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State, canal firms reach proposed settlement

TWIN FALLS — The state of Idaho and two canal companies have reached a proposed settlement in a suit that sought to halt groundwater development in eastern Idaho.

The settlement, which recognizes the connection between surface and groundwater and would study the extent of that connection, is of "critical importance" to water users in the Magic Valley and

eastern Idaho, said Idaho Department of Water Resources Director R. Keith Higginson.

"What comes out of this suit could directly affect every groundwater user in the Snake River Basin upstream from Milner Dam," he said.

The proposed settlement would require the department to continue a moratorium on water development it imposed earlier this year because of the extended drought. The moratorium would continue while the state conducts studies to determine the

exact relationship between surface and groundwater in southern Idaho.

In exchange, the canal companies would drop the suit.

The settlement would allow for new permits for domestic, commercial, municipal and industrial development as well as the possibility of emergency drought irrigation wells.

The money is better spent on the study than on litigation, said Twin Falls attorney Gary Slette, who represents the Twin Falls and North Side canal companies.

The canal companies have long sought to limit development of eastern Idaho groundwater. Eastern Idaho irrigation wells, say the companies, have reduced the flow of springs in American Falls, on which their natural flow rights depend.

The companies have asked for a moratorium on groundwater development since 1988. In July they resorted to a lawsuit.

The suit asked the court for an injunction against the Water Resources Department.

Jury: Stradley didn't murder Amanda

TWIN FALLS — Donnell "Bud" Stradley will play Santa Claus at his family's Christmas party again this year.

The burly, bearded 29-year-old Twin Falls man walked out of the courthouse in a crowd of family members Thursday morning after a jury cleared him of the death of 2-year-old Amanda Hosteler.

"I got my life back," he said. "God has answered our prayers." Stradley's family crowded into the same courtroom that saw three weeks of testimony about Amanda's sudden Jan. 20 death.

After nearly 20 hours of deliberation over three days, the jury's verdict was read just after 10:30 a.m.

Gasps and cries erupted from Stradley supporters and family members when the court clerk read verdicts of innocent to first-degree murder and involuntary manslaughter.

Stradley hugged Public Defender Mike Wood before being mobbed by his sobbing family.

Wood said he has never had a client with so much support from friends and family.

Now he wants to make sure Stradley gets the psychological help he needs after

undergoing the tremendous strain of the trial.

Although he was sure of Stradley's innocence, Wood said he was not certain the jury would be convinced.

"There was tremendous sympathy for the death of this little girl," Wood said. "He was very much at risk."

Standing on the other side of the emotional courtroom scene, Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter was philosophical about losing the final trial in her 8½-year career.

"This is the kind of case that has to be tried by a jury," she said. "Their decision is correct."

Her job was to present the facts and let the jury make its decision on a difficult case, Baxter said.

"You have to believe the system works," she said.

As he left the courtroom, Stradley said he plans to buy a tombstone for Amanda, who is buried at the Twin Falls Cemetery.

He will try to put his life back together after an 11-month ordeal that he said still has not ended.

"I will never put it behind me," Stradley said. "The public will go on believing what they have to believe, but God was on my side."

Congressional, Wall Street vets on economic team

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — President-elect Clinton began building his new administration Thursday.

He started by selecting Texas Sen. Lloyd Bentsen for treasury secretary and a cadre of other experienced hands from Wall Street and Congress for remaining top economic jobs.

Announcing his first Cabinet selections 37 days after his election, Clinton said to "stay tuned" for more major appointments with his health and environmental picks among those that could come yet this week.

Propelled into office on a pledge to restore the nation's economic vitality, Clinton promised to "work my heart out" with his new economic team. He

announced five appointments in all, selecting faces familiar to the Washington scene and reassuring to the business community.

Besides Bentsen, who chairs the Senate Finance Committee, they are:

• Rep. Leon Panetta, chairman of the House Budget Committee, who will be director of Office of Management and Budget.

• Robert Rubin, co-chairman of Goldman, Sachs & Co., to be assistant to the president for economic policy and coordinate a new National Economic Council.

• Roger Altman, a Wall Street investment banker, who will serve as Bentsen's top deputy.

• Economist Alice Rivlin, former

director of the Congressional Budget Office, who will be Panetta's deputy.

Taken together, the five nominees offer what Clinton hopes will be the right mix of economic philosophy and practical skill to fill in the details of his economic proposals and get them enacted. Rivlin and Panetta, in particular, are known as strong advocates for cutting the federal deficit.

"These people are seasoned, skilled, incredibly hard and ready to work for the American people," Clinton said of his first appointees, who appeared with him at a news conference in Arkansas' Old Statehouse.

He was questioned on other topics as well and said at one point that he would ask his attorney general to review whether a

U.S. brings Somali warlords to peace meet

MOGADISHU, Somalia — Somalia's two strongest warlords agreed Thursday to hold their first peace meeting here today.

As they did, the U.S.-led intervention in this devastated country expanded from securing its ports and roads for humanitarian relief convoys to brokering its politics.

Sporadic gunfire heightened tensions at American and French military positions in Mogadishu Thursday and underscored the pressure on U.S. officials to restore a semblance of governmental authority to a country overrun by armed gangs.

The first casualties of the U.N.-mandated intervention came when soldiers near a French Foreign Legion position opened fire Thursday night on a Somali truck that tried to drive through a roadblock. Two Somalis were killed and seven injured.

The famine-racked town of Baidoa was reported relatively quiet Thursday after two days of heavy inter-clan fighting that left 48 people dead and at least two reported

Richfield Marine calls home from Somalia — via NBC

TWIN FALLS — Vivian Truscott hasn't heard from her son, Jason, for three weeks, but she may get to see him soon.

Marine Lance Cpl. Jason Armstrong landed in Mogadishu, Somalia, Tuesday night with 1,800 other Marines to the glare of hundreds of TV lights and cameras. Wednesday morning, he showed up on the "Today" show being interviewed by an NBC correspondent.

"A friend called me Wednesday night

and said Jason had been on television," Truscott said Thursday. "I couldn't believe it."

There's a "99 percent chance" Truscott will get a tape of the interview, said the manager of the local NBC affiliate.

"If she writes me a letter and makes the request, I'll forward it on to NBC in New York," said Bob Krueger, station manager of Boise station KTVB-TV. KTVB broadcasts in the Twin Falls area as K3BAS.

The 21-year-old Armstrong, who joined the Marines two years ago this

month on the eve of the Persian Gulf War, was headed for Saudi Arabia as part of American peacekeeping contingent in the area when his ship, the USS Rushmore, was diverted to Somalia.

Armstrong, who grew up in Richfield, maintains guns and ordnance in a weapons company. Truscott said she didn't know where he'd be stationed in Somalia, but expects him to be there up to six months.

"I don't know the communications situation is there," she said. "But I hope I hear from him for Christmas."

Also arriving Thursday was Marine Lt. Gen. Robert Johnston, commander of the Joint Task Force Restore Hope. At the same time, the focus of American

who have battled for control of the capital for the last two years.

The veteran diplomat will meet with Mohamed Farah-Aideed, who heads the strongest of Somalia's factional militias, and his rival, Ali Mahdi Mohamed, both members of the Hawiyah clan, which splintered into interethnic fighting after the overthrow of longtime ruler Mohamed Siad Barre in 1991.

Today's meeting will be followed up on Saturday by a second session aboard a French ship carrying relief supplies "donated" by French schoolchildren.

The meeting was facilitated by the American military intervention, and U.S. pressure on both men to settle their dispute, Oakley said the United States intervention "produces a political sea change," and he added, "They see this as an opportunity."

Oakley said in the interview the Marines were still working to establish a secure position in Mogadishu and had no plans yet to move to the troubled outlying areas. "The minute the U.S. military hit the ground, everybody wants them to do something for his or her organization," he said.

The chaos in the outlying areas has caused relief groups to begin intense lobbying of the U.S. military forces to speed up their deployment and send forces to the countryside.

One cubic foot per second equals 448 gallons per minute.

Stette said he is pleased with the proposed settlement and its potential benefit to all Idaho water users by determining the extent of effects of groundwater pumping on surface water uses and how to manage the two conjunctively.

Idaho's earliest water laws dealt only with surface water, Higginson said. Not until the 1950s did irrigators begin using groundwater.

In recent years it has become apparent that surface and groundwater are a single inter-related resource, he said. But the effects of groundwater development are often remote and delayed. In some areas, the effects of

groundwater pumping cannot be seen from year to year.

The study called for in the proposed settlement would identify areas where groundwater pumping affects surface water and quantify that effect, Higginson said. It doesn't make sense to deny access to a large public resource in area where it doesn't affect other water rights.

But in areas where groundwater pumping can be shown to affect senior surface water rights, those pumps may be shut off or made to return some water to the river, Stette said.

Northwest, East struck hard by heavy snow, wind

Storms spread rain and heavy snow over the Northwest and much of the East on Thursday with warnings posted throughout today for some Eastern states.

A strong low pressure system moved into the Pacific Northwest. High wind hit the southern Oregon coast during the night, toppling trees and power lines. The weather service reported 110 mph gusts at Humboldt Mountain near Fort Olney.

Snowfall totals in Washington state included 10 inches at Harrah, 9 inches at Tieton and Cowlitz, and 7 inches at Yakima, the weather service said.

In California, rain fell at lower elevations and a winter storm warning remained in effect through Friday for the Sierra Nevada north of Yosemite National Park. A storm watch was in effect through Friday for the eastern slopes of the central Sierra.

Heaviest rainfall for the six hours up to 1 p.m. EST was 1.09 inches at Crescent City, Calif.

Snow fell along an arc from Illinois across the Great Lakes and Appalachians, and the storm pushed into the Northeast. Rain fell at some lower elevations from West Virginia and Virginia south into the Carolinas and northeastern Georgia.

By late afternoon, Grant County in northern West Virginia had up to 15 inches of snow. At midafternoon Cumberland, Md., had 5 inches; Allentown, Pa., had 7 inches; and southwestern Lower Michigan had up to 9 inches.

Hosteler in Jan. 20 may never be known. Stradley called police that afternoon to the home where he lived with Amanda and her mother, Jodie Hosteler.

They found Stradley alone with the child, who was not breathing. Emergency crews were unable to revive her.

Prosecutors said he tossed Amanda 10 feet through his living room onto a wooden waterbed frame, causing severe abdominal injuries.

But defense attorneys countered with testimony that Stradley always been a man who loves children and would never hurt one intentionally.

Stradley said he only tossed Amanda onto the mattress while standing next to the bed. An earlier statement to police that he threw her onto the waterbed frame was coerced, he said.

The prosecution simply didn't have the evidence to get a guilty verdict, according to alternate juror Christi Coggins of Twin Falls.

The six men and six women who unanimously decided the case declined to comment Thursday. Coggins, who was present during the entire trial and listened to the judge's instructions to the jurors but was not involved in the deliberations, said she would have voted for a "not guilty" verdict.

She talked with the other jurors after the verdict Thursday morning, and said later they did not believe the testimony of Amanda's mother.

Her story was riddled with inconsistencies and Coggins said she felt Hosteler, currently appealing a three-to-nine year sentence for felony child abuse, got off too easy.

Hosteler said Wednesday that she hoped Stradley would be convicted and made to pay for Amanda's death. She could not be reached for comment Thursday.

Several defense witnesses described Stradley as a lovable bear of a man who adores children. One of them, a 12-year-old girl, described him as the man "who looks like Santa Claus."

And every Christmas Eve, he dons the red-and-white suit while children sit on his lap and tell them their wishes.

"This year will be no different. You can't deny the children," he said.

Packwood apologizes for actions toward women

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Bob Packwood apologized Thursday for "unwelcome and offensive" actions toward women but defiantly refused to resign or discuss specific incidents of sexual harassment.

Packwood called himself a typical child of the 1930s and 1940s — "boys took shop girls took cooking" — whose view of women had grown more enlightened professionally while his personal behavior had been worse than "stupid or boorish."

"I just didn't get it. I do now," the Oregon Republican told a crowded news conference, his first public appearance since 16 former women employees or acquaintances accused him of improper sexual conduct.

The divorced Packwood, 60, portrayed his 24 years in the Senate as a contrast between his strong voting record for women's rights and "a blind spot" in his personal conduct. In fact, he said he didn't remember many of the incidents cited by former employees when confronted with them.

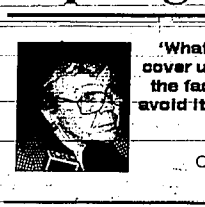
Not once did he use the word "harassment." He refused to discuss specific incidents or the conduct that caused his apology. And he wouldn't comment on allegations by some of the women that he threatened to discredit them personally with derogatory information.

Instead, he said he had been moving women into positions of authority ever since he was a County Republican official in 1960.

"From that time forward all my political activities have been ... gender neutral," Packwood said, noting that women have been his chiefs of staff for the past 15 years.

But of his personal behavior, he said, "My actions were just plain wrong."

Former employees, lobbyists, campaign workers and others said that from the 1960s to the 1980s, Packwood made unwelcome



advances that ranged from abrupt kisses to sudden physical grabbing. The Senate Ethics Committee is conducting a preliminary inquiry into the conduct.

Testy at times, Packwood said forcefully that "I am not going to resign under any circumstances."

Packwood's news conference, televised live in Portland, did not assuage his critics.

Betty Roberts, a former Oregon Supreme Court justice who lost to Packwood in 1974, said in Portland that "what we saw today was a cover-up."

"He wouldn't discuss the facts. It's his attempt to avoid it. He still doesn't get it," she said.

Packwood supporters, who watched the news conference in Portland, had a different view. "This was not sexual harassment. This was not term on this conduct injures working women," said Jeanette Stepien, a former Packwood staffer. "A demand for an apology is understandable. But the demand for a Senate seat is political."

Narrowly re-elected to a fifth term last month, the moderate Republican said "I could not recall many of the incidents" when the Washington Post confronted him with the specific allegations five days before the election.

"It was just a blank," the senator said, saying he didn't even remember some of the women mentioned by the newspaper. The

Post published the first story on the allegations Nov. 22. Packwood's statements about lack of memory — and his refusal to discuss accusations that he tried to discredit some of his accusers — angered at least one of the women, former staffer Julie Williamson. Williamson, who said the senator kissed her and tried to pull her clothes off, said after the news conference that he was still "trying to deceive the people of Oregon and the people of this country."

"I know he was asked about the incident with me over the years," she said by telephone from New York. "I know that he remembers the incident because he immediately went out of the Washington Post interview and told people to send letters about me to The Post."

Packwood pledged "full cooperation" with the ethics committee if asked about those and similar allegations.

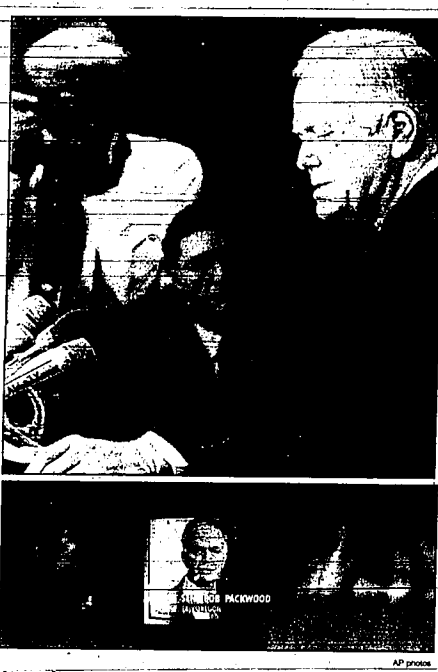

WASHINGTON (AP) — A top administration trade official said Thursday that a number of barriers still remain to completing global free trade talks by the time George Bush leaves office.

The official, seeking to reassure American industry and members of Congress, said that the administration will not make concessions simply to get a pact before Jan. 20.

"We are not going to settle for a bad deal," said the senior trade official, who spoke to reporters on condition that his name not be used.

Don Hales, spokesman at NASA's Dryden Flight Research Facility, said technicians stopped the leak of nitrogen tetroxide Wednesday night. Officials said the leak probably was caused by failure of a valve to properly close after a fuel dump.

Carter suggests U.S. troops supervise Haiti election

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Jimmy Carter suggested Thursday that U.S. troops join in supervising a new election in Haiti.

Carter, speaking at a human rights awards ceremony at the Senate, said he also supported the sending of U.S. troops to Haiti.

"I have no objection either if we get a seat in a U.N. force in Bosnia-Herzegovina and also in Haiti through the Organization of American States and the United Nations," he added.

with the present rulers of Haiti with the goal of restoring to power President Jean-Bertrand Aristide, who was forced out in a military coup more than a year ago.

"If the United States takes the leading role and if countries like France, Canada and Venezuela would initiate a U.N. action the U.N. could join the OAS in this effort," he suggested.

But he added that the effort should go beyond mediation. "If it took 1,000 or 1,500 troops that were

anointed by the United Nations just to provide stability on the streets while we could orchestrate another honest election, I think that would be an effort well spent," he said.

"I think it would probably be better if very few U.S. troops were used in Haiti," he said.

"There is such a separate issue of interventionism... that I think the troops would much better come from other countries in this hemisphere, including obviously Canada, all the way down to Argentina..."

Smokeless tobacco deadly

WASHINGTON (AP) — An increase in young people using smokeless tobacco could foreshadow an epidemic of oral cancer in coming decades, U.S. Surgeon General Antonia C. Novello said Thursday.

"Spit" tobacco — snuff and chewing tobacco — is "as dangerous and deadly as other tobacco products," she said. "I am deeply concerned by the attempts of the spit tobacco industry to downplay the health hazards."

She also noted the "terrific connection between baseball and the use of spit tobacco" and urged major league baseball to curtail its use among players.

A report "Spit Tobacco and Youth," issued by Novello, showed that in 1991 nearly 20 percent of high school boys had used smokeless tobacco in the preceding 30 days.

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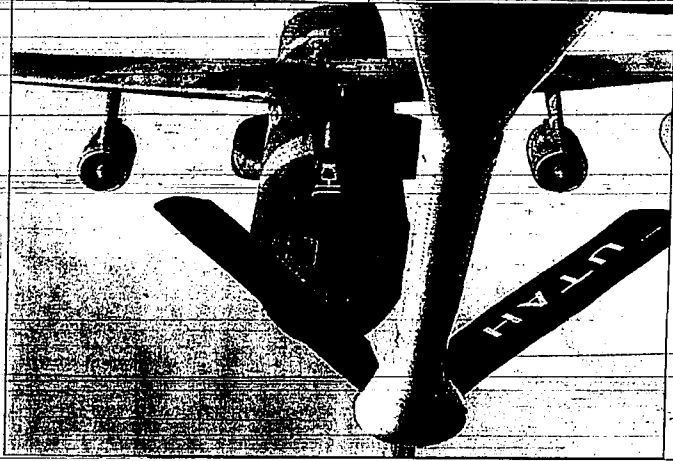

Troops, supplies arrive in Somalia from U.S. at full speed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The first Army infantrymen get orders Thursday to head for Somalia, and the Air Force said its America-to-Africa "air bridge" for troops and supplies had begun operating at full speed.

"We do now have a continual flow of flights," said Lt. Col. Randy Morger, spokesman at Scott Air Force Base, Ill.

Using hulking C-5 Galaxy and C-141 Starliner transport planes, as well as smaller C-130 Hercules aircraft, the Air Force is ferrying Marines from the 1st Marine Expeditionary Force in California and Army soldiers from the 10th Mountain Division in upstate New York, as well as tons of supplies and equipment.

At Ft. Drum, near Waterbury, N.Y., a company of about 120 infantrymen from the 10th Mountain Division's 2nd Battalion plus a few dozen advance people received orders to begin deploying eventually about 10,000 soldiers are to join the mission.

The deployment of the infantrymen signaled the start of a new phase in the U.N.-authorized multinational effort to feed starving Somalis and neutralize thousands of armed gang members who have blocked relief supplies.

The Army soldiers are expected to land at Mogadishu, the Somali capital where Marines have seized the seaside airport and Air Force specialists have made hurried improvements, such as installing lights, so it can receive regular transport flights.

The Pentagon's announced four-phase plan for Operation Restore Hope calls for the Army soldiers to join Marines at Baidoa, about 200 miles northwest of Mogadishu, then split off and establish their own security zones at three other points.

As of Thursday the Marines had not yet taken control of Baidoa, which is in the center of the famine zone of southern Somalia. Officials had said Wednesday that the Marines might seize and fix up another abandoned airfield that is midway between Mogadishu and Baidoa before heading into Baidoa.

