Yeltsin cuts wide swath in Kansas

WICHITA, Kan. — Putting aside talk of missiles and warheads, Boris Yeltsin came to America's heartland Thursday for down-home discussions about ham, bacon and the wheat harvest.

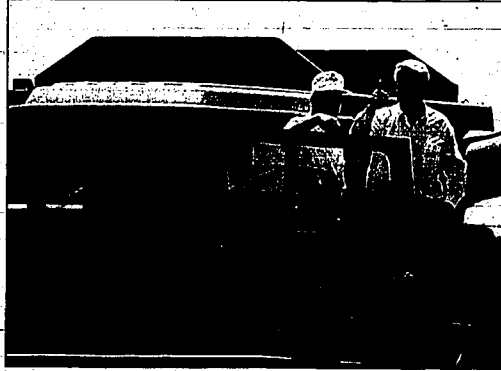
The Russian president, son of a wheat farmer, took the wheel of a combine to cut wheat on a family farm and put on a hard hat to tour a modern meat processing plant. He also spoke triumphantly about his three-day summit with President Bush in Washington, a meeting that resulted in major agreements on nuclear arms and economic cooperation.

"There is no way we will ever be even potential adversaries," Yeltsin told an audience at Wichita State University. "No, we are friends. We made it."

Late in the day, Yeltsin flew to Ottawa and was greeted by Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney as he began a two-day visit that was expected to be dominated by discussions of economic aid.

Yeltsin appealed for greater assistance from Canada, which he called one of Russia's "sincere and reliable partners."

"Canadian business, industry and services should have more courage and begin practical exploration of the Russian market," he said.

Earlier in Kansas, Yeltsin arrived at McConnell Air Force Base outside Wichita aboard an Ilyushin-62 plane emblazoned

with "Russia" on the side. He and his wife, Naina, waved and spoke briefly to a cheering crowd of about 300.

Yeltsin noted that Kansas is a leader in agriculture. "We do have to learn from you," he said through an interpreter. "I have come here to learn how you grow your crops and pack your meats, because we want to share your experience."

In his speech, Yeltsin spoke admiringly of the wheat fields he had passed in his drive from the air base. He noted that 75 years ago, Russian and American farmers achieved roughly the same yields from their wheat crops. Today, he said, Kansas farmers get 60 bushels an acre and Russians get seven or eight.

The remark brought snickers from the audience. Although Yeltsin apparently didn't realize it, the U.S. figure he used was for a bumper crop; typical yields are much lower, although still many times as much as Russian yields.

"This is what the communist system did to us. ... There is no coming back," he said.

The highlight of Yeltsin's five-hour visit was a tour and barbecue at the farm of Greg Rau, who grows wheat, soybeans and sorghum and grazes a small herd of beef cattle.

Yeltsin first met privately with Rau, and then both climbed into the cab of a combine and started cutting wheat.

"You have the best freedom and the best

Congress approves urban aid measure

WASHINGTON — Congress, breaking weeks of stalemate over its initial response to the Los Angeles riots, Thursday approved a scaled-down, \$1 billion emergency urban-aid bill that would provide summer jobs for disadvantaged teen-agers.

House and Senate Republican leaders pledged President Bush's support for the revised version, but it still had to overcome significant opposition from House Democrats. The House vote was 249-168.

Later in the day, the Senate sent the measure to Bush on a voice vote.

The bill's way was eased when Democrats relented under Bush's veto threat and agreed Wednesday to cut in half the \$2 billion bill they had sought.

The revised bill calls for just over \$1 billion in spending, including \$500 million for a summer jobs program. About \$100 million would be targeted to the nation's 75 biggest cities, with the remainder distributed to states under existing Labor

Department formulas.

Supporters said the money was enough to create 360,000 new summer jobs. Although the stated intention was to help inner-city youths, some of the money would flow to rural and suburban areas.

The bill includes \$495 million to replenish federal accounts providing business loans and emergency grants to rebuild Los Angeles neighborhoods torn by rioting. An additional \$81 million would be provided to other Small Business Administration loan programs.

House Democratic leaders bluntly said they wanted to spend more but were settling for as much as Bush had agreed to support. Bush had threatened to veto the \$2 billion bill that originally emerged from the Senate.

But the trimmed-down version was still twice the amount originally approved by the House in the wake of Los Angeles rioting. And Democratic leaders acknowledged they had been unable to secure enough support within their own ranks to pass the \$2 billion version.

Warrant names suspect in Burley bar murder

BURLEY — An arrest warrant has been issued for a 17-year-old boy who has been charged with killing a man outside a Burley bar June 8.

Abel Larios, a native of Mexico who was living near Paul, will face a second-degree murder charge and \$1 million bond when authorities track him down, Cassia County sheriff's detective Dave Tracy said Thursday.

Police are seeking Larios, a farm worker, in connection with the fatal shooting of 21-year-old Juan Ramos, another farm worker who was staying with relatives in Heyburn and Rupert.

Both men were involved in a fight that spread from the Las Palmas bar to the Yacht Club bar on a Sunday night, Tracy said. Ramos was shot in the back of the head with a .45-caliber handgun as he tried to drive away from the scene of an argument outside Ken's Bar on Main Street.

Neighbors of the mobile home north of Paul where Larios was staying say he packed up his belongings and left a few hours after the shooting, Tracy said.

Fifth District Magistrate Nathan Higer signed an arrest warrant for Larios Wednesday afternoon after Cassia County Prosecutor Stephen Bywater filed the second-degree murder charge. The

Police investigating rape allegation involving CSI basketball star Tyson

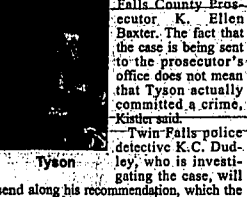

TWIN FALLS — Police are investigating a Twin Falls woman's allegation that College of Southern Idaho basketball star Craig Tyson raped her early Sunday morning.

No criminal charges had been filed against Tyson as of Thursday evening. The Twin Falls police detective who is handling the case said he had a few "loose ends" to tie up before turning the case over to the Twin Falls County prosecutor's office.

Tyson, 22, declined to comment on the allegations when contacted at his room in the CSI dormitory Thursday.

According to Twin Falls police Lt. Jim Kistler, the decision on whether there is a case against Tyson will be made by Twin



send along his recommendation, which the prosecutor may or may not follow, Kistler said. Dudley would not say Thursday what his recommendation would be.

It will be up to the court to decide whether or not a crime occurred, Dudley said.

—Tyson, who has completed his junior college eligibility, is scheduled to enroll in the fall at the University of Arkansas, where he signed a letter of intent to play basketball.

A 19-year-old Twin Falls woman reported to police late Monday that Tyson had come into her Heyburn Avenue home while she slept shortly after 4 a.m. Sunday.

"Although I was confused about why he was there, I didn't think much of it" because Tyson is a friend who commonly visited her house, the woman said in a written statement to police.

In her statement, the woman said she asked Tyson to leave and told him to "knock it off" when he began to touch her.

Tyson then left the room and the woman thought he was leaving the house, but he

Violence halts show in Boston

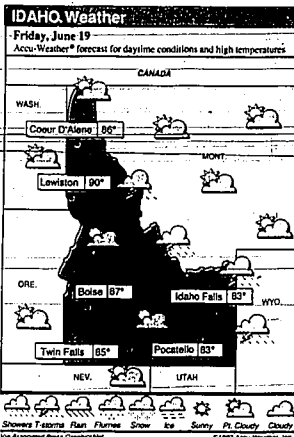
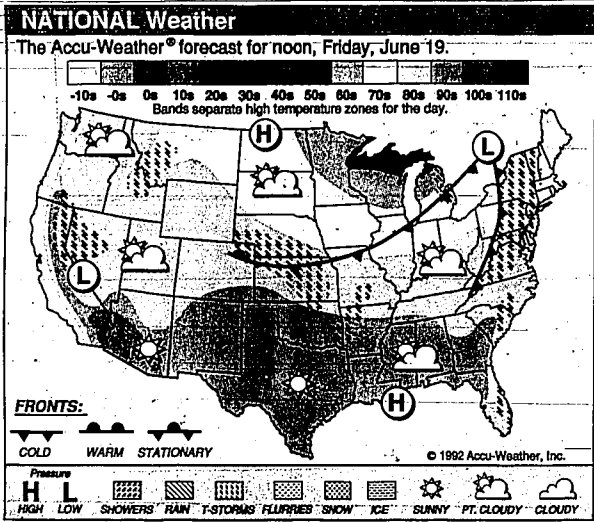

BOSTON — A music and comedy show at City Hall Plaza erupted in violence Thursday after members of a crowd numbering in the thousands became enraged when police ordered the show halted.

At least 16 people were hurt, including a 16-year-old boy who was stabbed in the stomach, police Superintendent James Bratton said. At least 18 were arrested, he said.

The superintendent said police decided to cancel the free outdoor concert after people in the audience ignored orders to quit fighting toward the stage. Several minor injuries had also broken out by that time, said Bratton.

The National Weather Service reports afternoon and evening showers and thundershowers in the southern part of Idaho.

An unstable airmass, combined with cloud moisture across southern Idaho, set the stage for scattered rain showers and possible strong thundershowers mainly over the higher elevations on Thursday. Heavy rains were reported with a thunderstorm at Rogerson, about 25 miles south of Twin Falls. Some hail was also reported.

These stormy thundershowers continued over southern Idaho Thursday afternoon. In the north, a drier and more stable airmass provided mostly clear to sunny skies, except in the mountain areas along the Idaho-Montana border.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 89 degrees at Hagerman, Lewiston and Emmett. Dixie reported the coldest at 34 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 108 degrees at Presidio, Texas. The lowest was 28 degrees at Truckee, Calif.

Ohio Valley, South latest target for thunderstorms

Rain and thunderstorms extended from the Mississippi Valley into the central Appalachians and the Ohio Valley on Thursday, causing flooding in Kentucky.

The storm system, which spawned severe thunderstorms and numerous tornadoes Wednesday in Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois and Indiana, produced damaging wind and heavy rain Thursday morning in Kentucky.

More than 5 inches of rain fell on parts of Washington County in west-central Kentucky. The state normally gets 3 to 4 inches for the whole month of June, the National Weather Service said.

Kentucky National Guardsmen evacuated dozens of people, some by helicopter, who were stranded by high water.

Heavier rainfall totals for the six hours up to 2 p.m. EDT, all in Kentucky, included 2.28 inches at Lexington, 1.15 at Jackson and 1.08 at London.

Blue Grass Airport, at Lexington, Ky., recorded wind gusts of up to 65 mph.

By midday, showers and thunderstorms extended from northern Mississippi to West Virginia, where about 2.9 inches of rain fell in 30 minutes in Grant County in the Eastern Panhandle, the weather service said.

Showers and thunderstorms also developed over eastern Indiana and southeastern Lower Michigan.

In the South, a few showers and thunderstorms developed over southeastern Georgia, the Florida Peninsula and southern Louisiana.

Temperatures dipped into the 30s and 40s early Thursday in the Rocky Mountains and into the 40s in the northern high plains.

Reams in the 40s also were reported along the northern Atlantic Coast. Atlantic City, N.J., had a record low of 45.

Thursday's low for the lower 48 states was 33 at Flagstaff, Ariz., and Gallup, N.M.

Gem high court will hear bingo case arguments in September

BOISE (AP) — The question of what the Idaho Constitution means when it allows "charitable games of chance" will be argued before the Idaho Supreme Court in September.

The court on Thursday set Sept. 15 at 9 a.m. for verbal arguments in a lawsuit filed by a group trying to stop bingo games in the Boise area.

Meanwhile, the Idaho Legislature plans a hearing in Boise next Thursday on whether it should hold a special session to clarify the same section of the Constitution, to make it clear that the 1988 constitutional amendment that authorized the Idaho Lottery was not intended to allow casino or high-stakes gambling on Indian reservations.

Fourth District Judge Robert Newhouse ruled from the bench in April that the constitutional amendment allows "qualified charitable organizations" with legitimate goals to conduct "charitable games of chance" under certain circumstances.

One of the circumstances is that there must be no "consideration," or entry or admission fee charged.

The ruling went against the Idaho Alliance for Traditional Values, which was seeking a restraining order to stop bingo games conducted by Riverbend Addiction Prevention Association, Inc., a nonprofit association.

The alliance appealed, and the Supreme Court set up an expedited schedule for legal arguments before the verbal hearing in September. Each side will have 30 minutes and the state, which has intervened in the case, will have 10 minutes for its arguments.

Indian tribes contend the amendment cleared the way for gambling games on reservations, and have been pressing the state to negotiate agreements.

State attorneys and others will meet with representatives of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes Monday in Boise and the next day with a delegation from the Coeur d'Alene Tribe.

Gov. Cecil Andrus said earlier this month he would call a special session, probably starting July 27, for a proposed constitutional amendment making it clear that only charitable gaming and such games as bingo are allowed, even on the reservations.

Andrus said if legislative leaders of both parties could reach substantial agreement on a proposed amendment by July 3, he would call a special session, limited to that single issue.

Other lawmakers want the agenda expanded to cover such things as more money for education or state response to the drought.

Panel adopts forest reserve plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Agriculture Committee approved a bill Thursday to ban logging temporarily across 6.8 million acres of federal forests in the Pacific Northwest, cutting timber harvests to less than half the 1980s level.

The 27-15 vote marked the first time in more than two years of negotiations that a full House committee has backed a measure addressing the region's old-growth forests and the threatened northern spotted owl.

However, the measure touted as a compromise cannot move to the House floor until differences are resolved with members of the House Interior Committee.

Rep. George Miller, D-Calif., chairman of that panel, advocates a more sweeping protection proposal with an 8 million-acre forest reserve.

The bill also faces an uncertain future in the Senate, where many Western Republicans have taken strong stands against protection of wildlife at the expense of logging and mining jobs.

Rep. Mike de la Garza, D-Texas, chairman of the Agriculture Committee, predicted Congress eventually will approve Northwest

wheat in the world," Yeltsin told a crowd of about 300 people at an outdoor cookout. "I wish we had many, many farms like this in my country."

By the end of the day, Yeltsin was sweating in the hot Kansas weather. With temperatures in the 90s, he shed his suit coat and his tie, opened his collar but never rolled up his sleeves.

A Belarus tractor and a Don combine, both imported from the former Soviet Union, were displayed at the farm along with American farm machinery. Belarus tractors cost about half as much as their American and Japanese counterparts, dealer Max McDaniel said.

At the air base, Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., said the visit ushered in a "new era of peace and friendship that our countries could only dream about for the past half century."

Yeltsin's plane had taxied past military planes, including 11 B-1 bombers. The Russian president gestured to the B-1 bombers and said, "Let those bombers. I see here be never on alert and be used only for civilian purposes."

Yeltsin went from the air base to the Doid Foods beef and pork processing plant. Wearing a red hard hat and a white smock, he watched workers removing bones and fat from slabs of pork and running the meat through processing machines before dumping the product into stainless steel vats.

Yeltsin assumed a look of wonder when a plant official described what the plant's machines could do.

"I have visited maybe 100 meat processing plants, but the one you have is a real wonder," Yeltsin told Doid executives. He suggested that "plants like this cover the whole world."

Earlier Thursday, Yeltsin met in Washington, with Bill Clinton. Yeltsin praised the Arkansas governor as a "fighter against bureaucracy who is in favor of active cooperation with Russia." He then paid a final visit to President

The reason for the fights that led to Ramos' killing is still unclear, Tracy said.

Ramos apparently left the Las Palmas bar with two women and drove to Connor's Cafe near Heyburn at about 1:20 a.m. June 8.

When he returned the women to their apartment above the Yacht Club, a car drove up and several young Hispanic men got out and began arguing with Ramos.

"When he tried to drive away, a single shot shattered the rear window of his pickup and struck him in the back of the head," he added.

Supreme Court OKs taxpayer-revolt law

WASHINGTON (AP) — California's Proposition 13, born of a 1978 taxpayer revolt and a boon to those who owned homes before its enactment, was upheld Thursday by the Supreme Court.

Voting 8-1, the justices said Prop 13's ironically named "welcome stranger" provision does not discriminate unconstitutionally against more recent home buyers — some of whom pay 17 times more in taxes than neighbors who purchased before 1978 and kept their homes.

Prop 13, adopted by the voters as an amendment to the state constitution, pegs annual property taxes on a home's purchase price rather than its current market value.

