State probes hunters' assault claim

JEROME — The Idaho Bureau of Investigation is looking into allegations by four Twin Falls hunters that Jerome County Sheriff Larry Gold verbally assaulted and threatened to arrest them over the weekend.

Gold said Thursday the incident has been blown out of proportion and he denied charges that he threatened the men.

The confrontation began after one of the hunters began shouting profanities at the sheriff when he went to retrieve a pheasant he had shot, Gold said.

"I couldn't believe the sheriff would act like that," said Tug Worst, recalling the Saturday incident in a beet field in Jerome County.

Worst, a recent law school graduate, was hunting with Dr. Donald Pica, a physician; Magic Valley Regional Medical Center vice president Kent Deibert; and Deibert's 16-year-old son Ryan when the confrontation with Gold began.

The four hunters were preparing to enter a beet field when they saw Gold and his hunting partners in an adjacent stubble field, Worst said.

The hunters and Gold disagree about what happened next.

Gold climbed over the fence and began hunting in the beet field they were headed for, Worst said, he and Deibert yelled at him to keep out because they were going to hunt in the field.

The Twin Falls men had gotten permission from the field's owner to hunt there, Worst said.

"He's way off," Gold said. He shot a pheasant from the stubble field, but the bird fell into the beets, and Gold was following his dog to get it, he said.

Worst said Gold ignored their protests and then shot a pheasant that flew up along the ditch bank, he said.

The bird went down in the beets, and the hunters say they renewed their protests, yelling at Gold to let his dog get the bird so they could continue to hunt the field.

Gold said the hunters' profane screaming caused his dog to drop the bird, thinking she had done something wrong.

"That's how loud it was," Gold said.

Worst denies anyone in his party used profanity during the confrontation.

Instead of getting his kill, Gold walked quickly to where the Deiberts and Worst

Attention grabber

Bush, Clinton camps view Perot surge warily

WASHINGTON — President Bush and Democrat Al Gore on Thursday eyed Ross Perot's supporters not to waste their votes, trying to stall a modest post-debate resurgence in support for the independent candidate.

Perot countered with another 30-minute network commercial that focuses mostly on his family life but also urges Americans to "vote your conscience."

New campaign finance reports detail a major factor in Perot's recent gains: He has spent more than \$46 million of his own fortune on the campaign, including \$30 million in the last six weeks.

Campaign and industry sources said that in addition to network television buys, Perot is airing TV ads in 23 states around the country.

The Texas billionaire also is spending heavily on radio ads in at least nine states: Connecticut, Florida, Iowa, Maine, Michigan, Minnesota, Pennsylvania, Texas and Wisconsin. Supporters have been urging Perot to make campaign appearances as well, but aides said Thursday that none were scheduled.

Perot's climb into the high teens in national polls and even higher in some state surveys is significant but has not dramatically changed the national campaign's dynamics.

Perot's best states are Alaska, Washington, Nevada and elsewhere in the mountain West. Pollsters in both parties who are not aligned with the presidential campaigns say some voters believe that Clinton is going to win and plan to vote for Perot to underscore worries about the deficit.

It is unclear whether that sentiment and other Perot support will hold through Election Day, when support for third-party candidates traditionally wanes. Never before has an independent candidate spent so much.

Spending reports filed Thursday with the Federal Election Commission show Perot spent \$30 million from Sept. 1 through Oct. 14. That brought his total spending to \$48 million — all but \$1.3 million of that his own money.

Still, any Perot stirring is viewed warily by a Clinton camp trying to retain its strong lead in the campaign's final days.

"It's a problem," said Clinton communications director George Stephanopoulos. "Obviously, the higher he goes, the more he takes from us."

Perot's movement also is viewed with alarm by the Bush campaign, which faces a challenge in overtaking Clinton

Idaho joins mountain region gains

WASHINGTON — Idaho, other Rocky Mountain states and parts of the American heartland are weathering economic hard times better than the once-booming East and West coasts, the government said Thursday.

With some exceptions, states that flourished during the "bicoastal economy" of the 1980s now are struggling the most to shake off the recession's grip, according to personal income data published by the Commerce Department.

The Gem State, with personal income up 6.4 percent in the second quarter of 1992 compared to the same period a year earlier, ranked seventh nationally.

Montana, at 8.4 percent, had the fastest growing economy in the nation.

Delaware, on the other hand, had the slowest growth, at 2.7 percent.

After Montana, the fastest growing states were Utah at 7.2 percent, Nevada at 6.8, Washington at 6.6, South Dakota at 6.6, Kentucky at 6.4, Idaho, Oregon at 6.4, Mississippi at 6.3 and North Carolina at 6.3.

"The bicoastal economy is certainly a thing of the past," said economist Mark Zandi of Regional Financial Associates Inc. in West Chester, Pa. "Clearly the coasts are paying for the excesses of the 1980s."

Zandi said growth in California and New England in particular had depended on a brief commercial construction spree, on defense spending — since decimated by the end of the Cold War — and on the now-busted financial services boom.

"The Midwest and the mountain states didn't really take part in that and now they don't have to pay the piper," Zandi said.

Among the country's eight regions, New England had the slowest growth in personal income from the April-June quarter of 1991 to the same quarter of this year — 3.9 percent, the Commerce Department said.

In the Far West, growth averaged just 4 percent. Weak 3.3 percent growth in California offset strong 6 percent-plus growth in the Pacific Northwest.

The Rocky Mountain states, with 6.3 percent income growth, had the best showing over the period.

Comet could smack Earth in 2126

It's a snowball's chance, but a newly sighted comet named Swift-Tuttle could collide with Earth on August 14, 2126, according to a circular issued by the International Astronomical Union.

The comet, previously seen during the Civil War — was rediscovered late last month, and many astronomers believe it creates the Perseid meteor shower each August as the Earth passes through the debris that Swift-Tuttle leaves behind.

"(There is) a small but not negligible chance that the comet will hit" the Earth, said Brian Marsden of the International Astronomical Union, a part of the Harvard-Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory in Cambridge, Mass. "Probably nothing to worry about."

Job hunt becomes more convenient

JEROME — A gray box with a computer screen you can touch is an Idaho job-seeker's connection with employment seekers.

The new Automated Labor Exchange program, or ALEX, will permit job seekers to check out employment openings at 15 locations throughout the state.

The Idaho Department of Employment has installed the computer in the Jerome Public Library, the Minidoka County Courthouse and Gooding City Hall. Thirteen other terminals are spread across the state.

"This allows us to get out to new areas and areas that were hard to serve," said Twin Falls Job Service Manager Jim Ingalls.

The computers allow job hunters to find out about jobs listed with the Job Service and how to apply for them. Job information is downloaded from the Job Service's Boise office each morning, and includes information on jobs throughout the United States.

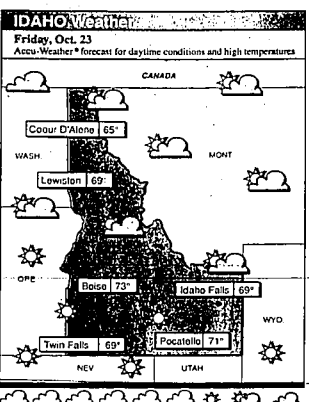
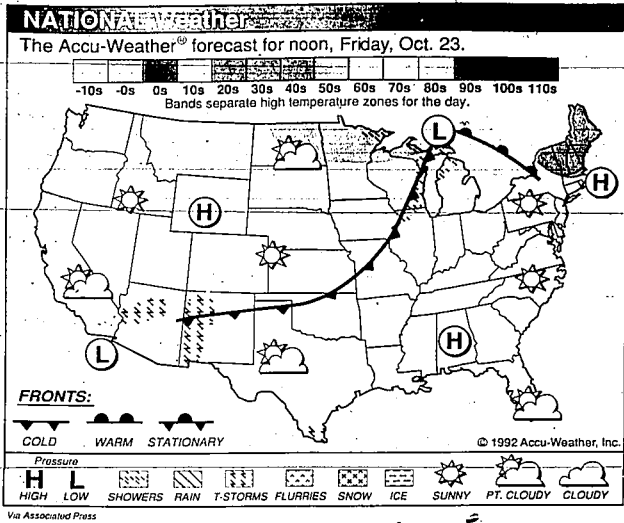

Rule delay cost 1,400 young lives

NEW YORK (AP) — A five-year U.S. government delay in requiring warning labels on aspirin led to the needless deaths of 1,470 children from Reye's syndrome, according to an analysis being published Friday. "These 1,470 deaths were especially tragic, because they were, typically, healthy children who never recovered from viral infection or chicken pox," the report's authors wrote. The deaths provide a dramatic example of the potential harm in easing public health regulations, said one of the authors, Patricia Buffler, dean of the School of Public Health at the University of California, Berkeley. "The Reagan administration and the Bush administration have been marked by a commitment to deregulation," she said. "When it occurs in an area where it has a health impact, the consequences are profound — profoundly adverse." Dr. Thomas Bryant, chairman and president of the Aspirin Foundation of America in Washington, D.C., said the report's authors "have got an interesting argument, but they overstate it." The foundation is a trade association of aspirin makers. He said voluntary public information campaigns by the aspirin industry had already led to a drop in Reye's syndrome before warning labels were required. Reye's syndrome often strikes children who are about to recover from flu or chicken pox. They suddenly take a dramatic turn for the worse, becoming lethargic and quickly sinking into a coma. Many are dead within a few days. Others recover but are left with severe brain damage. The report by Buffler and Devra Lee Davis of the National Academy of Sciences appears in Friday's issue of *The Lancet*, a British medical journal. It notes that Reye's syndrome deaths dropped off sharply after 1986. That year, 103 deaths were reported to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control. In 1987, the figure dropped to 36.

were standing. Pica was a few minutes behind and arrived at the scene later. The sheriff agrees that he told the hunters they were trespassing and asked to see their hunting licenses. Gold said he mistakenly thought the field they were in belonged to a former spouse wife had asked him to make sure hunters stayed out of their fields. Ken Deibert, Worst and Pica all say the sheriff told them they were under arrest. The sheriff said he detained them while checking their hunting licenses. "At this time we were trying to convince him we hadn't done anything wrong," Deibert said. Gold told the men he "had 21 deputies just over the hill" to assist if the men were uncooperative, he added. "That sounds like something Stephen King would come up with," Gold said in reply. "Worst said that Gold's gun was

cradled in his arm with the barrel pointed in the sheriff's direction. "I am not accusing him of pointing the gun at me," Worst said. But he was nervous about the gun and asked the sheriff to "point it at the ground." Gold replied: "I'm a law enforcement officer, you are armed men so I can point my gun any place I want to. Lean point, at your chest if I want to." Deibert said. Worst recalled the same statement. Gold recalls the statement differently. He told the men that, if he was arresting them, he had the authority to point his weapon at armed men. "The truth is, Gold said, his gun barrel was pointed at the ground and the chamber was empty. The sheriff said he tried to "disengage" himself from the confrontation several times, but each time Worst continued to yell at him, escalating the conflict. "It was Worst's mouth that kept this thing going," Gold said.

Worst denies yelling or swearing at the sheriff. Pica said when he arrived and introduced himself, the sheriff's demeanor changed dramatically. Tempers cooled and Gold returned the hunters' licenses and let them go. Gold wrote a letter of apology to the hunters and gave it to Jerome County Prosecutor John Horgan. In the letter, he apologizes for letting the confrontation "degenerate." "The other men with whom Gold was hunting Saturday were hunting elk on Thursday and could not be reached for comment," the sheriff said. An investigatory hearing about the incident was held Wednesday, but neither Horgan nor 5th District Magistrate Roger Burdick would comment on what happened. A state investigator from Pocatello has been in the Magic Valley this week interviewing people involved. Nobody from the Idaho Bureau of Investigation could be reached for comment Thursday.

was brought by as much as two weeks, meaning that the comet would miss Earth on its next pass — though it could strike at another time. The icy object's orbit or miss hinges on an astronomical odd known as "non-gravitational perturbation." Following studies of Comet Halley, astronomers have determined that comets generally have eruptive forces on their surface that act much like thrusters on a rocket. "These forces play a major role in determining the comet's track around the sun. Although the shape

of that track is largely determined by gravity, the unpredictable perturbations cause astronomers concern because of their volatile nature. "This comet is subject to more non-gravitational forces than any other comet I've ever seen," said Geoff Chester of the Einstein Planetarium. "Whether it hits us or not, it's going to be a spectacular show. I won't be around to find out." Comets are giant pieces of ice and dirt. Swift-Tuttle returns near Earth in a "period" of between 125 and 135 years; and since its sighting last

month, it has displaced Comet Halley as the longest, predictable periodic comet. In physical terms, both Marsden and Chester believe Comet Swift-Tuttle to be about six miles in diameter, roughly the size of the city of Washington. Coincidentally, the potential collision date of Aug. 14, 2126 matches the shower date of the Perseid meteors. As comets travel, they leave a dusty trail. When the Earth passes through the trail, the dusty particles strike the Earth's upper atmosphere. This results in meteor showers.

Presidential candidates like (to slam) each other

President Bush said Thursday he has a "pleasant relationship" with Bill Clinton, then freshened his attack on his rival's character and economic proposals.

The Democrat said that after 12 years in power, the GOP has "run out of direction and they ought to be run out of town."

With a dozen days remaining until the election, Clinton and Bush both shot novernal glances in Ross Perot's direction.

The third man in the race has "some good ideas and he's got some nutty ideas," the president said in an interview on "CBS This Morning." "I don't think people want to waste their vote (on Perot) and that's what it undoubtedly would be."

Clinton didn't mention Perot by name but lumped him together with Bush by implication. "Of all the choices you have in this election, only one has never been part of the Washington insider establishment," he said of himself. The Clinton campaign has referred to Perot's previous ties to the Nixon administration and his congressional lobbying.

Clinton leads Bush in all the pre-election surveys, with Perot well behind in third place. Even so, the Texas businessman has stepped up his radio and television advertising and polls suggest he has gained strength in selected parts of the country after the three presidential debates.

The daily ad and fax were continued, as well.

The president's campaign distributed a letter from 50 retired admirals and generals calling on Clinton to release all the documents in his possession about his Vietnam-era draft status. On the stump, Clinton reminded his audience that 24

retired admirals and generals have endorsed him.

Clinton previewed a 30-second television commercial in support of his plan to impose higher taxes on foreign corporations operating in the United States. The ad says Bush

"supports tax loopholes" for the firms, "supports them so much that he attacks Bill Clinton for wanting to close them."

Bush campaigned with Joseph Cioppio, a former hostage who was held in Lebanon. "God bless Amer-

ica and God bless the president," said Cioppio. Another former hostage, ex-Associated Press correspondent Terry Anderson, has sided with Clinton.

Perot's running mate, James Stockdale, paid a low-key visit to Seattle, dropping by for 10 minutes at the ticket's campaign office to sign autographs for volunteers. "Let's go for victory," he said.

Campaign finance reports indicated that Perot is plowing millions from his own fortune into his race for the White House — including \$30 million in the past six weeks.

In a 30-minute ad airing Friday night on NBC, he rejects Bush's contention that Perot votes are wasted votes. "You are throwing your vote away unless you vote your conscience," he declares in the commercial.

Campaign and industry sources said that in addition to a string of network television commercials, Perot was paying for local TV ads in 23 states. In addition, the Texas billionaire is spending heavily on radio ads in at least nine states.

Clinton, 45, invoked the name of an earlier young Democrat as he campaigned in Washington and other Western states.

"About this time in the campaign of 1960, John Kennedy said to the American people that at this stage of the election the choice is about more than the candidates; it is about the people themselves. You have to decide what kind of people you are, what kind of values you have and what kind of future you want."

The Democrats, he said, offer hope and improvement.

The Republicans, he said, "have had the White House so long, that they've run out of energy, run out of ideas, run out of direction, and they ought to be run out of town."

"Shrugging off his deficit in the polls, Bush said the momentum was his: 'In spite of the economic concerns that we all feel, I think — I'm confident — I'm going to win this election,'" he told his CBS interviewer.

Bush firmly turned aside any attempt to get him to consider the possibility of failure in his re-election bid. Asked by CBS' Paula Zahn what kind of president Clinton would make, and what his greatest fear would be, this exchange took place:

Bush: "You sound like — what's that woman who writes for one of those magazines, those now slick-covered inside stretch me out on a couch and let me analyze..."

Zahn: "Do a little psychoanalysis here. Well, that's what we do on 'CBS This Morning...'"

Bush: "The heck with that.... I've got a pleasant relationship with Bill Clinton. Our difference is substantive."

And by the time he reached New Jersey, he laid it out.

"He's going right after you wall-crowd in Vineland, N.J. 'You hold a job on Main Street, he's going after you, so button it up and vote for me.'"

He also repeated his customary attack on Clinton's character. "He tries to be all things to all people. You cannot lie and you cannot be all things to all people," he said.

Environmentalists sue over refuge abuse

WASHINGTON (AP) — Navy fighters are dropping dummy training bombs near sea lions on a national wildlife refuge off the coast of Washington state, the most blatant of dozens of violations on wildlife reserves, environmentalists charged Thursday.

"It comes as a shock to people that national wildlife refuges are not what they say they are," said Karin Sheldon, vice president of The Wilderness Society.

Her group, the National Audubon Society, Defenders of Wildlife and others filed a lawsuit in U.S. District Court in Seattle Thursday seeking injunctions to halt alleged government abuses on 10 of the country's most sensitive refuges.

The military exercises, livestock grazing, motorized boating and other recreation illegally harm wildlife on those reserves in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Colorado, Arizona, California, Massachusetts and Florida, they said.

