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# Hub Butte top choice for landfill

TWIN FALLS — A siting committee will recommend that acreage on Hub Butte south of Twin Falls be chosen as the site for a new county landfill.

Mud Lake, located southwest of Twin Falls, was chosen as the second choice for a site, followed by the Loughmiller property south of Hub Butte and then Berger Butte southwest of Filer.

The siting group finished its study of the four sites and compiled a report obtained

by The Times-News. The group will present the report to the Twin Falls County Commission on Monday morning.

Jim Stevens, a geologist for EHM Engineers, compiled data on the sites, including soil depths and estimates, as well as geological data for each area. The group also considered how close each site was to populated areas and irrigated farmland.

Berger Butte, which the group looked at first, was placed at the bottom of the list largely because of area residents' vocal opposition to placing a landfill there. The butte area, however, also has a fault under

it, Stevens said.

"The fault is the reason the dirt is there," he said.

But the fault is not active and Stevens said it would not present a "fatal flaw" to building a landfill. However, given residents' opposition to the site, Berger Butte was placed at the bottom of the list.

"Unless no other sites are available, this site should not be considered," the report states.

The Loughmiller property south of the city can be seen from U.S. Highway 93 and also has people living near it, according to

the report.

Mud Lake had the deepest soil, but was the farthest from Twin Falls, meaning that the transportation costs would be the highest at this site. However, the siting group will suggest that the county try to buy this land for a backup site and to lock up landfill capacity for the next 100-plus years, the report says.

Hub Butte holds the second most soil after Mud Lake, but it's sparsely populated area, proximity to Twin Falls and location within two miles of the current landfill

# White House ignored Iraq arms links

WASHINGTON — The son of renegade arms maker Gerald Bull said Thursday that the Bush administration had little interest in investigating their company's links to Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein and never discouraged it from selling sensitive technology that boosted Iraq's "super gun" and ballistic missile programs.

"The government now says they were raising red flags about this all along but they never picked up the phone," said Michel Bull, who served as managing director of Space Research Corp. of Maryland, a Baltimore-based company run by him and his late father.

"If this was such a big deal," the younger Bull said, "why didn't they contact us? The U.S. government ... could have called us."

Bull and other knowledgeable sources

said that administration officials did not delve deeply into the company's export license applications or into Gerald Bull's ties to the Iraqi government.

The elder Bull, described as a genius in the close-knit world of arms trading, was jailed in 1980 for breaking U.S. export laws and illegally supplying munitions to South Africa. Gerald Bull, a Canadian native, was shot to death in Brussels, Belgium, by unknown assailants in early 1990.

One source familiar with the Bull company's high-technology transactions with Iraq said that "there is no evidence that the Commerce Department ever contacted Space Research Corp., other than in strictly routine, procedural matters."

Because of his father's criminal past, Michel Bull said Thursday in a telephone interview from Montreal, the Bulls wanted to be sure of U.S. policy. "We didn't want

to incur the wrath of the U.S.," Bull said.

"They (State Department officials) seemed generally friendly to the idea of working with Iraq," he added. "We wanted a general guidance from them. If they had viewed it as unpleasant, we would have dropped it. They said there was no hostility between the U.S. and Iraq at the time."

An administration official didn't dispute Bull's account of the meeting, saying that the State Department "did not attempt to discourage them."

In September 1989, the Department of Commerce granted the Bull company's request to ship computers with extensive military and civilian applications to Iraq.

Michel Bull professed ignorance Thursday of any links between the computers and the "super gun," a mammoth artillery system capable of firing nuclear-tipped shells hundreds of miles.

# Pollmania grips nation as election draws closer

It's Clinton ahead by three lengths but here comes Bush closing fast on the outside with Perot bringing up the rear.

Into the stretch it's ...

It's an old complaint: Pre-election polls are turning the Republic's greatest deliberative exercise into something as unseemly as the fourth race at Aqueduct.

This season the charge has new urgency, as poll results dominate the closing days of the presidential campaign and, some warn, threaten to shape the very outcome of the election.

On Thursday, President Bush's rise in the polls has all over the airwaves and across Page One in New York's tabloids. "CLOSER" reported Newsday, while the New York Post had Bush "BREATHING DOWN BILL'S NECK." The president, headlined the Daily News, had pulled off "A LATE POLL VAULT."

It's all part of what University of Virginia political scientist Larry Sabato has called "the worst orgy of polling in American history."

Two television networks update their election polls daily, giving a fresh answer to the one question that matters most in a political campaign: Who's ahead?

The number of national presidential election campaign polls increased from three in 1972 to 259 four years ago. This year, a half-dozen

polling organizations are dialing tens of thousands of people across the nation in the two weeks before the election, and hundreds of state and local news organizations and candidates are conducting their own polls.

The Seattle Times is not among them. "Who's ahead" polls are the junk food of our democratic process," executive editor Michael R. Fancher wrote in a column this month. But, he admits, "readers love to talk about them."

What does the public think of the reporting of pre-election polls? Naturally, there's a poll. In 1988, 38 percent of respondents told Gallup it was good, while 45 percent said it was bad.

That doesn't mean everyone wants to talk to the pollsters. For those who don't, Daniel S. Greenberg, a syndicated columnist specializing in scientific issues, has a homemade remedy: "When the pollster calls and asks for your opinion, preference or plans, simply respond: 'None of your business, thank you.'"

Even the candidates can grow impatient at the barrage of polling — especially when it runs against them. Earlier this month, when many polls had Bush with a double-digit deficit, he told a crowd in Cornelia, Ga. "Don't believe these crazy polls! Don't believe these nutty pollsters!"

On Thursday Bush seemed to take a more tolerant view, saying in Michigan, "I'm encouraged by the way these polls that we live and die by are shaping up."

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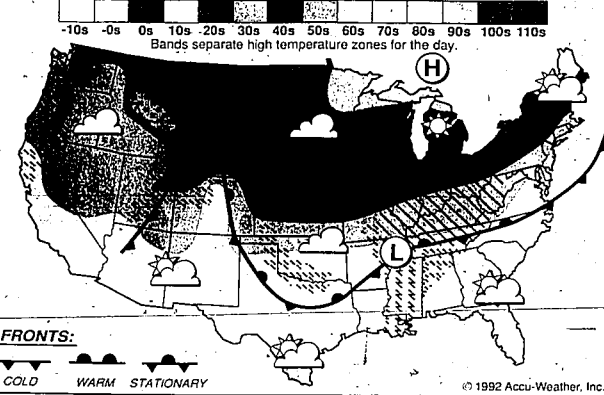
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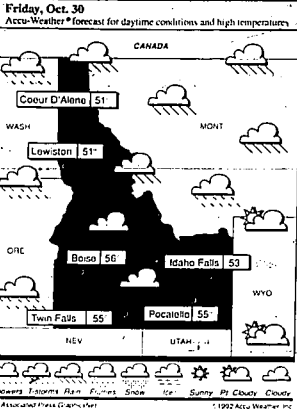

## Storm drenches Northwest, brings snow over mountains

A powerful Pacific storm drenched the Northwest on Thursday while snow blanketed high peaks of the Sierra Nevada and the central Rockies.

Thunderstorms rumbled over parts of Texas and rain doted portions of the East. Dry weather prevailed across the rest of the nation, but skies were mostly overcast. The sun peeked through over the Florida peninsula.

Denver got snow early, the result of a front parked over the central Rockies.

Snow in the mountains of Washington and higher elevations of Oregon and Northern California was expected to reach 4 inches.

By afternoon, showers and thunderstorms were over Texas, the northern Rockies, the Gulf Coast, the Plains, the Ohio Valley and New England.

Rainfall totals at mid-morning in Southern California included 2 inches in Magnolia and at Shasta Dam just 2.5 inches at Old Shasta. More than 3 inches fell at Ripps, 15 miles north of San Francisco, and 3.25 inches at Nagla.

The rainfall total of .74 inch in Sacramento by midday was a record for the date.

Temperatures were in the 30s by afternoon in the central Plains and over the Great Lakes. Readings were warming into the 80s over Texas and much of the South. High winds buffeted the nation's mid-section.

"investigatory records" when the release of those records "would constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy."

Horgan would not say whose privacy would be violated if the report is released.

Meanwhile, the controversy over the jailbreak continues to follow Gold on the campaign trail. He faces a stiff challenge from independent candidates George Silver III and Dale Reddick, and Democrat Ernie Brooks.

"I will not try to second-guess our prosecutor," Gold said. Although he and the commissioners, especially Lierman, have a history of heated conflict, Gold said he doesn't think the refusal is politically motivated.

Gold and Horgan agree that the report shows a series of "miscommunications" led up to Cisneros' escape. Changes have been made in the jail that make an escape of the same type "quite impossible," Gold said.

Cisneros, who was arrested in September in Salt Lake City and returned to Colorado to face escape charges there, used a smuggled hacksaw blade to saw through rivets on a window grate.

When he and the other inmates were allowed out of their cells and into a hallway to exercise, he jumped through a Plexiglas window while a fellow inmate held back the grate.

Officials in the sheriff's office had received a tip that Cisneros was planning to break out. But Gold said after the escape that the information came from an unreliable source and that such tips are fairly common.

Still, Gold stationed deputies outside the jail to watch for anyone trying to smuggle things through a cracked window.

Gold has repeatedly denied suggestions that he allowed the escape to happen in an attempt to catch Cisneros in the act. The attorney general's report bears that out, he said.

"It does exculpate me from all liability... except that I was sheriff at the time," he said.

# FDA approves birth control shot

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government on Thursday gave women the option of using an injectable drug, Depo Provera, that provides birth control for three months but also may cause weight gain and menstrual irregularities.

"This drug presents another long-term effective option for women to prevent pregnancy," Food and Drug Commissioner David Kessler said in a written statement.

"As an injectable, given once every three months, Depo Provera eliminates problems related to missing a daily dose," Kessler said.

About a quarter of the women of childbearing age in the United States use the birth control pill, which must be taken every day.

The Food and Drug Administration's decision followed the advice of an outside panel of scientists who recommended unanimously last June that the drug be allowed for use as a contraceptive.

However, the FDA pointed out that the drug has possible side effects, including weight gain and menstrual irregularities. It also can leave women tired, weak, dizzy and nervous and can cause headaches and abdominal pain.

The FDA's Fertility and Maternal Health Drugs Advisory Committee heard a day of testimony on the drug's side effects before voting that its potential benefits outweighed the risks. The panel considered whether the drug is scientifically linked to breast, liver or cervical cancer.

In 1973, FDA had announced its intention to approve the drug as a contraceptive, but protests from "during" congressional hearings prompted the agency to withhold approval. FDA again denied approval for this use in 1978 because animal studies suggested a link to cancers of the cervix, liver and breast.

# Artificial vision allows woman to see light dots

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A tiny electrode implanted in a blind woman's brain allowed her to "see" distinct dots of light — a method that may produce an artificial vision device in several years, doctors said Thursday.

The experiment "gives us firm evidence that artificial vision for the blinded person is an achievable goal, hopefully before the end of the decade," said Dr. Murray Goldstein, director of the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke.

The device would include a miniature television camera attached to eyeglass frames: The TV picture of a blind person's surroundings is sent to electrodes permanently implanted in the brain and the user experiences the sensation of seeing a picture made up of 250 to 1,000 spots of light.

"Our initial goal is to develop a stadium scoreboard type of display so they could read printed material and recognize street signs," he said. "Eventually, we'll navigate through doorways and avoid obstacles," said Dr. Terry Hambrecht, an institute physician and bio-medical engineer.

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# Election looms, but is America ready to make a leap of faith?

Allie Turner lives in a small town with big-city problems. Two women murdered in the past two weeks; 20 jobless men within three blocks of her home; countless youths gripped by illegal drugs.

"It is depressing," says the retired Meridian, Miss. schoolteacher and principal. "I don't have children, and I'm beginning to think that I'm fortunate to have lived when I did."

Are our best days as a nation behind us? The question is haunting Americans as Election Day 1992 looms. They yearn to believe the future holds promise, but many aren't ready to make that leap of faith.

Indeed, many Americans believe the country is on the wrong track and they don't see major social ills disappearing anytime soon. Asked to look 10 years down the road, participants in an Associated Press poll were glum about the prospects for a less dangerous, more compassionate society.

"Things just seem so up in the air. Everything seems kind of frightening right now," says Debbie Coleman, 33, a Merrimack, N.H. homemaker with two young children.

The national spirit usually soars in anticipation of a new president or a new start, says political psychologist Harold Zullow of Columbia University. But not this time. "This is a malaise election, similar to 1932 or

## AP polls finds pessimism on solving social ills

NEW YORK (AP) — Most Americans don't think the country will make much progress toward solving major social problems such as crime, drug abuse and homelessness in the next decade, an Associated Press poll has found.

But the AP survey discovered somewhat more optimistic attitudes when it came to America's future prosperity and equal opportunity for women.

The results were based on telephone interviews with 1,000 adults across the country, conducted Oct. 16-20. Participants were asked to say whether the following series of statements would be accurate or inaccurate in 10 years: (Because of rounding, sums may not total 100.)

1. The streets of America's big cities will be much safer than they are today. Accurate: 20 percent. Inaccurate: 78 percent. Don't know: 2 percent.

2. Older people were twice as likely to agree with this statement as people under age 44. Accurate: 82 percent. Don't know: 17 percent. Inaccurate: 1 percent.

3. Homelessness will be virtually eliminated in America. Accurate: 15 percent. Inaccurate: 83 percent. Don't know: 3 percent.

4. America will not be one of the world's most prosperous countries. Accurate: 42 percent. Inaccurate: 55 percent. Don't know: 3 percent.

5. Blacks and whites will be treated equally. Accurate: 39 percent. Inaccurate: 57 percent. Don't know: 3 percent.

6. Men and women on average will have equal job opportunities. Accurate: 55 percent. Inaccurate: 44 percent. Don't know: 1 percent.

7. Health care will not be equally available to everyone who needs it. Accurate: 57 percent. Inaccurate: 39 percent. Don't know: 4 percent.

8. You will have a better standard of living than your parents did at the same age. Accurate: 61 percent. Inaccurate: 36 percent. Don't know: 3 percent.

"I don't know if my kids will be able to do that," he says.

Much of the pessimism has economic roots. People see the headlines, they hear the statistics. They may even be a headline or statistic. It's no longer unthinkable.

"We're seeing a lot more white middle-class people coming through our mission center," says Don Helms, associate pastor of the First Baptist Church of Newman, Ga. "They're looking for food, clothing, or somebody to listen and say 'Things are going to get better for you,' so they can just have a chance to experience hope."

Democrat Bill Clinton — the candidate who was born in Hope, Ark. — has tried to frame the election as a choice between "hope and fear." He has called repeatedly for racial unity and closed his nomination acceptance speech with the line, "I still believe in a place called Hope."

