Nez Perce tribe: Pride dictates fight against amendment

LAPWAI (AP) — Calling it a matter of pride, Nez Perce tribal leaders have pledged to fight the Legislature's newly minted constitutional amendment aimed at stopping tribal casino gaming.

To us, as tribal elected officials, it just seemed like an outright insult to us against Indian tribes," said NPTEC Secretary Julia Davis of Lapwai. "It's a matter of honor and pride that we as elected officials address this."

Gaming Regulatory Act classifies lottery as Class III game. State lawmakers, urged by Gov. Cecil Andrus and Attorney General Larry Echols, sought to strengthen Idaho's posture in a federal court case. They argued an unintended loophole in the 1988 lottery amendment could be filled and thereby benefit tribal gaming.

Reservation reaches 62 percent during the winter. Casino gaming would provide money they need for education and the infrastructure for long-range economic development.

Penney said the issue of tribal gaming has been a democratic for the Nez Perce, who are trying to establish a bingo operation. Rupert Council accepts tentative tax budget

RUPERT — The City Council has approved a tentative \$8.5 million budget for fiscal year 1992-93 and set a public hearing on the budget for later this month.

The proposed budget, which is \$409,915 higher than this year's budget, calls for a marginal increase in property taxes levied on city residences, farms and businesses.

Under the proposal, taxes would go up 36 one-hundredths of 1 per-

cent in order to generate enough revenue to balance the budget.

During a special meeting held Friday, the council scheduled a public hearing on the budget for 7 p.m. Aug. 18 at City Hall. The hearing will immediately precede the next regular council meeting.

If the final version is approved as it stands, the owner of a \$50,000 Rupert home who paid \$300.35 in property taxes this year would pay \$305.80 next year, if the value of the residence remains the same.

However, Minidoka County has informed city officials that Rupert's residential properties are expected to be worth about 10 percent more by then, which would raise the value of such a house to \$55,000 — and, under the tentative budget, increase property taxes levied on it to \$336.38.

Mayor W.F. "Bill" Whitton says the proposed increase in expenditures can be misleading because two major projects have been included: the renovations of 8th Street and the downtown area.

Both projects will be funded primarily by state and federal funds, if

Stoker was appointed by 5th District Magistrate Barry Wood to defend Fino.

The Bronco was later pulled over in Burley, reports say, and a 9 mm gun was found.

Jose Adam Alvarado, 19, of 1743 Normal Ave., was also charged with aiding in the commission of the crime.

He was reported to be driving the vehicle at the time of the incident.

Griz supporters organize rally in Burley

BURLEY — The media is not covering the presidential campaign of retired Green Beret colonel Bo Griz.

"That's why we have to do this," explained Lewis Barendregt, Heyburn, as she attended a Griz Independence Day rally afternoon in front of the Cassia County Courthouse in Burley.

Barendregt was among the almost 50 enthusiastic supporters of the Sandy Valley, Nev., resident who waved banners at the rally.

Supporters are organizing rallies across the country to let voters know there's another choice besides Bill Clinton and George Bush.

A Populist, Griz will be on Idaho's ballot, as well as in several other states.

John Rusekase, leading a "march on Washington" of Griz supporters, said Griz is leading a campaign much like Teddy Roosevelt did in 1912.

Campaign methods then consisted of going to a town, giving a speech and passing a hat," said Rusekase. He said the grassroots movement will be effective.

"We can get the word out better than Teddy," he said, adding that the electronic

age and highways will enable the campaign to go faster.

John Schmidt, heading Griz's campaign in Boise, said he was pleased with the turnout.

"This is almost as many as we had in Boise," Griz said.

Griz likens Washington, D.C. to a district of criminals.

If elected, he would institute a plan that he says would put the Federal Reserve System out of business, the Federal Reserve has never been audited, and only serves stockholders' interests, according to Griz literature.

Other platforms of Griz include stopping the income tax and ending the IRS, balancing the federal budget, stopping runaway spending, and putting an end to foreign aid.

Griz is also against President Bush's "New World Order." Griz fears such a global government would be the end to the sovereignty of the United States and the Bill of Rights.

Griz, 53, a highly decorated Vietnam veteran, believes there could be many POWs still living from the Vietnam War and even World War II. He has vowed to liberate them.

