Bush says he understands Perot's appeal to voters

WASHINGTON — President Bush said Thursday that he understands Americans' fascination with Ross Perot as an outsider who promises to solve problems, but predicted voters eventually will demand, "How are you going to do it?"
Bush pointedly noted that Perot opposed U.S. military action against Iraq and suggested that he has ties with Congress even though he depicts himself as an outsider.
Bush promised to debate during the fall campaign but declared he plans to avoid the political tumult until after the Republican convention. Instead, he said repeatedly, Congress should enact his legislation program, including a Constitutional amendment to require a balanced federal budget.
In an election-year, prime-time news conference — one that ABC, NBC and CBS declined to carry — Bush refused to issue a frontal attack on Perot, who leads the president in polls in key states such as California, Texas and Florida.
Cable News Network carried the session, then followed up with an interview with Tom Luce, Perot's top aide.

State may sock docs to pay up Medicaid

BOISE — The state Medicaid program is facing a \$35 million shortfall next year, and physicians and other health-care providers may be asked to help make up the difference.
The Andrus administration is studying a proposal to tax medical services to fill an anticipated 12.5 percent gap between revenues and expenditures in the program.
Although no tax package has been put together yet, a task force will meet later this month to discuss the possibility of imposing a provider tax, said Gary Felt of the governor's Division of Financial Management.
The task force would include state officials and representatives of physicians, hospitals and nursing homes. It would consider what services could be taxed, who would collect the tax, and how it would be collected.
"The plan is to talk about it and see what the possibilities are," Felt said. "But unless the medical profession is willing to go along with this, probably nothing will happen. It'll take a summer's worth of talk."
However, the medical profession likely will balk at any provider tax, if early reaction is any indication.
"I'm kind of shaking my head at this one," said Dr. James Schuel, a Twin Falls family practitioner and president of the Idaho Medical Association. "The physicians are not going to be in favor of this."
The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare first floated the idea of a provider tax in February, at a meeting of the Legislature's joint budget committee.
At that time, Linda Caballero, deputy director of Health and Welfare, estimated that total revenue available to the Medicaid program, from both the state and the federal government, would be about \$250 million during the 1993 fiscal year, which begins July 1. She said \$285.9 million would be needed to provide mandated services to all eligible beneficiaries.
Caballero blamed the looming shortfall on state and federal service mandates, growing numbers of people — especially children — eligible for Medicaid, and higher prices for medical services.
The Medicaid program provides medical assistance to poor people who are 65 or older, blind, disabled, members of families with dependent children, or qualified pregnant women or children. It is paid for with both federal and state funds.
The state's Medicaid contribution will be \$70.8 million in fiscal 1993, up from \$58.2 million in the current fiscal year, said analyst Dick Burns of the Legislative Budget Office.
Because matching funds from Washington would fill 71.2 percent of the gap, Felt said, the state would have to raise only an extra \$10.3 million.

Andrus likely to recall lawmakers on gaming

BOISE — Gov. Cecil Andrus reiterated his opposition to casino gaming on Thursday and indicated he agreed with legislative leaders that a special session was needed this summer to assure casino games are clearly barred everywhere in Idaho.
"It would be better if it were handled in a timely fashion so the people could speak to it at this election," Andrus told reporters in his first news conference since returning from two weeks in Europe that included a state visit to the Basque Country.
"I probably will consent to their request," the governor said.
If he does, it would be the first special session since the spring of 1983 when the state was coping with a \$70 million deficit.
Legislative leaders from both parties unanimously asked for the special session on Wednesday amid rising concern that a recent district court interpretation of the 1983 state Lottery constitutional amendment cleared the way for casino gambling on the state's Indian reservations.
That court ruling, which is being appealed, held that the charitable gambling provision of the lottery amendment was self-enacting and without any restrictive legislation allowed all types of gaming by nonprofit organizations.
And under the federal Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, Indian tribes can operate any gambling enterprise that is legal under any circumstances elsewhere in the state.
While Idaho tribes have run bingo operations under the combined provisions of the lottery amendment and the federal law, it was not until this week that one said it intended to add casino games to its gambling enterprise. The Shoshone-Bannock Tribes of eastern Idaho notified Andrus that they want to begin federally mandated negotiations on a state regulatory compact for casino gaming in anticipation of augmenting their bingo program.

U.S. would sign treaty if minor changes made

RIO DE JANEIRO — The United States, under attack for its refusal to sign an Earth Summit treaty to protect plant and animal diversity, would sign the agreement if minor changes were made, the chief U.S. delegate said Thursday.
"We have prepared specific language that would satisfy our concerns," William K. Reilly, the head of the U.S. delegation, told a group of U.S. reporters.
He declined to release the language, saying "I don't think it's reasonable to expect that very much will happen with the treaty."
"I need to knock down any impression that we expect a reopening of the biodiversity treaty," said Reilly.
"He said he did not expect the United States to sign the treaty before the end of the Earth Summit next week. But he left open the possibility that the United States might sign on at some point in the future."
"Should other countries decide to possibly reopen the treaty for amendment, then our language would be reviewed," Reilly said.
Reilly also announced that the U.S.-Forest Service would no longer practice clear-cutting as a standard policy in U.S. national forests.
The biodiversity treaty that was to be opened for signing Friday is a centerpiece of the summit.
In pre-summit negotiations, the United States rejected limiting carbon dioxide emissions to 1990 levels by 2000, as sought by European and other countries. The treaty now calls for reducing these emissions — a primary cause of global warming — but sets no target.
The 15,000 delegates at the summit began working to complete other key agreements on technology transfer, ocean pollution, forest protection, population control and environmentally safe development.
On the sidelines of the summit, organizers of a worldwide meeting of environmental groups called the Global Forum warned that their event was broke and could collapse.
Warren Lindner, the chief organizer, said the forum was \$2.3 million short of the \$12 million needed for the event.
Former U.S. Rep. Bella Abzug, D-N.Y., who chairs a women's environmental group, immediately pledged \$5,000. She then passed her large purple-and-green hat through the audience. It came back stuffed with Brazilian cruzeiros.
Washington has opposed the biodiversity treaty, which Reilly offered to modify, on the grounds that the United States would contribute much of the money to help prevent extinction while decisions on how to spend it would be left to developing nations, which have the greatest variety of species.
Reilly, head of the Environmental Protection Agency, also says the treaty threatens the growing U.S. biotechnology industry.

Fires slow greenhouse effect

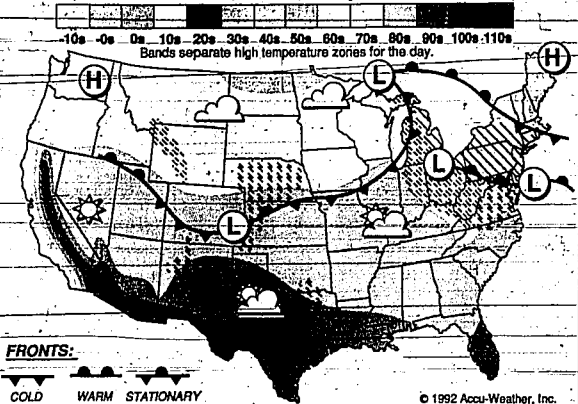

WASHINGTON — A global shade caused by smoke from tropical forests and grasslands is delaying the predicted greenhouse warming of the Earth, perhaps by a few decades, researchers say.
Emissions from the burning of up to five billion tons of plant matter annually act like a cooling parasol for the planet, Joyce E. Penner of Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in California said Thursday.
But she warned that the effect will not save the Earth from the eventual temperature rises predicted as the result of industrial society dumping too much carbon dioxide into the atmosphere.
"This study is not really comforting," Penner said. "The cooling effect caused by the smoke, she said, is just masking the greenhouse effect. If you stopped the burning you would immediately start to feel the effect of global warming."

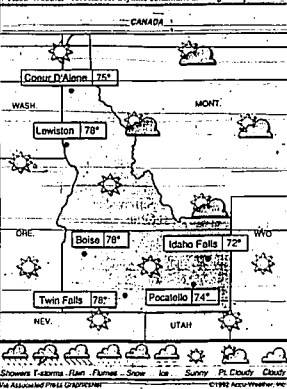

Heavy rains drench Atlantic seaboard states

Rain fell on the mid- and south-Atlantic states Thursday, causing fears of flooding in parts of Virginia.

Much of the rest of the nation was sunny, although strong winds kept temperatures cool in parts of the northern Plains.

The weather was particularly warm in the Southwest, Southeast and Florida, where overnight lows were often in the 70s, and in some instances the 80s.

A warm front curving through Tennessee and South Carolina brought heavy thunderstorms to those areas, as well as North Carolina and Virginia.

Showers were also scattered across the Ohio Valley and central and eastern Gulf coast states.

Thunderstorms were particularly strong over the Carolinas and Virginia, with a chance of flooding forecast for Virginia's foothills and Shenandoah Valley by Friday morning. Flooding was also possible in North Carolina's northern mountains, the National Weather Service said.

Nearly 1.5 inch of rain fell on Roanoke, Va., during a six-hour period ending at 2 p.m. EDT Thursday. Nearly an inch fell at Asheville, N.C., during the same period, while 37 inches were recorded at Wilmington, N.C., and 40 inch fell at Greer, S.C.

Dry weather prevailed across the rest of the nation, with sunny skies over much of New England and the area west of the Rocky Mountains.

But strong west to northwest winds kept afternoon temperatures in the 50s and 60s in much of Montana, Minnesota and northern Iowa.

Elsewhere, temperatures were generally seasonally warm, reaching the 80s by early afternoon across Texas, Georgia and Florida.

House approves nuclear test ban in defense bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House on Thursday approved its first post-Cold War ban on U.S. testing of nuclear weapons, a step opposed by the Bush administration, as part of a proposed \$274 billion military budget.

By a 237-167 vote, the House adopted a one-year moratorium on nuclear testing provided that the former Soviet republics continue their current unilateral ban.

Lawmakers also approved, 356-54, a measure providing \$350 million to help stop the proliferation of nuclear weapons, including \$250 million to help the former Soviet republics dismantle their nuclear arsenals.

The proposed test ban was one of several reasons the administration opposes the overall budget package, which is \$7 billion less than President Bush has proposed.

Defense Secretary Dick Cheney said he would recommend a veto based on the total amount, cuts in the Strategic Defense Initiative and a series of burden-sharing amendments passed Wednesday.

Hospital says American defector schizophrenic, but free to leave

TROITSKOYE, Russia (AP) — An elderly American committed to a Russian psychiatric hospital more than two decades ago is a paranoid schizophrenic, the U.S. State Department said Thursday. The hospital director said Thursday.

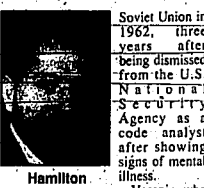
But the man, identified by his family as American defector Victor Norris Hamilton, is free to leave if his relatives or the U.S. government claims him, said Vladimir S. Voronin, director of Special Psychiatric Hospital No. 5.

In a bedside interview with The Associated Press on Thursday, a fit-looking Hamilton gave an improbable account of his life on Ward 21 of the red-brick hospital, about 30 miles southwest of Moscow.

Hamilton, who currently calls himself Fouzi-Hindaly, said he communicates round-the-clock with a Pentagon admiral via television. He claimed he was both a prisoner and director-general of intelligence in the hospital, which he said was actually a brothel.

"I will get out of here only as a corpse," he said, speaking in the room he shares with nine other men on a locked ward.

Hamilton was transferred to the hospital in 1971 from a Kremlin hospital for high-ranking officials. His family says he defected to the

Soviet Union in 1962, three years after being dismissed from the U.S. National Security Agency as a code analyst after showing signs of mental illness.

Voronin, who was then a staff psychiatrist, said Hamilton had no documents other than his medical history. He said the hospital had no idea Hamilton was an American — even though he spoke fluent English, and little Russian.

Hamilton's family thought he was dead, until they heard otherwise this week from the Ark-Project, a Connecticut-based group that searches for U.S. prisoners-of-war and soldiers missing in action.

Hamilton said little about his past on Thursday, and doctors say he has never told them about defection. Hospital records indicate he is 71; his family says he is 75.

Hamilton told the AP he was born in Idaho when it was part of Palestine. He went to school in Jerusalem and studied social sciences at the American University in Beirut. The Atlanta Journal-Constitution has given a similar account of his birth and education.

During the 15-minute interview, Hamilton was calm and spoke in a soft, courteous voice.

"I am in constant contact with the Pentagon, 24 hours," he said. Communication is done through TV, he said, but refused to elaborate.

"I am director-general of intelligence (at the hospital) and I report the events from hour to hour," he said.

Hamilton insisted his family, including his wife, Lillie, and their daughters, are dead. He acknowledged he once lived in Union City, Ga., where his wife still lives.

Hamilton and his doctors said he spends most of his time sitting and writing in diaries, a couple of dozen of which are stacked on his bedside table. "A huge, dog-eared Oxford English Dictionary rests on his bed,"

But Hamilton, wearing a blue terrycloth bathrobe and a checkered cap over a shock of steel gray hair, was in a talkative mood on Thursday.

Voronin said Hamilton used to take long walks on the hospital's tree-covered grounds, but now he spends most of his time indoors.

Perot agrees to testify before Congress on MIAs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ross Perot, who has long made accounting for Americans missing in action in Southeast Asia a personal cause, will testify on the subject at a Senate hearing later this month.

Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass.,

chairman of the Senate Select Committee on POW/MIA Affairs, said Friday. The announced independent presidential candidate will brief Congress on his continuing efforts on behalf of prisoners-of-war and those missing in action.

Perot has claimed that the Reagan administration asked him to spearhead an investigation into American servicemen missing in Southeast Asia but then ignored his efforts.

The hearings will begin on June 24. Perot will testify on June 30.

aid, and a talk-show session with Clinton.

Luce said Perot has been stressing the deficit problem in recent speeches and noted Bush's repeated call for a Constitutional Amendment to balance the budget. "I think what's happening is this Perot phenomenon is going to drive the agenda of this country."

"Clinton went after Bush and Perot. He said it was 'somewhere between amusing and amazing' that Bush would push a balanced budget amendment since he had presided over the quadrupling of the national debt. And he chided Perot for saying the nation 'could cut budgets in government spending without breaking a sweat.'"

Bush said he was swearing off politics until August, and struck a presidential pose as he fielded questions in the ornate East Room

Kelsey Edmo's statement to Andrus sparked a debate over "all types of gaming."

Andrus said he wanted to talk with tribal leaders before deciding about a special session, but he said that announcement would come by Tuesday at the latest. Legislative leaders said they believed the issue could be resolved in five days.

To gain a spot on the November ballot, the proposed constitutional amendment must be approved by two-thirds of both the House and Senate before the middle of August.

The governor's office was working with Attorney General Larry Echolfaw and legislators on specifics of both a statute to strictly define charitable organizations and a constitutional amendment to clarify that in passing the initiative amendment four years ago there was never any intention of opening the door to casino gaming.

In view of the positions taken so far by the Sho-Bans and the Coeur d'Alene Tribe in the Panhandle, however, Andrus acknowledged that any action the state takes will be challenged in court.

Andrus discounted suggestions: "A special session would open the door to attack on the policy of allowing the lottery along with parimutuel horse, mule and dog racing and bingo."

reimbursements to providers, Caballero said.

About half the states already have some kind of provider tax. Fell said as Medicaid costs continue to rise, "probably just about every state" will have to at least look at enacting them.

According to Health and Welfare, states have enacted several kinds of provider taxes. Physicians and hospitals are taxed on their gross income; nursing homes are taxed per bed; and pharmacies are taxed per prescription.

All of those kinds of taxes, as well as others, would be on the table during the task force meetings this summer, Fell indicated.

But Scheel said providers probably would pass on any new taxes to consumers in the form of higher fees and prices. He added

that they would hamper efforts to persuade physicians to move into Idaho, one of the most medically underserved states in the nation.

"This does not seem to be a fair tax," Scheel said. "Instead of physicians having to pay for Medicaid for the whole state, maybe the whole state should pay for it."

And the chairman of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, which might consider any proposed provider tax, took a dim view of the idea.

"I'm not too enthused about it," said Rep. Steve Antone, R-Rupert. "I think medical costs are too high already."

But Antone said he would want to study any tax proposal carefully and look at the revenue situation in January, when the Legislature reconvenes, before definitely ruling a provider tax in or out.

Senate OKs lifting ban on fetal research

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted 85-12 on Thursday to lift a government ban on the use of aborted fetuses in disease research, setting the stage for an expected veto by President Bush.

The measure passed the House last week on a 260-148 vote, which, unlike the Senate tally, was short of the two-thirds necessary to override the president.

Its supporters said fetal tissue holds the promise of new treatments for Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease, diabetes and spinal cord injuries.

The Bush administration contends lifting the ban would encourage more people to have abortions. It has proposed permitting research with tissue from miscarriages and tubal pregnancies, but not induced abortions, and establishing a program to collect and preserve that tissue.

Sen. Malcolm Wallop, R-Wyo., first voted against the measure. But after the voting was closed and the results announced, Wallop got unanimous consent from his colleagues to switch his vote to yes.

Voting against the bill were Sens. Wendell Ford — D-Ky.; Christopher Bond, R-Mo.; Orrin Hatch, R-Utah; Larry Pressler, R-S.D.; Dan Coats, R-Ind.; Robert Smith, R-N.H.; Steven Symms, R-Idaho; Phil Gramm, R-Texas; Conrad Burns, R-Mont.; Don Nickles, R-Okla.; and Alfonse D'Amato, R-N.Y.

Not voting were Sens. Jesse Helms, R-N.C.; Jeff N.M., and David Durenberger, R-Minn.

The provision removing the administration's ban on public supported research with fetal tissue is a part of a broader bill authorizing \$3.4 billion next year for the National Institutes of Health, the principal medical research agency of the federal government.

Although abortion opponents have led the campaign to prevent use of aborted fetuses in research, some leading anti-abortion senators voted in favor of the bill.

"Everybody in this chamber knows I'm a strong opponent of abortion," said Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C.

But taking the other side, Sen. Bob Smith, R-N.H., said: "There is a moral line we cannot cross, even in medical research."

Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, said tissue from miscarriages and ectopic pregnancies, and Bush's proposal to establish a tissue bank, offer a practical alternative.

Prisoners need more AIDS tests

ATLANTA (AP) — Prison is one of the best places to fight AIDS because it has a high-risk population that is a captive audience for AIDS education, federal health authorities said Thursday.

But they said too few inmates are being targeted.

Only about 30,000 prisoners in 42 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico were tested for AIDS last year under publicly funded programs, the Centers for Disease Control said. There are about 4.3 million people in U.S. prisons.

Four percent of those tested had HIV, the AIDS virus.

"The correctional system provides excellent opportunities to reach persons at risk, or if they're already infected, prevent the spread to others," said Gary West, assistant deputy director of the CDC's HIV unit.

"There are some good efforts out there, but it's obvious there's a lot more that needs to be done."

"Most of those tested in prisons volunteered for the testing, although some prisons make it mandatory," West said.

The CDC report was the second on AIDS released this week. On Wednesday, researchers at Harvard University estimated that at least 13 million people around the world are infected with the virus, and that as many as 120 million could be infected by 2000.

Elvis fans love him tender, young

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Americans love him tender.

They overwhelmingly chose the young Elvis Presley, from his "Hound Dog" days, for a new postage stamp, rejecting his lounge lizard look.

But it was no heartbreak hotel for the 27-year-old who liked Elvis in his high-collared jewelined jumpsuit and cape. The King finally was getting a stamp.

"I keep pinching myself. It's hard to believe it's really happening," said Pat Geiger, who began fighting for a Presley stamp in 1983. Geiger worked for the older Elvis.

The portrait on the 29-cent, first class stamp was picked through a nationwide vote, the first ever to select Postal Service artwork. More than a million Elvis fans chose between the portraits. The winner was announced Thursday during live TV broadcasts on all three morning talk shows.

The vote, conducted by mail April 6-24, ended with the younger Elvis collecting 851,200 votes, three times as many as the mature Presley.

"When you think of Elvis, you don't think of him as some older person. You think of him as a young man," said record producer Sam Phillips, who discovered Presley.

The results were announced at Graceland, Presley's mansion where he died in 1977 at age 42. The estate draws more than 650,000 tourists a year. More than 200 fans gathered for the announcement under a large, white tent.

"Of all the awards and honors he has received... this would probably be the most special for him," said Priscilla Presley, his former wife.

The stamp will come out Jan. 8, the 58th anniversary of Presley's birth. It will be part of a "Legends of American Music" series that will include seven other music figures yet to be selected. The first Elvis stamps will be single sheets of 40 stamps each. Elvis fans have lobbied for years for a postage stamp bearing his picture. Critics objected, largely because of his much publicized abuse of prescription drugs.

