U.S. planes unchallenged over Iraq

WASHINGTON — U.S. warplanes swooped into southern Iraq Thursday to enforce a coalition ban on all flights by Iraqi aircraft.

Saddam Hussein's government denounced the no-flight zone and threatened retaliation "in due time." But the Pentagon said no Iraqi planes had challenged the prohibition of flights below the 32nd parallel.

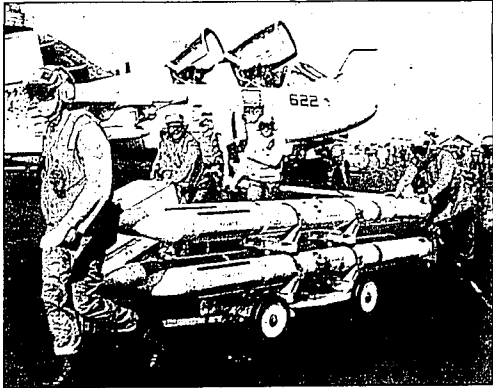
Pentagon spokesman Bob Hall, speaking at a news conference almost two hours after the 10:15 a.m. EDT ban went into effect, said: "As of this moment, or as of about five minutes ago, there had been no activity to prevent the monitoring regime that we've undertaken."

He said F-18s based on the aircraft carrier Independence and F-15 fighters were patrolling the skies of southern Iraq, and that the military was adding to its AWACS and RC-135 reconnaissance plane force in the Persian Gulf theater. British and French planes are moving into the region to participate, Hall said. President Bush announced the ban on Wednesday, saying one purpose was to prevent any attacks on coalition surveillance planes monitoring Iraqi military activities in the marshlands of southern Iraq. Bush accused Saddam of attacking the Shiite people of southern Iraq, a violation of U.N. Resolution 688 that requires Iraq to cease all suppression of its citizens. Shiite Muslims make up 55 percent of Iraq's population, were crushed when they rose up against Saddam following the Gulf War defeat, but have kept up guerrilla operations based in the vast marshes of the south. The Iraqi military has recently stepped up its attacks on the region.

More than 20 American aircraft based on the Independence patrolled southern Iraq, some flying escorts for British Tornados helping monitor the special zone.

Pilots returning from the flights said none fired any of their air-to-ground missiles and they were not locked onto by Iraqi radar, although they flew over roads, rivers, airports and known surface-to-air missile sites.

Pentagon sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said they expect Saddam's forces to test U.S. and allied resolve with possible "cat and mouse" plays, perhaps by flying aircraft just over or near the border of the zone.

Traffic, crime, housing city's top problems

TWIN FALLS — How about renaming Blue Lakes Boulevard to Zoo Lakes Boulevard? One city resident says traffic problems on Twin Falls' busiest artery merit that name.

In fact, a number of residents say traffic in general is among the city's worst problems, according to the first Twin Falls community surveys tabulated this year.

Crime and a lack of affordable housing also made the list of the city's worst problems, said Nancy Taylor, who heads a team of planners helping revise the city's comprehensive plan.

The city mailed out 2,500 surveys to residents and 500 more to businesses. In addition, interested citizens picked up surveys at City Hall.

Nearly 1,200 of the surveys have been returned, a rate that Taylor called "astounding." Overall, residents rated city services — fire, police, sewer, water, the airport, for example — as good.

Residents listed a variety of qualities as the city's No. 1 asset, Taylor said. Among them:

- Good people;
- Hard-working, "underpaid" residents;
- Recreation opportunities;
- The College of Southern Idaho;

Chaos in Andrew's wake frustrates needy thousands

PERRINE, Fla. — Local officials angrily pleaded for help Thursday to break a logjam of food, clean water and other supplies for thousands of people left in need by Hurricane Andrew.

Meanwhile, the hurricane's remnants, downgraded to a tropical depression, pelted a large area of the Southeast. Strong winds blew down a tree that killed a logger in the Florida Panhandle, tornadoes injured four people and damaged buildings in Tennessee, and torrential rains threatened flooding in Alabama and Georgia.

Throughout the area south of Miami that had been devastated by winds gusting to more than 160 mph Monday, residents and officials alike were growing more impatient by the hour.

"We're doing everything we can! Where ... is the cavalry on this one?" demanded Kate Hale, director of Dade County's emergency management.

The government estimated it would cost \$20 billion to \$30 billion to clean up and rebuild in Florida and care for residents displaced by the storm, which went on to strike a second blow at Louisiana's Cajun country on Wednesday. Louisiana wasn't hit as hard as

Troops join relief efforts

FINDLAY, Ohio — President Bush mobilized federal troops Thursday night for disaster-relief duty in hurricane-ravaged Florida, promising that "help is on the way and it will be a major effort."

The Pentagon said 2,000 to 5,000 troops were being sent to Florida from Fort Bragg, N.C., and all would arrive by this morning. With damage estimates ranging from \$6 billion to \$20 billion, Bush said, "The damage is far more

widespread than even we had feared."

The president's announcement, at the end of a campaign swing through Missouri and Ohio, followed angry complaints in Florida over distribution problems with food, clean water and other supplies. Damage estimates ranged in the billions of dollars.

Later, White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said Bush had canceled a scheduled weekend trip to his Kennebunkport, Maine, so that he could monitor the relief effort.

Florida, and state officials there expressed relief that the storm's damage was limited. But that sentiment was lost on people in marshy coastal areas who returned to homes that had been badly damaged or destroyed.

Where the storm had passed, people were left in chaos — without diapers, radios, toilets, drinkable water and other necessities.

In Perrine, 15 miles south of Miami, small U-Haul trucks sat outside destroyed homes while family members

salvaged what they could. People had painted their street addresses and the names of their insurers on sides of the debris.

Cars crowded a strip shopping center, where three of about 30 stores were open. In the parking lot, three men served up barbecue and cold pasta with pesto to lines of people, most dressed in shorts and dirty T-shirts.

Rain began falling upon the area at mid-afternoon.

Sister talks with fugitive in N. Idaho home

NAPLES — The sister of an armed fugitive talked to her brother through a loudspeaker Thursday as a federal stakeout of Randy Weaver's mountaintop hideout entered its seventh day.

Weaver, a white supremacist, had asked to speak to his sister, Marjorie Joy of Jefferson, Iowa, FBI special agent Gene Glenn said.

Federal agents brought Joy to a safe spot that was close enough to the cabin to talk to Weaver through a bullhorn.

Weaver shouted responses to his sister, mostly short one-word answers like "yes" or "no." Glenn said Thursday evening. The agent said Joy talked with her brother about a variety of subjects, but would not disclose details.

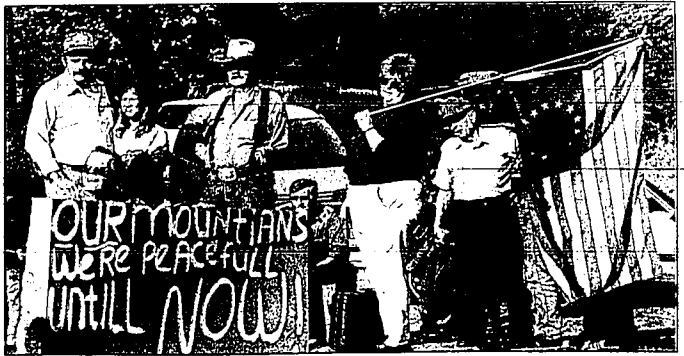

Glenn called the conversation "a step in the right direction." Meanwhile Boundary County has put its back-to-school plans on hold as federal agents used a school gym as a bunkhouse.

In the bizarre drama playing out in North Idaho's Selkirk Mountains, federal agents are using loudspeakers to bombard the cabin with tape-recorded messages from Weaver's friends and family, urging him to seek an end to the deadlock.

Radio personality Paul Harvey joined the chorus Thursday, including a plea to Weaver in his daily national broadcast from Chicago.

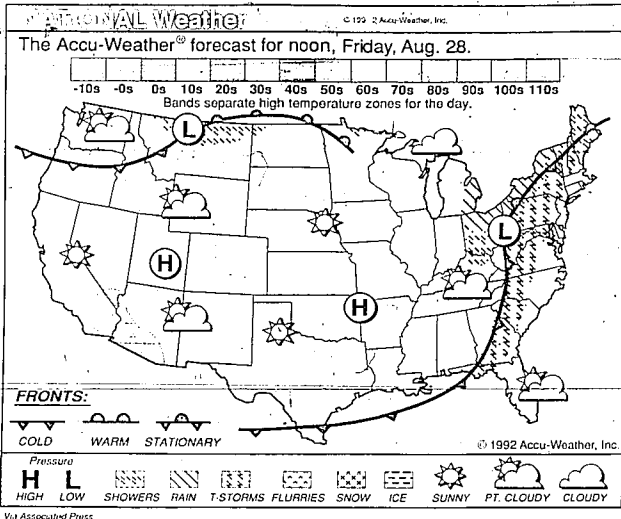

Andrew's remnants drench South; West cool again

The tropical depression that was Hurricane Andrew caused wet, windy weather and spawned a few tornadoes as it moved northeast Thursday.

Tornadoes touched down southwest of Valdosta, Ga., and near Montgomery, Ala. Baseball-size hail fell near Wapakoneta, Ohio.

Thunderstorm winds caused damage in parts of Alabama. Much of the state received heavy rain and there was some flooding.

Thursday morning was again unseasonably cool over parts of the Rocky Mountains, and the chill reached into the Plains. At least 23 cities in Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, Utah, New Mexico, Texas and Nebraska ticked or broke low temperature records for the date. In Utah, the records included 29 in Richfield and 35 in Hanksville, each 10 degrees lower than the old records.

Flood warnings were posted for the lower Pearl River at Bogalusa. The river was expected to reach flood stage Friday and crest more than 7½ above flood stage Sunday.

Flood warnings also were posted for the Pearl River at Monticello, Miss. and the Bogue Chitto River near Tylertown, Miss. Both rivers were expected to crest Friday, the Pearl at about 4½ feet above flood stage and the Bogue Chitto at about 3½ feet.

Third-party presidential candidate Bo Gritz, who failed in his bid to attempt communication with Weaver at the scene Wednesday, was urging "patriots everywhere" in the nation to converge on the northern Idaho area... to demand the peaceful release of Randy Weaver and his family to avert any further bloodshed."

Gritz is a former U.S. Army Special Forces colonel, and Weaver is a former Special Forces engineer.

The road was reopened about an hour later after a Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agent, wearing protective clothing, opened the overnight-mail-type pouch and removed what appeared to be a manila envelope. Its contents have not been disclosed.

"The area has been in a state of siege since last Friday, when a federal marshal and Weaver's son were shot to death outside the cabin. The site has been under periodic federal surveillance since February 1991, when Weaver held us there after failing to appear in court to face a weapons charge."

More than 100 federal, state and local law enforcement officers and National Guardsmen have joined the standoff. The cabin is about 40 miles south of the Curlew border.

Stores of neo-Nazi skinheads and other Weaver supporters have held a fractious vigil at a barrier erected by federal agents about three miles from the cabin.

School was to have begun Thursday, but those plans were postponed.

"Why take a chance?" school board chairman Leonard Kuehn said. "The presence is here; the potential (for problems) is here. If we've got nervous parents, why not put them at ease?"

The high school gymnasium has been turned into dormitory for officers helping in the siege of Weaver's home.

On Wednesday, the FBI reported hearing a "series of words" from a male in the cabin. It was the first communication from the group under siege and was characterized as a possible first step toward negotiation.

Weaver is believed to be accompanied by his wife, three daughters and Kevin Harris, 24, a family friend charged with first-degree murder in the fall shooting of deputy U.S. Marshal William Degan, 42, of Quincy, Mass., in the Friday's exchange of gunfire.

Weaver, whose 14-year-old son, Samuel, died in the firefight, has been charged with assault on a federal officer. A bullet tore the shirt of that deputy, who was not injured.

Weaver supporters add a volatile element to the already deadly conflict.

Weaver has said he won't surrender unless authorities admit the weapons charge he fled more than 18 months ago is false. He is accused of selling sawed-off shotguns to an undercover agent.

Weaver is a devotee of the Christian Identity Movement that combines Old Testament beliefs with right-wing and white-supremacist politics.

In these 120 surveys, the overwhelming response to the city's housing problem is to allow apartment buildings throughout the city, Taylor said.

A flap over an eight-plus project proposed for the city's northeast corner was one reason that the city opted last autumn to revise the comprehensive plan.

Residents had interesting suggestions for amenities to improve the city. These ranged from building a skating rink to building a tram to run across the Snake River Canyon at Shoshone Falls, she said.

A question about retaining city streets through a range of responses also.

"I've lived here 15 years and just figured it out, so don't change it," one resident wrote.

"It's had enough. Don't make it worse," echoed another.

But someone else suggested "that could be one of the biggest improvements you could do."

Another citizen suggested that one way to make the city better would be to get rid of the parking attendants downtown.

These 120 responses came from four neighborhoods on the city's west side. Taylor expects to take at least the next 10 days cataloging all the survey responses into a computer.

When that's finished, planners can take a closer look at the responses in relation to the comprehensive plan, she said.

Louisianans return to demolished coastal towns

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Louisiana's made their way back to hurricane-ravaged coastal neighborhoods Thursday, officials expressed relief that destruction wasn't worse and appealed for medical help at still-crowded shelters.

"We've been spared a major, major disaster," Gov. Edwin Edwards said during a helicopter tour.

Storm Andrew, still drenching Dixie as it weakened to a tropical depression, was blamed for one fatal affront: an offshore natural gas rig apparently damaged by the hurricane collapsed and caught fire at the wellhead. No pollution was reported, the Coast Guard said.

Officials throughout southern Louisiana began compiling damage estimates, but said no numbers would be available at least until Friday. Still, estimates likely will be measured in millions of dollars, rather than the billions-of-more-densely populated Florida.

"All my things, all my things, my furniture," Linda Hensson wept in Bayou Vista, west of Morgan City. Under cloudless skies and steamy heat, a steady stream of cars, slowed by sightseers, returned to the coastal towns where Andrew's eye and 160-mph winds, storm gusts came ashore Wednesday.

The clean-up began with chain saws and portable generators ringing out. A tow truck righted a toppled trailer and National Guard troops with Humvees and M-16 rifles took up posts. Store owners put up plastic sheets over shattered windows and swept up broken glass with shovels. Everyone, it seemed, waited for insurance adjusters.

