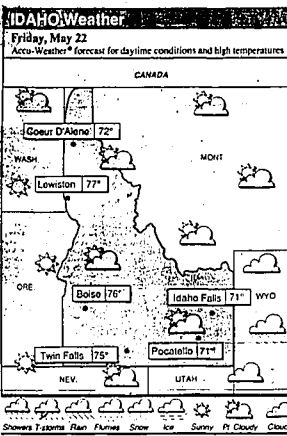
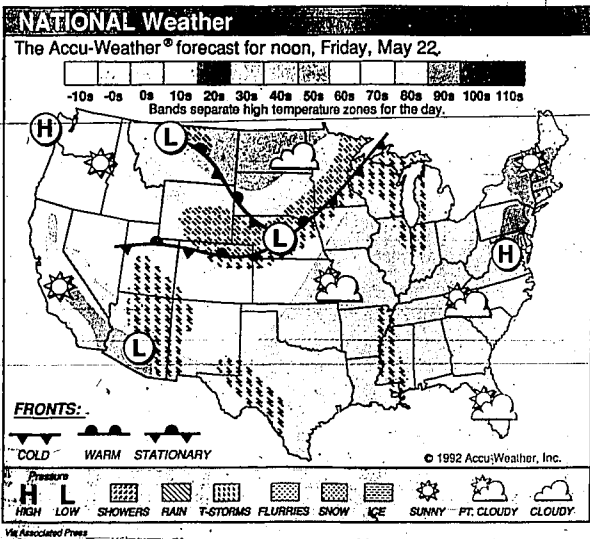

**Rain, thunderstorms spread across much of nation**

Heavy rain and thunderstorms struck the southern Plains and parts of the West and Midwest on Thursday, while hail fell on Arizona.

In the Northeast, unusually cold mornings continued to be followed by warm afternoons.

Thunderstorms caused flooding in parts of south Texas for a third day Thursday, and a tornado that touched down in Garden City, Texas, tore up barns, trees and fences but caused no injuries.

Flash flood warnings remained in effect along the Guadalupe and San Antonio rivers, and several streets in

San Antonio were closed because of high water. More than 3 inches of rain fell overnight near Del Rio, Texas.

During the early afternoon, rain showers and thunderstorms were present over the southern Plains, western Kansas, eastern Nebraska, the central Mississippi Valley, the upper Missouri Valley, Illinois, Kentucky and western Tennessee.

Rain also fell on the central Gulf Coast, the Georgia coast and Florida's northeast coast. In the West, rain was scattered across the eastern half of the Great Basin and the northern Rockies. Hail fell on Phoenix in the late morning.

Heaviest rainfall during the morning was .83 inch at Salt Lake City.

# Critics skewer Forest Service

WASHINGTON — Public woes about timber sales in public woodlands could be drowned out by the sounds of chainsaws, according to critics of the U.S. Forest Service's plan to end its appeals process.

The plan would end citizens' right to halt deals between the Forest Service and the timber industry. That right has created a bureaucratic logjam and stalled regional economies, the plan's proponents said in a Senate hearing Thursday.

Under a proposed regulation that could become effective this summer, the Forest Service plans to bar the public from administratively appealing timber sales. Instead, the Forest Service will "front load" the system and allow the public to comment on the sweeping, 10-year management plans for each national forest as they are being written.

"The appeals are filed by preservation groups or individuals whose sole intent is to confuse, disrupt, delay and increase the costs of Forest Service sales," said Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho.

Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., said ending appeals was too extreme a response to the disputes. "This proposal takes a meat ax to a problem requiring more delicate surgery," he said.

In Montana's national forests, the government is falling far short of the sales it expected, leaving loggers without jobs and communities without commerce, one industry official testified.

"Many appeals are little more than tools promoted by cynics to delay projects," said Tucker Hill, a spokesman for Milltown, Mont.-based Champion International Corporation.

"Their sheer volume is hamstringing the Forest Service, and this appears to be the objective," Hill said. He cited the example of two timber sales in the Idaho Panhandle National Forest, which have together been met with 228 appeals.

All but two were exact copies of the same appeal, Hill said. "One appeal was filed by a five-year-old girl; another by a resident of Canada."

Craig said many appeals "are compiled on a word processor and submitted on multiple sale decisions with merely a change in the name of the sale."

"Sales are appealed by eastern college students who have absolutely no knowledge of the subject matter," Craig added. "Appeals are being mass-produced and circulated at shopping malls."

Some senators said the process may be in need of refinement, not the outright removal of citizen appeals.

"What you are saying is, 'I am the god of the forest. I will listen to mammon but if I don't like what he says, tough,'" Sen. Wyche Fowler, D-Ga., told a Forest Service official.

# Congress saves Seawolf, passes \$1.5 trillion budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress voted resoundingly on Thursday to rescue one of two Seawolf submarines President Bush wanted to kill, taking a compromise course the administration said it would accept.

By overwhelming margins, the House and Senate sent Bush legislation slashing \$8.2 billion from the 1992 budget, including \$1.3 billion from the Seawolf program. That would allow construction of one of the sophisticated nuclear submarines but halt plans to build a second one.

The House approved the measure on a 404-111 vote, and the Senate sent the measure to Bush on a 90-9 tally.

In a separate vote that showed Congress' reluctance to make deep

defense cuts despite the Soviet Union's breakup, lawmakers then approved a \$1.5 trillion federal budget for fiscal 1993, which begins Oct. 1.

The spending plan would hold military spending just slightly below what Bush proposed. The House adopted it by a narrow 209-207 margin, and the Senate gave it final approval by 52-41.

law degree from that school. The Times-News was unable to confirm Stone's educational background Thursday.

He has done legal work for prison inmates and is familiar with criminal procedure and law enforcement, Stone said.

The current charges against him stem from a domestic dispute, Stone said, and he plans to plead innocent when he is arraigned in 5th District Court on May 26.

That's primary election day. Stone added that he has sent a letter to Gov. Cecil Andrus requesting pardon for his earlier embezzlement conviction.

County Clerk Linda Wright said Thursday that Stone's paperwork seems to be in order, but she will forward a copy to the secretary of State's office Friday.

His campaign will cost the county money because Wright will have to hire two additional election workers to count write-in ballots.

The status of Stone's campaign was in doubt early in the day, because he was unable to come up with the \$40 filing fee.

He asked the county commissioners to provide the money from the county's indigency fund.

After consulting with an attorney from the Idaho Association of Counties, Commissioner Jim Fraley said the county denied that request.

But state election rules say the \$40 fee does not have to be paid until 10 days after the election, Wright said.

And as a write-in candidate, he was not required to gather petition signatures like other declared candidates do.

Stone acknowledged Thursday that he has psychiatric problems, but said they should not hinder his campaign.

"We all have nerves and emotional problems," Stone said. "Everyone should see a psychiatrist at least once."

In two separate letters to court officials, Stone has asked for a psychiatric evaluation at Canyon View Hospital, and he has consulted with Dr. Adrian Dean, a psychiatrist, during Dean's visits to the jail.

"Emotionally, I'm stable," he said. "I can pack a big 45 or a 38 and know when to use it and when not to."

Stone pleaded guilty in September to a misdemeanor charge of carrying a concealed weapon — a knife.

He added that he has a black belt in karate and other martial arts.

**New Jersey to cut state sales tax**

TRENTON, N.J. - The Republican-dominated state Legislature on Thursday guaranteed a cut in the state sales tax by overriding Democratic Gov. Jim Florio's veto of a bill to reduce the 7 percent levy to 6 percent.

The action by the Senate and Assembly paved the way for the largest tax decrease in state history and culminated a two-year-battle that began when Democrats raised taxes by \$2.8 billion.

This was the first override of a New Jersey governor's veto since 1982, when the Legislature rejected Republican Gov. Thomas H. Kean's attempt to block a bill that allowed a moment of silence in schools.

**Smokers butt out to reach 37-year low**

ATLANTA - Smoking in the United States reached its lowest level in 37 years because of health concerns, the increasing cost of cigarettes and public smoking restrictions, federal health officials said Thursday.

The Centers for Disease Control reported that 25.5 percent of Americans smoked in 1990, the latest year for which figures are available. That's the lowest since the agency began monitoring smoking in 1955.

"This tells us that Americans are responding perhaps in even greater numbers to the public health education campaign that's occurring," said Gary Giovino, the CDC's chief smoking epidemiologist.

**Budget surplus shrinks in April**

WASHINGTON - Recession-dampened tax collections helped shrink the government's April budget surplus to less than half of last year's level, the Treasury Department said Thursday.

The surplus was \$14.6 billion last month, reducing the deficit for the first seven months of the fiscal year to \$184.7 billion. But the April budget balance a year ago was \$30 billion, swelled by a \$5 billion contribution from Persian Gulf War allies.

And the deficit-to-date this year is 51 percent greater than last year's comparable \$122.2 billion. That puts the deficit on track to break last year's record \$269.5 billion.

**Post Office probes hit crucial junctures**

WASHINGTON - Two separate investigations of the House Post Office have reached crucial junctures, and testimony of two senior employees could determine whether lawmakers become targets of the probes, congressional sources said Thursday.

The U.S. attorney's office recently asked House investigators to delay their work until the two can be questioned in a federal grand jury probe.

Rep. Charles Rose, D-N.C., chairman of the House Administration Committee's investigating task force, said he agreed to the delay until June 15.

**Demo plan aims to aid defense workers**

WASHINGTON - Senate Democrats on Thursday unveiled a \$1.2 billion plan to help more than a million defense workers and their communities to convert to a post-Cold War economy.

Democratic leaders accused President Bush of doing nothing to help the defense-related job force while sending \$85 million in technical aid to the former Soviet Union for converting its swords into plowshares.

"It should be unacceptable to Americans that their government has a plan to help convert the economy of the former Soviet union from defense to civilian production but has no comparable plan for our own country," said Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell of Maine.

The plan was developed by a 21-member task force Mitchell appointed two months ago.

**National parks charge little for rent**

WASHINGTON - Concessionaires at national parks gross millions of dollars using government-owned buildings, from hotels to boat houses. But the U.S. Treasury earns hardly a penny because it charges little or no rent, congressional investigators said Thursday.

Officials of the U.S. Park Service acknowledged at a House hearing that the agency cannot even say how many buildings and facilities it provides park concessionaires. Nor can it estimate what the fair market value of the buildings might be.

**Cheney avoids comment on firm's sale**

WASHINGTON - Defense Secretary Dick Cheney said Thursday he does not favor government ownership of companies but declined specific comment on the proposed sale of LTV Aerospace and Defense Co. to a French-owned firm.

"As a general proposition, I have not been an advocate of government-owned corporations. I think the private sector is the backbone of our economy. I support a strong private sector," Cheney told a Senate panel.

The Pentagon chief said he was reluctant to take a public position on the issue since the Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States, which is made up of the Treasury, Defense, State, Commerce, and Justice departments as well as other administration agencies, must approve the sale.

**Space agency sinks to new depths for study**

KEY LARGO, Fla. (AP) - Call it 43,000 minutes under the sea; or three men and a little lagoon.

What it comes down to is three divers submerged 30 days in a NASA isolation study; aquanauts helping astronauts.

Aquanauts Christopher Olstad, Richard Presley and John Conant have been living in an underwater hotel and research station on the bottom of Emerald Lagoon since noon on May 6. They can't surface until noon on June 5.

They broke their public silence Thursday - Day No. 15 - in their first sea-to-shore news conference. They told reporters in a video hookup that they are in good spirits and definitely not bored, although they missed their families and sunshine.

"Other than that, we're pretty satisfied," Olstad said. "All the things that we need to be happy are down here."

NASA behavioral scientists want to see how the three deal with stress in extended confinement, how they think, sleep and function, how they communicate with one another and organize their work.

Researchers also want to test futuristic space gadgets such as a wristwatch sleep monitor and stress-measuring computers.

"It's not physiological at all. It's

entirely psychological," said Al Holland, head of the behavior and performance laboratory at NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston.

The agency needs to know all these things, and more, before space station Freedom is built and open for business later this decade. At least four astronauts are to live on the station for months, and shuttle astronauts have yet to spend more than 10 days in orbit at a time.

Such knowledge is even more vital if NASA hopes to establish moon colonies and go to Mars, which

would take at least a year round-trip. Four unpaid volunteers were chosen for NASA's \$40,000 study, the first underwater habitation program by the agency since 1970. The subjects had to be highly motivated, males who were working on a science project and could swim, since the only way to reach the lodge is by diving.

Four came three when William Scofield, a 35-year-old cell biologist from Sioux Falls, S.D., had to come ashore May 9 because of flu-like symptoms.

"Three is still sufficient, but we certainly wouldn't want to lose another," Holland said.

The aquanauts' abode is Jules' Undersea Lodge in Key Largo, which originally served as an underwater research laboratory off Puerto Rico.

The steel and acrylic bubble is anchored 65 feet offshore in 30 feet of water. It is 50 feet long, 20 feet wide and 11 feet high, and propped on four legs.

**Prison brutality complaints highest in South, California**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Five Southern states and California had the highest ratios of prison brutality complaints to guards, according to a government study of Justice Department figures from 1985 through 1990.

With an average of 28 complaints a year, Mississippi had the highest rate of brutality complaints to federal authorities in an average year - one for every 46 of its 1,291 prison workers, the study said.

The data, which covered complaints from 26 states, the District of Columbia and the federal prison system, were compiled from Justice Department files as part of a broader review of police brutality complaints undertaken after the Rodney-King verdict.

Fewer than 50 complaints were received from the rest of the nation's state prison systems during the period, said the study. Arkansas had a rate of one complaint for every 85 guards, followed by Louisiana, which generated one complaint for every 98 guards.

The rate in the Alabama prison system was one complaint for every 104 guards.

California had an average of 79 complaints a year or one for every 137 guards of the state's 10,788 prison guards. The rate in Hawaii was one per 138 guards followed by Texas, where prisoners filed one complaint for every 173 guards.

The federal prison system, which houses nearly 68,000 inmates, ranked seventh in the number of complaints received in an average year - 22. It ranked eighth when the ratio of complaints to guards was computed - one per every 257 guards. On an average year during the period, there were 5,670 federal prison employees.

Bureau of Prisons spokesman Greg Bogdan said the study "gives a false impression" about the federal prison system because it doesn't "fully reflect the professional standards in that agency until you look at the sustained allegations" of misconduct.

**School lunch prices likely to rise**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The price of a school lunch will be going up this fall, when the federal government ends its flour giveaways and cafeterias have to pay more for bread, biscuits and pizza crusts, Congress was told Thursday.

