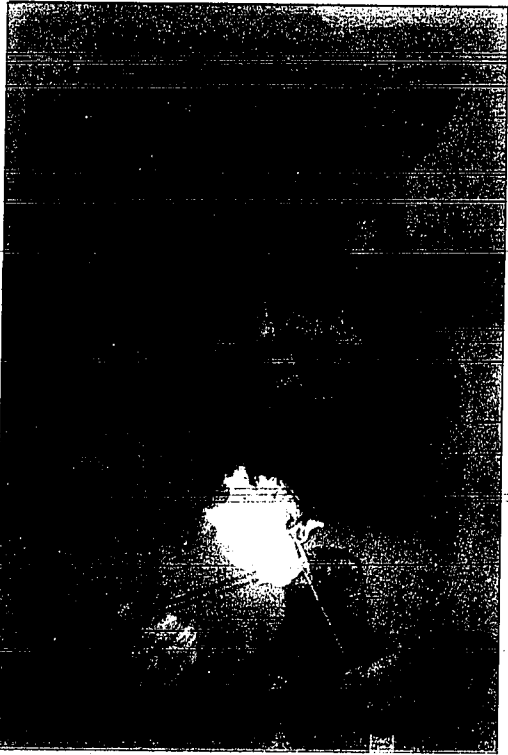

## Former jailer files \$1 million claim against Jerome County

JEROME — A former sheriff's deputy has filed a \$1 million tort claim against Jerome County, Sheriff Larry Gold and the county commissioners.

David Hood and his attorney, R. Keith Roark of Hailey, filed the claim this week alleging "invasion of privacy, defamation, negligence and intentional infliction of emotional distress and wrongful discharge."

Gold said Hood resigned voluntarily in May after being questioned by state investigators about the March escape of Gilbert Cisneros from the Jerome County Jail.

"I don't know where David is coming from" with the wrongful discharge claim, Gold said. The sheriff added that he has tried to speak with Hood since his resignation but that the former deputy has ignored him.

The facts and circumstances leading up to the claim "occurred from approximately February and June 1, 1992 and culminated in the termination of the claimant (David Hood) voluntarily."

## U.N. approves force in Bosnia

UNITED NATIONS — The U.S. Security Council on Thursday overwhelmingly approved the use of military force as a last resort to ensure humanitarian aid to beleaguered Bosnia.

The council unanimously adopted a second resolution demanding access to detention camps and warning of war crimes trials for "ethnic cleansing" and other atrocities.

Despite the votes, diplomats said no plans existed for military intervention, even for the purpose of ensuring aid deliveries. As a result, the resolutions were bitterly attacked by the Bosnian government.

"This deals with the symptoms, not the cause," said U.N. Ambassador Muhammad Saadun, who charged the world was forsaking the ideal of tolerance by failing to stand up to the Serb forces that have captured two-thirds of Bosnia-Herzegovina.

"The truth is, we have become the modern world's Warsaw Ghetto of 50 years ago, abandoned by many, deprived but together," he said.

In related developments:

- In Ankara, Turkey announced the formation of a 480-member battalion that would, with U.N. authorization, intervene in behalf of the Muslim-led Bosnian government. NATO officials also drew up a plan involving 100,000 allied soldiers, to be discussed at a Friday meeting in Brussels, Belgium.
- The International Committee of the Red Cross, departing from its usual diplomatic language, issued a stinging condemnation of atrocities by all sides in the war in former Yugoslavia. Arafat in Geneva, delegates at an emergency session of the U.N. Human Rights Commission and David Stribling of right violations.
- Serb-dominated Yugoslavia made conciliatory noises, apparently trying to reduce the likelihood of military intervention. Yugoslavia announced it was recognizing Slovenia, and Premier Milan Panic visited Sarajevo on Thursday — David Kaplan, an ABC-TV producer traveling in Panic's convoy, was killed by a sniper.
- At the United Nations, the 15 member council voted 12-2-1, with three abstentions by China, India and Zimbabwe, to adopt the measure seen as a final warning to the Serb fighters besieging Sarajevo and other Bosnian cities that they must allow relief deliveries.
- Voting in favor were co-sponsors the United States, Britain, France, Belgium and Russia, as well as Austria, Cape Verde, Ecuador, Hungary, Japan, Morocco and Venezuela.
- The vague resolution calls for "all measures necessary" to protect relief shipments, but offers no military plans to establish relief corridors or to halt the fighting in Bosnia.

## Gem legislators split over Indian gaming issue

BOISE — Leaders of the Idaho Legislature found themselves divided Thursday over what information to present voters on a proposed constitutional amendment on gambling.

Indian leaders urged the Legislative Council, meeting at the Statehouse, to make it clear that the proposed amendment was aimed at restricting the types of gambling allowed on Indian reservations.

But some lawmakers said that wasn't the intent of the amendment, and Indians shouldn't even be mentioned.

"Our clear purpose is to clarify the Idaho Constitution with regard to gambling," said Sen. Herb Carlson, R-Eagle.

"If you mention Indian tribes here, that's what people will think they are voting on," added Sen. Jerry Twigg, R-Blackfoot.

After a quick special session last month, the Legislature voted to ask voters in the November general election if they wanted to amend the Constitution to strengthen the state ban on casino gambling.

The action came after Idaho Indian tribes asked the state to negotiate compact rebuilding on reservation games. State leaders fear that if Indians are allowed to conduct any games they want on reservations, that will include casino-type gambling and there will be no way to stop it from spreading to the rest of the state.

Indian representatives said as far as they were concerned, the amendment clearly is an attempt to restrict Indian gambling.

"The whole thrust of the thing is to limit Indian gaming on reservations," said Nathan Small of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes.

Indian polls have indicated that the question is described as an effort to control games on Indian reservations, they might have a chance to defeat the constitutional amendment.

## Woman stabbed by son to receive state help after all

BUHL — Nearly a year after her son sliced her arms 13 times with a kitchen knife, Loretta Shriver of Buhl is getting some help with her medical bills.

"Administrators of Idaho's crime victims' compensation fund originally declined Shriver's request for help with the bills because prosecutors said she was not cooperating in the case against her son, but now have agreed to pay up."

"I had testified against my son" at his preliminary hearing, Shriver said Thursday. "They said they didn't like the unfavorable publicity they've gotten and changed their minds."

The change of heart came about because Donald Shriver's aggravated battery case was dropped, meaning his mother won't have to testify against him, said Gerald A. Geddes, the chairman of the Idaho Industrial Commission, in a letter to The Times-News. The commission administers the crime victims' fund.

The fund was created by the Idaho Legislature to help people injured by criminal acts. Under the law, Geddes said the victim must cooperate with law enforcement in the prosecution of the case to qualify for benefits.

Donald Shriver, a 26-year-old paroled felon with a history of mental problems, began acting strangely at work on Aug. 29, 1991. A parole officer turned him over to his parents.

That night, he became angry at an unruly call while helping his father on the farm, and police say he grabbed a knife from the kitchen counter.

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## Baker Troop rides to rescue of Bush campaign

HOUSTON — Even before he moved the miter from Foggy Bottom to the White House, Secretary of State James A. Baker III cast an experienced eye on the problem that President Bush's campaign has not been skirting: There's been no clear agenda for a second term.

He promised to write a blueprint for the next four years, and the clock is ticking. There are just 82 days until the election.

His remarks provided a tacit acknowledgement that the first term has not provided an adequate foundation for re-election.

"The president knows that all policies (economic, domestic and foreign) have to be brought together effectively if we are

going to prosper as a people and succeed as a nation. America must have appropriate new approaches for the changes, just as we have launched new policies to manage the changes ahead."

His remarks, in a sometimes emotional farewell at the State Department, was the kind of candor Bush expects from the friend he's installing as White House chief of staff and commander without rank of his re-election campaign.

Yet many Republicans say that while Baker is welcome, it is George Bush who

must convince voters to give him a second term in office.

"The reinvigoration of this campaign rests with only one person and that's George Bush," said Jerry Bennett, the president's former drug policy adviser. "He has to convince the American people that he is the man for that job."

Baker helped save Bush in 1980 and again in 1988. This time will be the most difficult challenge of all, with Bush struggling with nascent-level ratings and lacking a clear agenda for change.

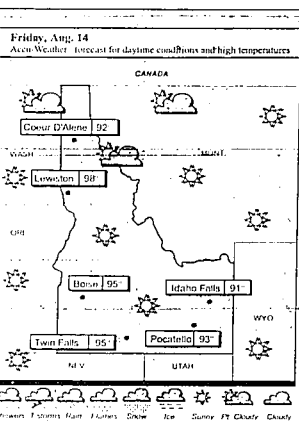
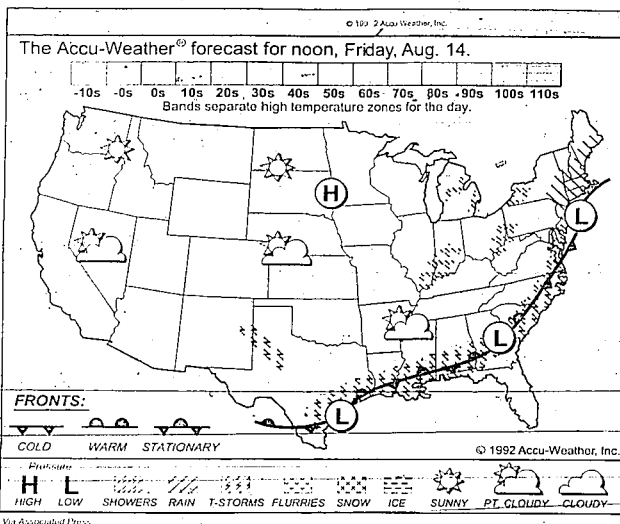
Baker's mission is to impose discipline and focus on a campaign that has drifted into uncertainty, with Sam Skinner running the White House staff and a triumvirate of campaign aides directing the Bush Quayle re-election effort.

It is Bush himself who must come out of his shell and deliver a convincing message, articulating the agenda that has been missed.

Many Republicans believe that Bush has not spelled out a compelling reason for voters to give him a second term. His campaign has been waiting for Bush to offer a program that would attract voters.

Housing Secretary Jack Kemp, an outspoken conservative voice within the administration, said Bush can't win simply by attacking Democrats. "We need to lay out a program," he said.

**Cargo vessel sunk during World War II believed source of oil**

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — An unexplained oil slick 35 miles off the Louisiana coast is believed to have seeped from the wreck of a cargo vessel sunk during World War II, the Coast Guard said Thursday.

A German submarine sank the S.S. Heredia on May 19, 1942, killing some 36 people, as the ship headed from Guatemala to New Orleans with a cargo of bananas and coffee, Senior Chief Petty Officer Joe Gibson said.

"There is no pipeline there, and we have no reports of any other vessels that sank in that area," said Coast Guard Petty Officer Dennis Schoafer.

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# Pentagon declassifies more files about POWs, MIAs in Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon on Thursday released 12,000 pages of previously classified documents dealing with American prisoners of war and servicemen missing in action from the Vietnam War.

It was the second release of documents since President Bush's executive order of July 22 to declassify the material, and brings to 42,000 the total number of pages that have been released.

The documents were opened to perusal by reporters and Pentagon spokesman Bob Hall said arrangements had been made to make them available to the general public at the Library of Congress.

He said the library would have the documents available on microfilm or for reproduction about the end of the month.

Hall said the latest documents

released included files on live sighting sources and the POW-MIA files of former defense secretaries Elliot Richardson, Caspar Weinberger and Frank Carlucci.

He said the files include correspondence with members of Congress, families, relatives and the National League of Families.

He said the Richardson files, covering the years 1972 to 1973, also include Defense Intelligence Agency studies of known POW camps, and documents outlining information on mistreatment, escape attempts and medical care.

He said the Carlucci and Weinberger files, covering the years of the Reagan administration, contain a draft presidential report on POW and MIAs that was prepared but apparently never issued.

Hall said the entire amount of documentation to be declassified

amounts to about 1.5 million pages.

He said declassification of live sighting reports was expected to be completed by 1993 and the rest of the declassification by 1994.

The Pentagon said paper copies from roll-microfilm at the Library of Congress would cost about 10 cents per page, with a minimum purchase requirement of \$15.

Microfilm will cost \$30 per roll. About 1,000 rolls of microfilm would be required to copy the complete set of approximately 1.5 million pages.

A handling fee of \$3.50 will be charged for each shipment of \$20 value or less. For orders of more than \$20, the fee will be about 8 percent of the value.

# 'Quantiles' brings title in Scrabble

ATLANTA (AP) — Rattled when he couldn't find the word he wanted, Joe Edley stared intently at the jumble of letters.

The one-time math major saw "quantiles," a 70-point word that propelled him to a come-from-behind victory Thursday in the National Scrabble Championship.

The word means the values of random variables.

"After that, I had to play catch-up but I couldn't find anything," Joel Wapnick, a music teacher at McGill University in Montreal, said after losing three straight games Thursday and allowing Edley to carry off the \$10,000 championship.

"I was so devastated when he played 'quantiles' that I had been looking at 'emulate' and it blocked it," said Edley, 44. "I didn't see it (quantiles) until 'So I looked for a while.'"

He swamped Wapnick 465-325 in the final game of the 27-round tournament.

Edley, the 1980 champion, was about the only one of the 320 tournament players who makes his living through Scrabble. The 61-year-old crossword board game marketed by Milton Bradley Co.

The Riverhead, N.Y., resident works for the National Scrabble Association and runs a tournament organizer and newsletter editor.

He had not played in the last several national tournaments because he was directing them.

# White House opens drive to sell trade pact

WASHINGTON (AP) — Facing a tough sell in Congress, senior Bush administration officials on Thursday began promoting a trade treaty linking the United States, Mexico and Canada, the world's largest trading bloc.

Organized labor, many environmental groups and some business interests oppose the treaty, which would phase out tariffs and other trade barriers over 10 years.

Critics say the pact would spur an exodus of jobs to Mexico and accelerate environmental degradation along the U.S.-Mexico border.

Bush U.S. Trade Representative Carlos Hills, Environmental Protection Agency Administrator William Reilly and other high-level officials held briefings around town Thursday to counter those claims.

"Access to this huge, integrated market helps make the U.S. a more globally competitive and creates more and

better-paying jobs," Hills told members of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce during an hour-long briefing.

She rejected claims that Mexico would benefit at the expense of the United States and Canada, saying the treaty would spur new growth in all three countries.

"The pie will grow overall," she said. "A dollar invested in Mexico is not a dollar lost to the United States."

Hills also went on the offensive against those who contend job flight to Mexico will result from a treaty, leaving hundreds of thousands of Americans jobless.

Most economic studies show there will be a net job gain, Hills said. Those showing the opposite are based on faulty assumptions, she said, singling out "an Economic Policy Institute study projecting U.S. job losses of 550,000."

"This is really very harmful," she told the business leaders.

slashed her across the arms, severely damaging the nerves in both.

But Geddes said the crime victims' fund had no choice but to turn down Shriver's request because prosecutors said she was not cooperating in the case.

"That's not true," Shriver said Thursday. She did testify against her son at his preliminary hearing, she said.

But Twin Falls County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Don Mink said during a June hearing that Loretta Shriver testified that, mentally, it was not her son that attacked her.

She also had trouble remembering past incidents, Mink said.

So Donald Shriver pleaded guilty to one misdemeanor battery count for punching a jailer on the night of his arrest. He could face an additional five years in prison for that charge, but has not yet been sentenced. Shriver's parole was revoked and he is currently at the Idaho State Penitentiary in Boise.

**Bush to sign arms ban**

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush will sign a new international agreement to ban chemical weapons and urges other nations to do the same, White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater said Thursday.

Disarmament negotiators completed their work on the Chemical Weapons Convention last week in Geneva.

from its employment with Jerome County" according to the claim received by the county Thursday morning.

Hood lists "all members of the Jerome County sheriff's office and there may be others" as having knowledge of the circumstances surrounding the claim.

"We will review the claim and submit it to our insurance, then decide how best to proceed," Jerome County Attorney John Horgan said.

None of the commissioners could be reached for comment.

A tort claim is a required legal maneuver that precedes a lawsuit against a government agency. The county now has 90 days to respond to the claim. If it remains unresolved, Hood can sue the county and take his claim to court.

"I stand behind the tort claim as submitted," Hood said. "There are a lot of things I would like to do at this time, but am unable to do so at this time."

Hood was working the night Cisneros escaped from the jail by using a smuggled hacksaw blade to saw through a window grate. Cisneros, who was being held on charges of resisting arrest and driving without a license, has not been caught.

The sheriff said Hood let some of the prisoners out of their cells to get some exercise in the jail's hallway shortly before Cisneros escaped.

The Idaho attorney general's office has been investigating the escape.

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# Clinton intentionally goes slow on takeover

WASHINGTON (AP) — A confident-sounding Bill Clinton says he's trying to "slow" his takeover plans for his White House, but already has started laying plans for his White House takeover. He says he'll bring independents and Republicans into his Cabinet.

Asked in a USA Today interview Wednesday whether he had started transition planning in the event he beats President Bush in November, Clinton said, "Yes."