That message has struck a chord. Candidates who either didn't discuss problems or made them seem surmountable won 18 of presidential 2 elections from 1900 to 1984, according to a study by Zullow and psychologist Martin Seligman of the University of Pennsylvania. Among the victors: Eisenhower, Johnson and Reagan.

President Bush is having trouble convincing some voters he has a way to fix their problems. Independ-

ent Ross Perot's call for shared sacrifice is not what most people want to hear. Almost by process of elimination, Clinton has become a repository for profound, intangible hopes.

In Ypsilanti, the doomed plant workers call Clinton their only hope. In College Station, Texas, Neal Van Alfen says Clinton will revive the caring of the past.

"Twenty years ago we had a real sense that we had a responsibility to the environment and to each other. I don't see that as much anymore. I'm disappointed in how the country has changed," says Van Alfen, a plant pathology professor at Texas A&M.

Blacks in the AP poll were more pessimistic than whites about the state of race relations a decade from now. But many have great hopes that Clinton will defuse tensions.

"If we don't sit down and talk to one another and reach some common ground, we're in trouble," says Johnson. "Clinton has a way to racial equity and doesn't believe in divisiveness. The message has to be sent from the top. That sets the climate and the tone."

Turner, the granddaughter of a former slave, sees "too many black men out on their backs, too many white men selling black boys crack." She, too, is counting on "responsible leadership" at the White House to help ease the trials of the black community.

1980," he says.

In the AP poll, eight in 10 said big-city streets would not be much safer, illegal drugs would still be a big problem and the homeless would still be with us a decade from now. Nearly six in 10 said blacks and whites would not be treated equally and health care still would not be equally available to everyone who needed it.

People were somewhat more optimistic on other fronts in answering

the poll questions posed by ICR-Survey Research Group of Media, Pa., an arm of AUS Consultant Cos.

More than half those questioned said that America would still be one of the world's most prosperous countries in 10 years, that they would have a better standard of living than their parents did at the same age and that men and women would have equal job opportunities.

It's their own kids people worry

about. "Are our children going to have to compete with Mexicans who think \$2-3 an hour is a good wage?" frets Brad Martell of Ypsilanti, Mich. He's an autoworker and his plant is about to close.

"Can my kids afford a house?" wonders George Johnson, 49, of Los Angeles. After 20 years on the police force, he retired and went into real estate — and bought himself "a great big old home" worth \$500,000.

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## Candidates file suit challenging congressional pay increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — A planned congressional pay raise, which would boost lawmakers' salaries to \$139,600 on Jan. 1, was challenged in a federal court lawsuit Thursday by 20 members of Congress plus nearly 100 House and Senate candidates.

The more than \$340-a-month, 3.2 percent cost-of-living increase should be declared unconstitutional in violation of the 27th Amendment, according to the suit filed in U.S. District Court. Rank-and-file House and Senate members currently earn \$129,500.

The amendment, written by James Madison in 1789 but ratified just this year, requires that an election intervene between the approval of a congressional pay raise and its effective date.

The suit said it was not questioning "the legitimacy of Congress' granting itself a 3.2 percent raise, but only ... the payment of it before an intervening House election has taken place."

The cost-of-living raise is part of a process that does not require a congressional vote.

It begins with a recommendation to the president by a citizens' commission, followed by a pay proposal from the president to Congress.

Lawmakers can pass legislation or separate House and Senate rules to make the raise effective, or they can do nothing and the new salary will be instituted on the day recommended by the president.

Congress this year chose the last option, the automatic increase. Even before the Madison amendment was ratified, a 1989 law required pay raises other than cost-of-living increases to be delayed until after the next election.

Just to emphasize their point, the plaintiffs announced the action in congressional districts across the country.

The chief counsel to the House clerk, Steve Ross, said he had no immediate comment. House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., has maintained that the raise doesn't conflict with the Madison amendment.

The suit sought an injunction to prevent the secretary of the Senate and clerk of the House from increasing congressional paychecks, the pensions of retired lawmakers or pensions of surviving spouses. It also asked for a ruling that any congressional pay raise taking effect without an intervening election would violate the 27th Amendment.

The suit was filed by 20 lawmakers, 99 House and Senate candidates — including a congressman running for the Senate — six organizations and others.

The 27th Amendment says, "No law varying the compensation for the services of the senators and representatives shall take effect until an election of representatives shall have intervened."

## Perot continues million-dollar pace

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ross Perot has dropped \$36.7 million of his own money on his presidential bid this month, and already has spent more than President Bush and Bill Clinton are allowed to spend on their entire general election campaigns, according to campaign finance reports.

Reports that Perot's campaign filed with the Federal Election Commission show the Texas billionaire forked over another \$10.7 million of his fortune to his campaign between Oct. 15 and Oct. 26.

The additional transfers bring to about \$36.7 million the amount Perot has spent since re-entering the race Oct. 1 — the substantial portion of which has gone to a national advertising blitz unseen in politics and rivaling even some of the most ag-

gressive corporate endeavors.

Bush and Clinton are limited to spending the \$55.2 million each received from taxpayers for the full campaign. Their parties also can spend about \$10 million on their behalf.

But Clay Malford, general counsel to the Perot campaign, said Thursday, "It's inaccurate to present the situation that Mr. Perot is spending more money than anybody else."

Malford, at the campaign's daily news briefing, gave reporters a chart showing much larger expenditures by the Bush and Clinton campaigns.

Counting party, convention, primary and other expenditures, Bush has spent \$167.78 million and Clinton \$167.09 million, Malford said.

He acknowledged Perot has outspent his opponents in October.

In all, Perot has spent \$58.7 million, all but \$1.3 million of it his own, since first flirting with an independent bid in March. Perot has no spending limit because he is paying his own way.

That alone puts him in his own league as the first presidential candidate in modern history to pay for his own national campaign.

Some observers say the historical significance may be that Perot, unlike Bush and Clinton, tends to campaign almost exclusively by television advertising, until now skipping traditional public appearances.

## CDC adds prevention to its name

ATLANTA (AP) — The agency that sets the nation's health standards is adding an ounce of prevention to its name: It's now the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"Prevention's time has come in America," Director William E. Roper said Thursday. "Since we are the nation's prevention agency, we think it only appropriate that our formal title carry that message."

Congress authorized the change this year, but asked the Atlanta-based agency to continue using the initials CDC because they're widely recognized.

The CDC grew out of the nation's program to protect soldiers from malaria during World War II. In 1946, it was named the Communicable Disease Center, widening its scope to address all contagious diseases.

# General: Hiss never spied for Russia, was victim of Cold War

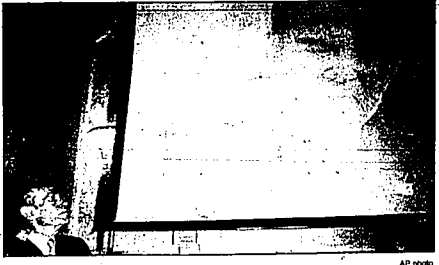
NEW YORK (AP) — Alger Hiss, one of the first targets of anti-Communist fervor at the start of the Cold War, said Thursday he was grateful he was still alive to proclaim vindication after 44 years.

In the sensational drama of 1948 that spotlighted a young Congressman Richard M. Nixon, Hiss was accused of being a Red spy by an admitted former Communist, Whitaker Chambers.

Now, at a news conference, the fragile, patrician, 87-year-old Hiss watched a videotape in which a Russian general declared that Hiss never spied for the Soviet Union.

Gen. Dmitri A. Volkogonov, keeper of Russian military intelligence archives, also said he found nothing in the records that showed Chambers was a Soviet espionage conduit.

The general asked John Lowen-

from his heart."

"The Alger Hiss case was a result of the Cold War, which I hope has definitely become a thing of the past," Volkogonov said.

Hiss, who came under attack while he was a 44-year-old former State Department lawyer, entered the news conference walking with a cane. He remained seated and his head shook as he answered questions in a quavery voice.

He said there probably would remain doubters — "people who have invested so much in a contrary point of view to mine that I can hardly expect them to change now."

Chambers' accusations came in testimony in 1948 before the House Un-American Activities Committee.

He said that 10 years earlier Hiss, while in the State Department, gave him secret documents for transmission to the Soviet Union.

It was too late for an espionage prosecution, but Hiss was charged with perjury for denying the allegations. After one hung jury, he was convicted in 1950 and jailed for 3½ years. He has since worked to clear his name.

Nixon staunchly backed Chambers and his political career took off. The case turned on bizarre revelations, the most famous of which had Chambers opening a pumpkin in which he had hidden microfilm of what he said Hiss had given him. It was known ever after as the "pumpkin papers."

Chambers, an editor at Time magazine when he made the allegations, died in 1961.

The case continued touching nerves in U.S. politics for four decades, spawning books and documentary films.

Some scholars expressed reservations about whether Volkogonov really could find and examine every source in the Soviet intelligence network.

Hiss called the general an "authoritative, important, authentic source." He expressed regret that what he called his exoneration had come from the Russian government rather than his own, but said he might continue to seek a reversal from U.S. courts.

## New gas for winter takes effect

WASHINGTON (AP) — This winter automobiles in most American urban areas will be polluting less, thanks to a cleaner-burning, popper gasoline required by the government. But the new gas will probably cost a little more.

As a result of the regulation that takes effect Sunday, carbon monoxide emissions from automobiles and small trucks will be sharply reduced in 39 urban areas from Boston to San Diego, say air quality experts.

There are no Idaho areas on the list.

"This is the first big program under the Clean Air Act to go into effect," said Dick Wilson of the Environmental Protection Agency. "It's the first thing the public will actually notice."

Under the two-year-old law, service stations in the 39 areas, which don't meet carbon monoxide health standards, will be allowed to sell only gasoline containing an additive that provides more oxygen, thereby allowing it to burn cleaner.

The new blend must be used over a four-to-seven-month period, most during cool weather, depending on the severity of air pollution. The EPA estimates that the new gasoline will result in a drop of about 20 percent in carbon monoxide emissions from cars and trucks.

## U.S., South Korea plan joint training

WASHINGTON (AP) — Most of the 787,400 U.S. and South Korean troops on the Korean peninsula will participate in a series of field training exercises next week, the Pentagon announced Thursday.

The Nov. 3-7 training will include firing blank ammunition and night combat operations, and most will occur well south of the densely populated Seoul metropolitan area, a Pentagon statement said.

The exercise, Foal Eagle '92, is the 27th in a series of similar annual training exercises.

There are about 37,400 U.S. troops stationed in South Korea, and about 750,000 active duty members of the military in the Republic of Korea.

## Carjack victim survives toss from roof

NEW YORK (AP) — It could have been a scene from "Diehard 3." The bad guys took their victim to the roof of a housing project, robbed him and tossed him over the side.

But he grabbed a scaffolding rope and dangled for more than 20 minutes before police pulled him to safety through a 19th-floor window.

Andre Modeste of Brooklyn was driving through the Bronx on Wednesday when two men jumped into his car and forced to drive

four blocks to the housing project, said Housing Police Officer Jay Fleming.

Modeste, 20, managed to break away after the men robbed him. They opened fire but missed him. Then they caught him and tossed him from the roof, Fleming said.

Modeste snared the rope and clung to it, screaming for help, Fleming said.

Residents called police, who pulled Modeste inside.

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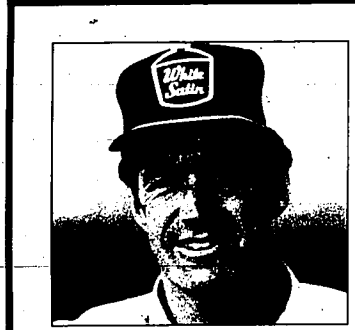
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## Kempthorne fights for fair trade for Idaho farmers


So let me restate my firm support for the sugar industry of Idaho and the sugar program!

### In our book, it's Stallings for Senate — by a nose

Words are the common currency of politics, and Richard Stallings and Dirk Kempthorne have spent them lavishly in this year's U.S. Senate race.

But words are not nearly so valuable as deeds in predicting a politician's performance. Fortunately for Idaho, both candidates have admirable records.

As the congressman from southern Idaho's own 2nd Congressional District, Stallings has earned a reputation for diligence and moderation and unquestionable integrity. As mayor of Boise, Kempthorne has presided over the ascension of a city known increasingly as a jewel of the West.

Contrary to the campaign-season brick-bats traded by the candidates, both are fine, honorable men. It's a tough call for voters.

Deciding the race "on the issues" isn't as helpful as you might think, because the two men are not far apart. Both are moderates, separated more by party label than by philosophy.

An example is the North American Free Trade Agreement. Though the two candidates have sniped at each other over the agreement's potential impact on Idaho's sugar growers, in practical terms their positions are almost identical.

But voters must choose. We think past performance — not this year's promises — should be the deciding factor. For that reason we lean toward Stallings, though not by much.

Here's our assessment of the two men:

#### Stallings

In his eight years in Congress, Stallings has behaved the way a Western Democrat must behave to survive. He makes frequent trips home, stays close to his voters and makes sure his votes in Congress reflect Idahoans' ideals.

Early on, Stallings staked out agriculture as his topic and became a devoted student of it. He has made a vocation of helping farmers and other constituents out of bureaucratic jams.

Like all Western Democrats, however, Stallings is at risk if he gradually becomes more Democrat and less Western. The risk is acute for senators, who run for re-election only every six years. They have plenty of time in Washington to hobnob with beltway lobbyists and similar species.

Additionally, Stallings' ties to labor groups are cause for concern. He has taken a pro-union position on several key bills, including one that would have allowed businesses to counter strikes by hiring replacement workers. If he is elected to the Senate on the heavy labor backing he now enjoys, he is likely to become even more pro-union in the years ahead.

Stallings says he will maintain his independence. If he is as smart as we think, he will guard against the folly of Frank Church, who became a national power but neglected his roots.

#### Kempthorne

Kempthorne started this race as a Boisean little-known outside his own city, but his bus-borne campaign has raised his stature around the state.

As mayor, Kempthorne made his reputation as one who gets things done.

His pragmatism, rather than any ideological zeal, is a strong credential. So is his reliance on solid business and conservative principles, which has allowed him to build alliances among civic and community leaders.

The danger is that Kempthorne, lacking either legislative experience or a heartfelt mission, could become a tool of the conservative machinery that is backing his bid for office.

That danger was reflected in Kempthorne's attack on Stallings over federal water rights in the Nevada wilderness bill. The issue became a festering sore on Kempthorne's credibility.

It's an example of a political style Kempthorne should avoid if he is elected. We'd hate to see him waste his career on trivialities such as congressional elevator operators. He's a better man than that.

#### Our choice

Of the two candidates, we give Stallings a slight edge, mainly because of his experience. Water and agricultural issues will pose serious challenges to Idaho in coming years and we'll need a U.S. senator who knows the ropes.

