East European refugee saves burning teen-ager

TWIN FALLS — A refugee Romanian doctor rescued a 14-year-old girl Wednesday night from flames that had engulfed her from her shoes to her hair, police say.

Titus Safciu caught a panicked Sara Friel and pulled off her shirt, extinguishing flames that had ignited while the girl and several companions were inhaling gasoline fumes near a downtown supermarket, according to a police report.

Safciu saw the flames, stopped his pickup truck and chased the girl, while the youngster's stunned friends stood by and watched, police said.

"People are afraid to do something, it's bad," said Safciu, who is working in a Twin Falls clinic while he completes medical studies so that he can practice in the United States. "She could have been hurt really bad, maybe died."

Friel, who lives at 425 5th St. E., was taken by Lifelight helicopter Wednesday night to the University of Utah Health Center's Intermountain Burn Center in

Salt Lake City, where she was listed in serious but stable condition Thursday night, the hospital's nursing supervisor said.

Safciu was driving his pickup into the parking lot of Anderson's IGA Super-Center, 512 Main Ave. N., at about 9:15 p.m. Wednesday when he saw Friel "burst" into flames, he said.

Safciu pursued her, took his shirt off and tried to smother the fire. When that didn't work, he tore her shirt off, extinguishing the flames, he said.

Friel had second- and third-degree burns over 19 percent of her body, including her left upper arm, her chest and her abdomen, said the Utah hospital's spokeswoman, who would not give her name.

"For someone her age that certainly isn't life threatening," the spokeswoman said. "It could have been a lot worse. She was very fortunate considering that gasoline and matches were involved."

Friel did not have respiratory burns, which commonly occur in gasoline accidents, and she will likely be released from the hospital in two weeks, the spokeswoman said.

Several people, including the girl's teen-age friends who witnessed the accident but feared getting into trouble for inhaling gasoline fumes, gave conflicting reports to police about what happened.

Patrolman Mark Marvin said four teens were inhaling gasoline fumes in an alley behind the grocery store, smoking cigarettes and playing with a cigarette lighter.

Roger Wyatt, who lives at 443 2nd Ave. N., came out of his house, ordered the teens to leave and then called police.

Friel was highly intoxicated from sniffing gasoline fumes and splashed gas all over herself, Marvin said.

But the teens' accounts of what happened differ.

One 12-year-old girl said several people in a vehicle that matched the description of Safciu's pickup drove by, doused the foursome with gasoline and ignited it, Marvin said.

In his 9th decade, Faren Faler still trafficking in good cheer

FILER — Faren Faler has been helping park cars at the Twin Falls County Fair for the better part of 20 years.

Faler, 84, is a past international director of the Lions Club, which runs the parking operation at the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds. He still enjoys it, and except for eight years when he lived in Boise, he's been doing it for the past two decades.

But after seven hours one day, with no chance to rest, "my hind legs were tired," he said.

Faler joined the Lions Club in 1942 in Pinedale, Wyo.

"It's such a good cause," he said. He learned just how good one day while selling light bulbs for the Lions door-to-door.

In an alley behind a nice, large house stood a small shack that looked more like a chicken coop. But there were curtains and a light in the window, so Faler knocked.

A small boy with glasses as thick as the bottom of a beer bottle answered the door. When Faler stated his business the boy brought his mother.

She called handfuls of nickels and

dimes she had saved to buy light bulbs to help the Lions Club. If not for the Lions' eye program, she told Faler, her boy would not have been able to go to school.

The Lions had given the boy his eyeglass back, and the incident changed Faler's attitude about service clubs. He's been a Lion ever since.

In the years since, Faler has traveled the world and seen the good service clubs do, he said.

Even parking cars at the fair makes him feel as if he's still doing something to help others, and at 84, it's satisfying to still be able to work, he said.

Though he gets to greet many old

Weaver hearing

Testimony fails to link suspect to shot at marshal

BOISE — A federal marshal testified for nearly three hours Thursday, but didn't directly link Randy Weaver to a shot that nearly killed the law officer.

After court adjourned until Friday, defense attorney Gerry Spence said, "I didn't hear anything today that would suggest Randy Weaver shot anybody."

Weaver, who with a friend and family faced an army of federal agents in a bloody, 11-day standoff at his northern Idaho cabin, is charged with assaulting a federal officer. Weaver surrendered Aug. 31 after three hours of testimony by independent presidential candidate Bo Gritz.

The officer—Weaver is charged with shooting, Marshal Arthur Roderick Jr.—was the only witness to testify at a detention-preliminary hearing for Weaver, 44. Despite about three hours of testimony before U.S. Magistrate Mikel Williams, Roderick didn't directly identify Weaver as the person who fired a shot that creased his chest during an Aug. 21 shootout.

Weaver was charged in 1990 with selling illegal saved-off shotguns. He failed to appear in court the next year, triggering a second charge. He retreated to a mountaintop cabin near Naples, in northern Idaho 40 miles from the Canadian border.

Federal agents spent more than 16 months monitoring Weaver, planning to arrest him if he left the mountaintop. But Roderick said they didn't want to take him by force because Weaver's wife, Vicki, four children including a baby and a family friend were in the cabin.

The Aug. 21 shootout resulted in the slaying of Deputy Marshal William Degan and Weaver's son, Sam, 13. Mrs. Weaver died of a gunshot wound the next day.

Roderick said federal agents, who at times kept the Weaver mountain compound

Probe may widen

WASHINGTON — A federal grand jury, signaling an expanded investigation of the House Post Office, charged Thursday there was a broad conspiracy between post office employees and "legislative officials" to defraud the government.

The three-count indictment named only one defendant: former House Post Office chief of staff Jonna G. O'Rourke. But it said she conspired "with other persons, known and unknown" to "perform personal and campaign services for members" of the House, including cashing their checks.

The indictment for the first time revealed that the grand jury is investigating the House Post Office's delivery of campaign checks from city postal boxes to the member's offices.

And the conspiracy included use of a taxpayer-financed express mail account to send "personal items" to one lawmaker's home district, the indictment said.

Congress splits on key legislation

Leave measure faces veto

WASHINGTON — The House on Thursday sent to the White House an emergency leave bill that Democrats said would boost "family values."

The vote fell far short of the two-thirds majority needed to override a certain veto by President Bush.

The House approved the measure 241-161 after a debate in which some Republicans cited the timing of the measure was a " cynical election-year ploy" to embarrass Bush, who has used "family values" as a theme in his reelection campaign.

The bill, approved by the Senate last month, now goes to the White House.

The measure would guarantee many American workers up to 12 weeks of unpaid family leave a year to care for newborn or sick children, spouses and ailing parents.

Senate rejects liability bill

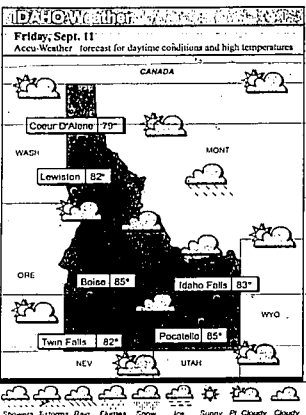
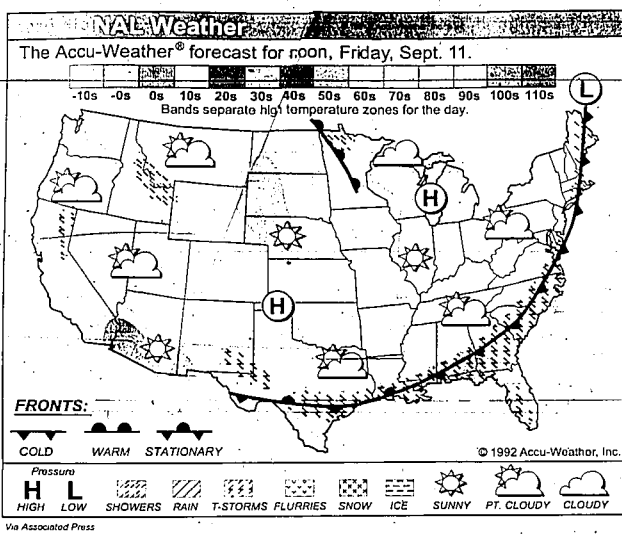

WASHINGTON — The Senate narrowly rejected a business-backed measure Thursday that would discourage people injured by defective products from suing the manufacturers for damages.

Supporters fell two votes short of the 60 votes needed to cut off debate on the measure, effectively killing it for this year. But sponsors said that they were nonetheless encouraged by the 58-38 vote, which virtually ensures that the fight over product liability laws will resume in the next Congress.

The vote, the Senate's first on a federal product liability law, came less than a month after President Bush and Vice President Dan Quayle made trial lawyers a campaign issue by blaming them for high court costs and verdicts that they said hurt American competitiveness.

From Southern Plains to New England, heavy rain falls

Stormy weather was scattered from the southern Plains to New England on Thursday, with locally heavy rain falling on parts of New Jersey and Oklahoma.

At midday, showers and thunderstorms extended across the southern Plains, lower Mississippi Valley, lower Great Lakes, the Appalachians, the central and southern Atlantic Coast and southern New England.

A flood warning was posted over Monmouth County in central New Jersey after thunderstorms produced more than 2 inches of rain during the morning, the National Weather Service said.

A flash-flood warning was issued for southeastern Oklahoma's Marshall County, as much as 3 inches of rain fell during the morning and more was expected, the weather service said.

Heavier rainfall during the six hours up to 2 p.m. EDT included 1.21 inches at Mayport, Fla.

From Wednesday afternoon into early Thursday, as much as 4.5 inches of rain fell across northwestern and north-central Indiana. Some parts of La Porte and St. Joseph counties have had more than 7 inches of rain this month, compared with their normal for the month of 3.25 inches, the weather service said.

During the same period, parts of northern Illinois also got heavy rain, with 5.02 inches at Joliet and 5.24 at Paw Paw.

Early morning temperatures Thursday were lower than normal over much of the northern half of the Plains and the upper half of the Mississippi Valley. Kansas City, Mo., tied its record low for the date at 48 degrees.

Parts of Alaska also were cooler than usual. Bethel tied its record low of 26 and Fairbanks reached a record low of 19.

Thursday's official low for the lower 48 states was 26 at West Yellowstone, Mont. Unofficially, Fontanille Dam on the Green River in southwestern Wyoming reached 22, the weather service said.

Iraq curtails attacks in south

ABOARD USS LaSALLE (AP) — Iraq has curtailed ground attacks against rebellious Shiite Muslims since allied warplanes started enforcing a flight ban over southern Iraq, a U.S. naval commander said Thursday.

"The main reason has led to the dropping of repressive activity, that's for sure," Adm. Raymond A. K. Taylor said in an interview with The Associated Press aboard his flagship USS LaSalle in the Persian Gulf.

A U.S.-led coalition declared the zone off-limits to Iraqi military aircraft on Aug. 27, following stepped-up government attacks on the Shiites, who launched a failed insurgency after the 1991 Gulf War.

"All of this is designed to have him stop bombing his own people," Taylor said. "I think we're having a favorable effect on reducing the repressive activity. ... So far, he has not challenged the 'no-fly' zone."

After flying for two weeks without a challenge from Iraq, the U.S.-led allies have reduced the number of patrols over southern Iraq by about 75 percent.

In northern Iraq, what appeared to be an Iraqi F-1 Mirage fighter jet on Thursday crossed into the zone where the allies previously imposed a flight ban to protect the Kurds, Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said.

The aircraft appeared to have been turning south when it was intercepted by two U.S. Air Force F-16s, and there was no exchange of fire, Williams said.

He said allied officials were not certain it was an Iraqi fighter, since others in the coalition protecting the Kurds fly such aircraft.

When the allies began enforcing the flight ban in the south, there was speculation that the United States might send in a second aircraft carrier to the gulf.

Senate kills base funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate committee on Thursday denied President Bush the money he wants to rebuild Homestead Air Force Base, as politics continued shaping efforts to ship federal aid to Hurricane Andrew's victims.

Bush pledged to reconstruct the destroyed South Florida air base shortly after Andrew raked Florida and Louisiana last month. Homestead is a major local employer, and Bush's promise was seen as boosting his prospects in a state he badly wants to win on Election Day.

But by a 12-8 vote, the Senate Appropriations Committee voted to strip \$480 million for rebuilding Homestead from a package of loans totaling \$7.5 billion.

"That was very quickly determined to be a fiasco," he said.

Investigating officers were also told that one of the teens spilled gas on the pavement, while another witness said someone dropped a cigarette on the spot. Still another said a boy spit a mouthful of gas on Friel and then flicked a cigarette on her.

"Sara was really messed up from the gas and started spilling it everywhere," a 14-year-old girl, who admitted sniffing gasoline herself, wrote in her police report.

The girl said as three of the teens walked toward the IGA, one of the boys lit a cigarette and someone pushed Friel into the lighter flame.

A woman who stopped at the grocery store on her way home from a church service saw Friel run toward her car and fall on the hood, police Lt. Bill Stonemets said.

"It's not every day a flaming girl throws herself on your car," Stonemets said.

Safcu was already out of his car by that time, and chased after Friel, who was running in circles and rolling on the ground as flames rose three feet above her head, he said.

"The little girl was screaming and yelling," Safcu said.

He ripped his shirt off and was able to dampen the flames but not to put them out, he said. He tried to lift the girl's blouse, but Friel worked against him.

Finally, Safcu tore Friel's shirt off and threw it aside, he said.

Friel's companions picked up the gasoline container and fled, he said. Friel ran with them, Safcu said.

Marvin, who was responding to Wyatt's call, said he found Friel pacing in circles and groaning in pain just before she got into a car in an alley 50 yards from the IGA.

"Marvin said he found the other teens walking about two blocks from the store. After hearing the 12-year-old girl's story about the 'phantom' truck occupants who doused them with flames, he went looking for and found Safcu, Marvin said.

Marvin is investigating the 12-year-old girl for filing a false police report, he said.

"The entire involvement in this incident is under investigation," Marvin said.

Friel and the three other teens are also under investigation for inhaling gasoline fumes, which is a misdemeanor offense, Stonemets said.

Safcu, who had blisters on the tips of his fingers Thursday, said he wasn't surprised when several people who witnessed the event froze up.

While Safcu took classes in California earlier this year to take a residency exam to become a certified doctor in the U.S., he studied human behavior and learned that when several people see someone in danger, they expect the next person to respond.

The 40-year-old Romatiani, who fled his homeland during the reign of the late Communist dictator Nicolai Ceausescu, has been in the United States since August 1989.

before the man had finished his apology.

Through long hours at the parking garage, Faler said he has had little trouble with cheaters. Most people don't balk at paying a dollar to park, especially when the proceeds go back into the community, he said.

"The cause helps, but there's always chiselers," he said.

Friends, Faler said he doesn't get much of a chance to talk to the people who come through the gate. But he has learned a few tricks to make change rapidly.

Once a few years ago, someone pulled in and handed him a \$100 bill, saying it was all he had. But Faler surprised him by handing back \$99 almost

On Aug. 21, Roderick said he led a six-man team near Weaver's cabin to prepare for the later undercover operation. Degan was along to review the plan.

Roderick said he and Degan, along with Larry Cooper, spent about five hours moving around the area near the Weaver compound, without being detected.

About 10 a.m., he said, the Weavers' dog started barking, and the three-man team saw the dog running at their position, followed by Harris carrying a rifle. Roderick said he told his team to leave, hoping to avoid a confrontation.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Kim Lindquist, who is prosecuting the case, asked Roderick how they retreated. "Very fast," he said. "We still thought we could get away and avoid a confrontation."

But the dog and Harris gained on them. Roderick said a shot rang out, although he didn't see who fired it, and the dog turned toward him. At that point he shot and killed the dog, he said.

Then general firing started.

Judging from the sounds, Roderick said, they included fire from an assault weapon, high-powered rifle, shotgun and handguns.

Cooper radioed him that Degan was hit, but Roderick said he didn't see the shot.

Roderick said he saw someone ahead of him vanish around a line of trees. He didn't see the person's face, but assumed it was Weaver because Weaver had been seen earlier that day wearing camouflage clothing.

A number of shots, including the one that skimmed his chest, rang out from the area where he last saw the man he presumed to be Weaver, Roderick said.

Eventually Roderick and Cooper were joined by the three officers who had been watching from a mountainside observation post. One was a medic, but he said Degan was dead. They remained pinned in an area below the Weaver compound, for 11 hours until a relief party took them out in darkness, he said.

Roderick said he and the others did nothing to provoke the attack.

Bush offers 1% tax cut if spending preferences OK'd

DETROIT (AP) — President Bush on Thursday laid out a repackaged economic manifesto less than two months before Election Day.

He suggested a 1 percent across-the-board tax cut would be possible if Congress followed his spending recommendations. Bush also proposed cutting the pay of federal officials making over \$75,000 a year by 5 percent, saying "Americans have tightened their belts and so should better-paid federal workers."