"I've tried to slow it down on purpose because I'm not presumptuous enough to believe this election is over," he said. "But I think I owe it to the American people to be ready if I do win on Nov. 3. So I've begun to think about some of the transition and asked some people to begin to do some work on it."

Clinton said he's preparing himself with a wide range of transition plans, but he "doesn't indicate necessarily the outcome." An ABC News-Washington Post poll released Wednesday showed Clinton with 60 percent support and Bush with 34 percent.

Clinton said he's been talking to people in the transition planning process, such as these: "How do you go about staffing the White House? How can you move quickly but with real quality to fill the Cabinet? What all our future plans are?"

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# Stagnant economy, inflation in check

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer prices rose a touch precipitous 0.1 percent in July as the stagnant economy continued to keep inflation in check, the government said Thursday.

But the extent of the economic problems was highlighted by other reports showing that retail sales managed a lackluster 0.5 percent gain, after falling in June, as Americans' real incomes fell for a second straight month.

Even a report showing that prices dropped in weekly jobless claims in July was not enough to lift economists' pessimism because they noted that the big improvement followed a large increase in the previous week.

Taken all together, analysts in the report depicted an economy barely managing to move forward with little prospect of a pickup.

There is nothing in the report, however, that suggests the economy is about to emerge from a slow, growthless, stagflationary period.

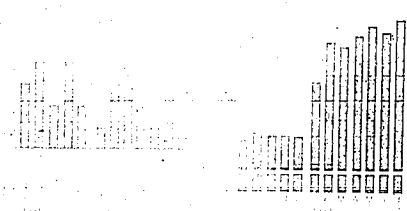

Another Thursday economic news item was that the July Consumer Price Index marked its third time this year that total price inflation has slipped slightly from its previous increase, leaving inflation for the year at an annual rate of just 2.9 percent.

July's good performance reflected a return to moderate energy prices, which fell after a two-month increase, following a two-spikes in June and the third monthly drop in food costs.

The 0.8 percent increase in total sales failed to impress economists, who noted that the Commerce Department revised away a similar June increase, saying that sales actually fell 0.5 percent during the month despite some strength in department store sales, analysts said. Total sales have gone nowhere since last year's 1.5 percent increase.

the economy over the past few months.

But private economists said while the economy was continuing to grow, the pace was so slow that they fully expected the overall jobless rate to remain very close to its current level of 7.7 percent through Election Day.

"The economy is stuck in neutral," said Mark Zandi, an economist at Regional Financial Associates in West Chester, Pa.

He predicted that the Federal Reserve, which has already cut interest rates 23 times in the last three years, could well do so again in the next month in the face of continued weak statistics.

The pattern of changes in consumer prices last month was very similar to the forces behind a similar 0.1 percent increase in wholesale prices reported by the government Wednesday.

Energy prices, which had surged by 2 percent in July, the biggest jump since October 1990, showed only a 0.1 percent rise in July. Gasoline pump prices were up 0.6 percent, compared to a 3.2 percent June increase.

Food and beverage prices fell by 0.1 percent in July, with prices charged at grocery stores actually down by 0.9 percent over the last year.

# Ship captain couldn't believe QE2 hit ground

BOSTON (AP) — The captain of the Queen Elizabeth 2 said Thursday he couldn't believe the luxury liner hit ground when it suddenly started shaking during a routine trip from Martha's Vineyard last weekend.

In his first public statement, Capt. Robin A. Woodall told investigators he was initially dumbfounded because ocean charts showed there should have been plenty of clearance for the ship.

"Grounding was the last thing that crossed my mind," Woodall said, "because I knew there was sufficient water in that area for the ship."

Woodall was the first witness at a Coast Guard hearing investigating last Friday's accident, which resulted in a 74-foot gash in the ship's hull and prompted the evacuation of 1,815 passengers.

The ship, owned by Cunard Lines, was in a Boston dry dock Thursday, where workers planned to begin inspecting the damage. The company hopes to return the ship to service on Tuesday.

The accident occurred as the ship was headed from Martha's Vineyard to New York. Woodall described it as a "time night" for a voyage, with clear visibility and a light moon over the water.

Woodall, with more than 40 years' experience at sea, was in command,

but a pilot who knows the region's waters, Capt. John Hadley, was monitoring the navigation.

Hadley, who was scheduled to pilot the QE2 after Woodall, said Wednesday, "I feel we were navigating safely."

About an hour after the ship left Martha's Vineyard, Woodall said he felt a "very heavy vibration" which stopped and then began again.

Woodall said he first assumed the ship had either hit something on the water's surface or there was a mechanical failure. After crew members ruled out those possibilities, he said his mind raced through the notion of wondering what the hell's happened.

"I could not believe that we could have touched the bottom," he said. "However it was the only remaining possibility."

Woodall noted that charts showed an ocean depth of 39 feet, plus another 2 feet of water due to the tide. The QE2's hull goes 42 feet below the water line.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, which prepares maritime charts, has been studying the accident area. Already, investigators have found at least one possibly uncharted rock, although there was no indication that it caused the damage.

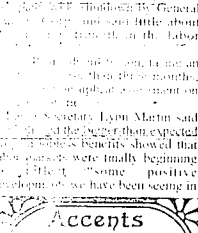

'It's still a dangerous world' as Baker leaves State Department

WASHINGTON (AP) - Middle East peace talks are entering a critical phase, the Balkans are at the point of explosion and crisis simmers in the Persian Gulf as Secretary of State James A. Baker III leaves his post to work for President Bush's re-election.

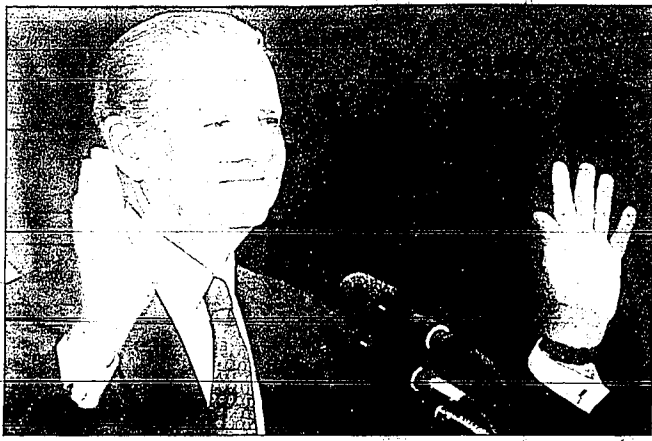
"I know we still have some work to do together," Baker told some 1,000 foreign service officers and others crowded into the Dean Acheson auditorium at the State Department Thursday. "It's still a dangerous world, as we see daily in Bosnia."

But, he said, after "long and serious thought," he and the president had concluded Baker could serve the country best by moving to Bush's side at the White House.

"I remain absolutely certain that we need a safe and strong America at home to be safe and strong abroad," Baker said.

Later, a senior State Department official said Baker would remain engaged in foreign policy issues "as the need arises," even after his resignation takes effect Aug. 23.

Baker explained this at breakfast to Lawrence S. Eagleburger, who was named acting secretary of state, the official top reporters. "The chief of staff has very broad responsibilities," he said, and Baker "will be

Some major developments of Baker's term

WASHINGTON (AP) - The world changed while James A. Baker III was secretary of state. Here are some of the notable developments and parts he played:

The Soviet Union cracked and then disintegrated. In its final throes, desperate for economic assistance, Moscow called off the Cold War and cooperated with the United States on arms reduction and withdrawal of troops from Afghanistan and Angola. Critics contend there was undue administration delay in recognizing that Mikhail S. Gorbachev was on the way out in Moscow and then there was a niggardly approach to Russia's economic plight. Some also say the U.S. response was too slow to plea from Poland, Hungary, and other former Soviet allies. However, Baker and the administration were not shy about reversing themselves. Aid was increased, Boris Yeltsin embraced and the former Yugoslav republics of Croatia, Slovenia and Bosnia-Herzegovina recognized as independent states, as the Europeans had done.

Arabs and Israelis were steered into peace talks through Baker's Middle East shuttle diplomacy. The negotiations held promise of at least an interim solution to the Palestinian problem and even hope of treaties between Israel and the Arab governments.

Worried GOP lauds shakeup

HOUSTON (AP) - Republicans cheered Thursday's shakeup in a Bush White House and campaign they said lacked discipline and focus, but said only the president himself can overcome his major obstacles to re-election.

"It's an admission that we have an uphill campaign in the fall, but it's a sign that we're not lying down," said Rep. Vin Weber of Minnesota, a leading voice among GOP conservatives. "Wherever Jim Baker has gone in this administration is where the rain has been."

Although long expected, Baker's move from the State Department to the White House was welcome news to worried Republicans gathering in Houston for next week's nominating convention.

"It is going to bring fresh new ideas and management style, a sense of decisiveness which I believe was lacking in the campaign," said Housing Secretary Jack Kemp. "It is time for some fresh leadership in the campaign."

The Republicans were unanimous in praising Baker's skills as campaign manager and tactician. Baker's longtime friendship with Bush, they say, will give him access and influence with a president who has been too slow in countering Democrat Bill Clinton and has yet to offer a compelling case for a second term.

"Clearly our party cannot win simply by attacking Democrats," Kemp said. "We need to lay out a program."

In the short term, the Republicans said, Baker will bring to the Bush campaign a single voice at the top in place of the campaign's current team-management approach under Bob Teeter, Fred Malek and Robert Moshauer. Those three, and their deputies, have drawn criticism from many Republicans who believe they have given Clinton far too much time to shape the fall debate.

"The very essence of a good campaign is to have someone who can make decisions every second of the day," said Angela "Buz" Bushman, who directed her brother Patrick's primary challenge to Bush. "You need someone forceful, someone who will define that campaign and what it stands for. They have not done any of that to date."

Implicit in much of the praise of Baker and analysis of the Bush campaign was criticism of the president himself for what some see as a lackluster campaign effort and, at least to GOP conservatives, his failure to respond more aggressively to the crawling economy.

"One problem we think we've had is that President Bush has not had a clear message," said Republican Rep. Bob Walker of Pennsylvania.

"The first Bush administration was successful in foreign policy and the next Bush administration will be successful in domestic policy," was how Weber characterized the message of the Baker shift. Weber left the clear impression he felt Bush couldn't or wouldn't adequately address domestic crises without Baker.

"I think the president will perform better with his most trusted adviser at his side."

Skinner leaves after never unsnarling administration traffic jam

WASHINGTON (AP) - With all the blame to the president's re-election woes dumped on Sam Skinner lately, it's hard to remember that he was the man who was imported last December to run things around.

"Replicating John Sununu with Skinner was supposed to get the campaign and White House troops marching lockstep toward the goal of getting George Bush re-elected. Now they're saying the same thing about Bush chief of staff number three, James Baker III."

The way it looked last fall, Sununu's personality got in the way of his job as the president's chief of staff. He was abrasive even to Republican allies. And there was that controversy about flying in Air Force splendor to his dental appointments.

Skinner hardly had time to absorb the luxury of his White House quarters, just steps from the Oval Office, when the shipping began. People who thought he could just waive a checkbook and make the Sununu mistake, now are disappointed. About

Skinner was supposed to take charge, wiping out the turf problems that had spoiled between the presidential staff in the White House and the Bush-Baker campaign, says blocks away.

The Bush message suffered. Skinner was supposed to run in the combats, but he never did. Still Skinner's persuasion did no better than Sununu's.

Skinner certainly had the street smarts to handle himself in the wolf's den that is the White House. In the 1960s, he was a top salesman for IBM. He went to night school, got a law degree and became a hot prosecutor and eventually the U.S. attorney in Chicago. He was the source of the welfare-fraud set and a member of Ronald Reagan's Organized Crime Commission.

Upward and onward. Partner in a well-connected law firm, friend of the governor and then secretary of transportation in the Bush Cabinet, where he was a "good friend of the president."

Before he became the aide-de-camp, Skinner had been on the chase side of the abortion issue in early talk-show interviews. Reporters

tried to widen that hole in the all-for-Bush wall. But Skinner quickly reminded them that when he worked for a man, he adopted that man's thinking, at least in public.

Skinner took the job with the idea that it was the toughest in America. He liked it for the army, saying "I was a company commander. Now I'm going up to battalion staff."

"I guess I'm going to be a traffic policeman, too, got to make sure the traffic is going in the right direction with the right people behind the wheel."

But the traffic jam Skinner unlearned never got unlearned and the Bush campaign was going nowhere. So on Thursday, he handed the badge to another cop.

Demos say switch may damage U.S. interests

WASHINGTON (AP) - Democrats criticized the transfer of Secretary of State James A. Baker III to the White House to help run President Bush's re-election campaign, calling it an act of political desperation that could damage American interests abroad.

Clayton R. Kopp, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, called the move "a mistake, and not in the national interest."

"I regret that the president has removed Jim Baker as secretary of state in order to run the re-election campaign," he said. "He was doing such an excellent job as secretary of state."

With the Middle East peace talks that have owed much to Baker's personal diplomacy due to resume Aug. 24, the administration appears to be giving short shrift to crucial matters, some said. Others noted volatile situations in the former Yugoslavia and a delicate reform process in the former Soviet Union.

"The United States can ill afford to have the man primarily responsible for the conduct of its foreign policy lay down his duties in order to unceremoniously terminate a political campaign," said Rep. Stephen Solarz, a senior member of the Foreign Affairs Committee.

"This move is unwise," Sen. Joseph Biden said in a Senate floor speech.

"To have our secretary resign to run a political campaign would place a taint on the job which is unprecedented in recent times - and would send a terrible signal to the world."

And Sen. Alvin D. Klinker, George Mitchell said the move would not help re-elect Bush but "hide in the shadows."

"On Nov. 3 the American people won't vote for campaign manager. They're going to vote for president," Mitchell said. "This is one more in a series of desperate actions by which obviously a panicked campaign, and I don't think it's going to make much difference."

First lady news media

HOUSTON (AP) - First lady Barbara Bush says reporters' questions about whether her husband had an extramarital affair were "an absolute outrage."

"Sick," Mrs. Bush said in an interview with the Houston Chronicle. "It was a lie. It was ugly."

Mrs. Bush, who will give a "family values" speech at the Republican National Convention next week, in Houston, gave White House interviews Wednesday to the newspaper and Houston television stations.

Her comments on the allegations echoed those of the president, who on Tuesday denounced a published report that he had an affair with longtime aide Jennifer Fitzgerald, now a State Department official.

Mrs. Bush said the reports had been "very hurtful to Jennifer."

The first lady not only denied there was any basis for the report, she also ripped the news media for pressing the issue with direct questions to Bush.

"I would be ashamed if I were the press," she said.

Mrs. Bush was asked if the campaign has reached its low point and replied, "I can't get any higher."

The interview with Mrs. Bush came a day after the president was asked what advice he would give a granddaughter contemplating an abortion.

Bush said he would urge the girl not to have an abortion but would lovingly support her, whatever the ultimate decision.

**Cargo ship rescues 7 fleeing Cubans**

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — Seven Cubans fleeing their homeland were rescued by a passing cargo ship near the Florida Keys after three days aboard a crippled, storm-tossed boat.

"We risked our lives for freedom, but we had to do it," Remberto Fuentes told The Associated Press Thursday after he was processed by U.S. immigration authorities in San Juan.

The Cubans left the northern town of Higuera, near the eastern tip of the island, for Florida on Aug. 7, but the motor on their 18-foot sailboat failed hours into the trip, said Montserrat Diaz, a spokesman for the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service.

The five men and two women were rescued Monday by the Puerto Rican cargo ship Humacao between Cuba and the Keys. The ship carried them to Puerto Rico on Wednesday.

**S. Africa OKs U.N. proposals for talks**

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — The government on Thursday accepted U.N. proposals for reviving political talks, including offers to monitor township violence and possible amnesty for political prisoners.

It also agreed to a probe of the police and military to "clean the slate" and end distrust between the government and black groups, Justice Minister Kobie Coetsee told a news conference.

The broad acceptance of United Nations proposals, which evolved from special envoy Cyrus Vance's visit in June, could clear the way for a resumption of government-ANC talks on ending white rule.

The African National Congress halted negotiations in June to protest violence in black townships, which it blames on government security forces.

**Transfusion centers lose insurance**

PARIS — France's largest insurance company said Thursday it was canceling the policies of 25 transfusion centers because of revelations from the trial of four doctors charged with allowing the sale of AIDS-tainted blood.

Michel Garetta, former director of the National Blood Transfusion Center, and three other doctors are accused of knowingly permitting the sale of AIDS-infected blood in 1985. More than 1,200 hemophiliacs contracted AIDS from the blood, and 256 have died.

The trial ended last week, and a verdict is expected Oct. 23.

**S. Korea investigates Christian sect**

SEOUL, South Korea — Police on Thursday launched an investigation of a Christian sect that is preaching the end of the world will occur in October.

Public concern has grown about the Dami Missionary Group and its thousands of followers, who have been accused of forcibly confining or kidnapping people, police said.

The group claims doomsday will occur on Oct. 28, or on some other date during the month. Police said many believers have deserted their homes, jobs or schools to prepare for the end of the world. Many have been preaching on streets, subways and in other public places, using loudspeakers and leaflets.

