Commission votes 5-4 to issue conditional use permit for site

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission OK'd a conditional-use permit for a landfill on Hansen Butte by a 5-4 vote Thursday night.

The vote means that six Magic Valley counties have cleared the first major hurdle to siting the landfill. It also means that those who oppose the landfill must take their case to the Twin Falls County Commission and then, possibly, to district court.

One man who has opposed the plan from the start, Tony Barnes, said Hansen-area residents will appeal the decision.

"We definitely will not quit. We will follow the normal legal agenda," Barnes said.

Debate over the landfill site has been emotional, but Thursday night's hearing was calm. The commission's discussion and vote attracted close to 100 people to the meeting.

Commissioner Chairman Jim Barker, Michael Heath, both of Buhl; Terry Kramer of Castleford; James Lanting of Hollister and Steve Koopman of Twin Falls voted for the permit.

The two commission members from Hansen, F.T. Freestone and Todd Claiborn, voted against the permit, as did Gerald Tews of Filer and Jim Patrick of Twin Falls County.

"Our job is to protect the agriculture area. I want to make sure we do that," Freestone said.

Given the 100-year life of the landfill, he wondered how the facility would fit into the area as the surrounding communities grow.

Claiborn said he opposed the plan for a couple of main reasons.

The Twin Falls Canal Co. and the Twin Falls Highway District took their names off of the conditional-use application. Also, at a hearing in May, a man who farms on the butte, Walt Coiner, testified against issuing the permit, Claiborn said.

Coiner had testified that spring storms and flash floods wash tons of dirt down the butte and that large storms could carry refuse to the canal below.

Claiborn urged the six-county coalition to forgo Hansen Butte and "choose your second- or third-best site."

Other commission members said, however, that the site was a good one for a landfill, and the technology and design would protect the groundwater.

Kramer said that the testimony of experts had convinced him to accept the plan.

"They tell me it's a good site. ... It's ridiculous for us as farmers to question the technology," he said.

Barker said that the new federal rules will protect the groundwater under the landfill.

"It will not pollute the aquifer. This is to protect the aquifer," Barker said.

Opposition to the site appeared to be a "not-in-my-back-yard-syndrome," he said. "I don't see an outpouring from anybody but the neighbors."

Before the commission voted, the attorney for the six counties, Gary Slette, asked Tews to excuse himself from the vote because of a story in Thursday's Times-News.

In the story, Tews listed a number of reasons for opposing the Hansen Butte site. Slette said that Tews couldn't give the matter a fair hearing Thursday night.

Tews declined to excuse himself.

Twin Falls, Blaine, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka and Cassia counties applied for the conditional-use permit to build a landfill to meet new federal rules.

The permit that the Planning and Zoning Commission OK'd Thursday night had about 12 conditions on it, ranging from paving roads to the facility to not allowing land farming — the trying of human waste on dirt.

Budget measure loses by 9

WASHINGTON — The House Thursday rejected a constitutional amendment to force a balanced budget, leaving its advocates bitter over the Democratic leadership's "full-court press" against their cause.

The vote was 280-153, nine shy of the two-thirds majority needed to send the measure to the Senate.

Those in favor were 116 Democrats, 164 Republicans.

Idaho's Democratic congressmen, Richard Stallings and Larry LaRocco, voted to approve the measure.

President Bush vigorously pushed the proposal on the campaign trail. Proponents said afterward that the House leadership had been relentless, perhaps ruthless, in its campaign to derail the movement.

"I don't know if what they did was inappropriate or not," said Rep. Charles W. Stenholm, D-Texas, who headed the amendment fight. "I just know the leadership worked very hard and turned some folks' votes."

Before taking up Stenholm's amendment, the House first voted on a version sponsored by Rep. Jon Kyl, R-Ariz., which would have limited yearly increases in federal spending to 19 percent of the gross national product. A second vote was taken on the amendment sponsored by Barton and a third on a proposal crafted by the Democratic leadership. It would have prohibited deficit spending unless the president asked for an unbalanced budget in any fiscal year and would exempt Social Security from any balanced-budget calculations.

All three were rejected.

Among those who changed their minds about the wisdom of using the Constitution to rid the budget of red ink were six original co-sponsors of the amendment measure, advocates said.

Rep. Jim Moody, D-Wis., said "a number of us were counting on buckled under the pressure" of the leadership's

Gas turns Bush visit into chaos

PANAMA CITY — Secret Service agents rushed a teary President and Barbara Bush from a platform in the heart of Panama's capital Thursday, as tear gas intended to ward off protesters provoked panic in a crowd waiting to hear the president.

The episode, in which Bush and his wife were not harmed, marked a brief stop that the White House had hoped would serve as a triumphant, politically tinged celebration for Bush. It was the president's first visit since ordering the December 1989 invasion, which ousted Panama's longtime dictator, Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega.

Pandemonium spread through the flag-waving crowd of about 2,000 as the prevailing wind sent clouds of tear gas through the heavily guarded plaza. The gas was unleashed by police after dozens of shouting protesters, positioned about one block from Bush, threw a few rocks and bottles and appeared to be surging through police lines.

At least eight security agents crouched with their weapons drawn, scanning the surrounding buildings as Bush and his wife were whisked from the platform, first to an adjoining tent and then to a bullet-proof limousine that took them to a nearby U.S. air base.

Marlin Fitzwater, the president's spokesman, said the Bushes were not adversely affected by the tear gas, but Bush and several others in the official party were seen dabbing at their eyes with handkerchiefs.

There were scattered sounds of gunfire in the frenzied aftermath as many in the crowd scurried for cover. At least two men were taken away in handcuffs before Bush's motorcade departed from the plaza, adorned with an imposing statue dedicated to "a gathering of friends."

After the episode, the president attempted to play down the demonstration and lashed out to what he referred to as "a handful of left-wing characters" for disrupting his visit.

U.S. to sign treaties

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil — In an effort to smooth the way for President Bush's arrival Thursday night at the Earth Summit, the chief U.S. negotiator announced a program to speed U.S. compliance with a recently negotiated treaty on worldwide climate change to curb global warming.

The negotiator, William Reilly, said the United States would not only sign the treaty here, but speed it to the Senate for quick ratification and advance by six months the completion of a detailed "action plan" for reducing carbon dioxide emissions. The plan would be completed by Jan. 1, he said.

The six-point program also calls for stepped-up monitoring of emissions from electrical generating plants — which produce one-third of all carbon dioxide emissions in the United States — and provides for \$25 million over two years to developing nations to take inventory of their emissions and carry out energy demonstration projects.

Reilly said the United States would continue spending a large amount for climate change and other scientific research. The Bush administration proposal for fiscal 1993 is \$1.4 billion, a figure Reilly called "the largest amount of any government in the world."

Environmentalists immediately criticized both plans, saying they fall far short of what is needed.

Money-losing deal for Q Bar in works

TWIN FALLS — The building that threw a monkey-wrench into plans for a regional juvenile detention center last summer may soon be sold — for a loss.

Officials for the five-county juvenile detention center board aren't saying who has offered to buy the building, or for how much, but they say a deal has been struck.

"We haven't got it sold yet," Twin Falls County Commissioner Norma Blass said. "We have agreed on a price."

And that price is less than the \$119,000 the counties shelled out for the building on Addison Avenue East, Jerome County Commissioner Veronica Lierman said. She would not divulge further information about the proposed selling price.

The building was listed with Three M Realty for slightly more than the original purchase price to cover real estate agent fees.

Twin Falls, Jerome, Gooding, Camas and Blaine counties used part of a \$740,000 state grant to buy the building last year after being told city zoning laws would allow a juvenile detention center there.

But neighbors raised a ruckus, prompting the City Council to overturn city Planning and Development Director LaMar Orton's decision to allow the center.

The counties appealed, but 5th District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt sided with the city in

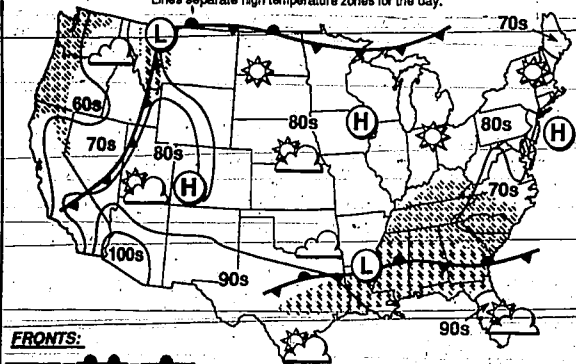

The National Weather Service says a major change in the weather is headed for Idaho.

A strong low pressure system off the West Coast Thursday morning was expected to push a cold front across the state later in the day, with the main part of the storm moving into western Idaho today.

This will bring significantly colder temperatures and widespread thundershowers activity accompanied by gusty winds to the state. Unsettled weather will persist through the weekend.

A few showers were noted overnight into Thursday with mostly light rain recorded. Some isolated heavier showers topped .34 inch of rain on Yellow Pine Bar on the Salmon River and .09 at Melva. Other activity was light and spotty. The chance of precipitation will increase statewide with the approach of the Pacific storm system.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 100 degrees at Riggs. Ketchum reported the coldest at 38 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 105 degrees at Lake Havasu City and Bullhead City, Ariz. The lowest was 33 degrees at Truckee, Calif.

Thunderstorms rumble across wide sections of nation

Thunderstorms brought heavy rain to parts of the South for a second straight day Thursday. Rain also fell on parts of the Northwest, but the West and Northeast were warm and sunny.

In the South, showers and thundershowers were developing ahead of a slow-moving cold front that was winding its way through the lower Mississippi Valley and the Southeastern United States.

The front brought heavy thundershowers to the lower Mississippi Valley, the central Gulf Coast, and parts of Florida.

Severe thundershowers were also reported in parts of Alabama, Georgia and Louisiana. Heavier rainfall totals for the six-hour period ending at 2 p.m. EDT included 3.19 inches at New Orleans and 1.33 at Baton Rouge. Lighter thundershowers and rain showers were also scattered across Missouri, Arkansas, Kentucky and the Carolinas.

More than 4 inches of rain fell on parts of North Carolina on Wednesday, and with rain continuing Thursday a flood warning was issued for the state's southern foothill regions.

A cold front moving across the Northwest also brought scattered thundershowers and showers to eastern Washington, northern Idaho and western Montana.

Skies were sunny from California and Nevada to west Texas and from the Great Lakes region to southern New England.

Strong southerly winds pushed temperatures into the 80s and 90s in the northern Plains Thursday afternoon. Readings were also in the 80s and 90s across much of the South.

NASA vows to salvage Galileo spaceship exploration of Jupiter

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The Galileo spaceship can successfully explore Jupiter during 1995-97 even if its jammed main antenna can't be fixed, NASA said Thursday as it released the craft's best picture of an asteroid.

Various high-tech tricks should allow Galileo to complete 70 percent of its Jupiter studies, although it might return only 2,000 to 4,000 pictures instead of the planned 50,000, said Torrence Johnson, project scientist for the \$1.4 billion mission.

The main loss will be thousands of pictures that would have been used to make movies of Jupiter's swirling weather patterns. Most pictures of Jupiter's moons will be obtained as planned, but they won't cover the entire lunar surfaces, he told reporters.

The 16-ton-wide, umbrella-shaped antenna failed to open last year, and repeated repair efforts have failed. Engineers believe three of the antenna's 18 ribs are stuck to a central tower because lubricant wore off tiny pins designed to hold the ribs to the tower when Galileo was launched.

If the main antenna remains stuck, Galileo will have to transmit data slowly using its two smaller antennas.

William J. O'Neil, project manager at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, said more fix-it efforts are planned, including warming and cooling the stuck ribs in a few weeks and turning the antenna-drive motors on and off 1,000 to 2,000 times next January.

Galileo was deployed from space shuttle Atlantis in 1989, and fired off on a looping path that will take it to Jupiter in December-1995. A probe will parachute into the atmosphere while the orbiter circles Jupiter for two years.

Galileo's route took it past Venus and Earth in 1990 as it used the planets' gravity to accelerate it and bend its path. It will again use Earth's gravity this December.

It flew past the asteroid Gaspra on Oct. 29, the first spacecraft to visit one of the rocky leftovers from the solar system's formation. The rocky asteroid measures 12 miles by 7.5 miles by 7.5 miles.

The new picture of Gaspra — stored on tape and transmitted slowly to Earth during late May and early June — is three times more detailed than a picture sent in November.

The new photo shows Gaspra has cracks hundreds of yards long, probably formed by collisions with other objects, said Cornell University scientist Joseph Veverka. Such cracks have previously been seen only on Mars' moon Phobos, he added.

"No little left-wing demagogue is going to hold back democracy in this country. The day of the dictator is over, and you should take great pride in what your country has done," Bush told a largely military crowd at Albrook Air Base.

