Fire burns Rogerson home

Smoky blaze endangers entire town

ROGERSON — A Rogerson family's home burned to the ground Thursday afternoon when winds fanned a brush fire out of control, threatening homes, trailers and sheds and leaving this burg in a haze of smoke and heat.

If townspeople and passing motorists hadn't battled the blaze before firefighters from several agencies arrived, flames might have spread from the northwest part of town across Salmon Dam Road, threatening numerous structures in the south part of town.

As it was, the flames burned near several homes and approached a couple mobile homes.

Nearly 30 firefighters from Kimberly, Filer and Rogerson, as well as Bureau of Land Management crews, fought the fire for nearly three hours. Probably at least 30 volunteers helped fight the fire.

Crews got water from a pond a quarter-mile north of town owned by Ralph Snell. Twin Falls County Deputy Sheriff Jim E. Webb said late Thursday that authorities did not know how the fire started, but that the flames appeared to spread in all directions at once. He estimated five to 10 acres burned.

"I'm glad that everybody was here to help. Otherwise, I think the whole town could have went," Webb said.

One resident said she heard cars and lawnmowers explode as the fire swept south from a field toward the home of Terry and Sharon Adermann.

Sharon Adermann was sleeping in the home when a neighbor girl knocked on the door and awakened her.

"They were already working on it when they woke me up," Adermann said.

She escaped unhurt but watched her house burn down as volunteers fought to stem the blaze. Her husband and two children were not home.

"We lost everything but two vehicles and the dogs," she said.

The fire started around 3 p.m. in a field north of the Adermann home. A northeasterly wind fanned the flames east and the fire engulfed a trailer filled with antique furniture. The flames threatened the home of Terri and Dan Whitney, jumped across the old highway running through town and scorched fields near U.S. Highway 93.

Terri Whitney, whose home sits on the west side of the old 93 and north of the Salmon Dam Road, said the blaze started in a field behind her house. Her children, who had been swimming in a nearby pond, ran home shouting that the field was on fire. Whitney tried to fight the flames as they burned toward the home.

"The wind snapped up and the flames engulfed everything. It came right at us," Whitney said. "It got so smoky, we couldn't see."

Whitney heard cars exploding as the fire spread.

"It got so smoky we couldn't see," she said.

She grabbed her two children and ran.

The flames reached east over Whitney's house and across the road, starting a field on fire toward Highway 93, she said. But the wind suddenly shifted to the south and headed toward the Adermann's home.

By that time, townspeople and passersby from the highway had spotted the flames and were using shovels and garden hoses to stop the flames. Volunteers said they stopped the fire, but the wind kicked up and sent the flames toward the Adermann's house.

Terri Whitney sent one of her children to warn the Adermanns.

Mary Pool and Doug Fritts were driving back from Jackpot on their motorcycles when they spotted the flames. They helped dig a fire line and were using a hose to stop the flames from marching toward Adermann's home.

"We kept on forcing it back ... The hose lost water," Pool said. "We tried to save the house but we just didn't do it."

Pool said the flames were so intense that he used the hose on himself several times to stop from burning.

When the Adermanns' home was lost to flames, Pool, Fritts and others concentrated on keeping the fire from leaping across the Salmon Dam Road.



BLM fire crews arrived quickly, and shortly after that firefighters from the Twin Falls Mutual Fire Insurance Co. and the Filer, Rogerson and Kimberly volunteer fire departments reached the scene.

By then, around 3:30, the Adermann home was engulfed in flames. Crews transferred water from a 2,500-

gallon tanker truck into a 3,000-gallon holding tank. From there, firefighters pumped water on the Adermanns' home, but after a while all only smoldering remains were left of the house.

Smaller fire trucks worked the fields north of the Adermanns' and east across

Hopes revive POWs alive

MOSCOW — Some Americans imprisoned after World War II may still be alive in the former Soviet Union, the Russian co-chairman of a commission investigating U.S. POWs said Thursday.

In an article written for the newspaper Izvestia, Gen. Dmitry Volkogonov said Soviet authorities had pressured 39 Americans to renounce their citizenship. He said those who refused were jailed as spies, and those who agreed were sent to prison camps anyway.

"There is reason to believe that some of them are still alive and that they live on the territory of the former U.S.S.R.," Volkogonov wrote, citing newly released KGB documents.

Malcolm Toon, Volkogonov's American counterpart on the commission, said in June he doubted there were any POWs still imprisoned in the former Soviet Union.

Vaccine shows promise of treating deadly cancer

LOS ANGELES — Patients with the deadliest form of skin cancer lived dramatically longer when they were injected with a vaccine-like treatment for the disease, according to a study released Thursday.

The experimental vaccine is among several being developed. They are aimed at curing patients whose malignant melanoma has spread throughout the body despite surgery to remove cancerous moles and affected lymph nodes. It will be five to 10 years before a government-approved vaccine is on the market and widely available, said the study's author, Dr. Donald L. Morton.

Morton, medical director of the John Wayne Cancer Institute at St. John's Hospital in Santa Monica.

Traditional vaccines stimulate the body's immune system to prevent a disease. Melanoma vaccines also are designed to trigger an immune system response, but to treat rather than prevent skin cancer.

Morton said his vaccine is further along in testing than others as a treatment for people with the most advanced stage of melanoma. He gave the vaccine to 136 such patients, then compared their longevity with 1,200 advanced melanoma patients treated conventionally in the last 20 years.

Of those who got the vaccine, 26 percent survived at least five years, four times the 6 percent five-year survival rate for the other patients.

Patients who received the vaccine lived an average of 23 months after diagnosis, more than three times longer than the average of 7.3 months for other patients. Morton said some patients have been followed for six to eight years and remain cancer-free.

"This is a step in the direction of increasing the lifespan of patients who are quite ill with the disease," said Ralph Reisfeld, a Scripps Research Institute biologist-biochemist.

"The eventual goal, of course, is a cure," Reisfeld said in an interview.

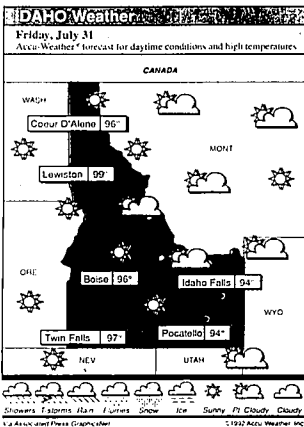
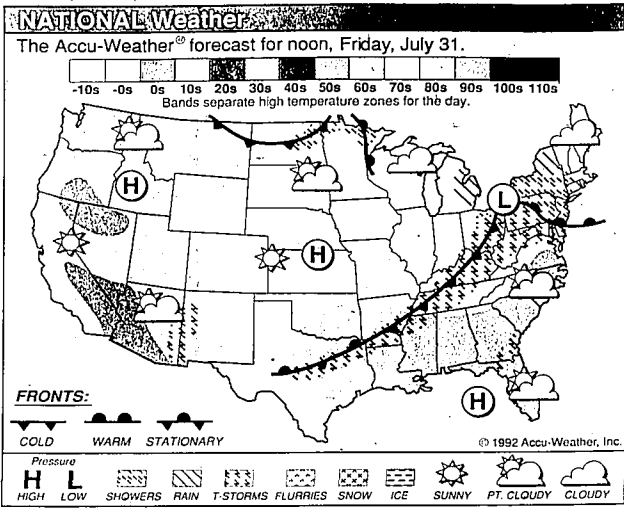

Heavy storms leave Nebraska flooded, hail-hammered

As much as 7 inches of rain fell in Nebraska as showers and thunderstorms were scattered Thursday from the Plains to the East Coast.
At midday, showers and occasional thunderstorms extended over Oklahoma, the northeastern Plains, the Mississippi Valley, the Tennessee Valley and lower Ohio Valley, the eastern Gulf of Mexico states, the southern Atlantic Coast and southern New England.
A severe thunderstorm watch was posted for parts of central and eastern Oklahoma, southwestern Missouri, northwestern Arkansas, central and southern Indiana, west-central and southwestern Ohio, and a small section of north-central Kentucky.
Roads, fields and homes were flooded Thursday for the second time in a week in southeastern Nebraska. The National Weather Service reported unofficially that 6.95 inches of rain fell in 12 hours from late Wednesday into Thursday morning at Preston, near Falls City, and softball-size hail struck the area.
In southwestern Nebraska, hail as big as baseballs fell near Lewistown and Maxwell and hail the size of golf balls fell south of Brady and north of Imperial. At least one tornado tore up a farm house in the area. Wind blowing up to 60 mph uprooted trees and did other damage in Oberlin, authorities said.
Locally heavy rain flooded streets and low-lying land in central and east-central Illinois, and an inch of rain fell in an hour at Marion, Ind., the weather service said. Wind in thunderstorms gusted to 60 mph at Sheridan, Ind.
Heaviest rainfall during the six hours up to 2 p.m. EDT was .87 inch at Moline, Ill., the weather service said.
A flood warning was posted over sections of northern Kentucky, where creeks were rising in central Marion County, about 60 miles east of Cincinnati.

Nation's migration goes Midwest

WASHINGTON (AP) — Go Midwest. Young Man Or Woman?
That may be the slogan of the 1990s, as Americans rediscover the industrial heartland after a decade of flight.
"The westward movement of the U.S. population may be coming to an end," the Census Bureau said Thursday in a report covering migration inside the United States from 1980 through 1988.
The 1970s saw a huge surge in migration from the Midwest and the Northeast to the South and the West, spurred by declining heavy industry in the North and the rise of high-tech businesses in the Sun Belt.
But government demographers analyzing tax returns found that trend peaked early in the decade.
Since then, the net gain in the West has declined to less than a third of what it was at the start of the decade, while the net loss in the Midwest has been cut to less than a fourth of what it was.
The number of people moving to the Midwest rose by 14 percent in the decade. In the West, the number of people moving in declined by 15 percent; in the South, movements in declined by 6 percent.
The Northeast also showed an increase, 7 percent, in the number of people moving in.
Overall during the decade, the South gained 3.2 million people and the West gained 1.3 million. The Northeast lost 1.8 million and the Midwest lost about 2.8 million.
In 1989, the South, with a gain of 262,000 migrants, was still the destination of choice, despite the region's long slide over the decade.
The West was second with a net gain of 63,000. The Midwest showed a loss of 97,000, and the Northeast, a loss of 229,000.

Blaze forces evacuation Hope of homes near Pocatello

A fire broke out west of Pocatello Thursday afternoon, burning in brush near houses and causing the evacuation of 10 homes in the Trail Creek area.
Bureau of Land Management fire information officer Ann Van Buren said the fire was estimated at 2,000 acres by evening.
It also seemed to die down as quickly as it appeared. There were no immediate confirmed reports of property damage.
"It went up in a hurry and was just a half-mile from some homes," she said. "It had all the makings of a disaster. It says something about the dry conditions now."
More than 200 federal firefighters and others were on lines at Pocatello, as the fire spread across the Bannock County line into Power County. Van Buren said it covered private, BLM and Fort Hall Indian Reservation lands.
It is believed to have started with a broken power line which ignited a heavy range grass in conservation reserve land set aside by farmers, she said.
Three aerial tankers were used along with a helicopter. Officials called in a "hot shot" team and said 25 heavy tankers and 15 light tankers were on the fire lines.
The fire was declared 67 percent contained at 6 p.m. and fire bosses hoped for full containment by midnight. "It's looking good. We have good weather tonight," Van Buren said.
But homeowners were allowed to return to their homes later Thursday. Officials closed two roads in the area to keep sightseers out, Trail Creek Road west of Pocatello and Michaud Creek Road.
Bannock County officials declared a disaster in the Trail Creek area west of the city a couple of hours after the blaze broke out just after 1 p.m.
Capt. Jan Heinz said the Bannock County disaster organization was activated at just after 3 p.m. Temporary shelters were set up in a church and a school.

Officials sign pact on chemical arms

WASHINGTON — Top Pentagon and Russian officials signed an agreement at the Pentagon Thursday to use \$25 million set aside by Congress for the destruction of Russian chemical weapons, a Pentagon spokesman said.

The \$25 million is part of a larger \$400 million appropriation set aside by Congress to help destroy nuclear, chemical and other weapons of mass destruction built by the former Soviet Union.

The \$25 million will be used to help Russians draw up a plan for the destruction of their weapons, to establish an alarm system for detecting leaks or problems with the weapons, and to establish visits and demonstration programs to educate Russian experts in the destruction of chemical weaponry, said Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams.

Panel: Don't require AIDS disclosure

WASHINGTON — The National Commission on AIDS said Thursday medical workers should not be forced to disclose whether they have the virus.

The lawyer for the only person known to have died from the disease caught through medical contact called the commission's stance "abominable."

The commission, appointed by the president and Congress, said in a report that medical workers and patients alike should be protected from discrimination caused by fear of the disease.

Clifford says he's a victim of BCCI

WASHINGTON — Washington patriarch Clark M. Clifford, described as in such poor health that he may not live long, pictured himself as an innocent victim of the BCCI banking scandal Thursday and vowed to fight charges against him "as long as I have the strength and health to do it."

Clifford, 85, a former secretary of defense and a confidante of Democratic presidents, said, "I did not know I was being made a victim, like so many others," by the Bank of Credit and Commerce International.

"We accepted them for what they appeared to be," he said. "We were deceived. They were not what they appeared to be."

Women lead in California Senate races

SAN FRANCISCO — Two Democratic women enjoy sizable leads over their Republican opponents in campaigns for California's two open U.S. Senate seats, according to a Field Poll released Thursday.

Both former San Francisco Mayor Dianne Feinstein and Rep. Barbara Boxer had 18-point leads in the poll of 771 registered voters taken July 22-28.

Feinstein is running for a two-year term that resulted from the departure of Pete Wilson from the Senate after he was elected governor. She led Sen. John Seymour, a Republican appointed by Wilson, 55 percent to 37 percent, with 8 percent undecided.

Regulators want nuclear backup plans

WASHINGTON — Federal regulators are asking owners of 37 nuclear reactors to implement short-term backup plans for monitoring possible meltdowns, after finding a safety device used for that purpose could fail.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission asked the owners to implement the plans within 30 days, spokesman Frank Ingram said Thursday. Owners were asked to ensure that emergency systems are in place and that workers are trained to respond.

Such emergency measures could include keeping large amounts of water in the reactor to offset misreadings, or teaching operators to recognize irregular gauge readings that might indicate a problem.

Insurers: Psychiatric claims fraudulent

SANTA MONICA, Calif. — Eight insurers on Thursday accused health care giant National Medical Enterprises of submitting fraudulent claims for care at the nation's second-largest chain of for-profit psychiatric hospitals.

The lawsuit claims the health care company devised a national scheme to admit thousands of patients to its psychiatric hospitals with no regard to need. It involves hundreds of millions of dollars in claims.

