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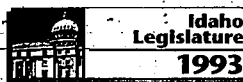
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School hearing fo

BOISE — Outcome-based education, including Twin Falls' controversial Outcome-Driven Developmental Model (ODDM), and the future of programs for gifted and talented students were the main topics Thursday at a public hearing on school reform in Idaho.

More than 40 people, most of them parents of children in public schools, testified during the two-and-a-half-hour-long hearing before the House Education Committee.



Gerri McIntyre of Twin Falls called ODDM a form of "social engineering" that diverts school resources from academics. To back up her contention, McIntyre displayed a chart of how students at Morning-side Elementary School scored on the reading portion of the Iowa Test of Basic Skills. ODDM, a new teaching philosophy,

stresses constant improvement. Under ODDM, when students don't understand a concept or skill, they can have a chance to learn it through a different approach. Although scores of fourth-, fifth- and sixth-graders rose between the 1990-91 and 1991-92 school years, according to the chart, scores for second- and third-graders fell since ODDM was implemented at Morning-side. "If ODDM is responsible for the increase, it's also responsible for the decrease," said McIntyre, whose children attend private school. But Twin Falls School Superintendent

Terrell Donicht, who attended the hearing but did not testify, said afterward that McIntyre's chart was misleading because ODDM will take years to implement fully, and the district has not yet done its own testing to measure its effectiveness.

Another Twin Falls parent, Kelly Thompson, accused the district of hiding the details about ODDM behind a fog ofargon and bureaucratic jargon. "Why can't all parents be educated in all facets of ODDM so they can come to their own conclusions about whether they want their children educated under this system?" Please see SCHOOL/A2

Asylum-seeking Ethiopian forces German jet to cross Atlantic

NEW YORK — A young gunman seeking asylum in the United States hijacked a jetliner with 104 people aboard Thursday and forced it from Austria to New York, where he surrendered.

No one was injured during the 11-hour ordeal, the first trans-Atlantic hijacking in more than 16 years. Seven Americans were among the passengers on the Lufthansa Airbus 310.

The gun turned out to be a

starter's pistol, a source said. The hijacker was Nebiu Zewoldie Demeke, 20, an Ethiopian student living in Morocco, Assistant U.S. Attorney Thomas Roche said after several hours of conflicting reports about his identity.

The hijacker made three demands, said city Police Detective Dominick Misino: that the plane go to Kennedy International Airport; that he receive political asylum; and that the United States intervene in Bosnia-Herzegovina.

The plane was hijacked over Aus-

tria during a flight from Frankfurt, Germany, to Cairo, Egypt, and Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. It was diverted to Hanover, Germany, where it was refueled. German officials said they allowed it to take off for New York because the gunman threatened to kill hostages.

German authorities also said the hijacker gave assurances he would surrender once he arrived in the United States.

Passenger Feodor Goumouev of Stuttgart, Germany, said the flight

Clinton picks Miami's Reno to lead Justice

WASHINGTON — Sticking to his goal of naming the nation's first female attorney general, President Clinton nominated Miami prosecutor Janet Reno on Thursday.

Her selection came after two earlier candidates stumbled because they had hired illegal aliens.

"She is a front-line crime fighter and a caring public servant," Clinton said. Reno, 54, has been the Miami-area prosecutor for 15 years, overseeing 230 lawyers who prosecute 40,000 felonies a year.

In a reminder of Clinton's problems in finding an acceptable Justice nominee, Reno said with a "smile" answer to a reporter's question, "I've never hired an illegal alien and I think I've paid all my Social Security taxes."

Clinton said he was "somewhat" but not entirely "inclined" to nominate a woman. He considered at least four men, despite intense pressure from women's groups, the president said.

A six-footer, Reno stood eye-to-eye with Clinton at a Rose Garden news conference lit by a bright, setting sun. "I am humbled by the honor," she said.

Nominee Zoe Baird and top candidate Kimba Wood were dropped during the past three weeks amid a furor over hiring undocumented workers to take care of young children or do other household work.

Reno, 54, is single and has no children. One of her best-known cases was the prosecution of five police officers in the beating of black insurance agent Arthur McDuffie in December 1979. The trial was moved to Tampa and the five police officers were acquitted, sparking the "Liberty City riot" in Miami.

Clinton, who oversaw four executions in Arkansas and made capital punishment a campaign issue, noted that his nominee had won 80 capital punishment convictions.

But Reno said she told Clinton, "I'm personally opposed to the death penalty." She promised to "advocate" for the death penalty "when the evidence and the law justify it."

On another emotional issue, she said she supports abortion rights. Reno has a reputation among her peers for integrity, political savvy and administrative skills. But critics say she has handled off some local political corruption cases to the federal courts and they contend she lacks investigative zeal.

Clinton said he has known Reno for several years through his brother-in-law, Hugh Rodham, who is a public defender in Dade County.

Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Joseph R. Biden Jr. had no immediate comment on Reno.

Governor assails care providers

BOISE — Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday attacked the health care complex, accusing it of collusion, conflicts of interest and needless empire-building that have sent medical costs skyrocketing.

"We must make a serious effort to contain the cost of medical care before it pushes our backs to the fiscal wall," Andrus told Boise civic leaders but directing his comments at medical professionals and administrators.

"The providers must be part of the solution," the governor said. "But it will not be a solution to continue to say that the only thing we can do is to spend more and more. We've got to do something, and you've got to help."

Andrus made a pitch for support for his plan to curb the escalating cost of medical service for the poor by modestly reducing reimbursements to doctors and other health care providers.

"Here is my answer to the doctors, hospitals and nursing homes that have so much influence with the Legislature," the governor said. "If you won't do it my way then heal the system yourself, but get started."

And Andrus said the escalating cost of the \$300 million Medicaid program is only the "tip of the iceberg. Taken all together this is an iceberg that will sink us unless we start to shrink it, and we must begin now."

The governor said the health and medical insurance industries have established a cozy relationship.

Number of interracial couples doubles over period of 12 years

WASHINGTON — The number of interracial couples in America nearly doubled in the past 12 years, and now more than one out of every 50 marriages crosses the boundaries of race, the government says.

