# House votes to increase grazing fees

WASHINGTON — Ranchers who graze livestock on public lands would see their fees increase by one-third under a bill approved Thursday by the House.

A move to delete the increase failed 245-164 on Wednesday, as critics charged big corporations and rich cattle ranchers were benefiting from a taxpayer subsidy at current fees. The bill later passed 329-94. It now goes to the Senate.

"What we have now is corporate welfare," said Rep. George Miller, D-Calif., during debate on the grazing amendment Wednesday.

The increase is part of a \$12.7 billion bill funding Interior Department and related

agencies in fiscal 1993. The measure would require the Bureau of Land Management to boost the fees charged for grazing livestock on federal lands to "fair market value." But the annual increase could be no more than one-third, and the current fee of \$1.92 per animal unit month would increase to \$2.56 next year. An animal unit month is the amount of forage needed to feed a cow and calf pair, a horse, or five sheep.

Western lawmakers of both parties defended the current grazing practices and

said low rates were needed to protect small family ranch operations.

Rep. Pat Williams, D-Mont., said it was "a myth" that rich ranchers were benefiting from the subsidy and said the increase would drive some operations off the land.

But Rep. Chester Atkins, D-Mass., said 10 percent of the ranchers control half the nation's grazing on public lands. Among the owners are big oil companies and other corporations. He denounced the practice as "an obscene subsidy that goes to some of the wealthiest individuals and wealthiest companies in this nation."

An amendment backed by Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, to eliminate the increase was defeated.

"Unfortunately, our efforts to stop this grazing fee increase were unsuccessful,"

Stallings said. "We have this battle every year and every year finds us making the same argument."

He said the grazing fee question should be considered in an appropriate committee, not tacked onto an appropriations bill.

"The fact is that during committee hearings this year, testimony was overwhelmingly opposed to proposals to increase the fee by 33 percent," he said. "The fee increase ... would be a heavy burden on Western permittees and would put many of them out of business. Idaho's economy can't afford a hit like this."

Stallings said the vast majority of the 31,000 ranchers in the West run small, family-owned operations. They cannot handle such hikes, which would put them out of business, he said.

## Quayle, wife voice views on abortion

### 'We are pro-life,' vice president says

EVANSVILLE, Ind. — Vice President Dan Quayle hastened to reaffirm his opposition to abortion Thursday after causing a stir by saying he would support "whatever decision" his own daughter might make if faced with an unwanted pregnancy as an adult.

Quayle's wife, Marilyn, left no room for debate. She declared that if their daughter, now 13, should become pregnant, "she'll take the child to term."

The vice president, who favors the Republican Party's support for a constitutional amendment banning most abortions, said his comments on a hypothetical question involving his daughter represented "no change at all." "We are pro-life," he said. "We are opposed to abortion."

An abortion-rights group said Quayle's stance "smacks of a double standard," that he is in favor of a woman's right to choose when the issue is close to home. But anti-abortion activists said he had merely acknowledged the obvious — that a young woman's parents couldn't stop her if she really wanted an abortion and that they would rightly continue to love and support her.

Democratic presidential nominee Bill Clinton, who supports abortion rights, said in Little Rock, Ark., that Quayle's comments were in line with "my position that these matters should not be turned back into crimes."

"Asked what he would do if his 12-year-old daughter, Chelsea, were pregnant, Clinton said, "I wouldn't talk to the press about it."

The question arose Wednesday night on CNN's "Larry King Live" after Quayle praised a Pennsylvania law that requires parental consent before minors can have abortions.

## Twin Falls H.S. alum Peterson takes over IRS

WASHINGTON — Onetime Twin Falls schoolgirl Shirley Daniel Peterson says that even in this day and age people are often surprised to find a woman in charge of the Internal Revenue Service.

At a recent cocktail party, for instance, "My husband happened to mention to these people that his wife is the commissioner of the IRS, and they said, 'Oh you mean of the local office? Or the state?'"

No, Don Peterson dutifully informed them. Shirley Peterson heads the whole shebang: all 115,000 employees, all 900 offices, the entire \$7 billion budget. Everyone's favorite agency, the one that persuades Americans to fork over \$1 trillion in taxes every year, is run for the first time by a woman.

Peterson — who calls taxpayers "customers" and speaks of providing "quality service" — outlined her busy agenda for the agency during a recent interview in the IRS office she has occupied since being appointed by President Bush in February.

For 40 years at least, the IRS "has essentially done its job in the same way," she said. "But the world is so complicated now we have to change with it. We're entering a new era in tax administration."

The 50-year-old tax lawyer, a 1959 graduate of Twin Falls High School, was born and raised near the small southeastern Colorado town of Holly, which also happens to be the birthplace of Gov. Roy Romer.

As a child, she was academically inclined, reading a book a day during the summertime. But she was also "a bit of a tomboy," she said.

"I had two older brothers, and it never occurred to me I couldn't do anything they did. So, I rode horses and drove tractors and milked cows."

Her father owned a dairy farm, and she delivered the milk before school and washed the bottles after classes. But the farm, struggling in the best of times, was wiped out by drought in the mid-1950s.

Her father got a job selling dairy equipment in Twin Falls, Idaho, moving the family when she was in high school, but Holly left its mark.

"A lot of rugged individuals who learn to depend on

HOUSTON — Bill Clinton ventured into George Bush's adopted hometown Thursday to denounce the Bush administration for failing to live up to the tough-on-crime talk that helped the Republicans win in 1988.

The Democratic presidential nominee drew a mixture of boos and cheers from a

rowdy, rain-soaked crowd as he assailed U Bush for opposing the Brady bill, which would require a waiting period on the purchase of handguns.

"The president used the crime issue to beat Democrats in 1988 and then turned around and tried to take \$100 million away

from state and local law enforcement," Clinton said.

A campaign statement labeled "The Bush Record: A rap sheet on crime" said that Bush proposed cutting local law enforcement aid by \$100 million in his fiscal 1992 budget.

Clinton later stepped up his attack on the president in a speech to about 400

## Feds 'pray for rain,' send firefighting troops West

WASHINGTON — Interior Department officials said Thursday they are boosting airpower and cranking up new technology in anticipation of one of the West's worst wildfire seasons of the century.

And they have a not-so-secret weapon: pray for rain.

"The drought is extreme. It is as bad as it has been in modern history. Much of the West was ready to burn a few months ago," said Jay Thietten, national fire-program director for the Bureau of Land Management.

"We are well prepared, as prepared as we could be," he said. "But I can't overestimate the importance of weather. Sometimes if the weather is not

cooperating, no matter what we do, the fires are going to keep burning."

Jim Douglas, Interior's firefighting coordinator, briefed Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan Jr. on the situation Thursday along with officials from the BLM, National Park Service, Fish and Wildlife Service and Bureau of Indian Affairs.

An emergency communications center has been set up at department headquarters in Washington D.C. The actual firefighting will be directed primarily from the Boise Interservice Fire Center in Boise, Idaho.

Skip Scott, the fire center's chief operations officer, said the vast expanse of drought has caused a fourfold

increase in the number of fires and a threefold increase in the amount of acreage burned.

"The areas of most concern are still northern California, the Northwest, the Great Basin and Northern Rockies," Scott said.

"As lightning storms develop and August users in the start of normal fire season in the West, conditions exist for a devastating fire season," he said.

"The preparation that all federal wildland fire agencies have done will, hopefully, mitigate the circumstances. The largest help, however, would be if these lightning events contained some precipitation."

Thietten singled out Oregon as the area of greatest concern.

"Oregon is No. 1. Plus in Oregon right

now a lot of valuable commercial timber is at risk. Washington and Northern California would be right in there close, then Idaho, Nevada and Montana," he said.

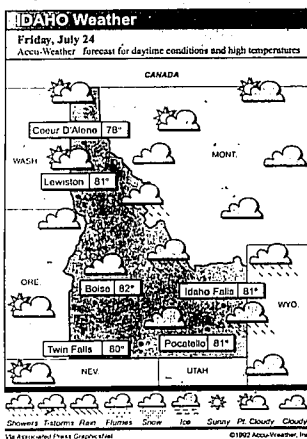
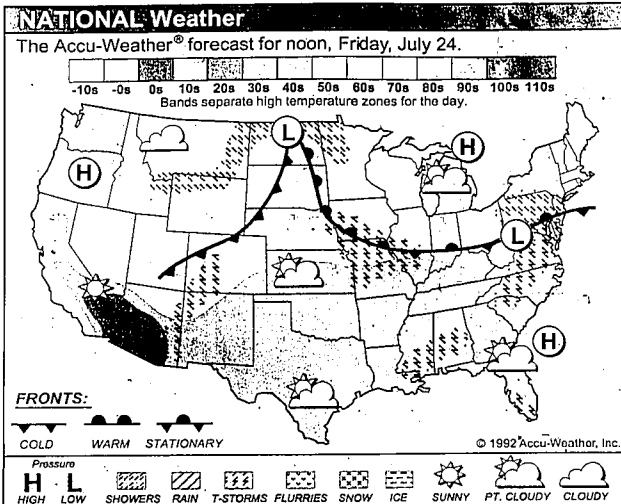
"Colorado and Utah are real dry too, but the others are so much drier that we are not making them as much of a priority," he said.

Nancy Dean, assistant fire-weather program manager for the National Weather Service, said drought conditions are severe or extreme across most of the West.

"Luckily, over June and most of July we have had rain over most of the West," she said.

But next week, Dean said, the Pacific Northwest could be subjected to what is known as "dry lightning."

**Weather summary**

The National Weather Service in Boise says rain continues to fall across the state, but southern Idaho was mostly sunny and dry.

It was a little breezy at times around Boise, Idaho Falls, Pocatello and a few other spots. In the north, skies were cloudy with steady rain at Lewiston and in the Moscow area with showers over the mountains along the northern Idaho/Montana border.

Some rainfall amounts included two-tenths an inch at Lewiston, more than four-tenths inch in Moscow and near a quarter inch at Mullan. Lowell and Grangeville also had rain, but no totals were available.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 88 degrees at Shoshone and Malad. Sun Valley and Stanley reported the coldest at 35 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 110 degrees at Lake Havasu City, Ariz. The lowest was 26 degrees at Truckee, Calif.

**In Walla Walla, it's water, water everywhere**

Heavy rain in the Northwest caused flooding Thursday in Walla Walla, Wash., and thundershowers and showers also extended from the Plains to the East Coast.

Walla Walla received 3.34 inches of rain from 11 p.m. Wednesday to 11 a.m. Thursday, the National Weather Service said. Homes and businesses were flooded.

Police halted traffic on downtown streets, which were covered by as much as 8 inches of water, dispatcher Bob Bruce said. Crews cleared mud from country roads. No injuries were reported.

Showers and thundershowers developed over the Rocky Mountain as a cold front crossed the region.

East of the Rockies at midday, scattered showers and thundershowers extended from southeastern Texas to the southern Atlantic Coast and from Kansas through the Tennessee Valley and upper Ohio Valley.

Showers and thundershowers prevailed from northern Virginia and the middle Atlantic Coast northward to eastern New York state and the southern two-thirds of New England.

Showers and thundershowers over West Virginia dropped 2.24 inches of rain at Haines Knob in rugged Rappahannock County during the 24 hours up to 6 a.m., the weather service said.

Morning showers and thundershowers over eastern New York state produced 1.44 inches of rain at Maplewood.

Heavier rainfall during the six hours up to 2 p.m. EDT included 1.52 inches at Joplin, Mo.; 1.37 at Akron, Ohio; and 1.27 at Wrightstown, Pa.

It's already the wettest July on record for three cities east of the Rockies. Concordia, Kan., had a record 10.17 inches of rain for the month as of late Wednesday, and Kansas City, Mo., had a record 10.91 inches by daybreak Thursday. Mansfield, Ohio, reported a record 10.00 inches by late morning Thursday.

For the year, Concordia had a total of 26.23 inches, compared with a normal 27.11 inches for the entire year.

# House OKs cable regulation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House, responding to consumer complaints about rising cable television rates, approved legislation Thursday to bring the industry under tighter government control.

The bill, passed 340-73, requires that companies offer basic service under a price formula set by the Federal Communications Commission. It establishes the package of channel offerings cable companies must provide consumers under basic service and sets standards for quality of service.

The Bush administration's Office of Management and Budget is recommending that the president veto the bill. The administration supported a substitute offered by Rep. Norman Lent, R-N.Y., that would have required regulation of basic cable service, with a definition of "basic" that was much less expensive than the version which won final passage.

Lent's bill, which was defeated 266-144, also would not have permitted the FCC to act against cable systems that charge unreasonable or abusive rates for programming beyond basic service, as would the Envidado provision that prevailed.

Both Democratic and Republican lawmakers said during debate that the best solution to rising cable rates is competition.

In an effort to foster that competition, the House passed an amendment 338-68 offered by Rep. Billy Tauzin, D-La., that prevents cable-affiliated programmers from denying programs to cable's competitors.

The chief competitor to cable, though now serving only about 400,000 subscribers, are members of the United States Interactive and Microwave Television Association.

The industry, which transmits programming to a small antenna on the "homeworker's" roof from a receiving tower linked to a satellite, has complained that it has not been able to grow because it does not have easy access to the cable programming that people expect to see on television, like CNN and ESPN.

# U.S. chief: Colombia warned of lax security

MIAMI — U.S. officials criticized Colombian authorities Thursday for failing to take adequate measures to prevent the escape from prison of drug lord Pablo Escobar.

"I am appalled that Pablo Escobar is once again on the loose, free to survive one of the most vicious criminal organizations the world has ever seen," said President Bush's drug czar, Bob Martinez.

"Escobar is a bloodthirsty gangster, responsible for the deaths of thousands of American citizens and the addition of millions more," said the former Florida governor who heads the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy.

Martinez said he is particularly upset because the United States had warned Colombia about lax security at the Envidado prison near Medellin.

"On numerous occasions, U.S. government officials have raised concerns about the security of the Envidado prison," Martinez said in a statement.

"We had been repeatedly assured by Colombian authorities that the prison was secure and that Escobar would face justice for his crimes. Despite the good intentions of the Colombian government, apparently this was not the case."

"I'm not giving up on Texas, because George Bush has a hotel room in this state," Clinton said, drawing laughter from the crowd. "I spent my life in the state just to your east and I'm not so sure that I don't have more in common with you than that fellow who claims Texas so he doesn't have to pay taxes in Maine."

Clinton also said he would fight back when criticized by Republicans. "I'll tell you that Al Gore and Bill Clinton believe in strong national defense and we believe in a strong political defense."

Earlier, Clinton said he would support military intervention in Iraq if the United Nations deemed it necessary to force compliance with U.N. resolutions requiring inspection of suspected Iraqi weapons sites.

The Bush administration said Wednesday it would not rule out using military force. Said Clinton, "Let Saddam Hussein make no mistake: even during an election campaign, Americans are united on this issue."

Speaking in a steady rain to about 2,500 people on the steps of Houston's City Hall, Clinton outlined his plans to make the nation's streets safer, and promised to use the crime issue "not to divide the American people, but to unify the American people."

That was one of several veiled references to Republican attacks on 1988 Democratic nominee Michael Dukakis. The GOP four years ago sought to paint Dukakis as soft on crime by stressing the case of Willie Horton, a Massachusetts prisoner who went on a crime spree while in a furlough program supported by Dukakis, then the state's governor.

themselves come out of that part of the country," she said.

"Helly," she said, "probably shapes my philosophy in everything I do: Get the job done. Do it right. Don't waste any time. Be nice. Do it now."

"My expectations for the Internal Revenue Service are very much shaped by (those) attitudes."

Peterson was all-everything at Twin Falls High — valedictorian, Girls' National, State, National Honor Society, Student Council — long after she had decided she would be the first member of her family to attend college.

When she informed her guidance counselor at TFHS that she wanted to attend one of the "Seven Sisters" schools, the prestigious, all-female liberal-arts colleges of the Northeast, he urged her to lower her sights.

"He said, 'Oh, Shirley, I don't think that's a good idea at all. First of all you won't be accepted there... and even if you were, you wouldn't be happy there.' And I remember thinking, 'I will show you,'" Peterson said.

She applied to Vassar. Smith and Bryn Mawr, was accepted at all three, and picked the latter. She loved it.

Peterson was interested in law, but the only lawyer she knew, the father of a friend, lectured her at a family dinner that "girls aren't lawyers, and I should just think of something more appropriate as my profession," she said. "And again I remember thinking to myself, 'We'll see.'"

So she enrolled at New York University Law School, where she was one of fewer than 20 female students in the 225-member class of '67. The first of her two daughters was born in the middle of her second year there.

"We couldn't afford a babysitter so I took her to class," Peterson said. "I took her in a little carrying thing and sat in the back corner by the door so if she cried I could get out in a hurry."

Twenty-five years ago, attitudes were much different, she said.

When not in class, she said, "I regarded it as my solemn duty to cook and clean and keep the house in order... and I did that. I always had a nice dinner ready for Don when he came home from work."

In 1969, she started work at the Washington, D.C., law firm of Peterson, Johnson & Johnson, first to partner in nine years despite working only part-time in order to spend more time with her children. It was there that she developed her affinity for tax law.

"It's an extremely intellectually challenging field... like chess or a crossword puzzle," she said. "Have you ever tried reading the Internal Revenue code? It's very complex but it fits together in a way. And it requires a very keen analytical ability to be a good tax lawyer."

