Americans quiz candidates

Free-flowing debate provides diverse forum

RICHMOND, Va. — President Bush, Bill Clinton and Ross Perot fielded questions from uncommitted voters Thursday in a civilized, issue-rich debate that ranged from taxes to crime and character.



After a brief clash in which Bush renewed his attack on Clinton's anti-war activities in the Vietnam era, the three men were brought up short by a questioner's demand that they focus on the issues and the programs.

They swiftly took his advice, and proceeded to dissect their disagreements over education, health care, the deficit, trade policy and urban woes.

There were few surprises and surely no knockout punches, and little to suggest that the session would boost Bush in his effort to overtake Clinton by Nov. 3.

The 90-minute debate at the University of Richmond was held under unprecedented ground rules in which independent voters asked questions from the audience.

Bush used his closing statement to make a swipe at Clinton's proposed tax hike, and to ask the voters to decide who has the "perseverance, the character, the integrity, the maturity" to handle a crisis in the Oval Office.

Perot stuck to his outsider's appeal, saying that if the American people want to solve their

Students: Perot wins slightly over Clinton

TWIN FALLS — They gave Ross Perot the most debating points, but most members of a panel of Magic Valley high school debaters thought Bill Clinton was the winner of the second presidential debate Thursday night.

The Times-News invited two debaters from each of Twin Falls, Wood River, Jerome and Minico high schools to watch the debate, score it and give their impressions.

Four thought Clinton won, two gave it to Perot, one-rated it a tie between Clinton and Perot and one gave it to Bush.

But judged on points — reasoning, evidence, organization, refutation, cross-examination and presentation — Perot was a narrow winner over Clinton and Bush.

For me, the winning statement was when Perot said, "You can't be a superpower unless you're an economic superpower. If we're not an economic superpower... we will no longer be a force for good throughout the world."

Looking at the debate objectively, Perot won, said Wood River High senior Sam Wileke, a Bush supporter.

"He just answered the questions more directly. Wileke also liked Perot's comment that there's no exact solution and that he'd get people to talk and compromise.

Gritz heats up before core of his supporters

JEROME — While the three major presidential candidates were debating in Richmond, Va., Thursday night, Populist Party candidate James "Bo" Gritz spoke to area supporters at Jerome High School.

The 53-year-old former Green Beret lieutenant colonel rallied about 500 of his troops in the high school auditorium, denouncing the Federal Reserve System and what he described as a conspiracy of the super-rich to destroy the Constitution and create a world government.

To make his point, Gritz told the audience earlier this year when he pulled the slight, gray-haired man out of the cage and nearly pushed him down a flight of stairs, and out of the courtroom because of his outburst.

According to the Associated Press, Gritz and his running mate, Cy Minett, are on the ballot in 16 states besides Idaho, including Montana, Utah and Washington.

"It's a little ironic," he said. "I would have thought the South would be my core of support, because I've been a rebel all my life. But you've got a pioneer spirit out here in the Northwest that's hard to duplicate."

Gritz, who lives in Sandy Valley, Nev., gained national attention earlier this year when he helped negotiate a peaceful end to the standoff involving alleged

Gritz was best known as a flamboyant and controversial searcher for American prisoners of war in southeast Asia.

Before Gritz's speech, Minett described for the crowd the nature of the conspiracy he and Gritz believe is ruining the United States.

The conspiracy, Minett said, dates back to the founding of the Bavarian Illuminati in 1776, and continues today through such groups as the Council on Foreign Relations, the Trilateral Commission, the Bilderberg Group, and especially the Federal Reserve.

The Fed, Minett charged, is gradually bankrupting the United States by charging the government

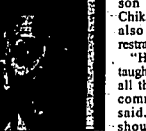
Russian killer sentenced to death

ROSTOV-ON-DON, Russia — For Lydia Khorobova, the death sentence handed down to the world's bloodiest serial killer was not enough.

"Give him to us! Let us have him!" she screamed on Thursday as a judge sentenced Andrei Chikatilo for murdering 52 children and women in a series of cannibalistic sex crimes.

Ms. Khorobova's 10-year-old son was one of the former schoolteacher's victims.

The 56-year-old grandfather — dubbed the "Forest Strip Killer" for the place where he dumped the bodies — was convicted Wednesday of killing and mutilating 52 boys, girls and women

between 1978 and 1990. Some of the victims were dismembered while they were still alive.

Court-appointed psychiatrists had certified Chikatilo as sane.

He kicked a wooden bench in his steel courtroom cage as the sentence was read in the court in this southern Russian city.

"Con man! Swindler!" Chikatilo yelled at Judge Leonid Akubzhanov.

Survivor found in quake rubble

CAIRO, Egypt — Rescue teams pulled a survivor of Egypt's killer earthquake from the rubble of a high-rise apartment building late Thursday, 82 hours after the tremor whose death toll has topped 500.

Rescuers, who found Akasm, Sayed Ismail pinned under the shattered building, also found the dead bodies of his Italian wife and 4-year-old daughter Samira, the official Middle East News Agency reported.

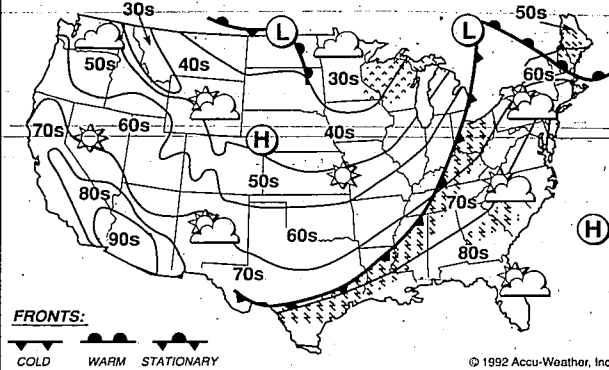

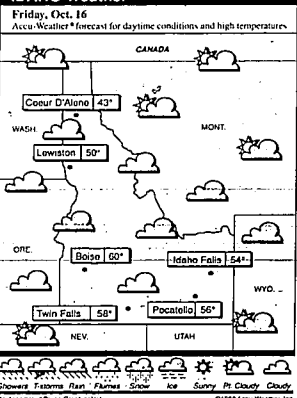

N.Y. shooting spree leaves 5 dead
 WATKINS GLEN, N.Y. — A gunman with a history of failing to make child support payments killed four workers in a county office Thursday, then told deputies he had accomplished his goal and took his own life, authorities said.

John T. Miller, 50, of North Ridgeville, Ohio, had a history of arrests in Schuyler County for non-payment of child support dating back to 1970, police said. It was unclear how much Miller owed in support payments for the now-grown child.

The killings took place in the county Department of Social Services's Support Collection Unit.

Miller had apparently been in the office Wednesday and talked to one of the victims, but police did not know if there had been a confrontation.

 interest on the national debt far in excess of what it could ever pay.

"The money issue is the most important issue in this campaign, and I believe this campaign is the most important campaign in the history of the world," he said.

Minetti also lambasted President Bush for allegedly capitulating to the United Nations, noting that he sought authorization from the UN Security Council to use military

force against Iraq and proclaimed his allegiance to the principles of the UN Charter.

"That sounds like treason to me!" he shouted. "He took an oath to defend the Constitution of the United States, not the UN Charter."

Gritz brandished a plunger decorated with a red-white-and-blue ribbon, saying it symbolized his campaign's determination to "flush out the human sewage in Washington."

He agreed that his was a long-shot candidacy at best, but added, "I've got the same chance of winning as David had against Goliath, or Washington against King George."

"Besides Bush, Democratic Gov. Bill Clinton of Arkansas, and independent billionaire Ross Perot, the other presidential candidates on Idaho's ballot are Gritz, Libertarian nominee Andre-Marrou, and New Alliance Party candidate Lenora Fulani.

 It juvenile sentencing procedures were used, Larios would spend no time in jail.

Granata rejected McMurray's argument, but admitted that his decision might open the way for appeals.

When he took the stand at his sentencing hearing Wednesday, Larios said he didn't mean to fire the shot that killed Ramos, a 21-year-old Burley resident. Ramos and his friends, as well as Larios' friends, had been involved in a fight earlier that night at the Las Palmas Bar.

Police were called, but made no arrests.

An hour later, Larios and his friends packed into an automobile

and went looking for Ramos. They found him sitting inside his pickup parked near the corner of West Main and Oakley Avenue in Burley.

An argument followed, and Ramos tried to drive away.

He didn't get far.

Larios fired a single shot that went through the back window of Ramos' pickup and into the victim's head.

Although McMurray said that Larios does not remember pulling the trigger of the handgun, Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Howard Smyser said the incident cannot be classified as an accidental shooting.

"This isn't a hunting accident or a case where a gun was dropped onto a floor and discharged," he said.

He said had the case gone to trial on the charge of second-degree

murder, he could have called people to testify who would have stated that Ramos had said that he disliked Larios. That apparently contradicts Larios' statement that he didn't know Ramos until the night the shooting took place.

Granata said Larios was caught up in the "ferny" of the night's events and chose to fire the gun in the direction of the pickup. In earlier statements, Larios said he only meant to frighten Ramos, not kill him.

In Wednesday's hearing, a cousin and uncle of Larios testified that Larios' personality has changed.

Granata said he sympathized with Larios' predicament, but added that he also sympathizes with Ramos' family.

 Egyptian and French rescuers using police dogs and electronic equipment located Ismail, who was given oxygen, water and glucose through a small opening cut through the debris of the 14-story building, the agency said.

Ismail, who suffered a broken leg, said he had heard knocking from a possible survivor nearby, but that the sounds stopped Thursday.

At least 48 people were killed after the building, in the affluent suburb of Heliopolis, collapsed in Monday's quake that registered 5.9 on the Richter scale.

The quake's overall death toll rose to 519 people, with 40 more bodies found Thursday.

Meanwhile in Giza province Thursday, hundreds of people left homeless by the disaster stormed the

provincial governor's office in anger over what they claimed was lack of government assistance.

The villagers from A'yat, who were turned back by police, complained that they had not been given any aid or temporary housing.

They said many in the village, where 23 people died when scores of houses collapsed, were sleeping in the street.

Officials promised to help them. But at the same time, Prime Minister Atef Sedki urged Egyptians not to try and profit from the disaster.

"Leave the new dwellings to the really needy, those with destroyed or uninhabitable homes, not those who don't like their houses and want to change," Sedki said in a televised news conference. "The burden is enormous and the government is

doing all it can."

The earthquake, and hundreds of smaller subsequent aftershocks, have seriously damaged or destroyed more than 500 homes. On Wednesday nine more buildings collapsed in some of Cairo's poorer neighborhoods.

Seismologists expect more tremors for another two to four weeks, which could destroy many of the capital's old dwellings.

problems "and not talk about it, I'm the one person they ought to consider."

Clinton closed by speaking to the voters in the audience rather than looking into the camera. He criticized the Republicans' "trickle-down economics" one final time, then said, "We've got to grow the economy by putting people first, real people like you."

The three men then shook hands and moved into the audience to greet those who had been their questioners.

Early on, the candidates were asked to give their remedies for the huge federal deficit, and Perot said scathingly that neither Republicans nor Democrats were willing to take blame for the nation's huge debt. "Somewhere out there is an extraterrestrial who's doing this to us," he said.

On crime, Clinton said he supported the so-called Brady bill that called for a waiting period for handgun purchasers, and also backed an anti-crime bill that was killed earlier this month in Congress by Republican-led filibuster.

Bush countered that the legislation backed by Clinton wasn't tough

enough. He said he wanted tougher provisions to cut down on court appeals and to strengthen the hand of police officers. He also stressed his support for the death penalty.

It was a presidential debate unlike any other. Rather than standing behind the customary wooden podiums, Bush, Clinton and Perot sat on blue-upholstered, long-legged chairs and paced in front of them. They fielded questions from an audience of 209 independent voters, rather than from journalists. Carole Simpson of ABC-News served as moderator.

Clinton was the leader in all the polls as he, Bush and Perot took up their positions, and Republicans conceded time was growing short for the president to shake up the race for the White House. Perot hoped that he could get a boost from some paid political advertisements, and he shamelessly called attention to the network time slots to come.

