# Milner Dam begins 2nd life with new power plant, spillway

MILNER — A chilly wind buffeted representatives of the Twin Falls and North Side canal companies and Idaho Power Co. on the speakers' platform.

Former U.S. Sen. James McClure delivered a short dedication speech with the rebuilt Milner Dam and its modern spillway, gleaming in new concrete, in the background.

North Side Canal Co. board member Bob Barks asked the gathered crowd to pray for rain — and it started later in the day.

Joe Marshall, chairman and CEO of Idaho Power, credited former company vice president Logan Lanham with the idea — a three-way wedding among the utility and the two canal companies — of building a power plant in conjunction with the dam.

McClure, who had flown in from Phoenix for the occasion, praised the

vision of the pioneers who put the plentiful water together with fertile land and made the Magic Valley what it is today.

The reconstruction and the new power plant dedicated Thursday are a tribute to that vision, McClure said.

Milner Dam was completed in 1905, and water from the dam began flowing into a thousand miles of canals and laterals on March 1 of that year.

The same night Shoshone Falls dried up as the water flowed out to irrigate more than 260,000 acres. Today water diverted at Milner irrigates nearly half a million acres.

In 1988 a dam safety inspection showed the dam could fail during an earthquake. The cost to make it safe was about \$11 million — a steep price for the canal companies' 7,500 shareholders.

So the irrigators got together with Idaho Power, which agreed to repair the dam and build a 57.5-megawatt power plant about 1/2 miles downstream.

Royalties from the hydro project would repay the cost of the dam repairs.

The new power plant license required a 200-cubic-foot-per-second flow through the dam. Idaho Power built an 800-kilowatt dam to take advantage of this flow.

Downstream the utility has built a two-unit plant. The smaller unit has a capacity of 11.5 megawatts of power and the larger has a 46-megawatt capacity.

A megawatt is 1 million watts. Water not needed for irrigation — up to 5,200 cfs — is run through the power plant from the Twin Falls Canal Co.'s widened main canal — now effectively a part of the Milner reservoir.

One cubic foot per second equals 448 gallons per minute.

Buses hauled the curious from the power plant to the dam and past the newly created wetlands, created to compensate for wetlands destroyed by the construction.

# Boise company offers private-sector solution to county's landfill problem

TWIN FALLS — A Boise company plans to build a \$3 million to \$4 million landfill and solid waste facility south of Twin Falls that could take trash from the Magic Valley and possibly beyond.

Dispose-All, Inc. has no contracts to accept waste at the landfill, although company officials have approached Twin Falls County and city, as well as other Magic Valley counties.

But if they build it, trash will come, company President Doug Lonow said.

"We're in a foot race. The first facility to open is ultimately going to get the Magic Valley's trash," Lonow said at a news conference Thursday afternoon.

The company plans to buy a 600-acre parcel 12 miles south and 2 miles west of Twin Falls. The land is owned by Bill Loughmiller.

The landfill could answer the area's solid waste needs, without raising taxes and would employ a user-pay method, Lonow said. That's more fair than an across-the-board solid waste fee because people would pay according to how much garbage they produce, he said.

The cost per ton of this landfill would compare favorably with the costs of a publicly owned facility once tax funding is taken away, Lonow said. He estimated a cost of \$41 a ton to landfill trash.

But at least one area resident, Mary Jones, 2684 East 2700 North, opposes the plan.

"I think it's going to be hideous. ... I'm against it," she told Lonow.

Jones said her property abuts the proposed area and she is worried about mice, rats, flies, odors and the landfill being an eyesore.

But Lonow said the landfill will take up only 135 acres. The whole parcel will be lined with trees with a 500-foot buffer between the landfill and adjacent property. The buffer zone would be farmed, he said.

"All you're going to see is trees," Lonow said.

"How big of trees will you plant?" Jones asked.

# Trade talks falter

WASHINGTON — Senior U.S. and European trade officials broke off talks Thursday night but promised to meet again in time to avert a transatlantic trade war after Dec. 5.

That's when the United States is scheduled to slap 200 percent punitive tariffs on \$300 million worth of European imports.

They said good progress had been made in daylong negotiations.

Walking out of Blair House, where the negotiations were held, both U.S. Trade Representative Carla A. Hills and European Community Trade Commissioner Frans Andriessen issued terse, upbeat and nearly identical statements saying there had been progress toward solving a five-year-old dispute over EC subsidies to oilseeds producers that cost American farmers \$1 billion a year in lost sales.

"We are quite close together. We are going to continue to work," said Hills. She added that both sides needed "some other data" to conclude the talks.

EC officials flew back to Europe Thursday night as scheduled and neither they nor aides to Hills would say when or where the next meeting is to take place.

They are negotiating against a tight deadline, with the European Union threatening to retaliate against U.S. imports if the United States imposes punitive tariffs on 15 days on European products, largely white wine from France, Germany and Italy.

This could quickly escalate because Hills is ready to add another \$700 million worth of European products to the retaliation list if there is no solution to the oilseeds dispute.

On a positive note, there were signs that the negotiations ranged beyond the oilseeds issue in an attempt to jump-start stalled world free-trade talks, which have been deadlocked for two years over payments by European governments to their farmers. Bringing other issues into the discussions would placate the French.

# France condemns U.S. flag burning

PARIS — The government on Thursday condemned the burning of an American flag outside the U.S. Embassy as angry farmers staged another anti-U.S. protest and threatened stronger actions if their subsidies are cut more.

Protesting U.S. pressure for new cuts in European Community farm subsidies, about 200 farmers massed outside the U.S. consulate in Bordeaux and threw fistfuls of corn at police guarding the building. They later dispersed peacefully.

On Wednesday, 300 farmers clashed with riot police outside the U.S. Embassy in Paris, causing about 20 injuries. They later reneged through a nearby McDonald's restaurant and overturned several tables.

During the protest, the farmers burned an American flag and speared the remains with a pitchfork.

# Astronomers get best picture yet of black hole

WASHINGTON — Astronomers surveying a small group of bright, nearby galaxies with the Hubble Space Telescope said Thursday that they had struck intergalactic paydirt.

They have the best snapshot yet of a huge clouds of dust and gas that may be spiraling into a black hole.

And if NASA's 1993 Space Shuttle mission to repair the Hubble succeeds, astronomers plan to hunt inside the frisbee-shaped cloud for what could be the first direct evidence that black holes exist.

"We haven't seen a black hole itself," cautioned Dr. Walter J. Jaffe, an American astronomer at the Leiden Observatory in the Netherlands, who led the observation. "But we've seen as close to a black hole as we've ever seen before."

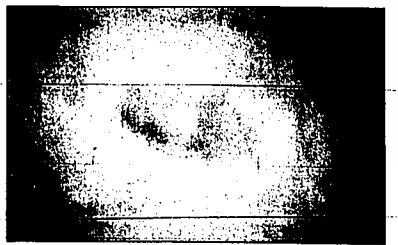
"It's something that's almost too good to be true," said Bruce Margon, chairman of the astronomy

department at the University of Washington, who studied the new data. He called the image "almost an artist's conception" of the region surrounding a black hole.

A black hole is a dimensionless point in space so tightly packed with matter that nothing, not even light, can escape the grip of its gravity. It sits in the center of an "event horizon," a sphere of absolute darkness where, once light or matter falls in, it can never escape.

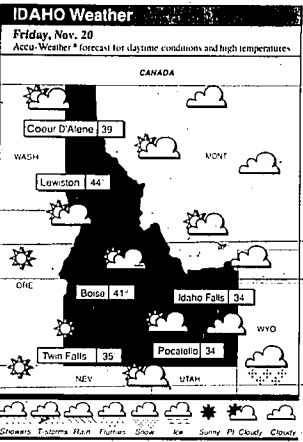
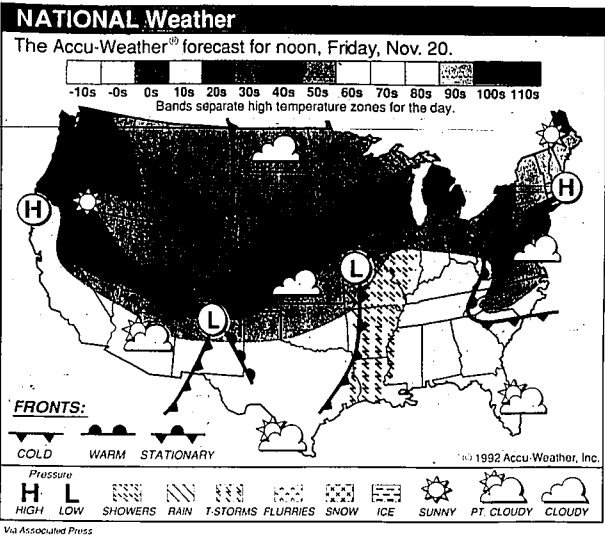
Working with Holland C. Ford of Johns Hopkins University and other researchers, Dr. Jaffe pointed Hubble at the core of a galaxy in the Virgo cluster of about 3,000 galaxies, located about 60 million light years away.

Astronomers already knew that the elliptically-shaped galaxy, called NGC 4261, produces a lot of radio energy and is spouting out two enormous jets of very hot material in opposite directions, like a tube of toothpaste open at both ends.

### Heavy rains drench Texas; snow buries Cascade Range

Strong thunderstorms dumped more than 7 1/2 inches of rain over parts of south-central Texas on Thursday. Heavy snow fell in the Northwest.

Flood warnings were posted for portions of central and southern Texas. Flash flood watches went up over the northern part of the state.

The thunderstorms produced nearly 7 1/2 inches of rain at Floresville, 6 1/2 inches at Stockdale and 5 1/2 at Pleasanton, all in Texas. Stranded motorists were rescued from the flood waters in Atascosa and Wilson counties.

A cold front moving eastward was expected to reach northwest Utah by late Thursday. Up to 4 inches of snow had fallen in the passes of the Washington Cascades with up to 8 inches reported in the Cascades of Oregon.

Rain extended over the northern half of the Pacific Coast at midday. Rain showers and thunderstorms also prevailed over parts of the Plains, the Mississippi valley, the lower Ohio Valley and the mid-Atlantic states.

Temperatures at mid-afternoon ranged from 20 degrees at Caribou, Maine, to 84 degrees at McAllen, Texas.

# Judge rules Lafferty incompetent to stand trial again for murders

PROVO, Utah (AP) — A judge ruled Thursday that self-proclaimed prophet Ronald Lafferty is incompetent to stand trial a second time on charges he killed his sister-in-law and her baby in 1984.

Fourth District Judge George E. Ballif's decision came two hours after a competency hearing in which two of three mental health experts said Lafferty suffers from serious mental illness and is incapable of assisting in his own defense.

Ballif ordered Lafferty to the Utah State Hospital, where he will remain unless he recovers and is deemed able to stand trial.

Lafferty, 50, is charged in the deaths of his sister-in-law, Brenda Wright Lafferty, 24, and her 15-month-old daughter, Erica, on July 24, 1984, in their American Fork apartment. Brenda Wright Lafferty was a native of Kimberly, Idaho.

He was convicted in 1985 and sentenced to death for the crimes, which he claimed were committed after God told him and his brother, Dan, to "remove" his sister-in-law and two other Utah County residents.

The 10th Circuit Court of Appeals, however, ruled in March

that the trial judge had used the wrong standard in determining Lafferty's competence and remanded the case for a new trial. The appellate judges said Lafferty's religious delusions could have indicated incompetence.

Lafferty's attorneys have long claimed he was delusional and could not help in his defense.

Defense attorney Mike Espino, who has defended Lafferty since his arrest, called Thursday's ruling just "I think it's right," he said. "I don't disagree with it at all."

Court-appointed psychologists Robert Howell and Phillip Washburn, both of whom have evaluated Lafferty several times since 1984, said Lafferty's mental illness and the brain damage rendered him incapable of fully understanding his situation.

"Howard said it is likely that Lafferty understands the facts and the court process. But Lafferty, Howard said, insists his acts were religious, not criminal.

Dr. Louis Moech, a psychiatrist who examined Lafferty in one lengthy interview last summer, said Lafferty is competent "in a limited sense" although he does exhibit signs of mental illness.

"He does have major mental illness, but the symptoms seem to be in remission right now," Moech said.

All three believe Lafferty would benefit from medication such as tranquilizers, antidepressants and antipsychotics.

At one point, Lafferty, wearing a jail jumpsuit and handcuffs, turned to a deputy and said the only medication he is interested in taking is cocaine.

Espino said it isn't likely that Lafferty will cooperate with doctors who want to medicate him.

"I think that is the key to the thing in order to see great improvement in a short length of time," he said. "But I think they will first have to convince him that he is mentally ill before he will take medicine without being forced."

## Allen, Farrow agree on terms for son's visits; quick flap arises

NEW YORK (AP) — Woody Allen reached an agreement with his former lover, Mia Farrow, under which he can see his 4-year-old bi-racial son, Farrow's lawyer said Thursday.

Farrow's attorney, Eleanor Alter, said the boy, Satchel, arrived at Allen's apartment building for a scheduled two-hour visit Thursday and found his father talking to a "60 Minutes" crew. Satchel's babysitter took him back to Farrow's, she said.

Farrow's lawyer said she was trying to use the child as a "prop" for the interview, Alter said. The interview

was scheduled for air Sunday.

But Leslee Dart, spokeswoman for Allen, said that no visitation had been planned for Thursday.

"This was merely an attempt on the part of Ms. Farrow to fabricate an excuse to prohibit Mr. Allen from seeing his son," she said.

Alter said she told Allen's lawyers that he could see Satchel only if he got a court order or worked out a formal agreement with Farrow.

"She said a formal agreement was required, but wouldn't disclose details. She said it will be signed Friday."

Four-foot trees to start with, Lomow replied.

Jones said her property sits [12 to 20 feet above the lowest part of the land] and 4-foot trees wouldn't help her.

"We may have to bring in a tree digger and put in larger trees," Lomow said.

Jones also asked if the company had a designated access route to the landfill and Lomow said as of now, no. But that might be worked out.

The facility would include a community recycling center and areas for composting, wood processing, dry rubble, rubber and contaminated soil, he said.

"It will be the first of the kind that we know of in America today," Lomow said.

Dispose-All hopes to finance the project through a privately issued pollution control bond, he said. This would offer tax incentives to investors, but Congress must reauthorize pollution control bonds in next session, he said.

Dispose-All can afford to build the facility and let it sit until

customers come, Lomow said. But the company cannot guarantee that it would not solicit or take waste from areas outside the Magic Valley.

"It is not our intention to solicit out-of-region waste," Lomow said. "Our waste shed is the Magic Valley."

Lomow doubted that Twin Falls County or the Southern Idaho Regional Solid Waste District can open new landfills by the Oct. 9, 1993, deadline under new federal rules. He also doubted that cost figures he's seen from the region and county are accurate.

"Although, I have much more confidence in the region's numbers," he said.

Dispose-All operates trash-hauling and waste management businesses in Boise, Oklahoma and California. The company is family owned, he said.

Twin Falls County residents will be receptive to a private company managing the county's trash if it can be done as cheaply as a public landfill, Lomow said.

"I really think that we'll be proven to be right."

# Clinton promises 'open door' to both parties in Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — President-elect Clinton paid a whirlwind visit to Capitol Hill on Thursday, pledging an open door to Democrats and Republicans alike to "meet them halfway" on an early agenda of economic revival and health-care reform.

"I think we're off to a good start," Clinton said after 6½ hours of meetings on Capitol Hill and as congressional leaders from both parties nodded in agreement. "I'm excited by it."

Clinton also met with Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, for a wide-ranging briefing on military, national security and foreign policy issues.

Powell reiterated his opposition to lifting the ban on homosexuals in the

military, but said he would help implement the change if Clinton kept his promise to reverse the ban.

"I'm very pleased that he has said he will move carefully in full consultation with military leaders and others who have an interest in this matter," Powell said in Pennsylvania before returning to Washington for the meeting.

Clinton was winding up a busy two-day visit to Washington, his first since winning the Nov. 3 election. His stay was rich with symbols not only of how Clinton plans to govern but of how he hopes to keep in touch with one everyday folks while leading the nation.

In one 24-hour stretch, Clinton's stops included: a White House meeting with President Bush, a visit

to a crime-scarred city neighborhood, an elegant dinner party, a stay in a posh hotel, a job past Washington's monuments and into McDonald's, a visit with commuters on a city bus and meetings in the Capitol with lawmakers.

As Clinton captured the capital spotlight, a host of transition aides quietly went to work on Capitol Hill and throughout the city. In addition, several Clinton economic advisers met with congressional staff.

The Arkansas governor came to Capitol Hill carrying a promise of bipartisan cooperation and left predicting lawmakers would reciprocate.

"We have to pursue a different course of growing this economy,

creating more jobs, raising incomes and having a disciplined plan to reduce the deficit," Clinton said. "I think if we work hard at it, we can have bipartisan cooperation."