Judging by past actions, we already know Stallings' ability, and we probably can expect more of the same.

As for Kempthorne, he is likely to become a good senator, but perhaps not as quickly. If he wins, we wish him well.

If he doesn't, his statewide exposure this year is a strong foundation for future races — perhaps a run for governor in 1994.

#### A footnote

We think there is merit to the argument that a government divided between a Republican president and a Democratic Congress leads to gridlock.

A Sen. Stallings would not be a frequent ally of a re-elected George Bush, and he might be a too-frequent ally of a President Clinton.

If you think Bush should have a broader base of support in Congress, that may be reason enough to vote for Kempthorne.

Or, if you think Clinton should have a friendly Congress to help overturn a long list of Bush vetoes, that may be reason enough to vote for Stallings.

Of course, either choice depends on accurately predicting which of three candidates will win the White House. Good luck.



## Clinton win would mandate action

The polls are suggesting victory for Gov. Bill Clinton, as they have continually since the Democratic convention. If Clinton does win, the public will find itself surveying a political landscape that, I think, will be surprising to many.

They will observe that, for the first time in a generation, the governance of the United States is, at every level, very largely in the hands of a single party — the Democrats.

The Democrats already have a majority in the House and in the Senate. They also hold a majority of governorships (28 to the Republicans' 20) and are in the majority in a majority of the state legislative bodies (72 to the Republicans' 26). According to the best guesses of the political experts, there is little chance that the Democrats will lose their lead in any of these arenas.

Of course, it is possible that this vision of an unbroken sea of Democratic office holders will, at the last minute, inspire voters as they approach the booths to return to the arms of the Republican incumbent in the White House.

However, there are reasons for doubting this will occur. The public, it is true, has deliberately chosen divided government for more than a decade. And an election is supposed to express the will of the people.

There is no law, however, that the public must do anything to happen in re-election years, the voters, by choosing one party to

take charge of the White House and another to predominate in Congress, appears to have opened for paralysis.

The public's will was not to will anything. It didn't want to hand the government a mandate to do something; it wanted to put a stick in the government's wheels.

A second sign of this national yearning for inaction has been the public's often-demonstrated refusal to pay higher taxes. If one way to disable government is to divide it, another is to deprive it of funds, as the people of California did when they passed Proposition 13.

A third way is to boycott the whole operation of politics — simply to shun voting, as almost 50 percent of the eligible voters did in the presidential election of 1988.

The politicians, adapting quickly to the disrepute of their own trade, schooled themselves in the arts of running, as "outsiders," against the government they sought to join.

Most important, they learned to swear not to raise taxes. The result, of course, is a national debt of \$4 trillion.

If this public mood, which might be called a kind of determined inattention to politics, had persisted, we might expect more ticket-splitting in the voting booths this year. There are important signs, however, that things have changed.

One is the sharp decline in the popularity of President George Bush, who, as the champion of the public's unrealmism regarding taxes, is the political embodiment of the public's inattention.

A second sign is the unmistakable realignment of audiences for the presidential debates and a rise in voter registration.

If these signs herald a fundamental change in the public's attitude, not just to Republicans and Democrats but to politics itself, then the public may, finally, be ready to put an end to paralysis.

And if that is so, then it may not shrink when it gets into the voting booths, giving a single party a clear, unqualified mandate for action.

With a clear mandate to act, however, will come clear responsibility for success or failure. The voters' mandate would be based entirely on the hope of future performance, not on a fund of loyalty for past deeds.

Such loyalty would be entirely conditional. It would be as shallow as it was wide. The Democrats, if they win this election, will be under a pressure to obtain results that no party has been under, perhaps, since Franklin Roosevelt was elected 60 years ago.

If they fail, their downfall is likely to be as thorough as the victory they are aching for on Tuesday.

services — there's no end to the list.

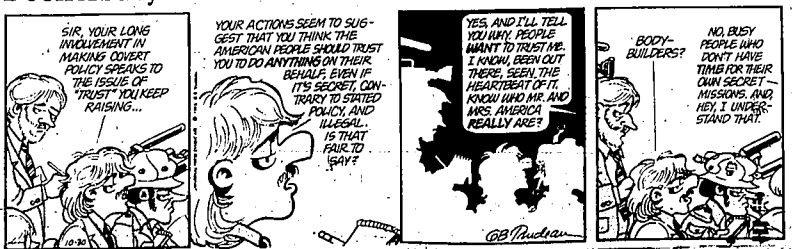

He attempted to intimidate us with his badge and falsely placed us under arrest for allegedly trespassing. His blatant abuse of his authoritative power upset me. In the past, my encounters with area law enforcement officers have been positive. The actions of Sheriff Gold were completely unparalleled to those exhibited by the other professional law officers that I have met.

I was disappointed that Sheriff Gold did not present the positive behavior that I have come to expect from other officers of the law.

Larry Gold abused his powers, attempted to intimidate us with false arrest, and behaved in a manner that is unacceptable for a law enforcement officer. Any man that displays these types of action should not be allowed to hold a public office.

By the time I caught up with our group, Mr. Gold had already obtained their hunting and driver's licenses. Mr. Gold would not accept being told to leave. He was hostile, agitated and confrontational, and their appropriate questions to him regarding why he was acting in this manner only raised his level of irritation.

During my presence, there was no profanity used by anyone involved. The only person not in control was Mr. Gold.

I addressed the sheriff, identified myself and indicated what I had witnessed and beyond my understanding and that I had just spoken to another hunter that he already intimidated. By this time, Mr. Gold's hunting companion arrived, had heard part of this conversation and he also indicated to Mr. Gold that the episode was totally out of hand.

I believe there is a more critical issue to be addressed. Using the authority of one's office to intimidate the average citizen is wrong. All of us who are entrusted by the public, whether through elective office or our chosen profession, have a special responsibility not to violate that trust.

This is even more critical in law enforcement, where people who have violated a statute and complain about their treatment to the authorities naturally have less credibility than those of us who are not in this

circumstance. This pattern of conduct when repeated over a period of time will sooner or later be called into question. Fortunately or unfortunately, depending on your perspective, we were the ones who were in the right place at the wrong place at the time.

**UN envoy in Somalia leaves post**

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) — The outspoken diplomat who coordinated U.N. operations in starving Somalia quit tearfully Thursday over what he called bitter experiences with the U.N. bureaucracy.

Mohamed Sahnoun's departure was seen by many as a setback in the international effort to alleviate suffering in Somalia, where drought and clan warfare threaten up to 2 million lives.

"He has left a huge void," said CARE-USA President Philip Johnston.

At a news conference announcing his resignation, Sahnoun acknowledged he may have stepped on some toes when he criticized U.N. response to the Somali catastrophe as slow and inadequate.

But, he said, "I did it with no intention but to really make people aware of the situation and to fulfill their duties."

After the news conference, the veteran Algerian diplomat left Mogadishu on a U.N. plane for Paris.

Sahnoun's resignation comes at a time of increased clan fighting, which has imperiled the United Nations' new, 100-day crash program to increase the flow of food and other aid.

As Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali's special envoy to Somalia, Sahnoun oversaw the relief efforts and peace talks. He recently was negotiating with warlords over deploying 3,500 U.N. peacekeepers to protect aid shipments.

U.N. sources said Sahnoun felt the time had come to quit bargaining with the warlords and deploy the troops, but that that sentiment was not shared at U.N. headquarters. The sources spoke on condition of anonymity.

By Sahnoun's estimate, 300,000 Somalis already have died from war and hunger. The United Nations says 250,000 more could perish by Christmas unless aid reaches them.

Until his successor is named, Sahnoun said, the Somalia operation will be headed by Brig. Gen. Imtiaz Shaheen, the commander of a Pakistani peacekeeping battalion in Mogadishu.

Asked where Sahnoun's departure left negotiations over the troop deployment, Shaheen replied: "At square one."

Boutros-Ghali declined to comment on Sahnoun's resignation as he left a U.N. Security Council meeting in New York. His spokesman, Joe Sills, said Boutros-Ghali had accepted the resignation and would officially notify the council soon.

**Waxworks sex probe goes on**

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands (AP) — Madame Tussaud's Wax Museum continued its investigation Thursday into how a pornographic magazine obtained photographs of semi-nude women in provocative poses with its wax statues.

Arthur Martin, the editor of Chick Magazine, said the pictures were taken during the museum's regular operating hours by a photographer on the publication's staff. The photos were published in the magazine's October issue.

The photos show three live models posing next to a wax statue of rock star Tina Turner, and kissing and petting a statue of singer-songwriter David Bowie.

The women were also photographed behind the front window of the museum, which looks onto the capital's Royal Palace.

Museum director Willem Bijleveld said the museum is conducting an internal investigation "into when and how these photos were taken."

Bijleveld said Madame Tussaud's suspects the involvement of an employee. Martin denied the collusion of any museum staff.

## Professor disputes penning of Little House books

**KANSAS CITY, Mo.** - Laura Ingalls Wilder's beloved "Little House" books about life on the American frontier in the late 1800s were ghostwritten by her daughter, a professor contends.

William Holtz, a University of Missouri professor of English, credits Rose Wilder Lane with everything that make the children's books "stand up and sing."

"I am saying the daughter substantially rewrote it, excising parts, writing dramatic themes, changing dialogue. If this isn't ghostwriting, what is?" Holtz said in a telephone interview from Columbia on Wednesday.

In a forthcoming book, Holtz challenges the image of Wilder as a literary Grandma

Moses of the Ozarks.

Some of Holtz's colleagues dispute his conclusion, saying the two writers collaborated and Lane was simply an editor for the series published in the 1930s.

"(Lane's) fingerprints are all over those books," said William Anderson, a Michigan author who has written several books on Wilder's family. "But I just don't think it is fair to say she did 80 or 90 percent of the writing."

William Morris, a spokesman for HarperCollins Children's Books, said that if Lane had been a ghostwriter, the company would have given her credit as co-author. HarperCollins' predecessor companies published nearly 35 million copies of the books.

The books, based on Wilder's experiences growing up on the prairie, were

translated into dozens of languages and became the basis for the TV series "Little House on the Prairie."

Gen. Douglas MacArthur had the books translated into Japanese and distributed in the war-ravaged country, "so they would know what real Americans were like," said Connie Tidwell, curator of the Laura Ingalls Wilder-Rose Wilder Lane Home and Museum.

Wilder, who had the equivalent of an eighth-grade education, began writing books at age 65 at her daughter's urging. Earlier, she had written for newspapers and a Missouri farm journal.

While working on her famous books, Wilder sat at a tiny desk at her home in the Missouri Ozarks and scribbled on paper tablets, some of which are on display at the

## Arts Council seeks public comment on proposal

**TWIN FALLS** - The Magic Valley Arts Council has launched a dream.

Picture it: Jazz groups making music into the night — nationally known country singers strumming their ballads — summer stock in the open air — Shakespeare festivals and local pageants on stage at an outdoor amphitheater.

To that end, a committee was established during the summer to study the possibilities. The panel includes people active in the arts, parks and recreation and community development. Currently in the initial stages of formulating a plan, this committee is seeking public comment, mostly from a questionnaire in today's paper. It's part of a feasibility study.

Earlier this year, the council received a \$10,000 grant from the Idaho Commission on the Arts to study the feasibility of constructing an amphitheater. John Bertram of Planners in Boise was hired to do the work. The grant also pays for a set of architectural drawings, to be completed by Beck & Baird of Boise once the feasibility study concludes, probably in mid-December.

Preliminary contacts have been made with arts groups in the community to determine interest in the project. "So far, I don't feel like the groups have caught the dream," said Betsy Bullard, council co-coordinator. Bertram agreed.

"You almost have to go to an amphitheater and experience it to know what it's all about," said Bertram, who is still compiling questionnaires from Magic Valley arts groups. He estimated that at least 25 percent of the

groups are neutral, with a few voicing support and a few conveying negative feelings. "We tried having a workshop for the arts groups, but only about half of them sent representatives," he said.

Finances don't seem to be a major objection, explained Bertram, adding that raising money for such a project usually involves a combination of grant money, private donations and ticket fees. "We aren't proposing building this next year," he said. "It would take a few years."

Right now, Bertram is concentrating on working with individual members of area arts groups who have expressed excitement about the amphitheater, Greg

English is one of the more enthusiastic dreamers.

Having worked with various theater groups in the Magic Valley, English visualizes an outdoor amphitheater as a unique and positive addition to the community. "Personally, I'm all for it," he said.

Planners have been combing the Northwest for model amphitheatres, like the one in Moses Lake, Wash.

The \$435,000 Moses Lake Centennial Theater, which seats 3,000 people, opened in 1990, and it's a hit, luring in tourists with a steady stream of touring concert acts, including Ranch Romance, the Platters and Glep Yarbrough. Money to construct the city-owned facility came solely from the town's hotel-motel tax.

Bullard sees a Magic Valley amphitheater as both a cultural and an economic plus for the community. "I think it would boost the tourist trade," she said, "and we could have great entertainment for families."

As the committee attempts to set priorities and seek direction, it has settled on four possible sites. They are Dierkes Lake southeast of the softball field, the City Park bandshell, the College of Southern Idaho campus near the Herrett Museum and Rock Creek Canyon near downtown.

The committee favors Dierkes Lake.

# O'Connor wants to try her hand at opera

LONDON (AP) — Sinead O'Connor wants to give up promotion of her pop music and study opera, her publicist said, denying a report that the controversial singer was giving up making records.

The pop magazine Melody Maker quoted O'Connor as saying her new recording of "Don't Cry for Me, Argentina" would be her last, because she has fulfilled a childhood pact with God.

But her New York publicist, Elaine Schock, said the singer just "does not want to be part of the pop music industry, and the conventional means of promoting a record, such as albums, interviews and tours. But she never did that anyway."

Schock said that when she spoke to O'Connor, the singer said, "I still want to be a part of music. I still want to write and sing and make my own records." The magazine accurately reported that O'Connor wants to train as an opera singer, the publicist said.

Melody Maker said that during an interview O'Connor said she intends to return to Dublin, study opera and "set up a family with children who'll grow up to be happy."

"The most impressive teacher I ever had once said to me, 'Don't forget to leave the party before they all get drunk and start fighting.' That's what I'm doing," she was quoted as telling Melody Maker, a pop music magazine.

"In the circumstances, perhaps I should have left a little earlier," O'Connor was quoted as saying. On Oct. 3, O'Connor sparked controversy by tearing up a photograph of Pope John Paul II on NBC's "Saturday Night Live" just after proclaiming "Fight the real enemy." Later in the month, she was booted off the stage by fans at a Bob Dylan tribute in New York.

O'Connor explained her actions by saying she wanted to draw attention to child abuse, which she blamed in part on teachings of the Roman Catholic Church. She has said repeatedly that she was abused as a child.