**European touts largest trading bloc**

BRUSSELS, Belgium — Europe, not North America, will remain the site of the world's largest trading bloc, a European Community official said Thursday.

The 12-nation EC, virtually shut down for the August break, has had no official comment on the landmark North American Free Trade Agreement setting up a free trade zone across Canada, the United States and Mexico.

But an official, speaking on condition of anonymity, told reporters Thursday that "it's not quite true" to call the North American zone, with 260 million consumers, the world's largest.

Rather, the official said the 19-nation European Economic Area, opening Jan. 1, will top North America.

**British jobless rate jumps to 9.7%**

LONDON — Unemployment in Britain jumped to 9.7 percent last month as another 29,100 people found themselves out of work, the government said Thursday.

In June, when 8,600 people had become unemployed, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 9.6 percent, the Department of Employment said.

**Stalin ordered U.S man's execution**

MOSCOW (AP) — An American in Soviet custody was sent to his death by Soviet dictator Josef Stalin, who authorized the man's execution and a story saying he died of disease, officials said Thursday.

They also revealed the names of eight additional missing Americans who vanished in the former Soviet Union during World War II in the Cold War.

The execution victim, who was not identified, was among several dozen Americans that Soviet secret police killed during and after World War II.

Most were forced to renounce their U.S. citizenship, officials said in a statement carried by the daily news paper *Lenta*.

"They were accused of espionage and other crimes, threatened and intimidated, told their children would be taken from them, and so forth," said the statement signed by Gen. Dimitri Volkov.

He and Malcolm Town, the former U.S. ambassador to Moscow, co-chaired the panel, created in March to look for American prisoners of war reportedly held in the former Soviet Union. Millions of Soviets were killed under Stalin, who ruled the Soviet Union from the 1920s until his death in 1953. The execution of the American whose case was disclosed Thursday was only one part of a wide reign of terror.

"A search through archives some times reveals terrifying documents," the statement said.

"An appeal was recently found in which (Soviet spy master) Viktor S. Abakumov requests Stalin to allow the killing in prison without trial and investigation of an American citizen earlier sentenced to eight years' imprisonment," it said.

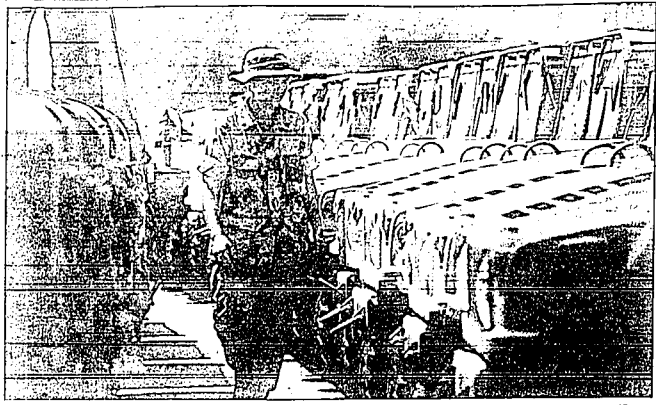
"Abakumov suggested falsifying documents and informing relatives that the prisoner died from a disease. With Stalin's consent, the hapless prisoner was killed," it said.

The newspaper did not give the name of the victim or the date of his death, but from the reports it appeared he died near the end of World War II or immediately thereafter.

**Fundamentalist offers cease-fire**

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Fundamentalist rebels attacked Afghanistan's capital with rocket-propelled bombs Thursday in an early morning assault that killed at least 100 people and wounded hundreds more.

For more than a week, fighters loyal to rebel chieftain Gulbuddin Hekmatyar have pounded Kabul with rockets and relentless artillery fire, killing or wounding more than 1,200 people, according to the government.

**U.S. troops practice unloading equipment during maneuvers**

RAJAHMUNDRY (AP) — U.S. Marines practicing rapid deployment techniques spent Thursday unloading tanks and howitzers off a heavy lift ship.

The exercise is part of a series of maneuvers that started Aug. 4 with a mock amphibious assault by 1,900 Marines.

"We know now that we can come in and off-load 530 pieces of equipment in 24 hours. The exercise demonstrates to anybody that is interested that we have this capability," said Brigadier Gen. Ted Hopwood, supervising the operation at Shuaiba port.

The equipment that came off the ship, James Anderson Jr., based in the Pacific atoll of Diego Garcia, included five M1-A1 Abrams tanks, eight howitzers and hundreds of other vehicles.

The ship is one of 13 stocked with military equipment at all times so it can be rushed, in trouble spots. It was last unloaded in Saudi Arabia after the Aug. 2, 1990, Iraqi invasion of Kuwait.

In this exercise the equipment will be put right back on board after it is taken off.

More than 5,000 U.S. troops are

taking part in two months of joint maneuvers with Kuwaitis under an intensified schedule designed to signal Washington's commitment to defend Kuwait.

U.S. officers have stressed that the exercises are part of a training cycle outlined under a 10-year defense pact signed with Kuwait last year.

But they have said they are also in Kuwait to block any potential threat from Iraq in the showdown with the United Nations over enforcing the gulf war cease-fire terms, including its failure to renounce its claim to the emirate.

**U.S. groups boost German racists**

BOSSN, Germany (AP) — The Ku Klux Klan has taken root in German cities, and Germany's growing neo-Nazi movement is getting a significant boost from other U.S. extremists as well, the government said Thursday.

In a new report whose findings are unsettling and sometimes bizarre, the government tells of German-made neo-Nazi computer games that are being traded by youths like baseball cards.

In one such game, right-wing extremists run a computer version of a Nazi death camp, sending Jewish inmates to gas chambers.

According to the report, the use of cover-nAMES by the

developers of these games makes it virtually impossible to find them.

Federal Interior Minister Rudolf Seiters, who presented the federal document, said the number of German right-wing extremists rose from 32,300 in 1990 to 39,800 last year, about 4,200 of them neo-Nazi.

Violent acts perpetrated by far-right German extremists leapt from 270 in 1990 to 1,483 last year, mostly attacks on foreigners.

More than 1,030 threats or attacks against foreigners were reported in the first six months of this year. At least five people have died.

Sniper fire kills TV producer

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — An ABC-TV producer was killed Thursday when a sniper's bullet struck him on his first day of covering one of the most dangerous journalistic assignments in decades.

David Kaplan, 45, died within hours of arriving in the Bosnian capital with an ABC television crew accompanying Milan Panic, the U.S. businessman who last month became prime minister of Yugoslavia.

Kaplan was hit while riding in the back seat of a van taking him on a perilous route from the airport to the headquarters of the United Nations Protection Force. Part of the route has been dubbed "sniper alley."

Veteran ABC reporter Sam Donaldson, who was traveling in the motorcade in a different car, said, "David probably never had a chance."

"He had lost too much blood and the bullet had done too much internal damage," Donaldson said in a shaken voice. "David Kaplan was a good man. He's been my producer for years. He worked with me during the Gulf War. He understood the risks here."

Kaplan is the first U.S. citizen to be killed while working as a journalist during the fighting in the former Yugoslavia. With his death, at least 30 journalists have been killed in the fighting since Yugoslavia began disintegrating in the summer of 1991. Scores of others have been wounded.

Kaplan, who was based in Washington, is survived by his wife Sally, also an ABC employee. He was born in Chicago and graduated from the University of Denver.

The bullet that killed Kaplan was fired from a high-powered rifle and smashed through the closed doors of the van between two large taped-on letters spelling "TV." Journalists tape "TV" on their vehicles in an attempt to discourage sniper fire.

The bullet struck Kaplan's back and went through his body. He was not wearing a flak jacket.

Kaplan was rushed to the U.N. hospital, where he died on the operating table. His body was flown out Thursday afternoon on a C-130 cargo plane to the U.S. Rhein-Main Airbase near Frankfurt, Germany.

In Washington, White House Press Secretary Martin Fitzwater called Kaplan "an honest, fair, talented and creative journalist," and described his death as a sad and personal loss.

"This is a very difficult time for those of us who worked with him because we all share so many experiences," Fitzwater said. Kaplan "was probably the only producer who could ever tell Sam Donaldson what to do and how to do it."

The Brussels-based International Federation of Journalists said in January that more journalists had been killed in the first seven months of fighting in former Yugoslavia than in any other warfare in recent history.

Journalists attempt to avoid getting hit by driving their vehicles around Sarajevo as fast as 100 mph, through the most dangerous intersections and those open to hills to the south, where Serbian snipers are positioned across the Miljacka River.

Donaldson said it was unclear which side killed Kaplan.

Snipers surround the Bosnian capital and daily pepper the city with bullets. Most of the attacks have been blamed on Serbian forces that have besieged Sarajevo for more than four months.

In an emotional news conference, Panic railed against "criminals and terrorists" whom he accused of killing Kaplan. He warned journalists that their lives were in danger in Sarajevo.

"You are targets," he said.

Turkey might take part in U.N. action

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — Plans were under way Thursday to assemble an elite mechanized battalion to be part of a possible U.N. military intervention in Bosnia-Herzegovina, a Turkish military official said.

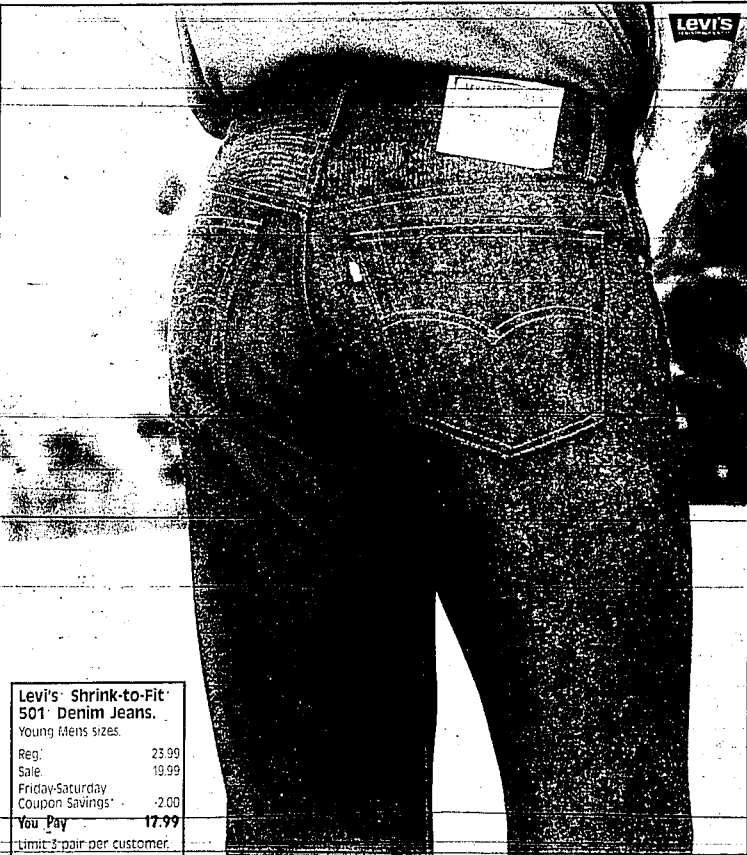
Turkey, a Muslim country with a secular state system, has been championing urgent military action to stop the ethnic fighting in Bosnia, which is 44 percent Muslim.

The military official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the battalion was being organized in hopes that the United Nations Security Council would sanction use of force.

### Big North American shark can't bite off protectionism

"Free trade, one of the greatest blessings which a government can confer on a people, is in almost every country unpopular."

— Lord Macaulay

In the shark-infested waters of international trade, we North Americans soon may be the biggest sharks of all.

As a result of the North American Free Trade Agreement, concluded Wednesday, the United States, Canada and Mexico may soon constitute the biggest trading bloc in the world, a tripartite \$6 trillion integrated economy that will dwarf Japan and Europe.

If the legislatures of the three countries approve the treaty, by 2005 it won't cost a businessman in Toronto any more to sell his products in Guadalajara than it will to sell them in Vancouver.

The potential of that system is enormous. In an international economy already driven by U.S. consumers, NAFTA offers the possibility of a post-industrial economy dominated by U.S. high-tech, Canadian capital and Mexican manufacturing.

For American agriculture, the rewards could be even greater. The continent that produces 70 percent of grain sold across international borders is in a powerful position to dictate the future of world agriculture.

But NAFTA is not an unalloyed blessing, as Congressman Richard Stallings and many Idaho agriculture groups have pointed out this week.

Idaho sugar, grain and potatoes — the state's most valuable crops — could be jeopardized by cheaper, government-subsidized commodities produced elsewhere in North America.

For while NAFTA will phase out tariffs and dismantle import fees, it will not legislate away protectionism.

In modern times, protectionism takes many forms, such as marketing boards and land set-asides. Before North America can have anything like free trade, those obstacles have to fall.

That's going to be a tedious and painful process, for there's a political constituency behind every protectionist barrier.

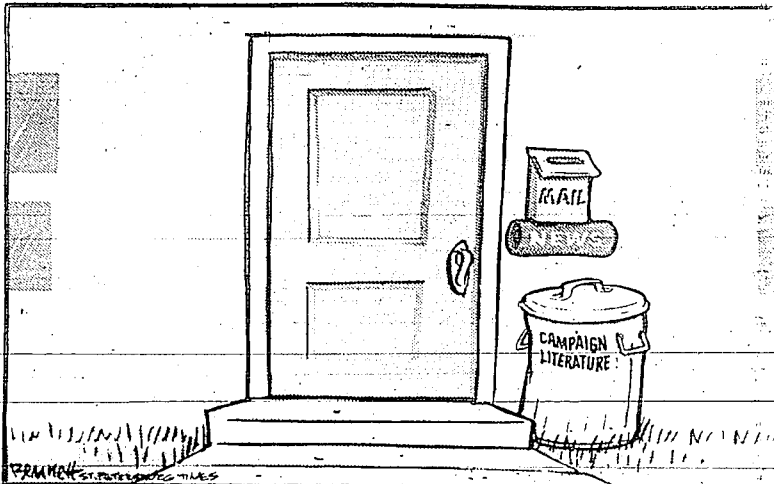
So far, the level playing field that President Bush and other backers of NAFTA tout is just a concept.

Benjamin Disraeli, the great 19th century British prime minister, once said that free trade is less a principle than an expedient, and expedients depend on self-interest.

Where's the self-interest for Idaho sugar beet growers threatened by competition from Yucatan cane growers. Where's the self-interest for Idaho grain farmers trying to compete against Canadian subsidies?

We don't know yet, and for that reason, like most Idahoans, we're suspending judgment on NAFTA for the time being.

But before free trade becomes a reality, it's going to be up to its backers to prove that the brave new world is worth the pain of parting with the old.



## Michigan harbinger for Congress

Hel-lo. It's sit-up-and-take-notice time. With what happened in the Michigan primary last week, who can deny the anti-incumbent mood out in voter-land? The public is powerful mad, all right, and there's bound to be a change in the U.S. Congress in November unlike any since the end of World War II.

In Michigan, one of the most powerful and prominent Republicans in the U.S. House, Guy Vander Jagt, was turned out of office by an unknown businessman who spent less than \$20,000 and "biked" the district. An interesting campaign gimmick, but bicycling is not what beat Guy Vander Jagt.

The super stump-speaking Vander Jagt had become a fixture in Congress since his first election in 1966. He was touted in 1980 as a vice presidential pick, and has been, since 1975, head of the National Republican Congressional Committee which works to elect other Republicans to Congress.

Vander Jagt's problem was that he spent too much time with the political elite, working for the NRCC, and not enough time working for the people of his district. His voters sent him a warning in 1990, electing him by the smallest margin of his career after he was included in an ABC "Prime Time Live" story about congressmen on a Caribbean junket.

But Vander Jagt never knew he was in trouble. Polls 24 hours before the election showed him 30 points ahead. He was stunned by the outcome. Afterward, the Detroit Free Press noted in an editorial that the state of Michigan "has now pushed into retirement or beaten seven of the present 18 members of its U.S. House delegation. People aren't giving many points for longevity in office."

Vander Jagt's defeat brings the number of incumbent congressmen defeated for nomination to 14; only three have been Republicans. (One U.S. senator, Democrat Alan Dixon of Illinois, also has gone down.)

Many of those incumbents suffered from the congressional bank scandal. Rep. Beryl Anthony, D-Ark., for example, a nine-term incumbent, lost to an opponent who focused on his 109 overdrafts.

More incumbents are expected to get the ax in September primaries. And, at last count, 65 House members (and seven senators) were voluntarily giving up their seats. The record turnover in the House was 118 following the end of World War II. Projections this year are that there will be as many as 150 new members of Congress.

But which party stands to benefit? While Vander Jagt's defeat (and Republican Newt Gingrich's scare recently in Georgia) coincided with President Bush's dramatic fall in the polls, this is not a partisan thing. It's a throw-the-bums-out sentiment. The Republicans are trying to turn public sentiment in their favor — to focus Americans not just on changing players but on changing parties in Congress, even as the Democrats focus on changing the White House.

"If people really understand, if they want President Bush to do the job, he could do it if they give him the tools," says U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, who heads the Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee. Democrats now control the Senate by a 54-43 margin.