California's property tax system, which yields about \$17 billion a year in revenue, is considered unique.

But at least two other states, Florida and Michigan, have proposals on the ballot this year to limit property taxes. Thursday's ruling could encourage similar efforts in other states.

In other decisions, the court:

- Ruled that criminal defendants may not use race as a basis for excluding potential jurors. Voting 7-2 in a Georgia case, the justices extended the scope of recent high court decisions that said race-based exclusions of potential jurors are unconstitutional.

- Barred states from imposing licensing and training requirements for hazardous waste site workers without the federal government's approval. The 5-4 decision striking down Illinois regulations said states have been pre-empted from imposing such rules by the federal Occupational Safety and Health Act.

- Struck down, 7-2, part of Iowa's corporate income tax. The court said states may not tax the dividends businesses receive from foreign subsidiaries while exempting dividends from domestic subsidiaries.

In the Prop 13 case, Justice Harry

Blackmun wrote for the court that the "welcome stranger" provision "is not palpably arbitrary" even though it may frustrate "the American dream of home ownership for many younger and poorer California families."

The system reasonably operates to further "local neighborhood preservation, continuity and stability" by discouraging residents from selling their homes, he said.

Also, he said it makes sense to deny a tax break to more recent home buyers because they are forewarned of the tax burden. Those who have owned their homes for years and are hit by skyrocketing taxes could be forced to sell, he said.

Justice John Paul Stevens, the lone dissenter, said Prop 13 has given many homeowners "a tremendous windfall and ... has created severe inequities in California's property tax scheme."

"Simply put," he said, "those who invested in California real estate in the 1970s are among the most fortunate capitalists in the world. It is irrational to treat similarly situated persons differently on the basis of the date they joined the class of property owners."

The "welcome stranger" provision was challenged by Stephanie Nordinger, a Los Angeles lawyer who bought her first home in 1988 with money saved while she rented for 25 years.

She paid \$170,000 for a modest bungalow in the middle-income Baldwin Hills area of Los Angeles. Her property tax bill for the first year was \$1,700, or 1 percent of the purchase price.

Panel approves abortion rights bill

WASHINGTON — A House panel approved Thursday a bill that would write into federal law a woman's right to an abortion and prevent states from imposing some restrictions on abortions.

The Judiciary Committee's civil and constitutional rights panel voted 5-3 to approve the bill and send it to the full panel.

Subcommittee chairman Rep. Don Edwards, D-Calif., said the full panel may vote as early as next week.

The vote followed party lines, with Republicans in opposition.

Vaccine immunizes against AIDS blood

WASHINGTON — An experimental vaccine has proven in a laboratory monkey test that it can immunize against AIDS-infected blood cells, a common pathway for spread of the disease among intravenous drug users.

Monkeys inoculated with the vaccine remained free of AIDS infection for up to a year after they were injected with contaminated blood, said Patricia Fultz of the University of Alabama in Birmingham.

"This proves we're on the right track," she said.

Proposal could cut aid to Israel

WASHINGTON — The chairman of a House subcommittee said Thursday he will push next week for an across-the-board cut in foreign aid that could yield the first significant reduction in aid to Israel since 1987.

With Congress in a budget-cutting mood, the threat is worrying supporters of the Jewish state, which at \$3 billion a year is the leading recipient of U.S. aid.

Israel's full complement of aid was included in a \$13.8 billion foreign aid bill endorsed Thursday by the House Appropriations Committee and scheduled for action in the full House next week.

But foreign aid subcommittee Chairman David Obey, D-Wis., said he would ask colleagues to cut \$400 million from the bill — about 3 percent — as foreign aid's contribution to reducing the deficit.

New committee aims to review business

WASHINGTON — The House, eager to shed its image as inept and corrupt, voted overwhelmingly Thursday to create a special committee on overhauling the way Congress conducts its business.

The bill, passed 412-4 and sent to the Senate, calls for a thorough review of everything from the huge congressional staff to the turf battles between committees.

"The aim is both to restore public confidence in Congress as well as to improve its ability to respond to an increasingly complex agenda," said Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., a co-sponsor.

Hamilton, Rep. Bill Gradison, R-Ohio, and Sens. David Boren, D-Okla., and Pete Domenici, R-N.M., introduced the legislation last July, and colleagues began to flock toward it this year in reaction to legislative gridlock and the bad-check scandal at the House bank.

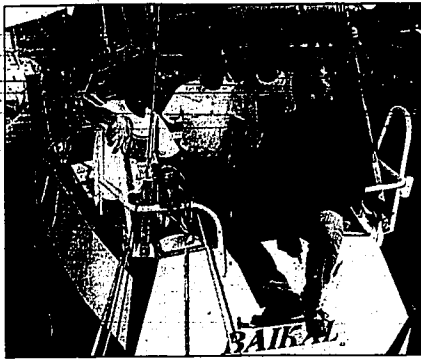
Mexicans crossed border to seize pair

TUCSON, Ariz. — Mexican police crossed onto American soil and seized two men at gunpoint the same day the U.S. Supreme Court infuriated Mexico by saying U.S. agents could cross borders to nab fugitives, border officials say.

Monday's alleged incursion into the southeastern Arizona town of Douglas followed the weekend seizure of a fugitive from U.S. courts in Mexico by private investigators from north of the border.

Both incidents aggravated tension between the governments over the Supreme Court ruling that in spite of an extradition treaty the United States was justified in the 1990 kidnaping of a Mexican physician wanted in the killing of a U.S. drug agent.

Financial problems strand Russian crew

RICHMOND, Calif. (AP) — One year ago, Capt. Alexander

Samoroukov and the crew of the sloop BAIKAL sailed from Vladivostok, bound for the Grand Columbus Regatta marking the 500th anniversary of the explorer's voyage.

But politics never makes for clear sailing and as the Soviet ship of state foundered, so went the BAIKAL's finances.

Now, Samoroukov and what's left of his crew — marooned for more than nine months in Northern California — are wandering what's next.

"We have some problems," says Victor Turok, one of three crew members who stuck with the BAIKAL, hoping to collect the \$15,000 it would take to resume the voyage to New York Harbor. Eight crew members began the trip.

It was a true voyage of discovery for the yachting enthusiasts who hoped to pick-up some business contacts and promote tourism for Siberia's beautiful freshwater Lake Baikal, the world's deepest lake.

They also wanted to slip through the new cracks in Russia's borders and find out how the rest of the world lives.

"I dreamed about this from my childhood," Turok said. "I read a lot of books about different places. Now in Russia (it's a) very interesting time. It's difficult time, interesting time ... for me it's very interesting to go to

different places and talk to different people."

Members of the Baikal-Maritime Club, a group of yachting enthusiasts who build their own boats and race on Lake Baikal, began their journey June 16, 1991. Their first stop was Dutch Harbor, Alaska, where they marked the 250th anniversary of a Russian expedition.

All went well until September, as the BAIKAL was making its way down the western coast of North America, intending to cut east through the Panama Canal, hit New York for the regatta, then finish circumnavigating the world on its way back to Vladivostok.

Then the Soviet Union was dismantled, creating political and financial upheaval that cut off their financial support.

Broke and worried, the sailors were directed by friends in the Russian-American community to San Francisco Bay.

Egyptian mummabilia on display

CAIRO, Egypt — There are whole mummies, fingers, a few feet, lots of heads and miscellaneous body parts. The long-forgotten mummies and mummabilia shown to the press Thursday could be the greatest mummy show on earth.

The 528 mummies and pieces, including two fetuses apparently sired by Tutankhamun, had been stashed at a Cairo hospital since World War II. Crammed into wooden boxes and anything else handy, the cache lay largely unnoticed until a month ago, when hospital workers began leaking information about it.

"Egypt has thousands of mummies, and we were under the impression in our museum we had only ordinary mummies," said Khairy el-Samra, dean of the faculty of medicine at Kasr el-Aini hospital. "We had no idea we had kings."

There are no plans now for the collection to be put on public display.

Venezuelan president won't resign

CARACAS, Venezuela — President Carlos Andres Perez Thursday described groups calling for his resignation as "spokesmen for tragedy" and vowed to lead Venezuela out of its current political turmoil.

Speaking during his weekly radio broadcast, Perez reiterated that he intended to complete his constitutional term as scheduled in February, 1994.

Left-wing groups and the main opposition Social Christian party, known as Copei, which last week ended a three-month alliance with the governing Democratic Action party, have urged Perez to step down early.

Aquino defends her term as leader

MANILA, Philippines — President Corason Aquino defended herself Thursday against charges that she was a weak leader and said her biggest achievement was to preserve democracy after years of authoritarian rule.

Mrs. Aquino, whose term ends on June 30, cited the peaceful transfer of power to her successor, Fidel Ramos, as proof that democracy in the Philippines was secure.

"The main threat to my government, and the democracy that must share its fate, came from the extremes of the political spectrum," she said in a speech at the University of the Philippines.

China cracks down on gun smuggling

BEIJING — China has begun a crackdown on gun smuggling in two border provinces where 90 people have been arrested this year, an official report said Thursday.

Authorities in Hainan and Yunnan provinces have seized 84 weapons and 1,100 rounds of ammunition, the Xinhua News Agency reported. Hainan is an island in the south China Sea, and Yunnan is in southwest China, bordering Vietnam and Burma.

Gun ownership is illegal in China. Only some police and military personnel are allowed to carry firearms.

Accident kills 1 in military maneuvers

MARSEILLE, France — The driver of an armored personnel carrier was killed and six other soldiers were seriously injured when their vehicle went over a cliff, military officials said on Thursday.

The soldiers from the 159th Alpine Infantry Regiment were on night maneuvers Wednesday when their TRM-2000 vehicle failed to negotiate a turn and tumbled 30 feet into a gorge.

Investigators had no immediate explanation for the accident.

Azerbaijanis close in on northeastern town

MOSCOW (AP) — Azerbaijan forces closed in on a key town in northeastern Nagorno-Karabakh on Thursday, and Armenia captured two villages in fierce fighting that claimed more than 200 lives, news reports said.

Armenia's Defense Ministry said the Azerbaijanis used about 20 tanks and 50 armored personnel carriers to try to take the regional center of Martakert. The ministry claimed ethnic Russians were fighting on the side of the Azerbaijanis.

Clashes in the past week between revitalized Azerbaijani forces and Armenian militants have been among the heaviest in more than four years of fighting for control of Nagorno-Karabakh, a mainly Armenian enclave inside Azerbaijan.

Azerbaijan launched its offensive a week ago after Popular Front leader Elhufez Elchibey won presidential elections. He has pledged to regain all Azerbaijani territory seized by Armenian militants. In May, Armenia won control of all major cities and villages in the region and opened a land corridor from Armenia to the enclave across Azerbaijani territory.

In Paris, meanwhile, Foreign Ministry spokesman Maurice Gourdault-Montagne said France would ask the U.N. Security Council to consider sending about 200 observers to the embattled enclave.

The European Community issued a statement condemning the latest fighting and appealed to both sides to

attend an international conference being planned by the Conference for Security and Cooperation in Europe.

Armenian forces retook the villages of Syrkhavend and Kazanchi, Armenia's Defense Ministry said. It said about 20 Armenians and 200 Azerbaijani soldiers were killed in fighting over the previous 24 hours.

Another 50 Armenians and 200 Azerbaijanis were killed during the previous two to three days in the Askeran region of Nagorno-Karabakh, the ministry said. Askeran is a key town linking Nagorno-Karabakh's capital, Stepanakert, with the eastern part of the enclave.

Azerbaijani officials said 10 people were killed in Askeran, the Interfax news agency said.

There was no way to confirm the reports. Both Armenia and Azerbaijan have exaggerated casualty reports in the past.

Nagorno-Karabakh's parliament said in a statement that it was surprised by the indifference of the Russian leadership to the fact that Russian are dying on the territory of Nagorno-Karabakh as mercenaries.

Russian deserters from former Soviet forces stationed in the Caucasus have said some Russian troops are fighting on both the Armenian and Azerbaijani sides as mercenaries.

Interfax said the Azerbaijanis rejected a proposal by the Karabakh Defense Council for a cease-fire so the two sides could exchange their dead.

Maxwell's sons arrested

LONDON (AP) — Two of Robert Maxwell's sons were arrested Thursday and charged in the disappearance of millions of dollars in pension funds from the late publisher's financial empire. They were freed on \$1.28 million in bail.

Kevin and Ian Maxwell and a third man, Larry Trachtenberg, were charged with conspiring to defraud, the Serious Fraud Office said. Trachtenberg is a retired director of Bishopgate Investment Management, which managed pension funds for Maxwell employees.

Kevin Maxwell and Trachtenberg also were charged with theft.

After an appearance before a London magistrate, the men were freed on bail until Sept. 1 and ordered to surrender their passports. Bail was set at \$925,000 for Kevin Maxwell, \$460,000 for Ian Maxwell and \$550,000 for Trachtenberg, 38.

Kevin, 33, and Ian, 36, helped their father run his publishing businesses and took them over for a short time after his mysterious death last fall. The Maxwell media empire, which includes the New York Daily News, subsequently collapsed from too much debt and its companies were put under court administration.

Robert Maxwell is alleged to have misappropriated hundreds of millions of dollars from the pension funds of public companies he controlled to pay off debts and cover operating losses at his private firms.

Ancient ship replica capsizes just short of 5,000-mile goal

TOKYO (AP) — A wooden replica of an ancient Sumerian ship capsized Thursday, only 62 miles from the end of a 5,000-mile trip from India to Japan, Kyodo News Service reported.

Japanese adventurer Akira Iwata, 61, and the ship's seven Indian crewmen were rescued by a Japanese navy helicopter, Kyodo reported from the southern Japanese island of Okinawa.

Iwata built the 50-foot, 30-ton ship in the southwestern Indian port of Calcut and was trying to retrace a route he believes some Sumerian tribes took in emigrating to Japan about 2,300 years ago.

Kyodo said the ship was due Friday in Okinawa but capsized about 62 miles from shore and was spotted by a navy patrol plane.

Sumeria was in what is now Iraq. Kyodo said Kwata tried to sail from India to Iraq before continuing to Japan, but bad weather forced him to abandon that plan.

Slaughter puts talks in doubt

BOIPATONG, South Africa (AP) — Attackers armed with machetes and guns massacred 35 people in this black township, and the African National Congress said Thursday that the slaughter put political reform talks with the government in jeopardy.

"We charge (President) F.W. de Klerk and his government with complicity," ANC Secretary General Cyril Ramaphosa told reporters after visiting Boipatong, south of Johannesburg. "This type of violence could lead to negotiations being derailed."

The attackers rampaged through homes and squatter shacks late Wednesday in one of the worst political assaults in two years.

Bodies were strewn across dirt roads and included those of a pregnant woman and a child less than a year old. A man and a woman, both hacked to death, remained wrapped in a blanket in a small shed where they had tried to hide.

Many of the shacks and houses were ransacked, and the floors and furniture were stained with blood.

Ramaphosa said he had been told as many as 50 people were dead, but police put the figure at 35. Ten adults

and seven children were hospitalized, said Dr. C.C. Mornberg, the hospital superintendent.

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Czechs, Slovaks ready for split

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Czech and Slovak politicians on Thursday suggested they had agreed to go their separate ways after 74 years as a two-state federation. There were apparently differences on how and when to part.

While offering little hope they can keep Czechoslovakia together, both Czechs and Slovaks said the parting would be peaceful.

Ivan Kocarnik, the chief Czech negotiator, said the federal constitution allows for the two regional parliaments to approve the disintegration of the country.

GOP convention spotlight opens on Symms

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A leader of the Idaho Republican Party for the last 20 years, Sen. Steve Symms, was in the spotlight Thursday as the Idaho GOP opened a state convention aimed at producing party unity.

Symms is giving up his Senate seat at the end of this year, winding up 12 years in the Senate and 20 years overall in Congress.

As a highlight of a convention that stretches over three days, the major dinner on Friday night has been set aside to pay tribute to Symms.

But the convention also has more serious work, such as hammering out a platform for candidates to run on this fall, and healing the rifts in the party that allowed Democrats to come close to controlling the Idaho Senate in the last election.

As the convention's opening event Thursday, 87 signed up for tours of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, which is eastern Idaho's largest employer.

