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Jerome's plea leaves council cold

With roads open, Guard pulls out of Jerome

JEROME — The Air and Army National Guard loaded up their equipment and left Jerome County Thursday after spending nine days helping open snow-clogged roads.

Gov. Cecil Andrus ordered the Guard into the county on Jan. 25 after a series of storms had blocked miles of rural roads and strained the capacity of the Jerome and Hillsdale highway districts to open them.

The Guard cleared 75 miles of roads, using 22 men, five loaders and two blowers.

"All roads are open," Thomas McKay, Jerome County's disaster service director, said Thursday. "A few are still one-lane, but we've widened most of them. There were a few farmers who couldn't reach hay stacks, but we couldn't help them out, even though we wanted to, because the hay was on private land."

There was some drifting snow Wednesday, but we believe the Hillsdale and Jerome highway districts will be able to keep up with it now," he said.

Anderson, who is being reassigned to the 1st National Guard Readiness Center in Washington, D.C., said, "This has been a good way to set in concrete what the real mission of the Guard in a state is supposed to be."

City crews have been clearing snowbanks along streets in the northeast section of Jerome in an attempt to prevent flooding in the event of a rapid thaw.

BOISE — Jerome County won't get \$100,000 in federal grant money to help dig itself out of last month's monster snowstorm.

Not yet, at least.

In a telephonic conference call Thursday, the Idaho Economic Advisory Council put off a decision on the county's application for the grant. It may take the county officials time to develop a detailed budget for their snow-clearing operation.

But several members of the council, which advises the Idaho Department of Commerce, were reluctant to give Jerome County any money at all, for fear of setting a bad precedent in the middle of what is a relatively heavy snow season statewide.

They also found it hard to understand why Jerome County and its two highway districts needed the federal money, especially since all the county's roads have at least one lane cleared, partly with the help of the Idaho National Guard.

"You're talking to someone who can't sympathize very much, because we have this problem all winter," said council member Dale Lavigne, from the north Idaho community of Osburn. Lavigne's drugstore was nearly crushed by heavy snow last month.

Idaho can apply for a total of \$300,000 in Community Development Block Grants. Council members feared that if Jerome County receives one-third of that amount, other counties with snow-removal problems will quickly demand the rest.

But Thomas McKay, Jerome County's emergency services director, insisted that his county's situation is unique and dangerous.

Jerome County's problems began on Jan. 12, when 17 inches of snow — nearly four times the average snowfall for a month — fell on top of six inches already on the ground. Then strong northeast winds blew the snow into 10- to 12-foot-high drifts, blocking most of the north-south roads.

County crews repeatedly plowed the roads, only to have drifts cover them up again. As a result, many roads are about the width of a snowplow and bordered by snow walls 10 to 15 feet high.

Family leave bill breezes through Senate

WASHINGTON — The Senate overwhelmingly approved a bill Thursday guaranteeing workers up to 12 weeks unpaid leave for childbirth or family sickness, pushing this year's first major social legislation toward President Clinton's signature.

The Senate approved the so-called family leave bill by a 71-27 vote after three days of debate. Voting in favor were 55 Democrats and 16 Republicans; two Democrats joined 25 Republicans in opposition.

Idaho's Republican senators, Larry Craig

and Dirk Kempthorne, were among those voting against the measure.

The house was expected to give final approval late Thursday, allowing Clinton to sign the bill this morning.

He had asked Congress to hurry in the measure, which was vetoed twice by former President Bush.

In addition to granting workers up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave for the birth of a child or a family health emergency, the measure ensures they have the same job, or an equivalent post, when they return. Companies with less than 50 workers are exempt.

Before its final vote, the Senate defeated a GOP attempt to give employers more say when employers could take half days off for medical emergencies. That provision, identical to one tacked on by the House, went down 59-39.

With final action, the family leave bill would be the first legislation to pass the 103rd Congress as well as the first to hit Clinton's desk.

Because of Bush's vetoes, Democrats said the bill's quick passage would demonstrate the end of legislative gridlock, now that their party controls both Congress and the White House.

In addition, since it's designed to help working families, Democrats said it held additional symbolic value as an indication of Congress' priorities this year.

The House passed the bill late Wednesday. It got temporarily sidetracked as the Senate took a four-hour respite to debate a Republican-led effort to block Clinton's plan to lift the ban on gays in the military.

Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole of Kansas shot back at those who scolded him for forcing the says debate. He said the family leave bill won't become law for six months so bringing debate "I don't think is going to delay the country to a stop."

'Motor voter' measure wins House OK

WASHINGTON — The House, in another step toward enactment of a long-stalled Democratic agenda, passed legislation Thursday that would allow voters to register by mail or when they apply for drivers' licenses.

Brushing aside Republican objections that the legislation would open the door to wide-spread electoral fraud, the House approved the so-called motor-voter bill 259-160 on virtually a straight party-line vote.

Idaho's congressman split on the bill. Republican Mike Crapo voted against it and Democrat Larry LaRocca voted for it.

The bill, which is expected to win easy passage in the Senate later this month and be signed by President Clinton, was almost identical to legislation vetoed by former President Bush last year. Proponents hope it will increase voter participation in elections by streamlining the registration

process. Higher voter registration generally helps Democrats at election time.

The bill would require states not already doing so to offer voter registration by mail and in person at motor vehicle bureaus, unemployment agencies and other offices providing social services.

It also would prohibit states from removing a person's name from a voter registration list for failing to vote.

GOP bid fails to stall gay ban

WASHINGTON — The Senate on Thursday rejected a Republican attempt to thwart President Clinton's efforts to lift the ban on homosexuals in the military.

By a 62-37 vote, the Senate turned aside a GOP-sponsored measure that would have restored the 50-year-old ban on gays as it existed before Clinton announced his compromise with Democratic congressional leaders last week.

Instead, the Senate adopted a non-binding resolution that leaves intact the changes Clinton implemented, including temporary suspension of the formal discharge of homosexuals from the military.

Clinton also ordered the recruiters stop asking applicants about their sexual orientation.

The president, who promised during the campaign to lift the ban, was forced to retreat during the first week of his presidency in the face of widespread Democratic and Republican opposition.

Idaho's Republican senators, Larry Craig and Dirk Kempthorne, were among the 37 voting in support of the measure.

Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole of Kansas had predicted defeat but vowed Republicans eventually would prevail on the divisive issue. "I happen to believe that mainstream America recognizes bad policy when they see it," he said.

Clinton has ordered Defense Secretary Les Aspin to draw up an executive order on lifting the ban by July 15. The Republican legislation would have required Clinton to get congressional approval before any policy change.

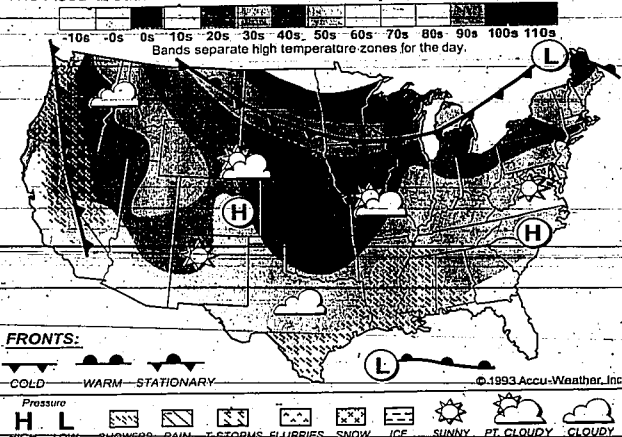

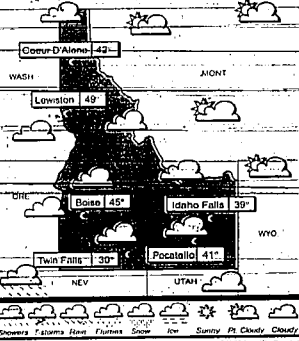

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the mobile home and wandering through the muddy desert in rain, sleet and snow. She found the road about dawn Monday and flagged down a motorist on Interstate 70 at noon.
 By the time sheriff's deputies reached the spot where she and her husband and the mobile home were found, about six miles south of the interstate, they were gone.

 Those snow falls are dangerous, said Patrick Frischmuth of the state Bureau of Disaster Services, not only because they block visibility at intersections but also because they leave no place to plow any new snow that falls.

After rocky start, Clinton seen learning from early mistakes

WASHINGTON — After two weeks in office, President Clinton is working to smooth rough edges and ruffled feathers.

His "refocused attention" onto less inflammatory issues — from welfare to campaign reform — and even gotten the phones to work.

All but the harshest critics agree Clinton is settling in and learning from his early mistakes.

"It's hard to argue that we did things perfectly in the first week," said White House Press Secretary Doc Dees Myers. "But a lot of the moving-in pains are easing."

After the early days turbulence from the chaotic move to the White House and an unwanted skirmish with Congress over lifting the ban on military gays, Clinton was navigating in calmer waters.

He held high-profile meetings on health care, welfare reform and campaign financing — and made overtures to organized labor and governors.

And he dramatized the work on his

economic package by inviting the Cabinet to Camp David and holding daily sessions with economic advisers.

After eluding prematurely with Democratic leaders over his plan to lift the ban on gays in the military, Clinton made two goodwill trips to Capitol Hill this week to cement ties with Democrats.

He also announced he'll meet Hill leaders every Tuesday — alternating between just Democrats and bipartisan delegations.

"His presidency got off to a bad start. But he's already shown the damage doesn't have to be permanent," said University of Virginia political scientist Larry Sabato.

"All this week he's been on message and scored direct hits on welfare reform, campaign financing, and other subjects."

Clinton himself told budget workers Wednesday, "I may not do everything right, and I can't do everything that's just popular in the

short run. (But) we're trying to set an example for the people that sent us here."

Clinton and his high command, laden with baby-boomers who grew up in a high-tech age, were

worked to modernize what they described as a dysfunctional computer system.

"When I got to the White House, guess what I found?" Clinton told governors. "Same phone system Jimmy Carter had. With technology that was put in during Kennedy's time and changed only to put push buttons instead of dials."

"The E-Mail, no conference calls, but anybody could pick up the button I was talking on — anywhere in the White House — and listen in on the conversation."

"An antiquated White House switchboard — jammed since Inauguration Day — got a partial facelift. Now, a taped message gives callers an alternate number."

Clinton's image-makers also now are borrowing from the Reagan playbook: focus on one message each day.

White House Communications Director George Stephanopoulos drastically reduced his own live TV appearances — deciding, perhaps, that too much exposure was interfering with conveying the day's message.

That doesn't mean all is going smoothly now.

Trial balloons sent aloft by the administration filled the skies over Washington.

Suggestions of an energy tax draw special-interest lobbyists in droves to oppose it well before its release. And hints of limits on Social Security benefits — one of the most popular U.S. programs — threatened to mobilize an always-potent army of retirees.

While Clinton "made some tactical errors early on," they're "no irreversible," said Leo Ribuffo, a George Washington University political scientist. "It's common stuff. But it's not fatal."

There's also culture shock: "All of a sudden you're expected to govern. There is not a writing period to find out how things work," said Tom Griscorn, a White House aide during the Reagan administration.

Not all ex-GOP staffers are so charitable. "The place is filled with inexperienced people," groused longtime-Reagan confidant Lyn Nofziger. He added, "Clinton is still low on the learning curve."

Measure calls for streamlining, tightening control over lobbying

WASHINGTON (AP) — A corporate lawyer seeks a lawmaker's help in a battle against a burdensome regulation.

The head of an interest group talks strategy with a Senate aide over lunch.

A direct-mail firm solicits hundreds of letters opposing a bill.

These are the typical chores of the modern Washington lobbyist. But under current law, none of them is classified as lobbying. The lawyer, the interest group director and the direct-mail firm all are exempt from registering as lobbyists and reporting on their activities.

"There's considerable leeway in the current laws," added Robert O'Brien, spokesman for defense giant McDonnell Douglas. The company, which does nearly \$9 billion a year in business with the government, currently has six staff members who deal with Congress — none of them registered as lobbyists.

"There are thousands that don't register," said John L. Zornack, a lobbyist for small businesses and author of a lobbying handbook.

This year, with the winds of reform blowing, Sen. Carl Levin hopes to change that. The Michigan Democrat on Thursday introduced a bill that would tighten government oversight of lobbying at the same time

consolidating a welter of current rules to make it easier for lobbyists to comply. A similar bill is being sponsored in the House by Rep. John Bryant, D-Texas.

"The public has a right to know who is being lobbied, by whom, and how much they are being paid," Levin said.

Vice President Al Gore appeared with the lawmakers at a Capitol Hill news conference to lend the Clinton administration's support. "We're committed to reforming the way our government does business," Gore said, standing alongside Sen. William Cohen, R-Maine, and Rep. George

Gekas, R-Pa., who also are sponsoring the bill.

The proposed new restrictions would broaden the definition of lobbying to better reflect current reality. Gone would be exemptions for lawyers, for lobbying congressional aides (as opposed to lobbying members of Congress themselves), or for lobbying executive branch officials. Indirect efforts to influence the government, such as ginning up floods of mail, would be included as well.

The proposal also would require for the first time that lobbyists disclose roughly how much they spend to

influence policy-making. But in what some regard as a weakness, lobbying reports would be filed just twice a

year, instead of quarterly as under current law. And lobbyists would be required to report only which agency or committee they contact, not the names of individuals.

Gekas said his aim is to shed light on special-interest activity, not to curtail lobbyists' First Amendment rights. "Many special interests are the only connection we have with our constituents back home," he said.

After government lobbying is Washington's largest industry. Estimates of those directly or indirectly involved in persuading, pressuring and cajoling policy-makers run as high as \$8,000. Yet just 7,381 people are currently registered under the law widely ignored 1946 law that regulates the domestic influence business. Another 800 firms, many

with dozens of individual lobbyists on their payrolls, are registered with the Justice Department under another law as lobbying agents for foreign countries and companies.

One reason for the small number of registrants is that the 1946 law together with several other stopgap measures adopted since is riddled with exemptions, to the point where compliance is seen as voluntary. And in the nearly five decades since the main lobbying law was enacted, no one has ever been successfully prosecuted for violating it.

Congress has tried on and off for decades to tighten public disclosure of lobbyists' activities, which have a shadowy public image. But all efforts have failed, often torpedoed by the lobbyists themselves.

Experts back vaccination method

ATLANTA (AP) — Immunization experts said Thursday the United States should follow Britain's example in tracking down all the preschool children Clinton wants to vaccinate for free.

British newborns are automatically assigned a doctor and a social service worker to ensure they are immunized, while many infants in this country leave the hospital and don't see a doctor again for years, the specialists said.

"In the United Kingdom the responsibility for the child is not solely the responsibility of the parent," said Dr. Walter Orenstein,

immunization director for the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. "They make their system more user-friendly."

Immunization experts from the CDC and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation meeting here said Clinton's proposal that the government distribute free childhood vaccines means unvaccinated youngsters under age 2 must be found in a hurry.

"You still have to get that vaccine into a child, and that doesn't automatically happen," said Dr. Watson of A.L. Kiddy Court, a \$2.3 million Johnson Foundation program

to find innovative tracking methods.

Orenstein said the CDC has told Clinton administration officials they need a tracking program. The Atlanta-based agency will offer ideas for finding preschoolers and create a national registry of immunization records, he said.

All U.S. children must be immunized to enter public school. Doctors recommend they get the shots by age 2, but fewer than 60 percent do. And only about 10 percent in inner-city neighborhoods get immunized, though most already get free shots from the government because they are poor.

Americans take to electronic tax filings

WASHINGTON (AP) — More Americans are filing electronic tax returns this year, and crooks are still scheming to beat the high-tech system, the Internal Revenue Service said Thursday.

By Jan. 31, 2.1 million couples and individuals had filed returns electronically, up from 1.15 million, or 6 percent, from the same period a year ago. The IRS already has found more than 350 fictitious returns and has blocked 98 percent of the phony refunds claimed.

"The IRS won't let a few criminals spoil the benefit of electronic tax

filings for millions of honest taxpayers," said Mike Dolan, the agency's acting commissioner. "If you think you can misuse the system because the technology makes it a quick crime, you had better think again."

The IRS expects 14 million returns to be filed electronically this year, compared with 10.9 million in 1992. Electronic returns, filed through selected transmitting companies; result in considerably fewer errors than paper returns, reduce IRS paperwork considerably and produce refunds three or four weeks faster

than conventional returns.