"And a lot of people just don't like him. Elvis has been accused of all the ills of the world," said Geiger, a fan from North Springfield, Vt. "He had the audacity to put on weight. He had the audacity to die."

The Elvis portraits were commissioned by the Postal Service, which

Lucille Ball leads female candidates for postage stamp

NEW YORK (AP) — Move over young Elvis. Lucille Ball led a recent survey about women entertainers who deserve a postage stamp.

Although about two dozen male entertainers have been featured on U.S. stamps, only one female star — comedian Fanny Brice — has had a stamp of her own.

Asked which woman entertainer most deserved the honor, 45 percent of 1,000 men and women

plans to spend \$1 million producing and promoting the stamp. The stamp is expected to be a money-maker since many will be held by collectors and fans.

"Our very rough estimate is we will probably have about a \$20 million profit on this stamp," said Edward Horgan Jr., associate postmaster general.

The winning portrait, showing a fresh-faced Presley singing into a '50s-era microphone, was drawn by Mark Shutzman, an artist from Mountain Lake, Md. He said he worked on it for about a week.

"Everybody else was more confident it would win than I was," Stutzman said.

John C. Berkey, an artist in suburban Minneapolis, drew the jeweled Elvis. He said he expected to lose, but objects to descriptions of his version as the "old" or "fat" Elvis.

"As a matter of fact, he weighed 160 pounds and he was 37 years old" at the time, Berkey said.

"That's not far from that's not old as far as I'm concerned," said Ginger Bain, a fan from Dallas, said she voted for the younger Elvis, though she liked him during his flashier later years, too.

"He just seemed happier, more carefree and the older one was just too intense," she said.

Mitchell pans Bush budget plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell said Thursday that President Bush's support for a balanced-budget constitutional amendment is "another example of him saying one thing and doing another."

Mitchell, a leading Democratic critic of Bush, said, "By submitting budgets with record deficits and then somehow suggesting it's all someone else's fault, that's a familiar pattern in this administration."

The Maine senator invited reporters to his Capitol office hours before Bush planned to make a pitch for the proposed amendment at a nationally broadcast news conference. Crossfire over the plan has intensified lately, with the House planning a vote on the measure next week and the Senate sometime later.

Because of sky-high budget shortfalls, the recession and political embarrassments such as the House bank scandal, lawmakers had seemed likely to send the amendment to the states for ratification.

But Democratic leaders in the House and Senate have been working hard to kill the plan and its fate now seems uncertain. Before debate on the amendment begins, House leaders now plan to let legislators vote on a less restrictive bill requiring a balanced budget in hopes of stealing votes from the amendment itself.

The leading versions of the amendment would allow the government to run deficits only with three-fifths majorities of both chambers of Congress.

Ancient Greek works sent to US in trip abroad

WASHINGTON (AP) — Masterpieces of ancient Greek sculpture never before sent abroad will be shown in this country, beginning Nov. 22, at the National Gallery of Art announced Thursday.

The exhibit, called "The Greek Miracle," celebrates the 2,500th anniversary of the beginnings of democracy — usually dated from the reforms of the Greek statesman Cleisthenes. It will include 22 sculptures from Greece, most of which have never left Greek soil. Another 11 will be lent by other museums, including two from the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York. The exhibit will also be seen at the Metropolitan next year.

"These sculptures are among the finest pieces that have survived from Greece's golden age," said Greece Prime Minister Constantine Mitsotakis in a videotaped message announcing the exhibit.

"It is fitting that they make their first journey from their homeland to visit the United States, a country founded on the model of Greek democracy."

Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist, in another message, noted that the inscription "Equal Justice Under Law" over the classical Greek facade of the U.S. Supreme Court Building derived from Cleisthenes' reforms.

A star of the show will be the statue of a boy, done about 480 B.C. and attributed to the sculptor Critius. It is the first work that broke with the ancient tradition of showing a human figure only from the front; the boy's head is slightly turned and his figure is portrayed in fully three-dimensional form.

Retired officers join forces to assist hunt for missing children

WASHINGTON (AP) — A team of retired law enforcement officers will assist local police departments in tracking down missing children, administration officials and members of Congress said Thursday.

Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady and Sens. Alfonse D'Amato, R-N.Y., and Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., announced the formation of Project ALERT at a news conference.

The acronym stands for America's Law Enforcement Retiree Team.

Officials said the initial team of 10 retired officers would be from the ranks of the FBI, Secret Services, Customs, the New York and Chicago police departments and other agencies.

Officials said the initial team of 10 retired officers would be from the ranks of the FBI, Secret Services, Customs, the New York and Chicago police departments and other agencies.

"Many police departments simply do not have the resources needed to solve the many missing children cases they must face," said D'Amato.

He said the retired officers were volunteering their services without pay and would enter cases only at the request of local departments. They will serve as consultants and not be armed or have authority to make arrests.

D'Amato said he and DeConcini, both members of the Appropriations Committee, are seeking \$171,000 in federal funds to help pay for start-up costs and operating expenses.

for Missing and Exploited Children, a private organization through which the services of the retiree team would be offered.

"In cities and small towns nationwide, local agencies often have no where to turn for expert assistance into these complex and far-reaching crimes," Brady said.

Officials said the project was developed after John Libonati, a Secret Service agent working as a Congressional Fellow in D'Amato's office, worked on the case of a Buffalo woman who wrote to the senator that three of her four children had been abducted the day after Christmas 1990.

The children were located in Tennessee in January, their mother, Barbara Hartless, had last seen them when they left her apartment for a visit with her estranged husband.

Ms. Hartless, appearing at the news conference, appealed to parents to "put yourself in my position and imagine what it is like to not know where your children are, even for one day or one night."

Spy satellite activity now a bit less secret

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new government agency has taken control of spy satellite operations, deciding what to photograph, how to do it and who gets to see the results.

The new agency was formed in part to answer sharp criticism that satellite operations in the Persian Gulf war provided duplicative and confusing results, officials said Thursday.

It was also designed to respond to congressional demands for greater efficiency in an era of shrinking budgets.

The government broke with traditional secrecy and publicly — albeit reluctantly — acknowledged the existence of the Central Imagery Office. But officials couldn't quite bring themselves to talk about it.

After months of deliberations, Defense Secretary Dick Cheney signed a four-page directive May 6 establishing the Central Imagery Office. It wasn't classified, but it wasn't made public either.

Pentagon spokesmen said Thursday they hadn't heard about the document, knew only vaguely that a new agency was being established and believed the CIA might know more about it.

The CIA, on the other hand, referred questions to the Pentagon.

where the new agency is housed. While confirming the existence of the office, CIA spokesman Mark Mansfield said it would be "preliminary to discuss specifics and details."

The scope and tasks of the Central Imagery Office were painstakingly negotiated by Cheney and CIA Director Robert Gates, in a compromise designed to sidestep the traditional rivalries between their services, officials said.

The imagery office will take some responsibilities away from the Central Intelligence Agency, but the director of the new office will be recommended by the director of the CIA, according to Cheney's directive.

The new agency's first director is intelligence veteran William Lackman, Mansfield said.

Cheney's directive made it clear that the new office is supposed to provide information for all intelligence agencies.

But outside experts said they were concerned that because the new agency was being run by the Defense Department, it would focus too much on military and battlefield intelligence to the detriment of other information — for instance, missile proliferation in Third World countries such as Iraq.

Perot volunteers give way to professionals

DALLAS (AP) — The first challenge for the new professionals in Ross Perot's budding presidential campaign is not to goof up what the amateurs have done.

Volunteers said they look forward to sharper direction with Republican Ed Rollins and Democrat Hamilton Jordan at the helm. Some worry about losing the grass-roots flavor. But they say the change is a sure sign the not-yet-campaign will soon become one.

"It's like going public after being a mom-and-pop operation," said volunteer Michael McGinty.

The newcomers came aboard paying tribute to the achievements of the volunteers. "The worst mistake any of us can do is, tinker with what's here," said Jordan, who masterminded Jimmy Carter's 1976 White House race.

Rollins was Ronald Reagan's 1984 campaign manager.

Perot's undeclared candidacy has been powered by a volunteer drive to get him on the ballot in all 50 states and enthusiasm among dissatisfied voters, hunting for an alternative to the major party contenders.

Erom nowhere in late February,

Perot's popularity has topped that of President Bush and Democrat Bill Clinton in Texas, California and Ohio polls.

And yet the campaign has had a folksy tone, with volunteers being tapped to assist the paid issues researchers and sometimes even sitting in on strategy sessions.

"Most of the people who are involved in this are people who have just come out of the woodwork and maybe it will bother them that the big boys are getting into it," said Joan Alspaw, an Annapolis, Md., volunteer. "But then again, they aren't all bad ... it needs organization for it to work."

NASA designs shields to fend off space junk

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA engineers have been forced to redesign shields for the space station because there's so much junk littering space, officials said Thursday.

New, stronger shields are expected to provide two to three times more protection against orbiting debris, said Eric Christiansen, manager of a hypervelocity laboratory at Johnson Space Center in Houston.

"It's a tremendous improvement," Christiansen said.

NASA recently approved the new shield designs, which incorporate stronger alloys, more cushion and, in some cases, extra material. The added protection would add millions of dollars to the cost of the space station, said NASA's William Rancey.

The armor is intended to cover fuel tanks, navigation equipment and some other critical components of space station Freedom, a \$30 billion-plus laboratory to be built in orbit starting in late 1995.

Although station managers always planned for shielding, it wasn't until February that they adopted new calculations that show there are thousands more potentially lethal pieces of junk up there than NASA officials realized.

Calculating the danger of space debris is difficult and, at times, uncertain.

"Occasionally, people still call it black magic and it's really not," said Jennifer Robinson, a NASA engineer who is working on shielding for the station's living quarters. "It's not some imaginary problem."

The shielding for the living quarters bears the brunt of criticism in a General Accounting Office report to be released any day, according to those who have seen drafts.

The report was requested last year by Sen. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., chairwoman of the Subcommittee on Government Activities and Transportation.

Clinton addresses older crowd, asks for support

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — Democrat Bill Clinton courted a powerful lobby of retired Americans on Thursday, urging older voters to help push for better education and health care for the nation's youngsters.

At a national convention of the 33 million-strong American Association of Retired Persons, Clinton delivered a version of his stump speech tailored for the elderly, pledging to protect Social Security and work to bring down health care costs.

But the Arkansas governor also focused on America's children, citing gloomy statistics on how crime, poverty and a lack of educational opportunities are hurting young people. He called for full funding of the Head Start program for pre-schoolers and other investments for the next generation.

"If we do not fully fund Head Start today, we may not be able to fully fund Social Security 20 years from now," Clinton said.

Clinton didn't mention his presidential rivals in his speech, but his campaign issued a fact sheet that compared his record on issues of concern to the elderly with President Bush's. The sheet also included a section for Ross Perot's positions, which was left blank.

Clinton planned to tape CNN's "Larry King Live" after Bush's prime-time news conference and spend the weekend at home in Little Rock.

Speaking at a conference whose theme was "Generations Growing Together," Clinton urged AARP members to join his fight "not only to keep older Americans out of poverty, but to lift our children up as well."

He said older Americans, through volunteer efforts, "could revolutionize the lives of troubled youngsters."

Nation Buchanan schedules surgery

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vanquished Republican presidential challenger Patrick Buchanan scheduled major elective heart surgery for today to replace a valve apparently damaged by complications from an illness decades ago.

His sister and campaign manager, Angela Bay Buchanan, said the conservative columnist expects to be

back in fighting form for the Republican National Convention in August.

Buchanan, 53, who has been in generally good health, will have his aortic valve replaced

with an artificial valve. A heart murmur from a bout with debilitating rheumatoid arthritis when he was 20 is believed responsible for the damaged valve, Bay Buchanan said.

"It's always a concern but we're extremely hopeful and so are the doctors that everything will be just fine," she said in an interview.

She said Buchanan had known about the condition for the past 10 years and that doctors in April recommended surgery this year after they detected a worsening in his condition.

"He wanted to finish the election cycle. He wanted to finish California," she said. "He was going to have some down time, and this gives him plenty of time to recover and get ready for the Republican convention."

Buchanan, whose strong showing in early primaries rattled President Bush's re-election campaign, wound up without a single primary victory. He vowed to take his largely symbolic challenge all the way to the convention floor in Houston in hopes of influencing the party platform.

Buchanan entered the Washington Hospital Center on Thursday and is expected to remain there for eight days, said campaign spokesman Dan Giroux. He said doctors expect a full recovery.

Bay Buchanan said that her brother did not have chest pains, an irregular heartbeat or any other symptoms of heart disease. Other than the defective aortic valve, his heart is strong, she said.

Bush marks World War II anniversary

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush warned against ever letting America's defenses down as he signed a proclamation Thursday marking the 50th anniversary of World War II.

Bush, who fought in the Pacific as a Navy bomber pilot, said the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor "forced America to abandon isolationism and take up the mantle of leadership."

"Weakening our defenses during a time of peace is an open invitation to those with the potential to wage war," Bush said at a signing ceremony in the Roosevelt Room witnessed by generals and lawmakers.

"Some say our victory in the Cold War allows us to pull back to our own water's edge. I say just as America's vigilance helped us win that war, so a strong America can now help win the peace," he said.

"We must never, ever let America's defenses down," he added.

Bush noted it was 50 years ago this week "that our forces began what may have been the greatest naval battle of all time, Midway, (which) turned the tide of World War II."

The proclamation declares this week (May 31-June 6) as a time for the national observance of the war's 50th anniversary.

Train hits garbage truck; 10 injured

POPLARVILLE, Miss. (AP) — An Amtrak train on its way to New York from New Orleans struck a garbage truck and derailed Thursday morning, slightly injuring 10 people.

The Crescent struck the loaded truck as it crossing at 8:45 a.m. The train was carrying about 60 passengers and 10 crew members, according to Howard Robertson, an Amtrak spokesman. No passengers were seriously injured, but five passengers and five crew members, including engineer R.W. Lee, were taken to a hospital in Piquette with minor injuries, Robertson said.

Throngs mark Khomeini anniversary

BEHESHT-E-ZAHRA, Iran — Roars of "Death to America" swelled from the shrine to Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini Thursday as hundreds of thousands of Iranians marked the third anniversary of the Islamic revolutionary leader's death.

A special group of about 10,000 mourners pounded their heads and beat their chests in a choreographed display of grief. On cue, the breast-beating stopped, and the crowd roared, "Death to America," and "Death to Israel," familiar refrains of the ayatollah's followers.

Khomeini claimed his brand of revolutionary Islam on Iran in 1979, after the fall of the pro-Western shah, Mohammad Reza Pahlavi. Although his influence is in decline, he remains revered by millions of Iranians, and his social teachings are widely followed, especially by Iran's poor.

About 120,000 people packed the gold-domed shrine inside the Behesht-e-Zahra cemetery, 10 miles south of Tehran, for Thursday's memorial.

Walesa, government face crucial vote

WARSAW, Poland — President Lech Walesa formally sought the dismissal of Prime Minister Jan Olszewski and his Cabinet on Thursday, the eve of a parliamentary vote of confidence in the government.

The president and Olszewski have been feuding for months. Hours before Walesa sought the prime minister's dismissal, Walesa harshly criticized the Interior Ministry for releasing names of possible police collaborators before the accused had a chance to defend themselves.

Olszewski is Poland's third prime minister in the three years since the Communists lost power.

Political instability in Poland has discouraged Western investors, so the prospect of a fourth government is considered a negative development. It is possible, however, that Olszewski would be replaced by a government more determined to make tougher reforms.

NATO takes small peacekeeper role

OSLO, Norway — The United States and its NATO allies agreed Thursday to allow their soldiers to operate outside alliance territory for the first time by serving as peacekeepers in European conflicts.

But sources said European nations rebuffed an American attempt to get them to promise NATO help — possibly including the use of force — to implement tough U.N. economic sanctions against Yugoslavia and deliver humanitarian aid to war-torn Bosnia-Herzegovina.

The European allies have rejected several pleas from Bosnia's leaders to send troops to separate the warring factions in the former Yugoslav republic.

About 10,000 U.N. peacekeepers are in Croatia, another breakaway republic where fighting has generally died down since a cease-fire went into effect in January. But U.N. diplomats have failed to halt fighting in Bosnia, and the United Nations does not try to impose truces by force.

Indonesian campaign takes a breather

JAKARTA, Indonesia — The official cooling-off period started Thursday in campaigning for the June 9 parliamentary elections in which the three parties allowed to participate have produced no burning issues.

All 2,283 candidates for the 400 contested seats support President Suharto's administration. Major national issues in the world's fourth-most populous nation were not debated, and no overt criticism of personalities was permitted.

The bottom line in Indonesian politics is the armed forces, the country's dominating force since Suharto, then a general, took power in 1966 after the ouster of President Sukarno and the crushing of the Communist Party.

Filmmaker killed in New Guinea

PORT MORESBY, Papua New Guinea — Police are investigating the death of a Swedish filmmaker who was found with his throat cut while working on a documentary about refugees, officials said Thursday.

The body of Per-Ove Carlsson, 32, was found on April 29 in a house at Kiunga, near Papua New Guinea's border with the Indonesian province of Irian Jaya.

A police spokesman said the case initially was treated as a suicide but now was viewed as a suspicious death. The official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, would not say if there were any suspects. Carlsson arrived in the northwestern town of Vanimo from Irian Jaya on a tourist visa earlier in April. He had been making a film along the border and had tried to find accommodations at a Papua New Guinea camp for Irian Jayan refugees.

Famed women's college goes coed

OXFORD, England — Somerville College, one of two all-women Oxford colleges and the alma mater of four world leaders, said Thursday it would admit men in 1995 despite student objections.

Somerville students had appealed to University Chancellor Lord Jenkins to overturn a surprise decision by the college's governing body to admit men in the fall of 1993.

In a 5,000-word judgment on the dispute, Lord Jenkins overruled their objections, saying the 113-year-old college has suffered intellectually and financially in recent years because of its single-sex policy.

Israeli gunships attack guerrilla base

TYRE, Lebanon — Israeli helicopter gunships fired guided rockets into a Palestinian guerrilla base at the Rashidiyah refugee camp near this southern Lebanese port Thursday, Security sources said, three people were wounded.

The sources said three Cobra gunships rocketed the camp at 1:15 p.m., sending gray clouds of smoke over the shantytown on Tyre's outskirts. The sources, who requested anonymity, said the victims were two guerrillas and a civilian. It was the seventh Israeli air raid on Lebanon in two weeks and the 15th this year.

Police reportedly arrest labor activists

BEIJING (AP) — Police arrested at least two founders of a now-banned labor union Thursday to prevent them from commemorating the third anniversary of the bloody crackdown on China's democracy movement.

Two other members of the union were missing and believed arrested, Chinese sources said.

The government was determined to prevent any commemoration of the June 3-4, 1989, army attack that ended weeks of mass pro-democracy demonstrations and left hundreds, possibly thousands, dead.

Except for a lone man's protest in Tiananmen Square on Wednesday, the two days passed quietly with the vast, central square and college campuses under tight security.

In Hong Kong, tens of thousands of people clutching candles spilled across a soccer field and basketball courts at Victoria Park for speeches and songs Thursday night in remembrance of those killed in the crackdown.

"We are here because our brothers in Beijing don't have the freedom to do this," said Cheung Man-kwong, spokesman for the Hong Kong Alliance in Support of Democracy in China. "We are doing this for them."

Mourners in the British colony, which reverts to Chinese control in 1997, laid wreaths around a replica of the Monument to Revolutionary Martyrs in Tiananmen Square, where pro-democracy demonstrations were held in 1989.

Chinese police set up roadblocks for a second night around Beijing University, which was a center of the democracy movement. Foreigners were blocked from going near the school, but students said by telephone that it was quiet.

Friends of the arrested men, whose names were not disclosed, said, speaking on condition of

anonymity for fear of punishment. Han Dongfang, sometimes called China's Lech Walesa for his leading role in the union, was detained Wednesday night while walking in Tiananmen Square, the friends said. Two colleagues, Zhou Guoqing and Qian Yumin, were missing and believed under arrest, they said.

Twin Falls' Jim Hörner, later named his team's most valuable defensive player, picked off North quarterback Bror Walter on the second play of the game.