Local radio stations were out, and newspapers in Franklin and Morgan City haven't been able to publish since Monday.

Knee-deep water receded quickly, leaving only scattered pools lying about. Stores and restaurants tried to open; however, most still lacked electricity. A few resourceful Cajuns cooked on barbecue grills and portable gas stoves and sipped instant coffee. The Salvation Army had 26 canteen trucks out delivering food and water.

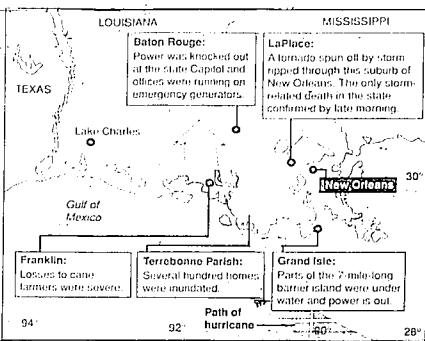
"If we can keep their stomachs full, they'll be a little more contented," said Al Rigdon, a Salvation Army official in Morgan City.

The hurricane, which ravaged subdivisions south of Miami on Monday, then raked the Louisiana coast 48 hours later, has already been labeled the costliest natural disaster in U.S. history. In addition to billion-dollar estimates of up to 20 billion in damage, about 300 people were killed, a total of 200 people in the two states and the Bahamas.

Its remnants crossed Mississippi on Thursday with winds of about 35 mph. Jackson recorded 4 inches of rain, the National Weather Service said, and about 29,000 Mississippi homes and businesses lost power. In Livingston, Ala., near the Mississippi line, Mayor Tom Tartt said wind damaged several roofs.

The storm was on a track to cross Alabama and move into Georgia by Friday, forecasters said.

In Louisiana's inland parishes, where an estimated 10,000 people



led to 43 Red Cross shelters as Andrew approached. Officials issued a plea for more workers to relieve 500 to 600 volunteers.

"We need medical personnel," said Alexandria, La., Mayor Ned Raloph. "Some of these people in the shelters need some medical care."

Power companies reported that 381,000 Louisiana homes and businesses had lost electricity, but that service had been restored to 214,000 of them by Thursday. In Morgan City, the mayor said residents should plan for two weeks without power.

"This is by far the worst hurricane I've been involved in," said Mayor Cedric Lafleur, who has held public office since 1968. "Almost every business place or home here has some damage — some major and some just damage to things like fences, carpets and awnings."

Convoy of repair crews from power companies across the South were arriving to help, spokesmen at utilities said.

"Some roads remained impassible, mostly because of fallen trees. Waiting to return to his home in the small community of Amelia, Lemis Scully Jr. wondered if he had been wipped out.

"I'm just walking on faith now," he said.

Community still poor, forgotten

GOULDS: Fla. (AP) — They were poor and left overlooked a week ago. Now they feel like the forgotten forgotten.

Forgotten before Hurricane Andrew ripped through their public housing complex and tiny Baptist church, and forgotten after Andrew took what little they had worked so hard for.

"This area has always been ignored down here — we're at the bottom of the totem pole," Patricia Roker, a 38-year-old single mother of four, said Thursday.

Ms. Roker lives in the Arthur Mays Villas public housing project. She has no food or water left and says she has had to walk miles to get what her kids can't do without.

She and some other mothers gathered Thursday, shouting at a county public housing employee, telling him how tired they were of being the last person in line.

"Now we're considered a disaster area and yet we still don't get help from the government," Ms. Roker said. "What does it take? I've been a survivor all my life, but I just don't know how much longer I can keep surviving without help."

Goulds, population 7,300, is one of Dade County's poorest communities, located just south of the more well-to-do Cutler Ridge, which also was severely damaged.

Many of the one-room cement block houses in Goulds have concrete floors. They never had running water, and roads already were crumbling. Goulds residents said fire hydrants had been used as a domestic water source and it had been years since they had seen any governmental effort to improve the community.

Residents say half of their meager homes didn't make it through the storm.

"This is a predominantly black community and we're always left out, but we're used to it," said Merril Kelly, a 50-year-old nursing assistant at a home for the elderly.

But while people on the west side of Goulds, where cardboard already served as windows and hydrants for showers, waited, those on the east side saw some relief.

Skip Tribbey, a wildlife officer with the Florida Fish and Game Commission, tried to calm the 200 to 300 people in line Thursday for the first distribution of food and clothes.

"Their prescription is probably accurate," Tribbey said. "I don't suppose that nobody cares, it's just that there hasn't been any food yet to deliver."

A dozen National Guard with their M-16s at hand shouted orders. "I'll be real honest with you," yelled Lt. Tim Monismue, "I don't have any idea what's coming. I hope ya'll get water and ice, but I just can't tell that's the case."

About 100 people back, Brenda Jones cried.

"I know there are a lot of places that are really torn up, but nobody has come through here to see us. Nobody cares about us," said the single mother of seven children. "It seems like we're always the forgotten ones."

Claudia Mae Tomason, 88, sat in front of her demolished home, clutching her blood pressure medicine and shoeing away the chickens that walked in and out of the house.

"My house has been broken for years and God, he just broke it a little more."

Storm reveals poor construction, materials

MIAMI (AP) — Some homeowners, who claim that a sweeping of Hurricane Andrew complained of shoddy workmanship and inferior building materials, and regulators warn they may be cheated again when they seek repairs.

"It's shocking to see what we see, but it's not hard to understand," said Loumie Hayes, a fine business owner who built homes in Miami for 20 years. "Shoddy construction, un-proven construction and a quick buck have been the motive for the last 20 years."

Miami entities and states in the southeastern United States have adopted a standard regional building code, written by industry and influenced by such factors as regional weather conditions. The Southeast code calls for buildings that can withstand 110 mph winds.

In Florida, building codes are issued by each county, and Dade County, which includes the city of Miami, requires buildings that can withstand 125 mph winds.

"After 25 years ago during the very rapid growth era of Dade County, there were a lot of shortcuts," said former-county consumer advocate Walter Darland. "There's always some of that popping up, but you never find out until you have a disaster. Now you have a disaster."





Truman's daughter blasts GOP for using her father as model

WASHINGTON (AP) — Margaret Truman Daniel gave 'em hell Thursday. She said the 33rd president, her father, had been hijacked by the 41st, George Bush, and the rest of the Republican Party. Harry S. Truman would have been "flabbergasted to learn that he has become a model for President Bush's campaign for re-election," Mrs. Daniel wrote in an op-ed page article in the Washington Post.

She noted the frequent favorable references

to her dyed-in-the-wool Democratic father at last week's Republican National Convention. Bush, in his speech, recalled Truman's come-from-behind 1948 campaign — and misquoted her father, she said.

Said Bush: "Harry Truman said this: 'This is more than a political act to arms. Give me your help, not to win votes alone, but to win this new crusade and keep America safe and secure for its own people.'"

But, Mrs. Daniel said, the quotation was ac-

tually Truman's paraphrase of Franklin D. Roosevelt's own 1932 acceptance speech, "and my father gave President Roosevelt credit for it."

Since the convention, Bush has been comparing his underdog campaign to Truman's and paraphrasing what Truman said when people shouted, "Give 'em hell, Harry." Truman always would respond: "I'm just telling the truth and they think it's hell."

Truman's defeat of Republican Thomas E.

Dewey has been considered the greatest presidential upset of the 20th Century. Pollsters quit polling, they were so certain that Dewey was undefeatable.

"Personally," wrote Truman's daughter, "I have always found President Bush to be a friendly, pleasant man, invariably courteous to me. I never suspected that behind this Ivy League facade there was a political plagiarist."

"Of course, after many years on the political battlefronts, nothing should surprise me. It

would not surprise Harry Truman. The Republicans are just lucky that he's no longer around to shoot back. I don't think they would dare try to entice him or kidnap him or steal his best lines if he was still with us."

She concluded by paraphrasing what Sen. Lloyd Bentsen said to his vice presidential opponent, Dan Quayle, in 1988...when Quayle compared himself to John F. Kennedy.

Said Mrs. Daniel: "I would say to George Bush, 'You are no Harry Truman.'"

Economy stumbles in 2nd quarter

WASHINGTON (AP) — The economy stumbled in the April-June quarter as consumers showed reluctance to open their wallets, the government said Thursday.

But a record drop in applications for unemployment insurance in mid-August and an increase in corporate profits offered glimmers of hope for improved growth later this year.

The nation's gross domestic product, the broadest measure of economic health, inched up by a 1.4 percent annual pace, unchanged from an advance estimate released last month, the Commerce Department said.

That was less than half the 2.9 percent rate of the first quarter. Most of the deterioration came because consumer spending decreased 0.2 percent in the second quarter after surging 5.1 percent during the first three months of the year.

Meanwhile, the Labor Department said first-time claims for unemployment benefits plunged to 382,000 during the week ended Aug. 15, down from 474,000 a week earlier. It was the largest decrease on record since the department began tracking claims in 1967 and the first time claims had fallen below 400,000 in 22 months.

Economists were encouraged and said, if sustained, the drop could give consumers the buying power and confidence needed to fuel more robust economic growth. But they cautioned against reading too much into the big decline, noting that the previous week's number was inflated

by a temporary shutdown of General Motors Corp. factories.

On another bright note, the Commerce Department said profits of American corporations rose 2.1 percent to an annual rate of \$23.4 billion in the second quarter, the highest level ever. The rise was built on a 10.8 percent increase in the first quarter, the best in four years.

Higher profits eventually should give businesses the wherewithal to hire more workers and increase purchases of productivity-improving capital equipment. But so far increases have been generated chiefly by cost-cutting rather than strong sales, analysts said.

Although second-quarter GDP growth was unchanged from last month's estimate, its composition took a worrisome turn, economists said.

Most of the growth this first thought came from an accumulation of inventories, and the nation's trade performance proved to be a bigger negative than initially believed.

Clinton, Bush bash each other, tout tax plans

President Bush and Democrat Bill Clinton mocked each other's tax proposals on Thursday as Bush hunted for swing votes in the Midwest and Clinton began a Texas bus caravan.

Republicans took out ads along Clinton's route accusing him of being "in the back pocket" of trial lawyers.

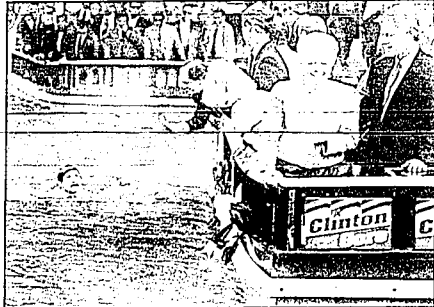
While both presidential candidates focused on economic themes, a new Associated Press poll conducted just after last week's Republican convention showed Americans more likely to prefer Democrats when it comes to the economy, education and their own futures.

Bush, at a campaign stop in St. Louis, accused Clinton of advancing protectionist trade policies. Clinton told a San Antonio, Texas, rally that Bush's tax policies would benefit only the rich.

"This administration's sole obsession is keeping taxes low on the wealthiest Americans," Clinton said as he teamed up with running mate Al Gore for one more bush tour, their fourth.

While Clinton and Gore worked Bush's adopted home turf, the president campaigned in Missouri and Ohio — two states he narrowly carried in 1988 and which are now regarded as key battlegrounds by both sides.

After touring a factory in St. Louis that makes police sirens, many of

which are sold internationally, Bush accused Clinton of wanting to tax foreign-investment and waiving on support for expanded trade with Mexico.

"Governor Clinton hopes to exploit the darker impulses of this uncertain age, fear of the future, fear of the unknown, fear of foreigners," Bush said. "I know his reputation for opportunism... the kind of guy who will do anything or say anything for political gain."

"I guess as a candidate you can be on both sides of every question," Bush said. "As president, you can't."

Clinton has proposed that foreign-owned companies pay taxes on profits made from their U.S. operations, contending it would put them on an even footing with all-U.S. companies.

Clinton said Bush's attack on his proposal was "ridiculous."

"I don't think American companies should pay more of their in-

come in taxes than foreign companies who do the same business here. All I want is fairness."

As he campaigned in Texas, Clinton promised to revive the nation's lagging economy and ridiculed Bush's promise of a broad tax cut if he wins a second term.

Clinton said that Congress had passed legislation providing modest middle class tax relief as well as incentives for American businesses but that Bush had vetoed it because it raised taxes on millionaires.

"Congress gave him a bill and he jumped in the tank for his wealthy friends," Clinton told his San Antonio audience, "mostly made up of blue-collar workers."

The Bush-Quayle campaign began running newspaper ads in Texas cities along the route of Clinton's latest bus tour contending the nation's trial lawyers were attempting a "takeover of the White House."

The centerpiece of the ads is a recent letter from Arkansas Trial Lawyers Association President David H. Williams urging fellow trial lawyers to "dig down deep and give to Bill Clinton" and boasting of influence with the Democratic nominee.

"Bill Clinton is in the back pocket of the trial lawyers," the ad states. In Washington, Vice President Dan Quayle made a similar claim. "I know where the trial lawyers' money goes... They know that they've got influence and absolute control of Bill Clinton," he said.

President OKs voting rights extension.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush has signed a 15-year extension of the Voting Rights Act expanding assistance in the voting booth for non-English-speaking citizens.

The original 1965 act required help if 5 percent of a locality's citizens spoke a foreign language and did not know enough English to participate in the political process.

Now, help will be mandated if a

jurisdiction has 10,000 or more citizens who speak the same foreign language and are limited in their English proficiency. Another section requires voting assistance where more than 5 percent of the population are American Indians or Alaska natives living on a reservation and speaking their own language.

Bush signed the measure Wednesday. It passed the House by a vote of 237-125 and the Senate, 75-20.

Patrol puts 20 planes over Iraq

ABOARD THE USS INDEPENDENCE IN THE PERSIAN GULF (AP) — More than 20 U.S. Navy planes flew off Thursday on the first patrol to enforce an edict banning Saddam Hussein's air force from rebellious southern Iraq.

The pilots returned safely and reported they had seen no Iraqi planes in the "no-fly zone" declared Wednesday by the United States, Britain and France. The pilots said they had not been locked onto by Iraqi radar. "I saw a lot of brown dirt, a lot of blowing sand," said Lt. Jeff Roacha, 29, of San Jose, Calif., whose mission was to escort two British Tornados reconnaissance planes.

