In harm's way

Mother of tot who drowned finds obstacles to getting Perrine Coulee fenced off

TWIN FALLS - Two months ago Laura Bashline turned her back for 60 seconds and her daughter Jordan drowned in Perrine Coulee.

If the coulee had been fenced, 2-year-old Jordan wouldn't have fallen in, Bashline said.

She does not want one more child to drown in the coulee, so Bashline has started a drive to fence the coulee. But she is learning that getting the waterway fenced will not be easy.

Almost all of the land bordering the coulee is privately owned, meaning that homeowners and landowners must fence the property themselves. The coulee lies in a flood plain and any fencing must meet federal flood-plain rules.

"This is something that impacts a lot of people. ... A lot of this is going to

depend on the owners taking personal responsibility," Bashline said Thursday.

She has collected \$4,000 in donations to help fence the coulee and hopes to get more money.

Bashline had hoped that the city of Twin Falls and the Twin Falls Canal Co. could help fence the coulee from southeast to northwest through the middle of Twin Falls.

Thursday she talked with Twin Falls City Manager Tom Courtney and Jack Eakin, acting manager of the Twin Falls Canal Co.

While Courtney and Eakin said they'd do what they can, neither could offer any

money.

"We only get money from farmers. We don't feel we can donate that money," Eakin said.

Likewise, the city does not generally donate taxpayer money to projects that private property owners should handle, Courtney said.

Any financial help from the city would have to be OK'd by the City Council.

The canal company has the right to clear the coulee of debris and the city can try to get landowners to clear the weeds, but otherwise neither the city nor canal company has authority over the land, Eakin and Courtney said.

The city will help Bashline design fencing that meets the flood-plain standards, Courtney said. And city Attorney Fritz Wonderlich will help draft an ordinance making it illegal to use the coulee for recreation.

Prosecutor clears ex-CSI player of rape allegation

TWIN FALLS - Former College of Southern Idaho basketball star Craig Tyson did not rape a 19-year-old Twin Falls woman, the Twin Falls County prosecutor said Thursday.

"The actions of Mr. Tyson do not constitute rape" under Idaho law, Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter said in a memo explaining why she was declining to prosecute the case.

A College of Southern Idaho student and one-time friend of Tyson's told police that she was raped in her apartment June 14.

Baxter said that, although Tyson, 22, and the woman did have sex on the night in question, there was no rape because the woman consented at first and protested only later, during the act.

Under Idaho law, rape requires actual resistance before the act and the overcoming of that resistance by force or violence.

"Some other states are more liberal or more progressive" and require only the lack of consent to prove rape, Baxter said.

Neither Tyson nor his attorney, Bill Hollifield, could be reached for comment Thursday. Tyson declined comment on the allegations when contacted by a reporter last month.

A 6-foot, 4½-inch Baltimore native, Tyson started at the swing position for CSI last year. He plans to continue his college basketball career at the University of Arkansas this fall.

The woman who brought the charge

against Tyson said she was unhappy when Baxter told her Thursday morning that no charges would be filed.

"But it's nothing against her," the woman said. "She explained that under the law it wasn't rape."

"Everyone I know believes all you have to do is say 'No,' and that's not enough," she said.

According to Baxter's memo, the woman saw Tyson with a group of friends and invited them over to her apartment about three hours before the incident.

There was no response, so the woman went home, leaving her door unlocked because she was unsure whether her roommates had come home yet.

She was asleep when Tyson came into her apartment at about 4 a.m., and she asked him to leave because she "wasn't in the mood," the memo said.

"I wasn't insistent, because he was a friend," the woman said Thursday. "I thought that was good enough for him."

The woman said she met Tyson in August, and she told investigators that they had "consensual sexual contact" last fall, Baxter's memo says.

After being asked to go home, Tyson left the room but came back, the woman said. At that point, the woman said she was willing to have sex with him. The conflict began when the sex act began to cause pain, the woman said.

"She states at that point she was hurting and told him to stop," Baxter's memo says. The woman said Tyson didn't stop, but

Baby-boom ticket to lead Democrats

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Gov. Bill Clinton named Sen. Albert Gore Jr. as his running mate Thursday, selecting a fellow Southerner and moderate to form the first major-party ticket from the baby boom era.

"Throughout American history, each generation has passed on leadership to the next. That time has come again, the time for a new generation of leadership for the United States of America," said Gore.

In choosing the two-term Tennessee senator, Clinton went against the old maxim of balancing the ticket and the new maxim that Congress is a bad place to shop for national leadership.

In a joint appearance, the two men said they stood for strong families, a clean environment and a growing economy with benefits for all — a likely preview of issues to arise in the three-way race with George Bush and Ross Perot.

Clinton said he and Gore share the values they learned in their home towns of Hope, Ark., and Carthage, Tenn. — "individual responsibility, hard work, faith and family, and the idea that people who work hard and play by the rules should be rewarded with the American dream."

Clinton, 45, and Gore, 44, both have struggled with the political issues of the time in which they came of age.

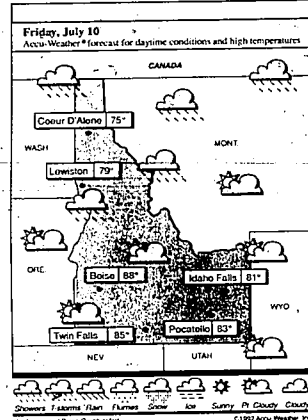
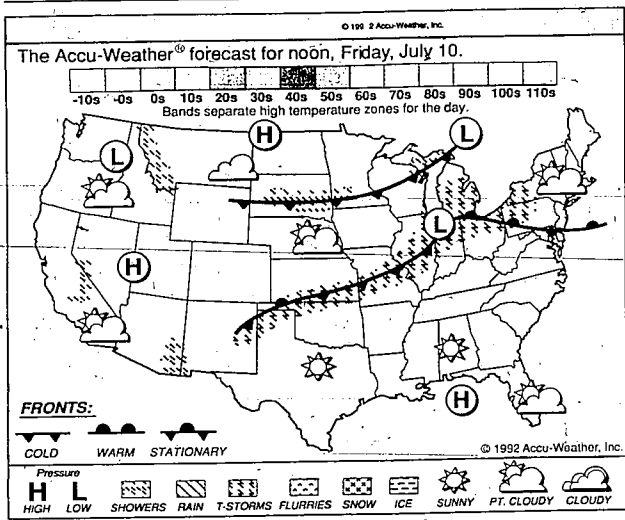

Thunderstorms rumble over Plains states again

Thunderstorms hit the Plains and the Mississippi Valley on Thursday while rain was scattered over the northern Rockies and the Southwest.

Storms produced hail as big as baseballs in Charleston, Ill., and the size of golfballs in Decatur, Ill., the National Weather Service said.

Morning thunderstorms produced dime-size hail south of Atlanta, Mo., and hail an inch in diameter northeast of Versailles, Ill., the weather service said.

Strong thunderstorms also hit eastern South Dakota. Showers prevailed in western and northeastern Kansas and southeastern Nebraska and were scattered from northeastern Wyoming to northwestern Montana.

Elsewhere, showers were scattered over southern California and light rain and drizzle spread over northern New England. Heaviest rainfall amounts during the six hours up to 2 p.m. EDT were half an inch or less.

Strong northwesterly wind behind a cold front kept afternoon temperatures in the 50s and 60s in the northern high Plains.

Lows early Thursday cooled only into the upper 70s as far north as the upper Ohio Valley. Charleston, W.Va., reported a low of 78 and Beckley, W.Va., had a record warm low of 73.

Florida also posted record warm lows with 76 at Daytona Beach, 91 at Miami and 84 at Key West, the Weather Service said.

Overnight lows in the 40s were confined to the Great Basin and the northern and central Rockies.

Thursday's low for the Lower 48 states was 35 at West Yellowstone, Mont.

support a new U.N. resolution "calling for all necessary means" to protect shipments of food and medicine to Bosnia.

He wouldn't give further details but said: "Some have felt it is not likely we would see American combat troops on the ground, but that we might more likely see as a contribution from this country the provision of air and naval power."

In Washington, the Pentagon confirmed that two U.S. warships, the amphibious assault ship USS two Jima and the guided missile cruiser USS Biddle, were now in the Adriatic while the aircraft carrier USS Saratoga was in the western Mediterranean.

Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said the two warships would provide "communications and tracking capabilities" for aircraft landing in the Sarajevo relief mission, as well as standing by for any possible search-and-rescue missions.

The two Jima is manned by 1,700 Marines, has CH-53 and CH-46 troop and transport helicopters, but has no attack choppers, Williams said.

Judge rules boy, 11, may 'divorce' parents

ORLANDO, Fla. — In perhaps the first ruling of its kind in the nation, an Orange Circuit Judge decided Thursday that an 11-year-old boy can sue his parents to end their relationship.

After a four-hour closed hearing in juvenile court, Judge Thomas Kirk agreed with arguments from the boy's lawyers that the Florida Constitution guarantees the courts will be open to all people, including children.

The ruling means the boy will have a trial this fall on whether he should live permanently with his natural mother or be adopted by the Lake County, Fla., foster family he lives with now, said his attorney, Jerri Blair of Leesburg, Fla.

The case has drawn attention because it apparently is the first time a child has sued his parents for what amounts to a divorce. The boy has said he wants his foster parents to adopt him because his biological parents have abused and neglected him.

However, the first issue that had to be decided was whether the boy had the right to sue. Children normally do not have legal rights in custody cases. They are represented by the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services and an appointed attorney known as a guardian ad litem.

Children's rights groups called Kirk's ruling a major victory.

But the lawyer for the boy's natural mother said she feared the judge "has opened a Pandora's box" that will lead to children suing their parents over every perceived wrong.

"There has to be a delineation between Orlando attorney Jane Carey. We're changing the whole system here. They (children) are going to have the ability to sue over anything."

This will help raise parents' awareness of the dangers.

In the meantime, Bashline has contacted property owners to see if they will help fence the coulee in dangerous areas. Any fencing likely will need gates to give canal-company workers access to clear the canal of debris and weeds.

Property owners who are willing to fence probably will have to sign an agreement saying they will control the weeds and keep up their

area by the fence.

"So far the response has been very good," she said.

Twin Falls accountant David Cooper will help set up a fund for donations for the fencing.

On Sunday, May 17, Jordan Bashline was walking with her sister and brother at the end of a cul-de-sac at Morningside Drive. Her mother had been watching Jordan and the other children, but went to the garage for just a minute.

In that time, Jordan wandered near

told her to "shut up" and treated her rudely afterwards.

Had it not been for the pain, both emotional and physical, the woman said she would not have reported the incident to police.

The next day, the woman said she talked to her roommate about what had happened, and also went to the local rape crisis center.

"It kept haunting me all day long," she said.

The counselor at the rape crisis center convinced her she had been raped, and she decided to tell police, the woman said.

But that report came more than 48 hours after the incident, and the physical evidence had been destroyed, Baxter said.

The prosecutor said she made her decision after talking to the complaining witness several times and after reading a report by a polygraph expert from the Idaho Bureau of Investigation who advised her not to file charges.

The woman agreed to take a lie-detector test, but no test was performed because the investigator who interviewed the woman before testing determined there was no criminal case, Baxter said.

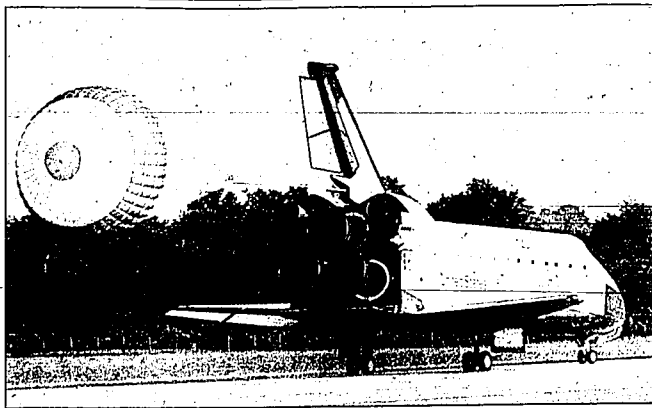

Columbia lands safely in Florida, ending longest shuttle flight

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Columbia touched down Thursday a day late and a continent away to end the longest shuttle flight, a 14-day research mission intended as a rehearsal for NASA's space station.

The shuttle swooped across a clear sky and landed on the concrete runway at Kennedy Space Center an hour after sunrise. It was diverted to Florida because of rain at the preferred landing site — Edwards Air Force Base in California.

"Congratulations on the longest shuttle flight on record. Thanks for helping to pave the way to space station operations," Mission Control's Ken Reighter told the crew.

Kennedy Director Robert Crippen, a former astronaut, greeted the crew and said shuttle commander Richard N. Richards told him "they could have stayed up there for many more days."

Three Skylab missions in 1973-74 lasted 28 days, 59 days and 84 days. And the Russians hold the space endurance record: 366 days.

But space agency officials said Columbia's mission will pave the way for monthlong stays aboard space station Freedom, to be built in orbit starting in late 1995. "It's a significant milestone," Crippen said. "I was proud of the way it (Columbia) performed and I think that the science that was accomplished on board was also a precursor of the kinds of things that we can do in orbit by staying up longer."

Crippen said both Columbia and its crew looked fine. The astronauts were hustled off for medical tests and later were to head to Houston, home of NASA's Johnson Space Center.

Doctors had worried about how the five men and two women might fare when returning to gravity after being away so long. Unlike their predecessors, whose spacecraft parachuted into the ocean, shuttle pilots must be healthy and alert to guide their ship to a safe landing.

Richards and pilot Kenneth Bowersox seemed steady on their feet when they walked around and

underneath Columbia after emerging from the shuttle. They inspected the tires — a new and improved kind — and the thermal tiles.

NASA added new tires and brakes, as well as the red, white and blue drag chute that popped from the tail as Columbia rolled down the runway, to make Kennedy landings safer.

The drag chute was first used on the last shuttle flight.