The lawyer who filed the lawsuit, Thomas W. Brunner, declined to say what percentage of the claims he believed to be fraudulent.

Admiral: Navy ignored sexual harassment

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy knew of serious sexual harassment problems in its ranks for years, but failed to act before they burst into view last year's Tailhook incident, the service's top officer testified Thursday.

But the service is now seeking to make up for that failure with a strict "zero tolerance" policy and a readiness to kill the careers of those who ignore the new standards for behavior between the sexes, said Admiral Frank B. Kelso II, chief of naval operations.

"This is not a new issue," Kelso told the House Armed Services Committee, testifying before two House Armed Services subcommittees on a panel with the chiefs of the Marines, the Army and the Air Force.

"We have never failed to identify the problems," he said. "We have, I must admit, sometimes failed to act

on those early warnings." Kelso and the other chiefs heard stern lectures from several women on the panel.

"Men must accept women as human beings and not sex objects," said Rep. Marilyn Lloyd, D-Tenn. "That is the issue."

Some committee members said the problem seems worst among military aviators, and Rep. Ike Skelton, D-Mo., asked about the different culture among those who fly.

"You've got to have people who have a kind of devil-may-care attitude if you want them to do this work," responded Air Force Chief of Staff Merrill A. McPeak. Marine Corps Commandant Carl E. Mundy,

called it "a warrior spirit" and added, "There is such a thing as male bonding." Kelso said sexual harassment problems have existed since women began joining the Navy in large numbers two decades ago, but they have been dealt with case by case, what he called "our normal way of doing business."

In addition, attitude surveys of naval personnel have revealed sexual harassment problems, and incidents at the Naval Academy and naval training centers have prompted limited responses.

The Navy's primary focus, however, was on integrating women successfully into its force, he said. "There was a persistent belief among Navy leadership that as women rose to more senior ranks and became an accepted part of the service, attitudes would change over time," Kelso told the panel.

Last year's Tailhook incident, in which as many as 200 naval officers groped or disrobed at least 26 female colleagues during a wild convention in Las Vegas, has forced more drastic moves, he said.

The problem is "obviously a cultural and institutional problem in the Navy," Kelso said.

Adding to drunkenness that contributed to the Tailhook scandal, Kelso said, "It is clear that we must focus additional attention" on alcohol abuse in the Navy. And he called sexual harassment a more complex problem than the issues of racism or drug abuse which the Navy has tackled in the past.

"Events of the past year make it clear that we in the Navy are facing a crisis of significant proportions," Kelso said. He outlined what he termed an aggressive plan to educate personnel and punish those who don't comply.

Bush takes campaign to Texas, California

WAXAHACHIE, Texas (AP) — President Bush won cheers defending Texas' huge super collider project on Thursday and then headed for California, hoping to revive his slumbering campaign in two states holding nearly one-third of the votes needed for election.

Presidential rival Bill Clinton also supports construction of the massive \$8.2 billion atom smasher, the world's largest science project, so Bush trained his fire on congressional opponents, most of them Democrats.

Opponents say the project costs too much and complain that it is concentrated in one state, but Bush dismissed such critics as "parsons of the past" battling against "the architects of the future."

Addressing a friendly crowd of workers at the construction site, he said he would "call everybody necessary" to keep Congress from the killing the project.

The president toured buildings at the site of what is officially known as the superconducting super collider, at one point being shown equipment that was cooled to a temperature of 450 degrees below zero.

"Impressive," Bush declared. And he later donned a yellow hard hat and climbed up to inspect a test shaft used for digging on the project some 30 miles from Dallas.

"Here is where a new electronics industry is going to be born," Bush said, "but some in Congress don't see it."

Bush noted Thursday's disappointing economic figures showing anemic growth, but said Americans should "resist the urge to exaggerate our problems." And he renewed his blame of Congress for making things worse.

"Congress has dillydilly and dillydilly while too many Americans have been out of work," the president said.

Tax bill including IRAs for all likely to be passed

WASHINGTON (AP) — A catchall tax bill that includes the popular tax-deductible individual Retirement Accounts for all workers has an excellent chance of becoming law this year, lawmakers and lobbyists said Thursday.

"I don't know how anybody can stop this thing now," said Rep. Robert Matsui, D-Calif., a member of the House Ways and Means Committee and no particular fan of the IRA provisions. "This is going to be our (only) tax bill for the year and the lobbying community is ready."

"It's a bill I can campaign on and one the president can sign," said Rep. Rod Chandler, R-Wash., a Ways and Means member and Senate candidate.

"It has a lot of momentum behind it," agreed David Keating of the Na-

tional Taxpayers Union. "The best part is the IRAs. Everything else is mish-mash."

The IRA provision is only one of scores of tax cuts and tax increases included in the bill, which won unanimous approval of the Senate Finance Committee on Wednesday. It could be considered by the Senate as early as next week.

The bill, now carrying a five-year price tag of about \$31 billion, originated in the House as a \$17 billion measure whose chief purpose was to provide federal incentives for businesses and investors to create jobs.

Lethal injection kills Utah prisoner for 1974 torture-murders

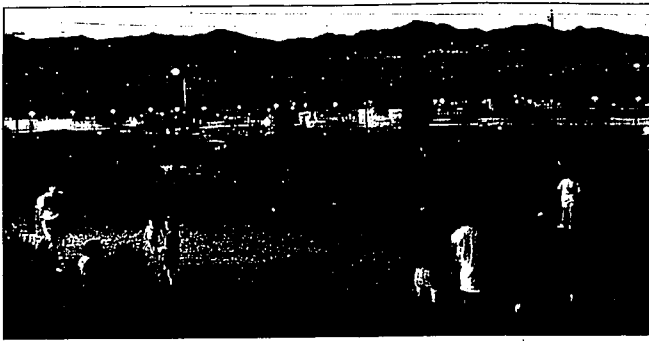
SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — William Andrews smiled broadly at friends and family moments before his execution early Thursday for a 1974 robbery in which five people were bound, tortured and shot, three died.

Andrews, 37, was pronounced dead at 1:46 a.m. MDT, 32 minutes after entering the death chamber at Utah State Prison and being strapped face-up on a gurney and injected with lethal drugs.

The execution followed weeks of protests by supporters who insisted Andrews had not personally killed anyone and who claimed that, as a black man, he was the victim of racial discrimination.

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NASA: Atlantis, crew ready for tricky mission

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Atlantis and its multimillion-dollar European cargo endured final ground tests Thursday for an unprecedented mission to test a satellite that will fly 12 miles above the shuttle, connected by a thin cord.

NASA aimed for a 9:56 a.m. EDT Friday liftoff. Near-perfect weather was expected; forecasters called for a 95 percent chance of favorable conditions.

The flight with seven astronauts is considered one of the most complex, and exotic, missions in shuttle history.

The conglomeration will be traveling nearly 5 miles per second, or 17,500 mph, and will be the longest structure ever flown in space.



Bo knows what ails America

Backers of Populist Party candidate Gritz rally for freedom

TWIN FALLS — Listen up, all you disappointed Ross Perot supporters: James "Bo" Gritz wants you.

Local supporters of the retired Green Beret colonel (whose last name rhymes with "fights") rallied Thursday evening in front of the Twin Falls County Courthouse to promote his long-shot presidential candidacy.

And to hear them talk, Gritz is the last chance to save the United States from being absorbed into a sinister "new world order."

Gritz, 53, is a highly decorated Vietnam veteran who has spent much time searching for POWs and soldiers listed as missing in action in Indochina. He lives in Sandy Valley, Nev., and is the candidate of the Populist Party.

Idaho is one of about a dozen states where Gritz will appear on the ballot, according to the spokesman for his national campaign.

John Ruseckas, a retired Air Force colonel who is leading a cross-country "march on Washington" of Gritz supporters, described the campaign as a "war to win our country back."

And, since most major media outlets have ignored Gritz's campaign, Ruseckas told the Twin Falls crowd, the war will be won with more unorthodox weapons, like sticklers.

The plan, he said, is to distribute thousands of Gritz stickers to truckers, who will plaster them on the sides of their

Ketchum's top cop waits, wonders

KETCHUM — Supporters of embattled Ketchum police chief Cal Nevland gathered Thursday evening to see whether Nevland would still have a job this morning.

But at 5:30 p.m. disciplinary hearing by the Ketchum City Council quickly turned into a 5:50 p.m. executive session that stretched late into the evening.

Nevland, who has held the reins of the Ketchum police department for 11 years, has been fighting for his job since the beginning of the year.

Nevland's attorney, Keith Roark, demanded that the council air any grievances against his client before the public.

But the council retired to the city attorney's office down the street and called several officers in for interviews behind closed doors. Council members had not emerged by Times-News press time.

Officer J.T. Creviston said he refused to answer the council's questions. "I don't trust them. They talked more than I did," he said.

Creviston said the ongoing feud between the council and the police chief put a lot of stress on the officers. "Cal is a great chief of police. He's the reason I'm here," said Creviston, who joined the force in 1981.

The reasons for the tension between Nevland and the council aren't completely clear, but the police chief did campaign heavily for Mayor Dan Hamilton, who ousted longtime councilman Tom Held last November.

The council conducted a hearing on Nevland in June over his handling of a personal matter involving one of his officers. This month, council members have come up with a list of complaints against Nevland that include his handling of drug investigations.

Adding fuel to the fire is a recall movement targeting three of the council members opposed to Nevland. A petition drive to put Ed Simon, Pam Ritza and Larry Young up for recall in November is a month old, and the petitioners must obtain the necessary signatures by late August.

"It's going well," said Ed Scott, one of the council's most vocal critics through the Nevland controversy. Scott said the Nevland situation is the central issue behind the recall drive.

Officials hope Twin Falls middle school concept will reach adolescent students

TWIN FALLS — Schools need to do a better job of reaching adolescent students, and the middle school concept may help Twin Falls administrators do that.

Although their names will not change, the educational philosophy driving Robert Stuart and O'Leary junior high school will shift in the coming school year, Stuart Principal Dale Thomsberry told the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club Thursday.

"There is a need for a different approach to deal with these kids," Thomsberry said. "Youngsters in their early teens just entering junior high school are often

frustrated by a whole new way of learning — moving from class to class, dealing with six or seven different teachers and handling more subjects, Thomsberry said.

Statistics show that, if students don't succeed in the seventh grade, they won't make it through high school, he said, noting that 20-25 percent of Idaho students who begin ninth grade don't get their diploma.

The goal of the middle-school concept, which has gained favor in school districts across the state, is to ease the transition from grade school to high school.

Although the ideal years for a middle school are sixth through eighth grades, Twin Falls schools are limited by their current facilities and will try to implement

the concept in the current junior high years of seventh through ninth grades.

Seventh grade will be the focus this year, with teachers and administrators experimenting with "blocking" and "teaming."

Teaming involves groups of teachers from different subjects — history, math, english, science — who coordinate their lesson plans to lend meaning to the material, Thomsberry said.

Blocking allows those teachers more flexibility with the hours spent with the students. If an English teacher needs two hours with a group of students, for example,

Centennial water rules violated

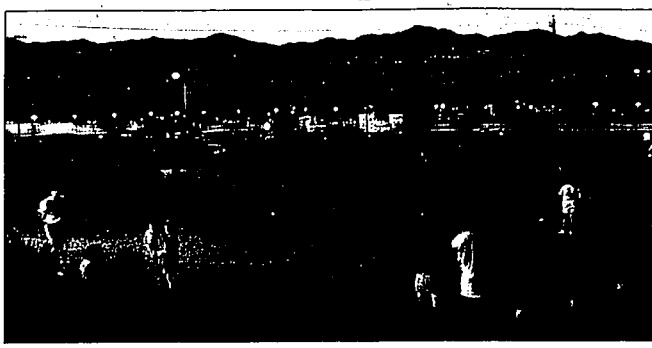

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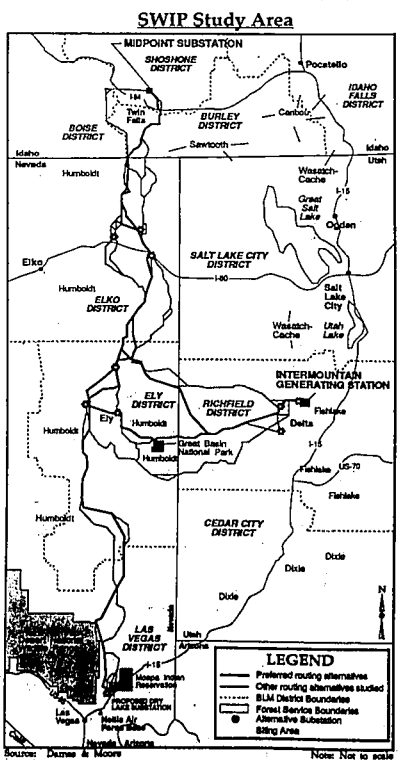

Although their names will not change, the educational philosophy driving Robert Stuart and O'Leary junior high school will shift in the coming school year, Stuart Principal Dale Thomsberry told the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club Thursday.

"There is a need for a different approach to deal with these kids," Thomsberry said. Youngsters in their early teens just entering junior high school are often

frightened by a whole new way of learning — moving from class to class, dealing with six or seven different teachers and handling more subjects, Thomsberry said.

Statistics show that, if students don't succeed in the seventh grade, they won't make it through high school, he said, noting that 20-25 percent of Idaho students who begin ninth grade don't get their diploma.

The goal of the middle-school concept, which has gained favor in school districts across the country, is to ease the transition from grade school to high school.

Although the idea is new for a middle school area sixth through eighth grades, Twin Falls schools are limited by their current facilities and will try to implement

the concept in the current junior high years of seventh through ninth grades.

Seventh grade will be the focus this year, with teachers and administrators experimenting with "blocking" and "teaming."

Teaming involves groups of teachers from different subjects — history, math, English, science — who coordinate their lesson plans to lend meaning to the material, Thomsberry said.

Blocking allows those teachers more flexibility with the hours spent with the students. If an English teacher needs two hours with a group of students, for example,

Centennial water rules violated

TWIN FALLS — Rules that ban water-skiing near Pillar Falls, said Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman, have been breached.

The lawbreakers got away with it, too.

Though the park opened only this month, someone already was seen water-skiing near Pillar Falls, said Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman.

A sheriff's deputy also recently caught someone using the type of one-person motorized ski that the Twin Falls County

Commission banned from the park. Hempleman said, "But the deputy didn't issue a ticket."

The water-skier was reported to the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Department. But the department's motorboat wasn't available for a deputy to take to Pillar Falls, so the lawbreaker got away, Hempleman said.

A deputy would have to see someone skiing to issue a ticket, he said.

