# Clinton offers details of plans

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — President-elect Clinton on Thursday detailed a crowded blueprint for action including quick reversal of Bush administration abortion policy and creation of more than a half-million jobs in his first year.

Clinton, in his first formal news conference since the election, also promised his transition and administration would have the strictest ethical guidelines in history.

Calling on congressional Republicans as well as Democrats to work with him on his busy agenda, he said, "The clear mandate of this election from the American people was the end of politics as usual and the end of gridlock in Washington and the end of finger pointing and blame."

Vice President-elect Al Gore stood nearby as Clinton fielded questions at the Old Arkansas Statehouse.

The Arkansas governor called the news conference to announce 48 additions to his transition team, a mix of political and policy advisers charged with helping Clinton build the first Democratic administration in a dozen years.

"They reflect my commitment to assembling the most qualified and diverse group of people available, including men and women with broad experience, some of whom served in the campaign and others who are just joining us now as we move

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — At his news conference, President-elect Clinton promised:

• To lift the Bush administration ban on abortion counseling at federally funded clinics.

• To revise Bush's Haiti policy and allow refugees now summarily returned to their country to petition for political refugee status.

• To impose the strictest ethics guidelines of any administration in history.

• To provide an investment tax credit

for new factories and equipment, which he predicted would create some 500,000 jobs in his first year.

• To offer a middle-class tax cut and to accelerate spending on roads and bridges to create more jobs.

• To chart a security and foreign policy that "keeps the defense of this country the strongest in the world" despite reductions.

• To lift the ban on homosexuals in the military — but only after consulting "with a lot of people about what our options are, including people who may disagree with me about the ultimate merits."

toward governing," Clinton said of his picks.

The president-elect then answered questions on an array of topics, from his general economic and foreign policy priorities to his specific plans to provide jobs and deal with nuclear proliferation, as well as his feelings on the heavy security and intense media attention that came with his election.

"I'm having a wonderful time," Clinton said. "It is an enormous responsibility, but I asked for it, and it's an indulgence to feel

overwhelmed by it. ... I'm just going to give you my best effort every day."

He spoke quietly and seriously throughout most of the 40-minute, nationally televised question-and-answer session, but took a few occasions to joke and one to angrily denounce the Bush administration "search" of his State Department passport files during the campaign.

If he hears of people doing anything like that, he said, "I will fire them the next day."

## Bennett blames breakdown in values for America's woes

TWIN FALLS — A breakdown in traditional values is at the root of most of America's most pressing social problems, former Education Secretary William Bennett said Thursday.

Speaking to several hundred participants in the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce's 10th Annual Success Breakfast, Bennett said parents need to reassume primary responsibility for teaching children the difference between right and wrong.

"Although not every teacher is a parent, every parent is a teacher — a first teacher and his all but indispensable teacher," he told the audience at the College of Southern Idaho auditorium.

"If a child doesn't learn to feel guilty about doing something shameful and to take pride in doing something good, he's missed out on one of the most important lessons in life," he said.

Bennett served as Education Secretary from 1985 to 1988, and as the nation's coordinator of drug control policy, or "drug czar," in 1989 and 1990.

Following President Bush's defeat in

last week's election, Bennett has frequently been mentioned as either the next chairman of the Republican National Committee, or a presidential candidate himself in 1996.

On Thursday, he used a mixture of wry humor, personal anecdotes and sobering statistics to back up his contention that moral values "imported by strong families are necessary to win the war on drugs," reduce crime, and improve education.

It's a lesson Bennett learned firsthand. He and his brothers grew up in a single-

## Chamber honors school 'drug czar'

TWIN FALLS — Six years ago Marcia Lanting took a part-time teaching position with the Twin Falls School District, which had promised to interview her for a part-time drug education position.

She got the drug-education position, too, and it was a decision that brought the district national honors.

The federal Department of Education has named the Twin Falls School District one of the few "drug-

free" schools in the United States.

On Thursday, the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce named her its 1992 "Person of the Year." Lanting's efforts in the Magic Valley have contributed greatly to the overall quality of life in this area," the chamber said.

Lanting, who grew up in Kimberly and taught in Hansen before she went to work for the Twin Falls schools, gives the community credit. One of the first decisions she made was to put together a school-and-community advisory committee.

## Lawyers argue over penalties

BOISE — After an acrimonious battle between federal prosecutors and an attorney defending Randy Weaver, a judge has postponed a decision on whether to penalize another lawyer for statements he's made in the case.

U.S. Magistrate Mikel Williams on Thursday held a 90-minute hearing on the government's bid for sanctions against defense attorney Gerry Spence, Jackson, Wyo.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Ron Howen didn't specify the penalty he wanted Williams to impose, but said the judge should consider removing Spence from the case if he continues to violate local rules of court procedure.

Weaver, 44, and Kevin Harris, 25, face a possible death penalty if convicted of involvement in the slaying of U.S. Marshal William Degan, Quincy, Mass., during a shootout Aug. 21 near Weaver's cabin near Naples in northern Idaho.

Weaver was in court Thursday as Howen and defense attorney Charles Peterson traded complaints about each other's behavior in the case. Spence did not attend and Harris also was absent but his two court-appointed attorneys were on hand.

Howen asked for sanctions against Spence for giving news media interviews in September during a preliminary examination for Weaver.

The examination was stopped after several days when a grand jury returned a

## AIDS risk high for Americans

WASHINGTON — Americans are not practicing "safe sex," leaving millions at risk of infection by the AIDS virus, according to authors of the largest national sexual survey in more than 40 years.

The survey results, to be published Friday in the journal Science, indicate that heterosexual Americans are not taking seriously the risk of AIDS and that the vast majority with multiple partners are engaging in sexual intercourse without condoms.

AIDS has been most prevalent in the United States among homosexuals and intravenous drug users. But Joseph Catania, a University of California, San Francisco researcher and an author of the study, said that with so many people not using condoms or other protection, "it is just a matter of time before it will spread widely into the heterosexual community."

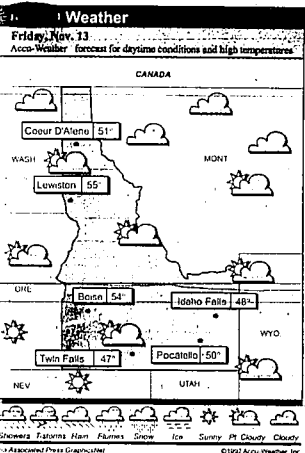
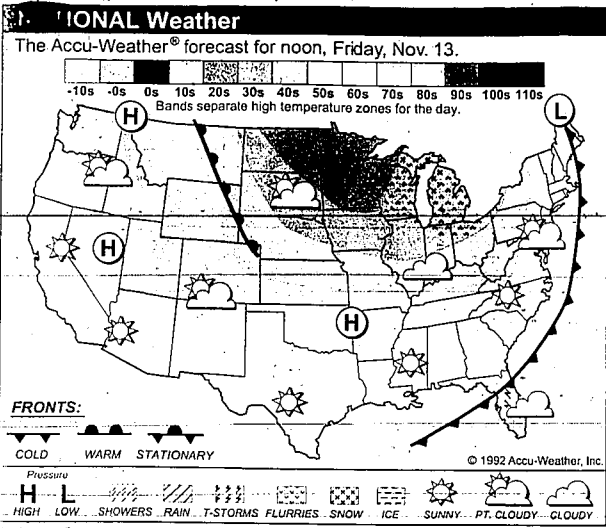
"This is the first of a kind," Catania said, because it concentrated on behavior related to the risk of sexually transmitted diseases, such as AIDS. He said it was the first large scale survey on human sexuality in the U.S. since the Kinsey report in 1948.

## Weather summary

The national weather service reported light rain and snow was scattered across Idaho Thursday as a band of moisture moved through the state.

It continued to move eastward and fog will be common across the state this morning.

**Indiana streams overflow as rain covers much of East**

Rain fell across much of the nation on Thursday, causing some flooding in Indiana. Snow fell across the Great Lakes region.

A tornado watch was in effect for parts of Alabama and Georgia for much of the day, and the National Weather Service reported a twister touched down in Brentley, Ala. There were no reports of damage or injuries. In Mobile, Ala., 2.5 inches of rain fell in 90 minutes.

At midday, rain and thunderstorms extended from northwest Florida to southeast Louisiana, from east-central Missouri to west-central Illinois, across the Atlantic coast states, the Ohio Valley, the lower Great Lakes, the Appalachians and the Tennessee Valley.

The eastern Gulf of Mexico states, the Mississippi Valley and the Rocky Mountains also received rain.

In west-central Indiana, flooding prompted school

officials in Parke County to close three schools and about 100 residents in nearby Clinton were evacuated. A small area of Terre Haute was evacuated because of a fuel leak into the sewer system.

Elsewhere, snow fell in western Upper Michigan, western Wisconsin, northern Minnesota and the northern Rockies.

Heavier rainfall during the 6 hours ending at 1 p.m. EST included nearly 3.6 inches in Biloxi, Miss.; 3 inches in Mobile, Ala.; 1.8 inches in New Orleans; and 1.37 inches in Key West, Fla.

There were no reports of measurable snowfall during the same 6 hours.

The nation's morning low was 3 degrees below zero in Alamosa, Colo., a record for the date in that town.

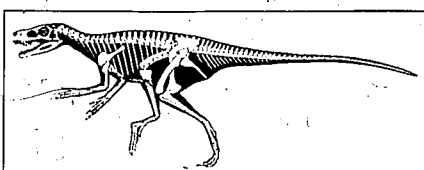

# Early dinosaur believed ancestor of Tyrannosaurus rex, experts say

WASHINGTON (AP) — Researchers have assembled an almost-complete skeleton of a 400-pound reptile that ran on its hind legs, ripped prey apart with jaws and claws, and probably was the ancestor of Tyrannosaurus rex, the largest meat-eater to walk the Earth.

University of Chicago paleontologist Paul Sereno said skeleton parts pieced together from a fossil in Argentina show that a 230-million-year-old carnivore called Herrerasaurus is the earliest known meat-eater in the dinosaur family.

"This represents the most primitive early phase of the carnivorous line of dinosaurs," Sereno said.

In a study to be published today in the journal Science, Sereno said that characteristics of the Herrerasaurus show that the evolution of dinosaurs into specialized hunters and plant-eaters began very early in the 180-million-year dinosaur reign.

"We see in these deposits that dinosaurs had already split into a couple of groups," he said. "Dinosaurs had already done a little branching already, even though they did not then dominate numerically. This is a bit unexpected."

The Herrerasaurus was first identified 30 years ago, said Sereno, but the proposed appearance of the animal was based on leg and pelvis bones. In 1988, he said, University

of Chicago researchers found almost complete skeletons of the animal in a valley in the Argentine foothills of the Andes Mountains.

Sereno said the deposit was rich with fossilized remains and the researchers were able to put together the most complete skeleton of Herrerasaurus ever found.

"We came up with five skeletons and though none of them are complete down to the last bone, it becomes very apparent after overlapping these things what kind of animal you have," he said. "It tells us what the dinosaurs looked like in this early phase."

Distinctive features found in the completed skeleton showed that the animal had already developed adaptations that later would be found in the Tyrannosaurus rex, the 40-foot hunter that ruled the final era of the dinosaur age.

Herrerasaurus lived about 230 million years ago, near the very beginning of the dinosaur age, and Tyrannosaurus rex first appeared about 70 million years ago. Dinosaurs became extinct about 65 million years ago.

Sereno said adult Herrerasaurus dinosaurs were 10 to 20 feet long and weighed 300 to 450 pounds. The animal had long, powerful hind legs and short forearms that ended in a hand with three dominant fingers.

"Its hand is very large with recurved claws," said the Chicago researcher. "It is very well adapted for grasping and for raking flesh off of animals."

## Clinton mixes transition team

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — President-elect Clinton on Thursday made 48 additions to his transition team, naming a mix of political and policy advisers to help him redesign the government and fill the first Democratic administration in 12 years.

Most of the picks were from the ranks of Clinton's campaign inner circle, including transition communications director George Stephanopoulos, political adviser David Wilhelm, chief financial officer Eli Segal and Washington office director Mark Gearan.

But Clinton also dipped into Vice President-elect Al Gore's circle of advisers and reached outside political circles to fill other key roles.

For example, the critical transition personnel went to Jan Hietay, tapped by Clinton because of her work as a consultant for the Chicago-based MacArthur Foundation, which offers no-strings-attached "genius" grants in an array of fields.

10-count indictment against Weaver and Harris. It accuses Harris of shooting Degan during a shootout and Weaver with aiding and abetting the crime. Both also face federal conspiracy, firearms and other charges.

Trial for both men is scheduled in February.

Howen accused Spence of "holding court" with the news media outside court in an attempt to influence "public" opinion. But Peterson said neither he nor Spence has done anything that violates local rules.

The prosecutors introduced a

bundle of newspaper articles with statements supposedly made outside court by Peterson or Spence. Peterson got Marshal John Stafford to acknowledge that he didn't attend the court proceedings and hasn't gone through court records, so he doesn't know what news reports were based on court statements or legal arguments or simply stemmed from interviews.

Howen argued that court rules forbid attorneys from making out of court statements about evidence and the proceedings. At one point, he said, "I know what I can prove and I will prove each and every statement in the indictment."

parent household in inner-city Brooklyn, and he credits his mother and a rigid Catholic school education with teaching him things like the value of hard work, personal responsibility and tolerance for others.

Now, he tries to impart those same values to his two sons, although he admitted that with his busy schedule it can be hard.

"Coming home after giving a speech, my wife, Elaine, will often meet me at the door and say, 'Talking about family values again, honey?'" Bennett said.

He added that "one of the only advantages of being 'drug czar' was that I could call my wife 'ezarling' and my two boys the 'ezarlings.'"

Bennett laid some of the blame for the decline in traditional values on popular culture and what he called a "utopian" belief in modernity and technological progress. But he put most of the blame on three things that, paradoxically, also are the source of much of America's strength: freedom, democracy, and prosperity.

Americans value freedom and the individual pursuit of happiness, he said, but freedom without shared values leads to chaos. Democratic

governments are slow to react to problems and constrained in their choice of solutions by respect for human rights. And when people are prosperous, he added, they can afford to acquire bad habits like drug addiction.

"One of the reasons we have such a tremendous drug problem in this country is that we're so rich," Bennett said at a brief news conference after his lecture. "People can afford to put bread on the table, keep gas in the car and support a drug habit."

At the news conference, Bennett allowed his political side to emerge for a bit. He predicted that President-elect Clinton will hew a conservative-centrist line on tax and budget issues, at least for his first year in office, and pursue more liberal policies in social issues.