The space agency prefers Edwards with its wide-open spaces in the Mojave Desert to the single concrete runway at Kennedy when the shuttle weighs more than 205,000 pounds. Columbia exceeded 228,000 pounds, 22,200 pounds of that from Spacecab, the 23-foot-long laboratory in the cargo bay.

Schools' innovation recognized

WASHINGTON (AP) — Programs including extended school days, pre-natal care and extensive use of computers were among the winners Thursday as the New American Schools Development Corp. announced selection of 11 designs for innovative elementary schools.

President Bush said the designs were intended "to create the best schools in the world" and are "in the forefront of a movement that will, by the end of the 1990s, create revolutionary new schools."

The New American Schools Corp. was formed a year ago at Bush's request to finance new school systems that communities across the country can copy. The organization did not specify the extent of any financial rewards for the winning designs.

Among the winners is a project of The Johns Hopkins University, the St. Mary's County, Md., public schools and the Maryland State Department of Education. It calls for restructuring four elementary schools in the Lexington Park, Md., area. Johns Hopkins said in a news release that it would cover "not just the traditional elementary school years, but the first 11 years of life."

The announcement said schools would remain open for extended days, in part to allow children who need it to receive extra help.

Another winner was a project of Audrey Cohen College in New York. The college said its system begins with pre-natal care and calls for students to carry out "constructive actions in the community" to apply their knowledge and skills.

The college said the program would be initially implemented in Alexandria, Va., Chicago, Hollandale, Miss., New York City, Phoenix, San Diego and Washington, D.C.

Another winner was organized by the National Center on Education and the Economy in Rochester, N.Y., headed by John Sculley, chairman and chief executive officer of Apple Computer Inc.

Other winners were:

- ATLAS Communities, Providence, R.I., with initial school sites in Lancaster, Pa., Norfolk, Va., Prince George's County, Md., and Guilford, Maine.
- The Odyssey Project, Gaston County, N.C., with initial sites in that county's 54 schools.
- The Bensenville Community Design, Bensenville, Ill., a community of 17,000 residents.
- Community Learning Centers, Minneapolis, with initial sites in Robbins School District in rural West-Central Minnesota, North Branch and St. Cloud.

- The Co-NECT School, Cambridge, Mass., with initial sites in Boston and Worcester, Ma.
- Expeditionary Learning, Boston, with initial school sites in Portland, Maine, Boston, New York City, Decatur, Ga. and Douglas County, Colo.
- The Los Angeles Learning Centers with initial sites in Los Angeles County involving approximately 3,200 children.
- The Modern Red Schoolhouse, Indianapolis, with initial school sites in Portland, Maine, Boston, New York City, Decatur, Ga. and Greentown, Ind., Charlotte, N.C. and Kayenta, Ariz.

Veteran television news commentator Eric Sevareid dies at 79

what Walter Lippmann did for the newspaper column in this country," said his long-time friend James Reston, a New York Times editor and columnist, shortly before Sevareid's retirement from CBS News in 1977.

Sevareid had always fashioned himself—more—essayist—than—performer. He prided himself on elegant prose, lucid arguments and would frequently chide the glitzy, superficial aspects of electronic journalism.

As a young Paris-based reporter for United Press and the New York Herald Tribune, he suggested to the late Edward R. Murrow, who was

recruiting him for a radio job, that his voice was not appropriate for broadcasting.

Sevareid accepted the position, however, and would from that time on be known as one of "Murrow's boys," a group of newspapermen assembled in Europe by the CBS producer on the eve of World War II.

Many who knew the tall, thin man with a craggy face said he was shy, often to the point of aloofness.

"I am cursed with a somewhat forbidding Scandinavian manner, with a restraint that spells stiffness to a lot of people," Sevareid wrote in a 1965 article for Look magazine. "Inside I am a mush, full of a lot of almost bathetic sentimentality about this country, the Midwest, Abraham Lincoln and the English language."

His detractors accused Sevareid of being too wishy-washy, and called him "Eric Sevareidides." He was often criticized for rambling, for failing to make clear exactly what he wished to say.

But even those who disagreed

with him were often won by him. An aide to former President Nixon once explained that Sevareid was never attacked by the Nixon White House during Watergate because the broadcaster "looked and dressed exactly like God."

In fact, he had humble beginnings. Sevareid's America was symbolized by a wheat-growing village called Velva, N.D., where he was born, the son of a small-town banker. His grandfather had immigrated from Norway a half-century earlier.

After graduating from the University of Minnesota, Sevareid went to work for the Minneapolis Journal, only to be let go, the victim of a bad economy and a labor dispute. Sevareid went to Europe, where he studied at the London School of Economics and the Alliance Française in Paris.

It was in 1938 that he took the job with the Herald Tribune. A year later, he received a phone call from Murrow who was in London. "I don't know very much about your

experience," Murrow later recalled saying, "but I like the way you write and I like your ideas."

Sevareid traveled through Belgium, France, Holland and Luxembourg, broadcasting war news back to the United States. He was the last

American to broadcast from Paris before it fell to the Germans.

Afterward, he joined Murrow in London, and broadcast from there during the mass bombing raids. Home sick, he returned to the United States in 1940.

Candidates fare poorly on AIDS issue

WASHINGTON — Only 6 percent of Americans think President Bush is doing a good job of handling the AIDS problem, but few believe Bill Clinton or Ross Perot would do better, according to a poll released Thursday by an AIDS activist group.

The survey found 9 percent of those asked would do a good job of handling the AIDS problem while 8 percent felt Clinton would. But 52 percent of those asked said none of the candidates is equal to the task while 24 percent had no opinion.

"The public wants both plain talk and action on AIDS from the government, from the presidential candidates and from the president," said Burns Roper, chairman of the Roper Organization, which conducted the poll. "It doesn't feel it has been getting appropriate action from government or appropriate leadership either from Bush or his would-be successors."

Democrats want independent counsel

WASHINGTON — House Judiciary Democrats on Thursday asked for appointment of an independent counsel to investigate possible criminal misconduct by senior Bush administration officials concerning U.S. pre-war policy toward Iraq.

Judiciary Committee Chairman Jack Brooks, D-Texas, announced the move after a caucus of the panel's Democrats generated 20 signatures for the request to Attorney General William Barr.

Brooks and his colleagues asked that the counsel investigate:

- Whether laws were violated in providing U.S. assistance to Iraq prior to Saddam Hussein's August 1990 invasion of Kuwait;
- Whether the administration illegally falsified documents given to congressional panels looking into the policy, and withheld other information from congressional investigators;
- Whether the White House interfered in the federal investigation of more than \$4 billion in loans to Iraq by the Atlanta branch of an Italian bank, some of them taxpayer-subsidized commodity loans.

Filings for unemployment decline

WASHINGTON — The number of Americans filing new claims for unemployment benefits shrank by 4,000 in late June for the second straight weekly decline, the government reported Thursday.

The number of first-time applications for jobless benefits totaled 416,000 during the week ending June 27, down from 420,000 a week earlier, the Labor Department reported.

After ranging in the 450,000-level during the winter, new jobless claims dropped below 410,000 for much of the spring before jumping to 421,000 during the week of June 13.

But despite the back-to-back declines the following two weeks, the number of weekly claims remained high enough to push the four-week moving average to 415,750 during the period ending June 27.

Republicans attack transportation idea

WASHINGTON — A Democratic bid to shift hundreds of millions of foreign aid dollars to jobs-creating transportation projects was assailed by Republicans Thursday as an election-year effort to destroy a 2-year-old deficit-reduction agreement.

As debate opened on a \$25 billion transportation appropriations bill, aides to President Bush made it known that he will likely veto the measure if Democrats succeed in the money transfer.

The Democratic proposal, contained in an amendment sponsored by Rep. David Obey, D-Wis., provides \$400 million for spending next year and authority to spend an additional \$2.2 billion over the next several years. Congress would later have to vote that additional money.

Bill Clinton ignores tradition of balancing ticket

NEW YORK — So much for ticket-balancing and base-touching. Bill Clinton teamed with a look-alike running mate, the senator next door, in a calculated break with campaign tradition.

For the second spot on his presidential campaign ticket, the governor of Arkansas chose Sen. Albert Gore Jr. of Tennessee, a man about his own age, from his own region, identified with his own centrist Democratic philosophy.

In old school politics, the rule was balance — regional, philosophical, even generational. The theory was that contrasts, even opposites, might attract more votes to a ticket.

None of the above apply to the ticket the Democratic National Convention will ratify at Madison Square Garden next week.

Clinton and Gore are from adjacent, relatively small Southern states. Clinton is 45, Gore is 44. Both are allied with the centrist, moderate school of Democratic politics, although Republican campaigners already are trying to depict Gore as an all-out, old-line liberal.

"Throughout American history, each generation has passed on leadership to the next," said Gore, whose father was a senator, too. "That time has come again."

For the first time, a major party is nominating two men born after World War II. As John F. Kennedy began his presidency, he said the torch had been passed to a generation tested in that war and in the bitter peace of the Cold War era. With the Clinton-Gore ticket, it passes again — this time, in less elegant phraseology, to the baby boom generation.

That's a contrast to the generation gap on the Republican ticket — Bush is 68, Vice President Dan Quayle 45.

Nor were old-fashioned geography lessons a factor. No Boston-Austin span this time as last. "You can exaggerate geography," said former Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis, trounced in 1988 with Texas Sen. Lloyd Bentson as his running mate. "These campaigns really become national."

Clinton and Gore share the Democratic center, although the Bush campaign will be out to convince voters that they're liberals in disguise. The Clinton wager is that a centrist ticket can reclaim votes that have been going Republican, particu-

ularly in the South and Sun Belt states.

The last time the Democrats won the White House, in 1976, they did it with Jimmy Carter, their most conservative nominee of the era.

The arithmetic of a three-way contest against Bush and independent Ross Perot makes the South crucial to Clinton. It has become part of the base for successive GOP presidential victories, and Perot has fared well in polls there. Liberals have been losers there, balanced tickets notwithstanding.

And a strategy that succeeded in forcing Bush and Perot to defend the South and Sun Belt could divert them and thus help Clinton in states he must win to have a chance in California, plus the old Democratic strongholds of the industrial Midwest and Northeast.

Bush's campaign manager, Fred Malek, said he doesn't expect the president will have problems in the South, although he conceded that Gore might deliver Tennessee's 11 electoral votes to the Democrats.

Ironically, the centrist credentials that may be a major asset in the fall got an unintended boost from Jesse Jackson.

"Well, it's all so Southern, it's all Democratic Leadership Council, so it's a fairly narrow ticket," Jackson said in a Fox television interview. The council is an umbrella group set

up by centrist Democrats to push their views in party councils.

"It takes two wings to fly," Jackson said. "and here you have two of the same wing."

There are some differences between the men. Clinton said he wanted a candidate to complement his own experience and background. A governor, he got one from Congress, with House and Senate experience dating from 1976.

Gore is a Vietnam veteran; Clinton didn't go. Gore is an environmental specialist; that topic has been a target for Clinton's campaign critics. He broke with Democratic leaders in 1991 and voted to authorize force in the Persian Gulf, then spoke out against Republicans he said were playing politics with Desert Storm.

Clinton said, and repeated, that Gore is qualified for the presidency, "has what it takes to lead this great nation from the day we take office." The Democrats will argue that Quayle never has met that standard.

For all that, vice presidential nominees do not win elections. In a close vital electoral vote, but even that hasn't happened since Lyndon B. Johnson helped the Kennedy ticket narrowly carry Texas in 1960.

Four years ago, he'd called the vice presidential nomination a political dead end. It isn't. In six of the last seven presidential elections, at least one major party presidential nominee had served as vice president.

Tipper active on campaign trail

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The all-Southern team of Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton and Tennessee Sen. Albert Gore Jr. gives the Democrats not two seasoned campaigners but four.

Both Hillary Rodham Clinton and Tipper Gore are outspoken and have shared many election campaigns with their husbands.

Mrs. Gore, 43, joined forces with Susan Baker, wife of Secretary of State James Baker, to crusade against off-color lyrics on rock 'n' roll recordings.

The women formed the Parents' Music Resource Center to persuade the music industry to place warning labels on recordings containing lyrics considered too sexual or violent for young ears.

Mrs. Clinton, 44, has campaigned for her husband all five times he has been elected governor. She has

turned the job of Arkansas first lady into a personally tailored power base.

She continued her work on children's issues nationally, became a senior partner in a law firm, spearheaded state education reforms and helped raise the couple's only daughter, Chelsea, now 12.

An active feminist, she adopted her husband's surname only after it threatened to become a political liability to the Democratic candidate.

Mrs. Clinton has toyed with the idea of running for public office and Clinton said he would like to give her a high-level job in U.S. government if he is elected.

Record lyrics are not Mrs. Gore's only issue. She also has spoken out for better mental health facilities for children, and promised in 1988 that

if Gore were elected president, he would establish a day care center at the White House to point up the need for better child care.

She also has been an advocate for the homeless.

Mrs. Gore has been prominent on the campaign trail when her husband ran for the House, the Senate and the presidency.

The former Mary Elizabeth Aitchison, she married Gore in 1970. She has been called "Tipper" since she was a toddler. Friends said the nickname stems from a nursery rhyme she liked.

The couple has four children: Kareenna, 20; Kristin, 14; Sarah, 13; and Albert III, 9. Albert III was injured in a car accident that left him camped in a body cast soon after the 1988 campaign and his mother said the near-tragedy drew the family closer together.

He easily won re-election to three more terms in the House before winning election to the U.S. Senate in 1984. He was easily re-elected in 1990.

Summer festivals bring fun, but sometimes trouble, too

In the Magic Valley, nothing quite defines community like the summer festivals that annually attract thousands of people.

In small towns from Glens Ferry to Albion, they're an affirmation of our common sense of place and our shared sense of pride, of what distinguishes one town from another and our little corner of the world from the rest.

These summer celebrations dwarf other social and recreational activities in the valley in popularity. A check with local law enforcement agencies showed that on the Fourth of July more than 40,000 people were at the three community festivals in Haul, Rupert and Hailey.

That's one-fourth of the population of the Magic Valley.