The broader lawsuit specifies abuses at Copalis and nine other refuges, — saying — they — are representative of problems nationwide:

- Cabeza Prieta, Ariz., low-level flight operations.
 - Camas, Idaho, livestock grazing.
 - Crystal River, Fla., recreational uses of river.
 - Great Meadows, Mass., motorized boating, water skiing, jet skiing.
 - Havasu, Ariz.-Calif., beach use, swimming, motor boating, water skiing, jet skiing.
 - McNary, Wash., beach use, swimming, picnicking.
 - Monte Vista, Colo., livestock grazing.
 - Turnbull, Wash., livestock grazing.
 - Umatilla, Wash.-Ore., motorized boating, airboating.
- A second lawsuit singles out what the environmentalists said is the "most outright example of illegal activity."

legality" — diving Navy jets dropping 25-pound inert loads on the rocks and islands of Washington's Copalis National Wildlife Refuge.

Threatened Steller sea lions, gray whales, seals and migratory sea birds inhabit the refuge, which the Interior Department has allowed the Navy to use as a training target since World War II.

Fish and Wildlife Service director John Turner has refused to halt the practice because it has caused 85 miles west of Seattle, citing national defense concerns. And Rob Shallenberger, chief of the service's refuge division, said there are no plans to revoke the Navy's bombing permit, "at least under this administration."

Lt. Jesse Tillman, a spokesman for the Naval Air Station at Whidbey Island, Wash., said Thursday that there would be no comment on the lawsuit.

The Navy began a new biological assessment of the training runs earlier this year, he said, but currently adheres to a static study conducted in 1984-85 which found the impacts to be "minimal and apparently insignificant."

But Jim Whitaker, the first American to reach the summit of Mount Everest, said he has witnessed destruction on Copalis' Sea Lion Rock from his cabin on the Washington coast.

"For many years my family and I have watched bombing and missile attacks on this rock," said Whitaker, a member of Defenders of Wildlife. "We have found in their aftermath dead seals, sea lions and birds, and witnessed the shattering of a bay's tranquil state of nature."

The greatest danger is the noise-induced stress resulting from planes flying faster than 400 mph only 200 feet off the ground, critics say.

Group charges misuse of training funds

WASHINGTON — A Honduran company used U.S. government funds to train its workers to make a line of men's clothing shortly after its American partner closed a Texas plant making the same garments, according to documents released by an American labor group and Rep. George Brown, D-Calif.

The 1,100 workers who lost their jobs in San Antonio received trade-adjustment assistance benefits from the U.S. government.

The incident is a classic example of why the Central American programs of the U.S. Agency for International Development should be re-examined, said Charles Kernaghan. He is executive director of the National Labor Committee in Support of Worker and Human Rights in Central America, a union coalition.

"This kind of funding is wrong when it acts as an inducement for U.S. companies going offshore," Kernaghan said.

The use of the AID money to replace American workers has also become a key issue in the presidential campaign of Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton.

The documents focus on Levi Strauss & Co., San Francisco, which closed a plant in San Antonio, Texas, that made Dockers brand pants, in 1990.

Several months later, it began buying the pants from Euromoda, a Honduran contractor. Kernaghan said.

The Euromoda workers were trained to manufacture Dockers pants by Kurt Salmon Associates, Princeton, N.J., under a program funded by the Honduran Council for Human

Resources Development, the documents reveal. It has received over \$30 million in U.S. funds, Rep. Brown said.

"Apparently, it wasn't enough for Levi Strauss to have the American taxpayers dunned to finance the training of Hondurans to make Dockers pants," Rep. Brown told the Journal of Commerce. "They also had the taxpayers pick up the tab for the meager adjustment assistance that was provided to the American workers who used to make Dockers and were fired by Levi Strauss in 1990."

Levi Strauss' petition to the U.S. Department of Labor for the benefits said, "The employment of the San

Antonio workers has been eliminated because of the company's decision to utilize (the) lower labor cost used to assemble its products through offshore sources."

Kelly Presta, a spokesman for AID, said the agency has provided \$6.3 million to the Honduran foundation to help American and foreign companies set up factories in Honduran export-processing zones, where goods used in re-exports can be entered duty-free. The companies use low-wage Honduran workers to manufacture goods, primarily from American-made materials.

"It would be an ultimate irony if U.S. firms were excluded from this program," said Presta.

Jobless claims hit 2-year low

WASHINGTON (AP) — The number of new claims for jobless benefits shrank in early October for the third straight week, retreating to the lowest level in more than two years, the government said Thursday.

The Labor Department report showed new claims unexpectedly declined by 15,000 during the week ended Oct. 10, to 368,000. It was the lowest level since they dropped to 367,000 during the week ended Aug. 11, 1990.

In advance of the report, many economists had expected applications to climb by 15,000 after falling two weeks in a row.

Claims dropped below 400,000 during the week ended Sept. 26, falling to 399,000, and then to 383,000 a week later.

Former U.S. operative obtained MIA photos from Hanoi archives

WASHINGTON — The photographs that have broken a long impasse between the United States and Vietnam over the fate of servicemen missing from the Vietnam War were obtained by a longtime U.S. intelligence operative who has been living in Hanoi and writing a book about the Vietnamese army, according to intelligence officials and other sources.

Thousands of photographs taken by North Vietnamese combat photographers during the war, many of them grisly images of

Americans killed in action or shot by their captors, have been given to the Defense Department in the past few weeks.

No U.S. official has said publicly where they came from, but reports from several sources Wednesday said they came directly from Vietnamese military archives through the American in Hanoi, apparently with the consent of at least some factions in the Vietnamese government.

The American who obtained the photos was identified by persons familiar with his history as Tim Schweitzer. He reportedly worked in Vietnam for the Defense Intelli-

gence Agency during the war and later was stationed in Phnom Penh, Cambodia. There, he reportedly told friends, he was the person who destroyed classified files and other sensitive documents when the United States closed its embassy just before communist Khmer Rouge rebels captured the city in 1975.

He later worked in Bangkok for the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, organizing assistance for Vietnamese boat people who had been attacked by Thai pirates, according to intelligence sources. Now officially retired from govern-

ment service, he returned to Vietnam to direct a charitable organization that donated medical supplies and equipment, an activity permitted under the terms of the U.S. embargo on trade with Vietnam.

Accounts varied as to the exact position Schweitzer occupies in Vietnam. One intelligence source said he is under contract to the Vietnamese government to research the history of its army and assist in sorting military archives. Another source said he approached the Vietnamese and asked for access to the material for his book.

In any case, he reportedly came across the

photos while working openly in Hanoi's military museum.

The Defense Intelligence Agency, which is the Pentagon agency responsible for tracking down information about the fate of 2,666 servicemen still listed as unaccounted for from the 13-year war, learned as early as last February that the material had become available, intelligence sources said.

A presidential mission headed by retired Army Gen. John Vessey was in Vietnam last weekend to discuss the material with the Vietnamese government.

Vaccine test didn't create AIDS virus

NEW YORK (AP) — The possibility that the AIDS virus arose from the testing of a polio vaccine in Africa 35 years ago is extremely low, a panel of scientists reported Thursday.

The most telling evidence against this is the case of a British sailor who apparently was infected with the AIDS virus before the vaccine testing began, the committee said.

"It can be stated with almost complete certainty that the large polio vaccine trial began late in 1957 in (what was then the Belgian) Congo was not the origin of AIDS," the committee said.

The scientists had been asked by the Wistar Institute of Philadelphia to investigate the possibility of a link, which was raised earlier this year by the magazine Rolling Stone. The vaccine was developed by former Wistar director Dr. Hilary Koprowski.

The vaccine used live polio virus grown in monkey kidney cells. The article suggested that a monkey virus may have contaminated those cells and been accidentally administered along with the vaccine, and that once in humans, the monkey virus may have evolved into the AIDS virus.

Prior research suggests that AIDS began in Africa and that the AIDS virus, called HIV-1, evolved from a monkey virus called SIV.

The committee was co-chaired by Dr. Claudio Basiglio of the New York University School of Medicine and Frank Lilly of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York.

Despite its conclusion, it recommended testing remaining samples of the polio vaccine for SIV "so that no stone is left unturned." But the scientists said that for technical reasons they doubted such testing would be conclusive.

The British seaman died in 1959, and researchers later found he had been infected with HIV-1. Although he had traveled to Africa and so could have been infected there, he had returned to England before the vaccine testing began in late 1957, the committee said.

The man developed symptoms in 1958, and given the long incubation time of the virus, he was probably infected many years before, Basiglio said in a telephone interview.

Moreover, the committee said, it is highly unlikely that the monkey SIV could have evolved enough to become HIV-1 within two years; the gap between the polio testing and the seaman's death.

The committee also said there was little chance SIV or HIV-1 could infect a person after being squirted into the mouth along with the polio vaccine.

The scientists also said the possible presence of SIV or a related virus in the vaccine cannot be discounted.

'Blazing Saddles' star Little dies

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Cleavon Little, who played the black sheriff who took on a redneck town in the smash 1974 comedy "Blazing Saddles," died of colon cancer at his home Thursday, his talent agency said.

Little was 53, said Doug Smith, an assistant to Little's agent.

In addition to his starring role in the Mel Brooks comedy, the actor won a Tony award on Broadway and appeared regularly in the television shows "The David Frost Revue," "Temperatures Rising," "Bagdad Cafe" and "True Colors."

"Blazing Saddles," a biting satire on racism, is considered one of Hollywood's top comedies. Comedian Richard Pryor was one of the authors of the screenplay.

Little played a palomino-riding railroad worker who teamed up with an alcoholic gunslinger (Gene Wilder) to save a town from a corrupt attorney.

Harvey Korman played the attorney, Brooks himself played a governor in cahoots with Korman, and Madeline Kahn did a parody of Marlene Dietrich.

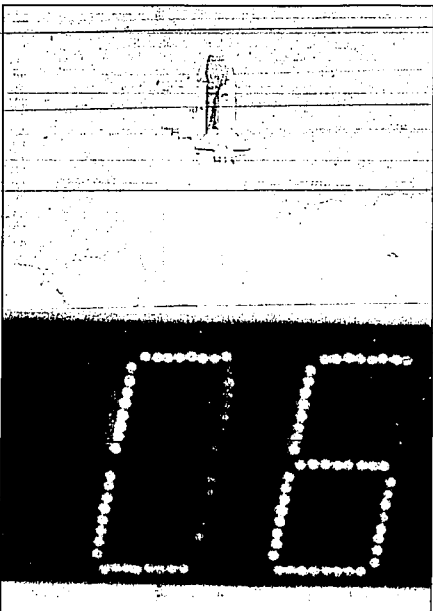

Gene flaw linked to type 1 of Alzheimer's

WASHINGTON (AP) — A defect in a third chromosome has been linked to Alzheimer's disease, a discovery that shows there may be a variety of biological pathways leading to the brain disease afflicting 4 million Americans.

University of Washington researchers studying a form of Alzheimer's that strikes early and only in rare families have found that the disease is linked to genes found in one arm of chromosome 14. Earlier studies had linked other inherited forms of the disease to chromosomes 21 and 19.

A study on the chromosome 14 finding is to be published Friday in the journal Science, put out by the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Experts said the new finding firms up the idea that there could be a variety of different processes, working in subtly different ways, that result in Alzheimer's.

"The finding both complicates and potentially clarifies research into the cause of Alzheimer's," said Dr. Gene D. Cohen, the acting director of the National Institute of Aging.

He said it complicates efforts to follow the biological events that lead to the disease, but it also could help researchers find a key point in the Alzheimer's disease process where the effects of the flawed genes intersect.

Dr. Gerard Schellenberg, leader of the University of Washington research team, said the group screened more

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Columbia's second mission into space with six astronauts and a laser-reflecting satellite Thursday after NASA waived a flight rule and launched the shuttle despite excessive wind gusts.

"The Flagship of the fleet is back in space again," shuttle commander James Webber said moments after NASA's oldest shuttle reached orbit.

High crosswinds at Kennedy Space Center's emergency-landing strip delayed liftoff nearly two hours. NASA pressed forward with the launch even though gusts exceeded the allowable limit of 17 mph by 7 mph, and Columbia soared into a clear sky at 11:09 a.m. MDT.

Shuttle deputy director Brewster Shaw said he and other mission managers decided to launch Columbia because the average speed of the wind was within limits.

Not everyone at NASA agreed — flight director Jeff Bantle at Mission Control in Houston voiced concern in the final minutes before liftoff.

"We accepted Jeff's recommendation and we made a management decision that went in a different direction," Shaw said.

"That sometimes happens in this business."

Shaw, a former shuttle commander, said that if Columbia had to return to Kennedy because of main engine failure, the landing would have been safe despite the wind. The gusts occurred about every minute and lasted up to seven seconds, he said.

"When we finally decided to go we were confident that we'd made the right decision," agreed launch director Bob Sieck.

Shaw said he doubted the flight rule would be changed. The rule has been in place since long before the

1986 Challenger disaster, which led to more stringent launch requirements.

Columbia's 10-day mission is the 51st shuttle flight for NASA and the 26th since the Challenger accident.

Once settled in orbit, the crew of five Americans and one Canadian prepared for their first major task, release of the Laser Geodynamics Satellite, or Lageos. Geologists hope to track the slow drifting of continents by firing laser beams at the satellite and measuring the time it takes for the pulses to be reflected back to Earth.

The aluminum and brass ball, just 2 feet in diameter but weighing 900 pounds, was to be freed from the cargo bay Friday morning. The satellite is studded with 426 prisms, giving it the appearance of a golf ball.

Italy's space agency made Lageos as well as an attached rocket to boost the satellite into a 3,666-mile-high orbit.

The satellite itself cost \$4 million while the satellite booster cost \$120 million. Italian and U.S. space officials estimate the cost of the entire project at \$160 million.

Lageos is identical to a satellite launched by NASA on an unmanned rocket in 1976. It is expected to provide more accurate information on the movement of Earth's crustal plates and, as a result, improve scientists' understanding of earthquakes.

NASA repeatedly has defended the decision to launch the newest Lageos from a shuttle rather than an unmanned rocket, which would have been cheaper and not risked lives. The space agency estimates the average cost of a shuttle mission at \$409 million.

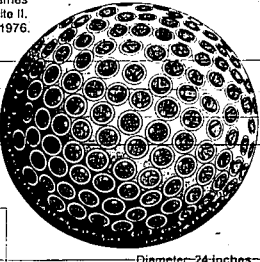

agreement with Italy before the Challenger disaster to fly the booster being used for Lageos. "This is a continuation of that commitment," he said.

After deploying Lageos, the astronauts will perform medical, metallographic and ozone experiments, keep tabs on 12 rats flying as a part of a bone loss study, and test a Canadian robotic vision system designed for the shuttle arm.

The vision system is expected to improve the precision with which

astronauts can use the crane to lift objects and, eventually, build space station Freedom.

The mission is scheduled to end Nov. 1.

Health officials argue over TB risk in hospitals

ATLANTA (AP) — Public health officials and doctors argued Thursday over whether hospitals need tougher rules to help stem the spread of tuberculosis, such as requiring employees to wear battery-powered respirators.

"Nobody knows how many hospitals follow 1990 guidelines laid down by the Centers for Disease Control, they said, although there have been no reported cases of TB infection in a hospital that does.

"In an occupational setting where precautions are not being consistently implemented, there's risk," said Dr. James Hughes, chief of the federal agency's infectious diseases program.

The CDC convened a two-day

meeting of doctors for advice on whether new steps were needed to halt the spread of TB within hospitals.

Tuberculosis is on the rebound after years of decline, partly because of AIDS victims' increased susceptibility to the disease. In 1990, there were 25,701 TB cases reported.

At least 10 million Americans are infected with TB, but only about 10 percent will actually develop the disease. Active TB is highly contagious, spread by coughing or sneezing, but is usually treatable. However, in recent years, drug-resistant strains have developed and deaths have increased.

The CDC already recommends that hospitals quickly isolate patients suspected of having TB in special rooms

that circulate contaminated air outside, and that hospital workers wear disposable face masks while treating them.

In September, the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health urged the CDC to recommend that workers wear battery-powered personal respirators when dealing with infectious TB patients.

But hospital representatives predicted Thursday that the proposal would cost a typical 300-bed hospital about \$200,000, and said there's no proof that workers have been infected in hospitals that follow the current rules.

"I'm not aware of any," agreed Dr. Samuel Dooley of the CDC.

Many hospitals can't afford the

current rules, said Dr. Rebecca Wurtz, who had to use window fans to help draw contaminated air out of isolation rooms at the pre-World War I Cook County Hospital in Chicago.

Stopping TB's spread could be as easy as putting televisions and telephones into isolation rooms so the patients don't get bored and leave, said Dr. Rachel Stricof.

Researcher's now are trying to isolate the specific gene that causes the Alzheimer's, he said.

Humans have between 50,000 and 100,000 genes distributed among 23 pairs of chromosomes. Schellenberg said his team has narrowed the search down to between 50 and 100 genes in one arm of the chromosome.

"The haystack is a lot smaller now," he said.

Schellenberg said that once the gene is located, scientists then could learn the biological effects that are controlled or influenced by the gene. This, in turn, could help them discover the cascade of cellular events that leads to Alzheimer's.

Bush 'overstatement' has handlers scrambling

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush said Thursday he may have "overstated it" when he asserted in Monday's debate with rival presidential hopefuls that no U.S. technology was used in Iraq's nuclear weapons program.

The State Department, meanwhile, scrambled to correct a spokesman's misstatement on the same subject.

The government is investigating U.S.-made equipment found at nuclear development sites in Iraq after the Gulf War, officials said Wednesday.

Bush said in the presidential campaign debate that "there hasn't been one single scintilla of evidence that there's any U.S. technology involved in it." But the former head of the U.N. nuclear inspections team in Iraq disputed that statement.