"I didn't know if I was going to be able to stay alive, and I asked God to help me," she was quoted as telling Melody Maker. "I promised Him that if He helped me, I'd work for Him. And He did help me. He gave me my voice, and I have to use my voice in every way, not just singing...."

homestead in Mansfield.  
By the time she died in 1957, Wilder had published 10 books. Another was published after her death. Lane died in 1968.

Holtz's claims are made in his biography of Lane. "The Ghost in the Little House" is to be published in the spring by University of Missouri Press. Lane's heir gave Holtz access in 1976 to family letters, diaries and manuscripts.

"I think what the manuscripts, the diary and the letters indicate is that (Wilder) was an amateurish writer from beginning to end and that everything that makes the 'Little House' books stand up and sing is what the daughter did to them," Holtz said.

He said Lane was an established writer before Wilder became

famous, writing novels, articles for national magazines and biographies of Henry Ford and Herbert Hoover.

"Have to finish my mother's goddamn juvenile, which has stopped me flat," Lane wrote to a friend about Wilder's "On the Banks of Plum Creek."

"Change the beginning if you want," Wilder wrote her daughter. "Do anything you please with (the) damn stuff if you will fix it up."

Wilder's manuscripts are noticeably different from the edited "Little House" books and Lane wrote entire chapters, Holtz said. Anderson, however, said the first two books were published "almost word for word" as Wilder wrote them.


Aside from improving the books' literary quality, Lane injected her libertarian political philosophy.

Holtz said. She hated Franklin D. Roosevelt's vision of an activist government and wanted Americans to remember a time when they were more self-reliant, he said.

For example, a character in Wilder's manuscript attended a school for the blind on state subsidy. Holtz said, Lane had the family paying for the girl to attend the school.

One expert questioned the importance of Holtz's assertions.

"It's an interesting scholarly question," said Liz Luntoon, director of children's services at the Chicago Public Library. "But it doesn't make any difference to the millions of kids around the world who read those books. It's still quintessentially the American pioneer experience."

# Strait can sing, but 'Pure Country' creaks

HOLLYWOOD — In "Pure Country," country singing star George Strait seems so laid back that at times the script laid out. Singers often make good actors, but Strait's performing

doesn't measure up to his heartfelt, down-home warbling. It doesn't matter much: "Pure Country" is pure corn.

The whole shebang is so achingly familiar that, after a while, you almost look forward to Strait's engagingly unengaging presence. Except for his performance numbers, he doesn't seem to be taking anything about the movie terribly seriously, which is the right approach.

Strait is "playing" Dusty, a country star who yearns to return to his North Texas roots. His shows have become so full of smoke and special effects and bombast that, when he unexpected-

ly drops out of his tour, a lip-synching replacement (Kyle Chandler) is brought in by his manager (Lesley Ann Warren) and the cheering audience never even catches on.

Dusty's odyssey takes in his kindly crochety grandmother (Molly McCleure) and a beautiful, free-spirited barrel racer, Harley (Isabel Glasser), who is a credit to her jeans. "The end

of the road" (rated PG for mild violence, sensuality and language) is so lulling in its down-home clichés, and so chaste in its romance, that it seems to have been made in a time warp. But it's too clunky to be offensive. When Strait smiles his wan, wide smile you can hear hearts breaking up and down the audience.

# Star buttons down for initial starring role

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) —

George Strait falls unceremoniously on his backside during one scene in the movie "Pure Country."

He's hoping the film — and his first starring role — don't meet the same fate.

The country singer turned leading man has a polished, button-down stage masculinity that Warner Bros. movie executives are counting on to translate to the screen.

"The film is about a country singer named Dusty who returns to Texas to rediscover his roots. Lesley Ann Warren plays his protective manager, and Isabel Glasser his headstrong love interest.

Strait, 40, has no acting experience unless you count his appearances in beer commercials. So people may wonder how he prepared. "I didn't," he said by telephone from Dallas. "They said maybe I

should take lessons, but I didn't want to and the director (Christopher Cain) didn't want me to, either. So we just jumped right in."

And Strait said he's satisfied with his acting debut.

"I enjoyed it and I did better than I thought I would. If you can get on stage and get a feeling from the crowd, you can get a similar feeling making a movie. It's just another part of the entertainment business."

Strait, displays his honky-tonk baritone on 11 songs in the movie, and the soundtrack has been turned into his 17th album. The first single released from the soundtrack is "Cross My Heart," and the music video accompanying the song features scenes from the movie.

Strait was country's pre-eminent star until Garth Brooks came along about three years ago. Strait was voted the Country Music Association's top award, entertainer of the year, in 1989 and 1990. Brooks has won it the two years since then.

Singing often about lost love, Strait has had 25 No. 1 singles and 16 gold or platinum albums. His music is dotted with clear, simple messages: "If you planned on hurting me, you're an overnight success" and "Leaving's been coming for a long, long time."

Some of his hit records: "All My Ex's Live in Texas," "So Much Like My Dad," "If I Know Me," "I've Come to Expect It From You," "What's Going On in Your World," "Lay Me Without End, Amen," "Baby's Gotten Good at Goodbye."

One of Strait's admirers is Col. Tom Parker, who was Elvis Presley's longtime manager. Parker encouraged "Pure Country" producer Jerry Weintraub to take a chance on Strait as a male lead.

## Linda McCartney looks back at 1960s in photography book

NEW YORK (AP) — After she got married in 1969, Linda McCartney stopped photographing rock performers. But earlier in the '60s, she photographed lots of them.

"I made a living. I paid my rent with it. I remember selling five or six pictures for personality posters, \$25 each. Boy was I happy," she said during an interview on a hotel room's small, sunny balcony. "And I was a free spirit. I could hang out, go on the road with them if I wanted to."

"After I married, I made a decision not to keep up with it. I would have loved to go to Jamaica and photograph (reggae musician) Bob Marley and taken a horse and a camera to the Southwest and photographed (painter) Georgia O'Keeffe. But photography became a family matter and projects to save the environment. It became more like a hobby than a job."

Some of those photos are included in her new book, "Linda McCartney's Sixties, Portrait of an Era."

Among her favorite photos: Jimi Hendrix thrusting his arm forward at the end of a guitar phrase. She also likes one of Otis Redding "just because it's Otis," adding: "There's one of John (Lennon) and Paul I like. It shows them smiling together. It shows their relationship that the press never got near. And this one of the four Beatles together, for the same reason."

The most famous photo shows husband Paul McCartney with their first baby, Mary, tucked inside his jacket. He used it as the cover on his first solo album.

"Everybody kept saying I should do a book. Paul kept saying it. Even back when we got married he said,

...I loved my photography—prints in black and white. Color he would flip into his briefcase. Can you imagine Jimi Hendrix with a briefcase?"

McCartney, who looks lithe and fit and whose manner is candid and friendly, also wrote the text.

"I decided to write it ungrudgingly," she said. "I wanted to show the wonderful thing that was going on. I was telling my little remembrances, really."

When she thinks about the '60s, she said, "Funny images come to my mind, like being inside another world while this world was going on. It was like a nucleus of young talent, nobody aware they were a nucleus."

"They were trying to change the norms, pointing out a generation gap, change being inside another thumbs change the whole political right wing and bigoted prejudice."

"I think it was a period people were saying let's help life to be a wonderful thing rather than an oppressive thing. It is desperately needed again. It is youth that does it. We've got to break traditions but keep the good ones."

"I think the arts have always influenced the way things go. Picasso and Goya were trying to stop war. They opened people's eyes to it. A lot of music now is image and money. Change has to be in the heart if it is to be a meaningful change."

She has enough pictures for more volumes of '60s photos, McCartney said, but probably won't pursue that because she wants to do a retrospective from all her photos.

"That really excites me," she said. "These are familiar faces. That would be life. There might be a few from the '60s. I took a lot of photographs alongside these, some art more than commerciality."

### Book information

"Linda McCartney's Sixties, Portrait of an Era" is published by Bulfinch Press, and sells for a suggested retail price of \$40.

"You should do a book on these photos..."

McCartney, 50, said she put the book together because "I was finally ready to look back on that period. It is really just the vibes, I guess."

Most of the pictures are black and white because her color slides and negatives were stolen from their house while the McCartneys were vacationing shortly after their marriage.

"Fans had broken in... A lot of it has come back in drabs and drabs. Hundreds of color shots are gone. I guess I'll never see them."

"Also, I gave Jimi Hendrix, who

HAGERMAN — Voters in Hagerman today will decide if the city is going to offer matching funds for a grant application.

The city needs to improve its water system to meet new state regulations, engineer Scott Bybee said at a public hearing Wednesday.

He explained that if the city wants to win federal grant funding for the project, estimated to cost about \$2 million, residents need to offer some funding of their own.

"If the bond is not passed, then the application would not be submitted because it wouldn't be going anywhere," Bybee said.

Voters will be saving money by approving the levy, the engineer said. He predicted that, if the city contributes the maximum amount of \$500,000, user fees for the levy would be \$7 per month per household for 20 years. All users, both in and out of city limits, would be charged the same fee.

However, Bybee warned, if the bond levy fails, the city will not be able to get grants

### Mayor: Misunderstanding led to mixup

HAGERMAN — A controversy over whether the mayor of Hagerman gave the all-clear last week for residents to drink from the city's troubled municipal water system arose from a misunderstanding with a Times-News reporter, the mayor says.

In an Oct. 22 story, the newspaper incorrectly reported that an order to boil drinking water in Hagerman had been lifted.

That report was based on an Oct. 21 telephone interview with Mayor Jim Martin, but the mayor's comments apparently

were misinterpreted. ("The reporter asked about the water," Martin said Thursday. "We talked about several things, and I think she just misunderstood.")

Martin said only the state Division of Environmental Quality, which imposed the boil-water order on Oct. 19, could lift the advisory.

The Times-News quoted Martin as saying, "We got back a negative test this morning, so I would say it is safe to drink now."

Although The Times-News believes the quote to be accurate, Martin said Thursday that he never made that statement.

The DEQ has not announced yet that the water is safe to drink.

### When, where to vote

HAGERMAN — City residents can vote today from noon to 8 p.m. at City Hall on a new water system. The ballot asks voters if they are in favor of or against issuing revenue bonds of up to \$500,000 to use as matching funds to improve the city water system.

The system Hagerman has now does not meet state requirements, he said.

Because of its serious need, Hagerman stands an excellent chance to win grants, Bybee said. He presented maximum figures showing that the city can get a \$600,000 grant from the federal Economic Development Administration, a \$500,000 grant from the Idaho Department of Commerce and a \$650,000 grant from the Farm Home Administration.

The child's mother told police she left Zane with Rose at 8:45 a.m. and returned just after noon to find him injured.

A 24-year-old Twin Falls woman contacted authorities Tuesday afternoon and said she had been raped several hours earlier.

The two apparently knew each other, and were in the desert northeast of the Perrine Bridge when the incident happened, Brant said.

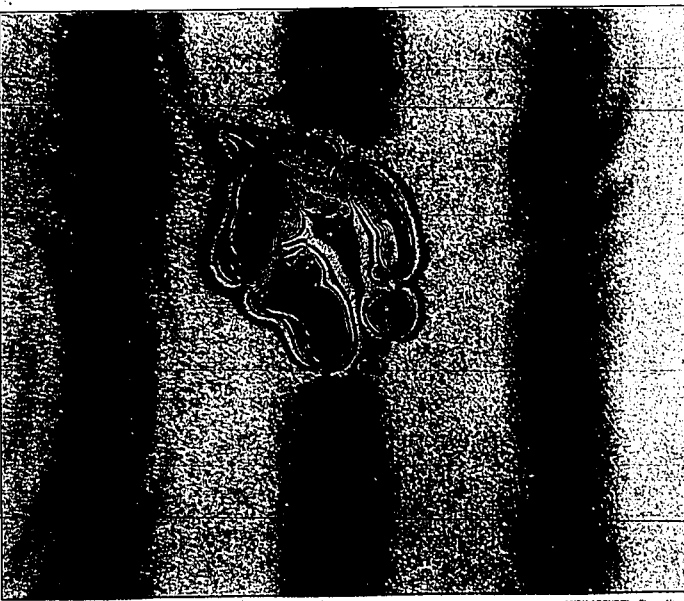

### Salmon Tract ponders fire protection

HOLLISTER — Most of the people at a hearing Thursday night said they want the Salmon Tract to form a separate fire district from the rest of Twin Falls County.

But the two-hour meeting showed the tough job county residents and the county commission face in forming one or more fire districts by the end of the year.

A Salmon Tract district is not even formed yet, but other residents from the proposed district's north end already are petitioning to join the Twin Falls Rural Fire District. But some residents within that north area are saying they would prefer to stay with the Salmon Tract.

At the close of the hearing, county Commissioners Jim Fraley and Marvin Hempleman took a straw vote that showed 34 people wanted to form a separate Salmon Tract district, while just three voted to go with a countywide district.

The proposed district would run from the Nevada border as far as 3450 North with a western boundary at Salmon Creek Falls and the Sawtooth National Forest on the east.

Hollister resident Julia Bingham said she worries that the Salmon Tract cannot properly fund a fire district.

"I'm concerned we have a district that can't (financially) function," Bingham said.

The Salmon Tract could raise \$48,000 a year in property taxes. Hollister Fire Chief Roger Jones said a budget worked up several months ago called for \$53,000 a year to run a fire department.

That can be trimmed, however, Jones said. Jones wants a separate Salmon Tract district.

"The majority of (Hollister) firemen probably still favor forming a separate district both as firemen and as taxpayers," Jones said.

A separate district will give more local control, he said.

Some north-end residents of the proposed district have asked the Twin Falls Rural Fire District to annex them down to 3200 North and from 2550 East to 3350 East.

One resident of that hearing said Thursday night, however, that he opposes the plan, saying

### Kemphorne talks health care to CSI audience

TWIN FALLS — With five campaign days to go before Election Day, GOP Senate candidate Dirk Kemphorne flew into town and back into the Magic Valley Thursday in a quest for undecided voters.

Kemphorne, whose recent polls have shown leading Democrat Richard Stallings, answered questions from College of Southern Idaho students for about 45 minutes before flying off to Idaho Falls and a rally with Vice President Dan Quayle. He returned to southern Idaho last night for a rally in Burley.

At the CSI forum, Kemphorne restated several of the themes that have marked his campaign, from market-oriented health care reform to the need for a balanced-budget amendment to the Constitution.

The audience of about 100 students was generally friendly to the Boise mayor, at one point singing him "Happy Birthday" as supporters gave him a cake for his 41st birthday.

However, some Stallings backers posed Kemphorne pointed questions about one of his television ads and his endorsement by Senate Minority Leader Robert Dole of Kansas.

Before the talk, Vice President Dan Quayle, James McClure and Sen. Alan Simpson of Wyoming, appeared with Kemphorne at a fund-raising breakfast last week.