With those benefits come new efforts to cheat the system. In 1992, the IRS found 12,000 fraudulent electronic returns and was able to block nearly 70 percent of the phony refunds, worth \$22 million. Still, more than \$11 million worth of phony refunds were paid.

The IRS said it is working closely with electronic-return preparers to detect fraud schemes. As part of its long-range computer modernization, the IRS has improved its ability to match taxpayer names and Social Security numbers.

Ruling protecting endangered species sends Texans into dither

SAN ANTONIO — The farmers are angry. The ranchers are furious. The City of San Antonio is in a dither, predicting that it could lose thousands of jobs, and warning that its citizens might be able to baille only twice a week.

The environmentalists are victorious, with the preservation of the endangered fountain darter and the Texas blind salamander all but assured.

There is dark talk of a conspiracy by neighbors to the north, a "Chinatown" plot with a Texas twang.

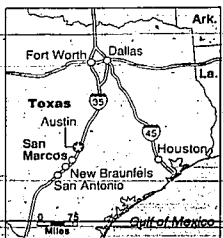
All-in-the-name-of-water. The furor has been raging since a federal judge in Midland, Texas, ruled Monday that, to protect four species of endangered plants and animals, the flow of underground water to two Texas springs must be assured at all times, even in droughts. This raises the prospect that San Antonio could lose more than half of its water supply.

Though the two springs are miles from the city, they are fed by the giant Edwards Aquifer, the only source of drinking water for San Antonio and, until now, a seemingly inexhaustible and free way to irrigate farms to the west.

In his ruling, U.S. District Judge Lucius Buntin said that in times of drought, San Antonio might have to cut the amount of water pumped from the aquifer by as much as 60 percent.

"Think about a world where you are only allowed to take a bath twice a week," said Mayor Nelson Wolff at a news conference Wednesday.

"Think about a world where you

have to get a judge's permission to irrigate your crops. In an earlier interview, the mayor warned that the ruling could cause great feeling against the Endangered Species Act, which has been under fire because of the spotted owl controversy in the Pacific Northwest.

"This is 10 times more important," he said. "This story has a long history, stretching back to the 18th century when settlers discovered they could find water by poking a hole almost anywhere over the aquifer, a 176-mile long underground lake that spans five counties and is the major source of water for the Guadalupe River, which flows to the Gulf of Mexico."

Pumping water from the aquifer, however, has become a source of contention only in the last generation, as San Antonio grew rapidly to become the nation's ninth-largest city. Farmers and ranchers of the

region have always contended that it is their absolute right to pump as much water from the aquifer as they wish.

Buntin's ruling was made in a suit filed jointly by the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority and the Sierra Club in May 1991. The two invoked the Endangered Species Act in protection of four items — the salamander, Texas wild rice and two tiny fish, the fountain darter and the San Marcos gambusia — as a way of curtailing pumping from the aquifer and thus keeping the Comal and San Marcos springs flowing. Both are growing tourist attractions.

Last year, the Texas Water Commission tried to extend its jurisdiction to the Edwards Aquifer by claiming that the aquifer was an underground river. But an Austin judge overruled the commission, ruling that it was not a river and thus not under the commission's purview.

With the Austin ruling, water became another area in Texas that could come under federal control. In the past, federal judges have taken over administration of the prison and health care systems here. The state is also in danger of having the education system taken away from it by federal authorities if major changes are not put into effect by the end of the school year.

President prays for sustaining hope, reveals thoughts while taking oath

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton asked God for the "hope that it takes never to give up" as he joined clergy and laymen, military leaders, foreign dignitaries and members of Congress and the Supreme Court at the National Prayer Breakfast on Thursday.

Clinton also told the 2,000 participants of his innermost thoughts as he took the oath as president two weeks ago. He noted that at the end of the 35-word oath, presidents have the option of adding four more words: "So help me God."

Clinton said: "And the chief justice was giving me the oath and I was trying to remember the words and I said (to myself), 'You know, when I get to the end I'm going to think of the ringing voice of Washington and Jefferson and Lincoln and the Roosevelts and Kennedy and all the other great presidents through the ages and I will say, 'So help me God with all the strength at my command,' and I did. But deep down inside I wanted to say it the way I was thinking it. 'So... Help me, God.'"

surge over Palestinian deportations. It is an indication of the priority administration attaches to peace-making in the Middle East, Clinton said in a statement announcing the eight-day trip by

Warren M. Christopher. Christopher was optimistic his first overseas mission would succeed. "I think we will see a resumption of the peace process at an early date," he said.

AIDS won't impact most, study says

WASHINGTON — Despite thousands of deaths and an aura of national health emergency, the AIDS epidemic will have little impact on the lives of most Americans or the way society functions, the National Research Council says. A study released Thursday by the council said AIDS is different from historic epidemics, such as the bubonic plague that swept across Europe in the 14th century, claiming victims in virtually every part of society. AIDS is concentrated among gays, drug users, the poor and the under educated, the study said — "socially marginalized groups" with "little economic, political and social power."

Technology targets airline safety

WASHINGTON — A high-technology firm on Thursday unveiled a video device it said could lead to safer and more efficient de-icing of aircraft. Officials of Robotic Vision Systems Inc. of Hauppauge, N.Y., told a news conference the device, now designed to be mounted on airport trucks, is a breakthrough because it can reveal small amounts of ice, even in total darkness, on an aircraft's skin. The company hopes to develop later models for aircraft installation, so the pilots themselves could read the display. The company portrayed the device as more reliable than the methods now employed to detect icing.

GM must pay \$105 million for neglect

ATLANTA — A jury found the nation's biggest automaker negligent Thursday in the fuel-tank design of a General Motors pickup truck and awarded \$105.2 million to parents of a teen-ager killed in a fiery 1989 crash. The Fulton County State Court jury awarded 17-year-old Shannon Mosley's parents \$101 million in punitive damages and \$4.2 million for the value of his life. The parents' lawyer had asked for \$100 million in punitive damages. "The problem is getting this mammoth corporation to accept responsibility," James Butler argued. "Do it for a 17-year-old boy who did not deserve to die."

Kevorkian helps pair kill themselves

SOUTHFIELD, Mich. — Dr. Jack Kevorkian helped a man and woman kill themselves Thursday, the 10th and 11th people the proponent of medically assisted suicide has helped to die. Kevorkian's attorney, Geoffrey Fieger of Southfield, said the two died in a Leaning Rock community on Lake Michigan north of Traverse City. Fieger identified them as an 82-year-old man with pancreatic cancer and a 72-year-old woman with breast cancer. They died of carbon-monoxide poisoning, he said.

First lady helps memorialize victims

WASHINGTON — Hillary Rodham Clinton took part in a memorial ceremony Thursday for two CIA employees shot to death last week near the agency gates. Mrs. Clinton read a letter from her husband to the thousands of employees gathered in an outdoors courtyard at the wooded agency compound in Northern Virginia near the nation's capital. The president was unable to attend because of a long-standing commitment to attend the annual National Prayer Breakfast, she said. The two men were killed Jan. 25 by a rampaging gunman who fired pointblank into cars waiting at a spotlight, to turn into the CIA compound. Two other agency employees and a third man were injured. Police are still hunting for the gunman, who fled in a car.

Defense will re-evaluate savings

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary Les Aspin has asked three defense experts from outside the Pentagon to take a hard look at whether Bush administration defense budgets overestimated long-term savings and underestimated weapons costs. If Bush's figures are deemed seriously off base, that could mean even deeper cuts may be in store for the military. President Clinton has promised to glean \$60 billion in savings over five years from the Pentagon, and use the funds to support other programs. Aspin's appointment Thursday of the outside panel came two days after he instructed the military to identify \$11 billion in cuts for the coming fiscal year. Compiled from wire reports

HONOLULU (AP) — They don't look all that scary. In the rear of the AFC locker room, back behind the 300-pound tackles and the muscle-men linebackers, quietly sit two of the most feared players in pro football.

On the right is the locker of the Buffalo Bills Steve Tasker, flanked by that of the Indianapolis Colts Clarence Verdin.

The two players look strangely out of place, like high school kids who would be asking the all-stars for autographs.

Tasker is only 5-foot-2, 183 pounds. Even so, he's considerably heavier than Verdin, who is 5-8, 162.

But, as opposing coaches know, these two All-Pro special teams stars aren't to be taken lightly. Both Tasker, who shines on kick coverage, and Verdin, who runs back kicks, can be game-breakers. Tasker had 19 special teams tackles and one fumble recovery in 1992. And, in the Super Bowl last week, he blocked a punt to set up the Bills' first touchdown.

yards-per-punt-return-and-20.9 yards per kickoff return this season, ran back two punts for touchdowns, for 84 yards at Miami and 53 yards at New England.

Tasker, making his fourth Pro Bowl appearance Sunday, and Verdin, playing in his second, can appreciate each other's skills.

"Before we played them, we spent a half day working on stopping Tasker," Verdin said. "He can set up a score on you, and he can stop you from getting in position to score."

Tasker said the Bills spent similar time on Verdin.

"We watched every touchdown he ever made," Tasker said. "They (the coaches) warned us that he could win the game." The two see themselves as helping break down some barriers — giving legitimacy to special teams players, and showing that small players can make big plays. "Guys like Clarence and me used to be just regular guys on the team; somebody they would throw in on punts and kickoffs," Tasker said. "But that barrier is falling."

Bills fire GM Polian who helped turn team from loser to winner

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y. (AP) — The Buffalo Bills fired general manager Bill Polian on Thursday, four days after the team's third consecutive Super Bowl loss.

Polian, who announced his own dismissal during a news conference, took over the team in 1986 following a 2-14 season and within three years transformed it into the dominant franchise in the AFC.

He said Bills owner Ralph Wilson Jr. had told him at the start of the season that he planned to restructure the team management.

"As a result, I will be leaving the Bills effective today," Polian said. Polian did not say if the Dallas Cowboys' 52-17 rout of the Bills in Sunday's Super Bowl played a role in Wilson's decision to fire him. He refused to answer questions.

restructuring would not affect coach Mary Levy or the rest of the coaching staff. Officials in Wilson's office at Detroit said he was unavailable.

Polian had kind words for Wilson and thanked him for the opportunity to run the Bills.

"He is a fine man for whom I have nothing but respect and affection," Polian said.

Polian rebuilt the Bills through the college draft, trades and free agent signings. The Bills have been to the playoffs for five straight seasons and have won more games than any other team over the past five years.

After becoming general manager, Polian signed quarterback Jim Kelly and helped orchestrate a three-way trade with the Los Angeles Rams and Indianapolis Colts that brought linebacker Cornelius Bennett to the Bills.

From 1978-82, Polian worked as a scout for Levy, who was coach of the Kansas City Chiefs. He also worked for Levy with the Chicago Blitz in the USFL in 1984 and the Montreal Alouettes in the Canadian Football League in 1976.

"I wish to offer a heartfelt thank you to my colleague, my mentor and my friend, Mary Levy," Polian said. Levy was not in his office Thursday and could not be contacted.

Dallas squabbles over parade date

DALLAS (AP) — There hasn't been this much wrangling over the Dallas Cowboys since Jerry Jones bought the team in 1989, fired Tom Landry and watched the team go 1-15.

Three seasons later, the Cowboys are Super Bowl champions, and discovering — of all things — that ticker tape parades just aren't what they used to be.

The city reiterated plans Thursday to hail the world champions with a parade Tuesday despite protests from a contentious city council that the event shouldn't be held on a school or work day.

The Cowboys last had a parade in their honor on Jan. 16, 1978, one day after beating Denver 27-10 in the Super Bowl.

City council member Domingo Garcia sent Jones a letter, signed by five of his colleagues on the council, asking the owner to reconsider and hold the parade Saturday, Feb. 13.

The Cowboys and Mayor Steve Bartlett, however, said that was impossible because Jones and coach Jimmy Johnson would be at a scouting combine in Indianapolis and players have made prior commitments, including vacations.

"You're going to have a lot of broken hearts," Garcia said.

Ultimately, the thousands of students and the fans who will be working on Tuesday and can't make it downtown, they're the ones who pay those six- and seven-figure

salaries. They were all part of the Cowboys' success.

Dallas Independent School District school board president Rene Castilla said students won't be excused Tuesday to attend the parade. Several cities, such as Washington, D.C., declare the day of the championship parade a bad weather day to be made up at the end of the school year.

Several city council members at a council briefing session Wednesday enthusiastically ripped into Bartlett for approving the date — and for simply approving the parade itself — without consulting them.

Council member Paul Fielding professed amazement about the tone of the dispute.

BYU official will retire in August

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Glen Tuckett, director of athletics at Brigham Young University for the past 17 years, will retire Aug. 31, and will be replaced by Associate Student Life Vice President Clayne R. Jensen.

"It is hard to realize that my 34-year love affair with BYU is coming to a close," Tuckett said. "I am reminded of a quote by Walt Kelly: 'Too soon we breast the tape, and too late we find the fun was in the running.'"

Tuckett, 65, was BYU's head baseball coach for 17 years before becoming athletic director in 1976. When he retired from coaching, he was the ninth most winning baseball coach in the NCAA with a 489-258 (.657) record. He was an assistant football coach at BYU for seven years.

"Glen Tuckett's 17 years of service as athletic director at BYU have been characterized by success such as few other athletic programs have ever seen," said BYU President Rex Lee.

Frost ends round at 66 before Pebble Beach winds whip up

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) — David Frost parlayed a deft putting touch and a break in the pairings into a 66 and the first-round lead Thursday in the Pebble Beach Pro-Am.

"I've never actually seen Pebble play that calm," Frost said after his 6-under-par effort over the Pebble Beach Golf Links. "It was real calm until our third shot on the 18th," said Frost, among the "early starters" in the unique event spread over three Monterey Peninsula courses.

But by the time the group behind him reached the 18th green, "the wind had the flags kicking, bending and blowing," Brooks said following his bogey-free round of 67.

"We were very fortunate in our starting times," Brooks said.



Prosecutors don't need special retirement plan

Imagine you're a bright young lawyer, a couple of years out of law school, and back in your hometown building a practice.

One day, a few of the movers and shakers in your community take you out to coffee and ask you to run for county prosecuting attorney.

If you win — most prosecutors in Idaho are unopposed in the general election — you can expect to hang around for four years, then take your resume on to better things.

The money isn't great by lawyers' standards, but the experience can't be beat. Most prosecutors leave office able to command substantially higher salaries than they could ask before they were elected.

That's why legislation passed by the state Senate Tuesday strikes us as wrong.

The bill would classify prosecutors and their deputies as police officers under the state retirement system. Like cops, these lawyers would be able to retire five years earlier than others covered under the Idaho Public Employee Retirement System, and with substantially higher benefits.

Backers of the bill say prosecutors deserve to be treated like law enforcement officers because they too are in the front ranks of fighting crime.

To us, that's stretching a point. The average tenure for prosecutors in Idaho is less than five years, most of it behind a desk. Cops spend decades climbing their retirement benefits, putting their lives on the line every day.

When a law enforcement officer retires, his pension will more than likely be his livelihood. But after prosecutors leave public service, they can expect to earn a comfortable living for as long as they want to practice law.

Idaho has a relatively generous public employee retirement system, but it's our guess that the prospect of a higher pension won't be enough to keep good lawyers in public service.

What it will do is end up subsidizing the incomes of attorneys, who don't need the money, years after they've left the public payroll.

It would be nice if Idaho counties could pay the best and brightest prosecutors enough to persuade them to make a career of putting criminals behind bars. But in a free-enterprise system, talented people tend to do what they get paid best for.

That's not going to change, no matter how golden the parachute is.

Suppressive government should respect innovators

The world, a wit has said, is divided into two kinds of people, those who divide the world into two kinds of people and those who do not.

I say: The world is divided between those who do and those who do not understand that activist, interventionist, regulating, subsidizing government is generally a servant of the strong and entrenched against the weak and aspiring.

Consider the cases of the Houston jinx operator and of the four men trying to launch the Quick Pick lottery in Denver.

Alfred Santos, 40, appears as the Houston man to become one of those disturbers of the status quo, a man with a new idea. He would run jitney services, particularly in the city's poorer neighborhoods.