"Maybe I overstated it a little bit," Bush said in a "CBS This Morning" interview Thursday. "Now, if somebody illegally has

moved some (technology) without the knowledge of the U.S. government, some foreign country or something, why, that would be an offense."

The Customs Service, the Pentagon and the Commerce Department are investigating U.S. equipment discovered at Iraqi nuclear sites by inspectors from the United Nations.

The findings under investigation include an electron-beam welding machine that was shipped to Iraq in 1988 under a Commerce Department license that allowed it to be used only for general military purposes.

The State Department issued a statement Thursday correcting spokesman Richard Boucher's earlier denial that the government had issued an export license for the welder. Boucher told reporters Wednesday that the equipment must have been "smuggled or illegally diverted to Iraq."

Relations with Vietnam far off

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush on Thursday praised Vietnam's willingness to cooperate in accounting for missing American servicemen but said he doesn't see normal relations with Hanoi in the near future.

Bush left the impression in an interview with CBS that there will be no decision on normalizing relations before his term in office — meaning a decision may fall to Democrat Bill Clinton if Bush is defeated.

The president reaffirmed that normalizing relations with Vietnam will be linked to Hanoi's cooperation in accounting for the MIAs and hinted that an exchange of ambassadors could depend on whether Hanoi moves toward democracy.

The United States has never had diplomatic relations with the Hanoi government and maintains a trade embargo against Vietnam.

"I must be satisfied as president that all obstacles about POWs and MIAs have been removed," Bush said in explaining his requirements for extending diplomatic recognition.

He described as a "little optimistic" an account in Thursday's editions of the Los Angeles Times that relations could be established within two to three months.

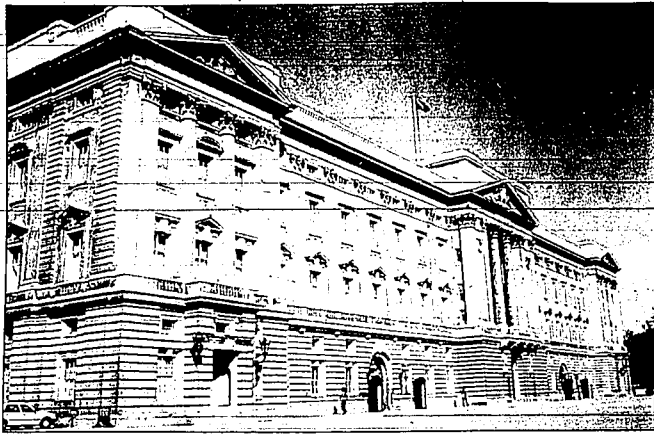

Buckingham Palace's inside story: Bed Goers, Backstairs Pages



Brian Hoey's latest book, 'All the Queen's Men,' says Buckingham Palace is made up of 361 rooms, 78 bathrooms and toilets, 45 acres of gardens and is run by a staff of 300.

LONDON (AP) — The Cobweb Cleaner and the Spider Catcher have faded into history, but among the staff of 300 at Buckingham Palace are such curiosities as the Pages of the Backstairs.

The titles of Yeoman Bed Hanger and the Yeoman Bed Goer carry on at Buckingham Palace, though it has been two centuries since those senior members were actually required to search the royal bed each night for signs of intruders and treachery.

"Some of the titles, like those of the Glass and Chintz Parity, seem incongruous in a modern organization," Brian Hoey writes in his new book about the royal household, "All the Queen's Men" (HarperCollins).

The titles may sound as if they spring from the pages of a history book, which indeed they have. Many of them originated in medieval times, but the men who hold them today play as vital a role in the organization of the monarch's domestic life as ever in the past.

The most vital, if pay is the measure, is the Yeoman of the Stair. Hoey says his salary is secret to avoid provoking jealousy in the kitchen.

domestic servant, carries a ruler to measure the correct distance between knives, forks and spoons at banquets.

"The only criterion in the kitchens is perfection: the Brussels sprouts at a banquet must all be the same size," Hoey wrote.

The same goes for the footmen. Some of the elaborate servants' liveries cost \$1,600 and may be 100 years old, hence the necessity for same-size footmen for state occasions: 5 feet, 9 inches with a 38-inch chest.

The palace has 361 rooms — including a cinema for the queen and a room for her corgi dogs — and 78 bathrooms and toilets, Hoey said.

Servants bow or bob whenever they meet a member of the royal family, except private secretaries who meet with them several times a day.

By tradition, the 26 householders who dust and clean must not be seen by their royal highnesses at all, and are obliged to dodge into alcoves or hide behind curtains "if someone comes along."

Hoey, a specialist writer on the court, says he collected his information over the years from members of the royal household, on the understanding that he would not identify

his informers. Running the British monarchy costs the queen and the state about \$1.6 billion a week.

Among the information dug out by Hoey is that the servants are not allowed on the 45 acres of the palace gardens.

The royal family, and the staff have the same food. Kitchen sinks are wooden to avoid chipping crystal glasses and delicate china.

Hoey says that all the staff work together to ensure the monarchy runs like a well-oiled machine.

"If you are a member of the staff, if you are the person you telephone if you want to see the queen."

There are four Pages of the Backstairs — two for queen and two for Prince Philip.

Minister snubs Hong Kong official

BEIJING (AP) — Foreign Minister Qian Qichen lectured Hong Kong's governor on Thursday and refused to shake his hand to protest proposals for greater democracy in the British territory before it reverts to Chinese rule.

Premier Li Peng snubbed Gov. Chris Patten, refusing to meet with him. Qian accused Patten of trying to provoke the Beijing government and repeated China's claim that the governor's proposals violate an agreement to transfer Hong Kong from British to Chinese rule in 1997.

Patten maintains his proposed reforms do not violate the agreement.

It appeared Patten would end his first visit to Beijing on Friday without managing to shore up investor confidence in Hong Kong. Continued sniping between the two sides eventually could threaten the territory's standing as a thriving Asian financial hub.

Patten, in a rare after-11:30 hours of talks with Chinese officials, insisted that the political reforms he proposed two weeks ago are in the best interests of Hong Kong.

The reforms would give residents a larger role in electing legislators and reduce the power of special interest groups dominated by China. The voting age would be lowered from 21 to 18.

Patten could implement the plan without Chinese approval, but China has indicated it would reverse the changes after 1997.

Britain, which has controlled Hong Kong for 150 years, agreed in 1984 to return the territory to Chinese sovereignty. China promised to preserve Hong Kong's capitalist system for at least 50 years, but many residents and foreign businessmen are skeptical.

"Those proposals are in the interests of the stability, prosperity and way of life of Hong Kong," Patten told a news conference after his meeting with Qian. "If I didn't think that, I wouldn't have put them forward."

Peacekeepers, rebels battle in Liberia

MONROVIA, Liberia (AP) — West African peacekeepers fired barrages of artillery shells at rebels besieging this refugee-choked capital Thursday, and their warplanes reportedly bombed the rebels' headquarters in the interior.

The air raid on the base of rebel

leader Charles Taylor could signal all-out war between the 7,000-man peacekeeping force and the rebels.

It came after a week of escalating fighting around Monrovia, and the seven nations that have provided troops for the force have been rushing in reinforcements and weapons.

Commanders of the West-African force could not be contacted for comment on developments Thursday. Regular communications in the city have been disrupted by the fighting. Taylor also did not issue a statement.

Smoke-loving French ready for tough law

PARIS (AP) — Smoke-filled bistros and cafes, an inimitable part of the French image, are likely to become battlegrounds in a war of wills when an anti-smoking law takes effect Nov. 1.

Confusion and outrage seem certain before the air clears.

Restaurants, hotels and offices are preparing frenetically for the new regime. But in a country where many view smoking as among life's pleasures, where the pungent odor of state-produced black tobacco abounds, not everyone is enthusiastic.

Salesmen peddling ventilation equipment "are descending on companies like a flock of sparrows," said Jacques The, president of the National Hotel Industry Federation.

The law outlawing smoking in many enclosed places, strengthens smoking regulations already in effect in public transport, and demands that those in charge of enclosed public areas "assure the protection of non-smokers."

"It's aberrant, stupid," Germaine Bourrel, owner of the Cafe St-Philippe, said of the law. "People go to a cafe to relax, have a cigarette, talk. It's part of life."

Queen receives mixed reception in city ruined by bombing raids

DRESDEN, Germany (AP) — Crowds greeted Britain's Queen Elizabeth II on Thursday with applause and jeers as she sought reconciliation with this German city destroyed by British and U.S. bombing raids in World War II.

The queen and her husband, Prince Philip, took part in a prayer service in a reconstructed church that recalled the massive civilian casualties the air war inflicted on German cities.

U.N. team on prowl for arms

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — U.N. inspectors are visiting sugar mills, rummaging through junk piles and walking through underground tunnels in search of weapons that Iraq leader Saddam Hussein may be hiding.

Iraq says it has no more weapons of mass destruction — such as ballistic missiles or chemical bombs — but Western intelligence reports say otherwise. Baghdad's previous claims about its arsenal, such as the denial it was working on nuclear weapons, have been shown false by earlier U.N. inspections.

"We are going everywhere to make sure that weapons of mass destruction are discovered," said Nikolai Smidovich, the Russian leader of the latest U.N. team to hunt for Iraqi weapons.

The team is the largest yet to visit Iraq under terms of the Gulf War cease-fire, which require Iraq to destroy its long-range missiles and chemical weapons and dismantle its nuclear and biological weapons programs.

Tensions were high before the team arrived a week ago. Iraqi officials and news media sharply criticized the visit, contending the inspectors might provoke an incident before the U.S. elections to help President Bush's re-election campaign. But the inspectors have not reported any confrontations.

"The operation is unique, a very delicate task," said Kevin St. Louis, an American who is the chief field officer for the U.N. weapons program. "The world may not see an operation like this again, I hope."

Many of Iraq's surface-to-surface missiles were destroyed by allied bombing during the Gulf War and others have been wrecked under U.N. supervision since. But Iraq is still suspected of having 50 to 200 Scuds hidden away, mainly in camouflaged underground shelters built before the war.

The team has traveled to some sites, including two sugar factories, a cement plant, a junk yard and a trash heap near a military base west of Baghdad. They also have used U.N. helicopters, flying as low as 150 feet.

Moscow police seize guns, drugs

MOSCOW (AP) — Police seized guns and drugs and an underground passage near a McDonald's restaurant in central Moscow on Thursday.

It was part of a crackdown on Moscow crime, which rose by one-third in the first half of 1992 compared with the same period last year, according to law enforcement officials.

Police were especially interested in checking documents of people from the Caucasus region, a mountainous area on the southern border with Russia known for arms and drug trafficking.

More than 100 people from Azerbaijan, Georgia and other Caucasus areas were checked during the five-hour raid on the Rossiya hotel at the Pushkin Square area, police said.

The raid was staged three days after a grenade exploded at a police station near the Moscow McDonald's, injuring a 5-year-old girl and seven other people.

Irish for change in abortion ban

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP) — Almost half of Irish voters favor changing the constitutional ban on abortion, according to a poll published Thursday.

The Irish vote on Dec. 3 on whether women should have the right to abortion information and to travel abroad for the procedure.

Abortion and information about it are outlawed in this overwhelmingly Roman Catholic country.

According to the survey, 48 percent of those polled support permitting abortion in cases in which the pregnant woman's life is at risk. Thirty-four percent were against the proposal, and 18 percent were undecided.

Collision leaves 31 dead

RABAT, Morocco (AP) — A bus and truck collided near the southern city of Khemis Zemamri, killing 31 people and seriously injuring 27, the official MAP news agency reported Thursday.

The head-on collision Wednesday on the narrow road linking the seaside resort of Ajadir with El Jajida occurred as the truck was passing another vehicle.

All of the victims were Moroccan.

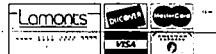

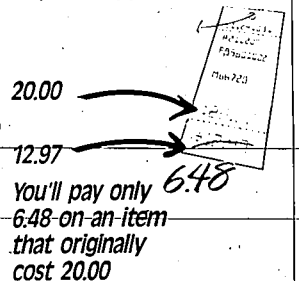

Bevan offers competence, energy in prosecutor job

Remember when the race for prosecuting attorney in rock-ribbed Republican Twin Falls County used to be routine and predictable?

Democrat Golden Bennett and the various Republicans who vied to succeed K. Ellen Baxter in the prosecutor's office certainly changed that.

Bennett has kept attention on his campaign, with his threats of lawsuits and with his anointment of former-Gooding County prosecutor Lynn Nelson as his prospective chief deputy without getting Nelson's permission first. (Nelson, a loyal Republican, was horrified.)

Before that, former Deputy Prosecutor Frank Nichols' vocal support for the grand jury process, his inability to make grand jury indictments stick and his fondness for blaming Public Defender Mike Wood lent a three-ring-circus atmosphere to the GOP primary.

Fortunately, out of this election-year sideshow, Twin Falls County may be about to get its best prosecutor in some time.

Rich Bevan, the Republican nominee, has managed to keep not only his dignity in this off-kilter campaign, but also his focus on what the prosecutor ought to be.

It's a vision for a prosecutor's office that works, for a people's lawyer who does the people's business and for a district attorney who puts criminals in jail and not back on the street.

It seems a long time since Twin Falls County has had such a luxury. Baxter's attention to the prosecutor's job has been flagging

steadily for the past couple of years. These days she's concentrated on teaching college classes and arranging for her career after she leaves office.

Her tenure perhaps reached a low point in August, when she argued in court that Jodie Ann Hostetler should receive a more lenient sentence than a state investigator had recommended in connection with the death of Hostetler's 2-year-old daughter.

Meanwhile, the county's record-for-child-abuse prosecution is the state's worst, people arrested for drug crimes go free because the county can't get evidence back in time, and civil cases are farmed out to private attorneys.

If he's elected, Bevan will be a breath of fresh air. He has said he'll treat the job as what it is, the third-largest law firm in the Magic Valley, with professional standards and professional expectations.

Bevan wants to make supervision of young deputy prosecutors, who do the lion's share of the work in county prosecutors' offices in Idaho, a priority. But any prosecutor's office is only as good as the lawyer who runs it, and in that respect Twin Falls County will be getting an A-list attorney if it chooses Bevan.

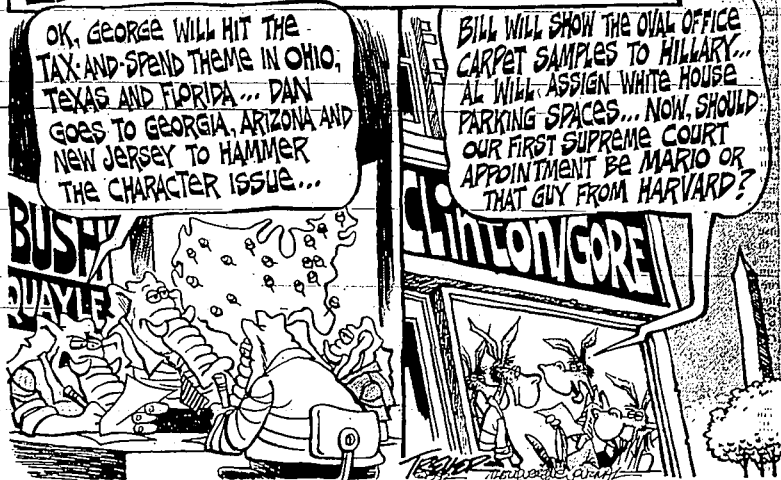
Bennett, as colorful a candidate as he may be, is not in the same class. We need a county attorney who is capable of delivering energy and competence in an office that has been just going through the motions for too long.

There are about 1,000 taxing districts in the state of Idaho, each one run by a board elected by you the people. Each district is required by law to make up a proposed budget and publish it and then hold a public hearing on it. If you fail to attend that budget hearing, you are just the same as telling that district what they do is OK with you.

Remember, all your property taxes go to operate the district in which it is collected. The only ones who should have any say as to how those tax dollars are spent are the ones living in that particular district, not the state of Idaho. It was only the second coroner's jury in 30 years in Lincoln County.

JEROME — The four-county regional E 911 board will start negotiating with a Jerome partnership to lease-purchase a dispatch center for the system.

A group called Jerome Partners II of Magic Valley submitted a bid for a monthly lease of \$4,145 and the E 911 board decided Wednesday night to start negotiating with the group, project manager Al Sandner said.

The partnership would construct a building in the Jerome Industrial Park, Sandner said. The building would measure 3,300 square feet with a radio transmission tower.

Sandner said the E 911 region now needs to know whether the city of Twin Falls will stay in the region. City officials have said they want more information about the plan.

Twin Falls city officials also do not like the district bylaws that prohibit locating the dispatch center in Twin Falls.

Burley BLM seeks comment on list of rivers to protect

TWIN FALLS — The Bureau of Land Management plans to list potential wild and scenic rivers in the Burley District, a BLM spokeswoman said Wednesday.

Terri Stubbs of the Burley BLM said she plans to determine if rivers, or stretches of them, are eligible for the designation.

Is Hagerman water safe to drink?

HAGERMAN — How many residents are buying bottled water in Hagerman right now depends on whom they believe.

The mayor said Wednesday the water is safe to drink, but a state official said Thursday it's not.

The boil-water order lifted Wednesday by Mayor Jim Martin shouldn't have been, a Division of Environmental Quality official said Thursday. "The real crux of the problem is the mayor doesn't lift boil orders; it's the division that does," said Greg Misbach, DEQ's supervisor for prevention and certification in Twin Falls.

The order was issued by the DEQ earlier this week after the town's old chlorinator broke down, and the water tested positive for bacteria.

But Martin said again Thursday that the water is OK to drink because the town's new chlorinator was back on line.

However, he acknowledged, he shouldn't have issued the all-clear order until he got

permission to do so.

"We can't lift the order until (a DEQ official) sends us a certified letter and says we can," Martin said.