The Army infantrymen are a lightly armed combat force, not equipped with tanks, towed artillery or Bradley fighting vehicles. They carry 60mm mortars, Dragon antitank missiles, M-16 rifles, M-203 grenade launchers and M-60 machine guns.

Hart said no decision had been made on whether to seek authority from President Bush to order reserve units to active duty.

Amid glory, lies reason for U.S. landing

AFGOI, Somalia (AP) — A few miles outside Mogadishu, the confident crunch of Marine boots gives way before the wavering cries of sickly, starving children from the sick huts at the Lafoole refugee camp.

Hassam Riyole and Hindia Asman, two 10-year-olds who spend their days in their damp huts at Lafoole, are the reason American troops came to Somalia. But Operation Restore Hope, whose goal is to prevent widespread looting and get supplies to those who need it, probably came too late for Hassam and Hindia.

Accustomed to millet and meat, Hassam rejects the porridge-like Unimix served to camp residents. He is alive mainly thanks to antibiotics — a stumbling, marionette-like figure who leaves his hut only when pulled outside by aid workers.

Hassam could be healthy if only he would eat, his father says. But after losing all his siblings to famine, he says, Hassam may simply have given up.

Hindia's mother, father and seven siblings also fled Warmhun. One of the children died at the camp; the remaining six are squeezed together with their parents in a smoky hut. All are basically healthy, except

"We're dealing with an extremely dangerous situation," said Marine Corps Lt. Gen. Martin L. Brundtner. "There's an enormous potential for any type of event to occur."

Logistically, the military faces many of the problems of Desert Storm, compounded by Somalia's lamentable infrastructure. Nearly all the food and water required by up to 30,000 American troops will have to be flown in.

Pentagon officials say that heavy military traffic may tear up the roads, which will have to be resurfaced, that dust will get in the helicopters, that Mogadishu's small airport will become terribly congested and that communications lines must be built from scratch.

The Persian Gulf War, however, was a good primer on how to protect men and machines from the desert.

"There was a lot of doom and gloom at the start of Desert Storm," said retired Army Col. Harry G. Summers Jr., a military analyst. "It turned out to be generally unfounded."

More important may be avoiding incidents, such as the Marines' arrest of Somalis who later turned out to be airport employees, that could quickly cool the warm reception the Americans have had.

Man recognizes niece in Somalia photo

The photograph appeared Monday on the front page of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer. The caption identified her as 5-year-old Easha Shegwo.

Alli Seego, who owns a delicatessen in Seattle, said Shegwo is the Somali spelling of his family's name, which his brother uses.

The caption described Easha as an orphan. Seego said his niece, the

daughter of his brother, Omar, has two brothers and a sister.

"I don't know (if) they are dead," Seego said.

The American Red Cross in Seattle has contacted the International Red Cross on the girl's behalf, said spokeswoman Hope Tuttle.

U.S. Rep. Jim McDermott's office is contacting the Immigration and Naturalization Service about the case.

The photograph was taken by the Edmonton Sun and transmitted by The Associated Press. Editors at the Sun said it was taken Sunday at Keynancy Hospital, north of Mogadishu, Somalia's capital.

The name of the hospital was given to the Red Cross in Seattle to be forwarded to Red Cross workers in Somalia.

Seego has been in the United States for 10 years and graduated from the University of Maryland before coming to Seattle last summer. He has acted as a spokesman for the Somalian community here.

He said he would like to help his family come to the United States, and hopes to visit Somalia at the end of the month.

He had 12 brothers and sisters and his mother in Somalia before the civil war and famine. He doesn't know how many are still alive.

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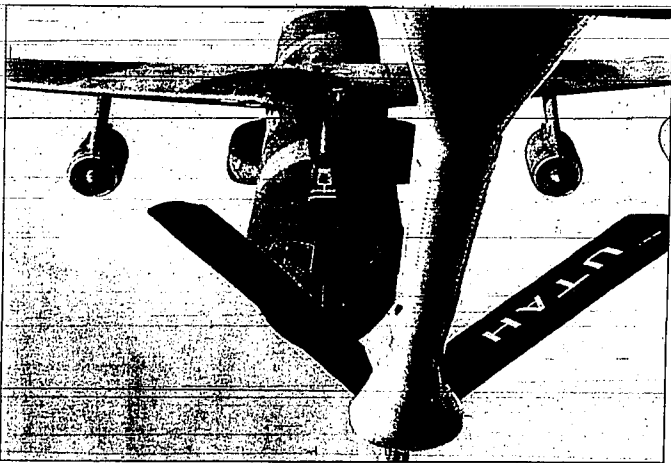

Man recognizes niece in Somalia photo

SEATTLE (AP) — A Somali immigrant recognized a little girl photographed sleeping on the ground outside a Somali hospital as his niece, and is getting help finding her from the Red Cross, his congressman and a newspaper.

The photograph appeared Monday on the front page of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer. The caption identified her as 5-year-old Easha Shegaw.

Alli Secco, who owns a delicatessen in Seattle, said Shegaw is the Somali spelling of his family's name, which his brother uses.

The caption described Easha as an orphan. Secco said his niece, the

daughter of his brother, Omar, has two mothers and a sister.

"I don't know (if) they are dead," Secco said.

The American Red Cross in Seattle has contacted the International Red Cross on the girl's behalf, said spokeswoman Hope Tuttle.

U.S. Rep. Jim McDermott's office is contacting the Immigration and Naturalization Service about the case.

The photograph was taken by the Edmonton Sun and transmitted by The Associated Press. Editors at the Sun said it was taken Sunday at Keyesany Hospital, north of Mogadishu, Somalia's capital.

The name of the hospital was given to the Red Cross in Seattle to be forwarded to Red Cross workers in Somalia.

Secco has been in the United States for 10 years and graduated from the University of Maryland before coming to Seattle last summer. He has acted as a spokesman for the Somali community here.

He said he would like to help his family come to the United States, and hopes to visit Somalia at the end of the month. He had 12 brothers and sisters and his mother in Somalia before the civil war and famine. He doesn't know how many are still alive.

Prosecutor botched case before it even started

The 12 honest folk on Donnell "Bud" Stradley's jury apparently had little trouble seeing the truth that eluded Twin Falls County's prosecuting attorney.

The jurors on Thursday delivered the only possible verdict that made sense. They found Stradley innocent of any crime in effect declaring him blameless in the death of 2-year-old Amanda Hostetler.

Let no one be angry at this verdict. Rather, be angry that Stradley stood trial at all.

Had Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter somehow won her case, she would have succeeded in making Stradley the befuddled fall guy for the truly guilty party: Amanda's mother, Jodie Hostetler.

Two days before the jury verdict, Baxter made a futile attempt to distract public attention from the ineptitude with which she had handled the case. She told reporters: "My job is done. The prosecution's duty, she said, is to present the facts to the jury.

What a pitiful dereliction that statement represents. Presenting the facts is not the half of a prosecutor's job. First the prosecutor must determine the facts and decide whom to prosecute and for what crimes.

Baxter botched this part of her job long before she entered the courtroom.

The trial made that fact clear to any observer. While the defense showed that Jodie Hostetler habitually abused her daughter, Baxter produced no substantial evidence that the intellectually underdeveloped Stradley was any more malevolent than Santa Claus.

Personal vengeance?

Why did Baxter pursue this hopeless crusade against the wrong defendant? We cannot know her motivation, but we'll guess—a yearning for personal vindication.

Over the years Public Defender Mike Wood repeatedly embarrassed Baxter in court. Overmatched and demoralized, she shrank from aggressive prosecution and did little to conceal her growing personal hostility toward Wood.

Baxter seems to have seen the much-publicized Amanda case as an opportunity for a theatrical exit from office: She would vanquish Wood in an apocalyptic battle.

But Baxter's desire for victory apparently clouded her judgment. Her focus on Stradley led to her key error—the premature decision to cut a plea bargain with Jodie Hostetler.

The community may never know the full truth of Amanda's death. But testimony at the trial told much about Amanda's life. The child was her mother's punching bag.

Witnesses testified that Jodie Hostetler slapped her daughter, knocked her down and lifted her by the hair. If Hostetler did not directly kill

Amanda, neither did she give her baby a life worth living.

But those horrors were inconsequential to Baxter. She granted Hostetler immunity in return for a guilty plea to a relatively minor charge.

Then, when the state's investigator argued in court for sending Hostetler to prison, Baxter (amazingly) became an advocate for the criminal. Baxter asked for leniency—probation.

"If anything approaching justice is finally done in this case, the community will have Judge William Hart to thank. Hart courageously rejected Baxter's recommendation and ordered Hostetler to prison.

We hope that Hart's decision—currently under appeal—will stand.

Fortunately for the community, Baxter's term in office is nearly over. Her tenure has been marked with colossal mishandling of grand jury indictments, a cavalier indifference to community concerns and ineffectual management of the prosecutor's office.

Roses and brickbats

While Baxter is primarily at fault for this case's dismal conclusion, she is not the sole owner of the blame? Some others worth mentioning:

• The Twin Falls police detectives who appear to have fumbled their interrogation of Stradley.

• The Idaho State Police trooper who testified that he had encountered Stradley on a routine traffic stop, when in fact he had stopped another man with a similar name. He made the prosecution look silly or dishonest.

• The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare. Confidentiality rules prevent the public from ever finding out why the child-protection system failed to protect Amanda, despite repeated warnings that she was in danger. We only know that the system did indeed fail.

Every person who observed Amanda Hostetler's misery but chose not to get involved. Let this be a lesson for all of us.

Some praise needs to be handed out as well:

• To Judge Hart, for blocking Baxter's attempt to set Jodie Hostetler free.

• To Bud Stradley's jurors. In a gruesome and tediously complex case, they performed exactly as juries are supposed to.

• To Public Defender Wood and his staff. They worked competently and conscientiously to win the freedom of a man who—without their help—would have been crushed in the wheels of injustice.

The Amanda case is drawing to an unsatisfactory conclusion, and the community can do nothing to change that fact. The best any of us can do is to promise ourselves that we will do better next time.

Has abortion 'principle' been settled?

The election of pro-choice Bill Clinton, the recent Supreme Court decisions upholding the supposed constitutional right of a woman in consultation with her abortionist to take the life of her unborn child, and the possibility that the new Congress will enact a version of the so-called "Freedom of Choice Act" has led some to conclude that the abortion debate is over and the pro-lifers have lost.

"The principle has been settled," writes Charles Krauthammer in his column. No, it hasn't. Nor has there been an honest debate because pro-choice forces in the press and entertainment industries, academia and the medical profession have been unwilling to present any information to women other than that which upholds their extreme, abortion-on-demand position.

as a member of the House of Commons, the moral power of his argument would not have been heard and the abolition movement in England and later in America might never have begun.

Had Susan B. Anthony caved in to the "political realities" of male power, women might never have won the right to vote.

Last week President Bush decided that crusaders should have more information about the food they buy, so he endorsed a policy to print more information on food labels, including fat content.

Had Martin Luther King Jr. concluded in the Birmingham jail that segregation was too powerful a force to be overcome, the civil rights movement might have been delayed or denied. One searches in vain for statutes to greatness which stand on foundations of resignation to political realities.

Too bad pregnant women are not accorded such a full-disclosure service, a kind of truth-in-utero law. Equipped with information about the contents of their wombs and about alternatives to abortion, they could make choices at least as fully informed as the voters they make at the supermarket.

Those who revere stood for principled truth, often against great odds. Those we revere, if we remember them at all, compromised or gave up when the going got tough.

The suggestion that pro-lifers might as well give up because the political process has decided the issue in favor of abortion rights has little precedent in history.

In his column, Krauthammer writes, "In a democracy, the law comes to reflect the people's mores." Perhaps that is what this Republic—we are not strictly a democracy—has become, but the Founders and those who most influenced them understood it to be the other way around. If the law serves the people, rather than the people serving the law, then law is meaningless and becomes a mere convenience (or

inconvenience which can be changed at will). For law to have meaning, it must be fixed in a set of absolutes. The highest good a Republic can do for its people is to conform them to a standard which may not always be to their liking, but which eventually will be to their benefit. If such a standard is maintained, they will find it is ultimately to their liking, because they see it will benefit them.

Krauthammer and others say that the Republican Party must be clear that it will "not allow itself to become a vehicle of the anti-abortion agenda."

At its founding, the Republican Party was pressured by "moderates" to jettison the issue of slavery. Like the abortion issue, it was said that being an abolitionist would cost the party votes. Principled Republicans prevailed, and it was the principle for which they refused to compromise that brought the party of Abraham Lincoln into power and immortality.

If the Republican Party abandons its principled defense of the unborn and of women who are not being told all of the truth, it will have denied its reason for being.

The debate is not over. If it takes a decade, or a century, or more, pro-lifers have only begun to fight for the weakest of the human family. Like the British in their darkest hour, pro-lifers say with Winston Churchill that we will never give up. Never, never, never.

I have just read, for the umpteenth time, articles in *The Times-News* concerning landfills and trash.

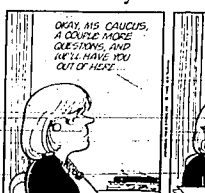
Local Idaho is being an opportunity to be pioneers in an industry that will have to come to pass sooner or later. That industry is recycling. Everything is re-usable. Trash is nothing but raw resource

and should be used instead of buried.

Here would be my plan: Each town or city would have a transfer station where local trash trucks would deliver sorted waste. The sorting is already a part of life in a lot of cities.

Larger trucks (how about out-of-work logging trucks?) would haul large containers of sorted materials

to a plant (maybe between Boise and Mountain Home, around Owyhee).

The plant would take plastic and produce whatever can be sold as a raw material for remanufacture. Metals and aluminum would become ingots to be shipped out.

Paper could become rolls of paper or cardboard to be used again. Garbage can become fertilizer and provide methane gas to power the plant, etc.

With the plant sitting on the

rails, you can take the trash from other states and ship your raw materials out on them. You can charge, for each truck or boxcar that arrives just like the landfills do.

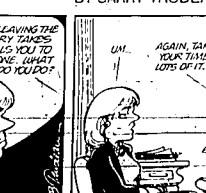

Indian rights activist Menchu accepts Peace Prize

OSLO, Norway (AP) — Indian rights activist Rigoberta Menchu accepted the Nobel Peace Prize on Thursday, calling it a tribute to exploited people in her native Guatemala and around the world.

"Today we must fight for a better world, without poverty, without racism, with peace," said Menchu, clad in colorful, striped clothes traditionally worn by Guatemalan Indians.

The 33-year-old laureate won the \$973,000 prize for her efforts to bring peace and reconciliation to Guatemala. Some 120,000 people, including Menchu's parents and brother, have died in the Central American country's three decades of civil war.

The award coincided with the 500th anniversary of Columbus' arrival in America. For Menchu and others, 1492 marks the beginning of centuries of violent repression.

"I consider this prize not as an award to me personally, but rather as one of the greatest conquests in the struggle for peace for human rights and for the rights of the indigenous people who,

along all the 500 years, have been ... the victims of genocide, repression and discrimination," she said.

"Let there be freedom for Indians ... because while they are alive, a glow of hope will be alive as well," she said.

The choice of Menchu as the 1992 peace prize recipient was controversial because she has been accused of having ties to armed rebel groups in Guatemala. She claims that anyone who campaigns for human rights in her country is called a rebel.

Menchu said she dreams of equality between the peoples of the world.

"This Nobel Prize is a recognition to those who have been and still are in most parts of the world, the most

exploited of the exploited ones, the most discriminated of the discriminated ones," she told the audience in the crowded Oslo City Hall.

Menchu asked Burma's general to release the 1991 Nobel Peace Prize winner, Aung San Suu Kyi, who has been under house arrest for more than three years for leading a democracy movement.

The chairman of the Norwegian Nobel Committee, Francis Sejersted, presented the Nobel peace medal and diploma.

"By maintaining a 'dismaying humanity in a brutal world,' Rigoberta Menchu ... appears to be the best in us," Sejersted said. "She stands as a

uniquely potent symbol of a just struggle."

Menchu says she will use the prize money to set up a human rights monitoring foundation in memory of her father, a peasant leader burned alive during a protest.

The peace-prize and other Nobel awards are always presented in Oslo and Stockholm, Sweden, on Dec. 10, the anniversary of the death of Alfred Nobel, the Swedish inventor of dynamite who used his fortune to endow the prizes.

At Stockholm City Hall, the Nobel literature prize was presented to Derek Walcott of St. Lucia, Edmond Fischer and Edwin Krebs of the University of Washington in Seattle received the medicine prize, and Georges Charpak, a Polish-born French citizen, got the physics prize.

Rudolph Marcus, an American citizen born in Canada, received the chemistry prize. The Nobel in economics, endowed by the Bank of Sweden in 1968, went to Gary S. Becker of the University of Chicago.

Yeltsin spurns hard-liners, calls for referendum

MOSCOW (AP) — President Boris Yeltsin declared Thursday he could no longer work with Russia's hard-line lawmakers and proposed a nationwide referendum to decide whether he or Congress should run the nation.

Frustrated by the rejection of his reformist prime minister a day earlier by the Congress of People's Deputies, Yeltsin accused legislators of trying to lead "a creeping coup" and send the country "on the road to nowhere."

In a campaign to bypass the Congress and appeal directly to the people, Yeltsin proposed a Jan. 24 referendum on whether there should be new presidential or parliamentary elections in the spring.

The Congress shot back by rejecting Yeltsin's action as confrontational, saying any referendum should be held for both the president and the Congress, Russia's highest parliamentary body.

Returning to the populist tactics that carried him to the peak of power, the 61-year-old president left the Kremlin and Krasnaya Square in the afternoon and plunged into a crowd of workers on the grease-covered assembly lines of an auto plant in southeast Moscow.

"I ask you to go out and collect signatures for a referendum on the Congress," Yeltsin told cheering workers at the Leninist Young Communist League Auto Plant.

Yeltsin pumped his fist in the air, a gesture he used to stir popular support during the defeat of the Communist-led coup in August 1991.

During a blunt, bitter speech when the Congress convened earlier in the day, Yeltsin accused lawmakers of blocking his economic reforms and of

trying to revive "the totalitarian Soviet-Communist system."

"What they failed to do in August 1991 they decided to repeat now and carry out a creeping coup," Yeltsin said.

Lawmakers responded with jeers. He blasted the Communist-dominated Congress for rejecting his nomination of Yegor Gaidar as prime minister on Wednesday. He said Gaidar, the architect of Russia's free-market reforms, would stay on as acting prime minister.

Smarting from the hard-liners' rejections of his compromises before and during the nine-day Congress, Yeltsin attacked the deputies as crude and referred to a melee that disrupted the session last week.

"The walls of this hall have turned red because of endless insults and gutter-style cursing at specific people because of anger, rudeness and loose behavior, because of the dirt that is inundating the Congress, because of morbid ambitions of failed politicians, their brags and disgrace in full view of the world," he said.

Immediately after his speech Yeltsin met with 200 reformist deputies and asked them to begin collecting the 1 million signatures needed to hold the referendum without Congress' approval.

Yeltsin's proposed question would read: "Whom do you entrust to take the country out of the economic and political crisis and revive the Russian Federation—the president of the Russian Federation or the present composition of the Congress of People's Deputies and the Supreme Soviet of the Russian Federation?"

If voters choose the president, as Yeltsin hopes, then new parliamentary elections would be held on March 27, according to his proposal. If voters say they trust the Congress, a presidential election would be held then.

Government bans group

BONN, Germany (AP) — German officials on Thursday banned a leading neo-Nazi group, arrested two men for arming a rightist commando unit and sought to silence a newspaper affiliated with Germany's leading right-wing party.

The "action" was part of an intensified effort to crack down on rightist militants who have killed 17 people in 2,000 attacks on foreigners and Jews this year.

Bonn has come under fire from critics who accuse it of not doing enough to stamp out hate crimes.

Chancellor Helmut Kohl,

speaking before parliament, pledged "our special solidarity to all citizens of the Jewish faith," and Interior Minister Rudolf Seiters declared that no one in Germany would live in fear.

On Wednesday, the government took the extraordinary step of asking the court to strip two prominent extremists of their basic civil rights, including free speech.

Then on Thursday the government banned the German Alternative, one of the main right-wing extremist organizations in the country.

NATO members to develop plane

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — Four European nations that have boggled for months over a costly jetfighter project that was launched seven years ago agreed Thursday to develop a leaner, cheaper plane.

Germany had threatened to pull out of the project, citing its \$34 billion price tag. But Britain, Spain and Italy convinced the Germans to stay in by proposing the streamlined model, expected to cost 30 percent less, officials said.