But, he added, "the left will be running Washington, because there are more of them than there are of him. The Congress tends to the left, particularly with the people who've been elected to the Senate."

Bennett was deliberately vague on what his role might be in the GOP. He said he wanted to "be at the table" discussing the party's future course, but "necessarily at the head of it."

"We understood we had to build resiliency into kids," Lanting said. "It was not just 'say no.' We had to build the skills."

Such a program was a welcome sight to Paul Du Fresne when he came to Twin Falls police and fire chief in 1989.

"When I first met her, it was like a breath of fresh air," Du Fresne said. "Her approach is just what's needed."

That approach includes several activities, including an annual "Red Ribbon Week" full of anti-drug activities. It also includes lots of volunteers in the school and the community.

"They're courageous," Lanting said. "It does take confidence and a willingness to step out there and know you can change what's happening to families and children. The community models a healthy lifestyle to kids," she said.

# Military fears disruptive effect of allowing gays in services

On the intellectual level, people in the military say they understand the argument that homosexuals have the right to serve their country.

On the gut level, many have doubts and anxieties.

From the rank-and-file to Pentagon brass, opponents of homosexuality aren't compatible with military life. An open policy would be divisive, a morale-killer, a likely source of conflict and turmoil, they contend.

Homosexuals have always been in the military. But it's been a quiet reality, an orientation that could be bridged or overlooked — unlike a person's color or sex. If trouble cropped up, a soldier or sailor could be moved on or out.

Not Keith Meinhold. When the military dismissed him after a national television interview in which he disclosed he was gay, the 30-year-old petty officer fought back. So far he has won.

After winning a judge's order, Meinhold returned to his job Thursday as a sonar instructor at Moffett Naval Air Station near San Francisco pending a decision on the

## Gay sailor: 'Proud and honored to wear the uniform'

MOFFETT NAVAL AIR STATION, Calif. (AP) — Keith Meinhold, kicked out of the Navy after revealing he was gay, reclaimed his job as a sonar instructor Thursday under court order.

"This is the day I've looked forward to," Meinhold said as he walked onto the military base with his uniform in a paper bag.

"I'll be proud and honored to wear the uniform of my country again."

The 30-year-old petty officer's reinstatement wasn't the first time the military has been forced to take back an openly gay soldier. However, after a judge renewed a reinstatement order this

week for Meinhold, President-elect Clinton announced plans to end the military's half-century ban on homosexuals.

"Part of the reason this case is so important is because of the attention it has generated, and because of the political climate in which it has arisen," said Benjamin Schatz, a lawyer for the American Association of Physicians for Human Rights, a San Francisco-based gay-rights group.

Meinhold was honorably discharged in August after going on national television and saying he was gay. He said Thursday many of his former superiors and co-workers at Moffett

knew for several years he was homosexual.

Dozens of reporters surrounded Meinhold as he entered Moffett, 40 miles south of San Francisco. "I have had wonderful support from people from all walks of life — this has been very empowering," said Moffett, from Palo Alto.

Moffett spokesman John Shackleton said Meinhold's duties with Patrol Squadron 31 will be the same as before he was discharged.

The military's rationale for excluding homosexuals is the same one used earlier by the military to exclude blacks, Schatz said.

male-male, gay female-female. It's going to be more divisive than ever."

She worries, too, for her rights. "You're in such close quarters and would literally have to take showers with these women," said Benton, who like Meinhold is based at Moffett Field in California. "You get dressed, sleep, do everything together. Will I be protected? That's what I wonder."

Gay-rights activists suggest the women assaulted by drunken Naval officers at the Tailhook convention might wonder the "same." Sexual harassment, they say, is no more prevalent among homosexuals than among heterosexuals.

"Well," Benton said, "I don't think people believe that. But anyway, if they're going to let these people be in the service, then I think that women should at least be allowed on the front lines."

It comes down to lines, expectations and judgments that however erroneous — have always held people back. Especially people who are "different," which in the military has included women, minorities and homosexuals.

Those who support Meinhold and Clinton's plans embrace the new openness. Evasion and secrecy, they say, are not good for the military, or for the country.

## Court affirms gay rights

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — An anti-gay rights ballot measure passed by Oregon voters four years ago is unconstitutional, the Oregon Court of Appeals ruled Thursday.

The initiative, known as Measure 8, repealed an executive order by former Gov. Neil Goldschmidt prohibiting state agencies from discriminating based on sexual orientation.

Measure 8 was sponsored by the Oregon Citizens Alliance, a group that this year sponsored a measure to amend the state constitution to declare homosexuality abnormal and perverse. Voters rejected that measure this month.

A three-judge panel said Thursday

the 1988 initiative violated rights of free expression. "A statute that establishes a content-based restriction on the free expression rights of public employees cannot be sustained," the court said in an opinion by Judge John Butler.

The ruling frees state agencies to adopt rules against employment discrimination based on sexual orientation. The court upheld the state Board of Higher Education's approval of such rules.

The lawsuit challenging the measure was brought on behalf of Harriet Merrick of Eugene, a lesbian and homosexual rights advocate who works in the higher education financial aid office.

He just shouldn't be in the military. It was a hidden issue before and that was all right," Miller said.

About 14,000 homosexuals have been kicked out of the services during the past 10 years. The courts have always backed the Pentagon's contention that the presence of homosexuals impedes "discipline, good order and morale."

"People are always afraid of something new. It takes time to get over that fear," said Lt. Col. Willie Henry, director of the family life program at Fort McClellan, Ala.

"Some people think different is bad. But I don't see any reason gays wouldn't perform their duties like any other soldier."

Henry, who is black, has known prejudice. Likewise, Petty Officer Shannon Benton. She has worked long and hard to establish her equality and capability.

Still, she says, opening the military to gays is a bad idea. "They separate us in boot camp as it is; male-female. Now are they going to separate gay

## U.S. awash in violence, study states

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States leads industrialized nations in murders, sexual assaults and other attacks, and the fear of violence has permeated American life, the authors of a new study say.

The specter of violence has degraded American life, left people afraid to walk their neighborhoods at night, put children in danger in school and caused many to barricade themselves behind locked doors, according to a report released Thursday by the National Research Council.

"The nation's anxiety on the subject of violence is not unfounded. In 1990, more than 23,000 people were homicide victims," the report said, although it noted that murder rates were higher earlier in this century, and higher still in some locations last century.

"Violent deaths and incidents that result in lesser injuries are sources of chronic fear and a high level of concern with the seeming inability of public authorities to prevent them," the report said.

The United States, the study found, is, in general, more violent than other societies. "Homicide rates in the United States far exceed those in any other industrialized nation," the report said. "Among 16 industrialized countries surveyed in 1988, the United States had the highest prevalence rates for serious sexual assaults and for all other assaults, including threats of physical harm."

**Booms become beeps in San Francisco Bay**

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Beep Beep, go the newfangled fog warning gadgets the Coast Guard installed on San Francisco Bay.

Nuts, say traditionalists who want a return to the old foghorns that moaned through the mist.

"The foghorns are really mournful and romantic — they're Sam Spade sidling down the Hyde Street hill in the dripping fog," said Wayne Wheeler, president of the San Francisco-based U.S. Lighthouse Society.

Last week, the last of San Francisco Bay's bellowing sentinels on Alcatraz Island was replaced by a high-pitched, electronic beeper. The Coast Guard says the beepers are cheaper and more reliable.

But even the city's board of supervisors wants the old horns back. The Coast Guard was surprised by the reaction from the board and the public. "We knew there was some interest but we didn't anticipate the level of interest we've seen in the last week," said Mike Van Houten, assistant chief of the Coast Guard's Aids to Navigation Office in Long Beach.

The Coast Guard isn't likely to replace the beepers, but might let someone else operate an old foghorn, he said.

"In the 19th century, mariners navigating the foggy bay were guided by shore-based steam horns, trumpets, bells, whistles and almost anything that made noise. At the turn of the century, air-powered sirens were developed.

Later, the ponderous two-note foghorns became popular and held sway for decades, offering the baritone "BEEE-ohhhhh" that Wheeler says "became part of the city's ambience."

"They're the old Lifebuoy commercials," Wheeler said. "Who wants to hear a beep every 10 seconds at night?" At one time, more than four dozen traditional horns boomed throughout the bay, from the Oakland Estuary to Old Lime Point below the Golden Gate Bridge.

"But the last of the hooters" was removed from the southern tip of Alcatraz Island as part of the Coast Guard's modernization of its navigation aids.

**Senators cancel visit to Southeast Asia**

WASHINGTON — Two Republican senators canceled plans Thursday to go to Southeast Asia with a Senate delegation searching for information about American servicemen missing from the Vietnam War, and another GOP senator was added to the contingent.

The three senators, all members of the Senate Select Committee on POW-MIA Affairs, were Sens. John Kerry, D-Mass., chairman of the panel; Tom Daschle, D-S.D.; and Hank Brown, R-Colo., who was added to the trip Thursday.

They were scheduled to leave at midnight Thursday and return Nov. 22. They were to meet with officials in Vietnam, Thailand and Laos. Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, decided not to go "because he was tied to by the Vietnamese in April ..." about missing U.S. servicemen, an aide said.

**Research leads to leukemia advance**

PHILADELPHIA — A renegade protein formed by two fused genes triggers certain forms of leukemia, according to scientists, who said Thursday their discovery may lead to development of a screening test and better treatments.

The fusion is involved in about 90 percent of acute leukemia in infants and an estimated 40 percent in older children, Thomas Jefferson University researchers said.

The protein appears to contribute to acute lymphocytic, myelocytic and monocytic leukemias, sometimes fatal cancers of white blood cells that strike mostly children, the scientists said. About 2,000 new cases of acute leukemia occur each year.

**Hospital releases actress Hepburn**

LOS ANGELES — Audrey Hepburn was released Thursday from a hospital, where the actress had a cancerous tumor and part of her colon removed.

Miss Hepburn was in good condition, said Ron Wise, a spokesman for Cedars-Sinai Medical Center.

**U.S. accepts lower security for plutonium**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Japan rejected a Pentagon recommendation that a vessel-escorting 1.7 tons of radioactive material be equipped with modern anti-missile defenses, officials and anti-nuclear activists said.

The Pentagon, after two years of negotiations with Japan, nonetheless approved the Japanese security plan for transporting the plutonium, these sources said.

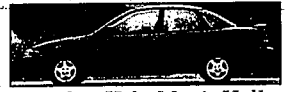
The Japanese freighter carrying the plutonium left France on Sunday bound for Japan, where the material will be used to fuel power stations. The ship is being escorted by a lightly armed Japanese coast guard frigate along its route, which is secret for security reasons.

Under the 1986 Diplomatic Security and Anti-Terrorism Act, the Pentagon was required to evaluate Japan's proposed security plan to ensure it could thwart theft, sabotage or acts of terrorism. Under a subsequent agreement with Japan, the United States has the power to veto the security arrangements if it finds them inadequate.

# Peacekeepers, guerrillas die in clashes

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Muslim guerrillas and U.N. peacekeepers exchanged fire Thursday in south Lebanon, killing one guerrilla and a Nepalese soldier, authorities said.

Another guerrilla was slain and two Israeli soldiers injured in a separate attack.

In Washington, Israeli negotiator Uri Lubrani said peace talks between Israel and Lebanon would continue despite the violence. Talks resumed Thursday after a day off for Veterans' Day.

The clashes came amid heightened tensions along the border between Israel and Lebanon. Hezbollah, or Party of God, gunners have recently shelled northern Israel, prompting Israeli artillery fire that has driven Lebanese civilians northward.

Three other Nepalese soldiers were wounded in the clash with

pro-Iranian Hezbollah fighters in Kafra, officers with the U.N. Inter-

im Force in Lebanon said. Fundamentalist guerrillas fired at

the Nepalese patrol after it ordered them to abandon a surveillance position in the village. U.N. spokesman Timur Goksel said.

The guerrillas also attacked Nepalese troops in nearby Yater and Sribbine, Goksel said. The villages are just north of Israel's self-proclaimed security zone, designed to shield its northern settlements from guerrilla attacks.

The guerrillas, Goksel said, fired automatic rifles, rocket-propelled grenades and Soviet-made rockets at the positions.

Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency blamed the clash on the U.N. soldiers. It said they fired on a Hezbollah ambulance, killing a nurse.

Hezbollah guerrillas also attacked Israeli troops in the hilltop Kafra and Yater, security sources said on condition of anonymity.

### Bandits ambush Somali relief convoy

NAIROBI, Kenya — Bandits ambushed a relief convoy in Somalia, but guards and a security force organized by townspeople alleged by looting fought back and saved most of the American grain, an aid official said Thursday.

At least four people were killed in the ambush Wednesday, said Rick Grant, the spokesman for CARE International in Somalia's capital, Mogadishu.

All but one of the escaping trucks turned back and did not make it to Baidoa, one of the southern Somali towns hit hardest by famine.

### Seoul institutes women only train cars

SEOUL, South Korea — Commuter trains in Seoul will set aside coaches for women starting next month to protect them from pawing males.

The Korean National Railroad said Thursday it will designate two out of 10 coaches for Seoul-area electric trains as "women only."

Many female passengers on Seoul's trains and subways complain they can't escape molesting males in rush-hour crowds. On subways, pushers are employed at peak hours to squeeze passengers into the cars so the doors can close.

### 'Ingenious' Fraser-Smith dies at 88

LONDON — Charles Fraser-Smith, who inspired Ian Fleming to create James Bond's gadget inventor, "Q," has died. He was 88.

Fraser-Smith died Monday at his home in Bratton Fleming, in southwest England, his family said Thursday. The cause was not disclosed.

He worked alongside Fleming during World War II making ingenious devices to help British secret agents, servicemen and prisoners of war, most of whom were in Nazi-occupied Europe.

## Co-defendant's illness stalls Honecker trial

BERLIN (AP) — Former Communist leader Erich Honecker went on trial Thursday for the killings of East Germans fleeing to the West.

But the illness of an elderly co-defendant forced the court to recess until Monday, demonstrating how difficult the prosecutors' job will be.

The criminal case is considered the most important in Germany since the Nuremberg war crimes trials against Nazi bosses after World War II.

For many Germans, the trial represents a final reckoning with the ousted and disgraced East Berlin regime, which Honecker headed from 1971 to 1989. But many others think it serves no purpose.

Outside the Berlin District Court, former East German political prisoner Rolf Richter hung up a flag from his now-vanished country, with the words "Send Honecker to Bautzen written on it. Bautzen was the Communists' most notorious prison for political foes and people caught trying to escape.

About two dozen Honecker supporters also gathered outside the court, where a dozen police vans stood by to prevent trouble.