The Arkansas governor was quick to take advantage of the format, noting that he had suggested it himself. Over and over, he moved away from his chair and closer to the audience in responding to questions.

Perot came out as feisty as ever, punctuating his points with hand

"He didn't have a solution for everything, but I don't think there is a solution for everything."

But Twin-Falls High School senior Mark McAllister, who said he's undecided about the race, gave the decision narrowly to Clinton over Bush.

"Perot fell on his face," McAllister said. "Horrible."

Bush and Clinton were better at presenting their side of the issues, he said.

"Anyone can give a book report on what should happen," McAllister said. "It's more than saying: it's showing what you can do."

McAllister's classmate Mandy Floyd, a Clinton supporter, thought the Arkansas governor was the clear winner.

"He kind of had a look that made him sound more persuasive," she said. "He actually thought about the things and believed in what he was saying."

Of the eight, only Wood River High senior Jonathan Hopkins picked Bush as the winner.

Bush backed everything up but Clinton's presentation was "polished," said Hopkins, who

supports the president. Substance won't be for Bush over Clinton's presentation, he said.

Minico High senior Jose Gardea, who said he was undecided before the debate, and Jerome High senior Jeremy Agte, who was a Bush supporter, both said Clinton won.

"I'm swayed a little more toward Perot after the debate," Agte said. "I am curious to hear Perot's plans of action in more detail and see what specific implementations he has to offer."

Jerome High senior Julie Piper called it a draw between Clinton and Perot.

Before the debate, six of the debaters said they had already decided on whom they would support — three for Bush, two for Clinton and one for Perot. The debate changed none of their minds.

Of the two undecideds, Gardea said after the debate he was leaning toward Clinton and McAllister said he wouldn't vote for Perot.

"He seems like a good mechanism for change, but not the right guy."

Father kills daughter, then himself

Man was out of work, had history of not paying child support

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An out-of-work actor killed his month-old daughter and shot himself on a deserted beach at sunset after the baby's mother refused to marry him, police said Thursday.

Paul William Force, 30, was pronounced dead at UCLA Medical Center about 10 hours after a woman walking along the beach discovered the baby dead and the father dying late Wednesday afternoon at Will Rogers State Beach, said Lt. Al Moen.

Force, with a gunshot wound to the head, was lying on the sand below Pacific Palisades next to his daughter, Amanda, and a gun. No note was found, Moen said.

An autopsy was scheduled to determine how Amanda died. Investigators believed she was smothered or drowned.

Moen said Force abducted the baby Wednesday afternoon from his girlfriend's home in Park La Brea, a private, gated community of mostly rental properties.

"During the abduction, a gun was seen. A witness saw him leaving her residence and followed him. He abandoned his car and was seen fleeing on foot," Moen said.

Detectors were trying to piece together what happened during the last four hours of Amanda's life.

Police did not immediately interview the mother because "after she identified her baby's body at the coroner's office, she was not in a condition to be interviewed further," Moen said. Police had not released the woman's name.

Before the bodies were found, the mother described Force as an unemployed actor and said he was angry over her refusal to marry him, Moen said.

The Screen Actors Guild confirmed Thursday that a Paul Force was a member, but listed no agent for him. A SAG spokeswoman said she could not release information such as how long Force had been a member or what roles he may have had.

Moen said he didn't believe the couple had any other children and no disturbance calls at their home had been reported.

No drugs were found and Force had a "considerable amount of money on him," Moen said.

Will Rogers is a large public beach, but Moen said it wasn't unusual for it to be deserted on a cool day in October.

FBI director fights back amid investigation

WASHINGTON (AP) — FBI Director William S. Sessions and his allies launched a counterattack Thursday to a Justice Department investigation of allegations that he abused official "perks" and "tried to avoid paying local income taxes."

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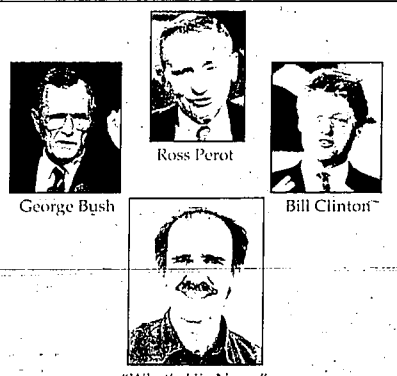

MINNEAPOLIS — This time, Rich Gannon and the Minnesota Vikings didn't wait. And now it looks like the Detroit Lions will have to wait until next year.

Gannon—who rallied the Vikings from a 20-point fourth-period deficit to a 21-20 victory over Chicago in their previous game, quarterbacked them to a 24-0 lead Thursday night and Minnesota beat punchless Detroit 31-14.

The Vikings (5-1), one of the NFL's surprise teams after going 14-18 the last two seasons, took a 1½-game lead in the NFC Central. Defending division champion Detroit (1-5) has lost once more than it did all last season, when it reached the conference title game.

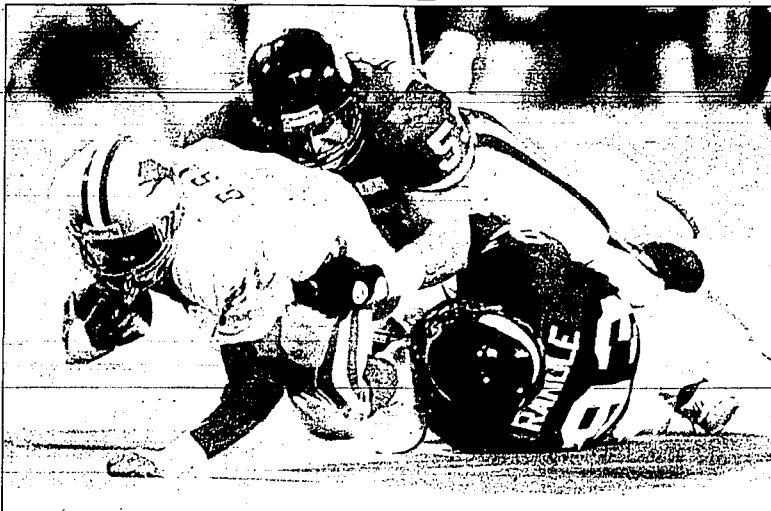
Gannon completed 8 of 10 passes for 146 yards and two touchdowns before leaving early in the second quarter with a hyperextended left knee.

His replacement, Sean Salisbury, struggled before clinching first-year coach Dennis Green's ninth win in 10 games, including four exhibitions, with a 29-yard touchdown pass to Cris Carter 1:26 into the fourth period.

Barry Sanders scored Detroit's first touchdown, but he continued to be bottled up by opponents and by his team's ineffectiveness. Used as a decoy early in the game and virtually ignored while the Lions played catchup late, Sanders rushed 16 times for 52 yards.

Sanders, who averaged 4.9 yards per carry while rushing for 4,322 yards in his

Dousing irks TV announcer

NEW YORK — Tim McCarver says Atlanta Braves outfielder Deion Sanders committed an act of cowardice when he dumped ice water on him three times, and he wants National League president Bill White to do something about it.

Sanders poured the ice water on the CBS announcer after Wednesday night's game, when the Braves beat Pittsburgh 3-2 for the National League pennant. The act was in apparent retaliation for comments McCarver made, criticizing Sanders for playing in an Atlanta Falcons football game Sunday before rejoining his baseball team that night.

"How can he leave in the playoffs and go play in a football game?" McCarver asked during Saturday's telecast. "... The way I look at it, that's just flat wrong and I guess could be construed as a breach of contract."

McCarver said the first time Sanders doused him, he was so shocked he pulled a muscle in the right side of his back. After he was doused a third time while doing interviews, McCarver said he went in search of Sanders in the Braves clubhouse.

"I didn't know what I would do or say, but as I was going toward the middle of the clubhouse, Sanders was creeping up with another tub of water," McCarver said on a conference call Thursday. "He said, 'Where's McCarver,' and I said, 'I'm right here.'"

"He tried to hit me with another tub that missed me, and I said, 'You know, Deion, you're a real man, you are a real man.' I thought it was a deliberate, cowardly act."

McCarver said he would talk the matter over with White, who already has spoken about it with CBS senior vice president Rick Gentile.

The Atlanta Journal quoted officials of the Atlanta CBS affiliate, WAGA, as saying that White asked for copies of a tape shot by a cameraman, showing the final confrontation between McCarver and Sanders.

"I don't know what steps I plan on taking or what steps Bill plans on taking," McCarver said.

Neither team worked out, and only one piece of news emerged: The Blue Jays said Jack Morris, as expected, would start Game 1 Saturday night in Atlanta.

Two hours after the Blue Jays beat

Oakland 9-2 Wednesday to win the AL playoffs, Morris was pitching in the secluded bullpen at the SkyDome, already tuning up for his next assignment, Morris was the MVP of the World Series last October, winning it with a 14-inning shutout against Atlanta in Game 7, and the Braves have not yet decided who will oppose him this time.

Toronto's triumph meant the World Series would move out of the United States for the first time. Manager Cito

Gaston and pitching coach Galen Cisco showed at the SkyDome briefly and talked about whether to add Jimmy Key to the pitching rotation, and they're leaning that way.

The Blue Jays were scheduled to take an early flight Friday to Atlanta, and planned to practice later in the afternoon at Fulton County Stadium.

The ballpark in Atlanta was empty. Braves manager Bobby Cox spent the day

at home, and was said to be resting his hoarse voice after Wednesday night's thrilling, 3-2 victory over Pittsburgh in Game 7.

Atlanta scored three times in the ninth inning, two on pinch-hitter Francisco Cabrera's two-out single. Sid Bream slid home just ahead of the tag, causing a huge pileup of Braves at the plate and pinning the hard-luck loss on Doug Drabek.

No. 3 Vandals will visit No. 16 Eastern Washington Saturday

At Eastern Washington, Idaho will pit the nation's most prolific offense and the conference's most potent scoring attack against the Big Sky's most stingy defense.

The Eagles, second to Idaho in scoring and total offense, lead the league in rushing defense and total defense and are second in scoring defense. But the Vandals are third in that category and have the conference's toughest pass defense.

Last year, when both teams finished in the middle of the Big Sky pack at 4-4, Eastern Washington beat Idaho 34-31 in double overtime at Moscow. The victory snapped a five-game losing skid to the Vandals, but Idaho still leads the series 8-3.

"They have been pretty much the premier team in the Big Sky since we've been in the conference," Eastern Washington coach Dick Zornes said.

U.S. team easily beats New Zealand

ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) — It was a breeze for Fred Couples and Davis Love III, and Tom Kite had a scare as the top-seeded United States beat New Zealand 3-0 on the opening day of Dunhill Cup team competition. Couples and Love both shot 70, despite a stiff breeze that dropped the wind-chill factor to below freezing. Couples' opponent, Frank Nobilo, lost by five strokes and Craig White shot 77 and lost to Love by six.

Kite, who led by seven after 18 holes, hung on to his one-stroke lead going to the 18th where Greg Turner drove out of bounds and ended with a bogey. He shot 73 to Kite's 71.

Couples, the Master champion, said he may have played in conditions as cold and difficult but he couldn't remember when.

"It was freezing out there. Although I love the tournament you can't really play with enjoyment in conditions like that," he said.

All the players wore woolen hats and most had thick gloves. Although it was bright for most of the day, they had to play through rain showers and even a hailstorm.

"It made for high scoring and close games."

Two-time champion Ireland's Padraig Harrington tied with outside South Korea with one game each and the third halved.

But Christy O'Connor Jr., who tied with Park Nam-Sin, called for a ruling after the Korean played a provisional second ball at the 17th, played the wrong one with his second shot and carded the wrong score.

His disqualification gave victory to O'Connor and meant a 2-1 triumph for Ireland. Philip Walton beat Cho Chul-Sang 77-80, but Roman Rafferty lost 72-74 to Choi Sang-Ho.

Greg Norman and Bernhard Langer were head-to-head as

two-time winner Australia met Germany and each shot a 72.

