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# U.S. tariffs to triple import wine price

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration announced Thursday it is imposing punitive tariffs that could triple the import price of most European white wines.

The tariffs, affecting \$300 million of imports, are meant to force the 12-nation European Community to end subsidies on soybeans and other oilseed crops. The administration claims the subsidies cost American producers \$1 billion a year in lost sales.

The move threatened to set off a full-scale trade war between the United States and its biggest overseas market.

Officials of the European Community gave no hint they planned to back down. EC officials have vowed to retaliate by

boosting tariffs on American products if European goods are hit. Frans Andriessen, the EC's chief trade negotiator, said in a statement that the trading bloc's council of ministers would likely make a decision on what American products to retaliate against at a meeting on Monday. He said the EC remained ready to negotiate to resolve the dispute before punitive tariffs went into effect on either side.

U.S. Trade Representative Carla Hills announced that effective Dec. 5, the tariffs on a 750-milliliter bottle of white wine

from Europe would rise from 7 cents a bottle to 200 percent of the price paid by importers. Thus, an American importer who paid \$10 for a bottle of wine would be hit with a \$20 tariff, pushing the cost to \$30.

American consumers would not likely feel the effects of the higher tariffs until January, because many importers have stockpiled shipments in anticipation of such a move.

Several importers said, however, that if the tariffs take effect virtually all European white wines would disappear from American store shelves because the importers would cut off orders. Further, the risk being caught with expensive inventories they can't unload at triple the current price.

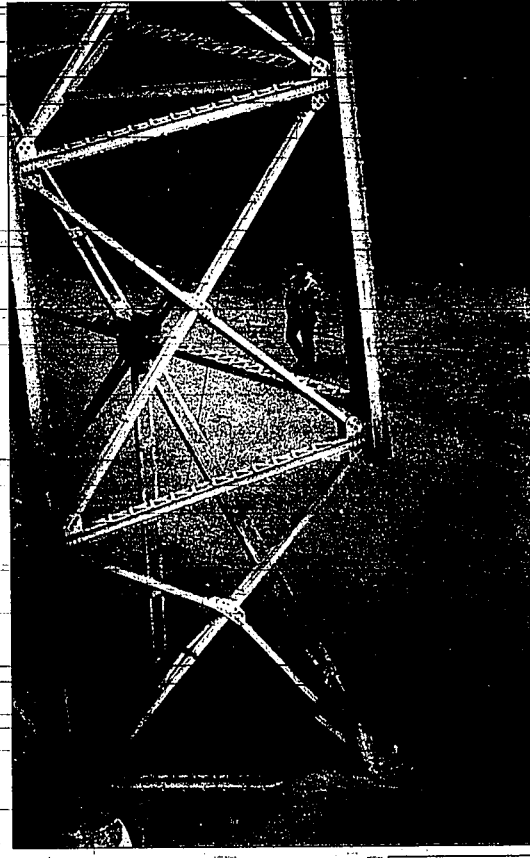
U.S. officials released a two-page list of

240 wines that would be hit with the higher tariffs. The United States imported \$270 million worth of white wine from Europe last year, with France supplying \$125 million of that amount. Other big suppliers were Italy, \$98 million, and Germany, \$35 million.

Wines from Spain, Portugal and Greece were also targeted for the new 200 percent tariffs.

Hills also announced that 200 percent tariffs would be imposed on \$30 million in imports of wheat gluten, primarily used as a binder in pet food, and in rapeseed oil, a cooking oil.

Hills said she was delaying the effective date for the new tariffs to allow negotiators time for one last-ditch effort to resolve the underlying trade dispute involving American soybean sales to Europe.



# A bridge too tough

## Melody lingers on above Rock Creek Canyon

TWIN FALLS — Score it Singing Bridge 2, demolition crew 0.

But bet the farm on a big comeback by the crew today.

More explosives Thursday failed to send the 72-year-old bridge crashing into Rock Creek Canyon. It was the second demolition attempt in three days, but blasting experts said their work appears to be finished.

"It did exactly what it was supposed to do," said Jerry Dilley of Superior Blasting in Nampa. "It's too bad it just didn't weigh about 2,000 or 3,000 more pounds (to help bring it down)."

Dilley said the lack of weight and the remaining support from piers at each end helped keep the bridge from falling.

Although the structure still stands, the second blast did more damage to the supports. Entire sections of some legs were blown out while other charges cut apart some supports.

Gaylord Hudson of Idaho Construction in Kimberly said the blasts may have made enough cuts to allow cranes to pull the structure down and disassemble it.

"It's an optical illusion," Hudson said with a smile. "That bridge is down."

Dilley said a decision on the next plan of action will be made at 10

a.m. today, but there's little or no chance that more blasting will be needed.

Fewer people gathered Thursday along the Rock Creek Canyon rim to view the destruction, but their laughter echoed loudly at the bridge's persistence.

"I think it's unreal. They sure knew how to build bridges, that's for damn sure," Twin Falls resident Grant Osterhout said.

Dilley said he used twice as much explosive weight in half the area in an attempt to finish the job he started Tuesday. Dirt was piled around some charges to keep the shrapnel down, dampen the noise and contain the air blast, he said.

The first attempt failed to demolish the bridge because about "eight or nine" charges were shaken out of place, from the millisecond time difference between explosions, Dilley explained. Failure of one or two charges would have been allowable to demolish the bridge.

He said 80 percent to 90 percent of the cuts needed to bring the "down" were made by the 52 1-pound "shaped charges" but that wasn't enough. The V-shaped charges are designed to shoot through and cut metal at a high velocity along the same principles as armor-piercing artillery shells.

# Gem sales tax may be expanded

BOISE — Andrus administration budget experts plan to recommend that the governor propose extending the sales tax to at least some services.

That move would be intended to finance any spending above a bare-bones level in his 1994 state budget, a Division of Financial Management official said Thursday.

Budget Bureau Chief Larry Schlicht told the Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council that the entire state faces the same situation it does — no cash to do anything beyond the very minimum to keep services and

operations at, or at least near, present levels.

"I would be anticipating that the division will be recommending to the governor to raise additional revenue," Schlicht said. "I wouldn't be surprised that the division recommended extending the sales tax to services, some of the services, and remove some of the exemptions."

After pulling health care and the widely supported production exemption from the mix, there would still be more than \$200 million in additional revenue available from extending the sales tax to services and repealing existing exemptions.

But while the state has been taxing a handful of services, primarily amusements and admissions, Gov. Cecil Andrus' one firmation with the question of extending the tax — to car repairs — was decisively rejected in 1988. And the current atmosphere in the more conservative make-up of the new Legislature suggest the atmosphere is even less receptive now.

But administration budget experts indicated that even with continued solid economic growth and the \$60 million in new revenue that would bring, there would still be only enough money to cover inflationary operating

# Clinton supports free trade accord

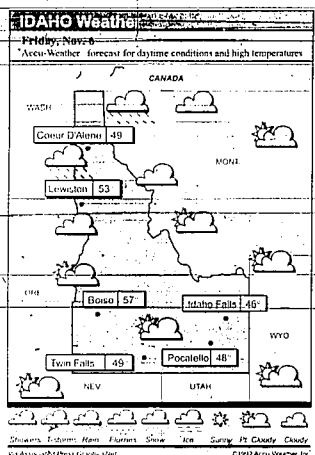
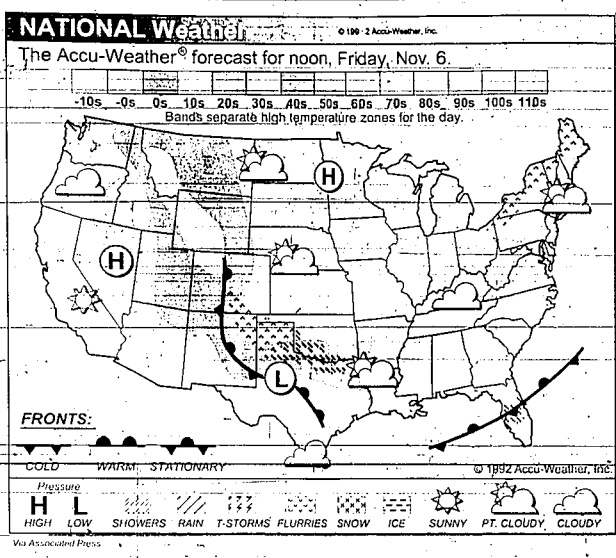

## From Rockies to Ohio, it's snow; on East Coast, rain

Rain spread across much of the East on Thursday and snow was scattered from the Rockies to the Ohio Valley and Great Lakes.

Temperatures fell to record lows in Texas.

At midday, rain extended across the Ohio Valley, the Appalachians, the lower Great Lakes, the central Atlantic Coast states and into southern New England.

Thunderstorms extended over the southern Atlantic Coast states and Florida.

Heavy rainfall during the six hours up to 11 a.m. MST was .92 inch at Valdosta, Ga.

Tornadoes touched down during the morning at Hernando Beach, Fla., and Ridge Manor, Fla., but no damage or injuries were reported, the National Weather Service said. High winds damaged power lines and trees around Morrison and Orlando.

The thunderstorms were fueled by unseasonably warm air. West Palm Beach, Fla., hit a record high for the date of 91 and Wilmington, N.C., had a record 84, the weather service said. Daytona Beach, Fla., tied its record of 87.

In sharp contrast, freezing temperatures were forecast just to the northwest, in Alabama and southeastern Mississippi, for Friday morning.

Record cold air had already surged southward all the way across Texas. Record lows were 41 at Brownsville; 31 at San Antonio and 23 at Wichita Falls. Abilene, Texas, tied its record of 26; Midland, Texas, tied its record of 27; and Oklahoma City tied its record of 24.

Snow was scattered from northern Utah across the northern half of the Rockies, the northern half of the Plains, northeastern Kansas, the northern and central Mississippi Valley, the upper Great Lakes, and across the lower Ohio Valley.

From 1 to 3 inches of snow fell overnight and into Thursday morning over Upper Michigan, including Houghton, Marquette and Ontonagon. As much as 6 inches of snow fell overnight over the western end of Upper Michigan from Bessmer to Ironwood.

A winter storm watch was in effect through Friday across northeastern Upper Michigan.

**Saddam scoots Scuds around nation**

AMMAN, Jordan — Saddam Hussein is moving scores of Scud missiles around Iraq on camouflaged trucks so U.N. weapons inspectors can't find them and he has buried at unknown number of rocket boosters, Western officials and other sources say.

One intelligence operative described it as a "real game" of hide-and-seek.

U.N. weapons inspection teams over the past 18 months have tracked down and dismantled much of Iraq's nuclear, chemical and biological weapons programs as well as its surface-to-surface missiles with a range of 400 miles or more under terms of the 1991 Gulf War cease-fire agreement.

But American and U.N. officials suspect that Saddam has stashed away some of the 819 Scud-B missiles he acquired from the former Soviet Union during the 1980-88 war with Iran, or longer-range al-Hussein and al-Abbas variants Iraq developed.

**Ireland's governing coalition falls**

DUBLIN, Ireland — The unhappy two-party coalition that has governed Ireland since 1989 collapsed Thursday in a complex dispute that was set off by a controversy over sales of Irish beef to France.

The government lost a vote of confidence 88-77, opening the way for Ireland to elect a new government on Nov. 25.

With unemployment exceeding 20 percent, the economy lags as the main election issue. The ballot also will include proposals to change Ireland's abortion law to allow travel abroad for an abortion, distribution of information about abortion abroad, and the right to abortion in Ireland to save the life of the mother.

**Judge dismisses anti-cigarette suit**

NEWARK, N.J. — A landmark lawsuit against the cigarette industry was dismissed by a judge Thursday at the request of lawyers for the plaintiffs, the family of a woman who claimed smoking caused her fatal lung cancer.

The case had been sent back to federal court in Newark for retrial in June by the U.S. Supreme Court. The high court said a 1965 federal law requiring warning labels on cigarette packages did not shield the companies from all lawsuits based on state personal injury laws.

The 7-2 ruling also said smokers need to do more than prove that cigarette advertising and promotions tend to minimize the health hazards.

U.S. District Judge Dickinson R. Debevoise dismissed the case with the consent of the family of Rose Cipollone, said Alan Darnell, an attorney for the family.

Darnell wouldn't elaborate, and Marc Z. Edell, another attorney for the family, declined to comment.

**Justice Department won't defend law**

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department said Thursday it would not defend a provision of the new cable television law that requires cable operators to reserve up to one-third of their channels for relaying the signals of local broadcasters.

But the department will battle the cable industry's First Amendment challenge to another part of the law that forces operators to negotiate with the local broadcasters over the terms, including possible payments, for relaying their programs.

In a letter to the Senate, the Justice Department noted that President Bush himself felt that the "must-carry" channel-reservation provision was unconstitutional and said so when he vetoed the cable TV net. His veto was overridden.

**Iran denies access to American**

WASHINGTON — Iran has refused to grant consular access to a U.S. businessman arrested on spy charges three weeks ago, the State Department said Thursday.

The official Islamic Republic News Agency had said Wednesday that Milton Mayar, 38, was providing vital business information from Iran to several international companies. It said he also had links with foreign intelligence agents.

Spokesman Richard-Boucher said the Swiss Embassy, which handles U.S. interests in Iran, has made repeated requests for consular access to Mayar without success.

Mayar remained in Iran after the revolution on the pretext of having an Iranian wife, the agency said.

**Maverick co-star suffers stroke**

HUNTINGTON BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Jack Kelly, who played Bart Maverick opposite James Garner in the popular TV series "Maverick," suffered a stroke and was hospitalized in critical condition Thursday.

Kelly, a councilman and former mayor of this Orange County city, was in the intensive care ward at Humana Hospital Huntington Beach.

Kelly, 65, remained unconscious Thursday, and his ex-wife and 20-year-old daughter, Nicole, were with him at the hospital, a spokesman said.

Kelly played the brother of Garner's, Bret Maverick, the show's dapper card shark.

**AIDS drug protection fades quickly**

BETHESDA, Md. — A panel considering large-scale testing of an AIDS vaccine heard a report Thursday that the drug causes a response that offers potential protection but quickly fades.

The panel of experts, convened by the National Institutes of Health, was organized to consider whether to recommend a clinical trial of a candidate vaccine called gp160.

NH earlier turned down requests for clinical trials of gp160, but a lobbyist for the drug maker, MierGeneSys of Meriden, Conn., persuaded Congress to include \$20 million in a defense appropriations bill to pay for a largescale testing of the candidate vaccine.

**Russian units disarm ethnic militants**

MOSCOW — Russia's defense minister flew to the North Ossetia region Thursday to assess the first serious ethnic frictions over the nation's soil, and Russian troops moved to disarm rival factions.

Russian troops entered several villages in the strict-torn southern region seeking to force Ossetian and Ingush militiamen to stop a bloody fight over territory in the Caucasus Mountains, IFAF-Tass said.