He sought to balance such optimism with a reminder that some problems facing the country are "of mind-bending complexity." Said Clinton: "The sense I have from the American people is ... they don't expect miracles of us, but they do expect progress."

To court Congress, Clinton had breakfast with Democratic leaders, lunch with a bipartisan group of legislators and a handful of private meetings with senior legislators from both parties.

Clinton said his challenge was "to present a credible program and work

with them and meet them halfway."

Leaders from both parties said they shared his hope for bipartisanship.

"This will be an era of unprecedented communication and cooperation between the Congress and the president," said House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt of Missouri.

"I'd give him credit for being realistic," said Senate Republican leader Bob Dole, noting that Clinton stressed economic stimulus would have to be balanced with deficit reduction. "I think he knows he's got some constituencies out there that are going to have to hold their breath for a while."

Clinton said he hoped to encourage quick passage of his economic stimulus package by getting it to

Congress by the time he takes office in January so that "any wrinkles and problems" could be quickly addressed.

## Barbara tells Hillary during tour: Avoid reporters 'like the plague'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Barbara hugged Hillary, showed her around the White House and cautioned about one downside of living there: Reporters.

"Avoid this crowd like the plague," said Mrs. Bush, gesturing to the reporters and photographers crowded together on the South Lawn. "If they quote you, make damn sure they heard you."

"That's right," Mrs. Clinton said with a hearty laugh. "I know that feeling already."

The first lady had waited with her dogs, Mollie and Ranger, outside the South Portico. Mrs. Clinton's limousine stopped several feet away. She stepped out, patted the dogs and walked to greet Mrs. Bush.

The women brushed cheeks, held hands as they walked toward the entrance and put their arms around one another as they stepped inside. They toured the Executive Mansion with no aides or reporters along for about an hour.

As she waited for Mrs. Clinton, the first lady answered reporters' shouted questions about her recent house-hunting trip to Houston.

"I looked at 21 houses, decided to build, talked to the architect and have the plans," Mrs. Bush said of the couple's intent to build on a lot they own.

In the meantime, Mrs. Bush said, she and her husband will rent a home after they leave the White House Jan. 20.

For the Clintons and their 12-year-old daughter, Chelsea, the move will mean much more room

than they've had for 12 of the last 14 years. In Little Rock, the private quarters of the governor's mansion have 1,800 square feet two bedrooms, four bathrooms, a den and a sitting room.

In Washington, the living quarters of the White House have 14,000 square feet.

The White House has 29 fireplaces, three elevators and hundreds of rooms, including the Lincoln bedroom and the Yellow Oval Room with its breathtaking view of the Washington Monument and the Jefferson Memorial.

## Bishops move on sex molesting

WASHINGTON (AP) — Roman Catholic bishops on Thursday toughened their stand on ousting sex-molesting priests and pledged care and help for victims.

Citing the "pain, anguish and sense of alienation felt by the victims," the bishops vowed a "healing ministry" to them and their families and asked firm action against clergy sex offenders.

It was the first joint policy declaration by the bishops on a problem that has surfaced in numerous dioceses, involving a growing number of priests and victimized youngsters.

"It just can't be tolerated," said

Archbishop Daniel E. Pilarczyk of Cincinnati, pointing the blame at a new conference at the close of the bishops' four-day meeting here.

**Defense contends spy chief didn't lie**

WASHINGTON — Former CIA spy chief Clair E. George had some memory lapses, but never lied to Congress about his knowledge of the Iran-Contra affair, his lawyer contended Thursday as George's second criminal trial neared an end.

An Iran-Contra prosecutor portrayed a different Clair George: one who testified falsely to hide the roles of key players in the sale of arms to Iran and the military resupply of the Nicaraguan Contras.

George is accused of lying to Congress and a grand jury. His first trial ended in a hung jury last August. Prosecutors working for Iran-Contra Independent Counsel Lawrence E. Walsh are trying again to convict the man who headed CIA spy operations from 1984-87.

As a critic of retired CIA employees who support George looked on, an unnamed defense lawyer Richard Hilsey hammered at the credibility of the government's chief witness, former CIA official Alan D. Fiers. Fiers, who testified George lied to Congress, has pleaded guilty to lying in congressional testimony.

**Investigation focuses on contractor**

WASHINGTON — Two federal investigations into alleged Superfund fraud are examining a former accounting clerk's contention that his boss, at the firm's largest contractor ordered him to lie to government auditors, according to two sources familiar with the probe.

The Environmental Protection Agency and a House subcommittee are separately investigating the clerk's allegations regarding the contractor, CH2M Hill Inc., as part of a larger inquiry into alleged abuse of the EPA's Superfund, according to the sources, who declined to be identified by name. "It is a very serious matter, and the subcommittee is pursuing it," one congressional source said Wednesday.

The company has denied any wrongdoing.

**Corp of Engineers looks to cut costs**

WASHINGTON — The Army Corps of Engineers will slash 2,600 jobs and close division offices in five major cities in a nationwide belt-tightening, officials announced today.

The Corps division offices will be closed in Chicago, Dallas, New York, Omaha and San Francisco, the Corps said in a statement.

The work of those offices will be performed in restructured offices in Boston, Atlanta, Cincinnati, Vicksburg, Miss., Portland, Ore. and Honolulu, officials said.

The Corps is the nation's largest engineering agency with about 40,000 civilian and military employees. The cuts were brought on by the nation's budget crunch and resulting pressure on the Pentagon to slim down.

**Vietnamese reportedly sought asylum**

TACOMA, Wash. — A U.S. Senate committee is investigating a report that Vietnam's ambassador sought United Nations tried to defect earlier this year and provide information on missing American servicemen in Vietnam.

The Corps is the nation's second-ranking diplomat in the United States, was recalled to Vietnam this summer after his defection attempt was rebuffed or bungled by U.S. officials, Robert Egan, an American friend of Car's, said Thursday.

At the time, Car was one of two Vietnamese ambassadors accredited to the United Nations. Many countries have more than one representative.

The Senate Select Committee on POW-MIA Affairs is investigating the allegation and trying to learn Car's fate, said Lisa Stockton, a spokeswoman for Sen. Bob Smith, R-N.H. Smith is vice chairman of the POW committee.

**Judge to hear AIDS exposure case**

HOLMA, La. — A state judge scheduled a Dec. 2 hearing on a constitutional challenge to a law against intentionally exposing anyone to the AIDS virus.

The American Civil Liberties Union brought the challenge in the case of St. Katherine Gamberella, who was convicted Wednesday of intentionally exposing Delta Trowler to the virus during sex.

Gamberella, 28, could get up to 10 years in prison for violating the 5-year-old Louisiana law, which the ACLU claims is unconstitutionally vague and violates privacy rights.

Twenty-five states have laws against transmitting or exposing others to the AIDS virus.

**Jury clears Alabama governor's aide**

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — A jury convicted an informant of lying to the FBI when she said Gov. Guy Hunt's press secretary wanted to buy 11 pounds of cocaine.

Hilda Teague was convicted Wednesday of falsely telling FBI agents she met with the Hunt aide, Terry Abbott, three times this year to arrange the drug buy for \$145,000. Her claims came amid an ongoing ethics investigation of Hunt.

**President's mother, Dorothy Bush, 91, dies; funeral set for Monday**

GREENWICH, Conn. (AP) — Dorothy Bush, a senator's wife who taught her son George with "generous measures of both love and discipline" and lived to see him elected to the White House, died Thursday. She was 91.

Mrs. Bush, who had suffered a stroke, died shortly after 3 p.m. MST at the family home here, said spokesman Marlin Fitzwater in Washington. President Bush had flown here from Washington on Thursday morning to be with his mother but was back in the capital when she died.

Fitzwater said private funeral services for Mrs. Bush will be Monday morning in Greenwich. The president will attend.

After her son was elected in 1988, Mrs. Bush said: "I've been ready to have him be president, since he chose

to work for it, but I pray to God for him because it's the toughest job in the world."

President Bush said his mother and father, the late Sen. Prescott Bush, were the most important people in his life. His 1987 autobiography, "Looking Forward," is dedicated to both parents.

"They believed in an old-fashioned way of bringing up the family — generous measures of both love and discipline," he wrote.

"Dad taught about us about duty and service," Bush wrote. "Mother taught us about dealing with life on a personal basis, relating to other people."

Just before he took the oath of office as president on Jan. 20, 1989, Bush spotted his mother on the platform, leaned over to give her a kiss and said, "Many of our family

are here and they all, as does this son, worship the ground she walks on."

The president regularly visited his mother at her home here or her winter home in Jupiter Island, Fla.

Mrs. Bush's 90th birthday in July 1991 was an occasion for a rare reunion of all five of her children at the family compound in Kennebunkport, Maine. Gathered with President Bush were his sister, Nancy Ellis, and brothers Prescott Jr., Jonathan and William "Bucky" Bush.

"Everyone in this family — young and old, direct and indirect relations — looks up to her," the president said. "I have a feeling that that's still true in a lot of families in this country."

Mrs. Bush was born July 1, 1901, in Kennebunkport, a daughter of wealthy Midwestern businessman George Herbert Walker. Walker, an

**Smoking bans choke tobacco industry profit**

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Workplace smoking restrictions in California cost the tobacco industry \$203 million per year in lost sales, and a nationwide workplace smoking ban could cost cigarette makers \$4 billion, a study says.

The study, based on interviews with 24,000 Californians, found that 13.7 percent of workers smoked in workplaces despite bans, compared with 20.6 percent who smoked where there were no restrictions.

Restrictions also encouraged smokers to smoke fewer cigarettes, researchers found.

Smokers in smoke-free workplaces smoked an average of 296 packs of cigarettes per year, compared with an average consumption of 341 packs per year by smokers in workplaces with no restrictions.

Michael Eriksen, director of the federal Office on Smoking and Health, said the findings were consistent with previous studies in Australia and in the United States.

He emphasized the importance of the finding — that restrictions encouraged smokers to smoke less.

"One of the important things to remember is that the less someone

smokes, the easier it is for them to quit," he said. "We're all for that. We want to shrink the market."

Coincidentally, Thursday was the American Cancer Society's annual Great American Smokeout, when smokers are asked to stop smoking for one day.

The \$4 billion figure is, however, far surpassed by cigarette makers' revenues.

For example, Philip Morris, the largest U.S. tobacco company, reported revenues on tobacco profits up 6.3 percent to \$19.15 billion in the first nine months of 1992. That represented a profit of \$5.43 billion in nine months.

Tobacco companies "are raising prices and boosting efficiency, and consumption isn't dropping that much," said Jack Maxwell, an analyst who follows the tobacco industry for Wheat First Butcher and Singer in Richmond, Va.

The study, by Stanton A. Glantz and Tracey J. Woodruff, of the University of California, San Francisco, noted that workplace smoking restrictions protect nonsmokers from the hazardous effects of other people's smoke.

**Dec. 2 set for year's last shuttle flight**

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA has set a Dec. 2 launch date for the year's eighth and last shuttle flight, a military mission by Discovery.

Launch was scheduled for 4:59 a.m. MST. Five astronauts, all military men, will deploy a classified satellite on the first day of the seven-day flight. Everything else about the mission is open to public scrutiny.

John Pike, director of the Federation of American Scientists' space policy project, said the payload is believed to be a Lacrosse radar-imaging satellite.

The Defense Department said this will be the last time a shuttle is used to carry a major military satellite.

**Task force touts launch system**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A White House task force said Thursday that a government decision not to develop a new space launch system would guarantee higher costs, "less reliability, less safety and higher risks" for space flight.

"Without the introduction of a new launch vehicle that meets cost and performance goals, we can write off future U.S. competitiveness in

this area," the task force reported to Vice President Dan Quayle. It recommended development of a new family of rockets, to be called Spacefliter, capable of lifting light to medium-heavy cargoes — 20,000 to 50,000 pounds — into near-Earth orbit. The rockets would be used for manned operations as well.

Eventually, Spacefliter would replace the space shuttle.

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## CDC urges schools to help stop spread of AIDS among teen-agers

ATLANTA (AP) — The high number of American teen-agers having risky sex is slowly dropping and schools are increasing education about AIDS, federal health authorities reported Thursday.

There's no way to know how much of the drop in teen sex is because of school efforts. Still, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention urged schools to begin education about HIV, the virus that causes AIDS, in kindergarten and intensify it by the ninth grade.

"HIV education can be most effective when it's integrated as part of a comprehensive, kindergarten-through-grade 12 health

education program," said Dr. Lloyd Kolbe, the CDC's director of adolescent and school health.

"It's just as important as science and math."

That doesn't mean discussing condoms with first-graders, Kolbe said.

"In the early grades it's important that young people start to understand that they can influence their own health," he said, advocating that courses gradually become more specific. "You don't come into the 12th grade and provide two days of HIV education and expect that to be sufficient."

Nationwide, school systems and parents

are grappling with how much children need to learn about AIDS and at what age. Hundreds of Georgia parents this month opposed a state proposal for AIDS education in elementary schools.

In New York City, the nation's largest school system, AIDS education begins with general discussion in kindergarten, fourth graders are taught how HIV is transmitted and sixth graders are told of the risks of anal sex. The curriculum's effectiveness is still being evaluated.

"The debate will come down to where people draw the line to introducing lifestyles to young people who are unaware of them,"

said New York City school board member Michael Petrides, who succeeded in getting abstinence emphasized in the courses.

Figures in the CDC report came from yearly surveys of about 12,000 teen-agers, conducted in 1989, 1990 and 1991, Kolbe said. The United States has about 11.7 million students in grades 9 through 12.

The CDC said 54 percent of teen-agers it questioned in 1991 said they had had sexual intercourse, down from 59 percent in 1989.

Thirty-five percent said they had had two or more sexual partners, down from 40 percent, and 19 percent reported four or more partners, down from 24 percent in 1989.

However, condom use was up only 2 percentage points, to 48 percent, from 1990 to 1991. Students weren't asked about condoms in 1989. Students under age 15 had the greatest increase in condom use — 57 percent, up from 46 percent.

The survey found that 83 percent of students received some sort of HIV education at school last year, up from 54 percent in 1989.

Students who receive that instruction are more likely to discuss AIDS with their parents or other relatives, the CDC said. Sixty-one percent had those talks in 1991, up from 54 percent in 1989.

### Christmas shopping was never so important

For 25 years, the United Way of Magic Valley has made, in a thousand small ways, a difference in the Magic Valley.

You don't have to look far to find a life it has touched: the Boy Scout next door; the family across the street, whose soldier son in Saudi Arabia got a message from home via the Red Cross; the widow down the block who spends her afternoons at the senior citizens center.

But the services that have helped these people might be harder to come by in the future.

For a variety of reasons, the United Way of Magic Valley is in trouble. And this weekend's Celebration of Caring at the Magic Valley Mall may help determine whether the agency has a future.

Last year's Celebration of Caring, a Saturday night shopping-and-entertainment event, raised about \$17,000 for the United Way.

It's more critical this year, because with less than a month left, the campaign is less than 40 percent of the way toward its \$280,000 goal.

If it ends up that way, many of the 19 agencies that depend on the money are going to be in desperate shape.

Most of them will have little alternative but to look elsewhere for funding... and that could spell the end of the United Way campaign as we know it.

More importantly, it would leave

thousands of our fellow citizens without some very important services.

Guardian Ad Litem, the volunteer organization that speaks for children in our legal system, might be silenced. Compassionate Friends and Foster Grandparents might not be there when someone needs them, and the Twin Falls YFCA might be shuttered after school.

This valley's annual investment of several hundred thousand dollars in the United Way probably saves millions of dollars in taxes, because the volunteers who help these agencies deal with real people with real problems. They keep them out of the court system, off the welfare rolls and out of hospitals.

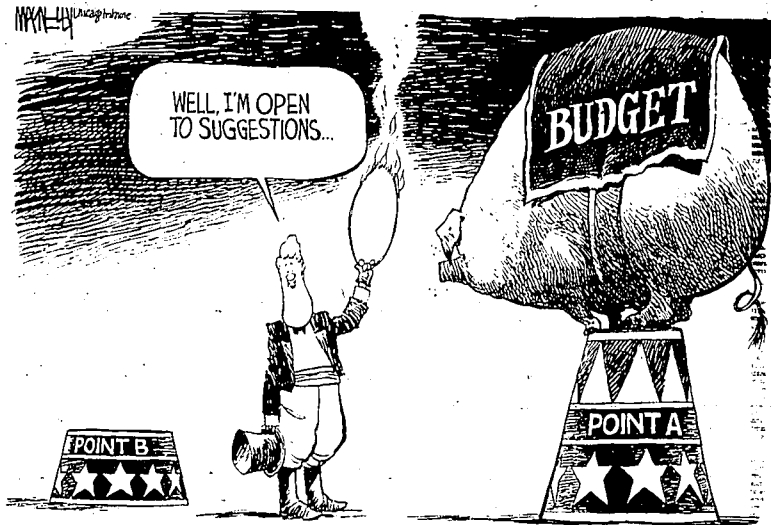
It's an asset worth saving.