And he promised to slash spending at the White House by a third — if Congress would pare its own operating budget by as much.

Bush set as "a grand goal" the nearly doubling of the nation's \$6 trillion economy, to \$10 trillion, "by the early years of the next century" — an ambition considering the slow economic growth of the past few years.

His new plan was unveiled as the White House struggled with an economic-policy embarrassment of its

own making. A day after Bush told a New Jersey audience "I went along with one Democratic tax increase and I'm not going to do it again" — ever, ever, presidential spokesman Martin Fitzwater insisted that Bush was not repeating his famous broken pledge of 1988: "Read my lips — no new taxes."

Battered by bad news in the polls and on the economy, Bush's newly repackaged economic plan was an attempt to deflect criticism that he hasn't focused enough attention on the economy.

"I know that times have been difficult, very difficult, for many Americans," Bush told the Detroit Economic Club.

He suggested his "agenda for change" was superior to that of Democratic challenger Bill Clinton, whom he trails in all major national polls.

"The world that we knew as children, no matter your age, will never be the same," Bush said. "America will

change — that's our destiny. How it will change will soon be decided."

During a question-and-answer period, he said he would debate Clinton although the Bush campaign so far has refused to accept a bipartisan committee's proposal for three presidential debates.

"I'm not a professional debater. I'm not an Oxford man," chuckled the president, himself a Yale man. He gently mocked Clinton's debating style, saying, "I think he is good at that. I mean, he's got more statistics than there are problems."

Bush's economic speech was accompanied by release of a 27-page booklet entitled "Agenda for American Renewal." The booklet was to be offered free to Americans by Bush in a five-minute campaign ad focusing on the economy. The ad, which will include an 800-number to get the booklet, was airing on major television networks Thursday night.

Although the booklet bears a blue-

cover and resembles a budget document, it was printed by the Bush-Quayle '92 campaign. Aides stressed that its proposals do not amount to formal recommendations to Congress.

And Bush himself noted that his suggestion of a 1 percent tax cut was "just an example of what could be accomplished if Congress would go along with \$130 billion in spending cuts he said he'd already recommended."

At the Republican convention last month, Bush promised an across-the-board tax cut in a second term along with spending cuts to help pay for it but reiterated no details.

Clinton's campaign reacted with expected skepticism to Bush's new plan — the president's third major economic presentation of the year. "Promises, promises," said George Stephanopoulos, Clinton campaign communications director. "Four years ago he promised no new taxes and 30 million jobs and what we got was no new jobs and more than 30 new tax-

Board adopts rules for bank disclosure terms

WASHINGTON (AP) — A reluctant Federal Reserve Board did Congress' bidding Thursday and adopted rules Thursday designed to make it easier for consumers to shop for savings and checking accounts.

But board members warned that the mammoth regulation — 267 pages including explanatory memos — was so complex it could discourage banks from advertising their savings and checking accounts and encourage them to offer consumers fewer kinds of accounts.

"The net result of the massive costs of this regulation will be to reduce savings yields," predicted board member John P. LaWare.

Last November, Congress included the so-called "Truth in Savings Act" as part of a broader bill rescuing the insolvent Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. It in-

structed the Federal Reserve to implement the law.

The act requires banks, savings institutions and credit unions to clearly and uniformly disclose the interest rate, terms, fees and other conditions of their deposit accounts.

It also requires that advertisements and solicitations carry the information and that depositors get advance notice of rate changes, such as when a certificate of deposit is automatically renewed.

The law requires that interest be paid on the full balance of an account. In the past, a few banks have advertised high rates but paid it on only a portion of an account.

The rules, adopted on a 3-2 vote, take effect Sept. 21, but compliance is optional until March 21.

Bush's tax plan at a glance

DETROIT (AP) — Here is what's new in the economic package President Bush outlined on Thursday.

• Sets a goal of a \$10 trillion economy by the early years of the next century. The current value of the U.S. economy is about \$6 trillion. Bush said he hoped the ambitious goal could be reached through growth and not inflation.

• Suggests an across-the-board tax cut of 1 percent could be achieved if Congress would enact some \$132 billion in spending cuts over five years. Some would come from the president's proposed freeze on mandatory benefit programs other than Social Security. Bush said the 1 percent figure was "an example," not a concrete proposal.

Jerome School Board foregoes higher taxes

"We have (enough) students to do it, but the taxpayers have been real good to us," Nancy Churchman, School Board chairman, said Thursday.

Idaho law allows school boards to raise taxes without a vote of school district patrons if fall enrollment exceeds expectations.

But the Jerome School District had a windfall of \$242,000 left from careful spending in the past school year and additional revenue from state and county taxes. "We don't need it (the emergency levy), so why charge the taxpayers," Churchman said.

Student enrollment grew by 104 more than was anticipated when the current budget was put together.

Brown begins work as new Jerome planning official

JEROME — Jerome County has hired a new planning and zoning administrator. Art Brown of Jerome began work Tuesday.

The position was left vacant when Glen Howell resigned in order to spend more time with his heating installation business. The county commissioners had wanted to make the part-time job full time, a proposal that would have kept Howell in the position. But the county did not have enough money.

Brown was born and raised in Twin Falls, and spent 19 years in the Navy as a chief diesel mechanic. More recently he was director of environmental services in hospitals in Folsom and Long Beach, Calif.

Census: Only Utah spends less on students than Idaho

TWIN FALLS — Idaho spends the second lowest amount per pupil on education in any state, according to a new report from the Census Bureau.

According to "Public Education Finances: 1989-90," Idaho spent \$2,929 a year per student on instruction and other expenses, about \$350 more than Utah, which ranked 51st. The survey included the District of Columbia.

Mississippi ranked 49th at \$2,958, while Alaska was first in the nation at \$7,736.

"In 1989-90, states spent an average \$4,684 per pupil on current expenses, compared to \$4,376 the year before," said Henry Wolf of the report's staff.

Local financial support ranged from \$9 of every \$10 in the District of Columbia to \$1 of every \$25 in Hawaii. About 83 percent of local support was generated by taxes.

Wolf said the largest source of financial support was 48 percent from America's elementary and secondary public schools came from states. Local governments contributed 47 percent and the federal government 6 percent.

Crapo questions Williams' claim

"The reason the balanced-budget amendment is not before the people right now is because of the Democratic leadership in Congress," Crapo said. "How can J.D. Williams support (it) and still vote

for the very leadership that block it?" But Williams replied that he's been endorsed by the amendment's main sponsor, Rep. Charles Stenholm of Texas, and said he hasn't made any deals to get an Agriculture Committee assignment.

He said he spoke to Foley about the assignment before deciding whether to run for the 2nd District seat, because "I wanted to know whether I could be an effective congressman."

The Agriculture Committee, Williams said, "is the key committee affecting the economy of southern Idaho, especially now that the North American Free Trade Agreement is coming up."

Outside the gate, business booms for parking at Twin Falls fair

FILER — Even with a new exit from the Twin Falls County Fair — north, toward Pole Line Road — traffic still gets snarled after major events.

"Monday it was a madhouse," said James Solomon, one of the Lions Club members who operate the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds parking lot.

Finding a place to put all those cars, pickups and RVs is big business at the fair.

In distinctive yellow Lions Club vests, members collect \$1 from each car parked on the fairgrounds parking lot.

The annual operation is a major fundraising event for the club, Solomon said. The first two days of the fair, the club splits the profits with the Twin Falls County Fair Board. The rest of the money goes into Lions Club projects.

Solomon, who's had a cornea transplant, is a believer in the club's programs, which include an eye bank, school drug programs,

Miss Twin Falls scholarships and pageant, Little League Football and meals for Johnny Horizon county cleanup.

But even at a busk-a-vehicle, the fair parking gets some competition from nearby residents. The closer to the Fair Avenue fairgrounds entrance, the higher the rates. A couple of blocks away parking spaces sell for \$2. Right across the street the price jumps to \$3.

The Whelan family has been selling spaces on its lawn for the past 17 years. It's a good once-a-year business, Marie Whelan said. And it makes the tax payments on their house across the street from the fairgrounds.

When the Wheelans bought the house, they decided to cash in on fair-goers who parked along the street. Now they sell reserved parking spaces at \$3 a day. Many people return year after year to reserve spaces, some for the entire week, Whelan said.

The lot is convenient to the Fair Avenue entrance, especially for elderly people who have trouble walking long distances, she said.

Meanwhile the Wheelans sit in the shade of their porch and watch people bounce across the street to the fair. Many hours and miles of walking later, they come drugging back.

It's also a chance to chat with old and new friends. And as long as they have to keep an eye on the parking business, Whelan is trying to sell a used Franklin stove.

Down around the corner, at Park Avenue and Main Street, the Filer Special Olympics team has a small lot with \$2 parking spaces. This is the group's first year at selling parking spaces for the fair, Karen Chandler said.

It isn't just people with available space who are cashing in on the fair.

Right across from the main entrance to the fair, Annette Gilmore has set up a couple of tables in the yard of a friend, where she sells her handcrafted leather goods and jewelry.

Earlier Thursday, she sold a skimpy suede outfit to a stripper, she said.

Her business, Half-Bred Leathers of Twin Falls, is new and she can't afford a booth at the fair, she said.

After recent incidents, lawmaker vows to make sniffing fumes a crime

TWIN FALLS — The second severe accident in a month involving inhaling gasoline fumes points up the need for tighter controls on the process, state Sen. Denton Darrington said Thursday.

Darrington, a Decle Republican, said he would introduce a bill in the 1993 Legislature to make inhaling gasoline, paint or other volatile substances by minors a crime. "Right now, if the police find some kid inhaling, or sprawled out in the gutter high on gasoline, they have nothing to take him in on," he said. "We need to get a handle on this."

On Wednesday, 14-year-old Sara Friel of Twin Falls was severely burned when a cigarette lighter ignited gasoline she was inhaling near a downtown Twin Falls supermarket.

On Aug. 14, Kevin Eugene Wheeler, 14, of Hansen died of lung congestion due to inhaling gasoline fumes. Wheeler's lungs filled with fluid to the point where they could no longer supply enough oxygen to his bloodstream, Jerome County Coroner Gerald Ostler said.

A 16-year-old Decle boy died in a similar incident in April, after inhaling cleaning fluid sprayed into a plastic bag.

Gasoline, cleaning fluid, paint and similar volatile liquids give off strong-smelling fumes that can make anyone who inhales them feel light-headed, euphoric or dizzy, said nurse Margo Nichols of the State Poison Center in Boise.

"It (gasoline) is a cheap high, and it's not a hard thing to get," Nichols said.

Gasoline fumes can also cause rapid or irregular heartbeat; coughing, choking and shortness of breath; nausea, and a form of pneumonia. The fumes also can literally burn lung tissue, starving the body of needed oxygen, Nichols said.

"That can lead to coma or death," she said. Repeated inhalation of gasoline fumes can kill off brain cells and lead to permanent brain damage, Nichols added.

"It's horrible, the effects it can have," she said. Gasoline poses other dangers. It is extremely inflammable and combustible, said Battalion Chief Wayne Campbell of the Twin Falls Fire Department.

The flash point of gasoline is minus-45 degrees Fahrenheit, Campbell said. That

means even at temperatures that low, it can be ignited.

Also, the euphoria and disorientation gasoline fumes cause can lead people to do dangerous or foolhardy things.

"The poison center frequently gets calls about people who've breathed in gasoline fumes or accidentally swallowed gasoline (while siphoning, for example), but Nichols said she couldn't say if the Sara Friel and Kevin Wheeler cases represent a larger trend.

Darrington, though, said juvenile probation officers have told him that "there's a lot of this out there."

A similar bill Darrington sponsored last session passed the state Senate but was held up in the House.

If you find someone under the influence of gasoline fumes who is vomiting, having difficulty breathing or showing other symptoms of poisoning, immediately move them out of the affected area and into fresh air, Nichols said.

If the symptoms persist, she said, if the person directly to a physician or hospital emergency room.

Regulators to look at Albion rates

BOISE — The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has scheduled a meeting this month to discuss rates that several small southern Idaho telephone companies charge long-distance carriers for access to their local exchange customers.

Last month, the commission received a petition asking that switched access rates be revised for local exchange companies that participate in the Idaho Universal Service Fund. The petition was filed by U S West Communications and the seven independent companies that participate in the program — Albion, Cambridge, Inland, Midvale/Rockland, Rural and Silver Star.

If the PUC agrees, it could mean lower phone bills for customers of U S West and the seven independent companies.

A conference to sort out the issues and schedule further proceedings will begin at 9:30 a.m. on Sept. 30 in the commission hearing room at 472 W. Washington St., Boise. Anyone who wants to participate with the right to cross-examine witnesses must file a petition with the commission before Sept. 23.

Since July 1988, phone companies that do business in Idaho have been required to collect universal service fund surcharges from local and long-distance customers. The surcharges are used to offset the high costs of several small phone companies so that their rates do not rise more than 25 percent above the statewide average.

A 0.1-cent-per-minute surcharge is assessed for all in-state long-distance calling. Long-distance companies are required to make a similar payment to the universal service fund and make periodic reports of minutes of in-state toll usage.

Local exchange companies pay 3 cents a month for each residential line and 7 cents a month for each business line.

Switched access rates of 13 to 14 cents per minute for long-distance customers through 1990 for the six southern Idaho

Jerome GOP places Ridley on ballot

JEROME — The Jerome County Republican Central Committee chose Jerome grocery-store owner Jerry Ridley on Wednesday to take the late county Commissioner George Andrus' place on the November ballot.

Ridley, 37, was the committee's first choice not only to succeed Andrus, who died last month, but also to serve as a temporary commissioner until January when new elections take office.

The final decision on who will fill Andrus' shoes till the new year is up to Idaho's Democratic governor, Cecil Andrus — no relation to George Andrus.

But regardless of whom the governor selects to replace Andrus, it will be Ridley who will oppose Democrat William A. Koresy Jr. in the November race for commissioner from the 2nd District.

The central committee chose him over Woolley, Larry Webb and Neuman. Webb lost in the primary to incumbent Larry Gold for the sheriff's seat on the Republican ticket.

Ridley, who owns and operates three Koresy'sIGA Food and Drug stores in the Magic Valley and two other grocery stores in Boise, was born and raised in Pocatello

Committee takes up anti-PC bill

WASHINGTON — Public and private colleges that punish students for making offensive remarks under "hate speech" rules would lose their federal funding under a proposal by Sen. Larry Craig. The bill was introduced in a Senate committee Thursday.

The Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee's review of Craig's bill signals that Congress may be about to enter the long-running controversy surrounding free speech and "political correctness" that has embroiled a number of colleges and universities around the country.

Some colleges — mostly private schools in the Northeast such as Brown University and Connecticut College — have tried to deter racial slurs and sexually harassing remarks towards women and homosexual students by punishing students for "hate speech."

Several prominent public universities, including the University of Wisconsin and the University of Michigan, also have attempted to enact such codes.

shouldn't arrest him for screaming certain words across the street, even if he uses words we don't like," Craig told the panel.

"I'm saying to colleges and universities, if you wish to do that that's fine, but I don't think the American taxpayer should subsidize it," he added.

No Idaho schools have hate speech policies, a Craig aide said.

Hate speech rules suffered a blow in June when the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously struck down a St. Paul, Minn., city ordinance that outlawed cross-burning and swastika displays. The court's ruling, that such

restrictions violated the Constitution's free speech guarantee, could be extended to prohibit school regulations curbing freedom of expression.

But because private colleges are not affected by that court ruling, Craig said Congress must pass legislation to ensure that students' free speech rights are protected on all campuses.

The legislation, he said, also would put "teeth" in the high court ruling by tying universities' policies to their federal funding.

The Idaho Republican said colleges have a "world of opportunities" to fight sexual and racial harassment, such as by citing a student for disorderly conduct or by educating students about tolerating different cultures and lifestyles.

The hate speech rules, he said, stem from some liberals trying to push "politically correct" language onto others.

Not everyone who testified at the hearing agreed.

Kenya Welch, a black Minnors University student, said minority students need the rules to guarantee their equal access to an education.

Welch said she considered

dropping out of school after seeing fellow students dress up as Ku Klux Klan members for Halloween and being called "nigger" by several others.

After the hearing, Shirley Wittich, an attorney for the 80-member National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, defended private schools' rights to govern themselves and denied Craig's charge that they were falling prey to political correctness.

"The problem for us arises when we have a student who, even after all attempts to educate, still doesn't get it and the student continues to be abusive and assault students based on color or religion or sexual orientation," Wittich said. "The question for colleges is, what do they do? How do they maintain an environment of civility which allows for free discourse to occur?"