Russian Defense Minister Pavel Grachev arrived in North Ossetia's capital and met with Russian military commanders and the North Ossetian Security Council to get a firsthand report on the situation, IFAF-Tass said.

increases and other unavoidable expenses associated with federal mandates, medical care for the poor and increased student populations. And even some belt-tightening will be required in those areas, they said.

Anything new or expanded government services or efforts beyond the basics, they said, will have to be tied directly to a way of raising the cash to pay the bill.

Council members, who recommend to the governor and Legislature the public works repair and construction priorities, came up against the state's tight revenue picture in setting the priority list for the coming budget deliberations.

Even after ignoring an estimated \$20 million in new construction and past planning studies, the council found that the permanent building fund was not expected to have enough money to meet building maintenance needs and underwrite bond payments.

"We need the Legislature to provide us with a more permanent source of funding and dollars we can count on because it's gotten to the point where we can't plan anything," Council Chairman Jerry Wray, Boise, said.

"Every one of the charges was critical to collapsing that bridge," Dilley said Wednesday. "We didn't have the luxury of overkill."

Dilley said the location of the bridge in the city called for his crew to use just enough charges to do the job. Typically, he said, he would have used about eight or nine times as much explosives in a less populated area.

"We can't hit it as hard as we'd like to hit it," Dilley said.

Complicating matters was the fact that the Singing Bridge, like most man-made constructions, was over-engineered by about 50 percent, Dilley said.

"Man-made structures are tough to bring down," he said.

When it finally does come down, the bridge will be sheared and sold to Pacific Steel for disposal. Betty Byce, contractor and office manager for Idaho Construction, said regulations require that pieces of the bridge be taken by a company qualified to handle the material. The lead point on the structure prevents it from being used for anything else.

Lead point is what helped bring about the need for a blasting company. Byce said dismantling the bridge piece by piece would have been more dangerous.

"We felt that this was the safest way to bring the bridge down," Byce said.

Construction on the \$2.3 million five-lane replacement for the Singing Bridge is expected to be finished in the fall of 1993.

according to a statement released by the Mexican president's office.

Analysis said the market took the comments as a sign Clinton would not try to renegotiate the treaty. During the election campaign, the Democrat had suggested that modification was necessary to protect American jobs and the environment.

The market gained 28.84 points, or 1.35 percent, to close at 1,568.59, and analysts said it was a sign of confidence in Clinton, who takes office in January.

The recently signed agreement would create a duty-free area of 360 million people generating \$6.4 trillion per year in trade. It must still be ratified by the legislatures of the three countries.

Salinas, who has two years remaining in his six-year term, had a close relationship with President Bush. His ability to maintain constructive ties with the U.S. administration is considered key to the continuation of Mexico's economic reforms.

In the conversation, Clinton congratulated Salinas on his four-year campaign to rebuild the Mexican economy, which was depressed for most of the 1980s.

Clinton, who initially expressed reservations about the treaty, had sought to address fears raised by organized labor that American jobs would be lost to Mexico, where labor costs are much lower, and claims by environmentalists that Mexico's pollution laws are poorly enforced.

# Visitors damage national parks

WASHINGTON (AP) — National parks are being degraded because the Park Service spends most of its money accommodating visitors and little protecting what they came to see, a government audit says.

Fossil beds in Utah, a national seashore in Texas and the troubled bull trout population in Oregon have fallen victim to the agency's mismanagement of the natural resources. The Interior Department's office of inspector general said in an audit Thursday.

has occurred in some of our national parks and the natural value and attraction of these parks have been diminished," assistant inspector general Harold Bloom said.

Auditors visited 33 national parks from November 1991 to April 1992 and sampled more than 13 million acres of problems, including Redwood National Park in California, Crater Lake National Park in Oregon and Gateway National Recreation Area in New York.

## Hagerman Fossil Beds is among 13 degraded sites

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument in Idaho is among 13 National Park Service sites suffering significant degradation of natural resources, the Interior Department's Office of Inspector General says.

External agricultural irrigation, soil erosion and site destruction are the principal causes listed for degradation at the fossil beds monument.

Significant fossil beds have been lost because water used to irrigate nearby farmlands has saturated the soil and caused landslides. Two major landslides since 1988 destroyed 75 acres of fossil beds, the audit says.

Other sites, with the name followed by the number in the natural resource is identified by the inspector general's audit:

Biscayne National Park, Florida — Toxic contamination, external development and invasive debris.

Canyonlands National Park, Utah — Cattle trespass and overgrazing, soil erosion and exotic species.

Crater Lake National Park, Oregon — Water quality and exotic species.

Gateway National Recreation Area, New York — Trash dumping, hazardous waste sites, water pollution.

Glenn Canyon National Recreation Area, Arizona — Archaeological degradation, cattle trespass and overgrazing and external development.

Oregon Caves National Monument, Oregon — Water quality and flow, external development and aesthetic and visual degradation.

Polaris National Seashore, Texas — Hazardous waste and marine debris.

Redwood National Park, California — Soil erosion, water flow, external development.

Shenandoah National Park, Virginia — Air pollution, external development and wildlife habitat.

than 4,700 resource protection projects estimated to cost about \$472 million, but devoted only \$93 million to its entire natural resource management program last year.

Only 8 percent of the Park Service's budget is spent on natural resources and 92 percent on visitor services, the audit said.

Edward Davis, the Park Service's associate director for budget and administration, said the agency generally agrees with the audit.

But he said the 92 percent figure was misleading because it includes spending for safety, maintenance, cultural-historical resource preservation and international affairs.

He said the service has made progress since audits found similar problems in 1987 and 1990, including recent success in protecting air quality at the Grand Canyon.

The auditors determined that most damage results from a shortage of money to monitor the resources.

When the Exxon Valdez spilled oil on 300 miles of Alaska coastline in 1989, the park service "could not assess the extent of the damage because of insufficient inventory and monitoring data," the report said.

At the Biscayne National Park in Florida, ammonia toxins 1,000 times above recommended levels leaked undetected from 1985 until 1990.

The nation's full trout population at Crater Lake National Park in Oregon is in danger of extinction because park managers were slow to respond to the adverse impact of introducing brook trout to streams, the auditors said.

## Clinton team hopes Bush not very 'mischievous'

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — President-elect Clinton's team can't do much except wait for the next two months while the Bush administration plays ahead with its own policies, like Thursday's decision to impose punitive tariffs on European imports.



Clinton aides "hoped" that Bush in his concession speech Tuesday night and in comments Wednesday would pledge to work with Clinton's team to ensure a smooth transition.

"Hopefully, they'll keep their mischievousness in check," Bruce Reed, a Clinton policy aide, said of the Republicans' long duck period before the new president takes over Jan. 20. "We've waited 12 years. We can wait another two months."

Clinton himself sounded supportive of President Bush's decision to make powers for the next 70 days, reserving comment on the European tariff decision until he could review it.

"We've got one president," said Clinton, who was working on state and transition business at the Arkansas governor's office and placing introductory phone calls to new leaders.

"The administration has been making a number of decisions in almost four years. It's not such a big deal."

Clinton's team to ensure a smooth transition. Bush said "he wants to work with the new administration to get things rolling." Reed said. "The ball's in their court as to what kind of transition it's going to be."

Clinton's aide insisted there was nothing irritating about having the very Republicans they had just defeated still making decisions about the nation's fate.

"We're not asking for the wheels of government to shut down until we get to town," Reed said, adding, "The administration has been making a number of decisions in almost four years. It's not such a big deal."

# Libyans fuel Liberia strife, officials say

WASHINGTON (AP) — Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi has been funneling weapons to a faction in Liberia's three-year-old civil war in an effort to install a radical regime, U.S. officials said Thursday.

The officials said Libya has been involved in the conflict from the beginning and recently has increased its arms shipments, delivering light arms, mortars and small artillery pieces and using Burkina Faso as a transit point.

There has been a marked deterioration in the situation in recent weeks as the pro-Libyan National Patriotic Front of Liberia, headed by Charles Taylor, has attacked the capital of Monrovia. Casualties have numbered in the hundreds, perhaps thousands, including

five American nuns. The front controls much of the country's side.

According to the officials, Taylor has received training in Libya and in Burkina Faso.

Liberia traditionally has had close ties with the United States. The officials, asking not to be identified and it would be a political plus for Gadhafi if he were able to help install a radical regime in that country.

For years, Libya has been on a State Department list of countries which sponsor terrorism.

The State Department announced Thursday it is recalling the U.S. ambassador from Burkina Faso to protest the arms shipments.

Burkina Faso has actively undermined the peace process in Liberia but he declined comment when asked where Burkina Faso obtained the arms.

In addition to recalling U.S. ambassador Fabs and Britons for consultations, the United States asked the west African nation to cancel plans to send a new ambassador to Washington.

Boucher said.

"The Reagan government and the Bush administration have to share some of the responsibilities for what has happened," Roman Catholic Archbishop Michael Francis said in an interview in Monrovia, the Liberian capital.

He and others believe the United States has a moral responsibility to help end the country's brutal, nearly three-year civil conflict.

The archbishop said the Reagan administration gave a half-billion dollars to the Samuel Doe regime, overthrown by Taylor in 1989. Most of that money went to Doe and a clique from his tribe, Francis said. In return, the United States was able to use Liberia as a CIA listening post and satellite tracking station.

Nobody can say why the American nuns, aged 50 to 70, were among the 604 victims.

One of three remaining American nuns in Liberia, Barbara Brillant of Bronxville, N.Y., said Taylor's fighters also "see the CIA behind every abuse."

**For those who keep vigil across from White House, it ain't over**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ellen Picoletto has camped outside the White House 24 hours a day every day for 12 years to protest nuclear arms.

She wants to be known simply as Ellen, not Picoletto, she said. She has a sign that says "NO NUCLEAR WEAPONS."

"Changing the President won't do anything," Picoletto said. "The only way to change the President is to change the system. You just move the pieces."

The small, Spanish-speaking woman, her head covered in a thick black wig and a large babushka, spends her days directly across from the White House door, on the edge of Lafayette Park.

President Bush has never crossed Pennsylvania Avenue to meet her, and her attitude toward presidents in general goes well beyond disappointment.

But she did go to the polls Tuesday to vote for Ross Perot.

"He did make a little more sense than the other ones. He was more sincere," said Picoletto, "who would not give her age. Besides, he's not a politician."

A few pages away, between two white signs with messages like "WANTED — WISDOM AND HONESTY," sits Ellen Thomas, who voted for a man of my generation, Bill Clinton.

But Thomas has no plans to quit her 24-hour White House vigil.

"I told myself if God wanted me to, I'd stay here until there were no nuclear weapons left anywhere," said Thomas, 46, who wears her grey hair in pigtails held in place with red rubber bands, and sports a metal shell like a talisman around her neck.

"I'd rather not be here," she said, "but I probably will be for a while."

Picoletto has no other home. Thomas is married to a man who works on nuclear-arms protests from a friend's basement, where she sometimes goes to shower and take a break.

The women see themselves more as peacekeepers than protesters. In their purpose, they said, is to remind.

Both hand out information to anyone who wants it. Picoletto has photocopied articles in a variety of languages, including Spanish, German, Japanese and English.

Thomas asks passersby to sign a petition for Proposition One, a voter referendum she hopes one day to see on the ballot in every state. It calls for total nuclear disarmament in the United States—and eventually, the complete conversion of all military forces and industries to peacetime pursuits.

She said Bush has been better since he started taking his thyroid medicine, but she feels "real hope" for Clinton—a man free of the terrible memories of World War II.

Thomas said she danced and beat a drum in Lafayette Park until 3:30 a.m. Wednesday morning to celebrate Clinton's election. But reality is returning along with the night routine.

Picoletto quietly swept the area around her belongings, which include a makeshift board seat between two

bright yellow signs emblazoned with large black and red letters.

"STAY THE COURSE AND THIS WILL HAPPEN TO YOU," reads one, which is plastered with gruesome post-Hiroshima photographs of dying people and skulls piled up in large mounds.

"WHITE HOUSE 24 HRS. A DAY ANTI NUCLEAR PEACE VIGIL, SINGE-1982" reads the other, a bulletin board of sorts for press clippings, bumper stickers, and letters. She's written to Mikhail Gorbachev and others. A friend of Thomas' stopped by to say she's heading to the library, does Thomas need anything?

"It's hard to get through the bureaucracy over there," Thomas said, tilting her head in the direction of the White House. "Once you get in there, it's hard to keep in touch with what's going on out here."

Thomas said she has a challenge for Bill and Hillary Clinton.

"What I would hope is that, unlike the two predecessors, they will be free enough of fear to come out of the gate and come over here and talk to us."

**Bush administration claims drug war results**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration claimed Thursday it has fresh evidence its war on drugs has been working — a study showing declining cocaine use when supplies dwindled and prices rose.

The study was released just two weeks after the government reported that cocaine-related visits to hospital emergency rooms during the first three months of 1992 hit a record 30,103, wiping out earlier gains and exceeding the record set in the fall of 1989.

The study was based on data between 1986 and 1991. Released by the Office of National Drug Control Policy and paid for

by the Bush administration, the study by Abt Associates of Cambridge, Mass., that said cocaine use fluctuated in that period depending on its price and availability.

"Supply reduction efforts are an indispensable ally of demand reduction programs," said White House drug czar Bob Martinez. "By making drugs more expensive and difficult to obtain, they help reduce drug use."

But Herbert Kleber, a professor at Columbia University Medical School, said a basic flaw in the study was that it assumed drug supplies can be reduced or halted with more law enforcement.

**Kidney disease increased in 80s**

ATLANTA (AP) — The number of cases of severe kidney disease attributable to diabetes increased sixfold during the 1980s, hitting the elderly and blacks hardest, federal health officials said Thursday.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said cases of severe kidney disease caused by diabetes jumped from 2,220 in 1980 to 13,332 in 1989. The rate of such cases went from 38.4 per 100,000 people with diabetes in 1980 to 202 per 100,000 in 1989, it said.

The federal agency studied only cases of diabetes-related kidney disease so severe that patients had to undergo dialysis or a kidney transplant to survive.

Diabetes is a chronic disease in which the body doesn't produce or respond to insulin, which helps the body metabolize sugar. The disease is the leading cause of kidney failure in the United States.

## County solid waste fee displeases many

**TWIN FALLS** — County and city residents greeted the new \$50 solid waste fee like an unloved relative Thursday.

"Among those unhappy to see the fee in the afternoon mail were Twin Falls City officials. 'Unfortunate and presumptuous,' Mayor Howard Allen called the fee Thursday night."

City Council members want to decide by the end of November whether to stay with a county landfill plan or join the Southern Idaho Regional Solid Waste District.

"They had hoped the county might hold off on the fee until the city had chosen its plan, so city residents didn't have to pay for a county landfill if they did not use it."

"We weren't looking for it to come this early," he said.

The mayor said he received a number of calls about the fee, as did City Sanitation Inspector Sherry Jeff.

None of the Twin Falls County commissioners could be reached Thursday night for a reaction to Allen's comments.

Thursday afternoon, however, county Commissioner Norma Blass answered telephone calls about the fee. Most callers, however, took the fee better when they learned it was to help build a new landfill and

not for operating expenses, Blass said.

