# Twin Falls dumps waste district

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls County will tell the Southern Idaho Regional Solid Waste District today that the county wants to build and run its own landfill.

The news comes after the Twin Falls County Commission voted 2-1 Thursday to leave the district.

Commissioners Norma Blass and Jim Fraley voted for the county to go it alone. Commissioner Marvin Hempleman voted to stay with the district.

While he "still believes in the district," Hempleman said he'd work with Blass and Fraley in the county's effort to site its own landfill.

The other five counties in the regional district now must vote to let Twin Falls County leave the group. Commissioners from those counties will meet in Shoshone today and have said they will not fight Twin Falls' leaving the district.

If Twin Falls County leaves, it must have

its own new landfill up and running by October 1993 in order to meet a federal mandate.

Twin Falls County would have been the solid waste district's largest contributor of trash and money. Blaine, Lincoln, Jerome, Minidoka and Cassia counties belong to the district. Gooding County might join the district too.

Terry Schultz, the district's manager, could not be reached for comment Thursday.

Fraley said he saw pros and cons to staying in the district. But the district's

bylaws give Twin Falls County only one vote even though it would pay the most money, and that was hard to accept, he said.

"I really have been torn. I woke up last night worrying about this thing," he said.

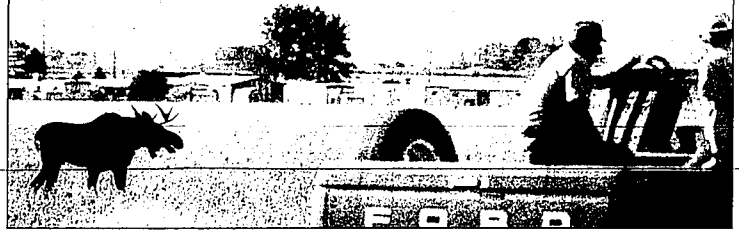
But problems working with four other counties to get a juvenile detention center built helped Fraley make his decision.

"Everything we get involved with in a regional situation seems to be a headache," he said.

Blass said the county faces an expensive

## Meandering moose brings exposure to Twin Falls' northern side

TWIN FALLS — Welcome to Cicely, Alaska.

You'll excuse the folks on Twin Falls' north end for feeling like extras on the set of "Northern Exposure" Thursday afternoon when they looked out their windows to see a misplaced moose wandering around.



Earlier in the day, it stays in a pond at the Los Lagos condominiums north of Twin Falls.

The moose mascot of the CBS television series set in that fictional Alaskan village is decidedly more mellow than Twin Falls' own version, however.

In fact, the 500-600 pound bull moose remained loose Thursday night despite being shot with three tranquilizer darts and being run ragged by a caravan of Idaho Department of Fish and Game officials and curious onlookers.

"We're just going to let him rest tonight, and we'll see what tomorrow brings," Fish and Game wildlife biologist Randy Smith said. "If people will just leave him alone, I think he'll be all right."

The bedraggled moose finally bedded down in a shady spot in some farmland near the Snake River Canyon west of the Twin Falls Gun Club Thursday evening, Smith said.

He estimated the moose to be about two and half years old. It probably came from the Sublett-Mafad area, which is

home to the nearest established moose population.

If and when he is captured, the moose will be taken north of Fairfield, where the Fish and Game Department is working to establish a viable herd, Smith said.

Thursday's safari began at the Los Lagos condominiums along Washington Street North, where the wayward moose was standing in a decorative pond looking for a snack.

He stayed around until Fish and Game officials came along and flushed him out of the pond.

The intent was to tranquilize the moose and transport him to the Fairfield Ranger District, but the big mammal had other ideas.

The moose spent the rest of the day dodging officers and onlookers. On one occasion, he almost trampled a television cameraman.

By mid-afternoon, he had wandered into the parking lot of the Target store on Blue-Lakes-Boulevard-North.

There were no bargains on water cross.

## Cable regulation zips through House

WASHINGTON — Holding out against fierce lobbying by the cable TV industry, the House voted overwhelmingly Thursday to cap rates for basic service and set national standards for customer protection.

The 280-128 vote exceeded the two-thirds majority needed to override a threatened veto by President Bush although it was short of the 289 votes needed if the whole House were to vote.

Idaho's congressmen, Demo-crats Richard Stallings and Larry LaRocco, voted for the measure.

Now the bill must clear the Senate, where the outcome is expected to be closer. A Senate vote could come next week.

Consumer advocates assert that the bill would force price cuts of up to 30 percent on a monopoly-dominated industry that has raised fees on captive customers at three times the rate of inflation for the past five years.

But the bill would leave it to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to determine reasonable rates for basic cable, and even supporters caution that expectations of dramatic price rollbacks are overblown.

"Rates are going to go up with or without this legislation," said Rep. Jim C. Slattery, D-Kan., a backer of the bill. "They will go up much less with the passage of this legislation."

Cable industry lobbying and thousands of letters from concerned consumers cut into support for the bill, resulting in 55 more "no" votes than for an earlier version the House passed in July.

Playing down the main issue of price controls, the cable industry has focused on a requirement that cable operators get permission from over-the-air broadcasters before retransmitting their signals.

Cable operators want rates would rise by \$20 to \$50 a year if broadcasters demand payment for programming.

## A deep thirst for education

### Asian-Americans set hot pace in college degrees but pay lags

WASHINGTON — Asian-Americans have a devotion to higher education more widespread than most people in the United States, the Census Bureau said Thursday.

It was its first detailed study of the nation's fastest growing racial group.

The bureau said two-out-of-five Americans with roots in Asia and the Pacific had completed four years of college or more. That's about twice the rate for the whole country and for whites, and four times the rate for blacks.

The drive among young Asian-Americans to get an education comes from the home, where parents daily teach the lesson that schooling counts, said Katsumi Kunisuga, executive secretary of the Japanese American Cultural and Community Center in Los Angeles.

She graduated from high school in the Heart Mountain, Wyo., internment center, where she and her family had been sent after Japan attacked Pearl Harbor, and later graduated from the University of Wisconsin.

"I'm a second-generation Japanese, and my folks certainly emphasized we should get the highest education possible," she

said. "Even in the most trying circumstances, we always tried to get our education, not so much for earning a living but for forming good character."

More recent immigrants were highly educated in their own countries, and so had the motive and means to send their own children to college, said William O'Hare, population and policy analysis director at the University of Louisville.

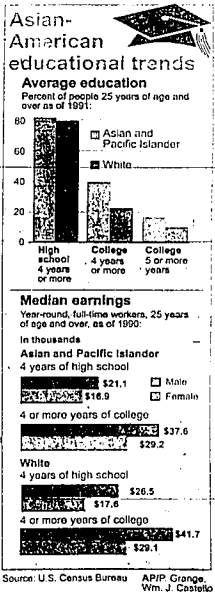
The number of Asian-Americans more than doubled from 1980 to 1990. Immigrants accounted for about three-fourths of that growth.

"It's sort of a spillover effect," O'Hare said. "They came 10 years ago and now their kids are going to school."

Despite their affinity for higher education, Asian-Americans with four years or more of college earned nearly \$1,700 a year less than whites with the same education, based on median income, the Census Bureau study said.

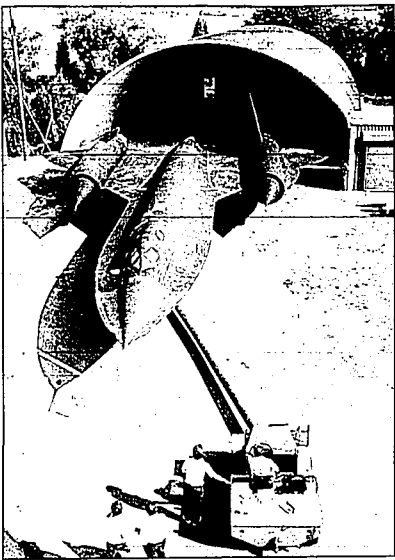
The kinds of jobs held by Asian-Americans and others explains part of the difference, said Claudette Bennett, author of the study.

Asian-American men are nearly five times more likely than white men to fill service jobs, which tend to pay less than industrial work.

**'Star Wars' plan remains free of cuts**

WASHINGTON — Senate opponents of President Bush's "Star Wars" plan tried but failed Thursday to engineer further cuts in the anti-missile program. An effort to slice \$500 million from the program for the coming year failed in the Senate Appropriations Committee on a 14-14 vote. "If (Bill) Clinton wins as president, I don't think he's going to follow through on this program," said Sen. J. Bennett Johnston, D-La., arguing for deeper cuts in the Strategic Defense Initiative.

**Economics guru supports Clinton**

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — The founding father of Reaganomics says President Bush's economic performance has been a disaster. And economist Arthur Laffer says he will vote for Bill Clinton. President Reagan relied on Laffer's theories to cut taxes in 1981. Laffer told a Louisville audience Wednesday he's voting for Democratic this year.

"I really think Bush doesn't deserve to be re-elected," Laffer said. "Once a Bush supporter, Laffer has been an outspoken critic since the president broke his no-new-taxes pledge in 1990."

**Pentagon spokesman pans vote charge**

WASHINGTON — A Pentagon spokesman defended the military's get-out-the-vote campaign on Thursday, denouncing as "ludicrous" charges the effort is aimed at gleaming votes for President Bush. "No one is told for whom to vote," spokesman Bob Hall volunteered at the opening of a Pentagon briefing. "It's nonsense. It's ludicrous on its face," Hall said, responding to a report in the Washington Post that said "Democratic and independent analysts" suspect the effort is an attempt by the Bush administration to energize a sympathetic vote.

**Women tell of abuse at VA hospitals**

WASHINGTON — Women who work at veterans hospitals told Congress on Thursday that they were sexually harassed on the job, then faced reprisals for complaining about it. "You are victimized first by your harasser and next by the system," said Mary O'Connor, who said she was a victim of physical sexual harassment by a doctor at the Veterans Affairs Medical Center at Northampton, Mass. She said that when she complained, "management attempted to minimize the abuse, to cover up the actual assault and to inform me that, should I file a formal complaint, the entire hospital would be aware of the offense — and that complainants are in for extreme discomfort."

**Handling the crowd**  
Candidates hit, miss during campaign speeches

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Bill Clinton peered over the podium at an enthusiastic crowd at San Jose State University and said, "I never expected to see so many people here."

But Clinton didn't know the half of it. Because of heavy raining by his advance staff, the candidate was only looking at a portion of the crowd. The rest were hidden behind the press stand, sweating in 90 degree heat, listening, but not seeing the candidate.

Many went away muttering. Something about having to stare at the posteriors of the cameramen. So it goes in the 1992 presidential campaign.

President Bush and Arkansas Gov. Clinton are veteran campaigners, but assembling a crowd and connecting with it once it gathers, is not rocket science. Both candidates, it seems, are having their share of misses as well as hits.

Clinton is at his best when he wades into crowds before and after he speaks. But some of his traveling staff members would like to string up the strategist who told Clinton that he does better with voters in person than on television: About 91 million Americans will be voting on Nov. 3 and Clinton acts as though he'd like to shake hands with all of them.

This has the effect of making Clinton habitually late, which is not always a trivial matter. In San Jose, where Clinton was close to an hour late, a group of "Kids for Clinton," was asked if waiting for the Democrat had been worth it.

"No!" they shouted in unison. Bush's team, by contrast, generally make the train run on time, but then there's the matter of actually having to give the speech. Bush routinely stumbles over words and can appear frenetic and shrill, in contrast to the more calm and measured demeanor he exhibits at the White House.

The president tends to take his cue from his audiences, which generally haven't seemed as enthusiastic as the Clinton crowds. In Colorado, which hasn't voted for a Democrat for president since 1964, Clinton drew more than 15,000 people in downtown Denver Thursday at a raucous noon rally. At a rally outside Denver two days before, Bush drew only a couple thousand onlookers.

A Clinton appearance often resembles the sighting of a movie star, with loyalists, usually women, asking for

Clinton was seen as interested in seeing a president -- any president -- as in hearing Bush. They gawk at his huge motorcade and lung out at airports waiting for Air Force One to land or take off. But once Bush starts speaking, it can be all downhill. He receives his biggest applause upon arriving at an event, not during or after his speeches.

At his big economics speech last week in Detroit, the largely GOP audience of 2,300 waited 23 minutes

more than half-way into the president's speech -- before applauding.

For both candidates, however, the crowd often gets most animated when the opponent-bashing begins.

Teen-agers and college students at a Bush rally Thursday in East, Okla., squealed, whistled and barked (yes, barked) as Bush lit into Clinton's economic proposals.

At his rallies, Clinton gets the crowd into it with his standard attack on "trickle-down economics," frequently inciting the crowd into spont-

**Critics claim Ag Department dumps butter, oil on schools**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Children who eat a school lunch are getting too much butter and oil with every meal, because the Agriculture Department is dumping fatty farm products on school cafeterias, a consumer group charged Thursday.

Public Voice for Food and Health Policy said that the Agriculture Department "has spent twice as much money on butter and cheese for the national school lunch program as on fruits and vegetables."

USDA spokesman Dick Thaxton says schools are not required to use the commodities. "We are responding to a demand on butter and cheese," he said. Kevin Dando of the American School Food Service Association, however, said school nutritionists tell his organization they would prefer margarine to butter.

"What we have today is the economic well-being of the dairy interests in this country calling the shots in a program that should be providing good nutrition to our children, particularly the poor and minority who are most

vulnerable," said Ellen Haas, executive director of the private organization that runs educational programs and health care for the government on health-related food issues.

Since 1979, the Agriculture Department has spent \$10.2 billion on food for the school lunch program. Of that, USDA used \$1.3 billion to buy butter, \$2-billion for cheese and \$1.6 billion for fruits and vegetables, Public Voice said.

The group said it also found that nearly all of the fruit was canned, and most of the vegetables were frozen or canned. More than half of the vegetables are potato products, and virtually all have had fat added in processing.

Through its purchase of farm commodities, which USDA distributes free to schools, the department "may be creating a 'dumping ground' in the national school lunch program for surplus high-fat dairy products," Haas said. "And the end result is that the nutritional quality of one of the nation's most important feeding programs is sorely compromised."

# Car thieves, stymied by anti-theft devices, turn to carjacking

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Kim Horton was waiting at a red light on the way home one July night when some young men decided they wanted her car.

"It's just beyond comprehension," said her father, the Rev. Richard Horton. "All her hopes and dreams gone, and for such an inconceivable reason."

This week, a man was shot to death in New York City when he tried to stop someone stealing his car. And in a highly-publicized carjacking last week, a Maryland woman was dragged to her death.

Instead of breaking into parked cars, thieves increasingly are resorting to forcing the driver out at stoplights, freeway ramps, parking lots, and then speeding away. A crime once considered "retailness" is turning up casualties.

Some police officials think amateur thieves are simply stymied by the sophisticated alarms, steering-wheel locks and jamming devices installed by desperate auto owners as thefts continue to rise. No device stops a professional car thief, they say.

or popping the ignition. And the car's not damaged.

The FBI doesn't keep statistics on carjacking alone, said spokesman Mike Kortan in Washington, but in the last two years, the phenomenon has occurred in cities around the nation, notably Detroit and Houston. In parts of suburban San Fernando Valley, carjackings account for 2 percent of all car thefts, authorities said.

In New York, Aaron Garnett, 24, was killed early Wednesday defending his car from two robbers. He had stopped at a pay phone to call his girlfriend.

On Sept. 8, a woman from Savage, Md., was dragged to her death behind her luxury car after it was stolen with her 2-year-old inside. A few days later, a teen-ager in suburban Washington, D.C., was shot to death by an FBI agent after an at-

## How to avoid carjackings

Motorists fearful of carjackings can take some measures to protect themselves.

Some recommendations: Roll up windows, lock doors, drive in the center lane, take freeways rather than streets through high-crime areas. For an escape route, leave enough space from other cars while stopped at red lights.

tempted carjacking outside the agent's home.