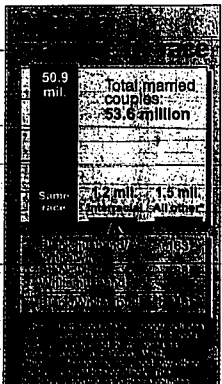
There were 246,000 black-white couples last year, nearly four times the number in 1970, the Census Bureau said.

An additional 883,000 couples represented marriages between whites and other races, such as Asian, Pacific Islander or American Indian; 32,000 were between blacks and other races; and there 1.2 million couples that mixed Hispanics and non-Hispanics.

The bureau counted only married couples, so the numbers do not account for interracial couples who haven't tied the knot.

It has been 26 years since the Supreme Court struck down all state laws outlawing mixed marriages.

Even so, many Americans still seem fixated by interracial romance. Mixed-race couples are a staple on daytime television talk shows, and even today there's an occasional

AP cross-burning at their homes or other acts of racial prejudice and hatred.

But most the nation's 1,161,000 interracial couples find their lives aren't much different from everyone else's.

"Interracial marriages, biracial children, folks that date interracially — it's a very normal thing," said Yvette Walker of Oak Park, Mich. "The biggest problem we have is paying off our credit cards," like many other families, said her husband, Daniel Hollis.

She's black, and edits a magazine, New People, for interracial couples. He's white and works as a courier. Walker said the couple occasionally runs into small acts of prejudice, such as a dirty look or a muttered racial slur.

"I think the problem is that people think interracial relationships are abnormal," Walker said. "A lot of people fear things they don't know."

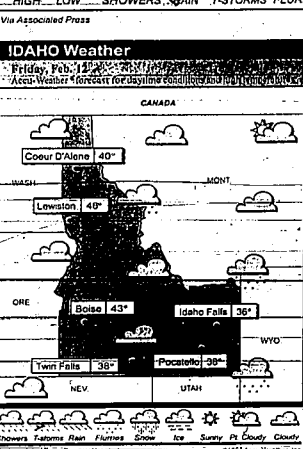
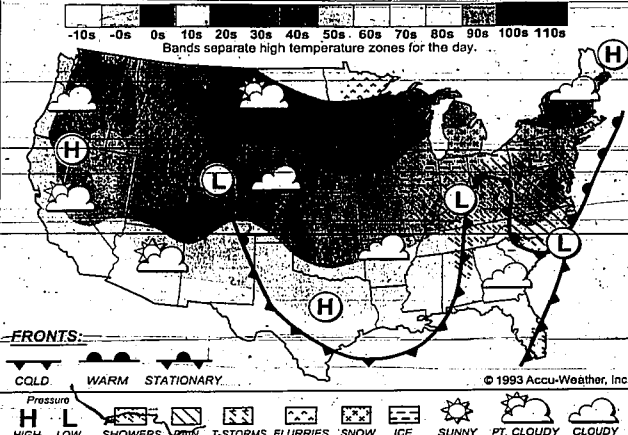
Her husband added, "They feel like there could only be a neurotic attraction... They couldn't just be in love."

Robert Bates and Carmen Melcior of Oak Park, Ill., are a couple of 14 years. He's a union lawyer and black, she's a secretary and Hispanic. They find their racial and cultural differences now mean little to their friends and family.

Weather summary

The National Weather Service says light rain and snow spread north across southern Idaho Thursday afternoon. Snow fell in some valley areas as well as the higher elevations, and was mixed with rain at times.

Areas of fog also continued in some of the valleys. Clouds covered the state Thursday except for the extreme north where it was partly cloudy. Precipitation amounts during the day were generally less than a quarter of an inch and winds were generally 15 mph or less.

Snow, wind, freezing rain lash central Plains states

Freezing rain and wind-whipped snow lashed much of the southern and central Plains on Thursday.

Rain damped the Northwest and southern Atlantic Coast.

Snow fell across much of North Dakota; South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas and Colorado.

Wind up to 40 mph caused blowing and drifting snow across Nebraska, Kansas and the Oklahoma and Texas panhandles, the National Weather Service said.

Schools were closed and travel was hazardous in northwest Kansas as wind up to 30 mph blew 7 inches of snow into deep drifts. Parts of Interstate 70 near the Colorado line were closed due to freezing rain icing roads.

Snowfall early Thursday included 6 to 7 inches at Goodland and Saint Francis in western Kansas and up to 1 foot at Chadron in the Nebraska panhandle.

Freezing rain was scattered across Kansas, Nebraska, the Midwest and the Mississippi Valley.

Temperatures were mild across much of the rest of the nation. The weather was balmy in much of the West, with scattered clouds.

Scattered rain showers reached across Oklahoma, Kansas, the Midwest, the southern Atlantic Coast states, Washington, Oregon and Northern California.

Rainfall amounts for the six hours ending at 11 a.m. MST included .80 inch at Paducah, Ky., and .74 inch at Marysville, Fla.

The low temperature for the Lower 48 states Thursday was 7 degrees below zero at Ely, Minn.

Former BSU president detained; no charge filed

BOISE (AP) — Boise mayoral candidate and fired Boise State University President John Keiser was detained Thursday afternoon for investigation of shoplifting. He was not arrested or charged.

"It's embarrassing, but there were no charges," he said later.

Keiser, 56, a history professor at Boise State, was detained by employees at an Intermountain Arms store shortly after 12:30 p.m. when he reportedly tried to leave with merchandise he had not purchased.

Keiser said he was in the store to buy files and leaders for a fishing trip. He put two leaders in his pocket while he carried seven or eight files to the cash register.

"I put the leaders into my pocket and paid for the files, but I walked out with the leaders," Keiser said. "The dingers went off and it looked like I was walking out with them, which I was. But I didn't do it intentionally."

Boise Police Lt. Tim Rosenvall said a police report showed an electronic detector at the store's door was activated when Keiser tried to leave. He returned four "fishing leader-type items" valued at \$10.48, Rosenvall said, but the store's management declined prosecution and Keiser was released.

Keiser said the value of the items

in his pocket was about \$3.

"Clearly they were following procedures that they were supposed to follow. They didn't know who I was," he said of store employees. "They were polite and I was polite and everybody else was, too. They just did what they were supposed to do."

