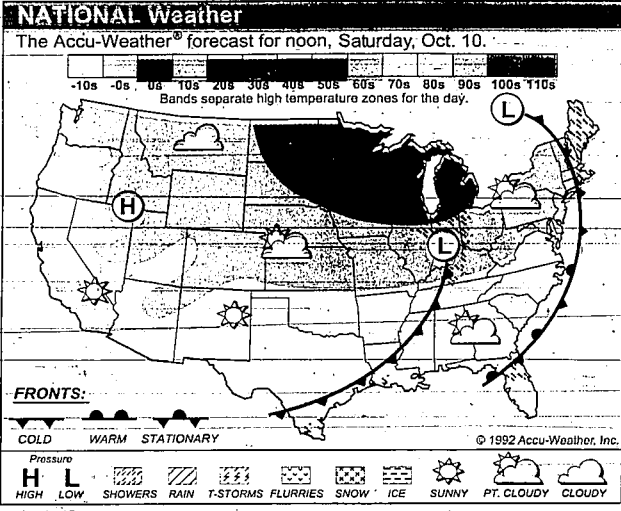

Weather summary
The National Weather Service says high pressure moved into Idaho Friday, bringing clear skies but brisk winds.
With the surface high pressure moving into Idaho, windy conditions were reported in the Snake River valley. Wind speeds were averaging 10 to 20 mph with gusts at Mountain Home Air Force Base to 23 mph.
The wind also kept a cool edge on temperatures which moderated slightly, climbing above Thursday readings by a few degrees.
There were no reports of precipitation although a few clouds remained over northern Idaho.
The warmest temperature in the state Friday was 70 degrees at Riggin's and Payette. Stanley reported the coldest at 22 degrees.
Elsewhere in the nation Friday, the highest temperature was 100 degrees at Imperial, Calif. The lowest was 16 degrees at Gallup, N.M.

Heavy rain produces flooding in South Carolina

Rain extended along much of the East Coast states Friday, causing flooding in South Carolina while snow fell in northern Wyoming.
At midday, showers and thunderstorms extended from central New England across the lower Great Lakes and into Virginia. Rain was scattered along the coast of the Carolinas and over the upper Great Lakes.
Seven to 16 inches of rain late Thursday and early Friday caused flooding in southern South Carolina. A freight train derailed where tracks had been washed out and two people died when their car plunged into a washout on a rural highway. Dozens of people fled flooded homes.
A row the lower Sancti River was expected to crest about 4 feet above flood stage Sunday at Blair, S.C., the National Weather Service said.
Several people also were evacuated from homes in Swainsboro, Ga., and a 2-week-old baby was swept from its mother's arms near Millen, Ga.

The taxes reviewed included income, property, Social Security, unemployment compensation and franchise, as well as a sample of other levies such as gross receipts and inventory taxes.
Detroit and Grand Rapids, Mich., ranked highest. Montgomery, Ala., and Manchester, N.H. had the lowest total tax burden.
The five hypothetical businesses, federal taxes accounted for between 41.5 percent and 81.5 percent of their total tax bill. State taxes accounted for between 11.3 percent and 17 percent, and local taxes accounted for between 22.5 to 41.3 percent.
Boise's relatively high ranking came as something of a surprise, said NFIB spokesman Terry Hill.
"You would normally assume that a city that's not in a major metropolitan area would have a lower tax base," Hill said. "When you look at Boise being ahead of cities like Newark, Atlanta and Chicago, you figure those cities are paying for a decaying infrastructure. So something in Boise is pushing the tax rate up."

That something, says NFIB Idaho director Pete Skammer, is the large number of overlapping tax districts in Ada County and the rest of Idaho.
Many analysts blame the proliferation of taxing districts on the 1978 1 percent initiative, which limited the budgets of only those districts that voted when the initiative was approved.
"A business could fall into a number of overlapping tax districts - cemetery districts, the auditorium district, irrigation districts, mosquito abatement districts," Skammer said.
"A few blocks away, a comparable business can be in a completely different set of taxing districts and have a completely different tax liability."
That means that a Boise business' tax bill depends a lot on where in the city it's located, Skammer said. He added, though, that the NFIB's findings sounded about right for the downtown area he chose for the study.