The last time Republicans had a majority in the U.S. House was in 1954. "There hasn't been a Republican committee chairman since 1954," U.S. Rep. Dick Army, R-Texas, emphasized last week. "Democrats write the rules, control all the committees, control the agenda on the floor, hire all the key officers such as postmaster or sergeant-at-arms. I would like to see a little more focused understanding of the job."

Republicans are generally thought to have an opportunity to gain 25 to 40 seats. They need 52 more for a majority, with the current ratio being 166 Republicans, 268 Democrats and one socialist. "If we can get the focus fixed, that's not out of reach," Army contends.

He likens the opportunity to that of the post-Watergate, reform-minded 1974 Congress, which shifted power from the executive to the legislative branch through such legislation as the War Powers Act, the Budget Act of 1974 (which took authority away from the president) and the authorization of special courts. That Congress also expanded its own number of committees and subcommittees.

At least, a reform-minded Congress of newcomers would shake up who has gotten so comfy in their jobs.

But getting voters to put the same party in the White House and the Congress will not be easy. Voters in general trust neither party, yet they hedge their bets by letting Republicans control the White House and Democrats control Congress. By deliberately sending a divided government to Washington, voters guarantee the gridlock that has become prevalent in Washington.

Many voters like to pride themselves on voting "for the person, not the party." To really force change, however, voters have to take the risk of putting one party or the other in charge.

If nothing else, perhaps such high-profile defeats as Guy Vander Jagt's will make all of us — press and public alike — curtail our obsession with the presidential race and examine more closely those who are running for Congress — where most of the domestic decisions are made.

I am writing this letter as a concerned parent and a citizen of Twin Falls County. I have two small children who go to day care in a private home. Our provider is licensed, and to be licensed, they are required to hold a current cardiopulmonary resuscitation card. Two employees of this day care took a night class taught by Mr. Cal Edwards, who not only instructs CPR and first aid to police officers but is also a firefighter and candidate for the office of sheriff.

Here is my concern. The participants in this class received no book. They did receive a lecture in Adult, Child and Infant Obstructed Airway and CPR techniques, along with very limited demonstration and hands-on practice. They received no skills test or written tests at the end of the class and were given cards certifying them in CPR.

I have been a CPR instructor for approximately 10 years for both the American Heart Association and the American Red Cross, and I have never heard of a class taught like this one.

I have since seen that this day care's employees are being properly certified. My only question at this point is how many other day care centers and police officers are improperly trained in CPR?

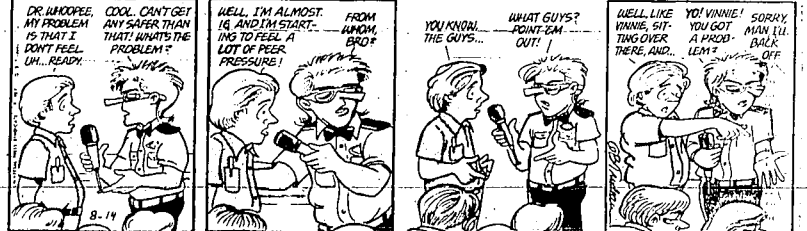

# Big changes in a year: Soviet-made MiGs now welcome in U.S.

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — A year ago, if a couple of Soviet-made MiG jet fighters had come anywhere near a U.S. Strategic Air Command base they might have been shot down.

Now, SAC a relic of the Cold War era, and a pair of Ukrainian pilots and their planes were welcome in Spokane.

"I never imagined being in the United States," Col. Valery Soloshenko said through an interpreter Monday. "I didn't imagine or think of it before."

Soloshenko, a Ukrainian fighter pilot, had just flown one of two MiG-29 jets over Fairchild Air Force Base to land at

Spokane International Airport. Capt. John Jensen, a Montana Air National Guard F-16 pilot, escorted Soloshenko and Col. Alexander Holovan into Eastern Washington from a Canadian air show.

Capt. Mike Miller, a Washington Air National Guard pilot, posed for a picture of the nose of the MiG with some of his friends.

"A year ago, I was pulling tanker alert over there," Miller said, nodding toward Fairchild, west of Spokane.

A year ago, there was still a Soviet Union and a Cold War. The U.S. military

was ready to launch its planes on a moment's notice. A year ago, the MiGs would have been painted camouflage greens and yellows, rather than the bright blues and grays of the new Ukrainian Air Force. Now, instead of inviting bullet holes by flying over restricted U.S. airspace, the MiGs' fuselages are plastered with stickers from Gnat units, air shows and Western cities the pilots have visited.

The designation of U.S. Strategic Air Command bases were done away with in favor of other management units as part of a national reorganization of the Air Force.

Soloshenko and Holovan have flown the MiGs in air shows across the United States and Canada for five months, trying to raise awareness of Ukraine as an independent country.

They were in Abbottsford, British Columbia, last weekend, and will be in Columbus, Ohio, next.

"We're a pioneering group," Soloshenko said. "We're the first representatives of a free Ukraine. We're not showing military might but all aspects of free trade."

After the Soviet Union broke up, Ukraine formed its own air force.

The Ukrainians were invited to attend air shows but didn't have an equivalent of

the U.S. Thunderbirds. So Soloshenko and Holovan developed a routine with the former Soviet Union's top-of-the-line fighter. The Ukrainians and their escorts were only scheduled to refuel in Spokane but had to extend their stay after one MiG blew two tires landing.

A safety mechanism caused the tires to deflate when the brakes overheated, and spare tires had to be flown in from the supply truck that was still in Canada.

The Cold War hasn't been over long enough for Spokane Airways to stock spare parts for a MiG, one company official said.

## Girl killed for \$475 rent check

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A 16-year-old girl was stabbed to death to get a \$475 rent check she had been given by the Mormon church, officials contend.

The allegation was in court documents filed Wednesday as Elroy Max "Bugsy" Esquibel, boyfriend of Shannon Anderson, was charged with capital homicide in the slaying and with the rape and kidnapping of Anderson's 10-year-old sister.

The incidents occurred on Aug. 6 and police arrested Esquibel that afternoon at a transient camp near Wasatch Spring. He was incoherent from sniffling paint thinner, they said.

Esquibel remained in the Salt Lake County Jail and will appear before 3rd Circuit Judge Sheila McCleave Aug. 18 at 9:30 a.m. for a roll call hearing.

Prosecutors will seek the death penalty, said Deputy Salt Lake County Attorney Gregory G. Skordas.

"He had a prior conviction for a crime of violence, which fits our death-penalty statute," Skordas said. "The other reason is the crimes that were committed in connection with the homicide, the rape of a child and the aggravated kidnapping of the 10-year-old."

According to court documents, the Ros Park 10th Ward, and a church Relief Society official visited the victims' home several times the night of the killing. The girls' mother was in jail on Aug. 6, serving time on a shoplifting charge.

Ringwood said he delivered a \$475 check to the 16-year-old, payable to her landlord. Police later found the check. Ringwood said he also left food for the family and then left the home at 10 p.m.

The girls then went to sleep, the 10-year-old in her bedroom upstairs and the older girl in her basement bedroom.

Shortly after midnight, the younger girl was awakened by Esquibel, who carried her downstairs and raped her, the documents allege. He "then tied her up, put a sock in her mouth and covered her with blankets and threatened to kill her if she moved," the documents said.

## Ferry accident kills 1

NANAIMO, British Columbia (AP) — A van carrying six people fell into Departure Bay Thursday as it was boarding a ferry, causing the death of one woman and critical injuries to her two children, police and hospital officials said.

The accident occurred about 8 miles during the landing of the Queen of New Westminster, which was scheduled to sail to Tsawwassen, south of Vancouver.

The van, which had Alberta license plates, somehow toppled into the Vancouver Island bay, said Staff Sgt. Wayne Legge of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

RCMP divers pulled the van's six occupants — a mother and father, their two daughters and a friend, and the daughters' grandmother — were pulled out of the water and taken to Nanaimo Regional General Hospital.

The mother, in her early 40s, died, said hospital spokeswoman Anya Pugh. The daughters, ages 11 and 14, were in critical condition, she said.

## Reagans in good health after exams

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Doctors found former President Reagan and his wife, Nancy, in excellent health during the couple's annual physical examinations, a family spokeswoman said Wednesday.

Reagan, 81, and Mrs. Reagan, 71, underwent the routine checkups Tuesday and Wednesday at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., said spokeswoman Cathy Goldberg.

Reagan was returning to Angeles to finish the address to the Republican National Convention in Houston on Monday, Ms. Goldberg said.

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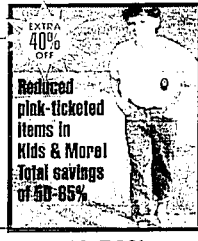

**Outbacks decision delayed**

**WAHIAE (AP)** — The Board of Education has postponed a decision on whether to abolish the outback and police departments to cope with a funding shortage.

Since 1989, delinquent property taxes on an average depressed by a falling mining industry have reached \$115,000.

City Council members are considering a plan to lay off 10 of the city's three police officers and three person fire department. The council is thinking about turning to an all-volunteer fire department and contracting with another agency, such as the Shoshone County Sheriff's Office, to provide law enforcement.

**Equalized benefits idea put on hold**

**BOISE (AP)** — The president of the state Board of Education says he will temporarily shelve his proposal to equalize the benefits for exempt and classified employees at Idaho's public universities to allow their contract.

Two months ago, Karl Shurtliff of Boise said he intended to ask the board to provide the same level of benefits for exempt employees, university administrators and professional staff as the state's other employees. Classified workers include clerical and maintenance jobs.

But Shurtliff on Wednesday said he will temporarily drop the idea to allow exempt workers at Idaho's four-year schools to voice their concerns to the state senate.

"I'm a value to listen to those arguments," he said. "That's all that should change. Waiting another month or two on that anything."

Some of the University of Idaho's exempt employees and they worry the plan would cost the state more money.

UF officials estimate the school's annual payroll costs would increase \$1.7 billion a year.

Exempt employees currently earn salaries as high as \$100,000 a year. But they do not receive comparable time-off and overtime pay like classified workers.

Valerie Roberts, chairwoman of the UF Staff Affairs Committee, said she is disappointed Shurtliff is delaying his plan.

"I think it shows he is willing to examine the issue a little more and his concern and interest in employees," she said.

However, Shurtliff said he still plans to ask the board to adopt his plan as a member. But board member Glenn Maloney of Lewiston contended he is heading a deal horse.

"We have discussed the issue and we have found it," she said Wednesday.

Five months ago, a board subcommittee concluded the plan should not change its annual leave policy because studies indicate there would be large financial loss.

**Man convicted; 6 life terms ordered**

**COEUR D'ALENE (AP)** — David Holden of Coeur d'Alene faces six life sentences in prison for his 1st District Court conviction in the brutal rape of his wife.

The seven woman, five-man jury returned six guilty verdicts late Wednesday evening after deliberating for nine hours.

Holden was found guilty of raping his wife, forcibly penetrating her with a variety of foreign objects and forcing her to commit other sexual acts.

Holden, 26, was charged with one count of rape, six counts of forcible penetration and two counts of inflicting serious bodily injury.

Sentencing is set for Oct. 21.

Idaho's County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Lansing Haynes said the verdict represents justice for the victim and vindication for the Coeur d'Alene Police Department, which handled "a case of insidious nature and an extremely traumatized victim with professionalism and sensitivity."

During the three-day trial, Holden's wife testified he repeatedly raped and sexually assaulted her for eight hours on the night of March 27-28.

In his closing argument, Haynes said the victim was held "virtual hostage" in her home during the eight-hour ordeal.

**Locals differ over reaction to Earth First! invasion**

**GRANGEVILLE (AP)** — Earth First! activists may be on a crusade to save the Nez Perce National Forest from logging, but the residents of Elk City and Dixie differ whether they even want them there.

Judy Willis, owner of the Lodgepole Pine Inn in Dixie, said there were rumors some tourists planned to stay away because of possible conflicts with the activists.

"There's been some concern, but so far this week we've had a fairly good flow of traffic," Willis said. "But people were concerned, I guess they have this vision that the activists are out there sabotaging campers.... They're not. They're doing their thing and we have not had any problems with them."

"They come in and do their business and are gone. Fortunately, we've had no rumors with the loggers and the Earth Firsters here in Dixie, but if things continue... the antics they are supposedly doing, I don't know."

Willis said some tourists were worried the road to Dixie had been closed to the public. But forest officials closed off a portion of the Cove Mallard area to the east, not the main route in.

But two business people in Elk City paint a more hostile picture of the mixture of environmentalists and area loggers and contractors.

Lodge, said the local opinion of the group is "very, very negative."

"They've done a lot of damage to the (road construction) equipment. They've dug a ditch across the road and covered it with leaves" and a local contractor was injured when he fell in, Cleaver said, adding he would not rent a room to them.

"The local joke around town about how to tell an Earth Firster is: 'They're a jack that looks like a jill that smells like a jill,'" Cleaver said.

Sybil Williams, manager of Tiffy's Cafe, has posted a sign in her window telling Earth First! activists to stay out.

"Why should they come here and disrupt our lifestyle? They're from back East and they have no business out here."

Erik Ryberg, a Earth First! spokesman, said despite the distrust of his group, there have been no serious incidents of harassment or violence.

"The local people have treated us extremely well," Ryberg said. "The people at Dixie have stuck their necks out at times for us, not because they agree with us, it's because they treat us like human beings."

Kim Pringle, manager of the Junction Lodge, maintains a broad-minded attitude about the differences of opinion.

### Idaho Power plans outage this Sunday

TWIN FALLS — It's lights-out in much of Cassia County, eastern Jerome County and the Milner area of Twin Falls County Sunday morning.

Idaho Power Co. is installing new generators at Milner Dam, and will need to shut off electricity for four hours Sunday morning to finish the job.

Electricity service will be shut off from about 11 a.m. to all parts of Cassia County served by Idaho Power, to the Hazelton and Eden areas of Jerome County and to the areas of Twin Falls County near the dam, although service to Murtaugh will not be interrupted.

### Hansen racketeering trial moved again - to Aug. 31

POCATELLO — The racketeering trial of former congressman George Hansen and ex-aid John Scoresby has been rescheduled again, this time due to conflicting court schedules.

Most recently set for Aug. 24 and transferred from Pocatello to Boise, the Hansen-Scoresby trial now is scheduled to begin Aug. 31 to accommodate U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge.

He currently is presiding over a Pocatello drug trial.

Hansen and Scoresby each were indicted by a federal grand jury March 12 on 49 counts of bank fraud.

They face up to 30 years in prison and a \$1 million fine on each count if convicted.

The two originally were scheduled to stand trial in Pocatello beginning May 5, but they were granted an extension until Aug. 18 and earlier this week the trial was set to begin Aug. 24.

The latest change was ordered Thursday.

### Gooding officials investigate rape reported near Hagerman

HAGERMAN — Authorities in Gooding County are investigating a rape reported south of Hagerman Tuesday evening.

"We're trying to follow some leads right now," Gooding County Sheriff Robert Aja said Thursday.

Aja declined to release many details about the incident, saying such information could hamper his investigation.

A woman in her late 20s called the sheriff's office and said was working south of Hagerman when she was attacked by a stranger Tuesday evening, Aja said.

Authorities have no firm suspects, but they believe the attacker is a local person, he said.

### Buhl mayor off landfill search group, Castleford man on

TWIN FALLS — Buhl Mayor Ted Pence won't be serving on the advisory committee looking for a site for a possible new Twin Falls County landfill.

County Commissioner Norma Blass said Thursday that Pence's name was erroneously released with the names of the other eight members of the committee appointed by the commissioners Wednesday to explore alternatives to a regional landfill.

But Blass said that Jake Prudek of Castleford has been added to the committee, which as its first official duty is to make a tour of five potential landfill sites Monday morning.

The committee is scheduled to make a recommendation on a landfill site to the county commission by Sept. 1.

### Officials charge Filer man with molesting 14-year-old

BUIL — A Filer man has been charged with molesting a 14-year-old Twin Falls County girl while the two were working at a dairy last week.

A preliminary hearing for Walter Tibbets, 24, is set for Aug. 21.

Twin Falls County sheriff's deputy Dan Mort began investigating the case after the girl told an Idaho Department of Health and Welfare worker that she had sex with a man at the dairy in early June.

In separate interviews, Tibbets admitted to police that he had sexual contact with the girl, according to Mort's affidavit included in the court file.

No formal plea has been entered in the case.

## Candidates warily eye free-trade pact

TWIN FALLS — Idaho's would-be senators and representatives warily eyeballed the proposed North American Free Trade Agreement Thursday, with comments ranging from cautious optimism to outright opposition.

No one flatly opposed the idea of creating a free-trading zone between the United States, Mexico and Canada, but they all said, in various ways, that "free trade has to mean fair trade."

Translated, that means they won't vote for NAFTA if it unduly hurts Idaho farmers.

The agreement, which President Bush announced Wednesday, would remove tariffs and other impediments to the

movement of goods, services and money between the three countries over a 15-year period.

Bush is expected to formally present the agreement to Congress on or around Sept. 8. Negotiating it has been one of the main goals of his administration, and he hopes it will be one of his key legacies.