Before Bush's speech Thursday, security agents placed metal detectors at streets leading into the area. Only spectators with invitations were admitted to the plaza, but U.S. officials said they were not intended as a security measure.

As the crowd awaited his arrival, protesters set fire to tires and garbage, sending up clouds of black smoke. Helmed riot police stood guard. Protesters did not become aggressive until after Bush appeared.

"Those who soil democracy are not welcome to the patriotic conscience of the nation," said Ivan Zungu, an academic counselor at the University of Panama, where numerous students held protests before Bush's visit.

Bernard Aronson, assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs who was traveling with Bush, called the U.S. serviceman's slaying "a terrible thing. If it was what it appears, it was some kind of terrorist act."

Rumors circulated Thursday that the U.S. Secret Service had wanted to cancel Bush's speech — but Aronson said no thought had been given to canceling the stop in Panama. "You can't allow terrorists to determine the schedule of the president," he said.

Bush said he had received a warm welcome from thousands of people who lined up to await his arrival at the airport. "Don't let this little ripple out there... a handful of people trying to disrupt this wonderful welcome, don't let it discourage you," Bush said to cheers.

But many Panamanians have remained resentful of the U.S. invasion, in which an estimated 500 people were killed. Demonstrators Thursday and Wednesday shouted that Bush was an assassin.

Panama also remains an impoverished country, and there is wide sentiment here that Washington has not done enough to help. Tourism, once a major source of income, has failed to rebound since the invasion.

Before the rally, Bush attempted to dismiss the protesters in a lighthearted fashion.

"None of those criticizing the leadership would specify what pressure tactics were used or how they might have been inappropriate," House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., denied twisting arms, but he did make a rare floor appearance to speak against the amendment.

Lobbying from all sides had been unsparring for weeks. The balanced-budget movement, a sleepy presence on Capitol Hill for more than a decade, gathered unexpected steam this year, and special-interest groups responded with vigor.

Bush was among the most enthusiastic converts to the cause and fumbled heartily, though he himself has never submitted a balanced budget to Congress.

Both Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton, the likely Democratic presidential nominee, and independent aspirant Ross Perot opposed the amendment. Perot, said on NBC's "Today" show, that supporters were simply interested in avoiding tough choices.

"An amendment is an excuse not to do anything," he said.

The last time the government operated with a surplus rather than a deficit was in fiscal 1969. This year's deficit approaches \$400 billion. The total national debt is close to \$4 trillion. The final annual interest payment on the debt alone tops \$300 billion.

Rep. Joe Barton, R-Texas, said his colleagues sent a sorry message when they rebuffed his version of the amendment, which was similar to Stenholm's but would have forbidden tax hikes without a three-fifths vote of Congress.

Stenholm's amendment would have required the president to submit a balanced budget to Congress and forbidden the government from spending more money than it expected to raise in any fiscal year, except in times of war or on the vote of a three-fifths majority of Congress.

Stenholm and his compatriots pledged to bring the issue before the House again next year, when there could be as many as 100 new faces among the chamber's 435 members.

House Speaker Foley rolls strike, financial disclosure form reveals

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Thomas S. Foley tossed a perfect strike last year on a stock exchange involving two leading analysts, according to one of the hundreds of House financial disclosure forms released Thursday.

Financial dealings did not go as well for Rep. Bart Gordon, D-Tenn., who reported "less than desirable results" from three failed real estate investments. He did get to appear on the Oprah Winfrey show, receiving free air fare, food and lodging, his report showed.

The economic tales of Foley and Gordon were just two to emerge from the 1991 reports that provide insight into the lives, earnings and liabilities of 435 lawmakers. The forms also recount thousands of

gifts they received; from a jar of tomato sauce to a \$2,500 crystal castle.

Senate forms are due out Friday.

The annual salary in the House is \$125,100, which for many constitutes the bulk of all earnings. But for Rep. Arno Houghton, R-N.Y., heir to the Corning Glass fortune, salary is just a small fraction.

Houghton said his earned income last year included more than \$140,000 from 34 family trusts. He also listed assets of more than \$1

million in Corning Inc. stock and a house in the District of Columbia valued at more than \$1 million.

Among the poorest members is Rep. Bob Davis, R-Mich., whose listed assets of less than \$1,000 and liabilities of \$40,000 to \$115,000. Davis wrote 878 bad checks at the defunct House bank and has decided not to seek an eighth term.

The forms show that speechmaking outside the nation's capital has dropped off sharply, now that lawmakers can no longer accept up to \$2,000 per speech as they used to. All proceeds from paid speeches must now be given to charity.

House Speaker Foley, whose total assets are listed at between \$446,000 and \$1.1 million, added between \$1,000 and \$15,000 when East Bow

Inc. merged with Atomic Lanes, located near the Hanford Nuclear Reservation in his home state of Washington.

Foley had 728 shares in East Bow Inc., which split nine for one.

The speaker, whose annual salary is \$160,000, reported that between \$250,000 and \$500,000 of his money came from an inheritance in his mother's trust.

Sports and entertainment proved to be monetarily beneficial to two other members.

Jim Bunning, R-Ky., a former major league pitcher, collected \$1,100 for appearing in an Old Timers baseball game. Rep. Scott Kluge, R-Wis., pocketed \$100 from a charity-pinball tournament.

J. Alex McMillan, R-N.C., took

top honors for diligence in describing the gifts he received during the year, attaching a 25-page list with 500 or more items to his financial disclosure form.

The items ranged from a jar of Regu tomato sauce from Unilever and a bag of Vidalia onions from the Piggly-Wiggly stores to an Operation Desert Storm" carpet paper-weight from the Kuwaiti ambassador.

McMillan also received a collection of sayings, "Things Your Dad Always Told You But You Didn't Want to Hear," from constituent Ruth Hill and a book difficult to find on the latest best-seller list, "Natural Gas as a Second Language," from Mobil Natural Gas Inc.

In general, House members are re-

quired to list all tangible gifts whose aggregate value is \$100 or more.

Richard Ray, D-Ga., received a \$2,500 crystal castle from Elena Amos after serving as pallbearer at the funeral of her husband, John Ray, needed a waiver from the House Ethics Committee before he could accept the gift.

House members received outside money from a wide variety of sources:

Fred Grandy, R-Iowa, is still getting residuals from reruns of the "Love Boat" series in which he played the character "Gopher," but they dropped last year to \$215.

Barney Frank, D-Mass., listed royalties of between \$15,000 and \$50,000 from his book, "Speaking Frankly."

Leading national polls, Perot goes call-in with the public

NEW YORK (AP) — Ross Perot, fielding questions from callers for two hours on national television, said Thursday that President Bush was to blame for the savings and loan debacle and the Persian Gulf War.

Perot said Bush sent emissaries to "bump, diaper and pamper" Saddam Hussein and then went to war because "our manhood was questioned."

The undeclared presidential candidate also said repeatedly that he would not offer "sound bite" answers to complex problems nor, if elected, would he perpetuate a "regal presidency."

Perot's scheduled one-hour appearance on NBC's "Today" show was extended to two hours in mid-broadcast, with the Texas billionaire saying there was "nothing more real than talking to real people about real issues."

"This is the only war in my memory where generals and politicians are heroes and there's no Audie Murphy or Sergeant York," he said.

He said American small business, which he called the key to economic recovery, cannot get the credit and capital it needs because Bush's management of deregulation caused "the banking fiasco we just went through."

"No villains here," Perot added. "He just doesn't understand business."

Perot told another caller that he would not take a salary as president and would "do everything I can to get rid of what I call the regal presidency" in which motorcades shut down city traffic for hours.

"I will stop at red lights if I'm the president," he said. "I will not shut the city down and do all this goofy stuff we've evolved into that has nothing to do with security."

He expressed scorn for sound bites, and turned the phrase into a verb, first when asked about abortion.

"It's the woman's choice," he said. But he added: "Let's not sound bite it. Realize that the saddest thing in the world is to create a little child nobody wants."

He told a retiree in Florida that he would not cut the Social Security benefits of the affluent but would ask them to give it up voluntarily.

Asked by "Today" interviewer Katie Couric what level of affluence would make someone a candidate for volunteering, Perot said: "Let's go make the computer runs and define it."

To Clinton's suggestion that the candidates hold weekly debates from now to election day, Perot said he would be eager to "get in" but doubted that Bush would join in.

Planet detection method accredited by new evidence

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Researchers who devised a new method to search for other solar systems found evidence that planets may orbit seven stars in our Milky Way galaxy, NASA said Thursday.

The objects 2,650 trillion miles from Earth also could be faint companion stars or "brown dwarfs," bodies of gas too big to be planets but too small to become stars, said Kenneth Marsh, an astrophysicist at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

Other scientists praised the new method of looking for planets, which involves measuring differences in infrared light emitted by disks of gas and dust surrounding certain stars. But they aren't yet convinced Marsh and astrophysicist Michael J. Mahoney actually found planets outside our solar

system.

"The landscape of previous efforts to detect planets is littered with the corpses of claims that haven't been substantiated," said David Black, director of the Lunar and Planetary Institute in Houston.

"It's way too soon to tell" if Marsh and Mahoney really discovered other worlds, he said, but the method used is "very interesting... very creative."

"It's a whole new way of looking for planets," said Steve Maran, spokesman for the American Astronomical Society and an astronomer at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, Md.

Marsh presented the findings at the society's meeting in Columbus, Ohio.

He and Mahoney found nine

stars that appeared to be orbited by companion objects. They determined two of those objects were faint stars. The seven others may be orbited by planets, faint stars or brown dwarfs, they said.

But they are pretty sure one of those stars, named GK Tauri, is orbited by a brown dwarf or one or more planets.

The seven stars are in "Taurus-Auriga," a star-forming region of gas and dust clouds about 450 light years — or 2,650 trillion miles — from Earth.

"Stars form with a thin, dusty, pancake-like disk around them," Marsh said. "That's where we expect planets to form. We think the same thing happened in our own solar system."

Gravity from a planet should "sweep out" a ring-shaped gap in the disk.

Quayle attacks 'elite' abortion support

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP) — Vice President Dan Quayle took another swing Thursday at what he has dubbed America's "cultural elite," accusing them of supporting abortion and treating the fetus as an "inconvenience to be discarded."

"They believe in the right to dispose of life. We believe in the right to life," Quayle said to cheers from more than 600 people at the National Right to Life convention.

Renewing the attack he began last month with a blast at television charac-

ter Murphy Brown for having a child out of wedlock, Quayle accused the national media of being biased in favor of abortion.

He said the public response to his advocacy of "family values" has been overwhelmingly favorable, but not in "some of our news rooms, sitcom studios and faculty lounges."

"The cultural elite don't want me to talk about values, but the American people do. The cultural elite's reaction has been outrage, ridicule and scorn," he said.

He repeated the line he used Tuesday at the Southern Baptist Convention in Indianapolis: "I wear their scorn as a badge of honor. All of you know how that feels."

The anti-abortion activists laughed and cheered. They chanted "Four More Years!" as Quayle walked onto the stage.

Before Quayle spoke, they booed when National Right To Life Committee President Wanda Franz described the abortion stands of Bill Clinton and Ross Perot. Both favor abortion rights.

GOP pep talk sets a record

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican officials delivered a pep talk Thursday to 600 convention delegates and others in what was billed as "the biggest political teleconference call in history."

Bush-Quayle campaign manager Fred Malek and Republican national Chairman Richard Bond spoke for 20 minutes and fielded several prepared questions, including a couple on Ross Perot, according to Will Felius, the campaign's director of communications.

"I think it's the biggest political teleconference call in history," Felius said. "It was a one-way call, however, the party faithful could only listen to Malek and Bond, not talk back."

The conversation was on the Bush-Quayle campaign's tab, although Felius was unsure of the cost.

Prices, sales, jobs provide disturbing news

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wholesale sales, propelled by higher costs for gasoline, tobacco and clothing, rose at their fastest clip in 19 months in May.

As they did, consumers managed only a tiny 0.2 percent increase in retail purchases, the government said Thursday.

Economists termed both developments disturbing, suggesting to some that this year's weak recovery may run out of gas just as a similar upturn did last year.

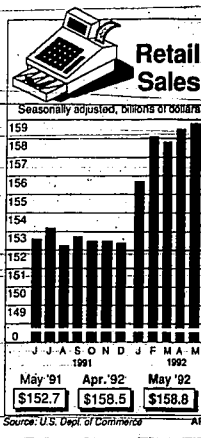
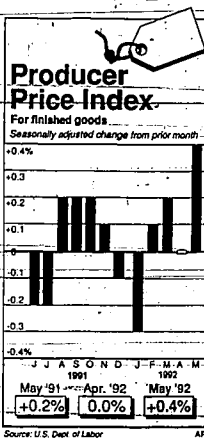
"I'm starting to get a little worried about this recovery," said David Wyss, an economist at DRI-McGraw Hill. "The numbers are starting to look too much like last summer."