usually sweep for mines, then the American expert does the disposal work. Among 5,000 Americans living in Kuwait, about 200 work in ordinance clearing but only about 20 in the demilitarized zone.
Richard A. Boucher, the U.S. State Department spokesman, said in Washington that the United States had demanded Hall's release. U.S. Ambassador to Kuwait Edward W. Gnehm said the embassy also was working through diplomatic channels to try to secure Hall's freedom.
At the United Nations, Iraq's U.N. ambassador sought to ease tensions with the United States. Nizar Hamdoun told reporters Hall "is safe and in good health," and he said he hopes the incident will not turn into a major crisis.
Hamdoun said he had no instructions yet from his government about Hall's detention. But he added that he hoped "things could be resolved through diplomatic means rather than to get into any situation whereby a crisis may emerge."

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Classified documents disappear

Materials from Reagan interview on Iran-Contra scandal lost

WASHINGTON (AP) — Prosecutors Lawrence Walsh questioned Ronald Reagan last summer in California about a possible cover-up in the Iran-Contra scandal, and highly classified documents used in interrogating, the ex-president disappeared after the interview, sources said Friday.

The FBI is trying to recover the material, which Walsh aide packed in a suitcase and checked at curbside with an airline at Los Angeles International Airport, said sources who spoke on condition of anonymity.

When the aide tried to retrieve the suitcase after the flight to Dulles International Airport outside Washington, it couldn't be found. Some of the lost material is categorized at

the "code word" level, the most sensitive classification that can be put on government documents.

Walsh and his aides had flown to California to accommodate the former president, who didn't want to come to Washington to be questioned, the sources said.

Reagan gave videotaped testimony in 1990 as a defense witness in the trial of ex-national security adviser John Poindexter. But until this summer, Reagan had never been questioned about his own role in a possible cover-up.

Mary Belcher, a Walsh spokeswoman, said she believes the suitcase containing the classified documents was stolen, but declined to elaborate. Reagan's lawyer, Theodore Olson, declined immedi-

ate comment. Both refused to confirm that Reagan had been interviewed.

An Aug. 14 Justice Department letter accused Walsh's office of a "flagrant violation" of security rules and of taking two weeks to report the missing suitcase. Two sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, confirmed the contents of the letter.

Knightrider Newspapers first revealed the letter's existence in Friday editions, saying a Bush administration source provided it in hopes of embarrassing Walsh.

Walsh brought his nearly six-year investigation to a close Sept. 17, but has three pending court cases — the trials of former Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger and former CIA official Duane Clarridge, plus the

re-trial of former CIA spy master Clair George.

The Reagan questioning, previously undisclosed, occurred after Walsh told Congress in June that he was investigating whether "officials at the highest level of government" covered up their knowledge of the 1985 Iran arms shipments.

As the Iran-Contra scandal erupted in November 1986, Reagan's aides feared shipments of TOW and Hawk missiles the previous year had violated the Arms Export Control Act. Some of the aides — particularly Attorney General Edwin Meese — stated publicly about the president hadn't known about the 1985 deliveries.

It could not be learned what Reagan was questioned about.

Prosecutors to seek new Weinberger indictment

WASHINGTON (AP) — Iran-Contra prosecutors said Friday they will seek a new indictment against former Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger to broaden charges he took part in a Reagan administration cover-up.

The aim is to use information supporting an obstruction-of-Congress charge that was thrown out by federal Judge Thomas Hogan last month, said prosecutor Craig Gillen.

Gillen and defense lawyer Robert Bennett had a testy exchange during a discussion in Hogan's court about maneuvering in preparation for the Jan. 5 trial.

"I won't respond to his nasty remark," said Gillen, who also announced he is stepping aside and will be replaced within a week by someone else who will try the case.

Gillen might have been disqualified anyway because the defense may call him as a witness to testify about an FBI interview with Weinberger he attended in 1990 at which the former Pentagon chief allegedly made false statements.

Weinberger, defense secretary for seven years, is the highest-ranking Reagan administration official indicted in the Iran-Contra case.

If convicted, he faces a maximum five-year prison sentence and a \$250,000 fine for each of the remaining four counts of the indictment.

