Autumn blows across S. Idaho

Strong winds kick up dust, hinder traffic

TWIN FALLS — Wind-blown, dust scoured the Magic Valley Thursday afternoon as a fast-moving cold front swept across the state on the second full day of autumn.

Winds gusted up to 60 mph at the Twin Falls airport tower, said Orville Robinson, meteorologist for the National Weather Service in Boise.

Those winds downed power lines, large tree branches and blew enough dust to close a stretch of Interstate 84 near Glenn Ferry.

Elmore County Chief Deputy Nick Schilz said visibility on the freeway was reduced to almost zero at noon.

Officials were forced to close the interstate for about 45 minutes after several minor accidents, he said. The Idaho State Police reported no serious accidents in the area.

A falling tree knocked down a three-quarter mile stretch of power line on U.S. Highway 30 between Kimberly and Hansen at about 1 p.m., Idaho Power engineering supervisor Sid Brewer said.

All Hansen-area customers had electricity restored by 4:50 p.m., Brewer said.

There were scattered outages reported throughout the area due to branches and trees striking power lines, Brewer said, adding that he hoped to have power back

to everyone Thursday evening.

The National Weather Service issued a severe thunderstorm warning and a tornado watch for Twin Falls, Cassia, Minidoka, Gooding, Jerome and Lincoln counties from about midday until 3 p.m.

Winds were at 40 mph at noon, and went up from there, Robinson said the cold front moved quickly through the state and

warmer temperatures and sunny skies should return for the weekend.

"This is a classic cold front that kicked up winds of at least 58 mph," Robinson said. Winds were even stronger around

Malta, he said. Not much rain accompanied the storm — just enough to stick the dust to formerly clean cars and houses.

Farmers probably didn't suffer much damage from the wind, Twin Falls County extension agent Bob Vodranska said.

High winds could cause some shelling of beans lying in windrows in fields, he said. If the wind blew cut alfalfa out of its windrows, that too could cause some extra work for farmers, he said.

House unlikely to join Senate in overriding family leave veto

WASHINGTON — The Senate voted Thursday to override President Bush's veto of the family leave bill, shining a campaign-season spotlight on an issue Democrats think will wound him come Election Day.

Supporters of the legislation coheated that even with the Senate's 68-31 vote, a House override effort will probably fail. Nonetheless, Democrats relished the high-profile chance to contrast Bush's opposition to the bill with his rhetoric championing "family values."

Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., said the House will vote next Wednesday on the override attempt. But supporters and opponents alike said

they expect the House to uphold Bush's veto. The House approved the bill by 253-177 last November — well short of the 289 votes, a two-thirds margin, that would be needed if all 433 members vote.

Fifty-four Senate Democrats and 14 Republicans voted Thursday to override Bush, while three Democrats and 28 Republicans sided with him.

Idaho's two Republican senators, Steve Symms and LaFry Craig, cast "no" votes — to uphold the president's veto.

Only three senators who participated when the Senate voted 65-32 for the measure last Oct. 2 voted differently on Thursday.

Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, voted against the bill Thursday after voting

for it in October. Sen. David Boren, D-Okla., voted for the bill Thursday and against it in October. Sen. John Seymour, R-Calif., who is up for reelection, did not vote Thursday but voted against it last October.

"Those Republicans who voted with us today chose families," said Sen. Al Gore, D-Tenn., Democratic presidential candidate Bill Clinton's running mate. "Those who voted with the Bush-Quayle position chose to say, 'Read our lip-service to family values.'"

The measure would require businesses with 50 or more employees to grant workers up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave each year to care for newborn babies or sick family members.

House adopts strict nuclear testing limits

WASHINGTON — The House overwhelmingly Thursday to reverse President Bush's policy on nuclear weapons testing, imposing strict conditions on the underground blasts and ending them entirely in 1996.

On a vote of 224-151, lawmakers adopted a Senate provision that had been the subject of earlier administration veto threats.

The presence of the project, the superconducting supercollider, made it politically untenable for Bush to veto the bill, which provides money for energy and water projects for the coming year, said the source, speaking only on condition of anonymity.

The plan adopted by the House, originally offered by Sens. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., George Mitchell, D-Maine, and James Exon, D-Neb., would impose a nine-month moratorium on tests beginning next month, put strict conditions on subsequent tests, and ban them entirely after Oct. 1, 1996. Advocates argued that the moratorium is an important symbolic response to the current testing suspensions being observed by France and Russia.

Halting testing, proponents say, also would move the United States toward fulfillment of its promise in the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty.

The issue of whether to continue underground tests provides a sharp contrast between Bush and Democratic challenger Bill Clinton. Clinton favors a policy in which tests are first restricted, then ended entirely.

Nation couldn't resume war over prisoners, retired admiral declares

WASHINGTON — The top military officer at the end of the Vietnam War told a Senate panel Thursday that the nation "didn't have the stomach" to resume fighting over possible unreturned POWs after peace had been negotiated.

Adm. Thomas Moorer, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff from 1970 to 1974, said it was politically impossible for President Nixon to reopen the war in 1973 on the unconfirmed possibility that not all Americans had been returned from Laos.

At that time, in 1973, Nixon had concluded peace talks with the North Vietnamese. The government of Laos was not represented in the negotiations. And Nixon was preparing to hold welcoming ceremonies for U.S. POWs released under those Paris peace accords.

"We would have had to go to Laos ...

and physically sweep out the whole area," Moorer said.

"We didn't have the stomach for it. We didn't have the will," Moorer said, adding later that he referred to the nation as a whole, not just military and Nixon administration officials.

Both sides aim at voters in abortion middle ground

WASHINGTON — George Bush and Dan Quayle support an abortion ban — but now, it seems, with some loopholes.

Bill Clinton and Al Gore stress abortion rights, but maybe with restrictions.

Republicans and the Democrats, coming from different basic positions, are aiming their appeals at similar voters: those who have mixed feelings.

"For us, it is suburban, well-educated, prosperous women who are not happy with the pro-life portion of the Republican Party," said a top GOP official who spoke

on condition of anonymity. "For the Democrats, it is the Catholic or Southern conservatives who disagree with the party's absolute pro-choice position."

The Republican convention produced a party platform that called for a ban on abortion in the form of an amendment to the Constitution. The Democrats supported a national law guaranteeing a woman's right to choose.

Those documents made the choice very clear. Perhaps too stark for many people's tastes.

Bush, Quayle, and Barbara Bush all made television appearances distancing

themselves from the platform's hardline, pro-life position.

In an interview on NBC television last month, Bush was asked what he would do if his granddaughter came to him and said she was pregnant and wanted an abortion. "I'd stand by her," the president said.

So, he was asked, the choice would be hers? "Well, who else's could it be?" he responded.

Some of the president's campaign literature now says simply that he "favors reasonable restrictions on abortion."

Quayle offered Wednesday that abortion is "not an issue with the American people."

A day later, Marilyn Quayle, the wife of the vice president and a vehement opponent to abortion, said she did not believe in a universal ban. Pregnancy from incest was one case where abortion might be acceptable, she said.

David Beckwith, the vice president's spokesman, says the Quayles' position has always been to make exceptions for cases of rape, incest and danger to the life of the mother. "The media is trying to make an inconsistency where no inconsistency has occurred," he said.

"The platform is a human rights issue." Please see ABORTION/A2

Season's initial frost chills Eastern states

The first frost of fall chilled the Northeast on Thursday. Thunderstorms span off by Tropical Storm Danielle dumped rain on parts of the southern Atlantic Coast while record high temperatures warmed the northern Plains.
Frost extended into the high mountain valleys of the Appalachians in West Virginia and across western New York State and western Pennsylvania, the National Weather Service said. The growing season has ended over most of eastern New York State and Vermont, forecasters said.
At midday, rain showers and thunderstorms remained over the southern Atlantic states, Texas, the northern Rockies and the northern Pacific Coast. Rainfall during the

six hours ending at 2 p.m. EDT included 1.67 inches at Jacksonville, Fla., causing some street flooding.
Temperatures over portions of the northern Plains were unseasonably warm. Record highs for the day included 90 at Rapid City, S.D., and 91 at Williston, N.D.
Colder temperatures included 27 at Greenbank and 28 at Gladly, both in West Virginia; and 26 at Angelica, N.Y.; and 22 at Smethport, Pa.
Temperatures were unseasonably cold over Alaska, where the lowest was 14 degrees below zero at Beaver in the upper Yukon Valley.
"Temperatures around the nation at 3 p.m. EDT ranged from 49 at Lowell, Idaho, to 105 at Imperial, Calif. The low temperature for the contiguous nation Thursday was 19 at Wallingford, Vt.

Select Committee on POW-MIA Affairs as it held a third day of hearings with former military and Nixon administration officials from two decades ago.

Former officials have testified there was reason to believe that more Americans than the nine eventually released from Laos had been held in that country as a result of the fighting in Southeast Asia.

Former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger acknowledged the possibility there may have been more living Americans in Laos, though he denounced as "a flat-out lie" the allegation U.S. officials knowingly abandoned Americans there.

Committee Chairman John Kerry, D-Mass., said, "The evidence is overwhelming to the committee there is a gap between stated public policy at that time and reality."

In a just-released deposition to the committee, Moorer was questioned about orders he issued in March 1973 to delay search for others, and U.S. troops in Vietnam until a full accounting of POWs had been provided. One day later, Moorer reversed those orders.

"When this started and the POWs came back and so on and there was a very euphoric reception and the wives of POWs came (to the White House) and so on and press release after press release (said) that we were withdrawing the troops, at that point, no president could have said, 'Oops, we're not going to withdraw the troops,'" Moorer said in his deposition.

Testifying Thursday, Moorer said it "wouldn't have been fair" to the POWs accounted for by North Vietnam to have delayed their release while the United States pursued a search for others.

He said the officials had no confirmed information about other Americans believed to be held but not accounted for.

"If we'd known the identity and location of certain POWs, we'd have done something about it," he said.

The committee also questioned Roger Shields, who headed the Pentagon's POW-MIA office from 1971 to 1977, and his boss, William Clements, the deputy defense secretary from 1973 to 1976 and later governor of Texas.

Shields defended a statement he made on April 12, 1973, that "We have no indication at this moment that there are any Americans alive in Indochina." Shields contended his statements did not rule out the possibility more Americans could be released, but that officials had no solid information.

THE CANDIDATES:

GEORGE BUSH: Spent the day at Camp David, Md., with no public appearances. In Washington, the Senate voted to override Bush's veto of the family leave bill, sending the politically charged issue to the House for a final vote.

BILL CLINTON: Said his health care plan would save \$700 billion in eight years and guarantee basic coverage to all while dismissing President Bush's rival plan as "too little, too late." "We cannot go on like this, this is a matter that is critical for the survival of this country's future," he told a rally in New Jersey.

NEWS OF NOTE: Democratic vice presidential nominee Al Gore's parents, former Tennessee Sen. Albert Gore Sr. and his wife, Pauline, are campaigning energetically

for the Democratic presidential ticket.

A poll by Spy magazine shows Clinton and Bush rate similarly on campus as in the real world. The students think Clinton would be the better leader, 70 percent to 6 percent. But they'd rather have Bush babysit their kids, 42 percent to 31 percent. The rest have no preference.

Clinton leads Bush 56 percent to 35 percent in the poll of 1,190 students randomly selected for face-to-face interviews at 62 representative colleges and universities nationwide.

amendment, and that could be the more repeal of Roe vs. Wade, which would put it back in the states and put it back in the political system," said Beckwith.

Clinton has embraced the position of "pro-choice" elements of his party, including codification of Roe vs. Wade, the Supreme Court decision that made abortion legal nationwide.

"We can be pro-family and pro-choice," he says at campaign stops, to rousing applause.

But Clinton's record suggests he is far from militant in his support for abortion rights, and the campaign seems happy to live with that duality.

As governor of Arkansas he signed a bill requiring parental notice if a minor sought an abortion and he opposed state subsidies so poor women could get abortions.

As a presidential candidate, he has opposed a federal notification law and would allow public financing of abortion as part of his universal health care plan. Sen. Al Gore, his running mate, also opposed federal abortion financing in the past.

Clinton's support of state, instead

of federal, decision-making on abortion restrictions sounds a little like Quayle.

"His position is clearly pro-choice but he's clearly uncomfortable with abortion," said Stan Greenberg, Clinton's pollster.

Greenberg adds that Bush, by wavering, stands to appear "both hypocritical and very political with an issue people consider to be private," he said. "I think it's an issue we win on."

Polls show Clinton leading Bush among women, and at least part of that difference can be attributed to the abortion issue.

The "gender gap" was evident in a USA Today-CNN-Gallup poll released last week. While the race was a virtual tie among men, Clinton's lead among women was 54 percent to 39 percent.