"We recognize the real importance of the INEL to Idaho's economy," State Chairman Phil Batt said. "It's crucial that people understand the facility, its mission and the opportunities it provides for Idaho."

Senate President Pro Tem Michael Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, the party's candidate for the 2nd District congressional seat being surrendered by Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings, thinks the party's in pretty good

shape heading into the fall election, thanks to the efforts of State Chairman Phil Batt.

"I think it's being dealt with," Crapo said of the battles between the party's conservative and more moderate wings.

"As I see it, it's not as big a thing as people have tried to make it sound. It has been well-addressed by Phil Batt as party chairman and people are coming together very well. He's made a yeoman effort to bring the party into a strong position for the election," he said.

The major item of business for the GOP will be selection of the 22 Idaho delegates to the national convention in Texas next month. After the Idaho primary May 26, President George Bush won 12 of the delegates, Pat Buchanan 2 and another four will be officially uncommitted.

Besides the delegate assignments go to party officials and officeholders. Besides the Friday evening banquet devoted to Symms, Sen. Orrin

Hatch, R-Utah, was to speak to a convention gathering, along with Rep. Guy Vander Jagt, R-Mich., chairman of the National Republican Congressional Committee.

Adoption of party platform planks sometimes can be a touchy proposition, especially on abortion.

Crapo said he hopes the party will adopt a stand on abortion that everyone can support.

"I believe we've got to leave room for Republicans of all persuasion on that issue," he said.

"My position on abortion is well-known," Crapo said. He opposes almost all abortions. "There are many other Republicans who have different positions, and I think their positions have to be acknowledged."

The party's newly elected regional chairman, Jeff Schrade, an aide to Sen. Larry Craig, also said the party must heal divisions left by some hot primary election races, particularly in Bonneville County.

"We do have a lot of difficulties," he said.

Former employees sue INEL operator

IDAHO FALLS — Five former employees at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory are suing the contract operator of the Naval Reactors Facility for allegedly illegally dismissing them after an investigation into timecard violations.

In a lawsuit filed in 7th District Court earlier this month, the former health physicists claimed Westinghouse Electric Corp. fired them abruptly and illegally because it was forced onto the defensive after condoning timecard violations.

"It's our belief they were scapegoats," Blackfoot attorney Ralph Savage said. "Some heads had to roll, and they picked our guys."

50 gather to remember Indian battle

WHITE BIRD — About 50 people, Indian and non-Indian, have gathered atop White Bird Hill to remember a battle that touched off the beginning of the end of the old Nez Perce way of life.

"The event that happened here in 1877 changed our lives together forever," Kevin Peters of the U.S. National Park Service said Wednesday in opening the ceremony at the interpretive center along U.S. Highway 95.

"It ended a way of life that had been maturing for thousands of years. Here the Nez Perce came into conflict with another culture... and have gone on in a different direction."

Richard Ellenwood, a Nez Perce tribal elder, offered prayers during the ceremony in his native language, and spoke about the radical change of life that began that day.

Peters said the ceremony, which the parks department plans to make an annual event, will keep the lives of ancestors meaningful.

Magistrate rejects self-defense claim

ST. MARIES — A Benewah County magistrate has rejected a claim of self-defense from a St. Maries man accused of killing his stepdaughter's boyfriend earlier this month.

Magistrate Peter Hutchinson ordered Charles Moore, 50, to stand trial for second-degree murder in the shooting death of Russell Epler. Moore claimed that he fired on Epler when the 20-year-old man

raided, charged him at his downtown apartment on June 1.

Authorities said Epler fled down the hallway after being hit in the chest with a slug from the .357 Magnum, apparently dodged a second bullet fired at him moments later and then staggered down the stairs to the outside sidewalk where he collapsed and died minutes later.

Boise man pleads innocent to shooting

BOISE — A Boise man accused of shooting an Ada County rancher has pleaded innocent to an aggravated assault charge.

Ricky Wallace Miller, 31, was originally charged with attempted murder, but that was dropped because prosecutors decided it would be difficult to prove.

According to police reports, the rancher approached three men on his property on May 25 and told them to leave. The men argued, and as the rancher drove away, he was shot in the neck. He was treated and released from a Boise hospital.

Lawyer faces aggravated assault charge

BOISE — A Boise attorney has been charged with aggravated assault in connection with a traffic dispute where a teen-ager was allegedly threatened with knife.

Loren C. Ipsen, 42, was charged Wednesday with the felony. Deputy Ada County Prosecutor Alan White said. Ipsen is a partner in the law firm of Moffatt Thomas Barrett Rock & Fields.

White said a man accused a 17-year-old Boise boy at about 8:40 p.m. The man, who did not know the boy, threatened to stab him in the throat. White said.

Panel endorses INEL project

POCATELLO (AP) — Development of an advanced design nuclear reactor at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory has received a major boost from a national scientific panel that sees it as one of two designs offering the greatest promise for the struggling American nuclear industry.

The special congressional report by the National Academy of Science panel said the futuristic "liquid metal reactor" being developed by Argonne National Laboratory should receive continued government support along with a mid-sized light water reactor with passive safety features. It discarded five other reactor designs as not worthy of or not needing government support.

The report's conclusions are likely to carry considerable weight in Congress where lawmakers will determine what money the Energy Department gets for advanced reactor design projects. The department currently spends \$1.6 billion a year in commercial nuclear power research and development.

The liquid metal reactor that might

be available after 2025, addresses one of the other key scientists' concerns — disposal of radioactive waste.

The panel concluded that for the commercial reactor industry to remain viable, the government must step up efforts to permanently dispose of radioactive waste, which "will continue to hinder nuclear power development and must be resolved soon."

Charles Till, associate director of Argonne National Laboratory-West at INEL, said the bulk of the work being done on the liquid metal reactor is occurring at INEL.

End of hostility offers hope of prosperity, if we're wise

President Eisenhower knew the war business inside and out. "Every gun that is made," he said, "every warship launched, every rocket fired, signifies, in the final sense, a theft from those who hunger and are not fed, those who are cold and not clothed. This world in arms is not spending money alone; it is spending the sweat of its laborers, the genius of its scientists, the hopes of its children."

The past week brought news that surely would have made the old general smile. Over the next decade, the United States and Russia will reduce their nuclear arsenals by nearly two-thirds - down to 3,500 warheads each.

The killing power of what will remain is still horrifying, and the risk of global annihilation remains. But it is a step.

Many small steps have been taken since the breakup of the Soviet Union, and many more will come. Weapons will be mothballed, soldiers will be mustered out, bases will close.

Little by little, resources of these two giant economies will be set free to feed the hungry and to clothe the cold.

No one can argue against the necessity of national defense. No one can argue that the Soviet Union was not a serious threat that had to be countered over the past 40 years. And no one can argue that the end of the Evil Empire ends all need for defense.

But in the changing world, we have a wonderful opportunity to redirect large amounts of wealth, labor and talent.

Downsizing military spending, unfortunately, will disrupt millions of families. Call it the price of peace if you like. More accurately, it is part of the residual cost of the Cold War.

Either way, companies and people -

from missile manufacturers on down to mom-and-pop taverns outside military bases - will have to find new ways to support themselves.

Some of the disruptions will be in places you might not expect. A journalism trade magazine writes sympathetically this month about reporters who have made a career of covering the Pentagon. They're nervous about their futures.

One anxious reporter jokes, "What are you going to do - cover the plowshares industry?"

Probably not. Yet the plowshares industry can have a profound effect on American life in the next decade - if the so-called "peace dividend" can be pruned out of the Pentagon's fingers.

We're seeing evidence of those clutching fingers in Idaho now. Despite a supposed reduction in strategic needs, the Air Force is trying to grasp more unspoiled Western land as training area, for reasons that are not clear to Idahoans.

Idaho's governor is courting the Air Force out of concern for the economy of Mountain Home, a community that depends on a military payroll. (The Air Force says there's no quid pro quo, but a little insurance can't hurt.)

Such behavior isn't unusual. It's how defense business has been done in America, for as long as most folks can remember.

But as the Soviet threat recedes, that kind of business will make less and less sense. Countless military-dependent local economies will have to give way to the more productive peacetime business of feeding, clothing, housing and otherwise improving people's lives.

"Ike" dreamed of such a possibility. If we're smart, this generation can make it happen.



How can anyone take Quayle seriously?

Now we know. A sophisticate is somebody who knows how to spell potato.

This must be the kinder, gentler America of which President Bush spoke. It used to be that being sophisticated meant you had to wear correct clothes, be seen at trendy restaurants, read the right books and quote from them at smart cocktail parties, serve angula, all that sort of thing.

Now it's just a question of finding Dan Quayle vacuous and learning how to spell the name of a few common vegetables. Since Quayle misspelled it on a visit to an elementary school Monday, later being corrected by a 12-year-old, those of us smug elite who know how to spell potato - and doesn't it make you feel superior? - are now fully defined for all to see as the mysterious "sophisticates," those dreadful people, the enemies of "traditional American values" whose scorn Quayle wears "as a badge of honor" and whose licentious malignity he denounced last week at the Southern Baptist Convention.

Really, a nation going slowly mad cannot be a pretty thing to watch, and we have to ask ourselves whether or not that is what we are witnessing. The most pernicious symptom of this is not the vice president's inability to

spell the name of one of the most widely eaten foods in America.

What does that matter? And it is not the fact that millions of American schoolchildren have just been given an atrocious example of how, in this age of epidemic Philistine mediocrity, it is unimportant to do their lessons and mind their teachers lest they end up career failures.

No, what is the most troubling symptom of our national decay is this insane conspiracy to pretend that Dan Quayle is a serious man who makes an occasional ass of himself and that these are exceptions to his behavior and character that we can all get a good laugh out of without feeling we're being cruel and insensitive. After all, most of us, if we were raised right, were taught not to laugh at people who can't help what they are.

In the introduction to their book on Quayle, Bob Woodward and David S. Broder complain that "the news media have generally taken notice of him only when he has done something to live up to his image as a boyish buffoon. So the real Dan Quayle remains largely unknown." Their 207-page, \$18

search for the real Dan Quayle is a disappointing expedition, not for their lack of diligence or excruciating fairness, but for their utter failure to discover the smoking gun that would prove even tentatively that Dan Quayle isn't a buffoon, that the popular image of this man isn't, in fact, the man.

The Bush people, who were so careful in 1988 to restrict Quayle's schedule to heavily shepherded appearances at goat ropings and county fairs, now feel safe sending him to spelling bees. They even talk openly of Quayle as a big gun, as the glue that will hold together the president's conservative base in a configuration that, though it may be a minority, will be sufficient to snatch victory in a field in which Ross Perot and Bill Clinton will split the sane vote in America.

What has American conservatism been reduced to?

And what has politics been reduced to when perfectly sophisticated political strategists decide their strongest asset is a man who, in an ABC-Washington Post poll, was found to have a "favorable" rating of only 26 percent, half that of Murphy Brown, a woman who doesn't even exist?

Education's out of control

If you have been reading The Times-News of late, you have seen the cuts the teachers have been taking so the teachers can have a raise. They say it is the Legislature's fault. I disagree with that; it is the people's fault for letting education get so far out of hand. I feel the people have to take our schools back. Here are some of my ideas that might help.

I feel about the only way out is year-round schools. They would be set up as follows:

- Teachers would work year-round. They would get one week vacation after one year, two weeks for two to five years, three weeks for five years on; six days sick leave and six paid holidays. If they go to school to further their work, they would be given a leave of absence.
- Students would go to six weeks and be off three weeks. While off the three weeks, they would be given so much homework that would be graded when they return to school. As one-third of the students would be out of school at all times, we could lay off about 25 percent of the teachers and cut the class size down. Also close off some classrooms until needed and use fewer buses.
- Look at the classes offered to our students. We would cut out such classes as lifetime sports, teen living, wood shop. In their place, we would start a job-training class for students who don't plan on going to college. In their freshman and sophomore years, they would be required to take their English, math and science classes. In go their senior years, non-college students would take their math and English

classes in the morning and then in the afternoons, they would work on the job of their choice. There would be no pay as they would be learning.

- No school hours could be used for sports, drama, Future Farmers of America, Future Homemakers of America, choir, etc. These would be after-school functions only. Also, the school would fly its sports within the Magic Valley only; this would save on costs.
- Now, who would set up this plan? The people themselves, as the legislators would make a mess of it. The educators haven't been able to do it, as you look to see what we have now.

countryside to rescue wounded hawks, owls and eagles. And I have indeed visited bait stations and looked at the claw marks climbing high into the aspen trees.

But so what? What has all that to do with the slaughter of bears at a bait station? Do I have to bait and slaughter a bear before I can comment meaningfully on the ecological and social insensitivity of bear-baiting - its disrespect for the bear's way of life, its inhumanity? Surely, we can know something is wrong without doing it ourselves.

Third, you missed the irony in my remark about issuing a hunting license to kill the "stupid animals" that raid garbage cans in Yellowstone Park. No animal is stupid. A bear has a bear's intelligence, a bear's way of being - including its life-sustaining search for food. What I tried to show was that we make the bear "stupid" when we trick it into coming to a bait station for a free meal - only to be slaughtered.

But all that aside, Scott, it sounds to me as if you really enjoy filming bears this year - even

though you didn't "harvest" one. Maybe you could do it that way again next season. And thanks for the invite to observe bears with you - "camera only," of course!

One suggestion: Print a picture of the action (excitement) occasionally.

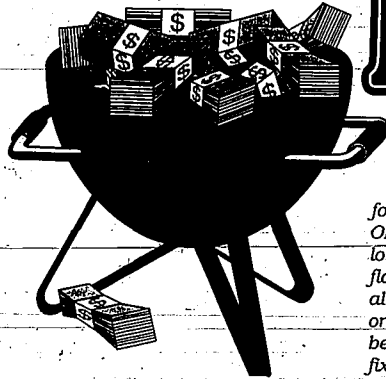

He will be charged today with a felony, which could range between aggravated battery and attempted second-degree murder, the prosecutor said.

JEROME — The No. 2 man in the Jerome County Sheriff's Office is leaving his job.

Sheriff Larry Gold said Thursday night that Under Sheriff Mito Alonzo had resigned, but Alonzo refused to comment on his departure, saying he would issue a written statement in a few days.

The decision to resign was made by Alonzo, who had agreed to stay with the department through the primary election, Gold said in a prepared statement.

"Alonzo has recently received employment opportunities from several law enforcement agencies in Idaho, although he has not made a final decision," Gold's statement said.

Alonzo's resignation will become effective at the end of his accumulated leave, Gold said. Sgt. Gerald Brumley was appointed acting under sheriff and will be promoted to that position when Alonzo's resignation becomes effective, Gold said.

Hailey County commissioner won't run for another term

HAILEY — Alan Reynolds, chairman of the Blaine County Board of Commissioners, has decided not to seek reelection in November.

A nine-year commission veteran, Reynolds declined to run in the May 26 Democratic primary but indicated that he might file as an independent candidate. He announced Thursday that he will not run.

Independent candidates for county positions have until June 24 to file petitions to place their names on the November ballot.

If no independent candidate files for the District 3 commissioner's seat held by Reynolds, the Democratic nominee Leonard Harlig — who defeated Ketchum architect David Barovetto in the May primary — will run unopposed in November.

No Republicans filed for the race.

BOISE — The Idaho Supreme Court has agreed that a district judge properly ruled against a lawsuit filed when a 7-year-old girl was struck by a runaway snowmobile.

The court ruled 4-1 Thursday against Alex and Lorinda Fuller, who filed a personal injury claim on behalf of their daughter, Nina, who was struck and injured by a snowmobile in Minidoka County.

Court records show that a 3-year-old girl climbed on an idling snowmobile and turned the throttle. The machine eventually went over an embankment and injured Nina Fuller.

TWIN FALLS — No one had appealed the Hansen-Butte landfill decision to the Twin Falls County Commission as of Thursday afternoon; Commissioner Jim Friley said.

Residents of the area do not want the landfill built there and to appeal the decision they must go to the county

Kvanvig said he expects a number of residents to appeal the decision to the commission.

"On Monday, I got up and went to work but Cindy came back to Oakley, knocked on the door and asked the owner if she would consider selling the home," Kelley said. "The owner invited her in and said she was interested. Her husband had recently died, and the house was too big for her alone. But she was particular about who she sold it to, and here we are."