At the same time, the Agriculture Department continues to spend hundreds of millions of dollars giving foreign countries a bargain price on U.S. flour and wheat.

Some analysts blame the aggressive use of those export subsidies for helping deplete the nation's wheat reserves. The Agriculture Department cites the empty bins in its decision to end giveaways of "bonus" flour to school cafeterias, nursing

homes, Indian reservations, and other feeding programs for the poor.

"The victims of the new policy are the school lunches; the elderly nutrition programs and the charities - those without powerful lobbies to defend their cause," said Rep. Bob Wise, D-W.Va., and the chairman of the House Government Operations subcommittee on agriculture.

But advocates of the export enhancement program, or EEP, argue that it has little effect on the school situation because the cafeterias get government flour and foreign countries are buying privately owned wheat. Also, the bonus flour amounts to just a fraction of the wheat being exported.

# Billionaire considers innovative presidential campaign tactics

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ross Perot wants to revitalize the campaign playbook, bypassing barnstorming trips and other traditional stump techniques in favor of live television call-ins sponsored for by the Texas billionaire.

That would break new ground in media advertising — campaign commercials the voters could talk back to. "We're talking about having a series, or maybe just a constant stream, of Perot and the People talking about the issues," said Perot spokesman James Squires.

Meanwhile, Perot continued to expand his circle of top advisers in preparation for an independent presidential candidacy, hiring pollster Frank Luntz — who previously worked for Republican presidential candidate Pat Buchanan — as his director of research.

"This is the most angry, frustrated electorate since the depression," Luntz said in an interview. "Voters are looking for change and apparently they believe that neither party's candidate offers that kind of change."

Little about Perot's expected general election campaign will be traditional, Squires said.

"It's hard for people to grasp. But this is not a conventional campaign with press releases, press planes, access to all the campaign strategists and all the spin doctors and the guys who are taking credit for this strategy and that strategy."

"This is a different world. And boy is it fun to see from this side," said Squires, former editor of the Chicago Tribune.

Squires said that television productions in which Perot appears live and takes calls from viewers could be the centerpiece of his media campaign.

"They will be a campaign version of the so-called 'electronic town halls' that Perot has vowed to institute if elected."

"We are looking at this whole idea of Perot being able to sit down and talk to his people — volunteers or prospective voters — and listen to them and have a two-way dialogue that's unfiltered by press or advertising gimmicks — or anything," else," Squires said.

Perot will use his own studio, his own cameras and buy satellite time for the productions, the spokesman suggested.

At first, the setup will be used to communicate with specific audiences — enabling Perot to speak with groups of supporters in various cities.

"They listen to him, he listens to them. The press can come and watch it. Anybody who wants to put it on TV can," Squires said.

Later, the same technique would be used for paid campaign commercials.

He said Perot's campaign commercials might include a mix of 30-minute, ten minute and shorter spots.

"The 30-minute show might be Perot talking for ten minutes and then having 20 minutes of discussion with people," he said.

"Whatever it is, it would be spontaneous, unrehearsed, lightly produced," he said.

"Just Perot and the folks."

He said some of the shows may focus on selected "tough issues" such as crime or abortion rights.

Perot made his debut earlier this year as a prospective independent candidate on CNN's Larry King show, a five call-in show, and has made extensive use of similar formats to gain national exposure.

Squires said that, unlike other major presidential candidates, Perot does not intend to have a campaign plane or issue press releases. "I hope we never put out a press release," he said.

Perot travels in his own corporate jet and does not usually allow reporters to accompany him.

# Vice president says 'Murphy Brown' controversy will assist Republicans

WASHINGTON (AP) — Late-night television comedies are having a field day with Dan Quayle's attack on Murphy Brown's morals, but the vice president said Thursday he "wouldn't change one word" in his controversial speech on traditional family values.

"I'm sure the media elite and Hollywood didn't like the speech that I gave, but the American people support what I'm talking about," Quayle told reporters.

Quayle said he has touched off a national debate bound to help the Republican ticket in November.

"Obviously we were able to get a substantive discussion on values," he said. "At first it wasn't substantive."

"What is this Murphy Brown business? Now they see what it is. They're forced to move beyond Murphy Brown."

His spokesman, David Beckwith, said the response to his speech has been "beyond our wildest dream."

The fur kept flying Thursday.

Democratic presidential front-runner Bill Clinton, in Cleveland, accused Quayle of engaging in "cynical election-year politics." It ignores the relationship of our family problems to our national economic decline."

A day earlier, Clinton agreed that out-of-wedlock births were "not the example we want to set for our children."

Beckwith responded he was "happy that Bill Clinton is joining the debate on family values and we will look forward to continuing it."

Independent Ross Perot, in Kentucky to get his name on that state's general-election ballot, poked fun at the "goofy" debate over Murphy Brown and single motherhood and opined, "Only in America would that be a front-page story."

Jesse Jackson had harsh words for

Quayle and his family values speech, saying, "No... exam... cheating... pot smoking, draft dodging, privileged youth vice president in a 'Bush the Blamer' administration can speak with moral authority about abandoned moral values and assuming personal responsibility."

# Perot calls White House reaction to sitcom 'goofy'

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Ross Perot filed petitions Thursday to get his name on Kentucky's presidential ballot, then poked fun at the Republicans' "goofy" debate over Murphy Brown and single motherhood.

"Only in America would that be a front page story," the Texas billionaire said of the brouhaha over CBS-TV's highly rated sitcom.

Vice President Dan Quayle started it Tuesday, saying a "Murphy Brown" episode glamorized illegitimacy when its title character gave birth to a son out of wedlock. The White House applauded Quayle's remarks at first, but since has tried to downplay them.

"Only in America would somebody who's an incumbent just keep reacting to that," Perot said in a news conference at the Kentucky Capitol. "So, it must have been a very slow day in Washington. ... I just thought it was goofy."

In Frankfort, a crowd of about 1,000 surrounded Perot as he and a group of Kentucky campaign volunteers delivered ballot petitions to Secretary of State Bob Bahnsge.

Perot, who would run for president as an independent, needed only a \$20 filing fee and the signatures of 5,000 registered voters to qualify for the ballot. His supporters said they

had gathered 40,000 signatures. Perot has been certified for the ballot in Tennessee, Utah, Delaware and Maine. His organizers said petitions also were being filed Thursday in Alaska and petition certifications are pending in Texas, Florida and New Jersey.

Kentucky does not permit write-in votes for president in Tuesday's primary. Pam Kleier, a campaign volunteer from Louisville, urged the crowd-at-a-rally-outside-the-Capitol to vote "uncommitted" instead.

That would not directly affect Perot, but a sizeable uncommitted vote could result in fewer delegates being bound to vote for President Bush or Democratic candidates at the national political conventions.

Perot talked at length about ethics and hard work during a news conference and at a campaign-style rally. He said he wanted to "make made in the USA" the world standard for excellence again. He promised that, as president, he would be like a man in "old clothes with his sleeves rolled up, working on the engine."

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Roger Keith Coleman's supporters said Thursday they will keep trying to prove the state executed the wrong man for the 1981 rape and murder of his sister-in-law.

Keeping the death-penalty issue in the spotlight across the nation, opponents planned to march outside San Francisco's federal building, one month after Robert Alton Harris became the first convict in 25 years to die in California's gas chamber.



And attorneys for a Texas convict fought to keep that state from executing its 50th person since it resumed capital punishment in 1982. Robert Black, 45, was slated to die by injection early Friday for hiring a hitman through "Soldier-of-Fortune" magazine to kill his wife, Sandra, in 1985.

Lawyers for Black contended the former Marine captain suffered from post-traumatic stress syndrome brought on by his combat service in Vietnam. They asked the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans to halt the execution, which would be the second in Texas this week.

In Virginia, Coleman's lawyer, Kathleen Behan, said his case will be remembered as "the Dred Scott of death penalty law," referring to the infamous 1857 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that upheld slavery.

"Roger's innocence will be proven. The evidence is out there just waiting to be brought to the public," she said.

But Brad McCoy, husband of the victim, Wanda McCoy, said Coleman's supporters would never succeed.

"I think the evidence is there that Roger raped and killed Wanda. There is no doubt in my mind whatsoever," said McCoy, who waited outside the Greensville Correctional Center in Jarratt while Coleman, 33, died in the electric chair at 11:38 p.m. Wednesday.

James McCloskey, a New Jersey private investigator who has worked on Coleman's case for four years, said he would continue to follow any lead.

"We don't have the immediacy and the emergency," McCloskey said. "But it's still an alive case as far as we're concerned."

In the weeks before his execution, Coleman pleaded his case on national talk shows, in newspapers and in magazines as well as in the courts.

McCloskey said he received a new lead Wednesday night when he called Coleman's family in the coal-mining town of Grundy.

**Battlefield**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon Thursday issued a set of principles to provide more open press battlefield coverage of American wars while maintaining military security.

The new guidelines, issued after months of negotiations between executives of leading U.S. news organizations and defense officials, are intended to deal with the complaints of many reporters that their coverage of the Persian Gulf War was hampered by military restrictions.

"I have directed that those nine principles be made part of defense department policy," said Defense Secretary Dick Cheney in a statement. "They have now been formally incorporated into our directives."

Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said the military will now take on the job of "improving what it must provide to journalists."

While the military and journalists agreed on nine of the ten principles originally proposed, they reached no agreement on a news media bid to bar prior review by military officers of news reports.

"The military believes it must retain the option to review news material to avoid the inadvertent inclusion in news reports of information that would endanger troop safety or the success of a military mission," Williams said. "Any review system would be imposed only when operational security was a consideration."

Representatives of the news organizations said they believe journalists in a battlefield can be trusted to act responsibly.

### Scattered ideas on Murphy, money, monarchs, missteps

Some days, the news is so full of juicy items that we can't pick just one to comment on. Here's a Friday foursome:

#### Murphy and the veep

Hidden among the hype and hilarity of Vice President Dan Quayle's dispute with the TV sitcom "Murphy Brown" is a genuine issue worth talking about. Quayle criticized the show for presenting a damaging role model. (The unmarried and unworried Ms. Brown gave birth Monday night.) Quayle was instantly set upon by the guardians of sensitivity.

Our first instinct is to laugh off the whole incident. It was only a sitcom, for crying out loud. Is anyone going to model her life after Murphy?

But that begs the serious question of whether entertainment moguls should worry projecting moral values. In the past couple of seasons TV characters, regardless of marital status, have been reproducing like mice. (Maybe someone put fertility drugs in the studio water cooler.) Of even more concern is TV's nonstop portrayal of easy violence.

Murphy won't inspire a rash of single motherhood, but does the larger context have a subtle impact? If it does, TV networks should care.

#### Merits of monarchy

Notice what happened in Thailand this week? With the military-backed government waging bloody attacks on pro-democracy demonstrators, the king lectured both sides to calm down.

King Bhumibol Adulyadej is a revered figure in Thailand. Though his post is largely ceremonial, he is enormously influential. The two sides' leaders had to kneel before him to receive their dressing-down.

A revered, ceremonial monarch such as Thailand's or Great Britain's has some appeal in a time when the messiness of politics leaves all participants looking sullied. The U.S. Constitution doesn't allow such a post, of course. Still, it's interesting to speculate.

Let's see — we'd need someone deeply respected but detached from the details of government. Barbara Bush? Ronald Reagan? Mr. Rogers? Ross Perot?

#### Denial is bliss

For anyone still supporting Frank Nichols for Twin Falls County prosecutor, Thursday's front-page story should have been instructive.

Nichols, the deputy prosecutor who bobbed 28 drug indictments, said he still hasn't read a judge's May 6 decision chastising him for mishandling a grand jury. Nichols remains convinced he did nothing wrong. Sure, Frank.

Further, he blamed the county's criminal prosecution problems on judges who give the public defender "carte blanche" to bog down the system.

Oh, so now it's those mean, liberal judges who are on the wrong side of what Nichols says is a "war."

Nichols needs to face the truth: One, his grand jury performance was both incompetent and unethical. He should be fired, and the bar association ought to review the case.

Two, Public Defender Mike Wood performs a legitimate and essential role in protecting the rights of defendants. If he wins a lot, maybe it's because he's better than the prosecutors he faces.

Nichols and political opponent G. Richard Bevan both have said that Wood is controlling criminal justice locally.

If that's so, it's because the prosecutor's office has abdicated responsibility for the task.

#### Tight was right

Gov. Cecil Andrus was conveniently in Spain this week as the rain of fiscal reality fell on the plains of Idaho. State tax collections through April were more than \$13 million below projections, and the state could wind up the fiscal year on July 1 in the red. A tax increase seems a strong possibility next year.

In commenting on the shortfall, House Speaker Tom Boyd tried not to say, "I told you so." But in fact he did tell Andrus so. He and other Republican leaders fought the governor all winter over whether revenue could support Andrus' spending plans for schools.

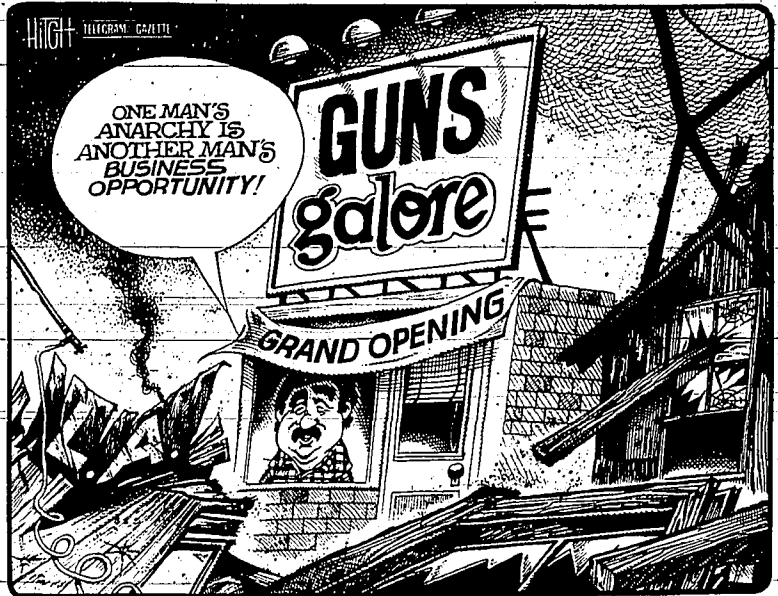
Nobody can give a concrete explanation for the revenue problem, but no matter. Whatever the cause, the situation vindicates the wisdom of Idaho's conservative, citizen Legislature. By clinging to frugality over the past several years, the conservatives have protected Idaho from the budget nightmares that afflict so many other states.