"It was a quieter than we thought it would be. ... If they were there, they were not trying to shoot us," said Cmdr. Tim Healy, 39, of Belleville Ill., an FA-18 fighter pilot. "There was no indication of anything down below."

Navy officers declined to discuss details of their missions.

President Bush on Wednesday gave Iraq 24 hours notice to keep its warplanes and helicopter gunships north of the 32nd parallel and stop attacking Shiite rebels in the vast marshes of southern Iraq. The ultimatum took effect at 10:15 a.m. EDT, around dusk in Iraq.

Pentagon officials said any Iraqi planes caught in the air would be shot down without warning. U.S. Air Force planes flew out of Saudi Arabia.

"There were U.S. airplanes all over the country — up, down, as far as the eye could see," said Lt. Randy Marr, 31, of Syracuse, N.Y.

Most of the Navy men on the first patrol had been over Iraq before — during the Gulf War, which ended in February 1991 with the ouster of Iraqi troops from Kuwait. They were still nervous, worrying about Saddam's reaction.

"The mood is confused. No one knows what to expect. He could do nothing; he could start blazing away," said Lt. Pat Brannan, 29, of Palo Alto, Texas.

Before taking off, the pilots were issued their "blood chits" — small packages containing a text in English, Arabic and Farsi of neighboring Iran saying they were American pilots who might need help getting back to friendly forces.

Some men wrote final letters home, to be sent only if they were shot down.

"There's a real mixture of 'I really want to be there' and 'I really don't want to be there,'" said Capt. Carter B. Kato, commander of the Independence.

Navy officials said technicians monitoring Iraq's air space detected no air traffic over Iraq all day until the U.S. planes crossed the border.

Ordnance crews buzzed around the deck aiming some of the carrier's 70 combat jets. The weapons included Sparrow and Sidewinder air-to-air missiles and air-to-ground missiles that can be used against radar and anti-aircraft guns.

The F-14 Tomcat interceptors and FA-18 Hornet fighter-bombers also carry 20mm cannon.

There were none of the cheeky messages to the enemy traditionally chalked on rockets and bombs by the ordnance crews.

"It's a matter of housekeeping. We're hoping we don't have to use them, have to clean it up later," said Lt. Wayland Wilhams of Lemoore, Calif., in charge of ordnance safety on the flight deck.

The 59,000-ton carrier's air wing includes 20 F-14s, 20 FA-18s, 20 A-6E Intruder ground attack jets, five EA-6 Prowler electronic jamming aircraft, five E-2 Hawkeye airborne radar jets as well as helicopters.

While waiting for the first mission, a few pilots checked their aircraft. Some stored lucky charms, including at least one baseball bat. Some jogged around the flight deck.

Pilots said one of the first things that drove home their new mission was being issued loaded pistols to carry on their patrols.

"It starts to feel a little like the Wild west," said Lt. Mark Hopgood, 31, an A-6 pilot from Charlotte, N.C.

Chaplain David Pearey, in his first public prayer after the "no-fly zone" was proclaimed, asked the crew to pray for wise decisions by their commanders.

"Steady ahead and carefully," he said. "It's hard to anticipate what really lies ahead. Help us to do what is necessary."

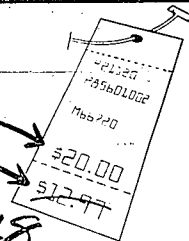

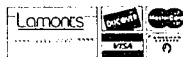

Woody's 'family values': It's not Ozzie & Harriet

Woody Allen is nobody's role model and nobody's spiritual adviser, and he isn't running for public office. So his personal morality for lack of it doesn't make much difference.

But, since his smutty little tale has already been inflicted on the public, maybe there's a lesson to be drawn from it.

This is, after all, a political year that features much discussion of "family values," except for politicians and fewer voters know exactly what the politicians mean by the phrase.

Part of the problem is that "values" means so many different things to different people. But another part of the problem is that, in the second half of the 20th century, the definition of "family" also is vague.

Woody Allen's extended clan is perhaps the most extreme example. In Mia Farrow he had neither a wife nor a live-in lover, but a "long-term live-apart soulmate." Together with Farrow's ex-husband Previn, and Farrow's biological and adopted children, this hanson made up a bizarre mutation of the Brady Bunch.

But if the Farrow-Previn-Allen Bunch is odd, it is only an exaggerated version of families that live on every block.

Any schloffteacher will testify that a fourth or more of America's children live with stepparents. Others live with one parent, or with a parent and a live-in "friend," in ambiguous relationships that muddy the picture of family life which seemed so clear in the 1950s.

This is where Allen and Farrow got into trouble. Having redefined "family" to suit themselves, they lived by their definition for a while. But when their relationship soured, Allen rewrote the redefinition.

He had never been a "father figure" to Soon-Yi Previn, the 21-year-old adopted daughter of Farrow and Previn, he said. So it was OK to recast her as his new squeeze.

Leave aside Farrow's allegation that Allen sexually molested their 7-year-old adopted daughter. We don't know whether it's true, and the Soon-Yi question is moral thicket enough.

Was Allen wrong to woo his lover's daughter? The human gut may answer "Yes," but the head has trouble defining

the sin. The romance is not incest in a legal sense, nor even in a biblical one, spitefully speaking.

Certainly it is sex outside wedlock, an activity still frowned upon in straightlaced circles. Intuitively, though, we all know it's something more than garden variety hanky-panky.

The best explanation may come from Marion Lindblad-Goldberg, a family counselor quoted in Newsweek: "The boundaries—in any—stepfamily—are ambiguous, but there are still functional relationships and expectations."

In simpler terms, Lindblad-Goldberg seems to be saying that a decent person knows what's right and should do it. Allen didn't.

When the politicians talk about "family values," many of them use the phrase as code words for reckless government intervention in private matters. But at least part of what family values means is simply doing the right thing. Accepting responsibilities. Living up to them.

Behaving morally.

Even in the 1990s, family should be something more specific than whatever anyone says it is, and so should right and wrong.

As a group, politicians are barely more credible on moral issues than Woody Allen is. But their criticisms of modern morality sometimes are on target.

It's not that behaving morally is any harder to do nowadays than it used to be. The problem is that, in a society where traditional social constraints such as church, neighborhood and extended family no longer regulate behavior, behaving immorally is easier than it used to be.

For all their talk, whichever politicians win this fall won't do much to change that. Cultural momentum is difficult to break.

Certainly, institutions of government, education, entertainment, culture and religion all have influence, and they should exert it. At its root, though, a nation's morality is the sum of billions of small decisions by individuals.

Each of us, including Woody Allen, must choose daily whether to do the right thing.

These are proposals that would have meant jobs for Americans and a boost for our economy. Yet Congress refuses to accept its role in our economic dilemma and continues to blame the president. I think Mr. Bush put it well when he said he was surprised that he didn't get blamed for crossing guards being out of work when the Berlin Wall fell.

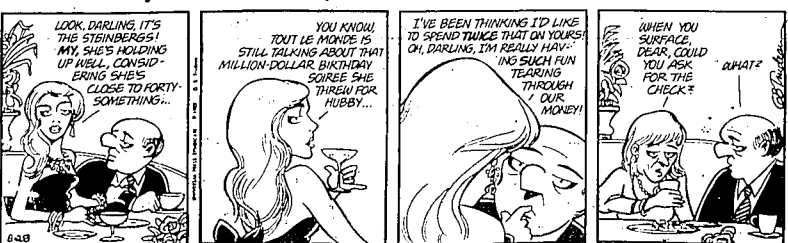

Japanese kingmaker will resign

TOKYO (AP) — After months of speculation that Japan's governing party would be rocked again by scandal, its kingmaker announced Thursday he is resigning his party posts because he took a dubious donation of millions of dollars.

Opposition leaders said the decision by Shin Kanemaru was a serious blow to the Liberal Democratic Party, which has governed Japan for

nearly four decades despite several bribery and influence-peddling scandals.

Makoto Tanabe, head of the Socialists, and other opposition leaders called for Parliament to meet early to discuss Kanemaru's resignation.

Kanemaru's political clout was so strong that his support was needed by other politicians to become prime minister.

BAIDOA, Somalia (AP) — On the blacktop road to Baidoa, a sun-baked corpse lies in the center, the chest emptied by vultures.

It might have been a bullet, a bus or hunger. In Somalia, no one stops to find out.

Scores of thousands have died this year, another 2,000 more with every sunrise. A million may follow. But beyond the mumbing statistics, the impact comes one death at a time.

In Baidoa, Amina Sheikh Mohamed, a nurse, stood in the yard of a feeding center and told a visitor that six children had died that day. A man spoke softly in her ear, and her face clouded.

"Make that seven," she said.

Under the dappled shade of a tree, Samow Sheikh squatted by the latest victim, his 14-year-old daughter, Habiba. He tried to close her mouth, which had locked open in death.

Before she joined the statistics, Habiba spent months of agony, wasting away with scant water and less food. When she died, she looked 7.

"You see this again and again, and you want to help, but you can't," said Amina, 30, a nurse with four kids of her own. "We need medicine, we need food, we need everything."

The feeding center, run by the Irish voluntary agency Concern, is a microcosm of what war, drought and international neglect have made of this nation of 6.5 million people.

It is yet another circle of Somali hell but far from the worst. In most places, starving children have only their parents' soothing touch, if that.

For a while, Habiba lay in the open courtyard, one of several bundles of blanket with tiny toes protruding from one end. Then a bright blue wheelbarrow marked "UNICEF" arrived, and she was gone.

Her father, a farmer, brought his family to Baidoa from a village 25 miles farther west. He left three other children with his wife in town.

"I'm afraid to go back in case they are dead," he said.

Amina turned to a young mother gazing deviously at the child in her arms. At nine months, she looked like a wizened old man.

"He may be next," she said. "We need IVs, but look, this is all I could get from the hospital next door." She pointed to three empty drip-solution bags hanging from the tree. "They have nothing else."

Baidoa is only three hours' drive west on a paved road from Mogadishu, the capital, but until recently there was nothing to bring and no way to bring it.

The International Committee of the Red Cross and the U.N. World Food Program have been airlifting food and sending more in trucks that bristle with guns. But armed gangs continue to loot perhaps half of what gets here.

"Mogadishu shows some improvement, but here it stagnates," for all the agencies trying to help," said Dominique Noury of the French Medecins Sans Frontieres (Doctors Without Borders), which is sending a team.

Helping is risky work in Baidoa. On the shot-up main street, a jeep labeled International Medical Corps carries a .50-caliber machine gun on the roof.

U.S. officials said in mid-August that American aircraft would shuttle huge stocks of food to Baidoa. But veteran relief workers on the ground

warn that bringing food is the easiest part, and the wrong approach could spark warfare over spoils.

Clan militias and freelance fighters overpowered guards hired by the U.N.

"You must consider that some of these guards might also be looters," said Reinholdz Mbari, a Mozambican who is UNICEF's adviser on Somalia.

Relief officials also fear that if too much is done here, Baidoa will draw desperate refugees from remote areas, depopulating villages and overwhelming the town.

Although many of Baidoa's nearly 100,000 inhabitants fled warfare and famine earlier this year, the city now is twice its normal size with people who have come here expecting salvation.

"Everyday, more," said Abdi Kader Hassan, a volunteer at a camp on the edge of town where 13,000 people huddle out of the sun in guts of their own bushes and scavenged scraps.

Once a day, families of up to 20 people get Red Cross rations: two pounds of dry rice and beans, with barely enough water to cook it. The water must also suffice for drinking and washing.

A few weeks ago, they arrived at a rate of 20 families a day, camp officials said. Now it is closer to 70 a day. Daily deaths, it decreasing some what because of the food, still approach 40.

Altogether, Somali Red Crescent teams collect 200 to 300 corpses a day, increase the pressure on the refugee centers, as well as others like the unknown victim on the Baidoa road.

Every one of them saddens Amina Sheikh Mohamed at the Concern children's center.

Asked how long the nightmare would last, she shook her head solemnly.

"If we can find some honest people, maybe it will be over in six months," she said. "If not, maybe longer."

U.S. airlift to begin sending supplies Friday

MOMBASA, Kenya (AP) — After two weeks of negotiation and negotiation, the United States is ready to begin emergency food flights Friday to Somalia, where chaos and danger reign in a land ravaged by drought and civil war.

Marine Brig. Gen. Frank Libutti, in charge of the U.S. military operation, said Thursday that the first of six C-130 Hercules transport planes would take off before dawn for Belet Huen, 670 miles northeast of this Kenyan port.

Since Libutti's team began flying a week ago, its eight C-130s and four C-141 Starliners have delivered about 925 tons of food to Somali refugees and drought-stricken Kenyans in northern Kenya.

But the focus of the aid operation ordered by President Bush is the delivery of food to Somalia, where 4.5 million people out of a population of 6.5 million are said to be in immediate danger of starvation.

The direct flights were delayed by negotiations to arrange security both for the American military personnel and for the food itself. Widespread combat between competing clan warlords has left Somalia in anarchy, and roving bandits have stolen humanitarian aid sent into the country.

"Our mission, simply stated, is to deliver food to the needy," Libutti said. "I'm absolutely confident we've done our homework. My decision is we're going to go. We can take food to Somalia and feel good about it."

The food being flown in by U.S. planes is to be distributed by the International Red Cross. One of its demands, sticking large Red Cross details on the U.S. aircraft, was satisfied Thursday.

Both Libutti and Andrew Natsios, Bush's special coordinator for the Somalia effort, called the Swiss-based organization the "real heroes" of Somalia relief.

Sarajevo quieter but shells kill 3

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — The bitter fighting in Sarajevo quieted Thursday for the first time since the weekend, but mortar rounds blasted a bread line and a cafe, killing three people and wounding 29.

As hospital workers collected the casualties, diplomats in London again signaled and threatened the factions in Bosnia's ethnic fighting in an attempt to bring peace to the former Yugoslav republic.

But previous conferences have failed to stop the conflict, and Western leaders continued to oppose military intervention from a settlement for fear of becoming entangled in a protracted guerrilla war in the rugged Balkans.