Activists on both sides insist abortion is a key electoral issue but polls suggest a more limited impact.

In one survey, just 10 percent of registered voters considered abortion so important that it would determine which presidential candidate they voted for. And only a fraction of those would be undecided.

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12-year-old boy goes to court to 'divorce' parents

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Squirming and chewing a gum drop, a 12-year-old boy went to court Thursday seeking a "divorce" from his parents in a case that could help give children more protection against parental abuse.

Gregory Kingsley, brown-haired and pale, sat in the back of the courtroom with members of the foster family he hopes to live with permanently.

His mother, Rachel Kingsley, cried as she denied allegations that she abused, neglected and abandoned him for most of his life. In the past eight years, Gregory has lived with her only seven months.

Mrs. Kingsley also denied that her fiancé, Steve Hack, had recently beaten her in the presence of her two younger sons, who live with her in St. Louis.

A former sister-in-law, Jeanette Glenn, detailed instances of abuse and neglect, accusing Mrs. Kingsley, 30, of being an alcoholic, a drug abuser and even a prostitute.

Sobbing, Mrs. Glenn said she hoped the two younger boys also could be taken from her "because nothing's going to change. ... That's

the pattern for her." Gregory said he felt unloved and unwanted most of his life. He smiled occasionally in court, chewed on a gum drop and whispered to those around him.

The trial was shown live on CNN and Court TV.

Child welfare advocates and legal scholars said the case could establish

a significant legal precedent, but some said it was unlikely to have much practical effect.

Charmaine Crouse Yoest, policy analyst with the conservative Family Research Council in Washington, said, "The ramifications are huge. ... You're looking at a fundamental shift at the way we view children."

Howard Davidson, director of the American Bar Association Center on Children and the Law, said it was unlikely that many children would be bringing lawyers to sever parental custody in the future. He said the case was mainly significant because it had attracted so much attention, not vice versa.

"All of the publicity makes it significant," he said. "To my knowledge, this is the first time in American history that a termination-of-parental-rights hearing has been broadcast on national television."

Three of Mrs. Kingsley's former co-workers at an Orlando area restaurant-bar testified at the request of Gregory's lawyers that she had a female lover-roommate and attempted suicide by slitting her wrists when the roommate left her.

Robert Noll, a counselor-supervi-

for the state Health and Rehabilitative Services Department, which has legal custody of Gregory, said the department has changed its position and would like to see termination

of Mrs. Kingsley's parental rights. Gregory was taken from Mrs. Kingsley by his father at age 4 and she didn't see him for almost five

years. Gregory claims his father was an alcoholic who abused him. The boy rejoined his mother in 1989 when he was 8 and lived in the Orlando area, until she placed him in foster care again nearly a year ago.

Gregory has been living with Russ and his wife, Elizabeth, ever since. Mrs. Kingsley said she tried hard to provide the boys a stable home, but was forced to put them in foster care because she couldn't afford to keep them on a \$200-a-week salary.

Under questioning from Gregory's foster father, attorney George Russ, Mrs. Kingsley denied she had a history of alcoholism. Later, she accused Florida social workers of thwarting her attempts to contact Gregory.

"I tried to call for his birthday and he was away on a camping trip," she said. "They told me he didn't want to speak with me after a while."

Mrs. Glenn said she had been a frequent visitor to the Kingsley home in a St. Louis suburb when the children were young.

Gregory finally has a chance to live a decent life with people who love and care for him, Glenn said. "I want that to happen."

For Bush, nothing seems to be working

WASHINGTON — President Bush has brought back his old political team.

He's tried new lines of attack. But nothing seems to work.

He seems stuck in a rut, unable to stir fears about Bill Clinton or create momentum about four more years of Republican rule.

One month after the Republican convention that was supposed to launch his comeback campaign, an embattled Bush continues to lag behind his Democratic rival by anywhere from 10 to 20 points.

"We have little ups and downs in the polls but basically Clinton has kept his lead," said Andrew Kobut, director of surveys for the Times Mirror Center. "People are expressing as much strong support for Bill Clinton as they did for George Bush four years ago."

While Clinton has scored points by hammering Bush on the sad state of the economy, the president has not gotten much payback from his attacks on Clinton's avoidance of the draft during the Vietnam War.

"He (Bush) not only doesn't have a vision for America, he doesn't have a vision for getting elected," said Lyn Nofziger, who was White House political director for Ronald Reagan.

"They're running out of time if they haven't already. My feeling is, George Bush has reached the point where he really doesn't care" about winning.

In the month since James A. Baker

Analysis

III took over as chief of staff, there have been some marked improvements in Bush's campaign.

Bush has sharpened the debate on differences with Clinton, particularly on taxes, and has begun to focus on Arkansas' bottom-dwelling ranking in many economic areas.

The president has finally addressed the "vision" question, defining a rationale for a second term based on an agenda of free enterprise, lower taxes and less government.

The indecision that plagued Bush's campaign has been replaced with a clear line of authority emanating from Baker. Campaign money is being spent more wisely, officials say. Bush has doled out favors, promises and tax breaks to farmers, defense employees, displaced workers, businessmen and average taxpayers — although he's been fuzzy about how to pay for everything.

But the miracle that Republicans hoped for hasn't materialized.

"We've stabilized and laid the groundwork for a possible breakthrough," one senior White House official said. But the official added, "It's not clear that we'll be able to make the breakthrough. We need to change the dynamic or the psychology of this campaign in the next couple of weeks."

Another senior official said, "The jury's out on why the numbers have not moved. The conventional wisdom out there is that there is still a large, undecided vote."

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP) — A gunman opened fire and killed a man in the San Bernardino County courthouse Thursday as bystanders in the hallway scurried for cover, authorities said.

Witnesses heard three shots fired and soon afterward police arrested Lynn Walker, 30, of San Bernardino, said Police Department spokeswoman Sherric Guerrero. But it was unclear if he was the gunman.

Police also recovered a weapon, but didn't immediately say what type.

Another man thought to be involved in the shooting also was being sought.

The gunshots followed a heated argument between family members involved in a child custody battle, witnesses said.

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Spacecraft stands ready for launch

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — An American spacecraft stood ready Thursday for a mission to Mars, the nation's first attempt to reach the Red Planet in 17 years.

"We should think of it as the beginning of what we hope will be a regular series of missions to explore Mars, which is the one planet besides our own that holds the most fascination for humankind," said NASA's chief scientist, Lennard Fisk.

A Titan 3 rocket holding NASA's Mars Observer was fueled for its scheduled 12:27 p.m. EDT today liftoff from Cape Canaveral Air Force Station. Forecasters gave 70 percent odds of good launch weather.

The Titan's job is to hoist Mars Observer into low Earth orbit. Once that's accomplished, a Transfer Orbit Stage (TOS) is to be fired on its first flight to send the spacecraft zooming 450 million miles toward Mars.

The trip should take 11 months. The cost of the mission, expected to last more than three years, is \$980 million.

The amount includes \$511 million for the Mars Observer; \$282 million for the Titan and transfer orbit stage, both built by Martin Marietta Corp.; and at least \$150 million for mission-operating costs, said Fisk.

NASA officials, understandably, are anxious. The opportunity to go to Mars comes only every 26 months because of planetary alignment, and the Mars Observer must be off the ground by Oct. 13 or face a two-year

wait. It is the first U.S. spacecraft to be sent to Mars since Viking 2 in 1975.

"When we get our good ride from the Titan and TOS folks, we'll have a sip of champagne with them," said project manager David Evans of the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif. "But on the other hand, we can't really open our champagne until we're at Mars in orbit and gathering good data."

The 2½-ton spacecraft should arrive at Mars in August 1993. After it is maneuvered into a near-polar orbit 235 miles above the Martian surface, it will really open our landscape and weather conditions. Measurements are to be made for one full Martian year, or 687 Earth days.

Hurricanes traumatize kids

MIAMI (AP) — A secretary dives under a desk at the sound of a thunderclap, a 4-year-old clings to his mother while sucking his thumb, a brother and sister destroy each other's toy cities in a game of "hurricane."

Psychiatrists, nurses and professors recounted those stories Thursday at a public hospital as they offered summaries of the thousands of contacts mental health professionals have had with victims in the month since Hurricane Andrew hit.

Thirty to 40 percent of Hurricane Andrew's youngest victims probably are showing signs of post-traumatic stress, said Dr. Jon Shaw, head of the Jackson Memorial Hospital's child psychology division.

That includes regressive behavior, like the thumb-sucking boy, and cases of bed-wetting, or simply bad dreams, he said.

Admirals fired for not aggressively investigating Tailhook sex scandal

WASHINGTON (AP) — Acting Navy Secretary Sean O'Keefe stripped three admirals of their jobs on Thursday for failing to investigate aggressively the Tailhook sex abuse scandal.

O'Keefe said those who harass women "will be driven from our ranks."

In a sometimes emotional appearance before reporters, O'Keefe vowed to "get to the bottom" of the scandal, which has haunted the Navy for more than a year.

"Sexual harassment will not be tolerated," he said. "And those who don't get the message will be driven from our ranks."

But O'Keefe defended his top aide, Undersecretary Dan Howard, against criticism contained in a report issued Thursday by the Pentagon's inspector general.

The report faulted the three admirals and Howard and said their removal from office should be considered — for failing to investigate aggressively the alleged abuse of more than two dozen women at a Las Vegas aviators' convention in 1991.

O'Keefe said Howard had been given an "impossible task" and had, in effect, become a "referee" in a botched investigation. Howard performed as well as possible and the failure was not his, but that of the officials and officers reporting to him, O'Keefe argued.

A second and potentially even more explosive report by the inspector general dealing with possible criminal charges stemming from the incident is due out in December.

The report said "lurid" sexual behavior had taken place at the annual convention at least as far back as 1985 and naval leadership had done nothing to stop it.

At his news conference, the secretary announced:

• Rear Adm. Duvall M. Williams, the one-star commander of the Naval Investigative Service, which handles criminal inquiries, will be replaced with a senior civilian.

• Rear Adm. John Gordon, the Navy's two-star judge advocate general and its chief legal officer, will be replaced.

• Rear Adm. George Washington Davis, the navy's inspector general, will be reassigned after the Senate confirms his replacement.

The inspector general's report asked O'Keefe to consider "appropriate disciplinary action" for Gordon and Williams. The secretary said he'd not yet made any such decisions.

A Navy source, who spoke on the

condition of anonymity, said the two had been put on "terminal leave." That means they may be permitted to retire in their current grade. Because all retirements of flag officers must be confirmed by the Senate, however, the lawmakers could have a say in the final disposition of the two admirals.

None of the three responded immediately to requests for comment.

Rep. Patricia Schroeder, D-Colo., and a member of the House Armed Services Committee, called the report "excellent."

The military's attitude toward women is "going to change a little more when they see three admirals being dealt with in this manner," she said.

Sen. John Glenn, D-Ohio and a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, called O'Keefe's action "a small step in repairing the damage done to the Navy's image." Glenn added, "They still have a long way to go."

In a series of steps taken to improve future Navy investigations, O'Keefe said the inspector general's post will be upgraded from a two-star to a three-star admiral's position — so that its occupant would be nearer retirement and less fearful of angering superior officers with his work.

The principals in the Navy investigations erred when they allowed their concern for the Navy as an institution to obscure the need to determine accountability for the misconduct. "... said the report issued by Pentagon inspector General Derek Vander Schaaf.

Williams repeatedly attempted to halt the investigation, the report said, while Gordon was cited for "poor professional judgment."

Williams also was cited for his attitude toward women in the service, an opinion that should have raised concerns about his ability to conduct a full and proper investigation, the report said.

The report quoted Williams as saying "that 'men simply do not want women in the military' and that he appeared to share that view himself."

The inspector general said that Williams, in a "screaming match" with a senior female Navy civilian, "made comments to the effect that a lot of female Navy pilots are go-go dancers, topless dancers or hookers."

Williams began to argue for a halt to the investigation in December 1991, and said his office didn't have "a fair's

chance in a whirlwind" of getting to the bottom of it all, the report said.

For his part, Gordon "failed to ensure that the Navy fully addressed the issues" in the investigation, and failed to provide the service with "a comprehensive report" that the service could use to correct its problems.

Davis "did not ensure that his reports had a factual basis," and relied too heavily on the NIS work, the report said.