The Labor Department said the 0.4 percent increase in its Producer Price Index, which measures inflationary pressures before they reach the consumer, was the biggest advance since a 1.1 percent surge in October 1990 as world oil prices took off following Iraq's invasion of Kuwait.

Meanwhile, the Commerce Department said retail sales edged up a barely noticeable 0.2 percent in May as declines in clothing and hardware stores blunted a pickup in auto sales. In addition, the government slashed its estimate of April sales by more than half, now saying the increase was just 0.4 percent.

Since consumer spending accounts for two-thirds of total economic activity, continuing weakness in this area would be enough to abort any economic upturn.

While the disappointing sales per-

Southern Baptists pan TV networks, schools

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Southern Baptists, blasting what they called "the moral breakdown in our society," accused television networks Thursday of promoting immorality and demanding that public schools quit giving out condoms.

The Baptists, in the final day of their three-day annual convention, also encouraged the Boy Scouts of America to continue to ban homosexuals from leadership positions and to retain the pledge of duty to God in the Scouts' oath.

Delegates to the 15.2 million-member denomination's convention also spoke out against suicide, abortion and abortion-related research, and said failing to observe the Sunday Sabbath in religious ways was helping cause "the moral breakdown in our society."

In a resolution condemning the distribution of condoms in public schools, the delegates expressed "moral outrage at this unprecedented usurpation of parental rights and violation of family integrity."

"The dangerous myth of 'safe sex' continues to claim victims, including young children in public schools," a convention resolution stated.

"The convention" also charged that television was exerting a corrupting influence on societal values.

"The viewing public is bombarded with themes, plots, images and advertisements which promote and glorify sexual promiscuity, violence and other forms of immorality," the convention said.

Sides step up drive for arms pact

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State James A. Baker III arranged a quick trip to London Thursday night in a drive to conclude a new missile-reduction agreement with Russian Foreign Minister Andrei Kozyrev in time for next week's superpower summit.

The trip was arranged in a telephone conversation with Kozyrev that evidently gave Baker reason to hope final details could be worked out between them over the weekend.

The two sides are committed to reduce their arsenals of long-range bombers, missiles and submarines beyond the cuts required under the START treaty.

However, Russian President Boris N. Yeltsin accused the Bush administration on Wednesday of seeking an advantage over his country. He criticized the U.S. proposal to eliminate all missiles with multiple warheads that are based on land, but only one-

third of those kept at sea.

Land-based missiles are the backbone of Russia's strategic forces, while submarine-launched ballistic missiles are prized by the United States.

State Department officials declined to say how close the two sides were to an accord. Apart from the dispute over multiple-warhead missiles, talks in Washington Monday and Tuesday between Baker and Kozyrev failed to produce an overall numerical ceiling on long-range warheads, sub-seasides on various weapons and an understanding on how quickly banned missiles would be discarded.

The Russians agreed to part with some of their land-based missiles, but

only after the seven-year period in which the START treaty would be implemented. That means postponing a second round of reductions until the 21st century.

A State Department spokesman, Richard Boucher, said Baker and Kozyrev would meet at the Russian embassy in London on Friday and wind up their talks in time for the summit, which opens at the White House next Tuesday.

Yeltsin is due to arrive on Monday, hold talks with Bush and Baker on Tuesday and Wednesday and fly to Kansas on Thursday to visit a meat-packing plant and a university.

Russia and other former Soviet republics now have some 10,200 long-range nuclear warheads and the United States has nearly 10,000. The START treaty, which Bush and former Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev signed last July, sets a limit of 6,000 warheads apiece.

Gene can halt brain tumor

WASHINGTON (AP) — In laboratory research that soon will be tried on humans, scientists have shown that a brain cancer can be cured by injecting it with a gene that makes the tumor cells sensitive to an anti-herpes drug.

The technique cured a usually lethal cancer in laboratory rats at the National Institutes of Health. Now, a group of NIH doctors are poised to use the therapy on human patients with no other hope of survival.

Dr. Kenneth Culver, lead author of a report on the research in the journal Science, said the technique also has worked experimentally on liver cancer in rats and eventually could be modified to work on a variety of other cancers.

Culver, a National Cancer Institute researcher, said the technique involves the direct transfer into cancer cells of a herpes virus gene that is sensitive to an antiviral drug.

"By transferring this gene from the herpes virus into the tumor, we cause the tumor to become genetically like a herpes virus," Culver said. "When we treat with the drug that kills the herpes virus, then we kill the tumor too."

In effect, he said, the gene is like "a suicide bomb." The tumor cells add the gene to their genetic structure and this leads to the death of the tumor cells.

Normal cells, said Culver, are not affected.

The researcher said that the experiment began by inserting into a culture of laboratory mouse cells a genetically engineered virus sensitive to the anti-herpes drug ganciclovir. The mouse cells then were injected directly into tumors in the brains of 14 laboratory rats.

Once implanted, the virus transfers its genetic pattern into cells in the brain that are dividing and growing. Since in the brain the only cells that divide are those of tumors and their blood vessels, the virus ends up only in the cancer.

After waiting a week for the genes to transfer, the rats were given 10 injections of ganciclovir over five days.

Early detection doesn't curb prostate cancer

ATLANTA (AP) — Deaths from prostate cancer are increasing, particularly among black men, despite improved methods of early detection, federal health officials reported Thursday.

The increased death rate raises questions about the benefits of newer and more expensive tests to detect the disease, said Ron Aubert, an epidemiologist for the Centers for Disease Control.

"There is clearly something going on. It's becoming a growing public health problem," Aubert said. "But there are studies that are needed to evaluate the benefit of screening and early detection."

"We're not to the point that organizations feel comfortable making recommendations that people get these early screenings, as they have with breast and cervical cancer."

The Atlanta-based CDC reported Thursday that deaths from prostate cancer increased 2.5 percent among white men and 5.7 percent among black men from 1980 to 1988, the latest year for which figures were available.

In 1980, about 17.3 white men per 100,000 — or a total of 19,095 — died from prostate cancer. The rate reached 18.6 in 1988, when the total was 24,175.

For blacks, the rate was 37.4 in 1980 — a total of 3,670 — and 39.6 in 1988 — a total of 4,581.

Aubert attributes the higher black mortality rates to fewer cancer screenings among blacks and less access to more expensive and sophisticated tests and treatment.

There is also a higher rate of blacks being diagnosed as having prostate cancer, the CDC said, but the diagnosis rate for whites increased faster.

Health official quits

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Suzanne Dandoy has resigned as executive director of the Utah Department of Health effective in mid-July.

She will become deputy commissioner for Health Care Services in the Virginia Department of Health.

Gov. Norm Bangerter has not appointed an interim director. The next administration will pick a permanent successor.

Dandoy said Wednesday that her biggest disappointment was the Legislature's 1992 decision to remove from state law the requirement that the executive director be a physician.



Kurdish separatists open fire on Turks

IBTILIS, Turkey — Kurdish separatist guerrillas stopped a bus, ordered the passengers out and opened fire with automatic weapons, killing 13 people, officials said Thursday.

The attack occurred Wednesday near the village of Kokasu in this southeastern province, according to a local official and the Anadolu news agency. No reason was given for the shooting, but insurgents in the area have killed Kurdish civilians who do not support their cause.

Guerrillas operating in the region belong to the outlawed Kurdistan Labor Party, which has been fighting for self-rule in the Kurdish since 1984.

2 million Muslims mark 3-day feast

MECCA, Saudi Arabia — About 2 million Muslim pilgrims to Mecca prayed and lauded sheep at dawn Thursday to mark the start of the three-day Eid al-Adha, or Feast of Sacrifice.

Throughout the world, the estimated 1.3 billion Muslims also began the feast commemorating the Prophet Abraham's willingness to offer his son's life to God.

Elsewhere in Saudi Arabia and neighboring Persian Gulf countries, the rulers rose for dawn prayers, then stood in their palaces to receive lines of well-wishers.

Muslim leaders also exchanged greetings. Sultan Qaboos of Oman reportedly sent one to Iraqi President Saddam Hussein, a pariah in the Persian Gulf since he invaded Kuwait in August 1990.

American architect receives prize

ROME — American architect Frank Gehry was named Thursday as one of five winners of this year's prestigious Japanese Imperial Prize. The other winners, announced at a news conference in Rome, were Japanese film director Akira Kurosawa, French painter Pierre Soulages, English sculptor Anthony Caro and Russian-German composer Alfred Schnittke.

The winners are to be awarded their prizes in Tokyo this fall at an official ceremony attended by the Japanese royal family.

Each will receive about \$117,500. The prize was instituted in 1987 as the equivalent in the art world to the Nobel prizes for science, literature and peace.

Broke entrepreneur enters hospital

PERTH, Australia — Bankrupt entrepreneur Alan Bond, jailed last month on a fraud conviction, has been hospitalized for what appears to be a heart condition, prison officials said on Thursday.

Bond, best known for financing Australia's yachting victory over the United States in the 1983 America's Cup, was taken Tuesday from Wooroloo Prison to a hospital for what was described as a routine chest X-ray.

He was undergoing tests at a second hospital on Thursday. A corrections spokesman said Bond was stable and comfortable, and was expected to return to prison over the weekend. Bond's lawyers expect to hear Friday whether he will be freed on bail pending an appeal of his conviction.

Czechoslovakia could face split

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia — Czech and Slovak rivals charged with governing Czechoslovakia met Thursday for talks that could decide whether the increasingly shaky federation splits into two countries.

Vladimír Křiváček, the federal finance minister who won last week's parliamentary elections in the Czech lands, and Vladimír Mečiar, the Slovakian leader, are at odds over the pace of economic reform and Slovakia's desire for more autonomy. The federation, formed in 1918 from parts of the Austro-Hungarian empire, united the wealthier, more populous Czechs and the poorer and less numerous Slovaks.

Transactions follow Maxwell's death

LONDON — Wheeling and dealing with the money of companies once controlled by Robert Maxwell continues seven months after the publisher's mysterious death at sea, a court-appointed receiver said on Thursday. Peter Phillips said several million dollars had been moved through European banks in the past few weeks in an attempt to evade his grasp.

"Clearly the money has continued to move after Robert Maxwell's death, just as it was alleged to have been moved before it," he said in an interview with British Broadcasting Corp. radio.

Resignation might add to Yugoslavian strife

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Former Communists and other leftists supporting Stobdan Milosevic rallied around Serbia's president Thursday, warning that his ouster would cause chaos and civil war.

Pressure for Milosevic to resign has mounted since the United Nations hit Serbian-dominated Yugoslavia with trade, oil and air embargos May 30 over accusations it has incited the ethnic fighting in Bosnia-Herzegovina.

Opposition parties and independent analysts said the whipping up of pro-Milosevic passions could be a prelude to a violent crackdown against his foes. That could further spread the bloodshed that began when the Yugoslav federation started disintegrating last year.

Illustrating the tensions, a bodyguard for a Milosevic ally, Vojislav Seselj, fired a pistol in the air Thursday when the politician scuffled with taxi drivers the outside parliament who were protesting inflation, witnesses said. The crowd dispersed and no one was reported injured, but about 80 taxis later blocked Revolution Boulevard to protest the incident, the witnesses said.

Fighting in Bosnia's capital, Sarajevo, subsided on Thursday after five days of heavy bombardment by Serb irregulars positioned in the hills surrounding the city. The Belgrade-based Tanjug news agency said the leader of Bosnia's Serbs, Radovan Karadzic, was proposing that all of Sarajevo be put under U.N. protection.

Serb militias have besieged the city for two months in their attempt to carve their own republic from the newly independent Bosnia. But Muslim-led forces, have scored some

gains in recent fighting, and the U.N. sanctions are hurting Serbia's economy. A U.N. convoy on a mission to open Sarajevo's airport for aid flights reached the U.N. offices downtown after being stranded overnight on the city's outskirts following an attack on an escort column.

Meanwhile, Bulgaria's premier, Filip Dimitrov, urged that U.N. or NATO troops impose a cease-fire in

the disintegrated Yugoslav federation. He said he feared fighting could spread to neighboring Balkan nations.

Bosnia's leaders have appealed repeatedly for foreign military intervention, but U.N. and European leaders have shown no inclination to send troops without a cease-fire already in effect.

Serbia's leaders have argued they are cutting ties to Serb fighters in Bosnia. But U.N. officials said Thursday that a Yugoslav air force plane dropped an anti-personnel cluster bomb on Sarajevo on Wednesday.

Thousands of Serbian intellectuals and university students have joined opposition parties and the influential Serbian-Orthodox Church in calling for the ouster of Milosevic and his nationalist government.

Yeltsin: Blame Communists for setbacks

MOSCOW (AP) — As he marks one year in office as Russia's first popularly elected president, Boris Yeltsin is blaming setbacks in his reforms on the "distorted social system" inherited from the Communist era, particularly Mikhail Gorbachev's tenure.