The two mortar attacks jolted a generally peaceful day in the Bosnian capital, which had been suffering since the weekend under the relentless artillery duel between Serbs in the surrounding hills and troops loyal to the Muslim-dominated government.

At the London conference, the United Nations announced plans to increase the size of its peacekeeping force in Bosnia from the current 1,040 soldiers. Troops still would be used only to guard convoys.

Radovan Karadzic, the leader of Serbs in Bosnia, said Thursday that his forces were prepared to give up a fifth of the territory they hold in Bosnia — 70 percent of what is reported. They were likely to be unacceptable to Bosnia's Muslim leaders, who oppose the partition of the state.

Uganda will reopen game parks so that tourists can view gorillas

KAMPALA, Uganda (AP) — Uganda plans to reopen its forested southwestern game parks in December so tourists can again view the rare mountain gorilla, officials said Thursday.

The gorillas live in the heavily forested mountains shared by southwestern Uganda, northwestern Rwanda and eastern Zaire.

Uganda tourism officials said two groups of gorillas in Uganda's Mgahinga and Bwindi parks have been familiarized with humans, and

four tourists a day will be allowed to see them.

"We can only allow a few at a time to maintain the ecosystem of the parks," said Fred Mubumza, a spokesman for the Uganda National Parks office.

Marshal says Degan died early on in 30-minute gunbattle

BOSTON When Bill Degan's funeral was over Wednesday, deputy Federal Marshal Arthur Roderick leaned against a wall at Florian Hall in Dorchester and spoke of the Idaho gun battle that took the life of his friend and colleague.

"All hell broke loose," Roderick said at a reception held for the hundreds of law enforcement officers who came to honor Degan. "Rounds were coming in from everywhere. I dove into the woods, and bullets were coming from three different directions."

Roderick, a Provincetown, Mass., native and nine-year veteran of the U.S. Marshal's Service, recounted the gunfire that engulfed him and fellow marshals Degan and Larry Cooper when they were confronted by federal fugitive Randy Weaver and his follower Kevin Harris near their mountain cabin in Naples, Idaho.

He spoke of how one bullet fired at him from the side - pierced his clothing without wounding him. "I'm talking maybe an eight or an inch higher, it would have done me," Roderick said.

But his close brush with death isn't what bothers Roderick.

"What really hurts me is that Billy Degan went down," he said. "Billy was one of the best. He did it because he was protecting us. We've lost a good friend."

Roderick said he, Degan and Cooper were heading back for the day at 10:30 a.m. Friday, having started their trek to the cabin area eight hours earlier to conduct surveillance on Weaver's home, when their radios crackled with news from a second team also on the mountain.

A car had entered the valley below, one of the marshals from the other team said, and the sound - heard high above the valley because of what Roderick called its unique acoustics - was bringing people from Weaver's cabin to the rock outcropping from which they defended the perch.

"But unlike other times in the eight or nine weeks in which Roderick had worked trying to root out Weaver, this time the cabin dwellers did not stop at the rock. This time Weaver, Harris and Weaver's teenage son, Samuel, came after them, using a dog. Roderick said that when the report from the other team came in, he moved away from the cabin area to a tree for cover.

"I just looked around the tree and I saw the dog coming at us about 150 or 200 meters away, and Harris was behind him with a rifle," he said.

He said he and the others moved back down the slope, away from the cabin, rather than confront Weaver because they did not want to risk a firefight that might injure the teenager.

"We were trying to get further cover because we knew the kid was

there," said Roderick. Samuel Weaver, 13, was killed in the gun battle that began when Harris shot and killed Degan, according to authorities.

Roderick said he told Cooper and Degan that the dog and Harris were after them and that the three marshals took turns providing cover for one another as they moved down the slope.

At one point, Roderick was leading the way back because he knew the trails. He said he was about to take a

right fork down to the marshals' base camp when he glimpsed a man he believed to be Weaver. The man was in front of him and off to the side, he said, "screaming like a fool."

Roderick said he feared that he and the others would be outflanked. "At that point I said, 'Stop, Federal Marshal.' And Bill yelled it and Larry yelled it."

The shots started flying. Roderick said he and Cooper returned fire in the first stages of the shootout. After the first fusillade,

Cooper told him that Degan had been hit; during the first lull in the shooting, Roderick started trying to make it back to his wounded friend.

It was then that a single shot rang out and just missed hitting Roderick. "I dove back into the woods and there were more shots," Roderick said. "I could see rounds all around us. Larry was taking shots too. He was trying to get Billy back."

They radioed to the other surveillance team, whose members covered 1 1/2 miles of dense forest in

15 minutes to get to the shooting scene.

That team was also fired on from the cabin during the half-hour gun battle, said Roderick.

Roderick said he and the other marshals eventually made their way to Degan and Cooper.

The shooting subsided and they sent two marshals down the mountain for help. But attempts to get Degan back down were defeated by periodic gunfire from the cabin. Fears that a rescue team might be ambushed delayed its departure until after dark, Roderick said. It wasn't until 1 a.m. Saturday that the team was able to reach the stranded marshals and lead them to safety.

"We tried to get him down the hill a couple of times. We loved the guy," said Roderick.

DOE seeks additional test material

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - The U.S. Department of Energy still wants the right to haul in at least 4,250 drums of radioactive material to test the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant 1,850 more than recommended.

House-Senate conferees have been debating a bill that would allow the department to test 0.5 percent to 1 percent of the waste repository's total capacity. The 2,400 drums recommended by Sandia National Laboratories represents 0.28 percent.

"Based on the scientific uncertainty associated with this program, it would appear that 1 percent should be considered," Assistant Energy Secretary Leo Duffy said Wednesday.

Sandia, the agency's scientific adviser on the project, recommended in June that the Energy Department cut the number of tests it plans at WIPP. The lab also urged that only 2,400 drums of waste be brought in for the tests, aimed at determining if the site is acceptable as a permanent repository for defense-generated transuranic waste.

The site is located 2,150 feet underground in salt caverns 26 miles southeast of Carlsbad. Some plutonium-contaminated waste already is prepared for shipment to New Mexico from the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The June 22 study recommends the number of bin tests be slashed from 138 to between 25 and 50. That translates to 150 to 300 drums of waste. And Sandia urged that the number of alcove tests, involving about 1,050 drums, be cut from five tests to just one or two.

But Duffy said such tests will help satisfy an Environmental Protection Agency exemption for WIPP called a "no-migration variance."

"We can speculate on what the test is going to show... but EPA says that until they see qualified test data, they will not approve the no-migration variance," Duffy said.

Gooding County ponders \$10,000 error

GOODING — A clerical error in the county's contract with a landfill manager has caused another ripple in the already rough seas of the Gooding County budget. Commissioner Bob Muffley said Thursday that a budget of \$124,500 was set aside last October for the operation of the county landfill.

However, an typographical error from county Clerk John Meyer's office set the contract amount at \$134,500, Muffley said. The mistake was discovered when landfill operator Fred Willard, owner of Willard Enterprises, pre-paid a fill-dirt subcontractor, Ben Gnesa of Kimberly, three months in advance and came looking to the county commissioners for more cash. "We budgeted and figured for \$124,500," Muffley said, "but after the budgeting process, it came out at \$10,000 more, so he (Willard) assumed we were Santa Claus and gave him another \$10,000. The figure should have been \$124,500.

"But with what we're taking back from what we're paying him, plus the dirt we're getting, we will balance out at \$124,500," he said. Muffley said Willard had agreed to the contract amount, in writing, at the beginning of the last fiscal year. Willard concurred, and said he would discontinue the \$2,835 monthly he pays Gnesa until his contract with the county balances. Gnesa still owes the county about 4,400 yards of fill dirt, which is used to cover the trash at the landfill, Willard said.

This latest snafu comes only months after a clerical error in tax assessments nearly cost the county hundreds of thousands in revenue. Additional tax notices were sent out in June to counteract that shortfall. In other business Thursday, the county received some good financial news, in the form of a \$15,500 check from Gooding County Fair and Rodeo manager Lucy Osborne.

Chisholm establishes hotline tracking nuclear shipments

BUHL — Buhl activist Bill Chisholm has set up a message phone system for people who want to get the latest on a shipment of spent Navy reactor fuel from New York that is reportedly headed toward the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The nuclear waste is part of a Navy reactor program. Last year, shipments from a Colorado reactor sparked a border showdown and court battle at the behest of Gov. Cecil Andrus, who also opposes wholesale shipment of spent Navy fuel to Idaho.

Chisholm, who calls the current plan "an almost exact scenario of last year," says a demonstration is planned somewhere in Pocatello when the waste arrives. People interested in protesting or who want more information can call Chisholm at 543-4418 or a message phone at 543-8423.

Chisholm attempted to block the Colorado shipments last fall on Interstate 15 south of Pocatello and was arrested.

Federal agencies toughen restrictions due to fire danger

BOISE — The Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management tightened restrictions on the use of all public lands in southern Idaho because of the extreme fire danger.

The "Stage 2" restrictions, imposed at midnight Thursday, prohibit all wood and charcoal fires outside of developed recreation sites, ban the use of chain saws and operating vehicles off roads between 1 p.m. and 1 a.m. daily and bar smoking except within an enclosed vehicle, a developed recreation site or while stopped in an area at least three feet in diameter that is clear of all flammable material.

The new rules do not prohibit the use of propane stoves.

If you're planning to travel near areas experiencing wild fires, there's a toll-free telephone number you can call to receive up-to-date travel information before you leave.

The number, 1-800-635-7820, is updated daily and accessible all day. Callers will receive information on road closures and where the major fires affecting travel are located by pushing 3 on a touch-tone telephone to "current travel conditions."

Idaho teacher pay rises at rate lower than national average

WASHINGTON — The shift in the focus of state aid to public education away from bolstering teacher pay toward upgrading instructional programs has reversed the one-time campaign to bring Idaho teacher salaries up to the national average.

The annual report of the American Federation of Teachers, released on Thursday, showed average teacher pay in Idaho rising less than 3.3 percent for the 1991-1992 school year to \$26,345.

At a third of a point lower than the national average increase, it marked the first time in three years the paychecks of Idaho teachers only keep pace with inflation.

The modest increase also dropped the state's ranking among all 50 states from 44th a year ago to 46th, the lowest ranking since the campaign to gradually bring state teacher pay up to the national average began in the mid-1980s.

Jerome alternative high school to open

JEROME — Students who have dropped out of school can soon enroll in a new alternative school that is ideal for pregnant teen-agers or students with day jobs, a local school official says.

The Jerome School District will open the doors to its Alternative High School next Wednesday for students between the ages of 17 and 21, said Karen Fraley, program administrator.

Classes will be held from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Thursday, Fraley said, and the school will take all classes from throughout the Magic Valley.

The only restriction is whether students have transportation, she said.

The trimester system will be run in

three, 12-week sessions. "Basically it serves a whole cadre of students the daytime school doesn't serve," Fraley said.

Registration will be from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Monday and Tuesday at Jerome High School.

The district is anticipating an enrollment of between 65 and 100 students from across the Magic Valley, Fraley said.

Many of the students will be teens who dropped out of school after they became pregnant, she said. The alternative high school will provide free baby-sitting for children of students, Fraley said.

Holding the classes at night allows many students that have day jobs to attend school that couldn't otherwise attend.

Unlike the Magic Valley Alternative

High School in Twin Falls, which limits enrollment because it holds class in tight and makeshift quarters in a Twin Falls church, the Jerome alternative school has ample space at the high school once day students go home.

The Jerome school will have about eight teachers, who also teach during regular school hours in other valley high schools, Fraley said.

The alternative school generates state funds according to the number of students who attend. The state gives more money proportionate to student enrollment to alternative schools than regular schools, Fraley said.

"That's because class sizes are intentionally smaller at alternative schools

Enrollment edges up in Twin Falls

TWIN FALLS — Teachers were shifted to different schools and grades to handle an almost 2 percent increase in Twin Falls School District enrollment on the first day of class Thursday, Superintendent Terrell Donicht said.

Enrollment in the district will increase by about 1.7 percent — just as Twin Falls school officials had predicted — and top 7,000 total students for the first time ever.

Enrollment is expected to reach 7,064 students, Donicht said. Last year there were 6,932 students on the fourth week of school, he said.

This year's total is based on completed enrollment tallies of all district schools except Twin Falls High School and O'Leary Junior-High School. Enrollments at those schools are estimates, Donicht said.

This is the second year in a row that enrollment increased by more than 100 students.

District officials anticipated that enrollment at all six elementary schools in the district would grow to 3,789 students. Actual first-day enrollment was only 10 less than that.

The biggest increase in school populations came at Lincoln Elementary School. The district expected 656 students at Lincoln, and 693 actually showed up at Lincoln, Donicht said.

"We may add a teaching position to Lincoln over the next few days," he said.

But although the district expected 533 kindergarten students, only 474 turned up, Donicht said.

"That's the only place where we are off the mark," he said.

Enrollment at Stuart Junior High School was 717, and enrollment at Magic Valley Alternative High School was 118 students.

George Hansen 49 counts of fraud

Hansen's fraud trial begins next week

TWIN FALLS — Barring any last-minute postponements, the multimillion-dollar bank fraud trial of former U.S. Rep. George Hansen will start Monday morning in federal district court in Boise.

Hansen and an associate, John Scoresby, are charged with 49 counts of fraud in connection with an alleged check-kiting scheme involving several banks in the Magic Valley and the Upper Snake River Valley.

The two men have pleaded not guilty.

Their jury trial — which already has been postponed three times — is set to start at 9:30 a.m. in the federal courthouse in Boise, 550 W. Fort St. It is scheduled to last 10 days. District Judge Edward Lodge will preside.

If convicted, the two men face maximum penalties of 30 years in prison and a \$1 million fine on each count.

Earlier this year, Rupert farmer Brad Neibaur pleaded guilty to one count of writing a bad check as part of the scheme. He was

sentenced to three years' probation and ordered to pay \$100,500 restitution to the Bank of Commerce of Idaho Falls. The conviction will be erased from his record if he completes his sentence successfully.

Neibaur has cooperated with investigators and is expected to testify at the Hansen-Scoresby trial.

The federal indictment alleges that Hansen and Scoresby initiated the check-kiting scheme as part of a larger "Ponzi scheme," in which they solicited "loans" from dozens of people in

order to pay off previous loans, which Hansen had solicited at often-exorbitant interest rates.