Rodger Davies overpowered Heinz-Peter Thuid by three strokes, shooting a 6-over-par 78, and Ian Baker-Finch, a former British Open champion, scored a 75 yet beat Torsten Gideon by six.

Defending champion Sweden fell behind to France's wingman Jean Van de Velde shot 73 to beat Robert Karlsson by four strokes.

But Per-Ulrik Johansson shot a 75 and beat Thomas Levet by two and Anders Forsbrand's 74 edged Marc Farry by one as Sweden won 2-1.

Jose Maria Olazabal had to get an extra hole to beat Italy's Silvio Grappasonni after both shot 76s.

Miguel Angel Jimenez, replacing Seve Ballesteros on the Spanish team, shot 69 to beat Giuseppe Cali by eight strokes. But Costantino Rocca's 74 was three shots better than Jose Rivero, and that tied the match before Olazabal halved his high-scoring game.

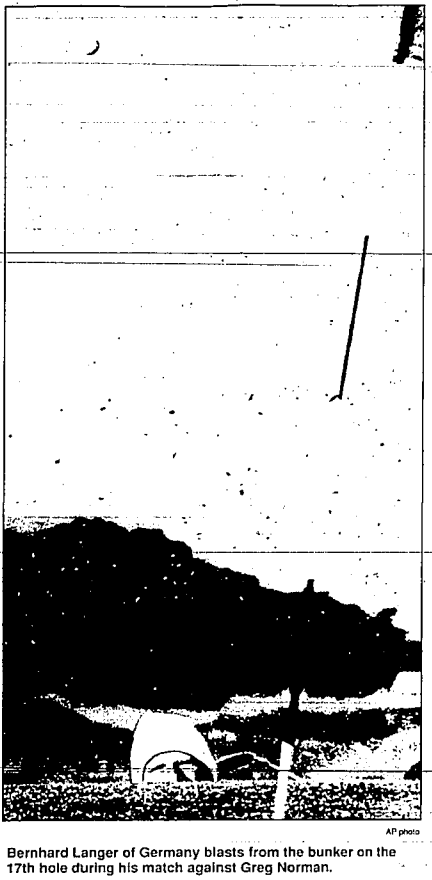
Olazabal birdied the first extra hole and Grappasonni parred it so Spain squeaked by 2-1.

Clip from behind may end career for Bates

IRVING, Texas (AP) — It was probably the 1,000th time Bill Bates had been clipped in his NFL life of living dangerously on special teams. It could have been the last.

"I came down on the kickoff real aggressively just like I had done a trillion times," Bates said. "I got deep downfield then I was pushed from behind by somebody I never saw."

"I've been hit from behind tons of times. But this time it happened just as I was planting my leg."

Bates, the Dallas Cowboys' special teams captain, was in his 10th year when he was injured Sunday against the Seattle Seahawks. It was 10 years more than anyone thought he would play as a free agent out of Tennessee.

The 31-year-old Bates played in 81 consecutive games for Dallas. He's had 608 career tackles for the Cowboys.

He will undergo reconstructive surgery on his left knee Oct. 22. Then he'll have at least nine months of rehabilitation.

"I'm through with mooring over it and now I'm into denial," Bates said. "I was shocked the knee was damaged as much as it was."

"I walked off the field. I told the doctors there was no way that it was as bad as they said it was. I was wrong. It's bad."

Bates will be at the Cowboys' game against Kansas City on Sunday as a spectator on the sidelines.

"I've never done that before," he said. "It will be strange. But maybe I can help by just being down there. I'm willing to volunteer to do what ever the coaches want me to do. I can still help the younger guys."

Bates said he doesn't even want to think about possibly coming back.

"I've got to put that out of my mind right now," he said. "We've got to see how the surgery goes."

The injury will cost Bates about \$170,000. He opted for a split contract that would pay him more money if he remained on the active roster but less if injured.

"Bill had the option of taking a larger salary," Cowboys owner Jerry Jones said. "But instead he took more of a risk in an attempt to make more money."

Bates said he didn't want to talk about the contract and wouldn't reveal whether he had injury insurance.

"Maybe I will later, but I don't want to say anything about it now," he said.

Bates doesn't want to think about anything right now except what happened on Sunday.

"When you play you're always wondering when you'll have your last play," Bates said. "I hope I didn't have mine."

Rookies don't make big impact in NFL

After Art Monk caught his 820th pass to become the NFL's leading career pass-catcher, someone in the press box made a suggestion.

"Why," he asked, "doesn't Joe Gibbs or Desmond Howard catch his first?"

Why not? Because, silly, he's a rookie and rookies just don't play in the NFL this year, particularly on offense, where they can make mistakes.

"Take a quick look."

Despite a draft considered deep in quality players, the only offensive player to have an any immediate impact is the Saints' Vaughn Dunbar, who has gained 344 yards for a 3.9 average in six games.

Dunbar was a drafted day disappointment — expected to go in the Top 10, he slipped to 21st overall. But he was chosen by the perfect team. A hard-running inside-plugger, he went to a team whose offense is built around that kind of player.

But the rest? Figuring in holdouts (Howard, David Klingler, Bob Whitfield), injuries (Johnny Mitchell) and lack of opportunity (Derek Brown, Dave Brown, Tommy Maddox), the impact of rookies on offense is probably less so far this season than it's been in two decades — if not ever.

Example: The best newcomer this year clearly is running back Ricky Walters, turning out to be the next Roger Craig for the San Francisco 49ers. Walters, who leads the NFL in rushing and the NFL in overall yardage, was taken in the second

round a year ago and spent all of last year on injured reserve with a broken foot.

Example: If Boomer Esiason's bruised left forearm keeps him out of Monday night's game with Pittsburgh, Cincinnati coach Dave Shula will start Donald Hollis, a fourth-round pick a year ago rather than Klingler, the sixth player taken in this year's draft.

"David's not ready," Shula says of his top pick, a holdout for all of training camp.

The other quarterback? Maddox saw his first action for Denver at the end of the rout in Washington. But he's active only because he's the team's best holder — Shawn Moore is actually second to John Elway on the depth chart.

Dave Brown, taken by the Giants in the first round of the supplemental draft, was the nominal backup to Jeff Hostetler last week after Phil Simms injured an elbow.

But because he didn't sign until after the exhibition season, he'll probably drop to third string again this week behind Kent Graham, an eighth-round pick who was impressive in the preseason and is coming off injured reserve.

Receivers? The best are Tampa Bay's Courtney Hawkins and Cincinnati's Carl Pickens, who have caught seven and five passes, respectively.

Howard, the Heisman Trophy winner, returned to play in a touchdown against Atlanta — after taking a lateral from Brian Mitchell. But he's barely seen action beyond that.

Cancellation of football hits prep team hard

CENTREVILLE, Mich. (AP) — The sharp October sun slants over the football field at Centreville High School, casting long shadows where the varsity once played.

There seem to be shadows everywhere in this lovely little town. Ever since coach Bob James pulled the plug on the Bulldogs' varsity season.

"It's been a tough three weeks of school. I'll tell you that," James said. "The kids just don't understand."

James, 28, took over the varsity this year, moving up from his assistant's post. But after watching his team get pummeled in the first four games, James decided it was unsafe to go on. He canceled the last five games of the season.

"It was the kids that were hardest to convince," James said. "They didn't understand. But they will later."

Centreville is south of Kalamazoo, near the Indiana border. There is a covered bridge outside of town, and

a small Amish community nearby. The high school has 283 students.

Only 18 players began the varsity season. The roster included three sophomores and two foreign exchange students who never had played American football, and one senior in his first year of football.

James quickly lost three players to knee injuries and one to a non-football injury. He also believes one had a broken arm, but the player wouldn't allow it to be checked.

Down to just 13 players, James combined his junior varsity squad with the varsity for the fourth game, against Constantine, only to lose two sophomores to knee injuries. After a 37-0 pounding, he knew something had to be done.

It's time for a change in Gooding sheriff's office

Gooding County Sheriff Robert Aja lost the game. Now he wants extra innings.

Defeated in last May's Republican primary by Gooding city policeman Jim Jax, he's staging an independent write-in campaign to keep his job in the Nov. 3 general election.

We think Gooding County voters were right five months ago. It's time for a change.

Aja's 12½ years as sheriff have been marked by his strong personality and his determination to do things his way. That's an asset, to a point.

But that point was crossed when Aja — and not crime prevention — became the focus of law enforcement in Gooding County.

The days of the lone-wolf country lawman who takes all the responsibility — and all of the credit — for keeping the peace in his county are gone.

Gooding County needs a sheriff who will work with the city cops in Gooding, Wendell and Hagerman, share information with the public and the media and make citizens partners in their own protection.

Jax, it seems to us, fits that description far better than Aja and the Democratic candidate, John Crandall.

A 51-year-old former high school science teacher, Jax got into law enforcement because he was alarmed at the growth of drug use in the schools. After 10 years as a Gooding County

sheriff's deputy and several more as a Gooding city detective, he has some ideas about stemming the flow of drugs in a county where law enforcement manpower is spread thinly.

He envisions a form of community policing that would involve kids by appointing some of them as junior deputies, getting them together monthly to talk about drug problems and allowing them to occasionally ride with officers in low-risk patrol situations.

More importantly he understands, as a former teacher, that education can be a powerful tool in combating Gooding County's growing drug problem.

It's often difficult to judge what kind of sheriff a candidate will become, but the signs with Jax are encouraging.

He's open, candid and without any particular constituency, and he has links to the community outside of law enforcement.

At 60, Aja is an experienced administrator and a proven investigator, and his ties to Gooding County's fast-growing Hispanic community are a plus that will be tough for Jax to match.

But the sheriff has become the issue, and that's a bad bargain for any county.

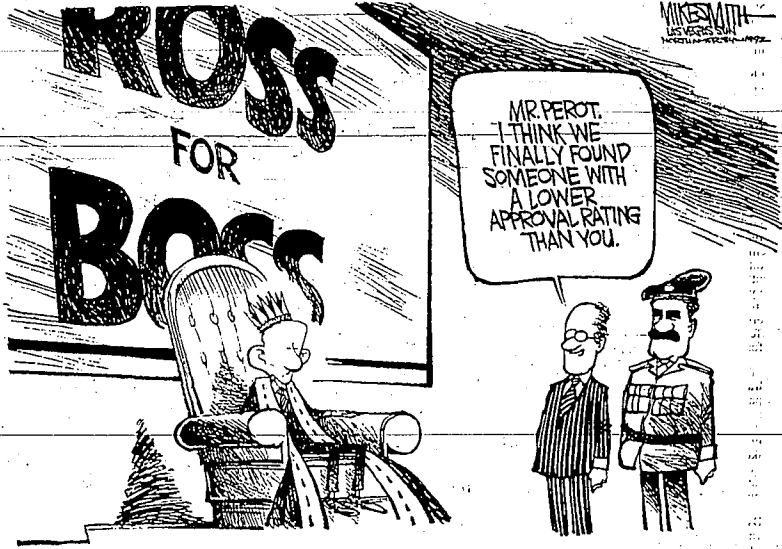
Crandall, a 40-year-old Wendell sheep shearer who wants to crack down on drugs in the county, has little experience in law enforcement and less in leadership, which he says is an important issue in this race.

We agree. That's why we recommend a vote for Jim Jax on Nov. 3.

Clinton's programs would require raid on taxpayers' pocketbooks

Bill Clinton and his minions have worked themselves into a lather over Bush-Quayle ads that show how Clinton's economic plan will raise taxes on working Americans.

True to form, Clinton has dodged the arguments and accused Republicans of dirty tricks. But, as the governor loves to say, that dog won't hunt. The truth is, he will raise your taxes.

Check the fine print of his economic plan. Clinton proposes to raise taxes by \$150 billion. He says that he can raise \$82.9 billion by increasing to 36 percent the income tax rate on the wealthiest taxpayers, hiking the Alternative Minimum Tax and imposing a surtax on millionaires. He claims that he can get the money by taxing only those who make more than \$200,000 a year, "the top 2 percent," in his words.

