'God Squad' goes with jobs, not owls



Spotted owl: Doomed to extinction?

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration said Thursday that restoring the beleaguered northern spotted owl to health is not worth the timber jobs it would cost and so launched a historic assault on the nation's toughest environmental law, the Endangered Species Act.

The administration wants to allow logging in millions of acres of Pacific Northwest forest in which the 3,000 remaining pairs of owls depend. Its proposal was so aggressive that even critics were surprised.

While Bush administration officials talked of balancing owls and jobs, government scientists predicted the logging will ultimately drive the endangered bird to extinction.

Environmentalists charged that the administration proposal represented a direct attack on the Endangered Species Act of 1973, a symbolic centerpiece of the nation's modern concern for environmental protection.

The administration proposal came as criticism of the act mounts in Congress and the nation. Adopted during an era of intense public concern over dwindling resources, the act flatly forbids harm to species in danger of extinction.

But now, with the country crawling from recession, the cost of that mandate has become clear: Efforts to save scarce wildlife are threatening to hike electric rates in Washington, impose water

conservation in Texas, and curtail farming in California and Colorado.

On Thursday, conservative politicians and business groups put the owl proposal into that broader context, characterizing it as a major challenge to the environmental movement. Clearly, they said, the President Bush believes it is now wiser to defend jobs than to fight for the environment.

The administration's Thursday assault on the act's strict terms is unprecedented in its intensity.

It began with a morning meeting of an administration committee known informally as the "God Squad," which voted 5-2 to overrule the act and permit timber harvests on 1,700 acres in Douglas County, Ore. The act itself gives the God Squad authority, but it is tightly proscribed and has never been used.

Stradley ordered to stand trial in death of Amanda

TWIN FALLS — The man accused of killing a 2-year-old girl in January was ordered Thursday to stand trial on a charge of first-degree murder.

Fifth District Magistrate John Varin ruled the state has enough evidence to try Donnell "Bud" Stradley, 28, for the death of Amanda Hosteler.

In his own statement to police, Stradley "admitted using force against the child and creating the injury that caused her death," Twin Falls County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Dan Mink said.

According to testimony from Twin Falls police detective Ron Roberson, Stradley said he was swinging the child in his arms, then tossed her 10-12 feet through a doorway onto her waterbed.

Stradley said he misjudged the toss, and Amanda landed on the corner of the bed, hitting her abdomen, Roberson said.

An autopsy revealed that Amanda died from internal

bleeding caused by a severe blow to the abdomen. After Mink called his final witness, Twin Falls County Public Defender Mike Wood asked the judge to dismiss the case or at least reduce the charge to involuntary manslaughter.

"This is not a murder," Wood said. The only evidence connecting his client to the death of Amanda Hosteler is his own description of the events, he said.

None of the medical experts who testified at the preliminary hearing was asked if landing on the padded bed corner could cause the injury that killed Amanda, Wood said.

Mink pointed out testimony from doctors, police and emergency personnel that indicates Stradley lied about the source of Amanda's injuries.

Only after being confronted with a pathologist's report identifying Amanda's injuries two days later did he tell authorities what happened, Mink said.

Under Idaho law, someone can be charged with first-degree murder if he kills someone while committing

Endeavour pair spends 6 hours on spacewalk

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Astronaut Kathryn Thornton on Thursday became the second American woman to walk in space when she floated in the open cargo bay of Endeavour and tested techniques for building a space station.

Thornton was accompanied by Thomas Akers, one of three men who captured a wayward satellite the day before.

"We never did it like this before" in training, Thornton said as the two assembled a pole structure that towered over the bay.

"We didn't. But we thought about it, didn't we?" Akers replied. Earlier, the seven shuttle astronauts watched as delight 470 miles away as the rescued Intelsat-6 satellite was rocketed into high orbit.

"It was really kind of neat to look at here," said shuttle commander Daniel Bredenstein. "It left a kind of a reddish glow around it as it took off, and a red cloud."

Cheers erupted in the Intelsat control center in Washington and at ground tracking stations around the world.

"It's on its way home!" said Intelsat spokesman Michael Newsome.

Thornton and Akers left the safety of their cabin late Thursday afternoon for a six-hour outing. They received a last-minute chore, to check a suborbital antenna in the bay.

Thornton got a late start because of a problem with instruments on her space suit that provided information about life support. Mission Control said ground readings showed nothing wrong, but told her to hurry back to the safety of the airlock if she sensed something amiss.

'Don't drink and ride' latest advice

ATLANTA — A study has found nearly 40 percent of people killed by falling off horses in one state had been drinking, prompting a government warning Thursday against drinking and riding.

"It makes as little sense to drink and ride and it does to drink and drive," said Dr. Thomas Cole, injury control chief with the Department of Environmental Health and Natural Resources in North Carolina.

The study, reported Thursday by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control, examined blood-alcohol content from 13 people killed in North Carolina by falling or being thrown from horseback from 1979-89. Five, or 39 percent, had been drinking.

The CDC noted that the study included only North Carolina but Cole said there's no reason to think horse enthusiasts anywhere else aren't at equal risk of dying from riding drunk.

Water war brewing in bone-dry S. Idaho

TWIN FALLS — The clouds of a water war are gathering over southern Idaho.

"Idaho's always had a water war of one sort or another," said state Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, chairman of the Senate Resources and Environment Committee, on Thursday. "This one is broader."

The Idaho Department of Water Resources on Wednesday put a stop to new water development in southern and eastern Idaho, a decision that may well set irrigator against irrigator.

The moratorium is a result of pressure from Magic Valley irrigators and others who say their water rights are being affected by new groundwater development on the Snake River Plain.

The conflict may pit people who have water against those who would like some

water, Noh said. In the sense that groundwater diversions already are affecting senior water rights, the moratorium is very late in coming, he said.

"It's a symptom of a serious problem," he said, a problem which is not fully understood.

How much of the current problem is related to drought and how much is related to human activity? When the drought ends, will spring flows and senior water rights recover?

About 730 acres and pending permits for the diversion of 1,353 cubic feet per second of water to irrigate 96,907 acres east of Milner Dam await approval.

But groundwater pumping since the mid-1950s and reduced flood irrigation have reduced the level of the Snake River Plain Aquifer. The springs where the aquifer emerges into the Snake River have shown a steady decline.

The problem has been worsened by the past few years of drought. Idaho water law is based on the principle that the earliest legitimate water users have the first claim to water in times of shortages. The law allows the senior water-rights holder to sue other users who may be affecting the older right.

But it's hard to prove that a new

irrigation well in St. Anthony would affect water rights in Twin Falls. The lack of effective enforcement of water law is one of the problems that long has plagued the state, Noh said.

"The fact remains that water is a finite resource," he said.

Idaho may have to look to other states for solutions to its present problems, Noh said. But so far no other states have successfully dealt with the dilemma of managing groundwater and surface water without causing economic losses for some users.

— DeWitt Moss of Jerome, chairman of the Committee of Nine, said his panel is divided over the moratorium and has no position on the issue.

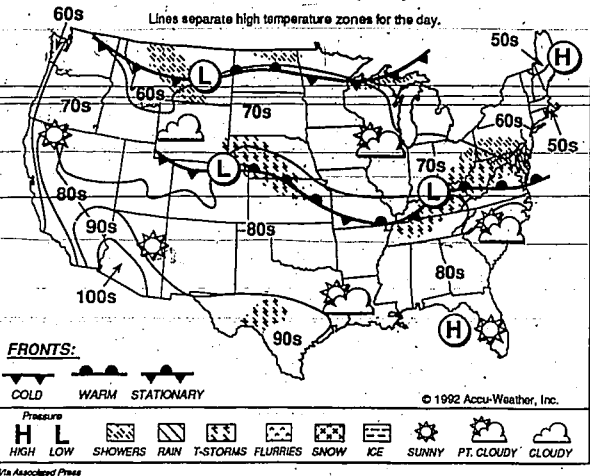

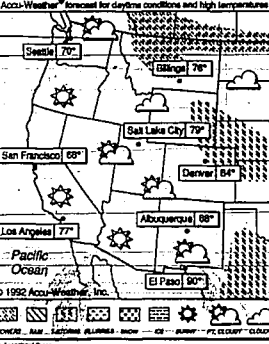

Storms hammer Oklahoma, Texas with rain, hail

Thunderstorms packing heavy rain and hail as big as golf balls hunkered over parts of the South on Thursday while unseasonably cold temperatures plagued the Great Lakes region.

Strong thundershowers dropped heavy rain in northeastern Texas. A severe thundershow storm watch was posted for parts of central and northeastern Texas, northwestern Louisiana and southwestern Arkansas.

Thunderstorms over east central Oklahoma produced dime-size hail at Stigler. Storms over north central Texas produced dime sized hail at Wauqua, golf ball size hail at Frisco and Farmers Branch, and hail an inch in diameter in Dallas County.

Showers and thundershowers over north central Texas produced 2.25 inches of rain at the Dallas-Fort Worth. Temperatures in six hours.

Temperatures didn't rise above the 40s in the upper Great Lakes region Thursday afternoon. Clouds and rain kept temperatures in the 50s in the middle Mississippi Valley.

A record low temperature of 63 degrees was recorded for the date Thursday in Hollywood, Fla. The morning low for the lower 48 states was 27 degrees at Marquette, Mich.

Grand jury demands records in House Post Office probe

WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal grand jury investigating the House Post Office has subpoenaed office expense records of Ways and Means Chairman Dan Rostenkowski, two other lawmakers and the former sergeant-at-arms.

The subpoena also sought information on stamp allotments for House members.

The subpoenas appeared to broaden the investigation, which until now has focused on embezzlement and alleged drug dealing.

The grand jury sought six years of vouchers for goods and services submitted by Rostenkowski, D-Ill.; Reps. Austin J. Murphy and Joseph Kolter, both D-Pa.; and former Sergeant-at-Arms Jack Russ. The period covered ended April 15.

Neither side likes owl decision

SEATTLE (AP) - The Bush administration is inviting America's forests to "drop dead" with its new announcement Thursday on the northern spotted-owl, environmentalists charged.

Timber industry officials weren't entirely pleased, either.

But they said there are indications the government is beginning to listen more to the plight of humans than in the call of birds.

It was the second time the Endangered Species Committee has granted full exemption under the act.

"The Bush administration's message to America's forests is 'drop dead,'" said Michael Fischer, executive director of the Sierra Club. "Destroying an animal's habitat is the surest way to drive it to extinction, no matter how many gimmicks you invent."

Andy Kerr, conservation director of the Oregon Natural Resources Council, noted all five members of the so-called "God-Squad" panel that voted for the Oregon logging exemption - nicknamed because they have the power to override the Endangered Species Act - were appointed by Bush.

He added: "You can take the God Squad to court, and we will."

Mark Rey, of the American Forest Resource Alliance, said the decision "doesn't go nearly far enough in helping people and allows only a minuscule volume of timber to be sold."

Timber industry leaders said the committee should have approved 44 proposed timber sales covering 4,426 acres in western Oregon, instead of agreeing to only 13 of them on 1,700 acres.

"This was the first time timber families and communities were given due consideration in the spotted owl debate. Unfortunately, the committee chose to turn its back on the hard-working people of the

Northern spotted owl facts

■ Owls need old growth forests because they dwell in mid-forest, safe from hawks and other predatory birds who inhabit the sky above, and animals who would eat them.

■ The owls are small and live in pairs, male and female. They eat rodents.

■ They are found predominantly in national forests in Oregon, Washington and California.

Pacific Northwest," said Jim Geisinger, president of the Northwest Forestry Association.

Lujan on Thursday introduced a long-term plan that would restrict logging across only about 2.8 million acres of federal land.

"Unfortunately, this plan will still cost 15,000 jobs in timber-dependent communities, especially in the already hard-hit areas of southern Washington, Oregon, Cascades and northern California," Geisinger said.

Lujan's plan is an alternative to one proposed by the Northern Spotted Owl Recovery Team, a panel of government scientists, that wants to restrict logging across about 5.4 million federal acres in Washington, Oregon and northern California. Lujan said that plan would cost about 32,100 jobs.

Improper word choice leaves Arizona senator red-faced

WASHINGTON - The federal deficit is out of control, Sen. Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., declared Thursday, and it's huge - a "gigantic organism."

DeConcini made the pronouncement at a news conference to endorse a balanced budget amendment. He apparently intended to say "organism."

Instead, DeConcini said he expected the amendment to be approved and that "it's going to be a great day because we're going to finally wrestle to the

ground this gigantic organism that is just out of control, that just absolutely can't put itself together."

There were a few muffled chuckles as DeConcini, who didn't notice his slip, finished speaking. But the room lost control when Sen. Charles Robb, D-Va., went to the podium and said, "...was just about to say I will join in everything my colleague had said - with one notable exception."

A blushing DeConcini hurried from the room; presumably to wrestle with other problems.

certained other felonies, such as robbery.

The Idaho Legislature recently added aggravated battery on a child under 12 to that list.

The law, commonly called the "felony murder rule," means the prosecutor does not have to prove the killing was premeditated to convict Stradley of first-degree murder.

Stradley, who remains free on bond, could face the death penalty if convicted.

Amanda's mother, 21-year-old Jodie Ann Hostetler, avoided trial by agreeing to plead guilty to one

felony count of permitting injury to a child.

As part of the agreement, a second felony child abuse count will be dropped.