The man hired to take the fee for the county, Myron Nield, stood behind a counter on the courthouse second floor handing out appeal forms, taking checks and answering the telephone Thursday.

"You got some people coming in ready to throw you through the wall. Others say they want to pay their fair share," Nield said.

A couple of people refused to pay the fee because the county hasn't sited the landfill yet, Nield said.

Most of those appealing the fee are businesses, Nield said.

The fee is based on units of trash — the amount of garbage that an average household generates in a year. The city used the records of private waste haulers to estimate how much trash businesses generate and charged them for the number of units they produce.

For some businesses this will mean a fee of thousands of dollars.

For people who own more than one residence it means a \$50 fee for each house. Homeowners and apartment owners will pay the fee to their renters if they want.

Carol Davison of Kimberly said she plans to appeal the fee.

Davison owns a house but also owns an old Fraternal Order of the Eagles Lodge building she uses as an art studio and to store supplies in.

"I don't mind paying for the house," she said.

But she produces about one-fifth the garbage in the studio that she does in her home, Davison estimated.

## Buhl considers sending its trash to regional landfill

**BUIL** — The city of Buhl will send its trash to a regional landfill if that costs less than using a Twin Falls County landfill, the Buhl public works director said.

Gary Winn said Buhl will not decide until the county and the Southern Idaho Regional Solid Waste District offer the city firm prices. But Winn said the city is talking with the district about using a regional landfill.

"We have to save our taxpayers money," he said. "We're sure looking because everything's tight."

The matter largely comes down to the transportation costs versus the landfill costs, Winn said.

The solid waste district wants to build a regional landfill on Burley Butte, eight miles west of Burley. If the district overcomes area residents' opposition and builds the landfill, Buhl would pay the haul costs of 40 miles or more to the facility.

However, with Minidoka and Casser counties also using the Burley Butte site, and possibly the city of Twin Falls, the cost per ton of landfilling trash might offset the haul costs, Winn said.

## Ski area sale nears completion

**FAIRFIELD** — The ink isn't dry, but Soldier Mountain may soon be under semi-new ownership.

Local commodities broker Alex Sinclair and former Twin Falls developer Dave Armstrong are buying the ski area north of Fairfield. Before they can take over, however, the Forest Service must approve the permit, which will take another week or two.

With snow flurries dancing through the hills and ski season rapidly approaching, the new Soldier Mountain owners plan to concentrate on basics this year. Sinclair said that snow-making equipment is being repaired and improved so more of the slopes can be covered with man-made white stuff.

Sinclair went into partnership with co-owners Claude and Karen Hinkle last season, after the mountain landed on Hinkle's lap only a few years after he sold it to a California company. Hinkle had been involved in Soldier Mountain since 1972 and bought in 1988. In 1990 he sold it to a California-based company but took back ownership of the mountain in February 1991.

Soldier Mountain has been part of southern Idaho's ski industry since 1941, when Camas County residents Robert Frostenson and Harry Duvall started the resort with two rope tows. The owner has been through a succession of owners since the mid-1970s and was hit hard by drought the late 1980s.

Skier visits have dropped from 23,400 in the 1984-'84 winter to 3,640 in the winter of 1990-'91.

Hinkle said he would focus his energy on his ski stores in Fairfield and Twin Falls.

"We've sort of been wanting to move it into the hands of somebody who wanted to perpetuate the thing and do some development," Hinkle said.

## Hagerman Valley water rights owners complain about 'unfair' adjudication

## Big turnout, uneven campaign, anti-incumbent mood beat Stallings

**TWIN FALLS** — In the wake of his stunning loss to Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne in the U.S. Senate race, one question remained for Rep. Richard Stallings:

Why did he lose a race he was favored to win only a few months before?

It's a question with many answers, some short-term and specific to Stallings' campaign and some long-term and having to do with national trends and Idaho's political landscape.

Both men's campaign managers, though, agreed on one thing Wednesday: The record turnout on Election Day overwhelmingly benefitted Kempthorne, turning what might have been a close race into a near-rout.

"It's historically in Idaho, the bigger the turnout the better it is for Republicans," said Kempthorne's manager, Phil Reberger, a veteran of Idaho politics. "This year, that worked out in spades."

"It's very tough for a Democrat to win once you get beyond the 40,000 (turnout) mark," said William Sublett, Stallings' manager.

In fact, 477,848 voters were cast in the hotly contested Senate race. That was 40,000 more people than voted for the three major presidential candidates, and 44,000 more than voted in the 1980 Senate contest between Steve Symits and Frank Church.

Most pre-election observers had rated the

race as either a toss-up or a narrow Kempthorne win. Kempthorne, however, ended up winning with 56.53 percent of the vote.

Many of the new voters were inspired by Ross Perot's presidential candidacy and the anti-incumbent mood it both fed on and helped generate.

Although Stallings was not, technically, an incumbent in the Senate race, he effectively filled that role. But what would have been an advantage in most years proved a decided liability in 1992.

"Incumbents aren't a hot property this year," Reberger said dryly.

In his speeches, debates, campaign appearances and especially in his television ads, Kempthorne repeatedly stressed that it was "time for a change" and that he was "an Idaho voice to put Washington right." He implicitly, and late in the campaign

explicitly, linked Stallings to the Democratic power structure in Congress.

Change, in fact, was the main — some would say only — theme of Kempthorne's campaign. Stallings, on the other hand, seemed to flit from issue to issue, never finding one or two he could hammer away at.

For example, Stallings could have stressed his expertise in agricultural issues, his dedication to serving his 2nd District constituents, or the argument that given a Democratic-run Congress and a likely Democratic administration, he could be more effective than Kempthorne.

Instead, he tried to attack Kempthorne over his record as mayor, his stand on the North American Free Trade Agreement, and his position on Snake River salmon recovery. None of those seemed to strike a chord with voters.

The series of debates Kempthorne and Stallings held around the state helped present the mayor's face to voters who had never heard of him before, a key part of Reberger's campaign strategy.

"We felt very confident from the outset that if we could introduce Dirk Kempthorne to people around the state, there would be a connect, as there was in the Treasure Valley," Reberger said.

Kempthorne also kept up a steady barrage of television and radio ads throughout the summer, while Stallings aired few if any. Supporters complained, usually off-the-record, that the congressman wasn't being as visible as he needed to be. And he failed

to make effective use of popular surrogates such as Gov. Cecil Andrus, until late in the campaign.

Stallings also acknowledged more difficulty than he had anticipated in raising money, which hampered his campaign.

"If money hadn't been a factor, we would have run more ads over the summer to match his (Kempthorne's) message," Sublett admitted. "But then we wouldn't have been competitive at the end."

By Labor Day, the race was generally considered to be even. Then two things happened to allow Kempthorne to pull out the lead:

As the mayor embarked on a statewide tour of more than 170 stops, Stallings went back to Washington, D.C., for the 11th month of Congress' session.

Although Stallings tried to turn his absence into a campaign plus, saying he had to be on Capitol Hill to look after Idaho's interests there, the practical effect was to keep him out of the state while his opponent generated large amounts of generally favorable media coverage.

By the time Congress adjourned and Stallings returned to Idaho for the last few weeks of the campaign, he was well behind Kempthorne. Although Sublett said the momentum had shifted toward Stallings a week before Election Day, the Kempthorne campaign maintained that they never lost their lead.

At any rate, the massive turnout helped

RUPERT — Members of the Fifth Judicial District on Wednesday appointed Rupert attorney Larry R. Duff to fill the vacancy of former Judge Robert Workman.

Duff, who has practiced law since 1962, was chosen over seven other attorneys to take Workman's place on the bench, serving Minidoka County. Duff will officially don his robes Jan. 1.

The Rupert attorney said he applied for the job since he was considering a new career anyway — and one, perhaps, more civic-minded.

"My feelings were that when all my children left home I should get into some type of work community oriented," he said. "I anticipated I'd try to go on the bench or teach in a university."

Workman resigned from the bench in early September after the Idaho Judicial Council considered disciplinary proceedings against him. By stepping down, Workman ended those proceedings.

Workman's supervisor, William Hart, has declined to discuss the reasons for the judge's abrupt departure.

Magistrates with the 5th District had narrowed the field down to three — including Cindy L. Campbell of Blackfoot and Thomas H. Berenson of Boise — before selecting Duff.

Duff, 55, said the appointment didn't necessarily come as a surprise since he has served on numerous judicial committees and helped shape magistrate jury, criminal and civil rules.

"I thought I had a pretty good chance," he said.

"In a past president of the Idaho Trial Lawyer's Association, been involved in litigation and a lot of state associations (and) with prosecuting with the Attorney General's office from 1963 to 1972."

He added, though, the interview for the position included facing a panel of 16, and he was pleased with the appointment.

"It's always exciting when you get to do something you want to," he said.

Duff helped draft criminal rules for pleadings in criminal cases for magistrate and district court, helped write Idaho civil jury instructions, and worked on committees to determine civil rules.

He has been a partner in the Rupert law firm of Goodman & Duff since 1962.

Forest Service recognizes teacher for environmental education

### Idahoans know what kind of home state they want

A footnote to Tuesday's anti-gambling vote.

The connection between gambling and a society's culture was much-hinted-at but never fully stated in the campaign for HJR 4. Maybe we all should have paid more attention to the racketeering trial of Shoshone County Sheriff Frank Cmkovich.

Cmkovich was the target of a federal investigation into widespread illegal barroom gambling in northern Idaho's Silver Valley. The government alleges Cmkovich tipped off bar owners when federal agents were on the prowl.

The defense is using a unique tactic. It has tried to show that gambling and prostitution are such an ingrained part of the Silver Valley's culture that Cmkovich's behavior was no big deal.

The defense included testimony by state Sen. Marii Calabretta of Osburn, who said gambling and prostitution were traditional aspects of life in mining communities. They meet a recreational need for miners who "work hard and play hard."

Before going further, we should note that U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge rejected the defense's gambit. He refused to let jurors hear the arguments that lawlessness was justified because it

was widely tolerated.

"Just because people are hostile to the law, that doesn't mean the law should be overlooked," he said.

Lodge is of course right. But what the judge says about the law is less interesting than what this case says about life in the Silver Valley.

It's tough to swallow the idea that hard-working miners need gambling and whoring to help them unwind. What's the matter, don't they get ESPN? Can't they go bowling?

But the idea apparently has wide enough acceptance that a state legislator is willing to express it in court.

At the risk of sounding puritanical, resisting such attitudes was exactly what the HJR 4 debate was about.

Gambling, prostitution, official corruption, street crime and a general decline in public morality all fit together like pieces of a puzzle. They are part of an environment that has made Atlantic City and Las Vegas unsavory places.

Idaho voters understood this hazard when they approved HJR 4 on Tuesday. So, apparently, do the federal authorities working to clean up the Silver Valley.

### Good news for the economy

President-elect Clinton wasted no time in going to work on the nation's economy. Two days after the election, the Associated Press reported that:

- First-time unemployment claims have fallen to the lowest level in more than two years.
- Productivity improved in the third quarter of 1992.
- Sales are up from last year at Wal-Mart, Kmart, Sears, J.C. Penney, Dayton Hudson and Federated Department Stores.
- Wow. Looks like we got rid of that Bush fellow just in time.

While it is a formidable task, I believe we can strengthen the state's ability to manage its own waters if we develop a joint legislative/executive strategy and pursue it aggressively.

I have discussed this issue with R. Keith Higginson, director of the Department of Water Resources, and we would like to offer several suggestions:

- Convene a multi-state, joint executive/legislative summit to develop a strategy for FERC reform.
- While there are unquestionably problems with execution of FERC's responsibilities, the basic problem stems from the federal law itself.
- I support the legislators' call for a moratorium on small hydro development pending resolution of the problem. I also support the Miller amendments which recently failed in Congress or some similar provision.
- In addition to the law, we need to focus on commission appointments.
- To the best of my knowledge, none of the current commissioners have significant experience either with hydro projects or with Western water appropriation. That needs to change.
- I propose we consider a multi-state meeting in Idaho to develop a comprehensive strategy for FERC reform.



### Work together to protect Idaho water

In response to the Oct. 15 commentary signed by 14 Magic Valley legislators concerning I. B. Industries' plans for hydroelectric projects on the Middle Snake River.

We at the Division of Environmental Quality appreciate the legislators' concern for the Middle Snake. We also share their frustrations with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

While it is a formidable task, I believe we can strengthen the state's ability to manage its own waters if we develop a joint legislative/executive strategy and pursue it aggressively.

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### Reader comment Joe Nagel

It may be appropriate to invite key congressional representatives from each of the Western states as well.

- Amend state law to prohibit water quality certification on protected or interim protected rivers.
- Protection and interim protection of state rivers presently prohibits some state agencies from approving dams, impoundments, hydro projects, diversions, mining, stream bed alterations, and gravel extraction (possibly more limited if a river is designated as recreational). However, the prohibition does not extend to water quality certification of federally permitted activities by DEQ.
- We would support amending the state River Basin Planning Law to include such a prohibition on the grounds that DEQ cannot certify activities which meet water quality standards before it knows what level of protection the state will afford the river.
- It stands to reason that state-protected rivers might require higher water quality standards than non-protected rivers.
- Adopt state regulations to incorporate federal NEPA decisions in state certification process and to provide four state oversight of water quality conditions.
- DEQ is currently working on a final draft of "401 Certification" regulations which will be published as proposed regulations in the next couple of months. They will address two of the problems cited in the Oct. 15 article.
- The regulations will propose that an applicant submit the final NEPA determinations from the appropriate federal agency as part of his application to DEQ for water quality certification. If it is not included, the regulations will propose DEQ automatically deny certification with the option for the applicant to resubmit the application once a NEPA determination has been made.
- The regulations will also propose that applicants enter into a written, enforceable agreement with the state whenever it is necessary to assure that conditions imposed by the state are followed.
- Amend state law to incorporate water quality consideration in water appropriation process.
- The most important lesson of all to be learned from the current situation on the Middle Snake River is that it is difficult, if not impossible, to protect the quality of a river independent of actions authorizing uses of water under state water rights laws. There needs to be coordination of water allocation and water quality protection to provide that authorized uses return water to streams in a condition which does not violate standards.
- Such coordination would significantly strengthen the state's ability to manage its own waters with much less interference from the federal government.
- We thank the legislators for their strong interest in this vital issue. We would strongly support a joint initiative to strengthen state management of our water resources.

I have been a local businessman, retired a year ago. I'm a senior citizen and an overseas veteran of World War II.

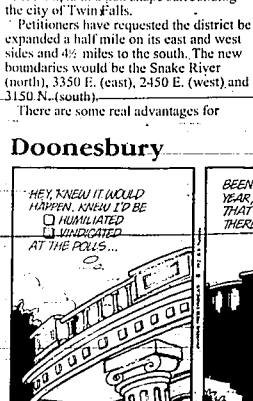
As I recall, the last general election in 1988 didn't generate as much public concern, but in spite of it or not, The

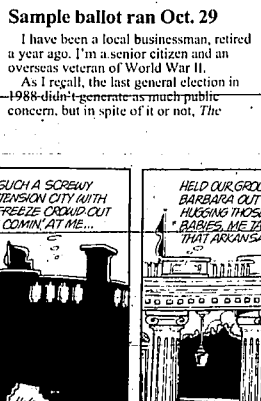

# U.S. sub-docks in Persian Gulf with tender

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — The first U.S. submarine openly enter the Persian Gulf tied up with a tender Thursday while waiting for a newly purchased Iranian sub to reach the body of water, which is vital to world oil trade.