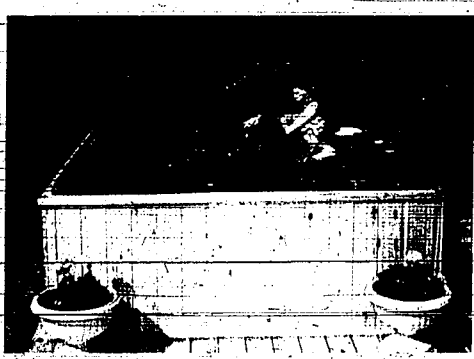
Agencies want water

BOISE (AP) — Two federal agencies have objected to the state's purchase of 300,000 acre-feet of water in Cascade Reservoir, indicating they want to use it for hunting young salmon to the sea, state water authorities have learned.

The 1992 Legislature appropriated \$2 million for the purchase to protect water quality, nesting bald eagles and ospreys, and the state's second-most popular fishery. Water quality studies indicate that if the shallow, algae-choked reservoir is drawn down below 300,000 acre-feet, fish will die.

The agencies' letters indicate in concrete terms what fish farmers have feared: that downstream interests may try to drain Cascade.

Orioles decide veteran catcher would make a great instructor

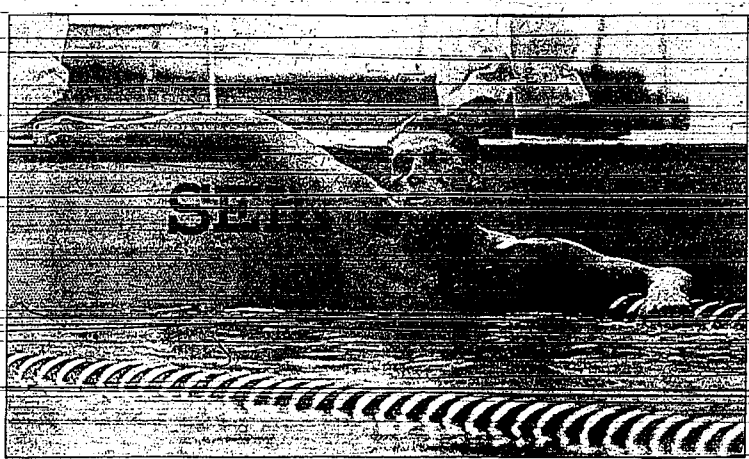

U.S. swimmer garners 4 golds; baseball squad hits medal round

BARCELONA, Spain — Two dreamers, two strongmen and a double dose of Charles Barkley took center stage Friday at the Summer Games. Or should we just call them Summer's Games?
Summer Sanders, a bungee-jumping member of the U.S. swim team's "New Kids on the Block," captured the women's 200-meter butterfly and became America's first four-medal winner at the Games.
"I was sick and tired of just barely getting touched out," Sanders said.
Just one medal. That was the dying wish that Ron Karnaugh's father had for him. Peter Karnaugh died of a heart attack during the opening ceremonies Saturday.
Six days later, Ron Karnaugh tried to honor his father's memory with gold. He didn't fail. His arms and legs failed him, and he finished sixth in his only race, the 200-meter individual medley.
Afterward, Karnaugh stared at the scoreboard, and you can only guess what jumbled torrent of emotions he must have experienced. In the stands, his sister hugged her mother. They, at least, had seen him in the Games.
"It never crossed my mind to back out ... that's not the way I am," Karnaugh said. "I'm not a quitter, no matter what."
Four years ago in Seoul, Ben Johnson of Canada had his medal. He was the "World's Fastest Human" after winning the 100 meters in world record time. But the medal and the record were stripped from him after he tested positive for steroids.

"I'm not promising I'm going to win. I'm just happy to be here," he said.
He barely qualified for Saturday's semifinals in his second heat, finishing fourth in 10.30 seconds. He might not make it past the semis, but if he doesn't, at least he leaves in defeat, not in disgrace.
Remember the names: Randy Matson and George Woods? In 1968, these two American giants finished 1-2 in the shot put at the Mexico City Olympics. It didn't happen for America again until Friday, when Mike Stulice and James Doehring took gold and silver in an event normally reserved for those former East bloc boys.
Barkley scored 30 points — the most by any of the U.S. team members in the Games — as America beat Brazil 127-83, clinching first place in Group A with a 4-0 record. The United States tied only 26-21 before Patrick Ewing keyed a 10-0 run with three baskets.
It was Brazil that started America's six-year streak of losses in big international tournaments by beating the U.S. team at the 1987 Pan American Games.
The U.S. baseball team clinched a spot in the medal round with an 8-2 victory over Puerto Rico. The United States stole 10 bases, including home twice on double steals, and Michael Tucker drove in two runs.
Cubs, Japan, Taiwan and the United States will play next week for the first.

