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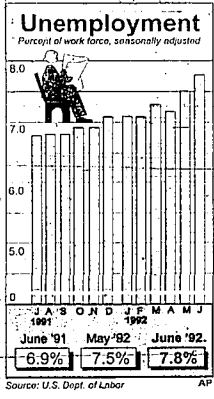
Area employment picture brightens

The Times-News experienced continued growth in employment during June," said a statement by department labor analysts. "However, the seasonal hiring which normally occurs in June took place in May due to the warm weather, resulting in a higher seasonally adjusted unemployment rate."

In Twin Falls, Jerome and Gooding counties, the jobless rate dropped from 6.5 percent in May to 5.8 percent in June, a decline of 2.5 percentage points since April.

"It's a little bit of everything," said Janelle Hyer, labor market analyst for the Department of Employment's state office, "construction under way, a lot of new businesses and things are going along pretty well in the Magic Valley."

Bad news could lead to Bush losing office

WASHINGTON — If George Bush is voted out of office in November, the post-mortem on his troubled presidency could wind up reading: Died, 8:30 a.m. EDT, July 2, 1992.

That was the moment on Thursday that the Bureau of Labor Statistics released its employment report for June, a surprising, disturbing package of bad news that described an economy far different from the rosy, recovering one that Bush has planned to ride into a second term.

More people were looking for work, the statistics said, and fewer people were working. After a few spring months when the economy seemed to be gaining a little energy, it was the opposite of what analysts had expected. The opposite of what Bush had hoped, the opposite of what the country had been waiting to hear, and it underscored the peculiar, discouraging tenacity of this two-year downturn.

Chinese ran experiments on POWs

WASHINGTON — The Department of Defense has collected evidence indicating that several dozen American servicemen who disappeared during the Korean War were captured and sent to China, where they were subjected to psychological and medical experiments before they died in captivity, the Los Angeles Times has learned.

The preliminary conclusions, based largely on information supplied by an Eastern European military defector, prompted the United States to send a high-level American delegation to Beijing in May to question the Chinese.

The Chinese government replied that it had no evidence to confirm the existence of such a facility.

Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney, who received the report in April, has turned the report over to the National Security Council and the Central Intelligence Agency, which was asked to investigate, sources said.

The Eastern European intelligence source told U.S. investigators from the Defense Intelligence Agency that American captives were transferred directly from Korea to a facility believed to have been located in the Manchurian city of Harbin.

At that facility, the report claims, American prisoners were subjected to tests designed to determine how regional and racial differences affected their ability to withstand torture and interrogation. A second source said that the testing may also have involved germ warfare agents.

The ultimate fate of the American captives is unclear, but the DIA concluded that some were executed and others "might have died" during the course of the experiments.

One knowledgeable government official called the DIA report extremely preliminary, noting it is based almost exclusively on the uncorroborated claims of a single East European military source, believed to be from Czechoslovakia.

But word of the report could heighten the renewed fervor over the fate of American POWs from foreign wars.

Thursday, the Senate passed a resolution, 96-0, urging President Bush to order the de-classification and disclosure of all declassified documents and files containing information about POWs and other U.S. servicemen still missing from the Vietnam War.

Also endorsed unanimously by the Senate Select Committee on POW/MIA Affairs, the resolution follows new allegations that the Pentagon has ignored evidence that some POWs may have been left behind at the end of the Vietnam war.

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Bush vetoes 'motor-voter' bill

WASHINGTON — President Bush vetoed legislation Thursday that would have allowed Americans to register to vote when they seek a driver's license or other government services; condemning the bill as "an open invitation to fraud and corruption."

It was Bush's 31st veto and, given the margins by which the measure passed the House and Senate, it appeared unlikely that its Democratic sponsors could muster enough votes to override his action.

"Once again, the will of the majority of Congress has been thwarted by a president who wields the veto pen and has just enough members willing to follow him over a cliff to sustain it," conceded Sen. Wendell H. Ford, D-Ky., the bill's chief sponsor. Ford said he would attempt an override and promised to continue to press enactment of a bill that would make voter registration easier.

The veto was not unexpected, but it was quickly denounced by one of the sponsoring groups, the League of Women Voters, as "a terrible gift from the president for our nation's birthday."

Centennial Park open for holiday

TWIN FALLS — The formal dedication remains a ways off, but the Centennial Waterfront Park has opened in time for the Fourth of July.

Actually, it quietly opened on Wednesday.

"It's time we opened it up. People have been clamoring for it," said Darrell Heider, Twin Falls County Parks and Recreation director.

The county had hoped to open the park at the end of May, but the work took longer than expected. County workers put some

finishing touches on the park Thursday afternoon in time for the holiday.

A slight breeze kicked up a few small waves as workers tried to place a buoy on the right side of the river upstream from the boat docks. The buoy would mark a no-wake zone from the docks.

"But the buoy only had a 10-foot chain and the water was deeper than that, so workers placed the buoy on the left side and will get a longer chain to place another buoy on the right side.

Small birds swooped along the river, while pigeons darted in and out of the rocks and bluffs of the Snake River Canyon recessed against a blue sky, the waterfront park looked prime for a lot of use.

"When people on the Perrine Bridge see people boating down here, they're going to want to boat on the river," Heider said. "This is going to be the greatest thing down here."

The county Parks and Recreation Commission has applications before it from companies that want to run tours on the river, Heider said. The commission will consider the applications at a meeting Monday night starting at 8:30 in the county office building at 246 3rd Ave. E.

Crews have yet to set three concrete picnic tables near the boat docks and Heider said he hopes to get electricity in to run a well and provide water. He's talking with an adjacent property owner about running a power cable under his land to get electricity to the park, Heider said.

The county built the park largely through a \$57,000 grant from the state Waterways Improvement Fund. The Idaho Department of Fish and Game also gave the county money to improve the access road to the park.

The Twin Falls Rotary Club raised money to buy seven acres adjacent to the waterfront park. The county hopes to develop this land as a "green area" next to the park.

Judge bars timber sales in Northwest owl habitat

SEATTLE — A federal judge on Thursday banned federal timber sales in northern-spotted-owl habitat in Oregon, Washington and Northern California, saying the Forest Service plans for the lands were inadequate.

U.S. District Judge William Dwyer's ruling came in a lawsuit filed by several environmental organizations to challenge a Forest Service plan, adopted March 3, for managing the spotted owl and its old-growth-forest habitat.

Dwyer said allowing timber sales to proceed would hurt the defendants as well as the owl.

"These public lands belong to the entire nation," he wrote. In enacting the laws that govern these lands, "Congress viewed them from the perspective not of a day but of generations."

Dwyer made permanent an injunction issued May 29, when he decided the Forest Service's environmental impact statement for its latest owl-protection plan was inadequate. He ordered the government to present by July 14 a schedule for a new impact statement that corrects defects in the previous one.

The Sierra Club Legal Defense Fund, which filed the lawsuit for assorted environmental groups, said it should take the government less than a year to complete a supplemental impact statement. The injunction would remain in effect until then, the plaintiffs said.

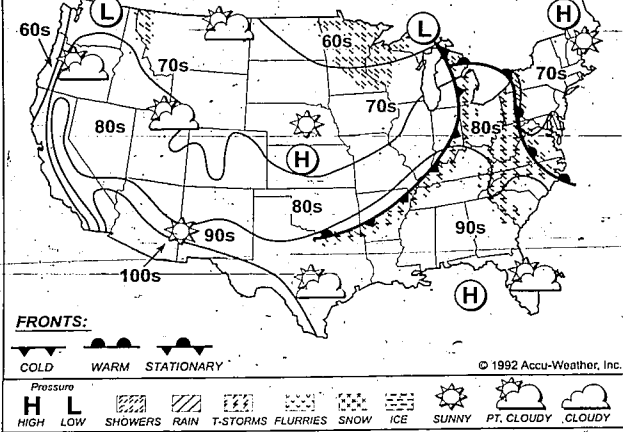
Dwyer found the Forest Service statement failed to address studies showing the owl population is dwindling.

Lines separate high temperature zones for the day.

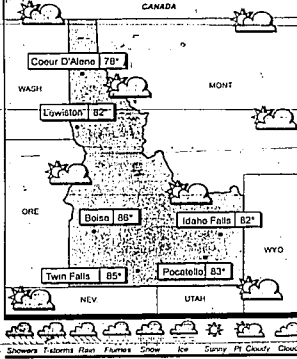

Thunderstorms extend from Plains to East Coast

Rain and thunderstorms were scattered from the Plains to the East Coast on Thursday, with damaging wind and hail in parts of the Midwest.

At midday, showers and thunderstorms extended over northern Oklahoma, the lower and central Missouri Valley, the upper Mississippi Valley and the upper Great Lakes.

Rain and thunderstorms also were scattered over the central Gulf of Mexico states, the Tennessee Valley, the Ohio Valley and the central and southern Atlantic Coast states.

Tornadoes touched down in Illinois near Quincy and Aurora, but no damage was reported, the National Weather Service said.

A tornado that touched down early in the day near Hastings, Neb., also caused no damage. But large hail broke windows, ripped leaves from trees and destroyed crops around Hildreth, Neb., about 20 miles south of Kearney, said police chief Dale Casper.

The hailstorm cut a 25-mile-long swath on the border of Franklin and Kearney counties, damaging corn, soybeans and wheat, said Alan Carr, extension agent for the two counties. Some farmers reported 100 percent destruction of their crops.

Wind gusted to more than 65 mph in thunderstorms at Cedar Rapids and Monticello, Iowa. Wind elsewhere in the state caused scattered damage to trees and utility poles.

In eastern South Dakota, a flooding warning was posted for the Big Sioux River between Sioux Falls and Aberdeen. The river created a major flood stage at Sioux Falls early after the 6 inches of rain fell on the region late Wednesday.

More than 4 inches of rain had fallen during the past two days in northeastern Minnesota and northwestern Wisconsin, where some basements and low-lying areas were flooded, the weather service said.

About 2.5 inches of rain fell during the night and Thursday morning across northeastern Georgia.

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U.S. still world's largest debtor

WASHINGTON (AP) — America solidified its position as the world's largest debtor nation last year as the recovery in U.S. stock and bond prices raised the value of foreigners' holdings in the United States, the government said Thursday.

When valued at current stock market prices, America's net debtor position rose to \$381.84 billion, up 40.4 percent from \$272.03 billion in 1990, according to the Commerce Department report.

The department said the size of the net debtor position was "bolstered by the stronger recovery in U.S. stock and bond prices than in those abroad."

Foreign holdings in the United States totaled \$2.49 trillion in 1991, up 10.7 percent from a year earlier, it said. At the same time, American investments overseas totaled \$2.11 trillion, up 6.6 percent from 1990.

The debt reflects the difference between what foreigners own in the United States and what Americans own overseas.

Britain remained the largest owner of direct assets in the United States in 1991 with holdings of \$106.06 billion. Japan was second, with holdings of \$86.66 billion. Direct assets are defined as at least 10 percent ownership of a business.

The figures were based on stock market prices, one of two measuring methods the Commerce Department has used for the last two years. U.S.

Figures show investments

WASHINGTON (AP) — Following are figures showing the net international investment position of the United States using different valuation methods.

A positive number means the United States was a net creditor with its holdings of overseas assets higher than holdings by foreigners of U.S. assets. A negative number means the United States was a net debtor.

The first figure represents the investment position using corporate stock prices to value

assets. The second figure represents the investment position with assets valued at their cost of replacement.

and foreign assets previously were valued at their historical purchase prices.

In the early 1980s, the United States was the world's largest creditor nation, a position now held by Japan.

But as the U.S. merchandise trade deficit grew, larger amounts of dollars were shifted overseas as payments for such items as foreign-made cars and television sets. Many of those dollars ended up as investments in U.S. buildings, entertainment companies and other holdings.

Many analysts contend the shift

eventually will lower Americans' standard of living as more and more money is transferred overseas to service foreign investments here.

By using the current replacement costs of assets, the other measuring method, America's net-debtor position was \$361.50 billion last year, up 22.6 percent from \$294.84 billion in 1990.

When using current costs, U.S. investments overseas totaled \$1.96 trillion, up 4.0 percent from 1990. Foreign-owned assets in the United States totaled \$2.32 trillion, a 6.6 percent advance.

Joseph Walsh, chief economist at Wells Fargo Bank headquarters in San Francisco, echoed financial and political people around country when he said "It's not all his fault, but everyone looks to the president (to be) a savior."

Walsh said he couldn't imagine much happening to save either the economy or the president in the next few months. "Probably the die is cast," he said. "Probably it's too late."

There are those who disagree, such as survey researcher Fabian Linden of the Conference Board in New York, who says a single month's employment survey doesn't make an economic trend or determine a political outcome.

But Linden added, "If it happened for a second month, I'd begin to really be concerned."

No modern presidential candidate from a sitting administration has won in a year without a downturn in the 12 months before the election.

Richard Nixon almost certainly lost in his razor-close contest with John F. Kennedy in 1960 because Nixon was vice president in an administration president over whom clearly was defeated in 1980 because of the economic troubles that beset the country throughout his tenure.

By that pattern, Bush could hope to survive only if unemployment in

October comes down to 6.4 percent, the level of October 1991. The BLS figure announced Thursday was 7.8 percent.

Other analysts measure his fate in other ways.

In Jacksonville, Fla., Barnett Bank economist Mark Vitner maintains a "computer" model that relates economic conditions to a president's public support. Last winter, that model forecast that Bush might win in a tight race if the economy in 1992 grew at an annual rate of 3 percent.

So far, Vitner noted, the economy's pace has been half that. "It's impossible to make up all that lost ground before the election," he said.

Bush was visibly disheartened Thursday. He called "the unemployment report bad news, suggested it reflected the past more than the future and blamed Congress for the country's economic trouble."

Later in the day, Vice President Dan Quayle declared in Little Rock, Ark., that the administration was "taking the offensive on economic growth" and asked "How high does unemployment have to go before the Democratic Congress passes the president's growth package?"

Political analyst William Schneider of the American Enterprise Institute said the administration would have a hard time persuading the public. "They're being forced to make an argument

that doesn't work — that everything is getting better except unemployment and that's a lagging indicator," he said.

"Americans believe the only thing that counts is unemployment... They're not going to believe the economy is recovering until they see the unemployment rate go down."

Even the newest cut in interest rates, ordered Thursday by the Federal Reserve, might not be of much help, either to the president or the country.

"The unfortunate part if you're in George Bush's shoes," said economist Kurt Karl of Philadelphia's WEFA Group, "is that lower interest rates take six months to have an impact."

The rates are currently at a 29-year low, but the succession of cuts that got them there hasn't done much to affect the willingness of consumers or business people to buy.

And that set of attitudes, not presidential policies or politics, is at the heart of the continuing slump.

Magic Valley economy is coping with a much larger work force made even larger by students seeking summer jobs, Hyer said.

Construction and retail are absorbing many of the job-seekers, she said.