Both Kelley and Qualls still work in Twin Falls. They enjoy the quiet life they have found in Oakley. Their two children were more than a little reluctant to leave their friends and schools in Twin Falls when they moved easily, Kelley said.

Jon and Sandy Roundy bought the old Cutler Worthington home 21 years ago when they had only two of their eight children.

"It was pretty basic, actually pretty bad," Sandy said. The people who had lived there didn't have the money to fix up the home which had stood vacant for a long time in the 1940s and 1950s.

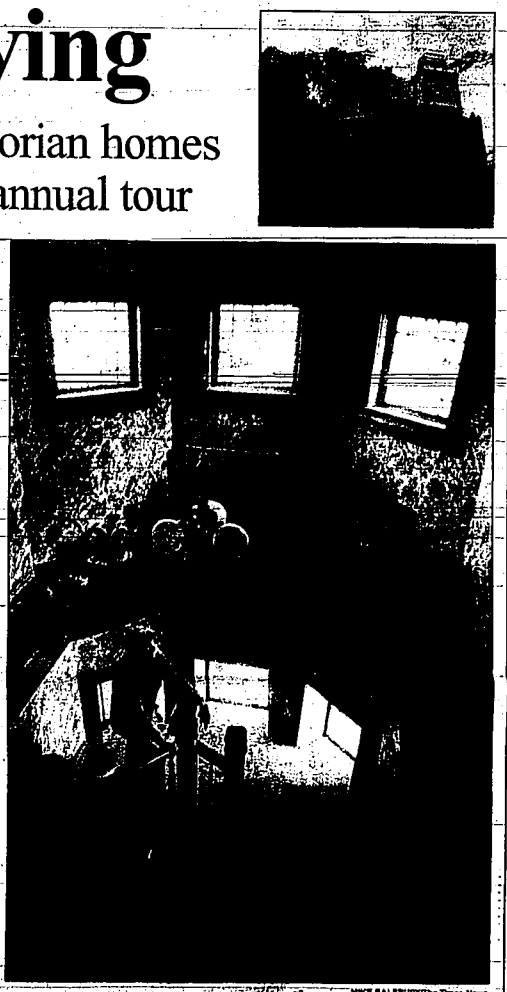

"We're trying to take the technology that candidates have used in the past to manipulate voters and turn it around to voters' advantage," Harber said.

The effort, called Project Vote Smart, began operating earlier this year, she said. It's based in Corvallis, Ore.

Elmore County residents differ on range impact

MOUNTAIN HOME — This military town is no stranger to uncertainty or roller-coaster economics.

"It's always been uncertain," City Council president Fred Prouty said Thursday.

Prouty, along with more than 150 other people, visited the Air Force's open-house design session. It was the last in a series to be held throughout southwestern Idaho designed to help the Air Force determine the scope of an environmental impact statement on the proposed Big Springs Training Range in southwestern Owyhee County.

In an attempt to assure the future of Mountain Home, Gov. Cecil Andrus has

proposed buying and trading for 166,000 acres to create the range for jets based at Mountain Home Air Force Base.

Many feel the range is vital to this high-desert town's future, but others say it's time Mountain Home weaned itself from its military dependency.

That dependency has brought economic as well as emotional uncertainty. After all, when war comes, some of the pilots and air crew stationed here may not return.

"These aren't Air Force fighter pilots, they're my friends," Prouty said.

"This is an Air Force town," he said.

"People who live here are Air Force-related. They want to keep the Air Force here."

Only the skeleton would be left if the Air Force closed up shop, Prouty said.

Local residents support the range proposal because it improves the chances of the Air Force sticking around, he said.

"That doesn't mean they don't want it done right," he said.

Prouty and some other Mountain Home residents, however, are bothered by the ambiguity of apparently conflicting statements about the Air Force's need for the range.

In the short term, it's true the range is not needed. The composite wing, made-up of several different types of aircraft that would comprise a combat unit, is already here, he said.

But in the long run, the range is important

Hagerman plans paint

HAGERMAN — Houses will be painted free of charge this fall for senior citizens in the Hagerman Valley.

environmental and drug programs, and increase spending on health care, education and the debt.

Some Wendell residents wonder about tax increase for schools

WENDELL — District taxes for schools have been raised to make up for this year's reduction in state revenue.

But the new Truth in Taxation law makes the local tax increase appear higher than it actually is, school officials say.

However, some residents told school trustees on Monday that the total sum of taxes is becoming unbearable.

Phyllis Mattice said her taxes have risen to the point where they are more than her social security payments and more than her home and property are worth.

"It just keeps going up more and more," she said. "We're taxed to the nth degree. It's ridiculous."

Kurt Albert said the taxes for his 70-head dairy have more than tripled since he went into business 10 years ago. Just in the last few months, he said, the school board added \$200 to his annual taxes, a new garbage fee added \$500 and a property re-evaluation added five percent.

"I'm here because my taxes are going up, and I want to find out why," Albert said.

Benson said taxes on her home in Wendell rose 24 percent this year.

In accordance with the Truth in Taxation law, the Wendell School District had to advertise a tax increase of 15 to 20 percent.

But figures show that the increase will be 5.5 percent, only 5 percent above the normal annual increase.

The district advertised a higher

increase because, the Truth in Taxation advertisement required them to do so, officials said.

Overall, the 1992-93 budget is \$134,665 less than the 1991-92 budget. State revenues will be \$2,149,853, compared to \$2,280,211 last year. The district received less in state funds because of a high absentee rate at the school, officials said. The state provides funds based on average daily attendance rates.

In the district's 1992-93 budget, the request to the county for local tax revenue is \$351,978. Last year, the district received \$333,389 in local tax revenue.

However, other 1992-93 revenues for the Wendell School District will be less.

Other local income, mainly from interest, will be \$21,000, down from \$37,480 last year.

The total 1992-93 budget is \$2,779,645, compared to the previous budget of \$2,914,310.

Mattice said it looks like taxes can go up every year in an uncontrolled rate.

Albert said this makes him want to support the 1 Percent Initiative that will hold taxes to 1 percent of fair market value. "I know it will do a lot of damage," he said, "but maybe it will force someone to do something."

Trustee Clarence Sparks said the initiative may look like a solution to stop high taxes, but a taxpayer would be "killing yourself" to vote it into law. Instead, Sparks said, people should talk to their legislators.

Superintendent Larry Manly said this is "by far the worst year" the district has ever had in trying to write

its budget. Staff has been reduced, he said, and every possible cut-off expenses has been made.

A supplemental levy was needed and the district was eligible, Manly said, but school officials decided not to ask for it because it has just passed a bond for a new school.

"We're cutting back. We're tightening our belts," Manly said.

He noted that it is no fun to have to ask for more money. "We live with this frustration day in and day out with this budget," Manly said.

Trustee Tony Rost said the state mandates that schools have more classes with fewer students and more teachers; but no additional funding is provided to meet those mandates.

Solomon said he wishes the district could afford to make teachers an offer they would accept without having to go through negotiations.

In an executive session later in the trustee meeting, teacher contracts were discussed but no final figures were announced.

In other business:

Hot lunch supervisor Cynthia Lundstrom recommended that a gas cooking system be installed to replace an old, electrical \$900 stove that needs \$1,000 of repair work.

Manly said lottery funds, expected to be between \$15,000 and \$18,000 this year, could be spent, in part, to update the kitchen as requested.

The school board thanked outgoing Trustee Emily Icke for her service and gave her an engraved plaque. Icke will be replaced next month by Marsha Bennett, who won the trustee position by one vote over Icke in the May election.

Minidoka trustees OK budget boost

RUPERT — After an hour-long budget hearing, the Minidoka County School Board approved a \$1.7-million maintenance and operations budget for next school year.

Assistant Superintendent Bert Nixon said the budget showed an increase of 6 percent over last year. He cautioned several residents at the meeting, though, that nothing is set in stone. "This budget may still be changed a little," he said.

The budget includes salaries, benefits, supplies, textbooks, equipment and travel.

Nixon said the budget leaves very little room for a contingency fund, "which is a necessity." The fund will hold \$41,000.

Mike Erling, principal for the alternative school that started up this year, passed out an annual compiled

by students. "The annual cost each student \$3 and was done in three weeks," Erling said. Smiling from ear to ear, he also said he is excited about the opportunities the alternative school is providing for the students who attend.

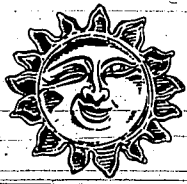
Students who have young children are able to bring them to school with them during the year. The children are placed in a day care facility on the

Panel approves bill to save yew trees

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House panel on Thursday endorsed a bill requiring government logging operations to put a higher priority on retrieving Pacific yew trees for the anti-cancer agent taxol.

The Agriculture Committee voted unanimously to send the measure on the protection and harvest of the precious trees to the House floor.

"In the past, yews were generally just bulldozed out with the rest of the scrub," said Rep. Harold Volkmer, D-Mo.

"This legislation will help ensure their protection."

Researchers have found taxol,

obtained from the tree's bark, to be effective at combating breast and ovarian cancer.

"We are excited that this weed tree in the Pacific Northwest may include this complex molecule used in treatment of cancer," Rep. Sid Morrison, R-Wash., said.

Most of the trees are found on national forests and other federal lands in the Northwest.

The bill requires the secretaries of agriculture and interior to complete an ongoing inventory on the yews within six months.

It instructs them to adopt a policy in which, "to the extent that timber harvesters' health and safety will not be jeopardized, the bark from Pacific yew trees in timber sale areas is harvested before the harvest of other timber resources."

Harvesting would occur in the following priority:

- first, in areas in which timber has been cut but Pacific yew trees have not been removed.
- second, in areas in which timber is already sold but remains uncut.
- third, in areas scheduled for timber sales in the near future.
- fourth, in those other areas where commercial and salvage timber sales are allowed under existing laws.

Police claim man planned casino thefts

CRIPPLE CREEK, Colo. (AP) — Police have arrested a man they claim hatched a scheme — based on a B-movie plot — to steal \$18 million from Cripple Creek casinos.

Terry Allen Boles, 34, was arrested this week and is accused of trying to recruit undercover police officers for the heist, in which he promised at least \$1.5 million each, according to a police report.

In his pitch, Boles allegedly urged police to rent the video "The Taking of Beverly Hills," in which TV star Ken Wahl and others rob the rich couple by forcing its evacuation after faking a toxic waste spill.

Boles, a cook at Johnny Nolon's Saloon and Gambling Emporium, allegedly warned over the movie's plot: "Overturn a hazardous waste truck along Highway 67 on its approach to Cripple Creek, then warn authorities the town had to be evacuated."

The truck, driven by a cohort, really would be harmless and would allow Boles and others enough time to blow open safes at casinos in an abandoned Cripple Creek, investigators said.

Police say Boles, who met with the undercover officers several times about the scheme, boasted connections with police, casino workers and others he said would help out on the caper.

"He seems like a person who likes to brag," said Colorado Springs police detective Ken Lewis.

"We could have carried on with this charade for a long time, but we wanted to get a person we thought was a threat off the street."

Judge grants bail in murder charge

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A judge on Thursday set a \$125,000 cash and property bond for Sam Kastanis, who faces four counts of aggravated murder in the November slayings of his wife and three children.

Third Circuit Judge Michael Hutchings also scheduled an Aug. 10 preliminary hearing for Kastanis on the capital homicide charges.

Hutchings agreed to allow Kastanis' sisters, Helen Pavich and Louise Rudelich, to use their Salt Lake Valley homes as collateral. He said Kastanis would have to post \$15,000 cash.



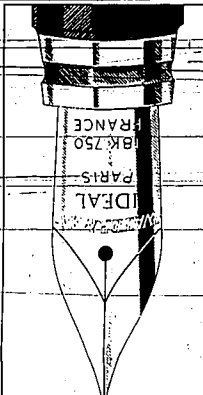

Sawtooth Country Cloggers head for Calgary Stampede

TWIN FALLS — The Sawtooth Country Cloggers will hit the road next month — all the way to Calgary.

When the local cloggers got word they had been selected to perform at the Canadian Stampede, they stepped (or tapped) up their practice sessions.

"We were so thrilled," said the team's teacher Joelle Muir, who submitted the audition tape that earned the cloggers a ticket onto the Stampede stage where the group will perform four times. "This has caused an incredible motivation in the kids' energy level," Muir said.

The group will embark on the super tour July 1. During their week in Canada, the cloggers will visit the ice fields, check out sites where Olympic memories were made and shop the world's largest mall, in Edmonton.

Since 13 of the 14 group members are female, ranging in age from 11 to 17, the

mall stop has become a favorite topic of conversation at clogging practices.

"I'm excited about the sightseeing and the performing," said 14-year-old Rebecca Dahl, a six-year clogging veteran. "My friends at school say I'm clogging 24 hours a day."

Jennifer Peters, 17, is clocking in plenty of practice time, too. She began clogging in fifth grade, trying out new steps with a cousin on the school playground. Now, she often tunes up her skills at home in the kitchen. "In my socks so I won't leave scuffmarks," she said.

The fancy footwork is not that easy. It

differs from tap dancing in that the heel is used as often as the toe, and the rhythm is a down beat throughout. Steps increase in difficulty as the clogging progresses.

"Clogging originated in the Appalachian Mountains as a mixture of dances from different countries," Muir said. "It is an American folk dance that evolved through several traditions and eventually moved West."

Dancers must audition for the 10-year-old Sawtooth clogging group. Once in, they travel to nearby communities to compete and perform. Over the years, the troupe has toured Australia and Yellowstone and has appeared at the National Governors' Conference.

The trip to Calgary will cost the cloggers \$630 apiece. Fund-raising projects have defrayed some of the costs, but each clogger is required to earn money, too.

Rebecca is stacking up income from a paper route. Jennifer, a Jerome farm girl, is selling a cow. Other cloggers are raising money in different ways.

Meanwhile, the troupe is bouncing and chugging its way through three hours of strenuous rehearsals each week, perfecting routines Muir has set to bluegrass music. A pop number entitled "Far From Over" is one of the songs on the program for the Stampede and rodeo.

"Far From Over" tells how we feel about clogging," Muir said.

Another number on the Calgary bill is "Bop," a '50s routine especially popular with the dancers. "Our 'Bop' costumes are really neat," said clogger Nancy Morris, 13. "My mom made mine, and it's a pants set."

Nancy has been with the Sawtooth group for two years now. The routines were hard to learn at first, she recalled, but they got easier with practice.

"When asked if you have to have an inborn talent to clog, Nancy thought about the question for a while. "I think you have to want to do it," she said, "and I think it takes a lot of hard work and dedication."

A total of \$10,000 was appropriated to the Magic Valley Arts Council to study the feasibility of building an outdoor amphitheater at the Dierkes Lake Park Complex. Arts Council member Betsy Bullard said she hopes the amphitheater will prove to be a commercial and tourist attraction for the region.

- \$5,000, 100 tray ounces of silver and a \$2,000 commissioned piece of art to Kim Klasse Lane of Hailey for a Silver Design Fellowship in celebration of the Idaho Commission on the Arts 25th Anniversary.

- \$1,120 to Pershing Elementary School in Rupert for Idaho Theatre for Youth performances.
- \$10,000 to Sun Valley Center, for the Arts and Humanities for general operating support.
- \$3,710 to the Idaho Dance Arts Alliance in Twin Falls for portable dance floors.
- \$4,293 to Magic Valley Arts Council in Twin Falls for general operating support.
- \$3,500 to College of Southern Idaho for a performance series.
- \$2,000 to Idaho Dance Arts Alliance for a two-week dance workshop.

Marketers hope for bat boom

DALLAS — Welcome to Batmania, Part II.

Companies know the return on investment in Batman means big Bat bucks, so they're producing everything from "Batman Returns" school supplies to Bat-shaped tortilla chips to Catwoman cocktail dresses to earn their share of Bat-craved consumers' dollars. Total retail sales from the first movie have been estimated as high as \$1 billion.

For the "Batman" sequel, Warner Bros. actually cut the number of merchandise licenses they awarded by 40 percent, yet Bat products — and advertising — seem more present than during the buildup for the first hit film in 1989.

But while 150 — instead of 250 — companies are licensed to sell the Batman name, corporate deals may be what make the difference.

Warner Bros., Choice Hotels International, Coca-Cola USA and McDonald's together are spending more than \$70 million from June to mid-July in television advertising alone.

But holy hells, Batman! Can Bat burnout be far behind?