Jitneys are small vehicles, usually automobiles or vans, that transport people along designated routes for fixed fares, usually higher than bus fares but lower than taxis. Jitneys often serve remote or low-density neighborhoods, or poor neighborhoods where automobiles may be luxuries, taxes are expensive and reluctant to visit, and municipal bus service does not reach all transportation needs.

Trouble is, Houston has a 69-year-old law proscribing jitneys. It was passed in 1924 to protect the electric streetcar company. The streetcars charged a flat rate regardless of distances traveled, so long-distance travelers were subsidized by short-distance travelers who became customers for jitneys. In Houston, as in many other cities, the jitneys' revenues exceeded the streetcars' lost revenues, indicating that jitneys also attracted customers from taxis, and pedestrians.

Houston's streetcar company sought protection and being strong, got it, partly because most jitney operators were black and primarily served blacks. This pattern of protection occurred in many cities, but in some cities illegal jitney services still flourish.

In 1989 some libertarian lawyers, now functioning in Washington as the Institute for Justice, filed suit on Santos' behalf and as part of a concerted strategy to resuscitate judicial protection of economic liberty. They charged that the anti-jitney law violated Santos' constitutional rights, including his 14th Amendment rights to due process and equal protection of the laws, and to the full privileges and immunities of citizenship.

The Institute concedes (not cheerfully) that government has broad powers to regulate economic activity. But the institute seeks enlightened application of judicial rulings that regulation must be reasonably related to the legitimate promotion of the public welfare. The Institute wants to narrow judicial deference toward government regulation that is anti-competitive both in intent and effect.

Santos is a civil rights litigant who seeks not only seeks opportunity and he is still waiting for a judge to rule on his claim. Perhaps the Institute's four Denver clients will get more expeditious consideration of their attempt to

crack Denver's government-sustained taxi monopoly.

The four men — an African American and three immigrants from Africa — are frustrated by their experience working for the three existing companies, are eager to experience the satisfactions of entrepreneurship, and are determined to bring better taxi service to Denver's poorer neighborhoods. They want to start a taxi company. Trouble is, since 1947 Colorado's Public Utilities Commission has rejected every new application for a license to launch a competitor to the existing companies.

The taxi industry in America grew without significant regulation until the 1930s. Then the combination of rising industrial unemployment and falling car prices brought many new drivers into the industry. Soon there came a wave of regulations restricting entry into the field. The regulations were largely a result of pressure from public transit firms and established taxi fleets.

Today most cities have a fixed number of taxi licenses, or a fixed ratio of licenses to population. A wise government knows just the right numbers, or require, as in Denver, a showing of "public convenience and necessity" to win a license. Such regulations often are perfunctorily rationalized as relevant to safety, but their clear aim is to protect economic entities powerful enough to hire lobbyists.

In 1974 a federal study concluded that regulations restricting entry into the taxi business, and restricting price competition, cost customers \$800 million annually, and that removal of such anti-competitive measures would create 38,000 entry-level jobs. Nineteen years later, both numbers must be even larger.

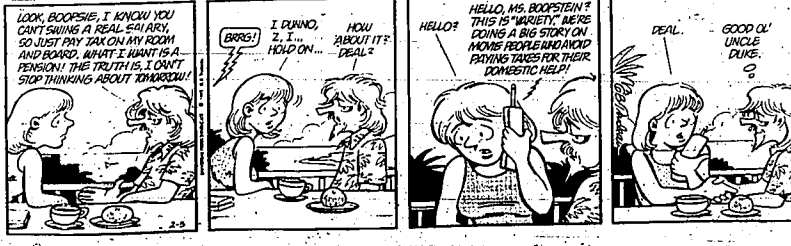
When the four Denver men went before the PUC, two of the three existing taxi firms opposing them shared the same lawyer.

The four men were bombarded by burdensome interrogatives from lawyers. (For example, what was their five-year advertising plan?) Then their application was denied. So the Institute is bringing the 14th Amendment into play.

The world is divided into two kinds of people: those who want to prosper by competing, and those who want to prosper by getting government to cripple their competitors. America is divided between genuine entrepreneurs, and those persons whose entrepreneurship consists of turning government into a dispenser of privilege and injustice.

On the trail of Gen. Morgan

WITH BLACKJACK 15. Over Somalia (AP) — Blackjack 15 is skimming the treetops 25 feet from the ground, his observation helicopter whirling after the warlord, Gen. Morgan.

Blackjack 15, alias Mike Tucker, psychology major turned army pilot, is one of a small band of pilots trying to enforce a cease-fire among Somalia's warring factions.

Morgan, whose real name is Mohamed Said Hirsi, has been attacking the forces of Col. Omar Jess for the past two weeks near the southern port of Kismayu, violating a cease-fire and delaying peace talks.

The Blackjacks are a half dozen OH-58 Scout observation helicopters and a half dozen A-1H Cobra gunships flying in formations of two or more, with an observation helicopter in the lead and gunships trailing.

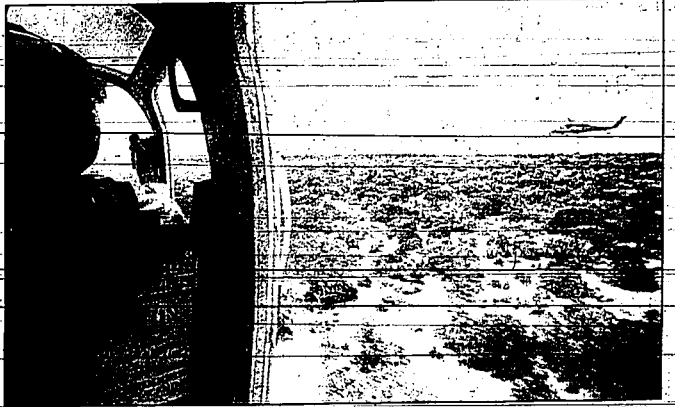
They are from Bravo Troop, 3rd Squadron, 17th Cavalry. The troop has been around since the turn-of-the-century and so has its name, Blackjack. None of the pilots are sure how it was acquired.

All are too young to remember the general who led American troops in Europe in World War I, and later in a punitive mission against Pancho Villa in Mexico — John J. "Blackjack" Pershing.

This past Monday, the Blackjacks knocked out a 5-ton truck, first firing a warning shot to give the 20 Morgan troops aboard a chance to escape the fury of rockets and cannon. A week earlier, they wiped out seven vehicles and several artillery guns.

Their mission is to keep Morgan's forces in recognized neutral zones and to disarm his vehicles if they leave approved areas. Under the rules of engagement, the Blackjacks must receive approval from a higher command to attack. Even then, warning shots are fired first.

Capt. John Poppie, 28, of Spokane, Wash., a business major and commander of Bravo Troop, and a 29-year-old warrant officer from College Park, Md., briefed for their current mission Wednesday.



U.S. Army helicopters search for forces of warlord Gen. Morgan this week in Kismayu, Somalia. Morgan, the son-in-law of ousted dictator Siad Barre, has been attacking forces of a rival warlord, breaking a cease-fire and delaying peace talks.

Pointing at coordinates on a map posted on a large sheet of plywood in the middle of a field, Poppie told the pilots:

"Morgan forces are located to the west of Burmani. Are you all familiar with what's been happening there? Morgan and Jess have been fighting it out on and off. They usually fight in the morning. By the time we get out there, they've disappeared into the woodwork."

He notes that up to 100 men were spotted around a water hole. Morgan reportedly can mobilize up to 200 men at a time.

"During the day, they'll usually break down into five-man groups. It's very hard to see. You see them the first time, you're probably not going to see them the second time because

they'll jump into bushes and stay out of the way. There will be no friendly forces in the area. The only forces out there are going to be your four helicopters..."

"Safety considerations. They may shoot so be careful when you're flying over them."

But on this day, there will be no shooting.

En route, the Blackjacks get a mission change: Fly over Kismayu.

"I think it's very important for the people of Kismayu to see military might in the air," says Brig. Gen. Lawson Magruder, commander of U.S. and Belgian forces in the region.

After this, the Blackjacks searched north to south through one target area but found nothing except a few nomadic herds of camels and goats.

Tucker then flew over the water hole and spotted 30 to 40 people camped around the area. He did not see any weapons, nor was he fired upon.

Later, Tucker flew passes over another area but was ordered back to Berxani. There were no signs of life.

Mission accomplished, it was back home to Kismayu.

Blackjack 66, Poppie's thoughts wandered home to Philadelphia, N.Y., just outside Fort Drum, home of the 10th Mountain Division. His two children would be celebrating their birthdays this month — Dirk will be 2 on Feb. 9 and Britanna turns 5 on Feb. 28.

Poppie won't be able to make it. He has an appointment with Gen. Morgan.

Flawed Bosnia peace plan offers only hope

VIENNA, Austria — The peace plan touted as the way to end war in Bosnia does nothing to disarm combatants or punish criminals, and contains the seeds of future conflict.

But it is the only plan around, and if Washington fails to endorse it, war will rage on. The international community — America, Russia and other powers — would then have to figure out a better peace plan.

International negotiators Cyrus Vance and Lord Owen are trying to persuade President Clinton to back the plan, currently under discussion at the United Nations, at a time when the administration is formulating a position on ending the tangled ethnic warfare in the former Yugoslavia.

Vance and Owen have toiled for five months, with frequent trips to the Balkans. Their plan divides Bosnia-Herzegovina into 10 ethnically mixed, largely autonomous provinces. Muslims, Serbs and Croats each dominate three provinces; the 10th is the city of Sarajevo, where the three groups once lived together in harmony.

Only the Croats have said yes to the deal. Bosnia's Serbs, under pressure from their patron in Serbia proper, agreed to drop their demand for the right to secede, but are unlikely to sign the Vance-Owen package unless the Muslims do.

The Muslims, 44 percent of Bosnia-Herzegovina's population before many were forced to flee the war, are increasingly inclined not to agree, for several reasons:

The plan grants such wide autonomy to the 10 provinces that an independent Bosnia-Herzegovina, for which the Muslims are fighting, would cease to exist in all but name. The Serbs and Croats would be tempted to unite their parts with Serbia and Croatia, and to divide up the scattered Muslim territories.

Although the Serbs would relinquish some territory they have gained in war, they would keep substantial chunks. In other areas, it is unlikely that Muslims, driven out by Serb rebels, will return to live in harmony with Serb neighbors.

The Muslims detect increasing hesitation in Washington over the Vance-Owen plan. They hope Clinton, who criticized the Bush administration for doing nothing in Bosnia, will lead U.S. intervention or, better still, a lifting of the arms embargo. The badly outgunned Muslims would then get weapons from Islamic nations and even the odds against them.

The Clinton administration, sharing the concern about human rights expressed by some Americans, has objections to the Vance-Owen plan.

Washington cannot see that the plan will work, since it fails to disarm,

the warring sides, nor how it will stop atrocities, since it fails to mandate punishment for war criminals.

Europeans also are unhappy. But the European Community endorsed the plan on Monday as the only way to stop the daily carnage.

The war hits Europe in ways it has not hit America.

There are 4,800 French and 2,700 British troops on the ground and both forces have suffered casualties.

Hundreds of thousands of refugees from the former Yugoslavia have fled to safety elsewhere in Europe.

Yet Europe cannot bring peace without the backing of America and Russia. Balkan politicians, practiced in realpolitik, respect only the really big stick.

That leaves Clinton with the dilemma of supporting an imperfect plan that might halt the killing now, or rejecting it and devising an alternative backed by Moscow, a traditional ally of Serbia.

Any alternative presupposes the three sides actually want to end the war. The desire for revenge grows the longer the killing goes on — and more than 18,000 are already dead, tens of thousands missing and hundreds of thousands homeless.

In 1978, the Austro-Hungarian Empire was awarded the right to rule Bosnia-Herzegovina. Vienna discovered the only way to do so was to dispatch tens of thousands of troops.

Nonetheless, in 1914, a Serb shot the heir-to-the-Austrian throne in Sarajevo, and ignited World War I.

In 1993, the United Nations has come to play the policing role that used to belong to individual imperial powers. So far, the best solution the United Nations has been prepared to offer for Bosnia is the Vance-Owen peace plan.

If America wants another deal, it will have to be prepared, like the Austro-Hungarians of old, to put muscle behind it. In the face of the prospect that even then, it could fail.

Thousands flee war zone in search of food, U.N. says

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Thousands of Muslims trudged through one of Bosnia's most brutal war zones Thursday in a desperate flight to find food, and a U.N. report said more were dying on the trek.

U.N. officials in the eastern town of Tuzla said Serb militiamen were allowing the Muslims to leave besieged towns in a simple method of "ethnic cleansing."

A new aid convoy moved toward Sarajevo in central Bosnia as U.N. officials warned that food stocks in the besieged capital would run out within three days unless replenished. Aid shipments were delayed earlier in the week after attacks on a U.N. convoy.

As international mediators prepared for new talks on a proposed peace plan for Bosnia, heavy fighting was reported in parts of eastern Bosnia. The Muslim-led government

has been winning back some eastern areas lost to Serb forces last year in the war over the republic's secession from Yugoslavia.

Intensified fighting also was reported in southern Croatia, where Croatia's army is pressing a 2-week-old offensive against the Serb-controlled Krajina region.

In another development, Romania tightened international sanctions against Yugoslavia by stopping Yugoslav barges from traveling down the Danube River to pick up fuel. Yugoslav vessels had been defying the U.N. trade ban imposed in May to punish Serbia for helping Serbs in the wars in Bosnia and Croatia.

The U.N. statement on the Muslim exodus said people were leaving the area around Cerska and Kamenica, which has been under Serb siege for months, and walking south about 20 miles to Tuzla.

Philippines toll rises

LEGAZPI, Philippines (AP) — A full moon and high tide are liable to trigger a major eruption of Mayon volcano this weekend, a chief volcanologist said Thursday.

Officials "girding for the worst," drew up plans to quickly evacuate thousands living near the slopes.

The death toll from Tuesday's eruption passed 40, as rescuers brought down more bodies from mountain settlements buried in landslides. Heavy rains prompted fears of new avalanches.

Lottery targets Chernobyl victims

MOSCOW (AP) — The American doctor who helped treat victims of the 1986 Chernobyl nuclear disaster on Thursday announced a Russian lottery that he hopes will raise \$1 billion to pay for more research and medical treatment.

"We're desperate for money," said Dr. Robert Gale, the American bone marrow specialist.

The tickets will be sold for \$1 or its ruble equivalent "because this is the only way to protect the proceeds from inflation," said Vladimir Tkach, director of the Children of Chernobyl lottery.

The target could prove difficult to reach. One dollar at the current exchange rate is 572 rubles, a day's wage for many Russians.

Prizes range from \$5 to \$100,000. Officials in Kentucky will let some of

the Russian winners enter that state's lottery.

After the April 1986 accident at the Chernobyl nuclear power station in Ukraine, Gale flew in and helped Soviet doctors treat 499 people at Moscow's Hospital No. 6.

"Twenty-nine died from radiation but the other 470 are alive and quite well and we continue to follow them in the clinic," Gale said at a news conference. Two others died at the site of the explosion: two workers' worst nuclear accident.

Gale said a deteriorating health system, economic upheaval and the breakup of the Soviet Union have made it difficult for experts to precisely measure the health impact of Chernobyl.

Experts who once worked with a central Soviet government must now

coordinate with the governments of Russia, Ukraine and Belarus — "none of which is particularly keen to work with the others," he said.

The organizers said they hoped to raise \$150 million in the first year for medicine, medical equipment and rehabilitation and relocation services for children.

Thousands of families were evacuated from their homes after the nuclear disaster.

Gale has predicted that 2,000 to 20,000 people will die of cancer around the world during the next 50 years as a result of the radiation release at Chernobyl.

Some Ukrainian scientists claim that thousands already have died, but former Soviet officials say the cancer rate has not been affected at all by the accident.

Nevadans seek vast water vein

CARSON CITY (AP) — A Senate panel was told Thursday that \$100 million or more in federal funds could be tapped by a group seeking a huge supply of underground water in Nevada's mountain ranges.

Tom Gallagher of Eco-Vision Inc. told the Natural Resources Committee that the money already is authorized for preservation of the Stillwater marshes near Fallon and for preserving the "rainbow" fish in Pyramid Lake, near Reno.