"We have reached total agreement," said British Defense Secretary Malcolm Rifkind, calling

the deal a "milestone for European cooperation in the defense field."

Rifkind said the Royal Air Force should be flying the Eurofighter 2000 by the year 2000.

But German Defense Minister Volker Ruehe, in announcing his country's participation in development and research, said Germany was deferring until 1995 a decision on starting production.

The idea for a European fighter aircraft was formally adopted in 1985. It was seen as embodying Western Europe's resolve to take on a greater defense role.

Sarajevo running out of bread

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — The hungry hung on the gates of Sarajevo's last functioning bakery Thursday, but bread supplies were running out nine days after the humanitarian airlift was suspended because of the winter storm.

U.N. officials said their emergency food stocks were almost gone.

In Brussels, diplomats said several NATO nations were on the verge of intervening militarily to stop the ethnic war over Bosnia's secession from Yugoslavia.

Fears have risen that Sarajevo is close to falling to ethnic Serb forces that have besieged the Muslim-controlled capital for eight months. Western nations have mainly blamed Serbs and Serb-dominated Yugoslavia for failures to end the war, in which Serbs have captured about 70 percent of Bosnia.

Dutch Prime Minister Ruud Lubbers made an impassioned plea Thursday for outside intervention.

"I don't give a damn who takes the lead," he told his parliament. "I think it's downright scandalous that there's no intervention in Somalia, but not in Yugoslavia."

Lubbers said his government would "do our absolute utmost" to ensure that Bosnia was high on the agenda of the European Community summit that begins Friday.

At least 17,000 people have died in the fighting among Muslims, Serbs and Croats, and more than 100,000 are officially listed as missing. Sarajevo's 400,000 residents have been surviving on meager rations for months.

Sarajevo officials said they could barely produce 25,000 loaves of bread a day — about a fifth of peak production

and only enough to meet the needs of hospitals and refugees from fighting elsewhere in Bosnia.

"The basic food now is bread," said Husain Ahmovic, assistant manager at the bakery. "Without it, it's starvation."

Amira Pijic, a typist, said she had been living on bread and tea for 10 days. She got her last U.N. aid package on Nov. 21. It contained two small cans of meat, two of fish, 6½ pounds of flour, some hot chocolate and four U.S. military combat meals.

"I feel very weak," she said.

Sarajevo suffered through a fourth straight wintry day without electricity and water because fighting prevented repairs to power lines.

Dwindling bread production has heightened tensions at the bakery's gates, where people collect a daily ration of a 6-inch chunk of bread.

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Militia overruns government post, then pulls back

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Militiamen overran a key security post controlled by forces of the Islamic interim government, then agreed to pull back to their bases, the Defense Ministry said Thursday.

Wednesday's firefight in battered Kabul was seen as a warning to President Burhanuddin Rabbani, who hinted earlier this week that he might not surrender power later this month as scheduled.

The militia, headed by Gen. Abdul Rashid Dostam, seized the Bala Hissr fort on the eastern edge of Kabul following a daylong battle with government troops, a ministry spokesman said on condition of anonymity.

The two rival sides, which joined forces to topple the former Communist regime in April, agreed late Wednesday to hold their fire, the spokesman said. Dostam's

officers also agreed to withdraw from their predominantly Uzbek fighters, he said.

The militiamen pulled back from a major intersection wrested from the Kabul garrison and the Department of State Security. But Dostam's troops still controlled the main road from the airport in western Kabul to the city center and occupied sandbag bunkers near the Defense Ministry and presidential palace.

Leader: Natives killed by whites

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Prime Minister Paul Keating officially admitted Thursday that white settlers murdered and dispossessed Australia's aborigines during two centuries of settlement.

In a speech launching the International Year for the World's Indigenous People, Keating said whites committed atrocities and injustices, "took the traditional lands and smashed the traditional way of life."

"We brought the diseases and the alcohol," he said.

"We committed the murders. We took the children from their mothers. We practiced discrimination and exclusion."

Keating's official admission of wrongdoing brought cheers from an audience of about 500 aborigines and whites gathered in an park.

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Prince's blood sample provides clue to Russian royal mystery

LONDON (AP) — A blood sample from Prince Philip, the duke of Edinburgh, may have solved the 74-year-old mystery of the fate of Russia's imperial family, the government said Thursday.

The sample from the duke, who is married to Queen Elizabeth II, has been found to match DNA samples taken from a group of bones thought to be those of Czar Nicholas II, Czarina Alexandra and her children.

Prince Philip is directly related to the czar

in on his mother's side. His grandmother Victoria was Alexandra's sister.

"The tests could end the dispute over the identity of the nine skeletons unearthed in a pit at Ekaterinburg in eastern Russia in July last year," the Forensic Science Service said in a statement.

It said tests on DNA extracted from the excavated bones show there is one family group among the bones and that "the sexes of the various individuals is consistent with

the tentative identification made in Russia."

"The results obtained so far are encouraging," said Dr. Janet Thompson, director of the forensic agency.

But the agency said no definite identification of the remains can be made until further samples from other relatives have been examined. The project is expected to be finished in early spring.

Bolsheviks in 1918 carried out an order from Soviet founder Vladimir Lenin to execute

Russia's last imperial family, the Romanovs, in the Ural Mountain city of Ekaterinburg. The bodies were dumped in a pit near the city, known as Sverdlovsk during the Soviet era.

Remains believed to be theirs were discovered in the city in July 1991 and brought to the Forensic Science Service in Britain for testing three months ago by one of Russia's leading DNA scientists, Dr. Pavel Ivanov.

The service is known for its expertise using a technique called DNA sequencing to identify genetic links. The process identifies the genetic pattern unique to members of the same family and is accurate even when comparing relatives of different generations.

A team of six American experts in July confirmed earlier identification by Russian scientists of the skeletons of Nicholas, Alexandra, their eldest children Olga, Maria and Tatyana; and the family doctor.

Faulk, Jones retain top honors

Marshall Faulk and Marvin Jones play on opposite sides of the ball and opposite ends of the country. However, they share a distinction: the 1992 Associated Press All-America team.

The San Diego State running back and the Florida State linebacker are the only repeaters on the first team, which was released Thursday.

Faulk was the nation's leading rusher for the second consecutive season and became only the second major college player to gain more than 3,000 yards in his first two years.

The first was Georgia's Herschel Walker, who is also the only other player since World War II to make the AP's first-team as a freshman and sophomore. Despite missing 2½ games due to injury, Faulk gained 1,630 yards this season and finished third in scoring with 15 touchdowns.

Jones won the Lombardi Award as the country's top lineman and is a finalist for the Butkus Award, which goes to the best linebacker. He led the Seminoles with 111 tackles, including three sacks and seven others behind the line of scrimmage.

Joining Faulk in the backfield are Miami quarterback Gino Torretta and Georgia running back Garrison Hearst. Torretta is 26.1 as a starter, holds almost every career passing record at Miami and is one victory away from leading the Hurricanes to their second straight national championship.

He threw for 3,066 yards this season, completed 57 percent of his attempts and had 19 touchdown passes with only seven interceptions. He already has won the Maxwell and Walter-Camp awards as the best college player, and is favored to win the Heisman Trophy on Saturday.

Hearst was second in rushing with 1,547 yards and first in scoring with 21 touchdowns, which "broke" Walker's Southeastern Conference record. He averaged 6.8 yards per carry, third among 1,000-yard rushers.

The all-purpose back is Stanford's Glyn Milburn, who was second in all-purpose yardage (177 per game) and third in punt

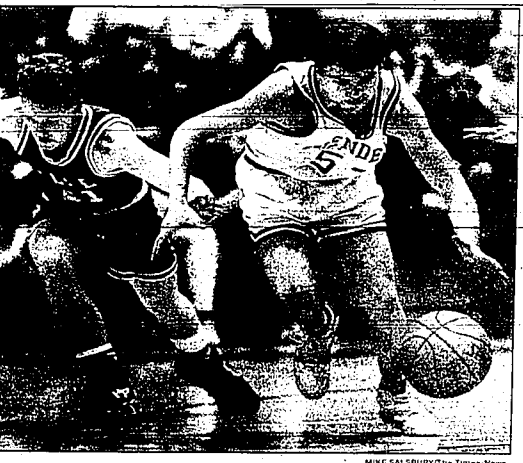

Senate panel investigates baseball antitrust charge

WASHINGTON — Baseball's acting leader tried to convince a U.S. Senate panel Thursday that the integrity and independence of the commissioner's office will not be tampered with.

However, senators repeatedly confronted Milwaukee Brewers president Bud Selig with vitriolic remarks made by Chicago White Sox chairman Jerry Reinsdorf.

"All of us who have been raised in the game understand the need for a strong commissioner. There is no doubt in my mind that baseball needs a strong commissioner," said Selig, chairman of the executive council that has ruled the major leagues since Sept. 7, when Ray Vincent resigned as commissioner.

Selig, a leader of the group that forced Vincent repeatedly to resign as commissioner of the Judiciary subcommittee on antitrust about Reinsdorf's assertion that the next commissioner will have to "run the business for the owners, not the players or the umpires or the fans."

Debate about the commissioner's role and the possibility of renewed labor strife, not the controversy over Reinsdorf's remarks allegedly made by Cincinnati Reds owner Marge Schott, dominated the hearing.

"A strong commissioner is independent and stays there even when you are unhappy with him," subcommittee chairman Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, reminded Selig. "How can you convince the American people — and this committee — that you mean what you say?"

"We want a commissioner who can stand up to the owners on an issue that's important to the fans," added Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt.

Vincent urged the panel to strip baseball. Please see BASEBALL/B7.

NFL, players reportedly near labor agreement

NEW YORK — The NFL and its players were "closer than ever" to a contract agreement Thursday that would bring a form of unrestricted free agency to pro football and end a bitter five-year labor stalemate, a lawyer for the players said.

"We have consensus on the major issues as best I can tell," Jim Quinn, attorney for the players, said. "The parties have moved closer than ever before to breaking the stalemate."

Those issues have been identified as free agency, a salary cap and the college draft.

The league, however, took a more cautious approach.

"There's still work to be done and obstacles to overcome," said Greg Aiello, a spokesman for the NFL. "We're not there yet. We still have to meet again."

But a source close to the negotiations

insisted the deal was all but done after an eight-hour meeting Wednesday night in New York.

"We've got a deal," said the source, who spoke on the condition of anonymity. "There are a few minor things to be worked out but the major issues have been agreed to."

Both sides said some issues needed to be finalized, but player agent Leigh Steinberg said the basic structure of a settlement fell into place at Wednesday's meeting with a deal that would grant players free agency after five years.

Another meeting is planned next Tuesday, the day before the owners meet in Dallas.

Doug Allen, assistant executive director of the union, said, "I can only say that progress has been made. I'm very hopeful about what happens in the next week."

Steinbrenner stampede

Pending return of Yankee owner means free agents look elsewhere

NEW YORK (AP) — OK, the New York Yankees got Abbott. So, where's Costello.

And who's on third?

I don't know.

Neither does George Steinbrenner, and I don't give a darn.

The one-time wheeler-dealer king of baseball can't even sign free agents anymore by outbidding people. One, they were fanned for their checkbook. Now, when they get the pen out, people laugh. Then run away.

The Yankees soon will be the longest-running off-Bronx dynasty in New York — winners of nothing since 1981.

The folks who keep track of such stuff-figure the Yankees offered a total of \$122.5 million to free agents they haven't signed. This winter, in every case except Barry Bonds, the Yankees offer was the highest. Bonds went to San Francisco for \$43.75 million over six years after he rejected a Yankees offer of \$37 million over five years.

The Yankees couldn't sign David Cone, even when he said he wanted to be a Yankee. Doug Drabek and Jose Guzman went elsewhere after rejecting Yankees bids, and when Steve Steinbrenner came to town; he doesn't even like to venture out into New York's mean streets.

He just orders room service and plays Nintendo. For all he knows, general manager Gene Michael and acting owner Joe Malloy are two mushroom-eating brothers named Mario and Luigi.

Maddux went to Atlanta for \$28 million over five years. \$6 million less than New York offered.

Cone was ready to look at a Yankees offer for \$5 million a year when he read in the newspapers that it had been withdrawn. He signed with Kansas City for \$3 million a year and a \$9 million signing bonus.

"The Yankees negotiations were strange, needless to say," Cone said. "I think the chaos surrounding the front office there is pretty much self-explanatory. I'd rather not get into it."

Steinbrenner, the man who started the free-agent wars by

signing Catfish Hunter on New Year's Eve in 1974 and two years later got Reggie Jackson, is due to come back off suspension on March 1. That ought to fix any off-field confusion, right? There's never been any confusion with George at the helm, right? You don't suppose Steinbrenner's imminent return is why these free agents are going elsewhere, you? You don't suppose GM's from other clubs are warning players: "He's back." Sort of like "Steinbrennergeist II."

Anyway, since losing third baseman Charlie Hayes in the expansion draft to the Colorado Rockies, the Yankees have managed to get only Jim Abbott, Steve Howe and Spike Owen. None of them plays third.

Abbott was acquired in a trade with the California Angels for three minor leaguers, essentially because the Angels couldn't get his name on a long-term deal. He can be a free agent in two years, and then it's his turn to laugh at George's checkbook.

For Howe, the Yankees needed personalized checks with little boomerangs, or something, on them. "The Yankees re-signed Howe, the seventh-inning drug and alcohol loser, for \$4.2 million over two years."

Howe was suspended from baseball June 8, but his lifetime ban was overturned on Nov. 11 by an arbitrator.

"People have different feelings about whether he should be in baseball," Michael admits.

The same could be said about the only free-agent the Yankees signed last year, Greg Maddux. To get Owen, a light-hitting shortstop with limited range, the Yankees anted up \$7 million over three years, and you can bet nobody was going to beat that offer.

Now, Steinbrenner says, the Yankees next target is Toronto's free-agent pitcher, Jimmy Key, for whom they're reportedly willing to offer the Bronx and Staten Island, too.

"I think Key's a key," Steinbrenner says. That's Key, as in Keystone Kops, as in New York Yankees.

The winter meetings were over Thursday, but the dealing was not done. Pittsburgh agreed to a one-year deal with reliever Alcantara Pena. Detroit got reliever Tom Bolton for one season and the New York Mets signed veteran left-hander Frank Tanana for one season.

By then, clubs had spent \$258 million to sign free agents such as Maddux, Barry Bonds, David Cone and Andre Dawson, and made a slew of trades that sent the likes of Jim Abbott, Ivan Calderon and Kelly Gruber to new teams.

Here's how hectic it was: On Tuesday, executives from the Phillies, Blue Jays, Angels and Cubs all crowded into the press room, each preparing to announce deals in a span of five minutes.

After a few seconds of shuffling around the parties to see who would go first on the podium, Philadelphia spokesman Larry Shenk stepped to the plate, so to speak.

"We have received clearance from air traffic control to go ahead," Shenk started, summing up the craziness with a smile.

It was a shopping spree of unparalleled proportions, one that not even a scoreboard and a calculator could fully comprehend.

But, as everyone knows, the bottom line of baseball business is wins and losses. So, who won?

The Braves and Toronto, who met last night, became even stronger. Gone are the days when the World Series teams used to come to the winter meetings to gloat, not to get better.

The Pirates and Oakland, playoff losers who never traded dollar-decisions, broke apart even further.

The Yankees got Abbott in a trade with California, but left Louisville more disappointed than anyone.

Hey, Abbott? Who's on first? Don Manning said he will not be traded by Maddux, Bonds, Cone, Doug Drabek, Jose Guzman or any other top free agents the Yankees hoped to sign.

There was a chance the Yankees still could sign Ruben Sierra, who along with Mark McGwire, are the two best luxury cars left on the free-agent lot. Dave Winfield, Wade Boggs, Jimmy Key and Tom Henke all have some miles on them, but each might be good for one more ride.

Even though they could lose Winfield, Key and Henke, and even though did lose Cone, Dave Stieb and traded Kelly Gruber, the World Series champion Blue Jays could be better off than ever.

Toronto came to the meetings with a game plan that began with re-signing Joe Carter. It was between the Blue Jays, Carter's new home team, and a Kansas City, the team he grew to love, that was Oakland's ace, the Royals offered a \$10 million signing bonus, and Carter considered it carefully. He even sent a statement to his agents at the Galt House that thanked the Blue Jays, their fans and the city of Toronto for all of their support, to Toronto in case he signed with the Royals.

But, he picked Toronto. So did Paul Molitor and Dave Stewart, who each broke off long-term associations to join the Blue Jays.

Stewart was Oakland's ace, the pitcher who kept the Athletics'

season alive in the playoffs against Toronto.

"If this is going to be my last contract, which I've seriously considered, I want Cleveland to win two more times," Stewart said. "I'm aware of everything going on. I can't see that this club has gotten any weaker. It'll probably be a stronger club in 1991."

Molitor, a staple in Milwaukee since 1978, was worried that the Brewers' cost-cutting measures might turn them into losers. He wanted to play for a winner, and that meant Toronto.

"From what I've heard from other players, and what I've observed from afar, they have a real strong commitment," Molitor said.

Maddux, meanwhile, took \$6 million less than he could've gotten from the Yankees and instead signed with the Braves for five years and \$28 million. The National League's reigning Cy Young winner will join a rotation that includes 1991 Cy Young winner Greg Maddux and the last two NL playoff Most Valuable Players, John Smoltz and Steve Avery.

"The money issue was secondary," his agent, Scott Boras, said. "He wanted to win a World Championship."

The money matter didn't matter as much to Maddux because even though he could've got more elsewhere, he's set for life. Money was the main reason, however, for Oakland and Pittsburgh.

The A's went into the offseason with 14 free agents, with McGwire, Sierra, Stewart and Mike Moore among them. Oakland cannot keep the main man, however, and Moore already have left.

The Pirates, who traded Gold Glove second baseman and lost free agent reliever Roger Mason before the meetings, saw Bonds leave for St. Louis. They also lost Doug Patterson, an effective middle reliever.

As the holidays approach, plenty of teams will try to fill their wish lists.

Boston really wants Henke. They moved last Wednesday to signing him, but they could not make a move because their 40-man roster had been filled by signing Dawson.

Later in the day, the Red Sox took up the air in trying to complete a trade with San Diego. After midnight, Boston announced a deal that sent Phil Phanter to the Padres for reliever Jose Melendez.

Plus, there's a chance that Toronto and the Blue Jays might swap in the trade front. Had the Blue Jays not signed Carter, they wanted to get Ron Gant for the Braves.

Now, with Toronto shopping around for a reliever, the teams could swap. The deal might involve Mark Wohler or Kent Mercker.

Braves' owner ready to slow acceleration

ATLANTA (AP) — General manager John Schuerholz said Thursday the Atlanta Braves are no longer on a mission.

Reaching a contract agreement with free agent Cy Young award winner Greg Maddux left the Braves satisfied with their accomplishments at baseball's winter meetings in Louisville, Ky.

"We're not on a mission any longer," Schuerholz said at a news conference after the Braves' win in Kentucky. "We were on a mission three days ago. We're not looking for anything now, but we'll continue to talk."

The Braves announced Wednesday night that Maddux, 26, had agreed to a five-year, \$28 million deal. The 20-game winner with the Chicago Cubs last season thus makes what is considered baseball's top starting rotation even better.

"It's going to be an unbelievably awesome starting rotation," said John Smoltz, the MVP in the Braves victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates in the NL playoffs.

"I just would hate to see a signing team coming in to face our staff," Smoltz said.

The Braves also feature Tom Glavine, the 1991 Cy Young winner, Steve Avery, and Pete Smith, who posted a 7-0 record last season.

To help finance the acquisition of Maddux, Schuerholz traded Charlie Leibrandt to the Texas Rangers Wednesday night.

The Braves also are expected to have to trade Charlie Leibrandt to get a definitely welcome addition to not only the Cy Young winner but a great young pitcher, Smoltz said. "This move solidifies us for a long time to come."

"This guy, we think, is one of the premier pitchers in the National League," Schuerholz said.

"Pitching and defense is how you win more than the other guy," he said. "He's durable, he's good. We're glad to have him."

The Braves had offered Maddux a contract worth \$6 million more than the one he got from the Braves. Asked how he did it, Schuerholz said, "I just brought up all the wonderful golf courses we have. He's a avid golfer."

Schuerholz added, "It's nice in this day of greed and avarice to see a guy say I have enough. I think it is a lot about him."

Schuerholz also said negotiations are ongoing with Glavine's agent, Bob Woolf.