"Freedom for Erich Honecker and

Erich-Mielke," one woman shouted into a megaphone.

Mielke, one of the six defendants, is the 84-year-old former chief of East Germany's dreaded secret police.

Although his lawyers claim he's deathly ill with liver cancer, the 80-year-old Honecker did not appear frail. He smiled occasionally as he took his place inside the dark, cramped courtroom.

Dressed in a natty blue suit and maroon tie, he posed for photographers and briefly waved to one supporter who gave the Communists' clenched-fist salute.

Honecker is charged with manslaughter in the deaths of 13 people who tried to escape to West Germany. Nine were killed by mines and booby traps at the border, and four were shot at the Berlin Wall.

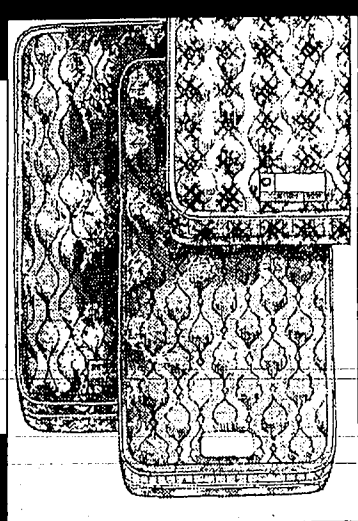

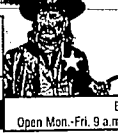

### Don't let troubles ruin important charity drive

Every day at noon, a family of seven walks into the Salvation Army Corps Center in Twin Falls for its only meal of the day.

They sit among 50 to 90 others, many elderly, some physically disabled. A handful are transients, but not many.

Most, according to Salvation Army director Capt. Roger Davis, are "Twin Falls residents who are trying to do what they're supposed to be doing and having a hard time of it."

After the first of the year, the odds are pretty good it will get even harder.

The kitchen may be an early casualty if the United Way of Magic Valley doesn't finish its current campaign in better shape than it is in now. United Way is a primary funding source for the Salvation Army and 18 other agencies.

With a month to go, the United Way has collected pledges for \$93,000, about \$187,000 short of its goal.

A year ago at this time, the campaign had raised about \$140,000 toward a goal of \$280,000.

The "Salvation Army" received \$28,944 from the United Way for the current year; unless things change dramatically in the next month, it could be half that amount next year.

"We would be able to continue to fund our pantry program, but the hot-lunch program would be the first to go," Davis said. "We also do things like provide temporary shelter to people whose pipes have frozen and make available showers for people who have shelter but no hot water. I don't see how we'd be able to continue to do that."

An uncertain economy and disgust with the national United Way's free-spending former president, William Aramony, have hurt the local campaign. Many Magic Valley residents who used to contribute to the campaign seem to be sitting on their wallets this year.

Worse, the United Way of Magic Valley's executive director, Kathy Williams, quit a month into the campaign. No successor is in sight.

There's no question the local United Way has organizational problems. But before you write it off, consider this:

The money the campaign raises goes to real people, with real needs - from the Boy Scouts to the Hagerman Senior Citizens' Center.

And consider something else: If United Way support for its member agencies drops significantly, many - perhaps most - will go looking for money on their own.

The result would be chaos - an unremitting, year-round free-for-all fund-raising. It would quickly dry up the available money and probably would leave some worthy charities short of funds.

"Some of the Salvation Army organizations around the country have quit the United Way and started raising money on their own," Davis said. "I would really hate to do that, but we're operating with a skeleton staff here. There's no place to cut."

"It's one thing to make cuts on paper, but it's quite another when you have to deal with the faces every day."

## GOP should consider reinvesting in own party

Are the political parties still relevant? The answer in last Tuesday's elections was not reassuring.

Not only did a man with no party win 19 percent of the popular vote, in many races from the top on down it was difficult to tell what either party stood for.

It seems to me that a strong two-party system is important, and the Republican Party must reinvent itself in order to recapture the allegiance of the voters.

The reality is that the Republican Party faced fundamental problems before Tuesday's vote, and we still face them.

In nearly every case, these problems are self-inflicted. The biggest question now is whether we can close ranks and heal our divisions.

The healing process can begin by facing up to the fact that we have betrayed our conservative roots and shredded our basic message. Consider what we have done to the three pillars of the Republican majority.

We are the party of fiscal responsibility. In the 1980s, desiring an enormous expansion of defense spending, Republicans willingly exchanged the tax-and-spend policies of Democrats for borrow-and-spend policies that quadrupled the national debt. In the process, we seem to have discarded the basic principle that government should live within its means.

We are the party of limited government. Traditional values, or "family" values to some, generated a lot of heated rhetoric in the GOP campaign. What was deliberately overlooked was the most basic Republican value: Individual responsibility cannot be replaced by government fiat.

We now have turned this value upside down.

In fact, we have adopted the Democrats' view that government can make up for our individual and collective shortcomings. Nowhere is this topsy-turvy thinking more evident than in the divisive debate regarding abortion.

Individuals who have believed that the traditional values of personal freedom and individual responsibility should be addressed in the home and the church now find themselves under attack within the party for objecting to government intrusion into this area.

Federal regulation of the most private aspects of our lives is not limited

government - it is big government at its worst.

Unless we face up to this contradiction, our party will continue to be denied of its energy and enthusiasm, and many Republicans, including me, will no longer feel at home in our own party.

We are the party of American leadership in world affairs. The current cliché is that we are a victim of our own successes.

Like most clichés, it is somewhat true. With the collapse of the Soviet Union, the one clear threat to our national security disappeared, and so did a key GOP claim on the White House.

However, the Soviet threat now is being replaced by a host of new, smaller but potentially dangerous threats that demand a rethinking of our role in world affairs.

Russia faces a grim future. The Middle East could erupt again. China must make a tricky leadership transition. The list goes on at a time when the global economy also is in turmoil.

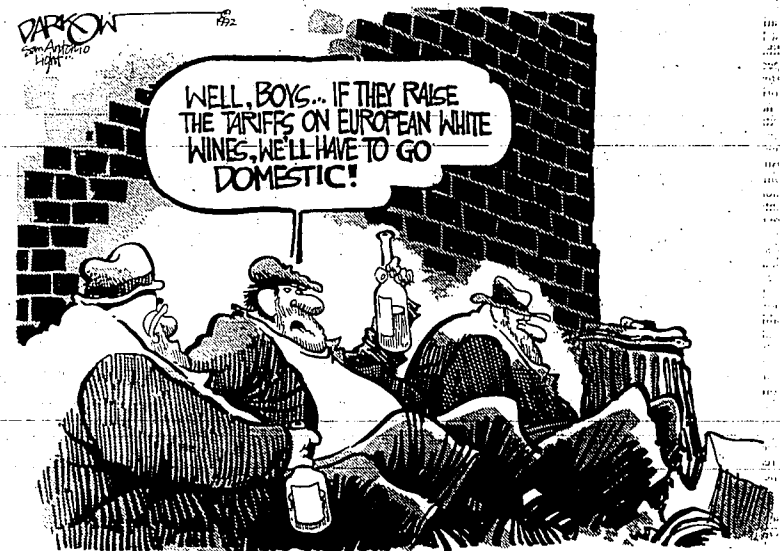
We Republicans now seem stuck on arguments over Cold War hardware - submarines, missiles, bombers and SDI - and whether America should withdraw from the world and put "America First."

This desire to turn inward and isolationism comes just at the time when the world and our own national security most need American leadership to meet pressing economic, political, military and diplomatic challenges.

If our bumper-sticker philosophy - Peace Through Strength - no longer resonates with voters, it is because we have failed to redefine "strength" in terms of present circumstances. If we want to lead America into the 21st century, we Republicans must return to our roots and our fundamental beliefs.

We can heal our divisions, if we are willing to close ranks around the real hallmarks of genuinely Republican, genuinely conservative values.

## War on Poverty hasn't made a dent

In the mid-'60s President Lyndon Johnson declared a "War on Poverty," billed at the time as a great investment that would return its cost to society many fold.

In fact, before the War on Poverty began the poverty rate was going down - from 32 percent in 1950 to 14.7 percent in 1966. After it began in 1966, and welfare spending began to explode, the poverty rate levelled off. With a few modest dips and peaks, it has remained largely unchanged for the last 23 years.

How is it possible to quintuple anti-poverty spending over 23 years (adjusted for inflation) without lowering the poverty rate - or to spend \$226 billion in one year (as was done in 1990) on welfare, and still have more than 30 million poor people, as the Census Bureau reports?

The answer is that it is not possible. Not even the federal government can spend \$226 billion on low-income people without having a significant impact on living standards. The simple fact is that the Census Bureau "neglects" to count most of this assistance when calculating the number of poor Americans.

There is a political game that is played in Washington over the poverty issue, and it goes something like this: First, the Census

Bureau defines as poor any household with a cash income below the poverty threshold, which was \$13,942 for a family of four in 1991. A household's current assets are ignored. The taxpayers are then told that by this standard there are more than 30 million poor Americans. Greater welfare spending is urged. Next, welfare spending is increased.

Then, behind the scenes, efforts are made to assure that cash earnings of low-income people are undercounted and that virtually no welfare spending is counted as income when determining if a family is poor. Thus, more families can be counted as poor. The next year the public is again told that there are more than 30 million poor people. Obviously, greater spending is needed. As long as this cycle repeats, welfare officials can extend the reach of their bureaucracy in perpetuity.

This explains how, of the \$184 billion spent on low-income people in 1990 (excluding those in institutions like jails or nursing homes), only \$32 billion was counted as income. Spending that was not counted - on cash handouts, food, and housing alone - totaled about \$70 billion: more than enough to raise every poor American above the poverty threshold if it were given to them in cash today. By not counting this amount, the Census Bureau can grossly exaggerate the number of poor in America.

Hopefully, Bill Clinton recognizes that the real problem with welfare is much more than its burgeoning cost - now more than 4

percent of the entire national economy. It is the current system actually harms, rather than helps, the poor.

Anti-poverty spending has raised the standard of living of some Americans, but only by creating massive welfare dependency. The welfare system contains such perverse economic incentives that the result is whole communities where traditional two-parent families have vanished, work is rare or non-existent, and multiple generations have grown up dependent on government handouts. This "behavioral poverty" is the real return on the nation's investment in poverty programs.

In spite of this, many political leaders still use the current welfare system to parade themselves as champions of the downtrodden. They discount ideas like "enterprise zones" by which the private sector could give the poor a chance to raise themselves out of poverty.

Clinton should distance himself from these leaders, who do an incredible disservice to low-income Americans. By falsely narrowing the range of options, these leaders encourage an attitude of indifference or even hostility to learning, work, and marriage among the poor.

In so doing, they turn the poor away from the face of opportunity and into the arms of anger, resentment and despair.

I am writing in regard to the recent moose tragedy. I am completely disappointed in the Fish and Game Department.

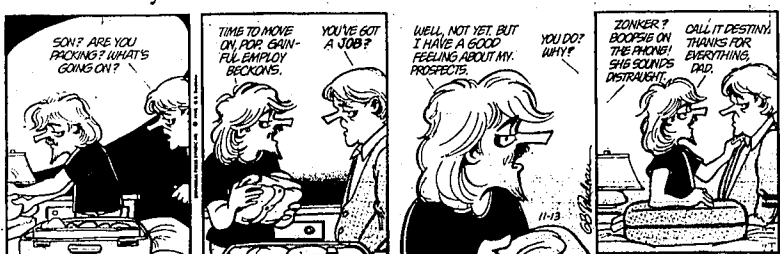

# Health-care plan can't be the cure-all president-elect promises

President-elect Bill Clinton has repeatedly promised to put together a national health-care plan in those first 100 days in office for which he deliberately raised such high expectations during the campaign.

Health care is on his short list of priorities, second only to improving the nation's economy and intricately linked to it. Nothing he does next year is likely to impact all of us so personally.

But turning his glib campaign promises into political reality will be a monumental problem. What Clinton has offered as his health-care plan so far has been a clever, feel-good wish list that makes good TV sound bites but is full of double-talk and financial time bombs. Even if he can push it through the new Congress, millions of us will pay more — one way or another — for less health care and less personal choice about it.

Clinton has promised a plan "under which every American family finally has the right to affordable, high-quality health care." He's also going to provide more services for the elderly and disabled, long-term care, more primary and preventive care, a slowing of price increases for prescription drugs and a speed-up in new medications, more attention to AIDS issues and more investment in medical research.

Oh yes, he will control costs and do all he promises without

increasing the deficit or raising taxes — except, of course, on rich people earning more than \$200,000 and on foreign corporations.

Although Clinton says his plan is not what is usually called "pay or pay," it comes close. He would require all employers to provide a "basic package of benefits" to employees (and pay for 80 percent) or be assessed a payroll tax for workers to join a public program, along with others who need coverage. Small businesses would get tax credits to ease the impact if necessary. The government would fold Medicaid into the new system. Clinton is essentially proposing a massive expansion of Medicaid, with all of its problems and drawbacks. Many employers, especially those whose workers have high health costs, would find it easier and cheaper to dump them into the public system, which would be under pressure to hold costs down by curtailing payments to health-care providers, as Medicaid does now.

Clinton forces are vague about how large their proposed tax credit would be, how long it would last and how much impact it would have on the deficit or on taxes — and what the impact of the program would be on prices and wages.

The president-elect talks glibly

about "maintaining choice in coverage and care." But he also wants to push millions of people into managed-care systems. These, in theory, would compete with each other for consumers, providing some element of private enterprise that would supposedly keep prices from rising too high too fast.

But managed-care systems, such as HMOs, have not been uniformly successful in controlling escalating costs. Consumers understandably worry about being assigned to a health-care enterprise that has basic financial incentives to under-treat them and keep costs down.

The president-elect also wants a national board to set what are called annual "global budget targets" for total spending on health care by the entire nation and to enforce such caps. How such a board would function, how its controls would impact individual physicians and their medical decisions for individual patients and what would happen when the spending cap is

reached while sick people still need to be treated aren't explained. Clinton's board would also be empowered to decide what goes into the "basic benefits package" to be covered by the health-care system — in stark words, who lives and who dies. "Basic benefits package" is political code for rationing. Most Americans would be highly uncomfortable having such decisions made for them by the federal government and subject not only to federal budget pressures but also to political deal-making.

However Clinton describes his health-care plan, it inevitably involves price controls. But government price controls have never worked and usually produce shortages and black markets. For example, as Medicaid has held down payments to physicians, many doctors either refuse to take Medicaid patients or reduce the time they spend on them.

Clinton and his staffers are fond of talking about how much money

they can save by paring administrative costs and reducing paperwork. But anyone who has wrestled with the paperwork and regulations required by the IRS just to collect income taxes must wonder how they can make such claims with a straight face.