Without that restraint, the numbers could be far worse.

# In former Soviet Union, vacation could cost a year's salary

## Russia delays ruble conversion

MOSCOW (AP) — The Russian government is delaying the introduction of a convertible ruble and plans measures to speed the privatization of the economy, a spokesman said Thursday.

Government economist Alexei Ulukayev said the ruble will become convertible on July 1, as planned, but will be "fixed" two or three months later, than the originally envisioned Aug. 1.

The announcements came after a meeting of Boris Yeltsin's Cabinet, which discussed the troubled Russian economy.

Earlier this month, Russia announced that as of July 1 it would end the practice of having multiple conversation rates for the ruble

and would allow it to float for a month. Officials hoped the ruble would stabilize at about 80 rubles against the U.S. dollar by Aug. 1, at which point they could fix the exchange rate.

Although Western currencies formerly were traded at rates fixed by governments, in practice they have been floating since the 1970s.

Maintaining a stable conversion rate is important to avoid depleting a \$6 billion stabilization account that the International Monetary Fund has agreed to establish.

Ulukayev also said the government plans to double the rate it is printing new rubles from 64 billion

a month to 128 billion a month beginning in June.

Currently, he said, 571 billion rubles are in circulation, 70 percent in Russia and the remainder in other former Soviet republics.

The government is reviewing its economic reform program to correct what Ulukayev called a "disturbingly low rate of converting state-owned businesses and factories to private ownership."

By early May, he said, property valued at 3.5 billion rubles (\$39 billion) had been privatized, about one-third of the goal. The government had planned to privatize property worth about 72 billion rubles (\$800 million) by the end of 1992, he said.

YALTA, Ukraine (AP) — Communism was good to chambermaid Galina Khromisova.

She had a small salary and small apartment, but every year she put down her broom, threw off her apron, and had a big vacation on the Black Sea.

No more. Now prices are so high that a three-week vacation would cost her almost a year's salary.

"This life isn't made for holidays anymore," she said sadly.

Under Communist rule, trade unions and enterprises issued Khromisova and other workers special vouchers entitling them to hefty discounts at resorts and sanatoriums throughout the country. Similar vouchers provided access to hard-to-get train and plane tickets.

But most of these organizations lost their government backing following the collapse of the Soviet Union last year. Previously subsidized transportation costs have more than quadrupled. And the rising cost of food and clothing has forced many people to spend savings on necessities.

Also, many once-popular vacation spots have become off-limits because of civil unrest, rising crime and polluted beaches.

And some people are staying away from other popular resort ar-

cas, such as in the newly independent Baltic states, saying they don't want to feel like foreigners in what used to be their country.

"Before perestroika we always went on holiday to Foros or Sochi (Black Sea resorts), but now we can't go anywhere," complained Khromisova, whose vacations used to be paid by her Communist-run trade union.

The Crimean peninsula, with its rocky Black Sea beaches, government-subsidized coastal resorts and fancy sanatoriums for high-ranking Communist Party officials, was a favorite Soviet vacation spot for decades.

But the powerful political elite no longer stroll the boardwalks. The tourist season has begun, but few sun worshipers are on the beaches and the cafes are almost deserted.

The clientele also has changed. Most of the tourists who come to the Black Sea now are rich.

Anatoly Fetisov, director of the Rossiya Sanatorium, an elegant coastal resort in Mountaintown Yalta, says he expects fewer guests this year because the Rossiya now is open to anyone who can afford it. In the past, it catered only to members of the Communist Party's Central Committee.

The sanatorium, whose sprawling

lawns and white-columned facade recall an Italian villa, charges 18,000 rubles (\$150) for a 24-day visit with board and access to recreational facilities and a private beach. Last year, it charged only 200 rubles (less than \$2) and the party-picked-up-the rest.

"An individual doesn't necessarily have to be rich to come here now, but his enterprise has to have money," Fetisov said.

Other regions and businesses also are suffering. Pressa Publishers, formerly Pravda, tried to issue employee vouchers for health resorts in the Latvian city of Jurmala, the Georgian town of Pitsunda, and just outside Moscow, said chief manager Valery Zhukolenko.

But the Jurmala resort has been reclaimed by the Latvian government. People are hesitant to travel to Pitsunda because of the Georgian civil war. And the Moscow mayoral office has taken over the resort outside Moscow and turned it into a children's sanatorium.

Some resorts hope that attracting foreigners with hard currency can help them solve their financial problems.

Although visiting the Crimea is relatively cheap for Westerners, like most places in the former Soviet Union, it lacks Western amenities.

### Albion farmer files for Darrington seat

BOISE — State Sen. Denton Darrington, R-DeLo, may have some competition after all in his quest for a sixth term in the Legislature.

Albion farmer Earl L. Warthen, a Democrat, filed a declaration of intention this week to run as a write-in candidate for Darrington's District 25 Senate seat.

Under Idaho election law, if Warthen gets 50 write-in votes in Tuesday's primary election, he'll qualify for the November general election ballot.

Darrington, a junior high school teacher who serves as chairman of Senate Judiciary and Rules Committee, was elected without Democratic opposition two years ago in a district that included Cassia, Jerome and Minidoka counties.

His new district, reshaped by reapportionment last winter, includes Cassia County, Heyburn and part of Rupert in Minidoka County and Murtaugh in Twin Falls County.

### College seeks course transfer from CSI to Pocatello school

LEWISTON — Lewis-Clark State College will ask the Idaho Board of Education next month to transfer the management program it conducts at the College of Southern Idaho to Idaho State University.

"By state board directive, Idaho State is responsible for the service area that includes Twin Falls," said Robert Sorrels, dean of extended programs and community development at the Lewiston school. "LCSC has been providing this management program for the last seven years, but this was always considered a temporary thing."

"ISU is closer, has greater resources and can provide more services for Magic Valley students," Sorrels said. Under the plan, LCSC's program would be transitioned into one of three different majors that ISU is proposing to begin delivering in the Magic Valley by the spring of 1993.

The change would affect about 100 students, the school said. "Under the proposal, LCSC will offer transition courses this fall and maintain our coordinator at CSI until January 1993," Sorrels said.

Sorrels said it makes more sense to have ISU, located 125 miles from the CSI campus, run the program than for LCSC to attempt to manage it from 400 miles distance.

### Twin Falls pool plans to open for Memorial Day weekend

TWIN FALLS — The city swimming pool will open Saturday, Sunday and Monday for the Memorial Day weekend. Pool hours will be from 1 to 6 p.m., said city Parks and Recreation Director Chad Browning.

After Memorial Day weekend, the pool will close until the weekend of May 30-31 when it will open from 1 to 6 p.m. again, Browning said.

After that weekend, the pool will close until the following weekend when it will open for regular summer hours, beginning Saturday, June 6, he said.

Regular pool hours this summer will be from 1 to 5 and 7 to 9 p.m. Monday through Saturdays and from 1 to 5 p.m. on Sundays.

Pricing will be 50 cents for children 5 and under; \$1 for children 6 to 12; \$1.50 for children 13 to 17 and \$2 for adults.

Season passes cost \$15 for children 5 and under; \$30 for children ages 6 to 12; \$45 for children ages 13 to 17 and \$60 for adults.

Season passes for a family of five cost \$100 plus \$25 for each additional member older than 5. For additional members under age 5 the cost is \$15, Browning said.

### Crews widen Highway 93 north of Interstate 84

SHOSHONE — Transportation crews have begun work on widening U.S. Highway 93 north of Interstate 84 to relieve traffic congestion.

The contractor is widening about one-half mile of the roadway to provide two travel lanes in each direction and a center-lane turn bay.

Minor traffic delays will occur during blasting operations during the next two weeks. Two-way traffic will be maintained. The project is expected to be completed sometime in July.

# Jerome jailbreak highlights debate

TWIN FALLS — A March 21 jailbreak provided the closest thing to a flashpoint in a televised debate between candidates for Jerome County sheriff Thursday night.

"If you have knowledge that an escape is going to take place, you lock that jail down," said Larry Webb, a former Jerome County deputy who is seeking the GOP nomination for sheriff in next Tuesday's

primary election. "You get the prisoners in their cells and you search for weapons and contraband."

The case involved the escape of Gilbert Cisneros, a Colorado man being held on a charge of driving without a license and resisting arrest.

Using hacksaw blades smuggled into the jail by his girlfriend, Cisneros sawed the bolts that held a grate on a second-floor window and fled on foot.

He has not been found. Despite news accounts in the wake of the escape that sheriff's deputies knew beforehand there would be a jailbreak, Sheriff Larry Gold, a Republican seeking a second term, has maintained he did not have advance knowledge.

"If I had known there was going to be an escape, I would have done everything in my power to prevent it," he said in the debate, televised by Kingvideo Cable and

broadcast by radio station KTFI. "I was home at the time with some people from my church."

Gold said there were escapes from the jail when Webb was a deputy.

"Hindsight is 20-20," he said. Gold touted cooperation among Northside counties and Cassia County in drug enforcement, but Webb said Jerome County should join the Magic Valley. Please see DEBATE/B2

# Twin Falls County sheriff candidates agree: Experience is the key to race

TWIN FALLS — Just about the only thing the two Republican candidates for Twin Falls County sheriff disagree on is which one is the most qualified.

Retired Idaho State Police Cpl. Gene Bolton says his 26 years of experience patrolling southern Idaho's highways have given him the background to take over the Magic Valley's second-largest law enforcement agency.

Twin Falls County coroner and city fireman Cal Edwards points to his own six-year stint as a Twin Falls police department patrolman and his investigative work as coroner.

Edwards insists that the coroner's office is a law-enforcement job even though it doesn't involve patrol duties or investigating property crimes.

"I'm an investigator for the most serious crime of all, and that's death," Edwards said.

As a full-time city fireman, Edwards said he spends more than 20 hours per week on the coroner job, which pays \$11,880 per year.

All deaths that do not occur in a hospital or in the presence of a doctor are investigated by the coroner's office, Edwards said.

In addition, all cremations must be attended by a coroner.

According to county records, Edwards personally investigated a little more than

one-third of the 166 calls his office handled in 1991.

Between October 1991 and April 1992, Gene Edwards responded to only 10 of 105 cases investigated by his office in that same period.

Those figures can be misleading, Edwards said, because he accompanies his deputy coroners on a fair number of those calls.

And deputies often make the initial contact by driving to the scene and gathering evidence, then return to the office where Edwards takes over the

## Gooding County commissioner, District 3

What is your position on the increasingly pressing landfill problem in Gooding County?

### Bill Emerson

"Gooding County is at border-line capacity. Choosing between Elmore and the site at Hansen is going to take some investigation and some hard decision-making. If we're forced by the federal government to go to one of those sites, then which one?"

"We have not received a really, a concrete proposal from Elmore County, but then again, the situation in Hansen is not set in concrete either, so we're really in a position that we kind of have to wait until something develops and then decide what we're going to do. For Gooding, it's closer to haul to Elmore, and cheaper,

from what they tell me. But neither one of them have come up with a concrete offer, a flat dollar figure, so I can't say right now which is the better site.

"A lot of people are upset with this new tax. I'm not saying we should abolish it, I'm just saying we should take a hard look at it. You've got to have some kind of equity."

### William Henslee

"I would like to see the landfill stay in Gooding County if at all possible."

"We know that joining a regional landfill will cost the county a whopping \$50 per ton. With the use of recycling the

volume of trash would be about 20 tons per day. Plastic liners and monitoring wells would not be needed for this amount of trash."

"This could be done for a fraction of the cost, in comparison to going to a regional landfill. This idea should be explored in detail as soon as possible. The reasons being, there will be a cost to recover the recyclable materials, and there is a lack of established markets in the area. Markets may need to be developed."

### Vernon Mason

"I'm for a regional landfill, but we'll have to have a transfer station in Gooding County. My preference would be to have it at Hansen."

# Prepare for long, dry weekend

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho State Police has promised to meet crowds of speeding motorists with crowds of squad cars. Banks, government offices and many stores will be closed. General fishing season opens.

It's Memorial Day weekend, the first splash of summer holiday fun. But this year, because of an odd quirk of fate, many liquor stores will be closed for three straight days.

Memorial Day is one of the three holidays that the state prohibits the sale of liquor, unless a county ordinance allows it. In Twin Falls County, no such ordinance exists.

State law also prohibits liquor stores on an a state, federal or city election day. Since Tuesday is a primary election day, all liquor sales must cease and desist during election hours, from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

State police are also gearing up for what they call one of the worst holidays for accidents. Even though roads are more hazardous in the winter, accidents aren't as dangerous because motorists drive slower.

"In the summer, the roads are good, people are on the move and frequently they're driving faster," State Police Superintendent Col. Ron Moore said. "It's these higher-speed accidents that frequently result in fatalities."

Their answer? Lots of police cars on the road. And a new program called "Speedometer."

"Our Speed Task Force officers will be targeting areas we've identified as trouble spots," Moore said. "They will not only work individually, but will periodically through the summer conduct saturation patrols."

In a saturation patrol, a large number of officers will patrol a designated stretch of highway.

Keeping your speed down will not only save lives, money on traffic tickets, but you will also get better gas mileage. That could help, because the American Automobile Association says the statewide average price for gas has risen sharply and could hit its highest level in eight years.

According to its survey, self-service, unleaded gasoline has reached \$1.20 a gallon, nearly 8 cents higher than the nationwide average.

Many motorists will be closing early on Saturday, so customers should plan their flower purchases early. The Magic Valley Mall will be open on Memorial Day from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

## Wendell school will cost taxpayers less

**WENDELL** - The new high school in Wendell is going to cost taxpayers \$215,000 less than expected, thanks to lower interest rates.

"We're very fortunate to be borrowing money at this time," Superintendent Larry Manly said. School trustees opened six bids for bond sales. Tuesday and accepted the lowest bid, submitted by Merrill Lynch and Co. of Los Angeles, Calif. The company offered to buy the bonds - thus loaning the district \$3.8 million - at an interest rate of 6.035 percent.

Earlier projections of interest rates put the figure closer to 7.0 percent.

Trustee Clarence Sparks said

even a few tenths of a percent in the rate can make a considerable difference in the life of bonds.

In related business, trustees reviewed building designs for the new high school as presented by Design West of Boise. They resolved questions about heating and cooling systems and roof construction, then approved the preliminary plans for the 50,812 square-foot structure.

Architectural drawings of each side of the new building are available for public viewing and comment at the school administration office.