Glavine, a 20-game winner two years in a row, can become a free agent at the end of the 1993 season. He has expressed a desire to sign a contract that will keep him with the Braves several more years.

"There's no question in my mind they're going to keep Glavine and Maddux, which gives them the most exciting rotation in baseball," Woolf said in a telephone interview from his Miami office.

Woolf said he believed the signing of Maddux was very helpful.

"It gives us some panimmers," he said. "We understand fully that Tommy is not a free agent so we certainly wouldn't expect to get what Maddux got."

There have been published reports that the Braves offered Glavine a four-year contract worth \$4.2 million a year with an option for a fifth year.

Glavine was the team's highest paid pitcher last year, earning just over \$2.9 million.

Lewis fight with Bowe less certain

NEW YORK (AP) — Lennox Lewis' manager appears ready to accept what he calls an insulting \$3 million offer to challenge heavyweight champion Riddick Bowe.

It also appears to be a clange of heart that will be too late.

Frank Maloney, Lewis' manager, said in London that he told the British challenger not to accept \$3 million to fight Bowe, "but if Lewis insists, we will have to talk again with Bowe's people. The fight will be in April, and we will demand that Bowe has no warmup fight beforehand."

Rock Newman, Bowe's manager, however, told The Associated Press Thursday that an agreement for Bowe to make a first defense against an opponent other than Lewis is imminent.

"If I make a deal, then Lennox Lewis goes to the back of the line, and chances are slim Bowe would fight him in 1993," Newman said. "Once I make a commitment, I'm not looking at Lennox Lewis."

Newman was in New York talking to HBO about Bowe making a defense in early February. TVKO, the pay-per-view boxing network, also was involved in the talks.

Newman also is entertaining an offer to fight on the Fox Network Jan. 31. The fight would begin during half-time of the Super Bowl telecast on NBC.

"I would see how the fight would be, but we would see how the fight would be," Newman said.

That organization has said it will withdraw championship recognition from Bowe if he doesn't agree by Jan. 2 to make his first professional fight against Lewis, who stopped Razor Ruddock in the second round on Oct. 31 in what the WBC called a title elimination bout.

Bowe won the undisputed championship, including the WBA and IBF titles, by knocking out Evander Holyfield on Nov. 13.

Flurry of tournaments fatigues Floyd; Trevino looks to move up

DORADO BEACH, Puerto Rico (AP) — The final week of PGA Tour competition and four major championships behind him, there's little chance success will spoil Ray Floyd.

But it sure has tired him out. "I've gotten pretty tired," he said. "I've got to have a practice round for the Senior Championship which begins Friday at the Doral Resort. "It's not so much the physical side of it. It's more mental than anything."

"I've played a lot more this year than I have in a long time, maybe 27, 28 tournaments. And it's all been at the end."

And it's been scattered around the continent. In the last few weeks, Floyd has fought in the Australian Open, played in the Shark Shootout in California, now is involved in the \$1 million, season-ending Senior Championship and next week will play in Jamaica.

in the year as a member of the regular tour, reached his 50th birthday a few days later, joined the senior circuit and won twice on the senior circuit.

As the only man to win on both tours in the same season, he will compete in both the regular tour and senior tour sections of the "Tournaments."

"I'm looking forward to it," he said. "It should be fun. It seems like that's all anybody wants to talk about. It's generating a lot of interest, and that's good for our game."

Before that season opener, however, he has to deal with the season-closer and the elite field of only the top 30 money-winners on the over-50 circuit who are competing at the Dorado Beach resort.

And, despite his fatigue, Floyd ranks among the leading contenders for the \$150,000 first prize.

He is not, however, in the hunt for the senior money-winning title — despite having \$1,009,909 in official earnings for the year. Of that, \$774,911 came from the regular tour, \$267,991 on the senior circuit.

Only Lee Trevino, Jim Colbert and Mike Hill have a shot at the money title. Trevino has \$847,752, Colbert \$724,518 and Hill \$722,423.

And Trevino, a five-time winner this season, knows exactly what he has to do to gain a second money title in three years.

"I need to finish 12th or better to win it. And if I don't finish 12th or better Colbert or Hill has to win to beat me," said Trevino, who next week faces surgery on his damaged left thumb and will miss the early part of the 1993 schedule.

The record says the possibility of a Hill victory are very great.

New arenas will greet new NHL teams

PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Walt Disney Co. has the right to build Blockbuster Video Inc. NHL expansion franchises Thursday for Orange County, Calif., and South Florida.

The unexpected unanimous decision by the NHL Board of Governors last month's winter meeting expands the league to 26 teams. The newest members will begin play either next season or in 1994-95.

The California club, Disney's first professional sports team, may play in the new Anaheim arena, which opens in June.

The South Florida team will likely play at least initially in Miami Arena. Blockbuster chief H. Wayne Huizenga, who last year won a baseball expansion franchise for

South Florida, plans to build a new Florida arena but declined to speculate on its site.

"We're thrilled to announce that both of these companies known throughout the world for their marketing expertise, image and family values came and sought to join the NHL," president Gil Stein said.

The fee for the new franchises will be \$50 million, same as for the Tampa Bay Lightning and Ottawa Senators, who joined the league this season. Half of Disney's fee will go to the Los Angeles Kings, who are in the Los Angeles arena, for Southern

California territorial rights.

The deals are contingent on the new owners getting paying their entry fees on schedule.

Disney had one other profitable venture into hockey — "The Mighty Ducks," a movie that has grossed \$50 million. Disney Co. chairman Michael Eisner, who has nickname for the expansion team.

"Whenever I suggest the little Mighty Ducks, six people tell me no hockey player will play for that team," Eisner said. "The trouble is, if we don't win in three or four years, we might be called the Unmighty Ducks — or worse."

— As with baseball's Florida Marlins, Huizenga said his hockey team won't carry the Miami name.

"We're not featuring ourselves as South Florida's team," he said.

State, Coeur d'Alene tribe ready to sign interim gaming compact

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus and the chairman of the Coeur d'Alene Indian Tribe are on the verge of signing an interim compact for the regulation of gaming on the northern Idaho reservation.

Both Andrus spokesman Scott Peyron and tribal spokesman Bob Bostwick said the pact, which would be the first between the state and any tribe, involved agreements on substantial issues.

It "may raise a few eyebrows," Bostwick said.

But sources said the compact, that could be signed as early as today, does not address the central issue in the reservation gaming debate — whether the tribes under federal law can conduct casino-style games.

That issue along with the extent to which the state can regulate casino gaming if it can be conducted on reservations will be settled by a federal judge.

The action comes as the tribe's \$2.2 million gaming hall 15 miles south of Coeur d'Alene was nearing completion. Bostwick

said the hall should be open for bingo sometime next month.

The Coeur d'Alene Tribe asked a federal court on Nov. 3 to declare that since the state allows lotteries and parimutuel betting it has no authority to preclude casino-type games on reservations under provisions of the 1988 Indian Gaming Regulatory Act.

That act classifies lotteries, parimutuel betting and casino-style gambling as Class Three games. And the tribes contend that once a state allows any kind of Class Three

gaming, it cannot preclude an Indian tribe from engaging in all Class Three gaming.

The state maintains that the federal law allows it to limit reservation gambling to only the specific types of gambling it allows off reservations.

And state officials won overwhelming voter approval of a constitutional amendment precluding all gambling but lotteries, raffles and parimutuel betting.

The validity of that amendment, however, is being challenged by the Nez Perce Tribe

in the state Supreme Court. No hearing on that case has been set yet.

Four of Idaho's tribes have initiated talks with the state on a regulatory compact held in preparation for opening casino gaming operations.

The deadline for completing those talks is at hand, and the gaming manager for eastern Idaho's Shoshone-Bannock Tribes predicted his tribes will have to go to federal court to force agreement with the state.

Idaho inmates could be set free early

BOISE (AP) — The Andrus administration is drafting legislation to allow the Board of Corrections to order the early release of inmates to ease prison overcrowding.

The plan, triggered by what would be called an overcrowding emergency, was being seen as a safety valve by prison officials facing an inmate population in excess of the limits dictated by a federal court and state inmates awaiting space in county jails approaching 200.

Director Richard Vernon said, "We could easily have 300 people backed up in the county jails by summer... We're at gridlock in our institutions."

While Gov. Cecil Andrus has not endorsed the early release proposal, he has made it clear, but Vernon and Corrections Board Chairman Nick Miller said there will be no additional cash for new prison cell construction.

As a result, Andrus aides have acknowledged the bureau will need to find a solution to overcrowding and they endorsed exploration of all feasible alternatives.

Board members, who discussed the release program on Thursday, conceded judges could oppose the scheme because, in effect, it reworks the sentences they impose. But the board hoped to win the support of the parole commission for the early release concept before pressing the governor to include it in his legislative package.

is no relief in sight. Although a new 190-bed cellblock opens at the prison farm south of Boise next October and the new women's prison opens in Pocatello a month earlier, corrections officials do not believe they will be able to completely clear the county-jail backlog.

"Once you stop enacting new laws and harsher laws, it still takes four years after it stops for the people in the pipeline to work out," said Eugene Larson, head of the field and community services for the Corrections Department. "But we haven't stopped. We have another 10 or 15 sentencing enhancements being introduced this year."

The state will spend \$3.2 million in payments to counties for housing state inmates, and officials estimate that without any relief that figure will exceed \$4.5 million in the coming budget year. "We're going to be in violation of the federal court order in the next few months," Corrections

Heavy snow pelts much of Washington

A potent storm that caught forecasters by surprise dumped several inches of snow across much of Washington state Thursday.

Coastal towns braced for flooding from high tides, while elsewhere schools closed, traffic slowed and tens of thousands of people temporarily lost power.

Crews early Thursday morning repaired a jetty breached by a storm tide that briefly flooded a 12-block commercial area of the coastal community of Westport on Wednesday.

Residents braced for more high tides and gusty winds later Thursday.

Snowfall in the Puget Sound area had largely tapered off by early afternoon, but not before the National Weather Service issued a heavy snow warning for the Puget Sound region and the northwest interior of the state. Forecasters said as much as 2 inches of snow was expected to accumulate, mainly on hills.

Heavier snow fell in the mountains and in parts of Eastern Washington.

The weather service reported 8 inches of new snow at the Yakima

airport and up to a foot near the east slopes of the Cascade mountains.

"If you do not need to travel, you can stay home," the Yakima County sheriff's office advised motorists.

Wenatchee braced for up to 10 inches of snow.

"We're working as hard as we can," said Kris Young, administrative assistant to the public works director. "People just need to be careful, drive slower and be patient."

In Westport, crews used heavy equipment to move extra armor rock into a hole in the rock jetty. The hole, big enough to fit a semi-truck through, allowed seawater to flood a commercial area to a depth of 2 to 3 inches. Public Works Director Fred Chapman said.

Westport Mayor Doug Merino declared a state of emergency. "Right now we're looking at a quarter to a half-million dollars in damage to private and public property," he said.

Heavy snow caused trees to fall into power lines, knocking out electricity in the Puget Sound area.

About 15,000 people in the suburbs east of Seattle, 18,000 customers in Kitsap County and all 6,000 customers on Bainbridge Island temporarily lost service, said Betty Workman, a spokeswoman for Puget Sound Power & Light Co.

About 18,000 to 20,000 customers in Snohomish County lost power, and some were expected to remain cut off into the evening, said Public Utility District spokesman Andy Muntz.

In Seattle, where public schools closed early, the city Engineering Department sent 22 trucks on city streets spreading sand. King County dispatched about 50 trucks.

Snow-covered roads caused numerous accidents. A dispatcher at the Bellevue office of the Washington State Patrol said troopers were swamped Thursday morning, but there were no reports of serious accidents.

Snow avalanches closed Washington 12 for 15 miles on each side of White Pass, while Cayuse Pass and the North Cascades Highway remained closed from earlier storms.

As much as 4 inches of snow fell in northeastern Washington and between 2 and 4 inches were reported in areas of southeastern Washington.

Smoke inhalation claims 7-month old in Lewiston

LEWISTON (AP) — A 7-month-old Lewiston infant died of smoke inhalation as he slept in his family's basement apartment, even though a smoke alarm was installed in the hall way near his bedroom.

The small, smoky fire was inside the baby's bedroom, and with the door closed the smoke alarm outside was not activated, Lewiston Fire Chief Thomas Tomberg said Wednesday.

Joshua G. Starnes, the son of Shaun and Sonja Starnes, was dead on arrival at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center about 5 a.m. Wednesday.

"This goes against everything we've been preaching," Tomberg said of the smoke detector. "This home was equipped just like we wanted it to be, and it didn't work."

That's disheartening. God must have wanted this child."

Tomberg said Mrs. Starnes apparently was sleeping in another room with a 2-year-old child when she was awakened by the family dog. The father is stationed in California with the National Guard.

Mrs. Starnes found the baby's room filled with smoke and was unable to rouse her son. She grabbed the baby, left the 2-year-old with a neighbor and drove to the hospital.

Tomberg said the fire had gone out and no one was home when firefighters arrived. The blaze — with heavy smoke but almost no flames — appeared to have started in clothing and toys that were too close to a baseboard heater.

Salmon expert awaits transplant

LEWISTON (AP) — Moscow's Ted Bjorn, a member of a federal team writing a salmon recovery plan for Snake River salmon runs and the biologist most familiar with the problems facing the fish, finds himself facing a new challenge.

Bjorn, a U.S. Fish and Wildlife

Service researcher stationed at the University of Idaho, is waiting for a heart transplant at LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City.

The National Marine Fisheries Service, which formed the seven-member recovery team, plans a statement soon clarifying Bjorn's status.

Fire scorches Colfax

COLFAX, Wash. (AP) — Fire heavily damaged a downtown building Thursday, and the firefighting effort blocked the main highway through this southeast Washington town.

The building appeared to be a total loss. There were no injuries reported.

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Denver mayor tries to stem state boycott over anti-gay law

DENVER -- Efforts to over a snowballing boycott of Colorado over the state's new law that bans protected status for homosexuals are meeting with only partial success, the mayor of Denver reported Wednesday.

Mayor Wellington Webb, returning home from a two-day tour of New York aimed at arresting the boycott, said that he had made some progress. Some gay and lesbian leaders, however, suggested that Webb was being overly optimistic.

Webb called the trip "partial success in damage control." He said that his assessment was based on the fact that New York Mayor David Dinkins "did not call for the full economic boycott of the state that had been recommended to him by several members of the New York City Council."

Despite Webb's pleas, Dinkins this week banned city travel to Colorado in protest of the new state law, passed by voters here Nov. 3. Atlanta and Philadelphia have taken similar steps.

Webb was also rebuffed during his visit by the Village Voice, a weekly newspaper based in New York.

Although Webb met with the newspaper's editorial board and argued against a boycott, the paper promptly published a scathing editorial on Tuesday titled "Boycott Colorado!"

It was not the first call for a national boycott of Colorado and its glitzy, mountain resorts in the wake of the law's passage.

So far, several organizations have canceled conventions and meetings in Denver, including the American Law Libraries Association and the National Council for Social Studies, which alone was expected to bring 4,000 delegates and about \$4 million to Denver.

There were also signs that some Colorado ski resorts are losing bookings to other states.

"We were planning one of our trips to be to Colorado, but after the amendment passed I couldn't find enough skiers interested in paying to go there," said Linda Lu Cannon, who organizes outings for the 400-member Microsoft Ski Club of Richmond, Wash.

Cannon said that she had no problem organizing trips to British Columbia, Big Mountain, Mont., and Snowbird, Utah.

Hoping to staunch the flow of money leaving the state, the Denver Metro Convention and Visitors Bureau announced plans Wednesday to place a special advertisement in travel and trade publications.

At a press conference here Wednesday, Webb said that he was dogged every step of the way in New York by members of a group called the Lesbian Avengers, which somehow obtained a copy of his itinerary.

Carrying pickets and chanting, "We're here, we're queer and we won't go skiing!" eight Lesbian Avengers first confronted Webb on Monday in New York's Regency Hotel while he was being interviewed over breakfast by a reporter.

"We hit him five more times on Monday," said Ann Northrop, a spokeswoman for the 300-member group.

"Everywhere he went we were at the door to greet him."

Webb said he went to New York to carry the message that Denver, along with Boulder and Aspen, already have ordinances that specifically uphold civil rights protections for homosexuals.

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Sociologist: Fantasy of mountain life falls to reality quickly for most

KALISPELL, Mont. (AP) — Urban refugees fleeing to the Rocky Mountains are chasing a fantasy, and the great majority are disillusioned and gone within a few years, says a sociologist.

Most come from big cities and from urban areas of California, and they cite "equality of life" for bringing them to the Rockies and trendy destinations like Montana.

But the meaning of the term has changed over the years, says Pat Jobs of Bozeman, a sociology professor at Montana State University.

In the early 1970s, he said, "serious environmental devotees" moved in, taking full advantage of hunting, fishing, skiing and the outdoors.

In the 1980s, newcomers "talked as if they were environmentally active, but weren't."

Now they just talk about the scenery.

"They're reacting to symbols

rather than reality," he said.

Jobs has studied newcomers to the booming Bozeman area of southern Montana since the 1970s, and he sees close similarities with the population rush now hitting the Flathead Valley of northwestern Montana.

Eighty percent of the people who moved to Montana in the 1980s have already moved out, he said. One reason is most newcomers quickly see their income take a nosedive.

Of couples, men are the driving factor in 11 of every 12 decisions to move, Jobs said. They are lured by the promise of hunting, fishing and other macho models.

"Women are not as deluded as men are" about the kind of lifestyle they'll find, he said, though they are attracted by a desire for more safety and by the friendliness and ambience of rural life.

It is the men, however, who grow dissatisfied after about three years and want to move again, Jobs said.

"Of the people who stay, most are retired or middle-aged with children, he found. They are employed and college-educated and participate in community activities like church and school groups.

The wealthy are less likely to stay than upper-middle-class residents, he said.

The people who left told Jobs of unmet expectations, including the assumption that by moving and becoming an "environmentalist," they would be surrounded by like-minded neighbors. That illusion dies when the next-door neighbor turns out to be a lawyer.

They also find they cannot run away from personal problems that are, Jobs said, quite mobile.

"People really are living with an illusion when they move to a beautiful place in the Rockies," Jobs said. "They do not have an accurate impression of what they are looking for, and they don't know how to cope with what they find."

Police on the lookout for elusive goat

BOTHELL, Wash. — You've got to hand it to the Bothell cops. They're not about to let some rambunctious kid get their goat.

But you couldn't blame them for being at the end of their tether, either. For the past three months, the Bothell police force, King County Animal Control and several city residents have spent hours trying to catch a quick little billy goat which seems to appear out of nowhere — only to disappear to the same place.

The goat has been responsible for stopping traffic on Interstate 405,

Highway 522 and the Bothell-Everett highway. Bothell is a suburb of Seattle.

One officer even suspects the animal of possessing supernatural powers.

"He's able to leap over fences and people in a single bound," said officer Mike Gleason, who spent part of Wednesday afternoon chasing the goat through downtown traffic.

"I think criminals are much easier to capture than this goat."

goat still escaped into the bushes.

No one knows who owns the brown and black animal. But when it's caught, police plan to turn it over to a local farmer who has several goats.

"It hasn't caused any damage yet, but we are concerned that it may cause an accident," says Gleason.

Meantime, the police are trying to handle the goat's escapades with a sense of humor: They refer to themselves as the goatbusters.

Cause of Amanda's death still mystery

TWIN FALLS — There was no public outcry when Donnell "Bud" Stradley walked out of the courtroom an innocent man Thursday morning.

No mob of angry citizens demanded atonement for the death of 2-year-old girl Amanda Hostetler, nor was anyone asking how a jury could have found Stradley innocent of first-degree murder.

But that verdict left questions about what happened on Jan. 20 at 346 4th Ave. E. — questions that some people still want answered.

"There was still a crime committed," said the Rev. Wayne Weld-Martin, the Methodist minister who

performed the funeral service for Amanda. "I hope the result will be that Twin Falls and Idaho will be so sensitized to child abuse that it can't be tolerated."

Amanda's mother, Jodie Hostetler, is now applying a three-to-nine-year prison sentence after pleading guilty to felony child abuse earlier this year.

"My impression all the way through that time was that they were prosecuting the wrong person," Weld-Martin said.

"It is a shame that no one is going to pay the price for the death of that child," said Commissioner Misenhimer of Buhl, one of the leaders of an ad hoc child protection group called Friends of Amanda that crystallized public outrage soon after the child's death.

Misenhimer said she doesn't question the jury's

decision, but she still wants to know why Amanda was left in her mother's care despite numerous reports of child abuse.