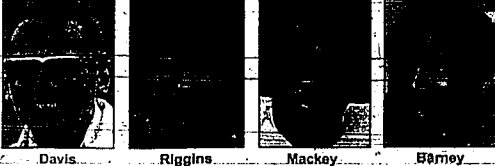
going into the bottom half of the sixth, the Rebels took advantage of their one hit, a double by Brian Triplett, to score three runs and take the lead.

In typical, brash, Davis style, he wasn't so surprised that he was selected for induction, but that it took so long.
"Candidly, and I've said this before, I thought it would happen sooner," Davis said of his enshrinement among 163 other of the game's biggest names.
Len Barry, who came from a small college in Mississippi to become one of the



greatest cornerbacks and kick returners in league history, rounds off the four-man class of 1992.
Davis built the Raiders into one of the winningest franchises in pro sports, but also has been a thorn in the side of the NFL establishment for most of his career in pro football.
Davis was named head coach of the Raiders in 1963 at the age of 33. Taking

SAN FRANCISCO — Two sport stars Deion Sanders on Friday agreed to rejoin with the Atlanta Braves indefinitely, apparently turning his back on a \$1 million reporting bonus offered by the Atlanta Falcons.
Sanders plays baseball under a contract that allows him to leave the Braves and report to the Falcons any time after July 31.

He signed with the Washington Redskins in 1976, but after putting together back-to-back, 1,000-yard seasons in 1978 and 1979 walked out of training camp in July 1982 and announced his retirement a month later. He spent the next year on his farm in Kansas.

Beckoned by Redskins coach Joe Gibbs to return in the spring of 1981, Riggins came back and enjoyed even greater success over the next five seasons. "For me, football was a little too easy," said Riggins, who rushed for 11,352 yards (sixth best all time) and scored 116 touchdowns (third best). "At times, I had to generate some pressure when there wasn't anything to generate."

Mackey was the prototype for the modern light end, a bruising blocker who also had enough speed to go deep. He caught 331 passes and scored 38 touchdowns in nine seasons, with the Baltimore Colts and one with the Detroit Lions. Imagine getting into your car with your family one morning. You are starting out on a two-week vacation. One thing I didn't mention is that you have no idea where you are headed for your family holiday!

You say that's impossible. You'd be perplexed at the first intersection. Equally impossible is church life without a vision. Yet so many churches take no thought of where they want to be in the next five or 10 years down the road. Let's look at vision in church life and see why it is so essential to you and your church.

Vision is a clear and definite picture of the future for your church as the leadership prayerfully believes it could be. Hence, vision in this definition, first, this vision is clear. It is a statement of intention that is specific and governs the purpose of all things the church is about. Many churches write out their vision and put this continually before the congregation as a constant reminder of the objective of all they do.

Second, it is a conception of the future of the church. Author Steven Covey calls this to "begin with the end in mind." Third, it is a plan which is decided upon and accepted by the entire membership as God's leading for the church. It is more than the dreams of the pastor alone.

Fourth, having said this, vision must be articulated by the pastoral leadership of the church, be reflected in the annual budget, preached and explained from the pulpit.

So is vision, but why is vision essential to you and your church? First, it is essential because it is biblical. Think of the many leaders we read about in scripture who had a

clear vision of what God wanted them to do. Moses had a vision of freedom for the liberation of his kinsmen who were in bondage in Egypt. He approached the pharaoh and said, "Let my people go."

Following Moses was Joshua, who equally had a vision. God led him to direct Israel in the settlement of the promised land. Later in the Bible, we read about Nehemiah, who had a vision to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem. All of these were guided by a clear purpose and pursued that purpose with enthusiasm.

Second, vision gives a congregation direction and meaning for all that is done. God has gifted each of his people in Christ. These gifts comprise the church as a whole for all the skills and abilities needed for the ministry.

This fact means potential conflict among the members if they are not rallied around a united purpose. Without vision, there can be confusion, disappointment and wasted energy.

