Court grounds airport solicitors

WASHINGTON — Airports may prohibit political and religious groups from soliciting donations in terminals, but must allow distribution of free literature, the Supreme Court ruled Friday.

The mixed ruling, just in time for the summer's peak travel season, was mainly a defeat for the International Society of Krishna Consciousness. It had challenged restrictions on Hare Krishnas at New York City's three major airports.

The voting, fragmented and stretched over two separate decisions, went like this:

• By a 5-4 vote, the court said an airport terminal, unlike a city street or park, is not a traditional "public forum" where free-speech rights enjoy enhanced protection.

• The court, 6-3, said soliciting can be banned in airport terminals.

• But a 5-4 split of the justices said distribution of free literature may not be banned.

The court is due to close out its 1991-92 term Monday, and still pending is a decision over a Pennsylvania abortion law. Legal experts expect the court to use that case to undermine, if not overturn, its landmark 1973 decision legalizing abortion nationwide.

In other decisions Friday, the court: • Said Mississippi must do more to desegregate its state-run colleges and universities than let whites and blacks attend the school of their choice.

• Upheld the 1990 census result that cost Massachusetts one of its 11 seats in the House of Representatives and gave Washington one more, from eight to nine.

• Ruled that a business place with a distinctive appearance may be protected by federal trademark law even if the public doesn't automatically identify the decor with any particular business or owner. The decision resolved a dispute between competing Texas-based Mexican fast-food restaurant chains.

• Writing for the court in the airport soliciting case, Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist said, "The tradition of airport activity does not demonstrate that airports have historically been made available for speech activity."

• Rehnquist said solicitation can be disruptive for airline passengers, who must slow down to avoid or respond to a solicitor.

• "Delays may be particularly costly in this setting, as a flight missed by only a few minutes can result in hours worth of subsequent inconvenience," he said. "In addition, face-to-face solicitation presents risk of duress.... The skillful and unprincipled solicitor can target the

most vulnerable, including those accompanying children or those suffering physical impairment and who cannot easily avoid the solicitation."

Rehnquist was joined by Justices Byron R. White, Sandra Day O'Connor, Antonin Scalia and Clarence Thomas. Justice Anthony M. Kennedy joined in allowing a ban on soliciting, but said that an airport terminal is a public forum where some free speech must be allowed.

Justices David H. Souter, Harry A. Blackmun and John Paul Stevens dissented.

• Writing for the three, Souter said, "The claim to be preventing coercion is weak to start with. While a solicitor can be insistent, a pedestrian on the street or airport concourse can simply walk away or walk on."

• Anita Das, a spokesman for the Hare Krishnas, said, "We're disappointed. It's not going to shut us down but it's a serious blow."

• A central tenet of the Krishna religion is sankirtan, in which followers solicit money for support of the religion.

In a separate decision, Souter, Blackmun, Stevens, Kennedy and O'Connor formed a five-justice majority to strike down bans on distributing literature.

Friday's decisions upheld a ruling by the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Wadsworth quits Utah teaching job

BURLEY — A former Burley teacher who left the state after being charged with inappropriately touching six students has resigned from a teaching job in a Salt Lake City suburb.

Ralph Wadsworth, a former Mountain View Elementary School fourth-grade teacher, resigned Thursday afternoon from Hillsdale Elementary School in West Valley City, said Kent Gardner, spokesman for the Granite School District.

Wadsworth met with district administrators Thursday before filling out a "form" resignation letter, which was effective immediately, Gardner said. The letter did not give reasons for the resignation, he said.

A woman answering Wadsworth's phone Friday would not say whether Wadsworth was available for comment.

"I asked you not to call here. I have no comment," the woman said. "Please do not call here again or this is harassment."

Meantime, the Utah Department of Education is collecting information from Granite School District and Idaho school and law enforcement officials in a process that could lead to revocation or suspension of Wadsworth's Utah teaching certificate, said Doug Bates, department staff attorney.

Idaho Department of Education officials have undertaken a similar process against Wadsworth's Idaho teaching certificate, which Wadsworth used to receive certification in Utah and Arizona. Wadsworth was a substitute teacher in Phoenix for one day in 1991.

Wadsworth taught fifth-grade class at Hillsdale during the 1991-92 school year, and he was a substitute teacher in the Granite School District in the spring of 1991.

Granite is the nation's 32nd-largest district, with more than 80,000 students and 64 elementary schools in suburban Salt Lake City.

Gardner said he does not know how many schools Wadsworth substituted for or how often he worked as a substitute for the district in 1991.

Gem lawmakers await poll on special session

BOISE — The Legislative Council will survey lawmakers to see if there's agreement on the best way to handle the Indian gambling issue.

If so, lawmakers again may urge Gov. Cecil Andrus to call a special session next month to work on a proposed constitutional amendment on the issue.

But after two days of hearings in Boise wound up Friday afternoon, it remained unclear whether the special session will be held.

The vote to poll members on their sentiment on a special session was 11-3, with Democratic senators Marti Calabretta, of Osborne and Patricia McDermott of Pocatello voting against, along with Rep. Harold Reid, D-Craigmont.

McDermott said she was afraid passing a constitutional amendment specifically prohibiting certain games inevitably would omit something. It could be argued that the untimely passage would be legal.

"We might be allowing legislation of the unclear whether the special session will be held."

Calabretta has urged liberalization of gambling laws, not new restrictions. "If for one do not see the need for a constitutional amendment," she said.

House Democratic Leader Jim Stoitchoff of Sandpoint it appears clear the only way the state will be able to stop casino gambling is if the state eliminates the state lottery and pari-mutuel betting on races. He said he didn't think voters will go along with that.

Attorney General Larry Echo-Hawk, however, told lawmakers that if they do

Navy secretary resigns over sex-abuse scandal

WASHINGTON — Navy Secretary Lawrence Garrett III resigned Friday, accepting responsibility for a "leadership failure" demonstrated by the reported sexual assault of 26 women at an officers' convention.

In a letter to President Bush, Garrett insisted that he neither saw nor engaged in any offensive conduct at the 1991 Tailhook Association convention in Las Vegas.

Nevertheless, he wrote, "I hereby tender my resignation as Secretary of the Navy and do so immediately. It brings me a great deal of pain and embarrassment. I am deeply sorry that my actions have caused so much pain and embarrassment to so many of our fellow officers."

Garrett, 53 and the Navy's top civilian, said he also took responsibility for the "leadership failure" which allowed the "egregious" conduct at Tailhook to occur in the first instance.

The President Bush accepted the resignation in a statement emphasizing that "sexual harassment will not be tolerated."

Garrett's resignation was issued at the same time as the resignation of Secretary of Defense Richard Cheney on charges of sexual harassment in the same area.

Fitzwater described Bush as "very upset" by the Tailhook incident and concerned "both for the integrity and conduct of the Navy, as well as by sexual harassment in the Navy."

The statement said Bush was briefed by Defense Secretary Dick Cheney on the status of investigations into the Las Vegas incident and "seeks a full, thorough, and expedited investigation that will result in actions to ensure the highest standards of equality and conduct among all members of the Navy."

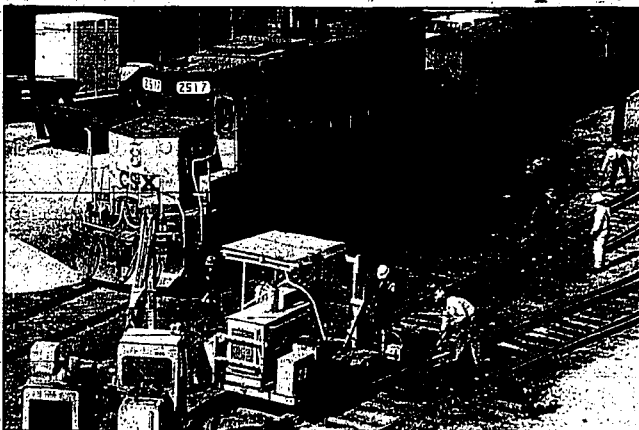
Cheney, in a separate statement, praised Garrett's "courage and loyalty to the U.S. Navy" but also declared, "There can be no tolerance of sexual harassment in the same area."