The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare eyes the "community an answer," she said.

According to three current or former child protection workers who testified at Stradley's trial, the answer is that no evidence of abuse was found during several visits they made to Jodie Hostetler's home.

"I didn't have any concerns about physical abuse," former social worker Rick Ho Chee said after making four visits to Hostetler's house in the summer of 1990.

He saw Ho bruises during those visits, and the apartment seemed to be clean although cluttered, Ho Chee said.

Fraud trial goes to jury

BOISE — A federal jury began deciding the fate of former congressman George Hansen and associate John Scoreby Thursday.

The jury deliberated for about three hours Thursday afternoon and will reconvene at 8:30 this morning.

Seven women and five men will determine whether Hansen and Scoreby defrauded banks in southern and eastern Idaho in 1990 by operating an elaborate check-kiting scheme.

During closing arguments Thursday morning, Assistant U.S. Attorney George Breitsamer told jurors that Hansen and Scoreby repeatedly wrote bad checks to other people, led those people to write bad checks to them, and lied to investors in Hansen's so-called "loan program."

Breitsamer cited the 212 check exchanges between Hansen's firm, Ideal Consultants, and Rupert farmer Brad Neibaur as evidence of a deliberate plan.

"It's hard for the defendants to argue this

is not intentional," he said.

But Hansen's lawyer, John Runft, argued that, far from being an innocent victim, the Bank of Commerce of Idaho Falls was fully informed of Hansen's operation.

"His bank condoned and worked with him month after month, day after day, week after week," Runft said.

What the government called check-kiting, Runft called "an unusual form of credit."

Hansen and Scoreby each face 47 counts of bank fraud. Each count carries a maximum penalty of 30 years in prison, a \$1 million fine, or both.

Runft called Hansen "a dedicated champion of a large group of people" who were willing to lend him money for his projects.

Soldier Mountain resort's new owners have big plans

FAIRFIELD — Soldier Mountain Ski Area's new owners have big plans for the 44-year-old resort.

The resort that piqued Twin Falls commodities broker Alex Sinclair's interest during a ski trip may not be a small entree to Idaho's ski banquet much longer.

"I got up on top and saw the other mountains," Sinclair said.

The Forest Service on Thursday approved the transfer of ownership from Claude and Karen Hinkle of Fairfield to the new owners. Soldier Mountain is about 10 miles north of Fairfield.

In the immediate future, Sinclair and co-owners Dave and Donna Armstrong of Twin Falls plan to keep Soldier a family resort, possibly adding a few snow-making nozzles and refurbishing the current facilities. In the not-so-distant future, though, Sinclair sees a resort rivaling Sun Valley.

Behind Soldier's current slopes are three peaks that step their way up a ridge to Smokey Dome, elevation 10,095 feet. Sinclair and Armstrong want to develop those mountains, starting with the middle peak, known locally as Second Peak.

The move would involve punching a road into a new base area and building a lodge northwest of the existing facilities. The elevation of Second Peak is about 9,400 feet, higher than Bald Mountain and more than 2,000 feet higher than the elevation at the top of the current lifts.

"I wouldn't have bought the resort if I didn't think we had the potential of moving back the ski plan," Sinclair said. He figures he has a 60-70 percent chance of actually making the improvements.

The new area would likely operate as a higher-end resort, and the current area as a more-affordable resort.

Before they expand, Sinclair and the Armstrongs will study the economic and environmental feasibility of their plan. Although the Forest Service's master plan designated the area near Smokey Dome as a winter-sports area, it is outside

County keeps money from abolished fee

TWIN FALLS — Even though the Twin Falls County Commission abolished the solid waste fee two weeks ago, residents keep sending money.

"The county is keeping it too. If they send it, I'm putting it in the bank," Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said Thursday. "We'll pit it in an account until we decide whether we're going to do it."

The man taking the money, Myron Niels, said he has collected about \$35,000 since last Friday.

"I was told to keep collecting it if it came through the mail," Niels said.

Niels tells walk-ins that the fee was abolished and that they do not have to pay, he said. As of Thursday morning, the county had collected more than \$239,000, according to Niels's records.

The commissioners hoped to raise \$1.6 million from the fee to build a landfill that will meet the requirements of new federal rules.

Some businesses have paid bills of up to \$3,000 since the fee was abolished, Niels said. A few homeowners sent their checks but then stopped payment.

Commissioner Norma Blass said those who have paid the fee have not lost the money. "The county records who has paid the fee."

"If it changes, or is canceled, they'll get it back," Blass said.

The county has banked the money collected until the fee is reinstated to pay solid-waste bills, Hempleman said.

Among these bills are \$60,000 as the county's share of costs in Southern Idaho Regional Solid Waste District and an estimated \$20,000 in the search for a landfill near Twin Falls County.

Hempleman, Blass and Commissioner Jim Fraley paid their solid-waste fees. Hempleman paid \$150 for three homes on Nov. 19. Blass paid \$50 for one home on Dec. 3.

Fraley paid \$50 for one home on Wednesday, according to county records. Fraley also paid for some rental units on Thursday, Niels said.

Rural residents petition to block private landfill

TWIN FALLS — Residents southwest of Twin Falls have started a petition drive to stop a Boise company from building a landfill near their homes.

"Would you want one near your property?" asked Charles Blass, who farms 320 acres near the proposed site.

Dispose-All Inc. has petitioned the Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission to change the zoning designation in the area from agricultural to industrial.

Traffic, dust, smoke and odor are among the problems Blass fears a landfill would bring. He also worries about flood water escaping from the landfill into the nearby Salmon River Canal Co. canal.

Roads in the area are not strong enough to handle large garbage trucks, Blass said.

Mary Jones, whose property adjoins the proposed facility, said she has collected 28

signatures on petitions against rezoning the area to let in a landfill. Jones said she will get more people to sign.

The company wants to build a landfill between 2700 and 2800 North and between 2600 and 2700 East in Twin Falls County. The property — about 600 acres — lies southwest of Twin Falls and sits about six miles south of the Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport.

Dispose-All would buy the land from Loughmiller Farms, but the sale depends on the company getting the zoning changed.

The Twin Falls County Commission decided last summer that landfills are not appropriate for the agricultural zone, so Dispose-All must get the area rezoned. A public hearing on the request is scheduled for January 14 before the Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission.

The company's proposed site lies not far from where the county has found acreage for a new landfill.

Columbia Sun, a company that makes quick-frozen "loose shred" hash brown potatoes, will become UFF's third plant. Universal, Twin Falls' largest employer, also operates a plant in Pasco, Wash.

No purchase price was disclosed for the Columbia Sun operation.

"This acquisition will provide Universal Frozen with significantly enhanced product development capabilities," said John Pool, president of UFF. "In addition to the current business base, Columbia Sun will provide expansion capability into new product lines and business segments."

UFF is a subsidiary of Universal Foods Corp. of Milwaukee.

Pool said UFF planned no changes in Columbia Sun's current operations, which employ 86 full-time workers.

John Betz, Columbia Sun's owner, will also continue to work for UFF.

Columbia Sun pioneered "loose shred" hash browns in the 1980s, a category of specially processed potatoes that has grown steadily, according to a news release issued by UFF spokesman Gary Blakely.

At various times, Columbia Sun's plant has supplied loose shreds to nearly all major frozen potato processors on a co-pack basis, Blakely said.

Columbia Sun also produces diced and sliced potatoes, potato skins and traditional shredded hash browns.

UFF is a subsidiary of Universal Foods Corp. of Milwaukee.

Schwinn says \$40 million buyout offer low, wants more bid time

CHICAGO - Schwinn Bicycle Co. said a \$40 million buyout offer is low and wants time to get more bids.

Zell-Chilmark Fund L.P. of Chicago and Scott U.S.A. of Ketchum offered Monday to pay \$40 million in cash for Schwinn's trademarks, customer lists, contracts, inventory and records.

The potential buyers expressed no interest in Schwinn's only remaining U.S. bike manufacturing plant, in Watertown, Wis., the company's distribution centers or Chicago headquarters.

That offer, the best Schwinn has had so far, expires Dec. 24.

Ned Post, president of Scott, said his company, which manufactures and distributes ski and bicycle equipment around the world, is pleased with the marketing aspects and dealerships of Schwinn.

"We see an opportunity for a very good fit," Post said. "We think its brand name is one of the best in the world."

He added Scott's ski business provides 20 percent of the firm's sales, while the Ketchum-based company is doing in excess of \$100 million in business between the American and European sales. Scott's overseas firm is based in Freiburg, Switzerland.

Post added although Schwinn appears financially shaky that fact doesn't overly trouble Scott.

"We think its market position is good, but falls on hard times," he said. "Management could have done better."

On Wednesday, Schwinn asked a U.S. Bankruptcy Court judge to allow bids until Feb. 1. It said there are more than 30 prospective buyers.

Schwinn attorney Dennis O'Dea suggested that Chicagoan Samuel Zell was trying to pre-empt higher

offers with its Christmas Eve deadline.

"There are others who will be willing to pay more," O'Dea said. David Schulte, a general partner of Zell-Chilmark, said the early deadline was needed to allow the partnership to place orders with Asian manufacturers in time for spring sales.

Arnold Dratt, retained by Schwinn to try to turn the company around, said prospective buyers need at least through January 15 to study Schwinn's books and decide whether to bid.

Schwinn filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection Oct. 7, citing a huge debt and sluggish sales.

Post said if Scott is successful in its buyout, it could not predict what changes the Ketchum firm would make or whether jobs would be created locally.

"I could paint a bunch of scenarios," Post said. "But it's far too premature."

City must produce money to maintain ice boom

SALMON (AP) - If Salmon residents want to continue use of an ice boom to protect the Salmon River, they must match the Army Corps of Engineers funding for the project.

The estimated cost could be as high as \$434,000, leaving \$218,000 for the city, said the City of Salmon.

The local money can come from other government agencies.

The experimental boom was built and installed in 1989 by the Cold Regions Research and Engineering Laboratory in Hanover, N.H. It was designed to reduce the risk of flooding from the "deadwater" ice jam.

Historically, during prolonged arctic weather, the Deadwater jam has begun 26 miles downstream from Salmon and extended upstream past the town.

When conditions are right, as in 1984, the backed-up water causes severe damage in Salmon.

Hydraulic engineer Kate White said she learned in 1989 the boom had to be reshaped so that it would trap frazil ice, or slush, that forms when temperatures drop to freezing.

During the cold winter of 1990-91,

the boom trapped frazil ice and caused a five-mile ice jam upstream from the town. The five-mile ice cover warmed water temperatures and helped to decrease the production of ice that could be added to the Deadwater jam downstream. The boom is made of concrete and beams strung by cable across the river.

White said CBREL research shows that without the boom, residents can expect the Deadwater jam to reach town every three years. With the boom, White predicts the jam would reach Salmon every 10 years.

There are not always physical signs of child abuse, and welfare workers must walk a thin line between examining children and invading parents' privacy, said Health and Welfare's regional director, Steven Woodworth.

Patricia Decker Mike Wood, attempting to show that Amanda's mother was more likely to have inflicted the fatal blow than Stradley, listed nearly a dozen instances where people either saw Amanda being abused or evidence that she had been injured.

Each of those instances was testified to by at least one witness.

Woodworth said the department has made positive changes in the way it handles child abuse complaints since Amanda's death.

"I just feel sick about this child dying," he said.

A list of recommendations drafted by a citizens' committee earlier this year has been taken to heart, and those ideas are still being implemented, he said.

In addition, the new head of the local division of Family and Children's services, Ed VanDusen, will help to improve that area even further, Woodworth said.

Some of the changes in place or

in the works include more intensive training of child protection workers, linking with medical and law enforcement personnel, implementing child protection teams in each community, and allowing child protection workers to specialize.

The Twin Falls police department also will be looking to improve in the wake of Amanda's case.

Police Chief Paul Du Fresnoe said he and the officers involved in the investigation will review the case within the next few days to see what, if anything, should have been done differently.

"By and large, I thought they did a very good job of handling a pretty technical investigation," Du Fresnoe said.

"It was not an offer of any amount that we could take. We've got a lot more money in it than he offered," she said.

Anyone in the county who opposes the landfill can sign the petition.

"I think that's ridiculous," he said.

Carnaroli, who represented Scorsby, said his client should be acquitted because he was relying on Hansen and the Bank of Commerce that his actions were proper.

"George was calling the shots," Carnaroli said. "John was not in the loop except for picking up the deposits and making out the checks."

Both Runft and Carnaroli said the Bank of Commerce "stood between Hansen and Scorsby and the other banks they allegedly defrauded, by assuring those banks the Ideal Consultants account was solid."

The loan program, in which scores of people in southern and eastern Idaho lent Hansen money at high interest rates, wouldn't have collapsed if the Idaho Department of Finance hadn't found it illegal, he said.

Referring to Hansen's highly publicized battles against federal agencies during his seven terms in Congress, and the prison sentence he served in the mid-1980s for violating financial disclosure rules, Runft said Hansen, like civil rights leaders in the 1950s and 1960s, had been persecuted for his beliefs.

"Mr. Hansen has had one overwhelming message in his life to free the common citizen from overbearing government and to make government more accountable to the common citizen," he said.

But Breitsamer scorned that notion, saying that Hansen continued to solicit loans in 1991 after a court order forbade him to do so.

"That shows contempt for the laws," Breitsamer said. "He would tell you he's above the laws - that he's not playing by the same law you have to."

Runft tried to convince the jury

that Hansen needed to raise large sums of money to fund a series of nationwide television ads.

The ads, which featured 1-800 phone-in polls on public affairs, would both earn income and provide a public service, he said.

Breitsamer, though, scoffed at that project and others for which Hansen allegedly was raising money.

"Those programs were props," he charged. "I submit they were simply means by which defendants defrauded people."

Breitsamer also mocked Hansen's contention that deposits into the Ideal Consultants account were split between different Bank of

Hindu leaders jailed for inciting riots

AYODHYA, India (AP) — Authorities on Thursday banned three Hindu nationalist groups and jailed top Hindu leaders accused of inciting Hindu-Muslim riots that have killed at least 950 people.

Fighting between Hindus and Muslims erupted in Calcutta and other cities Thursday, and the semi-official Press Trust of India news agency said 170 people were killed.

The violence, among the worst since India's independence in 1947, began Monday, a day after Hindu zealots razed a 400-year-old mosque in Ayodhya so they could build a Hindu temple on the spot. The Hindus claim the mosque was built on the birthplace of the Hindu god Ram.

The news agency Press Trust of India said the death toll in the four days of rioting was 950, but the actual number of deaths was believed to be much higher.

Prime Minister P.V. Narasimha Rao, who has been criticized for failing to stop the bloodshed, said Thursday the army was in command in all riot-torn areas and had averted many deaths.

"From day to day, the situation is steadily improving," he said in a television interview. Rao rejected demands that he quit his post. "Why should I? There is no question of resigning at all."

Among those killed Thursday were eight Muslims attacked by a group of Hindus who stopped a passenger train near Surat, in the western state of Gujarat, police said.

A day earlier, 24 people were doused with kerosene and burned alive in Surat, newspapers reported.

As is usual in the Indian press, reports did not identify the religion of the victims or their killers for fear of inciting more violence. But both sides have committed similar outrages. More than 185 people have been killed in Gujarat, a major industrial state.

Four Hindu leaders accused of inciting the violence during speeches in Ayodhya appeared Thursday before Judicial Magistrate K.P. Singh, who ordered them jailed.

Lal Krishna Advani and Murari Manohar Joshi, the senior leaders of the Bharatiya Janata Party, Vishnu Hari Dalmiya, the president of the fundamentalist World Hindu Council, and Uma Bharati, a legislator, were arrested on charges of inciting communal violence. The charges carry a maximum penalty of 11 years imprisonment.

The four Hindu leaders, appearing subdued, were brought to Singh's court in the town of Akbarpur, 37 miles south of Ayodhya. Authorities have three months to file formal charges that would put them on trial.

State-run television identified the banned Hindu nationalist groups as the World Hindu Council, Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh and Bajrang Dal. It said two Muslim groups, Jamaat-e-Islami and Islamic Sevak Sangh, also were banned. It did not elaborate.

On Thursday, army troops patrolled Calcutta's streets, enforcing a curfew with shoot-on-sight orders.

In New Delhi, the curfew was relaxed for two hours in the old section of the capital. It also was eased in the steel city of Jamshedpur in the northern state of Bihar, and in other cities where tensions had eased.

The riots sweeping northern India shattered years of Hindu-Muslim co-existence. In Tando, a cotton-spinning town 30 miles southwest of Ayodhya, Hindus and Muslims had prospered together for 100 years. But after the demolition of the 16th-century shrine in Ayodhya, enraged Muslim weavers took to the streets.

"Muslim passions are inflamed not just here but round the world — it's natural," said Hayat Mohammad, a wealthy 80-year-old cotton trader who is the chairman of the town's government.

About 800 Muslims gathered at a road crossing in Tando and rattled stones on policemen. They withdrew after four crude homemade bombs were thrown from a three-story house owned by a Hindu.

Double-cross on Yeltsin; will he strike back?

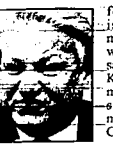
MOSCOW — Russia's Congress double-crossed Boris Yeltsin by voting down his candidacy for prime minister.

Now the legislators had better look out, because Yeltsin has a history of getting even.

Starting now, the president has no reason to make any more concessions to the former Communists who held almost 90 percent of the seats in Congress. And he has every reason to shoo them back to the provinces for good — if he can find a legal way.

Yeltsin had offered his hard-line opponents a deal: Let the brains behind my free-market reforms, Yegor Gaidar, be confirmed as prime minister. I'll let you have final say over four other Cabinet posts.

It was a reasonable, even generous, offer — especially because one of the four posts was

foreign minister. That meant Yeltsin was ready to sacrifice Andrei Kozyrev, the man the opposition loathes most next to Gaidar.

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actually demonstrated confidence in the government.

"Nothing terrible happened," said another minister, Alexander Shokhin. He predicted Yeltsin would simply keep Gaidar as "acting" prime minister, the title he has held for six months.

But there was no hiding the humiliation for Yeltsin and Gaidar.

The vote could also hurt the economy because faith in the government's stability is needed both at home, where inflation threatens to spiral out of control, and abroad, where creditors and investors are wary.

Opponents of reform took their shot. Was it a wise one?

They had four birds in hand, four Cabinet seats they could have determined in the near future.

They went for the one in the bush, Gaidar.

They may well get nothing because Yeltsin's likely response is to refuse to submit any ministerial nominations. His aides say he can keep the entire "reform team" in place until April, when the Congress holds its next session.

And Yeltsin does not forget. Mikhail S. Gorbachev drummed him out of the Politburo in 1988. Just under four years later, he drummed Gorbachev out of a job as Soviet president.

Clearly worried about Yeltsin's revenge, lawmakers tried to insure themselves Wednesday. They passed an amendment that would automatically strip the president's authority if he violates the constitution by, say, dissolving parliament and calling new elections.

But Yeltsin does not have to break the law to break up the Congress.

Russia supporters in the Democratic Russia movement already have begun collecting the million signatures needed to call a referendum on disbanding the parliament. It could be held as early as March.

Republics receive more aid from U.S.

NEW YORK (AP) — With the onset of winter across the former Soviet Union, the U.S. government and private groups are increasing humanitarian shipments to the troubled region.

American contributions toward the immense humanitarian needs of the 15 former Soviet republics have not waned despite the shift in attention to crises in Yugoslavia and Somalia, according to relief officials.

American contributions are still dwarfed by European efforts. But a top Russian relief official had only praise for the U.S. effort. "We are profoundly satisfied with the organization of humanitarian aid from the United States," Pavel Onishchenko, of Russia's Humanitarian Aid Commission, said.

Small town shines brightly for Christmas

PEABODY, Mass. (AP) — They're roadside attractions in many a town — Christmas Houses, where holiday spirit and a love of twinkling lights appear to have overwhelmed the owners' good sense.

In this Boston suburb, it's the LaBrie home, festooned with more than 60,000 lights and surrounded by motorized stuffed animals, storybook and cartoon dolls and Santa Claus.

In Agoura Hills, Calif., it's the Kaplan home with an estimated 120,000 lights, a laser light show, and a fog machine. And in Laurens, S.C., it's the Owens home, which has an estimated 8,000 to 10,000 lights, as well as candy canes and Santas. Why do people do it?

"I don't really know," says Wayne Owens, a 27-year-old bookkeeper at a grocery store, who gets his family's help on the house. "I guess they have the Christmas spirit."

