people returning for help a second year. "It's not a sustaining thing. It's just for

Hudson remembers when the group helped the family of a woman whose husband had leukemia. Since then, the husband has died and the woman is now happily remarried, Hudson said.

Although she no longer lives in eastern Twin Falls County, Hudson said the woman showed her gratitude by donating 150 plucked chickens to the Providers.

"Now she's knocking on doors for us," Hudson said. "She said she wanted to give something back."

Aid from the once-needy creates a rare circle of understanding and assistance.

"It's not common, but it's rewarding."

Dad thankful for sons' 1st steps

CHICAGO - When Ron Greenfield met the little Russian boys who would become his sons, he didn't speak their language, he didn't know their customs. But he did identify with them.

Like Greenfield, 4-year-old twins Andrew Anton and Maxwell Sergei are amputees. Greenfield knew their shared handicap would be an instant bond. One smile from them and he knew they'd be an instant family.

This week, Greenfield and his wife, Janet, celebrated a special, early Thanksgiving, watching their adopted sons giggle and squeal, taking their first tentative steps on artificial legs at the Rehabilitation Institute of Chicago.

It was a poignant, proud moment for Greenfield, a 47-year-old Vietnam veteran who lost part of his left leg from a war injury.

"I just got a real warm feeling all through my body when I saw the look on

Somalia assistance offer prompts mixed response

MOGADISHU, Somalia - An aid agency predicted disaster Thursday if the United States sends a large military force to this starving nation, but other relief specialists welcomed Washington's offer.

Acting Secretary of State Lawrence S. Eagleburger told U.N. chief Boutros Boutros-Ghali on Wednesday the United States was willing to send up to 30,000 soldiers to Somalia as part of a U.N. peacekeeping force.

If the offer is accepted, it would mark largest deployment of U.S. troops in a U.N. operation since the Korean War. Only small groups of American soldiers have been involved in U.N. operations since then. Boutros-Ghali will present a plan to the

U.N. Security Council next week to expand the scope of U.N. operations in Somalia, a senior U.N. official in New York said Thursday, on condition he not be named. The official refused to say if the Secretary-General would recommend the council accept the U.S. offer.

The United Nations in August authorized deployment of a 3,500-member force to Somalia to guard humanitarian efforts, but only 500 have arrived because of objections from two leading world powers.

College braces for flood

TWIN FALLS - The College of Southern Idaho will have a lot more company next fall if informal surveys of southern Idaho and northern Nevada high school students turn out to be accurate.

Those surveys show CSI could have a 10-percent-plus enrollment increase next year, leaving the school scrambling to find housing and enough teachers to meet the demand.

CSI officials have visited area high schools this fall recruiting students and explaining the school's offerings to students considering a college education, President Gerald Meyerhoeffer said.

"It gives us some lead time in what to do with students" in case of an enrollment increase, Meyerhoeffer said. This year more students than ever said they planned on attending CSI, he said.

CSI enrollment has been soaring for the past several years.

This year for instance, 2,391 academic students enrolled, which is 291 students or almost 14 percent more than last year. The number of vocational students increased to 638, which is 105 students or 15.4 percent more than last year.

If the school's enrollment increases next year as projected, CSI will have to make some adjustments, Meyerhoeffer said.

But if as expected state funding for CSI remains about the same as last year, the college will be hard pressed to hire the new teachers it will need to meet the increased demand, he said.

The projected increase also adds impetus for a proposal for a \$1.5 million CSI dormitory addition that would house 100 students, Meyerhoeffer said.

Student housing has been increasingly hard to find in Twin Falls. In several recent years, scores of students have decided not to attend CSI because they were unable to find housing, Graydon Stanley, director of student activities, has said.

The new dormitory space would be funded by rent paid by the 100 students who would occupy the building.

CSI is looking for ways it can more accurately predict enrollment several months in advance, such as requiring pre-registration in the spring, Meyerhoeffer said.

Crews battle Shoshone blaze

SHOSHONE - Firefighters were battling the final stages of a blaze late Thursday evening that had engulfed a 100-year-old building in the middle of town containing a grocery store, offices and a laundromat.

Crews from Shoshone, Richfield and Gooding were fighting the fire, Lincoln County Sheriff's dispatcher Diane Houser said. The Shoshone Fire Department received a call at 7 p.m., firefighter Dale Bennett said. When firefighters arrived at the scene Henson's Market was fully engulfed, he said.

They concentrated on keeping the blaze from spreading to the adjacent city hall, library and Buzotto's Furniture and Appliance, Houser said. Those buildings suffered smoke damage, she said.

Market owner Jay Henson said he arrived at the scene shortly after 8 p.m. "It was all gone when I got here," Henson said.

Many Shoshone residents turned out to help firefighters battle the blaze, resident Phil Brown said.

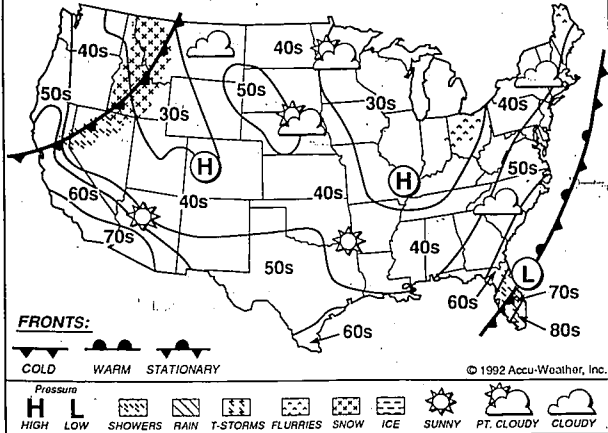

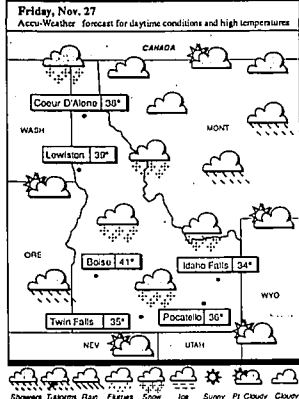

East has soggy holiday; bitter cold engulfs Rockies

Rain fell along the East Coast on Thursday, with snow lingering in the Mississippi Valley, and temperatures fell to as low as 20 below zero in the northern Rockies. Showers and thunderstorms were scattered from northern Florida to the mid Atlantic Coast at midday, with rain and drizzle to the Northeast. Orangeburg, S.C., got over 5 inches of rain in five hours during the night. Several South Carolina rivers were at or near flood stage. Heavier rainfall totals for the six hours up to 11 a.m. MST included 2.25 inches at Wilmington, N.C., and 1.84 inches at Waycross, Ga., the National Weather Service said. Dense fog prevailed along the central Atlantic Coast. Wilmington, Del., reported a visibility of just one-sixteenth of a mile during the early afternoon.

In the aftermath of the storm that dumped heavy snow on the Plains, light snow lingered Thursday from extreme eastern Kansas across the middle Mississippi Valley into Wisconsin. During the night, the storm produced heavy snow in west-central Wisconsin, including 9 to 12 inches in Crawford County and 6 to 9 inches in Vernon County, the weather service said. Totals in adjacent southeastern Minnesota ranged up to 8 inches at Mable. Midday temperatures were only in the teens and single digits over parts of the Rocky Mountains, and readings as far south as the Texas coast were only in the 40s. West Yellowstone, Mont., reported a midday temperature of just 2 above zero, following a morning low of 20 below zero.

without the warlords' authorization if the Security Council broadens their mission.
Relief officials here were enthusiastic about the prospect of having thousands of American troops guarding convoys, which have been repeatedly attacked by bandits, and ensuring food is not stolen at Mogadishu's port or elsewhere.
"Obviously, if you put 30,000 troops in Somalia it's going to have a positive effect on moving food out of Mogadishu port," said Rick Grant of CARE.
The agency has been designated by the United Nations to move food from the port to starving Somalis in the capital and drought-ravaged countryside.
But another relief agency sharply criticized the U.S. troop proposal.
"Imposing troops on Somalia as suggested by the United States would be a disaster for the whole relief operation," the British-based Save the Children said in a statement issued in London.
"If troops arrive without the consent and understanding of the Somali population, it could turn the population against all outside intervention, including humanitarian relief," said the agency, which runs feeding centers and clinics for mothers and children here.
The United Nations estimates 300,000 people have died from war and famine and 2 million more risk starvation.

De Klerk sets date for multiracial vote

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — President F.W. de Klerk on Thursday spelled out for the first time exactly when South Africa's ruling whites may relinquish power, calling for multiracial elections by April of 1994.
"Totally unacceptable," said the African National Congress, which demanded voting for an interim government before the end of next year.
But both sides were at least able to take some satisfaction in that now, after almost three years of faltering reforms, the country's future has come down to little more than a question of dates. De Klerk told reporters that he was announcing the government's timetable Thursday to combat what he said were "unrealistic expectations" being raised about the possibility of an election in the near future.

Abortion reforms appears to falter

DUBLIN, Ireland — Voters overwhelmingly rejected a proposal to loosen the strictest abortion regulations in Europe, according to preliminary national referendum returns announced late Thursday.
The figures from Ireland's two largest cities indicated a more than 2-to-1 defeat for a constitutional amendment to allow abortion when a woman's life is in danger.
Final results from Wednesday's voting have not been announced, but it is believed the voting in Dublin and Cork will reflect trends across the predominantly Roman Catholic nation. About 12 percent of the vote had been counted by early Friday.

Amputation was necessary. Andy lost his right leg. Max both legs. Though his circumstances were very different, Greenfield believed he'd be a good role model.
"Even though they're amputees," he said, "they have no limitations — only what they want placed on themselves."
"Doctors have a tendency to say, 'You can't do this, you can't do that,'" he added. "If I want to try something, I just go ahead and do it."
Greenfield, a soft-spoken manager at Ameritech Corp., plays basketball and football. He drives a motorcycle. He runs in races, and he's a mean rock 'n' roll dancer. He is constantly wearing out his artificial leg.
"I've developed a can-do attitude," he said.
"That's what I'm going to try to communicate to the boys."

Hudson said of those who return to town.
Giving back was what brought Hudson into his current role as a community assistance leader.
A retired Air Force colonel, Hudson been working with the Providers since 1983.
"My parents always taught service, and to give back to the community where you got," Hudson said.
Marshall said Hudson and his wife, Betty, deserve credit for what they give the community at this time of year.
"He and his wife put their life into it every year," Marshall said.
Last year the Providers gave out 7,000 meal equivalents to the needy with help from churches, Boy Scouts and school food drives and Federal Emergency Management Agency funds.
Expecting less than the \$1,000 they received from FEMA last year, the East End Providers are also struggling with their food and fund drive while trying to keep up with requests. "This year the demand is higher than what you'd expect," Hudson said.
Striving to raise \$3,000, Hudson said donations are "a little slow coming in." Corporate donations are down, but food donations are up, Hudson said.
The arrival of Thanksgiving helps remind residents of the charity and donations typically begin increasing afterwards, Marshall said.
Proving that point was last week's Boy Scout food drive that collected 22 cases of food, which is eight more than they brought in last year. And a Friday community dinner in Murtagh collected 20 cases of food and \$408.06 in cash.
"You get a real sense of what Christmas is about. There's a lot in return that's not tangible," he said.
Aside from donations, Marshall said volunteers are the biggest need during the holiday season.
"Ed really starts chewing on his cigars at the end," Marshall said.
"People are so busy," he said. "If they could just give a day or morning, it really does something."
Someone who offers her time is self-described "foot soldier" Lillian Andrews, who, among other duties, is trying to round up a brand-new toy for each family.
"I just thought we should do our part to bring some equity," Andrews, the Providers vice chairman, said. "Even though you never see them, you know you've done something right."

Clinton backs Bush on Somalia

President-elect says it's high time for U.S. to take initiative

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — President-elect Clinton served turkey for battered children at a shelter on Thanksgiving and said he backs Bush administration efforts to help the starving nation of Somalia.

Talking to reporters after one of two shelter stops, Clinton said he welcomed word that Acting Secretary of State Lawrence S. Eagleburger had discussed options on Somalia with United Nations chief Boutros Boutros-Ghali.

Eagleburger said the United States was willing to send up to 30,000 soldiers to Somalia as part of a U.N. peacekeeping force.

The president-elect, who said his aides had talked Thursday to National Security Adviser Brent Scowcroft, declined comment on any possible use of force until President Bush decides what course to follow.

"The thing I think is so heartening is that the United States is now taking the initiative, going to the United Nations with a number of options, obviously considering pushing this more strongly," Clinton said. "I think it is high time."

"I think the American people should be happy and I'm glad that it's happening on Thanksgiving," he said.

In a taped appearance on CBS-TV's "NFL Today" pre-game show, Clinton said he's "going slow" on picking his Cabinet because "I like to pick a good team and I really believe in team work."

Clinton, in an interview taped Wednesday, said his most memorable Thanksgiving memory was his mother taking in one of his needy schoolmates for dinner because the child only had a bag of Fritos to eat.

"Thanksgiving ought to be a time

when those of us who have anything are grateful and sensitive to those of us who have nothing," Clinton said.

Clinton started the day running in Little Rock's annual "Turkey Trot" five kilometer race, then visited the Dorcas House shelter for women and children — a home he often goes to on holidays.

About 20 children came outside to greet him, and he went in to help carve the turkey and serve them. Later, he stopped by a rescue mission for transient men before returning to the Arkansas governor's mansion for a traditional dinner with his family.

Unlike President Bush, Clinton apparently likes broccoli. It was on the menu for the Thanksgiving feast along with turkey, ham, sweet potatoes and Irish potatoes, green beans, cranberry sauce, bread dressing and compound dressing, Bing cherry gelatin salad, a relish tray with pickled watermelon, carrot cake and four types of pie — lemon, pumpkin, mince-meat and pecan.

He feasted with his wife, Hillary, 12-year-old daughter, Chelsea; mother, Virginia Kelley; stepfather, Dick Kelley; and Hillary's parents, Hugh and Dorothy Rodham.

At the "Turkey Trot" race, which Clinton has run in for the past six years, he whipped out a \$20 bill to pay the \$15 registration fee.

Clinton, running in a pack with about 300 others, finished the roughly three-mile race in 24 minutes, 16 seconds — about 8 minutes behind the first-place finisher.

"I won my age and body fat division," Clinton said laughing.

On Friday, the Clinton family was heading to California for a long weekend of mostly vacation time.

Aides keep president abreast during vacation

KENNEBUNKPORT, Maine (AP) — Undeterred by a tight rain and poor visibility, President Bush played golf for two hours Thursday to work up an appetite for his turkey dinner.

In keeping with his practice since losing the elections on Nov. 3, Bush kept the press at bay. Reporters and photographers were not allowed on the course and were forced to keep watch from about 500 yards away as Bush and his wife Barbara played with a local golf pro and his wife.

Aides say Bush feels he was unfairly treated by the media during the campaign.

Bush was being kept abreast of developments in Somalia, where a worsening famine and civil war have prompted the United States to offer

the services of up to 30,000 troops to protect international relief supplies.

Bush discussed the U.S. offer with Acting Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger on Wednesday, before Eagleburger met with U.N. Secretary General Boutros Boutros-Ghali to offer U.S. help, an aide said.

Bush flew here Wednesday for a five-day Thanksgiving vacation. He planned to dine at his seaside family compound at Walker's Point on turkey, bread stuffing, sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce and pecan pie.

The first couple was not accompanied to Maine by any family members. They will be joined Friday by National Security Adviser Brent Scowcroft and White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater.

Engineered virus blocks AIDS

WASHINGTON (AP) — A harmless virus carrying an engineered genetic pattern is able in test tube experiments to keep the deadly AIDS virus from reproducing inside its favorite blood cell target, researchers report.

In a study to be published Friday in the journal Science, three scientists said they showed that AIDS resistance could be inserted into the blood cells using another type of virus that carries altered genes.

The scientists, in a laboratory experiment, inserted into an infection particle called adeno-associated virus, or AAV, a gene that would stick to a specific part of the genetic pattern contained in the human immunodeficiency virus, or HIV, which causes AIDS.

Healthy blood cells, called CD4 cells, that are the favored target of the HIV, were then infected with the AAV virus. This caused the new gene to be incorporated into genetic pattern of the CD4 cell.

When HIV virus was then exposed in laboratory culture to the altered CD4 cells, only a few of the viruses could grow or reproduce. In unaltered CD4 cells, cultured for comparison, the HIV was able to replicate, the study says.

Untreated CD4 cells reproduced about 1,000 times more HIV virus than the CD4 cells with the altered genetic pattern, the study said.

The researchers said the work showed that the AAV virus was an effective way to carry a new gene into blood cells. The AAV is taken up by the blood cells and the virus then inserts the new gene into the nucleus of the cell.

When the HIV virus enters the cell and tries to take over the nucleus, it is met by the new gene. The researchers said the new gene acts like a shield that blocks key processes the HIV must perform in order to reproduce.

Work is underway now to test the technique in animals. No human trials will be planned until the animal experiments are completed, the researchers said in a statement.

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California political watchdog panel fines governor's campaign \$100,000

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — The state's political watchdog has fined Gov. Pete Wilson's campaign \$100,000 for improperly reporting more than \$7 million in expenses.

It was the first time such a penalty has been levied against a California governor's campaign organization.

The Fair Political Practices Commission also said Wednesday that the governor's campaign failed to disclose dozens of late contributions totaling \$106,000 and improperly reported about \$127,000 in campaign spending.

Wilson's 1990 gubernatorial campaign spent nearly \$24 million to defeat Dianne Feinstein, the former mayor of San Francisco. She had better luck with the voters this year, as she was elected earlier this month to a U.S. Senate seat.

"This case involved some significant campaign reporting errors," said commission chairman Ben Davidson, a Wilson appointee.

Wilson spokesman Dan Schur said the \$7.1 million in disputed expenses involved payments for broadcast advertising throughout the state. "The problem is that although the total amount of the money spent on broadcasting was accurate, the amount spent in each individual station contained inconsistencies," he said.

State law, Davidson added, "requires full disclosure of campaign receipts and expenditures so the public knows exactly who is contributing to campaigns and how that money is spent."

The commission said its investigation found no evidence of intentional misconduct, and that the Republican governor and his committee staffers cooperated fully. The fine was paid as part of a settlement reached the same day the complaint was filed.

Schur said the fine was levied against the campaign committee and Wilson was not aware of the violations.

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Political sex scandal rocks Poland

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Members of parliament protest that the bedroom secrets Anastazia P. reveals about them are not true, but the public seems to love it anyway as Poland revels in its first post-Communist sex scandal.

In a steamy 132-page paperback called "Erotic Immunity: The Memoirs of Anastazia P." that reached store bookshelves this week, a 25-year-old writer purports to recount the sexual proclivities of leading politicians.

The under-the-sheets doings of parliament and other exploits supposedly occurred from June to September while Anastazia prowled parliament using a press pass she obtained by posing as a journalist for a French newspaper.

In reality, she is Marzena Domarosz of Gdansk, a quick-spoken blonde who wears a lot of black and says she "mixes easily."

Ms. Domarosz praises one leftist parliamentarian as "highly erotic." She complains that another was "too quick."