But both chambers of Congress, along with the Canadian and Mexican national legislatures, must approve the agreement first. Congress likely won't vote on it until

## Loss of funding forces raptor center to shut down, release recovering birds

GLENN'S FERRY — The Raptor Rehabilitation Center in Glens Ferry closed its doors Thursday, forcing more than two dozen sick and injured birds of prey out of the nest and ruffling the feathers of the handful of volunteers who have dedicated four years to saving Idaho's winged hunters.

The center, which cares for more than 100 injured owls, eagles and hawks each year, shut down operations following the announcement that \$6,700 of funding from the Idaho Fish and Game Department's non-game "Challenge Grant" program had been pulled.

The center's Director Pat Smith said she and other Rehab volunteers have held meetings with the Fish and Game's head of non-game funding Wayne Melquist since last April, but to no avail.

"We are no longer taking birds into the center as of today," Smith said from her Glens Ferry home Thursday. "We just don't have the money to keep it open anymore. It's a blow."

Smith said the department had given the center a "big chunk" of its non-game budget in years past and even declared the center Idaho's central Raptor Rehabilitation Facility last year.

But because of a 50 percent cut in the non-game budget this year the department will no longer fund the program, which has cared for and released more than 300 birds since 1987.

"We're trying to meet the needs of the public," said Melquist. "There needs are growing, but the dollars we bring in haven't increased. In fact, the non-game money has declined some in recent years."

Melquist added he didn't think that Smith's program had had effect on the environment.

"She's doing a tremendous job, and her project is popular from a public standpoint," he said. "But from a biological standpoint, rehabilitation of these animals really isn't having an impact on the environment."

"We're frustrated to some extent. But the department is already funded more than half its budget from outside sources, and we simply can't afford this kind of thing."

Smith started the rehab center with a small group of volunteers in 1987, after her husband, Larry, began bringing injured birds home as part of his work as an officer with Fish and Game.

Thanks to public-education efforts, the center grew from caring for seven birds in 1987 to more than 100 birds in 1990, with volunteers nursing their winged patients through everything from gunshot wounds and electrocution to food poisoning and malnutrition.

Smith said she and other volunteers spent many hours every day just gathering whole animals for the birds to eat.

"I'm really angry about this," said Smith, who has put more than \$30,000 of her own money into the center in the past four years. "We showed the Fish and Game that by running the center here, we saved them about \$25,000 last year."

"They're mandated to protect our wildlife. We asked them several times during our last meeting on Tuesday, 'What does wildlife mean?' But they don't have any answers because they don't have any money."

## Rupert author writes of woman's plight in WWII

RUPERT — It's sort of like having a baby that's 2 years old before anybody knows about it.

That's how Terry Montague described Wednesday's release of "Fireweed," a 311-page, 115,000-word novel that Montague conceived two years ago this month and completed — appropriately enough — after nine months of labor.

"Fireweed" centers on a Berlin Mormon woman, Lisel Spann, whose family is destroyed by Nazis and whose beloved city is decimated by Allied bombers during World War II. Spann must eventually flee the city to escape the advancing Russians.

Montague's work has been published once before, when her nonfiction work, "Mine Angels Round About," recounted the experiences of LDS missionaries in Nazi Germany.

In an interview Thursday, Montague said the 59 interviews she conducted for that book inspired her to write "Fireweed."

The response to her novel has been very favorable, she said.

"Everyone that's spoken to me has said, I can't believe how real it was," Montague said.

The attention she has received already over the soft-cover novel (published at \$9.95 by Covenant Communications, Inc.) caught Montague off-guard.

Speaking to a group of book buyers Wednesday, she said several who read advance copies of "Fireweed" told her how moved they were by the book.

"I've written something two years ago and to all of the sudden get all this attention is very, very strange," she said.

Although primarily a dramatic novel, Montague said the story line includes liberal doses of humor.

Not so humorous was the six-week period during the writing of the book when

she reduced her daily caloric intake to 800 calories to experience the pain of hunger as she thinks her characters might have.

The title "Fireweed" comes from the plant that sprouts from the ground after fire has burned away all the other living things in a forest or meadow.

The lead character, Spann, is likened to the fireweed plant by her overcoming personal tragedy to become charitable and selfless.

Montague, who herself is of German descent, is the director of public relations at Minidoka Memorial Hospital.

She is a Brigham Young University graduate and resides in Rupert with her husband, Quinn, and their daughter, Elizabeth.

## Blaine County loosens rules for open space

HAILEY — Can open space contain fences, trails and roads?

It can now in Blaine County, as a result of a change by the county commissioners this week in the subdivision ordinance.

The title "Fireweed" comes from the plant that sprouts from the ground after fire has burned away all the other living things in a forest or meadow.

Modified to settle a debate over management of a five-acre parcel of riverfront property near Bellevue, the new definition allows fences, trails, parking and irrigation systems on public open space earmarked for the county by subdivision developers.

Donated to the county as open space when the Broadford Polo Club Subdivision was platted in 1985, the land has attracted increased use and abuse by off-road vehicles in recent years, according to neighboring property owners.

Led by Kiki Tidwell, the Broadford Polo Club Homeowners Association petitioned the county for fencing that will restrict motor vehicle use.

But under the old definition of open space in the county ordinance, such areas could not have fences, trails, roads or parking areas.

"If it deteriorates by happenstance, which is what's happening, we can't do anything about it," Commissioner Tom Blanchard said in June.

**City contracts upset Idaho Falls mayor**

IDAHO FALLS — Doyle Beck, an Idaho Falls asphalt contractor once accused of trying to bribe the city's public works director, has been awarded two city contracts worth \$419,000.

Mayor Tom Campbell called the Idaho Falls City Council decision "foolish," and Public Works Director Chad Stanger objected.

But some of the council's newest members said it was time to end the city's feud with Beck, despite lawsuits still pending before the Idaho Supreme Court and concern over the quality of Bevo Construction's work.

The unsuccessful 1989 candidate for mayor accused city officials in the 1980s of favoring their cronies in bids for city construction contracts. The city denied the allegations and accused Beck of trying to bribe Stanger.

No charges were filed and Beck denied the bribery allegation.

**Neibaur to assist Medicaid group**

BOISE — Former state lawmaker Brent Brocksome has picked six people to help him sort out Idaho's beleaguered Medicaid program.

They include Mack Neibaur, long-time former legislator from Paul; Robert Decker, former superintendent of the Idaho State School & Hospital in Nampa; Jess Brauner, an independent insurance agent in Boise.

Also, Gloria Crockford, Ada County Community Services Chair; Dawson, a Boise pharmacist; and Gary Fleicher, senior vice president of St. Luke's Regional Medical Center in Boise.

The Legislature's special committee on health care has appointed Brocksome, a former Republican state representative from Ada County, who operates health care facilities in Boise.

**Project eyes farm crops as motor fuel**

BOISE — Two three-quarter ton pickup trucks have launched a demonstration project to show the feasibility of using Idaho farm crops as a motor-fuel source.

The state BioDiesel Demonstration Project kicked off on the steps of the Statehouse Thursday. A gallon of biodiesel, a blend of 80 percent diesel and 20 percent rapeseed oil, was poured into one of the trucks to get the demonstration going.

Officials said each vehicle will be driven 30,000 miles in the first year of the demonstration. It's expected to continue for three years, or 100,000 miles, if funding is available.

**Rivers group touts project to save fish**

MOSCOW — The spring Snake River test drawdown was highly successful and north-central Idaho businesses should welcome the salmon recovery rather than high water, Idaho Rivers United says.

The statewide river advocacy group is traveling around Idaho with informational meetings. "Restoration of salmon is going to bring jobs and money to Idaho," said Liz Paul, associate director, who spoke Wednesday in Moscow.

Biologists are studying whether lowering the Snake reservoirs to river-like levels might help flush young salmon smolts downstream to the ocean.

**Pharmacist fined for supplying drugs**

COEUR D'ALENE — When authorities arrested a Hayden Lake woman on embezzlement charges this spring, they picked up her pharmacist husband as well.

The state Board of Pharmacy has suspended and fined Lewiston pharmacist Kent Dean after police learned he illegally provided his estranged wife with several prescription drugs.

His license was suspended for a similar offense in 1979.

Debra Lynn Dean admitted in March to the theft of \$9,400 from Precision Time in Coeur d'Alene, where she worked as a bookkeeper.

**Lawyer asks court to delay execution**

BOISE (AP) — An attorney for convicted slayer Mark Henry Linkford asked the Idaho Supreme Court on Thursday to delay Linkford's scheduled execution for at least six months so he can prepare a defense.

In a written brief, Orofino attorney Nick Chenoweth said he was only appointed to represent Linkford on July 29, and needs at least six months to properly prepare the case. Chenoweth said he needs preparation time to "adequately understand and raise legitimate defenses to which he may be entitled." There was no immediate action from the Supreme Court.

Chenoweth also said there have been seven previous lawyers representing Linkford in nine years of legal battles, and he needs time to gather up the "scattered materials" from their files. Chenoweth said he understood there were at least six file boxes of papers among the other attorneys.

Chenoweth argued that there is an "unanswered and undecided" petition for post-conviction relief on file for Linkford, and it raises issues that cannot be decided before the scheduled execution.

At an Aug. 10 hearing before 2nd District Judge George Reinhardt III, Idaho Solicitor General Lynn

Thomas argued that Mark Linkford already has filed a petition for post-conviction relief with the Idaho court system, which has been decided. He is not entitled to go through the process a second time, Thomas said.

Allowing Linkford to "fracture" his appeals would allow the appeal to "go on and on forever," Thomas argued.

Linkford, 36, a native of Cimarron, Texas, is scheduled to be executed shortly after midnight Aug. 29. He and his brother, Bryan, 31, were convicted of the robbery-murders of Marine Corps Capt. Robert Bravence, 27, and his wife, Cheryl,

25, of El Paso, Texas. Trial testimony indicated the Bravences were camped in a forest campground in Idaho County when the Linkfords clubbed them to death and stole their vehicle and credit cards. Witnesses said the Linkfords fled criminal charges in Texas and abandoned their car near where the Bravences were camped.

Bryan Linkford also was sentenced to death in the case, but that sentence was overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court on grounds that he was not made sufficiently aware that the death penalty was being considered in his case. He is awaiting resentencing.

**PACs give plenty to Senate, House candidates**

POCAHELLO (AP) — With 12 weeks left before the Nov. 3 general election, special interest groups are pouring money into the races for Idaho's open U.S. Senate and House seats.

Idaho candidates for the U.S. Senate and 2nd Congressional District seats are among the top 50 recipients nationwide of campaign money from political action committees, according to the Federal Election Commission.

The FEC this week released its financial rankings of 1992 Senate and House candidates, through June 30. Idaho Republican Party Chairman Phil Batt said out-of-state money is an unhealthy influence on candidates.

"If I had a magic wand, I would put a stop to those types of activities," Batt said. "I think Idahoans should be able to decide their own fate."

But receiving large PAC donations does not obligate Idaho lawmakers to special interest groups, state Democratic Party Chairman Mike

Wetherell said. "They cannot hide from their constituency in a state this small," he said.

The high rankings did not surprise either party leader.

Idaho's U.S. Senate races in particular appeal to PAC contributors because they are less expensive to influence than races in more populous states, Wetherell said. "The political fact of life is that a vote in the U.S. Senate counts the same whether it's from California, New York or Idaho."

Republican Dirk Kempthorne, the mayor of Boise, and Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings are running to replace retiring GOP Sen. Steve Symms. "It's a non-incumbent race and therefore up for grabs," Batt said.

Stallings reported \$352,100 in PAC contributions, placing him 35th nationally. Kempthorne received \$19,500 from PACs, according to the FEC. Kempthorne ranked 46th among all Senate candidates.

Kempthorne, who won a three-way primary for the GOP nomination, also

ranked 41st nationally among U.S. Senate candidates in campaign debt. His disclosure report showed debts totaling \$56,000 through June.

Stallings reported only \$7,184 in campaign debts.

In the race to replace Stallings in Congress, state Senate President Pro Tem Michael Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, and Democratic state Auditor J.D. Williams also made the top-50 list for PAC contributions.

Crapo ranked 35th nationally, receiving \$61,996 in contributions through June. Williams was 42nd, taking in \$55,250 from PACs, the FEC report showed.

The report showed Williams had received \$45,236 in individual contributions through June while Crapo had taken in \$140,842. But Crapo's campaign showed \$230,205 in expenses while Williams' expenses were under \$74,000.

**Andrus tells prison board more concrete isn't answer**

BOISE (AP) — State Corrections officials say they're headed toward another budget crunch, with a soaring prison population pushing up against a state budget that can't fund a big increase in the department's spending next year.

But Gov. Cecil Andrus told the Board of Correction Thursday the answer isn't simply building more prisons. "Society has got to find a better answer than pouring more concrete and pounding more nails. There's got to be a better answer."

I'd rather put my money into a new building than a new prison," he said.


Board Chairman Nick Miller of Boise told Andrus there has been a "dramatic surge" in the state prison census in the last few weeks. "We're concerned that our budget needs are going to be difficult to keep in line with your directives for holding expenditure down."

Overall, he said, a state prison system that had 1,600 inmates to deal with a few years ago now has 2,400 inmates to accommodate.

**NASHVILLE, Tenn.** — Garth Brooks survived an onslaught of newcomers in Thursday's Country Music Association award nomination sweepstakes. Randy Travis and Clint Black weren't so lucky.

Brooks, America's top-selling singer in the '90s, received three nominations: entertainer of the year, best male vocalist and best album.

The other nominees for top entertainer are Reba McEntire, Vince Gill, Alan Jackson and Travis Tritt. Gill and Tritt led the finalists with five nominations each. Jackson and McEntire had four each.

"Winners" of the 26th annual awards will be announced Sept. 30 during a CBS-TV special at the Grand Ole Opry House.

Newcomers such as Billy Ray Cyrus and Mary-Chapin Carpenter attracted their share of the spotlight in the nomination derby, while longtime superstars Black and Travis were left guessing.

Black and Travis, both former male vocalists of the year, were named finalists in only one minor category each.

Cyrus' "Achy Breaky Heart" was nominated for best single and best video. Carpenter bagged nominations for best female vocalist, best single and for writing "Down by the Twist and Shout."

Nominees and winners are chosen by the 6,000 members of the CMA.

Nominated for best male vocalist are Brooks, Gill, Jackson, Tritt and Joe Diffie. For No. 1 female vocalist, finalists are McEntire, Carpenter, Wynonna Judd, 1991 winner Tanya Tucker and Trisha Yearwood.

"Achy Breaky Heart" led the nominees for single of the year. Others are "I Feel Lucky" by Carpenter, "Look at Us" by Gill, "Love Me" by newcomer Collin Raye and "Maybe It Was Memphis" by Pam Tillis.

Brooks' "Ropin' the Wind," which has sold 7 million copies, is among the finalists for top album. Others are "Brand New Man" by Brooks & Dunn (the duo Kix Brooks and Ronnie Dunn), "For My Broken Heart" by McEntire, "What Do I Do With Me" by Tucker and "Wynonna" by Judd.

The nominations for Judd are her first since launching a solo career earlier this year. She and her mother, Naomi, were the duo the Judds until Naomi retired from concerts last December because of hepatitis.

The Judds were nominated for duo of the year, along with Baillie & the Boys, the Bellamy Brothers, Brooks & Dunn and Sweethearts of the Rodeo.

## Summer action films make way for women

To the surprise of virtually everyone in the movie business, the summer of 1992 may be remembered for its women — and not the women you'd expect, such as Ripley, the Alien Slayer.

Back in early May, few could have predicted that two of the season's most enduring images would be Whoopi Goldberg in a nun's habit and Geena Davis in a baseball uniform. After all, the summer movie season's big guns usually are just that — big guns.

Male-oriented action films generally swamp the hot-weather months. But this year, those two movie-blockbusters, "Batman Returns" and "Lethal Weapon 3," earned their \$100 million-plus quickly and then departed the Top 10 box-office charts faster than anticipated.

By comparison, "Sister Act" and "A League of Their Own" provided the summer's backbone. Quieter blockbusters, they opened to less spectacular figures than the two action hits, but their box-office decline has been far less precipitous. Obviously, the word-of-mouth is positive.

"The trend right now in Hollywood is to try to make a movie that an enormous amount of people want to see once, such

as "Batman Returns" and "Lethal Weapon 3," says John Shaw, president of MovieLine International, a film consulting firm for domestic and overseas distributors. "The problem is that's how many times they see those films — just once. But the studios are happy because they get a huge amount of money back within the first several weeks."

"If feel-good, human interest movies are done well, they attract repeat viewers. Both 'Sister Act' and 'A League of Their Own' are fresh, original films, dealing with particular subjects that haven't been done before."

Regardless of their artistic merits, the summer's two "sisterhood" hits feature strong female characters working together and enjoying almost every minute of it. "Sister Act" stars Goldberg as a lounge singer and murder witness who, under police protection, hides in a convent and brings fresh life to the nunnery.

"A League of Their Own" features Davis in a tribute to the all-female professional baseball team that flourished during World War II. Rumbles of this feminist trend were discernible last summer, when "Thelma & Louise" was the season's most widely

Lullabies and nursery rhymes, when combined gradually with more thoughtful reading, are an excellent primer for raising a reader. Rhyming games that combine recitation with fun and eye-hand coordination have multiple benefits.