She became assistant U.S. attorney general in charge of the tax division in 1989, a step away from the IRS job.

As commissioner, she said, she puts in 12- to 14-hour workdays, plus seven hours on Saturdays.

One big demand on her time is compliance 2000. The idea is that more taxpayers will cooperate with the IRS if complying with the rules was easier and if the rules themselves were more comprehensible.

"Not that the IRS has gone soft. 'It doesn't mean we won't use enforcement efforts; we will,' she said firmly.

She also is overseeing a massive modernization program in which the agency will spend billions over the next decade revamping its badly outdated computer system.

"But we may not have a chance to see these ambitious projects through. If President Bush loses his bid for re-election this fall, she likely will be looking for work."

"I'm not worried about finding a job," she said. "Who knows? Maybe I could go find a few cows to milk."

**Lawsuit halts paving along South Fork**

CASCADE — Much of the work on paving a road along the South Fork of the Salmon River has been halted because of a lawsuit that claims Payette National Forest officials haven't done enough study on its impact on spawning chinook salmon.

The paving project is east of Cascade. Forest Service officials said most of the work on the \$8 million project has been halted. The contractor, Tidewater Construction of Oregon, will be allowed to complete work already under way.

That primarily involves replacement of culverts and construction of retaining walls. The National Marine Fisheries Service is to review the project to determine its impact on ocean-going fish, before construction can resume.

**Canyon officials call for jail inspection**

CALDWELL — The Canyon County Commission will call in an outside expert to inspect the new jail and evaluate whether cracking of a second-floor concrete slab has led to other problems.

Commission Chairman Walter Opp went along with the motion Thursday, but said he thought the county was wasting its time by calling in an outside expert.

Commissioner Jan Vinson said an outside engineer says the jail is structurally sound, but the concrete floor remains a problem.

**Grow old but stay sexy, conference hears**

FORT HALL — Women don't have to let aging get them down. There are ways to minimize the impact.

"Sexuality doesn't necessarily have to change as you get older," said Dr. Jean Bokelmann, physician at the Idaho State University Student Health Center. "Changes in the body affect the way (women) feel about themselves."

Nearly 100 women attended a conference on women's health sponsored by the Indian Health Center at Fort Hall and the Shoshone-Bannock Tribal Health and Human Services Department.

**Boise offers reward for rape cases help**

BOISE — The city of Boise is offering up to \$30,000 in reward money for leads to solve the rape cases which have terrorized local women. Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne on Wednesday said outrage at these "vicious, brutal attacks" led to the monetary offer.

Meanwhile, investigators have determined Sunday's alleged abduction and rape of a woman from Shaver's grocery store never happened, said Lt. Tim Rosenthal.

Police have not decided whether they will file a criminal charge against the woman for filing a false report, Chief Jim Carwin said.

**Officials reject Priest Lake sewer system**

PRIEST LAKE — Granite-Reeder Bay has once again rejected a central sewer system on Priest Lake and health officials are worried the purity of the water could be degraded.

The five-member board Tuesday voted down the latest proposal, 3-2, even though only 45 percent of residents publicly opposed the project.

It is the third time a proposed central system have been shot down since the mid-1970s. Priest Lake is listed as one of the cleanest lakes in North America.

**Rare polio poses no threat of outbreak**

BOISE — An extremely rare case of polio has been confirmed in a Payette County teen-ager who may have contracted it from an infant's vaccine, state health officials say. However, the public has no reason to worry about a polio outbreak, they stress. "He is not infectious," said Dr. Fritz Dixon, state epidemiologist. "He's not a risk to anybody."

**State finalizes INEL waste permit rule**

BOISE (AP) — The state Health and Welfare Board has completed regulations to force federal compliance with state air quality permit requirements if attempts are ever resumed to bring commercial nuclear waste into Idaho for storage.

The board's unanimous action on Thursday made permanent the emergency regulations enacted in April after the state Legislature quickly approved enabling legislation prompted by a federal appellate court decision voiding the state's previous attempt to force compliance by the Energy Department.

The legislation and rules were part of Gov. Cecil Andrus campaign to halt shipments of high-level radioactive waste from the decommissioned Fort St. Vrain commercial reactor near Denver to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory for storage.

Andrus' stand against the Colorado shipments was only an extension of his four-year battle with the federal government over using the INEL as a temporary — but long-term in his view — dump for nuclear waste generated by other states when the government had done little to open permanent dumps.

Three of the 247 truckloads of Fort St. Vrain waste had reached INEL last fall before the state found the air quality permitting requirement and won a court order enforcing it.

That was the order overturned on appeal. But despite complaints from business interests fearing regulatory red tape, the enabling legislation won approval after INEL reported a radioactive release — exactly the kind of thing state critics of the waste shipments claimed could happen without state permits.

And since the regulations took effect on an emergency basis, Deputy Attorney General Curt Franzen told the board "there have been no needless requirements placed on businesses."

In that time, the federal government has also dropped its attempt to complete its contract with the Fort St. Vrain utility to store the material at INEL. The legal delays against temporary dump constructed by the reactor site, and the containers the material is stored in are not licensed for shipping purposes.

**Lawmakers say support for gaming law fades**

POCATELLO (AP) — Eastern Idaho lawmakers think support is fading for a proposed constitutional amendment to flatter ban casino gambling in Idaho.

The Legislature convenes Monday in a special session to deal with the issue. Attorney General Larry EchoHawk has been touring the state outlining a proposed resolution that will be offered to the lawmakers leading to a constitutional amendment.

Eight lawmakers met with EchoHawk at Pocatello on Wednesday, and most said support for an amendment was fading. Sen. John Hansen, R-Idaho Falls, said he believed when Gov. Cecil Andrus called the session the measure had the necessary two-thirds majority. "But I am getting more concerned that that is perhaps not the consensus."

EchoHawk said a majority of lawmakers oppose casino gambling but have questions about language in the draft amendment.

"The concept is supported," he said, but specifics may be a problem. Andrus and legislative leaders agreed on a special session after three Idaho tribes asked the state to negotiate compacts governing reservation gambling.

Bruce McCaskill, Pocatello, a member of the Amusement and Music Owners of Idaho, said the resolution as proposed also would ban electronic games that simulate

poker and keno and award free replays to winners. He predicted between six and 10 local businesses would close if the amendment passes.

His organization is lobbying hard against the proposal, McCaskill said. He estimated there are between 2,000 and 5,000 machines, costing about \$3,000 each, in use around the state. "It's devastating. It could be devastating," he said.

Legislative leaders hope to get the special session over in two or three days, but most lawmakers at Wednesday's meeting said it could take a full week.

**Cool temperatures help firefighters**

Air tankers pounded two small but stubborn forest fires with chemical retardant on Thursday as firefighters attacked dozens of backcountry blazes sparked by a storm packing more wind and lightning than rain.

Unseasonably cool temperatures and higher than usual humidity gave fire bosses the opportunity to gain ground on the flames feeding on fuels turned tinder-dry by six years of drought.

Over 100 firefighters battled the pair of 20-acre Towne Creek fires burning within a mile of each other northwest of the small community of Pine about 45 miles east of Boise.

Boise National Forest spokeswoman Lynette Berriehocha said both fires burned hotly into the night before finally laying down. Winds gusting up to 40 miles an hour kept tankers out of the air until Thursday.

Buildozers were pulled in among some summer homes along Towne Creek to protect them if the fire

turned in that direction. Twenty miles northwest, reinforcements were pushing manpower toward 400 on the Flicker Creek Fire, which was burning on 700 acres at the confluence of the North and Middle forks of the Boise River.

Forest Service roads were closed, and campers at the Troutdale Campground about a quarter mile southwest of the fire were told to leave the area.

There was no estimate of containment at either fire front.

**Teen dies of injuries**

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Jennifer Wyler, 17, Idaho Falls died Thursday at Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center of injuries suffered in a two-car accident a month ago on U.S. 20 north of Idaho Falls, official said. The Idaho State police said that on June 25, Cherri Mitchell, 36, of Montevideo was embroiled when the car she was driving apparently failed to yield to Wyler's car and the two collided.

**Bush OKs more college assistance**

ANNANDALE, Va. — President Bush Thursday signed legislation boosting college assistance to middle-income families who "skipped the vacation and drove the old clunkers so their kids could go to college."

The legislation extends the life of federal higher education programs and authorizes spending of \$115 billion over five years. The maximum Pell Grants will be raised to \$3,700, and income ceilings also will be raised for students seeking Pell Grants of up to \$2,400 a year. Students from families of four with an annual income up to \$42,000 a year would qualify for the grants where the previous income maximum was \$30,000.

**Funicello to promote MS awareness**

LOS ANGELES — Actress Annette Funicello, who recently disclosed she has multiple sclerosis, said Thursday she was eager to help bring attention to the degenerative disease.

"They want to make me national ambassador for multiple sclerosis and, oh yes, I'll do it," the former Mouseketeer and beach movie veteran said in a telephone interview from her San Fernando Valley home. "I want to do this. I want to help people. I'm already getting people to donate to MS." said Miss Funicello, 49. "I've read they are so close to finding a cure. Do you realize there are 200 new cases a week of MS? Isn't that astounding?"

Ms. Funicello's participation in promoting MS awareness was welcomed.

**Yugoslavia kills Saratoga port call**

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon announced Wednesday the aircraft carrier USS Saratoga has canceled a scheduled port call in Greece because of the "situation in the Balkans."

"U.S. military commanders felt it was the right thing to do to keep it at sea," Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams announced at a briefing for reporters. Williams said the warship had been scheduled to visit the port of Rhodes from July 28 to Aug. 3. Presently, the ship is in the central Mediterranean. Williams' statement about the Saratoga appeared amid criticism of the carrier's movements were in connection with rising tensions in Iraq.

**Disruptive gulf water begins to cool**

WASHINGTON — The temperature of a massive pool of unusually warm water in the Pacific Ocean is rapidly moving toward normal — and that could be good news for people from South Africa to Texas.

The easing of the extraordinary ocean warmth means that the so-called El Nino phenomenon that's been scrambling weather patterns in parts of the world is moving toward an end, according to the federal Climate Analysis Center.

Meteorologist Chester Ropelewski said Wednesday that ocean temperatures in crucial areas went from 2.8 degrees Celsius above normal in May to 1 degree above normal in June. The rapid change indicates that El Nino "is in its final stages," the Climate Analysis Center reported, announcing that it is discontinuing its regular scientific advisories on the matter.

**Gramm tabbed for GOP convention**

WASHINGTON — Sen. Phil Gramm will give the keynote address at the Republican National Convention in his home state of Texas next month, GOP sources said Thursday.

Gramm, a conservative stalwart who is considered one of the party's premier speakers, will deliver the keynote on the second night of the convention, Aug. 18, said the sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity. The convention to nominate President Bush in his adopted hometown of Houston will run from Aug. 17-20.

**Mosquito-borne virus alarms researcher**

WASHINGTON — A mosquito that arrived in this country from Asia in 1985 has been found to carry the eastern equine encephalitis virus known as sleeping sickness — and a researcher said Thursday the discovery is cause for concern.

The mosquito, *Aedes albopictus*, is "a very aggressive biter and feeds quite readily on man," said Carl J. Mitchell of the Centers for Disease Control's medical entomology branch.

The virus, which generally affects birds and young fresh water swamps, is spread from one animal to another by mosquitoes, only about 10 varieties of which are known to be able to carry the disease, Mitchell said.

**Space station receives tentative funding**

WASHINGTON — The House Appropriations Committee on Thursday allocated \$1.7 billion for NASA's space station, a planned \$30 billion-plus project it tried to kill last year.

The committee action doesn't, however, mean smooth sailing ahead for NASA's most controversial project.

Opponents are preparing to offer an amendment on the House floor next week to strip all funding for Space Station Freedom, leaving only \$400 million to shut down operations. A similar maneuver is planned in the Senate.

**Bush backs economic package**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration used its midyear economic review Thursday to make a detailed election-season appeal for a growth package already rejected by the Democratic-controlled Congress.

The review, presented by Budget Director Richard Darman and chief economic adviser Michael Boskin, also revised the administration's economic forecast, last updated in February. The administration now forecasts slightly better economic growth than before and a much smaller budget deficit.

In non-election years, the midyear review normally is a slim document of around 50 pages. But this year, the Office of Management and Budget cranked it up to 421 pages with details of economic proposals that for the most part were proposed and rejected months ago.

The administration again offered arguments for such measures as a reduced capital gains tax, a \$5,000 tax credit for first-time home buyers, enterprise zones for blighted inner cities and tax-deferred savings accounts.

"The Congress has failed to deliver," Darman said, "there is much posturing." But when it comes to constructive congressional action, on a scale of zero to 10, the total is closer to zero.

Boskin said adoption of the short-term economic stimulus package proposed by President Bush in January would have created 500,000 jobs this year alone.

Meanwhile, in a speech to corporate executives in Chicago, Treasury Secretary Nicholas F. Brady attacked lawmakers.

"They figure that if the boat leaks enough, maybe they'll get a new captain — so why fix the holes?" he said.

Democrats, meanwhile, criticized the new economic review. House Budget Committee Chairman Leon Panetta, D-Calif., called it "more of a political document than it is an accurate analysis of where the economy is going."

The review's economic forecast, however, is in line with the typical private economic forecast, except for the unemployment rate.

**July jobless claims hit high**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The number of Americans filing first-time claims for unemployment benefits rose sharply in early July, the government said Thursday, dampening hope for anything more than minimal improvement in the unemployment rate this month.

The Labor Department said initial jobless claims for the week ending July 11 hit 422,000, up from 403,000 the week before.

The 19,000 increase was bad news for President Bush, who faces re-election in less than four months.

It was the biggest rise since late February and the level of claims was the highest since the week ending May 2.

Economists had been expecting a smaller increase but cautioned against reading too much into weekly fluctuations in the claims number.

**Family discounts report that 'POW' photo is a fake**

WASHINGTON — By September 1990, Deborah Robertson Bardsley had abandoned any hope of ever again seeing her father, an Air Force pilot whose F-4 Phantom was shot down over North Vietnam in 1966.

On the 24th anniversary of his drowning, she walked away from a candlelight vigil in a California coastal town, convinced her father's fate would never be discerned.

Then Bardsley's younger sister obtained a startling photograph. The picture, passed to her by a man whose aunt had recently visited Cambodia, purported to show Bardsley's father, Col. John L. Robertson, and two other Vietnam-era officers still being held prisoner in Southeast Asia.

"It was a shock to look into his face," Bardsley said. "He had aged just like his own father."

The discovery of the photo set the two sisters on a yearlong odyssey, sending them on several trips to Vietnam and Cambodia in search of further clues about their father's whereabouts. It also prompted the Defense Department to try to determine whether the photo of the three men, one of whom was presumed dead, was authentic.

Earlier this month, the Pentagon announced its conclusion: The widely publicized photo, it said, was a hoax. Defense Department

officials are convinced the picture is a doctored reproduction of a 1923 photo of three Soviet farmers published in the December 1989 Khmer-language issue of a magazine called "Soviet Union Today."

"When you look at the pictures, there's very little doubt," said Capt. Susan Strednansky, a Defense Department spokeswoman. "We're satisfied they're the same pictures." Bardsley is not. She traveled to

Washington from Chhattisworth, Calif., to participate in a news conference Thursday with family members of the other two officers, Air Force Maj. Albro L. Lundy Jr. and Navy Lt. Larry James Stevens. The families of the three servicemen believe the Pentagon's research methods and conclusions are "unacceptable." Bardsley told about two dozen reporters gathered in a late-morning drizzle in front of the Pentagon. "We're not satisfied."

**Quayle's council runs into trouble**

WASHINGTON — Let no one say Dan Quayle is an empty suit in a powerless office.

In 1990, Quayle invited business executives to meet with the Vice President's Council on Competitiveness, a little-known group that rewrites the federal rulebook behind closed doors. "Now is your chance," he said. "Come and tell us what regulations and what rules are burdening the business sector."

Since then, the council has overturned federal regulations

governing everything from air pollution to airplane noise. It has blocked 59 provisions of the Clean Air Act, a law Quayle himself has called "the most significant environmental piece of legislation in decades."

It has knocked out provisions for recycling standards, fought to let polluting companies increase toxic emissions without public notice, scuttled acid-rain regulations and sought to keep millions of acres of wetlands from the protective clutches of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

And it has done this by holding private meetings, often with industry groups, where no public records are kept.

Now the council's red tape-cutting is becoming ensnared in the law.

This month, a federal judge in New York said the White House is violating the Clean Air Act by failing to put the law into effect. Last week, a federal appeals court in Washington blocked an order, imposed by the council, that would have allowed municipal incinerators to burn car batteries containing toxic lead.

**Garth Brooks fans tie up phone system**

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — A man dialing 911 for help after his wife suffered a heart attack could not get through because Garth Brooks fans calling for tickets overwhelmed the phone system, a company spokesman said.

Home Hardy said he isn't sure his wife would have been saved if he had been able to get through Saturday, "but she might have had a possibility."

Phyllis Joan Love Hardy, 67, had a seizure Saturday morning. Her husband, who is a doctor, tried to call 911 every half-minute or so, while also giving her cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

After a delay he estimated at about five minutes, Hardy finally got help dialing "911" and talking to an operator. But his wife died without ever regaining consciousness. "I wasted an awful lot of time when I could have called someone else."