Officially, the USS Topoka is in the gulf for maintenance work. But military sources in Washington, speaking on condition of anonymity, told The Associated Press last week it would monitor the Iranian sub deployment.



## Yeltsin proposes summit

MOSCOW (AP) — President Boris Yeltsin talked with Bill Clinton by telephone Thursday, invited the U.S. president-elect to Moscow and suggested further cuts in nuclear weapons, Kremlin spokesmen said.

"I think, Mr. Clinton, that my warm and good relationship with George Bush will not prevent our relations from being even better," Yeltsin said during the 20-minute conversation, part of which was shown on television.

Yeltsin practically shouted into the credit-colored telephone while looking into a TV camera across his dark wood desk in the Kremlin.

"The boldness in politics and firm rejection of old dogmas and stereotypes that you stand for match well with the principles of our Russian-American relations," he told Clinton.

Earlier in the day, a deputy foreign minister said Yeltsin had good "chemistry" with Clinton and wanted to meet as soon as possible after the inauguration.

Yeltsin suggested during the phone call that he and Clinton immediately exchange ranking representatives, the ITAR-Tass and Interfax news agencies reported.

U.S. Ambassador Bob Strauss, who leaves his post next week, predicted Clinton would be sensitive to the need for maintaining continuity in U.S. policy on Russia.

"I have every reason to believe that Bill Clinton and Boris Yeltsin will build a relationship of their own on top of the previous relationship that will be strong and firm," said Strauss.

Georgi Manedov, Russia's deputy minister of foreign affairs, said Yeltsin had offered to meet Clinton "at any suitable time," but no date had been set for a summit.

"Great understanding emerged between Boris Yeltsin and Bill Clinton in Washington," during Yeltsin's summit with President Bush, Manedov said. "I was present there, so I would say that this human chemistry worked."

Elsewhere, a spokeswoman for Vietnam's Foreign Ministry said her country hoped Clinton would hasten normalization of relations between Vietnam and the United States.

Vietnam's economy is struggling, and its leaders have been seeking an end to the economic embargo the United States has maintained since South Vietnam fell to the Communist north in 1975. The Bush administration has said relations would not be normalized until Vietnam makes a satisfactory accounting of 2,266 American servicemen still missing from the Vietnam War.

In Iran, meanwhile, a newspaper close to the government urged Clinton to reduce U.S. hostility to Iran. The English-language Tehran Times said Clinton should unfreeze Iranian assets seized after Iranian militants stormed the U.S. Embassy in 1979 and held 52 Americans hostage for 444 days.

Manedov said Yeltsin had sent Clinton a telegram offering congratulations as well as a separate message suggesting greater U.S.-Russian cooperation in "all areas, above all economic."

He said the message also proposed "further deep cuts in strategic offensive weapons, chemical weapons convention and specific measures to prevent the proliferation of missile technology."

Manedov noted that Yeltsin and Bush agreed at their summit in June to cut long-range nuclear arsenals by "three to four times."

After the summit, Yeltsin was cool toward Clinton when he displaced Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev, the two leaders developed a comfortable relationship over the past year and often spoke on the telephone. The high point came during their successful June summit.

It is also likely the American nuclear attack sub will be used to test the acoustic properties of the gulf, knowledge that is crucial to detecting and tracking submerged subs. Each body of water has its own characteristics that affect the transmission of sounds.

The gulf has long been considered too dangerous for submarine warfare because its shallow waters — ranging generally in depth from about 80 feet to 100 feet in its central portions — make the boats easily detectable by other warships. The diesel-electric Kilo-class sub bought by Iran is about 30 feet from its bottom to the top of its tower, the Topoka about 33 feet.

But submarines based in the gulf could operate just outside the Strait of Hormuz in the far deeper waters of the Arabian Sea. About 20 percent of the world's oil supply moves through the

strait. The Iranian sub, which has been sailing on the surface since it left St. Petersburg several weeks ago, was spotted in the Red Sea earlier this week by the Royal Navy aircraft carrier HMS Invincible.

It was off Bab al-Mandeb, the southern entrance of the Red Sea close to the Yemeni port of Aden, and about to round the southern tip of the Arabian Peninsula.

### Authorities ask entire school staff to transfer

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Education authorities have asked all 90 teachers and staff at a high school to take transfers after Aboriginal students and parents complained of racism.

The New South Wales state Education Department said that in one incident, an Aboriginal boy was suspended for swearing at a teacher who allegedly described Aboriginal students as "scumbags" and "vermin." They said racism was "a continuing source of controversy and tension" for almost a decade at the school in the town of Casiner, 375 miles north of Sydney.

Education officials began an investigation in July following complaints about mistreatment.

# Sounds of violence: Europe's skinheads united by music

BERLIN (AP) — The music is loud, fast and filled with raw hatred of anybody who isn't white.

To a rightist radical, these are songs with a good stance, and you can beat to it.

Europe's neo-Nazis are being serenaded — even inspired, some experts fear — by a new wave of rock groups who mix racist rants with thumping punk and frenzied heavy metal.

"It's 'Mein Kampf' to a four-four beat," says Tony Robson, a researcher at the London-based Searchlight, a monthly magazine that monitors neo-Nazi activities.

The list of neo-fascist groups includes Hungary's Heart Minority and Healthy Head Skin, France's Legion 84, Germany's Storm Troop, Britain's No Remorse — a reference to the Holocaust — and dozens of others.

Czechoslovakia's white-supremacist Orlik, which split up after it was banned, sold 100,000 records last year, an amazing number in a small nation.

Although the phenomenon is not new, the numbers of such groups — and their appeal — are rising in relation to an increase in xenophobia and rightist violence, particularly in Germany.

Under fire for their plodding response to neo-Nazi attacks on foreigners, German officials only recently

began listening to the movement's musical messengers and probing a shadowy company in Cologne that records and sells music by Europe's biggest neo-fascist bands, including to U.S. markets. In Britain, authorities are prosecuting a record distributor with a paraphernalia product list that includes Ku Klux Klan T-shirts and baseball caps from the United States.

But another blatantly neo-fascist distribution company in France, Rebel European in Brest, has operated internationally for six years. In Hungary, slick fan magazines openly cater to followers of skinhead music.

Although people who study the skinhead scene differ on the degree such music works as a recruiting tool, they agree it provides a universal bond and common currency to white right-wing ragers.

It is rock-and-roll-made-for-people-who-throw-them-at-foreigners. "It gives them an identity. Kids in Poland, Germany, France all wear the same T-shirt," Robson said.

The bands themselves frequently team up for fly-by-night concerts, usually in white working-class districts.

Last year, Britain's veteran kings of fascist rock, Skrewdriver, organized a concert with Germany's two hottest hate bands, Stoerkraft and Radikal, in the east German city of Cottbus.

## Bush's loss soothes nerves of the 'cultural elite'

HOLLYWOOD — The "cultural elite," under siege from Vice President Dan Quayle and the religious right throughout the grueling 1992 presidential campaign, rejoiced Wednesday after Bill Clinton and Al Gore swept to victory in the race for the White House.

No TV Nielsen rating or weekend movie box office grosses ever smelled so

sweet in Hollywood.

The Clinton victory gave Hollywood, which had sustained the brunt of Quayle's attacks, a chance to savor the moment. One could almost picture Murphy Brown, babe in arms, beaming that shy smile into the camera and saying, "Take that, Dan!"

The Bush years were also marked by repeated attacks in Congress against the National Endowment for the Arts for funding artworks that many conservatives

found offensive, and reaction from the nation's art community was, similarly, pleased.

Derided by Quayle as "shallow sophisticates" with a liberal agenda, a broad section of the creative community said that the resounding Democratic victory indicated the country wanted to solve the pressing problems of the economy rather than splinter in a divisive debate over family values.

By Wednesday morning, the "cultural

elite," a term that many people in the arts and entertaining community thought was a bogus issue created by politics in the first place, relaxed in the comfort of victory. And they had the most unlikely of people to thank for it — a governor from a small, Southern state who openly embraced the "cultural elite."

## Too foul for words? Film profanity draws comment

Ears may be ringing in movie theaters this fall, but are films really talking dirtier? Depends who's listening.

It's no surprise that, among meditations on macho themes now on screen, several are robustly foul-mouthed. "Glengarry Glen Ross," "Reservoir Dogs" and "Laws of Gravity," while winning critical praise, strafe viewers with so many obscenities that even blasé audiences are taking notice.

"Glengarry," for the record, has 135 obscenities. "Reservoir Dogs" has 246. "Laws of Gravity" has more than 150 obscenities and at least 23 profanities (defaming the sacred). Too many? Who says? Who cares?

Unlike sex or violence, which is rated on a subjective basis, the use of certain language comes with specific consequences from the Motion Picture Association of America, says MPAA President Jack Valenti. One "F" word, for example, is an automatic PG-13; use of two is almost always grounds for an "R" rating. All three of the aforementioned movies, therefore, have "R" ratings.

## 3 new movies create controversy

Malle, recovering from surgery, said in a statement he was "stunned" by the rating on the film, which stars Jeremy Irons and Juliette Binoche, and has "no

# Fischer wins match against Spassky but reputation still in doubt

**BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)** — Bobby Fischer came out of two decades of seclusion to win one of history's most bizarre chess matches on Thursday.

The controversial former world champion—showing flashes of brilliance in overwhelming his old rival, Boris Spassky. He pocketed \$3.35 million and claimed he is still world champion.

But while the fiery Fischer showed he hasn't lost his tendency for odd behavior, some experts say he may have tarnished his legend as an all-time chess genius.

Playing publicly for the first time since beating Spassky for the world title in 1972, Fischer took just over nine weeks to defeat Spassky, wrapping up a 10-5 victory in the 30th game on Thursday. The 55-year-old Spassky earned \$1.65 million.

Robert Byrne, an American grandmaster who once defeated Fischer, described the play in the match as "spotty. These guys aren't what they were, by any means."

"I don't think Fischer can equal that genius play of 1972," Byrne said in New York.

But chess was only one element of the unlikely match, pitting a long-time recluse, age 49, against a former star who had faded from the world chess scene.

It began on Sept. 2 in Sveti Stefan, a gorgeous resort on the Montenegrin coast barely 40 miles from the ferocious fighting and shelling of Yugoslavia's civil war.

The match was organized by Jezdimir Vasiljevic, a wealthy banker who hoped it would bring publicity, people and money to Yugoslavia. Despite U.N. sanctions slapped on the country for fomenting war in Bosnia-Herzegovina,

the show-sty extravagance failed to lend legitimacy to the new state, but it did bring Fischer out of his long seclusion in southern California and back to competitive chess—and controversy.

He played the match in defiance of international sanctions against Yugoslavia, and the U.S. government has not decided whether to punish him.

1975 decision by chess authorities stripping him of the title for refusing to defend it against Anatoly Karpov.

But the International Chess Federation did not recognize the match, and in its opening week, Fischer was so angered by chess reports failing to call it the world championship that he threatened to have reporters barred.

That was mild compared to his other outbursts.

Fischer repeatedly attacked the Jewish community and tore up and spat on a letter from the U.S. Treasury warning him he was violating U.S. sanctions against Yugoslavia.

He denounced world chess champion Garry Kasparov as "a pathological liar."

Apparently relishing his bad-boy image, Fischer demanded special chess boards, tables and halls where he played. Organizers soon installed glass plates to muffle the noise of a crowd that dwindled to 30 a game in Sveti Stefan but was 200 once it moved to Yugoslavia's capital, Belgrade, following Fischer's fifth victory.

Once the early hype was out of the way, however, it became clear many grandmasters that Fischer had lashed out at were still playing chess.

Kasparov said. "He's destroying his own legend, the greatest chess ever had."

Still, Kasparov refused to dismiss the possibility Fischer could be a future challenger for his title.

He, like most grandmasters, appeared to agree that Fischer deserves a spot at least among the top 50 players in the world.

Most were reluctant to draw firm conclusions from a victory over the 96th-ranked Spassky, who lost three straight games due to blunders and called a postponement for "physical exhaustion and sleeplessness."

Fischer's assessment of himself was typically controversial. He thought he was playing well, "considering the fact that I've been blacklisted by world Jewry for 20 years."

American grandmaster Larry Evans said Fischer "is a genius and that never leaves you."

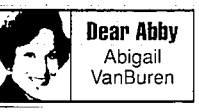
Dutch grandmaster Jan Timman said Fischer was "brilliant at times, but needed to play more tough matches."

"He has the strength but maybe not the concentration," said Immanuel, who plays British grandmaster Nigel Short in January for the Fide World Chess Championship for the third time next August.

Match organizers say "in the future plans to include in Yugoslavia for awhile. Negotiations are under way for him to play Hungarian teenager Judit Polgar, the world's top-ranked woman, who recently took Fischer's title as the youngest grandmaster ever.

# High-definition TV now on the horizon

**ORLANDO, Fla.** — When Barry Rebo thinks about the future of television, he thinks big — big picture, big screen ... and big bucks for consumers.

High-definition TV, the next generation in home viewing, is now too costly for the home. But within eight years, the technology, which is crisper and clearer than ordinary television, may be available for about \$1,500 to \$2,000, he said.

"By the end of the decade, I think you're going to see high-definition in many types of one-third of consumer homes," said Rebo, president of Rebo Studios, a New York company that has used high definition in some productions.

Numerous applications for high-definition TV were explored at IHD Imaging '92, a three-day conference sponsored by the American Film Institute at the Disney Yacht and Beach Club Resort.

About 150 people attended the event. High-definition technology, they were told, can be used not only in homes, but also in the film-making and medical industries.

The technology is expected to take off next year after the Federal Communications Commission sets standards for its transmission. When that happens, more equipment manufacturers will likely enter the industry, and equipment prices will be driven down.

"We're closer to bringing this into the home than ever before," Rebo said. "Once the FCC selects a standard, companies will know which systems to take into the home."

The beauty of high-definition television is in the clarity of its picture. The technology provides for 1,125 lines of resolution, about twice the resolution of current television. The technology is designed for a wide screen — 72 to 36 inches in the home.

Japanese companies, particularly Sony Corp., have spearheaded development of the new systems, though the technology is still costly even in Japan. Consumer systems there cost about \$8,000, said Rod Findley, a producer with Vision Works Entertainment, a Los Angeles production company.

Even in Japan, you don't see them everywhere. It's mostly in public areas, like hotels, airports or in the train system," Findley said.

American filmmakers are not likely to abandon film for high definition, Findley said. Film offers a soft quality that high definition cannot duplicate. In addition, movie theaters would have to change their projection systems to accommodate the new medium.