The president-elect may be a gifted politician waving his electoral mandate. But he must also deal with the sobering realities of translating it into legislation.

Almost 80 health-care plans have already been introduced in Congress. Washington is also full of vested interests and their lobbyists intent on making sure any new laws do them no harm.

At last count, 748 health-care groups and trade associations are paying lobbyists in Washington to influence health legislation. Not only do they shovel money into

legislators' campaign funds, they do much of the homework on health issues, churning out handy fact sheets, position papers and publicity releases. Special-interest groups that worked for Clinton's election — and those that stayed offstage by request — will be standing in line now for their slice of the victory pie.

Spending for health care in the United States now tops \$300 billion a year and there is no end in sight to the relentless escalation.

Can a Democrat president with a Democrat Congress find a solution that isn't a traditional Democrat tax-and-spend approach, that will do at least half of what Clinton promises without creating the chaos and harm his opponents fear? We should all hope so.

## Nuke train crew fears for its safety

TWIN FALLS — Idaho activists are continuing to track a Union Pacific train carrying a load of radioactive waste in a manner that railroad employees say is unsafe.

The train — last seen Thursday in Baker, Ore. — passed through Shoshone Wednesday evening heading for Hinkle, Ore. where the car carrying a 171-ton radioactive waste shipping cask will be hooked to another train.

The engineer and conductor of the train left Pocatello "under protest" Wednesday afternoon, said George Millward, legislative director of the United Transportation Union in Pocatello.

The loaded cask-car was hooked at the end of the train behind a string of empty cars. Hooking a loaded car behind empty cars is against railroad safety rules, but required by federal rules for nuclear waste shipments.

The configuration could cause a derailment, Millward said.

UP officials would not disclose the destination of the cask-car.

But Snake River Alliance members think it is heading for the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton, Wash. There it would be loaded with spent nuclear reactor fuel and returned to Idaho where the highly radioactive spent fuel will be unloaded, inspected and packed off to storage.

The alliance is a statewide citizen activist group.

UP often hauls a variety of hazardous materials, including radioactive waste. But in this case the train makeup made the train crew and railroad workers nervous.

## Funding cuts won't hurt road projects

SHOSHONE — The reconstruction of Clear Lake Grade and the widening of U.S. Highway 30 west of Twin Falls won't be delayed by a nearly 15 percent cut in federal highway funds.

"Everything approved by the board for fiscal 1993 will proceed at this point," Jeff Stratten of the Idaho Transportation Department's public affairs office in Boise said Thursday.

Under the Surface Transportation Act passed by Congress and signed by President Bush last year, Idaho had been authorized to spend \$139.5 million on road and bridge projects in the 1993 fiscal year. Despite cuts in federal highway funds, none of the scheduled projects should be delayed, Stratten said.

And the department will wait to see if President-elect Clinton will urge Congress to release road money as he has promised, Stratten said.

"We'll proceed as planned and see what the new administration brings as far as highway funds," he said.

Loren Thomas, district engineer for the transportation department, and John Collins, area engineer for the local roads section of the department in Boise, detailed how some Magic Valley construction projects are progressing:

- Clear Lakes Grade: Reconstruction and realignment, 1.9 miles, \$6 million. The project is still in the planning stages.
- U.S. 30, Filler to U.S. 30/93 junction: Reconstruction and realignment, one mile, \$3.3 million. A public design hearing for the three-phase project is planned for Dec. 17.
- Idaho 25: Downard Bridge replacement southeast of Rupert, \$2.8 million. It is now in the final phase and it will be advertised for bids in the near future.
- Interstate 84, Burley to Twin Bridges: Pavement rehabilitation, 8.2 miles, \$2.5 million. This project is also in the final phase.

## Judge denies change of venue; lawyers pare down juror list

TWIN FALLS — The first Twin Falls murder trial in more than eight years began Thursday as jury selection got under way in the case against Donnell "Bud" Stradley.

Stradley, 29, is the Twin Falls man charged with first-degree murder in the January death of 2-year-old Amanda Hosteler. Flanked by a pair of public defenders and with most of his family sitting in the gallery behind him, Stradley sat quietly during the first of what will be several days in courtroom one at the Twin Falls County Courthouse.

"If convicted, he could face the death penalty."

Before jury selection began, 5th District Judge James J. May denied a request by Deputy Public Defender John Olson to move the trial to Boise.

Extensive pre-trial publicity and community outrage over Amanda's death makes it unlikely that an impartial jury could be selected in Twin Falls County, Olson said.

More than 170 potential jurors filled out questionnaires before Thursday's proceedings; 94 percent had heard of the case and one third believed Stradley was guilty, Olson said.

Revelations that Amanda appeared to have been abused long before her death sparked outrage in the community and brought criticism to the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare for not intervening.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter said the large jury pool leaves a choice of unbiased people from which to pheny a 12-member panel to hear the case.

## Wendell post office begins changing addresses to streets, house numbers

WENDELL — Christmas cards from Wendell will have new return addresses on them this year.

The mailing addresses of city residents have been changed from rural routes and box numbers to streets and house numbers. "It's all based on speed and time," Wendell Postmaster Louis German said.

Thanks to new sorting machines in larger cities, he said, mail will arrive in Wendell already sorted by street and number. Carriers can then pick up the mail for their routes without having to spend hours sorting it according to box numbers.

"The mail will already be sorted, or, at least, we won't have to do near as much sorting as we do now," German said.

One problem with the old system, he said, is that no room was allowed for growth. Boxes were numbered one, two, three and so on when the system was set up. Since then, more boxes with new numbers and letters have been added in between.

"Here we have Box 105," German said, showing how numbers have grown between the original boxes. "It just got really confusing."

The said clarity-of-emergency calls is another advantage of making street and mailing addresses the same. A child calling 911 will give directions to that house rather than to a route and box number.

German said he expects the complete change-over to take several years. Rural areas went from route and box numbers to a grid system about four years ago; he said, and about 25 percent of the mail is still addressed to the old route addresses.

"As people move in, they are using the new addresses," he said. "They don't even know there were old ones. The longtime residents are the hardest to change."

The new system for city residents was announced in September and the response has been good, German said, adding, "We expect another big improvement after Christmas."

Mail carrier Sarah Bitterli said most outgoing mail has the new addresses, while about two-thirds of incoming mail has the old addresses.

People can help mail carriers — especially the substitutes — by putting their street addresses on their mailboxes, she said.

German said people do not have to worry about not getting letters that have the old addresses.

"We'll deliver them," he said. "It's no problem."

# Environmentalists charge state seeks ways around river protection laws

**BOISE** — Environmentalists say state officials are considering a way to allow hydroelectric projects on protected rivers.  
The Idaho Department of Water Resources will hear public comment next week on proposed amendments to the Comprehensive State Water Plan, which now allows the state to prohibit development on certain Idaho rivers.  
The hearing will be at 7 p.m. Tuesday at the department's Twin Falls regional office, 222 Shoshone St. E.  
Sections of the Middle Snake River are being considered for protected status by Idaho Water Resources Board. A final plan for

the middle Snake is expected next year.  
Marti Bridges, with Idaho Rivers United, said the amendments to the plan would allow create a back door for developers to suggest hydro projects on protected rivers.  
"These things are horrible," Bridges said of the amendments. "What this amounts to is special interest legislation that doesn't allow citizens equal treatment."  
Jim Yost, a spokesman for the Idaho Farm Bureau, said environmental groups like Idaho Rivers United can't be satisfied. The groups just want to lock up the rivers, he said.  
"In our perspective, we don't mind providing protection until evidence is given the project can proceed and still protect the

environment," Yost said.  
The board will consider four amendments to the law. One of the amendments in question states: "Where the designation of a state protected river precludes a project or development, the (Water Resources) Board will entertain requests to amend... the plan."  
Wendy Wilson, with Idaho Rivers United said the Water Resources Board had the amendments drafted because of pressure from developers who want to build a hydroelectric project on the North Fork of the Payette River.  
The stream was protected by the state Legislature in March 1990.  
The charge was denied by board members. "We're not being pushed by anyone," said Gene Gray, a board member from Payette.

# Dietrich water bills set to run

**DIETRICH** — The residents of Dietrich can expect the first monthly billing soon for their new city water system.  
Payments on the interest for the bond must begin one year from the time the papers are signed. The monthly bill will be \$22.  
The long wait is over with the arrival in Dietrich of several semi-tractor trailer loads of pipe for the system. Meanwhile, drilling began late last week on the city's community well.  
The city is installing a citywide water system to replace the wells residents draw water from now. City officials have said the new system is necessary since some wells have dried up, while water pressure is dwindling in some shared wells.  
The council resumed its recessed meeting to discuss the possible purchase of a copying machine

to ease the expected mountain of bookwork associated with the sizeable project.  
Barring bad weather and other difficulties, the new water system is expected to be completed in about three months.  
The council will meet frequently during that time in order to keep current with the progress of the project and to sign checks and pay for services as needed.  
Gary Bowman and several others asked the city's opinion of combining the rural and city fire departments to form one district.  
The idea was presented some time ago, and rejected, since the plan was to tax property to finance the district.  
"This time, however, the plan was presented as a tax to be included on the tax rolls after the issue was put to a vote."  
Councilman Bingham said he doubted the success of such a vote because residents must begin paying on the city water system. "I don't think they'll want their taxes raised right now," he said.

# INEL cleanup proposal includes dig in 1 section, leading to general plan

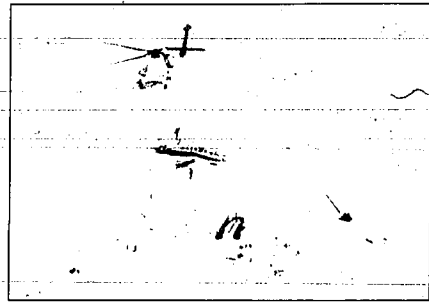
**TWIN FALLS** — Cleanup of buried waste at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is going to take a lot of digging and some complex processes, officials say.  
State and INEL officials presented a proposed cleanup plan and answered questions from the public Thursday evening.  
The plan is to start in one corner of INEL's Radioactive Waste Management Complex to learn about waste buried there in the 1960s, what has happened to it since it was buried and perhaps how to clean up the whole complex.  
The radioactive burial ground was started in 1952. In 1954 plutonium-containing waste — known as transuranic — began arriving from the nuclear weapons plant at Rocky Flats near Denver.  
The long-lived transuranic waste was buried — some neatly stacked some haphazardly dumped — in 20 pits and trenches dug in the shallow

desert soil, covering an area of about 44 acres.  
The test pit — known as Pit 9 — covers about one acre. Waste was dumped into this pit, eight feet deep, from 1967 to 1969 on a thin soil liner. It was then covered with about six feet of soil.  
Large pieces included plutonium, americium and various other radioactive materials and organic solvents along with what part of machinery and reactors — even an old pickup truck bed.  
"It presents a potential risk to the environment and to human health."  
The waste of Idaho, the Environmental Protection Agency and the federal Energy Department have agreed on a process that would dig the waste up, separate out the hazardous components through physical and chemical means and reduce the volume of waste by 90 percent.  
Officials have lined up two contractors to present cleanup proposals. After the proposal have been shown to work on non-hazardous material, the best

contractor would be picked.  
The winning contractor would then build a temporary building over the cleanup site to contain any dust and test its operation on the real thing.  
Both have proposed similar extraction methods.  
Large pieces would be separated out, decontaminated and returned to the pit. Smaller pieces, soil and solvents would then be chemically treated to remove radioactive components.  
"Organic chemical" would be broken down. The solvent carbon tetrachloride, for example, would be broken into its constituent parts and released as carbon dioxide and ordinary table salt.  
Concentrated radioactive material would then be mixed with enough soil to form an obsidian-like glass known as iron enriched basalt which heated.  
"Soil" and other pieces of waste below a minimum level of radioactivity would be returned. Anything higher would be packaged and stored.

# National Guard plane crash claims 8

**JUNEAU, Alaska (AP)** — A National Guard plane carrying eight people crashed Thursday into a mountain range on its way to the Juneau airport, the Coast Guard reported. Officials said there were no survivors.  
The wreckage of the C-12F twin-engine Beechcraft was found at the 2,600-foot elevation on the Chilkat Peninsula, Petty Officer Erik Lou said. A Coast Guard helicopter spotted the wreckage in the Chilkat Range about 30 miles west of Juneau and seven miles southeast of Excursion Inlet.  
The plane was reported missing Thursday morning in stormy weather on its approach to the airport. It was overdue on a flight from Elmendorf Air Force Base in Anchorage when the airport tower lost contact at 9:10 a.m., Lou said.  
The victims included Brig. Gen. Thomas C. Carroll, 44, the deputy commissioner and chief of staff of the state Department of Military and Veterans Affairs and the commander of the Alaska Army National Guard.  
National Guard officials said Carroll and at least six of the other victims were based in Anchorage.  
The cause of the crash was

During the interviews in Lewiston,

may find an impartial jury unlikely, she said.  
The defense's motion was "probably just an excuse to delay the case," Baxter said.  
May also demand defense motions to sequester the jury and witnesses.  
May, who called an Ada County jury to hear the murder trial of Mitchell John Odgera in Huxley last year, said that almost all of the jurors in that case knew of the incidents leading up to it, but they were able to make an impartial decision.  
He noted that many people who filled out jury questionnaires in the Stradley case said they believe Amanda's mother, Julie Hostetler, is guilty of the child's death rather than Stradley.  
Hostetler is currently free on bond while she awaits a three-to-nine-year prison sentence for felony injury to a child.  
She and Stradley were living together when police were called to a nearby house on Fourth Avenue East early 10 months ago.  
An officer found Amanda lying on a waterbed, breathing. Efforts to revive her at the house and at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center were unsuccessful.  
A pathologist says his autopsy revealed that the child died of internal injuries — a ruptured mesentery — as the result of a blow to the abdomen.  
Stradley was arrested three days after Amanda died, and indicted Jan. 30 by a grand jury. That indictment was thrown out because a faulty tape recorder left no clear record of the

proceedings, so prosecutors filed a criminal complaint charging him with murder.  
During Stradley's preliminary hearing, Twin Falls police detectives testified that Stradley told them he was playing with Amanda and tossed her toward the bed where she fell short, striking her abdomen on the bed corner.  
Prosecutors have charged him under an untested portion of Idaho law that makes aggravated battery against a child that causes the child's death a murder case.  
What really happened that day will be up to a yet-to-be-determined panel of 12 people to decide.  
About 150 people remained in the jury pool Thursday. One by one, potential jurors came into the courtroom to be questioned by Baxter and Public Defender Mike Wood.  
Each attorney has 10 minutes to ask the prospective juror about his or her background, experience and exposure to the case. If an attorney doubts a juror can be fair and impartial, he or she can ask that the person be excused from jury duty. The judge makes the final decision.  
There are plenty of reasons jurors get excused. A Menominee woman was released because her religious convictions prevent her from sitting in judgment on another person.  
A Twin Falls businessman was also excused out of the process, after telling the judge his income would be damaged if he had to spend two or three weeks sitting on a jury.  
Jurors who say they already have made up their mind about the case

also are excused.  
Wood used a photograph of Amanda's bruise-covered body to screen out jurors likely to have strong emotional reactions to what promises to be graphic testimony about her death.  
Jury selection went well on the first day, Baxter said. Wood declined to comment.  
Of the 20 people questioned Thursday, 11 made it through the first round of screening. When that number reaches 34, each side will be allowed to disqualify 10 people, leaving a 12-member jury with two alternates.  
Opening statements probably will be given sometime Monday or early Tuesday.  
Stradley's is the first Twin Falls County murder case to go to trial since Keith Rosenkrantz of Castleford stood trial in June 1984, Baxter said.  
Rosenkrantz was charged with first-degree murder in the shotgun slaying of his ex-girlfriend and her new boyfriend. He was convicted of two counts of manslaughter.