Weinberger is charged with lying to Congress by denying knowledge of a \$25 million Saudi contribution to the Contras, Nicaraguan anti-communist rebels and a 1985 arms

shipment to Iran. He also is accused of lying to FBI agents in 1990, when he denied taking extensive notes at White House meetings.

Hogan on Sept. 30 dealt a blow to independent counsel Lawrence Walsh and his prosecution team by dismissing an important obstruction-of-Congress charge against Weinberger.

The judge left intact four other charges that Weinberger lied to Congress and prosecutors about the Iran-Contra affair.

L.A. refinery smolders after hydro explosion

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Escaping gas continued burning Friday at a smoldering Texaco refinery where an explosion fell 15 miles away rocked the harbor area, shattered windows and chased hundreds of people from homes.

"My first impression was it was like an earthquake," said resident Elvira Jimenez, who was awakened by the blast and fled her home.

In Illinois, a gas pipeline exploded Friday and killed one of 30 people working in the area.

Sixteen Los Angeles refinery workers were hurt slightly but there were no deaths.

By the end of the trading day, it had fallen by \$2.12 per share to \$60.25. The news of the explosion also drove crude oil and product futures higher on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

The fire that followed the blast was being allowed to burn itself out.

"They are letting off residual gas and there is a flame. They can't tell us how long it will take to burn off. If we put it out, there could be another explosion," said city fire spokesman Paul Guierrez.

The explosion damaged several buildings at the 350-acre refinery.

The blast sent sheets of flame skyward and clouds of black smoke rose over the harbor area 20 miles south of downtown. Residents within two miles were evacuated to shelters for about five hours.

At Elwin, Ill., a pipeline exploded while it was being moved to make way for highway expansion, said John Barnett, a spokesman for his owner, Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line Co.

Barnett, speaking from Eastern Panhandle headquarters in Houston, said company workers had uncovered about 100 feet of the pipe when it ruptured. The cause of the accident was unknown, he said.

The cause of Thursday night's blast in a hydrogen processing unit at the 100,000 barrel-a-day refinery wasn't determined, said Texaco spokeswoman Kelly McAndrew. No damage figure was available.

The units are used in the manufacture of gasoline and diesel fuel.

The refinery, the second largest of Texaco's four domestic refineries was expected to be shut down indefinitely. "Until we find out what the damage is, we won't know," said Mrs. McAndrew.

Senate probes possible collusion in loan cover-up

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Intelligence Committee is investigating whether the Justice Department colluded with the CIA to hide information about illegal loans to Iraq, the panel's chairman said Friday as he convened a second day of secret hearings.

Sen. David Boren, D-Okla., summoned the head of the Justice Department's Fraud Section, Lawrence Urgenston, to testify behind closed doors regarding his dealings with the CIA in the case.

On Thursday, Boren's committee heard testimony from officials of the Central Intelligence Agency.

"We have far more questions than we have answers," Boren said at the start of the hearings, which were hurriedly and unexpectedly convened before the Senate adjourned for the year. He said the panel had voted Thursday

to issue subpoenas, if necessary, so that could continue the probe.

The investigation was focusing on CIA letters sent last month to the Justice Department and the U.S. attorney in Atlanta, he said. In the letters, the CIA provided misleading information about its knowledge of an Italian bank's role in illegal loans to Iraq.

The CIA subsequently admitted the information was incorrect.

The \$5.5 billion loans, guaranteed in part by the U.S. government, were provided by the Atlanta branch of the Italian government's Banca Nazionale del Lavoro.

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U.S. to credit Russia for food

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department announced Friday that it will guarantee \$525 million in sales to Russia of U.S. pork, poultry and grains by the boatload.

USDA also announced details of \$134 million in food aid to Russia, which will also include high-value products such as pork and baby food.

Friday's announcement marks the first time Russia has used its credit guarantees to buy pork, a sale sought by the industry for months.

Ann M. Veneman, deputy secretary of agriculture, said Russia would use U.S. credits to purchase \$30 million of pork, about 23,000 metric tons or 330,000 hogs.

The Agriculture Department guarantees the credit for the pork sales. A separate export subsidy program, the Export Enhancement Program, will give Russia a price break.