Outrage over those crimes prompted action from top officials. FBI Director William Sessions promised a national crackdown, and a House committee advanced a bill that would make armed carjackings a federal crime punishable by up to 15 years in prison.

Car owners are still much more likely to lose their car when they're not around. In five years, car thefts have risen 23 percent nationwide to 1.66 million in 1991.

But carjackings cause more anxi-

ety simply because people usually feel safe in their cars, said Marcus Felson, a crime prevention expert at the University of Southern California.

"Whenever you're victimized in your home or your car or any location you thought was secure, you'll probably be more upset," Felson said. "It's a violation of your private space."

Police recommend several ways drivers can protect themselves. Among them: rolling up windows, locking doors, driving in the center lane, taking freeways rather than streets through high-crime areas.

"The most important thing is, be aware," Newton said.

"If you see someone get out of a car behind you with a gun, drive off. But if they've got their gun barrel 6 inches from your head, do what they say."

Though luxury cars are, sometimes targeted, carjackings tend to be random.

"It's everything from Ford Grandads to pickup trucks," said Los Angeles police Detective Mel Arnold. "The criminal needs a car to get from one end of town to another, or he wants to use it for another robbery."

That means precautions don't always work.

There's no indication Ms. Horton resisted attempts to steal her car before she was shot July 25 at a yellow-light intersection not far from her Inglewood home, police say.

Witnesses reported two cars zooming away from the intersection, and authorities speculated that a car drove up alongside and Ms. Horton was shot through the passenger-side window.

Ms. Horton, who lived with her parents, had just driven home family friends from a birthday party for

her parents' grandchildren. When police stopped the stolen car in the suburb of Pomona, several young men raced away. An 18-year-old was arrested and told police he didn't know the car was stolen. He was released for insufficient evidence.

"I find that I'm really just beginning to deal with the shock and horror of it," said Ms. Horton's father. "The doorbells aren't ringing and the people aren't coming anymore, and Kim is still dead."

## Victim's family thanks public for its support

SAVAGE, Md. (AP) — Biswanath Basu thought the bad times were behind him when he and his wife, Pamela, were finally able to adopt a little girl.

After years of struggling through the emotions of not being able to have a child and having one adoption fall through, they brought home Sarina from India in November 1990.

"With Sarina, our life was complete," said Basu, who is of Indian descent.

Last week, the family's life was shattered when two men forced Mrs. Basu from her car as she was taking her 2-year-old daughter to preschool. Mrs. Basu's arm became entangled in a seat belt and she died after being dragged several miles. Sarina

was unharmed, left in her car seat on the street. "Pam was the stability in our family. Since last Tuesday, I have been feeling this void and this emptiness," Basu told reporters Wednesday at the library in this suburb between Baltimore and Washington, D.C.

Nita Seelinger described her sister as "a beautiful, happy, vivacious person, a dedicated, caring mother and a loving wife."

"Pam's life was a big, happy smile, which spread across the entire family and Sarina was center stage," she said. "Our family's tremendous loss will be felt until we and our children pass from this Earth."

The family declined to speak specifically about

the crime or the two men charged with Mrs. Basu's death on Sept. 8.

Basu thanked well-wishers for their outpouring of cards, food, gifts for his daughters and contributions to a trust fund set up for her education.

The family said it was too soon to decide if they would play any role as advocates for stricter laws involving carjacking. Basu said he hoped his wife's death could somehow prevent other families from suffering similar tragedies.

"I have to live and I have to do the things that Pam would have wanted for Sarina," he said. "I just hope that nobody will have to go through the experience that we've been through and we're going through."

## Endeavour's married astronauts wave, but that's it

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The world's first husband and wife to share a spaceship wave to each other while floating in and from work aboard Endeavour and have posed together for a few snapshots.

But that's about it for togetherness, they said Thursday.

Mark Lee works the day shift, Jan Davis has the night shift. So about five only time they see each other is during the 15-minute overlaps between their 12-hour shifts inside the shuttle laboratory.

"We just kind of wave as we pass in the tunnel going to work each day," Davis said.

Lee said it wasn't until Wednesday — midway through the eight-day mission — that he and Davis found time to have their pictures taken together.

"We don't see much of each other ... but nevertheless, we're still sharing this flight and I've really enjoyed it," Davis said during a space-to-Earth news conference.

Lee, 40, and Davis, 38, both mechanical engineers, fell in love while training for the mission.

They married in January 1991, even though they knew one might be bumped from the flight.

NASA reluctantly made an exception to its policy barring married couples from flying together in space, and this history was made Saturday when Endeavour blasted into orbit.

But that's the only kind of history for them. Lee and Davis insisted before the flight that no sex-in-space experiments were requested or planned.

The flight is due to end with a Sunday landing at Kennedy Space Center.

#### NCAA rules Bearcats center not eligible; appeal likely

**CINCINNATI** — The NCAA has determined that Cincinnati center Corie Blount has used up his college eligibility.

NCAA executive director Richard Schultz sent a separate response indicating that he would permit an appeal to the NCAA Council. Cincinnati athletic director Rick Taylor said Thursday, adding the university intends to appeal.

Blount played in four games early in the 1988-89 season at Rancho Santiago Junior College in Santa Ana, Calif., before sustaining a season-ending injury. He received a medical hardship waiver from the California Community Colleges Association, and later transferred to Cincinnati.

#### Expos-Pirates tie would be decided in Montreal

**NEW YORK** — If the Expos and Pittsburgh Pirates are tied for first place after 162 games, a one-game playoff will be held in Montreal, the National League said Thursday.

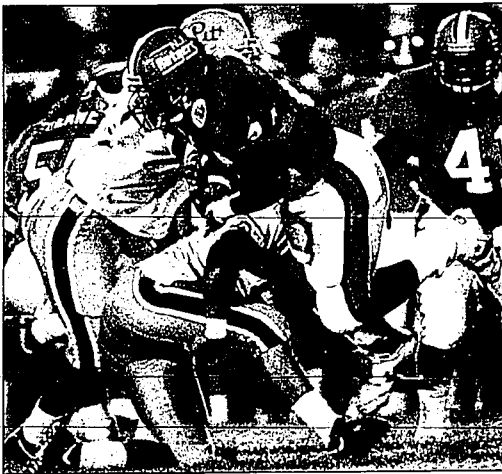

Bruce Presley caught one of two touchdown passes thrown by Bryan Fortay, who stood out in a return to the starting job. Presley also ran two yards for what proved to be a game-winning touchdown early in the fourth quarter as Rutgers beat Pitt for the first time after nine losses.

The win was the second straight for Rutgers (2-1 overall, 1-1 Big East). Pitt (1-2, 0-2) has lost two in a row.

The loss spoiled what should have been a memorable night for Van Pelt, who completed 36 of 55 passes for 395 and two touchdowns. The four-year starter needed just 31 yards to break Marino's career passing mark of 8,597 yards set in 1982. He broke that with a 15-yard pass to Chris Bouyer with 7:14 left in the second quarter. He got another school record with 91-yard scoring pass play to Dietrich Jells with Pitt trailing 14-3 in the third quarter.

However, three of Van Pelt's passes went to Rutgers players. The first was on a 2-point conversion after the long TD and the other two were in the fourth quarter with Pitt in Rutgers territory threatening to get back into the game.

## Top Big Sky preseason picks clash

The Big Sky Conference football teams picked first and second in a preseason media poll open their league schedule Saturday with a game that promises plenty of passing, lots of scoring and precious little defense.

Weber State (1-1), ranked 11th in the NCAA Division I-AA preseason poll, visits Idaho (2-0), ranked 9th nationally,

the preseason and now sixth.

All six other Big Sky teams play non-conference opponents this week.

## NFL owners put expansion on hold; cancel WL season

**GRAPEVINE, Texas** — Expansion was postponed and the World League was suspended Thursday by NFL owners meeting to discuss the fallout from last week's antitrust verdict in Minneapolis.

While the league continued to insist that it did no worse than break even in the verdict, which awarded \$1.6 billion to four players and declared the Plan B free agent system illegal, Thursday's actions seemed clearly tied to the action of the federal jury.

The only specifics were to postpone a decision on choosing two new expansion cities, scheduled to be picked at a meeting in Chicago on Oct. 20, and to cancel next spring's World League season. Commissioner Paul Tagliabue said if the World League is revived, it would be

oriented more to Europe; where it was more popular than in the United States.

As for expansion, Tagliabue didn't rule out the league sticking to its timetable to expand in 1994, and added:

"Right now, the priorities are labor and a new television contract. It's a matter of priorities."

On labor, Tagliabue was more conciliatory than he has been since the verdict. He said the league would have some plan in place by next Feb. 1, when more than 500 players are due to become free agents, and that he hoped it would be through the first collective bargaining agreement since the players' strike five years ago.

"My view is that when people sit down and view the realities, they'll view it as a win-win situation to sit down at the table."

# Frost smokes field for early PGA lead

**COAL VALLEY, Ill. (AP) —** David Frost, an amateur for 62 Thursday and held a two-stroke lead in the first round of the Hardee's Golf Classic, which was suspended because of a 2-hour rain delay.

Frost, who won the Buick Classic in June, finished three of his first five holes and finished with eight birdies and one bogey in coming within a stroke of the course record. "I could have putted with my foot today," Frost said after what he called his best round of the year.

Tom Lehman, the leading money-winner on the Ben Hogan Tour last year, Willie Wood, who finished second in the Hardee's last year, and Bart Bryant were tied for second at 64.

Lehman already has posted eight Top 10 finishes this year but is still looking for his first PGA victory.

The group of eight one stroke back in third included Bryant's older brother, Brad, and defending champion D.J. Weirberg.

Twenty-four golfers were still on the course when play was suspended at 7:08 p.m. CDT. Those players were to resume their rounds at 7:30 a.m. Friday with the second round to be played as scheduled.

"He was pretty impressive," said

Paul Azinger, who played with Frost and was also in the group at 65. "We feel just each other," Azinger said. "He could have shot in the 50s. He hit it so close. He could have used a broom handle and shot the same score."

Frost missed a couple of short putts, but he wasn't complaining even after rain disrupted his round. "You don't often have a round like that," Frost said. "You've got to enjoy it."

The rainfall left the greens soft and many players reported them choppy in the afternoon, but that didn't stop several late golfers from posting lofty scores.

The crowd favorite Thursday was clearly John Daly, who finished at 69.

Hundreds of fans ignored rainy conditions to follow Daly, who displayed his dramatic driver and erratic putter and managed two birdies and a bogey.

A full slate of 156 golfers attacked the long, narrow fairways and small, fast greens at Oskowood Country Club for a share of the \$1 million purse.

Weirberg is trying to become the first person to win the Hardee's three times. No one has managed consecutive victories in the 20 years since it became a PGA Tour event.

# Panthers face running Bengals

**CEDAR FALLS, Iowa (AP) —** Playing a Big Sky Conference team usually means burning up on pass defense. With Idaho State, that's no longer the case.

Idaho State, which plays at Northern Iowa on Saturday, has a new coach and a new-law offense that has shifted its emphasis to running the ball. The Bengals' leading rusher is a converted wide receiver and they're off to a 2-0 start, their best since 1985.

"They are a little off the track for a Big Sky team," Northern Iowa coach Terry Allen said. "They have rejuvenated the running game. They have an exceptional tailback."

The tailback is senior Sylvester Jones, who is among the top 10 on

Idaho State's all-time receiving list. Jones has rushed for 348 yards and three touchdowns. He ran for 187 yards last week in a 24-20 victory over Boise State. It was Idaho State's first victory over Boise State since 1987.

The Bengals won it on a 22-yard touchdown pass with 5 seconds left.

"That kind of gets your attention," said Allen, whose team lost to Boise State 20-3 in the first round of the 1990 Division I-AA playoffs.

Idaho State-quarterback-Paul Putnam, a transfer from Ricks College, has thrown only 34 passes, which would be a good half for many Big Sky teams. He has completed 15 for 206 yards and three touchdowns, including the game winner against Boise State.

A trick kickoff return called the Globe of Death set up that touchdown. The Bengals' six deep men huddled and then broke in different directions, each pretending to have the ball. The return went for 50 yards.

UNI defensive end Casey Smith expects to see more trick-hold coach Brian McNeese on Saturdays.

"They will try anything to win here," he said. "They know it's going to be tough to come here and win, so they're going to pull everything out of the bag."

Northern Iowa began the season last week with a 21-18 victory at McNeese State. The Panthers will be trying for their 18th straight victory at home. They haven't lost at the UNI-

Dome since the 1989 season opener.

"This is our terror dome, our dome of doom," running back Hank Corner said. "We can't lose here. That's a no-win."

Allen hopes his team is sharper than it was last week. He counted 53 mental mistakes against McNeese State. That figure was in the teens and 20s at the end of last year, he said.

"Hopefully, all of the jitters will be over with," Smith said. "If everyone's on the right page, we'll be all right."

Former Northern Iowa player Mark Caballero coaches the Idaho State running backs. Caballero was an all-Gateway Conference offensive guard in 1984 and '85 and coached UNI's offensive line from 1986-88.

# Ankle injury benches Wolverines' Grbac

**ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) —** Elvis Grbac is out and Todd Collins is in as Michigan's quarterback against Oklahoma State on Saturday.

Grbac injured his left ankle last week in the Wolverines' 17-17 tie at Notre Dame.

The injury occurred with about 10 minutes left in the game, but Grbac continued to play.

When he could hardly get off the bus back at Ann Arbor, coaches realized Grbac was hurt, so they thought, Grbac has been on crutches with the ankle in a light cast all week.

"We're not going to play him," coach Gary Moeller said Thursday. "We think it's better to keep the ankle healthy. If everything goes well, Elvis might be able to play the following week against Houston."

Oklahoma State (1-0) defeated Indiana State in its opener. The Cowboys were idle last week.

Collins is almost a Grbac clone. Both are 6-foot-5 and a little over 230 pounds.

The difference is experience. Collins has almost none.

Last year, he got some mop-up duty in six games, including the Rose Bowl loss to Washington, completing 16 of 26 passes for 138 yards with no touchdowns and no interceptions.

"I've been out there taking snaps with the first team," Collins said. "It's been a little bit different."

"I think the way we're coached to play is part of how Elvis and I are

similar in the way we play. We're about the same size, we both have strong arms, and we're not exceedingly mobile."

As fate would have it, Grbac got his first action under similar circumstances. As a redshirt freshman in 1989, he started four games as a replacement for injured

Michael Taylor. He went 4-0 in those starts.

When Taylor recovered, Grbac went back to the bench.

Grbac became the regular quarterback the following year and led Michigan to a victory in the Gator Bowl. Last season, he completed 165 of 254 passes for

2,085 yards and 25 touchdowns, helping split end Desmond Howard earn the Heisman Trophy.

Collins, a standout high school player at Walpole, Mass., is ticketed to be the regular for two seasons, beginning next year.

"I'd been enough knowing I'll sit this year," Collins said. "But I accept it. Hey, every school I visited had a really good QB ahead of me. Notre Dame had Rick Mirer, Syracuse had Marvin Graves, Illinois had Jason Verduzco, and Glenn Foley was at Boston College."

"I asked him if he was nervous," Moeller said. "He said he was. I said, 'You'd better be. You're a damned fool if you're not.'"

"I think Todd will do a more than adequate job. He's not Elvis, but he's a good quarterback. He just doesn't have the game experience. I have all the confidence in the world in Todd Collins."

As a high school freshman, Collins backed up former Iowa quarterback Matt Rodgers.

Their high school coach, John Lee, says Collins is the better of the two.

"Todd is probably the best pure athlete I've ever coached," Lee said. "He was a natural, and nothing bothered him."

He apparently is no slouch in the classroom, either. The political science major also was recruited by Harvard.

"I want to go to law school and study corporate law," Collins said.

# Rocket makes donation, avoids suspension

**VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) —** Rocket Ismail agreed Thursday to make a \$10,000 charitable donation rather than be suspended and fined for kicking an opponent in a Canadian Football League melee involving the Toronto Argonauts and Calgary Stampeders.