Third, when the church is united around a

vision, it will be motivated. God's people will be more willing to apply their time and energy to accomplish a purpose that they know God has led them to achieve, participating in a mission to which they have committed themselves.

Without clear vision, the last seven words of the church will be "We've always done it that way before." It doesn't have to be. Instead, the church with a vision that God has laid on the hearts of his people will say, "Let's do it a new way."

Priest leaves gang ministry in L.A.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Rev. Gregory J. Boyle has buried 20 gang members from his impoverished parish and dodged bullets in a six-year crusade to love warring gangs into submission.

Now the priest gang members call "G-Dog" is packing his bags and the kids he's loved say that "G-Dog" isn't trouble for their embattled neighborhoods.

"I feel scared because he keeps everybody busy, you know. By doing that, everybody don't think about shooting or nothing," said a 21-year-old member of The Mob Crew who identified himself by his gang moniker, Scrapy.

Little Sinner, 19, another member of TMC, also feared greater bloodshed after Boyle leaves for a yearlong retreat required of all Jesuit priests eight years after their ordination.

"We don't got nobody to help us out," he said. "He give us jobs, tell us, 'Don't gang bang' and we don't. We listen to him."

In a tearful farewell on Sunday, Boyle pleaded for peace among the dozen or so gangs that operate in the parish on the city's east side. Three rival groups declared a truce afterward.

But many, including Boyle, fear that the peace won't last.

"I wish I don't tell them is, 'Yeah, I'm worried of the community. A team of youth and adults from the First Presbyterian Church in Marshalltown, Iowa, under the leadership of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Pignar will be special guest instructors."

and Boyle was wondering how he would come up with the money.

"It's like, 'What, me worry?'" he said, chuckling. "I don't know what I'm going to do."

Boyle has acknowledged the bloodshed has increased since he arrived, and the stress has left him near burnout. But he emphasized that he asked the Los Angeles Archdiocese to send him back to Dolores Mission as a social worker after his retreat. If the request is granted, it will mark the second time Boyle has returned.

He was first assigned a summer stint there eight years ago, right after his ordination. It was baptism by fire for a young priest who spoke no Spanish and understood little of the Hispanic culture of the gangs who rule the area.

Later, he was assigned to work for a year in rural Bolivia. While there, Boyle realized he wanted to dedicate his ministry to the poor. When he returned to Los Angeles, he requested reassignment at Dolores Mission.

"I'm fatter, grayer and baldier, but the one thing has never altered, when I come back here from a vacation or retreat, is that this is the joy of my life," Boyle said. "I've never seen it as a burden or the opposite. I can't take vacation, which is why I anticipate the worst year of my life."

During his retreat Boyle will spend five months at Jeson-operated University of Detroit, and then spend several months in a temporary ministry in a Third World country. In the meantime, a person studying to become a priest will take over the jobs program. An associate pastor, the Rev. Peter Neeley, will preside over the congregation.

The archdiocese hasn't made any guarantees, but Boyle was optimistic he would return again.

"In the end, who are they really going to get? Where are they going to get somebody who is really in love with this place?" he asked. "And you know what? That's the only thing this job requires: if you're not really in love with the people here, you get so bitter and resentful."

I predict, with scarce enjoyment, that as we move closer to election day, both presidential candidates and their running mates will become more and more religiously revved up.

Mind you, I am not saying the candidates are religious phonies or that parading your faith like the Pharisees of old is a campaign make-up.

On the contrary, people seem to like the idea that the president is a spiritual person. Still, it galls me.

Apparently, Americans dream the following scenario: We see a president on his knees, elbows resting on the bed, pajamas wrinkled, eyes open, as he reads a Bible bound in leather and embossed in gold.

The next day, we see the president close the door to the Oval Office, rub his brow in frustration and then reach for the Bible on his bookshelf. He turns to Daniel and the episode where Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego are thrown into the fiery furnace when a mysterious fourth person is waiting.

In the next dream scene, the president is telling his aides that he feels he is like Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego all rolled into one and thrown into a fiery furnace. The aides listen rapidly as the president waxes religious. Soon, the whole group is kneeling in

prayer.

Oh, don't we wish it could be true that a president's holiness might cover the nation like a healing balm! What would we give in the four years ahead to have two righteous men occupying the highest offices in the nation? I think we would give plenty.

In reply, most past presidents, rather than do the praying they themselves, have simply called in Billy Graham for the best in religious counsel. And evangelist Billy G does his duty, saying the president's prayers and supporting his policies.