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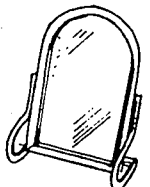
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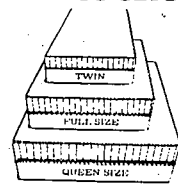
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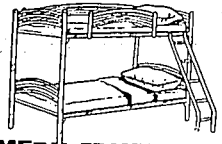
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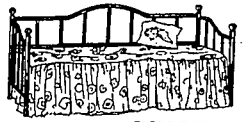
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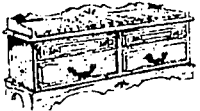
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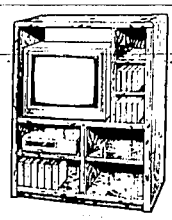
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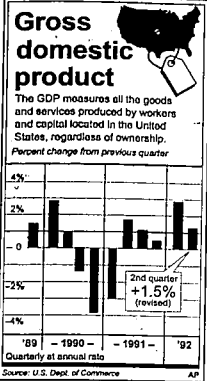

Consumer caution keeps economic growth down for 2nd quarter



WASHINGTON (AP) — The economy grew at a slightly less anemic rate than first thought in the April-June quarter, but new claims for unemployment benefits rose in mid-September for the fourth week in a row, the government said Thursday.

Separately, the Labor Department said 414,000 Americans filed applications for unemployment during the week ended Sept. 12, an increase of 15,000 partly attributed to claims from victims of Hurricane Andrew. It was the fourth consecutive rise.

Analysts expected the mostly gloomy economic news to continue between now and the Nov. 3 presidential election.

"I can't see how the impression could possibly change before the election," said economist Paul W. Boltz of T. Rowe Price Associates in Balti-

more. "George Bush is stuck with (talking about) family values at this point."

Next week, the Labor Department reports on September's unemployment rate. Many economists fear the end of a federal summer jobs program for teen-agers and job losses from the hurricane will cause an increase, from 7.6 percent August rate.

On Oct. 27, only a week before Election Day, the government releases its first estimate of GDP in the July-September period. In advance, economists were expecting at best a modest improvement compared with the second quarter.

The second quarter performance followed a moderate increase of 2.9 percent at an annual rate in the first three months of the year. That's considered poor for just after a recession but it still was the best growth since the early months of the Bush administration.

American consumers, whose spending accounts for roughly two-thirds of all economic activity, were behind the slowdown. Their spending edged

down 0.1 percent in the second quarter after spiking 5.1 percent in the first. The decline encompassed a 2.1 percent drop for durable goods — big ticket items such as autos and appliances.

Business investment in new equipment recorded a large 24.1 percent gain in the second quarter. Business investment in buildings fell at an 0.8 percent rate. Spending on housing rose 12.6 percent.

Federal, state and local government

spending fell 1.2 percent overall, led by a 5.2 percent drop in defense expenditures.

Meanwhile, the Commerce Department said the after-tax profits of U.S. corporations edged 1.3 percent higher in the second quarter to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$232.7 billion, a downward revision...from last month's estimate of a 2.1 percent gain.

Still, analysts said profits were in good shape compared with a year ago because the latest advance came on top

of a 10.8 percent jump in the first quarter, the best in four years.

The various changes translated into a GDP increase at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$18.7 billion with total GDP standing at a \$4.89 trillion, after adjusting for inflation.

A measure of inflation tied to the GDP advanced at a 2.9 percent annual rate in the second quarter, an upward revision from the old estimate of 2.6 percent. But it still was better than the 3.6 percent rate in the first quarter.

World leaders scold Bush, U.S. for ballooning budget deficits

WASHINGTON — If George Bush was hoping to get a campaign boost by demonstrating America's global reach on financial matters, this week's premier gathering of capitalism had to be disappointing.

Not only did the president's idea to give gold a role in currency matters fall on deaf ears, but the United States received quite a tongue lashing for its budgetary sins.

Various speakers at the annual meetings of the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank castigated the United States for failing to get a grip on its ballooning budget deficits, which they charged were diverting scarce capital from the neediest countries.

The complaints were led off by IMF Managing Director Michel Camdessus, who included Germany and Italy in his list of countries that

urgently need to trim their deficits.

But Camdessus aimed his most pointed comments at the United States, which has failed for more than a decade to control its deficits.

"Each postponement of long overdue fiscal action adds to the severity of the problem," Camdessus said.

For their part, Bush administration officials stuck to their guns, blaming this year's expected record deficit of \$330 billion on the recession and saying that once Bush has a new Congress to work with he will make progress again on deficit reduction.

Bush took the unusual step of inviting the finance ministers to the White House Sunday for a reception and presidential pep talk on the need for better cooperation to boost world growth. The event seemed to have more to do with election-year campaign needs than with any serious ef-

fort to address the turmoil in European currency markets.

The president suggested that currency movements and a country's interest-rate policies be linked to changes in the price of a selection of commodities that would include gold. The idea was actually a rehashing of a proposal in 1987 by then-Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III, the man now running Bush's re-election effort.

The commodity basket approach to currency stabilization received a cool response at the finance meetings, with Germany rejecting it as a ploy to force German interest rates down and other finance officials calling it simplistic.

ICL stunt drags unwilling bystanders into mine issue

OK, Idaho Conservation League. You've made your point. You've had your fun. You've generated a ton of news coverage.

Now pull up your stakes and go home. The ICL's high-profile stunt at the Elkhorn Golf Course this week was a childish prank that will earn it more enemies than friends if it continues. So the ICL's "mine-all mine co." activists groups have no moral right to disrupt private businesses that are innocent bystanders to political battles.

The ICL contends that federal mining laws are too lax and open to abuse. The group objects to the fact that "any fly-by-night outfit" can stake a claim to mineral rights on federal land without paying for it.

Even after formerly federal land has been transferred to private ownership, the law apparently still applies if the government retains the mining rights.

So the ICL's "mine-all mine co." showed up at the "golf" course Wednesday with survey paraphernalia and made a nuisance of itself. There may be more to come; the group threatens to bring a backhoe to dig exploratory trenches, both at the course and at Bald Mountain.

The group's contention has some merit, at least on its face. Miners extract a reported \$3.9 billion worth of minerals from federal land every year, without paying royalties. If they choose, miners can buy federal land for \$5 an acre or less - prices set in 1872.

Although this year's attempt to change the law died in Congress this week, the ICL and other interested parties will have ample opportunity to debate the issue next year.

Even if you agree with the ICL's view, however, the group's tactics constitute harassment. One of the ICL's stated goals is to prod the recreation areas' owners into helping with lobbying. But making a pest of yourself seems like a funny way to recruit allies.

So far Elkhorn and its customers haven't suffered much inconvenience. Meanwhile, the ICL has achieved what it really wanted: lots of media coverage. (That coverage included front-page photos in this newspaper. In hindsight, we're a little sorry we played it so prominently.)

The group should quit while it's ahead. Continuing the charade will only antagonize people who never asked to be involved.

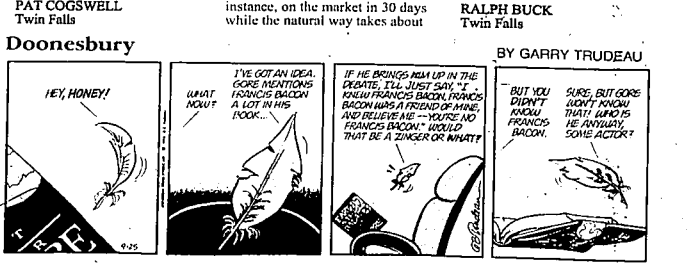

In besieged Sarajevo, forced to be creative, cooks make war paste



SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Take some dry bread and crumble it.

Add a can of sardines squirreled away last winter, cut in small pieces. To that add salt, oregano or any other spice, and water.

Spread this pate look-alike, Fehma Rezakovic's Sarajevo war paste, on bread for a satisfying — if slightly unusual — breakfast.

Sarajevo's kitchens are the domain of cooks trained for generations to turn out dishes rich in meat, fresh produce and lively spices that reflect the city's location as a crossroads of European and Ottoman Turkey. But under siege, necessity has become the mother of invention.

War paste, rice schnitzels, nettles and war cookies won't win any blue ribbons, but they do help to keep body and soul together. In Sarajevo, that's enough.

who are fighting a war — or fighting to maintain a normal life amid the siege.

"They have forced us to be creative," she said of the Serb forces choking off supplies to the city.

"Sometimes, I lose my desire to cook," Mrs. Rezakovic said Thursday, bright eyes flashing under a shock of gray hair. She nodded her head for emphasis. "Nothing changes. Every day is the same."

"We used to have everything," she added. "Now, we have nothing."

Nothing, that is, except flour, rice, pasta, oil, and the ever-present nettle.

Anyone who has more in Sarajevo either was smart enough to stock up heavily before fighting started this spring, or has a lot of money to spend.

In a city where the average person earns the equivalent of \$10 a month, one egg now costs about a dollar and a half.

That makes rice schnitzel, a breaded patty of boiled rice, a good

bet. It's better for those who stockpiled canned tomatoes or paste to make a sauce.

Nettles, better known by westerners for their ability to cause pain, are a substitute for spinach and about the only greens available.

Seifka Gogalija has been growing and selling nettles in Sarajevo for 30 years. Traditionally, they are used to make soup or tea. Standing in back of her stand at a small downtown market where she offered nettles, dandelion leaves and various grasses for tea, she said this has been a banner year.

"Before, we didn't grow it like this," she said. "It's the biggest amount of my life." With two sons and their families — 10 people in all — to feed, the 52-year-old said she has been eating a lot of nettles herself.

She's had nettles mixed with rice, she's had nettles wrapped in pastry dough. Sarajevo residents swear the nettle contains iron, is good for the blood and digestion — but enough is

enough.

Atifa Sekso said she despairs at her limited supplies "almost every day, 10 times a day, 100 times a day." But she gets by with a deep breath and another shot of optimism.

Her war cookies consist of three cups of wheat flour, three spoonfuls of sugar and a cup of oil, mixed together. But there's a hitch.

"If you don't have gas or electricity, you go to your neighbor's to bake them," she added.

On the way back, though, she has

to hand out cookies to a gauntlet of other neighbors and there may not be many left by the time she gets home.

Under the siege, Mrs. Rezakovic says she has lost eleven pounds. Her husband Maso has lost 33 pounds. Their blue-eyed daughter Anesa has lost 13 pounds.

Asked if she found any recipes she would use after the war, Mrs. Rezakovic said: "Never! After the war, no war recipes. Never! Nothing like that."

Shelling hinders U.N. efforts to restore power to Sarajevo

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Shelling frustrated U.N. soldiers' attempts Thursday to restore electrical power that was knocked out three days earlier to 80 percent of the Bosnian capital.

In neighboring Croatia, the United Nations' chief civilian officer warned Croatian officials not to begin turning refugees to the east, most of four-U.N. protection zones, saying that Serb militias were still menacing civilians.

Cyrus Vance and Lord Owen, the envoys leading

the ongoing Yugoslav peace conference in Geneva, said they would fly to Banja Luka on Friday to investigate similar reports of intimidation around the Serb stronghold in northern Bosnia.

Serb fighters who want to remain tied to Serbia and Montenegro, the remaining republics in Yugoslavia, have captured two-thirds of Bosnia. At least 10,000 people have been killed since Bosnia's Muslim and Croats voted Feb. 29 for independence from Yugoslavia.

Shelling began Wednesday morning as a team of engineers left U.N. Protection Force headquarters in an armored car for the damaged electricity station north of the city at Ugorsko. They made no progress on repairs.

Sarajevo has suffered from irregular electricity and water supplies for much of its nearly six-month-long siege by Serb forces. Only about 20 percent of the city of 400,000 residents has had power since shell-lammed into the Ugorsko power substation Monday.

Brazilian ministers will resign

BRASILIA, Brazil (AP) — The nation's economy minister said Thursday he would resign next week before Congress votes on the impeachment of President Fernando Collor de Mello.

Marcelio Marques Moreira, who has made no secret he intends to resign, said he didn't want to step down after the vote because that might give the impression he was forced out.

Justice Minister Celso Borja and Central Bank President Francisco Gros also said they would quit before the vote, which could be as early as Tuesday.

The resignations have been expected since Aug. 25, when 15 Cabinet ministers signed a pact to stay on until the political crisis was "resolved."

Collor, 43, is accused of receiving \$6.5 million in cash and gifts from a slush fund run by Paulo Cesar Farias, his 1989 campaign treasurer. Farias allegedly extorted millions of dollars from businessmen in return for government contracts and favors.

Moreira, the architect of Brazil's agreements with creditor banks and the International Monetary Fund, has been the prime force propping up the embattled Collor regime.

This week, he announced in Washington that Brazil and its creditors had agreed on terms for repaying \$44 billion of the nation's \$115 billion foreign debt, the Third World's largest.

On Wednesday, the Supreme Court rejected Collor's appeal for more time to prepare his defense and said the impeachment vote must be public.

U.S., Russian officials argue over cooperation by KGB

MOSCOW (AP) — The American and Russian heads of a commission searching for U.S. POWs differed on Thursday over whether the former KGB has blocked their work and whether any servicemen might still be alive.