That's not true, and he knows it. According to figures from the departments of Treasury and Commerce, the top 2 percent includes any individual who earns more than \$64,800.

And Clinton knows that he can grab up only about \$59 billion of the \$83 billion he needs out of that top 2 percent, according to Treasury Department figures.

So Clinton must dig deeper into middle-class pockets, and raise the top rate on every individual who earns more than \$53,400.

But there's more. Clinton pretends he can collect \$45 billion in revenue by taxing the earnings of foreign corporations. That's a joke.

In the last year for which we have figures, foreign corporations in America produced a total of only \$2 billion in taxable income. Congress' Joint Tax Committee charitably assumes that Clinton may be able to raise \$1 billion over four years — leaving Clinton a mere \$44 billion short.

As Clinton well knows, he can cover this shortfall only by raising even more middle-class pocketbooks. Treasury statistics show that Clinton can get his money only by throwing individuals with taxable incomes of \$36,600 and up into his roster of the rich-and-taxable.

The deeper you look into Clinton's plan, the more appalling the deception becomes. He does not fund his health-care plan, for instance. The Congressional Budget Office and the Urban Institute estimate that the governor's health-care proposals would cost about \$200 billion a year.

Even if he slips on a 7 percent payroll tax, he still would run a deficit of \$120 billion a year.

Clinton also has advocated imposing a 1.5 percent tax hike on businesses for worker retraining. That would cost billions more. Looking at this, you can only conclude that Bill Clinton thinks of the economy as a kind of board game, where you can always get money from the taxpayer.

But while Clinton has made no bones about his intention to raise taxes, he has not been forthcoming about who would pay.

As Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., said recently: "Anybody who thinks you can raise taxes only on the rich and get the budget under control is wrong. They haven't looked at the arithmetic. ... Anybody who says they can do that is misleading you."

Look into the details of Bill Clinton's plan, and you'll find that he plans to slam virtually every American who does not qualify for welfare.

To make things worse, he would weigh down our economy at a time when we need all the steam we can get to beat our industrial competitors.

Yet that's just part of the Clinton charade. Bill Clinton also wants to raise federal spending by \$220 billion. I have no doubt that the Democrat-controlled Congress will

rush to spend that money and more.

The real problem arises when Clinton says that he will offset the spending by cutting \$145 billion in other spending.

While his spending hikes are real, his cuts are not. He provides specific cuts totaling only \$4.4 billion — or only 3 percent of the total he needs.

The other "cuts" come from faint wishes — \$10 billion from the non-existent incitem veto, \$16 billion in "administrative reforms" and so on.

Finally comes the crucial matter of his "middle-class tax cut." Once upon a time, Clinton promised a middle-class tax cut, but it has disappeared from his plan.

Look at the tables at the back of his plan. The middle-class tax cut just isn't there.

When you get down to the basics, ...

Clintonomics amounts to higher taxes, more federal spending and increased government regulation of the economy.

I can't imagine an approach more at odds with the times or the needs and mood of the American people. I haven't had anybody ever tell me, "What's wrong with America is that the federal government is not spending enough money and my taxes are too low." But Clinton seems to believe that people think that way.

So if you believe we need more spending and taxes, vote for Bill Clinton. He won't disappoint you.

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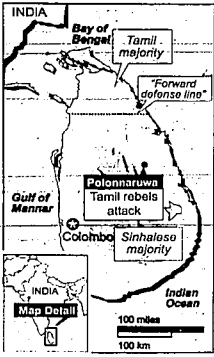

Rebels kill 134 in Sri Lanka

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — Tamil rebels attacked three villages in north-central Sri Lanka today and killed at least 134 people, most of them Muslim civilians, military officials said.

It was the biggest attack on Muslim villagers in Sri Lanka since August 1990, when Tamil Tiger rebels killed more than 300 Muslims in two attacks in the east.

Thirty children were among those killed Thursday in the predawn assaults in Polonnaruwa district, according to officials at the Joint Operations Command in Colombo.

Military officials said government troops had found the bodies of 115 civilians, 23 of them scattered in jungles where they were apparently dumped by the rebels. They said eight soldiers and 11 policemen also

were killed. But a military officer at the site of the massacre said as many as 159 people — 142 civilians and 17 army and police personnel — were killed.

About 100 civilians were injured, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

A policeman in the nearby village of Mediripitiya said his colleagues in the villages reported by radio that the rebels threw grenades, fired automatic weapons and hacked the victims with knives.

Mohamed Azuradeen, a 20-year-old Muslim, said he fled into the jungle when he heard shooting. "I saw the (Tamil) Tigers chasing people in the rice field and shooting them down," he said in a telephone interview.

There was no immediate claim of

responsibility or clear motive for the attack. In the past, Tamil rebels have struck at Muslim villages in areas where the guerrillas want an independent Tamil homeland.

In April, 130 people were killed in two massacres involving Tamils and Muslims in the same region, 100 miles northeast of Colombo.

Today, about 150 guerrillas simultaneously attacked the three villages for an hour, gunning down the victims, officials said.

Several soldiers and policemen stationed in the villages to protect the Muslims were outnumbered, they said.

The rebels were reported to have burned more than 40 mud and straw huts before fleeing when military helicopters flew in reinforcements, officials said.

Hunger striker's death prompts protest

JERUSALEM (AP) — The death of a Palestinian hunger striker sparked Arab-Israeli clashes and the resumption of a hunger strike by prisoners Thursday.

Scattered stone-throwing clashes between Arab youths and Israeli security units were reported in east Jerusalem and the occupied West Bank. Arab merchants closed their shops in a sympathy strike to mourn the inmate's death of an apparent heart attack Wednesday.

In northern Israel, meanwhile, a

farmer was found dead with multiple stab wounds in a field near the city of Afula.

Police said they suspected the man, Shimon Avraham, 38, was attacked by Arabs. An Arabic-language newspaper received an anonymous phone call claiming responsibility for the killing by Islamic Jihad-Palestine, a Muslim fundamentalist group outlawed by Israel. There was no way to confirm the authenticity of the call.

Arab world prefers Bush over Clinton, polls show

DAMASCUS, Syria — Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton may be ahead in the polls, but if the U.S. election were held in the Middle East, President Bush would be the easy winner.

Throughout most of the Arab world, the slide in Bush's political fortunes is being watched with dismay. He is thought to be better informed and more sympathetic to the Arab cause than any U.S. president in decades and likelier to push the Arab-Israeli peace talks to a successful conclusion.

Here in Damascus, the official media have made much of the fact that Clinton has worked hard to garner the votes of U.S. Jews.

In al-Bath, the official paper of President Hafez Assad's ruling party, Clinton was de-

scribed as utterly beholden to the U.S. Jewish lobby. And in a recent edition of The Syria Times, an article titled "American Elections and Mideast Peace" showed Clinton wearing a yarmulke and a slightly sinister expression next to a photograph of Bush with a winning smile on his face.

"Bill Clinton... took the lead in popularity that exceeded Bush's rating due to the former's repeated promises and clear statements to promote strategic ties with Israel and to maintain its military edge over the Arabs!" the article said.

Recent disclosures on the ABC News program "Nightline" concerning Bush's involvement in the Iran-Contra affair were also highlighted here because the information came from an Israeli source. The Syrian media took that as evidence that Israeli wants Clinton to win.

Arabs were troubled with Clinton last spring when he criticized Bush for refusing to grant Israel loan guarantees to absorb Russian immigrants unless Israel stopped building Jewish settlements in the occupied West Bank of the Jordan River.

An Egyptian commentator, Mohammed Sayed Ahmed, writing in the London-based Arabic weekly paper al-Wasat, asserted that the Israeli government of Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin was hoping for a Clinton victory.

"The Democratic Party is closer to Israel and to the Labor Party than the Republicans," he wrote. "In addition, Clinton is not obliged to fulfill what Bush promised during the Gulf crisis. Clinton criticized many aspects of Bush's Middle East policy."

Radioactive leak shuts down Lithuanian reactor

VILNIUS, LITHUANIA (AP) — A radioactive steam leak forced Lithuania's only nuclear power plant to shut down on Thursday, but the nation's nuclear agency said no radiation had seeped into the atmosphere.

In Moscow, the Baltfax news agency quoted the Lithuanian State Atomic Inspection Agency as saying the leak at the Chernobyl-style plant in Ignalina would not harm residents or the environment.

"The steam leaked inside a reactor building, but multiple testing did not indicate a rise in the radiation level outside the plant, Povilas Vainis, the head of the Inspectorate on Nuclear Power Engineering Safety, told ITAR-Tass.

The No. 2 reactor was shut down

about noon (6 a.m. EDT). Baltfax said repairs could take about a week, and electricity to industries in the Baltic nation would be rationed until then.

The No. 1 reactor already was closed for repairs following a gas leak several months ago.

Lithuanian radio and television reported the leak in the No. 2 reactor late Wednesday. But Swedish radio quoted Jan Nistad, a Swedish nuclear engineer in the Lithuanian capital, Vilnius, as saying it was detected nine days ago. Sweden is helping Lithuania to improve safety at the plant.

Hans Edhvald of the Swedish Radiation Protection Institute said the leak apparently occurred in the steam separator, which separates

water from steam that has passed through the reactor. The steam powers turbines that generate electricity.

Ignalina, 56 miles northeast of Vilnius, provides 60 percent of Lithuania's energy needs. The power plant has two Chernobyl-style graphite-moderated reactors of the RBMK type that became operational in 1983 and 1986.

Both reactors are capable of producing 2,500 megawatts of electricity, but they have been operating below full power since the 1986 reactor explosion at Chernobyl, in Ukraine.

That nuclear accident, the world's worst, spread radioactive fallout across the western Soviet Union and much of Europe, killing hundreds.

TWIN FALLS — Nick moved from "Homeland" to Canada, and everyone called him a sgak. It's not a nice word.

This is just a play. It's not real life. But it might as well be, say the College of Southern Idaho students who will perform "New Canadian Kid" next week. These students also say they are learning a lot about prejudice.

"I chose this play partly because of the influx of immigrants into the Magic Valley," said director Laine Steel. "The issue of overcoming language barriers is an interesting one."

The play is about culture shock, as Nick and his mother struggle to find their spots in a new land. Ads for the production ask a question, "How would you like to be called a sgak?" The word represents any obscenity leveled at another person.

"I'm going to bash the sgak with my baseball bat," said Glen Van Sickle, who plays the bully, Mog. During one scene, Mog explains that his father won't let him play ball with sgaks.

Songs about police receive more screening

The legacy of Ice-T's "Cop Killer" song appears to be a recording industry that is moving away from music that talks about violence — at least when police officers are the target.

In the two months since Ice-T agreed to pull "Cop Killer" off his album in the wake of police protests, several acts have edited or dropped songs containing lyrics that talk about violence against law authorities.

* Rap artist Tragedy, after consulting with A&M Records, agreed to remove the song "Bullet" from his upcoming album. The song is a retaliation fantasy about shooting a police officer.

* Juvenile Committee, a rap act on Warner Bros., was asked to re-record a song called "Justice for the Hood" on its upcoming debut album because of a reference to police officers.

"Coffee, Donuts & Death," a song by rap artist Paris that was distributed in industry circles before the Ice-T controversy hit its peak, has gone into creative limbo. A spokeswoman for Tommy Boy Records said it's unclear whether the song will ever be released to the public.

"It's a different world now, isn't it?" said Robert Merlis, spokesman for Warner Bros. Records, whose corporate parent, Warner Inc., was the target of the Ice-T protest.

Police groups are pleased, but some musicians are worried about a chilling effect on free speech.

"Artists have been affected by it and are realizing that it's a threat to what they write and talk about," said Jon Shecter, editor in chief of The Source, a rap-oriented magazine.

The protest against Ice-T drew

Rock pals honor Dylan's 30-year career

NEW YORK — When Bob Dylan released his self-titled debut album 30 years ago, it didn't create much of a stir. It contained just two Dylan originals — "Song for Woody" and "Talkin' New York" — and sold 5,000 copies in its first year.

Not much of a reason to celebrate then, but a pretty good excuse for a bash 30 years later.