As part of that scheme, the indictment alleges, Hansen and Scoresby exchanged approximately 201 checks with Neibaur between March and October of 1990. The value of the checks totalled more than \$21 million.

During the same period, the two men allegedly also exchanged approximately 109 checks with Raymond Burns of Idaho Falls. The value of those

Word on rhizomania: Prepare for long haul

RUPERT — The rhizomania crisis some local sugar beet growers are experiencing this year will remain a problem for many years to come, the Minidoka County extension agent says.

Ivan Hopkins made his comments Thursday at the Rupert Elks Club during the Rupert Area Chamber of Commerce's monthly luncheon. The report was a grim reminder to area business leaders of the local rhizomania situation, for which he apologized for not having more optimistic news.

"There's not many things we can say positive to you about rhizomania," Hopkins said.

Rhizomania, an isolated disease spread by a fungus and transmitted by soil contact, was first reported in Idaho June 17, when a southern Minidoka County farmer discovered symptoms of the disease in his sugar beet crop.

Since then, Hopkins said, agronomists have tested 333 fields totaling some 15,000 acres throughout the state, searching for signs of the disease in every known sugar beet field.

In Minidoka and Cassia counties, he said, it has infected 26 fields totaling between 600 and 700 acres.

Also known as "crazy root" and

"root madness," rhizomania causes the roots of a sugar beet to proliferate and twist, while causing the leaves to yellow and shrivel. There is no cure for sugar beets infected with rhizomania.

The disease does not affect other vegetation and does not appear in products processed from beets, he said.

Fungus spores that carry rhizomania can survive in soil for at least 10 years, so farmers whose sugar beet fields are infected cannot use that acreage to grow sugar beets for at least a decade.

Hopkins said the spores can be transmitted from field to field through the soil, such as by using farm machinery in a contaminated field then using the equipment on uncontaminated acreage.

Borrowed equipment must be cleaned by high-pressure water and sterilized before leaving an infected farm, he said, under the Idaho Department of Agriculture's 1987 Rhizomania Isolation Order.

The spores can even be transported by wearing a pair of work boots in one field and walking into another, he said, or by the movement of livestock.

The only solution right now, he said, is taking steps to isolate the disease, then plant other crops in rhizomania-infected fields.

Arson suspected in California fire

ROUND MOUNTAIN, Calif. (AP) — Crews worked Thursday to dig the last three miles of containment lines around a 64,000-acre wildfire that authorities suspect was caused by arson.

The state's largest wildfire this season, which has destroyed 307 homes in Northern California towns along Highway 299 northeast of Redding, was 75 percent contained Thursday, said California Department of Forestry spokeswoman Kay McQuade.

Arson emerged as the probable

cause as investigators eliminated such other factors as lightning, downed power lines and campfires. Shasta-Trinity Ranger Unit Chief Ray Stewart speculated that a motorist may have set the fire, then driven away.

In Southern California, firefighters hoped to encircle a 3,800-acre wildfire in the southern San Joaquin Valley by Saturday night. No structures were burned or threatened in the remote area at the base of Tejon Pass, about 10 miles from the community of Arvin.

Cassia County officers want people to destroy their opium

BURLEY — Area gardeners might be growing a narcotic in their gardens without even realizing it.

Area law enforcement officers have been notified by the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency that "innocent" homeowners in the Pacific Northwest have been discovered growing the poppies.

Recently, Cassia County Sheriff's Department detectives drove through a neighborhood to see if they could locate any of the flowers.

"It didn't take long," said Lt. Alan Smith of the department. Detectives now have a garbage sack full of uprooted plants in their office from flowers gleaned from two area gardens.

Law enforcement officials are asking residents to dispose of the illegal plants. So far, Smith said residents of the two households were cooperative in allowing law officers to take the plants.

But the problem of them growing won't end there. Because of their re-seeding capabilities, the plants may continue to reappear every summer for several years.

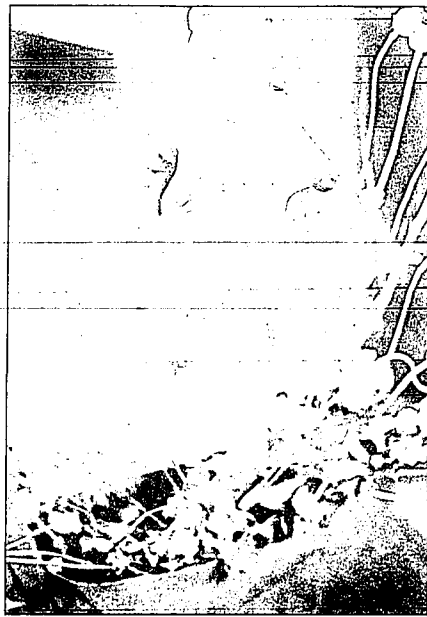
The poppies in question are not the typical poppy with orange flowers, said Detective Tim Little, but come in pink, red, purple, white or a combination of the colors.

The pods are pumpkin-shaped, said Smith, and are larger than the common poppy. Several pods may branch from a single stem.

The flowers can be distinguished by their shape and by their aqua or blue-gray leaves, according to the DEA. They can grow 3- to 4-foot high.

Smith said it was once thought that opium poppies couldn't be grown in the Northwestern states, but that belief has obviously turned out to be a myth.

While Smith said he's not aware of people in this area who are processing the poppies to manufacture drugs, he said there have been reports in some states of people

collecting their neighbor's poppies for that purpose.

If Cassia County residents have a question as to whether flowers growing in their yards are opium poppies, Smith said they could call the sheriff's department and a deputy could stop by to examine the flowers. Officers will not prosecute people if plants are found. "They're a beautiful flower," Smith said. "But people aren't supposed to grow them."

Water races set this weekend

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The memory of the Los Angeles riots will haunt any juror anywhere in the United States afraid to acquit the four policemen charged in the beating of Rodney King, one of the officer's lawyers suggested Thursday.

"The officers were indicted earlier this month on federal charges of violating King's civil rights. U.S. District Judge John C. Davies set their trial for Feb. 2 to give lawyers time to file extensive pretrial motions."

Davies scheduled a pre-trial hearing for Nov. 12.

He agreed to preside over the case even though he had been assigned to handle King's lawsuit for damages to the city of Los Angeles. He said he saw no conflict since the lawsuit is on hold.

Harland Braun, who recently stepped in as Officer Theodore Briseno's lawyer, said he will argue for dismissal of the case.

Braun said the publicity surrounding the officers' state trial in Simi Valley and the riot in Los Angeles after their acquittal tainted prospective jurors throughout the United States.

"We feel the extraordinary publicity in this case means that any juror anywhere in the country would hesitate to vote not guilty," Braun told the judge.

"Am I where in the country?" the judge asked in astonishment. "Do you have the evidence that there are not 12 people anywhere?"

Braun responded that if there were 12 unbiased jurors, they would be impossible to find. He said he would present surveys and demographic studies to support his unprecedented motion to dismiss.

"I assume there will be evidence," said the judge. "I won't pay much attention to attorney speculation."

Officers Briseno, Laurence Powell and

Timothy Wind and Sgt. Stacey Koon, who are white, are charged with violating the rights of King, a black motorist stopped in a Los Angeles suburb March 3, 1991, after a high-speed chase.

A nearby resident videotaped King being kicked and clubbed dozens of times. The videotape, broadcast worldwide, heightened racial tension in Los Angeles and fueled outrage against police brutality nationwide.

Lawyers for Koon, Wind and Powell said they would file motions to sever each officer's case from their co-defendants.

Wind's lawyer, Paul DePasquale, said he would argue that the officers are being held in double jeopardy by being tried in federal court after resolution of the state charges.

The state jury acquitted every other except Powell on every count. It deadlocked on one count against him; a state judge said that charge would be dismissed.

District attorney makes offer on selection of judge

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The district attorney's objection removed a black judge from the trial of three men accused of the riot beating of a white trucker offered Thursday to let another black judge hear the case.

District Attorney Ira Reiner, under fire from a defense attorney who called the ouster of Superior Court Judge Roosevelt Dom racist, asked the defense to agree to give the case to Superior Court Judge Donald Pitts.

"We're trying to put the focus back on the criminal case and not on side issues that are destructive to the community," said Reiner spokeswoman Sandi Gibbons.

The judge who is eventually chosen will hear the case of Damian Williams, Antoine Miller and Henry Watson, three black men accused of beating Reginald Denny on April 29 at the flashpoint of the Los Angeles riots.

The riots started after four white policemen were cleared of most charges in the March 3, 1991, beating of black motorist Rodney King.

Miller's attorney, James Gillen, who accused Reiner of racism, said he wouldn't respond to the proposal

until he read Reiner's letter.

"I think Reiner has come under tremendous political pressure and the pressure was created by his own stupidity," Gillen said.

Williams' attorney, Ed M.O. Paul, immediately accepted the offer. Watson's attorney was in court and unavailable for comment.

It will ultimately be up to the courts to rule on the proposal, said John Lynch, director of the district attorney's central operations. But he added, "it's easier if all the parties agree."

Ms. Gibbons said the flap was the result of a misunderstanding.

Reiner's office was told weeks ago that supervising Superior Court Judge Cecil Mills would submit Dom's name as the trial judge, she said. Mills' second choice was Superior Court Judge George Trammell, and Pitts was third, Gibbons said.

Each side in a criminal case is entitled to only one peremptory challenge by which they may remove a judge without stating a cause.

Madison County files charges against Fish and Game officers

REXBURG (AP) — Three years ago, Idaho Department of Fish and Game officers charged rancher Jud Neeley and some of his neighbors with numerous game violations. Those charges were eventually dropped at now Madison County authorities have filed criminal charges against three Fish and Game conservation officers and a biologist. They are accused of overstepping their authority during a 1989 search at the ranch of Neeley's mother.

"I don't believe the state of Idaho should use storm troopers running around like they do in Nazi Germany and not be held accountable for it," Neeley said.

"The contention is that it appears that they exceeded the scope of the search warrant," Madison County Sheriff Lynell Curry said. Jerry Hugo, Jeff Copeland, Joe Curry and Russ Kozick have each been charged with felony malicious injury to property and grand larceny. The four will make their initial court appearances Sept. 3.

Copeland is a wildlife research biologist based in Moscow, while Curry, Hugo and Kozick are conservation officers based in Ashton, Dubois and North Fork, respectively.

W. Dallas Burkhalter, the deputy attorney general defending them, declined comment,

but said they have not been formally charged yet and the accusations are vague. Koon said the officers searched the Neeley ranch in November 1989 because of rumors of poaching.

Neeley on Wednesday said he was in REXBURG at the time the officers arrived. His wife called and told him they had a search warrant.

"I said they should go ahead and search," Neeley said. "There's nothing illegal there."

As Neeley came back, he ran into officers taking away three elk and two tubs of frozen meat.

None of the meat was taken illegally, and

some of it was actually deer, beef and pork, Neeley said. The frozen meat thawed and was riddled, he said.

The officers overstepped their authority by going into his cooler, his home and his mother's home, he contended. The search warrant only allowed them to look for one elk, he said. They took three elk out of the cooler and the frozen meat out of the homes, he said.

Neeley also questions whether the warrant was legal because it was issued in Teton County, although Koon said it was proper.

Neeley and several others were charged with game violations but they were dropped.

Roon said. The group of six defendants paid thousands of dollars in legal fees to fight the 18 charges and suffered public scrutiny, Neeley said.

Neeley said he filed a civil lawsuit against the officers and the state in federal court, but the suit was dismissed.

Koon said it has taken a long time to file because authorities were watching to see how the civil suit turned out. If the officers overstepped their authority, they will be facing criminal penalties personally, Koon said.

"The law only protects an officer of the law when he is acting in the scope of his authority," he said.

Conservationists sue Forest Service

BOISE — A handful of conservation groups has filed a notice of intent to sue over the Forest Service's approval to log a large tract of prime wildlife habitat southeast of Grangeville.

While stopping short of the "confrontational tactics" of the Earth First activists fighting cutting in the Cove-Mallard area, the consortium has filed a notice of intent to sue over the Endangered Species, Clean Water and National Environmental Policy acts.

"Our immediate concern is the destruction of chinook, salmon habitat by logging road construction along Big Mallard Creek, and destruction of prime elk and bighorn sheep habitat in the Jersey Jack area, also called Cove-Mallard," said Ron Mitchell, Idaho Sportsmen's Coalition executive director.

Joining the sportsmen are the Alliance For The Wild Rockies, Ecology Center, Idaho's Golden Eagle Audubon chapter, Forest Conservation Council, Foundation for North American Wild Sheep and the Oregon-Natural Resources Council.

ISU considers facelift for Holt Arena

POCATELLO — Non-university activities may be banned at Idaho State's Holt Arena unless the school gets help renovating the building.

ISU President Richard Bowen said upgrading the arena "to its former glory" is one of three major campus improvements that may be considered this year, at a total of \$9 million.

Bowen said he will meet a credit committee to get a rating for the issuance of renovation bonds. Idaho State needs permission from the state board of education to sell the bonds.

A committee of ISU officials and Greater Pocatello Chamber of Commerce members has been looking into ways of defraying renovation costs. The original bonds used to build Holt Arena — all bought with student funds — will be paid off next year. It has fallen into disrepair in recent years.

Rightly teen-ager seeks to withdraw plea

IDAHO FALLS — Rightly teen-ager Michael Book will attempt to withdraw his guilty plea in the 1991 slaying of Danny Disney of Ammon, his public defender says.

In court arguments against the Idaho Falls Post Register's request to unseal court files, and lift a gag order on the case, Steven Thompson on Thursday said he plans to file a request to withdraw the plea.

"There may be a trial in this matter," Thompson said.

Seventh District Judge Marvin Smith turned down the newspaper's requests, keeping the gag order in place and some documents sealed. Thompson declined to say why Book will withdraw his plea. But Book faces a more serious charge than Disney, 34, who pleaded guilty to second-degree murder in July.

Deputy Bonneville County Prosecutor Gil Gardner said Book will not withdraw his plea without opposition.

3 adults, 5 juveniles face theft charges

IDAHO FALLS — Three adults and five juveniles have been arrested on charges stemming from more than 200 vehicle burglaries in Bonneville County authorities say.