Some of these events, such as the Idaho Regatta - Burley's early-summer gathering of muscle boats - outgrow their local roots and attract a larger following, bringing thousands of dollars into the community and national attention to a town that is trying hard to diversify its economy.

But there's a danger that such an event will fall victim to its own success and alienate the people responsible for its popularity. And there are signs that may be happening in Burley.

Along with the world-class speedboats at this year's regatta, there was more than a little uncouth behavior by spectators. The combination of hot

sun, cold beer and too little security resulted in fights, drunkenness, property damage and indecent exposure - just the kind of thing that keeps local residents and their families away.

There's an understandable reluctance on the part of organizers of such a successful event to fix something that isn't broken, but the regatta's growing reputation for boorish fans is a real danger to its future.

There aren't enough hard-core boat racing fans in Burley to support such an event; it depends on the good will of families who peruse their Sunday newspapers and decide it would be fun to go to the boat races.

Those aren't the kind of people who are going to put up with the kind of 80-proof hooliganism that's more appropriate to an English soccer stadium than to a pleasant marina in a straight-faced, rock-ribbed conservative town like Burley.

One of the reasons people live in the Magic Valley is that it's still a place where family values mean something. That applies to the way we make a living, the way we organize our lives - and the way we have fun.

That's the kind of fun that the Idaho Regatta used to be, but it has changed.

The regatta's problems should inspire concern among Burley's civic leaders - and watchful caution among organizers of the valley's other summer events.

Galled by patrol policy

For Bush, no good deed goes unpunished

If Ronald Reagan was a Teflon president, George Bush is Velcro.

Nothing much ever stuck to Reagan. But no matter what Bush does, he can't shake the unhappy images, unfounded charges, impossible expectations and political mud that sticks to him like burrs to sweat socks. To borrow his own unfortunate metaphor, he hasn't mastered the necessary art of avoiding the political doo-doo, and it may be his undoing. For examples:

No one has produced a "smoking bimbo" to substantiate rumors that Bush has cheated on his wife. If not lately then at least once upon a time. But the stories persist like urban legends, usually based on an unidentified source who recalls a conversation with someone whose name he won't disclose who remembers hearing something he assumed meant Bush was having an affair.

Why don't the mainstream media report it? They are too much in awe of the presidency and too concerned about the woman's privacy, according to the "other-Gennifer" theorists.

Communism died on Bush's watch and with it the Cold War that has cost this nation hundreds of billions of dollars and clouded the lives of Americans for almost half a century with fears of nuclear holocaust.

But none of the credit sticks to Bush as one of the winning Cold War strategists. Instead, he's dumped on for not immediately producing solutions for the Soviet economy and the ethnic turmoil among the old Soviet states.

Bush offers no world leadership, no global vision, his critics say. But when faced with the first military takeover of one country by another in the post-Cold War era, Bush quickly rallied a United Nations force to turn the invaders back.

The cost in human life was minimal for the peacekeepers. Other countries picked up a large share of the bills. And Bush set

up a useful game plan: The world would cooperate to stop aggression immediately but would not invade another country to depose a ruler, however abhorrent his policies.

No evidence has been turned up despite extensive investigation that Bush, in whatever political capacity, had double-dealings with the Iraqis aimed at postponing the release of the hostages until after Reagan was elected. But Bush-whackers prefer the persistent, ugly rumors, however flimsy, to the facts.

Bush was the youngest pilot in the Navy in World War II, having volunteered at age 18, and survived being shot down over the Pacific during a bombing run. He was a success in the tough Texas oil business and head of the CIA. He is a demon speedboat racer, a non-stop athlete.

But he still can't get loose from the label "wimp."

No one has ever figured out how to eliminate business cycles. There's no consensus among economists about how to end recessions, especially when the national debt is astronomical, labor is cheaper overseas and foreign competition is sharpening. But Bush is stuck with the blame not only for this recession but for the stagnating recovery and for sounding stupid and unearring when he's trying to restore economic confidence.

All politicians make campaign promises they can't keep, especially when it comes to taxes. Bush's failures, especially with regard to taxes, seem to be cardinal sins, not mere political expediences.

Say magazine has counted up 1,000 reasons not to vote for Bush. They include: "He has two middle names" (No. 896); "one in every four pregnant American women does not receive early prenatal care" (No. 919); "his favorite tennis player

is Pam Shriver" (No. 764); "even the rich aren't happy" (No. 77); "he said nothing about the Exxon Valdez spill for seven days" (No. 511); "Dick Cheney bounced a lot of checks as a congressman" (No. 446).

A few weeks ago, the chair of the National Commission on AIDS publicly blamed the president for not halting the AIDS epidemic, as if he could somehow change the behavior that is spreading HIV and order up a cure and a vaccine.

The impending population crisis is Bush's fault and he could solve it if he would, a family-planning expert told the nation on "60 Minutes." Never mind the cultural, social, political, educational and economic barriers.

When Bush says there are no more American POWs or MIAs in Southeast Asia, he's not just accused of being mistaken or getting inadequate military intelligence but of deliberate, lying conspiracy.

Poor Bush. His daughter married a Democrat. A son got mixed up in a savings-and-loan mess. His dog earned hundreds of times more in book royalties than he does. A hurricane churned through his home and swept a lifetime of personal belongings out to sea. He tried to tough out an attack of stomach flu on a trip to Japan and threw up at a formal dinner.

His mother taught him to be modest and self-effacing, an almost fatal handicap for a politician. He can't shake off the image of ineffectual, do-gooder weenie. His voice and his hang-dog expression dilute the effectiveness of everything he says.

Maybe a Velcro man, like Bush, should get out of politics - or get himself some better public-relations people. Or at least he could take a few voice lessons and learn not to cock his head sheepishly when he talks.

Tribe sues state over gambling

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) — The Community Council on the Fort Belknap Indian Reservation has sued the state of Montana, contending it has been too slow in negotiating a compact for casino-type gambling on the reservation.

"Negotiations with the state of Montana to arrive at a compact on the operation of video gaming machines have been ongoing since the implementation of the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act in 1989," tribal attorney Jim Vogel said in a news release. "To date, the council has experienced little movement on the part of the state in this negotiation process."

The suit, filed on Wednesday, accused the state of negotiating in bad faith — the same accusation tribal leaders have made against the state of Idaho — where the governor and legislative leaders are striving to ban casino games on the reservation.

The federal law requires tribes and states to reach agreements regulating casino-type gambling, lotteries and other games designated as class III by the federal government.

Class III gambling includes most forms of gambling except bingo, card games played in compliance with state law and traditional Indian games. Video poker and keno machines fall under the definition of Class III gambling.

Only one of Montana's seven Indian reservations, Fort Peck, has signed an agreement with the state. And federal officials have said they will prosecute those on the other reservations who illegally operate casino-type games.

Vogel estimated that 30 to 40 machines were in operation on the Fort Belknap Reservation in north-central Montana until late June.

On June 25, U.S. Attorney Doris Poppler said all gaming machines operating on reservations without a negotiated compact with the state were illegal.

Prior to the shutdown, the machines provided employment, directly or indirectly, to 20 to 30 Fort Belknap Reservation residents, Vogel said.

"The state of Montana has been very slow in responding to proposals of the council," he said. "The last proposal of the council sat on the table for comments from the state for a period of over 16 months."

Bob Robinson, administrator of the state Gambling Commission, said Wednesday he had not seen the suit and declined to comment.

At Fort Belknap, all machines operated within the reservation boundaries are owned by the Community Council and were regulated by the council's gaming agent.

The council adopted rules for the regulation of gambling in 1987, Vogel said.

Much of the income from the machines was earmarked for economic development or direct assistance to families for food, clothing and emergency medical needs, he said.

Rock hits car, kills woman

Utah Highway Patrol Trooper Jon Cady said their car was hit by a foot-ball-sized rock as they drove along I-15 in North Salt Lake.

The car was northbound near Cuddey Lane about 11:15 a.m. when the 20-pound rock hit the windshield twice and also struck Mr. and Mrs. Ferrone.

In the Magic Valley, nothing quite defines community like the summer festivals that annually attract thousands of people.

In small towns from Gems Ferry to Albion, they're an affirmation of our common sense of place and our shared sense of pride, of what distinguishes one town from another and our little corner of the world from the rest.

These summer celebrations dwarf other social and recreational activities in the valley in popularity. A check with local law enforcement agencies showed that on the Fourth of July more than 40,000 people were at the three community festivals in Buhl, Rupert and Hailey.

That's one-fourth of the population of the Magic Valley.

Some of these events, such as the Idaho Regatta - Burley's early-summer gathering of muscle boats - outgrow their local roots and attract a larger following, bringing thousands of dollars into the community and national attention to a town that is trying hard to diversify its economy.

But there's a danger that such an event will fall victim to its own success and alienate the people responsible for its popularity. And there are signs that may be happening in Burley.

Among the world-class speedboats at this year's regatta, there was more than a little uncouth behavior by spectators. The combination of hot

sun, cold beer and too little security resulted in fights, drunkenness, property damage and indecent exposure - just the kind of thing that keeps local residents and their families away.

There aren't enough hard-core boat racing fans in Burley to support such an event; it depends on the good-will of families who peruse their Sunday newspapers and decide it would be fun to go to the boat races.

Those aren't the kind of people who are going to put up with the kind of 80-proof hooliganism that's more appropriate to an English soccer stadium than to a pleasant marina in a straight-laced, rock-ribbed conservative town like Burley.

One of the reasons people live in the Magic Valley is that it's still a place where family values mean something. That applies to the way we make a living, the way we organize our lives - and the way we have fun.

That's the kind of fun that the Idaho Regatta used to be, but it has changed.

The regatta's problems should inspire concern among Burley's civic leaders - and watchful caution among organizers of the valley's other summer events.

Prior to the shutdown, the machines provided employment, directly or indirectly, to 20 to 30 Fort Belknap Reservation residents, Vogel said.

"The state of Montana has been very slow in responding to proposals of the council," he said. "The last proposal of the council sat on the table for comments from the state for a period of over 16 months."

Bob Robinson, administrator of the state Gambling Commission, said Wednesday he had not seen the suit and declined to comment.

At Fort Belknap, all machines operated within the reservation boundaries are owned by the Community Council and were regulated by the council's gaming agent.

The council adopted rules for the regulation of gambling in 1987, Vogel said.

Much of the income from the machines was earmarked for economic development or direct assistance to families for food, clothing and emergency medical needs, he said.

Rock hits car, kills woman

NORTH SALT LAKE, Utah (AP) — A California woman has died of injuries suffered when a large rock struck her car while driving along Interstate 15.

Terry Ferrone, of Riverside, died of head injuries late Wednesday at Salt Lake's LDS Hospital, spokeswoman Betty Costello said Thursday.

Her husband, Robert Francis Ferrone, 42, was listed in serious but stable condition following the Tuesday accident. Their 13-year-old son, Matt Ferrone, who was in the back seat, was not injured.

Utah Highway Patrol Trooper Jon Cady said their car was hit by a football-sized rock as they drove along I-15 in North Salt Lake.

The car was northbound near Cudahy Lane about 11:15 a.m. when the 20-pound rock hit the windshield twice and also struck Mr. and Mrs. Ferrone.

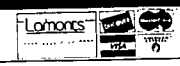

Berkeley decides to allow insulting remarks

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — This may come as a surprise to anyone who marched in the streets of Berkeley in the turbulent '60s — it only became legal this week to let insults fly in public.

"Here of all places!" declared lawyer Andrew Hoye, who helped get rid of the old ban on public insults. "After all, Berkeley is the birthplace of the free speech movement."

Results stopped being illegal Tuesday when the city council did away with a 1946 law that made "insulting

or annoying remarks" in public a misdemeanor punishable "by up to six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine. A fight over a parking ticket had led to a ruling that the law was too vague.

Berkeley's tradition of unfettered public comment includes the 1964 founding of the Free Speech Movement at the University of California when students demanded the right to engage in political activities on campus.

Legendary professor Wavy Gray wanted to know if the now-defunct

law could have been used against police.

"If I'd known about it, I could have used it a couple of times," he said. "I could have probably at one point or another arrested the entire UC-Berkeley police department."

Hoye and his client, Los Angeles science teacher David Badger, challenged the ordinance after Badger had a run-in with a Berkeley police officer in 1991.

Badger was given a ticket because his car was sitting in a no-parking zone. He remonstrated, saying he

should have been warned first. The officer replied that remonstrating in the zone was warning enough and ended the conversation with the phrase "Have a nice day."

Badger responded, adding an anatomical disparagement. He was then presented with ticket No. 2, this time based on the 1946 law. "He was shocked," Hoye said.

Traffic Commissioner Jon Rantzman ruled the law too vague and also said it was not needed because of a state law that bans "fighting words."

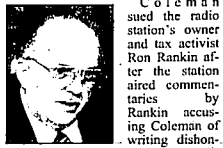

Judge will permit suit over boycott

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — First District Judge James Judd has refused to throw out a lawsuit against a Coeur d'Alene businessman for allegedly organizing an advertising boycott against radio station KCDA.

Jim Coleman, owner of J-U-B Engineers Inc., denies he interfered with advertising contracts last year in retaliation for radio commentary critical of Coleman and his engineering firm.



Rankin sued the radio station's owner and tax activist Ron Rankin after the station aired commentaries by Rankin accusing Coleman of writing dishonest grant applications on behalf of the city of Coeur d'Alene.

At the time, a federal grant was being sought to pay for downtown street improvements.

Rankin, president of the Idaho Property Owners Association and an independent candidate for the state Senate, and Rook Broadcasting of Idaho countersued. They alleged the radio station lost ad revenue because of a Coleman-led boycott by downtown Coeur d'Alene merchants.

On Wednesday, Judd rejected a motion from Coleman for a partial summary judgment against the counterclaim.

Judd said "reasonable inferences" can be made that Coleman, through his actions following the commentary, was responsible for the boycott. As a result, he said the case should be considered by a jury.

An October trial is scheduled on Coleman's lawsuit against Rankin and KCDA.