Kemper-Products, which has exclusive rights to market toys tied to the sequel, sure doesn't think so. The company is stocking stores with its new line of 40 Bat toys.

"We're counting on this to be our top boys line for 1992," says Krickett Neumann, Kenner's manager for public relations.

Ralston-Purina kept its first Batman cereal in supermarkets for two years and is expecting repeated success with its "Batman Returns"

cereal, a chocolate rice chex and mac and cheese mix, says spokesman Keith Schopp.

Why does everyone want in on the Bat market?

"I think it has to do with the Batman character," Schopp says. "He's 53 years old. He's been a powerful product for DC Comics and Warner Bros. for a long time. It's been a big hit for a lot of kids and a lot of generations."

Batman comic books have been big sellers for more than 50 years.

The "Batman" TV series finished in the top 10 in 1965-and still airs in syndication.

Retailers know the Caped Crusader is a cash cow. The film "Batman" grossed \$251 million in the United States and more than \$400 million worldwide; the video, more than \$150 million.

shelves, says Simon Halls of Street Kids, which marketed nightlights and coin banks for the first Batman film. "The 7-Eleven stores are already reordering," he says.

McDonald's restaurants started selling Batman Happy Meals and six plastic collector cups last week.

An environmentalist joined the Bat bandwagon with his "Batman Returns" medallions. Through an EPA-approved non-toxic process, the silver used in making the medallions is extracted from scrap X-ray and photographic film, refined and turned into 99 percent pure silver. Batman, Catwoman and Penguin each are featured on 10,000 numbered medallions.



Successful album and fewer disputes cure the Cure

NEW YORK (AP) — The Cure's new album, "Wish," entered Billboard magazine's best-selling chart at No. 2 and singer Robert Smith "jokes" that England showed more taste: There it entered at No. 1.

"I always said if we got to No. 1 I'd quit. I lost my chance for another three years," Smith said in an interview the day he, guitarist Perry Bamonte and bassist Simon Gallup arrived here from England on the QE2. Drummer Boris Williams and guitarist Peri Thompson flew over to begin a 44-city tour, which began May 14. The tour ends July 23.

After the last American tour three years ago, Smith said the Cure wouldn't be back. "Things weren't going very well. On stage they were. The concerts were some of the best we've ever done," he said.

"There were upheavals in private lives. We got home, had some time away from each other. Then we spent a week-end together. We were supposed to be listening to each other's demos. I wanted to see if things were going to blow up. They did."

Roger O'Donnell, keyboardist for two

years, left; they drafted Bamonte. "Perry was around the group for the past eight years," Smith said. "He had a look-after-guitarist and come-out-for-drinks function."

Now, Smith says, "You can rely on anyone in the group; you can share your problems. There's never been a lineup that had that intimacy. There's always been at least one I would have been uncomfortable sitting with. It's taken a long time to get there."

The Cure made its first album in 1979. "Wish" is the ninth of new material.

Smith, 33, still has spiky hair and wears makeup. "I shaved my head completely nine months ago. I feel more comfortable with hair a bit longer. I keep thinking each day when I wake up I should do something radically different. Then I think, what's the point?"

About fans who model their appearance on his, he says, "I look less like me than a lot of people I see. They overcompensate. When I put on makeup, it makes me feel more comfortable."

He wears a little makeup around the house when he isn't working because his wife, Mary, likes it. Smith and his long-

time girlfriend were married before the 1989 American tour in the Benedictine monastery where his older sister had been wed.

Last year, the Smiths bought a house with a view of the ocean. He says it was hard to leave it and go on tour, especially since he was in the mood to try to write a screenplay.

As for the Cure being called "the most accomplished and popular purveyors of British Mope Rock" by Time magazine and often referred to as messengers of gloom, Smith says, "Gloom is an overused word in our case. The other side of the group is the pop side. Like any other group we make idiot music. I think people prefer it when you're one or the other."

The new LP on Elektra has two cheerful songs, "Friday I Am in Love," the second single following "High," and "Doing the Unstuck."

Smith writes words and the entire band writes music.

"On this record, we've written some of the more happy, upbeat songs as we were recording," he said. "The atmosphere was so good, we were enjoying ourselves so

much. Some of the melancholy songs got ditched. We did 25 songs; 12 made into the record.

"We were all living together in a big house, really having a good time together. There's a kind of spontaneity about writing happy words. In my normal, everyday life, I'm usually motivated to write only about things that upset me."

He says the next album will be instrumental, "to shift the emphasis away from me doing all the talking."

After the last big tour, they played in eastern Europe and made two video compilations. Last year, they won a number of awards, and played a small club to see how they'd feel about doing small clubs. They got together a year ago to record.

The title "Wish," Smith says, "conjures up the idea of wishes coming true and there might be something you want that you haven't got. Words I like to copy an indefinable something. I was reading a child. You believe in wishes. They're a symbol of innocence."

"Wish" is guitar-oriented, while the 1989 album "Disintegration" emphasized keyboards.

Springsteen's 2nd act may outshine the 1st

STOCKHOLM, Sweden — If it's true, as F. Scott Fitzgerald wrote, that there are no second acts in American lives, then that undoubtedly goes double for the careers of American rock stars. It isn't just that these musicians have a hard time coming up with a credible second chorus once their original ideas have played out; making things worse is the fact that American rock fans are by and large unwilling to accept change as the necessary price for artistic growth.

Bruce Springsteen hopes to change all that. Not only has he decided to write a second act on his career by bringing in a new band, a fresher sound and an altogether different perspective on his work, but he has already started his new show on out-of-town tryouts. And if this week's tour-opening performance at Stockholm's Globen Arena is any indication, this revamped Springsteen could prove even more potent

than the original.

Given the less-than-spectacular sales of the singer's current albums, "Human Touch" and "Lucky Town," that may seem a little hard to swallow at first. After all, even dedicated Springsteen fans have confessed to having doubts about the relevance and viability of their hero's latest work.

But after seeing Springsteen whip his Swedish audience into such a frenzy that they stood cheering for a full six minutes after the house lights came up at the end of the show, it seems impossible to doubt him. Particularly since he earned that response the hard way, performing a show that offered mostly new material — often in radically different arrangements — and none of the standbys most fans would expect from a Springsteen concert.

There was no "Rosalita," no "Born to Run," no "Cadillac Ranch." If fact, only two of the con-

mentary

cent's 26 songs dated from before the album "Born in the U.S.A." Yet Springsteen's performance was so impassioned and his vision so complete that the Swedish fans followed unhesitatingly, even in such unexpected territory as the conga-driven funk groove that powered "57 Channels (And Nothin' On)"

Still, as earnestly as Springsteen tried to accommodate his Swedish fans, it was obvious that the bulk of his efforts went into reworking and rethinking his songs. Some of that came across Monday in strictly musical terms, as with the Hendrixian "Star-Spangled Banner" intro, given "Born in the U.S.A.," or the way the gospel harmonies woven into the end of "Leap of Faith" seemed to lift the tune to another plane entirely.

But the evening's most telling mo-

ments were those in which Springsteen recast the emotional content of his material. "My Hometown," for instance, was offered as an elegy for the sense of community that seems to have passed out of most Americans' lives, while "Darkness on the Edge of Town" was rendered with a wistful tone suggestive less of anger than of acceptance. And in what was perhaps the most stunning transformation of all, Springsteen and wife Patti Scialfa (an unexpected walk-on) somehow turned "Brilliant Disguise" on its head, changing it from a depiction of duplicity into a testimonial to marital commitment.

Heavy snuff, to be sure, but it wasn't lost on the opening-night audience. Swedish rock critic Lasse Anrell, writing in Aftonbladet, went so far as to claim that "for the first time I really understand all the music and lyrics on the new albums." And though few other fans were quite as articulate, the sentiment in the final ovation was obvious: If this was the sound of the new Springsteen, they definitely wanted more.

A must-see movie: 'Batman Returns' improves on the original

There are people who still wonder how King Kong got to the top of the Empire State Building. They will enjoy only parts of "Batman Returns."

But the majority of moviegoers, who never have pondered how the ape scaled the skyscraper, will love virtually every frame of the well-written, well-acted and well-nigh irresistible "Batman Returns." Pity the poor souls who let logic hinder their enjoyment.

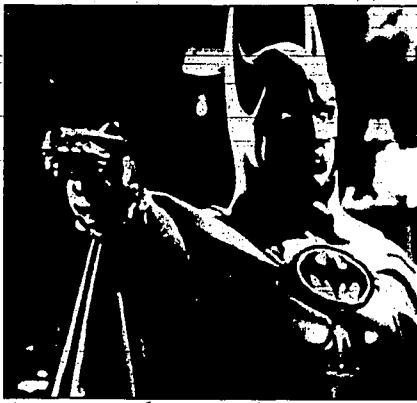
Not only is "Batman Returns" a major improvement on 1989's "Batman," but it is also the most enthralling special effects movie since "Raiders of the Lost Ark."

As a film maker, director Tim Burton has more energy than grace; scenes end too abruptly and some characters seem to evaporate. And as an action director, he conjures chaos with excitement. But his visual sense is paralleled only by Steven Spielberg at his best: Each scene in "Batman Returns" has a provocative touch that commands your interest, and despite its rough edges, the film emerges as a coherent whole.

Like all first-rate movies, "Batman Returns" occupies its own universe, and Batman's world is, of course, dark, damp Gotham City. In an inspired touch, Burton places the film at Christmastime, and the snow scenes fluctuate between the inspirational, the cheery and the ominous.

In Gotham City, the Christmas season is synonymous with greed rather than religion. The evil billionaire Max Shreck (Christopher Walken) is in cahoots with the ineffectual mayor (Michael Murphy) to construct a power plant that will rob the already dark metropolis of every source of energy.

So much for the plot. What matters in "Batman Returns" are the major-league players. All possess dual personalities, and that's a conservative estimate. Of the leading

triumvirate, Catwoman (Michelle Pfeiffer) is by far the most intriguing: the Penguin (Danny DeVito) is the most picturesque, and Batman (Michael Keaton) is more than serviceable.

In fact, the main games played by Batman-Bruce Wayne and Catwoman-Selina Kyle are fueled with such teasing undertones, a psychology student conceivably could write a

thesis exploring the subconscious relationship between Batman and Catwoman.

Batman, she, Penguin and Catwoman are all lost souls adrift in the big city. Batman's unhappy history as wealthy recluse Bruce Wayne was traced in the 1989 movie, and Burton and screenwriter Daniel Waters have come up with surprisingly poignant profiles for the other prin-

cipals. The Penguin was born with webbed hands and feet; after he devours the family cat, his wealthy but frosty parents dump him in a frozen pond, on which he floats until he is rescued by a group of penguins.

Emotions complicate all their goals and add texture to the film. Bruce and Selina, without their disguises, sense a kinship with each other. Batman and Catwoman share an intense attraction-repulsion toward one another. It all gets deliciously complex.

The story of Shreck's evil attempts to gain total control of Gotham City gets lost amid the personal duels of Batman, Catwoman and the Penguin. You may notice it, but you won't object too loudly. And a bit too much footage is devoted to the Penguin's rambling gang of evil circus performers — although the organ grinder and the poodle lady are a lot of fun. And, finally, there are too many explosions — but what colorful explosions they are! For every minus, Burton provides a plus.

And, surprisingly for a comic-strip movie, the performances are among the film's greatest assets. Pfeiffer is a divine Catwoman. Her Selina is a comic expansion of her disheveled waitress in "Framed" and "Jaimie." But once she dons that black costume, cracks her long and lithe whip and makes wild purring noises ... well, the subconscious does wonders with the basics supplied by Pfeiffer. And she wisely manages to deliver her extremely game performance without winking at the audience.

relationship with his butler Alfred (indelicately stiched by the very proper Michael Gough) has more depth and affection than in the first "Batman." As a commercial commodity, "Batman Returns" is pre-packaged, an inevitable sequel to one of the biggest hits in movie history. As a film, "Batman Returns" is imaginative, vivid, haunting and exhilarating. It's a must-see movie that people would see even if it weren't.

Director seeks strong reactions

CHICAGO — The first major feature motion picture he directed (following his 29-minute short, "Frankenweenie," the story of a boy who revives his dead dog — twice) was "Pee-wee's Big Adventure." The second was "Beetlejuice." The third was "Batman," and the fourth was "Edward Scissorhands." Not surprisingly, Tim Burton's favorite word is "weird."

At the moment Burton — who concedes that he has always been "a fairly isolated character" — is sitting in a Chicago hotel room, dressed in gray, baggy pants, boots and a shirt that's his favorite color: black.

"I think people should dress how they feel, and I do feel a kind of heaviness sometimes and a darkness, and yet I use that as a catharsis," he is saying. "I mean, it's not something I'm stuck in. Addressing those issues actually helps me to be lighter. People think that I'm some kind of dark character — they always have — but I'm not. I'm really not."

Exuding an adolescent giddiness and a bouezy, constantly agitated, Richard Lewis-like body language, he keeps his hands in constant motion, rubbing them through his long, dark hair as his head bobs back and forth. Laughing frequently and easily — even giggling, for heaven's sake — he segues into talking about his fifth film, "Batman Returns," a follow-up to 1989's "Batman" which — again — features Michael Keaton as the "Dark Knight" of Gotham City.

"At one point during the filming Tim was starting to look pretty damn healthy and focused and mature, like he pretty much had his finger on exactly what we were doing — and that made me real nervous," Keaton would say later. "I like him when he's pale and gaunt, and his hair all over the place, and needing washing and his shirttail flying, and he's pacing and looking lost. And I think, 'That's when I got him right where I want him.'"

"Tim has a very unusual, sophisticated way of viewing the world," adds Michelle Pfeiffer, who co-stars

as the dual personality of put-upon secretary Selina. "There is an innocent, childish, wicked darkness to his films. Nobody else is doing that, and that is a sign of genius to me. The fact that he somehow has managed to retain that view and has also become as successful as he has is kind of a miracle."

The heavily ballyhooed film opens today, but long before there were reports about all the logistical problems on the set, which included a collection of penguins made up of live animals, robots operated by puppeteers and performers of small stature in penguin suits.

The film, like its predecessor, will make do without Batman's comic book sidekick, Robin. "To me, there's something about Batman, where he is this lone figure, and I have trouble disrupting that psychology."

The Joker (outrageously played by Jack Nicholson in 1989) also will be missing, having fallen to his death in the last film.

Burton and writer Daniel Waters ("Heathers"), collaborated to give fresh "backstories" to two of their new shady characters, Catwoman and Danny DeVito's Penguin. (The third is nefarious millionaire Max Shreck, played by Christopher Walken.) "Again, the thing that attracted me to the world of Batman — unlike other comics like Superman, which was much more clearly and simplistically good and evil — is that it had more of a weird psychological depth to these characters. They're a little stranger and a little more gray."

Catwoman originally was to go to Annette Bening, who proceeded to get pregnant. There were reports that Ellen Barkin, Lena Olin and Jennifer Jason Leigh were considered for the role, and — certainly Sean Young (speaking of weird) tried to grab it.

"In some ways, you think of Michelle Pfeiffer, and you think, 'It's perfect,'" says Burton. "In some ways, it was almost too perfect. But I met her and I really liked her and as we got into it, she was incredible. She just amazed me with what she did physically. I mean, you look at her and you don't

think she could be this incredibly physical and coordinated. But she was, like, doing karate fights on curved roofs with four-inch heels, and she learned to use the whip unbelievably beautifully."

The Penguin, he says, was in some ways his least favorite character in the comics. "It was because all the others had a sort of interesting psychological profile, and I could never quite figure out what the Penguin's was. When Danny got involved, it was very apparent he didn't want it to just be Danny DeVito in a top hat and tuxedo, quacking."

Burton's films usually elicit a love-them-or-hate-them response, which he says is all right. ("I'd rather get that than a shrug.")

In the blood: Hadley, daughter Emily both earn music honors in same month

TWIN FALLS — Maybe it's genetic: Ted Hadley and his daughter Emily both received prestigious state music awards last month.

Just in time for Father's Day, Hadley, a local music instructor who also conducts the Magic Valley Symphony and Twin Falls Municipal Band, is reaping the rewards of many years spent making music with his family.

While he was accepting the 1992 Idaho Music Educator Award from the Idaho Music Educators Association, Emily was being declared best soprano singer and best flutist in the Idaho State Solo Contest.