The person on the individual motorized ski talked a sheriff's deputy out of catching him, Hempleman said. Evidently that person persuaded the deputy that a sign listing proscribed activities was worded vaguely, so the deputy let that person go.

The sign lists several rules for the park, among them: No water-skiing shall be allowed; nor will any individual power skis be allowed.

The deputy wasn't sure that a ticket would stand up in court, Hempleman said. "We need to reward the signage," Hempleman said.

The commission would move quickly to fix the problem, he said. "Absolutely," he said.

The park runs from Pillar Falls, east of the Perrine Bridge, downriver to Auger Falls. The county commission banned water-skiing and the use of Jet-Ski-like machines at the park after a long community debate last year.

Both types of skiing were considered too dangerous for that narrow stretch of river. County residents also said wanted a quieter park.

Glenns Ferry pair draws jail for poaching

MOUNTAIN HOME — Two Glenns Ferry men have admitted poaching five protected sturgeon from the Snake River and will serve a minimum jail term.

Elmore County Magistrate John Sellman ordered Francisco Ortiz and his brother-in-law Miguel Salas to serve a total of four days in jail and pay \$2,300 in fines and penalties along with court costs and public defender fees.

They also lost their hunting, fishing and trapping privileges for a total of six years. Idaho Department of Fish and Game conservation officer Jeff Day said he received an anonymous tip that Ortiz had been poaching sturgeon and found three sturgeon heads at the Ortiz home.

Two others were discovered at the Salas home. The fish had been three to four feet in length.

Because sturgeon do not start reproducing until 12 years old and then only in five- to 10-year cycles, the species has been under catch-and-release protection since 1970.

Symms blasts report, LaRocco, Stallings

TWIN FALLS - Idaho's two Democratic congressmen came under attack Thursday over a congressional report that questions the benefits of a "composite wing" proposed for the Mountain Home Air Force Base.

"I think it's a travesty that neither Richard Stallings nor Larry LaRocco lifted a finger to set the record straight on Mountain Home," Republican Sen. Steve Symms said.

But a Stallings aide said the congressmen had no means of influencing the report.

A June report from the House Armed Services Committee report raised questions about the composite wing. It also questioned the capability of the Mountain Home base to accommodate it, because of the lack of an adequate training range near the base.

Symms, on a Thursday news release, criticized Stallings and LaRocco for supporting the 1993 National Defense Authorization Act, passed by the House in June.

The committee report, which accompanied the bill, was a "blatant political move" to keep the composite wing concept or to keep the wing out of Mountain Home, Symms said.

Stallings aide Cary Jones, however, said the committee report was not legislation, carried no force of law and could not be amended on the House floor. It represented only the views of the committee members, he said. Neither Stallings, who is the Democratic candidate to replace the retiring Symms, nor LaRocco is on the Armed Services Committee.

The committee questioned whether the composite wing would fulfill the Air Force's doctrine of "global reach, global power," the report said. "The benefits of the composite wing appear less tangible than the disadvantages of implementing the concept."

The report commented on the Air Force's attempt to establish composite wings at three locations. Each wing would be made up of different types of planes, which would train together as they would fight together.

Andrus won't make it to grave dedication

OROFINO (AP) - A schedule conflict will preclude Gov. Cecil Andrus from participating in the dedication of the grave for the 3-year-old victim of Idaho's first convicted torso-murderer.

The governor's office said on Thursday that previous commitments prevented Andrus from attending the Sept. 19 dedication of the grave of Robert Miller, who was systematically beaten to death over a period of time by Gene Francis Stuart.

Stuart, 40, has been on Idaho's Death Row for more than a decade

But Mountain Home and the two other proposed locations might not be the best sites "from both a deployment and cost standpoint," the report said.

The committee report also questioned the ability of the Mountain Home base to accommodate the wing. The existing Saylor Creek Bombing Range near the base would provide only the most basic training requirements, the report said.

For additional training the planes would have to go elsewhere.

Gov. Cecil Andrus, however, has offered to assemble state, private and federal land into a training range in southwestern Owyhee County. The proposal includes a two-part, 166,000-acre bombing range in the southwestern corner of the county and 35 electronic emitter sites scattered between the proposed range and the Saylor Creek range.

The governor has said he wants to keep the Air Force in Idaho to ensure the future viability of the Mountain Home base and its more than \$100 million annual payroll.

Symms' press release suggested that the Idaho congressmen should have challenged the report and told "the truth about Mountain Home - that it is one of the finest assets in the Air Force inventory and near perfect place for a composite wing."

Once the training range is established, Mountain Home will be perfect, Symms said.

The bombing range proposal has met with criticism from the Bureau of Land Management, Idaho Department of Fish and Game, sportsmen, ranchers, environmentalists and Duck Valley Shoshone-Paiute Indians.

The state would lease the range to the Air Force, following the results of an environmental analysis expected to be completed in October 1993.

The proposal must also wind its way through a complex land exchange process with the BLM.

The composite wing and the range proposal also face three court challenges - from the Indians, from local ranchers and from a coalition of environmental advocates.

Water agency will revise plans for future of Henrys Fork Basin

BOISE (AP) - The Idaho Water Resource Board hopes to get a revised version of the Henry's Fork Basin plan to the Idaho Legislature when the 1993 session convenes in January.

The board on Thursday approved a schedule for revising the plan to meet objections voiced by members of the House, which rejected the plan in the last regular session.

The board also agreed to sponsor bonds for Fall River Rural Electric Cooperative, Inc., which will use the money to install a 4.8-megawatt generating plant at Island Park Dam in the northeastern corner of the state.

A plan protecting the Henry's Fork of the Snake River, considered one of the prime fishing streams in the country, sailed through the Senate but fell to objections from farm interests in the House. It was the major environmental battle of the 1992 session.

Eastern Idaho lawmakers objected to a provision that they said could preclude eventual reconstruction of the failed Teton Dam. The Bureau of Reclamation dam failed in 1976 as it was being filled for the first time and has never been rebuilt. Farm interests in the area hope to get it rebuilt so it can store additional irrigation water.

The original plan gave protected status to an area of the stream that

would have become part of the backwaters of the Teton Dam Reservoir. Opponents argued that would have made it impossible to rebuild the dam.

"That was never the intention," Higginson said. The plan is being revised so the protected area stops at the dam's projected backwaters.

The Henry's Fork plan also contained a suggestion that water-bodies be able to convert their water rights from consumptive use to in-stream use.

Higginson said if that change is desired, it should be part of the overall state water, not part of a basin plan. It has been moved.

The agency plans three eastern Idaho informational meetings in mid-September on the revised plan, with two formal hearings set for the next month.

The Fall River co-op serves 8,000 accounts in northeastern Idaho from Bigby in Yellowstone Park and the southern fringe of Montana.

It hopes to start construction Sept. 8 on the dam project. General Manager Dee M. Reynolds said the utility has been negotiating with Bonneville Power Administration to buy the electricity it will produce.

Eventually, he said, the project will give Fall River's members a cheap source of electricity.

The resolution approved by the

board Thursday allows up to \$13 million in bonds to be issued, but Reynolds and Board President Kenneth Brown said the plan is to borrow about \$8 million to complete financing.

The project has been in the planning stages since 1978. The utility suffered a setback when a partner, Bonneville Pacific of Salt Lake City, went into bankruptcy last year.

Construction could start Sept. 8, and could be finished one year later.

The utility received \$1 million in federal funds to help pay for wildlife mitigation and facilities such as an aeration basin to improve water quality.

Reynolds said when the work is done, it will help improve water quality in an area where increasing development and recreation use have been adding pollution.

Board Secretary Gene M. Gray, Payette, said he wanted it understood that the revenue bonds, exempt from state tax but not federal, would be offered first to Idaho residents. There is no state liability to cover repayment.

"We want them sold in this state to our people," Gray said. "I want the bonds offered in Idaho first."

Bond counsel Chuck Fawcett said that wouldn't be a problem, unless no Idaho buyers could be found.

Volunteers will clock Boise speeders

BOISE (AP) - Lead-footed drivers in Boise should watch out for ordinary citizens armed with stopwatches and ready to report them to police.

Volunteers for the Boise Operation Speed Watch Program will work with the Boise Police Department

and the Ada County Highway District. The program starts Aug. 14.

Fifteen neighborhoods want to take part, said Terry Little of ACHD.

"It's one way to get people to consciously slow down in neighborhoods where people are living and children are playing," said Renee Quick of the East End Neighborhood Association.

Volunteers receive training materials and videotapes showing them how to use a stopwatch and calculate vehicle speed.

ACHD will paint stripes on the streets at 100-foot intervals to calculate speeds. One volunteer clocks the speed while a second takes down license plate numbers and driver descriptions.

The information is sent to the police, who mail written warnings to the registered owners of the vehicles.

"This allows people to help themselves," said Curt Crum of the police Crime Prevention Unit.

"Seeing someone visible (on the street) may help be a deterrent."

Filer youth pleads guilty to auto theft

Today's session originally had been planned for Aug. 4, but was moved because of scheduling conflicts among some members. The date of the budget's public hearing coincides with the date of the next regular council meeting.

Klingenberg said that council should adopt its budget Sept. 1. The city's fiscal year runs from Oct. 1 through Sept. 30.

Minidoka fair's rodeo draws nearly 250 entrants

RUPERT - Nearly 250 cowboys and cowgirls will compete for a total of nearly \$15,000 in prize money next week during the 44th Annual Minidoka County Fair's Dick Anderson Memorial Rodeo.

The fair begins Monday and continues through Saturday. The rodeo, traditionally one of the fair's biggest attractions, will take place Thursday and Friday.

This year's rodeo, which has attracted 247 entrants from all over the West, will feature saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, team roping, breakaway roping, steer wrestling, ladies' barrel racing and wild cow riding.

Rodeo chairman Wade Zollinger of Oakley said that wild cow riding is just that - a wild ride for the riders as well as the audience. Three-man teams will saddle up wild cows and try to ride them between barrels to a finish line.

"It's hard just to get them to finish," Zollinger said, laughing. Crystal Bros., of Rigby, Idaho, will supply the horses and bulls. Calling the rodeo, a sanctioned International Professional Rodeo Association event, will be Ted Dweyer, a veteran

announcer from California.

The rodeo will begin at 8 p.m. both days, preceded by two children's events: steer riding, for children age 8 and up, and mutton bustin', a sheep-riding competition for kids age 7 and under.

The Minidoka County Color Guard will present the United States flag during both evenings.

One local woman will receive a pleasant surprise from the rodeo's organizers. The title of this year's rodeo "Grandma Queen" will go to an unsuspecting woman in attendance Thursday who has spent a lifetime involved in the rodeo, ranching and community service.

The "Grandma Queen" will receive a rocking chair, a silver felt huckle and a dozen roses, Zollinger said.

Reaching out to Hispanics will benefit Mini-Cassia area

Officials in the Mini-Cassia area deserve credit for taking the first steps toward bringing Hispanic residents more fully into their communities' civic life.

The steps are small and tentative, and a person could argue that they are overdue. But they are steps.

Last week the Heyburn City Council announced creation of a Hispanic Involvement Committee. The goal is to help Hispanics integrate themselves into the area's culture and political life. "We feel they should have a say in what goes on in the community," Mayor Glen Loveland said. Bravo.

Meanwhile, Cassia County officials are toying with a comparable plan. Concerned about some residents' perceptions that Hispanics are to blame for crime in the county, officials are looking at appointing both Hispanics and Anglo-Americans to a committee to examine the crime problem — and to work on better inter-ethnic relations.

Sheriff Billy Crystal also suggested putting a Hispanic on the city-county Law Enforcement Advisory Committee. These are all good moves, but they

should be regarded as only a start. Hispanic residents deserve serious attention from all sectors of the established local leadership.

In the decade before the 1990 Census, Hispanics increased to 19.3 percent of Minidoka County's population, up from 15.1 percent. In Cassia County, the gain was from 9 percent to 13.4 percent.

The percentages are smaller in other parts of the Magic Valley, but the trend is the same: Hispanics' account for a growing share of the area's population.

As leaders reach out to Hispanics, the greatest need will be for open ears and open minds. They may find that Hispanics have their own ideas about how they should be included in civic life — ideas that don't necessarily match what the established leadership had in mind. The establishment should listen.

The steps being taken in the past few days may be the beginning of an exciting and challenging journey. There surely will be bumps along the way, and maybe a few roadblocks. But it's a trip worth taking.

Health care causes concern

I read the article on health care in your newspaper with some concern as I have been a contributor to a private health fund for 40 years.

Approximately 20 years ago, the federal and state governments introduced a government-sponsored medical scheme which was to provide medical care for all people and make redundant any support necessary from private health funds.

Now we have a condition which is described in the press as gross over-serving. It seems that some medical practitioners saw the opportunity to increase their profit margin by providing the support facilities necessary to satisfy the needs of their patients.

Many new multi-purpose clinics appeared and when patients presented themselves for examination, they were "put through the system." X-rays and pathology tests of considerable complexity were diagnosed as being necessary and the resulting medical claims were submitted through the Medicare scheme.

The total cost of medical care has mushroomed to the point where medical insurers have now sought from their contributors the authority to automatically increase salary deductions to ensure that they are never behind with their contributions; otherwise, contributors could find themselves with inadequate cover should a serious illness befall them.

Think very carefully before you choose a system which supposedly provides everything for everyone. So far, no system has been devised that has achieved this goal.

In the mean time, some medicines now have garages which house two Mercedes.

Problem isn't Dan Quayle, it's Bush

Dan Quayle is not the first vice president whose tenure has been placed in doubt, nor will he be the last.

Indeed, a recurring theme of postwar American politics has been whether this or that president was likely to dump his vice president. Richard Nixon survived one such effort in 1956. Lyndon Johnson apparently believed — probably incorrectly — that John F. Kennedy would get rid of him in 1964.

And speculation about Quayle's future has plagued the former Indiana senator almost from the moment that President Bush plucked him from political obscurity to be his 1988 running mate.

But the only time since World War II that the quadrennial rumors came true was when the nation's only non-elected president, Gerald Ford, dropped his non-elected vice president, Nelson Rockefeller, in a 1975 effort to neutralize conservative Republican opposition.

That may have helped Ford turn back Ronald Reagan's 1976 primary challenge. But the president's eventual choice of Kansas Sen. Bob Dole may have been partially responsible for his eventual narrow general election defeat.

So the exercise is risky at best. In the case of Quayle, the situation is complicated by the political difficulty in which Bush finds himself just three months before the Nov. 3 election.

For one thing, Quayle's greatest weakness is probably among the same suburban independents and moderate Republicans who disagree with the president's opposition to abortion rights. Keeping him might make those voters more likely to vote Democratic this year.

For another, initial polls show that the public thinks Democratic nominee Al Gore

is far more qualified than the incumbent vice president.