In a series of interviews ahead of Friday's anniversary, Yeltsin described Gorbachev's rule as a period of "stagnation" and implied the former Soviet leader did not have the "personal courage" to embark on real economic reform.

Yeltsin also told reporters: "Agreement can be reached" in talks in Washington next week with President Bush to complete a treaty

on reducing strategic missiles by more than half by the end of the century.

On Thursday, he dispatched Foreign Minister Andrei Kozyrev to meet with U.S. Secretary of State James A. Baker III to iron out details.

He has slowed down the pace of his economic reforms because Russians on fixed incomes are living in "literal poverty."

Trials, but not "a witch hunt," are possible for some senior officials of the former Soviet government for violating human rights and conducting nuclear tests near populated areas.

"The first year has not been an easy one," he told the Russian Information Agency. "It consisted virtually entirely of stressful hard work. But I still believe that we have made the most of it."

"I do, however, feel dissatisfied with the progress of the reforms," he added.

Yeltsin said Russia "cannot agree to a number of demands of the International Monetary Fund."

The IMF is demanding a series of fiscal austerity measures to start an aid package of \$24 billion to Russia.

Japan bill would dispatch troops



TOKYO (AP) — A bill to dispatch Japanese troops abroad for the first time since World War II cleared a key parliamentary panel Thursday over the shouts of opposition lawmakers.

The bill now goes to the full lower house, where the governing Liberal Democrats hold a commanding majority. The legislation has already passed the upper house. While passage now seems inevitable, opposition lawmakers said they will not retreat, leaving open the possibility that they will again use delay tactics to postpone the final vote.

"It is unforgivable to pass such an important bill in a one-sided way," Makoto Tanabe, chairman of the Socialist party, told reporters after the boisterous committee session. "We will strongly protest this."

Critics say the bill violates Japan's postwar constitutional provision, which renounces the use of force in settling international disputes.

The legislation is Japan's response to critics who faulted Tokyo for not sending troops to help oust Iraqi soldiers from Kuwait in the Gulf War.

During the televised session, opposition lawmakers

crowded around committee chairman Yoshiro Hayashi after he ended debate and prepared to call a vote.

They shouted and waved signs reading "Continue the Questioning," and some lawmakers pounded on desks.

"This is embarrassing," Hayashi said. "Please return to your seats."
Socialists and other opponents refused to sit down, then stalked out of the room after the vote.

After they left, committee members of the governing Liberal Democratic Party raised their fists in the traditional "banzai" cheer, often associated with Japanese militarism.

The prospect of a resurgence of Japanese militarism has aroused concern in Japan as well as neighboring countries that suffered under Japanese occupation before and during World War II.

In Seoul, South Korea, dissidents struck the car of the Japanese ambassador with wood placards demanding nullification of the bill. Protesters also have turned out at the Japanese embassy in Manila, the Philippines, this week.

China tries to entice students home; doubts remain

BEIJING (AP) — Chinese authorities floated a new package of incentives today to lure students who fled the country or refused to return after the 1989 crackdown, but they did not clarify the policy toward dissidents.

The state-run China Daily newspaper said the government has drafted a resolution promising freedom of job choice and residency to the more than 100,000 Chinese students in other countries.

The resolution will be submitted soon to the State Council, the Cabinet, for approval, the paper said.

It did not clarify, however, if there will be any political conditions for enjoying the incentives.

Many of overseas students took part in demonstrations or otherwise criticized the Chinese army's attack on the 1989 democracy movement in Beijing.

Last month, authorities expelled one homebound student, Gong Xiaoxia, when she arrived in

Canton. Another scholar, the well-known journalist Dai Qing, was forced to wait in Hong Kong until after the June 3-4 anniversary of the army attack.

Dai returned to Beijing on Sunday, while Gong flew back to the United States on Wednesday.

The treatment of the two women compounded overseas students' hesitancy to take advantage of the government's new welcome mat.

Victims' fund should help victims, not prosecutors

Consider the dilemma of Loretta Shriver. In a few weeks, the Buhl woman may be called into a courtroom and asked to help imprison the man who is charged with stabbing her 13 times. If she cooperates, she may put her son, Donald, back behind bars, where he has spent all but a couple of months of his adult life. If she doesn't, she'll put in jeopardy any assistance from the state victims' compensation fund, money she and her husband, James, need to help pay \$9,000 in medical bills not covered by insurance.

Twin Falls County prosecutors and the Idaho Industrial Commission, the state agency that administers the victims' compensation fund, haven't paid the Shriverts a dime yet.

Prosecutors initially said Loretta Shriver was uncooperative; they've since backed off that characterization, but they're not yet willing to recommend the state give her any victims' compensation money until they hear what she says in court.

In the process, they've victimized Loretta Shriver a second time. They also seem to have jeopardized their own hopes of convicting Donald Shriver on the testimony of his mother, the only eyewitness to the stabbing.

If Donald Shriver's defense attorney gets Loretta Shriver on the stand, won't he ask about whether the quality of her victims' compensation award is contingent on the quality of her testimony?

The situation is an outrage, made possible by a poorly thought-out law that is being used not as a tool of justice but as a weapon of the prosecution.

As envisioned by the Legislature, the victim's compensation law was designed to provide a no-strings-attached fund to help victims of violent crime and their families.

Paid for by a \$10-per-misdemeanor, \$20-per-felony tax on crooks, the money was designed to help people such as Loretta Shriver, who had been savaged by criminals, put their lives back together.

The law requires cooperation on the part of the victim, to be determined by the Industrial Commission.

In reality, the call is made by the prosecutor; if a prosecutor tells the commission a victim isn't playing ball, the victim doesn't get the money.

It's as simple as that. Say the wrong thing, and you end up like Loretta Shriver.

To our way of thinking, this is a conflict of interest akin to Twin Falls Deputy Prosecutor Frank Nichols trying to get people indicted by a grand jury on drug charges while depending on seizures from drug cases for his income.

In a society of laws, justice should never depend on who's holding the checkbook.

It's time for the Legislature to make sure the Industrial Commission starts compensating victims and stops victimizing them.

Any person who spends as much time as I do searching for bears, walking mile after endless mile, following tracks, checking logs and stumps they've torn up or looking at the trees they claw and leave their mark just to extensively study their habits will tell you that not all bears living in the area will consistently feed at a bait site. And also that a high percentage of the bear activity occurs after dark so they may never present a

photography or harvest experience for the baiter.

Rod Rees, I baited this year and I did not harvest a bear, nor did a lot of other baiters, but I've got pictures and I enjoyed it.

In your letter to the editor, you referred to bears as stupid animals. I really question your intelligence with that remark, or were you just thinking of Yogi and Boo-Boo? I realize that many people never see a bear in the wild or only occasionally. I truly believe that it is not a lack of bears but that they are intelligent and elusive.

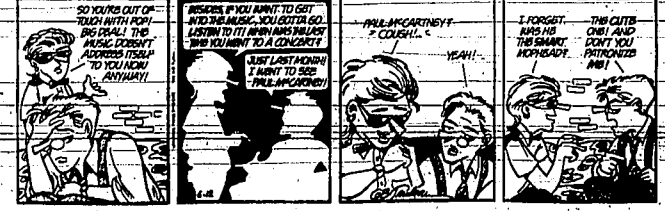

Pocatello schools to ask for voter help

POCATELLO — The Pocatello School Board, facing the prospect of a multimillion-dollar budget cut that could eliminate programs and increase class size, has voted to seek additional revenue from district property owners.

Board Chairman Robert Weppner said the \$1.9 million supplemental levy coupled with what all too many parents believed were only limited cuts in administrative expenses was the only way to avoid losing programs.

The board action late Wednesday came over demands of parents and teachers earlier in the week for dramatic cuts in central office administration.

County cannot interfere with clerks

BOISE — When county clerks are acting in their capacity as clerk of the court, county commissions may not interfere with the hiring or paying of employees, the Idaho Supreme Court says.

The court on Thursday sided with Boundary County Clerk Norma Estep, who got into a battle with the County Commission over the hiring of a deputy clerk of the court.

The Supreme Court agreed with Estep that when she's acting in a judicial capacity, the County Commission has no authority. Chief Justice Robert Bakes signed an order to commissioners Ronald Smith, Merle Dinning and Orrin Everhart to stop interfering with the clerk's selection of a deputy or pay.

Stuart denied new murder trial

LEWISTON — Convicted torture murderer Gen. Francis Stuart's bid for a new trial has been denied by 2nd District Judge Ronald Schilling, discounting testimony Stuart's jailhouse telephone calls were tapped.

In a 33-page memorandum filed Wednesday, Schilling ruled he found no evidence Stuart's jail-house telephone calls with his attorneys were monitored.

The ruling left Clearwater County Prosecutor John Swayne "extremely gratified and happy."

The decision negates the need for the second phase of the evidentiary hearing. Schilling said that only if he found Stuart's phone calls with attorneys were monitored would the state be forced to show it had gathered evidence by other means.

Judge overturns grant for radio tower

MOSCOW — A judge has overturned the Latah County Commission's decision to allow construction of a radio tower near Moscow, although it was built last fall.

Second District Judge John Bengston ruled there is little evidence to show another radio station is an absolute necessity in the area.

In July 1990, the commissioners unanimously upheld the planning and zoning commission's decision to grant a conditional-use permit to Robert Hauser, owner of KCLX at Colfax, Wash. for the tower on Paradise Ridge southeast of Moscow.

Paradise Ridge residents James Macdonald and Mary Butters subsequently challenged the county's decision in court.

State will investigate scholarship offers

BOISE — The attorney general's office says it's investigating a Georgia-based company's telephone solicitation, which tells parents their children have been awarded five-year, \$4,000 per year college scholarships.

The Consumer Protection Unit said what parents get-if they pay \$98 is a list of 100 to 125 scholarship sources. The student still must apply, and there's no guarantee that a scholarship will be landed.

Legislators split over special session need

POCATELLO (AP) — State legislators around the Fort-Hell-Indian Reservation are divided over the need for a special legislative session on Indian gambling.

Some say if a special session is held; it should consider other things, such as the need for more school funding.

Gov. Cecil Andrus told legislative leaders Wednesday he'd call a special session about July 27, if lawmakers could reach substantial agreement on the language of a constitutional amendment. It would clarify the state ban on casino-type gambling, even on Indian reservations.

"We certainly ought to clarify the intent of the people of Idaho, and that procedure would," said Sen. Allan Larsen, R-Blackfoot.

"I just don't understand what the great need or great necessity is for it right now," said Sen. Mary Lloyd, D-Pocatello.

A session could cost as much as \$25,000 per day. Lloyd said she is not yet convinced its results would be worth the price.

"If it's a critical issue, yes, but I am not prepared to say whether I think this is worth it or not," Lloyd said.

On the other hand, "I suspect it's something that needs to be done," said Sen. C.E. Bilyeu, D-Pocatello.

Indians want negotiations

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Idaho-Indian tribes want the state to negotiate gambling regulations rather than waste money on a special legislative session to outlaw casino-style gaming on reservations, a spokesman said today.

"We're very concerned with the state of Idaho calling a special session," said Ernie Stensgar, a spokesman for the Alliance of Idaho Tribes.

"The state should not waste \$25,000 a day on the Legislature when 'public schools are in dire need of public money,'" he said.

Gov. Cecil Andrus said Wednesday he would call a special session next month on Indian gambling if legislative leaders can get a bipartisan consensus beforehand.

The session would be limited to constitutional amendment that would block casino-type gaming on Indian reservations.

Lloyd and Sen. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, said the deficit in public school money worries residents more than Indian gaming.

The Pocatello school district faces a \$2.3-million shortfall for the 1992-93 school year; Blackfoot schools are short \$900,000.

McDermott said school funding should be addressed if a special session is called.

Moreover, there are legal con-

cerns about bringing Idaho's 126 lawmakers to Boise to set state policy on reservation gambling, according to McDermott, an attorney. The Shoshone-Bannock Tribes of Fort Hall and the Coeur d'Alene Tribe of northern Idaho have asked the state to negotiate agreements to expand tribal gambling operations.

Under the federal Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, Indian tribes can offer any kind of gambling that is legal in the state.

A recent 4th District Court ruling said the 1988 amendment creating a state lottery "also authorized all types of gaming by nonprofit organizations, unless specific legislation restricted the gaming."

McDermott said changing state law after negotiations with the tribes have begun could be viewed unfavorably by federal courts.

"I do have a concern that calling a special session on receipt of request by the state to negotiate in good faith may be seen, as a matter of law, of bad faith (by) the federal courts," McDermott said.

Tribal leaders, who urged Andrus not to call a special session, threatened to sue the state if lawmakers changed state law.

AIDS-infected north Idaho man kills self

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Jennifer Harris is struggling to overcome her anger at the suicide of her 25-year-old husband, an AIDS victim who unknowingly infected her.