There's no question that it's time for the United Way of Magic Valley to take a hard look at the way it does things. It suffers not merely from damage done to the United Way's national reputation by a scandal earlier this year, but from poor decisions and lax organization at the local level.

But none of that diminishes the need or the responsibility of all of us to do something about it.

Help out a good cause and show up at the Magic Valley Mall between 8 p.m. and 11 p.m. Saturday. Five bucks gets you in, and that money - along with a portion of the proceeds from the stores' sales - goes to the United Way.

### Air travel taxes citizens

According to a report by the House Post Office and Civil Service Subcommittee, in a 27-month period, the Air Force flew 678 flights for foreign visitors at a cost of \$4.8 billion to the American taxpayer. Often the plane would fly without passengers to a far-off destination, pick up the passengers, travel for fun and recreation, then return empty. The \$4.8 billion was hidden in the defense budget.

Luxury flights were not confined to foreigners visiting the United States. German Chancellor Helmut Kohl, a Bilderberger member, was flown from Bonn to Berlin on May 28, 1990, in a military aircraft at a cost of \$9,358 for the American taxpayer.

A commercial ticket would have been a fraction of the cost.

Danielle Mitterrand, wife of French President Francois Mitterrand, who is a Tri-Continental member and leader, flew on a plane sent from Andrews Air Force Base outside Washington to escort her from New York to Pease Air Force Base in New Hampshire. The short flight cost American taxpayers \$11,503.

On Feb. 4, 1990, three Air Force officers flew from Andrews Air Force Base to Boston to meet Swiss Defense Minister Villiger.

Villiger and his party of 13 were flown back to Andrews Air Force Base. On Feb. 6, Villiger and his party of 13 were flown to St. Louis. The next day, they flew to Las Vegas, Nev. On Feb. 8, they flew to San Diego, Calif. The next day, they flew back to Boston. By the time the plane returned to Andrews Air Force Base, the cost to the American taxpayer was \$54,000.

On one occasion, the plane was sent from Washington to Los Angeles to pick up a Japanese prime minister for a 40-minute flight to Palm Springs, Calif.

The state of Idaho has given the individual counties the power to tax. This great responsibility was given under specific laws and guidelines. By law, we are required to pay the taxes levied by the county against our property.

I am alarmed that such an important task has been taken so lightly.

In a report prepared by the Minidoka County assessor, Max Vaughn, on Page 17, he states the following:

"A current PA8137 indicates that there are approximately 1,390 real property parcels that have reversion dates of 1987 and older. Included in this estimate are approximately 420 commercial property parcels, which is the total of all commercial property in the county. In other words, all commercial property escaped physical appraisal in the county."

"Ratio studies from the past several years indicate that commercial categories have had the poorest assessment level and uniformity. In addition, uniformity of residential property has become worse, due to the fact that a large number of parcels have not been physically inspected for the last five to 10 years."

Copies of this report are available to the public at the county courthouse.

Idaho law requires a minimum of 20 percent of properties in all categories be physically appraised annually, and the remaining 80 percent be indexed up or down accordingly. The laws concerning these matters are clear and the purpose is to prevent unjust taxation.

How could the officials of Minidoka County let this get so far out of line? Why hasn't the State Tax Commission done something about this problem? Have we become lax as taxpayers?

I am convinced that the only way to correct this problem is for the taxpayer to closely review their assessments and voice an opinion.

Voicing an opinion is something that should be done more than once every four years at election time.

Now that we know Mondays can be dangerous to our health because of the increased risk of heart attack, what are we going to do about it? Here are some possibilities:

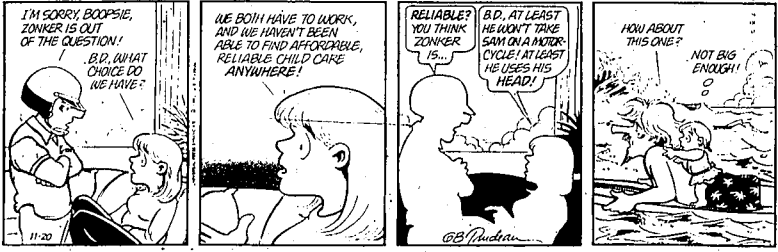
- Eat your heart out every Sunday night. You can do this by reading stories about lottery winners.

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — The conservative Islamic government on Thursday ordered Benazir Bhutto not to leave her hometown in southern Pakistan, but she vowed to keep trying to bring down the government.

"This government has dug its own grave, and its days are numbered," Ms. Bhutto told a news conference in Karachi.

She announced plans for a rally and protest march on Friday in the northern city of Peshawar.

Ms. Bhutto was expelled Wednesday from the federal capital and surrounding area for 30 days for ignoring a ban on public rallies and protests. She and hundreds of supporters broke through police barricades to go to a rally where she urged an estimated 30,000 people to help topple the government.

Shaken by Ms. Bhutto's defiance, Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif on Thursday ordered her not to leave Karachi, her hometown.

Leaders of Ms. Bhutto's party met to decide how to sustain the protest campaign, but the meeting was raided by police.

The politicians escaped, but about a half dozen Pakistani journalists were roughed up and arrested.

Police fired tear gas and used bamboo batons to break up a rally of about 3,000 Bhutto supporters in Rawalpindi and arrested 25 women, witnesses said.

Ms. Bhutto charges that Sharif's government, which replaced her administration in 1990, is corrupt and repressive. She herself was ousted amid similar charges.

Sharif says Ms. Bhutto is trying to create anarchy and force a takeover by the army, which has ruled Pakistan for more than half its 44-year history. He warned Wednesday that further protest marches would be met with an unprecedented show of force.

Ms. Bhutto and senior leaders of her party, the Pakistan Peoples Party, ignored the threat and began organizing new "street power" demonstrations.

"Nawaz Sharif calls this a rebellion. Yes, this is a rebellion, and the people are rebelling," Ms. Bhutto told The Associated Press by telephone from her fortress-like home.

At least one of Ms. Bhutto's supporters, and possibly as many as three, were reported killed Wednesday after being hit by tear gas shells, fired by police.

The Pakistan Human Rights Commission, based in the eastern city of Lahore, said 11 of its members and two representatives of the London-based Amnesty International were arrested when police raided their homes.

News reports said Salman Taseer, the party's information secretary, had been beaten and tortured at a remote jail in eastern Pakistan. Police denied the charge.

Sharif's special adviser, Chaudry Nisar Ali, said the order banning Ms. Bhutto from the rest of the country would be lifted soon.

"We want a cooling-off period," Nisar Ali said. "Just for a few more days. We know this doesn't look good for our government, but we have to be a bit cautious."

Ms. Bhutto said her supporters would continue demonstrations until President Ghulam Ishaq Khan uses his constitutional powers to dismiss Sharif's government, as he did here two years ago.

# Russia hints it might halt submarine construction

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — President Boris Yeltsin said Thursday that Russia would probably stop building submarines in the next two or three years and had withdrawn all strategic nuclear weapons from the Far East.

His comments in South Korea's parliament stunned some aides back in Moscow.

The announcement on submarines "sounds totally new and exciting as a surprise," said Yuri Andreyev, an adviser on converting military factories

## Battles hinder U.N. relief effort in Bosnia

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Bosnia's ethnic factions battled in the north and east Thursday, while U.N. and European peace envoys toured disputed areas in neighboring Croatia.

As the season's first snow fell on besieged Sarajevo, U.N. officials said violations of an 8-day-old cease-fire hampered efforts to distribute food and other emergency supplies in Bosnia before winter sets in.

Still, a U.N. convoy reached the north-central city of Tuzla for the first time, they said.

Meanwhile, the Western European Union said it and NATO would not need more than the 10 warships they have in the Adriatic Sea to enforce a U.N.-authorized blockade of Yugoslavia.

The action is aimed at increasing pressure on Serb-dominated Yugoslavia to force Serb militants to stop the war in Bosnia.

The union, the embryo of a European Community defense force that is expanding to 10 nations with the addition of Greece, is expected to formally approve the blockade Friday.

The 16-nation North Atlantic Treaty Organization voted Wednesday to help enforce the blockade of Yugoslavia, now made up of Montenegro and Serbia.

Serbian President Slobodan Milosevic and opponents of his hard-line nationalist policies are headed for an electoral showdown on Dec. 20, the Serbian newspaper Politika said Thursday.

to civilian production.

"Halting production will cause serious problems for enterprises producing subs, but we shall try to accelerate their conversion and to cope with this problem," he told The Associated Press.

The International Institute for Strategic Studies estimated that Russia had a total of 86 submarines of various types stationed with its Far East Fleet, including 25 Yankee and Delta class submarines at the Pavlovskoye base, just north of the Korean Peninsula on the Sea of Japan.

During a visit focused on winning economic aid and investment, Yeltsin also said he had settled disagreements over Russia's debt with South Korea and cleared the way for a \$15 billion natural gas pipeline from Siberia to Seoul.

In trust-building moves, Yeltsin indicated he would abrogate a 1961 defense agreement with Communist North Korea, and he handed over the "black box" containing the flight recorder of Korean Airlines Flight 007, which was shot down by Soviet jets in 1983 after violating Soviet air space.

The flight recordings, transcripts of which were released by the Yeltsin government earlier this year, contained conclusive evidence the South Korean pilots were on a standard civilian flight and did not know they had entered Soviet air space.

"The blank wall of distrust and estrangement that divided the two coun-

tries collapsed," Yeltsin said after his talks with South Korean President Roh Tae Woo.

Yeltsin told reporters that Korean and Russian experts had discussed projects "totalling \$20-30 billion" to develop the Russian Far East and convert military plants to civilian use, the daily Izvestia newspaper reported.

Yeltsin gave few details on the removal of nuclear weapons, but it appeared to be part of the short- and medium-range nuclear arms cuts agreed to by President Bush and Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev in fall 1991.

Russia has an estimated 60 SS-11 nuclear-tipped missiles at Svobodny and 45 Bear strategic bombers at Ukraine, just north of the Chinese border within range of Korea, according to the Military Balance handbook published by the International Institute of Strategic Studies.

Yeltsin also told reporters that he saw no major obstacles in improving Russo-Japanese relations, including a solution of the dispute over a handful of islands that prompted him to cancel a planned visit to Tokyo in September, ITAR-Tass said.

Japan has refused to formally adopt a treaty ending World War II hostilities with the Soviet Union until Moscow agrees to settle the issue.

Yeltsin sent a clear signal that he was withdrawing support from North Korea's isolationist Communist regime and would stop supplying it with offensive weapons and nuclear technology, Izvestia reported.

## MVP award goes to Eckersley

NEW YORK — Oakland reliever Dennis Eckersley, named the American League Cy Young Award winner last week, was also selected the league's Most Valuable Player on Thursday. Eckersley, who led the majors with 51 saves in 54 chances, is only the ninth player to win both the Cy Young Award and MVP honors in the same season. He joins Don Newcombe (1956), Sandy Koufax (1963), Denny McLain (1968), Bob Gibson (1968), Vida Blue (1971),

Rollie Fingers (1981), Willie Hernandez (1984) and Roger Clemens (1986). The 38-year-old right-hander is only the fourth reliever to win the MVP. The first was Jim Konstanty in 1950, followed by Fingers and Hernandez. "Part of me was waiting by the phone because I thought I deserved it," Eckersley said. "It's hard to say because I'm not that cool to think I deserved an MVP. But if there was any time in my whole life I thought I deserved it, this is the moment." Eckersley, 7-1 with a 1.91 ERA,

received 15 of a possible 28 first-place votes and 306 points in balloting by the Baseball Writers' Association of America. He was followed by Minnesota outfielder Kirby Puckett with 209 points, including three first-place votes, and Toronto outfielder Jose Carter with 201 points and four first-place votes. Mark McGwire, Dave Winfield and Roberto Alomar also received first-place votes. "There's a lot of deserving guys out there that have the everyday numbers,"

Eckersley said. "Everything fell into place. These things come around once in a lifetime." The AL MVP was expected to be the closest of all the postseason awards, but it didn't turn out that way. In the AL Cy Young voting last week, Eckersley received 19 of a possible 28 first-place votes. In 80 innings this season, Eckersley walked only 11. For winning the MVP award, Eckersley expects a \$100,000 bonus, bringing his 1992 income to \$3.35 million. Puckett also got a \$100,000 bonus.

## Weekend games to clear up Big Sky playoff picture

The final Saturday of the Big Sky Conference football season will determine whether Idaho, Eastern Washington or both will be invited to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs. Eastern clinched at least a share of its first Big Sky football title last weekend by beating Boise State. If Idaho does the same Saturday at Bronco Stadium, the two teams will share the title but Idaho gets the automatic berth in the 16-team playoff because it beat Eastern 38-21.

It's Eastern's first Big Sky men's title in any sport since joining the league six years ago. In the only other Big Sky league game of the day, Montana is at Idaho State in a game important only to the pride of each program. Weber State (6-4) hosts McNeese State and Montana State (4-6) is at Nevada-Las Vegas. Northern Arizona finished the season 4-7. Eastern has completed its regular season at 7-3, 6-1 in league play, and more importantly ranks 14th in the latest NCAA poll, which is a factor in who gets invited.

Fifth-ranked Idaho (8-2 overall, 5-1 Big Sky) is almost certain to get a bid no matter what happens at Boise. For Boise (5-5, 3-3), it might be a battle for survival for sixth-year coach Skip Hall. The Broncos have lost three straight and could wind up with a losing season for the first time since 1986. That's when BSU coach Lyle Setenech was fired for a 5-6 season. On paper it looks like a big mismatch. The Vandals lead the Big Sky and are fourth nationally in total offense, and Boise is last in defense. Idaho has scored 384

points and 50 touchdowns in 10 games while Boise State has fallen from last year's 44 touchdowns to 21 this season. Idaho star running back Sheridan May has 22 touchdowns, one more than the entire Bronco team. But both coaches say because it's such a huge traditional rivalry, records don't matter. The game was sold out before the season started and will be televised both locally and regionally. Vandal Coach John L. Smith said he expects Boise to be "cranked" up for the contest.

## California will mark 10th anniversary of The Play

BERKELEY, Calif. — It began as a desperate game of keepaway and in the span of a few seconds became one of the most enduring moments in college football history. It is known simply as The Play, a five-lateral kickoff return for a touchdown as time expired that produced California's miracle 25-20 win over Stanford in the Nov. 20, 1982, Big Game at Berkeley. Ten years later, the play lives in football folklore and as a reminder that, in sports as in life, every second counts. Four Cal players, including two who handled the ball twice, were involved in the chaotic 57-yard return. The final 20 yards of it wound through the Stanford band as it played "All Right Now" in a premature victory celebration. A reunion of the four — Kevin Moen, Mariet Ford, Richard Rodgers, and Dwight Garner — is planned Saturday at Cal's Memorial Stadium, where Stanford and Cal meet in the 95th renewal of the Big Game. They will be on the field together for the first time since their fabled kickoff return during a halftime program. Also planning to attend the game is Gary Tyrrell, the Stanford trombone player who was bowled over in the end zone by Moen's joyous leap. "I haven't missed a Big Game since 1979 and I want to keep that streak going. But I'll try to stay out of the way," quipped Tyrrell, now a controller for a Menlo Park electronics company. Only four seconds stood between Stanford and victory after John Elway led the team on a last-ditch drive capped by Mark Harmon's 35-yard field goal, which gave the Cardinal a 20-19 lead.

# Ivanisevic beats Courier; Sampras wins

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) — Jim Courier learned the hard way Thursday that Goran Ivanisevic has more to his game than the most fearless serve in tennis.

Playing what he said was the best match of his career, Ivanisevic overwhelmed the top-ranked American 6-3, 6-3 at the ATP World Championship.

Coming into the match with the tour-leading '92 ace this season, Ivanisevic hit only six against Courier but dominated from the backcourt with his powerful ground strokes. He also won 24 of his 26 first-serve points.

"I played a fantastic match," Ivanisevic said. "I think that was the best match I've played in my life. I can't play much better."

"I came up with some great points from the back. He is one of the best players from the backcourt, but I won most of the points from the back," the fourth-ranked left-hander from Croatia said.

Ivanisevic said he wasn't trying to prove anything. "I've always known that I can hit aces but that I can also hit from the back."

Ivanisevic broke Courier twice in the first set, and was helped by a Courier double-fault that gave the Croatian a set point. He hit a blistering cross-court forehand to win the set.

He broke again in the fourth game of the second, and saved three break points in the next game by winning five points in a row.

Ivanisevic slammed two aces and two service winners in the last game to win the match in one hour, 11 minutes.

"I was a bit nervous after the break in the second set, but I managed to concentrate," he said.

"He came up with the goods," said Courier, who is trying to become the first American to finish the year as No. 1 since John McEnroe in 1984. His five titles this year include two Grand Slams — the Australian and the French Open.