One student asked Kemphorne why he brought

Race for Blaine County Commissioner pits opposites

Collins runs campaign on issues, refuses funding

TRIUMPH — A 49-year-old political novice with idealistic notions about government service is challenging Blaine County's three-term county commissioner, Rupert House.

Wendy Collins, who is seeking public office for the first time, refuses to criticize her opponent. Instead, she asks voters to judge candidates by their stands on the issues and their commitment to serve the public.

Collins also refuses to accept campaign contributions, suggesting that candidates need to be more "fiscally responsible" before they get into office and questioning the influence such contributions purchase.

Collins and her husband, Bill, moved to Blaine County, California in 1971 and raised a family. A tailor by trade, she was attracted to the Blaine County Planning and Zoning Commission 18 months ago and has steadily grown more politically active.

Collins, a self-avowed environmentalist, said she sees a need for clearly stated zoning laws and ordinances to guide Blaine County's growth and prevent degradation of its quality of life. As planning commissioner, she supported the controversial riparian and hillside ordinances.

"I support the concept of both

Highway 75 through the Wood River Valley, Collins supports alternatives like merging lanes, staggered working hours for commuters to reduce peak flow, and the use of a mass transit system.

Collins said "Absolutely!" to the idea of a county-wide bus system. "A system with bicycle racks would be usable by more people, enabling riders to go to their various destinations with less concern over connecting points and carrying parcels," she said.

Collins added that the timing and type of transit systems will depend on the availability of state and federal funding.

On the issue of county spending, Collins pointed out that the Blaine County budget has increased over \$3 million in the last three years.

"This type of runaway expenditure cannot continue or many people will be priced out of their homes. As the property values rise, the mill levy should come down to relieve citizens of an overburden of taxation," she said.

As commissioner, Collins said she would like to improve relations between the commissioners, county departments and the four-cities in the county in an effort to hold the line on costs.

She also added her support to the idea of a county-wide Real Estate Transfer Tax.

"We need a way to offset the impact that new development creates," Collins said. "Established residents bear the burden of added infrastructure costs created by

ordinances," she said. "Time will show where there are areas that need change. Some loopholes will be found that will have to be closed, and some areas that are too restrictive, or have inconsistencies, will have to be adjusted."

Like House, Collins supports the county's current effort to identify and protect public access.

"When it is completed, the goal will be to maintain public access where it has already been established, to reopen public access where it has been closed off by an individual, and to establish which roads are indeed private," Collins explained.

Incumbent House criticizes 'restrictive' zoning

TRIUMPH — The tiny, unincorporated community of Triumph, once the site of a major lead and silver mine, is common ground for the two candidates contending for the District 2 seat on the Blaine County Board of Commissioners.

Rupert House, a 76-year-old Republican incumbent seeking his fourth four-year term, has resided in the narrow East Fork canyon for more than 50 years. He was foreman of the Triumph Mine before he shut down in 1957 and later worked as a heavy equipment operator and road builder.

He lives on a small ranch about two miles downstream from the mine's tailings.

Wendy Collins, a 49-year-old Democratic challenger running for office here, lives on the opposite side of the tailings in Triumph proper.

Both House and Collins share an affection for the rugged East Fork Canyon with its steep forested hillsides and breathtaking views of the Pioneer Mountains. And both have expressed concern over the way the Environmental Protection Agency has handled its Superfund investigation of the Triumph mine tailings, suggesting that the potential threat from lead and arsenic is being overlooked.

The two candidates are divided by more than their age and political affiliations, however. Collins says it is time for a change in the makeup

of the commission, while House defends his record resolutely.

On land use issues, House said he thinks much of the county's zoning ordinances are "pretty restrictive," although he voted in favor of riparian and hillside protection ordinances during his latest term as commissioner.

In hindsight, he said the hillside ordinance — adopted to protect the Wood River Valley's scenic beauty from road scars — may have been unnecessary.

"There already was a pretty good road ordinance in place. All this new one did was upset the farmers down in the south end of the county," he said.

House favors enforcing both ordinances "on a case-by-case basis."

He has also supported the county's "public road identification plan, begun in 1989 in response to a public outcry over traditional

accesses to public lands being closed off by land owners. "We're working on that," House said.

Like his opponent, House agrees that Friedman Memorial Airport must remain in its current FAA classification, limiting the size and type of aircraft permitted to land. "The way it is now, the people that use the airport and fly are the ones that pay for it," House says. "If they want bigger planes, let them land down in Twin Falls."

House, however, voted against the airport commission's recent decision to limit growth at the airport by allowing just one fixed base operator to serve private aircraft.

On other transportation issues, House has supported a four-lane solution to traffic problems on Highway 75 and stands opposed to a county-wide bus system.

"We tried it once before and only four or five people rode on it. In spite of what all these do-gooders think, it just doesn't work," he said.

As for recent increases in the Blaine County budget, House deflected criticisms of the commissioners' spending policies, saying, "Nobody thinks their tax dollars are being used efficiently."

He defended the county commissioners' decision to raise county employee salaries, to bring them more in line with the high cost of living in Blaine County.

House tentatively supports the idea of a county-wide Real Estate Transfer Tax to help pay for county infrastructure improvements.

Dole in to campaign for him when Dole voted in 1990 to cut the sugar price support program, and asked if he would protect the sugar beet industry during negotiations on the North American Free Trade Agreement.

Kempthorne did not directly address the Dole question, but stressed that he would not vote for NAFTA unless it was changed to reflect several concerns raised by the sugar industry.

"There's no way I would abandon the sugar beet industry, the third-largest crop in Idaho," he said.

Kempthorne's position is basically similar to that of Stallings. However, the four-term congressman has not called the trade pact a "disaster" for

Idaho farmers, and says that because negotiations with Canada and Mexico are over, the only way to force meaningful changes in NAFTA is to convince the Bush administration that Congress will not pass it as is.

Kempthorne, though, says that by rejecting the agreement, Stallings has "taken himself out of the picture."

The mayor also defended a television ad which depicted an intern in Stallings' Washington, D.C., office. The intern has asked Kempthorne to take him out of the ad, claiming he was videotaped without his knowledge or consent.

But Kempthorne said doing that would raise questions about the rest of the ad, which depicted the Senate subcommittee and elevator operators for automatic elevators as examples of

congressional waste. "The intern was not the focus of the commercial," he said. "In a 60-second commercial, he was in for two and a half seconds."

Like Stallings, who spoke at a similar forum on Tuesday, Kempthorne received a round of applause when he said he opposes the 1 Percent Initiative.

"The property tax-cutting measure" would be devastating to our educational system and to the services that are provided on the local level," he said.

Besides, Kempthorne added, the initiative doesn't touch the federal government, which said takes 65 cents out of each dollar paid in taxes, Local property taxes, on the other hand, account for only 3 cents of each tax dollar.

If a judge shows 10 cases exceeding his standards on Dec. 31, 1991, for example, that means 10 percent of the cases pending on that day were beyond the standard.

Fifth District Administrative Judge J. William Hart says a judge's case load does not necessarily reflect the amount of work he is doing. On a given day, one judge may handle up to 30 minutes' claims arguments while another judge may be spending no more handling just one trial. Also, judges who travel a lot naturally have fewer cases, Hart said.

**RUPERT** - A preliminary \$1.2 million plan to revitalize downtown Rupert and Eighth Street has received the City Council's approval.

The council took the action Thursday following a public hearing at City Hall.

The plan calls for improving roadways, sidewalks, curbs and

gutters along:  
• Eighth Street, from B Street west just past the canal alongside K Street.

• F Street, from Eighth to the railroad tracks parallel to Idaho 24 and 25.

• Around the City Square, on Fremont Avenue and on portions of Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, E and G streets.

• Storm sewers will be installed along stretches of streets F through

K, while street lights and electrical conduits are planned for the square.

Urban analyst Wayne Forrey, executive director of The City Leaders Institute in Boise, presented the council with the plans. After some modifications, the council approved them.

Rupert officials hope to obtain about \$900,000 in Federal Pass Through funding from the Idaho Department of Commerce to go toward the project. The city will

contribute the remaining \$300,000 from various sources.

At the council's next meeting - at 7 p.m. Tuesday - Forrey is scheduled to present a project budget to the members. If the city's preliminary application is accepted, more detailed plans must be drafted.

Mayor W.F. "Bill" Whitton said he hasn't heard any complaints or criticisms from city residents about the project. No residents attended Thursday's public hearing.

# Jerome searches for way to fill half-million-dollar budget gap

**JEROME** — A half-million dollar budget deficit has the Jerome City Council searching for solutions. Expanding the city's waste water treatment plant to handle waste products from new industries coming into the area will cost \$500,000 more than the city budget has available, council members said as they met Monday to try to solve the deficit.

The council voted 3-2 to postpone the bid award until the next council meeting.

"First and foremost, we have the community's best interest from all council members," Mayor Gerald Oster said. "We have an obligation to fill. We have to come up with the necessary funds, and we will do that and see this thing through to its conclusion."

At a previous meeting, the council awarded a \$2,053,604 contract to Ross Enterprise, Inc. But only \$1,566,072 available to pay for the contract, plus costs for purchasing equipment for the plant.

Three possible solutions to the funding shortfall, presented by City

Administrator Larry Payne were:

- Contract with a private company to operate and maintain the plant.
- Obtain equipment for the plant expansion on a lease/purchase basis.
- Cut \$320,000 out of the city's operating budget and cancel plans to hire three employees to assist in the operation of the new plant.

Payne said he did not recommend using the city operating budget to pay for the plant expansion. "If we take anything out of it (the city budget) we're in trouble," he said.

Scott Bybee, engineer for the project, said the deficit was not anybody's fault.

Larry and the city have been taking a lot of heat on this unjustly. It's not through the fault of the council or Larry," he said.

Estimated costs of the plant expansion were put together in three hours, Bybee said. A project he said he wished he had 60 to 90 days to complete.

"Some of the things turned out not to be correct," he said.

Meeting deadlines for the last year's bond issue election and for submitting an application for a community development block grant

necessitated putting together the costs for the plant expansion in three hours, Bybee said.

"We're between a rock and a hard place," Councilman Rocky Jackson said. "We're a half million down, we've already spent four and one-half million outside the city and we don't belong there. We've tried our best, but we can't get so far."

Council members Janet Burdick and Ernie Brooks asked if there was any guarantee the \$500,000 wouldn't be increased when other things were needed for the expansion.

Revenue from the Jerome Cheese Co. plant will pay for the waste water treatment plant improvements, but not in time to pay the bill that will be owed the contractor. A contract with the cheese company can't be changed for a year to increase the rates the cheese plant would pay the city, Payne said.

"We're trying to build a facility that will allow the city to receive a fairly even flow (of waste)," Gaylord Fowler, the plant manager, said. "It's possible that what we've done on our own premises (to pre-treat waste products) will help you in the type of expansion you're going to do."

# Dig near Bliss unearths different story of Snake River Indian life

**BLISS (AP)** — Anthropologists used to think Indians lived a stable life along the banks of the Snake River near here 200 or so years ago, depending on the river for salmon.

But evidence from excavations at three sites indicates otherwise.

"We've found there is little data to confirm that picture," said Mark Plew, who is head of Boise State University's anthropology department. "Instead, these people appear to be highly mobile foragers, more dependent on deer and rabbits than fish at certain times of the year."

Plew and other Boise State instructors and students dug along the Snake at a spot where the river swirls to the north. As staves were dug out, tools, pottery, projectile points, tools and bones were surfaced.

"This is a really important site," Plew said. "It's the least disturbed

and single largest block excavation along the Snake. It's in essence a depiction of the Shoshone culture."

Only seven or eight people made the site their home, with perhaps a few more spending winters there. He thinks that several other nearby areas were occupied.

The Bureau of Land Management said the excavations are valuable in a number of ways. The BLM gains valuable information about the first residents of the area, and about two dozen students get experience and college credits during the six-week program. Most were anthropology majors.

Students usually started at 7:30 a.m., excavating, surveying or classifying earlier finds in a temporary lab at Bliss High School. John Lytle, BLM archaeologist in the Shoshone District, said the student volunteers are a big help. "The work needs to be done and the quality is good. From a small area, they're getting a tremendous amount of information. It's nice to see an academic community interested in this kind of field work," he said.

# Craig tells Mini-Cassia audience NAFTA dialogue remains alive

**BURLEY** — Sen. Larry Craig on Thursday criticized senatorial candidate Richard Stallings for rejecting the North American Free Trade Agreement and said hope remains that provisions can be changed in order to protect Idaho sugar growers.

During a Republican rally held at Burley Junior High School, Craig said U.S. Trade Representative Carla Hills had sent a letter to him, pledging to "continue the dialogue" with sugar producers and other concerned parties over the future of the domestic sugar industry under the treaty.

"This dialogue will help ensure that the Agreement we reached will adequately guard the interests of U.S. sugar producers while facilitating a smooth transition to

open markets within the region," she said.

Hills said she believed Mexico would not likely dump sugar on the U.S. marketplace.

Many sugar growers and lawmakers have thought otherwise, however, believing Mexico sugar dumping could virtually kill the U.S. sugar industry.

Craig criticized Stallings for immediately rejecting NAFTA, instead of trying to work things out.

"Richard took himself out of the process," Craig said.

Craig pledged that he would continue to work to change provisions that have many Idaho sugar beet growers worried.

"If the changes aren't made, Craig said he would vote "no" on the treaty.

criticizing Stallings, who is vying for a U.S. senate spot against Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne. "Stallings said it can't be fixed."

Hills also said Mexican sugar consumption is growing much faster than production.

"Mexico's production of sugar now falls short of demand by more than 25 percent (900,000 tons)," she wrote.

Hills said NAFTA will not encourage Mexican producers to produce for export to the U.S. market because prices for raw sugar in Mexico and the United States are about the same.

She said she felt the 10-year transition period to phase out import restrictions on sugar-containing products is appropriate and added that the provisions relating to sugar were among the most difficult parts of the NAFTA to negotiate.

Engineer Scott Bybee said an annexation to 3200 North could take several million dollars in valuation from the Salmon Tract District.

Such a loss of valuation could cost several thousand dollars in tax revenues for the district, he said.

He advised residents to make sure the district is not underfunded.

Filer Fire Chief Bud Compher

urged county commissioners to consider who can provide the best protection when determining fire district boundaries.

Twin Falls County Mutual Fire Insurance Co., a private insurance carrier, has decided to quit fighting fires by Feb. 1, 1993. This means that Salmon Tract Residents and all other county residents not protected by a fire district or city fire department must vote by the end of the year on whether to form fire districts.

The county commission plans hearings on Nov. 16, 17, 18 and 19

on proposals for fire districts in the Kimberly-Hansen-Murtaugh area, Buhl, Filer and countywide.