But Gallagher said that without a new source of water — such as the supply his project could produce — federal funds will be used to buy water rights from farmers or other right-holders whose lands would then dry up.

Gallagher filed claims on 12-million-acre-foot of water in central Nevada. He said the water never has been appropriated by the state engineer.

Critics have said the Eco-Vision project could be a disaster for central Nevadans, but Gallagher told lawmakers, "We aren't talking about exploitation of rural water."

Sierra Pacific Power Co. has agreed to put \$600,000 into the exploration efforts now being conducted by Eco-Vision, but Gallagher said the idea isn't to add to the Reno-based utility's supplies for urban customers.

Sue Ollman of Sierra Pacific said the utility is interested in the project, but has made no decisions on whether to go beyond the exploration stage with Eco-Vision.

Gallagher said he has made use of various high-tech methods to locate potential water sources in "faults and fissures and cracks" of the many rocky mountain ranges that cover half of Nevada's land mass.

He said the state engineer's focus has been mainly on water in valleys and his venture is based on a new theory that a much heavier water yield can be found in previously untapped mountain regions.

Eco-Vision hopes to focus on a few areas by mid-April.

GAO raps lack of progress in dump site hunt

LAS VEGAS (AP) — A new congressional report says the Energy Department's search for a nuclear waste dump site is still as distant as it was 10 years ago.

The report, from the General Accounting Office, suggests Congress should consider alternatives to Yucca Mountain, a site 100 miles northwest of Las Vegas that is currently being studied by the Energy Department.

A summary of the GAO report, released Wednesday by the state Nuclear Projects Agency, says the prospects appear dim for completing a Yucca Mountain repository by the target date of 2010.

The report was prepared as a transition document for the Clinton administration to identify the Energy Department's nuclear waste disposal problems.

Nuclear Projects Agency chief Bob Loux, who released the report's two-page summary, said it provides evidence of the need to take a new step at the nation's nuclear waste storage program.

Yucca Mountain is the only site being studied for disposal of 77,000 tons of high-level nuclear waste, mainly spent fuel from commercial nuclear power reactors.

The report questions the \$30 billion price tag for the nation's nuclear waste disposal program.

"A reassessment is needed. It is time to reconsider the alternatives for storing nuclear waste and to ensure that funding levels and time frames realistically accord with the selected alternatives," the report said.

Toddler dies after being struck by car

WASHINGTON CITY (AP) — A 22-month-old Washington City girl has been killed after a 19-year-old man accidentally ran over her with his vehicle, the Utah Highway Patrol said.

Kassidee Mangum was pulling her 4-year-old sister, Kadi, in her wagon Wednesday, and was passing back into the girls and Kassidee went under the wheels.

Hafen told officers he did not see the toddler.

She was taken to Dixie Regional Medical Center in St. George, and died about three hours later. Her sister was not injured.

Production goes beyond bare necessities of Kipling's classic, explores exotic Indian culture

TWIN FALLS - Mowgli the man-cub is headed toward Twin Falls, and he's bringing the exotic rhythms and rich culture of India with him.

Next week, when the Children's Theatre Company presents "The Jungle Book," theatergoers will be making one more stop in the midst of a five-month

national tour, involving 59 cities in the United States.

"The actors are adults, except for the 11-year-old boy who plays Mowgli," said Beth Pesonen, public relations coordinator for the theatre company in a recent phone interview. "We have one child fly-out for three weeks, and then we send out another, so they can go to school, too."

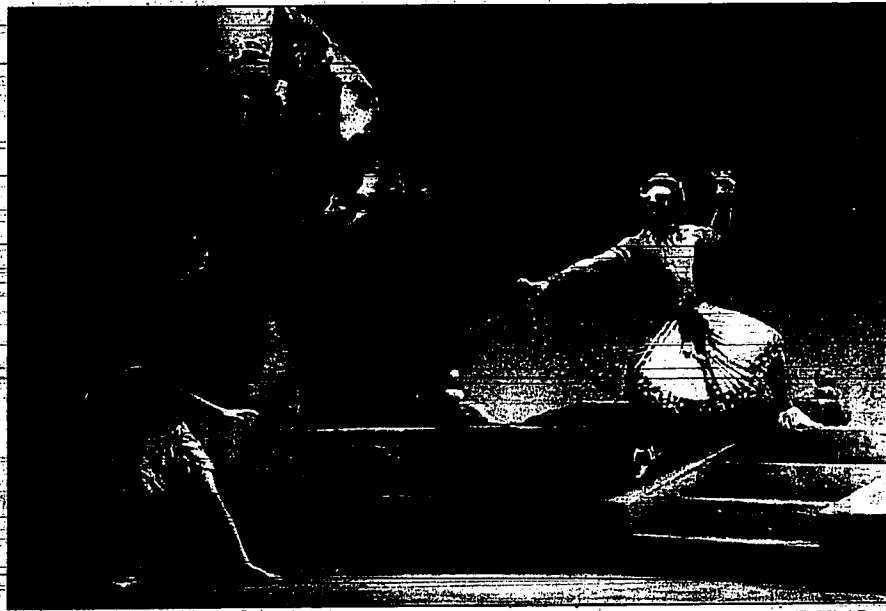

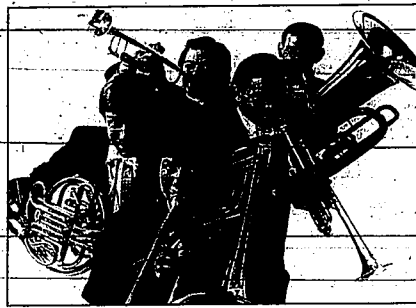

Figure out the names and titles you'll most certainly hear that morning (and again on Oscar night, March 29), along with Thompson and Sarandon: Al Pacino, Denzel Washington, Clint Eastwood, Gene Hackman, Miran-

da Richardson, "Unforgiven," "Malcolm X," "The Crying Game." Some other nominees are probable, some will be surprising. And some, deserving, are sure to be overlooked.

In 1964, the headline on the front page of the Los Angeles Times screamed: ACADEMY NOMINATIONS UPSET ... JULIE ANDREWS CHOSEN ... AUDREY HEPBURN OMITTED.

Barbra Streisand fans were upset last year when she wasn't nominated as Best Director for "The Prince of Tides." Some people missed the specter of sexism.

Likewise, it's a safe bet that Spike Lee's supporters will be upset this year if he's not chosen for the Best Director category for "Malcolm X." Racism will most certainly be changed.

But while politics — studio, financial, gender, racial — are factored into the nomination system, it's wise to bear in mind when considering Oscar nominations what screenwriter William Goldman said about his industry:

"Nobody knows anything."

In Variety, the show-biz publication, movie companies take out ads promoting their candidates for nominations. These are some of the women being touted for Best Actress: Jennifer Grey ("Wind"), Anne Archer ("Patriot Games").

But there probably are five serious, credible candidates, if you dig deep. Mary McDonnell definitely deserves a nod for "Passion Fish." She plays a soap opera actress paralyzed in an accident and confined to a wheelchair in her home in Louisiana bayou country. It's an impressive, intelligent performance in a tacky role that could have been tacky melodrama.

Other deserving contenders: Miranda Richardson ("Enchanted April"), Jane March ("The Lover"), Gong Li ("Raise the Red Lantern") and, I'm told, Michelle Pfeiffer for "Love Field," a movie almost no one has seen because newly reconstituted Orion Classics, the distributor, is just getting going. They

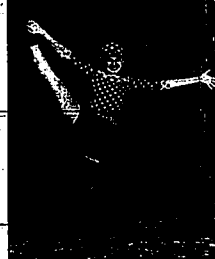

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Casino plays odds on employee, strikes jackpot

JACKPOT - At age 28, Angie Baker has found opportunity and run with it.

It doesn't matter that she never finished high school, or that she is a woman, she is young, she is single, and she has four small children. With hard work and no excuses, this trim, cheerful brunette has climbed the ladder for nine years to become Director of Hotel Operations at Cactus Petes Resort Casino.

Under her direction, this hotel recently was awarded its first, Four Diamond Rating by the American Automobile Association. Of 22,000 hotels examined nationwide by AAA, only two percent received this top grade based on the quality of service, hospitality and other amenities.

As hotel operations director, Baker is in charge of 750 employees and 420 rooms. Managers of the bell service, courtesy shuttle service, front desk, recreational vehicle park, housekeeping and laundry, custodial services, uniforms, gift emporium and styling salon all report to her.

This powerful director is modest about her achievement. "Don't bother with this story," she said. "All I do is work." She added, "I have wonderful (department) managers. Most of the day decisions, they make themselves."

But resort owner Craig Neilson has plenty of praise for Baker. "Angie is a totally dedicated and highly-motivated employee who always strives for exceptional performance," he said, adding that Baker's employees recognize her as a company role model who sets an excellent example of how customers should be treated.

Baker started when Baker, a Rupert native, was 19 and heard about a bookkeeper job opening at Cactus Petes. She had no lofty goals or any idea-of-the-promotions-available.

After dropping out of high school in her sophomore year to get married, Baker had worked as a waitress and in agriculture, sorting potatoes and beans.

Moving to Jackpot with her husband and two toddlers, she thought she'd work for a few months, just until she could afford to stay home.

"I fudged to get in," Baker said, recalling how she was hired at Cactus Petes. "She (the interviewer) asked if I had any experience on a

10 key (adding machine) for one hand, and I said I did. She asked if I used one finger and I said, no, I use all 10."

The interviewer laughed and said she didn't think Baker really had any experience, but was willing to give the young girl a try anyway. "She thought it was humorous, thank goodness," Baker said. "I was only 19 so she let me get away with it. I would never do that again."

So Baker went to work, anxious to prove she could handle the job. She quickly mastered the 10 key and gained other skills as she followed her motto: "Learn something from everyone you meet."

Neilson said this young woman turned out to be a good bet. "She demonstrated unusual initiative and was promoted several times within the department," he said.

After one year, Baker was promoted to the role of Accounts Payable Supervisor, where she took care of all the bills for two years.

"I learned the east side of the company," she said. "For instance, the light bill. I would never have been able to guess or even imagine it. Most employees see only the income side of the business."

In her next step up the ladder, Baker applied for and was given the position of Food and Beverage Administrative Assistant. For a year and a half, she helped develop new

menus, wrote monthly expense reports and analyzed daily expenses. Baker also worked when needed as cashier, hostess and waitress, and spent her spare time developing a training manual for food and beverage workers.

Although she was content and not at all anxious to take another step up, Baker accepted Neilson's offer to become Hotel Management Trainer.

Looking back on that move, Baker said, "Now I think it was probably the opportunity of a lifetime. It opened the doors for more learning."

In the next four years, Baker rose steadily through the ranks of hotel management, as Front Desk Manager and then as Hotel Manager. In December, she was promoted to become Director of Hotel Operations.

Along the way, she had two more children and experienced divorce. Angie Baker now works 50 to 60 hours a week as she meets with department managers, answers calls and corresponds from hotel guests, balances staff with hotel occupancy, attends business meetings with other directors and Neilson, and keeps an eye on the current \$750,000 renovation of the 86-room Granite Range.

"It's never boring," she said with a laugh. "We never have a day-like the day before."

After work, Baker spends time with her children, ages 10, 9, 5 and 1, asking them about school, fixing dinner and reading stories.

"I'm having this much responsibility is trying times," Baker admits. "When I get under the weather, I just keep going and stay focused on my work and try to spend quality time with my children," she said.

"My parents and Cactus Petes management always support me. Baker said she hasn't had time to sit back and realize her success.

"I never think about it," she said. "I'll come over the hill and I look at the tower. Then, I feel proud."

Foreigner duo rebuild burnt bridges, let music flow

NEW YORK - Foreigner's original vocalist Lou Gramm and guitarist Mick Jones are creating memorable guitar riffs again now that they've patched their personal rift.

They're friends again. But their parting was anything but friendly. They were separate "officially two years, musically six or seven years," Gramm said.

Now that they're together again in all ways, they've written three new songs — the "beyond" part of the album's title, "The Very Best ... and Beyond" — "Soul Doctor," "Prisoner of Love" and "With Heaven on our Side."

They got together last year after Atlantic Records released a compact disc in Europe of hits including their gold singles "Double Vision," "Hot Blooded," "I Wanna Know What Love Is" and "Waiting for a Girl Like You." All seven albums Foreigner made between 1977 and 1983 sold between a million and 6 million copies each in the United States.

The record company suggested to both of us the possibility of polishing up and adding a few unrecorded outtakes from previous albums ... it would have required Mick and I to meet and go through old tapes. We hadn't seen each other in two years," Gramm said.

Said Jones: "We were a little nervous, tense at first, with each other ... It didn't take long to be laughing about the old times and how silly we'd been."

In their last year together, they wrote separately and showed each other what they'd done.

"There wasn't that much collaboration," Jones said. "Going back to the early stage, there was."

It came to a big break. We wrote "Soul Doctor" first. That,

came pretty spontaneously and the record of reminded me of the way we used to do it. I came up with the riff, Lou came up with the title. We filled in the spots in between."

Gramm said he felt a sense of relief "that we still had the goods." If they hadn't been able to write together, they wouldn't have reunited, Jones said, adding, "This was an important test of our ability to really not just write but write something special. Those songs had to be able to stand up to the rest of the major hits of our career."

Instead of arenas, Foreigner now is playing clubs, something it didn't do even in its earliest days. Gramm, 42, and Jones, 45, blame the pressures of success, as well as a lack of communication — finally, other people relayed in-

formation back and forth — for their split.

"We were victims of intense circumstances. Success. My life turned upside down in the middle of all that," Jones said. "That had a lot to do with my distraction. We were almost feeling from some pretty hectic seven or eight years of intense situations."

"It's the flip side of glamour," Gramm said. "The fun was going out of it. There was too much touring, a lot of time spent in the studio, periods of inactivity."

Jones said he thinks "at one point I was almost running away from it. I was resenting what it had done to me. I was trying to find something inside me that was real, success really? Glory for an hour. Great. When you go home and try

to look into yourself, you get pretty lonely at times. It's a strange, exaggerated existence and you always have to be up." Ha, Ha, everything is great."

"You try and keep that curtain up and what is really happening in your life? A lot of things took their toll. I lost a wife."

Added Gramm: "I didn't but I was losing a number of friends."

Jones, who's remarried, has four children and three stepchildren. Gramm has two boys.

Before they split up, Jones said, "Communication broke down and we were accusing each other of all sorts of things. We went in separate corners, never confronting the

issue together. The situation was being fueled by speculation from other people within and around the band."

Gramm characterized it as "a cold war."

"I think had it gone on any longer it would have been irreconcilable," he said.

Jones continued Foreigner, which made one album, "Unusual Heat," with Johnny Edwards singing. Gramm made two albums, in 1987 and 1989, and was preparing for a third solo album before the reunion and reconciliation.

"Hearing about the best of Foreigner package in Europe gave me cause to pause and reflect,"

Gramm said.

"Foreigner has been over a third of my life. It seemed like the right thing to do. I guess to re-create it."

"To pick up where we left off when things were still fun between us," Jones added. "I think we understand each other a lot more now. I think we both feel better prepared, if anything does start to happen, to hopefully avoid it and confront it earlier on. There are bound to be things we disagree on."

Said Gramm: "I'd rather hear from other about what we agree or disagree on than from what someone else says Mick thinks. More upfront communication. No buffers. We're big boys."

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Bart breaks into comics

America's cartoon family appears in "Simpsons Comics and Stories" that hit the newsstands Monday.

It's the first comic book from Simpsons creator Matt Groening.

The book reveals Springfield's costumed crusader, Bartman, and his battle to save fellow hero Radioactive Man. Also in the issue, graffiti artist El Barto goes to jail, Maggie saves Springfield from a nuclear meltdown, Lisa turns to crime and Itchy & Scratchy give tips on power tool safety. At \$2.50 each, 400,000 copies of the comic book have been printed. A special edition, bagged with a "Radioactive Man Meets Bartman" poster, will be available only in comic book shops.

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'Matinee' aims at amusement

Perhaps you had to be in elementary school in 1962, doing the duck-and-cover in hallways to survive atomic bomb blasts, to fully appreciate "Matinee."

Maybe you needed to be the child of a serviceman during the Cuban Missile Crisis, with dad likely to ship out to a destination so dangerous you couldn't inform you. It might help if you spent Saturdays at schlocky horror movies where the theater managers wired joy buzzers to the seats.