While it is too late in the legislative session for Craig's bill to move this year and the committee has not taken a vote in aggressively pushing the bill, the Idaho Republican claimed victory in throwing the debate over political correctness and censorship on college campuses back into the spotlight.

Mini-Cassia businesses discuss cooperation

HELYBURN — Cooperation among Mini-Cassia businesses is essential to the area's economic growth, as is the development of a local tourism industry, say members of the Burley and Rupert area chambers of commerce.

About 30 members of the two chambers met Thursday evening at the Idaho Power building to discuss the advantages and disadvantages of merging the two organizations.

Representatives of the two groups have talked seriously about merging for several weeks. Thursday's meeting was aimed at determining if those discussions should continue.

Nearly everyone who spoke during the session favored the idea.

In the end, chamber officials decided to create a questionnaire, to be sent to all members of both chambers, that will ask members for their opinions with regard to a merger.

Leading the discussion were Rae Smith, president of the Burley chamber; Alan Johnson, president of the Rupert chamber;

Randy Stone, second vice president of the Burley chamber; and Wally Struder, first vice president of the Rupert chamber.

Several in attendance said forming a unified chamber of commerce would create a formidable political entity within the area and eventually increase local economic growth.

"We just have to reach out and ask for it, and it will happen," Johnson said.

In addition, the construction of a visitors center near Interstate 84 would generate tourism and also bolster the local economy. Sales at the center would offset its cost and fund its continued operation, they said.

"If we are to proceed with this, we can find a way to build this office ... at no cost to chamber members," Struder said. "If not, we're just not doing our jobs."

Stone said some local county officials seem to want to stifle economic growth, while a joint chamber would "send out a signal" from area business owners that they want to promote growth throughout the Mini-Cassia area.

"If the business community won't take the lead, who's going to?" Struder asked.

State may allow spent fuel project at INEL

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — While Gov. Cecil Andrus seeks more information about the Navy's plans to ship more nuclear waste to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, his administration supports allowing the federal installation to do just that.

The state Division of Environmental Quality has proposed granting an air-quality permit for a "dry cell" at the INEL's Exposed Core Facility. The project, which

would be used for cutting up spent nuclear fuel from submarines and warships, meets state air pollution guidelines, a state engineer said.

The dry cell, 84 feet long and 21 feet high, would be shielded by four-foot concrete walls and handle an unspecified increase in Navy nuclear shipments to the INEL.

"Additional dry shielded cell space is needed to handle an anticipated increase in Naval fuel work load at

ECF in the coming years," the INEL said in an application for a state permit for the new project.

But it is still unclear how many more Navy consignments are headed to Idaho.

The Snake River Alliance contends the Navy materials will soon rise fivefold. The Navy acknowledged there will be an increase, but it will be smaller than that. The Navy application for a state permit offers

no specifics, and the state did not ask for any.

Since the dry cell will release only a minute amount of radioactive material, within state and federal guidelines, the state has proposed granting the permit, said Avijit Ray, an air quality engineer for the state.

Idaho officials did not ask the Navy about its plans to ship waste to the INEL, since that was "extraneous" to the permit application, Ray said.

Yet this is an important issue to Andrus. He wants to know more about the Navy's plans, and is scheduled to meet this month with top Navy officials. He has said he might oppose a large hike in Navy shipments to Idaho.

The dry cell could be operational by early 1995.

Assault suit targets state

POCATELLO (AP) — A 65-year-old Idaho Falls woman sexually assaulted at her apartment is asking the Idaho Supreme Court to hold the state Health and Welfare Department liable for the actions of a 16-year-old youth who brutally attacked her.

Meanwhile, opponents of the St. Anthony Work Camp on Wednesday requested the court to close a minimum-security work camp in their neighborhood.

Thursday's oral arguments were part of the first Pocatello session including newly appointed Justice

Linda Trout, the first woman to become a justice in the Idaho court.

Seventh District Judge Ted Wood had ruled the state was protected by statute from any liability in the attack on Ester Harris.

The juvenile, who pleaded guilty to the assault, including rape, and sodomy, was in state custody at the time of the incident.

He was sentenced to prison and Harris subsequently filed a civil suit against Health and Welfare, charging it with being negligent in managing the juvenile.

Sides propose new Henry's Fork plan

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — Conservation and recreation interests have joined forces behind a new plan to protect 279 miles of the world renowned Henry's Fork of the Snake River and its tributaries.

The proposal, unveiled on Thursday, would protect 133 more miles of the river and its tributaries than the Henry's Fork Protection Act, that was approved from the state Senate last winter but was bottled up in House.

The bill, backed by the state Water Resources Board, would have

protected 146 of the 3,000 miles of streams in the Henry's Fork basin.

"This proposal completes the work that was never accomplished last year in recognizing all the rivers with outstanding qualities in this basin," said Jim Brown, Henry's Fork Foundation executive director. "In the confusion and polarization of last year's efforts, some of the most pristine and truly outstanding streams were overlooked."

The new plan would bring back to the Water Resources Board language recommending changes in state water

law. Lawmakers also were worried that the bill would prevent study of rebuilding the Teton Dam.

The new plan, called the "Henry's Fork 279," would permit inundation of the Teton River if the Teton Dam were reconstructed, recommends no changes in state water law and applies only to the streambed up to the high water mark.

"Supporters of the Henry's Fork 279 acknowledge the importance of water agriculture to the entire Idaho economy and the rural lifestyle we all enjoy," Brown said.

Rep. Richard Stalling, the man both Williams and Crapo want to succeed, sits on the Agriculture Committee.

During his news conference, Crapo also said that he, unlike Williams, has signed a pledge not to raise income tax rates, and that Williams supported spending an extra \$5 million in public schools at the same time state faced a \$13 million budget shortfall.

The 1992 Legislature battled for weeks over public-school spending, the largest single item in the state's 1992-93 budget. Gov. Andrus and Democratic legislators pushed for a \$501.9 million budget, but the Republicans who controlled the Legislature eventually pushed through a \$496.9 million budget.

Later, an unexpected decline in state tax revenues pushed the 1991-92 budget into the red, forcing Andrus to order spending holdbacks and tap the state's budget reserve account, or "rainy day fund."

Williams; however, said he supported the higher school budget because the state would have gone toward school reform.

"We had the money — over \$30 million in the reserve account," he said. "My position is it's time to quit studying education and start implementing our reform plan."

As for the no-tax pledge, Williams said he's seen several such pledges and considers most of them "campaign gimmickry."

He said he would support higher taxes on people with annual incomes above \$200,000, but only if the capital-gains tax is cut and spending reductions aren't enough to make up the lost revenue.

Crapo continued to emphasize his themes of congressional and budgetary reform, saying he would favor giving the president a line-item veto even if that president is Democrat Bill Clinton, and blasting the common practice of tacking spending provisions onto unrelated bills.

"Although he conceded that Idaho projects may have benefited from this practice, Crapo said, "Some Idahoans, like all Americans, have to realize we can't keep using the system for pork-barrel politics."

However, Crapo wouldn't promise to refrain from the practice if it isn't adopted by Congress as a whole.

"I won't let Idahoans that if we can't change the system, I'll leave Idaho unprotected," he said.

Both candidates said they opposed the regional wilderness bill introduced Wednesday by Rep. Peter Kostmayer. D-Idaho. Kostmayer's bill would designate as wilderness more than 13 million acres in four Northwest states, including four million acres in Idaho.

Williams called the measure "unwarranted meddling in Idaho affairs by eastern lawmakers," while Crapo said it underscored the need for Idahoans themselves to resolve the state's wilderness question.

companies that receive universal service fund money. Those rates were reduced by 25 percent of the statewide average access rates in effect at the time.

But since 1988, the state's largest phone company, U.S. West, has reduced its southern Idaho access rates each year. As a result, today's average in-state access rate is significantly lower than the rate that was in effect when the companies began drawing money from the universal service fund.

Based on the 1992 universal service fund administrator's report, the statewide average switched access rate is about 9 cents per minute, yielding 11,233 cents per state average.

But the seven southern Idaho companies have switched access rates that substantially exceed 125 percent of the current statewide average, ranging from 144 percent to 160 percent.

"These rates in part affect the long-distance toll rates in southern Idaho,

If the access rates are reduced to 125 percent of the statewide average, the seven companies' revenues would be reduced about \$181,000 per year. If that revenue were made up from the universal service fund, annual withdrawals from the fund total about \$1 million would be increased — by about \$181,000.

Crimestoppers Line not busy, but successful, detective says

BURLLEY - Fewer than four telephone calls a month are enough to keep Kelly Hutchinson happy. That's how many calls the police detective receives on the new Mini-Cassia Crimestoppers line. While the numbers aren't many - he's received 32 calls since the start of 1992 - he said he's pleased with the number of crimes that are being solved because of the calls.

"I think we've done pretty good," said Hutchinson, who serves as the liaison officer for the Mini-Cassia Crimestoppers, an organization which gives rewards for anonymous tips on crimes.

But Hutchinson also wished to encourage more involvement.

"Sometimes people don't realize they have seen a crime and sometimes they just don't want to be involved," he said. "But this is one of the easiest ways to help without being involved. You can be subpoenaed to testify in court, and you will receive a cash reward."

Hutchinson guesses that some don't realize that people can remain anonymous through the

Crimestoppers program. The telephone calls aren't recorded, he said.

The Crimestoppers program was formed eight and a half years ago. "Basically, a group of concerned citizens wanted to help," said Hutchinson. With the aid of the Stoppage Club, Crimestoppers was born, and a board of directors was chosen.

"The board is made up of private citizens. We have bankers and farmers and some regular business-type people on the board," said Hutchinson.

But while the board members' backgrounds are varied, they have a common interest in catching criminals.

Once a case which was assisted by a Crimestopper's tip is solved, the board decides how much money the person who gave the tip should receive.

"There's no set fee," said Hutchinson. He said the maximum reward the board would likely pay is \$1,000. That amount might go to someone who gave a tip which helped solve a homicide.

The Crimestoppers line, which is manned 24 hours a day, is fund-

ed through the aid of private donors and an annual dinner, which is scheduled next on Nov. 4 at the Rupert Elks Club.

In order to gain serious attention, callers need to have specific information.

"They need to have more than to say, 'I think my neighbor is selling drugs,'" said Hutchinson. "They need to have seen or heard something very specific."

And while sometimes, a Crimestopper's tip doesn't give police enough information to make an immediate arrest or to gain a search warrant, it gives officers somewhere to start, said Hutchinson.

The Crimestoppers' telephone number is 678-2900 in Cassia County and 436-5353 in Minidoka County.

Since Crimestoppers began, over \$250,000 worth of property has been recovered. One big recovery came last winter, when \$100,000 worth of copper wire was recovered through a Crimestopper's tip, said Hutchinson.

Wire was being stolen from irrigation pumps and being sold as scrap.

Minidoka County property taxes likely to climb

RUPERT - Property taxes in Minidoka County will rise an average of 3.2 percent during the next year if county commissioners approve the 1992-93 budget that is before them.

Commissioners will act on the budget during their next meeting at 9 a.m. Monday at the county courthouse.

County Clerk Duane Smith said that under the proposed budget, residential, commercial, industrial and agricultural taxes throughout the county would increase an average of 3.2 percent.

The tax increase would be necessary by a proposed 4.6 percent in-

crease in the county's expenditures when compared to the 1991-92 budget, Smith said.

Although the county's total property valuation rose from \$398.1 million last year to \$403.3 million this year, that increase was not enough to generate the additional tax revenue needed to cover the increase in county expenditures, he said.

Actually, under the proposal, the county's total operating budget for 1992-93 would be \$4.7 million - about \$300,000 less than last year's.

But Smith said that comparison is deceptive because last year's figure includes \$514,800 that went toward the construction of the Mini-Cassia Ju-

venile Detention Center.

The county's single-largest expense is the justice fund at \$1.6 million, which includes district court salaries, jail operations, the prosecutor's and public defender's offices, the sheriff's department, city of Paul law enforcement, and operating the juvenile detention center and juvenile probation office.

Tuesday, commissioners held a state-mandated Truth in Taxation meeting to present the budget, then conducted a public hearing to gather input from county residents.

Two people addressed commissioners to ask questions they had concerning the budget, Smith said.

Cassia County Courthouse to be remodeled

BURLLEY - The Cassia County Courthouse will undergo some changes as commissioners set aside funds to remodel the building and upgrade the elevator in their 1992-93 fiscal year.

Remodeling is scheduled to take place and a few offices moved, which will free up some area, according to county administrator Jim Hurst.

The health department will be moved to the nearby Law Enforcement Building in the space previously occupied by the county jail. The jail was consequently dismantled with the building of the Mini-Cassia Criminal Justice Center.

The space presently used by the health department in the basement of the courthouse will be remodeled into a meeting room for county commissioners.

"That way we wouldn't be up the district courtroom," said Hurst. When commissioners hold a meeting in a large crowd of people are expected to attend, they presently often need to schedule the use of the larger district courtroom.

One of the biggest expenses will be upgrading the courthouse elevator.

Because of the American Disabilities Act, which took effect in July, new controls will be needed on the elevator, as well as a new braking system.

The upgrades could cost anywhere from \$50,000 to \$100,000, said Hurst.

To pay for the project, \$204,700 has been included in the proposed budget for next year.

Hurst said no date has been set for the remodeling to begin.

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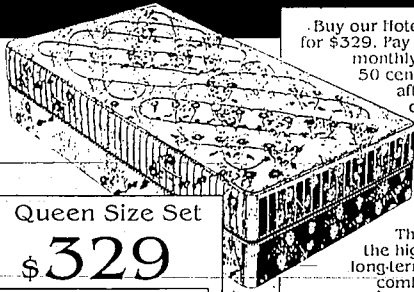

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Tribes bombard media with anti-gambling amendment ads

The Alliance of Idaho Tribes is putting together a television advertising campaign to turn voters away from the state-referenced constitutional amendment banning casino gambling.

Submission of the amendment on the Nov. 3 ballot was triggered by the decision of several tribes to pursue casino-style gambling on their reservations as allowed under the 1988 federal Indian Gaming Regulatory Act.

Tribal leaders hope filming on the three ads will be completed this week. They are

being produced by Greg Licht Productions of Pocatello.

Alliance Chairman Eric Stensgar of the Coeur d'Alene Tribe said the money from the coalition will defray only a small portion of the television production costs and distribution costs that could hit \$100,000. The ads will be aired beginning next month if the cash is available.

Stensgar said the spots were needed to counter negative information about Indian gaming.

"I feel like information isn't being presented to Idaho voters," he said.

"We think we need to tell that story from

our perspective."

Gov. Cecil Andrus and the legislative and civic leaders backing the amendment have contended it is needed to close unintended loopholes in the 1988 state Lottery amendment to the constitution. But tribal leaders argue the sole point is to block reservation casinos — one of the few remaining economic development tools they claim to have.

They claim the amendment attacks tribal self-determination, curbs a needed revenue source, violates federal law, interferes with state and tribal gaming negotiations and unfairly targets reservations.

Officials said there is no government advertising campaign planned to support the amendment, but anti-gambling forces, led by Boise attorney Stanley C. Crow, indicated they would join the media battle if they can raise enough money.

Elsewhere, Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne officially began his 53-day unpaid leave of absence Thursday to campaign full time for the U.S. Senate. City Council President Sara Baker took over the reins of the city while Kempthorne focuses on Democratic Congressman Richard Stidings in the race for the seat of retiring GOP Sen. Steve Symms.

But Kempthorne remained available to help on any municipal matters if needed.

Republican congressional hopeful Rachel Gilbert looked to Friday's fund-raiser with Republican Congressman Frank Riggs of California, who faced off last spring with her opponent in a nationally televised debate over the handling of the House banking scandal.

Gilbert, a former state senator from Boise, claimed Riggs would offer another view of Idaho freshman Democratic Congressman Larry LaRocco — a view she says will bolster her chances of an upset over LaRocco this fall.

Bookstore owner sentenced to 6 months

BOISE — A Garden City bookstore owner has been sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$600 for selling obscene material.

Lamar Larsen, 38, will remain free pending an appeal, Ada County Magistrate Terry McDaniel said Wednesday. Clerk at Larsen's Over 19 adult store also was sentenced to six months in jail.

"If I let them close the store and I fold, I'd be letting down the written press, the electronic press, the libraries," Larsen said afterward. "Once you let a crack in the armor, the whole country will fold."

Police raided his Garden City store three times in 10 days late last year. The first raid resulted in Larsen being found guilty of violating prohibition from an April 1991 conviction for selling obscenity.

Group: Management plan harms river

BOISE — Idaho Rivers United contends a management plan being drafted by the state could threaten the Middle and North forks of the Boise River.

The Idaho Department of Water Resources plan would allow a dam to be built at Twin Springs on the Middle Fork, Idaho Rivers United's Marti Bridges said Wednesday.