Rosenvall said police asked the city attorney's office what information it could disclose about the case after receiving a number of media inquiries. Deputy City Attorney Bill Nary said he decided no charge would be filed.

"Our officers are not a witness to a theft, so if a victim chooses not to prosecute, we normally wouldn't," Nary said.

He said the decision had nothing to do with Keiser's standing in the community. "If he had been charged and convicted, Keiser would have faced up to one year in jail and a \$1,099 fine."

Keiser said he hoped Thursday's incident would not affect his candidacy for mayor, which he announced last month.

was going smoothly until the captain suddenly announced, "There's a young gentleman on board who does not want to go to Cairo and he has a gun pointed at my head."

The pilot, Capt. Gerhard Goebel, said later, "I thought it was a hoax, but only for one minute."

At one point, Goebel said at a news conference, the hijacker pointed a gun at his head and warned, "If you do not turn to the west, I will shoot you."

The hijacker held the gun throughout the flight, one law enforcement source said on condition of anonymity. That source said hostage negotiators in Kennedy's control tower talked with the man during the flight, and he remained "very calm and very cooperative during negotiations."

The jet landed safely at Kennedy at 1:50 p.m. MST and taxied to a remote area of the airport. Twenty minutes later, the gunman turned the gun over to the captain, who held it up to the plane's window to show officers outside.

The gun turned out to be a starter's pistol that fired only blanks, another law enforcement source said on condition of anonymity.

The hijacker got the gun past security at Frankfurt airport by hiding it under his hat and placing the hat on a table as he passed through a metal detector, then picking up the hat as he headed to the plane, the source said.

When he surrendered, the hijacker left behind the hat and a note for the pilot, said James M. Fox, head of the FBI's New York office. "The note said, 'Thank you, here's your Tschuss' — a German form of 'goodbye.'"

The hijacker walked off the plane with his hands behind his head, Federal Aviation Administration spokesman Duncan Fardus said. Law enforcement agents met the hijacker, and the passengers left the plane. Fox said none was physically injured, but some suffered "emotional trauma."

Fox said the hijacker would be arraigned Friday on an air piracy charge, which carries a potential sentence of 20 years to life.

The plane carried 94 passengers, including seven Americans, along with Japanese, Egyptians, Germans and one Canadian. Lufthansa spokesman Jim Freeman said there were 10 crew members.

One passenger asked for frequent flyer credit, which he will receive. Lufthansa executive Leo Henckel said.

Thompson asked, adding that district officials have labelled her a "blocker" for questioning ODDM's effectiveness and desirability.

Donich angrily denied the district is trying to freeze parents out of ODDM.

"We've invited some of these people into our classrooms so they can see what's going on, but they won't come," he said.

On the other side of the ODDM debate, Twin Falls attorney Tom High said his children are "soaring" under the program, and that ODDM critics either misunderstand what it's about or fear the unknown.

And Laura Petersen, former president of the Lewiston school district, praised the outcome-based education program her district is implementing.

"In today's economy, we can't afford to let children go to school without the skills needed to succeed in a technological society," Petersen said.

Some parents were concerned about the program at first, she said, but as the district took the time to explain what it was trying to do and the rationale behind it, most of them have come around to supporting it.

At least half of the witnesses pleaded with the committee not to repeal the requirement that local districts have special programs for gifted and talented students.

The requirement, which goes into effect July 1, was enacted two years ago. However, the state has not given schools any money to create the programs. Gov. Cecil Andrus' proposed budget contains \$20 million.

Further hearings set for Monday

The House Education Committee will take testimony from teachers on Idaho's school reform efforts on Feb. 15 in the Gold Room of the Statehouse.

The hearing will start at 9 a.m.

The committee will hold a second parents' hearing on reform issues the morning of Feb. 27 in the Gold Room.

Committee Chairman Ron Black said.

It is also being arranged to arrange a special hearing in Twin Falls to specifically discuss ODDM. That hearing would be open to parents, teachers, administrators and any other interested parties, he said.

"If I hold an OBE (outcome-based education) hearing here, it's going to be dominated by pro- and anti-ODDM people from my own district," said Black. "Twin Falls. That wouldn't be fair."

To implement the gifted and talented mandate and other reform efforts, the Education Committee will vote on introducing two bills today, one to push back the deadline to July 1, 1994, and one to repeal the mandate altogether.

"Many people feel gifted and talented is the cream on top of basic education," said Sue Richards, an Idaho Falls woman whose six children are enrolled in that district's gifted and talented program.

"But," she added, "gifted and talented is basic education for these children."

Queen Elizabeth II to pay income taxes

LONDON (AP) — Queen Elizabeth II will pay income taxes just like any American, but the government said Thursday, it will not require the queen to pay taxes from the next monarch.

Prime Minister John Major had announced in November that the

queen would reverse a decades-old royal tradition and start paying taxes, but until Thursday, the arrangements were never fully clear.

The queen will pay taxes on income and capital gains at the same rate as any other taxpayer — presumably the top rate of 40 percent.

Now America finds out what it got

WASHINGTON — In a sense, Bill Clinton's presidency begins next week.

America will find out what it got when it elected him.

Clinton will go before Congress and the country Wednesday night and lay out his plans for dealing with staggeringly complex economic problems.

He has modeled himself after Franklin D. Roosevelt, who came into office at a time of economic emergency and acted boldly. Clinton, too, promises boldness.

The young president says he must pull off an achievement never demanded of any of his predecessors: simultaneously expanding the economy and shrinking the deficit "before it chokes off our ability to invest in our future and undermines your living standards and those of your children."

And just as Roosevelt jettisoned his campaign talk of a balanced budget in 1933, Clinton is poised to give up his promise of a middle-class tax cut. During his town hall meeting this week, he pointedly recalled that he had refused to take a "read-my lips" pledge.

To effect changes on a Rooseveltian scale, says one Republican economist, Clinton must make "shocking" proposals. "If he only tinkers around the edges of the budget and tries to slide to 'grow the economy' out of its troubles, his deficits over the next four years will match George

Bush's, according to the calculations of the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office, that would add another trillion to the \$3 trillion national debt.