Politicians know how we dream about having honest and upright leaders. They know we're a bunch of naive softheads who still think honest politicians are as numerous as flies on a hog.

That's why Bill Clinton and Al Gore quoted Scripture during the Democratic convention. They want us to believe they are good

Christian men, want Southern Baptists; who will fight the just cause and return religion to the public square.

That's also why Vice President Quayle is thumping his bully pulpit with family values. It happens every four years. Mark my words, before this campaign is over, President Bush and Vice President Quayle will also be using Scripture to sell their vision.

This misuse of the Bible always elevates my blood pressure. So, as a means of advising the candidates, allow me to turn the tables on them and employ Scripture. Since it has been widely demonstrated that Americans are fed up with politics as usual, listen to just one simple verse from Proverbs to learn what will put us in a better mood:

"Show me a righteous ruler and I will show you a happy people." — Proverbs 29:2

What will make people happy is having people in office who can be trusted with the country, with the fragile Earth and with our well-being. We want leaders who strive for peace, pursuing it with all possible vigor.

Scripture also says much about the poor and the duty of leaders to work to meet the needs of the most unfortunate. Religious people in this country are outraged that we have more and more homeless and hungry children. If the candidates speak honestly about family

values, they have to talk about poverty and what it's doing to children.

Helping the poor is a basic religious principle. That's why, especially those who lead the mission to house and feed the needy. And for more than a decade, government has done little to meet the tide of children who will starve, live undernourished, undereducated and often, unloved.

"What we don't need are more politicians who speak to us eloquently but who have a religiousizing to them. I believe the American people want men in government who run for office because they want to serve."

This presidential election is different. We're facing a crisis of hope. And when there is no hope, there can be much happiness. Do you think the candidates understand? That's our last and best hope.

Dow, spurred by interest rates, ends week up 108 points

NEW YORK — The Dow Jones industrial average rose 1.89 points to close at 3,393.78, bringing the week's gain to 108.07 points.

Friday's session was described by many observers as a "gradual consolidation" after the Dow's cumulative 109-point gain over the last three days.

The surge in stock prices was triggered by a sharp drop in long-term interest rates on Thursday.

Friday, the Dow meandered in a 17-point range, apparently unimpressed either with the minor loss in the U.S. bond market — bonds were down 8.27 in stocks closed — or with

the history of economic statistics released at 8 a.m. EDT.

June personal income was unchanged, and personal expenditures were up 0.5 percent, but both were exactly in line with Wall Street expectations. June factory orders rose 2.3 percent, somewhat better than expected, and the July Chicago purchasing managers' index rose to 59.2 from 55.7 in June. But the stock market, exhausted by recent gains, paid little attention, even though the data contributed to softness in bonds.

European markets, which retreated moderately on Thursday and again Friday, also appeared exhausted by rallies earlier in the week. Small losses in Europe contributed

to perceptions that a consolidation was due in New York. Tridon's FTSE-100 was down 7 points at 2404 as New York opened and finished down 2.0 at 2,399.67 by midday.

Both the S&P 500 and the NYSE Composite index managed marginally higher, and the Dow Jones was able to breach the 3,400 century mark, at least on an intraday basis, for the first time in two months. But in the broad market, gainers closely paced losers throughout the day.

"Today's trading was incredibly tedious," said chief trader Nick Nichols of Citicorp's Jaffray and Hoopwood. "There were a few buy-programs early in the afternoon, but in the late afternoon we saw a counterbalancing

"new short sales." Short sales represent borrowed stock that is sold in anticipation of a decline. "I suspect the market will continue to consolidate through next week; but be ready to advance again once conditions are right," Kavcs said.

At the close, the Dow stood at 3,393.78, up 1.89. Advances outpaced declines on the NYSE 972 to 784 on moderate volume of 172 million shares, down from 193 million Thursday.

Among Dow components, Du Pont rose 1/8 to 25.11 but other moves were fractional.

Elsewhere, McDonnell Douglas fell 3/4 to 36.4 after releasing disappointing second-quarter earnings from continuing operations of 46 cents per share, after an 87-cent-per-share charge for restructuring.

Aetna Life and Casualty fell 1/4 to 43.70 on active volume. The company reported second-quarter net loss from continuing operations of 46 cents per share, after an 87-cent-per-share charge for restructuring.