The resignation stems from a meeting of the Tailhook Association in Las Vegas in 1991 where 26 women — half of them military officers — say they were sexually assaulted while being pushed down a gangway of drunken naval aviators in a hotel hallway.

Pressure had been building on Garrett, who acknowledged last week he had been present in one of the suites near where the abuse reportedly occurred, but he insisted that he'd only entered the room to pluck a beer from a cooler.

Adding to the pressure, the Pentagon Wednesday confirmed the Navy had disciplined its top civilian, William H.L. Gurnea, in connection with the scandal.

Rail shutdown ends as dispute with unions goes to arbitration

WASHINGTON (AP) — Unions and railroads Friday began a new effort to resolve their 4-year-old wage-and-work rule disputes under the pressure of binding arbitration imposed as the government ended a two-day rail shutdown.

But some union officials branded the new and untried approach "a crime" that will destroy collective bargaining by effectively ending the right of labor to strike.

Railroad officials said the new procedure, in which an arbitrator is authorized to choose a winner from the best offers made by railroads and unions, is uncharted territory, at least for the railroads.

Congress modeled the winner-take-all process on the arbitration system adopted in the Major Leagues to settle pay disputes between owners and baseball stars.

The railroads said they hoped baseball's approach to arbitration could be transplanted to their industry and help end the stubborn labor disputes that have festered for more than four years.

The process begins Monday when the two sides each submit the name of an individual who will, in the

days following, appoint a single person to arbitrate the outcome of negotiations.

The test will come if negotiators are unable to settle their differences themselves.

Then the arbitrator is empowered to pick the last best offer of one of the two sides without making adjustments or splitting the difference.

Rail unions would regain the right to strike only if Bush rejected the arbitrator's decision, an extremely unlikely step, say administration officials.

Congress, meanwhile, seemed relieved to shed, at least for the moment, the onerous responsibility of intervening in railroad labor disputes and imposing a settlement itself.

But labor said it was enraged.

"Two crimes were committed this week," said Mac A. Fleming, president of the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees. "The railroads blackmailed Congress and the nation by holding the economy hostage. And Congress murdered collective bargaining in the industry."

Fleming said the Maintenance workers union went out of its way to

avoid creating a national emergency of the kind that would force Congress to intervene. The union, he said, kept talks going beyond the midnight deadline last Tuesday.

When another union, the Machinists, launched a selective strike against CSX Transportation, a regional railroad, the industry responded as one, shutting down all U.S. freight railroads and causing the stoppage of Amtrak passenger trains that operate over their tracks.

The result was the arbitration law President Bush signed shortly after midnight Thursday.

"Experience has taught us that binding arbitration lacked on the end of the process doesn't encourage bargaining, it discourages it," Fleming said. "Congress has now set a pattern that tells the carriers they never have to bargain in good faith."

The AFL-CIO, speaking for other railroad unions including the Machinists, had much the same message in a statement released Friday: "No matter how irresponsible the railroads are, Congress will always make sure that management gets its way and that railroad workers are denied their legal right to strike."

Democrats name convention speakers

WASHINGTON — Democrats on Friday named three keynote speakers for their national convention and said Texas Gov. Ann Richards, who gave a famous keynote speech in 1988, will preside over the four-day event.

Richards' appointment as convention chairwoman suggested she was not being considered for the vice presidential slot on a ticket that will be headed by Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton.

The appointment of Sen. Bill Bradley as one of the keynote speakers sent a similar signal. The New Jersey senator had been viewed as prime running-mate material. The other keynote speakers at the July 13-16 convention will be Georgia Gov. Zell Miller and former Texas Rep. Barbara Jordan. All three will speak the first night.

U.S. opposes ban on nuclear testing

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney said Friday the Bush administration opposes any ban on nuclear testing since it would undermine the United States' ability to assess the quality of its weapons.

"We believe it is essential to continue to test to guarantee the safety and reliability of the stockpile," Cheney told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Cheney's comments echoed the remarks made earlier this week by Secretary of State James A. Baker III before the same congressional panel.

The appearance of the defense secretary and the Joint Chiefs of Staff was part of the administration's campaign for Senate ratification of the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty.

Panel halts promotions due to scandal

WASHINGTON — The Senate Armed Services Committee will not act on top Navy and Marine Corps promotions until junior officers are cleared of any connection with the Tailhook sex abuse scandal, panel leaders said Friday.

The committee chairman, Sen. Sam Nunn, also called on the Navy to conduct its "investigation of improper activity by officers involved in the matter."

"They have to take a close look at their own procedures," the Georgia Democrat told reporters. "They have to untangle this."

Pianist will be reburied in Poland

WASHINGTON — President Bush on Friday called the late Jan Ignace Paderewski "one of the great men of our time" as he gathered a group of Polish-Americans to celebrate the return of the musician-statesman's remains to his homeland.

Paderewski's body has lain in Arlington Cemetery since his 1941 death in New York. It was the dying wish of the great concert pianist that his body be returned to Poland when it recovered its independence.

"That day has come," Bush said in a Rose Garden address to ethnic Americans and Polish officials. "Poland has thrown off the yoke of Soviet communism."

Jury clears defendants in S&L trial

LAFAYETTE, La. — A jury on Friday acquitted Sen. Edward Kennedy's prospective father-in-law of federal charges of defrauding a savings and loan.

Applause broke out in the courtroom after the verdicts were returned in favor of Edmund Reggie, Oscar Boswell, Reggie's former law partner; and Kenneth Comeaux, former president of Acadia Savings and Loan of Crowley.

Prosecutors said Reggie, who founded the S&L in 1957, headed schemes to defraud Acadia Savings and Loan and tried to force two investors to buy stock in a failing bank, Louisiana Bank & Trust, in order to get loans from the thrift. Both institutions were closed in 1987.

State: Diaper company didn't recycle

SEATTLE — A company hailed on national television as a recycler of disposable diapers was actually taking them to the dump untreated, the state contends in a lawsuit.

The Attorney General's office filed suit Thursday against Anderson Diaper Co., owner Irma Anderson and her brother-in-law, former company vice president Ken Anderson, alleging they violated the state Consumer Protection Act by misrepresenting the company's services.

The company has been the subject of numerous news media stories and was featured in a nationally-broadcast documentary on public television in 1990.

NOW hopes for boost from voter discontent

CHICAGO (AP) — The National Organization for Women said Friday it hopes to tap into a popular campaign theme — disgust with incumbents — while pushing mainstream women candidates and opposing President Bush.

"We are about to make a dramatic breakthrough at the federal level," NOW President Patricia Ireland said. "Certainly the public disgust with scandal, greed and corruption feeds into this in a major way."

High-profile U.S. Senate primary victories by Carol Mosley Braun in Illinois, Lynn Yeakel in Pennsylvania and Barbara Boxer and Diane Feinstein in California have prompted some to declare 1992 a breakthrough year for women in politics.

The Center for the American Woman and Politics at Rutgers University said seven women Senate candidates and 55 women House candidates have been nominated by major parties.

The records are 10 women Senate candidates in 1984 and 70 women House candidates in 1990, the center said.

In primaries not yet held, 12 women are seeking Senate nominations and 69 women are running for

House nominations, and 13 potential House candidates have not yet filed, it said.

The Senate currently has two women members, the House 28.

Women are lined up and ready to break through that glass ceiling, Ireland said. "Our focus is changing the balance of power in Congress."

Ireland credited the Clarence Thomas-Anita Hill hearings with galvanizing support for women candidates. She also said women were aided by the creation of new districts through reapportionment and voters' search for a perceived outsider.