What is more likely, Findley said, is that producers will use high definition to a limited extent, either in post production or for special effects.

For instance, "Honey, I Blew up the Kid," a Disney movie, used high definition in several instances to show a larger than life baby wreak havoc. With the aid of a computer, a clay ear the child actor held was transformed into a real ear

"Doogie Howser, M.D.," said that the whole notion of Hollywood and the media as cultural elites was "bogus."

"We always felt that we're an easy target and that the extent to which you take a beating is very often symptomatic of the extent that people are really disaffected by their lives and the quality of their lives. If the new administration starts addressing hopefully an awful lot of social problems, and if the economic turns around, you will find yourself with a generally more pleased population. And I think you'll begin to see a little more tolerance for the normally divergent points of view that you should get in entertainment."

**LINDA BLOODWORTH-THEMASON**, creator of the CBS series "Designing Women," "Evening Shade" and the new political satire "Hearts Afire," who also produced the Clinton profile, "The Man From Hope," that was shown before his acceptance speech at the Democratic National Convention.

"I hope that Bill and Hillary are very, very, interested in traditional family values, and the fact that children be exposed to them in all the mediums possible. Bill will help us all redefine what traditional family values means. It won't

A moderate Republican, he backed Clinton this summer after calling a GOP platform "unconstitutional."

"I think it's a hopeful sign that Gov. Clinton was elected. "I guess this morning I feel a little better about the country's future. But you never know what's going to happen. Tipper Gore has never been a fan of mine or other rappers but I think her husband and Clinton are smart enough to see that the majority of politicians who attacked rap and the First Amendment all lost their jobs. I think Clinton and Gore realize that there are more important problems to solve."

fact—he and Mamet never even talked about it.

What he did notice, and what Mamet demanded, is that the carefully wrought dialogue spoken by such actors as Jack Lemmon and Al Pacino have the maximum aural power. And if profanities and obscenities are ingredients, they had better be used to the measure.

"The actors said one of us more or one less, it seemed to lose its rhythm entirely," Foley says. "I think it had to do with the actual sound of the language."

The rough language also was crafted in "Reservoir Dogs," says producer Lawrence Bender. "Most of the dialogue was written, it wasn't improvised," says Bender.

Both Foley and Bender say the language in their films is the natural expression of the film's characters.

"It shows the frustration of guys with limited vocabulary trying to express themselves," says Foley. For example, in a certain word two times in a sentence "may" may be somebody using profane language, but three times or four times it becomes hyperbolic and it becomes funny."

Says Bender: "Everything that happens comes out of who these guys are. And I think that's wonderful how that happens. The language is part of it. It's sort of stands on its own."

Moyie critic Michael Medved,

whose book "Hollywood vs. America: Popular Culture and the War on Traditional Values," decries the trend of sex and violence in the movies, says the language in "Glengarry" and "Dogs" doesn't bother him too much. It may be excessive and ultimately degrading, but audiences for these movies tend to know what they're getting, he says.

"I do understand and recognize that the esthetic purposes that Mamet was working for, however unworlthy, required a certain amount of blue language," says Medved. He notes that "Good Will Hunting," which he liked, had nearly 250 obscenities struck through it.

Nevertheless, the argument that profanity is simply reflecting reality leaves Medved unmoved. "The fact is there are lots of aspects of reality we don't reflect," he says. He has a hunch, for example, that at least one of the characters in "Glengarry" is suffering bowel trouble.

"Does that mean," he says, "we need some long, extended scenes of a commode as they are grunting and struggling?"

What troubles Medved most is what he sees as the growing frequency of foul language in PG and PG-13 movies. The language in "Dogs," for example, while relatively rare, is "cutely out of place."

"White Men Can't Jump" though rated R, was marketed with no hint

of the raw language it contained. It was crisscrossed with 115 profanities, something of a milestone among recent films.

Nevertheless, Ted Baehr, whose Christian Film and Television Commission counts the curse words and issues a "biblical guide to the movies," says there are signs of change. By the commission's measure, the number of films with "excessive" vulgarity dropped last year for the first time, from 44 percent in 1990 to 38 percent in 1991.

"I think studios are getting sensitive to the family audience," Baehr. With "teen-agers' shrinking as a demographic base, Baehr believes studios are aiming for a potentially larger audience.

The MPAA bears him out: Between 1989 and 1991, the number of R-rated movies released fell from 67 percent to 61 percent of the total. The number of PG films fell slightly, but the number of PG-13 films jumped from 16.4 percent to 19.2 percent.

For the concerned parent, however, the long-term view is less promising. From 1966 to 1986, more than 11 percent of the movies released were G-rated. Last year, it was only 2.3 percent.

Medved, therefore is more pessimistic. "My strong impression is that it's more of a problem because it's creeping into more movies. It's more ubiquitous."

TV notwithstanding, the days of radio remain dear to Kenworthy's heart. "It was a wonderful era," he said.

Edgar Bergen (and Charlie McCarthy) once invited Kenworthy to dinner — during the days when Candice Murphy Brown was only a baby herself. And Kenworthy played golf with Bob Hope.

"He was a pretty good golfer when he was young, but I don't think he's quite that good," Kenworthy said. "Of course, I wouldn't admit it if he did."

Once, Kenworthy did a radio show with Hope on Christmas Day. "He knew none of us could have Christmas dinner at home, so he had the whole cast over to his house," Kenworthy said. "We had a lovely dinner, and the Hope's even had people there to entertain us."

Kenworthy retired in 1975, after 32 years with NBC. He will celebrate birthday No. 80, Nov. 25, 1980, the Kenworthys tired of

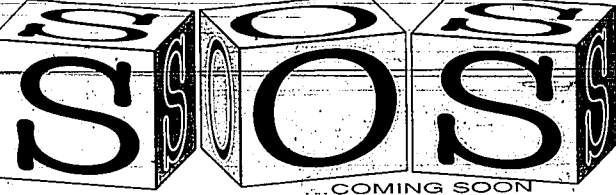
the hectic California life and returned to Jerome. His wife died in 1987.

These days, Kenworthy enjoys spending time with his three children and his many grandchildren and great-grandchildren. intention to cut it."

"This past year, I have seen R-rated pictures that contained scenes of shocking violence, murder, rape and exploitative pornography," Malle said. "Damage" is about a man's passion and sexual obsession, which turns into tragedy. It is a powerful and disturbing tale, but there is not one scene in the film which is gratuitous or titillating."

Since replacing the X rating in September 1990, the NC-17 has struck with only two mainstream releases — Philip Kaufman's "Henry and June" and a version of Bernardo Bertolucci's "1900."

In the debate that led MPAA President Jack Valenti to implement the new rating, critics argued the need to classify adult films but not stigmatize them with the X rating, which had been co-opted by pornographers.

But because it only replaced adult did not supplement X, the new rating is believed to suffer from the same problems — theater chains with anti-X restrictions, limited newspaper advertising and the

refusal of the nation's biggest videocassette chain, Blockbuster, to carry NC-17 movies.

"Bob Deitch, the producer of 'Body of Evidence,' insisted those bundles were not why he and others agreed to tone down the movie. He said the controversy threatened to obscure the film's story."

"We really wanted to see it we could do it," said Deitch, but test screenings and focus groups found the audience not connected with the ratings flap. He denied that the film's preliminary NC-17 rating was just aimed to cause publicity, but acknowledged it had created an awareness of the film. Now we have to hope that awareness."

At least one filmmaker, however, has decided to take his NC-17 in stride.

"I've stopped caring about a bunch of Beverly Hills housewives judging my movies," says Abel Ferrara, the director of "Bad Lieutenant," which stars Harvey Keitel and opens Nov. 20.

Ferrara, who successfully fought initial X ratings for "King of New York" and "Ms. 45," says he's had it fighting with the "five board," "If people want to see his movie — or Louis Malle movie — they will find it, even if it is the victim of NC-17 restrictions."

"If that's the price of personal freedom, then screw them," he said.

# New 'Blade Runner' hits home

**HOLLYWOOD** — The reconstructed "Blade Runner" may be the best "new" American movie released this year. Set in its spectacular dystopian Los Angeles, enveloped in high-tech shimmer, a gaudy mix of Wonderland and rain-drenched City of Night director Ridley Scott's adaptation of the Philip K. Dick novel "Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep?" had one of the most spell-

binding "looks" of any modern movie. Its script by Hampton Fancher and David Peoples ("Unforgiven"), was unusual. But its vision was unique: film noir cubed, science fiction a step beyond "2001." The tale of a moody cop (Harrison Ford) pursuing a gang of four androids (Daryl Hannah, Joanna Cassidy and Brn James, led by Rutger Hauer), whose major crime was simply aspiring to be human, caught its

audience on a primal, dreamlike level. Scott's final version gives us the vision unfiltered. The droning, lack of "explanatory" narration, which pushed the audience too much toward Ford — and perhaps kept us from truly appreciating his performance — is gone. The mood and melancholy have been heightened, and the film builds to its different, properly ironic climax. Seeing it now, in the light of Scott's "Thelma & Louise," "Blade Runner" more obviously becomes a poem of alien-

ation, rebellion and its consequences of exploitation and institutionalized brutality, of a world teetering on apocalypse. The androids are finally sympathetic; their pursuers odious. And all around them both is a world startling in its contrasts: vital yet decaying, nightmarish yet bewitching, sophisticated but brutal. It is a world that we deliberately see from great heights and depths. The leaders seem stunted and cruel, the hunted outlaws have an eerie perfection, strength and beauty.

# Roach leaves enormous legacy

Though his name may be almost forgotten, there's no one who encounters it in the obituaries who has not laughed at some gag of Hal Roach's.

The pioneer comedy guru died Monday at his Southern California home of pneumonia after one of the longest and most fruitful creative lives in the history of the film industry. He was 100 years old and if any could be said to have earned his rest, it was Hal Roach.

Roach, after all, was the man who decided to team a lanky, diffident Britisher with a pudgy light-footed Virginian and created one of the enduring comedy teams of history: Stan Laurel and Oliver Hardy.

And it was also Roach who, depressed by the over-dressed rich kids of his friends who kept showing up at auditions, looked out the window one day and had the first and still most enduring visions of a multi-cultural nation, seeing in the ragamuffin street kids an image of the squabbling family of American: a band of fat kids and skinny kids and dumb kids and smart kids and white kids and black kids, who somehow set aside their individual differences and became more together than they could have been apart. He called it "Our Gang," and it was indeed our gang — everybody's gang.

Roach has that most mysterious of Hollywood talents, the most difficult to pin down and dissect. He directed but he wasn't really a director. He wrote screenplays but he wasn't really a screenwriter. He acted but he wasn't an actor, not really. He thought up gags but he wasn't a gag man. He was fundamentally a producer, which is the key job in the industry and is almost the industry itself. He produced.

It means he recognized talent, not only in and of itself but was able to project it, and imagine how it might fit with other talent and from the sparks could be created something exquisite. He was the print mover, and his Hal Roach Studios was a font of creativity for 30 years, quite a stay at the top in any profession but most particularly the brutally competitive profession of the movies.

Though he began as a stunt man and bit part player, at the very start he had an eye for talent and he 1915

had teamed with another bit player. The two tried several films, failed, drifted apart, then came together in 1916 to try their hands at what they called "Phun-Phlins." And thus, Roach's first star, Harold Lloyd, gradually finding his screen persona and becoming one of the great silent comedians.

And thus was launched the Roach Studio and the Roach approach. Unlike his cruder rival, the Mack Sennett who invented the "Keystone Cops," Roach built his short films not on mere gags and pratfalls but around solid comedy construction rooted in character. And he knew talent. During the Twenties, the words "Hal Roach Comedy" became a touchstone of laughter, and his stable included some of America's funniest men, including Will Rogers and Charlie Chase.

Laurel and Hardy were first teamed in 1926, under director Leo McCarey, although ironically enough they had appeared in "Lucky Dog" in 1917, completely fortuitously. As a team, they went through the roof, making over 100 films, including 27 features.

Meanwhile, Roach became something of a mogul. His studio grew and grew and soon ventured into areas other than comedy. At the same time, he managed an extremely smooth conversion to sound in the early Thirties, and was able to keep both the "Our Gang" comedies and the "Laurel and Hardy" movies perking along nicely with the added dimension. In fact his two Oscars came after, not before, sound: in 1932 for the L&H short "The Music Box" and in 1936 for the "Our Gang" short "Bored of Education."

He understood the mechanics of

screen comedy as well as any man alive. He once told an interviewer, "It's portraying things a child does. But it takes a great artist to do it like Stan Laurel crying or scratching his head, or Oliver Hardy playing with his tie. They were adults playing children. The reverse was the 'Our Gang' series with children playing grown-ups."

He also had an exquisite sense of timing. He was always ahead of the curve and segued neatly out of the two-reeler format in the mid-Thirties, when he sensed it was a dying genre, concentrating thereafter on features. It was among the first to understand the charisma of our friends the dinosaurs, setting the thunder herds to bustle after poor Victor Mature in the campy classic (later remade with Raquel Welch) called "One Million, B.C." His most important straight feature was 1938's "Of Mice and Men," a remake of which has just entered the marketplace.

## Capsule reviews

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**CANDYMAN (R)**. The latest Clive Barker horror shocker is the worst. An ambitious would-be allegory involving racism and mythology that merely seems pretentious and preposterous as it drowns in gallons of blood and guts. Virginia Madsen manages to be impressive as a Chicago grad student whose research into urban legends takes her to the dangerous Cabrini-Green project. With Tony Todd, Kasi Lemmons and Vanessa Williams.

**A RIVER RUNS THROUGH IT (PG)**. Despite luminous cinematography and a career-making performance from Brad Pitt, Robert Redford's version of Norman Maclean's celebrated memoir about fly fishing and families suffers from an excess of idealized, worshipful attention. Though finely made and not without its moments of quiet satisfaction, the main emotion "River" arouses is a curiosity about what all the fuss was about in the first place.

**THE LAST OF THE MOHICANS (PG)**. George Strait is mild-mannered to a fault in this mild-mannered country-Western romance about a country singer who wants to ditch the glitz and get back to good 'ol family values. Lesley Ann Warren, as his manager, provides a few sparks.

**UNDER SIEGE (R)**. Hard, fast and brutal, directed by Michael Mann and starring Daniel Day-Lewis and Madeleine Stowe, this retelling of the James-Fenimore-Cooper-tale-of-romance and savagery during the

French and Indian War comes if you like a tomahawk and just about leaves you for dead. Undeniably exciting, filled with spectacular violence and heart-stopping battle scenes, would nevertheless be much improved if as much attention had been paid to the lackluster script to historical accuracy.

**MR. BASEBALL (PG-13)**. A good-natured cultural clash comes from baseball picture, this lively, perceptive Fred Schepisi-directed entertainment stars Tom Selleck, who is delightful as an inscrutable, but essentially decent, catcher on a hitter on the decline who is traded to a Japanese team.