If 5th District Judge J. William Hart agrees to the deal, Hostetler will be given a suspended prison sentence and placed on probation for two years.

She also will be required to undergo a psychological evaluation.

The plea bargain also clears Hostetler from any future prosecution related to the treatment or death of her daughter.

If Hart refuses to sign the agreement, Hostetler can withdraw her guilty plea.

Kempthorne denies insider accusation

BOISE (AP) - Challengers for the Republican U.S. Senate nomination on Thursday attacked front-runner Dirk Kempthorne and the state GOP hierarchy supporting him as political insiders only intent on perpetuating the kind of federal irresponsibility voters seem intent on ending.

But the Boise mayor, remaining true to his precept of not criticizing fellow Republicans, turned aside the charges, praising former-GOP-Sen. James McClure, who is chairman of his campaign, and rejecting suggestions he would merely be a pawn of the special interests

McClure now represents.

"I can't be bought," Kempthorne, 40, declared during the hour-long debate sponsored by the League of Women Voters and the Idaho Press Club and broadcast statewide by Idaho Public Television.

"I don't buy any of what he's saying," Boise stockbroker Milton Erhart shot back.

But it was evident throughout the debate that Kempthorne believed the real battle will be in November against Democratic Congressman Richard Stallings. Stallings is the odds-on favorite in his three-way primary, and has declined to

participate in that debate on Sunday because of a spat with Panhandle businessman Matt Schaffer.

Kempthorne's confidence about the nomination was obvious when at one point he used his time not to question Erhart or Rod Beck but to attack Stallings for votes he had recently cast in Congress.

And for the first time, the mayor made clear to pro-choice Republicans that he opposes them.

He said flatly he would not support the pending Freedom of Choice Act, the pro-choice compromise plan to push if the U.S. Supreme Court overturns its Roe vs. Wade decision.

GOP rebels step up pressure to alter party's anti-abortion stand

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans who favor abortion rights are putting up billboards, planning rallies and making television ads in a show of muscle aimed at getting their party to reverse its anti-abortion stand.

Billboards contending most Republicans support legalized abortion start going up Friday in Salt Lake City, where the party is holding a platform hearing May 26 on abortion and other family issues.

Williams: From City of Brotherly Love to the City of (fallen) Angels

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Willie Williams, retiring Friday after four years as police commissioner, cleaned out his desk this week and prepared for a tougher job: chief of Los Angeles' embattled police department.

"Being a police chief in America has never been an easy job, and this one won't be any easier than the one in Philadelphia," Williams said in an interview with The Associated Press. "It's going to be harder."

The 7,900-member Los Angeles Police Department, already under fire since white officers beat black motorists Rodney King, has been criticized for its handling of rioting that erupted after four officers were acquitted.

Critics say police did too little too late to head off the deadly riots and the resulting \$785 million in damage. Williams, 48, never known to speak too loudly too soon, says he'll wait until he takes over for Daryl Gates next month before he gets specific about his plans.

"But he said his priority as Los Angeles' first black police chief will be to improve officer morale. "I'm going to try to spend most of my first few days in the field, and get to see them, get to talk to them and let them see Willie Williams face-to-face," he said.

"You have to be available to the officers," he said. "You have to get out there and talk to the men and women, and support them. Even when they make mistakes, as long as it's not gross negligence, you got to work with them, and provide some leadership. Right now, they are starving for leadership. "After this riot they really feel like

they've been abandoned by everyone from the top, and blame for inaction is being cast on them which is incorrect," he said.

Another priority will be to improve relations between the force and the community.

In Philadelphia, Williams inherited a department that had a legacy of corruption and brutality, especially

The late Republican national Chairman Lee Atwater described the party as a "big tent" with room for abortion rights supporters, and current GOP Chairman Richard Bond has agreed. But Bond also has said the party platform is likely to continue to reflect President Bush's opposition to abortion.

"Given the fact that we'll have the same nominee as we had in 1988, in all likelihood there won't be significant changes," national committee spokesman Gary Koops said Thursday. "But that will be a decision made by the platform committee in meetings the week before the convention."

Party officials expect to hear from four witnesses on each side of the abortion issue at the hearing later this month. The anti-abortion panel will be led by conservative activist Phyllis Schlafly.

The abortion-rights panel thus far includes Ann Stone, head of a political action committee called Republicans for Choice; Mary Dent Crisp, chairman of the grass-roots National Republican Coalition for Choice; and former Ohio Sen. Robert Taft Jr. The Republican Party in Salt Lake City is deciding who gets in to observe the hearing and Stone said abortion-rights supporters are being kept out. But she said they are planning to "make noise outside the four walls."

In addition to the billboards, the Stone and Crisp groups say they'll run full-page newspaper ads in Salt Lake City the day of the platform hearings. They have scheduled a rally there that evening as well as a mid-day press conference to preview radio and TV ads they plan to air in the weeks before the convention.

Salt Lake City, with its conservative Mormon character, was considered an appropriate symbolic setting for the Republican platform hearing on family issues. The Utah state party is solidly anti-abortion.

Abortion-rights groups are spending their money sparingly in Utah for that reason, said Stone. She said the broadcast ads won't run there this summer and the groups aren't paying for billboard space — it was donated by an abortion-rights supporter.

According to Stone, one of the new broadcast ads will ask Republicans whether they think their party needs to come back to its roots and make the platform more neutral on abortion. If so, they'll be asked to call a 900-number.

The other ad is expected to depict the anti-abortion faction of the party as religious crusaders and ask Republicans if they think their party should be a vehicle for religious beliefs.

If not, again, they'll be asked to call a 900-number.

California bank loss in millions

WASHINGTON (AP) — A top banking regulator told Congress Thursday the failure of a California bank that was secretly owned by the Bank of Credit and Commerce International will cost \$130 million to \$140 million.

John W. Stone, director of the Supervision Division of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., said at a Senate hearing it's not certain whether taxpayers will have to

cover some of the loss. He said the FDIC hopes to recover some of the money from a special fund of forfeited BCCI assets.

At the same hearing, Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass., said there may be a fifth U.S. bank with ties to foreign-owned BCCI, which pleaded guilty to federal racketeering charges earlier this year and agreed to forfeit a record \$550 million in U.S. assets.

State Department admonishes Libya

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration said Thursday that Libya's continued support for terrorism contradicts new promises from Tripoli to behave. "These are words, we want to see action," the State Department spokeswoman said.

The skepticism was expressed in response to pledges reported by JANA, the Libyan news agency, to cut all ties to terrorist groups.

Libya is the target of U.N. economic sanctions for refusing to surrender two suspects in a 1988 Pan Am jetliner attack that killed 270 people and for harboring terrorist groups.

Western diplomats at the United Nations said Col. Moammar Gadhafi's government had agreed to issue a statement denouncing terrorism. But they said U.N. sanctions on Libya would not be lifted until the suspects were extradited for trial in Britain or the United States.

Feds unplug antics of catastrophic DJs

WASHINGTON — Federal regulators put out the word Thursday they'll have the last laugh the next time some wild and crazy deejay thinks it's funny to broadcast a phony nuclear attack or fake a murder.

The Federal Communications Commission unanimously approved a \$25,000 fine for any broadcast hoax that could harm the public.

In deference to First Amendment concerns about infringing free speech, the commission said the rule would apply only if the hoax involved a crime or catastrophe that would scare the public so much that police and rescue forces would be called, injuries could result or property damaged.

Senate rejects measure limiting claims

WASHINGTON — The Senate on Thursday rejected a 10-year effort by manufacturers and other business groups to limit the ability of consumers to collect punitive damages over faulty products.

On a 53-45 vote, the Senate turned down a measure by Sen. Bob Kasten, R-Wis., to establish nationwide standards on how much consumers can recover in suits against manufacturers.

Republicans tried to attach the measure championed by Vice President Dan Quayle to a Democratic bill that would require states to let people register to vote when they apply for drivers licenses, jobs pay or welfare.

Mother convicted of murder kills self

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — A woman accused of killing her two sons died from an overdose of an anti-depressant drug, hours after she was convicted in one of the deaths she had blamed on the drug Halcion, authorities said.

Nila Wacaser's use of Halcion was a key to her claim that she was insane when she fatally stabbed her sons Aug. 28, 1987, shortly after learning she'd lost custody of them to her former husband.

Her defense, which contended that the world's most widely prescribed sleeping drug can cause memory loss, depression, paranoia and irrational actions, has been invoked with mixed success in trials nationwide. For Wacaser, 43, the defense failed. Last Friday, a jury that had heard widely differing expert testimony on Halcion convicted her of first-degree murder in the death of her 8-year-old son Eric.

Drug pusher could face death penalty

ATLANTA — A convicted drug trafficker accused of arranging the deaths of four people will be tried under a 1988 law allowing prosecutors to seek the death penalty, a U.S. attorney said Thursday.

Travis Williams, the reputed leader of the Miami Boys gang, was indicted Wednesday on charges of causing the deaths of a rival drug dealer, two people who processed crack cocaine and a cocaine buyer who didn't pay.

Williams was indicted on lesser charges, including 10 accused of participating in a drug-dealing conspiracy. Under the 1988 law, federal prosecutors may seek the death penalty against drug dealers, arms dealers or killers of federal agents; Williams' case will be the first in Georgia and the fifth nationally to be tried under the law.

Clinton pledges education reform

LOS ANGELES — Democrat Bill Clinton on Thursday derided President Bush's school policies as failed "trickle-down education" and promised a more activist federal role to promote lifelong learning if he is elected.

"America needs an education president who shows up for class every day, not just once every four years," the Arkansas governor said in an impassioned speech at an inner-city community college.

Gorbachev appeals to Congress for aid at 'crucial, historic' time

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev appealed to Congress Thursday to pass a bill aiding the people of his disintegrated country, saying the assistance is crucial in a time of crisis.

"This is an historic moment and an historic opportunity," Gorbachev told about 300 members of the House and Senate assembled in a vaulted hall near the House floor. "It should not be allowed to slip by."

Gorbachev was greeted with a warm standing ovation by members of Congress, a sharp contrast with the controversy that flared five years ago when plans for a speech to Congress by the then-communist leader were dropped because of political opposition on Capitol Hill.

The speech was staged in Statuary Hall to avoid any slight to Russian President and former Gorbachev rival Boris Yeltsin, who is scheduled to address a formal joint meeting of Congress in the House chamber on June 17.

After the speech, Gorbachev went to a luncheon with congressional leaders, and he was to have a private dinner later with President Bush at the White House. The Soviet Union's last president was near the end of a two-week U.S. tour for the Gorbachev Foundation, whose goal is to promote democracy and disarmament.

Gorbachev took aim at those who seek to keep Russia in a weakened state because of Cold War prejudices. "Russia cannot be permanently kept offside in world politics," he said, speaking through a translator.

To do so, he said, would mean the

United States would lose a "good and reliable partner in its highly moral and intelligent foreign policy."

Geopolitically, Russia is in opposition to the United States, nor

is it a competitor." He predicted that "the superpower era will presumably fade further and further into the past."

"It is in the interests of the United States to give real assistance to reform in Russia," Gorbachev concluded. "Now is the most difficult stage of these reforms. In fact, we still haven't reached the bottom of the crisis." He asked lawmakers to "recall how much is riding on this vote."

On Wednesday, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee voted 14-4 for an open-ended aid package favored by Bush. The legislation offers only broad authorization for technical aid and credits for the former Soviet states, but leaves out most mention of specific dollar amounts.

Prospects for ultimate passage of the bill have been clouded by threats to attach unrelated provisions, including loan guarantees for Israel, and by domestic political considerations. Several leading House Democrats have said no new foreign aid can be approved until Bush agrees to sign domestic-aid legislation like an extension of unemployment benefits.

Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, introduced Gorbachev as a rare individual whose actions fundamentally changed the course of history. Under Gorbachev's presidency, "perestroika and glasnost became household words in America," Mitchell said.

And he drew applause when he added: "History's ultimate judgment will be that you opened the gates through which freedom flowed."

Perot: Life in Navy 'not for me'

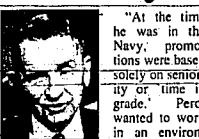
AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Ross Perot says his dislike of the Navy's seniority system and hope for merit promotions elsewhere prompted his father to ask two senators to help win his early release from active duty 37 years ago.

Documents reviewed by The Associated Press showed the elder Perot sought help from Texas Sens. Lyndon Johnson and Price Daniel in 1955 in an unsuccessful effort to get Perot released two years early from active duty.

Perot, who is readying an independent presidential bid, said he raised the question because the Korean conflict was over and he hoped to cut two years from his four-year obligation to the service.

"Perot raised the question in 1955 about whether or not his original obligation of two years was back in effect because the war was over," Perot's organization said in a written statement. It said the incident should not detract from Perot's reputation.

Perot, who is well-known for efforts to help prisoners of war and hostages, said through his aides that the Navy life was not for him.

"At the time he was in the Navy, promotions were based solely on seniority or time in grade," Perot wanted to work in an environment that promoted people based on merit and consideration.

His effort to leave the Navy also occurred the year that one Perot biography says the young officer had a falling out with his ship's captain.

In "Perot An Unauthorized Biography," author Todd Mason described Perot as having been on the Navy's career fast track.

After graduation from the U.S. Naval Academy, he had become chief engineer on the destroyer USS Sigourney. When the ship's command changed hands, Perot clashed with the new captain, according to the book. Details were not given.