Dylan, now 51, will be joined by veteran rock pals Eric Clapton, George Harrison and Neil Young at a Madison Square Garden party today to mark the release of that historic album.

Others scheduled to play at the Dylan tribute include John Mellencamp, Willie Nelson, Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers, and Sinead O'Connor in her first live gig since she tore up a photo of the Pope on "Saturday Night Live."

Latest additions to the show are The Clancy Brothers, whose friendship with Dylan dates back to their early days together in Greenwich Village; Sophie B. Hawkins, who recently covered Dylan's "I Want You"; the O'Jays, who hit with a cover of "Emotionally Yours" last year; and a country-folk trio of Mary-Chapin Carpenter, Rosanne Cash and Shawn Colvin.

No one's confirming these names, but they're good rumors: Billy Joel, Paul Simon, Elvis Costello, Van Morrison, Lou Reed, Tracy Chapman and "Nashville Skyline" pal Johnny Cash.

Most notable among the missing: Bruce Springsteen, who inducted Dylan into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1988, and the surviving members of the Band, Dylan's brilliant backing group of the '60s and '70s — Robbie Robertson, Levon Helm, Garth Hudson and Rick Danko. Richard Manuel committed suicide in 1986.

Dylan remains a draw (as do his friends). Tickets for the show sold out in

70 minutes, a record for the Garden. Dylan's music — from his '60s classics to his '70s conversion to his up and down '80s efforts — will take center stage, although the format is still unclear.

Each artist is expected to perform at least one Dylan tune with an impressive house band headed by guitarist G.E.

Smith, a veteran of several Dylan tours, guitarist Steve Cropper, bassist Duck Dunn, keyboard player Booker T. and drummer Jim Keltner.

There's an outside chance of Petty, Harrison and Dylan getting Jeff Lynne out with them for the first-ever Traveling Wilburys live performance.

There are some very un-Dylan aspects to the show — such as the pay-per-view sales and the outrageous ticket prices. Try \$150 for the top seat. And none of the money is going to charity? Well, Bob, the times ... ah, you know the rest.

Are people angry about the ticket prices? "Uh-huhhhh," acknowledges Barbara Hutson, a spokeswoman for the show. But she defends the high cost of the seats by pointing out top-shelf buyers get four hours of food and drink.

The cheapest seats are \$35. When Dylan was playing Gerde's Folk City in Greenwich Village three decades back, admission was free to see the Hibbing, Minn., native and whoever else showed up for hootenanny night.

As for the pay-per-view, 22 million folks have the chance to drop \$19.95 to bring Bob and company into their living rooms. Dylan's last

appearance on the small screen was shaky at best; his mumbling "Masters of War" during the 1991 Grammys.

In addition, only three hours of the four-hour show will be shown on pay-per-view.

The show will be aired on a tape-delayed basis around the world within 48 hours. There are no plans for a live album or video of the event, said Huston, although the show is presented by Dylan's long-time label, Columbia Records.



Books offer thrills, chills for holiday

The dental bill that can result from weeks of reading scary supplies (read: Halloween) sends chills down the spine of parents everywhere.

Maybe you can trick the kids into cutting their candy collecting short by promising to read them a good ghost story when they return. Fat chance? Well, then keep these books in mind for reading in the dentist's waiting room:

THE WIDOW'S BROOM, by Chris Van Allsburg (Houghton Mifflin Co., \$17.95).

A witch lands in the vegetable garden of the widow Minna Shaw after her broom makes a free fall from the sky. Witches' brooms don't last forever, you know; they wear out just like the kitchen kind. The kindly Minna takes in the witch, who magically heals herself and hitches a ride with a passing spirit, leaving behind her broom.

Within a few days, the broom is making itself useful — sweeping the kitchen, chopping wood, fetching water and picking up the piano. In short, the witch's broom is good company for a lonely widow. Too bad the neighbors don't agree. The Spivey boys start making trouble and soon their hot-headed father and a neighborhood lynch mob burn the broom at the stake. Or have they? A ghostly apparition makes one wonder.

"The Widow's Broom," is the 13th (fitting, eh?) book by author/illustrator Christopher Van Allsburg, perhaps best known for his Christmas classic "The Polar Express." The subtle sepia illustrations give the book an eerie look.

The book is perfect for young readers, but it also will entertain preschoolers without scaring the bejibbers out of them.

PICNIC AT MUDSOCK MEADOW, by Patricia Polacco (G.P. Putnam's Sons, \$14.95).

Mudsock Meadow may exist only in the mind of Patricia Polacco, but she brings it to life again with colorful folk-art drawings and the tale of Halloween picnic where the legend of the ghost of Titus Dinworthy rears its head.

It's also the tale of a boy and a girl at that gawky, awkward age who discover their affection for each other — despite their initial one-up-manship and embarrassment.

Readers may remember Mudsock Meadow from two previous books by Polacco: "Meteor!" and her adaptation of Ernest Thayer's "Casey at the Bat."

This story also is easy enough for young readers and tame enough for young listeners.

LET'S COUNT, DRACULA AND HALLOWHAT? by Alan Benjamin, illustrated by Sal Murodoe (Simon & Schuster, \$3.95 each).

From the gentle rhymes of "Hallowhat" to the counting lessons in "Let's Count, Dracula," these Chubby Board books will be a Halloween hit with the toddler set. The cardboard pages are sized for small hands and are sturdy enough to let wee ones handle unsupervised. After hearing the books read a few times, one 4-year-old attempted to "read" one to her younger brother. She didn't quite have every word memorized, but he didn't know.

MAKING FACES WITH THE SIMPSONS, by Matt Groening (Harper Collins, \$9); **SCARY MASKS** BY CAROLYN BRACKEN (Dover Publications Inc., \$2.95).

Don't know what to be for Halloween? Choose from Homer, Lisa, Maggie, Marge, Bart and 10 assorted other Groening creations. These face-size masks come with lined lines for cutting — for those intent with scissors. Just think, everyone in your family can adopt a Simpson persona for the day. (What do you mean your family already acts like the Simpsons?)

If the Simpsons are too tame for your goblins, try "Scary Masks." Choose from a vampire, a witch, a skeleton, a mummy, a pumpkin and strange purple thing with horns. These colorful masks are printed on perforated cardboard (no scissors required) and, like the Simpsons masks, can be worn by attaching string. Warning: This batch might be too gruesome for the toddler set.

I CAN DRAW HALLOWEEN, by Tony Tallarico (Simon & Schuster, \$3.95).

If there's a budding artist in your family, this learn-to-draw book is just the ticket. With simple step-by-step instructions, would-be artists can turn basic shapes such as circles and squares into witches, black cats, pumpkins and ghosts.

Given this book, a child could spend hours quietly in his room. Now there's a scary thought!

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'Hero' an erratic look at courage

HOLLYWOOD — "Hero" is something of a mess, but even as a mess it offers more to chew on than most older pictures. Haphazard and erratic, involving only in fits-and-starts, "Hero's" core is nevertheless so shrewdly and gleefully cynical about public heroism and the cult of celebrity it is impossible not to be at least sporadically amused and entertained by it.

Written by "Unforgiven" screenwriter David Webb Peoples (from a story by producer Laura Ziskin, Alvin Sargent and Peoples), "Hero" is frankly curious about acts of courage. Is heroism really selfless or is it, as one of its characters says, rather an act of stupidity, "doing something you wouldn't do if you thought about it. Not in your self-interest."

Similarly, what kind of citizens are moved to be brave, to put others before themselves? Do they all fit the conventional cereal box mold or could they, perish the thought, actually be people like Bernie LaPlante?

To know Bernie LaPlante (Dustin Hoffman) is not to love him. A curmudgeonly, antisocial, weasel, first met lifting the wallet of his own attorney as a jury in a Chicago courtroom declares him guilty on all charges of receiving stolen goods, LaPlante wouldn't stick his neck out on a bet. "Keep a low profile, that's my motto," he says, and no one who knows him doubts his sincerity on that point.

But one rainy night, driving his barely mobile junker to one of his infrequent get-togethers with his young son, LaPlante can't help but see an airplane crash directly in front of him. Not one to get too involved in other people's troubles, he yells an irritated, "What's the problem, pal?" to the desperate people inside, and is initially more worried about ruining his expensive shoes than saving any souls. Yet one thing leads to another and before his lust for the other profiles of his own act of guy, I don't take credit," causes him to drift off unrecognized into the night, LaPlante's actions have brought about the rescue of 34 lives.

One of those saved turns out to be Gale Gayley (Geena Davis), the usual hard-charging TV reporter who knows the case she's covering about hero could be the story of a lifetime. "Who is the Angel of Flight 104?" her station demands to know, and when handsome, soft-spoken John Bubber (Andy Garcia) shows up to

claim the laurel wreath — and the reward — everyone is appropriately gratified. Except, of course, a seriously disgruntled Bernie LaPlante.

In form and attitude, "Hero" wants to join the tradition of the amoral screwball farces of the late 1930s and early 1940s, where deception was the order of the day and no one had more excuses than they could afford. Preston Sturges worked this territory extensively (one of his films is even ironically titled "Hail the Conquering Hero").

These films succeeded by carefully playing cynicism off against sentimentality, and the problem with "Hero" is that none of its elements, and especially not Stephen Frears' direction, is up to that kind of a delicate balancing act. While Frears, a top-drawer director whose best work has included such icy productions as "The Grifters" and "Dangerous Liaisons," has no difficulty with the darkly satirical parts of "Hero," the more heart-tugging sections seem to leave him totally at a loss.

The result is a film that goes in and out of emotional focus as its tone wavers from seriousness to awkwardness. Its best scenes are its most biting ones, like LaPlante's genuine irritation at what a pain in the neck it is to go searching for survivors on a downed airplane. However, when it comes to the Frank Capra-esque good feeling engendered by what a fine hero John Bubber seems to be, "Hero" acts almost embarrassed about the scenes it is showing.

"Hero's" best star performance is Dustin Hoffman's, who has the benefit of the script's shappest lines, but his frequently amusing work as the whiny compulsive liar is also uneven. Better served by the film are two of its minor roles, Kevin J. O'Connor as Chucky, the self-obsessed cameraman, and an uncredited Chevy Chase as Gayley's strictly business boss.

Despite its uncertainty, however, "Hero" (rated PG-13) never totally loses its fascination. Its sarcastic examination of the mechanics of hero building and hero worship, and its bemused attitude about how easily one is manipulated by imagery, all give it a certain amount of bite. Its teeth could have been a lot more effective, but we're happy to see that it has any at all.

TV coverage an inspiration

Screenwriter Alvin Sargent and producer Laura Ziskin were sitting around their house watching TV coverage of the '88 election, when the idea for "Hero" dawned on them.

In the Capresque comedy, which opened around the country Friday, Dustin Hoffman plays a weaselly thief who, in spite of himself, saves all 54 passengers aboard a crashed airliner. Then he wanders off into the stormy night, and someone else takes credit for the heroic deed.

Geena Davis, an ace TV newswoman who was one of the plane's survivors, latches onto the impostor (played by Andy Garcia) and transforms him into a populist icon, the picture-perfect hero.

"We were looking at the role of the media," remembers Ziskin, whose production credits include the giant Disney hit "Pretty Woman." "We were struck by how the broadcast media, in particular, identifies people, how they can only deal with one characteristic, or one act of a public figure, and that then defines them, when in fact we're all much more complicated than that."

The thing that really started them thinking was the controversy over presidential candidate Gary Hart's alleged extramarital flings. "I was interested in this notion that, whatever good qualities or bad qualities or whatever he had, once he was identified as this womanizer, that defined him. It didn't matter what else he was ...

"That led us to thinking, what if somebody was perceived wrongly to be really virtuous and fabulous? If someone performed an act of great heroism and disappeared, and then was re-analyzed? And what would happen if that person turned out to be a jerk, a 'lowlife'?"

New York film industry falls on hard times

NEW YORK — Some years ago, actor Eli Wallach sat behind the wheel of a New York taxi waiting for his director to show "Action!" Suddenly, a passerby yanked open the rear door, sat down and blurred the address of a Manhattan hotel.