**SNEAKERS (PG-13)**. Though its Mission: Impossible plot is awfully familiar, this good-spirited caper film succeeds on the basis of the playfulness of its script and the casual charm of its star performance. Robert Redford, Sidney Poitier, Don Ameche, River Phoenix and Lisa Kudrow. River Phoenix and Lisa Kudrow play renegade master high-tech deering-do who have to outwit the bad guys and get the golden gizmo. Clever, likeable, a savvy enough not to take itself too seriously.

**UNDER SIEGE (R)**. Andy Davis directs the best of the Steven Seagal films: a "punishing" good-faith high-tech-thriller that takes its simple hook—"Die Hard" on a battle ship, with Seagal as a karate cook—and keeps ramming home the blood and glitz. Tommy Lee Jones and Gary Busey are the ace heartbeats of a pair of shaggy-dog killer-clovers. And, though it's pretty crazy stuff at least, unlike Tom Clancy and techno-clones, these moviemakers know its crazy; they play for both shocks and yocks.

## La Russa wins top manager honors

**NEW YORK** — Tony La Russa, voted American League Manager of the Year last week by the baseball writers, was named as Major League Manager of the Year by the Associated Press on Thursday.

# Kempthorne sees himself as a consensus builder in Congress

BOISE (AP) — It was on Dirk Kempthorne's watch as the nonpartisan mayor of the state's largest city that the 20-year deadlock over Boise's urban-revitalization ended.

Diverse interests finally found common ground, and Idaho's capital became the economic envy of the West.

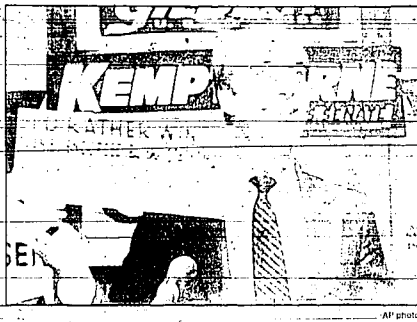
As Idaho's new Republican U.S. senator, he wants to use those consensus-building skills to get the nation moving again.

"One of the track records that I have as mayor of Boise is the ability of bringing diverse groups together and achieving results," Kempthorne, 41, said. "I'm not going to settle for excuses. Once we've defined what the objective is, we bring the folks together, sit them down at a conference table and make sure it does happen."

The last time a Boise mayor was elected to higher office was in 1932, 19 years before Kempthorne was born.

Although a southern California native, Kempthorne first demonstrated his political skills in Idaho in 1974, successfully winning the student body presidency in his senior year at the University of Idaho, where he majored in political science.

Over the next four years, he married and married his wife, Patricia, and stayed in involved in Idaho politics behind the scenes. He worked in

public relations for EMC Corp. and as a spokesman for the state Home Builders Association.

He waded back into elective politics as the manager of GOP Lt. Gov. Phil Batt's 1982 gubernatorial campaign. He saw Batt pulled to the philosophical right in losing to incumbent Democrat John Evans by just 4,200 votes.

So when Kempthorne decided to become a candidate himself, he set

his sights on the Boise mayor's office in 1982, and a campaign that did not include the controversial issues typically making partisan faces. Although a self-proclaimed conservative, he easily won the election over a large field and then proceeded to work easily and constructively with both incoming Boise City Council, including current Democratic state Chairman Michael Wetherell.

"He has believed in the active involvement of government to push private sector development of downtown Boise," Wetherell said. "That has not been the traditional Republican approach."

As mayor he earned a reputation as a moderate and with his boyish good looks quickly became a rising star within the state GOP.

After backing away from an impossible challenge to popular Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus in 1990, speculation on Kempthorne's future focused on the 1994 governor's race that Andrus had already said he would not make.

But that quickly changed 18 months ago when outspoken conservative Steve Symms began having second thoughts about making what would have been a difficult bid for a third Senate term.

By the time Symms made his retirement official in August 1991, Kempthorne already had the GOP's successful campaign machine geared up on his behalf, and the traditional Symms supporters lined up behind him.

It was that link to the retiring senator, whose welcome appeared to be wearing thin with Idaho voters, that proved a key problem for Kempthorne in a campaign keyed to the theme of change.

But Kempthorne managed to walk

the line that kept Symms supporters contented while leaving the impression he will be nobody's clone.

## U.S. Senate win leaves Boise seeking leader

BOISE (AP) — Republican Dirk Kempthorne's election to the U.S. Senate has Boise in the market for a new mayor.

City Councilman Brent Coles and City Council President Sara Baker, acting mayor for another 10 days, both said they are interested in an interim one-year appointment and may seek their own four-year term next year.

The mayor's current salary is \$66,000 a year, Kempthorne, who defeated Democratic Congressman Richard Swafford for the seat of retiring GOP Sen. Steve Symms on Tuesday, has one year left in his second term as mayor.

The Boise City Council will elect Kempthorne's successor after he resigns Jan. 3 to move to Washington, D.C. State law allows, but does not require, the replacement to be selected from among council members. The council members predicted that the choice would be made from the current panel.

Other prominent Boise residents said they are considering the race next November, but none expected to announce candidacy for at least a few weeks.

"I'm talking about it with a number of business and civic leaders — about the issues and direction that we see Boise moving and what we see we ought to do to help or hinder," said Tracy Andrus, daughter of

of limited government, free enterprise and private property rights," Kempthorne said.

"But I'm myself, I would hope that I'll be able to carve out my own style, establish my own brand."

## Court upholds ruling against disability claim

BOISE (AP) — More than one member of the three-person Idaho Industrial Commission should have personally observed a claimant when the commission issued a decision based on observation, the Idaho Supreme Court says.

The court on Thursday upheld an Industrial Commission ruling against Darlene Darnier, who alleged she suffered a disabling back injury in 1989 while working for Southeast Idaho Linen Service and claimed disability benefits.

The decision was upheld on other grounds, but the Supreme Court said it was wrong for the commission to base its decision in part on personal observation.

Only one of the two commissioners who took part in the case had

personal observation, the court said.

"The demeanor of a witness cannot be judged unless the judge is present to observe it," the court said.

Chief Justice Robert Bakes dissented from the ruling on personal observation. Since the commission uses a lot of hearing officers, and accepts recommendations from them, it should be able to accept similar recommendations from its members.

Where one of the commissioners has conducted a hearing, the other commissioners ought to be entitled to consider that commissioner's evaluation of credibility, including his observations of the demeanor of the witness," Bakes said.

In other decisions,

The Supreme Court reversed an Industrial Commission ruling that

salesmen for an Idaho Falls candy vending machine company, Venis Marketing Co. Inc., were employees. The company was ordered to pay \$16,000 in unemployment compensation taxes. The Supreme Court said the Industrial Commission failed to consider clearly stating that Venis' salesmen were independent contractors, not employees. The case was sent back to the commission.

The Supreme Court upheld Idaho State Bar action dismissing a petition for reinstatement from a suspended lawyer, Joseph E. Williams II, because Williams failed to appear at a conference on the petition. But it overturned the Bar's recommendation that Williams must wait one year before again applying for reinstatement. The Supreme Court said Williams could apply any time.

The Court of Appeals reversed a petition for post conviction relief from Wayne S. Olds from his life

sentence in an Ada County case. Olds claimed it is a practice of the Commission for Pardons and Pardon to deny sex offenders parole, which causes them to serve longer sentence than other inmates.

Since Olds won't be eligible for parole until at least the end of 1993, the petition was premature, the court said.

#### Boise may have to pay for cleanup

BOISE — The city of Boise may be called upon to pay for the cleanup of chemical contamination from a site near the airport. The state Division of Environmental Quality is requiring the municipality and Pressure-Treated Timber Inc. to clean up pentachlorophenol, a toxic chemical used to protect wooden poles from the elements. Pressure-Treated leased the land from the city from 1963 to 1980.

Under the permit issued by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the state, the company was required to guarantee it could pay for site closure and cleanup. But earlier this year, Pressure-Treated notified the state it lacks the money to rehabilitate the location.

#### State spent at least \$32,000 in search

BOISE — Hiring a new Boise State University president cost the state at least \$32,775, preliminary estimates show. A university official said Wednesday that the expenses include travel and lodging costs for 11 semifinalists and five finalists who came to Boise for interviews, a reception and dinner for finalists and community leaders, and advertising for the position in national publications.

Rayburn Barton, executive director of the state Board of Education, said the expense was justified. "Given the end result, absolutely," he said. The Board of Education in October named Charles Ruch as Boise State's next president. Ruch is the provost and vice president of a academic affairs at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond.

#### Fishing issue imperils Idaho workers

BOISE — The jobs of up to 300 Idahoans who work on Pacific Ocean fishing trawlers could be at stake when the Pacific Fishery Management Council meets in two weeks, officials say.

Idahoans who work on factory trawlers that fish for whiting stand to lose their jobs because the council may take away fishing rights, industry officials said Wednesday. "It would decimate the factory trawler whiting fishing industry," spokeswoman Katherine Fitzgerald said.

Several Idaho trawler workers and representatives of the factory trawler industry were in Boise lobbying Idaho's two members on the council.

#### Gas firm agrees to help fish habitat

BOISE — Pacific Gas Transmission Co. has agreed to improve fish habitat to mitigate for damage the company caused at four locations on Myoe River, the Department of Water Resources says.

In exchange for the mitigation work, the state will not seek penalties against the company for making unauthorized stream alterations, the agency said Thursday.

The Myoe River is near Bomers Ferry and runs into British Columbia, Canada. It's only a few miles from the Montana border.

In August, Pacific Gas Transmission and its contractor, Bechtel, did stream channel alteration work in the Meadow Creek area. It was where Pacific Gas Transmission was building a natural gas transmission line, which extends from Canada to California.

#### State rules against tax reform group

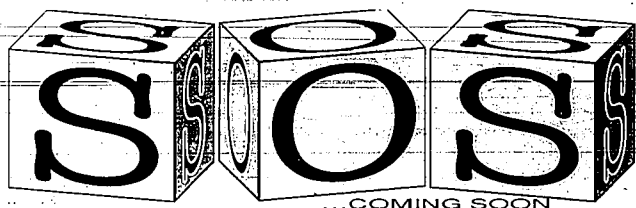
SANDPOINT — A Panhandle tax reform group's crusade to roll back county property taxes is invalid, the Idaho attorney general's office had announced.

Bonner County commissioners Monday received a letter from Deputy Attorney General Francis Walker, which states the county budget cannot be set by referendum.

The county commissioners in September approved a budget which includes a 49 percent rise in tax revenue. The county has been operating under the budget since Oct. 1.

## El Alamein

### Half a century later, battle is '... a lesson for the world'

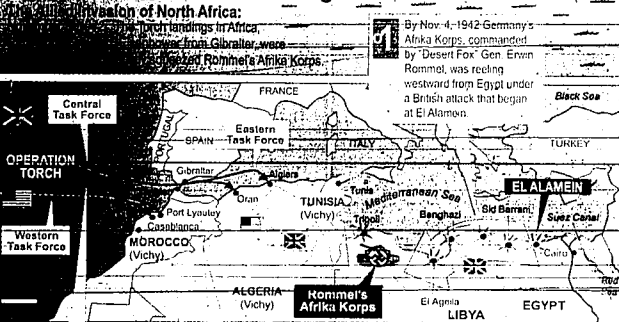
EL-ALAMEIN, Egypt — Duncan McInyre, 19, led the Highlanders' charge, his bagpipes skirling "The Road to the Isles."  
This began the second battle of El-Alamein on Oct. 23, 1942.

beneath a brilliant moon.  
At 9:40 p.m., soldiers from Britain and the Commonwealth loosed the fury of 1,000 guns on German and Italian opponents in the sands of Egypt's western desert. The earth trembled. Tanks rumbled forward, but McInyre was wounded twice, but

kept playing. A third wound killed him.  
Joe Leveson of Middlesex was here that night, riding a tank of the 4th Armored Brigade.  
"You can't imagine the sound," he said half a century later. "That's why so many of us today are 'hard of hearing.'"

"In 10 days of battle, 13,500 Commonwealth soldiers and 59,000 Axis troops were killed, wounded or captured. When the fighting ended, in rain and mud, the tide of World War II had turned.  
On Oct. 25, veterans, widows and diplomats honored Alamein's fighters in a 50th anniversary commemoration. Prime Minister John Major of Britain attended the service outside the fortress-like German memorial.  
"Alamein is a lesson for the world: Know the sacrifices of war, realize the cost," said Arthur Howe of Lyme, Conn., who was a major in the American Field Service ambulance corps, attached to the Commonwealth forces.  
"It's an unbelievable cost, hopes and aspirations buried in cemeteries stretching continuously across the desert," he said.  
Howe was among about 60 Americans at El-Alamein, either with the American Field Service or flying with the Royal Air Force. At least 10 were killed.  
How important was the battle? "Before Alamein, we hadn't won a victory. After Alamein, we never lost," said George Worthington of Cheshire, England, who fought with the 50th Infantry.  
Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, commander of the Desert Storm coalition against Iraq, considers Alamein one of three pivotal battles of World War II, along with Guadalcanal in the Pacific and Stalingrad in Russia.  
He did not retread Alamein before Desert Storm, another great tank battle. "But I remembered its lessons," Schwarzkopf told The Associated Press.  
Alamein made legends of two armies and their leaders.  
The British 8th Army were "the Desert Rats" and Lt. Gen. Bernard Law Montgomery became "Monty," the "soldiers' general."  
On the other side, Field Marshal Erwin Rommel, "The Desert Fox," led the fearsome panzers of the Afrika Korps.  
In Montgomery's headquarters hung a quotation from Shakespeare's Henry V: "Oh, God of Battles! Steel my soldiers' hearts!" On another wall was a photograph of Rommel.  
The Alamein battlefield was 40 miles of featureless desert, bounded on the north by the Mediterranean Sea and on the south by the quicksands of the Qattara Depression.  
At stake was the German dream of conquering the Suez Canal at the end of their victorious sweep across 1,500 miles of North Africa.  
British and Commonwealth soldiers had been dug in at Alamein since July. Five million German mines, "The Devil's Garden," protected Rommel's forces against infiltration.  
Montgomery arrived Aug. 13 and told his men: "If Alamein is lost, Egypt is lost. If we cannot stay at Alamein alive, we will stay there dead."  
Howe, the American, said Montgomery was "mesmerizing," and "always told the men they must forge ahead, but if they don't make it, the ones behind will die."

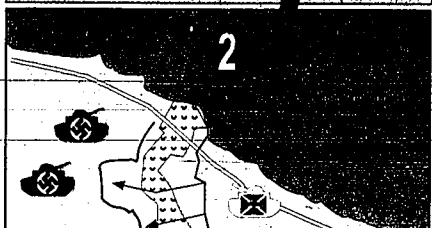
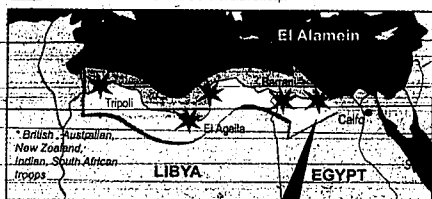

2 Two great naval convoys carrying 84,000 American and 23,000 British soldiers set out for northwest Africa in late October 1942 as the second jaw of a gigantic vise that would squeeze the retreating German and Italian troops.