"If built, it would back up water into the Middle and North forks, flooding out miles of river," she said.

Water Resources spokesman Bill Graham said although the plan would allow a dam to be built, no one is considering building such a dam and he doubts one would ever be built.

Latah County OKs budget minus levy

MOSCOW — Idaho 2nd District Judge John Bengtson will not be the first judge in Latah County history to preside over a property tax levy for the court.

The county commissioners approved the 1993 budget without the court levy they had originally set. Bengtson asked them last week to avoid the district court levy.

The commissioners shifted court-appointed lawyer expenses to bring the court expenses below anticipated revenue. The court is self-sufficient with revenue from fines and fees it imposes.

But the overall budget also includes a 5.5 percent property tax hike for county residents.

Sandpoint mayor fined \$500 in dispute

SANDPOINT — Sandpoint Mayor Dwight Shettler has been fined \$500 and will not act as a public accountant for a short time, the Idaho State Board of Accountancy says.

Shettler, who is CPA, said the disciplinary action was taken after a misunderstanding arose over the amount of hours he spent in continuing education in 1990 to keep his accountant status.

The state board wrote: "On March 26, 1992, Mr. Shettler acknowledged and signed a stipulation for consent that stated: Mr. Shettler agrees to cease and desist from practicing public accounting and refrain from holding himself out to practice public accounting until his license is renewed."

Bannock family receives water filter

POCATELLO — A Bannock County family will receive a filter to rid their drinking water of solvents.

The county is installing the filter for Blaine and Kim Thomas, who live about 200 yards downhill from the Fort Hall Mine Road landfill.

"It's our position that we attack this thing right away before it gets to anybody else's well," county Commissioner John Carlson said. "We want to get it fixed immediately."

The county recently tested seven private wells near the dump, after finding high levels of cleaning solvents in some of its monitoring wells.

EchoHawk issues scam warnings

BOISE (AP) — Attorney General Larry EchoHawk is launching a radio and television advertising campaign to alert consumers, especially senior citizens, about the scams they face every day.

Although the state's consumer protection unit has managed to recover more than \$500,000 for victims of fraud and deception, EchoHawk said on Thursday that an educated consumer is the best protection against court actions.

"The first and best line of defense against fraud is an informed consumer," he said. "It's great when we can help someone get their money back, but it's even better if we can keep them from losing it in the first place. That's what this program is aimed at."

Idaho officials of the American Association of Retired People estimate consumers are fleeced of more than \$1 million a year in the state.

In addition, EchoHawk's office released its first "Bayer Beware" list of businesses with serious consumer complaints against them and no record of cooperating with the attorney general's office to resolve the complaints.

Sixteen businesses made the initial list, and they will be removed only after arrangements are made with the state to improve business practices.

Weaver attorney visits standoff site, looks for clues to aid defense

SANDPOINT — The lawyer for fugitive Randy Weaver, whose 11-day standoff with federal agents led to the deaths of his wife, son and a U.S. marshal, toured Weaver's property, searching for clues that might aid in the white supremacist's defense.

"I'm doing what any good defense lawyer should — come to the scene to see what is going on and understand it," Gerry Spence said Wednesday as he hiked around Weaver's mountaintop cabin near this north Idaho town.

"There is nothing much to do up here but get a sense of the lay of the land," Spence said. "Everything we see is second hand. All the critical evidence has been taken into custody and there has been no effort to provide us with the same clear chance to understand the evidence the federal government has."

Spence claimed some evidence had been changed, but would not elaborate.

The famed Wyoming lawyer, who

has defended former Philippines first lady Imelda Marcos among others, was accompanied by two Boise attorneys, Charles Peterson and Gerry Gilman.

Weaver faces charges of selling two illegal sawed-off shotguns to a government informer and one charge of assault on a federal officer.

The assault charge stems from the standoff between federal agents and Weaver, his family and family friend Kevin Harris.

The standoff began Aug. 21 when a shootout killed Deputy U.S. Marshal William Degant, 42, and Weaver's 14-year-old son, Samuel.

Weaver's wife, Vicki, was killed in shooting the next day, while Weaver and Harris were wounded. Harris is charged with killing Degant.

Degant had gone to the Weaver cabin to gather evidence after Weaver failed to appear for trial on the weapons charges last year.

The standoff ended when Weaver and his three daughters, who are now with relatives, surrendered Aug. 31.

The Weavers were adherents of the Christian Identity church, which preaches separation of the races.

Spence took photographs of a hole through a shed where Weaver was shot and spoke briefly with two FBI agents from Boise who were still gathering evidence.

Spence talked for an hour with a detective from the Boundary County sheriff's department, who showed him where Degant and Samuel Weaver were shot.

"The overwhelming feeling I have here is sadness," Gilman said. "I think that three people are dead over a missed court date seems incredibly wrong and sad."

Spence said it was difficult to classify the cabin as a fortress.

"It's just a cabin in the woods," Spence said. The only color in the "whole dismal scene" were flowers the family had planted and a purple toilet seat that lay on the ground near where agents smashed an outhouse with an armored personnel carrier.

Latah County officials accept deputies union

MOSCOW (AP) — The Latah County commissioners have unanimously agreed to recognize a sheriff deputies' union, the first of its kind in Idaho.

It also has the support of Sheriff Ken Buxton.

"The recognition is a giant step because you have to have recognition before you can do anything else," Sgt. Chip Whiteley said. He represents the 38 full-time deputies who have signed commitment cards for union recognition.

The union, most likely Service Employees International Union AFL-CIO Local 6 of Spokane, will bargain with the commissioners only on salary issues.

Latah County Prosecutor Craig Mosman issued a memo to the commissioners urging them to only recognize the union "solely on the issue of wages."

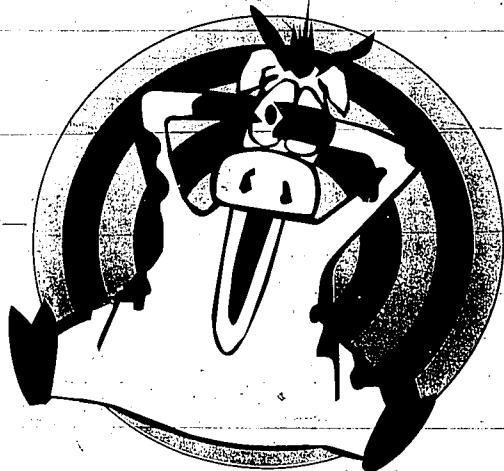
According to the Idaho Constitution, the commissioners can set salaries, but they do not negotiate over the working conditions in the sheriff's office. That responsibility remains with Buxton.

Buxton said he supports the union.

"For working conditions, they must deal with me," he said. "We have that understanding ... I feel the memo, as presented, is appropriate."

Before approving the measure, Commissioner Nancy Johnson voiced concern over the possibility of a strike.

Emergency levy shouldn't be excuse for budget boost

Two months before a tax-limitation election is a supremely dumb time for elected officials to become cavalier about raising taxes.

But that's what the Twin Falls School Board did this week.

Under the guise of reacting to an enrollment increase, the board boosted the school district budget by \$300,000. Local property taxes will rise accordingly.

The decision was legal under a state law that is intended to protect schools from unexpected growth. The law says if early September's attendance is up from last year, the district can declare an emergency property tax levy.

Several Magic Valley school districts are in that position this year, and they either have approved levies already or are about to. (Jerome is a happy exception, despite an increase of 105 students, the board there declined to raise taxes.)

In most of the districts that will impose emergency levies, the money will go for additional teachers and supplies for the extra students, as the legislature intended.

But at least one case — Twin Falls — the money will pay for a general shopping list: graduation expenses, detention monitors, staff training, computer software, public relations.

Most of these items are familiar. They were in the school district's budget proposal earlier this summer. The board cut them out in June; when state support came up short.

In other words, although the expenses were probably worthwhile, the board regarded them as among the most expendable items in the budget. Now, three months later, these expendable items have been elevated to the status of "emergency."

In their meeting on Tuesday, board members did their best to characterize the expenses as being related to the district's 147 additional students. In truth, however, school officials simply capitalized on an opportunity to grab some more money.

If the goal truly had been to compensate for the influx of students, the district would be hiring five or six full-time teachers. Instead, it is hiring only two, plus two part-timers.)

Worse yet, taxpayers were given no chance to object before the levy was approved. Officials counted students' noses, held a special meeting, and that was that.

To be fair, the emergency levy won't bankrupt Twin Falls property owners. It will cost homeowners only a few dollars each.

But this kind of arbitrary tax increase is even if it's small — infatuates taxpayers. It likely will fuel support for the misguided and damaging 1 Percent Initiative that will appear on the Nov. 3 ballot.

Emergency levies are an important safety valve for school districts. But if boards twist the law's intent, they have little room to complain if taxpayers strike back.

The scene shall not be disturbed until authorization is given by the law enforcement officer conducting the investigation. The coroner gathers information from the law enforcement agency and passes on that information.

Some of us that are in the law enforcement field take exception to Mr. Edwards' 12 years of experience. I guess I've been changing light bulbs in my house for the past 20 years, does that make me an electrician?

The dream of becoming the sheriff does not substitute for experience. There is no mention in his brochure about his Idaho Police Officers Standard of Training certificate. This is a necessary certificate, which must be current to be a police officer in Idaho.

I urge the voters of Twin Falls County to read about and study the qualifications of all the candidates for the office of sheriff, the top law enforcement officer in the county.

Doubts about Clinton could hurt his chances

Bill Clinton faces two obstacles on the road to the presidency: lingering doubts about the person he is and lingering doubts about the party he represents.

The two questions are not so separate as they may seem. Clinton's integrity, under-recognized asset from the Republicans, will become part and parcel of the question of the party he represents.

Is Clinton the leader of a tough, bold new Democratic Party, circa 1992, or does he sometimes just talk that way in order to sneak into office the Democratic Party of 1972?

The latter possibility worries some of his friends and delimits his enemies. It sometimes seems as if the Democrats' generational fault line runs right through Clinton. One week he sounds like Hubert Humphrey, preaching the party's protection of government benefits to a group of little old ladies. The next week he sounds like Gary Hart, promising to create high-tech, globally competitive manufacturing jobs.

At critical points in his campaign, Clinton has made the most progress when he has opted for the non-traditional. In late 1991, Clinton leaped over his rivals on the strength and freshness of ideas contained in three critical Georgetown University speeches.

This summer the movement from third place to first place began with the non-traditional choice of a running mate. As he kicked off the fall campaign this week, Clinton again seemed to opt for the non-traditional. He told reporters that he would demonstrate that he was a "different kind of Democrat," someone who could create a "third way" beyond the old left-right, liberal-conservative distinctions, and he followed up with a tough welfare speech Wednesday.

But the third way is often lost in the course of campaigning as Clinton articulates the easy parts while smoothing over the tough parts. For instance, the third way rests on a real commitment to private-sector growth in a global economy.

Clinton's strength is in the perception that he has a strategy for growth in this new economic world. But his weakness is the perception that he is wavering in support of the North American Free Trade Agreement out of a desire to please the protectionist forces within his own party.

The second dominant theme of the third way rests on the concept of reciprocal obligation between the citizen and the government. When talking about this, Clinton can evoke memories of John Kennedy asking us to ask what we can do for our country.

Yet, as often as not, when Clinton talks about national service in exchange for college tuition, for example, it ends up

sounding like another big government program.

National service should represent a movement away from the politics of entitlement and toward a politics whereby all government benefits, from education to welfare, are contingent on the recipient giving something back.

But arguably the most important part of this third way rests on the reinvention of government. Government employees who support Clinton don't like the word "reinventing" because inherent in the concept are productivity goals and imperatives that they fear could reduce their numbers.

So Clinton prefers to talk about revolutionizing not reinventing government. In so doing, he takes the easy-pat — bashing bureaucracies and lobbyists and promising to cut 100,000 federal jobs.

But he shuns the difficult parts: the adoption of productivity standards in government and the provision of choice, in everything from education to social services, for citizens.

The tendency to paper over the differences between the old and new Democratic Party is natural. But to win a race that promises to get closer and closer, it's not enough to disparage George Bush's leadership.

Clinton has to demonstrate his own leadership by showing that he has the toughness to change the party. Nothing else will more effectively end the lingering doubts about him.

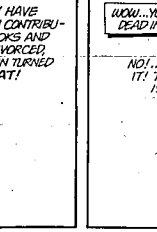
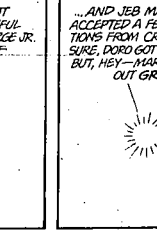
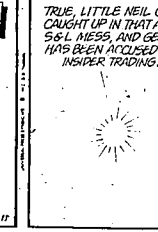

Russia to release KAL jet information

MOSCOW — President Boris Yeltsin said Thursday his government will give South Korea material related to the downing of a KAL jetliner over then-Soviet territory in 1983.

Yeltsin made the pledge during a phone conversation with Korean President Roh Tae Woo on Thursday, Russian presidential spokesman Anatoly Krasnov said.

It was not immediately clear whether the material contains parts of the downed plane's flight recorders, which were reportedly found by Soviet search teams.

The Korean airliner, a Boeing 747, was shot down Sept. 1, 1983, off Sakhalin Island after it strayed inside Soviet airspace during a flight from New York to Seoul via Anchorage. All 269 people aboard KAL Flight 007 were killed.

English royalty snubs photographers

LONDON — Seven photographers and a cameraman who secretly shot pictures of Princess Diana lolling about a pool on a trip to Egypt in May were not invited to cover her upcoming visit to South Korea.

The frenzied photos of Diana in a bathing suit were widely used in British newspapers, annoying officials who said they detracted from the serious nature of the tour.

Diplomats show resolve over Bosnia

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina — The chief European and U.N. negotiators on the breakup of Yugoslavia pledged Thursday to end war in Bosnia even as battles raged around the capital.

The Bosnian government, meanwhile, claimed Serb forces were moving artillery to their headquarters east of Sarajevo to hide it from U.N. inspectors charged with monitoring heavy weapons.

"Slowly, persistently, patiently, we will end this," said Lord Owen, the European Community's chief peace negotiator, after arriving in an armored personnel carrier wearing a flak jacket and helmet.

He and Cyrus Vance, the U.N.'s special envoy, met for an hour with Bosnia's Muslim President Alija Izetbegovic and were to meet the leader of Bosnia's Serbs, Radovan Karadzic, later in the day.

OAS to investigate rights in Haiti

PETIONVILLE, Haiti — The government has agreed to let the Organization of American States send an 18-member team to investigate reports of human rights abuses and political repression, state radio reported Thursday.

By granting permission to the OAS observer team, the government apparently hopes to ease a hemisphere-wide trade embargo imposed after the military overthrow elected President Jean-Bertrand Aristide in September 1991.

Radio Nationale said the decision was announced at a meeting Wednesday night by Foreign Minister Francois Benoit. Benoit insisted the observers were not part of an OAS civilian peacekeeping mission authorized in principle seven months ago, but Aristide supporters predicted they would form the core of a peacekeeping group.

Russian faction claims island victory

MOSCOW — Russian nationalists claimed victory Thursday over President Boris Yeltsin's decision to postpone a trip to Japan, and claimed they are winning ground in their battle against his market reforms.

"This is a victory for the patriotic forces," said Viktor Alksnis, an Air Force colonel who rose to prominence last year as an advocate of force to prevent the disintegration of the Soviet Union.

Yeltsin, due to leave Sunday for Tokyo, called off the trip on Wednesday as popular outrage grew over reports he planned to honor a 1956 agreement to give Japan two of four disputed Kuril Islands occupied by Soviet forces at the end of World War II. The dispute over the islands — known in Japan as the Northern Territories — has prevented the two nations from formally concluding hostilities.

German courts convicts attackers

ROSTOCK, Germany — A court on Thursday handed down the first convictions of rightists involved in attacks against refugee centers the past three weeks.

Prosecutor Martin Slotny said the government wanted speedy trials to show its "firm will to deal rigorously with violence."

The Rostock district court convicted two youths of disturbing the peace. One — described as a "skinhead" from Dresden — was sentenced to nine months in prison and the other was given a year's probation. The youths, who were tried as juveniles, were not identified by age or name. Slotny said he was appealing the lighter sentence, which he considered too lenient.

Mandela resigns post over letters

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — Winnie Mandela, the estranged wife of ANC leader Nelson Mandela, resigned her posts in the black organization Thursday after the publication of a love letter she allegedly wrote to a man half her age.

In the letter printed Sunday in the South African press, Mrs. Mandela allegedly told Dali Mpofu she feared an investigation into misuse of funds from the ANC's social welfare department, which she once headed. On Thursday, Mrs. Mandela said vicious gossip forced her to leave her posts in the African National Congress, but she denied any wrongdoing. "We have not been without enemies, be it inside or outside our ranks," she said in a statement.