"Lady! We're making a movie here!" an exasperated Wallach said.

The woman glanced at the movie lights and crew, then gestured toward the cab's on-duty sign.

"I don't care what you're making," she shot back. "Your light is on!"

The story, told before a packed news-conference last week at New York City Hall, is pure New York — the unrecognized celebrity, the unimpressed New Yorker, the crisp retort.

Ah, said Wallach, shooting in New York steps a film in authenticity. You just can't get that on a Hollywood lot.

Unfortunately for those who feel this way — or are among the 75,000 New Yorkers who earn a living making movies, TV shows or commercials — the industry here has fallen on hard times.

Shaken by the recession and the after-effects of a half-year studio boycott that accompanied contract talks two years ago, the nation's second largest film, TV and commercial-production center has suffered a dramatic fall-off in activity.

"There are a lot of people who are definitely doing less work," said Nina Steich, acting director of the mayor's Office of Film, Theatre & Broadcasting.

This will likely be the first year since 1986 that half of office issues fewer than 100 permits to use out-

door locations to shoot feature films, she said. The figure was 143 in 1990 and 124 last year.

Other categories are troubled as well: Outdoor shooting permits for TV shows that none of the permits between 1990 and 1991, and outdoor permits for commercials dropped nearly 19 percent. (Permits are not required for indoor work, but that is thought to have similarly suffered.)

In an effort to publicize New York as the filming center, Mayor David N. Dinkins recently took time off from his battles with police officers and worries about re-election to announce that a new private film-production company was being formed. The company will make "Sam and Molly Kasper" starring Wallach and actress Ann Jackson, star of the Broadway hit "Lost in Yonkers."

It is to be a quintessential New York picture about a quarrelsome couple reviewing their 40 years of marriage. But unlike most of the current films with New York settings, it will actually be made here. The film version of "Lost in Yonkers," for example, is being shot in Cincinnati. Other films that pretend to have a New York setting are actually being made in Pittsburgh and Toronto.

"We must dispel the notion that New York is an expensive and uncooperative filming location," Dinkins said.

Dinkins has been sharply criticized for not doing more to revive the city's film industry. Chiefly, he is faulted for leaving his film office without a director since April.

In addition to lobbying producers to make their films here, the office helps cut New York's mind-boggling red tape and smooths the way through outdoor locations.

The city estimates the film, TV

and commercial industries have pumped as much as \$3 billion a year to the city's economy.

Counting all the network shows, syndicated shows, talk shows and soaps, there are 68 shows in regular production in New York, according to the film office. In addition, there are hundreds, perhaps thousands, of commercials made here.

How much that has fallen is impossible to measure, but industry members say it is certain that film workers — most of whom are freelancers — are hurting.

"People have been forced either to take additional jobs or to go into other businesses," said Alan S. Gordon, executive secretary of the eastern division of the Directors Guild of America.

The economy, of course, is a big factor, making even network news programs trim employees, and forcing cutbacks in advertising budgets that support commercial making.

But New York is also suffering the effects of a protracted dispute over production costs between craft unions and the major film and TV producers.

"New York continues to be the most expensive place to film in the United States," said Nicholas Counter III, president of the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers in Hollywood, which represents the big studios and major independent producers.

"So if a decision is strictly bot-

tom-line-oriented, New York will lose and you'll find an alternative, such as Pittsburgh or the back lot of Universal or Paramount" in California.

Gordon said that a feature film with a budget of \$20 million can save \$1 million by shooting in Chicago rather than New York, largely because of union contract provisions on staffing levels. "The city's tough to work in," he said.

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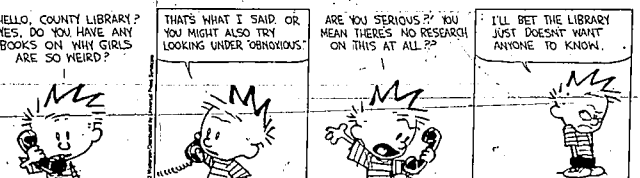
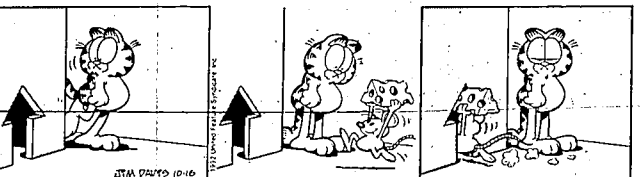
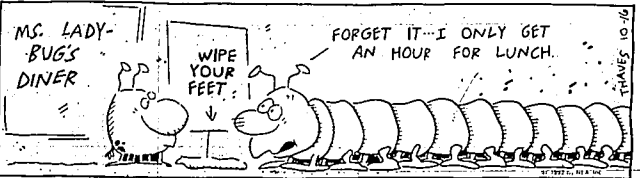
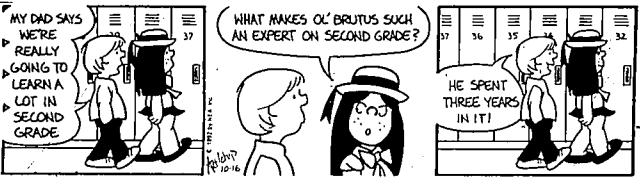
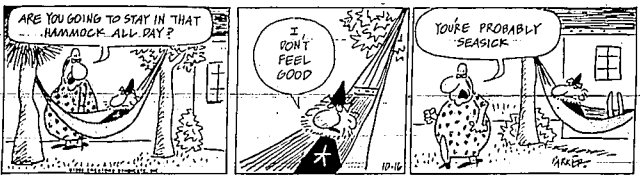
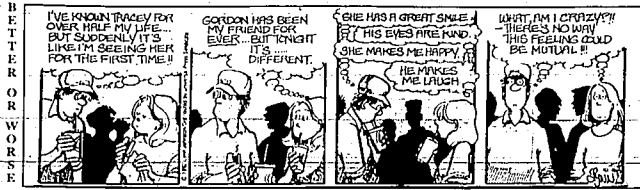

Singing Bridge ends tune Monday

TWIN FALLS—Time to hop in the pickup and take a last ride across the Singing Bridge.

The aging span—named for the ringing sound of car and truck tires on the bridge's metal deck—will be closed Monday morning and dismantled during the next several weeks.

A Kimberly company, Idaho Construction, will build a new concrete bridge in its place in the next 12 months,

said Scott Malone, an Idaho Transportation Department engineer.

"We expect the new bridge in the fall of 1993," Malone said.

The bridge was built across Rock Creek Canyon in south Twin Falls in 1920. In 1954 the metal deck was added that helped give the bridge its name.

Transportation Department engineers found the bridge unsafe for heavy trucks nearly three years ago and closed the bridge to commercial truck traffic.

Idaho Construction won a contract in late September to replace the bridge. The project

will cost an estimated \$3 million. Malone

The new bridge will be 64 feet wide—five lanes, with a center turning lane—and will line-up with the road on both sides of the canyon. Six concrete columns—three rows of two—will anchor the bridge, Malone said.

The construction company will have 180 working days to build the bridge, he said.

December, January and February will not be counted as working days because weather might stop work on the bridge during these months.

Malone expected the bridge to be closed by 11 a.m. or noon Monday.

Area businesses are wondering how the bridge's closure will affect them. Dave Hildrege, owner of Gem State Service, a car repair business, said recently that he fears the bridge's closure might put him out of business.

The manager of the Stinker Station across the road said she wasn't worried.

The manager of Sweeten's Magic Market was waiting to see if the closure would affect business.

Collision of school bus causes minor injuries

GOODING—A collision involving a Gooding school bus sent 14 people—including 11 students on the bus—to the hospital with minor injuries Thursday afternoon.

Bus driver Ralf M. Lucke, 65, of Gooding, was cited for running a stop sign. Cpl. Salena Stanley of the Idaho State Police said.

The bus was northbound on 1700 East when Lucke failed to stop at the intersection at 1800 South, Stanley said. David Malone of Gooding was driving east and hit the rear portion of the bus, she said.

Malone and his two passengers went to Gooding Memorial Hospital, along with the students, aged 6 through 18. All were treated and released.

Tax commission offers breaks to those with unfiled returns

TWIN FALLS—The State Tax Commission is offering a break of sorts to people who haven't filed tax returns.

For example, most people who have never filed a return will be required to file no more than six years of returns. Penalties will be excused. Those who can't pay in full may set up a payment plan.

And as long as the returns are truthful, late filers won't go to jail.

The Idaho Nonfilers Project runs through Dec. 31, in conjunction with a similar project sponsored by the Internal Revenue Service.

State Tax Commissioner Coleen Grant said that many people aren't even aware they should file Idaho tax returns, such as Idaho residents who work in another state or out-of-state residents who work in Idaho. And the program also applies to sales tax returns or any type of required return.

Out-of-state drivers in Idaho will have to pay traffic fines

BOISE—Drivers from out of state who receive a traffic citation in Idaho can no longer get away without paying a penalty.

Idaho is now a partner in the Non-Resident Violator Compact, in which 42 states share traffic citation information, Transportation Department officials announced.

Under the new program, if a resident of another state gets a citation in Idaho—or vice versa—but does not pay, the home state will suspend the license until restitution is made.

Department officials said in 1990, Idaho lost \$224,000 from unpaid citations. Currently, half of all unpaid citations are to out-of-state drivers.

BURLEY—The Fourth annual Medley of Scarecrows will take place Wednesday through Saturday with proceeds going to help the Golden Heritage Senior Center building fund in Burley.

The event will conclude with a community breakfast Saturday from 8 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. at the New Gold Heritage Senior Center on 2421 Overland Ave. Cost is \$3.50 per plate.

Keep campaign posters away from highway rights-of-way

BOISE—Transportation Department officials are warning that persons running for election may not place campaign posters within highway rights-of-way.

Putting posters on utility poles, trees or rocks or on temporary stakes within a highway right-of-way is a misdemeanor offense, said Jeff Stratton, public affairs officer for the department.

Election posters may be affixed to utility poles within the right-of-way when permission from the owner of the pole is submitted to the nearest Transportation Department District Office.

Election posters may also be affixed to privately owned fences, subject to local zoning ordinances, the department said.

Shoshone council seeks to sell Mountain View Addition lots

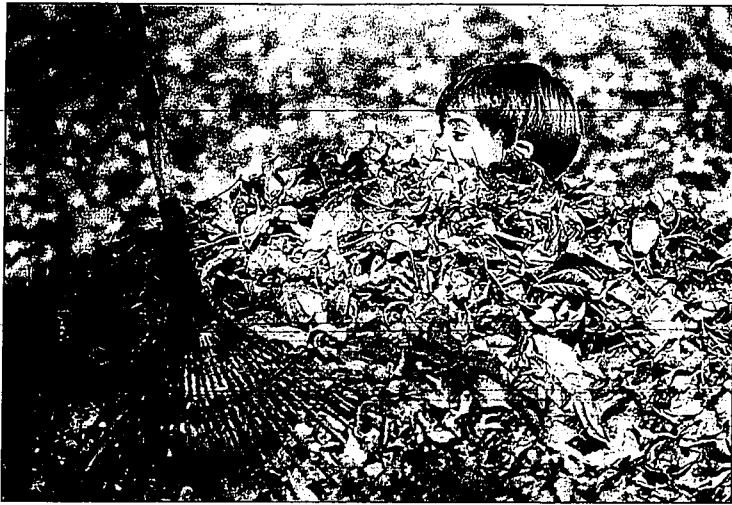
SHOSHONE—The Shoshone City Council voted recently to put up for bid seven city lots in the Shoshone Mountain View Addition.

CSI offers advanced library degree

TWIN FALLS—In their small-town library, people can order books from around the globe or check out a book that shows how to fix a motorcycle carburetor.

That is, if they know how to get access to a continually growing array of library materials—or the librarian can help them, said Catherine Poppino, a College of Southern Idaho professor.

A new University of Arizona master's of library science program offered through the College of Southern Idaho's

telecommunications system will train new librarians how to find what they need in the library, said Poppino, who will be the site coordinator and instructional assistant for the new program.