After design development and contract review workshops in June and July, trustees are scheduled to approve contracts and other final plans in August, with construction expected to begin in October.

## Superintendent warns of tough economic times

**WENDELL** - Superintendent Larry Manly said enrollment is steadily rising in the district, while state fund board members to look for ways to tighten their belts.

"While enrollments rise and fall, last year they were up so high, Wendell was eligible for an emergency tax levy, which it did not take advantage of.

This year, Manly said, the count is down so the district will receive about \$120,000 less in state funds. At the same time, he said, health insurance costs for the district's 80 employees are rising about 15 percent every year.

The cost of benefits for the current year was about \$210,000, he said, so a continuous 15 percent increase to that amount "really escalates itself quickly," he concluded.

Manly also said the district's monthly payroll is \$200,000. While accountants recommend maintaining a fund balance high enough to carry the district for three months, Wendell has only a one month reserve.

Trustees agreed to work to increase the existing balance if possible.

Manly said everyone will have to hold spending down to the bare essentials. "We have quite a task ahead of us and some hard decisions have to be made," he said.

# Lincoln County sheriff candidates face off

**SHOSHONE** - Lincoln County Sheriff Steve Southwick was appointed to office in November of last year, following the death of Sheriff Darwin Mills. He is being challenged in his bid for re-election by Tim Swenson. Swenson has been a deputy sheriff in Lincoln County since August of last year. Before that he was a deputy with Elmore County and was with the Mountain Home Police Department for three years. The following are their answers to several questions on operating the sheriff's office:

**SOUTHWICK**  
Q: What is the most important issue in this campaign?  
A: "There are not really any clear-cut issues, but the most important thing to me is that Lincoln County

receives all the law enforcement services that the sheriff is required to provide."

Q: Do you think that the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department has adequate manpower?  
A: "Besides the sheriff, there are two deputies. There are times that that's more manpower than we need, and times that it's not enough.

"When the sheriff does the administration work that's required, he's not patrolling. That's not always a good situation, but the county has

some financial problems that won't permit the hiring of any more manpower."

Q: Do you think that consolidating the law enforcement agencies or city and county would be advantageous?  
A: "In theory, it would be a real good idea and would have genetic advantages. However, there would be a problem working out the financial aspects of a consolidation. It would require time an compromise from both entities, city and county. But with five patrol officers, Lincoln County could have 24-hour per day, seven-day per week duty coverage."

**SWENSON**  
Q: What is the most important issue in this campaign?  
A: "There's not just one particular issue, but several. Alcohol with teenagers is a real problem. Better trained personnel to do a better job and improving communications

between the public and the Sheriff's Department."

Q: Do you think the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department has enough manpower?  
A: "No, not for the size of the county. There's usually only one officer on patrol. There are three schools in the county, and there should be after-school patrol for each school. If the officer is otherwise involved, there's no one for the schools."

Q: Do you think consolidating the law enforcement agencies or city and county would be advantageous?  
A: "Yes, I think it would work. And I think it would be cost-effective too. Instead of having two separate agencies, all would work together effectively and do a better job. It would take research to properly set it up, and putting the idea across to the community for their acceptance would be important."

## Judge sets bail for 4 in trucker's beating

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** - A judge set bail Thursday for four black men who pleaded innocent to charges in the televised beating of a white truck driver at the outset of rioting that followed the Rodney King verdict.

But another judge ordered one of the men held.

Also Thursday:  
• The death toll rose to 52 from the fiery chaos that followed the April 29 acquittals of four white officers in the videotaped beating of King, a black motorist. The latest victim was a man whose body was found Wednesday in the ruins of a burned building in South Central Los Angeles.

• The formal truce called after the riots by the Bloods and Crips gangs seemed to be holding. And new statistics found almost half the black men in Los Angeles County ages 21 to 24 belong to street gangs.

• The price riot-scared Los Angeles is paying in lost tourism was

talled past the billion-dollar mark and lost jobs in the thousands; the Los Angeles Convention & Visitors Bureau said.

• President Bush named David J. Beightor, a White House aide, as executive director of a federal riot recovery task force.

In the arraignments of four men accused in the beating of Reginald Denny, the white truck driver, Municipal Judge William Chidsey Jr. said he found no reason to hold the defendants without bail. He set a June 10 hearing.

Damian Monroe Williams, 19, Henry Keith Watson, 27, and Antoine Miller, 20, pleaded innocent to attempted willful, deliberate, premeditated murder and aggravated robbery, torture and second-degree robbery.

Gary Williams, 33, pleaded innocent to second-degree robbery.

Damian Williams' bail was set at \$195,000; Watson's, \$185,000;

Miller's \$50,000; and Gary Williams, \$5,000.

But Superior Court Judge Gordon Ringer ordered Watson held without bail for violating probation in a 1990 conviction for grand theft and carrying a concealed weapon. He set a June 12 hearing.

Denny was beaten as rioting erupted April 29 and the assault was broadcast live nationwide by television news helicopters. Four blacks rescued the truck driver and took him to a hospital in critical condition. He was released May 14.

District Attorney Ira Reiner said he was heartened by apparent results of the informal Blood-Crips truce, but was skeptical about its lasting.

"There haven't been any black gang homicides since the truce began and that's good," Reiner said, adding "We've had many of them over the years and unfortunately they've all failed."

Authorities estimate at least 936

gangs are active in Los Angeles County, with some 150,000 members. Of these, about 37,000 are black and 58,000 Hispanic.

Almost half the county's black males ages 21-24 belong to street gangs, according to the report by Reiner's staff. A record 771 gang homicides were recorded in Los Angeles County last year, up from a previous peak of 441 in 1980.

Without gang-related murders, the city's homicide rate actually would have declined since 1984.

The rioting in Los Angeles, where tourism is the second-biggest business, will cost the city \$1.1 billion in visitor spending and 31,000 full-time jobs over the next year, according to studies just released.

The surveys by the visitors bureau said international tourism would be hardest hit, falling up to 40 percent through summer's end. A long-term decline of 15 percent to 25 percent was forecast over the next year.

## Cassia Memorial upgrades capabilities for eye surgery

**BURLEY** - Cassia Memorial Hospital has recently purchased equipment enabling a new state-of-the-art cataract surgery procedure to be performed locally.

"Patients needing this type of surgery prior to this time have had to travel to Twin Falls, Pocatello or Salt Lake City," said Dr. Scott Allan, ophthalmologist.

"With Cassia Memorial's purchase of this high-tech equipment, Mini-Cassia residents will not have to leave the area for treatment."

The new equipment allows

surgeons to perform a small incision cataract surgery, said Allan.

With this procedure, the incision made to the eye is only 5 millimeters and requires one stitch, as opposed to 13 millimeters requiring six or seven stitches used with an older technique.

In addition, recovery time is reduced from approximately 10 weeks to between two and four weeks.

All eye surgeons on staff at Cassia Memorial Hospital will be using this equipment. These doctors are Scott Allan, Allan Frost, Brad Hobbs and Robert Welch.

"I don't think the danger of chemicals leaching into the aquifer is a problem because there is a big layer of lava rock in that area, but there is the wind which can be

# Buhl school trustees find new bus service

BÜHL — Mayflower's bid of \$392,111 for annual transportation costs for the Buhl School District was accepted by board members after a second special meeting.

On May 13, bids were received from Mayflower and West Valley Bus Co., and an individual who bid on only one route. At that meeting, board members wanted to examine the bids more closely and scheduled another meeting.

The school district's transportation director Bob Bailey Sr. had prepared estimates comparing extra-curricular transportation costs for the next school year, based on the bid mileage and wait-time for both companies. Superintendent Gene

Pyles told board members that based on those estimates, Mayflower came in at \$15,765 lower than West Valley.

The actual difference between bids is almost \$12,000. However, Pyles explained that Mayflower's bid would be less in its comparison because of some fire wait-time allowed during some extra-curricular activities. Pyles recommended the board go with the lower bid from Mayflower.

Board member Armand Eckert said West Valley Bus had provided good service to the district during their years of operation, but he also stated that Mayflower was a reputable company.

He then moved that Mayflower's bid be accepted, and the motion passed unanimously.

# Senate considers bill protecting Idaho lands

Bills exchanging Idaho timberland for Arkansas wetland, permanently protecting the Snake River Birds of Prey National Conservation Area and setting the pace of the lower Salmon River all could become law before the year is out, Sen. Larry Craig said Thursday.

But the Idaho Republican said some work may still have to be done on all three pieces of legislation considered Thursday by the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Subcommittee on Public Lands, National Parks and Forests.

Craig also said he wants more public input from Idahoans on the measures before they come to a Senate vote. Hearings may be scheduled during a recess in Congress this summer, he said.

The land swap legislation would exchange 19,694 acres of scattered government timberland in six northern Idaho counties for 56,000 acres of Potlatch Corp. property near the Arkansas-Mississippi border.

The Potlatch acreage would go to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to expand the Cache and White River national wildlife refuges, which are a big part of a national waterfowl restoration program. The Arkansas wetlands along the Mississippi Flyway harbor about 300,000 mallard ducks each winter.

Potlatch has sponsored meetings on the swap in each affected county. Craig is cosponsoring the bill introduced by Sen. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark.

The Bureau of Land Management would provide most of the Idaho acreage transferred to Potlatch, handing over 10,266 acres directly to the company.

The Forest Service would shift another 10,598 to Potlatch but would receive 9,114 acres from the BLM as part of the deal. Potlatch would trade back 891 acres to the Forest Service and another 279 acres to the BLM. Most of the land trade will be in Shoshone County.

Conservationists had feared the shift of ownership from the BLM to the Forest Service of some 5,000 acres near Grandmother Mountain north of Clarkia would allow more logging there.

Craig said Thursday that the issue

has yet to be resolved.

The Snake River Birds of Prey bill would provide permanent federal protection for a 482,000-acre area of southwestern Idaho set aside for raptor habitat by Gov. Ced Andrus when he was the Card administration's Interior secretary.

Glenn Stewart, executive director of the Idaho Conservation League, told the Senate subcommittee the compromise measure "puts her birds first without extinguishing other values."

It allows continued livestock grazing, recreational use and National Guard use of the Orchard Training Area, Stewart said. "All of these activities can and should continue so long as they are compatible with the purposes of this act — to protect a unique birds of prey area," he said.

# Ogden man to stand trial in bombing of ex-wife

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — An Ogden man has been bound over to stand trial for murder and attempted murder in a bombing that killed his ex-wife and her mother and wounded two others.

Toan H. Hua, 27, appeared Thursday for a preliminary hearing before 2nd Circuit Judge Parley Baldwin, who scheduled an arraignment for next Wednesday before 2nd District Judge David Roth.

Hua is charged with two counts of aggravated murder and one count of attempted aggravated murder. All three are first-degree felonies, with the harshest sentence being capital punishment.

Killed in the April 26 explosion were Le Cam Nguyen, 21, and her 41-year-old mother Ut Thi Nguyen. The blast injured Ut Nguyen's 44-year-old husband Dan Dang Pham, and Le Nguyen's 18-month-old son, Jame Hua. Hua is accused of putting a pipe bomb in a radio that detonated when his ex-wife shook it. Testimony at the preliminary hearing indicated the bomb was meant for the victim's father.

Appearing confused at times and speaking through an interpreter, Dan Pham told Baldwin about the morning of the explosion. Pham said his family was preparing a meal to celebrate the third anniversary of their arrival in the United States when his daughter found a package outside the front door.

The unwrapped package was addressed to Pham on a National Rifle Association card. His name was misspelled. A radio was inside the package, but Pham said it didn't work after his

daughter plugged the cord into an outlet. The witness said his wife and daughter were in the living room fiddling with the radio when the explosion occurred.

Pham and his grandson had been walking into the room from the kitchen. He then ran outside, screaming for help.

Ogden Police Detective John Stubbs said he and other officers found evidence at Hua's house to link him to the explosion, including

powder residue on the stove, metal pipe and discarded material from the NRA.

After getting consent from Hua to search the house, along with a signed search warrant, investigators also found a typewriter with Pham's name on the ribbon.

Stubbs said he interviewed Hua, who eventually confessed to having problems with his in-laws because he felt they exerted too much control over their daughter and himself.

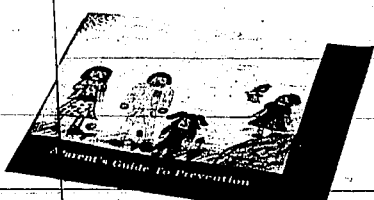

# Condemned triple murderer seeks U.S. Supreme Court review

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Attorneys for condemned triple murderer Paul Ezra Rhoades have asked the U.S. Supreme Court to review Idaho Supreme Court decisions affirming his convictions and death sentences. But even if the high court considers the cases and agrees with his arguments, it would not overturn Rhoades' convictions and death sentences. The U.S. Supreme Court has not decided yet whether to review the cases, a court spokeswoman in Washington, D.C., said Thursday.

Rhoades, 35, of Idaho Falls, received two death sentences for the March 1987 slaying of schoolteacher Susan Michelbacher, 34. She was sexually molested and raped before her body was riddled with bullets. Michelbacher's body was found in a lava field west of Idaho Falls. Rhoades also was sentenced to a death-degree murder conviction and a fixed life prison term after pleading guilty to the first-degree murder of convenience store clerk Nolan Haddon, 20, in Idaho Falls. In petitions sent to the Supreme Court, Rhoades' attorneys argue over review on a number of grounds. James Lobsenz of Seattle, one of Rhoades' attorneys in the Baldwin case, said pris-

oners sentenced to death in Idaho have only 42 days after sentencing to file an appeal. All other prisoners are allowed five years. That difference violates Rhoades' constitutional rights to equal protection under the law, due process and protection from cruel and unusual punishment, Lobsenz said. "In this case Idaho has singled out defendants sentenced to death for discriminatory treatment," Lobsenz wrote. Attorney Russell Webb of Idaho Falls raised the same issue in the Michelbacher case. And in a written petition, he said the state Supreme Court made mistakes on several other issues.

Webb said the Idaho Supreme Court should have determined that the jury instructions given at Rhoades' trial violated his rights to due process. The instructions may have suggested that a higher degree of doubt than a reasonable doubt was necessary to acquit him, Webb and attorney John Radin have said. The state court also should have determined that a comment to the jury by Bonneville County Prosecutor Kimball Mason during his closing arguments violated Rhoades' rights against self-incrimination. Several jurors said after the trial said Rhoades' failure to testify had an impact on

their decision to find him guilty, the written request said. The U.S. Supreme Court does not have to review the cases. If it does and Rhoades prevails on the question of whether he should have had more than 42 days to appeal after his conviction, he would simply have more opportunities to appeal through the state court system, the attorneys said. If the high court determines that Mason's comment or the jury instructions violated Rhoades' rights, he could get a new trial, Webb said. Rhoades may still appeal through lower federal courts if the Supreme Court decides against reviewing the cases.