Veneman said the two programs "will allow an otherwise competitive U.S. industry to fight unfair competition and gain a foothold in Russia, a potentially vast market."

Senator undergoes heart valve surgery

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — U.S. Sen. Terry Sanford was in stable condition Friday after a four-hour operation to replace an infected heart valve with one from a pig, doctors said.

"The surgery was uncomplicated," said William Green, a longtime Sanford aide. "The doctors are very pleased with his progress."

Sanford, 75, had a bacterial infection of his heart valve. He was treated with antibiotics this summer but the infection persisted, forcing replacement of the valve.

There was no immediate word on how long Sanford, a former president of Duke University, would remain at Duke Medical Center.

Vietnamese official meets U.S. officials

WASHINGTON — The State Department disclosed Friday that Vietnam's foreign minister had an unannounced meeting Thursday with top administration officials to discuss prospects for establishing normal relations.

Foreign Minister Nguyen Manh Cam conferred with Acting Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger and Defense Secretary Dick Cheney.

State Department spokesman Richard Boucher had no comment as to why the meeting was not announced except to say, "We felt it was better to keep it private for a little bit."

Cam has been in the United States to attend the U.N. General Assembly.

Bush makes Veterans Day proclamation

WASHINGTON — In a Veterans Day proclamation, President Bush on Friday asked the nation to renew its pledge "to obtain the fullest possible accounting" of the fate of prisoners of war and members of the military-missing-in-action.

"Let us remember throughout the year that our freedom — and that of millions of people around the globe — would not be possible without our veterans' service and sacrifice," said the president, declaring Nov. 11 to be Veterans Day.

Bush noted Veterans Day is dedicated to all who served in their country's uniform but "during the 50th anniversary of World War II we remember especially those who helped to defeat the expansionist aims of Nazi Germany and Imperial Japan."

The holiday was originally known as Armistice Day because it commemorates the signing of the peace treaty ending World War I on Nov. 11, 1918.

FAA orders inspection of 747 fuse pins

SEATTLE — The Federal Aviation Administration Friday widened the call for inspection of 747 engine-mount fasteners, and ordered airlines to inspect both new- and old-style fuse pins on a regular basis.

The FAA warned that the fuse pins used on more than 700 of the 930 Boeing 747 jumbo jets flying could crack and result in the engines falling off.

The agency ordered continual inspections, repeated as frequently as every several months, for 747-100s, 747-200s, 747-300s and 747-400s equipped with Pratt & Whitney or Rolls-Royce engines.

The order does not cover 747s with General Electric engines.

Protesters block gates to nuclear test site

LAS VEGAS — Anti-nuclear activists blocked traffic into the Nevada Test Site briefly Friday, chaining themselves to gates leading to the remote desert site.

Energy Department spokesman Jim Boyer said the protesters blocked the Mercury road, the main entrance to the sprawling test site, for about 10 minutes before being arrested and removed.

A total of 111 arrests were reported Thursday evening and Friday morning. Those arrested were transported 54 miles to Beauty, Nev. The activists were cited on misdemeanor trespass charges, then released, Boyer said. Many were arrested a second time Friday morning, according to Boyer.

The protest is part of a project called Walk Across America, and includes activists from the United States, Belgium, Canada, and England.

Clinton: Bush attack hatched by right-wingers

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Bill Clinton on Friday dismissed President Bush's criticism of his anti-war efforts two decades ago as a political ploy hatched by "extreme right wingers."

Bush said he wasn't questioning Clinton's patriotism, just his judgment.

The Democratic nominee, who spent most of the day cloistered with top aides preparing for Sunday's debate, pointed to published reports that said Bush's latest line of attack was designed at an Oval Office meeting.

Clinton rejected Bush's contention that he was expressing what was "in my heart" when he made a campaign issue of the Democrat's anti-Vietnam War activities and 1969 trip to Moscow.

"It is now obvious... Far from speaking from his heart, he was speaking from a prescribed political strategy cooked up in the White House by Robert Dornan and other extreme right-wingers," Clinton said, referring to a conservative California congressman.

"He turned the Republican convention over to the far right for two days; now he's apparently going to turn his campaign over to that," Clinton said. "It's very sad."