For Owens, it's apparently a matter of love. Whenever he's off, he says, he runs home and puts up more lights.

People on the street stop him and tell him it's "remarkable and it's beautiful and they don't see how I have the time to do it. It makes me feel good. I like to know people enjoy it."

In Agoura Hills, Donald Kaplan, 54, a real estate investment company owner, says his display is getting bigger and bigger by popular demand.

"This was my way of saying, 'Thank you,' to everybody and I just hope that everybody has a good time," he says. "In these rough times that we have been having for the past couple of years, this helps people appreciate the holidays a little better."

"It makes you feel superb to see their faces. That's why you do it. The kids just love it," said Drew Kaplan, 23, who helps his father with the exhibit.

Shirley LaBrie of Peabody says that eight years into her project, she's still getting these random flashes of inspiration when she's shopping and sees something to add to the display.

"When I see something, my mind goes," she says.

Her house in a cul-de-sac on a hilltop in this city of about 40,000 is visited by as many as 4,000 people a night — mostly families with small children — during the height of the season, said her husband, Arthur.

Theory links language's evolution to gossiping

LONDON (AP) — Language evolved so women could gossip, not so men could talk while hunting as had long been thought, according to a theory posited by an anthropologist.

"This would explain our fascination for social gossip in the newspapers and why gossip about relationships, account for an overwhelming proportion of human conversations," said Robin Dunbar, professor of biological anthropology at University College London.

He believes humans need to bond with other humans, and that language is much more efficient than fur grooming, which consumes much of the waking hours of chimps and baboons.

Dunbar said researchers have no way of knowing what tribal women talked about. But he figured that if people today spend so much time gossiping, it's likely our ancestors did, too.

His theory is described in the Nov. 21 issue of *New Scientist*, a British weekly.

"I think it's a lovely hypothesis that makes a great deal of sense," said Phyllis Lee, a biological anthropologist at Cambridge University.

But Dr. Barry Keverne, a Cambridge University investigator who has studied how animals bond, said Dunbar's theory "sounds highly speculative."

Language has many functions, said Keverne, including passing along vital information from one generation to the next and educating people. "That certainly is not gossip."

For years, scientists assumed language developed so men could talk while hunting. But Dunbar does not think they "chatted much," and that hunting developed long before talking.

In an informal study of conversations in a university coffee room, Dunbar found that people devoted about a third of their time to talking about people who weren't there — in other words, gossiping.

First you lay down a layer of cotton quilt batting to simulate snow, then you arrange the little houses, school, churches, businesses, train track, ice skaters on the pond, holiday carolers, evergreen trees, mail trucks, pink Cadillac convertibles loaded with gaily wrapped packages, etc., etc., until you've created the most charming winter village that ever was. Small bulbs illuminate the inside of each building, casting their soft glow over the snow outside the windows.

contemporary, with Coca-Cola logos on the storefronts, to the Middle East, in the form of a complete town of Bethlehem, circa the first Christmas Eve, including the Nativity.

Such scenes have been around for 20 years or more, but in the past three years they've just exploded in popularity. You can pick up pieces at the higher end of the price range at department and specialty stores, or scrounge through the discount and drug stores for villages for less.

"At a Wal-Mart, Christmas manager David Rongish was busy restocking shelves with pieces of several holiday village lines after selling out of some lines.

By the time you do all the landscaping, with various snow-covered evergreens, shrubs and leafless deciduous trees with tiny robins perched in their branches, and all the holiday decorating with tiny strings of exterior lights, the Salvation Army bell ringer and Santa perched on a rooftop, you can very easily run into the big bucks.

People typically start their collections with a building that reminds them of something in their life.

"They'll always start as a rule with something that means something to them, such as their church; the little church that looks like their church. Then they'll buy their school, then they'll buy the little town, the house that looks like theirs," Lancelot said. "Pretty soon they're collecting the whole thing."

Every year new pieces are added to the different villages in the collections. And there's a continuing market for pieces people didn't buy in past years.

Lancelot first started stocking the little villages more than 20 years ago.

"I think it's something you can have in your home that the entire family enjoys," she said. "The little light in that house, or that little village, gives a tranquilizer effect."

Fighting for grandparents' rights

Couple expects number of cases likely to increase

MILWAUKEE (AP) — The last time Helen and Fritz Ford saw their 6-year-old granddaughter, they took her on a picnic and to the zoo and visited her school.

Such an ordinary outing was three years, many court battles and more than \$10,000 in the making. Before that September visit, they hadn't seen her since Christmas 1989.

"She was perfectly at ease. It was almost like three years hadn't gone by — all kinds of hugs and kisses," recalls Helen Ford, who lives in Janesville, 55 miles southwest of Milwaukee.

"We just spent the day together. We didn't talk about anything or anybody. It was just the three of us having fun," she says. "I will never worry again that she'll forget us."

Less than two years after their son James died after heart surgery, the Fords became embroiled in a bitter court battle for the right to see their son's only daughter. The girl's mother forbade the visits after her new husband decided to adopt the girl. The sole contending visits by the grandparents would confuse the child.

"Even though my son died, my son was still her father, we were still grandparents," Helen Ford says. "I don't think that just because another spouse dies after the adoption of the child the natural grandparents should be shoved aside."

The Fords went to court, using Wisconsin's family visitation law, which allows grandparents to go to court to seek visitation rights even when the children's parents object.

Two state courts ruled that the

grandparents' would lose visitation rights if the girl was adopted by her stepfather, but the rulings were reversed last May by the Wisconsin Supreme Court.

The Fords' fight ended last month when the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the law as constitutional. They can now spend a day with their granddaughter every three months, and after three visits will have a weekend with her every three months, Helen Ford says.

But the high court's rejection of the appeal without comment did little to clarify the grandparents' rights issue for lower courts and for grandparents around the country who are battling to see their children's children, says Linda Balisle, the parents' lawyer. She said her clients did not want to talk about the case.

"I've been on both sides of these cases," Balisle says. "There's no real consensus right now, and there are

so many circumstances it's hard to reach a real conclusion."

The Supreme Court on Oct. 19 upheld a Kentucky law similar to Wisconsin's.

"Right now, because families are changing the rules are changing, and while parents have always had a constitutional right to protect their children, the state legislatures are coming along and saying the grandparents have rights too," Balisle says.

Grandparents' rights laws are likely to undergo changes as the breakup of families continues, says Lucilla Davison, who founded Grandparents Anonymous in Sylvan Lake, Mich., in 1977, when she was having difficulty seeing her grandchildren.

"There are more couples living together and there are always ex-husbands and ex-wives who won't let their child see the grandparents," Davison says.

"They, feel threatened, or there's too much closeness," she says. "They like to think they have complete control over the children."

Davison has answered 150 letters and about as many phone calls this year from grandparents who want desperately to see their grandchildren.

"They can give them some kind of heritage, some kind of link to the past, which a lot of kids don't have anymore," Davison says. "It's important for kids who have that relationship with their grandparents to keep having it. It gives them a secure feeling."

More than 50 groups supporting grandparents' rights came together last July in Washington, D.C., to form the National Coalition of Grandparents.

Legal fees deter many grandparents from seeking visitation rights, says Helen Ford; whose fight cost her family more than \$10,000.

Shoppers turn high-tech, write own greeting cards

CULVER CITY, Calif. — There's more high technology in the cards for consumers — greeting cards, that is.

Greeting card companies are increasingly setting up computer-equipped booths known as kiosks, providing more consumers with the opportunity to create personalized Yuletide messages.

"I want to create a Christmas card for a friend because my friends are really impressed when they see their name on a card," said Raquel Reynolds, 15, while comparing kiosk operations at two card shops at the Fox Hills Mall in this Southern California suburb.

"I like it because it looks professional, even though it's so personalized," said Lynda Plant, an English teacher, as she created a message for a "world-class" friend at the same mall.

The personalized card is not new. Card shops and stationery stores have long offered individualized cards for years. And a number of firms have offered personalized cards for catalogue purchases of a minimum of 25 cards.

However, the computerized greeting-card-producing kiosk is a fairly new approach. In the personalized-card business, and the industry is getting the message; there are big bucks in individualized greetings in the Christmas season.

Sales of personalized Christmas cards have risen 20 percent since 1986, accounting for sales of about \$200 million in 1991. The greeting card industry's total sales were \$5 billion that year.

The two giants of the business — Kansas City, Mo.-based Hallmark Cards and Cleveland-based American Greetings Corp. — are rapidly expanding their computer kiosk

system. Both companies charge \$3.50 for a personalized card. Small and medium-sized greeting card companies are also developing kiosks or software that generate personalized cards.

For example, Boston-based Inscribe Pop Inc. is competing on the East Coast with the "Print-a-Little Message" kiosks, which will write limericks or free verse poetry when told the occasion, the intended's name and two adjectives describing that person.

Although customers do not have complete creative freedom in determining what to write on their cards, Hallmark spokeswoman Sherry Timbrook said that sales of Hallmark personalized cards have exceeded the company's expectations. Hallmark has 900 kiosks in 26 states but plans to have about 1,900 computerized outlets in 50 states by next June.

'The (new) Nutcracker'

Company brings traditional Russian version

TWIN FALLS - Now in his second season as artistic director of the American Festival Ballet, Russian-born Benjamin Kuzmichev is promising an all-new "Nutcracker" this year.

When the ballet opens in Twin Falls this weekend, it will be a ballet based on the traditional Russian version of the classic story of a fantasy world occupied by a naughty brother, a dangerous mouse king and a nutcracker come to life.

Tchaikovsky composed the music, and E.T.A. Hoffmann penned the story. Kuzmichev's classic Russian training and professional work as a dancer and choreographer has blended with both to create a ballet that mirrors the original Christmas tale.

AFB executive director Betty Snow talked about how it all came together in a recent phone interview from the ballet's home base in Boise.

"Benjamin's original choreography is different from the Americanized version of the ballet," Snow said. "The cast is larger, too, and the special effects are more exciting." In fact, some of those special effects are being kept secret until opening night.

All of this has come to life in the brand new Esther Simplot Performing Arts Academy, just south of downtown Boise. The old ice warehouse was purchased

In the fall of 1892, Petipa became so ill that he could not continue his work on the ballet, and he turned its completion over to Lev Ivanov.

During the early 20th century, "The Nutcracker" was rarely performed outside Russia. But, in the mid-1930s, the ballet was introduced to several European companies. Most versions have been true to the original concept, but some have made radical departures.

AFB is celebrating its 20th anniversary with this year's production. Next season, it will be given a new name: Ballet Idaho.

Finally, Hollywood begins to wipe its blacklist clean

HOLLYWOOD - Decades have passed and the Cold War has ended. Yet the blacklist in Hollywood still makes those who lived through it wince, even as efforts continue long after the fact to credit writers barred from working under their real names in the 1950s.

"Front." It's a terrible word. It connotes a kind of sneakiness," said screenwriter Millard Kaufman, 75, who once was a front.

Many would call what he did heroic. In 1950, at great personal risk, Kaufman allowed blacklisted writer Dalton Trumbo to use his name as a front for Trumbo's credits for the film "Guh Cnzy."

"Known" is one of the "Hollywood 10." Trumbo had recently been released from a year in jail for refusing to cooperate with the House Un-American Activities Committee,

which began investigating communist influence in the film industry in 1947. The two writers had met only once before, over drinks, but they shared the same agent, who set up the arrangement.

"I never saw the picture, and I never got a cent for it, or expected to," said Kaufman, who is perhaps best known for creating the cartoon character Mr. Magoo. His screenwriting credits include such classics as "Bad Day at Black Rock" (1954) and "Banting County" (1957).

If discovered, his fronting could have landed him in prison. "I did it for principle, but for God's sake don't write that down," said Kaufman, who was afraid of sounding self-congratulatory. Kaufman was a decorated Marine veteran who fought on Okinawa and Guam during World War II.

"I spent World War II fighting fascism and found it flourishing when I came home. I was

NEW YORK (AP) — Like any other teen-ager, Rob Reiner would come home from school, go to his room and listen to his favorite record. In his case, however, one of the voices on the record belonged to his father, Carl Reiner.

"I'm like a big fan of everything he's done, and when I was a kid he and Mel Brooks were making those '2,000-Year-Old-Man' records. I used to play the second one all the time," recalled the 45-year-old director.

"I always admired him so much. He was the nicest man, a decent man, an intelligent man, and talented, and everybody liked him. He was a great role model for me. He talks the story of when I was very little, I came to him once and said, 'I want to change my name.' And he said, 'What do you want to change it to?' And I said, 'Carl.'"

Well, he's gotten over that. In fact, Carl Reiner might be the one who would change his name these days, because it's Rob who has the big projects, whose friends are some of the biggest stars in the business. Carl, meanwhile, was referred to by some as "Rob's father."

But the younger Reiner hasn't stopped thinking about the past. Six years ago, he released the drama "Stand by Me," which centered on an introverted 12-year-old who feels rejected by his father. It was a film that convinced the director that he was a talented artist in his own right.

"His latest feature, an adaptation of the Broadway hit 'A Few Good Men,' is both a military courtroom thriller and a story about a son living up to his father's name.

But he's frightened to death of striking out on his own," Reiner said.

Reiner has been through that, too. He is one of Hollywood's most successful filmmakers, his close friends including Billy Crystal and Richard Dreyfuss, but he can still come across as the star-struck son, blushing when he notes his father is his biggest fan.

Rob certainly looks like Carl, some twinkling eyes, same broad smile, same lack of hair on top. In interviews, however, they differ: Carl is a born showman; Rob more intropective.

Unlike Daniel in "A Few Good Men," the younger Reiner never failed to take life seriously. For a while, he was even a little too serious, the brooding young boy who stood by and watched while Brooks, Sid Caesar, Norman Lear, Neil Simon and others came over to the house.

Dubbed a "funny kid" by Lear in spite of his shyness, Reiner began acting in high school and by his early 20s had formed an improvisational comedy group with Dreyfuss and Albert Brooks.

His acting career took off in the 1970s when he starred in "All in the Family," but directed in his real dream. After leaving the show in 1978, he began work on a short film that became the cult satire "This Is Spinal Tap."

Released in 1984, "Spinal Tap" was a surprise hit, and Reiner's next film, the romantic comedy "The Sure Thing," also did well. Still, he said, he didn't think he had done anything his father wouldn't have tried.

"Stand by Me" was personal to me and also very different to anything my father had done. 'Stand by Me' is more reflective of my personality of anything I made before or since," Reiner said of the moody, low-budget feature that made more than \$50 million.

"The whole experience of making 'Stand by Me' was very scary to me, because if the audience didn't accept it, they didn't like what I felt was good and what I really had to offer."

Drama may come to him more naturally — he did well with "Misery" in 1990 — but Reiner still makes the occasional comedy. He had a big hit with the 1989 feature "When Harry Met Sally..." and he says his next film, "North," also will have a lighter touch.

The story should sound familiar: a talented 9-year-old who feels unappreciated by his parents.

Powerful cast teams up in top-notch drama

Aaron Sorkin's play, "A Few Good Men," cried out to be a movie.

As a play, various levels of a nearly bare stage depicted a Marine barracks, commandant's office, a courtroom and other locales. But the story was so compelling the audience was able to supply the scenery and furniture.

Now director Rob Reiner has filled in the blanks with scenes of Guantanamo Bay naval base in Cuba (actually... California)... the Washington cityscape, an apartment building, baseball diamond and courtroom.

He and Sorkin also have fleshed out the characters and heightened the drama. With a powerhouse cast, "A Few Good Men" is the most triumphant drama of the year.

Comparison to "The Caine Mutiny" is inevitable, particularly in the climactic testimony of a deranged commander. But "A Few Good Men" adds value of three lawyer-suits trying to unravel military secrecy to save two enlisted men from life sentences.

The duty-minded Marines are charged with murdering another crew member who had complained to congressmen about his treatment at the base. The defense, a pliant bargainer who never has tried a case (Tom Cruise), a businesslike lieutenant commander (Demi Moore) and a sensible family man (Kevin Pollak).

The defenders are faced with what appears to be a sure conviction.

Their only hope is to prove that officers at Guantanamo had authorized a Code Red, an illegal killing of Marines who did not live up to the corps' high standards. The lawyers visit the base and encounter a fierce enemy, Col. Nathan R. Jessup (Jack Nicholson). He swears the intruders and declares that no Code Red existed.

But is he lying? And is there any way to prove it? That is the possibility the three lawyers pursue. Courtrooms provide surefire movie drama, and "A Few Good Men" presses all the buttons. Cruise turns masterful and Nicholson delivers the desired testimony.

The supporting cast delivers admirably. Pollak, Kevin Bacon as prosecutor, Kiefer Sutherland as a fanatical officer, J.T. Walsh as Nicholson's assistant, and particularly James Marshall and Wolfgang Bodison as the defendants.

"A Few Good Men" is a Castle Rock film released by Columbia Pictures and produced by Reiner, David Brown and Andrew Scheinman. Rating is R, mostly for language. Running time: 115 minutes.

Actress says she campaigned for movie role

LOS ANGELES — A smiling, confident Demi Moore, dressed in pantsuit that is not painted on, strides into a Los Angeles hotel suite trailed only by her 4-year-old daughter, a nanny and a publicist.

"Hey, wait a minute... there's the hairdresser, the makeup person and fashion consultant? Where are the agent and personal manager? Where are the bodyguards? Where are the exotic pets-and-animals-trainers-the-personal-trainer-and-chef? Where are the half-dozen assorted assistants, and lackies that go with any self-respecting movie star entourage?"

"Sorry, this is it," the actress shrugs in a mock apology. "The person I'm used to is used to the disappointment on journalists' faces when she walks into a room. So much has been written about her entourage, her contract demands and her pushiness on the set that people expect to be greeted by a Hollywood monster."

"I had one experience on a film ("The Butcher's Wife") that unfortunately set the negative tone for this whole image," said the actress, who stars with Tom Cruise and Jack Nicholson in the military courtroom drama "A Few Good Men," which opens today.

On the set of "The Butcher's Wife," which did not do well at the box office, Moore said "she complained about the script and direction. But she says the film confirms what she was trying to say. "Unfortunately, they were doing a Vanity Fair piece on me at the time and some things appeared in print that started this whole image," she said. "If I was out there complaining that my trailer wasn't big enough or that my lunch was late, then maybe people might have come to say those things about me..."

"But I guess the time is the best revenge," she added with a sigh of resignation. "That's how Bruce (husband Bruce Willis) and I have approached the stories on our marriage. They keep writing that our marriage is in trouble, and we get our revenge by having a long, happy marriage. We keep laughing in there."

Like many other movie stars, Moore, 29, dreamed of the bright lights as a shield against a childhood of constant moving around and having to meet new friends. Her father was an advertising executive for a newspaper chain and the family moved as often as twice a year.

"I had a tremendous need for attention as a child, and a kid like that has two options. You can hide and become completely anti-social or do what I did. I was desperate for a sense of belonging so I adopted different characters wherever I went. I didn't want to be special. I just wanted to fit in."

After her parents split up when she was 12, she and her mother moved to West Hollywood. Moore got into the drug scene and quit school at 16, earning money on the side with modeling. At 18, she married an unknown rock 'n' roll musician named Freddy Moore.

In 1982, she got her big break when she was cast on the daytime soap "General Hospital," playing reporter Jackie Templeton. She made her major film debut two years later in "Blame It On Rio."

During the lengthy filming in Brazil, her marriage disintegrated. By the time she was performing in "St. Elmo's Fire," she was living with Emilio Estevez. In 1987, she and Estevez broke up and she married Willis.

Three years later, she realized the stardom-and-attention-first-primed-in-"St. Elmo's Fire"—when she was cast opposite Patrick Swayze in "Ghost." The sleeper hit launched her into the same superstar strata as her husband, who enjoyed a similar launch with "Die Hard."

But in recent years, Willis' career has leveled off, and Moore's star is rising. Her husband has been quoted as saying he would kill to work for a

prestige director such as Rob Reiner (whom Moore worked for in "A Few Good Men"). But she wasn't Reiner's first choice for the role of naval officer Joanne Galloway, and she admits she worked hard to get the role.

"If campaigning means you do whatever it takes to give yourself the best chance of getting something, then, yes, I campaigned for this role," she said. "In this case, it meant going in and reading for the part, which wasn't easy because I was 8½ months pregnant, and some of those scenes were very difficult. I thought I did well, but I didn't know if Rob liked me."

Reiner said he auditioned many actresses for the role. In fact, every actress in town wanted the part because many think that role and a couple of others in the film have Oscar written all over them.