And though analysts generally believe that only a small proportion of Americans base their votes on the vice presidential candidates, a swing of one or two percent could decide a close election.

Still, there are far more political reasons for Bush to retain his vice president, especially at this late date.

First, Quayle's political base is in the GOP's conservative wing, which has always had its doubts about Bush. Dropping the vice president might reinforce those doubts and reduce the GOP turnout.

Second, by dropping Quayle, Bush would in effect admit that he had made a mistake in the first place. Few politicians like to do that, and there's no sign that the president believes his choice was wrong.

More significantly, Bush is the man whose credibility was severely damaged when he abandoned his 1988 campaign pledge of "no new taxes."

Given his repeated endorsements of Quayle, starting with a 1989 interview with The Dallas Morning News that he would "absolutely" be on the ticket, a second significant reversal could be especially damaging.

And if anyone in the Bush entourage thought that Quayle might voluntarily step aside, it was wishful thinking.

Withdrawal from the ticket under fire would probably mean an end to the vice

president's 1996 presidential aspirations. And Quayle's confidence in himself makes it unlikely that he would ever accept that, premise that he was hurting the ticket.

Though somewhat accident-prone as in his willingness to discuss a hypothetical question about abortion and his 13-year-old daughter, the vice president has sometimes shown better political instincts than the

Within two days of the nationwide railroad strike, the U.S. House of Representatives voted 248 to 140 for a 35-day cooling-off period on the railroad industry.

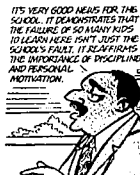

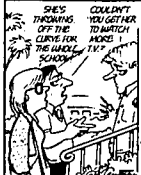

National Right to Work committee gives to non-candidate Symms

The political action committee for the National Right to Work Committee has contributed \$4,000 to Idaho Sen. Steve Symms — even though Symms isn't running for re-election and already has close to \$500,000 in a campaign fund.

"He has a lot of expenses to cover," said Reed Larsen, Springfield, Va., leader of the national right-to-work movement. "He is doing a lot of good things for the country."

Larsen defended the contribution to a non-candidate, even though Symms has \$485,426 in his campaign committee account.

"I'm sure he will be doing useful things with whatever is in his political action committee," he said Thursday.

"I know his philosophy very well. I'm sure he will be helping the kind of candidates I believe in, absolutely."

"The right-to-work PAC wouldn't have given out money unless it felt it was in the interest of the right-to-work cause," Larsen said.

Symms was out of the office sick Thursday but aide Dave Pearson said it was not surprising that Larsen would make the contribution, even though Symms isn't running.

"They are good, personal friends and believe in the same things," Pearson said.

For a non-candidate, Symms showed a lot of campaign activity in a report filed with the secretary of state's office this week covering the first six months of the year.

Besides the \$4,000 from right-to-work, his only contribution, Symms' campaign also earned \$12,899 interest.

Symms spent \$28,692 for the

period and also made \$20,800 in political contributions, apparently with the intent of qualifying the Steve Symms for Senate Committee as a multicandidate committee.

That would allow the committee to contribute \$5,000 per election, \$10,000 per election cycle, to individual candidates instead of the usual limit of \$2,000 per candidate.

Symms donated to candidates in Maine, New Jersey, North Carolina and Virginia.

To qualify as a multicandidate committee, a committee must have been registered at least six months, receive contributions from at least 50 contributors and must have made

contributions to at least five federal candidates.

Pearson said Symms hasn't converted the committee to a multicandidate committee yet.

"He may do that. He has talked about it," he said.

Pearson said the incumbent has been studying what to do with the huge campaign surplus but has made no decisions. There will be no conversion to personal use. Senate rules forbid it and Symms has stated repeatedly he would not use any of the campaign money for himself.

"One alternative is that he may turn the committee into a multicandidate political action committee further the hopes of candidates with similar philosophical views," Pearson said.

Larsen said he expects that to happen.

"I haven't discussed it with him, I

trust his judgment," Larsen said. "I've seen him perform and he operates in the interests of the people of this country."

"The kind of people he will be helping are the kind of people who will be good for this country."

Federal election laws limit contributions from individuals to a candidate to \$1,000 per election, or \$2,000 for both primary and general elections. An individual can give \$5,000 a year to a political action committee or state party committee and \$20,000 to a national party committee. Overall, an individual can make \$25,000 per year in political contributions.

The committee or group limits are the same except there is no overall limit.

A multicandidate committee can give \$5,000 per election or \$10,000 per year to individuals and PACs or state party committees but just \$15,000 per year to a national party committee.

Panel wants expanded INEL study

POCATELLO — A state panel will recommend that a planned study of radiation releases at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory be expanded to include all types of hazardous releases and all possible means of human exposure.

Pat McGavran of the state Office of Environmental Health said the panel of health and environmental scientists and citizens will release its final report and recommendation to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control in September.

The panel will also make suggestions to state health officials and federal authorities and their contractors for improving the methods of estimating past and current health hazards from chemical and radioactive releases.

The major recommendation is for a closer review of the ways contamination can spread such as through waterfowl, soil deposits and groundwater migration.

Inmate says prison is cruel, unusual

BOISE — A state prison inmate claims that because the state has limited facilities to treat sex offenders, his prison sentence amounts to cruel and unusual punishment.

But the Court of Appeals rejected the argument Thursday, sustaining the sentence of 5-to-10 years ordered for Joseph William Repici III on a Washington County conviction of sexual abuse of an 11-year-old child.

Repici raised the argument in a motion for sentence reduction. But the Court of Appeals said constitutional arguments of that sort should be raised in habeas corpus proceedings so a factual record can be developed.

Fall from cliff leaves boy in hospital

POST FALLS — A 16-year-old boy was in serious condition at Kootenai Medical Center Thursday after falling from a cliff, a nursing director said.

Jason Galloway of Coeur d'Alene was trying to get down a steep, jagged cliff when he tumbled 50 feet onto the rocks, next to the Post Falls dam Wednesday, said Lt. Ben Wolfinger of the Kootenai County sheriff's department.

"He was climbing down the cliff, and he stepped wrong," Wolfinger said.

The teen-ager was taken by helicopter to the hospital, where he underwent surgery to repair several broken bones and other injuries.

Marijuana suspect pleads innocent

BOISE — A man charged with growing more than 1,000 marijuana plants in a Meridian-area barn has pleaded innocent to a charge of manufacturing a controlled substance.

Charles Vernon Pugh, 41, is scheduled to stand trial Sept. 3 before 4th District Judge Gerald Schroeder. The judge denied a motion to reduce Pugh's \$100,000 bond.

Police arrested Pugh after they raided a barn June 20 and discovered a sophisticated watering and lighting system for the plants. They estimated the value of the crop at \$4 million and called it the largest marijuana operation discovered in Ada County. Pugh remains in the county jail.

Deputies make arrests for marine DUI

COEUR D'ALENE — Lake Coeur d'Alene is a haven for boating enthusiasts, but Kootenai County sheriff's deputies want to make it a "dry" lake for drunken skippers.

With four arrests between Saturday and Tuesday, including a Washington judge, marine deputies have arrested 17 people for boating under the influence so far this summer, said marine division commander Sgt. Nile Shirley.

Only five arrests were made last year, Shirley said. Kootenai County's drunk boating busis account for all but three in the state this year, he said.

Stepmother testifies in murder trial

IDAHO FALLS — The stepmother of accused double murderer Jeffrey Smith testified Thursday that Smith told her he had been at the home of Leo and Mary Downard twice between the time they were last seen alive and their bodies were found last March.

But Sondra Smith told Magistrate Linda Cook that her stepson was "fery, very shocked" he found out the elderly couple had been murdered.

"He had said they were like grandparents to him," Mrs. Smith recalled.

Smith is charged with two counts of first-degree murder in the shooting deaths of the Downards.

Cost will determine battle over prayer

REXBURG (AP) — The cost of continuing the legal battle and whether it is covered by insurance will determine how far the Madison School District will go to defend its practice of prayer at graduation ceremonies.

Superintendent Brent Orr said the district already faces as much as \$70,000 in legal fees from the court confrontation it had last year with the American Civil Liberties Union over graduation prayer.

But Orr said the district insurance carrier has yet to say if the \$100,000 policy will cover both its \$20,000 bill plus the \$30,000 to \$50,000 the ACLU is expected to seek in legal reimbursement.

"We're waiting to see where the insurance company stands," Orr said. "Then we can look at our options and make a decision."

ACLU attorney Steven Peviar set a tentative deadline of next Tuesday for the district to respond to his offer to settle the case out of court. Peviar said if the district did not respond by then he would ask the U.S. District Court to reopen the case, which has been on hold in Pocatello since April 1991.

On June 25, the U.S. Supreme Court essentially upheld its 30-year ban on prayer in school, and Peviar asked the district to sign an agreement banning prayer at all school functions including graduation ceremonies. The agreement would eliminate any need for further court proceedings.

But while the ACLU maintains the high court ruling bans all prayer in public schools, the Madison School District and other prayer advocates contend the court indicated prayer was appropriate as long as administrators do not get involved in the decision.

Peviar has warned the district it faces substantially higher legal fees if it persists in defending its past prayer policy.

Two Rexburg families sued the district in late 1990, saying their civil rights were being violated by officials allowing prayer in the schools. The families have remained anonymous despite legal efforts by the district to expose their identities.

Department offers help to Indians

BOISE (AP) — In the wake of the Idaho Legislature's vote to try to stop casino gambling, state Department of Commerce officials are offering to help Indian tribes improve their economies without gaming.

Among the possibilities: handicrafts exports and business contracts for minority workers.

"With existing programs we could be more effective, if the tribes would enter into a partnership with us," said Karl Tuelker, the department's deputy director.

But Shoshone-Bannock spokesman Dave Archuleta said, "I'm not hearing anything new that the tribes don't have."

On Tuesday, tribal leaders saw their plans for reservation-sponsored gambling jeopardized when the lawmakers put an amendment banning casino gambling on the Nov. 3 ballot.

The tribes maintain they have no alternative to brighten their economic prospects and ease unemployment levels of 50 percent.

"Anytime the tribes try to get ahead through taxation, gaming, employment and business licenses, the state or its local entities step in and put a halt to tribal progress," said Kelsey Edmo Sr. of the Sho-Bans.

Jay Engstrom, the department's administrator of economic development, listed several alternatives to gaming, including:

- Handicrafts marketed overseas, including Japan, which recently sent a trade mission to buy samples.

Ruling expected to attract Haitians

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) - Refugee advocates said Thursday that a U.S. court's rejection of President Bush's order to return boat people quickly could prompt more Haitians to leave their country.

Scores of half-finished wooden boats sit on beaches north and west of this capital. The U.S. Coast Guard said cutters south of Florida and aircraft over the Windward Passage had not spotted any refugee boats at sea as of late Thursday.

"We're prepared for anything," Petty Officer Joe Dye, a Coast Guard spokesman, said by telephone from Miami. "We're planning on it (a new influx)."

"In Haiti, people live on hope," said Martene Dorleville, director of a semi-official Haitian refugees organization. "Anyone who sees a glimmer of hope will head in that direction."

Last week, at least 91 people died when a refugee boat sank just off the coast.

Since then, Prime Minister Marc Bazin's government has announced the arrests of 13 people accused of organizing refugee voyages.

Since the army overthrew elected President Jean-Bertrand Aristide in a coup in September, the Coast Guard has intercepted 36,980 Haitians and returned 27,242 of them to their homeland, Dye said. U.S. officials have found grounds for most of the others to seek political asylum.

Bush declared on May 24 that fleeing Haitians should be returned without a hearing, and the flow of refugees all but stopped.

Only one boatload of Haitians had been encountered this month, compared with more than 13,000 refugees picked up in May. All 150 refugees aboard the last boat were returned to Port-au-Prince on July 23.

Judge orders Honecker to remain in jail

BERLIN (AP) - Former East German leader Erich Honecker was ordered to remain in jail Thursday while awaiting trial on manslaughter charges.

His attorney, in a hint of international fireworks to come, disputed Germany's claim that the trial will be non-political.

Honecker, 79, appeared before a judge to hear an explanation of the manslaughter charges that he faces after being forced to return home Wednesday after 17 months of refuge in Moscow.

The hearing, in the Moabit prison complex where Honecker is held, was closed to the public and journalists. Officials announced that Judge Hansgeorg Braeutigam, who heads the Berlin District Court panel that will try Honecker, ordered that he remain in custody.

The trial is not expected to begin for at least a month.

Military explosives depot blast kills 2

RISHPON, Israel (AP) - A blast Thursday in a military explosives depot killed two people, injured 40 others and, for wary neighborhood residents, evoked the Persian Gulf War.

The explosion also brought demands to move the munitions factory that includes the depot to a less populous area.

Fire Commissioner Shlomo Cohen said authorities were investigating whether the cause was negligence or sabotage.

Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, who is also defense minister, said the explosion "did not occur in the course of work," contradicting reports that an experiment at the factory could have been at fault.

Explorer's bones to be buried in Russia

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) - The bones of the 18th century Danish navigator who discovered the Bering Strait will be returned to their grave off Russia's Kamchatka peninsula, now that researchers have completed studies of the remains.

Henning Jensen, the mayor of Horsens, the explorer's hometown, said Thursday that the remains of Vitus Bering will be reburied on Sept. 14 on Bering Island.

The Danish explorer was working for Czar Peter the Great in 1728 when he discovered the strait between Russia and Alaska that bears his name.

Bringing kids a-tooned to art

Political cartoonist draws youngsters to park workshop

TWIN FALLS - By day, Dale Hom works for the Forest Service; after hours, he toils away indoors - creating political cartoons for a newspaper in Alaska. Tomorrow, he will share his cartoon skills with a younger audience when he leads a workshop entitled "Tooning up" at Kids Art in the Park.

Hom's workshop was one of the first to fill up, according to Kids Art organizer Ruth Turner. The more the better, according to Hom.

"Kids are an easy audience," said Hom, who was raised in Seattle in a family filled with artists. "Kids still have a lot of their natural creativity, and they haven't yet been told that it's wrong to take risks."

Hom led a cartooning workshop at Sawtooth Elementary School last year, so he's well prepared for his Art in the Park adventure.

When Hom was a child, he liked to watch a Seattle TV artist named Brakeman Bill and a Seattle TV weatherman who specialized in cartoon weather reports. More recently, while working for the Forest Service in Alaska, he began testing his own cartoon skills professionally, at the newspaper where he is still under contract.

Hom's editorial cartoons, which run under the tag "Pine Needles," have addressed topics from Desert Storm to Michael Jordan to Earth Day. One depicts a frustrated animal standing beside a sign that reads, "Bull moose hunting area only." The caption? "Now that's sexual harassment."