Clinton and his aides prepared for Sunday's debate in St. Louis at a Kansas City hotel, going over potential questions and holding mock debates — complete with stand-ins for Bush and Ross Perot.

In a television interview earlier Friday, Bush again expressed concern about Clinton's role in anti-war protests while studying at Oxford University in England.

"I just don't think it's right to demonstrate on foreign soil or mobilize demonstrations. I believe that's the word he used, against your country's policies from foreign soil," Bush said, appearing on ABC's "Good Morning America."

"I think it's a question of judgment and character, not a question of patriotism," Bush said.

Clinton, in turn, said, "I was against the policy of the government, not against my country."

Leading in the polls, Clinton brushed off the impact of the Republican assault, calling it "a last ditch bid to get the election off the economy."

"The issue for most Americans is what are we going to do the day after the election," Clinton said. "And it's not surprising that Mr. Bush doesn't want to talk about that because of his record and because he hasn't had any proposals until the eleventh hour."

In his ABC interview, Bush said he was satisfied with Clinton's explanation of student travels to Moscow two decades ago if his Democratic rival had been truthful.

Responding to charges that he's stooped to "McCarthyism" by questioning Clinton's patriotism, Bush complained: "When I say what's in my heart about how I think decisions impact on the job of the United States, the press and others on the left jump up and get all over me."

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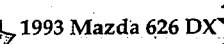
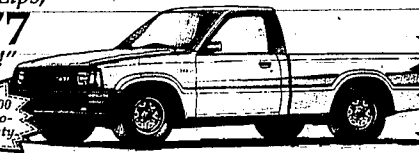

Serbs
renew
purges

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Rebel Serbs are conducting a new round of ethnic purges in northern Bosnia, and many near-starving residents of the besieged capital are barely surviving on handouts, U.N. officials said Friday.

At the United Nations, the Security Council voted Friday to impose a "no-fly" zone over Bosnia to halt attacks by Serbian warplanes. However, the world body rejected aerial patrols and shoot-down orders to enforce the zone.

With winter approaching, the push to bring food and water to Sarajevo took on added urgency. For a second day, U.N. troops escorted utility crews trying to restore electricity and desperately needed water service.

But bad weather hampered the week-old international airlift of food. Only four flights were able to land in Sarajevo on Thursday, a fraction of what is necessary to stave off starvation and sickness.

"The people are living in miserable conditions," said Mik Magnusson, the spokesman for the U.N. peacekeepers in Sarajevo. "You have no heating. Food is extremely limited now."

"Many people clearly have nothing and are living on the handouts from neighbors, maybe a bit of sugar," he said. "There is no running water and no toilet facilities and no electricity," he said.

More than 14,000 people have been killed in Bosnia since Serbs rebelled against a vote in February by majority Muslims and Croats to secede from Serbian-dominated Yugoslavia.

The Serbs are trying to carve out their own republic within Bosnia, possibly as a prelude to uniting with Serbia.

The Muslim-led government in Sarajevo wants to preserve a single state with decentralized authority. Croats, while nominally accepting the Muslim-led government, also seek greater autonomy.

Although the three warring groups have been accused of purging areas they control of other ethnic groups, the international community has blamed the Serbs the most for creating concentration camps and committing atrocities.

U.N. to send 1
of largest teams
to inspect Iraq

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — The United Nations will send one of its largest teams of weapons inspectors to Baghdad next week to continue dismantling Saddam Hussein's arsenal, officials said Friday.

Gulf-based diplomats are speculating that the United Nations is sending a larger team than usual to test Iraq's renewed assurances of Iraq's operation under terms of the Gulf War cease-fire.

The world body refused Iraq's request to delay the latest mission so its trip did not coincide with the U.S. presidential campaign, said Kevin St. Louis, the chief U.N. field officer in Iraq.

He said Iraq's foreign minister, Mohammed Saeed al-Sahaf, made the request in a letter to Rolf Ekeus, chairman of the U.N. commission overseeing the elimination of Iraq's nuclear weapons program and its arsenal of chemical weapons and long-range missiles.

But Ekeus turned the Iraqis down and said the new team would go to Baghdad next Friday as scheduled, St. Louis said.