For the very young, ages 2 1/2 to 3 1/2, the 38 simple rhymes in "The Betsy Wetsy Spidey: Fingerplays and Action Rhymes" (Albany, N.Y., \$9.95) by Joanna Cole and Stephanie Calanchiano. Line drawings by Alan Tiegreen demonstrate how to make fingers drive a toy engine, fry sausages, pour tea and keep five monkeys in line until it's time to go rolling home. Just for the motor skills benefits, this one is worth buying for a toddler or "new" parents.

Brightly colored photographs by George Anonima give away the answers, and the answer also is printed on the page facing the riddle.

"Lightning Inside You and Other Nature-Mimicking Riddles," edited by John Biehorst, (Monte Junior Books, \$14.95) for 8 and older.

Rhyming riddles might seem like a more mature version of nursery rhymes. Children 8 and older, but necessarily more mature, are likely to enjoy the silly verses in "Lots of Limericks," selected by editor Myra Cohn Livingston (Margaret K. # Lollapalooza

## Festival offers best of alternative music

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Calif. (AP) — Lollapalooza, nine hours of loud music, political pep talks, performance art and tattoos.

The festival that caters to the MTV generation's answer to counterculture kicked off its U.S. tour at the Shoreline Amphitheater in Mountain View on July 18 and continued to New York Tuesday and Wednesday. (The remaining dates on the tour: Atlanta, Aug. 20; and Los Angeles, Sept. 11-12).

It offers a deafening array of America's hottest alternative bands: the Red Hot Chili Peppers, Soundgarden, Pearl Jam, Jesus and the Mary Chain, and Ministry, among others.

"Kids are fed up paying 28 bucks to see one band," said Peter Barsotti, the Bill Graham Presents producer who set up the "concourse of oddities and curiosities" accompanying the music at all 35 venues.

South-central Los Angeles rapper Ice-T, who has been at the center of a nationwide debate over the lyrics of his song "Cop Killer," introduced many of the bands. He did not perform.

Numerous negative references — some too explicit for print — were uttered about Tipper Gore, the wife of Democratic vice presidential nominee Al Gore and the chief advocate of placing labels warning of explicit lyrics on albums.

Lollapalooza isn't for everyone.

Heart patients would be well advised to stay away. At points, the music was so loud that one could feel one's vital organs being pounded by the beat. Rapper Ice Cube's lyrics in an 40-minute set could have kept Gore's Parents' Music Resource Center busy for a year.

As the music blared, young women browsed through 1960s-style floral dresses at a stand on the concourse. A few feet away, a group of muscular, shirtless young men beat sticks on a sculpture constructed, in part, of hanging hubcaps, 55-gallon drums and other hunks of metal.

"I came here to see all these weird people, to see all the types of life that are around, and to hear good music," said Toby Curtis, a 23-year-old litigator from Reno, Nev. "It's a big flashback. It's almost like the early '60s or late '50s. I think we're in the middle of a big revolution, or real close."

It's a culture influenced by punk rock, surfing, hip-hop and hippies. Tattoos are a fashion must.

Barsotti said the festival was designed so that someone could not possibly see everything.

"We're trying to give people more than their money's worth," he said, then pausing to greet a female friend, who summed it up best:

"It's so mega. It's so mega."

"We give them an all-day event that features the best of the new cutting-edge bands, a circus, a sideshow. ... You will definitely see things here you have never seen before."

Now in its second year, Lollapalooza is the brainchild of Perry Farrell, former lead singer of the defunct Jane's Addiction, a socially conscious thrash band. The event was inspired by England's Reading Festival, a similar tour of alternative bands in that country.

Aside from music, the festival offers audience members a host of activities, entertainments, artwork and foods on a concourse outside the main arena.

People lined up to take turns in the "crash box," an area where they are encouraged to smash televisions and other electronic items.

Distraction, angst and anti-censorship were dominant themes throughout.

# Old bands like new technology

The big news on the Grateful Dead tour this year is earphone monitors.

"Instead of monitors onstage, each member of the band gets his own mix through a custom-fitted wireless earphone," says spokesman Dennis McNally. "You can't believe how great this has been. It cuts the volume onstage by 50 percent, which saves everyone's hearing. And because they're not in the middle of a hurricane all the time, they can hear each other better and their harmonies have improved."

The only complaints, says McNally, have come from the ultra-Dead-heads who like to sit in the first row. Reducing the sound onstage also reduces the volume.

"They've lost the right to have the skin peeled off their faces by the volume," admits McNally. "But it's great for the band."

So this is what it has come to: These '60s bands that have survived to stay on the road, come back, are now exhilarated by technology that protects them, in a sense, from themselves.

Just ask Pete Townshend of the Who, whose hearing is so impaired from years of high decibels that on the Who's 1989 tour he played an acoustic guitar while someone else played some of his famous electric licks. On that same tour, Townshend had a large clear "bell" constructed that could be lowered to enclose and isolate him on the stage if his ears started to bother him during a show.

He did not, as it turned out, need it. But what the Who and other bands could use is technology that would protect them from fans who insist on hearing all their '60s hits every show.

"That's the 'big problem' for old bands," says Roger Daltrey, Who vocalist. "You have the old fans who want to hear the songs they remember, and they bring their kids, who also want to hear those songs because they feel like they missed something."

For the bands themselves, however, this can be a trap, preventing them from moving forward with their music and developing potentially popular new songs. When Bruce Springsteen started his current tour, he specifically said he wanted to start with a virtually clean song slate.

"You've got to," said a member of his camp. "Otherwise, you're Neil Diamond."

Diamond actually is doing pretty well these days, having sold out the first four of his six shows at New York's Madison Square Garden. His show does lean heavily on the famous songs and hits he has accumulated over 26 years, and like most long-running artists he says the audience would leave disappointed if he didn't sing what they remember.

"But the audience also can keep those songs fresh for you," Diamond said a couple of years ago. "I'm not a person who looks back, so even though I do older songs, I try to do them so it doesn't feel like a time warp."

The Who did only old songs on its last tour, not having recorded a new album, and Daltrey says he wouldn't want to do that way again.

"We were celebrating 25 years of Who music, and those are great songs, so why shouldn't we be the ones to do them? But when we go out again, I'd want us to have something new and different."

For some artists, that hasn't been a problem. Eric Clapton, one of this summer's hottest tickets, regularly

adds new songs and drops old ones. For other artists, it's a big problem.

The Beach Boys today do pretty much the set they did in 1967, and so do the hundreds of still-touring artists who had a couple of hits in those days.

"I've been gone 15 years, but some things just make you want to come back," said the Elvis Presley impersonator, clad in a gold jumpsuit and dark glasses.

At a news briefing, "S&Lvis" strummed his guitar and sang "Bailout Rock," to the tune of "Jailhouse Rock," and "You Ain't Nothing But a Junk Bond."

The words:

"You ain't nothing but a junk bond. Declining all the time. You ain't nothing but a junk bond. Declining all the time."

Declining all the time. Well you ain't never paid much interest. And you ain't no asset of mine. Billie Carr, executive director of the Harris County Democrats, said a Resolution Trust Corp. auction of savings and loan assets in Houston on Thursday showed how Republican economic policies have failed.

She said the auction held by the bailout agency rather than the festivities set to unfold here on Monday should mark the real start of the Republican National Convention.

"For 12 years, Bush has been selling out and selling off America," she said. "Today we have a fire sale for the rich at burnout cost to the middle class."

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# Veteran singer Waylon Jennings stays fiercely true to principles



NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) Waylon Jennings is drinking fresh coffee out of a cream-colored cup with this brusque inscription: "Since I've used up all my sick days, I'm calling in dead."

The sign on his office door swears impudently against "the appointment." The gold-plated door is kept locked even during business hours.

"I've never compromised, and people respect that," he told a reporter allowed inside.

The feisty 55-year-old country music star has released a new album with the punchy title "Too Dumb for New York City, Too Ugly for L.A."

The first single from the album, "Just Talkin'," attacks politicians for proscribing while the rest of the country declines. With brash outrage, he criticizes lawyers who "tell you how to feel."

The cut "Too Dumb for New York City, Too Ugly for L.A." puts down hustlers and hookers in New York and condescending attitudes in Los Angeles.

"From sea to shining sea and coast to coast, somewhere in the middle is the land I love the most," Jennings sings.

It's clear from his remarks that he's still in charge, even though his hit records don't come as rapidly as they did when he helped define country music in the mid-1970s. It's been five years since he had a No. 1 record.

He teamed up on records like "Mamma Don't Let Your Babies Grow Up to Be Cowboys," "Good Hearted Woman" and "Luckenbach."

To non-country fans, Jennings was the deep-voiced narrator on the long-running TV show "The Dukes of Hazard." He said its theme song, which is a million-seller.

More recently, Jennings and Nelson joined Johnny Cash and Kris Kristofferson on the two "Highwaymen" albums. The four recently reformed from a monthlong concert tour of Europe.

As Jennings began work on his new album, he discussed the project with a couple of possible record producers, who are not among his favorite people.

One of them told Jennings he wasn't sure he could work with the musicians Jennings wanted to play on the album.

Jennings' retort: "It wouldn't mean one doody damn if you're not comfortable, I'm the one who does this, you know."

The subject turns to the swelling ranks of younger country singers. Jennings, an elder statesman with 16 No. 1 records and about 60 albums, likes Travis Tritt, Marty Stuart and Vince Gill among those he calls "the new bucks."

"I hope they (younger performers) don't lose control of their own destiny," he said. "Every time the

record companies and producers get control, things usually die. I hope they don't compromise. Once you compromise, you never get it back."

Jennings has spent 29 years in country music — much of it a persistent quest to make music his own way without interference from producers and music executives.

"You start makin' with my music, and I get mean," he said. "As long as you're honest and upfront with me, I will be the same with you. But I still do things my way."

His way helped him win two Grammys, his "Greatest Hits" album, "Wanted: The Outlaws" and "Waylon & Willie" totaled 8 million in sales.

He describes Nelson as "one of the best friends and brothers of the road a man could ever have."

Jennings' career was nearly cut short by tragedy. In 1959, he was scheduled to fly on the light plane

that crashed in Iowa and killed his friend Buddy Holly, Ritchie Valens and the Big Bopper.

Jennings gave up his seat on the plane to the Big Bopper (D.J. Richardson), who was ill and wanted to fly rather than travel by bus with those left behind.

Jennings doesn't dwell on his fate. "Once in a while I think about it. There are a whole I think, understand. I still think about Buddy and the Big Bopper and Ritchie Valens. Buddy was a good man, good guy and loved living. If you want to find something to wonder about, it's that, because he was so happy."

"When a plane crash last year killed seven members of singer Ketch McCortner's band, Jennings was one of the first to call her.

"I told her there's one thing you're going to have to deal with. And that's thinking it was your fault," he said.

# 'Buffy the Vampire Slayer' manages not to take itself too seriously

**BUFFY THE VAMPIRE SLAYER (PG-13).** As high-spirited, undeniably silly and not particularly deep as its teen-age heroine, this is one

film that lives up to the promise of its gothic title. Starring Kristy Swanson as a bratty-shop ahead who discovers she is really born to save the world, with nice supporting work by Donald Sutherland as her mentor and Luke Perry as the only guy who takes her seriously. In a between myself, heated summer, "Buffy" knows enough not to take itself too seriously.

**DEATH BECOMES HER (PG-13).** A Robert Zemeckis-directed black comedy that frequently forgets it's supposed to be funny, this Doris on Gray's tale of the lengths two rivals (Meryl Streep and Goldie Hawn) will go to stay young and beautiful is proof that just because an idea is audacious doesn't mean it's good. The film's elaborate "Terminator 2" type special effects are something to see, but no one seemed to notice that they stop the movie dead in its tracks.

**HONEY, I BLEW UP THE KID (PG).** Honey, they fouled up the movie. The wild reduce-o-artists of "Honey, I Shrunk the Kids" return with more shock instead of shrinking his kids, mad scientist dad Rick Moranis now turns his 22-year-old tot into a 112-foot Godzilla Baby munching on Las Vegas. Randall Kleiser directs, gracefully and gracefully. Over-obvious gags and special effects; wildly mugging actors; dozens of extras running around hysterically wherever Junior

clumps down a foot. The whole picture is a big happy blank, a balloon that never has the decency to burst. **A LEAGUE OF THEIR OWN (PG).** Blessed with a pleasing comedy concept (World War II women's baseball), a funny director (Penny Marshall) and a cast that knows its way around the bases (Geena Davis, Tom Hanks, Madonna), this lightweight entertainment can't hold a lead. Starting out funny, it just about drowns in excessive sentimentality and unnecessary plot compli-

cations. "Saturday Night Live" vet-cast Jon Lovitz's brief cameo as a dour scout, however, is worth the price of admission. **SISTER ACT (PG).** Whoopi Goldberg on the lam in a convent is the not unfamiliar device that turns this clever film into the funniest mainstream comedy in who knows how long. A tribute to those often denigrated qualities, slickness and professionalism, "Sister," helped in no small measure by superlative supporting performances.

## 'Raising Cain' is disappointing

Brian De Palma's new thriller about a man with a split personality has left me feeling, ah, divided.

Half of me thinks that "Raising Cain" is disappointing. The other half thinks it's just stupid.

While I'm fighting this out between myself, let's get right to the plot: Carter Nix is a child psychologist who kidnaps young children to use in research experiments. Played by John Lithgow, Carter looks like a normal guy — or, rather, as normal as somebody played by the extravagantly eccentric Lithgow can look.

But Carter is not above allowing his own daughter to be used in these experiments — even if that means disposing of his wife in the process. Clearly, this is one sick puppy — or maybe more than one. Working with Carter in this fiendish scheme are his creepy twin brother and father, both of whom are also played by Lithgow and each of whom may or may not be a figment of Carter's warped imagination.

Why is "Raising Cain" disappointing? Well, to begin with, I never went along with the facile theory that De Palma is merely a Hitchcock imitator. I've always felt that he earned his title as the "modern master of suspense" with such terrific thrillers as "Dressed to Kill" (1980) and

"Blow Out" (1981), which upped the ante on Hitchcock.

But "Raising Cain," which is being billed as De Palma's "Psycho," is more like De Palma repeating himself — and without conviction. "Dressed to Kill" already was De Palma's "Psycho"; this one is more like his "Psycho."

As writer and director of the new film, De Palma does manage one scene of Poeque terror: a character who had seemed to be dead suddenly awakens, horrified, in a car that is sinking in a river.

And the filmmaker knows enough about the camera to achieve a certain visual polish throughout the movie.

But effects that he has used so expressively in the past come off here as empty gestures. "Raising Cain" is never dead-stop boring, but it fails to find its tone. And even with the lives of children at stake, there's little passion in this by-the-numbers thriller.

Lithgow has a few funny-scary moments as Carter's creepy, chain-smoking twin, but his performance as Carter lacks punch, and his other characters are just stunts (if well-performed stunts).

Lolita Davidovich ("Blaze") portrays Carter's wife so blandly that I assume this must be at least partly deliberate — although I can't imagine why. As the wife's old flame, Steven Bauer ("Scarface") also is quite bland.

So, is "Raising Cain" disappointing or just plain stupid? Let's compromise and say it's both.

## Elvis scores more golds

**MEMPHIS (AP)—**Elvis Presley legitimized his title as King of Rock 'n' Roll.

A new audit lists him as having 110 gold or platinum records, more than twice the number of his closest rival, the Beatles.

The figures, based on record sales in the United States, were released by RCA Records and the Recording Industry Association of America. Presley previously was listed with 99 gold or platinum records.

Fans packed into a racquetball court at Presley's former residence, Graceland, to hear the announcement. Others watched on closed-circuit television.

"It's a track record no other artist has ever set, or ever will. He was a phenomenon," said Lucille McCallie, an aide from Presley's birthplace of Tupelo, Miss.

Some 20,000 Elvis fans are expected in Memphis this week for the anniversary of his death at Graceland on Aug. 16, 1977, at age 42.

RCA spokesman Don Wardell said the audit was based on business files of the singer's former manager,

Tom Parker.

"We have every royalty statement from the moment we sent Elvis a royalty check," Wardell said.

RCA's sales figures on many of Presley's earlier records have been unclear over the years, said Jack Soden, Graceland director.

Graceland obtained Parker's business files and hundreds of other pieces of Presley memorabilia in late 1990. Elvis fans have long believed he qualified for additional gold records, Soden said.

Behind Presley, the Recording Industry Association of America lists the Beatles with 41 gold or platinum records, the Rolling Stones with 39 and Barbra Streisand and Elton John with 37 each.

A gold record generally means it sold 500,000 copies, while platinum is awarded for 1 million units in sales. Some of Presley's awards are multi-platinum, meaning sales of 2 million or more.

While the figures apply only to U.S. sales, Presley is also the largest record seller worldwide, said Jay Berman, RIAA's president.

## Baseball commissioner feels the heat

The Associated Press

**TORONTO** - Embattled baseball commissioner Fay Vincent acknowledged he has been under extreme pressure and strongly indicated Thursday that he won't seek another term.