The author accuses one deputy of raping her and calls another a "pathological sex maniac." Both are from the right-wing National Christian Union, which is now waging a moralistic battle to ban abortion and make Catholic teachings part of national policy.

"I hate hypocrisy and thought first of all that I should show that hypocrisy is the dominant characteristic in the top parliament circles," she said in an interview. "I think the voters have a right to know."

What Anastazia tells them is that one ranking politician fantasizes about having sex on the podium as parliament looks on, another offered her an envelope stuffed with \$100 bills and a third proposed group sex.

She names dozens of politicians she says she had contact with, ranging from the most intimate to the merely suggestive, and includes the official biography of each.

Her language is unabashed, and so is her manner. Asked about causing the first sex scandal in post-Communist Poland, she corrected: "I think the first in post-Communist Europe."

As the first 110,000 copies were being snapped up, the politicians she named found themselves pressed for comment.

Andrzej Kern, deputy speaker of the lower house and a member of the National Christian Union, told the Polish news agency PAP that Ms. Domarosz's claim he forced himself on her was a lie.

He said he was the target of "a disgusting attack" and will take legal action.

Ms. Domarosz described Stefan Niesiolowski, leader of the Christian caucus, as "the greatest hypocrite in parliament," saying he opposes abortion while being obsessed with sex. Niesiolowski said he plans neither to read the book nor sue its author, PAP reported.

Germans unable to stop violent rightists

BERLIN (AP) — Plagued by neo-Nazi terror, German officials have been issuing proposals and promising action to stop the growing violence.

But successes are slow in coming, despite Thursday's arrest of a suspected rightist terrorist who may be linked to this week's firebombing deaths of three Turks.

"There just aren't enough police to put an officer in front of every refugee home," says police union official Wolfgang Dicke.

Within the past week, politicians have proposed special police units, helicopter patrols and bans on neo-Nazi groups.

The rightist violence is shocking Germans, especially the country's minorities.

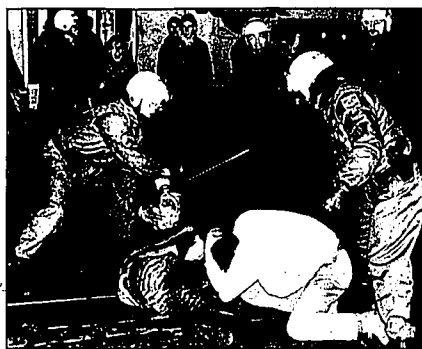
"Young people are beginning to ask, 'Can we live as Jews in Germany?'" says Micha Guttman of the Central Council of Jews in Germany. "I think it's tragic that this discussion has flared up again."

After Monday's firebombing of a Turkish family's home in the town of Moelln, anger is rampant among Turks, Germany's largest ethnic minority.

"Many have sworn retaliation," Cigdem Akkaya of the Turkish Studies Center in Essen says of the younger Turks.

The country's handicapped also have been the targets of neo-Nazi harassment.

"You must not underestimate this,"

Erfurt chief prosecutor Otto Kretschmer said of the riotist threat. "We have to take drastic, decisive measures as quickly as possible to prevent further crimes."

Kretschmer said Thursday he had assigned a prosecutor to coordinate proceedings against extreme rightists.

The neo-Nazis have found fertile ground in eastern Germany, where economic hardships and social tensions make convenient scapegoats of Jews, unemployed refugees and others. Refugees, who will number about a

half-million this year alone, have been the most frequent targets. Some states in eastern Germany are beginning to trumpet their successes, including Saxony-Anhalt, which boasted of 100 police raids and 230 rightist suspects rounded up from August to October.

"Whoever considers these numbers and still believes that police are blind in their right eye is blind in both," state Interior Minister Hartmut Penschau said.

The radical rightist Republican Party, which could gain seats in parliament in 1994 elections, claims support from frustrated police officers.

Some states are taking steps to protect refugee homes, but some shelters lack even telephones to notify police when trouble is brewing.

A survey by The Associated Press found that of the 16 people killed by rightist extremists this year, there were convictions in less than half the cases. The harshest sentence handed out this year was 8 1/2 years for manslaughter, with no convictions for murder.

Critics say Germany's justice system frees neo-Nazi thugs hours after they're arrested, letting them head out for another round of attacks.

Many critics also point out that West Germany poured resources into a concerted fight against leftist terrorism in the 1970s and early 1980s, while fighting today's menace on a piecemeal basis.

HIV-infected men can father healthy babies

LONDON (AP) — Italian researchers claim to have isolated and inseminated healthy sperm from 29 AIDS-infected men in one of the most extensive studies using a controversial "sperm-washing" technique.

Some scientists argue they can select healthy sperm and offer hope to infected men yearning to be fathers. But most AIDS experts say the technique puts the lives of healthy women and newborns at risk because so much remains unknown about the disease.

The study of 29 healthy women and partners infected with the AIDS virus was reported in Saturday's issue of The Lancet, a British medical journal.

Sperm-washing is not a new technique, but this study is one of the largest and longest reported. The report in The Lancet did not specify when the study began, but the data was current to Oct. 14.

After six to 18 months, none of the women who received treated sperm developed antibodies to the HIV virus that causes AIDS, and all 10 babies born were healthy, the study said. The vast majority of people infected with HIV test positive within six months, but a few studies have shown that it can take up to three years after infection to develop antibodies.

Dr. Augusto Semprini, the lead investigator at the University of Milan, said these results "provide hope of safe childbearing" for men infected with the AIDS virus.

AIDS experts said the technique is not safe at all.

"It's extremely dangerous and unnecessary, where one failure is a terrible tragedy," said Dr. William A. Haseltine, chief of the Division of Human Retrovirology at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute of Harvard University in Boston.

"It skirts on the edges of ethical propriety," said Dr. Richard McDonald,

an AIDS expert in private practice in Chicago.

"They can't offer these people guarantees. If a woman were to become infected or give birth to an infected child, the researcher would bear the ethical and moral responsibility."

Semprini said the technique offers a safer alternative to the many couples who still using condoms and risk passing the AIDS virus in order to have children.

"Sperm-washing" is based on two theories: The HIV virus lurks in disease-fighting immune cells in the seminal fluid surrounding sperm, and fluid that swim fastest are surrounded by fewer infected cells.

Sperm are washed to remove most of the immune cells in the seminal fluid and the fastest are then selected for insemination.

Opponents of the technique fear HIV may penetrate the sperm, and not just the immune cells.

Queen Elizabeth II offers to pay taxes, not pay kids

LONDON (AP) — In the latest chapter of Britain's royal family saga, Queen Elizabeth II has volunteered to pay taxes on her personal income and take her children off the public payroll.

Opposition politicians have made an issue of the queen's tax status since the government promised to pay for repairs to millions of dollars in damage to Windsor Castle, which was ravaged by the last fire.

Prime Minister John Major told the House of Commons that the queen made the request before Parliament's summer recess in July. He said the new arrangements were not final, but would be effective in the next tax year, beginning April 6.

The queen's income and net worth are unknown, and estimates vary widely. Major's office pointed to an article in The Economist magazine this year that said her income is in the range of \$50 million a year.

Press Association, the national news agency, said the treasury indicated the queen would be subject to the top income tax rate of 40 percent, and would also be paying taxes on her private estates of Sandringham and Balmoral.

Major said Prince Charles, who already pays 25 percent tax on income from his Duchy of Cornwall estates, had also indicated that he wished to pay taxes on the same basis as his mother.

The announcement came two days after the monarch, in a speech in London, confessed to having had a horrible year.

She mentioned only the fire, but it was a year in which her daughter was divorced, her son Andrew was separated from his wife, Sarah, and Charles' reported marital problems were endlessly raked over in the tabloids.

The tax issue received new attention in January with the publication of "Royal Fortune," a book by Philip Hall. Hall said Queen Victoria paid income tax when it was introduced in 1842, but her successors gradually won exemptions.

King George V, the queen's grandfather, was the last monarch to pay taxes, Buckingham Palace said. In 1910, he made an agreement in which he promised to pay the expenses of visiting heads of state in return for the tax exemption.

Major said the queen proposed paring the civil list, which provides payments for several members of the royal family and costs \$15 million a year. He said she suggested continuing payments only to Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, and to the queen's husband, Prince Philip.

The queen would also continue to receive \$12 million a year under the civil list for her household expenses, Major's office said.

Iran flexes muscles over oil

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — As OPEC ministers look for a way to prop up the price of oil, Iran has become something of a wild card.

The cartel's No. 2 producer has been pumping more oil, alarming Persian Gulf neighbors with a vast military buildup that includes the recent purchase of a Russian-built submarine and a hard-line stance in the OPEC talks.

The talks continued Thursday for a second day, and as the oil ministers filtered out of an afternoon session, they reported little progress.

Iran seems to be flexing its muscles at the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries' winter meeting. While pushing for

lower production ceilings to drive up prices, Iran has increased its own production, potentially giving the Islamic state more bargaining power within OPEC.

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U.S. peacekeepers in Somalia would break with U.N. tradition

WASHINGTON — The surprise U.S. offer to send up to 30,000 troops to Somalia reflects the way that ravaged, starving African country has become a metaphor in recent months for all that seems to be wrong with the United Nations.

The U.N. operation has been crippled by hesitancy, inefficiency, personnel problems and, most of all, by old rules that make no sense in a country that no longer has any semblance of government.

The dispatch of American troops would signal a dramatic enlargement and overhaul of the operation — perhaps putting the United Nations in the unusual role of enforcing the peace rather than just trying to keep it.

The offer of the troops, reportedly made by Acting Secretary of State Lawrence S. Eagleburger to U.N. Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali in a meeting in New York Wednesday, was not announced officially. American and U.N. officials evidently feared that to do so would provoke Somali warlords into harming relief workers and the 500 Pakistani peacekeeping troops now in Somalia.

There is no certainty that the United Nations will accept the American troop offer, although the United States, the most prominent Security Council member, is sure to lobby hard for its acceptance.

In the past, the Security Council has steadfastly observed the hoary rule that the United Nations will not send peacekeepers to an area without the consent of the belligerents. That edict, however, has proven frustrating

and infuriating in Somalia as the warlords agree, then renege on promises to let the peacekeepers protect the food convoys. Only a small percentage of the food is reaching the starving; most has been looted by armed gangs of the warlords.

"What is going wrong in Somalia is that it is a very particular case where you have no government," Boutros-Ghali told the Los Angeles Times in an interview this week. "In all other cases, you are dealing with one or two protagonists of a dispute. Then you can make an agreement. But in Somalia, there is no government. There is a kind of confusion of government. Rather than one government, you have 10 factions. And this is something new in the peace process."

Boutros-Ghali is known as an advocate of using U.N. troops to enforce peace when there is no way to get warring parties to agree to a cease-fire monitored by U.N. peacekeepers. But asked if Somalia is a clear case for peace enforcement, he was cautious in his reply.

"I don't want to give you an answer because this has to be decided by the member states," Boutros-Ghali said. "But you certainly will have a great preoccupation among member states, because if you accept peace enforcement (in Somalia), this may be a precedent for intervention in the internal affairs of other member states in the future."

The size of the proposed U.S. force raises another question. Speaking with a few journalists, American

officials, relief workers and scholars in Washington a few weeks ago, Mohammed Sahnoun, the former U.N. official in charge of the Somali operation, said he believed that 3,000 peacekeeping troops would be enough to keep relief supplies moving in Somalia.

"But they must be willing to fight their way through," he said. "They cannot have a passive role."

France threatens to torpedo trade pact

PARIS (AP) — The prime minister threatened Thursday to block a world trade pact unless an agreement between Washington and the European Community cutting farm subsidies is modified.

Negotiators meeting in Geneva, meanwhile, set a Dec. 31 target for all 108 nations participating in the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, which is designed to liberalize global trade restrictions. Disputes over farm subsidies have stalled GATT talks, which began in 1986. Technical and legal details of the

accord would then be ironed out so it could be presented to the U.S. Congress for approval by a February deadline.

But Prime Minister Pierre Berégovoy told the Senate that France would veto EC acceptance of the world trade accord if it is seen as damaging to its farm interests. If France vetoes the accord, all 12 EC countries would have to drop out and

down it to failure. Unless it is modified, the subsidy-cutting agreement will be contained in the GATT accord. France contends

the pact violates EC rules, but EC leaders said Thursday it fits within the group's framework.

Farmers have staged increasingly violent protests across France since the pact was announced last week.

The issue also has thrown French politics into turmoil.

Lawmakers' late Wednesday denounced the subsidy-cutting accord, but an opposition bloc demanding a quick veto refused to support Berégovoy's strategy to try to work within with EC bureaucracy to modify or kill the pact.

Yeltsin fails to appease government hardliners

MOSCOW (AP) — President Boris Yeltsin reshuffled another top aide Thursday to appease opponents, but some hard-line lawmakers said they would still seek the ouster of his reformist Cabinet.

Legislators reacted coolly to a new "anti-crisis" economic plan presented by acting Prime Minister Yegor Gaidar. A powerful Yeltsin critic accused Gaidar of breaking a promise to restore elements of central economic planning.

The developments dimmed Yeltsin prospects for avoiding a fierce battle in the Congress of People's Deputies, Russia's highest legislative body, which convenes Tuesday.

The 1,046-member parliament is dominated by pro-Communist lawmakers elected before the Soviet collapse.

Yeltsin, however, could make further changes in his Cabinet or his reform plan before the opening of the Congress, which could be one of the

most contentious since he came to power.

In an effort to placate hard-liners, Yeltsin eliminated the job held by his close friend and adviser, Gennady Burbulis, and reassigned Burbulis to a newly created advisory council.

The cosmetic move came a day after Yeltsin accepted the resignations of two other Cabinet ministers and fired the reformist state broadcasting chief.

Serbs block relief to besieged town

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Serb officers blocked a food convoy to Srebrenica on Thursday, but a U.N. spokesman said the relief trucks would reach the embattled eastern city on Friday.

Another U.N. relief convoy completed its delivery to the government-held town of Gorazde 30 miles southeast of Sarajevo, and was reported on its way back. It was delayed Wednesday when an armored ambulance hit a mine. Nobody was hurt.

The convoy to Gorazde was only the third since it was besieged in the spring. Srebrenica has had no relief at all during the war. Serbs prevented all previous attempts to deliver food.



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Government scrambles to implement amendment

DENVER (AP) — Colorado municipalities are scrambling to put together 1993 budgets which are hindered by fiscal uncertainty created by the passage of a tax limitation amendment.

Inspired by California's Proposition 13, the Colorado amendment requires voter approval for certain state and local tax revenue increases and debt, and restricts property, income and other taxes.

It also limits the rate of increase in state and local government spending, and requires initiative and referendum elections on all major spending at the state and local levels.

The measure passed Nov. 3 by a margin of 54 percent to 46 percent, after seven previous attempts failed over 20 years.

Douglas Bruce, a Colorado Springs investor and former California lawyer who led the fight to limit tax increases, said the measure passed because elected officials abused their authority by spending taxpayer money on projects voters rejected.

Some communities say they already are feeling amendment's effects.

The Leadville School District, facing possible insolvency, says the amendment will hasten the district's demise.

The Brush City Council says it may have to cancel a water fluoridation system because it cannot come up with the \$6,000 it would take for its share, even though the city would be reimbursed within 90 days.

The Canon City Fire Department says it may have to cancel a second fire station.

Bruce has met with some city and state officials to discuss the amendment's impact, and says many communities are making "stupid mistakes," rushing to spend their reserve funds.

"They're squandering money and behaving in a fiscally irresponsible way, so they can plead poverty next year and ask voters for a tax increase," Bruce said.

Bruce said Colorado's elected officials probably will go through the same stages public officials in California went through after Proposition 13 became law.

"In California, there were a lot of threats about punishing voters. They tried it a while, and that didn't work, and then they faced reality. That's what we need to do here," he said.

Sam Mamet, associate director of the Colorado Municipal League which represents 267 municipalities and 63 counties, has rejected an offer from Bruce to discuss the amendment. The league is conducting emergency classes for municipalities on how to cope with the amendment.

"I have frankly had my fill of Doug Bruce. If he's such an expert on municipal finances, why doesn't he run for office and become a mayor so he can educate us?" Mamet asked. "It doesn't matter what Doug Bruce says about Amendment 1, or what Sam Mamet says about it. The voters have spoken. We're into the second chapter of this book, and now local government will be responsible for implementing it."

Mamet says he will ask Gov. Roy Romer to submit a series of questions to the state Supreme Court to clarify the amendment. Among questions to be resolved are whether city businesses such as sewer, water, airport and hospital districts are part of a city's funding base, and whether election restrictions apply to citizen ballot petitions.

Twenty-five of 63 counties and 131 of 267 municipalities are in financial trouble, facing property devaluations, Mamet says. If levies cannot be raised to cover reduced valuations, many projects may have to wait until a vote can be held next year, he said.

Mamet says he hopes elected officials will act responsibly, and not cancel needed projects to punish voters and prove their contention that the amendment won't work.

Artists worry about what Clinton considers art

WASHINGTON (AP) — Artists looking for federal money from the next administration know their chances of support depend on how President-elect Clinton views two simple but imponderable questions: What is art? What is obscene?

Clinton's publicly-stated views on federal financing of the arts differ substantially from President Bush's. But will that mean the arts community will flourish, as it hopes?

"What we hope to do in the Clinton administration is to lower the political heat in that arena," said Deborah Sale, who was a Clinton campaign aide and is chief of staff for New York Lt. Gov. Stan Lindine.



"We'd like to have a much less politicized environment for the arts, a much clearer sense that the peer process was something that one should rely on and one should be really looking for quality," said Sale, who

represented Clinton before several arts groups during the campaign.

What has maddened many artists seeking funds from the National Endowment for the Arts is what they see as the administration's political appointees brushing aside recommendations made by artist review panels on what projects should be funded.

Several times since Anne-Imelda Radice took over as acting chairwoman of the independent federal agency last spring, she has rejected the recommendations of peer panels on projects that contained sexual material.

Last week, she refused to award \$17,500 in grants to three gay and lesbian film festivals, saying they lacked

artistic excellence worthy of the NEA's support.

Earlier this year, before John Frohnmayer was forced out as NEA chairman by conservatives who accused him of funding obscene art, the NEA agreed to give \$250,000 to the National Alliance for Media Arts and Culture to distribute to various projects. The alliance then convened a peer panel that recommended 53 groups share in the funding.

But Radice, who succeeded Frohnmayer, rejected the three homosexual film festivals among them.

Shortly after she took over, she rejected funding recommendations by an NEA peer-review panel and an

NEA advisory group, citing a similar lack of excellence in the two projects, both of which had sexual themes.

Frohnmayer said he is "very optimistic" about changes under the Clinton administration because the next president supports an "arts endowment free of political interference and free of content restrictions."

The Clintons "are comfortable with the arts and what they give to our society," Frohnmayer said.

He also said Clinton "has done pretty well for the arts in Arkansas. It's a small budget there, but over the years when state budgets were being cut, their arts council has increased modestly."

Luginbill unsure whether Faulk will play against Miami

SAN DIEGO — Marshall Faulk participated in 8-to-10 plays in practice Thursday, and San Diego State coach Al Luginbill said he'd wait until warmups Saturday to decide whether the running back would play against Miami.