Doing England, the inspectors' Bahrain-based chief, said the 49-member group will be led by Nikita Smidovich, the Russian who headed a team that went to Iraq in August. It will be made up primarily of ballistic experts, but may include experts in other fields as well, England said.

120 people may have
died in El Al crash

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands (AP) — Dutch officials said Friday that up to 120 people are believed to have died when an El Al cargo jet crashed into a suburban apartment complex.

The estimate was much lower than the figure of 250 given after last Sunday's crash. Friday's figure was based on updated police lists of people believed missing in addition to the 51 bodies recovered from the site of the air disaster.

However, Mayor Ed van Thijn said the death toll figure may never be precisely ascertained.

Officials have had trouble identifying all the victims because the flying height and impact of the plane is believed to have incinerated or even vaporized bodies.

The exact cause of the crash still is not known.

LaRocco, Crapo lead races, poll shows

NAMPA — Voters are on the way to breaking up Idaho's all-Democratic delegation in the U.S. House of Representatives only two years after electing it, according to a new poll released Friday. The random telephone survey of 299 likely voters in Idaho's 1st Congressional District and 315 in the 2nd District, conducted for Nampa's KIVI-TV by the firm of Rich, Smith & Rich in Boise, showed Democratic Rep. Larry LaRocco and Republican Michael Crapo winning their respective races.

The poll found LaRocco leading Republican challenger Rachel Gilbert 58 percent to 32 percent with 12 percent undecided. Crapo was leading Democratic State Auditor J.D. Williams 49 percent to 28 percent with 23 percent undecided. Each survey had a 5.7 percentage-point margin of error.

Poll: Voters oppose casino gambling

NAMPA (AP) — Idaho voters are overwhelmingly opposed to casino-type gambling in the state, according to a new statewide poll released on Friday.

But there remains some question about their feeling toward a proposed constitutional amendment to ban casino-style games on their reservations under provisions of a four-year-old federal law. The telephone poll, conducted for KIVI-TV of Nampa by the Boise firm of Rich, Smith & Rich, found that 59 percent of the 604 randomly selected, but likely, voters opposed casino gambling in the state. Only 34 percent supported it with 7 percent undecided. The margin of error was 4 percentage points in the survey conducted Sept. 30 through Oct. 3.

Spokesmen for the Indian tribes in question were not disheartened by the latest poll results, and they suggested the figures are consistent with their own and reinforce their plans for reservation gambling.

Home continues ban on admissions

BOISE — A ban on admissions continues at the state's largest nursing home, four months after a state inspection turned up a shortage of workers. Capital Care Center in Boise is a 216-bed home that currently serves 185 patients.

"We had continued to receive complaints about care from residents and families," said Jean Schonover, chief of Idaho's Bureau of Facility Standards.

Cynthia Mintun, Capital executive director, said she was surprised the nursing home still was having licensing troubles. "I want to send a real clean message that we have a real good staff," she said. "We just want to use this as an educational opportunity to do better."

Snake River Birds of Prey Bill dies

BOISE — The bipartisan effort of Republican Sen. Larry Craig and Democratic Congressman Larry LaRocco to provide permanent protection for the Snake River Birds of Prey area south of Boise died Friday when Congress shut down operations for 1992.

Spokesman for both lawmakers said the compromise bill that had cleared the Senate two days earlier was blocked to the end by some congressman from other states. But both Craig and LaRocco have agreed to offer the bill again next year in the new Congress.

Vandals steal clapper from bell replica

BOISE — Vandals have stolen the clapper from the replica of the Liberty Bell that has been displayed in front of the Idaho State Capitol since 1950.

Dan Jullion of the Division of Public Works says a member of the Capitol complex security force heard the bell clang just after midnight last Sunday morning — something not unusual. But when the officer went to check, the two-foot-long, 15-pound cast iron clapper was missing. Jullion said it could be extremely difficult to reproduce a clapper that would provide the same tone, although the specifications have been ordered from Washington, D.C.

Atlanta knuckles under, 3-2

PITTSBURGH — The Pittsburgh Pirates were asleep, now they feel like they're dreaming. That's what a visit to the Wakefield of Dreams will do for you.