The written statement says a dispute arose when a senior officer ordered Perot to carry out two illegal acts. The statement does not specify what the acts were but says Perot refused.

Unemployment filings increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — The number of Americans filing claims for unemployment benefits increased for a second straight week, the government said Thursday in a report economists viewed as a reminder of how fragile the current recovery is.

The Labor Department said a total of 424,000 newly laid-off workers applied for benefits during the week ending May 2, the highest level in a month and up 10,000 from the previous week's 414,000.

The government said the figure would have been even higher but the riots in Los Angeles kept an estimated 2,600 people from filing claims.

Economists said the fact that unemployment claims have risen for two straight weeks could be a troubling sign of renewed labor market weakness.

Explosion forces families to evacuate

MOSCOW — An ammunition dump for the former Soviet navy's Pacific Fleet caught fire and exploded Thursday, unleashing a cloud of yellow smoke and forcing the evacuation of thousands of families, a news agency reported.

An undisclosed number of people were injured in the blast on the outskirts of the Russian Far East city of Vladivostok, but no deaths were reported, the ITAR-Tass news agency said.

Residents were evacuated to the Amur Bay coast, ITAR-Tass said. It was not immediately known what started the fire, and no further details were available.

Explosions could be heard for at least three hours, ITAR-Tass said.

Filipino crowds protest election results

MANILA, Philippines — Troops rushed Thursday to guard election offices in several towns after angry mobs stormed them to protest alleged vote fraud in this week's national election.

The wave of complaints — virtually all stemming from local races — raised concerns that the public might not accept the outcome of the close presidential race, regardless of the winner.

Three days after the presidential balloting, anti-graft crusader Miriam Defensor Santiago was locked in a tight race with President Corason Aquino's chosen candidate, former Defense Secretary Fidel Ramos. Mrs. Santiago has already claimed victory, but Ramos' spokesman described the election as a three-way fight among Mrs. Santiago, Ramos and businessman Eduardo "Danding" Cojuangco.

France remembers Dietrich at funeral

PARIS — Marlene Dietrich, the sultry star of cinema and cabaret, was remembered at her funeral Thursday for the combative spirit that propelled her career and turned her against her homeland's Nazi rulers.

"Everyone was struck by her sense of duty, like a soldier as she once said. She wanted to die like a soldier," said the Rev. Philippe Brizard, setting the theme of the 90-minute Roman Catholic service at the Madeleine church.

Dietrich's closed coffin was draped in the French flag and adorned with a simple bouquet of white wildflowers. Medals, including France's Legion of Honor, were displayed military-style at its foot.

Striking German union rejects contract

BONN, Germany — Germany's largest public employees union voted Thursday to reject a wage contract that ended a crippling 11-day strike last week. But it did not appear the workers would resume their walkout.

Meanwhile, the powerful IG Metall engineers and metalworkers union appeared headed for a strike following the failure of wage talks Thursday in several districts, including the largest in North-Rhine Westphalia state. The OetV public employees union rejected a 5.4 percent wage increase worked out by government and union leaders on May 7.

Can Afghanistan accept Islamic governing?

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — A little more than two weeks after the establishment of the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan, the new country's rulers are busy trying to create an Islamic society from the ashes of a Communist one.

The government shut Kabul's dozen movie theaters this week so Islamic censors could check all films, including "Rambo III," which had been packing in more than 600 people a night at Kabul's Khyber Cinema.

State-run TV ended the decades-old tradition of Thursday night Indian movies, considered irritating in this part of the world. Women were ordered to cover their heads, legs and arms or risk flogging. Alcohol was outlawed. And, effective Thursday, the new authorities commanded all government employees to pray at midday.

Kabul, the capital, still lacks a police force but it already has a Committee for Islamic Publicity — established to fight "sin," according to the official Bakhtar News Agency. Looting occurs nightly throughout the city but the government appears more interested in matters of the spirit than those on the street.

Yet despite orders and circulars replete with Islamic fervor, few people believe Afghanistan can become a fundamentalist Islamic state like its neighbor to the west, Iran.

The country's numerous and fracturing ethnic groups and tribes, its traditions of fierce individuality and the disparate strains of Islam that run through this landlocked nation militate against such change.

Even among ministers in the new government, which replaced the Soviet-installed regime last month, there is already bickering over the direction the country should be taking.

Its Islamic traditions are weak. And many of its people follow a mystical, head-of-Islam, than their Muslim brothers in Iran or the Arab states.

are some fundamentalists in the government now but they will be thrown out. They are nobodies who've become somebodies overnight."

Haq bemoaned what he said were incorrect priorities pushed by the new regime.

Afghanistan is considered the second-poorest nation in the world after Cambodia. But its Ministry of Commerce is open only four hours a day while the Ministry of Information and Culture, the center of the Islamization movement, is functioning overtime.

"We should be worrying about food, security, medicine, industry and the economy," Haq said. "The other stuff can wait."

Afing Minister of Culture Siddiq Chakari rejected Haq's call for practical steps to get the country back on its feet and said Islam would be Afghanistan's savior.

"The rule of Islam will do away with the difficulties that the people are facing," said the 29-year-old.

Firebrands like Chakari, backed by armed gangs, are taking advantage of Afghanistan's current chaos to impose their will on Kabul.

Last week, for example, unidentified gunmen burst into the Baharestan Cinema in the middle of a Kung Fu movie called "The Boys From Shaolin Temple" and forced a full-house audience to a mosque to pray.

Heavy fighting erupts in Bosnia in spite of declared truce

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Attacking Serb irregulars fought fierce artillery duels and house-to-house battles with Sarajevo's Muslim defenders on Thursday. A defense official said virtually the entire city came under bombardment, and at least four people were reported killed.

"Decisive battles ... are being fought," Bosnian radio said. Shells crashed into the presidential building and the headquarters of the U.N. peacekeeping force, wounding a peacekeeper. The heavy fighting in Sarajevo, site of the 1984 Winter Olympics, broke out hours after the United Nations declared it was too dangerous to maintain a peacekeeping mission in Bosnia-Herzegovina.

And the battles came despite conciliatory statements by Radovan Karadzic, the leader of Bosnia's Serb community, who said Serbs were prepared to give up some of the land they have occupied in order to secure a peaceful settlement. At U.N. headquarters in New York, Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali said Muslim militias had started the latest fighting, breaking a truce declared by the Serbs. But he said Serbs are largely to blame

for the bloodshed that has gripped the republic since it declared independence nearly three months ago.

Independence is opposed by Bosnia's Serb minority, and Serb irregulars surrounding Sarajevo have been blocking vital food and medicine shipments.

Of two good lawmakers, Peters looks slightly better

It's a classic choice: Youthful energy and enthusiasm vs. experienced judgment. This time, we'll lean toward experience.

That whimsical-matchmaker, legislative reapportionment, is uniting Jerome County and most of Minidoka County this year as District 24. This shotgun wedding results in a Republican primary race between two competent but very different legislators.

Rep. Ralph Peters of Jerome is a three-term veteran legislator notable for his breadth of experience. After dual careers in farming and insurance and a stint as mayor of Jerome, he brings to the Legislature his keen knowledge of agriculture, business and local government.

and a quick study. He used his experience as an insurance agent to establish himself as a player on insurance and health-care issues. He's confident (maybe overconfident), and given seasoning he could become a key member of the valley's legislative delegation.

Either of the two could be a better-than-average senator, and we wouldn't be disappointed to see either one win. We're endorsing Peters—mainly because his farming background is an important asset to the valley's delegation, but also because he simply is more experienced. We also like the fact that he is pro-choice on the abortion issue.

The choice wasn't easy for us, and it probably won't be easy for District 24's voters. Fortunately Cameron is young, and if he loses this race he will have ample opportunities to run again.

The one danger in this race is that it will create a struggle between Minidoka and Jerome counties for dominance of the new district. Presumably Jerome County's larger population would give it the advantage, but no one really wins that kind of fight.

The two counties share common interests (mainly agriculture), and the county line shouldn't be a partition. Whoever wins this race should make a special effort to represent the whole district.

Election 1992

Ralph Peters and Dean Cameron are seeking the Republican nomination for state senator in District 24. The winner will face Democrat Jason Stolldorf in November.

Peters, 70, is independent, conservative and perhaps crusty, but he's reasonable too. He helps keep an eye on state finances and has been a key player on the House State Affairs Committee, of which he is vice chairman.

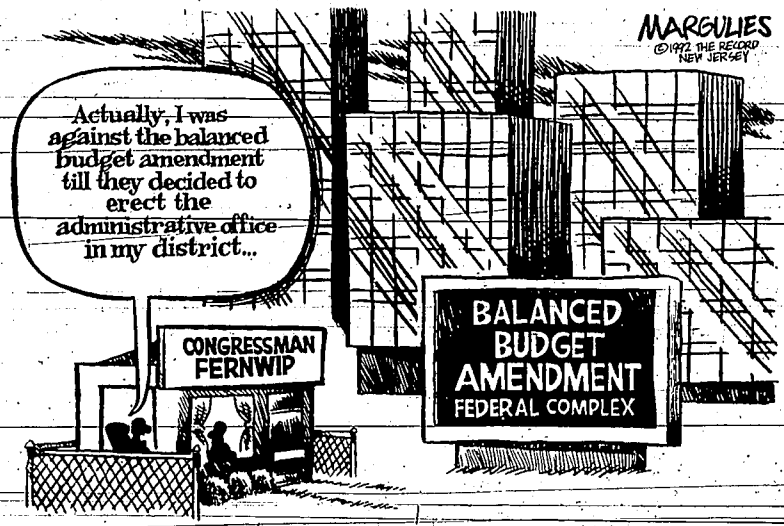
At less than half Peters' age, 31-year-old Dean Cameron of Rupert needed only one legislative session to establish himself as a feisty and able lawmaker. He was appointed to the Senate last summer when Lynn Tominga resigned, and he acquitted himself well in Boise this winter.

School needs auditorium

seats—is needed was the visit to the area of Dr. Lonise Bias in April. In order for the O'Leary students to hear her at one time, the entire school had to be bussed *across* town to CSI—with transit time both ways representing lost class time and added expense to the district. How much easier it would be to bus the students to the high school, which is much closer. Then her evening presentation had to be timed to overlap with the regularly scheduled rehearsal of the Magic Valley Symphony. Thus, having one auditorium in town inconvenienced two groups—the few who wanted to hear her and those involved in the rehearsal for the symphony's pops concert.

In short, the CSI Fine Arts Auditorium is overbooked and the situation is getting worse. A perfect example of unavoidable overbooking occurred on Mother's Day, when the Magic Valley Choral concert was followed a little over two hours later by a Suzuki string concert. The only way to end these bottlenecks is to approve this bond issue.

It is needed—badly. It is time—now. Please vote "yes" on May 19.

Fine arts take a back seat

As a traditional area of education, the study of the fine arts has enriched Idaho's public education

system for longer than a century. Lately, however, in a frantic effort to "keep up with the Japanese," classes in creative writing, dance, music, drama, visual art, and theater have been simmering on the back burner while science and mathematics have been boiling on the front one. To stop the diminishing of our cultural future, Twin Falls needs an auditorium to resurrect these ignored aesthetic ingredients.

The denial of the fine arts is witnessed in records of state and city education systems. In Chicago, there are 23 full-time teachers of the fine arts to cover the city's 498 elementary schools; in California, there is one fine arts teacher for every 1,600 students. In Michigan in 1974, there was a rate of 61 percent of the students receiving art education in the public schools; today that rate has decreased to 41 percent.

Schools have increased the student work load, striving to achieve higher national test scores. This in itself is not a poor attempt to produce educated citizens capable of making informed choices; but, by also educating the artist in students, they become better informed about the world globally and historically. Societies bond through the arts.

By upgrading our fine arts facilities, Magic Valley students will succeed in gaining a better and broader understanding. Shipping and advancing our exposure to the fine arts arouses people of all societies to behold the beauty of the arts which celebrate both our uniqueness and our commonality.

It is not good enough and is nearly impossible to partake in an embodied experience of Mozart when the band is performing in a gym where cheerleaders are chanting, and for the actors and actresses to relive Shakespeare in our "performing cafeteria." Worst of all are the debate events who spend countless evenings occupying empty classrooms of the homeless problem in America.

By denying the need for an auditorium, we are telling students that they can be educated without the fine arts, and that the fine arts are not important. Our inadequate facilities inhibit students'

opportunities to share in a well-balanced education.

The night I attended the show, almost every seat was filled, most of them with high school students.

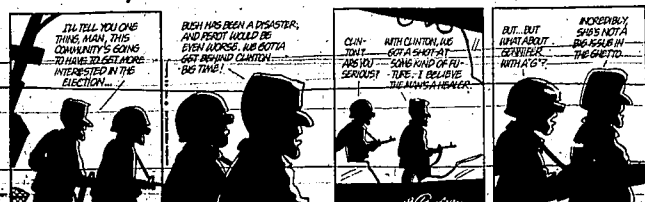

Pauling, 2-time Nobel laureate, says vitamin C delayed his cancer

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) — For a quarter century, two-time Nobel laureate Linus Pauling has taken megadoses of vitamin C and a lot of flak from skeptics for trying to stave off the deadly C — cancer.

