# Ex-Burley teacher in Utah classroom

**BURLEY** — A former Mountain View Elementary School teacher who left the state after being charged with inappropriately touching six students has been teaching in a Salt Lake City suburb this year, Utah officials say.

Ralph Wadsworth, a former Mountain View fourth-grade teacher, taught fifth grade at Hillsdale Elementary School in the Granite School District during the 1991-92 school year, Hillsdale Principal Cal

Poulson said.

Wadsworth also was a substitute teacher at Hillsdale, in West Valley City, in the spring of 1991, he said.

Wadsworth's hiring in Utah may have been helped by letters of recommendation from retired Mountain View Principal Harold Blauer, who said he did not mention

Wadsworth's pending criminal charges in the letters.

Wadsworth was charged in the spring of 1990 with six counts of battery involving six girls in his class. He moved from Burley shortly after charges were filed against him and has never answered the charges.

When contacted by phone at his home in West Valley City this week, Wadsworth said, "I think you need to find your sources some place else." He then hung up.

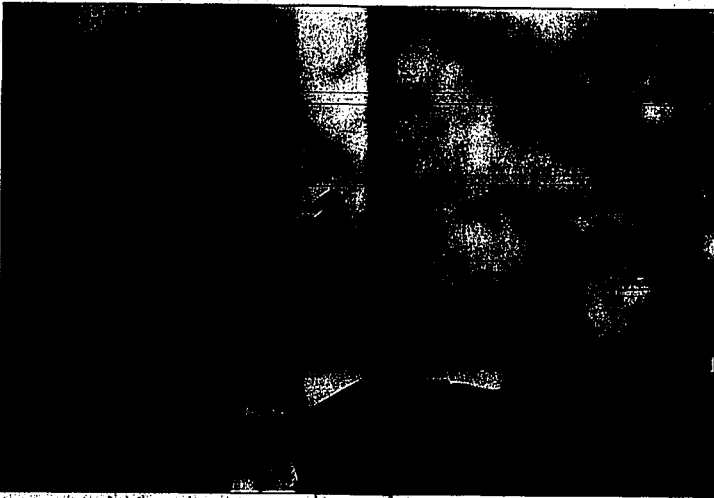
Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal said Wadsworth's charges stemmed from numerous allegations of "improper touching" throughout the 1989-90 school year.

The six charges are misdemeanors, with potential penalties of up to a \$1,000 fine and one year in jail.

Although charges against Wadsworth are pending, he is not in jail.

# Police learn identity of mutilation killing victim

## Brothers sought for questioning

**BURLEY** — The mutilated body found in eastern Lincoln County Monday night belonged to a 61-year-old Mexican man who had been living in Burley, the Cassia County sheriff said Thursday.

Sheriff Billy Crystal would not release the man's name Thursday evening, saying his office was trying to determine whether the man has relatives who should be contacted.

Authorities also found what they believe is the place where the man was killed and an ax that may have been used in the killing, Crystal said.

The victim's body was found by a Lincoln County farmer Monday night, cut into at least a dozen pieces and stuffed into garbage sacks.

An autopsy performed Tuesday revealed that the man died of severe blows to the head.

Investigators are looking for two brothers who Crystal said were living with the man in a Burley trailer park and who came from the same Mexican state as the victim.

"I won't say they are suspects yet," Crystal said. "They are just wanted for questioning in connection with our investigation."

He said the brothers, 24 and 25 years old, have not been seen in the area for several days.

Crystal said he does not know whether the three men are citizens of Mexico or of the United States. The three shared a mobile home with a fourth man.

The fourth man showed up at the Cassia County sheriff's office at about 10 a.m. Thursday and said his roommate had been missing since Saturday.

He took authorities to the mobile home in the 700 block of Oriental Avenue where he lived with the victim and the two brothers, Crystal said. He told police the two brothers had told him the victim had taken ill and had gone to Utah.

There police found an ax and blood in one of the bedrooms, he said.

Three people positively identified the remains, Crystal said. In addition, the FBI identified the man using fingerprints taken at the autopsy, Lincoln County Sheriff Steve Southwick said.

Now that the crime appears to have taken place in Cassia County, authorities there will take over the investigation, Southwick said.

Although he is sure the brothers have left Burley, Crystal said he is not sure where they've gone. Like the victim, they are from the state of Chihuahua in northern Mexico, he said.

The victim's pickup truck also is missing, Crystal said. An old white sports the 1984 orange and brown Chevrolet, with license plates 2M 10489, should report it to their local police, he said.

# Most women who obtain abortions unmarried, young, survey finds

**WASHINGTON** — The woman walking into a hospital or clinic for an abortion is most likely unmarried and young.

She's probably white, and there's a better than a 50-50 chance that this is the first time she's chosen to end a pregnancy.

The Institute, which is affiliated with the leading pro-choice organization Planned Parenthood, also concluded that the abortion rate in America, which rises sharply in the first few years after the Supreme Court's 1973 decision

legalizing abortion, has gone down in recent years.

"We cannot determine the exact reasons for the abortion rate decline," the institute's researchers wrote in a 1991 study, "it could be attributed to reduced access to abortion services or changed attitudes toward abortion as well as toward carrying unplanned pregnancies to term."

Several states have moved to restrict access to abortion, and the Supreme Court is expected to rule by the end of the month on the constitutionality of a Pennsylvania law that imposes waiting periods and notification requirements on women seeking abortions.

With more than 4,000 abortions occurring in any day, the procedure is one of the most common surgical

procedures in the country. But the statistics, even those gathered by the government, can be fuzzy because doctors and clinics don't always report the procedure as an abortion.

But the statistics of the Guttmacher Institute are accepted as authoritative by anti-abortion as well as pro-choice groups.

"Their numbers are some of the most accurate ones available," said Olivia Gans, director of American Victims of Abortion, which is affiliated with National Right to Life.

The institute said that of the women getting abortions in 1987:

- 82 percent were unmarried.
- 26 percent were in their teens.
- About one-third were between 20 and 24 years old.

# Cost of abortion varies with facility chosen

**WASHINGTON** — The average cost for a first-trimester abortion in an abortion clinic and with oral medication was \$245 in 1989, according to the most recent figures available.

The price goes up as the pregnancy progresses and as a woman moves up the medical ladder from a clinic specializing in abortions to one that does not to a doctor's office, and finally to a hospital. An abortion in a non-specializing

clinic cost an average \$294, and the procedure cost an average of \$360 if done in a doctor's office, said a study published in 1991 by the Alan Guttmacher Institute, which is affiliated with Planned Parenthood. The average cost for a hospital as an outpatient was \$1,275 and that didn't include all the fees.

"An abortion in a hospital clearly costs the patient up to seven times as much as one performed in an abortion clinic," the institute's study said.

"In addition to the economies of scale that come with providing a large number of procedures, facilities that charge less tend to attract more women; thereby strengthening the association between low fees and high patient volume," the institute's study said.

By way of comparison, a second-trimester abortion in an abortion clinic cost an average \$509 and \$897, for a third-trimester.

Like everything else, the price has gone up.

# Indian lawyers say Idaho can't block tribal games

**BOISE** — Indian attorneys contended Thursday there's no way the state can stop gambling on reservations, short of banning all gambling in the state including the Idaho Lottery.

The tribes can engage in games because the state does not prohibit it, said Leroy Kootenai, attorney for northern Idaho's small Kootenai Tribe.

He was one of several Indian attorneys appearing before a legislative hearing in Boise. Lawmakers are trying to decide if

they support a special session to deal with Indian gambling.

Three tribes have asked the state to negotiate compacts covering on-reservation gambling, which might include casino-type games. Indian attorneys all contend that because Idaho allows the state lottery, pari-mutuel betting on horses, mules and dogs and "charitable" bingo, under federal law it can't stop tribes from conducting any game they want.

Deputy Attorney General David High disagreed, and urged the lawmakers to support a special session to produce a

constitutional amendment making it clear that casino-type gambling is not allowed.

One attorney for the Indians said that would do little except strengthen the state's position in a lawsuit.

"The attorney general has no interest in getting into a lawsuit with the tribes," High said, of Attorney General Larry EchoHawk, who did not attend the meeting.

"We feel that if nothing is done, we will have casino gambling in Idaho. This is an important question. It should not be decided by default," he said.

Indian leaders in five hours of testimony

stressed the fact that Idaho's five reservations are depressed areas, with high unemployment and little prospect of economic development, and need the jobs and revenue that gambling operations will provide.

Attorney Stan Crow, representing an Ada County anti-gambling organization, No New Gambling, said there are better ways for the state to aid economic development on reservations than allowing wide-open gambling.

He suggested tax breaks or incentives to

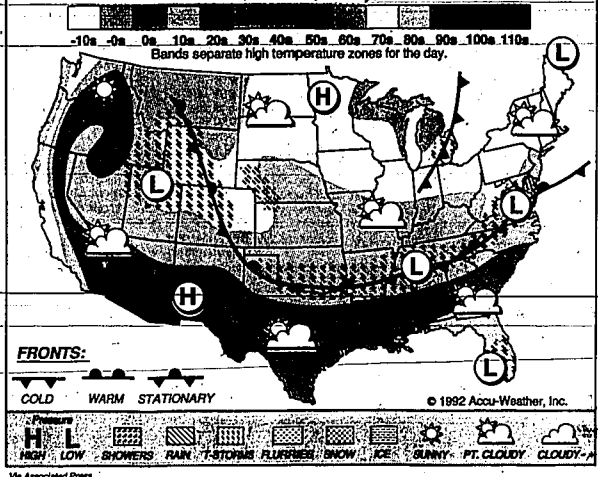

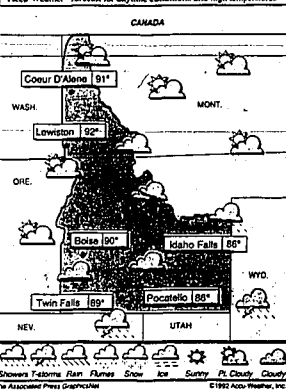

### Thunderstorms bring heavy rain to wide areas of nation

Thunderstorms dumped heavy rain over much of the nation for a second straight day Thursday. The rain was especially heavy in Florida.

Thunderstorms also contributed to the crash of a small plane in which one person died near Konawa, Okla., authorities said.

Temperatures, meanwhile, were seasonably warm across the nation.

Torrential rains in southern and central Florida dumped 13 inches in 48 hours at Parrish and 8 inches at Veneta and Manatee Dam.

The heavy rains prompted officials to issue flood warnings for the Myvakka and Manatee rivers.

Elsewhere, severe thunderstorms were scattered over the

Mississippi Valley, Tennessee, North Carolina and the Plains.

Showers and thunderstorms also drenched parts of Ohio and Virginia, the Great Lakes, the Great Basin, the Rockies, Oklahoma and New England.

Street flooding was reported in Tulsa, Okla., and a flash-flood warning was posted for parts of southern and central Oregon.

On Wednesday, trees and power lines were blown down and some windows smashed by heavy winds caused by thunderstorms that were scattered across the Midwest, including Wyoming, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas.

The low for the nation's 48 contiguous states Thursday was 42 degrees at Alpena, Mich., and at Dickinson and Williston, both in North Dakota.

# Perot-GOP feud offers insights about both sides; Clinton gains

HARTFORD, Conn. — The feud between Ross Perot and Republican Party chief Richard Bond played out on national television, offering insights about both sides.

It showed a cantankerous, dorked side to Perot and spotlighted the high anxiety at the Bush campaign.

Democrat Bill Clinton, for once able to claim the campaign high road, could wind up the winner in the dust-up.

Perot and Bond continued their wrangling on Thursday. Bond went on NBC's "Today" show to accuse the independent challenger of making "wild and reckless charges."

And Perot told a rally of Connecticut supporters that Bond seemed "a little tight," even "uptight," when the GOP chief called to challenge Perot on CNN's "Larry King Live" show Wednesday night.

The fact that Bond himself dialed Larry King's 800-number for a chance to confront Perot directly is being portrayed by Bush strategists as a bold stroke.

But it also seemed to underscore a sense of desperation among Republican officials.

"It shows the frustration on the Bush side," said Kathleen Jamieson, a political scientist at the University of Pennsylvania who specializes in campaign rhetoric and advertising.

"It is much better ... to let those presumed to be ordinary voters carry the questions."

Perot on Thursday made fun of Bond's television appearances, wondering, "Are you sure it wasn't Dana Carvey pretending to be Rich Bond?" He was referring to the television comedian known for his imitations of American political figures.

Republicans have suggested that Perot investigated the personal and financial dealings of President Bush and others with whom he has disagreed.

And both Bond and White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater over the past few days have been using the words "paranoid" and "paranoia" to describe the

unorthodox Dallas computer tycoon.

In seeking to blunt these attacks, Perot has shown a peevish, contentious side that many Americans might not have seen before.

At one point he lashed out at reporters at an Annapolis, Md., news conference, suggesting that they were siding with Bush and his supporters.

"I love this," he grumbled. "You're here to defend everything they do."

And Perot has repeatedly claimed a "dirty tricks" squad is out to get him — without offering any evidence.

Again, on Thursday, he asserted that he had documents to back him up but declined anew to make them available.

"I got a stack of them. At the right time, I'll give you a thriller," he told reporters here.

Meanwhile, Clinton moved quickly to capitalize on the situation.

Campaigning in Boston, the Democratic candidate said Bush and Perot appeared to have "an almost obsession with one another, and I'll let them play it out."

invest on reservations, or some type of government organization to make investment capital available.

In the long run, he said, tribes will not benefit from huge investments in gambling casinos.

"It is a short term solution for Indians to look to casinos gambling as economic development," he said.

Earlier, Coeur d'Alene-Tribe

attorney Ray Givens said there's no need for a special session because Idaho officials can't stop any type of games on reservations.

House Speaker Tom Boyd, who conducted the hearing, said it would continue today and then the Final Council would discuss final wording of a proposed constitutional amendment and new laws. They will be sent to all

legislators and then legislative leaders will gauge whether there is enough support for the legislation to call a special session.

Gov. Cecil Andrus will decide whether to call a special session, probably later next month. The governor said earlier he wouldn't call a special session unless there was substantial agreement over what would be done.

still pending, he can avoid prosecution indefinitely by staying out of Idaho, Crystal said. Idaho officials cannot extradite suspects from other states on misdemeanor charges.

Crystal said he learned four months ago from the mother of one of the alleged victims that Wadsworth was in Utah. He did not tell Utah authorities about the charges for two reasons, he said.

"The main reason is it's their responsibility to do a background check," he said. Concern about liability for spreading damaging information about Wadsworth was the other reason, he said.