Ismail will donate his fine to the Special Olympics chapter of Ontario after accepting a recommendation by CFL commissioner Larry Smith.

The commissioner gave Ismail the choice between a one-game suspension and \$1,000 fine or the charitable donation.

Smith also fined four other Argos, including head coach Adam Ritto and Andy McVey of the Stampedeers for their roles in the second-half brawl at the Toronto bench last Sunday.

"These are clearly the actions of an irate child," Smith said of Ismail. "This is the biggest fine levied in the history of our league."

Ismail will be allowed to play Saturday in Vancouver against the B.C. Lions.

"I find it completely unacceptable behavior and won't condone it," Smith said.

"Football is a game of controlled aggression and, once you go beyond that point, you fall over the cliff. There's no place in sports for people who can't control themselves."

Rito was fined \$500 for exhibiting poor leadership in a tight situation; Argos safety Dave Van-Belleghem was fined \$350 for investigating the incident; Toronto receiver David Williams was fined \$250 for abusive behavior and Argos receiver Darrell

Smith was fined \$500 for vulgarity. McVey was fined \$250 for unacceptable behavior.

Ismail twice kicked McVey while the Calgary player wrestled with Van-Belleghem.

Ismail also attempted to jump on McVey's head with both feet, but missed.

"I'm grateful that I did have the option and I think the second option was a lot better than the first one

because more people can benefit from it," Ismail said.

Ismail, a former Notre Dame star who signed with Toronto for more than \$4 million per year, went on community television after the Calgary game to apologize for his actions. "I think it was very uncharacteristic of Rocket to do what he did," McVey said. "It showed just a lot of frustration ... an isolated incident."

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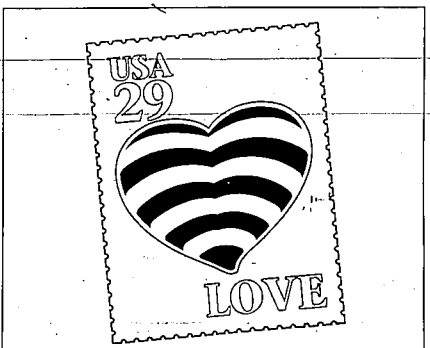

### Another political season of TV (yawn) debates

Too bad President Bush doesn't want to meet Bill Clinton in a rough-and-tumble debate, instead of the usual ten-party with a panel of journalists.

Iahoans have seen the merits of kick-and-pounce debating this year, in the series of face-offs between Senate candidates. Dirk Kempthorne and Richard Stallings.

The House mayor and the 2nd District Congressman have met five times in five cities. Each time it has been a knuckle to nose, with only a single moderator to keep order.

Voters saw some of what these guys were made of, Kempthorne, cool and deliberate. Stallings, fiery and pugnacious. Cobra and mongoose. Ali and Frazier.

Bill Paw. In your snoot, fella.

What a refreshing change from the quadrennial patycake tournament. In most debates, whether state or national, viewers must endure a preening panel of journalists, trying to show how smart they are by asking acutely perceptive questions.

News paper journalists are the worst. There's a reason these guys don't have TV jobs. They're windy and pompous, and most of them wear hairstyles from the Ford administration. Newspaper guys on TV are a great advertisement for radio.

With reporters in the way, the candidates rarely confront one another directly. They get by on rehearsed speeches and canned one-liners. Body blows such as Ronald Reagan's "Here you go again," and Lloyd Bentsen's "You're no Jack Kennedy," are the memorable exception rather than the norm.

But Bush prefers this tired style of debate - and who can blame him? He's lousy on his feet. His ad libs tumble into jortous mazes of syntax.

Besides, that panel of reporters is likely to ask Clinton a lot of rude questions that Bush would be reluctant to mention himself. Questions on topics like bimbo and draft dodging.

So we won't see Bush and Clinton slashing at each other the way Kempthorne and Stallings have.

To put things in perspective, though, remember that no debate will really show a candidate's presidential mettle. It may provide a glimpse of his character and mental agility, but debating skills are not the key to a successful presidency.

For a better gauge of brains and preparation, a battery of essay tests might be better.

But it would make mighty grim video.

## Clean up toxic waste that's polluting media

Let's be clear about what's at issue here, without being tagged as Jesse Helms. But Buchanan or Dan Quayle or gagged as prudish, Puritans or potential censors.

The problem is the violence, a vicious epidemic of violence, sexual deviance and assault on common decency in the movies, on TV and in pop music.

Much of the powerful and pervasive entertainment media is not only losing touch with much of the mainstream audiences but are attacking their values, and contributing to the rising level of violence and social pathology in our society.

The situation has become so widespread and so damaging it must be considered a serious, national public health issue, TV Guide warned last month.

Next month, in a hard-hitting new book, "Hollywood's America," film critic Michael Medved blasts the entertainment industry for its increasing preoccupation with violence and brutality, its hostile undermining of the family and its glorification of promiscuity, foul language and bizarre behavior.

Neither Medved nor TV Guide exaggerates. And Murphy Brown is among the least of the problems.

"More televised violence than at any time in the medium's history is flowing into American homes," notes TV Guide.

Medved's book is specific almost to the point of nausea in describing the cannibalism, sexual violence against women, capital killings and antisocial bias so common now in the entertainment industry's products.

Moreover, the messages and the morality of these offerings generally go unquestioned, especially by critics. Medved points out, violence seems to be critically acceptable if the brains splatter from an artistic way.

Cannibalism can win Oscars if the lighting is well done and the methods imaginatively macabre. Pop lyrics describing incest and sexual brutality usually get a pass if the rap beat is catching and the rape can be equated with racial protest.

Medved talks about the "accumulated impact of irrepressible messages that are repeated hour after hour, year after year."

The most significant problems of the popular culture stem from the pervasive presence of antisocial material, not from a few isolated examples of offensiveness.

The public is being desensitized to film violence as entertainment, he says. It takes more to shock than it did a decade or two ago.

Violence begins to seem acceptable, a behavior norm. So does sex outside marriage. Outrageous behavior starts to seem routine. Foul language no longer grates.

The entertainment media are giving a legitimacy to sex and violence. As a result, they are making all of us. Women are often mistreated. Sexual activity is 13 times more likely to be shown as occurring outside of marriage than within.

Five times as many people go to church in a given week as go to the movies, Medved points out. But the entertainment media

virtually ignore religion and rarely suggest that actors may have moral motivations.

Medved points out that "more than 3,000 research projects and scientific studies between 1960 and 1992 have confirmed the connection between a steady diet of violent entertainment and aggressive and antisocial behavior."

Depression, fearfulness and feelings of being ineffective and vulnerable in a dangerous world are also associated with heavy watching of violent entertainment, studies show.

TV Guide points out, "the overwhelming weight of scientific opinion now holds that television violence is indeed responsible for a percentage of the real violence in our society. What is new is that psychologists, child experts and the medical community are just now beginning to treat televised violence as a serious public health issue."

Industry spokespeople who say the linkage has not been proven are beginning to sound as hollow as Tobacco Institute trying to wiggle away from all the evidence tying cigarettes to lung cancer.

But it's difficult to deny that violent TV films don't influence behavior when advertisers are charged millions of dollars for a few short commercials on the same programs that they are assured will affect viewers.

Responsible parents can, of course, try to reduce the amount of violence, sexual deviance and smut to which their children are exposed. They can teach their children moral values and better ways to handle conflicts. But that doesn't solve the problem of increasing violence impacting on youngsters whose homes make them more susceptible to such influences.

Schools can help children learn to be critical viewers, to understand the violence is fake and that in real life there are serious consequences to such behavior.

Watching groups can help. Boycotts can be effective in rare, specific instances. But the movie industry seems indifferent to the reasons why millions of adults, who grew up with a fascination for films, rarely go to see them now.

And the TV industry seems to be trying to one with a steady loss of viewers by churning out more of the same junk.

But public opinion is still the most effective and powerful weapon, although it can take time to energize and mobilize.

The public has every right to reject the toxic wastes that are pouring out of the entertainment media. As a result, those who are producing the pollution will find it unprofitable and impossible to keep on churning out what doesn't sell.

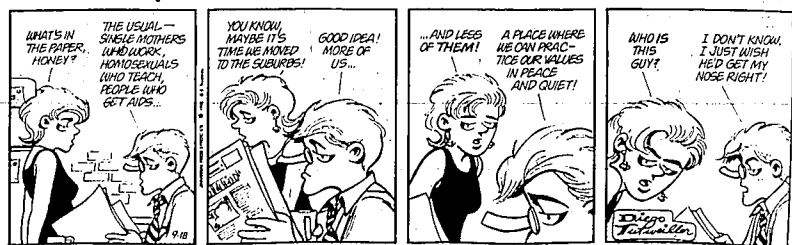

# Navajo code talkers mark 50-year anniversary of war service

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — Federal officials Tuesday honored the 50th anniversary of the group of Navajo war veterans who baffled the Japanese with their code-within-a-code messages.

Joe Kellwood, one of more than 330 Navajo "code talkers" during World War II, sent a special code-talker message to Keith Little in Washington, wishing "the world-peace and wisdom."

Using a high-tech video telephone from an office at a Motorola plant, Kellwood told Little:

"To our commanders at the Pentagon,

people of the United States and to people all over the world: As we celebrate our 50th anniversary to the survivors, members of the Navajo Code Talkers of World War II and their families ask that God grant us peace and the wisdom and love to preserve it."

Kellwood spent several minutes sending the 54-word message encoded and translated into Navajo.

After sending the message, Kellwood remarked "That's good, by golly. He got it."

Little, also a former code talker, was to relay the message, in English, to Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of

Staff, at a special ceremony. Powell was to read the message later in the day at the dedication of a Pentagon museum display honoring the code talkers.

The 71-year-old Kellwood earlier this week recalled the code talkers' proficiency in both languages.

"You had to be good in English and good in Navajo," Kellwood said. "You would make names for the letters and memorize them, so that you would have nothing with you when you sent a message."

Kellwood, who grew up near Ganado on the Navajo Reservation in northeast Ari-

zona, said he spent three years in the Marines during the war.

The signals the code-talkers sent were actually a code within a code, because letters were assigned words and then translated into Navajo, which sounds nothing like English. Further, Kellwood said, common letters were assigned several different words, which were then alternated.

"Once you mastering the thing, it was easy," Kellwood said. "English was never mentioned when transmitting a message."

The Phoenix resident who spent 40 years as a carpenter after the war said he couldn't

remember any one message as his most important. The messages he was given always involved troops — when they needed support or to pinpoint where they were. Five Navajos were killed in action during the war.

Kellwood said he remembers sending messages during battles. Asked if he had ever been close to death, he said, "too many times."

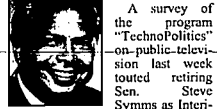
He said the code-talkers were taught all types of communication, from Morse code to setting up radio links, before being sent into battle.

## EchoHawk could head the Interior

BOISE (AP) — Yet another Idahoan may be in line to head the Department of Interior. In Democratic Attorney General Larry EchoHawk.

The O'Leary-Kamber Report's September edition said EchoHawk is one of four likely candidates should Bill Clinton win in November.

A bright, attractive leader, EchoHawk would be a bold appointment to Interior," said the Washington, D.C., newsletter.



EchoHawk should be re-elected.

Other candidates mentioned on the O'Leary report were former Arizona Gov. Bruce Babbitt, Hawaii Gov. John Waiheae and retiring Colorado Sen. Jim Walsh.

EchoHawk said he would "seriously consider" the post if offered. "I guess I wouldn't be surprised if I had an opportunity to serve in a Clinton administration, but I don't know if I'd do it because I love what I'm doing here," he said.

Gov. Cecil Andrus, who held the job from 1977-81, said: "Larry EchoHawk would do an excellent job if he were given the chance. I hope they don't offer it to him because his future is very bright here."

EchoHawk, considered a candidate for governor in 1994 and the U.S. Senate in 1996, would likely have to give up on a governor's race. But he could be positioned to run for the Senate.

## Juveniles cited for starting fire unintentionally

POCATELLO (AP) — Two teenagers will be cited in juvenile court for accidentally starting a 225-acre brush fire Wednesday that threatened houses in an exclusive residential area northeast of Pocatello.

Bannock County Sheriff Bill Lynn said the boys, aged 14 and 13, admitted starting the fire.

"It wasn't intentional," he said. "It was just a lack of care."

It apparently started around 4 p.m. as a small campfire in a sagebrush and juniper-covered gully below the home of Henry and Paula West.

The flames licked the family's driveway and came within 40 yards of the large house which, with the West's 20 acres, is valued at nearly \$230,000, according to county assessor records.

The fire was declared contained by the Bureau of Land Management at 7 a.m. Thursday and full control was expected later in the day. The BLM said about 80 of its firefighters battled the blaze, along with 20 to 25 from other agencies.

## Robbery of potato chip truck a hoax

LAS VEGAS (AP) — A story about dim-witted bandits robbing a potato chip truck — thinking it carried casino gaming chips — has been branded a hoax.

"We're just glad that it was not true; that we didn't have people out there this stupid," said Lt. Carl Fruge, a spokesman for the Las Vegas Metro Police Department.

Police declared the case unfounded Wednesday after giving driver Rodney Dwayne Bont a polygraph examination.

Bont told police last week that he was accosted at knife point and forced to drive across town in a delivery truck belonging to Vegas Chips, a local potato chip company. Wednesday Bont declined comment when asked whether the robbery was a hoax. But he admitted having a gambling problem.

# French farmers' anger could humble EC

STRASBOURG, France — (AP) — France's 1 million farmers have benefited greatly from generous European Community subsidies, yet many will be voting to humble the EC in Sunday's crucial referendum on European union.

French farmers, who proudly call themselves peasants, may doom the controversial Maastricht treaty, possibly halting themselves in the process. Polls indicate opinion on the treaty is evenly divided, and the farmers, most of whom oppose it, could tip the balance.

"There's no logic in this. The peasants are shooting themselves in the foot," said Jacques Dilasser, 35, a farm adviser from this small village in Brittany, France's picturesque western peninsula.

The pact aims to create a single currency and unified diplomatic and economic policies for the 12 EC countries.

The treaty itself doesn't deal at all with agriculture. But opinion polls and comments from farmers' union leaders indicate many farmers see a "no" vote as revenge for EC betrayal in world trade talks earlier this year, when negotiators agreed to U.S. de-

mands to cut subsidies.

A French rejection of the treaty would be severe setback for the EC, which has brought undreamed-of prosperity to Western Europe's farmers through price supports and subsi-

dies since its creation in 1957. President Bush outraged the EC two weeks ago by pledging new export subsidies to American farmers.

Jacques Dilasser's brother-in-law, Bernard Goumison, is among many

Breton farmers who fiercely oppose the treaty.

"It would take you a day to read this thing," said Goumison, thumping a 62-page copy of the treaty that the government mailed to each voter. "Who has a day to waste? I get the feeling that even the politicians don't know what's in it."

Goumison, a pig farmer, believes the EC will stay together, treaty or no. In his view, the treaty promotes the interests of "paper-scratchers and politicians."

Under new EC rules, farmers receive bonuses to take land out of production to ease huge food surpluses they produced with the help of subsidies. Bernard believes farmers eventually will lose out as EC taxpayers demand cuts in farm spending.

# Pending talks offer no respite from fighting

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Fierce fighting erupted in the western part of the capital Thursday in what the U.N. commander said was an apparent attempt to stake claims before the opening of peace talks in Geneva on Friday.

Bosnia's increasingly isolated government rejected a Serb proposal to use the talks to start dividing the republic into ethnic regions. Forces of the Muslim-led government poured into Stup and Azici after Serb rebels launched a fierce attack with tank guns, artillery and mortars on the western neighborhoods. The government forces had been pushed back into that area in recent fighting.

Gen. Hussein Aly Abdel Razeek, the Egyptian commander of U.N. forces in Bosnia, said the battles appeared to be an attempt to lay territorial claims.

"They are going to the Geneva talks, and they are going with some cards in their pockets," he said.