## Senate candidate will continue graphic anti-abortion TV ads

BOISE (AP) — Republican Senate candidate Rod Beck said Thursday his controversial anti-abortion commercials have been so successful he's extending them through the weekend. "They've been resoundingly successful. I'm sure they have saved the lives of children," Beck told a Boise news conference. "It has touched some hearts, clearly."

"It has touched some hearts and it has generated financial support for my campaign," Beck said. He started graphic anti-abortion ads this week, showing a number of dead fetuses. They were scheduled to end Thursday, but Beck said he's received so much support and financial contributions that he's running them at least through Saturday. Beck is one of three candidates seeking the GOP nomination in Tuesday's primary election to succeed Republican Sen. Steve Symms. The others are Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne and stockbroker Milt Erhart. Beck said his campaign contributions have "picked up dramatically" since he started the commercials, but wouldn't say how much. He acknowledged that he probably will wind up in debt after the campaign.



He also said it was "an affront" to the Idaho cattle industry for Kempthorne to refuse to respond to an Idaho Cattle Association survey on natural resource issues, Beck said he backs all 10 ICA-supported issues. Phil Reberger, Kempthorne campaign manager and chief of staff for Symms, said Kempthorne didn't get the survey. "The first we saw of it is when it was published," he said. "We would be supportive of the natural resource industries in Idaho, including the cattle industry." "A huge portion of Idaho's jobs are natural resource based. As the mayor of the capitol city, Dirk always has recognized the interrelationship between the natural resource economy

and Boise's economy," Kempthorne said. Beck called for an end to foreign aid, mentioning specifically economic aid to the former Soviet Union. "We have problems here in America that need to be solved first," he said. Meanwhile, Boise businessman Walt Minnick has contacted 1,700 fellow conservationists, urging them to cross party lines to vote for one of Beck's opponents, Milt Erhart. "One letter does not a cross-over campaign make," said Reberger. In a letter sent to conservationists, Minnick called Erhart "a true conservation oriented candidate... who will put Idaho's land, water, and people ahead of demands of special interests." "I think on a variety of issues, including conservation issues, that Erhart is different and more progressive than the other two candidates," Minnick said, "and that ought to be conveyed to voters like it is on other issues."

## Competence will be 1st retrial issue

PROVO, Utah (AP) — Utah County Attorney Kay Braxton says the murder retrial of Ron Lafferty will be handled "as if the offense were committed yesterday." The second hearing begins in six weeks and will start, as before, with a mental evaluation. If found competent, Lafferty will once again stand trial for the murders of his sisters-in-law, Brenda Wright Lafferty, a native of Kimberly, Idaho, and her 15-month-old daughter, Africa, on July 24, 1984. Lafferty was sentenced to death for the crimes, while his brother, Dan, was given life in prison. However, the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver overturned Ron Lafferty's two murder convictions in Denver, and the U.S. Supreme Court announced Monday that it would not review the appellate court's decision.

**Fruitland man dies in 2-car collision**  
FRUITLAND — A Fruitland man has died in a two-car collision on U.S. Highway 95, police say. Hugh James Rash, 82, on Tuesday afternoon pulled onto the highway from a side road and collided with a car driven by Jeffrey Nelson, 21, New Plymouth. Rash was pronounced dead at Holy Rosary Hospital in Ontario, Ore. No other injuries were reported and no citations were issued.

**Judge sentences child-beater to life**  
CALDWELL — A 22-year-old Nampa man has been sentenced to life in prison without parole for beating his 6-week-old son to death last year. Richard Pedersen showed no emotion Thursday as 3rd District Judge Gerald Weston imposed the sentence for first-degree murder. Weston said Pedersen demonstrated an "utter disregard for human life," in killing his son, Bradley Alan Roberts. The boy died last Oct. 26 after being declared brain dead and removed from life support at a Boise hospital. Public Defender Klaus Wiebe argued for a life sentence with a fixed term of five to 10 years.

**Murder suspect will stay in jail for now**  
IDAHO FALLS — Double-murder suspect William L. Gray will remain in the Bonneville County Jail for now. At a hearing Wednesday, 7th District Judge Ted Wood denied requests from Gray's attorneys to release him immediately and dismiss an arrest warrant they contend was obtained illegally. A grand jury indictment charges Gray, 52, of Jackson, Wyo., with two counts of first-degree murder and one count of first-degree burglary in the July 24, 1989 slayings of his wife, Betty Lou Gray, 47, and Reeda Roundy, 49, at Roundy's home east of Idaho Falls. Attorney John Radin said prosecutors should have conducted a hearing after Gray's indictment was issued to let a district judge decide whether there was enough evidence to issue an arrest warrant. A judge determines whether to issue a warrant, not a grand jury, he said.

**Anti-hate leader earns national award**  
SPOKANE, Wash. — The director of an anti-harassment organization that battles white supremacists in northern Idaho has been given a national award for being a "catalyst of positive social change." Bill Wassmuth, executive director of the Seattle-based Northwest Coalition Against Malignant Harassment, received the Gleitsman Award and \$50,000 for his efforts in fighting bigotry. Wassmuth, a former Roman Catholic priest, co-founded the anti-hate group in 1987 in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. With an annual budget of \$100,000, the organization monitors racist groups and assists communities in combating prejudice.

## Stallings wants federal funds to buy wetlands

BOISE (AP) — Democratic U.S. Rep. Richard Stallings is asking a House committee for federal funds to buy natural habitat in the Halls Gulch area of the Boise Foothills. Halls Gulch is a series of wetlands and wildlife cover near the capital city's North End. Stallings on Wednesday asked the Interior Appropriations Subcommittee to allocate \$625,000 toward purchasing about 170 acres there for public use. The money would come from the Land-and-Water Conservation Fund, collected from off-shore oil royalties. It would go to the Boise District of the Bureau of Land Management. The land, now owned by Orida Investments, is proposed for a residential subdivision. "This area is a critical part of the Halls Gulch environment and is one of the few remaining areas within the Boise Foothills containing valuable habitat for a variety of wildlife species," Stallings told the panel. In March, Boise Water Corp.; its sister company, Orida Investments; the city; and citizen preservation groups hammered out a land exchange for 100 acres at Halls Gulch. The trade will create a city-owned public corridor through the area.

## 'Partying in the name of peace,' LA gangs consider unity

**LOS ANGELES** — Sipping a 40-ounce bottle of Old English 800 at housing project last week, Dale Marks stood among scores of celebrating Crips and Bloods — once deadly rivals in Los Angeles' street-gang warfare.

For the first time in his life, he was partying in the name of peace. From throughout Los Angeles County, Bloods and Crips had converged on the Nickerson Gardens project in Watts, as they had on a number of previous nights, swapping in high fives and trading gang colors in a display of unity that would have been almost unfathomable before the riots.

The 24-year-old Marks, a longtime member of the Bloods and a father of three, said he does not doubt the resolve of various factions of the two gangs to end the pay-back killings that have claimed hundreds of lives of gang members and bystanders. But he said that, unless economic conditions improve for gang members, some may continue to engage in criminality.

"The average black person I know is just like me and can't get a job," Marks said. "Most of us don't have another way of being somebody other than being in a gang."

"One thing for sure," he said, without admitting or denying that he had ever engaged in criminal acts, "I have a family and I am going to take care of my family."

While a surprising and positive development in a city victimized by record increases in gang-related murders, police say they are wary of the accord because of reports that the Crips and Bloods may be joining forces to attack law enforcement officers — a contention that gang members involved in the truce deny. "It is in fact that the two major factions want to bury the hatchet and they don't want to go against the police, the department is all for that," said Los Angeles Police Department Cmdr. Robert Gil. "Some of the things they're saying now are positive and some tend to be negative and we want to assess both sides of it."

Community activists say it is crucial for political leaders, business owners and neighborhood residents to quickly develop programs that will help ease the poverty and despair that give rise to gangs.

They worry that the positive energy from the truce already is dissipating in the nightly celebrations in South-Central Los Angeles housing projects — one of which ended in two severe beatings and another with wild shooting in the air.

Mayor Walter R. Tucker of Compton (which is adjacent to South-Central Los Angeles), former football star Jim Brown and 30 current and former Crips and Bloods this week challenged elected officials and corporations to create jobs for jobless gang members as part of the city's rebuilding effort.

"Without an infusion of jobs, they said, youths can be expected to slide back into trouble. And without support, they said, the truce is unlikely to spread beyond South Los Angeles — home to the Crips and Bloods — and into other areas for the county where Latino gangs are based.

Authorities contend that there are an estimated 150,000 gang members countywide, and it is unclear how many of them are adding to the truce. There is evidence that the feeding is continuing among some gangs. Last weekend, four people were killed and eight others were injured in what police described as gang-related incidents throughout Los Angeles County.

Robert Moore, a businessman and community activist, said young gang members he knows are not honoring the truce.

"They say they just don't believe in it, that it's a hoax created to keep them from doing this or that, all the anger (from the Rodney King verdict) blows over," said Moore. "They believe that no one is addressing the real issues."

Supporters of the truce contend that many gang members, who are not hardened offenders, truly want to change their lives and be included in the rebuilding of their riot-torn neighborhoods, citing a 10-page proposal by a group of Crips and Bloods outlining a \$3.7 million rebuilding plan.

"If we turn our backs on these brothers there will be another riot," said Mayor Tucker, speaking Tuesday at a seven-acre site where Compton officials plan to establish a jobs training center with the help of a grant from the Southern California Edison Co. "The gang truce can last if there is a foundation for the truce — that means local production and jobs."

Peter V. Ueberroth, chairman of Rebuild L.A., the non-profit corporation created by Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley to lead the reconstruction of riot-torn areas, implied gang members would be included in the effort.

"There is no group that will be excluded," he said. "We recognize that there is a critical need to understand problems and obstacles that young people throughout the city must deal with daily. Nobody has discounted the importance of addressing this segment of the community."

The peace movement among Crips and Bloods originated, by all accounts, with the gang members themselves. Those who were interviewed said a series of incidents that they said led gang members to see black neighborhoods as besieged from without for the first time.

They repeatedly cited the fatal shooting of 15-year-old Latasha Har-

lins by a Korean-born storeowner, the beating of King and the subsequent not-guilty verdicts returned in Simi Valley by a jury that included no blacks.

"There is no equality," said Bradi, a Crip who declined to give his last name. "You are only going to take the injustice for so long before something blows. And that's what happened. If they want us to work with the system then they have to show they gonna treat us right."

Many say the truce talks began in Watts' three largest housing projects — Nickerson Gardens, Imperial Courts and Jordan Downs.

On two recent evenings as many as 1,600 gang members gathered at the Imperial Courts, "hugging and exchanging tears," said Charles Norman, a regional director of Community Youth Gang Services.

Former enemies renewed friendships and relatives who had been too fearful in the past to venture outside their neighborhoods once again uniting.

"One young man hadn't seen a cousin who lived only a few miles away for more than 20 years, since they were both about 7-year-old," said Norman. "Now they were walking arm-in-arm."

"All of us grew up together and attended the same junior high school, we ran the streets together, played basketball but then we went down that road and we separated," said Charles Rachal, 28, a Crip. "We've all got aunts and cousins who we haven't been able to visit in years, but we're tired of it."

Details of the truce have been spread by leaders of various Crips and Bloods factions, typically older gang members or former gang members known as OGs or Original Gangsters.

"We've got our own rules and regulations," said an OG Blood who identified himself only as BJ from Nickerson Gardens. "There are no more drivebys. No more disrespecting each other."

\$95,000 to a buyer who hopes to open a foreign car dealership and repair shop.

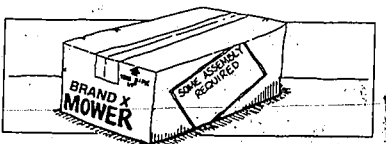
Bids for the other three firehouses did not meet the city's minimum bid requirements. The city council will decide what to do with those buildings.

## Prepare for lots of sequels - and a few surprises

Everything old is renewed again. Before the month is out we'll be seeing the third installments of "Alien" and "Lethal Weapon," and during the hot-weather weeks to come we'll be getting "Batman Returns," "Patriot Games" (a follow-up to "The Hunt For Red October"), "Hellraiser III," "RoboCop 3," "Pet Sematary II" and "Honey, I Blew Up the Kid."

As if to prove that Robert Altman's lacerating Hollywood satire, "The Player," is anything but fiction, summer is already slapping up as another retreat of time-tested formulas. Still, if you take the optimistic view that The New Testament is really a sequel, this state of affairs may not look so off-putting.

Although few of these films have been screened even for theater owners, the buzz is not all bad on "Alien3," which isn't likely to repeat the patterns of the first two movies,

and there's hope for "Batman Returns," which was directed by "Batman's" Tim Burton and offers the seemingly irresistible teaming of Michelle Pfeiffer as Catwoman and Danny De Vito as the Penguin.

And there are a few interesting developments that have nothing to do with sequels: art-house releases galore, the return of 70mm cinematography in "Far and Away," a new version of "Of Mice and Men," and Disney's daring national reissue of a movie that's been available on tape and disc for years, "Pinocchio."

As usual, much jockeying for position has already taken place. The Tom Cruise movie, "Far and Away," which had been slated for June 5, has been moved up to this weekend, and it will face competition from the long-delayed "Alien3" and Disney's fantasy-comedy, "Encino Man."

Goldie Hawn is currently scheduled to have three movies opening within three months, while director Reginald Hudlin now has two movies arriving

within weeks of each other ("Boomerang," "Boyz n the City," "Class Act" is supposed to open one week after "Sister Act." That may change, and so may a number of other dates.

Here's the lineup as it looks now:

**TODAY:**  
"Far and Away." Although many movies are blown up from 35mm to 70mm ("Howards End" being a recent example), and the special effects in such films as "Close Encounters" and "Star Wars" are shot in 70mm, this is the first major-studio production since "Ryan's Daughter" (1970) to be filmed entirely in the wide-gauge format. Chosen as the closing-night movie at this month's Cannes Film Festival, the \$60 million Irish epic was directed by Ron Howard ("Backdraft") and stars Tom Cruise and his wife, Nicole Kidman.