Years of work backed action on prostitution

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Sixteen years of evidence led to last month's arrest of seven women and seizure of sexual aids and business records at three Stateline massage parlors, according to court records.

The affidavit, signed by Kootenai County Sheriff's Deputy Jeff Thomas, was filed June 26 in 1st District Court in support of the search warrant served the same day on The Mustang, Adene's and Andrea's Health Spa.

Simultaneous search warrants were served on the homes of the owners of the three massage parlors.

The raid by more than 50 law officers capped a 14-month investigation into allegations of prostitution at the three Stateline businesses.

Investigators now are sifting through four truckloads of evidence, including used and unused condoms, sexual aids, pornography, business records and massage tables and beds seized during the raid.

Felony charges of interstate white slave traffic, accepting the earnings of a prostitute, harboring a prostitute, racketeering and conspiracy are pending against the owners of the parlors.

A charge of prostitution has been filed against just one of the women arrested. Kootenai County prosecutors say charges against the others will be filed soon.

Adene's and the Mustang closed operations after the raid, while Andrea's remains open for business.

Hurlburt, of Twin Falls, is scheduled to rule Tuesday on a department request to oversee distribution of water from Mackay to Arco as part of the Snake River adjudication.

Adjudication is the process by which the court decides what water rights are valid and which have priority. It was authorized by the Legislature in 1985 and will validate all water rights in southern Idaho and assure proper distribution.

What happens in the Big Lost River basin is significant because it's the first area to go through adjudication and will set a precedent. It's also controversial because the basin is in its sixth year of drought and falling water supplies have pitted upstream irrigators against downstream water users.

Debate over Birds of Prey tilts toward ranchers

WASHINGTON - Late in Congress' calendar, Idaho's Republican senators have crafted a new version of the Snake River Birds of Prey conservation bill in an attempt to create a half-million-acre area where raptors, livestock and military tanks can coexist in Ada, Elmore and Owyhee counties.

Nearly eight months after the House passed Idaho Democratic Rep. Larry LaRocco's legislation, a rival measure being pushed by GOP Sens. Larry Craig and Steve Symms seeks to steer legislative protection away from wildlife.

But Medberry added he was glad to see any movement on a bill that has languished in a Senate committee for months. A spokesman for LaRocco said such

movement suggests progress. "Larry welcomes the senators' effort," said Tom Knappenberger, LaRocco's district representative.

With the new initiative, the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, on which Craig sits, must now decide whether to cast aside the LaRocco measure in favor of the Craig bill.

The more likely outcome will be a compromise incorporating competing interests, including ranchers, range biologists and Idaho National Guard artillery units.

"It had a lot of scrutiny from a lot of folks," Knappenberger said, adding that

there was room enough for the 600 pairs of nesting raptors and the 50 livestock permittees to live in harmony. The site is home to red-tailed hawks; peregrine falcons and bald eagles, as well as cows and sheep. "Nobody's going to get everything they want in a piece of legislation like this," he said.

Medberry agreed there was cause for encouragement.

"It's a positive sign in that it shows that Sen. Craig wants to deal with this issue. He had just expressed opposition without offering an alternative," Medberry said.

"I think that there's a compromise that can be worked out," he said.

Indians say no to range

'Respect us,' Shoshone-Paiutes tell Air Force at hearing

OWYHEE, Nev. - Elaine Egan, whose Indian name is Owyhee Kingie, doesn't want the bombing range.

"I don't like them airplanes," she said. Egan and many of her fellow Shoshone-Paiutes oppose a proposed Air Force bombing range a few miles from the 290,000-acre Duck Valley Indian Reservation, which straddles the Nevada-Idaho border.

The Air Force came to Owyhee Thursday to hear the concerns of the reservation's 1,200 Shoshone-Paiutes. The meeting at the tribal headquarters

was designed to help determine the scope of an environmental impact statement on the proposed Big Springs Training Range.

Egan, in her eighties and one of the tribes' elders, said the reservation was given to the Shoshone-Paiutes by the white man's government. If the Air Force wants to put in the bombing range and fly low over the reservation, it should be Congress, not the Air Force, that makes the decision, she said.

Gov. Cecil Andrus has proposed assembling 166,000 acres of state, private and federal land in southwestern Owyhee County and leasing it to the Air Force.

HAILEY - Friedman Memorial Airport's tenuous ties to Blaine County are being scrutinized by the Blaine County Airport Commission as it considers the proposed 1992-93 budget for the airfield.

Friedman's payroll is handled by Blaine County, but there are questions about whether the airport staff is covered by the county's employment policies. And there is uncertainty about the role of the airport commission in the budget process.

"Are airport employees county employees?" asked the commission's attorney, Barry Luboviski, during

Wednesday night's meeting.

Tom Blanchard, one of three Blaine County Commissioners who also sit on the seven-member airport board, argued that Friedman is evolving as a separate entity. The pay scale for airport employees, he noted, is higher than county wages.

"The salary we pay our airport manager is higher than any of our elected officials or administrative department heads," Blanchard pointed out.

That could be cause for hard feelings among county employees, he said. Dan Hamilton, Ketchum mayor and airport commissioner, countered Blanchard by questioning whether he was reversing directions on efforts to consolidate

government services.

"If it's just to save the eggs of a few individuals, maybe we could talk to them and explain the situation," Hamilton said.

"We'll let you participate in that," said commission Chairman Alan Reynolds with a smile.

In his 1992-93 budget proposal, Airport Manager Todd Wirthin has requested a 6 percent overall increase for his staff, totaling \$183,000 in salaries. Wirthin's current \$43,700 salary would not change.

"Airports are an oddball, particularly in terms of job descriptions," Wirthin told the commissioners. He defended the airport's wage scale, noting that its employees are faced with dangers and responsibilities that

Shoshone superintendent takes job in South Dakota

SHOSHONE - Shoshone's superintendent of schools has announced his resignation and is helping board members screen new candidates for the job.

Stef Palaniuk said Tuesday that the School District Board has accepted his resignation, and he will be leaving June 22.

Palaniuk has accepted a full-time superintendent position in Bellefourche, S.D. He said he is now helping the district in its search for a replacement.

Palaniuk said that the two years he has spent at Shoshone have been enjoyable, and he's taken pleasure in working with the students and teachers.

"I also have enjoyed living in this small community," Palaniuk said. "The people

have been very supportive, and I appreciate that."

Palaniuk added his position at Shoshone is his first superintendent's job, and it has given him a valuable education.

"I learned budgeting, among other things, and gained an excellent foundation for future growth and development," he said.

Palaniuk explained that when he first took the Shoshone position, the district had no excess funds, but he was able to build up the school's fund balance.

"We were able to finish carpeting the elementary school and buy bulletin boards," Palaniuk said. "We also bought some furniture for a couple of high school classrooms. We are even able to begin putting money away for necessities, such as adding classrooms."

Other items in the proposed budget include \$229,000 in operating expenses (up 4 percent) and \$312,000 in capital outlays.

The airport commission appeared ready to approve a \$724,000 budget for Friedman before Luboviski questioned its role in the process. The Blaine County Commissioners have the final word on county budget allocations and could make changes at a later date, he pointed out.

"There should be an understanding between the Blaine County Commissioners and the Blaine County Airport Commission what your respective roles in the budget

Shigellosis bug bites Burley day-care center

BURLEY — An outbreak of a disease that causes diarrhea and a mild fever has afflicted several children at a local day-care center and family members of the children, a state health official says.

Four children at a day-care center, seven members of their families and a day-care center worker have been infected by the disease, called shigellosis, which is spread by an organism called shigella, said Cheryl

Becker, nurse epidemiologist for the South Central District Health Department.

Typically those who get the disease have diarrhea and a fever only a few days and rarely does the sickness cause someone to become seriously ill, said Fritz Dixon, state epidemiologist for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

The Burley day-care cases have occurred within the last month, Becker said. She declined to give the name of the day-care center because it would be unfair to the business, she said.

"Day cares are a higher risk of getting infectious diseases but we already know that," she said. "We don't want to cause a run of people leaving day cares."

Bad hygiene is an unlikely cause of the outbreak because it takes few shigella organisms to spread the disease and several children at the day-care center did not get sick, Becker said.

The disease is common in day-cares where it is spread among playing children who invariably and frequently stick their fingers in their mouths, or by a worker who

changes several diapers without properly washing their hands, Becker said.

Some day-care workers wash their hands after changing diapers for their own cleanliness and don't realize the greater danger of spreading disease from child to child, she said.

When children become infected with contagious diseases parents should keep them at home until they are well, Becker said. Parents should also contact day-care providers, she said.

In Idaho, there have been 29 cases of

shigellosis since the beginning of the year. 17 of those in the Magic Valley. Last year there were 35 cases of shigellosis throughout the state.

The few other cases in the Magic Valley occurred sporadically and were not linked.

It is not unusual that one area — like Burley — would have several cases of shigellosis and the rest of the state have few cases, because the disease spreads swiftly, Dixon said.

However, it is difficult to identify the source of the first infection, he said.

Pair of Heyburn men faces charges stemming from raid

HEYBURN — Two Heyburn men are facing charges of possession of drugs with intent to deliver following an April 21 Idaho Bureau of Narcotics raid which netted drugs and more than \$18,000 cash. 5th District Court documents show Pete M. Penna, 37, and Rommy Gonzales, 26, are awaiting preliminary hearings scheduled for July 15.

The Mini-Cassia News Service

obtained information about the raids on Thursday. Bureau of Narcotics officials were unavailable for comment.

According to court documents, Idaho Department of Narcotics officials gained warrants to search the suspects' residences at 1821 L St., Apt. 1, and 840 20th St.

Agents found in various locations in Penna's 20th Street residence about one-and-three-quarters' pounds of marijuana, as well as \$18,426 stashed away in the master bedroom, documents revealed.

Law enforcement officials acted on tips that marijuana was being sold at the residences, as well as reports of large numbers of people frequenting the locations.

The Department of Law Enforcement is attempting to obtain the money and drugs which allegedly came from the suspects' drug trafficking, which also includes \$762 cash allegedly discovered at Gonzales' home, say court documents.

Money and property used in drug deals is subject to forfeiture to law enforcement officials.

Paul solid waste rates increase

PAUL — Businesses in this city will pay more for refuse removal and disposal beginning Sept. 1, following City Council action taken Wednesday.

City Clerk Lois Landrum said Thursday that businesses will begin paying a flat \$7 monthly fee, plus an additional \$1.50 per cubic yard of refuse.

Landrum said budget discussions were postponed after Councilman Tom Dailey said he had not yet obtained figures from Minidoka County officials, and the council learned it had not yet received budgeting manuals from the Association of Idaho Cities.

Heyburn residents to be tied into Cassia County 911 system

HEYBURN — Beginning Oct. 1, Cassia County emergency personnel will respond to 911 calls placed by Heyburn residents.

The Heyburn City Council authorized the switch Wednesday from Minidoka County's 911 system, following telephoning difficulties experienced by residents calling that county for emergency assistance.

City clerk Ruth Davis said Thursday that because Heyburn residents are assigned telephone numbers from the Burley exchange, 911 calls placed from Heyburn first must be routed through Burley in Cassia County, where dispatchers forward the calls on to Minidoka County, where nearby Heyburn is located.

The switch will not cost the city nor its residents any additional money, Davis said. She was unable to say how much Heyburn now pays Minidoka County for 911 service.

In other business, the council asked city residents who flood-irrigate their lawns to conserve dwindling water supplies by doing it only once every 14 days, instead of weekly.

The council discussed passing more restrictive watering legislation — similar to that approved Tuesday by Rupert City Council — but postponed taking any action.

Essentially, Rupert council members said that unless Rupert residents reduce their sprinkling and flood-irrigating by half, the city could run out of water by mid-August.

Davis said that Heyburn council members couldn't agree to take such legislative measures and in-

stead decided to give the matter more study. However, she added that city officials would appreciate irrigators instituting voluntary watering restrictions.

Residents who pump their own well water under their lawns are not being asked to reduce their consumption, Davis said.

Despite pressure, Symms won't run for governor in 1994

There won't be a Steve Symms for governor campaign in 1994. The retiring Republican senator admits that a lot of people have urged him to run for Idaho chief executive when Democrat Cecil Andrus vacates the office at the end of 1994.

"I'm complimented by people talking about Steve Symms for governor," Symms said Thursday, during taping for the week-end "Viewpoint" television program.

"But I have no plans to run for any other office. Had I wished to seek political office, I would have run for re-election to the Senate," he said.

"I'm looking forward to getting into the private sector when I get out."

Symms winds up 12 years in the Senate and 20 years overall in Congress, includ-

ing eight years as Idaho's 1st District representative.

Symms, 54, announced almost a year ago that he wouldn't seek another term. Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne won a three-way battle in the primary election and faces Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings in the general election.

"The hot rumor in Idaho politics since the GOP state convention last month was that Symms was mulling a run for governor. He's never run for state office and says he doesn't plan to start now.

"It is true there have been a lot of people who talked to me in the last week while I have been in the state," he said. "I keep telling them all no, there are others in the

party that I think are prepared to run for governor and should run for governor." He didn't name names but Lt. Gov. Butch Otter has been looking at the race for some time.

Symms said he plans to divide his time between Washington and Idaho for the next couple of years but it's his intention to move to Idaho for good and get back into private business.

He was involved with the family fruit-growing operation in Canyon County, one of the state's largest farming enterprises, when he first ran for Congress in 1972.

Symms acknowledged he sent out a fundraising letter on behalf of Kempthorne recently, describing the mayor as "an outsider" in the political process, despite the fact former GOP senator James McClure is listed as chairman of the Kempthorne campaign and former Symms staffer Phil Reberger is running it.

Reberger, who was Symms' chief of staff, earlier this year was dividing his time between his federal job and managing the Kempthorne campaign. Symms said Reberger received half his Senate salary, \$119,000 per year, for a time, and for the last six weeks was receiving one-fourth of his Senate salary.