"Everybody's drinking it down here, but we can't say the order is lifted until the DEQ says it is lifted."

Misbach said the problem is that state law mandates water samples need to be

tested for two days.

He added it's possible there will be continuing problems with Hagerman's water — and the boil-water order may not come off through the weekend.

He said that assessment was based on a lab worker's observation of some water samples taken Thursday.

Those results will be ready Friday about noon when the department will issue a determination of water safety, Misbach said.

"If the system is clean tomorrow, (the order) could be lifted," Misbach said. "There is some indication—it's a possibility they may not be clean."

New canyonside retirement village shuns 'institution' label

TWIN FALLS — The jukebox is stocked with Perry Como and Bing Crosby records, there are fireplaces on every floor and the wallpaper is mauve, coral and burgundy.

"There is nothing about BridgeView that says 'institution,' absolutely nothing," said Sandra Schafer, marketing director of Health Resources Inc., the Portland, Ore.-based company that manages the new 155-unit canyonside retirement village. "Everything about it says this is their home, we care and we want to help," Schafer said.

On Thursday, construction and landscaping workers were putting the finishing touches on the tiled \$6 million structure east of the Magic Valley Mall in preparation for the facility's Sunday grand opening.

The business, which will eventually employ 125 workers, already has filled 45 percent of its apartments, said Julie Conrad, BridgeView's general manager and administrator.

Some residents have already moved in from as far away as Florida. Many are returning to their native Idaho because BridgeView meets their needs, Conrad said. The cost ranges from \$1,050 for retirement studio apartments to \$4,550 for private-health center rooms.

BridgeView, owned by Campbell Homes of Wenatchee, Wash., is the first facility in Twin Falls that offers three levels of care for seniors: 60 retirement apartments, 35 assisted-retirement apartments and 60 health-center rooms, Schafer said.

Each level has its own dining room and entrance lobby. The retirement area — with studio, one-bedroom and two-bedroom apartments — includes covered parking and outside patios.

The rooms each have a refrigerator and a stove, although residents can eat three meals a day in a dining room if they choose. Breakfast and lunch are served cafeteria-style and waiters serve dinner.

The retirement section also has a beauty and barber shop, a library, an exercise room and a game room with a pool table. Residents can reserve a banquet room for special family events and have meals of their choice brought to them along with a birthday cake.

Each room throughout the BridgeView complex — decorated with the residents' own furniture and wall hangings — is

equipped with all lights in the bedroom and the bathroom. All BridgeView residents can use transportation services and participate in regular activities.

The advantage of BridgeView is that when residents require additional assistance, they can move to a different level within the complex and not to another nursing home away from friends, Schafer said.

The assisted-living apartments offer all the amenities of the retirement apartments along with more hands-on help, including medicine monitoring, special physician-ordered diets, help for dressing and regular security visits.

The health center wing has a medical director, and provides 24-hour nursing care, social services, occupational therapy and speech therapy.

Lawyer continues assault on sheriff's character

JEROME — Allegations of intimidation against Sheriff Larry Gold continued Wednesday at the Jerome County Courthouse.

Public Defender M. Lynn Dunlap continued attacking Gold's character in an effort to persuade a judge to dismiss felony charges against two of his clients.

"I knew he would try to paint me as an

evil villain," Gold said after the day's testimony was over.

Specifically, Dunlap is trying to prove that Gerie Mae Rolyson was intimidated by an undercover informant into buying drugs in January.

He also represents that informant, John Morris, who left a work release assignment in July after being sentenced for aggravated battery.

Dunlap said Morris was afraid of Gold and left for his own safety.

He called several witnesses to the stand who testified they had been intimidated by Gold.

Fifth District Magistrate Roger Burdick, who sentenced Morris, said Gold asked him two or three times to grant probation and a withheld judgment for Morris so he could continue his undercover drug work.

One of those conversations happened when Gold followed the judge into the courthouse elevator and stopped it between floors, Burdick said.

"All I wanted to do was extricate myself from the position," Burdick said. He felt he was being "imprisoned, quite frankly, in the elevator."

Burdick added that it was the only time he could recall Gold having such a conversation with him outside the presence of an attorney.

William Hicks of Eden said he and roommate Dale Clew called Gold in November and asked the sheriff to keep

Attorney race takes spotlight in Rupert

RUPERT — Eight candidates running for four elective offices took part Thursday in a Minidoka County candidates' forum, but for much of the evening, it was a one-woman show.

Nuke train hasn't reached Idaho borders

Thursday evening the train was expected to reach Pocatello early Friday morning.

TWIN FALLS — A train carrying spent reactor fuel destined for storage at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory did not arrive in Idaho Thursday as expected.

The train was sighted in Wyoming Thursday by activists tracking the secret shipment of Navy reactor fuel. Thursday evening it was expected to reach Pocatello early Friday morning.

The train may have been delayed by speed restrictions on poor track sections and by other safety related speed or route restrictions.

The train is believed by a nationwide network of activists to carry spent reactor fuel from the Navy's Knolls Atomic Power Laboratory near Albany, N.Y. The reactor is being revamped to train naval personnel in the operation of the new Sea Wolf class of nuclear submarines.

But government officials will not disclose details of the shipment's

schedule or route. Activists must depend on sightings and general information about train routes, speeds and travel times.

They charge that it's foolish to drag highly radioactive waste around the country on raily that in some places are in such poor condition that trains must inch along to avoid accidents.

Union Pacific Railroad spokesman Alex Tice said that poor track condition may not be the only reason for speed restrictions on the "nuke train."

"Nobody wants to have an accident with something so sensitive," Tice said.

But people expressing their concerns over such hazardous

shipments helps insure that extra care is taken when transporting dangerous materials.

The spent fuel shipments are escorted by couriers and treated like nuclear weapons shipments, the Navy says.

Since 1957, the Navy has sent spent fuel from its 158 reactors to INEL for storage at INEL's Idaho Chemical Processing Plant - ICPP.

The most recent figures available show the totals at 265 tons of spent fuel stored in water-filled basins; 2 million gallons of dissolved fuel — an intensely radioactive liquid — stored in underground steel tanks, and more than 127,000 cubic feet of radioactive powder, already solidified from the liquid.

INEL officials say that in the future the number of shipments will increase only slightly, while the amount of spent fuel in those shipments will

more than double over the next ten years.

Information given to the governor's office says despite the anticipated increase, "existing ICPP storage facilities adequate for over 30 years."

Meanwhile, an environmental impact statement covering the change of the chemical plant from a spent fuel reprocessing facility to a storage and research and development facility says, "there is a need to increase existing storage capacity for ongoing and proposed new receipts."

Government officials say naval-fuel activities in Idaho contribute to national security. They help insure that nuclear powered warships can be refueled and return to sea in a timely manner. INEL operations also help improve fuel design, which in turn makes those warships more efficient.

The Naval Reactors Facility at INEL is the "mainstay" of the federal Energy Department's presence in Idaho, officials say.

Activist cautions against casino gambling

TWIN FALLS — Legal casinos in Idaho would end up hurting the very people they are intended to help, a Chicago city activist said Thursday.

Terry Brunner, executive director of Chicago's Better Government Association, says the Illinois metropolis is considering casino gambling for the same reason some Idaho Indian tribes are: economic revitalization.

But Brunner, whose association has issued a 150-page report highly critical of the Chicago proposal, says the BGA's research shows casinos offer merely the illusion of development.

"Real economic development produces something. Gambling produces nothing," said Brunner, a

former federal prosecutor in Illinois and Pennsylvania. "This is a way for society to avoid investing in low-income communities, whether they're on the South Side of Chicago or Indian reservations in Idaho."

Backers of the proposed constitutional amendment to ban casino gambling in Idaho brought Brunner to Idaho to boost their uphill campaign. He also spoke in Idaho Falls, Boise, Lewiston and Coeur d'Alene.

The amendment, which would ban casino-style games but not affect the Idaho Lottery, has trailed in several public-opinion polls, including one published by *The Times-News* this week.

In that poll, 48 percent of the likely Magic Valley voters surveyed said they would vote against the proposed amendment, while 38 percent said

they would vote for it. Using a 1988 federal law, several Idaho Indian tribes have expressed interest in starting or expanding gambling operations on their lands, saying they offer the best prospect for improving reservation economies.

Dozens of tribes across the nation have already begun their own gaming operations under the law.

They use the same rationale that Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley has used in pushing the casino proposal in his city, Brunner said.

The four-casino "family entertainment center" would be located in a blighted area south of the downtown Loop area. Casino operators promise stable, well-paying jobs, Brunner said, but the reality is different. While casinos do generate large numbers of jobs, he said, the BGA found that the average

Gooding raises rates for sewage upgrade

GOODING — Gooding city residents will soon be paying more in sewage rates.

The improvement plan comes after a mandate from the Environmental Protection Agency cited several inadequacies with the city's sewage plant, said Mayor Dave Adair.

The mandate came as a surprise to city officials, who expected the 10-year-old plant, considered state of the art at one time, to be operable for another ten years before drastic improvements would be needed.

Instead, such inadequacies as over-chlorinated water, inefficient pump stations and improper disposal of solid wastes were cited by the EPA, Adair said.

The mandate gives the city until Dec. 31, 1993, to bring the sewage plant up to fix the faults or be fined \$25,000 per day, Adair said.

The EPA cited the over-chlorination of the water as one of the major faults.

The chlorine kills off the microorganisms that populate the river. The single pump stations were allowing his of sewage to escape on its way to the plant, and a faulty grid chamber was not dispersing the solid waste into a form which would be acceptable for disposal, Adair said.

The city turned the problem over to the consulting firm of Forsgren Associates, who in turn took a TV camera into the sewers to view the problems themselves, Adair said.

The TV showed tree branches grown into the pipelines as well as a weakening in certain parts of the lines, Adair said.

The city also faces the problem of what to do with the mountain of dried sludge that has accumulated because of a faulty grid chamber which did not properly strain the sludge from the water.

Adair said the sludge cannot be returned to the river, while the city has no solid waste disposal area, and the sanitary landfill cannot be used.

The city has opted to install drying beds for the sludge. The solid waste will be, in turn, stored on the sludge mountain, already quite high.

City officials had hoped to contract with farmers of the area to use the sludge as fertilizer since the it has been purified through bacteria or harmful metals that could pollute the ground, Adair said.

The only stipulation states no in-ground use can be permitted for at least two years, he said.

However, the city has yet to get the plan approved by the EPA, Adair said.

The main problem for the city at this point is to find funds to launch the project, Adair said.

So far, city officials have looked to Region 4 and the Division of Environmental Quality. The funding should become finalized by February 1993.

Bids will be taken at this time for the project.

Judge sets Hostetler bond

TWIN FALLS — A district judge set Jodie Ann Hostetler's bond at \$15,000 this week, raising the possibility that the mother of a 2-year-old girl who died in January may be able to bond out of the Twin Falls County jail.

"In this it's possible," said Thomas Kershaw of Twin Falls, her attorney.

The costume was missing, the report stated. The doll was found attached to the trellis signed by the "pumpkin bandits."

Police had reported receiving several complaints about the display, but Garcia told the Mini-Cassia News Service on Tuesday she didn't need to offend anyone by decorating her house for Halloween.

The dolls on the barbecue grill symbolized sinners being punished by the devil, she added.

The display had nothing to do with Baby X, the infant whose body was found mutilated and buried at the Minidoka County landfill in November 1989, she said.

Burley renews insurance plan

BURLEY - The city of Burley renewed its health insurance contract for its 73 employees at this week's City Council meeting, although the deductible workers pay will rise.

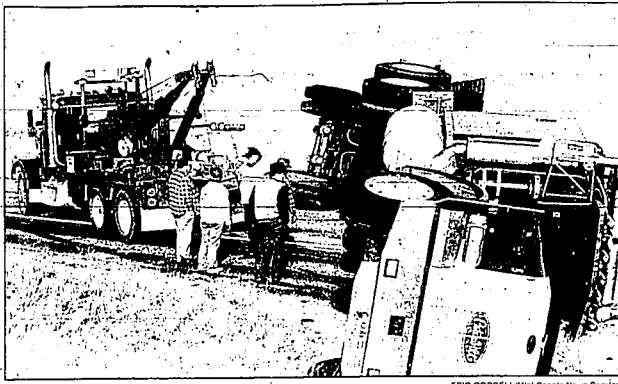
Mayor Frank Bauman said if the city kept its current health insurance program, costs would have increased by 23 percent.

Board OKs funds that may help Twin Falls, meets today in Burley

TWIN FALLS - A new federally financed program that will provide money for things like bicycle paths and greenbelts was approved by the Idaho Transportation Board Thursday, opening the possibility that funds will be available to pay for an ambitious Twin Falls project in the future.

A committee of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce has drawn up a wish list of 53.6 million in projects, including 39 miles of landscaping and 22.5 miles of bike-path projects.

If the projects meet the specifications of the board's guidelines, which will be drawn up

soon, Twin Falls might be in line for some of the federal funds, board members said.

The board, making its annual visit to the Magic Valley, also heard pitches for highway projects from the chamber's transportation committee, including the long-sought U.S. Highway 93 bypass and up to a half dozen turning lanes along Highway 93 between Twin Falls and Jackpot.

The bypass, designed to relieve traffic on Blue Lakes Boulevard North in Twin Falls, is on the Idaho Transportation Department's to-do list, but the timing will be affected in part by the availability of federal funding, board members said.

In other business, the board:

• Heard a bid from Jack Ramsey of the Bull Economic Development Council for improvements to the five-point intersection at Highway 30 and Clear Lake Road west of Bull to reduce safety problems.

• Discussed the possibility of a combination rest-area-visitor center at Malad Gorge State Park with Yvonne Ferrell, director of the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation.

The board will conclude its Magic Valley visit with a meeting with the Mini-Cassia Transportation Committee this morning at 9 in the Burley Inn and a second board meeting at 1 p.m. at the Canyon Springs Inn.

Henry's Fork protection debate renews

IDAHO FALLS (AP) - The polarized debate over the future of the Henry's Fork of the Snake River has begun anew.

Conservationists, who supported a protection bill narrowly defeated in the Legislature last winter, now want more miles of stream safeguarded in Fremont and Teton counties. They say a blowout of the Marysville Canal in June and sediment flushed into the Henry's Fork during last

month's draining of Island Park Reservoir illustrate the need to protect rivers in the basin.

Irrigators, suffering through a sixth year of drought, say they need additional water storage and want to compromise on development issues.

Somewhere in between is the Idaho Water Resource Board with a revised Henry's Fork Basin plan to protect 146 miles of the world-renowned river and its tributaries.

Most of the 30 people who testified at Wednesday's public hearing in Idaho Falls supported a proposal that would protect 279 miles of streams in the basin. Another hearing was scheduled Thursday night in St. Anthony.

"I think the 279 (miles) is fair and sound, and I think it will work," said Mary Hoy of Idaho Falls, a member of the Greater Yellowstone Coalition. "People in eastern Idaho want to see it."

Conservationists say they want more miles of stream protected because some segments, including Robison Creek, Birch Creek and parts of the Teton and Fall rivers, were overlooked in the original plan.

Hoy, like many other conservationists, opposes building more reservoirs. He said there isn't enough water in the basin to warrant their construction.

But Dale Swenson, manager of the Fremont-Nadwin Irrigation District, said about 2 million acre-feet of water passes Milner Dam near Burley each year, and some of that water could be captured in the Henry's Fork Basin.

Candidate alleges call to drop race

Newman says former magistrate threatened her with loss of job

RUPERT - An independent candidate for the Minidoka County prosecuting attorney's position says a former 5th District Court magistrate threatened to strip her of her job as county defender if she would not bow out of the prosecutor's race.

Gara Newman, who is running for prosecutor against Republican David R. "Bub" Workman, denied making any such threat, when contacted after the luncheon by the Mini-Cassia News Service.

Newman, speaking before about 40 people, said a recent letter to the editor which appeared in two local newspapers prompted her to make her comments concerning Workman.

The letter, written by local attorney and two-term Minidoka County prosecutor Donald Chisholm, stated that Newman should have resigned her position as county defender several months before the Nov. 3 election, in an effort to avoid possible conflicts of interest with her current clients.

"A lawyer who receives critical information from a defendant cannot later prosecute the same person using the information," Chisholm wrote. "The lawyer must avoid any appearance of impropriety."

Newman said she has taken steps to ensure she will never face a current client, on the same charge, if elected prosecutor.

However, it was that same conflict of interest issue which angered Workman to such a degree that, during a meeting in his chambers on July 17, he threatened her with her job, she said.

"Judge Workman told me to basically get out of the prosecutor's race or you're not practicing in my court room," she said. "Get out of the race, or you'll be out as public defender."

"That statement is entirely false," Workman said from his office at Ling Nielsen & Robinson, the Rupert law firm he joined soon after resigning as magistrate on Oct. 1.

He recalled the meeting, but said he only met with Newman and then-prosecutor Charles Creason Jr. to discuss possible conflicts of interest involving Newman as a public defender running for prosecutor.

Creason said Thursday he too remembered Workman discussing possible conflicts of interest with Newman at the meeting. However, asked if he remembered Workman threatening Newman with her job, Creason said: "No, I don't recall that."

Newman said she followed the advice of the Idaho State Bar Association and used other attorneys in her cases.

She later disqualified Workman from cases she handled in magistrate court and informed all her clients of her political intentions.

Even if given the chance, she would never, as prosecutor, use information provided by a former client against that client, Newman told the chamber audience.

"I just wouldn't do it," she said.

Greyhound restores full bus service to Rupert

RUPERT - After several weeks of providing only partial service, the management of Greyhound bus line has reinstated full service to the city of Rupert.

Bus riders, again may purchase their tickets at Rupert Gas & Oil, located at Idaho 24 and "A" Street.