Although the fighting was escalating, he said it was a "war of attrition" and that neither side had much chance of winning.

Bosnian government defense headquarters were deserted because all available officers and troops rushed to reinforce the Stup and Azici fronts, where the fighting sent columns of thick black smoke into the sky.

### Dutch balloonists build 30-mile lead

ROTTERDAM, Netherlands — Dutch balloonists built a 30-mile lead Thursday as they headed into open sea off Nova Scotia in the first ever trans-Atlantic balloon race.

But the second-place U.S. team was better positioned to climb into stronger westerly winds, said Montique Willems, the reserve pilot for The Dutch team.

"At this point, even the team in last place can finally win the race," she said.

Britain was in third place, followed by Belgium, with Germany bringing up the rear about 100 miles behind the leader, according to the race tracking center at Rotterdam's Zestienhoven airport.

The two-man crew lifted off on the perilous, 3,000-mile voyage before dawn Wednesday from a racetrack in Bangor, Maine.

### Danny the drinking goat found shot

BRISBANE, Australia — Danny the goat has drunk his final beer.

For the last 10 years, Danny entertained tourists on Moreton Island, six miles east of the Queensland state capital, Brisbane, with his ability to pick up a mug and swig beer.

The talent earned him coverage in local newspapers and a spot on the television program "Australia's Funniest Home Videos."

But this week, Danny was found shot to death, owner Leila Oakey said Thursday.

"People are upset," she said. "He had a personality, and was a real tourist attraction."

### Collector pays \$11,880 for war medals

LONDON — An American collector on Thursday paid \$11,880 for medals awarded to U.S. Gen. Walton H. Walker, who commanded 8th Army and United Nations forces in the Korean War in 1950, Solteby's said.

The buyer was not identified, nor was the seller, another American collector. The auction house said U.S. law bars the sale of American medals in the United States, particularly those of recent campaigns.

Walker, a Texan, was killed in a road accident in 1950 in South Korea. He was at a crisis in his career after ordering a 120-mile retreat from advancing Chinese forces.

### Yeltsin plans visit to South Korea

SEOUL, South Korea — Russian President Boris Yeltsin will visit South Korea in November, state television reported Thursday.

Yeltsin will become the first Russian head of state to visit South Korea. The Korea Broadcasting System, quoting unidentified Seoul government sources, said the visit was set for Nov. 18-20.

Yeltsin originally had been scheduled to visit South Korea and Japan this week.

The trip was canceled amid growing tensions over Japan's demand that Russia return four disputed islands seized by the former Soviet Union at the end of World War II.

While in Seoul, Yeltsin will meet with South Korean President Roh Tae-woo and sign a friendship treaty, state television said.

### Return of avalanche sensors sought

MANILA, Philippines — Officials appealed Thursday for thieves to return sensors that warn of impending avalanches triggered by Mount Pinatubo.

The Regional Disaster Coordinating Council said thieves stole all the devices and radio sets that had been installed along the slopes of the volcano. In June 1991, the volcano exploded in one of the century's biggest eruptions, dumping more than 100 million tons of debris on the mountain's slopes.

With the advent of the rainy season, the debris has been washing down the slopes, forcing nearly 180,000 people to flee their homes.

### Vandals scratch swastika on Rabin car

JERUSALEM — Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin's wife said Thursday that a cat rented for her use in Berlin was replaced after vandals scratched a swastika on it.

Leah Rabin, who fled Nazi Germany with her family in 1933 at the age of 5, said the rise of racism and anti-Semitism in Germany was evident during her three-day visit there with her husband.

She said she did not see the swastika because the car was replaced immediately.

The Rabins ended their trip to Germany on Wednesday.

### 2,100 U.S. troops aid efforts in Somalia

MOGADISHU, Somalia — Four warships carrying 2,100 U.S. Marines arrived off Somalia on Thursday, and a spokesman for the country's main warlord said he had no objection to their presence.

The Marines are to provide support for a U.S. airlift of U.N. troops to Mogadishu, the besieged Somali capital.

The U.S. Air Force Reserve and the National Guard are transporting 500 U.N. soldiers from Pakistan, 60 of whom had arrived in Mogadishu by Wednesday. The rest are scheduled to arrive by the end of the month.

The Marines from the 11th Marine Expeditionary Unit, who were moved from the Persian Gulf to international waters off Somalia, are to provide "support of this movement of the Pakistani security force," Pentagon spokesman Bob Hall said Thursday at a briefing in Washington.

"That's their only purpose."

## Fahd appoints justice minister to new council

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — King Fahd of Saudi Arabia appointed his justice minister Thursday to head a long-awaited advisory council, a milestone of sorts for the conservative Islamic monarchy but far short of Western-style democracy.

The appointment of Mollah bin Ibrahim bin Jubair as speaker of the 60-member Majlis, or consultative council, is a big step in the evolving politics of the Arab world. Economic progress and the presence of Western forces during the Gulf War have created pressures for change in the region. Unlike Western representative bodies, members of the Majlis will be appointed by the king but will not be able to initiate legislation — only advise the king of his views.

Fahd is expected to announce the Majlis members on Sept. 23, the 60th anniversary of the founding of the monarchy by Abdel-Aziz bin Abdel-Rahman Al Saud, who named the kingdom after his clan. Saudi Arabia's Majlis is expected to be conservative and composed of academics, businessmen, tribal leaders and judges.

## Woman pleads guilty in killing

Jackson and two friends, Jori Sexton and Michelle Revels, were driving east when Wersland's car smashed into them, killing Angela.

At a preliminary hearing in November, Sexton remembered the last words she told her best friend: "I said, 'I love you, Ang. I have to get some help.'"

The ordeal moved into the courts when Lynn Nelson, then the Gooding County prosecutor, charged Wersland with being drunk, negligent or both in the accident.

The front end of Wersland's car was completely on the left side of the road when she hit Jackson, according to Idaho State Police Cpl. Fred Rice, who investigated the accident.

Now Sexton and her mother, and others close to Jackson say they are angry about how the case has been handled since Phil Brown took over as prosecutor after Nelson resigned.

They are upset about Brown's proposed sentencing recommendation — one to three years in prison, with the court retaining jurisdiction in the case for 120 days.

If 5th District Magistrate John F. Varin accepts that recommendation, Wersland will be evaluated during a four-month stay at the women's prison in Orofino.

Nearly everyone gets probation after serving such a "120-day rider," Nelson said.

But Varin is not bound by Brown's

recommendation, said defense attorney Bill Hollifield of Twin Falls.

Hollifield said he will ask the judge not to send Wersland to prison at all, noting that she has never been charged with a crime before this incident.

Still, Sexton said she feels like Wersland has been given "all the options" and Angela's friends and family have been ignored in the process.

"What about what we feel?" asked Cathy Sexton, Jori's mother. "We're victims too. We'll never forget what happened."

Brown said he told Angela's mother, Julie Jackson, some time ago how he

## Crapo, Williams disagree on how to lessen federal deficit spending

TWIN FALLS — The two major candidates for the 2nd Congressional District seat continued sparring Thursday over how best to whittle down the federal budget deficit, but they agreed on one thing: Social Security and Medicare benefits should be preserved.

During a visit to Twin Falls, Democratic nominee J.D. Williams endorsed a plan crafted by House Democratic leaders to cut federal spending by \$700 billion to \$800 billion over a five-year period.

Under that plan, the budget would be divided into several categories, such as defense and domestic discretionary spending, and spending targets would be set for each category each year.

Lawmakers would have to decide which programs in each category would be funded and which would be cut, said Williams, the state auditor.

If the Congress tried to appropriate more

money for any category than allowed under the plan, the funds would be automatically sequestered — prohibited from being spent.

The plan was advanced by House leaders earlier this year in a successful attempt to head off approval of a balanced-budget constitutional amendment.

Williams admitted that the plan was similar to previous efforts, such as the 1985 Gramm-Rudman-Hollings law, that have failed to bring the deficit under control.

But he said the close call with the balanced-budget amendment, combined with a projected 150 new members of Congress next year, will give lawmakers the political guts to stick with the plan.

Republican candidate Mike Crapo, however, said that plan won't work, because individual members of Congress will fight to protect their pet projects.

"The entire political process is thrown into a turf battle under that approach,"

Crapo, the president pro tem of the state Senate. "We do not have the time to wait for the political process to work that slowly. We need to balance the budget now."

The way to do that, he said, is to impose across-the-board cuts on every federal program — except Social Security and Medicare benefits.

Such cuts, which would be between 2 and 5 percent, would force agencies to trim waste and inefficiency and spread the deficit-reduction burden more evenly, Crapo said.

Although Crapo said some deeper cuts are also needed — cutting agencies' travel budgets by 15 to 20 percent, for example, or eliminating such bodies as the American Battle Monuments Commission — across-the-board cuts are the only way to sidestep traditional pork-barrel politics.

Williams has attacked Crapo's across-the-board cuts as a "chicken" way to reduce the deficit. "What's Congress for?"

## Energy Department agrees to conduct full-scale environmental assessment

BOISE — The U.S. Department of Energy has agreed to prepare a full-scale environmental impact statement on shipments of radioactive waste from a Colorado nuclear plant to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

That is expected to delay transfer until at least 1994 of any more spent nuclear fuel to the INEL from Public Service Co. of Colorado's mothballed Fort St. Vrain reactor.

The agreement was included in documents the Energy Department filed on Thursday with U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan in response to the state's legal challenge of the agency's waste shipment plans.

"It looks like a victory for us in the long continuing battle to preclude the dumping of nuclear waste in the state of Idaho," Gov. Cecil Andrus said. "I'll feel better when Judge Ryan says he accepts their pleading, but they have agreed to shelve no more Fort St. Vrain waste down our throat."

Ryan ruled against the state's attempt to

stop spent fuel shipments in the spring of 1991, citing a constitution prohibition against state interference with interstate commerce.

But a state contelecom alleged that the Energy Department had violated federal environmental laws by not conducting a full environmental impact statement on its shipments from Colorado to Idaho.

Andrus said Thursday's action apparently was an attempt to resolve that issue.

"This is at long last a clear statement from DOE that they're going to quit accepting commercial waste from Fort St. Vrain," he said. "In this brief they also made it clear that they plan to do a sitewide EIS, which is something we've been asking for a long time."

Almost 224,000 pounds of spent fuel from the Colorado plant already is being stored at the INEL under a 1965 Public Service contract with the Energy Department. But since a federal court decision temporarily blocked shipments last fall, the utility has been storing additional waste from the decommissioned reactor in a

## Hub Butte not choice for landfill

TWIN FALLS — The east side of Hub Butte apparently isn't the choice spot for a new Twin Falls County landfill that a siting group had hoped.

The area has only 5 or 6 feet of dirt — not enough for a landfill, at least in that spot.

It was not until late last week when the siting group found the patch of Burgau of Land Management ground. But when the county dug with backhoes to see how deep the soil might run, they hit rock at 6 feet, the Twin Falls County commissioners said Thursday.

Hub Butte sits several miles south of Twin Falls and the county's current main landfill is dug into the butte's north side. The siting committee looked at BLM land because the county might be able to acquire it for little money.

But County Solid Waste Director Darrell Heider said Tuesday that he doubted the butte's east slope had deep enough soil. He and other county officials say that deeper soil makes a landfill more economical because it uses less ground to bury garbage.

The siting group also found a large depression on the butte's south side that the BLM owns. Gerald Tews, head of the siting group, said earlier this week that this area might have soil up to 10 feet deep.

If the site were chosen, and more dirt needed, Tews and other committee members suggested dirt could be hauled from nearby and the landfill could be built up to the sides of the depression.

But County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman doesn't favor that idea.

"The committee seems to think they can run a landfill in 5 or 6 feet of dirt, but I don't think that's reasonable," Hempleman said.

"I still think they need to look someplace else," he said.

Hempleman suggested the committee look at land south of the Butte on the east side of U.S. Highway 93. The area is called Loughmiller's farm.

Neither Hempleman nor Commissioners Norma Blass and Jim Fraley would rule out another area southwest of Filer as a potential site. A ridge of BLM land four miles west of Highway 93 between 3300 and 3200 North has up to 40 feet of soil.

But area residents have offered up petitions against that idea and say they'll fight putting a landfill there in court if they have to.

But the commissioners hope that if that site were chosen, the county might be able to build a road that would steer traffic away from area residents. The siting group liked the spot as well, but started looking elsewhere after people protested.

## State Board of Education to ask for 11.6% increase

MOSCOW — The Idaho Board of Education is seeking an 11.6 percent increase for Idaho's public universities and other agencies under its control in the coming fiscal year.

In a 4-1 vote Thursday, the regents approved the budget request for about \$228.67 million in state money.

There was no information available at press time on the fate of the College of Southern Idaho's request for a state funding increase of almost 5 percent.

Earlier, the board's finance committee slashed about \$11 million from requests by the universities and other agencies.

Their base budgets already have been cut by either 1 percent or 1.5 percent in this fiscal year through a mandate by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

Board member Karl Shurtliff of

Boise dissented, while board members Roy Mosman of Moscow, Joe Parkinson of Boise and Keith Hinkley of Blackfoot were absent.

Wednesday, Shurtliff proposed slashing 25 percent from the state board's office budget and eliminating the equivalent of 3 positions. But his proposal was dead on arrival with the other board members.

Board chairwoman Diane Bilyeu of Pocatello contended Thursday the panel must show the needs of Idaho's universities and college to lawmakers.

"The appropriation ultimately will depend on the fate of the 1 Percent Initiative in November and the economy, she said.

"With the restraints we know are in place, my hope is that because of the mandate by some of the (specific budget requests), some of them would be funded," Bilyeu said.

# Williams says NPR dead

TWIN FALLS — A proposed New Production Reactor may be on the skids, says 2nd Congressional District candidate Bill Williams. "NPR, I think, is dead," Williams said during a campaign stop in Twin Falls Thursday.

Williams, the state auditor and a Democrat, is running against Idaho House Republican Mike Crapo for the full seat vacated by Democratic U.S. Rep. Richard Stallings, who is seeking a Senate seat.

The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is one of two sites proposed for the reactor, which would produce tritium, a radioactive form of hydrogen used to increase the power of nuclear bombs.

The other site is the federal Energy Department's Savannah River Site in South Carolina, believed by some to be the department's favored location.

Earlier this week, Energy Secretary James Watkins announced the postponement of the project until at least 1995.

Watkins said the nation did not immediately need a new source of tritium given recent changes in

world politics and a reduced nuclear stockpile.

A Sept. 14 letter from President Bush asks Congress to transfer \$186 million from the NPR program to other programs.

"This reallocation would support nonproliferation activities and decontamination of hazardous toxic and radioactive facilities," Bush wrote.

A letter from Office of Management and Budget Director Richard Darman proposes transferring \$166 to develop technologies to track nuclear materials in support of the Bush's nuclear nonproliferation initiative.

It also recommends reallocating \$20 million to South Carolina Universities Research and Education Foundation for joint academic-federal research to develop remote handling technology for the maintenance and decontamination of toxic and radioactive facilities at the Savannah River Site.

Darman said the reallocation would reduce the Energy Department's 1993 budget outlays by \$4 million.

"The DOE's original 1993 budget proposal for the NPR was \$171.8

million, department spokeswoman Joanna Stancil said.

It is not clear where the \$20 million would come from. Energy Department officials Thursday could not explain the discrepancy.

The NPR budget at INEL for 1992 is \$61 million. About 158 employees and contractor employees work on the NPR program at INEL.

Meanwhile Williams said the future of the eastern Idaho facility lies in power reactor development and radioactive and hazardous waste cleanup technology development.

Williams supports an Air Force proposal to develop a rocket engine powered by a small nuclear reactor to drive space vehicles.

But he doesn't support turning INEL into a bomb factory as outlined in the department's Complex-21. That proposal would consolidate part or all of the nation's nuclear weapons production facilities at the site of five sites, of which INEL is one.

Williams also said he thinks he can help INEL gain the credibility he said it needs by demanding credible answers to questions.

"You've got to be more than just a cheerleader for the place," he said.