RUPERT — A Rupert detective hasn't given up on a lead indicating that a suspect in the Randy Walker murder case might have been involved in an attempted kidnapping in Utah. One of the composite sketches of a man thought to be involved in the April 13 slaying death of Walker resembles a man who reportedly tried to kidnap a 13-year-old school girl on Sept. 22 in Murray, Utah. So far, Murray police have made no

arrests in the kidnapping case. Detective Sam Skaggs of the Murray Police Department said the two composite sketches and physical descriptions of the suspects are similar, but chances are it is not the same man. Detective Terry Quinn of the Rupert Police Department said the Rupert composite sketch was only one of several circulated following Walker's murder. He said different witnesses can often give varying descriptions of a suspect. Skaggs said Murray police have

received numerous leads about the kidnapping suspect, but so far "there hasn't been positive information leading us to a specific individual." The suspect tried to kidnap the Utah girl as she was walking home from school. He grabbed the victim around her waist, lifted her over his shoulder, and started to run with her. The girl kicked and screamed, causing the man to drop her to the ground. The suspect then fled, possibly in a white sedan which was seen in the area. In the pawnshop murder, a

customer who entered the pawnshop while the murder was taking place said she was pushed to the floor from behind as she entered. Looking up, she said she saw a brown-haired man struggling with Walker. The only suspect arrested so far in the murder case is dark-haired Jerry Fino, 18, a Hispanic. That, and because some witnesses saw a suspicious brown-haired man near the pawnshop at about the time of the murder, suggests there might have been at least two people involved with the murder.

## Acequia Elementary celebrates reading

ACEQUIA — Whether in the form of a rap song or a skit, Acequia Elementary School students did their best to promote reading Wednesday and Thursday. Teachers asked their students to promote books ranging from the well-known "Charlotte's Web" by E.B. White to the obscure "The Slime Thing." The events were held to celebrate National Children's Reading Day, officially observed on Wednesday. Each class advertised its book in a different way, by using a song or performing a skit, highlighting parts of the book. The best one was voted on afterward. The classes performed the activities during special assemblies. The last 10 minutes of Thursday's assembly was spent — you guessed it — reading. "It's to get them excited about reading and to encourage them to

pick up a book they haven't read," Principal Goldie McClure said. A special committee of teachers helped organize the various events to celebrate Reading Day — and the first time for the school to do so. A little over a month ago, Acequia teachers set a goal to have their 400 students read a total of 10,000 books this school year; so far, the count is at 2,274. "At that pace, I think we will make it," McClure said. To encourage reading, McClure reads to students two mornings each week, before class begins. Attendance is voluntary. "It's a real open-ended type of thing," she said. McClure said she is saddened by statistics showing that many children — including high school graduates — haven't learned to read. "I think a child can succeed if they can read," she said. "But we not only need to teach them how to read; but to love reading."

## Ex-policeman faces charge of fondling

RUPERT — A former reserve officer with the Blackfoot Police Department has been charged with fondling a 14-year-old girl. According to documents at 5th District Court, the Minidoka County prosecutor's office has charged Ron Rangel Garcia, 42, of Paul, with the sexual abuse of a child under 16 years of age. The charge is a felony. Court documents allege the act took place on Oct. 13, while Garcia was a passenger in a vehicle being driven to Paul by the child's father.

The girl told her father about the incident after Garcia got out of the vehicle in Paul. The father later relayed the story to a Minidoka County sheriff's deputy at the County Law Enforcement Building. During an Oct. 27 preliminary hearing in Magistrate Court, the girl testified that Garcia had been drinking before allegedly fondling her. Magistrate John F. Varin bound the case over to District Court. Garcia was arraigned before District Judge William Hart on Nov. 2. Garcia is free on \$1,500 bond.

**Hispanics reportedly feel shortchanged**

**CALDWELL** — An increasing number of Hispanics feel shortchanged by the police and schools in Canyon County, says the Idaho Human Rights Commission.

Those feelings have increased tensions between Hispanics and Anglos, said Marilyn Shuler, executive director of the commission. "I think that perception is reality when you deal in intergroup tensions," Shuler said.

To help figure out what is going on in the county — and what can be done about it — the Human Rights Commission will hold two public forums in Caldwell this week.

**Meridian teachers support their own**

**MERIDIAN** — Several hundred Meridian teachers voted to denounce School Board members for improperly punishing three high school teachers.

At an emotional meeting Wednesday of staff from throughout the district, Meridian Education Association members unanimously approved a resolution expressing a "profound lack of confidence" in the board.

The no-confidence vote is the teacher organization's strongest statement of criticism.

"This means we have no confidence in their actions. They act without gathering facts and let parent telephone calls dictate their policy," said MEA President Cindy Bartz. "What it's doing is creating self-censorship. Teachers are fearful of doing anything that might bring the board down on their necks."

**DOE hopes INEL plan saves money**

**IDAHO FALLS** — The Department of Energy is hoping to save \$265 million over the final five years of the decade by consolidating the contracts for managing and operating its programs at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

And government officials, in announcing the consolidation plan on Thursday, said if the move results in any reduction in the work force at INEL, the job cutback will be handled through attrition rather than layoffs. "This is going to be a long process," said Jeff Hoyle, deputy director of the department's Idaho contracts management division. "We have no real anticipated cuts and can't even comment on it until we see some proposals."

Five companies now hold government contracts through September 1994 to run operations at INEL. The department hopes to trim its management fees during the following five years by cutting the number of contractors to one or two.

**Seniors, toddlers live, play side by side**

**ASHTON** — In eastern Idaho, it's the old Ashton hospital where young and old mix.

While the main section of the complex is now a nursing home, the surgical wing has been converted to a day-care center. And now it's not unusual for toddlers and seniors to be spending time together.

"Everybody loves the little ones," said nursing home resident Lillian Miller. "It helps keep the older ones younger because our hearts are young."

At least once a week there is a more formal gathering involving a skit or something like that after which nurses introduce the youngsters, often referring to them as so-and-so's grandchild. Some of the children usually find laps to crawl onto.

**Clinic cuts back due to federal program**

**BOISE** — Les Bois Obstetrics and Gynecology clinic in Boise abruptly ceased seeing primarily elderly women covered by Medicaid this week because of what doctors characterized as punitive regulations in the federal health care program.

"This was not a rash decision," Dr. Brenda Williams said. "This is something that was agonized over."

In a letter to the patients who will now have to find other doctors, Williams and her two colleagues at Les Bois cited the translation of recent federal legislation into regulations that threaten the clinic's viability.

"If an innocent error is made, we may be fined thousands of dollars and/or taken to court with the possibility of a lengthy prison term," the letter said.

**School should have drug-free program**

**BOVILL** — An auditor has advised school officials here the Whitepine School District violated federal laws by not having a policy in place for its federally funded Drug-Free Workplace program.

The federal government provides funds for programs designed to make communities and school districts drug free. The Whitepine District gets about \$169,000 a year.

Accountant Greg Mann said he will send a report to the state Department of Education about the omission.

However, the School Board also is sending a statement of intent that the policy is in place now and each employee in the district is required to review and sign it.

**Attorney seeks drop of murder charge**

**SANDPOINT** — The attorney for 18-year-old Jeremy Cooper, accused of murdering his mother, has filed another motion asking that charges be dismissed because the trial has been delayed too long.

Cooper is accused of killing his mother, Jodi Cooper, 35, Feb. 29 at their Careywood residence.

His stepfather, Robert Peter Crockett, 41, was injured and Cooper also faces a charge of aggravated battery.

Cooper has pleaded innocent and faces a Nov. 30 trial date. He was freed under \$25,000 bond Oct. 16 and remains under house arrest at the home of a relative in Las Vegas.

The trial was postponed earlier over objections from defense attorneys Bruce Greene and Dan Featherston. In court motions, Greene said the prosecution doesn't want to go to trial because it doesn't have enough evidence.

**Tribes talk gaming, despite vote for ban**

**FORT HALL (AP)** — Eastern Idaho's Shoshone-Bannock Tribes resume talks on reservation gaming with state officials on Friday in the wake of overwhelming voter approval of a ban on any casino gambling.

"I'm still optimistic about getting into some kind of compact with them," tribal gaming manager Nathan Small said. "I guess you've got to remain optimistic."

The Shoshone-Bannocks along with the Nez Perce, Kootenai and Coeur d'Alene tribes had been meeting about once a month from June through October in an attempt to develop a regulatory compact on reservation casino gambling as

authorized by the federal Indian Gaming Regulatory Act.

In some cases, the casino operations would be added to successful high-stakes bingo games that do not require a regulatory compact with the state.

At the same time, however, nearly every state official was promoting a proposed constitutional amendment intended to circumvent the federal law and block the tribal efforts to use casino gambling as a way to breathe life into depressed reservation economies.

The notable exception was Republican state Treasurer Lydia Justice-Edwards, who maintained the issue was tribal sovereignty and self-sufficiency.

## Holyfield: Smarts will beat Bowe's brawn

LAS VEGAS — Will power and fire power.

These ingredients, or lack thereof, are the keys that will unlock the outcome of the Evander Holyfield-Riddick Bowe heavyweight title fight Friday night.

Holyfield's fighting philosophy is "try to break a man's spirit."

"I'll be trying to find out if he is a quitter," said the unbeaten 30-year-old champion, who will be making his fourth title defense.

Bowe has had to live with the charge by some boxing people that he quit against Lennox Lewis in the second round of the 1988 Olympic super heavyweight final.

Tape of the match confirms Bowe's contention that he did not quit, but that the referee acted too hastily.

"So far I've proven them wrong," said Bowe, who has a 31-0 record with 27 knockouts. "People said I didn't have any determination. I hate to lose."

Bowe, however, has yet to win a situation where the moment is a fight for the most valuable individual prize in sports. And the man he is facing is a champion of bulldog tenacity.

"I realize he hasn't been tested mentally for what is about to come," said Holyfield, 28-0 with 22 knockouts.

"Riddick Bowe is a young fighter who has made strides between fights like you've never seen before," said 82-year-old trainer Eddie Futch, who has worked with 17 world champions including Joe Frazier and Larry Holmes.

"I'm a big guy who is determined," Bowe said. "I'm going to show him I know more than he thinks I know."

The 25-year-old Bowe, 6-foot-5, is the youngest and tallest opponent Holyfield has had in a title fight. Two of Holyfield's defenses were against George Foreman and Holmes, both in their 40s.

Holyfield weighed in at 205 pounds, the lightest the former cruiserweight champion (190 pounds) has been for five heavyweight title fights. Bowe weighed

235 pounds. "I'm not the strongest fighter, I'm not the quickest fighter," but if I put it all together I might be the smartest fighter." Holyfield, however, has shown that when he gets hit he can turn into a bruiser, which could be dangerous with an opponent such as Bowe.

Critics point to Holyfield's narrow escape against unheralded Bert Cooper, who took the fight on late notice as a substitute for Francesco D'Amico. Holyfield was knocked down in the third round, but he stopped Cooper in the seventh on Nov. 23, 1991.

"Everybody who follows boxing is not fooled by the Cooper fight," said George Benton, Holyfield's trainer. "Everybody knows great fighters can get knocked down."

"The doctor said he won't even talk about Rob getting back on the floor for a week," the coach said.

Earlier, sophomore center Taj McFarlane caught a knee just above his right hip and had to retire with swelling in his midsection. He is considered out for a week, too.

And then, freshman Paul Jarrett, given a hardship year when he sustained a broken wrist in last year's second game, won't be eligible until Monday's third outing for this season's Eagles. Point guard Lance Jackson has started rehabilitation on his knee and probably won't be available for a month.

"So we'll get nine strong when we hit the floor (there at 8:30 p.m., Saturday against Central Washington jayvees) and 10 on Monday (against NNC jayvees) when Jarrett becomes eligible," Trenkle

## Expansion teams have good players to choose from

CHICAGO — The Florida Marlins and Colorado Rockies will have their choices of some respectable players in Tuesday's expansion draft, including National League saves leader Lee Smith, slugger George Bell and Gold Glove second baseman Jose Lind, according to published reports.

Others left off the protected lists by the 26 major league teams include Danny Tartabull, Bobby Thigpen, Ellis Burks, Kevin McRaynolds, Glenn Davis, Shawn Dunston, Steve Sax, Charlie Leibrandt and Mark Lemke.

Each club had to submit a list Monday of 15 players who are exempt from the draft. Only the Marlins, the Rockies and the commissioner's office received the full

lists, and the names on them were not to be made public.

Even though the lists were supposed to be cloaked in secrecy, a few names leaked out after they were handed in. It was revealed that the World Series champion Toronto Blue Jays had exposed Jack Morris and Kelly Gruber, that the NL champion Atlanta Braves had left off Kent Mercker, that the New York Mets left off Eddie Murray, and that Carlton Fisk, Tim Lincecum, Bryan Harvey and Bob Walk also were available.

But in stories in the Chicago Tribune and Rocky Mountain News on Thursday, all 26 protected lists were published.

Other familiar players who can be drafted include pitchers Mitch Williams, Mike Harkey, Pete Smith, Steve Farr and

Mike Schöller, catchers Damon Berryhill, Mike LaVilliere, Don Slaught and Matt Nokes; infielders Charlie Hayes, Billy Ripken and Randy Milligan; and outfielders Ivan Calderon and Dave Henderson.