Statewide, more than 480,000 people were on the job for the third consecutive month in June as Idaho's work force and number employed were the second-largest in history.

In Blaine County, the end of the spring slack season of joblessness falling as it usually does, but the change was more pronounced this year — indicating the revival of the national economy to which Blaine County's is so closely tied.

Unemployment was 4.5 percent in June, down from 5.8 percent in May. In June 1991, 6.6 percent of the county's work force were job-seekers.

Most of that improvement was tied to new construction. Through the first five months of 1992, Blaine County and the cities of Sun Valley, Ketchikan and Hailey issued building permits worth \$29.739 million in new construction, compared to \$19.239 million during the same

period in 1991. But in the Mini-Cassia area, where wide swings in joblessness are common, the change was for the worse.

In Cassia County, 11.1 percent of the work force was out of a job in June, up from 7.5 percent in May. The June unemployment rate a year ago was 6.3 percent, but because of the warmer winter and early spring, the cycle of slowdowns in the food-processing plants is different this year.

In Minidoka County, joblessness stood at 9.5 percent, up from 7.8 percent in May. In June 1991, the figure was 6.9 percent.

Idaho's third-of-a-point increase in unemployment matched the nation's, but the 7.8 percent rate across America was the highest in eight years as more people were out of work than at any time since October 1983.

The 1.7-percentage-point difference between the state and national jobless rates remained among the biggest spreads ever recorded.

The number of unemployed workers in Idaho increased 2,100 from the previous month to 32,000 in June. But the civilian labor force

expanded by 400 to 513,600 — second only to the 514,000 reported in April 1992 as outsiders continued seeking to take advantage of Idaho's robust economy.

Idaho's June 1991 unemployment rate was one-tenth of a point higher at 6.2 percent as the Employment Department recorded 5,700 more jobs this year than last.

Each of the state's seven regions, except the Magic Valley, reported lower unemployment levels in June than a year earlier. Jobless rates also were down from May in Canyon County and the Magic Valley.

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House military budget falls \$9 billion short of Bush package

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House approved a \$252 billion military budget on Thursday that punishes the Navy for its handling of the Tailhook sex abuse scandal by slashing 10,000 positions from its headquarters staff.

By a vote of 328-94 after just three hours of debate, the House adopted the post-Cold War package that is \$9 billion less than President Bush sought for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1.

The Senate is expected to complete its version of the bill in September. House and Senate members will then meet to write a final budget for Bush's signature.

Idaho's Democratic-congressmen split, with Richard Stallings voting against the measure and Larry LaRoeco voting in favor.

In all, 204 Democrats and 124 Republicans voted for the bill while 52 Democrats, 41 Republicans and a single independent voted against it.

Lawmakers have been outraged by the

Tailhook congestion scandal in which at least 26 women — half of them Navy officers — said they were fondled and disrobed while being pushed down a ganglet of drunken aviators in a Las Vegas hotel hallway.

Navy investigators found that officers closed ranks and impeded their inquiry into the incident. The Defense Department's inspector general's office is conducting its own probe.

Rep. Patricia Schroeder, D-Colo., an outspoken critic of the armed forces' treatment of women, lauded the job cuts during "this difficult period we've been going through with the military and whether or not our services members are going to be considered equal or not."

The bill targets 10,000 administrative jobs at the Navy's departmental and major command headquarters. The Navy has declined to say how many people it employs at its headquarters on the grounds that it doesn't comment on pending legislation.

Rep. Randall "Duke" Cunningham, R-Calif., a former instructor at the Navy's so-called Top Gun fighter pilot school, praised the women who have spoken out about the attacks but warned against punishing the innocent.

"I think we need to be very careful that we don't tar and feather honorable people that represent this country and have represented this country faithfully," Cunningham said.

During Thursday's debate, the House approved \$4.3 billion for the Strategic Defense Initiative, less than the \$5.4 billion the administration sought but the highest amount ever adopted.

Proponents of the so-called Star Wars effort narrowly turned aside an effort to cut \$700 million from the SDI budget. The vote was 217-201.

The House also approved \$4 billion for four B-2 stealth bombers in fiscal 1993. The House accepted to Bush's decision to end the

program at 20 planes and rejected, 248-173, an amendment to cut B-2 funds by \$27 billion.

With little debate and by voice vote, lawmakers also approved reductions of \$700 million in the overall budget cuts that would force the Defense Department to reduce its inventories and the use of outside consulting services.

Among the bill's provisions are: — Approximately \$2.6 billion for three Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyers, which amounts to one ship and \$900 million less than Bush requested.

The panel added \$1.2 billion for one Marine Corps amphibious assault ship, which is built in Mississippi, home state of the Appropriations Committee chairman, Democratic Rep. Jimmie Whitton.

— About \$1 billion for work on the new version of the Navy's F-A-18 fighter, \$3 million more than the Pentagon requested.

The appropriations bill also breaks ranks with the House-approved authorization package that called for just over \$500 million for the aircraft.

The authorization bill sets the spending levels while the appropriations legislation provides the money.

About \$77 billion for military personnel, \$184 million less than the Pentagon sought. The funds are for 1.8 million active duty personnel, 118,617 fewer than last year.

Meanwhile, the bill increases the number of National Guard and reserve personnel. Reserve units are located in nearly every congressional district and lawmakers consistently fight any reductions.

The bill provides for 1,072,850 National Guard and reserve positions, 60,150 more than the president requested.

Compromise provides more jobless benefits

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 1 million Americans who use up their jobless benefits could get up to 26 more weeks of coverage, and qualify for help more easily under compromise legislation the House approved Thursday.

The House rushed the measure to the Senate by an overwhelming 306-23 vote, just hours after House and Senate negotiators worked out the deal. Republicans said President Bush would sign the bill quickly.

The measure was completed as the government announced that the May unemployment rate swelled to an eight-year high of 7.8 percent. With the political pressure intensified by that report, Bush dropped veto threats aimed at earlier versions of the legislation.

"The president of the United States is going to sign this unemployment bill for two reasons: unemployment is up, and his popularity is down," said Rep. Thomas Downey, D-N.Y., who helped write the measure.

15 states qualify for maximum

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fifteen states would qualify for the maximum 26 weeks of extra jobless benefits under the unemployment bill Congress was rushing to President Bush on Thursday.

The number of weeks of extra benefits available to a state depends on the amount of joblessness it has.

States receiving 26 weeks: Alaska, California, Connecticut, Idaho, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Washington, West Virginia.

All others would qualify for 20 weeks of extra benefits, and is usually considerably lower than the more commonly used unemployment rate.

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Panel OKs millionaire surtax bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Democratic-controlled House Ways and Means Committee on Thursday set up another election-year confrontation with President Bush, approving a major child welfare and anti-hunger bill paid for by a surtax on millionaires.

"We are going to let the people decide if they want to help children and how they want to pay for it," said Rep. Mike Andrews, D-Texas, a sponsor of the bill.

"This is all a charade," responded Rep. Bill Archer, R-Texas, because it is obvious that Bush will veto any increase in income taxes.

If the bill makes its way through Congress later this year, Bush would have to decide whether his opposition to raising taxes on more than 600,000 millionaires is important enough to kill.

\$3.5 billion over five years for improving conditions for foster children and other child-welfare assistance.

\$3.5 billion to fund the Mickey Leland hunger program, aimed at channeling food to families with children that are on the brink of homelessness.

\$1.2 billion for reducing the budget deficit.

The 10 percent surtax would apply to the tax paid on incomes exceeding \$1 million a year. The provision was among several tax increases on the wealthy that prompted Bush in March to veto a bill that included a middle-income tax reduction.

Rep. Fred Grandy, R-Iowa, tried to strike the surtax from the welfare bill. He lost on a 22-14 vote, with Rep. J.J. Pickle, D-Texas, joining the panel's 13 Republicans in opposing the tax.

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South reports most new AIDS cases in country

ATLANTA (AP) — AIDS is increasing faster in the South than in any other part of the country, federal health authorities reported Thursday.

The South reported the largest number of new AIDS cases in 1991 and the largest increase in cases from 1990, the Centers for Disease Control said.

"This is no longer a regional problem of New York and California, or the East Coast and West Coast and major metropolitan areas, but it now extends to the small cities and the rural areas," said Dr. James Curran, who heads the CDC's AIDS programs.

In 1991, 15,761 AIDS cases were reported in the South, up 10.2 percent over the 14,301 cases reported in 1990.

Nationwide, the number of cases increased 5 percent — 45,506 reported last year, up from 43,352 reported in 1990.

Still, most AIDS patients live in the Northeast, although numbers reported there declined slightly in 1991, the latest year statistics are available.

The region reported 13,435 cases, down 0.9 percent from the 13,551 reported in 1990.

The Northeast has the nation's highest AIDS rate — 26.3 AIDS cases per 100,000 people, compared with 18.7 in the West, 18.2 in the South and 7.4 in the Midwest.

The second highest increase in cases reported in 1991 was in the Midwest, up 8.6 percent from 4,078 to 4,428. The West reported 10,408 cases, up 3.7 percent from 9,686.

Curran said researchers had expected the jump in the South because the number of Southerners infected with HIV, the virus, that causes AIDS, has risen in recent years.

But the jump will test the social systems and health care facilities in the South, a mostly rural region with areas in severe need of basic medical care.

"A lot of the issues grappled with and dealt with in the 1980s in very large cities now have to be dealt with in the small towns and rural areas," Curran said.

The largest numbers of AIDS cases — 52.7 percent — still are attributed to the spread of HIV through homosexual and bisexual men. But those numbers decreased last year by 0.4 percent.

Cases among women, however, jumped 15 percent last year, from 5,258 to 6,045, compared with a 3.6 percent jump for men, from 38,094 to 39,461. Female and heterosexual male intravenous drug users had a 9.8 percent increase.

Cheney appropriates \$1.5 billion for development of V-22 Osprey

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney agreed Thursday to free an estimated \$1.5 billion for the V-22 Osprey, although he continued to express serious reservations about the experimental aircraft.

The decision temporarily ends the tug-of-war between Congress and the Pentagon over the Osprey, which takes off like a helicopter and flies like a plane.

"This is clearly a victory for the V-22," Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, said shortly after meeting at the Pentagon with Cheney and congressional Osprey supporters.

Rep. Curt Weldon, R-Pa., called it "a complete ... win," while Rep. Pete Geren, D-Texas, a leading advocate of the aircraft, said, "It's clear that Secretary Cheney has seen the writing on the wall."

The tilt-rotor aircraft is being developed by Bell Helicopter Textron in Fort Worth, Texas, and Boeing Helicopters outside of Philadelphia

in Delaware County, Pa. Gramm said he believed "we are on track for a very strong, significant production run," but the debate over the Osprey's future is sure to be renewed next year, once testing of the V-22 is completed.

In a letter to Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, Cheney emphasized that the Pentagon will continue to look at both the V-22 and new helicopter technology to meet the military's needs, leaving a "final decision ... would be left for future years, when the value of each approach has been shown," Cheney wrote.

Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said Thursday, "We continue to oppose producing this V-22, which we believe is unaffordable."

"We're asking Congress to let us go ahead and pursue some alternative to the V-22 at the same time we are working at the V-22," Williams said at a briefing. "Let the two have a head-to-head competition and see which one works better."

Cheney for years has tried to kill the Osprey program over the objections of Congress, and the Marine Corps, which is seeking to replace its aging fleet of Vietnam-era CH-46 helicopters with the V-22. Several accidents have been attributed to structural weaknesses in the CH-46 helicopter.

The defense secretary earlier had refused to spend the \$790 million Congress appropriated last year for the V-22, contending the aircraft was not affordable and would cost an estimated \$30 billion over the next decade.

Researchers: Scavenger cells may be cause of osteoporosis

WASHINGTON (AP) — Indianapolis researchers believe they have found the reason women after menopause often develop weak bones — the condition called osteoporosis. The finding may lead to new drugs, to combat the disorder.

Dr. Stavros C. Manolagas of the Veterans Medical Center and Indiana University School of Medicine in Indianapolis said that laboratory studies show that lack of the hormone estrogen leads to an overproduction of bone scavenger cells that carve pits and craters throughout the skeleton.

The result is pain, fragile bones that break easily, and a spinal slumping that might include the characteristic "widow's hump" seen often in osteoporosis patients. A report on the research is to be published Friday in the journal Science.

Manolagas said in a telephone interview that studies with mice show that the lack of estrogen stimulates production of interleukin-6, one of the host of chemicals in the immune system.

Interleukin-6, or IL6, then stimulates the growth of cells called osteoclasts, he said. And the osteoclasts are the culprits in bone degeneration.

Manolagas said the normal function of osteoclasts is to find and resorb.

move old bone cells. "They look like a Pacman," he said. "They move slowly over the surface and excavate the old bone and leave behind craters." Under a microscope, said Manolagas, researchers can see a trail of pits left in the wake of the osteoclasts.

A bone formation cell, called an osteoclast, usually follows the bone

scavenging cells and fills in the pits and craters with new bone. "There is a constant interplay and balance between the removal of the old bone and the filling of the good bone by the osteoblasts," said Manolagas.

The problem comes when a woman goes into menopause and stops the normal production of the hormone estrogen.

After that, said Manolagas, the balance between bone scavengers and bone builders is lost. "There are suddenly so many more osteoclasts than osteoblasts that the bone builders are overwhelmed," he said. It's rather like a street crew that finds pot holes are being made faster than they can be filled.

Estrogen, said the researcher, apparently plays a role in suppressing the effect of IL6 and, thus, helps keep the actions in balance. Without the estrogen, the bone-destroying cells dominate and slowly erode the skeleton.

Many women take estrogen pills to prevent osteoporosis, but, until now, it was not known exactly what role the hormone played in the loss of bone mass.

Man chases gang, dies later

DENVER (AP) — A man with a history of heart trouble suffered a fatal attack while trying to fend off rock-throwing mob outside his home. Three people were arrested.

Donald G. Martinez, 51, died about half an hour after the altercation began early Wednesday at a convenience store next to his home, police spokesman John Schnittgrund said Thursday.

"Authorities haven't determined what charges will be filed against the three attackers, two of whom are juveniles. They provoked the heart attack. It was like sticking a gun or a knife in him," said Margaret Martinez, Martinez's daughter-in-law.

The confrontation began when Martinez's son, the son's girlfriend and Margaret Martinez walked from their home to the store and were harassed by five suspected gang members.

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
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Tax war, ruble unification snarl Russian economy

MOSCOW (AP)—Russian leaders plunged into a war over taxes Thursday, the prime minister warned of hyperinflation if they are cut, and the legislative speaker said foreign investors would stay away if they aren't.

The debate came a day after Russia unified its snarl-of-exchange rates, to mixed response from economists. The ruble strengthened Thursday at the bi-weekly currency auction, moving to 134.8 ruble per dollar from 144 last week.

It also came after President Boris Yeltsin launched a new phase of his privatization plan to convert thousands of state firms into public companies whose stock could be traded by employees and others.