Poulson, the Hillsdale principal, said the only work references he received for Wadsworth were from Hillsdale teachers who had known Wadsworth when he taught in the Granite School District several years ago.

Granite officials would not say specifically whether they had received a reference letter from Blauer. But Personnel Director Darrell Johnson said, "We would not hire anyone without the recommendations usually from the principal of the school where the teacher most recently taught."

Blauer retired from the Burley district a year ago. He said he gave Wadsworth two letters of recommendation, one in the spring of 1990 when Wadsworth resigned and the other in the spring of 1991.

"Mr. Wadsworth is a 3894 teacher in my opinion," Blauer said.

After speaking with parents of two of the alleged victims in 1990, Blauer said he found no evidence that Wadsworth had done anything wrong.

The father of one of the six girls, contacted by The Times-News Thursday, said he was angry to learn that Blauer had not mentioned the criminal charges in his letters.

"I don't know what made it the school district judge and jury, but they just don't want to look bad," he said.

The father, whose name is omitted from this story to protect his daughter's privacy, said Blauer broke an unwritten agreement between parents and the school district that Wadsworth's criminal charges would be recorded in his personnel file and that the Idaho information would be given to

prospective employers.

"I'm frustrated that (Wadsworth) would get a clean bill of health from our school district to go teach some place else," Cassia County Prosecutor Steve Bywater said. "How that could not be transferred to them when he was going to teach elementary school kids, I don't understand."

Cassia School District Superintendent Norman Hurst said that not one district office personnel received inquiries about Wadsworth from any district.

Blauer said a Granite School District official called him to confirm Wadsworth's former salary.

Cassia School District officials first heard the allegations against Wadsworth on April 26, 1990, and suspended him with pay eight days later.

Later that spring, Hurst said that Wadsworth had resigned in a letter to the district in which he denied the allegations. The letter said that Wadsworth did not want to teach in Burley with the allegations hanging over his head, Hurst said.

"Although Wadsworth is not teaching during the summer vacation, he remains employed by the Granite district," Hurst said.

Granite School District officials will meet soon to consider whether to take disciplinary action against Wadsworth, Poulson said.

A law passed by the Utah Legislature this year says teachers who leave other states with criminal charges pending must prove their innocence in order to work as teachers, said Doug Bates, staff attorney for Utah's education department.

Idaho state officials this week began a review process that could lead to revocation of Wadsworth's Idaho teaching license, which Wadsworth used to receive a Utah license, said Jim Smith, chief certification officer for the Idaho Department of Education.

Smith said neither Blauer nor Hurst ever told his office about Wadsworth's criminal charges. He only learned about the charges when he was contacted by The Times-News last month.

Hurst said Wadsworth's guilt or innocence had not been established, and no law required him to report a questionable resignation.

A law passed by the Idaho Legislature this year requires

administrators to report within 10 days any firing or any resignation under conditions that could have led to a firing.

Cases such as Wadsworth's were the reason for the law, Smith said.

Bywater, the Cassia County prosecutor, said he will ask the parents of the alleged victims whether their children are still willing to testify against Wadsworth.

If they are, Bywater will ask Granite School District administrators to ask Wadsworth to return to Idaho to face charges, he said.

If the children decide not to testify, which would be understandable after two years, Bywater will drop the charges, he said.

Bywater called the situation frustrating.

"What he would accomplish is avoiding the charges by running away," Bywater said.

Along with teaching in Utah, Wadsworth also holds an Arizona substitute teaching certificate, officials in that state said.

The certificate is valid until July 1997, said Cathryn Kilroy, state administrator for education technology for the Arizona Department of Education.

Wadsworth substituted for one day for Washington School District in Phoenix in the spring of 1991, Kilroy said.

# POW-MIA panel clashes with ex-official

WASHINGTON (AP) — The former Pentagon official in charge of accounting for the Vietnam War's missing clashed with a Senate committee Thursday by insisting he'd had no "hard evidence" in 1973 that Americans were left behind alive.

Sen. John Kerry, chairman of the Senate POW-MIA panel, charged that Roger Shields had been "disingenuous" and the Pentagon was knowingly wrong in asserting in April 1973 that there was no reason to believe Americans remained behind after the release of U.S. prisoners of war.

"We had no current, hard evidence that Americans were still held prisoner in Southeast Asia," said Shields, who was deputy assistant secretary of Defense for POW-MIA affairs from 1971 to 1977.

"None of those who returned had any indication that anyone had been left behind," Shields said.

But Shields acknowledged that the Pentagon was aware it had not received an accounting from North Vietnam for some men "who at one time had been listed as missing."

Kerry has charged that recently declassified government documents show that as many as 133 U.S. servicemen may have been left alive in Vietnam and Laos after the Pentagon asserted it knew of none left behind.

Shields, defending actions nearly 20 years later, contended those servicemen were appropriately re-

garded as missing because it had received no specific, recent information confirming that they remained in captivity.

Kerry also suggested a broader effort to mislead, citing comments of former deputy Defense secretary William Clements and Richard Nixon.

"To say that all prisoners of war had returned, as the president announced on the 29th of March (1973) ... was wrong. You knew it was wrong," Kerry said.

Without explaining the document he was reading from, Kerry recounted what he described as an exchange Shields had with Clements, who later became governor of Texas.

"You recall going to see ... Clements in his office, in early April, a week before your April (news) conference. And you heard him tell you, quote, 'All the American POWs are dead.' And you said to him, 'You can't say that.'"

Shields replied, "That's correct." "And he repeated to you, 'You didn't hear me. They're all dead.'" Kerry added.

"Here's the disingenuousness: Why didn't you say, 'We've got 244 questions. We've got people we list as POW and we don't know.' Instead of saying, 'There are no indications that anybody's alive.'"

Because the last thing you knew was that they were alive."

Shields responded, "I do not know whether they are alive or dead." Senator Kerry.

Kerry: "You had indications some were alive." Shields later was questioned about Nixon's comment that all POWs had come home. He replied: "I don't control the president's comments. I was dismayed at that statement, as anyone else was."

A committee spokeswoman, Deborah DeYoung, said later that Kerry had read from staff briefing documents based on an account Shields provided to the panel in a deposition of his conversation with Clements.

Shields suggested the committee itself was being less than serious in its dealings with the issue, citing comments by at least one member, vice chairman Sen. Bob Smith, R-N.H., that it has information an American was alive in Southeast Asia as recently as 1989.

Kerry said that was Smith's personal view and that he disagreed.

Smith said he stood by his remarks.

Kerry said the committee's review of Defense Department documents shows that 244 Americans who did not return during Operation Homecoming "should have been reported in captivity" in April 1973. He said 111 Americans from that list of 244 were later found to have died, leaving 133 unaccounted for.

## Columbia lifts off in marathon mission

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Columbia broke through the clouds and roared into orbit Thursday on a marathon 13-day mission that is expected to lead to even longer trips and, eventually, full-time stays in space.

Columbia and its seven astronauts began the longest shuttle flight ever planned by NASA at 12:12 p.m. EDT. They're not due back until July 8.

"We're going to find out whether those kids are really friends or not," said Brewster Shaw, deputy director of the shuttle program.

Seconds after liftoff, the 100-ton spaceship was swallowed by clouds, its twin solid rocket boosters flashing orange, as it arced over the Atlantic and sped toward a 184-mile-high orbit.

The shuttle beat out thunderstorms that were headed toward Kennedy Space Center. Launch officials delayed the flight five minutes because of a high deck of clouds that they feared might trigger lightning as the ship passed through those clouds scattered just before liftoff.

"Fortunately, Mother Nature smiled on us," Shaw said.

The crew of five men and two women quickly powered up Spacelab, a 23-foot laboratory in the cargo bay. Almost all the round-the-clock research will be performed inside Spacelab.

Payload commander Bonnie Dunbar was the first one inside the labo-

ratory. She floated through the tunnel connecting the cabin and Spacelab, followed by camera-toting Kenneth Bowersox, the pilot.

Crystals were among the first experiments to be activated. The mission is expected to yield thousands of specimens ranging in size from a grain of salt to a marble, all bigger and better than those cultivated on Earth where gravity hampers growth.

Scientists hope the space crystals will speed the search for drugs against AIDS and other diseases, and lead to better semiconductors and infrared detectors.

The astronauts also will study drops of fluids, set small fires in sealed chambers, and undergo medical tests needed to gain understanding of the effects of extended space travel.

Although the third and final Skylab mission in 1973-74 lasted 84 days, a U.S. space record, shuttle flights never have exceeded 10 days and 21 hours. Columbia set that record in 1990; Dunbar was among the five astronauts aboard.

"This is obviously the longest mission we've flown so they'll be cooped up together," Shaw said.

"But we've flown seven people before without a Spacelab module, which is a heck of a lot more cramped than they're going to be. ... They're going to be so busy over these 13 days that I'm pretty sure they won't have time to get mad at each other."

## Pentagon reports Scud launcher hits incorrect

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon's spokesman acknowledged on Thursday that claims of successful U.S. attacks against mobile Iraqi Scud launchers during the Persian Gulf War were incorrect.

He said the claims were sharply revised downward in a postwar assessment of the conflict.

"That was the best evidence that we had at the time," Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams told reporters of the initial claims. "That was what we thought was true at the time. But now we've gone back, we now say that less damage was left than we previously thought."

Williams was referring to a Jan. 30, 1991, briefing led by Gen. Norman Schwarzkopf, who said 11 ve-

hicles carrying the mobile Scud missiles had been bombed. He also showed dramatic videotape to back up his claim.

However, Williams said, "The video footage that was shown and said to be, at the time, destruction of mobile Scud launchers ... our information now is that those vehicles were probably large tanker trucks."

## Additional Iran-Contra indictments possible

WASHINGTON (AP) — Iran-Contra prosecutors said Thursday additional indictments in the arms-for-hostages affair are possible this summer and "we are attempting to determine whether officials at the highest level of government broke the law."

In a report to Congress, the prosecutors said these officials — whom they did not name — may have lied to investigators about the White House-approved arms deliveries to Iran in 1985.

Thursday's report is the strongest statement to date that independent counsel Lawrence Walsh intends to continue the criminal investigation.

The statement said Walsh was considering whether additional proposed indictments would be presented to a grand jury.

"That investigation should be completed this summer," it added.

Walsh said he will work fulltime in the Iran-Contra prosecutors' office in Washington "in order to complete the final phase of our investigation."

Walsh had been spending most of his time at home in Oklahoma since late last year.

Iran-Contra prosecutors last month tried to persuade former Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger to provide evidence against former President Reagan, sources familiar with the investigation have said.

Those sources spoke on condition of anonymity.

Weinberger was indicted a week and a half ago on charges of obstruction and lying to Congress and Iran-Contra prosecutors about his knowledge of the 1985 arms sales.

"We are attempting to determine whether officials at the highest level of government, acting individually or in concert, sought to obstruct official inquiries into the Iran initiative by supplying a false account of the 1985 arms sales from Ismaili stocks," said Walsh's report.

**Wheelchair operator faces DUI charge**

**BOWLING GREEN, Ky.** — A person who operates a motorized wheelchair while drunk can be charged with driving under the influence, a judge ruled Thursday in a case involving a man missing both legs.

But James I. Jagers avoided jail for his wheelchair drunken-driving arrest when Judge Joann Spiess Coleman agreed to a pretrial program under which the charge could be dropped after a year.

The prosecutor said he agreed to the deal because he felt sorry for Jagers, who had driven his wheelchair into the roadway because a sidewalk had been blocked. Warren County Attorney Mike Caudill also acknowledged it would have been difficult to convict Jagers, whose legs were amputated about 20 years ago.

**Clinton vows to work on U.S. problems**



**BOSTON** — Bill Clinton, plainly relishing the "personal vendetta" between President Bush and Ross Perot, promised Thursday to "keep working on the problems of America" while his rivals snipe at each other.

The Democratic presidential candidate campaigned in Boston, picking up the endorsement of Mayor Raymond Flynn, promoting his economic plan and answering questions about the escalating feud between his rivals.

Clinton said that "most people are worrying about not being able to educate their children and a lot of people are worried about not being able to live on safe streets... we are treated to a presidential election in which the other two candidates seem more interested in investigating and dumping on each other than investigating the problems of the American people."

**Ruling clears way for lumber tariff**

**WASHINGTON** — The U.S. International Trade Commission ruled Thursday imports of Canadian softwood lumber are harming U.S. manufacturers. The 4-2 vote clears the way for Commerce Secretary Barbara Franklin to levy a tariff on the Canadian imports.

The Commerce Department earlier issued a preliminary finding that a 6.5 percent duty is needed to put U.S. manufacturers on an equal footing with their competitors north of the border.

**Teen boys in South at high shooting risk**

**ATLANTA** — Shootings are the third leading cause of accidental death among children, and teen-age boys in the South face the greatest risk, federal health officials said Thursday.

The Centers for Disease Control reported that more than 3,600 children under age 19 died in accidental shootings from 1982-88, and most of the shootings occurred at home.

The CDC said shootings were the third leading cause of accidental deaths — after auto accidents and drownings — among children ages 10-19 in 1988, the latest year for which data was available.

**Baker presses for aid to ex-Soviets**

**WASHINGTON** — Secretary of State James A. Baker III raised the specter Thursday of a renewed Cold War and accompanying trillion-dollar defense budget if the United States doesn't assist reform in the former Soviet republics.

Baker said a "new chapter of hope" has been opened by the arms reduction treaty now pending ratification and administration proposals to assist the economic reform process in these republics.

"Both the START treaty and the Freedom Support Act are before the Congress," Baker said. "Congress may hesitate. But history will not. It is time for the Senate and the House to act and to act now."

**Economic growth doesn't excite analysts**

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The U.S. economy grew at an annual rate of 2.7 percent in the first three months of the year, the brisk pace of the Bush presidency, the government said Thursday.

But while the administration insisted that the economy is clearly in a period of "modest growth," private analysts dismissed the rise in the gross domestic product as ancient history and worried that more recent reports show the recovery is in danger of stalling out again.

The GDP report did show that an inflation index that measures the prices paid by U.S. residents increased at a modest rate of 3 percent in the first three months of the year. And an accompanying report showed that after-tax profits of American corporations jumped 11.3 percent in the first three months of the year, the biggest increase in nearly five years. The various changes left GDP at \$4.90 trillion in the first three months of the year, after removing the effects of inflation.

The increase in the GDP, the country's total output of goods and services, was revised up from a 2.4 percent estimate made a month ago.

It represented the fastest growth since the final three months of 1988 when the economy expanded at an annual rate of 3.9 percent. Since that time, the economy has been virtually stagnant or in outright recession.

The upward revision to the first quarter GDP report reflected new-found strength in housing construction, business investment and the country's trade performance.