Settlers' fears abound as peace talks progress

ALONEI HABASHAN, Golan Heights (AP) — Thirty new cottages sit shuttered and empty on a windswept hillside — a ghost village in the making.

No one is eager to move in to homes that stand a few hundred yards from the Israeli-Syrian boundary, on land whose future has been plunged into doubt by the Syrian-Israeli peace talks.

The red-roofed cottages were supposed to more than double the population of the Alonei Habashan cooperative farm, in line with a broad consensus that the Golan is inseparable from Israel.

But since then Syria has begun for the first time to negotiate peace with Israel. A new Israeli government is in power, talking territorial compromise. And many of the 12,000 Israelis living on the Golan Heights feel betrayed. Were it not for the peace talks, "we would have a lot of trouble settling people here," says Tami Atia, 27, general secretary of Alonei Habashan. "Maybe it wouldn't be 30 families right away, but it wouldn't be such a problem to settle all the units. Now, we have 30 empty homes."

Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin said Thursday that Israel can't make peace with Syria without returning land. He refused to pledge that the 32 Golan settlements would not be dismantled, and said they contributed little to Israel's security.

That represents a profound change in Israeli thinking. From the day Israel captured the Golan in the 1967 Mideast war — with Rabin as military chief of staff — it was an article of faith among Israelis that the 454-square-mile plateau overlooking northern Israel was a strategic asset too narrow to allow even a small withdrawal.

It was the Labor party, now led by Rabin, that sent the first settlers to the Golan, while the right-wing Likud government cemented the bond by an effect annexing the Golan in 1981.

Syria was regarded then as an implacable foe, heavily armed by the Soviet Union, and the feeling was that the future of the Golan would never reach the negotiating table.

But the Soviet Union is gone. Iraqi missiles falling on Tel Aviv have diminished the sense of security Israelis derive from territory. And Syria's stated willingness to reach peace with Israel is seen by some Israelis as historic change. "One fact is beyond doubt: most of the Israeli public has abandoned its oath of allegiance to the Golan Heights," the daily Maariv recently editorialized.

The settlers have the backing of a strong anti-withdrawal lobby in Parliament, led by Likud legislators, but also includes members of Rabin's Labor party. They also point to Golan's rich water resources.

But Israelis make no biblical claim to the Golan, and surveys indicate that support for a territorial compromise has risen from five to 45 percent over five years.

Even leaders of communities in northern Israel — targets of heavy Syrian shelling from the Golan before 1967 — declared recently they back a land-for-peace deal.

People like Mrs. Atia say they settled in the Golan because they believed they would never be moved.

"This is my home. We had children here, we planted trees here," Mrs. Atia said of the neat cluster of two dozen garden cottages whose residents grow cherries, apples and grapes. "Now it is becoming clear to everyone that we would be the first ones to be evacuated."

Rabin pledges territory to Syria for real peace

JERUSALEM (AP) — Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin said explicitly for the first time Thursday that Israel was prepared to return some of the Golan Heights to Syria in exchange for peace.

In return for a treaty that includes diplomatic relations and open borders, "Israel is ready to implement U.N. Security Council resolutions 242 and 338 ... and this means a readiness for some sort of territorial compromise," Rabin said in an Israeli radio.

Israel captured the Golan Heights in the 1967 Middle East war, and annexed the region in 1981.

The remarks came during a break in the sixth round of Middle East talks. Israeli officials said Syria has presented them with positions containing signs of common ground.

Rabin said that although Syria has demonstrated a "substantive change" in its position, it did not go far enough.

"So far, Syria is speaking of a peace agreement as opposed to a treaty, without the elements of normalization, without open borders, diplomatic relations and embassies," he said.

"As long as Syria will not say it is ready for this kind of peace we have

not entered, we will not enter into any territorial topics, we will not draw maps or lines," Rabin said, adding that any withdrawal would be "limited."

Foreign Minister Shimon Peres said chances for peace with Syria were unprecedented following the latest round of peace talks.

"It's the first time that there's been a real exchange of opinions between the Syrians and ourselves. It's without precedent. In the 44 years that Israel has existed, never have we known 10 such days with the Syrians, with dialogues and exchange of documents," Peres said in Paris, where he was on a three-day visit.

Israeli hard-liners have accused Rabin of setting in motion a process that would end with the return of the entire Golan Heights, a 556-square-mile plateau overlooking the Sea of Galilee.

Some of the 12,000 Israelis living in 32 settlements on the Golan reacted angrily Thursday to Rabin's assertions. "We have no doubt that Rabin defrauded us, his voters, everyone who supported labor in saying that the settlements of the Golan Heights would not be harmed," settler leader Eli Malka told Israeli radio.

In Ciskei homeland, leader rules by force

BISHO, South Africa (AP) — The Ciskei nation, non-existent to nearly everyone except the Ciskei and South African governments.

There is no passport control, no customs post, not even a yellow line across the road at the border where at least 24 African National Congress marchers were killed Monday by Ciskei security forces.

The only sign of nationhood is the sprawling government compound from which Brig. Gen. Oupo Gqozo, 40, rules over about 850,000 people crammed into the small territory.

Virtually everything that passes through the halls of government must be approved personally by Gqozo, even a request for a list of his Cabinet, which includes several white South Africans.

Ciskei, a barren patch of land in the southeast of South Africa, became nominally independent in 1982. Like the nine other black homelands created by Pretoria under apartheid to give blacks separate

nations, Ciskei's nationhood has been ignored by the rest of the world and opposed by the ANC, the main black opposition movement.

The ANC considers the homelands offspring of apartheid and their governments puppets of the white South African government.

In the wake of the killings, the ANC says Gqozo is an obstacle to further negotiations with the South African government and must go.

The ANC mounted the march to

call for Gqozo's removal.

But the slender, impeccably brooded brigadier, who cruses his tiny capital in a jet-black, bulletproof Land Rover, appeared determined to remain in power.

"I like a challenge — I love a challenge," he said Wednesday at his first news conference since the shootings.

Gqozo was a prison warden and physical education instructor in South Africa before joining that country's defense forces in 1977. He became a military instructor in Ciskei in 1982, the same year Ciskei became independent, rising rapidly in its small army.

He seized power in a military coup in 1990, ousting President Lennox Sebe's authoritarian government. At

first he was an ally of ANC leader Nelson Mandela.

But Gqozo soon turned against the ANC. He backed off returning Ciskei to South Africa, saying the ANC wants to impose a Communist dictatorship.

Many Ciskei residents scoff at Gqozo's claims they're better off under his rule.

Ciskei is desperately poor and many people are forced to go to South Africa as migrant workers to support large families in the homeland.

"Gqozo pretends to be democratic, but he's a fascist," Sibusiso Ngwenya, a teacher, said bitterly as he stood with hundreds of other protesters at a vigil for the shooting victims.

Winged, gilled passengers ready for shuttle flight

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Scientists from around the world Thursday fussed over space shuttle Endeavour's winged, web-tooled and gilled passengers as NASA's countdown clocks ticked toward a weekend liftoff.

The laboratory research mission, due to begin at 10:23 a.m. Saturday, is a joint venture between NASA and Japan's space agency.

Besides seven astronauts, including the first married couple in space, Endeavour will carry 180 Oriental hornets, 7,600 fruit flies, four South African clawed

frogs, two Japanese carp and 30 fertilized chicken eggs.

Israeli entomologist Jacob Ishay carefully sifted through about 2,000 hornets — all female workers, no queens — in preparation of Friday's loading of animals into the shuttle. He chose those that laid the most eggs and were neat about doing it.

"I look at the family, whether it's a nice family, a clean family," Ishay said. "If they can take care of themselves here it means they will be able to do it in space."

The winners were 60 adults, or those

more than 3 days old; 60 juveniles, or those just hours to 3 days old; and 60 in the pupa stage.

Ishay, a pharmacology professor at Tel Aviv University, spent much of July and August scouring fields near Tel Aviv and the Dead Sea for hornet nests. He was lucky — he was stung only a few times.

He gathered the hornets, nests and all, just before flying to the United States on Aug. 31.

"I wanted them to be fresh," he explained. Half the 180 hornets will be kept in

darkness during the seven-day Spacelab flight. The other half will be exposed to 12 hours of light and 12 hours of darkness each day.

Ishay wants to see whether, in the absence of gravity, the hornets build their nests toward light or rely on the shape of the container. There are spherical, cylindrical and cube-shaped containers; each holds 10 hornets. On Earth, hornets build their combs toward gravity.

Ishay is eager to see whether the hornets build smaller combs in weightless conditions.

Kerrey defends Clinton

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Bob Kerrey, a Vietnam War hero, rose Thursday in an emotional defense of Bill Clinton's draft record and accused President Bush of a callous attempt to reopen wounds he had promised to save.

The Nebraska Democrat, a former Navy Seal who lost his right leg below the knee and holds the Congressional Medal of Honor, reminded the Senate that Bush had pledged upon taking office to help the nation get past lingering divisions over the conflict.

"Now, when the ... smell of political blood is in the air, you abandon your earlier and correct intention," Kerrey said.

Kerrey delivered his poignant address in the wake of a days-long attack by Republicans calling for the Arkansas governor to "come clean" on the draft.

BCCI case initial trial in New York

WASHINGTON (AP) — Washington insider Clark Clifford lost his bid Thursday to face narrow federal charges here in the BCCI scandal before standing trial on broader charges in New York state.

U.S. District Judge Joyce Hens Green granted a request by federal and state prosecutors to postpone a federal fraud case against Clifford and his law partner Robert Altman until after their New York trial, set to begin Jan. 4.

But, in another move that could excise Clifford from both trials, she appointed a court-appointed to examine the 85-year-old Clifford, as well as the Justice Department had requested.

Clifford, a former defense secretary and adviser to Democratic presidents, and Altman, his 45-year-old protégé, have pleaded innocent to all charges.

They now will not face the federal charges before March, and the federal case may even be dismissed.

The more serious New York charges against the two include accepting \$40 million in bribes from the foreign-owned Bank of Credit and Commerce International. Clifford and Altman were attorneys for BCCI and one of the U.S. banks it secretly owned, First American Bankshares Inc. of Washington.

Clifford has said he wants to stand trial to clear his name, but only on the narrower federal charges. His lawyers have argued that Clifford, who lives in Washington, has a heart condition and would be given a "death sentence" if he faced trial in New York and was unable to sleep in his own bed.

Doctors have said that Clifford had a heart attack in 1977 and could suffer a possibly fatal attack from the stress of a trial.

Federal and New York state prosecutors said last week that, depending on the court-appointed doctor's assessment, they may decide to excuse Clifford from facing trial.

Altman, who was indicted with Clifford in late July, would still go on trial.

Polio fading out in hemisphere

ATLANTA (AP) — The last case of polio in the Western Hemisphere was reported more than a year ago, a sign the disease is being wiped out in the Americas, federal officials said Thursday.

The last case was reported Aug. 23, 1991, in Peru. It's the first time since polio has been monitored in the Western Hemisphere that there hasn't been a case reported for a full year, the federal Centers for Disease Control said.

The Pan American Health Organization, which began a polio eradication and monitoring program in 1985, planned to announce the findings today in Washington.

Pro-repository rally pushes jobs

LAS VEGAS (AP) — A study committee is urging Nevada to negotiate on a nuclear waste dump, saying it could take up the economic slack caused by a decline in nuclear testing.

Members of the Nevada Nuclear Waste Study Committee staged a rally here Wednesday to urge negotiations on the repository, which the Energy Department wants to build at Yucca Mountain, 100 miles northwest of Las Vegas.

Aftershock finally hits

ST. GEORGE, Utah (AP) — University of Utah seismologists say a long-awaited aftershock hit southern Utah early Thursday.

At 2.7, it was the first aftershock large enough to be felt since a quake of 5.9 on the Richter Scale occurred in the area Sept. 2.

The aftershock was recorded at 12:42 a.m. A few St. George residents felt the tremor, but there were no reports of damage or injuries.

Professional tap dancer Cheryl Johnson says it's as easy to learn a shuffle as it is to learn a chord on the piano. The hard part is learning to play (or dance) an entire composition.

Next week, Johnson will show the Magic Valley what she means, in the first performance of this year's Arts on Tour. Johnson's partner, in dance and in life, is Anthony Peters. They met in New York City in the early '80s and became a duo in Seattle in 1985. Since then, they have married and have christened their act Anacrusis Modern Tap Dance, borrowing the title from a music term meaning upbeat before the downbeat.

"Tap dancing is at an all-time high in the country," said Johnson, in a recent phone interview. "Younger people are getting interested in tap dance and doing all kinds of creative things with it." Johnson, 37, and Peters, 35, specialize in high energy style. The art form, in their possession, nods respectfully to the great tap dances of the past, then zooms into the present to combine the elements of rhythm, jazz, rock and roll, humor, motion and emotion. They work with a four-piece jazz combo.

"For the Twin Falls performance, we will be doing a dance first done by Jimmy Cagney in 'Yankee Doodle Dandy,' our tribute to Hollywood," Johnson said, "but then we will go on to combine modern and rhythm styles into a new tap form."

Johnson and Peters first started shuffling to the tune of the dance parties on TV. "TV dance parties were the early influence for both of us," said Johnson, who once performed on a unicycle in a circus act. The duo's performance credits range from

Publishers' lists of new books read like montage of tabloid topics

Vampires, dinosaurs and dead rock stars. JFK and the CIA. Madonna's erotic secrets. Jesus on live television. No, this isn't a rundown of the latest tabloid headlines but books that soon will appear in stores and libraries near you.

Although publishing has become more of a year-round industry, fall is traditionally the strongest selling season as publishers release their heavy hitters in hopes of scoring big at the holiday cash registers.

This year, with the economy still in a slump and the book market more competitive than ever, publishers

appear to be going all out with attention-getting titles. Even writers with such serious literary reputations as Gore Vidal and D.M. Thomas are flirting with the outrageous.

Vidal's forthcoming novel, "Live from Golgotha," is veiled in secrecy until its publication, but such much of the premise is known: Owing to a breakthrough in computer technology, an NBC crew races into the past to capture — live from the suburb of Golgotha — the Crucifixion, just in time for the fall sweeps.

As for Thomas, the author of "The White Hotel" re-imagines the assassination of John F. Kennedy in his forthcoming novel "Flying Into Love." Kennedy also appears in

fictional form in Michael Korda's September novel, "The Immortals," along with his brother Bobby and Marilyn Monroe.

Non-fiction Kennedy entries include Nigel Hamilton's first installment in a projected three-volume biography, "JFK: Reckless Youth," and E. Fletcher Prouty's conspiracy-theory book "JFK: The CIA, Vietnam and the Plot to Assassinate John F. Kennedy."

The CIA comes up for further examination in Joseph Trento's "The Renegade CIA" and Mark Perry's "Eclipse: The Last Days of the CIA." It's no secret that some authors sell books on the strength of name alone. Among best-selling authors with new offerings this fall are Dick Francis,

Sidney Sheldon, Danielle Steel, Dave Barry, Douglas Adams, Tom Peters, Maeve Binchy, Nelson DeMille, John Bradshaw and Tom Peters. Such literary lights as John Updike, Rosellen Brown, Gloria Naylor, Tom McGuane and William Trevor also have new works.

And speaking of secrets, Madonna reportedly bares all in "Sex," a book of erotic fantasies in words (Madonna's) and photographs by Steven Meisel.

Both Norman Schwarzkopf and Magic Johnson tell their stories in forthcoming books, while subjects for biographies range from writer Stephen Crane and architect Frank Lloyd Wright to actor/iron James Dean. Rocker, Janis Joplin is

remembered in two volumes, including one by her sister Laura Joplin.

Further proof that no one — or no thing — is ever dead and gone when it comes to publishing is James Gurney's lavishly illustrated "Mitotopia," about a world in which humans and dinosaurs live in harmony. Turner Publishing is hoping the book will be another Gnomes, a big hit with the coffee-table set.

And then there is "Vampire: The Complete Guide to the World of the Undead," coming just in time for Halloween, as is Anne Rice's new novel in her best-selling Vampire Chronicles series, "The Tale of the Body Thief." Will readers bite? Time will tell.

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Event marks demise of rock innocence

Never mind the cast of mega-star performers that ranged from Michael Jackson to Elton John to Nirvana. Forget about the award winners that ran the gamut from Van Halen to the Red Hot Chili Peppers to Nirvana. What really made Wednesday's Video Music Awards worth watching was the extent to which it marked MTV's descent into show-biz mediocrity.

This was where rock video truly lost its innocence. We're not talking about innocence in the sexual sense. After all, rock videos have always been home for a whole range of bump-and-grind sexuality, and Wednesday's show was no exception.

From the hunky, bare-chested male dancers who pumped their pees behind En Vogue during "Free Your Mind" to the frenzied gyrations that accompanied the Red Hot Chili Peppers' performance of "Give It Away," there were charming hormones everywhere you looked.