The city had been without full Greyhound service since July, when Rupert Gas & Oil owner Del Hollinger got into a dispute with Wayne Steele, the husband of regional Greyhound master ticket agent Fifteen Steel of Twin Falls.

The cause of the disagreement is unclear, at the time, Hollinger said. Wayne Steele simply no longer wanted Rupert to be a full-service stop for Greyhound.

Steele simply labeled it "a clash of personalities" and promised a new Rupert ticket agent within a short time.

Hollinger said Thursday the situation was resolved by Rupert Mayor W.F. "Bill" Whitton.

The mayor spoke to Greyhound officials in Salt Lake City and demanded the bus line reinstate ticket sales in Rupert, or discontinue service entirely, Hollinger said.

The bus line stops in Rupert in front of Rupert Gas & Oil.

Although Hollinger did not sell tickets for a period, he continued to fly down buses if riders wished to board and purchase a ticket at Greyhound ticket agencies in either Burley or Snowville, Utah, depending on the direction in which the rider was headed.

A number of people, particularly older residents, rely on Greyhound for a relatively inexpensive transportation out of the area, he added.

Hollinger said selling Greyhound tickets does not provide him with a lucrative source of income, but gives him an opportunity to provide local residents with a public service.

Jerome hires Ross to expand plant

JEROME — The Jerome City Council selected a local firm to expand its Waste Water Treatment Plant to accommodate new waste from the cheese plant.

Ross Enterprises, a Jerome contracting firm, received the \$1.5 million contract Tuesday, beating out six other bidders from construction companies in the Magic and Treasure valleys, City Administrator Larry Paine said.

Although the city is short \$500,000, the work will be paid off through a bond issue voters approved and through grants. Once, the plant starts treating sludge from the soon-to-be-completed Jerome Cheese Co., the firm will start paying the city for the processing.

Increasing the waste treatment plant's capabilities to handle the excessive waste will be done in two steps to stay within the budget, Paine said.

A meeting with engineers will be needed to discuss "the effect of the bid on the existing budget," Paine told the council Tuesday.

Paine said the city came up short on funds while preparing the cost of expanding the treatment plant. The city, he said, had not considered the highest level of waste load that could be sent from the cheese plant.

The problem will be addressed by the council at a special meeting at 5:30 p.m. on Monday.

Turning the wastewater treatment plant over to a private company is one of several alternatives being looked into by the city.

But Alvin Abbott, an employee at the plant, said he dislikes the idea.

"I want to know what's going to happen," Abbott said. "It's my job that will be affected, and I don't sleep nights the way it is now."

Financing the purchase of new water meters for Jerome property owners was approved through West One Bank.

The council had approved spending \$279,335 for the meters, an expense that will be paid off through a 5-year lease plan, Paine told the council.

In other business, the council:
• Heard a report from Chief of Police George Silver III that U.S. West Communications had donated a mini-van to the city police department for use with drug prevention. Sunny, the drug dog, will ride in the van, Silver said.
• Heard a report from Fire Chief Jim Auclair that U.S. West donated a one-ton pickup to the fire department.
• Accepted a \$3,000 grant to purchase video cameras for city patrol cars.

"The cameras will help keep drug dealers and users off the streets," Silver said.
• Heard a report from Silver that the Tri-County Drug Task Force had used the Jerome drug dog effect to help locate and donate \$200 for the "maintenance of Sunny."

• Approved the building inspection program. Clay Davis, and the city fire department to set up a fire prevention program. Under the program Jerome residents can receive a free inspection of homes, including chimneys. For the service, call the department at 324-8189.

• Heard an announcement by Auclair that the fire siren will be sounded at 6 p.m. Saturday to remind Jerome residents to change their clocks and change the batteries in smoke alarms.

• Appointed Kathy Miller as city clerk/treasurer to complete the unexpired two-year term of Helen Paoli. Miller will serve in the position until Jan. 1994, at a salary of \$52,187 per month.

• Council members agreed to waive the water user fees incurred by Amalgamated Sugar Co. during the beet harvest. Council members will review the situation annually in case they change their minds.
• Amalgamated Sugar Co. fills tankers with city water to sprinkle the beet factory property. This is done twice a day during harvest to control dust problems.

The fee that is being waived is currently between \$75 and \$100 during the six- to eight-week harvest.

• Red Ribbon week will take place on October 24-30. Council members agreed to donate \$125 to the anti-drug campaign. Red ribbons will be purchased for city employees and the Filer School District.

Filer trustees officially oppose 1% proposal

• The district's principals presented their accountability Report Cards to the School Board Tuesday evening. The report compiles annual information on test scores, atten-

dance, class size, textbooks and materials, counseling, discipline and other matters.

The report provides a tool for district to chart progress and direct attention to areas of concern. The compiled district report is available at the superintendent's office, and each school's individual report is

available in the principals' office.

• Board members approved the school district's attendance policy at its second reading. The new policy addresses excused absences, being tardy, truancy, scholastic probation, and the disciplinary action taken in the event of truancy or probation. It includes an appeals process.

Suits to ban activities include Camas refuge

WASHINGTON (AP) —

Environmentalists attacking the government's alleged abuses of national wildlife refuges are seeking court orders to halt military exercises, livestock grazing and water recreation on five reserves in the Northwest.

The Wilderness Society, National Audubon Society, Defenders of Wildlife and others filed lawsuits in U.S. District Court in Seattle Thursday over the grazing on the Turnbull National Wildlife Refuge in Washington and the Camas National Wildlife Refuge in Idaho.

They cited harm to wildlife caused by water recreation on the McNary refuge in Washington and the Umatilla refuge along the Columbia River between Washington and Oregon.

They said the most blatant alleged violation of laws governing national wildlife refuges occurs on the Copalis refuge off the coast of Washington north of Gray Harbor, where Navy fighters drop dummy bombs on training missions.

Rob Shallenberger, chief of the Fish and Wildlife Service's refuge division, said efforts are under way to phase out most of the activities that are incompatible with wildlife protection.

"The frustration from the outside is that we are not moving fast enough. I would dispute that. I think we have made major progress," he said.
But the lawsuits allege that the

service has allowed secondary uses of the land to continue despite adverse impact to wildlife — much of the damage documented by the service itself.

"Despite volumes of evidence in its own files... it has done little to address these violations," said John Echeverria, an attorney for the National Audubon Society.

For example, the Navy training missions over Copalis are permitted despite the local refuge manager's conclusion that they are "incompatible" with the refuge's mission.

The Fish and Wildlife Service has made similar "incompatibility" findings concerning livestock grazing on refuges.

On other refuges, the service has determined that motor boating, water skiing, jet skiing and other water recreation harms marine mammals

and washes out waterfowl nests.

"Recreation water sport are something that may sound innocent, but when dealing with waterfowl nesting, that activity can be devastating," said Bob Dreher, an attorney for the Sierra Club Legal Defense Fund.

Here's a look at the four other Northwest refuges:

• **Camas National Wildlife Refuge** covers 10,600 acres in southeastern Idaho, with waterfowl, waterbirds, endangered bald eagles and the endangered peregrine falcon.

The service permits private cattle grazing on two-thirds of the land. The agency "has been aware of the adverse impacts of grazing on wildlife and waterfowl habitat within the refuge for more than a decade," the lawsuit said. "Despite the Fish and Wildlife Service's knowledge of the harm caused by this use, the agency has not eliminated or even substantially reduced the amount of grazing on the refuge."

• **McNary National Wildlife Refuge** covers 3,600 acres along the Columbia River, including eight islands within the river that provide habitat for waterfowl, colony nesting birds and other wildlife.

The service closes the islands to public entry during part of the year. But the Fish and Wildlife Service Compatibility Task Force found in 1990 that beach use and swimming continued to pose a threat to wildlife.

"Considerable loss of wildlife values occur such as displacement, nesting loss, harassment, disturbance and death including reduced survival of young," the refuge manager said.

• **Turnbull National Wildlife Refuge** covers about 15,500 acres of lands and waters southwest of Spokane, Wash. It provides habitat for nesting and migrating waterfowl, including ducks, geese and swans.

The service found in November 1990 that grazing within the refuge "destroys the dense vegetation required for nesting waterfowl and other wildlife, preventing nesting and rendering birds vulnerable to predators, and causes bank erosion in wetlands... decreasing the growth of aquatic animals and plants used by waterbirds as food," the lawsuit said.

The agency concluded that "no sound management tools exist" that could render grazing compatible with the purposes of the refuge. But the service has decided to allow the activity to continue until 1995.

• **Umatilla National Wildlife Refuge** covers 22,000 acres along the Columbia River with large populations of waterfowl and other wildlife.

In February 1991, the refuge manager determined that boating, swimming, water skiing, jet skiing and air boating "resulted in documented displacement and harm to wildlife," the lawsuit said.

Lafferty seeks \$10 million for 'wrongful incarceration'

PROVO, Utah (AP) — Ron Lafferty, facing retrial for his role in the 1984 slaying deaths of his sister-in-law and her baby daughter, has petitioned for release from prison — and \$10 million in damages.

Lafferty, 51, used a pencil to write the petition himself. He then mailed it to the court from Utah State Prison, where he has been incarcerated for eight years.

Meanwhile, 4th District Judge Cullen Y. Christensen on Wednesday once again denied the Utah County Attorney's request to prosecute the case. The state attorney general will now handle it.

Lafferty was originally sentenced to die for the deaths of Brenda Wright Lafferty, a native of Kimberly, Idaho, and her 15-month-old daughter, Erica. But the Utah Court of Appeals ordered a new trial, ruling the trial judge improperly found Lafferty competent.

Three mental health professionals examined Lafferty recently and their determinations will help Judge Cullen Y. Christensen decide if Lafferty is competent to go on trial a second time.

Christensen ordered the county attorney's office off the case because he found a conflict exists.

Weiser voters OK school bond issue

WEISER (AP) — Only months after defeating a measure to pay for a community swimming pool, Weiser voters overwhelmingly approved a \$3.27 million bond issue to finance 26 new classrooms and other school needs.

The vote on Tuesday was 1,377 yes to only 470 no, or 74.6 percent approval. A two-thirds majority was needed for approval. Weiser School District Superintendent Jim Reed credited unusually heavy turnout.

Police nab escaped rapist in Spokane

SPokane, Wash. (AP) — A convicted rapist who escaped from McNeil Island prison last week has been captured in Spokane by a team of state, local and federal authorities, the FBI said Thursday morning.

Timothy Mark Webb was taken into custody without incident at about 9 p.m. Wednesday, said Dave Hill, an FBI agent in Seattle.

Webb, 34, was held in the Spokane County Jail, Hill said. The capture marks the end of FBI involvement, the agent said, referring questions about Webb's escape and details on his return to state custody to the Department of Corrections. Calls to that agency were not immediately returned.

"I'm not sure who's investigating, but he's not a federal prisoner. ... It won't be us," he said.

Trial involving shooting of marshal delayed until February

BOISE (AP) — The trial of two men charged in the slaying of a federal marshal in northern Idaho has been postponed until February after both sides asked for a delay.

The trial was originally scheduled to start Monday.

U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge late Wednesday signed an order moving the trial of Randy Weaver, 44, and Kevin Harris, 25, to Feb. 2 at 9:30 a.m. at Boise. Lodge, chief federal judge for Idaho, also will hear the case instead of District Judge Harold Ryan.

in outside Naples in Boundary County. Harris is accused of first-degree murder for the shooting of Deputy Marshal William Deagan, 42, Quincy, Mass., Aug. 21. Weaver is accused of aiding and abetting the slaying and both face the death penalty if

charges. Deagan died in a shootout with Harris, Weaver and Weaver's son, Sammy, 14, and Sammy was fatally wounded. The next day, Vicki Weaver, 43, was shot to death at the cabin. Harris, who was wounded by the shot that killed Mrs. Weaver, surrendered Aug. 30 and Weaver and three daughters, 16, 10 and 10 months, ended the standoff the next day.

Defense attorneys already have raised the issue that it was self-defense when Harris and the Weavers came upon heavily armed men hiding in the woods near their home. Lodge 10 years ago presided over a trial in which self-defense was the key issue. Trapper Claude Dallas Jr. was tried for

first-degree murder in the slayings of two Fish and Game Department officers, but argued at trial he only shot when he thought one was going for his gun.

The Canyon County jury accepted the argument, convicting Dallas only of manslaughter. But Lodge, in pronouncing the maximum sentence on Dallas, specifically rejected the self-defense claims.

In asking for a postponement, federal attorneys said they needed more time to inventory reports, documents and physical evidence, interview witnesses and otherwise prepare for the trial.

"The discovery (review of the evidence and exchanges of information between the prosecution and defense) hadn't been com-

pleted and we weren't ready to try the case yet," said one of Weaver's attorneys, Chuck Peterson of Boise. "It's a very complex case with a lot of complex issues."

Assistant U.S. Attorney Kim Linguist said the government was ready to put on its case starting Monday, but there was concern that if the trial were held too soon, the defendants later might be able to appeal on grounds they were not given adequate time to prepare.

Harris' attorney, David Nevin of Boise, said the government hasn't provided him with critical information such as a statement federal agents said Harris made to FBI agents at a Spokane hospital the night he surrendered.

Senator's services might not be legal, attorney general claims

BOISE (AP) — Democratic Sen. Mike Burckett's legal services contract with the state was considered legal last spring, but the attorney general now says having a legislator represent the executive branch may be illegal.

Burckett, D-Boise, resigned from the contract Tuesday. He had been paid more than \$25,000 for six months of work for the state Department of Labor and Industrial Services. The resignation came after Attorney General Larry EchoHawk, also a Democrat, called for a halt to the deal.

EchoHawk approved the contract in April, saying the competitive bidding requirements of the state procurement law do not apply to personal services, including legal work.

Chief Deputy Attorney General Jack McMahon explained the thinking behind the exemption allowing Burckett's work. "You don't want to turn the state's legal business over to the cheapest warm body you can find. If Burckett were selling computers instead of legal services, it clearly would apply."

But last week, Republican state Treasurer Lydia Justice Edwards questioned it. Deputy Attorney General David

High, in consultation with EchoHawk, wrote Edwards on Tuesday the constitutional separation of powers "pose a concern."

"We are concerned that a legislator, even one who is not running for re-election, may not be permitted to provide legal services to an executive agency," High wrote.

Burckett, who is retiring from the Legislature Dec. 1, resigned Tuesday.

"The attorney general determined the contract wasn't illegal, it wasn't a conflict of interest," Burckett said.

"But he was concerned about the separation of powers. I was concerned as well. So I just resigned my duties."

Burckett made ethics a key issue in his successful race in 1988 to unseat Senate President Pro Tem James Risch.

"It's pretty ironic that he campaigned against me as the standard-bearer for ethics and anti-conflict of interest and yet, given the opportuni-

ty, winds up very quickly with his hand in the cookie jar," Risch said. "I don't think my hand is in the cookie jar." But he countered, "Our law firm had provided good services to the department for years. It was good work and fair pay for hard work."

Burckett signed the contract April 6. He took over the work after two other attorneys, Pat Costello and Sergio Gutierrez, left his law firm.

Burckett said he handled 150 cases for the department, which pursues wage claims by employees who have not been paid for work performed.

"I'm just sorry because Mike did us a good job," said Department Director Gary Gould.

Burckett said he does not intend to work for the department after Dec. 1. He was paid \$25,411 from April to September. The October billing, of an undetermined amount, has not been paid. But Gould said Burckett should be compensated.

Scott Peyton, press secretary to Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus, said Andrus was unaware of the contract until the "last few days."

"From what we know, Sen. Burckett did the right thing," Peyton said.

Video of nude inmate angers prisoner, wife

BOISE (AP) — A video of a nude Idaho inmate struggling with guards came closer to nudity, he said. "I've never had any formal complaint come to me."

That has inmate Gary Trimble and his wife, Yolanda, angry. But Trimble could not be identified in the tape, said Arvon Arave, warden of the Idaho State Maximum Security Institution.

Arave said the showing was "borderline appropriate" and he would probably not do it again.

"I'd be more selective, and make

sure there wasn't anything that would come closer to nudity," he said. "I've never had any formal complaint come to me."

Yolanda Trimble, 36, said her husband was videotaped naked as guards forcibly removed him from a cell in March.

"It is very upset that they would show a videotape of him like that," Mrs. Trimble said. "He feels it's an invasion of his privacy."

Trimble, 36, was convicted of grand theft in February, 1990, and sentenced

to a sentence of two to five years. Arave said Trimble is being held in solitary confinement on an unrelated matter.

Arave said the video was shown at an annual open house last Thursday for prison employees and their families. Inmates were "locked down" and staff members took their families on tours.

"We did show a video of cell attractions to the staff members and their families, so we could demonstrate to the staff and their families how the use of force works," Arave said.

Felon holding hostages disarmed by police

POST FALLS (AP) — Four hostages were freed when Kootenai County sheriff's deputies disarmed a man wielding a loaded revolver in Post Falls.

Two deputies on Wednesday captured Rodney Jay Reynolds, 32, Coeur d'Alene. Just after he emerged from the lower level of a house, Sheriff's Capt. Gary Cuff said.

Reynolds was apparently following one of the hostages who had just fled the basement. Cuff said. The suspect was caught by Sgt. Jeff Thomas and Deputy Barry Allen when he came around a corner in the house with a .22-caliber revolver in his hand.

"He was so close they took him to the floor and disarmed him," Cuff said.

Reynolds was charged with four counts of first-degree kidnapping, four counts of aggravated assault, one count of burglary and one count of unlawful possession of a firearm by a felon.

He was held in the Kootenai County jail Wednesday afternoon after bond was set at \$250,000.