Being a librarian during the age of information demands more sophistication than in the past and yet the number of universities offering library degrees are dwindling with only four in the west, she said.

The University of Arizona is attempting to pick up the slack by offering as many as three library science classes a semester for 15 locations in South Dakota, Nevada,

Alaska, Arizona and Idaho.

But eight people must sign up for each class in a given semester, or they will be canceled, Poppino said.

Next computer reference systems and an ever-expanding supply of books and magazines to choose from, make library management a challenging field, Poppino said. "A lot of people still have the idea of a librarian sitting behind a desk stamping books all the time," Poppino said. "That simply isn't the case anymore."

Williams assails Crapo on reform record

TWIN FALLS—Democratic congressional candidate J.D. Williams stepped up his attack on GOP rival Mike Crapo Thursday, charging that Crapo's rhetoric on congressional reform doesn't match the reality of his voting record.

Crapo, an Idaho Falls state senator who has made reform of Congress the centerpiece of his campaign for the 2nd District seat, said Williams' charges were "a desperate attempt to revive a failing campaign."

Among other things, Crapo wants to make Congress subject to several laws from which it has exempted itself, such as the Occupational Safety and Health Act and the Civil Rights Act, and cut the number of committees and committee staffers by 50 percent.

But Williams says that during his eight years in the state Senate, Crapo has voted to increase the number of committees, opposed a proposal to strip legislators of their immunity from arrest during sessions, and voted to exempt the Legislature from the financial control mechanisms to which all other state agencies are subject.

"Candidate Crapo's congressional reform package flies in the face of his record in the Senate," Williams said. "I've received a firm commitment from the House leadership that meaningful reforms in House administration will take place, and they won't even wait for next year to do it."

Crapo, in a telephone interview from Shelley, said Williams was nipping at his reform agenda because he, Williams, has none of his own.

Inquest set in Shoshone boy's death

SHOSHONE—Five months after his body was found on a dark Lincoln County road, Jay Barrantia's death continues to raise questions.

A coroner's inquest—only the second in more than 30 years—will begin next week to try and answer some of those questions, Lincoln County Coroner Francis Bergin said Thursday.

Bergin and Lincoln County Sheriff Stephen Southwick have ruled out foul play and say Barrantia was struck by a car and killed.

Glenda Barrantia of Shoshone said she believes her 16-year-old son was hit in the head and killed, or at least knocked unconscious, by boys attending a party with her son at Magic Reservoir.

The boys then dropped Jay on the road to make it look like an accident, she said.

Why else would her son, who was dropped off half a mile south of his house, be found dead on the road three quarters of a mile north of the house just 25 minutes later?

Bergin hopes an inquest will provide some answers, although he's sure that Jay Barrantia was killed when he was hit by a car. In fact, the boy was hit by two or three cars before his body was found.

"He died of severe head injuries," Bergin said.

Could he have been dead before the cars hit him?

"No, I don't think so," Bergin said. State and county officials tried to determine who drove the vehicle that delivered the fatal blow, but no charges have been filed.

Bergin said drivers that may have hit the body as it lay in the road will appear at the inquest.

The probe is set to begin at 9 a.m. Wednesday and may last through the end of the week.

In a coroner's inquest, a six-person jury listens while the county prosecutor questions witnesses. There is no cross-examination.

The inquest may turn up nothing, Bergin said. But he hopes the probe will at least "appease the family members," he said.

The family doesn't seem to want to let this drop," Bergin said.

Rumors that foul play may have been involved in Barrantia's death began almost as soon as his body was found on Idaho Highway 26 east of Shoshone in mid-May.

Southwick issued a statement soon afterward saying those rumors were unfounded.

"After reviewing the information gathered at the scene, by interviews taken, from the coroner and autopsy reports, there is no evidence to indicate that foul play was involved," Southwick said.

Glenda Barrantia accuses the sheriff of not investigating her son's death.

Idaho detective finds evidence of 1864 murders

Non-descript bits of rust represent only clues to region's most brutal crime

HAMILTON, Mont. (AP) — A handful of non-descript bits of rusting metal lies atop Milo McLeod's desk; a buckle off an old leather strap, two .33-caliber lead balls, the metal corner that 129 years ago held a wooden box together.

They represent the only modern evidence of one of this region's first and, arguably, still most brutal crimes.

When dug up by a Lewiston, Idaho, private detective last August, they confirmed for the first time since 1864 the exact site where Lloyd Magruder and his companions were murdered and robbed by men they'd befriended.

And lying on McLeod's desk, far from the wilderness where they were found, they represent the irreplaceable loss of historic data, and a federal crime committed by the detective.

"From an archaeologist's point of view, once you excavate a site and remove an artifact from context, you've destroyed the site," said McLeod, archaeologist for both the Lolo and Bitterroot national forests.

And from a legal view, federal law makes it a crime to remove just about anything that could be deemed an artifact — from arrowheads to old bottles — from federal land.

The agency won't prosecute the detective, Monty Spears, owner of Gem State Investigations and Security, or employee Tom Haugstad, who went along. Spears didn't know what he did was illegal, he got tacit approval from a volunteer at an Idaho ranger station on both the way in and out, and he willingly gave up the artifacts to McLeod and federal agents.

"He was totally unaware of the archaeological laws," McLeod said. "He's certainly not a collector that goes out and hits every historic site."

Spears was out of town last week, but Haugstad said he'd professed a lifelong fascination in the tale. In the four years Haugstad has known him, Spears often talked of finding the exact spot where a trusting Lloyd Magruder was killed.

"I guess it was just his basic investigative instincts," Haugstad said.

At the time, the grisly tale outraged the public from Idaho Territory to both coasts. The story's been periodically revived in magazines and the press as a detective yarn, a ghost story complete with present-day dreams, and, at its simplest, an historic tragedy.

Magruder left his home in Maryland and eventually joined the 1849 rush to California to prove himself in business and politics.

He went broke, but did serve in the state assembly, to some acclaim. That waned, and in 1862, he left for a new start around the gold mines in Idaho Territory.

By summer 1863, he owned a pack train and a store in Elk City, and was dabbling in politics. His luck had finally turned.

On Aug. 22, he loaded a mule train with trade goods and set off on the south Nez Percé trail. In Bannack, he met three men — Page, Romain and Renton — two of whom traveled on with him to the fledgling Virginia City.

They arrived Sept. 15, sold out in a week for what historians estimate was \$12,000 to \$15,000 in gold dust, and started back.

Others asked to go along with Magruder and his packer back over the Bitterroots: two brothers from Missouri with their gold earnings, and a man Magruder had known in California. Another man, named Lower, joined in a short ways later.

Romain, Renton and Lower were the murderers, perhaps at the design of notorious Sheriff Henry Plummer, though auditor Julia Conway Welch discounts Plummer's involvement in her 1991 book, "The Magruder Murders."

But Plummer certainly knew them, Welch writes, and some of the trio's acquaintances were later hanged by vigilantes for their own crimes.

Page would testify against the others in exchange for leniency. He denied any involvement in the killings, and his version is all that's known about the

murders.

According to Welch: On Oct. 11, 1863, the party camped on a high bench well above the Sawtooth River. After supper, Lower and Magruder went up the hill to improve the temporary corral. Lower took an ax.

Page said he went to bed, and awoke at midnight to Lower and Renton coming down the hill. In short order, Renton and Romain backed to death the sleeping Missouri brothers. Renton grabbed a shotgun and killed the packer in his tent, and Romain laid into the California man with the ax.

They threw the bodies and most of the unneeded gear over the hill. Page gathered up the rest and buried it in the fire. They shot dozens of mules to get rid of identifiable evidence and sneaked back to Lewiston.

By some accounts, Lewiston hotel owner Hill Beachy had dreamed about the ax-murder of his friend Magruder. By most accounts, he became suspicious of four men carrying heavy containers and trying to buy stage tickets. He concluded they'd robbed someone, Welch wrote. His friend Magruder was overdue.

Beachy and another man trailed the four to Portland, caught up with them in San Francisco, and returned them to Lewiston for the territory's first criminal trial and subsequent hangings.

Romain, Lower and Renton were convicted on Page's testimony in January 1864. Winter prevented an investigation of the site or discovery of the bodies until the following June, when Page led Beachy and others back.

They found items Page had cached, and the remains of the men, including Magruder's split skull. Beachy nailed a sign to a tree, commemorating the tragedy.

By the early 1900s, the tree had grown to engulf the sign, and some Lewiston citizens felt the tree, extracted the sign, and took it back to town to commemorate Beachy.

Plans may vault state to forefront of school reform

SEATTLE — A bold plan to give Washington state's local schools more control over public education has won the support of key members of a blue-ribbon panel in private meetings over the past week.

If adopted, it could put the state in the forefront of national education-reform efforts. "To me, it's the most radical thing that has ever happened in Washington state education," said state Superintendent of Public Instruction Judith Billings.

If adopted by the Legislature, the plan could cost taxpayers an additional \$87 million next year and \$321 million annually by the end of the decade. The current annual state education budget is about \$3.8 billion.

In the proposed "performance-based" school system, state government would stop telling local

school districts how to spend their money.

Instead, the state would set broad educational goals and let local educators and citizens decide how to meet those goals.

While proposing higher academic standards, the plan also calls for vigorous measures to help disadvantaged children succeed in school.

The Governor's Council on Education Reform and Funding is expected to give the proposal tentative approval Friday, which would put Washington in the forefront of education reform. Gov. Booth Gardner appointed the council in the wake of a state teachers' strike last year.

Billings and other members of the council said consensus has been reached on major elements of the plan, although many details remain to be worked out. The plan will undergo a series of public meetings next month before the governor's council considers revisions and sends it on to the Legislature.

Stunning in the scope of its changes—the proposal would:

- "Deregulate" public education, repealing state rules on salaries, staffing and hours of instruction.

- Hold schools accountable for meeting new state goals for learning. Financial incentives would be offered to school staffs that boost students' academic performance.

- Raise academic expectations for all students and extend the school year for slower learners.

- Require new teachers and administrators to show their competence. Mentors would be assigned to work with new teachers.

- Replace standardized multiple-choice achievement tests with more sophisticated measures of student learning.

- Establish social-service and health centers in or near all public schools.

- Offer preschool to all at-risk 3-year-olds not currently enrolled in Head Start.

1% Initiative could cripple U of I extension system

MOSCOW (AP) — Passage of the One Percent Initiative could disrupt the services of the University of Idaho's cooperative extension offices in 42 counties, officials say.

All counties, with the exception of Shoshone and Boise, support extension agents with a total of about \$1.8 million a year, or nearly 20 percent of the offices' funding. About \$8.89 million a year comes from the state and federal taxpayers, said Larry Branen, dean of the UI's College of Agriculture.

The initiative on the Nov. 3 ballot would limit

property taxes to 1 percent of fair market value. The county money pays for part of the extension agents' salaries and operating expenses, he said, and does not include the free space provided for the offices.

Daniel Chadwick, executive director of the Idaho Association of Counties, said cooperative extension is a service counties have authority to support, yet are not mandated to provide.

"If it's not mandated and the Idaho State Constitution says counties can't deficit spend, I have a lot of sympathy for the elected officials who have to

make the decisions," said Robert Carver, the extension system's director in the 10 northern counties.

He noted Bonner County officials estimate they would have to cut \$300,000 from their budget even after excising all programs that are not required, if the initiative passes.

"We are very concerned because we feel extension provides excellent educational programs for adults and kids," he said Wednesday. "If we have to close county offices, we might try to serve a few counties out of one office. It certainly wouldn't be business as usual."

Plan offers power boat restrictions

LEWISTON (AP) — A new management plan for the Snake River in Hells Canyon, two years in the making, for the first time imposes limits on private power boaters.

The Forest Service, which prepared the plan for management of the Hells Canyon National Recreation Area, planned a Thursday night hearing at Lewiston.

A task force met during 1990 and 1991, frequently providing a forum for sharp debate. Some of the contentious issues remain, although the plan represents a compromise.