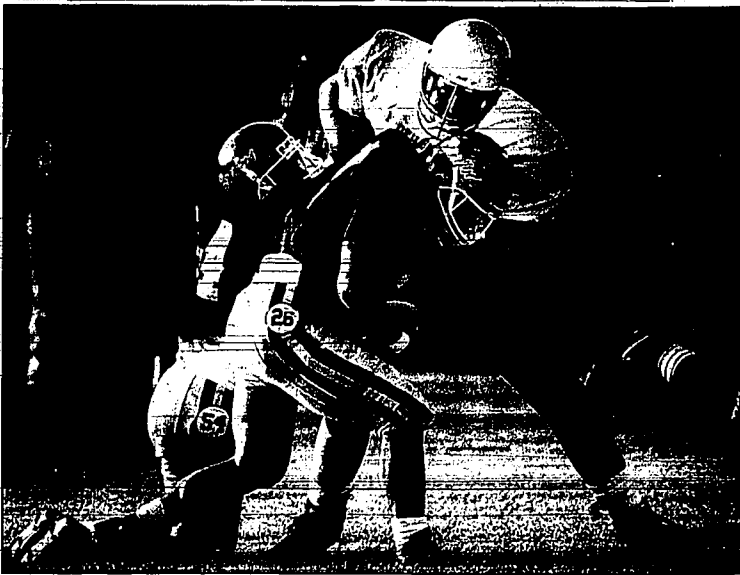

Drexler, Blazers question Jordan's 'typical' game

CHICAGO — The Portland Trail Blazers are the ultimate skeptics about Michael Jordan's amazing 3-point shooting exhibition in the opener of the NBA Finals.

Jordan set Finals records with six 3-pointers and 35 points in the first half of Chicago's 122-89 rout of the Trail Blazers on Wednesday night.

The number of points wasn't shocking to the Portland players. After all, Jordan has won six consecutive scoring titles. But after he made only 27 of 100 3-pointers during the season, the Blazers certainly weren't expecting a long-range lesson from Jordan.

"He might score 39 points again, but I don't think he will do it with 3-pointers again," Clyde Drexler said Thursday. "This was a typical game for him. We couldn't plan for something like that. It was a special night for him."

Drexler, who guarded Jordan in most of

the first half, said double-teaming Jordan near the 3-point arc would be counter-productive.

"He was shooting from pretty far out, but all the man guarding him can do is put more pressure on him," Drexler said. "We can't double-team him from 3-point range."

Forward Jerome Kersey took a turn guarding Jordan in the second half, and he scored just 4 points and took five shots while passing for seven of his 11 assists.

"We still have to worry more about him penetrating more than outside shooting," Kersey said. "The closest guy has to pick him up. But whenever he shoots the ball, we have to put more pressure on him. We can't let him go up for a shot unattended."

"But when you allow him to get to the basket, he's going to dunk or the other guys are going to get easy baskets or offensive rebounds."

"After a while, we were all playing like we had mittens on," Blazers forward Buck Williams said.

Portland coach Rick Adelman said it is too simple to blame the loss on Jordan's performance.

"We all realize Michael had a great game, but we also realize there are many other reasons on both ends of the floor that caused us to lose," Adelman said.

Adelman was more concerned about Portland's 21 turnovers that led to 34 Chicago points. But he admitted Jordan's performance may have shaken his players and caused them to make mistakes.

"When Michael got on a roll, we started thinking, 'We've got to get it back,' and it just got worse," Adelman said. "But I learned from Jack Ramsay you have to be resilient in this league. We're going to have bad quarters and bad games and good

TWIN FALLS — A win in the final two laps of a race for Eddy McKean. A first win of the season, for Bob Fort.

"Michael could have been in the first balcony and made a shot," teammate Horace Grant said.

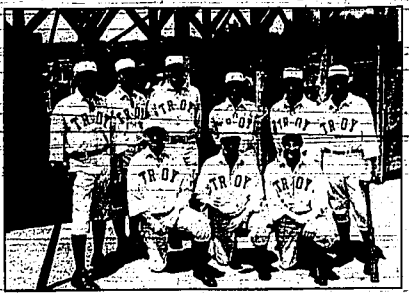
Take me out to the old ball game

TRIOY, N.Y. (AP) — The National League still owes Troy and Worcester, Mass., some exhibition games. Since the NL is unlikely to pay up any time soon, two of the league's oldest members are playing a series of their own.

The Troy Haymakers and the Worcester Baseball Club meet here Saturday to recreate a game from 1882, when both cities had National League franchises. They play again in Worcester June 20.

"After attending the practice last night, Troy is going to beat the socks off Worcester," Lloyd Johnson, national president of the Society of American Baseball Research, said Thursday at a news conference to introduce the Troy players.

The series celebrates the baseball history of both cities. Troy was an NL member from 1879-82. Worcester from 1880-82. Five members of Troy's NL team — Tim Keefe, Buck Ewing, Roger Connor, Mickey Welch and Dan Brouthers — are in the Hall of Fame. So are Troy natives Johnny Evers — of "Inkers-to-Evers-to-Chance" fame — and Michael "King" Kelly, another pre-1900 great.

Another reason, according to Johnson, was gambling.

Professional baseball already had its share of gambling scandals by 1882, and Troy, a thriving industrial center in the late 19th century, was "infested" of gambling, Johnson said.

Pepperdine advances to CWS championship

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Steve Rodriguez's seventh-winning grand slam gave seventh-seeded Pepperdine a 5-1 victory over Texas on Thursday night and a berth in the College World Series championship game.

Pepperdine (47-11-1), in its first title game in two CWS appearances, will play the winner of Friday

night's game between 10-ranked Miami and Cal State Fullerton. The winners meet Saturday.

Texas (49-16) finishes fourth, the 15th time in its record-16 CWS appearances that Longhorns coach Cliff Gustafson finished that high.

Pepperdine set a CWS record with 24 consecutive scoreless innings, breaking the mark of 22 set by

Florida-State in 1970. The streak ended when Paton Hickman lined a three-run homer to right off Wavon relief ace Steve Montgomery off a 3-1 lead.

Montgomery (10-2) had come on after starter Steve Duda hit pinch-hitter Doug Pettit and gave up only his second hit of the game, both singles by Tim Hardaker.

E. Washington loses pair of hoop stars

CHENEY, Wash. (AP) — Two Eastern Washington basketball players, including the Big Sky Conference's record holder for career 3-point baskets, do not plan to return for next season.

Three-point specialist Justin Paola said coach John Wade asked him not to return to the team while point guard Kahu Dennis said he plans to transfer for the 1992-93 season.

In addition, forward Shawn DeLaiture said he is unsure if he will return.

Paola, who would be a senior, said he has signed an agreement allowing him to keep his scholarship and continue school as an elementary education major.

He (Wade) didn't really give me any reasons, he just said I could come back to school but he definitely didn't want me on the

basketball team," Paola said last week. After the Eagles finished 6-21 last season, Wade said he would take steps to turn the team around.

Top Yugoslav soccer team to sell players

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — The international sports ban on Yugoslavia is taking its toll on world soccer champion Red Star Belgrade, which must sell its remaining stars in order to survive.

"We are crippled by the U.N. ban. The sanctions have tied a noose around our necks," Red Star director Dragan Dzajic said.

Red Star, the 1991 world and European champion, sold many of its best players long before the United Nations approved sweeping sanctions against war-torn Yugoslavia last Saturday.

Now faced with even more financial troubles because of the ban, Red Star plans to sell its youngest stars — midfielders Sinisa Mihajlovic and Vladimir Jugovic — to wealthy Western teams.

"We have to be realistic in this situation. If we cannot compete on the international scene, at least we should get something out of the funds we invested in these players," Dzajic said.

Following the U.N. vote, soccer officials banned Yugoslavia from the upcoming European championships in Sweden and other international soccer events.

The sanctions are designed to pressure Serb-led Yugoslavia to halt its war against the breakaway republic of Bosnia-Herzegovina.

Red Star's best French champion Olympique-Marseille for the European club title last year. Later, the Belgrade team beat Chile's Colo Colo in the Intercontinental Finals in Japan, claiming the title of world champion.

The 22-year-old Jugovic is negotiating with Italian teams Sampdoria and Genoa, while 23-year-old Mihajlovic has been contacted by several European squads, team sources said.

Graf, Seles survive, reach final

PARIS (AP) — Steffi Graf lost the first set 6-0. Monica Seles tied 4-2 in the third. Yet both recovered in time to reach the French Open final.

Seles, the defending champion and top seed, played a brilliant final four games Thursday to overcome Gabriela Sabatini 6-3, 4-6, 6-4. In a breathtaking display, Seles hit seven consecutive "clean" winners at one stage to erase Sabatini's lead.

Sabatini "didn't know what hit her."

"When I was up 4-2, I thought I had a chance to win the match," she said.

"Suddenly, she started hitting very hard. I don't know where she got the power. I was just defending myself. There wasn't much I could do."

Graf, who lost to Arantxa Sanchez Vicario 6-0, 6-2 in the semifinals last year, appeared headed for the same fate before raising her game and coming back to beat the Spaniard 6-6, 6-2, 6-2.

"The most important thing is that I kept myself going," said Graf, the No. 2 seed. "I just pushed myself. In the second set, I just pumped myself up and it kind of worked."

Thursday's matches, played on a rare day of no rain disruptions, provided by far the most spectacular women's tennis of the tournament.

In the only men's match of the day, Petr Korda beat Russia's Andrei Cherkasov 6-4, 6-7 (7-3), 6-2, 6-4 to set up a semifinal encounter against French favorite Henri Leconte. Jim Courier and Andre Agassi meet in the other men's semi on Friday.

Seles, who lost to Sabatini in the finals of the Italian Open last month, seemed to have reassessed her dominance when she won the first set convincingly in 37 minutes.

But with the capacity crowd chanting "Gaby! Gaby!" Sabatini came back strongly in the second set, hitting high-percentage looping topspin shots and making few errors. Sabatini pumped her fists and shouted "Vamos" while saving three break points to hold serve for 4-3 after being down 0-40. She broke for the second 5-4, hitting a backhand pass down the line to reach 15-40 and forcing Seles into an error on the next point.

Sabatini kept the momentum going into the final set. When she pounced on a second serve and hit an inside-out forehand winner to break Seles at love for a 4-2 lead, Sabatini thought the match was hers.

Seles said she was feeling tired physically and mentally,

Estonian captures heptathlon

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Brigham Young's Anu Kaljurand, who will be the only woman on the Estonian Olympic track and field team, won the NCAA heptathlon championship Thursday with the second-highest score in the meet's history.



Kaljurand, the first Baltic athlete to win an NCAA title, suffered a broken left foot while finishing second in the long jump at the 1986 World Junior Championships in Athens.

After finishing second again in the same event in the 1988 world juniors in Sudbury, Ontario, she re-injured the foot.

"They (Soviet sports officials) said they were not interested in me any more," she said.

"I couldn't really jump. They took my money away and I totally lost interest."

Until Brigham Young recruited her in January 1990.

That year, Kaljurand finished fourth in the NCAA heptathlon. She improved to second last year, behind Shiron-Jaklofsky of Louisiana State.

Jaklofsky, a sophomore from Australia, finished a distant second this year, with a 5,968 points, one point ahead of Diane Guthrie of George Mason.

Kaljurand's pivotal event was the javelin, the next-to-last event in the competition. She vaulted from third to first with a throw of 173 feet, 2 inches, the best of her career.

Jaklofsky, the leader at that point, managed only 126-0.

"Overall, everything was decent," Kaljurand said of her performance, "but the javelin was great."

NCAA track & field

Kaljurand, 23, a junior from Tallinn, finished the two-day, seven-event competition in the University of Texas' hot and humid Memorial Stadium with 6,142 points.

Only 1988 Olympic gold medalist Jackie Joyner-Kersey of UCLA, who compiled 6,365 points in 1983, has amassed more points than Kaljurand in the collegiate championships.

Kaljurand also became the third-best collegiate performer of all time. Joyner-Kersey is the leader with 6,718 points in 1985 and Mercedes-Harmon of Cal State-Northridge is second with 6,215 in 1983.

The heptathlon was the only final Thursday, when the program also included preliminaries, qualifying and semifinals in 17 events. Fourteen finals will be held Friday and 24 on Saturday; the final day of the meet.

Kaljurand is elated about competing at Barcelona, where she will be joined by six members of the men's team —

Don't force reservation gambling on Idahoans

Four years ago, a majority of Idaho voters said they liked the idea of a state Lottery to raise money for education.

Their mechanism was a referendum on a constitutional amendment that authorized charitable gambling.

Charitable gambling can be construed as meaning many things, from church-basement bingo to punch-board games, but the intention of the legislators who wrote the amendment and the people who voted for it was clearly that it didn't mean casino gambling.

Now, thanks to three Idaho Indian tribes, there's a very real possibility that it will.

Legislative leaders from both parties agreed Wednesday to ask Gov. Cecil Andrus to call lawmakers into special session, to clarify that casino-type gambling will not be allowed in Idaho under any circumstances.

They're thinking about putting a second constitutional amendment on the November ballot to say just that.

Wednesday's hurriedly-called leadership meeting came as Shoshone-Bannock Tribal Chairman Kesley Edmo notified Andrus the tribes want to begin negotiating a federally mandated compact with the state for regulation of casino-type gaming on the eastern Idaho reservation.

Six weeks ago the Coeur d'Alene Tribe of northern Idaho started negotiations on a gaming compact under the federal Indian Gaming Regulatory Act. Tribal Chairman Ernest Stengas said casino-type games, while not being contemplated by the tribe, would be the subject of the compact on grounds that the Coeur d'Alenes will not cede any sovereignty over economic development to the state.

The federal deadline for completing the compact is the beginning of October.

But Edmo's letter this week said flatly that the Shoshone-Bannocks want to expand gaming beyond their successful bingo operation. They need the money, he told Andrus.

State officials said the Kootenai Tribe in the Panhandle has also

expressed interest in holding gaming compact talks.

It's all part of the latest trend among Native Americans' tribes, which see gaming as a way out of the pervasive poverty that may suffer.

And since Indian reservations have a limited sort of sovereignty, they'll defy the states in which they exist to stop them.

There's even a plan in the works to put up a casino on Indian-owned land in downtown Chicago.

To our way of thinking, that's arrogance of the worst kind.

Ninety-eight percent of Idahoans are bitterly opposed to casinos gambling within the state's borders, and now they're told they're powerless to stop it unless they rewrite the state's constitution.

The loophole that could make that necessary was a 4th-District Court ruling this spring on an attempt to shut down a non-profit bingo parlor in Boise.

The 1988 lottery amendment authorized charitable gambling. And while state officials contended further legislation was required to legalize charitable gaming, Judge Robert Newhouse held that the constitutional provision was self-enacting.

And under the federal law, Indian tribes are authorized to engage in any gaming operations that the state allows under any circumstances.

That means, in effect, that if Idaho allows church raffles, it allows casinos at Fort Hall.

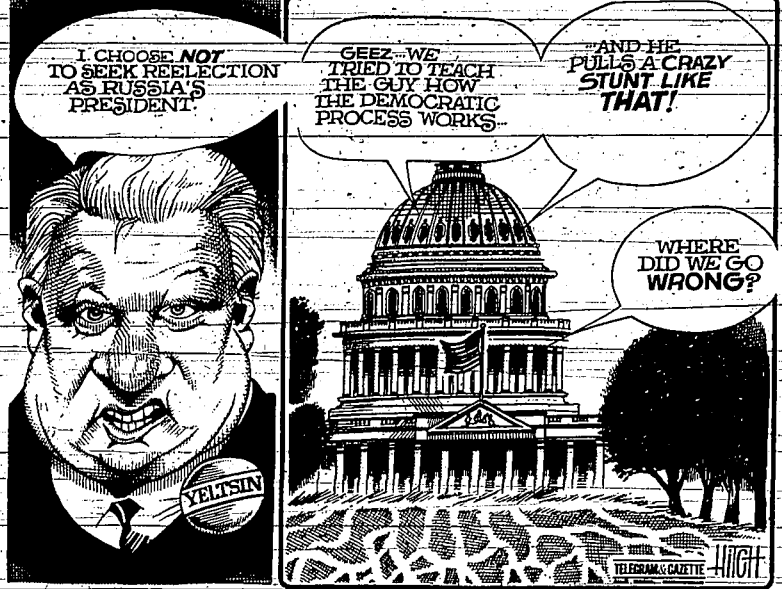
If that's what it takes to keep Idaho from becoming Nevada North, it's worth giving up our bingo games.

But the bigger question is this: Why are our fellow Idahoans among the Sho-Bans, the Coeur d'Alenes and the Kootenais so anxious to sell off our community standards without our consent?

And why, in the interest of self-determination, are they allowed to?

The notion that an Indian reservation is a vacuum, economically and politically independent and thus perfectly free to make decisions that will affect its neighbors, is crazy.

We hope the Legislature makes that clear at its earliest opportunity.



Bush seems to be out of it in Europe

PARIS — George Washington, by legend, was first in war, first in peace and first in the hearts of his countrymen.

George Bush, in today's Europe, is first in war. And you can forget the rest of it.

Despite a vaunted reputation at home as an expert in foreign affairs, Bush seems to be out of it in Europe. He has become a follower, not a leader. And he doesn't seem to be quite sure who he wants to follow.

The most dramatic illustration of Bush's uncertainty recently has been his reluctance, or inability, to define U.S. policy toward the continuing crisis in Yugoslavia.

Bush has spoken repeatedly and proudly of "American leadership" in the post-Cold War world.

—But there has been no evidence of U.S. leadership in Yugoslavia, a potential tinder box if there ever was one. Sarajevo, after all, is where World War I began.

—In Yugoslavia, the administration's policy, if you want to call it that, has been to let Europeans call the shots.

Europeans, divided as usual, have not been able to quell the violence, and U.S. officials — including the now departing ones — are gradually improving.

This is leadership?

The underlying problem appears to be that Bush has no real concept of what the U.S. role should be in what he himself has chosen to call "the New World order."

Staffed as it is by veteran Cold warriors, the administration seems inclined to define problems in purely military terms. It has demonstrated little talent for complex problems of diplomacy.

Perhaps this is why Bush seems to change his mind, and positions of principle, from

an interview the other day that, as far as he could discern, the Bush administration has no clear concept about what the future of NATO should be.

The administration wants to preserve NATO. But it doesn't know what it wants NATO to do. This verges on the ridiculous.

The Cold War has been over for more than two years and there are still about 200,000 U.S. troops in Europe with no one to fight.

Bush has said more than once that the reason for maintaining high troop levels is to ensure "stability." But there is no stability in Yugoslavia.

The lesson in all of this may well be that what the world needs from the United States is political leadership, perhaps even moral leadership — not military leadership.

There is a logical place for the United States to start in defining a new role.

The French and the Germans, a few weeks ago, announced plans for a 35,000-member joint Army Corps intended as the nucleus of a future European Army.

The Europeans, at last, would begin to take responsibility for their own security, a job they have long been unable to do.

But Washington has resisted the notion, arguing that it would undermine NATO.

Bush is not clear about what NATO should be doing. But he somehow feels it should be there anyway.

He should be telling the French and the Germans and so should other Americans. We have plenty of problems of our own.

Treasure the ideology; slight suffering

My mother first was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease when I was in high school — it is a long, slow, crummy illness — and since then we have watched her condition worsen as scientific understanding of it gradually improves.

Breakthroughs are frequently promised, and occasionally there's actual progress. It gives you a funny relationship to the daily news: As the families of millions upon millions of people know who suffer from diseases still waiting for scientific breakthroughs — from cancer to Alzheimer's to HIV — living intimately with a disease that also has a life in the media can be a bursing experience of ups and downs.

The person with the disease has the liveliest time of it, of course. There are terrific, hope-inducing days; there are days when front pages announce a breakthrough or a potential therapy, and you scurry about making phone calls only to find that the advance is less significant than reported. And there is the more wrenching variation on this when a breakthrough drug is featured on front pages everywhere, your friends call you up in heartfelt excitement and happiness; and you must explain repeatedly and patiently that the therapy described is, in fact, one you tried in an experimental protocol, only to learn you are not in the group of sufferers it can help.

—But when your disease is a political hostage, like Parkinson's, these emotional ups and downs become considerably more violent. Ever since the Bush administration decided in 1988 — against the best scientific evidence — of its own advance panels — to uphold its 1987 ban on funding research on fetal tissue on the grounds that it made use of a product of the abortions it so passionately opposes, our close-up view of the scientific process has become into a close-up of the way ideologists scold individual human pain.

This last round has been the worst yet. Not content with blocking the fetal tissue experiments that could illuminate and perhaps cure the disease, the ideologists in the White House concede publicly that victims may perhaps, and access to some — as long as it's the kind of issue that, because of its source in spontaneous abortions, carries a high probability of taint or infection.

An ideology can sustain its coherence and direction only from indifference to suffering in individual cases — that, surely, is news to nobody. The notion that general principle trumps individual suffering could, in fact, be ideology's workaday definition. It's less obvious in this country that at some point ideology must also put principle above incontrovertible facts of science.