"The people are far more willing to accept change than the administration realizes," said economist Barry Bosworth, who worked in the Carter administration. "Tell them it's a big problem and here is a big solution."

Analysis

Bosworth said what Clinton does will be critical to his presidency; after he speaks, such concerns as the baby sitter problems of his Cabinet selections "will pale into insignificance."

Clinton divided the deficit during his campaign. That was Ross Perot's issue: Now it dominates Clinton's calculations. The government is spending \$5 for every \$4 it takes in.

Republicans Herbert Stein and Murray Weidenbaum and Democrats Charles L. Schultze, Henry Aaron and Bosworth — economists who advised Presidents Nixon, Johnson, Carter and Reagan — say that Clinton's best chance to get action is now, while he has the country's attention and support.

In interviews this week, they agreed that he must both raise taxes and cut spending, especially subsidies for farmers, veterans and business.

Above all, it is crucial, they said, that the public recognize that the sacrifices fall on every segment of society.

"Good budgeting is the uniform distribution of dissatisfaction," is how Weidenbaum put it.

"I think Clinton should be bold and far-reaching," Stein said. "He's got to change attitudes — not only in the country but also in the way he can only do that if he proposes something shocking, if he shows a willingness to attack the sacred cows, impose some taxes on the

middle class and take away some of the benefits. Otherwise, he's not going to get anywhere."

But cutting popular spending is not natural for Democrats — Clinton, his advisers or the party members in Congress who must act on his plans.

Democrats customarily are more concerned with liberal ideas than economics. And they fear they will be indelicately stamped as tax-and-spenders "if after 12 years out of power the first thing you do is announce a major tax increase," Bosworth said.

As for specific bold steps, Stein mentions raising fees for Medicare, which is mainly a subsidy for old people who are not poor." Aaron advocates that, too.

Stein would not oppose a value added tax, a form of national sales tax. Schultze favors a value added tax, perhaps dedicated to health care costs, or an energy tax. He and others propose taxing Social Security benefits just as any pension payments.

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Clinton tells U.S. to heed economic 'warning bells,' rally behind plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton asked Americans on Thursday to heed the "alarm bells" of the night and rally behind his economic plan, including an increase in the top tax rates for both individuals and corporations.

He also told 230 business leaders in a White House meeting to expect some form of a broad-based economic plan, including an increase in the top tax rates for both individuals and corporations. Clinton used stark terms as he stepped up his campaign pitch for the plan that he will unveil next Wednesday, saying the current economic crisis is "every-bit-as-grave as those we have faced in the past."

"We risk losing the standard of living that we have taken for granted for so many years as Americans," Clinton said.

He also began a series of meetings with Democratic members of Congress to outline his plan.

A day after Clinton indicated in a televised town hall meeting that his plan would include higher taxes on middle Americans, the president told 230 business leaders he would also propose raising the top corporate tax rate above its current 34 percent.

Administration aides said that

Clinton was expected to propose raising the rate to 36 percent — the same top rate he has suggested for households earning over \$200,000 a year and who now pay 31 percent.

Corporations with taxable income of \$75,000 or less would still pay a lower rate.

White House communications director George Stephanopoulos said that Clinton hadn't decided yet on a final figure for the increase in the top corporate rate, suggesting he could move it even higher than 36 percent.

Clinton also indicated he would announce tax-code changes designed to hold down high-flying corporate salaries.

"I want to make a proposal that deals with the fact that the tax code should no longer subsidize excessive pay of chief executives and other high executives — excessive defined as unrelated to the productivity of the enterprise," Clinton said.

"There is no question that there are higher taxes across the board coming down," Barry Rogstad, president of the American Business Conference, said after the session.

Clinton also told business leaders he would seek to offset the higher

corporate taxes with an investment tax credit for businesses.

John Sculley, chairman of Apple Computer Inc., one of a handful of the business leaders who had a separate, private meeting with Clinton, said Clinton clearly indicated he would propose an "energy tax in some form."

The president also said he would propose some mechanism to ease the burden on the neediest, Sculley said.

Administration officials have said that a gasoline tax is unlikely and that a broader tax on all energy forms — possibly based on heat content — was more likely.

At the private session, Clinton also said he would propose a reduced-capital-gains tax for long-held investments in small businesses, and seek to make permanent a tax credit for research and development, participants said.

Clinton, in the larger open session attended by business leaders, made a direct appeal for their help. "I need your support and your contribution," he added. "I ask you to do your part."

Then, aiming his message beyond the business community, Clinton said: "Americans are at their best answering alarm bells in the night."

White House wants trade pact extension

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Clinton administration announced Thursday it will ask Congress for the authority to extend the deadline for negotiating a sweeping world trade agreement.

The decision was announced by U.S. Trade Representative Mickey Kantor following a two-hour meeting with the top trade negotiator of the 12-nation European Community, Leon Brittan.

The action was the first word from the new administration on how it planned to deal with what had been the Bush administration's major trade initiative, an effort to rewrite the rules of world trade under the auspices of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

These talks, known as the Uruguay round for the nation where they began in 1986, have been stalled for more than two years.

Hopes were raised last year that the discussions could be concluded before President Bush left office, after Europe and the United States resolved a longstanding dispute regarding farm subsidies.

However, the farm agreement began to unravel because of strong opposition from France and the last minute effort to conclude the Uruguay round went nowhere.

The new administration had faced a deadline of March 2 for completing the Uruguay talks and notifying Congress of that fact.

Retail sales continue climb; jobless benefit claims slow

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans carried the Christmas buying spree into the new year and the job market improved late in January, the government said Thursday, adding to a string of good news economic reports.

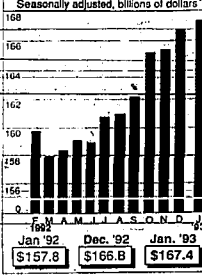
Retail sales rose 0.3 percent to a seasonally adjusted \$167.4 billion, the Commerce Department said. That followed a gain of 0.8 percent in December and was the sixth in seven months. Department store and furniture sales showed particular strength. Sales from November to December were 7.2 percent higher than a year earlier.