Hom's cartoons, which have won awards from the Alaskan Press Women and the Alaskan Press Club, are done in pen and ink. Hom also dabbles in papier-mache and architectural graphics.

Working out of a basement office in his country home, Hom receives daily inspiration from a colorful poster hanging beside his desk. It's a montage of popular cartoon characters, jammed together Waldo style.

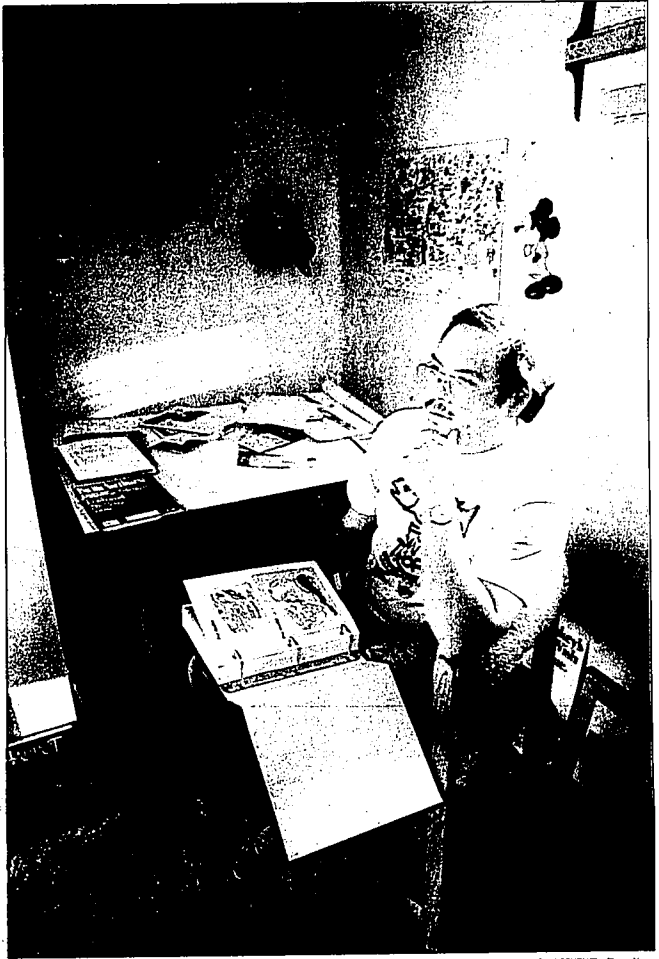
Hom's favorite comic strips range from Calvin and Hobbes to Hi & Lois to Blondie. He's especially partial to a Seattle cartoon called Adam, based on the life of a contemporary househusband.

Hom's own home and family life revolves around his wife, Rebecca, a professional storyteller and classical pianist, and their children, Marcus, 7, and Rachel, 3. The children have been helping Hom put his sketchbook in order for this weekend's classes.

"Whenever my children become critical of their artwork, I revert back to simple shapes, circles and dots," said Hom, who insists that anyone can learn to draw cartoons. "During the workshops, I will emphasize basic shapes and cartoon caricatures."

Not long ago, one of Hom's cartoon characters, shown plunking out tunes on a baby grand piano, graced a series of music association posters. Another cartoon, featuring nerve-racked employees juggling coffee cups and urgent memos, hangs on Hom's office wall at the Sawtooth National Forest Service. It's about

Books need to be part of every child's summer gear - and reading one of the skills he practices along with curve balls, back strokes and cartwheels. Reading, like many other skills, improves with practice and diminishes without it.

Researchers say that if a child reads only six books during school vacation, he will maintain the reading skill he had when school let out. If he does not, he is likely to have some catching up to do come September.

But, wait a minute! This is vacation, parents say. After months of monitoring homework assignments and study habits,

day in school or for homework.

"The biggest thing parents can do is let kids know reading is important," says Deborah Taylor, the head of the office of Idahoans for Literacy at Baltimore's Enoch Pratt Free Library.

And parents can clue their kids in to how important reading is in the same ways they communicate other values. Namely, by doing it themselves and by devoting family time, attention and money to the pursuit of it.

"The single most important factor influencing children's literacy is the amount of time they are read to. Factors such as vitamins, low-cholesterol foods or a private school education do not seem to matter," writes Steven Bialostok in his new book, "Raising Readers" (Penguin Publishers, Winnipeg).

Trips to the library can be family outings. It's a cool place to visit on hot days and "everybody can find something there," Taylor advises. Making time in a family's routine for regular library visits again shows children how important parents consider them, she adds.

Reading aloud is not something children outgrow when they learn to read themselves. "Upper elementary children still need to hear meanings in books, meanings that can only come from hearing books read aloud," Bialostok writes. "A sixth-grade child will want to read 'The Black Stallion' independently after hearing the book read aloud."

Being read to may also provide encouragement to a struggling reader, suggests a Reading is Fundamental publication, "Children,

Who Can Read But Don't." "The pleasure of listening to you read, rather than struggling alone, may restore your child's initial enthusiasm to books and reading," it says.

Youngsters like to read aloud, too. Encourage this. It not only promotes reading, but also boosts self-esteem and can be good family entertainment - for you as well as other youngsters.

Here are some other summer reading suggestions for parents from Graves and RIF publications:

- Set aside a reading time every day. The natural one is just before bed when everyone's settling down. You might also establish a "family reading" time - perhaps just after dinner - when everyone reads quietly for fun. This gives youngsters a chance to see mom and dad reading.
- Let older children "stay up" to read in bed for 15 or 30 minutes each night. It is a grown-up thing to do.
- Give books as gifts.
- Talk about what you have read - a newspaper story, for instance - with your children and ask them about what they are reading.
- Nudge reluctant readers with good non-fiction on subjects that interest them: sports, music, clothes, science, famous people.
- Let children help plan the family vacation. They can write ahead to chambers of commerce and travel offices requesting information. Then, when the material arrives, they will be inclined to read it and suggest destinations and activities. This has a "triple purpose," explains Graves. "The children are writing, they're getting mail and they're reading."

'Mo' Money' offers violence, few laughs

If you were the star and chief creative force behind one of the most popular comedy series on television, what would you do for your first movie as a major headliner?

How about a violent, low-grade crime thriller in which the jinks disappear after the first 30 minutes and macho posturing, with fists, guns and speeding cars, takes over for the remainder of the running time?

As perverse as that may seem, that's pretty much what Damon Wayans, star and creator of television's "In Living Color," has provided with "Mo' Money."

This dark and frequently bloody feature was written by Wayans and slickly directed by Peter Macdonald, whose best-known work is "Rambo III." The car crashes, not surprisingly, are far more effectively staged than the punchlines.

Wayans plays Johnny Stewart, a Chicago street hustler whose infatuation with the beautiful Amber Evans (Stacey Dash) drives him into taking a job in the mailroom of her company, a major credit card firm.

In his nervous sorting letters and avoiding the unwelcome advances of a gangly female co-worker (Almayvonne), Johnny discovers a plot to float stolen credit cards, masterminded by the company's sinister director of security (John Diehl, in an effective performance).

HONEY, I BLEW UP THE KID

PG. Honey, they fouled up the movie. The wild reduce-o artists of "Honey, I Shrank the Kids" return with more shtick: instead of shrinking his kids, mad scientist dad Rick Moranis now turns his 2½-year-old tot into a 112-foot Godzilla Baby marching on Las Vegas. Randal Kleiser directs, gracefully and Greaselessly. Over-obvious gags and special effects; wildly mugging acting; dozens of exits running around hysterically wherever Junior clumps down a foot. The whole picture is a big, bright happy blank, a balloon that never has the decency to burst.

A LEAGUE OF THEIR OWN (PG). Blessed with a pleasing comedy concept (World War II women's baseball), a funny director (Penny Marshall) and a cast that knows its way around the bases (Geena Davis, Tom Hanks, Madonna), this lightweight entertainment can't hold a lead. Starting out funny, it just about drowns in excessive sentimentality and unnecessary plot complications. "Saturday Night Live" veteran Jon Lovitz's brief cameo as a draft scout, however, is worth the price of admission.

PRELUDE TO A KISS (PG-13). Somehow combining "Love Story" with elements of "The Exorcist," this delicate romantic fable is a sweet meditation on the vagaries of love, what is based on, what it can withstand. Alec Baldwin and Meg Ryan brightly co-star as a made-for-TV couple whose world turns upside down when she kisses a strange old man at their wedding. Not as strong or pointed as it was on the stage, but still involving and out of the ordinary.

SISTER ACT (PG). Whoopi Goldberg on the lam in a convent is the not unfamiliar device that turns this clever film into the funniest mainstream comedy in who knows how long. A tribute to those often denigrated qualities, slickness and professionalism, "Sister Act" helped in no small measure by superlative supporting performances by Maggie Smith, Kathy Najimy, Mary Wickes and Wendy Makkena, is just about as good as Hollywood gets. 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Groups start explaining reasons for PG, PG-13 films

HOLLYWOOD — The Motion Picture Association of America and the National Association of Theatre Owners, which administer the movie rating system, said that they will begin providing explanations of why movies are rated PG (parental guidance suggested) and PG-13 (parents are strongly cautioned... some material may be inappropriate for children under 13).

Until now, the adult categories, R and NC-17, have been the only two to include an explanatory note stating the rationale for the rating decision. For example, the erotic thriller "Basic Instinct" received an R rating and carried the explanation that the movie contains "strong violence and sensuality" and "drug use and language."

In contrast, no explanation was offered to parents to describe the PG-13 rating of the current "Batman Returns." Some parents have expressed confusion about the film's suitability for young children because it is being marketed for all ages. The new system would have given parents more information about the movie.

MPPA President Jack Valenti said the timing of the new policy was "coincident" with the national political debate about family issues and some conservatives' criticism that the entertainment industry is indifferent to "family values."

The move is the first adjustment to the 24-year-old voluntary movie rating system since September 1990, when the NC-17 label replaced what formerly had been the "X" rating for adults-only

films. At that time, the MPPAA began sending out explanations of the R and NC-17 ratings to theaters, film critics and to video retailers.

"Our feedback from parents and exhibitors indicates they have been pleased with the explanations on R-rated movies," Valenti said. "Now we want to extend it to the other ratings."

No explanatory statements will accompany the G rating, which advises that a movie is considered acceptable for all age groups.

Among the first films to receive the new explanations in this week's list of newly rated movies is Warner Bros.' "Christopher Columbus: The Discovery," starring Tom Selleck and Martin Brando, due in theaters Aug. 21. The film was rated PG-13, for "some action violence, and for nudity."

Studio changes 'Looters' movie name to 'Trespass'

Fall video releases leave dealers upbeat

LAS VEGAS, Nev. — The talk of the Video Software Dealers Association convention here this week was the industry's rebound from last year's slump and the prospects of a strong fall lineup that will boost this year's revenues well ahead of 1991.

The annual gathering of the nation's video retailers was more upbeat than last year, when the industry's total revenues fell late just to stay even with 1990, at an estimated \$14 billion to \$15 billion. The projections for 1992 revenue range as high as \$16 billion.

The key to the year's success is the fall offerings, which is expected to include some very appealing titles. The only major release that has been announced so far is Disney's "Beauty and the Beast," which is due Oct. 30 at \$25. In the sales market, this should be the blockbuster of the

season, with a shipment, some speculate, in the 16 million to 20 million copy range. That would break the industry record held by another Disney video, "Fantasia."

What really had retailers salivating is the lineup of other films they expect to hit the home video market in October and November: "Basic Instinct," "Alien 3," "Lethal Weapon 3" and "Sister Act."

The summer's big hit, "Batman Returns," is also projected for a November release, possibly at a sales-market price of \$20 to \$25. Three other early summer hits — "Patriot Games," "Housesitter" and "Unlawful Entry" — should be put in December to take advantage of the lucrative Christmas market.

Swimmers excel; Miller wins gymnastics silver

BARCELONA, Spain — Butterflies, bullseyes, baskets and baldies. BINGO! America broke the bank Thursday at the Summer Olympics.

Melvin Stewart, the wettest, wildest dude on the team, started an American beach party that, with six events still left, gave U.S. swimmers more medals than they had in 1988 at Seoul.

“It's the Olympic Games. It's not a party, it's a celebration,” said Stewart, who knows something about both. He once was caught caving naked through a girls' prep school dorm at 2 a.m.

That might rule him out as presidential material, but he's the king of the butterfly. For America, it was ready, aim, fire — on the rifle range and the basketball court. On the volleyball court, the U.S. men proved once again that bald is beautiful with a hair-rising victory over Spain.

Even in gymnastics, when world champion Kim Zmeskal bumbled her way to 10th, 15-year-old Shannon Miller won a silver medal in the women's all-around. It's the best all-around finish ever for an American woman at a meet with the former Soviets.

“I'm very proud to bring the silver medal back to the United States,” Miller said. Launi Meili, a 29-year-old who turned gunslinger in the seventh grade, became only the second American woman to win an Olympic individual shooting event, capturing the three-

Track and field competition set to begin

BARCELONA, Spain — Olympic track and field, tarnished by Big Ben's drug use in 1988, is tarnished by Baby Ben even as it begins this time.

The sport that has spent four years trying to recover from the Ben Johnson scandal at the Seoul Games is troubled again. The problem now is a runner who once idolized Johnson.

On the eve of today's start of competition, British sprinter Jason Livingston — “Baby Ben” because of

his resemblance to Johnson — was sent home by team officials after testing positive for steroid use in a random test two weeks ago.

It was an inauspicious start for the nine-day competition, which already was suffering from the absence of some of its biggest names — including women's sprint champion Katrin Krabbe and Olympic heroes such as Roger Kingdom and Edwin Moses.

Carl Lewis will not be defending his 100-meter title, and world champion Dan O'Brien won't be seeking a record in the decathlon. Florence Griffith Joyner is

abdicated her throne as the queen of speed.

Griffith Joyner retired after winning the 100 and 200 in Seoul. Kingdom's quest for a third straight title in the 110-meter hurdles ended when he failed to qualify for the U.S. team, and O'Brien also flopped at the U.S. trials in June.

Krabbe, the German who won the women's 100 and 200 at last year's world championships, spent this spring battling to clear herself of charges she manipulated a drug test. She won her battle in late June, but said she was not

NEW YORK — The New York Mets would like to make a deal, any deal.

But heading for Friday night's waiver deadline it doesn't look promising that the Mets can swing a big trade. They talked to the Philadelphia Phillies about Lenny Dykstra, but the Phillies said forget it.

Several teams in contention will be looking to acquire some veteran help in the hours leading up to midnight. Thereafter, a player must clear waivers to be traded.

“I think you'll see some trades,” Mets general manager Al Harazin said. “It's getting harder to get through waivers. It's not automatic, anymore.”