Ivanisevic, finalist at Wimbledon, is concluding his best season in which he has won four tournaments.

Another tremendous hitter, Richard Krajicek, mixed power with a delicate touch, to rally and beat Michael Chang 2-6, 6-3, 7-6.

Krajicek, a 20-year-old Dutchman, was thoroughly outplayed in the first set, but came back to win the second and took the decisive tiebreaker 7-4 after dropping his serve while serving for the match.

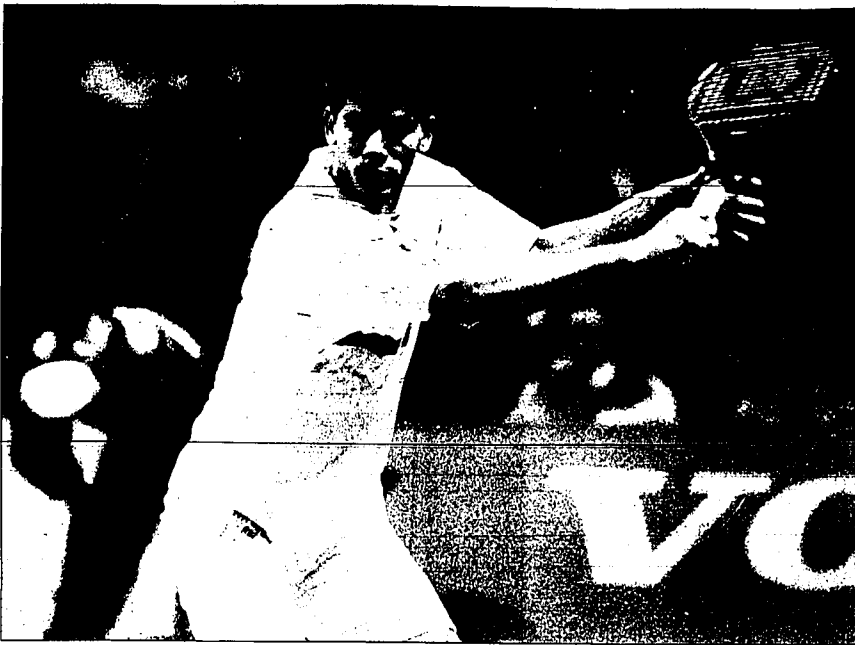
Krajicek, who lost to Courier on Wednesday, is now 1-1 in the eight-man tournament, while Chang dropped to 0-2.

Ivanisevic is now 2-0, while Courier dropped to 1-1. On Friday, Ivanisevic plays Krajicek and Courier, and Chang to decide the two semifinalists from the Rod Laver Group.

In the last match Thursday, Pete Sampras (3-0), the defending champion who is already sure to advance to the semifinals, from the Ken Rosewall Group, came from behind to beat Petr Korda (0-3) 3-6, 6-3, 6-3.

The second semifinal from that group will be decided Friday between Boris Becker and Stefan Edberg, both of whom are 1-1.

The \$2.5 million event pits the top eight players in the world, who are split into two round-robin groups. The top two from each group advance to the semifinals.

## Seles, Navratilova move into semifinals of Virginia Slims tourney

NEW YORK (AP) — It wasn't easy, but Monica Seles and Martina Navratilova eventually did what was expected — both advanced to the semifinals of the Virginia Slims Championships.

The top-seeded Seles fought out of a deep hole to overcome Jana Novotna 3-6, 6-4, 6-1 after Navratilova, seeded fourth, shook off the mid-match blues to defeat pesky Arantxa Sanchez Vicario 6-1, 2-6, 6-2.

"I'm lucky I escaped today," Seles said.

Their opponents in Saturday's semifinals won't be known until after Friday night's quarterfinals. Seles' second-seeded sister Gigi Graf, consisted in the opening round by Alex Nikolic. At first it appeared as if Seles would join her on the sidelines.

Novotna applied continual pressure on Seles by taking the net at every opportunity and keeping her groundstrokes deep. Seles was just slightly off her usually explosive game, but that may have been caused by her Czechoslovak opponent.

Navotna seemed to always guess correctly whether Seles was going to hit down the line or cross-court. Her sharply hit volleys punctuated a lot of points, while her court coverage forced Seles to go for even sharper angles.

"She was doing everything right," Seles said. "She wasn't making many unforced errors." The match began with three straight service breaks. And when Novotna held in the fourth game, Seles missed a forehand shot.

The right-hander, playing nearly perfectly, broke Seles again in the ninth game to close out the set, then broke her two games later as she grabbed a 3-0 lead in the second set.

But that was as close to victory as Novotna would come. "I was a little tentative in the first set," Seles said. "When I lost my first serve in the first set, it threw me off a bit. I don't know why it took me so long to get into the match." But get back into it she did. Seles' winner of three of the four Grand Slams tournaments for the

second straight year, broke Novotna in the fifth game at 30 as the Czech had problems putting her first-serve into play. That allowed Seles to jump all over the second serve, hitting unreturnable backcrosses.

"I just kept playing as hard as I could," Novotna said. "I did everything right in the first set. In the beginning of the second set, everything was working so well. Unfortunately, Monica picked up her game." As mistakes began creeping into Novotna's game, Seles applied even more pressure.

## Knight concocts plan 'Tombstone' notches 125 wins in 5 years

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) — Maybe Bob Knight is planning to get out of his bullwhip.

The Indiana coach, who gave Calbert Cheaney a mock whipping for photographers during the NCAA tournament last spring, already is in midseason form.

Knight didn't like Cheaney's lack of movement in Wednesday night's 103-80 victory over Murray State and emphatically told him so. He promises a change Friday night when the fourth-ranked Hoosiers play No. 17 Tennessee in the second round of the preseason NIT.

"But Knight won't say how he'll do it. "We still have a tendency to stand a little bit, too much, offensively," Cheaney does," he said of Indiana's leading scorer the past three years,

whom he hauled to the sideline for some Knight-style instruction. "We have a plan in effect that'll get Cheaney out of that."

Cheaney, a 6-foot-7 senior forward, hit only five of 12 shots from the field and had three turnovers to go with his 13 points in the Hoosiers' season-opener. He understands what's expected, and he doesn't need the bullwhip he and his teammates gave to Knight as a joke last spring to motivate him.

"We have to come out Friday night with a purpose, and play hard and play smart," Cheaney said. "We played hard, but as far as playing smart is concerned, we have to work on that."

TROY, N.Y. (AP) — Wanna fight? Give Buck Smith a call. He'll fight anybody, anytime, anywhere. As long as it's within driving distance.

Meet the quintessential journeyman fighter. Ordinary? Nope, even if most of his opponents have been. The man they call "Tombstone" has racked up a 125-3-1 record with at least 90 knockouts since first leaping on the gloves in his native Oklahoma City just over five years ago.

And you thought Mike Tyson fought a lot before he became champ. "People back home say I'm crazy," the 27-year-old Smith said. "But if a guy's capable of doing it, why shouldn't he?"

Even though he liked to fight, Smith wasn't a boxer until an opening appeared on a card at the last minute in August 1987 and he was summoned as a substitute.

"I had a fighter pull-out," said Smith's manager, Sean Gibbons. "Then his brother Mike came back and I said he'd knocked out all the guys in the neighborhood. He looked like a fighter."

"He passed his physical, put on a pair of shorts, a pair of Reeboks and looked good for about a round," Gibbons said. "But he ran completely out of gas and ended up losing a four-round split decision. I told him to come on down to the gym, but I never thought I'd see him again."

Apparently, Gibbons thought Smith liked his job as a gravedigger better. He didn't. "I lost, but I was happy because I got 50 bucks," said Smith, who was

knocking at the gym door a week later. "I told him I wanted to get involved in boxing. I started going to the gym and he showed some interest because I was dedicated. He took me under his wing. After my first loss, I won 20 straight."

Mostly on the road. In the past two years, 52 of his 69 fights have been away from Oklahoma City.

It's a good thing Smith is only a welterweight because he and his entourage — usually just Gibbons and a cutman — travel everywhere in a six-year-old Honda Civic.

That it has over 220,000 miles on it is no surprise when you consider his schedule. During one 34-day stretch, Smith fought in Oklahoma, Kentucky, North Dakota, Indiana, and Tennessee. In fact, he's had three more fights this year than his latest opponent, Kevin Pompey, has had in his six-year career.

"We live in Oklahoma, and it's close to the Midwest," said Smith, who won a record 106 straight fights before losing a unanimous decision Wednesday night to Pompey, the U.S. Boxing Association's welterweight champion. "You can hop to one state and another to fight. We leave right after each fight. It's prestige. I just pack my bags and go."

Sometimes he packs them more than once. In May, he drove 165 miles from Oklahoma City to Wichita, Kansas, knocked out a character named Marco Davis in the second round, then headed back home, where he won a unanimous decision over a guy named Rodney Johnson. Each ride offers a new adventure.

"We've had six guys in this two-hour Honda," Gibbons said. "Coming out of Louisville once, we had three heavyweights in the car. One guy basically sat on the luggage rack."

"But it's great driving because we've gotten to see a lot of the country that we wouldn't have seen unless we joined the Army."

And just as you are some of these characters Smith fights?

"Truckdrivers, cooks, batters," Gibbons said with a snide. "A lot of guys say he's fought bums, but I know half those guys and they weren't bums. They had other jobs."

Still, Smith has demonstrated he is no pushover. In 1990, he staked his

claim to fame, flattening Britain's welterweight champion at the time, 35-year-old Kirkland Laing, in the seventh round. And last December he scored a second-round knockout of 1988 Olympic gold medalist Robert Wanga.

Although Smith lost the biggest fight of his life to Pompey on Wednesday, he remains undefeated. "We're a throwback to the old fighters," Smith said as he prepared to drive 13 hours — weather permitting — back to Oklahoma. "We're active. That's how you learn to fight. You don't get burned out in the gym. If you like to fight, why not go out on the road instead of getting beat up in the gym. In 1992 alone, I've had 36 fights. That's unbelievable."

## California point guard draws attention early

No kidding — Jason Kidd will step into a starting job at point guard for California as the most-hyped freshman since Damon Bailey arrived at Indiana two years ago.

Considered the top prep player in the country last season, Kidd's presence has boosted ticket sales and interest in Cal basketball even before he's taken his first shot.

Meanwhile, there's a new look to the Big West Conference this season. The youngest and oldest coaches have become head coaches, and Nevada joins the league to try to beat perennial champion UNLV.

The big question in the Pacific-10 Conference: Can Kidd turn around the Golden Bears, who were 4-14 last season and finished tenth-to-last in the conference?

Cal coach Lou Campanelli is quick to remind that his roster has six sophomores and three freshmen in addition to two seniors and a junior.

"We are going to be very young and inexperienced, and I know everybody feels we're going to make the greatest rise," Campanelli said. "But this is my eighth year in the conference, and every team that has won the conference or finished second has been an experienced team

dominated by juniors and seniors." Campanelli plans to go with a three-guard rotation of Kidd, freshman Jerod Haase and sophomore K.J. Roberts, who moved to off-guard to accommodate Kidd.

Like Bailey, Kidd has been tabbed for greatness since the eighth grade. The 6-foot-4, 205-pounder from Oakland was MVP in the Bay Area Pro-Am League last summer, playing alongside several NBA standouts.

Campanelli cautions against expecting too much, too soon. "I don't care how good a high school player you were, you don't just automatically walk into our conference and not have some adjustments," he said.

"But he's a very unselfish player, he loves to distribute the basketball and he works hard on the defensive end."

UCLA and Southern Cal, which finished 1-2 in the Pac-10 last season, are recovering from the departures of several key players to graduation and the NBA.

The Bruins, who were 16-2 in league play and advanced to the NCAA West Regional championship game before being beaten by Indiana last March, lost Tracy Murray and Don MacLean to the NBA.

## Gretzky could be back

TORONTO (AP) — The Los Angeles Kings could have their king-maker — Wayne Gretzky — back by March. That is, if the pain in his herniated disc doesn't increase and he does not need surgery.

Gretzky has been encouraged by recent progress in his rehabilitation program. The past week has been a big step forward," Gretzky said Wednesday. "There's a light at the end of the tunnel. Two weeks ago, it wasn't there."

After nearly eight weeks of inactivity, Gretzky is in rehab 2½ hours a day, exercising, stretching and riding a stationary bike for 15 to 20 minutes.

The inflammation in the disc is subsiding, the pain is deteriorating and his mobility is returning, so

much so that he envisions himself back in the Kings' lineup in four months.

### Fire district votes likely

**TWIN FALLS** — County residents likely will vote on forming individual fire districts in the Buhl, Filer, Salmon Tract and east end areas in mid-December.

This decision, though not official yet, will head off a potential conflict involving the expansion of the Twin Falls Rural Fire Protection District. Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said Thursday night.

"Let's get some districts and some boundaries formed, and the gerrymandering can be done after that," Hempleman said at

a meeting at the College of Southern Idaho.

A potential conflict arose when residents of parts of the proposed Filer and Salmon Tract fire districts petitioned the Twin Falls Rural district to annex them. But some residents of those areas also want to remain with Filer or the Salmon Tract.

If parts of the proposed Filer and Salmon Tract districts are annexed into the Twin Falls district, the two districts stand to lose a good portion of their potential revenue base. The commissioners and engineer Scott Bybee, whom the county hired to study the issue, were not sure Wednesday how that

**TWIN FALLS** — The Twin Falls County Commission agrees that the \$50 per-unit solid waste fee needs more explanation.

After meeting with the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce and business leaders Thursday, the commission decided to consider reviewing the waste fee.

Gary Garmand, president of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors, offered to help set up a task force to examine the solid waste fee.

The Chamber's board of directors detailed its concerns over the fee in a Nov. 17 resolution. The resolution stated the Chamber of Commerce's support for the landfill and the commissioners' need to raise money to pay for the site. But the letter also called on the commissioners to rescind the present fee and re-evaluate the costs.

Twin Falls County Commissioner Norma Blass said the commission will discuss who would be on any task force at its 10 a.m. meeting next Wednesday. The commission could decide to put commercial fees on hold until more data is available.

Commissioner Jim Fraley told the group. Definite landfill cost estimates from J.U. B Engineers and EHM Engineers are expected around Dec. 1, as a part of pre-design work by the companies.

Commissioner Norma Blass said once some numbers come in, the county will be looking to "get this where it's equitable for the people." Adjustments could be made before the solid waste fee due date on Feb. 1.

"There is an alternative, and I think the alternative should be examined," Stivers said.

Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said the county has been open to private companies, but favored its own landfill because it offered more stability for the future.

"To think the door is closed, it's not. We've looked at everything," Hempleman said.

## Initial witnesses take stand in Stradley trial

Attorneys promise to make their cases; pathologist tells how Amanda died

**TWIN FALLS** — The question of who killed 2-year-old Amanda Hostetter in January is no mystery to Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Eflan Baxter.

She promised a jury Thursday morning that she will paint a clear description of desperation, deception and discovery that points to 29-year-old Donnell "Bud" Stradley as the killer as his murder trial unfolds.

Stradley has pleaded innocent to first-degree murder in the death of the little girl who, with her mother, moved in with Stradley in September 1991.

Before that date, the common threads in Amanda's life were her mother, Jodie Hostetter, and the physical abuse she inflicted, Public Defender Mike Wood said.

In contrast, Wood said his witnesses will show Stradley is a gentle, caring man who loves children.

Wood also told the jury during his opening statement that Stradley will tell his side of the story during the trial.

Prosecutors have asked 5th District Judge James J. May to limit the scope of the defense and prevent Wood from turning the focus of the trial from Stradley to Amanda's mother.

Hostetter has pleaded guilty to injury to a child and is free on bond while she appeals a three- to nine-year sentence.

The incidents leading to that felony — keeping a dirty house and allowing Amanda to stay in unsafe conditions — were not directly related to the child's death, according to Baxter.

Because of a plea bargain in her case,

Hostetter is immune from prosecution for anything relating to her treatment of Amanda.

May ruled Thursday morning that he will allow evidence of prior abuse by Jodie Hostetter if the defense can tie it to Amanda's death.

The courtroom was full most of the day Thursday, as Melanie Hutchinson brought her students from the Twin Falls Alternative High School to watch the opening arguments.

The students were very interested in the case, especially since many of them have small children of their own, Hutchinson said. Also watching, as they have been throughout the case, were members of Stradley's family.

"It's very stressful on the family as it would be on any family," his mother, Colleen Lamp said during a break. "I believe in my son. I always have."

The state's first witness was Dr. Charles Garrison of Pocatello, the forensic pathologist who did an autopsy on Amanda two days after she died.

Several courtroom observers and a few jurors looked uncomfortable as Garrison used slide projections of Amanda's corpse to show how he performed the autopsy.

He said Amanda died from internal bleeding caused by a tear in her gulletry — a fan of fatty tissue that supports and supplies blood to the small intestine.

The exact cause of that two-inch rip is the focus of medical evidence in the case.