"This event is an excellent sign that the economy is pumping along on all cylinders. ... If such a healthy rate of increase continues, the economy will not falter in 1993," said economist William K. MacReynolds of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. Meanwhile, the Labor Department said the number of Americans filing first-time claims for jobless benefits fell by 12,000 to 340,000 during the week ended Jan. 30. It was the second consecutive decline and the lowest level of claims in five weeks.

The latest reports came as President Clinton put the final touches on an economic and budget package to create jobs this year and slash the deficit in half over the rest of his term.

Clinton appealed to business leaders at the White House to support the tax increases in the package, which will be formally presented to Congress next Wednesday.

Many Republicans are saying the



economic Committee that without a stimulus the job market will improve only gradually.

"There is enough slack in the economy to warrant a more aggressive approach. The payoff would be higher output, more jobs, with little danger of inflationary pressures," Solow said.

He said a stimulus package of \$35 billion would reduce the current 7.1 percent unemployment rate to 6.6 percent in a year. Without the package, the rate probably will fall to around 6.5 percent, he said.

In advance of Thursday's sales report, many economists were looking for a slightly better increase. Still, they were pleased that retail spending held up during a month in which consumers were coping with large credit card bills.

"It was a modest gain but considering that it followed such a strong holiday sales, it's quite solid," said economist Sandra Shaber of the WEFA Group, a Bala Cynwyd, Pa., forecasting firm.

As long as the job market continues to improve, analysts expect consumer spending also will increase. However, there could be a pause in the progress over the next few months if many people discover their tax refunds are less than expected as a result of a presidential order last year to reduce payroll withholding.

In January, sales at auto dealers jumped 1.1 percent, the best since October. That followed a 0.8 percent gain in December. Excluding autos, overall sales rose just 0.1 percent.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton has authorized the hiring of 160 more meat and poultry inspectors to help make the nation's food supply safer, Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy said Thursday.

Espy said Clinton would announce the \$4 million in new hiring authority when he releases his economic recovery package next Wednesday. Espy said the package would have "substantial assistance" for rural America.

Espy also said he was meeting this afternoon with "whistleblowers" — meat inspectors who have complaints about sanitary conditions in slaughterhouses and processing plants.

Espy was taking those steps in

response to a fatal outbreak of food poisoning last month in Washington and other western states. At a news conference, Espy also announced several efforts to make the agency more friendly to farmers and consumers, and "just plain friendly."

Although he gave no details of his plan to restructure the department, he said he would consolidate the public information functions into one of the Office of Communi-

cations. "The bottom line is that the Department of Agriculture does not need 1,000 staffers assigned to telling the public what a great job we are doing," Espy said. "Instead, we need more employees assigned to providing direct services to our citizens."

Espy added that although he intends to restructure the department's headquarters, he eventually will restructure field offices as well.

Espy also announced an "open door" policy at the department, making it more accessible to the public. He also announced he was eliminating his reserved table at a departmental dining room.

Doubts about drought reign

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Water isn't the only thing coming down in buckets in California. Confusion reigns, too.

For six years, water experts said there was a severe drought. Laws were written. Lives were changed.

Then the rains came. Now some parts of California have a drought, some don't.

Through Thursday, the normal amount of rainfall for the season, which begins July 1, would be 8.94 inches. Last year, 9.08 inches of rain fell by this time. This year, it's 19.42 inches and rising, said National Weather Service meteorologist Dion Hamilton.

As the rain has mounted, so has doubts about drought. As one news-

paper put it: "There is no drought, and the drought will never end."

The State Department of Water Resources says the drought isn't over, even though water deliveries may be increased because snowpack in the Sierra Nevada is 175 percent of normal.

But the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power says the drought is over and is recommending that the City Council revise its emergency water conservation ordinance, eliminating a 10 percent water reduction program for 3.5 million customers, said a department spokeswoman Debra Suss. A vote is expected before the end of February, she said.

Meanwhile, the laws haven't

changed and conservation messages can still be found in restaurants, utility bills and the California psyche.

In Los Angeles, an end to the drought would allow firefighters to resume training with water for the first time in five years.

"When we can't actually flow the water, it changes things for firefighters," said Fire Capt. Steve Rudin. "It's like typing on a typewriter without a ribbon. You can type all you want, but when you're done you don't know what you've written."

He said there have been no water shortages for fighting real fires and firefighters have been properly trained. "But knowledge is power. Take away that power and there is a potential for inadequacy."

Fumes from recycling plant fire force evacuation

GARY, Ind. — A fire at a Gary auto recycling company early Thursday forced the evacuation of a 20-square-block area in neighboring Hammond because of concerns over toxic fumes.

A Gary fire department dispatcher said a fire was reported shortly before 3 a.m. at H&H Enterprises, which Indiana officials have been

trying to shut down for allegedly operating without a permit.

The fire was still smoldering in the afternoon, and firefighters were using loads of sand to smother it because they were not sure what chemicals might be burning.

At 8 a.m., a section of the Hessville neighborhood in Hammond, including six schools, was ordered evacuated because smoke was blowing toward homes and schools.

Indiana environmental officials said the smoke contained high levels of vinyl chloride, a known human carcinogen.

No injuries or illness had been reported by early afternoon.

A 10-block sector of Cline Avenue — which marks the border between Hammond and Gary — was closed Thursday morning and was expected to remain closed through the evening rush hour.


2 plead innocent to leaving kids

GENEVA, Ill. (AP) — A couple accused of leaving their two daughters alone while vacationing in Mexico pleaded innocent Thursday to charges ranging from neglect to aggravated battery of the girls.

In addition to abandonment charges they have faced for weeks, the parents were accused this week of locking one daughter in a crawl space for seven hours and another in a room repeatedly, kicking one in the ribs and stomach, beating both with a belt and pulling their hair.

The St. Charles couple, David and Sharon Schoo, appeared in Kane County Circuit Court today to plead innocent to all 64 criminal counts.

Attorney Herbert Hill entered the plea and asked for a jury trial.

Brown loses salary case; McDowell accepts less

NEW YORK (AP) — Kevin Brown, a 21-game winner last year, lost his salary arbitration case Thursday while 20-game winner Jack McDowell won even though he asked for much more.