"I needed somebody who had emotional strength and power," Reiner recalled. "Someone who projected intelligence and also had built-in sexuality because there is no sex in the film. Without a romance, you at least need a sexual undercurrent between the characters. "It's hard to find all that in one person, but Demi, by far, gave the best reading of anybody."

Battle with leukemia doesn't slow 10-year-old blues musician

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — With a man and his dog against leukemia behind him, 10-year-old Nathan Cavaleri has every right to write the blues from his electric guitar.

But the diminutive star says life hasn't been all that bad, and it's getting better all the time.

Nathan performed at the 1991 Australian Music Awards, opened for two of Australia's biggest acts during a recent tour and jammed with idol Mark Knopfler of Dire Straits twice. His yet-unfilled debut album, including six original songs, is scheduled for release in March 1993.

More importantly, the cancer has been in remission two years, and doctors say there's only a 10 percent chance of recurrence.

"It was a bit of bad luck," Nathan said with a wisdom far beyond his years. "Now, I'm happy and healthy. My wishes are over."

But tempted by fantasies of playing with Knopfler at a packed house or owning a convertible, his easy, contagious smile breaks through and Nathan is fit and wistful once more. "Then again..."

Maturity and youthful exuberance meld easily in the lean 4-foot, 70-pound frame that's a study in intensity on stage. Learning over to make the guitar whine, sing and cry, Nathan plugs into the music and the crowd in a way that can't be taught.

This is no off-key, fumble-fingered performance at a school assembly. This is flat-out, no-holds-barred talent on a trimmed-down Fender Stratocaster.

"I think it's just something I've got," Nathan said. "I just close my eyes and I play and everything I feel goes into my guitar."

Parents Frank and Joanne are blues fans, though Nathan insists he would have been drawn to the style anyway. His father, a builder who has played in local gigs, began letting Nathan, not long out of diapers, sit in on his garage jam sessions.

For his third birthday, Nathan got a half-sized acoustic guitar. Within a year, he was cranking out a variety of tunes.

Then at 6, severe back pains led to a diagnosis of leukemia. Two years of chemotherapy followed.

Joanne Cavaleri said Nathan used his guitar to cope with the fear and pain.

"Kids who come down with something like leukemia often feel a lot of anger and confusion," she said. "He was so involved with his music that he channeled all that into positive things. It was a little mind-over-matter."

The Starlight Foundation, a group that grants wishes to seriously ill children, arranged a meeting with Knopfler.

"You're great; you're unbelievable," Knopfler told Nathan, then 7, as the two played together in London. "You'll have to get your own band. I know you'll be the leader because you've got a very strong will, like me when I was young."

Knopfler, who gave Nathan a blue Fender Stratocaster that remains his most prized possession, also provided tips and motivation.

By the time Nathan met Knopfler again last year, he could wind his way through the intricacies of Dire Straits' "Sultans of Swing."

"Mark couldn't believe Nathan

had gotten so much better," Joanne Cavaleri said.

She said she and her husband walk a fine line of providing support for Nathan's music without pushing.

"I think that because we came so close to losing him, we want to make sure we're not doing this for us, just for him," Joanne Cavaleri said. "He truly loves it. People kept telling us that he would spend a half-hour or an hour in the studio, then get bored. But he's at the studio five or six hours at a time and not just when he's doing his bit."

Nathan's record company, Mushroom, was uncertain whom to target — his young peers, the teens who mob him after performances, blues fans, or older folks who have seen Nathan on daytime TV.

"We decided we just have to do what he wants and enjoys, and hope

people like it," Joanne Cavaleri said. Nathan sounds like any 10-year-old, with no sign of ego problems. He plays Nintendo and hangs around with friends. School's going well. He sees his immediate future in music but also wants to be a bulldozer, like dad.

"I just don't talk about myself; what I am doing, or when I'm going to be on TV," Nathan said. "I might go overboard and get a really big head."


He perks up at the prospect of groupies, but his naivete is refreshing. Although one of his favorite songs is Dire Straits' "Money for Nothing," he was surprised to learn he had misheard the line "money for nothing and your checks for free." "Really? I thought it was 'your checks for free,'" he said.

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Disney releases prove 'toons aren't just for kids

ORLANDO, Fla. — On a recent weeknight, while those around them lined up to see adult thrillers such as "Passenger 57" and "The Bodyguard," mortgage brokers Dana and Donna Wickersham waited for tickets to "Aladdin."

"That's right, a Disney animated film. Or, in street parlance, a cartoon. I wanted to see 'Beauty and the Beast' but he didn't want to," said Donna Wickersham, referring to her husband. "But when I heard about 'Aladdin' and then when I saw clips and heard Robin Williams (the genie's voice), I said, 'I gotta go see this.'"

Not far behind the Wickershams were 36-year-old Kevin Thomas and 32-year-old Donald Ressel of Orlando, followed by two 19-year-olds stationed at the Naval Training Center.

Not your typical audience for a Disney cartoon.

But there's a movement afoot. Animation, once considered Saturday-morning fare for kids, is broadening its appeal. These days, the matinees for Disney features are full of children; the evening shows are full of adults. And on television, animated shows such as "The Simpsons" and "Ren & Stimpy"

have children and adults tuning in for their weekly fix of laughs and wisecracks. There's even a new cable network devoted exclusively to cartoons.

Some call it a nostalgia trip — a chance for baby boomers to gloriously relive the days when they watched Fred Flintstone on television and "101 Dalmatians" in the theater while downing jumboes and throwing popcorn in their sister's hair.

But at Disney, animators have been carefully cultivating an adult audience since the 1983 debut of "Who Framed Roger Rabbit?"

"This is a crossover that's been in the making," said "Aladdin" director John Musker, who also directed "The Little Mermaid." "It started with Roger Rabbit."

Indeed, in "Roger Rabbit," with its groundbreaking combination of live action and animated cartoons juxtaposed on screen together, Disney came up with a story that appealed to cartoon-loving kids but also had definite adult appeal.

particularly in the form of Jessica Rabbit.

"The Little Mermaid" came along in 1989 and brought more women into the Disney fold. Still, however, it failed to reach men. But when "Beauty and the Beast," Disney's 1991 blockbuster hit the theaters, adults began buying tickets.

And not just adults with children. Suddenly, there were couples "Fragrances on date," even college kids.

"I think with 'Beauty and the Beast,' Disney proved that adults could go and not feel condescended to," Musker said. "With 'Aladdin,' we've built on that. And I think Robin took that to a new, contemporary sensibility."

But, some say, "Aladdin" is no typical cartoon. With its enchanted storyline combined with Williams' bolshoi blue genie who transforms himself into everyone from William F. Fading footsteps

2 decades after Apollo 17, moon and Mars seem further away

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Twenty years later, the words still chill Harrison "Jack" Schmitt, one of the last two men on the moon.

"This may be the last time in this century that men will walk on the moon," President Nixon declared after Schmitt and Eugene Cernan roared off the lunar surface on Dec. 14, 1972.

Schmitt has never forgiven Nixon for that remark and says he never will. "Whether that turned out to be true or not, it was an inappropriate statement for the president of the United States to make," he said. "What's worse, it's proving to be true."

Twenty years after Apollo 17, the last of six manned lunar landings, NASA's plan to send astronauts back to the moon and on to Mars is up in the air. There is no funding for the Space Exploration Initiative this fiscal year and, as Cernan sees it, no vision, no challenge, no deterring-idea.

"We're talking about a generation ago having gone a quarter-million miles into space, a generation ago, and yet today we don't have the capability to go more than 300 or 400 miles from the surface of this Earth," said Cernan, who commanded Apollo 17.

Cernan, Schmitt and Ronald Evans left Earth on a mighty Saturn 5 rocket on Dec. 7, 1972. Four days later, as Evans orbited the moon in the command ship America, Cernan became the 11th man to walk on the moon. Schmitt was No. 12.

The last footsteps on the moon were those of Cernan.

"We leave as we came and, God willing, we shall return with peace and hope for all mankind," Cernan said before following Schmitt into the lunar module for the third and final time.

"The mission and arguably NASA's greatest era, ended Dec. 19, 1972, when the Apollo 17 spacecraft splashed down in the Pacific Ocean."

"We used to say Apollo 17 was not the end but rather the beginning," Cernan recalled. "The problem is, neither Jack-Schmitt nor I nor Ron Evans ever dreamed that the beginning would be a generation in coming, and maybe it isn't here yet."

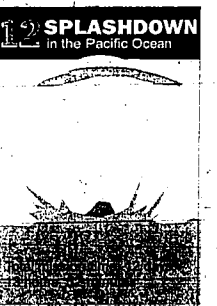
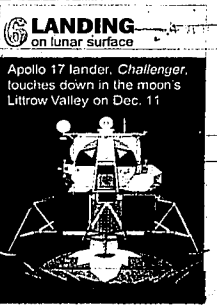
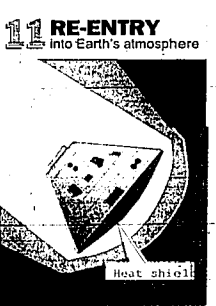
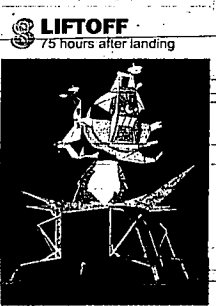
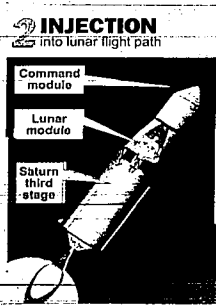
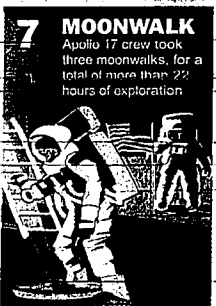
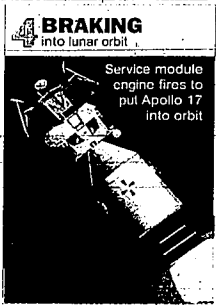
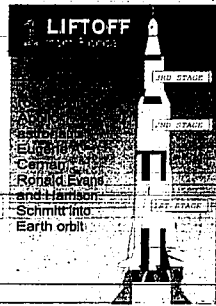
Cernan wonders what people will say 100 or 200 years from now "when they look back at the order and sequence we did things in."

"We went to the moon and somehow forgot to keep going," he says.

There's been Skylab and Apollo-Soyuz and the shuttle. Around the turn of the century there probably will be the orbiting space station Freedom. But that's as far as American space travel goes.

Although President Bush in 1989 proposed colonizing the moon early in the next century and later sending astronauts to Mars, little progress has been made due to lack of funding. Congress refused to fund the Space Exploration Initiative, or SEI, in the budget year that began Oct. 1.

Michael Griffin, NASA's associate administrator for exploration, had planned to use most of the requested \$2 billion to start building the first in a series of robotic lunar probes, precursors to human settlement. He had been aiming for a spring 1995 launch. "We'll be at least a year later on that and that assumes we get funding" for the next fiscal year, Griffin said. "We're not going to be going to the moon or Mars or indeed anywhere unless there is some added money for NASA. Those things don't come free."



NASA's budget this fiscal year is \$14.3 billion, slightly less than last year's.

It's not just the federal deficit that is hurting SEI, Griffin said. It's the way money for space is appropriated by

Congress, and politics, too — Democratic members of Congress were reluctant to support the Bush

administration's exploration plans, he said.

Space policy analyst John Pike of the Federation of American Scientists blames the withering moon and Mars support on Bush and Vice President Dan Quayle, head of the National Space Council. He said neither Bush nor Quayle ever asked the two fundamental questions: "Why are we doing it and how are we going to pay for it?"

Bush had set a goal of having astronauts on Mars by the year 2019, the 50th anniversary of Apollo 11, the first manned lunar landing.

"My disappointment with the SEI program is that the work they have been doing has primarily focused on how you're going to do it rather than why you're going to do it," Pike said.

The how — for Mars, anyway — has focused on nuclear-powered rockets. Nuclear propulsion could cut travel time to the Red Planet by nearly half — 300 days round trip, including a 14-day stay, as opposed to 500 days via chemical rockets. It's assumed such a venture would be international in scope.

NASA plans to use space station Freedom, once it's built, to test Mars flight equipment and astronaut endurance. Space officials doubt Freedom will be of much use to lunar base planners.

Setting up camp on the moon, though, is a necessary stepping stone for Mars, Griffin said. The current plan is for astronauts to initially spend 45 days on the moon, with the stints gradually getting longer and longer.

"I think it's a crazed notion, from an engineering viewpoint, to go directly to Mars without resuming travel to the moon," Griffin said. "It's a three-year affair away from home and if we do that next we won't have been to the moon for three decades and the last time we went to the moon we were limited to three days. There's just too big of a gap."

Although it's too soon to say how the Space Exploration Initiative will fare under a Clinton administration, most political and space experts believe the program will be shelved for economic reasons, at least for a while.

Preliminary estimates by NASA put the cost of a lunar base and human expeditions to Mars at \$400 billion to \$500 billion over 30 years. Griffin believes it could be done more cheaply, but is reluctant to specify a price or timetable.

To avoid cost overruns, Griffin has pledged to limit the robotic lunar missions to \$100 million each, including launch expenses. At least three missions are planned.

Jay Greene, flight dynamics officer for Apollo 17 and now Griffin's deputy, targets the year 2005 for the next human moon mission, at least in theory. "Once we get the dollars, five to seven years and we're there," Greene said. "It's a function of when the dollars start to flow."

Space exploration advocates envision astronauts mining the moon and erecting giant observatories for viewing the universe. Those views would not be obstructed by atmosphere as they are on Earth — the moon is airless.

Such ideas enthrall NASA's 89 astronauts, many of whom joined the space program in hopes of one day going to the moon and Mars.

"It's just those dreamy things that you have in the back of your mind that motivate you, and then you do the real things that are practical," said Michael Foale, who will make his second shuttle flight in the spring.

Junk litters moon

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Going to the moon? Forget the jumper cables.

The 12 Apollo moonwalkers left \$517 million worth of equipment behind, including three moon buggies. But none of it is thought to be reusable.

Space experts believe the machines and tools have been ruined by the extreme swings in lunar temperature — from 250 degrees Fahrenheit in sunlight to minus-250 degrees Fahrenheit in shadow.

It might be best, in fact, to avoid Apollo relics altogether. Some of the items, like five mortar grenades used for seismic studies and five nuclear-powered science instruments, still could be dangerous.

Among the more expensive lunar leftovers: Six lunar module landing stages and wreckage of six ascent stages. Total cost \$270 million.

Three battery-powered lunar rovers costing a total of \$6 million.

Twelve life-support backpacks worth \$3.6 million.

Television and still cameras valued at \$3 million to \$5 million.

The moonwalkers, loaded down with rocks for study back home, discarded the equipment to keep the lunar module as light as possible for liftoff. They even tossed out their boots and bags filled with garbage and human waste.

Other castoffs, though, had nothing to do with saving weight.

Each pair of moonwalkers planted a U.S. flag on the lunar surface. The flags were stiffened with wire in order to fly unfurled in the airless vacuum.

The first and last set of moonwalkers left plaques bearing President Nixon's signature.

The plaque left by Apollo 11's Neil Armstrong and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin reads: "Here men from the planet Earth first set foot upon the moon July 1969, A.D. We came in peace for all mankind."

The plaque left by Apollo 17's Eugene Cernan and Harrison "Jack" Schmitt reads: "Here man completed his first exploration of the moon, December 1972, A.D. May the spirit of peace in which we came be reflected in the lives of all mankind."

There are silver medallions bearing the thumb prints of the family of Apollo 15's James Irwin and a photograph of the family of Apollo 16's Charles Duke.

Lots of moon dust memories for astronauts

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — There's so much more they wish they could have done, and said, during their 75 hours on the moon.

"You do a lot of things you don't plan to do," said Eugene Cernan, who as Apollo 17 commander left the last footprint on the moon 20 Decembers ago. "Yet there are a million things I wish I had done: things I forgot to say or tribes I forgot to make or pictures I forgot to take."

For Cernan and Harrison "Jack" Schmitt, 75 hours just weren't enough on the lunar surface, even though that

was longer than the 10 previous moonwalkers stayed.

They spent more time outside their lunar module — 22 hours — and covered more distance in a lunar rover — 22 miles — and brought back more moon rocks — 244 pounds — than anyone else. "To go a quarter of a million miles away into space and have to take time out to sleep and rest for 75 hours straight," Cernan said.

"I knew when I left I'd never have a chance to come back."

Cernan, now 58 and a Houston businessman, remembers those three days well. It was his third and last space flight and his second trip to the moon. His first moon mission was Apollo 10; NASA's final dress rehearsal; he got to within nine miles of the Sea of Tranquility. "I wanted to go back," Cernan said. "I wanted that last 50,000 feet." The Navy pilot landed the lunar

module Challenger in the valley called Taurus-Littrow on Dec. 11, 1972, with Schmitt at his side as Ronald Evans circled the moon in the command ship. The time on Earth was 12:55 p.m. MST. "When we shut down that lunar engine, I guarantee you there has never been a quieter moment in my life," Cernan said. "In that whole three days, I don't think there's anything that became routine ... But if I had to focus on one thing ... it was just to look back at the overwhelming and overpowering beauty of this Earth."

Schmitt, now 57 and a business consultant in Albuquerque, N.M., recalls the sun being "brighter than any New Mexico sun you can imagine" and illuminating the 7,000-foot-high mountains fringing the valley. At the same time the sky was the blackest of black and in its midst was "this remarkable, marbled blue and white planet."

As the first American scientist in space, Schmitt, a geologist, appreciated the moonscape all the more. It was his only space flight. He went on to become a U.S. senator. "It is a scene and a vision that one can only have when you're there."

Evans, who also flew in space just that once, died of a heart attack in 1990 at age 56. He called going to the moon "the best experience I ever had in my life."

The only bad part, at least for Cernan, was the selfishness he felt for having all that beauty to himself.

In a humble attempt to share, Cernan drew the letters "TDC" with a finger on the dusty gray surface of the moon near the parked rover just before he climbed into the lunar module for the third and final time. Those were the initials of his only child, Teresa Dawn, then 9 years old. It was a spontaneous gesture, one of those things he hadn't planned to do.

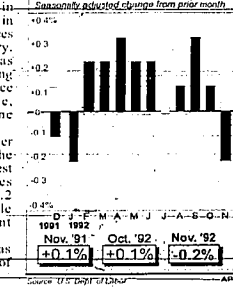

Playing the flip side

Richard Dean Anderson breaks away from good-guy image

HOLLYWOOD — After playing the unconventional hero MacGyver for seven seasons on ABC, Richard Dean Anderson knew what his next career move would be: a project that would break him away from his good-guy image "as positive as it is."

Thus, his villain role in "Through the Eyes of a Killer." The psychological thriller, which also stars Marg Helgenberger ("China Beach"), is Anderson's second post-"MacGyver" project. Last spring for CBS, Anderson starred as a detective who falls for Justice Bateman in the adult thriller "In the Eyes of a Stranger."

"Through the Eyes of a Killer" was originally titled "The Master Builder," Anderson, 42, isn't thrilled the network changed the name. "It's like they've got a franchise on the 'Eyes of...'" he said, laughing. "Is there something about my eyes? What's the deal here?"

In the new "Eyes" movie, Anderson plays

Ray Bellano, a contractor with a "questionable past," who becomes involved with the woman whose apartment he is renovating. Though she is legally bound by his contract, she cools their relationship. Bellano, though, doesn't want the romance to end.

A producer friend, Anderson said, brought him the script.

"She said, 'You got to do this. This is the one that is going to help (break away from MacGyver). It was a great set. The director, Peter Markle, is my hockey buddy. We skated on a team together last year. We are both from Minnesota and we are sort of bonded by the skates.'"

Anderson saw the film at a recent screening. "It's really fun," he said, at the same time admitting he wasn't crazy with his performance. In fact, he usually is critical of his own work.

"I don't know why that is because I love (acting)," he said. "I think aside from being an incurable cynic and maybe a little jaded, I am not sure." Perhaps it is because, Anderson said, he keeps "going through these little

reality checks about my relative abilities (as an actor). After a screening and you are standing in the foyer (of the theater), people are saying, 'You're great. You're great. What are they going to say? If people were blatantly honest, which is no one will ever be in this business, then I would feel a lot better (about my performances).'"

He did get a compliment of sorts from one of the producers during the filming. "There are some sequences where I really had to slip Marg around," Anderson recalls. "After we were shooting a sequence, I rolled off Marg and the producer said, 'I am not letting my kid watch this,' totally destroying the MacGyver mystique."