Rookie knuckleballer Tim Wakefield supplied a wake-up call and Andy Van Slyke answered it, finally delivering a huge hit and even bigger RBI as the Pirates fought off almost sure elimination with a 3-2 victory over Atlanta Friday night in Game 3 of the National League playoffs.

"He was having a lot of fun, and we were just along for the ride," Van Slyke said of Wakefield. "Some rookie, huh?"

The Pirates had been shut out at home for 31 straight postseason innings by Atlanta, and even manager Jim Leyland all but admitted the series was over if they didn't win this one. The pressure on Wakefield — who had pitched only 13 games in the majors — was huge.

So was his performance.

"It's exciting to finally have a dream come true," Wakefield said.

The first rookie in nine years to start an NL playoff game, Wakefield pitched a five-hitter for the first complete game by a Pirate since Bert Blyleven against Cincinnati in the series clincher in 1979. That was the last time Pittsburgh made it to the World Series.

Until Wakefield's remarkable performance, the Pirates didn't even look like they'd make it to Game 5 of this series. Now, they've not only proved they could score against Atlanta at home in the postseason, but also that they could win.

"I'm not one to show a lot of emotion, but this was very special to me," Wakefield said. "For the manager to show so much confidence in me to pitch me in Game 3 of the playoffs... it was very exciting. If I had any poise, it was the confidence I have in myself."

The Pirates, who stopped their scoreless streak on Don Slaught's solo homer in the fifth, will ask ace Doug Drabek to tie the

Pirates' chief warns of crisis over finances

PITTSBURGH — Baseball needs a drastic financial fix in the next two years to rescue the 18 or 19 franchises that are losing money, Pittsburgh Pirates president Mark Sauer says.

What that drastic move be a 1993 spring training lockout — the second such shutdown of baseball in four years and one aimed at stopping the incredible upswing in player salaries?

"Sauer, like most baseball executives, won't speculate, perhaps fearing that prematurely tipping ownership's strategic hand might give the players time to develop a counter strategy. But Sauer said baseball's finances need fixing — and not in 1997 or 1998 or 2000, but now.

"If you're in baseball and you're not concerned about the potential plight of the whole sport, you've been brain dead," Sauer said.

Sauer's Pirates are the perfect example of a smaller-market team that needs a dramatic reshifting of revenues and expenditures if it's not to risk jeopardizing its future.

The Pirates have won three straight National League East pennants, set franchise-attendance records in 1990 and 1991, sold well over 2 million tickets — a figure once considered unreachable in Pittsburgh — yet will lose an estimated \$8 million to \$10 million this year.

The answer won't come from selling more tickets — the Pirates, in a market of \$2 million, may already be near the saturation point — or in raising ticket prices.

Late in the second quarter Carey broke the game wide open with 22 unanswered points that left Shoshone staring down a 28-0 halftime deficit.

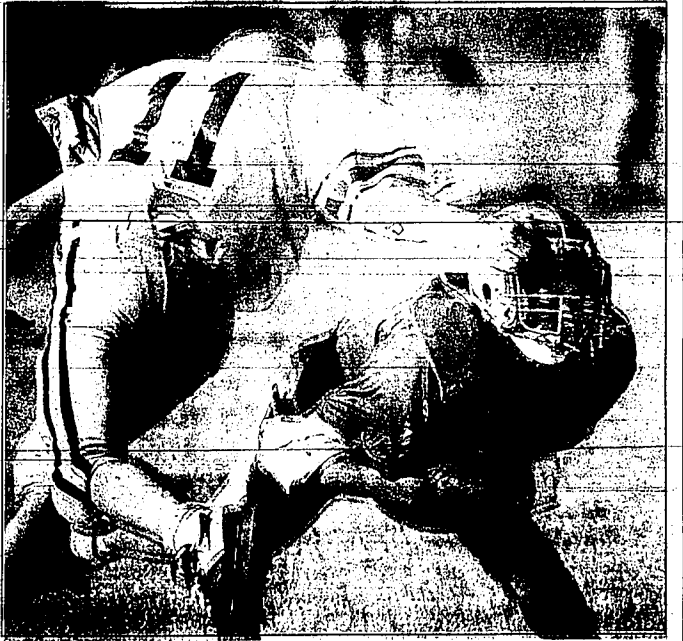