# Symms' colleagues throw raucous send-off party

WASHINGTON — Flashbulbs popped, lips smacked, and spirits overflowed Wednesday night as about 350 political and personal friends of Sen. Steve Symms worked for the environment in "freedom fighting" on the congressional floor.

The 54-year-old Idaho Republican, who will retire from the Senate at the end of the year, capped his tenure on Capitol Hill by being feted by the city's finest, complete with backslaps, belly laughs and the occasional snide aside.

At times, the four-hour Symms roast resembled a miniature Republican National Convention. Ernie Sires of Wendell sang "Additional cowboy music," while Senate Republicans Robert Dole and Richard Lugar chatted with guests-like Pence-Corps-Director Elaine Chao.

"I'm here because I'm a Sigma Nu (like Symms)," said Mississippi Republican Sen. Trent Lott.

"Isn't this a fraternity party? Where's the beer?" he asked.

Democratic Sen. Pat Moynihan of New York showed the crowd

that even adversaries can share a laugh. Moynihan, the new chairman of Environment and Public Works Committee on which Symms serves, jokingly portrayed Symms as a political double-agent, working for the environment.

"In the 12 years Symms has been in the Senate, not one environmental regulation has been repealed, and thousands have been enacted," Moynihan said.

For his "pro-environmental efforts" Moynihan gave Symms a Wilderness Society sticker for his BMW; membership in three environmental organizations; and a button "Spelling the word potato in the Republican manner — with an e," Moynihan said.

"I would rather fight for the opinion on the balcony of an M-16-toting Symms rather than some word-procressor like Al Gore any day," Moynihan deadpanned.

Vice President Dan Quayle, former President Ronald Reagan and former White House Chief of Staff Andrew Young also gave John Sununu all videotaped farewell messages.

"You're as right today as you were in 1972," Quayle said, holding a bitten apple. Symms, a former fruit farmer, was elected to

the House of Representatives in 1972 on the slogan that he would "take a bite out of government."

Reagan thanked the "American hero" for his early and outspoken support and for "teaching the American spirit" in the 1970s.

From the set of his political talk show, "Crossfire," John Sununu, known for blunts and bluster, cooed, "From one pussycat to another, I'll miss you."

Idaho's other Republican senator, Larry Craig, who hosted the event, said the number of esteemed guests "was testimony to (Symms') broad base of friends."

Craig praised Symms for his diligent work on the reauthorization of the nation's new highway bill, and his "constant vigil for freedom and rights."

After a few hours of ribbing, Symms took the stage, thanked his family and friends for the party and support and said, "I'm thrilled to have this many friends here. I am humbled by this experience. It's been a lot of fun."

"I'll take home millions of memories tonight, but there's only one thing you have to remember," Symms said. "Come Jan. 4, I'll be out of a job."

# '92 audit shows Jerome schools spend less money than expected

JEROME — An audit of the Jerome School District uncovered prudent spending of tax dollars and few program cutbacks.

The District spent about \$50,000 less than expected last year, according to Paul Neilson, of McMullen McPhee and Co., a Twin Falls audit company.

Taxpayers were spared from paying \$165,855 in additional taxes this year. A sharp increase of 107 students made the district eligible for an emergency levy.

But the board decided against the levy, since taxpayers were already paying for a new elementary school, and a district windfall left over from last year.

Superintendent Will Brown said

the high school was bulging at the seams.

The increased high school enrollment could give the Jerome High School an A-1 classification, and additional sports events if the enrollment figures continue for four years.

In other business, the board:

- Adopted a resolution against the 1 Percent Initiative and agreed to urge residents to say no to the question on the ballot.
- Heard a request from the Jerome Ministerial Association that school events not be scheduled for Wednesday nights.
- "Wednesday night is traditionally a church night, but you're scheduling school events on almost every Wednesday night so the kids have to choose between school and church," the Rev. Bob Stebe said.

The board took no action on the request.

- Decided against a request from patrons of the high school baseball and softball programs who asked the district to pay for coach salaries and transportation costs.
- But officials said the students who organized the programs had agreed they would raise the funds.
- Unanimously agreed to hire a part-time computer coordinator, two computer aides and one person to watch the exit gate at the high school to assist in enforcing the closed campus rule.
- Decided to hold School Board meetings in different schools each month. Next month the meeting will be held at the high school.

intended to handle the case, Jori Sexton has refused to speak with him, he said.

But Sexton said she had an appointment with Brown on Thursday that his office canceled going to Wersland agreed to plead guilty.

Congress is there to prepare budgets," he said Thursday.

But Crapo responded by displaying a Williams campaign brochure that stated, "J.D. supports a 5 percent across-the-board budget cut (except Social Security)."

The two candidates also clashed on who can best address issues involving the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Williams said he would be the better spokesman for the INEL, because he has credibility with environmental groups and because Crapo, an Idaho Falls native whose law firm has represented INEL contractors, "has a built-in bias toward the site."

"No one from the other side of the

state will ever see him as fair" when it comes to balancing new projects at the INEL with environmental concerns, Williams said.

Crapo, though, said people from the Upper Snake River Valley have the most to lose from an environmentally "dirty" INEL.

"I have always been a staunch supporter of the INEL," he said. "But I stand on my eight-year record (in the Legislature). I've fought to make sure the environment is protected and the state has oversight authority."

Both men support bringing a research project for a nuclear-powered rocket to the site, saying it would place the INEL in the forefront of both military and space-exploration research.

facility is built at Fort St. Vrain.

Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, said Energy Department officials told him Thursday that no more Fort St. Vrain waste would be moved to the INEL for storage until the environmental review is completed on the shipments, as well as another environmental impact statement on nuclear waste nationwide.

That study will address spent fuel consolidation, storage, processing, transportation and other issues, said

Grant helps Rupert students

RUPERT — Students of Memorial Elementary School in Rupert will soon be staying after school — and liking it.

The students will be taking part in a school enrichment program that is the brainchild of teachers Anita Morfin, Jill Gull and Jayne Parker.

"It is going to be fun," said Parker. "There will be incentives and they will get a free T-shirt."

The trio of teachers wrote the grant proposal and recently received \$11,027 from the state Department of Education to complete their project.

"It required a lot of thinking, a lot of developing," said Morfin. "We

needed to include all the project activities, our goals and how we were going to reach those goals."

The three were up against a lot of competition in winning the grant. Two hundred forty seven projects were submitted, but only 40 projects were fully funded or partially funded.

The enrichment project includes five five-week projects, with two classes taking place every week. The first project, science activities, will begin Sept. 29 and last through Oct. 29.

Other programs include Christmas activities and crafts set for Nov. 3 through Dec. 3; art activities, Jan. 11 through Feb. 10; readers theater and choral reading, Feb. 22 through March 24; and physical education

activities, April 5 through May 5.

For physical education projects, students will, in part, read stories of famous athletes, and do reports on such things as how to repair a bicycle.

Each project will include a theme-related field trip and a visit to the public library.

Besides helping the students learn, the three teachers also hope participants get a boost of self-esteem from the project.

"The students — 32 for each five-week program — will be selected by teachers, depending on the various interests the students have."

Morfin, Gull and Parker won't be teaching the classes, but have selected the teachers who will participate.

Some of the teachers aren't currently teaching at the school, but are qualified to teach.

Morfin said some men who work other jobs will join in to illustrate that men can teach and provide a good role model.

The teachers will receive a stipend for their five weeks' work "to reward them for their extra time," said Morfin.

Funding includes nearly every expense that will be incurred during the project, including extra rewards that will be given outstanding students.

Because the classes will take place after school, financing has also been provided for after-school snacks, which the students will often make.

Burley man faces battery charge against sheriff, receives lawyer

RUPERT — Criminal charges have been filed against a Burley man who allegedly fought with Jerome County Sheriff Larry Gold following a June 1 high-speed chase.

Oliver Vieira was charged earlier in the month with battery upon a law enforcement officer and fleeing or attempting to elude a peace officer.

After reaching speeds of 100 mph, Gold said Vieira stopped his vehicle in Minidoka County, just east of the Jerome-Minidoka county line.

During the arrest, Vieira allegedly took out a pair of scissors and a fight ensued in which Gold was cut on the hand.

In the summons filed Sept. 8, Prosecutor David Haley who was appointed after Creason resigned to become general manager of the Project Mutual Telephone Co., claims Vieira used his fists to hit the sheriff in the chest and head.

The summons does not mention

the alleged knife incident.

A report of the incident was delayed until Gold was able to regain more of his memory. Gold said that because he suffered a blow to his head during the fight, he wasn't able to recall all the events of the night.

"I still don't remember him stabbing me," Gold said Thursday.

He can, however, remember being punched in the stomach and other parts of the struggle.

Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal served Vieira with the summons Sept. 11, according to court records.

The case was turned over to the Minidoka County prosecutor's office because the alleged altercation occurred just inside the county line.

Betting opponents say state has enough troubles already

OGDEN, Utah (AP) —

Parimutuel officials oppose a Utah law that would allow pari-mutuel wagering on horse racing without adding gambling to the list.

Former Salt Lake City mayor Palmer DePaulis said local governments already are struggling with problems of homelessness and gangs. "Are we in such good shape that we can begin to mix gambling with these kinds of things and expect it isn't going to add to the plate of social costs?" he asked. "Our plate is full."

DePaulis made the comments during a debate over pari-mutuel wagering sponsored by the Ogden-Weber Chamber of Commerce and the Breakfast Exchange Club.

Jon Freston, a spokesman for the pro-parimutuel Citizens to Put Utah First, said it's wrong to say crime accompanies pari-mutuel horse racing.

He said a national crime index that adjusts crime rates according to population indicates that Boise, which has had pari-mutuel wagering for 25 years, has a crime index less than half of Salt Lake City's.

Evanston, Wyo., another town where pari-mutuel wagering is allowed, has a crime index less than a third that of Salt Lake's after seven years of betting at Wyoming Downs.

Meanwhile, the group Utah Citizens Against Parimutuel Gambling has released a brochure outlining the economic woes that may accompany the legalization of horse betting.

Utah voters will consider the issue in a referendum vote in November. UCAAP spokesman Robert Rice said the brochure shows that the anti-gambling forces are not on the moral crusade pro-betting groups would like Utahns to believe.

It quotes a series of financial reports showing the gambling efforts could cost taxpayers up to \$500,000 a year in subsidies.

Lawmakers last year appropriated \$200,000 to the newly established Horse Commission, set up by the Legislature to oversee Utah's horse-racing industry. Gov. Norm Bangerter, however, halved that appropriation, saying the commission and industry should be self-sufficient.

Freston's group says those arguments are specious in light of the \$1.5 billion horse industry Utah stands to lose should voters defeat the initiative.

For his part, DePaulis said the economic impact of pari-mutuel wagering has not been determined. One estimate predicts a comparatively small positive impact on education funding of \$625,000, he said.

He said that figure is "insignificant," given it takes about \$9 million to raise Utah's teacher salaries 1 percent.

"I have never sold this issue as the sole answer to education funding woes," he said.

"But it is a step in the right direction," he said.

Utah prison inmate allegedly threatened president's life

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A Utah State Prison inmate has been indicted for allegedly threatening to take the life of President George Bush.

U.S. Attorney David J. Jordan announced on Thursday the two-count indictment against 34-year-old Robert L. Miller.

Miller is accused of making threats against President Bush on April 13 and June 5.

But Assistant U.S. Attorney Stanley Olsen said authorities do not believe the alleged threats were made in connection with Bush's recent visits, including his appearance before the National Guard Association of the United States on Tuesday.

"The threats were made prior to the time the president came to Utah," Olsen said.

Olsen refused to disclose a detailed account of the threats but said they were not made by telephone and were received by prison personnel and the Secret Service.

Trio admits they sold rotten meat

SPOKANE (AP) — Three family members who ran a Coeur d'Alene meat business pleaded guilty Thursday to selling unspiced wild deer and elk meat and beef, the U.S. Attorney's office said.

Lyle I. Kevness, Joyce Kevness and their son Kevin of Kevness Meats and Deli pleaded guilty in U.S. District Court to violations of the Federal Meat Inspection Act and the Lacey Act.

# University presidents worry about initiative

MOSCOW (AP) — Idaho's university presidents are worried about the One Percent Initiative and the economy as they make their budget pitches to the state Board of Education.

Idaho State University President Richard Bowen said it could be seen as irrational to ask for a 17.6 percent hike for his school in the upcoming fiscal year when it is more likely the schools could wrestle with a 4 percent budget cutback or the initiative to limit property taxes to 1 percent of market value.

Bowen is requesting \$42.1 million in state support for ISU.

Two months ago, Gov. Cecil Andrus ordered a 1 percent cut in the budgets of Idaho's four-year schools. Their funds could be slashed about 15 percent if the initiative passes in November and there is a major overhaul of the state's tax structure.

University of Idaho President Elizabeth Zinser said the state faces uncertain times with the One Percent on the ballot and uncertain revenue projections.

She said the UI's request for a 9.9 percent hike in state support to \$59.43 million focuses primarily on meeting the needs of the school's undergraduates.

Boise State University is facing an enrollment increase that shows no signs of slowing — asked the board to approve a \$58.7 million budget request, 15 percent more than the current mark.

It is possible to provide more classes to additional students and increase faculty.

"I don't think it's wise to take students' money and not provide a certain level of quality," Larry Selland, BSU's acting president, told the board.

Lt. Governor Thomas Bell and Lewis-Clark State College President Tom Zieker emphasized their schools need more funding to meet the growing demands placed on them.

About \$5 million of the UI's request would maintain current operations, and re-store the budget cut of \$550,000, Bell said.

"It's bread and butter... it's the basics."

"The state's university system already has 6,000 more students than it had six years ago, he said. The average class size is up by two students to 18, compared with six years ago, he said.

Lewis-Clark seeks a 21.3 percent hike in state support to \$8.12 million in its general education budget.

Meanwhile, Bell said the UI is seeking \$500,000 for six faculty positions and 1.5 technicians to expand its engineering programs in Boise. There are about 450 students in BSU's pre-engineering program and the UI's upper-division engineering courses at Boise.

The UI typically allocates \$330,000 a year to BSU engineering programs.

Last week, Andrus announced his support for a line-item appropriation to get accreditation for the bachelor's degree program in electrical engineering at Boise.

Bell promised the program would be accredited this year, but now if lawmakers make good on his budget request.

Board member Joseph Parkinson of Boise questioned whether the UI will meet Hewlett-Packard's needs in computer science and computer engineering.

Richard Jacobsen, interim dean of the UI College of Engineering, said the development of the UI's computer engineering program in Boise depends on Boise State's new bachelor degree program in computer science and the UI's electrical engineering program at BSU.

He said he would like to seek accreditation for computer engineering, electrical engineering and mechanical engineering programs at Boise three years from now. But it will take more money to gain accreditation for all, he said.

# Tax commission predicts shortfall with 1% Initiative

BOISE (AP) — The One Percent Initiative would reduce 1993 Idaho property tax revenues by \$115.7 million and \$150.3 million, a new state Tax Commission analysis says.

The initiative is "going to have too much of an impact on local government and schools," Rep. Steve Antone, R-Eupat, chairman of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, said Wednesday, citing the new figures.

However, initiative supporters say its impact will be softened by their prediction of a total growth of \$5 billion increase in taxable property value this year and next.

The commission used the \$5 billion figure in its analysis, even though it is "optimistic," said Tax Commissioner Hob Fry.

"Rural areas whose property values grow slowly could be severely impacted because their growth could not make up the revenue loss," he said.

The initiative would limit property taxes to 1 percent of actual market value if approved by voters Nov. 3.

Rep. Rankin, president of the Idaho Property Owners Association, said a tax revenue loss of \$116 million would represent a 30 percent reduction only in the portion of taxing district budgets funded by property taxes.

Taking into account property value increases and other non-property tax sources, including fees and state and federal taxes, he said the taxing districts will see a 4.5 percent revenue decrease.

"It's not going to be that substantial impact," he said.