"I'm angry at him for doing this," the 24-year-old mother of two boys said. "He needed help. Everybody knew that."

Last Friday, Dave Harris went to a local pawn shop, bought a gun, returned to the Harris house, laid down in the bathtub and shot himself in the chest.

Two days earlier, Harris had unsuccessfully tried to take his life by swallowing 30 pills, but his wife called emergency medical personnel and his stomach was pumped at the Kootenai Medical Center.

He had been despondent since he was diagnosed with AIDS last August. He had gone to the hospital after experiencing night sweats, weight loss and coughing — common symptoms of the fatal disease. Jennifer Harris was diagnosed with the AIDS virus but not the full-blown disease, and her two boys, ages 2 and 3, have been diagnosed as free of both.

She said that despite a history of arguing that sometimes became violent during their four-year marriage, she decided it was important to stay with her husband after his diagnosis. But she finally tired of their fighting and earlier this spring said she wanted a divorce.

"He told me he wasn't going to grant me a divorce," she recalled. "He was going to make me a widow."

After his earlier suicide attempt, Jennifer Harris secured a court order to protect her from her husband's "violent outbursts" only to have him appear at the house with the 25-caliber handgun that he openly displayed to his children before going into the bathroom.

She fled to call police from a neighbors and when she returned, officers told her Dave Harris was dead from a gunshot wound.

"He went to a pawn shop and came back with a loaded gun," she said, maintaining that the suicide would not have occurred if the state had a waiting period and background check for gun purchases since his prior suicide attempt.

"Suicide is selfish," said Jan Schwanz of the Panhandle Health District, "the ultimate selfish act."

Sen. Symms son's trial will start in October

BOISE (AP) — Trial is scheduled to begin in Boise Oct. 19 for Daniel Symms, son of Sen. Steve Symms of Idaho, on federal charges that he falsified documents for alien farm workers.

Also charged is Symms Fruit Ranch, Inc., Caldwell, a fruit ranch owned by the Symms family and one of Idaho's largest farming operations. The senator isn't directly involved but is on the board of directors for the fruit ranch and owns a substantial interest in the company.

Steve Symms is retiring from the Senate at the end of this year, after two Senate terms and a total of 20 years in Congress.

Daniel Symms, operations manager for Symms Fruit Ranch, has pleaded innocent.

U.S. Senior Judge James Burns of Portland heard arguments and motions for three days in Boise this week and on Wednesday set a date for the trial, which could take several weeks. A grand jury in May of 1991 returned a 74-count indictment and listed 50 witnesses it planned to call, including Sen. Symms.

Burns also plans additional hearings on evidentiary matters in late August.

Pocatello sues for cleanup aid

POCATELLO (AP) — City officials have sued several insurance companies, neighboring municipalities and Bannock County in an attempt to get some help in financing cleanup of any contamination from the abandoned Pocatello Creek landfill.


"The city is not going into this alone," City Attorney Dean Trammer said.

Along with the local government, the suits, in 6th District Court, name Pacific Indemnity, Hartford Insurance, United Pacific — Reliance, Aetna Insurance, Fireman's Fund, Maryland Insurance, American Insurance, Western Insurance, Colonial Penn Insurance and Compass Insurance. All had policies in effect between 1968 through 1986.

West Tribes vow to oppose water rights ruling

FORT WASHAKIE, Wyo. (AP) — The Shoshone and Northern Arapaho tribes have vowed to keep pursuing their right to regulate water on the Wind River Indian Reservation despite last week's ruling by the Wyoming Supreme Court that the state has final say.

In a statement, tribal leaders said they are "extremely disappointed" in the decision and are considering such responses as an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The lack of clarity in the state high court's ruling will lead to more litigation unless a comprehensive water use and management agreement is reached in the Wind River Basin, the tribes said.

In a landmark decision, the state Supreme Court last Friday ruled in the state's favor in the longstanding water dispute with the tribes. The court voted 3-2 that the state has the upper hand in regulating water on the Wind River Reservation.

And the court also voted 3-2 that the Shoshone and Arapaho tribes don't have the right to use their future agricultural water rights to hold back water on the Wind River to establish and maintain fisheries.

The long-awaited ruling was intended to resolve the sometimes bitter battle that has pitted Indians wanting to improve their economy with world-class fisheries against non-Indian ranchers and farmers wanting to make sure they have enough water for irrigation.

But the tribes said they are concerned that the Supreme Court ignored an extensive body of law concerning tribal sovereignty and both Indian and non-Indian law.

"This is a continuing example of the efforts of non-Indians to take or destroy the value of tribal property whenever it is determined that the property has value," said John Washakie, co-chairman of the tribes' Joint Business Council and a Shoshone tribal member.

Burton Hutchinson, the council's other chairman, said the Arapaho and Shoshone tribes "will not go away."

And if an accident occurred, it could be bad, said Marvin Resnikoff, who spoke Wednesday in Laramie as a paid consultant brought by the Wyoming Outdoor Council and Wyoming Against Nuclear Dumps.

"Four-hundred-and-thirty days to clean up...\$620 million it would cost to clean up, 20 square miles would be contaminated—that's according to Department of Energy contractor," Resnikoff said.

But Robert Jefferson, a consultant for the nuclear industry, disputes that claim.

Lucky players enjoy winnings; Nevada casinos cope with losses

CARSON CITY (AP) — Las Vegas Strip casinos were hit hard by lucky players in April, giving clubs statewide an overall 1.6 percent decrease in winnings compared with the same month a year earlier.

The state Gaming Control Board said today the poor showing by several unnamed resorts on the Strip was the main reason for the decrease. Clubs statewide won \$454 million for the month.

GCB spokesman Harlan Elges said other areas of the state showed gains in April, but the Strip declines "drew down the overall win for Las Vegas as well as for the state. They simply did not have a good month."

The April decline continued a pattern of erratic revenues for the clubs. In March the clubs had a slight 0.4 percent gain, following a strong 13 percent gain in February.

The April win of \$454 million brought fiscal year-to-date revenues to \$4.73 billion, up 2 percent from the same period in 1990-91.

The monthly winnings generated \$27.6 million in revenues for the state. That's 4.5 percent less than April 1991 tax collections. For the year to date, the tax take is \$308.2 million, up 3.2 percent.

Las Vegas Strip clubs accounted for \$189.6 million of the total April revenues, for a 10.9 percent decrease. Downtown Las Vegas clubs accounted for \$57.1 million, up 4.2 percent.

Laughlin clubs on the Colorado river accounted for \$41.9 million in April, up 6.1 percent.

Reno-North Tahoe clubs showed April winnings of \$74.3 million, for a gain of 6.7 percent — the biggest gain of any area in the state.

Elges said Reno generally had a good month and the revenues also were helped by expansion of the Clarion hotel-casino. But the gain was well below the 16 percent increase reported in March.

Clubs on Tahoe's south shore collected \$26.2 million from players during April for a 3.5 percent gain compared with April 1991 revenues.

Clubs in Elko County took in \$11.2 million for a 2.4 percent gain. Legislators had assumed 7.5 percent growth in the tax revenues over the year. Due to the sagging economy, the estimate was revised downward to 4.6 percent — but even that now appears optimistic. The latest revenue report is bad news for Gov. Bob Miller, who already has imposed layoffs and other cost-cutting moves because of the slump in gaming and sales taxes.

In Bismarck, time does stand still

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — Cross west over the Missouri River a little north of Bismarck and time becomes distorted.

In Oliver County, depending on their livelihood, the residents set their clocks to either Central or Mountain Time.

Those who commute to Bismarck do business with companies that usually find it easier to keep Central Time. Banks, schools, city offices and businesses that cater to the local population remain an hour behind in the Mountain zone.

Two years ago, the county voted in favor on switching to Central Time. Then the bureaucracy in Washington took over.

"We haven't forgotten about it," said Joanne Betric, an attorney with the Department of Transportation, which must approve such changes.

"We'll resolve it one way or another in a timely manner."

That could be this fall, she said. Mercer County, which abuts Oliver County along its northern and western boundaries, defeated a proposal to go Central in June 1990.

Wyman Sheets, a farmer in Center, the Oliver County seat, petitioned his county commission to allow voters to decide whether to switch. It hasn't been a hot topic of conversation since then, he said.

"The majority of the people did vote for it, but I don't think there's a big push to do anything about it," Sheets said.

Sheets said he believed no action would be taken unless both counties wanted to change.

"There's nothing in writing to that effect," said Oliver County State Attorney John Mahoney. "It may have been spoken by a few people at the time, but nothing was written down."

The county commission heeded the wishes of its residents and sent the proposal last fall to Washington.

The Department of Transportation has rules to follow, Peirce said. First, it will issue a "notice of proposed rule change," which she explained is "an official-looking document in the Federal Register."

Then a public hearing would be held in the county and the public would have another 45 to 60 days to submit written comments.

If the final OK is given, the time change probably would be made in the fall when daylight-saving time ends. Instead of "falling back," Oliver County residents would keep their clocks the same.

The issue could be moot if Mitchell Bohn, chief of the state Department of Economic Development and Finance, has his way. Last week, Bohn said he thinks North Dakota should be entirely in Central Time.

"That might be hard to sell, but it isn't the worst idea in the world," Mahoney said, "being that Williston is way-west-of-here and they're in the Central time zone."

Porn king sentenced

LAS VEGAS (AP) — A man reputed to be the world's No. 1 porn peddler has been sentenced to four years in prison and fined \$1 million.

Ruben Sturman, 68, also agreed to forfeit interests in adult bookstores, movie theaters and buildings in Las Vegas, San Francisco and Reno.

Court lets stand ruling to return Becker to job

BOISE — The Idaho Supreme Court Thursday refused to reconsider its decisions reinstating 5th District Judge Phillip Becker to the bench.

Becker was suspended after a number of alcohol-related incidents, but was reinstated under tight controls ordered by the Supreme Court. The Idaho Judicial Council, which recommended removal from office, had asked to present additional testimony.

The court said the council failed to prove the new evidence wasn't available at the time of an earlier hearing.

Hydro proposals on tap as Water Resources Board meets

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Water Resources Board will meet here today.

The meeting will start at 8:30 a.m. at the Canyon Springs Inn and includes a 30-minute period for public comments.

The board will discuss a request by LB Industries of Boise for an exemption to the state's interim protection status. The developer wants to build hydroelectric projects at Boulder, Empire and Kanaka rapids.

The protected status blocks development of the river until a comprehensive plan for the river is completed. But the board has the authority to grant exemptions for projects that do not impair the values for which the river would be protected.

The board also will discuss the status of moratoriums on ground and surface water developments in the Snake River, Salmon and Clearwater rivers and Bear River basins.

Woman charges 21-year-old raped her at his parents' home

TWIN FALLS — A 22-year-old Twin Falls woman says she was raped at a home near Kimberly last week.

An investigator from the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office said the suspect, a 21-year-old convicted child molester, is being held at the Twin Falls County jail on a suspended probation violation.

No rap charges were filed Thursday, but Cpl. Robert Gauthier said "our investigation is continuing."

The woman reported on Monday that she had gone with the man and a girlfriend to his parents' home near Kimberly to watch movies June 5, according to documents in the suspect's court file.

The woman told authorities that the man dragged her into a bedroom and raped her.

Felon seeking sheriff's seat needs to pay his filing fee

TWIN FALLS — The Democrat running for sheriff in Twin Falls County, convicted felon Thomas Stone, still has not paid his \$40 candidate filing fee one day before the deadline.

Stone, 41, announced a write-in campaign just five days before the May 26 primary election and garnered the five votes necessary to get onto the November ballot as a Democrat.

But Stone, who is in the Twin Falls County jail awaiting trial on felony assault and battery charges, has not paid the required filing fee, courthouse officials said Thursday.

The fee is due 10 days after the official canvass of the ballots, which was completed June 3.

Try free fishing this weekend at 'barrier-free' Oster Lake

HAGERMAN — The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service invites the disabled to a day of free fishing Saturday at the new "barrier-free" Oster Lake No. 1.

Hansen could not be reached for comment Thursday.

The drawing originally had been scheduled for April 15, but the date was pushed back two weeks to allow organizers to gather more donations.

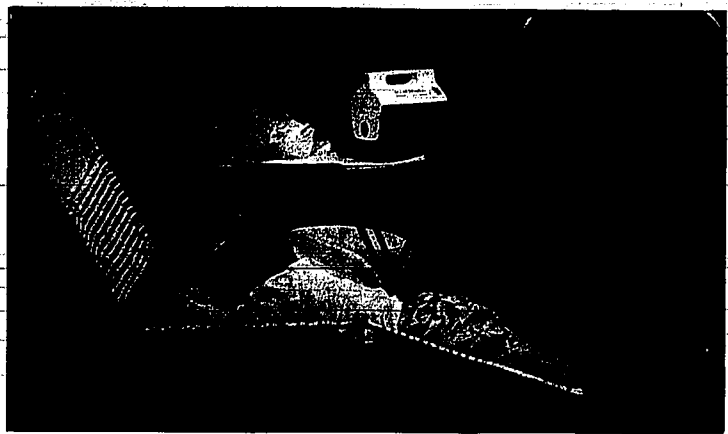
The drawing was the latest in a series of unsuccessful fund-raising efforts by the

'Oldster' replays Gem history

KETCHUM — They say you're as old as you feel, but how old is the Oldest Man of Idaho?