Reberger resigned to work full time on the Kempthorne campaign. "He has gone off of the payroll," Symms said. "Phil Reberger is not working for me elsewhere in Idaho politics," he said.

Democratic Chairman Michael Wetherell said the race for president in Idaho is a tossup and Democratic nominee Bill Clinton's selection of fellow southerner Al Gore as his running mate only helps the party's chances to crack the Republican hold on the state.

The Tennessee senator's acceptance of

the vice-presidential spot gives Democrats a youthful, all-southern ticket that Wetherell said would pose no problem in attracting Idaho voters.

"Gore is well-liked in Idaho," Wetherell said. "He's visited Idaho on a number of occasions, most recently last winter for the Frank Church Symposium at Boise State. He's got a lot of friends in Idaho. I think this helps the chances in Idaho."

The last time a Democrat won the state's four electoral votes was in 1964 when Lyndon Johnson buried Republican Barry Goldwater. In the 1980s, however, Idaho gave Ronald Reagan the second-highest percentage of the vote of any state in the nation. Only Utah's percentage was higher.

But Wetherell said the presence of Texas billionaire H. Ross Perot in the presidential sweepstakes has made a moderate like Clinton, bolstered by a moderate like Gore, very competitive for Idaho votes.

Court rules against utilities commission

BOISE (AP) — It was wrong for the Public Utilities Commission to order a small northern Idaho water company to hire an accountant, but not allow the company to count the \$15,000 cost in its expenses, the Idaho Supreme Court says.

The court on Thursday sent a rate case back to the commission with orders to count the expense in determining the return for Hayden Pines Water Co.

At the same time, the court ruled it was not an unreasonable taking of private property for the PUC to reduce the water company's rates.

Justice Byron Johnson wrote a unanimous opinion that if the company couldn't include the cost of a PUC-ordered accountant until a future year, that will create a loss that couldn't be recovered.

The PUC ordered Hayden Pines Water to lower its rates by 3.36 percent after an association complained they were too high. The Supreme Court upheld that order.

In other court decisions released Thursday:

The Supreme Court ordered former magistrate judge Roger L. Williams, Kootenai, suspended

from the practice of law for three months after the Idaho State Bar filed a disciplinary recommendation alleging that Williams inappropriately touched a client. Williams also was suspended for an additional 21 months but will be allowed to practice law as long as he meets certain conditions during those three years of probation.

Williams was a former 3rd District magistrate judge at Caldwell before resigning and moving into private practice. The Supreme Court said Williams was charged with battery after the client filed a complaint, but eventually pleaded guilty to trespassing, spent two days in jail and paid a fine.

The Court of Appeals rejected a bid from Lawrence L. Nelsch to withdraw his guilty plea to a Kootenai County kidnapping charge, six years after it was entered. Nelsch claimed he didn't know the penalty for first-degree kidnapping had to be either death or life imprisonment. The Court of Appeals said there was ample evidence he was aware of the penalties when he pleaded guilty for the second time in 1986.

Meridian begins administrative overhaul

MERIDIAN (AP) — The Meridian School District is launching a major five-year overhaul of its teaching and operations under the direction of its new superintendent, six-year administrator Bob Haley.

The Meridian School Board voted unanimously Wednesday night for Haley to succeed Nick Hallett, who will leave the district Aug. 15 to join

the faculty at the University of Idaho. Haley, now assistant superintendent, was picked from a field of 11 applicants.

Haley takes the helm of the state's second-largest district at a time of unprecedented growth and lean finances. He also will lead the district through a plan to revamp school governance, curriculum and instruction.

4th victim of June auto crash dies

CALDWELL (AP) — A fourth person has died from injuries suffered in a June 18 crash on a rural road near Melba that already has resulted in three counts of vehicular manslaughter against a Nampa man.

But Canyon County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Timothy Spencer said his office would wait for a death certificate on Eustulia Corca before deciding whether to file a fourth vehicular manslaughter count against Robert Aehart.

Corca, 23, died last Friday at St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise, according to the Ada County coroner's office.

Questions raised about auditor's phone calls

BOISE (AP) — Telephone calls were made from the office of Democratic state Auditor J.D. Williams relating to his campaign for Congress, a campaign worker said.

But, Jill Kuraitis, campaign press secretary for Williams, said Wednesday that the situation was not unusual.

"This is the way it's done," Kuraitis said. "Otherwise, only rich people could run for office."

The state auditor general's office also said it would not look into allegations against Williams' campaign unless a public official asks it to.

Kuraitis said the calls in question were campaign-related, but were short. Such calls are not out of the ordinary in campaigns, she said.

"It's unrealistic to think people who run for office can quit their jobs," she said.

Williams could not be reached for comment Wednesday.

His Republican opponent for the 2nd Congressional District seat, state Senate President Pro Tem

Michael Crapo of Idaho Falls, said he does not plan to ask for an investigation. "I just saw the reports this morning," Crapo said. "I don't think it would be appropriate for me to jump to any snap conclusions. I am going to wait and see what the situation is and comment at that point."

Nampa television station KIVI reported Tuesday that phones in the auditor's office were used to make numerous calls to Williams' Boise campaign office. KIVI said it reviewed several months of phone records before airing the report.

Campaign manager Randy Furniss said he did not expect the situation to hurt Williams' chances of winning the November election.

"I just don't see that there are any problems, period," Furniss said.

Tribe OKs training plan

FORT HALL (AP) — The Shoshone-Bannock Tribes' steel company will link up with a Seattle construction company in a new federal training program.

The Tribal Council on Wednesday voted 5-1, with Vice President James Osborne opposing, to approve the pro-mentor program involving Sho-Ban Steel and Turner Construction Co.

The voluntary program, managed by the Department of Defense, provides federal money and credits for mentor companies who agree to work with small, disadvantaged businesses.

The mentors can provide general management and financial assistance,

engineering and other technical help and award subcontracts on a non-competitive basis.

"It will really upgrade our skills and give us a lot of help," said LaGrand Coby, Sho-Ban Steel general manager.

"I think it can be a profitable business because Sho-Ban Steel is the only Indian-owned steel business in the United States," said council member Mary Washakie.

Sho-Ban Steel has worked as a subcontractor for Turner Construction on three projects, Washakie said the program could help Sho-Ban Steel make much-needed contacts with other businesses.

TWIN FALLS — This year's JUMP Co. summer show mixes messages with music. Nothing subliminal. You'll get it.

"Li'l Abner" is the perfect choice for an election year," said JUMP Co. president Valerie Williams. "It's about what the government is doing to this poor little town of Dogpatch — like blowing it off the face of the Earth." The play, in other words, is heavy on tongue-in-cheek.

At a recent rehearsal, the 27 young people in the cast were decked out in brightly patched overalls and ragged skirts. They were dancing and singing across the stage to the tune of "The Country's in the Very Best of Hands."

Is it a summer civics lesson? Maybe, in a way.

The comic strip Li'l Abner was sort of the Doonesbury of its time," said Laine Steel, who's directing the play, "and most of what this play says about government is still true today."

The plot of the musical comedy goes something like this: In order to test a bomb, the government plans to blow up Dogpatch, which, officials have dubbed an "unnecessary place."

When the time comes to move the people out, they are told they won't have

to leave if something "necessary" is found in the town. Townsfolk vote for Mammy Yokum's yokumberry tonic, which makes her son, Abner, so strong — and the plot unfolds from there.

Characters in the play, originally created by Al Capp, include notables like heroine Daisy Mae, Marryin' Sam and Apassionata, complete with blonde hair, furs and fringe. She's the "secret weapon" Gen. Bullmoose will use to try to get the yokumberry tonic for his own company, so that he can make more millions. (Did the satire just extend to private enterprise?)

Steel is staging the play without the skimpy costumes and bulging muscles of the Broadway version. "The play wasn't

really written for this age group," he said, "and it's a little difficult for the kids to handle some of the romantic ideas or the idea of earning so much about your hometown."

If the kids don't "get it," it won't be for lack of trying. During rehearsals, Steel puts a lot of emphasis on each actor capturing his or her character.

"You've got to believe in the scenes you are in," he told the youngsters last week. "I realize this is a comedy, and it's a little farfetched, and I know that Park Chop Boulevard sounds kind of stupid, but you have to believe that, if you get kicked out of this place, it's the end of your lives," he said. "Comedy only works if it's played straight."

The kids were a bit more intense after that. "I warns it up out of the berries of our yokumberry tree," Mammy, played by Carrie Boumas, cried with conviction, hoisting up her battle.

"This is a blast," whispered Bethany Diehl, 17, who plays "one of the wives." Complete with pigtails and bare feet, she said she feels like a hippie. A hillbilly hippie, no doubt.

"In my part, I volunteer my husband to go and get beautified and muscled up like Li'l Abner," Bethany said. "It's really fun."

Cast members seem to enjoy this show because most of them are on stage for long periods of time. And yet, though the big production numbers are rowdy and plentiful, none of the songs from "Li'l Abner" ever made it to the top 10, even among the Tony Award set. Except maybe "Jubilant T. Cornpone," the boisterous tribute to the founder of Dogpatch.

But the political message of "Li'l Abner" remains intact.

Heading up the cast of "Li'l Abner" are Jordan Williams as Abner, Jessie Hamilton as Daisy Mae, John Miller as Marryin' Sam, Carrie Boumas as Mammy Yokum and Morgan Williams as Pappy Yokum. Sue Miller is musical director, and Lori Head is choreographer.

Films for teens might look light, but they have some serious messages

"High school is such a crucial time in a kid's life," says Kid (a.k.a. Christopher Reid), co-star of the new teen comedy "Class Act."

"There's so much pressure from various elements: Pressure from your parents, pressure from within, pressure from your friends — all to do with a variety of different things, like how you're gonna do in school ... All of these pressures come into play."

And "Class Act," with "Encino Man" and "Buffy the Vampire Slayer," are three high-profile high school movies this summer that lightheartedly examine some of these serious pressures from a teen-ager's point of view.

What differentiates some of these newer teen comedies from many of their predecessors is a subtly increased emphasis on social and moral responsibility rather than the anything-goes attitude of blindly hedonistic party pictures such as "Losin' It" (1983) or "Bachelor Party" (1984).

"There have been lots of teen comedies, from 'The Last American Virgin' to 'Can't Buy Me Love,' but they weren't saying anything positive," Kid said recently. "They were just mindless fun. And that's cool."

"But I think in this day and age, the kids out there, they need much more than that. They're goin' back wild out there. They're goin' crazy out there. High schools are battlegrounds. So it's not a time for

mindless fluff. It's a time for some fun with a mind toward the future."

In "Class Act," rap duo Kid 'N Play follow up their two successful "House Party" pictures with a comedy about a shy, nerdy intellectual named Duncan Pinderhughes (Kid) and a brash juvenile delinquent named Blade Brown (Play, a.k.a. Christopher Martin), whose academic credentials and identities are switched on their first day at a new school.

By temporarily trading places, they learn to better appreciate each other's unique qualities and to expand and develop their own personalities beyond the pigeonholes that previously have defined and confined them.

In "Encino Man," a pair of high school social misfits played by Sean Astin and Pauly Shore defrost and befriended a frozen teen-age caveman they've unearthed while digging a backyard swimming pool. They attempt to mold "Link" (Brendan Fraser) into the cool guy they themselves could never be, hoping to ride to popularity in his wake but feel threatened when he becomes more popular than they are.

And in "Buffy the Vampire Slayer," opening July 31, a superficial, materialistic cheerleader named Buffy (Kristy Swanson) discovers her true destiny with the help of a supernatural adult mentor (Donald Sutherland) and a fellow student (Luke Perry of "Beverly Hills, 90210").

"Buffy" producer and director Fran Rubel Kuzui ("Tokyo Pop") says her teen horror

How appropriate it is that a man so enthralled by the history of country music has performed alongside so much of it — and is himself becoming a part of it.

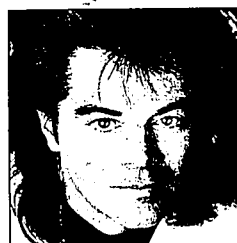

Genesis tops concert draws so far

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — English rockers Genesis and the venerable Grateful Dead were the top concert draws in an improving economic climate for rock 'n' roll the first half of the year, an industry newsletter reported.

Pollstar said the concert business has begun to shake off the doldrums that had promoters complaining last year of singers crooning to empty seats.

But the newsletter warned that the recession may still claim victims later this summer, when big tours by Elton John, Bruce Springsteen, U2 and Guns N' Roses hit their stride.

"The forecast is for intense competi-

tion for scarce ticket dollars which will once again lead to far too many box office casualties," Pollstar said.

Genesis, the trio led by Phil Collins, topped all acts by grossing \$28 million in North America during the six months that ended June 30. The Grateful Dead grossed \$26.3 million.

Pollstar said Genesis "may have raked in more money, but they left vast sections of empty seats at a good number of their stadium shows."

Tougher tickets to get were for arena-tours-by-Irish-rockers U2 and country star Garth Brooks, the newsletter said.

Metallica was the busiest act

among the top 10 concert draws, grossing \$22 million while performing 89 times in 83 cities.

Jimmy Buffet, who tweaked the business blues with his "Recession Recession Tour," ranked 11th with gross earnings of \$9.8 million.

"Everyone is more optimistic about this summer than last summer," said Ben Liss, executive director of the North American Concert Promoters Association.

This summer's stadium tours — which include Genesis, the Grateful Dead, U2, and double bills of Eric Clapton and Elton John, and Metallica and Guns N' Roses — are selling very well, he said.

Editor discusses plans for The New Yorker

NEW YORK — Tim Brown raised one of the burning questions herself.

"Will The New Yorker have Luke Perry on the cover?" she laughed.

"Would it ever have a black-and-white photo from an upcoming show at the Museum of Modern Art?" she continued. "I don't know. I wouldn't like to say no, you know? I mean, obviously I have to leave myself open to seeing what works and what doesn't."

Brown, who will leave the editor's office at Vanity Fair to E. Graydon Carter later this month, has the summer to consider her plans for The New Yorker before taking over the highbrow magazine from editor Robert A. Gottlieb in September. Until then, she says, she would rather not speak so recklessly as to become a hostage to her words.