I fit into those categories, and I surfered with pleasure on the movie's waves of nostalgia. "Matinee" aims to be nothing but an amusing recreation of an era when prosperity, panic and presidential glamour dominated our thoughts.

People who see it through the judicious lens of the '60s may find it hard to believe such innocence prevailed in our culture. When a 15-year-old calls Key West, Fla., the "Make-out Capital of the World," those who know it today as a gay enclave may chuckle.

But there was an era when people made movies such as "Man!" — the film-within-a-film in "Matinee" — and promoted them with such tag lines as "So terrifying only screams are safe!" to sit in theater lobbies, urging patrons to sign disclaimers releasing the film company from responsibility if they died of heart attacks.

That's just one of the gimmicks Lawrence Woolsey, played by John Goodman as an affectionate take-off on horror impresario William Castle, has come to Key West to promote his latest extravaganza in Atomovision and Rumble-in-the-Brain. The movie is a ton or so of machinery and 140 pounds of trouble in the form of Ruth Corday (Cathy Moriarty), his sometime squeeze and reluctant star.

Movie review

Unfortunately, they're 90 miles away from the Soviet missile buildup, which leads Floridians to think every stirring of stomach indignation may be the far-off sound of bombs falling. Most anxious is Gene Loomis (Simon Fenton), whose Navy dad is on one of the ships sailing off to blockade the bad guys. He finds a soulmate in Sandra (Lisi Jakub), a beatnik-to-be, and a chum in Stan (Curti Katz), who has a crush on mature-for-her-years Sherry (Kellie Martin of TV's "Life Goes On").

Charlie Haas' screenplay contains two dark presences besides the shadow of "The Bomb": Threat of bankruptcy for B-movie promoters (whose market would dry up by 1966) and one Harvey Starkweather, a reform-school parolee

who courts Sherry with a switchblade in one hand and bad, self-penned poetry in the other.

This juvenile delinquent, a stock villain among real-kids, is a false note. The other is "Man!" itself, special effects recreate its genre beautifully, but the acting lets it down. The presence of '50s horror-film veterans William Schallert and Kevin McCarthy is fun, but Moriarty misplays her scenes; she doesn't realize that '50s scream queens were too overwrought in emotional scenes, not too bland.

Goodman gets the two best speeches, monologues explaining the thrill of moviegoing and the assured nature of horror films: "We see out demons controlled and defeated; yet we get the thrill of living vicariously on the edge. Otherwise, he has a small part.

Most scenes are left to the kids, who are talented and/or well-cast.

Martin is old for a middle-schooler but appealingly perky. Katz and Jakub are sweetly shy, and Fenton — last seen as the young apartment-fighter in "The Power of One" — is remarkably natural, especially for a British-born boy.

Director Joe Dante likes in-jokes: Here he gave bit parts to John Slayles (who wrote "Piranha" for him in 1978) and Dick Miller, who worked for Dante in Roger Corman's low-budget flicks.

Dante also likes Roger to movies that inspired him, putting posters on almost every wall: "The Crawling Eye," "Panic in Year Zero," "The Day, The Earth Caught Fire." True horror fans will note one eyeshot: "The Day of the Trifids," which didn't reach theaters until the year after Kennedy called Khrushchev's missile bluff.

Acting makes up for comball Pacino film

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times.

SCENT OF A WOMAN (R). Al Pacino gives a tour de force performance as a blind, retired Army lieutenant colonel in this compelling, remarkable odyssey. Chris O'Donnell is fine as the scholarship student from a nearby prep school who is hired to take care of Pacino — for the Thanksgiving weekend and ends up accompanying him on a bender in Manhattan. Overlong and occasionally comball, but full of affecting moments and wonderful acting.

USED PEOPLE (PG-13). This charming romantic comedy set in 1963 Queens — a Jewish-Italian fantasia, based by writer-Todd Graff on his "Grandma Fania" — pits Marcello Mastroianni against Shirley MacLaine as irresistible force-and-inmovable subject. The heavy ensemble (Jessica Tandy, Kathy Bates, etc.) gives it texture and depth. British director Beban Kidron adds warmth and pace. It's a goofy, dreamy, pleasurable, little family fable, and it calls up its reveries with just enough wit to keep them from sappiness.

ALADDIN (G). This musical successor to Disney's "Beauty and the Beast" does more than expand the visual boundaries of mainstream animation and its possibilities for extravagant humor. It offers Robin Williams, who brings his nimble wit and lightning fast comedy to the character of the genie, in what may be the role of a

lifetime. The late Howard Ashman contributes some brilliant lyrics, and the whole combination ends up appealing not only to the smallest child, but the hippest adult. Aren't we lucky to have it now?

ASPEN EXTREME (PG-13). Two Detroit auto assembly workers decide to head to Aspen and a new life as ski instructors where one of them becomes very popular and hobnobs with the wealthy. Starring Paul Gross, Peter Berg, Finola Hughes, Teri-Polo and William Russ. Directed by Patrick Husbarger.

A FEW GOOD MEN (R). A brisk and familiar courtroom drama of the old school, as enjoyable as it is predictable, and boasting a pair of pure star-power performances by Jack Nicholson and Tom Cruise. Centered around a murder trial inside a military courtroom, "Men" is entertainment pure and simple, a commodity that has unaccountably become rarer and rarer. And nobody but nobody can raise their eyebrows quite like Jack.

RIVER RUNS THROUGH IT (R). Despite luscious cinematography and a career-making performance from Brad Pitt, Robert Redford's version of Norman Maclean's celebrated memoir about fly fishing and families suffers from an excess of idealized, worshipful attention. Though finely made and not without its moments of quiet satisfaction, the main emotion "River" arouses is a curiosity about what all this fuss was about in the first place.

You know things are getting rough at the corner Bijou when no less a connoisseur of full-throttle mayhem than William Friedkin calls a cease-fire. The director of "The French Connection" and "Live Die Man in a Cage" is especially appalled by Quentin Tarantino's graphically violent "Reservoir Dogs."

"I saw it the other night," he says. "I hated it. In fact I couldn't wait to get out of the theater. I wanted to spit. I think it's a work of mindless violence. (Tarantino) may, if he's not too crazy, make a good film or two, but just to celebrate violence isn't gonna get it."

This, from the man once threatened with X ratings for "The Exorcist" and "Cruising."

But Friedkin isn't alone. The Hollywood establishment, as represented by Jack Valenti and the Motion Picture Association of America ratings board, is finding much to condemn on screen these days. Indeed, at no time since the late '60s and early '70s — when "Bonnie and Clyde," "Straw Dogs" and "Midnight Cowboy" appeared — have film makers pummeled us with such graphic, in-your-face images.

Among the controversial recent examples are "Man Bites Dog" and "Damage" and Abel Ferrara's NC-17-rated "Bad Lieutenant." The latter has already really run heads, what with Harvey Keitel's corrupt cop doing things on screen once consigned to the realm of soft-core porn.

Surprisingly, what these filmmakers — some established, some new to the game — are discovering is a public willing to experiment. Up to a point.

They're also being reminded of a film school given: If you give something meaningful to say (about love, love, how desensitized we've become) and you know how to push the envelope artfully, you can get away with a lot more than the average Hollywood hand.

Still, filmmakers have their limits. Even lauded film critics become squamish when a straight razor ap-

pears or the line between humor and savagery disappears. At this year's Toronto Film Festival, the darker-than-dark "Man Bites Dog" drew howls of laughter — until a gang-raped-turned-bloodthirsty Sudden this Belgian import had crossed over the line. Hisses and walkouts — and the San Francisco distributor's decision to cut the two-minute tableau — followed.

"We thought it ('Dog') was a brilliant idea well-executed by first-time filmmakers," said Roxie Releasing's Bill Banning, whose past acquisitions include "Flame in the Heart" and "The Good Woman of Bangkok." "But that one scene ... was so graphic and disturbing it caused many people to walk out. We felt it hurt the film and its chances to be seen by a larger audience. But if the filmmakers had insisted upon more cutting, it, we wouldn't have cut it."

"Man Bites Dog" is but the most extreme example of moviedom's

new permissiveness, which might be traced to 1990 and the one-two jolt of "The Cook, the Thief, His Wife & Her Lover" and "Henry: Portrait of a Serial Killer" (both released unrated after being threatened with an NC-17).

In their bloody wake were: Peter Medak's "The Krays," Ferrara's "King of New York," Lizzie Borden's "Love Crimes," Edward James Olmos' "American Me," and Paul Verhoeven's nihilistic companion pieces, "Total Recall" and "Basic Instinct."

In turn, these more visceral entertainments have led to a new spate of psycho-sexual fantasies. On the midnight-cult circuit, we have the deliciously gruesome "Teusou: Iron Man" and its more ambitious sequel, both by the wildly creative Shinya Tsukamoto, and Ryu Mutsakami's aptly titled "Tokyo Decadence," in which, in clinical detail, a prostitute partakes of bondage and heroin.

Tarantino's "Reservoir Dogs" — a bloody homage to the classic heist thriller — found its way onto many year-end "best" lists, but with the caveat "may be too graphic for some tastes." Everywhere you look these days filmmakers are testing limits or — waging "guerrilla warfare with a camera." Madonna's roundly jeered "Body of Evidence" copes with three knockdown, drag-out sexual encounters. Jean-Jacques Annaud's adaptation of Marguerite Duras' "The Lover" is equally steamy (albeit in a more arty way) in its depiction of an ill-fated affair between a white teen-ager in Indochina and a handsome Chinese financier.

Not to be outdone, Louis Malle's "Damage" contains several heavily stylized lovemaking scenes. The participants: Jeremy Irons' frustrated cabinet minister and Juliette Binoche's wary but manipulative art appraiser.

All three films were threatened with an NC-17 rating by the MPAA board: "The Lover" because of ed cabinet minister; "Body of Evidence" because it unspooled like a live-action "Sex" manual; "Damage" because of an especially frisky sex scene.

All three films went back to the editing table, and, after minor snips, were awarded a more commercial R (or restricted).

Forest Service and Idaho Department of Idaho Fish and Game officials have received several complaints in recent weeks about skiers and dogs frightening game animals.

"If you notice a herd of elk, go find another place to ski," Pinkerton suggested. "There are plenty of other places."

Kempthorne \$20,000 in red after successful campaign

BOISE — Dirk Kempthorne owed nearly \$200,000 as of the first of the year after his successful campaign for the U.S. Senate.

A campaign finance report filed Monday with the secretary of state's office showed the new Republican U.S. senator owed \$191,934, most of it to the Washington, D.C., media consultant credited with an advertising campaign that keyed his 62,000-vote victory over Democratic candidate Richard Stallings.

"Kempthorne" also listed \$45,790 in his campaign fund after spending \$1.2 million on the election battle against Stallings, former four-term congressman.

Steve Symms, who retired from the Senate last month, listed \$355,852 in his campaign fund. Symms decided in 1991 not to run for a third Senate term but still received \$46,000 in contribution, which he refunded.

Symms also reported contributions up to \$1,000 each to more than 30 Republican candidates and independent Ron Rankin of Coeur d'Alene, who ran for the Idaho Senate.

'Affordable' housing in the offing

Applications for space in Fawnbrook Apartments open today

TWIN FALLS — A 96-unit complex of "affordable" rental housing, near the College of Southern Idaho will open this spring and people who want to live there can start applying today.

But to live in the Fawnbrook Apartments, renters must qualify under income limits, representatives of a property management firm said Thursday.

Those interested in applying to live in Fawnbrook can call 734-1600, or pick up information and applications at the Idaho Housing Agency office, 1201 Falls Ave. E., or at the apartment complex construction office.

Renters will range from approximately \$390 for one bedroom, \$550 for two and \$400

for a three-bedroom apartment, property managers Thomas Brenneke and Jeffrey Passadore said. Renters will pay utilities also.

Income limits to rent one of the apartments range from \$12,390 for one person to \$20,532 for a six-person household, the two said. Demographic studies show that more than half the residents of Twin Falls qualify to live in the

apartments, Passadore said. He and Brenneke work for Guardian Management Corp., a Portland, Ore., firm managing the complex for the developer, Pacific Housing Association.

Rents at the complex will fall at about 30 percent of renters' income, Passadore said, and some subsidies might be available.

"We're anxious to provide housing for people on the Idaho

Housing Agency list," he said. Those who want to rent must provide references and meet other qualifications.

"We have a real strong interest in making sure that Fawnbrook is perceived as a very positive addition to Twin Falls," Passadore said.

When Pacific Housing, also from Oregon, announced plans for the housing for people on the Idaho

Jerome County scrapes to purchase patrol cars

JEROME — Jerome County has pooled all its money budgeted for capital expenses this year and earmarked it to buy patrol cars for the county sheriff's office.

After other county departments agreed to forgo major purchases, the county commission voted this week to spend the money on replacing the county's dilapidated police cruisers, some of which have 250,000 miles on them.

"We sent a letter to all departments, asking them to assess their needs," Commissioner Veronica Lierman

said Thursday. "We received two requests for some capital outlay items, but after the elected officials saw the serious need for cars for the sheriff, they all agreed the money should go for vehicles. We're working on other ways to take care of the two requests we received."

One vehicle, a 1984 Pontiac with 32,500 miles, has been purchased and other cars will be bought "when we find the right ones," Sheriff George Silver III said.

"The cars we have that are costing a lot of money to keep running, we'll put in the bone pile and sell them at an auction or use them for non-emergency purposes," he said.

Nine of the department's 10 patrol cars have seen the

inside of a repair shop since Jan. 11. The newest car in the fleet has about 100,000 miles on it.

"You wouldn't believe how everybody is working together on this," Silver said. "I want to find a way to convey my appreciation to the commissioners and departments in the courthouse for giving up so much."

Excessive repair costs and potential liability made it critical that the county upgrade its fleet of patrol cars, the sheriff said.

"We don't expect new vehicles—we're going to get the best and most we can with the money they gave us," Silver said.

Cassia County deputies nab suspect in Declo rape

DECLO — Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal credited fast police work for the arrest of a man wanted for questioning in the Thursday morning rape of a Declo-area woman.

According to the Cassia County Sheriff's Department, the woman was forced to stop on a highway near Declo at about 7:30 a.m. by a man, who was driving a wrecker, fired a bullet into the victim's car, then drove her to a location east of Declo where he raped her, investigators say.

Crystal said an Idaho State Police trooper in Ada County at about 4 p.m. detained a 23-year-old

Washington man matching the description of the wanted individual. No charges had been filed against him Thursday night.

The woman said the man who raped her was a white male with short brownish-red hair, 5-foot, 10-inches to 5-11 tall, 170 pounds, and wearing blue jeans, white T-shirt and an orange sweatshirt with a zipper in the front.

Crystal said investigators in the case worked quickly to get the word out to other law enforcement agencies about the incident.

The man being detained for questioning will be interviewed by Cassia County detectives to determine whether charges should be filed.

The sheriff said he's "fairly sure" the man is the one being sought by authorities.

He said the man who will be questioned was driving through the area and was headed for Washington. If the sheriff's department hadn't acted quickly, the man might have gotten back to Washington without being stopped, Crystal said.

Crystal said the man may have used the emergency lights on the wrecker in order to pull the woman over. He said the man pointed a handgun at her, but was unsure when the man fired the shot into the woman's vehicle.

The man did not fire the gun at the woman, he said.

Impact statement could cost more than \$150,000 at Hub Butte landfill site

TWIN FALLS — The county will pay two local engineering firms up to \$150,000 for an environmental impact statement of the Hub Butte landfill site.

The two firms, J-U-B and EHM, already have agreed to design a landfill on the butte for \$15,000 plus other services estimated at \$93,000.

"With the impact statement, the firms' services could total \$358,000.

Hub Butte and the county wants to buy the acreage for a landfill. But before the BLM can turn the land over to the county and impact statement must be conducted.

Steve Freiberger, an engineer with J-U-B, said the engineering firms will try to have a draft impact statement ready by April or May. If that's done, the county can hold public hearings on the EIS and work on the landfill can start this summer.

While the engineering services are a large up-front cost, they amount to pennies per ton of trash over the life of the landfill, Freiberger said.

The county hopes to close its current landfills and open a new one by an Oct. 9 federal deadline.