"Women are seen as outsiders, even if they're incumbents," Ireland said. "It's not to say there aren't some very good men in Congress."

Women just have a different experience. It's not abstract to us to talk about battery and rape."

NOW, whose 280,000 members make it the nation's largest women's group, has not endorsed a presidential candidate, NOW says, it is against Bush because of his anti-abortion positions and stances on many women's and family issues.

Ireland expressed personal support for Democrat Bill Clinton, and said the group might endorse him if he chooses a woman as his vice presidential candidate.

The 26-year-old organization has endorsed only one presidential candidate — Walter Mondale, who chose Geraldine Ferraro as his running mate in 1984.

Poor health care linked to poverty

WASHINGTON (AP) — Warning: Poverty can be hazardous to your health.

Americans at or below the poverty level are more apt to develop high blood pressure, heart disease, kidney failure, lung disease, obesity and diabetes — and to die suddenly.

The poor are more likely to smoke, to drink and to have poor access to medical care.

Since a higher proportion of minorities is poor, when compared to the whole U.S. population, poverty-related causes of death and illness strike particularly devastating black, Hispanic, Asian and American-Indian communities.

These are the conclusions of medical experts attending a forum on minority health sponsored by the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute.

At a news conference Friday, the experts said that the health risks of being poor have been known, but that little progress has been made. They said the toll of early death from treatable illnesses and disorders will continue in America until health care and health education be come more widely available to the poor.

"Until we have universal health care or health care that is not dollar-driven, we are going to continue to have these problems," said Dr. John M. Flack of the University of Minnesota.

"The priorities we set in government have got to change," said Flack. "We have to realize that is easier and cheaper to prevent disease than it is to cure it."

High blood pressure, a condition that can lead to heart attack, stroke and kidney failure, can be treated for \$100 or less annually, he said.

Lack of adequate care has struck black people particularly hard, he said.

Black women die of heart disease at a rate 20 percent higher than white women, and, on average, black people experience a first heart attack five years earlier than whites, said Flack. Blacks, also, are more apt to die suddenly from a heart attack.

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Official seeks reform

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Catholic archbishop who heads the U.S. National Conference on Friday said his African nation faces "an apocalyptic" if the body's attempts to promote democratic reform fail.

Archbishop Monsengwo Pasinya speaking after meeting Secretary of State James A. Baker III, said Baker promised strong support for the conference's effort to move the country to democracy.

River outfitters try to improve image

IDAHO FALLS — Outfitters on the South Fork of the Snake River are trying to shine their tarnished image with eastern Idaho sportsmen.

And the board charged with regulating them said their record has improved dramatically over the last three years.

Increased pressure on the South Fork and other blue-ribbon trout streams has brought complaints from local anglers that guides are filling the rivers with non-residents.

But surveys by the board's enforcement staff and by the U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management show that guided trips make up less than 10 percent of the boating pressure on the South Fork.

"What we've heard is we've had a lot of success curbing a high level of illegal outfitting and focusing attention on licensed outfitters," Dale Baird, chairman of the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Licensing Board, said during the week-long meeting in the Idaho Falls area.

Court investigates murder confession

MOSCOW — Latah County Magistrate William Hamlett has scheduled arguments Monday on whether a Colfax, Wash., man's confession to the June 12 shooting death of Yance Knoke of Moscow was obtained legally.

Douglas Raymond Colvin, 30, is charged with first-degree murder. He remained in the Latah County Jail on Friday in lieu of \$100,000 bond after a preliminary hearing Thursday.

Police say Knoke's slaying apparently stemmed from a dispute over Knoke's girlfriend, and that Colvin admitted shooting Knoke twice with a .22-caliber handgun.

Storm disrupts Boise River Festival

BOISE — High winds, pounding rain and lightning sent 20,000 people crowded into Boise's downtown scurrying for shelter and canceled the kickoff of the Boise River Festival.

Meanwhile, a Boise teenager was critically injured Thursday when he was struck by lightning at a Babe Ruth baseball game at Bishop Kelly High School.

North and east-end neighborhoods were flooded and mudslides caused by the deluge closed Idaho Highway 21 briefly southeast of the city as chunks of roadway were torn away.

The storm hit Boise shortly after 6:30 p.m. Thursday and almost an inch of rain fell in less than an hour.

Good Sams prepare for 'Samboree'

BLACKFOOT — Nearly 1,000 members of the Good Sam Club are pulling their recreational vehicles into the Eastern Idaho Fairgrounds this weekend for their annual "Samboree."

"We just try to keep it fun and simple," said Curley Clark of Twin Falls, founder of the 20-year-old Idaho Good Sam chapter that has grown to 9,000 members. "And everybody has a good time."

The annual gathering offers a time for fun, but the club's main objective remains helping people on the road and in the community.

Started by Art Rouse in 1966 in Los Angeles, the club is the largest RV club in the world with 1.5 million families enrolled.

Workers protest non-union contractor

POCATELLO — Union iron workers closed out the week by posting informational pickets at the FMC Corp. elemental-phosphorus plant to protest the company's hiring of a non-union contractor for work at the plant.

Ed Bamberg, business agent for Iron Workers Local 732, said FMC's contract with Southern Idaho Equipment of Soda Springs deprives up to 100 union members in Pocatello of work they have done for years. FMC had used union iron workers for the past 25 years.

But FMC spokesman Mike Smith said the decision had nothing to do with the organization of the labor force.

Students burn peace symbol in protest

SANDPOINT — Five Sandpoint teen-agers claim responsibility for setting a symbol affair last week at a church to protest what they claimed was the church's racism.

The five spoke to the Bonner County Bee only on the condition that they remain anonymous. The newspaper said it agreed to interview the high school students after they provided details of the incident last Friday night that had not been publicly released previously.

The students said they burned a peace symbol at the America's Promise Church to expose members of the church as hatemongers.

Work on sports medicine center near

POCATELLO — Pocatello Regional Medical Center is ready to proceed with construction of a 52.3-million-sports medicine complex in conjunction with Idaho State University.

Spokesman Doug Hyde said the hospital wants to break ground on the project as soon as possible now that the state Board of Education has given its approval.

The board unanimously endorsed the facility during its meeting that would up on Friday after Bannock Regional Medical Center finally withdrew its staunch opposition.

Bannock Regional feared the 22,000-square-foot complex adjacent to Holt Arena would become another competitive problem in a health care market that has had its problems supporting the two existing hospitals.

U of I answers criticism with teaching plan

LEWISTON (AP) — The University of Idaho on Friday presented a plan to the state Board of Education to boost the status of teaching on the Moscow campus.

The university has come under fire in recent months by critics who contend it has given priority to research. Among the most notable was popular Agriculture Dean Larry Brannan, who tendered his resignation because he believed research was rewarded at the expense of teaching at the university.

But President Elisabeth Zinser again said that perception was inaccurate.

Teaching "is the center stage for any self-respecting university," Zinser said, and land-grant schools with a research mission have a special challenge to balance both.

"A lot of our research dollars provide significant resources to improve education," she said.

Still, the announcement of the plan to place new emphasis on teaching seemed to underscore the depth of what Zinser called a misconception.

Under the program, the university has created an Office of Teaching Enhancement. Its objective is to foster good teaching and faculty development, said George Simmons, vice provost for teaching and undergraduate studies.

That will be done with awards, better equipment, training and improved communications with students, he said.

"Where the action is in the classroom," Simmons said.

"But the university needs more money for faculty — about \$3 million for 74 positions," Provost Tom Bell said.

And board member Keith Hinkley of Blackfoot simply advised university officials to become creative because more money is not forthcoming from the state.

In other business, the board heard a report from Lewis-Clark State College President Lee Vickers on the development of a Japanese student exchange program.