Garrison used a slide of the internal organs of Amanda's abdomen to show the torn mesentery.

## Jerome ponders joint city-county law enforcement

**JEROME** — Jerome officials are considering combining local county and city law enforcement agencies with the hope of saving costs.

But if officials do so, it won't be for some time yet.

"We're just kicking around some thoughts about consolidation — looking at what Cassia County has done," Mayor Gerald Ostler said. "It's awful

preliminary to even say any more than that."

The Cassia County Sheriff's department also covers law enforcement needs for the town of Burley.

County Commissioner Jerry Ridley said several benefits may result.

"Economies are not everything," Ridley said.

"But we are certainly going to study that. We need an open line of communication between the county and city. If consolidation could improve our

law enforcement, then we'll come out as winners."

Ridley said the city police department has 11 employees and the county a little more than 20.

"Maybe it doesn't take two administrators to supervisor the duties of about 30 employees," Ridley said.

The committee working on the study agreed residents should have a chance to voice their opinions before any action was taken.

"I estimate it would take a year before

we could get all the facts and bring the issue before the people," Ostler said.

Former sheriff and city police commissioner Elza Hall said that officials ought to give newly elected sheriff George "Pee Wee" Silver III some time to get his feet on the ground.

"I think it could work, but its going to take time," Hall said. "(Silver) is an capable man for the job and could do it, but he'd need some time. It would probably take about a year before we'd be ready to take it before the people."

# Historical perspective makes geography fun

Geography, in the main, boils down to several simple questions: "Where am I?" "How do I get there?" "What is on the other side of the mountain?"

"These primal questions have been responsible for pushing humanity from one place to another in search of something better," writes Kenneth C. Davis, author of "Don't Know Much About Geography" (Abrams, \$23).

"Geography doesn't simply begin and end with maps showing the location of all countries of the world. ... It is impossible to understand history, international politics, the world economy, religions, philosophy or patterns of culture, without taking geography into account," Davis continues in his book, published in October.

"Geography is a mother lode of sciences. It's the hub of a circle from which other sciences and studies radiate: meteorology and climatology, ecology, geology, oceanography, demographics, cartography, agricultural studies, economics, po-

litical science. At some level, all of these can be related back to geographic factors. It is obvious that a solid understanding of geography is a vital basic ingredient for a rounded, full understanding of the world and the universe."

What Davis did in his book was to take this important subject, often taught in stodgy terms, and make it fun.

Two years ago his "Don't Know Much About History," which took the same approach, was on the New York Times' best-seller list.

What prompted Davis to take on geography?

"I think it was a natural progression," Davis said in a telephone interview. "When I talked to people about history, I often heard the refrain, 'Oh, I'm terrible at history and I'm even worse at geography.' People confessed without any shame to being lost when it comes to the subject."

"I discovered as I was talking to people about American history in my previous book, the issue of where things happened and why they happened came up quite often. People were very much at sea when

it came to understanding where things are."

To bring the book down to a basic level, Davis raises and answers some basic geography questions in ways that pump life into the subject.

There are lots of playful examples in Davis' book, examples that help readers make geographic connections. And lots of headings that pull you from one chapter to the next. Examples: "What's So Bad About the Badlands?"; "Elephants in the Alps"; "Paradise Lost?"; "Geography, Weather and the Environment."

"I try to find stories to illustrate geographic points because I really do think they tickle people's fancy and get them to peek up their ears and get them interested in the subject."

Davis said that while he wrote his book for adults so they could help their children with homework, he was gratified that the book was named by the School Library Journal as one of nine necessary books to read for 1992.

Davis' book will go a long way in helping to popularize geography and helping people to answer that simple important question, "Where am I?"

## Changing times, tougher questions

When the National Geographic Society introduced the seventh edition of its world atlas this month, it contains 39 more countries than the 1990 edition did, not to mention 14,000 place name changes in its 150,000 entries index.

"The 1992 'National Geographic Atlas of the World' only emphasizes what a changing world we live in."

Although the Mississippi River remains the longest in the United States and Little Rock still is the capital of Arkansas, consider the change of identifying 15 new countries that were the Soviet

Union. Consider also the reunification of Germany, the fragmentation of Yugoslavia and the scheduled splitting of Czechoslovakia on Jan. 1, 1993.

"We had figured the 1990 atlas would have a shelf life of about five years," said John E. Shupe, chief cartographer of National Geographic. "A year later we were shaking our heads, saying, 'Wait a minute. The Baltic states have just become independent. The breakup of the Soviet Union is imminent.' You name it and you're happening. We decided we couldn't have our primary general reference work that far out-of-date, so we began to plan an atlas for 1992."

The publication of the atlas coincides with National Geographic Awareness Week (Nov. 15-21), a program that brings into focus a neglected subject in U.S. schools.

And so does the Chicago Tribune Travel section's third annual Geography Challenge. Our intent is to stimulate your thinking about Planet Earth.

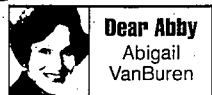
# Couple's correspondence leads to exchange of wedding rings

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# Lawmaker plans town meetings on wilderness bill strategy

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Larry LaRocco hopes to get a quick start on an Idaho wilderness bill in the next session of Congress, so he plans three town meetings next month to gather testimony.

"For a dozen years this has remained Idaho's most important unresolved natural resources issue," LaRocco said Thursday. "As with health care and the Persian Gulf War, my first step will be to hear from the people of Idaho."

The first town meeting is Dec. 14 at Coeur d'Alene. The second will be the next day at Lewiston and the third on Dec. 16 at Boise. All will be evening sessions, starting with a

panel discussion.

LaRocco said he would stay as long as anyone wanted to testify.

"Clearly Idaho's 9 million acres of roadless land need to have decisions on which areas will remain wild and which areas will be allocated to other uses," he said. "Idaho deserves certainty, stability and sustainability when it comes to management of our national forests. Nine million acres of land without a decision simply leads to continued uncertainty."

When running for re-election, he promised to have an Idaho wilderness bill introduced by the end of March. "Obviously, the clock is ticking and that isn't too far away," he said.

Idaho has 9.3 million acres of roadless areas under study for possible wilderness. All previous efforts to win approval of an Idaho wilderness bill have failed, even a Republican-Democrat effort sponsored by former GOP senator James McClure and Gov. Cecil Andrus.

Idaho and Montana remain the last two states without a wilderness bill and Rep. Pat Williams, D-Mont., talked Wednesday about the possibility of a joint wilderness bill.

LaRocco said it's possible, and he is keeping that option open, but it will be extremely difficult to accomplish.

Of the McClure-Andrus bill, LaRocco said it was mostly the work of the staffs of the two officials.

"Some people felt left out of the process," he said, which is why he is holding public wilderness sessions.

LaRocco said he talked with Republican Sen. Larry Craig of Idaho and is in general

agreement on how to approach the wilderness problem. He also wants to get Congressman-elect Mike Crapo and Senator-elect Dirk Kempthorne, in on the process, but hasn't heard from them.

"Nothing will get through the Congress unless both senators agree on it," he said. But LaRocco said with a new Democratic president, if the Idahoan doesn't like the wilderness bill approved by Congress, he probably will have veto power over it.

"There are a lot of land mines out there" on wilderness, LaRocco said. But, "We will not have a dependable timber supply until we resolve the wilderness question."

## Proposal for bill spells bad news for prime backer of 1% Initiative

COEUR D'ALENE — State Sen. Mary Lou Reed, D-Coeur d'Alene, plans to introduce legislation requiring the attorney general to rule if an initiative is constitutional before the signature-gathering process can start.

It is unwelcome news for Ron Rankin of Coeur d'Alene, who spearheaded the unsuccessful One Percent Initiative drive to limit property taxes this year and has submitted signatures for another try.

"In this last election, the time and resources of a host of people were used arguing for and against the One Percent Initiative that the attorney general said was unconstitutional," Reed said.

"That is a lousy way to run a populist democracy, and I want to change it."

The bill requires the attorney general to issue a ruling within 20 days.

That ruling could then be appealed to the Idaho Supreme Court. Typically, the high court would respond with a "quick" ruling. However, the Legislature cannot

dictate when the court must decide an issue.

Rankin called the bill "a perfect example of legislative mischief" designed to skirt the people's ability to change laws.

"This is trying to price people out," he said. "The people can't do this unless they've got a darned good lawyer and a lot of money up front."

Reed disagreed.

"The intent is to save money. The intent is not to cost more," she said. "Part of this is sort of a consumer issue. The public should have confidence that whatever they're voting on will stand up."

In a legal opinion before the election, the attorney general indicated the initiative would not stand up in court. The failed measure was criticized because it required a two-thirds vote of all "qualified

electors" to pass school bonds and overrides, making it virtually impossible.

The new version would change that to two-thirds of all "those casting ballots."

Idaho's initiative law, borrowed verbatim from Oregon in 1933, prohibits the attorney general and the Supreme Court from ruling on the constitutionality of a measure until after it is passed by the voters.

In 1986, the Supreme Court ruled it did not have authority to keep the lottery initiative off the ballot. But after it passed, the court in 1988 ruled the measure unconstitutional.

"I think the voting public should have the assurance that what they are voting on will be a good law if it passes," Reed said.

But Rankin said the bill violates the separation of powers between the legislative, judicial and administrative branches of the government.

"This is still the United States and not the Soviet Union," Rankin said. "You can't by legislation give the attorney general the power of the Supreme Court."

## Weather, endangered salmon could close remote community for winter

BOISE (AP) — Snow and the federal Endangered Species Act may soon close off the remote mountain community of Yellow Pine east of McCall.

The only way in and out of the town during the winter is along the South Fork of the Salmon River road, which runs along the stream where chinook salmon spawn. They have been listed as "threatened" by the National Marine Fisheries Service.

That agency has put a hold on plowing the road this winter because it could damage chinook habitat.

"The road could go another two to three weeks, but if we get two feet of snow that would close it," said Ron Julian, Cascade District ranger in the Boise National Forest.

Yellow Pine residents are not happy.

"People can't go to and from their homes unless the road is plowed," said Howard Buetgenbach, who travels between a home in Yellow Pine and one in

the Boise Valley. "We're talking about real fundamental rights."

He said about 130 people live in Yellow Pine in the winter, including children and retirees.

Prior to 1983, the residents had no access and used snowblowers to travel.

The dispute puts the Forest Service in a bad spot, officials said.

The agency in 1989 was ordered by the federal courts to keep the Salmon River road open.

But for now, the Endangered Species Act and the fisheries service carry a bigger stick, said Ralph Geibel, local engineer for the Payette National Forest.

Officials are trying to find a way to remove snow without plowing it to one side, such as trucking it out.

"We're trying to get this resolved before we end up back in court," Geibel said.

## Cattle producers brace for change

BOISE (AP) — Changes are expected in the federal Endangered Species Act, but livestock producers should not assume there will be much less impact on them, speakers told the Idaho Cattle Association convention.

"It's wishful thinking to think these are going to be major revisions to the Endangered Species Act," Boise attorney John Schroeder said Thursday at a meeting of the Association's Public Lands and Environment Committee.

And in an earlier address to Cattle Association members on the second day of their convention in Boise, Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, said he was optimistic the federal law will be reauthorized next year with more

attention to the burden saving endangered wildlife places on economies in the West.

"We will be remiss as a country if we do not build a human factor into the Endangered Species Act," Craig said. "I don't think there are any who would disagree, in this room at least, that it has been used by some interests in this country well beyond what it was initially intended to do."

The senator said whether a animal species is threatened with extinction is a purely biological decision, "and it probably ought to remain there. But the question is then how much do you commit of human resource to solving the problem, and natural resource."

Beefles more attention to

economic impacts. Schroeder said Congress may consider changing the law to more clearly define "Species," which could eliminate protection of narrow "sub-species" such as Snake River sockeye salmon.

Schroeder urged cattle producers to commit money to challenge attempts at listing species as endangered if evidence can be found that listing is unnecessary.

He specifically cited a proposal to make the bull trout an endangered species in Idaho and other states.

"Before you surrender, you better get your biology done," he said.

But Schroeder warned cattle producers to keep the issue in perspective.

## Shelley School District begins year in grim way

SHELLEY (AP) — Three months into the new school year the Shelley School District is \$538,000 in the red, its teacher talks are unresolved, the state is withholding almost \$1 million and patrons are angry.

The shortfall has meant larger class sizes, fewer materials for teachers and students and frozen salaries. School Board members and administrators are struggling to make ends meet while trying to figure out how they get into such a mess.

Some progress was made Wednesday, when teachers voted to sign a contract equal to last year's, pay with the provision that they may continue to negotiate for scheduled pay raises.

The state, by law, must withhold funds until contracts are signed. Shelley's regularly scheduled Nov. 15 payment of \$946,500 has been stopped until teachers sign the contract.

The real bombshell fell Oct. 15,

when an auditor told the School Board it faces a \$538,000 shortfall. Officials are once again working on a revised budget, but Superintendent Scott Edrington said that budget probably won't be ready until Dec. 17.

Officials now are working on a three-year plan to cover the debt, including trying to raise revenue through new legislation and applying any surplus from the current budget to the deficit.

### Bannock County seeks more jail space

POCATELLO — Bannock County commissioners may rent an office building at the Gateway West Industrial Center to use as temporary housing for county jail inmates.

The lease agreement would allow the county to substantially reduce the cost of renting beds at other area jails for the prisoner overflow. Bannock County Commission Chairman Tom Katsilometes said Thursday.

The county now pays about \$80,000 a month to transport prisoners and rent beds at jails in Burley and Blackfoot. Those prisoners must be transported back and forth to Bannock County for court appearances.

The American Civil Liberties Union won a federal court order requiring Bannock County to cap its jail population at 40 prisoners, 45 on weekends.

In August, county voters approved general obligation bonds to build a \$9.3 million, 188-bed jail to replace the outdated 72-bed jail in Pocatello.

### Sho-Bans ponder loss of steel factory

FORT HALL — The Fort Hall Business Council has voted to close Sho-Ban Steel, but a company employee and an outside investor may buy the equipment and privatize the steel fabrication business.

Owned and operated by the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes since 1988, Sho-Ban Steel never earned a profit. The tribes invested nearly \$3 million in the business, according to the tribal newspaper.

"We've just lost too much money," Business Council Chairman Kelsey Ednow said Thursday.

"That's hard to come by now," LaGrand Coby, Sho-Ban Steel manager, has proposed buying the company's equipment for \$60,000. The tribes' attorney will review the request before drawing up a contract.

### Panhandle man wants stepson charged

SANDPOINT — A Sandpoint-area man who survived an attack that killed his wife is upset murder and battery charges against his stepson were dismissed.

Robert "Pete" Crockett of Careywood said he has no memory of whoever severely wounded him and hacked his wife, Jodi Cooper, to death while they slept in their home Feb. 29. But he believes his stepson, Jeremy Cooper, knows more than he has told authorities.

Crockett received severe lacerations to his arms and back and a deep gash in his forehead.

Cooper, 18, was taken into custody near the home that morning and charged with murder and battery.

The charges were dismissed Monday when Bonner County Prosecutor Phil Robinson said the investigation was incomplete and he would not be ready to proceed to trial Nov. 30.

### Report contends formula slights BSU

BOISE — Boise State University is shortchanged by a state funding formula that does not reflect the population and enrollment changes in Idaho, says a report to the state Board of Education.

The report, written by a committee of Boise business and community leaders, could help chart BSU's future. It was expected to go before the board at its Thursday meeting in Nampa.

The committee, formed by acting BSU President Larry Selland, was directed to identify the school's needs from a community perspective. The recommendations will become part of BSU's strategic plan.

### Tests solve mystery of 12-year-old death

POCATELLO — Forensic and ballistics testing advancements have finally solved the slaying of a Pocatello man 12 years ago.

Tom O. Tolson, 42, of Lyman, Wyo., was arrested Wednesday, waived a preliminary hearing and pleaded guilty to involuntary manslaughter for the 1980 shooting death of Harold Dewey Higley, 19, Pocatello Police Chief Jim Benham said Thursday.

Bannock County Prosecutor Mark Hiedeman said Tolson was released on his own recognizance until sentencing, which is scheduled for Jan. 11.

Higley was killed by gunshot wounds to his upper body as he was driving out of a Pocatello trailer park early on the morning of Jan. 10, 1980.

### Some INEL workers receive reprieve

IDAHO FALLS — Some employees of an Idaho National Engineering Laboratory contractor, EG&G Idaho Inc., who were to be given layoff notices Friday have been placed elsewhere within the company and others have been offered voluntary termination.

EG&G General Manager Jim Okeson said last month it would be necessary to terminate up to 100 workers because of federal funding cuts.

INEL spokesman John Walsh said EG&G managers decided against involuntary job cuts and more than half of the 100 targeted employees have been transferred.

"What we're doing is offering employees in certain departments and certain job families within those departments the opportunity to voluntarily terminate employment," Walsh said.