Many of the players left unprotected are high-priced veterans, several of them coming off injuries. The Marlins and Rockies, who also are free to sign free agents such as Barry Bonds, Joe Carter, Ruben Sierra and Greg Maddux, have indicated they will not build by spending big bucks.

Most likely, the two new National League teams, who will each draft 36 players, will fill out their rosters with younger, less expensive players. And, if Colorado and Florida decide to go that way

starting with pitching, there will be some good prospects available, such as Cincinnati's Chris Hammond, Montreal's Jeff Fassero and Texas' Scott Chiamparino and Brian Bohannon.

There also is the possibility that the Marlins and Rockies will draft players, then trade them.

Smith led the NL with 43 saves last season for St. Louis. Bell had 112 RBIs for the Chicago White Sox, and Lind, of the Pittsburgh Pirates, recently won his first Gold Glove as the NL's finest fielding second baseman.

Each of the established 26 major league teams will lose one player in the first round of the draft. AL clubs then will be allowed to protect four more players and NL clubs can protect three more.

# Report: Agents look into plots to kill horses, collect insurance

NEW YORK (AP) — As many as 40 owners, trainers, veterinarians and riders have been involved in plots to murder thoroughbred and show horses in order to collect insurance money, according to a report in Sports Illustrated.

Agents of the FBI, Internal Revenue Service and Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms are investigating the schemes and indictments are expected to be issued, the magazine said.

The report, which appears in the Nov. 16 issue of SI, also raises questions about the injury led to Alydar being humanely destroyed two years ago. Alydar was the runner-up to Affirmed in all three 1978 Triple Crown races and later became one of racing's best sires.

The report details how horses were electrocuted by hitman Tommy Burns, known in the horse industry as the Sandman because when he was around, a horse would be put to sleep. Death by electrocution is difficult to detect, according to vets

at the University of Pennsylvania's New Bolton Center, one of the nation's "leading" animal hospitals. Usually, SI said, electrocuted horses were assumed to have died of colic.

Burns faces sentencing Dec. 14 in the death of Streetwise, a show horse who died after suffering a broken leg in his stall. Burns and Harlow Arlie, who SI said used a crowbar to break the horse's right leg, were apprehended by investigators.

# Tampa group sues over loss of deal with Giants

**TAMPA, Fla. (AP)** — The Tampa Bay Baseball Group, rebuffed in its bid for a major league franchise, has filed a lawsuit in Hillsborough County circuit court against the Giants for more than \$100 million, charging "irreparable harm, both monetarily and otherwise."

The suit, filed Tuesday, named as defendants some 60 individuals, including former major league commissioners Bowie Kuhn, Peter Ueberroth and Fay Vincent, team owners and representatives George Steinbrenner, Fred Kohlmann, Jerry Reinsdorf, Peter O'Malley, Bill Giles, Dave Danforth and Wayne Huizenga, and league presidents Bill White and Dr. Bobby Brown and the men

who preceded them, Chub Feeney and Lee MacPhail.

The Tampa Bay Baseball Group contends that its failure to bring a major league franchise to the Tampa Bay area "was due to the continuing interference, breach of trust and misrepresentations by various agents within Major League Baseball, including various commissioners of Major League Baseball, team owners and American and National League presidents."

The suit was filed after National League owners voted Tuesday to block the proposed sale of the San Francisco Giants to the Tampa Bay area.

The 55-page complaint listed four counts, under two theories of recovery. The theories

of recovery are "tortious interference with a contractual relationship" or an advantageous business relationship, and violation of the Florida Antitrust Act of 1980.

Under the first theory, the Tampa Bay Baseball Group alleges that the defendants interfered with two distinct efforts by the Group to secure an ownership interest in an existing major league franchise.

The Group alleges that in 1984, after it had paid \$1.5 million to acquire 42.14 percent interest in the Minnesota Twins and "in the midst of negotiating for an additional 51 percent interest in the team, the defendants, "by threats, intimidation and misrepresentation forced the Group to sell its 42.14 percent interest for less than fair mar-

ket value and to abandon its efforts to acquire the additional 51 percent interest."

Under that same theory, the Group alleges that in 1988, when the Group "followed the explicit directions" of baseball in an effort to acquire and relocate the Texas Rangers to Tampa Bay, the defendants "misled" the Group and "renege[d] its promises and assurances by interfering with business relationships the Group had with then-Rangers owners Eddie Chiles and Eddie Grayford."

"Despite the interference, threats, intimidation and misrepresentations by Major League Baseball," the complaint said, "the Group was told by the defendants to be a 'good sport' and if the Group complied with this 'good sport' mandate — the Group

would be awarded an expansion franchise in the early 1990s. This promise was never kept by the defendants."

Under the second theory, the Group alleges that "at all times material to the Group's pursuit of a Major League Baseball franchise, expansion or otherwise, the defendants were nothing more than a group of conspirators who monopolized trade, commerce and the business of major league baseball with impunity."

Furthermore, the Group alleges that "the intentional, malicious and conspiratorial acts of the defendants is in direct violation with these Florida laws designed to foster competition and prevent monopolistic and conspiratorial activity within the state."

## Championship hopes on the line as BSU, E. Washington collide

The NCAA's Division I-AA football championship playoffs don't start until the end of this month, but as far as Boise State and Eastern Washington are concerned, they start Saturday at Cheney, Wash.

The Eagles host Boise State, with both teams hoping to ease past Idaho and capture the Big Sky Conference championship. But the loser of Saturday's game almost certainly will be eliminated from the playoff.

"I don't think there's any question this is the biggest game we've played," said Dick Zornes of Eastern. "We've put ourselves in a position to win the Big Sky championship, and I think that's a big deal for our football program and our entire athletic program."

No. 20-ranked Eastern Washington (5-1 in Big Sky and 6-3 overall) and Boise State (3-2 and 5-4) both could capture the Big Sky crown over Idaho (4-1 and 7-2). Eastern has to beat the Broncos and then hope Idaho falls to Boise State the

following weekend.

The Eagles could win a co-championship with Idaho if both teams finish 6-1 in league, but the Vandals would get the playoff bid because they beat Eastern Washington earlier in the season.

In the only other Big Sky game Saturday, the 6th-ranked Vandals hope to recover from an embarrassing shellacking by Montana last week, hosting Montana State (2-4, 4-5). Montana, 4-5, is aiming at its fourth straight victory in a non-league game against Division I-AA independent Hofstra (4-5) of New York State.

Northern Arizona hosts Minnesota-Duluth and Idaho State is at home against Southern Utah.

Both Boise State and Eastern Washington coaches said they were encouraged by Montana's big victory over Idaho last week.

"No question about it, it's like getting a new lease on the league race," Boise's Skip Hall said. "We knew it was doubtful, but yet there's always hope. It's a great lesson in college football. Anything can happen."

"It gave us a second life and gave us our season back," receiver Mike Wilson said. "It's a two-game playoff right now and our future's in our hands."

Zornes said up-and-down Boise, which has lost its last two games, should benefit from having last weekend off.

"I think that will give them some benefit to fix a pat and get their feet back on the ground," Boise State is always a good football team and they have some of the better talent in the league," he said.

A young Idaho State team, which has averaged playing 21 freshmen for the last four games, hopes to break a four-game losing streak against Southern Utah. If the Bengals win, it would give the team four victories this season, the most since 1985. Southern Utah is 5-5 and ends the season Saturday at Pocesto.

Idaho's John L. Smith said the Vandals weren't properly prepared to meet Montana last week, and vowed it wouldn't happen again.

## 1 for the Huskies

### Committee: Washington should not forfeit wins

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** — The University of Washington won a major victory Thursday when a Pacific-10 Conference committee recommended the Huskies not forfeit any of the eight games quarterback Billy Joe Hobert played in this season.

Hobert, a redshirt-junior, was declared ineligible Tuesday after an investigation by the Pac-10 and Washington found he had taken \$50,000 in loans from the father-in-law of a friend last spring with no collateral, apparently relying on his pro football earning potential.

"It was a very difficult decision, although it was unanimous," said Douglas Hobbs, one of the three-member panel which made the recommendation. "The critical factor for the committee was its belief that the outcome of athletic contests are best settled on the field. We're better off sticking with the result rather than engaging in hindsight."

Hobert and the Huskies aren't off the hook just yet, though. The recommendation of the committee will be considered by the Pac-10 Council, which meets Sunday in San Francisco.

The Council's verdict will then be forwarded to the presidents and chancellors of the Pac-10 schools, who will make a final decision Tuesday.

"The University of Washington is encouraged with the recommendation of the review committee," Washington athletic director Barbara Helges said in a statement. "We will await the outcome of the Council's recommendation to the presidents and chancellors."

Hobbs, faculty athletic representative at UCLA, said he has no way of knowing what the Council will recommend.

The committee met behind closed doors at a Los Angeles hotel for 4 1/2 hours Thursday before its recommendation was announced. Other committee members beside Hobbs were Ted Leland, athletic director at Stanford, and Patricia Drapela, senior women administrator at Oregon State.

Hobbs said the evidence was not compelling enough to recommend that Washington forfeit the eight games Hobert played in.

"We could not find any evidence at all that Washington knew about the loans and unless we were prepared to say they should have known," Hobbs said.

Hobert said he spent the \$50,000 in three months: using it to pay bills, for entertainment and to buy cars, guns and a stereo.

The investigation found that the loans were improper because — a promissory note signed by Hobert included payback terms based on his future earnings as a professional football player.

— the loans were not from an established family friend;

— Hobert's professional potential played a part in the decision to provide the loans.

NCAA rules prohibit a player from accepting a loan based on his future earning potential as a professional athlete, or from receiving a loan that is not ordinarily available to other students.

The Pac-10 Compliance and Enforcement Committee will consider at a later date the NCAA rule violation.

Washington coach Don James had said he didn't learn of the loans until last Wednesday.

"If they had played him after they knew he was ineligible, those games certainly would have been forfeited. I'm sure," Hobbs said. "The question resolved itself down to whether they have known."

"We'd be very reluctant to punish an institution where it was unknown and unknowable (about the loan). That just isn't the American system."

Hobert can apply to have his eligibility restored for next season, and he said he may do that. He also is contemplating entering April's NFL draft.

## Alabama faces tough schedule to gain chance at winning it all

Although a dream matchup against top-ranked Miami must be appetizing to Alabama, the Crimson Tide has to put that aside for a while.

Saturday night would be a good time to start, because even Georgia State's second-ranked Tide has to clear the first of three critical hurdles if it is to meet the Hurricanes in a national title showdown on New Year's 10th in the Sugar Bowl.

Alabama (9-0) travels to Mississippi State, where the 16th-ranked Bulldogs (7-2) figure to be its most formidable foe this season.

A victory would put Alabama in the first SEC championship game on Dec. 5 at Birmingham. It will take a victory there and another Thanks-

giving Day against Auburn for the Tide to finish 12-0.

"We talked about it during the summer," Derrick Lassic, Alabama's leading rusher, said of a possible national title. "In fact, we've talked about it for quite a while."

"But talk is cheap. We've just got to keep an winning."

—No. 3, Michigan (8-0-1) goes back to the Rose Bowl as Big Ten champion by winning at home against Illinois (5-4).

—No. 6, Washington (8-1) returns to the Rose Bowl as Pac-10 champion should the Huskies win at home against Oregon State (1-7-1). No. 9 Arizona (6-2-1) loses at No. 18 Southern Cal (5-2-1) and No. 21 Washington State lose at No. 15 Stanford.

—No. 24 Hawaii (7-1) would win its first WAC crown and represent the conference at the Holiday Bowl with a victory over San Diego State (4-3-1).

—Unranked Mississippi would sew up a Liberty Bowl berth by beating Louisiana Tech, a Division I-AA team.

Temple (11-8) is at Miami (8-0), Tulane (2-7) at No. 5 Florida State (8-1), No. 7 Nebraska (7-1) at Iowa State (3-6), No. 22 Penn State (6-3) at No. 8 Notre Dame (7-1-1), and No. 10 Syracuse (8-1) at No. 17 Boston College (7-1-1).

## Tennessee could buy out Majors

**KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP)** — University of Tennessee officials wouldn't comment Thursday on published reports that the school may buy out the two years remaining on Johnny Majors' coaching contract.

"Negotiations are going on," school president Joe Johnson said.

Asked if a possible buyout was on the agenda, Johnson said, "We are negotiating and have reached no conclusions."

A report Thursday in The Tennessean citing "two highly placed university sources" said a buyout was among the items being discussed by Johnson, Majors and athletic director Doug Dieckey.

Calls to Majors' office were not returned.

Majors recently returned from heart surgery. Without him, the Volunteers had an unexpected good start to the season, upsetting Florida and Georgia when both were ranked above Tennessee.

When Majors returned, the team won one game with him in the press box and one when he coached from the sidelines. Then the Vols lost to Arkansas, Alabama and South Carolina and fell from No. 4 to No. 24 in the rankings.

The 17-10 loss to archrival Alabama was Tennessee's seventh in a row to the Tide.

Now the team is 5-3, ranked 23rd and virtually eliminated from the Southeastern Conference race entering Saturday's game against Memphis State.

Contract negotiations had begun before Majors had bypass surgery Aug. 25.

Majors, 57, is in his 16th year at Tennessee. In 1988, his contract was extended through the 1994 season. The base contract pay is \$96,000 a year, with a matching amount coming from radio and television fees.

If the university decides to buy out his contract, it would have to pay only the base salary.

Majors, a former star player at Tennessee, left a national championship program at Pittsburgh to a warm welcome home at his alma mater in 1977. Only recently has his status been clouded.

## Players ask judge for free agency

**MINNEAPOLIS (AP)** — Attorneys for Philadelphia defensive lineman Reggie White and several hundred other players asked a federal judge Thursday to declare them free agents after the season.

White was joined as a plaintiff by Pittsburgh linebacker Hardy Nickerson, New Orleans quarterback Mike Buck and former Seattle and Los Angeles Raider defensive back Van McElroy. If Judge David Doty rules that White has a valid class action lawsuit, as many as 605 players who are in the final year of their contracts could be declared free agents as of Feb. 1, 1993.

The players' request comes in the aftermath of the Freeman McNeil lawsuit, in which a Minneapolis jury said in September the league's Plan B free agency system was a violation of antitrust laws.

Players' attorney Jeffrey Kessler told Doty that the league had a cycle of antitrust violations dating back 30 years.

"If violating antitrust laws was an addition, we'd say they were in denial," Kessler said.

NFL attorney Frank Rothman argued that any injunction issued by Doty should only apply to the eight plaintiffs in the McNeil case. He asked the court to retain Plan B until an appeal can be heard.

"If we are right and the court grants free agency to 600 players, chaos," Rothman said. "We can never unassemble that egg."