Dennis Smiley, a spokesman for Southwestern Bell in Oklahoma, said the phone system simply wasn't able to handle the flood of calls by fans dialing for Brooks tickets.

More than 300,000 calls were made during a one-hour period, twice the previous record in Tulsa, Smiley said.

### Best judges of family values are families, not politicians

Tired of hearing about family values from the presidential candidates? Get used to it.

Between now and November, President Bush and Gov. Bill Clinton, the Democratic nominee, will each do his best to convince you that he's Dear Uncle Harry and that his opponent is a cavair-chomping, champagne-sipping elitist who cares more about his fast-lane friends about than the ordinary folks on Walnut Street.

And they'll do it by invoking family values.

It's a crude means of trying to tap the rising frustration of middle-class Americans under siege, and it's easily the phoniest phrase to turn up in a presidential campaign since 1960's mythical "missile gap."

For President Bush, family values is Willie Horton draped in respectability, but it's still designed to distinguish "us" — white, middle-class suburban and small-city voters that the Republicans are in danger of losing from everybody else.

For the Democrats, it's the cynical politics of resentment — a smokescreen designed to obscure the fact that Clinton has no real plan to cure the real causes of families' distress.

In truth, family values can mean

anything that anyone with an ax to grind wants it to mean: federally mandated job leave for new parents, or increased federal spending for college loans, or a ban on abortion.

And it completely misses the point. Times are tougher for families. They are squeezed by recession and buffeted by uncertainty and a sense that America isn't in control of its own destiny any more.

But neither Bush's rudderless, better-times-are-around-the-corner, won't-you-trust-me approach nor Clinton's prescription of treating the symptoms is going to make families one bit better off.

Families need a president who will balance the budget, get serious about controlling crime and drugs, work to make America competitive again and then get out of the way.

Americans need to make their own decisions about education, child care, abortion and other "family" issues. Given the chance, they'll make the right ones.

To put it bluntly, politicians who can't even deliver the basics — fiscal responsibility, safe streets, access to health care and schools that work — have no business telling Americans how to run their families.

Maybe it's time America's families said so.

## With Perot out, pros can breathe a sigh of relief

The can-do non-candidate is out of the race, back to can-doing with endeavors with which he is more comfortable. The professionals can relax. For now, their jobs look safe and their status assured.

They said he was a dictator, albeit a benevolent one, who they feared would come and, in his apt phrase, "clean out the barn" that passes itself off as modern-day American government.

They pronounced him guilty of naivete, not quite ready for the prime time, a bit on the simple side. He heaved the smooth edge and the sophisticated answer. He stood for but one thing: action.

He scared them.

Texas zillionaires might be able to throw their weight around in the business world, but they cannot be successful at presidential politics if they refuse to dress themselves in the wilderness required in modern campaigns.

His withdrawal confirmed to them that rough-edged outsiders would not stand a chance at running at high office.

Politics is the art of the possible, they say. It is a careful balancing and blending of economic and social interests that are written into law and added to appropriations bills. Bit by bit, year after year, these interests have created a mountain of law and spending.

By and large, this activity should be constructive for American citizens. Indeed, to many it is.

But not to all. Over the years, the demands on the federal budget created by this old-fashioned system of taking care of large constituencies have grown into a massive, unsustainable deficit.

This would be can-do government, too, but of a different kind. The art of the possible has become the art of self-destruction. All this spunky little outsider wanted to do is to take what had become possible over the past few decades, turn it upside down and give it a good hard shake.

He would turn around what so many professionals worked hard to achieve. He would have pushed a society desperately trying to avoid choices into making a few key taxing and spending decisions.

His economic program, on the verge of being announced before he decided to quit the race, would have stunned many of these special interests. Social Security, the most sacred of sacred cows, would have been cut with a ceiling on cost-of-living allowances. (There, presumably, went Florida.)

He would have slashed farm subsidies (there went the Midwest) and raised the federal gasoline tax by 50 cents a gallon (there went most of the West).

He would have put a ceiling on mortgage

interest, which would surely frighten every homeowner in every region of the country. He would have balanced the budget in five years.

This sounds radical, threatening. Neither George Bush nor Bill Clinton, who pass themselves off as "change agents," would have gone this far, and for good reason. In modern campaigns, the worst names you could call anyone are "tax raiser" and "Social Security cutter."

In truth, his program isn't so radical considering the economic threat to the nation. The Social Security cost-of-living allowance trims are modest for a program running amok. A gasoline tax increase is just what the economic doctor ordered for a country that wastes too much energy.

It was thought he was going to develop his program through a series of electronic town hall meetings, proposing only after listening to all the special-interest demands. To his credit, he did not wait.

But he dropped out before he could announce it, saying he could not win outright. Many of his followers shouted betrayal, and rightly so. Many political analysts give him great credit for having the fortitude to raise the budget deficit as a key campaign issue.

This is so much nonsense. Without him in the race, Bush and Clinton, and their hangers-on, will tend to marginalize the deficit again. Clinton would not cut it in half after five years, for example. Bush claims his plan would balance the budget, but only after assuming unsustainable economic growth.

Ross Perot, the superpatriot, has let his country down. He was the first candidate for president to sound the real alarm of the deficit and promise strong action.

The scary thing for the professionals was that his rhetoric attracted a huge following. Indeed, there was a real chance that his economic plan, once revealed, could have been more widely accepted than believed.

By inflicting a little bit of pain on everyone, it followed the true precepts of democracy: Share the sacrifice in order to save our children. For this idea, we have fought wars. It might have played very well with a frightened country.

This the professionals knew and appreciated.

They were tickled and relieved when Perot called it a bluff. Now, they are back in control, and it probably will take a crisis to resolve the budget problem.

The eagle has landed, a threat no more.

## Abortion emerges as new world war

The Supreme Court's decision to uphold the Federal Drug Administration's ban on RU486, the so-called abortion pill, is only another round in the protracted worldwide struggle over abortion. That women will prevail I no longer doubt. The question is how many female casualties will occur before the abortion wars have subsided.

Outside the United States, too, abortion has emerged as one of the most contentious and charged issues in national politics.

In Ireland, for example, the pubs buzz with debates over this fall's referendum on abortion. Some Irish supporters of integration with Europe voted against the Maastricht treaty solely because they feared that Europe would force Ireland to allow abortion. But with half the population under 30 years of age, there is a growing sentiment for liberalized abortion reform.

In Germany, where the East used to allow abortion on demand and the West prohibited it, the unified country compromised on an abortion law that pleases no one. In Hungary and Poland, campaigns to abolish abortion polarize former political allies and mold bizarre new coalitions.

In what was formerly Yugoslavia, Croats wage a public campaign to associate Serbian enemies with legal abortion. In Czechoslovakia, Slovakian nationalists play the abortion card to persuade the public to separate from the more liberal, Western-oriented Czechs.

Why have the abortion wars spread so widely? One obvious reason is that the collapse of communism permits many nations to debate what was suppressed for decades. But

the deeper explanation is that the abortion wars were everywhere amount to a referendum on the unprecedented and irreversible revolution that has severed women's sexuality from their reproductive capacity.

Many people mistakenly think that the sexual revolution was about liberalized sexual behavior. But changing sexual mores were the consequence of a much greater and historic transformation in women's lives.

Throughout most of history, women's traditional role has been yoked to ceaseless childbearing. The birth-control pill threw off the yoke.

The historic rupture between sexuality and reproduction is only three decades old. First birth control and then legalized abortion gave women — educated women in developed countries, that is — the choice to delay childbearing, to plan children or even to remain childless. For good or ill, women were released from relentless childbearing and allowed, for the first time in history, to imagine and shape their own destinies.

This is the real sexual revolution that has ignited political firestorms over abortion. At stake are the losses and gains women face as they shed centuries of burdens and protections for new opportunities fraught with dangers. With new sexual freedom, after all, comes new forms of sexual exploitation. With new economic independence, women lose the economic security formerly provided by their families or by men.

For many people, to be sure, opposition to

abortion is about the sanctity of life. But for many others, abortion is a symbolic debate over the loss of women's traditional role and the uncertainties and confusion society faces as a result.

In the United States, there is a growing passion to protect women's choice; young women who grew up believing that they had all the rights they needed, thank you, have discovered that Roe vs. Wade was merely a truce — not the end of the struggle. Recognizing this change, the Democrats have practically adopted "pro-choice" as their campaign mantra.

George Bush is checkmated on this controversy. When the Democrats put the Freedom of Choice Act — legislation that would make abortion legal — on his desk in the fall, Bush will veto it. The political fallout may boost Bill Clinton's presidential campaign more than anything else the Democratic candidate says or does between now and November.

As developing nations industrialize and improve their standards of living, the abortion wars will spread even further. Millions of women, leaving behind a traditional agricultural life and entering the paid labor force, will seek ways to limit the number of children they bear. British and French women may take RU486 when they need to terminate a pregnancy, but for most of the world, the abortion wars have just begun.

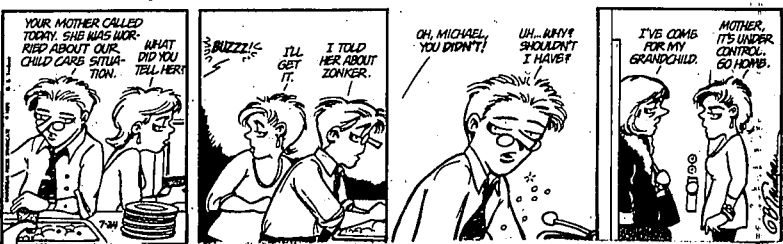

### Firefighters battle blazes sparked by lightning storm

**TWIN FALLS** — The lightning storm that moved through southern Idaho Wednesday evening kept firefighters jumping overnight.

Forest Service crews brought the 130-acre Big Creek fire under control about 6 p.m. Thursday. About 45 firefighters, one helicopter and four engines fought the blaze about 35 miles southeast of Twin Falls, said Ed Waldpate, spokesman for the Sawtooth National Forest.

A five-acre fire near Strevel on the Utah-Idaho border was brought under control at 9 a.m. Thursday, he said.

The lightning also sparked three small fires in the Sawtooth Wilderness. They all are small encompassing only a few trees each.

About three weeks ago the Forest Service decided to fight all wilderness fires because of the dry conditions, Waldpate said.

The Burley office of the Bureau of Land Management reports several fires in the south east corner of the state — also sparked by the lightning. The biggest was about 25 to 30 acres.

Six smaller fires were put out overnight, according to the BLM.

### Twin Falls County stops accepting tires at landfill

**TWIN FALLS** — As of Aug. 1 the Twin Falls County landfills will no longer take old tires for burial.

The landfills will, however, stockpile tires for recyclers to haul away, according to a news release from county Solid Waste Director Darrell Heider.

Residents who take their tires to the landfills for stockpiling will pay the following charges:

- \$1.25 for unmounted passenger tires, \$2.50 for mounted tires.
- \$3.50 for unmounted truck tires. Mounted truck tires will not be accepted.
- Tractor and large industrial tires will not be accepted.

## Twin Falls crime rate continues upward

**TWIN FALLS** — The crime rate in Twin Falls continued its steady climb last year, with every category except arson and burglary showing an increase over 1990.

Twin Falls police chief Paul Du Fresne said Thursday he is not surprised by the numbers in the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement's annual report.

"Crime is a function of growth," Du Fresne said. "Along with the positive aspects, you have to expect the negative consequences of growth."

The city's crime rate — the number of crimes per 100,000 people — increased slightly more than 3 percent last year to 7.821.

That's higher than Idaho's three biggest cities: Boise (5.599), Pocatello (5.173) and Idaho Falls (6.205).

### Hailey police arrest resident suspected in rash of burglaries

**HAILEY** — A Hailey man has been arrested in connection with a string of vehicular and residential burglaries that has made residents lock their doors and cast a watchful eye.

Norman K. Miller, 21, of Hailey, was arrested late Wednesday afternoon and booked into the Blaine County Jail.

Miller remained in jail after his arraignment Thursday in which bond was set for \$20,000.

Miller had been found guilty recently for the burglary of The Animal Center in Ketchum in which iguanas and snakes were stolen. An Aug. 17 sentencing date was set for that offense.

"The juvenile justice system doesn't ensure that consequences attach to young people and their crime," he said.

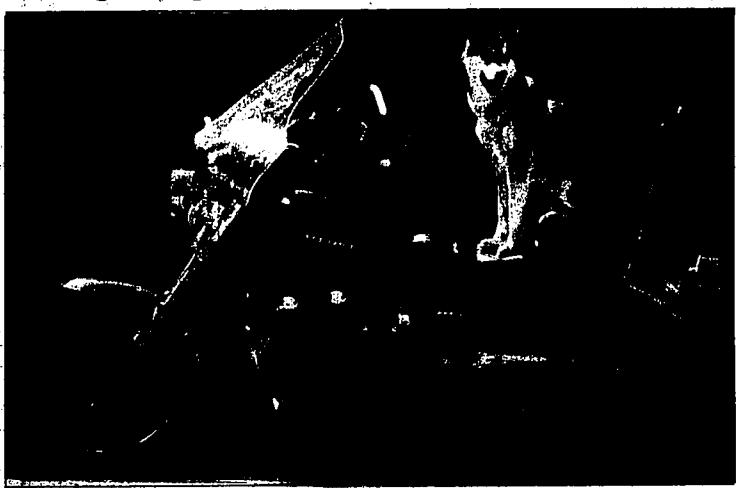
The police chief said he was most surprised at the rising numbers of robberies and aggravated assaults.

## Governor seeks help for salmon

**SUN VALLEY** — Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus is trying to enlist members of the national Association of Conservation Information in his battle to restore Northwest salmon runs through drastic management changes of Columbia River Basin dams.

During a speech to the group meeting in Sun Valley on Thursday, Andrus said that once wildlife advocates in Congress like House Energy Chairman John Dingell, D-Mich., and Interior Chairman George Miller, D-Calif., understand the viability of the Idaho plan they will reject the objections of the federal agencies and their clients who want to maintain the status quo.

"Common-sense conservationists will concede, as I have, that the fight to save the salmon has national significance," Andrus said. "It is our challenge to increase the attention to this profound regional issue on the national scale."

The National Marine Fisheries Service declared the Snake River sockeye salmon endangered a year ago after the spring spawning and migration of chinook salmon threatened this year. A strategy to bring the dwindling runs back so the designations can be withdrawn is now being debated.

The Idaho plan calling for a two-month drawdown of the reservoirs behind the four dams on the lower Snake River in eastern Washington and modification of fall dams to facilitate fish passage when reservoirs are not completely full has drawn repeated attacks from downstream interests who would be significantly affected.

Andrus has pledged to stand with these interests in demanding federal money to help offset the losses they would suffer during the drawdowns.

The governor maintained the battle over the salmon would prove the worth of the Endangered Species Act at a time when many are pressing for changes. He said it gives states a voice — but not the veto — over the listing of species.

"The most effective path to species protection is at the fringe of an issue — it's in the middle," Andrus said. "There are important battles that have to be made on every range and wildlife issue."

## Officials ponder raises for workers in Twin Falls

**TWIN FALLS** — City Council members cannot yet tell city workers how large a salary raise they might get this year.

The council, met with city employees Thursday morning to talk about raises, health insurance and other matters. After the meeting, Mayor Howard Allen said the council needs more information to figure out raises.

"We don't know what the compensation increase will be. ... I think there probably will be an increase," Allen said.

The council is preparing the city budget for the upcoming fiscal year and part of that budget must be allocated for worker pay. But until the council knows where the property tax levy will be set, the raises won't be known.

Allen said the council hopes to have some firmer figures by Aug. 7.

Raises weren't the only topic at the meeting.

The city faces an estimated 35 percent increase in its health insurance premiums, with Blue Cross this year because of a few serious illnesses among workers.

This leaves some hard choices on how to pay for health insurance. Workers could be asked to pay more into the plan, or perhaps deductibles could be increased, Allen said.

The city employs approximately 172 full- and part-time workers.

## EPA schedules more tests at Triumph, including feeding pigs mine tailings

**HAILEY** — Another round of tests is scheduled at Triumph, where five families and 15 people live near piles of tailings left behind after a mine closed 35 years ago.

Besides blood and urine tests scheduled July 29-30 by the federal Environmental Protection Agency, pigs will be used in research to determine if there's a potential health problem from tailings from the old Triumph Mine.

The tests will seek to determine residents' exposure to lead and arsenic. Similar tests in November showed people had low levels of the chemicals, and some residents claim contaminants in the mine tailings are in a form not easily absorbed by humans.

To test the "bioavailability" of chemicals in the tailings, they will be fed to pigs by

Michigan State University researchers. That will help determine if the elements can easily be absorbed by humans.

Raleigh Farlow, EPA risk assessment official, told area residents at a Ketchum meeting last week that the gastrointestinal tract of pigs is similar to that of humans, especially in fetuses and small children.

Some residents say they wish the EPA would end its studies and leave them alone. EPA has been looking at the site for possible inclusion on the Superfund list of contaminated sites that must be cleaned up.

Ed Nigbor, in 1987 chief of the Blaine County planning department, said he asked EPA to look at the site because he was concerned about wetlands next to some of the pileings.

The EPA said Nigbor warned of potential leaching of lead, zinc and copper from the tailings into the aquifer of the Big

Wood River's East Fork, about 500 feet southeast.

Past tests of well water in the area found it met federal and state primary drinking water standards, although there was some discollocation.