More arrests are expected in thefts from unlocked vehicles ranging from pocket change to stereos and guns, Idaho Falls Police Sgt. Byron Stommel said Thursday.

The break-ins occurred over the past six weeks, Stommel said. Police so far have recovered about \$1,000 worth of items.

The adults arrested are Serafin Ramirez, 38, of Idaho Falls; James Caviness, 19, Idaho Falls; and Eric McKelley, 18, Shelley. They face felony charges of first-degree burglary, Stommel said.

Firefighters near containing Foothills Fire

Fire crews drew closer on Thursday to closing the containment line around the 127-mile perimeter of the 257,600-acre Foothills Fire in south-western Idaho.

As tankers dropping chemical retardant and helicopters dumping water from large buckets cooled hot spots for scores of ground crews clearing the final miles of fire line.

And the ground gained over the past few days allowed strategists to finally begin releasing manpower that had approached 3,000.

"We're starting to scale down our operation," spokesman Jack DeGolia said. "Because the fire's not advancing, the job now is patrol to keep the fire within established lines."

Four 20-man crews were demobilized on Thursday and another 10 were expected to be released on Friday, he said.

But with the mercury again on the rise, the government imposed more restrictions on activity on state and federal land throughout southern Idaho. In addition to the ban on open fires and smoking outside developed campgrounds, off-road vehicle travel and the use of chainsaws was prohibited. They will remain in effect until the weather changes.

And the fire 30 miles east of Boise also forced Boise National Forest managers to consider emergency sales of a huge supply of scorching timber in addition to trees killed earlier by insects. The surge of timber on the market would be an immediate boon to the logging industry, but it could also mean reduced harvests in the future.

Hand crews had less than 20 miles of fire line left to go, and there were indications the Sept. 1 containment target could be moved forward because of the progress during this week's cool snap that sent overnight temperatures plunging to the freezing mark and kept daytime highs below 70.

The battle has already cost \$55 million and could reach at least \$100 million, spokeswoman Jo Bamer said. Losses to the flames, including a half-dozen structures, livestock and wild game, were estimated in the millions of dollars.

Crews were also being demobilized elsewhere in Idaho as more of the fires that once numbered over 100 were checked.

U of I president says research role must be clarified

MOSCOW (AP) — Teaching is the first priority for University of Idaho's faculty members, but the role of research at the university must be clarified, President Elisabeth Zinser says.

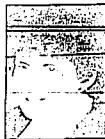
She also told faculty members Wednesday at their annual fall meeting that she is interested in expanding the McGeewey university's ties with Lewis Clark State College and any other institution to serve the needs of Idahoans.

Zinser, who has been under fire from some faculty members for promoting the University of Idaho's research mission at the expense of its teaching role, said it is her obligation to protect the faculty's position in the state's higher education system.

"I know this, that Elisabeth Zinser believes that teaching is your number one responsibility," she said. "But she warned that state Board of Education members will give the university's mission as the preeminent research institution to another school if the university doesn't meet its responsibilities."

"If they do, they give away a major part of our institution and you and I and our students would suffer and so would Moscow and Lewiston in particular," Zinser said.

Meeting its instructional responsibilities need not

be at odds with the school's research and extension obligations, she said.

"Research and extension give special qualities to teaching and undergraduate education here that make this university preeminent in teaching and research," Zinser said. "It behooves us to clarify for ourselves and others the role of research in this institution."

She invited faculty members to provide their views in writing to develop "a fresh statement on the role of research at the university" without backtracking on the major progress in research in the past decade.

Zinser also said state Board of Education President Karl Shurtliff is raising reasonable questions about better serving future students.

He has suggested consideration of merging administrative functions of Lewis Clark and the University of Idaho, forming a statewide School of Education and turning Eastern Idaho Technical College in Idaho Falls into a community college under Idaho State University's control.

Late bloomer

Sculptor goes 'Over the Top' with latest work

TWIN FALLS - Idaho sculptor Danny Edwards offers living testimony to the idea that people should follow their dreams, even if the notions seem a little crazy.

In January 1986, Edwards was making a good living and supporting his family of five with a successful Twin Falls furniture business. But he wanted to try sculpting.

"I didn't know I could do it before 1985," he says. "But I had seen Earl McAdams sculpting at Art in the Park and I said to my wife, 'I think I can do that.'"

The next year, he took the leap into a full-time art career. Today, he is a successful sculptor whose works have shown up in high places, everywhere from the White House during Ronald Reagan's administration to galleries in the art-minded mountain resort towns of Jackson, Wyo., and Vail, Colo. His works now command prices ranging from \$1,500 all the way up to \$75,000.

17-foot bronze sculptures require help from others

TWIN FALLS - Just one took at a sculpture as grand as Danny Edwards' "Over the Top" convinces you he had to have some help doing it.

And he did. Although Edwards conceives and creates the original versions of his sculptures here in Twin Falls, he relies on Eagle Bronze of Lander, Wyo., to do the casting. "They work with me every step of the foundry process," he says.

Here's how it works: Edwards starts by making a small-scale model of the finished product. "You actually have to sculpt the big one, too, but you have something to go from," he explains.

Working from the model, the

artist then builds a wire armature, which acts as a kind of supporting skeletal structure for the full-size sculpture.

Then the clay goes on, 600 to 700 pounds' worth in the case of "Over the Top," and Edwards works to sculpt the detail in its final, enlarged form.

Next, rubber molds are made for each piece of the sculpture; "Over the Top" included 70 different molds. Wax is poured into the molds, coated with a ceramic shell, then dipped in a thin slurry liquid and sand.

When the shell hardens, it is fired. The wax melts out, and hot bronze is poured in. Then, when the piece cools, the shell is broken off and the bronze remains. The various pieces are then sandblasted and welded together.

In addition to NBC's "A Different World," which has completed a two-part episode recreating the riots, plotlines dealing with the unrest and the aftermath will be featured in early season episodes of ABC's "Doogie Howser, M.D.," NBC's "Fresh Prince of Bel Air" and "L.A. Law," and CBS' "Knots Landing."

Doogie Howser will be confronted with his own social unawareness when the emergency room at the hospital where he works is suddenly filled with riot victims in the Sept. 23 season-opener.

In November, Gregory Sumner, the ruthless corporate magnate played by William Devane in "Knots Landing," will head up the corporate division of the fictional L.A. Task Force, an organization

modeled after Rebuild L.A., the group created by Mayor Tom Bradley to guide the city's revitalization in the wake of the riots.

The family in "Fresh Prince" returns to its South-Central Los Angeles neighborhood to help clean up, and find they must confront their physical and philosophical distance from their roots in

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y. (AP) — Of all the jokes made at the expense of Irish rock band U2's super-serious public image, bassist Adam Clayton likes best the one about the light bulb.

"How many members of U2 does it take to change a light bulb?" Clayton repeats with a laugh. "Three — and Bono to explain it to the world."

The quartet, which has recently embarked on its outside "Zoo TV" tour, is still very serious about its music. But they say the image of four frowning men taking on the world's problems had become so distorted that it needed some redressing.

U2 wants to have some fun. The band's sense of humor is spread throughout a live show that's both a high-tech supermarket and a send-up of Las Vegas' worst excesses. The fun begins when U2 takes the stage under a huge video image of President Bush edited to intone, "We still rock you."

Lead singer Bono, who wears his hair dyed jet black and alternates suits made of black patent leather and silver lame, mugs shamelessly for cameras transmitting his image on four large screens. He twirls in a circle, pointing a hand-held camera at his face and crotch.

"People were kind of stunned the first few shows that we did indoors," Clayton said of the tour's first leg this winter. "It took them a while to realize, 'Oh, yes, it's a different thing. It's not the white flag coming out.'"

For U2, it's been a long trip from Dublin in the late 1970s, when the four teen-agers performed in an abandoned parking lot for any friends who happened to stop by.

The "Zoo TV" tour requires a 200-person crew to build a stage that reaches 11 stories and has aircraft warning lights. There are 36 television monitors, a satellite dish to pick up TV broadcast signals, and four power generators with three miles of cable.

Backstage is a mobile city, with trailers set aside for everyone from band members to the belly dancer who makes a cameo appearance on "Mysterious Ways."

In a trailer, guitarist The Edge and disc jockey B.J. Fallon huddled with a tape player, searching for a George Clinton song to play

over the sound system for 30,000 waiting concertgoers.

Before the "Zoo TV" tour, U2 had set upon the delicate task of musically redefining itself.

The jokes about U2, including several with the theme of Bono as God, or vice versa, began in reaction to a decade-long career of music that often touched on the political and spiritual.

"They grew kinder after 'Rattle and Hum,' a sprawling tribute to American music that saw U2 dueling with blues master B.B. King. Critics snuffed that U2 was trying to force its place in rock history when, as Clayton explained, 'we were just having fun.'"

Rumors that U2 was about to disband ramped when Bono said from the stage at a radio concert in 1989 that, "we've got to go away and dream it up all over again."

"We did go away and we did rethink it," Clayton said. But quitting wasn't an option. "That wasn't the crucial question at that time," he said. "It was where was rock 'n' roll and what was exciting for us? Where is that place? We'd done 'Rattle and Hum,' and it didn't feel right for us, so it was time to move on."

The band re-emerged last year with "Achtung Baby." The title is a line lifted from a Mel Brooks movie; David Bowie and his band, Tin Machine, have already poked fun by naming their new album "Oh Vee Baby."

An adventurous musical exploration of the techno sounds that The Edge is fascinated by, "Achtung Baby" also contains some of U2's strongest melodies in songs about love lost and found. The band immediately held off on interviews after the album to give the music a chance to sink in.

"We knew this record was a hard record for people to get a grip on, but it was a record we wanted to make," Clayton said.

Actually, the album wasn't much of a stretch for a band with a career The Edge describes as "consistently inconsistent." From the political anthems of "War" to the expansive sounds inspired by the American southwest on "The Joshua Tree," U2 has specialized in making sharp left turns from album to album.

"We try to avoid becoming too set, too closed in by a certain style or certain way of doing things because that limits your freedom," The Edge said. "I'm quite excited about the band because I think we can literally do whatever we want. I think we've established that the songwriting terrain we work with is very broad."

The immediate future includes performing, not songwriting. The "Zoo TV" tour heads through eastern United States and Canada and the Midwest during late August and September. It then heads South as autumn progresses and is scheduled to end in November.

The show musically re-structured like the spring's indoor concerts. The earlier portion is dominated by "Achtung Baby" songs and the latter by some past hits, set apart by a brief acoustic set.

Red, white and blue "Vote Baby" posters are plastered on concert grounds during the tour, which coincides with the American election season. News headlines scrawl across a scoreboard onstage.

The multi-media barrage is meant to symbolize the struggle between music and technology. The Edge said, "We win at the end," he said.

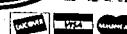

Black-and-white sets turn off TV viewers

You probably have never heard of Bruce DuMont, but he was a celebrity in his Chicago neighborhood back in 1952 when he was 8 years old. His family owned a television set.

The picture was a bit fuzzy, and all in black and white. But it was "the hottest thing" around, and DuMont recalls that people came from all over for a look-see.

DuMont is head of the Museum of Broadcast Communications in Chicago now, and literally part of television history. But the vehicle for those early days of television — the black-and-white set — has almost disappeared.

Except for miniature models, black-and-white TVs have faded from view, their sales shrinking as fast as the size of their screens. The sets rarely are sold for less than \$100, says any more, and prisons are among the few remaining customers.

Many of the nation's biggest retail chains, such as Sears, Roebuck & Co. and K mart Corp., don't sell any traditional black-and-white sets. The last time Sears sold them was in 1990, and then it was just for the Christmas season when the chain offered a 12-inch model for \$79 to drum up customer traffic.

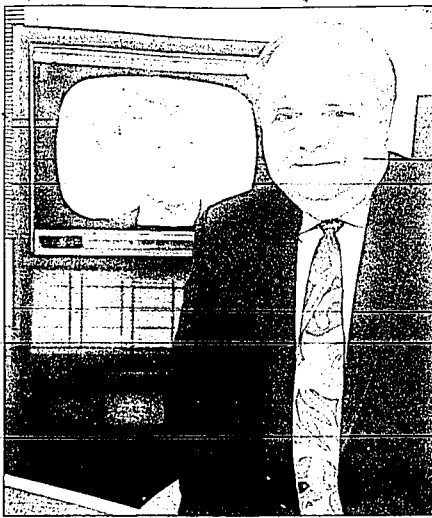
Stores that do sell black-and-white TVs usually won't sell anything bigger than the small models, with screen sizes typically ranging from a few inches to 7 inches, and the same holds true for electronic appliance chains.

"That's really a dead market," Pat Ruggieri, a marketing manager for Sony Corp., said of larger black-and-white sets.

Emerson Radio Corp. of North Bergen, N.J., still markets a 12-inch black-and-white set made in factories in the Far East, but a company executive, noting the razor-thin profits, thinks the future of the medium is anything but black and white.

"Nobody really likes the business anymore," said executive vice president Marino Andriani. "I don't think you'll see a day where you couldn't sell a black-and-white set. But will people continue to make them? That's another question."

The Electronic Industries Association estimates that nearly all of America's 94 million households have at least one color TV set, and

for programmers and advertisers, who could use graphics more creatively.

The NBC peacock was a symbol of this new world, and viewers were amazed by the hues they saw in shows such as "Bonanza" or the spectacular Rose Bowl Parade.

In sporting events, viewers suddenly could identify teams by the colors of their jerseys.

"You think of baseball in the '40s and '50s, and you think in black-and-white," said Ron Simon, curator of the Museum of Television & Radio in New York.

"Then people discovered home movies in color. You see the players in color. You see the grass in color. It's a whole different sensation of what the stadium looked like. It's almost like two different levels of experience."

RCA Corp. installed TVs in 150 homes in the New York area and began regular broadcasts through its subsidiary, NBC, in 1936. The number of sets in the country climbed from about 10,000 near the end of World War II to about 6 million by 1950.

For some who rose to stardom during TV's early days, the notion that Americans were watching black-and-white television rather than color made little difference.

Milton Berle, television's first star, says simply: "Funny is funny." "Color isn't going to enhance the performance or the script," said Berle, who entertained viewers on "The Texaco Star Theater" from 1948 to the mid-1950s.

Even if black-and-white sets go by the wayside, black-and-white programming still remains popular and, in some cases, is viewed as avant garde rather than outdated.