Doty took the matter under advisement and is expected to rule next week. The judge issued a temporary restraining order in September freeing tight end Keith Jackson and nine other players who were without contracts for 1992.

Kessler also asked Doty to void the 1993 contract of New York Giant defensive back Mark Collins, the only plaintiff in the McNeil case with a contract for next season. Collins signed a two-year deal with the Giants in August, while the trial

was underway. Kessler said Collins will return his \$25,000 signing bonus if Doty voids his contract.

Kessler said White and several hundred other players plan that turned loose agency with four or more years of experience in the league. If such a plan were approved by Doty, 432 players would be free agents after this season, Kessler said.

"Why propose a four-year plan at all?" Rothman responded.

"They must recognize we're entitled to a rule maintaining competitive balance."

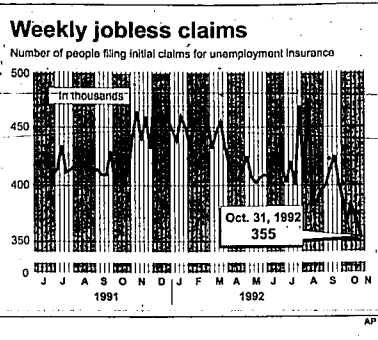
Late-October jobless claims hint at improving outlook

WASHINGTON — The number of Americans filing new claims for jobless benefits and remained under 400,000 for the sixth straight week, the government reported Thursday.

the lowest since claims totaled 354,000 in the week of Aug. 4, 1990. Many analysts had expected claims to rise. Initial claims, which peaked at 530,000 on March 23, 1991, at the depths of the recession, have plummeted less than 400,000 since Sept. 26.

Others say the economy will have to grow faster than the 2.7 percent annual rate in the third quarter to generate substantial job growth. Only 27,000 jobs were created in October, for instance, less than half of September's 72,000 loss.

Missouri attributed its decrease to fewer layoffs in the transportation industry, while New York said it had fewer seasonal layoffs in a variety of industries. There was no explanation for Ohio, California and Iowa.

# Holiday movies:

## Season features gripping biographies, children's titles

LOS ANGELES — After an autumn filled with cinematic coal lumps, Hollywood is set to unwrap its prized holiday movies, including a "Home Alone" sequel and Spike Lee's much-anticipated "Malcolm X."

Other high-profile releases include Steve Martin as an evangelist in "Leap of Faith," Robin Williams in "Toys" and Susan Sarandon and Nick Nolte in "Lorenzo's Oil."

The emphasis on biography is profound. In addition to "Malcolm X," upcoming releases include "Hoffa," a story of the late labor leader, and "Chaplin," with Robert Downey Jr. playing the legendary movie tramp. But there will be fewer films this season than in years past. "This is going to be Christmas light," said D. Barry Reardon, president of distribution for Warner Bros. "There will be 11 films in broad release vs. 13 in 1991."

Among the movies said to have strong Academy Award appeal are the animated feature "Aladdin," "Hoffa," "A Few Good Men," "Lorenzo's Oil" and "Toys." The box office almost certainly will be dominated by "Home Alone 2" and "A Few Good Men," with Tom Cruise and Demi Moore. Possible sleepers include Kevin Costner and singer Whitney Houston in "The Bodyguard" and the rapper-themed "Trespass."

The independents, who typically shy away from their more powerful studio brethren during the holidays, plan to release several titles. Among the best of the art-house lot is "The Crying Game" (Nov. 25), a provocative tale of love and sexuality set against the backdrop of the Irish Republican Army. "Damage," an explicit drama of a father's affair with his son's fiancée, debuts Dec. 16.

Competition throughout the season will be strong. Audiences, no doubt reeling from such contrived dramas as "Under Siege" and "Hero," will be offered a variety of quality, adult-oriented dramas.

The studios have been juggling release dates to take advantage of the second, most-profitable movie-going period behind summer. Their fear is that if a movie performs badly in its opening weekend, it is doomed.

For months, people in Hollywood talked about the showdown between Danny DeVito's labor leader story "Hoffa" and "A Few Good Men," a military courtroom drama starring Tom Cruise.

20th Century Fox ultimately decided to move its "Hoffa" to Dec. 25, a space previously occupied by Walt Disney's "Distinguished Gentleman," featuring Eddie Murphy. That Washington D.C.-themed comedy is now going to debut on Dec. 4.

Gentleman" no longer must face "Trespass," whose stars Ice-T and Ice Cube might have cut into Murphy's black audience.  
By moving "Hoffa" back two weeks, Fox believes it can cash in on the performance of "A Few Good Men." Nicholson has a small part in the latter film, but is a prominent co-star in "Hoffa."  
"If people like Nicholson in 'A Few Good Men,' they'll love him in 'Hoffa,'" said Fox distribution chief Tom Sherak.  
Perhaps the season's most-watched confrontation will be between the Walt Disney Co.'s "Aladdin" and 20th Century Fox's "Home Alone 2: Lost in New York."  
Disney's animated film "Aladdin" already has earned favorable comparison

to the studio's "Beauty and the Beast." That 1991 release is the highest grossing animated film ever, making a staggering \$141 million at North American theaters. "Aladdin" features the voice of Robin Williams in a story adapted from "A Thousand and One Nights."  
"Home Alone 2: Lost in New York" stars Macaulay Culkin in a reprise of the 1990 smash, the third most-popular film of all time with ticket sales exceeding \$285 million. ("Batman" and "Jaws" each made less.)  
Believing "Aladdin" was likely to receive far better reviews than the "Home Alone" sequel, Disney opened the animated film in Los Angeles and New York on Wednesday. "Home Alone 2" will premiere nationwide on Nov. 20. "Aladdin" will debut nationally in 800 theaters on Nov. 25. Another 700 or so

locations will be added Christmas Day.  
"It's the same thing we did with 'Beauty and the Beast,'" said Dick Cook, head of Disney's distribution arm. "The idea is to start the engine, obviously, by hoping that we'll get good critical attention before the wide release."  
"Aladdin" originally was scheduled to premiere Nov. 18, just two days before "Home Alone 2." But Disney executives feared their film wouldn't have enough time to establish itself against the Fox movie.  
Amid all this, Disney will release the children's film "A Muppet Christmas Carol" on Dec. 11.  
Yet no one is doubting the power of the 12-year-old Culkin, who now earns more than \$5 million a movie. Said Disney's Cook: "I'm sure they have a terrific movie and are going to do great."

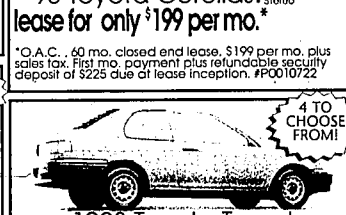
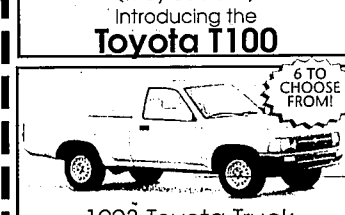

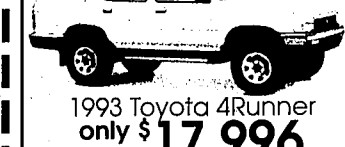

Abby, their child is under 2 years old and the father is a colleague of my fiancé. We both fear it would be rude if we asked the couple to please leave their child at home.

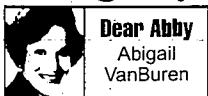
On the other hand, we do not want a crying child to ruin our formal church wedding. What other course of action can we take?

# 'Passenger 57': Is this trip necessary?

As good an actor as Wesley Snipes is—and it is hard to think of many better—he still isn't good enough to save "Passenger 57." How could he be? Though it is refreshing to see an actor of color playing a straight-up action hero, and though Snipes' performance gives this film considerably more kick than it would have had otherwise, it remains a standard-issue thriller, dutifully going where its betters have gone before.

Like its more polished "Die Hard" predecessors, "Passenger 57" (rated R for violence and language) deals with terror in the skies and how one tough hombre takes on the kind of minuscule "wreck" which considers killing 60 people to create a distraction all in a day's work.

Unlike "Die Hard," however, the creative team of "Passenger 57," from director Kevin Hooks to screenwriters David Longhour and Dan Gordon to producer Lee Rich, all have backgrounds that are heavy on the TV side, and it shows. From its abbreviated 84-minute length to its muddled and confusing plotting to its tepid acting, "Passenger 57" plays like a cookie-cutter "Movie of the Week," dead-set against anything that so much as hints at originality.

The major exception to this, obviously, is Wesley Snipes, who, as evincing from "New Jack City" to

"Waterdance" has shown, is incapable of an indifferent performance. Wherever Snipes is on the screen, energetically snapping necks as well as wisecracks like "Always bet on black," "Passenger 57" is more diverting than it has any right to be, but even he is no match for the film's determined ordinariness.

Snipes plays John Cutter, perhaps the world's top anti-terrorism operative, a man who knows both how to do during an airplane hijacking and just how to do it. But rather than being out there fighting the good fight, Cutter, nursing a personal trauma, has "taken himself out of the game." Instead he passes the time teaching feisty stewardesses like Mari Slayton (Alex Datcher) how to handle terrorists and biting her pretty little head off when she miffs the job.

While Cutter is losing his temper, Charles Rane (British actor Bruce Payne) is getting captured by a heavily armed SWAT team. If villainy were an Olympic sport, this cool psychopath, archly nicknamed "The Rane of Terror" and apparently the victim of a rather nasty childhood he can't bear to have anyone mention, would be a shoo-in for the gold. When he says "sit down, shut up or be killed," he is not just making conversation.

After bumping some incense and doing the kind of Oriental meditation

all deadly karate experts have a weakness for, Cutter decides to get back into the swing of things by taking a job as head of security for the mythical Atlantic International Airlines. And, in the kind of coincidence that would cause connoisseurs in Las Vegas to end up sharing a plane with not only that attractive stewardess, but also a heavily guarded Charles Rane as well. As a crew member innocently puts it, "I have a feeling this is going to be a very interesting flight."

The problem with "Passenger 57" is that Rane, for violence and language, is

# Smart hopes program won't evoke sympathy

LOS ANGELES — Jean Smart was concerned her portrayal of a convicted serial killer in the CBS movie "Overkill" might generate sympathy for the woman.

"I have sympathy for her, but I also have sympathy for her victims and their families," Smart said. "The bottom line is no matter what happens you've had in your life, you're still responsible for what you do."

"She didn't get any support as a child. She got nothing... But you also have to look at the havoc and pain she inflicted."

Authorities say Aileen Wuornos, stalked Interstate 75 in South Florida, robbing and killing six middle-aged men in a 12-month period ending in 1990. She has been sentenced to death in four cases, and faces two additional death sentences.

"Overkill," which also stars Park Overall as the roommate and best friend of the killer, airs from 8 to 10 p.m. MST Tuesday on KMYT and other CBS stations.

"I have no idea why they offered the role to me," said Smart, who previously starred on "Designing Women." "She's much shorter than I am. She's 5 foot 2, but people remember her as tall and having dark, dangerous eyes. I think she's filled with an incredible rage. I've always wanted to play a character on the fringe."

Smart said she does not think Wuornos set out to kill, as most serial killers do.

"She claims it was self-defense," she said. "I find that hard to believe. I have the feeling she has justified that to herself or has convinced herself that it's true. I think she must have gotten some satisfaction out of it not to quit. One of the inhuman things is that she not only carried a gun, but rags and a cleaner to wipe up blood and fingerprints."

"Overkill" was filmed on location northwest of Los Angeles near San-

to Paula.

"We didn't go to Florida, and I've had a lot of communications with Aileen," Smart said. "I'm not sure that I would want to. I think I'd prefer that she remain a character I've played. I have to recognize she's based on a real woman. I felt a great responsibility to her, but you have to remind the audience lips is not a documentary."

Smart studied at the University of Washington and began her acting career at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival. She worked in the theater in New York for three years and made her movie debut in "Flashpoint" opposite Tate Williams and Kris Kristofferson.

"She left CBS' "Designing Women" at the end of the 1990-91 season and was replaced by Jan Hooks, who plays her character's sister."

She returned for one episode during the show's sixth season, believing her character would be written out of the series.

"They didn't write her out," Smart said. "I've been asked back, but I think I'd like to return when it goes off the air. It would be great to bring back all the cast — but I think hell would freeze over before that will happen."

Smart's film career has been busy in the past year. She co-starred with Robert DeNiro, Martin Scorsese, Robin Landau, Eli Wallach and Martin Wohl in the feature film "Mistress."

In December, she co-stars with her husband, Richard Gilliland, in the NBC movie "Just My Imagination." "I met my husband when he came on the show to play Annie Potts' boyfriend," she said. They have a son, Connor Gilliland, who is almost 3.

"I've been offered some series, but I want to wait for a while before I make that kind of commitment again," she said.

"It's scary to commit yourself to five years. I may change my mind when my son starts school."

This was a group decision on how this show should be. I think we're all on the same page."

Thomas said "Love & War" creator Diane English arranged for Hancock's mother to fly from Arkansas for the memorial.

# Australia's appetite for sex stretches TV standards

**SYDNEY, Australia** — Thirty-four minutes into "Australia's Naughtiest Home Videos," network executives yanked the plug on the special.

The Nine Network's switchboard had lit up across the country as one raucous clip followed another: a couple having sex in a park, dogs and cats trying to mate with other species, even men on a beach with flaming toilet paper between their buttocks.

But when the American sitcom "Cheers" was hurriedly dropped into the schedule early, the switchboard lit up again — this time with calls from people irate that the titillating video show had come to a premature end.

Australia's appetite for television sex is being stretched to the limit as its networks test how far they can go. Conservative are fighting back by threatening advertisers with boycotts and circulating petitions demanding cleaner viewing.

Supporters of looser standards say people can switch off if they are offended. Critics respond that in today's worldwide world, it is too easy for youngsters to tape a show for later viewing.

The bottom line is that sex often equals high ratings. "When 'Naughty Videos' went dark on Sept. 3, it was pulling in the best figures of the night, nearly double its closest competitor in the 8:30-9:30 p.m. slot.

## Steamy soap leaves little to imagination

**SYDNEY, Australia** — The camera pans the back of a nude woman during the opening credits to "Chances," leaving no doubt about what's to come in Australia's popular late-night soap opera. Depending on perspective, the steamy show is either the most titillating or most mindless example of Australian television's wide-open attitude toward sex. About 600,000 people watch each week, about a quarter of the people with televisions on during its 11 p.m.-midnight time slot.

Just over a minute into a recent episode titled "The Naked and the Dead," one of the two main hunks, Cal, emerged from the bathroom wearing nothing but a towel around his waist and a grin on his unshaven face.