Teams like the Toronto Blue Jays and New York Yankees figure to lose some minor-league prospects in the expansion draft, so they might trade off some excess talent for a veteran. The Blue Jays could use a pitcher now that Juan Guzman is hurting.

When Greg Maddux turned down the Cubs' \$28 million offer, there was talk he might be traded. But with Chicago in contention all of a sudden ... forget it. The Bleacher Bums would storm Wrigley Field.

The California Angels are not in contention and would trade Jim Abbott or Chuck Finley if the price was right.

The Blue Jays would just about wrap things up in the AL East with such an acquisition. More likely, however, is a pitcher such as Bob Ojeda of Los Angeles. The Kansas City Royals are also looking to dump some pitchers, including Mike Boddicker and Tom Gordon.

Late-season acquisitions can often make the difference between a pennant and second place.

Hall of Famers Enos Slaughter, Johnny Mize and Eddie Mathews made the trip and so did 300-game winners Gaylord Perry, Don Sutton and Phil Niekro. All traded late in the year, each going to a team looking for one final piece of the puzzle.

Commissioner takes the stand in NFL trial

MINNEAPOLIS — The NFL's restrictive free-agency system is necessary to retain competitive balance in the league, commissioner Paul Tagliabue testified Thursday in the antitrust case brought by eight players.

Tagliabue was the league's first witness in the five-week-old federal trial of a suit against the NFL over its Plan B free-agency system. The eight players say the system restricts them from offering their services around the league when their contracts expire.

Tagliabue testified that Plan B, the college draft, roster size limits, the waiver system, and revenue sharing all help assure that the worst teams and the least financially stable teams have a fair chance to sign the best players.

Without those rules, wealthy teams and teams in large media markets like New York and Los Angeles would be able to attract more than their share of star players, Tagliabue said. Ultimately, those teams would dominate the league and fans would lose interest in the NFL, he contended.

As evidence, Tagliabue pointed to the All-American Football Conference, which competed with the NFL from 1946 through 1954. Many of the league's players were World War II veterans who were free agents.

Some Olympic athletes are driven by something deep in their soles

BARCELONA, Spain — Next time, down in Atlanta, we're going to make the Olympics real. We're going to throw away these silly flags — the Stars and Stripes, the tri-color, the Union Jack. They were fine back in the days of nationhood, when a birthplace meant something to an athlete, when patriots played the Games. But now you use those flags to shine your shoes. Today's champions pledge allegiance to the swoosh of the United Shoes of America, and to the arches on which they stand: one tongue, under lace, with traction and balance for all.

By Atlanta, we'll boil it down to the world's great teams. Nike, Reebok, adidas, Mizuno. Yeah, Cuba, too. There once was a U.S. Track and Field team, but no more. Danny Everett accuses men's coach Mel Rosen of nominating Michael Johnson for the 4x400 relay, because Rosen said Johnson works for Nike. Carl Lewis appears at a news conference, but not one sanctioned or arranged by the U.S. Olympic Committee. Not his first one, anyway. That one came under the auspices of Mizuno, in the stifling basement of a Barcelona hotel — and, yes, that was the president of Mizuno, care-

fully fanning Carl's heated brow. Reebok unintentionally pumped up more discord by getting the USOC contract for the Official Award Warm-up Suit. The one the USOC actually expects Michael Jordan to wear. Jordan won a gold medal as a collegian in 1984. He has done a lot of dunking since then. All of that dunking has been done in Nikes. This is the company that named a shoe for him. This is the company that teamed Jordan with Spike Lee, with money for both. This is the company that told the NBA it couldn't use Jordan in its licensing anymore. Jordan is much more a Nike man than he is a U.S. Olympian, or a Chicago Bull for that matter.

So a picture of Michael Jordan in Reebok gear would have some value, like Nolan Ryan's Jackie card. But you'll see it on approximately the same day Charlton Heston signs up with Greenpeace. Right? Not according to the USOC. Not according to Spatterey. Harvey Schiller, the USOC's executive director, who stamped his foot Thursday: "It is mandatory policy" that any athlete taking part in an official medal ceremony in Barcelona will wear this apparel, whether they like it or not. "It is included in the code of conduct for all members of our delegation." When it comes to codes of conduct, Schiller is a real purist. He

only took a few free ski-slope passes in Utah, a lapse that earned him a USOC reprimand but did not cost him his job. Michael Plant, an Olympic speed skater at Lake Placid 12 years ago, is now the chairman of the USOC athletes' advisory council. His indignation surprised Schiller's. He pointed out that U.S. athletes formulated USOC Code of Conduct Rule 14, which mandates the Official Award Warm-up Suit. "It is mandatory that these regulations be adhered to by all 610 Olympians," Plant said. "Every athlete, regardless of their sport, their popularity, or their financial situation, must follow USOC regulations in order to compete on the US Olympic Team. There can be no exceptions."

Not even for Michael Jordan? "They (the Dream Team) must realize that they are 12 of 610 American athletes," Plant said. Then he put together the sentence that opened the lid of the US volcano, and let us see all the trey but-tings below: "If the U.S. Olympic Men's Basketball Team is fortunate enough to win the gold medal, their victory does not allow them to set up and follow their own rules and regulations," Plant stated. If they're fortunate enough. Hey, basketball's a funny game. Lithuania might come out overconfident, and Jordan, Magic and the Mailman might get the idea they can play with these guys, and who knows?

For Zmeskal, 10 years of work vanishes with minor missteps

BARCELONA, Spain — It has happened to you, so you must know how Kim Zmeskal feels. It happens to everybody. You give something all your love, all your everything, for years, and then it dies or disappears or something, and your life is never quite the same.

It happened to Kim Zmeskal almost before the greatest flying circus of them all even began Thursday night.

She flopped a foot a few inches out of bounds on a double flip ending her floor exercise, the first event of the most magnificent of Olympics gymnastics, the women's all-around.

Suddenly the United States' world champion was back in the pack, just another underdog-looking robot wondering, "After 10 years, how could this happen?"

Zmeskal stands 4 feet 7 inches, and weighs 80 pounds, and has the face of a waif who hasn't had a square meal in her entire 10 years.

Tears poured out of that face in huge floods when she made the slip that ended a decade into the deepest disappointment that can come to what we used to call tumblers but who now can command millions of dollars, as Mary Lou Retton did, for winning the all-around gold.

Zmeskal was crying so hard she almost could not talk. Long after first Team all-around medalist Shannon Miller of the United States and bronze medalist Lavinia Milosovici of Romania had come and gone from the interviews, Zmeskal was weeping as though, yes, something had died.

"Even if I hadn't gone out of bounds, I still wouldn't have won," she said between sobs. "Even when I hit, I didn't make the scores, it was not the best day of my life."

She actually finished 10th. She

can come back and win one of the individual golds in either the floor exercise or vault (her two best events), but it won't be the same as the all-around. "There's nothing in all the world like the all-around," Retton herself had said just a little earlier. "I had no idea how winning it would change

my life. Sometimes even now, when I'm 24 years old and married, eight years after I won in Los Angeles, I lie awake and wonder what my life would have been like if I hadn't won." And Zmeskal will lie awake and wonder what her life would have been like if she had won.

Drugs again play a part

BARCELONA, Spain — On the day before Canadian sprinter Ben Johnson was scheduled to return to the Summer Games, his positive drug test from four years ago at Seoul continued to cast a shadow over the Olympic movement.

The British Olympic Association sent three athletes home Thursday after discovering that they failed random tests for performance-enhancing drugs earlier this month in Great Britain. One of them was promising young sprinter Jason Livingston, who has modeled his career after Johnson's to the extent that he is known as "Baby Ben."

The two other British athletes were weightlifters, dumping more scandal on a sport considered so prominent. International Olympic committee member has suggested that it be eliminated from the Games.

Also on Thursday, the German Swimming Federation's doping control expert resigned amid complaints that he has been too vigilant in attempting to rid the sport of banned substances, as news from the front of international sport's war against drugs again threatened to taint the Summer Olympics.

Above all else, the 1988 Games at Seoul will be remembered for the positive test for an anabolic steroid that resulted in Johnson's disqualification after he won the 100 meters in world-record time.

But nine other athletes also tested positive at Seoul, including five weightlifters.

After two Bulgarian gold medalists were disqualified, the remainder of the team withdrew to avoid testing. Afterwards, IOC Executive Board member Richard Pound of Canada recommended that weightlifting be dropped from the program.

Davis stars as U.S. women demolish Czechs by 56 points

BARCELONA, Spain — It took four years, five screws and two years longer than expected, but Charissa Davis finally assumed her proper place in women's basketball.

Davis received the honor of starting the first U.S. women's game Thursday, and she made the most of it, scoring 12 of her 16 points in the first half as the U.S. romped to a Dream Team-like 56-point victory over Czechoslovakia.

The U.S. women set Olympic records for points scored and margin of victory in the 111-55 win.

"We wanted to send a message to the world," said Davis, a 6-1 forward. "We wanted everyone to know that we're going to pressure the ball in and putting on pressure-defense until the last buzzer. And we showed that."

For Davis, it was the culmination of a dream that was painfully delayed. In 1987-88, Davis was averaging nearly 25 points a game for the University of Texas. She was one of the top players in the country. There was little doubt that she was going to make the Olympic team.

But she suffered a knee injury of monumental proportions. Two

ligaments were torn, one was stretched, five screws were torn. She underwent surgery Jan. 1, 1988. She still has the five screws in her knee.

But she was determined. She approached her rehabilitation with the resolve of a great athlete. Six months later, after an injury that usually requires at least a one-year recovery, she participated in the Olympic trials.

She could not go at full speed, however, and although she was selected as an alternate, she was unable to participate in the 1988 Seoul Olympics.

She returned to Texas for her senior year, and averaged 26.3 points. The last three years, she has played in Italy and Japan. And now she is here.

"I think today was the first time that the reality that I'm really part of this team took place," she said after the game. "When we came out in uniforms and the crowd was there and everyone was excited, I really felt a part of this team."

Davis was so committed to playing in the Olympics that she postponed her wedding until next summer. After the Olympics, she will return to Japan, where there is a thriving women's professional league.

fulfill a goal, there is one huge negative in her life. Her stepfather recently suffered a stroke. Davis prefers not to talk about the details, but she said Thursday that his health is so poor that he cannot watch the games on TV.

"Since I started playing basketball, he's always been at every game," Davis said. "He never misses a game. He even left the hospital once when I was in high school to see one. He's been my biggest fan. I just going to play hard for him. I know if he could be here, he would be cheering me on."

The U.S. women are attempting to win their third consecutive Olympic Gold Medal, and although they are not expected to do it as easily as the Dream Team, they are clearly the class of the tournament.

They also are in a weak pool. Neither China nor Spain are considered as good as the Czechs. Three teams in the opposite pool — Cuba, the Unified Team and Brazil — have good teams, but only two of those will qualify for the medal round.

The U.S. women play a day off Friday, then play China on Saturday.

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Denver Broncos suffer another reversal: Vance Johnson injured

John Elway may have trouble finding his receivers this season if a run of bad luck continues for the Denver Broncos.

Wide receiver Vance Johnson will be sidelined about three months after surgery for a tear in his right shoulder. Johnson injured the shoulder Monday and swelling led doctors to believe the pectoral muscle was torn — a diagnosis confirmed during exploratory surgery Thursday.

"He's much further ahead than he was last year," Henschaw said. "Whether he's going to have the consistency to do it day-in and day-out, that remains to be seen."

Atlanta and first-round draft pick Tony Smith have not come to terms on a contract, with camp set to open Saturday at Suwanee, Ga.

Smith, a running back from Southern Mississippi, said he is making the best of it by keeping with his training regimen of lifting weights and running on alternate days.

Colts
Backup quarterback Jack Trudeau doesn't have a contract agreement with the Colts, despite the announcement of a deal by club owner Robert Irsay. Trudeau's agent said Thursday.

Leigh Steinberg, Trudeau's agent, said more meetings were planned Thursday. Irsay had told The Indianapolis Star late Wednesday that Trudeau was ready to sign.

"We had a nice three-, four-, five-hour meeting and it looks like we have come to terms with Mr. Steinberg," Irsay said. "We're preparing the documents around Mr. Steinberg's (recommendation). Jimmy and I are very pleased, as is Mr. Steinberg. It's very nice to have Jack taken care of."

Trudeau, 29, earned a base salary of \$775,000 last year and reportedly is seeking a base salary in the \$1.5 million range. The Colts are seeking something closer to \$1 million.

Starter Jeff George had some of his best passing Thursday since camp began after getting limited action Wednesday, coach Ted Marchibroda said.

"Jeff threw extremely well after the day's rest," said Marchibroda, who said he cut down George's work Wednesday because he had thrown a lot since reporting July 16 for two-a-day workouts.

Raiders-Cardinals
The Raiders and Cardinals had a half-closed showing of punching matches before a crowd of about 500 at Northern Arizona University at Flagstaff, Phoenix coach Joe Bugel called it "all good, clean fun."

He said nothing would keep him away from the ceremonies, even though he will rely on crutches and the physical support of his son, Lem Barney III, and former teammate Mel Farr.

Barney was a second-round draft pick of the Lions in 1968, out of Division II Jackson State. He quickly established himself as one of the finest cornerbacks in the NFL and a threat every time he touched the ball on an interception, punt or kickoff return.

But that isn't what he had foreseen. "My original dream from high school (in Gulfport, Miss.) was to be the first Afro-American quarterback to start in the National Football League," Barney said. "After getting to college, I understood what athletic politics were when I ran up against two juniors and the No. 1 quarterback in the state."

"After that, my freshman year I switched from offense to defense. ... I came from the type of background where if a coach said, 'I'm looking for ballplayers, Lem Barney, where do you play?'

I'd say, 'I'll play anywhere you want me to play, I'll play offensive tackle if needed.'"

That was never necessary, although opponents might have felt his presence on every aspect of the Lions. He totaled 56 interceptions in his 11 years as a pro. He scored 11 touchdowns, including a 98-yard kickoff return, a 94-yard field-goal return, a 74-yard punt return and a 71-yard interception return.

Despite his contributions, the Lions never played in a championship game during his career. "After leaving football (in 1977), people had said, 'When are you going into the Hall of Fame?' (I knew I had the numbers, but being on a championship team or even a contending team eluded me)," he said. "But everything else was there for the opportunity to go in."

Barney, 46, works in public relations for a Detroit utility and also is in his 13th season as a color commentator on college football games on the Black Entertainment Television cable network.

Riggins accumulated 11,352 yards rushing (sixth best all-time) and 116

touchdowns (third best) in his 14 seasons. While with the Redskins, the Kansas graduate was the most valuable player in the 1983 Super Bowl with a record 38 carries for 166 yards.