Officials said the results from an evaluation of the site last year could be released in August or September, but one EPA Superfund official said the chances are 50 percent or better that the site would qualify for the Superfund list.

An EPA contractor has calculated the cost of cleanup at \$606 million, the expense of hauling and disposing of 2.7 million tons of material at the site.

The Triumph Mine stopped operations in 1957 after 75 years of intermittent production of lead, zinc and silver. Pileings from those operations cover 27 acres in heaps up to 15 feet high.

## North Side water hits on-off schedule

**JEROME** — North Side Canal Co. water users will have water on-again and off-again for the rest of the season.

The canal company board of directors decided Monday to take stronger measures to conserve water in the wake of a continuing Magic Valley area drought.

Officials ruled that irrigation water would be turned off Aug. 31 for one

week, then turned on again. The water would be shut off again about mid-September.

At that time, water officials would study water availability and decide whether to turn the water back on again Oct. 1, according to company manager Ted Diehl.

The first segregation in the Eden and Hazelton area will receive water on a 100 percent delivery plan.

Second and third segregations from the Malad River to the King Hill area can

expect to receive about a 70 percent water delivery rate.

Water is being brought down river from the Jackson Lake area, Diehl said. Palisades and American Falls reservoirs are not completely dry.

The cooperation of water users in conserving water throughout the year has made it possible to continue to irrigate, Diehl said.

Farmers should consider not planting winter wheat or alfalfa this fall, and fertilizing next spring instead of this fall.

## Wendell trustees OK attendance policy

**WENDELL** — School board members approved the 90 percent attendance policy proposed by new Wendell High School Principal Roy Parton.

Parton said his philosophy was that students should be present in class, and that frequent absences disrupt the learning process.

The school is adopting its own policy since the state has discontinued its 90 percent attendance requirement.

Superintendent Larry Manly said some

students thought the 90 percent rule meant they had 10 percent time off. The new policy, he said, means students have to be in school every day unless they are excused.

"They are either excused, or it is a truancy," Manly said.

An excused absence must be approved by the students' parents or guardians within two days, Parton said. Activity absences for school-sponsored programs are limited to five per semester. Makeup for classwork, homework and exams can be done within a limited time. "A truancy is a major disciplinary violation, and parents or guardians will be notified," Parton said.

Students who are truant and fail to maintain a passing grade will be put on probation. If they fail to meet probation rules, they will lose credit for classes, Parton said.

Parton said he requires regular and punctual attendance because it makes students become better employees later in life. It also builds self-esteem, contributes to student safety, and has educational benefits, he said.

- Board members selected Joseph Hendrickson to be the new high school principal for the coming school year. The high school will have three new teachers, Ed Richards, science; Arthur Biecler, social studies; and Steven Hines, vocation.
- Two new teachers were hired for the Hollister school, Sandra Hall and

Board members also accepted the resignations of three teachers and denied a request for a leave of absence from the wrestling coach, Todd Bowman.

# Crime takes jump in Buhl, Filer too

**TWIN FALLS** — Towns in Twin Falls County's West End are following their larger neighbor in reporting rising crime numbers for 1991.

The Buhl Police Department reported 206 major crimes in the city last year, an increase of more than 15 percent over 1990.

The numbers went up nearly 45 percent in Filer, with 58 crimes reported there last year.

Those statistics, released this week by the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, mirror a general increase in the Twin Falls County crime rate.

Property crimes — burglary and larceny — led the increase in the county, which saw the number of crimes per 100,000 residents rise more than 6 percent.

Burglaries in Buhl were down slightly, from 31 in 1990 to 28 a

year later. They more than doubled in Filer, however, from 10 to 26.

Larceny and auto theft increased in both cities.

The city of Twin Falls accounts for 80 percent of the serious crimes in the county, Twin Falls police chief Paul D. Fresno said. He added that the city employs 58 percent of the law enforcement officers working in the county.

There were 11 rapes reported in Twin Falls County last year; nine were in the city of Twin Falls. There were only eight aggravated assault cases in the county that did not originate in the city.

The pressure on county deputies responding to crimes is likely to increase, Du Fresno said, as the city of Twin Falls continues to expand and neighboring residential areas grow.

# Officials point to arson in field fire by Jerome

**JEROME** — Arson is suspected in a fire that destroyed a ripe wheat field and burned grass in an area north of Jerome.

The fire burned about 23 acres of wheat owned by Ed Chojnacki and about four acres of dry grass on a development area owned by John Henderson, according to Larry Stulberg, rural fire department chief. The two fields were not adjacent to each other.

A fence was also damaged and a wheel-line sprinkler system, valued at \$5,000 destroyed.

The wheat field, valued at \$10,000, was scheduled to be harvested this week, Chojnacki said. "We were working one and one-half miles from the wheat field and when we saw the smoke, we hoped it wasn't ours and kind of wrote it off, because it just couldn't be that our wheat would be burned just when we were ready to harvest it," he said.

The fire is listed as suspicious and is under investigation, Stulberg said. A \$500 reward has been offered for any person offering evidence that leads to the conviction of the person or persons starting the fires.

# Utah spill prompts evacuation

**OREM, Utah (AP)** — Hundreds of people were evacuated from an industrial area Thursday after about 20 gallons of toxic substances spilled at a chemical company.

Orem Police Detective Gerald Nielsen said 400 to 500 people were told to leave businesses in the area of Parish Chemical after the spill was reported at about 3 p.m.

People in the area reported having difficulty breathing, burning eyes, numbness around the mouth and nausea.

A handful of people inside the building and five people who were driving by were treated at a local hospital, Nielsen said. He said he does not know how the spill occurred.

"I have no idea if it was a spill or a drop," he said.

An Orem police officer who was the first on the scene required oxygen even though he was wearing a full chemical protection suit, he said.

He identified the chemicals as trimethyl phosphite, methylchloroacetate and trimethylphosphonacetate.

Nielsen did not know what the chemicals were used for, but he said they became highly flammable and toxic when combined.

Nielsen said Parish Chemical is a major chemical company that makes chemicals for insecticides and pharmaceutical companies,

# Jerome takes in more property

**JEROME** — The Jerome City Council approved expanding the city boundaries by annexing 19.7 acres adjacent to the high school.

The property is owned by an LDS church and will be used primarily for the location of a seminary on a 150-foot strip of land. No opposition to the annexation was heard during a public hearing.

One county resident, Glenn Ellwell, asked in a letter that the council deny the annexation request to "maintain the admirable character of East Main Street."

Ellwell said that he did not wish development of the area to include a commercial mall. Development of the downtown would be far more advantageous, Ellwell said.

The acreage could also be used for residences and has yet to be zoned by the Jerome Planning and Zoning Commission.

In granting annexation approval, the council accepted Councilman Rocky Jackson's proposal to require easement provisions to extend East

8th Street if homes are built on the property.

A new bus system in the city was proposed by Jim Vining, director of Trans IV Buses. Vining said a used bus was available that had a lift for wheelchairs and was accessible for senior citizens and handicapped people. Federal taxes would pay for a new bus next year, he said.

The city would hire a driver and insure the vehicle, Vining said.

"We'd like the city to have jurisdiction over the vehicle and driver," he said. This arrangement would require joint ownership of the vehicle.

An 800 number would be available for dispatch of the bus that would service the entire county and make daily trips to Twin Falls.

The bus would replace the Senior Citizen van that had discontinued services, Vining said.

Council members decided to confer with the city attorney before making a decision.

A request to change the job title of Paula Thompson, an employee in the city clerk's office, to assistant clerk, and give Thompson a salary increase

to \$1,450 per month was withdrawn after discussing the request in executive session.

A decision on a retirement settlement for Raymond Bartlett, water department superintendent who was injured on the job, was delayed pending "further research," Mayor Gerald Oster said.

The promotion of Robert Culver to the superintendent position was also delayed pending completion of Bartlett's retirement settlement, Oster said.

The council approved promoting Grant Robbins to water department lead worker at \$1,555 per month.

In other business, the council:

- Approved a request from the Jerome Police Department reserve force to hold a street dance at the fairgrounds on Aug. 7. Proceeds from the dance will be used to purchase equipment for the reserve officers.
- Approved filing liens against property owners who had not paid irrigation assessments. Liens totaling \$10,881 for 1991 delinquent payments and \$7,348 for 1992 will be filed.

1990 to 74 last year, but those numbers are still far below the 1988 high of 263.

"The increasing number of violent crimes could be at least partly the result of bicyclic criminals accompanying the general influx of new people into the city, he said.

That same phenomenon could be responsible for the most positive note in the report: burglaries were down for the second year in a row.

As people from more crime-ridden areas move into Twin Falls, they bring with them an awareness of the need to lock their doors and take other security measures, Du Fresno said.

Every day, thousands of potential crime victims drive into Twin Falls to work and shop, then leave again. Those people benefit from the city's services, such as police protection, but they don't pay the property taxes to pay for those services.

The city's 2-year-old Accident Reduction Team has helped allow patrol officers concentrate on other areas, Du Fresno said.

The department will add one new officer next year, but he expects any significant increases in manpower to be further down the road.

Police protection, like all city services, must respond to growth immediately, even before that growth

begins to translate into more dollars for city government, he said.

When that growth curve catches up, the city may be able to expand its police department.

Last year saw Twin Falls' first murder since 1988, the still-unsolved shooting of 27-year-old Edward Alward outside the Pear Haus tavern in November. The death of 2-year-old Amanda Hosteler in January is the city's only homicide so far this year.

Among the Idaho cities that Du Fresno uses for comparison, Twin Falls ranks somewhere in the middle.

The 7,821 crimes per 100,000 figure in Twin Falls compares favorably to Coeur d'Alene's rate of 9,125 or Nampa's rate of 9,244.

But Lewiston, at 4,196, and Cassia County at 5,943 have much lower crime rates than Twin Falls.

"These guys are opportunists," said Hailey police officer Jeff Guter.

Common items stolen include money, checkbooks, glasses, radar detectors, stereos, bicycles and binoculars.

The department may end up making more arrests. Juveniles are suspected to be involved and the investigation is continuing, Stoneback said.

Other recent burglaries involved the theft of \$30 from the Growing Concern hair salon and broken windows at the Hitchcock grocery.

Ketchum had its own form of theft Monday night when 10 cars were burglarized.

Ketchum police authorities are investigating the possibility those crimes are related to the Hailey burglaries.

"There's a lot of petty thievery going on, and a lot of it could have been prevented if we'd lock our cars and our homes," Stoneback said.

The Hailey Police Department has always had a high rate of vehicular burglaries since July 1. There have been 28 arrests for everything from battery to drunk driving to burglary during this three-week period.

This follows an alarming trend in police activities, Stoneback said. In 1990 and 1991 all police activities increased 95 percent over 1989 statistics, with arrests rising an alarming 247 percent.

So far this year, the department is making 20 to 30 percent more arrests and conducting crime-related activity than last year, Stoneback said.

There have been no reports of thefts in Bellevue this month.

**Residents begin cleaning up after storm**

RUPERT — Local residents started removing trees, repairing power lines and replacing roofs Thursday following the previous day's storm that spawned a tornado.

The National Weather Service in Boise confirmed that it was indeed a tornado Wednesday that ripped the roof off a Burley area auto salvage business and uprooted 17 large trees at the Rupert Cemetery, located about 3-1/2 miles north of town.

No injuries were reported in either Minidoka or Cassia counties.

The force of the storm rolled an irrigation wheel line measuring several hundred feet long from a nearby field into the line of trees at the south end of the cemetery.

The impact of the wheel line with the trees caused portions of the pipe to wrap around some of the trees.

Herman Bott, the cemetery's sexton, said the storm left plenty of cleaning up to do.

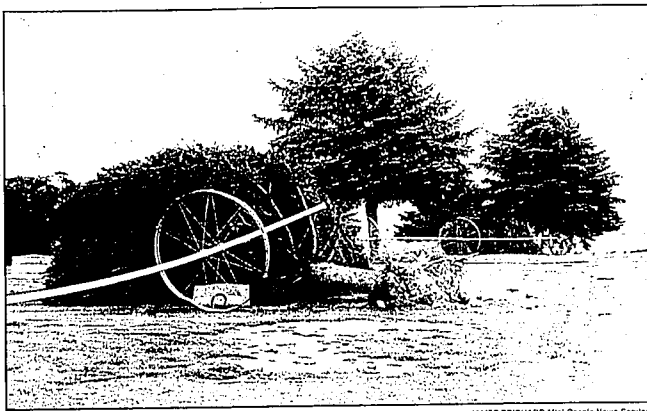
"It caused a mess," he said.

Workers were busy Thursday sawing the toppled trees into pieces and hauling them away. Bott said he was hurrying to get the trees out of cemetery roadways in time for the next funeral.

The twister first touched down at about 5:40 p.m., according to Val Cunningham, a meteorological technician with the Weather Service. Cunningham said reports of the tornado being one- to two-mile wide were probably accurate.

The tornado apparently moved in a northeasterly direction beginning west of Burley and ending north of Rupert.

Trees were uprooted throughout Rupert, including two massive trees that fell onto a parked car in the

driveaway of the Ted and Elaine Henscheid home, 1003 First St. The trees missed hitting the house by only a few feet.

The Minidoka County Sheriff's Department reported that a carport was blown off of a South Sixth Street residence, and that power lines were downed along North Meridian Road.

In Cassia County, the sheriff's office reported that two trees were uprooted in Burley, one of which fell onto a parked vehicle in the west side of town.

Don Brown, owner of Auto Wrex

Plus west of Burley, said there wasn't much warning before the tornado apparently touched down near his business.

He said the front door began swinging open, and he went to close it.

"All I could see was solid dirt," Brown said.

In a matter of 10 to 15 seconds, he said he felt the metal roof of his business tear away. A large shed belonging to a trucking company about 500 feet from Auto Wrex Plus also had about a third of its roof blown off.

A customer happened to be outside at the time of the storm. A post near the business broke off in the wind and almost hit her, but struck her car instead, said Brown.

Brown said his roof, which measured about 60 feet by 30 feet, landed in a crumpled heap about 250 feet away from the building. It will cost about \$15,000 to replace, he estimated.

The heavy winds subsided after about two minutes, Brown added. Employees of a nearby radio station told him they hadn't experienced the high winds, he said.

**Friends press drive for Burley man's operation**

BURLEY — The movement to fund a lung transplant for Ed Burgess continues, but for those trying to help the real estate agent get his life-saving operation, time is one commodity that is in short supply.

Earlier this month, volunteers used their lunch hours to stuff envelopes that would be mailed to every Realtor in Idaho, seeking donations toward a costly lung transplant that, if successful, would save the life of one of their own.

Since then, Burgess' insurance company sent him a letter of commitment, promising to spend up to \$100,000 toward his transplant.

As of Thursday, the letters — along with some local donations — have generated another \$20,432.

But the operation will cost an estimated \$290,000, leaving a difference of about \$170,000 the

group still must make up.

Thursday, Burgess' wife, Crystal, and about 30 of his friends and associates hit the telephones, soliciting donations from local business owners who have worked with him in the past. The volunteers are hoping for a miracle.

Still, Denise Wright, executive officer of the Burley-Rupert Board of Realtors, says she is hopeful that the money will be collected in time to give Burgess a new lease on life. The response, so far, has been overwhelming.

"Real estate people throughout the state of Idaho have been excellent," Wright says.

Most notable were contributions from Realtor boards in Twin Falls, Pocatello, Idaho Falls, Couer

d'Alene and Ada County. Those boards each donated between \$1,000 and \$2,000, not including donations from individual Realtors.

Burgess, owner of Agri-West Realty in Burley, needs a lung transplant because his own lungs have deteriorated to the point where they are useless. He injured his lungs in a farming accident several years ago, Wright says, but only recently have they started failing him.

The same accident cost Burgess an eye, and in Salt Lake City Tuesday, surgeons removed his optic prosthesis and covered his socket with a portion of his palate. The operation was necessary to prevent a possible infection, she says, in case the delicate transplant is soon performed.

Burgess returned home from the hospital Thursday.

"Ed's not doing well," Wright says. "He needs us now."

The Burgess have sold many of their own possessions to cover

the ever-increasing medical bills, she adds.

"They had some money, but they liquidated everything they had, except the roof over their heads," she said.

So far, donations have been placed into a special account at the D.L. Evans Bank, Wright says.

Every dollar donated, Wright says, will be spent only on the transplant itself, not on other medical costs.

Wright, who like dozens of others, has donated many hours of her own time to help the Burgessses, says she is not a particularly close friend of the family.

She has been motivated by the compassion others have shown towards the ailing Burley man.

"I've never seen a group of people like this," she says. "They are willing to do anything. For me, that is probably the best thing that could come out of all of this, except for saving Ed's life."

**Rupert officials hope to meet commissioners**

RUPERT — After a property valuation controversy arose some months ago, the Rupert City Council wants to ensure the city is perceived as a financially friendly town to other potential newcomers.

On Tuesday, the council agreed to set up a committee made up of City Attorney Rick Bollar, Mayor W.F. "Bill" Whittem, and council members Dwinelle Allred and Steve Porch to work with Minidoka County commissioners to help make the city more attractive to new businesses.

The formation of the committees comes in the wake of a decision by the county assessor's office to levy property taxes on the new Fresh Line, a Rupert car wash and oil change business, at a property valuation its owners complained was excessive.

Allred said a meeting with county commissioners might help avoid future valuation problems and provide new businesses more incentive to locate within Rupert and Minidoka County.