But the county commissioners also are hoping that the Environmental Protection Agency or Congress will grant an extension to counties that are working in good faith to meet the deadline but might be able to do so

Police continue to uncover 'stash' after 3-month probe

TWIN FALLS — Police recovered a stash of stolen goods — three pickup loads full — and arrested two people Wednesday night after a three-month investigation.

"We're still uncovering more stuff," Lt. Jim Kistler of the Twin Falls police department said.

"This thing just kind of snowballed on us. Some stuff led to other stuff in other places," Kistler said.

Daniel Killinger, 32, of Twin Falls was arrested and charged with burglary, and his girlfriend, 26-year-old Tammy O'Dell, is charged with possession of stolen property.

Both charges are felonies.

After investigating a series of burglaries for several weeks, police got their big break on Jan. 13 when a confidential informant told them Killinger had asked the informant to help him take some items from a storage unit on Washington Street North.

Police began watching The Vault's rented storage units and saw Killinger with two other men loading several pieces of furniture into a pickup, according to an affidavit by detective David Heidemann in Killinger's court file.

Officers followed the pickup to South Louist Mini-Storage where the same three people unloaded the furniture into a storage unit, Heidemann said.

O'Dell was seen driving Killinger's car to the storage units, and the pickup later took a wooden hope chest to the Cactus Inn where

Killinger and O'Dell were staying, the affidavit said.

Police contacted the renters of the first storage unit, who confirmed that several items worth an estimated \$1,649 had been taken.

The missing items included a hope chest, pots and pans, and a flowered chair.

Armed with a search warrant, police searched a pair of storage units rented by O'Dell at South Louist Mini-Storage.

Inside, they found the stolen goods, Heidemann said in his affidavit.

"We still haven't got it all sorted out," Kistler said, adding that more charges are pending.

The department will keep the recovered items as evidence until prosecutors can look at it, Kistler said.

If the actual items are not needed for evidence in court, police may photograph the items and return it to the owners, he said.

Killinger, who has served jail time in the past for armed robbery, possession of a controlled substance and carrying a concealed weapon, is being held in lieu of \$100,000 bond.

Heidemann said in requesting an arrest warrant that Killinger has threatened to blow up the police station, and investigators believe he may have dynamite stashed somewhere.

O'Dell was being held in lieu of \$5,000 bond. Preliminary hearings for both defendants are set for Feb. 12.

Public defenders have been appointed to represent them.

2nd trial run likely for bike route

KETCHUM — Another trial run of the Sun Valley-Road bike route appears to be just a push, hop and pedal away.

After much public comment Thursday night concerning the controversial bike path through the Ketchum City Council directed the city staff to draw up a proposed ordinance that would allow for its existence from June 1 through Labor Day this year.

The route, which eliminates parking along Sun Valley Road while it is in effect, was tried for the first time last summer.

The ordinance will follow guidelines proposed by the Bike Path Committee and will meet standards set by the American Association of State Highway Transportation Officials.

Proponents say the bike route is needed to provide an easy route through town for tourists and residents using the Wood River Trail and the Sun Valley Trail systems. This group includes bicyclists and business owners along Sun Valley Road.

Opponents, mostly from businesses along Sun Valley Road, say it eliminates much-needed on-street parking, is dangerous and it reduces their income.

"Most people are looking for a long-term solution," said Bob Rosso, a member of the Bike Path Committee. He said the committee would like to see a plan adopted that addresses all of the city's needs — lighting, sidewalks, parking and bike path.

But "our plan tonight is just temporary," he said.

The plan calls for bike lanes on both sides of Sun Valley Road with signs that would urge bicyclists to slow down as they pass through town, warn them of upcoming intersections and bus routes, and remind cyclists to ride with, not against, the flow of traffic.

The bike route will be designated by lines painted on the street. Concrete planters near the Bank of America building would be removed and planter boxes were mentioned as a possibility to separate the bike route from the automobile traffic. They are not a part of the proposal, according to Dick Forsbury of Galena Engineering.

Sun Valley Road was proposed as the best route through town because it is the most direct route, the way people would go anyway, and has the least number of parking spaces to give up.

Business owners in opposition to the route said they saw bicyclists riding both ways on both sides of the street last summer and riding much too fast for the conditions. Parking, they stressed, is a more critical issue for the city.

In other business, the council:

- Heard Mayor Dan Hamilton say the city will crack down this spring on property owners who are "posting" "no-parking" signs and placing cones in front of their houses and illegally blocking people from parking on city streets. Rosso mentioned the problem in his presentation and Hamilton said, "Maybe you can come with me to talk to them."
- Continued public comment on Ketchum's annexation plans until the council's Feb. 17 meeting. City Administrator Jim Jaquet said he had received a letter from Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation requesting meetings to draw up an annexation agreement regarding the Reinheimer Ranch land.
- The department, and the trustee for the Reinheimer Will Trust, want to ensure that the land retains its agricultural zoning after annexation. The Reinheimer parcel is the key to Ketchum's annexation plans.
- Denied a request for an off-site advertising sign at the corner of Skiway Drive and Warm Springs Road. The request was made by Paul Kenny Ski and Sports. Hamilton cast the tie-breaking vote.

Auditors laud Jerome for improvements

JEROME — Auditors have given the city of Jerome a pat on the back for "efforts to achieve efficiency" during the 1992 fiscal year.

Kevin Rexroat, auditor with Smith Cook & Co., told the City Council this week past that programs with accounting have been corrected.

"We don't see the internal control problems you used to have.... Your records and controls have come a long way."

"You have a better use of personnel now," he said.

In an interview after the council meeting, Rexroat said the basic delegation of duties is spread in an intelligent manner now. It didn't used to be that way.

The audit report suggested the following changes in how the city does business should be made:

- Modify software programs to eliminate having to duplicate entering data for cash reconciliations and income generation.
- Reading meters for every address, regardless of whether it's occupied or not, in order to prevent unauthorized and unpaid usage of water.
- Clarify city ordinance governing the methods used in calculating water usage fees.
- Give employees manual and change the wording in the manual regarding payment of sick leave.
- Determine whether the Library Board of the city would authorize payment of bills for the library.
- A comparison of the last 10 years, indicated revenues or income increased from \$2,150,603 in 1982 to \$3,395,114 in 1992. Expenses increased from \$2,212,166-10 years ago to \$3,671,153 in 1992.
- The complete audit report is available to the public in the city clerk's office.
- Other business, the council:
 - Unanimously approved promoting Larry Culver to street department foreman at a monthly salary of \$31,925 and waiving charging the club a fee for using the park.
 - Awarded a \$20,615 bid for gravel to Walker Sand and Gravel of Bellevue.
 - Approved hiring Jason Vinyard as a street department laborer at \$1,406 per month. Vinyard's suspended license had been reinstated and insurance costs would not be increased.
 - Approved paying Acting Police Chief Jay Gardner a monthly salary of \$2,055. "We were shortighted when we agreed to appoint Jay as chief. We neglected to increase his pay," Mayor Gerald Oster said.

Sun Valley pioneers to be honored at reunion

SUN VALLEY — Hall of Fame skiers Fried Pfeifer and Otto Lang, pioneers of the Sun Valley, will be guests of honor during next week's 27th annual reunion of the Sun Valley Ski Club.

Scheduled to begin Sunday, Feb. 7, the week-long gathering of Olympians, ski instructors, Sun Valley residents and frequent visitors reunites skiers who have been reuniting down the resort's slopes since it opened in 1936.

Pfeifer, 82, was co-director of the Sun Valley Ski School with Lang, 85, in 1939. Both men were recruited by the Sun Valley's founder, Averil Harriman, to help build the first destination ski resort. Pfeifer later helped design and build the Aspen ski resort in Colorado

and Lang became a Hollywood film director. An Austrian native, Pfeifer was a world-class racer in Europe before moving to the U.S. and joining a three-time national slalom champion during World War II he was a member of the Army's famous 10th Mountain Division of telemarking troops and was wounded while fighting the Nazis in Italy.

Lang, a native of Yugoslavia, is a self-taught skier who became one of America's first professional ski instructors. He was the first coach of Gretchen Fraser, a Sun Valley resident who became America's first Olympic skiing medalist in 1948. Lang retired from ski coaching in 1950 to become a director for 20th-Century Fox in Hollywood.

Lang directed more than 100 television episodes and several feature films and received four Academy Award nominations for his

documentaries. Among Lang's feature films were "Call Northside 77" with Jimmy Stewart and "Five Fingers" with James Mason.

Pfeifer and Lang, both members of the National Ski Hall of Fame, will be honored during a special meeting of the Sun Valley Ski Club at 4 p.m. Tuesday hosted by the Ketchum Sun Valley Historical Society and during the club's banquet Friday evening.

Others during the week include a no-host ski race for club members and several teas and dinner parties.

Notable figures participating in the activities include Kathleen Harriman Mortimer, the daughter of Averil Harriman, former Sun Valley owner Bill Janes, and Olympians Gretchen Fraser and Don Francis.

Idaho Parks and Recreation Board adopts Albion development plan

BOISE — The Idaho Parks and Recreation Board Thursday adopted a plan to develop the long-shuttered Albion Normal School campus into a state park.

But unless and until the Legislature, the National Park Service, or somebody else puts up money to refurbish the school's deteriorating buildings, the park will exist only on paper.

The former teacher's college, which held its first classes in 1951. Since then, except for a decade as the home of Magic Valley Christian College and two years as an arts center, the campus has been empty.

In 1991, at the prompting of state Rep. Jim Kempton, R-Albion, the Legislature appropriated \$25,000 to study the feasibility of turning the campus into a state park.

It has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1980, and is being considered for National Historic Landmark status.

The study adopted Thursday was generally optimistic about Albion Normal's park potential, because of its location 12 miles off Interstate 84.

However, depending on what the campus was eventually used for, the report estimated it would cost anywhere from \$1.7 million to \$3.3 million to refurbish the campus and ready it for visitors.

Under one option, turning the campus into a historical park, visitors would not be allowed inside the buildings except for a visitors center.

Given the amount of traffic that now passes through Albion on Idaho Highway 77, the report estimated that as many as 5,982 people might make unscheduled visits to the campus.

But a more ambitious option envisions the buildings being completely restored for use as meeting rooms, a folk art museum, a field institute affiliated with Idaho State University, cultural events, workshops, or even overnight lodging for the Pomerelle ski resort, as well as preserving the historic aspects of the campus.

In 1918 and 1926 and the largest surviving building on campus, could be rehabilitated at a cost estimated between \$4.575 million and \$1.8 million, the report said.

Kempton said he was satisfied with the report, but added that "I don't think that with the revenues of the state the way they are, you could ask it for an initial commitment for turning it into a state park."

However, he said, the report can serve as a plan for a partnership between the state and the city of Albion to phase in park development over several years.

Parks and Recreation Director Yvonne Ferrell said that, even with the expense of fixing up the buildings, the Albion campus has great potential as a park. It even impressed Chuck Odegaard, the National Park Service Northwest regional director, and other Park Service personnel when they visited last year.

"They were pretty excited," Ferrell said. "They thought it was a unique site and that it should be preserved and put to some kind of use."

Heyburn rides its central location to economic boom

HEYBURN — Members of the Mini-Cassia Chamber of Commerce have considered it. Officials at Public Health District V offices are thinking about it, and the Idaho-Migrant Council is going to do it.
It seems just about everyone lately is thinking about or planning on building in or relocating to Heyburn. And that suits Heyburn just fine.
In recent years, elected officials and business leaders in Minidoka and Cassia counties have been putting their differences aside and working together toward common goals.
Inter-county groups such as the Mini-Cassia Transportation Committee and the Southern Idaho Solid Waste District have been formed. The Rupert and Burley chambers of commerce have merged. Sometimes there is even talk of consolidating the two counties themselves.
One result of all of this togetherness is the desire for a centrally located area convenient to both counties, and Heyburn fits the bill.
"I think there's great potential here," Loveland said.
The increasing interest in this Minidoka County town of 2,714 residents, he said, seems to have started with the construction of the giant Wal-Mart Super center outlets in nearby North Burley. Both stores opened last fall.
But since then:
• Public Health District V officials announced their intention to consolidate the district's facilities in the Cassia and Minidoka county courthouses and on Alfresco Road in North Burley.
The officials told Minidoka County commissioners that their ideal location for a single new district office would be in Heyburn.
• Before the merger of the two chambers of commerce, the members considered building a new office in Heyburn. They said they liked its central location and easy access to Interstate 84, which could result in thousands of tourists dollars.
For now, at least until its financial situation is clearer, the new chamber will be located in the former office of

the Rupert Area Chamber of Commerce.
• Work is scheduled to begin later this year on a 24-unit migrant housing project in Heyburn — an appropriate location for a city whose population increases by 20 percent or more during the growing season.
The Idaho Migrant Council suggested placing the project in the city about two blocks from the Union Seed Co.
• Two developers recently talked with Heyburn officials about building subdivisions within the city.
• Representatives of a well-known company have discussed building a new electricity-generating facility in the city, creating new jobs. Loveland said. Another company is considering locating an assembly plant here.
A key to managing growth in Heyburn, Loveland said, is the widening of Alfresco Road — or the building of another road parallel to Alfresco less than a mile to the north.
Property owners on Alfresco dislike the idea of losing land to such a project, he said. And a new road might prove to be more efficient and developmentally ideal.
"I think we want the proper growth," Loveland said. "We want it to be positive growth. We want the citizens to feel good about it."
While Heyburn's official population actually declined by 50 people between 1980 and 1990 — a decrease some city officials question — its motor vehicle traffic apparently has increased dramatically in the past two years. During 1991, the city's police department issued or made 234 citations or arrests among drivers; last year, that figure jumped more than six-fold, to 1,495. Part of that increase could be attributed to the appointment early last year of a new police chief.
Loveland knows that, at least subtly, Heyburn is evolving from a small town with a large influx of seasonal laborers into a hub of sorts for the Mini-Cassia area. He wants its residents to be prepared for the changes ahead.
"Let's be about like human nature," he said. "Sometimes we sit back and don't jump on the bandwagon until we see a success. But if we allow it to progress in the proper perspective, I think there's no end."

Burley may attempt recycling plan again

BURLEY — Although one recycling program met with failure last year, the city of Burley might consider doing other things to promote a similar effort.
"Everything is kind of in a limbo until we see what's happening at the (regional) landfill," Councilman Clay Handy said.
Last summer, Burley resident Chip Martini was authorized to begin a 90-day curbside recycling pilot program. Although Martini said he received a big response from the 1,000-house route he covered, he wasn't able to make ends meet.
Efforts to renegotiate his contract with the city to provide extra cash weren't successful, Martini said.
"He shouldn't feel disappointed," Mayor Frank Bauman said. He said Martini put in a good effort to make the system work.
Bauman said that while recycling is popular with some people, it's still hard to get everyone to participate. In addition, the city was paying more for Martini's recycling efforts than it was paying for its own employees to pick up the trash. Martini, in another agreement with the city, also cleaned up alleys and recycled materials he collected.
"It just wasn't economical for the city and wasn't economical for him either," Bauman said.
During Martini's recycling program, people provided glass, aluminum and other recyclables in tinted plastic bags, which would be collected once a week. He said he gave the newspapers to the Kiwanis Club. Martini said he only made money on the aluminum cans.
Martini, now a manager at American Recycling in Burley, said he hasn't given up yet. He may yet develop another recycling plan and approach the county or cities with it.
He expressed optimism that programs could work that would at least pull a small profit.
"Some communities have private contractors who assess residents' garbage collection fees, and pick up trash and recyclables," Martini said.
"They get by," he said.
Bauman said he hoped recycling will catch on with more people.
"People need to see what the cost recycling costs money," he said.
He agreed that recycling is good for the environment, but costs to recycle are currently high.
Handy said the city, before looking at any recycling programs, will likely want to see what the cost per ton to ship waste will be for the new regional landfill west of Burley. The landfill, which will serve Minidoka and Cassia counties, is expected to be open by this fall.
Depending on the cost, it might be feasible for the city to open up more satellite stations to collect materials for recycling. Handy said.
"A few years ago, the city placed large waste receptacles next to its service center in southwest Burley to collect recyclables from aluminum cans to glass."