"The Waterdance." A prize-winner at the Sundance Film Festival in January, this drama deals with a young man's struggle to adjust to

permanent paralysis. "Alien3." Sigourney Weaver, who made her film debut in the original "Alien" 13 years ago, is the coproducer of this sequel to 1986's "Aliens," for which she received her first Oscar nomination. This time she has to battle the Alien without technology. The script was written by David Giler, Walter Hill and Larry Ferguson. The first-time director is David Fincher.

"Night on Earth." A new deadpan comedy from Jim Jarmusch ("Stranger Than Paradise," "Mystery Train"), about five cab trips in five different cities. It starts with a wry segment set in Los Angeles, with Gena Rowlands as a passenger and Winona Ryder as the driver.

"Encino Man." Disney fantasy-comedy about a frozen caveman (Brandon Fraser) who is revived in a California suburb and learns to talk, just like Bill and Ted. Sean Astin and Pauly Shore play the high-school

## Artist paints Oregon Trail history for book, exhibit

KIMBERLY - Coming soon: the chance to travel the Oregon Trail without leaving your armchair, thanks to a local artist and some interested citizens.

Gary Stone, in conjunction with the Idaho Governor's Committee for the Oregon Trail Sesquicentennial, is hard at work on a series of 40 paintings, heavy on lesser-known spots along the celebrated route. The paintings will be featured in a book, with text provided by Stone's wife Bev. The actual artwork will travel the state and may eventually be placed in a museum.

Many of the paintings are a set of three 24-by-48-inch panels, like Stone's view of the Stricker Ranch, complete with military encampment and the Indians who speared salmon and sold it to immigrants on the trail. In the foreground of one painting, historic Indian Maggie Tybo is making gloves to sell and a Chinese man from the Snake River Mines is standing nearby.

Among the more inaccessible locations made alive by Stone's paintbrush is Mask Rock, situated on private ranch property

South of Oakley. Stone carefully re-created the huge monument, on which hundreds of names are carved.

explained, as have two Oakley cowboys, Jim Nelson and John Fairchild. "Those guys take you right there, with the wind whipping around you, telling their stories and taking you back in time," he said. "On this project, something is coming out of my paintbrush that I've never experienced before."

In pursuit of more Oregon Trail experiences, Stone will soon hit the road, in his four-wheel drive pickup, to paint on site near Pilgrim Springs, Rattlesnake Station, Hot Springs Station, Teapot Dome and Canyon Creek Station. He will also paint Old Fort Hall and an area near Montpelier made famous by Mountain Man Pegleg Smith.

Other sites included in the series are Three Island Crossing, City of Rocks and Gorge. One of Stone's special favorites is a spot named Seventh Sun, once considered sacred to the Indians, which is located near Kimberly.

Working with acrylics, Stone is turning out a painting every two weeks. He's hoping the book can be on the racks before Christmas and can be priced between \$25 and \$35, even though his paintings often

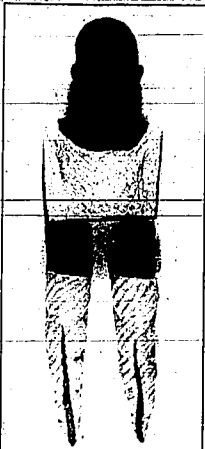

# Carson avoids sentimentality in last shows

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) - Thursday marked the end, as most Americans know it, of "The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson."

Don't panic. It wasn't the absolute final episode. But it was to be the last opportunity for the 66-year-old Carson to thump his double-erased pencil in the presence of celebrity guests.

Scheduled guests on Thursday night's show were Robin Williams and Bette Midler.

And true to form in the topsy-turvy final week of Carson's reign, there was no rhyme or reason to the issuance of invitations for the show's last celebrity supper.

"It was just a matter of scheduling and availability," said show spokesman Mark Kern.

Ticket availability was another matter. More than 100 fans snuggled

in sleeping bags and lounged in beach chairs to grab seats for Thursday's taping, the last to which the public was allowed.

"The truth is that Johnny is really a living legend. He's become an icon in the world of entertainment and show business and nobody has lasted longer in television than he has, and we're witnessing the passing of an era," said Todd Schwartz, who camped all night outside the NBC Burbank studios.

His patience was rewarded in the form of a single ticket for Thursday's show.

Friday night's broadcast will be a family and staff affair. The man who has tucked America in for 30 years will go solo before an invitation-only audience.

Even the green room, where guests assemble backstage before

going out to meet the man who has launched a thousand-plus careers, will be closed to all-but staff and friends.

Carson has said he wants the final hours of his three-decade career to be void of indulgent sentimentality. Even through executive producer Fred de Cordova, sidekick Ed McMahon and Doc Severson will all say goodbye Friday when the band strikes up "The Tonight Show's" signature theme for the last time.

"He wants very much to keep the last shows from being self-serving," de Cordova said in a recent interview. "It's an enormous record of contentment. It's been first class."

Carson's legacy as the king of late-night talk shows never faltered, even in the face of competition from

popular newcomers such as Arsenio Hall and Dennis Miller.

Unfazed by competition, the only umbrage Carson ever took with another late-night host occurred when Joan Rivers launched her ill-fated show on the fledgling Fox Broadcasting Co. The raunchy female comedian had been the permanent guest-host-for-Carson when she jumped ship without telling him.

Carson has refused to speak to her. This week, she accused him of refusing to allow "Tonight Show" clips featuring her to be shown on Rivers' syndicated afternoon talk show.

"It's like I'm Stalin," she said on her program. Carson representatives denied her claims. But she was not one of the many guests asked to appear during Carson's final tapings.

# 'Far and Away' lacks actors to carry an epic movie

Imagine "Ben Hur," "The Godfather" or "Lawrence of Arabia" with Tom Cruise in the lead roles instead of Charlton Heston, Marlon Brando and Peter O'Toole.

Preposterous, you say? No doubt. The aforementioned are actors who fill a screen, who command attention and keep us riveted to an epic from beginning to end. Epics are, by definition, large-in scale and demand large actors — actors of substance, of depth, technicians who can reach inside and get to the guts of a character and make it their own.

Here, then, is the problem with Ron Howard's lavish and lovingly filmed production, "Far and Away." He has cast two actors — Cruise and Nicole Kidman — who simply do not have the scope or ability to carry an epic. And he does not have a strong enough support team to fill in the gaps.

Cruise fashions an Irish accent for his role of Joseph Donnelly, sounding like a reject from a Lucky Charms commercial. He also flexes his big wonderful Cruise smile, but doesn't pump very much else into his portrayal. His cute looks aren't enough to overcome a superficial performance.

Kidman, an Australian actress

who charmed American audiences in the thriller "Dead Calm" is delightful as Joseph's love, Shannon Christie, but gives a small-screen portrayal.

Strangely, this husband-wife team shows little on-screen chemistry, so we can't even look to that.

Dolan ("Willow"), "Far and Away" is based on a story by Dolman and Howard. It's set in the late 19th century when the second wave of European immigrants hit the United States.

Joseph is a poor tenant farm boy, who uses his fists to settle all disputes real and imagined. Shannon is

the privileged daughter of one of the most powerful landlords in the country.

Her father, Daniel Christie (Robert Prosky), has Joseph's farm burned to the ground once his father dies and Joseph loses his home. He sets out to seek his revenge against Christie, is caught and held for

hanging and wind ups falling in love with the highly independent and neo-feminist Shannon.

Shannon yearns to leave the restrictive society of Protestant Ireland for the glorious adventures of the American West. She dreams of owning her own farm near a gurgling river in Oklahoma where, she's been told, the government is just giving away the land.

Over a misty morn, as Joseph faces Shannon's spurned love, Stephen (Thomas Gibson), with dueling pistols, she emerges from the fog in a buggy and hustles him off to a steamer about to leave for the United States.

They arrive in Boston, only to have Shannon's pilfered savings stolen. To support them, Joseph becomes a barroom boxer. The Christies, meanwhile, are turned out of their home by Catholic rebels and journey to Boston with Stephen to save Shannon.

Joseph's pride and his insane jealousy of Shannon cause him to lose his fight money and his boxing gig. The two are thrown out of the brothel where they rent a room and cast out to the snowy Boston streets.

Shannon is shot one night after she and Joseph seek refuge in what

they believe to be an empty mansion. But Joseph sees to it that her life is saved by taking her to her parents.

Slowly, they make their way across America — Joseph building the rails for the trains that carry the affluent Christies.

They all turn up for the Oklahoma land rush and race to their destinies.

Howard is wonderful with romance and "relationships," as he's demonstrated in such movies as "Cocoon" and "Parenthood." He also artfully films the beautiful vistas of the fresh coast and the expansive American Plains.

But as pretty as "Far and Away" is (filmed in the new Panavision 70 camera equipment), it does little to move us — emotionally or intellectually, and winds up being little more than a watered-down brew of "Wuthering Heights" and "Camaro."

And that's too bad, because Howard's was a noble effort. His prime failure, though, was in weak casting.

"Far and Away" is an Imagine Films Entertainment and Universal Pictures production and is rated PG-13 for some violence, blood, and adult situations.

# Husband-and-wife team proved themselves

Ever since he waited a rock number in his underwear, Tom Cruise has been the hottest box office star this side of Eddie Murphy. It may be hard to imagine, but Cruise began as Nathan Detroit in "Guys and Dolls."

It was his high school production, and that was the first time that he seriously thought about acting. "I knew I loved it when I was about 8, or maybe 7 years old," he tells me.

"My mother started a theater company in Canada and she used to run some creative drama workshops. And I did some things there that I really enjoyed. But it was when I was a senior in high school and did 'Guys and Dolls' that I knew I really loved it."

Cruise, who seemed like just another pretty face after "Risky Business" and "Top Gun," proved his mettle in "Rain Man" and in the upcoming "Far and Away," a sprawling saga in the mode of "The Quiet Man" in which he plays a scrappy Irish peasant.

Cruise's wife, Nicole Kidman, plays the upper-crusty woman in companies, to the United States in the rough-and-tumble late 1800s.

"In spite of all the fuss made over him, Cruise says, 'I don't know what to say — I'm flattered. It's not something I sit back and really analyze and really give a lot of attention to."

On Howard, who directed "Far and Away" had some doubts about working with a husband-and-wife team. "We proved him wrong," says Kidman. "We both love acting. And we didn't let anything conjugal come into it once we were working on the set. I think that's probably the thing that will destroy you if you let any of those conjugal problems come in and dominate instead of the work."

Everyone recalls with affection the lovely version of "As Time Goes By" sung and played by Dooley Wilson in "Casablanca." But did you know that Wilson, who is cast as Sam the piano player in this cinematic classic, couldn't actually play the piano? He did sing the song, but his piano playing was dubbed by a Warner Bros. staff musician named Elliott Carpenter.

I discovered this crucial bit of trivia by flipping through "The Casablanca Companion" (\$10.95, Taylor Publishing Co.), a new fact-packed tome by Dallas writer Jeff Siegel. Its official publication date is June 1, 1992 — in plenty of time for the 50-year celebration of the movie's original release on Nov. 23, 1942. (I found that out in the book, too.)

As part of the anniversary celebration, a newly struck print of "Casablanca" is being shown at select theaters throughout the year. Not only is this the perfect opportunity to reacquaint yourself with one of the most purely entertaining movies ever made, it's a great chance to see if you can tell that Dooley Wilson isn't really tickling the ivories.

Howard has developed into one of the most successful directors in town. He and partner, Brian Grazer, seem to have the Midas touch with films like "Night Shift," "Splash" and "Cocoon."

It was Grazer who first noticed Kidman — an unknown in America — when she co-starred in the Australian movie "Dead Calm."

"Brian called me and told me she was going to be a star," says Howard. "We tried to get her for 'Kindergarten Cop' at that time."

When he was casting "Far and Away," Howard was thinking either of Kidman or Emily Lloyd, the English actress who starred in "In Company." "I was shooting 'Backdraft,' and I didn't know that Nicole

and Tom Cruise were working together in 'Days of Thunder.'"

Howard sent the script of "Far and Away" to Cruise. Cruise followed it up with a phone call recommending Kidman for the female role.

Howard remembers: "I called Brian and I said, 'This is great. Tom Cruise seems interested in this film and there's an actress, Nicole Kidman, he's working with her now and he thinks she'd be terrific in this movie.' Brian paused for a second and said, 'Will you just read a paper for once or watch TV? They're going together.'"

"So I realized that Tom had been a

little sly about the whole thing. And I gave him a little grief for that the next time I talked to him."

Cruise later made it clear to Howard that he'd like to do the film either way. And he was doubly delighted when Kidman became his co-star.

Cruise's next film, "A Few Good Men," will be out in December and he's working on "The Firm" with Sydney Pollack. Kidman's next movie is a thriller called "Battersea," directed by Harold Becker. They have not cast her leading man yet. "They hired the woman first," she says gleefully.

## Accident injures 12 on Angels team bus

BALTIMORE — California Angels coach John Wathan was dinged off on the team bus during the movie "Delta Force 2" when he was jolted awake by the sound of branches whipping against the windows.

Within seconds, he was pressed to the floor after the bus came to rest against a couple of trees along the New Jersey Turnpike.

"It was quite a shock," he said. "It's hard to remember how long it was — whether it was 10, 12, 15 seconds. You don't realize how long it is while you're going through something like that."

Wathan and 11 other passengers were hurt

when the bus overturned at 1:47 a.m. Thursday near Dentford Township, N.J. According to equipment manager Leonard Garcia, the bus driver said he veered off the road to avoid hitting a tree that had fallen off a tractor-trailer.

Angels manager Buck Rodgers was the most seriously injured, suffering a broken right rib, right knee and right elbow. Wathan, the third base coach, will be the interim manager for the Angels' weekend series against the Baltimore Orioles.

California was idle Thursday. Wathan was sitting four seats behind Rodgers when the accident occurred, a few hours after California lost to the New York

Yankees 3-2 in 12 innings. Hitting instructor Rod Carew, who also was seated near the front, suffered whiplash and a knee injury. "The coaching staff took the brunt of it. That's why they put us up front," Carew said, forcing a smile.

All the injured passengers could afford to be somewhat relieved because the accident could have been much worse.

"The bus was in bad shape," Wathan said as he checked into a Baltimore hotel. "It was smashed up good. Although he had more injuries than anyone else, Buck was very, very lucky. We all are."

Wathan said the passengers were saved from serious injury by the trees that stopped

the bus from sustaining further damage. "What was holding it up was one or two trees," he said. "Otherwise, it would have careened down about 15 or 20 more feet and rolled over once or twice."

Another team bus was following, and within seconds of the accident members of the trailing bus were offering assistance.