The Pacific International Institute, a joint venture between Eishin Foundation of Japan and the American Heritage Association of Lake Oswego, Ore., opened this summer with 16 Japanese students at Lewis-Clark.

University will continue focus on microelectronics after Maki

LEWISTON (AP) — Microelectronics will remain a primary research area at the University of Idaho, despite the impending departure of microelectronics whiz Gary Maki, university Provost Thomas Bell says.

Maki, director of the University of Idaho's Microelectronics Research Center, announced plans last month to go to the University of New Mexico by November — largely to be able to work with national laboratories there.

Microelectronics is one of the five primary research areas in Moscow.

"The microelectronics research center will continue to be a primary element in the research enterprise," Bell said Thursday after the state Board of Education authorized the school to sign agreements with the University of New Mexico to form a microelectronics consortium.

"That doesn't change a bit. The foundation and infrastructure is there," Bell said.

He said there is potential for the research center to head in other directions.

The Microelectronics Research Center was established seven years ago and received a five-year, \$7 million grant from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration five years ago.

Court says wood stove not part of property sale

BOISE (AP) — A nonfunctioning, unconnected wood stove can be personal property, and not part of a real estate sale, the Idaho Court of Appeals says.

The court on Friday sided with Paul and Shelly Higgins of Kootenai County in a lawsuit filed by Jack Everett, who bought a residence from the Higgins, argued that an antique, decorative wood stove was a "fixture" and should have been part of the sale. He claimed damages because it was removed by the sellers.

The Court of Appeals unanimously upheld lower court decisions that it was personal property, not real estate, and there was no specific mention of it in the sale contract.

Everitt contended it was part of the building, even though the wood stove was not connected to the house's heating system and was not connected to a stovepipe.

In another decision Friday, the court rejected a bid from a Canyon County drug dealer to lessen his sentence of 10 to 20 years in prison and more than \$10,000 in fines and court costs.

Guadalupe Linares Ruiz argued it was wrong for 3rd District Judge Dennis Gough to sentence him to at least 10 years in prison, after a sentencing hearing at which the judge indicated Ruiz was not telling the truth about his involvement in drug deals.

The Court of Appeals said it would have been better if the judge had taken a more cautious approach toward questioning Ruiz during the sentencing hearing, but there was nothing wrong with the sentence, to 10 years in prison.

Andrus, others applaud new Atlanta dam

ATLANTA (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus and federal resource managers are pointing to replacement of the failed Kirby Dam at the mountain town of Atlanta as clear evidence that government does work.

"People say government doesn't respond," Andrus said at the dedication on Friday. "Today is a day to reflect on the ability of citizens and their government to work hard to deliver a team response to solve a problem. Let it serve as a model for future situations in Idaho."

After high water caused the once-repaired Kirby Dam to fail over Memorial Day weekend in 1991, the state, the Forest Service, Bureau of Reclamation and Environmental Protection Agency worked with residents to finance and build a new dam to provide hydropower locally and protect the Middle Fork of the Boise River from toxic mining sediments.

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Good economic news fails to spark market action

NEW YORK — The Dow industrials ended down a point at 3282 Friday after a late, 14-point loss in sluggish action.
Traders said the market basically drifted after a new slide in foreign equity markets dampened early trading sentiment, but failed to push the Dow down more than 10 points.

Following unexpected drops in the U.S. money supply released Thursday, continued failure of the Federal Reserve to even hint at lower interest rates, and the unwillingness of index-fund traders to actively support cash prices, analysts said.
Although interest-sensitive sectors showed some life — particularly the money-center banks, which rose broadly — the high-technology sector remained troubled. While Thursday's basket case Lotus Development stabilized Friday, falling only fractionally, the focus of selling shifted to Symbol Technologies, which fell as much as 4% to a session low of 17 1/2 on high volume after a disappointing earnings projection.

Technically, the Dow remains locked in a tight range bounded by roughly 3310 on the upside and 3270 on the downside. The intermediate-term trend still is considered upward by many technical analysts because the late-April lows near Dow 3300 were violated by the market's recent three-week decline.
Nevertheless, the ability of the market to hold for over a week above a close of 3270 suggests that a short-term low may already be locked in, technicians said.
The Dow skidded 10 points to 3274 in early trading reflecting a new 6-year low in Japanese stocks, as well as being off through losses in London. The Nikkei-225 fell

330.99 points to close at 15,812.73, and London's FTSE-100 followed with a 24-point loss to 2532 as New York opened, eventually closing down 23.2 at 2334.1.
A 1 a.m. U.S. economic data briefly rattled stocks as the government revealed that May personal-income rose 0.3 percent and personal spending rose 0.5 percent. The income figure was on target with expectations, but spending proved higher than the 0.4 percent generally anticipated by economists. But lack of either conviction or volume doomed the stock rally after only 10 minutes.
"The data gave some mixed signals," said

economist Daniel Seto at Nikko Securities. "Short-term, the greater pickup in spending is a good sign for the economy. But long-term, Americans are still spending more than they earn. The implication that savings rates are still going down is not good for future spending momentum," he said.
By early afternoon, the Dow began a slow drift down, bottoming with an hour remaining at 3270, down 14 points, before rebounding into the close.
At the close, the Dow stood at 3282.41, down 1.60, while advancing stocks edged down by 848 to 835 on light volume of 154 million shares, contracting from a more moderate pace of 182 million on Thursday.

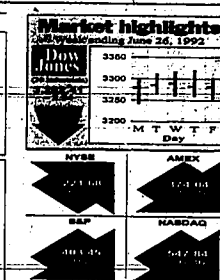
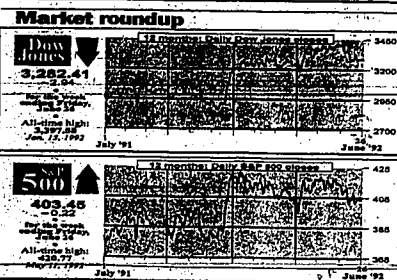

Williams becomes new police chief in L.A.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Willie L. Williams was privately sworn in as police chief Friday today and will take the reins of the department the minute Chief Daryl Gates retires this weekend, officials said.

"It was a very small, private ceremony early Friday morning," said Mayor Tom Bradley's press secretary, Bill Chandler.

He said the mayor did not attend the event at Williams' new home,

but a few police commissioners and some of Williams' relatives were present.

Williams' formal swearing-in before an audience of more than 1,000 is scheduled for Tuesday. Williams is former Philadelphia police commissioner.

A Police Commission spokesman, Bill Dammron, said it was not unusual to have an official sworn in before his successor leaves office.

"It provides a smooth transition," he said. "We do it all the time."

Gates, who has run the city department for 14 years, had caused an uproar earlier this month when he hinted in a newspaper interview that he might not retire on schedule as planned. He later backed down.

Gates, 65, leaves office and Williams becomes police chief at 12:01 a.m. Sunday.

The police department has been a target of criticism over the March 1991 videotaped beating by white officers of motorist Rodney King, who is black.

The beating caused racial unrest, and the acquittal of the officers in April touched off rioting that killed 52 people.

Salesman of the year arrested for murders

FEDERAL WAY, Wash. (AP) — A former Federal Way man used-car salesman, said Nampa police Capt. Gordon Crawford, was arrested in Idaho for investigation of the killings of his wife and two sons, whose decomposed remains were found in an abandoned rental storage room.

Mark James Bender was arrested late Thursday night in Nampa by King County police detectives and Nampa police, said spokesman Rick Chubb of the King County department.

Timber Wolfe, general manager of the Happy Days Ford dealership in Caldwell, said Bender was "a likeable person, not extremely outgoing."

White Bender was friendly and would go to company parties. "He definitely did not tell us a lot about his past," Wolfe said.

Bender had been at the dealership for about two years and was King County prosecutor's spokesman. Detectives planned to bring him back to Seattle.