"Black-and-white has a certain appeal in creating beautiful imagery," said Stephanie Apt, director of broadcast production for the J. Walter Thompson Inc. advertising agency.

"Particularly in a world where everything is in color," she said, "black-and-white really stands out."

Some aficionados of TV reruns say they actually prefer to watch black-and-white programs. For them, there's a simple solution, even in a world dominated by color sets.

David Lachenbruch, editorial director of Television Digest, said: "Anybody who wants a black-and-white picture can just turn the color down," he said.

Videocassettes under \$10 claim big piece of market

Video collectors have been reaping the fruits of downward pressure on cassette prices for several years. Hit movies of the first magnitude, such as "E.T.," "The Exorcist" and "The Godfather," came to market at \$19.95 and sell for even less after you factor in rebates and store discounts.

The question these days is: How low can prices go? Increasingly, the answer seems to be under \$10. The most dramatic example is a large assortment of video material already available at \$9.95 and less. In fact, the biggest distributor of video to the discount chains, Handman Co., which supplies the likes of K mart and many other stores, reports that 42 percent of its video revenues are derived from cassettes selling for under \$10.

Many of those cassettes, however, are short-form children's programming or other nontheatrical fare. If you're looking for a feature film, you've had to resort to the "previously viewed" bin.

But this year that situation is changing in a big way. Just last month, three big video marketers, Paramount, Columbia TriStar and New Line, announced a handful of new titles and rereleases for sale at \$9.95.

Paramount has even gone so far as to create a new label to identify its budget product. Called Gateway Video, the group consists of 14 feature films from the '50s, '60s and '70s. Many were produced overseas and all are new to video. Titles to be released Sept. 9 include "War of the Gargantuas," "The Ballon Job" and "Denver & Frosty's Granddaddy."

On Aug. 5, Columbia TriStar released a clutch of horror films, ranging from \$9.95 to \$19.95. Most of them are rereleases, but among the eight priced at \$9.95 are two that are new to video: "Cat Girl" and "Voodoo Woman." The other six are "Fear No Evil," "I Was a Teenage Werewolf," "I Conquered the World," "The Lanton" and "Road Games" and "Apel."

On the same date Columbia released four hit-road movies at \$9.95 that are also new to video: "Dragstrip Girl," "Motorcycle Gang," "Road Racers" and "Daddy-O."

Columbia followed these with four more budget releases on Aug. 19: "Teenage Caveman," "Girls in Prison," "Operation Dames" and "Sabmarine Sealhawk."

Granted, none of these Paramount and Columbia exploitation titles were Oscar contenders. If you were to see them on the rental shelf, you might not give them a second look in your quest for "The Band That Rocks the Cradle" or "The Prince of Tides." But the studios seem to be banking on slapper impulse to generate a few more dollars out of old properties placed in discount stores.

Yet not every budget tape is from the bottom of the barrel.

For its first \$9.95 feature, New Line is releasing on Sept. 23 a group of comedies with a measure of star appeal: George Segal and Denzel Washington in "Carbon Copy," Jackie Gleason in the Woody Allen-scripted "Don't Drink the Water," Walter Matthau in "Rabbit Test" and Billy Crystal in "Rabbit Test."

Of all the under-\$10 titles mentioned above, only Paramount's will be duplicated in the economical extended-play mode (EP), which uses two-thirds less tape than standard play (SP), and produces a buzzier picture. Paramount will thus become the first major studio to use the so-called Master Sharp process developed by Rank Video, an improved form of EP duplication that carries a quality guarantee.

Repricing movies to \$9.95 and issuing them as EP cassettes after their rental life has been fairly exhausted is already a well-established tradition. Republic Pictures Home Video, LIVE Home Video and Starmaker Entertainment do so on a regular basis. But for Hollywood heavyweights to release video premieres at such a low initial price brings the price-cutting game to a new playing field.

Memorex introduces new VCR cleaning system that uses non-abrasive brushes

Although there is widepread agreement that VCRs require occasional cleaning, the proper way to do it still may be a dispute.

The most effective method is the most inconvenient and expensive: Hire your machine to a repair shop or have a technician fit the lid for a mechanical cleaning. The prospect of paying \$50 or more in labor costs and being the use of the VCR for a day or two are good reasons that this practice is not more popular.

VCR cleaners for home use, usually involving a cleaning tape contained in a cassette shell, are easier on your budget but less dependable. Most models don't reach all the areas that require cleaning; their action is limited to the tape path.

Beyond that, repair shops routinely complain that consumers tend to overuse such gadgets and inadvertently damage sensitive VCR components by running the cleaner over and over. No wonder. If you were to buy every cassette-style cleaner on the market and compare instructions about how often to use the product, you'd only become confused.

But now there's yet another alternative: a cassette-style cleaner

that does not use a tape to do its business. This month, Memorex is introducing the Automatic Brush Video Cleaning System, priced at \$17.99. Instead of the abrasive action of a cleaning tape or fabric, it relies on brushes that reach into the VCR to wipe away dust, debris and other dirt. It's simple to use. The cleaning solution is contained in a pen that resembles a felt-tip marker. By opening the flap on the cassette, you gain access to three soft brush heads. Moisten them with the pen. Insert the cassette in your VCR and press play.

One brush emerges from the cassette and moves against the video drum, wiping it as the drum rotates. The two other brushes form a V and wipe the pinch roller, a key point in the tape path. After one minute of cleaning, eject the cassette.

Abrasion through overuse does not seem to be possible. Not only are the brushes quite soft, but the cassette also has a dial that times the cleaning cycle, not unlike the timer on a mop-and-waxer.

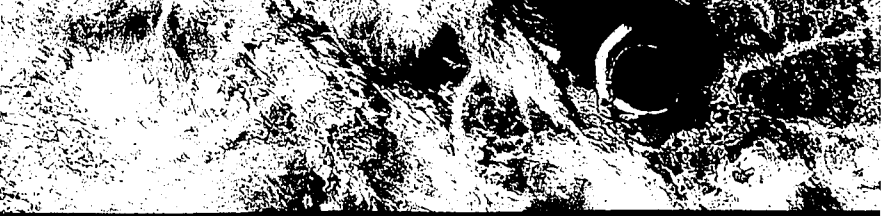
Memorex recommends using it after every rental movie. A rental tape is likely to pick up dirt from a customer's VCR through electrostatic action. When you play back that same tape, the particles may be deposited in your machine.

Sitcom veteran throws jabs at TV series

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Television, which has fed John Ritter merrily over the past 15 years, gets severely bitten in Ritter's new movie, which even takes a few nips out of his long-running series, "Three's Company."

"Stay Tuned" fantasizes what could happen if a suburban couple (Ritter and fellow sitcom vet Pam Dawber) were sucked into a giant television screen and find themselves participants in diabolical versions of series and movies.

Among the titles: "Northern Overexposure," "Silencer of the Lamps," "Beverly Hills 90210," "Driving Over Miss Daisy," "Diane's Underworld," "Meet the Mansons," "I Love Lucifer," "Biting the hand? It's a title nip," Ritter said in an interview. "I think television deserves a little bite now and then, just as actors do, whether they want it or not. We get bitten by the hands that used to clap for us."

Ritter is one of the few actors who has managed to veer from television to features and back again. His movies include "They All Laughed," "Problem Child," "Skin Deep" and "Naked Gun."

But the mainstay of his career has been comedy. "The Minsky Company," "Three's a Crowd," "Hooperman" and an upcoming CBS show, "Hearts Afire."

"We did eight years of 'Three's Company,' then I did one year of 'Three's a Crowd,'" Ritter commented. "That's nine years — longer than high school and college. Boy, did I get an education."

"It was real interesting working with guest stars. Some comedians, some had only done soaps, some had only done theater, some did movies and looked down their noses at us. A lot of people from New York said, 'I usually don't come to California.'"

"Yet when the curtain went up, no matter how long you've studied or haven't studied at all, you had to answer to the audience. We didn't do retakes. If there was a microphone boom in the shot, so be it. Basically we did two shows a week, and we were out on the street by 9:30 on Saturday night."

Johnathan Southworth Ritter was born into the business 43 years ago. His father was Tex Ritter.

who starred with his horse White Flash in westerns and is best known for singing the ballad of "High Noon."

He grew up in the San Fernando Valley and studied psychology at the University of Southern California until he switched to theater arts.

Ritter's first steady job was his role as the minister in "The Waltons."

He found fellow actor Richard Thomas "very generous in sharing with me the traps and giving me advice about dealing with a series, pace yourself, always look for other jobs, do different kinds of things, aim not at being a huge, big star, but to be a long star, from being a leading man to character actor."

He also remembered advice from his father. "His big thing was 'Be humble, son. He was very proud when he saw me on 'The Waltons,'" Tex Ritter died in 1974.

Ritter remembered trying out for Peter Bogdanovich's "The Last Picture Show," about small-town Texas. Timothy Bottoms got that role, but Ritter later worked for Bogdanovich in "Nickelodeon," "They All Laughed" and "Shores Off."

"Three's Company," about a bachelor sharing an apartment with two attractive women, Suzanne Somers and Joyce DeWitt, was considered racy in its time (1977-1983).

John won a Emmy for his role, and he could have fallen into the typecasting trap. He recalled: "I would get scripts about a young swinging bachelor on the make, and I said, 'No, I've done that.' Or they'd say, 'You're living alone and... What I was looking for in my time off was something a little bit different, a little serious, or funny in a different way.'"

Ritter has shown his serious side in plays like "The Glass Menagerie" and "Desire Under the Elms" and the made-for-TV movies "Unnatural Causes" and "Stephen King's 'It.'" But he keeps coming back to comedy.

"I was the class clown, but I was also student body president in high school," he said. "I had my serious side — I idolized Bobby Kennedy; he was my role model. But so was Jerry Lewis."

Ritter then launched into an imitation of Lewis with a Kennedy accent — which would indicate that the class clown won out.

'Single White Female' means double trouble

In "Single White Female," the psychological atmosphere that director Barbet Schroeder creates is so densely threatening that the air feels thick around you.

Though Schroeder consciously evokes Hitchcock's "Vertigo" and Polanski's "Rosemary's Baby," the movie conjures up less noble precursors as well, in particular "The Hand That Rocks the Cradle," "Basic Instinct" and other recent psycho femme thrillers.

What's remarkable, though, is how engrossing the marriage of these high- and low-brow elements turns out to be. The tension between its content and its trashy form is precisely the key to its vitality. If it were any less cheap, it wouldn't have the same edgy, gut-twisting jolt.

Schroeder's true subject here is dependency, and to explore it he puts his microscope to the relationship between two vastly different young New York women Allison (Bridget Fonda) and Hedy (Jennifer Jason Leigh), who become roommates in Allison's rent-controlled Upper West Side apartment. (There's one catch: because of the rent, they are not to remain officially anonymous.) Allison is a drop-dead set of curves topped with a helmet of flame-red Louise Brooks hair whose fiancé is history for sleeping with his ex-wife.

Immediately, the contrasts between the roommates is blinding. Hedy is as painfully self-conscious as Allison is outgoing; as plain as Allison is ravishing; and as sullen as Allison is bright.

But whereas Allison is romantic and naive, Hedy is a realist with a keen sense of humor. Allison, who has never lived alone, isn't even aware how shaky her sense of self is, or how much she needs others to reinforce it.

Hedy, who is the guilty surviving member of a pair of identical twins, is more than ready to act as Allison's reflecting pool. All her life - or at least since the age of 9, when her twin was killed in an accident - Hedy has been searching for her missing "other half," and before long, the women begin to function as two smoothly meshed parts of a single machine, protecting each other, confessing and dreaming out loud to each other and sharing each other's clothes, perfume and tastes in movies.

Schroeder shoots these sisterly bonding scenes as if terrifically strange, yet so fatiguing blissfully, magically in love, transforming them instantly into the most appealing and effortlessly compatible romantic movie couple of the year. But the information that we have about Hedy and that

Allison doesn't have gives this lyrical (and uncommensurate) courtship a ripping edge, because we can see Hedy slowly but steadily transforming herself into Allison's double.

Allison's relationship with Hedy is precious for obvious reasons: By becoming her mirror, Hedy has answered Allison's most fervent, most terrifying secret prayer.

Naturally, when Hedy's intentions become obvious - at the precise moment when Hedy marches down the stairs at the beauty parlor with her hair styled and colored identically to her roommate's - Allison is enraged though for reasons she can't quite articulate. And by the time she figures out that something unhealthy is going on, it's too late.

Fonda and Leigh are brilliantly subtle in the way they modulate the flowing emotional currents between their characters. As the frumpy, mush-mouthed Hedy, Leigh is maddening when she looks longingly and scrupulously over Allison's features, studying every pore, the fragile angle of her neck, her insouciant, hip-locked way of standing, like an actress working her way into character.

Yet, while Leigh has the part with the flashier effects, Fonda shows how Allie blossoms under Hedy's tireless attentions. If you look at the film as a kind of psychological vampire movie, with Allie as the parasite's victim, you can see how enthralled the victim is by its enemy, how ready to be taken.

You can ponder "Single White Female" from a great many angles - as a lesbian power struggle or a symbolic depiction of the soul-stealing that goes on in every

relationship - but of all the possible alternatives, Schroeder and screenwriter Don Roos have chosen the simplest and the least alluring. In the end, the movie deteriorates into a predictable exercise in melodramatic slasher tactics.

Schroeder's refusal to choose moral sides gives the psychological

confrontation between the women the kind of weird, mutually accepted form of diseased co-dependency that Claus and Sunny von Bülow shared in his previous film, "Reversal of Fortune." In "Single White Female," Schroeder leaves the subtext unresolved, but manages to strike a very raw nerve.

Soap opera actor leaves 'Days' to seek film, prime time roles

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Charles Shaughnessy is preparing to leave the NBC soap opera "Days of Our Lives," with his character as mysterious and fading as ever and probably headed for new ways of saving us from world domination.

The English-born actor wraps up eight years as Shane Donovan, consistently one of the most popular heroes of the daytime serials, at the end of September.

"I've always had out in my contract so that I could do other things," Shaughnessy said. "I did a pilot for CBS that generated a bit of noise. I had a role in the miniseries 'Till We Meet Again.' I was Delta Burke's husband in the year and 'Days.' I was the host of 'An Evening at the Improv' on the Arts & Entertainment channel.