3 These seaborne forces poured ashore in Tunisia, a puppet government that controlled southern France in collaboration with the Axis. Allied troops, armed with the new Grant M-1 rifle, encountered surprisingly stiff resistance from the French, but eventually overcame them.

4 Within four months powerfully reinforced Allied units were retraining across Tunisia's sprawling plain against German and Italian troops with an ever-tightening pocket. Eventually, an Axis army of 240,000 surrendered.

pass in his tank and throw cartons of cigarettes to the soldiers, Howe said. Montgomery neither drank nor smoked.  
"It was a hard time for the men. The flies were terrible, the heat was awful," Howe said. "There were always skirmishes, somebody always dying."  
"Well, you get used to anything, I guess," said Leveson, the British tank crewman. "We poured tea for each other."  
They lived on crackers and canned beef, fried eggs on their tanks, sweetened flies and killed scorpions, sometimes snakes.  
The first battle of Alamein was an Axis attack Aug. 30 at Alam El-Halfa. Rommel withdrew four days later.  
Worthington, the former British foot soldier, said it was common knowledge among the troops that Winston Churchill, the British prime minister, became impatient after that. "He wanted to go in, but Montgomery wanted everything in

place," Worthington said.  
Equipment moved toward the front, dummy tanks were brought in and leaves were canceled. U.S.-made Stuart, Grant and Sherman tanks (M-3 light tanks, M-3 and M-4 medium tanks) crunched through the desert.  
"I don't know what we'd have done without those American tanks," Worthington said.  
Rommel went to Austria late in September to recuperate from an illness. He returned Oct. 25.  
Commonwealth forces had 530 flyable aircraft, the Axis 340. They had 939 tanks in the forward area to Rommel's 548. His included Italian machines known as "self-propelled coffins."  
The count of fighting men was 210,000, well-supplied with ammunition and fuel against 180,000 Germans and Italians with artillery, but little gasoline for their tanks.  
Fighting was fierce the first two

days. The New Zealand Division, 9th Australian Division and British 1st Armored Division and the Rifle Brigade bore the brunt.  
Both sides suffered heavy casualties around Kidney Ridge, a key position.  
Although Montgomery lost 200 tanks, he launched "Operation Supercharge" on Nov. 14. By the next day, Rommel had only 10 tanks left.  
On Nov. 4, Rommel disengaged Hitler's orders and began a masterful retreat across North Africa. Four days later, American troops of Operation Torch, under Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, landed in northwestern Africa, increasing the pressure on Rommel.  
Tobruk fell on Nov. 13, Benghazi on Nov. 20. On Jan. 23, 1943, Commonwealth troops captured Tripoli, completing their own 1,500-mile victory march.  
Alamein has become known as gentlemen's battleground, perhaps history's last. Rommel called his writings about the North Africa campaign "War Without Mercy."  
Karl Zimmermann was 22 when he served with the Afrika Korps at El-Alamein. He was seriously wounded three weeks later.  
"Two were dead. I lost my left eye," he said at his home in Mannheim, Germany. "The English came out of their tank, bandaged it, and gave us cigarettes, chocolates, and water."  
"That's something about the English I will never forget. I say tanks. If it had been Russians, we would have been given a final shot."  
In a view from the other side, Howe said: "It was a role of thumb you wanted to be captured by a German," not an Italian, because "you knew he'd treat you well."  
"I was at El-Alamein. It has become a bond between many former enemies.

## Naval actions off Casablanca stop French, get U.S. ashore

By the evening of Nov. 6, 1942, the Western Task Force of the Operation Torch was in African waters.  
It had sailed directly from the United States to land and without incident. It was to land an American army of 35,000 men under Maj. Gen. George Patton at three beaches north and south of Casablanca in French Morocco on Nov. 8.  
The landings were widely spaced. Safi was 125 miles south of Casablanca. Medhia and Fedala were respectively 65 and 14 miles north of the city. Hopes that the Vichy French would not resist were dashed when shore batteries opened

up on the landing craft.  
The order "Play ball" was given. The United States would fight its way in.  
At Safi, the battleship New York and heavy cruiser Philadelphia duelled with shore batteries mounting 130 mm guns. The batteries were silenced without damage to the U.S. warships.  
Destroyers Bernardou and Cole charged the harbor to land Rangers who seized the equipment needed to unload the supply ships. Aircraft from escort carrier Santee bombed a

French airfield and disrupted a column of Vichy troops. French aircraft and a submarine were driven off.  
At Medhia a fort manned by the French Foreign Legion mounting 138mm guns held out until Nov. 11. Naval gunfire and bombing could not crack it, and American troops were driven back by fierce counterattacks. The Legion again proved its reputation as one of the world's toughest combat units.  
However, the destroyer Dallas still managed to push its way up the Serouf River against heavy fire and past a stubborn boom blocking the

waterway to land Rangers who seized the Port Lyautay airfield.  
In a battleship duel, outside Casablanca, the new Massachusetts traded salvos with the partially completed Jean Bart. The French battleship lying immobile in the harbor was eventually beaten down, but not until Nov. 11. Meanwhile American aircraft and destroyers fought to suppress powerful shore batteries at Fedala.  
At 8:25 a.m. the French naval flotilla made its challenge. Two destroyer-leaders and five destroyers from Casablanca tried to reach the

American transports.  
The heavy cruisers Augusta and Tuscaloosa and light cruiser Brocklyn moved to intercept, as did Massachusetts and several destroyers.  
Aircraft from the light carrier Ranger flew to the attack. Though a French light cruiser and three more destroyers joined the battle, it was still an uneven contest. Only one French destroyer made it back to harbor. The rest were sunk or run aground.  
A few hits were scored on the American warships during the battle, killing 20 seamen.  
The transports survived the French onslaught without damage. However, within two days of the

French cease-fire on Nov. 11, the Germans mounted their attack.  
Two U-boats, U-173 and U-130, part of a large wolf pack vectored to the invasion area, got close enough to the transports to sink four of them with torpedoes.  
A third U-boat was also hit but survived. The destroyer Hambleton took a torpedo the night of Nov. 11 from U-173. Though heavily damaged, the ship put into the drydock at Casablanca and was repaired in five weeks. The escort carrier Avenger was sunk on Nov. 15.  
The destroyers Woolsey, Swanson and Quick got some revenge the night of Nov. 16 when they sank U-173 with depth charges.

Economists were encouraged by the positive news but cautioned that economic growth, while showing signs of improvement, will not take off anytime soon.

"The economy is beginning to grow more rapidly, but we still won't have the kind of recovery that has followed past recessions," said...

The Labor Department is scheduled today to report the unemployment rate for October and the growth, if any, in the nation's workforce.

In advance, analysts predicted an unchanged jobless rate but a small increase of about 25,000 jobs.

In Thursday's report on productivity, the department said that output per hour of work increased at a 2.4 percent annual rate during the July-September quarter. It was the sixth straight quarter that productivity advanced and the best in six months.

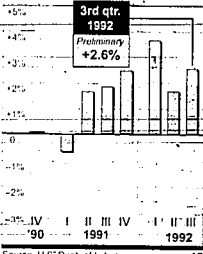

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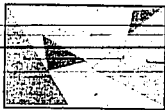

**ABC sits pretty at top of ratings stack**

LOS ANGELES (AP) — ABC won the latest TV ratings race with help from "Roseanne" and the Julie Roberts feature film "Pretty Woman."

With a 12.9 average rating, ABC placed first in overall network standings, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

NBC and CBS tied for second with 12.2 and Fox Broadcasting Co. was last with a 7.3. Each ratings point represents 931,000 homes.

November sweeps, which end on the 25th, is one of four periods each year used by local stations to set advertising rates.

ABC's "Roseanne" was the most-watched show on television last week, followed by the CBS newsmagazine "60 Min-

utes." In third was ABC's "Coach," followed by CBS' wisecracking TV journalist "Murphy Brown."

ABC's "Home Improvement" sitcom and NBC's political satire, special "Saturday Night Live's Presidential Bash," tied for fifth place.

Sunday's ABC movie presentation of "Pretty Woman" ranked seventh.

CBS' longstanding drama favorite "Murder, She Wrote" placed eighth.

The ABC newsmagazine "20/20" ranked ninth, followed by the network's comedy series "Full House."

In the network news contest, ABC was first with an 11.4 average rating, followed by CBS with 10 and NBC with 9.6.

**NBC, Letterman extend contract**

NEW YORK (AP) — David Letterman's contract as host of NBC's "Late Night," variety show has been extended three months, under a deal that lets him "explore opportunities outside the network," both sides announced last week.

The agreement was struck "in a good faith effort to move their negotiating process forward," the comedian and the network said in a joint statement.

Reports of Letterman's unhappiness with NBC and his purported plans to end his 10-year stint as host of the program have been grist for the entertainment media for more

than two years.

"His" contract, which would have expired in early April, now extends until late June.

"At David's request, NBC has agreed to give him the right to explore opportunities outside of the network," the statement said. "David Letterman emphasizes that this announcement does not represent a final decision regarding his future with NBC."

"NBC reiterates its desire to continue its long-standing relationship with David Letterman and remains hopeful that it will extend his contract beyond next June," it added.

**'Major Dad' skips syndication**

NEW YORK (AP) — Off-network rights to the hit comedy "Major Dad" were sold to cable TV's USA Network, the basic cable service said.

It marked the first time a major off-network comedy went straight to cable.

USA Network acquired 116 episodes of "Major Dad," which stars Gerald McRaney as Maj. Mac MacGillis and Shanna Reed as his wife, Polly. The series, produced by MCA Television, is in its fourth season on CBS.

The price of the deal was not disclosed, but published reports

speculated that the series sold for \$600,000 per episode.

Daily reruns of "Major Dad" will begin on USA in the fall of 1993, airing either in early evening or the "late fringe" period at 11 p.m., said Dan Martinson, the cable network's chief spokesman.

"This is the first of a number of comedy series acquisitions USA hopes to make to create a comedy club," Martinson said.

USA Network is available in more than 60 million households over 11,500 cable systems nationwide.

**USA networks hold top spot in ratings**

NEW YORK (AP) — USA Network led the prime-time ratings among basic cable services for October, its sixth first-place finish in the 10 months of 1992, the network said Monday.

USA averaged a 2.3 rating, or about 1.36 million homes in the 56.5-million household "universe" surveyed by Nielsen

Media Research. It was a 5 percent increase over 1991, the network said.

USA said its "World Premier" movie series averaged a 3.8 rating for the year to date, up 9 percent over 1991, and its "Sik Stalkings" drama series in the 11 p.m. Sunday time slot is up 43 percent over 1991, to a 2.0 rating.

**Actor: Sinatra miniseries isn't a whitewash of life**

LOS ANGELES — Actor Philip Casnoff says he doesn't think the CBS miniseries "Sinatra" is a whitewash of the life of singer Frank Sinatra.

"It tells of his marriages falling apart, his affairs with the mob," he says. Casnoff, who plays Sinatra from the ages 19 to 59 in the five-hour miniseries, "It touches on a lot of that stuff."

"I think some of Sinatra's devoted fans will be offended by the negative things in it," he said. "But I think with William Mastrosimone as the writer, it would be impossible to be a whitewash. He's very interested in how the dark side illuminates the success and is the counterpoint."

In "Sinatra," airing in two parts Sunday and Tuesday, Olympia Dukakis plays the singer's mother, Dolly Sinatra, Joe Santos plays his father, Marty Sinatra, and Gina Gershon plays his first wife, Nancy Barbara Sinatra. Nina Siemaszko appears as Mia Farrow, Marcia Gay Harden as Ava Gardner and Rod Steiger as mobster Sam Giancana.

The course of the \$18.5 million project has been troubled, and the fact that it met with Sinatra's approval and was produced by his daughter, Tina Sinatra, aroused suspicions.

Two earlier scripts had been turned down by Sinatra and Warner Bros. before it went to Mastrosimone, a playwright who wrote "Extremities," "The Woolgatherer" and "Tamer of Horses." Mastrosimone has been quoted as saying that he feared it would be a whitewash when he first was approached but that he changed his mind after he began work.

The miniseries deals with Sinatra's mother's arrest for performing an abortion, the collapse of his

marriage to Nancy Sinatra, his stormy marriage to Ava Gardner, his relationship with Giancana and his role in helping Giancana's support for John F. Kennedy's political career.

"I saw Sinatra as an extremely complex character to play," said Casnoff, who starred in the miniseries "North and South" and will be seen in the upcoming feature film "Jersey Girls."

"I had an opportunity to play him as a very young man and ending at 59 when he made his comeback in the 1970s," he said. "He began with enthusiasm and a certain amount of innocence: He had that gift of voice. I think his life changed him. The tremendous success affected him. He spent so much time working away from his wife and kids. There was just too much, too fast. He began drinking and staying up late and his career went sour until 'From Here To Eternity.'"

Casnoff said he had to pay close attention to the fact that Sinatra was a different person by the time he was 50.

"I listened to his music, saw all his movies," he said. "Then I let it go and tried to filter out what would be useful for the characterization — bits and pieces of his mannerisms, the way he lit a cigarette, the way he walked at a certain age. But I had to let it go so I wouldn't be self-conscious."

"I had a photo session with Sinatra, but once it was set in motion he wanted to stay away from it and let it run its course," Cas-

noff said. "I did talk to him, but it wasn't a private talk. Besides, he's 78. It's like talking to a different person."

Sinatra was the subject of the controversial 1986 biography "His Way" by Kitty Kelley. Casnoff said that when he talked to people in Sinatra's hometown of Hoboken, N.J., some people said the Kelley book had a lot of truth in it, while others said it was bunk.

Sinatra had considered an autobiography, but said he felt a miniseries was the only way to tell his story and include his music.

More than 20 songs taken from his master recordings are in the series, including such standards as "Without a Song," "The Luckiest Duck," "That Old Black Magic," "You Go To My Head," "All the Way," "It Was a Very Good Year," "They Can't Take That Away From Me," "You Make Me Feel So Young" and, of course, "My Way."

Casnoff was cast for the role in New York, where he currently lives with his wife, actress Roxanne Hart, and their 41-year-old son.

He received a Theatre Guild Award for his role in the Broadway musical "Shogun" and has appeared in "Chess" and "Grease." He played Lafayette in the miniseries "Glee of Washington" and was Elkanah Bent in both "North and South" series. He also was in such TV movies as "Hands of a Stranger," "The Red Spider," "Ironclads" and "Red Wind."

Casnoff said he is writing a screenplay and that he wrote 400 pages of a novel before his son was born.

"When I finish the second draft of the screenplay, I want to go back and complete the novel," he said. "The act of writing takes my mind off wondering when the next audition will be."

It also helps make "Evening Shade," a show produced by

"We're always glad to welcome another member to the 'cultural elite,'" Harry Thomason told the Hollywood Reporter, referring to Vice President Dan Quayle's recent attacks on the media:

"Maybe now we can get him to change his vote to Bill Clinton."