It doesn't stop there. Hadley's wife, Patricia, plays clarinet in symphony and band. Daughter Katie, 13, plays oboe, viola and piano. Son Jesse, 9, plays piano and composes music.

"I planned it that way," Hadley said. "Everyone is born with an innate ability to at least appreciate and probably make music, but those abilities have to be nurtured at an early age." He added, "The vocal cords harden by age 9, and it becomes very tedious to change anything after that."

Hadley explained that most children respond to rhythm easily but

need someone to help them match pitch. "If you want your kids to love music, make sure you sing with them a lot," he said, "and emphasize live music, not just records or tapes."

Emily, 14, has been singing all her life. The youngest participant in the Idaho State Solo Contest, she sang her first solo in church when she was 6. Currently, she studies voice under Karen Goodrich and has studied flute under both JoAnn Gerish and Cy Gilbert.

She won her soprano award singing "Pie Jesu" from Faure's "Requiem." She played Ernest Bloch's "Suite Modale" in the flute competition. This year, she will join her mother and father in the Twin Falls Municipal Band.

"Emily has the gift of performing in front of people," Hadley said, "while the other two children are shy singers." He has purposely dif-

fused competition among the three. "I've always encouraged duets," Hadley said, "and I've avoided judging the children by the same standards."

Hadley has the credentials to back up his tactics: Having taught music in Twin Falls public schools for 18 years, he is also a worship pianist at Community Christian Church. He holds a master's degree in music from the University of Idaho. Someday, he hopes to find more time to compose music.

Emily has some musical goals, too. She will audition for the Magic Valley Symphony in a year or so and may even settle on a career in music — if she doesn't decide to become a doctor.

Meanwhile, Emily is content to tone up her talents inside her family circle. Even though she is a teenager, she is not embarrassed to make music with Mom and Dad.

"It's even OK to go to the mall and be seen in public with my parents," Emily said.

"As long as we don't act too stupid," her father noted.

But what about turning down the stereo at home?

"Sometimes Emily plays her music so loud I can't talk, and I ask her to turn it down," Hadley said, "but I don't do that very often, because she might tell me my music's too loud."

U.S. Open 1st round defies predictions

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. — Gil Morgan knows about pain. So does Curtis Strange. In Thursday's first round of the U.S. Open golf championship, though, they put the hurt on would-be contenders.

Morgan, 45, whose career was threatened by rotator cuff surgery and who suffers from chronic pain in the left shoulder, took the lead with an 18th hole birdie putt.

"I knew if I made par, I'd be tied for the lead. I didn't expect to make it. I was just trying to get it close," Morgan said.

But the 15-foot, gently curved line to the cup and left Strange with the second-best effort — a 67 — in a day of scoring exploits distinctly at odds with all predictions.

The pre-tournament line was that Pebble Beach, toughened by narrow fairways and generous rough, would be all the world's greatest players could handle.

Of particular concern were the unyielding, rock-hard greens and the prospect of the gale — that frequently swoop-in-from-the-Pacific Ocean.

Par, went the consensus, would be a very good score, possibly a winning score.

But this gray and gloomy day produced only the softest suggestion of a breeze. A misty drizzle moistened and softened the greens and muzzled their bite.

The result: more than two dozen subpar scores and 11 eagles.

While Pebble Beach's defenses were down, they weren't completely out, however.

Sandy Lyle of Scotland, for example, had a place among the leaders until he took a triple bogey on the 14th, where an errant tee shot caromed off a pine and out of bounds. He shot 73.

Jack Nicklaus, going for a fifth Open title at age 52, was making a move until he got tangled up in rough and took a double bogey on the ninth — it only got worse on the back, where he took a 41 and a 77 total.

Tom Watson, playing in the same group with Nicklaus, also was moving up when he doubled the 10th. He shot 75.

By way of contrast to that starry threesome, there was career struggler Andy Dillard, who was tied for third at 68 with Phil Mickelson and Steve Pate.

Tom Lehman, the 1991 Player of the Year on the Ben Hogan Tour, was next at 69.

The huge group at 70 included Nick Faldo and Colin Montgomerie of England, Jay Haas, Mark Calcavecchia, Paul Azinger, Mark Brooks, Willie Wood, Tom Purtzer, Mark McCumber and Jay Don Blake.

Strategies clear in NFL trial

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The strategy of both sides continues to emerge at the antitrust suit by eight players that could decide the future of the NFL.

The players emphasize freedom. The owners emphasize the wealth of the players.

That was the theme Thursday as guard Dave Richards of the San Diego Chargers and quarterback Don Majkowski of the Green Bay Packers took the stand.

Majkowski and Richards are two of eight NFL players suing for free agency in an antitrust action that challenges Plan B, the system that allows each team to protect 37 players each season and allow the others to become free agents. All eight were protected in 1990, the year they filed the suit.

As they have in the first two days of the trial, the players emphasized their lack of freedom to test their value on an open market. The owners emphasized the money they made to the "all-woman jury" of nine, none of them of high income.

With Majkowski, for example, they emphasized his salaries of \$1.3 million and \$1.7 million the last two seasons, when he was limited by injury; the \$1.218 million earned in four seasons by Richards.

Richards, a one-time high school All-American in Dallas, detailed a career that included three years at SMU and one at UCLA. After SMU was given the "death penalty" by the NCAA for recruiting violations, he said he would have liked to have played in his hometown for the Cowboys but never got the chance. He was passed over in the draft by Dallas, picked by San Diego in the fourth round in 1988. He has started every game for the Chargers since his rookie season.

As a result, he has been protected under a "contract" that he has negotiated only with the Chargers and which his contract has been up for renewal.

"I'm not unhappy in San Diego, but I want to have the right to test my market value," Richards said. "I felt the restrictions placed on me as a player degrading and unfair."

"I didn't feel like I should be

bought and sold like a "commodity without considering my wishes."

NFL attorney James Fitzmaurice emphasized under cross-examination that Richards' salary had continually gone up — from \$85,000 in a rookie year in which he also got a \$55,000 signing bonus to more than \$400,000 last season. Richards understood, however, that Mark May, who signed with the Chargers as a Plan B free agent last year and was his backup, received more than \$700,000 in salary and bonuses.

That was even more so the case with Majkowski, when defense attorney Frank Rothman displayed a graph showing his salary increasing from a strike-reduced \$48,500 in

1987 to \$1.7 million by 1991. But Majkowski stood his ground, maintaining that the \$22.5 million, six-year contract he sought after an outstanding year in 1989 was justified.

"Do you feel you deserved in 1990 to be the highest-paid player in the game?" Rothman asked Majkowski, who said he has been limited by his 1990 holdout and injuries from reaching that level the past two seasons.

"Perhaps," Majkowski replied.

"More than Joe Montana?" asked Rothman.

"I think I should have been considered in that category," Majkowski replied.

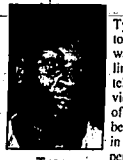
In another development, one of

the nine jurors was removed from the case Thursday after she told U.S. District Court Judge David Doty that she didn't know if she could decide the case fairly. She had remained Wednesday after a conference with Doty but was sent home on Thursday after Doty saw accounts of the problem in newspapers.

"Somewhere along the line, a misunderstanding developed," Doty said, and left the impression with the non-attending public that something strange is going on in this courtroom.

The trial will continue Monday with Mark Collins of the New York Giants and his agent, Frank Bauer, expected to take the stand.

Tyson released from segregation cell



INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Mike Tyson was released Thursday from a segregation cell where he had asked to stay before a television interview aired criticizing guards and fellow inmates at the Indiana Youth Center.

Kevin Moore, a prison spokesman in Indianapolis, said Tyson did not say whether threats had been made against him.

"Tyson's request was very simple: There's some things I need to sort out, and I need to get away from the offender population to do that," Moore said, quoting a written request Tyson submitted to prison officials Wednesday morning.

In an interview with reporter Ed Bradley broadcast Thursday on CBS' "Street Stories," Tyson claimed he had been harassed by inmates and guards at the Plainfield prison since his incarceration in March on a rape conviction.

Moore said the former heavy-weight champion had met with prison staff Thursday morning, "and he felt that his opinion about things are better. He feels more in control or able to deal with the population."

Tyson was released from the segregation cell about 1:30 p.m. EDT after eating lunch there, and reported to the prison recreation area for his regular work project, Moore said. Tyson's duties include maintaining athletic equipment.

Moore said Tyson's request would not be isolated from the television interview, excerpts of which have been published in area newspapers and promoted on the local CBS affiliate.

However, the New York Post quoted an unidentified source close to Tyson as saying the boxer was worried about "dealing with the reaction inside to what he said."

In the interview, conducted May 26, Tyson said some inmates had called him a "tree jumper," or someone who jumps from behind trees and rapes people.

He also said he has had trouble with certain prison guards who want to "put their foot on somebody's neck," but aren't good enough to "clean my toilet."

Moore said the comment about the guards was perplexing.

"We've never physically had to handle Tyson," he said. "I will agree that we do have good correction officers and there are some that aren't as good as the others."

Officers complain about staff all the time — that's not unusual. Everybody has their own opinions, but I'm not really unclear about what he's trying to get out of it."

European Olympic qualifying tournament features familiar faces

BARCELONA, Spain — The European Olympic qualifying basketball tournament that opens Friday in Spain will look anything-but-foreign to American fans.

New Jersey Nets guard Drazen Petrovic of Croatia and Indiana Pacers forward Delf Schrempf of Germany are just two of the five current NBA players taking part, and at least 10 others in the tournament have been drafted by NBA clubs.

Other familiar names include Golden State Warriors forward Sharanas Maroulis (Lithuania), Atlanta Hawks forward Alexander Volkov (Commonwealth of Independent States), and former Phoenix Suns center George Louchev (Bulgaria).

In addition, two-time NBA draftee Arvidas Sabonis — selected by both the Hawks (1985) and Portland Trail Blazers (1986) will play for Lithuania, which is making its return to international sports after being absorbed by the Soviet Union in 1940.

Four of the five starters on the Soviet Union's 1988 gold medal Olympic team were Lithuanian, and Sabonis said they have something to prove.

"I have a gold medal and I intend to defend it," he said. "I suppose the players from the CIS feel the same way, but basketball is a sport and this is a matter of politics."

Numerous players with NCAA experience, like Seion Hall forward Arturas Karshinovas (Lithuania), will also take part.

Twenty-five nations will compete for the four European Olympic berths. First-round action will take place over the next seven days in four different cities — Murcia, Bilbao, Granada and Badajoz — with eight teams advancing to the final rounds June 29-July 5 in Zaragoza.

The Olympic draw, which will dictate the schedule for the Olympic Games, will be held in Zaragoza following the final game.

Among the pre-tournament favorites are Germany, Croatia, Lithuania, Italy, Israel and the CIS. Spain automatically qualifies for the Olympics as the host nation, meaning that five European teams will actually reach the Olympic Games.

The reigning world and European champion, Yugoslavia, are unlikely to take part. The Yugoslavs, who feature Los Angeles Lakers center Vlade Divac, former Miami Heat center Milo Babic, and former San Antonio Spurs forward Zarko Paspalj, were banned earlier this week by Spanish organizers after the United Nations vetoed sanctions against the nation for its ongoing war with Bosnia-Herzegovina.

GM's mentor said it was time to deal Barkley

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Jack Ramsay, who coached Jim Lynam in college and hired him as an NBA assistant, suggested as late as possible that it was time for the Philadelphia 76ers to trade Charles Barkley.

And Ramsay knows something about blockbuster deals. He traded Walt Chamberlain from the 76ers to the Los Angeles Lakers in 1968.

Ramsay and Lynam traveled to Greece recently for a basketball clinic, and during the long trip one of the many subjects discussed was the advisability of trading Barkley.

"I thought it was time to move him," Ramsay recalled Thursday, the day after Lynam, general manager of the 76ers, sent Barkley to the Phoenix Suns for Jeff Hornacek, Tim Perry and Andrew Lang.

"I admire Barkley's talent," Ramsay said. "He's an amazing player. But I did not see him in (new 76ers coach) Doug Moe's passing game and pressing defense."

Lynam recalled the conversation with Ramsay but said the influence of his old boss in the decision to trade Barkley was "next to none."

Lynam said nobody knows his team and Barkley better than he does, and that he was convinced the superstar would not flourish in Moe's system.

"This was the only way to make this team significantly better," Lynam said.

Ramsay said that as general manager of the 76ers in 1968, he had a choice to trade Chamberlain, and that Lynam, for different reasons, found himself in the same predicament.

"Chamberlain threatened to jump to the ABA if I didn't trade him," Ramsay said. "We would have got nothing for him. He said he wouldn't play in Philadelphia. Later he zeroed in on the Lakers. He led a gun to our heads."

"And Barkley was unhappy. He didn't want to play in Philadelphia."

Phoenix fans warm to 'Round Mound'

PHOENIX (AP) — With the dust beginning to settle after the thunderbolt trade that put Charles Barkley into a Phoenix-Suns uniform, the Suns' brain trust went back to work Thursday preparing for the NBA draft.

Meanwhile, Phoenix fan reaction seemed to shift in the first 24 hours.

"A lot of the first flurry of callers in were really concerned with the fact that the Suns gave up (guard Jeff) Hornacek," but I think when you get down to it now, it's probably 70 percent to 30 percent in favor," KCTAR sportscenter Greg Schulte said.

"Like one guy said, they've got one of the best players in basketball right now for some guys on the bubble," Schulte added.

The Suns also gave up Tim Perry, their best rebounder, and Andrew Lang, their best shot-blocker.

Ray Long and backup Mark Westphal went on an entire playoff game against Portland without getting a rebound May 9, exemplifying the hole-in-the-middle pattern which had some fans comparing the team to a donut.

"They've had some good seasons the last few years, but they just couldn't quite seem to get to the top

level. They needed to do something." Phoenix cabdriver Adam Johnson told The Phoenix Gazette.

Jeff Gilden, a Scottsdale businessman, said only point guard Kevin Johnson was indisputable.

"As long as we didn't have to give up KJ, it's OK," he said.

Phoenix coach Paul Westphal said the Suns would try to find help at guard and center. Phoenix has the 22nd pick in the first round of Wednesday's draft.

"We could use an outside shooter at the '2' spot and another big body," he said.

"There are only 10 players left on the team, so we probably have to do something, whether in the draft or by signing free agents or trades," Westphal added. "I don't see us acquiring anyone else in a trade, but we'll just look at the options, see who's out there and not rule anything out."

Westphal said Barkley is "a natural low-post player" but "can just about anywhere on the floor he wants to go to be effective."

"We're going to try to use him in whatever way fits in with the rest of the guys on our team," Westphal added.

Hornacek, whose 20.1-point average led the Suns, was an over-achiever whose six-year stay with Phoenix turned out better than anyone expected, culminating with selection as an All-Star this year.

"It came in the same year as Mark Price and Scott Skiles, and we felt in that particular draft that he was a sleeper," chief scout Dick Percudani said. "The guy has been a success story all along the line. He wasn't concerned about being a star when he got here; he was concerned about making the team."

Suns owner Jerry Colangelo alluded Wednesday to the team's having given Hornacek the platform which launched his career, and Percudani agreed.

"He could have been drafted by another team and been cut, and his career could have been over with. He made it here, and it's a great American success story," Percudani said.

"We hope there's another Hornacek out there in the draft," said executive vice president Cotton Fitzsimmons, who coached the Suns to 217 wins in the last four years without being able to get them into the NBA finals.

"He's a tough-minded guy not afraid to give the hard foul. And for a big man he's a good foul shooter (76.8 percent)."

Ramsay said the 6-9 Perry can play either forward, runs the floor well and is an excellent shot blocker. He noted that the former Temple player showed what he could do last season in his first real opportunity for playing time, and should get only better.

Ramsay believes the 76ers have gone from "weak defense in the front line to pretty strong. And they still have a good draft pick coming up."

Walker hopes rest leads to win

HERSHEY, Pa. (AP) — Colleen Walker is hoping history will repeat in the LPGA's \$400,000 Lady Keystone Open.

"I took a week off last year and came here and won," Walker said. "So I took a week off again this year."

The 54-hole tournament, which begins Friday, has a full field, but only four on the top 10 in the LPGA money list.

Walker said her 9-under-par 203 score of last year on the West Course of the Hershey Country Club might not be good enough this time.