The reforms were Russia's most dramatic since Yeltsin lifted price controls on Jan. 2, sending costs soaring as much as 1,000 percent. Many steps were demanded by the International Monetary Fund as a prerequisite for loans.

But Prime Minister Yegor Gaidar warned those loans could be further jeopardized if the legislature succeeds in slashing Russia's income tax and value-added tax. Such cuts would sink the government further into debt and boost inflation, he said, something the IMF doesn't like.

"We won't be able to cut state expenses to compensate, and the country will be hit by hyperinflation," Gaidar said in an emotional speech.

"Our creditors will immediately stop talks because such a decision would break a mutual understanding on reasonable monetary policies," Gaidar said the government would lose a third of its revenues if the legislature approved the proposal to cut the 28 percent value-added tax in

Report: Yeltsin receives four-fold pay raise

MOSCOW (AP)—The economy is in disarray and thousands of workers are going unpaid because of the country's cash shortage, but lawmakers Thursday decided to give President Boris Yeltsin a four-fold pay increase.

Yeltsin's new monthly salary of 18,900 rubles amounts to about \$147, the ITAR-Tass news agency reported. The raise, approved by the Supreme Soviet legislature, went into effect retroactively to June 1.

The decision fixed the president's pay at 21 times the minimum wage. Yeltsin's previous salary, according to the latest

available figure, was 4,000 rubles, set in June 1991.

Vice President Alexander Rutskoi also got a raise, to 17,100 rubles, or about

\$126. The raises came the same day the daily newspaper Izvestia reported that workers at a top government research center have gone without pay for nine months.

Lawmakers led by legislative speaker Ruslan Khasbulatov — an occasional critic of the government — want to provide relief for millions of people barely able to make ends meet in the fledgling Russian market economy.

"The world financial circles ... say directly that under such tax pressures, there are no prospects for direct investment," Khasbulatov said, his voice booming in the chamber.

"There is the point of view of amateurs, pundits, professors and journalists," Gaidar retorted, "and there is the view of people who actually control the money."

The Supreme Soviet gave preliminary approval to the income tax cut but postponed a vote on lowering the VAT until the government works out a different rate.

Gaidar later said the decision was "not harmful."

A joint legislative-government panel next considers the income tax cut before a second vote in the legislature.

Yeltsin's privatization decree said some state firms must be converted into stock companies by November.

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) President F.W. de Klerk on Thursday accused the ANC of trying to seize power and warned of a crack-down to prevent the nation from "sliding into anarchy."

De Klerk's harsh attack on the African National Congress came after prospects for a quick resumption of black-white negotiations on abolishing apartheid and ending white-minority rule.

The ANC broke off all talks last week to protest the June 17 massacre of more than 40 blacks in the Boipatong township south of Johannesburg. It has launched a campaign of demonstrations and strikes to try to bring down the government.

"They want to force their views on the rest of our society through confrontation and mass mobilization," de Klerk said in a speech to the nation-wide. "The government will not hesitate to take all steps necessary to

Communists win big in Mongolia

ULAN BATOR, Mongolia (AP) — Communists won 70 of 76 legislative seats in nationwide elections, according to official returns released Thursday that reflect the country's anxiety over the hardships of free-market reform.

Support for the Communists, however, was not as overwhelming as the numbers suggest. Lkhavagsuren, chairman of the Central Election Commission, said 43 percent of the votes went to non-Communist candidates.

Contenders in individual districts were elected by a simple majority.

The Communists have pledged to continue Mongolia's 2-year-old transition from a socialist to a free-market economy, but are likely to

see the election results as a mandate to slow the wrenching process.

Lkhavagsuren, who like most Mongolians uses only one name, announced the final results of Sunday's vote at a news conference.

A coalition of the three main opposition parties — the Democrats, the United Party and the National Progress Party — won four seats. A Social Democrat won one seat, as did a Communist Party member who ran as an independent.

The Communist Party, formally called the Mongolian People's Revolutionary Party, held this Central Asian herding nation in an iron grip for seven decades, following directives from Moscow. In 1990, bowing to calls for democratic reform, the Communists held Mongolia's first free elections and invited opposition parties into a coalition government that began dismantling the socialist economy.

Most prices have been freed, central economic plans have been discarded and the country's livestock herds — and some businesses — have been privatized.

But the transition coincided with an abrupt halt in barter trade and aid from the former Soviet Union that created acute shortages of almost everything.

Prices have soared, unemployment is up and many Mongolians spend hours each day trying to buy food, now strictly rationed.

Dissidents claim Saddam crushed military coup attempt

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)— Iraqi dissidents Thursday said a mechanized brigade of elite Republican Guard troops this week tried to topple Saddam Hussein but were crushed by forces loyal to the Iraqi leader.

The report could not be independently confirmed. The Baghdad government has banned most foreign news organizations, including The Associated Press, from operating in Iraq.

U.N. officials and Arab diplomats at the world body's headquarters in New York had no information on the report. Nor did U.S. State Department spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler.

Jordanian drivers returning to Amman from Iraq Thursday said all was calm in Baghdad.

If true, the coup attempt would be the first reported in more than a year and would follow reports of intensified covert U.S. aid to Saddam's opponents in an effort to end his rule.

The Republican Guards, Saddam's best troops, are a pillar of the Baghdad government, and if one of their units did stage a coup attempt it could signal a serious weakening of support for the Iraqi ruler within the military.

The dissident Iraqi National Congress said the brigade, commanded by Brig. Gen. Sabri Mahmud, moved toward Baghdad but was defeated in a battle on the northwestern outskirts of the capital on Monday.

The group made the claim in a statement sent by

facsimile from its London headquarters to the AP.

A senior Kurdish rebel source, speaking on condition of anonymity, said he had received similar reports from Iraqi contacts in Jordan and Turkey. He said he had reports of a wave of arrests following the coup attempt.

Baghdad-based diplomats, who talked with the AP in Cyprus and Jordan on condition they were not quoted by name, also reported widespread arrests.

The statement from the Iraqi-dissident group made no mention of casualties in the fighting. But it said that Mahmud, from the northern oil city of Mosul, was killed when his men were intercepted by Saddam's Special Security battalions, drawn from the Republican Guards.

An Iraqi mechanized brigade usually has about 4,000 men split into four combat battalions, and is equipped with about 150 armored personnel carriers and often some T-54 or T-62 tanks.

It was not clear why a single brigade, with little heavy armor, would move against Saddam in his heavily defended capital. Diplomats and other sources have said Baghdad is ringed by 25,000 Republican Guards and hundreds of top-line T-72 tanks and helicopter gunships.


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Molesters face tough penalties

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Men who paw or molest women on crowded subway trains and buses or in other public places would face up to a year in prison under a draft law announced by the government on Thursday.

Those who sexually harass employees or subordinates at work could get up to two years in prison.

The proposed law is in response to increasing complaints by South Korean women that crowded subways make molestation almost unavoidable. Department began deploying 328 special police officers on subways to stop molestations and other crimes.

Many Korean women are too shy to drive away the offenders, and Park Song-Kyu, a policy planner of the governing Democratic-Liberal Party, said they might hesitate to press charges under the proposed law.

Will CSI get a fair shake on state education money?

State Board of Education President Karl Shurtliff, never a man to shy away from controversy, has waded into another one.

Why not, he suggests, transform the Eastern Idaho Technical College in Idaho Falls into a state-funded community college and in the process have the state pay for running the College of Southern Idaho and North Idaho College?

As if stands, property taxpayers in Twin Falls, Jerome and Kootenai counties pick up the biggest part of the tab for CSI and North Idaho. The state kicks in about \$8.5 million a year peanuts in a \$139 million higher education budget.

That means, of course, that John Q. Propertyowner in Twin Falls is subsidizing the cost of education at Boise State University while the taxpayer in Boise isn't returning the favor.

Shurtliff doesn't think that's right, and we agree. For most of its 26 years, CSI has had to cope with steadily rising enrollment with flat or falling property tax revenues.

At the same time, CSI and NIC are always at the tail end of the pipeline for state funding. If you doubt that, visit the tiny room that serves as a library at CSI.

For longstanding reasons rooted in the fierce regional rivalries that underlie Idaho politics, CSI and NIC

are considered lesser lights in Idaho's higher education firmament. For a senator from Pocatello or a representative from Moscow, opening the state's checkbook to pay for what are still perceived to be institutions that compete with those lawmakers' hometown schools may take more political maturity than they can muster.

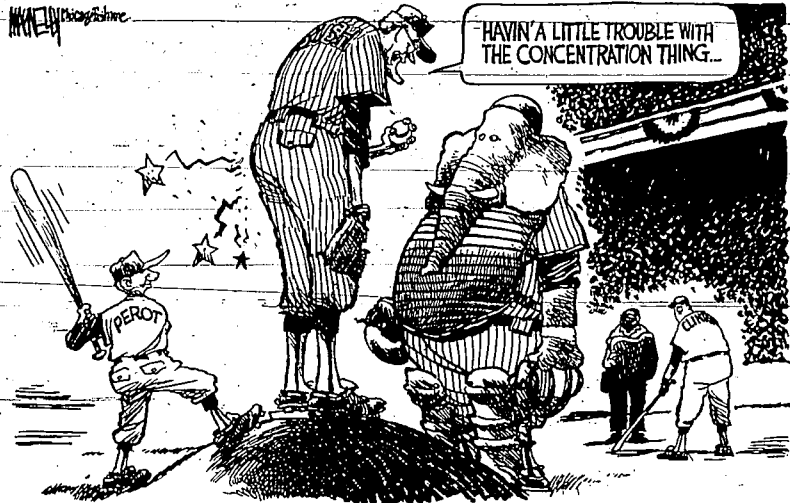
But the hard reality is that the days of paying for education with property tax revenue in Idaho are numbered, and the end may come sooner rather than later.

The property tax is a recipe for inequality, something that will become starkly evident if the voters pass the 1 Percent Initiative in November.

Most school districts, including the CSI and NIC, community college districts, can't operate with that kind of limit, and the Legislature will be forced to come up with the money from some other source.

The state's public school system will move inexorably toward 100 percent state funding, and so will the junior colleges.

Shurtliff and his colleagues on the state board realize that, of course, maybe his idea of a fully state-funded junior college in Idaho Falls will finally convince enough legislators that where you live should have nothing to do with how much you can learn.



Gay ban aims to keep fighting spirit

Rep. Pat Schroeder of Colorado wanted to give women "equality and opportunity" by making them ruckus-toting grunts. Now she aims at putting homosexuals in the foxholes to end the final bastion of discrimination.

"I cannot think of a better way to destroy fighting spirit and gut U.S. combat effectiveness. My credentials for saying this are over four decades' experience as a soldier or military reporter.

Despite the ban on service by homosexuals, gays have long served in the armed forces, some with distinction. Many perhaps felt no sexual inclination toward their heterosexual fellow soldiers. If they did, they had their buddies' attitudes and the Uniform Code of Military Justice hanging over their heads. Still, I have seen countless examples of inappropriate and morale-busting behavior.

In Italy, for example, in the postwar occupation, a gay soldier could not keep his hands off other soldiers in my squad. He struck discipline, mangled trust among squad members and zored out morale. In the same unit, the personnel manager was gay. He was a superbly trained technician, a soldier in exchange for kicking up their test scores.

During my second tour in the Korean War, a gay commanding officer gave combat awards to his lovers who had never been on the line. In Vietnam, a young captain in my unit was asked by the commander to go to bed with him. This almost destroyed the spirit of a platoon.

These are not isolated incidents: During my Army career I saw countless officers and NCOs who couldn't stop themselves from hitting on soldiers. The absoluteness of their authority, the lack of privacy, enforced intimacy and a 24-hour duty day made sexual urges difficult to control. The objects of their affection were impressionable lads who sometimes ended up in a gay relationship they might not have sought.

Sure, banning gays from defending their country is discriminatory. But discriminations are necessary when a larger public purpose is being served. Civilian standards of fairness and equality don't apply down where the body bags are filled.

On the battlefield, spirited men who place their lives in their buddies' hands are the most essential element in warfare. The members of such combat teams trust one another totally.

One doesn't need to be a field marshal to understand that sex between services members undermines those critical factors that produce discipline, military orders, spirit and combat effectiveness. Mix boys and girls, gays and straights in close quarters such as the barracks or the battlefield, and both sexual contact and the consequent breakdown of morale are inevitable.

Many bright people are pushing for the ban to be lifted. I suspect that few if any have been down in the trenches.

Unfortunately, most of the top brass won't sound off. They duck and weave and offer hollow and spurious Pentagonese double-talk reasons for continuing the ban — reasons that they're "against it, but sounding off would be the kiss of death, like opposing women in combat — a career killer, you know."

A serving lieutenant general recently wrote to me, "Ask Pat Schroeder if she'd like her kids under a gay first sergeant who might use his rank and authority to demand sexual favors from his subordinate 18-year-old kids. We just had that occur in my command."

No doubt advocates of gays in combat units will argue that they don't approve of demanding sexual favors and that the first sergeant deserved what he got — a court-martial. The problem is, all the court-martials and regulations in the world can't prevent the kind of morale problems that a change in the law is bound to create. Sure, the first sergeant is serving hard time at Fort Leavenworth, but Pat Schroeder and the two dozen lawmakers who support her bill must also ask themselves what happened to the morale and fighting spirit of his unit.

Knigge leaves memory of progressive legislator

If the quality of a person's life can be measured by the courage of his convictions, Lawrence Knigge was a wealthy man indeed.

His death by his own hand Tuesday night was a tragedy not just for his family but for the people of his West End district who elected him to the Idaho House of Representatives for five terms in the late-1970s and early 1980s.

For Knigge was a man who was not afraid to say what he believed, and those views were in the minority in the Magic Valley legislative delegation in the early 1980s.

In the Republican supermajority elected to the Idaho House in 1980 on Ronald Reagan's coattails, education funding took a back seat. Knigge, a former Filer School Board member, didn't think that was right.

He fought a hard, and sometimes

lonely, fight for Idaho's kids in the House GOP Caucus and on the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee. He often disagreed with the two most powerful Republicans at the time, Speakers Ralph Olmstead and Tom Stivers, fellow members of the Twin Falls County delegation.

Knigge and a north Idaho Republican named Tom Boyd became the prototypical steelheads, the go-against-the-flow label later adopted by the insurgent Republicans who elected Boyd speaker and took control of the House in 1987.

In so doing, Knigge maintained an old and honorable tradition of Republican conservatism in Twin Falls County, the notion that the interests of your constituents ought to outweigh the purity of your ideology.

That's not a bad epitaph for any elected official.

Sunday's front-page article reminded me of a story of three dogs walking downtown Berger. They passed the meat market and saw a side of beef ribs hanging in the window.