In the case of fetal tissue research, the ideological position is that no good thing can come of the abortion evil. The argument is that, although information gained from experiments with fetal tissue transplants could ease or cure the stubborn ravages of Huntington's, Alzheimer's or diabetes, a more important side effect of the experiments would be the perception that some good had resulted. This is a message the administration cannot tolerate sending. Why not? They aren't my mother. Sticking to the symbol won't cost them the

ability to speak clearly or walk without falling.

When both houses of Congress overwhelmingly passed legislation to lift the ban, the administration responded last week with a smoke-screen executive order designed to deflect the formation of veto-proof majorities: It would create fetal tissue "banks" of tissue resulting from miscarriages or from ectopic pregnancies.

Here's where the rejection of science comes in. Scientists who maintained just such a fetal tissue bank at Yale for four years say that no usable tissue was ever recovered. The reason is the source: Tissue spontaneously aborts when there's something wrong with it.

A leading argument in the administration's arsenal is that the possibility of tissue transplants will "encourage abortions": the hypothetical case of a daughter, say, willingly getting pregnant and having an abortion so as to ease a parent's suffering.

Besides sounding crazy, the question is moot. I couldn't. The law Bush is set to veto includes clauses making this transaction impossible. It bans selling tissue, knowing or designating the recipient, or mentioning tissue research in abortion counseling. Where is the "compassion" that can see past this latest twist on "pro-life" ideology and reject its underlying contempt for lives people actually live?

Reilly's dilemma

EPA environmentalist fights 'no-win situation'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Talk of William K. Reilly's frustration and even rumors of his impending resignation swirl about Washington like mosquitos in a Brazilian rain forest.

But Reilly, a career environmentalist in an administration accused of caring little about the environment, says that while he has taken his lumps he also has had his triumphs. And leaving is not on his mind.

This week the 52-year-old head of the Environmental Protection Agency is leading the U.S. delegation to the U.N. Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro where, among other things, he is arguing in favor of a treaty on global warming that he privately feels doesn't go far enough.

In the opening days of the summit, Reilly has had to fend off sharp criticism of the U.S. stance on that issue, and also of the administration's initial rejection of a treaty to protect plants, animals and natural resources. Reilly offered changes Thursday in the natural resources pact so the United States may be able to sign it, and also offered tighter restrictions on domestic clearcutting of timber to protect forests.

Leading the delegation represents something of a high-water mark for Reilly, who was chosen by President Bush for the role over domestic policy adviser Clayton Yeutter, the choice of administration conservatives.

Yet the summit also comes as environmentalists, including some who have considered Reilly a personal friend for years — are increasingly questioning his effectiveness in a White House they say has become openly hostile toward environmental protection.

Four years ago, Bush's selection of Reilly, then the president of the World Wildlife Fund, to head the EPA was hailed by environmental leaders as a sign that Bush might take the environment seriously. They all now say they are disappointed.

Reilly calls some of those critics overly dogmatic and defends Bush's environmental record as being "significantly better than that of most of the countries that are going to be in Rio."

"I think we have no apologies to make," he said in an interview before the summit.

Far from being a radical environmentalist, Reilly has always emphasized consensus and compromise.

As president of the Conservation Foundation and later of the World Wildlife Fund, he excelled at bringing together government officials, business leaders and environmentalists to address global environmental problems.

During nearly four years inside the government, he has not always been as successful and has the battle scars as reminders.

Over the past 10 months, there has been a succession of confrontations with senior White House officials over protection of wetlands; whether to allow businesses a loophole to increase air pollution about the threatened northern spotted owl and over

how vigorously to respond to the threat of global warming.

Some critics of the administration contend that in all of these issues Reilly has come out on the short end.

"He is being sandbagged at every juncture," says Jay Hair, president of the National Wildlife Federation, who has known Reilly for a dozen years and remains one of his biggest admirers.

Supporters argue that Reilly continues to have the ear — and strong respect — of the president. He frequently has discussed environmental issues directly with Bush over lunch at informal social events or occa-

sional visits with the president at Camp David, say aides.

But the strains between Reilly and some senior administration officials, including Vice President Dan Quayle have grown.

Quayle's office succeeded recently, over Reilly's objections, in allowing business greater flexibility in meeting new clean air requirements and forced the EPA to abandon efforts to put devices on cars to cut pollution while refueling. A nearly yearlong battle between Reilly and Quayle over a proposal to dramatically reduce federal protection of wetlands seemed to have ended in stalemate, but may surface again soon.

Still, Reilly and aides say there also have been victories.

Early in his tenure as EPA administrator, he ignored some key White House aides and ordered a halt to the Two Forks Dam project in Colorado. He also persuaded the administration to impose pollution controls on an electric power plant near the Grand Canyon, persuaded Bush to speed up the phaseout of chemicals that destroy the ozone layer, and has argued successfully each year for more EPA money, especially for prosecuting polluters.

Reilly also was — more than anyone else in the administration — the architect of an ambitious clean-air proposal embraced by Bush, much of which eventually was enacted into law by Congress.

The disputes have at times been biting.

Reilly and former White House chief of staff John Sununu rarely saw eye to eye on anything. And Richard Darman, head of the Office of Management and Budget, reportedly once referred to Reilly in disdain as a "global rock star."

Tall and slender with sandy hair and green eyes and a fondness for well-tailored suits, Reilly brought to the administration an Ivy League education (Yale and Harvard) along with his reputation for forging compromises. Fluent in Spanish and French, his interests have leaned heavily toward global ecological concerns, especially protection of the rain forests.

When selected to head the EPA in 1988, Reilly told an interviewer, "To some people this is a no-win situation." Many environmentalists say Reilly could not have been more correct.

Summit misses population issue

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil — As the "Earth Summit" opened Wednesday, many experts fear the 12-day gathering of world leaders will ignore one critical issue linked to the environment: the continued explosion in the world's population.

Watered-down by the Vatican and some developing nations, the text of the Rio Declaration, which sets out general principles of development and environmental protection — and the more specific Agenda 21 document fail to call for the stabilization of world population or specifically mention what many experts say are the means by which women can do this — family planning and the use of contraceptives.

Most leaders of industrialized nations and many environmentalists say the world's environment cannot be protected if population growth continues at the present rate. But many leaders in poorer countries say the unequal distribution of the world's wealth — not population growth — is the primary cause of poverty and environmental degradation.

Moreover, in pre-conference negotiations last April, the Vatican, which is a non-voting member of the U.N. General Assembly, threatened not to support sections of Agenda 21 dealing with demographic issues unless the terms "family planning" and "contraceptives" were deleted from the final text.

The text will probably face final review by delegates beginning Thursday at the summit, officially called the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development. Catholic dogma prohibits the use of contraceptives.

"The U.N. conference is taking a big step backward. You can't separate population growth and the environment. Managed population growth combats environmental degradation," said Jennie Petersen, an official at the U.N. Population Fund, which supports family planning programs in 136 countries.

But Tseayo Lahadi, a professor of sociology at Nigeria's Univer-

sity of Jose and a conference participant, said, "Americans and Europeans are always talking about population control. It's not a question of overpopulation. It's a question of redistributing wealth. They are using this issue to try to control our development."

According to the U.N., the world's population of 5.5 billion will grow to 10 billion by the year 2050 if the current growth rate of 1.7 percent is sustained. More than 95 percent of this growth will occur in today's developing countries, where inadequate family planning programs, poverty, and cultural and religious beliefs combine to create pressures for large families.

In Nigeria, which has one of the world's fastest-growing populations, men frequently abandon infertile women, according to Ore Salan, an environmentalist and geography professor at Nigeria's University of Port Harcourt. In a society where polygamy is common, Nigeria's inheritance laws also favor wives, who have the most children. Most of the country's poor also cannot afford contraceptives, she said.

Nigerian women now have an average of six children, though five years ago the government asked women to voluntarily have only four children. Nigeria's population is about 100 million; it may have 400 million by the mid-21st century.

Environmentalists say rapid population growth contributes to deforestation, soil erosion through the overuse of agricultural lands and increased pollution in major cities where sewage and garbage is often dumped untreated into rivers and oceans. As these countries develop, they will also contribute increasingly to problems such as global warming and ozone depletion, environmentalists say.

Population experts say an increasing number of developing countries are implementing family planning programs, but the current efforts are inadequate to stabilize population growth.

Climate agreement could be first step in limiting global warming

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil — In 1958, scientist Charles Keeling hoisted a gas intake tube up a tower 11,000 feet atop Hawaii's Mauna Loa volcano.

Nearly every day since, he has pumped samples of pristine Pacific air down through an infrared gas analyzer.

In just 34 years — a mere moment in Earth's history — Keeling has documented a 12 percent rise in the atmosphere's carbon dioxide levels, an increase greater than the planet had experienced over thousands of years and one of the most precipitous environmental changes in the history of mankind.

Carbon dioxide, an invisible gas, is the ubiquitous byproduct of the industrial age. Released by nearly all forms of burning, it is produced when an American suburbanite drives a car to work, when a Polish generation burns coal to produce electricity, and when a Brazilian landowner clears out a forest to create a farmstead.

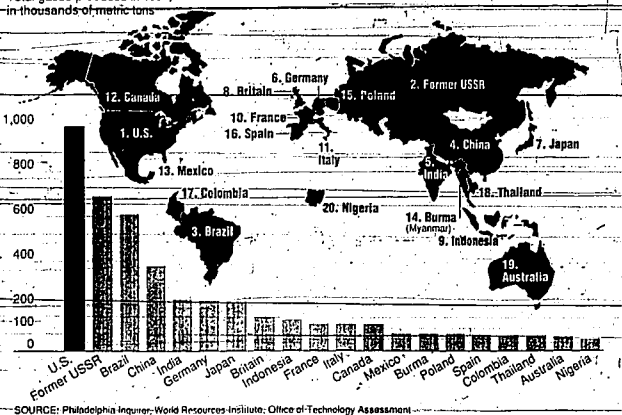
Scientists say it traps heat like a greenhouse and eventually will warm the planet with extraordinary consequences: Polar icecaps could melt, the seas rise, farmlands parch into desert. Many consider it the gravest threat to civilization short of nuclear war.

A climate-change treaty that President Bush and other heads of state will sign here is the first international attempt to avert the danger.

The treaty, the centerpiece of the Earth Summit, is the result of three decades of research spurred by

Keeling's first findings, years of scientific and political debate in the United States, Europe, Japan and the developing world, and 15 months of often fractious negotiations among 143 nations.

Scientists don't know when the warming will begin or how severe it will be. The Bush administration, pointing to these uncertainties,

refused to accept legally binding restrictions on the emission of polluting gases. Environmentalists, for their part, complained that the U.S. stance turned the treaty into a statement of good intentions.

But the accord is testimony to the growing world consensus that the dangers of foot-dragging are too great to wait for total scientific cer-

tainty.

The United States, the world's largest industrial power and the developed country with the cheapest energy, is the world's biggest greenhouse-gas polluter.

Eastern Europe, where factories have been shielded from market incentives to improve fuel efficiency, has the dirtiest industries. East Germany, for instance, was the only industrial country in 1988 spewing out more carbon dioxide per capita than the United States — 5.4 tons per East German compared to 5.3 tons per American.

In many Latin American countries, where industry is still developing, more carbon dioxide pollution comes from deforestation than from the burning of fossil fuels. This is

because much of the weight of wood and other vegetation in tropical forests is carbon, most of which is released as carbon dioxide when trees are cut and burned.

The pollution potential of mass deforestation is enormous. Worldwide, it amounts to about a quarter of greenhouse gases.

The average wealthy Brazilian rancher who burns off Amazon forest for cattle grazing releases 1,565 tons of polluting gases into the atmosphere annually. This compares with the average polluting American, who produces just 3 tons, and the rest of the 150 million Brazilians, whose activities release less than half a ton of polluting gases each.

A Swedish chemist first articulated fears about the global buildup of carbon dioxide in 1896, noting the vast surge in the burning of coal during the Industrial Revolution.

No one succeeded in measuring the buildup until Keeling, then a 26-year-old atmospheric chemist affiliated with California's Scripps Institution of Oceanography, began his Mauna Loa gas measurements in 1958. In that year, Keeling found an average carbon dioxide concentration of 313 parts per million.

"It's never failed us since. It's gone up every year," Keeling said in a recent interview. Last year, he measured 355 parts per million, an increase of 12 percent just since 1958.

The increasing concentrations are especially critical, since carbon dioxide lingers for more than a century in the atmosphere before breaking down.

Adding to the threat are emissions of methane, nitrous oxide and chlorofluorocarbons, which also are accumulating in the atmosphere and scientists have discovered, helping to trap the Earth's heat.

But uncertainty is as widely accepted a theory as there is in the earth sciences today," Stephen Schneider of the National Center for Atmospheric Research in Colorado wrote in a recently published book "Global Warming."

"Predictions that the Earth will warm, as well as how much, how fast and how the warming will affect individual countries or regions, depend on computer-driven climate models that attempt to approximate the workings of the Earth's atmosphere and oceans; according to MIT climatologist Richard Lindzen,

"These systems are so vast and complex that the computerized models, though increasingly sophisticated, remain crude approximations," he said.

"So far, you don't see man-induced warming in the data, and you don't see it in the models, because they're not good enough," Lindzen said.

Along with the uncertainties over climate models have come missgivings about the costs of limiting emissions, which could be staggering.

Lester Lave, an economist at Pittsburgh's Carnegie-Mellon University, estimated the worldwide annual costs of adhering to one commonly cited emissions-reducing scenario at \$50 billion to \$100 billion.

"On a worldwide basis, it's going to be expensive, so we have to be careful," Lave said.

Yet concerns over the potential dangers of sudden climate change have gained momentum faster than these apprehensions over costs and despite the absence of a confirmed warming trend.

Earth Summit gathers small ideas which could help planet in big ways

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil — Everything seems big here. Even the name, Earth Summit.

Possibly the largest gathering ever of heads of state. Discussion of a United Nations plan for economic development and environmental protection, costing \$625 billion a year. Poverty to be lessened and the environment protected.

Big talk by big people about big money.

But amid the grandeur of it all, there are some small people who are doing small things that help people in a small way.

For example, there is Salar Box Cookers International, Robert Metcalf set up his booth at the Global Forum, a parallel conference by non-governmental groups.

With millions of acres of land being stripped by people in search of firewood, their only affordable source of energy, Metcalf promotes the use of a simple insulated box with a glass window on the top. It traps sunshine and cooks food without other fuel.

"There are 2 billion people in the world today who, when heat is needed, think only of fire," said Metcalf, of Sacramento, Calif.

"The only alternative, if you survive the world, is sunshine. That's all they got."

There is the "Trickle Up Program." This is capitalism at its lowest level.

Started in 1979 by Mildred Robbins Leet and husband, Glen Leet, of New York, it gives \$50 grants to groups of five or more people to start profit-making enterprises.

They must complete a one-page business plan, pledge to invest 1,000 hours of time and reinvest 20 percent of their profits as a continuing source of capital.

"If poor people earn some money, they spend it right away and they're still poor," said Mildred Leet. "They have to learn what rich people learn, that if you have capital you are much better off."

After three months, the group completes a one-page business report and qualifies for a second \$50 grant.

"You need trickle down and trickle up and, in the best of all worlds, they meet in the middle," she said.

Small farmers in Brazil are at the mercy of many things, but mostly their own agricultural skills and banks. Often because the former is inadequate, they lose their land to the latter.

Now about 20 groups have banded as the Alternative Technology Program that funnels low-cost technology or simple techniques to poor farmers.

For example, to prevent erosion in hillside fields, farmers are taught to use a simple device made of wood and rope to show where rows of crops should be planted.

"We bring them technology, new techniques," Lourdes Greybowski said. "It's slow work. But it's showing results."

David Spencer of the Summer Institute of Linguistics admits his group has an ulterior motive in taking languages with no written alpha-

bet and producing one.

"We translate the Bible," he said.

The group lists 7,000 languages in the world, more than 4,000 of them without a written alphabet.

"Until their language is written, they're barred from education, they're barred from being part of the world," Spencer said.

The group has created more than 1,200 alphabets in 50 countries.

"How do you teach someone to read or write — you do it in their own language," he said.

Accomplished character actors don't automatically succeed in leading roles

Last fall, when Danny Ajello was giving interviews for "29th Street," he was exuberant. After receiving acclaim for character parts in such well-received films as "Do the Right Thing," "Moonstruck" and "The Purple Rose of Cairo," he found himself playing starring roles.

"I can't believe how lucky I am," he said at the time. "I've got starring roles in '29th Street' and 'Rudy.' I never thought I'd be playing starring roles."

Through no fault of Ajello's, both the critically praised "29th Street" and the largely dismissed "Rudy" were flops. But the fate of Ajello's starring movies is not singular.

John Goodman, whose television exposure in "Roseanne" has made him known to a wider audience than Ajello, was a bright in "best pal" roles in "Sea of Love," "Always" and "Arachnophobia." Put him in a starring role in "The Babe,"

and no one shows up.

Joe Pesci wins an Oscar for "Goodfellas" and makes wicked comic impressions in such hits as "Lethal Weapon 2" and "Home Alone." But in the title role of "The Super," he is nerve-grinding, and "My Cousin Vinny" was only a modest success. In the current smash "Lethal Weapon 3," his role is only peripheral. Perhaps he has learned that it's best to leave the audience wanting more.

Danny DeVito has managed to become a star, but only when surrounded by bigger stars in lavish, high-concept productions: "Batman Returns," "The War of the Roses."

It is undeniably difficult for character actors to attain stardom in conventional American movies, with their large budgets

and the resultant need for large audiences. In England, Bob Hoskins can play the center of attention in such outstanding films as "Mona Lisa" and "The Long Good Friday." In Hollywood, however, he plays novelty parts in such extravaganzas as "Hook" and "Who Framed Roger Rabbit."

The system is even less generous to character actresses. Talented though Pamela Reed is, she has secured only a wobbly foothold in features. Yet she consistently rises above such material as "Kindergarten Cop" and "Passed Away."

Whoopi Goldberg seems to be the exception. Although she won a "supporting" actress Oscar for "Ghost," she was as responsible for the film's success as the earnest Patrick Swayze and the weepy Demi Moore. After her screen debut in "The Color Purple," she had one modest success ("Jumpin' Jack Flash") and a series of flops ("Burglar," "Fatal Beauty," "Clara's Heart") and the completely ignored "Homer and Eddie."

Best-known performances often given by actors not at top of casting wish list

The common knowledge that the actors you see in a movie may not be the ones originally sought for the roles.

Less common is the situation that arises when an actor is officially signed for a role and then "re-cast." This summer you can see Harrison Ford in "Patriot Games," Michelle Pfeiffer in "Batman Returns," Bruce Willis in "Death Becomes Her," Gene Davis in "A League of Their Own" and Goldie Hawn in "Housesitter."

Originally, Atee Baldwin was set to reprise his "The Hunt for Red October" role as CIA analyst Jack Ryan in "Patriot Games." But a combination of salary and professional demands as well as scheduling conflicts resulted in Ford's being cast. Pfeiffer inherited the role of Catwoman in "Batman Returns" after Annette Bening announced her well-publicized pregnancy.

According to trade paper reports, Kevin Kline was cast as the Beverly Hills plastic surgeon in "Death Becomes Her" — until he demanded a salary equal to those of co-stars Meryl Streep and Goldie Hawn. Willis, anxious for a change of pace after the debacle of "Hudson Hawk," stepped in. Debra Winger stepped out of "A League of Their Own," reportedly in protest of the "stunt casting" of Madonna. She was replaced with Davis, fresh from the success of "Thelma & Louise." When Meg Ryan said she didn't understand the psychology behind the female lead in "Housesitter," Hawn was quick to grasp the situation.

Sean Young has proved the unluckiest person in the game of "cast-out, recast." A riding accident prevented her from starring as Vicki Vale in 1989's "Batman." Kim Basinger replaced her, although Basinger is now being seen in the sequel, Young then was cast as Tess Trueheart in "Dick Tracy," only to be replaced by Glenn

Headly. Producer Warren Beatty said she lacked the maternal nature necessary for her many scenes with the street urchin. Young insisted there were more personal considerations. In any event, when Bening's pregnancy was announced, Young campaigned mightily for the role of Catwoman in "Batman Returns" but to no avail.

Another casting casualty was Eric Stoltz, who was before the cameras for two weeks in "Back to the Future" before being replaced by Michael J. Fox. According to producer Steven Spielberg and director Robert Zemeckis, Stoltz lacked the upbeat tempo necessary for the character. Co-star Leah Thompson said it was like "replacing James Dean with James Caaney."