That was to be expected, though. What wasn't expected was the amount of hackneyed award-show behavior between the performance sequences.

It was bad enough to see TV stars like John Corbett ("Northern Exposure") and Sherry Dunsen ("Beverly Hills 90210") in shiny gowns before announcing the Best Director award. But having to watch Anne Lennox and Peter Gabriel read stiffly from cue cards for the Best Group Video award was depressing beyond words.

Where did they think they were, the Grammys? Award-wise, the broadcast was pleasantly broad-based. The evening's biggest winners were Van Halen (whose "Right Now" won Video of the Year, Best Direction and Best Editing), Nirvana (Best Alternative Video and Best New Artist in a Video for "Smells Like Teen Spirit") and the Red Hot Chili Peppers (who won the Viewers' Choice award for "Under the Bridge") and the breakthrough Video and Best Art Direction awards for "Give It Away.")

Eric Clapton's elegant "Tears In Heaven" was voted Best Male Video, Anne Lennox's "Why" gave her Best Female Video, Prince & The New Power Generation won Best Dance for "Cream."

The Best Metal-Hard Rock award was taken by Metallica for "Enter Sandman." Best Group was U2 for "Even Better Than The Real Thing."

Who were the losers? Bobby Brown, for one.

Brought on to perform his current single, "Lumpin' Around," Brown hardly sang at all, barking tenders. But he did have wind enough at song's end to shout, "MTV, peace!" and a profane phrase that was bleated just a tad too late.

He was not the only bleeping star onstage. Van Halen singer Sammy Hagar accepted his group's Video of the Year honors by declaring, "This is really, really," and then adding his appreciation with profanity.

Dave Carvey's debut as host was a mixed blessing overall, since he leaned far too heavily on tired "Saturday Night Live" schtick like the Church Lady, Garth Algar (of "Wayne's World" fame) and his President Bush impression. Far funnier were prepared bits like David Spade's receptionist-from-hell routine (for instance, blandly telling Kingu Starr "I'm sorry, Bingo, but I don't see your name here...").

For most honorees, the best thing about the show was the opportunity to play on live television. Unfortunately, things weren't always as exciting for those of us at home. Although Pearl Jam offered a hard-rocking and heartfelt performance, and the Black Crowes came across as funky and fun, Michael Jackson's obviously pre-taped performance of "Black or White" seemed more Memorex than live, while not even a cameo by Elton John could enliven Guns N' Roses' lurid "November Rain."

What is it about live TV that brings out the worst in rock musicians? Kevin Cadogan, for example, peppered his rendition of "Kathleen," a host of ad-libbed lyrics. Later, after the Red Hot Chili Peppers won the Breakthrough Video award, bassist Flea leaped up onto the podium and gyrated his hips as singer Anthony Kiedis mimed the sort of act not usually seen on prime-time TV.

"This show is officially PG-13," cracked Carvey afterward.

TWIN FALLS — Two award-winning children's book authors who write about everything from zebra walks to chocolate chickens are coming to town next week.

Rosemary Wells' books are included on "best" lists with the School Library Journal, the Book-of-the-Month Club, Junior Literary Guild, the New York Times and American Bookseller. Kevin Henkes' titles can be found among ALA Notable Books, on the School Library Journal Best Book of the Year list, and on Horn Book Fanfare Honor Lists.

Black-oriented films slow climb in '92

HOLLYWOOD—Last year this time, "Boyz n the Hood" was emerging as one of the hottest films of the year, the latest in a wave of movies from African-American filmmakers that included "New Jack City," "Straight Out of Brooklyn" and "Jungle Fever."

But if 1991 was a breakthrough year for black-oriented movies, 1992 has been a comedown so far. Last year, about 20 major films dealing with African-American themes were released out of the roughly 140 films distributed by the major film companies. This year, the number will be half that, while the overall output of the studios will be roughly the same.

Certainly, by the end of the year, Spike Lee's highly anticipated "Malcolm X," starring Denzel Washington as the controversial '60s Black Nationalist leader will be in theaters, as will the South African musical "Sarafina!" starring Whoopi Goldberg.

In addition, "South Central," based on the Donald Baker book "Crips" and directed by John Singleton and produced by Oliver Stone, is due this fall. And, come 1993, the number of African-American-themed movies will swell again.

There are varying opinions among African-American filmmakers about why 1992 has not been a more notable year for films by and about blacks. They range from obstacles for minority filmmakers—in a white-dominated industry to the fact that many of the filmmakers whose films were released in 1991 are busy this year making movies for next year.

"In my view, it's not like Hollywood is losing interest in black movies," said Matty Rich, who directed "Straight Out of Brooklyn."

"The filmmakers from last year are getting ready for next year. The problem is the door is already closing. Those (filmmakers) from last year are in. But it's not open for many newcomers. There can't be too many of us. The system is not designed for us, to be very dominant."

This year's biggest box-office hit by a black filmmaker is the current "Boomerang," which was propelled into production by Eddie Murphy. So far the comedy, directed by Reginald Hudlin and produced by Warrington Hudlin ("Hush" star), has grossed about \$65 million at the box office.

But two earlier black-themed movies this year, "Juice," about inner-city youths who become involved in violence, and "Class Act," which starred the rap duo Kid N Play, proved box-office disappointments. And this summer's "Mo' Money," with Damon and Marlon Wayans of TV's "In Living Color," has done only so business.

Producer Doug McHenry, who with his partner George Jackson made last year's popular "New Jack City" as well as "House Party 2," attributed the small response to "Class Act" to "little black involvement" on the production

side. "It can be argued that the sensibility they brought to the films lacked a correct philosophy on what the target audience (blacks) wanted to see. As a result, blacks didn't support the film."

"I'm not saying a fine filmmaker can't make a fine film about blacks. But the probability is that many of the proven black filmmakers are better able to do that than novice white filmmakers."

McHenry and Jackson say that even with their success, they have run into financing problems at Warner Bros., where their production company is based. "We've been trying to get an answer for a sequel on 'New Jack City'... but I can't explain the holdup," McHenry said.

He said that any film that grossed \$50 million—which is about what "New Jack City" did—is a candidate for a sequel, but that "the same rules don't apply here for us. It's not the same for African-American filmmakers as it is for others. It's clear that despite the success that African-American filmmakers had last year, there aren't the same number left."

Warner Bros. did not respond to requests for comment. McHenry believes part of the problem is that the studio executives "we're selling to... have an insensitivity to the black market. There's also a lack of programs for African-American filmmakers, whereas white filmmakers have a lot more access to more material and distributors and resources."

He contended that the issue actually goes to a "greater issue of institutional racism—why black entrepreneurs don't have access to capital in the first place."

Frank Underwood, who is a partner with his brother, "L.A. Law" cast member Blair Underwood, in Quiet Fury Prods., said, "The door is only open to the black filmmakers, for a short time. We have to rush to get the product in. The last rush was in the late '60s and early '70s. Hollywood is always into trends. And it was trendy then to have black product. It is now again."

With that in mind, the Underwood brothers and Matty Rich are busy planning films.

Rich is working on a script for TriStar Pictures called "The Forty Thieves," about the first black-organized crime family in America, which he hopes to begin shooting next year.

"The project is a much more expansive view than his gritty, sberetous "Straight Out of Brooklyn." But he sees it as part of the need to expand upon the themes in African-American movies. "There are many dimensions to blacks. We've got to go beyond stereotypical images."

Underwood said that he and his brother are planning "in the Blink of an Eye" about four upscale black men in Los Angeles who are racially harassed by officers in the Los Angeles Police Department but that at the moment they don't have a distributor.

Writing team gives 'Sneakers' technical, emotional backbone

Normally, it's impossible to decide multiple screenplay credits, to know who among two or more writers contributed what to a film's final script. But breaking down "Sneakers," a lighthearted caper movie written by Phil Alden Robinson, Lawrence Lasker and Walter F. Parkes, appears to be a cinch.

Lasker and Parkes—the writing team responsible for the technically compelling, emotionally cold hacker drama "WarGames"—no doubt gave "Sneakers" its hardware and its micro-gauge vocabulary. And director Robinson, best known for his magical sleeper "Field of Dreams," gave it its heart and its personality. What ever, the result is an enjoyable bit of software, a feel-good movie for the computer generation.

The title refers to computer hackers who have gone straight and are now security experts who break in to corporate systems to show their clients how easy it is, it's like hiring burglars to show you which win-

dows in your house need bars, except the windows here are buried deep inside microchip memories. Robert Redford, in his first true ensemble film since the 1972 jewelry heist comedy "The Hot Rock," is Martin Bishop, the operational head of a small band of "sneakers" hired by government agents to find a master decoder, an electronic skeleton key that can break into any computer program in the world. Even with a collapsed Soviet Union—and a de-clawed KGB, this little gizmo could do some damage in the wrong hands.

The decoder is nothing more than a plot convenience. Hitchcock's Maguffin, and the espionage angle is the least interesting of all "Sneakers." What makes it so much fun is the assortment of oddballs in Redford's gang and the way the very talented Robinson got the actors to play off of each other.

With the exception of Whistler (David Strathairn), a blind audio

specialist who speed-reads in Braille, the sneakers are all men with dubious pasts. Crease (Sidney Poitier) is an ex-CIA man who left the agency under a dark cloud. Carl (River Phoenix) is a new wave hacker, a kid going to college on a scholarship he earned by breaking into a university computer and awarding it to himself. Mother (Dan Aykroyd) is an ex-con wiretapper with conspiracy theories so far out he makes Oliver Stone sound like an apologist for the Warren Commission.

Bishop's secret, which we learn in the opening flash-back—is that he and a college pal were pioneer hackers back in the '60s, committing criminal computer pranks that sent his friend to prison and turned Bishop into a fugitive. It is the knowledge of Bishop's past that gives the agents the leverage to force him and his gang into working for them. But the question that rushes the movie toward its immensely satisfying finish is, who are they working for?

"Sneakers," rated PG-13, takes its time setting itself up, allowing us to

get to know the gang and Bishop's old girlfriend (Mary McDonnell), who reluctantly joins them. Much of the pleasure is in the writing itself, and Robinson's light touch, evident in his scripts for "All of Me" and "In the Mood" before "Field of Dreams," is all over it. But there are also terrific performances, especially by Strathairn, playing a blind man with unlimited insights, and Aykroyd, with a dead-pan delivery of Mother's uniquely paranoid theories (JFK was not only shot by the CIA, but he lived!).

Seeing Redford divide screen-time with six other actors—Ben Kingsley rounds out the cast, as Bishop's bitter, megalomaniacal old-college friend—reminds us how enjoyable he can be when he doesn't have to carry a movie by himself. Redford is a reactive actor, always better responding to events than leading them, but \$10 million stars don't work in ensemble films.

"Thanks to 'Havana,' said Redford's worst and least seen movie, he's at his best again.

Miss 'Unforgiven' and you'll never forgive yourself

UNFORGIVEN (R), Working at the top of his form as both an actor and a director, Clint Eastwood has turned out a Western for the ages. Simultaneously heroic and nihilistic, reeking of myth but modern as they come, it resonates with the spirit of films past while staking out a territory quite its own. In addition to Eastwood's work,

it features splendid acting from Gene Hackman, Morgan Freeman and Richard Harris, as well as an exceptional revisionist script from David Webb Peoples. Saddle up or get out of the way.

CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS — THE DISCOVERY (PG-13), Let's hope Ridley Scott's "1492" is better than this mega-claptrap starring George Clooney as C.C. and Marlon Brando as Torquemada. (Brando looks like Charles Laughlin-style for

about 10 minutes of screen-time.) Not only is it politically incorrect, it's also humanly incorrect, historically incorrect and cinematically incorrect.

PET SEMATARY II (R), Too gruesome for little kids, too easily laughed off by high schoolers, this imaginative sequel nevertheless expresses perfectly the angst of pubescent junior high school kids—and, on a mythological level, attempts to resolve it. Edward Furlong and Jason McGuire are two unhappy 13-year-olds who test the legend that the dead rise from their graves in an ancient American Indian burial ground in Maine—when McGuire's

beloved dog is killed by his bullying stepfather (Clancy Brown).

HONEYMOON IN VEGAS (PG-13), What if Andrew Bergman ("So Fine," "The Freshman") is funny the way other people think they're funny. He stars Sarah Jessica Parker as the prize between a reluctant boyfriend (Nicolas Cage) and a big-time gambler with a killer instinct (James Caan) who thinks she looks just like his dead wife. Giddily anarchic, daringly absurd and featuring a hoard of Elvis impersonators and twenty of the songs that made the King famous.

State arts commission taking applications from writers

BOISE — The Idaho Commission on the Arts is taking applications from communities throughout Idaho for participation in a two-year program to bring writers and literary opportunities into six selected communities.

The effort, running concurrently in Wyoming, Utah and Idaho, is made possible by a grant to the Western States Arts Federation from the National Endowment for the Arts. The funds will allow communities to work with some of the region's celebrated writers and will make honoraria and group bookings available to Idaho writers.

The design of each program will depend on the interest and creative ideas developed by each community. It may include readings, workshops, children's programs or poetry gatherings.

For the purposes of the project, "community" is being

defined loosely. In Wyoming and Utah, a women's prison "community" will take advantage of the program. Counties and towns may also apply together.

However, requirements state that a "community" selected must have limited access to the arts, participants must be willing to read and become familiar with regional writers and poets, organizers must set up a steering committee made up of a cross-section of people, applicants must demonstrate community interest and organizers must attend a statewide conference.

Applications should be in the form of a letter expressing community interest and commitment and outlining preliminary program ideas. These must be postmarked by Sept. 25.

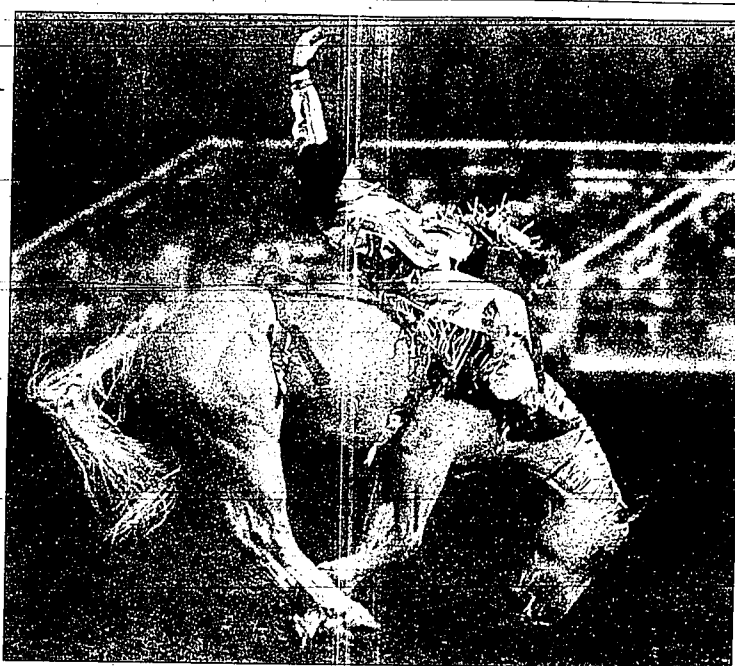

Chang reaches semis in 5-set yawner

NEW YORK — The human backboard, Michael Chang, frustrated Wayne Ferreira in an anticlimactic five-set drama Thursday night to reach the U.S. Open semifinals for the first time.

Simultaneously in the stadium and grandstand after a nearly three-hour rain delay, former champions Stefan Edberg and Ivan Lendl renewed their long Grand Slam rivalry while Chang and Ferreira met in the most important Open match.

Chang, who had never gotten past the fourth round here, beat a taped-up and slightly hobbled Ferreira 7-5, 2-6, 6-3, 6-7 (4-7), 6-1.

Minutes after that match ended, the second deluge of the day drenched the stadium and forced the suspension of the Edberg-Lendl match with Edberg ahead 6-3, 6-3, 3-6, 5-6. Lendl was up a break in the fourth set, serving to tie the match and

send it into a fifth set, when play was stopped at 10:36 p.m.

Edberg, the defending champion and No. 2 seed, had four match points at 5-4 in the fourth as he cut Lendl in on a 0-40 hole on his serve in the 10th game. Lendl refused to yield, though, and crawled back to defeat with an ace. An overhead by Edberg gave him another match point, but Lendl saved it with a service winner on route to holding service.

The ninth-seeded Lendl then returned the favor, getting Edberg down 0-40, but

Edberg couldn't come back the same way. He saved two break points, then pushed a backhand volley wide.

The match was just beginning to develop the drama of the one in the grandstand, and

it wouldn't resume for another hour and 10 minutes. Lendl promptly held service at 40-15 with a blistering forehand crosscourt that almost knocked the racket out of Edberg's hand as he sent it wide. That set up a fifth set starting shortly before midnight, then left the court again with another rain suspension 16 minutes later at 12:02. Edberg leading 2-1 on serve.