The council plans to schedule a meeting with commissioners soon.

In other business, the council will start cracking down on residents who conduct garage or yard sales more frequently than the one time each year such sales are permissible under city ordinance.

Porch said he is aware of one such violation, who recently advertised new jewelry for sale at his garage sale.

**Man captured in Utah receives life**

WOODSTOCK, Ill. (AP) — Richard Church, who eluded police for more than three years after killing his former girlfriend's parents, pleaded guilty Thursday to murder and was sentenced to life in prison.

Church's capture in Salt Lake City in November ended a flight that crisscrossed the western United

States. Under an agreement with prosecutors, Church, 23, pleaded guilty to two counts each of first-degree murder and attempted murder and one of home invasion. McHenry County Circuit Court Judge Henry Cowlin sentenced him to life in prison without parole.

By reversing the innocent pleas he

entered last December, Church avoided a possible death sentence had he been found guilty by a jury.

"I believe that the majority, at least that of the victims and family members, agree with us that is the appropriate disposition of his case," McHenry County State's Attorney Thomas Baker said.

**Hazelton's Baisch spends life helping others**

HAZELTON — A short verse ran under each of the yearbook pictures of the Kimberly High School graduating class of 1919.

Although Ralph Baisch isn't quite sure exactly what his verse said or where that yearbook of long ago is stashed, he remembers the heart of it. At 91, Baisch paraphrases the little verse, saying it said he could be a friend to everyone, and everyone was a friend to him.

That saying eventually became a way of life — a tenant for living and treating others — for the longtime Hazelton resident.

Today, Baisch is the oldest living male graduate of the high school — one female of the era still survives — and says he is still keeping with that 73-year-old philosophy of treating others fairly. "If I find something I like, I stick with it; if I'm satisfied I don't change," he said.

All his life Baisch has worked to help others, lending them things they needed, keeping them comfortable and avoiding arguments in his nearly seven-decade-old marriage.

Take Boyd Hagan, Baisch's friend for more than 40 years.

Hagan said that at Baisch's insistence years ago, he rented the Hazelton's man's ground and machinery — a generous offer, which allowed Hagan to break into farming.

"He's a fine person, broadminded and fair," Hagan said. "He's got the welfare of the community in mind."

Baisch has always tried to stay involved in helping others through volunteer work.

The Hazelton man spent 36 years as the chairman for the Hillsdale Highway District and six years on the Hazelton School District Board.

Baisch says listening to others is the secret of his success to pleasing others. "I've never had an enemy since I've lived here. I've never been put

off a board because I always took care of my business and looked after the people under me."

Baisch has applied his listening rule in his 69-year marriage to the former Kaitlyn Dougherty, as well.

"We both know how to get along," he said. "It's got to be give and take (but) there's enough arguments to keep life interesting."

Since their marriage in 1923, Baisch says he's kept quiet and listened when his wife "gets peeved" — a technique that has kept them together through the Depression and tough farming years.

Baisch's says his natural tendency to be a friend to all could at times make him especially inventive.

Baisch used to take children to school in a rounded canvas-topped wagon that looked like a sheep wagon.

Baisch would put a heated rock in the wagon to keep the children warmer.

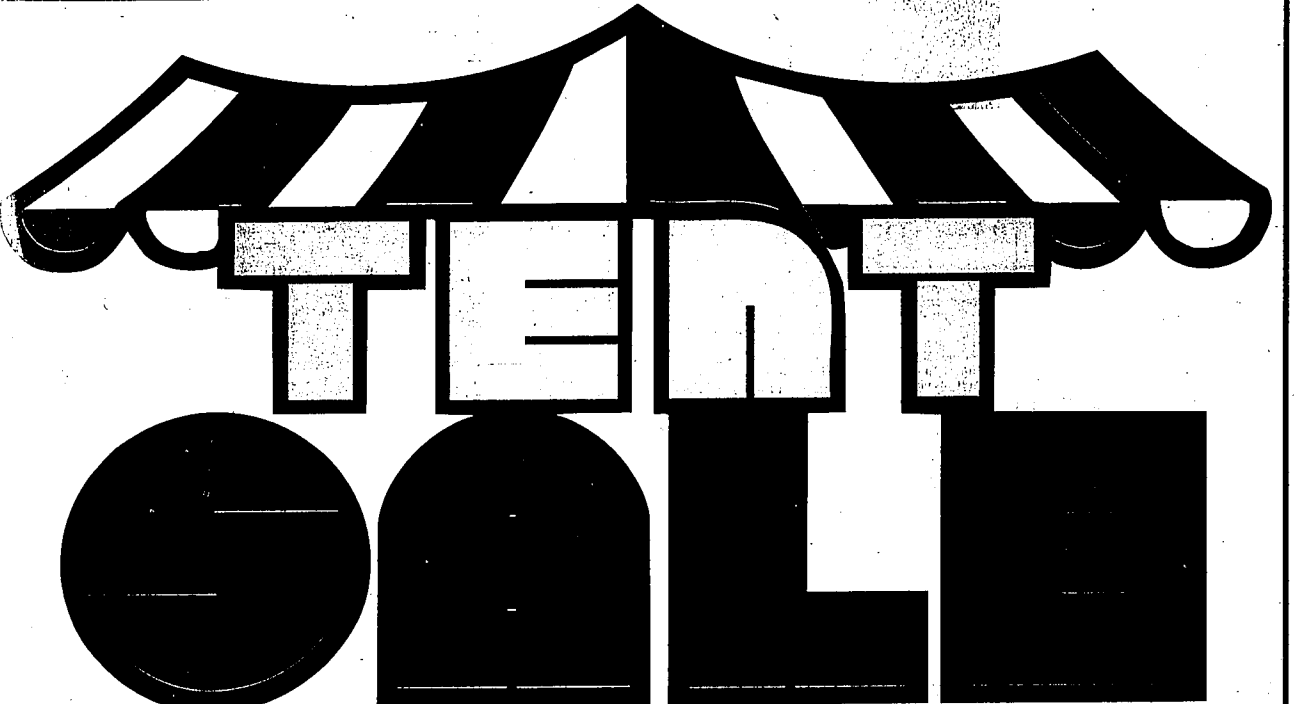

"The founding charter members who established the Guild were fine artists or lovers of fine art," said Ciele, who is, herself, a member of the Art Guild of Magic Valley, "and I am thrilled that we are going back to the standards that were established when we set out." She added, "Crafts can be beautiful, but there are already so many craft shows."

In a nutshell, that's the opinion of those who made the decision to return the 1992 show to its roots. Art in the Park was, in fact, a fine arts show when it originated in 1959. Crafts were added five years ago.

Braced for criticism, Art in the Park chairman Joyce De Ford says she hasn't gotten many protest calls. "The crafters made a lot of money at our show," De Ford said, "but we have only received two complaints from them."

Meanwhile, Ciele is working hard to

finish up several crates of paintings. It's a large order.

"I'm so far behind," she said, perched in front of the easel in her small studio on Kimberly Road. She retired from teaching drama and music in the California public schools more than 15 years ago to teach private art classes in Twin Falls.

Working with Jim and Mary Beikman, who own The Homestead, Ciele built up to a clientele of 87 students in the late 1970s. Eventually, she decided to put aside the classwork and paint full time.

"Painting is not a 9 to 5 job," Ciele said. "When you're inspired, you need to be able to go on, even at two o'clock in the morning." At the risk of sounding sexist, Ciele explained, she firmly believes this is easier for men than women.

"A man can get lost in his studio for three or four hours with someone to make his sandwiches and do his laundry," Ciele said. "A woman who wants to do that must choose not to marry, or she must wait until her children are on their own."

Ciele, now 56, chose to wait. She met her husband at college in Utah. She raised two daughters and is now the

grandmother of three. But Ciele's love of art was born long before any of that.

"I started drawing on church bulletins when I was little," Ciele said, "and I won an art contest in sixth grade and was awarded free art lessons at the city gallery."

As a teen, Ciele decorated the windows of her church youth department with Bon Ami, water and food color. She was "poor as a church mouse," she said, but a member of the congregation named Miss Baldwin took pity on her and presented her with her first set of oil paints. Ciele's love affair with oils was launched.

Ciele credits her father's passion for nature with giving her the inspiration to paint wildlife. These days, she paints on location near Hagerman or along the Snake River Canyon. She has taken first place and best of show at the French Art Colony in Ohio and, in 1990, she went home from the Twin Falls County Fair with the purchase award.

In addition to the painting now hanging in the fair board office, Ciele has a painting hanging in the office of Rep. Richard Stallings. She has sold her

**TWIN FALLS** — A group that began "with a few leotards and some high hopes" nine years ago is now recognized internationally as well as nationally.

And that group, The Chi-Town Jazz Dance Co. from Chicago is not only in Twin Falls for a concert Friday night, but also as the instructors at the College of Southern Idaho two-week dance camp.

The group of eight dancers was founded by Merbeth Kisner, who is a talented and experienced dancer herself.

Before starting the Chi-Town dance company Kisner performed in the Harkness Ballet, The Royal Winnipeg Ballet and in the Broadway production of "Chicago."

She also worked as the assistant director and principle dancer for the Gus Giordano Jazz Dance Co. in Chicago.

After leaving the Giordano company, Kisner decided she wanted to retire.

"But I couldn't do it," she said. "My whole life's been involved with dance. It's my love affair with dance."

Kisner continued to teach dance in Chicago until she founded the Chi-Town Jazz Dance Co. in 1983.

Kisner began the company with six dancers and has now expanded to eight. The dancers range in age from 22-40 and from all areas of the United States as well as Germany.

Chi-Town dancer Joerg Chabowski grew up in southern Germany and began studying jazz and ballet at the age of 21.

In 1989, Chabowski was offered a scholarship to study dance in Chicago with the Gus Giordano Jazz Dance Co.

Chabowski spent two summers studying with the Giordano company before being offered a chance to work with the Chi-Town company and Kisner.

"Jazz in Europe is very single-sided; there is a lot more variety here," he said.

Chabowski said his experiences in the United States and with the Chi-Town company have given him more

Within six months Kisner offered Langenfeld a chance to work with the Chi-Town Co. where she has been for the past two years.

The other Chi-Town dancers include: Julie Cartier, Anne Denner-Wayne, Sharon Freedman-Moore, Paul Cipponeri, Mike La

Gatta and Joe Killelea.

Kisner admitted the performance world of the Chi-Town dancers entails a lot of work.

Besides the 20 weeks a year spent traveling around the world, the Chi-Town dancers also hold 10 concerts in Chicago, and work as instructors in Kisner's two studios in Chicago.

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# Dick Van Dyke criticizes TV's emphasis on numbers

LOS ANGELES — With his plentiful white hair, thick white mustache and deep tan, Dick Van Dyke looks like a distinguished corporate boss. No wonder the folks at cable's Nickelodeon network cast him as "chairman of Nick at Nite."

Of course, it's mainly a publicity man's role. He stars in TV commercials to boost Nick at Nite's stable of reruns, which includes his classic '60s series at 7:30 weeknights. His face also adorns Nick at Nite print ads to "Preserve Our Television Heritage."

But this public relations stunt offers a reassuring illusion: The man who was Rob Petrie, good-guy television writer, lands at the top of a network.

If only more TV executives

thought like Van Dyke. He complains that TV bigwigs are looking at numbers and demographics too much these days.

"They're forgetting that the good shows were good because they were written and produced by creative people who were not concerned with the audience," Van Dyke said.

"They did what they thought was good. The businessmen running the networks have their heads down, looking at the figures, and that is all."

Van Dyke appeared before television critics, meeting here on their summer tour, to announce Nickelodeon's acquisition of classic MTM series like "The Mary Tyler Moore Show," "The Bob Newhart Show," "Hill Street Blues" and "St. Elsewhere."

"Mary Tyler Moore," featuring Van Dyke's former co-star, will join

the network first, in September. The other series will be introduced over the next few years and run on Nickelodeon through the year 2003.

Despite his criticism of network executives, Van Dyke remains bullish on television.

"For some reason, people got the idea that movies are not dispensable and expensive, and that television is," he told critics. "The truth of the matter is, the television average of good programming is a heck of a lot better than about 90 percent of the movies."

After his speech, Van Dyke said he watches few sitcoms these days. He knows the format too well and finds himself critiquing rather than laughing.

But he likes "Murphy Brown," "a good show despite what the vice president says." He's overjoyed that his brother Jerry has found stardom

on "Coach." "He was the funniest one in the family and always has been," he said.

"Seinfeld" wins his highest praise. "It's not only funny, it's quality and tasteful, and I LIKE it."

He punched LIKE just the way Rob Petrie would. What he doesn't like is the way viewers his age — he's 66 — have been disenfranchised by the major networks. "The networks pretty much have discounted the over-49 group," he said.

"Moore Show" grads Cloris Leachman, dithering Phyllis, and '60s' critics to discuss the MTM deal. Each expanded on Van Dyke's complaint that older viewer are being ignored.

"For a network to say, 'We're going to skew to those people because they're buying the most,' I think it's

kind of silly," Harper said. "The key thing here is quality. I think old and young are turning off television because there's no experience delivered."

Leachman complained that TV doesn't know what to do with older characters. The writers on her short-lived NBC sitcom "Walter and Emily" thought her grandmother character was too bitchy and later reduced her to a mere housekeeper, she said.

The culture's snubbing of older people could have devastating consequences, Leachman said. "Silly," you think, what are we wasting?

One thing might be the talents of older performers like Van Dyke. He recently played a doctor and amateur sleuth in CBS movies, though he said not to expect a series. "Because I would appeal only to an audience that they're really not interested in

going after."

As a viewer, Van Dyke has found an alternative to network television. "Like a lot of other people in my age group, I've graduated and gone to cable," he said. He watches the famous Channel, the Arts & Entertainment Network and Nickelodeon, naturally.

He also finds hope in video shows and public-access programs. The networks have "lost touch with what people want, and the people are going to start entertaining themselves," he said.

Though his Nickelodeon role is largely ceremonial, the network does accept his thoughts on programming philosophy, he said. "I would love to be involved when Nick at Nite starts doing original programming," he added.

His original and the viewers are lucky, he will be.

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# Gonzo photographers inspire documentary

NEW YORK (AP) — If you don't know what they look like, you've surely seen what they do. The tabloid shots of Madonna in shorts, Marla in jeans. Candid close-ups of Don and Melanie, Kurt and Goldie, Winona and Johnny Depp.

They are the paparazzi, those faceless mobs of lights and cameras that swarm like bees around the rich and famous and turn red-hot images into cold, hard cash. Whether at a film premiere, a charity bash or a morning jog, you'll find them jostling for position, aiming their lenses and reaching for the stars.

Now comes "Blast 'Em," a documentary in which the celebrity followers finally get top billing. You can watch them talk about the business and check them out in action: hanging out in streets and hotel lobbies, camped out in front of apartment buildings — waiting for their subjects to emerge.

Madonna, Jack Nicholson and Robert De Niro are but a handful of the big names that turn up in this film, but the unofficial star is the currently unknown Victor Malfaronte, a former photographer for The Star-Ledger in Newark, N.J.

Malfaronte is a paparazzo, but he sees himself as not just any paparazzo. He's the thinking man's paparazzo, the paparazzo with a human face, an artist trapped in a paparazzo's body.

"What is interesting is that I don't aspire to be a paparazzo," says Malfaronte, a native of Newark. "I never did aspire to be a paparazzo. I just got into the business. I'm the most intimate observer of the business, providing the people so interested in this stuff."

Malfaronte, 29, lives in a sunny studio apartment in Greenwich Village, where his book shelves are lined with works by the German philosopher Immanuel Kant and Leo Tolstoy and his computer printer churns out celebrity schedules. At a moment's notice, he can

move from pondering the fate of man to pondering the whereabouts of Michael J. Fox.

But if you think of Malfaronte as detached from it all, a book in one hand, a camera in another, the film shows otherwise. He is the gonzo paparazzo: always in motion, a hyperactive hustler with a wiry build and ears that stick out like Ross Perot's. You can see him bantering with doormen, sneaking through back rooms, fretting about his career, cursing colleagues and stars

like John McEnroe arguing a line call.

Why all the fuss over someone walking down the street or stepping into a cab? Money, that's why. An exclusive of Madonna joggng or Sean Penn kissing De Niro's girlfriend can be worth hundreds or thousands of dollars. Twenty years ago, there were just a handful of paparazzi. Now, there are dozens of them around the world.

Sometimes, the living is easy, like when Malfaronte was invited

to Malcolm Forbes' "Party of the Century" and got a picture on the cover of New York magazine, or when he was hired to shoot Bruce Willis for the actor's singing debut.

Then, there are those times he has to stir up his own action. Take the case of John F. Kennedy Jr. Malfaronte knew the late president's son worked at the Manhattan District Attorney's office. He had an idea: Why not go there, get some pictures and then follow him home.

"It's just heads-up thinking," he said. "At the end of day, he comes bounding out. I hang way back and I follow him home. He goes across the street and bounds out on roller blades. Everyone wanted that picture: John in shorts, with the big muscles and the big stride."

And here's where that "dichotomy of spirit" creeps in. It's easy to get mad at a celebrity, like Dennis Quaid, who won't have his picture taken at a film premiere — a press event, after all. But Kennedy's

fame is accidental and he wasn't looking for publicity, he was simply living his life.

"He did confront me, which he generally never does," Malfaronte said. "He was a little upset and he told me so."