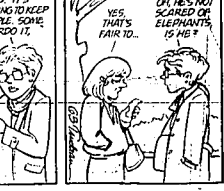

Canadian infantrymen bolster Sarajevo airport defense

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Canadian infantrymen who had to threaten to fight at a Serb roadblock reached Sarajevo's airport Thursday to bolster defenses for the international airlift of food for the besieged Bosnian capital.

Meanwhile, Milan Panic, a Serb who became a wealthy American businessman, announced he agreed to be premier of the smaller Yugoslavia. The appointment was seen as an effort to ease Western pressures over Serbia's alleged role in fomenting ethnic fighting in Bosnia and other former Yugoslav states.

The United States said two Air Force C-130 cargo planes, each able to carry more than 20 tons of supplies, would begin relief flights Friday for the nearly 400,000 people still in Sarajevo, which has been under siege by Serbs for 87 days. The European Community said it was staging a planned six-plane operation.

Machine-gun and rifle fire rattled in nearby villages as the convoy of 350 Canadians, dusty and ruffled from a three-day trip, took up positions along the airport's runways, in buildings and at entrances to the field.

They joined 80 U.N. soldiers who opened the airport Monday and 125 French commandos who flew in

Wednesday. An additional 650 Canadians were still approaching the city Thursday evening after a 180-mile journey through mountainous areas held by troops loyal to newly independent Bosnia and by Serb militiamen opposed to its secession. It was not clear if they would camp near the city overnight.

U.N. officials said two planes arrived Thursday with more aid. One Norwegian plane brought 15.5 tons of American medical supplies, the first of 45 tons expected to arrive in the next two days. A French plane carried food, and two more were expected Friday.

U.N. officials have said 15 tons of food are enough to feed 30,000 people for one day.

French combat rations were distributed Thursday to refugees at the Dzevad Haveric school in a neighborhood of narrow streets and picturesque old houses, many torn by artillery shells.

The distribution of food on Wednesday was hampered by Serb snipers.

U.N. Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali said the situation in Sarajevo had improved some but that the Serbs had not turned over all their heavy weapons as promised. Lt. Col. Michel Jones, the Canadian commander, told Maj. Gen.

Lewis MacKenzie, the U.N. commander in Sarajevo, that his troops had to use the threat of force to pass one Serb roadblock. He said the convoy finally moved past the blockade without permission from the Serbs, but no shots were fired.

"It looked like we were going to have to fight our way through," said a Canadian soldier sitting nearby on an armored personnel carrier. He declined to give his name.

Jones told reporters later that the troops were stopped at the roadblock in Konar on Tuesday. He said after a tense confrontation, he withdrew the convoy of 100 armored personnel carriers and trucks about 12 miles for the night.

Wednesday, the 350 Serb commander threatened to fire on the Canadians if they tried to pass. Jones said he told the commander: "If you shoot, we'll return fire." He said the Canadians then moved on.

MacKenzie said he hoped to have eight relief flights a day landing at the airport soon.

"The situation at the airport is still very tense. But when planes land it seems to stop, so maybe we should bring in more planes," he said.

But Ejjup Ganic, a member of the Bosnian presidency, said: "Opening the airport is not going to get enough aid in. We need roads."

Brits tear hair out over wig situation

LONDON (AP) — They're wrangling over wigs, protesting over perukes. Britain's judges and senior lawyers cannot decide whether to toss away more than 200 years of tradition along with their curly gray hairpieces.

Barbara Mills, recently appointed director of public prosecutions, believes the horsehair helmets copied from the French court in the 17th century are an anachronism that alienates lawyers from ordinary people.

The new Speaker of the House of Commons, Betty Boothroyd, refuses to wear the shoulder-length wig adopted by her male predecessors, preferring "to be comfortable when I'm working."

Spurred by this rumbling in the ranks, Lord Taylor, the Lord Chief Justice and a declared abolitionist, has commissioned a survey on judges' and lawyers' preferences on wigs and the traditional black gowns.

The Bar Council, representing senior lawyers, will discuss the matter this month.

There are few calls for the scrapping of gowns, legal attire since the Middle Ages. But the wigs provoke a fiery response.

Lord Williams, chairman of the Bar Council, says they "should be sent back to the pantomime box."

"In hot weather they have been known to smell, and not exactly of the purest aromas," Lord Richard, a judge, complained during a House of Lords debate last month.

He confessed he had always disliked wigs during his 37-year legal career, finding them "insanitary, scratchy and extremely hot."

Lord Campbell, also a lawyer, countered that wigs convey "an air of dignity, anonymity and authority."

Lord Morris boomed that "in terms of discomfort, modern lawyers are rank amateurs. The patron saint of lawyers, St. Ivo, wore a hair shirt... (and) took his resting on a straw mat with a book or stone by way of a pillow."

"As an Englishman, I want tradition to last for a million years," said Bill Hale, the plaintiff in a case at London's Law Courts. Brian Green, another litigant, said scrapping legal dress "takes away our heritage."

An unscientific survey by the law magazine "Counsel" of 160 people appearing at Oxford Crown Court in June found 84 percent felt more confident with lawyers in costume. Sixty-eight percent of barristers, or lawyers, and 77 percent of judges at Oxford County Court felt more confident in wig and gown, "Counsel" said.

Yugoslav-born American accepts post

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Yugoslav-born American businessman stepped into the cauldron of his native country's politics Thursday, announcing he had accepted the job of prime minister.

Milan Panic, a U.S. citizen who owns a pharmaceuticals company in Costa Mesa, Calif., said he would work to end the fighting in successor states of the fractured Yugoslav federation, set up prompt free elections and restructure the socialist economy on a free enterprise basis.

Panic (pronounced PAHN-itch) told a news conference in Washington that he was leaving for Belgrade on Thursday night to accept the post from President Dobrica Cosic.

State Department spokeswoman

Margaret Tutwiler said, "We do not endorse, support or have any views about his serving as prime minister. It is entirely Mr. Panic's decision."

Tutwiler said the 62-year-old businessman had been given a license by the Treasury Department to allow him to travel to Belgrade without violating U.N. sanctions imposed to stop Yugoslavia's dominant Serbs from fighting to carve out territory in Bosnia.

The license is granted with the express condition that he not en-

courage, condone or tolerate a violation of U.N. sanctions by his government," she said.

The State Department will not prejudice the issue of whether it is legal for Panic to serve as an official in a foreign government and retain his U.S. citizenship, she said, calling it a complicated legal question.

She noted that Armenia's foreign minister, Raffi Hovannisian, is a U.S. citizen.

Panic would become prime minister over the republics of Serbia and Montenegro, the remnants of Yugoslavia after Croatia, Slovenia, Bosnia and Macedonia declared independence.

Panic said he had support "across the entire political and cultural spectrum." But it was not clear

where he stood with Serbian President Slobodan Milosevic, the main force in Yugoslav politics; Milosevic is a former communist leader and the target of the U.N. sanctions.

"I believe that my becoming prime minister will contribute to an ending of those factors which led to the international sanctions being imposed," Panic said.

He said his government would work with the United Nations "to create an environment in which the sanctions can be removed."

In addition, Panic said his government will ensure that no regular Yugoslav army troops are in neighboring former Yugoslav republics. "The government will strongly oppose any activity by any irregulars," he said.

Norway might leave whale group

GLASGOW, Scotland (AP) — Pro-whaling Norway said Thursday it will consider quitting the International Whaling Commission in frustration at what it considers the group's domination by conservation nations.

The 38-member commission weighed a plan to set commercial whaling quotas Thursday but put off any action until the closing day of its meeting on Friday. Since the commission shows no sign of lifting a moratorium on whaling ordered in 1982, no quotas are likely to be set soon.

Norway announced Monday that it would resume commercial whal-

ing next spring in defiance of the moratorium.

Iceland, another supporter of resuming whaling, withdrew from the commission Monday, but said it had no immediate plans to start hunting whales again.

In response, the United States, Australia, Finland, Germany and Switzerland backed a resolution seeking additional safeguards to protect whales.

Popular support for whaling is strong in Norway, Iceland and Japan, which have a tradition of catching and eating whale. Japan and Norway also want to regain whaling industry jobs and profits.

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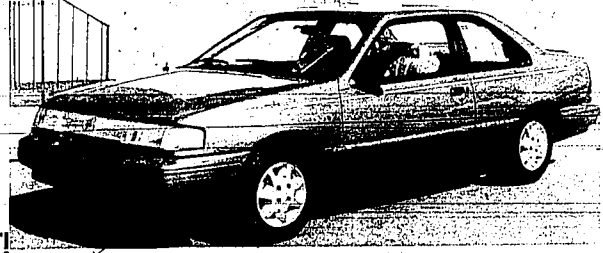

Business likes Cameron, McRoberts

TWIN FALLS — Idaho industry won more of its legislative battles in 1992 than the previous year, according to the state's business lobbying organization.

The annual Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry report card on lawmakers produced an average 74.4 percent score in the Senate, compared with 65.5 percent in 1991.

In the House, the percentage of votes cast IACI's way rose slightly, to 67 percent from 65 percent.

Leading the pack were Sen. Jerry Thorne, R-Nampa, and Rep. Phil Childers, R-Boise, who received 100 percent ratings from the business lobby. Sen. Brian Donessley, D-Boise, got the Senate's lowest score, 55 percent.

Four House Democrats from northern Idaho tied for last place with 44 percent

scores: Monica Beaudoin and Jim Stoiichell of Sandpoint; Marvin Vandenberg of Coeur d'Alene and Eugene White of Cataldo.

Generally speaking, Magic Valley legislators ranked above average in support of IACI positions, and several were close to the top.

Republican senators Dean Cameron of Rupert and Joyce McRoberts of Twin Falls

both voted IACI's way 92 percent of the time, and Russ Newcomb of Twin Falls received an 82 percent rating.

Denton Darrington, D-Declo, and Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, received 75 percent ratings. John Peavey, D-Carey, had the lowest score among area senators, 67 percent.

Among area House members, Jim Kenyon of Albion scored 83-percent and Celia Gould of Buhl received an 82 percent. Both are Republicans.

The lowest scores were received by Mark Stubbs, R-Twin Falls (65 percent), Clint Stennett, D-Ketchum (61 percent), and Patric Nafziger, D-Wendell (53 percent).

Voting records tell only part of the story, said IACI President Steve Altens of Boise.

"Regardless of how they vote on the floor, there are ways in committee work or behind the scenes that legislators can be helpful to the business community," Altens said. "For example, Sen. Bruce Sweeney (D-

Leiston) and Sen. Marguerite McLaughlin (D-Orfino) don't appear at the top of our voting record, but both are top-quality legislators and we have excellent working relations with them in the Legislature."

Topping the business lobby's list of concerns was avoiding what it viewed as a hasty overreaction to the 1 Percent Initiative.

Following IACI's stance, lawmakers changed property tax laws on the fringes but refused to approve substantial changes like local option taxing authority or shifting the property tax burden from residential to commercial property.

But IACI also found itself allied with proponents of measures to use recycled materials in highway construction, to consolidate election dates and to produce air quality regulations to regulate radioactive waste shipments to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Woman reports rough robbery outside mall

Christine A. Friel, 41, said she had left the ShopKo store at 6:10 p.m. when two people with long hair — she believes both were female but she isn't sure — stopped her and asked for directions to Jerome, Sgt. Steve Ryan of the Twin Falls police department said.

When Friel led her arm to point, one of the women slapped her very hard and the other jerked the purse from her arm, Ryan said.

The two fled with the purse around the corner of the mall. Friel said she drove around the building but did not spot them, Ryan said. The robbers got away with about \$150 cash and \$325 worth of money orders, he said.

Hailey youths OK following evening roll-over west of town

HAILEY — Four Hailey youths escaped serious injury when their car rolled three times after the driver swerved to miss a deer Wednesday night.

Alexis Trafford, 16, was driving west on the Crox Creek Road about five miles west of town when she tried to miss the deer, sending the car off the right side of the road where it rolled, Lt. Ed Fuller of the Blaine County sheriff's office said.

Trafford and her three passengers were taken to the Wood River Medical Center's Hailey Campus.

Andy Garcia and Shawn Johnson, both 19, were thrown from the vehicle and were the most seriously hurt, but they were in "pretty good shape" Thursday, Fuller said.

Trafford and Angie Barbie, 15, had only minor scrapes and cuts, he said.

"They were pretty lucky," Fuller said.

Lawmaker claims Idaho base positions threaten process

BOISE — Idaho is trying to circumvent Congress in its efforts to create an Air Force training range in the Owyhee desert, U.S. Rep. Bruce Vento contends.

Vento, D-Minn., says laws have been broken. But Gov. Cecil Andrus' office rejects Vento's charge and says the Idaho proposal for the range gives the state more control there.

Vento is chairman of the Interior Subcommittee on National Parks and Public Lands which has jurisdiction in those areas.

Gov. Cecil Andrus declined comment. A spokesman rejected the idea Idaho is making an end run around Congress.

Vento's comments addressed a proposal by Andrus to swap state land with the U.S. Bureau of Land Management and create a training range for combat aircraft stationed at the Mountain Home Air Force Base.

Andrus has said the training range is needed to keep Mountain Home from being closed, although Air Force officials have said it is not a prerequisite to further base operations.

Court upholds lewd conduct case against Twin Falls man

BOISE — The Idaho Court of Appeals has upheld the five- to 10-year prison term ordered for a Twin Falls man in a lewd conduct case.

Edwin Fullerton had appealed the length of his 1991 sentence.

Twin Falls County will close landfills for holiday weekend

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls County west and main landfills, as well as the Murtaugh transfer station, will close Saturday and Sunday for the July Fourth holiday.

The west landfill is in Buhl and the main landfill is south of Twin Falls. Both landfills will reopen Monday, July 6, at 8 a.m., said a spokeswoman for the Twin Falls County Solid Waste Department.

The county Solid Waste office at 450 6th Ave. W. is closed today for the holiday.

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New park offers free, easy access

TWIN FALLS — To get to the Centennial Waterfront Park, take the road west of the Perrine Bridge that leads to Canyon Springs Golf Course.

At the wide shoulder of the second turn on the road, a pair of gates mark the dirt road to the park.

The park opens at least by 7 a.m. and will stay open until dark, said Darrell Heider, the county parks and recreation director.

Weather permitting, the park will open every day of the year, Heider said.

Unattended cars will be locked in the park overnight.

The county charges no admission to get into the park, Heider said.

The park contains a boat ramp and dock, two floating docks for fishing, and handicapped accessible rest rooms.

The parking lot contains 13 stalls that will hold two trucks and trailers each, as well as 15 single parking spaces.

Crews recently black-topped the parking lot and an eagle scout striped the lot as part of a scouting project, Heider said.

The Twin Falls County Commission recently set rules regulating the park. These include:

- Noise control. Boats must be muffled not to exceed 82 decibels.

- Wake control. Motorboats must not cause wakes from the boat dock to the upriver buoys.

- Speed control. Once past the buoy, motorboats cannot go faster than 25 mph.

- No water-skiing or use of Jet Skis in the park.