Documents filed in King County Superior Court say Bender first rented the locker on April 14, 1980, one day after he had told a friend that his wife and children had left him.

Group finds city's level of police brutality 'appalling'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Amnesty International said Friday that Los Angeles police and sheriff's deputies regularly resort to excessive force by shooting and beating people who pose little or no threat to them.

In a report based on a yearlong study of the Police Department and the county Sheriff's Department, the Nobel Peace Prize-winning human rights group concluded that brutality has "gone unchecked for years with officers feeling free to act without fear of discipline or prosecution."

"It is one of a number of current human rights scandals in the U.S. that undermine its credibility in promoting rights internationally," he said.

Hispanics and blacks bear the brunt of the brutality, the report said.

The 52-page report, prompted by the videotaped beating of black motorist Rodney King by white officers, was released as Amnesty International USA opened its annual general meeting.

The report is a key part of the organization's broader condemnation of human rights abuses in the United States.

Martin also chastised the federal government for turning back thousands of Haitian refugees without proper screening and permitting the accelerated use of the death penalty.

"The U.S. government holds itself up to the rest of the world as an advocate of human rights, yet fails to protect some of those very rights itself," Martin said.

In the case of Los Angeles police and sheriff's deputies, use of excessive force has at times amounted to torture or cruel, inhuman and degrading treatment, Martin said.

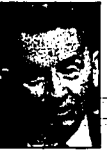
The report on police brutality is based on about 60 lawsuits alleging wrongful death or excessive force and in which the city or county agreed to settle out of court.

"The record on police brutality is appalling," said Amnesty International Secretary General Ian Martin.

Perot easily passes test in Nevada

CARSON CITY (AP) — Texas billionaire Ross Perot has qualified for a spot on Nevada's fall ballot as an independent presidential candidate. Secretary of State Cheryl Lau said Friday.

The qualifying was no surprise for Perot's Nevada supporters who turned in nearly 50,000 signatures. State law requires only 9,392 signatures to place an independent presidential hopeful on the ballot.

"It's not really an earth-shattering thing," said Tom Johnson of Reno, Perot's state coordinator. "It would have been earth shattering here, but not qualified."

Nevada becomes the third Western state in which Perot has qualified for a presidential bid. He already has qualified in Idaho and Wyoming and 15 other states and is awaiting verification of petitions in 10 others.

Perot has said he'll enter the presidential race as an independent candidate if he qualifies for the ballot in most of the 50 states — a likely prospect by early July.

Johnson said he isn't certain when Perot plans to file his Nevada candidacy declaration and pay his \$250 filing fee, which will complete the paperwork process for ballot access. The deadline is Aug. 14.

Ms. Lau said clerks in 13 of the state's 17 counties already have verified 14,299 signatures. She added the count should be much higher once reviews of the remaining 34,000 signatures are completed.

"He's on the ballot — as soon as he pays his \$250," added Ms. Lau's elections deputy, Dale Esquiaga.

The signatures had been turned in June 4 after a 90-day campaign.

Wells will pay loan back later

CARSON CITY (AP) — The Legislature's Interim Finance Committee has given the city of Wells another five years to repay a \$112,000 industrial park loan that was supposed to be paid off by now.

Wells officials said Thursday they have the money to pay the state, but asked for a 10-year delay so the funds can be used to qualify for a \$3.2 million federal grant to renovate their airport.

Assemblyman Matthew Callister, D-Las Vegas, who chairs the IFC, said he had compassion for the small Elko County town, but the community should honor a 1986 agreement to repay the loan within five years.

"There isn't a community in the state without a meritorious, justifiable use for \$112,000," Callister said. "These are hard times for all of us."

But Sen. William Raggio, R-Reno, Sen. Dean Rhoads, R-Tuscarora, and Assemblyman J. Coy Pettyjohn, R-Henderson, won't support for a motion to allow Wells to repay the funds over the next five years.

Sightings reported in murder case

Authorities seek brothers for questioning

BURLEY - Several people have reported seeing two brothers wanted for questioning in connection with the brutal murder of a 61-year-old Burley man, but police hadn't tracked the men down Friday.

Benito Ruiz Carabeo's body was found cut into pieces and dumped in the desert in eastern Lincoln County Monday night. Investigators believe he was killed and his body dismembered in a Burley mobile home.

The killing was the second Burley murder in two weeks. Authorities still are looking for a suspect in the June 8 shooting of a 21-year-old Minidoka County man.

Sheriff's deputies are looking for two brothers, ages 24 and 25, who lived with Carabeo. All three men are from Mexico, although Carabeo had been in the United States for several years.

"There is a possibility they are still in the area," detective Dave Tracy of the Cassia County Sheriff's Department said.

Tracy said several people have contacted his office and reported seeing two Mexican

men in a pickup truck similar to the description of Carabeo's truck, which is missing.

The 1984 Chevrolet pickup is orange and either white or tan, with license plates reading 2M 10489. Anyone who sees it should call 911, Tracy said.

The men, each about 5 feet, 4 inches tall and weighing about 150 pounds, have been arrested previously in Cassia County on misdemeanor disturbing the peace charges, Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal said. One of the men also was arrested in Twin Falls County in 1990, he said.

Those arrests mean authorities have fingerprints from both men on file, Tracy said. The fingerprints have been sent to the

state crime laboratory in Boise, where they can be compared with evidence gathered at the crime scene.

Investigators believe that scene is a bedroom in the mobile home where Carabeo and three other men had been living. Police found an ax in the home and blood in the bedroom, Crystal said.

Police were led to the trailer by a man who lived with Carabeo and the two brothers. The man told authorities Thursday that Carabeo had been missing for several days.

No relatives of Carabeo have been found, Crystal said, adding that he believes all of the man's family members live in Mexico.

The new head of the department's three-man traffic team is Cpl. Tim Miller.

Accident near Sweetzer kills 1, injures two others

BURLEY - An accident on Interstate 84 near Sweetzer Pass killed a Washington girl and injured two other people Thursday night, the Idaho State Police reported.

Lisa Wolfe, 13, of Bellingham, Wash., died when the car she was riding in rolled down an embankment just before 7 p.m., a state police dispatcher said.

Christina Wolfe, 15, was driving west on the interstate when she went off the east side of the road, overcorrected and lost control of the car, the dispatcher said.

Passengers Cheryl Wolfe, 22, and Carmel T. Drewes, 16, were taken to Cassia Memorial Hospital. Drewes underwent surgery Friday and remained in the hospital's intensive care unit, a nursing supervisor said.

Cheryl Wolfe was in stable condition.

Nichols leaves prosecutor's job early for National Guard

TWIN FALLS - Deputy county prosecutor Frank Nichols has left his position earlier than expected to go on active duty with the Army National Guard.

Nichols, whose position was to end July 31, said in a memo to his supervisor that he had been called to active duty beginning July 6, and asked to put on military leave until July 31.

But Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter, in a memo to the County Commissioner, said Nichols already used his unpaid military leave and asked that his final check be for his work through June 19.

Nichols, who finished fourth in the Republican primary election for Twin Falls County Prosecutor in May, is a captain in the National Guard and pilots an Apache helicopter.

He has said he would consider staying in the prosecutor's office under Baxter's successor if given the opportunity.

Car burglars strike north Twin Falls neighborhood

TWIN FALLS - At least five car owners in a northern Twin Falls residential neighborhood fell victim to a car burglar late Wednesday night or early Thursday morning, according to Twin Falls police reports.

"Two cars on Juniper Lane, two more on Targhee Drive and another on Eyergreen Drive were broken into. The burglar took car stereos, music cassettes, personal items and a mobile telephone worth more than \$1,000," the reports say.

No suspects are listed on the reports.

Algae stalls Andrus

Governor experiences Snake River pollution first-hand

THOUSAND SPRINGS - The governor got stymied.