## School clears Meridian teachers' records

BOISE (AP) — Three Meridian High School teachers are returning to class with their personnel records free from any reprimands for allowing lesbians to speak to students.

School officials withdrew a set of School Board-ordered sanctions against the teachers Wednesday.

"The Meridian School Board will rescind all actions taken against Pat Motoney, Ruddy Four and Greg Harm," Superintendent Bob Hiley said in a prepared statement. "The three teachers are recognized as outstanding instructors who were victimized by the lack of a clear policy."

The teachers were suspended with pay two

weeks ago and then — after missing two days from the classroom — reinstated by the board with reprimands in their personnel records.

Haley distributed a written apology from him, the School Board, Meridian High Principal Gil Kuga and the three teachers for the "disruption in the district."

The district still must establish a specific policy over guest speakers and special topics. It will appoint a committee of parents, teachers and students to hammer that out.

Also up in the air is an effort to recall some of the board members, and determining how much academic freedom teachers should have, weighed

against parents who want a say in their children's education.

Teachers celebrated the clear victory for their colleagues. But Meridian Education Association President Cindy Betz said they will work to ensure academic freedom and due process policies are followed. "This has resolved one instance," she said, "but the whole district is at risk if teachers are working under the threat of censorship."

The three teachers showed little emotion when the agreement was announced.

"We're happy because it's over, but we feel the big winners are our students," Motoney said. "It's been a very trying two weeks."

## Legislator's win margin draws close

BOISE (AP) — Republican

Sylvia McKeeth's margin fell to just 10 votes in an election recount Thursday, but she's still the new state representative from Legislative District 16.

Chief Deputy Secretary of State Ben Yutsa conducted a recount of the votes at the Ada County Courthouse, producing a final margin of 7,190 for McKeeth and 7,180 for Rep. Molly Lazechko, D-Boise.

Unofficial results election night gave McKeeth a 24-vote victory. But Ada County Clerk David Navarro said this week his office discovered 300 unopened absentee ballots cast Oct. 26.

They were opened and tallied Wednesday, cutting the margin to 17.

The election result cannot be challenged in court, Yutsa said if Lazechko wants to contest the outcome, it will have to be filed with the Idaho House, which will be dominated by Republicans 50-20 in the 1993 session.

The Board of Canvassers met Wednesday to certify results of the general election. Losers have 20 days to ask for recounts.

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# 3,300 Somalis off ship search crowds near camp for relatives

ADEN, Yemen (AP) — Khadija Ahmet came away from the chicken wire surrounding the temporary isolation camp with tears streaming down her dusty cheeks Thursday.

Barely a day off a rusted cargo ship that was a two-week hellhole for 3,300 refugees fleeing Somalia, she had got word of a brother lost for more than two years.

"When President Siad Barre was overthrown and the war broke out we all scattered to different places. I had no idea they were here," said Mrs. Ahmet, a 45-year-old mother of seven.

Messages sent in all directions over the two years went unanswered. Then she recognized a former Mogadishu neighbor hugging the fence who told her the brother

was at a nearby camp holding other Somali refugees.

"I didn't expect even that. I still don't know where my husband is, whether he is dead or alive," she said.

Yemeni police fired guns into the air, swung knotted cords and sent a jeep careening along the fence to keep the new arrivals separate from hundreds of refugees outside looking for lost friends and relatives.

## Arab groups condemn acts of violence

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Four Arab human rights groups condemned a surge in violence by Muslim extremists, but voiced fear that Arab governments are fighting back by violating human rights.

Only about 12 people had to be put in a special tent for observation. Relief officials said the new arrivals likely would be moved from the isolation camp within three to 15 days

Members of the French relief agency Doctors Without Borders said the overall health of the refugees who arrived Wednesday was good, even though they had run out of water and food for three days on the voyage to Yemen.

Dr. Eustace Kyriosis of Doctors Without Borders said those who fell ill from drinking seawater on the trip recuperated once a French warship pumped fresh water onto the freighter *Samaa-1* during the voyage.

The \$100 price of the boat trip meant the vessel was crammed with people of what is considered the middle class in Somalia, and not the 2 million Somalis facing starvation.

# Another Russian winter brings hope and despair

MOSCOW (AP) — Valentina Yudicheva has given up hoarding food for the winter.

Last winter, when store shelves were bare and money was tight, she scrambled to stock up and gave her pregnant daughter-in-law milk powder she cooked as part of a Western aid package.

"It was a very difficult time for us," recalled the gray-haired accountant, whose granddaughter Olysiya is now 7 months old.

Yeltsin said "We have left the old model forever, and a foundation for the new Russian economy is being built."

But there is dissatisfaction with Yeltsin's policies, primarily from former Communists who scorn his ambitious reforms or from those who think they have taken too great a toll on the population.

Yeltsin has warned of what he calls a "revanchist coup" by hard-line lawmakers, who have threatened to oust him and Acting Prime Minister Yegor Gaidar.

Bread shortages last year caused near riots in some cities.

For soccer coach Sasha Prokhorov, living in a post-Soviet world has brought nothing but hardship.

For the second year in a row, he and his twin brother, Valera, "have had to land winter jobs baking and selling meat pastries in a downtown train station to supplement their incomes."

"Prices are going up so quickly that our salaries can't keep pace," explained Prokhorov, 35, who adds to his salary in warmer months by selling fruits and vegetables from his garden.

"After the putsch I had high hopes that things would get better, but now it's difficult to say. I've begun to have doubts," he said.

For Yudicheva, political reforms have made the economic struggle easier to bear.

A former Communist Party member who worked 28 years as a broadcaster for state-run radio, the 66-year-old widow said she relishes freedom of speech.

"The station used to make me record political slogans to be read at May Day parades on Red Square," Yudicheva recalled bitterly. "I had no independence at all."

She lives in a two-room apartment with her son, his wife and their baby.

Her salary is not large, but she supplements it with a government pension.

Now, she said, she lives "with the faith that things will get better, and that confidence gives me strength. I think my granddaughter will have a better life than I did."

But the dire predictions of famine, chaos and civil unrest that filled Russian newspapers during the Soviet collapse last year were not borne out. And Yudicheva is more optimistic now.

Food is much more expensive now, but at least there's something to eat. That makes me much happier than empty shelves," said Yudicheva.

Last winter, shocked by rampant inflation and fearful the winter would be harsh, many people resorted to panic-buying, lining their cupboards with dry and pickled goods.

This winter, the mood is more mixed. It has become harder for some, and prices keep going up. Grain reserves are dwindling.

Others say their lot has improved since the centralized economy broke up.

In an address to industrialists Saturday, President Boris N. Yeltsin said the economy was recovering. He said Russia has overcome its cash shortage in the past year and reversed the decline in production.

"After many years of marking time, headway has been made,"

## Tajikistanis elect anti-government rebel leader

DUSHANBE, Tajikistan (AP) — An anti-government rebel leader was elected acting president Thursday, becoming the third leader of the war-torn Central Asian state in two months.

The vote came a day after Deputy Security Minister Dzhurabek Aminov was assassinated in central Dushanbe. The killing eliminated a key centrist figure in the struggle to end the country's civil war.

Irgali Rakhmonov, the chairman of the northern Kulyab region, was cho-

sen in a vote of 186-11 by the Tajik parliament. It met in the northern town of Khodzhet to escape the fighting.

Rakhmonov will replace acting President Akbarshah Iskandarov, whom the parliament removed from office hours earlier. Iskandarov became Tajik leader in September after a coalition of Islamic and democratic groups forced the resignation of President Rakhmon Nabiyev, an old-style Communist.

Rakhmonov had been allied with

Nabiyev's supporters in the fighting against the Iskandarov government.

Some Tajik legislators told The Associated Press on condition of anonymity that the parliament on Friday may review the legality of Nabiyev's forced resignation and possibly restore him as Tajik president.

Since Nabiyev's ouster, Tajikistan has been "wrecked by violence" that has killed thousands of people and driven tens of thousands from their homes, Iskandarov tried but failed to unite the country's fractious clan.

## Iran builds submarine base

LONDON (AP) — Iran is building a base outside the Persian Gulf for a submarine it bought from Russia, the magazine's Defense Weekly reported Thursday.

The Kilo-class submarine apparently has "surface-to-air missile capability," the magazine said. The managements on such submarines usually are 18 torpedoes.

The diesel-electric submarine, which has arrived in Iranian waters, and up to two more submarines Iran has bought will be based at Chah Bahar on the northeastern shore of the Gulf of Oman, the magazine said, quoting Western naval intelligence sources. The Gulf of Oman lies between the Persian Gulf and the Arabian Sea.

Diplomatic sources initially thought the submarines would be based at Bandar Abbas, at the mouth of the Persian Gulf and a possible choke-point for shipping into the waterway. Basing the submarines at Chah Bahar indicates they will be used mainly in the Arabian Sea, Jane's said.

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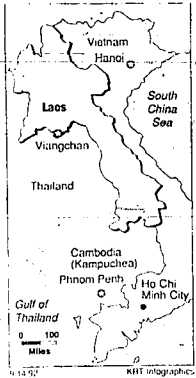

**Laos lets experts see MIA mark**

HO CHI MINH CITY, Vietnam (AP) — Laos will let American investigators visit the site where a surveillance photo showed what may have been a U.S. military rescue code dug into the ground, a U.S. senator said on Thursday.

American teams will also see previously closed areas where there have been reported sightings of people who could be MIAs, said Sen. John Kerry, the chairman of the Senate committee on missing U.S. servicemen.

He announced the agreement after returning from a day trip to Vientiane, the capital of Laos.

The U.S. satellite photo, taken in January 1988, shows the 12-foot-high letters "USA," with something underneath that could be the letter "K." The letter "K" was used as a secret emergency code by American aviators during the Vietnam War.

Some people say the letters might have been a signal from an American held prisoner since the Vietnam War. Experts agree the "USA" was handmade, but they are not sure whether the other marking was a "K," or whether it was intentionally stamped out in a rice paddy.

Kerry, D-Mass., is visiting Southeast Asia with Sens. Tom Daschle, D-S.D., and Hank Brown, R-Colo., to seek more information on the 2,265 Americans unaccounted for since the war. That includes 519 servicemen missing in action in Laos.

Kerry and Daschle met with the prime minister of Laos, Khamtai Siphandone, and Foreign Minister Phoum Sipasout to seek assistance for the MIA search.

Laos agreed to give U.S. experts access to film archives and will allow Lao-speaking Asian-Americans to work as members of search teams, Kerry said.

Searches in Indochina are conducted jointly by the host governments and a Pentagon task force.

The senators flew to Vientiane after a three-day visit to Vietnam's capital, Hanoi, where they said they received full cooperation from Vietnamese officials.

Vietnam, which is seeking international help to rebuild its economy, hopes to improve relations with the United States.

The United States has imposed a trade embargo and diplomatic freeze on Vietnam since the Communist north took over the south in 1975. The official American policy is that relations will be normalized only when Vietnam has helped make a full accounting of the missing.

Kerry said Wednesday he would recommend that President Bush make a reciprocal gesture for Vietnamese cooperation on the MIA issue. Bush, in a letter the senators carried to President Le Duc Anh, pledged he would take such action if cooperation was forthcoming.

**Woman can't work in public after 5 p.m.**

KHARTOUM, Sudan (AP) — Sudan's Muslim fundamentalist government has issued new decrees that ban women from working in markets and other public places after 5 p.m., an official newspaper reported Thursday.

The decrees also require all shops to close down two hours for Friday noon prayers, the army daily al-Kuwait al-Muslaha said.

Sudan's Muslim fundamentalist government has taken a number of steps affecting women, such as requiring female ministry employees to cover their hair, as Islam demands. It also has banned men from working in hair salons for women.

In another development related to Sudan's separation of the sexes, the newspaper reported confusion over who should sit where on public buses. The government had restricted women to the back of the bus, but after women's organizations protested, it moved the women's section to the front.

Now no one is sure where to sit, the newspaper reported.

**Honecker defense presses anew to end manslaughter trial**

BERLIN (AP) — Lawyers for Erich Honecker filed a new petition Thursday to stop his manslaughter trial, saying its only purpose is to torture the ailing former East German leader who is not expected to live to see the verdict.

When the third session of the trial ended, charges against Honecker and three co-defendants still had not been read into the record, and the judges seemed mired in legal motions.

Chief Judge Hansgeorg Braeutigam and his two associates even had to deal with a petition doubting the defendant really was Honecker. It was filed by a relative of a person killed at the Berlin Wall, and the judges rejected the request to fingerprint Honecker, calling it absurd.

The manslaughter charges stem from the deaths of 13 people killed trying to escape to the West during Honecker's 18-year rule as Communist boss, which ended in 1989. He oversaw construction of the wall in 1961.

Honecker, 80, waved cheerfully to supporters in the public gallery Thursday and got quickly to his feet when the judges entered. He lasted through the four-hour session, unlike on Monday when he complained of feeling unwell and the session was cut short.

Defense lawyer Nicolas Becker introduced a letter from Professor Volker Taenzer, a radiologist at the Muesbitz prison hospital who diagnosed Honecker's liver cancer.

Taenzer wrote that the court might violate Honecker's human rights by subjecting him to trial and keeping him in prison where his mental condition was more likely to deteriorate.

Taenzer has estimated Honecker's life expectancy at six to 18 months, while the trial is likely to last two years.

Becker said continuing the trial "can have only one purpose, to torture the defendant."

The next court session is scheduled for Nov. 26, and the judges will rule by then on defense petitions to end the trial and free Honecker from jail. It has rejected such petitions in the past.

On trial with Honecker are three former members of East Germany's national defense council:

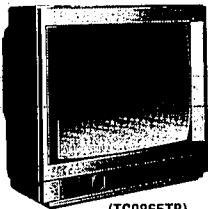
former Defense Minister Heinz Kessler, 72; Hans Albrecht, 72, a party chief in Suhl; and Deputy Defense Minister Fritz Streletz, 66.

Earlier, the court accepted petitions to suspend proceedings against Honecker's former secret police chief, Erich Mielke, 84, and former Premier Willi Stoph, 78, because of their poor health.

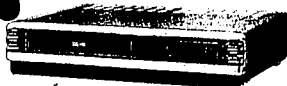
Ruediger Boergen, a lawyer for relatives of people killed at the Berlin Wall, complained that their concerns were being overshadowed by the fuss over Honecker's health.

He also complained that the court was not covering legal expenses of the relatives, who have a role in the trial as co-prosecutors under German law.

## For young blacks, Malcolm X is America

**WASHINGTON** — At all-black, all-male Morehouse College in Atlanta, 75 freshmen grind out papers for History 111 on "The Relevance of the Views of Malcolm X in Today's Society."

Five pages, based only on Malcolm's speeches and writings. Due the day Morehouse alum Spike Lee premieres "Malcolm X," his epic film on the Muslim leader's life. The movie will open nationwide Wednesday.

"I was determined my students would know something about Malcolm before the movie," says instructor Herman Mason Jr. "What Spike presents is going to shape the minds of so many young people who are not going to read."

For the students, Malcolm X is a figure who aptly voices their alienation and hope for redemption.

"They trek with wonder his melancholism from Malcolm Little to Malcolm X to El Hajj Malik al-Shabazz. They want to be Malcolm, mimicking the goatee, horn-rimmed glasses and natty dress, but adopting only bits and pieces of his total philosophy."

"There's all sorts of interesting lessons about the entire African-American experience that can be learned through Malcolm's life," said Robert Franklin, director of black church studies at Emory University in Atlanta.

"I'm less interested in Malcolm as a hero than I am in his life as a window. A lot of brothers are going to be wearing the X, the glasses and all. I'm hoping younger brothers will study his model and embrace the substance. I hope his life can open up a larger arena of study, and white America will become more sensitized to the black experience because of this."

Malcolm X evolved from a drug abuser, petty thief and convict into a disciplined follower of Islam who urged black power "by any means necessary." He called whites "blue-eyed devils," only to retract that sentiment after a pilgrimage to Mecca among Muslims of all races.

Born Malcolm Little on May 19, 1925 in Omaha, Neb., he spent his childhood in Lansing, Mich. He was his seventh-grade class president and aspired to be a lawyer, but was discouraged by a white teacher who told him he couldn't go to college because he was black and suggested he try carpentry instead.

As a teen-ager, Little migrated to Boston and Harlem, where he became a nightclub waiter and picked up an education in hustling just by listening to some of the customers.

Malcolm then became a pimp, drug addict and burglar. While serving a prison sentence for burglary, he re-educated himself, copying the dictionary page-by-page and reading practically every book he could find.

He also discovered the teachings of Elijah Muhammad, leader of the Nation of Islam. After being released from prison in 1952, Malcolm dropped the Little surname and adopted "X," as did all of Muhammad's followers, to signify rejection of their white slave masters' names.

In two years, Malcolm was named minister of the Harlem mosque and emerged as a national spokesman, advocating that blacks own their own businesses, learn their history. In 1958, he married Betty Sanders, now known as Betty

Shabazz; they had six daughters.