The saddest case of cast replacement in Hollywood history occurred with the 1950 filming of "Annie Get Your Gun." The Please see CHOICE/B3

Well-known character actors

The list could continue from here to eternity, but here's a sampling of some of our favorite contemporary character actors — and why:

CARRIE FISHER: Who would have thought that the imperial snit, Princess Leia of "Star Wars," would turn into a dandy character actress? Her roles ("When Harry Met Sally ...," "This Is My Life") border on the man-hungry stereotypes of yesterday's character actresses, but her approach is a model of contemporary wit.

WILLEM DAFOE: He can be noble (as in "The Last Temptation of Christ") or profanely sinister ("Wild at Heart"). Either way, he's mesmerizing. When he tries to play leads, as in the recent "White Sands," you sense a fascinating complexity aching to escape the confines of a lead part.

ROBERT DUVAL: Despite his Oscar, he's still a character actor — but he's just about the best we have. When he's on screen, it's hard to look at anyone else. His performances in "Tomorrow" and "Tender Mercies" speak volumes for the inarticulate souls of the world.

SWOOSIE KURTZ: She's found a niche in television — we hope, without neglecting the movies. She seemed destined for blue-collar roles in movies ranging from good ("The World According to Garp") to not-so-good ("Stanley & Iris," "Wildcats"). However, "Dangerous Liaisons" proved she could play upper-class as well.

HECTOR ELIZONDO: His mannerisms are the same, but his appeal also remains constant. He's played a polished hotel manager ("Pretty Woman"), a plumber ("The Flamingo Kid"), a coach ("Necessary Roughness") and the owner of a diner ("Frankie and Johnny"). He was believable in each

Grandparents' medications, vitamins can be injurious to children

DEAR ABBY: Your response to the poison-war from Pesotum motivated me to provide the most recent poisoning statistics compiled by the American Association of Poison Control Centers. In 1991, there were 44 deaths of children under 6 years of age. However, more than 1.8 million poisonings were reported, including nearly 1.1 million accidental poisonings in children under 5 years of age.

Of course, these numbers represent only those poisonings that were reported to poison control centers participating in this surveillance system. Many additional unreported poisonings actually occurred.

A recent study showed that more

than a third of pediatric poisonings from toxic prescription drugs involved the ingestion of grandparent's medication. I cannot imagine any grandparent wanting to be responsible for a life-threatening illness in a grandchild. Imagine your grandchild, comatose in an intensive care unit, with a tube in the stomach, IVs in the arm and a respirator hissing in the background. Yet, grandparents are regularly implicated in childhood poisonings. Perhaps it would help to focus

attention on those household products that are extraordinarily dangerous, and limit our expectations of grandparents to keeping these extreme hazards out of the child's reach. For example, iron supplements should be needless deaths in toddlers in 1991. Other causes of pediatric poisoning deaths were prescription medications, acid toilet bowl cleaners, alkaline cleaning substances (such as drain cleaners), gasoline, kerosene, lamp oil, fabric protector, charcoal lighter fluid, gun bluing and oil of wintergreen. Pesticides, windshield washing solutions and antifreeze also merit special vigilance.

Grandparents can make a difference!

DEAR DR. LITOVITZ: Thank you for your attention-getting letter and for informing me of the correct statistics from the American Association of Poison Control Centers — 1,581,540 poison exposures, reported to your association. Approximately 935,000 of those were accidental poisonings in children under 5 years of age, and 1,072,292 were accidental poisonings in children under the age of 18. Of special interest was the comment, "Extrapolating from reported cases to actual poisonings

allows us to estimate that 2.75 million children under 5 years, and 3.16 million children under 18, were actually poisoned accidentally in 1989."

DEAR ABBY: In a recent column, you asked readers to send in their peeves with respect to the misuse of words. Mine is the frequent statement, especially by news media persons who say "a million and a half dollars" when they mean "one and a half million dollars."

Abby, there is a \$499,999.50 difference between those two. A million and a half dollars can only mean \$1 million and 50 cents. The "half" takes on the dimensions of the

Journalistic fact, fiction blend into hybrid form of infotainment

"Good evening, I'm Connie Chung. In today's news... Murphy Brown gave birth to a baby boy."

"Live! From New York, it's... the Democratic National Convention."

News flash: "Spinal Tap: Heavy Metal Has Beens Blow Back With Their Latest Album, 'Break Like the Wind.'"

Who's going on here?

Connie Chung is a real journalist. Murphy Brown is not. The Democratic National Convention is a real event that will be televised this summer by real news organizations — and by the Comedy Central cable channel. mother-by-choice, with some very real social problems, including the Los Angeles riot.

"The thing that's really disturbing is that Murphy Brown is being talked about as if she were a real person," says Donald K. Fry, who teaches journalism ethics at the Poyner Institute in St. Petersburg, Fla. "In some ways, Murphy Brown is more real than a lot of newswomen. She's crisper. When you write fiction, it's usually to make more sense than real life, because you can get rid of the

shaggy edges. Fiction's being perceived as real isn't new. In 1936, the day before Halloween, Orestes Welles delivered "The War of the Worlds" radio broadcast announcing the invasion of Grover Mill, N.J., by Martians. Panic ensued.

But 1992's citizens have had their television sets for about 40 years. Our children watch it on average more than 20 hours a week on their choice of more than 80 channels. We've seen history unfold on the evening news, then sat transfixed by a prime-time comedy, "War of the Worlds" wouldn't fool us.

"If that broadcast were on tonight, people would chuckle," says media critic Jon Katz. "They'd understand it; they'd be more skeptical."

And yet, the conventional media were outraged by Oliver Stone's film version of the Kennedy assassination, "JFK," claiming it was rewriting history. Some people tuning in to the Comedy Central cable channel's announcement of comedian Sam Kinison's death in a car accident didn't know whether it was real news or especially-dark humor.

The increased mixing of fact and fiction may be the result of a recent

trend: younger people turning away from conventional media, such as newspapers and network news shows, to entertainment media for information on current events.

The Match 5 Rolling Stone featured an article by Katz that has created a stir in the journalism community. Katz, a former editor for the Dallas Times Herald, wrote that entertainment media grapple better with today's issues than conventional media do. He dubbed this phenomenon the "New News."

He cited studies showing that younger Americans are tuning out "The CBS Evening News" and putting aside The New York Times. They're looking to Rolling Stone and Entertainment Weekly to see social issues discussed in a provocative way. In addition to fluffier fare of rock-band profiles and movie reviews, the magazines have tackled topics such as sexual harassment, the environment and racism.

Meanwhile, rap groups such as Public Enemy and N.W.A. have been talking about racial hatred and — prophetically, in view of the Los Angeles riot — relations with the police. The television show "Designing Women" debated both sides of the Anita Hill-Clarence Thomas hearings, and "Murphy Brown" gives a face to gender issues and feminism.

Politicians opened the door for journalists on sitcoms, Fry says.

Quayle appeared on an episode of "Major Dad," former House Speaker Tip O'Neill on "Cheers."

"Murphy Brown" is the most recent example of blurring the line between reality and fiction. The main character, a news anchor, is made more believable by the guest appearances of real news anchors. An episode in May featured Paula Zahn, Katie Couric, Faith Daniels, Joan Lunden and Mary-Alice Williams attending a baby shower for Murphy.

The next morning, Couric was back in her role as morning news show anchor alongside Gumbel. It is possible that viewers would consider what she said as a newswoman as fictional as the lines she delivered the night before?

Fry says just the opposite could happen. "Television validates. And having seen Paula Zahn on 'Murphy Brown,' a very popular show that people believe in, it's likely to make her more believable over in her news context. Why don't we just put Murphy Brown on as the newscaster?"

"Argue for a minute that this might be a good thing," Fry says. "Let me make the argument, though I don't believe in it: If our purpose is to convey reality to the public, and the public believes more in these fictional characters than they do in the real ones, then we might cynically use fictional means to

convey reality to them, as a public service."

That, in fact, is what will happen this summer when cable's Comedy Central channel covers the Democratic and Republican national conventions. Comedian Al Franken, best-known for his appearances on "Saturday Night Live," will host.

The coverage, says Tony Fox, the comedy channel's vice president of media relations, will include analysts representing both ends of the political spectrum, plus unusual commentary and news — "the kind of information that isn't necessarily reported by the traditional news organization."

To some degree, the traditional broadcast networks and even CNN have a tendency to pay lip service to the government and our candidates, in telling a very specific story, the news story. And we don't necessarily have that responsibility," he says. "We don't necessarily have to agree with what people say, because we have no vested interest."

"We can tell the truth through comedy."

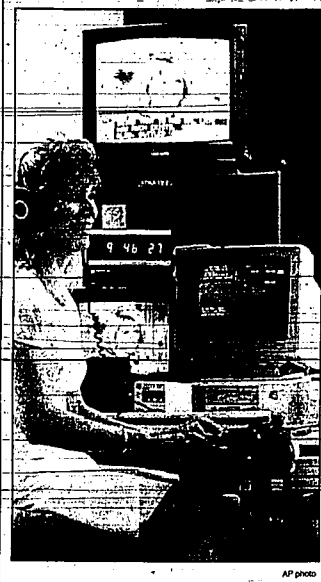

Closed captions

Leno's 'Tonight Show' is latest challenge for captioners

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Jay Leno's name is familiar to millions of television watchers, but this is the way Amy Skwraeu HREPB TPFOE.

It is Bowen's job to create closed captions for television shows. She strokes away on a 25-key steno machine, writing words that lag three seconds — or less — behind the lips of the person who is speaking on the screen.

Leno's debut as host of "The Tonight Show" was Bowen's debut, as well. The start of the Leno era coincided with the first closed-captioning of "The Tonight Show" — NBC Productions hired her employer to do the closed captions.

Captions were started in March 1980 on a handful of TV shows, mostly sitcoms. Now they're on every prime-time program and most commercials on the three biggest networks, said Morgan Bramlet, spokesman for the Alexandria, Va.-based National Captioning Institute, which produces the decoders.

The cost is born by the program's producer, sponsor or network. Any of the nation's estimated 320,000 families with a decoder can receive the captions, which resemble subtitles in a foreign-language film but can be turned on or off at the viewer's will.

One user, Nancy Thego, 69, of Chapel Hill, N.C., lost her hearing five years ago because of a viral infection. She wrote a letter of appreciation to the institute: "TV captioning — the greatest invention since the wheel. ... What a godsend!" she wrote.

"Captioning probably is the wave of the future as the baby boom ages. One in three people over age 60 suffers from hearing loss, said Terri Zuckerman, sales manager for CaptionAmerica, the Pittsburgh-based company that does "The Tonight Show."

It isn't only for the hard-of-hearing, though. Sports fans in noisy bars benefit from captioning, as do immigrants learning English, children learning to read and hospital patients who don't want to disturb sleeping roommates.

Last year, at least 40,000 decoders — about half NCI's sales — were sold to immigrants, Bramlet said.

Soon, television buyers won't need extra electronics to receive the captions. Under federal law, all televisions with screens 13 inches or larger sold in the United States after July 1, 1993, must have built-in decoders.

For all of this technology, the system depends on human captioners like

Bowen. The steno system, they use is based on phonics and uses key combinations that — to the casual onlooker — defy logic, hence the strange spelling of the three syllables of Leno's name.

The system has its flaws. Once, the words "get together" were chewed up and spit back out as "ghetto back coige," according to Jeff Hutchins, general manager of CaptionAmerica. CaptionAmerica is one of three for-profit companies that write subtitles for national programs; the two others, including NCI, are nonprofits.

The captioners are able to hold down the number of such errors by creating electronic dictionaries, telling their computers how to spell certain phonetic combinations.

News shows, CaptionAmerica's specialty, present particular problems because they must be scripted in what captioners call "real time" — while the programs are aired live.

A daily staff of six steno captioners writes for all of NBC's news shows, but the toughest may be "Meet the Press." "It's fast. They don't take many commercial breaks," said Missy Macri, 24.

In three seconds:

The captioners must hear and understand the spoken words and type them in phonetic code into a computer. The computer translates the code back into English.

The words are then beamed to a satellite and bounced back into decoder boxes sitting on top of family televisions.

"We don't even have time to think about it. When you stop and think about it is when you have problems because you get behind," said Bowen, 31.

A former court reporter, Bowen practiced on "The Tonight Show" for two weeks to uncover any problems she might have with the format or the new host.

"He speaks fast. You know, there's a lot of interruption back and forth between the guests," Bowen said.

Hereafter, "The Tonight Show" will be pre-recorded. NBC plans to provide an audio tape of the show so a captioner can write a rough draft. An editor, during real time, will add descriptions of audience reactions like applause or laughter.

Last week, though, Leno was live, and Bowen's preparation paid off with smooth work shifts.

"I think it went really well for Jay Leno, too," she said.

Big type, fun pictures help kids learn

That "Little Mermaid" or "Ninja Turtle" watch may be cute, but when it comes to learning to tell time, a book's better.

Publisher Dorling Kindersley again uses its trademark combination of photos and illustrations to make learning fun with a trio of non-fiction for 2- to 8-year-olds. The youngest will love pointing at the oversized photos; the oldest will be able to read the explanations.

MY FIRST BOOK OF TIME (\$14.95) takes time to deal with how to read a clock as well as the passage of time in terms of weeks, years, and the changing of seasons. This is a delightful oversized reference book with each page broken down into easy-to-digest chunks. The type is big; the vocabulary simple but precise in dealing with the more abstract elements of time (growing older).

There's a smart glossary and index (not only for kids — what a stand for, for example) and a fold-out clock that lets kids practice moving the hands. Digital clocks are also shown.

MY FIRST NUMBER BOOK (\$12.95) has even less text and more photos, as well as lots of counting games. Included are games to match sizes and shapes. Cheers to the editor who laid out 500 beads and 1,000 candies for the final page on BIG Numbers. This book, by the way, is fine if there's no interest in numbers yet. One toddler calls it the food book, because of double-digit numbers on vegetables, numbering 20.

MY FIRST WORD BOOK (\$12.95) groups words and pictures by themes — supermarket, park, toys. The seaside page alone makes it great for the beach. It shouldn't be unusual, but it still is. The photos of kids included a healthy diversity of races.

IN FICTION, MY FIRST BOOK by Louise Voce, Rosalinda Kightley, Tony Wells, Charlotte Knox and Julie Lancombe (Candlewick Press, \$14.95) is a compilation of works on animals, planes, and playground scenes. Young readers are invited to have fun with this: "You can start at the beginning and go through the middle to the end, or you can start at the end and go backward."

Big and bold illustrations offer a mix of the five contributors' styles. Ages 6 months to beginning readers.

In '67, 'Sgt. Pepper' united world of youth

In late 1966, word filtered out that the Beatles would never tour again and that the group was preparing to make an album, which would eventually take a then-unheard-of four months and \$100,000 to record. (In comparison, the Beatles' 1963 debut, "Please Please Me," was recorded in one day at a cost of \$2,000.)

When "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band" was finally released on June 2, 1967, it was perhaps the most widely anticipated rock record ever.

On that day, as he was driving across America, critic Langdon Winner recalls that "in each city where I stopped for gas or food... Laramie, Ogallala, Moline, South Bend — the melodies wafted in from some far-off transistor radio or portable hi-fi. For a brief while, the irreparably fragmented consciousness of the

West was unified, at least in the minds of the young."

"Sgt. Pepper" certainly was no ordinary record. Its cover, designed by Peter Blake, featured the Beatles in satin outfits surrounded by dozens of their heroes: W.C. Fields, Aldous Huxley, Fred Astaire, Bob Dylan, Laurel and Hardy. Inside its fold-out sleeve were comic-book cut-out items such as a paper mustache and a Sgt. Pepper picture card, and the song lyrics were printed on the back-cover (a common occurrence now, but a rarity in those days).

The music itself was playful, grandiose, relentlessly catchy and trivial — sometimes all at once. The epic "A Day in the Life," which was compared to T.S. Eliot's "Waste Land" by a following Newsweek critic, was actually two unrelated songs pasted together. But it built a furious momentum, with John Lennon chanting "I'd love to turn you on" (triggering all sorts of drug denunciations from John Birchers and

the like) as a 41-piece orchestra swirled capotophonously around him, climaxing with a final chord that was drawn out for a staggering 45 seconds.

Other tracks were not nearly so dense and disruptive, especially Paul McCartney's maudlin "She's Leaving Home" and George Harrison's Indian trance, "Within You, Without You."

All the while, the Beatles seemed to be winking at their listeners, constructing a grand joke that everyone who wasn't a square could share. The solemnness of "Within You, Without You" is shattered by raucous laughter, an eight-second tone-audible-only-to-dogs-gives-way to a bit of gibberish called "Inner Groove," and the album cover is laced with humorous details: marijuana plants, a wan Buddha figure, a small sign welcoming the Rolling Stones.

It wasn't a masterpiece, but "Sgt. Pepper" lived up to the claim made on its back sleeve: "A splendid time is guaranteed for all!"

This summer a blockbuster for concerts

Stadiums aren't just for baseball this summer.

From heavy-metal noisemakers Metallica to English veterans Elton John and Eric Clapton, rockers will elbow pitchers and catchers out of the way that huge open air arenas in the coming months.

And concert bookers are hoping that putting a feast of famous musicians out on the road will erase the bitter memory of last year's too quiet and too costly summer season.

"It will probably be the biggest stadium season in history," said promoter Jim Koplik, whose Metropolitan Entertainment is based just outside of New York City.

In contrast to last summer, when the Grateful Dead was the only band performing in large stadiums, this year will see summer tours from rock 'n' roll's old and new guards.

Following a series of sold-out shows this spring, Irish rockers U2 are expected back this summer for some outdoor events, said Gary Bongiovanni, editor of the concert trade publication Pollstar.

Metallica is teaming with Guns 'N' Roses for a double bill of the current kings of the heavy metal world. For teen-agers on the other side of the musical spectrum, the Cure will spread their gospel of romantic gloom.

Clapton and John are teaming up for a stadium tour. The English band

Genesis will go it alone for concerts across the country.

The Grateful Dead will be back as well, mixing dates at Giants Stadium outside of New York City and RFK Stadium in Washington, with multiple night stands at indoor arenas.

Although he's expected to stick with indoor arenas, longtime concert favorite Bruce Springsteen is also causing excitement in the live music business.

"It's going to definitely be better than last year," Bongiovanni said.

Talking about the summer of 1991 is like reminding concert promoters of a root-canal appointment. A combination of a recession and a lackluster lineup of concerts proved deadly.

Business was so bad that a concert promoters' association took the unusual step of naming the artists that cost them the most money. The promoters said these stars demanded big advanced payments and couldn't bring in enough fans to cover the costs. Artist managers pointed out that competition between promoters helped jack up the prices.

Bongiovanni said concert promoters have exhibited more caution this year, which should help fans because ticket prices will be relatively stable or, in some cases, even lower than last year.

The circuit for open-air amphitheaters, where the bulk of the summer concert business is concentrated, has some intriguing shows and a lot of retreats.

One of last summer's few success stories, the Lollapalooza tour that mixed alternative, rap and metal acts, will have a sequel this year that stars the Red Hot Chili Peppers.

B.B. King is headlining a blues-oriented show featuring the Fabulous Thunderbirds, Buddy Guy and Dr. John. Ringo Starr is taking a new All-Star band on the road. Former Steely Dan leaders Walter Becker and Donald Fagen lead a group of musicians in the "New York Rock and Soul Revue."

Several acts are teaming up, such as the Moody Blues and Chicago, Little Feat and George Thorogood, Paula Abdul and Color Me Badd, Ozzy Osbourne and Ugly Kid Joe, and the Allman Brothers Band and Blues Traveler.

"Packaging is really the key," said promoter Danny Zelisko, whose Evening Star Productions is based in Phoenix. "You can't just throw the same bands that have been playing the same old songs out there with a comedian or a nothing band."

Some acts pop up about as regularly as fireflies every summer. Industry experts will be watching such acts as James Taylor, Jimmy Buffett, the Beach Boys, Steve Miller, Crosby, Stills and Nash and Peter, Paul and Mary — many of them several years removed from their latest hit — to see if they still have drawing power.

Country music's drawing power will be tested by several acts on the

road, including Wynonna Judd, Hank Williams Jr. and Patty Loveless. Reba McEntire and Vince Gill and Travis Tritt and Marty Stuart.

Other acts trying the amphitheater circuit this summer include John Mellencamp, the Indigo Girls, Spinal Tap, Iron Maiden, Natalie Cole, Harry Connick Jr., Linda Ronstadt, Emerson, Lake and Palmer and Rush.

Based on business this winter and spring, promoters are optimistic they can put last year's nightmare behind them.