- The boat ramp must not be obstructed. It is to be used only for loading and unloading boats.

- No swimming. A dredging operation left barrels, angle iron and cables in the water that pose a danger to swimmers.

Official takes court position

TWIN FALLS — County Clerk Linda Wright has been named trial court administrator for the 5th Judicial District.

Wright, 43, will oversee the workings of the courts in the eight-county Magic Valley area beginning Aug. 1, or as soon after that as a successor is chosen for the county clerk position.

Because Wright is a Republican, the county's Republican Central

Committee will choose three candidates for county clerk. The Twin Falls County commissioners will then choose one of them to fill the remainder of Wright's term, which ends in 1994.

Her duties in the new job will include implementing statewide court programs and handling court budgets and finances, personnel, facilities and schedules.

"It's a little more secure," Wright said of her new job, because she won't have to run for re-election. A hefty pay raise also is "a nice incentive," she said.

Wright makes \$29,160 a year in her current position as the county's clerk, auditor and recorder. She will make \$42,785 as court administrator.

An interest in courts and court administration led Wright to run for her current position as clerk, so the move to become administrator of all the 5th District's courts is a natural progression, she said.

The trial court administrator is a new position created by the Idaho Legislature. The 5th Judicial District, which includes Twin Falls, Blaine, Lincoln, Camas,

State senator says vote on session for gambling should be public

TWIN FALLS - Idaho lawmakers should say how they vote on calling a special legislative session on Indian gambling, the head of the state Senate said Thursday.

Legislators are being polled to see whether there is broad support for a special session, which would consist of a constitutional amendment designed to bar casino gambling in Idaho.

Although legislative leaders will announce the overall results of the poll, how individual members vote will be kept secret.

During a campaign trip to the Magic Valley Thursday, Senate President Pro Tem Mike Crapo said he originally wanted to make the individual votes public. Legislative leaders decided not to, he said, because they were afraid legislators who favored a special session would then feel pressured to vote for an amendment.

Reversing the secrecy decision, Crapo said, probably would require votes among "each of the four legislative caucuses" House and Senate Republicans and Democrats.

But the Idaho Falls Republican said lawmakers ought to say how they voted anyway, so long as it was disclosed that supporting a special session did not necessarily mean supporting an amendment.

The poll of Senate Republicans is nearly complete, he added, and so far no one in that caucus has opposed a special session.

Gov. Cecil Andrus has said he will call the Legislature back to Boise if there is substantial support in both chambers and both parties for a constitutional amendment to prohibit casino gambling.

Andrus also repeated previous statements that it would be impossible to guarantee in advance the two-thirds majority necessary to place an amendment on the November ballot.

Legislative leaders have circulated a draft amendment, and lawmakers are reviewing it before voting on whether to return to Boise. But the draft could change once a special session starts.

"We can't promise the governor what a vote will be on a specific piece of legislation," Crapo said.

The gaming issue has been about three months ago. Two of Idaho's Indian

tribes, citing federal law and the section of the state Constitution authorizing a lottery, asked Andrus to negotiate an agreement on reservation gambling.

Earlier this week, the Alliance of Idaho Tribes released a poll showing that a majority of Idahoans surveyed favored allowing the tribes to run casino gaming operations on their reservations and opposed a special session.

However, Crapo said casino gaming could not be confined to reservations. "Once it starts anywhere for one state, the pressure will build inexorably until it spreads throughout the state," he said.

Crapo acknowledged that no matter how the issue is resolved, it might hurt him in his campaign for the 2nd Congressional District. He faces Democrat J.D. Williams and two independents for the seat.

If the Legislature fails to pass an amendment, Crapo said, he could be criticized for opening the doors to unrestricted casino gambling in Idaho. If it does pass an amendment, however, he said, legislators would be accused of riding roughshod over Indian rights.

The decision will be forwarded to Alonzo in a letter with a copy of his attorney in accordance with Alonzo's request, Lieman said.

In announcing his resignation, Alonzo said he wanted to relax and "take care of his family."

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Filer man will stand trial for attempted murder of ex-wife; judge rules

TWIN FALLS - A Filer man was ordered Thursday to stand trial for the attempted first-degree murder of his ex-wife.

Gary Wickel, 47, also is charged with battery with the intent to commit a serious felony in connection with a domestic dispute in January in which his ex-wife's throat was slashed.

The victim of the attack, 43-year-old Sandy Souza, has recovered from her injury and testified at Thursday's preliminary hearing.

In his first visit to Twin Falls since becoming a judge, 5th District Magistrate Robert Elgee of Hailey

ordered Wickel be bound over to District Court on both counts.

Wickel was arrested June 21 outside a mobile home north of Filer after Twin Falls County Sheriff's deputies were called to a domestic dispute.

Deputies found Souza lying in a house with her throat severely cut. Souza was drinking that Wickel had been told police and cut her throat before she escaped and ran to the house next door, where her son already had gone for help.

Wickel and Souza previously were married; they divorced, and were living together when the incident happened, according to the Twin Falls County sheriff's office.

After being charged with

attempted murder, Wickel was indicted by a grand jury one week after his arrest.

That indictment was dismissed two weeks ago by 5th District Judge Daniel Meehl, who said the grand jury was not properly instructed about how to tell if prosecutors had enough evidence to justify an indictment.

Twin Falls County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Dan Mink had enough evidence Thursday, convincing Elgee there was public cause to believe Wickel committed the crimes. Wickel, who has been in the Twin Falls County jail since his arrest, will be arraigned in District Court. If he pleads innocent, the case will go to trial.

That's the official date, but Robert Plotts said he expects to start work sometime in late July. During a telephone interview Thursday from Kettle Falls, Wash., Plotts said he looks forward to the job.

He will look closely at the school's needs before recommending or implementing any new ideas, he said.

"The things that are going well, I want to continue with," he said. "I have no agenda at all. The reason I came to Burley was because I knew it was in good hands."

Plotts said his wife, Nancy, and their three children who still live at home, a daughter attends Brigham Young University — are excited about the move.

"We're looking forward to being a part of the community," he said.

Accident injures pair, ISP officer

The accident happened shortly before noon about two miles southeast of the Interstate 84-86 split. The driver of the 1989 Cadillac that caused the accident was Robert Orrison, 73, of Boynton Beach, Fla.

Orrison and his wife, Veronica, were flown to LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City with serious injuries, Bristol said.

Witnesses reported that Orrison was driving faster than 65 mph, he said. Officials said they do not know

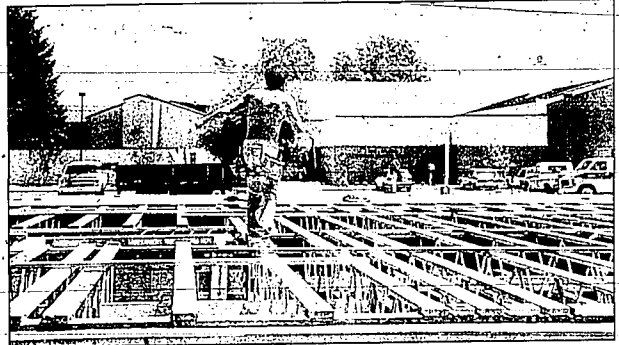
what caused the car to drift off the road.

The Orrisons were not wearing seat belts, Bristol said. "I feel sorry for them. I'm not mad at them," Pinther said. "I wish they wouldn't have been hurt."

INEL schedules Burley hearings for water system, other projects

BURLEY — The federal Energy Department, the Environmental Protection Agency and the state of Idaho have scheduled a hearing in Burley to hear comments on proposed plans for three sites at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory near Arco.

The three sites are the perchlorate water system beneath the reactor area, the motor pool pond at the central facilities area and the chemical evaporation pond in the auxiliary reactor area.

The hearing is scheduled for July 21 at the Burley Inn, 800 N. Overland Ave.

An informal open house will begin at 5:30 p.m., discussion on the perchlorate water system will take place at 6:30 p.m. and comment on the motor pool pond and chemical

evaporation pond is scheduled for 8 p.m.

The perchlorate water system plan considers the impact of contaminated perchlorate water located 330 feet above the Snake River Plain Aquifer.

No remedial action is recommended, with monitoring and periodic reviews to ensure protection of public health and the environment.

The motor pool pond plan considers the risks associated with exposure to contaminants in the pond sediment. No remedial action is being considered for this site.

The chemical evaporation pond plan analyzes the risks associated with exposure to contaminants in the pond sediment. No remedial action is being considered at this site.

Briefings on the proposed plans are available to interested citizens during the weeks of July 6 and July 13. The format for a briefing will vary depending on the number of people requesting a briefing in each community.

Anyone interested in a briefing can call the INEL Community Relations Plan coordinator at 208-526-6864 or the INEL Outreach Office in Twin Falls at 734-0463.

The public comment period runs from July 6 to Aug. 5. The public is invited to attend the hearing in Burley, during which both written and verbal comments will be taken.

The public is encouraged to provide written comments by writing to Jerry Lyle, deputy assistant manager, Environmental Restoration and Waste Management, DOE Idaho Field Office, P.O. Box 2047, Idaho Falls 83403-2047.

Former construction workers claim sexual harassment

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Three former construction workers are suing an Idaho National Engineering Laboratory subcontractor, contending they were victims of sexual harassment on an Idaho Chemical Processing Plant job.

The women say they were subjected to an "intimidating, hostile and offensive" working environment at the Fuel Processing Restoration job site, and ultimately were fired because of their gender.

Earlier this month, a U.S. Department of Labor investigation

backed up some of the workers' claims against Kiewit Industrial Co., an Omaha, Neb., construction company working at the U.S. Department of Energy facility.

The former employees are seeking back pay through the Labor Department, plus at least \$150,000 each in damages, through their suit in U.S. District Court in Boise. It was filed last Friday.

Local Kiewit management could not be reached for comment.

In the complaint, former Kiewit employees Clara Kruger, Kelly

Bullock and Sheila McCormick say they were hired to work at the Fuel Processing Restoration site last year. They were promised work for "up to five years," but McCormick was fired after, one month on the job and Kruger was fired after seven months, according to the lawsuit.

Kruger, a carpenter's assistant living in Shelley, said she was told she was being fired because of cutbacks on the project. But in an interview Wednesday, she said she was fired only after complaining about sexist comments at the workplace.

Kiewit foremen openly complained

that there were too many women on the job site and set out to fire some of them, she said.

Foremen deliberately put female employees on cleanup jobs and swing shifts, knowing they would be the first jobs cut, she said.

Kruger said she suffered neck and back injuries on the job in December after trying to lift a heavy piece of wood.

A forklift was nearby and could have been used to carry the wood, she said, but she said she was ordered to lift the wood herself or she would be fired.

Andrus requests drought disaster area

BOISE — Gov. Cecil Andrus has asked U.S. Agriculture Secretary Edvard Madigan to declare Lewis County a drought disaster area.

The declaration would make farmers and ranchers in the west-central Idaho county eligible for federal emergency aid, including low-interest loans.

Lewis County commissioners asked Andrus to seek the disaster declaration last week, citing the impact of more than five years of drought on local crops.

County extension agent Ben Barstow has estimated losses in yield to Lewis County wheat and barley growers alone at \$18.8 million.

Dworshak releases begin today

OROFINO — The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will increase water releases from northern Idaho's Dworshak Dam for seven days, starting today, to help migrating fall chinook salmon in the lower Snake River.

Dworshak's outflow will be increased from 1,200 to 11,200 cubic feet per second until July 10, the Corps announced Wednesday.

The release is expected to lower Dworshak Reservoir about 1 foot per day, but should not affect area boat ramps and campgrounds. Reservoir elevation was about 1,579 feet — 21 feet below full pool — on Wednesday.

Streamflow on the Clearwater River near Spalding is expected to increase from about 5,000 to 15,000 cfs as a result of the release from Dworshak.

Officials at the Corps' Walla Walla, Wash., district office said the action comes in response to instructions from the Fish Passage Center in Portland — a multi-agency group of federal, state and tribal interests.

Environmentalists may have to pay

BOISE — A hydroelectric company working to develop a project on western Idaho's Payette River has filed a bid for more than \$58,000 in legal fees and costs against two environmental groups.

Friends of the Payette and Idaho Rivers United filed a lawsuit to stop the project, but U.S. District Judge Marion Callister ruled against it last week. Callister awarded costs against the groups.

David Hirsch of Horseshoe Bend Hydroelectric Co. filed a motion with the court on Wednesday asking \$54,000 in legal fees and \$4,200 in other costs.

Hirsch said the motion also asked the court to hold directors of the groups personally as well as corporately responsible for the bills.

The groups said they planned an appeal to the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals and expected to do better at that level. In a May trial, Callister allowed only one witness to testify.

Sheriff pleads innocent to DUI charge

BOISE — Boise County Sheriff Craik Landers has pleaded innocent to a misdemeanor charge of drunk driving and is scheduled for trial on Oct. 29.

Landers, 39, crashed a county patrol car on a mountain road on May 11. A test revealed his blood-alcohol level to be 0.15 percent, above the state's limit of 0.10 percent.

Landers won the Republican nomination for sheriff on May 26, the same day the blood-alcohol tests were announced.

Officers rule drowning an accident

POST FALLS — A drowning Friday night in the Spokane River near Post Falls will be ruled an accident, a Kootenai County sheriff's detective says.

That decision was made after some witnesses were reinterviewed about the death of 38-year-old Joseph Vance of Rathdrum, said Sgt. Gerald Wiedenhoff.

The man apparently never got out of the water on the north side of the river after swimming from Corbin Park on the south side, according to the later interviews.

Authorities heard conflicting testimony of a possible fight before the drowning, how long it took to pull Vance out of the water, and how long it took to administer cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

Alcohol was probably involved in the accident, he said. With no evidence of wrongdoing, no charges will be filed.

Children sue stepfather over murder

COEUR D'ALENE — The children of a murdered Coeur d'Alene woman are suing their stepfather, who was convicted last month of killing their mother.

Attorney Kenneth Jacobson of Coeur d'Alene filed suit this week on behalf of Jennifer A. Hatfield, Margaret M. Rowe, Michael F. Berg and Elizabeth L. Berg.

The four are the children of Joanne Saso Moore, who was murdered over the Christmas holidays.

Her second husband, William Dudley Moore, was convicted June 23 of second-degree murder. Sentencing is set for July 31. Moore faces a possible sentence of life in prison.

The lawsuit seeks unspecified damages for the loss of companionship and mental anguish.

'Inquisitive nostrils' ruled OK

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Court of Appeals says it isn't a "search" when officers smell marijuana growing inside a home.

The court on Thursday unanimously upheld the drug conviction of Louis Rignolot in a Bonner County case. He pleaded guilty but reserved the right to challenge evidence seized in the case, which included 145 marijuana plants.

Rignolot argued that a search warrant was improperly obtained after investigating officers came onto his property. The officers, said when they approached the house, they smelled marijuana.