Luginbill said Faulk must be at 100 percent in order to play against the top-ranked Hurricanes. The Aztecs (5-4-1) won't practice on Friday, but trainer Brian Barry will run Faulk through a workout.

"He was at about 75 to 80 percent," San Diego State spokesman John Rosenthal said. "We're encouraged by the fact that after he ran Wednesday for the first time, there wasn't a regression. He seemed to feel better today than yesterday."

Faulk, the leading rusher in major college football, sprained his knee at the end of a 19-yard run on San Diego State's first play from scrimmage in a 45-41 loss to Fresno State last Saturday. He sat out a play, returned and scored a 2-yard touchdown, then went out again.

Faulk did not practice Tuesday or Wednesday. Instead, he ran, rode a stationary bike and did other exercises. He averages 163 yards per game.

Hagerstown is like CSI, full of athletes and wanting to run the court.

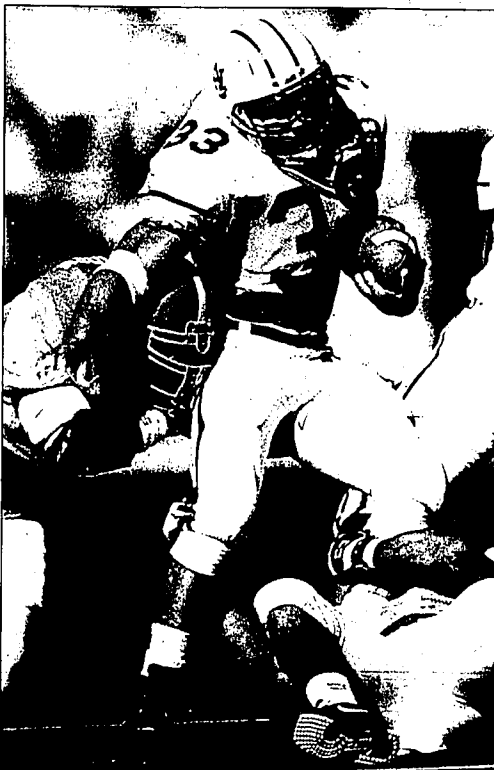

Dye finishes career; 'bama beats Auburn

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — Pat Dye's career is over. No. 2 Alabama still has some unfinished business.

With the defense leading the way again, Alabama smothered Auburn 17-0 on Thursday and moved a step closer to a national championship showdown with top-ranked Miami.

It was the final game for Dye, who announced his resignation Wednesday night after 12 years at Auburn.

"This is not exactly the way I would have preferred to go out," said Dye, who stepped down amid allegations that Auburn violated NCAA rules and troubled by his own health problems.

"The competitive spirit in me... is to stay and fight," he said during an emotional post-game press conference. "But the destruction would far outweigh the other. I did not want to split the Auburn family. I didn't want to leave Auburn on any kind of bad terms."

He did leave on a losing note. Antonio Langham returned an interception 61 yards for a touchdown to break a scoreless tie in the third period.

It was another dominating performance by an Alabama defense that leads the nation in all categories and held Auburn to 20 yards rushing and 139 yards overall.

"They are a great football team," Dye said. "If I had to vote for someone No. 1 in the nation, they would get my vote."

Alabama (11-0, 8-0 Southeastern Conference) will play Florida Dec. 5 in the first league championship game for the chance to meet Miami in the Sugar Bowl. Auburn (5-5-1, 2-5-1) closed out the highly successful Dye era with its second straight season without a winning record.

Dye's players were hoping to send their coach into retirement with his 10th victory at Auburn. Before the game, they walked slowly onto the field, each holding his helmet defiantly in the air in an apparent show of support.

But Dye will have to be content with four SEC titles and a 99-39-4 record at Auburn. Any emotional advantage the Tigers may have enjoyed was canceled out by a superior Alabama team.

Coach Dye's announcement yesterday motivated an offensive tackle Chris Gray said. "But Alabama's just a great team."

The Tigers stayed even until the third quarter. But then came the biggest play in the game.

After Auburn took the second-half kickoff and drove to the Alabama 39, quarterback Stan White attempted to throw a quick pass along the left sideline. Langham stepped out to tip the ball, and it came down right in his hands. He ran untouched to the end zone for the only points he and his defensive teammates would need.

"I saw it coming," Langham said. "I reached out and tipped it, and all I saw was green. I wasn't worried about anything else."

Michael Proctor added a 47-yard field goal before the third period was over to make it 10-0. Third-string tailback Sherman Williams led the victory on a 15-yard touchdown run with 12 minutes remaining after a short punt gave Alabama the ball at the Auburn 46.

"10-0 is not a very big lead," Dye said. "Unless you've got a defense like Alabama's got. Then it's monumental."

At the end, all Dye could do was walk slowly across the field with his hands in his pockets. One of the first people to reach him before he was mobbed by the media was Alabama receiver Kevin Lee, followed by several other Tide players who wanted to shake hands with the coach who guided up 6-6 against his intrastate rival.

Dye finally reached Alabama coach Gene Stallings, who has posted three straight victories over Auburn. They spoke briefly before heading to their respective locker rooms.

"I've got a little bit of mixed emotions," Dye said.

Giants can't keep Cowboys' Smith down

IRVING, Texas — The New York Giants found out you can stop Emmitt Smith early but you can't hold him down for 60 minutes.

Smith, smothered by an eight-man front in the first half, scored two touchdowns in a span of 2:50 in the third quarter on Thursday and the Dallas Cowboys rolled to a 30-3 victory over the fast-sinking New York Giants.

Smith broke three tackles on a dazzling 26-yard run after taking a swing pass from Troy Aikman and boled 68 yards untouched for a touchdown the next time he got the ball to put the game away.

Dallas improved its record to 10-2 and can clinch a playoff berth if Tampa Bay defeats Green Bay on Sunday.

The Giants, playing without quarterback Jeff Hostetler, linebacker Lawrence Taylor and punter Sean Landeta, dropped to 5-7.

Smith's best moves came on the touchdown pass from Aikman on a day he rushed 17 times for 129 yards. It was the first 100-yard day against the Giants by a Dallas runner since Tony Dorsett in 1980.

Smith, who had 12 receptions for 67 yards last week against Phoenix, forced Reyna Thompson and Greg Jackson to miss him and he carried linebacker Corey Miller into the end zone for the score. Smith had six catches for 41 yards.

The next touchdown was a straight hand off, breaking behind the blocks of tackle Erik Williams and guard John Gieseke to score with 3:53 left in the period.

Lin Elliott kicked field goals in the first half from 45, 33, and 52 yards to offset Matt Bahr's 42-yarder as the Cowboys took a 9-3 halftime lead over the 15-point underdog Giants.

The Cowboys drove to the New York 27, 14, 35 but had to settle for Elliott kicks. He has a club-record 12 in a row.

Aikman got his second TD of the day on a 4-yard flip to Alvin Harper in the fourth quarter.

Dallas also got to the Giants 3 but New York held on fourth and one when linebacker Ed Reynolds tackled Smith for no gain.

The Giants fooled Dallas on their first possession with a 44-yard flea-flicker from Rodney Hampton to rookie Kent Graham to Ed McCaffrey to the Dallas 18.

But Bahr's 35-yard field goal attempt hit the left upright.

Graham had problems with the NFL's No. 1 ranked defense, hitting 12 of 28 passes for 151 yards.

The Cowboys are now 14-7-1 on Thanksgiving Day.

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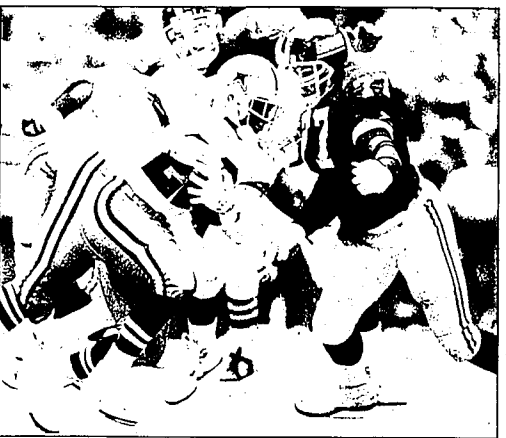
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Dallas Cowboys running back Emmitt Smith picks up five yards before running into New York Giants defensive end Eric Dorsey Thursday.

Heisman race unimpressive

Leaders in the Heisman Trophy race usually spring to the finish. Last Saturday, they were stumbling, limping or taking a breather.

Miami's Gino Torretta threw three interceptions against Syracuse, San Diego State's Marshall Faulk injured his knee against Fresno State, and Georgia's Garrison Hearst had the day off.

The weekend symbolized a lackluster Heisman race that has failed to produce consistent, top-notch performances by any contender. With the voting deadline only two weeks away, many voters still are undecided.

Ed Sherman, who covers college football for the Chicago Tribune, says it reminds him of the 1992 presidential campaign.

"We've got three candidates, and none of them are very impressive," he said.

All three will make their final campaign appeals Saturday on ESPN. After Hearst tries to sway voters with a big game against Georgia Tech, Torretta and Faulk are scheduled to go head to head in San Diego. Faulk is expected to play, but may be slowed by a sprained right knee.

Mark Blaudschun of the Boston Globe State says he is leaning toward Faulk, but won't make up his mind until the Miami-San Diego State game is over.

"I don't have a No. 1 pick right now," he said. "It depends on what happens Saturday. Who knows, I might end up voting for (Florida State linebacker) Marvin Jones."

No primary defensive player has won the Heisman, and it's not going to happen this year, either. But many voters appear to be looking for alternatives because they're not

Losers wonder what keeps them from winning

Having a bad day, or maybe a bad week? Well, quit complaining. You've got it easy compared to a fistful of sports teams who are having bad decades, perpetual also-rans stuck on a treadmill to oblivion.

They are the losers, the sadsack have-nots, peeking over the fence at the haves, wondering just what it is that keeps them on the wrong side of success.

The last time the Cleveland Indians were in the World Series was 1954, which is pretty bad until you consider that the last time the Chicago Cubs made it was nine years before that.

The New York Rangers haven't won a Stanley Cup in 52 years. The Los Angeles Clippers went 15 years without coming close to the NBA playoffs.

The Green Bay Packers have drifted through limbo since winning the first two Super Bowls a quarter century ago. Nine other NFL teams — Detroit, Houston, Cleveland, Seattle, San Diego, Phoenix, Tampa Bay, New Orleans and Atlanta — have never even gotten to the big game.

It's not that these teams don't try to turn things around. Perhaps, in fact, they try too hard. They often operate a perpetual revolving door, firing coaches and general managers every couple of years.

Hall of Famer Ernie Banks played for 19 years with the Cubs under 10 managers, including five different ones in 1961 and 1962 when owner Phil Wrigley employed a revolving college of coaches. It was all to no avail. The Cubbies finished over .500 just six times during those years and only twice, in 1969 and 1970, were they legitimate pennant contenders.

Still, Banks exudes enthusiasm over Chicago. "We exemplify loyalty, stability and family," he said. "That's the pure baseball. We are the pioneers of

major league baseball, over 100 years old with 15 pennants."

Six of those flags were won before 1900, though, and there have been none since 1945. That adds up to a lot of losing lately.

"The good part is we were philanthropists," Banks said. "You know, it's better to give than to receive. We gave a lot. The Cubs won the World Series in 1908. It will come back. We will be a dynasty again. Stick around."

Banks said there is a thin line between winning and losing and no explaining why a team lunks on one side and not the other. "It has nothing to do with players or the manager or the general manager," he said. "It's a cycle. You're down now. You can't explain why it's one of those things that has no solution. You can't figure it out. Mr. Wrigley told me that all the time."

When Oakland started winning American League pennants, teams tried to figure out what made that franchise different. For one thing, the A's had a sports psychologist on their staff. For another, they had Canseco, McGwire and Eckersley on their roster. If teams couldn't get those players, they could certainly get a psychologist.

Rick Wolff, who studied psychology at Harvard and played minor league ball in the Detroit Tigers organization, was a perfect fit — a wedding of behavioral science and baseball performance. Suddenly his phone started ringing and teams were bidding for him like some hot shit free agent. "I talked to a number of them," he said. "I decided the Indians made the most sense. When I told my wife, she said, 'If you run them around, you'll get the Nobel Peace Prize.'"

Cleveland is a challenge, indeed. In the last 30 years, the team has won more games than it has lost yet seven times and never finished higher than third. Your move, doctor.

"The simple answer to why teams lose is talent," Wolff said. "You could have the most motivated team in the world, but in the end talent wins. There's no way to get around that. If you've lost for 5-10-15-20 years, then it's a question of your overall blueprint. Some teams build for speed, others for power, others for pitching and defense. When you lose for that long, the overall scheme is not working."

Few people have been through the losing cycle in more places than Dan O'Brien, senior vice president for baseball operations of the California Angels. O'Brien's other stops since 1973 have been at Texas, Seattle and Cleveland — a cumulative oh-for-first place.

In each case, the reasons for failure involved the bottom line — good old American greenbacks.

"When Bob Short moved the Washington team to Texas in 1972, he sold the radio-TV rights for 10 years for \$7.5 million," O'Brien said. "He took that money and paid off his debts in Washington. So for 10 years, there was no local radio and TV revenue."

"When Short sold the team in 1974, his perk for selling locally was part of the money earned from 1974 seasons tickets. Modestly, that's 4,000 tickets. League and visiting clubs shares still had to be paid on those tickets. That money came out of the gate receipts. Plus, we had to pay the regular percentage for those sales. And

remember, there was no radio-TV income. We were in a perpetual hole, always climbing out, never able to get ahead."

"I moved to Seattle in 1979. They came into the league with Toronto in 1977. In Seattle's first four years, it won more games than Toronto. But Toronto drew six million more people. That's a \$6 average price and \$36 million does a lot to develop a team. That's money Seattle didn't have to enhance its position."

"They've always had good draft picks and good scouting. But they've never drawn people and you wonder if they ever will. With Toronto's facility in Seattle, you stand a chance. In summer, people want to go outdoors

there. The club asks them to go indoors. People resent that. It's always been a struggle."

"In 1984, I went to Cleveland. That team has always been in trouble. There have been several positives in recent years, some good deals and people from the farm system. If this doesn't work — the young kids with a new stadium in two years merging at the right time, if this doesn't work, write them off."

"Money is always an issue. You can't keep pouring money into a situation and wake up and realize you won't draw three million or two million and you might not draw one million. Owners come to realize that and they get tired of writing checks."

Lewis won't fight world heavyweight champion

LONDON (AP) — It looks like No. 1 contender Lennox Lewis will be fighting George Foreman next spring instead of world heavyweight champion Riddick Bowe.

Following a breakdown in negotiations between the two sides, Bowe appears set to give up the World Boxing Council version of the title and let Lewis become champion by default.

The world title will be split while Bowe and Lewis go their own ways before meeting in a unification fight in 1994.

That was the scenario described Thursday by Lewis and his manager, Frank Maloney, the latest twist in the heavyweight picture since Bowe outpointed Evander Holyfield for the title on Nov. 13.

Lewis, who beat Bowe for the Olympic super heavyweight title in 1988, stopped Razor Ruddock in London last month in what the WBC billed as a title elimination bout. Under an agreement with the WBC, he was to fight the winner of the Bowe-Holyfield fight.

The WBC reiterated this week that Bowe will be stripped of its version of the title if he refuses to make his first defense against Lewis. In that case, Lewis would become the WBC champion.

"My goal is to beat Riddick Bowe," he said. "Right now, he's ducking me. We know what Bowe will be eating Thanksgiving. He won't be eating Turkey. He'll be eating chicken."

Any chance of a Lewis-Bowe fight apparently evaporated Wednesday during 3½ hours of talks in New York involving Maloney, promoter Dan Duva and Bowe's manager, Rock Newman. Maloney, who returned to London Thursday, said Newman made two offers that were unacceptable.

The first would have guaranteed Lewis \$3 million, while giving Bowe a

90 percent share of the purse and 10 percent for Lewis, Maloney said.

Newman's second offer was for Lewis to refuse the WBC title, have an interim fight in the United States for a guaranteed \$2.5 million, and then fight Bowe for \$9 million or a percentage to be negotiated.

Maloney conceded the second offer was a good one but said, "It's a matter of principle. We made a commitment to the WBC. They backed us, and we have to honor that agreement."

Maloney countered with his own proposal, a 75-25 percent split of the purse. He said Newman turned that down.

Maloney said Bowe was now ready to give up the WBC title while holding on to the World Boxing Association and International Boxing Federation crowns, and said Bowe was looking to make his first defense against Ray Mercer.

Bowe originally had hoped to fight the 43-year-old Foreman, but those plans fell through. Foreman is set to fight Therese Coetzar at Reno, Nev., on Jan. 16.

If Foreman wins, he is to fight Lewis in April, either in the United States or in Manchester, England, Maloney said. Lewis would have preferred to fight Mercer or Tommy Morrison but settled for Foreman because of U.S. television.

"We're taking George Foreman because it's the only fight TVKO will take at the moment," Maloney said.

Smoking policy should be practical, compassionate

The "Drug Free School Zone" sign outside Twin Falls High School signals an almost laughable hypocrisy, when some teachers daily ingest America's deadliest, most addictive drug.

For that reason, a proposed ban on smoking in all Twin Falls public schools is attractive. Ridding schools of tobacco is a good idea - but one that nonetheless should be tempered by pragmatism and compassion.

Some Twin Falls teachers have protested the proposed policy, complaining that it violates their rights. They are wrong.

There is no right to smoke. There is no right to willfully risk cancer and other diseases that will increase the district's long-term health insurance costs. There is no right to inject toxic smoke into the atmosphere breathed by co-workers and students.

As loathsome as the nicotine habit is, however, the School Board must be practical. Smokers are addicts. They are unhappily hooked on a legal drug, one that has been tacitly approved by decades of federal policies.

Asking them to choose between cold turkey and unemployment would be unreasonably harsh, and it might invite

a lawsuit. Some private employers - including *The Times-News* - have resolved the issue by restricting smokers to outdoor patios and parking lots. That option accommodates die-hard smokers who are willing to brave the elements, while clearing the air in staff lounges for the non-smoking majority.

Schools have a special problem, because outdoor areas usually are in view of students (and of disapproving taxpayers passing the school). Some kind of enclosure or visual screen might be the solution.

Some employers have further softened the blow to smokers by offering to pay for smoking-cessation therapy or classes. Many taxpayers would be justifiably reluctant to pay for helping teachers kick the habit, but why couldn't the teachers union sponsor this potentially life-saving service for its members?

Removing smoke from workplaces is a worthy goal, but it should be pursued sensitively. The school district should talk with its employees, think creatively, and find a solution that promotes the welfare of smokers and non-smokers alike.



When gay soldier died, comrades wept

"A Gay Young Cavalryman" How times change. The words above appear as the title of a song opposite page 1 of the brief memoir my father wrote of his service in the U.S. Cavalry between the two world wars. Can you imagine a song today called "A Gay Young Fighter Pilot - or Infantryman - or Leatherneck?"