Antone said he had the analysis prepared because "so many figures have been bandied around about what the actual impact would be."

Calculations for the \$115.7 million cut in taxes also assumed no growth in property tax budgets, although they have grown at 8.3 percent annually since 1981.

To reach the \$150.3 million, the commission assumed a 5 percent budget growth in 1992 and 1993. "That (\$150.3 million) is a conservative estimate," Fry said.

Antone said \$5 billion growth in taxable value used by Rankin is "absolutely unrealistic," given the 3.5 percent annual growth average over the past five years. An increase of \$5 billion would mean an 8.4 percent increase by 1993, he said.

Rankin said the \$5 billion growth fits the pattern of recent surging property values and new construction, with a \$2.2 billion increase from 1990 and 1991.

The actual 1991-1992 growth figure will not be available until late October, just before the election.

# Gem Indian tribes launch anti-amendment campaign

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Indian tribes have begun campaigning in earnest against a proposed state constitutional amendment that they contend would rob them of their sovereign rights and a chance at economic self-sufficiency.

The amendment placed on the Nov. 3 general election ballot by a July special session of the Idaho Legislature would make it clear that casino gambling is not allowed anywhere in the state.

Alliance of Idaho Tribes spokesman Bob Bostwick said Idaho voters should not be fooled by arguments that if tribes are allowed to establish casino gaming, it inevitably will spread off the reservations.

"We're not asking the state to lead us. We're not asking anyone to follow us," Bostwick said Thursday.

"We're simply asking the state to get the hell out of the way."

Bostwick, Fort Hall Business Council member Mary Washakie of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes and Marjorie Matheson, chief executive officer of the Coeur d'Alene Tribe, called a Boise news conference to launch the tribes' campaign against the amendment.

News conferences also were held Thursday in Pocatello and Coeur d'Alene.

The Coeur d'Alene, Shoshone-Bannock, Kootenai and Nez Perce tribes have asked the state to enter into negotiations toward gambling compacts required under the 1988 federal Indian Gaming Regulatory Act.

The requests prompted Gov. Cecil Andrus to call the special legislative

session to address the failure of a 1988 amendment to the Idaho Constitution establishing a state lottery to close the door to other forms of gambling.

But Washakie said the amendment, and proposals by Andrus and Attorney General Larry EchoHawk to push for state economic development aid to the tribes, unfairly ask Idaho taxpayers to subsidize reservation economies.

"We're asking the voters to help free the tribes toward economic self-sufficiency and to free the taxpayers," she said.

"Idahoans should not have to fund proposed new programs for economic development on reservations when tribes want and intend to do so themselves."

# Bulldozer not needed to aid fish

SALMON (AP) — Lemhi River irrigators can call off a bulldozer that's been sitting on standby for the last month, says Jim Loucks of Idaho Fish and Game's Salmon office.

Ranchers were prepared to use the bulldozer to breach a dirt diversion five miles upriver from the river's mouth to create a "flush" to help chinook salmon migrating upriver to spawning beds. Fish and Game fisheries biologist Mark Lier said the salmon made it without help.

"In fact, there's enough water in the Lemhi so that if the fish were returning right now, they could make it," Lier said.

The fish-dash is a part of a salmon recovery project developed by the Lemhi River Model Watershed. Ranchers have agreed to provide enough water for up to three flushes each year to aid Idaho's chinook salmon. They've been listed as a threatened species under the Endangered Species Act.

"It will be up to the Fish and Game to decide how and when they want to use the water," said Lemhi County extension agent Bob Loucks.

Developing a plan acceptable to the National Marine Fisheries Service was simple, he said. The Lemhi River has been "studied to death" and scientific data from past studies support the plan.

The most difficult part was convincing everybody that they needed to work together and make decisions. Loucks began in 1989.

When funds became available the Bureau of Reclamation plans irrigation ditch work, installation of more fish screens and replacement of inadequate existing screens.

The Soil Conservation Service has applied to the Bonneville Power Administration for a grant to pay a project coordinator for the Lemhi River Model Watershed.

Madison Superintendent Brent Orr said in a local newspaper advertisement purchased by the district last week that the board's negotiating position is a matter of economics.

"The board values the excellent teachers in our district and wishes it could do more," Orr says. "The only way the board was able to make this generous offer was to put the entire carryover fund, plus additional money from budget cuts on school supplies, fuel and utilities, on the negotiation table."

But Walline contends the board has not negotiated in good faith, despite teachers' willingness to compromise.

### Man fined, sentenced in stalking case

POCATELLO — A former Pocatello man was fined \$100, sentenced to 10 days in jail and was ordered to leave town in Bannock County's first use of a new state law against stalking.

Deputy City Attorney Kim Clausen said Richard Adamcik, 37, was charged with stalking his ex-wife, making "numerous contacts and confrontations," in an effort to force a reconciliation. Clausen also said he threatened to kidnap her.

Magistrate Wesley Crowther sentenced Adamcik on the misdemeanor charge, which can carry a maximum penalty of one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine. The new law went into effect July 1.

### Number of inmates non-negotiable

POCATELLO — An attorney for the American Civil Liberties Union says there isn't much room to negotiate with Bannock County over how many prisoners can be housed in the old county jail until a new one is built.

Steven Pevar, Denver, met with county officials Wednesday. The county has been restricted on how many people can be kept in the old jail. County residents recently approved a \$9.4 million bond issue to build a new facility but it will be up to two years before it will be ready.

Pevar said he was willing to compromise, but said an order from U.S. Magistrate Mikel Williams in an inmate lawsuit set "rock bottom standards of decency... so we're not talking, then, about much room for flexibility."

### Court asked to review murder case

SAGLE — The defense attorneys for Jeremy Cooper are asking the Idaho Supreme Court to review his murder case, saying prosecutors do not have enough evidence to go to trial.

Cooper, 18, is accused of killing his mother and injuring his stepfather with a machete Feb. 29 at their Careywood home. He has pleaded innocent.

Defense attorneys Bruce Green and Dan Featherston contend investigators should be looking at other suspects.

In a petition to the high court, Greene stated Cooper's rights are being violated because he is being held without bond on "the flimsiest of equivocal circumstantial evidence" and the trial has been delayed beyond the six-month speedy-trial deadline.

### Shooting brings man prison term

COEUR D'ALENE — Saying it was miraculous the shooting did not end in a death, 1st District Court Judge Gary Haman has sentenced a Coeur d'Alene-area man to 15 years in prison for firing six gunshots at his wife.

Haman on Wednesday ordered Lino Gomez, 52, to serve at least seven years before he can be considered for parole.

Gomez was convicted of hitting his now ex-wife, Vicki, with at least four bullets as the couple and their son, Jason, stood on the back deck of their home in July 1991.

The shooting climaxed their tumultuous, 20-year marriage.

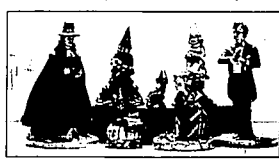

## Local writers search for community

TWIN FALLS - Next weekend, writers from all over the Gem State will descend on Twin Falls to take part in the annual Idaho Writers' League conference.

For three days, up to 70 people will meet for workshops, speeches and awards. They'll discuss how to create characters, conduct research, fight writer's block and woo publishers.

But what will happen after the conference concludes? Is there an ongoing literary community in Twin Falls? And the big question: Is the Magic Valley any kind of place for an aspiring author to live, or do serious writers have to move elsewhere to practice their craft?

"If I had to list five writers who are aggressive in pursuing a literary career in Twin Falls, I couldn't do it," says Bill Studebaker, who teaches English at the College of Southern Idaho. "Either they're not here or they're well hidden."

Many writers shy away from organized, dues-paying groups such as the Idaho Writers' League and the Gem State Writers Guild. Such writers often prefer informal networking, something that exists in other areas of the state but not in Twin Falls. "In Idaho, Twin Falls is kind of an anomaly," Studebaker adds.

One reason may be that a literary

TWIN FALLS - Despite a long writing tradition including such names as Ernest Hemingway and Ridley Pearson, Idaho is just now trying to find its literary legs.

In recent months, a number of key players in the state's writing community have taken steps to connect and encourage Idaho authors. But the process is only beginning, and there's a long way to go.

In mid-June, more than 100 people attended the first-ever Idaho Writers and Readers Rendezvous in McCall. Participants heard readings by and

hobnobbed with noted regional writers Pam Houston, Clay Morgan, Daryl Jones, Robert Wrigley and Mary Clearman Blew (all of whom except Houston live in Idaho).

More than anything else, the conference served to show there is a large community of writers in Idaho.

"I think there are more writers than we know about," says Diane Josephy Peavey, who serves as literary services director for the Idaho Commission on the Arts. "A lot of people are writing in a vacuum and don't know each other."

Peavey is now hearing from writers all over the state who want to establish networks, and she is interested in

would show up to hear a writer read his or her work.

But in the early 1980s, Studebaker turned his attention to his own career. He since has published five collections of poetry and the new prose volume "Backtracking: Ancient Art of Southern Idaho," which he co-wrote with Boise State University anthropology professor Max Pavesic.

Since then, no one else has jumped in to fill the void. "To make a writing community, it takes an informal agreement among the writers that they'll pick up the ball and run with it when someone else doesn't have it," Studebaker says. For a time, Penelope Reedy tried. She moved to Twin Falls from Fairfield, bringing with her The Redneck Review of Literature, a nationally acclaimed critical journal of Western writing. But "Redneck" failed to make much of an impression in Twin Falls.

Reedy now lives in Milwaukee, where she and her husband, former CSI English instructor Jay Sloan, moved in 1991 to advance their educations. Looking back on the Idaho literary landscape, she says that while Idaho is home to many fine writers, few are known within their communities.

# Spassky sickness postpones Game 10

**SVETI STEFAN, Yugoslavia (AP)** - The 10th game in the \$5 million rematch between Bobby Fischer and Boris Spassky was postponed Thursday after Spassky complained of kidney trouble, match organizers said.

Spassky appealed for Thursday's match to be held over until Saturday. He lost the ninth game to Fischer on Wednesday, giving the American a 4-2 lead in the rematch. Draws do not count.

A brief announcement on closed-circuit TV monitors at this Adriatic resort said Spassky had asked for postponement late Wednesday and his request was supported by match doctors Zika Petrovic, Ljubo Zivkovic and Mitar Lubisa.

Under match rules, a player's request for a postponement due to illness must be backed by a medical certificate.

Spassky, 55, has made a series of blunders in the last three games that experts speculated could be health-related.

Match organizers declined to comment, but one briefly showed what was apparently an internal document that spoke of Spassky's "complete physical exhaustion and sleeplessness."

Spassky told a news conference Monday that he was suffering from recurring kidney problems.

"I started this marathon match like a sprint distance and now I am really tired," said the Russian-born French citizen. "I have put in so much energy (as) I have never done before in my life."

Fischer also made references to illness and delays at Monday's news conference: "In this match the days off are only if you are really sick, and you have to get a doctor's certificate."

Experts at the match say Spassky's poor play in the past three games is preventing Fischer from showing whether he is back to the brilliant form that won him the world championship when the two played in 1972.

Earlier it was Fischer who was playing poorly, falling behind 2-1 before a three-game rally that started with a victory on Saturday.

The postponement, coming only three days after such remarks were made, raised speculation among the dwindling audience here that the announcement might be a move to buoy sagging interest in the game.

The first player to win 10 games clinches the \$3.35 million first prize, while the runner-up gets \$1.65 million. The prize money has been

put up by Yugoslav businessman Jedimir Vasiljevic, and the match is being held in defiance of U.N. sanctions against Yugoslavia for instigating war in Bosnia-Herzegovina.

After one player wins five games, the match moves from this lush Adriatic resort to the Serbian and Yugoslav capital of Belgrade.

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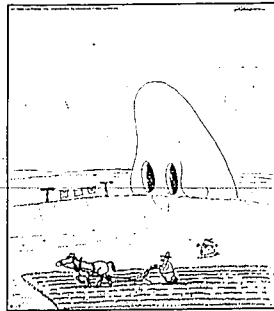
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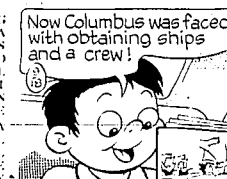
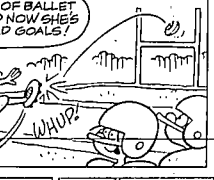
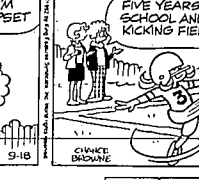
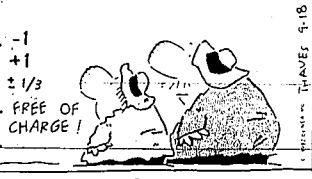
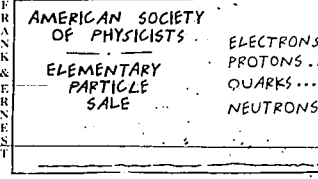
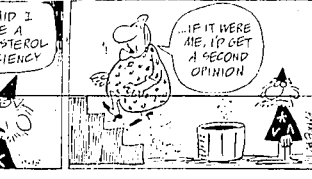
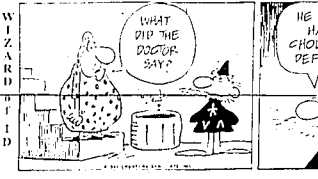

# 'Rapid Fire' hits with martial arts mayhem

**HOLLYWOOD** - It is always difficult for a son or daughter to follow in a famous parent's footsteps, especially if the parent is in show business - and happens to be the late, legendary Bruce Lee, the ultimate kung fu star.

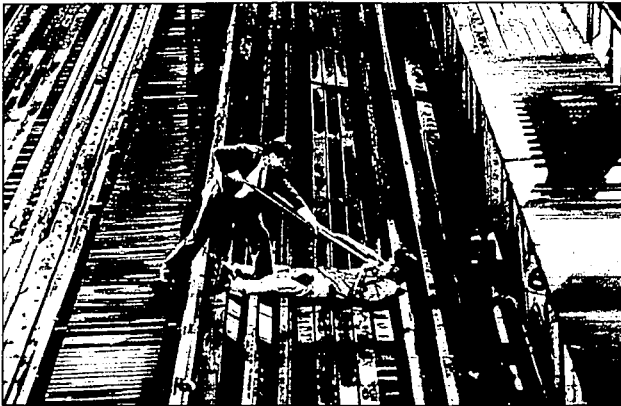

However, judging from the strong impression Brandon Lee makes in his first starring role in the dynamic hard-action film "Rapid Fire," he has what it takes. What's more, "Rapid Fire" is a much better movie than "Enter the Dragon," the film that made Bruce Lee an international star.

Brandon Lee has loisin going for him: striking Eurasian features, genuine acting ability in contrast to his father, who alternated between sneers and grimaces, and most important, a style all his own.

Tall and lean, Lee has a direct, matter-of-fact approach to his formidable martial-arts skills in contrast to his father, whose appeal rested largely upon the breathtaking balletic grace he brought to his kung fu moves. For the son, martial arts is but one aspect of his personality, not the raison d'etre it was for his father. Indeed, his last picture, "Showdown in Little Tokyo," in which he co-starred, showed off his flair for comedy.

As Jake Lo, Lee is a college arts major living in Los Angeles who is maneuvered into attending a campus gathering marking the second anniversary of the Tinnamen Square massacre, where Jake witnessed the death of his father, a U.S. Army Intelligence officer. Bitter about his father's death, which he regards as a pointless sacrifice, he

had not wanted to attend or witness the event. Yet no sooner does he arrive than he witnesses a Chicago gangster (Nick Mancuso), whose empire is crumbling, assassinate a distributor for a Golden Triangle drug lord (Tzi Ma), who refuses to give a bigger cut to Mancuso.

So much for the plot, which you might not catch if you're not paying close attention, thanks to the exhilarating-brokenneck-pacing of Dwight Little's astute direction. As the action moves to Chicago, where Jake is to testify, he's plunged into a thicket of danger, a pawn between an FBI and local police power struggle and a target of assassins.