Former U.S. Ambassador Malcolm Toon said he lodged a complaint with President Boris Yeltsin on Wednesday about the lack of cooperation by the Russian Security Ministry.

Toon and his Russian counterpart, Yeltsin aide Dmitri Volkogonov, spoke at a news conference before Toon was to fly to Khabarovsk in Russia's Far East and then return to the United States.

Volkogonov said the former KGB had overcome its initial reluctance to help the POW panel, which was formed in March by Yeltsin and President Bush.

"There were some difficulties and misunderstandings at the beginning of our effort," he said. "But now we have full understanding and we cooperate very closely with the archivists."

Toon said at his meeting Wednesday with Yeltsin, the Russian president agreed to do whatever he could to open more intelligence files.

"I would anticipate that in the future we will

have a free flow of information, even from these archives," Toon said.

Yeltsin caused a furor in June when he said the former Soviet Union had imprisoned American servicemen — including some from Vietnam — and that some might still be alive.

Investigators searching newly opened archives of the KGB and other security agencies so far have found little information on any POWs, although they did find names of 49 American civilians who were trapped in the former Soviet Union during and immediately after World War II. Five are still alive in the former Soviet Union, Volkogonov said.

Toon also has been pressing the Russian government to make a definitive statement about whether any Americans were being held.

Volkogonov said Thursday it was "impossible" that U.S. servicemen were held against their will.

Toon replied that "in my three visits to Moscow, I have heard nothing from the officials I've talked to, I've seen nothing in the archives that have been made available to us that would support the idea that there is a live American POW being held against his will in Russia. And that's all I can say."



WWII romance leads to nuptials after 50 years

DARWIN, Australia (AP) — A World War II romance between an American soldier and an Australian woman has been rekindled with a whirlwind courtship and wedding 50 years later.

Glenn Hicks, then age 22, and Dorothy Gill, 17, spent five months going steady in the central Australian town of Alice Springs in 1942.

Hicks, of Boise, Idaho, was a member of a U.S. military unit sent there after the Japanese bombed the Northern Territory's capital, Darwin, 745 miles to the north.

When Hicks was transferred out, the couple lost contact and married other people. Both have since been widowed.

Hicks returned to Alice Springs in August and proposed four days later. On Sunday, the couple was married.

"I was his first girlfriend and he was my first boyfriend," the new Mrs. Hicks said. "We were pretty naive."

The couple first resumed contact in 1987, when Mrs. Hicks and her first husband tried to find Hicks while vacationing in the United States.

Accidents kill 13,000 Russians

MOSCOW (AP) — Traffic accidents killed 13,000 people and injured 75,000 in Russia in the first six months of 1992, a newspaper reported Thursday.

Drivers were to blame for three-quarters of the accidents, the newspaper Trud said, quoting figures released by the State Statistics Committee.

The newspaper urged stiffer penalties for traffic violations and said more traffic lights, pedestrian underpasses and protective roadside railings should be installed.

Russian roads and cars are frequently in disrepair. Motorists often disregard traffic laws, drive in the wrong lane and change lanes without signaling or looking.

Cabinet officer quits

LONDON (AP) — David Mellor, a close friend of Prime Minister John Major, resigned from the Cabinet Thursday, following scandals over an affair with a Spanish actress and his friendship with the daughter of a P.L.O. official.

Mellor, 43, the National Heritage minister and among the brightest stars of Major's 22-member Cabinet, had tried to turn a three-month battle to keep his job into a trial of strength with Britain's tabloid newspapers.

Wendell teachers still battle for new contract

WENDELL - No contract settlement has been reached between Wendell teachers and their school district.

After about four hours of discussion with a federal mediator this week, the Wendell Education Association proposed a contract of a \$17,000 base salary and a fringe benefit pool of \$290 per month per teacher.

The district has 10 working days to reply.

The previous contract paid a base of \$16,250 and offered varying benefits to employees and their dependents.

Single employees received \$135 per month in insurance payments and employees with families received up to \$340.

Superintendent Larry Manly said the board of trustees will meet next week to decide what to do.

"We are doing some calculations and we will get back to the WEA regarding their proposal," he said.

Manly said the two sides are "a little closer" to working out an agreement.

Jerome sheriff warns against high-priced paving operation

JEROME - The Jerome County Sheriff's Office is warning residents to beware of a high-priced paving operation targeting older people.

The most recent complaint about the outfit came Wednesday when an elderly woman living south of Jerome paid \$2,000 for what turned out to be slighsd work on a new driveway, Jerome County Under Sheriff Gerald Brant said.

The woman told deputies that two men with a truck told her they had half a load of asphalt that she needed to get rid of and could pave her gravel driveway in a hurry.

When the woman asked how much the job would cost, the men said they wouldn't know until the job was done, Brant said. They finished and presented a \$2,000 bill to the woman. She paid it even though she was suspicious.

Then she called some area paving companies and found that the job should have cost about \$1,000, but when she called her bank to stop payment on the check it already had been cashed, Brant said.

The woman did not get a name, and a telephone number leads to a Boise-area answering service, he said.

He urged residents to get several bids, check with the sheriff's office or call the Better Business Bureau before agreeing to any paving work from people they are not familiar with.

Federal agency declares county drought disaster area

SHOSHONE - U.S. Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan has declared Lincoln County a drought disaster area, making farmers there eligible for low-interest loans from the Farmers Home Administration.

Madigan notified Gov. Cecil Andrus Thursday of his decision. Producers in more than a dozen other counties already were made eligible for federal drought disaster assistance.

Religious banner offends resident

Jerome man reports message to ACLU for violating Constitution

JEROME - Jack Adams says he was so displeased with a banner strung across a Jerome street that he was ready to sue the city over the offending advertisement.

Instead, Adams reported the message on the banner to the American Civil Liberties Union's Boise office, and the advertisement was promptly removed by city officials.

The banner - stretched across South

Lincoln - advertised the Awana Club sponsored by the Bible Baptist Church. The club, for boys and girls, is similar to a youth scouting club, but includes religious training.

Adams, a Jerome resident, said the banner that was hung on city property and carried a religious message violated the Constitution's separation of church and state.

"The mayor belongs to (the Bible Baptist Church) and he (had the banner put up) on

his own volition," Adams said. "The council didn't act on it."

"Either it was a complete lack of understanding of the law on the mayor's part, or he had a total disregard for the law."

Adams said he had complained to the city administrator about the religious banner, but when nothing happened, he contacted the ACLU.

"We were going to file a suit Tuesday if it didn't get taken down," Adams said.

Mayor Gerald Ostler said the poles for any banners hung over South Lincoln were donated by Idaho Power Co. for use by any organization that had a need.

"So when Awana asked me if they could put the banner up, I said, 'sure,'" Ostler said.

He added from now on the poles would not be on loan to any churches in the area.

"(Awana) is a worthy cause, but it's against the Constitution; it's against the law," Adams said.

Hagerman to decide on water plan

HAGERMAN - After a strong show of support from city residents, city officials are ready to decide on a final plan for a new Hagerman city water system.

At a public hearing this week, engineer Scott Bybee answered questions from concerned citizens about drilling wells, pumping costs, ground water supplies, federal funding, government regulations and problems with spring water.

Bybee also presented four alternative plans to improve the city water system. The cost, he said, will be somewhere between \$200,000 and \$2 million.

"It is prudent to try to make some decision now before the state imposes a moratorium," Bybee said.

Even though the city's spring water is tapped at its sources 1,000 feet back into rock cliffs, the state may soon judge the springs to be classed as surface water that is adversely being impacted, he said.

If so, the state, in order to protect public health, could issue an order to stop use of that water if the city does not do so on its own by July of 1994.

By acting now to secure another source (a well) or to improve the existing source by filtration, the city has a good chance to receive grant funding for at least 75 percent of the project, Bybee predicted.

"If this whole (new) system was done by city financing, you couldn't pay for it," Bybee said.

In order to get federal funding, city residents have to agree to help pay for a new system, said Region 4 economic development manager Carleen Herring, who will be applying for several grants on behalf of the city.

"You've got to have some local commitment," she said. "The feds aren't going to foot the whole bill."

The city will have to pass a bond in October as a promise to help pay for the improvements, Herring said. Otherwise, she said, the city has no chance of winning any grants.

Only city residents will be able to vote on the bond issue, Bybee said, but if the bond passes and Hagerman does receive federal funding, bond payments will be raised by a user fee rather than city property taxes. He estimated that the user fee will be about \$4 or \$5 a month per household - in or out of city limits - for about 20 years.

Energy officials admit fuel sent to INEL no longer has value

BOISE - The federal Energy Department has admitted that spent nuclear fuel from a Colorado reactor now stored in Idaho no longer has any research value.

And that removes the reason the department used for bringing the fuel to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The federal official responsible for nuclear reactor development has conceded under oath that there is little, if any, research value in the high-level radioactive commercial reactor fuel the government has been storing at INEL.

The statement by E.C. Brodin nullified the only argument the Department of Energy had used against charges by Gov. Cecil Andrus in a heated confrontation with the department last year. Andrus argued that DOE intended only to use INEL as a warehouse for the spent fuel from the decommissioned Fort St. Vrain nuclear power plant near Denver.

"In early September 1992 DOE concluded that there is no need to pursue a research and development program," which will "substantially reduce the technical value" of

the spent nuclear fuel from the Fort St. Vrain facility, Brodin said in a sworn affidavit.

Andrus administration officials had maintained throughout the confrontation that the research claim was merely a ruse.

The affidavit was filed last week as part of the government's attempt to, in effect, dismiss Andrus' federal court suit to block further waste shipments to INEL. Brodin is acting principal deputy assistant secretary for nuclear energy and deputy assistant secretary for civilian reactor development.

The Energy Department announced at the same time that it would conduct full-scale environmental impact studies Andrus had demanded and went to court to get.

Energy Secretary James Watkins said those assessments wouldn't be completed until 1995 and no further attempts to ship material under a 1965 contract with the Colorado utility running the reactor would be made before then.

More than 100 truckloads of the material had been shipped from Colorado to INEL in the early- and mid-1980s before Andrus regained the governor's office and began his unilateral campaign to block further use of

INEL as a nuclear waste dump. Three more

came in during 1991 before Andrus was finally successful in getting a court order to halt them.

Andrus repeatedly said in early 1991 that he would let the material into INEL if the federal government assured him that it would be reprocessed or used for research. The federal government offered to construct a reprocessing plant and conduct a \$29 million research and development program.

But the department refused to commit to those promises. Andrus wanted the department to pay substantial fines if the facility and research were completed and material not removed from Idaho by the end of the 1990s.

In the past several months, the federal government has suffered repeated setbacks in its attempt to force compliance with the 1965 contract with the Colorado utility. Because of obstacles thrown up by the state, the utility built a special on-site storage facility in Colorado, removing any immediate need for moving it again.

The company left itself without any way to ship the material without obtaining federal approval of a new shipping container - a process that would probably take about two years and has yet to be started.

Twin Falls residents form neighborhood watch

TWIN FALLS - While police search for a man suspected of stabbing one man and shooting another over the weekend in a once-quiet Twin Falls neighborhood, residents there are forming a neighborhood watch program.

A party on Jefferson Street turned sour Saturday night, and neighbors say they've had enough.

"This used to be a quiet neighborhood, and we're going to take it back," said Jan Ciele, who lives across the street.

A felony charge of aggravated battery was

filed Thursday against Isiah D. Robertson, 18, in connection with the Saturday night stabbing of Oscar Ortiz, 17, Twin Falls police Lt. Jim Kistler said.

Ortiz has been released from Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

Robertson also is the suspect in a shooting that happened early Sunday morning, but no formal charges were filed in that incident Thursday, Kistler said.

"There are still people we need to talk to on the shooting," he said.

Ortiz was stabbed in the neck with a screwdriver shortly after 10 p.m. Saturday. About two hours later, 18-year-old Francisco

Rendon was shot in the right arm and shoulder with a shotgun as he walked down the street.

Detectives have been interviewing people who were at the party to find out just what happened Saturday night.

One witness said he tripped over a man at the party, and a fight began. Ortiz and Robertson became involved, and Robertson hit Ortiz in the jaw, the witness told detective Sgt. Dave Heidemann.

Robertson has left town, but Kistler said Thursday that police know where he is.

"Hopefully by the weekend we'll have him," Kistler said.

Last weekend's party was not the first time

police have been summoned to this neighborhood by a loud party, Ciele said.

"We have bent way over backwards to be neighborly," she said.

Ciele says she's tired of picking up beer cans and bottles from her yard and seeing people use her yard as a urinal.

She expects 40-50 people to attend an organizational meeting outside her house at 208 Borah Ave. Tuesday night at 7 p.m.