"If we don't get a lot of rain, this is going to be a pretty hard one to win," she said. "The greens are smooth and much faster than they were last year."

The forecast calls for a chance of rain Friday and Saturday.

Ramsay, fourth on the money list, is among the favorites, as are Danielle Ammannappano, who is second on the money list; Brandie Burton, who is third; veteran Pat Bradley, and former champions, Nancy Lopez, Juli Inkster and Laura Davies.

Bradley, who won here with a 10-under-par 206 in 1978, is looking for her second victory of the season.

"This is a course I've always liked," said Bradley, who admits she feels more relaxed since qualifying for the LPGA Hall of Fame.

A lot of the pressure to win is gone and I'm learning to deal with that," she said. "I haven't lost any of my competitive spirit. It's just that I'm much more relaxed now."

Chamberlain played for the Lakers from 1968 to 1978.

Ramsay, analyst during the NBA Finals between Chicago and Portland, said Lynam did much better than he did in the Chamberlain trade. The Sixers got Darrall Imhoff, Archie Clark and Jerry Chambers from the Lakers.

He pointed out that Imhoff was nowhere close to replacing Chamberlain at center. Clark was a starter and Chambers a bench player.

"The Sixers got three starters from Phoenix, three-fifths of a team,

the 76ers have needed that kind of quality for years and with Hornacek they now have one of the best rotations in the league.

"I think he (Hornacek) is the best perimeter shooter in basketball, plus he can play the point without making mistakes. He doesn't give up the ball. He gets the offense going. He's a very underrated player."

Ramsay recognized as one of the best coaches in NBA history, also said he likes Lang, a 6-foot-11 center.

"He blocks shots and rebounds and defends in the basket area," Ramsay

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Track takes a lot of flak at Olympic trials

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — At the U.S. Olympic track and field trials, it seems as if the sport is on trial as well as the athletes.

The trials haven't even started, but in courtrooms and at news conferences, some of the United States' top stars are criticizing the way the system is run.

Take Butch Reynolds, Michael Johnson, Delisa Floyd and Carl Lewis.

Lewis became the latest to blast American track officials when he said Thursday that the Olympic trials are being held too close to the start of the Barcelona Olympics. The trials end June 28, the Olympics start July 25.

He said there's no reason to run so many heats in the trials, which begin Friday.

"Trying to duplicate the Olympics is pretty silly, especially now that most of the athletes have already been to the Olympics or are experienced in international competition," said Lewis, a six-time Olympic gold medalist. "They need to back off and allow the athletes more rest to prepare."

And then there's the plight of Reynolds, Floyd and Johnson.

Reynolds, the world record-holder and 1988 Olympic silver medalist at 400 meters, is fighting the International Amateur Athletic Federation's

two-year suspension for alleged drug use. A federal judge in Columbus, Ohio, will rule Friday whether Reynolds can compete in the trials.

Johnson, top-ranked in the 200 and 400 meters, had asked for an Olympic schedule change that would allow him to compete in both events. On Wednesday, seven months later, the change was made but Johnson had already committed to run only in the 200 at the trials.

Floyd, the two-time national champion in the women's 800, lost her court fight in Denver's U.S. District Court on Tuesday to have her four-year suspension by the IAAF overturned. She tested positive for using a banned substance in 1991. After the decision, she said: "It's not over yet."

There is certain to be more heat once the trials begin at Tad Gormley Stadium. Average temperatures are expected to be in the 90-degree range, with the humidity about 60 percent.

On Friday, preliminaries begin in events including the men's 400 and women's 800. There are quarterfinals in the men's and women's 100, the first round of the men's and women's 400 hurdles, and the men's 800. Qualifying also begins in the men's and women's javelin and the men's pole vault and triple jump, with semifinals

in the men's and women's 10,000 and the women's 5,000.

Reynolds and Floyd do not compete, they will have plenty of company on the sidelines, including Edwin Moses—two-time gold medal winner and 400-meter hurdles world record-holder, Andre Phillips ('84 silver medalist in the 400 hurdles) and Joan Benoit Samuelson ('84 marathon gold medal winner). Also out for an assortment of reasons are Joe DeLoach (200 meters), Llewellyn Starks (long jump), Vicki Huber (3,000 meters), Mated Malone (women's 400) and Shannon Butler (10,000 meters).

Lewis and Jackie Joyner-Kersey could be the stars of the trials as they each try to qualify in four events:

Lewis, the world record-holder in the 100, competes in the 100, 200 and long jump. If he makes the team in any event, he would be eligible for the 400-meter relay. Last year, he anchored that team to a world record.

Joyner-Kersey, the '88 Olympic champion in the women's long jump and heptathlon, will compete in those events plus the 100-meter hurdles and high jump. No woman ever has attempted this quadruple in such a major meet.

Lewis blasts officials for timing of trials

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Carl Lewis criticized U.S. officials on Thursday for holding the Olympic track and field trials just five weeks before the start of the Barcelona Games.

A competitor must go through three qualifying rounds to reach a final at the U.S. trials, a simulation of the Olympic grind.

"Trying to duplicate the Olympics is pretty silly, especially now that most of the athletes have already been to the Olympics or are experienced in international competition," said Lewis, a six-time Olympic gold medalist and current world record-holder in the 100 meters.

"They need to back off and allow the athletes more rest to prepare," Lewis, who has criticized Olympic officials in the past, will try to make the U.S. team in three events—the 100- and 200-meter sprints and the long jump. He won all three at the 1984 Games in Los Angeles.

Lewis said distance runners and those trying to make the team in more than one event shouldn't have to compete in physically draining trials. Instead, he said, those athletes should be selected by The Athletics Congress, the governing body for track and field in the United States.

When trials are needed, he said, they should be held well before the Olympics so that competitors have time to recuperate. For example, the U.S. trials in the marathon and long-distance walks were held a month ago.

"Ultimately, we are selecting a team for the Olympics to go and do their best," he added. "We should prepare by putting everyone in a situation where they could best prepare themselves for the Olympics."

Lewis could be in for a 10-day ordeal at the track and field trials, which begin on Friday and end June 28.

Lewis has preliminary heats in the 100 meters on Friday. The long jump final is four days later and—the 200-meter final—takes place on the last day of the trials.

If everything goes as expected, he will get only four weeks rest before beginning competition at the Olympics. His first preliminary heats in the 100 meters at Barcelona are scheduled for July 31.

Lewis will face tough competition in all three of his events at the U.S. trials, but Jackie Joyner-Kersey will have it even tougher. She intends to compete in four events, including the seven-stage heptathlon. Joyner-Kersey also will attempt to make the team in the 100-meter dash, 100-meter hurdles and long jump.

Who came up with "Dan and Dave"? The advertising campaign by Reebok promoting the decathlon rivalry of U.S. athletes Dan O'Brien and Dave Johnson?

In other words, which Reebok marketing executive got the bonus and the all-expenses-paid trip to Rancho?

There are probably a lot of people taking credit for it, says Mark Bossardet, Reebok's director of running promotions.

The idea was hatched by committee about a year and a half ago after Reebok obtained advertising rights for the '92 Games.

Reebok commissioned Chiat-Day, a national advertising agency, to design a campaign to best maximize Reebok's exposure leading up to the Games.

The agency asked for a list of athletes already under contract. Reebok handed to have both Dan and Dave.

A few years ago, Nike hit the mother lode when it hired two-sport star Bo Jackson to market its cross-trainer line of shoes. But with Jackson out of the picture, having undergone hip-replacement

surgery, Reebok was poised to

as a superstar. At a meeting last December, Bossardet posed a question: "Why not use both? At the time, people thought we were crazy because Dave was having a bad year."

It was decided the campaign would revolve around pitting Dan and Dave against each other in a series of commercials that would ask:

"Who is the world's greatest athlete?" The campaign's catchphrase: "To be settled in Barcelona."

In the first few commercials, Reebok never identified Dan and Dave as decathletes. Most people thought the men in the commercials were actors.

Reebok knew the two decathletes still had to make the U.S. team. It was Bossardet's job to assure them they would.

"I guess I was the point person," he said. "They were putting on the pressure, asking, 'Are these guys going to make the team?'"

Seven have aired so far. The eighth will debut at the U.S. Olympic Trials, which begin today.

Bossardet assimilated the information and reported back to his bosses at company headquarters in Stoughton, Mass.

"Dan is the future, Dave is right now," Bossardet concluded. Discussions wavered over whether to use Dan or Dave. While Dave was slumping in 1991, Dan was emerging

LONDON (AP) — Yugoslavian athletes were banned from international track meets on Thursday by the International Amateur Athletics Federation in support of United Nations sanctions.

A statement from track and field's world governing body said the ban would stand until a further announcement is made.

In keeping with United Nations Security Council resolution 757 and following resultant action taken by the International Olympic Committee, the IAAF has declared that no athletes from the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia are to be allowed to compete in any athletics event outside their recognized borders," the IAAF said.

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No. 1 pick gets contract out of way to concentrate on Olympics

HOUSTON (AP) — Phil Nevin, the No. 1 pick in the amateur draft, took a lucrative break from working out with the U.S. Olympic baseball team Thursday to sign a contract with the Houston Astros.

The Cal State-Fullerton third baseman earned a reported \$700,000 signing bonus. Contract terms were not announced.

"I'm playing with the U.S. Olympic team and I didn't want any

distractions so I'm glad to get this done," Nevins said. "My goal always has been to play professional baseball so now that's getting closer."

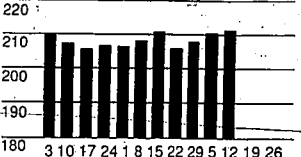

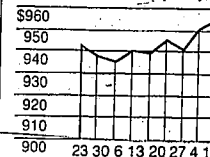

April trade deficit worsens

Merchandise trade deficit



WASHINGTON (AP)—The U.S. trade deficit widened to \$6.97 billion in April, the worst showing since November 1990, as exports slipped further and imports jumped to the second-highest level on record, the Commerce Department said Thursday.

The Bush administration insisted that the deterioration was temporary but private economists worried that weak overseas economies will cut into export growth this year and act as a further drag on an already-weak recovery.

The Commerce Department said that the April trade gap was 24.8 percent higher than a March deficit of \$5.58 billion, reflecting the fact that oil imports surged by 16 percent while American exports declined for a second straight month, hurt primarily by a slump in aircraft sales.

Exports totaled \$36.39 billion, down 1.9 percent from March, while imports jumped to \$43.36 billion, the highest level since a record \$43.88 billion in products were shipped in October 1990.

Commerce Secretary Barbara Franklin said that trade figures for both oil and airliners can be very volatile from month to month.

"April's performance cannot be viewed as indicative of a longer term trend," she said. "Our export picture is still very positive."

However, private analysts worried about the fact that exports were down for a second straight month, saying it reflected the fact that many of America's major overseas markets were either in recession or close to it.

"We are beginning to see the impact of slow economic growth,

among our major trading partners," said Steven Wood, an economist at Bank of America in San Francisco. "It is going to be very difficult to get much growth in export activity for the rest of the year."

In other economic news Thursday, the Labor Department said that 407,000 newly laid off Americans filed claims for unemployment benefits in the first week of June, down only slightly from a figure of 409,000 the previous week.

Analysts said this report showed that a very weak recovery so far had had very little impact on the labor market.

During the first four months of the year, the trade deficit was running at an annual rate of \$64.9 billion, basically unchanged from the 1991 deficit which had been the first one below \$100 billion since 1983.

FCC OKs network, cable links

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Communications Commission ruled Thursday that television broadcast networks can own cable systems and vice versa.

The ruling opens the door for CBS, ABC, NBC or Fox Broadcasting to buy into the systems that deliver cable television service to consumers' homes.

The FCC said it took the action to remove restrictions that had begun to hurt the networks' ability to remain competitive in today's expanded, diverse video market.

"In the early days of cable, the networks were prohibited from ownership because the government wanted to help cable grow free of the dominance of the networks."

Over the years, however, the growth of cable has cut into broadcast network viewership and caused a decline in network advertising revenues, the FCC said.

Under the new ruling, a company with network and cable system interests is limited to its cable interests to 10 percent of homes nationwide with access to cable and 50 percent of homes in a broadcast market.

While the action was pursued by the networks and supported by the National Cable Television Association, it was opposed by local affiliates and independent broadcast stations, which fear that networks would favor their affiliates when it came to channel placement on the cable dial.

As a safeguard against this, the FCC established a complaint system for such stations that could lead to FCC action against the offending network.

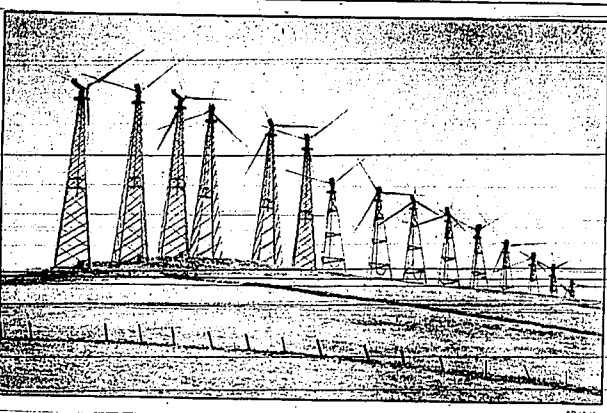
Commissioners James Quello and Ervin Duggan said they would have preferred a rule requiring cable firms to carry all local stations with their over-the-air channel numbers.

The ruling included a plan for reassessment of the situation in three years with the possibility then of changing the rules.

In other action, the FCC cleared the way for construction of so-called "smart-homes" by relaxing technical rules covering use of radio and television signals along home electrical circuits.

Use of such signals in combination with computer technology has enabled the development of home systems that do everything from warning of fire or theft to controlling lights and appliances and monitoring children at play.

California firm goes Dutch on sale to harness wind power

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The Netherlands reclaimed land from the sea by using its trademark windmills to power pumps, but it's getting an advanced version of the centuries-old machine from the United States.

Kenetech-U.S. Windpower Inc. has sold 80 energy-producing turbines to EGD, a Dutch utility, to create one of Europe's largest "wind farms."

Unlike the traditional wooden Dutch windmills used to turn grain mills and pumps, the sleek, updated versions will produce electricity, enough for an average 112,000 homes.

"Wind energy is very rapidly coming a serious alternative for utilities worldwide," said Glenn Ikemoto, vice-president of business development for the San Francisco-

based company, which closed the deal last week.

The triple-bladed turbines are similar to those on the world's largest wind farm — 3,400 turbines on Altamont Pass, 40 miles east of San Francisco, that produce energy for Pacific Gas & Electric Co.

A few centuries ago, the Netherlands had almost twice that many windmills — one for about every 2 1/2 square miles of land, said Helen Colijn, a Menlo Park author and native of Holland who has researched the history of windmills.

"The windmills are the reason Holland exists today," she said. "If they hadn't found a way of pumping the water away and controlling the water flow, there probably wouldn't be as much of Holland left."

An estimated two-thirds of the

nation's land was surrounded by dikes and pumped dry.

The old windmills "helped Holland become what it was, and a means for people to form their trades," Colijn said.

Only about 1,000 remain in use, all of them national monuments.

The new windmills make economic sense. The cost of electricity from these is about the same as producing electricity from fossil fuels — about 5 cents a kilowatt hour, Ikemoto said.

Wind power is also cleaner. "There is no air pollution, there is no water pollution," Ikemoto said. "All the land is operated under total use. Cows graze on it, farmers grow wheat. It takes up only 3 percent of the land. When you take them away, the land looks just like it did when you got there."

Loan payments lag in early '92

WASHINGTON (AP)—The percentage of delinquent consumer loans jumped sharply during the first three months of the year despite an overall improvement in the economy, a trade group said Thursday.

A seasonally adjusted 2.75 percent of consumer loans were at least 30 days past-due at the end of March, the American Bankers Association said, the highest level since the summer of 1989 and up from 2.58 percent three months earlier and 2.67 percent a year earlier.

Economists said the number may reflect the realities of consumers coping with protracted joblessness. Despite signs of life in manufacturing and housing, the unemployment rate this year has been rising, reaching an eight-year high of 7.5 percent in May.

"After people lose their jobs, they usually can scrape together the money to pay on their loans for a while. But they can only do that for so long," said economist Paul Lally of R.H. Wrightson & Associates in

New York. James Chessen, the association's chief economist, attributed the increase to the sluggish pace of the recovery, which so far is the weakest rebound in 50 years.