The Court of Appeals said despite the fact Rignolot posted a "no trespassing" sign, the officers had a legitimate right to be there and restricted their movements to places ordinary visitors would go.

The court said it isn't a "search" in the Fourth Amendment sense when an officer legally present at a certain place detects odors emanating from a private premise.

"There is no reasonable expectation of privacy" from lawfully positioned agents "with inquisitive nostrils," the court said, citing a 1974 federal court ruling. In another decision released Thursday, the Idaho Supreme Court ruled that conservators of estates have an obligation to carry out a known estate plan.

The court upheld lower court rulings against The Old National Bank of Washington and in favor of Robert Tate in a Latah County case.

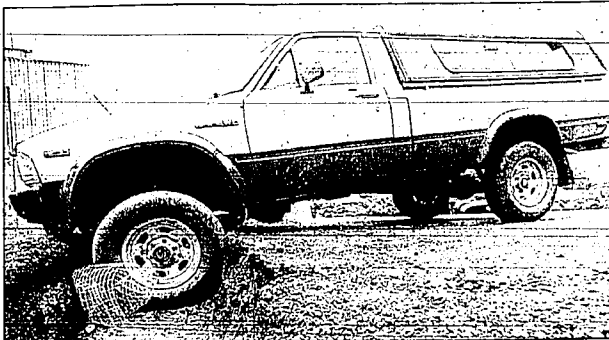
Tate's aunt, Nana Reinwald, bought a certificate of deposit for more than \$60,000, with a payable on death or POD provision in favor of Tate. When the CD matured, the bank transferred the money to itself as conservator and reinvested the proceeds without the POD provision.

Reinwald died in 1984 and the bank said it was obligated to put the money into the estate instead of paying it to Tate. The bank held that the CD with the payable on death provision was not an "estate plan."

"Today we hold that when conservators in the administration of estates have knowledge of an estate plan, they cannot disregard the plan, take into account and preserve that estate plan insofar as possible," the court said.

Central to the decision is that it must be a known estate plan. "Obviously, conservators cannot be required to preserve estate plans of which they have no knowledge," the court said.

University of Idaho officials worry financial oversight could stall hiring

MOSCOW (AP) — University of Idaho officials are concerned that a new executive state order will bar them from refilling vacant jobs without the approval of Idaho's Division of Financial Management.

The division may now slash positions that have been vacant for more than a year in some state agencies, such as universities.

Gov. Cecil Andrus recently issued an executive order after lawmakers passed a bill allowing state agencies to fill posts that have been open for more than a year with the division's authorization. The order takes effect this week and only impacts agencies under the control of non-elected officials.

But Jerry Wallace, financial vice president at Idaho questions whether lawmakers can delegate authority already granted to the state Board of Education to the division.

"The question needs to be asked and clearly answered," he said Wednesday.

Wallace said he wonders what would happen if division economists refuse to allow the universities to fill jobs that have been vacant for more than a year, by the education board.

reauthorized the schools to fill last week.

Last week, the board let the UI fill 68 of the state-funded vacant positions and 35 vacant ones on non-state money without any discussion of Wallace's concerns.

The state regents also approved Boise State University and Idaho State University filling 21 and 16 vacant positions, respectively.

Lewis-Clark State College does not have any posts that have been vacant for more than a year.

Idaho Rep. John Tippers, a sponsor of the legislation, said he cannot say, if it is appropriate for the divi-

sion to have veto authority over the education board.

"(But) I don't see why it is not workable," the Montpelier Republican said Wednesday night.

Chuck Moss, Division of Financial Management director, said he has not heard any concerns from the schools about the governor's order.

In all likelihood, Moss' office would not delete a vacant slot reauthorized by the education board, he said.

"We don't have any intentions of just slicing positions for the heck of it," he said. "This could be described more as a custodial operation."

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Republican official to work for Gilbert

COEUR D'ALENE — Kootenai County Republican Chairman Kathy Sims has resigned to work on Rachel Gilbert's congressional campaign.

"It's pretty hard to keep track of 10 candidates and devote yourself to one," Sims said. "I'm real interested in Rachel's campaign this year. I want to see that position back to a Republican."

The former state senator from Boise is running for the 1st Congressional District seat held by Democrat Larry LaRocco.

Sims has served as chairman of the Kootenai County GOP for four years. Last month she was re-elected to a two-year term.

A Cinderella story

First Miss Twin Falls made a splash

TWIN FALLS — Fairy tale bashers take heed: This Cinderella story did end happily ever after.

The year was 1952. It was the year when a 5-foot-5-inch blue-eyed brunette was transformed from a shy schoolgirl into a confident queen.

A few months after Zoe Ann (Warberg) Shaub became the first ever Miss Twin Falls, she went on to claim the crown of Miss Idaho and to win a talent scholarship at the Miss America pageant. Soon, she was rubbing shoulders with the likes of Marilyn Monroe and President Eisenhower.

But the Cinderella story doesn't end there. Shaub went on to earn a law degree from Stanford University and to become a probate judge.

Shaub met her future husband, a physician, in Sun Valley, skiing. "He appeared before me in court to testify at a sanity hearing shortly after we met," she said. "That night, he called and asked me out."

After her marriage at age 28, Shaub retired from the bench to raise three children, who are now in college. Never one to sit for long, she got so involved in her children's activities that she ended up running the Snake River Swim Association in which they competed.

Shaub, now 58, differs from Cinderella in at least one significant way. She had no fairy godmother. Instead, she decided what she wanted out of life, and she went after it. "I entered the pageant for the scholarship money," she said. "I didn't even know anything about it except that there were scholarships."

Born and raised in Twin Falls, Shaub was one of a set of twins. The family consisted of two sets of twins, born 21 months apart. "With four children so close in age, I knew I had to do something, because my education was going to cost a lot," Shaub said.

As it happened, Shaub's Atlantic City experience did, in fact, turn out

to be "something." For her talent, the 18-year-old would-be lawyer presented a three-minute talk on the need for qualified voters to "exercise your duty and privilege."

The talk was so moving that, within hours after the news services shared the story of the unusual contest message with the nation, the chairmen of both the Republican and Democratic parties had sent for copies. The pageant office mimeographed more copies, too, filling requests that poured in for weeks.

Since those days, Shaub has remained actively involved with the Miss America organization. For several years, she served as legal representative to the Western states. In 1985, she was invited back to Atlantic City, as a former contestant success story. Gary Collins interviewed her during the Miss America telecast.

Currently, Shaub works with the Twin Falls Lions Club, recruiting Miss Twin Falls candidates. In an era when pageants have been labeled everything from silly to despicable, Shaub is still a believer. She expresses strong approval of the fact that the Miss America organization gives away more than \$5 million in scholarship money every year. She is not so enthusiastic about the swimsuit competition.

"The swimsuit part bothered me when I was in the pageant, and it still does," Shaub said. "I wish they would do away with it. I know we lose a lot of girls because they don't feel comfortable with it."

Helen Henderson, who has served as Twin Falls Pageant Adviser since 1961, agrees. "I would give anything if they would do away with the swimsuit competition," she said.

They won't, Henderson explained, because people across the United States see PAGEANT/C3

"The great part of our lives is we get to live here year round," Linda said. "I feel very fortunate that I get to be a part of one of the greatest ice shows and not have to travel."

Skaters coming to Sun Valley for shows yet this summer include two-time Olympic gold medalist Katarina Witt, reigning Olympic champion Kristi Yamaguchi and 1988 Olympic gold medal winner Brian Boitano.

All Yankovic's parody hits home

Nirvana's "Smells Like Teen Spirit" was one of last year's most memorable hits, though an indisputable one.

"Smells Like Nirvana" is one of this year's most wickedly hilarious videos, with lyrics that skewer the very obtuseness of his inspiration.

New I'm mumble... and I'm screaming!

and I don't know... what I'm singing
Crank the volume... ears are bleedin'
I still don't know... what I'm singing

We're so loud and incoherent

Boy, this ought to bug our parents.
One stanza is delivered with marbles dripping out the singer's mouth. Elsewhere, he delivers them while gargling.

Smells like Weird Al Yankovic.

"It's gotten great reaction," says Yankovic in the middle of a tour that includes a performance in Washington. Like Michael Jackson — sweetly savaged by Yankovic in "Eat It" and "Fat" — he has waited five years between albums.

And, pop's premiere parodist says, his recent "Off the Deep End" is looking to be the biggest album of his career. One of the reasons: he wanted to come back with something strong, and it wasn't until Nirvana came out that I thought this was the next big thing."

Yankovic's first clue... or inspiration... came when "everybody knew" was going around saying, "Boy, I love that Nirvana song but I can't understand" a single word

they're saying. That sounded like the basis of a parody to me!

"As always I have my little idea notebooks handy and every time I came up with an idea that related to that, I'd write it down. I remember waking up in the middle of the night and writing 'bargle noodle zous,' thinking, 'This will be important someday.'"

Sure enough, it's one of the lyrics in "Smells Like Nirvana," which comes with its own phonetic subtitle on video.

"If 'Nirvana' was going to be a single, I knew I'd have to make fun of the video, which was a problem because the videos I'm taking off on are usually high concept and have some kind of story line, and 'Teen Spirit' was basically a performance piece. I was concerned about being able to find gags, but once I started thinking about it, I just had pages and pages of gags. It was fun."

The video — itself frame-for-frame parody — was shot on the same Culver City, Calif., sound stage with the high school set set Nirvana had used. It used many of the same kids, most of the cheerleaders and the 70-ish janitor who appeared in "Teen Spirit" (Rudy Larosa, the real-life janitor in the original video director's apartment building).

Aided Yankovic, now 32, has been working his madcap mackovers

since 1979, when "My Bologna," a clever send-up of the Knack's No. 1 hit, "My Sharona," brought him to the attention of syndicated radio maverick Dr. Demento. At the time, Yankovic was still an undergraduate at Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo, majoring in architecture and he figured out he could build a career deconstructing pop culture.

His debut album in 1983 included early favorites like "My Bologna," "Another One Rides the Bus" and "I Love Rocky Road." The next year, "Weird Al Yankovic in 3-D" went platinum on the strength of "Eat It," a food-based parody of Michael Jackson's "Beat It." It won Yankovic an American Music Award as best male performer — over Bruce Springsteen and George Michael, then at the height of their popularity.

Yankovic has shown an uncanny knack for mimicry, not only musically but visually, and that has allowed him a wide range of targets: James Brown in "Living With a Hermit," Robert Palmer in "Addicted to Love" and Jackson mimed again for "Fat" (set to "Bad"), where a Pillsbury doughboy-sized and leather-studded Yankovic waddles through the subway — on a set that Jackson himself lent for the video. This one earned a Grammy, but didn't. While Michael Jackson didn't approve a proposed parody of his recent "Black or White," feeling its

message was too important, Yankovic has encountered few problems getting copyright owners' permission to lampoon their works-with-one exception.

"I don't want people to know what obvious jerks, liars, people are," he says. "I don't want to mention any names like PRINCE because then people would realize what an idiot he is. Let's just keep it between you and me."

"Okay," Not that Yankovic is about to run out of material any time soon. The new album parodies Gerard's "Rico Suave" (with "Taco Grande"), Milli Vanilli on "The Plumbing Song," New Kids on the Block's "The Right Stuff" (with "The White Bus") and Hammer's "U Can't Touch This" (with "I Can't Watch This," about television).

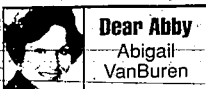

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'League' could be a hit

Watch out, Batman: A team of bat women might clip your wings at the box office. They just socked a comic homer in "A League of Their Own."

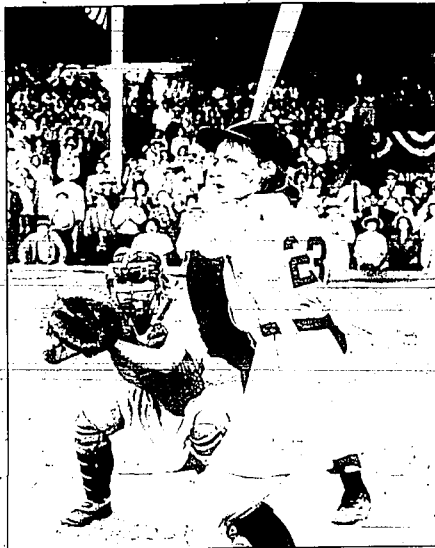
The warm, touching and period-perfect movie directed by Penny Marshall tells the nostalgic and entertaining story of baseball's legendary all-female players. They flourished from 1943, when many of the male players were off pitching grenades on World War II battlefields, to the mid-'50s, when television started to become a factor in baseball economics and the girls were shown the gate.

Review

The All-American Girls Professional Baseball League started with four teams and grew to 16. Sexist men in the stands snickered and jeered at first as the "girls" scampered around the field in short skirts, then cheered with genuine admiration as they developed into players who could rival the guys in just about everything but hitting power. It was a wonderful role for women to prove their worth on the sports field as well as in the B-29 factories, and Susie the Slugger became just as competent as Rosie the Riveter. Their self-esteem soared with their paychecks — \$65 to \$125 a week for women ballplayers, which was a lot of money in those days — and they had a heck of a lot of fun, the best seasons of their lives.

This inspiring and little-known story (to me, anyway) is told with the usual Hollywood sports-movie clichés — recruitment of a wisecracking, ragin' team of players from different backgrounds and parts of the country, fights between players and manager, and everything leading to that nail-biting World Series that goes to the seventh game.

But the acting is a finely balanced team effort, and a number of individual performers are standouts, especially Tom Hanks as the crude, drunken, washed-up home-run hitter, Jimmy Dugan, who reluctantly manages the Rockford Peaches and

ends up loving every minute of it. Hanks' mastery of physical comedy is brilliantly displayed when he savagely chews out a tearful player (Evelyn Gardner, endearingly played by Betty Schram) in one scene because she messed up a play, then clenches his anger with barely controlled hands and facial nerves in another scene because "he" has learned that women respond better to gentle advice.

Also wonderful are Lori Petty as Kit, the envious kid sister who finally steps out of her more-talented sibling's baseball shadow; Megan Calkins as homely hitter Marla

Houch; Jon Lovitz as the crabby city slicker who recruits farm-tough country girls for the team; Rosie O'Donnell as the tough New York cookie; and Jeri Paul Madonna as a former dime-a-dance sexpot.

Madonna's character, Mae, is just like the Material Girl — a sexy club dancer who strives for better things. She grabs the limelight here in a wild jitterbug scene set in a roadhouse bar and in another little scene set in a church, where she's in the confessional, and the priest gets so stomped he practically expiates his holy water. The movie is packed with little gems like that.

Star recalls 'fun stuff' during baseball years

LOS ANGELES — Lavone "Pepper" Paire Davis, a star catcher with the All American Girls Professional Baseball League, says the movie "A League of Their Own" is authentic in all aspects except one.

"The fun stuff we did on the road was a lot raunchier than what was shown in the movie," says Davis, who served as a technical adviser on the film. "Our fun stuff was really X-rated."