"It's very difficult to do these things when you're on a show. So, after eight years, I feel if I don't do something now I never will. I feel it's time to give Shane Donovan a rest. He's done everything."

The character has had a busy life, indeed.

He's had several star-crossed love affairs, usually with women who turned out to have secret pasts as prostitutes. His character has been in a wheelchair because he saved the life of another person in a nightclub explosion. He's been a butler, a bad guy, a spy and an agent for the International Security Agency. (Or the International Stupid Agency, as it's known among the actors.)

Soap operas today have plots that seem to have been lifted from 1930s movie serials, James Bond thrillers, the comic books and Indiana Jones movies. They're filled with mysterious figures, magic crystals, death rays and plots to take over the world.

The public apparently loves it.

"I wish we could do more interesting stories," Shaughnessy said. "Each soap has its own fans, and they display it well. They want to see their favorite characters doing the same stories. You have the supercouples, the rebels with hearts of gold, the dark, brooding young man who just needs the love of a good woman, the doctor and lawyer heroes, spies and power-crazed tycoons."

Shaughnessy is hoping to emulate the success of such former soap stars as Tom Selleck, Kathleen Turner, Meg Ryan, Alec Baldwin and, most recently, A. Martinez, who has left "Santa Barbara" for "A. Love."

When Shaughnessy joined the show in October 1984, it was merely for a three-day appearance as a butler who was spying on his employer. But after a few days, the producers decided they liked him and they kept him on the show.

"Gradually, I turned into a good guy," he said. "I had been a bad guy pretending to be good. I became a good guy pretending to be bad."

It would take volumes to explain everything Shane Donovan has been through, Shaughnessy said, even the writers forget past events and are reminded of goofs by the show's fans.

Shaughnessy graduated from England's Eton College and entered

Cambridge University to read law when he became interested in acting and enrolled in acting school in London.

It was there he met Susan Falender, a young student from California. They fell in love and were married but, after school, she came back to this country and he went into repertory theater.

"Susan had become a part of me," he said. "I just couldn't let her go. So I said 'why not?' and came to Los Angeles. I was doing a play at the Alhambra Theater with Alan Bates when I got the three-day job on 'Days of Our Lives.' That turned into eight years."

His wife has appeared on "Star Trek: The Next Generation" and the soap "The Young and the Restless." She also writes.

The pilot Shaughnessy did for CBS was "McBride and Groom," which co-stars Deborah Farentino, a kind of "Moonlighting" romantic detective show.

"I have to confess I've never taken the Soap Opera Digest Awards seriously," he said. "But I was on the show because I was nominated. The woman who is the head of casting at Universal Television saw a clip of me on the show and thought I had what she was looking for."

"McBride and Groom." That's how I got the role. I guess I'll have to take them more seriously now."

How will Murphy Brown answer Quayle?

HOLLYWOOD — It's the election-year equivalent of "Who Shot J.R.?" How will the fictional Murphy Brown respond to the real-life Dan Quayle's comments about her unwed motherhood in the season premiere of "Murphy Brown"?

Ever since the vice president took aim against Murphy's single motherhood and generated front-page headlines in what appears to be a widening Republican campaign strategy of attacking Hollywood's "family values," the producers and actors on the CBS sitcom have been besieged with requests for information about the season's first installment, an hour-long episode scheduled for Sept. 21.

But according to executive producers Steven Peterman and Gary Donizig, not even Candice Bergen, who plays Murphy Brown, or Diane English, the creator of the hit series, know exactly how Murphy will respond to Quayle.

"We decided that we had to address Quayle's comments because this show has always used references to real-life people in Washington, D.C., and the vice president is part of the world that Murphy functions in," Peterman said in an interview. "But nobody, including Diane, knows exactly how the premiere episode turns out. Candice knows a lot about what happens, but there

are some things that she has asked us not to tell her about so that the episode will be a surprise."

To keep the episode as secret as possible, the producers quietly filmed the main portions of the script two weeks ago on the Warner Bros. lot in Burbank, Calif. They shot several different versions of a few of the scenes. And there still are some parts of the show that have not yet been filmed — or even put into script form.

"There are a couple of things that still are in our heads," said Peterman, who co-wrote the premiere episode with Donizig after working on the story line with "Murphy Brown" consulting producer Kirby Shams.

"We're planning to have ourselves hypnotized so that we reveal the information in our heads only after being given a code word," he added jokingly.

The controversy over Murphy Brown and Dan Quayle has been an inherited whirlwind for Peterman and Donizig, who started out as story editors on the show several years ago and became supervising producers last season, then took over as executive producers for this season when English left to create and produce a new CBS series, "Love and War."

The new producers didn't expect so much controversy in the show's fifth season. "We thought by now that everybody would be watching 'Seinfeld,'" joked Peterman, who has written 20 of

the 100 episodes of "Murphy Brown" with Donizig.

Donizig and Peterman said they felt that the producers and writers on "Murphy Brown" had been responsible and careful in their handling of Murphy's pregnancy. And they noted that Quayle said at the time he first criticized the show that he had not seen the highly rated series.

"We take responsibility for the fact that Murphy does become pregnant after having sex with her ex-husband," Donizig said. "But he has come back into her life asking her to marry him, she is not a promiscuous woman, and (in an age of AIDS) they had had blood tests beforehand. She does have a moment of passion, but, as she said, most of her friends her age are (not getting pregnant) but going to fertility clinics."

Although they would not divulge the plot of the opening episode, Peterman and Donizig indicated that it would follow the "Murphy Brown" style of interweaving the fictional characters with real-life figures in Washington. But the response to Quayle will be confined to the first episode, they said.

"We are not running for political office, and this is not a show about Murphy Brown 'getting even' with Dan Quayle," Donizig said. "His name will certainly come up (in other episodes), but we don't intend to talk about the specific comments beyond the first episode. And we'll be talking about the

HOUSTON — St. Louis never got a chance to work on Brian Williams' confidence Thursday night.

After suffering some tense moments in a three-time losing streak earlier this season, Williams was ruck-steady with a five-hitter over eight innings, leading the Astros to a 5-1 victory.

"My confidence was down after that three-game losing streak but now I'm not going to let things bother me," Williams said. "Every time they tried to get something started, I came up with a good pitch."

The Cardinals got two runners on base in the second and sixth innings but Williams (6-1) kept control of the game each time. He wanted to finish the game and get his first major league complete game.

"But I didn't realize my pitch count was up (120) so that's fine," said Williams, who won for the third time in four decisions.

Joe Boever pitched the ninth inning.

"I like his poise and consistency around the plate," Astros manager Art Howe said. "He's never far from the strike zone and he's come a long way since spring training."

Williams had control problems in spring training and started the season at Triple-A Tucson. He won his first three games after reporting to the Astros on June 15 and then lost three in a row.

"He doesn't get rattled or flustered, his command is what's really come forward," Howe said.

Donovan Osborne (9-7) struck out the first five batters to start the game and retired the first nine in order before Craig Biggio doubled leading off the fourth inning and scored on Ken Caminiti's double. The Astros got another run in the inning on Eric Anthony's RBI grounder.

Cardinals manager Joe Torre praised Williams' performance.

"He had good stuff, he threw hard and had a good breaking ball," Torre said. "He didn't show any signs of walking hitters. He was getting ahead of the hitters."

Andujar Codeno, who hit for the cycle on Tuesday, and Luis Gonzalez each doubled to start the fifth inning for another run and Biggio's single made it 4-0.

Williams lost his shutout in the sixth inning when Milt Thompson reached base on second baseman Milt Thompson's fielding error, stole second and scored on Felix Jose's single.

Eddie Taubensee greeted reliever Bob McClure with a home run to start the seventh inning.

Anthony flew out to right fielder Jose in the sixth after hitting two grounders supporting the Astrodome's roof. Anthony's first ball fell in foul territory and the second careened back into right field where Jose caught it.

Torre said it was an off performance for Osborne.

"He got out of his rhythm and wasn't as aggressive as he was in the first three innings," Torre said. "That's what you expect from inexperience, you hit a little pop ball and it knocks you off a little."

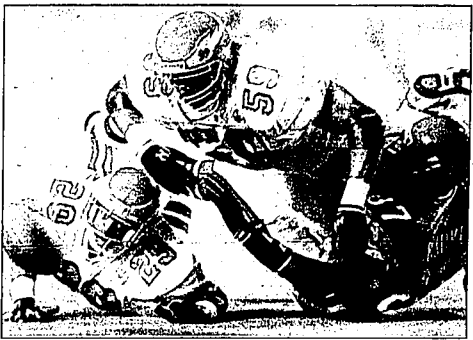
"We expect them to run most of the time Saturday night," Jund said. "Our key is to stop Johnson and Pankratz because they are Centennial's best two athletes."

"Our hopes to win this one will be elimination of mental mistakes and turnovers and we have to create some turnovers to help our offense," Jund said. "The Bruins plan on running at the Patriots, alternating backs Dillon Ward and Todd Amundsen most of the time behind a pretty solid offensive line."

The major worry comes at linebacker where graduation decimated the Bruins and Jund foresees a long process of rebuilding.

The Lithuanian basketball team, which didn't spend a penny.

The tie-dyed Lithuanian basketball warm-up shirts — donated by the Grateful Dead, detailed with a slam-

dunking skeleton — are the hottest selling item to emerge from this month's Summer Games.

Thousands of Americans are snatching T-shirts like those worn at the Olympic medal ceremonies by household names (in Vilnius, anyway) Rimas Kurtinaitis and Valdemaras Khomicus.

"Everybody wanted them. They were the coolest shirt... A small-time little thing, a small gesture from the heart, has become a fad," Dead spokesman Dennis McNally said.

The band's merchandising arm received 20,000 orders since the shirts went on sale last week, he said.

While the Dream Team was busy obscuring its warm-up logo with origami and American flags, the Lithuanians proudly accepted their bronze medals in multi-colored outfits more suited to Jerry (Garcia) than Larry (Bird).

"All those American millionaires covering up their logos, and then these guys... We felt great," McNally said. "Obviously, it was a gas."

So were the outfits, funded by the Dead and created by Phoenix entrepreneur Mike Fitzgerald and the Poughkeepsie, N.Y.-based Not Fade Away Tie-Dye Co.

The shirts were perfect for the height and the hoop. Journalists in Barcelona paid \$50 to get extras, while Lithuanian team members received offers of up to \$150 for the shirts off their backs.

A flood of callers to the NBA's Golden State Warriors, where Lithuanian leader Sarunas Marciulionis plays, knocked out

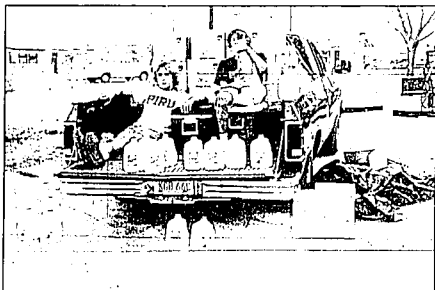

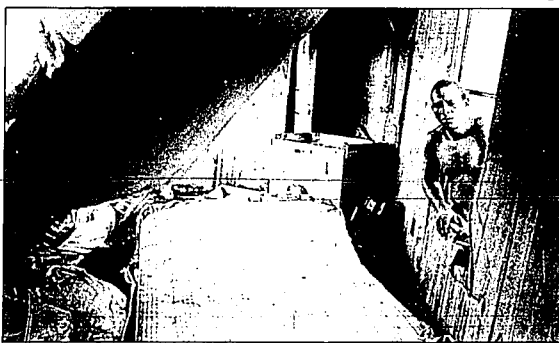

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

All things are possible until they are proved impossible... and even the impossible may do by means of now.

Sometimes a defender should win a trick as soon as he can, other times he must play a waiting game. Put yourself in today's East chair — should you win the first diamond to return partner's suit, hoping he had led from the heart ace?

South took East's heart jack with his king (he didn't want a spade shift) and led a diamond to dummy's nine. Should East win the queen to quickly return partner's suit? If he does, South ducks to West's 10 but wins the next heart and establishes the diamonds. With no hearts left, East must relinquish the lead to South who can claim 10 tricks.

East's early grab of the diamond queen would have worked if West had led from the A-10 of hearts instead of the Q-10. But was this possible? South had promised 16 or more HCP with his opening bid, and dummy and East had 21 HCP between them. Therefore, it was impossible for West to hold the heart ace.

East should therefore duck the first diamond. He wins the second with the queen, and dummy's suit is isolated. With only one sure exit in dummy, declarer can establish the diamonds but cannot run them, and instead of 10 tricks, South wins only seven.

With Olympics' close, NBC slips

Continuing its pre-Olympics winning ways, CBS topped up a 9.9 rating for the week ending Sunday, Aug. 16.

NEW YORK — CBS vaulted back to the top of the television ratings in the week after the Olympics, when NBC surged ahead, audience figures released Tuesday showed.

NBC, which had outrun all rivals during its exclusive Olympics coverage, fell to second place with 9.1, with ABC coming in at 8.6 and Fox at 7.1, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co. Each ratings point represents 921,000 homes.

But ABC had an impressive one-two punch as reruns of its powerhouse sitcoms, "Roseanne" and "Home Improvement," notched first and second.

CBS' share of audience averaged 19 percent of all sets in use, with NBC scoring a 17 share; ABC, 16; and Fox 14.

NBC's season premiere of "Blossom," coming in sixth, was that network's highest-rated show.

Here are the top 10 shows, their network and rating: "Roseanne," ABC, 16; "Home Improvement," ABC, 14.8; "CBS Sunday Movie: Good Night Sweet Wife," CBS, 14.4; "Coach," ABC, 14.2; "60 Minutes," CBS, 13.8; "Blossom," NBC, 12.8; "NBC Monday Night Movie: Settle the Score," NBC, 12.8; "Street Stories," CBS, 12.7; "Murphy Brown," CBS, 12.5; "Murder, She Wrote," CBS, 12.4.

And despite logging a distant 43rd overall, Sunday's premiere of a season of "Roc" episodes to be aired live on Fox was second only to CBS' "Murder, She Wrote" in its time period.

It outperformed the season premiere of NBC's "I Witness Video" and a repeat of "Raiders of the Lost Ark" on "The ABC Sunday Night Movie."