The identities of the alleged victims were withheld Wednesday, but they included a 21-year-old woman, a 23-year-old woman, a 41-year-old woman and a 26-year-old man, all of Post Falls.

Light rail test dubbed success

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Tests this month on the CyberTran high-speed rail system were a big success, the chief researcher for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory project says.

Now EG&G Idaho Inc. engineer John Deارين is looking for an industrial partner willing to spend \$10 million on a larger, full-speed CyberTran test.

A 36-foot-long prototype of the CyberTran rail car performed well during Oct. 8 tests along a half-mile stretch of track at the INEL.

"It rolled down the straight portions of the track great, and rolled down the curved portions of the track great," Deارين said Wednesday.

EG&G has designed a rail car that has only two axles, one on either end, and weighs only 10,000 pounds — much lighter than current "light rail" cars. But before the Oct. 8 test, no one knew if the lightweight, computer-operated CyberTran car would stay under control on a curve.

By designing a lightweight rail car with only four steel wheels, EG&G hopes to have a light-rail system that will be much cheaper to build and operate.

"You don't have to build a bridge structure to carry a 100,000-pound load," Deارين said. "You only have to carry a 10,000-pound load, and that is what's important."

Kootenai sheriff candidate demands public apology

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Kootenai County sheriff candidate Bill Miller is demanding a public apology from incumbent Pierce Clegg and his attorney for accusing him of illegally acquiring the sheriff's personnel file.

Clegg and Coeur d'Alene attorney Harvey Richman on Wednesday scoffed at Miller's warning he would go to court.

"He can threaten anything he wishes; I'm unmoved by threats," Richman said. "We suggest we do not owe him any apology at all."

"There is no question they have done irreparable damage," an outraged Miller said. "Not only are these

statements political, but they are libelous."

In a statement Tuesday on behalf of Clegg, Richman accused Miller of illegally obtaining a confidential personnel file on Clegg; a felony offense punishable by up to 14 years in prison.

Miller said Clegg and Richman should have investigated how the sheriff's "Personal Training History" was obtained before "throwing around these outrageous allegations."

Miller said he received the document through a mix-up with the Peace Officer Standards and Training Academy, or POST.

It's back to Atlanta

Smith's grand slam provides spark Braves need to defeat Blue Jays, 7-2

TORONTO — Lonnie Smith ran around the bases just fine this time, got even with Jack Morris and gave the Atlanta Braves another chance in the World Series.

Smith's grand slam capped a five-run fifth inning that finished Morris and the Braves beat up the Toronto Blue Jays 7-2 Thursday night to close their gap to 3-2 and send the Series back to Atlanta.

"I uttered a few words I don't care to repeat here, but by second base I was happy," Smith said. "I felt I finally did something to contribute."

Smith outpitched Morris in a rematch of last October's Game 7 starters and prevented the Blue Jays from putting up another flag at the SkyDome, the one calling them World Series champions.

Smith's slam provided perhaps some revenge, and some relief from the burden he has carried around ever since the eighth inning of Game 7 last year. In that one, Smith got lost when rounding the bases and did not score, and Morris and the Minnesota Twins went on to beat the Braves 1-0 in 10 innings.

That triumph earned Morris the MVP award, and saddled Smith, nicknamed "Slats" for his many mishaps on the bases and in the field, with the label of the man who lost the World Series.

"I don't think I will ever get any retribution from that game," Smith said. "People all year bring it up, and some people considered it one of the major blunders in World Series history."

"No, I didn't get retribution tonight," he said. "I've been criticized my whole career. For one thing, I'm a black man, so I'm going to be criticized. For another thing, I've been considered a mediocre player, and I've been criticized for that."

Now, after beating Morris for the second time in six days, Smith and the Braves get another chance to capture what got away from them last year. Steve Avery will start Saturday night against Toronto's David Cone when the Series resumes in Atlanta.

The victory was the first blowout in a week of close games, and marked the first time in 11 Series games that a non-dome team had won indoors.

Of the previous 37 teams to hold 3-1 leads in the World Series, 31 have gone on to win. The Blue Jays hoped to add another winner to that list when they won the first game they staged during the winter to win big games.

But Morris was booted off the mound after Smith's fourth career slam, and left with his head bowed. He went 21-6 during the regular season, but is a brutal 0-3 with a 7.43 ERA in postseason play.

four postseason starts. He has allowed six home runs and 24 hits in 33 innings.

Morris was tagged for nine hits and all seven runs in 4 2-3 innings. He was the first Series starter to give up seven runs since Danny Cox in 1987.

"Perhaps I left him in too long," Toronto manager Cito Gaston said. "But like I said earlier this week, he's the kind of guy I leave in there."

"Of course, I feel bad for him. He's made a lot of pitches he'd like to have back," he said. "Let's hope the bullpen was just for the situation, but it could've been for me and for Jack. Don't forget, people forget fast. He's one of the reasons we're here."

Morris struggled from the start, giving up a double to Otis Nixon on the first pitch of the game, and a solo homer to David Justice in the fourth.

Morris fell behind 3-2 when Deion Sanders lined a two-out, RBI single in the fifth. Terry Pendleton's second double of the game and an intentional walk to Justice set up Smith's opposite-field slam to right on a 1-2 pitch.

The sellout crowd became so silent as

Smith rounded the bases that it was possible to hear the Braves cheering and slapping high-fives as they spilled out of the dugout.

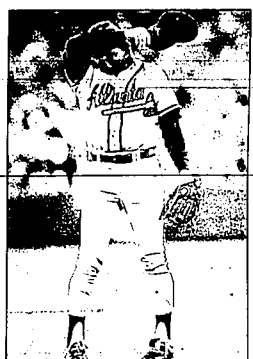
Smith's slam was the first by a designated hitter in the World Series.

Smith connected for the 16th slam in Series history, and the first since Jose Canseco's in 1988. The big blow made it 7-2 and gave Smoltz enough room to breathe easy.

Smoltz, again pitching on three days' rest as he had in winning the NL playoffs MVP trophy, also was not sharp. At least he kept his team in the game, pitching one batter into the seventh inning and allowing two runs on five hits.

Smoltz began the game with no record in three World Series starts despite a 1.66 ERA. He would have won Game 2 last week, but reliever Jeff Reardon gave up pinch-hitter Ed Sprague's two-run homer in the ninth.

The Braves' bullpen has struggled, but the five-run lead was enough. Mike Stanton relieved Smoltz after a leadoff walk in the seventh and quieted the Blue Jays' bats and their boosters and earned a save for his three innings' work.

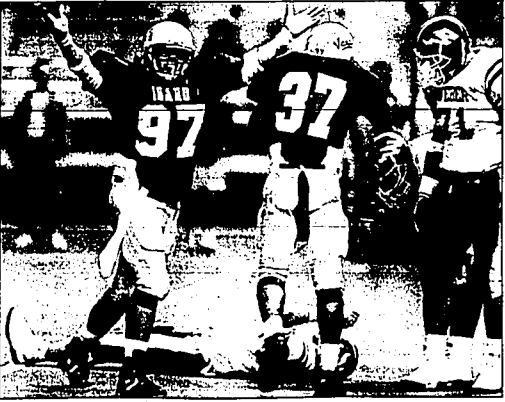

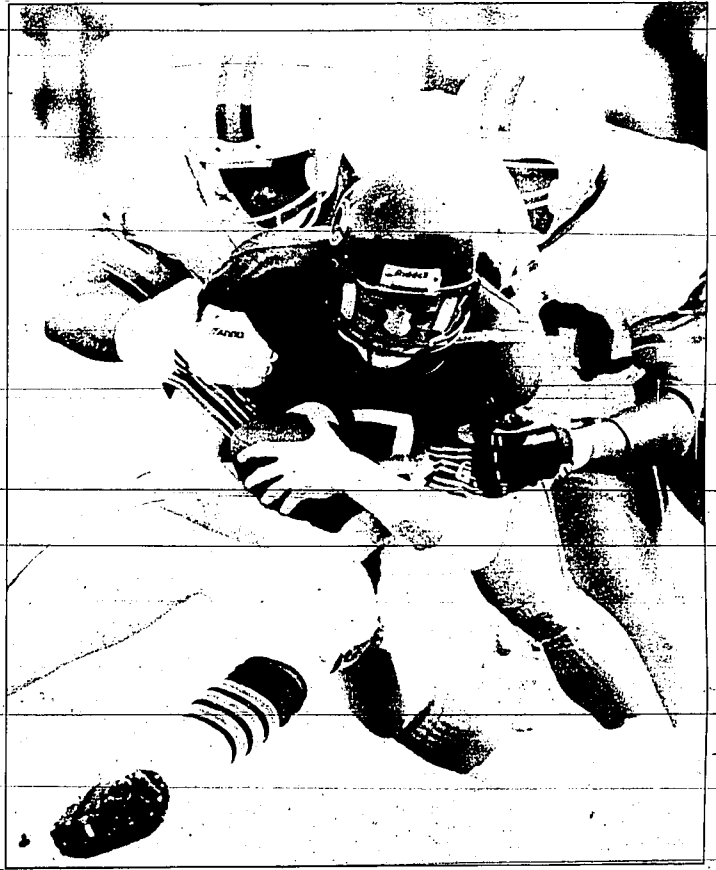

'Old Redhead' succumbs to intestinal illness, leaves behind broadcast legacy

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Red Barber, the "Old Redhead" whose folksy, insightful calls of Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Yankees games earned him a spot in Baseball's Hall of Fame, died Thursday. He was 84.

Barber, who began his career in the 1930s when the national pastime was only on radio, spanned seven decades on the airwaves and his warm, Southern drawl became a familiar and comforting sound for millions of listeners and television viewers.

In typical Barber-ese, a team was in control when it was "in the cauldred seat," and a rallying team was "rearin' up the peachpit." An argument was a "chubarb," and sometimes a home run was accompanied by "Oh, doctor!"

Barber worked at a time when there were few ex-athletes in the booth who could offer insights on what it was like to be on the field. But the Old Redhead spent hours before a game — on planes, trains and in hotel lobbies — absorbing baseball until he could think like a manager.

Barber, who built a loyal audience the last several years with a Friday morning talk show on National Public Radio, died at 11:14 a.m. today from pneumonia and kidney complications, said Tallahassee Memorial Hospital spokesman Warren Jones.

He was admitted to the hospital Oct. 10 for emergency surgery for an intestinal blockage. He remained in critical condition until his death.

Walter Lanier Barber was born Feb. 17, 1908 in Columbus, Miss., and lived there until the age of 10 when his family moved to Sanford, Fla. When he was 21, he enrolled at the University of Florida and worked a variety of jobs to pay for his education. He began broadcasting at the college station in 1930 and landed a job with the Cincinnati Reds in 1934.

There was only radio then, and the man in the

booth had to provide that picture for the fans at home. A runner wasn't just out at second, he had "the gate shut on him."

Smith earns record with 13th Gold Glove

TORONTO (AP) — As Ozzie Smith points out, the baseball numbers that catch most people's eyes are offensive ones: Home runs, RBIs and so on.

"I think that's a defensive statistic that anyone can appreciate: On Thursday, Smith was awarded his 13th Rawlings Gold Glove, the most ever in the National League.

Smith, considered the best fielding shortstop in baseball history, had been tied with outfielders Willie Mays and Roberto Clemente for the most NL Gold Gloves. Smith broke their marks by winning for the 13th straight year.

Third baseman Brooks Robinson

and pitcher Jim Kaat share the major league mark of 16 Gold Gloves for fielding excellence. The awards began in 1957, meaning Mays did not have a chance to win for his first several seasons.

"I think that in years past, I'd probably tell you that it didn't mean as much as it does now," Smith said. "But now, as each day goes by and I get older, it means more."

The Gold Gloves are voted on by managers and coaches.

The rest of the team in each league will be announced Nov. 5, but Rawlings released Smith's honor early because he will be in Japan

touring with a major league all-star team at the time.

Smith won the award twice with San Diego and, after being traded for Garry Templeton, has won it for the last 11 years in St. Louis.

Where he'll be next season, however, is in doubt. He plans to file for free agency because the Cardinals have not come forth with a solid contract offer.

"It's a situation that has kind of lingered for a couple of years. I'm kind of forced into the free-agent market," Smith said at a conference call. "When you feel like after 10 or 11 years that you still have to prove yourself, it's tough."

Trevino earns most, despite sore thumb

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Lee Trevino hopes he's finally come up with a way to wrap his sore left thumb so it doesn't disturb his golf swing.

Despite the injury that has forced him to miss four tournaments on the Senior tour this year, he's still the leading money winner, with \$807,708.

Trevino will try to increase that sum this weekend when he competes in the \$600,000 Senior Classic, which begins Friday at the Rancho Park course and includes a first prize of \$90,000.

"I've been trying to tape it differently every day," he said of his ailing thumb. "I think I've got it worked out."

"The only way I'll have an operation is if I couldn't play. And then there's no guarantee that the

operation would be successful."

Despite the injury, he's accomplishing his goal so far this year.

"My goal is to be the tour's leading money winner," he said. "I may hit a bad drive or two but I should be able to overcome them with my short game."

"I've been very good around the greens and my putting is just fine. I intend to play the rest of the year."

Trevino is the only player to win more than \$1 million (\$1,190,518 in 1990) on the Senior tour. This year, he holds a \$96,427 lead over the Jim Colbert, the tour's second-leading money winner.

Also in the field at Rancho Park are defending champion John Brodie; Raymond Floyd, who earlier this year became the first player to win a

regular PGA event and a senior event in the same year and gallery favorite Arnold Palmer.

Brodie's win last year was his first — and only — victory on the Senior tour. He's 60th on the money list this year with \$87,336 and has only one top 10 finish, Floyd earlier this year won the Doral Ryder Open on the PGA tour, and the GTE North Classic on the senior circuit.

TWIN FALLS - Noah may have had trouble corraling all those animals onto the ark, but it's just as hard to corral 67 children onto a stage. At least it must seem that way to Scott Smith, who is directing this fall's JUMP Co. production of "Noah's Animals."

"Actually, the kids are well behaved, but, with so many of them, things can get pretty hectic," said Smith, a CSI drama student who's preparing to make his directorial debut. Even as he spoke, a chorus of bunnies was multiplying onto the practice stage.

Acclaimed choir boys pay visit to Twin Falls

TWIN FALLS - For nearly five centuries, the Vienna Choir Boys have been making music. On Sunday, the singers will carry on tradition in Twin Falls.

The group was founded in 1498 by the humanist Emperor Maximilian I to fulfill his wish to have choristers in the Imperial Chapel. From its inception, the organization has attracted the finest musicians in the west.

Christoph Willibald Gluck, the founder of the modern operatic form, spent his most creative years as composer to the Hapsburg court in Vienna and wrote for the Imperial Chapel. Mozart did the same on his promotion as Composer to the Court in 1787. Franz Schubert sang as a choirboy from 1808 to 1813.

Since the early 1900s, the group has been known as the Vienna Choir Boys, but anywhere along the way, people kept referring to the singers the Vienna Choir, though the Vienna Boys' Choir never existed. The discrepancy is widespread, according to ICM Artists, which represents the Vienna Choir Boys.

It began, according to most accounts, when a Walt Disney movie switched the name around.

Today, those who wish to be considered choristers in the celebrated group attend a special preparatory school where they receive a thorough education, with special attention to the theory and practice of singing, as well as instruction on one musical instrument. At the examination,

Record sales become O'Connor's latest setback in tough times

NEW YORK (AP) - Joe Pesci and Madonna blasted her. The Bob Dylan crowd booed her. Angry protesters steamrolled her records - which, by the way, are tumbling down the charts.

"She was very lucky it wasn't my show, because if it was my show, I would have given her such a smack," Pesci said to cheers.

Even Madonna - who just released a 128-page book of erotic fantasies - defended the pope: "I think there's a better way to present her ideas rather than ripping up an image that means a lot to other people."

O'Connor's response to Madonna and Pesci: "There's no comment. And there won't be," said Schock, who is hopeful the furor will die down. It only rekindled at the Dylan bash, Sinead's first public appearance since "SNL."

"I must say that Ms. O'Connor brings out the worst in many of us. ... She came onstage with her own agenda and an attitude," columnist Liz Smith wrote about that fiasco.

"A Rolling Stone cover story didn't help," either, O'Connor, in a generally mellow crowd at the Bob Dylan tribute dove her in tears from the stage with their jeers.

O'Connor, in a statement Thursday in London, reiterated her objections to the church: "Which side of the road is responsible for the child abuse she suffered."

"The Vatican uses 'marriage, divorce and in particular birth control and abortion to control us through our children and through fear," she said.

Such explanations have done little to appease those incensed by her action.

"I think it was just the irreverence of it. Why is she blaming the pope for her mother abusing her as a child? It's ridiculous," said Bill Fugazy of the National Ethnic Coalition of Organizations.

On Wednesday, the organization used a steamroller to crush more than 200 Sinead albums. The remains were to be shipped to Sinead.

Fugazy isn't the only person

Sitcoms deal with deaths of cast members in a variety of ways

More than a week after actor John Hancock's death, the makers of the CBS television series "Love & War" still don't know how reality will intrude on their make-believe world.

The decision, whatever it is, would be the latest in one of TV's unusual, but not uncommon, rites: keeping a series alive when a star dies.

Hancock, who played the tart-tongued bartender, the Johnson, died of massive heart attack at his home. Last Friday, a spokeswoman for Diane English, the show's creator, said there was no comment on how Hancock's death would be handled on the show.

"Love & War," which premiered this season and is enjoying healthy ratings, has aired four episodes. Hancock had appeared in four episodes that have yet to be broadcast but are scheduled for future presentations.

Production of the show was shut down last week in Hancock's memory. Working at the junction of fantasy and reality that death creates "is very tough," says Les Charles, one of the creators of the hit NBC series "Cheers."