Police officers will be there to show a video and help the neighbors begin the program, she said.

"There's strength in numbers," Ciele said.

Developers face many obstacles north of Snake River Canyon

JEROME - The seemingly inevitable development north of the Perrine Bridge is in the initial stages of becoming a reality.

"There are very few places in Idaho with so much traffic and no development," said Lon McDonald, a member of the Jerome economic development task force. "I think that area is ripe for development."

Harvesting that ripe land will be met by retailers and other commercial users with help from the Idaho Department of Lands. The department wants to consider leasing 1,650 acres of land the state owns in

Jerome County just north of Perrine Bridge.

Even though it's prime land, developers would face several obstacles.

If and when proposals are considered, developers must go through usual zoning procedures. Jerome County Planning and Zoning Administrator Art Brown said the county would need to identify and decide what kind of zoning is best for Jerome County.

Currently, Brown said, the land in question is a preservation area because it is state land. Development along the canyon rim in Jerome County also is essentially

Jerome, Wendell, Bliss to receive irrigation water for 10 more days

JEROME - Irrigation water will be turned on in the Jerome, Wendell and Bliss areas for an additional 10 days.

But doing so may deplete water from the North Side Canal Co.'s storage system, and water officials say they are hoping for heavy snows this winter.

"Next year our water storage for this area will be zero," said Vince Alberdi, assistant manager of the canal company. "We like to start with 250,000 acre feet of water before the snow melts; so we better get on our prayer knees."

Water will be turned into the canals in the second and third irrigation areas on Monday. It should arrive through the area by Tuesday.

Irrigating water will be available through Oct. 7, when it will be turned off for the season, Alberdi said.

"We are delighted to have enough water to run 10 days," Alberdi said. "This will be the final run for this year's harvest."

Careful management throughout the season and a decision made in May to provide 70 percent of the normal water amounts, made the extra 10 days possible, he said.

Former state trooper charged with fondling 12-year-old girl

RUPERT A former state trooper, already charged with sexually abusing a young girl in Cassia County, is now facing a similar felony charge in Minidoka County.

The Minidoka County prosecutor's office has charged Robert A. Connor, 52, a 30-year veteran of the Idaho State Police, with committing sexual abuse of a child under the age of 16.

There will be a preliminary

hearing for Connor at 9:15 a.m. Oct. 16, in the courtroom of 5th District Court Magistrate Judge John F. Varn, according to court records.

If found guilty, Connor could spend up to 15 years in jail.

The girl, who was 12 at the time, told investigators Connor fondled her breasts at various times between August 1990 and June 1991.

In Cassia County, Connor has been charged with similarly touching a 13-year-old girl on her breasts during a church camp in July

1991. He testified during a February preliminary hearing on that case in magistrate court that he touched the 13-year-old's breasts accidentally while the two were sleeping during a camp outing.

The Cassia County case has been turned over to the state Attorney General's office in Boise because Connor worked out of the Cassia County Law Enforcement building before being suspended and subsequently terminated late last year because of the earlier charge.

5-term L.A. mayor Bradley to retire

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mayor Tom Bradley, who saw the city through its brightest moments during the 1984 Olympics and three of its darkest days during last spring's riots, said Thursday he will retire next year after two decades in office.

The announcement by the 74-year-old Bradley, the first black mayor of the nation's second-largest city, capped months of speculation over his political future. The primary election is in April 1993, the general election in June.

"The time for change has come," the five-term mayor said in a speech to about 300 supporters and staff members, many with moist eyes.

Bradley said the decision to step down was "the most difficult of my life."

"I hope I am doing what is right for Los Angeles, and my friends,

what is right for Los Angeles is right for me," Bradley said.

Bradley cited as his accomplishments revitalizing downtown, improving Los Angeles International Airport, helping clean the environment and initiating a major rapid transit project.

He said he will use the remaining nine months of his term to help rebuild the city from the riots.

In 1973, Bradley, a former policeman and city council member, defeated incumbent Mayor Sam Yorty.

For much of his tenure, Bradley's savvy and ceaseless energy made him appear politically invincible in Los Angeles.

Fall, athletic and consistently blunt, with his monotone delivery and aversion to public squabbles, Bradley has been consumed with the office of mayor, working 16-

and 18-hour days that start with a ride on an exercise bike.

Under his watch, Los Angeles gained international prominence, overtaking San Francisco as the West Coast's financial capital with its strong ties to Pacific Rim trading. The skyline literally changed as towering office buildings sprang up downtown. The airport and port became booming successes.

And the Olympic Games, which overcame an East Bloc boycott and produced a profit, made the city shine.

For much of his political life, Bradley's only failure was his inability to transfer his local popularity statewide.

Bradley, a Democrat, ran for governor in 1982 and 1986 and lost both times to Republican George Deukmejian.

Actress applauds state Senate candidate

POST FALLS (AP) — Actress Patty Duke said a common concern about the impacts of rapid growth prompted her appearance at a fund-raising event for Democratic state Rep. Barbara Chamberlain's state Senate campaign.

Besides, Chamberlain's campaign manager — Mike Kennedy — is Duke's nephew, and the actress is married to a Wallace

native. Duke also has homes in Cour d'Alene and at Carlin Bay on Lake Cour d'Alene.

Duke said she and Kennedy don't always see eye to eye on politics.

But "Chamberlain has us agreeing," she said Wednesday during a fund-raising luncheon at Templin's Resort.

The Democrat has "a practical

approach" to the area's needs, Duke said.

"She has proved to be a representative who listens. And she hears."

Chamberlain, of Post Falls, faces former Kootenai County Commission chairman Frank Henderson of Post Falls, the Republican nominee, for the District 2 Idaho Senate seat.

Out-of-state enrollment at U of I climbs

MOSCOW (AP) — Despite a 15 percent increase in tuition, the out-of-state enrollment at the University of Idaho continues to climb.

The university reported that nonresident enrollment is up 1.6 percent from a year ago as rising fees and the prospect of massive program cuts in their own state university systems push students from Oregon and California to the Moscow campus.

"There are factors that we don't have any control over that act in the opposite direction," Director of Admissions Peter Brown said.

While the nonresident increase was modest it was still more than university officials expected but they conceded that even with the tuition increase and an enrollment cap on one program, the school remains a "good buy" compared to other western state universities.

Last year, the state Board of Education was concerned that the number of nonresident college students was becoming excessive, approaching a quarter of the student body.

The large turnout will be documented and turned in with the grant application to help Hagerman's chance of winning money, he added.

Indian tribe chairman criticizes Andrus

PLUMMER The chairman of northern Idaho's Coeur d'Alene Indian Tribe is criticizing Gov. Cecil Andrus for issuing proclamations recognizing Idaho's tribes at the same time he is opposing Indian initiatives on several fronts.

In the September issue of the tribe's monthly "Coeur d'Alene Council Fires" newspaper, Ernie Stensgar said that with "1992 is an election year, it is important that citizens understand the issues and how politicians will go to extremes to almost buy votes."

An issue were gubernatorial proclamations declaring 1992 "Year of the American Indian and a Year of Reconciliation Between American Indians and Non-Indians" and Friday as "Indian Day in the State of Idaho."

Andrus issued the proclamations earlier this month at the request of James Osborne, chairman of the Tribal Cultural Committee for eastern Idaho's Shoshone-Bannock Tribes.

Osborne cited federal action early this year to recognize the American Indian and said he encouraged the governor "to actively foster the implementation" of that action.

Teacher receives presidential award

COEUR D'ALENE — Coeur d'Alene High School's Eileen Gruenwald has received a Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics Teaching.

She had applied for the award two times before. "It was to the point I decided if this application didn't have what it needed, I wasn't going to submit any more," Gruenwald said Wednesday.

The award gives Gruenwald and her husband an all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C., in March, and her school \$2,500 annually for three years from the National Science Foundation to improve its mathematics programs.

Court won't review civil rights claims

SANDPOINT — The Idaho Supreme Court has refused to review defense arguments that accused teen-age killer Jeremiah "Jeremy" Cooper's civil rights are being violated.

His attorney, Bruce Greene, contends Cooper is being held without bail on circumstantial evidence and has been denied a speedy trial on a first-degree murder charge for the Feb. 29 slaying death of his mother, Jodi Cooper, 35, at their home near Careywood.

Cooper, 18, has pleaded innocent to the murder charge and a charge of aggravated battery for allegedly injuring his stepfather, Pete Crockett, 41, during the same attack that killed his mother.

Greene said the Supreme Court gave no reason for refusing to review his civil rights arguments.

Al. rus to be at headstone dedication

OROFINO — Gov. Cecil Andrus is scheduled to participate in Tuesday's dedication of a headstone at the grave of 3-year-old Robert J. Miller, a 1981 victim of Idaho's first convicted torture-murderer.

Gene Francis Stuart, 41, was convicted under Idaho's murder-by-torture law and sentenced to death for the beating death of Robert, the son of Kathie Miller, Stuart's live-in girlfriend.

Thomas Thompson of Orofino organized Tuesday's ceremony to dedicate a grave marker and has started a fund-raising effort for a college scholarship fund in the boy's name for Orofino High School graduates.

More than \$10,000 has been collected so far, Thompson said.

City to use state grant for sewer system

POCATELLO — The city of Pocatello will get a state grant of \$300,000 to extend sanitary sewer collection lines and hookups to the South Grant-and-Bannock Highway neighborhood.

Gov. Cecil Andrus announced the grant on Thursday. The money will go for installation of pump stations, collector lines, service lines and street repair.

Perot supporters want him back in campaign

Supporters of Ross Perot want him back in the campaign.

That message went to Texas from Idaho's Perot supporters Thursday after polling to gauge sentiment on whether he should get back into the presidential race.

Mary Guidry, office manager in Boise for the Perot campaign, sent a message of overwhelming support to Dallas, along with a report that few Idahoans think the major candidates are addressing the issues.

"I've never thought that he wasn't (naming)," she said. "I've had the gut feeling all along that we were going ahead with this. That's why we're still here."

Even after Perot pulled out of the presidential campaign in July, his

views, it wasn't long in coming. "We have been inundated with phone calls here in the office," Guidry said. "We only have two lines, and it has been really interesting."

Perot's two questions were whether his supporters left Bill Clinton or George Bush were addressing the issues in the campaign and whether he should get back in.

Guidry said three of the 235 people who contacted the Boise office felt the Democrats were addressing issues;

none felt the GOP candidates were. Statewide, about 2,700 other responses were tabulated. About 15 said Democrats were addressing issues, but the Republicans drew a blank again.

Guidry acknowledged that the response wasn't surprising, because it would come from people who support Perot.

"If they were interested in ... the poll, I would assume so," she said. "These are just our core people, basically."

Elsewhere in Idaho politics, 2nd District congressional candidate J.D. Williams held a Boise news conference Thursday to attack his Republican opponent, Mike Crapo, for making tax promises that aren't reflected in his eight-year voting record in the Idaho Senate.

Crapo called it a familiar theme from an opponent and a distortion of his voting record.

Williams is the state auditor and the Democratic candidate. Crapo is president pro tem of the state Senate.

Williams said Crapo is running as "a solid, anti-tax conservative," but alleged it's just rhetoric. Over a number of years, Crapo voted for many tax increases, he said, and in 1985 voted for legislation that would have reduced a property tax exemption for homeowners by half.

Williams said that's cynicism. "He says one thing now, but as a legislator, having the votes upstairs (in the Senate), he did something else," he said.

"I will have a contract with the people of the 2nd District that the things I say will be the things that I do if elected," Williams said.

Andrus urges senators to support water rights

Gov. Cecil Andrus is urging Idaho's two Republican senators to put at the top of their agenda passage of legislation assuring state protection of outstanding water resources cannot be overridden by federal hydropower licenses.

In a letter to Steve Symms and Larry Craig, the Democratic chief executive said it was imperative that states have the ability to protect their water resources without intrusion from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission or other federal agencies.

"We in the West, and particularly in Idaho, have experienced a history of mismanagement by FERC which has often resulted in ineffective and inefficient water distribution and environmental degradation," Andrus said.

He and governors of 27 other states and the Northern Mariana Islands have formally backed the legislation that is included in the National Energy Efficiency Act. A compromise version of the bill is moving toward final action in Congress.

The issue of state control over water came to the forefront in the late 1980s after a federal court ruled that the federal commission had authority to set stream flows at power dams if licenses, thereby overruling state stream-flow requirements both above and below the generators.

"There is no issue more central to Idaho and Idahoans than our ability to manage our own water resources," the governor said.

Congressman Richard Stallings said budget negotiators have agreed to provide \$625,000 for the Bureau

of Land Management to buy about 200 acres of critical wildlife habitat in the Hull's Gulch area of Boise. Boise Water Corp., which owns most of the land, said it is willing to discuss selling the property to the government so it can be protected from development.