Mackey was the prototype of the modern tight end, a strong blocker with breakaway speed. Six of his nine touchdown receptions in 1969 covered at least 50 yards.

In nine seasons with the Colts and one with the San Diego Chargers, he totaled 331 receptions for 5,236 yards and 38 touchdowns. He also was respected off the field for his work as president of the NFL Players Association.

Davis' resume includes 30 years making the Raiders one of the most successful franchises in professional sports. He has served the team as a head coach, general manager and owner. He also was commissioner of the American Football League at the time of its merger with the NFL.

Over the last 29 seasons with the Raiders — whom he shifted from Oakland to Los Angeles in 1982 — his teams have a .670 winning percentage.

Knox shares lead at Hartford after overcoming back trouble

CROMWELL, Conn. (AP) — Kenny Knox was desperate for a pain-free round. A five-minute golf lesson proved to be great medicine.

Not only did Knox feel good in the Greater Hartford Open on Thursday — the first time in two months his back hasn't bothered him — he also played well. He shot a 6-under-par 64 to tie Ed Humenik for the first-round lead.

Ted Schmitz and Sonny Skinner were a stroke back, just ahead of a pack of eight golfers at 4-under.

Knox's main concern entering Thursday's round was his health. He had missed two tournaments with a bulging disk that made even walking up stairs difficult. He said wearing a back brace two weeks ago during the Chattanooga Classic was a disaster.

"I don't feel like I can be competitive with it on," Knox said.

His back felt a little better during Wednesday's pro-am, and following his round he asked Jim McLean, Tom Kite's coach, for advice. A five-minute lesson was a tonic for Knox's ailing game.

"He'd been watching me for a couple of years and knew what I was doing wrong but he didn't want to interfere with my teacher," Knox said.

The swing Knox had been seeking to recapture since 1986 — his best year on tour — came back immediately. McLean helped Knox simplify his swing so he doesn't have to worry as much about mechanics.

"He gave me something that enabled me to recapture the rhythm that I'd lost for so long," he said. "I started hitting the ball solid again. I've always said that when I hit the ball solid I can play with anybody."

Knox had tried many different methods to regain his swing over the years. Despite past failures, he is confident — convinced, he said — he's found the solution.

"Because I've had success in the past I know when it's right," said Knox, who has three tour victories.

4 will enter Football Hall of Fame Saturday

Barney needed approval from his doctors to be able to attend. He is still fending off a painful infection that set in after surgery on his Achilles' heel in May.

Jockey must sit out 4 days

LONDON (AP) — Jockey Steve Cauthen was suspended for four days on Thursday for misuse of the whip, marking only the third time he has been set down since arriving from the United States in 1978.

The suspension imposed by Jockey Club stewards will sideline Cauthen from Aug. 8-11.

Cauthen, a multiple winner of Britain's jockey championship and winner of the Triple Crown, was suspended after using his whip 13 times on Witness Bud during the running of the Goodwood Cup Thursday.

"It was done in the heat of the moment, but I don't feel I was abusing the horse," said Cauthen. "He is a lazy horse, and every time I hit him he was responding."

Cauthen criticized the whip rule, introduced this season to protect horses from excessive use of the whip.

"I admit I hit the horse down the shoulder, but I think it is a bad rule — particularly to do with hitting horses down the shoulder," Cauthen said. "Basically, we have been taught to ride that way all our lives."

"The rule was brought in because some Irish jockeys flogged some tired horses over jumps at Cheltenham," he said.

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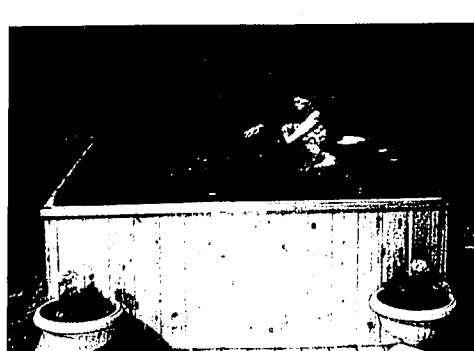

Turning point in the Pacific Theater

Guadalcanal marks end of Japanese advance, threat to Australian continent

At 9:09 a.m. on Aug. 7, 1942 — exactly eight months after Pearl Harbor — the first war landed on Guadalcanal's Red Beach.

The 1st Marine Division, mostly applegreen and carrying bolt-action Springfield rifles from an earlier world war, waded in.

Over the next six months and two days, history would be written in blood on this 90-mile-long junk of island jungle.

"Guadalcanal is not a name but an emotion," wrote historian Samuel Eliot Morison, "recalling desperate fights in the air, furious night naval battles, frantic work at supply or construction, savage fighting in the sudden jungle, nights broken by screaming bombs and deafening explosions of naval shells."

Guadalcanal was a turning point — the original steppingstone for later invasions of Tarawa, Saipan, Peleliu, Iwo Jima, Okinawa, each island a hopscotch step closer to Tokyo Bay.

And it was on Guadalcanal that a leatherneck legacy dawned in World War II. It provided the first indeclinable images of



Marines assaulting a beach and raising the U.S. flag on Japanese ground — the blueprint for Pacific victory.

"I can't say we started the Marine Corps reputation, but we bumished it a bit," said John B. Sweeney, a native of Columbus, Ohio, and a company commander of Marine Raiders on Guadalcanal.

"A lot of the guys — the fighters, the privates — they stuck at their posts and did everything that was asked, sometimes almost impossible tasks," Sweeney said. "And a lot of people got killed along the way. A lot of good men. You can't forget them."

To be sure, Guadalcanal wasn't just a Marine Corps show. Every branch of the U.S. military — the Navy, Coast Guard, Army and combined air forces — had a hand

in the battle on the ground, in the skies and on the seas.

This was total war, and it took bullets, bayonets, battleships, bombers and bulldozers to pay the first horrible installment on the price of victory.

Guadalcanal was the first U.S. offensive of World War II, and the first time the Japanese Imperial Army lost a piece of ground. It was an obscure place for one of history's turning points.

Located in the lower Solomon Islands, Guadalcanal was a largely uninhabitable British protectorate. The Japanese seized it and cobbled an airstrip out of the jungle from which they could menace Australia, 1,000 miles to the southeast.

To stop them, President Roosevelt dispatched the Marines. They captured the airstrip and named it after Maj. Lofton Henderson, a Marine dive bomber pilot killed in the June at the battle of Midway, the turning point at sea.

The full force of the Tokyo war machine tried to take back Henderson Field. Three times, the Japanese scheduled U.S. surrender ceremonies, only to be thwarted by Marines.

During a dozen charges in a Sept. 12-14

battle, the Japanese came within 1,000 yards of capturing the field. But Marine Raiders and paratroopers held on their last line of defense — Bloody Ridge or Edson's Ridge, named for Col. Merritt A. Edson, the commander of the 1st Raider Battalion. "We were told we had to stay until you die to hold the line," said Thomas Mullahey, a platoon leader on the ridge. "We never felt we'd get out of it actually. We thought we'd either be paraded in cages in Tokyo or be pulling rickshaws somewhere. It came out our way. By the skin of our teeth."

For a hint of how tough it was, every Marine who wasn't on the island knew the rhyme: "Say a prayer for your pal on Guadalcanal."

For starters, a 76ship Navy task force withdrew on Aug. 9, with half the Marines equipment and too much of their food still aboard. Tokyo Rose taunted the marooned Marines, who ate palm tree roots and coconuts to augment their meager rations. On average, a combatant lost 25 pounds.

The slop and seum of Guadalcanal featured clouds of mosquitos, jungle rot, dysentery, leeches and tropical downpours. Grunts who survived combat faced the

alternating fever and chill of malaria; Marine wasn't pulled off the line unless the temperature soared past 104 degrees.

And then there were the Japanese screaming "Banzai!" or "Long live the emperor!" — as they charged. They were flushed with Bushido, the ancient samurai code of preferring death to the disgrace of surrender.

The Japanese had pushed the American off Guam, Wake, Bataan and Corregidor and they figured to do the same on Guadalcanal. In 97 minutes on one night Japanese battleships hit Henderson with 91 rounds from their 14-inch guns.

"It seemed like it lasted forever. Day after day of getting bombed, shelled, shot at. You never got any real sleep, never got any real food," said Victor Croizat, a retired Marine colonel.

"But nobody was going to drive us out ...," Croizat said. "We were there to stay. You're damned if you're going to let the Marine Corps down and damned if you're going to let your outfit down."

When things were at their worst

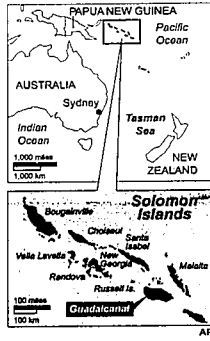

Ceremonies will mark historic battle

The national commemoration of the battle of Guadalcanal will include a 10:30 a.m. wreath-laying ceremony at the U.S. Marine Corps Memorial in Washington, D.C., on Aug. 7.

The memorial is the high point of the annual reunion of the 1st Marine Division Association. Veterans of the U.S. Army's American and 25th divisions will also take part.

On Guadalcanal, at dawn local time on Aug. 7, the new U.S. memorial will be officially dedicated. Carved in stone are these words: "May this memorial endure the ravages of time until the wind, rain and tropical storms wear away its face but never its memories."

On Aug. 8, two obelisk memorials will be dedicated at Bloody Ridge and at Henderson Field. Six other obelisks are being built.

and three others damaged in Japanese victory.

Dec. 9 — 1st Marine Division relieved by Army's American and 25th divisions and elements of the 2nd Marine Division. Maj. Gen. Archer Vandegrift tells his departing Marines that Guadalcanal was "a synonym for death and disaster in the language of our enemy."

Feb. 9, 1943 — Guadalcanal declared secure after the last 13,000 Japanese abandon the battlefield for transport ships.

Battle for Guadalcanal

The Japanese had seized Guadalcanal, a British protectorate located in the Solomon Islands, and were building an airstrip out of the jungle from which they could menace Australia, 1,000 miles to the southeast. The U.S. decided to take the airstrip.

1 Aug. 7 — The initial landings by the 1st Marine Division at Red Beach on Guadalcanal were unopposed and Marines quickly captured the abandoned airstrip and formed a perimeter. They named their camp Henderson Field. Marines hitting the northern islands encountered heavy Japanese resistance and fighting was fierce. After securing the area, Marine units were sent to help on Guadalcanal.

2 Aug. 20 — First U.S. combat aircraft flew in to Henderson Field.

3 Aug. 21 — First Japanese attempt to reclaim airstrip repulsed at midnight Tenaru River.

4 Oct. 23-27 — Japanese reinforces a third time, landing troops at Cape Esperance. They attempted their last and largest ground assault with a three-pronged attack while naval and air forces bombed the airstrip. U.S. Marines, backed by U.S. Army's 164th Infantry Regiment, repulsed the attack.

 commanders quietly drew up plans to have troops march into the jungle and fight as guerrillas.

But reinforcements arrived to beat the last and largest Japanese offensive Oct. 23-27. The Sendai Division tried a three-pronged assault supported by naval and air power. Their first general order was: "Do not expect to return, not even one man, if occupation is not successful."

One of the last Japanese assaults failed in front of Mitchell Paige, a machine-gunner who won the Medal of Honor. Near the end of a seven-hour battle, Paige cradled his 42-pound, water-cooled gun in his arms and draped two belts of ammo around his neck. He yelled to some infantrymen: "Fix bayonets and follow me." Then he charged.
 "It took me 15 years before I could talk about it," said Paige. "A Marine is like a well-oiled machine. You know in your own heart and your own mind the guys on your left and your right are going to fight to the death. It's your job. I felt confident we could whip any fighting force in the world."

On Guadalcanal, uncommon valor was a common occurrence.

Of the 30 men in Lt. Paul Moore's platoon, only six survived unscathed. Ten were killed and the others were wounded or sickened. Moore — awarded the Navy Cross, Silver Star and Purple Heart — took a bullet through his chest, made his confession and commended himself to God.

"If I get out of this, maybe it means I should do something special," Moore thought.

He did. The warrior was ordained an Episcopal priest, and as a man of God, he later became the bishop of New York.

"It was a just war, if there is any such thing," Moore said. "There was a real sense of camaraderie among us. You were really fighting more for the Marine Corps than for the United States. We were stuck there, so we had to stick together. What the hell are you going to do? You life is in

each other's hands every moment of the day. It's a terrible responsibility."
 Air power was pivotal in the way things turned out. Henderson Field opened Aug. 20 under the name Cactus Air Force. With the help of the construction battalions, the planes kept flying, sometimes with fuel or parts taken from wrecked aircraft.

Among the 15 Medals of Honor awarded during the Guadalcanal campaign, five went to Marine aviators. One was Capt. Joe Foss, who bettered Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker's World War I record of 25 kills to become the new ace of aces. "Marines have the best esprit de corps. The thing that a lot of people don't realize was the dedication of the people that were there. They put their lives on the line everyday," said Foss, later the governor of South Dakota and president of the National Rifle Association.

From the generals to the privates, we had one thing on our minds — get the job done and go home. The historians called it a turning point. Of course, we didn't know it at the time. We were just battling to knock those suckers down.

At sea, seven major battles were fought. So much war junk from both sides went to the bottom that the turquoise waters around the island were called Ironbottom Sound.

The U.S. Navy suffered perhaps the worst defeat in its history on Aug. 9, when three American cruisers and an Australian one were sunk in less than 60 slam-bang minutes off Savo Island.

But in the naval battle of Guadalcanal in mid-November, the Japanese lost two battleships, a cruiser, three destroyers and 10 transports, fanning men and equipment to the island.

"We've got the bastards licked!" declared Admiral William "Bull" Halsey, who took command in the South Pacific on Oct. 18.

Back on the ground, the 1st Marine Division was relieved Dec. 9 by the Army's Americal and 25th Divisions and elements of the 2nd Marine Division.

The fresh troops pushed the Japanese off the island. It was declared secure Feb. 9, 1943, after the last 13,000 Japanese fled to transport ships.

In the end, naval losses were roughly equal; each side had 24 warships sunk. In the air, Japan lost 682 aircraft, 446 of them combat planes.

U.S. air losses were 615 planes, including 264 combat planes.

The human cost was greater. The U.S. death toll included 1,769 ground forces (1,207 of them

Marines), 4,911 men at sea and 420 in the air.

But Japanese fatalities were four times greater. The Japanese lost 25,600 troops on the ground, 3,500 at sea and 1,200 in the air.

And that is how the Japanese came to call Guadalcanal the Island of Death. "It set the stage for the rest of the war. Once we were able to hold on, it gave everybody a lift," said George MacGillivray, then a Marine corporal.

The amphibious tactics were a model for getting troops ashore in

North Africa, Sicily, Anzio and Normandy. And even in later years, every Marine shared the lore and myth of Guadalcanal.