"The challenge is you're doing a piece of entertainment, but at the same time it is a really profound and profoundly moving experience everyone is going through, and you don't want to trivialize it."

When Nick Colasanto, who played Coach on "Cheers," died in

1985, Charles said everyone decided he would have to die on the show as well - which "is very difficult on a comedy show."

"The other actors on the show felt their characters needed to grieve for the coach in order for them to move on as characters," he said. "It was necessary for them to address that crisis. I think it was important."

The writers decided to introduce a new character who had been taking a mail-order bartending class from Coach - Woody, the gold-hearted rube-from-Indiana.

"But we were very nervous," says Charles, who believes Coach had been the show's most popular character. "If sympathies had turned slightly the other way it would have been a disaster."

TV has dealt with death in a variety of ways over the years - not always gracefully. On New Year's Eve 1972, actor Peter Dinklage, one of the stars of ABC's "Alphas Smith and Jones," shot himself in the head. Perhaps reluctant to change the name of their series, the show's producers simply replaced Dinklage with Roger Davies with nary a word of explanation.

In 1977, Freddie Prinze's suicide was explained on his show "Chico and the Man" as a sudden decision by Chico to leave the garage and take up with his wealthy father. The show, which had been a hit and made Prinze a major star, fizzled in his absence. The premiere episode of "Bonanza's" 14th season in the fall of

1972 was supposed to be a two-hour special featuring Hoss's wedding. Those plans were scrapped when Dan Blocker died that spring at the age of 43. Within months, NBC announced plans to cancel the series.

When Redd Foxx died last year, the producers of his new show "The Royal Family" brought in comedian Jackie to star as the sister-to-Della-Reese-Foxx-widow. The show then shut down for several months, returning with Jackie now playing Reese's daughter. The series did not last into this season.

Michael Conrad, who played the verbose Sgt. Phil Esterhaus, died in the middle of the 1983-84 season of "Hill Street Blues." Esterhaus, the officers were told, died nobly of a heart attack while making passionate love to the widow of a late cop.

When Jack Soo, a.k.a. Detective Yamada on "Barney Miller," died in 1979, a special episode full of reminiscences from previous seasons was run several months later.

Over the nine-year run of "Night Court," three women had played the bailiff. Selma Diamond died of cancer after the first season, and was replaced by Florence Halop. When she died of cancer after one season, she was replaced by Marsha Warfield.

When Johnny Carson asked Warfield if she was worried about following in his footsteps, she said, "Hey, it doesn't bother me. It's sort of like becoming the queen. It's the only way to get the job."

Story of scamming loser lacks hard edge

Harry Fabian is the kind of guy who would scam his own sick grandmother if he could make a quick buck or two. He's a schemer, a hustler, an ambulance chaser, a two-bit lawyer whose integrity died the day he was born.

Harry is a lot of things. But most of all, he's a loser.

Director Irwin Winkler etches a raw portrait of Harry — and the winners and losers of his scabby world — in "Night and the City." The movie is a remake of Jules Dassin's 1950 film noir starring Richard Widmark — replaced in the Winkler effort by Robert De Niro.

How do the two compare? Well, the changes are many; the results, mixed. Dassin's setting was London, and the world of wrestling; Winkler's is New York and boxing. Dassin's is moodier, darker, Winkler adds a little fizz.

De Niro, with his elastic face and unending supply of stage business,

does for Harry Fabian what he did for Rupert Pupkin in "King of Comedy." He's impish, on the edge, outrageous with no pride as he goes up against a big-time hood by hustling a poorly financed boxing event.

He's downright impudent when he has an assault victim fake injuries and wear body casts to court only to be kicked out by the judge, who notes that the alleged victim towers over the alleged assailant.

He's smarmy when he coos into Elaine's, the fashionable Upper East Side eatery where the elite meet, and chats up TV personality Regis Philbin, who's trying to have a quiet dinner with his wife.

And he has the ultimate chutzpah when he borrows money from the husband of his lover, Helen (Jessica Lange).

Not much of the steam in De Niro's stride is doused by Alan King, who steals the movie as the

feared boxing honcho Boom Boom Grossman. King adds a much-needed freshness.

There are lapses in "Night and the City," slow periods when the filmmaker takes far too much time for his characters to make a point or to move on.

Among the most forgettable scenes are those between De Niro and Lange. Heisen, the ex-felon who longs to leave her hoodlum husband and his bar and open a restaurant of her own, is not one of Lange's strongest character portrayals or one of her more interesting ones.

"Night and the City" lacks a hard edge and fails to touch or expose

raw nerve, despite De Niro's pleading soliloquies.

Winkler directed from a screenplay by Richard Price ("The Color of Money," "Sea of Love"). There are nice support touches from Jack Warden as Boom Boom's nicer brother, Al, and Eli Wallach as the loan shark Peck.

Tak Fujimoto ("Silence of the Lambs") provides effective photography.

"Night and the City," which closed the New York Film Festival, was produced by Jane Rosenthal and Winkler with Harry J. Liffand and Mary-Jane Liffand as executive producers. It is rated R.

Disney unleashes 'Beauty and the Beast' campaign

Backed by a \$65 million marketing campaign, the video edition of the Walt Disney animated feature "Beauty and the Beast" goes on sale the last week of October with the largest advance order in the history of home video.

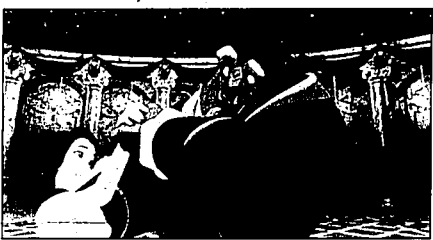
More than 20 million units of the videotape edition of "Beauty," or about 1 cassette for every 12 people in the United States, are expected to be sold before Disney stops shipment of the cassette in the spring.

Meanwhile, with "Beauty" leading the way in Christmas sales, Disney officials say the film is expected to account for 35 to 40 percent of rentals and sales in the final quarter of the \$12 billion-a-year home video business.

There are other box-office hits going on sale and into the rental stores this fall: "Batman Returns," "Basic Instinct," "Sister Act," "Far and Away" and "Lethal Weapon 3," to name a few. But none compares with "Beauty," which has grossed \$145 million since its initial theatrical release in 1991 and stands secure in history as the first animated feature to be nominated for a Best Picture Academy Award.

To make sure that the video version has a broad sale, the cassette is being marketed with a multitude of discount, rebate and tie-in offers that will bring its cost substantially below the suggested retail price of \$24.99. Buyers of Nabisco cookies, for example, will receive a \$5 refund by sending in proof-of-purchase coupons, and customers at Pizza Hut will find a \$10 "Value Card" in the videocassette box, redeemable for discounts on Pizza Hut products.

In addition to the basic cassette, Disney is issuing two special, higher-price packages. One, the "collector's edition," priced at \$99.95, offers the movie, plus a second tape containing a "work in progress" version and a

"making of" documentary, a compact disc of the soundtrack, an illustrated book and a commemorative lithograph.

The second special package, a "children's video and activity kit" at \$49.99, includes the movie, an animation flip book, an illustrated storybook and figurines of Beauty and the Beast.

The Disney organization, worried about the possibility of pirates using the optimum picture quality of

laserdiscs to create illegal tapes, is sending out only a \$49.95 "work in progress" edition on laserdisc this fall and, to the chagrin of laserdisc devotees, does not plan to release a disc of the completed film until September 1993.

As the current belle of the Disney studio, "Beauty" still has many other sources of income besides the video. Trade ads, for example, already have advised record dealers that the release of the videotape means "a rather large

number of your customers will be clamoring for all sorts of 'Beauty and the Beast' audio products that let them relive the musical magic of the movie."

A selection of artwork drawn from the film (but not all of it original) fetched \$1.25 million last weekend in a Los Angeles auction conducted by Sotheby's, and last month Disney executives were in New York to explore the possibilities of staging "Beauty and the Beast" as a live Broadway musical.

Moreover, the guaranteed success of "Beauty" as a video hit is not confined strictly to this one film. As Bill Mechanic, president of worldwide home video for Disney's Buena Vista Home Video, has noted, "We're not just bringing out the hits. We're using the hits to sell other products and bring in consistent floor traffic quarter by quarter."

In other words, customers attracted by the lure of "Beauty" to the Disney racks in video stores and chain operations such as Toys "R" Us are likely to buy other Disney videos, which range from Disney classic animated and live-action features to the shorter, cheaper television cartoons of Rocky & Bullwinkle and Alvin and the Chipmunks.

Latest Barker horror film is his worst

Capsule reviews

CANDYMAN (R). The latest Clive Barker horror shocker is the worst. An ambitious would-be allegory involving racism and mythology that merely seems pretentious and preposterous as it drowns in gallons of blood and guts. Virginia Madsen manages to be impressive as a Chicago grad student whose research into urban legends leads her to the dangerous "Cabini-Green" project. With Tony Todd, Kasi Lemmons and Vanessa Williams.

CONSENTING ADULTS (R). A successful couple with their own business and a good home life (Kevin Kline and May Elizabeth Masterson) find themselves attracted to the high life of their new neighbors (Kevin Spacey and Rebecca Miller), but things get out of control when Kline is accused of having an affair with Miller and killing her. 1492. **CONQUEST PARADISE (PG-13).** Despite the presence of Gerard Depardieu as the great navigator, director Ridley Scott's version of Christopher Columbus' travels and tribulations is dramatically inert. Visually the film is remarkable, filled with riveting sequences from the old world and the new, but story-wise, despite all the historical research that went into it, the result sounds like it was written after too much time spent watching old Hollywood movies. And Depardieu's uncertain English is no help.

Life masks show what's behind faces

NEW YORK (AP) — When Willa Shallit "touched" Richard Nixon's face she found sadness — but also an unexpected humanness. In Stevie Wonder, she found pure joy. Paul Newman revealed himself as a great humanitarian.

Shallit makes life masks: plaster, three-dimensional faces that capture every pore, bluish-and-white of the famous and not-so-famous.

In the last 15 years, she's cast nearly 2,500 faces. Her famous subjects have included the last five American presidents, the Dalai Lama and an array of stars from Sophia Loren and Marcel Marceau to Whoopi Goldberg.

Shallit's intent is to corral the spiritual side of her subjects — and she does it by slathering them with a seaweed gelatin called alginate, and covering their face with warm, gooey plaster bandages.

Sound sticky? Ask "Today" show host Katie Couric, who one recent morning found the goo dripping down her neck as Shallit plastered her eyes, mouth and cheeks on national television; the entire process takes about 10 minutes.

"It makes you a little bit nervous but Willa is marvelous and very calming," Couric said. For Couric, the most frustrating part of being turned into a living statue was "having my mouth taped shut."

Shallit, 36, the daughter of "Today" show film critic Gene Shallit, admits that this kind of construction makes some subjects nervous, but she's usually able to talk them through it.

That's not surprising. The petite, dark-haired creator, who is artist in residence at the College of Santa Fe in New Mexico, has a voice that could sell a million meditation tapes and a demeanor that exudes gentleness.

In town to promote her first book, "Life Cast: Behind the Mask," Shallit says she's able to find the true face of a celebrity because they are forced through the casting process, to turn inward.

"When I make the mask, the person is inside themselves," she says. "They're less posed. When you put a camera in front of someone, what do they do? Their face changes. They'll project, they'll pose in some way."

"But when you're sitting down and your eyes are closed and

someone is rubbing oil on your face, you're much more within yourself and so it's more revealing."

The 96-page, coffee table book details Shallit's experiences casting such famous faces as film director Federico Fellini, boxing great Muhammad Ali and Marceau, the French mime.

When she suggested Marceau choose an expression — a huge smile or frown — he said, "Non! ... I don't want to create an expression. I want very much to see the face of Marcel Marceau."

That's what Shallit "loves" best about her work. "You know how you can look at a piece of clothing but when you touch it you understand it better? I feel that way about touching people. When I touch them, I have a different impression of them."

And so, she came away understanding people such as Nixon, in whose face she says she found "an-

guish and pain, on a tragic level." But she also found the thing she believes he tried to hide: "his humanness."

As for Paul Newman, Shallit says, even with his baby blues shut tight, "I had a great understanding that he is a great humanitarian. That feeling just sprang forth."

But perhaps her favorite casting is that of Stevie Wonder. "His face reflects his spirit in a really pure way because he doesn't look in the mirror and say, 'I'd better wear my hair differently or comb my face differently' because there is no mirror for him. So there's something really genuine about his facial expression."

Shallit and her husband and casting partner, Dean Ericson, have worked closely with the singer, who has written a foreword for her book.

She says nearly all of her subjects are "pleasantly surprised" by what they find. "Usually, they'll

see something they never saw before."

Shallit and Ericson's celebrity castings are currently on view at museums and galleries nationwide through an exhibit organized by The Touch Foundation, a non-profit group that brings art to the blind.

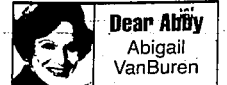
"It's a way for blind and visually impaired people to get to 'see' so many of the people they've heard so much about through touching," Shallit says.

She says the reaction from her "Please Touch" exhibit has been overwhelming.

"A woman who touched Nixon's mask felt the emotion in his face through her fingertips, and she had never expected to feel that," Shallit says. "Another woman said she didn't know that the face changed expression with emotion. She thought your face was just your face, like an elbow or knee. It opened a whole world for her."

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

After West's takeover double and his subsequent defense, South thought he knew where all the cards were. It was a cruel joke. West chose a deceptive and brilliant defense, but South was wrong to take the bait.
 West knew he had to shift when East followed with his spade deuce and South dropped his singleton jack at trick one. However, he didn't make the routine shift to a trump that many would make. Instead he led a diabolical club queen. He reasoned that, if necessary, South would play him for that card anyway, so it couldn't hurt to blow some smoke.
 South won his ace, drew trumps and led a low club to dummy's king, feeling secure when West followed low. Declarer now led a third round of clubs, expecting to endplay West, but it was East who won. East shifted to diamonds and the game was lost. South losing two diamonds, a club and a spade.
 How does South avoid West's trap? By going for a surer endplay. He knows where the spade ace is; he can't be sure that West has the club jack.
 To ensure his game, South allows West's club queen to hold and wins the next club in dummy to ruff a low spade. Trumps are drawn, the club ace is cashed and a trump is led to dummy. On dummy's spade queen, South discards a diamond and West is stuck on lead. Whatever he exits with, he gives South a 10th trick, and it's South who gets the last laugh.

LOS ANGELES — Donna Mills plays a journalist whose affair eight years earlier with a rising young senator comes back to haunt his future — and threaten her life — in the CBS thriller "The President's Child."

Her job took her to England, and she never told the senator she had a child. But the senator's aide, played by William Devane, knows. "I've been away and he's been coming up as a presidential candidate," she says. "When I come back and have my own cable news show, I have no intention of making it public. But Bill Devane thinks I do, and he wants to get rid of me and the child."

The movie, which also stars James Read as the candidate is adapted from the book by Fay Weldon.

"The movie's not really about politics, but it is set against that background," Mills said. "You get to see some of the backstage people. It's not a true story, but it is an interesting story of what could happen."

Although the role is another woman-in-peril part for Mills, she deplores violence in films and television.

"I played a policewoman in the movie 'The Heat,' but I've never done a cop series. I never felt comfortable with a gun in my hand," she said. "I won't develop movies with violence. I believe television influences the public strongly. We see too many guns and knives already. People get anesthetized after awhile. It just becomes a part of your life."

Mills has a movie and series deal with ABC, but "The President's Child" is not from her company.

"I won't develop any movie for my company that has violence," she said. "The President's Child" has a little violence, but none that I'm involved in. They kidnap my son and I have to figure out how to get him back in a very clever way."

Mills has worked with Devane several times before, most recently on CBS' long-running prime-time soap "Knots Landing," which she left in 1989. Her character, Abby, was a powerful vamp; he, a powerful businessman.

Devane also stalked her in "The Bait," a 1973 TV movie in which she played an undercover policewoman and he was a killer. And they acted together years ago in the New York-based soap opera "Love Is a Many Splendored Thing."

"He played a doctor and I was a nun — I swear," she said. "I've run the gamut, from nun to Abby. I was a novice nun, then I left the convent and married David Birney."

Mills' only other series was 1971's "The Good Life," a half-hour comedy she did shortly after moving here from New York that lasted only half a year. She and Larry Hagman played a married couple who gave up their middle-class life to become butler and cook for a wealthy man.

Mills is due to start work soon on "My Name Is Kate," which will be made by Fay Weldon for ABC.

"I play an alcoholic woman whose family has to intervene and get her into a program," she said.

Her company also is developing a four-hour miniseries for ABC about a Miami woman and her nephew who were tried and acquitted of murdering the woman's husband.

"She was married to an older rich man and had an affair with a younger man," Mills said. "She was like a big movie star."

Mills grew up in Chicago, where she studied ballet and drama. She danced in summer stock and acted in three plays before going to New York.

She was an understudy in Woody Allen's first play, "Don't Drink the Water" and worked in the soap operas "Love Is a Many Splendored Thing" and "Secret Storm."

Her first role after moving to Los Angeles was in the Burt Reynolds series "Dan August" and, after Reynolds brought her to Clint Eastwood's attention, Eastwood hired her to play his girlfriend in "Play Misty for Me."

Despite her confidence on stage or in front of the camera, Mills confesses to stagefright when she's not appearing in a role.

"The President's Child" airs from 8 to 10 p.m. MDT Tuesday on KMTV and other CBS affiliates.

Covington Cross plays off 'Robin Hood' popularity

You might think that whoever thought up the idea behind "Covington Cross," ABC's Saturday-night, family-adventure show, was suffering a serious case of seeing castles in the air.