The Labor Department said that the number of Americans filing first-time claims for unemployment benefits shot up to 422,000 for the week ending June 13. The unexpectedly sharp increase of 10,000 from the previous week put the number of newly laid-off workers seeking jobless benefits at its highest level in six weeks.

In another sign of weakness, sales of existing homes dropped for a second straight month, falling 1.7 per-

cent-to-a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 3.43 million units in May. The National Association of Realtors blamed rising mortgage rates for the setbacks.

Economists said the weakness in the housing sector and the labor market, coupled with a report Wednesday showing a big decline in orders for manufactured goods, all pointed to an economy that is slowing down rather than revving up.

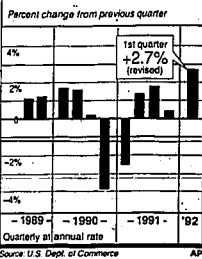
They worried that this year's recovery could be in danger of faltering just as a similar rebound did in 1991.

"The data is telling us that the threat of a relapse into stagnation is rising," said Laurence Meyer, head of an economic consulting firm in St. Louis.

"The first quarter was a good starter, but the question is can we maintain it and the answer right now is that we are going to have trouble," said Robert Dedrick, chief economist at Northern Trust Co. of Chicago.

**Black homicides drive up death rate for young**

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Deaths among young people are on the rise, largely due to a sharp increase in black homicide rates, federal health authorities said Thursday.

They said they are setting up a new center to try to reduce accidents and violence.

"Violence and injury are not just matters for crime and punishment but for public health prevention," Secretary of Health and Human Services Louis Sullivan said in announcing the new center at the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

James Mason, assistant secretary for health and head of the Public Health Service, said the center was planned before the Los Angeles riots but "is designed to face the underlying cause of violent acts there and in every big city and village."

The new center will be known as the National Center for Injury Prevention and Control.

"By making this into a science of prevention and injury control, we can have a major impact on the carnage that occurs on our highways and the violence in our neighborhoods," Mason said.

In an annual report on the nation's health, Sullivan said the death rate among those aged 15 to 24 had risen

after declining in the early 1980's primarily due to a 20 percent drop in motor vehicle accidents.

"This increase is attributed, in large part, to a rising rate of homicide among young black men," he said. "Between 1985 and 1989, homicides were up 74 percent among young black males to reach the highest level ever."

The annual compilation of health statistics said overall life expectancy at birth increased from 74.9 years to 75.3 years from 1988 to 1989.

Life expectancy for black women was 73.5 years in 1989, up slightly from the previous year.

Life expectancy of black men was 64.8 years, continuing a downward trend observed since 1984.

**Scientists find key AIDS virus enzyme's shape**

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Yale University scientists have discovered the precise shape of reverse transcriptase, a key enzyme in the AIDS virus infection.

The finding may speed development of AIDS "designer" drugs.

By knowing the shape of the AIDS enzyme, researchers will now be able to more quickly find drugs that effectively attack the AIDS virus and have a minimum of side effects, Thomas A. Steitz, head of the Yale research team, said in an interview on Thursday.

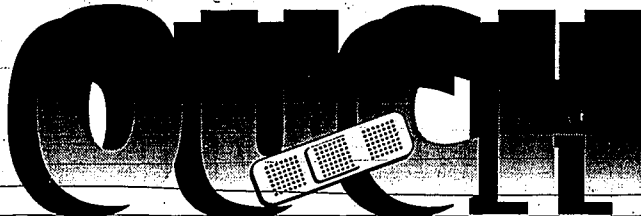
"Instead of trying everything, you can try a smaller number of things," said Steitz. "It narrows the search and enables you to direct your efforts more profitably."

A report is to be published today in the journal Science.

The Yale researchers determined the reverse transcriptase shape by first crystallizing the complex protein and then taking a long series of X-ray pictures. These were then processed through a computer to give a three-dimension image of the molecule.

With a picture of the structure, Steitz said the researchers will be able to determine which parts of the molecule perform actual functions within a cell. When these sites are known, he said, then scientists can design drugs that block the action of the enzyme, but which do not affect other proteins within the body.

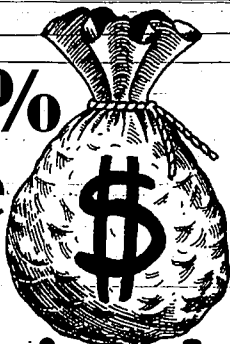

## Former Wimbledon champs serve glimpse of past during epic match

**WIMBLEDON, England** — Diving, rolling, even crawling on Centre Court, John McEnroe and Pat Cash played Thursday like the champions they once were in an epic last gasp for Grand Slam glory.

They left skid marks on the grass, brought back memories and created new ones in 4 hours, 9 minutes of the sweetest tennis seen here in years as McEnroe came through 6-7 (7-3), 6-4, 6-7 (7-1), 6-3, 6-2.

The guitar-playing buddies, with Rolling Stones drum Ron Wood sitting beside McEnroe's wife, Tatum O'Neal, put friendship aside in this electrically charged jam session with tennis strings.

"There wasn't a shot they didn't use — delicate touch volleys, disguised lobs, overhead smashes, passes from both sides, riffs they improvised along the way — and

the packed crowd roared at the performance almost as wildly as U.S. Open fans.

Despite McEnroe's and Cash's plans to quit tennis soon after long careers, their match was no old geezer's outing. They chased balls practically into the stands, racing from side to side and baseline to net as if they were teenagers again.

They daringly aimed for winners on almost every shot, disdainful of just trying to keep the ball in play. They had only 13 aces between them, but they brandished a style of tennis rarely seen anymore.

"It might have been my last match out there," Cash said. "It could have been his, too. You try your best off."

It was as natural as McEnroe's upset of Boris Becker in the Australian Open in January, though this time McEnroe's

emotions were exposed more and he had to scrap harder.

He flung his racket in disgust at times, bashed the net, the tarp and the court, but he kept his infamous temper in check enough to reach the third round against David Wheaton, a semifinalist last year.

McEnroe, calling it "high quality tennis," said he hadn't played better on Centre Court since he won his third Wimbledon title in 1984. Yet he knew he barely escaped a loss against the 1987 champion, who remains a crafty, tough battler on grass.

When they talked it over in the locker room afterward, both of them drained after going from hazy, midday heat to cool evening-on-court—they acknowledged to each other that only a few key points made the

## Regatta means boom time to Burley businesses

**BURLEY** — No matter how you add it up, the Idaho Regatta will give a significant boost to the Mini-Cassia area economy.

"I think it's safe to say it adds about a million dollars," said Terry Bingham of the Idaho Regatta Committee.

He said economists have various methods in determining economic impacts during such events.

"Each of them have their own favorite multiplier," Bingham said.

The area obviously benefits from the event as thousands of people gather to see the high-speed boats race around the course.

It has been estimated that there are five crew members to each of the 100 boats entered in the event, and that each crew member spends about \$200 during the event.

Brandhagen, manager of Tops Motel near Rupert. She said they were booked in January.

She said Regatta fans coming into the area need to call in plenty of time in advance to secure a room.

"We are busy, busy," she said. "An employee of the Budget Motel said that most of their rooms are reserved a year in advance of the Regatta, as people attending the Regatta will reserve their rooms for next year's event."

It appears area restaurants also get some benefits, but location might determine how much of an increase.

The weekend is one of our busiest times of the year. We are glad to have it in town," said a manager of Burgers-Etc.-in-Burley.

He said business increases from 15-20 percent during the event.

On the other hand, Russ Hutchison, manager of George K's in Burley, said he doesn't think his restaurant has lost any business because of the Regatta, but they don't see a great change in increased traffic.

He wondered if quite a few eat at the concession stands at the Regatta.

Bill Schafer, executive director of the Burley Area Chamber of Commerce, said there are continued attempts to promote the entire community during the Regatta.

For instance, other activities and tourist attractions, such as the City of Rocks, are pointed out to those involved with the boat race, in an effort to get them to stay in the Mini-Cassia area longer.

For the last two years, buses were made available to transport people from the Regatta to downtown free of charge. However, response to that was minimal, said Schafer.

Because of the lack of good response, the bus service will be discontinued this year.

The situation can be somewhat expected, said Schafer. "I don't think that's unusual about any event. It depends what kind of activity it is. It's hard to find any given event that provides a benefit to every business," Schafer said.

Currently, the downtown businesses don't see any significant increase in traffic during the Regatta weekend, Schafer said. With the Regatta now being a championship event, Schafer said he expects the Regatta to continue to benefit the area.

## Temperatures, low water cause fish kill

**JEROME** — A combination of low water, high temperatures and reduced oxygen levels has caused a fish kill in famed Silver Creek this week.

Dying trout first were noted Tuesday in the Nature Conservancy area and downstream to Picabo Bridge, said Stu Murrell, Region 4 conservation educator. About the same time, Bob Esselman, superintendent of the department's Hayspur hatchery, collected 53 dead rainbow and brown trout, ranging up to 24 inches and six pounds.

He also found water temperatures in the low 70s and oxygen running from 2.5 parts per million to 4.5.

Trout normally require five parts per million to survive, Murrell said.

Murrell said most fish die-offs occur at night for several reasons. First, plants release oxygen during the daytime through the photosynthesis process. But plants emit carbon dioxide and consume oxygen at night.

Temperature affects the amount of oxygen water can hold in the dissolved state. Higher temperatures mean greater loss of oxygen to the surrounding air.

Upper Silver Creek has extensive aquatic vegetation but this is the first time for a natural fish kill in the memory of long-time residents," Murrell said.

"The early, warm spring has probably increased aquatic growth and hot weather this past week raised water temperatures dramatically."

"This types of kills normally occur during the hottest part of summer so if our weather continues, we may have similar kills in many waters in Idaho," he warned.

Hayspur Hatchery, which receives water from Loving creek on a tributary to Silver Creek also is in jeopardy, Murrell said. Inflows have dropped from an average of 14 cubic feet per second to six cfs.

Temperatures have increased to the high 60s.

Murrell said Esselman fears loss of his trout production.

Hayspur has been selected to provide most of the rainbow trout eggs for other state hatcheries in southern Idaho.

"If we lose that production, a unique strain of Hayspur rainbow might be lost from our future stocking of the state," Murrell said.



# Reynolds saga nears end today

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Butch Reynolds' "paper chase" to make the U.S. Olympic team reaches its final chapter Friday, while the saga of Dan and Dave begins.

Reynolds' controversial story has been inflamed by a threat from track and field's international governing body that he will not be allowed to compete in the Barcelona Games even if he qualifies for the team.

Reynolds has continued to defy the International Amateur Athletic Federation's two-year suspension for alleged drug usage by competing in the U.S. trials.

And he has continued to defy the pessimists who thought he would not be properly prepared physically because of his lack of competition since his ban in 1990 and not be properly prepared mentally because of all the court disputes surrounding his participation.

In a display of exceptional physical and mental strength and resiliency, Reynolds has put together three outstanding races in advancing to Friday night's 400-meter final.

Tuesday, after three days of postponements because of all the court proceedings, capped by a Supreme Court ruling in his favor, Reynolds won his first-round and quarterfinal heats in 44.58 seconds and 44.68, respectively. Wednesday night, he was second to Quincy Watts in his semifinal heat in 44.14.

In order to beat Reynolds, Watts, the NCAA champion from Southern California, ran 43.97, the fastest time in the world since the 1988 Olympics.

That did not diminish Reynolds' enthusiasm from his appointed mission, making the team. "Running this fast at this stage is a good sign," Reynolds said. "I believe things will hold up, and I'll make the team."

But even if Reynolds finishes first, second or third in the final, the IAAF has been adamant in its stand that he will not participate in the Games. And it has threatened to extend his suspension for four more years for competing in the trials.

To counteract those possible moves, Reynolds has said he would return to court, perhaps even going to the World Court.

In similar case but with a different

result, a federal judge in Charleston, W.Va., on Thursday overturned a lower court order that would have permitted two-record holding shot putter Randy Barnes to compete in the trials.

U.S. District Judge John T. Copenhaver Jr. dissolved a temporary restraining order that a county circuit judge had issued earlier this week requiring that Barnes be allowed to try out for the Olympic team.

Barnes, like Reynolds, is under a two-year suspension imposed when he tested positive for steroids. And, like Reynolds, Barnes denies using steroids and blames faulty testing procedures for the positive test.

Meanwhile, the U.S. Olympic Committee has said it could submit Reynolds' name as part of the team, along with the court documents that allowed him to compete in the trials and the name of an alternate, in case he is not permitted to compete.

The last word, however, would be up to the IAAF, USOC executive director Harvey Schiller, said. "They are the final authority on the competition in the Olympic Games," he said.

In addition to trying to beat Watts for a spot on the team, Reynolds, the 1988 Olympic silver medalist and world record-holder, will have to beat Steve Lewis, the gold medalist and Danny Everett, the bronze medalist, among others.

While the Reynolds soap opera dominated the first six days of the trials, the generally visible Dan and Dave show remained on hold.

Now, it's ready for prime time. It will feature Dan O'Brien, the 1991 world champion and American record-holder, and Dave Johnson, the three-time national champion and 1992 world leader, in the decathlon.

The two friendly rivals, on the track and in their widely distributed television commercials, are the prohibitive favorites to finish 1-2 in the trials and possibly the same way at Barcelona.

But will it be Dan and Dave, or Dave and Dan, in that order? "I'm the guy to beat in my mind," Johnson said. "Dan will have a tough time beating me."

"I definitely want to win," O'Brien said. "It's for bragging rights ... although if we finish 1-2, we'll still be on the team."

"If I score less than 8,600 points, I'll be disappointed."

The first five events of the decathlon — the 100 meters, long jump, shot put, high jump and 400 meters — will be contested Friday. The other five — the 110-meter hurdles, discus, pole vault, javelin and 1,500 meters — will be held Saturday.

In addition to the open 400, there will be three finals Friday, when competition resumes after an off day Thursday. They are the men's 3,000-meter steeplechase and 5,000 meters, and the women's 10,000 meters.

There also will be first-round heats in the men's and women's 200 and high hurdles, semifinals in the men's and women's 1,500, and qualifying in the men's high jump, women's long jump and men's and women's shot put.

# Rhode Island court ruling should help former champion

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) — The Rhode Island Supreme Court ruled Thursday that the Indiana jury that convicted boxer Mike Tyson of rape should have been told that his accuser had hired an attorney to handle her civil case.

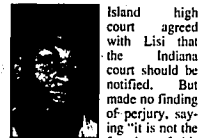
Tyson's defense attorney called the ruling "the smoking gun of perjury" that will help in his appeal. The former boxing heavyweight champion was convicted in February of raping a Rhode Island woman last year in an Indianapolis hotel room and is serving a six-year sentence.