Time and disease finally caught up with him in his ninth decade, he told — The Associated Press — on Wednesday, revealing he got prostate cancer five months ago. But at 91, he says he's recovering.

"Practically all old men are found to be developing cancer of the prostate sooner or later," a rosy-checked Pauling said in his office at the Linus Pauling Institute of Science and Medicine. "It may be that my vitamin C put the cancer off by 20 years."

Pauling said he was diagnosed with prostate cancer in December, about two months before his birthday. He's being successfully treated with a hormone-blocking drug, flutamide. A few weeks ago, he said, Stanford University Medical Center doctors told him he was no longer producing a prostate-specific antigen. That suggests the disease is no longer present, he said.

The white-haired Pauling, whose hands and age-wary voice each shake a bit, was told to come back for a checkup in four months. Meanwhile, he's taking flutamide along with his regular vitamin-C dosage — 18,000 milligrams a day, or 300 times the recommended daily requirement — in two heaping spoons of powder in his juice each morning.

"It looks as though this drug that I'm taking is doing the job," Pauling said. "But I feel that high intake of vitamin C and other vitamins can increase life expectancy by up to 24 years. ... That means someone who's supposed to live to 70 or 75 has a good chance of making it to 100."

"I don't expect to live forever," said Pauling, who wears a rakish black beret above smiling blue eyes. "But I'm feeling fine now. And the doctors don't seem especially worried."

He's feeling so fine that he has kept up his research publication rate of 10 to 15 papers a year, more than 1,000 since the 1920s. When he isn't traveling, Pauling works part-time at the research institute he founded nearly 20 years ago in Palo Alto, and part-time at his Big Sur ranch.

Pauling won the Nobel Prize for Chemistry in 1954 for unraveling the mysteries of chemical bonds in molecules. And in 1962, he won the Nobel Peace Prize for his effort to ban atmospheric testing of nuclear weapons.

"Sometimes I've been wrong over the years," Pauling said. "But I've been right so often that some scientists out there are saying, 'Well, maybe Pauling is right about vitamin C.'"

Researchers have been divided about whether large doses of vitamin C can help ward off cancer and heart disease. Last week, a study by the University of California, Los Angeles found that a daily intake of 300 milligrams may increase life expectancy in men by six years, and a daily dose of 150 milligrams could extend life two years. But few doctors have agreed with Pauling's view that taking vitamin C could extend the life of cancer patients as well as help prevent disease.

Health board stands pat on migrant tent ban

SPOKANE (AP) — The state Board of Health has refused to loosen restrictions on tents as housing for migrant farm workers.

The board on Wednesday rejected a recommendation from the state Department of Health that the rules be eased for three years because of housing shortages.

In December, the board, which sets policy, banned tents as residences for migrant workers, except in emergencies. But ways to resolve the housing shortage are still being debated.

A recent University of Washington study indicates housing is so scarce it would take 18,600 new units for all the workers to have a place to live. The estimated price tag: \$93 million.

Meanwhile, the board's approval of a three-week exemption in July for a Wenatchee cherry grower

did not go over well with a farmworkers' representative.

"I think this is a big joke—a shameful situation—that the Board of Health even is considering housing in tents the farmworkers, the people who feed the nation," said Bill Nicacio, a member of the United Farmworkers of Washington State. "This is the life you want these hard-working people to live?"

The Department of Health should not lower its standards for migrant-worker housing, Rebecca Smith, a lawyer with Evergreen Legal Services in Seattle, wrote in an analysis of the issue.

The agency "would not, for example, lower its standards and create a wholesale exemption for substandard nursing homes, even though there is a shortage of good nursing homes. It would not fi-

cease child care centers in substandard condition even though there is also a shortage of good day care. It would not advocate tents for homeless shelters," Smith wrote.

"It has instead chosen to subject only one class of people, farmworkers, to ever-lower standards, even though the Legislature has set a minimum that does not allow for tents."

"The department needs to say no tents, no more."

There are options, said Smith. She noted that on the board denied a grower's request for an exemption to the tent ban last year, the farmer brought in trailers for the workers. Kyle Mathison, the Wenatchee farmer who received the July exemption, told the board that without adequate housing and a ban on tents, the options are few.

Avon rep wants out of bargain arrangement

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A Coeur d'Alene Avon representative who drew national attention by selling her products to undercover police officers wants to back out of plea-bargain agreements.

Rose Christmann, 70, on Monday signed the agreements on two charges of illegally selling from her home. They were recorded Tuesday in 1st District Court and accepted by Magistrate Robert Burton.

However, Ms. Christmann said, she notified the city's attorney office on Tuesday afternoon that she changed her mind.

She said she withdrew from the agreement after a friend advised her the law gave everyone three days to back out of a contract.

"I had three days to cancel," Ms. Christmann said. "I have my rights."

Judge Burton declined to comment. Nancy Stricklin, Coeur d'Alene city attorney, said the agreement is part of the court record.

"That file speaks for the status of these cases," she said.

She faced two misdemeanor charges of illegally operating a business in a residential zone.

Ms. Christmann said she intends to pursue a commercial zone status for her property. The city twice has refused to rezone the parcel.

In the agreement, she was to gain a certificate allowing her to make telephone calls at her home. Customers, who ordered merchandise could drop by to pick it up. She could only post one sign.

In exchange, Ms. Christmann waived her right to a speedy trial. The agreement postponed a trial set to begin Monday.

Man who shot wife 6 times faces charge

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A jury has agreed that a Hayden man intended to kill his wife when he shot her six times in July.

The 1st District jury took an hour Wednesday to convict Lino Gomez, 52, of attempted first-degree murder.

He shot Vicki Gomez six times with a revolver at their home, but she survived the attack and recovered from her wounds.

In closing arguments, defense attorney Jonathan Hull said there was little evidence Gomez intended to kill her and he should only be found guilty of aggravated battery.

Hull employed testimony from a psychiatrist and the defendant.

"I bought the gun to kill myself," Gomez said.

He admitted he lied when he told the shop owner he was buying the small pistol to protect himself from bears.

Gomez said he purchased a false beard and a western outfit so he could get close to his wife and talk to her at the Hayden Dazz celebration that afternoon.

Senate hearings focus on river, Birds of Prey

LEWISTON — Republican Sen. Larry Craig plans Senate hearings May 21 on bills to protect a portion of the lower Salmon River and to expand the Snake River Birds of Prey National Conservation Area.

Craig introduced the lower Salmon bill during the Senate's last day of business last year.

The hearings will take place before the Public Lands and National Parks Subcommittee, said David Fish, Craig's press secretary.

Craig hopes to hold further hearings on the lower-Salmon bill in Idaho in July, Fish said.

Craig and Rep. Larry LaRocco, D-Idaho, agreed to work together on the two bills, Fish said. While Craig took the lead on the lower Salmon, LaRocco wrote the Birds of Prey bill.

A flap developed between the two early this year when LaRocco added a provision to protect the Payette River's North Fork from hydroelectric development to the House version of the lower Salmon bill.

Fish said Craig has not promised complete support for the Birds of Prey bill.

"He's going to take a very close look at it and those folks showing up at the hearing are certainly going to have a say in what the Senate does."

"The senator may choose to perfect it but I believe the goal of both Larrys is the same," Fish said.

Conservation League plans to sue over grazing decision

STANLEY — The Idaho Conservation League has informed the U.S. Forest Service it will sue the agency over its failure to protect one of the Northwest's most important salmon spawning streams.

The environmental group filed a 60-day notice of intent Wednesday to sue for the Forest Service's delay in reducing grazing by two-thirds as it proposed along Marsh Creek and Valley Creek in the Stanley Basin.

The Sawtooth National Forest put a hold on the reduction in April after Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, wrote a letter to Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan asking that other alternatives be considered.

Madigan held up the decision on management of the 45,000-acre allotment until the Sawtooths decided to reconsider.

Up to 1,500 cattle now graze in the Stanley Basin. Eight ranching families are involved in the allotment. The ranchers, mostly from the Challis area, say the Forest Service's proposed grazing reduction would have put several of them out of business.

Cowboy poet plans benefit at CSI to help with roundup

TWIN FALLS — Famed Idaho cowboy poetry artist Howard Norskog will do a benefit show at CSI on May 30. The proceeds will go toward the Iron Horse Roundup, celebrating the 150th anniversary of the Shoshone Depot and railroad.

The benefit, in conjunction with Twin Falls Western Days, will also feature a singer and guitar player. There will be two shows, at 7:00 and 9:30 p.m.

Norskog has staged over 85 different poetry gatherings throughout the west. He's been on Idaho Falls, TV, written 5 books and been featured on National Public Radio.

Work center, school won't tax sewer system

TWIN FALLS — A work-release center planned for south Twin Falls would have little, if any, impact on sewer services, city Engineer Gary Young says.

With a proposed population of more than 20 residents, the center would have the impact of about a 10- or 20-lot subdivision, Young said. "The volumes just aren't significant," he said.

Even if an elementary school is built in South Park, the sewer can handle the waste, Young said. A \$9.8 million school bond issue up before voters on Tuesday includes plans for a grade school on Washington Street South.

The city plans a \$250,000 upgrade of the Rock Creek pump station this summer, which will increase sewer capacity in the trunk line about 50 percent, Young said.

The Idaho Division of Environmental Quality is reviewing plans for the upgrade. If the state OKs the plan, work could start in July and be finished by the end of August, he said.

The city has asked several South Park businesses to halt production a couple of days a year because the sewer gets overloaded, Young said. These businesses include Universal Frozen Foods, Longview Fiberglass and the Western Dairymen's Cooperative.

UFF by far contributes the most waste water — about 2 million gallons a day, he said.

New tax notices head for Gooding mail slots

GOODING — Gooding County is sending out its second round of property tax notices this month to make up a shortfall in its levy.

Residents ought to expect their second tax bills by May 20, county Treasurer Helen Faulkner said Thursday.

"The county came up short — to the tune of about \$700,000 — when a clerical error was made in figuring the total assessment earlier this year. That error became official when county Clerk John Myers and the Idaho Tax Commission certified it."

But the Legislature approved a bill that allowed the county to amend its tax levy, so the upcoming round of tax notices reflects the amount residents

owe to make up the difference in needed taxes, Faulkner said.

It does not represent higher taxes, she said. "There is a lot of misunderstanding here as to why we're billing," Faulkner said.

She added since discovery of the error last winter, a lot of officials of various taxing districts within the county complained their budgets wouldn't cover their expenses.

While that was true, under state law none of the taxing districts were allowed to raise their levies, Faulkner said.

Faulkner added that some residents may notice their total taxes have gone up, but that is because the county began tacking a solid waste fee onto the bills. Some properties also were reappraised, she said.

Moratorium changes life for Magic Valley irrigators

TWIN FALLS — Bill Kelly of Albion may not get his permit to pump irrigation water out of the ground in Jerome County.

He has applied for a license to irrigate 610 acres in Jerome County, but his application may be held up by a moratorium imposed by the Idaho Department of Water Resources.

The department Wednesday called a halt to most new water development in southern and eastern Idaho.

"It wouldn't be good," said Kelly, who also has 128 water shares in the North Side Canal Co.

The moratorium is a result of pressure from Mogie Valley irrigators and others who say their water rights are being affected by new groundwater development in the Snake River Basin.

Kelly said he has applied for a permit to cover what he's already pumping. He can prove that's the historic amount of water used on his farm, he said.

"I'm pumping over my license, but everybody is," he said. "I just applied for this permit to be legal."

He said he feels the water doesn't belong to

the state. The government gave the mineral rights and rights to natural resources when it gave his great-great grandfather the homestead Kelly now farms, Kelly said.

"If there's gold there, it'd be ours," he said.

It is not known yet how the moratorium will affect Kelly's operation.

Applications for supplemental irrigation water will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis, said Glen Saxton, chief of the Department of Water Resources' water allocation bureau.

DeWitt Moss of Jerome, board member of the North Side Canal Co., has three wells on his land. One, 278 feet deep and dating from 1922, has gone dry, he said.

Several wells, more than 400 feet deep, on Jerome Butte have gone dry, Moss said.

"Virgil Temple, manager of A&B Irrigation District in Rupert, says his company has seen some of its wells drop by about 30 percent. And when the water level drops, the capacity of the pumps is reduced, he said.

Since 1950, the aquifer has dropped about seven feet, Temple said.

Since 1987 it has fallen another seven to eight feet. The reduction means the company is delivering 5 to 10 percent less irrigation water to its customers.

Burley youngster walks, but ordeal isn't over

BURLEY — For the first time in his young life Jordan Koyle can stand up on his own two feet.

The 3-year-old has just a few words for the experience, saying "I'm big now."

The Burley child is back home with parents Bradley and Jana Koyle after undergoing surgery at Primary Childrens Hospital in Salt Lake City seven weeks ago that will one day allow him to walk.

Jordan's surgery, selective dorsal rhizotomy, is performed at only two hospitals in the United States, the other one in Minnesota. The surgery was needed to correct a mild cerebral palsy condition that affected Jordan's legs only.

"He walked on his lip toes and could take only a few steps before falling

because he had no sense of balance, Jana said, "and he could barely sit up before the surgery. He couldn't sit up straight because his hamstrings were so short."

Jana said her son's condition worsened as he grew older, and doctors warned the family that if Jordan did not have the surgery, he would end up in a wheelchair for the rest of his life. "It was never a decision for us; we had to take the risk."