The Twin Falls Rural Fire District plans a Nov. 9 hearing on the proposal to expand its boundaries from 3400 North to 3200 North and to include a new west boundary of 2550 East and a new east boundary of 3350 East. The hearing takes place at 7 p.m. at the Twin Falls Fire Station No. 1 at 345 Second Ave. East.

Sorensen, 19, of Idaho Falls, faces trial starting Nov. 10 on charges of second-degree murder and aggravated battery. He is accused of killing Fliton during a shootout July 19 as she sat in a car outside a home. He also is accused of shooting Manuel Hernandez, 19, of Idaho Falls, in the leg.  
Hernandez and two other youths who authorities contend were on the other side of the shootout are also scheduled to stand trial Nov. 10.

**Poll reinforces opposition to 1% tax cap**

BOISE (AP) — A second statewide poll released Thursday reinforced earlier figures showing overwhelming opposition to the One Percent Initiative to limit local property taxes to 1 percent of actual market value.

The poll, conducted Oct. 22-24 for KTVB-TV in Boise, showed that 62 percent of just over 800 likely voters opposed the One Percent Initiative while only 21 percent supported it. Seventeen percent were undecided. Conducted by Political-Media Research Inc. of Washington, D.C., the poll had a margin of error of 3.5 percentage points.

The new survey showed a decided shift against the proposal that tax experts estimate will siphon \$150 million a year from local government and school district treasuries.

A Political-Media Research poll three weeks earlier found 36 percent against the initiative, 33 percent for it and 31 percent undecided.  
Earlier this week, KIVI-TV in Nampa, released its second poll on the controversial ballot proposition, showing a 40-point advantage for opponents. KIVI-TV's earlier poll showed the spread at 30 points.

Steve Ahrens, co-chairman of Idaho

hoans Against 1% and president of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry, has been cautious about the polling results while Ron Rankin, author of the initiative, completely discounts them. The anti-initiative forces have pumped nearly \$300,000 into the

campaign to head off what they warn will be either elimination of vital services or increases in other taxes. And records filed with the Secretary of State's office on Thursday showed money continued pouring in to fight the proposition.

**UI waits before naming center**

MOSCOW (AP) — University of Idaho officials will wait until after the election to ask the state Board of Education to name their fledgling transportation research center after UI alum, Sen. Steve Symms.

They withdrew their proposal to begin calling the research center "The Steven D. Symms National Center for Advanced Transportation Technology" from the agenda of the board's academic affairs committee last Wednesday without explanation.

UI Provost Thomas Bell said Idaho President Elizabeth Zinser concluded it would be more appropriate for her

to discuss the proposal with the board, possibly at the Nov. 19 meeting in Nampa.

Jerry Evans, chairman of the board's academic affairs committee, said last week was not the right time to name the center after the Republican lawmaker because it was two weeks before the Nov. 3 election.

"Anytime you do anything with anyone—deeply involved in the campaign you are subject to criticism from both sides," said Evans, the Republican superintendent of public instruction.

**FBI tries to prove case against sheriff**

MOSCOW (AP) — The FBI used videotapes, tapped telephone calls and secret recordings Thursday in an effort to prove that Shoshone County Sheriff Frank Crnkovich aided bar owners making illegal gambling payoffs.

Crnkovich is on trial in U.S. District Court on federal charges of racketeering and obstruction of law enforcement. Prosecutors allege he tipped off bar owners about impending raids or law enforcement visits, in exchange for payoffs.

Prosecutors Dan Butler and Nancy-Newcomb mapped out a four-month FBI sting in 1991 that led to charges against the sheriff. In the fourth day of testimony before U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge, the Justice Department neared the end of its case Thursday afternoon.

The racketeering charge carries a maximum sentence of 20 years in prison and \$250,000 fine. The other charges carry maximum terms of five years in prison and fines of \$250,000.

Testimony from FBI agents and more than 30 video and audio tapes were submitted as evidence.

Witnesses said three times, the FBI fed Crnkovich information that state or federal agents would be in Shoshone County investigating illegal gambling at more than 50 bars. The agents made sure only Crnkovich received the information to prove he was feeding it to bar owners.

Undersheriff Dan Schierman, working with the FBI, called Crnkovich at his home Jan. 28, 1991, and told him FBI agents

would be investigating Shoshone bars that night. Schierman beat Crnkovich in May's primary election for sheriff and is unopposed in the Nov. 3 election. Crnkovich fired Schierman after the election.

Soon after the information was given to the sheriff, Terry Douglas and Lief Merrill Field called bar owners warning them that "state people" were in the area or "strangers" were in town.

Douglas and Field pleaded guilty to distributing video poker machines to the bars and collecting revenue from illegal payoffs. Field said he averaged \$3,000 a week from the machines.

"Keep a close eye on the payouts when strangers are in there," Douglas told one bar owner in a taped conversation.

FBI agents raided the Shoshone bars in June 1991, taking gambling machines and what they said was evidence of illegal payouts.

Defense attorneys Sam Eismann and John Bardelli asked Lodge to continue the trial until Monday if the prosecution finished its case Thursday afternoon.

**Anti-gay measure proponent eyes Idaho**

BOISE (AP) — A proponent of a tough anti-gay measure in Oregon says Idaho is a good place to launch a similar initiative on the 1994 ballot.

The American Civil Liberties Union and human rights advocates are not pleased with the prospect.

Kelly Walton, former vice chairman of the Oregon Citizens Alliance, said he could easily collect the 33,000 signatures needed to put such a measure before voters.

"We were knocking down 30,000 signatures a

weekend in Oregon," said Walton, who moved to Burley last year. "I know how to organize a grassroots army."

"I would love to avoid this fight, but it appears it's becoming a necessary thing," said Walton, who worked for OCA from 1986-91.

Duke Wolf, co-chairman of the Idaho American Civil Liberties Union's Gay and Lesbian Rights Task Force, said he was not surprised by the news.

"I think we have to face it eventually," Wolf said. "I think the gays and lesbians in Idaho

would have a lot of support from many caring individuals who simply don't want to see this kind of measure."

Measure 9, on Tuesday's Oregon ballot, would require governments to discourage homosexuality and defines the practice as "abnormal, wrong, unnatural and perverse."

"I see very few flaws in Measure 9," Walton said. Walton said the agenda of the Task Force is likely to prompt a similar response in Idaho.

But Wolf replied the ACLU will not back down from its 1993 legislative intentions.

**Salmon River country pumpkin weighs in at 223 pounds**

SHOUP (AP) — Life in an isolated Salmon River canyon can be dull. But it was enticed this summer by a pumpkin-growing contest — which produced the 223-pound giant that grins from the porch of the Ramsherd Resort operated by Barbara Meyer and Bob Hagood.

"We don't have a lot of entertainment down here, so we have to make our own fun," said Meyer. The resort is 20-miles downriver from Shoup.

Meyer and Hagood, along with their business partners, Dave and Karen Marler, milked the con-

test for all it was worth.

They planted "giant pumpkin" seeds and distributed the seedlings to their neighbors and challenged them to a contest. Two neighbors took the bait.

One quickly dropped out when he could see his pumpkin wasn't going to make a good showing, even in last place. That left outfitter Stan Potts.

The competitors traded jabs and barbs as the pumpkins got bigger. When Hagood and Marler hung an intravenous feeding bag from a pole with a tube running down to their prize pumpkin, they

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
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

# Japan, U.S. pledge \$100 million in aid to former Soviet republics

**TOKYO (AP)** — The United States and Japan on Thursday each pledged \$100 million in new food and medical aid to help the strife-torn former Soviet states survive the coming winter.

The U.S. donation would come from a \$100-million corn purchase announced on Wednesday by the Agriculture Department, an attempt to boost the price of corn before the presidential election.

The pledges were made as officials from about 70 nations and 15 international organizations opened a two-day meeting in

Tokyo to consider how to help the region. Acting Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger led the U.S. delegation.

Japan officials put aside a territorial dispute to offer the cash, noting that shortages could lead to dangerous instability in the former Soviet nations. They said the aid would mostly be in food, medicine and other emergency supplies.

Japan is demanding the return of a group of small islands — part of the Kuril chain — seized by Soviet troops at the end of World War II. Tokyo has said it will not provide

large-scale aid to Russia until the dispute is resolved and the two countries sign a peace treaty.

But negotiations have made little progress because leaders on both sides face strong domestic opposition to concessions. In an attempt to accommodate public opinion, most of Japan's humanitarian aid has been targeted at Russia's Far East.

Market-oriented economic reforms in the former Soviet republics are causing severe inflation and scarcities of food, construction materials, fuel and medicine — problems

that are likely to worsen in the winter months.

The states are also burdened by a foreign debt estimated at \$70 billion to \$80 billion. About \$33 billion of that is owed to governments.

Aid groups told Thursday's meeting that this year's grain harvests in the new states would be better than last year's dismal yield but still well short of past harvests.

Delegates agreed that emergency aid was needed, but they also called for a shift in emphasis to technical assistance for long-

term improvement.

As part of that change, future aid efforts are to be coordinated separately for each of the new nations by the World Bank.

The Tokyo talks are the last of three gatherings proposed in January by then-Secretary of State James A. Baker III to coordinate emergency and technical aid.

Russia has agreed to let the World Bank coordinate its technical assistance programs, while the Group of Seven leading Western-bloc nations would handle financial issues, U.S. officials said.

## Dog sniffs out drug smugglers

**—URUAPAN, Mexico (AP)** — Marco, a dog with an unerring nose, has been prowling Mexico's highways in a Narcomobile, sniffing out marijuana with such success that smugglers have offered \$25,000 to anyone who kills him.

The 3-year-old Belgian Malinois — a brown-haired German Shepherd-hunting dog blend — can smell marijuana hidden in trucks and cars even at speeds of 60 mph, according to his American trainer, Kent Alexander.

"He's never been wrong. The first night out we got 770 pounds of marijuana," said Alexander, 46, of Tucson, Ariz.

"If I'm tracking your car going down a highway, I can pull in right behind you and it won't take long for Marco to detect the drug."

Since January, when Marco began helping bust traffickers smuggling marijuana from Mexico's western Sierra Madre to the United States, the 60-pound canine has sniffed out 7.35 tons of marijuana, 1,100 pounds of cocaine and 16 pounds of heroin.

"His efforts have led to the arrests of 113 suspects and the seizure of two planes and two buses."

"Some people try hiding the marijuana or cocaine in chili peppers, loads of bananas, even locked inside welded steel containers. But Marco can still smell them out," said Alexander.

Mexico's marijuana harvest peaked in late October, and tons of the drug are now moving north to California, Arizona and Texas from this craggy mountain region, 180 miles west of Mexico City, where three-quarters of Mexico's cannabis is grown.

One highway leads north to the border, and that is where Marco is on the prowl, scented in the back bay of the Narcomobile, a van fitted out with a series of tubes that funnel air to Marco.

Smugglers are so up-in-arms about the dog, known here as "Marco the Narco," that wanted posters started appearing in April offering a \$25,000 reward to anyone who kills him.

## Rebels rocket center of Liberian capital

**MONROVIA, Liberia (AP)** — Rebels led by Charles Taylor rained rockets on the city center Thursday, hitting the headquarters of the interim government and of a seven-nation West African peacekeeping force defending the capital.

The rockets terrified city residents and thousands of refugees who had fled to Monrovia from outlying areas and were trapped by the fighting.

Five nuns from Illinois were reported held hostage in their convent on the city's outskirts, their mother superior said.

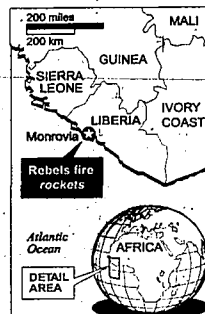
Sister Mildred Gross, head of the Adorers of the Blood of Christ convent in Ruma, Ill., said five nuns doing missionary work were being held at their convent in Gardnersville, rebel-held territory north of the city.

Gross said the U.S. Embassy was working to get them out. The State Department would not comment on the nuns Thursday.

Gross identified them as Kathleen McGuire, Shirley Kolmer, Joelle Kolmer, Barbara Ann Muirra and Agnes Mueller.

Nigerian-led peacekeepers fired back at the rebel-held iron factory where the rockets were being launched, but the defenders appeared demoralized.

"We're still pursuing a kind of conventional war and the presence of civilians makes our task more difficult, while the rebels fight without consideration of civilian casualties,"



Taylor, a Liberian who had assembled rebel forces in Ivory Coast, invaded in December 1989. President Samuel Doe was killed, and the West African nations dispatched peacekeepers.

About 60,000 people have died in what grew into a tribal war, 40,000 of them of starvation during a siege of Monrovia in 1990.

The latest fighting has cut the capital's international communications and piped water. Only one telephone is operating in the capital, a UNICEF satellite telephone.

Monrovia's collect water in buckets and bottles from creeks and rivers that are likely contaminated by decomposing bodies.

Health workers fear there could be a cholera outbreak and other diseases in the capital, which was over-crowded even before 160,000 people fled to it in advance of the rebels.

No one was reported hurt in Thursday's rocket attacks, said Dr. Ruth Tshabalala, a representative of the World Health Organization. The rebels fired at least eight into the center of the city from the iron factory, which they overran Wednesday.

One rocket exploded in the grounds of the fortified executive mansion where the interim government is based. One fell into the ocean behind the mansion and another landed short of the Ducor Palace, a state hotel where administration officials have been staying.

Biola Lawal, a spokesman for the peacekeepers, told The Associated Press.

He said there could be hundreds of Taylor's men in marshes around the Atlantic ocean town.

"The West African army, apparently expecting more rocket attacks through the night, broadcast warnings for people to stay on the ground floors of high-rise buildings."

Taylor had broadcast a warning that he could hit anywhere in Monrovia and recommended people stay away from military targets.

## Irish abortion information ban voided

**STRASBOURG, France (AP)** — The European Court of Human Rights Thursday voided an Irish court ban on providing information to Irish women seeking abortions abroad.

The court's rulings are considered binding on its 26 member nations, of which Ireland is one, but do not automatically overturn a nation's laws.

The rulings carry moral force and are rarely defied.

The court, an arm of the Council of Europe, did not rule on Ireland's constitutional ban on abortion. But it ruled 15-8 that preventing women from getting information on where to get abortions abroad, notably in Britain, violated the European Convention on Human Rights.

All nations that signed the 1950 convention accepted the compulsory jurisdiction of the court.

Ireland's government did not immediately respond to the ruling, and it was not clear what effect the decision would have on a Dec. 3 referendum on abortion-related issues.

Quoting NBA and Dallas sources, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram said Seattle would receive Harper and the second of the Mavericks' No. 1 picks in next year's draft.

However, sources said the holdup is that the Mavericks want veteran forward Derek McKey, whom the Sonics' have refused to trade.

"McKey's a star, and we'd make that move in a heartbeat," a Mavericks source said in the report. "Although Christie has some knee problems, we'd take him as a throw-in in that deal."