Vincent, in town to watch the final game of the Orioles-Blue Jays series, criticized the system which makes his office a scapegoat for baseball's problems, and said, "I feel very much under siege, and I think that's a problem for baseball."

Vincent, whose term expires March 31, 1994, doubted he'd serve again, even if requested by the owners.

"I haven't said that, but do you think somebody in my position would do this

again?" Vincent said when asked if this was his last term.

He has frequently said he won't resign.

"The easy thing would be for me to go to Europe for six months, to read some good books and to smoke some good cigars, but that wouldn't be right."

The latest crisis in Vincent's hellish season is the possible relocation of the San Francisco Giants to St. Petersburg, Fla., which he'll address (Friday) when baseball's Executive Committee holds a teleconference on the issue.

The Giants are the latest in a long list of headaches which includes:

- A suit by the Chicago Cubs for Vincent's decision to realign the National League
- An earlier suit by New York Yankees owner George Steinbrenner for reinstatement
- A grievance filed by the Major League Baseball Players Association for Vincent's ban of Yankees pitcher Steve Howe on a drug violation.
- The sale of the Seattle Mariners to Japanese ownership
- Projected financial losses after the television contract expires following the 1993 season.
- Pending negotiations with the Players Association (the contract expires after the 1993 season, but either side can reopen talks after this year).

All of these issues, said Vincent, have been passed into his office because the owners are unwilling, or unable, to reach solutions themselves.

"What big decisions have been made since I've been commissioner without coming to me?" asked Vincent. "There's no question the commissioner's job has been under pressure. The Cubs' suit is a very direct attack."

"Some people want to change (the commissioner's) role, but I think the commissioner has served baseball well. Baseball has not shown an ability to make tough decisions without referral to the commissioner. They always refer to the commissioner to make a decision, then he gets blamed for it."

## Defending PGA champ in danger of missing cut

**ST. LOUIS** - Golf tournaments cannot be won on the first day. But they can be lost.

So when Craig Stadler and Gene Sauers shared the first-round lead Thursday, they were only taking a big step in the right direction.

"The tournament's barely started," Stadler said. "All you're trying to do at this stage is just get off to a decent start."

John Daly, on the other hand, took an even bigger step in the wrong direction. The frustrated Daly, his face a scowling mask, struggled to a 76 that left him virtually no chance of retaining his PGA national championship and, instead, put him in jeopardy of missing the cut when the field is trimmed after 36 holes of play.

"When you shoot 5-over (par), there's nothing to talk about," Daly said and declined an invitation to the interview area.

"I'm out of here," he said. His meaning was unclear. For the day? For the tournament? He didn't specify.

While Daly was struggling with a Bellerive course that rejected his longest-in-the-game tee shots, the steady Sauers and the unusually patient Stadler found the long, hard layout more to their liking.

Each shot 67, 4-under par, on a course that was unusually benign with softer greens, relatively gentle breezes and mild temperatures replacing the sweltering heat common to this area in summer.

"The weather helped me," said Nick Faldo, the Englishman who holds the

British Open title and admitted to a dread of the humid-heat he expected.

"This wasn't what I was preparing myself for," Faldo said after a strong finish produced a 68 that left him one stroke off the lead.

"The golf course was playing about as easy as it can," said Brian Clair, another of the early finishers at 3-under. Jay Don Blake also shot 68.

The early group at 69 included Frank Nobilo of New Zealand, Bob Estes, Masters champ Fred Couples and 49-year-old Ray Dand.

Couples, who played in a threesome with Faldo and U.S. Open champ Tom Kite, had to battle back from a triple-bogey 6 on the third hole, where he hit into the water. He capped the comeback with birdies on two of the last four holes.

Kite, however, found his troubles late in the round and didn't have a chance to improve on a 73.

He was breezing along at 1-under until he dumped his second shot into a pond on the 17th, later three-putted and made double-bogey 7, then bogeyed the last hole.

Paul Azinger had an even greater struggle. He was 3-under and within one of the lead before a bogey-hogey-double bogey finish produced a 72.

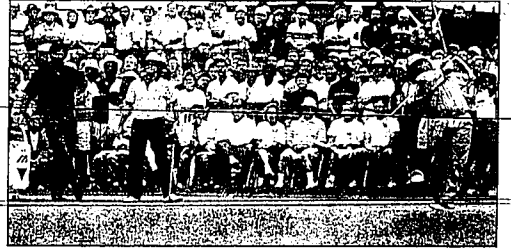
Jack Nicklaus, at 52 seeking a sixth PGA title, also had a 72. Arnold Palmer, 62, signed autographs for more than a half-hour after requiring 79 strokes in a slow-moving round.

operating the Detroit Red Wings, and his commitment to carrying on the Tigers' tradition," Monaghan said in a statement.

"The future of the Tigers' organization is now in the good hands of the Ilitches." Al Sebastian, a spokesman for Ilitch, said his boss wouldn't comment until the deal is closed and approved by owners.

But in an interview with the Detroit Free Press, made before Monaghan's statement was released, Ilitch said he was buying the team because he loved the game.

"Baseball was something I did for the first half of my life, something I wanted to do always, my only real desire and goal in life," said Ilitch, a one-time minor-league player.

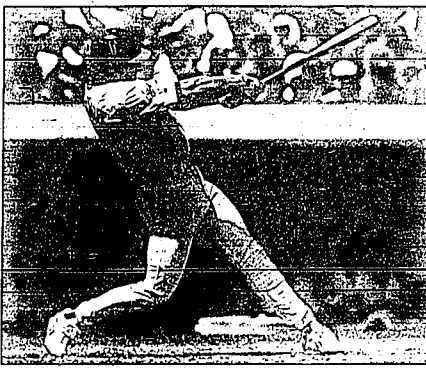

Players' lawyer questions NFL president over bookkeeping

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) - How much money the NFL makes continues to be a contentious issue Thursday at the league's antitrust trial, with the players insisting that the owners understate their profits.

NFL President Neil Armstrong returned to the witness stand for the second straight day and spent most of the session answering questions from players' attorney Jeffrey Kessler about bookkeeping matters. Kessler used examples of owners in Los Angeles, Denver, New Orleans and San Francisco making money that was not reported on the league's overall financial statements.

Los Angeles Raiders owner Al Davis picked up a \$10 million payment from the city of Irwindale, Calif., in 1987 that was reported on the Raiders' audited statements, but not on the NFL's financial forms, Kessler said.

"If this (money) went to Mr. Davis, you'd have to add it in," Austrian said.

The league's reports showed a \$163.2 million operating profit for the 28 teams in 1990 and a \$168.9 million operating profit for 1991. The players say the NFL substantially understates its profitability.

In another instance presented by

the players, the Denver Broncos sold their rights to future revenues on the luxury boxes at Mile High Stadium for \$9.8 million in 1987. That figure did not appear as revenue for Denver on the NFL books, Kessler said.

"You don't know how many owners are out there like that, do you?" Kessler asked Austrian.

"I don't," Austrian answered. Kessler said the Broncos reported a \$1.5 million loss to the Internal Revenue Service for 1990. But when the salary of owner Patrick Bowlen, amortization, writeoffs, interest expense and management fees are added, the Broncos actually made \$11.2 million in 1990, Kessler said.

In the case of the New Orleans Saints, Kessler introduced documents which claimed principle owner Tom Benson paid himself \$1 million in 1990 and \$601,000 in 1989 as "compensation for services" which was not listed as a salary on the league's financial statements.

Austrian said Benson's arrangement was not a salary, but a management service agreement.

In San Francisco, owner Edward DeLoe Jr. paid himself \$844,000 in 1990 and \$1 million in 1989 for using his private jet on 49er business, Kessler said. Those payments

would reduce the profits of the team, and possibly result in the team showing a loss, Kessler said.

Also revealed during Austrian's testimony was the \$75 million selling price of the Dallas Cowboys to Jerry Jones from Bum Bright in 1989. Jones paid another \$75 million for Texas Stadium, Austrian said.

The league president also said the NFL grossed \$120 million in 1990 after deducting fees from its NFL Properties arm.

Austrian appeared to be getting weary of disclosing pages and pages of financial data from privately held businesses. At one point, he said, "there is a privacy aspect to that information that this trial has clearly destroyed."

Earlier in the day, under direct examination, Austrian said banks had threatened foreclosure on former Philadelphia Eagles owner Tom Dawkins in 1984 because of an inability to repay a loan. Austrian also testified that former New England Patriots owner Victor Kiam lost \$24 million in the four years he owned the team.

The trial resumed early Thursday afternoon for the weekend because Judge David Doty had to attend to other matters.

Chargers pick up QB insurance

LONDON (AP) - The Washington Redskins traded backup quarterback Stan Humphries to San Diego today, giving the Chargers at least a temporary replacement for the injured John Elway.

If Humphries takes at least half the snaps in the upcoming season, the Redskins will get a third-round pick. Otherwise, the selection will be from the fourth round.

Friesz, the Chargers' starter last year, was lost for the season with a

knee injury when he was tackled by Phoenix's Ken Harvey in an exhibition game last Saturday night. He underwent surgery on Monday.

Humphries is entering his fifth year in the NFL after being chosen in the sixth round of the 1988 draft out of Northeast Louisiana, where he played behind Buster Brister, now with Pittsburgh, Bobby Beathard, now San Diego's general manager, was GM of the Redskins at the time.

Washington and San Diego almost put together a deal for Humphries on draft day last April but it fell through when the Redskins at the last minute insisted on a higher pick.

Humphries, who was competing with Cary Conklin and Jeff Rutledge for a spot behind Mark Rypien with the Redskins, flew out of London to meet the day after arriving with the Redskins for an exhibition against San Francisco on Sunday.

Unions try to finance San Francisco stadium

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Union officials on Thursday announced a plan to finance a proposed \$200 million downtown baseball stadium in hopes of keeping the San Francisco Giants from relocating to Florida.

"We don't have a lot of money, but we're willing to put up whatever we can," said Paul Saroff of Vendors Local 468.

The plan calls for investing pension plan funds in the project, with a return guarantee of at least the capital. Details of the agreement haven't been completely worked out.

Supervisor Angela Alioto, who heads a city committee for the proposed 43,000-seat ballpark, is working with the unions on the financing proposal. She attended Thursday's meeting of 27 union representatives but didn't comment.

Alioto and San Francisco Mayor Frank Jordan scheduled separate news conferences later Thursday.

Last Friday, Giants owner Bob Lurie announced he had reached an agreement in principle to sell the National League team to a group of Florida investors who would relocate the team to St. Petersburg, Fla. The agreement needs approval from both leagues and the baseball commissioner, but in the meantime Lurie said he would not entertain other offers.

A vote could come as early as Sept. 9 at the quarterly meeting of major league owners at St.

Louis. The unions said a letter detailing their proposal would be delivered by Jordan to commissioner Fay Vincent.

Although the unions hope their plan will help keep the Giants in San Francisco, the goal is to save hundreds of ballpark jobs.

"We would hope the Giants would stay. But if we had a tenant, we would build it," Larry Mazola of the Plumbers Union said. "We can't build it without a tenant."

The city's hopes for keeping the Giants waned Tuesday when H. Irving Grumbach, a prospective investor in a group considering buying the team, dropped out after examining the Giants' books. He said the team stood to lose \$10 million a year by 1994 by continuing to play at Candlestick.

If the unions invest pension plan funds into a new stadium, however, they'll have to be able to at least recover what they put into it, or the proposal probably won't be approved by the Department of Labor.

"It's not going to be handled in a cavalier manner," Walter L. Johnson, secretary-treasurer of the San Francisco Labor Council, said. "It will be handled in a prudent, professional manner."

A certain loser if the Giants move to Florida will be San Francisco's after-school sports program, which receives about \$500,000 - half of its funding - from Giants ticket sales.

"If we cut the program, I think we'd lose a lot of students," said Anne Heinline, commissioner of athletics for San Francisco schools. "They'd either quit school or go to another school with a sports program, if they'd drop out."

An estimated 10,000 middle- and high-school students are on athletic teams.

Also on Thursday, the San Francisco Examiner reported that George Shinn, owner of the Charlotte Hornets basketball team and two minor league baseball teams, has begun exploring a bid for the Giants.

"We have expressed our interest in a conversation with the mayor's office, and that's the extent of it right now," Hornets president Spencer Stolpen told the newspaper.

Asked just how serious Shinn was about his effort to rescue the team from San Francisco, Stolpen said, "If it works out, it's serious; if it doesn't work out, it's not serious."

The newspaper also quoted a source close to Shinn as saying that he had spoken to Lurie twice about buying the team and possibly relocating it. However, upon Shinn's return from Barcelona, it was learned the team had been sold, the source said.

Stolpen said if Shinn were to purchase the team, keeping it in San Francisco would be a serious consideration because the city is the nation's fifth-largest media market.

Coits QB hopeful bitter toward Cards

ANDERSON, Ind. (AP) - Tom Tupa, a starter for the Phoenix Cardinals one year ago, is a realist as he battles for a job with the Indianapolis Colts.

Tupa started the first 11 games for the Cardinals last year and completed 52.4 percent of his passes for 2,053 yards before he was benched. The Colts claimed the move was due to his play, but Tupa is convinced it was made to avoid paying him a six-figure bonus if he started 12 or more games.

"It was just a contract move," Tupa said. "I came from first all the way down to inactive. I know it was a matter of money."

Tupa, who never took another snap for the Cardinals, will see his first game action since then when he plays the second half of Saturday's preseason game with Seattle.

A four-year letterman at Ohio State, Tupa knows he has no chance to win a starting job with the Colts.

"I'm here looking for a job. I know Jeff (George) is going to be the starter here. I want to be able to back him up if something happens."

But he knows he still has what it takes to start in the NFL. "I feel I can start in the NFL, but that's not where I'm at now. I just want to win a job, play well and see what happens," he said.

Coach Ted Marchibrodski and Tupa both agree that Saturday's

game isn't a do-or-die situation for the quarterback.

"I'm real anxious to get out there, mess around a little bit and work against another defense," Tupa said.

Tupa watched from the sidelines as George and Mark Hammann split the quarterback duties Sunday's 31-14 victory over New England. Hammann, hoping for an 11th NFL season, helped his chances by completing 12 of 15 passes for 141 yards and touchdowns.

"Mark's play can't put any pressure on me. I just got to go out there, stay within myself and compete," Tupa said. "I'd like to do go this week, but there's two more exhibition games after this one."

"Hopefully, I get more chances to show NFL teams what I can do. But I don't want to take this one lightly. I want to try and earn myself a job."

The only pressure facing Tom is the measure he puts on himself. Marchibrodski said, "Mark was impressive last week. I don't know if he can play any better. That was winning football. It was an outstanding job."

Tupa holds the Ohio State record with a 44.7 average and also averaged 46.7 for six punts with Phoenix.

"His ability to punt is an added bonus but it won't be that big a factor when we make our player decisions," Marchibrodski said.

Draft pick's father says son won't sign with Marlins

MIAMI (AP) - The Florida Marlins No. 1 draft pick, Charles Johnson Jr., will not sign with the National League expansion team, his father predicted Thursday after refusing to meet with the team's scouting director.

"I don't think they're going to sign him," said Charles Johnson Sr., who is being advised in negotiations by agent Scott Boras. "Charles is looking forward to going back to school."

Charles Jr. returned home to Fort Pierce Wednesday night after he and some other Olympic baseball team members met with President Bush at the White House the day before. "I've been through this before," said Johnson, who has registered as a senior accounting major for classes that begin August 27. "I came out of high school, the Montreal Expos told me things would work out, and I went up going to the University of Miami."

"I learned my lesson from that. If they're not going to pay me what I believe I'm worth, then I'm going back to school."

Merlini scouting director Gary Hughes, who was unable to land Johnson three years ago while scouting director for the Expos, called Johnson of Canada was stripped of his gold medal after testing positive for steroids.

He appeared Tuesday before the Senate Governmental Affairs subcommittee on investigations. The subcommittee was looking into federal regulation of boxing.

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# Tragedy strikes racing family once again

HUEYTOWN, Ala. (AP) — Stock car racing delivered its harshest blow Thursday to a family that has endured plenty of speedway pain over the last four years.

Clifford Allison, son of former NASCAR Winston Cup champion Bobby Allison and younger brother of current driving star Davey Allison, died Thursday after crashing during practice at Michigan International Speedway.

It was yet another tragedy for one of racing's premier families. Bobby Allison had to give up racing after a wreck four years ago, while Davey was seriously injured last month in a crash.

"It's a hurdle we know comes with this type business," said Donnie Johnson, general manager of Bobby Allison Racing in Hueytown and Clifford's uncle. "It usually happens to someone else but now it's happening to us."

Clifford Allison, 27, was practicing for Saturday's Detroit Gasket 200 NASCAR Grand National series race when the wreck occurred. He had been competing since 1983.