The court ruled on questions raised by Edward Gerstein, a Providence attorney who had been hired by Desiree Washington, Tyson's accuser. He was her lawyer at the time of the trial but was later discharged from the case.

He said he had been hired on a contingency basis — that is, for no money except for a portion of what is eventually won in a lawsuit. But Washington and her father both testified they thought Gerstein had been retained to handle relations with the media.

Mary Lisi, the Rhode Island court's disciplinary counsel who reviewed the Gerstein matter, had recommended that the information on the contingency hiring be turned over to the Indiana judge. The victim had no firm concept of her financial relationship with the attorney, she found.

In its ruling today, the Rhode



AP photo Island court agreed with Lisi that the Indiana court should be notified. But made no finding of perjury, saying "it is not the function of this court to determine whether the victim in the rape trial testified falsely."

But in the opinion of Alan Der-showitz, one of Tyson's attorneys, "there's no question it has a very significant impact, both on the appeal and on a motion for a new trial. It is the smoking gun of perjury in Desiree Washington's testimony."

Der-showitz said the ruling shows Washington lied about her motive for pressing charges against the prizefighter. The defense had argued that the woman had agreed to have sex with Tyson and changed her mind later in part out of a desire to win money through a lawsuit.

Right from the beginning she was motivated by money, and she and the prosecution engaged in a coverup of that financial motive in order to keep that information from the jury," Der-showitz said. Jurors "never would have believed her" if they had known she planned to sue, he said.

Washington filed suit against Tyson on Monday, seeking unspecified damages.

# Bucks turn to youth in team reconstruction

MILWAUKEE (AP) — It's as if the Milwaukee Bucks, one of the NBA's oldest teams, had taken a quick dip in a fountain of youth. In one day's re-shaping they drafted or acquired five — and perhaps six — younger players.

"There is a process taking place here," said Lee Rose, the team's director of player personnel. "When you begin to reconstruct, you have to tear down. That's obvious by what took place."

Since the Bucks still have not hired a director of basketball operations, Wednesday's series of moves were orchestrated by Rose and new coach Mike Dunleavy.

Dunleavy isn't making any promises about his reshaped team. He has an eight-year contract, so he'll have some time to mold.

"When I came here I said we would never use Bands-Aids. We're looking for the long haul," Dunleavy said.

"To me, there are two ways you should want your team. You should have a team that's playing for the championship, or one that's going to play for a championship. We're a team that's going to be playing for the championship and we're going to go about it in the right way."

The Bucks began their overhaul Wednesday when they traded away Jay Humphries, one of their co-captains last year and arguably the team's best player, and Larry Krystkowiak to the Utah Jazz.

In return, they got 26-year-old forward Blue Edwards, point guard Eric Murdock, 24, and Utah's 23rd pick, which they used to take 22-year-old guard Lee Mayberry.

With their own selection at No. 8, the Bucks chose Mayberry, Arkansas teammate Todd Day, also 22. Earlier Wednesday, the Bucks signed 22-year-old forward Anthony Avent, whom they acquired last year, to a four-year contract.

Reports say the Bucks might also send Dale Ellis to San Antonio and will get UCLA's Tracy Murray, who was taken at No. 18 by the Spurs. Murray will be 21 next month. The deal couldn't be announced until the salary cap expands July 1.

"How can so many young players function on one team? It will be a big test for a young coach like Dunleavy, who is only 38."

"I've got a lot of patience. I've always had a lot of patience," Dunleavy said.

"It's going to be tough. To know how team chemistry is going to work with these new players is impossible to say. I'd like this team and in order to do that you have to have guys who can rebound."

# Quintet shoot to top of Buick Classic

HARRISON, N.Y. (AP) — Bob Tway turned out an old favorite for a new beginning.

"This is the best round I've had in a long, long time. I'm hoping it's the start of something good," Tway said Thursday after a 4-under-par 67 gave him a place in a five-way tie for the first-round lead of the \$1 million Buick Classic.

Tway, struggling through the worst slump of his career, shared the top spot with Ted Schulz, Greg Kraft, South African David Frost and Australian Steve Elkington, winner of the Tournament of Champions early this season.

Jeff Sluman, runnerup in the U.S. Open last week at Pebble Beach, continued his strong play with a 68 and was tied at 3-under with Chip Beck, Emlyn Aubrey, Buddy Gardner and Australian Craig Parry.

Tom Kite, who scored the first

major-tournament victory of his career last week in the U.S. Open, produced a sigh of relief after a 70.

"I'm very relieved to have that round behind me, and I'm very relieved it was a good one," Kite said, explaining he had feared a letdown in the wake of his emotional Open triumph.

"That was really a good round," veteran Ray Floyd told Kite after playing in the same threesome. "I know how difficult it must have been for you."

And it was very difficult, Kite said.

"A couple of the guys came up to me and said, 'What the hell are you doing too?' And I've kind of wondered, too," Kite said.

"But I had committed for the tournament. I've never withdrawn after committing and it's not a habit I want to get into."

"But I'll tell you, I sure am glad to have that round behind me. So was Tway."

The bogey-free effort was just what he'd been looking for. "I haven't played a single good tournament this year," he said. "The way I've been playing, golf is no fun."

"I haven't been doing anything very good. I wasn't driving it very well. My irons were mediocre and my putting suspect," said Tway, who has missed the cut in half his 12 starts this season and ranks a dismal 176th on the money list with \$21,976.

That compares with four victories, including the birdie from a bunker that beat Greg Norman in the PGA in 1986.

One of those 1986 triumphs came on this hilly Westchester Country Club course in the northern suburbs of New York.

# Lopez leads Rochester International by 1 stroke

PITTSFORD, N.Y. (AP) — Nancy Lopez, the tournament's only three-time winner, made six birdies on Thursday to lead by one stroke over Michael McGann in the first round of the \$400,000 Rochester International.

Lopez, who tied for second in last week's Lady Keystone Open, started out both nines with consecutive birdies on the way to a 6-under-par 66 at the Locust Hill Country Club.

All but one of Lopez's birdie puts were less than seven feet. She said missing puts like those had cost her during her past four tournaments, with two seconds, a fifth and an eighth.

"In the last month, if I would have made a

few of those 5- and 6-footers, I would have won two or three tournaments," she said.

About two months ago, Lopez switched putters, going to a model similar to the one she had used since childhood.

"I had played with it since I was 12 but the metal wasn't really solid anymore and I couldn't find (one) like my old one, so I went to another putter," she said.

Finally, the manufacturer of the old putter sent several test models. "I hoped that I'd get lucky and find one that rolled the ball like my old one and I did get lucky and found one," she said.

Lopez, winner of the Rochester tournament in 1978, 1980 and 1981, remains popular here and had the day's largest gallery, following her around the 6,162-yard course.

"I'd like to win here, but the people have supported me whether I've played well or I've played great," she said. "They don't jump on the bandwagon when I'm not playing well. They're still there when I'm not playing well."

McGann, looking for her first victory in three years on the tour, eagled the 459-yard, par-5 17th hole, as did playing partner Patty Sheehan, who was among nine players who shot 70.

# Slow, soft course promises competitive Bell Classic

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The 9-under-par 201 which Jim Colbert shot to win the first annual Southwestern Bell Classic last year may not be good enough the second time around.

The 6,496-yard Loch Lloyd course has been softened a bit by spring rain and unseasonably cool temperatures. In addition, winds were expected to remain light and variable for the 54-hole Senior PGA

Tour event, which begins Friday.

"We had a lot of wind last year. But this year the course has been slow and soft," Colbert said Wednesday. "You're going to see some competitive golf out here, and some fine shots."

If there was a favorite, it would have to be Lee Trevino, who shot a 205 last year and finished fourth. Already this year, Trevino has won five tournaments.

"I'm not downgrading the other players," Trevino said, "but they'll tell you I just happened to make some very crucial puts coming down the stretch. All five tournaments, I won by one shot. The last three I've played in, I lost by one. I don't think I'm playing exceptionally great right now. I think I can play better."

Trevino agreed with Colbert that the 3-year-old Loch Lloyd course is in beautiful condition. The greens and fairways are beautiful.

Unlike last year, Trevino has control of his putter.

"I didn't putt well here last year," he said. "I went back and worked on my putting and chipping. Now, I'm putting well. I'm playing very well. I've played well all year. I'm putting a lot better. I'm leading in putting. In 1990 I led it also."

# ACC signs 3-year deal with Peach Bowl

RALEIGH (AP) — The Atlantic Coast Conference signed a three-year deal with the Peach Bowl on Thursday, giving the Atlanta-based postseason game a conference alliance for the first time in its 25-year history.

Neill Cameron, president of the Peach Bowl, said the agreement would allow the bowl to select the highest-ranked ACC team not playing in the two major football bowl coalitions formed earlier this year, called Alliance I and Alliance II.

The rules of college football and how bowls are participating in college football is changing," Cameron said

during a teleconference. "We saw the opportunity to upgrade (our bowl) once the alliance made its statement."

Cameron said the ACC agreement may force one of the alliances to include the Peach Bowl after next season.

"This really positions us for the next generation," he said. "The alliance is a one-year agreement. I imagine the rules are going to change in the future."

The ACC team selection will be based on poll ranking, conference finish, strength-of-schedule and the most recent trip to the Peach Bowl, Cameron and ACC Commissioner Gene Corrigan said.

### Truth in Taxation ads tax folks' power to comprehend

If you want proof that Idaho's Truth in Taxation law needs fine-tuning, try reading one of the advertisements it produced:

"The Joint Hagerman School District No. 233 has proposed to increase its annual budget by an amount of ad valorem tax revenues that exceeds one hundred five percent (105%) of the ad valorem tax revenues certified for its annual budget during the previous year, by fourteen hundredths percent (.14%) or its ad valorem property tax rate by

Well, that's enough. You get the idea. Or more likely, you don't. The idea. And that's the problem.

Truth in Taxation is based on a good concept: Give citizens more information about their taxes. But that good idea produced a series of newspaper advertisements larded with some of the most impenetrable gobbledegook we've ever seen.

The new law took effect Jan. 1, and school districts were its first guinea pigs. School officials in the Magic Valley placed the first round of ads in late spring, and they have been complaining that the ads are more trouble than they are worth.

They say the law requires them to state their plans in a way that is at best incomplete, and at worst misleading. The ads leave out considerations of the bond levies, supplemental levies and

override levies. So the ads may say taxes are going up, even though the overall tax burden is going down.

That complaint may or may not be valid. But combine it with the fact that most people can't define "ad valorem" (it means "property taxes"), and you have a pretty good case for reopening discussion of the law.

State Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Blackfoot, who sponsored the new law, said earlier this month that he doesn't expect to change it significantly next year.

He says the ads aren't supposed to give voters the whole picture. If they want a more complete story about their city government or school district, they can attend a budget hearing, he says.

That's true, but it ignores human nature. People don't want to go to budget hearings. Even if they do, they may not understand what they hear. Government budgets are complicated, and the jargon is dense.

That's the beauty of a Truth in Taxation law. If it works right, people can acquire a basic understanding of what's happening to their taxes, without going to the trouble of attending meetings and reading volumes of numbers.

The Legislature ought to take another look at the law. With any luck, maybe next year's ads will make sense to the average taxpayer.

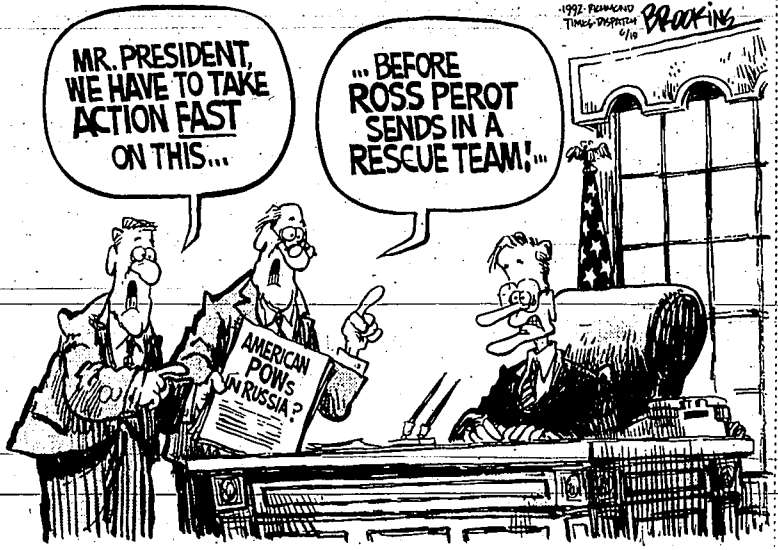

Conforming is exactly what the prosecutor did in the Ducharme case. For that, he was ridiculed. Susie Fisher stood up to an obviously biased directive and said, "No," and she is ridiculed.

The day that we lose the right to dissent, the right to speak out against the norm, the right to venture beyond inhibiting social paradigms, is the day we lose the right to be free.

In an age when we criticize our political officials because they conform to the demands of special-interest groups and have lost insight between what is right and what is wrong, it is refreshing to know that at least someone takes a stand on something.

Susie Fisher should be applauded, not ridiculed. She knew what was right, she believed in what was right and she stood up for that belief. Since there was no way for her to effectively change the rules, she took the only alternative available to her - passive defiance.

As an attorney, I cannot honestly approve of her method. As an American, however, I respect her belief and will defend her right to express it.

I realize injustices in the system do not happen only in Twin Falls; just look at the verdict handed down in the Rodney King case. How is it our legal system can do so much to protect the rights of the criminal (Ducharme) and yet do so little for victims (Cabrera)?

It seems to me that if you are planning to commit a crime, make it big, i.e., murder, rape or child molestation. Your chances of serving time in jail are greater if you commit a lesser crime like watching someone steal a pizza and then telling the truth.

### Support for work center

I have followed with great interest The Times-News articles describing the battle between some Twin Falls residents and the Idaho Department of Corrections.

Although I have never worked for the Idaho Department of Corrections, I have worked in several correctional facilities in another state, and I am familiar with the reputation of the Idaho Department of Corrections. Idaho has one of the more progressive and successful correctional systems in the nation. This is evident in the low number of released prison inmates who return to prison and the number of ex-felons who are contributing members of society.

This is due largely to programs such as the Community Work Center which has met with so much resistance in Twin Falls. As a family man, I certainly understand the fears of residents who oppose the facility. I believe, however, that most of these fears are exaggerated.

First, it is important to realize that inmates who will reside in this facility are scheduled to be released into this community in less than a year's time, with or without a work-release center.

The center's primary purpose is to help them find employment and put in place other support systems prior to their release into the community. This lessens the likelihood of their returning to criminal activities.