I commanded an infantry rifle company in the first year of the Korean War. Among the 150 or so men I had with me on the tops of those mean mountains in that bitter cold was at least one gay soldier. All of the other 149 of us knew that if nothing else he was effeminate. That and his red hair are probably why I remember him so well after all these years.

I saw men ridiculing him to his face on occasion, as men will. You know: one hand on a hip, the other waving in the air with a limp wrist as the mimic took prim, mincing steps around him. And the first sergeant approached me one day and said, "Sir I think Wilson (not his name) is a goddam queer." About all I could say was, "Well, Top, I guess there's no damn law against it as long as he's doing his job."

His job was BAR-man; the initials stand for Browning Automatic Rifle. It is a big weapon, weighing more than 20 pounds, but even at his size - about five-seven and 140 pounds - he carried the BAR in his squad. The weapon was so reliable and deadly that the Chinese invariably went for the BAR-man first.

But he did that job, which few men wanted, until a wet spring day in 1951, when I knelt down and looked at the small round hole dead center in his wet greenish-gray forehead below the line of his red hair. I noticed some of the men in his squad turning away from me so I wouldn't see them crying softly as they put him on a litter.

so we could carry him with us. He was one of us, a soldier.

I'm as sure of the fact that he was gay as I am that he no doubt wasn't the only one in the company, that he was a damned good soldier and that there were undoubtedly gay soldiers in the infantry battalion I commanded in Vietnam in 1967-1968. There are probably homosexuals in any group of a hundred or so men you assemble any place, any time.

A few years ago my son wrote a novel

about a gay cadet at West Point and brought down the wrath of many graduates upon his (and my) head for even intimating that West Point ever had a homosexual cadet. And now looking back from the vantage point of 40 or 50 years of knowledge, experience and our society's finally having let gays out of the closet, I'm certain that four general officers I knew (two of them very well) were gay; one was a highly decorated infantry officer in World War II.

I'm surprised that the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Gen. Colin Powell, takes a stance against gays in the military. As a black officer, he must be more intimate with discrimination than most of us.

The argument seems to be that integration of gays will disrupt the discipline of an organization. Of course it will! Did the integration of blacks? You're damned right it did! And still does to a degree. But the armed forces have controlled it and will continue to until the last of the bigots is gone and we finally have complete equality.

Why don't we have the guts to admit that there always have been and always will be gays in our society? Admit it and treat them as men. They are, you know.

This would appear to be an opportune time to approve construction of a new education facility at Valley for the following reasons:

- With passage of the handicapped access law, a great deal of expensive renovation will be required on the present facilities. After the renovation is complete, we have still not addressed the major problems with the older buildings, i.e., fire safety, outdated and improperly located heating systems, poor insulation and ventilation, crowded conditions, etc.

SNRA is well-managed

This letter is in regard to the Nov. 9 letter from Jim Prunty. In his assessment of Sawtooth National Recreation Area management, Mr. Prunty maliciously claims that the Forest Service is not protecting the resource. He could not be more wrong.

The ranch families grazing in the Stanley Basin, in a cooperative effort with the administration of the SNRA, are committed to compliance with an Allotment Management Plan that meets or exceeds Forest Plan Standards and Guidelines for riparian and range protection. Furthermore, the Standards and Guidelines of the SNF are the most stringent of any national forest in the entire Region 4 of the U.S. Forest

Service. Therefore, to say that the administrators of the SNRA are showing little concern for the resource is ludicrous.

Mr. Prunty also comments on private property purchased by the SNRA. I assume he is referring to the Busterback Ranch in the Sawtooth Valley, purchased earlier this year to acquire water rights. This was an effort to open additional spawning and rearing habitat for the sockeye and chinook salmon.

The cattle temporarily grazing on the ranch last summer were moved there to protect the more sensitive allotment pasture on Marsh Creek during this very severe drought year.

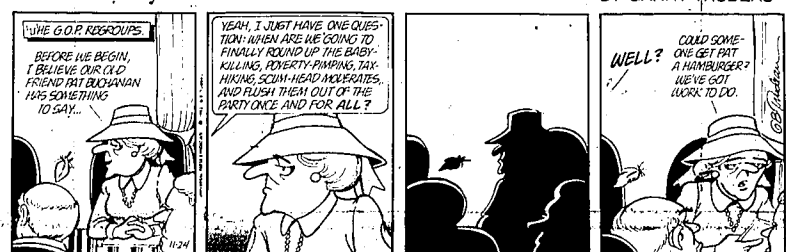
The SNRA administration should be commended on this action. Not only does this effort provide salmon habitat, but allowing grazing to continue on the ranch helps alleviate the six to eight jobs lost to the community when the ranch was purchased by the government.

One of Mr. Prunty's statements is correct. The SNRA was established 20 years ago. However, along with protecting natural resources, the act's primary purpose was to prevent the selling of ranch lands for subdivision development and to maintain the "pastoral scenery and the western ranching atmosphere" in the Stanley Basin. This was Sen. Frank Church's main concern as evidenced by congressional hearing records.

It is obvious that Mr. Prunty wants to see ranching exterminated from Stanley Basin, and he has a right to voice his personal opinion. But his attack on the administrators of the SNF and the SNRA was incorrect, untrue and unjust. Being a former Forest Service employee himself, Mr. Prunty should be ashamed.

Can a woman be the image of Christ?

History will record November 1992 as a watershed month in the emotionally charged issue of women's ordination to the priesthood. On Nov. 11, the Church of England approved a General Synod resolution that allows women to become priests. On Nov. 18, the U.S. National Conference of Catholic Bishops voted to reject a proposed pastoral letter that advocated the continued exclusion of women from the priesthood. These are major victories for women's roles in church ministry.

The intense debates in London and in Washington encompassed centuries of questioning, alienation and hopes. Though many rejoiced in the Church of England ruling, others saw it as the most divisive since the Reformation, one that will, said the Rev. Peter Geldard, "pit diocese against diocese, parish against parish, parishioner against parishioner." Immediately after the vote, the Vatican issued a statement calling the decision a "new and grave obstacle" to unity between the Anglican and Roman Catholic churches.

Before the American bishops voted on the women's pastoral, Archbishop Rember G. Weakland of Milwaukee warned that approving it could ignite a reaction in the church as devastating as that caused by "Humanae Vitae," the 1968 papal encyclical forbidding artificial birth control. The pastoral, he said, "would add another tremendous crisis to the church. We would lose another generation, especially another

generation of very wonderful women."

But in defense of the continued exclusion of women from ordination, Bishop Austin B. Vaughan of New York said: "I believe the doctrine is unchangeable, which means (that) if the world lasts to the year 2000 or 20,000 or 20 million, there will still be a Catholic Church and it will have an all-male clergy. A woman priest is as impossible as for me to have a baby."

Vaughan, in his own words, was echoing the Vatican rationale for excluding women from the priesthood: "Christ was and remains a man. The priest, in the exercise of his ministry, does not act in his own name; he represents Christ, who acts through him." In short, because Christ was a man, only a man can be a priest. Priestly ordination is seen as the church's confirmation of a person's response to Christ's call to service, particularly as a sacramental minister to the Christian community.

As these arguments over the exclusion of women from ordination intensify - is it an expression of God's will or the nadir of sexual discrimination? - we might do well to listen to what contemporary historians and Scripture scholars are saying about the origins of Christian ministry.

In the Bible, there is nothing to suggest that Jesus served as a priest in the Temple, nor is there evidence to prove that he "ordained" the apostles or anyone else to

found a new religion centered around sacramental ministry and cultic worship.

The ministry that Jesus inspired did not focus on rites and prayers, but on those actions that most opened the human heart to faith and love - such actions as feeding the hungry, healing the sick, forgiving trespasses, proclaiming the good news of God's kingdom.

Flemish Jesuit theologian Piet Franzen and others have concluded that ministry in the church is "not a matter of doctrine but of ecclesial economy."

As to the far deeper question of whether women can image Christ and the divine, the Bible says that women and men are created in the image of God, who is wisdom, life and love. God's image in human form is revealed when men and women live grounded in wisdom and love. To assert that women cannot image the divine is to radically undermine God's revelation in human creation.

Jesus taught that faith and love, not gender and bloodline, reveal God. He said, "Who are my mother and sisters and brothers? Those who hear the word of God and keep it."

Through their faith and love, Christian women and men reveal Jesus and the one Jesus calls "Abba." It's ironic to hear American bishops invoking God's will against women's ordination in three weeks after five American nuns in Liberia were martyred for living their faith.

To continue to exclude women from the priesthood because of their gender denigrates the divinely created dignity of women and undermines the very credibility of the church's sacraments. Without women, fully participating with their hearts and lives and wisdom in the church's sacramental ministry, the Catholic priesthood can never fully reflect the person of Christ or God's love.

Father Sweeney of Los Angeles resigned from the Jesuit order in 1986 under Vatican pressure to suppress his studies of bishops' attitudes on women priests and married clergy. His most recent book, "A Church Divided" (Protestantism, 1992) examines these issues. He wrote this commentary for the *Los Angeles Times*.

Study suggests genes influence risk of divorce through personality

NEW YORK (AP) — Genes may play a substantial role in the risk of divorce, probably because of the way they influence a man's or woman's personality, a study of 1,516 sets of twins suggests.

Researchers found that identical twins, who are more alike genetically than fraternal twins are, were also more alike in whether they had experienced a divorce.

The genetic effect would result mostly from a general influence on personality, rather than from any "divorce gene," said

study co-author David Lykken.

Environmental factors like cultural influences would still play a big role in divorce risk, and the genetic effect would not doom people to divorce, the researchers said.

Lykken and Matt McGue, psychology professors at the University of Minnesota, presented their study in the November issue of the journal Psychological Science. McGue said another research team has found similar results in another American

twins study.

In interviews, some scientists agreed with the study conclusion but others said the identical twins' similarity may have resulted from their growing up together. Lykken said other studies have shown that identical twins reared apart are just as similar on many measures as are those who grew up together.

The study involved 722 pairs of identical twins and 794 pairs of same-sex fraternal twins, ages 34 to 53. They answered a

questionnaire in 1989 about marriage and divorce. About one-fifth of the participants had been divorced.

If genes influence divorce risk, researchers said, identical twins should show more similarity in divorce history because they are identical genetically. Fraternal twins share only half their genes on average.

Researchers pursued this question: If one twin in a pair had been divorced, what was the likelihood that the second twin

had been divorced too? The answer was 45 percent for identical twins and 30 percent for fraternal twins.

The study "makes perfect sense," although the strength of the genetic influence versus that of environment is unclear, said psychologist Mavis Hetherington of the University of Virginia.

She also said that although the study contributes to understanding divorce, she could not think of a practical way to use the information in preventing divorces.

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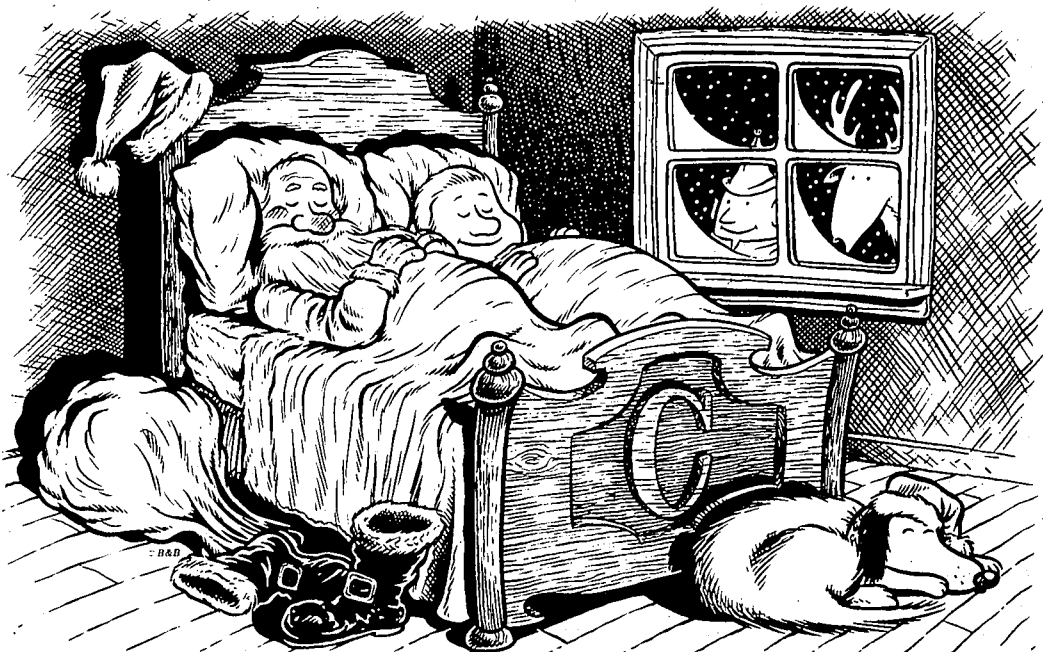

New York town gives OK for Woodstock 25th anniversary

BETHEL, N.Y. - Plans for a 25th anniversary Woodstock music festival have gotten the go-ahead from town leaders. Promoters want to feature some of the same rock 'n' roll acts that appeared the first time around.

More than 400,000 people gathered for three days of music at an upstate New York farm in 1969. Up to 100,000 are anticipated for the anniversary concert planned for 1994.

Promoters John Roberts, Michael Lang and Steven Gold won unanimous approval from the Bethel Town Board to begin planning the show. Final approval for the show itself was not granted.

More than 10,000 people gathered at the site on the 20th anniversary of the festival in 1989, causing headaches for local officials and police. Mostly local musicians played at the nonsanctioned event.

Motion picture academy will can 2 Oscars after next year

LOS ANGELES - The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences will eliminate Oscars for short documentaries and short live-action films following next year's ceremony.

"The categories for those kind of films began in the '30s and '40s, when filmmaking was a very different kind of experience," said Bruce Davis, the academy's executive director.

"These two short genres essentially exist as television forms and there's another academy that handles that area," he said, referring to the Emmy Awards.

Animated short films will continue to receive Oscars.

The shorts are the first categories eliminated since 1967.

"This is very shocking," said Jana Sue Memel, whose Chanticleer Films was behind the Academy Award-winning short "Session Man."

"Shorts are the way that many filmmakers begin their career and ... (a way for) very talented filmmakers who are not part of the Hollywood system to have their work recognized."

"It's a terrible shame and disservice to documentary filmmakers," said Betty McLane, executive director of the International Documentary Association.

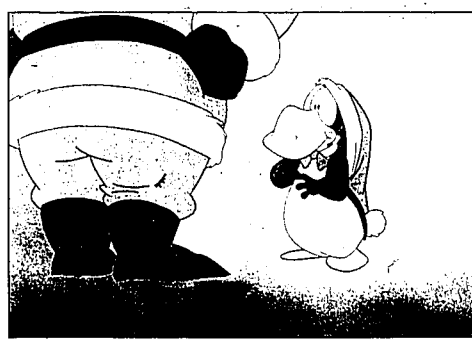

Robin Williams uncorks wild genie

Look out, Aladdin. This time when you rub the magic lamp, Robin Williams pops out of the spout, in Disney's manic new animated version of the classic fairy tale.

And Williams' quick-change-artist of a genie plunges the film "Aladdin" into more whacked-out cartoon comedy smuck than the ancient Arabs and Persians ever bargained for.

"We wrote the script with Robin Williams in mind," said producer-director John Musker, who along with Ron Clements, Ted Elliott and Terry Rossio expanded the screenplay from an original treatment by the late Howard Ashman, (Ashman, who won a 1991 Academy Award for best song for "Beauty and the Beast," also co-wrote three of "Aladdin's" songs with his long-time partner, Alan Menken).

"And since the casting really affects the way a character looks, the drawing of the genie was obviously tailored to Robin Williams' performance and all his marvelous vocal pyrotechnics." This is Disney with an attitude — and it's a world away from the classic storytelling tradition identified with the studio and films from "Sleeping Beauty" to "Beauty and the Beast." In "Aladdin," Williams blitzes through a dazzling profusion of vocal changes: gruff, kind-hearted genie through a Las Vegas-style stand-up routine to Jack Nicholson, Ed Sullivan, Arsenio Hall and Pinocchio.

Along the way his plump, doughy genie body mutates from wispy smoke to evilly arched Nicholsonian eyebrows, Pinocchio's really big nose and Sullivan's really big chin. Not to mention a leaning tower of implacable rage resembling a toasty-black "Ghostbusters" marshmallow man.

So the question is, which came first: Robin Williams or "Aladdin"?

The answer: both. "When we recorded Robin we just let him loose and encouraged him to improvise," Musker said. "He was so hilarious we were rolling on the floor in the control room. Then later on we'd have to try and boil it all down to his funniest stuff. Which was hard, because Robin would just get to the point of a character, and then he'd just zing around to something — and someone — else."

"We took the lines that Robin gave us and we basically just ran

Blitzes through vocal changes with them," said Joe Haidar, one of the animators who helped to draw Williams' takes on Nicholson and Arsenio.

"We only had time to make a quick visual statement. With Williams doing Nicholson, I emphasized the eyebrows, the sunglasses, the big smile. I had to study "The Shining" to do that."

Among the 70 or so character impersonations in "Aladdin" are a wonderfully twitish take on conservative political commentator William F. Buckley Jr. and a snarling "Taxi Driver"-ish Robert De Niro. But others, such as Williams' spins on John Wayne or Walter Cronkite, ended up as outtakes.

"Robin did a wonderful Cronkite routine in the place where Aladdin is contemplating freeing the genie," Musker said. "And he did George Bush when we asked him for a line about not letting go of the past. Maybe we anticipated that Bush would be out of office by now, because we didn't use it."

If much of genie-Williams' blitzkrieg talk-show delivery and visual fireworks seem far too fast and complex for kids, the flat, simple drawing and easy dialogue of Aladdin and his lovely Princess Jasmine seem an obvious, child-pleasing counterpoint. As the critical raves for the movie have noted, this is one animated movie that works on a number of levels.

"We've mixed adult and kid sensibilities here," Musker said. "Clearly we see that adults and kids come away from the film with different impressions. The kids go for the simpler dialogue and animation of Aladdin and Jasmine, and the monkey Abu and the magic carpet."

'Aladdin' answers moviegoers' wishes

Talk about wish-fulfillment! "Aladdin" is a dream come true for moviegoers. Believe me, I know how excruciatingly press-agentlike that must sound.

But, hey, what can I tell you? The hilariously hip and thoroughly gorgeous motion picture is nothing less than the crowning achievement (so far) of Disney's revitalized animation department.

That department created last year's "Beauty and the Beast," which recaptured the majesty of traditional Disney animation, and 1989's "The Little Mermaid," which boasted a more up-to-date sensibility. While I enjoyed both, I also felt that each was missing something.

In co-directing "Aladdin," John Musker and Ron Clements (the "Little Mermaid" team) have done what no one ever has: Visually and thematically, they've created an animated feature that deftly blends classical and contemporary approaches.

Based on familiar "Arabian Nights" episodes, "Aladdin" is set in the mythical kingdom of Agrabah. The title character is a street kid who — with the help of a genie from a magic lamp — wins the hand of the Sultan's daughter.