The House Agriculture Committee approved a Stallings' compromise to simplify the fee system for ski areas operating on federal lands after rejecting what the ski industry claimed was a crippling alternative. Backers claim the current system is expensive, time consuming and attempts to include income operators generate from facilities not located on federal land.

The committee also endorsed Congressman Larry LaRocco's Forest Health Act that would allow expedited salvage of timber damaged by the drought. LaRocco said the legislation not only reflects the dialogue among various interests on the timber salvage issue itself but lays the groundwork for future discussion of other land management issues. It must still win approval from the Interior Committee before going to the full House.

Judge allows only \$344 in river lawsuit

BOISE (AP) — A federal judge has concluded that a lawsuit filed to stop a hydroelectric project on western Idaho's Payette River was a good-faith attempt to protect the river and has awarded only \$344 in costs to the developers.

The developer, Horseshoe Bend Hydroelectric Co., Salt Lake City, won a decision in a lawsuit before U.S. District Judge Marion Callister in June, and the judge at the time said he would award attorney fees and costs.

The developer filed a claim for more than \$50,000 in legal fees and costs, an amount which was disputed by the plaintiffs, Friends of the Payette and Idaho Rivers United, Inc.

On Wednesday Callister awarded Horseshoe Bend Hydro only the mandatory amount of \$180 plus \$164.25 for preparation of a transcript.

The Payette River is a vital and precious resource," Callister said. "The project bore a heavy burden to prove itself because it has had such an impact on this river."

"The defendants did carry their burden, but that does not diminish the importance of the question raised by the plaintiffs. Both sides proceeded in good faith," the judge said.

The environmental groups filed a lawsuit contending the National Environmental Policy Act requires a thorough environmental impact analysis in such projects. Callister ruled on June 25 ruled against it, but the groups have filed an appeal to the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals.

The company and predecessors have been working since 1983 for approval of a hydro project on the Payette. It will involve diverting much of the flow of the river 3 1/2 miles to a power plant, which the environmental groups say will have a devastating impact on wildlife.



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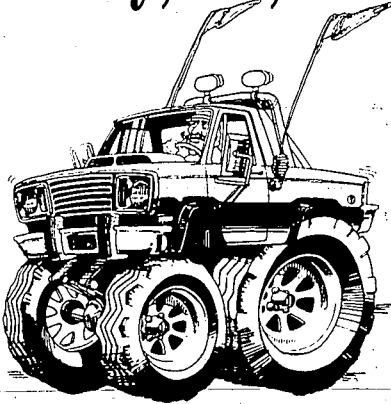

David Hillier, vice president and general counsel of the Tribune Co., which owns the Cubs, said papers dropping the case were filed today in U.S. District Court in Chicago and with the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Hillier said baseball's 10-man executive council, which rules the major leagues because of the vacancies in the commissioner's office, made the decision

Wednesday night. "The appeal is gone. And the realignment is gone," Hillier said. "It takes us back to the status quo prior to the realignment order."

But Selig of the Milwaukee Brewers, chairman of the executive council, issued a statement saying a committee was being appointed to examine the matter. "I consider this an extremely positive

development for baseball," Selig said. "We can move forward to resolve the realignment issue through consensus rather than confrontation, which is the approach I would like to take to each and every problem confronting the game today."

Former commissioner Fay Vincent ordered realignment on July 6, using his "best interests" power under the Major League Baseball Constitution.

"There's something about that Carolina blue that I just don't like," State linebacker David Merritt said.

North Carolina (3-0) will be trying to end a four-game losing streak to N.C. State (3-1), which is coming off a 34-13 loss to Florida State.

"I think State in the past couple of years has really been good, and we haven't been so good," North Carolina tailback Randy Jordan said. "But I think now, we're at a level where we're competing with teams and doing what

we have to do to win the games."

No. 2 Washington, No. 5 Texas A&M, No. 12 Ohio State, No. 13 Florida, No. 17 Syracuse, No. 20 Oklahoma and No. 22 Southern Cal don't play this weekend.

Judge OKs free agency

Jackson heads list of NFL players affected by ruling

MINNEAPOLIS — A federal judge today issued an order making temporary free agents of Philadelphia Eagles tight end Keith Jackson and three other NFL holdouts.

The decision was the first practical impact of last month's ruling in an antitrust lawsuit against the league. A federal jury threw out Plan B, the limited free agency system that allowed teams to protect their top 37 players each year.

LAWRENCE, Kan. — Dave Barr accounted for two touchdowns and Russell White smashed Chuck Muncie's school all-purpose running record Thursday night, lifting California past No. 24 Kansas 27-23 in the Jayhawks' first game as a ranked team in 16 years.

The Bears (2-1), 7-point underdogs, dominated Kansas along the line of scrimmage and never trailed while holding left hosts from the Big Eight conference 27 points below their season average.

Kansas (3-1) closed to within 20-17 on Maurice Douglas' 31-yard touchdown run with 4:22 left in the third period following Charley Bowen's 21-yard interception return, and moments later Dan Eichelhoff tried a 47-yard field goal that could have tied it.

But Brad Bowser blocked the kick and the ball rolled to the Kansas 40. Six plays later, Barr's 11-yard touchdown pass to Sean Dawkins restored the Bears' 10-point lead. The Jayhawks came right back and fooled the Bears on a

hailbolt option pass from Matt Gay to Rodney Harris that covered 33 yards to the end zone. A try for two points failed, leaving California with a four-point lead with 8:13 left.

White, who ran for 153 yards in 39 carries, surpassed Muncie's all-purpose record of 4,194.

Kansas quarterback Chip Hileyay, who entered the game averaging more than 237 yards on offense, didn't complete a pass until 8:00 of the second quarter and only Cal mistakes kept Kansas within three points at halftime. White went over left guard for 33 yards to the Jayhawks' 17 early in the first quarter. But Barr's pass on second and 5 was intercepted by Larry Thiel.

The Bears were driving early in the second quarter when Kansas' Robert Vaughn intercepted Barr's pass on second and 15 and returned it 11 yards to the Cal 44. Barr hit Mike Caldwell for 11 yards on third and 9 on the second possession of the second quarter and two plays later found Dawkins down the right sideline for 37 yards to the Kansas 17. The drive stalled at the 15 and Doug Brien made it 10-0 with a 33-yard field goal.

Axiom doesn't apply to this NFL season

Every year the NFL cites statistics on how many games were decided by seven points or fewer. Or three points or fewer. Or one point.

All the number crunching is designed, of course, to prove the old Pete Rozelle axiom: "On any given Sunday ..."

Sorry, no in 1992, when parity has become dis-parity.

Just three weeks into the season, it's clear there are four distinct levels:

- Very good, as in Buffalo, Dallas, San Francisco and Philadelphia.
- Good, as in Houston, Kansas City, Miami, New Orleans.
- Average, as in the Giants and Redskins, winners of the last two Super Bowls, and, until proven otherwise, 3-0 Pittsburgh.
- Awful, as in ... New England, Phoenix, Indianapolis, Seattle, the Rams and San Diego, which can change coaches, general managers and players and still spin their wheels.

"In years past, it's usually been above average and below average."

Those at the top are there because of good players AND good management. The average teams are either well-run teams (Bears, Giants, Redskins) in a down period or teams that seem to have discovered the people or formulas to move into the pack, like Pittsburgh, Detroit and Tampa Bay.

The bad teams are bad in all facets of the game, especially at the top management level.

There's New England (Billy Sullivan-Victor Kiam-chaos), Phoenix (Bill Bidwill), Indianapolis (Robert Irsay), Seattle (Ken Behring) and the Rams (Georgia Frontiere), where the executive types don't know enough to hire good people, get out of the way and let them run their teams.

The Colts, for example, tried for a quick fix by trading up for Jeff George. But in the process, they gave up his blocking (Chris Hinton) and his receiving (Andre Rison) and now ... of course, he's hurt.

San Diego is a better example, bad management combined with

bad luck.

"A couple of years ago I thought they were coming right up there," says Steve DeBerg, who was then with the Chiefs and is now with the Bucs. "I don't know what goes on there. I just can't put my finger on it."

Well, here's why.

Alex Spanos, who bought the team in 1984, thought he could win right away with an aging team that had been a power in the late '70s with Dan Fouts and an outstanding defense.

When the Chargers didn't win, Spanos changed coaches. Don Coryell to Al Saunders to Dan Henning to Bobby Ross.

Spanos brought in Steve Ortmyer, an Al Davis disciple from the Raiders as general manager and Ortmyer made one of the worst trades, dealing All-Pro tackle Jim Lachey to the Raiders for John Clay, an All-Pro bust. (That was compounded by Davis, who sent Lachey and a first-round draft pick to

Washington for Jay Schroeder, but that's another story).

When Ortmyer didn't win, Spanos went for a name, and brought in Bobby Beathard, the aging surfer, who preferred the west coast to Washington.

But Beathard's magic didn't come with his name.

Yes, he got his traditional sixth-round quarterback — John Friesz — as he had gotten Mark Rypien, Stan Humphries and Cary Conklin. But Friesz tore up a knee in the preseason and is out for the year.

Beathard's habit of giving up first-round-draft picks, which never hurt in Washington, has been disastrous in San Diego, largely because the Redskins always picked low; the Chargers always pick high.

During the 1991 draft, Beathard gave up his No. 1 this year to the Redskins to take guard Eric Moten in the second round. Moten is OK, when healthy. The problem is that the Chargers went 4-12 last season and the pick was turned by the Redskins into Desmond Howard, the Heisman Trophy winner.

Eventually, these things can be turned around.

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Stock market regroups for small increase to end 3-day decline

NEW YORK Stock prices staged a mild rally Thursday, pulling out of a three-day slump with encouragement from declining interest rates.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks down 48.30 points in the week's first three sessions, recovered 9.18 points to 3,287.87.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 5 to 4 in the New York Stock Exchange. Big Board volume came to an estimated 187.78 million shares as of 4 p.m. EDT, against 204.35 million in the previous session.

Interest rates dropped in the bond market, relieving worries over a recent upswing that raised yields on long-term Treasury bonds from around 7.25 percent to near 7.5 percent.

By late Thursday the price of the 10-year bond was up more than \$5 for each \$100 in face value, lowering its yield to about 7.41 percent.

The downswing came amid new evidence that economic growth remains sluggish and uneven.

Gainers among the blue chips included:

Coca-Cola, up 1/2 at 41 1/2; General Motors, up 1/4 at 33 1/2; Philip Morris, up 1/4 at 86 1/2; McDonald's, up 1/4 at 44 1/2; and International Paper, up 1/4 at 66 1/2.

Prominent pharmaceutical issues posted broad losses. Merck, a component of the Dow, fell 1/4 to 45 1/2; Glaxo Holdings is to 26 1/2; Novartis to 26 1/2; and Eli Lilly is to 65 1/2. Abbott Laboratories was unchanged at 29 1/2.

An exception among health care stocks was U.S. Surgical, up 3/4 at 64 after falling 2 1/2 Wednesday.

Continental Corp. tumbled 6 1/2 to 24. The

insurance holding company, adding up its losses from Hurricanes Andrew and Iniki, said it planned to withdraw from the reinsurance business and recommended to directors that the quarterly dividend be cut from 65 cents a share to 25 cents a share.

Stride Rite climbed 5/8 to 18. The company reported earnings for the fiscal third quarter ended Aug. 28 of 40 cents a share, up from 36 cents a share in the corresponding period a year earlier.

Compania Corveceros traded at 12 1/2 in the Nasdaq over-the-counter market, after an initial public offering of American

depository shares of the Chilean brewing company at 12 1/2.

Spanish stocks lost ground after the Bank of Spain's temporary imposition of restrictions on capital movements. Banco Bilbao Vizcaya fell 1 1/2 to 21 1/2; Banco Central de Espana, a closed-end investment company, is to 8 1/2.

The Nasdaq composite index for the OTC market gained 2.97 to 585.93.

TWIN FALLS — If your plane is ever delayed at the Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport, at least your aesthetic side can soar.

The Visual Arts Committee of the Magic Valley Arts Council is busy setting up a permanent, but revolving, art display next to the boarding terminal. Committee members, headed by Twin Falls artist Jean Swartling, are calling the Magic Valley Artists Sampler Showcases.

Among the works on display during the first six months will be a black and white pencil drawing by Gayle Barigar entitled "Listening Madonna." It's a depiction of a young woman listening to a wise voice. Another face, along with an owl, are subtly incorporated into the picture. The fact that the woman is larger than the voice means that she doesn't hear its message well. As a result, she appears to be in a dreamlike state.

"In every piece of art, there are all kinds of subliminals," Barigar said. "We often appreciate them without knowing that we see them."