Ferreira played from midway in the fourth set with his left thigh heavily taped. He pulled a quadriceps muscle and the trainer was called out during the change at 3-2 with the ace on serve.

It was more bad luck for Ferreira, who sprained his ankle and had to be helped off the same court in a second-round loss to Pete Sampras last year.

Ferreira forced the set to a tie-breaker and went ahead when Chang hit a long return. Chang double-faulted to lose the tie-breaker, then asserted himself from the baseline again.

Committee will aid game's restructuring

ST LOUIS — Baseball owners tentatively moved forward from Jay Vincent's forced resignation, appointing a restructuring committee on Thursday that was equally divided between the former commissioner's supporters and opponents.

Concluding their two-day quarterly meeting, owners also appointed a three-station committee headed by San Diego's Tom Werner to oversee baseball's national broadcast negotiations. In addition, ownership committee chairman Fred Kuhlmann of the St. Louis Cardinals said the St. Petersburg, Fla., group seeking to purchase the San Francisco Giants had restructured, eliminating one or two individuals who did not pass background or security checks. Owners did not address their biggest upcoming question, one being a Dec. 11 deadline: Whether

to reopen their collective bargaining agreement with the Major League Baseball Players Association.

But after a summer of internal bickering, the main focus was on the peace between the factions that had opposed and supported the former commissioner, Bud Selig of the Milwaukee Brewers, elected Wednesday as chairman of the ruling executive council, presided over the joint meeting of the American and National leagues.

"There was no acrimony," said Nelson Doubleday of the New York Mets, a vocal Vincent supporter. "The look was forward, and we don't look back." The restructuring committee called for in last week's no-confidence resolution against Vincent was appointed, and it will be co-chaired by Fred Wilpon of the Mets, who supported the commissioner, and Paul Beeson

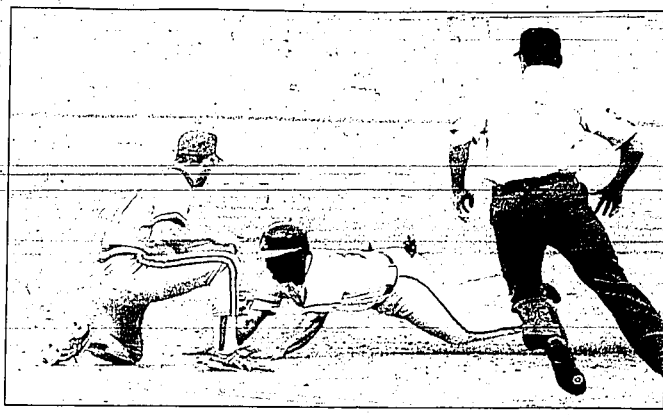

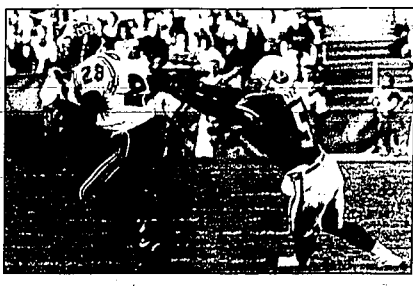

New ISU program suits guard Olson

POCATELLO — For the first time in recent memory, the Idaho State Bengals will take an undefeated record against a non-Boise State team.

"This game won't make or break our year, but a win will be a huge boost to our confidence," said offensive guard Travis Olson.

Olson, the former Valley High School lineman, makes his second career start Saturday against BSU at 6:30 p.m. in Holt Arena.

Olson was an all-state lineman at Valley in 1989-90, cumulating an A-3 offensive lineman of the year in '90 to go with the Vikings' state championship trophy.

He now finds himself starting at left guard on the ISU team that is rebuilding with a new staff.

"I like McNeeley a lot," said the sophomore letterman, referring to first-year head coach Brian McNeeley. "The program is more positive than last year."

Olson responded well to the new atmosphere, sharing offensive team honors with Big Sky player of the week Sly Jones for his part in the Bengals

52-17 win over Mesa State.

"Traves played very well," said McNeeley. "He had the highest offensive line grade and adapted well to all the defensive fronts they (Mesa State) showed."

Olson doesn't overpower his opponents like some offensive linemen; he relies on technique and athletic ability.

"Last year we didn't trap, it was all pass blocking," said the 6-foot 4-inch, 245-pounder. "I came from a high school where we trapped a lot, and this year we trap a lot more."

The change from former ISU head coach Garth Hall's passing game to McNeeley's high-powered running attack has suited Olson well.

"In high school, we ran some of the same plays we ran here; they're even called the same thing," he said. "I kind of laughed when I heard them."

Olson and his Bengal teammates will have to execute those plays in perfection against BSU on Saturday, a fact that doesn't escape the young lineman.

"Boise had to show all their stuff (35-20 loss to the UC-Chattanooga)," he said. "They showed both their defenses and our offense works really well against both of them."

With only two seniors on the offensive line charts, Olson will be the elder statesman next season.

"We're so young, we'll only get bigger and better," he said.

Olson sees this Bengal squad as the team that will lay the foundation for the Bengal squads of the future.

"I don't see any reason why we can't compete for the conference title in my three years left," said the smiling Olson.

During this time, a successful football career will go hand-in-hand with the education Olson is receiving. He plans to major in math and minor in history, with intentions to teach and coach when his playing career is over.

Not unlike many of his teammates, Olson wants to give a little back to that which has given him so much. In other ISU news, freshman running back Adam Alaniz has been declared academically ineligible for the season. Last year's A-1 player of the year from Capital High School failed to take either the SAT or ACT test and will miss the entire season. He will have three years of eligibility left. The 5-foot 10-inch 180-pound Alaniz had a 3.3 GPA at Capital.

Vandals look to add to Rams' losing streak

FORT COLLINS, Colo. (AP) — Colorado State looks to break a six-game losing streak when the Rams take an offensive-minded Idaho at Hughes Stadium on Saturday.

"The Vandals, ranked No. 9 in Division I-AA, whipped St. Cloud State 42-9 last week, amassing 428 total yards, including 245 passing, while the defense grabbed four interceptions.

Junior quarterback Doug Nussmeier had 319 yards of total offense, completing 18 of 32 passes for 230 yards and a touchdown and running seven times for 89 yards and three more scores.

Wide receiver Tim Murphy caught seven passes for 154 yards and a TD.

Idaho coach John L. Smith felt his team was inconsistent in its opener, but was impressed with the play of the secondary.

"Our linebackers are running around more, and the defensive backs are more in position than they have been," Smith said. "It will be good to see them and they'll be around the football a lot for this season."

Colorado State is the Vandals' only Division I-A opponent this season.

"We can go in there and beat these guys," Smith said. "That's the attitude we're taking."

"They have some hot horses up front. We'll have to step up and stop the run and do a better job on defense. I think our offense has some things in it that will enable us to move the ball."

A high-scoring passing game would favor the Vandals, Smith said, "but who knows what's going to happen."

CSU, which dropped its last five games of the season, bowed to 120-ranked Colorado 37-17 last week as Buff quarterback Kendall Stewart threw for a school-record 409 yards and four touchdowns.

But the Rams trailed by only seven points entering the final quarter, and fullback John Iyow had a big day, rushing eight times for 152 yards, including a yard scoring jump. Iyow's per-carry average of 19 yards set a CSU record.

The Rams rushed for 267 yards — averaging

5.9 per carry — against what is expected to be one of the nation's top defenses. And they committed only one turnover while gaining three; a year ago CSU had the worst turnover ratio in the nation of minus-24.

"You take away four big plays, and we played well defensively," CSU coach Earl Bruce said. "We also ran the ball well. I see some things that excite me. We are a young team. If they take coaching the rest of the year, we'll win a lot of games."

Bruce said the Vandals "have a great quarterback, fine wide receivers and a great defensive end in Jeff Robinson who is being touted as a Division I-AA All-American. We'll see an offense a lot like what we saw at Colorado. They line up and throw the football."

Other Big Sky teams in action this weekend include Eastern Washington at Portland State, Cal-State Chico at Montana, Austin at Montana State, Northeastern at Northern Arizona and Southern Utah State at Weber State.

Neon Deion's presence could enlighten Falcons' defense

SUBWANEE, Ga. (AP) — Pro Bowl cornerback Deion Sanders spent 20 hours Thursday on the practice field with the Atlanta Falcons after reversing his decision to play only baseball with the Braves for the rest of his season.

Sanders took a physical in the morning, reported to the Falcons complex shortly before the team's scheduled 1 p.m. practice and was on the field about 17 minutes after the workout began.

The two-sport star declined to comment before or after practice.

He had a 20-minute meeting of defensive backs after practice and then headed down Interstate 85 to Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium for the Braves' 3-2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

He went into the game as a pinch runner in the ninth and scored the winning run. Coach Jerry Glanville wouldn't say whether Sanders would be in the lineup when the Falcons play the Redskins in Washington on Sunday.

"It's a day-to-day thing," Glanville said after practice. "Unfortunately for him, there's no way we can have full-speed contact."

Parker declined to spell out details of the contract, which is believed to be worth about \$2 million for the 1992 season. Sanders previously had a \$750,000 contract for the season.

Parker said the Falcons agreed to free

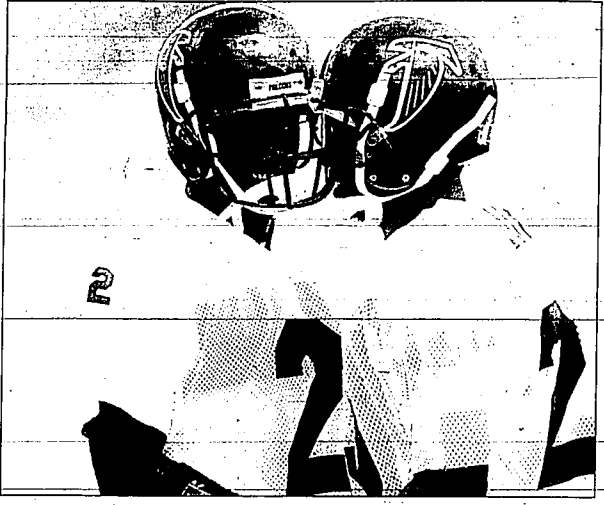
Sanders to return to baseball next month for any postseason play.

The Braves appear headed toward the NL West championship, with a 9 1/2-game lead over Cincinnati and San Diego. Parker said that for the remainder of baseball's regular season, Sanders' primary responsibility will be with the Falcons, who agreed to let him participate in Braves home games, time permitting.

"So he'll be shutting back and forth as much as he can while they're in town," Parker said. "The priority will be the football until the baseball postseason starts."

The first mistake came late in Sunday night's Raiders-Broncos game.

With the Raiders leading 13-10, Broncos were driving toward the Los Angeles goal when Eddie Anderson picked off a John Elway pass on the goal line near the sideline and cut upfield.

Even with the naked eye, Anderson appeared to step out at the 1. But he

continued upfield to the 30 and nothing was called. Replays showed that the naked eye was correct — he had stepped out and an official standing no more than two yards away with a clear view didn't blow the whistle.

The second error was viewed by far more people, in the Redskins-Cowboys Monday night game. And it could have been a game-turner, particularly since there were 270 mistakes on the same play, the second of which would have been corrected by replay if the first one wasn't.

It occurred with just under six minutes left in the half.

Marino enjoys, cherishes his role

MIAMI (AP) — Tanned, relaxed and quick to smile, Dan Marino said his good fortune as he spoke.

The Miami Dolphins' quarterback soon begins his 10th season in a job that has brought celebrity and wealth.

"You have to enjoy and cherish the fun you have in the NFL," because it's short," Marino said Thursday. "The older you get, the more you respect the game, because you realize there's going to be a time when you're not going to be doing it."

Remember the kid who arrived from Pittsburgh with an Afro for a haircut and a rifle for an arm? He turns 31 on Tuesday, the day after the Dolphins open their season at Cleveland.

There likely are more touchdown passes in the past than in the future. Still, that quick release seems of another world, and Marino plans to remain at the peak of his skills until further notice.

That birdie lifted him to within a stroke of the lead, and he tied Pooley with another two-putt birdie, again following a 3-wood second shot, on the final hole.

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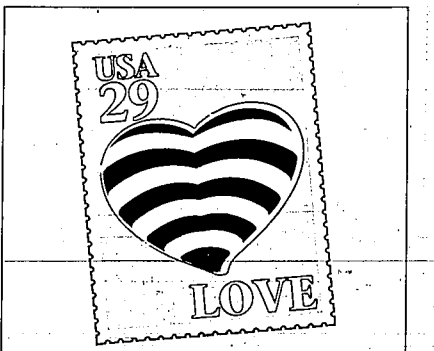
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Post-Bird era begins as Celtics sign Xavier



BOSTON (AP) — The Boston Celtics launched their first bold strike of the post-Larry Bird era Thursday, signing Xavier McDaniel from the New York Knicks, adding sass and shooting to a team that needs both.

"We're not going to sit back and wait for things to happen down the road," Boston coach Chris Ford said. "We want to compete this year."

Twenty-three days after Bird retired, the Celtics signed McDaniel, an unrestricted free agent, to a five-year contract, with three years

guaranteed, after he grew impatient with the Knicks negotiating pace.

He said "Bird" did it in one day. McDaniel said, "It was taking New York nine months."

David Falk, agent for the big-talking small forward, said he thought the Knicks weren't convinced when he told them that McDaniel had received "very strong interest" from two or three other NBA teams.

He said it's "fair to receive an offer from another team, like the one the Celtics made Wednesday, and take it back for the

Knicks to top. "I think (the Knicks) perhaps wanted a clear indication that the bomb was about to drop," Falk said. "I think they're very upset — understandably so. They lost their second best player."

"It's disappointing," Knicks president Dave Checketts said. "But 'X' decided that he didn't want to be here. We had been negotiating in good faith and wanted him to be part of what we're building here. They never gave us the opportunity to pay him more, which we would have done."

Oil prices/Nafta job loss

WASHINGTON — Labor Secretary Lynn Martin said Thursday that a maximum of 150,000 American workers would lose their jobs if a North American free-trade agreement is implemented.

It was the first time any member of the Bush administration had publicly stated such figures.

In testimony before the Senate Finance Committee, the labor secretary said, however, that the Bush administration's \$10-billion retraining program is more than enough to help workers affected by the trade pact.

Her remarks came as several U.S. senators warned that their support for Nafta, as the proposed pact is called, will hinge on the Bush administration's commitment to a fully funded worker retraining program.

They criticized the administration's proposals so far as inadequate. "Nafta will rise and fall on whether it has a good retraining act," said Sen. Robert Packwood, R-Ore., at a hearing of the Senate Finance Committee.

Martin repeated previous estimates that 325,000 jobs would be gained, citing studies from the Institute for International Economics.

She said the administration's retraining program would be funded in part from the \$68 billion in entitlement cuts that have been proposed by President Bush and sent to the spending side of the 1993 budget, which is due in January.

Last month, President Bush announced a five-year, \$10 billion "worker adjustment initiative" to help workers gain training and skills close to foreign competition or cutbacks in military spending.

The program was widely viewed as a response to criticism that Nafta

will make it easier for companies to relocate in Mexico. "Without telling the American people where the money will come from, this program still looks like empty campaign promises," said Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, chairman of the committee, in his opening statement.

The president's initiative will consolidate two present retraining programs into a single program to provide grants of up to \$3,000 a year for job retraining as well as transition income for laid-off workers. Every year, the fund will provide \$335 million for Nafta-related job dislocations.

NEW YORK — The stock market ran up its sharpest gain in more than six weeks Thursday, extending Wednesday's mild rally as President Bush made his proposal for reviving the economy.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, which had gained 10 points Wednesday, climbed 33.77 points to 3,305.16.

That marked the best single-day showing for the average since it

jumped 45.12 points on July 29. Advancing issues outnumbered declines by more than 9 to 5 in the daily tally on the New York Stock Exchange. Big Board volume came to an estimated 221.97 million shares as of 2 p.m. EDT, up from 172.89 million in the previous session.

The market advanced gradually all day, picking up some momentum as Bush described his "agenda for renewal" including spending cuts.

Businesses scale back investment plans

WASHINGTON — U.S. businesses cut back on already modest plans for investment spending this year, the government said Thursday in a report reflecting renewed pessimism about the economy's prospects.

Businesses surveyed during July and August told the Commerce Department they would spend \$551 billion on new plants and equipment this year, a 4.3 percent increase from 1991.

In the previous survey, during April and May, businesses had planned a 4.7 percent increase. Before the year began, they had anticipated a 5.4 percent rise.

Meanwhile, a separate report from the Labor Department showed new claims for unemployment benefits rose slightly in late August for the second consecutive week.