The classic parts of "Aladdin" aren't musty-classic, as some sections of "Beauty and the Beast" were. Visually, they're exotic-classic, with such marvelous sights as the wind-swept Arabian landscape, the Sultan's opulent castle and the scary, tiger-mouthed Cave of Wonders. Some scenes are painted in rich, saturated colors, which contrast splendidly with the mysteriously dark nightglasses scene.

As for the movie's hip side, it's not so different from those Warner Bros. cartoons featuring Bugs Bunny, Daffy Duck, etc.

In an especially brilliant stroke, some of the tale's traditional, serious characters have been paired with modern-seeming, comical ones. The plucky, heroic Aladdin is, for example, usually accompanied by his mischievous monkey Abu. Princess Jasmine has a big pet cat, but her funny sidekick is really her

father, the Sultan, whose long white beard and roly-poly physique make him look like a mini-Santa. Besides, the dark-lidded Jasmine is a more fully evolved ingenue than either of her immediate predecessors, Ariel ("The Little Mermaid") and Beauty ("Beauty and the Beast").

There's also a miraculous (and computer-animated) flying carpet which becomes a character in its own right by using its corner tassels as hands and feet.

As engaging as these characters are, it's the genie from the lamp who steals the show. Robin Williams provides the voice for this bubbly, blue-hued spirit — an inkpot persona that's like the ultimate big-screen realization of the comedian's stand-up self.

When the wisecracking genie has an announcement to make, his smoky tail becomes a microphone. At other times, he assumes the form of Groucho Marx, Peter Lorre, a dragon, a flight attendant, Arsenio Hall, Robert De Niro (in "Taxi Driver"), a line of cheerleaders, Ed Sulli-

van, a light bulb, William F. Buckley Jr. (to enumerate the restrictions of the magic lamp), a game-show host, a bumblebee, Jack Nicholson, a one-man band and even the moon.

"Aladdin" is a musical, and, in contrast to the faux-Sondheim sounds of "Beauty and the Beast," much of its score is like '30s and '40s music, with an Arabian accent. "Alan Menken and Howard Ashman — the musical team from both "Beauty and the Beast" and "The Little Mermaid" — wrote three of the five numbers, including my two favorites, the Fats Waller-esque "Friend Like Me" and the vaguely Middle-Eastern "Prince Ali." Other, more conventional songs were written by Menken and Tim Rice ("Evil-Be," including the romantic "A Whole New World."

If only the indispensable Ashman, who died last year, could have finished what he started. Rice does, however, get off a clever (political?) flourish in the reprise of "Prince Ali," for which he wrote additional lyrics; Rice has the evil Jafar — who

has become an all-powerful ruler and is soon to be deposed — sing the words "read my lips."

Written by Ted Elliott, Terry Rossio and the directors, the script is skillfully structured, with each episode growing naturally out of the preceding one. And the film is fortunate in its cast of voice actors which, in addition to Williams, includes comedian Gilbert Gottfried as Jafar's irascible parrot — the role he was born to play.

With all the pop-culture references in "Aladdin," references to earlier Disney films are hardly taboo here. When the genie's talk turns to the subject of prevarication, for example, he sprouts Pinocchio's noggin. And when a cookbook magically appears, Sebastian the crab hops out of it.

My stomach was starting to unknit, until I heard the word "eat." A girl's nightmare: Will I spill something? Or, worse, will I burp really loud?

We took our places in line, dishing

up the salads. My date dropped lettuce on the floor, and my friend's date put sour cream on his salad instead of ranch dressing.

Conversation at dinner was limited to giggles between the girls.

After dinner, we dropped by some person's wedding party. One of the guys had to congratulate a friend. When we arrived, a girl told me and my date that we made a "cute couple." I was humiliated.

Soon, we were heading for the Sadie Hawkins dance at Twin Falls High School.

At the dance, we posed for a group picture. I sat on a stool so I would

look shorter than my date. After that, a slow song began. Like an idiot, I asked my date if he wanted to dance.

"Of course he wants to dance, stupid!" I reprimanded myself. "If he didn't, he wouldn't have come to a dance."

We talked about how time goes by fast when you're having fun. The dance went by pretty fast.

I had to be home at midnight, like most unfortunate teen-agers. When we arrived at my house, I got out of the car and thanked my friend for the ride. Then we had a snowball fight.

Guns N' Roses singer must stay away from felons

This is how rumors start.

Last Tuesday, Guns N' Roses lead singer Axl Rose was sentenced to two years' probation and ordered to make \$50,000 in charitable donations after being convicted of misdemeanor assault and property-damage charges stemming from a riot at a Missouri concert in July 1991.

That's the one where he leaped into the crowd to grab a camera, then led the band offstage. The fans

did damage in the thousands of dollars.

if they are members of his band. "Hey, is the mob jealous or what? Except there's another twist, too: There may not be any felons.

St. Louis County Prosecutor Robert McCulloch admitted he didn't know who the felons were. "The defense brought it up," he said. "Defense attorney Art Margulis said he didn't know of any felons in the band, either. "The prosecutor said it," he said.

Band spokeswoman Bryn Bridenthal said she was only aware of "misdemeanors, drunk and disorderly, drugs, minor stuff. No felonies."

PUC refuses to keep US WEST studies quiet

BOISE — One of the requirements for protecting information under the state's "trade secret" law is that the data involved must be secret, not public knowledge.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission on Wednesday refused U.S. WEST's request to keep confidential certain toll traffic studies. The studies analyzed the number of toll calls to U.S. WEST's Burley-Declo exchange from the Albion exchanges, where customers petitioned for toll-free calling to Declo.

The PUC held a closed hearing so Albion Telephone Co. could present the information. On Wednesday, the commission said the information would be placed in the public record.

Under Idaho's Trade Secrets Act, information must be not generally known; must be not readily ascertainable by other persons who can get economic value from its disclosure or use; and it must be the subject of reasonable efforts to maintain its secrecy.

Trio receive grants to keep waste tires out of landfills

TWIN FALLS — The Southern Idaho Solid Waste District has received a \$70,000 grant and Twin Falls County \$40,000 from a fund designed to keep waste tires out of landfills and to reuse and recycle them.

Idaho Tire Recovery of Shoshone also got a \$75,000 grant.

A 1991 law created the Waste Tire Grant Account, and added a \$1 surcharge on the purchase of new tires. A state agency set up a competitive bidding process to award grants to counties and contracts to private companies.

Officials said the money can go for contracts for services from waste-tire processing facilities or for contracts to remove waste tires from county landfills or unlawful tire piles.

Funds also can go to establish waste-tire collection centers at solid waste disposal facilities or waste tire processing centers.

Helca Mining cuts won't affect south Idaho operations

COEUR D'ALENE — Planned reductions at the Helca Mining Co. will not directly affect its operation north of Sunbeam in southern Idaho.

The \$75 million Grouse Creek project off the Yankee Fork of the Salmon River will be considered along with all the company's other projects.

"We're looking at all our operations," Helca spokeswoman Vicki Kok said. The mining operations will go forward as financing becomes available and as long as prices allow profitable operation.

Continued poor precious metal prices have led Helca to reduce its corporate staff by 20 positions, company officials said.

"Precious metals prices are just not cooperating," Kok said.

Coeur d'Alene-based Helca is a major U.S. miner of silver, gold, lead, zinc and industrial minerals.

The Grouse Creek project has all the needed permits, but construction hasn't started yet. Helca expects to start next summer, but it will be 1½ to two years before actual gold production will begin, Kok said.

But miners are optimistic, expecting to find the next bonanza around the next corner, she said.

Medical evidence to decide verdict

TWIN FALLS — The verdict in the Donnell "Bud" Stradley murder trial may hinge on which doctors the jury believes.

The case is really a battle between two theories about what led to the Jan. 20 death of 2-year-old Amanda Hostetler.

Three doctors who have testified for the prosecution say the physical cause is clear: a two-inch tear in her abdominal tissue caused Amanda to bleed to death internally.

But what caused that tear and whose fault was it?

Prosecutors say Stradley, 29, tossed Amanda 10-11 feet toward her waterbed, where she struck her abdomen on the padded wooden corner of the bed frame.

Public Defender Mike Wood said in his opening statement that he will show a pattern of injury and abuse to Amanda's mesentery at the hands of her mother could have led to the injury that killed her.

The mesentery is a fan of fatty tissue that attaches near the spinal column and supplies blood vessels to the lower intestine.

Dr. Charles Garrison, the pathologist

who performed the autopsy on Amanda, said about one cup of her blood had poured into her abdominal cavity from the tear in her mesentery.

That's about 40 percent of the blood in a 2-year-old child's body.

"In my opinion, it was a severe blow" that caused the large tear in Amanda's mesentery, Garrison said.

After reading Garrison's autopsy report, the emergency room doctor and the pediatrician who treated Amanda at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center agreed with his assessment.

They also said Amanda's death was quick and painful.

"It was not a prolonged, slow bleed," Dr. Bart Adrian, a pediatrician said. Blood tests revealed Amanda died within 15 minutes to an hour after receiving the blow, Adrian said.

He based that opinion on several factors, including the number of red and white blood cells in Amanda's system.

Amanda's white blood cell count was normal when she died, which is unusual because the body's immediate response to injury is to release more of the infection-fighting white blood cells.

Race for enhancement funds heats up

HAILEY - Competition heated up this week within Region 4 for \$4.5 million dollars of Idaho Department of Transportation enhancement funds that will be distributed throughout the state at the end of this year.

The Blaine County Recreation District, the Shoshone BLM office and Blaine County have submitted proposals which will vie for a share of the funds with the city of Twin Falls and other local applicants.

The purpose of the enhancement program is to provide funding for transportation related improvements that would not otherwise be included in a typical highway project.

The Recreation District had turned in three

proposals by the Nov. 18 deadline. They include:

- \$131,250 to acquire part of the railroad right-of-way between the River Run Motel and Second Avenue to complete the Ketchum connection of the Wood River Trails system.
- If funded, the second proposal for \$250,000 would complete an eight-mile, class-one extension of the WRT system from Bellevue to Gannett.
- \$312,500 to design and construct a 14-mile, hard-surface pathway from the Sawtooth National Recreation Area Visitors' Center to the present Galena Lodge.

The Shoshone BLM has submitted four proposals. They include:

- \$25,000 to develop the popular Moonstone Recreation Area near Magic Dam. Interpretive signs, a highway pullout, RV dump station, and

campground would comprise the project.

- Several scenic and interpretive pullouts near the Craters of the Moon National Monument at the estimated cost of \$25,000. Another similar amount would be used to construct a series of canyon-to-mountain scenic and interpretive pullouts along Highway 75 between Twin Falls and the Sawtooths. The pullouts would provide information about scenic and historic sites such as the Oregon Trail and Black Butte Crater.

- \$300,000 to complete a paved section of the WRT system between BLM property at Hulien Meadows to Lake Creek.

Blaine County has applied for \$35,000 to purchase approximately 27 1/2 acres of property along Highway 75 near Ketchum for a scenic easement.

4 trucking company workers found guilty of battery

JEROME - A jury found four employees of a local trucking company guilty of battery of a Jerome woman.

Fifth District Court Magistrate Judge Roger Bunkick heard the case in a two-day trial earlier this week.

Gary Mallock, Diane Falconbury, Stefan Vesa and Max Booth,

employees of the Arlo Lott Trucking Co., were found guilty of attacking Teresa Stone when she delivered parts to the firm southeast of Jerome.

Defense attorney Lynn Dunlap said during his closing statements that a joke was played and someone was humiliated - but that was not necessarily a crime.

"The bottom line is that's the way things are run at Arlo Lotts," Dunlap argued in court. "They are always playing pranks on everybody that comes or works for Arlo. If someone gets hurt, it's not a crime."

The men forced Stone to the ground, held her down and painted her face with pencil marking pens, according to county records.

In struggling to free herself, Stone's arm and legs were injured in the incident, Stone said after the trial.

"At first I was afraid they were going to rape me," Stone said outside of court. "I kept telling them to let me go. I kicked and kept trying to get away, but there were three or four of the men holding me down."

The trucking company will reimburse Stone for lost wages and medical bills, according to court records.

A sentencing date has not been set.

PUC wants your ideas on meeting future demands

TWIN FALLS - Idaho Power Co. is seeking public comment on how the utility will meet electricity demands in the future.

The utility must file a 1993 Integrated Resource Plan with state regulatory agencies by March of 1993.

Idaho Power has issued a draft "resource portfolio" which will be used to list and describe available new resource, which Idaho Power can combine to meet future electricity needs at the lowest cost. Copies of the portfolio is available at Idaho Power offices.

Idaho Power will take written comments on the draft portfolio until Dec. 11. Comments should be mailed to Idaho Power Company, Resource Planning Department, Box 70, Boise 83707.

The utility hopes to complete a draft Integrated Resource Plan by January. It would then be subject to comment at public meetings. Comments on the resources

outlined in the portfolio or other resources not yet identified will help create the best combination of new resources for the 1993 Integrated Resource Plan, the utility says.

This year's draft portfolio includes a number of home and commercial energy efficiency improvements, electric transmission and generating efficiency improvements. It includes expansion at existing hydroelectric sites and a new dam at the A.J. Wiley site on the Snake River downstream of Hagerman.

It also includes a variety of generation possibilities using gas and coal.

Power generated from wind, solar and geothermal sources are listed as "promising resources for future portfolios."

Resources adopted from the 1991 portfolio include the Good Cents Program for home insulation, Low Income Weatherization and other programs to increase energy efficiency.

Sandy City Council puts brakes on controversial speeder-nabbing plan

SANDY, Utah (AP) - The Sandy City Council has said no, for now, to a policing technique the mayor considers too much like Big Brother government.

The council tabled a plan to start using the controversial PhotoCop, which snaps shots of the license plates of speeding vehicles. Four communities in Utah use PhotoCop, and it has won praise in West Valley City.

"We more or less put it aside to see what the Legislature's going to do," said council member Stan Price.

The Legislature earlier this year tried to kill PhotoCop, but the governor vetoed the legislation. The issue is expected to be taken up again by the next Legislature.

Price said the majority of the Sandy council is inclined to favor PhotoCop, though Mayor Larry Smith has staunchly opposed it on

grounds that it's too evocative of Big Brother government.

"The mayor's trying to keep peace and harmony," said Price, who called PhotoCop a "very sensitive issue politically."

Smith and three council members - Bryant Anderson, John Winder and Scott Cowell - are up for re-election next year.

But Price said he might support it if it's going to reduce the number of accidents. West Valley City's statistics show the traffic-accident rate dropped 16 percent in PhotoCop's first year of use.

For his part, Sandy Police Chief Gary J. Leonard would rather spend the money on more traffic cops.

In a letter sent to the council Tuesday, Leonard said the city needs to take a hard look at the devastated by budget cuts last year.

He said mindless and robotic technology like PhotoCop isn't capable of the "judgment and discretion" of a flesh-and-blood police officer. "I don't want photo technology to replace people already on the street," Leonard said.

"It's not something we're opposed to, but as we look at the cause of accidents, a lot are happening in intersections. Failure to obey traffic signals and that type of thing - and not necessarily speeding."

Leonard said the council sooner or later might give PhotoCop a try. "Their concern is to save lives and decrease traffic problems and this is definitely a tool to do that," he said.

Leonard said the technology likely would increase work for prosecutors.

Court clears way for suit against paper

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - The Utah Supreme Court has ruled that a Cedar City nurse cannot sue a newspaper she says defamed her by reporting on her drug problems and relationship with a doctor who allegedly supplied her.

The high court's decision came in the case of Shelley Russell, who was placed on probation for one year in 1985 but allowed to continue working on condition she submit to random drug testing.

A Dec. 11, 1985, story in The Daily Spectrum by reporter Kristine Messerly Loosley detailed a stipulated agreement between Russell and the state Licensing Division. The article also included a statement that the doctor providing drugs to Russell also performed four abortions on her.

Russell sued the newspaper, the reporter and Robert Bowen, then the division director. Because of the abortion comment, Russell said the defendants were guilty of defamation, invasion of privacy and intentional infliction of emotional distress.

On Aug. 8, 1990, the trial court dismissed Russell's suit against Bowen on grounds of governmental immunity. The suit against Loosley and The Daily Spectrum also was dismissed, based on claims the article was protected by statutory and common law privilege.

But the justices, noting that Bowen denied telling Loosley the nurse underwent any abortions, on Tuesday ordered the suit returned to district court for trial because of "conflicting evidence concerning

the source of the abortion statement."

"This quote involves a factual dispute as to whether Bowen actually made the statement attributed to him," Chief Justice Gordon R. Hall wrote in the unanimous opinion.

"If he made the statement, the publication is a fair report of the proceedings and official comments. If he did not make the statement, it is simply not a fair and true report," Hall added.

To win her suit, the court said, Russell must show negligence on the part of Loosley and the newspaper.

However, if a jury determines Bowen made the statement, Russell would have to prove malice toward her by the defendants.

In fact, Hollerreed has trouble summing up all the club's many duties, saying it is partly the town's chamber of commerce, partly a booster club and partly a service organization.

And because the club has now boasts 114 members, has no state or national affiliations, all the money it raises is put back into the Castleford community of 179 residents.

This year alone the group raised and donated funds to 28 Castleford organizations.

"And we do have a better community because of it," said the club's first President Earl Heide.

Of its members, the club only asks that they aren't stingy with their time, requiring them to stay involved in the community and discover new and

more worthy causes.

A big recipient each year is the Castleford School District, which this year received funds for programs ranging from reading projects to farming and cheerleading causes.

All told, 19 scholarships were presented to Castleford graduates this year, "as a little encouragement for rural kids to get on with their education," says Hollerreed.

Almost as old as the town itself, the Men's Club was organized in 1946, just five years after Castleford was incorporated and 21 years before it officially became a city.

In the past, members have supported Easter egg hunts, scouting and Head Start programs for disadvantaged children.

It also doesn't shy away from community projects to raise funds for

improvements at Balanced Rock Park or to help make streets safer by purchasing Neighborhood Watch signs.

Club members have also purchased high school bleachers, paid for landscaping of the school grounds and erected gazebos.

Perhaps the club's biggest event is its annual auction that has raised up to \$10,000 and draws a crowd from across the Magic Valley for 17 years.

This year's sale, scheduled for January 30, includes a piece of Castleford history: an antique adding machine used in a Castleford business back in 1900.

Many donations to the club, says Hollerreed, come from businesses and banks and "some of the widows (of former club members). We have some loyal people."

Adrian said. Amanda died before her body could respond to the injury, he said.

On the other hand, the percentage of red blood cells was only slightly lower than normal.

If she had been bleeding slowly, Amanda's body would have compensated for the blood loss by injecting fluids into the bloodstream to maintain the blood pressure, Adrian said.

That would have pushed the percentage of red blood cells far lower than the 26 percent found in Amanda, he said.

Emergency room Dr. Kevin Kraal had similar estimates of how long Amanda could have lived after receiving her injuries.

Wood tried to counter the doctors' testimony by saying nowhere in the medical literature are there studies using the white blood cell count to estimate the time of death in trauma patients.

An estimate based only on

Amanda's red blood cell count would put Amanda's injury no more than eight hours from her time of death, Kraal said.

Internal abdominal bleeding is usually apparent, even to a lay person, the doctor says.