"They started pounding on the windows to try to get us out of there as quickly as possible, because your first thought is an explosion," Wathan said. "They knocked open the windows. I was groggy, but I found out later I was helped out by (pitcher) Chuck Finley, Bert Blyleven and a few other players also helped."

## Boise rally sends Twin Falls into A-1 consolation bracket

## 'Soft' Cavs show Bulls how to shoot

CHICAGO — The Chicago Bulls missed their first 13 shots of the game Thursday night, and suddenly the Cleveland Cavaliers' luck changed.

Mark Price scored 21 of his 23 points in the first half when Cleveland took advantage of Chicago's miserable shooting, then went on to even the best-of-7 series 1-1 with a 107-81 victory.

The Cavaliers, criticized for being too soft in losing the opener 103-89, weren't demonstrably more physical in Game 2, but they were light years more potent offensively, especially in the first half when Cleveland led by as many as 27 points.

In the first two periods, the defending NBA champion Bulls made 12 of 43 shots, 27.9 percent, to the Cavaliers' 21 of 33, 63.6 percent.

Michael Jordan missed 12 of his first 14 shots and finished with 20 points on 7-of-22 shooting, his first time under 30 points in 12 playoff games against Cleveland. The Bulls were unable to put together any kind of threat, and got no closer than 22 points in the second half.

Brad Daugherty scored 28 points for the Cavaliers, who won for just the fifth time in 26 road playoff games in franchise history.

Scottie Pippen, a hero in Game 1 with 29 points, 12 rebounds and nine assists, scored 11 points on 4-of-14 shooting for the Bulls, who must travel to Richfield Coliseum for the next two games on Saturday and Monday.

Cleveland led 20-4 before Chicago made its first field goal, a jumper by Pippen with 3:46 left in the first

**Clashes may drag Turks in**

MOSCOW (AP) — Commonwealth troops went on alert Thursday after fighting erupted between Armenians and Azerbaijanis in an enclave bordering Turkey.

At least 20 people were reported killed and 100 wounded in the latest escalation of the 4-year-old war.

The outbreak of fighting in Nakhichevan follows Armenian victories this week in the bloodiest conflict in the ex-Soviet lands: the battle for control of Nagorno-Karabakh. The region within Azerbaijan is populated mainly by Armenians who want independence or alliance with Armenia.

Nakhichevan has a seven-mile border with Turkey, and fears are rising that Turkey will act on veiled threats to send troops to the region in support of Azerbaijan.

Turkey and Azerbaijan share a language, the Islamic faith and an ancient, deep-rooted animosity toward mainly Christian Armenia. Under Soviet rule, they could not form close links, but are now restoring relations rapidly.

Turkish diplomats have been expanding ties with the former Soviet Asian republics; where most of the people are Muslim and speak Turkish dialects.

Although the region is underdeveloped, it has rich reserves of oil, gas and other natural resources.

The Popular Front of Azerbaijan said 20 people were killed and about 100 wounded in enclave fighting Thursday morning and afternoon, according to the Nezasivimaya Gazeta news service.

On Wednesday night, Tehran Radio reported 470 Azerbaijanis were killed or wounded in clashes in the Caucasus Mountains. It did not say how many were dead.

The AP-Russia news agency said border troops of the Commonwealth of Independent States stationed in Nakhichevan were put on alert Thursday.

**NATO women seeking greater role in combat**

LONDON — Women officers in the armed forces of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization said Thursday that they are pressing for wider combat roles for females in the services.

At the close of a three-day meeting here of the Committee on Women in NATO Forces, the chairman, British Air Commodore Ruth Montague, said the performance of women in the Persian Gulf war had demonstrated their worth.

Further, by widening their role in combat, she said, better use could be made of all armed forces personnel. "Women performed well in the gulf," Montague said. "They performed well under pressure; they performed as part of a team; they got on with the job."

"They confirmed in their male colleagues' minds that they could do their jobs — and in the civilian mind that they could perform in all sorts of scenarios."

Montague's views were backed up by U.S. Army Brig. Gen. Patricia Hickerson, who said: "We were very pleased by the performance of our women soldiers — as battalion and company commanders and in other ranks — who did every job they were expected to do in their combat support roles."

**Afghan leader makes 1st trip**

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — President Sibghatullah Mojaddidi Thursday began a tour of northern Afghanistan, and rival guerrilla factions fighting for control of the new Islamic government announced a peace accord.

The president's trip, expected to last no more than three days, was intended to help Mojaddidi broaden his support since assuming office on April 28, his aides said.

Mojaddidi, who before the war taught Islamic philosophy at Kabul University, was to fly to the northern city of Mazar-e-Sharif and then travel by road to meet people in rural areas, his aides said.

Afghanistan has a formidable task in rebuilding from a 14-year civil war that left 1 million Afghans dead and 6 million refugees in neighboring Iran and Pakistan. But fighting among guerrilla groups that finally overthrew the communist government is standing in the way.

**Ramos leads Philippine count but agency raises question of cheating**

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Fidel Ramos widened his lead for the presidency Thursday, but the authorized agency counting votes from the May 11 election acknowledged that its figures may have been padded.

Anti-graft crusader Miriam Defensor Santiago has repeatedly accused the government of rigging the results to favor Ramos, President Corason Aquino's candidate.

The admission Thursday of possible vote tampering threatens to discredit the election and precipitate a political crisis that could undermine the nation's democracy. There are fears that if no candidate is proclaimed president, the military would step in to maintain public order.

With just over 52 percent of ballots counted Thursday, Media Citizens Quick Count showed Ramos leading with 2,963,539 votes,

or 24 percent, to 2,185,789 for businessman Eduardo "Danding" Cojuangco, an ally of the late President Ferdinand Marcos. Mrs. Santiago had 2,169,138 votes.

However, only 25 percent of the votes from metropolitan Manila, a Mrs. Santiago stronghold, had been counted. Mrs. Santiago claims the delay is part of a government strategy to condition the public to accept a Ramos victory.

That would diminish chances of public outcry if Congress certifies Ramos as the winner, Santiago supporters contend. Legislators begin meeting on Monday to review the election results.

On Thursday, Quick Count said its figures may have been tampered with, although it did not cite any party. "We suspect that there could be fraud," Quick Count's vice chairman Raul Lucin told reporters.

**BIJELINA, Bosnia-Herzegovina** - At an age when she should be enjoying the fruits of long life, grandmother Ruza Dzuric has lost the eight men in her family to the army and her home to the ravages of war.

Ordered out of her rural home by an officer of the Serb-dominated Yugoslav army, supposedly fighting on the side of Mrs. Dzuric and other Serbs, the woman and her two little grandsons found refuge here on the Bosnian-Serbian border.

"You have to leave by 10 a.m. tomorrow," Mrs. Dzuric, in her early 60s, recalled the officer telling her a week ago as her personal drama began in the village of Crno Blato.

"Now my five sons, husband and

two sons-in-law are fighting after being drafted by the federal army," she said tearfully.

Mrs. Dzuric's homeland, Yugoslavia, has degenerated into a multi-ethnic stampede to safety. An estimated 1.3 million people - Serbs, Croats and Muslims - have fled the brutal warfare that has killed at least 120,000 people. Half the refugees are from Bosnia.

Europe's biggest wave of refugees since World War II, they are straining the resources of the battered republics that once made up Yugoslavia, worrying European policymakers and tugging at the world's conscience.

An estimated 10,000 people were killed in fighting in Croatia, most of them last year. When a truce brought relative calm there, trouble erupted in Bosnia, a mixture of Slavic Muslims, Serbs and Croats.

The violence has shattered the life of Jovanka Tomic of Basanski Milosvo near Derвента, 13 miles-south of the Croatian border.

"Two months ago my husband was killed," she said. "The Croats caught him as a civilian near Derвента." Walking away from the Sremska

Mitrovia refugee center with her small son, she added: "Now we had to leave because of the fighting."

Stories of such horrors are at least as common, and as sorrowful, in the Croatian capital, Zagreb.

About 1,500 Muslim and Croat refugees arrived there Sunday, each with only a few possessions. Many wore the traditional "dimia," the wide trousers of Muslim women.

Fatima Causevic, a 33-year-old Muslim, said she fled with her five children, ages 7-12, when the army started shelling her village of Zivinice, near the eastern Bosnian town of Tuzla.

Up the road from Tuzla in Doboj, she said, all the Serbs have weapons. "They occupied government buildings, post offices, banks and cut off telephones," she said. "Serbs can walk around freely, but Muslims and Croats cannot."

Melhira Spajic, 38, of Gracanica near Doboj, said her own neighbors were on the tanks that chased her from her home.

The Red Cross did its best for the arrivals in Zagreb, providing each with a half-loaf of bread, a pint of milk and a can of ground meat.

## Activists threaten calm in Bangkok

**BANGKOK, Thailand (AP)** - Peace returned to the capital Thursday, but democracy activists warned that the calm could be quickly swept away if Prime Minister Suchinda Kraprayoon did not resign soon.

Thais bustling in everyday business again along streets where police and soldiers fought for four days with protesters angered by the military's long domination of the government.

But even as troops headed to barracks and demonstrators went home under a compromise mediated by Thailand's king, Suchinda's foes resumed calls for his ouster. They see the former army chief, who led last year's coup and is not an elected lawmaker, as a symbol of the military's control of the country.

"Dreams Die: Suchinda to Remain PM," headlined the newspaper Phoatjarn, echoing sentiments of many people interviewed following an agreement by Suchinda to implement a constitutional amendment barring non-elected prime ministers.

Demonstrators leaving an overnight rally at Ramkhamhaeng University promised to return to the streets if Suchinda remained in power much longer.

"The situation is very precarious," said Gotham Arya, vice chairman of the Campaign for Popular Democracy.

About 100 protesters showed up at the city's Democracy Monument about noon. They circled somberly, offering prayers for the dozens killed and hundreds wounded when the army tried to drive demonstrators from the streets.

By nightfall, the crowd had grown to 3,000. Protesters draped black cloth and Thai flags on the wing-shaped monument - which was at the center of much of the street clashes - and hundreds walked around it holding hands. Wreaths piled up at the base. Motorists passing by on Rajdamnern Avenue honked their horns in support.

Thousands of people gathered nearby in small knots, examining bullet holes in trees and buildings

and listening to stories of participants in the bloody demonstrations. Rings of jasmine flowers lay at the foot of one blood-stained tree scarred by dozens of bullet holes.

Suchinda has said 40 people died and 600 were wounded. But many Thais believe the toll was far higher. Some people reported seeing army trucks carting off loads of bodies.

"It's very sad that a criminal can get away without punishment," said Hansa, a lecturer at Chulalongkorn University who would give only her first name.

"We're not satisfied with the outcome, the compromise. We want Suchinda and his wife to leave Thailand," said Somsak Teerapong, one of the many businessmen who joined in the protests along with professionals, academics, students and other members of the growing middle class.

The faculties of Thailand's most prestigious universities - Chulalongkorn and Thammasat - issued a statement demanding Suchinda's resignation and punishment of those responsible for the bloodshed.

Thailand's oldest political party, the Democrats, also called for Suchinda to quit and urged a constitutional amendment that would strip the military-appointed Senate of most of its power.

Chalard Vorachit, a former member of parliament, vowed to continue his "fast until death" until Suchinda leaves office. Chalard stopped eating 44 days ago, and his fast won the sympathy of many Thais.

The stock market rebounded in euphoria over the political truce. But many business leaders appeared worried.

Korn Chaitakavanij, managing director of Jardine Fleming Thanakom Securities, predicted new trouble if Suchinda did not resign by next week.

Nikom Tengyal, president of the Paper and Printing Federation of Thailand, said, "If he doesn't step down, it will do more damage to Thailand's image and honor and the economy, and the country cannot accept that."

## Israeli planes, helicopters attack Hezbollah bases

**BAALBEK, Lebanon (AP)** - Israeli aircraft blasted four guerrilla bases of the Iranian-backed Hezbollah in Lebanon Thursday.

Police said 12 people were killed and 25 wounded on the third day of bloody clashes between Shiite-Muslim guerrillas and Israelis.

It was the heaviest toll claimed by Israel's air force in a single day this year. Police said a housewife, her teen-age son and a 9-year-old girl were among those killed.

The woman's husband, two other sons and two neighbors including a 5-year-old were wounded, and the rest of the casualties were guerrillas, the police said.

They said six were killed and 18 wounded in a morning raid on a Hezbollah training base near the village of Janta in eastern Lebanon's Bekaa Valley, police said. The village is 75 miles north of the Israeli border and three miles west of the Syrian frontier.

Five guerrillas were wounded in the attack itself, police said. Six were killed and others wounded about two hours later when five delayed-action bombs dropped by Israeli jets exploded while Hezbollah fighters searched the rubble, police said.

Three more guerrillas died in an afternoon raid on Dardghaya in a U.N.-policed area in southern Lebanon, police said. Israeli planes fired three rockets into a house used by Hezbollah in the village six miles north of the Israeli-occupied "security zone" in southern Lebanon.

At the same time, a pair of helicopter gunships fired missiles at two Hezbollah centers in the southern villages of Jibsheet and Kabrikha, just north of the U.N.-policed zone, police said. No casualties were reported at either village.

The military command in Israel confirmed it raided Hezbollah targets in southern Lebanon, but gave no details.

## Walesa leaves to sign treaty with Russia

**WARSAW, Poland (AP)** - President Lech Walesa left Thursday on his first official visit to Moscow as critics at home questioned his plans to sign a friendship treaty with Russia.

During the two-day visit at the invitation of Russian President Boris N. Yeltsin, the two heads of state also are to sign a treaty setting terms for the withdrawal of 30,000 to 40,000 former Soviet soldiers still in Poland.

Following more than a year of negotiations, the two sides initiated an agreement Friday that calls for the pullout to be completed by November.

The agreement also outlines a procedure for determining compensation for buildings used by the Soviet forces since World War II and resolves outstanding problems surrounding the transit of Soviet troops from former East Germany.

Several Polish politicians say the

friendship treaty is incomplete because it fails to condemn crimes committed against Poles by the former Soviet regime.

Walesa himself expressed misgivings about the treaty as he boarded the plane for Moscow.

"It settles the problems for today, but you can see the old epoch in the document," he said in reference to negotiations on the treaty that had begun long before the collapse of the Soviet Union.