## Colorado, Nebraska swipe spotlight this weekend

While Colorado and Nebraska steal the spotlight in the Big Eight this weekend, many college football fans will continue to focus on the Big Two — No. 1 Miami and No. 2 Washington.

Colorado and Nebraska, tied at No. 8 in The Associated Press poll, meet in Lincoln on Saturday. The winner will probably challenge No. 18 Kansas for the Big Eight title and a berth in the Orange Bowl.

The game will feature two contrasting offenses: Nebraska (5-1) is the nation's top rushing team, averaging 348 yards on the ground. Colorado (6-0-1) is No. 4 nationally in passing, averaging 334 yards through the air.

"Certainly, we have different philosophies," Nebraska coach Tom Osborne said.

Miami and Washington have the same record (7-0) and the same goal — repeating as national champion. They shared the title

last season, with Miami capturing the AP writers' championship and Washington winning the USA Today-CNN coaches' crown.

Miami puts two long winning streaks on the line Saturday against Big East foe West Virginia (3-2-2). The Hurricanes have won 25 straight overall and 49 in a row at the Orange Bowl.

"It's nice to be No. 1, but we can't worry about the polls," coach Dennis Erickson said. "As long as we keep winning, everything will take care of itself."

Washington goes for its 22nd consecutive victory when it plays No. 15 Stanford (6-2) at Husky Stadium.

Stanford coach Bill Walsh was 0-2 against Washington in his first stint as Cardinal head coach in 1977-78. He doesn't think the task will be any easier this time against Don James' team.

"From a talent standpoint, it's loaded in Washington's favor," Walsh said. "I don't

Not only did the famed old No. 2 course in the Carolina sandhills send Nick Price and John Cook plummeting to the bottom of the elite field, it so confused Fred Couples that he resorted to cross-handed desperation putting.

It didn't help.

And that does not mean that the four \$1 million winners were alone in their misadventures through dunes, pines and autumn-flaming trees.

There was Tom Kite, the U.S. Open champion needing a victory in this \$2 million event to have a shot at Player of the Year honors, slashing and thrashing his way to a 73 and topping only four

men in the field of the 30 leading money-winners.

Or take Paul Azinger, needing a win in this one to extend a string of at least one victory in 75 consecutive seasons.

He managed a 70, 1 under par but remarkable in that he birdied two of the last three holes — while putting with his wedge. He bent his putter with a sharp nip to the ground after missing a short putt on the 11th.

Love, one of the four millionaires vying for most of the game's season-long honors, hung on for a share of the lead at 68, 3 under par, despite a three-putt bogey on the final hole.

He was tied with Keith Clearwater, who had his customary hot opening round. Clearwater now has had opening scores of 68 or better in 12 of 32 starts this year — and has not won.

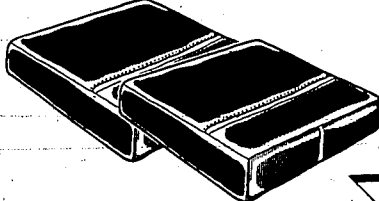

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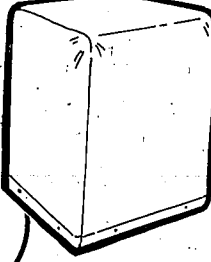

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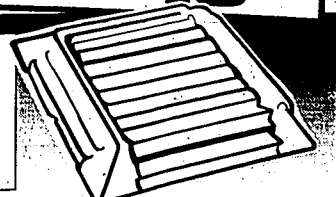

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Government sees future in artificial vision for blind

LOS ANGELES — Tiny electrodes implanted in a blind woman's brain allowed her to "see" distinct dots of light — a method that may produce an artificial vision device in several years, doctors said Thursday.

The experiment "gives us firm evidence that artificial vision for the blinded person is an achievable goal, hopefully before the end of the decade," said Dr. Murray Goldstein, director of the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke.

The device would include a miniature television camera attached to eyeglass frames: The TV picture of a blind person's surroundings is sent to electrodes permanently implanted in the brain.

"Our initial goal is to develop a stadium scoreboard type of display so they could read printed material and recognize street signs," Goldstein said.

Technical obstacles must be overcome to determine if the technique really can provide the blind with rudimentary vision, Goldstein said by telephone from Bethesda, Md.

The government experiment, part of a 20-year, \$10 million research effort, was revealed during the annual meeting of the Society for Neuroscience in Anaheim. It was kept secret because "we didn't want to spread false hope if the experiment failed," Goldstein said.

"It's really promising," said Richard Normann, chairman of bioengineering at the University of Utah in Salt Lake City.

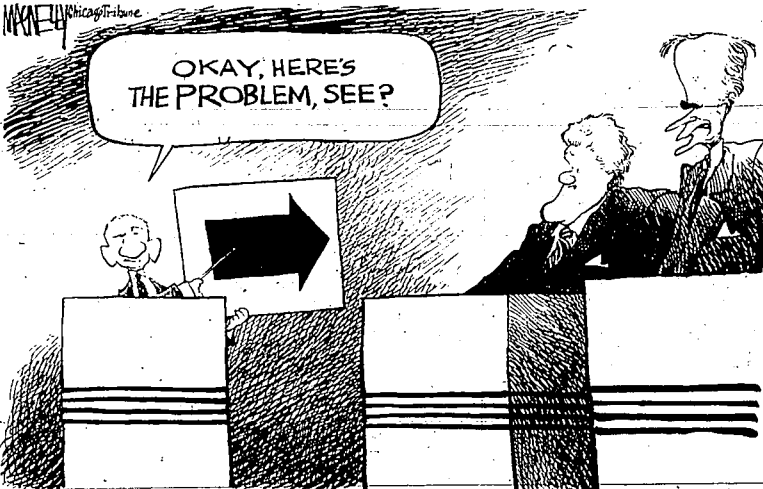
#### Kempthorne an honest man

**EMERGENCY REGULATORY ADOPTION NOTICE**

In the Matter of an Emergency Order Amending Mt. Control Regulations, Sections 5 and 7.

WHEREAS, an emergency situation exists concerning our outbreak of mint root borers (Fumiborys fulvipes) in the "Infested Area" of Idaho and the imminent threat to Idaho's mint rootstock growers ability to produce an in-state defined generation rootstock, and creating a shortage of certified rootstock for planting for mint of production and;

WHEREAS, the current requirements of the Idaho Department of Agriculture Administrative Code, Title 22, Chapter 52, establish a zero tolerance on rootstock found infested with mint root borer and;

WHEREAS, the Emergency Order, amending the Section 5. E and implementing a new Section 5. F, and increasing the tolerance 5.F through 5.H establishes a mint root borer tolerance level that allows movement of "lightly" infested rootstock while controlling movement of "heavily" infested rootstock thereby not significantly reducing rootstock quality.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that the present emergency regulation prescribed in Title 22, Chapters 7, 19, and 20, and Idaho Code, Title 67, Chapter 52, Idaho Code, the following Emergency Order is effective October 26, 1992, and will be valid for a 120-day period, February 22, 1993.

**SECTION 5. INSPECTION PROCEDURES.**

E. If the infested area rootstock is found to be infested with a regulated insect pest, the in-state generation status in the future.

F. If the infested area rootstock is found to be infested with a regulated insect pest, in-state tolerance levels greater than tolerance levels outlined in Section F, it shall be denied in-state defined generation status for the current year. The Department of Agriculture will issue an in-state transfer number to allow the grower to move rootstock within their farm for the purpose of controlling the infestation. If the infested area rootstock is found to be free of the insect pest, or infested in numbers lower than tolerance levels the following year, the rootstock will be eligible for in-state defined generation status. If the rootstock is found infested in numbers greater than tolerance levels, the infested rootstock is not eligible for in-state defined generation status in the future.

G. If the infested area rootstock is found to be infested with a regulated insect pest in numbers above tolerance levels, it shall not be denied in-state defined generation status for the current year. Those infested rootstock may be issued an in-state transfer permit with level of infestation noted on the permit.

H. If the infested area rootstock is found to be infested with a regulated insect pest, defined as noxious weed Law, Title 22, Chapter 24, the area infested with the regulated insect pest shall be denied in-state defined generation status for the current year. The Department of Agriculture will issue an in-state transfer number to allow the grower to move rootstock within their farm for the purpose of controlling the infestation. If the rootstock is found to be free of the weed pest the following year, the rootstock will be eligible for in-state defined generation status.

**F. INSECT PEST TOLERANCE LEVELS.**

1. Rootstock will be found above tolerance if an average of one (1) or greater regulated insect pests, or evidence of regulated insect pests, for every three (3) square foot of soil and rootstock sampled is found (0.33 pest per square foot).

2. Rootstock will be found above tolerance, at time of digging, if an average of one (1) or greater regulated insect pests, or evidence of regulated insect pests, found in a field divided by the number of square foot samples examined based on field size as outlined in section G.

# Betty Broderick sequel focuses on legal system

When we last saw San Diego socialite Betty Broderick, she had just shot her ex-husband and his new wife. That was the climax of the highly rated "A Woman Scorned: The Betty Broderick Story," which aired on CBS last season. But what happened next?

"Had we known everything that was going to happen, this would have been a miniseries," says director-producer Dick Lowry, Lowry, who was responsible for "A Woman Scorned," reassembled the cast from that film for a sequel, "Her Final Fury: The Betty Broderick Story Part II," airing Sunday, Nov. 1, on CBS.

The current movie consists of all-new material, Lowry says. "It does not repeat any of the first (film) except the killing," he explains. "The first film was about the marriage falling apart. This one is more about how (Betty) dealt with the legal system, which on some occasions was manipulated by her."

There were no plans at the outset of "A Woman Scorned" for a sequel. But the rush of events that surrounded Betty Broderick and her family, and the high ratings garnered by the

first film, made a second one inevitable.

How does Lowry account for the success of "A Woman Scorned"? "We felt that it is a case that touches a nerve in everyone," he says. "We all come from some form of family environment. Here was this marriage that started out with what appeared to be all the potential in the world; two very attractive, very bright, well-launched young people. Everything was the picture of what the world believes it is striving for." Of course, it didn't end up that way.

"We were in production (for 'A Woman Scorned') when the trial started," Lowry recalls.

What happened in that trial was totally unexpected — a hung jury. Even today, Lowry seems shocked.

"This is a woman who had entered the home surreptitiously and shot two sleeping people, then called a friend and told her she had done it," he says. "She subsequently told other people she had done it and eventually told a journalist she had done it. Nobody thought there would be a result other than some form of murder verdict." Of course, as the district attorney says in the new film, "Who can predict a jury?"

After a second, no less dramatic trial, Broderick is convicted of both killings and sentenced to a minimum of 30 years in prison.

Lowry remembers telling a colleague, "I think this is interesting stuff." In fact, it is the stuff of high-drama, and Lowry and his cast, including Meredith Baxter, who reprises the role of Betty, make the most of it.

"Courtrooms are tough to do," he says. "You want to keep it from becoming 'Perry Mason.'" He succeeds admirably, drawing directly on trial transcripts and using sinuous camera movements to suggest the tensions running through the courtroom, as well as eliciting strong performances from Baxter, Judith Levy as the prosecuting attorney and Kelli Williams as the oldest Broderick child.

Have we seen the last of Betty Broderick?

She will not be eligible for parole until 2011. Unless she escapes, the odds are against anyone making "The Betty Broderick Story Part III."

"Her Final Fury: The Betty Broderick Story Part II," runs from 8 to 10 p.m. MST Sunday on CBS.

LOS ANGELES — Flashback to Day 3 of Woodguy. It's 6 a.m., Aug. 19, and already the offices of "Entertainment Tonight" are jangling like a brain that's been jolted by caffeine.

Calls have been made to Boston to secure an interview with Mia Farrow's bigshot lawyer, Alan Derшовitz. A camera crew is being dispatched to Connecticut to stake out Mia's country house. Not much later, the results of a public opinion poll on Woody Allen's love affair with Mia's adopted daughter Soon-Yi hum across the fax.

TV newsmen become energized during a disaster — plane crash, earthquake, flash flood. For "ET," this is their Hurricane Woody.

"ET" executive producer David Nuell scans the poll results. He checks "T" the questions he deems important, puts an X next to the ones he doesn't.

Have you seen any movie that Woody Allen has directed and/or starred in? Check.

Will the controversy make "you more or less likely to see his upcoming movie? Check.

### New talk show being considered

The Washington Post reports Paramount Domestic Television is considering a syndicated talk show that would be co-hosted by "Entertainment Tonight's" John Tesh and Leezza Gibbons. Both would remain with Paramount's "ET" if the project is approved, however.

How interested are you to get more news on Allen's affair with Soon-Yi? X.

"That's what's known as the socially acceptable answer," Nuell notes of the results from the joint "ET"/JUS magazine survey, conducted the previous day. "It's like asking, 'Do you approve of inhaling marijuana?' Nobody's going to say yes."

In fact, only 24 percent of the 400 people polled admitted to being very or somewhat interested in more details about Woody's love life. The remaining 76 percent had enough already.

This might be a more telling statistic, though, one that gets to the heart

of what America really cares about: On a typical day, 11 million people watch "Entertainment Tonight." That's as big an audience as tunes in to "NBC Nightly News."

Ratings are only one way to measure the show's success. If entertainment is our religion, and celebrities our saints, "ET" is our daily Mass. "I remember the time my mother asked me about the box-office take of 'Raiders of the Lost Ark,'" says co-host Myra Hart. "That's when I knew the show was a hit."

Since the show premiered in September 1981, it has become the program of record for the entertainment industry. Several copycats have surfaced, including CNN's show business report and the E! Entertainment cable network. Many local newscasts have added TV and movie segments, and borrowed from "ET's" innovative graphics. At the same time "ET" has kept inventing or adapting new features — such as the public-opinion surveys.

Hart and co-hosts John Tesh and Leezza Gibbons meanwhile, have been transformed into celebrities by association.

"When we first went on the air it was very difficult for us to get interviews with big stars," recalls Hart.

# CBS to honor 'The Andy Griffith Show'

LOS ANGELES — When it comes to reflecting family values, "The Andy Griffith Show" was surely TV's model series. But Andy Taylor, sheriff of Mayberry, had something in common with Murphy Brown.

"Andy wasn't married. He brought up Opie," says Don Knotts. "Course, he had Aunt Bee there." The situations might not be parallel: Taylor was a widower, Murphy an unmarried mother. But it points up TV's long-term fascination with single parenthood.

Lunch with the man who was Barney Fife, the nervous little deputy who wanted to be a big shot, provides food for thought about the state of TV and the enduring appeal of a TV classic.

"I think there's a lot of identification with the values in the show," Knotts said. "It seems like it would have been a good way to live, and they had a good time, and it's funny, and life was very simple compared to today."

CBS wants to take everyone back to Mayberry, N.C., in November.