Take a widower, Sir Thomas Grey (Nigel Terry) and his producer's four children (Glenn Quinn, Jonathan Frisk, Tim Glick and lone Skyler — kind of like Ben Cartwright and his sons on the Ponderosa — and place them in a castle in England in the 1300s.

Add a lot of mud, ignore any anachronisms, journey halfway around the world to pick a pleasant, picturesque location and presto! You have a series.

"It's better than a cop show," says creator/executive producer Gil Grant, on the telephone from a location in England, recalling the impetus behind the unusual concept.

Covington Cross

"Covington Cross" airs from 8 to 9 p.m. MDT Saturdays on KVVU and other ABC affiliates.

Grant, who was a story editor on "Eight is Enough" and producer of the short-lived "Hull High," had just left Disney TV at the time.

He made a deal with Reeves Television (Uptars, Downstairs), Reeves wanted to coproduce a period piece.

"Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves" had come out that summer and had been a big hit and, as television is, "Right," they said, "let's do it. I didn't want to do that," Grant recalls.

"It was home one Sunday going through a TV magazine, and it was kind of like a thunderbolt: I kept seeing these front farm houses in rambling — 'Little House on the Prairie,' 'Bonanza.' It was really easy to

picture a ranch house as a castle. You move back the frontier about 500 years, and you take the same dynamics — a familial situation with a patriarch or a matriarch — and you do it in a way relatable to a contemporary audience."

And so was born the Gray family.

Other series regulars include a girlfriend for Thomas, Lady Elizabeth (Cherie Lunghi), and a resident butler, Sir John Mullens (James Faulkner).

Shooting in England rather than Los Angeles turned out to be advantageous for a number of reasons.

"It's cheaper to shoot here (in England) than in the U.S. on the exchange rate, it's not as cheap as you might think," Grant says.

"And we can get really fine, classically trained English actors at a bargain. The film business is very depressed here in England," Grant readily concedes that

the show plays fast and loose with history.

"When you set a show in a particular year," he says, "you open yourself up to total

scrutiny, and you can't win."

Grant hazily describes the time period as being "in the 1300s, give or take a few hundred years. What I wanted to do was just take the best of history and use it when it suits us."

The situations of "Covington Cross" are often anachronistic. For example, Lady Elizabeth and Thomas' daughter, Eleanor (Skye), appear to be ardent feminists in an era when women were often married at 13.

"Sure, we take such liberties," Grant admits. "But there were real women like that — Joan of Arc and Eleanor of Aquitaine, who was married to Henry II and very much a feminist."

"But they were very much exceptions to the rule. The average family — what we're portraying here — wouldn't have that. But what we're trying to do is a fun show, and that's what makes it fun."

Keller takes on extended family in 'Camp Wilder'

LOS ANGELES — You may need a scorecard to keep track of the characters on ABC's "Camp Wilder."

The main character is raising her 7-year-old daughter alone. She also is a surrogate mother to her teen-age brother and sister, and a sounding board of sons to a number of assorted friends who visit the family home.

Divorced mother Ricky Wilder, played by Mary Page Keller, takes her daughter and moves back home to care for her brother and sister after their parents die.

"The house is the hangout for all the kids and I have to play counselor to them," Keller said. "I feel like I'm still a kid myself. Who am I to tell them what it's like to grow up?"

"I think the comedy basically comes out of how do you run a house with no one at the helm," Keller said. "You're trying to establish who's in charge. It generally comes back to Ricky, yet she has to balance her job and her personal life with this responsibility."

This is not Keller's first experience as a sitcom single parent. She played an unwed mother in last season's flop "Baby Talk" and on "Life Goes On." She also appeared in the series "Duet" and "Open House" on Fox.

In real life, Keller and her actor husband Thomas has an 8-year-old son and two children. Keller was born in California and spent her first 10 years there. Then her father's job as a structural engineer took the family to Silver Spring, Md.

"It was only supposed to be for two years," she said, "but I stayed until I got out of high school. That's where most of my memories are. I miss that country, the green, the humidity — and the mosquitos."

She waved her hand in front of her face to

shoo off a mosquito. "That's the Maryland salute," she said.

Keller studied English and theater at the University of Maryland, then moved to New York.

"Until then, I'd only acted at the dinner table," she said. "I didn't pursue acting as a career until I got my first job. I didn't think I could make a living at it. You hear such horror stories about how hard it is to get work as an actor. It is hard, but I decided to roll with it. I studied acting in college. My parents were prepared to support whatever decision I made."

"My first job in New York was in the soap opera 'Ryan's Hope.' I actually got it while still in college during an ABC talent search. So I moved to New York with a job. I played Amanda, a rich continental debutante who had just returned from a Swiss finishing school. I stayed on for seven or eight months, then they sent my character off to Switzerland again."

Next, Keller worked on the soap opera "Another World," where she stayed for two years.

"The soaps are great training," she said. "You can form good habits — or you can form bad habits. You have to set your goals. If you're not clear on what you want, you can slip into bad habits. It can become a comfortable place and you don't grow."

"I was always too busy in the soaps to pursue theater. I worked five days a week. You can do theater if you're light in a show, but it was the most I could do to learn my lines and get to work."

Martinez tapes last show, "Santa Barbara" calls it quits

On September 11, A Martinez taped his last show as Cruz on "Santa Barbara" and little did he know at the time that a scant two weeks later, NBC would announce "Santa Barbara" was being canceled.

The soap opera, which has earned three Daytime Emmys, debuted on July 30, 1984, and during its eight year run, the ratings have never been high. In fact, "Santa Barbara" has lingered at the bottom of the ratings for most of those eight years.

In announcing the cancellation, Susan Lee, NBC Vice President of Daytime Programs, said they were hoping that a reprieve might have saved the show, but that once the soap was dropped in major markets such as Philadelphia and Boston, there was no way NBC could justify such a move. NBC plans to fill the "SB" time slot with a game show by mid-January.

"We believe 'Santa Barbara' is a wonderfully produced serial, as evidenced by the numerous Emmy Awards the show has received and we would like to salute everyone involved 'with the show,'" Lee commented. "However, given the current daytime environment, we concluded that it's simply not economically feasible for us to continue to

broadcast the series." One of the reasons "Santa Barbara" never fared well in the ratings is their time slot. They are on opposite the top-rated soap, "The Young and the Restless," on CBS. Excuses aside, the NBC soap will have its last air date on Friday, January 15, 1993, and according to head writer Pam Long, the show is going to go out with a decided bang, not a whimper.

"Santa Barbara" airs from 3 to 4 p.m. MDT weekdays on NBC.

A. Never underestimate the memory of a soap fan. Hindman was indeed Bob Reid in "Hope," 1975-84, nine years of the 12-year run of the soap. The end wasn't abrupt. The show had been in plot trouble for several years, the CBS execs decided to program their own shows. By the time "Hope" ended in January 1989, it had been on the bottom of the daytime ratings for months.

Q. Settle this: My brother-in-law says Lawrence Welk was born in Poland, came to America as a young boy, was taken in by people in Nebraska, left them when he was in his teens and they never heard from him again. I say he was born in Strasburg, N.D., and was of German descent.

A. Great kiddle, your brother-in-law. Welk was indeed, born in Strasburg on March 11, 1903. His parents had immigrated from Alsace-Lorraine, now part of France (it was German until 1919). Welk spoke only German until he was a grown man and began working in Midwest with his band. An attempt to get federal money a couple of years ago to restore his North Dakota birthplace was dropped when it was made public. Welk died in May of this year at age 89.

Q. Tell me, my brother-in-law Richardson, who plays Tim Allen's wife on "Home Improvement." Has she been in other TV shows?
A. Richardson, 41, was born in Bethesda, Md. She's the daughter of a Navy man who moved the family many times. She attended Swarthmore College and worked in dinner theater, then Broadway, where she understudied Angela Lansbury in "Gypsy." On TV, she's been a regular on "Double Trouble," "Eisenhower & Lutz" and "FM." She's married to actor Ray Baker and has a mother to Henry, 7, and twins Joseph and Roxanne, 2.

Q. I have an ongoing bet with my sister-in-law about actor Donnelly Rhodes. I say he played Philip Chancellor in the soap "The Young and the Restless" while in "Scare" and the father on "Double Trouble." She swears it can't be the same person.

A. It was. Canadian actor Rhodes also was seen in the U.S. sitcom "Report to Murphy" and the Canadian series "Danger Bay," seen on the Discovery Channel.

Q. Tell us something about Jerry Van Dyke.
A.—Van Dyke's hassled-much of his career in the shadow of older brother Dick, but seems to be making it on his own. Finally, he's "Scare." He was born in Danville, Ill., July 27, 1931. He started his career while serving in the Air Force in the 1950s, which included several appearances on "The Ed Sullivan Show." Later, he worked nightclubs and had his first TV role in "The Dick Van Dyke Show." He's worked steadily in clubs but

until "Coach" his TV career had been a series of lows, the lowest the 1965 sitcom "My Mother the Car." For the past two seasons he's had Emmy nominations for "Coach."

Patti Labelle plays night club owner in comedy

LOS ANGELES — It's appropriate that Patti Labelle's NBC comedy series is called "Out All Night." She has an aversion to daylight.

"I don't like L.A. Too much sun," says Labelle, who hides behind heavy drapes during the day, preferring the dark casinos she inhabits at night as a Grammy-winning rock singer.

And, on the whole, she'd rather be back home in Philadelphia.

Labelle was reluctant to go to Los Angeles to make "Out All Night," in which she plays a nightclub owner who takes two young men under her wing.

"It was hard to leave my roots," she said. "But listen to the way I talk! I'm really happy. Many people would love to have this job. I do work and tour. I just don't like the sun."

Labelle has appeared occasionally as Kadeem Hardison's mother in NBC's "A Different World," but "Out All Night" is her first starring role in a series.

She expressed some boredom with the rigid production schedule of a sitcom.

"I don't want to sound like an ingrate," said the singer. "I just have to get used to it. The great thing is that my son Zuri is a student at UCLA, and I can see him every day and cook for him. I just never saw myself as an actress. I always thought I'd be doing rock 'n' roll."

In "Out All Night," Labelle plays Chelsea Paige, a former singer star who runs a club in Los Angeles. She has a grown daughter, played by Vivica A. Fox, but just can't suppress her maternal instincts, so she takes in two of her daughter's friends in an apartment building she owns.

"I bought the building because I'm so attached to my daughter," she said of the show's plot. "Which seems to be the way it is with my son. He came here to school and I got a sitcom and moved here. He'll be an extra on the show once in a while."

Labelle describes Chelsea as a bighearted busybody who looks after everybody.

"That's a lot like Patti," she said as she scurried about her dressing trailer making sure everyone was seated comfortably and had plenty to eat and drink.

"Chelsea wants to help people survive," she said, "sometimes by driving people crazy. That's the way I am. I worry about people. I'll stop and give the homeless money. I have so much, and I want to see that everyone has something."

Skipped drug test lands star in jail

CONYERS, Ga. (AP) — Actor Howard Ellsworth Rollins Jr., who plays a cop on TV's "In the Heat of the Night," spent two days in jail for missing a drug test required as part of his probation.

Rollins was freed Friday after his arrest for failing to meet with his probation officer and skipping the drug test.

"I'm going to let him out, but if he misses another drug screen, he will be in serious trouble," State Court Judge Sidney Nation told Rollins' attorney.

Rollins, 41, pleaded guilty last month to driving under the influence of a prescription tranquilizer. He was sentenced to two days in jail, a \$1,000 fine, one year probation and his driver's license was suspended. He also was ordered to undergo weekly drug tests.

In 1988, Rollins pleaded guilty to driving under the influence and to cocaine possession charges in Louisiana.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — Colorado Rockies General Manager Bob Gebhard reviewed our mock draft.

Four members of the Gazette Telegraph sports staff — Sports Editor Scott Smith, columnist Ralph Routon, Deputy Sports Editor David Bean and reporter Mike Klis — recently conducted a mock expansion draft. Smith and Routon drafted for the Florida Marlins; the Rockies were put together by Bean and Klis.

For those who doubt our expertise, it should be noted that three of the four participants in a similar 1991 Baseball League. Their knowledge of players in each National League organization is so extensive, it's embarrassing. Don't these guys have lives?

And besides, how many games do you have to watch to realize that Greg Liton is not Ryne Sandberg? Granted, our knowledge of players below the Triple-A level is somewhat limited.

But after going through the basic steps of the draft, we realize that all those general managers who were whining about their

teams' being decimated by the expansion draft were mistaken.

Thanks to now-departed commissioner Fay Vincent, 1992 expansion teams were supposed to have a better chance of becoming immediately competitive. One of Vincent's last acts was to open the expansion player pool to both leagues. In previous drafts, only the expanding league had to submit players to the expansion pool.

So a lot of American League general managers howled over the prospect of losing two to three good players.

Bring out those tiny violins, folks. Maybe each team will lose one good player. Two, tops.

Keep in mind how diluted the talent on big-league rosters has become. In 1959, there were 16 teams with 25-man rosters, for a total of 400 big-league players. Entering the November draft, the 26 existing teams each get to protect 15 players. That multiplies out to 390 players.

Thus, the Rockies and Marlins start picking out their new draft bait with the 391st best player. In 1959, the 391st-best player was counting the days before an inevitable demotion to the minors.

Peter Bavasi, who guided the Toronto Blue Jays through their expansion in 1977, remembers looking at the players available in the final round and throwing his hands up in surrender.

"I asked (then-American League president) Lee MacPhail, 'What would happen if I didn't draft any of these guys?'" said Bavasi, who is president of SportsTicker. "He said, 'You have to draft somebody, or you'll embarrass baseball.'" I said, "If I don't use any of these guys, they'll embarrass the Toronto Blue Jays." So I drafted them, and they embarrassed us."

But enough explanations. Baseball fans in

Colorado and Florida want a baseball team, no matter how awful.

So off we went. The Rockies and Marlins are expected to use different strategies. For the most part, those strategies are predicated on money — the Marlins will have a lot; the Rockies should have little.

That's why our Marlins' draft roster is much more familiar to most baseball fans. The Rockies are not likely to draft a Mike Greenwell and his \$3.05 million salary. The Marlins, in turn, saw Greenwell's availability and bit.

Gebhard said he wants to build with youth. Youth we gave him. With the threat of the San Francisco Giants moving to Tampa, Fla. — and "bribe" is the right word in context with the Marlins — the Miami-based expansion team may want to hurry its development.

Florida's a big market, but how many fans will wait for the Marlins to build if Tampa is fighting for — get this — the National League West Division title? We'll give our mock draft bait with the Marlins' winning the coin flip. But they deferred the first selection so they could pick first in the second and third rounds.

The strategy behind the first draft pick was simple: Get the best player available. To the Rockies, that player was Milt Thompson, an outfielder with the St. Louis Cardinals. The Rockies can build their team around a player like Thompson, who has the experience (seven years in the big leagues), versatility (good average hitter with extra-base pop, above-average defensively) and speed (191 stolen bases).

Next, he will be 34 next year. And his salary — \$1.6 million in 1992 — is exorbitant for the tight-fisted Rockies. But he is a quality player who should play every day.

Philadelphia's Ricky Jordan was the Mar-

lins' first pick. At 27, Jordan is much younger than Thompson, and he is a better power threat. A first baseman, Jordan has platooned most of his career. Only in 1989, when he hit .285 with a career-high 12 homers and 75 RBIs, did he play every day.

After the first picks were out of the way, the teams reverted to their respective game plans.

With their second pick, the Rockies took Houston's Jeff Juden, a big, raw and talented right-handed pitcher who spent the past two seasons at Triple-A Tucson, Ariz. A few selections later, the Marlins snatched Chicago White Sox pitcher Kirk McCaskill, paying little attention to his \$2.33 million salary and 88-86 win-loss record.

Based on 1992 salaries, the Marlins spent \$19,427,833, or \$539,662 per player. That was slightly more than double the Rockies' total salary of \$9,220,917, or \$256,137 per player.

Consequently, the Marlins' roster is loaded with players. They are slotted in the big leagues. The question is, do they have any good years left?

They seem to have a good balance of right- and left-handed hitters. Their bench may be the team's strength. The pitching staff has some big names who are coming off shaky years. They are a little shy in power and very slow-foot.

The Rockies desperately need a right-handed power hitter, but they have good team speed. They also have some decent pitchers, especially in the rotation. But many of the Rockies' draft picks are at least a year or two away.

As for how the Rockies will be next year, Gebhard is right. Not very good.

ESPN will televise the draft Nov. 17. Check local listings for time.

Rules governing expansion draft

All 26 major-league teams participate. Each National League team loses three players. Theoretically, these players will be the 16th-, 20th- and 24th-best per team. Eight American League teams give up three players, and six teams lose two. The American League players available will be ranked 16th-, 21st- and 26th-best.

The draft consists of three rounds. No team can lose more than one player per round. The two expansion teams draft 13 players each in both the first and second rounds. They each draft 10 players in the third round, for a total of 36 players.

The Rockies and the Marlins flip a coin to determine who picks first in Round 1. If the Rockies win the flip, they have the opportunity to pick first and then alternate first-round selections with the Marlins. In the second and third rounds, Florida has the first pick.

Before the first round, each of the 26 existing teams protects 15 players from its entire organization. Players with fewer than three years of professional experience are excluded from the draft (unless they have appeared in the majors) and don't have to be protected. Free agents are also exempt.

Existing teams, though, must protect 10-and-5 players (10 years of major-league service, the last five with the current team) or those who have no-trade clauses in their contracts, unless those players agree to waive their rights.

After losing a player in the first round, each National League club protects three more players. Each American League club protects four more players.

After the second round, each National League team adds three players to its protected list, and each American League team protects four. After eight American League players have been selected in the third round, the league no longer participates in the draft.

All 12 National League teams, however, each lose one player in this round.