That was the burning question yesterday as Idaho history came alive for a group of youngsters and adults who listened to the recollections of "The Oldest Man of Idaho."

However, the Old Man didn't reveal his true age. In fact, he doesn't remember exactly how old he is — somewhere around 105 or 106, by his estimation.

"I was born in the Idaho Territory before it was a state ... up there on the shores of Lake Pend Oreille. They say I'm the oldest man in Idaho," he drawled in a husky voice full of age.

"We didn't have cars, television or

paved streets. I grew up pokin' around the woods."

Clark Heglar, a Ketchum photographer who isn't half that old, portrays the Old Man, creating a character to entertain folks and pass on a knowledge of Idaho history and trivia.

His storytelling hour, sponsored by the College of Southern Idaho, kept the attention of the kids gathered around and drilled the brains of two Hailley fourth graders who had just finished studying Idaho's history.

"Ya know what brought people to Idaho?" the Old Man asked with genuine interest, the morning sun reflecting off his spectacles.

"That's right, it was the mining, but first it was the trapping."

That introduction led into a brief account of the trapping, mining, and when the sheep

shipping which gave prominence to the Wood River Valley, enough so that the first telephone service in the state was set up in Hailley in 1883 followed by the state's first electrical light plant in 1887.

"And did ya know that television was invented in Idaho, right over in Rigby by a 15-year old lad by the name of Filo T. Farnsworth in 1923 — no 1922, the Old Man corrected himself.

"(In) 1922, that's when Dad bought a Model T. Said he was too old to drive, but he bought it anyway. That's when he ran into the cow ..."

Heglar said the Old Man was created after he had been putting together a program on Idaho.

Instead of portraying individual characters out of Idaho's past, Heglar felt

Hansen receives new post office — complete with wrong zip code

HANSEN — The U.S. Postal Service asks that senders use the correct zip code. Now Hansen residents are requesting that their local postal service do the same thing.

And Hansen residents have good reason to do so.

Through a recent postal office fiasco, the wrong zip code was emblazoned on the front of Hansen's new post office that is scheduled to open July 1.

Big, silver numbers on the building declare the zip code is 83335 — to the surprise of many of the town's residents. Hansen's correct zip code is 83334. The zip code now on the building belongs to Hazelton.

The blunder occurred last Friday when the incorrect numbers were hung, and ever since Postmaster Jackie Johnson said she has been deluged with telephone calls and visits from many of Hansen's 864 residents.

"There hasn't been anybody who hasn't called," Johnson said. "That's all I've done for the last four days."

Many of the callers believed Hansen's zip code was being changed, she said.

Johnson recalled one frustrated resident saying, "First you move our post office and then you change our zip code." Johnson has even gone so far as to put up a sign that reads, "No we are not changing our zip code."

Johnson said the slip-up occurred when the head postal office in Boise ordered the numbers to put up on the building. While the right number was ordered, things got mixed up between Boise and Hansen, and the wrong number was tacked up. "Someone out of Boise must have

pleked up the '5', and nobody knew about it until they put it up," Johnson said. "They aren't from Hansen; so they wouldn't have known it was wrong."

Despite the mistake and all the complaints it has caused, Johnson still sees the humor in the mix-up.

She said she planned to take a picture of the error and display one copy in the new post office and send one to the Hazelton post office.

"We get Hazelton's mail anyway — we might as well have their zip code," Johnson said.

Crews unearth graves

BELLEVUE — The century-old graves of two pioneer children were uncovered in Bellevue this week by crews installing the city's sewer system.

The unmarked graves were found by construction workers digging a trench near the intersection of Cedar and 7th Streets, according to Bellevue Marshall Dean Biggs.

"They came across bones and pieces of a casket," he said. "It appears to have been a child. But there isn't much left, just bits and pieces."

A second casket, much smaller than the first, was uncovered nearby. Its size suggests it probably contained an infant, according to Biggs, but no remains survived.

The graves were found on city property in what was probably the original Bellevue Cemetery site, according to Blaine County Coroner Russ Mikel. The cemetery was moved to its present location, a half mile to the south, in the early 1880s, and most of its graves were reinterred at that location.

The pioneer-era graves uncovered this week apparently got left behind, Mikel said.

A copy of the Blaine County Cemetery Records on file in the Regional History Department at The Community Library in Ketchum describes the pioneer cemetery as being located on a hillside "some distance from town on very, very uneven ground, treeless and grassless." A number of the markers are crude concrete affairs with nothing more than a year or a last name on them.

Interment dates at the old cemetery ranged from 1884 to 1901, according to the records. One marker reads: "Miss Ona McKinsey, Age 5."

The grave sites uncovered this week offered no clues as to the identity of their occupants, the coroner reported.

"Everything was in a very deteriorated state," said Mikel, who disinterred the bones and caskets this week. He has applied to the state for a permit to re-bury the pioneer children in a more suitable location.

The reinterment will probably take place at the "new" Bellevue Cemetery, according to Biggs.

No decision has yet been made on when it will occur or whether a ceremony will be performed.

Shoshone eyes 'upscale' food from the Depot

Senate aides garner salaries in 6 figures

Two aides to Idaho's senators are close to the top of the U.S. Senate payroll, the Washington-D.C.-based newspaper Roll Call says.

The paper on Thursday published a list of Senate aides making at least \$100,000 per year, covering the first half of the current fiscal year, October through March.

The top salary listed was \$125,800 for several aides. But not far behind was the \$118,861 paid to Gregory Casey, chief of staff in Washington, D.C., for Sen. Larry Craig and Phil Reberger, the Boise-based chief of staff and administrative assistant to Sen. Steve Symms, who was paid at the rate of \$118,706 per year.

Reberger also heads the Republican U.S. Senate campaign of Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne. Earlier this year, Reberger announced he was going to half time on the Senate job to devote time to the Kempthorne campaign. Half of his Senate salary would give Reberger \$59,353 per year.

Symms said it was easy to justify Reberger's salary. "It's very important to have good people close to the people you represent. He makes sure we have a good staff in Washington in close communication with the staff in Idaho."

Sen. Curtis Hulse's chief of staff and administrative assistant Wendy Higginsbohm \$122,026 per year, according to the Roll Call report, and Sen. Jake Garn's chief of staff and administrative assistant Winton P. Glines.

Elsewhere in Idaho politics, the clerk of the House released the latest personal disclosure reports required of all members of Congress and top appointed officials.

Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings, who is giving up his 2nd District seat to run for Symms' Senate post, listed few financial assets outside of his house at Rexburg, land, and small savings and retirement accounts. All of the income, which is listed in broad categories only, was listed at \$2,500 or less except rental payments on the Rexburg home.

Stallings listed a mortgage on the Rexburg home at between \$15,000 and \$50,000. He said he still is on unpaid sabbatical from his position as a history college professor at Ricks College.

Members of Congress no longer can accept honorariums for making speeches or appearances.

Stallings said a \$2,000 honorarium from the Pacific Northwest Generating Cooperative last July went to the University of Idaho for a scholarship.

Democratic Rep. Larry LaRocco, who was a Boise stockbroker before being elected to Congress in 1990, reported substantial holdings in stocks and bonds and joint interest in certificates of deposit with relatives in California.

His wife, Chris, reported an interest in Clauderott Farms, Wilder, valued at between \$100,000 and \$250,000. They jointly own an undeveloped lot at McCall valued at between \$15,000 and \$50,000 and the LaRoccos have several retirement accounts valued at up to \$50,000.

Gooding trustees question new law

GOODING—School officials in Gooding say Idaho's Truth and Taxation law caused confusion for the district recently.

The district ran an advertisement last week, saying it was raising taxes, when in truth no such thing is taking place.

The reason has a lot to do with the form of the advertisement as required by the new Truth and Taxation law that took effect this year, according to Superintendent Jim Cobble.

"The ads don't tell the whole truth," Cobble said. "They made it look like there was a big raise."

Although the district reduced its 1992-93 budget by 2.4 percent, it advertised a 10.1 percent tax increase. That fact caused some residents in town to attend a recent school board meeting complaining about the raise.

The Truth in Taxation law mandates that all taxing districts give adequate notice that taxes are going to be raised.

Cobble said what really happened has to do with a change in school district funding this year.

The district received additional funds last year through an emergency tax levy. This year, it is raising taxes 10 percent. However, without the emergency tax levy, its total tax collection will actually fall.

In fact, even with the tax increase and without the levy, taxes will go down 2.4 percent.

By law, the district had to include the tax increase in its advertisement that some folks in town questioned.

The numbers break down this way:

• Last year's emergency levy plus regular tax levies within the Gooding School District totaled \$3,172,558.

• This year, with a 10 percent tax increase but no emergency levy, the school district's total levy is \$3,145,347.

Several residents questioned school trustees Tuesday about the tax increase they had seen advertised in the newspaper.

Benny Benjamin, calling himself a concerned taxpayer, said his local taxes are up to \$356 per year, or \$1 a day.

"Each year, it's getting harder to keep the lid on," he said.

What he is griping about is the amount we already pay," Rene Simmons said.

Cobble said the School District had an emergency levy last year because of increased student enrollment.

This year, he said, the district does not have a levy, and so is receiving \$27,211 less than the 1991-92 budget of \$3,172,558.

"Your taxes may go up, but if they do, it's not because the school is getting more money," Cobble said.

"We have actually reduced our budget, and that's very difficult to do in time of inflation."

However, he explained, the levy from last year cannot be shown in the Truth and Taxation advertisement, and so the figures are misleading to the public.

"Some of it (required information in the advertisement) is 'what ifs' and 'ands' and 'hows,' but doesn't always measure exactly what's happening," Cobble said.

He noted that the cost of that advertising was more than \$700 for the Gooding School District, and the cost statewide was about \$100,000.

"That would have bought a lot of textbooks," he said. Cobble said Gooding is one of the lowest taxing school districts in Idaho. "We are about as conservative as we can be," he said.

Benjamin asked what happened to lottery money that schools were supposed to receive.

Cobble said lottery funds, by law, can be spent only on plant facilities.

Two years ago, he said, Gooding received \$49,000 from the lottery. Last year, the amount was \$40,000 and this year, Gooding will get \$30,000.

"It's diminishing, but it's still significant," Cobble said.

"Lottery money this year," he said, will pay for a new roof and a new parking at the high school. Last year, it paid for new sidewalks.

June Duncan asked the board if school districts in Gooding County could save money by having less administrators.

Board Chairman Claire Major said consolidation has been considered, but it would not save us as much as you would think it would."

She explained that superintendents in Bliss and Hagerman are also principals, and principals at all schools have multiple duties.

Major said there is a "ridiculous amount of paperwork" required for federal reports from each district. But the reports have to be done, she said, and it would be too much work for one regional superintendent.

So assistant superintendents would have to be hired, and total salaries in a consolidated district would be comparable to what they are now, Major said.

In other business: Trustees met in executive session to discuss teacher contract negotiations.

Elementary Principal Teresa Bennett said she is in the process of hiring a kindergarten teacher and a third-grade teacher.

Trustees accepted the resignation of Patsy Eisinger, who is retiring after 30 years as the high school honors English teacher. Also, Gail Cushman and Lecann Mueller resigned as drama coaches because each was receiving only half pay.

And Pat O'Dell resigned as cheerleader adviser, citing lack of time.

KIMBERLY -- City Council members faced opposition Tuesday night to an ordinance that will reduce the amount of "junk" in the city limits.

The junk ordinance covers everything from abandoned vehicles to old refrigerators and paint. Opponents of the ruling pushed for an even stronger definition of junk.

"Who decides what junk is?" resident Bob Hudelson asked. "What you may consider junk may not be junk to me."

Residents Wes and Helen McCord expressed concern about a restoration project Wes and his son are undertaking with two late 1950-model pickups.

"The intention of this is to clean up and clean up the town of junk," Councilman George McAdams said. "If we can see that work is being done on it, then there wouldn't be a problem."

they also depreciate the value of the property surrounding it. Mayor Jesse Posey said. "The council passed the ordinance 3 to 1 with the promise that they would be fair in determining what is junk."

The City Council also rejected a request from the Kimberly School District to pay for a portion of the gravel to be put in front of the new middle school.

"If we did go along with you, we'd just be asking for a lot of problems," Councilman Ted Wasko said.