The increase of 8,000 claims to 394,000 during the week ended Aug.

29 reflected a stagnant job market, analysts said.

Business owners, who have seen their hopes for stronger economic growth dashed several times over the past year and a half, will remain cautious about new hiring and major investment until they see a sustained improvement in their sales, economists said.

A survey released earlier this week by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce showed that business executives' confidence in the economy was at its lowest point in eight months.

"The fact is that manufacturers and businesses generally are still scared," said economist David Wyss of DRI-McGraw Hill in Lexington, Mass. "They don't see a big increase in demand coming. So, as a result, they are not anxious to hire, and they are not anxious to do anything permanent and high investment is very permanent."

The increase in investment spending this year, if realized, would follow a 0.8 percent decline in 1991, only the fourth drop in the past 33 years. Spending had risen a moderate 5 percent in 1990 after slumping up 11.4 percent in 1989 and 10.6 percent in 1988.

Economist Stephen S. Roach of Morgan Stanley & Co. in New York said he had expected an even greater reduction in investment plans, given the economy's recent sluggishness.

"I take heart from the fact that businesses in 1992 are still planning a 4.3 percent increase," Roach said. "... Capital spending should play a key role in driving this economy during the next several years, and this survey is reasonably supportive of (the belief) that that's what's going to happen."

He and other analysts said new investment in plant and equipment is crucial to making U.S. industry competitive with foreign firms and is one of the keys to a healthy economy in the long run.

But, at least for now, most manufacturing companies have little incentive to increase their capacity. Despite modest increases in new orders this year, they've reduced their backlog of unfilled orders for 11 consecutive months.

Factories operated at 77.6 percent of capacity in July, well below the 1989 peak of 85.1 percent.

"If you're only running at 75 percent of capacity, why build a new plant?" Wyss said.

Most of the planned investment increase this year is in aircraft manufacturing, where a 17.7 percent increase is expected, as well as nondurable goods manufacturing, such as textiles, chemicals and rubber, and in railroad companies and electric companies.

Durable goods factories, which make "big ticket" items such as autos and appliances, plan a 2.5 percent increase in investment spending after a 3.6 percent decrease last year.

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Junji Masuda, first Japanese lawyer to set up shop in the U.S., deals in acquisitions

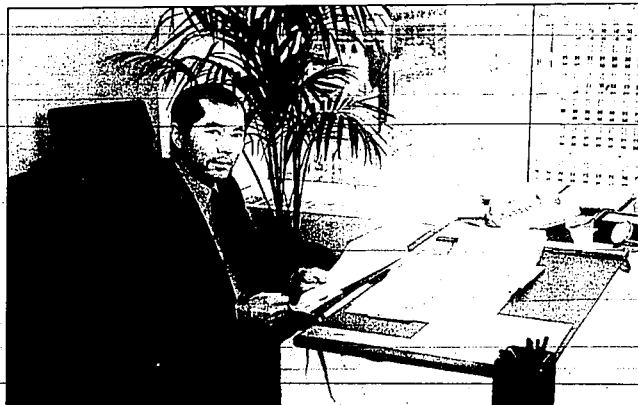

NEW YORK — Junji Masuda drives a red Jeep Cherokee, cuts big American steaks for dinner, likes to take in an occasional Chicago or Rangers game and admires Ross Perot's guts.

But Masuda also keeps a Lexus luxury sedan in the driveway of his recently purchased house in Scarsdale, N.Y. He knows the best Japanese restaurant in Manhattan for jet-delivered raw fish from Tokyo. He spends a substantial chunk of time, roughly once a month, flying between his native and adopted countries.

Masuda, 49, is a leading Japanese lawyer who specializes in international investments and financing. He's the first attorney from Japan to open a practice in the United States.

He represents clients ranging from Japan Air Lines to Bristol-Myers Squibb Co., helping them pick their way through the complexities of doing business—in the world's two biggest economies.

"I'm one-third lawyer, one-third businessman and one-third diplomat," he said during an interview in the 22nd-floor conference room of his Park Avenue office.

Although he doesn't advertise it, Junji Masuda (pronounced Juh-gee Maas-oo-dah) also is an important cog in the gears of the U.S.-Japan relationship, at the center of some of the biggest Japanese acquisitions of U.S. businesses in recent years.

In 1988, for example, Masuda's client Nippon-Mining Co. Ltd. purchased Gould Inc., a trouble-ridden electrical products manufacturer in Rolling Meadows, Ill., for \$1.1 billion. A year earlier, he helped client Daikin Inc. & Chemicals Inc. acquire Reichhold Chemicals Inc., a plastics coatings and adhesives company then based in White Plains, N.Y., for about \$630 million. "In all cases, when I'm involved, I act like the conductor of the orchestra," Masuda said. "I manage everything."

Japanese clients are drawn to Ma-

suda because he's familiar with the nuances of American law and can translate nontelese terms that may have no direct equivalent in Japan, ranging from "due diligence" to "fiduciary liability."

For American counterparts, Masuda's grasp of the vagaries in Japanese law and his ability to bridge the cultural gap make him more than just another lawyer.

"He's very good at explaining in terms the Japanese can understand," said David Bernstein, an attorney at Rogers & Wells, a leading U.S. law firm that has worked with Masuda. "He's extremely good at acting as a liaison."

Strictly speaking, Masuda isn't licensed to practice law in the United States to the same extent as an American lawyer.

He cannot, for example, argue a case before a judge. He works as a "legal consultant."

Masuda comes from a family of Japanese jurists — his father was a judge and his grandfather a justice

minister — but his appearance conveys little of his reputation as a shrewd and savvy litigator.

He's shy and self-deprecating, with thinning black hair, long sideburns and jet-lagged eyes that betray long days and those 14-hour plane rides over the Pacific. He exercises by climbing stairs.

Masuda declined to disclose his income, but said the firm's \$300 an hour, depending on the nature of the work.

In some respects, Masuda is a therapist in what has become an increasingly fractious economic marriage between Japan and the United States, marked by simmering disputes over the high Japanese trade surpluses and American frustrations in trying to sell goods and services in Japan.

When speaking with Americans, he sometimes finds himself explaining that most Japanese really don't have contempt for the United States. Much of what the Japanese know

about America, he says, comes from their exposure to U.S. newspapers, movies and music.

"In the past, America is like their dream, their partner," he said. "But now, it's too much. Your TV news can be seen in Japan. It shows bankruptcies and unemployment."

Masuda's fondness for the United States stems partly from his post-graduate training in U.S. law at Columbia Law School more than 20 years ago, a few years after he had received his Japanese law degree from Tokyo University.

He lived as a foreign exchange student with an American family in Scarsdale, the wealthy Manhattan suburb, and Fortune 500 executives, when he was a young boy. Even well-to-do families are crammed into two-room apartments, Masuda said he was enthralled with the expansive homes, large yards and manicured gardens.

"I was so impressed, it was like a dream," he said.

Study suggests U S West customers might be able to save significantly

DES MOINES, Iowa — Regulators in 14 states have received new ammunition for telephone rate cases involving U S West Communications.

A study released Tuesday suggests U S West's customers might receive significant savings if the telephone company's non-regulated businesses charge practices, accounting and salary practices.

The review was commissioned by regulators with the cooperation of the utility.

U S West said it is preparing a plan in response to the reports. But a spokeswoman said at least some of the recommendations are confusing.

At issue is how state regulators evaluate the services provided by U S West Communications by unregulated affiliates, such as U S West Advanced Technologies Inc., a research and engineering business.

In 1991, U S West paid all of its affiliates \$51.3 million, or about 8 percent of its \$636 billion in operating expenses.

The question is, what portion of that, if any, is inappropriately carried by ratepayers, said Dennis Nagel, chairman of the Iowa Utilities Board,

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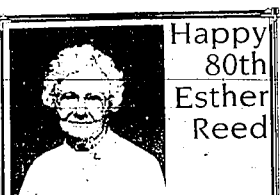

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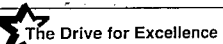

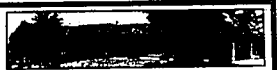

THE ACES ON BRIDGE - BOBBY WOLFF

"There is time enough for everything in the course of the day if you do but one thing at once; but there is not enough time in the year if you will do two things at a time."
- Lord Chesterfield.

Today's South got tangled in his own loose shuffling. He was lucky enough to dodge a damaging spade lead but he gave the advantage back by attempting too much in the minor suits.

Playing 15-17 HCP no-trumps, South reached the no-trump game via the slow route, all suits being bid on the way. West chose the neutral lead of the diamond 10 and South took his ace.

With his eyes fixed on tempting overtricks, South cashed his high clubs, pausing to assess damage when East discarded. It was too late. If he led a fourth club, West would attack in spades. This would create an insoluble communication problem for South, since he couldn't manage to take eight winners in the minor suits. And if South cashed his diamond queen after noting the club break, he would still win only eight tricks.

The answer to the problem is to do one thing at a time. South should take his ace and queen of diamonds at tricks one and two, and to maintain communication, he should lead a low club at trick three. West wins and attacks belatedly in spades, but it's too late. Declarer wins with dummy's ace and cashes two diamonds. South's four club tricks bring the total to a well-earned nine.

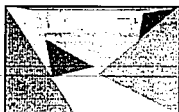

NEW YORK — Today marks Jay Leno's three-month anniversary behind the desk of NBC's "The Tonight Show." For three months, he has been slammed by critics and dissed by Aresenio Hall. And he has taken it like a man — a nice man.

Nice is a wondrous thing after the reign of Johnny what's-his-name, who in recent years seemed to think he was doing viewers a favor even when showing up in reruns.

By contrast, Leno is just plain tickled to have the job. Not only does he report to the office Monday through Friday like other working stiffs, he comes in early. He stays late. He invites hip, classy, brainy guests and he reads the books and sees the movies they are there to plug.

He lets all his performers — even the greenest singer or standup comic — come sit on his couch when they finish their acts. He holds up their CDs until you could memorize the fine print.

That's a nice guy. Leno clearly works hard on his monologue, and can deliver hilarious observations such as his forecast for a Sen. Al Gore-Vice President Dan Quayle debate: "Like watching the Dream Team playing Lithuania again."

But all is not right in Lenoland.

Here, in no particular order, is a list of problems with "The Tonight Show" — and how Jay can fix them.

• Something should be done about Jay's over-eager manner, especially the heaving shoulders and recurrent giggling.

Suggestion: Try a Xanax.

• The live sketches are pretty lame. While the prerecorded parodies are better, the fact is, there are shows that specialize in this kind of stuff (ever heard of "Saturday Night Live"?)

Suggestion: Leave satire to the experts.

• A marvelous band doesn't necessarily make a good TV house band. On television,

Mr. Peter Show," and give that washboard virtuoso a long-term contract.

• Like the old one, the new "Tonight Show" set is a glowing example of money over taste. The mural of that dusky bay recalls the decor at a bad Italian restaurant... The drab purple curtain seems pinched from a junior high assembly hall.

Suggestion: Borrow the cool, super-modern set from "The Dennis Miller Show." He doesn't need it anymore.

• The average commuter has better rapport with a subversive transmute than does Jay with Brantford Marsalis. Announcer Edd Hall, usually kept off-camera, could be phoning in his part from Uranus.

Suggestion: One is the loneliest number. Jay, so get a sidekick fast and get down with him. Or with her! A sharp, sassy female to bounce things off of might be just the ticket. Your interplay with comic Paula Poundstone, serving as "Tonight Show" suggestion correspondent, suggests the sort of much-needed edge an on-site woman back-up could bring to the show.

Bottom line: Jay Leno needs spice to go with the... "If you don't think that nice guys can finish first," he told his audience a couple of weeks ago, "just keep watching."

The way "The Tonight Show" is now, do we have to?

'Murphy' holds onto top spot

NEW YORK — A "Murphy Brown" rerun landed CBS atop the ratings heap in another "preview week" of the new television season, according to Nielsen Media Research figures released Wednesday.

The premiere episode of ABC's "Going to Extremes" was the only new show to land in the Top 25. It tied for seventh with a rerun of ABC's "Coach."

Fox's "Martin" premiered in 26th place. CBS' "Middle Ages," a show about fortysomething dreams and disillusion, finished 39th.

For the week ending Sept. 6, CBS had a 9.9 rating and a 19 share. NBC was second overall, with an 8.6 rating and a 14 share. ABC was third, with a 7.7 rating and a 14 share; Fox Broadcasting Co. earned a 6.8 rating and a 13 share.

As of Sept. 1, a single ratings point equals 931,000 TV homes in the Nielsen universe. A share is the percentage of TV sets tuned in.

"Scared Silent," a special on child abuse aired by all three networks, finished 30th on CBS and 41st on NBC on Friday's simulcast, and 81st on ABC Sunday.

Its combined share was 32.9.

Hot spot means high advertising prices; too

Guess what show is commanding the highest price for a 30-second commercial this coming season? "Murphy Brown," that's who.

The CBS comedy will be charging advertisers a whopping \$310,000 for a half-minute of commercial time, or as Advertising Age, the trade paper, calculates: \$10,333 a second. The next costliest spot for advertisers is on NBC's "Cheers," which is charging \$300,000, same as last season. Next comes ABC's "Roseanne," at \$290,000, and the same network's "Coach," at \$280,000.

The cheapest show of the new season is NBC's new Sunday night series, "Secret Service," at \$50,000 a spot, followed by ABC's "Covington Cross," at \$55,000.

The highest-priced new series is CBS' "Love & War" (with Susan Dey and Jay Thomas) at \$190,000.

Baker takes a seat for her 1st TV series

LOS ANGELES — Even though CBS' "Picket Fences" is a career move she desired, Kathy Baker is still sitting down on the job.

"In the early episodes, anything but me sitting and standing — anything but acting," said Baker, who hobbled into an interview session on crutches after having surgery to correct hip dysplasia.

"But don't worry about her ability to stand up to her starring role. She consistently has been a strong supporting actress in feature films such as "Clean and Sober," "Jackknife" and "Edward Scissorhands."

She's in demand for such roles, and that figured in her decision to switch to her first television series. The program debuts with a two-hour show at 8 p.m. MDT Friday, Sept. 18, on KMYT and CBS affiliates.

"I came back home after spending the whole fall on location shooting my part for 'Jennifer Eight,'" she said. "My part wasn't that big. I said, 'I know it. I've been with locations. I was in and out of planes. It's exciting to go on location. It's fun. But it gets old."

When she came back home after "Jennifer Eight," she told her agent she wanted to read pilot scripts for TV series.

"I looked at six or seven scripts, both comedies and dramas, and decided on 'Picket Fences.'"

The series, which also stars Tom Skerritt and was created by former "L.A. Law" executive producer David Kelley.

Baker plays a doctor in a small town in Wisconsin, and Skerritt plays her husband and the county sheriff. They have three children, and jobs between the kids and the parents' jobs, plenty is going on.

In the opening episode, Skerritt has to solve a mysterious murder. Baker is suspected of revealing privileged medical information in the case, and their teen-age daughter picks as a role model a singer who turns out to have a shady past.

"I picked this show because of the writing and the character," she said. "She has humor, she has intelligence and she has a real relationship with her husband and children. I liked her job. I read scripts where I didn't know what my character did. They said, 'Oh, we're working on it.'"

"I liked this, David Kelley said he wanted me, and that was pretty much it."

ESPN slides into cable network record books

From three guys in Paducah and a Coral Gables orthodontist whose fillings were especially sensitive, ESPN has grown to a viewership of more than 60 million homes in the past 15 years.

And, the industry is predicting that the all-sports network will be seen in as many as 75 million homes by the year 2000.

"ESPN's growth mirrors the growth in the cable industry, and we are the most heavily penetrated service in the industry," said

George Bodenheimer, ESPN's vice president of national affiliate sales and marketing.

"I would think that 75 to 80 percent of the TV universe is attainable over time. It's my own personal opinion, but I would say it's coming within the next 5 to 15 years."

In May, ESPN became the first cable network to surpass the 60-million mark — 60,536,000 homes to be exact, representing 65.7 percent of all TV households in the United States.

ESPN's secret: The network is available as part of the basic package in almost every cable system in the country.

"There might be some old, 12-channel systems in the hills of Pennsylvania that don't carry us, but I'm certainly not aware of it," said Dana Redman, ESPN vice president of research and measurement.

From the time ESPN was launched on Sept. 7, 1979 — with actually a few more than three households in Paducah and a guy's denture work — it grew to 10 million in May 1981. In September 1982, it reached 20 million and topped the 30 million household mark in January 1984. Other milestones fell rapidly: 40 million in December 1986 and 50 million in December 1988.

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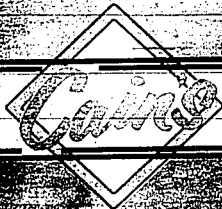
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