However, in an interview conducted after last week's stunning news that the champion of glitz and gloss would be entrusted with the stodgy and gray New Yorker, Brown, 38, pointed in the general direction she may go.

In addition, she shed brighter light on the circumstances behind the announcement from Advance Publications chairman S.I. "SI" Newhouse Jr. that Gottlieb was out. She said that she had been making no plans to

leave Vanity Fair until Newhouse offered her Gottlieb's job. This admission lent added weight, to the claim of a well-connected source that Newhouse had ousted Gottlieb unexpectedly — in keeping with the chairman's style — and not after months of discussion between the two men, as the magazine maintained.

"Any editor does bring new blood and I guess there will be quite a bit of it," Brown remarked.

One of the first changes at The New Yorker may be among the magazine's staff entities. An associate of Brown's at Vanity Fair characterized The New Yorker's current reviewers as "abysmal," saying there were no longer "leading voices," as in the years when movie critic Pauline Kael was quoted around the country. Indeed, Stephen Schiff, now Vanity Fair's critic-at-large, reportedly is preparing to make the transition to West 43rd Street with Brown. Critic James Wolcott seems a safe bet to do the same.

But who has published little fiction in Vanity Fair, also said she had yet to formulate plans regarding the New Yorker's literary component. Among those said to be distressed by Gottlieb's departure is

Roger Angell, the New Yorker's much-admired baseball writer who, as fiction editor, has helped cultivate an audience for Ann Beattie, Raymond Carver and other writers. Reached at his desk last week, he said it would be "inappropriate" for him to comment on the pending change.

Newhouse had cited "conceptual differences" between him and Gottlieb. What exactly were they?

"Well," Brown replied. "I think, mostly it was the fact that the readership had aged and that there must be ways to capture another generation of New Yorker readers. And in a way, that's what I have to figure out."

"The New Yorker will be very different from Vanity Fair," she explained later. "What I bring from Vanity Fair is my sense of story, which has always been strong, my sense of narrative, my sense of writing, my relationships with writers, my ability to talk to writers."

"I'm not bringing a lot of other things from Vanity Fair — the whole kind of spin and visual excitement and so forth that will not be appropriate to The New Yorker."

She cited such Vanity Fair offerings as novelist William Styron's harrowing account of his bout with depression and Norman Mailer's essays as "the kinds of pieces that would work in The New Yorker and Vanity Fair. And there are many other pieces that wouldn't... And I'm very much aware of the difference."

The Walt Disney Co. has received requests from church choirs for the music to the movie's reworked '60s

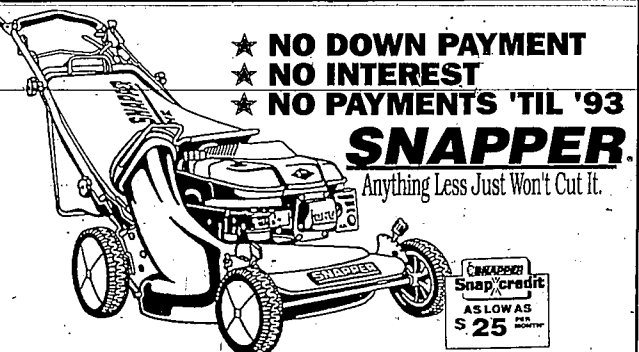

Clever device works magic in 'Prelude'

With special effects everywhere this summer, it's special in another sense to encounter a movie like "Prelude to a Kiss."

In the film's trickiest scene, a young woman and an old man magically switch bodies — but the magic is more in the mood than in the camera-work. And this is as it should be: "Prelude to a Kiss" is a kind of fairy tale, but it's a fairy tale grounded in human experience.

Based on Craig Lucas' Tony-nominated play, this witty, gently captivating picture tells the tale of two attractive young people, Peter (Alec Baldwin), who works for a publishing firm, and Rita (Meg Ryan), a bartender who aspires to be a graphic designer. Early in the movie, they meet at a party. It is love at first sight.

Their whirlwind courtship leads to a wedding, which is where the big switch occurs. When an elderly man wanders into the ceremony and kisses the bride, his soul ends up in her body and hers ends up in his.

This may sound gimmicky, but the movie doesn't seem that way because the gimmick is just a device for Lucas (who also wrote the screenplay) to comment on life, love and marriage.

Strange though the movie's situation is, it comes off as simply a dramatic exaggeration of situations that a lot of people experience. What husband hasn't occasionally felt the way Peter does on his honeymoon in Jamaica, when the woman he is married to does not seem to be the same woman he married? What woman hasn't felt the way Rita does in the old man's body, which is falling apart? And when two very romantic relationships haven't gone through an unromantic period?

The wonderful thing about Meg Ryan's performance is that you can almost imagine Rita behaving the way she does even without the old man's soul in her body. In the early scenes — before the switch — Ryan develops a character who is sexy and charming but also unpredictable and, beneath her vivacious surface, dark-spirited.

Much of this is in the script, which plainly es-

tablishes that Rita has had insomnia since she was 14 and that she doesn't want to have children because the world is such a mess. But Ryan's darting eyes and wobbly smile heighten Rita's morbid, wild side.

In the role of Peter, Alec Baldwin is as handsome as ever. Cinematographer Stefan Czapsky's rich tones do so much for Baldwin's features that the actor ought to sign him to a lifetime contract.

As the movie's narrator, Peter is intended as the viewer's surrogate, which might explain why Lucas has made him a bit generic. (As the story develops, our souls enter his body.) Baldwin — who appeared in the off-Broadway version of the play — fills in as many of Peter's character points as possible without compromising the movie's structure.

The supporting cast is also impressive: As Rita's parents, Ned Beatty and Patty Duke are an amusing, often comical couple, and Kathy Bates fills out the minor role of the old man's daughter. As the old man, Sydney Walker is perhaps a touch

too slow and heavy — especially during the scenes in which Rita's soul is supposed to be in the character's body. But although Walker occasionally seems to be acting in "Qualitate to a Kiss," his performance is certainly adequate.

"Prelude to a Kiss" was directed by Norman René, who also directed the material on the New York stage as well as the 1990 AIDS-themed movie "Longtime Companion," which Lucas also wrote.

For the screen version, René has visually de-emphasized the bodies of the characters, which has the disadvantage of sapping some of the play's physical force. But it has the advantage of making the body-switching (and, in particular, the sex-switching) element more abstract, which helps the central themes to come through clearly.

By the end of the movie, we learn that if love is ever going to conquer all, it's going to need some help. And when that help doesn't come in the form of magic, we need to supply it with patience.

These volumes are hardback and soft, new and old, fat and slim. They are history, essay and biography. All may be found at libraries and book stores — new or used.

"ORSON WELLES, A BIOGRAPHY"

By Barbara Learning (Penguin Books; 1986).

Part of the appeal of this intimate portrait, written with full cooperation on the fascinating subject, is that it's so unashamedly personal. At first, Welles led his biographer on a merry chase. But once committed to the project, he was remarkably forthcoming. Through Learning, a professor of theater and film at New York's Hunter College, we again hear that booming, rich voice. Read this book about Welles, and you'll understand why Marlene Dietrich said, "Cross yourself when you mention his name."

"THE CASABLANCA COMPANION: THE MOVIE AND MORE"

By Jeff Siegel (Taylor Publishing Co.; 1992).

You must remember this, "Casablanca" is more than a motion picture. It's a morality play, a 50-year-old movie classic and a piece of time when good and evil seemed simpler. There are a number of books about "Casablanca," including a recent one with the Howard Koch script. This is one eager fan's sketchy peek at the salaries, the play, the players, the writers and the shoot. And for trivia lovers, there's a soupçon of minutiae. Q: "What color are Rick Blaine's eyes?" The answer lies in a line of dialogue: "Are my eyes really brown?" Humphrey Bogart says, eyeing Major Strasser's dossier on him ...

"MGM, WHEN THE LION ROARS"

By Peter Hay (Turner Publishing; 1991).

This is a heavy, coffee table-sized book. But don't be put off by its test-of-strength size. The photo-filled history costs \$50, and it's worth every penny. From the time Metro Pictures merged with Goldwyn Pictures and Louis B. Mayer Productions in 1924, the studio influenced fashion, design and the popular culture. "It was the 'great' film studio of the world," said Helen Hayes, "not just of America or Hollywood; but of the world." This companion to Turner Network Television's six-hour miniseries in March 1992 also has lots of behind-the-scenes stuff.

"MARTIN SCORSESE: A JOURNEY"

By Mary Pat Kelly (Thunder's Mouth Press; 1991).

In Showtime's recent special on Oliver Stone, the filmmaker recounted the day he went into a film class at New York University, saw a wild-eyed instructor named Scorsese and as he was. This is a look at the passionate maker of "Mean Streets," "Raging Bull," "The Last Temptation of Christ" and "GoodFellas." "Martin's movies can change you, and they cling to your heart forever," says Steven Spielberg in his foreword. Robert De Niro, Barbara Hershey, Joe Pesci and Nick Nolte are just a few of those interviewed.

"DIETRICH: STYLE AND SUBSTANCE"

By Patrick O'Connor (Dutton; 1992).

This book is for fans of the woman Ernest Hemingway called "The Kraut." The screen goddess, who could make love to the camera and cook, created her own mystique. Here are her veils, hats, famous legs and pencil-thin eyebrows. The text tracks her career, but what makes this book glow are its 150 photos, many never before published, of the trouper Jean Cocteau called "this bird of paradise, this bark in full spread of sail ..."

'Batman Returns' fades, but still leads box office

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Batman Returns" remained No. 1 for the third straight weekend; but the sequel fagged behind the original "Batman" movie and was fading at the box office.

"Batman Returns" made \$13.8 million over the weekend, down 46 percent from the previous week, and collected \$123.1 million in three weeks, according to figures released Monday by Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc.

In 1989, "Batman" collected \$19.2 million in its third weekend of release and had made \$132.6 million after three weeks. It did so in fewer locations than "Batman Returns" and at a time when an average movie ticket cost about 50 cents less.

In second with a solid premiere was the women's baseball movie, "A League of Their Own." It made \$13.7 million. Eddie Murphy's sexual comedy "Boomerang" fought off lead reviews and collected a \$13.6 million in its debut for third.

"Sister Act" was fourth with \$6.8 million. "Unlawful Entry" was fifth with \$6.5 million. "Housesitter" was sixth with \$4.3 million and "Patriot Games" was seventh at \$4.1 million.

In eighth was the re-released "Pineschick," which took in \$3.1 million. "Lethal Weapon 3" earned \$2.4 million for ninth and "Far and Away" was 10th with \$1.6 million.

Comedy could control convention coverage

LOS ANGELES - Need further proof of just how screwy this election year has become?

Check out some of the crazy folks who will be reporting from the Democratic National Convention (a.k.a. the Clinton Coronation) next week.

Actor-comic Buck Henry will be a floor reporter for cable's Comedy Central network, while "Saturday Night Live" producer-performer Al Franken will anchor the checklehead channel's nightly convention coverage.

Megadeth lead singer Dave Mustaine has turned convention reporter for MTV.

Dr. Ruth Westheimer has been granted press credentials to cover the Democrats for Nostalgia Television.

"For one, I'd like to hear the candidates respond to questions from Dr. Ruth about sexual dysfunction," joked CNN anchorman Bernard Shaw.

There has been a rather silly outburst of self-conscious hand-wringing by some establishment TV and print journalists. They've been snarkily mooping about the unseemliness of presidential candidates popping up on an evening talk shows, "Larry King Live" and MTV.

"I think it's wonderful for the democratic process," countered Shaw while talking to TV critics.

"We have no copyright on asking the hardest and most intelligent questions."

Besides, the rise in video election populism is a way to undercut the tyranny of network newscast soundbites.

"We're going to be doing about two hours coverage a night, which is about twice as much as any of the broadcast networks," Franken told TV critics, tweaking the rather odd irony of the situation.

In what one executive termed "a really defining moment for Comedy Central," the humor network offered live coverage of President George Bush's State of the Union address last January ("State of the Union Undressed").

"We realized part of our job was to be comedy commentators," said Arthur Bell, Comedy Central vice president for programming.

Thus, the upcoming convention coverage: "Indecision '92."

But don't expect just a lot of goof-ball nonsense. In fact, by using such notable political pundits and reporters as Christopher Hitchens, James Hightower and Time magazine's Richard Stengel, Comedy Central hopes to be an outlet for sharper, more biting commentary than you might ordinarily find on NBC, CBS or ABC.

"The concept here is we want you to be able to watch the convention and not miss anything," Franken said. "We want you to laugh, sure, but also maybe think."

Giants pin hopes on Duke passer

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — The New York Giants hope they have finally found the young quarterback to eventually replace their two Super Bowl starters, Phil Simms and Jeff Hostetler.

The Giants, who rarely give away high draft picks, used their 1993 choice to take Dave Brown of Duke in the first round of the NFL's supplemental draft. But Tom Boisture, the team's director of player personnel, said it was a choice the team felt was worth it.

“We felt he was a value there,” Boisture said. “We felt we wouldn't be able to get that value with the pick we'd get next year.”

Technically, the NFL's right to conduct a draft expired last season when its 10-year agreement with the NFL Players' Association ran out. The league, however, insists there will be a draft next year, even if a new collective bargaining agreement has not been reached.

The last quarterback the Giants chose in the first round was Simms in 1979. Simms, who will be 37 in November, is scheduled to be the backup to Hostetler, 31, this year. Each has won a Super Bowl game for the Giants.