Then you have Diane Keaton, who happened to attend a play one night — not a premiere, just a play — and was greeted by Malfaronte and company after it ended.

"We waited for her to come out and followed her. She didn't catch a taxi. I don't know why. She had parked her truck in a garage nearby, but she didn't know where it was. She's Diane Keaton, she's a space cadet, she plays space cadets in movies."

"We were following her and she was getting upset. We happened to be in a very raucous mood. We're meaning the paparazzi, we're hung around in packs. We never see Diane Keaton. She never goes out. 'Click, click,' and she's getting confused. She finds the garage, goes into the garage attendant's booth and like cries her eyes out, tears pouring. We got pictures of her."

At this point you might wonder if Malfaronte's book-fueled conscience wasn't tugging at his clicking finger. Here we have a dilemna Nietzsche would have appreciated: an educated man, a believer in the will to knowledge, bounding a stranger and reducing her to tears?

"Yeah, it bothered me, but it was a scene that was valuable to me in a lot of ways, a scene that you couldn't dream of, a scene that I experienced that not a lot of people experienced. It's something worthy of writing about and talking about and making films about."

He swears, however, that he's going to get out of this racket. But forget philosophy, there's no money in that; Malfaronte's got bigger plans. He wants to act, direct. And, he's writing a novel — based on his experiences as a paparazzo.

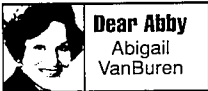

Severinsen said, "Last night in Greenville (S.C.), we had a total sellout and the audience went wild; I haven't heard this kind of audience reaction in a long, long time. It's something about the band being on the show and now being off."

When Johnny Carson retired as

"Tonight Show" this given name is Carlo played with Charlie Barnett's band in the '40s, and Tommy Dorsey's in the '40s and '50s.

"The group that we have now has been together about 20 years," Severinsen said, "and, believe me, after 20 years you get pretty fed up."

"There's absolutely no doubt" that all the publicity has generated interest in the band's concerts, Severinsen said. "There are a lot of people who miss Johnny so much that when the band comes in, this is a piece of 'The Tonight Show' a piece of history. When those guys walk out on the stage, the audience starts before a note is played."

Once the notes are played, "it's the big band sound. We don't warm up Glenn Miller classics, although we might play one or two. We have our own unique arrangements, we do big band jazz sounds, I've got some unbelievable soloists," Severinsen himself is no slouch as a soloist. The 65-year-old trumpeter Speaking of musical talent, Severinsen complimented the telephone playing of Bill Clinton, "a presidential candidate, he's OK. Actually, I've worked with guys who got paid who didn't play as good as he does."

# Election year calls for political film classics

Though it loves to schmooze with the candidates when they come to town trotting for cash, Hollywood hasn't spent much screen time on the campaign trail. Political documentaries, as a rule, do not make for box office success.

"The Candidate" (1972) picked up a couple of Oscar nominations and critical pats on the back, but the moviegoing electorate remained largely apathetic. Robert Redford gives one of his better performances as a photogenic would-be U.S. sena-

tor who gets a hard lesson in the game. Director Michael Ritchie and screenwriter Jeremy Lerner used experiences as campaign operatives to give the picture its dispiriting ring of authenticity.

Frank Capra's "State of the Union" (1948) concerns a businessman who runs for office and finds his ideals and integrity besmirched by the dirty process. Ronald Reagan stole his most famous campaign line ("I'm paying for this microphone!") from Spencer Tracy. Katharine Hepburn is the increasingly disgusted wife, Angela Lansbury the unprincipled "handler." Tracy campaigned

again, as a craggy big-city mayor, in "The Last Hurrah" (1958).

"The Best Man" (1964), based on Gore Vidal's politically juicy stage play, engages good-guy Henry Fonda and dinky-trickster Cliff Robertson in a particularly nasty fight for their party's presidential nomination. The far-flung, and Vidal's one-time habitue of the Kennedy White House — gets in a few real-world political insights as well.

Best Picture Oscar-winner "All the King's Men" (1949) took its inspiration from the rise and fall of Huey Long, the populist potentate from Louisiana who went national in

the '30s. Broderick Crawford and Mercedes McCambridge won Academy Awards, and the film, based on the Robert Penn Warren novel, has lost little of its power to disturb.

Robert Altman's "Nashville" (1975), a crazy-quilt of American life centered on the country-music scene in Nashville, includes a ubiquitous presidential candidate named Hal Phillip Walker, who blames virtually all of the nation's ills on lawyers. The never-seen character is the film's funniest and most ominous presence.

In a world where the words "record" and "album" are mere euphemisms for the latest audio recordings, the average "record buyer" is still latching on to new technology very slowly.

Compact discs, for example, accounted for no more than 30 percent of recorded music sales, though they've been around nearly 10 years. Imagine, then, the hard sell awaiting promoters of expensive and daunting new formats such as the minidisc and DCC (digital compact cassette) to be introduced this fall.

Yet amid the industry's techno razzle-dazzle, sales of the good old-fashioned audio cassette tape continue to boom. When it comes to price and portability, nothing (at least not yet) compares.

Having absorbed most of the vinyl share as albums have been phased out, the popularity of cassette tapes hasn't escaped the attention of the major record labels. Industry surveys reveal that nearly every American household has at least 2.5 tape players.

That's why the major record labels have been spending lots of money in recent years on technology that drastically improves the quality of tapes at minimal cost to the consumer.

For the past year, the WEA Group — the umbrella over the Warner, Atlantic and Elektra labels — has been introducing something new, called DIGilog, a digitally duplicated tape that brings the cassette

within striking distance of CD quality.

Though another major record group, BMG, introduced a similar digital production process last year, Warner is hoping to take the industry lead by coining and protecting the term DIGilog (much like the term Dolby is now a universal term synonymous with quality stereo sound), and by promising that every new release will use the upgraded technology.

DIGilog is a vast improvement over traditional cassette manufacturing. The old way utilizes a "bin loop" system that mass produces about 3,000 tapes at once. Since the master degrades each time it loops through the system, so does the quality of each successive tape that is spun off.

A consumer unlucky enough to purchase a tape from the end of the lot often receives a product far removed from what the artist originally intended.

Such low-end standards were commercially acceptable for years, but not in the age of compact discs, says Lou Vaccarella, vice president of production for RCA. "Today there are many more people listening with digital ears," Vaccarella says.

The DIGilog manufacturing process allows music to go right from a master source to every copy, thus guaranteeing every tape is never more than one generation removed from the master.

It is as near a precise copy as possible.

"It's a noticeable improvement," says Susan Nunziata, technology editor at Billboard magazine.

Considering that prices won't go up, and that such new tapes can be played on the same old tape deck, DIGilog seems like a pretty good deal for technology-resistant music lovers.

WEA begins hammering the point home with a print ad campaign. The ads read: "Extraordinary sound. Ordinary cassette."

Though DIGilog won't transform our listening habits, it's a boon because it keeps the cassette format competitive. That means consumers can expect to see them in stores for at least another 15 years, Nunziata predicts. And that protects consumer investment in equipment, as well as the labels' investment in its most popular format.

(By the way, DIGilog is not the same as the floundering DAT — digital audio tape. That's an entirely different, much more expensive format, in which the tape you play at home on fancy new equipment is also digital.)

Observers such as Nunziata say

some form of tape and some form of disc will remain the backbone of the recorded music industry for the next two decades. Eventually she sees the whole thing "going optical," or even to tiny computer chips.

Consumers can spot a DIGilog tape by the logo on the package. Other record companies can use the DIGilog logo, but only if they adhere to Warners' quality control standards. BMG entered into just such an agreement for its RCA, Arista and Zoo labels two weeks ago.

The new tapes will also keep a higher quality of sound longer than the regular old tapes, and play at a higher volume too, says Warner vice president Joe Vayda, who supervises research and development.

"It's where the cassette should be at this point," Nunziata says. "It's taking advantage as much as possible of what digital recording has to offer while still keeping the same format."

# Contrived 'Boomerang' features Eddie Murphy in romantic role

## Capsule reviews

**BOOMERANG (R).** A multimillion-dollar vanity project intent on shifting Eddie Murphy's screen persona from the comedic to the action, this listless star vehicle features

Murphy as a corporate Casanova who more than meets his match when Robin Givens becomes his boss. Whenever Murphy does do funny material, it's with the air of a potentate scattering crumbs to a grateful peasantry. Even Murphy's legal entanglements were more involving than this.

**UNLAWFUL ENTRY (R).** In this inflation fighter's twofor, killing

machines Jean-Claude Van Damme and Dolph Lundgren square off against each other as a pair of Vietnam casualties whose enmity extends beyond the grave, if not further. Though the acting is nothing to write home about and the finale is on the weak side, the very traditional action — cars bursting through glass, over cliffs and into flames — is expertly put together.

**UNLAWFUL ENTRY (R).** The latest in urban paranoia thrillers,

with Ray Liotta starring as a, shall we say, overzealous police officer who can't seem to stop protecting young marrieds Kurt Russell and Madeline Stowe. Though hampered by the usual glaring script implausibilities, solid performances and Jonathan Kaplan's fluid, unforced direction place this a cut above your average suspense film.

**SISTER ACT (PG).** Whoopi Goldberg on the lam in a convent is the not unfamiliar device that turns

this clever film into the funniest mainstream comedy in which you'll howl long. A tribute to those often denigrated qualities, slickness and professionalism, "Sister," helped in no small measure by superlative supporting performances by Maggie Smith, Kathy Najimy, Mary Wickes and Wendy Makkena, is just about as good as Hollywood gets. See it and remember how good it feels to laugh out loud.

This eagerly awaited sequel is, for better and worse, the product of director Tim Burton's morose imagination. His dark, melancholy vision is undeniably something to see, but its effect is oppressive rather than exhilarating and, with the notable exception of Michelle Pfeiffer's splendid work as Catwoman, it strangles almost all of the enjoyment out of this movie without half trying. A proverbial feast for the eyes that leaves you hungry for something, anything more.

# 'Shrunk' follow-up overdoes it

**HOLLYWOOD** — Nothing can be more galling than elephantine whimsy — and "Honey, I Blew Up the Kid" offers up just such a lot as big as a casino: 100-pound peppermint drops, huggy-bunny dolls the size of dinosaurs and massed helicopter attacks on the giggling Godzilla-baby.

A follow-up to the 1989 Disney studio hit "Honey, I Shrunk the Kids," its plot may be an ultimate example of wretched excess. A 112-foot-high "50 Foot Woman" marches on Las Vegas while his patents try desperately to save him from the local military-industrial complex.

## Review

"Did we say excess?" "Honey, I Blew Up the Kid" gives us a lot as big as a casino: 100-pound peppermint drops, huggy-bunny dolls the size of dinosaurs and massed helicopter attacks on the giggling Godzilla-baby.

Did we say wretched? Gags explode like stink bombs and dozens of maddeningly idiotic extras run around hysterically, tripping over Junior's fire-hose-size shoelaces, no matter where he clumps down his tank-size feet. As an entertainment, this film is completely outclassed by the new Disney cartoon on the bill: "Off His Rockers."

"Honey, I Blew Up the Kid" has a different director, Randal Kleiser, and writers — the tag-team of Thom Eberhardt and Peter Elling and Gary Goodrow — from its predecessor. But it continues the hapless adventures of the Szalinski clan: nerdy inventor Wayne (Rick Moranis), apple-checked mom Diane (Marcia Strassman), plucky kid Nick and Amy (Robert Oliveri and Nicky O'Neill) and the new kid, Adam (Daniel and Joshua, Shalik).

"It's no improvement. Even if you didn't much like "Honey, I Shrunk" — a movie that had a better script than this one, but worse acting — it's easy to see why it tickled the public. There was stick fun to the over-scaled effects, the

The story of a micro-size quartet, shrunk by a suburban dad scientist's ultra-gizmo and battling their way through the monster-jungle of their own back yard, had the same appeal that "The Incredible Shrinking Man" had. It made an exotic adventure out of the everyday.

But how common — or interesting — is a nightmare about a giant baby? There's a reason why '50s audiences were more enthralled by giant insects than giant humans, or why "The Incredible Shrinking Man" became a genuine cult movie and "Attila" of the '50 Foot Woman" and "The Amazing Colossal Man" — whose protagonist also marched on Vegas — are only "camp classics," relished for their silliness. It's always easier to identify with overpowered protagonists than gigantic ones.

In the early part of "Honey, I

Blew Up," the writers sketch Wayne's new circumstances: He is the pawn of evil corporate interests, trying to steal his new inventions. Then, they chronicle the difficulties of rapid infant growth; then they send Adam to Vegas. But their ingenuity, never high, starts to crack in the misdirection.

Most of the scenes involve the Szalinski family running around in circles, shrieking, giggling and gestulating, while snooty neighbors congregate on their lawn to try to creep through windows. By the end, invention has shriveled completely: Monstro-kid Adam picks up cars and goes goo-goo, sticks his brother and baby-sitter in his pocket, heaves his boulder-sized peppermint drops and tries to play riffs on a huge neon Hard Rock Cafe guitar sign.

These are hardly world-class gags, the special effects are variable, the ending a truly dubious paean to motherhood. We don't know why Big Baby Adam is heading toward Vegas, what he

cats or why he's so burblingly cheerful in the face of such rapid, puzzling changes. There's Moranis, Strassman, Lloyd Bridges, John Shea and the others have every reason to be distressed. If the first movie's acting style strongly suggested a series of kitchen cleanser commercials laid end to end, this sequel now suggests that only marginally more sophisticated form: breakfast cereal commercials.

There's one funny verbal joke in the entire film: Wayne trying to explain Adam's booming baby-talk, by describing him as a visiting Yugoslav. Is Kleiser aware of the small, but sweet, Randal Kleiser cult Yugoslavian, spurred by "Grease" in the early 1970s? Probably not. And "Honey, I Blew Up the Kid" (MPAA-rated PG) probably won't start another one — in Belgrade or Burbank. It's one more example of minuscule ideas inflated to preposterous proportions: An Attack of the 50-Foot Marketing Hook.

# Warner Bros. fares well for summer season

They must be positively giddy over at Warner Bros. these days, what with the back-to-back successes of "Lethal Weapon 3" and "Batman Returns."

These Warner Bros. productions are by far the summer's top performers — the former having grossed more than \$120 million in nine weeks and the latter having made around \$140 million in just four.

To put this in perspective, fewer than a dozen movies per year take in \$100-million or more at America's box offices. Another way to think about it is that, so far, the combined "Lethal Weapon 3"/"Batman Returns" total is \$270 million.

Although "Lethal Weapon 3" is near the end of its theatrical run, "Batman Returns" is just getting started. Even if "Unforgiven" — Warner Bros.' upcoming western with Clint Eastwood, Gene Hackman, Morgan Freeman and Richard

Harris — doesn't perform, this still looks like a great summer, box-office-wise, for the studio.

The folks at Universal Pictures may not be quite so giddy. Neither "Far and Away" (which has grossed around \$50 million) or "Housesitter" (\$43 million), has bombed exactly, but considering star power, expectations and budgets, neither really looks like a hit. The upcoming "Death Becomes Her" (the studio's dark comedy with Goldie Hawn, Meryl Streep and Bruce Willis) and "Raising Cain" (the studio's Brian De Palma thriller) could make the difference for Universal this season.

Meanwhile over at Disney, "Sister Act" is the sleeper hit of the season. With a gross of nearly \$90 million in seven weeks, it's destined to join the \$100 million club very soon.

Two other Disney summer films — "Honey, I Blew Up the Kid" and "A Stranger Among Us" — are just opening this week. The reissue of the Disney classic "Pinocchio" has grossed about \$12 million in three weeks — not great, but proba-

bly not too bad considering that the film has been shown in theaters seven times previously and was released on videocassette in 1985. (It's the first Disney cartoon feature to be shown in theaters after a video release.) Among the early summer studs is Disney's "Encino Man" (around \$36 million), a "Wayne's World" wannabe that wasn't.

Paramount Pictures' "Patriot Games" is going strong with a six-week gross of \$70 million — although the studio's "Cool World" (\$5.6 million in one week) will undoubtedly go cold fast. It's too soon to tell about Paramount's "Boomerang" (it's been open in two weeks), but it has opened well.

20th Century Fox's "Aliens" (around \$33 million) hasn't done nearly the business that had been expected of it as the third entry in a very successful series, and the studio's "Unlawful Entry" (\$30 million in three weeks) or "Prelude to a Kiss" (\$5 million in its first week) aren't looking like blockbuster either. Looking much better is

Columbia's "A League of Their Own" (nearly \$40 million in two weeks).

And guess what? There are still six weeks of the movie summer left.

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# Marketing now part of classical

What's happening here?

Classical music, the staid grand dame of the recording industry, is turning its marketing out of necessity. Record companies are repackaging centuries-old music in hopes of attracting a new audience.

"We're trying to show young listeners who are afraid of it that classical music doesn't have to be stuffy, pretentious or intimidating," says Linda Sterling, 32, the U.S. marketing director for the British record company EMI.

The new marketing push is meant to address classical record-makers' dwindling market share. For five years, the sector has lost 5.2 percent of \$5.5 billion in record sales in 1987 to 3.9 percent of \$7.2-billion total. Rock music in 1991 claimed 36.3 percent of the total market, with jazz falling 4.3 percent. In 1987, classical sales were ahead of jazz.