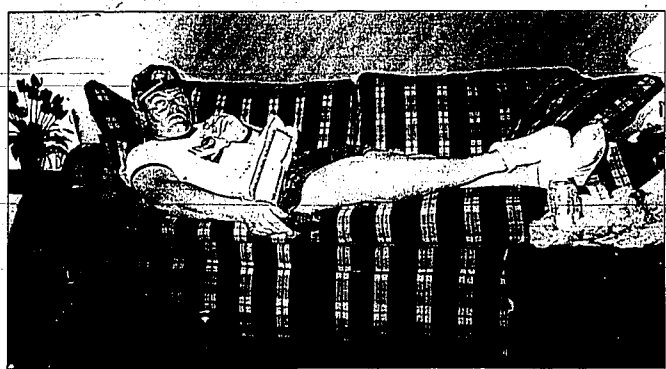
## Rail station bomb kills 1, injures 12

Maj. Vitaly Kurochkin of the railway police said the bomb apparently had been placed in a trash can near a ticket office outside the station.

"Kurochkin said rail traffic was briefly halted, but returned to normal later in the day.

# Guerrero rounds corner, drives to pole positions

**INDIANAPOLIS** — Five years ago, Roberto Guerrero was one of Indy-car racing's best young drivers. In May 1987, at age 29, he finished second in the Indianapolis 500 for the second time. He was leading late in the race until his car stalled during a pit stop.

Four months later, however, Guerrero's career was shattered. With the vast grandstands at Indianapolis Motor Speedway empty on a September day, he crashed during testing. With his wife, Katie, at his side in an Indianapolis hospital, Guerrero remained in a coma for 17 days.

Day and night, Katie Guerrero stared at the life-support monitors, aware that doctors had advised her there was a chance her husband never would completely recover.

Guerrero returned to racing the next year, but crashed a few more times and prompted garage whispers that he wasn't the same driver he was before the '87 accident. Last year, his career was hanging by a thread as he raced only five times

for drag racer Kenny Bernstein's King Motorsports Indy-car team.

Sunday, the always pleasant Guerrero was wearing a smile as bright as the Indiana sunshine. His record-ravaging average of 232.482 in a Quaker State Lola-Buick during Saturday's rain-shortened first day of Indy qualifying had held up.

On May 24, Guerrero will be the pole-sitter for the 76th Indy 500.

"I didn't close an eye last night (Saturday); I tossed and turned," Guerrero said of demolishing Emerson Fittipaldi's 2-year old qualifying record of 225.301. "Now, it's finally official and I'm over the moon."

Guerrero's closest challenger was Eddie Cheever, who qualified Sunday at 229.639 in a Ford-powered Lola. Next to Cheever on the front row is veteran Mario Andretti, who qualified at 229.503 Saturday, also in a Lola with Ford power.

The new Ford-Cosworth engine carried two other drivers, Arie Luyendyk (229.127) and Michael Andretti (228.169), to places on the second row. They flank Gary Bettenhausen (228.932) in a Lola-Buick.

**BROWN'S BABY BRINGS BOOST:** About 38 million viewers tuned in to see Murphy have her baby (a boy) on Monday's season-ending episode of "Murphy Brown," starring Candice Bergen. The CBS sitcom got a 23.0 rating from Nielsen (percentage of the nation's 92.1 million TV households) and a 35 share (percentage of sets in use), its second-highest ever. (The highest was Sept. 16, 1991, its premiere this season, when it had a 23.8/35). "Evening Shade," which followed "Murphy Brown" just for the night (it also

aired in its 8 p.m. normal time slot), had its highest rating ever.

**WELK REMEMBERED:** A brief salute to Lawrence Welk will be aired this weekend by PBS affiliates and other stations that carry the "Lawrence Welk Show." Welk died Sunday night at his home in Santa Monica, Calif., at age 89. The tribute will run at the start of the program, said executive producer Bob Allen. "Welk left a musical legacy like no one else," said Allen. "People will enjoy his music for years to come." The Welk program comprises edited segments from past shows, with introductions by members of his musical family. The program originally aired on ABC from 1955-71 and then went into syndication for another 12 years, with more stations (248) than it had on ABC. It has been airing on PBS affiliates for the past five years. "Welk has had his share of critics," said Allen, referring to what some felt was a schmaltzy musical style. "But, as Look magazine once said, 'nobody likes him but the public.'" Welk made 1,542 shows, the last in 1982.

**TURNER TURNS IT ON IN MOPSCOW:** CNN founder Ted Turner pulled the switch in Moscow Monday night on a trial two-hour nightly broadcast of CNN International with a simultaneous Russian translation. The two-hour newscast, 10 p.m. to midnight, will air for six months on Channel 6, a new independent station formed by former executives of Gostelradio, the old Soviet state-run network. Ostankino, the successor to Gostelradio, is a partner with CNN in the trial program, as is the Moscow city government. CNN has been seen in Moscow over the air and in six upscale hotels, 24 hours a day in English, since 1990.

**THREE CHEERS FOR CHEERS:** NBC won the prime-time ratings race last week for the second week in a row, with the season finale of its "Cheers" ranking No. 1. The network averaged a 12.1 rating (percentage of the nation's 92.1 million TV homes) and 14 share (percentage of sets in use). CBS averaged an 11.6 rating/20 share, ABC an 11.4/20. ABC's "Roseanne" was No. 2, followed by "Murphy Brown" (CBS), "Coach" (ABC), "Northern Exposure" (CBS), "Home Improvement" (ABC), part one of "Cruel Doubt" (NBC), "Night Court" (NBC), "Major Dad" (CBS) and "60 Minutes" (CBS). "The Best of Barbara Walters" (ABC) was No. 17. Dick Clark's "American Bandstand" special on ABC ranked 24th; Bob Hope (NBC) was No. 50, and Jon Lovitz (Fox) 68th, out of 79 entries. ABC won the evening-news race.

# Jack Nicholson: I got what I deserved

**Q: What's this about Jack Nicholson being beaten up by one of his disgruntled former lovers? — H.E.**

**A:** It actually happened. Nicholson sheepishly admits that actress Anjelica Huston was more than a little furious when she discovered that he had impregnated another woman — 28-year-old Rebecca Broussard — while their romance was presumably still in high gear. The incident occurred two years ago. Huston showed up at the Hollywood studio lot where Nicholson was working. She confronted the 54-year-old actor in his private office and, according to one account, "proceeded to pummel him." Nicholson, in recounting the incident, says he probably deserved everything he got.

**Q: We hear that Tom Cruise's marriage to Nicole Kidman is in real trouble. What's the problem? — C.P.**

**A:** Problem? What problem? The last time I checked, and that was fairly recently, Tom and Nicole were very much in the running for Hollywood's couple of the year award. In fact, Tom told me that this year has been "the happiest of my life." Why? He says he's been working on movies he really likes — "A Few Good Men" and "Far and Away" — and working with his actress wife. Wonder if the reviews Nicole will get in "Far and Away" will mar the bliss? Hollywood insiders tell me she steals the movie away from Cruise.

**RUNNING WILD:** Al Pacino was fined \$50 by the Orangetown, NY authorities for letting his dogs run loose in violation of the town's laws. The actor owns property in the town, which is north of New York City. One of his dogs bit another dog during one of these outings. Neither Pacino nor the dog was cited for that.

**Q: We hear that Sylvester Stallone is really very short. What do you say? — G.S.**

**A:** Stallone is always eager to talk about his body, and himself in general, for that matter. For some time, Sly has been dealing with reports that he wears lifts in his shoes to make himself look taller. He claims he doesn't have to. He puts his height at 5 feet 10 inches, and his

weight at 177 pounds. Stallone will even reveal his body fat percentage — 6.8 percent. In short, he's about average height but in great shape.

**SIGN OF THE TIMES:** In the past, the mere mention of a celebrity having lived in a house was enough to create a bidding war among prospective buyers. Not so these days. Prime example is the Lucille Ball Beverly Hills home — on posh Roxbury Drive across the street from James Stewart — which went on the market at an asking price of \$7.9 million shortly after the legendary actress's death. A respectable enough price in ordinary times for the large colonial, which includes a screening room, gym, pool with waterfall, and a guesthouse, but the property went begging for several years until finally selling for \$3.7 million. And, it took a real estate agent's sign on the front lawn to finally get the job done.

**Q: What's this about Christine Lahti, the lovely actress who costars in the movie "Leaving Normal," being embarrassed about her looks? Is she crazed? — C.W.**

**A:** Let me explain. Christine, a talented actress known for playing off-beat characters, prefers life on the East Coast near New York. She says she long resisted moving to L.A. because the town is so obsessed with

looking good. For reasons I don't quite understand, Lahti always felt she was too tall by L.A. standards and that her nose was too big. But Christine, 42, is a married woman with a 3-year-old son, Willie. Unfortunately for her, husband Thomas Schlamme, a film and television director, has to live in Los Angeles for professional reasons.

**Q: Isn't Burt Reynolds' movie career over once and for all? — R.A.**

**A:** Conventional wisdom in Hollywood a while back had it that Burt was washed up — as a movie star. But that was before his prime-time TV success, and subsequent awards, in "Evening Shade." Reynolds has revelled in his comeback of sorts. The show is winding up its second successful season. And, sure enough, he's returning to the big screen this spring in something called "Cap and the Kid." The director, ironically enough, is an ex-TV hand who never made it big in the movies — one Henry Winkler.

**Q: What's this about Michele Lee getting into a nasty battle with her ex-husband? — A.R.**

**A:** Michele is currently married — and happily so by all accounts — to TV producer Fred Rappaport. Before that, however, she was married to actor James Farentino. The two remain friends to this day, and have actually been trying to work in the same TV flicks together. Now it's about to happen. Considering their personal background, the vehicle chosen is rather curious. It's a domestic drama — about wife-beating. Lee will play a doughnut-shop worker; Farentino will play an out-of-work construction worker.

**Q: Isn't it true that Robert Redford looked so old in his last film that the movie was a big box-office flop and may spell the end of his career? — B.I.**

**A:** You're probably referring to "Havana," in which Redford played a hardened, middle-aged gambler in pre-Castro Cuba. You're right in that he dared to show his age — he's nearing 56 — by exposing all the wrinkles. And, yes, the movie bombed. But Redford remains Redford, a genuine Hollywood movie star. His next movie will be "Sneakers," about a nerdy computer hacker — NOT played by Redford.

# All eyes on Johnny during final week

The New England Journal of Medicine humorously dubbed it "Carsonogen monocular nycalopia," a vision problem caused by lying sideways in bed with one eye open to watch "The Tonight Show."

But all eyes will be on Johnny Carson this week. The king of late-night television is abdicating his throne after 30 years of common touches. Friday's finale, to be taped before an invitation-only audience in NBC's Studio 1, will find Carson, 66, Ed McMahon, 69, and Doc Severinsen, 64, sharing one last collection of memorable "Tonight Show" clips. By NBC's count — not counting reruns — it will be show No. 4,529 with Carson at the helm. In his eyes at least, it may well be a show like any other.

"He's not sentimental AT ALL. Not even a little bit sentimental," said "Tonight" co-producer Jim McCawley, who has been booking comedians on the show since 1972. "Making a spectacle out of your feelings is in poor taste — and he won't do that. It's cheap, and it's the easy way to go. And he's never done that his whole life."

No matter. In the intimate yet artificial medium of television, this intensely private public man has been approachable where it counts. Night after night, during a reign spanning seven U.S. presidents and his four marriages, Carson has tapped the elusive happy medium of the country at large. A boyish-faced Nebraskan, but no rube.

Quick-witted, not smart-mouthed. Mischievous, but aren't we all? Worth millions, although who would begrudge him? Ever-gracious with "civilian" guests, whether they were hog-callers or animal trainers. Even his expensive divorces paid off as long-running jokes in monologues. And when punch lines fell flat, Carson "died" inimitably for the further amusement of his masses. In short, he was television's all-time perfect fit.

"It will be like losing someone in your family," said Merv Griffin, whose talk show competed against Carson's "Tonight" from 1969 to 1972. "It's like part of your furniture.

Carson once faced the same challenge. NBC's "Tonight," originally based in New York, preceded him by eight years and two hosts. Steve Allen, a master of puns and sight gags, presided from 1954 to 1957. The emotional, often hot-tempered Jack Paar guided "Tonight" until March 30, 1962. Through the spring and summer of the year, Carson was an heir-in-waiting while "Tonight" made do with guest hosts ranging from Art Linkletter to Soupy Sales. Les Brown, author of "Les Brown's Encyclopedia of Television," was at the NBC affiliate station managers meeting in New York when the network introduced Carson as Paar's successor.

"We at first thought that Paar's successor would be something like him," Brown said. "And this guy was nothing like Paar. Paar had a kind of acerbic wit, and he was volatile. Carson seemed kind of slick and smooth and even-tempered, sort of an amiable Midwesterner. Paar was heat. But Carson was very cool, which I think is part of his appeal. For a great many people, Carson has been easy to relate to."

Three weeks before his Oct. 1,

1962, "Tonight" debut, Carson was in Dallas to accept the "Wonderful" award from the B'nai B'rith Society.

"I've been taking 'humble' lessons for the last few months, and they should come in handy," Carson said, referring to Paar.

Longtime Dallas entertainment writer and impressario Tony Zoppi, who interviewed Carson that day, said that he "personifies Middle America, and that's what endures. The very hip people from New York and L.A. don't endure. They can be funny, but they're too 'in.' A lot of people don't know what the hell they're talking about."

Carson kept "Tonight" in New York for 10 years before moving the show to "beautiful downtown Burbank," California, in May 1972. The shift in locales also signified a change in ambience. The more eclectic denizens of Broadway were replaced by a succession of sitcom stars. Severinsen's growingly glitzy outfits seemed to epitomize the new "Tonight."

"New York was full of lively people, but lively people did not high ratings make. Celebrities did," Laurence Leamer wrote in his 1989 book "King of the Night." "That same medium of television that had given Johnny fame beyond fame was creating a new kind of public personality. These were the people Johnny wanted seated next to him: the actress with the hot television show; the star with the big movie coming out; the singer the kids were screaming over. That many of these guests weren't really interesting hardly mattered as long as they basked in the glow of celebrity."

"Tonight" also continued to launch celebrities of its own. Roseanne Barr, Arnold, Jay Leno, David Letterman, Jerry Seinfeld — all were relative nobodies until Carson laughed at their jokes.

The show underwent another significant change in September 1980, when Carson cut back from 90 minutes to one hour. Robert Blake, one of the guests on the last 90-minute "Tonight," told Johnny: "With an hour, some of the folks that aren't as good as some of the other folks are going to fall off the end of the couch. It's competition time. It's dog-eat-dog, and I've gotta get some of these people off the couch."