Anderson, though, hasn't abandoned the clever hero. He will star in and produce two "MacGyver" movies for ABC. "The first is set to go in front of the cameras sometime next year."

The CBS movie airs from 8 to 10 p.m. Tuesday on KMVT and CBS stations.

Classy production explores challenges of terminal illnesses

It's a TV tradition to have at least one holiday season weep-arama to temper all the jolly goings-on. This year's best is clearly CBS' "A Christmas From Holly," an inspirational drama about two close friends facing the challenges of a terminal illness.

This is a classy production: one of TV's best writer-producers, Belati Polson, written by one of TV's most insightful scenarists, Daniel O'Neil, and starring two of the medium's most talented players, Lindsay Wagner and Shelley Long.

Kate Barnes (Long) is a hard-driving business executive who has found little time for any personal life in her rise to the top. Her only intimate friend is Holly Caulfield (Wagner), a college

chum who's as free-wheeling as Kate is tightly wound.

But when she gets a message from her longtime friend she immediately flies to Holly's remote ranch in the Southwest.

"Holly is dying of cancer, and she wants Kate to raise her daughter, Jennifer," Long says. "It's typical of Kate that she doesn't bat an eyelash and says, 'Yes.' She jumps in heart and soul."

It's not that simple, of course, in this poignant drama of change and letting go.

"Kate's a successful businesswoman, energetic, good humored, and not particularly domestic," Long says. "She'd rather attempt to shoot a duck than cook one. In the opening scene she goes on a duck hunt to salvage an account. She doesn't know what she's doing."

When she quickly agrees to raise Jennifer, Holly tells her it's not a business deal. She needs to give it study and care. Kate takes a six-month leave of absence, the time the doctor has given Holly to live. During this time, Holly, a sculptor, is consumed with finishing an excellent project.

"During this time she will learn to be a mother to Jennifer," she says. "It's a transference of motherhood. Holly wants Kate to raise her daughter, yet it's difficult for her to let go. It's hard for her to see Kate taking over her role. Kate comes on like a super hero, approaching motherhood as she does business. That gives Holly more missivings."

"Holly has to let go of her daughter and her life. She has to let go of her friend, still, they hang on to their sense of humor.

It's great for me that Kate is a comic relief. I love playing a fish out of water. I'm the city slicker at the ranch. She sees Kate going to change."

Holly, emotionally depressed, withdraws to feverishly complete her sculpture. This forces a major confrontation between Kate and Holly.

"This is really about relationships," Long says, "and within the context of this relationship these women are able to cope with a loss through love. It doesn't really focus on death—Kate focuses on assuming motherhood, Holly on letting go and Jennifer on transferring to a new mother."

A Message From Holly airs from 8 to 10 p.m. MDT Sunday on KMVT.

Brooks to sing national anthem at Super Bowl

Brooks, the country singer who has been one of the nation's hottest music stars, was named Tuesday to sing the national anthem at the Super Bowl on Jan. 31 in the Rose Bowl at Pasadena.

Among the others who have performed the national anthem at the NFL's championship game are Diana Ross, Barry Manilow, Wynton Marsalis, Neil Diamond, Billy Joel, Aaron Neville, Whitney Houston and Harry Connick Jr.

Brooks also will, in cooperation with the NFL, perform at two shows Jan. 29 at the Forum in Inglewood to benefit a community youth project in South Central Los Angeles.

Brooks was in Los Angeles at the time of the riots this year and later, along with Stephanie Davis, wrote a song about the unrest, "We Shall Be Free."

'Roseanne' new Tom Arnold show lift ABC

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Roseanne and Tom Arnold delivered a one-two punch for ABC, with the couple's tandem pair of sitcoms leading the network to victory in the weekly ratings contest.

ABC reclaimed the No. 1 spot it held for most of November with a 13.1 average, according to figures released Tuesday by the ABC, Nielsen Co.

ABC was second with a 12.7 average share, followed by NBC with 10.5. Each ratings point represents 931,000 home ratings point represents the most-watched program on television. The debut of Tom Arnold's "The Jackie Thomas Show" — in which he plays a dense TV star

ranked second in the Tuesday night time slot behind "Roseanne."

CBS' newsmagazine "60 Minutes" finished third, followed by two more ABC sitcoms, "Home Improvement" and "The Nanny."

"The Man Upstairs" a CBS TV movie, scored with a sixth place showing. Another Sunday night movie, "National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation," followed in the seventh spot.

Two more sitcoms, ABC's "Full House" and Murphy Brown" on CBS tied for eighth place. An ABC TV movie, the Christmas-themed "To Grandmother's House We Go," rounded out the top 10.

TV Guide offers on-screen listings via cable systems

RADDNOR, Pa. — It's hard to catch a wave when you're channel surfing. Wouldn't it be nice if your TV would tell you what's really on? Then you wouldn't have to wait, or figure out which section of the newspaper has the TV listings.

Several companies think they have the answer. Among them is TV Guide, which on Wednesday introduced its "TV Guide on Screen" service at a cable-television trade show in Anaheim, Calif.

The company will test its new service early next year on a Denver cable-television system.

The service will deliver two days of television listings directly to subscribers' TV sets, so they can call them up with a remote control. And, when they flip from one channel to another, the system will display the name of the program that is on, even if a commercial is being shown at that moment.

Eventually, according to Brian Margolis, director of TV Guide's electronic programming unit, the service will provide seven or more

days of programming information, give detailed program descriptions and capsule reviews, and act as a tool to help program a VCR. It will also call a viewer's attention to programs the viewer may want to see, based on information the viewer can provide to a database.

In the future, he said, the system may show previews of the programs.

Here are the catches: You have to be a cable subscriber to get the service. And even the stripped-down service may increase your basic cable subscription cost.

Here's how the service will work: By satellite, TV Guide will send the program data to the cable-television system, which in turn will send it to subscribers electronically, using the same cables it uses to deliver the programs. The information will be stored in new converter boxes, now being developed by Jerrold Communications of Habersham, Pa., a subsidiary of General Instrument Corp.

Once the information is in the box, viewers will be able to call it to their screen using the same remote-control they use to operate the other functions of the converter box.

Waterson: Public may hate good stuff

NEW YORK — Sweet, sad-eyed Sam Waterson contemplates the perilously fragile existence of "I'll Fly Away" without anger or resignation.

"It could be true that the American public hates good stuff, but I can't believe that," said Waterson, who heads a fine ensemble cast in the touching and deeply powerful drama of the 1950s South and its people.

Waterson plays lawyer Forrest Bedford, a virtuous man in troubled times. Regina Taylor plays Lilly Taylor, his forthright housekeeper, who works for civil rights. Their lives are separate, parallel yet somehow intertwined.

Waterson knows his show is one of the best on TV. It has won the People's Choice, Humanitas and Peabody awards, and 15 Emmy nominations this year. It's in its second season, and it's far from being a hit.

"People have come to have very low expectations about commercial television, and it takes time to convince our potential audience that they might find something that they'd like," he said.

There is a great deal to like about "I'll Fly Away," which tries to show how it was to live in those early years of the civil rights movement, when racial justice finally emerged as the biggest test of our culture.

NBC orders 3 episodes of 'I'll Fly Away'

NEW YORK — NBC ordered three more episodes of "I'll Fly Away," its critically acclaimed but low-rated drama last Friday, hours after an influential viewers' lobby renewed its campaign to save the show.

In addition to the three-episode order, NBC pledged that after the show's Christmas and New Year's Day pre-emptions, "I'll Fly Away" would have a four-week run in its 10 p.m. Friday time period.

"This is just a very nice little reprieve and it doesn't change the overall picture," said Dorothy Swanson of Viewers for Quality Television, the Fairfax Station, Va.-based TV lobby. "It eliminates some excuses."

"Take a look around the world, ready," he said. "The whole world is becoming this gigantic melting pot and America is its first crucible, where it's being figured out," he said.

"And one reason we make a virtue of it? Or are we going to regret the good old days when everybody looked the same and to which there is no going back?"

"Waterson is proud of the show's treatment of racial tension and conflict, and he believes the series treats the civil rights movement as a living process, not as history.

"I think maybe it also says, since this much can also be accomplished in one generation's lifetime, maybe that is an indication that the same again can be accomplished in maybe less time, since we know, a little bit, the way

why his series has not caught on with wider viewership.

He said NBC, in trying to find a time slot where "I'll Fly Away" could survive, first flourished, may have moved it around so much that viewers can't find it.

"We're not NBC's only problem, and I think they've shown tremendous guts to stick with us," he said.

"And I think we've sort of returned the favor by delivering very good stuff. But I don't think the real test has happened yet, which is that we'd be on for a steady amount of time in a single place, at an appropriate hour."

And when would that be? "Sunday night at nine," he replied. "That won't happen, of course. But any night, steadily."

Linda Dano, one of the strong actresses on "Another World" for many years, is also embarking on a highly dramatic storyline that involves her descent into

alcoholism. Although alcoholism may have been explored many times in soaps, the writer and producers stressed that there will be a new angle on the cause and effect of excessive drinking. "Felicia (Linda Dano) can't get it together after the trauma of the brutal murder of her husband, Lucas, and she begins to drink," Ms. Sloane said. "She has been a strong woman who has learned to cope with almost anything, but this time, she can't deal with the loneliness and we will see her going through the various stages of alcoholism. We will also focus on how her daughters feel about all this. Jenna (Alla Korot) becomes an enabler because of her protective nature while Lorna (Alicia Coppola) is confrontational—these three line actresses will have a lot to play. Felicia even falls asleep while smoking and her feather boa catches fire and she almost dies."

Ms. Sloane said Felicia's problem will focus on how much family means to people who get lost in the abyss of drinking. She said that all the writers have studied the research on drinking, so this storyline should make a connection with the audience.

From the sound of it, Ms. Dano may finally get some juicy scenes to send to the Emmy committee next year and, who knows, the talented actress may finally win a Best Actress Daytime Emmy.

USA airs world-class thriller Wednesday

Every now and then, the USA network comes up with a world-class thriller to make up for all those dumb "woman in jeopardy" movies it usually schedules in its series of Wednesday night premieres.

This week's "Past Midnight," the network's final original of 1992, is one of them.

Directed in demonic style by Jan Eliasberg from a diabolical script by Frank Norwood, "Past Midnight" is an authentic heart-stopper that will keep you guessing right up to the suspenseful finale.

Eliasberg not only kicks the movie up several notches over his standard third level, but also pioneers new territory for the network in terms of language and explicit sexual candor. This is definitely not something you'll see on any of the networks.

Natasha Richardson plays social worker Laura Matthews, who's intrigued by her latest client, a paroled murderer named Ben Jordan (Rutger Hauer) who has just spent 15 years in prison for butchering his pregnant wife during a drunken rampage. Her task: Find him a job in the more Washington state community where she works.

This isn't a cry. Jordan's crime was particularly cold-blooded—he even filmed his wife's demise—and potential employers shy away from him as if he were Satan

incarnate. Jordan doesn't exactly help his cause either with his heavy dose of "attitude."

Still, Matthews is impressed to learn Jordan was an exemplary prisoner and actually earned a master's degree in psychology by correspondence course. She's ten more impressed by his IQ: a genius level 146. She tells him a man with a 146 IQ certainly ought to have something to give society.

The deeper Matthews probes into Jordan's past, the more confused she becomes. How could a man as fall-down drunk as he was on the night of the murder still manage to stab his wife with almost surgical accuracy? What about the court testimony of a retarded boy who claimed he saw someone else enter the house that night? Could Jordan be innocent?

Director Eliasberg has made masterful use of the woody Washington setting—the movie seemed to take place entirely in a steady rainfall—and rendered a movie that's both terrifying and mystically beautiful. The Dutch actor-Hauer—was born to play these kinky, sinister types and Richardson, the daughter of Vanessa Redgrave and the wife of Richard Gere, has never been more appealing.

Though "Past Midnight" has some story improbabilities, you won't pay them any mind. If you relish effective thrillers, they don't come much better.

Last call for 'Cheers'

Paramount, creators turn out lights on top-rated NBC sitcom

HOLLYWOOD — For TV viewers, it's farewell to one of prime time's few dependably witty comedies. For NBC, it's another devastating loss as the reeling network sinks deeper into a quagmire.

The end of "Cheers" was increasingly likely — it's been on since 1982 — but the announcement that it would close its doors next spring is setting off reverberations nonetheless.

When it first arrived on NBC, starting slowly in the ratings, "Cheers" was considered a long shot by many industry observers who felt that a weekly show about a bunch of people in a bar would never last.

But when Paramount and the program's creators — James Burrows, Glen Charles and Les Charles — announced Monday that it was last call for "Cheers," the show had accumulated 111 Emmy nominations, more

than any other series in TV history. It has earned 26 Emmy Awards, tying "Hill Street Blues" and trailing only "The Mary Tyler Moore Show," which has 29.

For years a supreme ratings force in NBC's domination of TV, it is also a power in syndication.

But as NBC's once-impregnable hold-on-Thursdays — led by the now-gone "Gooby Show" — crumbled this season, even "Cheers" began to be affected. Although still a ratings winner, it ranked 35th and 16th in the last two weeks of national ratings.

"We are grateful to our loyal viewers over the years, but we feel it's better to end the series too early rather than too late," the producers said in a joint statement. A studio source said, "Obviously NBC is not doing well in the ratings, and if NBC is dwindling, who knows how much dwindling 'Cheers' would do?"

Joining the creators in the decision to halt the series, which was set in a Boston bar,

was Ted Danson, who has starred in the show since its outset and was reported to make at least \$250,000 a week from the program. In addition to other concessions that raised the speculated amount to as much as \$450,000 a week.

Danson's co-star in "Cheers," Kirstie Alley, who replaced Shelley Long in 1987 and plays Rebecca Howe, said: "All good things must come to an end, and luckily this one is ending while it's still good. It's been the best experience of my life."

Added George Wendt, the quintessential barfly Norm Peterson in the show: "It was pretty much of a mutual decision (to end the series). We've been talking about it all year. But the reality is, it's like somebody died almost. I'm a very sentimental type of guy and probably would never want to leave that kind of a watering hole. It's been a quarter of my life. I hope we were funny."

An NBC spokeswoman maintained that Warren Littlefield, president of the network's

entertainment division, was surprised at the show's coming halt because of the previous arrangements to continue: "Surprise is pretty accurate."

It turned out to be a black Monday for NBC because the network learned that CBS has made an offer to lure away its late-night star David Letterman, and now NBC must decide what to do.

What is devastating to NBC is that, although "Cheers" was aging, the network has lost the one show that it could not afford to lose, especially now that it has fallen from first to last in the ratings. It is without question NBC's remaining trademark series, it has been a frequent Top 10 show and its demographics have been acceptable in the network's drive for a younger audience.

"Cheers," going into its 11th season this fall, and "Wings" were a successful tandem representing NBC's last gasp in trying to hold on to Thursdays, the backbone of the network's six-year reign at the top.

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HBO's 'Legendary Boxing Heavyweights' a knockout

From John L. Sullivan's administration, "The bigger they come, the harder they fall," to Muhammad Ali's, "Float like a butterfly, sting like a bee," HBO has done it again.

Now firmly entrenched as television's foremost exponent of the sports documentary, HBO gives us another winner in "Boxing's Legendary Heavyweights," which makes its debut Tuesday night.

The hour-long show spans 100 years of boxing, highlighting the careers of six champions: Sullivan, Jack Johnson, Jack Dempsey, Joe Louis, Rocky Marciano and Ali. Much of the fight footage you've seen, but a lot of the personal stuff you haven't.

There's a 50-year-old, flabby-chested Johnson giving a boxing exhibition: U.S. Army Sgt. Louis in his World War II uniform, saluting his audience; the wreckage of the plane in which Marciano was killed in 1969, and Ali reading poetry and fidgeting with the bottom of his sports coat while Librarian tickled the ivories. HBO chose as his host one of television's fastest-growing new personalities, George Foreman. If HBO's show is as big as it's star, the ratings will go through the roof while Foreman goes through the floor.

There's a lot of goosebump stuff in this one, and even fight fans are bound to learn a thing or two.

For instance, after Sullivan died penniless on Feb. 2, 1918, grave-diggers hid his body to blast a hole in the ground for him.

"Just as John would have liked it," said Jake Kilrain, who lasted 75 rounds with Sullivan in his last bare-knuckle fight in 1889 before the ring doctor advised Kilrain to throw in the towel or die.

HBO also has excellently restored film of Johnson, his trailblazing, controversial career over, boxing an exhibition at age 50, then speaking to the crowd afterward: "I want to do something good, and out of doing that something good, something good will come to me."

By the time Dempsey came along, film footage obviously had become more easy to come by. There's film of Dempsey convaling with Babe Ruth and, later, at his famous New York restaurant, "Empire 5."

HBO also shows us the infamous picture of Dempsey that purported to show him joining the war effort at the shipbuilding yard. He was wearing workman's coveralls with shiny, new street shoes that obviously had seen no work.

The picture ruined Dempsey's

popularity, and his fans began to wonder, exactly what was he doing for the war? He wasn't in the service. It wasn't until his last fight, the famous long count loss to Gene Tunney on Sept. 22, 1927, that Dempsey regained his popularity.

Next up, Joe Louis, and there was never anyebb in his popularity. This also is where HBO trots out its best fight footage. Louis' one-round knockout in 1938 in the rematch with Max Baer selling a devastatingly.

Later, Louis spent four years in the Army, traveling an estimated 70,000 miles to fight 96 exhibitions for his fellow soldiers. For nothing. Well, not quite nothing, as Louis points out.

"I'm not working for nothing. I'm working for my country," he said, "and that's something."

The saddest piece of film in the documentary ends Louis' era and begins Marciano's. It's not Marciano's eighth-round knockout of an aging Louis on Oct. 26, 1951. It's the shot—of Louis—leaving Madison Square Garden and, before stepping into his waiting limo, taking one last look at his name on the marquee. He never fought again.

Cheap? Marciano once tipped a bellboy \$2 for 16 pieces of luggage. And, in an interview with HBO's trainer, Charlie Goldman calls Marciano "the classiest fellow I ever saw in the ring."

Along with his ferocity and power, he later used that clumsiness to become one of the best heavyweight champions of all time. There's a film of the 1952 fight with Jersey Joe Walcott, another aging fighter, in which Marciano claimed the title with a 13th-round knockout.

There's also a film of the 1956 news conference in which he announced his retirement, and of wreckage near Newton, Iowa in which he lost his life 13 years later.

"From the sleepy '50s, America stepped into the stormy '60s," Foreman says. "An unpopular war ripped the country apart, and at the center of the turmoil was the world heavyweight champion, Muhammad Ali..."

By the time the work was getting smaller, he kept getting bigger," Foreman said. Words, no doubt, written with the host in mind.

Being the most recent of the champions in the HBO show, much of this footage is familiar although worth seeing again.

"I always got the feeling," boxing writer and historian Bert Sugar said, "that he's afraid there's somebody in the world whose hand hasn't been yet."

For this hour of boxing nostalgia, we should all shake HBO's hand.

Durability just begins to tell Jerry Rice story

SANTA CLARA, Calif. — Behind all of Jerry Rice's high-profile statistics and records stands another—overlooked, if overlooked, aspect of the receiver's career: in eight years with the San Francisco 49ers, he has never missed a game.

But his durability just begins to tell the story of how he became the league's all-time leader in touchdown-receptions—six years faster—than —Seattle's—Steve Largent, whose mark Rice eclipsed Sunday with his 101st touchdown catch in a 27-3 win over Miami.

"He has all the natural gifts that go along with getting in the end zone," said executive assistant R.C. Owens, known for his leaping "Atley Oop" catches for the 49ers during the 1950s and early '60s.

"He has three gears, and by the time he's in his third gear, most guys are still shifting out of first."

Rice, the 49ers' top draft choice in 1985 out of tiny, Mississippi Valley State, caught the record-setting from Steve Young with 8:56 left. He beat J.B. Brown on a 12-yard slant pattern.

"No way that defensive back could've separated me from that ball," said Rice, who admitted the pressure of the record chase had taken a toll on him.

"Now, I can go out next week and have fun on the football field."

For Brown, though, getting beaten by Rice was nothing to be ashamed of.

"He's had a lot of victims in his career," Brown said, adding, "I knew they'd find a way to get him the ball. Rice is unquestionably a great receiver. I take my hat off to him."

And at 30, he's still in his prime.

"There's going to be an astronomical number of touchdowns

when he's finished," guard Guy McIntyre said.

Rice, who as a youth used to catch bricks tossed by his father as the two built houses in Mississippi, said he'd like to play for years to come.

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Why play on Thanksgiving?