Senate minority seeks support for reform

BOISE (AP) — Senate Democrats are pressing for approval of what they call a "good government" and campaign finance reform package, and raising the specter of an initiative petition drive to enact the proposals if they are rebuffed.
"If we're not successful here, we'll have to look at another option," Sen. John Peavoy of Carey said in outlining the proposals Thursday.
Some have already been rejected by the Republican majority and others were pending in the House.

One — voter registration at the time a person gets a driver's license — was approved by the U.S. House on Thursday, and two others appeared to have no application in Idaho. Lobbyists already are required to disclose the issues or bills they are trying to influence and there is no provision for severance pay for state employees.

The proposed ban on severance pay, which would still apply to city and county governments, was an obvious shot at U.S. Sen. Dirk Kempthorne.
The Republican's first week in office last month was tarnished by the disclosure that two of his top aides as Boise mayor received tens of thousands of dollars in severance pay from the city when they left for more lucrative jobs on his Senate staff.
The Democratic package included campaign contribution limits for state elections of \$500 for individuals and \$1,000 for corporations or political action committees. That has yet to be considered in the Legislature this year.
Earlier on Thursday, however, the House State Affairs Committee introduced legislation to modify the fines imposed for "violating campaign finance reporting requirements, add an extra pre-election report to the reporting schedule and require reports to be in the physical possession of the secretary of state — not just postmarked — by the deadline."

Arguments start today in murder trial
RUPERT — Opening arguments in the Jerry Fino murder trial will be heard today.
Attorneys for the defense and prosecution made final selections Thursday to a six-man, six-woman jury that will decide the fate of Fino, charged with the April 13, 1992, slaying of Rupert pawnbroker Randy Walker.
Three of the jurors are Hispanic, as is Fino. Jurors won't be sequestered, but 5th District Judge George Granata said he would stress to jurors that they must not read or watch any media accounts of the trial or the case.
"Will be emphasizing that to the max," he said.
Opening statements today will last a maximum 40 minutes each, the judge said. Granata expects to recess the proceedings at noon for the weekend.
BLM will spray herbicide near Oakley
BURLEY — The Bureau of Land Management plans to spray herbicides on about 400 acres of grazing land northwest of Oakley.
The spraying project — on public land in Cassia and Twin Falls counties — would control sagebrush and broom snakeweed invading an area seeded in the past with crested wheat to improve livestock grazing.
About 200 acres of Wyoming sagebrush would be sprayed with the herbicide 2,4-D. Snakeweed in another 200 acres would be sprayed with Picloram, a systemic herbicide.
The ranchers who hold grazing permits for the seedlings would pay the cost — about \$10 per acre, BLM range conservationist David Dunnell said.
The sagebrush would be sprayed this spring if all the paperwork gets done in time, and the snakeweed would be sprayed in the falls after it has flowered, Dunnell said.

BLM is working on an environmental assessment of the project and will accept public comments until March 1. Comments should be addressed to District Manager, Bureau of Land Management, Rt. 3 Box 1, Burley 83318. Attn: Tugue, Segobush and Snakeweed Control Project.

Committee turns effort to give voters more information

BOISE (AP) — State Rep. Jim Hansen says voters need more information about what's going on in elections — particularly who's paying for candidates' campaigns.

But the House State Affairs Committee rejected the Boise Democrat's proposal Tuesday in one instance because of the cost and in another because members thought it would violate personal privacy.

"They are public campaigns, for public positions," Hansen said. "The people ought to be able to know who is financing the campaigns."

A few Democrats supported

Hansen's bill allowing the state to publish a voter information booklet each election cycle. But the majority members rejected it, as well as a proposal to require people who make donations to politicians to list their employers.

The committee agreed to introduce a bill from the secretary of state's office, boosting the penalty for late

reports under the Sunshine Law and requiring an extra-report-per-election cycle.

Ben Ysursa, chief deputy secretary of state, said current law requires no reports from shortly after the May primary election until seven days before the general election. That gap of more than five months is too long, he said.

The legislation adds an extra report due Oct. 10. If it becomes law, candidates must have the new report, which Ysursa said is perhaps the most critical of the election, in the secretary of state's office by the

deadline. Under current law, anything postmarked by the deadline is considered on time.

Ysursa said reports made just before the election are very important, but candidates have been "playing games" with postmarks with the goal of getting the reports in just before the election.

"If you get a report the Saturday before the election, it does nobody any good," he said. "If you don't get timely reports of the expenditures, the whole purpose of the law has been thwarted."

He said the current \$10-per-day

fine for late reports is almost meaningless, and urged the committee to allow up to \$100 per day. But House Democratic Floor Leader Jim Strohbeck of Sandpoint objected to leaving it up to the secretary of state's office to decide how much the fine should be.

The panel amended Ysursa's bill to make the fine a flat \$50 per day. House old legislators Oregon and Washington publish voter information booklets, but committee members lost interest after he told them Oregon's booklet cost \$1.2 million.

"If we have that sort of cost, maybe

the political parties ought to be spending it rather than the taxpayers," said Rep. Alan Lances-R-Meridian.

Hansen also had a bill for a new law requiring people who contribute at least \$50 to a candidate to list their employer.

He said it was designed to prevent "bundling" of contributions by employees of a company to get around donation limits.

"Most states require considerably more than this," Hansen said.

But some lawmakers thought that would violate individual privacy rights.

Tax revenues still exceed administration's targets

BOISE (AP) — State tax revenues exceeded the Andrus administration's revised estimates in December and collections for the first half of the budget year surpassed the benchmark \$1 billion of year-go levels, an economic update issued Thursday showed.

The report came as legislative budget writers, under mounting pressure from agency officials to increase spending authority, searched for a scheme to underwrite the state's most critical needs without raising taxes.

It also fueled Republican skepticism about the accuracy of Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus' revised revenue forecast. Andrus significantly overestimated revenues during last spring's budget battle with the GOP. That forced him to impose a last-minute spending cut, but the budget reserve for \$3 million more than he wanted to spend, a push payment of \$6 million in bills over into the current budget year.

Some Republicans believe that problem left the governor gun shy

this winter, prompting him to take a conservative view of revenue growth. Still, a revised administration forecast \$16.8 million over the benchmark \$1 billion figure represented a healthy 6.5-percent growth rate.

But despite the big increase in July-through-December receipts over the corresponding period a year earlier, administration analysts projected they expect the month's total for the second half of the budget year.

They were particularly concerned about the income tax collection rate, which was primarily responsible for the year's revenue miscalculation. They expect the month's total to eventually be claimed in the form of refunds.

December's revenue collections were \$3.8 million higher than anticipated, largely on the strength of the individual and corporate income taxes. Corporate tax collections alone were \$2 million over the forecast, marking the first time in the budget year that they have exceeded the

monthly target. Individual income tax was \$1.3 million higher than expected.

Sales tax receipts were up a modest \$500,000 from the forecast level, but because of the collection system, those receipts reflected sales from November. Analysts said retailers reported that Christmas spending was up as expected, to be later than usual in the season.

December sales will not be reflected until the next economic update, but analysts said "early indications are that they should also be strong."

Overall, sales tax receipts for July through December were over 12 percent higher than for the same period in 1991 and personal income tax collections were up 11.5 percent from the year earlier period.

The state's only revenue weakness was in the license tax for the mining industry — pushed to the brink of ruin by depressed metals prices and earnings on invested state funds, which have been depressed by extremely low interest rates.

Family played role in decision against seeking Andrus' seat

BOISE (AP) — Attorney General Larry EchoHawk said Thursday that deciding not to run for the governor's first Indian cabinet position is more important than being upwardly mobile in politics.

So the man who had been considered the likely Democratic heir to an office the party has held since 1971 instead will run for a second term as attorney general in 1995.

"I've never had a job I've ever had. I hope the voters like what I'm doing enough to let me keep doing it," EchoHawk said.

"Having teenagers makes you realize how quickly the time goes, and how precious it is. I'd regret it if I missed these next couple of years with them."

Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus said he regretted EchoHawk's decision, but that he would not reconsider

retiring at the end of his unprecedented fourth term.

Sources said EchoHawk, 44, would evaluate his options for a possible challenge of GOP U.S. Sen. Larry Craig in 1996. But the attorney general said Thursday that he had not even considered that race. "I've just made one big decision," he said. "It's going to be a long time before I make another one."

EchoHawk, a member of the Pawnee Tribe and the nation's first Indian elected to statewide office, said deciding not to run for governor was difficult but educational.

State says Teton sheriff didn't misuse funds

DRIGGS (AP) — The attorney general's office has cleared Teton County Sheriff Kim Cooke of allegations that he pocketed county money and used his position to buy personal property, county prosecutor Roy Moulton said Thursday.

He received a report Monday from Rick Le Gall, a criminal investigator for the attorney general's office, who was enlisted by Moulton to look into the allegations.

Le Gall's report lists seven specific allegations and calls five of them unfounded, Moulton said.

No criminal prosecution was recommended on the other two.

Cooke said the investigation "came out like I assumed it was going to come out. I'm loyal to the citizens of this community. ... I'm glad this part of it's over."

Moulton said the allegations stemmed from last year's sheriff's race.

Cooke lost the May primary election to Deputy Ryan Kaufman, but won re-election in November as a write-in candidate. Kaufman later resigned. "I think we had a bad situation generated by a chief deputy running against a sheriff,"

the prosecutor said.

While Le Gall's report recommends no criminal prosecution, it says the sheriff's office should improve the way it logs evidence and keeps accounting records, Moulton said.

"It's no big deal," Cooke said. "We will change. We've already started doing some things different."

Le Gall's investigation determined an allegation that Cooke had the county purchase a pickup truck bed liner, gun and holster for his personal use was unfounded. To the charge that Cooke had disappeared or been lost or stolen, Le Gall wrote that sheriff's deputies were using three rifles and a pistol that had been confiscated and other weapons were returned "at a sale of excess county property."

The investigator also said allegations were unfounded that a \$150 donation to the county drug fund was never deposited into a county account, that Cooke had sold a saddle seized in a debtor case and kept the money and that the sheriff pocketed a \$500 bond from an out-of-state person cited for driving without a license.

Bill combining oversight of gaming dies

BOISE (AP) — The House State Affairs Committee has rejected Idaho Lottery Director Wally Hedrick's proposal to combine oversight of all legal gambling operations under a single state agency.

Hedrick said regulating the lottery, parimutuel betting and charitable bingo and raffle games would be more efficiently handled by an Idaho State Lottery and Racing Agency rather than four separate offices.

But State Affairs members deadlocked 8-8 and refused to introduce legislation combining the State Lottery and Idaho Racing Commission into a new office with additional authority to police charitable games and monitor gambling on Indian reservations.

"We could throw in the State Liquor Dispensary and call it the Department of Sin," one legislator joked.

Although there is no state law saying so, the Lottery agency has been given responsibility to come up with rules and regulations covering charitable bingo and raffles. Hedrick said earlier that the Lottery Commission won't act until the Legislature passes a permanent law this session regulating charitable games.

Panhandle highway remains clogged

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The traffic flow on U.S. Highway 95 through Coeur d'Alene continues to crawl and there is no relief in sight, a state official said.

Transportation officials in Boise last September scrapped plans for a Highway 95 bypass route through town, citing more pressing needs, said Tom Baker, District 1 engineer for the Idaho Transportation Department.

Relief from the clogged highway conditions will probably have to come from local government, Baker said.

The bypass, which Baker estimates

would cost "tens of millions of dollars," was initially set for the planning stage starting in 1996. The project is no longer on the transportation department's "five-year plan."

"Baker blamed Highway 95 traffic problems on rampant growth, but I think a saddle seized in a debtor case through Coeur d'Alene is local, he said.

"We've got development but we haven't done anything with the infrastructure, particularly roads and streets," Baker said.

The average daily traffic on Highway 95 through the city is

25,000 cars, Baker said. The peak month is August, when 28,300 northbound and southbound motorists pass the intersection each day.

Stop-and-go conditions on the highway prompted a recent letter to Baker from Coeur d'Alene County commission Chairman Ken Helmer.

Helmer said traffic has significantly increased on narrow county roads as motorists attempt to avoid the highway.

"The transportation problems on state highways in Kootenai County are not being assigned the priority level that increasing traffic volumes dictate," Helmer said.

Gun charges reduced against U of I athlete

MOSCOW (AP) — Charges of brandishing a gun filed against a University of Idaho football player have been reduced because the player never found, officials said.

Instead, UI linebacker Shawn "Duke" Garrett pleaded guilty Wednesday to disturbing the peace and agreed to pay a \$233 fine, Moscow City Prosecutor Mark Moorer said.

Garrett and two other students were arrested Jan. 16 outside the Xenon nightclub in downtown Moscow during a melee involving nearly 200 club patrons and several UI and WSU football players.

More good news for economy

WASHINGTON — Americans' productivity climbed 2.7 percent last year, the most in two decades, according to a government report that raised hopes that a long-awaited rebound in the nation's competitive standing is at hand.

In a torrent of good economic news Thursday, other reports showed:

- The nation's retailers had surprisingly strong sales in January.
- U.S. factories in December enjoyed their biggest surge in orders in 37 months.
- After rising for three straight weeks, new claims for unemployment benefits finally eased a bit in late January.
- The Dow Jones average of 30

industrial climbed 42.95 points to 3,416.74, surpassing the previous closing peak of 3,413.21 it reached last June 1.

The U.S. economy even got some help from overseas as Germany's powerful central bank lowered two key interest rates half after a similar rate cut in Japan.

Analysts said the foreign rate cuts should spur the world economy and U.S. exports while at the same time helping to keep U.S. rates low.

At the White House, President Clinton, still working on the details of his economic revival program, said the good news was encouraging, but that the bottom line was increased jobs.

"I'm happy that the productivity rates picked up, and I'm glad that people are able to finance their

homes at lower interest rates. But I'm still not convinced that this country is yet set on the right course in terms of generating jobs. And that's the key thing," Jobs' Clinton said.

Private analysts agreed. They said that unless job growth picks up considerably in the months ahead, the surge in consumer spending that has powered the economy so far will falter.

A critical piece of jobs information will come Friday when the government releases its employment report for January.

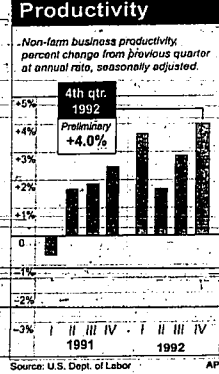
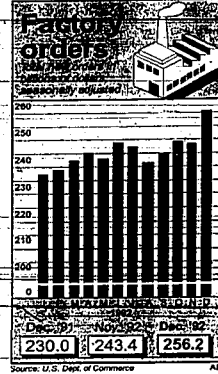
Economists were hoping to see an increase in payroll jobs of at least 100,000.

That would be double the anemic rate of the past several months but it still would not be enough to push the unemployment rate down from the

7.3 percent level where it has been stuck since November.

Among the economic news Thursday:

- U.S. productivity, defined as output per hour of work, rose 2.7 percent last year, the best showing since 1972 and more than five times the tiny 0.5 percent increase of 1991.
- Output was up 2.2 percent last year, the number of hours worked generally declined as companies, squeezed by the weak economy, got more work from fewer employees.
- The nation's major retailers reported strong sales gains in January, defying predictions that over-optimistic consumers would pull back after a torrid December. Wal-Mart, the nation's biggest retailer, said total sales were up 10 percent over the same period a year ago.

Fred's next impediment involves throwing Bamm-Bamm's bachelor party. With his pockets empty and a stripper demanding cash, Fred finds himself in a familiar bind, and Barney finds himself in a drug. Furious when he discovers it, Bamm-Bamm storms out of the party. Thoroughly disgusted with the whole affair, Barney follows with no intention of ever speaking to Fred again.

The Fred Flintstone volcano of sudden fury finally erupts when Barney blurts to Wilma what happened to the savings. Wilma puts her marriage in the doghouse, but Fred can't stay there either when he finds even all his children won't speak to him. Worst of all, his daughter and future son-in-law head off to marry in Rock Vegas, unaware that a sorid gang of thieves, the Wedding Whackers, have been lurking new weeks.

Stone broke and will literally nothing to lose, Fred pleads with Barney to accompany him to Vegas to retrieve the kids. Doing it solely for the children, Barney agrees, and they set off to search every chapel from top to bedrock. Believing they have spotted Pebbles and Bamm-Bamm, Fred and Barney mistakenly burst into a Wedding Whacker heist.