And a substantial risk it was: Jordan's mother described the surgery that involves shaving off the vertebrae and operating on the nervous system in the spine.

Jordan was in critical condition in intensive care for three days after the surgery, but his parents didn't realize he was listed as in critical condition until after his recovery.

"I'm glad we didn't know that," Jana said. "It was scary enough just seeing him

in intensive care hooked up to everything."

The time in the hospital when Jordan expressed his surprise about being "big now" is one of the few times he will be standing during the next year, though. For now, he is in a wheelchair, and he may crawl but not walk. He may stand some, but only in braces.

Before the surgery, Jordan used his legs together, in a hopping-like manner, instead of separately and his medical specialists wanted him to avoid in order to learn to use his legs separately, Jana explained.

The next year will also mean a lot of therapy for Jordan. Every week includes five days of therapy at the local hospital, three for physical and two for occupational and speech.

Jordan must return every month to Primary Childrens Hospital for an evaluation and every three months, he will travel to

either Boise or Idaho Falls for a Rhoizotomy Clinic staffed by his physician and therapists from Primary Childrens Hospital.

Jordan is doing pretty good, says his mom, but there is one problem, he has developed early anorexia and has refused to eat since the surgery.

He had a reaction to the anesthesia; so doctors didn't worry at first but soon, he refused the liquids and now is fitted with a feed tube until this hurdle is conquered.

Jana credits Burley orthopedic surgeon Joe Petersen with pointing them toward Primary Childrens Hospital. Other physicians, who didn't know about the condition and its seriousness had told the Koyles that Jordan would grow out of it.

A fund has been established at First Interstate Bank, Burley, to help with the medical expense Jordan has incurred.

Ex-cellestimate's information allowed

IDAHO FALLS — Seventh District Judge Marvin Smith has granted a prosecution request to use information from a former cellmate against accused murderer Jeannie Disney.

Bonneville County authorities denied Thursday that they cut a deal with Susan Biggs of Idaho Falls for information they believe would be damaging to Disney's defense against charges she ordered the murder of her husband, Danny Disney, 33, last June.

The information Biggs supposedly made available to prosecutors has not been publicly disclosed.

Biggs was jailed on three charges of prescription fraud and had been a cellmate of Disney's when she agreed to discuss with authorities what apparently were voluntary statements by Disney, officials said.

Danger lurks in school volunteer policy

BOISE — Boise schools are relying more on volunteers for a one-on-one experience with children, but it has created a classroom system of haves and have-nots.

Some schools have volunteers every day, and more than one per class. At other schools, teachers struggle alone, often in overcrowded rooms. When you don't have any volunteers to help, it really cuts back on the amount of one-on-one interaction the kids have with adults," said Mark Briz, a fifth-grade teacher whose class at Whitney Elementary has 33 students.

Three of every four elementary classrooms in the district are like his. They have more than 20 students, the largest number recommended by the Idaho Education Association.

Bush signs LaRocco 'medal' measure

WASHINGTON — The first bill sponsored by Idaho Rep. Larry LaRocco has been signed into law by President Bush, authorizing the striking of silver medals to honor the men and women who served in Operation Desert Storm.

A bill LaRocco introduced was included in the 1992 Omnibus Commemorative Coins and Medal Act signed by the president on Wednesday. Besides the war medal, the act includes the Christopher Columbus Quincentenary Coin, the White House 200th Anniversary Commemorative coin, the World Cup USA 1992 commemorative and the President James Madison coin honoring the Bill of Rights.

"This is truly win-win legislation," LaRocco said. "It helps the silver miners of northern Idaho while giving overdue recognition to the men and women who served our nation in the Persian Gulf."

Surplus silver from the nation's silver stockpile will be used for the medals, which will be financed through public sales of a bronze replica. LaRocco said that should help boost depressed silver prices.

Powerball produces 1st Idaho winner

BOISE — For the first time since the new Powerball lottery game started last month, Idaho has a \$100,000 winner.

The Idaho Lottery said a ticket purchased in Idaho matched all five white balls drawn Wednesday night. But the winner didn't get the powerball number, which was 37.

A player in Minnesota won the \$12.5 million jackpot by matching all five numbers and the powerball, so the estimated jackpot for Saturday will be \$2 million.

Lottery officials said they hadn't heard from the winner so they don't know where the ticket was sold.

In addition to the \$100,000 winner, 62 Idahoans matched four numbers to win \$100.

Woman claims sexual harassment

CASCADE — A McCall woman has filed a lawsuit in 4th District Court alleging that she was the target of sexual and racial harassment while working as a desk clerk at the Shore Lodge.

Linda Boe Foster's complaint names the Shore Lodge and Torrey Enterprises, Shore Lodge owner Douglas Manchester and former manager John Edwards.

Current Shore Lodge manager Ed Elam declined comment.

Foster is half Gros Ventre Indian. She went to work at the Shore Lodge in May 1988 and filed a complaint with the Idaho Human Rights Commission in February 1989.

Foster's complaint also contends she was denied promotions and raises.

State pursues fishing violation charge

FORT HALL — The Idaho Fish and Game Commission has refused to drop charges against a Shoshone-Bannock man who allegedly violated a state ban on chinook salmon fishing last summer.

Tribal leaders had asked the commission to drop its case against Nathan Small, who manages tribal bingo games on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation. He was charged last August with spearing salmon on the South Fork of the Salmon River while a state fishing closure was in place.

Small's trial is scheduled to begin June 5 in Cascade.

Jerry Conley, Idaho Department of Fish and Game director, said Fish and Game commissioners have decided to pursue the charges because they believe the state can legally impose emergency closures on Indian fishing.

Union leader alleges political activity

The Associated Press

A postal union leader alleged Thursday that the taxpayer-financed Senate Research Center in a Boise federal building is being used to raise funds for Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne's U.S. Senate campaign.

But an immediate check of the center showed no sign of political activity. The only Senate staffer present, Mikki Davies, said she was working on a salmon conference for Sen. Larry Craig.

In a news conference, Ken White, president of a postal union, said the office is being used to raise money for Kempthorne. He acknowledged he had no first-hand facts or information.

"Rumors of phone banks and political activity at the Senate Research Center will not go away," he said. "Who is protecting the taxpayer and his money?"

However, a check of the office showed just two ordinary office telephones.

Phil Reberger, chief of staff for Sen. Steve Symms and leading the Kempthorne campaign, said, "That's way off base and totally false."

He said the Kempthorne staff has its headquarters in another building and operates a six-line telephone bank there.

"The Senate Research Center serves senators Symms and Craig

with a number of community outreach programs such as Working Partners, Operation Home Front, Washington Classroom and putting together a directory for Reberger said.

Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, Reberger said.

White also said it was a travesty that the Hatch Act prevents federal employees from being active in politics, but lets congressional staffers such as Reberger and Senate Research Center chief Al Henderson do political work.

"Reberger sees nothing wrong with using taxpayer-financed staff, equipment and mail privileges to attack members of Congress who disagree with Sen. Symms—I see everything wrong with Reberger denying a letter carrier who makes \$30,000 a year the right to participate in politics even on his own time, while he pockets \$110,000 per year..." while engaging in political activities, White said.

"His claim is hogwash," Henderson said. "There's no campaign work that is being done out of this office. Any involvement, I've had has been on Senate time but my own time."

Reberger announced earlier that as

of Feb. 1, he went half-time on the Symms staff, working in the morning on the Senate staff and working in the afternoon on the Kempthorne campaign.

"The fact of the matter is he (White) is a civil servant and has Civil Service protection. Members of Congress are elected by the people, and the people who work for congressmen serve at their pleasure without any Civil Service protection," Reberger said.

"There wasn't a lot that I saw that was accurate in his statement, except for the fact that I work for Steve Symms and Steve Symms opposes elimination of the Hatch Act," he said.

He said Kempthorne also does not favor a change in the Hatch Act.

Elsewhere in Idaho politics, 1st District congressman and candidate David Doremus asked his Republican primary opponent, Rachel Gilbert, for an apology and retraction of statements she made during their debate Tuesday night.

Gilbert could not be reached for direct response.

Doremus in a statement Thursday claimed that "you (Gilbert) made two

immediately connected statements of fact and law, as follows: 'That in 1991 and 1992, I and my wife Valerie had claimed homeowners' property tax exemptions in both Idaho and California; and

'That claiming two such exemptions was a felony.'

"You have therefore publicly accused both myself and my wife of the commission of a felony offense under Idaho law."

However, she actually noted that he had a homeowners' exemption in California and said: "I believe you also had a homeowners exemption up at Elk City and I believe you paid back the one at Elk City because it is a felony to have a double exemption, homeowners' exemption.

"I'm just curious that if you had a homeowners exemption in California that it clearly establishes that you are a California resident," she said.

Doremus said "through simple oversight" he applied for a homeowners' exemption on his Idaho property near Elk City in 1991. He said it reduced his \$1,200 taxes by \$78 and he repaid that amount "immediately when the matter was brought to my attention."

Idaho sheriff won't face drug charges

CALDWELL (AP) — If Idaho County Sheriff Randy Baldwin stands trial in Canyon County this summer, alleged drug offenses will not be among the charges against him.

Third District Judge Jim Doolittle said Thursday that charges of attempted possession of cocaine and marijuana with intent to deliver can't be brought against Baldwin since he was acquitted on similar charges in federal court.

"I think it's clear that those charges have got to go," Doolittle said during a hearing on motions in the case.

Canyon County Prosecutor Richard Harris agreed to drop the felony drug charge, but said charges of first-degree burglary, attempted grand theft and using a firearm in commission of a felony would stand.

Baldwin, 37, of Grangeville, was acquitted last month on federal charges of attempted robbery, conspiracy to commit robbery, possession of cocaine and marijuana with intent to distribute and using a firearm in a felony.

A Boise drug informant Lamont Duane Jack, 46, was convicted on all but the drug charge, but the conspiracy conviction later was vacated. He faces sentencing Aug. 17

by U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge.

Baldwin and Jack both appeared Thursday before Doolittle.

Both men and Idaho County Sheriff's Lt. Patti VonBergen, Baldwin's administrative assistant, are scheduled to stand trial June 3 on state charges stemming from their Dec. 20 arrests in Nampa.

Baldwin and Jack admitted breaking into what they thought was the home of a major drug dealer.

The sting operation was set up by federal and state drug agents based on information that VonBergen and an unidentified "sheriff friend" were robbing drug traffickers.

Doolittle said he would rule in the coming weeks on motions from defense attorney Keith Roark that Baldwin be tried separately and that the trial be moved away from Canyon County, where Roark contends media coverage has made it impossible for his client to get a fair trial.

Roark said Baldwin should stand trial alone since tape-recorded conversations between Jack and another federal drug informant that would be submitted against Jack would be only hearsay evidence against Baldwin.

Fugitive indicted

BOISE (AP) — A Plummer man taken into custody after a nine-hour manhunt in Eastern Washington has been indicted on a murder charge, the U.S. attorney's office said.

William A. Davison, 32, is accused of shooting Victor Pierre, 68, of Worley on Nov. 29, 1990, at the Coeur d'Alene Indian Reservation.

He was indicted by a federal grand jury on Wednesday.

Davison was being held Thursday in the Whitman County Jail in Colfax, Wash.

Man found abandoned finds home

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — An elderly Alzheimer's patient arrived here Thursday, bringing an emotional end to a nightmare odyssey in which he was found abandoned at an Idaho dog track in March.

John Kingery, 82, was reunited at Nashville International Airport with three of the five children from his first marriage.

A daughter from his second marriage, Sue Gifford, is accused of removing Kingery from a Portland, Ore., nursing home shortly before he was found March 21 at a dog track in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.

Betty Miller, a daughter from Kingery's first marriage, said the family is relieved that his ordeal has ended.

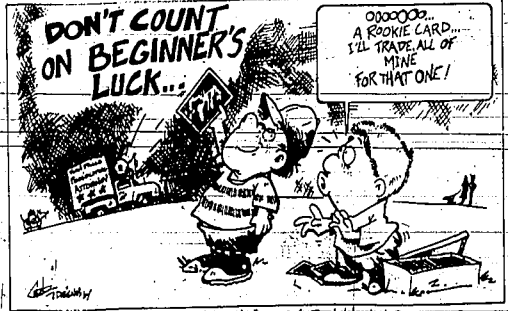

Carson makes way for Leno

BURBANK, Calif. - The desk is small, and looks cheap. The couch is tiny, but movie stars, comedians and even former presidents have crunched their egos onto it for 30 years, perched side-by-side like birds on a telephone wire.

The bandstand seems bigger, with rows of armless chairs facing ledges that, in some instances, have been decorated with glued-down pennies, dimes, matchboxes and unsmoked cigarettes.

It doesn't matter that the 500 audience seats rise at an angle that encourages vertigo and nosebleeds; ticket supply never could keep up with demand.

This is the house that Johnny built. Small and worn at the edges, parts of Stage One at NBC's sprawling Burbank studios are as familiar to millions of Americans as their own living rooms.

For three decades, Johnny Carson - tugging at his tie and tapping his pencils - has presided over the nocturnal institution called "The Tonight Show," launching thousands of careers while serving as America's favorite late-night guest.

It is fitting that when the 66-year-old Carson steps down May 22, he will take the contents of Stage One with him. Intensely private, most of what America knows about this man has been gleaned from this set.