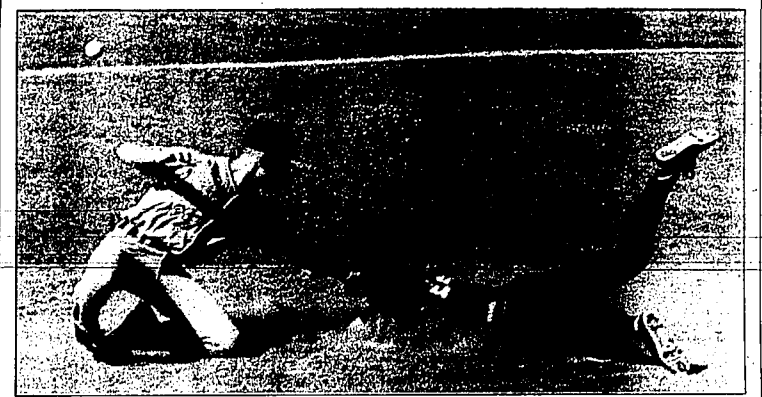
Brown, 6-foot-5 and 225 pounds, played three seasons at Duke and is the fourth leading passer in Blue Devil history. He completed 463 passes in 845 attempts for 5,717 yards and 42 touchdowns, including 230 of 437 for 2,794 yards and 20 touchdowns this past season. He also threw 15 of his 33 career interceptions in 1991.

Brown had another year of eligibility at Duke but he decided after spring practice to turn pro.

“I was one course short of graduating (Soviet Military History) and I felt I would stay the year and concentrate on football,” Brown said in a telephone interview from his parents' summer home on Long Beach Island, N.J.

“But when I saw how much the other quarterbacks were developing, I knew I was just putting off the inevitable and decided to get on with my life.”

After graduating, Brown applied for the supplemental draft, which is conducted in three tiers. Teams which had six wins or less in 1991 were eligible to draft first.

Supervisor of umpires has seen it all

Ever wonder what type of player give softball umpires have the most trouble? Is it the young, inexperienced ones? Does the intensity of the upper divisions lend itself to umpire baiting? Perhaps the sometimes sloppy play in the lower divisions spills over and muddles up umpire-player relations? Or is one gender usually crankier than the other? Answer: None of the above.

According to an authority on the subject, the supervisor of the Twin Falls Umpire Association, Paul Ostyn, “The poorest sport is the aging ball player who can no longer do the things he used to on the field. As his skills slip, he often begins to look for an alibi, and who's more convenient for the role of scapegoat than an umpire.”

On the subject of poor sports, there's a popular misconception about them that sometimes makes Ostyn cringe. “People are fond of saying things like, ‘The reason so-and-so rides the umps so much is that he's such a competitor.’”

Making a face like someone who's just bitten into a grapefruit, the former mayor of Twin Falls continues. “The truth is, people argue with umpires because they lack the self-control not to. No one enjoys being called out on a close play, but the more mature, controlled athlete accepts it as part of the game.”

In his job as supervisor of umpires in Twin, Paul currently works with 28 umpires. Between the men's, women's and co-ed leagues, his umpires cover 70 games a week, always working two-man mechanics.

“What I try to do most in my job,” he says, “is to get the umps to focus in on the things they have control

over. Given only a certain amount, none of us can much control our judgment, so I work on the other aspects of umpiring.”

“I'm a stickler for such things as hustling to get in the right position to make a call, not fraternizing with the players, and adhering to a strict dress code. And if you really want to rattle my cage, try showing up late for an assignment without calling your partner. I know people say I'm too serious about these things, but I've spent a lifetime trying to portray umpires as professionals.”

(Indeed, Ostyn's resume lays claim to 42 years of experience in umpiring and officiating.)

Without hesitation Ostyn cites the best part of the job: “It's the people.”

And he takes pride and satisfaction when speaking of some of “his guys.” Mike Nelson has umpired for 20 years and has done three national tournaments. One more and he'll qualify for international play, meaning the Olympics and Pan-Am games. Bob Mullen and Art Watkins have also worked national tournaments.

The world of umpiring according to Paul Ostyn is sprinkled with Ostynisms — little sayings that define his umpiring philosophy. A partial list, given in no particular order, follows.

• “Umpires are expected to be perfect in an imperfect game.” Interpretation: Look for umps to reach the state of perfection somewhere around the same time players stop committing errors.

• “The games do not exist for the umpires.” Interpretation: Be as invisible as possible. Sell a call loudly on a close play, but on an easy out call at first, a simple arm motion will do.

• “Doctors bury their mistakes; lawyers send theirs to jail.” Interpretation: Umpires must live with their mistakes.

Injury will keep decathlon record holder home

LONDON (AP) — In took only five seconds for Daley Thompson to realize his exceptional track career was over.

In a last-ditch effort to qualify for his fifth Olympic Games in the decathlon, Thompson pulled a leg muscle in Thursday's first event — the 100 meters. The decathlon world record holder and two-time Olympic gold medal winner pulled up in pain five seconds into the race and then called it a career.

"I wouldn't change anything," Thompson said after confirming he was retiring from international competition. "Nothing at all."

Except maybe the end.

It just didn't seem fitting for a man once called the world's greatest living athlete to finish his career running before a crowd of about 30 spectators. The competition at the Crystal Park track was set up specifically by British track officials to see if Thompson could qualify for the Barcelona Olympics.

Halfway through the 100, though, Thompson stopped, clutched the back of his right leg and told coach Frank Dick he had a pulled muscle. Asked if this meant the end of his international career, Thompson said

"Yes, it does."

"It's a big disappointment, but it's one of those things," Thompson said. "No one has a divine right, if you're not good enough you don't go. At the end of the day, I wasn't good enough."

"This wasn't a failure. If I hadn't tried, that would have been a failure. All sorts of mechanical things can go wrong as you get older."

Dick said the 33-year-old Thompson had torn a bicep femoris tendon in the right knee, and would be unable to compete for at least three weeks.

A series of injury problems have followed him the past five years. Af-

ter winning the Olympic title in 1980 and '84 — when he set the world record of 8,847 points in Los Angeles — Thompson was fourth at Seoul four years ago and has not completed a decathlon since.

The two-day event involved seven other British decathletes as Thompson needed to reach the British Olympic qualifying standard of 7,850 points.

"I never had heard of the phrase 'growing old gracefully,'" Thompson said. "This is an emotional moment for me. The thing I'm going to miss is in a couple of years when no one remembers me."

"Now people in the street smile at

me. In the last weeks I've met so many people who've stopped the car, knocked on the window and said you've got to go on, to do it for us."

Thompson said he hoped to continue involvement in track and field, but not as a coach.

"I haven't made contingency plans," Thompson said. "I've always thought of climbing one mountain at a time."

He wants to organize a "quasi-decathlon" at Crystal Palace in late August with invited top decathletes and other top track stars, including world champion Dan O'Brien of the United States.



Rangers doing well, but Valentine is out

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Keeping the Texas Rangers in the hunt in the American League West wasn't enough for manager Bobby Valentine to keep his job.

The Rangers fired Valentine on Thursday after deciding he was not the man to lead them to their first division title.

"Six-and-a-half games back and not playing very well in a season we thought we ought to be in contention. I think we were losing ground with the field," Rangers managing general partner George W. Bush said.

Bush said the move was made after a morning meeting with team president Tom Schieffer and general manager Tom Grieve. Coach Toby Harrah was named interim manager.

"We felt that we had to make a change in order to try and win this year," Schieffer said. "We feel that we have not played to our potential."

Frustration has been building over the years. The Rangers and Seattle Mariners are the only American League teams never to win a pennant.

The Rangers' franchise, which located in Texas in 1972, was created as the expansion Washington Senators moved to Minnesota and became the Twins in 1961.

Valentine's tenure was marked by criticism that team officials did not aggressively pursue deals to acquire big-name players. Speculation had been that Valentine's job was safe as long as Grieve stayed with the team.

Bush said Grieve's job was still safe.

"No one's very pleased with Tom Grieve," Bush said. "It shows he's willing to make tough decisions. He's done as good a job as could be expected."

Grieve, who Bush said will lead the search for a new manager, said his longtime friend took the news well.

"I think Bobby was surprised it happened," Grieve said. "He handled it like a true professional."

The coaching staff will remain intact until the new manager is named, Bush said.

Coach Tom House has taken a lot of heat for the inconsistent pitching staff. But Bush said he will encourage the team's new manager to keep House and the other coaches.

Bush also said the next few games aren't necessarily a test for Harrah, a former Rangers infielder.

"Toby doesn't have to go 3-1 or 4-0 in this series," Bush said. "It's not a trial period for Toby. Someone has to run the team tonight and Toby's the most qualified in my opinion."

Harrah has served on the Rangers' coaching staff since November of 1988. Harrah was manager of the Rangers' Triple-A Oklahoma City team in 1987 and 1988.

Valentine, who appeared in good spirits at a news conference Thursday afternoon, said he was surprised by the firing. But he added he was not ready to leave town.

"I'm not ready to move away from this team right now with my heart, my mind or my talent," Valentine said. "We might stay here and watch them win the World Series."

The Rangers (45-41) had lost two straight games and were in third place in the division 6½ behind first-place Minnesota when they played Baltimore Thursday night. Last season, the Rangers did not fall that far behind until July 31.

"I guess I'm kind of cautiously excited," Harrah said. "I think I'm just really interim manager."

Infielder Jeff Huson said he was surprised by the announcement. He said Valentine, known for his quick temper, was getting along better with his players this season.

"It's ironic that he did his best job managing this year and got fired," Huson said.

Valentine was the third-longest tenured manager in the major leagues, behind Tom Lasorda of the Los Angeles Dodgers and Sparky Anderson of the Detroit Tigers.

He is the second manager fired this season. Montreal fired Tom Runnels on May 22 and replaced him with Felipe Alou.

The 41-year-old Valentine was in his 21st baseball season — his eighth with the Rangers. Given the job May 16, 1985, Valentine became the youngest manager in the major leagues.

Although there had been speculation about Valentine's future, he signed a one-year extension last December that carried through the 1993 season.

Olympic committee says athletes from Yugoslavia can participate

LAUSANNE, Switzerland (AP) — Yugoslav athletes can enter the Barcelona Olympics despite United Nations sanctions if they wear neutral white uniforms and call themselves the Independent Team, the International Olympic Committee said Thursday.

The Olympic organization announced the plan after it got approval from world leaders. IOC officials lobbied them in recent weeks to agree to a formula that would let Yugoslav athletes compete without formally representing their country.

"It was decided that we would make an official proposal to the Yugoslav Olympic Committee that athletes from Yugoslavia can take part in the Olympic Games," IOC president Juan Antonio Samaranch said.

in a telephone interview from his Lausanne residence.

Yugoslavs would compete under the Olympic flag and anthem, he said. The Games start July 25.

Yugoslav Olympic officials, who held long talks with Samaranch at IOC headquarters in Lausanne on Wednesday, were given until Friday to study the plan. Carrard said he expects them to accept.

The U.N. Security Council included a sports boycott in sanctions it imposed May 30 on the Serbian-dominated camp Yugoslavia. The measures were designed to end Serbian involvement in the fighting in Bosnia-Herzegovina.

But Carrard said the IOC plan ultimately got "the approval of all major powers."

Samaranch met British Prime Minister John Major in London last week over the issue.

This week, leaders of the world's seven richest nations at their summit reportedly backed a Major suggestion to let Yugoslav athletes enter at Barcelona as individuals.

The loophole in the U.N. sports boycott was that it refers to people officially representing Yugoslavia, Carrard said.

"We managed to convince a number of people that long-term, this political intrusion into sports was excessive inasmuch as it was hitting innocent athletes," he said. "Why punish them?"

Yugoslavs "would participate representing themselves, not any state," he said.

Winter Olympics lose \$57 million

PARIS (AP) — The Albertville Olympics in February lost \$57 million, but the French government will cover three-quarters of it, the two co-presidents of the organizing committee said Thursday.

The deficit was 6.6 percent of the budget of COJO, as the committee is known, co-presidents Michel Barnier and Jean-Claude Killy said.

"This figure conforms to the risk we calculated in December 1991," Barnier told a final meeting in Paris of the committee, which will be officially disbanded next Wednesday.

The French government will cover 75 percent of the deficit, said Barnier, a member of the National Assembly who is also the elected head of the Savoie department where the Games were staged.

For the same \$14 million deficit that remains, Savoie has "basically covered it," Barnier said.

"Because of the expansion of the region and increased income, we were able to put aside \$12 million," he said. "There remain only some \$2 million to service through loans."

He added that there would be no post-Olympic tax to help pay for the Games, as Grenoble imposed after it hosted the Games for a net loss in 1968.

Barnier did not go into the main reasons for the deficit, which include spiralling costs for the bobbed and luge runs and for the ski jump platforms.

Both had to be modified at great expense for environmental and safety reasons.

Housing also brought in far less income than anticipated, as many journalists spurned COJO offered housing and its inflated prices to find their own lodging.

Three of the 13 communities in Savoie which hosted Olympic competition were hit particularly hard, Barnier said.

They include Brides-les-Bains, the athletes' village, Les Saixies, which hosted cross-country and biathlon events, and Pralognan-les-Vanoises, where curling was held.

"It must be noted that they undertook large-scale municipal investment in a short time to build up their regions, and COJO was not involved in these investments," he said.

Killy, a triple gold medalist in skiing at the 1968 Games, said that 941,650 tickets were sold, considerably more than expected, and that COJO had sold computer equipment and software for \$6 million.

Mariners hungry for new talent

SEATTLE (AP) — With new owners aboard, the Seattle Mariners are elbowing their way to the trading table.

Now that our ownership issue is settled, we're back in business and we're happy to be back," General Manager Woody Woodward said after a six-hour meeting with his senior scouts and advisors.

He said he has been instructed to begin working on trades that will help the Mariners' score in the win column more often — in other words, find some pitchers.

"They've told us to get the job done," Woodward said. "It takes two to dance, but if our desires have anything to do with it, we absolutely will make a move or two in the future. Absolutely. We're ready to get out and get active, things we haven't been able to do until now."

The Mariners traded hands June 30 in a \$125 million deal, with a group led by Japanese businessman Hiroshi Yamachi buying out Jeff Smulyan.

John Stockton heals quickly

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — John Stockton said after he cracked a bone in his right leg last week that he is a fast healer. Utah Jazz trainer Don Sparks confirmed it Thursday.