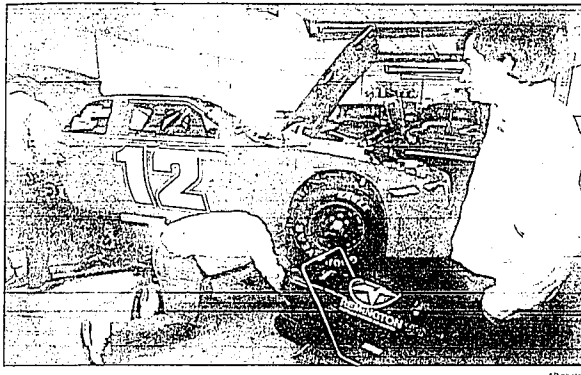
Johnson said Bobby Allison and Clifford's wife, Elisa, were at the track when Thursday's wreck occurred. Bobby Allison's wife, Judy, was at a nearby home the family was renting.

Johnson said he had spoken with Bobby Allison by telephone. "His reaction was he's all right his youngest son. That's enough said."

"There's probably no way for him to cope with this but he is standing up as well from all indications where I was talking to him," Johnson said.

He said Clifford's mother is "a very strong lady. She's proven that time and time again with Bobby and then with Davey and all he's been through the last few weeks. As for his wife, Elisa, what can I say? It's hard."

Bobby Allison's racing career ended in June 1988 after he was critically injured in a wreck at Long Pond, Penn. He spent 108 days in the hospital and still has not completed recovering from the wreck, walking with a limp and wearing a neck brace behind his right ear to cope with an equilibrium problem.

From left, Davey Allison was injured in a wreck at the same track on July 19. His car flipped 11 times and landed on its roof, sending him to the hospital for nearly a week with a broken right collarbone and broken bones in his right forearm and hand.

He returned to the track the following week, driving the first five laps of the Dick-and-Judy at Talladega Superspeedway so he would qualify for valuable Winston Cup points. Allison also drove part of last week's race at Watkins Glen, N.Y., and stands second in the standings behind Bill Elliott.

Bobby Allison often traveled with his youngest son to Grand National and ARCA races and spoke fondly of the time when Clifford might have enough skill to drive for his father on the Winston Cup circuit.

"I'd love to have Clifford in my car," the elder Allison said during an April interview with The Associated Press. "But he's not had enough experience to put him in the Winston Cup driver position."

"I'm a firm believer that you've got to go to school and pass each grade before you can go on to the next grade."

# Trainer encouraged with Bird's back following Olympics

BOSTON (AP) — Larry Bird's back held up "very well" during the Olympics, the trainer of the Boston Celtics said Thursday. Nobody's saying whether Bird will be back for another NBA season.

That decision could come late this month.

Bird missed 37 regular-season games and two of six in the tournament of the Americas at Portland, Ore., that preceded the Summer Games. But he played in all eight games at Barcelona, where the United States easily won the basketball gold medal.

"He came through Barcelona very well, better than he did in Portland," said Ed Lacerre, trainer for the Celtics and the Olympic basketball team. "He's had no major repercussions, any setbacks from the (first) home and he's doing well."

The games in the Olympics were less strenuous than NBA contests, and Bird averaged just 18 minutes per game in Barcelona. He was at every practice, Lacerre said, although the team didn't have daily workouts.

He also said Bird's activities were curtailed, such as his absence from the opening ceremonies.

Asked if Bird could withstand the pounding of a full 82-game NBA season, Lacerre said. "He had difficulty doing that last year."

"If he would go through the rigors of an 82-game season and not try to reinvigorate his activities, he probably would handle it well. It was evident last year. He came into the season feeling very good and things just crumpled up and he had to sit out an extended period of time."

Bird played in the first 20 games and 28 of 29 before missing the next 28 with back problems. He still averaged 20.2 points per game. He played in four of 10 playoff games. The previous season, he missed 22 of 83 games, then underwent back surgery.

Since travel can aggravate his back condition, one possibility would be for Bird to play mostly, if not exclusively, home games. Lacerre indicated that limiting his playing might be one consideration in Bird's decision whether to return for a 14th NBA season. He is signed through the 1993-94 season.

In his final Olympic game, Bird sat out the entire first half and was scoreless in 12 minutes, as the United States beat Croatia 117-85 for the gold medal last Saturday.

Asked whether Bird's limited playing time was a result of back problems, Lacerre said. "You have to speak to coach (Chuck) Daly on that. That's a coach's decision."

After the game, Bird said, "Yes, it is my last game tonight. Tomorrow, I don't know. I'll let you know in two or three weeks."

Lacerre said Thursday that Bird has said he will make a decision in the United States next week, open training camp Oct. 9.

Both Lacerre and Dan Dryck, Bird's therapist, treated Bird during the Olympics, Lacerre said.

Bird will leave soon for his home in Indiana to continue exercise, running and recuperating, Lacerre said. He added that no further surgery is planned.

"It remains to be seen" if Bird's back condition can improve, he said.

Lacerre said he was very encouraged by Bird's ability to withstand the Olympic activities, but made it clear the future is uncertain.

"I have no idea" if Bird knows whether he will play another season, Lacerre said.

"Nothing would surprise me about Larry. He is a unique individual in his ability to tolerate pain, in his ability to overcome a lot of things."

# King starts out right in bid for 4th LPGA major

WINNIPEG, Manitoba (AP) — Betty King, bidding for a career sweep of the major titles in women's golf, led a 5-under-par 67 on Thursday to lead a share of the opening round at the du Maurier Classic.

King, who has won the Dinah Shore and the U.S. Open twice each and in May won the LPGA Championship, put together five birdies and 13 pars in Thursday's round over the 6,257-yard St. Charles Country Club course.

Only Pat Bradley has managed a career sweep of the four tournaments which since 1983 have been designated as majors by the LPGA.

Meg Mallon, who won the LPGA and U.S. Open titles last year, was also at 67, along with Michelle Mackall, Sherri Stephenson and Kelly Rowland.

King had four birdies on the front nine, but a shaky putter limited her to only one on the back side. She twice missed makeable birdie putts on the back that would have given the outright lead.

She missed total less than 100 feet on No. 12.

"I was playing it to go a little left but I wasn't trying to play it outside the hole," King said. "I think I showed it a little bit."

King acted as driver to reach the green from beneath a tree en route to a birdie on the par 4 12th, the most troublesome hole for the players in the first round.

"You're definitely give-shot-at-the-round," she said.

Mallon made good use of approach shots to set up short putts for most of her five birdies.

She said it was a challenge to go after the morning leaders.

"You're not kind of casually look at the leader board as you're walking to the range and there's 50mlers up there already," she said. "So it's out there to be had. But in the afternoon it's obviously a little bit harder. The wind can kick up. The greens are firmer."

Mallon had the first of the 67s after a round featuring six birdies and one bogey. She sank birdie putts of 45 feet on No. 4, 154 feet on No. 12, 45 feet on No. 15 and 35 feet on No. 18 in capturing her low score in three years on the LPGA tour.

"I finished three of the more difficult holes on the golf course," Mack all said.

A 20-footer for par on No. 6 and the long putt on 15 helped her recover from erratic approach shots.

"That was really nice, to make a putt that way," Mackall said.

Her only bogey came at No. 17 when she three-putted.

Merlene Olney of Jamaica won the women's 200 in 22:20, beating Americans Evelyn Ashford, second in 22:47, and Michelle Finn, third in 23:03.

Dean Stankov of the United States won the pole vault at 19-0, with Gregory Yegorov of Russia second at 18-10 and Tim Bright of the United States third at 18-8.

Ferril Davis of the United States won the men's 800 meters in 1:47.42, and countryman Andrew Valton took the 400 in 1:13.96.

# U.S. triple jumpers duplicate Olympic showing

LINZ, Austria (AP) — Americans Mike Conley and Charlie Simpkins, 1-2 finishers in the triple jump at the Olympics, finished in that order again Thursday at an International Amateur Athletic Federation track and field meet.

Conley leaped 56 feet, 2 1/2 inches, far short of his winning, wind-aided jump of 59.7 ft at Barcelona. Simpkins jumped 55-11 1/2.

Conley was one of seven Olympic gold medalists competing before a crowd of about 18,000 at Canada's Mark McKow, helped by a strong tailwind, won the 110 meter hurdles in 15.06 seconds.

Two Germans — long jumper Heike Dreschler and javelin thrower Silke Renk — repeated Olympic victories in their events. Dreschler won at 23.4, Renk at 218.8.

In the men's 100 meters, Dennis Mitchell of the United States, the bronze medalist at Barcelona, finished second to Vitali Savin of Russia, who checked 10.08. Ben Johnson of Canada was seventh.

Conley's best pro season was his latest, when he averaged 12.3 points and 6.9 rebounds per game. He had a regular-season career-high 27 points against the Los Angeles Lakers in February and a playoff career-high 31 points against San Antonio in April in the Western Conference first round.

**NEW YORK** The Dow Jones Industrial Average fell 7 points to close at 3313 after the U.S. bond market tumbled amid technical and supply pressures in the secondary market, despite a strongly bid Treasury auction for \$10 billion of new 30-year debt.

Thursday's auction marked the final leg of the government's quarterly refunding.

Bond yields rose as high as 7.47 percent, rapidly nearing the 7.5 percent level that is virtually guaranteed to send some chills through the stock market, traders said.

Rising long-term interest rates threaten an economic recovery and provide increased competition for investor dollars.

The Dow initially ran to a session high of 3336, up 15 points, after the

U.S. government released a small battery of economic reports, all of which appeared to point to very modest economic strength accompanied by low inflation.

The government reported that July retail sales rose 0.5 percent, compared to expectations of a 0.2 percent gain. July consumer prices rose 0.1 percent and core prices rose 0.2 percent, reinforcing what were considered favorable producer-price data on Wednesday. And new state unemployment claims for the week ended Aug. 7 fell 66,000, virtually nullifying the 69,800 increase reported for the July 25 week.

There were some drawbacks to the data. June retail sales were revised dramatically, from a 0.5 percent gain to a 0.3 percent decline. But the news

was generally taken well by traders - particularly in the Chicago futures pits, where premiums on September S and P 500 contracts were driven high enough to invite index-arbitrage buying.

Foreign markets were mixed overnight.

But some semblance of stability in Japan, where the Nikkei-225 fell only 5 points to 14,768, served to reassure New York traders that no new battered declines are imminent in that market.

Nevertheless, trend-following traders abandoned the stocks rally after its initial spur as trading volume failed to expand from that of Wednesday, suggesting the rally was short-lived. The Dow subsequently settled into a narrow trading range around 2 pm.

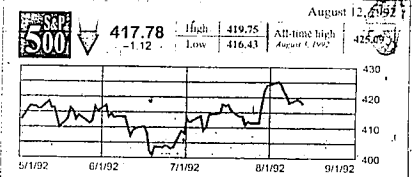
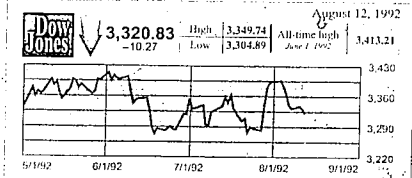
The strong demand evident at the

London sparked a brief, upward spike in bonds. But no sooner had stocks begun to follow the lead of bonds and index futures than the bond market suddenly tumbled, falling from near unchanged to over a full-point loss.

Bond traders said so many players had cashed in a recent rally after the auction that there was simply little buying power left in the market. As traders dumped bonds, technical selling was quickly generated as chart support levels were violated.

The Dow, unable to rally in the face of higher-bond yields, reached a session low of 3307, down nearly 33 points, before bouncing back feebly heading into the close.

At the close, the Dow stood at 3313.25, down 7.58, while declines outpaced advances on the Big Board by 185 to 170 in a trade volume of 176 million shares, expanding from 176 million on Wednesday.

# Walters asks questions we only dream of

Ask people what they think of Barbara Walters, and you'll get a strong reaction.

She has a large following — witness the long-term success of "20/20," the ABC Friday-night news magazine that she co-hosts with Hugh Downs, and the stellar ratings of her occasional celebrity-interview specials. But people frequently complain — long and loud — about certain Walters moments.

Walters is a strong believer that what counts is a reporter's results, not how he or she looks while getting them. "I think the mistake is to try to do it to impress your peers — so the newspapers will write it up and say, 'Walters' she brilliant,'" Walters says. "I'd rather ask the question that makes everyone say, 'Did he really? And then what?'"

And that's what Walters does best: asking the questions that we would ask ourselves if we only had the opportunity. Sometimes when she does so, she's a little too fawning — a little too interested in the response. But people do talk to her — and about things they frequently don't talk about to anybody else.

"It's no accident, for example, that Walters is the only interviewer to have long-term success with prime-time celebrity interview specials. Plenty of other journalists have tried it, but their conversations frequently seem to amble nowhere, and the responses they have to send me in comparison to the ones Walters is able to evoke.

Working on "20/20," Walters says, is quite different from working on an interview for a special. "When you're doing it for '20/20,' you are able to do it more as a magazine

piece where you can use footage and you can intersperse it with the interview," she says. "It has a different tempo and a different theme. And we do many more hard-news interviews. I try not to do the celebrity interviews on '20/20.' I try to keep them for the specials. Most of the time when you do political interviews, you're asking about the questions that are occurring that day, that week: Why did you do this? Why did you do that? Are you going to resign? It's not often that you do 'Who are you, and what leads you what you are today' interviews.

Walters got her training doing one of the toughest jobs in television — working on a morning talk show. In her case, it was "Today," which she joined in 1961 as a writer. A year later, she was a reporter, and in 1974, she finally became the co-host.

"I have enormous respect for people who do the morning shows," she says. "Everybody thinks that's very easy to do: 'Oh, you just get on there and you ask questions.' Well, to sit there every day and do the variety they have to do and to come in on time and to not shut them off and to have it make sense and to not say something stupid and to not put your foot in your mouth — it is very hard, and I think people realize that every time they try to find a replacement."

# MTV tells youths 'Choose or Lose'

NEW YORK — Somewhere between the heavy metal headbangers, the bouncing beat of hip-hop and teen-speak patter of veejees, MTV is getting into politics.

Seriously. Faster than they can flick a remote control, the estimated 35 million Americans who watch the leading rock 'n' roll cable channel are getting political reporting unlike any they'll find elsewhere on television.

Taking the theme "Choose or Lose," MTV's rendering of the political scene is part primer, part straight reporting on the issues and candidates, all at a hip-hop pace and all for a core audience ages 18 to 24.

MTV not only educates viewers on the basics — it urges them to act, in tandem with Rock the Vote, a grass-roots voter registration drive based in California.

Together they're trying to improve results in the 1988 presidential election, when 36.2 percent of 18 to 24 year olds voted, a drop from 40.8 percent in 1984, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

That's not all.

"Programs like MTV are helping to break the whole TV monopoly on the whole political process," said Jim Katz, contributing editor to Rolling Stone magazine, who writes about the news media and 1992 presidential campaign coverage. "It fuses the conventional news with popular culture."

That fusion made news June 16 when Clinton appeared on MTV for 90 minutes, and submitted to the smart, refreshing and pointed questions of a studio audience of 200 young people. It was another big step in MTV's venture into political reporting — a major departure for a network whose staple since it began 11 years ago is the rock music video.

Since "MTV" popped onto the screen in August 1981, it's expanded beyond rock videos, broadening

not only its musical offerings, but looking at current affairs and news through its youthful lens. Its news unit now has 15 staffers.

MTV first tried out political reporting during the 1988 presidential election. And in a promise of things to come, it also began running public service spots for Rock the Vote.

More recently, MTV has placed hundreds of thousands of postcards in CD packages, linking passers-by of "motor voter" legislation which links voter and driver's license registration. Buyers are prevailed upon to send them to Congress and the White House. MTV also is helping prepare a voter guide for young viewers to be distributed through cable affiliates.

"When I was constantly reading and hearing was that young people are disaffected and don't care about anything," said Judy McGrath, MTV creative director. This was born "Choose or Lose," which began in February with the New Hampshire primary.

"We love these people," McGrath said. "Our job is to help them to have a voice, to encourage them to participate. We felt this was a way to say 'We think you're great. You're going to write the future.'"

LOS ANGELES — If life just isn't weird enough for you, stick around. New episodes of "The Ren & Stimpy Show" will be arriving shortly.

Yes, last year's cult cartoon sensation is gearing up for a fresh batch of bent animation behavior.

Anchor'd at the heart of Nickelodeon's upcoming Saturday night foray into prime time — tagged SNICK by the cable network — new "Ren & Stimpy" episodes will air at 9 p.m. ET Saturdays beginning Aug. 15.

Who would have thought the twisted tales of a cranky, ashamate chihuahua (Ren) and his blubbery, good-natured feline pal (Stimpy) would have created such a pop culture commotion?

"I was pretty stunned that adults were watching it," said John Kricfalusi, the show's 36-year-old Canadian creator. 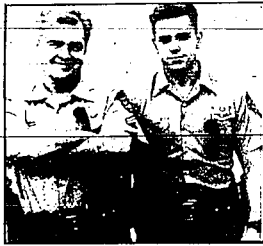

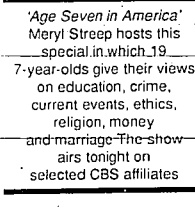

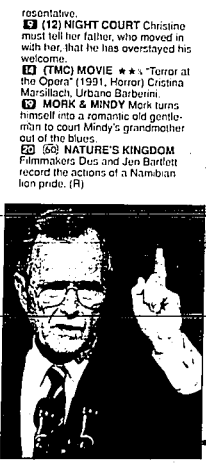