She does not elaborate, but she gives the impression that she speaks the truth. For 10 years, starting in 1944 when she was 18, she was one of the AAGPBL's major players; under the name of "Pepper" Paire, she had an impressive career as catcher for the Fort Wayne Daisies, the Racine Belles and the Grand Rapids Chicks.

"None of us thought in terms of being pioneer feminists," she says. "We certainly didn't think we were making history. We just felt it was our job to entertain people at the time of a very patriotic war. When one woman found out her husband was killed, she just hung her head, composed herself," said Paire. "Please don't announce it to the crowd," and went out and played. And she played every night that week."

Davis played while her brother and fiancé were missing in action. "My brother made it back. My fiancé did not. But it was our job. We were paid good money to do it. One girl played 'til she was eight months pregnant. She was a terrific hitter. Some girls left to have children and then came back."

Although the all-female league continued until 1955, Davis feels its decline was inevitable. "After the war, the men came back. All the media publicity went to the major leagues. We'd gotten lots of publicity during the war, and then the media wouldn't touch us. We were all from small towns. Our teams didn't

have big-city names. And then we did not have a farm system, where young women were trained. We all had been recruited by scouts, just like in the movie. When we left, there wasn't anyone trained to take our places. The last few years of the league really weren't much to get excited about, not like the old days."

In 1954, Davis took a season off from baseball because, she says, "I met a man and wanted to hook him."

When the league folded, the following year, "Pepper" Paire married Robert Davis. In the following years, Davis worked as an electronics assembler and in a pizza parlor. A grandnephew of four, she now does volunteer work for the Van Nuys, Calif., Chamber of Commerce.

"There is still a great rapport between us girls," she says of her colleagues on the team. "In 1988, I was not financially able to make the trip to Cooperstown," when the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y., finally acknowledged the AAGPBL with a special exhibit.

"It just about broke my heart to miss it," she recalls. "But at our reunion in Scottsdale, (Ariz.) the girls took up a collection and bought me two new outfits and a ticket to Cooperstown. In our league, the wives always took care of the husbands."

Davis is emphatic about how much she likes "A League of Their Own," which opened Wednesday. "But there are some things she would change. Like the comic relief that makes fun of the chaperones. Our chaperones were our best friends. They were the ones we would go to

in the middle of the night with our problems. But, then again, when we wanted to have fun in the middle of the night, we'd try and sneak out past those very same chaperones. We'd use the fire escapes and go to these little clubs — they were called roadhouse bars — then we'd have ourselves a ball."

'Batman' stays No. 1

"Batman Returns" was the nation's most popular film for a second weekend but failed to pass the \$100 million mark in record time.

The sequel earned \$25.4 million to boost overall earnings to \$96.8 million, according to figures released Monday by Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc.

The first "Batman" passed the \$100 million mark in 11 days. "Batman Returns" was expected to pass the mark Monday, its 12th day in theaters.

Second place over the weekend went to "Unlawful Entry," a new film about a bat policeman. It made \$10.1 million. "Sister Act" was third with sales of \$7.2 million.

In fourth with \$5.7 million was "Housesitter." "Patriot Games" was fifth with \$5.3 million. In sixth was "Lethal Weapon 3" with \$3.3 million.

The reissue of the 1940s animated classic "Pinocchio" collected \$3.1 million for seven days.

"Far and Away" was eighth with \$2.5 million and "Encino Man" was ninth with \$1.1 million. "Alien3" was 10th at \$1 million.

Rejuvenated Brat sets up intriguing semifinal against former student

WIMBLEDON, England — The sorcerer and his apprentice, John McEnroe and Andre Agassi, will be "matching magic" in the most whimsical Wimbledon men's semifinal in decades.

Who'd have thought it? A 33-year-old has been against a 21-year-old never-was, each suddenly casting spells on their opponents and the crowd.

By contrast, a predictable women's first was set up Thursday Steffi Graf after a major-brouhaha-over-Seles' grunting.

The only oddity about the women's semis was the fuss over Seles' noise in her 6-2, 6-7 (7-3), 6-4 victory over Martina Navratilova. Graf beat Gabriela Sabatini 6-3, 6-3 with hardly a peep.

McEnroe figured he'd need a miracle to win Wimbledon. So far he's moving along mostly with his own sleight of hand and racket, aided by a little kindness from the crowd and a lot of help from the draw.

McEnroe's wizardry carried him past Guy Forget 6-2, 7-6 (11-9), 6-3, shortly after Agassi conjured up a 4-6, 6-2, 6-4, 4-6, 6-3 victory over Boris Becker in the completion of matches suspended by rain Wednesday.

With Pete Sampras and Goran Ivanisevic in the other men's semifinals Saturday, this marks the first time since 1951 that none of the top four men's seeds reached the semis. It's also the first time in 10 years that three Americans are in the semis.

McEnroe is the only semifinalist to have won a Wimbledon title, his third and last coming in 1984. But his chance for a fourth could depend on how well he schooled Agassi in the mysteries of grass-court play.

"There's probably a chance he wishes he hasn't been practicing with me quite as much as he has in these past couple of weeks," Agassi said.

McEnroe laughed about the notion that he might have taught Agassi too well, but said he didn't regret it and wouldn't take Agassi's praises too seriously.

"That's sort of like a gimme," McEnroe said of similar flattery by every other player's best man here. "You know, 'We are really honored to have between No. 1 Monica Seles vs. No. 2 Steffi Graf after a major-brouhaha-over-Seles' grunting."

"With Andre it's the same thing. He's going to be very honored to play me, but if by some chance I win, he won't be so happy."

McEnroe's best trick against Forget was an escape from six set points in their tiebreaker after they resumed the match in the second set with McEnroe ahead 6-2, 5-5.

McEnroe used an old device, a long argument with the umpire, to change the outcome after Forget served an ace to take a 6-3 lead for triple set-point.

McEnroe claimed the ball was a foot long. Despite McEnroe's protests and pouting, the call stood, and he ambled back slowly to serve. At that moment, he looked like a beaten man — shoulders slumped, head down, shaking in disgust. His body sagged as if the air and spirit had been sucked out of him by that call.

If she fails at Boise, Welty will go to Brigham Young for a meet Tuesday.

Players' witness says NFL owners cloud teams' profitability

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Some NFL team owners pay themselves millions of dollars a year, clouding the reported profitability of the clubs, according to testimony Thursday at an antitrust trial.

Stanford University economist professor Roger Noll, testifying for the players-union-the league, said the owners take high salaries from their teams instead of profits.

Noll cited Phoenix Cardinals owner Bill Bidwill, who paid himself \$1.25 million in 1991.

In earlier testimony, Noll said the league's own accounting firm estimated the 28 teams earned an average of \$45 million in revenue for 1990. The same statement showed the average profit per team at less than \$6 million, a figure Noll called "substantially understated."

He said he research showed each team could be expected to make at least \$10 million and perhaps as much as \$25 million per year.

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Western leader fires 64 before storm hits

LEMONT, Ill. (AP) — Blaine McCallister got his leading 64 under cover Thursday before a drought-breaking storm forced an overnight postponement in the first round of the \$1.1 million Western Open.

McCallister and the other early starters played under a tornado warning, but it was the late players who had to scurry for shelter in the face of a severe, damaging afternoon thunderstorm in the southwestern suburbs of Chicago.

"There were tornadoes that touched down all along the storm line," said Peter deYoung, tournament director of the Western Golf Association.

"Winds were clocked at 80 miles an hour at Hinsdale, about 10 miles away," he said. "I think what passed over us was a tornado that didn't touch down."

"It was terrifying. I saw spectators running for cover who had terror on their face. I'm glad I didn't have a mirror, because I'm sure my face looked the same."

DeYoung said only two minor injuries, both to spectators, were reported.

"The golf course was littered with debris from the high winds," he said. "We lost power to the corporate hospitality area. And the winds knocked down nine of the 10 hospitality tents in that area."

Half the field of 156 was stranded on the storm-ravaged Dubsred course at the Cog Hill golf complex, marked positions and was due to return at 7:30 a.m. CDT Saturday to resume play.

The second round will start as soon as possible after all-players complete 18 holes. But the forecast was not favorable for completion of second-round play.

"We're expecting more storms tonight with the rain not letting up until 10 in the morning," deYoung said.

McCallister, who played the four par-5 holes under par with three birdies and an eagle, held a one-stroke lead over Australian Ian Baker-Finch.

"Man, I'm glad to get that in. McCallister said after losing one stroke in par over the three very difficult finishing holes.

After making birdie-4 on the 15th to go 9-under, "I was just trying to get to the clubhouse, because I knew what was in front of me."

He was even happier to get it in, he turned over because of something that he didn't know was in front of him — the extremely strong storm that disrupted the tournament, knocked out power to thousands of homes and closed airports.

Baker-Finch, making his last start before defense of his British Open title later this month, birdied three of the last four holes for a 65.

It was three strokes back to Loren Roberts, Larry Nelson and Brian Clair, tied for third among the early finishers at 68.

Davis Love III and Masters' champ Fred Couples, one-two in a tight race for the year's money-winning title, each shot 70 before the rains came.

PGA title-holder John Daly struggled to an 80.

Commissioner denies trying to change Yanks officials' testimonies

NEW YORK (AP) — Commissioner Elv Rosenthal denies charges on Thursday that he had attempted to have three New York Yankees employees change their testimony in the Steve Howe hearing.



Vincent summoned general manager Gene Michael, manager Buck Showalter and executive Jack Lawton to his office Wednesday after learning that they had testified against his lifetime ban of Howe because of the pitcher's drug involvement.

Reportedly, the commissioner told the three that they were risking suspension from baseball for testifying against baseball's drug policy. Dominic Amoroso, Showalter's attorney, said the commissioner tried to get the manager to change his testimony.

"Buck Showalter will not give in to intimidating tactics by commissioner Vincent," Amoroso said. "Vincent takes issue with anything that contradicts his position and as a result tried to intimidate these Yankees into changing their testimony."

Vincent, spending the week-end in Harwich Port, Mass., denied any attempt at coercing the three Yankees.

"That's ridiculous," he said. "How could I ask them to change their testimony? They had finished their testimony. I would never discuss that with them. I called them in because I was concerned with their recognition of the importance of baseball policy."

As for possible suspensions, Vincent said he would review transcripts over the weekend. "I don't have any thoughts at the moment," he said. "We'll meet and talk Monday."

Vincent said the flood of coverage of the affair in the New York press was "much ado about nothing. Somewhat it is remarkably insightful and some of it is remarkably stupid."

If Vincent had suggested a change in testimony, it could be a violation of labor law. "An argument could be made when you are dealing with an arbitrator and a third party threatens a witness, that could be interpreted as interference," said a labor attorney, who asked not to be identified.

Vincent and Howe Sources at the National Labor Relations Board said, "The matter raises difficult questions under the act."

Eugene Orza, associate general counsel of the Major League Baseball Players Association, which filed the Howe grievance, said, "If what I'm hearing is true, he acted highly inappropriately and we have to respond to it. I will bring it to the attention of the arbitrator on Friday. It seems to me we need a hearing about this."

Vincent "stopped being a lawyer yesterday," Orza said. At the Howe grievance hearing, Michael and Showalter were asked if they felt the pitcher's lifetime ban was justified. They testified that they believed it was not.

"There's a basic misunderstanding here," Orza said. "If you work for Chevrolet, you can't go around saying Ford makes better cars. But on the witness stand, you're under oath and you must tell the truth."

Orza said Vincent was acting as if Showalter, Michael and Lawton were employees of the commissioner's office. "They are not," he said. "They are employees of the New York Yankees. I don't think you can underestimate the fact that the organization involved is the New York Yankees. I don't believe this would happen if the organization involved was the Los Angeles Dodgers."

Still pending is Vincent's decision on altering his agreement with Yankees principal owner George Steinbrenner, who agreed to a ban from running his team following his involvement with the commissioner's office. The commissioner also is expected to rule on that matter next week.

Lone college Olympian likes to see best compete

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Don't count Christian Laettner among those who think college players are getting a raw deal by having NBA All-Stars at the Olympics.

"I don't think college players should feel slighted," said Laettner, the only player on Team USA without NBA experience. "If the pros need to be used to get the gold medal, so be it. The college players aren't getting it done in past years, so whenever it takes to get the gold medal is OK with the college players."

The United States has suffered five losses in international competition since 1987, with Laettner on three of those teams.

Laettner, drafted last week by the Minnesota Timberwolves, said a college all-star team would have won this week's Tournament of the Americas if the best players participated.

"I've played on the last three national teams, and none of those had all of the top college players," Laettner said. "I've never heard the top collegiate players on the same team, so that's why we never won. If we'd had the top 10 players, we'd have won this year and every year."

Thursday was an off day for the American team after it won its group by four blowout victories in four consecutive days, including a 128-87 decision over Argentina Wednesday night.

The win advanced the U.S. team into the tournament semifinals and an automatic Olympic berth.

Laettner had nine points in 17 minutes against Argentina, giving him 22 points in 45 minutes for the tournament.

Soccer panel awards 1998 World Cup to France

ZURICH, Switzerland (AP) — Sixty years later, soccer's No. 1 event is returning to France.

The 1998 World Cup finals were awarded to France, which beat Morocco 12-7 Thursday in a vote of the 19-member executive committee of FIFA, soccer's world governing body.

France, one of the game's oldest strongholds and a FIFA founder, last hosted the Cup finals in 1938. It made a high-tech bid for the 1998 event.

Only one ballot was needed for the decision, which ended Morocco's second bid for the 24-nation championship tournament.

The 1994 World Cup will be held in the United States. The event never has been held outside of Europe or the Americas.

"This award is the crowning glory of three years of work," Fernand Sastre, chief organizer of the French bid, said. "It's a great day for French football, a great joy."

French national team coach Michel Platini, one of his nation's

sports idols, resigned after FIFA's decision and was expected to help organize the World Cup.

France never has won the World Cup. It automatically qualifies for the 1998 championship as host.

FIFA rejected Switzerland's candidacy to avoid two competing European bids and because the country proposed temporary seating to boost stadium capacity. FIFA banned such structures after one collapsed in May at a game on the French island of Corsica, killing 15.

FIFA president Joao Havelange, a

Brazilian businessman, officially announced the result at a news conference carried live on French TV.

France promised to link all 1998 sites with the TGV high-speed train, the pride of the nation's technology.

Plans include a new 80,000-seat stadium south of Paris for the opening game and final of the 52-game tournament, and two other new arenas among the 12 game sites.

"It will be a big party," Platini said. "It's fantastic that the world's eyes will be on France."

Big Sky Conference delays expansion plans for now

BOISE (AP) — There will be no expansion of the eight-team Big Sky Conference in the immediate future.

Commissioner Ron Stephenson said Thursday the Big Sky President's Council accepted a report from a five-member expansion committee which looked into the possibility of adding Cal State-Sacramento and Cal State-Norridge, but took no action.