If these gun ho fighters could take on the Rising Sun's empire, commanders didn't hesitate to use them — some would say misuse them — at Inchon in Korea, at Da Nang as the first U.S. combat troops sent to Vietnam in 1965, at Beirut as an ill-fated 1983 peacekeeping force and at Kuwait City as liberators.

Fifty years later, Guadalcanal's capital city of Honiara, a sleepy port

that didn't exist in 1942, sits near Red Beach.

Japan's money, not its military, exert influence. Honiara's only hotel, the Mendana, is owned by the Japanese. So is half the island's tuna factory. The Japanese are building a new terminal at Henderson International Airport, the landing strip that so many merited for.

And demolition crews still uncover and detonate leftover bombs that litter the island, their explosions a distant echo of what happened 50 years ago.

Stocks push upward on carryover, buy-programs; pace slows

NiW YORK — The Dow Industrials rose 12 points to close at 3,391 on carryover from the substantial gains in the last two sessions and on program buying, traders said. But trading volume fell dramatically from Wednesday's breakeven pace. The gain occurred despite a listless U.S. bond market, where a sharp rally, accompanied by falling long-term interest rates, had finally triggered the Dow's 93-point, unidirectional gain on Tuesday and Wednesday. Thursday's advance in stocks was widely attributed to follow-through action on the part of institutional investors playing catch-up with portfolio adjustments, buying by trend-following technical traders and purchases at mid-afternoon associated with index arbitrageurs.

But Thursday's U.S. economic statistics, while reinforcing the same prospects, were not so much as to be the broad market, traders agreed. The government released its preliminary estimate of second-quarter real gross domestic product, showing a 1.4 percent rise, near the mean Wall Street expectation of 1.5 percent. GNP had risen nearly twice as much, at a 2.7 percent rate, in the first quarter. New state unemployment claims for the week ended July 18 were down 21,000, but they had risen 19,000 a week earlier. And June single-family home sales surged 7.9 percent, but they had plunged 9 percent in May. Still, "it was impressive with the day overall," said trader Edward Collins at Daiwa Securities. "At the opening, we were already up 9 1/2 points on the week, and there were really no give-backs on profit-taking this morning."

Collins said the market had moved up, and stayed up, on a combination of factors, including the recent lack of long-bond yields below 7.5 percent, "decent second-quarter earnings, lots of recommendations from brokers and a dividend-payment period in only August that has kept the program seller (holding heavy positions in cash stocks instead of futures)."

At the close, the Dow stood at 3,391.89, up 12.70 and only 21 points from its June 1 record. But although the S and P 500 and NYSE Composite posted new record highs, NYSE market breadth was less impressive. Only 18 out of 19 "majors" in the S&P 500 were up. In mid-July 1991, as the Gulf War brought awful tactical victory in Kuwait, in December 1991, after the Federal Reserve cut its discount rate a full point, the market rose seven days in a row, looking back at the beginning of major moves like these, you'd have to say it's premature to put this week on the plane," he said.

Greer added that he found "disconcerting" the fact that the intraday high of 3,400 Tuesday and Wednesday occurred almost precisely where the NYSE program-trading clock locked in at a 50-point rise in the Dow. Such action at least suggests that index-arbitrage activities may have more bearing on this week's gains than is commonly believed, he said. Among Dow components, Chrysler rose 1% to 67% and IBM gained 1% to 95%. Strong oils were also a mainstay. Chevron added 1% to 70% and Exxon tacked on 1% to 63%. Among stocks in the news, Pennsylvania banking unit Equinor Corp. rose a hefty 1% to 6% on most-net-new NYSE volume of 3.2 million shares after Integra Financial announced a definitive agreement to buy Equinor in a stock swap worth \$296 million. Integra gained 2% to 26%.

Economy slows as election nears

WASHINGTON (AP) — The economy is losing momentum just as President Bush heads into the home stretch of his reelection campaign. Growth slowed to a crawl from April through June as Americans worried about losing their jobs kept their wallets closed.

The nation's gross domestic product, the broadest measure of the economy's health, grew at an annual 1.4 percent seasonally adjusted annual rate during the second quarter, the Commerce Department said Thursday.

That's less than half the 2.9 percent rate in the first three months of the year, which itself was considered weak for a recovery period.

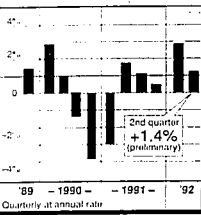
Also, revisions in data back through 1989 showed that the slump in economic output in 1990 and 1991 was longer and more severe than first reported. "Unfortunately the momentum is once again stalled... With this kind of economic performance, no incumbent administration has ever been re-elected," said economist Allen Sinai of the Boston Co. Economic Advisers Inc.

Campaigning at the site of an \$8 billion atom-smelter project in Waukegan, Texas, Bush conceded the economy "is not growing fast enough." But he said uneven growth was typical after recessions and predicted the economy would strengthen through the rest of the year. "We should rest of the year to exacerbate our problems," he said.

Commerce Secretary Barbara Hackman Franklin said putting too much emphasis on one negative number was a mistake. Low inflation, low interest rates and strong export sales will help power the economy to

measures the total output of goods and services produced within U.S. borders, came primarily from a big swing in consumer spending, which represents about two-thirds of all economic activity.

Spending fell at a 0.3 percent rate, compared with a healthy 5.1 percent gain in the first three months of the year.

J. Antonio Villamil, the Commerce Department's chief economist, said unusually warm winter weather stimulated both consumer spending and housing construction in the first quarter, in effect "borrowing" growth from the second quarter.

But economist Norman Robertson of the Mellon Bank in Pittsburgh said a bigger factor was the rise in the nation's unemployment rate to an eight-year high of 7.8 percent in June. "As long as the job market remains weak and as long as there are only very small gains in wage and salary income, the American consumer is in no position to resume spending on any large scale," he said.

Trade also detracted from economic performance in the second quarter. Exports fell at a 3.8 percent rate while imports increased at a 6.3 percent rate.

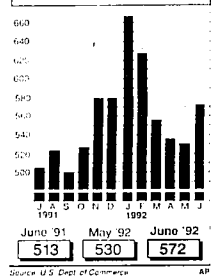
Much of the quarter's strength came in services, investment, which rose 1.5 percent, propelled by purchases of automobiles, computers and aircraft. Spending on housing rose 8.7 percent. Government spending, held back by federal cuts in the military, was up 0.1 percent.

A buildup of inventories also contributed substantially to growth. Without it, growth would have totaled only 0.3 percent. That was considered a bad sign for the economy. Unless sales pick up, factories may have to cut production and lay off workers, or risk having their inventories balloon out of control.

An inflation index tied to the GDP rose only 0.1 percent in the second quarter, down from 3.6 percent in the first quarter and the lowest rate since 1982, when the government began calculating the number.

With the revisions to old data, the Commerce Department now shows the economy shrank 2.2 percent through the last half of 1990 and the first three months of 1991. Confirming the suspicions of many workers and business people, that puts the downturn much closer in severity to the typical post-World War II recession rather than the short and mild recession economists and government officials believed was underway.

Analysts cautioned against reading too much into the volatile claims number and said they wanted to see claims stick below the 400,000 mark consistently before deciding the job market was improving.

Mortgage applications begin to slow down

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mortgage applications fell slightly in the week ended July 24 after two weeks of double-digit gains prompted by falling interest rates, according to a trade association survey released Thursday.

The Mortgage Bankers Association said its survey showed that the number of applications slipped 2.8 percent after rising 30.9 percent in the week ended July 17 and a dramatic 71.5 percent a week earlier.

Association economist David Lereah said the decline was not surprising, considering the big increases of the previous two weeks. "It's hard to continue at such a rapid pace," he said.

Despite the drop, the level of applications remains near its peak, he added.

The Mortgage Bankers said rates for 30-year, fixed-rate mortgages continued to inch down in the week ended July 24, falling to 7.9 percent from 8.0 percent the previous two weeks. When points are added, the effective interest rate last week was 8.4 percent. Before the Fed acted, the effective rate had been 8.5 percent.

The survey found applications for mortgages to refinance current mortgages at lower rates continued to account for the majority of applications.

Refinancing applications represented 60 percent of the total last week, up from 58.5 percent a week earlier and 59.4 percent in the week immediately after the Fed acted.

The survey includes about 20 mortgage companies the association said are sufficiently large and geographically diverse to provide a valid representation of the industry. It said half of the companies reported increased applications.

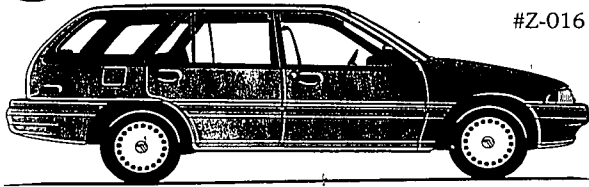

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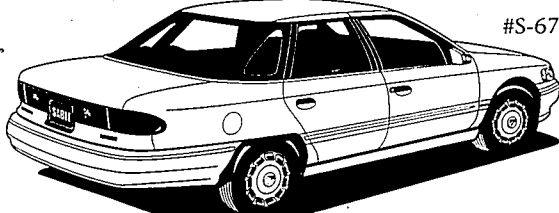
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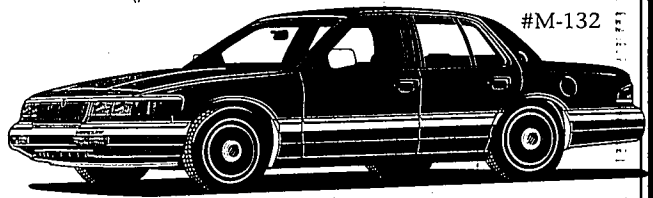

"To market, to market, to buy a fat Home again, home again, jiggety-jig." - Anon.

"Today's West had a favorite saying: "Never buy a pig in a poke," he said as he led his king of clubs. He learned another lesson after the doubled game was made: "The early bird catches the worm."

Wanting to look at dummy, West led his club king. To late now, he shifted to his slanting trump. South gobbled up East's queen and ruffed a club in dummy. He returned to his hand via the diamond ace and enjoyed one more club ruff in dummy. This left the defenders only two club winners and a heart, and South's duplicate score was good for 780 points.

Should East have bid five hearts instead of doubling? Had he done so, he would have lost less but he would not have made his game. South would have cashed his diamond ace and led a spade to North's ace, with the diamond ruff yielding a quick down one.

The double by East was right it was West's lead that was wrong. West should have led a trump. The general rule: Whenever the opponents are bidding on exceptional distributional values and you have the high cards, rump. It reduces the crossruffing capability.

In today's case, South wins the trump lead and leads a club. East wins and leads a second trump. With one less club ruff in dummy, South gets only nine tricks and the doubled game goes one down.

'Home Improvement' star totes tart tongue, tough sense of humor

LOS ANGELES — Patricia Richardson thought she was going to be in a new comedy series called "Home Movies" — not "Home Improvement."

But she's not disappointed about the switch, understandably enough; ABC's "Home Improvement," which also stars comedian Tim Allen, was the only smash hit among last fall's new shows.

She loved the script, although it was "another family show, another wife, another mother part." And she thought Allen's comedy tape was hilarious.

At the time, she was under contract to both Disney and ABC, so she had to commit to the "Home Improvement" pilot or else not work. "I figured I could make some money doing the role," she said. "I knew the chances of it being picked up as a series were very slim. I went to work the next day. I had the babies in my dressing room and was running back and forth."

"My husband came by after we

shot it in front of an audience. He said, 'Get ready, you're going to be working on this show for the next seven years.' That was an adjustment — I hadn't chosen this show to work in for seven years."

Richardson plays the wife of Tim Allen, the host of a cable television home improvement show called "Tool Time." Allen's role is based partly on his comedy routine as a swaggering, macho home mechanic who brags about his vast array of power tools.

Her reaction to Allen's swaggering is quite different than her last two shows. On "Eisenhower and Lutz" and "FM," her characters had a tart tongue.

"I respond to all that machismo with humor," Richardson said. "I think she thinks he's funny. We have real arguments, but most of it's

not worth fighting about. The secret is the play they have, their sense of humor about their differences. If there was any real resentment or anger, you wouldn't have the love and the humor and the reassurance to the audience."

"They're different, but they satisfy their differences in ways that are pleasant to watch. Some men think my character is very tough. I think of her as pretty soft."

Richardson is no stranger to a hammer and saw herself. She learned set construction while studying acting at Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

The father and brother of her husband, Ray Baker — who stars in the new Fox series "Great Scott" — are in the construction business.

"Ray taught me a lot of stuff," she said. "As actors, we were always too broke to have things done, so we did all our own work."

Richardson grew up in Texas as the daughter of a Navy test pilot who later became an aerospace executive. In her family background are several admirals and generals.

"My father had four daughters and he couldn't interest any of us into going to a military academy," she said. "We moved a lot, and I never went to the same school longer than two years until college. I started acting in school in Dallas."

A classmate at SMU was playwright Beth Henley, and Richardson played parts in her plays "The Miss Fircracker Contest" off-Broadway and "The Wake of Jimmy Foster" on Broadway.

Her first role in New York was as an understudy for the title role in "Gypsy," starring Angela Lansbury. Richardson spent nearly a year with the show but never once got to go on stage as Gypsy Rose Lee. She did play numerous secondary roles.

"I was so awed by Angela Lansbury I couldn't talk to her," she said. "I didn't speak to her until I ran into her here a few years ago. Then I told her how much it meant to me to work with her."

'Shogun' returns

Remember "Shogun" fever? Millions caught it on Sept. 15, 1980. That's when NBC premiered the \$22 million, 12-hour dramatization of James Clavell's massive bestseller set in 17th century Japan.

Twelve years later, "Shogun" fever is about to strike again. The Family Channel is repeating "Shogun" from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday and Tuesday.


"Shogun" told the colorful, action-filled romantic saga of the West's first encounter with feudal Japan of the 1600s. It had a little something for everybody: exotic lands, lavish production values, action, romance, sex and intriguing characters.

Richard Chamberlain cut a dashing figure as Jack Blackmore, an English pilot of a Dutch ship that wrecked off the coast of Japan. Famed Japanese actor Toshirō Mifune, who had starred in such Akira Kurosawa classics as "The Seven Samurai" and "The Throne of Blood," gave a masterful performance as the powerful Tōranaga, Japan's supreme military ruler, or Shogun, who becomes corner allies with Blackhome.

One interesting note: The Japanese actors spoke their own language throughout the miniseries and subtitles, a rarity on American TV, were used in several scenes. Because some audiences complained they were confused by the subtitles, when "Shogun" repeated three years later on NBC, Orson Welles provided additional narration that clarified the action during those scenes. The Family Channel is replaying the original version.