Stockton, cleared by team doctors to play for the U.S. team at the Olympics in Barcelona later this month, already can walk up and down stairs without pain or a limp.

"He may have some discomfort, but John doesn't actually have to play until the medals round on Aug. 4," Sparks said.

Stockton suffered an undisplaced fracture of the right fibula in a collision with teammate Michael Jordan during the Tournament of the Americas at Portland on June 29. He hasn't played since.

Jazz orthopedic surgeon Dr. Lyle Mason said the leg "is healing without callus and the fracture line appears to be disappearing."

Stockton should be ready to play in time for the opening of Olympic play in Spain on July 25. The medal round begins on July 27.

Jazz spokeswoman Patti Bulli said Thursday that Stockton was at his offseason home in Spokane, Wash., and unavailable for comment.

"John is an athlete who keeps himself in the best physical shape," Sparks said Wednesday. "I am certain this has helped in the process of healing."

Spurs lose Terry Cummings to injury

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The NBA season is more than three months away, yet the San Antonio Spurs have lost another starter.

The team confirmed Thursday that forward Terry Cummings has two torn ligaments in his right knee and could miss all of next season. One of the ligaments will require surgical reconstruction.

"We don't know whether he'll play next year. We think he might,

at some point. It would be foolish to say a date," said Bob Bass, Spurs vice president for basketball operations. "It's a big blow to our club."

Cummings suffered the injuries Monday in Chicago during a pickup game when another player fell on him from behind, hitting him on the back of his right knee.

The loss of Cummings for some or all of next season is the latest in a series of Spurs calamities.

Starting guard Willie Anderson is

recovering from surgery on stress fractures in both legs, which forced him to sit out the end of last season.

He is expected back up next season, although Spurs officials will be watching closely whether he is fully recovered.

Starting point guard Rod Strickland is gone. The Spurs failed to sign him to a new contract this summer, and the Portland Trail Blazers quickly picked him up in the free agent market.

Steelers face choice: Brister or O'Donnell

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Pittsburgh Steelers coach Bill Cowher declared his two-week minicamp a success but said he has no idea whether Bubby Brister or Neil O'Donnell will be his quarterback.

That decision is one of many that will wait until Cowher conducts his first training camp as a head coach on July 17. Eighty-three players attended the minicamp at Three Rivers Stadium.

"It's going very well," Cowher said Thursday. "What we're trying to do is give the players a very firm base for which to now take into training camp."

Cowher installed a new offense and defense and introduced the Steelers to a new practice schedule. He ordered more precision players were numbered practice jerseys, high school officials marked the ball and called penalties and a Jugs machine passed the ball to receivers.

But the most important things will

take place when the Steelers open extended camp at St. Vincent College in Latrobe.

"So many things happen differently with pads on," Cowher said. "I think things will happen differently as people start to understand exactly what they're being asked to do."

"What we've tried to do is create a foundation for these guys. Now, they have to take that foundation and apply it in a more competitive atmosphere that training camp will provide."

The most closely watched competition will be at quarterback. Cowher has declared the job wide open between Brister, the starter since 1988, and O'Donnell, who started eight games last season while Brister was injured. Brister had surgery on his right knee in February.

"It's held up fine," Cowher said. "Obviously, we're practicing only once a day and we're only out there for a little over an hour so I don't know if this was a true test or not."

63rd All-Star Game on tap Tuesday

The CBS broadcast crew of Jim O'Brien, Tim McCarver, Sean McDonough and Jim Kaat will be at San Diego's Jack Murphy Stadium Tuesday, July 14, for the "63rd All-Star Game." When the baseball stars from the National League, led by Chicago Cub second baseman Ryne Sandberg, take on the best the American League can muster, the game will see a more-mixed cast of players than ever before. We recently spoke to CBS announcer Jim Kaat about things baseball, and he reminisced about his own All-Star experiences. Kaat, a 6-foot-4-inch lefty who pitched in the major leagues for 25 years (from 1959 through 1983), was picked for the American League squad in 1962 and 1966, while playing for the Minnesota Twins, and he was selected again in 1975 as a member of the Chicago White Sox.

Unfortunately, Kaat didn't get to pitch in either of the '62 games (each season between 1959 and 1962, two All-Star Games were played, one in a city in each league), but there were extenuating circumstances. "A week before the All-Star break, I got my teeth knocked out by a ground ball back up the middle," Kaat remembers. "When I reported, it was a messy situation. I was walking around with these stitches in my

mouth and a big old puffy lip."

Despite the pain and the awkwardness, Kaat never considered not attending. Just being there was enough for a 23-year-old kid in the early stages of what would turn out to be a very successful baseball career.

In fact, Kaat remembers '62 with evident fondness.

"That was my first All-Star Game," he says, "which is always pretty special. But to see Rocky Colavito, Pete Runnels, Yogi — just to see the players that I didn't consider my contemporaries yet; they were still heroes to me — to see those guys made my first year a little more special."

Four years later, in 1966, Kaat got his chance to play, and he pitched two innings, giving up three hits and one run in one of the more memorable All-Star Games ever, a 2-1, 10-inning National League victory in St. Louis.

"That was a good, tight, pitching-dominated game," Kaat remembers, "despite all of the big names they had in there — Mays, Clemente, Aaron, Frank Robinson, Kaline. I guess the most memorable part of the game, though, was how hot it was at Busch Stadium. It was 116 degrees on the field; it was just smokin'."

Kaat was again selected to play in the 1975 contest in Milwaukee. In

that game — won again by the Nationals, this time 6-3 — Kaat was the lone bright spot among the American League pitchers, hurling two innings of perfect ball against the heart of the NL lineup.

"From a performance standpoint, the '75 game was a real good one," Kaat says. "I got to face Bench and Morgan and Brock. I had a lot of fun in that game. That was the year I was using a really fast motion, and I threw Bench a big, slow curve, and he hit it a mile foul. He chuckled at me and said, 'Throw me that again' I did, and he just missed it. He got under it and popped it up."

California film crew shooting documentary at Priest Lake

PRIEST LAKE (AP) — A film crew from San Francisco will be at Priest Lake this weekend to work on a documentary on pioneer movie producer Nell Shipman.

Shipman was a silent film star who established a movie studio at Priest Lake in the 1920s.

She made several movies at her Priest Lake studio, frequently with herself as star and a menagerie of animals on site.

The producers of Naked Eye Productions, Jane Wagner and

Tina DiSeliciano, will interview Boise State English professor Tony Trusky, who rekindled interest in Shipman by publishing her autobiography and rediscovering several of her lost films. They will also film in the Shipman archives at the BSU Library.

From there they will travel to Priest Lake for more filming and interviews.

The Nell Shipman documentary is being funded by the Idaho Humanities Council.

Lamb), Cecil Hoffman (Zoey Clemmons) and Anthony DeSando (Alex). Only John Spencer (Tommy Mullaney), remains from the gaggle of newcomers who got tryouts the last few seasons. In addition, two former "St. Elsewhere" producers, John Tinker and John Masius, become co-executive producers.

"Beverly Hills 90210" fans will get two doses of the Jason Priestly-Luke Perry Fox hit each week this summer. New episodes will air at 8 p.m. Wednesdays — kicking off Fox's new Wednesday slate — beginning July 15. Repeats from the first season will air at 9 p.m. Thursdays as of July 16.

"In a New Light," an information and entertainment special focusing on AIDS, is slated for July 11 on ABC. Elizabeth Taylor will introduce the 8-to-10 p.m. ET special, to be hosted by Linda Lavin, Bruce Davison and Robert Guillaume. Performers include: Dustin Hoffman, Arsenio Hall, Gloria Estefan and Clint Black.

BACK IN ACTION:

"Homefront," the glossy post-World War II soap opera set in small-town Ohio, returns to the ABC schedule for summer reruns Tuesday, July 21. The 90-minute series pilot airs at 9:30 p.m. that date. And a week later, at 10 p.m. July 28, "Homefront" treats viewers to a previously unaired episode covering events immediately following the wartime death of the Stoans' (Ken Jenkins, Mimi Kennedy) son. The episode includes both newly filmed scenes and footage left over when the "Homefront" pilot was expanded to 90 minutes last fall.

The clever Fox teencom "Parker Lewis Can't Lose" is now simply "Parker Lewis," reflecting the new fallibility of the show's hero played by Corin Nemec. "PL" returns for a summer six-pack of new episodes at 8:30 p.m. Thursdays starting July 16 on Fox.

NBC, which has been unloading its established hits like "In the Heat of the Night" and "Matlock" like so many closeout specials, is taking the opposite tack with "Scinfeld" and "Blossom." The network announced that both shows have been renewed for next season and will be given late-summer premieres in August coming out of NBC's telecast of the Summer Olympics. By having "Scinfeld" and "Blossom" get jumps on the new season, NBC will be able to grant both comedies liberal on-air promotion in heavily viewed time periods. It's a smart move from a network that needs a lot more to recapture its top-rated standing.

Big shakeup at "The Maury Povich Show." Karl Sagin, executive producer of Maury Povich's syndicated talkie since its September debut, left the Paramount show. Although the official word is Sagin "resigned to pursue other projects," New York sources say she was fired because the show featured too many "freaks and geeks" and not enough newsmakers.

Look, up in the sky! Is it a bird? Is it a plane? Is it Rocket Squirrel? Is it Mighty Mouse? Is it Superman?

No, it's Underdog! Yes, Underdog. Everyone's favorite canine hero and high-flying popular attraction in the annual Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. And never fear! Nickelodeon has begun showing repeats of the 125 episodes of the classic animated series.

Nick also has added the beloved "The Bullwinkle Show" to its cartoon kingdom lineup, which features the venerable "Looney Tunes," "Inspector Oadget,"

Children's programming

"Danger Mouse" and "Heathcliff" and the original Nick toons of "Doug," "Rugrats" and "The Ren & Stimpy Show."

Set in Washington, D.C., "Underdog" follows the exploits of the mild-mannered, lovable and humble pooch, Shoeshine Boy, who is actually Underdog, fearless crusader for justice and the American way.

Covering Underdog's adventures is sweet ace-television reporter Polly Purebred. Underdog's chief nemesis is the evil scientist, Bar Sinister, and his equally vile aide, Cad.

The late Wally Cox, who came to fame in the '50s as the star of the acclaimed sitcom, "Mr. Peepers," is the voice of Underdog and his endearing performance is part of the reason for Underdog's longevity.

"Underdog" originally premiered Oct. 3, 1964, as part of NBC's Saturday morning cartoon lineup. It moved to CBS in 1966 and soared back in 1968 to NBC, where it aired for another five years.

In a departure from its adult-oriented prime-time fare, cable's Nickelodeon will go with a teen lineup on Saturday nights, beginning Aug. 15.

First up, at 8 p.m., will be the network's popular "Clarissa Explains It All," starring Melissa Joan Hart. At 8:30, it's "Roundhouse," a new hip-hop variety show created by Buddy Sheffield, head writer for "In Living Color."

"Are You Afraid of the Dark?," featuring youngsters sitting around a campfire telling ghost stories, follows at 9:30.

Cable superstation TBS plans to launch "News for Kids" on Sunday mornings beginning in September. School-age anchors and reporters will take a look at current events.

Spike Lee will guest star in the new PBS children's series "Ghostwriter." The mystery series, designed to promote literacy among kids 7-10, debuts Sunday, Oct. 4, at 6 p.m. ET. Super sports star Bo Jackson has also agreed to help do promotion to launch the show, which is from "Sesame Street" creators Children's Television Workshop.

Summer TV has something for everyone

Television has something for everyone this summer — more series than usual and a plethora of specials and movies, not to mention those once-every-four-years events — the Olympic Summer Games and the Republican and Democratic conventions.

As has become tradition in summer, cable is premiering several series and bringing back new episodes of such hits as HBO's "Dream On" and "Tales From the

Crypt." And the four networks are following suit with a number of new series.

The most heavily hyped of the network entries is "Melrose Place," Fox's spinoff of the phenomenally successful "Beverly Hills, 90210." Fox is expanding its prime-time lineup to Wednesday night to accommodate "Melrose," which also is on Fox's fall schedule.

"Melrose" focuses on the lives of eight twentysomething adults living in one of Los Angeles' trendiest neighborhoods. Like "90210," the series boasts an attractive ensemble

cast of young-up-and-comers, including Josie Bissett, Thomas Calabro, Andrew Sue, Amy Locane, Doug Savant, Courtney-Thorne-Smith and Vanessa Williams. Grant Show, who plays construction worker Matt Fielding, is being touted as the new Jason Priestley-Luke Perry. He already has scored covers of People magazine and TV Guide.

The series made its debut July 8 with a 90-minute episode. On July 15, it will move to its regular time, where it will follow new episodes of "90210."

One of the most interesting of CBS' eight new series — and one of the few not targeted for a young audience — is "Middle Age!" scheduled for August. Indescribable is the only way to describe this comedy-drama that chronicles the lives of a disparate group of men and women living in Chicago.

The series' creators and executive producers are Stan Rogow, the man behind the 1990-91 cult NBC series "Shannon's Deal," and writer-director John Byrum of "Inserts" and "The Razor's Edge." The ensemble cast includes Peter Riegert, William Russ, James Gammon, Ruby Dee, Lisa Zane and Kyle Secor.

NBC is premiering one new series, the sitcom "Home Fires," starring Kate Burton and Michael Brandon. The network also is promising new episodes of the hits "Seinfeld" and "Blossom" in mid-August.

The Peacock network's big event is its 161 hours of the XXV Olympic Summer Games from Barcelona. From July 25 to Aug. 9, NBC will devote its morning, prime-time and late-night programming to the Olympics. Bob Costas, Dick Enberg, Katie Couric, Jim Lampley and Hannah Storm are the hosts.

CNN will present live coverage of convention and political news daily. Its "beyond-the-gavel" coverage of the Democratic convention begins July 12 with a special edition of "Larry King Live." Depending on the schedules, King is also set to present special programs throughout the convention. CNN will feature special convention editions daily of "Inside Politics '92," "The World Today," "Moneyline" and "Crossfire."