"There's bound to be a few soft ones, but I don't think there's the overwhelming percentage of soft ones as there was last year," Zelisko said.

'Sister Act' takes average material and works magic

HOLLYWOOD — "Sister Act" doesn't break new ground—plot isn't particularly original, its director is in no one's pantheon, and it doesn't feature actors doing anything you never imagined they could do. All it does is make you laugh.

—And laugh:
—And laugh some more.

"Sister Act" is a tribute to those often denigrated qualities, slickness and professionalism. Graced with a clever script, a cast that will make you smile until you ache, and a snappy sense of pace, "Sister Act" is the funniest by-the-numbers comedy in who knows how long; one of those rare occasions where everything almost magically falls into place.

The engine that drives "Sister Act" from start to finish is the tracheal mistress of the double take, Whoopi Goldberg. Entertaining as she was in her Oscar-winning performance in "Ghost," she is even stronger here in much more of a starring role, appearing in almost every situation and easily holding her own among some of the most adroit scene-stealers.

"Sister Act" (rated PG) opens with a brief prelude in a parochial school.

Review

A mischievous teen-ager (Isis Carmen Jones, a dead ringer for the star) is asked by a stern nun to name the four apostles. "John, Paul, George and Ringo," comes the elfin reply, causing the exasperated sister to grip her teeth and ask, "Have you any ideas what girls like you become?"

Just like that we cut to the most marginal of lounges in Reno, and a girl group knockoff captained by the selfsame Deloris Van Cartier (Goldberg). The songs are familiar Motown standards, the entertainment value uncertain, and the sparse audience of compulsive gamblers—and hopeless insomniacs—is understandably stingy with applause, but hey, nobody said show business was going to be easy.

Deloris has a personal as well as a professional interest in Reno: Her married boyfriend, Vince LaRocca (an amusing Harvey Keitel), is a big cheese in the hierarchy of organized crime. Fed up with Vince's refusal to break with his wife and the feeble pace of her career, Deloris is about to quit both Reno and LaRocca when she accidentally witnesses a murder.

Persuaded by tough cop Eddie

Mulcahy ("Regarding Henry's" energetic therapist Bill Nunn) to testify for the prosecution. Deloris faces the problem of where to safely hide until the trial begins. It's Eddie who comes up with the solution: a small, cloistered community of Carmelite sisters in San Francisco. The high-living Deloris is not exactly wild, but the idea ("There's nothing but a lot of white women dressed as nuns," she complains, not unreasonably) that Eddie makes her see that it's truly the last place Vince and his cronies would think to look.

The heart of the film, the influence the convent has on Deloris, and vice versa, is conveyed with a maximum of manic good humor. Again and again, just when you're fearful "Sister Act" will run out of steam, the script comes up with unexpected moments (the sisters do things in a biker bar, for instance, that would give even Eddie Murphy pause) and show-stopping situations that gleefully demand your attention.

As critical as good lines are, actors having the wherewithal to deliver them with brio are even more so. It's here that "Sister Act" really shines. Starting at the top of the order, Maggie Smith as the iron-fisted mother superior who is definitely not amused by Deloris is the ideal foil for Goldberg's limber performance. "God has brought you here," she says with exemplary hauteur.

"Take the hint."
Whether it is in a monster hit like "Dirty Dancing" or other films that didn't do quite so well, director Emile Ardolino never gave any indi-

cation that he could be so adept a director of comedy, so good (no doubt with the help of editor Richard Halsey) at keeping the pace lively and the spirits high. Still, ours is for-

tunately not to reason why, ours is merely to be grateful and enjoy a comedy that reminds you how good it feels to simply sit back and laugh out loud.

Religious setting has many precedents in history of the movies

Any picture parading Goldberg as a nun has got to be kidding—and "Sister Act" is a world-class kiddie. All right—the movie's Goldberg happens to be—would you believe—Whoopi—in all her liveliness.

She plays a Reno singer on the run from the mob because of extravagantly bad timing (i.e., she walks into a room where her gangland beau, Harvey Keitel, is having an underling blown away). The feds get her to a nunnery, pronto; and stashed there out of harm's way until killer Keitel can be brought to justice and she can safely sing him.

Such is the stuff of surefire sitcoms—and has been for time im-

memorial. Hollywood has a history of cloaking conspicuous, improbable types in priest robes and nun habits, and the contrast of this disguise (worldly characters—in saintly camouflage)—works for comedy as well as drama.

Eric Idle and Robbie Coltrane were the most recent to pick up the habits as 1990's "Nuns on the Run," a pair of petty Brit hoodies who try to double-cross their violent boss but bungle the job and go undercover inside Janet Suzman's convent. While there, roly-poly Robbie shows a certain ardent enthusiasm for coaching "Girls Gyn" that leaves him in a cold sweat and almost blows his cover.

Closer to home but farther from the funny bone—1989's "We're No Angels"—presented Robert De-Niro

and Sean Penn as escaped convicts in priestly garb, mugging unconvincingly to make up for the lack of laughs in David Mamet's rewrite of Sam and Bella Spewack's stage comedy, "My Three Angels." The cleric camouflage wasn't used when the play was first filmed in 1955 (with Humphrey Bogart, Aldo Ray and Peter Ustinov playing Santa Clauses from Devil's Island).

But in Bogart's very next film, "The Left Hand of God," he did don priest's clothing to escape the brutal rule of Chinese warlord Lee J. Cobb, settling in a mission where he kept up this priestly pretense by heading up on his duties in the mission library. In a showdown with Cobb, Bogart reverted to his secular ways and successfully won safety for his village via a crap shoot.

In 1968's "The Guns for San Sebastian," a village on the other side of the world—in 18th-century Mexico—is similarly saved (from Charles Bronson and his Yaqui Indians) by a bandito (Anthony Quinn), who takes up the cause—and the

cloak—of a dead Franciscan priest (Sam Jaffe).

Blackguards and bad guys frequently resort to saintly subterfuge. Rod Steiger in "No Way to Treat a Lady" (1968) and Dennis Price in "Kind Hearts and Coronets" (1950) committed at least one murder each as kindly priests making house calls. Alfred Hitchcock tipped the true sinister nature of the nun (Catherine Lacy) in 1938's "The Lady Vanishes" by giving her fellow train passengers a glimpse of something shocking—her high heels.

Another saintly fashion note from Hitchcock came in 1953's "I Confess," in which a Quebec church sexton (O.E. Hasse) borrowed priest Montgomery Cliff's cassock, committed murder first and confessed the deed to Cliff, whose holy oath prevented him from revealing the killer's identity. And in "The Counterfeit Trailor" (1962), Lilli Palmer revealed in holy confession to a fake priest she was an Allied agent, and this subsequently led to her Gestapo execution.

Cleric garb has always been up ef-

fective way of taking off the police heat. Con-artist Paul Douglas tried it out in 1952's "When in Rome," attending the Holy Year pilgrimage in Italy, and becoming inadvertently attached to the holy cloth, seeing the error of his ways.

Peter Sellers, a man of many disguises, has had it both ways in terms of religious frocks: A bogus priest was one of his contrived stunts in "After the Fox" (1966), and, in "The Magic Christian" (1969), impersonating the richest eccentric in the world, he turned up briefly as "a disco nun" in one of his multi-disguise

demonstrations that any man can be corrupted by money.

Peter Cook and Dudley Moore ranced through assorted guises, too, when they took after "Fausi" in their 1967 spoof, "Bedazzled." Short-order cook Moore sells his soul to Satan (Cook) for seven wishes, all of them squandered on conquering waitress Eleanor Bron—and all of them crazily coming to empty.

Wish No. 6—to be "warm, loving, outgoing"—tuns all three of them into nuns of the Order of the Leaping Berclians. It is, as ever, the Devil to pay.

Stylishly gloomy 'Alien 3' looks good, but lacks soul

ALIEN 3 (R). The last go-round for Sigourney Weaver's plucky Lt. Ripley and the horrific monsters who've been pursuing her from film to film. "Alien 3" goes in a gloomy new direction: a cast-iron sac with no exit, a vision of universal rot and breakdown. The cast, mostly British—, is good, and the film has an eerie, nightmare prison look, thanks to the designers and cinematographer Alex Thomson. But first-time director David Fincher, a rock-video specialist—, gives the movie, alternately, too-much style and not enough soul or guts. This film caps the series interestingly, but not smashingly.

ENCINO MAN (PG). Pleasantly dopey comedy about a cave-man un-cared-in the Valley. Not up to "Wayne's World," but MTV "personality" Pauly Shore scores a few laughs.

FAR AND AWAY (PG-13). Nicole Kidman and Tom Cruise star as a figurative princess and a genuine pauper who end up traveling together from Ireland to the free shores of the United States in director Ron Howard's, rather silly, attempt at an old-fashioned, audience-pleasing epic. Shot in vivid 65 mm, it is "strong" in terms of production values but weak as watery tale and it comes to little things like dialogue and character development.

FERNGULLY ... THE LAST RAINFOREST (G). With its bright

colors, upbeat rock sound track and strong ecological message, this modest but promising animated film should delight children and amuse their older siblings and parents. In his feature debut, director Bill Kroyer manages to keep the action moving, although he's saddled with a very talky script that tells the story through words, rather than visuals. The animation looks reasonably fluid, although the characters really don't do much acting.

Accident in Ketchum critically injures man

KETCHUM — A 51-year-old Australia native remained in a coma at a Boise hospital Thursday night after a one-car accident in Ketchum.

Gary James Bennett of Killara, New South Wales, was flown by helicopter to St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center after his car rolled onto its side at 12:10 a.m., an Idaho State Police dispatcher said.

Killara did not have his lights on, and was driving on the wrong side of Warm Springs Road at about 65 mph in a 35 mph zone, the dispatcher said.

Ketchum police officers had to take evasive action to avoid being hit by Bennett, she said. His car hit a telephone pole and a power pole before rolling onto its right side. The engine began smoking, but officers used fire extinguishers to keep the car from burning, the dispatcher said.

Officials charge Twin Falls man with molesting girl

TWIN FALLS — Investigators say a Twin Falls man charged with molesting a Kimberly girl claims to be in love with the girl and wants to marry her.

Terrance L. Martin, 34, 1893 Second Ave. E., is charged with lewd and lascivious conduct and aggravated battery involving a 13-year-old girl.

In an affidavit in Martin's court file, Cpl. Bob Gauthier of the Twin Falls County Sheriff's office said Martin has admitted fondling the girl on several occasions between 1987 and 1989.

"Martin phoned Health and Welfare (recently) ... where he inquired as to whether a 13-year-old could be forced to marry a 30-year-old," Gauthier said in the affidavit.

In addition to the molesting charge, Martin is accused of trying to strangle the girl in 1989 when he became jealous.

Bond for Martin was set at \$20,000 and a preliminary hearing is set for June 12.

Twin Falls weapons store reports guns, knife missing

TWIN FALLS — Several valuable guns and a commando knife have been reported stolen from a Twin Falls store.

The owner of Horror's Stocks, located at 169 Madonna St., told police that seven guns, mostly handguns, and an Australian commando knife worth \$1,000 are missing from the business.

Total value of the missing guns is estimated at \$3,850, according to a Twin Falls police report. No suspects were reported.

Idaho red ink shouldn't affect tax refunds, official assures

BOISE — Concerned about whether the state's projected \$10 million budget shortfall will delay your income tax refund? Don't worry, says a member of the State Tax Commission.

Commissioner Bob Fry says most tax refunds should be out by the middle of June, unless there is a mathematical error or other problem with the return.

"I believe we have most of the refunds out the door right now," Fry said.

The state has 60 days from the April 15 filing deadline to send out refunds. After that date, Fry said, 12 percent interest begins accruing, so the state wouldn't save any money by delaying refunds.

Besides, he said, the projected shortfall is only about 1 percent of the General Fund budget, and the state has the cash on hand to make good on refund checks.

"It's probably more of a political problem than an economic problem," he said.

Relive history next week at Jerome Crossroads project

Symms heads for Rio on a mission

coming years. The senators will conduct four days of meetings with international leaders.

Long a champion of private-property rights, Symms skewered critics who seek public control of land through

environmental regulations. He cited the example of the former Soviet Union and Warsaw Pact nations as a worst-case scenario in the area of government control run amok.

"There's overwhelming evidence that those countries that have given government absolute control of the resources have done the worst job of protecting their environment," the senator said.

"As we leave for the conference, I think we all take with us the hope that it will mark the beginning of a new environmental awareness, this time on a global scale."

Anti-gang group seeks help from Boys and Girls Clubs

TWIN FALLS — Helping young people develop self-esteem and giving them a place to channel their energies is the goal of a national group being asked to set up shop in Twin Falls.

The Boys and Girls Clubs of America is 130 years old and has chapters across the country.

Regional Service Director Bobby Jackson was in town Thursday at the request of a local group trying to stem the growth of local youth gangs.

Jackson said the record of the clubs is impressive when it comes to reducing drug abuse and teen pregnancies. Neighborhoods with Boys and Girls Clubs also see higher school attendance rates and less vandalism, he said.

"It won't immediately solve the problems," Jackson cautioned, but over

the long run, the presence of the club will make a real difference in the community.

"I've never had anyone place a dollar value on a kid's life," Jackson said. "I would like to know I have made a little difference."

Making a difference is the goal of CARGO — Community Action to Reduce Gang Organization — which formed earlier this year to find solutions to the area's fledgling gang problem.

A CARGO subcommittee is looking for a building and some funding to get a local Boys and Girls Club off the ground.

The club provides programs ranging from homework help and computer classes, to sports programs and arts and crafts.

Jackson showed Thursday's gathering a video in which one girl said "There's 8,000 things I like about the club."

Many projects begin in an existing building, such as a school, then grow into

new facilities as community support grows, Jackson said.

Wherever it is located, the club should be willing walking or bike-riding distance of most of the children in the area.

Raising money to put up a building is relatively easy, Jackson said. Finding consistent sources of money to pay for upkeep and programs is more difficult.

The clubs serve a real need in communities where most of the activities, like little league baseball, require fees. Club dues can be set low enough that anyone can join, Jackson said.

The next step for the local group is to compile information for a community needs assessment, which Jackson and his staff will compile. That document will help community leaders see what holes need to be filled, he said.

If all goes well, Twin Falls is nine to 13 months away from having a Boys and Girls Club, Jackson said.

All Idaho students will require shots

TWIN FALLS — Last year, an elementary school student had to show evidence of being immunized to get in the door on the first day of school.

Next fall, secondary school students will have to do the same thing.

A law passed by the Idaho Legislature last winter requires that all students in kindergarten through 12th grade must show school officials they've had their shots before they enter school next fall.

The idea is to provide better protection from childhood illnesses that are preventable, said Kim Kvale, registered nurse with the South-Central District Health Department.

The new rules are simple, Kvale said. On the first day of school, all students must be able to produce evidence they've been vaccinated for diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, polio, mumps, measles and rubella. Those students who are updating their immunizations will be allowed to attend school only if they show proof of being in

the process.

Families that don't want their kids immunized for medical, religious or personal reason must sign waiver forms available from the schools. That means that in the event of an outbreak of a communicable disease, those children will be kept out of school until after the disease abates.

Kvale estimates 10 to 25 percent of parents with kids in school throughout the Magic Valley will be receiving letters soon notifying them to update their kids' immunizations.

Trial set in rail death

Arizona man will face court for pushing fellow drifter off moving train

SHOSHONE — Hitching a ride on a freight train last month proved to be a fatal decision for a 35-year-old California drifter.

According to preliminary hearing testimony from another wandering train rider, Samuel Wayne Thurmond was asleep when a man named "Butch" pushed him from the door of the moving train near Kinama the night of May 22.

After the two-hour hearing Thursday, 5th District Magistrate R. Barry Wood ordered "Butch" — 38-year-old Melvin Atkinson — to stand trial in District Court on a charge of first-degree murder.

A second charge of attempted murder was reduced to assault with intent to commit a serious felony.

Atkinson, whose last known address was Phoenix, is being held at the Gooding County Jail in lieu of \$500,000 bond.

The prosecution's key witness in the case is Heinz Eppelmann, a 22-year-old Las Vegas construction worker who said he joined Thurmond on the train in Ogden, Utah, "for the experience."

The afternoon Union Pacific freight train rumbled through Shoshone, whistle blowing, as Eppelmann described how five hobos killed time in Pocatello before the train departed.

Eppelmann said he got "a buzz" from a 40-ounce beer, then he and the others paraded for money to buy more.

The five of them — Eppelmann, Sam, Butch, and two fellows named "Pops" and "Tennessee" — got on the westbound UP freight and headed for Oregon.

Eppelmann said he met Sam at a shelter for the homeless in Ogden last year, and soon hopped his first train ride from Utah to Portland, Ore.

The two bummed around Portland for a couple of months before Eppelmann returned to his job in Las Vegas, he said.

He had such a good time, Eppelmann decided to repeat the trip this year.

Of the five itinerant passengers who left Pocatello, however, only two made it to the train's next stop in Mountain Home.

A short time after the train left, Eppelmann said "Butch" asked if he had ever killed someone.

"You ought to try it; it's fun," Eppelmann recalled the man saying.

With that, "Butch" pushed the man named "Tennessee" out of the train car, probably somewhere in Power County, Lincoln County Prosecutor LaVon Loynd said.

Tennessee survived the fall, but Loynd said he doesn't know how badly he was hurt or if any charges have been filed in Power County.

Sam Thurmond, drunk on beer and sleeping, was the next to go, Loynd said.

Lincoln County Coroner Francis Bergin said officials believe Thurmond was born in California, but no relatives have been found.

Thurmond "is from all over," Bergin said. After Thurmond was pushed out of the train, Eppelmann said he feared for his own life and attacked "Butch," trying to push him out of the train.

"I thought I was going to die that day," he said.

Eppelmann said he wrestled the man to the ground.

Friends, relatives will recall noted Twin Falls native

TWIN FALLS — Jonathan Robert Tyson Hughes' long journey from Twin Falls High School will come full circle Saturday.

Hughes, the first Twin Falls resident ever to win a Rhodes Scholarship, died of cancer May 30 in Evanston, Ill., at the age of 64. He'll be remembered at a memorial service at 1 p.m. Saturday at the Twin Falls LDS Stake Center, 421 Maurice St. N.

"An economist, historian, banker, author and amateur clarinetist of some note," Hughes spent the last 30 years of his life at

Northwestern University, publishing a dozen books on economics, including a prize-winning volume, "The Vital Few: The Entrepreneur and American Economic Progress."

John Panzar, chairman of the department of economics at Northwestern, said Wednesday that Hughes was one of the

originators of quantitative methods in American economic history and was a leader in making Northwestern the center of economic history in the U.S.

"His gifts as a writer put most economists to shame in terms of clarity of exposition," Panzar said. "Economists are not noted for their clear, flowing prose. John's prose reads more like a novelist

than an economist. That's one of the reasons why his work was so widely noticed."

Born in Wenatchee, Wash., Hughes came to Twin Falls, his mother's hometown, as an infant after his father was killed in an auto accident. He graduated from TFHS in 1946 and attended Utah State University, from which he graduated in 1950 with a degree in economics.

After two years of graduate work at the University of Washington, Hughes won a Rhodes Scholarship to England's Oxford University, where he earned a doctor of philosophy in economics in 1955.

Following stints with the Federal Reserve Bank of New York and teaching at

Purdue University, he joined the economics department at Northwestern in 1962, where he earned a succession of academic and professional honors.

But despite his success as an economist, he never gave up his love of music. At Twin Falls High, Hughes played clarinet and saxophone in dance bands, performing 1940's classics such as "In the Mood," "Tuxedo Junction" and "One O'Clock Jump."

His former sweetheart, Dorothy Thompson, said he used to call her on the phone and play his clarinet for hours.