Barigar, 54, has the credentials to back up her knowledge of the art world. Having learned to sculpt as a child in her grandmother's studio, she has since moved on to other mediums, including oil, ink and watercolor. She

Heart, soul of country music success is still radio

When country music started officially becoming "the thing" about two years ago, observers pointed to video as one of the main reasons for the genre's new-found popularity, especially among young listeners.

Thanks to all-video shows on The Nashville Network (TNN) and its sister station Country Music Television (CMT), new superstars such as Garth Brooks, Vince Gill, Alan Jackson, Trisha Yearwood, Travis Tritt, Patty Loveless, Kathy Mattea and others were seen around the clock. It was a tidy summation: Video equals success.

How, then, do you explain that Garth Brooks has sold almost eight million copies of his third LP, "Ropin' the Wind," and watched three of its singles reach No. 1 without the benefit of a single video?

If this new format of "televized radio" is so hot, why did Wynonna Judd's first two singles as a solo artist hit the top spot without a video? How can it be that the video for "Rattlesnake" by new pretty boy Stacy Dean Campbell is in heavy rotation on TNN and CMT, yet the single peaked at No. 54 and already is sinking?

The truth that many artists are

rediscovering is that radio — not TV — is still the backbone of country music prosperity.

If TNN hadn't been so bullheaded about Brooks' "The Thunder Rolls" video, which was banned for its portrayal of domestic violence, Nashville might still be tossing too many eggs in the video basket.

As he pointed out during his recent news conference at Billy Bob's in Fort Worth, Brooks was so bitter about his experience with "The Thunder Rolls" that he might never make another video.

"When I cut a record, there are thousands of people all over the country who decide whether or not it gets played," he said. "When I make a video, it's six guys in Nashville who decide."

After Brooks' next single, "Rodeo," shot to No. 1, country artists began rethinking their obsession with videos.

Judd found that such glossy trumpeting was unnecessary when her self-titled LP made its debut at No. 4 on the Billboard pop album charts. On the strength of the

beautifully textured and dramatic single "She Is His Only Need," Wynonna kicked up huge sales right out of the box. Single No. 2, "I Saw the Light," also hit No. 1 without Judd and a cast acting out the lyrics on tape.

It was not until the current hit, "No One Else On Earth," which Judd acknowledged this "red hot" new format. Waiting until the third single to make a video is unheard of in pop music, but it's becoming more common in country, thanks to the Mayor of Music City, the honorable Garth Brooks.

Music alone can sell itself because country is all about striking a chord with the listener. Songs become hits when they are about easily identifiable experiences: unrequited love, working too hard, loneliness and rural folks coming to grips with an increasingly modern world. The thread of honesty grows within the imagination of the listener until the tune becomes a warming quilt of words and melody.

Video is all about fantasy, yet country music always has been steeped in reality; even on such far-fetched songs as "Big Bad John," thousands of coal miners could relate.

Such tunes as "He Stopped Loving Her

Today" by George Jones, which recently was voted the favorite country song of all time by the readers of Country Music magazine, have their own version that a cast of actors and a camera crew can't come close to matching.

Look at how the video for Jones' 1991 single "You Couldn't Get the Picture" almost ruined that song's poignancy. Instead of hiring actors to whom Jones' fans could relate, the director used rejects from a Calvin Klein ad.

Spend an hour watching CMT, and you'll see several great songs trivialized beyond belief by cheesy videos. Aaron Tippin's latest hit, "I Wouldn't Have It Any Other Way," is a powerful declaration of purpose, but it's hard to hear it now without remembering that cornball video plot that finds Tippin and his co-workers buying their factory out from under greedy men in suits. It's 3½ minutes of pure sap.

The all-video stations are great for new acts looking for exposure: Chances are that Stacy Dean Campbell wouldn't dent the Top 100 without CMT and TNN, and Suzy Bogguss wouldn't have many opportunities to show off her hat collection. Videos are not the product, however, but an ad for the product. It's encouraging to know that so many country music fans realize that.

'twentysomething' generation makes itself heard

- They love TV, poetry and cappuccino.
- They hate making decisions.
- They dream of careers as an actor/model or a singer/actress or a Chanel accessory designer.
- They'd rather be Jerry Seinfeld than Jerry Rubin, Jerry West or Jerzy Kosinski.
- They're the twentysomethings, and this wised-up, media-savvy, sometimes serious, sometimes cynical generation is making its presence felt in matters cultural. From television shows such as "Melrose Place" to "The Round Table" to "The Heights," the 40 million or so Americans born in the late 1960s and 1970s are the focus of intense cultural scrutiny.

This fascination with the young and the restive isn't limited to the small screen. In

seller. Now Coupland is back with its protagonist the 20-year-old son of a twice-divorced former hippie mother.

And, not surprisingly, the twentysomethings are in peak form in rock music. Lollapalooza '92, the alternative rock concert featuring the Red Hot Chili Peppers, Pearl Jam, Ministry and other bands, is among the summer's leading concert draws.

The trend speaks volumes about youth's buying power — they can splurge on CDs and concert tickets because most of them can't afford mortgages — but what does it say about their world view, their attitudes and ideals? And how do they differ from the baby boomers who came before them?

Tony Spiridakis, co-creator of "The Heights," says the problems baby boomers faced pale in comparison to the crises confronted by contemporary youths.

"This is the generation that is dead-on dealing with AIDS — at least the thirtysomethings were able to enjoy part of their lives without knowing the disease was festering," says Spiridakis, 34.

"Take the fear of selling out and compare it with the fear of AIDS or joblessness and tell me what you'd rather see dramatized," he says.

So who's tuning in on the twentysomething TV shows? "They're watched by very young viewers looking for behavioral role models, twentysomethings checking in to seeing how they're portrayed, and people in their 30s looking back longingly and wondering, 'God, why didn't I know that many good-looking people when I was 22?'" says Mark Harris, 28, senior writer for Entertainment Weekly.

TV's love affair with the twentysomethings is mutual. A Time/CNN poll asked 602 18- to 29-year-

old Americans which they spend more time when they were growing up, their parents or television, and a majority of them said TV.

"It seems that talking to today's 20-year-olds, TV is the one thing they all have in common. They may have read 'Silas Marner,' but they definitely have watched 'The Simpsons' and 'Family Ties' and 'The Brady Bunch,'" says Lisa Birnbach, author of 'Lisa Birnbach's New and Improved College Book,' who began looking at the lifestyles and attitudes on college campuses in 1980.

"It's fitting that Birnbach mentions 'The Brady Bunch,' the prototype video family for the twentysomethings, which featured a blended family of six children. An estimated 40 percent of twentysomethings are the children of divorce. And many others were latchkey kids, the products of two-career marriages.

Since time with their parents was

limited, they leaned heavily on friends for advice, solace and entertainment. It's no surprise, then, that many of the shows are built around a premise of a community of friends 'a la the Mediterranean apartment complex that forms the hub of 'Melrose Place,' the band in 'The Heights,' the bar in 'The Round Table' and the college dorms in 'Freshman Dorm' and 'Class of '96.'

Aspirations of a career in show business is an all but ubiquitous theme among the twentysomethings shows. The residents of 'Melrose Place' include an aspiring actress and an fashion designer trainee who pays the bills as a waitress and a boutique clerk; the young people in 'Real World' included an aspiring dancer and an budding writer.

Birnbach has noted a similar trend among college students: "A lot of them want to move to Hollywood and get involved in show business. A lot of them. That wasn't even a career 10 years ago, and today they all want to write for 'Seinfeld' or be a mogul.

"Ever since the advent of *Premiere* magazine and 'Entertainment Tonight,' they know a lot more about the biz. And that doesn't tend to attract do-gooders. It's not a business of altruism."

"It taps into this incredibly appealing fantasy of the twentysomethings of being in this perpetual state of aspiring to greatness and never having to make decisions that pre-empt that," says Harris, of *Entertainment Weekly*.

Despite their show business dreams, the twentysomethings have been drubbed for their failure to create an original youth culture to match that of the 1967 Summer of Love.

"The speed with which they took to 'Beverly Hills, 90210,' the speed with which they took to Wayne and Garth (of 'Wayne's World'), it seems like they're looking around for something but they haven't found it," Birnbach says.

"I give them some credit for promulgating the '60s renaissance, but that's still a borrowed culture."

'Malcolm X'

Spike Lee goes to court over video

HOLLYWOOD - Forty-five seconds of world-famous videotape will not be allowed to interfere with the Nov. 20 release of the 3-hour-and-11-minute, \$35 million "Malcolm X" film, Spike Lee's attorney said.

The attorney, Martin Garbus of New York, said that if the legal dispute over whether Lee is entitled to use footage of the March 1991 beating of Rodney G. King is not resolved by Thursday, the material will be excised from the movie.

By that date, completed prints of the film must be ready to be shown to exhibitors deciding whether to book the movie, Garbus said by telephone.

"Warner Bros. will not release the film with a cloud over it," Garbus said. "Our problem is that to clear the cloud, we'll have to take the footage out. ... We're not going to allow it to jeopardize release of the film."

A Warner Bros. spokeswoman confirmed that the studio needs at least six weeks to submit prints to exhibitors so they can bid on the film.

Lee failed Tuesday to persuade U.S. District Judge Terry J. Hatter to rule quickly on a preliminary injunction motion filed by George Holliday, the plumber who taped the beating.

In a suit filed Sept. 10, Holliday accused Lee of copyright infringement and sought to enjoin Warner Bros. from releasing the movie, which stars Denzel Washington as the slain African-American leader. Hatter is not scheduled to rule on the injunction motion before Oct. 13.

Holliday said Lee knowingly negotiated a licensing agreement with a party who had no authority to grant it. The filmmaker, in turn, has accused Holliday of extortion, saying he wants more than the \$50,000 agreed on for use of the tape.

Warner Bros., which was also named as a defendant in Holliday's lawsuit, joined Lee in asking the court to expedite a decision on the injunction, although the studio took no position on whether the licensing agreement is valid.

Privately, studio executives have said they would prefer to see the inflammatory King footage left out of the movie. In the film's opening montage, the beating follows a sequence showing an American flag burning and exploding into an "X."

'Singles' a genial romantic comedy

HOLLYWOOD — "Singles" is an enjoyably flaky comedy about loveless twentysomethings in Seattle. Cameron Crowe, the writer-director, is 34, still close enough to his characters to connect with them and feel affection for their foibles. Most of the current youth comedies are cartoonish and overblown but "Singles" is singularly sweet. It's a companionable movie about companionship.

Review

Most of the characters in the film live in the same Seattle apartment building. Steve (Campbell Scott) is a city engineer specializing in traffic control; Cliff (Matt Dillon) is the lead guitarist in a fifth-rate rock group; Janet (Bridget Fonda), a waitress and would-be architect, is smitten with a relationship with Steve. (It's a perfect touch that Linda drives a gas guzzler.)

Crowe sets up the film (rated PG-13) as a kind of romantic roundelay, with title cards to separate the sequences. The characters pair off, talk to the camera, talk to themselves. They're fooling around, flirting, seeking lovers. Their self-centeredness is wildly comic because they take their miseries so seriously. Their approach-avoidance love duets are so charged with mixed messages that, for most of the film, everyone seems to be crooning in code.

One of the jests in the material is how adept these people are at emotionally supporting each other with-

out in any way being able to help themselves. Most of them have been burned by other lovers in the past and they have gotten to the point where they look at potential partners with an almost clinical detachment. (The joke is that, of course, detachment is impossible.)

In the film's opening sequence, we see Linda getting two-timed by a Lothario with a Spanish accent. Sometimes later, Steve spots her at a rock concert and comes on to her by declaring that, in effect, he's not coming on to her. Linda can't see what we do in Steve — she shoots him down. She doesn't recognize until later that Steve's guilelessness really isn't an act. (When he tries for romantic gamesmanship he mangles his own good will.)

It's fitting that Steve's work project is a supertrain that would replace commuter driving in downtown Seattle. He can't understand why people might want to be alone in their own cars. He wants everyone to be happy together, and so when things with Linda sour he's re-

duced to a mumbling, unshaven hermit in his dank one-bedroom apartment. Steve is so ardent about love that when his ideals are wrecked he turns almost instantaneously into a basket case.

Janet is equally ardent about love, which is why she and Steve are soulmates (but not lovers). She's as blind to Cliff's grungy grumpiness as Cliff is deaf to the awfulness of his own music. Her true-blue spunk is more than Cliff deserves, and yet it's too much. She's so eager to

please him that she almost goes ahead with breast enlargement surgery that even the surgeon (Bill Pullman) doesn't want to perform. (The scene where he talks her out of it is a beauty.)