Second, it should be noted that participants in this program are carefully screened. Only inmates convicted of non-violent crimes are eligible. Participants are volunteers who have demonstrated good behavior and must not have a "criminally sophisticated" background.

I would also like to point out that program participants do not get a "free ride." Community Work Center residents are required to pay 25 percent of their gross salary to help defray maintenance costs. In addition, restitution to victims and counties is an integral part of the program.

This is far more constructive than having them sit behind bars at taxpayers' expense until the day of their release!

I fully realize that no one wants a prison in their back yard. I also realize, however, that if we stack the deck against people being released from prison, we are not doing our community a favor. Effective programs like the Community Work Center offer our best hope for true rehabilitation of ex-felons.

These are people we're talking about, people who need a chance to change their habits and build a new life. Let's give them that chance.

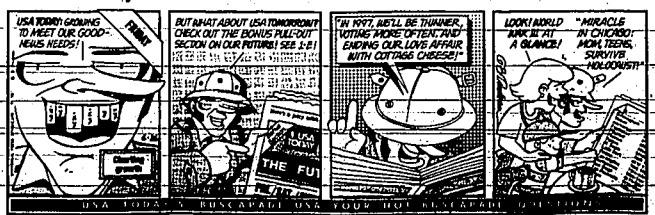

**Arens announces his intent to retire**

**JERUSALEM** — Defense Minister Moshe Arens announced Thursday he was quitting politics, making him the first top Likud party official to step down following Likud's election defeat.

Arens had often been tapped as a candidate for prime minister. But his decision removed him from the running for party leader when Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir steps down. Shamir has indicated he, too, will retire soon.

"With the establishment of the new government I will retire from political life," Arens, 66, told Israel Television.

Arens, 66, said he had been in public office for 18 years and had been considering retirement for some time. Tuesday's election defeat "influenced" his decision, he said.

Arens, who served as ambassador to Washington and as foreign minister, said Likud lost because it was torn by party quarrels and failed on the economic front.

**ANC orders vigils, product boycott**

**JOHANNESBURG, South Africa** — The African National Congress on Thursday ordered its offices around the world to hold vigils and boycott South African products on Monday to mourn victims of last week's township massacre.

Meanwhile, international pressure grew for the ANC, the nation's leading black group, and the white government to settle their differences and resume talks on ending white minority rule.

The ANC broke off talks with the government on Tuesday to protest the slaughter of 42 people in the Boipatong black township on June 17.

President F.W. de Klerk said Wednesday he wanted two days of urgent talks with the ANC to discuss complaints on both sides and hopefully end the political crisis.

**Thieves snatch \$384,000 in jewelry**

**PARIS** — Thieves broke windows at a chic Paris jewelry store on Thursday and before the eyes of flabbergasted clients stole gems worth \$384,000, police said.

The rings, earrings and necklaces were part of a special display of Chanel jewelry in six windows on the first floor of the Boutique Huel Dal.

The thieves hit the store during the lunch hour, when the Boulevard des Capucines, where the store is located, was full of shoppers, police said.

**Aquino lauds loyal, courageous forces**

**MANILA, Philippines** — Departing President Corason Aquino bade farewell Thursday to the armed forces, the institution whose members helped install her in office and also tried seven times to overthrow her.

"I shall remember only the loyalty, honor and courage of those who fought on our side," Aquino told troops during a ceremony at armed forces headquarters at Camp Aguinaldo. "It is fitting and proper that I should come here and as one of my last acts of office, be here among soldiers."

Aquino turns over the presidency Tuesday to former Defense Secretary Fidel Ramos, a leader of the 1986 mutiny who then defended her against the coup attempts.

**Swiss thunderstorms kill woman**

**ZURICH, Switzerland** — The worst thunderstorm in decades dumped record amounts of rain and hail on eastern Switzerland, killing one woman and causing \$1.4 million in damage, authorities said Thursday.

Wednesday evening's storm brought the region's biggest rainfall in decades, dropping as much as 1.5 inches in a half-hour on some areas, said Urs Keller, a spokeswoman for the Swiss Meteorological Office.

The storm also destroyed orchards, flooded basements, blocked road traffic with mudslides and temporarily stalled trains when lightning struck electricity lines. Insurance agents estimated the damage at \$1.4 million.

**Ozone layer depletion hits record level**

**TOKYO** — The depletion of the Earth's ozone layer over the South Pole reached record levels last year, Japan's Environment Agency said Thursday.

The ozone layer, found nine to 31 miles above the Earth, absorbs harmful rays from the sun and impedes heat from escaping into space.

Tetsushi Sato of the Environment Agency said the report was based on data obtained from scientists at Antarctic observation bases belonging to Japan, Britain, New Zealand and the United States.

The report said the hole in the ozone layer over the South Pole — an area with subnormal amounts of ozone — was estimated at 6.76 million square miles at its largest last year, an increase of 13 times in 10 years.

It said the ozone hole was at its largest in October.

**Fire causes panic, no injuries in Turkey**

**IZMIR, Turkey** — A fire broke out Thursday at a hotel used by U.S. military personnel in this Aegean coastal city, causing panic but no injuries, local officials said.

A Turkish firefighter said the blaze started on the ground floor of the Kordon-Hotel when its generator short-circuited. The fire was quickly extinguished, he said.

Capt. Jane Shafer, a U.S. military spokeswoman, said there were "not too many Americans" at the hotel at the time of the incident. She did not have a precise number.

**Cease-fire reached in Moldova**

**KISHINEV, Moldova (AP)** — Russia and Moldova announced agreement on a cease-fire in the secessionist Trans-Dniester region Thursday, and the United Nations said it would send a fact-finding team to the area within a few days.

The agreement was reached in Istanbul, Turkey, after more than two hours of private talks involving presidents Boris Yeltsin of Russia, Mircea Snegur of Moldova, Leonid Kravchuk of Ukraine and Ion Iliescu of Romania.

Snegur told reporters that Moldova's parliament would consider granting a high degree of home rule to Trans-Dniester, where ethnic Russian and Ukrainian separatists have tried to break away from predominantly Romanian Moldova.

Snegur said he and Yeltsin personally guaranteed to preserve a cease-fire that was declared Tuesday but has not been honored.

Earlier in the day, two helicopters were reported shot down and three Moldovans killed in overnight clashes in Trans-Dniester. More than



1,000 people have died or been wounded in recent fighting.

The separatists fear that Moldova eventually will reunite with Romania, which ruled all of Moldova except for Trans-Dniester before World War II.

Moldova refuses to give up the Trans-Dniester region because it is economically valuable and has a sizable ethnic Romanian minority.

The Trans-Dniester National Guard said today that it shot down two helicopters before dawn near the village of Parani inside Trans-Dniester, but no wreckage had been found. The militia's commander, Lt. Col. Nikolai Losiev, said the aircraft belonged to "terrorist groups" planning an attack, but he offered no evidence to support his claim.

Meanwhile, a spokesman for the Moldovan Interior Ministry, Dumitru Corlateanu, said separatists reportedly attacked a police station in the center of Bendery but were repelled. Two Moldovan policemen were killed and one wounded, Corlateanu said.

Defense Ministry spokesman Viorel Cibotaru said one Moldovan had been killed and one wounded during the night in fighting along the front.

Water purification plants were damaged during fighting in Bendery, 30 miles southeast of the Moldovan capital, Kishinev.

A large quantity of poisonous chlorine and ammonia gases were released into the air, the Interior Ministry said, but no injuries were reported.

**China drug problems worsen**

**BEIJING (AP)** — China's drug problems are worsening despite harsh measures in a year-long crackdown, and the West is to blame, the nation's top drug enforcement official said on Thursday.

The Communist Party newspaper, published a rare report on the drug situation in China by Wang Fang, head of the State Anti-Narcotics Committee.

Authorities in recent years have warned repeatedly that drugs were becoming an increasingly serious problem. Harsh measures, including executions of drug traffickers and forced withdrawal for drug addicts, have failed to keep the problem from growing.

China virtually eliminated illegal drug use and trafficking after the Communists took power in 1949.

# Tax collection rebound could pull deficit below \$10 million

BOISE (AP) — State income tax collections were back on track in May and sales tax receipts continued piling up faster than analysts expected, giving rise to the possibility that the current budget deficit may be held below \$10 million.

In its final update before closing the books on the current spending year on June 30, the Andrus administration on Thursday reported general tax collections through May totaled \$10.5 million less than the target.

But that was an improvement over the April figures that found the state facing as much as \$13.1 million in red ink because of a serious miscalculation on income tax receipts.

Economists were confident that steps Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus took earlier this month would be more than enough to assure the state averted a deficit.

The Andrus plan involved offsetting \$1.5 million in spending reduc-

tions with another \$3.2 million from the budget reserve account and then just netting \$8.9 million the state must contribute to school teacher pensions until the new budget year begins July 1.

But while that scheme assures a balanced state budget this year, it throws even further out of balance the budget for the new spending year that begins in less than a week. The state could open the new fiscal year facing \$20 million more in bills than the revenues it expects to generate.

Andrus had indicated late last year that a tax increase of some sort could be needed after the election, and administration analysts have suggested the billions of dollars in transactions—mainly services—that are now exempt from sales tax will be the target. But the magnitude of the state's financial bind has increased since then.

After seeing the bottom fall out of their personal income tax projections

for April, administration analysts said paycheck tax withholding was strong during May, running slightly ahead of the month's target. But it left personal income tax collections nearly \$12 million short of the governor's updated forecast and \$7 million short of the Republican legislative projection.

The shortfall in personal income tax collections came entirely in April, and analysts now say it was the result of unanticipated over-withholding by payroll workers during 1991. That could also be inflating this year's receipts from withholding, which accounted for about a third of total general tax revenues.

Another strong month of sales tax collections was primarily responsible for shrinking the potential deficit, and that reinforced economists' contentions that despite the problems caused by the revenue miscalculation this spring, the state is one of the financially strongest in the nation.

# Tribal fishing dispute continues into July

FORT HALL (AP) — A federal judge has given the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes and the Idaho Fish and Game Commission until next month to submit further legal arguments in their dispute over the state's attempt to regulate tribal fishing.

U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge rejected the tribes' request for an order barring the state regulatory effort earlier this month as the Shoshone-Bannocks worked with the National Marine Fisheries Service to hammer out a limited chinook salmon fishing season this summer.

The tribes' complaint was filed after the state imposed a conservation closure—banning fishing in most of the tribes' treaty areas on the Salmon River. The Fish and Game Commission said depleted

salmon runs warranted the emergency action.

The tribes said the commission lacked authority to regulate salmon fishing by tribal members. In response to the dwindling runs, the Fort Hall Business Council had already imposed limitations that included a restricted season and a catch of only 25 fish for the entire tribe. Tribal regulators also reserved the right to close spring chinook fishing areas to assure proper conservation, court documents said.

In denying the tribes' request, Lodge said the state has the authority to regulate Indian fishing under certain circumstances, but he also found Shoshone-Bannock leaders' undertook actions to regulate and restrict tribal members in the salmon hunt.

# Gasoline prices skyrocket in Pocatello area

POCATELLO (AP) — Gasoline prices in the Pocatello area soared as much as nine cents a gallon overnight this week, baffling motorists and local officials.

Pump prices that were averaging under \$1.20 a gallon on Tuesday were as high as \$1.29 a day later.

"There's a point at which tempers get the better of motorists, and I think it's at about \$1.20 a gallon," Dave Carlson of the Idaho chapter of the American Automobile Association said.

The AAA's survey of major Idaho travel routes this week showed the average state price for a gallon of self-serve unleaded gasoline was just under \$1.25. That was four cents higher than three weeks ago, and six cents over the national average. It was the highest average since December 1990 when the price peaked at \$1.44 during the Iraqi occupation of Kuwait.

# House arrest worries new neighbors

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A judge's decision to allow accused double murderer to live under "house arrest" in an older Idaho Falls neighborhood has some of William Gray's new neighbors concerned.

While some residents seemed indifferent to the arrangement authorized by Judge Ted Wood for medical reasons, others feared for their safety.

"It's a raw deal," one said, "I don't think he should be out. That's how other people get murdered."

Gray, 52, of Jackson, Wyo., is awaiting trial on two charges of first-degree murder and one charge of first-degree burglary in the July 1989 shooting deaths of his wife, Betty Lou, 47, and Reeda Roundy, 49, in Roundy's Bonneville County home.

Wood agreed to release Gray from the county jail earlier this month because the jail conditions threatened Gray's health. Gray is a kidney transplant recipient, whose medication weakens his immune system. Wood determined continued incarceration under those conditions would be a form of pre-trial punishment.

Sheriff's Deputy Lee Nielsen said Gray is fitted with an electronic monitoring device around his ankle that triggers an alarm at the jail if Gray strays more than 150 feet from a monitor on the house's telephone. Gray is also subject to police checks and searches of his rented home at any time.

# Symms wants to debate Demo on canal treaty

Retiring Republican Sen. Steve Symms took issue on Thursday with statements made last weekend by the Democrat who wants to replace him in Washington and challenged Congresswoman Richard Stallings to debate the merits of the Panama Canal Treaty.

The challenge came a week after Stallings said his campaign effort has focused more on Symms than Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne, the GOP nominee for the U.S. Senate seat.

And Stallings used the debate challenge from the outspoken conservative to reinforce his contention that Symms remains at the heart of the GOP campaign and Kempthorne has done little to warrant comment.

"Steve's tactics never cease to amaze me," the four-term congressman said. "He's always said he was going to play a role in this campaign, and here we go."

Stallings did not accept the debate offer, but he and Kempthorne are finalizing a series of debates for later in the campaign.

# Developer will meet Boise's conditions

BOISE (AP) — The developer of a Boise Foothills subdivision opposed by Indians and nearby residents has agreed to drop a court appeal and meet all the city's conditions for the housing project.

Fourth District Judge Alan Schwartzman signed papers this week ending an 18-month dispute over the Castle Rock development.

Morningside Heights Partnership maintained the city had exceeded its authority in contested six of the more than 30 conditions set by the Boise City Council in September 1990 before construction could begin.

The 177-home hillside development above the Old Penitentiary historical site drew fire from neighbors and critics at public hearings. Indians argued that unmarked graves of their ancestors were on the land.












**TWIN FALLS** - Most students don't go to summer school to play — except for those who sign up for the College of Southern Idaho's Music Fest.

## Soap-opera magazines booming as fans devour star, scandal news

**NEW YORK** - Hot news. Soap Opera Weekly's staffer-Gretchen Keene was on the set of "All My Children," dutifully reporting a cover story on the Pine Valley High prom, when a gossip crew member confirmed the rumors: Ceara was leaving the cast. The informant even slipped Keene the date of Ceara's final episode.