The network will celebrate the Griffith show, which ran from 1960 to 1968, and

"The Carol Burnett Show" with retrospectives. Previous tributes to "The Ed Sullivan Show," "All in the Family" and "M.A.S.H.," were ratings bonanzas.

Griffith will host the special; Knotts, Jim Nabors (Gomer), George Lindsey (Goobar) and Angela Cartaut (Helen Crump) will recall series highlights.

Executive producer Andrew Solt hopes to involve "Opie" — Ron Howard — too.

The special will feature new material filmed in North Carolina, but it won't be a sequel to "Return to Mayberry," the top-rated TV movie of the '85-'86 season. Griffith was adamantly opposed to more-TV movies.

"And if the Big Guy doesn't want to do one, well, we're in trouble," Knotts said.

Knotts speaks of "the Big Guy" with affection. They met on the Broadway show "No Time for Sergeants." Knotts saw the Griffith show pilot, called Griffith and suggested a deputy character. Thus, Barney Fife was born.

"Whatever he felt, you knew it immediately," Knotts said of the childlike Fife.

"He wore everything on his face, and he wanted to be a big shot. He acted like it, but he didn't know how. For years, everywhere I would go, police would stop me and say, 'We've got a Barney Fife in our station.'"

Knotts received five Emmys for the role; Griffith never won. "It didn't cause any problem," Knotts said. "We cemented a friendship that has lasted... He was great to work with. Still is. I do 'Matlock' sometimes."

On the sitcom, Griffith gave Knotts "all the leeway I wanted" and brought him in to help rewrite scripts. They toiled long hours to make the comedy human. If a line sounded like a joke, Griffith wanted it thrown out.

"Today, you have to have a laugh about

every 40 seconds," Knott said. Most sitcoms are "sort of farce comedies, FORCED farce comedies."

The Griffith show was shot like a movie over three days, after many rewrites and a day of rehearsal. Most sitcoms today are shot in front of audiences in one day, after a week of rewrites and rehearsals.

"We were a bunch of perfectionists," Knotts said. "We didn't know we were making a classic, but we knew we were making a good show."

## 'Hee Haw' back in glory

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — "Hee Haw" is celebrating its 25th season by reuniting its best programs, bringing back the show's trademark cornfield scene, animated donkey and departed cast members like Buck Owens.

Now called "Hee Haw Silver," the syndicated hour-long country music-humor show is adding brief commentary and introductions by longtime cast members Roy Clark, Grandpa Jones and Cathy Baker.

Program executives ditched last season's format change in which several veteran cast members were replaced by younger, unknown performers.

Last year's shows also eliminated the show's cornfield, replaced overalls with contemporary Western wear and quit using a superimposed cartoons on screen.

The idea was to attract younger viewers, and new advertisers.

But dedicated viewers complained. So classic "Hee Haw" shows are being rerun this year, with full production of new segments anticipated for 1993.

"This will bring back a lot of memories," said Clark, who has been "Hee Haw" host or co-host since the beginning. "We were like an old shoe. The show was like a family member coming in once a week to your home."

The reruns will include many pro-

grams with Owens, who was Clark's co-host from 1969 until 1986.

Also returning to the screen: Junior Samples, the round, wisecracking hayseed who frequently stumbled over his lines, and the "Hee Haw Honeys," feisty Southern girls in skimpy costumes like Gunilla Hutton who portrayed Nurse Goodbody.

"These are things the public demanded," Clark said.

Last year's changes were a cultural shock to veteran viewers, he said. "What they (executives) should have done, looking back, was keep some of the older people with some of the new faces and do a gradual turnaround," Clark said.

"What we did last year wasn't bad; it just wasn't synonymous with the title," said Sam Lovullo, the program's producer from its beginning. "I got calls on Saturday nights, after the show had aired, from people who wanted the old show back."

Last season it had 5 million weekly viewers. It's traditionally been aired on early Saturday nights. "We've held our own in the ratings," Lovullo said.

The program, now on 198 stations, first aired on CBS-TV as a summer replacement for "The Smothers Brothers Show." CBS dropped it in 1971, but the show went into syndication without missing a season.

Said Clark: "Hee Haw" needed a shot in the arm, but not that drastic a change."

pher who moves from New York. **Q.** Tell me what you can about little Stephanie from "Fall House." How did she start? Are her folks in show business? — Mrs. C.A.L., Detroit.

A. Jodie Sweetin, 10 last Jan. 19, is Stephanie. She's been playing the role since she was 5, before that she was seen in "Valerie" and did commercials. Friends urged her mother to give her acting lessons and take her to auditions. Neither parent is in show business.

**Q.** What are the ages of Valerie Bertinelli and MacKenzie Phillips? — C.K., Tuley Park, Ill.

A. The "One Day at a Time" co-stars are not quite a year apart: Phillips was born Nov. 10, 1959; Bertinelli, April 23, 1960.

**Q.** My husband and I tried to remember the names of the animals called "The Banana Splits" in a 1980s series. — E.H., Clementon, N.J.

A. The Splits were in a Saturday morning cartoon originally seen way back, 1968-70. Their names: Drooper, Snorky, Bingo and Fleggle.

**Q.** You said Mary McDonnell, of the movie "Dances With Wolves" did only one TV series, "ER." WRONG. She grew up on TV as Erin Walton. — Knows Better, Akron, Ohio.

A. Wrong. Mary Elizabeth McDonough was Erin Walton of "The Dukes." — J.P.

**Q.** I have followed PBS' "Masterpiece Theater" for at least 15 years. Give me some information on the narrator Alstair Cooke. Where can I write him to express my thanks for his literate contributions. — C.M., Norfolk, Va.

A. As "Masterpiece" marks its 20th anniversary, Cooke, who has hosted the anthology since its beginning, will be saying goodbye. He announced that this would be his last season. At 84, he wants to slow down and will concentrate on his writing and radio commentaries for Britain's BBC. Cooke, born in Manchester, England, came to the U.S. in 1932 as a student, moved here in 1937 and is an American citizen. He has reported on the U.S. for British newspapers,

radio and TV and has written two books: "Allstar Cooke's America" and "America Observed." He also wrote a biography about silent movie actor Douglas Fairbanks. Write: WGBH-TV, 125 Western Ave., Boston, MA 02134.

A. Clint Walker was best known as "Cheyenne," seen 1955-63, but he also did "Kodak," 1974-75, and "Centennial," 1978. Hugh O'Brian was Wyatt Earp in "The Life and Legend of Wyatt Earp," 1955-61.

**Q.** We know Doris Day starred in the movie "Please Don't Eat the Daisies" but who starred in the TV series? Was it Day? What was the TV show in which Doris Day starred with Denver Pyle? — P.H., Macon, Ga.

A. Pyle was with Day in the first two versions of "The Doris Day Show," seen 1968-73. (There were two more tries to find a format that would work for Day. The fourth lasted two seasons before Day called it

quits.) Pat Crowley starred in the 1965-67 TV version of "Daisies..." story. Competition is the name of the game and each network wanted to snare viewers with the lurid dramas.

**Q.** Is John Corbett, really more attracted to music than acting?

A. Corbett has put together a country-rock band, but he says it's mainly a hobby. "My goal isn't to get famous from singing," declares Corbett, who grew up listening to hillbilly jamboree in hamtown Wheeling, W. Va. "The singing is just for me." The former welder, pipe-fitter and hair-dresser might expect to showcase his musical-interests, however, because he has a face camera lens. He has made the rounds of hip commercials lately, and his on-screen exposure is growing. Still, Corbett likes to keep everything business. "My private life is private," he says, declining to reveal his age. He will say he lives alone with his cat Lotus in an apartment outside Seattle. "If I had a girlfriend, I would say so, but I wouldn't tell you her name."

## Howard Stern plans to host talk show

NEW YORK (AP) — Top-rated radio shock jock Howard Stern said Wednesday he plans to start a talk show on cable television. A women's group quickly protested.

In a two-hour news conference, Stern said he'll be host of a one-on-one interview show debuting Nov. 27 on cable's E! Entertainment Television.

Stern, noted for his blunt, politically incorrect humor and sometimes lewd style, had been host of a late-night TV show that was canceled this year after two seasons on WWOR, a superstation seen on cable systems nationwide.

"The Howard Stern Show" showcased segments such as

"Lesbian Dating Game" and "Hooker Hollywood Squares."

The Los Angeles chapter of the National Organization for Women issued a statement criticizing E!'s hiring of Stern, suggesting a possible boycott of the network and its advertisers.

"What is this industry going to draw the line," said Tammy Bruce, NOW's Los Angeles president. "During the hiring of Stern, E! is sending the message that misogyny and sexism pays, that their network is intent on perpetuating the hatred of women through Stern and in fact are willing participants in the growing backlash against women in this country."

E!'s vice president of programming, Fran Shea, said NOW

knows nothing about the new show and had not contacted her office.

Stern, 38, said of E!, a 24-hour cable network focusing on entertainment, that he'll have to install a satellite dish to see his own show.

"I'm here to save E! Nobody knows where to find the damn channel," he said. He said no celebrities have been booked.

Stern's daily four-hour radio show, based in New York, is heard in Los Angeles; Washington D.C.; Baltimore; Philadelphia; Cleveland; Dallas; Chicago and Albany, N.Y. Stern is the first radio personality to rank No. 1 simultaneously in the nation's top markets, New York and Los Angeles.

## Jury rejects Tracey Ullman's 'Simpsons' lawsuit

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Entertainer Tracey Ullman isn't entitled to \$2.25 million in merchandising profits from the hit cartoon series "The Simpsons," a jury decided Wednesday.

Superior Court jurors deliberated less than five hours before rejecting the suit.

Ullman claimed that 20th Century Fox owed her 7.5 percent of "Simpsons" product sales because the animated characters originated on her television show.

The British-born Ullman was in London on Wednesday and couldn't be reached for comment.

her attorney, Michael Bergman, said.

"The Simpsons" were originally featured in 30-second spots on the

Tracey Ullman Show," which was broadcast on the Fox network from 1987 to 1990. But jurors ruled that the characters weren't a part of Ullman's contract for the show.

Homér, Marge, Bart, Lisa and Maggie Simpson were featured in

longer segments as their popularity increased, and eventually moved to their own Fox show.

Bergman argued that Ullman's contract entitled her to profits from "Simpsons" T-shirts, dolls, watches and lunch boxes.

Fox attorney Louis Meisinger countered that a basis for Ullman's claim existed "only in the fertile imagination of her lawyer."

Ullman testified that cartoonist Matt Groening was completely responsible for creating "The Simpsons."

Bergman said it hadn't been decided if an appeal would be filed.

## Bill Cosby said to be negotiating to buy NBC

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Bill Cosby is the latest entrant in the "Who will buy NBC?" sweepstakes. "It's for real. It is serious. It's not a rumor," Cosby spokesman David Brokaw said Tuesday.

Brokaw's father, Norman, is the

entertainer's agent. Brokaw said his father was told by Cosby on Oct. 16 "to explore buying the network. The conversation is ongoing."

NBC spokeswoman Betty Hudson said the network had no com-

ment. Cosby, who this month was added to Forbes magazine's list of the 400 richest Americans and was called the richest entertainer, has net worth estimated at over \$300 million.

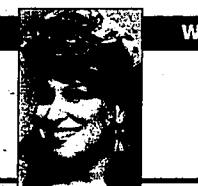

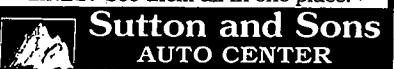

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# Pay-per-view service lacks pay-per-viewers

MIAMI — Give yourselves a hand, sports fans. You've succeeded in holding off that first-breathing, money-grubbing monster known as pay-per-view (PPV). The sales figures for most PPV projects this year have fallen well below expectations.

The details:

- The Olympics TripleCast: TripleCast offi-

cial says a final sales figure has not been determined, and they won't release it when it's available.

- The TripleCast said it needed 2 million homes to break even. But Barry Gould, editor of PPV Update magazine, said his research indicates buys did not exceed 175,000. Still, Atlanta officials say they will consider PPV for the 1996 Olympics.

- College football: The experiment, conducted by ABC and Showtime Event Televi-

sion (SET), has been a disappointment. Before the season, Steve Solomon, ABC Sports' senior vice president, said weekly sales between 25,000 and 50,000 would be a success.

SET will not release figures, but Gould said buys from the first five weeks probably did not total 30,000 combined. "Sales have been going up, but the jury is still out," Gould said. "It's done well in the Deep South. But there is so much college football already on TV."

- Another problem: Scott Kurnit, president of

SET, said about 20 percent of the cable operators that carry most PPV programming have passed on this one.

Gould said lack of interest in college football PPV probably will not discourage the NFL from instituting a similar plan, maybe by next season.

- Made-for-TV events: Event Entertainment projected 200,000 buys for the Jimmy Connors-Martina Navratilova match last month. There were 125,000.

## Jim Palmer to host show on lifestyles

After pitching baseballs and bikini underwear, Hall of Famer Jim Palmer is warming up for the syndicated-TV biz.

The long-and-lean former Baltimore Orioles star — best known for his, uh, revealing Jockey ads — is host of "Living Today," a weekday talk show scheduled to launch in national syndication in fall '93. The half-hour lifestyle series is produced by Sam Maturro's Compostant Ltd., based in Bryn Mawr, Pa., and Los Angeles.

"Over the years, I've had lots of offers to do talk shows and sports shows," said Palmer, 46, who left the mound in '84. "It was never the right show. This one is a good vehicle to showcase my meager talents, whatever they may be."

"Today," which features two lifestyle issues in each segment, is shot entirely on location. The Baltimore-based Palmer was in Philadelphia earlier this month taping pieces for an episode on marriage, divorce and parenting.

Palmer is familiar with that triple-play.

He's two years into his second marriage, to Joni, a "fortysomething" photographer. He has two daughters from his first go-round — Jamie, 25, who works for a health-care company in Boston; and Kelly, 23, an employee for a Baltimore clothing manufacturer.

When Palmer first stripped down to his skivvies for Jockey in '75, "my daughters were ready" for the mondo publicity that followed, he said.

"I've always said that when you're part of a major ad campaign, people are going to know who you are," said Palmer, who puts in 25 days per year for the manufacturer. "People perceive you as something you really aren't. I'm just a regular guy in a higher-profile job."

That profile still includes baseball. Palmer's broadcasting career has spanned 13 seasons, including stints on ABC with Tim McCarver and Al Michaels. These days, he does a lot for Orioles games on cable's Home Team Sports. Palmer has worked 28 home games this season and expects to do "a few more" next year.

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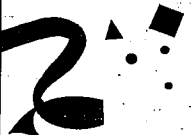

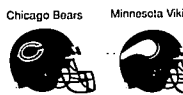

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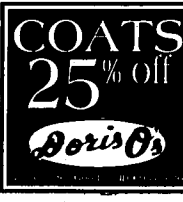
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