# Allen emerges as dad for the 1990s

For a while back there it seemed ABC's "Home Improvement" was a one-joke show: Destroy an Appliance Each Week. TV's sitcom — another "This Old House" — was becoming "This Old Shick."

Then the relationship ignited between Tim Taylor (Tim Allen), a be-fuddled TV fix-it host, and his level-headed wife, Jill (Patricia Richardson). One source of inspiration — an annotated Richardson. She asked, "Is this what it is: an explosion every week?" Allen said, "I'd argue with her on the set, and the writers would go, 'Gee, this is what we should be writing.'" The spats revealed their chemistry. The director's response to Allen: "This is perfect. This is a quality we hope you never lose."

So do the millions of viewers who made "Home Improvement" the lone breakout hit of last year's TV season. The sitcom, inspired by Allen's standup routine, ranked 5th last season. Granting like a baboon and declaring his tool space a shrine, Taylor has emerged as a TV dad for '90s, much as Cliff Huxtable was for the '80s and Jim Anderson was for the '50s. Father came to know best. Now he's bewildered.

"He's got an edge to him," Allen said. "He's not Bill Cosby at all. He's not Archie Bunker. He's more like me. I really enjoy women, but I don't like being pushed around by anybody. I beat up myself enough."

Allen's comely, which he describes as "Robert Bly with attitude," was identifiable and timely

to viewers. "The people who are watching this just want things to be nice between men and women," Allen said.

"We like being men, the women like being women. I like women, the women like the men, we're angry about things we're angry about, but our lives as women are, but it isn't the women's fault and it isn't my fault. We're just a little confused, but instead of floundering, we're making a stab at it."

Still, the sexes will never reach understanding, he said, citing "Naked Lunch" author William Burroughs, who described men and women as alien to each other.

"Home Improvement" tries to explore "this love dance called life," said Matt Williams, one of the show's three creators. "I think a lot of people are wrestling with this. Look at all these books on the best-seller lists: 'Iron John,' Gloria Steinem's book. I'm not saying that we're doing that on a grand scale, but we're doing that in small pieces of life."

Williams attributes the show's success mainly to Allen. "He thinks funny," Williams said. "The camera records your thoughts more than your words. You watch Bill Cosby, Bob Newhart. They think funny. Tim's got a funny take on life."

"Home Improvement's" success has caused Allen to alter his standup act. He was moved by a scorching letter from a fan who brought her children to a show. "I took out some of the harsh language," he said.

"I still want to be a little spicy... It's certainly not like Eddie Murphy. Raw. I would bring the kids if you allow them to watch cable."

# Kabler wants riskier 'Rhythm'

NEW YORK — "Those of you who've already tuned in to NBC's Thursday night comedy 'Rhythm & Blues' also have discovered Roger Kabler, a gifted actor and comedian and a brilliant mimic."

Kabler plays the manic, white-die-pockey Bobby Sawd on an all-black Detroit radio station, constantly riffing with dozens of dead-on impressions of stars such as Red Foxx, Richard Dreyfuss, Al Pacino and Christopher Lloyd.

To see him at work is a little like watching "Happy Days" when it featured a young, relatively unknown comedian named Robin Williams.

Great things are going to happen for Kabler, too, but "Rhythm & Blues" isn't yet one of them, and that has the actor a little worried.

"The show has a great heart, a great cast, tremendous potential," he said. "It's just like any new show. It's a question of getting into the groove, hitting those notes which we're just sort of reaching for now."

The cast includes Ron Glass ex-Barney Miller as an ad salesman and ex-member of the "Five" Tops, Anna Maria Horsford ("Amey") as the station owner, and Troy Cursey Jr. as The Love Man, a DJ who refers to himself only in the third person.

Yet "Rhythm & Blues" has yet to stretch any of those characters and is settling into the predictable plots and patter of sitcom.

In a recent episode, the station employees got together to pull Glass' character out of a middle crisis. Kabler didn't like the way it played.

My wife's criticism is that I was too sweet," he said. "She's right. Bobby should be a little edgier, a little more on the edge of his seat, and there should be more interesting things going on, instead of this sentimental good-hearted stuff that we're getting."

"I'm taking that fight to the producers," he said. "I'll be telling them, 'If you put an impression in the

script and I'm not happy to do it because it's not funny or it's not in the right place, I'm not me! I've been a comedian for five years. You hired me because of this, so let me take care of the shick!"

Kabler stoutly defends the creative skills of his show's writers and producers, but insists they're reluctant to take the kinds of chances that could make the show a breakout hit.

Could it be that NBC wants to ape Fox Broadcasting Co.'s appeal to younger viewers without taking the concomitant risk of offending somebody? Fox has captured younger viewers because it dares to be risky and unpredictable.

A forthcoming "Rhythm & Blues" is a case in point, Kabler said. Bobby is the only white guest invited to a co-worker's party, and his host tells him to "stand in the corner and don't talk to anybody."

The script called for David to lapse into Rodney Dangerfield, doing the "I don't get no respect" schtick. Instead, Kabler transformed himself into Redd Foxx, limping into the crowd and rasping, "Hey! Where the white woman at?"

It brought down the house. "It took the audience a minute to settle down after that," he said. "They were going crazy in the booth because they thought it was hysterical." Yet the producers decided not to use it.

"I will see in the next few episodes that I'm taking the chances," he said. "There has to be a reason for these impressions, and part of it is to vent hostility, frustration — and if that stuff doesn't hit, it flatens out."

"I'm going to go in and fight the good fight. I'm going to say, 'Do you want hysterical moments or not?' Because if you want them, you're going to have to take some chances."

"As much as I believe in the show, if we don't fix what's wrong with it, it would be a mistake," Kabler said. "All the elements are there. All we've got to do are a few simple things. I'm going to run up that campaign — at the risk of losing my job."

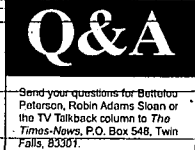
A: It's not the first time it's happened. In 1987, CBS aired "At Mother's Request," a two-part series starring Stephanie Powers based on Jonathan Coleman's book about New Yorker Frances Schroeder, who manipulated her son into murdering her millionaire father. Later in 1987, Lee Remick played Schroeder in NBC's "Nutmacker: Money, Madness, Murder" a six-hour mini, based on Shana Alexander's book on the same true story. Competition is the name of the game and each network wanted to snare viewers with the lurid dramas.

**Q: Whatever happened to Betty Thomas, the former "Hill Street Blues" cop?**

A: Thomas has found a highly successful career behind the camera as a television director. Her recent work can be seen on HBO's new "Dream On" series.

**Q: Has Jerry Van Dyke always lived in his brother Dick's shadow?**

A: Certainly Jerry has had a family reputation to live up to, but currently he is the star of a TV series, not his older brother. While the popular '60s sitcom "The Dick Van Dyke Show" is playing reruns on Nickelodeon, Jerry is a star of ABC's hit series "Coach." His portrayal of the perpetually befuddled Luther Van Dam has earned him three Emmy nominations. At 60, he has been busy in television since guest-starring on his brother's show in 1962. He

also performs his standup act in Atlantic City and Las Vegas and retreats to his working ranch in Arkansas.

**Q: Tell me about Margaret Colin, of the new ABC sitcom "Sibs." Is she married; children; has she been in any other TV shows?**

A: Colin has done two short-lived prime-time series, "Foley Square" and "L.A. Works," TV movies, "The Return of Sherlock Holmes" and "Warm Hearts, Cold Feet," but she's best known for her work in two soaps, "The Edge of Night" and "As the World Turns." She met her husband, soap actor Justin Deas, on "World." They have no children.

**Q: Tell me, if the people who appear on "Jeopardy" get to study the questions before hand? I say they do, my neighbor says they don't.**

A: Your neighbor is right. Since the quiz show cheating scandals of the late 1950s, television game shows have been closely supervised to make sure they're honest; no help, no hints and no studying before hand. "Jeopardy" contestants usually are trivia experts with a wide range of knowledge, even the teen-age contestants. When the show picks contestants, they're given a trial run, on different questions, to test their knowledge and ability to play the game.

**Q: Give me a personal profile of actress Erin Moran, of "Happy Days" and "Joanie Love Chachi." Why wasn't she on the "Happy Days" reunion show?**

A: Moran, now 31, was born in Burbank, Calif., started in commercials at 6 and had her first TV series role in "Daktari," at 7. She also did "The Don Rickles Show" and TV guest roles before "Happy Days" in 1974. Since 1984 she hasn't had any TV credits. She's married to singer Rocky Ferguson. In a People magazine article about the "Happy Days" cast, now Moran was quoted as saying she was invited to do the show but turned it down. She told People that "every member of the cast is evil."

**Q: I've looked everywhere for the address of "Live with Regis and Kathie Lee." Do you know?**

A: ABC, 36A W. 66th St., New York, NY 10023.

**Q: Please tell me about Sean Patrick Flannery of the "Young Indiana Jones Chronicles." Where can I write to him? Is it true that the show may go off the air for good?**

A: Flannery, who plays Jones from 1909-16 to 22, is 27, another Houstonian who started acting at

the University of Saint Thomas in Houston, he says, to meet a beautiful woman he saw at the theater. He left school in 1988 to go to L.A., where he waited tables and did bit movie parts and TV commercials until he was picked from 300 who tried out for the "Indy Jones" role. He's single. See above for his address at Paramount.

**Q: Is the music from Ken Burns' "Civil War" series available on cassette?**

A: The soundtrack, authentic music of the time performed by many different artists, is available on both cassette and compact disc. If you can't find it at your local record store, write: Signals, the catalog for friends of public television, Box 64428, St. Paul, MN 55164.

**Q: I watched "Herman's Head" and fell in love with Herman. Tell me about him and where I can write.**

A: William Ragsdale is from El Dorado, Ariz., started acting there and in college and drama school in Berkeley, Calif. His big break came in 1985 when he landed a role in the Broadway play "Blilot Blues." He's been in the features "Mannequin 2," "Fright Night" "Wally and the Valentines" and the TV movie "Frankenstein: The College Years." Write: Fox Broadcasting Co., Box 900, Beverly Hills, CA 90213.

**Q: How can I write Will Smith of "Fresh Prince of Bel Air"?**

A: NBC-TV, 3000 W. Alameda Ave., Burbank, CA 91523.

**Q: Tell me how to write to "Top Cops."**

A: CBS-TV, 7800 Beverly Blvd., Los Angeles, CA 90036.

**Q: Who is the actress who plays Alex in "Sisters"? Is she married and how can I write her?**

A: That's Swoskie Kurtz, and the first thing my ask about is her name. It is Swoskie. She's the daughter of World War II pilot Col. Frank Kurtz whose B-17 bomber, nicknamed "The Swoskie" (after Swan, half goose), was famous. When she was born in 1944, newspapers called her "Little Swoskie" and her parents decided to name her that. She's collected two Tonys and an Emmy in a career that includes TV, movies and theater. **Q: Where can I write Darryl Bell of "A Different World"?**

A: CBS/MTM Studios, 4024 Radford Ave., Studio City, CA 91604.

**Q: What is the background of Jeffrey Meek of "Raven"?**

A: Meek, who was born in Fairfield, Calif., graduated from the University of California, Irvine with a bachelor's degree in drama. After college he spent several seasons on the stage (earning two Dramalogue Awards) before breaking into television and film. Some viewers may remember

Meek in the starring role of CBS' late-night series "The Exiles." Previously, he had parts in the films "Winter People," "Johnny Handsome" and "Heart Condition," in addition to appearing on episodes of "Miami Vice" and "Cyberforce." "Raven," a summer replacement series, was added to CBS' prime-time lineup and premiered Sept. 26.

**Q: Is "Jake and the Fatman" going into syndication soon?**

A: The distributors are now offering the popular CBS series, starring William Conrad and Joe Penny, to stations around the country. If enough stations sign up, or a major cable network buys the series, reruns could begin as early as January. Otherwise, the show is scheduled to start general syndication next fall.

**Q: Did "The Wonder Years" use someone other than Daniel Stern as the narrator last season? It seems the voice was different in at least six episodes. Has it been changed for this season?**

A: Stern has been the voice of this popular ABC series in every episode of its run. If you thought you heard someone else, it may have been Stern with a bad cold, which he had on at least one occasion last season. The series, along with Stern, is in its sixth season on Wednesday nights.

**Q: Angela Lansbury's character on "Murder, She Wrote" is named JB Fletcher. Is it far Jessica, of course, what is the B for?**

A: CBS' Sunday night sleuth's middle name is Beatrice.

**Q: I've noticed that two actresses played Lois Lane in the old "Adventures of Superman" series on Nickelodeon — Phyllis Coates and then Noel Neil. Why did Coates leave the series?**

A: Coates played Lois Lane in the first 26 episodes of "The Adventures of Superman," which were made in 1951, but did not until the next year. The syndicated series resumed production in 1953. By then, Coates had gone on to other projects, including a supporting role in a short-lived NBC comedy series called "The Duke" (starring Paul Gilbert) and the 1953 film "Marshall of Cedar Rock." Neil, who had played Lane in the movie serial version of "Superman," assumed the role for the remainder of the TV series' run (1953-1957).

**Q: When did "The Young and the Restless" begin?**

A: CBS premiered the daytime

series in March, 1973, replacing "Where the Heart Is," a soap opera that lasted four years on the network.

**Q: Why is Madge Blake only seen in the first season of the old "Batman" series?**

A: Actually, Blake, who died in 1969, was a member of the cast (as the occasionally seen Aunt Harriet Cooper) for the full two-and-a-half seasons of "Batman" (ABC, 1966-1969). She had previously played the role of Flora MacFidelity in "The Real McCoys" (ABC, CBS, 1957-63), Mrs. Bames in "The Joey Bishop Show," (NBC, 1961-62), and as Larry Mondello's mother from on "Leave It to Beaver," along with numerous guest appearances on prime-time series throughout the 1950s and '60s. Her film credits include "Singin' in the Rain," "The Long Song Trail" and the film version of "Batman."

**Q: Where can I watch reruns of "The Waltons"?**

A: Reruns of the popular CBS series (1972-1981) are shown weekdays on cable's Family Channel.

**Q: I hear Billy Crystal set out to be a teacher before he got hooked on show business. Did he teach and, if so, where? — P.M.**

A: According to Crystal, he was hooked on entertaining from an early age. Home movies show him "performing" at family functions when he was as young as 3. His father was in the music business and his childhood was spent hanging around some of the greats, including Billie Holiday. Show business was always a goal but substitute teaching helped pay the bills in the early days. Crystal actually found himself "subbing" at his own junior high school on Long Island, working alongside many of his former teachers, an experience he describes as "bizarre."

**Q: Isn't it true that Johnny Carson's talk of return TV appearances is groundless given that he's unhappy about being forced off the air? — H.J.**

A: Carson's retirement from the "Tonight Show" was entirely voluntary. Johnny went with no bitterness whatsoever. That doesn't mean he's in love with TV these days. "I don't particularly like what I see on it today," he says. Nonetheless, Carson will turn up on a future episode of "The Simpsons" — that is, a one-time guest shot, voice only.