Wasko contended that the area between businesses or houses and the street is the responsibility of the owner. He said paying for the gravel would set a precedent and lead to other requests.

Members discussed the possibility of placing more restrictions on water usage or declaring an emergency if the water level drops too low.

The council agreed to provide more education to the public about the seriousness of the shortage. Council members also agreed they may take more strict measures later if necessary.

Parents oppose year-round schooling

TWIN FALLS -- Most parents who responded to an unscientific survey by the Twin Falls School District last month said they don't want their children going to school on a year-round schedule.

Of more than 3,700 surveys sent home with students at each of the district's six elementary schools, 1,294 parents filled out the surveys and returned them.

Of those, 756 parents or 58 percent said they do not want their kids going to school on a year-round schedule; 285 parents or 22 percent said they did and 253 parents or 20 percent said they were uncertain.

The survey did not ask parents how many children they have, so it does not indicate how many children are represented by the survey responses.

A majority of parents at every elementary school said they were against year-round schooling.

It may indicate that the idea of year-round schooling is more popular with residents who do not have children in school than with those

who do, Superintendent Terrell Donich said.

Over the past few years, several Twin Falls residents have suggested that the district look into year-round schooling, but a series of school district planning committees has always rejected that option.

The survey showed that there are enough people who said yes or said they were uncertain to justify looking at the issue more carefully, Donich said.

If the survey reflects the percentage of parents districtwide who are willing to have their children attend a year-round school, they would fill one school, Donich said.

"We can see that we need to get a lot more information out to parents about the pros and cons of year-round education," he said.

School district officials conducted

the survey to determine whether enough interest in year-round schooling exists to warrant a feasibility study of year-round schooling.

The survey showed there was enough interest, so district officials will continue educating the public about the concept and explore whether year-round schooling is affordable, Donich said.

Students who attend schools on year-round schedules go to class 180 days a year, just as children do on traditional schedules.

The difference is that children on year-round schedules have shorter but more frequent vacations spaced out at different times of the year, with some children attending school and some not all year.

For instance, under one year-round schedule, four classes of children would use three classrooms,

with one group off for three weeks at a time. All students would attend class for nine weeks and have four, three-week breaks.

All students would be out of school 10 days for Christmas break. Year-round schooling advocates say children forget less over shorter vacations and a school district that adopts such a schedule saves millions of dollars in construction costs.

The cost of operating the school system per pupil is also less expensive, they say.

The district is only considering going to a year-round schedule at elementary schools that have air-conditioning; the future elementary school in South Park, Perrine Elementary School, Sawtooth Elementary School and part of Lincoln Elementary School.

A Sawtooth parent wrote on the survey: "Day-care problems. Summer recreation problems. Family vacation problems. All schools need to do this if any schools do this. No. No. No."

"As an educator, I am 100 percent in favor of year-round school," another parent wrote.

Gunman kills 1 in spree

PHOENIX (AP) -- A man wearing a bulletproof vest and toting a .45 caliber pistol opened fire in a city office after being refused confidential information Thursday, killing one woman and wounding two others before being shot to death by police.

The flak-jacketed gunman was shot down as he faced two officers in shorts and polo shirts who were on a bicycle patrol in the area and were the first on the scene, said Detective Len Speliopoulos. The officers saw the gunman behind the glass doors of a records office and opened fire when he turned as if to shoot, hitting him in the head.

"It appears he doesn't know anyone in this office and it appears as though the shooting was indiscriminate," the police spokesman said. The gunman's vest stopped at least three bullets, said fire Capt. Erik Hoyer, one of the first to arrive after the shooting.

The motive for the rampage was unclear.

Immediately before the shooting, the gunman had asked for personal information on an individual and was turned down, Speliopoulos said. The gunman was dressed in slacks and a jacket, which apparently hid the bulletproof vest, Speliopoulos said.

The 36-year-old gunman, whose name was withheld, wasn't a current city worker and apparently never had been employed there, Speliopoulos said.

Three women were injured in addition to the gunman and a fifth person was treated for what Speliopoulos described as stress.

One of the women was pronounced

nounced dead at St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center and a second woman was in surgery more than four hours after the 11 a.m. attack, said Debra Gelbart, hospital spokeswoman.

In guarded condition with multiple gunshot wounds was Paula J. Carroll, 44, said Bill Byron, spokesman for Good Samaritan Regional Medical Center. A woman who wanted her name withheld was treated at Good Samaritan for stress trauma, said spokeswoman Terri Jones.

"Everyone in the building's traumatized," said Steve Jensen, a fire department spokesman.

It was the third time in three months that someone apparently driven by personal problems opened fire on strangers in the Phoenix area.

NHL president Ziegler steps down

TORONTO — John Ziegler is leaving as NHL president after 15 years of running a league that has been ridiculed for its failures rather than praised for any success.

Alan Eagleson, former executive director of the NHL Players' Association and now Hockey Canada's chief international negotiator, said Thursday he had spoken with Ziegler and that the league boss had told him "he's relieved to be going, and he's going with dignity."

NHL governors will hold a conference call Friday to ratify terms of a settlement agreement, a league governor said.

"It's true," the governor, requesting anonymity, said when questioned about published reports that said the man who has been head of the NHL since 1977 was giving up the post. "There has been no decision yet about a replacement," the governor added. Speculation about a possible successor centered around a number of television executives — Neal Pilson, 21 in Montreal.

president of CBS Sports, former CBS Sports president Robert Mueller and NBC Sports executive vice president Ken Schanze — as well as Canadian Olympic Committee official Richard Pound, Gary Bettman, senior vice president and general counsel of the NBA, and Mark Mulvey, publisher of Sports Illustrated.

The anonymous governor said Friday a conference call could be stormy.

Opposition to Ziegler first surfaced following the 10-day strike of NHL players at the end of the regular season, when some long-time governors reportedly felt he wasn't tough enough during negotiations and other newer board members thought he wasn't liberal enough. A five-man succession committee was appointed and met with Ziegler this week in New York, where a settlement of the president's contract was reached. The resignation will take effect Sept. 30.

Ziegler was the fourth NHL president, elected in 1977 to succeed Clarence Campbell, who held the job for 32 years. The two men had sharply contrasting styles. Campbell was a high profile executive while Ziegler preferred to stay behind the scenes.

Delegating authority to others, Campbell always disciplined players directly but during Ziegler's term in office, those duties fell to Brian O'Neill, one of seven NHL vice presidents.

New immigration rules worry music community

The music industry is worried - and not over the usual problems of recession and charges of obscenity. Now, some are concerned that the U.S. government is making it so difficult to bring in foreign performers that tours could be delayed or canceled.

"This is the worst-case scenario being painted by many in the industry concerning new immigration and Naturalization Service regulations that went into effect April 1.

Under the new rules, musicians and their crew must enter the country under strict new categories designed specifically for performers and athletes. U.S. labor-union involvement in the visa-granting process - used occasionally in the past - is now mandatory.

"In a lot of ways, it's easier for the entertainers," INS public-affairs specialist Richard Kenney said. "Now, they have a clear-cut category to apply for, whereas before they were put in the same category as people in all other occupations - they should be happy."

But many in the industry fear the new INS rules might keep out some performers, dissuade others from applying for admission and possibly lead to retaliatory measures against American performers trying to get into other countries.

"It's a threat to the free flow of culture in its most fundamental sense," said Jonathan Ginsburg, a Washington, D.C., attorney specializing in immigration issues who is educating tour specialists and others in the music industry about the new rules.

"The big impact will be in the paperwork, the logistics and the mechanics of complying with all these regulations," said Ben Liss, executive director of the North American Concert Promoters Association, a trade group whose membership includes major California promoters such as Avalon Attractions, Bill Graham Presents, the Nederlander Organization and Bill Silva Productions.

"It will require a time-consuming process on behalf of the artist; and that may discourage lesser-known artists who are coming over here with less of a legal infrastructure to get them through the cumbersome process."

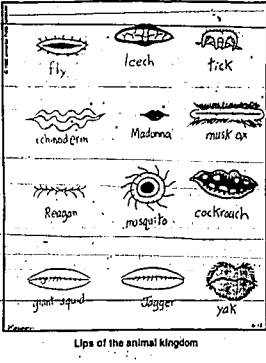
Further ruffling the music industry's feathers was the confusion that reigned at INS in April because the new applications weren't ready.

"There was a real rush to get a lot of tours approved before this mess came into effect," said Gary Bongiovanni, editor of Pollstar, a concert-promotion trade magazine.

The new regulations were not enacted by INS directly but mandated by Congress through the Immigration Act of 1990. Accordingly, performers who used to enter the country with other potential foreign workers under loosely defined visa categories now have their own categories.

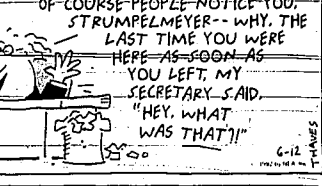
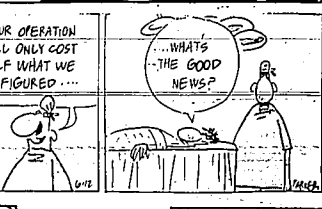
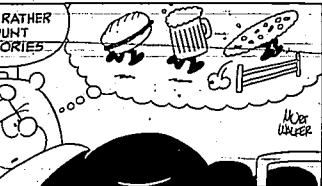

Co-stars salvage 'Housesitter'

"Housesitter" illustrates how style can triumph over substance. When you combine two of the screen's ablest comedy artists, Steve Martin and Goldie Hawn, sparks are bound to fly. Alas, no skyrocket.

Review

The fault can be traced to one of those "surefire" premises: oddball girl has one-nighter with stuffy boy, convinces everyone she is his wife, ends up getting the boy. A likely plot for a 1930s screwball comedy. Not so hot for the nervous '90s.

Universal Pictures describes it as a "romantic comedy about loving, lying and living together," but the accent is on lying. Hawn's character first presents herself to Martin as a waitress in a Hungarian restaurant who can barely speak English. That's a lie, as are most of the other stories she tells about herself.

Moffat) as well as Delaney. Much of the amusement of "Housesitter" stems from Martin's reactions to Hawn's prevarications. He is forced to join the charade when she charms his boss and invites him to a wedding reception. Another complication: Hawn must find a pair to masquerade as her own parents.

The vitality of the two stars and Frank Oz's sprightly direction at most sell the goods, and Mark Stein's screenplay offers ample surprise though a predictable outcome. The uncomfortable fact is Hawn's outpouring of falsehoods. They

stem motivated by the exigencies of plot, not by any crazy kind of logic. It would have been helpful to learn how she got that way. If only she would stop lying long enough to tell the truth.

In this trilogy summer, "Housesitter" may well find a receptive audience, and it's harmless family fun (rating PG, for minor swearing and adult situations).

Interest change keys bank profits

WASHINGTON — The nation's commercial banks earned a record \$7.6 billion in the first three months of this year, up 36 percent from a year ago, despite continued large losses on loans particularly for commercial real estate, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. reported this week.

The banks improved their profits largely by cutting the interest rates they paid their depositors more deeply and more quickly than the rates they charged their borrowers, according to the FDIC figures.

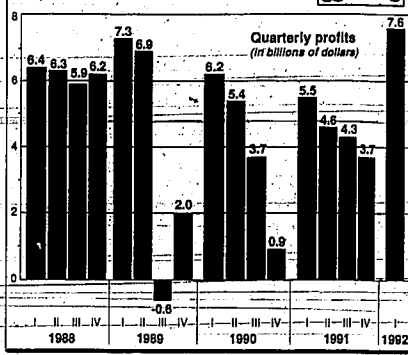
Most of the profits went to shoring up the basic strength of the banks, which had been badly shaken by the real estate collapse and recession.

While the banks wrote off \$6.3 billion worth of loans as uncollectable, about the same as in the first quarter last year, the institutions' earning power was great enough that they were able to set aside \$7.3 billion to cover future losses and still have their record profits.

"While banks are by no means out of the woods, there are signs that the worst may be behind us," Federal Reserve Board member John LaWare told the Senate Banking Committee Wednesday. Some institutions continue to have "big problems" that keep the number of bank failures—and their cost to the FDIC's Bank Insurance Fund high for some time to come, he cautioned.

Bank profits at a high

Although commercial banks recorded a record high \$7.6 billion in profits for the first quarter of this year, many institutions are still troubled by bad real estate loans.

"On balance, though, the broader outlook for the U.S. banking system seems brighter than it has in several years."

FDIC Chairman William Taylor, who also testified, said he encouraged that "there was no

significant increase in the industry's inventory of troubled loans. Moreover, there have been improvements in certain regions of the country's economy."

Taylor and LaWare both cautioned, however, that the enormous inventory

of empty commercial office buildings means it will be years before banks have put all those problem loans behind them. Banks themselves now hold \$27.6 billion worth of real estate on which they have foreclosed, up from \$23.1 billion last year.