To help lure rock-loving youngsters to great music, some classical music marketers are even creating innovative music videos. One fast-paced video, "Beethoven Lives Upstairs," is about a boy who befriends Beethoven — who just happens to live in the same apartment building. The story, though, is all based on facts about Beethoven's life and includes lots of his music.

Adrian Marthaler, a Swiss filmmaker-director, says dreams "up videos with visual images to match classical masterworks, in the style of rock videos. And even film stars are getting into the act. A new video of Saint-Saëns' "Carnival of the Animals" is narrated by Glenn Close and Jerry

"It's so easy to make classical music videos or record operas that we also have to find new ways of expanding the classical CD market to support the rest of what we do," says Laraine Perri, head of marketing for Sony Classical, the label spearheading the drive to entice a new generation of music lovers.

A favorite way of boosting classical CD sales is the "crossover" album. A popular concerto played by a classical superstar like Itzhak Perlman or Yo-Yo Ma might sell just 20,000 copies when first released. But package Ma with McFerrin or soprano Kathleen Battle with jazz trumpeter Wynton Marsalis, and sales routinely top 100,000.

The first crossover album appeared a decade ago, when RCA paired Placido Domingo and John Denver for an LP that sold more than one million copies. Now, every classical superstar has to cross over, for the sake of both image and sales.

Not that most classical music stars mind — quite the contrary. Battle actively sought collaboration with Marsalis, and violinist Yehudi Menuhin deeply enjoyed making best-selling recordings of Cole Porter and other popular tunes of the 1930s and '40s with jazz violinist Stephane Grappelli.

Lately, classical marketing strategists have also experimented with even more innovative ways of packaging art music so that it's more appealing to upscale baby-boomers weaned on rock rather than Bach.

"Dinner Classics" is a prime example of what the classical trade calls a "concept album." The series was the brainchild of Sony's Perri, who says she was constantly asked by friends which classical works they should use as background music for dinner parties. The series' "Sunday Brunch" CD, for instance, contains soothing sound bites of Bach and Purcell, along with recipes for a gourmet brunch by award-winning food writer Martha Stewart.

These food-music albums, which range from "A Taste of Spain" to "Dinner for Two," cost a few dollars less than regular classical CDs and have passed the million mark in sales. Indeed, the idea is so successful that Sony is launching another series this month dubbed "Passport," aimed at music-loving travelers. The series' "Music of Italy" disc offers Verdi, Rossini, Respighi and other Italian masterpieces. Earlier notes include a Berlitz travel guide with a map of Italy and basic Italian expressions.

# Singer builds on success of 'Beauty and the Beast' duet

NEW YORK (AP) — Singer Celine Dion, whose duet with Peabo Bryson on the "Beauty and the Beast" title song gained her fame in the United States, is building on that success with a hit single and tour.

"If You Asked Me To" — from "Celine Dion," her second album in English, on Epic Records — made the Cashbox magazine Top Ten with a bullet. And this summer she's opening 18 concerts for Michael Bolton.

Because Dion was in Los Angeles for the Academy Awards earlier this year to perform the song that won an Oscar for writers Alan Menken and Howard Ashman, she missed the Juno Awards in her native Canada, where she was named female vocalist of the year.

Certainly, she's still enjoying her breakthrough success from "Beauty and the Beast."

She recalled about a recent autograph session at a Buffalo shopping center: "Little kids, who didn't know my name, would say, 'Bye, Beauty and the Beast.' It was so cute."

Dion, the youngest of 14 children in a French-speaking family from a little town outside Montreal, said in an interview:

"I wanted to sing forever. I started to bug my parents at 5 or 6. I was seeing show business in my dreams. Hollywood, Broadway, being with Barbra Streisand making movies, to be on stage anywhere in the world."

"My goal is still to be part of this family of stars. I'm ready to work



Dion now has a hit single and will open for Michael Bolton. At 24, she has been singing professionally for half her life. Her parents had a little bar/restaurant, where she would sometimes sing on weekends.

"My parents realized that was my life. I remember my mom sitting on the floor with us, giving five of us a part to sing, helping us hold the tempo," she said. (Several brothers and sisters are musicians.)

"When I was 12, Mom wrote my first song. One of my brothers wrote the music. We decided to make a demo of it."

Her brother sent it to a well-known Canadian manager, who signed her to a contract. The manager, in turn, called Eddy Marnay, a noted French songwriter, who started to write songs for her.

"I had the most beautiful chance, being able at 13 to sing wonderful songs that I said something, something that's not stupid," she said.

"When you're 13 you can sing love, but differently. This man is like my father of show business. I made nine albums of his songs."

In 1983, she became the first Canadian to receive a gold record in France, for her single "D'Amour ou d'Amie."

She put one song in English, "What a Feeling," in her show at 14, without understanding it. When she was 18, Dion took an intensive two-month course in English to enhance her chances for success in the United States.

was really bad. I have to tell the truth. I was always singing in my head. I was stupid maybe," she said. "I couldn't wait to get home with my family. My mother was always cooking. It was smelling so good, the bread. My brothers and sisters were playing music in the basement. That was my paradise. At home I was feeling secure."

"Today it is one of the things I really have problems to admit and to deal with. When I write, the feeling comes out but I make a lot of mistakes."

"Everyone should make an effort to learn another language. You don't know how good you feel about yourself. In a couple of years, I'll learn another language. I would like to have a career like Julio Iglesias. He can sing in any language and is known everywhere in the world."

"I really admire Barbra Streisand. She has a perfection of a voice. She's such a wonderful actress. I love every movie she did."

Dion is also a big fan of Prince, who wrote the song "With This Tear" for her latest album.

Her manager asked Prince, through a lawyer they both consult, to write a song for her. "I said, 'It's impossible. Everybody must ask him for songs.'"

But Prince wrote it and telephoned her. "I was really in shock," Dion said. "I was talking too much and too fast. I was nervous on the phone."

## Judge rules Chicago is an Eastern city — for now

CHICAGO — Baseball commissioner Fay Vincent's power is not unlimited, a federal judge said Thursday as he issued a preliminary injunction that keeps the Chicago Cubs in the National League East for now.

U.S. District Judge Suzanne B. Conlon enjoined movement of the Cubs to the NL West pending a final decision of the team's suit. Although a trial may be months away, Vincent filed an emergency motion for an expedited appeal later in the day with the 7th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals in Chicago.

"It's great for the city, great for the Cubs and great for the Cubs' fans," said David Hiller, a lawyer for the Tribune Co., which owns team. "I would hope that the commissioner wouldn't argue with the umpire on that one."

Vincent, saying he was acting in the "best interests of baseball," on July 6 overruled the Cubs' veto of realignment. Conlon said Vincent exceeded his authority. "It is clear that the broad authority granted the

commissioner by Article I of the Major League Agreement is not as boundless as he suggests," Conlon wrote.

The realignment plan ordered by Vincent calls for the Cubs and St. Louis Cardinals to move to the NL West next season, and for the Atlanta Braves and Cincinnati

Reds to switch to the NL East. The current divisional alignment has been in place since the league expanded to 12 teams in 1969.

On March 4, 10 NL clubs voted for the plan, with the Cubs and the New York Mets opposed. The NL Constitution requires a 75 percent vote for realignment, including approval from all teams involved in switches.

The judge ruled Vincent's decision violated Article VII, which allows Vincent to resolve disputes between clubs when no other mechanism for resolution exists.

"Article VII expressly limits the commissioner's jurisdiction to resolution of disputes 'other than those whose resolution is expressly provided for by another means,'" Conlon wrote. "Reading Article I in light of Article VII, the commissioner lacked the authority to unilaterally abrogate the Chicago Cubs' rights under ... the National League Constitution. Accordingly, there is a strong likelihood that the Chicago Cubs will prevail on the merits."

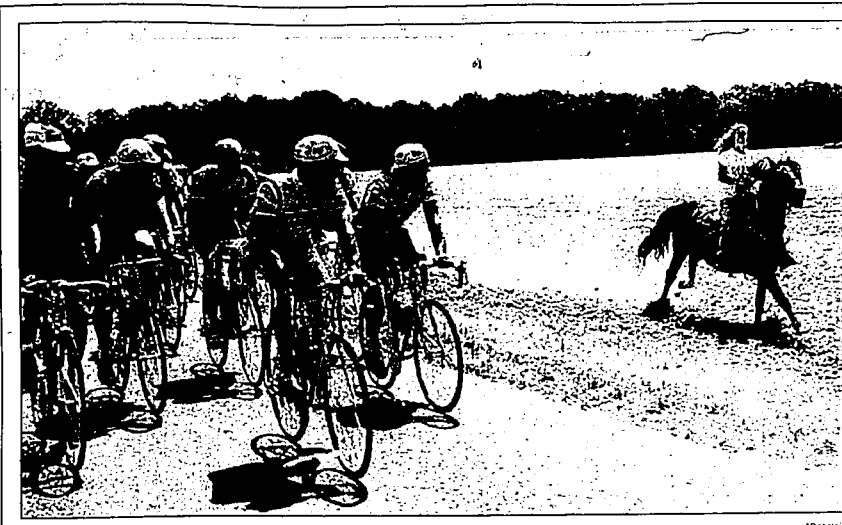

## Hampsten hopes to reign in next time trial

For Andy Hampsten, a year's labor will culminate Friday in the Tour de France's final individual time trial from Tours to Blois through the Loire River Valley.

Hampsten, of Boulder, Colo., remained in third place after Thursday's 132-mile stage from Montlucon to Tours was won by Thierry Marie of France in a sprint finish.

The race ends Sunday in Paris and Miguel Indurain of Spain is expected to extend his advantage over second-place Claudio Chiappucci of Italy when the 130 remaining riders compete in the 40-mile time trial.

Indurain's 30.4-mph performance in the Luxembourg time trial 10 days ago stunned his rivals and set up his challenge for the yellow leader's jersey, which he took in the Alps on Saturday.

"No doubt, Indurain will win this against-the-clock, but probably with less of a lead because the course is less difficult and Gianni (Bugno) has the legs for it," Laurent Fignon, winner in 1983 and '84, told reporters.

Chiappucci is expected to finish second for the second time in three years because he is a respectable time-trial cyclist. Third place, however, is anything but decided.

Hampsten is 8 minutes 7 seconds behind Indurain, but not that far ahead of some good time-

trial riders. Pascal Lino of France is fourth, 9:22 behind. Bugno is fifth, 10:09 behind and Pedro Delgado is sixth, 11:50 behind.

Hampsten finished 56th, 8:29 behind Indurain in the Luxembourg time trial. He also lost 4:48 to Bugno and 4:23 to Lino.

Hampsten, 30, said in June he would have to dramatically improve his time-trial racing to have a chance in the Tour de France.

His best finish was fourth in 1986 when he helped Greg LeMond become the first American to win the race.

Hampsten stayed in Switzerland last winter to prepare specifically for time-trial racing as much as any event this season.

## PGA stop takes on Friendly tone

SUTTON, Mass. (AP) — PGA Tour rookie Bob Faxon came roaring out of Arnold Palmer country Thursday to take the first-round lead in the \$1 million New England Classic.

The Pittsburgh native had seven birdies in a round of 64 over the 171-hole year of Pleasant Valley Country Club course.

He credited a revamped putting style for his round and added, "I hope it continues the rest of my life."

Mike Smith, who has played on both the PGA and European tours, had a trouble-free 65 with six birdies and only one hole that forced him to struggle for par. After a 65-minute rain delay, former Pleasant Valley champion Roger Maltbie and tour regular Brian Clair matched Smith's score.

Maltbie is famous around here for celebrating so thoroughly after his 1975 win that he left the \$400,000 winner's check at a local bar. A replacement was cut for him. The original hangs over the bar.

Rookie Phil Mickelson, still trying to make his first cut as a professional after a sterling amateur ca-

reer, shot a 66 and marched right back to the practice cage as a light rain came down.

Seven others were hunched with the left-handed Mickelson at 66 including Sieve Elkington, the reigning Tournament of Champions winner Ted Schultz, one of the best all-around drivers on tour, and Yoshi-nori Kaneko, who has had a successful year on the Japanese circuit.

Brad Faxon came in at 66 without a birdie on any of the par-5s. Faxon's final birdie came on the 12th hole when he rolled in a 30-foot putt, his first stroke after the rain delay. He had wanted to finish the hole before taking cover but when he went for his putter his caddy had already gone to the clubhouse.

Two contenders in last week's British Open kept up their solid play.

John Cook, runnerup to Nick Faldo at Muirfield, and fourth-place Steve Pate each shot 68.

Nearly half the field of 156 broke par as rain made greens receptive to iron shots directed at the flags, and 94 shot par or better, believed to be a tournament record.

## Laoretti heads Newport Cup field

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP) — U.S. Senior Open champion Larry Laoretti heads the field of 54 players in the \$400,000 Newport Cup, a 54-hole Senior PGA Tour event that starts Friday.

Laoretti, a 53-year-old former club pro who never played on the regular PGA Tour, earned his only Senior victory two weeks. He beat Jim Colbert by four shots and collected \$130,000 for finishing 99-nder at par 275 at the Saucony Valley Country Club near Philadelphia.

A native of Mahopac, N.Y., on Long Island, Laoretti is familiar with links courses similar to the Newport Country Club, the site of this tournament. The par-72, 6,722-

yard layout was the site of the first U.S. Amateur and Open in 1895.

Although he finished tied for 18th in the 1991 Newport Cup, Laoretti had a 69 and a 66 his last two rounds.

Five former champions join Laoretti in the tournament finale. The PGA dropped the event from its calendar effective next year. First prize is \$60,000.

Defending champion Larry Ziegler had a 17-under-par 199 last year. Al Kelley, the 1990 champion; Jim Dent, the 1989 champion; Lee Elder, the 1985 winner; and Miller Barber, who won in 1983 and 1987, are in the field.

## Bills open camp without Bennett, McKeller

The two-time AFC champion Buffalo Bills opened training camp Thursday without four starters from the team that lost the Super Bowl, and waived starting strong safety Leonard Smith after he failed his physical.

Smith was unable to play in the Super Bowl because of a knee infection and his recovery has been slow. But he was surprised by his own departure.

"I felt like I would still be a part of the team and rehab during the year and see what happened later and then continue playing," Smith said as he left camp. "They don't feel that they want to go that way so their option is to release me."

Coach Marv Levy said the Bills couldn't wait.

"It just appeared that it would be awhile and we feel that's better off committing ourselves to the new young prospects," Levy said.

Levy said last year's first-round draft choice, Henry Jones, and veteran Dwight Druce would compete for Smith's slot.

The Bills acquired Smith, 31, in a trade from Phoenix in 1988. The Cardinals made Smith a first-round draft pick out of McNeese State in 1983. Smith led the Bills with 99 tackles in 1989 and was third with 98 in 1990.

No-shows Thursday at camp in Free-donia, N.Y., were four starters from the squad that lost the Super Bowl to Washington: Pro Bowl linebacker Cornelius Bennett, tight end Keith McKeller, cornerback Kirby Jackson and defensive end Leon Seals. Also without contracts were Ken Davis, Mike Lodish and Marcus Patton.

### Giants

Ten-time Pro Bowl linebacker Lawrence Taylor showed up at the New York Giants' training camp at Madison, N.J., after missing the first four days of workouts and meetings.

As a signed veteran, Taylor can be fined up to \$1,500 for each day of training camp missed. The Giants traditionally have enforced the fine, but refuse to comment.

Taylor wasn't ready to talk about his absence.

"No guys, I said tomorrow," said Taylor, 33, who is entering his 12th NFL season. He has hinted that he is close to calling it a career.

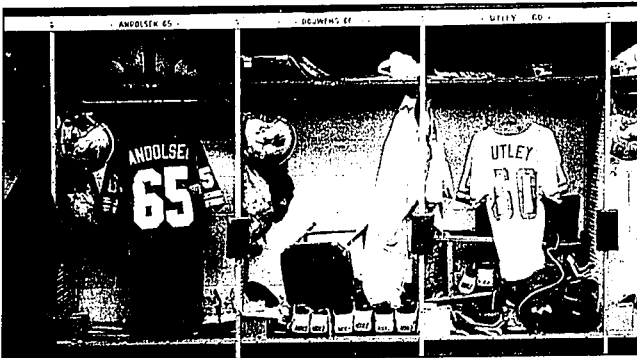
Taylor didn't attend any of the Giants' off-season meetings and his absence at the start of training camp wasn't surprising. He traditionally reports late, although last year he was in by the end of the opening day.

Giants coach Ray Handley didn't appear concerned by Taylor's absence on Tuesday.

"I would have preferred that he be here," Handley said Tuesday. "But Lawrence is an outstanding player and he knows how to be ready for games. When he gets here he'll be ready."

### Bears

Coach Mike Ditka, fed up with defensive lineman William "Refrigerator" Perry's perennial weight problems, said Thursday it might be time for a trade.

Ditka said Perry, who is unsigned, won't take the field in training camp at Plateville, Wis., unless he passes a physical, a stress test and a running test. If he fails, Ditka said, the Bears probably will try to get him in shape without putting him on the field.

"What it comes down to is whether it's time to trade him or what. We can't trade someone until we sign him. It's very hard," Ditka said. "I don't know what else we can do. It wouldn't make sense to keep a spot open on the roster and not trade him."

Ditka is tired of Perry's promises to keep his weight down.

"It is never going to be his way again. Period. There never will be a player that goes on the field that looks the way he did in a uniform last season as long as I'm here," the coach said.