Gov. Cecil Andrus was touring the Middle Snake River with state and federal environmental officials Friday, when his boat was waylaid by the very algae problem he had come to inspect.

The governor's party had traveled only a short distance up the river when algae plugged the intakes of the jet boat he was riding. The boat bobbed helplessly in mid-river.

"I wanted to see first-hand the middle Snake," Andrus said, the silent boat a mute but eloquent testimony to the problem. The algae also plagues boaters and hampers search and rescue efforts on the river.

"This is the way it is all summer long," Gooding County Commissioner Bob Muffley said.

The governor clambered aboard one of the other boats on the tour, and returned to shore.

Traveling with the governor were Dana Rasmussen, director of the Environmental Protection Agency's Region 10, Joe Nagel, head of the state Division of Environmental Quality, Yvonne Ferrell, director of the Parks and Recreation Department, and several local elected officials.

"We're here to learn," Rasmussen said. "The shore boat ride was only one stop on the Friday afternoon whiz."

"We saw a very ill river," Andrus said. "The river is plagued by stagnation, siltation and algae growth, and it needs protection, he said."

But more water is not the answer, he said. That would just send the problem downstream to the Brownlee Reservoir. Rather, the state must stop more contaminants from being discharged into the river.

"It's a problem we all have to face," Andrus said.

The river's ills are the result of years of discharges from fish hatcheries, irrigated agriculture, dairies, feedlots and municipal sewage treatment plants.

The fact that the governor and top environmental officials were on the river shows that, "we have a problem, a serious problem," said Tim Litke, regional director of the Twin Falls office of the state Division of Environmental Quality.

The state in September 1990 listed the middle Snake as a "water quality limited segment," meaning that portion of the river violated state water quality standards.

Former canyon-rim farmer Oren Boone dies

TWIN FALLS - Oren Boone grew top-quality potatoes on his rocky family farm in the 1950's, but his best crop was not potatoes, but land.

Boone, 82, died Friday of a stroke at the Mountain View Care Center in Kimberly.

Boone had retired from farming in 1980, when he sold his 80 acres of canyon-rim land for more than \$2 million to a Salt Lake development firm that built the Magic Valley Mall.

Boone was born in 1910, Boone graduated from Twin Falls High School in 1928. His younger brother, Boone said his high school yearbook described him as "sterner" and "hellion."

Boone's agricultural career at the canyon-rim farm was interrupted by military service. He participated in World War II, and in 1952 he

missed a crop of super-spuds that caught the attention of agricultural experts in the Magic Valley.

Coaxed out of a barren, rocky plot along the canyon rim, Boone's crop came up with a record yield of 96 percent Grade 1 potatoes.

Evelyn Boone said her husband married his first wife, Juliet, in 1937, and the couple lived with Boone's parents in a lava-rock house that is now a historic landmark.

The pair divorced in 1990, and shortly afterward Boone met and married Evelyn Crowder Boone. Juliet Boone died several weeks ago in Kimberly when a truck hit her car.

Evelyn Boone said the decision to sell the farm enabled her husband to retire and enjoy his accomplishments.

"In 1952 he was raising potatoes, all starch and good, and now they're using that land for a shopping mall, restaurants and nursing care buildings," she said. "Times change."

Suspect may have stolen brother's car

BURLEY - The man suspected of killing a 21-year-old Minidoka County man in front of a Burley bar June 8 may be driving a car he stole from his brother, police said Friday.

Abel Larios, 17, has been charged with second-degree murder in the shooting of Juan Ramos.

Investigators learned only recently that a car owned by Larios' brother is missing, detective Dave Tracy of the Cassia County Sheriff's Office said.

The car is a 1982 Pontiac Grand Prix, with license plates 4C 486, Tracy said.

Local authorities said earlier this week they were considering asking the FBI for help in finding Larios.

He was charged with Ramos' murder after investigators found shell casings that matched the .45-caliber bullet that killed Ramos inside the trailer where he was staying north of Paul.

Larios, a farm worker, apparently picked up a pay check on June 8 after the early-morning shooting and hasn't been seen since, Tracy said.

Officials believe he has cashed that check and are working with area banks to find out where, he said.

According to a witness, Larios and Ramos both were involved in several fights at Burley bars that culminated in an argument on Main Street in the pre-dawn hours of June 8.

When Ramos tried to drive away from the scene, he was shot once in the back of the head through the rear window of his pickup truck.

Drought aid: County cuts farmers' taxes

TWIN FALLS - Thirteen million dollars worth of farmland and houses had their taxes slashed by 50 percent Friday when Twin Falls County commissioners responded to a plea for tax relief from farmers on the drought-stricken Salmon Falls Creek irrigation tract.

"We toured the area Tuesday and it's pretty sad out there," said Commissioner Marvin Hempleman.

More than 30 farmers from the drought-stricken Salmon Falls Creek irrigation tract south of Twin Falls crowded into a county courthouse basement meeting room Monday afternoon to ask for the relief.

"We're all about broke," farmer Shirrel Sylvester told county commissioners and tax officials. "You can't make a living if you're not producing anything."

The farmers are receiving less water this year - 1.5 acre feet per acre than at anytime since 1934, according to Salmon River Canal Co. records.

The tax break will affect only 1992 taxes, while former property tax evaluations will be in force for the following year's taxes.

Sylvester asked that the tax cut be invoked not only on the farmland, but also on equipment and homes. He said farm homes were less useful to Salmon Tract farmers this year, because many farmers are working other irrigated land, far from home, so they can hold onto their homes.

"We're off running land everywhere else so we can stay there," he said.

The commissioners did not discount taxes on tractors, however, Hempleman said. Only taxes on so-called "real property" - land, homes and improvements

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2 independent candidates beat deadline, file for Blaine Commission

HAILEY — A pair of candidates filed last-minute independent petitions for Blaine County Commissioner this week, contesting Democrat Leonard Harlig's candidacy for a north county seat.

Dr. Lee Enright, a retired cardiac surgeon, and Keichum realtor Rip Sewell delivered petitions to the county clerk just before Wednesday's 5 p.m. deadline for independent candidates. Their names will appear on county ballots in November along

with Harlig's as candidates for the District 3 (north county) position.

Incumbent commissioner Alan Reynolds announced last week that he will not seek re-election, and Harlig appeared likely to run unopposed until Enright and Sewell entered the race. Both cited Harlig's lack of opposition as a factor in their decision to run.

"I hate to see anyone back into a position of that importance," said Sewell, who has operated Warm Springs Realty in Ketchum for 18 years.

Sewell said he entered the race "because

people who I have a lot of respect for wanted me to, and because they convinced I could win. I don't want to run a race if I'm not going to win."

An appointed member of the Ketchum Planning and Zoning Commission for four years, Sewell said he enjoyed his involvement in government and felt he helped the city. He ran for City Council unsuccessfully eight years ago, losing to former councilman Tom Held.

"I think I have the ability to make honest, straightforward decisions for the good of the community," he said.

Like Sewell and Harlig, Enright has never been elected to a government office. But he said his lack of political experience might be an asset.

"This might well be the year of the non-politician," he said.

A full-time resident of Blaine County for two and a half years, the former Bay Area surgeon has been a homeowner in Sun Valley for more than a decade. He also owns BUSTER Ranch in Stanley Basin, a former guest ranch that is now for sale.