Treasury Secretary Nicholas F. Brady welcomed the report and said that the Bush administration now expects banks to be more forthcoming in lending. "Healthy banks will do more lending," he declared.

Brady said, "the banks will begin to not expect of the Treasury securities they have bought instead of making loans during the past two years. Now that the return on Treasuries is down, he said, banks will begin to compete to "make more industrial loans" that will yield a higher return. "Those spreads don't stay there forever," he said. "They just don't."

To a substantial degree, economic growth and bank profits are linked.

Somewhat stronger economic growth later this year, which most forecasters now expect, should increase business and consumer loan demand and aid the banking recovery. This would be the reverse of recent conditions, in which huge bank losses and a shortage of capital led to a sharp cutback in bank lending — a credit crunch — which made the 1990-91 recession worse and helped limit the economic recovery that began more than a year ago, in the opinion of many analysts.

GM removes exec over fraud charges

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors Corp.'s financing subsidiary removed its president and another top officer Thursday over a scheme in which a New York car dealer allegedly embezzled \$436 million.

General Motors Acceptance Corp., smarting from the scam that cost its parent corporation \$171 million in an after-tax loss last year, said it found no evidence employees knowingly helped the dealer, John McNamara, borrow millions for non-existent vehicles.

But it said it was removing William J. Lovejoy as president and chief operating officer of GMAC as one of several steps "to strengthen GMAC's organization," in the wake of the McNamara case.

Thursday's action is GM's second major shakeup of executives since GM President Lloyd Reuss was demoted in April.

In a statement, GM said Lovejoy

will be on special assignment. To replace him, the GM board named John R. Rines as GMAC president and chief operating officer. Rines, 44, had been general manager of GM's service parts operation in Flint, Mich.

GMAC's chief financial officer, George G. Fenner, also was replaced. John D. Finnegan, an assistant GM treasurer, was promoted to the post to replace Fenner, who is retiring. In addition, the GMAC branch manager in Smithtown, N.Y., who serviced McNamara's account as well as two former officials at Smithtown were replaced.

Federal prosecutors say McNamara, a Buick-Pontiac dealer on New York's Long Island, skimmed \$436 million from a \$1 billion loan he got from GMAC to pay for new cars and vans.

He said he was exporting the vehicles overseas, but the vehicles were non-existent.

UPI says it has interested buyer; shutdown unlikely

WASHINGTON (AP) — United Press International said Thursday it had reached agreement in principle with a buyer, averting the threat of immediate closing for the 85-year-old news service.

"No shutdown tomorrow," declared Steve Geimann, UPI's executive vice president and editor.

Geimann commented after a message to bureaus moved on the UPI wire late in the afternoon, saying the company "has reached an agreement, in principle, with a prospective purchaser to continue operations."

The notice said a joint announcement by UPI and the purchaser, who was not identified, would be made Friday.

Earlier, UPI employees went about their usual reporting, editing and other assignments but expressed little hope that the news service would be able to continue.

"We are trying to keep going as best we can, but we are also realizing that the stories we are writing could be among our last," said Doug Levy, a UPI reporter who

is an officer of the Wire Service Guild.

"We are not making a whole lot of plans for coverage next week at the moment," Levy said.

Religious broadcaster Pat Robertson, who made a \$6 million offer for the company in a federal bankruptcy court in New York last month, exercised his option Wednesday to withdraw the offer after going over the books.

The company, which is \$60 million in debt, said it would close down at midnight Friday if additional funds were not found.

At midday, Geimann had said, "There has been a steady stream of calls from people asking, 'What will it take to keep UPI alive?' Those discussions are being followed up; nobody is being sent away."

Bruce Collins, vice president and general counsel of C-Span, the public affairs cable network, said its officials were among those calling but were not seeking to buy UPI.

"I think all news organizations are interested in the assets that might be there when the dust settles," he said.

Jury decides carmaker owes inventor \$11 million

DETROIT (AP) — A federal court jury today ordered Chrysler Corp. to pay \$11.3 million to the inventor of intermittent windshield wipers for infringing on his patent.

The jury in U.S. District Court said the third-biggest U.S. automaker didn't deliberately infringe on a patent held by Robert Kearns, but it said Chrysler must pay him about 90 cents for each of the 12.6 million cars it equipped with the wipers in 1977-88.

A Dist. Ct. jury ruled in December in favor of Kearns, 65, of Houston, and a separate trial to determine damages owed by Chrysler began April 27. Kearns, representing himself, had sought at least \$33 million.

Had the jury decided Chrysler acted willfully, Chrysler would have had to pay triple damages.

Kearns had argued for \$29.19 in damages for each of the wiper devices. Chrysler argued that he deserved about 5 cents for each.

"I expected them easily to be above \$3" a unit, Kearns said. "What it means is the patent system is not doing well at all. Chrysler, the infringer, walked away with \$354 million."

Kearns won a similar claim against Ford Motor Co. in January 1990 and later settled out of court for \$10.2 million. In both cases, juries ruled the automakers stole his invention of a device used on nearly every car and truck in the world. Judge Averm Kohn has indicated he will combine the remaining 18 lawsuits Kearns has filed against General Motors Corp. and 17 other carmakers into a trial tentatively scheduled for October.

For a twist, how about enchalidas-con caviar?

CHICAGO (AP) — Tradition says caviar comes from sturgeon and the best comes from beluga sturgeon that swim Russia's Caspian Sea. But Carolyn Collins aims to turn such convention on its ear.

Her products hail from the Great Lakes and other North American bodies of water. The roe — eggs still in the ovarian membrane — come from fish such as salmon, trout, freshwater sturgeon and whitefish.

And she sells the market's only flavored varieties — spiked with chilies and other ingredients — with names like "Lone Star Caviar" and "Smoked Chicago Golden."

Collins even promotes using the fish eggs in recipes like enchiladas con caviar.

Collins wants to change caviar's reputation as a snack for the snooty set and doesn't mind the jokes. "Caviar ought to be a staple food item for the common household," she said. "It should not be just a rare occasional treat for the rich and famous because it's so good and so much fun."

Her company is among a small group of domestic caviar producers but is the only one that makes flavored varieties, said John Roberts, head of the National Association of the Specialty Food Trade in New York.

"People recognize her as a leader and innovator," he said. "She's launched Carolyn Collins Caviar Co. in 1984 after a chef-friend raved about her homemade salmon caviar.

Now Collins caviar is available by mail order, in Midwest markets and at numerous restaurants and hotels nationwide. It's also exported.

At West Point Market in Akron, Ohio, it has sold as well as traditional caviars, said owner Russ Vernon.

"To put it it's like putting strawberry jam on your bread," Vernon said of the flavored varieties. "It gives you options beyond Beluga, to have a little more fun with it and be a little less serious."

For the first year, Collins made and delivered the caviar herself. As its popularity grew she hired a few assistants but the factory just west of Chicago's downtown Loop remains a small operation.

"Caviar is nothing more than cleaned, salted fish eggs. The trick is in the handling and in the technique," Collins explained. "You have to be very, very careful not to break the berries. You have to keep everything very cold... in order to keep the freshness up."

Collins declined to release earnings figures for her privately held company. But she said sales volume doubled almost every year for the first six years. Business tapered off with the recession, but she still sells about 10,000 pounds of caviar a year.

Collins features traditional styles of caviar. At \$25 an ounce and less, they're three times cheaper than top-quality imports.

The flavored varieties — \$8 to \$12 an ounce — make up about half the business volume.

'Northern Exposure:' The top notch comedy-drama with 'quirky' edge

Any series whose opening depicts a moose walking across the main street of a town is bound to suffer that bitter-sweet epithet, "quirky." And "Northern Exposure" (airing at 9 p.m. MDT on Mondays on CBS) has earned the adjective many times over. It is quirky. It is also fresh, intelligent and rollicking good fun.

The fictitious town of Cicely, Alaska, is filled with colorful characters, including barely post-adolescent cocktail waitress Shelly Tambo (Cynthia Geary) and her nifty sixtyish tavern-owner boyfriend, Holling Vincoeur (John Cullum). Geary admits that their romance seems far-fetched, but she relates a funny coincidence while discussing that huge age difference.

"Since I've been playing it, I've seen more and more Holling and Shelly's everywhere," she said. "I mean, that May-December relationship. And the weirdest thing is, in Roslyn (the Washington state town where the show is filmed), at the bar that our bar is modeled after, it's like a Holling and Shelly relationship. Jim and Julie (are the owner and the waitress). Julie is probably around my age, kind blond, and Jim's probably about Holling's age!"

Geary explains that she was discovered in Los Angeles after she left her Mississippi home to pursue an acting

career. "Northern Exposure" was the first pilot that she auditioned for. "I had no idea what (the show) was going to be like, because my character didn't say anything in the pilot," Geary said. "So I was clueless. I definitely went into it blind."

Viewers may find that hard to believe as they watch Shelly's interaction with the other characters and her antics: She's a former heavy-metal groupie who refers to her hoary boyfriend as "my squeeze" and trudges around in huge snowboots and hideous leggings. In other words, her character is firmly established.

Geary is delighted that the show scores consistently high ratings, but she says she had no idea when she first signed on that the show would become such a success.

"We knew the writing was great and

the acting and everybody was really creative," she explains, "but I think it was just the fact that it was a summer replacement show. I mean, none of us expected it to go anywhere, for the public-to-pick-up-on-it. It was not the same format as a sitcom."

Different is a good word to describe this offbeat show, which might contain, in one episode, allusions to Kierkegaard, Shakespeare and Jack London. We're just glad she didn't call it quirky.

Allen, 44, was replaced by anchor-reporter Jane Robelot, 31, as co-anchor of the 11 p.m.

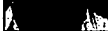

A: The miniseries, which is right now only in the discussion stage, is the pet project of actor Barry ("Petrocelli") Newman, who has obtained the rights to the controversial biography, "Bernstein," written by Joan Peyser. Newman, who is currently in London filming a BBC production of Agatha Christie's "The Mirror Crack'd," expects to concentrate on the Bernstein project upon his return to the United States. There will be no whitewash of any area of Bernstein's life, including his well-known bisexuality.

Q: Is Barbara Walters seeing anybody since she and her second husband split? — L.A.

A: Walters has been flying down to Washington, D.C. regularly to be with her new beau. He's John Warner, Republican senator from Virginia and best known to many as one of Elizabeth Taylor's former husbands.

Q: How could David Letterman appear on "The Tonight Show" as well as his own show, "Late Night With David Letterman," on

Q: My family and I watched six parts of the "Ethics in America" series on PBS in April. It was listed as a 10-part series, but the last four parts were never shown. What happened?

from the fact that both programs are from the same producers, the main connection is the early 1978 appearance of Robin Williams on an episode of "Happy Days." He portrayed Mork from the planet Ork on a mission to kidnap Richie (Ron Howard). The performance got such a positive response that in the following season the producers created "Mork and Mindy," based on the same character but with no continuing story line or setting from the original episode. As most viewers know, the more traditional spinoffs from "Happy Days" were "Laverne and Shirley" and "Joanie Loves Chachi."

Q: Has "Young Riders" been canceled?

A: Yes, it has. But, ABC still has five new episodes of the Western; the network began airing them last Thursday. The series premiered in the fall of 1989 and was last shown on Jan. 25 of this year. After the five new episodes are shown, the series will no longer be aired on ABC. Fans will have to hope that the reruns show up in syndication.

"Less is more when it comes to sex," Frankel says. "It's sexier when you don't show everything. I think people talking about sex is more provocative. It's the same seductive thrill you get when you overhear someone in a restaurant. There's a voyeuristic quality that you're overhearing private things."

Make no mistake about it, "Grapevine" is about sex, and the grapevine is the means by which the viewer eavesdrops on some of the most candid talk ever heard on prime time.

The half-hour CBS series, which stars Jonathan Penner, Lynn Clark and Steve Eckholdt, begins its six-episode run at 8:30 p.m. MDT Monday on KMYT and CBS affiliates.

"The show is sexy, but I think it's responsible because of the way people deal with each other," Penner says. "It's not sensationalistic. You see people you care about relating to each other. That's what makes it sexy. When they don't kiss you can feel the energy and relate to it."

"In the '90s sex has a dangerous quality to it because of AIDS. It's good to remind people that sex can still be fun — and funny. The message to remind people to be responsible is so strong that you can also show the other side. I think watching "Grapevine" is like having safe sex."

In recent years network television has portrayed sex more openly, partly in response to changing public stan-

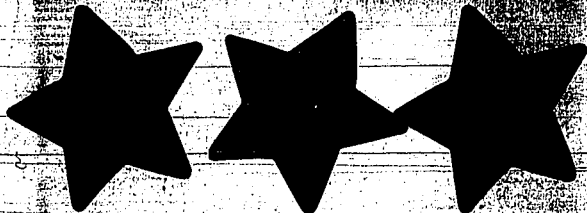