### Bengals

Linebacker Alfred Williams wants a third medical opinion on whether he should undergo a second operation for an irregular heartbeat.

"This is my heart and my body, and if I have to go through (surgery) again, I want to make sure I've considered all the options so it'll be done right this time," he said. "But I also know that this is a serious deficit in my football career."

Doctors told Williams, 23, on Monday that he could not be cleared to

play because an electrocardiogram indicated he still had the irregular beat, despite surgery June 12 to eliminate an extra pathway in the heart that causes it. Williams, the Bengals' top draft pick last year, could be back on the field in a week to 10 days after another operation, if successful. If unsuccessful, he could be treated with medication while playing, doctors said.

Nine veteran players remained unsigned before Friday's reporting deadline for training camp at Wilmington College.

### Saints

Heat and humidity drove the Saints from New Orleans for training camp, but the opening practice Thursday at 58 degrees and 80 percent humidity in La Crosse, Wis., made things too comfortable for coach Jim Mora.

"The players liked it," Mora said. "But I don't. I like sun and heat."

"You don't want excessive heat and humidity, and that's one of the reasons we're practicing up here, instead of down in Louisiana. You don't want excessive heat and humidity day after day, but you need hot weather, I think, to get a team in as good a shape as you can get there in. I would prefer that the weather be sunny and hotter than it is now, if I had my drawers."

"I think we're going to get some. I have to believe we will."

Average normal temperature for La Crosse at this time is 84 degrees, and the National Weather Service was predicting close to normal temperatures by Saturday.

First-round draft choice Vaughn Dunbar and veteran Gil Feenerty, both tailbacks, were held out of drills Thursday morning. Dunbar had a mild strain of his left hip-levator muscle and was held out as a precaution. Feenerty awoke with back spasms.

### Jets

Raul Allegre and Jason Staurovsky are battling for the New York Jets plackicking job to replace the retired Pat Leahy, the NFL's third-all-time leading scorer.

Staurovsky, 29, and Allegre, 33, both have experience, coach Bruce Coslet noted. He is confident both can make field goals from 45 yards and in. "Raul kicked for his first time in three years last year," Coslet said. "But Jason has kicked in this conference so he knows the stadiums we'll be playing in."

Allegre kicked two field goals to lift the Jets past Miami last December and into the playoffs for the first time in two star seasons. Staurovsky kicked the last four seasons for the New England Patriots. Leahy retired last month with a recurring sciatic nerve condition in his lower back.

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# IOC chief will try for 4th term

BARCELONA, Spain (AP) — Moved by the draft created by more than 900 clapping hands in a standing ovation, Juan Antonio Samaranch announced Thursday that he would stand for re-election as president of the International Olympic Committee again next year.

Samaranch, 72, is finishing his third term as IOC president. He was elected in 1980.

Until Thursday, Samaranch had insisted he would wait until the end of the Olympics that open Saturday to decide about running again. Samaranch apparently had wanted to see whether the 1992 Olympics in his hometown would be a success.

After being asked about his re-election plans by IOC member Maurice Herzog of France, the rest of the IOC membership stood to applaud before Samaranch could answer. "Yes, I am ready."

Samaranch was re-elected by acclamation in 1989 but could face opposition next year.

His name has come under heavy fire in recent months, notably in a book about the IOC by two English authors. They allege that Samaranch, a former official in Francisco Franco's Spanish government, has run the IOC like a dictatorship that increasingly has been corrupted by money.

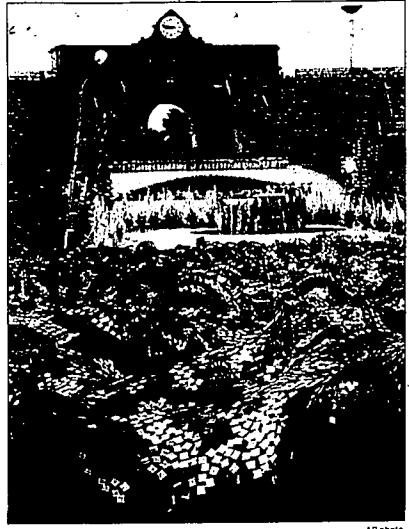
In other business on the final day of the session, Anita DeFranz of Los Angeles became the second woman ever elected to a position on the 10-member IOC executive board. DeFranz was one of three executive board members chosen from 11 candidates.

She will finish out the term belonging to Robert Helmeck, the former U.S. Olympic Committee president who was forced to resign from both the USOC and IOC after a conflict-of-interest scandal last year. DeFranz can then run for re-election.

Elected to normal, four-year terms on the executive board were Ashim Kumar of Pakistan and Richard Pound of Canada, who has previously been an IOC vice president.

DeFranz, 39, is a 1976 Olympic coach and is running and president of the Amateur Athletic Federation of Los Angeles. After Helmeck's resignation, she became the only IOC member from the United States, which is entitled to two.

## Monday hoops match excites Jordan, Pippen

MONTE CARLO, Monaco (AP) — No basketball team in the world scares Team USA.

Take Croatia, for example, the Americans' opponent Monday in their second game at Barcelona.

The breakaway republic has some of the remnants from the world championship team from Yugoslavia. The team boasts Drazen Petrovic of the New Jersey Nets and Toni Kukoc, possibly the best player in Europe.

It's Kukoc who interests Michael Jordan and Scottie Pippen, teammates on the Chicago Bulls as well as the U.S. team. The Bulls picked Kukoc in the NBA draft and for two years courted him before he decided to stay in Europe.

Jordan and Pippen have not seen Kukoc play, and they're looking forward to it.

"If ever defense will be played, it will be Monday night," Jordan said Thursday. "This will be a good test for Toni and for us. I want to see for

myself how good he is. Scottie and I will be playing some serious defense."

The U.S. team had another long and steamy intrasquad scrimmage Thursday, the last before it concludes a week of practice in Monte Carlo. The players and coaches will fly to Barcelona on Friday and play their first game at the Olympics on Sunday against Angola.

"We're ready for some other people to compete against. We're tired of beating up on ourselves," said Jordan, who pronounced himself too tired to play golf after practice.

"Whoever steps in front of us in Barcelona is in trouble. There's no reason to worry about Croatia when we're playing Angola first."

Jordan, asked if there was any chance the United States could lose, said nothing, then made a big zero with his fingers.

"The reason we're here is to put the other teams in their place," he said.

# Count on seeing Ore-Ida racer on medal stand, in future races

BARCELONA, Spain (AP) — Inga Thompson wants to win America's first cycling medal in Barcelona and she wants to go out on top.

She can just see it: tears will stream down her face; the U.S. flag will slowly ascend toward the sky as she stands on the medals platform and softly sings her national anthem.

But don't YOU count on seeing it Sunday after the women's road race in the suburb of Sant Sadurn d'Anoia. Not because Thompson doesn't have a shot at a medal. She does, and a very good one, at that.

But her dream of quitting while ahead is set in Atlanta in 1996 or maybe even sometime next century.

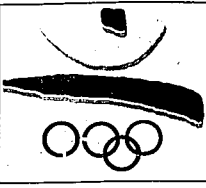
Thompson, one of the top international riders since the mid-1980s and the strongest American rider over the past two years, said Thursday she wanted to set the record straight; this isn't necessarily her last Olympics.

"I haven't thought about retiring. It hasn't crossed my mind," Thompson said. "Cycling takes years to be good. So I finally feel like I'm getting to be at the level I want to be."

"It's kind of odd to get where you want and everyone asks you about quitting," she added. "It took eight years to get here. I'm here. I'm good. I'm one of the best. It would be kind of silly to quit now."

"Just look at the good male professional cyclists. They're all in their late 20s and early 30s. They're at their best."

At 27, Thompson is better than ever.

She finished 21st in the first women's Olympic road race in Los Angeles in 1984, then improved to eighth at Seoul in 1988.

She has a pair of third-place finishes at the Tour de France de Feminin, in 1986 and '89, to go with two national championship road victories in '88 and '91 and a silver medal in the road race at the 1991 World Cycling

Championships.

On Sunday, she'll face a strong field, if not a strong course. Although the 81-kilometer course about 20 miles from Barcelona is challenging, it favors neither sprinters nor climbers.

"I definitely think it will favor me," Thompson said, "because I ride strong in the wind and strong in a pack."

Among the few riders expected to be in the sprint to the finish line with Thompson are Holland's Leontien Van Moorsel, who won the 1991 world championship road race in Stuttgart, Germany; eight-time world champion Jeannie Longo of France; 1990 world champion Catherine Marsal of France; and Van Moorsel's teammate, Monique Knol.

Other Americans in the race are Janice Goley, of Hollywood, Fla., and Sally Zack, from North Conway, N.H.

Goley won two gold medals at the 1991 Pan American Games in Cuba, in the team time trial and the individual road race. She was an alternate to the 1988 Olympic Road Team.

Zack was 16th in the 1988 Olympic road race.

Thompson, of Reno, Nev., said a good showing Sunday would help erase memories of 1988, when the U.S. team won just a bronze in the women's match sprint by Connie Paraskevini-Young.

"I guess if we were to win, it would be good for us the rest of the week," Thompson said. "Of course, if we don't, then I hope it doesn't set precedent either."

## Take a tour through host city Barcelona

BARCELONA, Spain (AP) — Buenos dias, señoras. Or as you non-Americans say: Howdy, folks.

It's time for your Five Rings Tour of Barcelona. As you can see, things are even crazier than normal here with the Olympics starting in less than 48 hours.

You'll see a little bit of everything on the tour: medieval churches and sparkling new sports arenas, modern art and old-fashioned sex shops, just in case you get homesick. Wayne's World is playing at the theater — dubbed into Spanish.

Let's hope the traffic isn't too bad. The police have been blocking off streets left and right to ease congestion, but it just seems to confuse everyone.

And Barcelona drivers aren't exactly known for following rules. They treat traffic lights like



temperature is rarely above 85 degrees, that dazzling Mediterranean sun can knock you out.

As we travel you'll see a flag hanging from nearly every balcony. Those are not Spanish flags; they are Catalan flags, with five yellow stripes alternating with four red ones.

Barcelona is the capital of Catalonia, one of the regions of Spain. Catalans are fiercely proud of their heritage, and of their differences from other Spaniards.

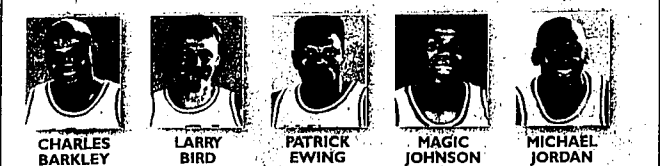
So you stand about as much chance of seeing a Spanish flag in Barcelona as you do of spotting an Oklahoma Sooner banner on the Oklahoma State campus.

You'll also be seeing plenty of Carl Lewis. He's featured, in a sprinting pose, on huge Panasonic billboards throughout the city. It's about the only place he'll be running in Barcelona, since he failed to qualify for the 100 or 200 meters.

**THE ACES ON BRIDGE** BOBBY WOLFF

"Learning is its own exceeding great reward."  
- William Hazlitt.

There's much to learn in a recently published book entitled "More Tips for Tops" by Dr. George Rosenkranz of Mexico City, who has won 12 North American Championships. His book offers much material that is rarely found in bridge books, and I recommend it to all intermediate and advanced players. It is available for \$9.95 from Devyn Press (1-800-274-2221, 1-800-442-7434).

Today's hand, from the book, shows how an errant lead can result in a hysterical defense.

West led a normal diamond jack and South rid himself of two hearts before starting trumps. On the ace and king of spades, West discarded the four and five of hearts. After winning a third round of spades, East panicked and played the ace and another heart. South ruffed and, in no doubt about the position of the club king, led the club queen from his hand to hopefully endplay West. Rosenkranz points out that when something bad happens at the table, players tend to panic. Had West led a heart instead of a diamond, the defense would have been calmer and more effective. But even with the diamond lead, East should have controlled his emotions instead of trying to get back heart tricks that were already lost.

Instead of leading hearts when in with the queen of trumps, East should have led a club. West wins while he still has a safe exit in hearts, and South cannot avoid losing two clubs, a heart and a spade for one down.

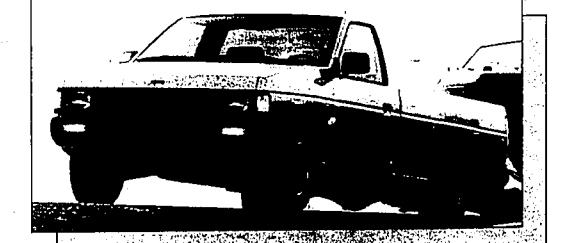

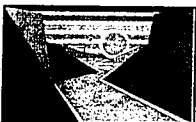

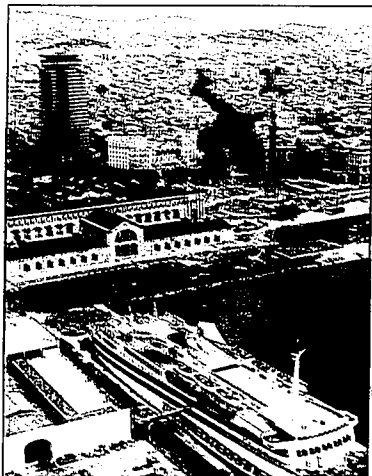

**POPULATION:** 1.7 million in the city, 4 million in the metropolitan area.

**LOCATION:** In the Catalan region of northeastern Spain, along the Mediterranean Sea.

**LANGUAGE:** Almost everyone speaks Spanish and Catalan; restaurant, hotel and other tourist industry workers generally speak English or French as well.

**WEATHER:** Summers are hot and humid, with maximum daily temperatures in the mid-80s. High humidity often is accompanied by smog.

**LIFESTYLE:** Barcelonians work hard and play harder. They usually work 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., take a three-hour lunch break, work until 8 p.m. and then eat dinner from 10 p.m. to midnight. Many continue the evening at a bar or disco.

**TOURIST SITES:** It is a city of modern, funky architecture highlighting the works of Antoni Gaudi — including the unfinished Sagrada Familia church. Excellent museums devoted to works of Pablo Picasso and Joan Miró. The Ramblas, a pedestrian mall and outdoor market, leads to a Columbus statue at the sea.

**POLITICS:** Pasqual Maragall, a Socialist, has been mayor since December 1992. Maragall, 51, is the grandson of Catalan poet Joan Maragall and a former lecturer at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore.

**OLYMPIC HISTORY:** Barcelona was a candidate for the Olympics three previous times — in 1924, 1936 and 1972.

**FAMOUS SONS:** Anis Miró and Salvador Dalí, architect Gaudi, cellist Pablo Casals.

# Triple trouble: Will NBC end up the big loser?

MIAMI — Try to contain your excitement: In just two days NBC begins its Olympics TripleCast, the most ambitious pay-per-view project of our generation. It could also be the most financially doomed pay-per-view project of our generation.

In case you've missed one of NBC's 18 million promos, the TripleCast is offering 1,080 hours of commercial-free programming July 26 through Aug. 9. Three channels will each televise 12 hours of live competition daily, 3 a.m.-3 p.m. MDT. Each show is repeated 3 p.m.-3 a.m.

Industry analysts say NBC could lose as much as \$100 million on the TripleCast.

"Worst miscalculation in the history of TV sports," said Jerry Dominus, senior vice president of J. Walter Thompson, the nation's seventh largest agency.

There are two reasons why the TripleCast may bomb: 1) Price. The \$125 charge for all 15 days is reasonable, but \$29.95 for one day is probably \$10 too high. 2) Time. NBC is offering 161 hours on free TV — nine hours on weekdays and at least 12 on weekends. To

watch any more, you would have to insert toothpicks in your eyelids and have the attention span of Einstein.

NBC is banking on two groups of potential customers — fans of less celebrated sports such as equestrian, which will be shown sparingly on NBC-TV; and viewers who want to watch everything live. NBC-TV is televising mostly taped coverage of events.

"We basically had to find a way to handle the rights fee," TripleCast coordinating producer Terry Ewert said. "We could have given rights to cable, but that would

have meant sharing advertisers."

That might have been the wiser option, though. (CBS, which sold cable rights to TNT, claimed it broke even on the Winter Olympics.) NBC is paying \$100 million for pay-per-view rights and another \$100 million for promotion and production.

NBC originally said 2.5 million homes was the break-even point, then lowered it to 2 million. The network won't disclose sales figures, but they reportedly have been meager.

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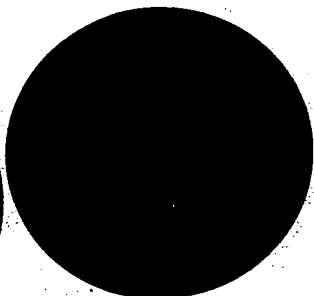
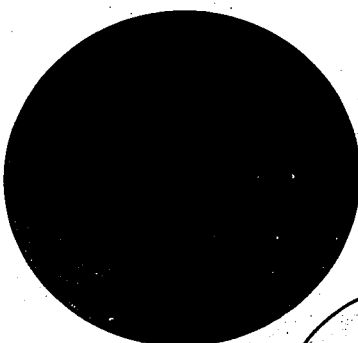
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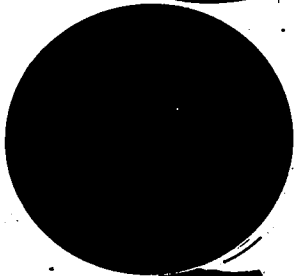
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