The plan limits private jet boat use on the portion of the Snake protected as a wild river from Pittsburg Landing upstream to Hells Canyon Dam.

The limits on power boat use still don't sit well with Lewiston jet boat enthusiast Richard Rogers, who represented the Northwest Power Boaters Association on the task force.

"My personal opinion is I don't feel they're needed at this point," he said. "Overall, I think it's a pretty fair settlement."

Series looks at recent political history

Democratic leaders of past and present cross paths as President John F. Kennedy meets a teenage Bill Clinton at a 1963 White House ceremony in 'America's Political Parties: Power and Principle.' This historical analysis of the Democratic and Republican parties from 1960 to 1992 will air as part of PBS's "Election '92" coverage on successive Fridays, Oct. 16 and Oct. 23, at 9 p.m.

As Election Day nears and the Democrats and Republicans step up the pace to attract and inspire voters, a special two-part series provides viewers with a historical look at this year's race.

On Oct. 16 and 23, PBS presents as part of its "Election '92" coverage "America's Political Parties: Power and Principle," which examines this year's contest through the prism of recent political history. Featuring interviews with Bill Clinton, Jesse

Jackson, Barry Goldwater, Jack Kemp and others, and hosted by two of America's most distinguished political commentators, David Gergen and Ben J. Wattenberg, this series traces the evolution of the parties from 1960 to today.

Historic footage from national conventions, newsreels and political ads, interviews with leaders and in-depth analysis combine to provide a riveting two hours.

The series asks: Can the Republican Party maintain the broad constituency it developed during the Reagan years? Have the Democrats, wracked for a quarter century with internal disagreements, found a way through Clinton's candidacy to unite and lessen? What lessons can they and the American people learn from the histories of their parties?

Today, both parties face the challenge of redefining their identities to appeal to a nation disenchanted with politics as usual. Confronting widespread discontent, fractured families and a shifting international arena, both parties must create new solutions and re-instill confidence in their ability to lead fairly and effectively.

"America's Political Parties: Power and Principle" will help viewers appraise which, if either, of the parties has the vision and means to claim the nation's support, though only Nov. 3 will provide the definitive answer.

"The Democrats, 1960-1992," Part I, explores what happened to liberalism, beginning with the election of President John F. Kennedy, the leader who has come to exemplify activist government and the Democratic Party itself. As the fortunes of a party unfold, Kennedy's death, LBJ's landslide victory, the chaos of the 1968 convention and the party's collapse in popu-

larity provide a compelling framework for the Democrats' recent history. The party has, since 1968, lost five out of six elections.

Part 2 of the series is "The Republicans, 1960-1992." Beginning with Barry Goldwater — at a time when "conservative" was disparaging word as "liberal" has become today — host David Gergen looks at how a grassroots movement grew to become the political orthodoxy of the nation, producing one of its most popular presidents, Ronald Reagan.

Gergen then examines whether conservatism has run out of ideas and run adrift under Reagan's successor, George Bush. Finally, Gergen asks where conservatives — and the Republican Party — are heading tomorrow. Can they once again build a majority or is the country heading elsewhere?

Part I, "The Democrats," airs from 9 to 10 p.m. MDT, tonight on KAIT and other PBS stations. Part II, "The Republicans," airs the following Friday, Oct. 23, from 9 to 10 p.m. MDT.

HOLLYWOOD — Twenty-eight years ago, a review in the Los Angeles Times said: "Gilligan's Island" is a television series that never should have reached the air this season, or any other season."

The New York Times was equally uncharitable: "'Gilligan's Island' is quite possibly the most pretentious situation comedy of the season."

Despite the pans, a three-hour cruise endured for three seasons. And "Gilligan's Island," which was rated No. 18 its first year, has proven enormously popular in its afterlife. Reports of course continually air, ABC had a Saturday morning cartoon version, "The New Adventures of Gilligan," 1974-77. NBC produced three popular reunion movies.

"When they get to the island, the Skipper assigns duties to everyone and the Skipper goes, 'You girls wash all the clothes on the boat.'"

Some scenes from the pilot were "re-used" in the season's first Christmas show and in episode No. 12: "Birds Gotta Fly, Fish Gotta Talk."

The pilot, which was shot in Kauai, Hawaii, received high

marks from preview audiences, and the reaction persuaded CBS to buy the series. Schwartz did some fine-tuning and recast the three castaways with Johnson, Wells and Louise.

"It is very fun to watch," McSweeney said. "Really, with the exception of the theme song and that Ginger, Mary Ann and the Professor are played by someone else, the show is in reality very similar to a Gilligan episode."

McSweeney, who was not a fan of the series while growing up, said she believes "Gilligan's Island" has proven to be so popular over the ages because "it reminds us of when we were kids ... it is so innocent and it is just silly. If you really sit down and watch it, no matter how old you are, you are going to laugh at it. It is like a Jerry Lewis movie."

"Gilligan's Island begins at 6:05 p.m. MDT, tonight on TBS. The 1978 reunion movie, "Rescue From Gilligan's Island" follows at 6:35 p.m. MDT.

More people watched 1st debate than AL playoff

NEW YORK — Politics surpassed the National Pastime among television viewers.

According to preliminary A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings Monday, at least four times as many households were tuned to the season's first presidential debate than those for the American League playoffs Sunday night.

CBS, which skipped the entire debate and stuck with the playoff game between the Toronto Blue Jays and the Oakland Athletics when it went into extra innings, scored an 8.3 rating and 13 share of audience for the 7 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. EDT timeslot.

The 90-minute showdown under President Bush, Bill Clin-

ton and Ross Perot, carried live on seven other networks, ranked with a total rating of at least 40 and an audience share of 60.

Despite virtually identical coverage as its rivals, ABC dominated the time slot with nearly half the debate audience, logging a 19 rating and 29 share, followed by NBC with 14.5 and 22. Fox had a 4.9 rating and a 7 share.

These overnight ratings reflect 49 percent of U.S. households, and Oakland is not included among the 25 cities surveyed. Ratings represent a percentage of all TV homes; a share point is 1 percent of homes whose TVs are in use during the period.

Figures were not immediately available for CNN, C-SPAN, PBS and the Spanish-language Univision.

Ullman wants cut of 'Simpsons' royalties

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Comic actress Tracey Ullman testified last week that she is entitled to a cut of the royalties from "The Simpsons" T-shirts and other items.

The British-born entertainer contended in Superior Court that she fostered and nurtured the cartoon characters, which first appeared in segments of "The Tracey Ullman Show," which aired on the Fox network for 3½

years starting in 1987.

At one point in her 90 minutes on the witness stand she confirmed that she told a newspaper reporter: "I breast fed those little devils."

Ullman is suing Fox Broadcasting Co. for 7.5 percent of the net profits from "The Simpsons" merchandising. She also seeks damages and an accounting of revenues from the merchandising.

CBS, affiliates reach compromise

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS and its local TV stations apparently have buried the hatchet.

After five embattled months, the network last week backed off from a complex and controversial plan to cut by more than \$20 million its annual payments to affiliates for carrying its programming.

Instead, the new arrangement, which has won affiliates' approval, will save CBS about \$10 million in what the industry terms compensation, according to Anthony C. Malara, president of CBS Affiliate Relations.

Angry affiliates had threatened to drop CBS programs if the network enacted compensation cutbacks it proposed in May. Such defections would have hurt the network's ratings, which in turn would have driven down its advertising rates.

Baseball card makers prepare for 1993 releases

Before you get too excited about the promise of new toys, just remember that sometimes even the nicest-looking gift boxes contain undergear.

If you like pretty pictures and interesting new designs, there will be plenty to choose from when the 1993 baseball cards begin appearing just in time for the holiday shopping season.

But you're expecting an accurate representation of the 1993 season. Santa's going to leave you a

box of socks.

Baseball is expanding: the San Francisco Giants may or may not be moving to Florida; a lockout easily could delay the start of the season until June and many free agents will be awaiting teams. Even if the baseball season opens on time, a large percentage of 1993 cards issued in December will be hopelessly outdated.

But more than \$550 million worth of sports cards were purchased as gifts in 1991, and that's why the manufacturers of several of baseball card lines are scurrying to prepare for a December release,

when holiday shopping surpasses baseball as the national pastime.

Although several cardmakers are keeping suspiciously mum about specifics, this much is known about the 1993 releases:

The expansion draft is Nov. 17; Score is a corporate sponsor.

• **Topps, Score and Upper Deck** are expected to have their products available before Christmas.

• **Score** is adding a new brand, **Score Select**, one series of 405 bordered cards, will debut in December, with a suggested retail price of \$1.25. "The Rockies and Marlins will be represented," Score

spokeswoman Julie Haddon said.

Cards will have an ultra-violet coating on the front and a matte finish on the back. Randomly inserted chase cards (approximately one in 18 packs) will feature a "Dufex" process in which colors are given a metallic tone, that change in intensity as the card is moved slightly.

• **Score** will continue to produce its low-end set, retailing for 69 cents a pack and the high-end Prismatic line (\$1.89). The regular set will be "smaller" than 1992's 893 cards.

• **Topps**, burned by the San

Diego Padres' proposed move to Washington in 1974, is taking no chances with the San Francisco-St. Petersburg Giants. Teams will be identified by nicknames only. Colored borders have been eliminated for the first time since 1985. Pre-production samples were printed on heavier, improved stock.

• **Upper Deck**, the first company to issue expansion-player cards, is planning two series of 440 cards, instead of 700 and 100. Presumably, this will allow the company to pick up on expansion draftees in the second series. The 1993 Heroes subset will feature Willie Mays.

Some believe instant replay should return to football

CHICAGO, Ill. — When National Football League owners tossed out instant replay, they figured it would quietly go away. But at least three times during last Sunday's games, network analysts pointed out plays that might have been overturned under the old replay rule.

The NFL continues to experiment with instant replay at some games, trying to find the proper equipment to speed up the process.

NBC's Paul Maguire points to at least two plays in the last five weeks "that were just key" — one involving a fumble by the New England Patriots, in which the Bills' Shane Conlan stripped the ball and teammate Mark Kelso recovered.

"It took (the officials) 2½ minutes to decide the runner was down," Maguire says. "How stupid is that? That's dumb. You're either down or you're not down."

One of the reasons the owners gave for eliminating the replay was to speed up games.

But, without replay and game officials hav-

ing conferences on every penalty, games are "a longer or not shorter," says Maguire, an observation seconded by NFL executive vice president Randy Cross says. "And if there's justice in the world, it will happen to one of those 11 owners that voted against it."

Cross, a firm believer in the replay, agrees it needs modifying, and "it will be back next year in a new form, sort of tweaked and shined up a little bit. It's a huge mistake not having replay this year."

Maguire, who was a "strong proponent" of replay since his USFL days on ESPN, figures "it's gotta come back. But what they need is someone (in the replay booth) making the calls with guts. You've gotta say it's either yes or no. It's that simple."

Maguire, like Cross, realizes the lack of replay could be costly once the postseason starts.

"God forbid this thing happens in the playoffs," he says. "Can you imagine to go that far, and it had cost you a game? If they never had it, that's OK. But they had it (and got rid of it). That's where the real problem is."

Sports channel loses bid to stop NHL from broadcasting games over ESPN

NEW YORK (AP) — In a decision handed down Tuesday by the Appellate Division of New York State Supreme Court, SportsChannel America lost its bid to enjoin the NHL from broadcasting its games over the ESPN cable television network.

SportsChannel America, which had broadcast NHL games for the last four years, asserted it had been deprived of its contractual right of first refusal for 1992-93 when the

league entered into a five-year, \$80 million deal with ESPN.

Justice Shirley Fingerhood denied SportsChannel's request for an injunction on Sept. 10 and the appellate court upheld that opinion, finding the agreement on which SportsChannel based its argument to be "too imprecise and ambiguous," and ruling the net-

work failed to show irreparable harm.

Attorney Stephen A. Marshall of Rubin Baum Levin Constant & Friedman, counsel for the NHL, said, "This is a complete win for the NHL and assures that its fans will be able to view NHL games this season over national television without interruption."