"They don't want their illusions destroyed. They want to know things about actors, but only certain things, not the bad stuff!"

Policy says it's selling about 360,000 a week. Add-in—the 1.5 million who get ABC's Episodes every other month, the 5,000 or so "hard-core fans" and industry types who subscribe to the weekly newsletter Soap Opera Now, and readers of assorted smaller magazines — and the number of fans who read about "Days of Our Lives" and "One Life to Live" begins to approach the number who watch them.

"We're the only ones to know when" Keene, back at her desk, calls over to news editor Gabrielle Winkler, at Soap Opera Weekly's Manhattan newsroom.

Ceara, played by former "General Hospital" star Gertie Franks, has had a heckuva year, what with the incest revelations and her killing her father, following by marriage to her onetime fiance's dad. But lately her story line's been dribbling out. Reporters on the "All My Children" beat had been speculating about her exit for months — a fatal crash? crime of passion? — but Keene nailed the specific day before her rivals.

Soap opera fans are famous for their loyalty: Two-thirds of those who tune into the hour-long soaps have been watching for five years or more, Abrams says. And it's clear from the 17-year success of Soap Opera Digest that they want to learn more about the stories, characters and actors than daily viewing can provide.

"The soap opera audience is insatiable," says Mary Ann Cooper, associate editor of Soap Opera Magazine (henceforth, "the Magazine"). Two television networks, watching other media companies feast on their programming, began offering their own glossy soap magazines, available through 900 phone numbers: ABC's bimonthly Episodes and NBC's less regularly published Daydreams.

Now the owners of the Digest and the Weekly, believing that the market still isn't saturated, are about to unveil Soap Opera Illustrated, a picture-heavy monthly expected on newsstands this August.

# Disney Publishing ventures into adult market

One expects Beauty and the Beast to be hanging out with Mickey Mouse. But what's America's favorite mouse doing with musician Mick Fleetwood, filmmaker Spike Lee, tennis star Jimmy Connors, talk-show host Regis and Kathie Lee, not to mention the anonymous Pat of "Saturday Night Live"?

The folks at Hyperion, Disney Publishing's year-old adult trade book division, will be the first to tell you that publishing can make for some strange but successful book-fellows. Consider the case of Wayne and Garth of "Saturday Night Live" fame and stars of the Paramount flick "Wayne's World." Hyperion published a \$7.95 paperback tie-in to the hit movie this spring. "Wayne's World: Extreme Close-Up," by Mike Myers and Robin Ruzan, it was Hyperion's first big best seller, with fans snapping up more than 300,000 copies.

"We expect to sell even more copies when the video 'comes out,'" Hyperion vice president and publisher Robert Miller said at the recent American Booksellers Association convention in Anaheim, Calif. "Saturday Night Live" has a huge following, and it's proving to be a strong market for books.

And so Hyperion will lead off its fall paperback list with "It's Pat! My Life Exposed," by Julia Sweeney, who created the Pat character, and Christine Zander, an SNL writer. In the volume, which will carry "An Official Saturday Night Live Book" label, readers will discover, among other tidbits, that Pat uses Secret deodorant and her favorite flick is "Victor Victoria."

Other books on Hyperion's fall list also display the fledgling publisher's affinity for popular culture. Hardcover titles will include Mick Fleetwood's "My Twenty-Five Years in Fleetwood Mac," which will come with a

never-before-released Fleetwood Mac song on a special CD packaged with each book; Jimmy Connors's fitness book, "Don't Count Yourself Out"; the cookbook "Cooking With Regis & Kathie Lee"; Aljean Harnetz's "Round Up the Usual Suspects: The Making of Casablanca," to tie in with the movie's 50th anniversary; and University of Kentucky basketball coach Rick Pitino's "Full-Court Pressure: A Year in Kentucky Basketball."

Among Hyperion's forthcoming trade paperbacks are Spike Lee's "By Any Means Necessary: The Making of 'Malcolm X,'" Tim Riley's "Madonna Illustrated" and "You Must Have Been a Beautiful Baby: Baby Pictures of the Stars."

"Our mandate has always been to be creative and innovative," Miller said. "We're publishing in areas that are exciting and attracting attention, and we're going to do anything we can to get that attention. As a

new publisher, we live and die with every book."

Hyperion also is publishing both literary and popular fiction, including a new novel from crime writer Edna Buchanan, "Contents Under Pressure," and topical non-fiction works such as the recently released "Capital Games: Clarence Thomas, Anita Hill, and the Story of a Supreme Court Nomination," by journalists Timothy M. Phelps and Helen Winteritz, and the forthcoming paperback "How to Make the World Better for Women," by Donna Jackson, an editor for New Woman magazine.

Publishing is a fiercely competitive business, and many in the recession-beset industry were surprised when Disney began its assault on the book market last year, especially as the entertainment company was starting a publishing firm from scratch. At the time, Disney chairman Michael

Eisner said it was an important event for the company, "similar to our" launch of Touchstone Pictures in 1984, through which Disney began to offer films to more general audiences. The move into publishing also was compared to Disney's choice to form its own record company; Hollywood Records, in early 1990 rather than acquire an existing label.

Hyperion published its first nine hardcover books last fall and ventured into trade paperback publishing this spring. Along the way, it has tried to live up to its initial billing as a publisher of "intelligent books on popular subjects, wonderful oddities and brilliant new fiction." Successes, Miller said, have included James Lee Burke's fifth mystery in his acclaimed Dave Robicheaux series, "A Stained White Radiance," the gift book "Amazing Grace" and two Disney-related books published last fall, "The Art of Mickey Mouse" and "Disney's Art of Animation."

Some stories never go out of style. Many of the folk and fairy tales and other classics we remember from childhood are available still, or again, in lovely new editions. Others are new stories told in the time-honored tradition of fairy-tales.

Here are some timeless tales fresh for the 1990s:

**THE EMPEROR'S NEW CLOTHES**, retold by Rikki Levinson; Dutton (37 pages, \$4.95)  
Hans Christian Andersen's lesson in the dangers of foolish vanity is told with humor and just the right touch of pomposity by Rikki Levinson. But the real charm is in the illustrations.

**Comical, brightly colored** illustrations by Robert Byrd spread from geometric patterns to spark the imagination with giggles and tickles. In Byrd's animal kingdom, the emperor is a lion, of course, and the sly tailors are foxes. Contrary to what we think of as fairy-tale endings, in this tale the emperor is exposed, so to speak, but not everyone gets his due.

**THE ELVES AND THE SHOEMAKER**, retold by Freyda Littledale; Scholastic (30 pages, \$3.95 paperback)  
This is a competent retelling of an old standard, with a clearer resolution than some editions have of what happens to the elves, the shoemaker and his wife.

Brimmer Turkle's illustrations begin somewhat drab and seem to build into brighter colors as the four characters near their happy endings.

What Turkle leaves out in detail is left for young minds to imagine, much the point of fairy tales.

Other retellings by Littledale include "The Little Mermaid," "The Magic Fish," "The Boy Who Cried Wolf" and "Seven at One Blow."

**THUMBELINA**, by Hans Christian Andersen; Doubleday (24 pages, \$4.95)

An enchanting aspect of this story is the moral that even little people can display great courage, wisdom and kindness. Unfortunately, Allison Claire Darke's characters fall into the easy, old-fashioned pattern of people's characters being equated with their looks. A warty-frog captures her, coppery, smiling fishes set her free; a butterfly takes her for a ride, but a lascivious beetle steals her away.

Another enchanting aspect is the scale. When I was a girl, after I heard this story, I desperately wanted a playmate the size of Thumbelina, and searched flower beds for hours in hopes of finding one. I made many walnut-shell beads with rose-petal eiderdowns. Darke's elegant illustrations feed this fantasy, often including familiar objects to keep in perspective the crucial issue of size.

Thumbelina does get to live happily ever after with a prince (of course, these storybook women find their fulfillment in men), but only after jilting a froggy blind-date and her rich, dull fiancé mole.

The staff is working with Magic Valley theaters to show the film before national distribution.

Foreign distribution of "Dark Horse" is well on its way, with domestic distribution taking a bit longer, according to Beresford.

"We're facing some tough competition with everything else that is out there," he said, citing summer movie-goers preferences for films such as "Lethal Weapon 3" and "Far and Away."

"Dark Horse" was produced on a low budget of \$3 million by Ketchum residents Hemmings, David Butterfield and Beresford, who make up SHED Entertainment.

The production staff moved into Wood River Junior High School and the county Judicial Building in Hailey, the Moritz Community Hospital in Sun Valley, the Susie Q Ranch near Pico, Creekside and Louie's restaurants in Ketchum, as well as the home of Dick of Patrick Wheeler in East Fork. Other filming locations included scenes on Trail Creek Road and at various spots throughout Ketchum.

The company is currently trying to obtain financing for another film project which would be shot on location primarily in the Fairfield area with other scenes in Shoshone and Bellevue.

but they may enroll in other vocal classes, too.

Fees for the camp run \$90 a student, though scholarships are available. In fact, thanks to donations from businesses, individuals and organizations, Cox estimates that 50 percent of the kids attending on scholarship.

The instructors donate much of their time because, as Cox put it, they simply love children. "They just," she said, "because we certainly don't pay them a lot."

# Classic Elvis songs return on CD

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Elvis lives ... on remastered CDs. "Elvis: The King of Rock 'N' Roll - The Complete 50's Masters" hit the record stores this week after a two-year search of record vaults in New York, Indianapolis, Nashville and Hollywood, movie studio archives and audiophile collections.



"I think the main thing that pops out is that in this period he was his own record producer. He knew what he wanted," Wardell said.

It weighs 2.3 pounds, has 140 tracks and is vintage Elvis. According to RCA Records, the five-CD set contains every master studio take recorded by Presley in the 1950s, several alternate takes, live tracks and previously unreleased material.

One CD is devoted to 14 unreleased performances, beginning with "That's When Your Heartaches Begin," the B side of the "My Happiness" acetate.

The original RCA and Sun Records master tracks were digitally remastered. The set begins with "My Happiness," a 1953 acetate recording made at the Memphis Recording Studio. The box set's acetate cuts were painstakingly restored before they were transferred to digital to ensure good audio reproduction.

If there is one nugget in the box, Wardell believes this is it: "I think it's all captured in that song. You can hear it all, the nucleus of what was to be," he said.

The release commemorates the 15th anniversary of Presley's August 1977 death. In testimony to Presley's continuing popularity, more than 500,000 units were shipped to record stores.

Acetate recording was a direct-to-disk process. The depth of the groove that was originally cut and every stylus that bounced around in the groove has an impact. The result years later is a scratchy, tinny sound and skips.

"This artist has been dead 15 years, and this record left the house gold," said project coordinator Don Wardell.

The acetate recordings used in the box set were subjected to extensive processing that scanned underneath hiss, distortion and crackle to see what was there, Wardell said.

Something that struck me forcibly during this process was the enormous body of work this man left behind."

The set, with a list price of \$79.98, focuses on years when one was in charge of Presley in the recording studio, Wardell said.

# Acclaimed documentary 'Shoshone' to air

The program seeks to determine whether the values that rural Americans use to define themselves can remain the same as their world changes - often for the worse.

And in February, the program received an Honorable Mention in the 1992 Golden Gate Awards competition, sponsored by the San Francisco Film Society, from among some 750 entries from 35 countries in 32 categories.

"Shoshone" also captured first place as best television documentary in the 1992 annual Idaho Press Club awards competition.

## Newcomb outspends Noh in campaign

**BOISE** — Russell Newcomb raised more than \$25,000 and spent more than \$15,000 in his unsuccessful state Senate campaign, according to financial disclosure reports filed with the Secretary of State.

About a third of Newcomb's total contributions — \$7,500 — came from the Idaho Business PAC, and Newcomb lent his campaign a total of \$4,128.

His opponent in the District 23 Republican primary, Laird Noh, raised \$8,624 for his campaign and spent about \$7,500.

Thursday was the deadline for candidates to file 30-day post-primary reports. The

reports covered contributions and expenditures between May 11 and June 5.

Noh, a Kimberly sheep rancher who won the May 26 primary with 56.4 percent of the vote, reported having about \$1,120 left in his campaign account; Newcomb, a Twin Falls surgeon, had just over \$10,000 left over.

Noh does not have opposition in the November general election.

Dean Cameron of Rupert, the victor in the Magic Valley's only other contested legislative primary, reported \$7,328 in total contributions and \$6,216 in campaign expenditures.

Cameron defeated Ralph Peters of Jerome to win the GOP nomination for state senator in District 24.

The Secretary of State's office had not received Peters' report Thursday afternoon, but it won't be considered late if it was postmarked yesterday.

With about \$1,122 left in his campaign kitty, Cameron now faces Democrat Jason Stoldorf, also of Rupert, in the general election.

The closely fought Newcomb-Noh race was one of the most-watched legislative races in the state, and both candidates reported substantial contributions in the campaign's final two weeks.

Newcomb said he received \$9,700 in itemized contributions during that period and loaned his campaign \$2,163 to pay for office expenses and advertising. After the primary,

Newcomb received \$100 from West One Bank and \$1,000 in services from Boise media consultant Greg Panter.

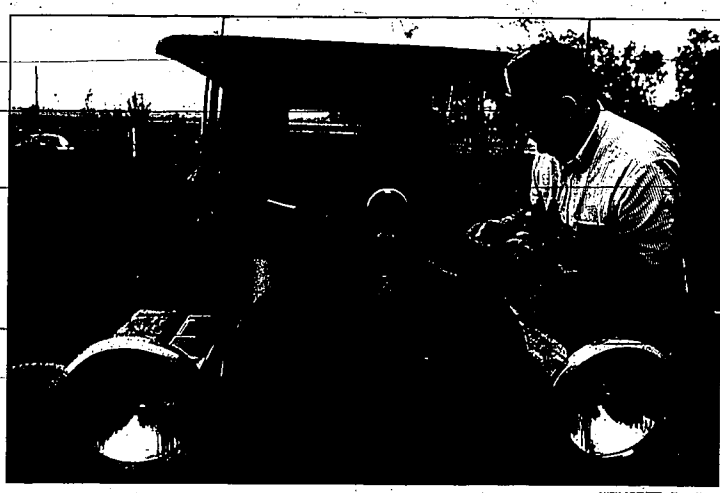
Among Newcomb's bigger contributors were Neil V. Colwell of Spokane, \$1,500; the Union Pacific Railroad, \$1,000; former state Rep. Noy Brackett, \$500; and the National Rifle Association and the Conservative Taxpayers Fund, \$500 each.

Newcomb also received a total of \$695 in 17 small, unitemized contributions during the reporting period.