McDowell was awarded \$4 million — the highest salary in arbitration — by Nicholas Zupan instead of the \$3.15 million offered by the Chicago White Sox. Brown was given a \$2.8 million salary — the seventh highest in arbitration — by Richard Bloch instead of the \$3.4 million he requested.

Both pitchers have four seasons of major league service. McDowell, 27, was 20-10 in last year with a 3.18 ERA. He lost in arbitration last winter in a case decided by Bloch, but his salary

still rose 814 percent from \$175,000 to \$1.6 million. Thursday's decision gave McDowell a 150 percent increase.

Brown, 27, made \$1.2 million in 1992. He was 21-11 with a 3.32 ERA for Texas, using Toronto's Jack Morris for the American League lead in wins.

Owners have a 4-3 lead over players with 26 cases remaining. New York Yankees pitcher Jim Abbott had Thursday's only hearing. He asked Anthony Stropoli for \$3.5 million while the Yankees offered \$2.35 million.

Strange fires birdie finish, retains lead

LA QUINTA, Calif. (AP) — Curt Strange, seeking an end to a puzzling, three-year slump, put a birdie-putting finish on a 7-under-par 65 and moved into the lead Thursday at the Bob Hope Classic.

Strange, on a slide since his second consecutive U.S.-Open victory in 1989, completed 36 holes in this unique, 90-hole tournament in 1:31, 13 under par.

"I feel very, very good about my game," he said.

But Strange, who had announced a renewed enthusiasm for the game and the high hopes of a comeback this season, was uncharacteristically short, curt, defensive and almost hostile as he discussed his day's play.

"I've got things to do," he said, walking away from television crew and heading for a practice area.

Strange played at Indian Wells under the format that has the 128 pros playing one round on each of four resort courses each day with a different set of three amateurs before the field is cut for the pro-only finish Sunday at the Arnold Palmer course at PGA West.

"I'm a little rusty, but so far so good," said Strange, who is competing in his fourth consecutive tournament.

Masters champion Fred Couples left without comment after a 18-hole eagle — his second of the day — as Tamarisk lifted him to within a single stroke of the lead at 132.

Couples also scored an eagle on the first hole and had an 8-under-par 64 that put him in a tie for second with Steve Elkington, Dave Rynnells, Rick Fehr and Jay Haas.

Elkington, the Australian Open champion, hit 18 greens in regulation and had a bogey-free 63.

Pitcher Pete Hamisch and the Houston Astros agreed at \$1,725,000, more than triple his \$475,000 salary last season. Outfielder Felix Jose and the St. Louis Cardinals agreed at \$1,525,000, nearly five times the \$315,000 he made in 1992.

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BSU guard drills 3-pointers to break Weber State, 92-75

BOISE — There was a resurgence in Lance Vaughn's 3-point shooting on Thursday night and the Weber State Wildcats felt the effects.

Vaughn, a Boise State guard, drilled three consecutive treys in the first half to break Weber State's zone defense and send the Broncos on their way to a 92-75 Big Sky Conference men's basketball victory.

"I'm starting to get my confidence back," said Vaughn, who ended with 15 points and five assists. "I just felt good. I've been working on it and getting my confidence."

Indeed.

As a result, Boise State played with confidence before a crowd of 7,871 and moved into a second place league tie with the Wildcats. Both teams are now 5-3 and trail the University of Idaho in the standings.

Forward Sherman Morris scored 20 points — 10 in each



half — and senior Tanoka Beard finished with 22 points and nine rebounds.

"Sherman, he had a monster of a game," Beard said. "I'm happy for Sherman. I'm happy for Lance. They both played excellent ball tonight."

The Broncos had their second-largest margin of victory in conference play and sent the Wildcats to their second-worst defeat of the season. Their worst loss was a 21-point defeat at Purdue the second game of the season.

With the score tied 2-2, Vaughn went to work, hitting his third long-ranger in less than three minutes. The 5-foot, 9-inch, 155-pound senior capped off a 12-3 run with his third shot from 3-point land to give BSU a 14-5 lead with 18:11 left in the first half. That broke the half-court zone defense.

Vaughn came into the game

shooting 27.6 percent from 3-point range.

The Wildcats, now 14-6 overall, later tried a full-court pressure defense that was just as futile as the zone.

"Boise State took a 44-30 halftime lead and continued to shoot well in the second half, finishing at 33-for-56.

Stan Rose was the only one to play well for Weber State, scoring 20 of his game-high 28 points in the first half.

How pivotal was the victory for the Broncos?

"It's big, because it keeps us in the hunt," said BSU Coach Bobby Byrne. "I don't think there's any question about that."

The victory came on the heels last week's 107-99 double-overtime loss to Idaho in Moscow.

"This is a very big win," Beard said. "I think last Saturday made a very big impression on us that we can play good basketball, but we didn't play very good defense. Basically, we wanted to come back and play better defense."

Bengals' Potter dunks game-high 23 points, ISU routs N. Arizona

POCATELLO — Jim Potter scored 16 of his game-high 23 points in the first half as Idaho State Bengals rallied to an 88-69 Big Sky Conference win over Northern Arizona Thursday night.

The Bengals never trailed in the contest, leading by as many as 28 to improve to 2-6 in conference play, 6-14 overall. NAU fell to 3-5 in the Big Sky, 8-11 overall.

Idaho State benefited from some hot outside shooting in the first half to build a 49-25 halftime lead.

Potter, Corey Bruce and Justin Jones combined to sever the Bruins' 3-pointing game.

"We just started hitting some shots for a change," said Bruce, who helped his team break a four-game conference losing streak.

The Lumberjacks never did get on track. The Bengals closed to a game back of eighth-place NAU in the Big Sky race.

"The season starts all over," said Erin Cowan, who was one of five Bengals to score in double figures.

Cowan kicked in 13 to go with 15 from Bruce. 10 from Chris Daniels and 17 from freshman Jones in his first collegiate start.

Brad Snyder led NAU with 20 points, 15 coming in the first half. John Rodeno was the only other Lumberjack in double figures at 14.

The win and Snyder's two-anticipated rematch with Weber State. In last year's contest at Pocatello, six players and ISU head coach Herb Williams were suspended for one game after a bench-clearing brawl. The Bengals went on to win the game 88-82 to earn the final berth in the Big Sky tournament.