"Nothing happened," Stephenson said. "They accepted the report and they're on the committee. There were no motions to do anything other than that" at Tuesday's presidents' meeting in Salt Lake City.

"They (the presidents) want to wait and see what happens in California with regard to their budget concerns," Stephenson said. "There was some concern expressed over the compatibility of their facilities with the rest of the Big Sky schools."

Stephenson said officials of both California schools were encouraged to visit Big Sky facilities, with the long-range goal of reaching those levels.

"I think if they were to do that, there probably would be considerably more interest in future expansion discussions," Stephenson said. The report recommended a close look at current funding problems in the California higher education system, which could mean cutbacks in sports, and suggested that both

schools need to improve their facilities before they could be seriously considered.

A Cal State-Norridge official said that could take five to 10 years.

The University of Nevada officially dropped out of the Big Sky as of Wednesday, joining the Big West Conference. Remaining schools are Boise State, Idaho State, Idaho, Weber State, Montana, Montana State, Washington and Northern Arizona.

Prior to the meeting, members of the expansion panel said both schools lack adequate sports facilities.

Cal State-Sacramento's football

field holds about 30,000, but much of it is temporary seating. The basketball gym resembles a high school facility.

"Our on-campus facilities are at the bottom of Division I," said Lee McElroy, athletic director. "There is no question about that."

But he said the school has much to offer and should not be denied membership in the Big Sky solely because of its athletic facilities.

Robert Hiebert, Norridge's athletic director, also said sports facilities need some work. The gym was built for a student population of 12,000 but now has 31,000 students now, nearly double the enrollment at

Northern Arizona, the Big Sky's largest at 16,750.

"A new facility would have to come from student funds...it's five to 10 years off," he said.

"The expansion panel also was wary of the expected \$3.9 billion deficit projected in the California budget this year."

Hal Godwin, University of Idaho faculty representative and a member of the expansion panel, said a school struggling financially could create problems.

The Big Sky plays at the NCAA Division I-A level in football but is Division I in basketball and other sports.

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Falcons offer \$1 million if Sanders reports early

ATLANTA (AP) — The Atlanta Braves thought they would have Deion Sanders in a baseball uniform until July 31, but the Falcons have offered the two-sport star a \$1 million bonus to report to football camp early.

Sanders attorney Eugene Parker said he talked to Sanders about the offer Wednesday night after the Braves played in San Francisco.

"We didn't get into details, because he was in transit," Parker said. Parker said he was encouraged that the Falcons took the initiative and showed they wanted to sign Sanders.

Both Atlanta's franchises have been discussing contracts with Sanders' representatives.

Sanders' \$600,000 a year baseball contract with the Braves expires July 31, but the Falcons want him to report on July 13.

The Atlanta Constitution reported Thursday the \$1 million offer would drop to about \$800,000 if Sanders wanted to report to official training camp, which begins on July 25.

In the last two seasons, Sanders has paid fines for reporting late to the Falcons camps because of baseball. Sanders was shuttled from Fal-

cons practice to Braves games during a two-week period last September. He did not miss any regular season Falcons games, but was unable to play in the World Series.

Sanders is an outfielder with the Braves, and a Pro Bowl cornerback with the Falcons.

If Sanders accepts the Falcons offer, his base salary will be \$1.75 million, the highest single-season base salary ever for a defensive player.

The proposal was made in a Wednesday afternoon telephone conversation between Parker and Jim Hay, the Falcons' chief financial officer.

The Braves were idle Thursday before opening a three-game weekend series at home against the Chicago Cubs.

Falcons owner Rankin Smith huddled with high-ranking club officials on Tuesday, discussing how to keep Sanders a full-time football player.

"We took our desire to have Deion be a full-time football player and attempted to translate that into a dollar amount," Hay said. "From what we understand, Deion has a strong desire to play both sports. Our intent has always been to have his full-time pursuit be in football."

Angels lefty does everything except win

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — A well-pitched complete game with seven strikeouts and one walk acknowledged by a raucous ovation from the crowd as he walked to the dugout after holding the world champion Minnesota Twins to two runs.

It still went into the books as Jim Abbott's 10th loss of 1992.

The California Angels' left-hander, 18-11 and third in the AL's Cy Young voting last season, is having an All-Star-type campaign. In 17 starts, Abbott has a 2.93 earned-run average, has pitched 113 innings and has five complete games, ranking in the AL top 10 in each category.

Then there's the bottom line — a 4-10 record. The latest loss, 2-1 to the Twins on Wednesday, seemed typical of the way things are going for Abbott. He pitched well and still lost because his teammates couldn't score runs.

When Abbott has pitched, the Angels have scored just 35 runs for him. Take away a blip — a 10-1 victory at Seattle last week — and that averages out to less than 5 runs per start.

The pitching-well-and-losing scenario has become so familiar, it's not a topic that has dwelled upon in the clubhouse after Abbott pitches.

After the defeat by Minnesota, in which Abbott scattered eight hits and allowed just one, a double by Kent Hrbek, for extra bases, California interim manager Johnathan said, "I have said all I can really say to Jim. There's really not much left to say."

"There are some things a pitcher cannot con-

rol. All he can do is concern himself with his performance; the rest is out of his control.

"When we only get four or five singles a game, we can't expect to win."

Abbott, whose positive outlook allowed him to overcome being born with only one hand, remains relatively stoic about the lack of hitting support this year.

"Right now, it's very frustrating for both myself and the team. Nobody likes to lose," he said. "I give myself a couple of hours (to get over a loss) and then I move on, still preparing for the next time I pitch."

"I obviously need to pitch better to win. It's fine to rationalize and philosophize about everything, but I still don't like to lose. We take the game hard sometimes, and maybe these things make us better men, better players."

Twins manager Tom Kelly, for one, could appreciate the way Abbott has been pitching. "He struck us out on the high fastball and he got us out with the curve," Kelly said. "We were fortunate to get a couple of runs off him. That was all we got. He was fantastic."

Abbott's name was among several submitted by Wathan to Kelly as candidates for the All-Star Game, but Abbott said he didn't think it would be fair for him to be named to the AL staff.

"A lot of other guys have the numbers; I'm 4-10," he said. "Someday at the All-Star break, I'd like to say my numbers warranted going. But things just aren't working out this year."

Abbott smiled at the prospect when reminded that things tend to even out over time. "If that's so," he said, "one of these times I'm going to have a pretty good year."

Most athletes graduate at normal rate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Athletes at major colleges graduate, on the whole, at virtually the same rate as other students, but black males — especially those who play basketball — lag far behind their white teammates as well as the general student body, the NCAA reported Thursday.

The study showed 51 percent of athletes who entered Division I colleges and universities in 1983 and 1984 graduated, compared to 52 percent for the general student body.

On the positive side, the report found that 61 percent of female student-athletes graduate, compared to 54 percent of female students in general.

But it also showed that only 29 percent of the black males who played basketball earned their degrees, compared to 55 percent of their white teammates. Black males playing basketball at Division I-A schools had only a 23 percent graduation rate.

Overall, black male athletes had a graduation rate of 33 percent, compared to 51 percent for the entire black student body, the NCAA said. Black female athletes had a rate of 43 percent, compared to 54 percent for black females in general.

For white student-athletes, the graduation rate was 58 percent, compared to 55 percent for white students in general.

Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J., and a former star of the New York Knicks, called the figures for black athletes "deeply disturbing."

"We clearly need more research, not limited to the athletic arena, about why blacks are not finishing college, and whether the obstacle is shrinking financial aid or deteriorating race relations on campus," he said.

Dick Schultz, president of the NCAA, expressed some satisfaction at the overall figures. "I always felt people would be very surprised about the graduation rates of athletes," he said.

Still, "Athletes should graduate at a higher rate," Schultz said. "They don't have the financial pressure that other students have."

Contenders want winner to fight champ

NEW YORK (AP) — Razor Ruddock has agreed to fight Lennox Lewis in London this fall, with one stipulation — heavyweight champion Evander Holyfield must fight the winner. In his next title defense.

"I'm going to fight Lewis in London. I should have a guarantee that Holyfield won't fight anyone else but me or Lewis," Ruddock said. "I don't think it's fair that Riddick Bowe should get a shot before me."

Holyfield made his last title defense on June 10 with a 12-round decision over former champion Larry Holmes. After the fight, Holyfield's promoter, Dan Duva, said they were interested in a fight with Bowe in November.

To get there, however, Bowe must first beat South African Jerry Coetzee on July 18.

"I've fought Mike Tyson twice. I'm ranked No. 1 in the world by the WBC," Ruddock said. "I don't think it's fair that Bowe should get a title shot before me by fighting some South African nobody's ever heard of."

Muhammad, who promotes Ruddock's fights, said he had a basic agreement with Lewis and his British-based handlers to fight on Oct. 31, however, Ruddock would like that date moved up to sometime in September.

Discount rate lowered by Fed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Reserve Thursday slashed two key interest rates in an effort to sustain a recovery showing alarming signs of faltering.

The Fed first lowered the discount rate from 3.5 percent to 3 percent, its lowest rate in nearly three decades.

The Fed board, by a 7-0 vote, acted on the discount rate less than an hour after the government reported that unemployment surged unexpectedly to 7.8 percent in June.

The Fed's easing efforts had an immediate impact on commercial banks, prompting many of them to cut their prime rate.

The Fed's aggressive move to add bank reserves as a signal that it had lowered the funds target a half percentage point to 3.25 percent down from 3.75 percent.

President Bush, at a Capitol Hill news conference, said the unemployment rate surge was "not good news," but said the interest rate cut "will be stimulative and will be very well received."

A cut in the discount rate is the most dramatic signal the Fed can send of its intentions to bolster a sagging economy by easing credit conditions for consumers and businesses.

Bank of America and Morgan Guaranty Bank lowered their prime rate, the rate charged their best business customers, to 6 percent from 6.5 percent.

The prime rate serves as a benchmark for a wide variety of loans to consumers and businesses, including many auto loans and home equity loans.

Both stock and bond prices rose strongly following the Fed announcement. The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials climbed 14.44 points to 3,368.54 in the first half hour of trading.

Economist Allen Sinai of the Boston Co. said consumers should soon begin to see the effect of the discount rate reduction in the form of lower lending rates.

"What's outweighing the helpful effects of lower interest rates is a whole host of structural economic problems that just haven't existed in all our other episodes," he said.

"The discount rate reduction, effective immediately, came under pressure from Bush and amid growing signs the already weak economy may be headed toward a repeat of last year, when it stalled following a brief period of growth."

"I think every American would like to see them lower. That includes me," said economist Robert J. Gordon, president of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York.

Federal Reserve policy-makers met behind closed doors on Tuesday and Wednesday. It was thought they were leaning toward holding rates steady, but that was before the release of today's unexpectedly dismal unemployment number.

The Fed cut the discount rate last December, to 3.5 percent from 4.5 percent. That reduction came amid growing signs the already weak economy might be sliding into a so-called "double-dip" recession, in which it turns down after a period of growth.

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The new package, agreed to Wednesday by AT&T and its union workers, would cut the company \$1.5 billion over the life of the contract, AT&T officials said.

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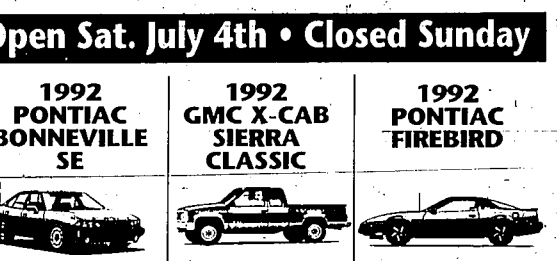

Seinfeld's Richards is not your typical next door New Yorker

Viewers of NBC's his Wednesday-night comedy series 'Seinfeld' are sure to be familiar with — and fond of — Michael Richards. Most of them know him, however, by the name of his character: Kramer, the hyperactive neighbor across the hall of the sitcom's star, Jerry Seinfeld. Richards' appearances are usually brief, but he manages to inject an incredible amount of humor and energy into an already lively show.

With his lanky arms akimbo, eyes wide open and head bobbing, Richards doesn't just recite jokes; he uses his body as his most effective comedic tool. Because of his physical finesse, even minor actions are transformed into high comedy. When a thought occurs to Kramer, he responds as though an electric jolt has just shot through his entire body — the physical equivalent of a light bulb sparking over his head.

In delivering these well-timed bits of manic stangeness to the lives of the show's pleasantly neurotic New Yorkers, Kramer does more than supply comic relief; he provides a

way for the other characters to deal with their everyday insecurities in the departments of romance, money, and employment. "He shakes them into another consideration; another way to look at what they're doing," Richards explains.

Richards also provided the 1991-92 television season with its most talked-about cliffhanger, as Kramer wandered to the West Coast and suddenly found himself working as a temp in the office of Murphy Brown.

Richards doesn't just play Kramer; the character was largely his conception. "Eighty percent of it was my own invention," Richards says. "There were certain tracks to follow in regard to the material, the lines I have to say, but the look and the way in which I walk or enter is my own."

He took his inspiration from the great comedians of the silent-movie era. "I've always felt that the best comedy is the comedy that can be seen rather than spoken, and the old clowns did funny things rather than said funny things," Richards says. "Laurel and Hardy can get big laughs just trying to start a car."

Off the set, Richards is nothing like the overanimated Kramer.

Instead, we find a serious and soft-spoken actor who has a firm understanding of his work and 'Seinfeld's' formula of success. He attributes much of the effectiveness of the show's comedy to the rapport of cast members Seinfeld, Julie Louis-Dreyfus and Jason Alexander.

Details of Morrow's contract problems were not divulged. The source close to the show, who spoke on the condition of anonymity, told The Associated Press Morrow had been due on the set Tuesday.

Fall season production began last week.

Calls to Morrow's agent in New York were not immediately returned.

Morrow has starred for two years in the show about a New York doctor forced to serve his residency in Alaska.

In his 35 years at CBS, Kuralt is best known for his sentimental "On the Road" vignettes that aired on Dan Rather's "CBS Evening News." But "Sunday Morning" and other network responsibilities have kept him off the road for about a year. Kuralt, who joined CBS in May '57, is 57.

Peter Lassally, a 22-year "Tonight Show" veteran who had been Johnny Carson's exec producer since '90, was named executive producer of David Letterman's "Late Night" on NBC. He succeeds Jack Rollins, who retired in April. Robert "Morty" Morton, Letterman's producer since '87, was named co-executive producer.

NBC has moved quickly to fill the "Saturday Today" and "Sunday Today" anchors slots, to be vacated at the end of July by Garrick Utley and Mary Alice Williams. The new kids on the block will be Scott Simon, 40, a Peabody Award-winning National Public Radio veteran, and Jackie Nespral, 26, a newsreader for Univision.

NBC is busily putting together a four-hour miniseries based on the hot biography "Diana: Her True Story," Andrew Morton's revealing sizzler about a certain British princess.