Crowe captures the ways kids in their 20s talk and hang out together and flirt. It is the first safe-sex generation — there's even a safe-sex party where you get to dress up as your favorite contraceptive. Crowe understands the haphazardness of his characters' raging emotions and he pays tribute by giving his film a haphazard, catch-as-catch-can structure. Scenes play like blackout sketches; the cappers are often squiggly bits of business taking place in the corner of the frame (like the moment when Steve and Linda try to have a serious conversation in a bistro while the couple next to them grope each other).

There's a genial untidiness about "Singles," but it's unified by Crowe's affection for his characters, and by the terrific Paul Westerberg music track, which plays like a pulse-beat to these people's lives. Crowe's affection for his actors is part of the package too, and they respond with the kind of winning ensemble work that turns every scene into a spirited jamboree. "Singles" is a bright and beautiful piffle about love American-style, joyful diversion.

Writer-director finds laughter in confusion

NEW YORK (AP) — Director Cameron Crowe filmed a segment for his new feature, "Singles," that he cut. He calls the piece "The Enemy," and its title refers to the telephone.

"Bridget Fonda is waiting for her boyfriend (Matt Dillon) to call and what happens is the phone rings and it's an electronic survey," Crowe explained.

"She tries to get off by pressing pound and she presses the wrong series of buttons and gets hooked into a dating line and then she goes drawing in and wants to meet this guy who's being described to her."

"But a voice comes back and says, 'I'm sorry, you're not an authorized user.' And then she presses the buttons again and she's hooked into guys all over the city and they're saying, 'Rita, how are you?'"

Crowe's got pages of stuff like this, stories of false starts, wrong numbers and missed connections. "If there's such a thing as Crowe Country, it's a land of confusion where the telephone is just one way young people wonder what's going on."

"Their careers are hazy, their relationships always in doubt. They can't seem to say what they're really thinking, like the scene in Crowe's 'Say Anything' when John Cusack phones a girl for a date and stammers like a Boy Scout who forgets the words to the Pledge of Allegiance."

"Singles" stars Fonda, Dillon, Campbell Scott and Kyra Sedgwick as single Seattle urbanites — all in their 20s, trying to get their personal and professional lives together. Dillon portrays a stoned poet in the tradition of Sean Penn from Crowe's "Fast Times at Ridgemont High," and a singer in a struggling garage band who takes his girlfriend, played by Fonda, for granted. Fonda, a coffee-shop waitress, dreams of being an architect. A neighbor (Scott) is a city planner and that most endangered of species: a nice guy, no emotional problems or macho hang-ups. He loves his girlfriend (Sedgwick), but she's just been burned by someone else and is slow to trust again.

Crowe's dialogue is an editor's nightmare. Besides the usual fill of fractured phone calls, there are plenty of "likes" and "I means" and "you knows," run-on sentences and run-on conversations, and a moment in which Dillon compliments Fonda's hat and assures her he doesn't mean it in an "Eddie Haskell" way.

"I love writing the way people speak," the 35-year-old Crowe said in a recent interview at a Manhattan hotel. "People rarely speak well. I will say 'like' and 'really' so much it will cause the pain. You know how people talk; it's messy. I realize with 'Singles' it's hard on the actors, especially if you come from the 'stage' where things are beautifully and elegantly constructed. In a long-winded way, the phone is the best opportunity to write a big chunk of dialogue."

The director grew up in San Diego and became interested in writing thanks both to his mother, an English teacher, and to the copies of

Rolling Stone magazine he began reading in his early years around girls as young as his. Crowe was a class ahead otherwise. He was working for a local alternative paper by age 15 and soon after was writing cover stories for Rolling Stone, his specialty West Coast musicians such as Eagles and Fleetwood Mac.

He never graduated from high school, but Crowe spent a year at one in California, pretending he was a student, and used it as the basis for writing "Fast Times."

He began "Singles" about 10 years ago when he was single himself. (His wife is Nancy Wilson of the rock group Heart).

Like a good reporter, what he didn't know himself, he picked up by observing others at bars and elsewhere. He filled notebooks with physical descriptions, favorite records, off-beat dialogue.

"It's the most fun to observe people speaking," he said, adding that "you can just go to a Denny's and sit in and kind of look at a couple and say, 'Wow, I never imagined two people when he was together.' One of the fun things was imagining what their lives were like and how they got together and that's how I kill time."

Despite its attractive young cast and best-selling soundtrack — featuring songs by Pearl Jam and Soundgarden — "Singles" was a tough sell for Crowe. Like his dialogue, the plot is loosely structured, a series of vignettes that fit together as casually as a bunch of friends hanging out at the diner.

Warner Bros. intended to release it in February, but kept pushing the date back while struggling to find an acceptable ad campaign.

Even Crowe's father, who died in 1989 soon after the release of "Say Anything," wondered if he shouldn't have tried something else.

"My last conversation with him was, 'I can't walk away. I'm going to rewrite the whole thing,' he said. 'You're getting offers from other people, why don't you take one of them,'" Crowe recalled.

Former cowboy records traditional songs

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) Buck Ramsey, a Texas cowboy forced to switch trades because of a severe back injury in 1965, wants to preserve the music once heard in cow camps and around chuck wagons each evening.

Ramsey, a poet whose work includes the "legally praised" "Anthem," is recording more than 50 authentic ranch and trail songs. Ramsey's primary interest is preserving these songs in their original style, and he hopes to complete the project next year.

As a result of the project, the Amarillo, Texas, resident also has issued his first commercial tape from the anthology, "Riding Uphill to Texas," which includes "Railroad Corral," "Roundup in the Spring," "Doney Gall," and "Brazos River Song."

"There's something very clean and simple about them," Ramsey said. "They are the story and song of the one real mythology that Americans gave the world."

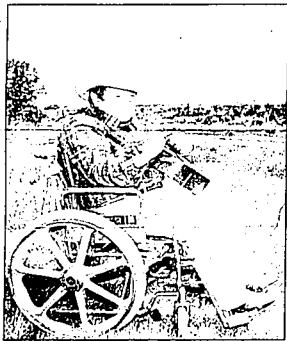
His efforts have attracted the attention of Lonn Taylor, associate director for public programs at the National Museum of American History at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C.

"I think Buck is a wonderful performer and an excellent researcher," said Taylor. "I'm very impressed."

Taylor said Ramsey's work is similar to that of John Lomax early this century. Lomax, a music historian, produced recordings and books of many early-day American songs on the verge of extinction.

"I think what he will end up with is a valuable collection," Taylor said. "Most of all I'm impressed by Buck's research. He's told me things about songs that I've always heard but never knew. He's a fine historian as well as a fine performer."

Kevin Mulroy, librarian and archivist at the Gene Autry Western Heritage Museum in Los Angeles, said Ramsey's work will be enjoyed by generations to come.

"I consider him to be a national treasure," Mulroy said. "I think he's really saving an endangered art form, an endangered species, in preserving some of the traditional Texas songs."

Most, if not all, the songs, are documented in books, Ramsey said, but attempts to record the music have been sporadic, Ramsey said.

"They contain all the parts of poetry; they tell stories. They have such great melodies; the kind that seem to speak to our common memory, take us back to what some of us think must have been a better time."

The recording sessions began more than a year ago, shortly after Ramsey met Lanny Fiel in Lub-

bock, Texas, host of a public radio program on traditional American music.

"One thing led to another and we began recording," said Fiel, who produced Ramsey's first tape and is overseeing efforts to compile the collection.

Cowboy songs, Ramsey noted, don't really fit the mold of contemporary Western music.

"I once spent a short time trying to write songs Nashville style," the 54-year-old Ramsey said. "The thing I was told in Nashville was, 'Hey, I'll bet you write poetry.' Poets always come to Nashville to write songs."

The music he sings today touches on many places, loves, difficult situations and memories. Each song is a story of cowboys and how they lived.

"They're informative on a way of life that once existed throughout the West and still exists in many places," Ramsey said.

Ramsey's introduction to music came as a small boy at a Baptist church in Middle Well, Texas, where his sisters sang as a gospel quartet.

In the early 1960s, only hours before a scheduled appearance on Arthur Godfrey's television amateur show, he left New York City to return to Texas where he worked as a cowboy.

An accident on a Texas Panhandle ranch left him in a wheelchair. He has since been a newspaper reporter, author, poet and student of politics.

Ramsey plays rhythm guitar on all his songs and Fiel has mixed in fiddle, mandolin, bass, harmonica for the tape. None is amplified.

"Very few of the old classics are documented in music," Ramsey said. "If it entertains, so much the better."

NEW YORK — The war of words between a fictional, unwed mother and the vice president of the United States was settled — maybe — with an estimated 44 million people watching.

The hour-long season premiere of "Murphy Brown" logged a 29.3 rating, or more than 27 million TV households, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co. Each rating point represents 931,000 TV households.

The CBS comedy scored a 41 percent share of viewers watching TV at that hour, Nielsen said. Without touch competition from NFL football on ABC, its showing might have been even higher.

The 41 share is dwarfed by blockbuster programs in the days before cable fractured the audience. The "Who Shot J.R.?" episode of "Dallas" drew an 80 share in 1980, and the "M-A-S-H" finale three years later did even better.

"Murphy Brown" ranked No. 3 in the ratings last season, its fourth, with an average 18.4 rating and 27 share.

The following are prime time television ratings as compiled by the A.C. Nielsen Co. for the week of Sept. 14-20. Top 20 listings include the show's ranking, with full season-to-date ranking in parentheses, rating for the week, and total hours.

An "X" or parentheses denotes one time only presentation. A rating measures the percentage of the nation's 93.1 million TV homes. Each rat-

Firing bitter pill for former 'Tonight Show' executive

LOS ANGELES — Helen Gorman Kushnick has had worse things happen to her. Her 3-year-old son died of AIDS in 1983. Six years later, her husband succumbed to cancer. In 1990, she underwent a mastectomy.

This week, she swallowed yet another bitter pill. She lost her job as executive producer of "The Tonight Show With Jay Leno," the crown jewel of late-night television entertainment.

Nearly four months after realizing her fondest career goal and reaching the pinnacle of a 17-year career managing Leno, Kushnick was fired by NBC. She'd been accused of strong-arming guests not to appear on rival talk shows.

Leno took over "The Tonight Show" on May 25 after the retirement of 30-year host Johnny Carson and brought Kushnick along.

But her tough personality and heavy-handed booking practices created a public relations nightmare for NBC.

The network first announced on last Friday it would restructure Leno's program.

On Monday, it said Kushnick had been dismissed.

I gave no official reason for her departure except that "we have determined that a change in the management structure of 'The Tonight Show' is appropriate at this time."

The dismissal came three days after the show's latest booking controversy — a claim that country singer Travis Tritt was permanently banned from Leno's show after agreeing to appear on "The Arsenio Hall Show."

Reasoner family inquires into death

Corbin knew 'Exposure' would hit

CBS' "Northern Exposure" is a show that has earned its reputation by pushing the lines that define what can and cannot be done in a TV series.

"That's kind of rare, especially in television, because television is art by committee," says Barry Corbin, who plays former astronaut Maurice Minnifield on the Alaska-based series.

"I think the viewer is willing to accept anything — if it's consistent. Our world has natural laws, which we have to abide by. But we have a lot of room to play within those natural laws. If we overstep the bounds — and I think we almost did once — then we hear about it."

That "once" was in the 1991 episode in which a duel was stopped at the last minute and the actors began addressing the camera.

"I think we almost lost it there," Corbin says.

Corbin was attracted to "Northern Exposure" because of its well-drawn characters.

"I liked Maurice because he had a lot of contradictions," says Corbin. "He had personal problems, but he had vision. He was a man of, in my opinion, the wrong kind of vision — he was talking about paving Alaska — but he had vision."

When "Northern Exposure" first premiered in 1990 as a limited-run summer series, few expected it to last. But Corbin was optimistic. "I always assume I'm on a hit," he says.

"I wouldn't do a show that I didn't think was good, because it's dangerous. The main thing that we have is our taste, and if we go against our taste, that we're committing artistic suicide."

"I'll do movies or movies of the week that I don't

think are that good," he adds.

"But I'm very careful about not doing a regular part in a series that's not that good. You don't want to be stuck in something that you hate. A lot of times people go, 'Well, I had no choice.' But you always have a choice."

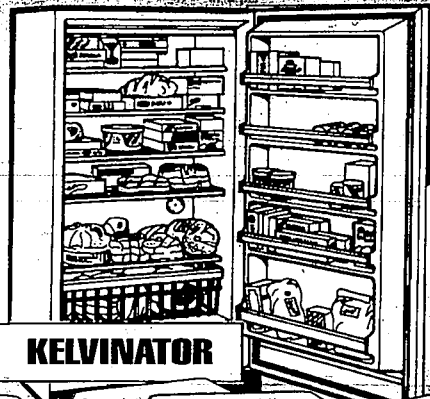