"Everybody's pumped up for Weber," said Cowan, who was one of three Bengals suspended.

In other news; ISU sophomore guard Chris Baker was suspended from the team for the rest of the season for violation of team rules. Baker started the last six games and was averaging 5.4 points per game.

Cowboys rank 19 in player pay

NEW YORK (AP) — The Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys were just the 19th-highest paid team in the NFL last season, while the Indianapolis Colts were No. 1, according to an NFL Players Association survey obtained by The Associated Press.

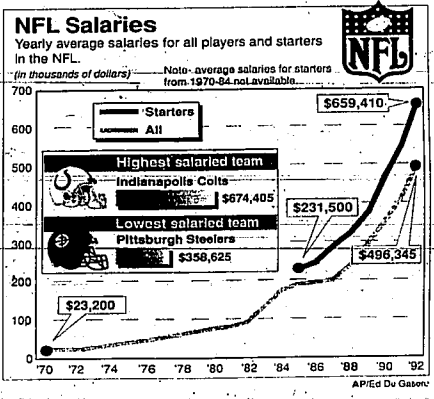
Dallas, which routed Buffalo 52-17 in the Super Bowl on Jan. 31, averaged \$466,980 per player, according to the survey, which is dated Dec. 15. The Bills were sixth at \$564,355.

Indianapolis (9-7), which missed the playoffs, had an average salary of \$674,405 per player. The Colts were followed by the Miami Dolphins at \$627,140 and the San Francisco 49ers at \$613,420.

At the opposite end, the Pittsburgh Steelers were last at \$358,625, and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers were next-to-last at \$379,660. The Steelers won the AFC Central and lost in the divisional playoffs to the Bills.

The average salary increased 19.6 percent last season to \$496,345, the survey said. The figure is double the \$239,100 average in 1988, according to players' association figures.

In comparison, the average salary in major league baseball was \$1,028,667 last season. The average NBA salary is about \$1.2 million this season.

Growth and gluttony: A tale of 2 capitals

Democrats in action. In Boise, Gov. Cecil Andrus exhorts PTA activists to get behind his school spending proposal.

"If you want more money spent in education, ... you're going to have to make your wishes known," he told them.

Andrus wants to increase state aid to public schools by 10.5 percent. Since the state's economy isn't growing that rapidly (and we'll bet your household income isn't, either) he essentially is proposing to increase government share of education costs.

In Washington, D.C., the Clinton administration talks of "stimulating" the economy with \$31 billion in increased federal spending. Meanwhile he talks about an energy tax that surely will fall significantly on the middle class that Clinton has vowed to protect.

Stimulate? On Thursday the government reported the unemployment rate was down in January for the second consecutive month. Retail sales were up — for the sixth time in the past seven months.

In short, the U.S. economy is wide awake. The main thing likely to be stimulated by \$31 billion in additional federal spending is the federal ap-

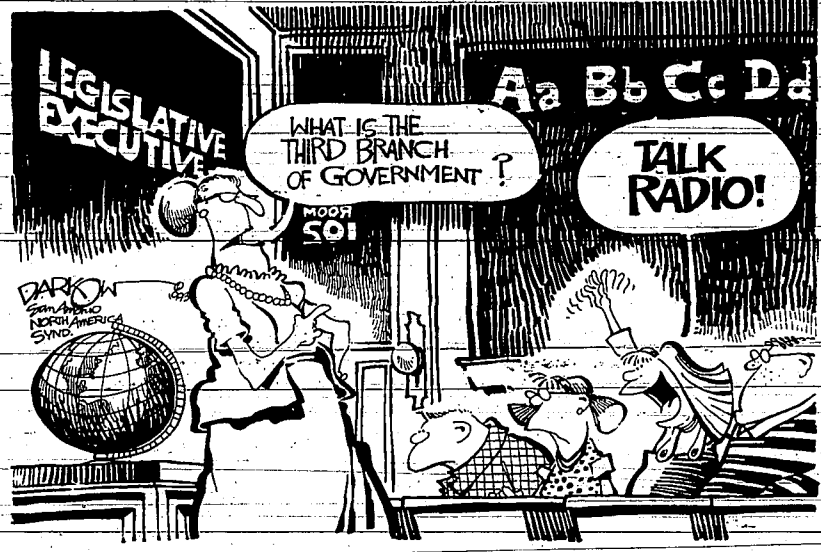
petite for tax money.

One basic difference between Andrus' situation and Clinton's is that Andrus must contend with a Republican Legislature. Idaho's lawmakers have turned a cold eye toward the governor's plan. They suggest, instead, that the state might have to get by without raising taxes.

If that happens, Andrus estimates state revenue would rise about 6.3 percent. That's not enough money to expand programs or solve a lot of the problems the state would like to solve. But plenty of private companies (and private-sector workers) would be pleased to see their own income grow so well.

Clinton and Andrus both seem to be working under a philosophy long beloved by Democrats: In order to do all the good works that government can (and therefore should) perform, government should increase its share of the economic pie.

That voracious philosophy appears unstoppable in the nation's capital this year. But in Idaho, where fiscal prudence saw us through the recent national recession in handsome style, governmental gluttony will be restrained a while longer.

Yet Chapter 34 of Idaho Pesticide Law says that it is if you do not have a consultants license. Nowhere in the sections regarding "consultants" do the phrases "for a fee" or "pesti-

cide program" appear, but the law, as written, was intended to govern the liabilities and require knowledge of professionals, not those of farmer-to-farmer advice. Although I am a supporter of organic methods, I also firmly believe that a farmer has the first Amendment right to recommend any pesticide or growing practice he chooses to his friends and neighbors. To paraphrase Mark Twain, "I may not agree with your ideas, but I will defend to the death your right to state them."

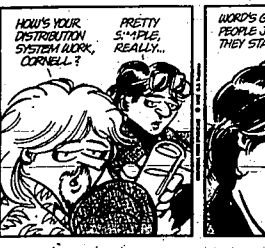

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FCC head to move quickly on cable law

WASHINGTON (AP) — Acting Federal Communications Chairman James Quello said Thursday he will aggressively enforce the new cable television law and not simply be a caretaker until President Clinton picks a permanent chairman.