Even a teaspoon or less of blood in the abdomen can cause a person to double over in excruciating pain, Kraal said.

In severe injuries, that pain is usually followed by lethargy, shock, vomiting and death, according to both Kraal and Adrian.

But, under questioning by Wood, the doctors acknowledged there have been cases where abdominal injuries have been misdiagnosed. The signs are not always evident, they said.

Wood further pointed out that children seem to have a higher resistance to the shock that follows internal bleeding, which could explain why both Stradley and Amanda's mother say the little girl was playing less than an hour before

a police officer found her dead on her waterbed.

The medical evidence leads to "multiple reasonable explanations" for Amanda's death, Wood said.

In his opening remarks, he said he will provide evidence that Amanda had a "smoldering mesentery" - one that was weakened by scarring and tender new tissue.

He likened it to a cut that won't heal because it is continually reinjured. With that condition, Amanda's fatal injury could have been caused by everyday activity, said Wood, who will begin presenting witnesses Monday.

Scarring and new tissue would have "no affect at all" on the mesentery's strength, Kraal said.

Garrison said the mesentery was probably "partially weakened," but said a severe blow still would have been necessary to cause Amanda's injury.

In his questioning of the prosecution's medical witnesses, Wood also has pointed out that Amanda's mesentery was damaged near her back even though the organs in front of the wound - the liver, kidneys, spleen, etc. - were not injured.

the school," added Gene Derrickson, who is the father of a 15-year-old freshman at Bliss. "The thing we want to do is separate ourselves from the PTO (Parent/Teacher Organization) and the school board. We're not focusing on the school system per se, we're focusing on the kids."

Part of that focus will include a somewhat unusual student-of-the-month program, where kids will be chosen based on a wide range of merit, rather than just on grade points or points scored in a basketball game. This approach will give the average student a shot of self-esteem, Derrickson said, and let the kids at the bottom of the academic or athletic ladder know that they matter, too. The club members hope the recognition will

encourage everyone to try a little harder, do a little better.

Derrickson said the club has already planned several fundraising events to pay for the student-of-the-month program and the other projects - special achievement plaques, game uniforms, school spirit-props - the Booster Club is considering. 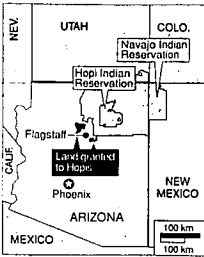
Land dispute settlement pits Indians against whites

PHOENIX (AP) — A plan to end a bitter territorial dispute between the Navajo and Hopi tribes by giving vast tracts of government land to the Indians has brought a new group of combatants into the century-old range war: whites who hunt, fish, ski and log the country.

The settlement announced this week was hailed by the tribes and federal officials as ending a Middle East diplomat.

The Hopis, whose relatively small northeastern Arizona reservation is surrounded by Navajo land, would get 515 million and some 500,000 acres of federal, state and private land outside both reservations. In return, they would drop efforts to evict 150 Navajo families from Hopi land where the Navajos have lived with their sheep herds for years as squatters.

The new Hopi land would be in two chunks in the high country south of the Grand Canyon, an area prized for recreation and resources. The federal territory — mostly in the Coconino and Kaibab national forests — includes timber leases and a cross-country ski and bike operation



of all improvements if the Forest Service loses control of the site — even if he wants to strike a deal with the Hopis.

Opposition is intense in Flagstaff, a mountain town that caters to the outdoors crowd.

On Monday, the same day both tribes' councils separately approved the tentative settlement, more than 100 people jammed the City Council conference room to criticize the plan and demand more information.

"It was done in secret with no local input," said state Rep. John Wettaw, R-Flagstaff.

The tentative deal would settle at least six lawsuits among the tribes and the federal government. It was reached in discussions before a mediator appointed by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals and approved Wednesday by the U.S. Agriculture and Interior Departments, despite Forest Service opposition.

Congressional approval also is required. In addition to worries the new Indian owners would end present recreational and commercial use of the land, Flagstaff is worried because the deal includes part of Lake Mary, a

water source, said City Manager David Wilcox. "We haven't been consulted," Wilcox said.

Gov. Fife Symington complained that Arizona officials weren't asked either, even though the deal would turn over 165,000 acres of state land to the Hopis.

"I would like to have this undone as soon as possible," said the Republican governor, who called the settlement a "land grab."

U.S. Sen. Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., said congressional approval isn't assured and promised hearings to assess the impact on Flagstaff.

The dispute between the tribes dates to 1882, when President Chester A. Arthur approved a square drawn on a map as a reservation for the Hopis, who live in a series of tiny, mostly traditional cliff-top villages.

The Hopis' traditional enemies, the Navajos, lived nearby, and the Navajo reservation eventually grew to surround the Hopi land as it was incrementally expanded to cover northeast Arizona and parts of Utah and New Mexico.

The Navajo, most of whom live in widely scattered hogans tending sheep on arid rangeland, say their move into Hopi territory is justified.

The Hopi use only small patches for crops and grazing and the Navajo have a traditional claim to the territory in an area known as Big Mountain, the tribe has argued in court.

The dispute reached the courts in 1958 when the Hopis sued the Navajos, claiming the entire 2.5-million-acre reservation in northeastern Arizona set aside by Arthur in 1882 belonged to them.

A federal court ruled in 1962 that 1.8 million acres of the reservation was to be owned jointly and equally by the two tribes, but the Hopis and Navajos still battled over control of the land for decades.

Amendment bans gambling for charity

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Gambling for charity — except for bingo and raffles — now is illegal in Idaho.

Since voters passed constitutional amendment Nov. 3 to clarify the state ban on casino gambling, that ends the popular casino night events charities have held for years to raise money.

"It's pretty clear. Casino nights are outlawed," said Frank Walker, deputy attorney general. "I think there are probably a lot of organizations with blackjack and craps tables that are shipping them to Washington."

Charities still can run gambling-type games, Walker said, but only if there are no prizes, risks or winnings. And on most casino nights, that's everything.

Under a bill approved by the last Legislature, bingo and raffles still can be used to raise money, but just until June 30. If the Legislature doesn't act, even that permission expires.

For several northern Idaho charitable organizations, approval of the gambling amendment means a retreat from lucrative casino nights to more mundane bake sales, dinner dances and raffles. Casino nights drew 1.2

crowds of well-mannered people who dropped a lot of money and were content to leave with a small prize and the memory of a good time, organizers said.

"People dine we raise from those goes back into the community. We're really disappointed by this," said Joyce Hilderbrand, president of Soroptimist International of Coeur d'Alene. The club held casino nights annually for at least six years.

"People sit at the tables with play money hoping to win a thermos at the end of the night," said Judy Alling, director of the Kootenai Family YMCA. The Y held two casino nights several years ago.

"People go mainly to support the agencies, not to walk away big winners."

Most charitable organizations ran casino nights about the same way.

They charged \$10 to \$25 for an entry ticket. For the price of admission, the ticket-holder got anywhere from \$10,000 to \$25,000 in fake money. It was used in blackjack, craps, a dice game called 4-5-6 and roulette.

Businesses and individuals donated prizes. Some organizations auctioned the prizes for fake money. Others awarded prizes to the top money winners.

"It's fun for people to come away with some sort of prize," Alling said. "If we can't award prizes, I wouldn't do it. That would take all the pizzazz out of it."

Phil Colozzi, director of North Idaho Community Services Corp., said when casino nights offer nothing but the chance to play with fake money, proceeds decline. His organization aids the homeless and held its first casino night about three months ago.

Canyon County Hispanics say they live by a double standard

CALDWELL (AP) — Leaders in the Canyon County Hispanic community say there's a different standard of justice in the county.

"I think it's a reality of life in Canyon County," said Caldwell attorney Camilo Lopez.

"I think that there is an emphasis on the Hispanic drunk driver, which in itself is wrong.

"And it goes to the unwritten rule that if a Hispanic does it to an Anglo, woe to the Hispanic. And if an Anglo does it to a Hispanic, most likely the Hispanic deserved it. And if the Hispanic does it to a Hispanic — good riddance."

Lopez and other complained about the "double standard" after Robert Dale Arehart, 22, Nampa, was sentenced to prison Nov. 13.

Last June, a car driven by Arehart struck a pickup carrying 11 farm workers. Four Hispanics died. Arehart pleaded guilty to four counts of felony vehicular manslaughter.

On Nov. 13, 3rd District Judge

Hispanics point to a 1985 case in which a Hispanic, Angel Martinez Fuga, was sentenced to a fixed term of seven years for the drunken driving deaths of two non-Hispanics.

Two relatives of one of the dead farm workers say that was discrimination. But others disagree, including a public defender who has been involved in 25 to 30 drunken driving manslaughter cases.

"I don't believe our courts have shown any racism," defender Van Bishop said. "There have been instances where you have a defendant with a substantial criminal record who is going to get a much stronger sentence than the first-time offender," Bishop said.

Arehart had one previous drunk-driving arrest and a misdemeanor charge involving drug abuse.

Judge Weston refused comment. Bonnie Bunger, Middleton, president of the Canyon County chapter of Mothers Against Drunk Driving, MADD, said she would have liked a tougher sentence.

"I don't believe the sentencing (of Arehart) had anything to do with racial issues," Bunger said. "I wish the judge had handed down a stiffer penalty since there was drugs and alcohol involved."

"I do believe, however, that judges need to start treating these cases as violent crimes and use the law we have in place to do so. Judge Weston made a start — I would like to see it continue," Bunger said.

"The court record shows race has never been a valid issue in the Arehart case," said Timothy Spencer, deputy prosecutor in charge of the case.

"The court record further shows Judge Weston compared the facts with the applicable laws and fashioned the sentence," Spencer said.

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ACLU claims prison abuses 'rider' program

LEWISTON (AP) — A 14-month-old federal class-action lawsuit challenging the so-called "rider" program at Cottonwood's North Idaho Correctional Institution is mired in legal maneuvers.

And the American Civil Liberties Union attorney who is pressing the case contends perhaps thousands of current and former inmates at the prison may have been illegally released or kept there.

While the suit falls short of calling for any releases, it does demand \$1 million for prisoners to hire attorneys to reopen their cases.

It also takes a swing at a sentencing procedure Idaho district judges have praised since it began in 1972.

The two defendants in the suit — Idaho Corrections Director Richard Vernon and Ronald McKinsey, warden at NICI-Cottonwood — decline comment because of the pending litigation.

But Steven Pevar, staff counsel for the ACLU in Denver, charges that because of slipshod handling of inmate evaluation reports by NICI staff, the rights of prisoners have been knowingly violated for more than a decade.

"If the defendants are not aware that violations are routine at NICI, then they do not want to know," Pevar recently wrote in a court document. "Their staff knows. Riders know."

The Legislature created the "rider" program 20 years ago to divert first-time offenders away from crime. Sentencing judges can retain jurisdiction over inmates for 120 to 180 days, after which time the court reviews the inmate's progress at Cottonwood.

The judge then can drop jurisdiction and impose the rest of the sentence on the inmate, or take other avenues like probation.

The rider program, Pevar said, hinges on a "fair and accurate" re-

view by NICI staff of the inmates' progress for the judges.

Pevar accused Vernon and McKinsey of ignoring legal review requirements imposed by the Idaho Supreme Court. He also charged them with being "sloppy" and "unconcerned" about procedures.

Pevar collected three dozen affidavits from inmates who claim review procedures in their cases were violated.

McKinsey supervises the rider program while Vernon assumes overall control.

The case, which was proceeding through the discovery process, stalled about three months ago when Deputy Idaho Attorney General Timothy Wilson filed a motion for summary judgment. It asks U.S. District Court Judge Harold Ryan to determine the case based on evidence gathered to date.

Pevar charged the tactic is an attempt to mount a defense by taking the offensive.

The state claims the inmate review process at NICI has already been scrutinized in at least six other cases and found to be proper, according to records.

While submitting no written policies or testimony, the state is relying only on case law where judges found no fault with the procedures at NICI, Pevar claimed.

He challenged the state to show where any judge actually reviewed those cases to confirm that proper review of the riders was followed.

The Idaho Supreme Court ruled in 1978 all NICI inmates under the rider program must have adequate notice before the hearing, an idea of the matters to be considered, the opportunity to explain or rebut any testimony or recommendations, and freedom to call witnesses from among employees or inmates.

Utah governor says drop abortion law fight

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Gov. Norm Bangert says Utah lawmakers ought to give up their costly legal defense of the state's new abortion law.

Bangert said that continuing the legal fight is "foolish, now that the Supreme Court, with numerous conservative Republican appointees, has still refused to go further in limiting a woman's right to an abortion."

The governor, speaking during his

final monthly press conference, advised lawmakers to "accept that fact and step back" even though he, too, supports the 1991 law. It was Bangert who pushed the law through the Legislature despite pressure to make it more restrictive.

But earlier this year, the U.S. Supreme Court reaffirmed the 1973 Roe vs. Wade decision that legalized abortion. In upholding a Pennsylvania law, the court gave states the right to restrict abortion but not

to ban it outright. The American Civil Liberties Union challenged Utah's new law as unconstitutional and both sides are awaiting a decision by U.S. District Court Judge Thomas Greene.

Last week, legislative leaders reaffirmed their support of the 1991 law, which bans abortions except in instances of reported rape, incest, grave fetal deformity and to save a woman's health or life. The cost of defending the law is

expected to reach \$1 million. The sponsor of the law, Sen. LeRoy McAllister, R-Orem, said legislative leaders are "committed to continuing to provide Utah's abortion laws with the best, most vigorous, professional defense possible."

McAllister said he intends to introduce new legislation modeled on the Pennsylvania law, which requires women to consider their decision to have an abortion for at least 24 hours.

2 women urge delay of child killer's execution

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — Two women, including one who says she wants to marry the condemned child-killer, have asked a judge to delay the execution of Wesley Allan Dodd.

A Nashville, Tenn., woman told Clark County Superior Court Judge Robert Harris in a letter that she and Dodd "have been in love for some time and we are spiritually committed to

each other."

"We would or will be married if time and the prison allows," she wrote in the Oct. 11 letter.

Harris released the contents of the letter this week, but ordered the name of the woman withheld at her request.

Monday, Harris is scheduled to set an execution date for Dodd and formally prescribe his method of death — hang-

ing or lethal injection. Dodd says he wants to be hanged at the state penitentiary at Walla Walla. Dodd, 31, was convicted of three counts of aggravated first-degree murder in the sex slayings of three young boys in 1989. He was arrested after patrons of a Vancouver-area movie theater caught him trying to abduct another young boy.

Dodd has described himself as a constitutional child molester since his teen years. He says he wants to die so he doesn't kill again, and has asked that no appeals be filed on his behalf.

The state Supreme Court has agreed to that request. An execution date early next year is likely, and would make Dodd the first inmate executed in Washington since 1963.

Conservative school group receives national attention

BOISE (AP) — An Eagle couple has turned the conflict over the suspensions of three Meridian High School teachers into a national campaign to inform the news media about the conservative group Citizens for Excellence in Education.

Roy and Christine Cueller have sent informational packages about the furor to the television networks, Cable News Network and talk show hosts such as Phil Donohue.

The three teachers were suspended for bringing lesbians to the school to talk about family issues. The suspensions were later lifted and the teachers' records were cleared.

Roy Cueller said the goal is to create an awareness of the national campaign by Citizens to influence school boards.

"We have just become aware of a group called Citizens for Excellence in Education and their agenda only after a second major local incident has taken place," the Cuellers said in their cover letter and clippings about the Meridian battle.

Citizens leader Robert Simonds agreed the group aims to place conservative members on the school boards, but added the primary goal is to return traditional family matters and parental control to public education.

When the sirens went off and the lights began flashing, Heath was perplexed. "I said, 'What did I do?'"

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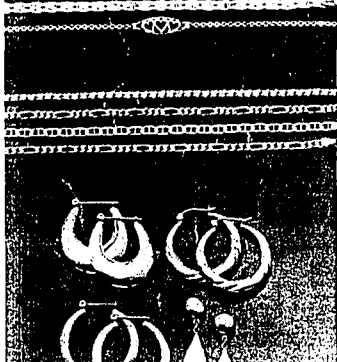
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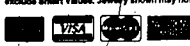
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Nation Giving thanks

Americans find reasons, ways to help fellow citizens

Rain dampened Thanksgiving Day parade-goers and some holiday travelers were still stranded by snow, but the spirit of the day came alive with turkey dinners for the homeless — and for former allies newly arrived from the jungles of Cambodia.

"What I've noticed is a real kind of neat family feeling," said Jeff Hadfield, kitchen manager at a center that provides meals for the needy in Norman, Okla. "We have a lot of regulars come in. Even though it's a little cold today, spirits are pretty high. It's turned out to be pretty nice."

Some people were thankful to have survived the week's deadly tornadoes, and in hurricane-battered Homestead, Fla., citizens gave thanks for the help sent there by people across the nation.

Umbrellas and slickers were in fashion for the thousands of people who turned out in the rain to watch the enormous cartoon characters balloons in the annual Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York.

"When you see the balloons, you sort of forget about the rain," said 9-year-old Lauren Cohen, of Tarrytown, N.Y.

Millions more across the nation watched the parade on television.

It also rained on the big balloons of Philadelphia's annual parade Thursday, but that didn't stop thousands of fans. "It's a tradition," said Pete Roberts of Philadelphia.

Heavy rain fell in the Southeast. Orangeburg, S.C., got more than 5 inches of rain in five hours and several rivers were at or near flood stage.

Volunteers and charitable groups across the country served Thanksgiving dinner to thousands of the homeless and the needy.

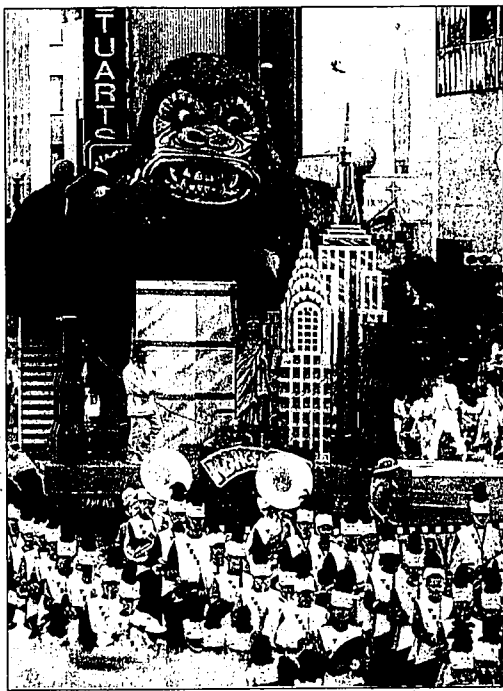
"It's very rewarding," said Pat Andrews, a volunteer who helped the Chicago Christian Industrial League serve nearly 1,000 people by midmorning. "You feel good about giving your time and your energy and your love."

Carradine said he was on hand "because it feels good and because it's what Will Rogers would have done. He would have helped people." The famed humorist was from Oklahoma.

Tornadoes earlier in the week cast a shadow over the holiday in Mississippi, where 15 people were killed.

Dorothy Jordan's dishes were blown away and her home was ravaged by a tornado, but said her family would have some sort of dinner, even if it was just a sandwich.