"Islam gave him an ideal to work for, gave him moral control. He became very, very idealistic," said David Leigh, a Seattle University professor who studies historical figures who experienced significant life changes.

"What's unusual about Malcolm X is his religious conversion kept developing. His earlier perspective was too narrow. He broadened it. Toward the end, he combined his insistence on black pride with his willingness to work with all races and all people."

Envisioning a more universal worship of Islam, Malcolm subsequently split with Muhammad, and founded the Organization for Afro-American Unity in 1964. But he didn't live long enough to get the group off the ground. He was assassinated at the age of 39 at a Harlem rally Feb. 21, 1965, in front of his wife.

In the weeks before his death, Malcolm toured the South and stopped in Alabama to visit the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., who was preparing a voting rights march on Selma, Ala. He also made the rounds of black colleges, sharing his Mecca experience with students.

"I was awe-struck," said Peter Scott, an editor at The Atlanta Constitution who met Malcolm X in the student newspaper office at Tuskegee Institute Feb. 3, 1965. "He was trying to maybe shape our thinking, coming down there to just talk to us, in his own way, to see if he could keep us on the correct path."

"He'd already broken from the Nation then. One of the things he was trying to do was talk with us about why he'd made the move. I think he must have just returned from Mecca. He told us he had gone there, and seen all these people, black, white, worshipping together. The impression he left us with was that it was possible for all groups of people to live together."

The post-Mecca phase of Malcolm X's life is the one in which Mason would like his students to concentrate. Young people too readily categorize him by his earlier militance and intolerance, he said.

"He was not the hatred-filled man that he may have been prior to going to Mecca," Mason said. "He was a courageous man to have come out and spoke about the goings-on with Elijah Muhammad. There is Malcolm the myth, and Malcolm the man."

## Spike Lee speaks to the point on Malcolm X, racism

**NEW YORK** — As soon as Spike Lee started angling to direct "Malcolm X," the controversies began. There was carping about Lee's ability to be true to the ideals of the slain African-American leader. When the film went over budget, it was news. And when a group of black superstars rallied to his cause with contributions, it was news again.

There were headlines when Lee battled for the right to use the Rodney G. King beating footage in the film. And more when Lee allegedly said students should skip school to see his film on opening day. And more again when it came out that he had asked some publications for African-American interviewees.

Finally, the nearly 3½-hour film starring Denzel Washington opened Wednesday. Dressed casually in a turquoise "X" cap, a blazer, jeans and purple-and-gray Nike sneakers, the outspoken Lee was direct and pointed but at times displayed a sense of

humor as he spoke of Malcolm X, racism and the film industry in an interview at Manhattan's Rigma Hotel.

**Q. How did Malcolm X affect your own political development?**

**A.** It had a great effect. I read the book ("The Autobiography of Malcolm X") in junior high school. It changed everything — the way I thought, the way I felt, the way I viewed the world. It made everything clear for me. The conditions of black people who live in this country, how it came to be that way, why it came to be that way, and what we must do as a people to deal with those things.

**Q. You leveraged the film away from Jewison, claiming it needed a black director. Since the film you've made is a straight bio-pic, why was it so important that it have a black director?**

**A.** White Americans will never know what it feels like to be an African-American in this country. This is a story of Malcolm X, whose life you might say is very symbolic of the whole African-American experience in this country. I've

# Kids applaud 'Malcolm X'

NEW YORK (AP) — They took Spike Lee's advice Wednesday, and the director of "Malcolm X" was right: His new movie was worth taking a day off from school to see, according to students who did just that.

"I wouldn't change a thing about this movie," said 16-year-old Tahira Duncan, who left the theater in tears after watching the film biography with her Afro-American studies class from Montclair, N.J.

"Malcolm X was a hero. He supported black unity. ... There are so many Malcolms dying at the hands of other black men, too many Malcolms. It has to stop," she said.

Duncan was one of about 300 students from Manhattan and Montclair who filled the Victoria 5 movie theater in Harlem to see the latest Spike Lee film — with school permission — instead of heading to class. The movie opened Wednesday at 1,200 theaters nationwide.

The theater, located between the Apollo Theater and Malcolm X Boulevard, held a special morning screening for the group. A night earlier, the cast and crew of "Malcolm X" watched the movie in the theater.

Lee, speaking before the movie's release, had encouraged students to see the film as a school assignment, citing his own forced visit to "Gone With the Wind" while in school.

Several New York City schools, including Lee's alma mater, Junior High School 113 in Brooklyn, sent groups of students to the movie on its opening day. Non-student crowds were heavy in Manhattan, with several theaters reporting first-night sellouts.

The movie follows Malcolm X from his days as a street hustler through his association with the Nation of Islam and his 1965 murder in Harlem's Audubon Ballroom.

Newspaper critics were full of praise, and the reviews from the mostly black crowd were unfailingly upbeat for the 3-hour, 21-minute epic starring Denzel Washington. The crowd cheered a costumed Malcolm in his early days, jeered a hanging judge played by civil-rights attorney William Kunstler, and screamed when Malcolm was assassinated on screen.

"I had mixed emotions between tears and anger. I was caught in between the two," said Coltrane Curtis, 16, wearing a black "X" visor. "This showed the human side of Malcolm.

"I think he was seen as an object, not as a person. This showed him as an average family man, the things he went through with his family. Everybody learned something from this."

And that's not all. Try these reviews:

"Very breathtaking. I felt Spike Lee did a wonderful job. ... The movie is wonderful!" Malika Crossdale, 20, City College.

"It was really powerful. Malcolm was a very

important man to history. It was important," Jason Avery, 16, Montclair High School.

Jesse Jackson, speaking Tuesday in Alabama, agreed with Lee that young people should see the film. "For our youth, 'X' must shift from a clothes style to a life style," said Jackson.

Launumba Bandlee, 20, who accompanied students from the Manhattan Valley Youth Center to the screening, said the film delivers the same message Malcolm was preaching on Harlem street corners three decades ago.

"The main thing of the movie is it's time for all African-Americans to drop the Negro mentality that they're inferior, second-class, don't have ability," he said. "The movies poses us a challenge."

Anges Times to assign an African-American writer to interview you?

A. That's right. Why? Because I don't get hatched jobs done on me. African-American journalists aren't going to ask me, "Spike, so do you have any white friends?" What kind of questions are those? Stupid. I'm going to do interviews, the bulk of the interview should not be some white journalist trying to convince me how liberal they are.

We can go down the line of institutions, sports, white corporate America, the media — the white guys run it. I'm in the position, with the little weight that I have, to demand that.

Q. Most of your movies have been provocative and angry. How about "Malcolm X"?

A. I don't know why I got this angry black man label. What reason would any black man in this country have to be angry about? (He smiles.)

Q. How did you decide which parts of the autobiography to use in the movie?

A. I relied on instinct and my gut feeling. I tried to get the essence of the man. There's no way you can tell the man's entire life in three hours — you can't do it in eight hours.

This is not a documentary. The words that came out of Denzel's mouth are not the same words Malcolm said. But you always have to ask yourself this question: Are you being true to Malcolm, are you being truthful? That's all you can do.

Q. I understand you went to the Nation of Islam before shooting the film. Why?

A. Yes, I went to see Minister Farrakhan to get their blessing, his blessing.

Q. The implication from the movie is that the Nation of Islam was behind the shooting. Do you think Elijah Muhammad ordered Malcolm's killing?

A. They had a lot to do with it. If it wasn't him, it was someone directly under him in Chicago.

Q. Will your relationship with the Nation of Islam be strained after this comes out?

A. We'll have to wait and see what happens when they see the film.

Q. Does white suburban America have an understanding of what

# Muslim terms used in 'Malcolm X' film

The opening of Spike Lee's movie "Malcolm X" has sparked interest in Islam and Malcolm X's identity as a Muslim. All of these terms appear in the film and are defined by the American Muslim Council:

ISLAM: The faith revealed to the Prophet Muhammad between the years 610 and 632 A.D. There are about 1 billion followers of Islam in the world, about 5 million in the United States.

MUSLIM: A member of the Islamic faith. The term "Moslem" is incorrect and highly offensive to followers of Islam.

QURAN: Often referred to as the

Koran, the Quran is regarded by Muslims as the direct word of God as spoken to Muhammad. The Quran is the primary source of revelation to Muslims; the Bible is a secondary text.

ALLAH: The name of "the one God."

BLACK MUSLIM: Used to describe followers of the late Elijah Muhammad, founder of the Nation of Islam. The term is not used casually to describe black American Muslims.

NATION OF ISLAM: Founded by Elijah Muhammad, the black separatist movement is regarded as pseudo-Islamic by followers of Islam. Louis Farrakhan is its leader.

MECCA: Holy city in Saudi Arabia

to which Muslims are expected to make a pilgrimage — or hajj — at least once in their lifetimes.

ELIJAH MUHAMMAD: 1897-1975, founder of the Nation of Islam and leader of the Black Muslim militant black movement. Malcolm X severed ties with Elijah Muhammad late in his life.

EL-HAJJ MALIK SHABAZZ: Malcolm Little, later known as Malcolm X. He formed the Organization of Afro-American Unity a few months after he ended his relationship with Elijah Muhammad and embraced traditional Islam teachings and a more multiracial approach.

and told them that Malcolm was his mentor? Forget about it.

No white director could have gotten Nelson Mandela to be in his film. Hell, no. They probably wouldn't even have thought about it, or seen the connection between Malcolm and Mandela. Warner Bros. (the film's distributor) definitely didn't see the connection.

I don't think a white director could have gotten access to shoot in Mecca, the white city of Mecca. Hell, no. To shoot the sacred site of hajj. That's never been done before. Ever, ever, ever. 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# Coppola's 'Dracula' lacks substance

## Review

In 1897, an Irish writer named Bram Stoker introduced the world to a horrific and hygienic count named Dracula, whose fangs were long and "cut to a sharp point," and who had "peculiarly sharp white teeth."

His book, "Dracula," was not the first work of English literature to detail the life and times of vampires. At least three others appeared prior to his. But Stoker's novel of Jonathan and Mina Harker, their servant friends and the wise Dr. Abraham Van Helsing, has become the definitive account of the haunted blood sucker.

It was an erotically romantic and gothic tale of moral and philosophical conflicts. It also was scary and frightening with its marvelous details of a man-creature who could slither down the side of a castle wall like a well-oiled lizard. Today, it remains superhigh camp.

In crafting his own take on the infamous count, Francis Ford Coppola has stayed fairly close to Stoker's book, and the end result is the estimated \$42-million "Bram Stoker's Dracula."

Coppola attempts to combine horror, romance, philosophy, humor, adventure and ecstasies into one big stylish brew. But what he churns out is vastly unappealing.

Yes, the movie is lovingly shot with beautiful cinematography, lavish, elegant costuming, lush sets and excellent performances from Gary Oldman, Anthony Hopkins and Winona Ryder.

But it's too long on style and illusionary effects and very short on substance. It also is hampered by Kevin Reeves' miscast in the pivotal role of Jonathan Harker. Reeves, whose British accent is almost as bad as Kevin Costner's in "Robin Hood," gives a wooden and embarrassing performance and serves only as a distraction from what could have been a wonderful journey.

Reeves clearly is out of his league.

First there's Oldman, last emerging as the consummate character actor of the 1990s, doing superb business as Count Dracula. We first meet him as the young, virile nobleman who attacks God

and church when his young bride is slaughtered. Then he appears as the ancient vampire, done up in flowing, crimson robes, long white hair twirled about his head. Later, he metamorphoses into a scaly, taloned creature of the night.

Oldman is just marvelous with a precise menace and courtly air. He can be forgiven when he delivers a line in much the same way as Bela Lugosi did in Tod Browning's "Dracula," the campy but stilled 1931 horror movie: "I do not drink... blood."

Ditto, "Listen to them — the children of the night. What music they make!" It is a line taken from the Stoker novel and is so wickedly delicious.

Then there's Hopkins as Dr. Van Helsing, the vampire expert. Hopkins scampers about with a certain insouciance, firing off the script's best comedic lines and making even the silliest dialogue sound scholarly. He's indeed an actor's actor, an artist who can adeptly shape and deliver any character and situation.

Ryder is properly fragile as the object of Dracula's desire, the reincarnation of his lost love and the human who can lead him to salvation. She is an exceptional young actress, who has yet to reach her peak.

There's also good support from Tom Waits as the deranged Renfield and Sade Frost as the voluptuous victim Lucy Westenra.

There's lots of violence and blood in Coppola's film, but few truly scary moments. Then again, the Lugosi version also was not a fright fest.

The vampire horror can be found in F.W. Murnau and Heinrich Galem's classic 1921 "Nosferatu" with its eerie shadows and silhouettes of a hovering, nightmarish Count Orlok. In later years, both Klaus Kinski and Christopher Lee have provided frightening interpretations.

Michael Ballhaus, who has worked with such directors as Rainer Werner Fassbinder, Martin Scorsese and John Sayles, provides excellent photography in "Bram Stoker's Dracula." And, de-

signed Eiko Ishioka, who worked on the Broadway production of "M. Butterfly" and designed the Japanese poster for "Apocalypse Now," created an extraordinary array of costumes and fantasy clothes.

Greg Cannom is to be commended for his aging makeup of Oldman, and there are nice visual effects by Roman Coppola.

With its opulent look and campy subject, "Bram Stoker's Dracula" will likely find a devoted audience. But it is a film that does not measure up to Coppola's masterpieces, "Apocalypse Now" and "The Godfather."

## Columbo almost wasn't

Back in 1968, TV's crime-solving sector welcomed several fresh recruits. Among the more noteworthy: Pete, Linc and Julie, the trio of anti-establishment sleuths in "The Mod Squad." Detective Steve McGarrett, who regularly instructed Danno to "book 'em" against a lush tropical backdrop in "Hawaii Five-O" and a permanently rumpled police detective by the name of Lt. Columbo slouched onto the scene for the very first time in a made-for-TV called "Prescription: Murder."

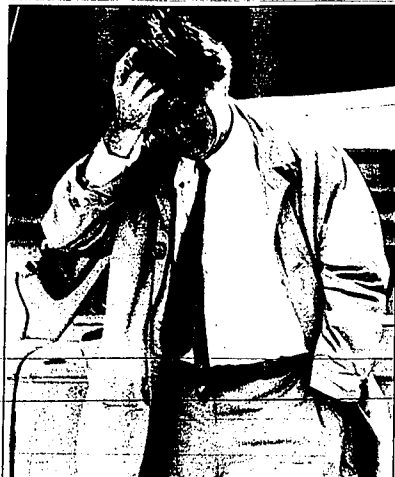
Well, the tie-dye faded on "The Mod Squad" long ago, and McGarrett said his last aloha in 1980, but the seemingly slow-witted man with the cigar and the sorry-looking raincoat lives on.

As a matter of fact, he'll be putting his wis to the test once again in "Columbo: A Bird in the Hand."

In his latest game of cat and mouse, Peter Falk's distracted detective is called upon to solve not one but three homicides, with a cast of suspicious characters that includes a compulsive, debt-ridden gambler (Greg Evigan) and the seductive wife (Tyrne Daly) of a pro-football team owner (Steve Forrest).

As "Columbo" is about to mark the 25th anniversary of its first appearance, it should be noted that this ongoing hybrid of classic British protagonist almost never got off the drawing board.

In his comprehensive 1989 volume, "The Columbo Philie: A Casebook," author Mark Dawidziak writes of the detective's rocky beginnings. Created by the successful TV-writing team of William Link and the late Richard Levinson, who followed "Prescription: Murder" with another Columbo TV movie, 1971's "Ransom for a Dead Man," before NBC decided to add it to its new "Mystery Movie" package,

where it would alternate...with "McMillan and Wife" and "McCloud."

But the network submitted a list of several "suggestions" (or demands) to the creators before it was willing to issue the go-ahead.

Of greatest concern was the show's trademark hook of the audience always knowing who committed the murder before the star did. NBC believed it climaxed the suspense factor and was a novelty that would quickly wear off. The network also wanted less talk and more action (as in violence and a few car

chases) and would have liked to see Columbo surrounded by a cast of regulars, or at the very least have a young sidekick.

Thankfully, Levinson and Link stuck by their guns, and the detective made his first regular appearance on Sunday, Sept. 15, 1971, in an episode called "Murder by the Book." Jack Cassidy and Martin Milner were among the guest stars, while behind the scenes, a pair of Stevens were making their mark—the director was Steven Spielberg and the young writer was named Steven Bochop.

## Dennehy portrays honest cop

LOS ANGELES — It was, Brian Dennehy said, "one honest cop against a corrupt group — and he nailed them."

Dennehy stars in the NBC miniseries "Deadly Matrimony" as sheriff's investigator Jack Reed in Cook County, Ill., who helped bring down corrupt officials.

"It's a real story," Dennehy said. "It has every corruption and crime you can imagine."