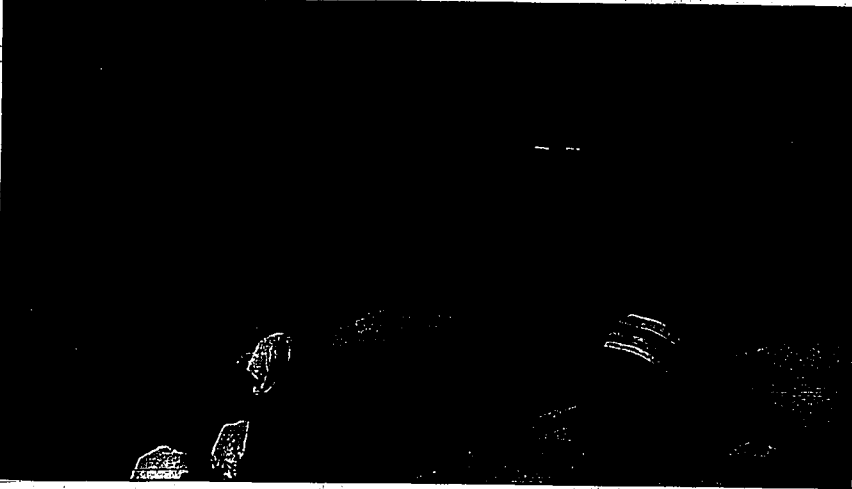
Enright said the county commissioners seat in Blaine County was a "very powerful and respected position" and that the voters

Blaine County voters will also choose between incumbent Commissioner Rupert House, a Republican, and Democratic challenger Wendy Collins in the District 2 race in November.

With the filing deadline for county positions now past, Sheriff Walt Emalley and Prosecuting Attorney Fritz Hammerle will be running unopposed for re-election in November.

Wall, abuse don't stop illegal immigration

TIJUANA, Mexico (AP) — On the Mexican border in the shade of a tree, Jesus Sanchez skims his comic book and scowls at U.S. military reservists erecting a steel "Berlin Wall" just a few yards north.

Wall or no wall, he plans the dash to the United States as soon as it gets dark.

"My family isn't going to die of hunger," said Sanchez, a 26-year-old electrical engineer. "I don't understand the purpose of the wall if Mexico and the United States have friendly relations."

The wall, near completion, is intended to stop illegal immigrants. Most who attempt the crossing do so from this border city.

From Texas to California along the 2,000-mile border, 1 million illegal workers were caught and returned to Mexico last year. U.S. immigration officials estimate they catch one out of three.

Most are Mexicans, but people of 62 nationalities were caught in 1990 around the San Diego area.

The 14-mile fence, made of old

U.S. military landing equipment, stands 12 feet high and is all that separates Mexico from San Ysidro, about 12 miles south of San Diego.

Many call it the "Berlin Wall." Bitterness is rife on both sides.

"Our nation is being invaded and the government isn't doing anything about it," said Joe Fields, a member of the San Diego-based group American Spring, which wants a military closure of the border.

Another group, Light Up the Border, regularly drives down to shine car headlights at night, symbolically helping border agents see better.

Meanwhile, would-be aliens mass along the wall and wait for nightfall — or a change of shift by the Border Patrol. Some scramble over the wall; others go around it where it is unfinished.

When the time is right, they run across the sloping hills, canyons and beaches that lead to California.

Spectators, who see a successful run, applaud wildly.

Vendors sell sodas and instant

soup to those awaiting their chances.

The migrants carry few possessions, little money and a lot of hope. With a little luck, they dodge the "migra" — U.S. immigration authorities — who hover in helicopters or sit in patrol cars with infrared devices.

Graffiti on the wall reads:

"Nobody can deny us the right to work!"

"If the Berlin Wall came down, why not this?"

"We're not illegal, we're international workers."

Daniel Lopez, a 38-year-old fisherman from the western state of Michoacan, was making his first try. He was traveling with his 11-year-old daughter, Teresa, who said, "I'm scared but I'm more scared of not eating."

More women and children are joining men in the journey north, a sign that they hope to stay in the United States.

Mexico has 40 percent unemployment and minimum wages of about \$5 a day.

In the United States, the Mexicans work in construction or as domestics, restaurant workers and fruit pickers, jobs many Americans don't want.

Untold numbers die from dehydration or suffocation in car trunks, driven by "coyotes," or smugglers. In 1989, 117 bodies were pulled from the Rio Grande.

Roberto Martinez, head of San Diego's American Friends Services Committee, said those dangers pale in comparison to confrontations with the U.S. Border Patrol.

"They treat them like they're criminals," said Martinez. "They're held in cold rooms like Turkish prisons, and women can be sexually abused, molested and raped by Border Patrol agents."

In May, the human rights group America's Watch released a study saying Border Patrol agents engage in "serious and systematic" abuse of apprehended illegal immigrants.

River study: Jerome rethinks opposition

JEROME — After recently turning down a request by the Bureau of Land Management for approval of a study of the Snake River, Jerome County Commissioners will reconsider their decision.

The BLM had asked the commissioners for their stamp of approval of an "eligibility and suitability" study of portions of the river that could place it under the Wild and Scenic River Act and could give control of developments to the Federal Government.

Gooding and Twin Falls county commissioners gave their OK to the plan previously.

Jerome commissioners turned down the offer since they thought the study was too much like several other studies being done, said Commissioner Veronica Lieman.

Commissioners also worried that future federal regulations

could be changed, and the county would be locked into something that wouldn't be in the best interest of the region, she said.

"We decided we needed to investigate the study and the need for a study," she said.

But recently, Maureen Boling of Hazelton requested the commissioners reconsider their decision. Boling said she is a resident-concerned about the quality of the Snake River.

"During the study that could take some time, the river would be protected from further development of dams," Boling said.

"This is the only way to protect the three parts of the Mid-Snake River that are included in the study," she said in reference to the Milner Reach (Milner Dam to the backwaters of the Twin Falls Dam), Lower Salmon to the backwaters of Bliss Dam and from the Bliss Dam to King Hill.

Commissioners will study the issue again at a meeting set for 3:30 p.m. Monday.

Rodney King won't be charged following dispute with his wife

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Videotaped beating victim Rodney King was arrested Friday after his wife said he injured her during a fight, but police said they wouldn't pursue charges against him.

King, 27, was arrested at his apartment in the city's Studio City area, said Deputy Police Chief Mark Kroeker. King's wife, Crystal Waters, suffered minor cuts, Kroeker said.

King was taken into custody for investigation of spousal abuse. But after interviewing him, police decided not to ask that the district attorney file charges, and he was released Friday evening.

"We have concluded there is insufficient evidence to record a booking," Kroeker said, adding that King's wife didn't wish to prosecute.

He said King initially was "a little bit upset" but cooperated as officers handcuffed him and took him to the North Hollywood station for questioning.

"He settled down and he's smiling and talking to officers now," Kroeker said.

The arrest was the second for King, who is black, since a bystander videotaped his beating by white police officers in March 1991. The highly publicized videotape of King's beating, following a traffic stop, led to Chief Daryl Gates' retirement and the arrest of four officers on brutality charges. The officers' subsequent acquittal on most charges sparked this year's riotous Los Angeles riots.

King was arrested in May 1991 after police said he tried to run down a vice officer with his truck after officers in Hollywood saw him pick up a transvestite prostitute.

'Big kids' in big boats begin big race

BURLEY — Their boats positioned all around the course, rescue team members have the best seats available for viewing the 16th annual Idaho Regatta.

Hopefully, all they'll be required to do this weekend is observe and enjoy the races.

That competition begins today with the start of eliminations at 11 a.m. Following a noon-flag-ceremony, competition will continue through late afternoon.

The same agenda is scheduled for Sunday with the awards ceremony slated for 7 p.m.

Large, powerful engines are most apt to catch an onlooker's eye, but a glance into the driver's compartment reveals a cockpit surprisingly devoid of gadgets. A seemingly oversized accelerator, but no restraining devices, few gauges or gauges.

"There's only two you really need. An oil pressure gauge and a tachometer," said Bill Moore, a California K-boater who accepted an invitation to the inaugural Regatta and hasn't missed one yet.

It's an event Moore calls "A big ego trip for big kids, that's grown into one of the best races on the West Coast."