"We won't let the day pass without giving thanks that we're alive," she said.

Florida Gov. Lawton Chiles led the services in Homestead, telling hurricane survivors packed into a relief tent that the ceremony "gives us a chance to tell people across the country how much we appreciate the help they've given us."

Man who threatened to kill Clinton sentenced

CHICAGO — A man who threatened to kill President-elect Clinton and his 12-year-old daughter was sentenced to 18 months in prison.

Gary Steven Foster, who was diagnosed as psychotic, pleaded guilty before U.S. District Judge George Marovich on Wednesday.

Prosecutors and Foster's defense lawyer both recommended that Foster be imprisoned at a federal prison in Minnesota that has a hospital wing.

Foster, 41, of Chicago was charged in August after telling a Clinton campaign worker that he was going to kill Clinton and his daughter, Chelsea.

Psychological examinations found him "psychotic, delusional and possibly dangerous," court documents show.

Foster also was charged with assault in June for draping a U.S. flag on another candidate, Carol Mosley Braun, who in November was elected to the U.S. Senate.

Sen. Coverdell's campaign spent \$500,000 for final blitz

ATLANTA — Sen.-elect Paul Coverdell's campaign acknowledged the National Republican Senatorial Committee dumped \$500,000 into Georgia for a final media blitz.

Coverdell beat Max Baucus in a runoff Tuesday by 15,000 votes, earning 51 percent of the vote.

Fowler aides last week accused the GOP committee of spending money in the runoff campaign in possible violation of federal election law.

"Here's an election won on the margins and they've admitted to buying it. They don't play by the rules," said Fowler spokesman Ned Horton.

The Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee filed a complaint last week with the Federal Election Commission, saying rules bar contributing money to runoff campaigns in excess of limits set for the general election. The six election commissioners failed last week to reach agreement on a ruling, said FEC spokesman Fred Eiland.

Coverdell spokesman Bill Crane said Wednesday that the National Republican Senatorial Committee, which contributed \$535,000 in the general election campaign, had not spent any additional money in Georgia at the time the complaint was filed.

Amtrak train kills couple, infant son along tracks

SYRACUSE, N.Y. — An Amtrak train struck and killed a couple and their infant son as the family walked along the railroad tracks after a shopping trip, authorities said.

Johanna Markovics, 19, and her 2-month-old baby, Vincent Thomas, died Wednesday at the scene, a short distance from a shopping mall. The father, Nick Thomas Jr., 26, died later at a hospital.

The evening accident came minutes after the New York City-bound locomotive pulled away from the East Syracuse station, said Police Chief Frank Sardino.

It was traveling at about 60 mph. The engineer did not notice the people on the tracks until it was too late, Sardino said.

Authorities said the family from Rochester was visiting relatives in Liverpool, a suburb of Syracuse.

Fishing crew believed to have smuggled fish released

NEW CASTLE, N.H. — Eight men suspected of smuggling and scuttling their ship to avoid prosecution were brought ashore then released Thursday, two days after being picked up by the Coast Guard.

The crew of the fishing boat Luciana, seven Spaniards and a Canadian, were not charged with any crime, but must leave the country. Their identities were not released.

Their 80-foot ship was spotted at anchor about 100 miles south of Newfoundland on Nov. 14, with no fishing gear aboard and no national flag.

The Coast Guard cutter Redifance was sent to investigate. When it arrived, the fishing boat tried to flee. Nearly a day later it stopped, then sank shortly after the men climbed into a life raft, said Capt. Paul Howard.

Oakland police chief retires after 19 years of service

OAKLAND, Calif. — Police Chief George Hart is retiring from the post he held for 19 years.

Hart, 57, who spent his entire 37-year police career with the Oakland force, will leave his \$117,000-a-year job Dec. 31.

Hart said Wednesday he wanted to "give others an opportunity to address their priorities and programs."

Since Hart took over the department in 1973, the percentage of minority officers has jumped from 12 percent to 45 percent, and the number of women police officers increased from two to about 60. During the same period, the number of citizen complaints dropped by 50 percent.

New optics may chip time off computer speed

LA JOLLA, Calif. — The perpetual search for ways to speed up computers and find new uses for them may benefit from development of porous silicon chips that give off light instead of electrical impulses.

The light-emitting optical chips may one day be used in high-quality color display screens for laptop computers, and to make more efficient photovoltaic cells that convert sunlight to electricity, said Michael Sailor, a chemist at the University of California, San Diego.

And because alcohol and other chemicals applied to the chips cause them to emit less light, they hold "most immediate promise" for the invention of sensors to test drunken drivers, measure air pollutants, detect deadly gas in mine shafts and measure sugar levels in a diabetic's blood.

Sailor, a leading researcher in the field, discussed these and others potential uses for the chips at a recent meeting of the Council for the Advancement of Science Writing.

Ben Patrusky, executive director of the science-writing group, called the light-emitting chips a "shining example of new science."

The chips have prompted great excitement among computer researchers. The American Institute of Physics, an organization representing 100,000 physicists and astronomers, cited the chips among significant developments in physics in 1991.

Chemical & Engineering News, a professional journal, last year hailed the chips as a "momentous discovery."

But Sailor cautioned that it could be decades — if ever — before such chips might be used in purely optical computers that use light instead of electricity.

More immediately, though, it may be possible to develop hybrid computers, he said. Such machines would use conventional silicon chips, electronic signals and wires to "think" while using porous chips, bundles of light and optical fibers to "talk" to other chips and accessories, such as display screens.

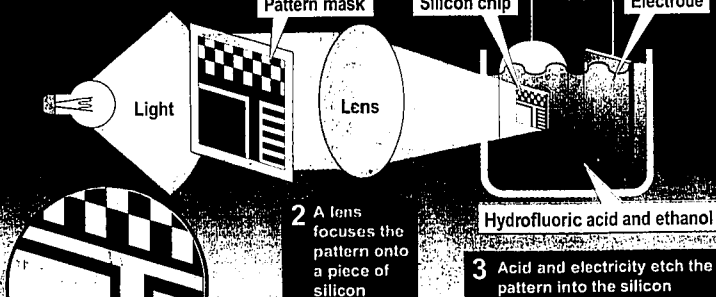

computation because light travels through fiber-optic cables 10 times faster than electricity moves through wires.

A single optical fiber can also accommodate multiple light signals simultaneously, providing much more capacity than current computer components which can take only one electric signal at a time.

Thus a computer using light-emitting chips could increase the speed and volume

of information much as a six-lane freeway can carry more cars at higher speeds than a single-lane road.

Texas Instruments Inc. and AT&T Bell Laboratories have already developed their own version of hybrid chips in "optoelectronic" or "photonic" integrated circuits that use light-emitting gallium arsenide semiconductors. Though faster than porous silicon chips developed so far — gallium arsenide chips can switch light

signals on and off in billionths of a second — they are also more expensive and complicated to make.

Scientists hope within a year to create porous silicon that can match gallium arsenide's capacity, Sailor said.

Another drawback of the porous silicon chip is stability. It tends to break down and stop emitting light. So far, Sailor and others have extended the chip's lifespan to six

Biosphere backer remains optimistic

ORACLE, Ariz. (AP) — In its first year, operators of the Biosphere 2 experiment admitted finding on promises of a sealed, self-sustaining environment where eight people would grow their food and recycle air, water and wastes.

Failure's a certainty

But the billion-dollar backer of Biosphere 2 remains optimistic about the scientific, commercial and educational potential of the \$150 million project in the desert north of Tucson.

Edward Perry Bass, the reclusive financier from Fort Worth, Texas, talked about the project at a celebration of the first anniversary of the sealing of the glass-and-steel dome.

Four men and four women were to live for two years in the complex the size of three football fields. The goal is to replicate Earth's ecological processes to better understand life on this planet, and prepare for living on other planets.

Given the "cutting-edge" position the project is in, there will certainly be a lot more failures as well as successes, unexpected things happening, Bass said. "After all, all of us involved in the project are only people."

But Bass, 47, is no ordinary person. He is one of four brothers who with their father's help and shrewd investing paralyzed trust funds established by their oil-wildcating great uncle, Sid Richardson, into a multibillion dollar fortune.

In 1988, Fortune magazine said the Bassets were the nation's fourth richest family. Media accounts have detailed a beakup of Bass Bros. Enterprises Inc. with each following his own parents, Ed Bass said he retains business ties with all three brothers and his father.

Bass is a philanthropic entrepreneur and ecologist, a self-described "ecopreneur" and "philologist" who has thrown himself with soft-spoken fervor into environmental projects around the world.

He is a director of the World Wildlife Fund, the New York Botanical Garden and the Jane Goodall Institute for Wildlife Research. He gave Yale University \$20 million last year to launch an Institute of Biospheric Studies.

Bass said he was pleased at Biosphere 2's one-year mark:

"No catastrophic problems, substantially all the systems are functioning, as evidenced by the fact that we still have eight biospherians living there."

The project got mired in controversy over issues of scientific credibility and secrecy, as evidenced by the fact that we still have eight biospherians living there."

The system had been hyped as self-sustaining, but the organizers eventually acknowledged using a machine to scrub carbon dioxide from the air, storing food reserves, pumping in outside air, and bringing in supplies after a crew member's emergency exit and return.

Biosphere, which opened Sept. 26, 1991, drew 154,000 paying visitors last year, and operators predict 250,000 will see it this year.

Bass said he hopes to get a return on his investment by the end of the decade and predicted research will produce valuable scientific information and commercially applicable technology.

Following news reports of problems at the project, Bass appointed an advisory committee of outside scientists. Among its initial findings, the committee said science had been given a lesser priority than commercial and educational aspects and recommended appointing a director of science.

A search is under way for someone to organize, manage and coordinate nearly 40 research initiatives involving outside scientists or institutions as well as the science-related work in the Biosphere.

Artist re-creates lost Red Oaks

CARTHAGE, Mo. (AP) — Lowell Davis recalls the days when Red Oak was a real town, where scores of men, women and children lived and dreamed.

Then the town died, and it seemed destined to be a lonely memory, hidden behind trees and corn fields as Route 66 drifts west toward the Great Plains.

But unlike the quiet deaths of many Midwestern communities, Red Oak survives — if only by force of Davis' imagination. Retic by relic, he's rebuilding the town in the middle of a corn field so visitors can step into a picture of a simpler life in southwestern Missouri.

"It's like a corn field was a big canvas and everything on it is part of the painting," says Davis, a painter, sculptor, author and friend of farm chickens.

"It's a piece of art. That's all it represents. I don't care if people come here, but they can if they want."

Neither Red Oak the ghost town nor Red Oak II has earned a dot on the state's official highway map. The re-creation sits off Route 66 — today's Missouri 96 — three miles east of Carthage and about 25 miles west of the original Red Oak, which is home now for hundreds of headstones but only eight living souls.

Red Oak became a ghost town after the second World War, when everybody started looking for work in bigger cities," says Davis, 55, a dry-humored character who looks a

conchob pipe on his belt loop.

"When I'd see an old building falling down — a corn crib, a privy or a chicken coop — I'd kind of get to feeling sorry for it, so I'd pick it up and bring it here," Davis says. "I didn't realize I was going to get the entire town when I started."

Red Oak II is not laid out to replicate the original place, and not all its buildings came from Red Oak. Davis says he just wanted to create a scene that feels like the 1930s-era town he grew up in.

Davis believes country living broke down when cities and suburbs grew after World War II. For him, the buildings he's refurbished at Red Oak II symbolize all a person should need: a church, schoolhouse, general store, blacksmith shop, saw mill, gas station, feed store, barns and wooden homes with wide front porches and obligatory white-picket fences.

Red Oak had about 250 people when Davis' father lost the farm during the Depression. The family survived by tanning the general

store, which now is the centerpiece of Red Oak II.

"It was such a close network of neighbors helping neighbors, it's something we sure have gotten away from," Davis says. "It was all self-sufficient. No one had any money. But with kerosene lights and wooden stoves it didn't cost but quarters to live."

Victor Charles, who has lived all 78 of his years in the real Red Oak, says America lost a sense of community when places like his home town faded into history.

"Then then if you needed a hand on the farm you could pretty well go into town and get somebody," Charles says. "You can't do it no more. There ain't nobody here."

His 14-year-old grandson, Adrian Garm, takes trips to Red Oak II to learn about the past.

"It's nice to know what used to be here," says Adrian, who is among the eight people still residing in the silence of Red Oak.

Down the highway, Red Oak II has become a low-key tourist

attraction, drawing several dozen people each day.

Davis sells his art, books and greeting cards at the general store and has converted four pre-World War II homes into bed and breakfast inns.

But he doesn't appear much concerned with commercializing Red Oak II. He says he built it for his grandchildren.

"I'm not making this a Silver Dollar City or anything like that," he says, referring to the turn-of-the-century theme park near tourist-swellen Branson. "It's all free and I hope it brings back memories for someone else."

Davis won't say how much Red Oak II cost him; he says he makes enough money selling his collectible porcelain figurines to pay for the project and live comfortably. Davis' paintings and sculptures draw from his small-town quaintness and love of farm animals.

He wrote and illustrated his latest project, "The Book on Chickens," a children's story about the romance of Big Jack and Goldie, chickens in his coop.

Like most things, Davis believes they don't make chickens like they used to. "Now, chickens are machines. They just lay eggs and you eat them," he says. He points to three of his pet chickens sitting on a picnic bench.

"You see," he says, "those aren't just chickens. Those are little characters."

Hot line serves jittery, gullible wacky public

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — California's new earthquake hot line is swamped with calls from people who are jittery, gullible, information-starved or just plain weird.

Some callers check in so often operators fondly refer to them as "quakes."

The California Earthquake Safety Hotline opened in early August. In six weeks after two major quakes on the same day killed a child, injured 400 and caused more than \$92 million in damage. It will be in operation at least until the end of the year and may become permanent.

One caller wanted to know if it was true that 10,000 body bags had been shipped to Lander, site of one of the two big quakes to hit Jan. 28.

"And we took a call from a person wanting to know if it was true they were putting pillows in Utah so when California fell off they would have a place to dock the boats carrying people going out to look for survivors," said Stef Donev, a spokesman for the hot line.

Then there was a woman who said she was a middle-school science teacher who "had it on good authority that the San Andreas fault was widening at the rate of one inch an hour," he said.

There are not 10,000 body bags in Lander, there are no emergency pillows in Utah and the slippage on the San Andreas fault is about an inch a year, Donev said.

The first day there were 695 calls. In October, after the state warned a strong quake could rock central California within three days, there were 500 calls in a single day.

In a more typical day, some 50 or 60 calls come in. In all, hot line operators have logged 6,500 calls.

One of the most often asked questions is: "Can the ground open up and swallow you?" Donev said, "No one we know of has ever been swallowed or trapped inside a fissure. Cracks can appear in the ground, but the ground does not close back up," he said.

Another popular question: "Is there earthquake weather?"

The answer is no, Donev said. "We have computer people who do nothing but run data through computers. They look for common denominators. So far, shaking is the only one they've found."

Many callers seek information on how to prepare for quakes. They get brochures. Some people want

reassurance they have done the right things preparing their homes or offices. They go through checklists with the hot line workers, two of whom are geophysicists.

Some people are just plain scared, Donev said. He remembers a Santa Monica woman who started calling every day after the June 28 quakes.

"She would live in her home fine during the day, but she slept in her car every night. She finally overcame her fear and is now sleeping in her home again."

He estimates about 10 percent of the callers are quakes — "people who call on a regular basis. They call several times a week wanting to know what's new and interesting."

Spy: I'll continue to support Castro

MIAMI — An old 9mm pistol sits on the dining room table. The barrel faces the front door, its trigger off safety. In one corner of the living room, a rifle leans against the wall. It, too, is loaded, available for quick access.

Such is the greeting at the two-bedroom home of Francisco "Fanchito" Avila — file-labeled, ex-political prisoner, paramilitary fighter and now self-confessed Cuban spy and double agent.

"I've got to protect myself," Avila says as he puts the pistol aside, placing it on a child's table. "I take care of myself with the gun."

Since Avila confessed on television to a life as a double agent — spying on exiles for the government of Fidel Castro while working for the FBI — his domestic life has become chaotic.

He is slow-moving but alert, an empty coffee cup sitting on the dining room table next to a legal pad on which he has been taking notes. He keeps looking out the open front door to glimpse passing cars.

"I'm not paranoid," Avila says. "I just like to know who's out in front of my house."

Behind his sparsely furnished home in northwest Miami is a boat. It came from the \$12,000 given him by the Cuban government while he was the military commander of Alpha 66, an exile group dedicated to the overthrow of Fidel Castro.

Avila said the boat was for possible use in attacks on the island, attacks that Castro could turn into propaganda victories.

Avila's critics say he has tainted the reputation of the "luchadores" (fighters) who have dedicated their lives to the struggle against Castro.

"They (critics) want to blame me for their failed missions," Avila says. "But when, in reality, have they tasted salt water when it wasn't while taking a swim in the beach?"

Avila says he made his story public to expose what Castro is capable of doing. There are other spies, he says, ones loyal to the Cuban government.

"My intention is for the American people to learn that these things exist and that their enemy is Fidel Castro."

Avila has three children: a girl and a boy from his first marriage and a young daughter from his second.

Avila and his second wife, Gladys Franco, filed for divorce in August. But the two have since reconciled, he said.

"Thank God I have an intelligent family," Avila says. "They support me."

"I am going to continue to fight against Castro, as I have been doing for 32 years. I will fight however I see fit. If tomorrow I find it convenient to disembark in Cuba, I will, even if I'm alone. I am a true fighter."

Chips of solid silicon are the tiny building blocks of contemporary computers. The machines contain transistors made of silicon or silicon compounds, and capacitors, wires and other components made of gold and copper.

In 1950, Bell Labs discovered acid could be used to etch solid silicon to make it porous. The result resembles a forest of tiny pillars.

year, however, when British and French scientists showed that porous silicon emitted intense, visible orange-yellow light when stimulated with laser light or electricity.

To create hybrid optoelectronic computers, chips that compute electronically must be modified so that their electric signals are converted to light. That light could then be directed elsewhere in the chip, to other memory chips or to display screens and other devices.

In a study published in the June 26, 1991, issue of the journal

Science, Sailor and his colleagues reported how they etched a porous silicon chip to send light signals. The etchings were made by projecting images of George Washington and Elvis Presley onto the tiny chips, producing colored, light-emitting pictures.

The scientists then "read" or retrieved the pictures, showing how the light-emitting chips could be harnessed to develop new optical devices for storing information and display and chemical sensors.

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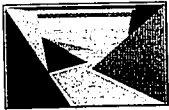

Johnson spins 'An American Story'

LOS ANGELES — Brad Johnson stars as a reluctant leader of battles against corrupt officials and ethnic prejudice in a story that has an unusually hard edge for a Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation.

"An American Story" tells how a group of World War II veterans drive the scoundrels out at the voting booths — but find themselves in the biggest fight of all for the ballot boxes. The two-hour movie will be telecast on Sunday.

"George Meade comes from a wealthy background," Johnson said of his role. "He fought next to comrades from a less fortunate background and it put things in perspective for him. He thought things would be different when he got back, but they weren't."