"Deadly Matrimony" is inspired by the case of attorney Alan Masters, who was convicted in 1989 in U.S. District Court in Chicago of conspiring to kill his wife and cover up the killing.

Dianne Masters' body was found in the trunk of her yellow-and-white Cadillac in the Illinois Sanitary and Ship Canal in Willow Springs in 1982. She had disappeared nine months earlier. The vehicle was winched up by officers looking into cars dumped in the canal as part of an insurance scam.

"Jack Reed was the man who broke the Masters murder case," Dennehy said. He was "a cop who said he was going to do something. Today, if you're a cop the smartest thing you can do is turn your back and walk away. Thank God, they don't all do it."

Treat Williams also stars as Masters, Embehl Davidtz as his wife Dianne Masters, Lisa Eilbacher as her friend, and Susan Rutan as Reed's wife, Arlene.

The miniseries will air Sunday and Monday on K38AS, KIFI and other NBC stations.

## Jacksons movie keeps ABC at No. 1

LOS ANGELES — "The Jacksons" television movie on the famous singing clan helped ABC grab its third straight weekly ratings win.

ABC had a 13.4 percent average rating for the week of Nov. 9-15, according to A.C. Nielsen Co. figures released Tuesday. CBS was second with a 12.9 average, followed by NBC with an 11.6 average. Each ratings point represents 931,000 homes.

Part 1 of "The Jacksons: An American Dream" finished in third place for the week. The No. 1 spot went to CBS' news-magazine "60 Minutes."

ABC's "Roseanne" finished second, with CBS' "Murphy Brown" at No. 4 and NBC's "Cheers" in the fifth spot.

## 'Roc' promises new life for deadly sitcom format

NEW YORK — The four broadcast networks' fall prime-time schedules are infested with no fewer than three dozen half-hour sitcoms. Of those, only one, the Fox network's "Roc," fulfills a promise every sitcom makes, at least implicitly, every time it hits the airwaves.

"Roc," about a Baltimore garbage collector and his working-class family, has set itself apart in its second season with a policy of performing and airing each episode live.

"We're hoping for new directions," series star Charles S. Dutton said. "The ultimate challenge is to find interesting new ways to do things. If it's going to be the same format, the same three-jokes-a-page kind of concept without breaking any rules, we might as well have stayed on film."

"For example, I imagine Roc coming from work one day, just walking onto the stage in his work clothes, and when the show starts, boom, he's there, nobody's home, and he's talking to himself in character. Just imagine a three-page monologue of a man alone."

Live-ness is important for "Roc," not because all viewers actually see it live (certain areas of the country get a taped replay). What counts is

that, while other sitcoms are staged to simulate theater performances, "Roc" certifiably is one.

The viewer is guaranteed that each episode is performed in front of a flesh-and-blood audience, from start to finish. No scenes are reshot, no supplementary scenes added. The laughter and applause are real.

Theater trades in illusion, but with "Roc" the viewer knows where the illusion ends and the truth begins.

By contrast, the rest of the sitcom pack is routinely edited, reshot, artificially enhanced. The result: An illusion of theatrical illusion.

Maybe TV viewers still support this sitcom resurgence because, after more than 40 years, they are conditioned. They are programmed for the frantic sitcom pace, the driving rhythm of the gaglines, the hopped-up hysteria of the in-studio audience, all of which carry the presumption of hilarity. The viewer gives in to the power of suggestion that what is going on is funny, whether it's funny or not.

Almost one-quarter of the networks' prime-time slots is sitcoms, so take heed. The next time that merry CBS promo beckons "all those who love great comedy say 'eye,'" you might look yourself in your own bloodshot eyes and consider an alternative.

## Crier moves to ABC

That's the word from ABC News President Roncario Arledge as speculation increased that Crier would anchor or co-anchor one of two new ABC prime-time newsmagazines and also substitute for Peter Jennings on "World News Tonight" and Ted Koppel on "Nightline." The job at "20/20" will give her a chance to hone her reportorial credentials, said a top ABC News executive.

Before joining CNN, Crier was a state civil district judge in Dallas.

# Will friendlier White House bring changes?

LOS ANGELES — Dan Quayle and Murphy Brown will stop making faces at each other come January when an administration more partial to the "cultural elite" takes over in Washington.

While many in television said it's unlikely viewers will see dramatic changes on the tube, some observers contend liberals will push television into more daring and partisan territory.

"Linda Bloodworth-Thomason — take the shackles off her. It will be full speed ahead with her man in the White House," said Betsy Frank, senior vice president for Saatchi & Saatchi Advertising in New York.

Jack Thompson, an attorney and anti-obscenity activist in Coral Gables, Fla., said Bill Clinton's presidency will send "a message, a wrong message, that it's no holds barred."

Bloodworth-Thomason said she plans to take on topical issues in her new CBS comedy, "Hearts Affire," set in Washington. But the Clinton confidante, known for spinning liberal riffs on "Designing Women" asks for credit for intellectual honesty.

"I have always been a bit of a contrarian and want to examine closely whoever has the reins of power," she said. "I don't think the fact a friend of mine is president of the United States will alter my writing."

Dick Wolf, executive producer of the NBC drama "Law and Order," agreed. "I think as soon as (comic impersonator) Dana Carvey figures out how to do Clinton, it will be business as usual," he said.

"CBS' 'Murphy Brown,' which took the brunt of Quayle's attacks on an industry he claimed undermines family values, already squeezed in a mild Clinton-era line: 'Looks like Tipper and Hillary are ready for another pitcher of margaritas,' bartender Phil joked in a recent episode.

In September, Clinton told a star-studded raiser in Los Angeles that he's always longed to be part of the "cultural elite" and called his audience "gifted, creative and caring Americans."

However, he counseled Hollywood in a recent TV Guide interview to re-examine itself, calling mindless sex and violence in popular culture a "net negative for America."

Thompson said Clinton lacks the moral stature to influence Hollywood. He said the president-elect also isn't beholden to those who "were holding George Bush's feet to the fire on these issues."

But the Clinton administration is going to make the pushing of limits more frequent and more bizarre, because there is no moral compass, at least in the White House," Thompson said.

## Clinton zaps TV commercials

RADNOR, Pa. — President-elect Clinton and Vice President Dan Quayle agree on at least one issue — television should clean up its act.

"TV and movie makers could, without undermining their artistic integrity, have a major new impact on the way people view the world — giving people something to look up to, deglamorizing mindless sex and violence," Clinton said in the Nov. 21 issue of TV Guide.

"My wife and I were talking about some of that stuff a long time before Dan Quayle got after Murphy Brown," Clinton said. "I thought he picked the wrong target and was obviously trying to politicize it, but there's no question the cumulative impact of this banalization of sex and violence in the popular culture is a net negative for America."

As a family, Clinton, his wife, Hillary, and their daughter, Chelsea, usually watch sports, news, specials and such reruns as "The Donna Reed Show." Clinton said he had Chelsea also like "American Gladiators."

"When I discovered 'American Gladiators' I thought it was the campiest thing," he said. "Now Chelsea and I watch it and laugh. Hillary thinks it's awful."

Asked who controls the television when he and his wife watch, Clinton said it's often a struggle.

"I'm in the kind of guy politicians hate, because I always zap past the commercials, political ads included. Hillary doesn't do that," he said.

He predicted the religious right will rely less on government "as a player in the cultural civil war" and more on boycotts and civil lawsuits.

Frank said racism is a television trend that held steady during the GOP years. The networks, after all, have to compete with less-regulated cable and videotapes.

Television clearly has retreated on one issue, abortion, said Robert Singer, executive producer of the NBC drama "Reasonable Doubts."

"That seems to be the last baggage," he said, the one that drives fearful advertisers away from shows. And it's advertiser squeamishness, not White House sniping, which ultimately reins in television, Frank said.

"Our clients are concerned that any programming they're in doesn't alienate a significant number of potential customers," she said. "I don't see TV becoming so far left that advertisers are going to desert the medium."

# 'Brooklyn Bridge' collapses, crushed by time-slot changes

There isn't a big enough rubber brick made to hurt at CBS for killing "Brooklyn Bridge."

Oh, they said the show was going "on hiatus" after last Saturday's episode. But that was just corporate mumbo jumbo. The show's been canceled.

"It's over," said Gary David Goldberg, its dismayed producer-creator.

Based on Goldberg's fond memories of his own 1950s childhood in Brooklyn, N.Y., "Brooklyn Bridge" possessed a specific humor, spirit and a charming wit. It is simply one of the finest family comedy series in TV history.

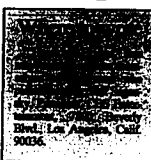
Seven remaining episodes will air later this year, Goldberg said. And there is talk of perhaps reviving the show on cable in its first-run syndication. But Goldberg, who also created "Family Ties," admitted the odds of that happening are very slim.

"CBS was not going to do what they had to do," Goldberg said in a phone interview from his Los Angeles offices. "And that was put us on a night where we had an opportunity to draw an audience."

"We have never aired five times in a row. And

"Brooklyn Bridge" was never on any sort of stable night."

Goldberg did praise CBS for giving him total creative freedom to make the show the way he wanted. They were great to us on that one level...

"But what they did on the programming level, they just killed us. They humiliated and tortured us. That's tough to say, but it's the truth."

Besides the cancellation of "Brooklyn Bridge," Goldberg cited the imminent demise of NBC's "11th Hour" and ABC's decision to yank "The Young and Rubicam Show" as evidence of a crisis in network television: Quality keeps losing out.

"It's like General Motors," Goldberg said. "They're just not getting it."

"All the innovation in TV is coming from CNN, HBO, MTV and others. But the networks are still loading up on chrome and big tail fins."

It's a long way from Pine Valley, USA, to Budapest, Hungary, but ABC's "All My Children" found a way to link them in a story line involving the show's premiere actress, Susan Lucci.

As far back as January of this year, exec producer Felicia Minei Behr was formulating the idea of a magnificent location shoot in Russia for the storyline which would reunite lovers Erica (Lucci) and Dimitri (Michael Nader) in an atmosphere not unlike that of "Doctor Zhivago." After a trip to Russia to scout locations and check out the feasibility of the location shoot, the producer decided it would entail too many obstacles and the plan was dropped.

Some months later, head writer Agnes Nixon was having lunch in a restaurant in New York and the owner approached her and told her about a restaurant he had just opened in Budapest, a city which he went on to extol in lavish terms. The seed was planted and Nixon suggested Behr look into the possibility of a location shoot in Budapest. The rest, as they say, is recent history.

Of course, there has to be a villain, and Callahan's Edmund, Dimitri's vengeful half brother, more than fills the bill. Edmund is egged on by Helga (Willis) who also has a strong taste for revenge.

In a recent press conference, held at a Hungarian restaurant in New York City, Susan Lucci and the Messrs. Nader and Callahan shared their adventures with the press. Callahan really got into it and even took a crash course in Hungarian. He did a lot of sightseeing and was able to communicate with the Hungarians he met. John admitted that he wasn't really proficient in Hungarian but it pleased and surprised him when he was able to make himself understood.

Nader was impressed with the beauty of Budapest and enjoyed the added freedom of playing scenes on boats and in cars. He said the romantic elements of the script certainly took on more momentum played out, as they were,

against the background of fabulous old buildings, quaint bridges and colorful streets that reeked with character.

# Ever wonder where babies come from?

In the magical world of TV, the bundle of joy are usually bundles from the doll factory

LOS ANGELES—Family values aside, baby-making on television can be as easy as wrapping up a doll and hauling it around.

"They just dub in the cooing or crying or other sound effects," said veteran network producer Lew Hunter, co-chair of the UCLA screenwriting department. "Since time began, they've been using dolls."

Many scenes in ABC's "Everybody's Baby: The Rescue of Jessica McClure," a 1989 made-for-TV movie, were done with a doll, said Irene Bayless Gallagher, who owns the Screen Children's Agency of Studio City.

Things get more complicated, however, if TV babies need to be of the real-tears variety.

Nearly 25 infants have been used in rehearsals and filming to play Candice Bergen's newborn son on CBS' "Murphy Brown," a birth that sparked a national debate about unwed motherhood.

But at that age sex doesn't matter, at least on TV. Little girls were often used to play Murphy's baby boy. "They are all

one pink little wrinkle," explained casting director Arnie Schwartz.

Strict laws govern the use of flesh-and-blood TV babies, says Mark Locher, national director of communications for the Screen Actors Guild.

No infant can appear in a movie or TV series until he or she is at least 15 days old, he said.

And from 15 days to 6 months of age, a baby "can only be on a set or at a place of employment for a maximum of two hours. Within that two hours, they can only work on camera a total of 20 minutes," he added.

The laws were imposed primarily to safeguard a baby's eyes, but it sure cuts down on the work life of a newborn thespian.

Time took its toll on Daniel and Kevin Renteria, who played the newborns on ABC's "Full House" last season. They were replaced this year by Blake and Dylan Tuomy-Wilhoit because in television time, the kids aged quicker than the characters, said Don Van Atta, co-executive producer.

Once babies weigh 9 pounds or reach the ripe old age of 6 weeks, their newborn careers are about over, Gallagher said.

Twins or triplets are always preferred, Gallagher said. They are born smaller and

more than one child can double or triple the amount of time legally available per day for shooting an infant scene.

Premature infants are sometimes used. "They are older chronologically, but they are still smaller so they look more like newborns," explained J.J. Jure, the "baby lady" at Herb Tannen & Associates talent agency.

But "most people would rather have full-term twins than a premature single baby," said Christa Dash, a commercial agent for Harry Gold & Associates.

In the first five episodes about the birth of "Murphy Brown's" famous baby, four or five sets of twins were used, said Gallagher. "We are now working with triplets."

A newborn is paid the same as any other minimum-wage actor, Locher said. "The current rate is \$466 per day. In addition, the employer or producer must make pension and health contributions. That work will also pay residuals into perpetuity."

"It will pay for diapers or hospital bills and it's wonderful college money," Gallagher said.

Triplets play the baby on CBS' "Evening Shade" these days, but several

different babies were used last season when the child was a newborn.

For CBS' mid-season replacement "Dr. Quinn, Medicine Woman," Gallagher found a set of Hispanic twins through a Twins club in the San Fernando Valley. The show gave the twins over 10 days worth of work, she said.

"The babies on 'Homefront' (from ABC) live in Las Vegas. They started as newborns. They just fly in (for filming)," Gallagher said.

"Babies have always been popular (Lucille Ball's Little Ricky captivated the nation in the 1950s). Whenever you want to get an extra ratings boost for your series you can go to Paris or some exotic locale, have somebody get married or have somebody have a baby," Hunter said.

"Hang the expense and unprofitability (of babies) if we can get an extra three or four points out of the ratings," Hunter said.

"Murphy Brown" has sustained her ratings through having a baby. So much of life does get down to dollars and cents. People today use babies to catch an audience and if that isn't enough, let the baby have AIDS."

# Woman makes college basketball history today

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP) — Melissa Burden will share a rare place in college basketball history today when she takes the court for the Savannah College of Art and Design.

She is expected to become one of the few women to play on a men's college basketball team when SCAD opens its NCAA Division III season against Maryville College in Maryville, Tenn.

Although no one keeps definitive records on such things, only one other team is known to have had a woman player.

At Pratt Institute in New York, which has no women's basketball program, Anne Brigette Nilssen, a Norwegian student, played last season, and in 1975, Cindy Meserve was a reserve for the same Division III team.

SCAD, 0-26 in its inaugural men's season last year, is planning to add a women's program next season — after Burden, a 5-foot-7 senior, graduates.

"I'm a little nervous," said Burden, who may even be in the starting lineup. "I'm looking forward to it. I imagine the first couple of minutes will be nerve-racking, but after that I'll be all right."

"There is a possibility we will start her in certain situations," said first-year coach Wayne West. "She has a good outside shot and quickness. We're going to look at her at point and the second guard, but she'll probably play the

second guard because she has such a good shot."

Burden, who also plays on SCAD's women's softball and volleyball teams, said she wanted to try out for the men's team last season but didn't get any support.

"This year coach West was very positive," she said. "He said, 'I'm going to treat you like everybody else, no special treatment,' and I decided to go out."

"We're about filling goals," said West. "She's a senior, and expressed the desire to play this year, right now. I went to my athletic director (Karen Ryan) and she said check with the NCAA. They didn't see anything wrong with it; we certainly weren't breaking any rules."

Burden outplayed 18 men to make the final cut, including two who played last season.

West said he told her there would be no pampering.

"I said, 'You may get cut, but if you are one of the 12 I feel will mold into the best possible team, you're going to be on the team.'"

She said she's been knocked around pretty good by her teammates in scrimmages, but they have received her well.

"They don't give me special treatment," she said. "If they do, coach gets on them and tells them I need to be prepared for the game."

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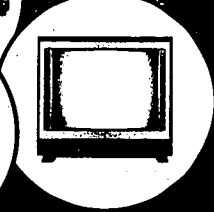