In fear of being revealed, the gang chases Fred and Barney through numerous casinos, leaving behind a trail of dazed and disorder. The huge commotion attracts the attention of Pebbles and Bamm-Bamm, who join the pursuit. The chase ends when Fred gets tripped up by chance. Caught rock-handed, the police arrest Fred, Barney, the kids and the thieves for disturbing the peace.

Grasping the fact that he has hit rock-bottom by having jailed the bride and groom, Fred laments aloud his misfortune. His tale of woe proves too much for the conscience of the gang members, who confess their guilt, resulting in the release of the rest.

Never ones to stand in the way of true love, the police escort Fred, Barney and the kids home. With the guests feeling restless and cheated, Fred victoriously blows in with the bride and groom to save the day.

As weddings go, the marriage of Pebbles Flintstone to Bamm-Bamm Rubble is "a page right out of history." Wilma and Barney forgive Fred, and even the guests are emotionally moved — so much, in fact, that Mr. Slate gives Fred his job back. The interminable friendship between Fred and Barney becomes a relationship bound by law, meaning they will stay comrades forever — or at least, for now.

NBC hopes "Mad about You" move gains viewers

All along, the idea for "Mad About You" was to create a different sort of romantic comedy.

It would be the sort of series that approached marriage from the inside, rather than the outside. In the typical kneepier TV spots and goosball barbs you get with sitcom shallow husbands and wives.

No human cartoons here. "It's things between a husband and wife," says Helen Hunt, the actress who supplies a lively comic presence as Jamie Buchman in her make-believe "Mad About You" marriage — Paul Reiser, a simily, engaging Paul Buchman.

TV's other new wave of romantic comedies — "Love & War," "Martin" and "Hearts Afire" — have focused more on couples (unmarried) who crack wise. They do go, sometimes, very well. But "Mad About You" has been different, more relaxed and observational in its humor.

These newlyweds are actually recognized as real human beings.

In fact, the Buchmans behave like real people. There's the shock of recognition when they noodle idiosyncratically while shopping for a sofa; either about the in-laws or grow inconsolably angry trying to decide what leisure activity to pursue on a lazy Sunday.

As a result, "Mad About You" has evolved into clever scenes from a modern American marriage, neatly balancing a blithe, naturalistic spirit with a believably neurotic edge.

"What's really been nice is that right from the beginning, NBC got it," says Reiser ("My Two Dads," "Aliens"), who created the series with executive producer Danny Jacobson. "We pitched it as 'thirtysomething' if it was shorter and funnier."

"Mad About You" is one of the funniest spots for NBC this year. In fact, the No. 1 network has been stumbling along a distant third in the ratings while being trapped in the glare of bad news as David Letterman jumps to CBS and "Cheers" announces it will call it quits after 11 seasons.

From the start last fall, while cozi-

ly paired with the sly, innovative "Ally McBeal" on Wednesday nights, "Mad About You" received the seal of critical approval. And this past week, Viewers for Quality Television, a grass-roots organization that lobbies the networks in behalf of good TV, selected the show as best new comedy series of 1992-93. It also tapped Reiser and Hunt as best actor and actress in a new series.

Trouble is, rave reviews don't guarantee any rating. Ratings, as usual, are down. "Mad About You" has been merely adequate, averaging a mediocre 9.8 rating (each rating point represents 921,000 TV households) while around the middle of the pack among all shows this season.

A big reason for the Nielsen anemia is the powerful Wednesday night opposition — ABC's highly rated comedy tians, "Home Improvement" and "Casey, 21." The much ballyhooed duel between "Home Improvement" and "Seinfeld" was no contest from Day One. And now NBC has finally decided to move both "Seinfeld" and "Mad About You" out of harm's way by being this week.

While "Seinfeld" takes over the plush 8:30 p.m. MST Thursday slot after "Cheers," Reiser, Hunt and "Mad About You" are being shipped to 8:30 p.m. Saturdays after "Empty Nest."

Whoops. Isn't the young adult audience that favors "Mad About You" out doing other things and ignoring network TV on Saturday nights? And won't "Mad About You" be the shuffle amidst low-brow chatter like "Nurses" and "Empty Nest"?

No and no, says Reiser and Jacobson. The conventional wisdom about young adults is wrong, said Reiser, who offered as proof his unscientific survey of his own friends and acquaintances. "You know we aren't supposed to be home, but we are," Reiser said, quoting one of his interviewees in Los Angeles.

As for the comedy surroundings: "We're not going to dumb the show down at all," said Jacobson in a phone interview. "I can't see a more secure being part of a comedy block."

CBS journeys back to Mayberry — again

"I was proud of it then and I am still proud of it," said Andy Griffith of his classic 1960-68 CBS comedy series "The Andy Griffith Show," which has become a cult phenomenon in reruns. CBS casts a nostalgic eye on homespun, wholesome series in the special "The Andy Griffith Show Reunion" airing Wednesday.

The tribute features regulars Don Knotts (Barney Fife), Roy Rowland (Opie), George Lindsey (Goobert Haver), Jim Nabors (Gomer Pyle), and Don Douglas (Howard Sprague), numerous film clips, with several "surprise guests" promised.

"It is very interesting to see all of us the way we were 32 years ago and the way we are now," Griffith said. "It is not so much a shock as it is a kind of interesting."

The one-hour show, Lindsey said, shows a "gentler time" in America. "It makes you say, 'hey,'" he said.

Griffith, now starring in the hit ABC series "Matlock," said he had no idea "Andy Griffith," which was always a Top 10 show, would be going strong 32 years later.

"I never thought about reruns at all when we were doing it," said Griffith, who began the series in 1960.

Producer Sheldon Leonard created the idea of Griffith as the widowed Sheriff Andy Taylor, who resided in the small North Carolina town of Mayberry. Frances Bavier was cast as Aunt Bee and now-film director Ron Howard as his son Opie. The pilot aired in February 1960 as an episode of "The Danny Thomas Show" and quickly sold as a series.

Before "Andy Griffith," began that fall, Don Knotts, who appeared with Griffith in "No Time for Sergeants" called him and asked, "Don't you need a deputy?" The addition of Knotts as the high school teacher and Sheriff Barney altered the tone of the series.

"I was supposed to have been the comic, the funny one," Griffith said. "It might not have lasted even half a season that way, but when Don came on realized by the second episode Don should be funny and I should play

straight to him. Then each time we had a good comic actor come on, we would ask him if he would like to be a regular on the show and that is how we built the town of Mayberry."

Jim Nabors was one such actor. Initially, Nabors was signed to play the naive, innocent Gomer for just one episode, but he ended up staying on for nearly two seasons.

'Laugh-In' celebrates 25 years with reunion

Television reunions can be a drag. Who wants to see little Opie's bald spot or a middle-age spread on Beaver Cleaver?

But Sunday the gap from "Rowan and Martin's Laugh-In" will be celebrating their 25th anniversary on a two-hour special on NBC.

Some of those cast members, such as Goldie Hawn and Lily Tomlin, have gone on to even greater fame. And the rest of the troupe haven't lost any of their wit, as was evidenced at a recent taping for the reunion show.

"Laugh-In" (which premiered on Jan. 22, 1968) sprang from the antics mind of George Schlatter, who managed to corral the untamed talent of people like Ellen Brennan, Ruth Bizzi, Arie Johnson, Alan Sues and even Tim Tim.

Henny Gibson auditioned with a poem and a back flip. Buzzi sang a duet with herself in the Xerox room and radio announcer Gary Owens auditioned by accident in the men's room at a Burbank restaurant.

Schlatter saw Tomlin doing a barefoot top dance at a club in New York and invited her to try out. Tomlin says she only has one regret about that audition.

"I didn't go going to my interview with George. I was going to do in like in a real demure cloth coat with a fur collar and kind of, you know, maybe a little cloche and a nice handbag. Then I thought I would take my coat off and hang it up and sit down with gloves on and then have an interview."

Tomlin did her adonidial telephone operator Emesline and enchanted Schlatter. "I went into the show in the third season," remembers Tomlin, "and everybody was fis-

"I didn't have an act," she says. "And I didn't write and I didn't do anything except dance and sing a little and act a little. And I went in to meet George. He saw me on the 'Andy Griffith Special' and I was dancing. And I did this interview with him and I still didn't know what I was going to do."

Hawn kept flubbing her lines and Schlatter kept trying. "And I started realizing that I was either going to look like a real ass or something was going to come of this character. And that's kind of how it happened. My mom would say, 'I don't think you're funny.' And I would say, 'Well, I don't really think I'm funny either.' Yet everybody else thought I was funny."

Barbara Feldon, who only did five shows because she was starring as Agent 99 on "Get Smart," remembers her first sketch.

"I did a Girl Scout leader who was camping outside Fort Dix with her troop of 28-year-old Girl Scouts. She was being interviewed and was saying that the cookies were moving real fast. And when George read me that sketch I said, 'What's funny here?' I never knew what was funny."

Peite British performer Judy Cume was the "sock-it-to-me" girl (who married Burt Reynolds) and later struggled with drug addiction.

Cume recalls: "George's brilliance was how to get a joke past the censors. For instance, I was lucky enough to do the first dope joke. I wonder why they chose me? Anyway, it was Henry and I dressed as hippies. And we just walk on camera and the censors: 'Hi. And I go, 'You too!' And the next morning the censor runs into rehearsals. He was furious. He said, 'George, you're not going to get away this! My son told me that that meant.' And George said, 'I'm worried about your son.'"

Schlatter himself can't quite explain what it was about these performers that made them so special. "Magic," he says. "Magic. You go old and you see somebody and it's magic. I mean, when they walked on stage and we looked at Dick and Dan we said, 'Hi, it's magic.'"

The show was hosted by Dan Rowan and Dick Martin, who had been introduced by Tommy Noonan, who himself was part of a two-man team. "Nine days later we broke an act at Charlie Foy's Supper Club, which has also burned down, as I recall," says Martin. "I was in there in 1987, was the straight man part of the team. 'He brought a great deal of class and he brought a great deal of know-how to keep things moving.' says Martin of his former partner. "He did that with me for 25 years and he was very good."

Buzzi is grateful for her days on "Laugh-In," but they've been a curse, too, she says. "When I travel — and I'm telling you the truth — I have had to clean more lavatories on every airline because when I go in they're dirty, when I come out I don't want people to think that I did that. 'Oh, Ruth Buzzi from 'Laugh-In' is really dirty.' So I've spent these last 20 years cleaning toilets!"

In spite of her current successes, Hawn says her time on "Laugh-In" were the best three years of her life. "I knew it then, I know it now. There's nothing better than being a part of a family of one holding the gold star. Everybody did their job. We laughed more than I've ever laughed on anything I've ever done. And there was kind of a wonderful socialism that actually worked within that group. ... It was a joyful and wonderful time."

Oprah snags live interview with Jackson

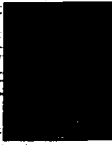

Super Bowl XXVII most watched show ever

NEW-YORK (AP) — An estimated 133.4 million people watched the Super Bowl on Sunday, making it the most-watched show in TV history, carrying NBC to its first overall ratings victory since last August.

The final A.C. Nielsen rating for Dallas' 52-17 victory over Buffalo was 45.1, the highest since CBS did a 45.8 for the New York Giants and Denver in 1987, and the share was 66.

Last year's Super Bowl on CBS did a 40.3 rating and a 61 share. The all-time ratings record was 49.1 by CBS for the 1982 San Francisco-Cincinnati Super Bowl, but there were far fewer TV households in America then. Each ratings point represents 1 percent of the 93.1 million television homes in the United States, meaning that about 42 million American homes had their TV's

tuned to the Super Bowl, another all-time record, NBC said.

The share represents the percentage of televisions in actual use at the time.

NBC now has the two most-watched shows in TV history. The old record-holder was the 1986 Super Bowl between Chicago and New England, a 46-10

Chicago blowout, which was watched by an estimated 127 million people.

Of the all-time top 10 shows only one is not a Super Bowl. That's the final episode of M.A.S.H. on Feb. 28, 1983, which was seen by an estimated 121.6 million people for fourth all-time.

NBC attributed the high ratings this year, in part, to Michael Jackson's halftime show, which did a 45.5 rating and allowed the network to hold onto most of it's audience.

The Super Bowl gave NBC an average rating of 15.1 for the week and its first overall victory in the A.C. Nielsen ratings since Aug. 3, during the Barcelona Summer Olympics.

ABC was second with 12.4, and CBS trailed the big three at 11.6.

Domestic-violence down on Super Bowl Sunday

BOSTON — The image was alarming: Men across America, incited by booze, gambling, losses and the body-slammings exploits of their football heroes, could make Super Bowl Sunday the worst day of the year for domestic violence.

Activists trumpeted the warning, saying national studies supported their claim. Much of the nation's media echoed the alarm.

And NBC, leading the prediction, aired as its only public service announcement in the countdown to the Super Bowl a 20-second television spot that dramatized for 40 million viewers the horror of domestic violence.

But in an embarrassing setback for the campaign against domestic violence — and for the news media — some of the groups that pressured NBC to air the free spot, including Fairness and Accuracy in Reporting, acknowledged Monday that they had based their predictions in part on incomplete, inaccurate or anecdotal information.

Despite the urgent warnings, advocates for battered women reported little or no evidence of a surge in domestic violence during or after the Super Bowl.

"It was not quite accurate," Steven Rendell, a FAIR spokesman in New York, said of his group's assertion that reports of domestic violence increased 40 percent on Super Bowl Sundays. "It should not have gone out in FAIR materials."

Yet a number of media outlets, including the Boston Globe, used the figure to support the premise that women were at

greater risk of being attacked by their abusive partners on Super Bowl Sunday than on any other day of the year.

Rendell said FAIR, a media watchdog agency, extrapolated the 40-percent figure from a 1991 book of photo essays, "Living With the Enemy." He described the figure as anecdotal.

"So, yes," he said, "you should strike that."

The error in reporting to several others by women's rights activists that were highlighted in a Washington Post article on Sunday, threatens the credibility of the movement to curb domestic violence, according to several advocates for battered women.

"It does hurt" the cause's credibility, said Joan Stiles, public education coordinator for the Massachusetts Coalition of Battered Women's Service Groups. Stiles said her group last week refused to confirm or deny any figure indicating a rise in domestic violence related to the Super Bowl because "that was something we could not document at all in Massachusetts."

"We could support the fact that Super Bowl Sunday is a bad day for domestic violence, as are many others," Stiles said. "But we were trying to resist the whole line about the Super Bowl because we thought that focusing on football in some ways sensationalized and trivialized the issue."

"We know from our experience that football fans are no more likely to be batterers than someone who is strictly into playing chess or into reading great literature," he said. "There is no stereotypical batterer."

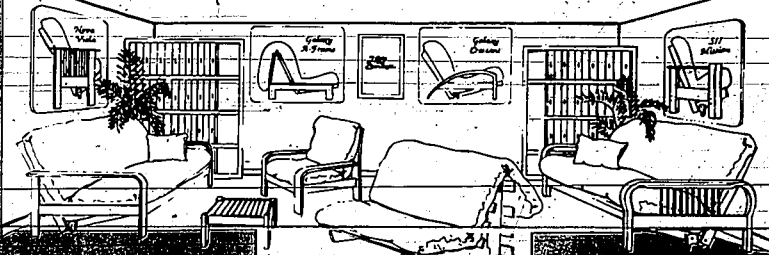

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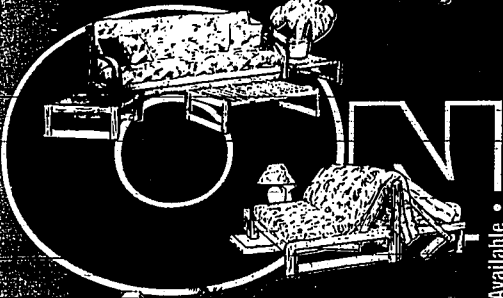
Futon (Foo' Ton), n.

The mattress itself was the primary product and was spread directly on the floor for sleeping, then rolled or folded for use as a sofa during the day.

At first, futon beds evolved with oriental design. Then frames were developed to convert the futon from a bed to a sofa. The frames are primarily sold for use in college dorms, vacation homes, dens, and children's rooms - from a sleep over to a teen's primary bed.

The price of a complete futon sofa is about 50% that of a conventional sofa bed.