Seated behind a desk measuring 59 inches long and 20 1/2 inches wide, Carson has given viewers glimpses, laced in self-deprecating humor, of four marriages, of million-dollar divorce settlements, of trying to kick a lifetime addiction to cigarettes.

In more poignant moments, viewers also were privy to sincere but never maudlin reactions to tragedy. Carson's 39-year-old son, Ricky, was killed in a car accident last year. A month later, longtime friend Michael Landon lost his battle against pancreatic and liver cancer.

"Johnny's the best at what he does," Jay Leno said shortly after being anointed as Carson's replacement. "I don't think we'll ever see the likes of it again. No one will ever hold an audience for 30 years the way Johnny has."

John F. Kennedy was president when Carson took "The Tonight Show" mantle from Jack Paar on Oct. 1, 1952. The show has been introduced by Ed McMahon, but it was Groucho Marx who stepped onstage and delivered a rambling, Please see CARSON/C3

New host is classic 'nice guy'

LOS ANGELES - No, says Jay Leno, he's not anxious about taking over "The Tonight Show" from Johnny Carson. But that doesn't mean the size of his ego corresponds to the exaggerated jut of his celebrated chin.

"It's not any sort of ego thing," says Leno, who becomes the show's permanent host on May 25. "I've had the advantage of guest hosting for the last five years."

"This just seems like the next step. It's like living with a girl for four or five years and deciding to get married. It's no big deal to you, but your relatives slap their foreheads and say, 'Thank God, it's legitimate.'"

James Douglas Muir Leno of New Rochelle, N.Y., is not known for being egocentric. The 42-year-old stand-up-comedian is the quintessential "nice guy," a man whose good humor and sense of it rarely offend.

"The great thing about Johnny is that he always kept a standard," Leno says. "We're not cable, and when I watch other talk shows, I see things that I don't really think are appropriate. If you respect your audience, I think they respect you."

The tenor of "The Tonight Show" will be different under Leno, but its format will remain largely the same.

"We'll obviously have a monologue," Leno says. "There'll be a lot of comedy bits. We'll still have music."

Brantford Marsalis, successor to Doc Severinsen, will offer a more contemporary sound than Severinsen's big band music, and the set at Burbank's Studio One will look different. Carson's technicolor curtain will be gone, as will his desk, but what will replace them is being kept under wraps.

What won't be changing is Leno's brand of humor, his way of taking current events and turning them into sharp-witted commentaries while still drawing his own line between funny and going too far.

"The best implant thing, for example," he says, citing an ongoing news story that he stopped making jokes about. "I got a letter from someone who said, 'That doesn't seem like your kind of joke.' So I said, 'OK, you

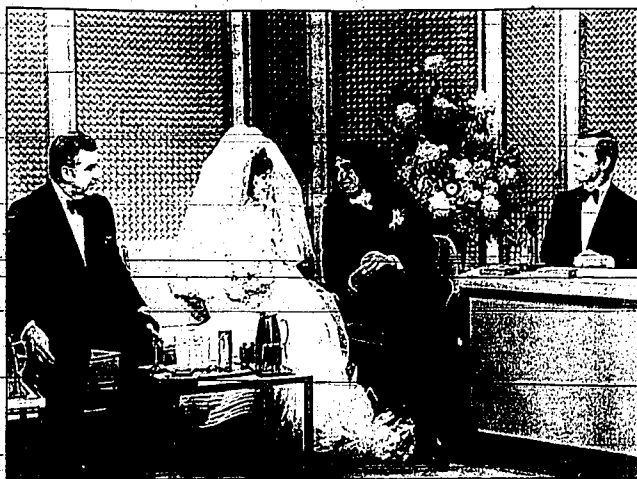

opening monologue about mice, sex and cheese.

Fifteen minutes later, McMahon returned. "From New York," 'The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson' — the guests that night were Marx, Joan Crawford, Rudy Vallee, Tony Bennett, Mel Brooks and The Phoenix Singers.

When Carson arrived, "The Tonight Show" ran for one hour and 45 minutes. In 1967, it was reduced to 90 minutes. In 1980, it was further shortened to an hour.

But besides fiddling with the show's length and moving it to California in 1972, Carson tinkered with little else. His opening monologue remains a daily-time capsule of political and social events.

Carson has said he never shows the monologue, culled from jokes provided by himself and eight staff writers, to anyone before taking the stage — not even to Fred de Cordova, his trusted 81-year-old, chain-smoking executive producer, who came on board 22 years ago.

Politicians quickly learned that nightly blasts during Carson's warm-up mirrored the mood of voters. His skewering of Nixon's actions during Watergate, for example, has been credited with helping to cement the former president's downfall.

When Carson moved his show to Burbank after 10 years in New York, more than his monologue had become popular. By then, a retinue of characters including Carnie the Magnificent, Aunt Blabby and the

Mighty Carson Art Players had been introduced.

The show also already had earned what remains its highest rating — the December 17, 1969, live on-stage wedding of Tiny Tim and Miss Vicki, seen by more than 45 million viewers.

The guest list for "The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson" surpasses 22,000. Actors range from Fred Astaire to Arnold Schwarzenegger; comedians include Jack Benny, Milton Berle, Sid Caesar, Freddie Prince and Danny Kaye.

Politicians and civic leaders from Robert F. Kennedy to Richard Nixon to Martin Luther King Jr. have stepped from behind the technician curtain that could double as Joseph's coat of many colors.

This month, a stream of Hollywood's biggest stars are dropping by Stage One to pay their final respects to America's retiring legend.

In Los Angeles, the big story is that Police Chief Daryl Gates announced his retirement. Carson joked in a monologue after announcing his own departure last year. "It will be sometime next year. Why can't a guy just retire without making a big deal out of it?"

Though Carson often poked fun during his monologues — "Sometimes I worry about Vice President Quayle. Today, he said: 'I can we defeat Iraq in six weeks, we ought to be able to put a man on the moon'" — he was not a mean interviewer. Instead, he seemed self-conscious and asked questions so

obviously written beforehand that they sounded stilted.

Carson's abhorrence of making personal revelations began when he took over the show and has stretched through the months before his retirement, when he continued to refuse interview requests. "He said he just doesn't want to do any," NBC spokeswoman Sue Binford explains.

At one point during his 30-year reign, besieged by reporters, he took to distributing a list of 10 answers, to be used with questions of the journalist's choice.

Among them: "Yes, I did." "Only twice in my life, both times on Saturday," and "No, Kumquat."

The job has never been easy for him. He has said that shows and the guests sometime run together. His greatest fear always has been that the audience will grow bored.

"That was a prime factor in his decision to leave. Thirty years, he has said, is a long time to do anything. 'Maybe it looks easy to a lot of people, but sitting in that chair will take more out of you than if you were chopping down trees all day,' he said in a 1967 Playboy interview. "It's not the physical strain; it's debilitating mentally. My biggest anxiety is about the day I'll know I've reached a point where I can't bring the show anything more that's new."

And so, under his own time frame and playing by his own rules, Johnny Carson of Corning, Iowa, former magician and radio announcer, is taking his chair and going home.

don't want someone sitting in bed to be hurt."

To Leno, offensive and funny do not often coexist.

"We don't get gay groups picketing 'The Tonight Show' because of remarks that were made — or people yelling from the audience," Leno says, referring to gay protests against Arsenio Hall's program. "So, consequently, people like you. And, if people like you, hopefully the show goes well."

Not everyone sanctioned Leno's appointment by NBC last year as the fourth host of "The Tonight Show." David Letterman, on whose late-night series Leno has appeared numerous times, reportedly was miffed at being passed over.

But the strongest criticism to date has come from Hall. A magazine interview contained several comments about Leno; none of them flattering.

"He can't replace Johnny," Hall told the magazine. "No one will ever reign like he reigned. And I think it's an insult to his legacy to say Jay is replacing him. He's done too much. He's been too good. Jay Leno can't replace Johnny Carson. It sounds like an insult."

About his relationship with Leno, Hall said "Jay and I are not friends. ... I have no problem saying good

things about my competitors, but Jay Leno and I aren't friends!"

The interview, isolated in an avalanche of favorable press, stunned Leno.

"That was a bit odd," Leno said. "I've never said anything bad about Arsenio in the press or anywhere else that would lead to this."

"To say that it's an insult to have me host 'The Tonight Show' — or to say that he won't have people on that have done 'The Tonight Show' — that only hurts the guests. Those comedians only make about \$250 for a spot and then they've got to go somewhere else."

Leno said he had considered Hall a friend. "He asked me to come down when he got his star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. I brought his mother back up to the house. ... I don't quite understand what this is all about. At least try to make it a joke — I can take a joke."

Leno's affair with stand-up comedy began as a teen-ager. By the time he was a sophomore at Boston's Emerson College, he already was driving to Manhattan to perform in comedy clubs.

Though he still plans to hone his jokes at local clubs on the weekends, his perpetual on-the-road lifestyle — a maze of personal appearances from Las Vegas to Little Rock, Ark. — will stop when "The Tonight Show Starring Jay Leno" premieres.

"For the last 20 years, I've been going to where the audiences are," he says. "Now they'll just be coming to where I am."

When selecting books for children, choose for the reader, too

Preschoolers have an insatiable appetite for hearing the same stories over and over. Adults are not so hardy.

And if a parent is not honestly entertained while reading, the lack of interest is subtly communicated to the child during reading. He gets a message that reading is tiresome, boring, a chore.

Keep these ideas in mind when choosing books for the children in your life.

- No book really is a bad book. No reading is bad reading. Some books, especially those with formula story lines (examples are the "Hardy Boys" and the "Baby Sitters Club" series) are like fast food: They lack the nutritional value of other foods, but they fill a particular need and offer variety.

- There are about 6,000 children's books published each year. Maybe 20 percent are keepers. But that doesn't mean you won't find something fun or enjoyable among the other thousands of titles coming out each year. Not to mention what the library has to offer.

- Let yourself (and your child) enjoy a reading "snack" or the literary equivalent of a hot dog from time to time. Admit it: You probably read People magazine in waiting rooms. Don't you?

- In general, I don't like to make

specific title recommendations because each child is unique in interests and learning/listening levels, but as a loose guideline, consider the suggestions of two experts in juvenile books.

Read-aloud expert Jim Trelease, author of "The New Read-Aloud Handbook" (Penguin, 1989; \$9.95), says anything short, wondrous and/or fantastical can be enjoyed by kids older than 5.

Edan Ross Lipson, an editor of children's books and author of "The New Times' Parent's Guide to the Best Books for Children" (Random House, 1991; \$15), suggests that as reading and listening skills mature, one can move from picture books to storybooks and novels.

For reading out loud, Trelease suggests adding adventure, humor and dialect for listeners 8 and older; storytelling becomes for age 11 and older; take advantage of the chance to read longer and more intense books, including those that might scare or bore younger children.

- Picture books are good for all ages (make sure all listeners can see the pictures easily). Even kids who are "too old" enjoy a good one now and then. But for children more than two years apart, try giving each his own reading-out-loud time. This reinforces each child's specialness. A mother and father can alternate auditions.

Reading with fathers is especially important. We know male involvement in education is uncommon. Some studies say only 7 percent of fathers go to PTA meetings. But 70 percent of remedial reading students are boys. It's especially important for boys 10 to 12, by example, that reading is not a sissy activity.

- As a corollary to No. 3, vary length and subject matter of books. Be creative. After reading "Little House on the Prairie," try something that can be read in one or two sittings.

- Don't neglect poetry, even if especially if you haven't much exposure yourself.

- Don't continue to read something that bores you and/or the child. This helps no one. Admit a mistake and move on. But be sure you have given the book a fair chance.

- Don't always be fooled by awards. Caldecott and Newberys are given in the United States for fine writing and illustrations, but not all of these are best read aloud. (However, when in doubt about what to pick for silent reading time, you won't often go wrong with these books.)

- Don't judge a book by its cover. It's an old saw, but true. One of my favorite books, "Sam, Bangs and Moonshine," is illustrated in black ink and a kind of olive wash that looks drab at first. It's not the kind of book that will jump off the shelf, when, say, you're looking for a

birthday present. But the story about a girl's runaway imagination is in fact enhanced by the illustrator's style.

- If you and your child enjoy a particular book, seek more books by the same author or illustrator. Check the library for more titles on a particularly enjoyable subject.

- Try to avoid books that kids already have seen on TV, in movies or on stage. Too often, if they know how it turns out or if something seems "wrong," they lose interest.

- Consider the intellectual, social and emotional levels of your audience. Seek books that stimulate emotions, the mind or the imagination. Sometimes read "over their heads" to challenge and stimulate them. But don't read above a child's emotional level.

- Keep in mind that reading specialists say a first-grader's reading primer is written with a controlled vocabulary of 350 words, but the listening vocabulary of most first-graders approaches 10,000 words.

- You can find books at schools, libraries and stores. But don't overlook friends and relatives. If a fami-

ly you know has kids the age of yours, ask what books they enjoy, and suggest some of your favorites. You're least likely to get back-and-I don't recommend lending books, because the ones you most want to share are usually the ones that (a) you're least likely to get back-and (b) you'll miss the most.

Workshops take brass faster, higher

TWIN FALLS Marcellus Brown learned to play the trumpet growing up in the Detroit school system. Today, the Boise State University Director of Bands is working to give other young people the same kind of love for music that enriches his life.