From this believable premise Lee and stunt coordinator Jeff

Imada spin a fantasy of martial-arts mayhem. Yet "Rapid Fire" never loses sight of the action picture truisms: The stunts don't mean a thing unless the people come first.

The linchpin of the film, therefore, is writer Alan McElroy's skillful rendering of the gradually evolving relationship that develops between Jake and tough, high-principled Chicago cop Mace Ryan (Powers Boothe). As Jake moves from a witness to be protected to the key position on Ryan's team he's reluctantly faced with the fact that Ryan is a man very much like his late father.

"Rapid Fire" isn't just about the good guys nailing the bad guys but about a young man discovering, through a surrogate father, that there was meaning in the loss of

his own father's life. Putting a further spin on the Jack-Mace friendship is the vibrant non-nonsense presence of Kate Hodge as Ryan's resilient partner who may be even more attracted to the divorced Mace than to Jake.

In all aspects "Rapid Fire" is a handsome, quality production anchored by solid performances right down the line, highlighted by a standout portrayal by Raymond J. Barry as a corrupt-FBI agent. Both Barry and Tzi Ma are able to bring recognizable human dimension to their villainy. Above all, "Rapid Fire" (rated R for violence, sexuality and language) launches Brandon Lee as a new martial-arts star who conceivably could move beyond the orbit of action films.

# Dahmer film angers families of victims

MILWAUKEE (AP) - A former embalmer who wrote the screenplay and portrays Jeffrey L. Dahmer in a feature-length movie said Monday he didn't glorify the serial killer who dismembered his victims and kept body parts in his home.

But victims' relatives contend that "Jeffrey Dahmer: The Secret Life" focuses on Dahmer's cleverness and dehumanizes the 17 people he killed.

"Jeffrey Dahmer's a household name, and we accept that, but he doesn't have to be a household hero," said Theresa Smith, sister of victim Edward Smith, 28.

"They glorify his intelligence and his strategy of a kill, just like a predator. People get off on that - I mean Hollywood."

Carl Crew, who was an apprentice embalmer for three years before becoming an actor, spoke on "Milwaukee's Talking" a radio talk show, along with the mothers of two victims. About 20 members of the victims' families sat in the studio audience.

Dahmer, 32, is serving 15 life sentences for murders in the Milwaukee area. He was also convicted of a murder in Ohio in 1978.

The crimes were uncovered in July 1991 when police found body parts in Dahmer's apartment.

Family members, who recently watched a promotional clip of the film, said they were outraged that Crew and director David R. Bowen did not consult them before making the movie.

Crew said he used published reports for background and avoided interviews with the families to avoid bias. He said the victims in the movie are composites and can't be identified by families.

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# Lynch movie combines bad taste, high style

**TWIN PEAKS: FIRE WALK WITH ME (R).** The last real act of David Lynch's "Twin Peaks" saga, which like all detective stories, ends at its beginning: A nightmare in soft jazzy smears and shades of dread, full of subversive dreaminess, offbeat wit and winking kitsch, it opens up the last week of life for Laura Palmer (Sheryl Lee), murdered teen queen, as well as the sewers under Peaks' placid streets. The film shouldn't be viewed in isolation; it caps off Lynch's weird soap epic in suitably bad taste and high style.

**PET SEMATARY II (R).** Too gruesome-for-little-kids, too easily laughed off by high schoolers, this imaginative sequel nevertheless expresses perfectly the angst of pubescent junior high school kids - and, on a mythological level, attempts to resolve it. Edward

Furlong and Jason McGuire are two unhappy 13-year-olds who test the legend that the dead rise from their graves in an ancient American Indian burial ground in Maine - when McGuire's beloved dog is killed by his bullying stepfather (Robert Downey Jr.).

**SNEAKERS (PG-13).** Though its Mission: Impossible plot is awfully familiar, this good-spirited caper film succeeds on the basis of the playfulness of its script and the casual charm of its star performances. A Robert Redford, Sidney Poitier, Dan Aykroyd, River Phoenix and David Strathairn play renegade masters of high-tech deeding-do who have to outwit the bad guys and get the golden zizmo. Funny, likable, and savvy enough not to trip itself too soundly.

**HONEYMOON IN VEGAS (PG-13).** Writer-director Andrew Bergman ("So Fine," "The Freshman") is funny the way other people think they're funny. He stars Sarah Jessica Parker as the prize-winning and a mythological constant boyfriend (Nicolas Cage) and a big-time

gambler with a killer instinct (James Caan) who thinks she looks just like his dead wife. Giddily anarchic, daringly absurd and featuring a hoard of Elvis impersonators and twenty of the songs that made the King famous.

**SINGLE WHITE FEMALE (R).** Bridget Fonda and Jennifer Jason Leigh deserve better than this roomie-from-hell scenario. Fonda plays a suddenly single career woman who takes in a roommate, played by Leigh, only to discover the roommate is a grade A loony. There are strong moments early on that show off the talents of the two actresses but it all devolves into a slash and gore fest.

**A LEAGUE OF THEIR OWN (PG).** Blessed with a pleasing comedy concept (World War II women's baseball), a funny director (Penny Marshall) and a cast that knows its way around the bases (Geena Davis, Tom Hanks, Madonna), this lightweight entertainment can't hold a lead. Starring out funny, it just about drowns in excessive sentimentality and unnecessary plot complications. "Saturday Night Live" veteran Jon Lovitz's brief cameo as a dour

scout, however, is worth the price of admission.

**SISTER ACT (PG).** Whoopi Goldberg on the lam in a convent is the not unfamiliar device that turns this clever film into the funniest mainstream comedy in who knows how long. A tribute to those often dismissed qualities of slickness and professionalism, "Sister," helped in no small measure by superlative supporting performances by Maggie Smith, Kathy Najimy, Mary Wickes and Wendy Makkena, is just about as good as Hollywood gets. See it and remember how good it feels to laugh out loud.

**UNFORGIVEN (R).** Working at the top of his form as both an actor and a director, Clint Eastwood has turned out a Western for the ages. Simultaneously heroic and nihilistic, reeking of myth but modern as they come, it resonates with the spirit of films past while staking out a territory quite its own. In addition to Eastwood's work, it features splendid acting from Gene Hackman, Morgan Freeman and Richard Harris, as well as an excellent revisionist script from David Webb Peoples. Saddle up or get out of the way.

# Miss America Pageant still battles brains versus beauty

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — Miss America contestants and officials insist that the 72-year-old production is a scholarship pageant, but members of women's advocacy groups say it is an exploitive, demeaning beauty pageant.

"It's not scholarship," said Donna Puluka, president of the New Jersey chapter of the National Organization for Women. "If it were based on women's intellect, there would be no reason to be in a gown and in a bathing suit and put vaseline on their teeth and glue their bathing suits in place on their thighs."

David Schleicher, of the Anti-Sexist Men's Action Network in New York, said it is "nonsense" to believe that the Miss America contest is an academic forum. He called it a "meat market."

"We all know that it's really a forum to continue the whole brutality and sexual objectification process against women that reaches its culmination in forums like Playboy and Penthouse," said Schleicher, a member of the Coalition to End Violence Against Women.

To compete for the Miss America title, a woman must be an American citizen, 26 years old or younger and single, and she can never have been pregnant.

"We're looking for wholesome young women," said Leonard C. Horn, the organization's chief executive officer. "Miss America is the visualized American maiden."

In an interview with The Associated Press last week, Horn said women aren't exploited by the program, which provides the largest amount of scholarships to women of any organization in the United States. This year, more than \$10 million in scholarships will be given to about 80,000 women.

"But she's going to have to be reasonably attractive and that's the way it is," Horn said. "You're not going to have the Hunchback of Notre Dame winning the Miss America Pageant."

Women must wear the swimsuit, he said, because it's part of the tradition of the pageant, which began on the beach in Atlantic City in 1921. Today, he said, it shows that women care about their bodies and stay fit, and the swimsuit competition is only a small part of the judging.

But Schleicher and Puluka said the contest is a "disgusting" attempt to put women into a mold.

"Our concern with ... the Miss America Pageant is they are continuing to portray women merely as objects that have to fit into a certain mold in order to be acceptable," she said.

The latest woman to participate in the pageant is 5-foot, 10-inches tall and 135 pounds. If the competition were based on a scholarship, Schleicher said, the pool of women would be more diverse in height, weight and other features.

In interviews with all 50 contestants, none said they felt exploited or bothered by the swimsuit competition. All said they

hoped the pageant was a scholarship contest, not just a beauty pageant.

Miss Wisconsin, Stephanie Klett, said she is an "ardent feminist" and a member of NOW.

"I had no problem with it," she said of the swimsuit competition. "I don't think it's degrading to the feminist movement."

Leslie Saunders, Miss South Dakota, said it's important to stay fit and that's why women wear the swimsuits.

"Beauty comes from within," she said. "It doesn't matter how large your chest is or what your thighs look like."

Miss Arkansas, Shannon Boy, said Miss America should be beautiful.

"I don't want to see an unattractive woman. I want to see a beautiful woman I can look up to," Boy said.

Horn said the pageant has changed since its fledgling days during the roaring 20s, when the contest simply carried the beauty queen image.

During the 1970s, he said, the changing roles of women in society forced the pageant to move away from that image in order to survive. "It's no longer some pretty kid standing behind a politician waiting for him to cut a ribbon," Horn said.

Sidney Siller, president of the National Organization for Men Inc., based in New York City, said women's advocacy groups are nothing more than "radical feminists."

"We've always thought that the Miss America Pageant was a

wonderful institution that ... adds something to the fall season," said Siller, who said his group has 12,000 members.

"He said there is nothing wrong with women competing in gowns or

bathing suits because they choose to do it.

"The National Organization for Women are a power-hungry group of elitists that want to attack every institution," Siller said.

# Analysts name top trade gains

**NEW YORK** — The widening in the U.S. trade gap to \$7.82 billion in July from a revised \$6.72 billion in June reflects the sluggish economic growth in several of the most important U.S. trading partners, economists said.

"It shows that the U.S. is ahead of its trading partners in the current business cycle," said Cynthia Latta, economist at DRI/McGraw-Hill.

"Growth is slowing overseas while the U.S. economy has already touched bottom and is slowly recovering."

The Commerce Department reported U.S. exports slumped by 2.2 percent to \$37.332 billion in July, while imports

rose by 0.6 percent to a record \$45.154 billion.

It was the largest gap since November 1990, when the deficit totaled \$9.485 billion.

The drop in exports was led by a \$1 billion fall in capital goods exports, which economists said was likely caused by fewer deliveries of U.S.-made aircraft to overseas airlines.

Robert McGee, senior vice president and economist at Tokai Bank, said U.S. exports are unlikely to expand much further "until this mess in European economies is cleared up and Japan gets back on a growth track."

McGee and other economists said poor short-term economic growth prospects in

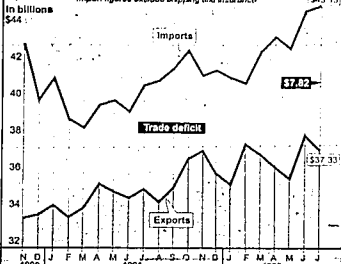
Europe and Japan would likely cause the U.S. trade deficit to expand further in coming months.

Slowing exports will also hamper the U.S. economy's ability to grow, as further expansion will depend more on domestic consumption and the "sticky" buying habits of the domestic consumer.

"What's interesting is that we're suffering because Western Europe is suffering," said Raymond Stone, economist at Stone & McCarthy Research Associates. "And our trade surplus with western Europe has declined quite sharply," Stone said.

The U.S. trade gap with Western Europe widened sharply from \$90 million in June to \$1.145 billion in July.

## Stocks dip a bit in slow trading

**NEW YORK** — Stock prices drifted lower in slackened trading Tuesday, showing little impetus either way as traders watched interest-rate and currency developments in Europe.

Central banks maintain order

LONDON (AP) - The currency crisis that pitched Europe into political and monetary turmoil widened Thursday, but central banks managed to keep order even as financial markets swung wildly. During the early morning hours, Italy joined Britain in suspending its currency, the lira, from the European exchange rate mechanism. The lira and the British pound fell sharply on currency markets, although neither went into the free fall some feared. Traders instead slammed the French franc, the Irish pound, the Portuguese escudo and the Danish krone to levels near their floors in the exchange rate mechanism, a system designed to minimize fluctuations in European currency rates.

European monetary system could become hopelessly unraveled or that an emergency realignment of more currencies could occur at any time if markets exploded again.

Fears that the French might vote "no" on Maastricht have prompted investors to dump their local currencies in favor of the powerful German mark for weeks.

The British pound had been particularly hard hit. Under the exchange-rate mechanism, the pound was supposed to fall no lower than 2.7780 German marks, but sterling traded below that level Wednesday.

But after traders pushed the pound and the lira as low as they seemed willing to go Thursday, the currencies appeared to stabilize and some experts said the outcome of the French vote might not be quite so ominous for financial markets.

Even if that optimistic view holds true, the fallout from the worst currency turmoil in years will take time to abate.

Britain's de facto devaluation of the pound, by removing it from the exchange rate mechanism created credibility problems for the government of Prime Minister John Major, who had vowed to maintain sterling's value, and his top Treasury official, Chancellor of the Exchequer Norman Lamont.

Amid perceptions that their reputations and jobs were in jeopardy, Major's Cabinet met Thursday to discuss the crisis. Lamont, who said he wasn't resigning, said the pound would return to the exchange rate mechanism, but didn't say when.

British officials attempted to deflect blame over the pound's troubles to Germany's central bank, the

Hundesbank. The Bundesbank indicated Thursday that no interest rate cuts are planned beyond Monday's cut of a quarter-point in the key Lombard rate. Turbulence in foreign exchange markets has stirred fears of a prolonged economic downturn that could spread elsewhere, even without the troubles faced by the weak U.S. economy.

Stable currency values are vital for consumer confidence and the ability of businesses to make future plans and the rapidly unfolding series of one European monetary crisis after another has only served to unnerve people.

Prices gyrated on some stock markets Thursday as traders were unable to make sense of the crisis. On the London Stock Exchange, the broad-based Financial Times-Stock Exchange average trading in a narrow range and closing down 3.51 at 3,315.70.

Activity was calmer on Wall Street Thursday, with the Dow Jones industrial average trading in a narrow range and closing down 3.51 at 3,315.70.

Among Thursday's currency developments:

Spain's peseta was devalued by 5 percent.

Central banks bought French franc, Irish pounds and the Danish krone to support them against the mark.

Sweden announced it would maintain its astonishing 500 percent interest rate at least through Monday, to protect the krona from sell-offs by speculators.

Greece raised its overnight interbank lending rate to 35 percent from 28 percent to defend the drachma.

What Britain's jolt can mean

NEW YORK - Cosmologists say the universe is expanding, but when it comes to money, the global financial village is shrinking.

Ask anyone who bought U.S. bonds, sold the dollar or applied for a car loan in recent weeks. The fallout from political and monetary maneuvering in Europe showed that America's financial fate is not sealed in a vacuum.

The Bank of England's gyrations Wednesday that boosted a key interest rate was intended to prop up Britain's pound. It also boosted a battered dollar. When Germany tinkered with lowering its interest rates earlier in the week, U.S. stock prices soared in the year's biggest one-day rally.

A stronger dollar could make Americans' purchases of imports cheaper.

Britain's interest rate jolts eventually could mean a rise in U.S. interest rates. That would make it more expensive for Americans to borrow for such things as homes, cars or college. It also could mean more money for people who rely of interest rates from savings accounts or certificates of deposits.

Indeed, yields on key U.S. Treasury issues have inched up in recent days in response to overseas interest rate changes. Even though the domestic economic landscape doesn't look any different than it did earlier this month.

In addition to the British moves, another major European event is looming. Voters in France go to the polls Sunday to ratify a sweeping plan to unify Europe - in part by creating a single currency. The results are sure to cause at least ripple in U.S. markets.