"Finally my sister and I would put the

Federal surplus commodities for feeding needy runs low

TWIN FALLS — The supply of federal government commodities used to feed the poor is starting to dry up just as demand is growing in the Magic Valley.
"We're still able to meet the demand, but a lot of the commodities we used to get we're just not seeing anymore," said Cyd Dillon, who handles commodities distribution for South Central Community Action Agency. "They cut out the cheese a long time ago, and now we're seeing fewer items like canned pork that a family can use for a meal."
Thousands of hungry Americans are finding bare shelves at free food pantries around the country because the federal government has nearly run out of surplus flour, corn meal, canned goods and peanut butter.
The Agriculture Department says its warehouses of surplus commodities are almost empty and it has spent nearly all of the \$120 million budgeted this year to buy canned goods and other food for distribution to low-income Americans.
Some of the purchased food may still be in the pipeline, but anti-hunger activists worry it won't last long once it's distributed to the states.
That's ominous news for Community Action, the agency in charge of distributing commodities and other federal help to low-income people in eight Magic Valley counties.
A year ago at this time, the organization was serving about 2,000 households. Now it's 2,500.
"Our demand used to be very seasonal," Dillon said. "We used to see a lot of people in December and February, but now we're seeing almost as many in June (usually a period of plentiful work on farms and in the food-processing industry), and that concerns me."
Congressional Democrats say the recession that has pushed a record 26.7 million Americans — more than one 10 onto the food stamp rolls is also increasing demand for USDA's emergency food donations.
Activists say food stamp benefits run out before the end of the month, so many families must stretch their meals with USDA giveaways.
USDA distributes the surplus commodities and purchased foods to the states under the Emergency Food Assistance Program. The states then provide the food to local pantries or community groups.
But some states have canceled distribution efforts, due to short supplies, said Phil Shanholzer, spokesman for USDA's Food and Nutrition Service.
Last year, the program reached an average 2.5 million households a month, or an estimated 6 million to 7 million people, he said.
"Lots add lots of people really, really need this food," said Gori Ireny, senior policy analyst for the Food Research and Action Center, a Washington-based anti-hunger advocacy group.
At its height in the mid-1980s, the program was giving away \$1 billion a year. But government farm policies have helped empty the USDA warehouses that once overflowed with cheese and wheat.
Last year, the department gave away \$91.3 million in surplus commodities and \$120 million in purchased foods.
Another policy that has helped reduce surplus is USDA's use of export subsidies at a cost this year of \$1.2 billion, to promote sales of U.S. farm products overseas.
"There is something very wrong with USDA's policy when they aggressively subsidize overseas food exports at the same time commodities are being denied to food banks, school nutrition programs and soup kitchens," Rep. Bill Wroblewski (D-W.Va.) told The Associated Press.
USDA contends the export subsidies are a bargaining chip with the European Community in the debate over international trade talks.

said Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., who chairs the Environmental Protection Subcommittee of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee.
Baucus said he wants to emphasize the role of environmental protection in trade relations throughout his stay in Rio.
Long a champion of property rights, Symms, also a member of the Environment panel, said he will remind world leaders to consider the impact on the economy when setting environmental standards.
Symms is one of few lawmakers who have praised President Bush's dealings leading up to the Earth Summit. Environmentalists and congressional Democrats have blasted Bush for weakening a treaty to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, as well as other agreements.
Symms said scientists are divided on the seriousness of global warming, and the United States should not take steps that could harm the economy without conclusive proof.
"I do not believe it is in the best interest of the United States as a world leader to become a party to actions based on extraordinarily subjective and often blatantly wrong information," Symms said. "And I own the presidential portfolio for recognizing the potential pitfalls of signing agreements based of that information."
The senators also will observe the proceedings as part of their advise-and-consent role for all treaties agreed to by the president. When the time comes, Sen. Paul Wellstone, D-Minn., said he will vote in favor of treaties on climate change and biodiversity even though he believes much more action is needed.
"There is still time for the United States to play a constructive role in meeting the global environmental challenge, instead of being branded an international outlaw," Wellstone said.
The other senators traveling to Rio are Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I.; Sen. Bob Graham, D-Fla.; Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass.; Sen. Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J.; Sen. Larry Pressler, R-S.D.; and Sen. Tim Wirth, D-Colo.

ground, but "Pops" — identified as 52-year-old Donald Hastings of Salt Lake City — pulled him off.
"Butch" then pulled a knife and told Eppelmann "you're a dead man," Loynd said.
Eppelmann said he tumbled and landed out of the train car, and seem to have lost consciousness for some time.
Hastings has been charged with being an accessory to murder after the fact, but unless more evidence is presented, Wood said that charge will not stand.
The most severe charge Hastings can face based on Thursday's hearing, appears to be misdemeanor battery, the judge said. He will make a final decision today after further research, he said.
After he regained consciousness, Eppelmann said he walked down the tracks hoping to find Sam Thurmond. He was disoriented, however, and began walking west, away from the spot Thurmond had been thrown from the train, he said.
Eppelmann said he was a "public defender Steve Swenson, said officials still don't know exactly what caused Thurmond's death other than severe head injuries.
"He could have jumped from the train himself, or been hit by another train or been pushed by someone else, Swenson said.
"I don't think we will ever know what happened in that train car," he said.
Swenson said Eppelmann's testimony is unreliable because he admitted drinking 76 ounces of beer during the day before jumping on the train.
"That's a lot of beer," Swenson said.

Jerome ponders Twin Falls fire truck offer

JEROME — The city of Jerome could obtain a new aerial fire truck if city officials accept an offer from the Twin Falls fire department.

The used truck would cost about \$30,000, including equipment valued at \$10,000. Jerome City Administrator Larry Paine told council members Tuesday.

"We should be able to find that much in the budget," he said.

The truck has been rebuilt and will be re-certified, he said.

"We're looking at combining the aerial truck with a new pumper truck," he said.

Councilman Rocky Jackson asked where the truck would be kept, since the City Hall was not large enough. A new building could cost from \$300,000 to \$500,000, Paine said.

"Maybe a block grant could be used for the building," he said. Twin Falls would store the truck temporarily, and assist in finding a storage place if necessary, he said.

Voiters had rejected a proposal to purchase a truck in the past.

"There is no way to get above a fire on Main Street and get water on the fire walls," said Fire Chief Jim Auclair. The fire department rating would be improved, which would reduce fire insurance of city property owners, he assured.

A funding plan will be presented to the council at a July 15 budget workshop.

The city also received approval to have a city administrator as a result of members' unanimous vote by council members.

The council approved the newly established position that has been held by Larry Paine. It will involve

overseeing personnel and finances for the city, managing city business transactions and advising the council.

In other business, the council:

- Heard a report from Jackson that filtration problems had been encountered at the recently opened city swimming pool.
- "We cannot keep up the buildings parks, rest rooms and hire staff on the \$33,000 to \$34,000 a year we get," Jackson said. "It just doesn't work. We've begged, borrowed and stole for five years. We need to come up with something to present to the citizens. This way the burden won't be on a few, but shared by all."
- Jackson said much of the costs for operating the pool had come from donations.
- Approved hiring Lisa Musgrave, Grant Lolly and Elizabeth Whitechurch as swimming pool lifeguards at \$4.50 per hour.

Heard a report from Jim Vining of Trans IV transportation company that from 60 to 65 people from Jerome used the Trans IV buses on a daily basis. The council was asked to put \$1,100 in next year's budget for the service, a reduction from \$2,000 in this year's budget.

Vining said "Trans IV would provide a vehicle for transporting senior citizens if a sponsoring agency would assume dispatch functions."

Four years ago, Woody moved to the Magic Valley and died in November, 1991 at Applegate Retirement Center in Buhl. She is buried at Dry Creek Cemetery in Boise.

Khtean-Keeton donated the painting along with other of Woody's pieces to the library several months ago.

They felt it was proper to give the painting in Woody's memory to an institution of learning because of her love of books and history.

Bliss council approves funds for fireworks

BLISS — The City Council donated \$100 to the Bliss Chamber of Commerce fireworks fund, bringing to \$900 the total raised by the chamber during its 3-month drive to bring fireworks back to the city's 4th of July celebration.

In other City Council business, the city will purchase safety alarms

for the city backhoe and dump truck. The alarms will sound when the vehicles are in reverse.

Councilman Joe Pruett will contact the State Highway District office in Shoshone about placing "No Parking" signs on Highway 30 through Bliss.

Pruett said freight trucks are regularly parked along the highway, obstructing views of oncoming traffic.

Jerome schools' budget on tap

JEROME — Jerome School District will hold a budget review session Monday.

The meeting is set for 7:30 p.m. in the district conference room at 107 Third Ave. W.

Although negotiations with teachers have not been completed, the proposed budget includes a one percent salary increase for teachers and a freeze on benefits, said Mike Gibson, school business manager.

The Jerome School District lost \$79,167 in state funding. This decrease must be taken out of the school supply budget, Gibson said.

The district received \$262,000 from the state — reimbursement for busing students attending double sessions in the Jerome Middle School.

Those funds will be put back in the fund balance account, he said. That will be balanced somewhat by an anticipated overall decrease of \$30,000 in revenue from the state and locally, Gibson said.

Student enrollment is projected to remain the same as in the current year. The board's monthly meeting will begin at 8 p.m.

Deaf youths prepare for annual Sawtooth outing

GOODING — Area deaf youths will happily take part in the second annual Sawtooth Camp for the Deaf next week. But while the kids will have a good time whitewater rafting in the Salmon river, fishing and horseback riding, they will also learn a few things they didn't expect to.

Camp director Tim Elstad of the Idaho School for the Deaf and the Blind, which is sponsoring the 6-day adventure, says the kids will possibly learn they're more capable than they believed.

"Summer camp provides a learning environment not often accessible to the deaf," said Elstad, the school's dean of students. "Hands-on outdoor living promotes self-esteem, including a positive feeling toward deafness."

Campers learn how to use a compass, read maps, set up tents, and apply basic first aid and survival skills, he said.

A total of 34 youths between 12 and 15 will take part in the unique camp June 7 to 13, staying in cabins on Alturas Lake near Stanley.

"Two-thirds of the kids are from ISDB and one-third are from public schools throughout Idaho," Elstad said.

"This year, the school's cook, Rose Harwood, will be going with the campers," said Pat Nelson, ISDB's director of special services. "She will do most of the cooking, but the kids will be giving her a lot of help."

Elstad said he breaks up the campers into groups of 12 because children can have closer social interaction among them during the outdoor activities.

"While each group experiences

the same activities, they participate in them on different days," Elstad said.

When one group is on their overnight camp out, another will be on a whitewater float trip on the Salmon river. The float trips are one-day guided tours with the campers packing their own lunches. The trip starts at the Sunbeam Dam 11 miles downstream from Stanley and ends wherever the campers tell their guides they want to go ashore.

Each camper group has an overnight camp out accompanied by three adults from the school staff who are experienced in deafness, the outdoors and have sign language skills.

"The overnight camp out in the mountains is one of the most enjoyable for the campers," Nelson said. "They hike to the campsite, put up their own tents, build fires, fish and cook their own meals outdoors."

A forest ranger will visit the camp and talk to the youngsters about the environment, tree planting, and safety tips about hiking the mountain trails.

"We get letters from parents and the kids afterwards thanking us for summer camp," Elstad said. "And I feel good inside knowing that with the staff of ISDB I helped make their adventure a success."

Andrus admits state needs financial adjustments to erase budget deficit

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus, admitting his fiscal miscalculation earlier this spring resulted in a multimillion-dollar cash shortfall, has acknowledged financial adjustments must be made this summer to bring the state budget back to balance.

"We're still adjusting the numbers to find out exactly where we're going to be at the end of the month," Andrus said on Thursday. "But there's no question in my mind we're going to be shorter than the estimate we had before. It will take some adjustments."

In mid-March, just three weeks after he vetoed his \$1.1 billion budget-balancing package the Republican legislative majority sent him, Andrus said it appeared revenues would be substantially stronger than anticipated when that combination of budget cuts and withdrawals from the budget reserve was approved.

He reduced the package's spending cuts for the current budget year from \$5.6 million to less than \$1.5 million and curbed the reserve withdrawal from \$5.4 million to \$2.2 million.

"A month later, however, administration economists were stunned by an unexplained but dramatic reduction in state income tax receipts that torpedoed the governor's earlier financial optimism."

"I'm man enough to stand up and say I'm wrong," Andrus said in his first comments on the red ink that was disclosed while he was on a two-week European trip that included a state visit to the Basque Country.

To assure that the current budget is balanced when the fiscal year ends on June 30, Andrus will advise the Board of Examiners next Tuesday that he is withdrawing the remaining \$3.2 million the Legislature authorized from the reserve.

The rest of the balancing act is still being put together, but it will apparently include delaying almost all of a \$10 million payment to the state retirement fund to cover school teacher contributions, originally due May 15, until the very last minute of the business day on June 30. That would make it an expense against the new 1993 state budget so the

1992 budget books can be closed in the black.

But in doing that, Andrus is adding to the financial problems that he acknowledged last December would plague the 1993 budget.

In addition to accommodating the \$10 million retirement payment, the state already faces as much as a \$10 million shortage in its contribution to medical care for the poor along with several million dollars in other emergency expenses anticipated for forest and range fire suppression and handling prison overcrowding.

Andrus said before the 1992 legislative session began that there was a good chance some kind of tax increase would be needed in 1993 to underwrite the spiraling spending demands in education, corrections and health and welfare programs.

But there was little question in the minds of most administration officials that their already tight 1993 budgets would be hit by another holdback should early after the new spending year begins.

Andrus said he would announce the holdback "early in July so nobody has any question about it."

Idaho Falls backs out of Teton study

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Idaho Falls has decided against paying half the cost of a preliminary feasibility study on replacing the failed Teton Dam, citing a lack of support for a new one.

The decision has led its main proponents, the Fremont-Madison Irrigation District, to put the idea "on the back burner," said district manager Dale Swensen.

He said the district, which provided much of the impetus for the original \$74 million earthen dam on the Teton River, felt Idaho Falls' involvement would give the proposal a boost. "We thought it'd give us a broader base of support for it, both financially and politically, and everything else."

The district now is pinning much of its hope on efforts to save Idaho's dwindling salmon runs from extinction. That will require huge amounts of water to help the fish migrate. "Hell, they'll do anything for endangered species," said James Stidaway, a member of the Committee of Nine which helps

coordinate irrigation in Water District 10 on the upper Snake River.

Stidaway said he supports the state's worst drought but underscored the need for another reservoir.

The original dam failed on June 5, 1976, shortly after the reservoir was filled for the first time. The disaster killed 11 people. Damage claims totaled about \$350 million.

The Idaho Falls City Council had budgeted \$100,000 this year in case it decided to participate in a study.

But Mayor Tom Campbell has informed the district by letter that the council has deemed the proposal premature. "He said there currently is no governmental, political or public support for rebuilding the dam."

City officials say Idaho Falls' only interest in the project lies in the possibility of having a power plant there if some other agency has the state's largest city-owned hydroelectric generating system.

Campbell said the federal Bureau of Reclamation or the Army Corps of


Engineers may look at the site for water storage as part of the effort to help endangered salmon.

Congressmen urge colleagues: Dump waste plan

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Rep. Wayne Owens, D-Utah, and five House colleagues are urging congressional action to prevent a U.S. Supreme Court ruling from turning rural states into waste dumping grounds.

"There is an immense amount of uncertainty about that case that only Congress can clean up," Owens said during a press conference Thursday with the other members of the U.S. Capitol.

The court ruled in two cases this week that states cannot charge higher fees to out-of-state firms for dumping hazardous waste at commercial facilities within their boundaries.

Owens said that will likely invalidate a

new Utah law that would have imposed such higher fees beginning July 1, although state officials have said they are unsure.

The court ruled such higher fees improperly restrict the free flow of interstate commerce.

But Owens said the court left open the possibility that states could discourage dumping by charging more for all dumping — not just that from out of state — or by adding a per-mile tax on the transport of wastes.

Owens has sponsored legislation to solve legal problems that led to the ruling and allow states to either refuse out-of-state hazardous wastes or charge higher fees for it. He tried to add it to a recent energy bill,

but it was defeated. Owens said Congress is about to consider reauthorization of key environmental laws this year, and that would be a perfect time to address problems of interstate dumping of hazardous wastes.

However, the House Energy and Commerce Committee has said it wants to put off the topic until next year.

"But I think with the Supreme Court decision this week, Congress will have to weigh in on this matter," said Rep. Mike Synar, D-Okla. "But it will be tough. Bear in mind that only six states are net importers of waste. The others are net exporters of waste, including his home state, worry that increasing pressure from Eastern states could soon turn their available lands into dumping grounds."

Rep. Jim Jontz, D-Ind., added, "Rural states will not stand for becoming the dumping grounds of America."

Rep. Butler Derrick, D-S.C., said 78 percent of the waste dumped in his state comes from out of state, "and it subjects our citizens to danger."

Rep. Dan Glickman, D-Kan., said he hopes Congress can turn dumping of hazardous waste from a free commerce issue into an issue of safety for local residents.

Owens earlier this spring spearheaded a letter by 40 members of Congress asking the Energy and Commerce Committee to address the topic this year. Synar said dozens more would, likely sign another letter now because of the court decision.

"Congress has to act now or courts will strike down state laws, by one and the states will be left defenseless," Owens said.

Oregon fugitive arrested in Boise

BOISE — A man wanted on an Oregon fugitive warrant was arrested Thursday in the shooting death of a woman in Boise, city police say.

Jaffrey Louis Carsner, 27, was arrested after officers were called to a Boise home at about 12:45 a.m., police Lt. Jim Tibbs said. Carsner was being held in the Ada County Jail in anticipation of a Friday arraignment on second-degree murder and an Oregon fugitive warrant, he said.

Lorraine McKee was found dead of an apparent gunshot wound to the head, Ada County Coroner Erwin Sonnenberg said an autopsy was expected Friday.

New trial sought in malpractice case

COEUR D'ALENE — Attorneys for a Borinners Ferry physician facing a multimillion-dollar malpractice judgment contend Idaho law exempts their client from liability for his emergency treatment of a local doctor.

But lawyers for Darryl and Roberta Eby urged 1st District Judge Walt Fratcher on Wednesday to deny Dr. L. Raymond Newcombe Jr. a new trial that could overturn a jury's \$2.3 million verdict for their son, Jeremy, 10.

Jurors in Coeur d'Alene agreed with the Ebys' contention that Newcombe failed to immediately treat the boy almost eight years ago, leaving him quadriplegic, legally blind and mentally impaired.

According to court records, the Ebys said Jeremy had been sick for four days in August 1984 when they took him to Newcombe, a specialist in internal medicine. The boy was vomiting and had diarrhea and a fever.

Loan scheme raises legal questions

TROY — Concerned about the reluctance of voters to raise property taxes, While Pine School District officials have turned to a loan scheme to expand classroom space. But 2nd District Judge John Bengston is still trying to decide whether the \$960,000 proposal is legal. His decision is expected this summer.

"We just need more classroom space, and we're looking for the best and surest way of acquiring it," Superintendent Roger Swanson said.

But if Bengston ultimately voids the loan deal, school board member Judy Kimberling of Bovill acknowledged that a bond issue, and probably one for more than \$1 million, would be a likely alternative although the board is open to any ideas to solve the classroom crunch.

The proposed \$960,000 loan would be combined with \$500,000 already in the district building fund to provide additional classrooms in both ends of the district.

Popcorn case about to be closed

REXBURG — The U.S. Department of Justice has cleared authorities of any civil rights violations after two women were arrested for bringing popcorn into a Rexburg movie theater.

John Dunne, assistant attorney general of the Justice Department, notified Rexburg Police Chief Blair Sieperl the federal government has reviewed the FBI report and determined the matter should be closed. That clears Rexburg, the Madison County sheriff's office and Rexburg College campus police.

Susan Anderson and Joan Bowman were arrested a year ago after Anderson attempted to take popcorn bought at a neighboring theater into the Holiday Theater. The duo claimed the police used undue force in making the arrests, and lacked a warrant.

'Honest mistake' pads test scores

EMMETT — The Emmett School District invalidated math scores on the Iowa Basic Skills test for 180 eighth-graders after discovering a teacher prepared students with questions based on last year's test.

Superintendent Albert Vaughn said the teacher, who had taught for two years, copied the math portion of the test when it was given to last year's eighth-graders. To prepare students for this year's test, the teacher handed out homework problems with nearly identical questions.

"She said she didn't have any idea we would be using the same test again this year," Vaughn said. "We are convinced it was an honest mistake."

Boise women win MTV concert contest

BOISE — One of the 590 entries two Boise women sent to the music television network MTV won them an all-expenses paid trip to a Guns N' Roses pay-per-view concert in Paris.

Toni Felton, 28, and Tanya Cowperthwaite, 21, were in New York on Thursday to catch a flight on the Concorde to France. The concert is Saturday night and the women are scheduled to return to the United States on Sunday. Besides the trip, Felton received 25,000 French francs — about \$4,700 — in spending money from MTV.

Meridian school head takes U of I post

MERIDIAN — Meridian School District Superintendent Nick Hallet has resigned to become an education professor and director of the University of Idaho's education administration program.

Hallet's decision caught employees and parents by surprise.

"I felt that at this time in my life and career, I need to take advantage of a growth opportunity," Hallet, 51, said Wednesday. "It's hard to leave; it's a hard time to leave. But I don't think you ever find a good time to leave."

Rexburg man faces new charge

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — Rexburg businessman James Horkey has been charged with felony manslaughter after his attorney's attempt to prove his innocence prompted rejection of Horkey's guilty plea to a lesser misdemeanor offense.