Noh reported \$3,075 in itemized contributions between May 18 and May 25; and one \$100 individual contribution after

## Classics roll through Magic Valley on brief but treasured road trips

**HOLLISTER** — When he's at work, Ken Cook designs complicated machinery for spacecraft at a Utah laboratory. On Thursday, he stood in the rain at Nat-Soo-Pah trying to fix a needle valve on his 1922 Dodge Touring Car.

"This is really a minor problem," Cook said, predicting that he will add to the 7,771 miles he has put on the spoked wooden wheels over the past 23 years. "We'll have her up and running today or tomorrow."

Cook is a mechanical designer for the Space Dynamics Lab in Logan, Utah, and an antique car buff.

He and other owners of older roadsters putted through the desert south of Twin Falls Thursday during the annual Bonneville-Regional-tour-of-the-Veteran-Motor-Car Club of America.

More than 30 antique cars and their riders will roll into Shoshone for a coffee break in the city park at 9:30 a.m. today, before continuing through Richfield and Carey to Craters of the Moon.

The trip will take longer than the customary two hours. Sylvia Cook said the car her husband bought for \$600 and rebuilt cruises on flat ground at 35 mph. Steep hills can drag it down to 10 mph, she said.

Richard Bingham's 1937 Packard will make the trip much more quickly if he shaves. His car looks like something out of a gangster movie, with its strong blue profile and stylized peelian hood ornament.

"I've known this car for 30 years, but I just got it in November," said Bingham, a Blackfoot sign shop owner.

An old friend who owned the car died several months ago and left the car to Bingham.

"My neighbor was so jealous, he went out and bought a 1940 Packard," Bingham said, laughing.

Like many antique car buffs, Bingham got hooked early. He still remembers the feel of his family's Packard when he was a child, and he has always liked Packards, he said.

Of course, he doesn't use the '37 to tool around town or to the grocery store.

"We've got a 1948 Packard that we use for a family car," he said.

The Cooks break out their vintage vehicle for special occasions, although

they are limited to daytime driving because the 70-year-old convertible has no roll lights.

"We drag Main sometimes," Sylvia Cook said.

Her children's attitudes toward the old car changed as they grew up, she said. When they were young, they thought the old car was neat and loved to ride in parades, she said. As teen-agers, they didn't want to be seen in it.

Now, that they've grown, they love it again, she said.

Buying and restoring old cars is a labor of love for the members of the Veteran Motor Car Club's local chapter, but tour chairman Bob Brackett of Twin Falls admits it's an expensive hobby.

## Twin Falls, Bliss schools will comply with ruling

**TWIN FALLS** — Two Magic Valley School officials expressed disappointment at Wednesday's Supreme Court decision to ban prayer from high school graduations.

But they said they'd adhere to the new law — reluctantly.

Bliss School Board Chairman Michael Vos said he thinks the Supreme Court acted un democratically.

"The Supreme Court has lost the judgment that majority rules," he said. "I don't think that a few individuals should interfere with what the rest of us do just because they think it interferes with their rights."

The Bliss board rejected an appeal by a group of Bliss High School seniors in April to eliminate prayer from their graduation ceremony.

Vos said that though the School Board did not poll the graduating students, he feels certain "from visiting with them" that most students wanted the prayer.

He stands by the decision but said next year things will have to change. "At the time I thought it was the right thing to do, but now it's a different story if the Supreme Court says it that way," he said.

Twin Falls Superintendent Terrell Donich said government policy on prayer in schools is inconsistent, and that the court's decision conflicted with Bush administration policy.

"We're sorry to see the Supreme Court make this decision about prayer in school and see the president come out the next day with a proposal to provide \$1,000 to low-income parents to take their children to private or parochial schools," he said.

Donich said students who don't want prayer at graduation ceremonies aren't forced to participate. They don't even have to come, he said.

"As you take a look at the way graduations are conducted, graduation is not mandatory," he said.

"Nobody is being required to submit to that."

Students who don't want to take part in prayer can skip the ceremony, or come after the invocation, he said. But he said students who want prayer will lose out because of this decision. "If there are students there who want to have incorporated in the graduation ceremony a prayer, they're denied the option because somebody else finds it offensive."

He said the Twin Falls School District will comply with the ruling.

"Well follow the law," he said. "I'm sure we'll get something from the state attorney general. Whatever it allows us to do, we'll do."

## Mudslide covers highway near Albion

**RUPERT** — The Minidoka County prosecuting attorney has resigned to become general manager of Project Mutual Telephone Co.

The decision by Charlie Creason Jr. means Minidoka County commissioners must choose someone to fill his unexpired term. It also means party officials must pick someone to replace Creason as the Republican candidate in the November general election.

"I'm real excited about it," said Creason, who said he was leaving for personal reasons.

Jeff Clark, president of Project Mutual's board of directors, said Creason's starting date has not yet been determined.

"My statement to Charlie is that we're anxious to get him on board," hopefully as early as Aug. 15, he added.

Creason still has a few loose ends to tie up in his role of prosecutor, said Clark.

To fill the void, the Minidoka County Republican Central Committee will begin to interview candidates once Creason has made his resignation formal.

According to Penny Ysura, administrative secretary in Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa's election division, the committee has 15 days from the time the office is vacated to select three candidates to present to the row county commissioners, who then have 15 more days to select one of the candidates for the job.

Creason will have to formally request that his name be taken off the ballot, Ysura, said, which includes submitting a notarized statement of withdrawal.

The central committee, in turn, would need to place someone, not necessarily the person selected to complete Creason's unexpired term — on the ballot.

However, Lynn Hunsaker, chairman of the central committee, said the person chosen to replace Creason would probably also be put on the ballot.

Hunsaker said the central committee would "start from scratch," making it possible for public defender Gary Newman to interview for the job. Newman, a Rupert attorney, recently announced plans to run as an independent against Creason in November.

Clark said he was pleased to have Creason accept the job.

"We got the best man for the job," he said, adding that there were approximately 120 applicants.

As general manager, Creason will be responsible for the service Project Mutual's 6,300 patrons receive.

Creason will also be in charge of keeping track of various regulations dealing with telephone service.

Creason will replace Jeffite Adams, who stepped down Jan. 17 to take a similar position with a telephone co-operative in North Carolina.

Assistant General Manager Ike Christensen has served as interim general manager since Adams' departure.

# Utah eyes permitting prayer

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** — Gov. Norm Bangert says he may still call a special legislative session to approve a constitutional amendment permitting public prayer. Bangert told reporters at his monthly news conference Thursday that he resents the conduct of attorneys in a prayer case being appealed by the Salt Lake City Council. "I get irritated," Bangert said. "Everything they do, they say, 'We're going to stop the practice of prayer in public.'"

The council is contesting a ruling by 3rd District Judge Dennis Frederick, who sided with the Society of Separationists in determining that prayers at council meetings violate the Utah Constitution's church-state separation clause. Bangert is annoyed that attorneys for the Separationists are trying to disqualify the appeal on grounds that the city did not pay a \$150 filing fee. State law exempts cities from paying filing fees for appeals. But attorney Brian Barnard contends he is suing individual council members, not the city. Bangert says if the case is dismissed, a special session might be in order.

# Federal judge clears way for Payette hydro project

**BOISE (AP)** — A federal judge has given the go-ahead to a hydroelectric project in the Payette River in western Idaho, rejecting a conservationist lawsuit contending the Army Corps of Engineers didn't give it enough study. U.S. District Judge Marion Callister on Thursday signed a 28-page ruling against Friends of the Payette and Idaho Rivers United, Inc. and in favor of Horseshoe Bend Hydroelectric Co.

The river groups said they would appeal, and weren't surprised by the ruling. The company and predecessors have been working since 1983 to win approval for a hydro project in the Payette. It will involve diverting much of the flow of the river three and a half miles to a power plant. River flows will be reduced sharply at certain times. Originally the lawsuit named as defendants the developers, the state environmental agency, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and the Corps of Engineers. Callister dismissed all defendants except the company and the Corps of Engineers. At trial May 11, Callister allowed only one plaintiff witness to offer testimony. He rejected the others and said federal law prohibited the introduction of any new evidence in what basically was an appeal from an agency ruling. Joan Cochran, Horseshoe Bend resident and a representative of Friends of the Payette, said the ruling was not surprising, considering Callister's decision on the witnesses.

The judge noted that sometimes, clean energy and wilderness preservation are compatible. "Unfortunately, however, there are times when the production of clean energy compromises wilderness values, and this case presents such a circumstance," he said. Callister noted that the environmental impact will be lessened by the fact the project will use a canal used for a power plant at the location from 1902-54.

# Firefighter shot during L.A. riots copes with paralysis, misses work

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A firefighter battling paralysis since a drive-by shooter wounded him during the riots says he's too busy recovering to be angry.

"I'm a victim, but it doesn't serve my purposes to be resentful, at least at this particular point of my life," Scott Miller said Wednesday. "I may feel resentful in six months. But that I'll deal with in six months."

It was the first public appearance for the 33-year-old Miller since the April 29 shooting. At a news conference, he said full recovery from the paralysis and a stroke he suffered as a result could take two years.

As it is, he said, his chance of complete recovery is just 50 percent. But Miller, who was to leave Cedars-Sinai Medical Center on Friday, said he's already regained most functions.

Miller was driving a hook-and-ladder to a fire in South Central Los Angeles the first night of the riots when a car pulled up alongside, its headlights off.

Someone in the car opened fire. It pierced Miller's cheek and severed the carotid artery on the right side of

The shooting initially paralyzed most of Miller's left side. Though much more mobile, Miller still barely speaks above a whisper. His left hand remains paralyzed, much of his face is numb, and he must turn his head to swallow. He undergoes physical therapy consumes five hours a day.

Miller said he remembers everything about the call April 29, after the riots erupted.

"When I was shot I remember hearing a 'bang' ... my head falling to the steering wheel," Miller said.

"I remember everything that happened basically until I was under sedation in the emergency room."

The shooter has not been found.

his neck. Colleagues drove the truck to the hospital, where Miller underwent more than five hours of surgery including replacement of the artery with a thigh vein.

The Fire Department is offering a \$37,500 reward for information leading to arrests.

Like many people around the country, Miller watched the erupting chaos on television. And like many of his colleagues, he was apprehensive yet determined to do his job.

"I knew that we were going up against something we really were not at all ready to experience and deal with," he said. "I don't think anybody in the city really believed it was going to get that bad."

Wearing a Fire Department sweat-shirt and accompanied by his wife, Kathi, the 12-year veteran said he's eager to return to a desk job and hopes to return to the field someday.

The Millers have a daughter, 5, and a son, age 3.

Miller said a visit and letter from President Bush and messages from firefighters around the world have helped keep his spirits up.

Before the shooting he was scheduled for promotion to captain, said Capt. Stephen Ruda, a department spokesman. That move up is on hold.

# Once hailed as American hero, Gates will retire in disgrace

LOS ANGELES (AP) — There will be no buildings erected in his honor, no triumphant farewell with resounding testimonials from a grateful city.

Los Angeles Police Chief Daryl F. Gates, once hailed by President Bush as "an all-American hero," retires this weekend in disgrace.

"How else can you look at it?" asks the LAPD's former spokesman, retired Lt. Dan Cooke. "They have thrown out all the good things he's done. Now they're only going to remember the bad."

Cooke says the media "stripped the man of everything" and politicians "did their level best to cut off his legs."

Others say only Gates is to blame. "Gates brought all this on the department and himself," says best-selling author Joseph Wambaugh, a former LAPD detective. "Personally, I really like the guy. But I'm afraid he brought down my department."

After 14 years as chief, Gates leaves a demoralized force, tarnished by claims of brutality and racism, by the videotaped beating of Rodney King and blamed for letting the ensuing riots in South Central Los Angeles get out of hand.

"Under his watch, South Central L.A. became a killing field," said Councilman Zev Yaroslavsky. "That's his legacy."

Gates, 65, won't attend Tuesday's swearing-in of his successor, Philadelphia Police Commissioner Willie Williams. Sunday will be Gates' last official

day-as chief. His retirement party Tuesday night was private, a barbecue attended by thousands of officers and their families at the Police Academy.

Gates once was a mythic figure in law enforcement. He was smart, good-looking, authoritative and outspoken, even when that got him into hot water.

He pioneered programs such as SWAT (Special Weapons and Tactics) and DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education), both emulated nationwide.

His officers loved him to the end, even chanting "Four more years, four more years!" at the retirement party.

But politicians increasingly hated him—Gates and Mayor Tom Bradley, a former LAPD lieutenant, didn't speak during his last year as chief.

Ask political insiders what toppled Gates and you hear three words: pride, arrogance and ego. His was a case of hubris, the overbearing pride that blinds a man to his own failings.

"I think in the latter stages of his career he enjoyed confrontation. He enjoyed being one against the many when the many were politicians," said Wambaugh.

# Unsettling economic news injects caution into stock market

**NEW YORK** — The stock market hovered in a narrow range Thursday, registering mixed reactions to new evidence the economy is still struggling.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, up about 10 points in early trading, was down 6.69 points at 3,284.01 by the close. Advancing issues slightly outnumbered declines on the New York Stock Exchange.

Big Board volume came to an estimated

182.34 million shares as of 2 p.m. MDT, down from 193.85 million in the previous session.

The Labor Department reported that initial claims for state unemployment insurance rose 16,000 in the week ended June 13, in contrast to the small decline analysts had been expecting. The news came a day after the Commerce Department reported a 2.4 percent drop in new factory orders for durable goods last month.

Interest rates fell in the credit markets.

Prices of long-term Treasury bonds rose more than \$5 for each \$1,000 in face value, lowering their yields to the neighborhood of 7.77 percent.

Lotus Development tumbled 5% to 18 1/8 in heavy trading in the Nasdaq over-the-counter market. The computer software company said its sales and earnings for the second quarter will fall short of expectations.

That selling that hit Lotus spilled over into other systems and software stocks as well. Microsoft fell 2% to 70; Novell Inc. 1 to 5 1/2,

and Borland International 1 1/4 to 39 1/8.

In Big Board activity, tobacco stocks declined fractionally as traders spent a second day warily appraising the possible impact of the Supreme Court's ruling in a suit involving a smoker who died of lung cancer.

Philip Morris, the most active NYSE issue, dropped 1/4 to 7 3/4, and RJR Nabisco was down 1/4 to 49.

While the ruling seemed to open the gates for new litigation by ailing smokers against cigarette manufacturers, the tobacco industry

claimed a victory and said the decision didn't increase the likely danger of damage awards.

British Petroleum's American depositary receipts fell 6 to 48 1/8 following word that R.B. Horton had resigned as chairman and chief executive.