Meade is forced to go against his own father, a member of the town establishment who believes the mayor is unbeatable, and his wife, who fears her husband's challenge will hurt her social position.

"It unfolds slowly, but I think it works. Meade's cynical at the end. I thought it was a little dark for Hallmark."

"An American Story" also stars Kathleen Quinlan as a psychologist who lost her husband in the war. Tom Sizemore as a brain-damaged veteran who gets the reform movement rolling. Lisa

Blount as his wife, Josef Sommer as Johnson's father and G.W. Bailey as the crooked mayor.

Also in the cast are Patricia Clarkson as Johnson's wife and David Labiosa as a young Mexican-American who runs for sheriff after he is severely beaten by the corrupt sheriff played by John M. Jackson.

The story also pits Sizemore against his wife, who has made the family business flourish during his absence. Labiosa finds himself facing not only an entrenched opponent but the Hispanic prejudice of the small Texas town.

It was filmed last November on location in McKinney, Tex., near Johnson's 140-acre cattle ranch at Denton.

"It was only 30 miles from my house," he said. "I went home every night."

Johnson, a rigged actor in the mold of Clark Gable, is probably best known as the definition of handsome pilot who wows Holly Hunter in "Always." He also played the pilot who carried the war into North Vietnam in "Flight of the Intruder."

"Always" was my first big film," he said. "I have a friend

who's a casting director who told me Tom Cruise was set for the role. But (Steven) Spielberg's producer, Kathleen Kennedy, wanted to see some other actors. I talked to Spielberg and he asked me to do a screen test with Holly Hunter. Tests went by and they saw everybody. One way or another, I ended up getting the part."

Johnson is currently filming a sci-fi adventure story called "Night of the Phoenix." In February, he starts work on "Med Blessing," a six-hour Western miniseries for CBS written by William Wittliff, who wrote the screenplay for "Lonesome Dove."

"Bill had written six hours that Steven Spielberg was going to do in three parts, like the Indiana Jones movies," Johnson said. "Bill said, 'Brad Johnson's your man for Med Blessing.' Spielberg set it aside to do 'Hook' and CBS said they wanted it as a miniseries. CBS called my agent — my ex-agent — who said I don't do television. I found out it was a year later and the role was still open."

With ABC out of race, Letterman's options dwindle

The race is on to tell Fisher story

For the first time ever, all three networks are producing movies about the same subject. Need we tell anyone, it's the ongoing saga of the so-called Long Island Lolita, Amy Fisher. Here's how the productions stand at the moment:

ABC's "Beyond Control: The Amy Fisher Story," based on public record, court transcripts and press accounts, began production Monday in Vancouver. It'll star former child star Drew Barrymore, now 17, a year younger than Fisher. Anthony Denison ("Crime Story") will play Joey Buttafuoco, whom she says she had an affair with, which led her to what she says was an accidental shooting of Mrs. Buttafuoco, Mary Jo.

The film is scheduled to air during the current season.

Alyssa Milano, who played Tony Danza's stepdaughter in "Who's the Boss?" will play Fisher in the CBS movie "Casualty of Love," which also started production Monday. Jack Scalia ("Lady Boss") has been cast as Buttafuoco. The CBS movie is being produced by TriStar TV, which acquired the rights to the story from the Buttafuocos. A TriStar spokesman said the studio paid "much less" than the reported \$11 million for the rights. CBS won't say when the film is slated for.

NBC is developing its movie based on material obtained from investigative reporter Maria Eftimiades, who co-wrote a People magazine article and a book ("Lethal Lolita") on the case, and from Stephen Steeman, a 20-year-old restaurant worker, who said that Fisher tried for several months to recruit him to kill Mary Jo.

The NBC movie — "Treachery in the Suburbs" — will star Nicole Parker ("Look Who's Talking Too") as Fisher and Ed Marinaro ("Sisters") as Buttafuoco. The film will be produced in conjunction with KLM Productions, which put up \$60,000 of Fisher's \$2 million bail money. Fisher has since returned to jail, saying the media attention was too much for her. No production start date has been announced. Word is NBC is aiming for a February air date.

Fisher will be sentenced Dec. 1.

Newest syndicated sitcoms join crowded market

LOS ANGELES — When it comes to television's highest-rated sitcoms, viewers are seeing double this season.

"Roseanne," America's favorite program, launched its fifth prime-time season last month, and its first in syndicated reruns. "Murphy Brown," Vice President Dan Quayle's least favorite program, likewise debuted its fifth season last month, as well as its first in nationwide repeats.

Also out of the syndication box this fall are "Designing Women" and "The Wonder Years."

On this year's prime-time schedule, at least nine sitcoms also are doing time as local reruns — a television first.

There are myriad reasons for this

comedic overabundance, but none of them necessarily reflect a boon in the humor market. Rather, they signal an end to the days of obscene profits from the syndication of top-rated sitcoms.

Independent stations buying network comedy reruns now hope for only "respectable" ratings. The competition for other independents, cable, VCRs and four broadcast networks is so fierce that the entire syndication market is redefined on an almost daily basis.

"What any programmer has to do now is not get excited," said Mark Sonnenberg, programming director for independent KTLA Channel 5 in Los Angeles, which recently debuted reruns of "Murphy Brown" and "Designing Women."

"You can't look at (ratings) numbers every day because it just goes up and down

too much," Sonnenberg said. "There's a glut of sitcoms out there. You're just not going to see the massive payoffs in syndication."

But everything is relative. The \$5.7 billion worldwide market, remains the most lucrative end of the television business. It is here that television producers and distributors reap real profits by selling a warehouse of product whose manufacture — to a certain extent — already has been paid for.

Today's money, however, is considerably less than what was made during the boom days of the 1980s. One of the biggest holders of that era's rerun wealth?

Bill Cosby.

In 1987, when "The Cosby Show" had amassed enough episodes for syndication (roughly 100), bids for reruns of the sitcom

doubled the industry's previous highs. Today, the show has taken in more than \$1 billion in syndication rights.

Cosby, a part owner of the series, which no longer is in production, carried a pre-tax syndication share totalling \$333 million. That wealth has made him the richest entertainer on the Forbes 400 list.

The consulting firm Paul Kagan Associates of Carmel, Calif., estimates that "The Cosby Show" is the most expensive series in reruns. Last year, Kagan estimated the per-episode price paid by the program's distributor at \$4.4 million.

By contrast, the distributor cost for reruns of "Roseanne," this year's No. 1 show, was \$2.1 million per episode, said Kagan analyst Paul Bricault. He estimated the same costs for "Murphy Brown" at \$1.2 million.

Non-black minorities condemn their invisibility on TV shows

LOS ANGELES — Do not adjust your television set. This programming is in black and white.

We're not talking about an exercise in TV nostalgia. It's the nearly complete lack of Hispanic and Asian performers that has rendered the television landscape dull.

Blacks wince at being played strictly for laughs in sitcom after jivey sitcom, bitterly denouncing stereotyping and their segregation from many dramas. During his induction last month into TV's Hall of Fame, Bill Cosby implored industry leaders to stop the "horrible measure of ignorance" being put on the screen.

But other minorities don't even get the chance to be insulted.

"It's very frustrating to be invisible in your own country," said Esther Renteria, executive director of the National Hispanic Media Coalition.

Name the Hispanic actors with continuing network series roles this season and you'll come up with only a handful, including A Martinez of "L.A. Law" and showman Czech Marin of "Golden Palace."

The rest of America's melting pot?

Chinese food delivery man did live up a recent "Seinfeld" as an accident victim.

Fox's "The Simpsons," downright wallowing in cartoon multiculturalism, offers those crazy "Two Guys from Kabul" restaurateurs and Indian convenience store operators.

And, through the years, a few series with non-black minorities as the leads have popped up.

ABC's "A.K.A. Pablo," about a young Hispanic comedian and his extended family, ran for less than two months. "Trial and Error," a CBS comedy about two buddies

from the East Los Angeles barrio, was a blip on the screen in March 1988. Most successful was NBC's "Chico and the Man," which ran four seasons.

The Screen Actors Guild offers the following numbers: In 1984, in both television shows and feature films, Hispanics represented 3 percent of performers, and Asians, 2 percent.

In 1991, Hispanics performers held steady at 3 percent, with Asians slipping to 1 percent.

The latest U.S. Census figures show that 9 percent of the population is Hispanic, with Asian or Pacific islanders at about 3 percent.

But it's not just a numbers game. More is not enough; better is the goal, say minority actors and activists. Diversity is the key.

In TV land, Hispanics are gang members, drug dealers, maids. Asians are, well, Chinese food delivery men.

"You're the shadow in the background serving coffee," laments veteran actress Carmen Zapata. Her frustration with such roles, she says, drove her out of Hollywood and into founding a Los Angeles community theater.

"The studios, networks, producers are 30 years behind the time. They're not really aware of where we are in the country," Zapata

said. "We are an upwardly mobile community and we're not being represented that way."

It's not just minorities who end up being cheated.

"The importance of having visibility is this: My children need the self-esteem of seeing themselves on TV," Renteria said. "Your children need to see them to know how to interact with them, to know we're all different but we're all the same, to eliminate the fear of the unknown."

Broadening TV's perspective also makes for a richer dramatic brew.

"Northern Exposure" draws heavily on Native American mythology and perspective — such as the sly Thanksgiving-themed episode Monday that showed the fictional town of Cicely draped in holiday mourning.

The ethnic emphasis "does make good drama, good stories," said Andrew Schneider, a producer and writer for the series.

But can it make money? "Northern Exposure" is a top-rated audience pleaser, but it features white actors in the leading roles.

"How do they know it won't sell if they won't try it?" argues Renteria. She and others say the lack of minorities in key decision-making and creative positions contribute to the problem.

Blaming the TV hierarchy is tempting and, most agree, fair. But it's shortsighted to stop there, note such industry figures as Norman Lear of "All in the Family" fame, who produced the short-lived "A.K.A. Pablo."

"Television has gone the way of the rest of the American culture and the rest of American business has gone," Lear said.

"It has become more bottom-line oriented, more needful of winning the short term — which in TV terms is ratings — and it has discarded wonderful things in the pursuit of that."

A right-thinking radio host comes to small screen

NEW YORK — Maybe you wouldn't call Rush Limbaugh the most insightful, entertaining, charismatic commentator ever to grace the airwaves.

But you ought to, or so says Limbaugh and the legions heeding his conservative clarion call. Catch him in his midtown Manhattan office, and you find a pleasant, heavyset man picking over newspaper clippings while the fax machine within his easy reach grinds out dispatches.

Duly prepared, he installs himself come noon in an adjacent studio to agitate his 13 million listeners, more than any other radio personality.

Then he heads up town to tape his syndicated TV show for same-day broadcast on 187 stations.

"I'll tell you what's IN the news, and what to THINK about it," the 41-year-old, twice-divorced Limbaugh tells his audience, adding, tongue-in-cheek, that his talent "is on loan from God."

Privately he swears that his hombase is a put-on, but in highly convincing fashion does he swoop down on his targets once he gets on the air, using his self-described "pomposus arrogance" as a blunt weapon against opposing forces.

The enemy? Most simply put, it's liberals and liberals.

Limbaugh long ago termed feminists "femi-nazis." He has used the sound effect of a vacuum cleaner while discussing abortions. He tweaks Spike Lee's new film by referring to its subject, Malcolm X, as "Malcolm the 10th."

On a recent show, Limbaugh told viewers how to cash in on government aid: "You have a riot, you kill about 65 people, and you burn down your neighborhood in an election year."

Limbaugh insists his chief goal is entertainment. A man of rare bluster but no discernible rage, he calls his programs "light-headed" and his manner "disarming, with a twinkle in my eye."

By contrast, he said, "the comedy from the left is mean-spirited stuff I don't think that they (liberals) have as much fun."

Few, liberal or conservative, are having as much fun as Limbaugh.

There are his weekly radio and TV shows, lecture appearances every weekend, even a newsletter. His book, "The Way Things Ought to Be" (Pocket Books) is No. 1 on the New York Times best-seller list.

Meanwhile, Limbaugh routinely rubs elbows with conservative bigwigs. He cut a wide swath at the Republican National Convention in Houston. He has spent the night at the White House. Vice President Dan Quayle and, last week, President Bush have dropped in on his radio show.

When asked if it's fun hobnobbing with the GOP A-list, Limbaugh crows, "THEY'RE limbo-nobbing with me."

Born into a family of staunch Republicans in Cape Girardeau, Mo., Limbaugh was 16 when he got into radio, and at 20 dropped out of Southeastern Missouri State University to be a full-time disc jockey in Pittsburgh.

He has been at a microphone ever since, not counting five years in marketing for the Kansas City Royals, in whose employ he never earned more than \$18,000 annually. He now makes in, by one estimate, 100 times that.

It was in 1984 in Sacramento, Calif., that he hit on his scorched-earth-with-laughs formula, and won a devoted audience. Four years later he was in New York, the next prince of the put-on and the put-down. His show went national that August.

"I've stayed focused on the audience," said Limbaugh, attempting to explain his explosive success. "My (radio) program has no political agenda. I don't have this show because I'm a conservative, it's because I can get ratings."

Kristoff St. John knows what it's like to be in soaps that rank at the bottom and at the top of the ratings. Kristoff played his first soap role, as Adam Marshall, in the low rated and now defunct "Generations" and went from that to his present part, as Neil Winters, in the top rated "The Young and the Restless."

The handsome actor not only moved up the ratings charts but also earned an Emmy for his performance as Neil. He says he feels blessed to be working in a hit show, but he now looks back on "Generations" not as a flop but as a success for what it accomplished.

As soap fans will recall, "Generations" was touted as the first soap to have the two main families—one black and one white—equally represented in the plotlines. Some would argue that this was just another example of narrow thinking, since the race issue was stressed and established an immediate and somewhat forced perception on the part of the viewer. However, the show broke ground in portraying African-Americans in a more realistic mode, and soon the issue of color was relegated to the background, as it should be.

"We all worked hard to keep 'Generations' on but it just wasn't meant to be. However, I'm proud, to have been part of a show which portrayed blacks as just average people, not stressing the racial issues only. It was and will remain a good and valuable experience."

At the ripe age of 7, Kristoff informed his dad that he too wanted to be an actor so dad found an agent and got Kristoff started. "Neil is ambitious and he's in the right company, Jabot Cosmetics, to climb the corporate ladder. He may be a bit of a workaholic but that doesn't make him dull, by any means."

Also, Kristoff feels Neil is a good role model for kids and he and head writer-creator Bill Bell intend to have Neil remain so.

Q. Isn't it true that Ginger Rogers, who was paired with Fred Astaire in so many movie classics, is virtually a forgotten woman while he remains a genuine Hollywood legend? — H.L.

A: It's by no means true that Ginger, born Virginia Katherine McMath 81 years ago in Independence, Mo., has been forgotten. She recently published a book of memoirs that sold reasonably well. She is the subject of occasional tributes at film gatherings. And, most gratifying, she will receive this December the prestigious Kennedy Center Honors citation, to be awarded at a big White House ceremony. "I'm like a bouncing ball — with joy," says Ginger. She notes that Astaire received the same award 14 years ago. "I wondered why I was left out. It was a man's world then. Better late than never."

Q. The recent interest in the old "Rocky and Bullwinkle" shows made me wonder when the program originally aired?

A: The immensely popular Jay Ward cartoon series had two titles.

It premiered on ABC in November 1959 as "Rocky and His Friends" and ran for two years. This is the version that included such segments as "Bullwinkle's Corner," "Fractured Fairy Tales" and "Peabody's Improbable History." In 1961, it switched to NBC and began a three-year run as "The Bullwinkle Show," with such new segments as "The Adventures of Dudley Doright." In 1964, it went back to ABC for Sunday morning reruns until 1973. In 1982-83, it turned up again Saturday mornings on NBC. Reruns now air weeknights on cable's Nickelodeon.

Q. What is the background of Cleveland Derrick, Dr. Frederick Ross on the new Fox series "Whoops!?"

A: Derriks has appeared in two previous series. Some viewers may remember him for his supporting roles in Dabney Coleman's "Drexell's Class" (Fox, last season) and the short-lived Farrah Fawcett-Ryan O'Neal series "Good Sports" (CBS, 1991). A veteran Broadway performer (he won a Tony Award for "Dreamgirls" in 1984), he has also been in several films, including "Nashville," "Hair," "Moscow on the Hudson," "Off Beat" and "The Slugger's Wife." Born and raised in Knoxville, Tenn., Derriks is married and lives in Los Angeles.

Q. Which plot line came first in the "Wiseguy" series: Mel Profit or Sonny Stegelgrave? When was it first shown?

A: The story arc that in 1987 kicked off the Ken Wahl series, which now has a cult-like following in reruns, featured Ray Sharkey as mobster Sonny Stegelgrave. The Profit segments, with Kevin Spacey and Joan Seaverance as the bizarre brother-sister crime duo Susan and Mel Profit, followed the Stegelgrave episodes. Both made up the first season of "Wiseguy." And, if you're keeping track, the second season found Winnie Terranova (Wahl) investigating a white supremacist group, the garment industry (with Jerry Lewis and Ron Silver) and the record industry. The third and final season's arcs (with Wahl) dealt with the New York mob, a counterfeiting ring and a homicidal maniac.

Q. Does "Northern Exposure" have a new team of writers this year? The new season doesn't seem to have as much humor this time around.

A: The writing team for the popular CBS series is basically the same as last season's, according to a representative of the show. Occasionally, a new writer is brought in to work on one episode or to help with rewrites, but the initial team remains intact. If you do see a change, it could be attributed to the gradual evolution of the characters, concept and production team on "Northern Exposure," a process that affects all series. A good example is to compare the early episodes of "Happy Days" with later ones.

Early last week, homeowner Patrick Kelly said he would repaint the house white before departing, since neighbors had complained that the wild paint job was an eyesore and lowered their property values.

The house, which didn't sell even after its asking price was dropped from \$258,000 to \$180,000, faced a

Nov. 24 foreclosure sale.

Cooper's agent, Toby Mammis, was quoted in The Press Enterprise last week as saying the musician would consider helping Kelly avoid foreclosure.

"One stipulation would be that he can't paint over the house," Mammis said.

"I'm not sure what we're going to do," Mammis said.

"We could help him get a loan, and get some publicity for Alice. Mr. Kelly obviously has good taste in music."

Young concert destined for wider audience

CHICAGO (AP) — Neil Young put on a two-hour show before fewer than 200 invited guests, but the concert is destined for a wider audience in the first joint production of a performance series by cable and public TV.

Cable music channel VH-1 and Chicago public TV station WTTW are co-producers of the "Center Stage" series, which aims for an older audience than the "Unplugged" concert specials on VH-1's sister channel, MTV.

Young ranged through a ballad-heavy set of 20

songs — nine from his new album "Harvest Moon." VH-1 said it will broadcast portions of the concert in a half-hour special Dec. 19 and 20.

The series will have its official premiere on Valentine's Day on VH-1, also in a 30-minute format. Hour-long versions of the concerts will begin airing on the public television system next summer, VH-1 and WTTW said.

Other artists signed for "Center Stage" include k.d. lang, Lindsay Buckingham, Michael Bolton and Keith Richards.