Everything is designed around the safety of the driver, but the cockpits are surprisingly simple.

"Here, you have a problem with altitude. We're getting so we have to have a tach to adjust the motor. But all the idea is to protect the driver."

That's a fact, albeit one likely to escape the uninited. "There's not much to them," said one fan while inspecting a K-class runabout. "What surprises me most is that there's not a strap over the foot feed."

Not to worry: It's anything but a safety hazard. "I have a black shoe, a tennis shoe actually, with a grip on the bottom that fits the pedal," said Pro Stock vet Tom Conant of Phoenix. "My foot can't come out unless I get thrown out."

Ejection, of course, is one of a number of scenarios which would send safety and rescue teams into action. An unlikely happenstance. "Experienced drivers usually don't flip," according to Conant.

Among a number of built-in safety devices, is a switch which automatically kills the engine whenever a driver is thrown from his boat.

"If you didn't have that cut off the boat would go into a barrel roll, bam, that quick," Moore said. "The main thing, safety wise, are there's no sharp things and our drivers all wear a parachute which will deploy to slow their entry into the water."

Fratianne says she's moved beyond Olympics

KETCHUM — This week's decision to allow professional skaters to compete in the 1994 Olympics may not benefit many skaters.

"I think it's wonderful if you have the time and the desire," said Linda Fratianne, Olympic silver medalist in 1980 and two-time world champion. "But for those of us who have moved on to families and other things in our lives... I would have no interest."

Fratianne currently skates in the weekly Sun Valley Ice Shows. She lives near Ketchum with her husband, Niok-Marjolein, the Sun Valley skating director, and their 21-month-old daughter, Alexandra.

"I don't have the drive," said Fratianne.

Boltano's hopes - BB

The most likely skater to take advantage of the rule change appears to be 1988 gold medalist Brian Boltano, who will headline a show at Sun Valley this summer.

By turning professional in 1989, Boltano passed on an opportunity to earn another gold medal.

"I think it must be very frustrating for Brian, knowing he could have been a two-time champion," Fratianne said. "He is probably stronger now than he's ever been. He can do a triple axel like he's nothing."

German star Katarina Witt, scheduled to appear at Sun Valley on July 11, is one professional who could boost the popularity of the Olympics. She has not announced any interest in competing in the 1994 games.

Witt already has won two Olympic gold medals (1984 and 1988). Another Olympic

win could do little to increase her popularity. "I don't know what she could gain from it," Fratianne said.

In addition to her Olympic golds, Witt collected four firsts and a second at the world championships from 1984 through 1988.

Being about a half a foot taller than most world-class women figure skaters, Witt might have problems competing with the younger, smaller Olympians.

"There's not any chance of fat on her, but she is big," Fratianne said. "I don't think she could do the jumps like some of the others."

"If she does decide, nothing is going to stop her. She has the drive, the determination, the motivation. She is going to do anything to win. She has that killer instinct."

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Reynolds misses Olympic chance in 400

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Butch Reynolds might be going to the Olympic Games. It just won't be as a member of the U.S. 400-meter team.

Reynolds' long and courageous bid to make the team in the 400 came to a halt Friday night when he finished fifth at the U.S. Olympic trials. Race winner Danny Everett ran the second-fastest 400 ever.

While the tired and emotionally drained Reynolds did not qualify for the team in the open 400, he did qualify as an alternate on the 1,600-meter relay team. It will be up to coach Mel Rosen whether to use Reynolds in the relay in any of the rounds at Barcelona.

It is unlikely, however, that Reynolds will undergo suspension, will compete at the Games.

Meanwhile, former University of Idaho track ace Dan O'Brien took the lead with a new world best scoring for the first day of the decathlon.

Steve Lewis, the 1988 Olympic gold medalist, finished second in 44.08 and was followed by NCAA champion Quincy Watts in 44.22, and Andrew Valmon in 44.52.

Reynolds, 33, said he had a good race. "Right now, I guess I'm going to Barcelona. If I'm not chosen to run on the relay team, I won't [run] in it," Everett said of his brilliant race. "This is the culmination of many years of learning. I'm a person who

for the past few years was always coming in around third and making mistakes. Now, I've matured and put everything together."

Prior to the race, officials of track and field's world governing body, the International Amateur Athletic Federation, reiterated that Reynolds would not be permitted to compete at Barcelona, regardless of his performance at the trials.

"We don't care if Reynolds wins or doesn't win," an IAAF spokesman said. "The case is closed."

Meanwhile, the heralded decathlon duel began between American record-holder Dan O'Brien and three-time national champion Dave Johnson, with O'Brien establishing a world best for first-day competition.

O'Brien, the 1991 world champion, had a five-event total of 4,698 points and a 504-point lead over Johnson.

It was not unexpected: O'Brien is a big first-day performer, while Johnson's best events are on the second day.

Still, O'Brien was impressive, compiling the best marks among the 25 competitors in each of the first three events. He opened with a meet-record 10.50 in the 100 meters, and followed with a long jump of 25 feet,

11 inches, a personal best of 54-56 in the shot put, 6-10x in the high jump and ran the 400 in 47.92.

The best previous first-day score was 4,677, by Britain's Daley Thompson at the 1984 Olympics. Johnson ran the 100 in 11.18, long jumped 23-10 $\frac{1}{2}$, threw the shot a decathlon personal-best 49-4 $\frac{1}{2}$, high-jumped 6-6 $\frac{1}{2}$ and ran the 400 in 48.21, for a total of 4,194 points.

"I'm satisfied," said O'Brien, who showed no ill affects of a recent stress fracture of the lower right leg. "I was nervous and sick all week leading up to this."

"I don't think a world record is possible, but I'll get a good score."

Johnson also was confident of a good score. "The recent media hype has been a bit of a distraction and it's a little harder to just relax with the added pressure," he said. "But I've been on the decathlon road for 10 years, and I don't want to stop me from getting to Barcelona, where I'm going to settle things."

"I had a front row seat to watch Dan compete and it was great." O'Brien's American record is 8,814 points. The world record is 8,847, by Thompson at the '84 Los Angeles Games.

high-speed crash the driver walks away unscathed.

A couple of relatively new innovations, foam in the hull and a canopy over the cockpit would decrease the risk of injury even further.

"Foam is actually one of the new things that everyone is starting to think about," Moore said.

"This boat went out last year and snapped at about 140 miles per hour. This one has 20 pounds of foam in the hull, the one down the way has none. They collided in a race last year. It nearly ripped the side out

of the other boat, but didn't leave a scratch on this one."

Moore compared the mishap to K-90, "Dark Side of the Moon," which survived in a recent accident which claimed the life of a powerboat driver. "He hit a wake at about 70 miles per hour. If it had been foam, the boat would have rolled over and

that's it. 'No broke up.' Little returns to be changed, but there is one additional safety feature Moore would like to see become a reality.

"We need a little longer boat so we could put a canopy on it," he said. "That way if we splash the water doesn't hit the driver and startle him."

"We has met the enemy, and it is us."

Today's South was his own worst enemy. Not only did he cut himself off from his game-going tricks, but he provided his opponents with an easy-to-read map for the winning defense.

East took his spade ace and returned the suit; South winning with a feeble falsecard of his king. Briefly South cashed two high diamonds and led a third diamond to East's queen. East, better at counting than South, saw that a spade return would guarantee South nine winners (West's opening lead told him where the spade queen was), and he switched to the heart 10. South was now stuck in dummy with no way to his hand, and the defenders scored one spade, two hearts, one club and one diamond for one down.

South slid his own throat when he played the diamonds the way he did. Instead of cashing the two top diamonds and conceding a third, South should have played a low diamond from both hands at trick three: East wins and shifts to hearts; but South has the diamond spade to cash his ninth winner. He wins East's heart shift in dummy, cashes his diamond king and spade queen, and then leads a heart to dummy to cash the good spade.