Brown has a theme for the brass workshops he leads. He calls them "Faster, Louder and Higher." He chose the title, he said, because those are the three things everyone wants to do on a brass instrument. "As a child, I wanted to play an instrument," said Brown in a recent phone interview, "but my dad was in the service, stationed in Germany, and there was no music program in my school." As soon as the family returned to the United States, Brown signed up to play the trumpet. "I chose it because it didn't look complicated," he said, with a laugh.

Workshop at CSI

Marcellus Brown will lead a brass workshop entitled "Faster, Louder and Higher" from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. May 22 in the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Building, Room 133. The \$5 fee includes admission to a May 23 trumpet and organ performance by Brown and Ruth Huettig, a prelude to CSI's Music Fest '92, scheduled for June 22-26. The workshop is open to participants of all ages.

Brown eventually found out the truth. But, by then, he was hooked.

The young trumpet player grew up to earn a master's of music at the University of Michigan and, from there, to become director of bands and professor of trumpet at Chicago State University and Augusta College in Rock Island, Ill. In the Midwest, he played with the Quad City Symphony Orchestra.

Since moving to Boise, Brown has performed with the Boise Philharmonic and has done both recital and

solo work throughout southern Idaho.

Brown's career has given him a front row view of music education in the state. "I think music education in Idaho is OK, but not outstanding," he said. "Many music educators are working without the kind of support they need."

Brown expressed concern about music being treated as a secondary pursuit in some school systems. "I was a soloist with the Twin Falls Municipal Band last October, and there are a number of very fine musicians in that group," Brown said. "Those sorts of people may not be available for municipal bands in the future if we don't do something now to make music more viable among young people."

Some of Idaho's public schools are no longer starting music education in the fifth grade, but, rather, in the sixth or seventh grades, Brown explained. A negative trend, in his opinion.

"If you have good music training when you are young, you can always play music," Brown said. "You may not always be able to go out and play football."

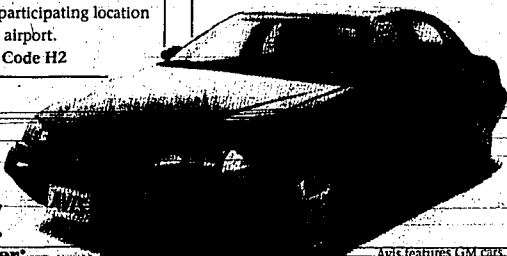

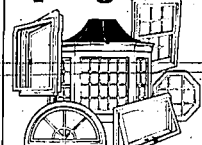

Pop-metal Las Vegas band Slaughter keeps its hold on rock fans

 What's so great about Slaughter? There's no denying that this rather average pop-metal band has carved out a far-from-average space in the hearts of fans.
 Guys like them. Girls absolutely love them. Not since Skid Row has there been a metal band that has appealed to both sexes and people ages 10 to 24 the way Slaughter does.
 And even with competition from the likes of Def-Leppard and the Cure, Slaughter's new record, "The Wild Life," made its debut at No. 8 on Billboard's pop album chart.
 "The Wild Life" will be supported by a yearlong tour.
 Figuring out Slaughter's appeal is not simple. The songs are standard party tunes or ballads, and the guys are fairly boy-next-doorish.

So why is this simple Las Vegas quartet shining brighter than other heavy metal bands? It just proves there's no such thing as too big a party.
 "Our band has a very different outlook than most groups," explains bassist Dana Strum. "Very few of them interact with their fans the way we do."
 The good feelings between band and fans are undeniable. Slaughter has crashed at fans' houses for the night and performed on the back of a flatbed truck parked at a Taco Bell. They also hold fan meet-and-greets before and after each concert and sign autographs for anyone just about anywhere.
 As part of the most ambitious fan thank-you to date, Slaughter sent out

a six-song demo tape of "The Wild Life" to each of the 32,000 people active in its fan club and non-paying mailing list.
 "We sent out those tapes two months before the record came out as our way of giving the fans something the regular public couldn't get," says Strum.
 "It was one of our dreams when we were kids; just think if Led Zepplin had sent us a demo of 'Whole Lotta Love.' Wouldn't that have been great? So that's what we did. And three days later, we got 2,000 letters of thanks and comments."
 The reason Slaughter "fights for its existence," according to Strum, is because it wants to set a precedent for the way future bands treat their fans.
 "After we sold a couple million albums, everyone thought we'd be-

come elite. Everyone was looking to the Seattle bands, and they won't deal with the fans," Strum says.
 "I'd like to see where Nirvana is five years from now. I'd like to see how Guns N' Roses fans are going to put up with them canceling shows and not letting the fans get near them."
 Adds guitarist Tim Kelly: "When bands start to forget who put them there, the fans will abandon them and they should. A lot of kids put a lot of money into our career, and we treat them with respect. And they end up becoming friends."
 Slaughter comes across as an honest, hard-working band," says Lonni Friend, editor of the heavy metal magazine Rip. "They are very close to their fans, and that's a big part of their appeal."
 Slaughter's music and look is

hardly distinguishable from that of Poison, Warrant, Bon Jovi, Great White, Winger, Lillian Axe — or even Vixen, an all-female band.
 And though Strum likes to repeatedly slip in oblique comparisons between his band and Led Zepplin, for the most part, he doesn't make Slaughter out to be anything more than a bunch of fun-loving rockers.
 "We are generally a good-times band," he says. "All of our lyrics are positive. We just want people to enjoy our music."
 Singer Mark Slaughter (his real name) and Strum formed Slaughter in 1990 after they left the Vinnie Vincent Invasion, a mildly successful metal band fronted by alternate Kiss guitarist Vincent.
 Slaughter, 27, and Strum, 32, wrote all the songs and also produced both of its studio albums, with

help from Kelly, 29, and bandmate and drummer Blas Elias, 24.
 As with the Beatles, fans note each member's personality traits and choose their personal favorite. Slaughter is the sincere one; Strum is the businessman; Kelly is the energetic party animal; and Elias is the shy sex symbol. Because they write and produce the albums, however, Strum and Slaughter are the undeniable leaders and spokesmen for the group.
 Strum says Slaughter is "the only self-produced, self-written American rock band there is. Skid Row, Aerosmith, Motley, Crüe — they've all used outside songs and outside producers in their careers. We have never done that. We even engineered this record and co-engineered the last one. When the fans hear something by Slaughter, they know it's ours."

2 Live Crew's legal tests continue

 The recent reversal by the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals of 2 Live Crew's 1990 obscenity conviction marked the end — in Florida at least — of two years of lawsuits, arrests and trials centered on the rap group's album, "As Nasty as They Wanna Be." But that doesn't mean the deck is clear for Luther Campbell, 2 Live Crew or explicit rappers in general.
 Just as the original conviction marked the first time that a sound recording had been judged obscene, the recent decision marked the first time a U.S. Court of Appeals had examined the application of obscenity law to musical composition — and it apparently heard things quite

differently from District Judge Jose A. Gonzales. It was Gonzales who found "Nasty" obscene because it was "an appeal to dirty thoughts and the loins, not to the intellect and the mind."
 The appeals court chided Gonzales, saying that he erred in relying on his own expertise in deciding two of three underpinnings of the test for obscenity set forth by the Supreme Court in Miller v. California. The Miller test requires that the material in question be "patently offensive" by appealing to "prurient interest" by arousing shameful or morbid sexual response) to an average person applying community standards, and that, taken as a whole, the work has no artistic value. Otherwise it is, in expression protected by the First

Amendment (whereas obscenity is not).
 "When you win a case like this, it's sort of like guerrilla warfare and it puts the state on notice of how hard it is to prosecute art, even shocking art," said Bruce Rogow, the attorney for 2 Live Crew.
 Whether the reversal affects a recent 2 Live Crew "sing" in Omaha remains to be seen. In mid-April, a number of record stores were charged with selling obscene material — 2 Live Crew's "Sports, Weck-end" album — to minors. Omaha Councilman Steve Exon (son of Democratic Sen. James Exon) arranged with Omahans for decency to send minors to nine record stores, six of which sold them the 2 Live Crew album.

Fans stand in lines

for Raisa Gorbachev

NEW YORK (AP) — Raisa Gorbachev experienced capitalism firsthand on Tuesday and discovered something familiar about it: long lines, just like home.
 The former Soviet first lady was a smash hit in a visit to a Fifth Avenue bookstore, signing copies of her memoirs for a sometimes impatient crowd.
 How popular is she? She surpassed rock 'n' rollers Lou Reed and Carly Simon as the all-time top seller at a Brentano's book-signing, according to a spokeswoman for the popular store. Gorbachev racked up 10,000 copies of her book "Hopes, which had been fading only moderately since its release last September.
 "We admire her — she's a neat person," said Prissy Kuersteiner of Tallahassee, Fla. "She stands for peace."
 Some of her fans, including Kuersteiner and three friends, waited for 3 1/2 hours.
 "It's well worth it," said Nat Bloch, an off-duty New York City

police lieutenant who had books signed for his three sons. "She's part of history."
 Later, Donald Trump, the developer who personifies capitalism, took Mrs. Gorbachev and her husband, Mikhail, on a tour-of-Trump Tower.
 It was one of many stops the couple made during their New York visit, which is part of a U.S. tour to raise money for Gorbachev's Moscow-based think tank.
 At the book signing, she arrived by limousine, a fashionable 15 minutes late. Wearing an emerald-green jacket — and matching earrings — she held forth like royalty behind a table at the top of a staircase, receiving customers one by one and chatting briefly with the help of an interpreter.
 "This is our fourth visit, and now we can feel the atmosphere of understanding and trust," she said in remarks in Russian afterward. "The fate, the destiny of the whole world, depends on that understanding and trust."

Redford's star status upstages his activism

NEW YORK — Robert Redford came to town recently to ask for justice for an imprisoned Native American. Not surprisingly, New Yorkers seemed more interested in gawking at Redford the gracefully aging movie actor than in hearing the activist plead to say about how the FBI "railroaded" American Indian Movement leader Leonard Peltier.

Through Redford, 54, hasn't had a hit movie since the Oscar-winning "Out of Africa" in 1985, he is demonstrably still a superstar. He had to be rescued from an aggressive mob of fans, autograph hounds and paparazzi, as he emerged from last week's Manhattan premiere of the feature-length documentary he produced, "Incident At Oglaala."

The next day, CBS-TV morning-show anchor Harry Smith interviewed Redford at his New York offices overlooking Rockefeller Center. When the TV crew left, Redford relaxed at his desk. He was fit, tan and casual in a black short-sleeved sports shirt, slacks and loafers. He put an apple and a banana on the desk with the intention of making "lunch" his lunch. "But he talked steadily, intently.

Redford talked mostly about his crusade to get Peltier a new trial, which was the reason the intensely private actor-director had agreed to do publicity. But he spoke, as well, about his nearly completed film "A River Runs Through It," which he has his way to Ireland to score.

He had put his considerable energy and clout into making "Incident At Oglaala," Redford said, because "our justice system is the greatest in the world and the most patriotic of all patriotic gestures is to protest when you see it being corrupted by the people hired to protect it. It makes me mad to see a double standard of justice for minorities developing in this country."

The film, directed by Michael Apted, executive produced and narrated by Redford, documents the events leading up to the June 26, 1975, shootout on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota. Two FBI agents and a Native American were killed. Two militant mem-

bers of AIM were tried for killing the agents and acquitted by a jury. But Peltier, extradited from Canada and tried separately, was convicted of murdering the agents and is in his 16th year in a federal penitentiary.

"This man was railroaded," said Redford. "It's an eye for an eye. The FBI was going to make somebody pay. And because they blew that first trial, Leonard was the fall guy."

Redford got involved with Peltier in the early '80s through Peter Matthiessen's "In the Spirit of Crazy Horse," a book about the destruction of AIM. There was a rumor Peltier was going to be murdered in prison, and Matthiessen asked Redford to visit the prisoner to draw attention to him.

Redford directed but does not appear in "A River Runs Through It," based on a Norman McLean novel about fly-fishing and family relationships. "It was a tough one to make," said Redford. "But I love it."

He has the Celtic stoicism that I grew up in. You don't talk about your troubles. You don't ask for help. Therefore you never learn how to give it. You never learn how to reach even people you love. The book was constructed as a love poem to a family. It goes to that dark area of not knowing how to help people you love before it's too late.

Since winning the Oscar in 1980 for his directorial debut, "Ordinary People," Redford has made only a handful of films. He founded Sundance Institute and an environmental organization and spent a lot of time with his family.

"I feel like I've done what I can for Sundance," said Redford. "It's doing what I wanted to do, which is to give new filmmakers a chance. And the annual festival is a success, so it's giving those filmmakers a chance to exhibit. I'm happy about it. And my family is well."

His children, 37 and 22, live, respectively, in Colorado and California. "I'm now to go back to my work, to film making."

'Straight Talk' lacks realism

HOLLYWOOD — There has always been something endearing about the contrast between Dolly Parton's down-to-earth personality and her glitzy appearance. But the straight dope on "Straight Talk" is that it sabotages Parton's fundamental honesty with a plot that's about as real as her wigs. It's jarring to hear so much talk about truth in a film that's synthetic to the core.

Writers Craig Bolotin and Patricia Resnick and director Barney Kellman ardently maneuver Parton's adorable Shirlee from an Arkansas dance studio to a Chicago radio show, where she is mistaken for a newly hired shrink. After just a few bits of downhome advice on the air from Shirlee, the station's switchboard lights up with 500 calls. Shirlee's an instant local success, with network interest quickly building.