Magistrate Charles Roos set next Monday for a preliminary hearing on the felony charge in the Oct. 25 accident that claimed the life of Madelyn Banner, 22.

Horkey, 39, had agreed to plead guilty to the misdemeanor vehicular manslaughter charge in exchange for Fremont County Prosecutor Penny Stanford's agreement to drop consideration of a felony charge in the death.

The maximum penalty for the misdemeanor is a year in jail and a \$2,000 fine while the felony carries a maximum sentence of seven years in prison and a \$7,000 fine.

But as Roos was scheduled to sentence Horkey on the misdemeanor late last month, defense attorney Roger Hoopes attempted to introduce expert testimony questioning the conclusion in the presentence report that Horkey was driving the car and therefore responsible for the accident.

Roos immediately halted the proceedings and asked his earlier acceptance of Horkey's guilty plea, opening the case back up for Stanford to file the more serious felony charge.

"Where you tell this court that that is an issue as to whether or not Mr. Horkey was driving that vehicle, no judge would his or her seal could possibly continue in this case," Roos declared. "That is an issue to be determined by the jury, and I can't go forward with it."

Roos expressed frustration that the defense waited so long to undermine the plea-bargain agreement by attempting to prove Horkey's innocence, and he pledged to expedite proceedings on the felony charge.

Teachers OK 2.9 percent raise in Meridian

MERIDIAN (AP) — Meridian School District teachers have ratified a contract including pay raises that figure to be less than the inflation rate during the coming school year.

Cindy Betz, president of the Meridian Education Association, said Wednesday that the majority of the district's 825 teachers will get pay increases only for additional education and experience.

She cited the district's tight budget in the 1992-93 school year.

"Male among the teachers is not good. People are upset with the value that the state has placed on teachers and education," Betz said. "We deserve at least to be able to keep up with the cost of living."

The average 2.9-percent pay increase will provide most teachers only with the regular increment they get for advancing in experience. Teachers at the top of the salary schedule who are not eligible for education and experience increases will receive raises of \$500 a year.

Assistant Superintendent Bob Haley said teachers deserve larger raises but the state's second-largest school district is unable to finance them because of its financial condition.

Furry assailant terrorizes family

DAVENPORT, Wash. (AP) — The meanest cat Police Chief Jim Gants has ever seen was destroyed after a terrorizing spree that sent a woman to the hospital.

In its wake, support has grown for a cat-walking ordinance that controls animals with "dangerous propensities."

Bonni Matheson was admitted to a hospital for treatment of insect scratches and bites on her hands that the white stray cat inflicted last month while she worked in her yard.

"It just came out of nowhere," she said. The underfed stray fled to a tree, where it perched at her sons Christopher, 18, and Joseph, 15.

"It was the meanest cat I've ever seen," said Gants, who used a skunk trap to capture the feline a few days after the attack. "It would go right after you, trying to get through the cage to get to you."

The cat was taken to the pound for a 10-day rabies observation; but it escaped after two days and made its way back to the Mathesons' house.

"It went right after us," said Mrs. Matheson, who had just returned from the Lincoln Hospital.

The furry terrorist tore up wallpaper in her kitchen, then took on the three family dogs in the living room.

"My house was a total wreck after that," she said. "The kids and I never got out of that house so fast."

Forest Service helps plan

CASCADE (AP) — The U.S. Forest Service has announced it will supplement the environmental impact statement on the proposed Valbois resort near Cascade, possibly getting the state of Idaho re-involved in the review.

"We've maintained all along we'd do another level of environmental analysis," Cascade District Ranger Benm Jullars said. "Hopefully, this will kind of get the train back on the track."

The state, through its Division of Environmental Quality, has been refusing to participate in the joint review process for the resort project because of its specific concerns about Valbois have yet to be addressed in the environmental review.

Deputy Attorney General Kevin Beaton indicated that the announcement of a supplemental environmental impact statement being put together underscored the state's contention that the original review was deficient.

The state has been concerned about the project's impact on water quality in Cascade Reservoir and has proposed that alternative sites for the development be considered along with

Court sends Canyon man back to judge

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Court of Appeals has sent a Canyon County man back for resentencing on child abuse convictions, saying the judge inadequately explained the rigid prison term.

Harry Carey appealed his convictions and sentences for sexual abuse and lewd and lascivious conduct with a minor. He had entered a conditional guilty plea.

He contested the court's denial of his motion to suppress, its failure to let him speak before the sentence and claimed the prison terms were "ill-reasoned and imposed out of anger and passion on the part of the district judge."

In a police interview Carey admitted committing the acts but contended he was confused at the time, court records say. But Carey stated in the trial, "I don't think it was the police that caused my stress."

Carey received the maximum time for sexual abuse at 15 years' confinement without parole.

He was given a consecutive indeterminate life sentence with a fixed 20 years for lewd conduct, which would virtually ensure he would be in prison for good, the appeals court said.

That court stated the failure of 3rd District Judge Jim Dozile to let him speak before sentencing is not grounds for reversing the convictions, but does require a resentencing.

A severe sentence, particularly, deserves some comment and judicial reasoning, especially where the record reveals only a shadow of the person, who, in a matter of seconds, is dispatched to prison for the remainder of his life," it said.

Report blasts testing policy at waste site

LAS VEGAS (AP) — A new congressional report alleges the Energy Department is not following its strategy for finding conditions that would make Yucca Mountain an unsuitable site for nuclear waste disposal.

DOE has not yet implemented the Secretary's strategy of conducting early surface-based tests to identify unsuitable site conditions...

The report, called "Nuclear Waste Repository Site Investigations: a Long and Difficult Task," was prepared by the General Accounting Office, the investigative arm of Congress.

Carl Gertz, manager of the department's Yucca Mountain Project, disagreed with the GAO's findings.

The department is charged with determining if Yucca Mountain, 100 miles northwest of Las Vegas, can safely contain 77,000 tons of high-level nuclear waste for 10,000 years.

Gertz said work began last week on drilling a well for the repository that will help determine how much surface water infiltrates the mountain and the pathways the water travels.

Resolving the ground water issue is a priority, he said, because if water can flood the floor of the proposed repository, it could corrode waste containers and carry off their radioactive contaminants.

Other priorities, Gertz said, are to determine potential hazards stemming from earthquake activity and the possibility of volcanoes erupting around the mountain.

The 76-page GAO report also criticized the Energy Department for preparing an early evaluation of the Yucca Mountain site, then waiting two years to seek public comments.

State Nuclear Projects Agency chief Bob Loux said he thought the report was "right on the money," particularly a section that says the state's reluctance to act on permits did not delay the Energy Department's effort to study the mountain.

Sen. Richard Bryan, D-Nev., blamed the delays on the Energy Department's mismanagement of the project, not the state's inaction on the permits.

Playboy touts new Vegas hot spot — jail

LAS VEGAS (AP) — When you think of Las Vegas' top accommodations, the Clark County Detention Center may not rank high on your list.

But the Las Vegas jail receives high marks from three convicts who have come up with a ranking of their favorite places to spend a few days.

The July issue of Playboy magazine ranks the facility fourth in the nation in its "Insiders Guide to America's Top Ten Jails."

The inmates listed the following perks: "Inmates per cell: One to two; TV; networks, nightly videos; Visits; Contact visits; Meals: small and warm."

"Unlimited free phone calls and daily newspaper deliveries allow for placing bets with friends on the outside. Cash winnings may be dropped off or Moneygrams deposited in non-interest bearing accounts."

"Well, they sure have stretched the rubber band," said Paul Martin, detention center director of security.

"We do provide newspapers but there is not unlimited phone access," Martin said. "They're allowed two 10 minute phone calls a day. If they ask someone to place a bet for them, we don't know because we don't monitor the phone calls."

Other than that, Martin quizzed little with the results.

"We do show movies as a means of gaining their cooperation," he said, adding that a local company provides the selection pool.

"The bottom line is this is a jail," he said. "I could put somebody in a suite in Hilton and if I tell them when they can shower, use the restrooms, eat their meals, visit friends or relatives they wouldn't like it."

Indians, government said to reach gambling pact

PHOENIX (AP) — An agreement has been reached between the Fort McDowell Indian Community and the U.S. Attorney's Office to allow the tribe's disputed gambling machines to be moved to another reservation and stored there.

U.S. Attorney Linda Akeres and the responded favorably about moving the machines to the Salt River reservation, Patea said.

Firms eye cautious improvement plans

WASHINGTON (AP) - American businesses plan a modest 4.7 percent increase in plant and equipment spending this year, reversing last year's rare decline, the government said Thursday.

But analysts noted non-manufacturing companies accounted for virtually all of the planned increase, indicating slow production and employment growth in the industrial sector.

The projected increase also would fall far short of the 16.4 percent pace in 1984, the second year after the 1981-82 recession.

Many economists believe the recent recession ended last spring, although the economy slowed again late last year. They contend the recovery will be less than half as robust as the average rebound since World War II.

In its report Thursday, the Commerce Department reported that a survey of about 8,000 companies in April and May suggested businesses

Analysis, however, dismissed the small advance as insignificant and noted that the four-week average for jobless claims continued to improve, falling to the second-lowest level of the past 18 months.

On the other hand, utilities and companies engaged in mining, transportation and other non-manufacturing businesses forecast an 8.4 percent increase to \$374.7 billion, from \$345.6 billion in 1991.

Economists say new investment to modernize buildings and upgrade equipment is one of the keys to long-term economic growth.

But the lethargic economy last year reduced demand, leaving factories with excess operating capacity and less incentive to invest. The sluggishness also reduced revenues available to many companies for capital spending.

Business investment declined 0.6 percent in 1991, to \$529.2 billion. It was the first drop since capital spending fell 2.6 percent in 1986 and only the fourth in the last 33 years. It had fallen 1.5 percent in 1983, the year following the previous recession.

Missing Exxon head strikes corporations

MORRISTOWN, N.J. (AP) - Alarms reverberated in corporate boardrooms when Sidney J. Reso, president of Exxon Co. International, vanished April 29, his car left idling 250 feet from home in his secluded driveway.

The mystery has corporations taking extra care to protect their top people.

"We're concerned about copycat cases. We're advising executives to be a little more careful than normal," said E.C. "Mike" Ackerman, a Miami-based former CIA agent who consults for about 50 of the top multinational corporations. "This is a very puzzling case."

No one can say for sure what happened to Reso, an Exxon employee for 35 years and, for the past four years, president of the subsidiary that oversees Exxon's explorations and production outside North America.

A group called the Rainbow Warriors contacted the company and told it to "have a lot of money ready," but it offered no proof it had Reso. No one had ever heard of the group.

"So where is Reso? Was it an abduction by eco-terrorists? Or was it a voluntary disappearance? Amnesia? Illness?"

Foul play is more likely in such places as Colombia, Peru, Brazil, Pakistan, India or the Philippines - not the exclusive, manicured suburbs of northern New Jersey.

A 10-year-old study for the Conference Board, a New York-based research group, noted that 55 percent of the 567 Americans kidnapped overseas between 1970 and 1978 were business executives.

But in this country, Ackerman said domestic kidnappings are "almost negligible." Patrick McGuire, who did the study for the Conference Board, estimates there are less than a dozen per year.

"The number of times a high profile executive is actually kidnapped for ransom in the United States is extremely low. Kidnapping is one of least successful crimes you can commit," McGuire said.

"Executives have more to fear from distant stockholders," Alan Bell, a former commando in the British Royal Marines and manager of Intercon Security Ltd. in Toronto, warns executives to take extra care driving to work, parking their cars and booking airline tickets and hotels.

Even if the incidence is low, corporate bigwigs remain targets for crusaders, criminals or crazies looking to make a fast buck or broadcast a statement.

"It's a subject no one wants to talk about," Bell said.

"You won't find any facts or figures. No one will produce statistics. No one is going to admit if it happens because they don't want bad publicity and they don't want to give people ideas on how to make big money very quickly."

"It happens more frequently than it surfaces in the media, though. A lot of this work is done behind the scenes," Bell added.

"It is certainly safe to say those corporations have security directors who pay a lot of attention to incidents like (Reso's)," Van Gilder said.

Fare war benefits filter to travel-related businesses

NEW YORK (AP) - Airlines that were bombarded by a record number of telephone calls this week haven't been alone - the rush to buy cheap air tickets lit up the boxes at rental agencies and hotels as well.

"These other businesses are thrilled because while the airlines chopped fares in half to lure customers, the related travel companies have just sat back and let the bookings flow in - at regular prices."

But it remains to be seen whether the air fare war scheduled to end Friday actually brings in more business for the embattled air travel industry.

Many people clamoring for half-price air fares were merely trading in more expensive tickets to take advantage of the bargains. Thousands more would have flown anyway at higher prices this summer.

And industry executives say it could turn out that several weeks or months worth of ticket-buying was just compressed into about 10 weeks of frenzied activity that lifted AT&T's long-distance calling volume to new highs.

Nobody will ever know for sure

"We'll have to sort of wait and see," said Emily Porter, spokeswoman for the American Society of Travel Agents. "There is a fear that the fall will slow down for the rest of the summer and bookings will slow down."

But even though many in the airline industry worried that they ended up selling too many seats for not enough money, hotels and car rental agencies that also found themselves swamped with calls are happy. "Based on what we've got now, it's already a good summer, and we didn't have to do anything to trigger this," said Joe Russo, spokesman for the Hertz Corp., the nation's largest car rental company.

"We just sat there and took it in." That is a welcome sign throughout the travel industry, which has been in bid shape since the Gulf War scared off many vacationers and the recession cut deeply into demand for travel.

Hotels, too, have reported record numbers of calls. "We've noted that more callers than usual are making reservations rather than just checking on prices."

Panhandle lumber firm targets Priest River mill

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) - A Coeur d'Alene lumber company says it has acquired an option to buy a Priest River sawmill and 24,500 acres of timber land.

An Idaho Forest Industries Inc. official said Wednesday the deal for the Merritt Brothers Lumber Co. stud mill and land is expected to close in December.

The stud mill employs 135 workers and the purchase would increase the number of Idaho Forest Industries employees in northern Idaho to 450. The company already is one of the region's largest private land owners. "We think this makes us a really strong entity in North Idaho," said Jim English, Idaho Forest Industries vice president.

"This puts us back up where we want to be in terms of size."

Neither English nor Merritt Brothers president Buck Merritt would discuss terms of the mill and timberland sale.

Merritt said he had several offers, but decided to sell to Idaho Forest Industries because of that company's ties to northern Idaho and its commitment to keep the mill in operation.

The stud mill background in the timber industry means that they'll be around for a very long time," Merritt said. "If we waited and sold five years from now, we may not have been able to find such a good buyer."

Merritt Brothers own timber land in Boundary, Bonner and Kootenai counties in Idaho, as well as in Spokane, Bend, Oreg. and Stevens counties in Washington.

Mexico moves to create a trained workforce

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Seeking to upgrade Mexico's labor force to compete in a free-trade economy, President Carlos Salinas de Gortari is pushing for an ambitious overhaul of the nation's impoverished schools.

The task is staggering and time is short. Some Mexicans worry that if a free-trade agreement with the United States and Canada goes into effect next year, they will become nothing more than cheap labor for the richer, more industrialized north.

The proposed continental trade zone would become the world's largest trading bloc, with 360 million consumers and \$6.4 trillion in commerce.

Shatner, CBS snub critics and find success in others' emergency efforts

William Shatner took a lot of flak from the critics when "Rescue 911" first came on the air. Many felt the reality-based series about emergency medical efforts, hosted by the actor still best known for playing Captain Kirk in "Star Trek," was exploitative. They also blasted CBS for scheduling it on Tuesdays at 8 (ET), a time at which young children would likely be watching. Now Shatner is having the last laugh.

The show is a certified hit. Potential subjects don't seem to share the critics' concerns about exploitation. "Less and less as the show has become more popular," says Shatner. "But in the beginning, it was difficult. We were begging."

And among its biggest fans are — you guessed it — children. One reason for its popularity among kids may be that it is sometimes the only show they are allowed to watch. "They like to watch it because there is excitement; people are in jeopardy and get rescued," says Shatner. "But they also learn a great deal (about basic emergency procedures). I was talking to a parent who said, 'You know, my child is 4 or 5, something like that. And I don't let them stay up past 8 o'clock, but I let them stay up until 9 on Tuesday evenings because of your show.' I thought, 'Gosh, that's one reason children like the show so much. They're allowed to stay up to watch it!'"

To date, "Rescue 911" has received more than 100 letters from viewers crediting it with saving lives. Most frequently cited are the rudiments of CPR that viewers have picked up from it, as well as the simple fact that it prompted them to immediately dial for assistance when a problem arose. The key to its popularity, Shatner feels, is that it chronicles the extraordinary heroism of ordinary people.

"It shows people in a good light, in a positive light," he says. "It shows that ordinary people are capable of such total unselfishness."

The show combines live footage with re-enactments.

"We'd much rather use the actual film," says Shatner. "But frequently there was nobody there to film it, so a re-enactment is really the only way. For the most part, we use the people who were there, who were a part of the occurrence. And they make such courageous acting decisions, because for them,

"They're not acting. It's—I screamed here. I cried here, I yelled there."

Clearly, Shatner isn't about to make a catty remark about the acting ability of any re-

enactor. "They're the best actors I've ever seen," he insists. "Really. Such immediacy. The tears are there. They tell the story, and the trauma is close to the surface."

The Game Channel (clever title), to combine TV and telephone technology, will enable viewers to become contestants, the elder Robertson says. No launch date. The Robertsons operate cable's Family Channel out of Virginia Beach. The Family, begun in 1977 as a religious channel, went to G-rated entertainment programming in the late '80s. It reaches 54 million homes.

CNN has plans to open a bureau in New Delhi to cover events in South Asia. The bureau will be the Atlanta-based network's 18th outside North America. It will join CNN bureaus in Beijing, Tokyo, Manila and Seoul in covering the region. A bureau in Bangkok also is scheduled to open this year.

NBC's "Sunday Today" co-anchor Mary Alice Williams is pregnant with twins, due in the fall. Maybe it's in the water; newly arrived "Today" news anchor, Margaret Larson, is expecting her first in August, and "NBC News at Sunrise" anchor Ann Curry is expecting her first in November. Katie Couric, current "Today" co-anchor, and her predecessor, Deborah Norville, also gave birth while working for the show.

What's new

Melissa Rivers, daughter of Joan Rivers, has been named gossip reporter for MTV's new 4-7 p.m. weekday variety show, "Hangin' With MTV." Her segments air on Wednesdays.

Hannah Storm, formerly a sports anchor at CNN, has joined NBC Sports as a host-commentator. Storm, 29, who joined CNN in '89 as host of "CNN Sports Tonight," makes her NBC debut June 27 as anchor of NBC's late-night Wimbledon coverage. The next month, she'll join Jim Lampley as co-host of NBC's late-night coverage of the Barcelona Olympic Games. Storm is only the second full-time female on-air talent at NBC Sports. (The other is Gayle Gardner.)

Mike Clancy and David Page have been named co-producers of NBC News's "Saturday Today" and "Sunday Today." They both work on "A Closer Look With Faith Daniels." Clancy as executive producer, Page as senior producer, and will retain those titles and responsibilities. Their appointment is part of a restructuring of the weekend "Today" programs caused in part by the departure of Gerry Solomon as executive producer of "Sunday Today." Solomon is considering either another assignment at the network or outside offers. "Saturday Today" will premiere Aug. 1, giving viewers seven days of "Today." And here we thought that on the seventh day we rested.

V.R. "Bob" Formad has been promoted to executive vice president and senior executive producer of the Cable News Network. He was formerly senior vice president and senior executive producer. Formad has been with the cable network since 1983. He is responsible for producing CNN's news and information programming, including anchors, graphics, operations, production, news-features units and the library. He also produces the live, breaking news coverage.

Q: Why did Bea Arthur leave "The Golden Girls"? Has the show been canceled or will it continue without her?

A: After seven seasons, Arthur grew weary of the series grind and the character of Dorothy. Her final appearance on the show came in the marriage-episode season finale. Fans of NBC's "The Golden Girls" will get to see three-fourths of the golden cast next season on CBS when Betty White, Rue McClanahan and Estelle Getty return Fridays in "The Golden Palace." This new half-hour sitcom will maintain the characters' names and personalities but changes the format by having them buy and run a broken-down South Miami Beach hotel, supported by a young inexperienced staff.

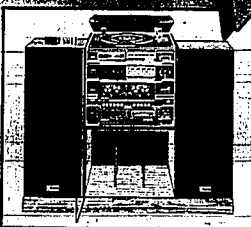