Katy Industries chalked up one of the day's most notable gains, jumping 4 to 20 1/2. The Carroll family, which currently holds a 51.9 percent stake in the company, said it was considering a possible bid to acquire the rest of the stock.

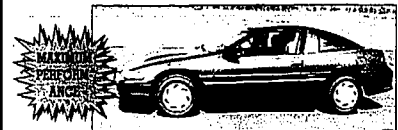

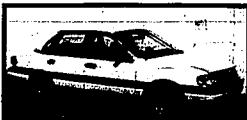

# The 'Mac' signs TV contract with NBC

John McEnroe has long complained about TV's tennis coverage. He's admitted "it's a lot more boring" on television and "tennis isn't nearly as good on TV as other sports are." Now he's promising to try to do something about it.

The three-time Wimbledon champion signed a two-year contract in April to be a commentator with NBC. He made his debut during the network's coverage of the French Open.

But don't think this means he is retiring from the court. His contract allows him to play for Wimbledon in June and July.

"My hope is not to do the TV, but realistically, I realize there's a good chance I'll be doing TV," said McEnroe, who hasn't been in the final of a Grand Slam tournament since the 1985 U.S. Open, and hasn't won one since the U.S. Open the year before. "I look at it as a no-lose."

McEnroe is planning to use his new job as an element in his quest to improve tennis.

"It's not something where I'm going to walk in the first five minutes and I'm going to make a list of the things that need to be changed," McEnroe said. "It's something that will go along with time."

"My way of approaching it will be when the time is appropriate. I'm not going to interrupt the flow so I can talk about some criticism. What I'm going to do is hopefully help tennis, not hurt it."

McEnroe, 33, said he won't limit

his contributions to just the broadcast booth. His wants to help NBC select better matches and try to overcome technical limitations — like not being able to show the differences between how hard men and women hit.

"There's a lot of room to improve, but I need to see it from another side," McEnroe said. "There may be some restrictions. I don't know the rules about where a camera has to be or what the potential is for change, but I certainly hope I can do something where there would be some more interest in viewership on TV."

Bud Collins, NBC's veteran tennis commentator, admitted that television

usually does not show the best matches.

"The very best matches are earlier in the tournament, maybe on a court where you don't have cameras or are on a day you're not working," Collins said. "Historically, finals are not the best matches. Sometimes you get lucky, as we did when (McEnroe) played in them. I can understand his frustrations and think he should voice them."

## Channel chatter

**GMA ADDITION:** A Sunday edition of ABC's early morning show "Good Morning America" will premiere Jan. 3, the network announced.

The new one-hour, live-news-and-information program will be broadcast at 8 a.m. EST, said Phil Beuth, president of early morning and late night entertainment programming.

The Sunday series, which is currently untitled, will have new co-hosts but will be broadcast from the same set as the weekday editions of "Good Morning America."

The weekday series' executive producer, Jack Reilly, also will oversee the Sunday show.

ABC's announcement follows a similar expansion undertaken by rival network NBC, which announced in January it would debut a Saturday edition of the "Today Show," starting Aug. 1.

**IVEY'S 'DESIGNING' ROLE:** Judith Ivey's role when she joins CBS' "Designing Women" this fall, according to series creator Linda Bloodworth-Thomason, is that of a "Texas court reporter who is suddenly widowed when her wealthy husband drops dead at their wedding reception. After inheriting his money, she hires Sugarbakers to decorate her house — and then decides to buy into their firm." Ivey comes into the cast with Julia Duffy's departure. Production on the series' seventh season begins in August. In September the series moves from Mondays to Fridays.

### What's New.

Buzz in New York is that model **Christie Brinkley** is close to joining Cable News Network as host of a new morning show. "Lifestyle in the '90s," to air at 10:30 a.m. weekdays beginning in September, would also feature CNN entertainment reporter Bill Tush and fashion reporter Elsa Klensch.

**Charles Osgood**, co-anchor of "CBS Morning News" since its 1987 inception, is leaving the broadcast to work full time at CBS Radio. No departure date or co-anchor for Meredith Vieira. On the TV end, Osgood will continue his commentaries on "CBS This Morning" (twice weekly) and on Dan Rather's "CBS Evening News" and Charles Kuralt's "Sunday Morning" (occasionally). The Osgood Files are heard four times a day on CBS Radio.

**John Chancellor**, longtime NBC News commentator will retire sometime next year, a network spokeswoman said. No firm date has been set.

Chancellor, 64, will leave several months after the 1993 presidential inauguration. Chancellor has covered every presidential election since 1952 for the network. He joined NBC in 1950. He anchored the "Today" show in 1961-62 and became "Nightly News" anchor in 1970. He began doing commentaries when Tom Brokaw replaced him as anchor in 1982. He left NBC to be director of Voice of America under President Lyndon Johnson, from 1965 to 1967.

After a search of nearly seven months, the Corporation for Public Broadcasting announced that **Richard Carlson** has been named president and chief executive officer, effective in July. Carlson is currently ambassador to the Republic of Seychelles and director of the Voice of America from 1986 to 1991.

## Chester Cheetah target of activists

**BOSTON (AP)** — Chester Cheetah, a cool cat who hawks cheese snacks, is getting some television activists hot under the collar.

Seven organizations, including the Cambridge-based Action for Children's Television, filed a petition in early March with the Federal Communications Commission to ward off any attempt to create a children's cartoon show featuring the feline, who is spokescat for Frito-Lay Cheetos.

### Children's programming

A spokesman for Frito-Lay says plans for "Yo! It's the Chester Cheetah Show" have been scotched. But TV activist Peggy Charren cites Chester as an example of how commercials are crossing the line into masquerading as children's TV entertainment.

Instead of say, turning E.B. White stories into quality cartoons, Charren contends companies are looking to base cartoon shows on characters created to promote products. And while adults may be able to make a distinction between promotion and programming, kids will not, she said.

"Think of the CBS eye. If CBS put legs on it and turned it into an adult program, we'd say, 'What a promotion.'"

"I'm not making this into a quality debate. Any cartoon is OK, as long as it isn't an ad," she said.

FCC rules call for a separation between commercial and programming material. The petition, supported by the Center for Science in the Public Interest, Black Citizens for Fair Media and four other organizations, asks for a declaratory ruling that a Chester-Cheetah show would violate the public interest.

But Frito-Lay may never launch such a show. Todd MacKenzie, a spokesman for Frito-Lay in Dallas, said the idea show has been discussed since 1986, most recently with the Fox Network, but now "it's as cold as ice."

"Since Chester came out in 1986, he's been wildly popular," MacKenzie said. So popular, in fact, that the company doesn't want to risk losing its Cheetos cheetah: "We don't want to jeopardize the job he's doing here."

MacKenzie said the company was not bowing to pressure and he said it had not yet been contacted by either the FCC or any of the groups which filed the petition.

Still, MacKenzie says that preventing commercial characters from becoming children's cartoon characters would be a great loss.

"Some of the world's best-loved trademarks and characters come from advertising," MacKenzie said, citing the California Raisins and even Santa Claus, who he said began as an advertising device.

Older cartoon lovers might remember that the whimsical Pink Panther was born as a character in the credits for the "Pink Panther" movies; he later had his own show and was later seen in ads for insulation products.

"The average consumer is sophisticated enough to make the distinction" between promotion and programming, MacKenzie said.

"Especially children who are a lot more sophisticated than you might expect."

# Lennon Sisters' debut came in 1955

**Q:** What year did the Lennon Sisters first appear on "The Lawrence Welk Show"?

**A:** The Lennon Sisters (Dianne, Peggy, Kathy and Janet) were regulars on "The Lawrence Welk Show" from 1955 to '68 (their ages were 9 to 16 that first season). After leaving the Welk show, they were featured on ABC's "Jimmy Durante Presents The Lennon Sisters Hour" (1969-70) and became regulars for one season (1970-71) on NBC's "The Andy Williams Show." They also appeared on other variety specials and series during the 1950s and '60s, including programs with Perry Como, Garry Moore, Jimmie Rogers and Eddie Fisher.

**Q:** On TV recently someone made another joke about Geena Davis's Oscar dress. Has she said anything about how people are still talking about how awful her outfit was? —

**K.B.**

**A:** Geena admits to taking a lot of heat for the outfit she wore to the Academy Awards this year, a billowy number that was long in the back and super-short-in-front. When I asked her about it, Geena proved defensive. She says she loves "that dress, it is cool." And she doesn't care especially what others thought about it. More important, Geena can't figure why anyone should really care. "Is this news?" she asks. At next year's Oscars, Davis promises an even more provocative outfit — perhaps the dress Tina Louise wore on the old "Gilligan's Island" TV Show, the one she made out of a sail. I'm not sure Geena was kidding.

**Q:** Explain Carol Channing on the recent Tony telecasts. She came across as a really cartoonish character with a voice that seemed weird and contrived. Is she always this way? — V.T.

**A:** The very talented Channing is one of the few stars — another being the late Mae West — who let their public personas totally swallow up their real-life style. Carol (who

scored her biggest stage hits as Lorelei Lee in "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes" and Dolly Levi in "Hello Dolly!") has melded her show business image into a bigger-than-life blend of both roles and never lets go. Since she's actually a super-bright and well-educated lady, some of her fans wonder why she doesn't chuck her outlandish mannerisms.

**Q:** What's this about news anchorman Peter Jennings having anxiety attacks about his on-camera appearance? What's wrong? — A.R.

**A:** No matter how secure an anchorman's TV ratings, there's generally a butterfly in the pit of the stomach about appearance. Generally it has to do with appearing too mature or old. Jennings, for example, worries about his bald spot and receding hairline, according to my ABC News insiders. After an hour under the hot TV lights, his hair wilts, says one. Perhaps, but his news delivery remains topnotch.

**Q:** Does CBS newsmen Dan Rather dye his hair? — M.R.

**A:** Rather, 62, has been asked that question from time to time. Usually, he ducks a direct answer, dismissing the

topic as being of no consequence. Perhaps, but I can tell you that Rather has artificially altered his hair

color in the past. He first colored his naturally dark hair to hide the gray, then tried lightening it to medium brown. Dissatisfied with the results, Rather went back to square one. Now his hair color is his natural salt-and-pepper.

**Q:** What is the background of talk-show host Montel Williams?

**A:** "The Montel Williams Show" is the Baltimore native's second TV program after "The 4th R: Kids Rap About Racism" (a 1990 special that aired in Denver and which won him a regional Emmy). His background is strictly military. Williams spent 15 years (1974-89) in the service, going from a Marine recruit to a lieutenant commander in the Navy. He graduated from Annapolis in 1980. Much of his time was spent in intelligence, serving in Guam, the Defense Language Institute in Monterey (where he obtained a degree in Russian), and at Fort Meade, Md., where he was stationed aboard a ship that took part in the invasion of Grenada. He also served on surface ships and submarines in the U.S. Atlantic Fleet. He left the Navy in 1989 after speaking to students at Kansas State University. His motivational talk caught the attention of educators and soon other schools were asking Williams to speak to students — which is what he's been doing a lot of during the past three years. "The Montel Williams Show" is currently on hiatus, having moved from Los Angeles to New York, and will be back in production in August.

## Springfield stars as shapechanging hero in ABC's new 'Human Target'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Want to see a show about a guy who goes around with a planeload of high-tech gadgetry, changing his appearance to look like innocent people who are about to become victims so he can take their place and zap the bad guys?

Well, you're about to get your wish. Debuting soon on ABC is a new summer series called "The Human Target," starring actor-singer Rick Springfield as the chameleon Christopher Chance.

But the real stars of the show are Chance's electronic gizmos.

"He mainly ferrets out the bad guys by making himself the target," Springfield says of his first prime-time series.

No firm date for the premiere of "The Human Target" has been set, but the first of seven episodes was expected sometime in July.

Chance flies around the world in a plane called Blackwing, which carries computers, a laboratory and all the equipment needed to transform him into another person.

When Chance becomes someone

else, another actor often takes over the role, leaving Springfield with only opening and closing scenes.

"In the first script, Christopher Chance was just a bookend," Springfield says. "Other actors played the fun stuff. But I liked the people involved and I liked the concept. They said I would get into more situations. We did seven shows and I did get to do some of the fun stuff."

It's a sharp contrast to the way NBC's "Quantum Leap" handles its identity crises.

When Scott Bakula "leaps" into the body of another — male or female, white or black — he still looks like Scott Bakula.

"The Human Target" is based on the D.C. Comics character created by Len Wein and Carmine Infantino. Danny Bilson, Paul De Meo and Steve Hattman, who collaborated on "The Flash," are the executive producers.

Born in Australia, Springfield has had two successful but separate performing careers.

He has appeared in films such as

"Battlestar Galactica" and "Hard to Hold," and as Dr. Noah Drake on the ABC soap opera "General Hospital."

As a singer, he has had several hit records, winning a Grammy in 1981 for "Jessie's Girl."

Springfield left Australia as a child when his father, who was in the army, was transferred to England.

"Like every army brat I've talked to, I went to 10 to 12 different schools," he said.

"I have no concept of having friends from childhood. It was hard as my brother and I got older. I was into music early. I grew up with radio because we didn't have television in Australia."

"When I was 9, we took a ship to England. It was one of the last of the big ocean liners. We traveled first class. ... I started actually performing in England. At first, I just lip-synched with a tennis racket as my guitar."

In 1969, Springfield went to Vietnam with an Australian band to perform for American troops.

## Goen brings game show to primetime

Why do game-show hosts get no respect?

"Because we don't deserve any," says Bob Goen with a laugh.

Goen has been there, so he knows. A five-year veteran of the much-maligned profession, he hosts "The Hollywood Game," airing Fridays on CBS.

For Goen, the prime-time slot marks a level of respectability seldom attained by his peers. "The Hollywood Game" draws on film and TV clips to test contestants' knowledge of Tinseltown trivia.

"It's real intelligent," Goen says of the program. "It goes more for a Jeopardy-kind-of audience. It's not a lot of jumping up and down and bells and whistles and gimmicks."

The show even looks more serious

than its daytime counterparts. "We wanted to have a nighttime feel," Goen says. "The set's a little darker, and I dress a little classier. It's those little things that give it a different image."

But even these changes may not be enough to give audiences a newfound appreciation of his job. Game-show hosts have long inspired a singular combination of derision and awe. It may take a lot more than a new suit to shake viewers' firmly held beliefs.

"It's a job that doesn't look that hard," Goen admits, "maybe because we don't have to work that often during the month."

Let them jeer, for Goen is living out his childhood fantasy. The 37-year-old California native grew up with a devotion bordering on fervor for such programs as "Jeopardy," and the "The Dating Game."

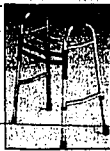