In a laborious early sequence Shirlee has

managed to meet "cute" James Woods' workaholic Chicago Sun-Times reporter — twice. Just as predictably as he is going to start digging into Shirlee's background, he is going to fall in love with her and discover that country-style common sense counts for more than academic training.

There is a sweetness and a forthrightness in Parton's presence that are ineradicable, but she has the effect of throwing into relief the film's every contrivance. The movies have not done well by Parton, who is more a personality (and a singer-composer who contributes a number of appropriate songs for the soundtrack) than an actress. But it's difficult to make her fantasy persona fit into anything very believable in today's world. Perhaps she should take a cue from Mae West, whom she inevitably brings to mind, and try a period piece; the costumed, opu-

lent Lillian Russell look might well be as flattering and effective an image for Parton as it was for West.

For that matter "Straight Talk" is like West's films, an old-fashioned star vehicle. Woods, properly gallant in the crunch, is very much Parton's leading man rather than co-star. In the tradition of West, Parton has surrounded herself with plenty of other stalwart-male supporting players. Just for openers, there's Griffin Dunne as a slyly program director, Michael Madsen as Shirlee's worthless ex-boy friend, John Sayles as her dance studio boss (who fires for being too good a listener to her pupils' problems), Spalding Gray as an arrogant psychiatrist, Jerry Orbach as Woods' tough-talking editor and Philip Bosco as the gruff radio station owner. Despite their efforts and Parton's own "Straight Talk" (rated PG for some mildy risqué remarks) pretty much goes straight down the tubes.

'Basic Instinct' leads weak movie weekend

"It's exciting," said Hollywood hopeful Khaleelah Boone, 13. "Everyone who watches this movie is gonna see me."

Arlyelle Bauman, a 78-year-old artist, took a cab from her north Spokane home to the auditions when she couldn't get a ride.

"It's the darndest thing I ever heard of," Bauman said. "I thought it would be fun. And I love to sing and dance."

Crowd control was the responsibility of Spokane County sheriff's deputy Don Johnson.

"Every time the line moves two feet in front, the people in back move up five feet," he said.

In the end, casting director Montgomery had so many stardom seekers he brought down the curtain after nearly two hours of auditions. The line still stretched 10 blocks.

Nachhattar Singh was especially disheartened. He drove his four children from Seattle for the auditions.

"One of my boys is really interested in being an actor," he said. "But right now, I don't know. It was a long drive."

Aggressive Knicks push Bulls to 7th game

NEW YORK - The New York Knicks are taking it to the limit against the Chicago Bulls.

The Knicks forced a seventh game in their NBA playoff series Thursday night, winning 100-86 behind 27 points each by Patrick Ewing and reserve guard John Starks.

Xavier McDaniel scored 24 points for the Knicks, 11 in the fourth quarter when they outscored the Bulls 32-16. Ewing, who limped noticeably after injuring his ankle in the third quarter, scored 10 points and Starks eight in the final period, while Michael Jordan had three and Scottie Pippen none for Chicago.

New York kept up its aggressive stance.

drawing two technicals and two flagrant fouls, but became the first team to score 100 points in the series while holding the opposition under 90 for the ninth time in 11 postseason games.

Jordan finished with 21 points and Pippen 18 for the defending champion Bulls, who won 67 regular-season games, 16 more than the upset-minded Knicks.

Game 7 is Sunday at Chicago Stadium. Although they tied the score seven times, the Bulls didn't lead until two free throws by Pippen after a flagrant foul by Starks gave them a 70-68 lead with 1.9 seconds left in the third quarter.

But that was Chicago's only lead of the

game as New York, which took a 14-game losing streak against the Bulls into the series, scored the first 13 points of the fourth quarter for an 81-70 advantage.

John Paxson broke an 0-for-6 Chicago drought with an 18-footer at the 5:51 mark, but a basket by McDaniel and two free throws by Starks gave the Knicks their largest lead, 85-72, with 4:37 left.

Craig Hodges, a three-time long-distance shooting contest winner who sees little playing time for Chicago, gave the Bulls some life offensively with consecutive 3-pointers, closing them within seven.

After a basket by Ewing, Will Perdue hit a free throw after a flagrant foul on Anthony Mason and Horace Grant dunked when the Bulls retained possession, pulling them to 87-81 with 2:54 left. But another

field goal by Ewing and two more free throws by Starks rebuilt the margin to 10 with 2:12 to go, and Chicago didn't threaten again.

Starks scored 17 points in the second quarter, 13 during a 17-8 spurt, that extended a 34-31 Knicks' lead to 51-39 with 1:43 left.

A layup by Pippen, a rebound basket by Bill Cartwright and a layup by Jordan closed Chicago to 51-45 before Starks ended the half with another jumper, giving the Knicks an eight-point lead at halftime.

Mark Jackson had an assist on nine of New York's 12 first-quarter baskets, and the Knicks held Chicago to 38 percent shooting en route to a 24-17 advantage after one period. Ewing scored 12 in the quarter and Jackson finished with 15 assists.

After that, Wong held CSI to two hits through the fifth.

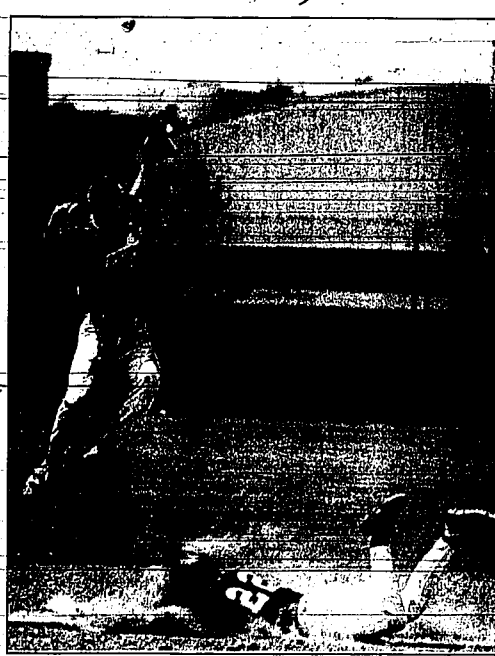
Meanwhile, two hits from Ybricht and a successful suicide squeeze bunt by John O'Rourke helped TVCC build its 6-1 lead.

Football great succumbs to cancer

PORTLAND, Ore. - Lyle Alzado, once among the most feared players in professional football, died Thursday of brain cancer, a disease he blamed on his prolonged use of body-building steroids.

The two-time all-pro defensive lineman died peacefully in his sleep at home. His wife, Kathy, was at his side. He was 43.

The disease, reduced to a minuscule athlete known for his bone-jarring violence on the field to a whispering shell of a man.

Alzado had come to Portland in March for an innovative "blood brain barrier" chemotherapy treatment pioneered at Oregon Health Sciences University. He was able to receive the therapy only once before he came down with pneumonia, a common side effect.

"He was as determined and as brave as any of our patients are," said Raymond Hogan, clinical coordinator of the treatment program. "His idea was to throw the book at the tumor. He wanted us to go in with both guns blazing. I never knew him to believe that he wasn't going to beat it."

Alzado, who was born in Brooklyn, N.Y., was the first player from Yankton College in South Dakota ever to be

drafted. He was chosen in the fourth round by Denver in 1971 and played for the Broncos for eight years.

He played three years for the Cleveland Browns and four for the Los Angeles Raiders before retiring in 1985 and beginning an acting career. He failed in a comeback attempt with the Raiders in 1990.

"He had a great career and did everything with gusto, whether it was football, acting or whatever," said Craig Morton, quarterback of Denver's 1977 team known for its "Orange Crush" defense. "But I think what he wanted to be remembered for most was his fight against steroid use by youngsters. Hopefully, they will use this as a lesson."

Alzado said he began using steroids in 1969 and spent \$20,000 to \$30,000 a year on the drug. He also said he used a human growth hormone during his comeback attempt, which he believes helped destroy his immune system. Even after he stopped playing football, he kept taking the drugs.

"I had my mind set and I did what I wanted to do," Alzado said of his steroid use. "So many people tried to talk me out of what I was doing and I wouldn't listen."

Italy embraces its America's Cup heroes - win or lose

ROME — Win or lose at sea off San Diego, Raul Gardini, farmer-turned-yachtsman, has already sailed to Italy's greatest maritime triumph since Columbus.

Such is the verdict at home of a rich man's quest that has turned into an insomniac's blessing and a national passion: Moromania.

"Il Moro di Venezia is a national hero. And so, suddenly, is its sport among a people whose nautical prowess is mainly the stuff of history.

Cheers, too, go to the Moro's "skipper," as he's known even in Italian, Paul Cayard, whom viewers are told is "an American naturalized Italian."

In popular gaze, the computer-designed, synthetic-hulled Moro has tacked seamlessly, in line astern, into a proud tradition: fearsome Roman triremes, the oared galleys of medieval merchants, the cocky caravels of Renaissance explorers.

"From squibs on the sports page Il Moro has bounced into Page 1 of the national newspapers," observed the magazine Panorama. "What was until yesterday considered a sport for the super rich with their nose in the air is becoming a sort of collective mania."

Everybody is an expert. Never mind that 81 percent of Italians blithely tell pollsters that they have never set foot on a sailboat. Or that only one Italian in 100 claims to be a regular sailor. This is the first time in nearly 30 years a European boat has reached the America's Cup finals, and it is a high-tech beauty emphatically stamped "Made in Italy."

Today, all Italy remembers those mischievous Kiwis and their irregular bowsprit, even if last month, most people could hardly have found their way from the poop deck to the prow.

Bleary-eyed Monday morning admirals more accustomed to soccer diagrams debate wayward winds and imprudent tacks with great animation. They pore over complex newspaper charts of the race course that a few weeks ago would have been no more intelligible than the sketch of an intestine.

Until the Cup races end, Italy will keep a weather eye on the winds of California.

Whether Moro's fling with fame will set Italy sailing again is a good question. For Moromania flourishes at a slack time in the Italian sports year: The soccer championships are mostly decided, skier Alberto Tomba's snow has melted; one of the country's best show-jumpers has been felled by AIDS, and Ferraris have not been running well in Formula One.

ABC also will add five hours of new series programs, including a sitcom centered by deposed "Designing Women" queen Delta Burke in the Thursday-night leadoff spot at 8 p.m. and a lighthearted drama from the "Northern Exposure" team of Joshua Brand and John Falsky.

The schedule casualties include "The Young Riders," "Baby Talk," "Billy," "Capital Critters," "Sibs," "Anything But Love," "Pros and Cons," "Good & Evil," "MacGyver," "Growing Pains" and "Who's the Boss?"

Three other shows not included on the announced fall slate — six-year veteran "Perfect Strangers" and rookies "American Detective" and "FBI: The Untold Stories" — will return as midseason replacements.

Also being given a midyear commitment is "Matlock," the Andy Griffith drama that ABC snapped up from NBC. And Tom Arnold, Roseanne Arnold's husband, has been promised a midseason start for

Now, however, the show apparently won't be ready for air until year's end at the earliest, giving "Life Goes On" a season's reprieve on Sundays.

ABC's decision to bring back "Homefront," "Civil Wars," "Young Indiana Jones" and "The Commish" for sophomore seasons despite lackluster audience response indicates a

new commitment to drama.

The new comedies: "Delta," which finds Delta Burke seeking fame and fortune in Nashville as a country singer.

"Laurie Hill," a dramatic comedy from the creators of "The Wonder Years" about the pressures faced by a doctor with a husband and children.

"Hangin' with Mr. Cooper," a "Three's Company" for the '90s in which a male junior high substitute teacher has his hands full dealing with a pair of gorgeous female roommates.

"Camp Bicknell," a comedy that tells the ongoing story of a household that becomes a nursing crash-pad for neighborhood teens.

The new dramas: "Going to Extremes," a light drama from the "Northern Exposure" team exploring the experiences of students earning their medical degree at a Caribbean university.

"Covington Cross," the story of an English knight, his three spirited teen-age sons and his feisty daughter as they encounter life in Medieval England (circa 1250).

"Crossroads," starring Robert Ulrich as a big-city prosecutor who chucks it all to renew ties with his estranged teen-age son via a cross-country motorcycle odyssey.

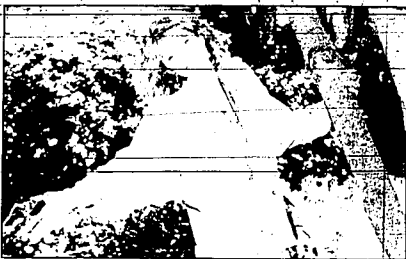
"She was so good I almost forgot who she was," Danner said. "I thought, 'Who is this? — Oh, she's my daughter.'"

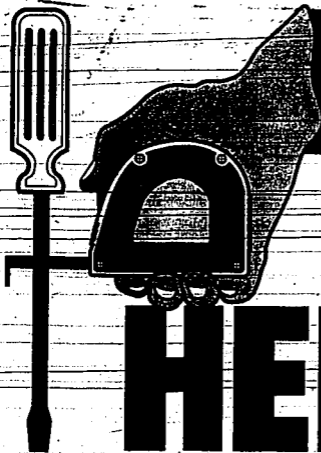