Before the scene ended:

• A woman doffed all to act as a diversion in a

robbery, hammer-and-sickles painted on each cheek of her derriere.

— The other male hunk, Alex, wandered into a house with a surreal all-white motif and saw a bank of TV sets showing him making love to a well-endowed woman.

• Alex was drugged and strapped to a rotating cable, his eyes alert but the rest of him paralyzed. His female captor, wearing a sheer white teddy with matching knee-high boots and hose, found his paralysis did not hamper sexual function.

• Cal disrobed on his boat and crawled in bed with a woman he thought was his girlfriend, only to discover a princess who had fled her husband and liked to be called Poopside. She astutely noted the tattoo on Cal's ear.

Confusing? Sure, but it's not likely many people watch "Chances" for the plot.

but a semineude shoot in Bali and a voice-over about her life. It was the No. 2 show of the week.

Sex on Australian television is nothing new, even without cable television, which has been the trendsetter in the United States. The groundbreaker in Australia was "Number 96," a 1970s soap opera about residents of an apartment building that spiced things up with a bare body now and then.

The current standards for what is permissible took effect in 1986 and involve a self-censorship system enforced by the industry watchdog, the Australian Broadcasting Tribunal. Shows are rated "G" for general audiences, "PG" for parental guidance recommended, "AO" for adults only.

"AO" programs are allowed 8:30 p.m.-5 a.m. every night and noon-3 p.m. on school days. They

may include nudity and discreet or simulated "intimate sexual behavior" if relevant to the plot or program content.

Banned are "explicit sex, sexual violence and the depiction of exploitative or nonconsensual sex as desirable."

Broadcasts of theatrical movies retain virtually all the sex scenes and most of the profanity. Violence is more likely to be trimmed for TV.

In addition to nonexplicit shows like America's "Studs," bad movies with sex themes find an easy audience.

The leering "Ghosts Can't Do It" with Bo Derek dropping all in seemingly every other scene, did well recently. So did "My Tutor," "Joysticks" and other movies usually relegated to the drive-ins and cable TV in the United States.

Even the "Playboy Channel" might have trouble matching the frankness of the magazine show style of "Sex," the titillation of the steamy late-night soap opera "Chances" or the tackiness of "Naughty Videos."

"Sex" was planned as a special before public response led to a series of 10 shows starting last May. They drew an average 1.6 million viewers and a 35 percent share of the televisions turned on in the 9:30-10:30 p.m. period. The program is on hiatus but is expected to return.

Those involved with "Sex" bristle at comparisons with "Naughty Videos" or "Chances" which began the latest wave of pushing limits when it debuted two years ago with bare flesh aplenty.

"We're totally different entities," said Dr. Kerry Phelps, a

general practitioner who serves as medical consultant for "Sex." "We don't consider ourselves steamy."

A typical one-hour episode of "Sex" included segments on why people participate in wet T-shirt and undershirt contests, what to tell children about sex, men's underwear, sex after heart attacks, date rape, abortion and amateur strippers.

Phelps said the blunt language and occasional graphic footage were necessary to reach people who need information, particularly teenagers.

"They want honest information, without ambiguity. Too often, sex education has left people with more questions than answers. So if we're doing something on cancer of the testes, there's no way to tell people what it looks like. You have to show them," she said.

"The support from the medical profession has been unequivocal. We're the people who see the consequences of ignorance."

"Sex" generated more than 900 complaints to the broadcast tribunal, but the panel ruled the show did not violate broadcast standards.

But protests and petitions from church groups and conservative organizations like the Australian Family Association have had some impact. General Motors, Holden, Nestle, Wrigley and other companies told their advertising agencies not to buy spots on episodes of "Sex."

Phelps said she wasn't surprised by the reaction.

"When you're dealing with a subject as sensitive as sexuality, you're going to hit some raw nerves," she said.

# Letterman show spotlights Illinois teacher's experiments

**CHICAGO** — Lee Marek doesn't worry about bombing when he appears as the wacky guest scientist on "Late Night with David Letterman." He's always got his day job — teaching high school chemistry.

Marek, a teacher for almost 20 years, has brought to national television such memorable experiments as the slime cannon and the foam shredder. Not all of them work, but Marek says it's not always his fault.

"You go in there with maybe 10 demonstrations," he said. "They keep changing, their mind every 10 minutes about what you're going to do just so you can fit in the time slot."

Marek, 47, has appeared on Letterman's show five times since the entertainer's staff read about his group called Weird Science — five teachers from different schools who perform science shows.

"We kind of do the MTV of science demonstrations," Marek said. "We've got videos. We've got audios. We've got songs to turn people on to science. ... We show that science can be fun."

On a recent program Marek shot plastic foam through a sander, producing a static electrical charge that was supposed to send

the foam spraying onto the studio audience. But much of the foam ended up clinging to Letterman.

"They wouldn't let me rehearse," protested Marek. "I didn't know they had big fans directed at the stage. So, instead of blowing it into the audience, it blew all over the camera people and Letterman."

How did Marek escape the foam storm? "I saw it coming and left."

Another experiment involved a cannon that launched slime — a gun, gum mixed with Borax — 40 feet into the air.

Marek, honored by the National Science Foundation as Illinois' outstanding science teacher in 1986, routinely performs for his students at Naperville North High School.

"He's just really good at relating to us," said a former student, 16-year-old Albert Hwang. "So, he makes it more fun by throwing in lots of jokes and puns so that when the test time comes around, we'll be able to remember."

Marek says moving back and forth between the classroom and a nationally televised show is no problem for him.

"If a comedian fails on Letterman, he's dead," he said. "If I fail on Letterman, I'm still employed in the morning. I go back to teaching."

Later that week, Marland and Terry met for lunch and talked about a variety of things, never really discussing Terry's coming on board at "World Turns." After feeling each other out, however, Douglas began formulating the character of Royce Keller that very afternoon.

An official offer came shortly thereafter and after some deliberation and negotiation, Terry signed on the dotted line. Of course, the big change for Terry was moving to New York City. When he was 21 and fresh out of college, Terry seriously planned on coming to the Big Apple to make his mark on the Broadway stage. Military service intervened and Terry never got to New York.

As soap opera viewers know, Terry made his mark as Jack Abbott in "The Young and the Restless," earning four Daytime Emmy nominations during the nine years he played the role. Terry joked that Peter Bergman, who took over the role when he left, was more successful in the part than he was. (Bergman won two Emmys back to back.)

After leaving "Y & R," Terry spent a year in the role of Mason Capwell in the now doomed "Santa Barbara." According to printed reports during that period, Terry left the soap after some clashes with the producers. Now, he's starting fresh, creating an interesting character in

a soap that is known to respect good actors.

"When I was signed and knew I was coming to New York, I decided to drive cross country and see some friends along the way. Since I had some time before I had to report to the show, I got into my car and headed east, stopping whenever I wanted to see parts of this country I hadn't before. I also talked to a lot of people and I gave me a sense of reassurance about our country. Despite all the hard times we've been experiencing of late, I think we're going to make it and that gave me a good feeling."

Terry's first priority after settling into the role of Royce Keller on "As the World Turns" is to get to explore New York City and sample all it has to offer in the way of theater, opera, concerts, museums and cabarets.

As *The World Turns* airs from noon to 1 p.m. MST Weekdays on CBS stations.

# What is meant by 'in syndication'?

**Q.** Explain exactly what is meant by "in syndication" or "syndicated." — M.L., Phoenix.

**A.** Syndication is the marketing of programs on a station-by-station basis. Thus, the early evening version of "Wheel of Fortune" can be seen on a CBS station in one city, an ABC station in another and an independent in still another. Talk shows, games, religious shows, movies, children's shows, reruns of shows previously seen on a network, some drama and sports, and program-long advertising are among the programs most widely syndicated. Usually they are seen in the periods when networks don't supply programming for their affiliated stations. But some stations also pre-empt network programs to run a syndicated show. The station makes more money that way. Independent stations often program syndicated shows with syndicated shows. Producing for syndication is an expensive and risky business, so shows are often made on the cheap — one reason there are so many talk shows. Stations prefer syndicated shows to local programming because it costs them less and attracts national advertisers.

**Q.** Do the cast members of "The Heights" play their own music on the show? — K.M., Lake Oswego, Ore.

**A.** They do and they write it, too. "How Do You Talk to an Angel" by Jamie Walters (Alex on the show) is a hit single on Capitol and the original cast album should be a storer by now.

**Q.** I'm curious which amusement park is shown in the opening of "Step By Step" on ABC. — L.A., Lansdowne, Pa.

**A.** It's Magic Mountain in Valencia near Los Angeles.

**Q.** Tell me where I can write Tim Allen of "Home Improvement"? — K.A., Rockwood, Mich.

**A.** Touchstone Television, 500 S. Buena Vista Blvd., Burbank, CA 91521.

**Q.** What happened to "2000 Mailbox Road"? Last I saw Perry was being attacked. Pulcise! — B.W., St. Joseph, Mo.

**A.** "Mailbu" was a limited series and its success caught CBS short. So far, there are no plans to revive it but that could change.

**Q.** What happens to Cheryl Miller, the cute blond who was in "Daktari," the 60s show about Clarence, the Cross-eyed Lion? — H.L., Detroit.

**A.** Miller, now 49, did a soap opera, "Bright Promise"; guest roles on series and TV movies until the late 1970s. She has since retired.

**Q.** When and why did Don Knotts leave "The Andy Griffith Show"? — L.S., Boulder, Colo.

**A.** After five seasons, 1960-65, Knotts departed to work on his own variety series, which finally made it on the air in 1970 but lasted only a season. Jim Nabers, who was Gomer Pyle, had the back: He spent just over a season in the "Griffith" show, 1963-64, then left for "Gomer Pyle, U.S.M.C.," which was seen 1964-70.

**Q.** I'm a fan of "Star Trek" and "Star Trek: The Next Generation." I'm a senior and can't go to "Star Trek" conventions. Do they have any place where you can get a replica of the ship and other things seen on the show every week? — V.J., Walled Lake, Mich.

**A.** "Star Trek" merchandise has been a big business for years. Check the toy and hobby stores for everything from models of the Tribbles to the Starship Enterprise, including blow-up plastic models big enough to make a little kid think it's real. In the near future, there are plans for "Star Trek" stores-in-shopping malls across the country.

**Q.** Tell me more about William Ragsdale of "Herman's Head." — L.L., Winter Park, Fla.

**A.** Ragsdale, 29, is from Arkansas, graduated from Hendrix College in Conway, Ark., and studied acting at Drama Studio London in Berkeley, Calif. In 1985, he landed a role in "Bilex Blues" on Broadway. Next came movies like "Mannequin 2," "Fright Night" and "Fright Night 2." He spent his 1992 "Herman" hiatus on Broadway singing.

**Q.** My sister and I have been debating who does the voice of Lisa on "The Simpsons." She says it's Louise from "Herman's Head." I say it's someone else. Who's right? — T.P., Coatsville, Pa.

**A.** She is. Yearside Smith is Lisa and Louise. Smith has said that she thinks her voice as Lisa is "unintentionally different" than her own in "Herman's Head."

**Q.** I've wondered for years what happened to Dawn Menzer, a k a Lori Martin of the TV series "National Velvet." — Mrs. K.A.O., Chesapeake, Va.

**A.** After the series, seen 1960-62, Martin did some TV guest appearances. She was also in the original 1962 "Cape Fear." She quit to go to college and be with her ailing mother. An attempt to get back in the business a few years later was unsuccessful. She married and retired.

**Q.** Give some information on Brad Pitt. I loved him in "Thelma and Louise." — L.S., Wichita Hills, Texas.

**A.** William Bradley Pitt was born in Oklahoma, Dec. 18, 1965, and raised in Springfield, Mo. He studied journalism at the University of Missouri but gave it up for acting. He landed a small part in "Dallas" in 1986. He also did the byline soap "Another World." He did several minor movies before making audiences take notice as the hitchhiker in "Thelma and

**Louise.** His latest film is "A River Runs Through It" and his current significant other is Juliette Lewis ("Cape Fear").

**Q.** Give me some background on my old favorite Clark Gable: When he was born, when he died and his first and last movies. — L.K., Philadelphia, Pa.

**A.** William Clark Gable was born in 1901, died in 1960. He was an extra in several movies in 1924 but made his real debut in "The Painted Desert" in 1931. "The Misfits" with Marilyn Monroe in 1961 was his last movie.

**Q.** My son and I recently saw "Walking Tall." He says I'm wrong that Joe Don Baker did only the first movie and others did the rest. — D.C., Des Moines, Iowa.

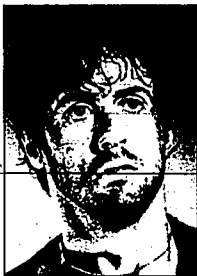

Friends have suggested that De Havilland, who's living in Paris and doesn't need the money, tackle some comedy roles along the lines of one of the dotty sisters in "Arsenic and Old Lace."

# Where can I find a winner, loser list for college world series?

**Q: I'd like to know where I could get the complete list of winners and losers of the College World Series, NCAA hockey championships and NCAA volleyball championships.**

**A:** Your best bet is to write the NCAA headquarters at 6201 College Blvd., Overland Park, Kan., 66211-2432.

**Q: My son umpires adult amateur baseball, and there's a play on which I need clarification.**

No one on base, no outs. The batter clearly hits a triple into the gap in left-center; however, once on third base he calls time out and heads back to second base and tells the umpire, my son, that he missed the bag at second. At that point, the umpire sends the runner back to third, play is resumed and of

course, the opposing team throws to second and the umpire calls the runner out for missing the bag.

After the game, I asked my son why he sent the runner back to third. As he interprets the rule: The runner must occupy the base he was on when time was called; hence, the runner was called out for missing the bag, which no one saw until he admitted his guilt. What would be the official ruling in major league baseball? Did my son

make the right call?

**A:** Any major league baserunner who voluntarily gives up third base for second might as well keep running to his organization's Triple-A park.

Your son's call was correct. According to Rule 7.10 of the Baseball Rule Book: "When the ball is dead, no runner may return to touch a missed base." The runner should either have remained at third, hoping no one noticed his mistake, or returned to second on his own,

without calling time.

**Q: Some old golf scorecards carry the words "styptic measure" and were six inches wide. What was a styptic and when was it discontinued?**

**A:** Playing the styptic was a tradition in match play. If a ball, for instance, was in your line between your ball and the cup on the green, you had to chip over his ball or put around it. If your opponent's ball was within six inches of your ball, or it was within six inches of

the hole, you had the option of asking him or her to mark it until you had putted. Scorecards were exactly six inches in width and were used as a measure. The rule was abolished in 1952.