"The economic recovery is much like an infant taking a few steps, stumbling now and again, but making progress nonetheless. It is possible to gain ground by taking two steps forward and one step back, but it takes a lot longer," he said.

Business finds silver lining in bad weather

WICHITA, Kan. (AP)—Tomado survivors at a recent anniversary gathering showered TV weatherman and forecasting entrepreneur Mike Smith with hugs, kisses and handshakes for saving their lives.

"They took cover April 26, 1991, after he warned viewers of an approaching tornado that tore through the Wichita area, killing 19 people.

For Smith and his company, WeatherData Inc., the rewards of the small but growing field of commercial weather forecasting are both lucrative and heartwarming.

WeatherData is among some 100 commercial forecasting companies nationwide. With 23 employees and more than \$1 million in annual sales, it's also among the biggest.

The profit that doesn't show up on a balance sheet is the praise of the Kansas stations and viewers he serves, and the thanks of railroads who said he saved them small fortunes by alerting them to high winds and floods that can derail trains.

Kansas Gas and Electric Co. uses WeatherData to anticipate electrical demand for summer cooling and

maps he peddled door-to-door for a nickel. "The neighbors thought I was crazy," said Smith, now 40.

"They asked, 'Why should I pay for weather? It's free.' That's still a problem WeatherData has today," he said.

Smith was only in high school when he began doing weather forecasts for a Kansas City radio station. He was working on his meteorology degree at the University of Oklahoma when an Oklahoma City broadcaster hired him. In 1975 he joined a Wichita station, moved for a time to a St. Louis station but returned to Wichita in 1981 when KSNW-TV offered to help him start WeatherData.

The American Meteorological Society, recently honored Smith as the first television weatherman in its 36-year history to receive the group's award for contributing to the advancement of applied meteorology.

He was cited as a pioneer in using color-radar, time-lapse radar and time-lapse cloud illustrations now commonplace in TV weather forecasts.

Smith also led the way in using computers to tailor regional weatherpages for newspapers. His work now appears in the Los Angeles Times, The Miami Herald and 30 other newspapers.

Chuck Shold, general manager of Smith competitor, Weather Central in Madison, Wis., praised WeatherData for its good reputation and high-quality products.

"In some respects private weather forecasting services are like advertising agencies," Shold said, "anybody with a computer and a little bit of knowledge can be one. We've tried very hard to maintain our reputation in the business and I know the hard work has done that."

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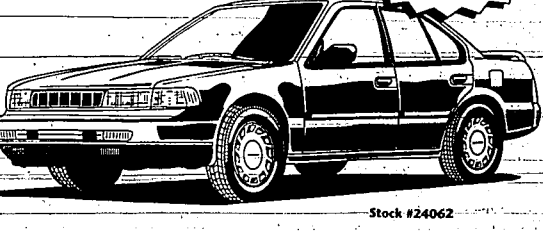

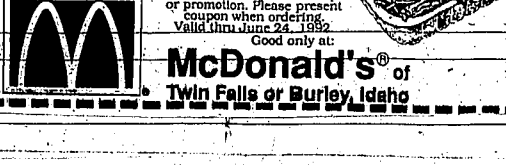

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THE ACES ON BRIDGE

To do a great right, do a little wrong. - Shakespeare.

"You went the wrong way in trumps," scolded dummy. "You're mistaken," was the caustic reply. "I could finesse in only one direction. I could not help it if the queen was offside."

Look over the situation to decide who was right.

Since there were no ruffing values in either hand, a no-trump game would have been superior. However, North fell victim to the temptations of the 4-5 spade fit.

South won his heart ace, cashed the trump king and led a low trump to dummy's jack. This lost to East's queen, and East exited safely with a third spade. With identical distribution in both hands, declarer was forced to play the clubs himself. The cost was three club losers for down one in the vulnerable game.

Do you blame North for insisting on spades, or should South have played the hand better?

South gets the blame for botching the play. Rejecting the trump finesse, South should cash both high trumps. Next he cashes two more hearts and follows with his three top diamonds.

When the third diamond survives, South leads a third spade and East is employed. If he breaks the clubs, South gets one club trick. And if East leads a diamond, South enjoys a ruff and discard.

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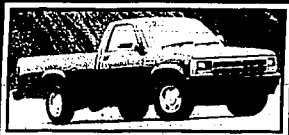

U.S. Open showdown in the making

The U.S. Open, the second leg of the Grand Slam of golf, begins this week, and ESPN and ABC will share coverage of the event.

ESPN will broadcast the first and second rounds of the prestigious tournament live from the Pebble Beach Golf Links in Pebble Beach, Calif., on Thursday, June 18, and Friday, June 19. The all-sports channel will have more than six hours of coverage, divided into afternoon and prime-time blocks, each day.

ABC picks up coverage of the third and final rounds on Saturday, June 20, and next Sunday, June 21.

All eyes will be on PGA Tour superstar Fred Couples, who had already won three tournaments — including Grand Slam event No. 1, the Masters — by mid-May. Couples has been setting a torrid pace on the tour, but Davis Love III has been close on his heels.

As of mid-May, Couples was the tour money leader,

but was a mere \$10,000 over Love. Couples also led the all-around standings (Love was third) and the scoring leaders (Love was second). Couples was third among birdie leaders, while Love topped the list.

With a victory, Couples would become the first golfer to win both the Masters and the U.S. Open in the same year since Jack Nicklaus did it in 1972. Arnold Palmer did it in 1960, Ben Hogan in

Gardenia, Cronyn feel rosy about 'Age-Old Friends'

"Age-Old Friends" made a considerable splash when it originally aired on HBO; it eventually won 1989 Emmys for its two stars, Hume Cronyn (Best Actor in a Television Movie or Miniseries) and Vincent Gardenia (Best Supporting Actor).

But as well as it did on cable, it is likely to attract a much larger audience when it makes its broadcast debut Friday, June 19, on CBS, in an unusual programming move.

"It's a very important and wonderful piece of work," says Gardenia, now 70, who plays Michael Aylott, a nursing-home resident terrified that the powers of his mind may be slipping away. "It's not the meal that you get every day."

The strong points of "Age-Old Friends" are the mutual support between two nursing-home residents, the irascible John Cooper (Hume Cronyn) and the gentle Aylott, and Cooper's feeling of estrangement from his daughter (played by Cronyn's real-life daughter, Tandy), who is finding it increasingly difficult to talk to her father about anything more meaningful than the traffic on the way over.

"It's a heavy scene for the people who do go and visit," says Gardenia. "And I imagine it's also a heavy scene for those who don't go. When we had less we had more, maybe, when everybody was together all the time. Not just family members — communities and neighbors: They all cared for each other."

Channel chatter

TOP COVERAGE: The battle against AIDS received four times the TV coverage of any other health care issue between November and May 1, according to a study from the Center for Media and Public Affairs. The survey covered 386 network news stories on health care issues—a total of 12 hours 25 minutes of coverage. AIDS was covered in 156 stories; the controversy over the safety of silicone breast implants was a distant second with 40 stories.

Six out of every seven sources interviewed on the three network programs over the six-month period criticized the quality of health care in this country, and three out of four blamed the private sector.

The center says that "compared with statistics on AIDS victims compiled by the Centers for Disease Control, TV portrayals of AIDS patients underrepresent gays, minorities and IV drug users and overrepresent the number of women with the disease."

SHOW LEAPS INTO PRIVATE EYE: It's supposed to be hush-hush, but the producers of NBC's "Quantum Leap" are working on an unusual show-within-a-show story line in which Scott Bakula would time-travel into the body of "Magnum, P.I.'s" Tom Selleck. In the story line — to air as the season cliffhanger this month — Sam (Bakula) and his partner Albert (Dean Stockwell) land in Hawaii, where Sam becomes the former CBS private eye. To other characters in the episode, Bakula will appear as Selleck. To viewers, he will be seen as himself. How did this guest show happen? Well, "Quantum Leap" boss Donald P. Bellisario was exec producer of "Magnum," a CBS hit from 1980 to '88. No word on whether other "Magnum" regulars will participate. The concept may be carried over to the two-hour season opener.

GUEST APPEARANCE: Secretary of Labor Lynn Martin will guest host ABC's daytime "Home" show June 24 and 25. While on the set, Martin will see to it that there are profiles of women in non-traditional careers; financial advice for women planning their retirement from the workforce; and tips for women facing the challenge of managing a career while raising a family.

NEW FORMAT: The Nashville Network's live "Nashville Now" prime-time show, cut to 60 minutes in March, will return to its 90-minute format, four nights a week beginning June 30. Executives at the country music-oriented cable channel said hundreds of viewers objected after the show was shortened March 30. The program, featuring Ralph Emery as host and music by country performers, will return to a 90-minute presentation Tuesdays through Fridays. The show will remain 60 minutes on Monday.

EMMY UPSET: ABC's plans for an annual May "American Television Awards" special starting next year brought a quick reaction from Leo Chaloukian, president of the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences. Chaloukian said that the academy's presentation of the Entinny Awards "has been, is and always will be the world's most prestigious and coveted recognition of excellence. There's 44 years of well-established history and tradition behind each Emmy award that can never be diminished by other forms of recognition. Emmys have special significance since nominations and wins are determined solely by professional peers who are active Academy members. It is not a popularity contest." Anyway, ABC's TV awards specials will be produced by George ("American Comedy Awards") Schlatter, who will ask the TV press to vote.

Characters keep 'GL' light strong

For 13 years now, Michael Zaslow has played daytime television's best villain: Roger Thorpe, on CBS's "Guiding Light." Over the years, Roger has raped two of his wives, and cheated on and tried to swindle a third. But Zaslow's Roger is no one-dimensional Snidely Whiplash! personnel have the habit of jumping from soap opera to soap opera. To have all the right people line up simultaneously occurs roughly as often as total eclipses of the sun. But this year, "Guiding Light" managed a near-perfect confluence of writing, acting and production personnel.

"Guiding Light" is written and produced with intelligence and precision. The writers emphasized not new arrivals, but characters who had been in Springfield for years. Seasoned veteran actors lent rare depth to their characters. Best Supporting Actress nominee Maeve Kincaed made the formerly spoiled Vanessa Chamberlain heart-rendingly human in the shadow of an unwanted divorce. Best Supporting Actor nominee Jerry Ver Don finally ironed-out some of the starch of his yuppie character, lawyer Ross Marler.

No one in the world of "Guiding Light" is purely good or evil. The characters are like real people, which has kept "Guiding Light" shining for 40 years.

General Hospital

Tom tries to help a frustrated Felicia get a clearer picture of her recurring nightmares. Romero sets his sights on Holly, who is uncertain of his convictions. The sparks that flew between Holly and Bill are rekindled. Scotty wines and dines Nikki's lawyer, Jessica, with ideas for advancing his own law career. AJ finds Nikki in Washington, totally shattered following her lawsuit against General Hospital. He promises to care for her. Karen reluctantly accepts Jason's invitation to the Quartermaine mansion for Dillon's christening.

One Life to Live

Billy is unhappy that he told Joey he is gay, and he thinks that Joey is treating him differently now. Things look bleak for Sarah at her trial, and Marty is mean to Billy. Lee Ann tells Viki she is asking Kevin for a divorce, and later she convinces Kevin to agree to it. Cassie lets Andrew know that she thinks Marty could cause trouble, and Max tells Bo that Addie may have seen the murderer. Jason comforts Lee Ann, and she moves in with him. Herb joins Jon and Sarah on the defense team. Cassie and Andrew make love, while Jason and Lee Ann wish they could make love. Kevin swears he will not let Jason raise his child. Sloan sees his doctor—he has only six months to live.

Loving

Desperate to save his mother, Clay agrees to re-marry Gwyn. Trisha questions her decision to separate from Trucker. When Dinah Lee finds out about Gwyn and Clay's marriage, she is totally through with him—she tells Clay she never wants to see him again. Casey's attraction to Ally grows, but all she can think about is Cooper. Casey and Hannah hit it off. Kent buys drugs to later plant on Cooper. Ally hopes that romance will bring Cooper back to her, while Casey cannot understand Ally's attraction to Cooper. Clay and Gwyn try to close the rift between them and their daughter. Tricia Trucker still wants to try to work things out with Trisha, but instead receives court papers for separation. At the Casablanca party, Hannah over-

hears Kent's plans for Cooper. Hannah and Casey try to save Cooper from Kent's plan, as Ally tries to keep Cooper away from Hannah.

All My Children

A startled Edmund wakes up from another nightmare. He tells Brooke it is a recurring dream he has had since childhood and is related to the fact that his father despised him. Jack goes after Angelique, who has ridden off in a violent rainstorm to find Dimitri. He rescues her after she falls from her horse and takes her back to Wildwind. Jack calls Mimi and Derek to try to find Dimitri. Dimitri is stranded in the hunting lodge with Erica, who sought shelter from the storm. They admit to one another that they never wanted to part; then they make love. Dimitri promises he will end his marriage to Angelique. When Derek and Mimi knock on the door, Erica hides, and Dimitri goes back to Wildwind with them.

Santa Barbara

While digging up Abby's grave, Micah tells Sawyer he was framed for the murders. The coffin is empty: Abby is alive! Sawyer wants Aurora to stay at his house for safety, but Abigail tries to stop her. Rafe goes after Lilly, and says he loves her. Lisa tells Rafe she is pregnant, and Rafe says he will stand by her. Abigail goes to the police station to report Aurora's kidnapping by a strange boy she thinks is working for Micah. Jodie and Reese tell her that he is their son. Lisa takes a pregnancy test, and goes for a walk with Rafe while waiting for the results. They return to find Lilly holding the EPT.

Days of our Lives

Two robbers posing as cops hold Shawn, Caroline and Jack at gunpoint while they attempt to hold up the Brady Fishmarket. When Bo rushes in, Shawn is shot and seriously wounded during the escape attempt. Knowing that Lawrence is Lisanne's client, John convinces Mickey to hire Lisanne to make sure that Alaman Industries operates legally. John and Isabella win their first corporate battle against

Lawrence. Lisanne and Vivian. Vivian is upset when her last piece of jewelry fetches less money than she needs for her precious "Nikki." Gavin uses the ruse of work to get Molly to meet him at a secluded cabin, and she is horrified when he tries to rape her.

The Young and the Restless

Vicki puts a condom in Ryan's hand, saying she is now ready to make love. But Ryan gives the condom back, telling Vicki he won't let her sacrifice what she believes in. Lauren and Scott agree to live their own lives. Ashley thinks Vicki needs to take an HIV test, but Vicki says Ryan has tested negative. Victor warns Ashley that he can't trust Jack. Victoria now realizes too many people would be hurt if her parents reunited. John accuses Victor of planning to dump Ashley and remarry Nikki, but Victor claims he doesn't want to hurt Ashley. Blade tells Jill that she gives new meaning to the image of "grandma." Dr. Cameron advises that while there is no reason to anticipate any physical impairment, he would like to run more tests before he releases Victor. Ashley calls Jack, and Miguel tells her Jack is not home, neglecting to mention that Jack has moved out.

The Bold and the Beautiful

Sheila tells Eric that she is a certified masseuse, and she begins massaging him. Macy suspects Clarke may be with another woman. Sally asks Clarke where he was last night and tells him to stop playing her for a fool. Stephanie is reeling from the consequences of Brooke and Eric's love-making. She could be pregnant with Eric's baby. It is June 25 and Sally has moved all of the clocks in the house ahead by one hour. Clarke can't wait until 5:00 p.m., when half of Sally's company becomes his. Sally resets Clarke's watch ahead, and Saul calls to confirm that he also reset the clock in Clarke's car. Clarke arrives at his apartment with a bottle of champagne, and Kristen is waiting. He looks forward to divorcing Sally, so the two of them can finally be together.

No, we're not sick of Roseanne yet

Q: Is it true that Roseanne Arnold is finally realizing that people are getting sick of her crude act? She seems to be toning things down. —MS.

A: As the French say, au contraire. Roseanne, at 39, declares that after five seasons on her top-rated TV show, "Nobody's going to tell me what to do." Roseanne is making a summer concert tour. 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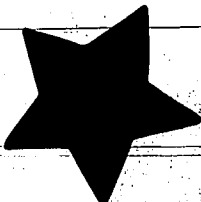
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