In the minds of the financial markets, developments in Europe are playing a much more important role, said Alan Levinson, a financial economist at WFEA Group in Bala Cynwyd, Pa. "And that is a difficult thing for the (American) public to understand."

In recent years, particularly since the start of the recession, the public has become adept at deciphering basic economic data, Levinson said. Many Americans know that a falling unemployment rate signals a pickup in the economy and, by extension, they can bet interest rates likely will be on the rise.

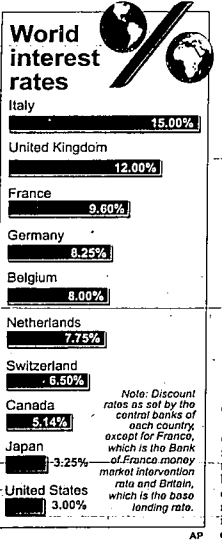
"That allows people to plan, to do things like lock in a mortgage rate," Levinson said. "But now things like a referendum in France can cause rollings in the markets that cause changes here, and that's difficult to explain to somebody and makes it harder for people to plan."

The United States, home of the world's broadest and most influential financial markets, is linked by computers trading rooms everywhere, and money flows back and forth 24 hours a day. But until now, many Americans have operated in psychological isolation, a right granted them by living in the wealthiest of nations.

However, international developments are getting harder to ignore.

"We're having the biggest crisis in the foreign exchange market since the Bretton Woods conference" of 1971, which resulted in the elimination of the gold standard; said Marc Chandler, an analyst with the advisory firm IDEA.

"The fact that the 6 o'clock news has the foreign exchange market has increased awareness of what's happening overseas, but the American psychology has been slow to adjust to the idea of a global village," Chandler said.



Currency turmoil reveals global gridlock

PARIS - While enriching themselves, currency speculators have changed the political map of Europe with their successful assaults on the British pound, the Italian lira and European financial institutions this week.

The speculators did far more than drive the pound and the lira out of the fixed parity zone of the European Monetary System (EMS). Thursday, they demonstrated the vulnerability of the monetary system itself, a key halfway house for European governments working for a tighter political and monetary union; senior politicians, civil servants and analysts in Paris, London and Brussels said Thursday.

The turmoil in the currency markets also demonstrated the costs of an emerging global gridlock on monetary and fiscal policies, some analysts said. Governments are increasingly immobilized by economic recession, taxpayer revolts and the overriding imperative to fight inflation. The speculators can little risk that the major industrial democracies would spring any surprises on them, in this view.

That sense of timing was one major factor that made this currency crisis different from the squalls that have periodically buffeted Europe's foreign-exchange markets in the past. Two other elements also help account for the hurricane-like impact in Europe of the week's still unfolding events:

Capital flows across borders have exploded as national currency restrictions have disappeared. With \$300 billion moving through the world's exchange markets each day, British, Italian or even German treasuries find it prohibitively expensive to spend their reserves to thwart determined speculators.

British Prime Minister John Major, the big loser in this crisis, dared the speculators to take him on by assembling a \$13 billion war chest to protect the pound, after proclaiming that he would not devalue his obviously overvalued

currency, withdraw from the European Monetary System or raise interest rates. By late Wednesday night, he had done all three and the currency markets were still attacking.

A sudden and unexpected debate over Europe's political and monetary future - touched off by Denmark's rejection of the European unity treaty and a French referendum on the treaty set for Sunday - has created an aura of uncertainty and doubt about pan-European institutions.

The turmoil in currency markets raises, in a different form, some of the same questions about Europe's future that have been raised in the security field by the bitter war raging among the former Yugoslav republics, which Europe has been unable to prevent or halt.

Institutions created for the Cold War, such as NATO or the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe, have not proved useful in resolving the Yugoslav conflict. Neither has the West European Union, which provides NATO's European members a forum for consultations.

The 12 nations of the European Committee now face a new set of uncomfortable questions about their intentions in monetary policy, an area they expected to be less controversial than defense.

The drive for political and monetary union, as spelled out in the draft unity treaty signed in Maastricht, the Netherlands, last December, was based on the assumption that the European Monetary System could be gradually converted into a European central bank that would issue and control a single European currency once the member countries had adopted "converging" economic and financial policies.

But the difficulties of 12 nations synchronizing their budget deficits, rates of inflation, government spending programs and other economic fundamentals have been spectacularly undermined by the forced march out of the EMS

by the British and Italians.

The monetary system in effect requires its members to keep the value of their currencies within 2.5 percent above or below the value of the system's strongest money, the German mark.

Faced with a deep and prolonged recession that made raising interest rates counterproductive and politically unpopular, and determined not to devalue the pound and thereby reignite inflation, Major's Conservative government vowed to keep the pound's value steady against the mark with the EMS limits.

But Major was trapped when the foreign exchange markets saw that Germany and the United States seemed even more determined than Britain not to raise the sterling, the world's second largest currency.

Continuing bad economic news and the November election pinned U.S. interest rates and the dollar to the floor. The markets were certain that the Federal Reserve would not raise interest rates and might well lower them a little before Nov. 3 to try to revive the economy.

On Monday, the German Bundesbank announced a quarter percent interest rate cut that was seen by the foreign-exchange markets as a politically inspired cosmetic gesture intended to encourage the French to vote for the Maastricht treaty Sunday. Stung by this interpretation, Bundesbank officials made it clear there would be no more reductions.

That firmly pinned the German mark at the top of the monetary ladder and made Major's commitments untenable. Italy, which failed to follow up an unconvincing 7 percent devaluation on Monday with deficit-cutting steps, also found it too expensive to stay in the EMS.

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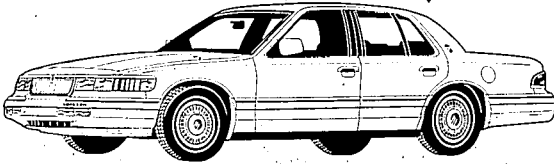




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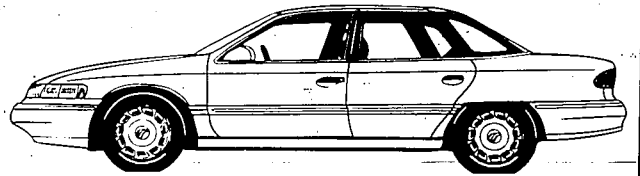

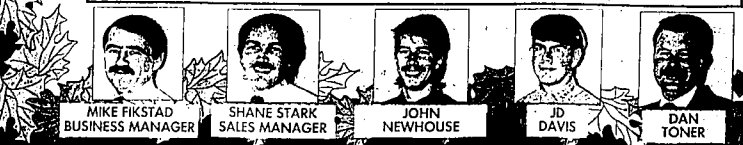

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE<sup>®</sup> BOBBY WOLFF

*The optimist proclaims that we live in the best of all possible worlds; and the pessimist fears this is true.*

— James Branch Cabell.

It takes a true pessimist to recognize the dangers in today's minor-suit game. Not many optimists pay heed to the possibilities of losing to a 5-1 split, which has a 14.5 percent chance of occurring.

The optimist eyes his two "solid" minor suits for 10 sure tricks; dummy's ace of spades will bring the total to 11. No need to waste time on this hand.

Quickly he ruffs the second heart and draws the trumps. Then he starts the clubs, aghast at East's unexpected singleton. There is no reprieve, and South must lose three tricks and his shot at his vulnerable game.

The pessimist also knows that the odds of a 5-1 club break are about 6-1 against. But he also heard the weak two-bid by East, a bid that increases the chances of finding a four club break.

To avoid such a disaster, the pessimist cashes his trump nine and one high club after ruffing the second heart. Next he leads his trump queen to dummy's king to lead a low club from dummy. If both follow, the rest is easy. He draws trumps and claims 11 winners. If East ruffs with the last outstanding trump, South ruffs the heart exit and runs the clubs, discarding spades from dummy. A spade ruff in dummy gives him his 11th winner. If East refuses to ruff, South wins and ruffs his low club with dummy's trump jack, and he still collects 11 winners.

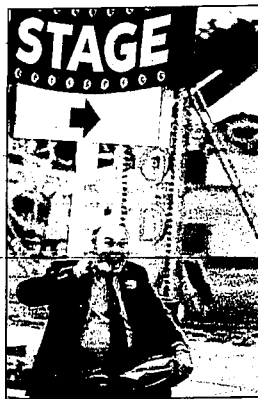
as it heads into its sixth season, have a firm idea of what they're after this time: more action and excitement.

The designated "Deep Space Nine" leader is Benjamin (Jake) Sisko. He's a sin-

gle fighter. He's had difficulties with Capt. Picard in the past (Yes, there's the potential for "crossover" visits from "TNG" cast members). And he's not sure he wants to raise his son in such rough-and-tumble surroundings.

Other key characters in the ensemble cast of eight regulars include Major Kira, a Bajoran, ex-terrorist and freedom fighter; Quark, a bartender; Odo, a security chief and razzle-dazzle shape shifter, and Jadex Dix, a young humanoid woman from the Trill species.

## NBC launches weather line

NBC will provide callers with a daily 24-hour global weather information service called "Weatherline." The network says it is "the first interactive weather service offered by a broadcast network."

(Translation: If you're tired of not getting weather information for free on the "Today" or other NBC shows you'll now have the privilege of paying for it.)

You just dial 1-900-WILLARD. The call cost 95 cents a minute and numbers will go to charity.

The Weatherline number is "named for" Willard Scott, the "Today" weatherman who does everything except the weather four times a morning on the network show. Says NBC:

"Scott's voice will greet callers to the Weatherline and instruct them on the use of the system." He will also, of course, plug the new service on the "Today" show.

# Strike up a conversation with Whoopi

HOLLYWOOD — "I want to know — is a bigot born?" mused Whoopi Goldberg, referring to white supremacist and former Ku Klux Klan grand dragon Tom Metzger, one of Goldberg's early guests on her new late-night talk show.

She leaned forward on a plush couch in the St. James Club in Hollywood. "Is he a bigot?" she asked rhetorically in her deliberate, thoughtful speaking style.

"How does bigotry come about? His was born in the United States Army. When he says his best friend in the Army was black — kind of makes you want to know what happened."

Goldberg furrowed her malleable brow, stared off into space and seemed to drift away for a brief moment.

"Yeah," she said to "no one" in particular, shaking her head slowly.

Bigotry is hardly subject matter for today's zippy, quippy late-night talk shows, mostly entertainment vehicles "driven by Hollywood's brightest stars. But "The Whoopi Goldberg Show," a half-hour syndicated series premiering Monday, appears to be a decidedly different late-night venture.

"At first they wanted the format everyone else has," Goldberg said. Last year several major syndication companies were bidding for her late-night services, which her high-power handlers at Creative Artists Agency were shopping around town.

"I told them, I don't want a band. I don't want a posse. I don't want a studio audience. I don't want a desk. I just want a comfortable place to sit and converse. Because that's what the show is, a conversation."

"I believe if you promote interesting conversation for more than five minutes, something great might happen," Goldberg explained.

If you believe in research — and most executives in the TV business swear by, and some-

times at, it — Goldberg has more appeal than any talk-show host in television, including Oprah Winfrey, Arsenio Hall and Jay Leno. The R Ratings, an annual research study that measures popularity and likability, place Goldberg above all other female performers in the entertainment industry.

Booyed by such findings, Genesis Entertainment struck a deal with Goldberg for 180 episodes, airing five nights a week with a special one-hour highlight edition on the weekend. Genesis is taking a gamble by allowing Goldberg, a one-time welfare recipient turned superstar, to slow down the pace of late night with a program that hopes to be as enlightening as it does entertaining.

The idea behind Goldberg's show is simple: Invite a single guest each night; sit down on

two great big chairs in a relaxing eclectic setting surrounded by sculptures and artwork from such contemporary artists as Julian Schnabel and Charles Bragg, and do what Goldberg feels few talk shows today really do ... talk.

Goldberg plans to have on whoever suits her fancy, whoever her inquiring mind wants to know, even if they don't have a new book, movie, TV show or record album.

"Pat Sajak asked me once to guest-host for him when he was doing his talk show," Goldberg said, laughing.

"I said, 'Only if I could have (first ladies) Lady Bird Johnson, Betty Ford and Rosalynn Carter as guests.' And they said, 'Not Not.' I said, 'Well, I can't do it then.' I was serious, because I thought now that would be interesting conversation."

## PBS showcases Kennedy family

PBS' "The American Experience," a prize-winning series that specializes in historical documentaries, gets a remarkable five-night showcase this week, focusing first on a political dynasty and then on two individual presidents.

Its four-hour look at "The Kennedys" (Sunday, Monday nights, repeating Saturday) is followed by "LBJ" on Tuesday and Wednesday and the landmark three-hour "Nixon" interview on Thursday.

"LBJ" and "Nixon" are repeats, but "The Kennedys" is new, the most comprehensive documentary ever made about the clan of Joseph and Rose Kennedy. Neither a tabloid treatment nor mythic saga, it is a look at a family rife with the patriarch's ambition and backed by his considerable wealth, whose ties to one another were strong, and whose tragedies were often public.

Judy Crickson, executive producer of the series since it started five years ago, said that when WGBH-Boston suggested "The Kennedys" as a documentary, "I was not certain that I was interested. I had worked on a lot of Kennedy projects over the years, particularly at ABC. But I came to admire WGBH's approach, which was different in that it considered the sweep of the family. As an old reporter, I was struck by the weight of the story when you take it straight through from old Joe to Teddy Kennedy's decision to withdraw in 1980. The story has a very different air when you take it as a whole rather than pulling it apart in little pieces."

# Advanced age isn't the end of life — real or TV, girls say

The talented stars of "The Golden Girls" taught the American public an important lesson during their successful seven-year run on NBC: Growing older doesn't mean that your life is over.

And losing a cast member (Ben Arthur, who played Dorothy Zbornak) doesn't mean the show is over, either.

In "The Golden Palace," the revamped version of the show, the beloved "Golden Girls" characters buy an art deco hotel and continue to enjoy their lively golden years.

"It's like a spinoff," explains McManahan, who plays emcee southern belle Blanche Devereaux, "but it's really something that hasn't been done quite this way before, where you take three-fourths of your cast, add some new ingredients and move it to a different look."

"The Golden Palace" also stars Cheech Marin as the hotel's chef, Chuy (pronounced "chewy") Castillo, whom Sophia (Estelle Getty) argues with, primarily because he serves Mexican cuisine.

McManahan concedes that the feel of the show will be different, but not because Arthur has left the cast.

"The feel of the show has altered because we're no longer in a home environment," says McManahan. "We're now in a business, a hotel, where people are coming and going. It would be altered no matter what, if Ben was with us or if one of us was gone or whatever."

The new 1992 season could be titled "The Year of Youth." The networks are offering an inordinate number of shows about the tight-skinned and tight-jointed set, but McManahan remains unfazed by the inundation, confident that "The Golden Palace" will hold its own.

"I think young shows will appeal to an audience that's of a certain age," McManahan says. "They certainly will not appeal across the board, like our show, because

our show doesn't stop at any age. It goes from (age) 3 to 93."

"I don't know," she continues. "Maybe the general public isn't aware of the fact that we have a very broad demographic. But I get fan mail, as we all do, from kids — lots of kids — and teen-agers."

McManahan has no doubt that the audience that was so fond of "The Golden Girls" will follow "The Golden Palace" as well.

"I think it's going to have a very long life because people are going to say, 'My gosh, this is delightful. It's the same audience. Everybody tells me how I'm thrilled that they're that we're going on with it.'"

McManahan concludes that the same factor that made "The Golden Girls" so popular is present in "The Golden Palace." "It's just humor," she says simply. "When I was a kid growing up, there was just radio, and the kids' shows were not really as interesting as Jack Benny and Red Skelton and Bob Hope. I listened to adult shows because they were wonderfully funny, and these were people in their 40s and 50s. And the same is true today. It's the humor that matters, not the age."

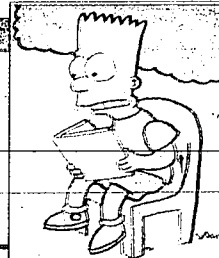