"The FCC must ensure, the landmark act is workable and fair to all concerned," said Quello at his first meeting as chair. "The specific implementation of the cable act for the March and April agenda will be very significant for the American consumer and the cable, broadcasting, telephone and satellite industries. So stay tuned."

A 19-year veteran of the FCC,

Quello was named last week to fill the vacancy left when Alfred Sikes resigned Jan. 19.

The normally five-member commission is now down to four members.

"In short, I don't have any delusions of grandeur at being chairman or interim chairman," said Quello, a Democrat who was first appointed to the commission by President Nixon.

He noted the challenges facing the commission include regulating developments in telecomputing, fiber optics, digital audio broadcasting, high definition TV, interactive communications, satellite transmis-

sion and cellular and personal communications services.

But he said, "With the wonders of the multi-channel world and direct broadcast satellite service upon us, I still believe the preservation and enhancement of the all important free universal broadcast service for all Americans — as advocated by Congress — will remain the underlying bedrock of American mass communications legislation and regulation for at least the next five years."

But on his first day as chairman, the FCC's business involved only four items, none of them final orders. They were:

- A notice that comment could be

submitted on rules to implement a new-law governing the 900-number segment of the telephone industry.

- A notice that rule-making had begun on elimination of the license requirement for most international receive-only earth stations in fixed-satellite services.
- A notice that the FCC is streamlining the processing of applications for instructional television services used in schools.
- A notice that rule-making had begun on the section of the cable act that requires the providers of home satellite dish programming to adhere to certain public interest requirements.

Photo reveals risky business of Aspin

WASHINGTON — It's not often that a Playboy model becomes a Cabinet officer.

The White House has been criticized for leaking that Judge Kimba M. Wood had been in training in the early 1970s to work in the Playboy Club in London. But she never went to work there.

Defense Secretary Les Aspin, however, was confirmed with many a peep from the Senate Armed Services Committee about his work for the rabbit warren.

Seems Aspin, shown in a 1971 Washington Post photo in a spiffy, decidedly non-"stealth," poolside lounge outfit, posed provocatively, barefoot and showing an unusual amount of skin when he was to publicize a Playboy fashion show. A Washington Post story at the time described the jacket as yellow and the pants and shirt "of every color imaginable."

Aspin, former senator John Tun-

ney of California and Rep. Ronald V. Dellums, D-Calif., now chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, modeled designer outfits provided by Playboy on the Hill.

Their three outfits were shown a few days later at a hospital benefit at the Concordia Gallery of Art.

The material and pattern of Aspin's suit are believed to have been discontinued and picked up by a company specializing in garage wallpaper, one knowledgeable source said.

Aspin spokesman Vernon A. Guidry Jr., when queried about the photograph, asked whether this was the one where "he's dangling a bare foot over the arm of his chair, he's got a goofy smile on his face, and he's wearing the most ridiculous suit imaginable?"

That's the one, Vern.

"This may be a rare opportunity," he replied. But upon reflection, Guidry left us only with this: "The '70s were a tough time for everyone."

Genetic defect could lead to adult leukemia

WASHINGTON (AP) — A genetic defect may allow cells to take off on a wild growth spurt that leads eventually to adult leukemia, say researchers. The finding holds the promise of a test for leukemia risk.

Dr. Cheryl L. Willman of the University of New Mexico School of Medicine reports Friday in the journal Science that it may take the loss of only half of the normal pair of IRF-1 genes to start a process that leads to leukemia.

She said in an interview that a missing or malfunctioning IRF-1 gene was found in the cells of each of 12 patients who had adult leukemia or a condition called myelodysplasia that leads to leukemia.

"Our hypothesis is that if you lose a single allele (half of a pair of genes), it can lead to unrestrained cell growth," she said. Rapidly dividing cells cause a higher rate of mutation and "can cause a promotion to full blown leukemia," said Willman.

The IRF-1 gene, located on chromosome 5, causes cells to secrete a protein that regulates cell division: It

represses the action of a protein that is expressed by another gene, called IRF-2, that promotes cell division. IRF stands for interferon regulatory factor.

A companion paper in Science by scientists at the Osaka University in Japan reports that tumors quickly develop in laboratory mice if there is a surplus of the IRF-2 protein or a shortage of the IRF-1 protein. In effect, the study found that if the two proteins are out of balance, then cancers can form.

Willman said it appears that a balance of the two proteins is lost if only one of the two IRF-1 genes is missing, damaged or malfunctioning.

She said her studies show that a single IRF-1 gene is deleted in patients with myelodysplasia, a condition that appears for some years in older adults before they develop leukemia.

"We think that their whole myelodysplasia may start with the loss of a single allele," said Willman.

"They then progress on in time to develop full blown leukemia."

Katherine Hepburn uninjured in accident

PETERSBURG, Va. (AP) — A car in which Katherine Hepburn was riding was involved in a minor traffic accident while she was heading into town to stop for the night.

No one was injured and no charges were filed in the accident Wednesday evening, police Lt. Melvin Jones said Thursday. The driver of Hepburn's car, Howard Frederick, told police she was

going to Florida. Asked her destination by a reporter, the 85-year-old actress replied, "None of your business."

Hepburn, who has homes in New York and Connecticut, apparently was traveling on Interstate 95 when she decided to stop in this city south of Richmond to spend the night, said Candi Noc, who was working at the High Street Inn when she arrived there.

Teen-ager held after killing entire family

CUMMING, Ga. (AP) — A 17-year-old who had skipped school to hang out with a friend is accused of killing his family one by one as they arrived home later in the day, authorities said.

Sarajevo's war traumatizes, bores its silent victims — the children

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Like Fagin in Dickens' "Oliver Twist," Burdush directs his band of dirty ragamuffins from atop a garbage can throne.

He leads the "Europees," a gang of children living as refugees in the former Hotel Europee in downtown Sarajevo.

With nothing else to do but ape the warlike adults, the boys and girls of the Europee hang out, throwing bottles and rubble from their shell-damaged hotel at the rival gang from the refugee hotel down the street, the "Centrals."

"We have three bikes, so we ride around the streets, and we fight the Centrals," Burdush said. "Fighting the Centrals is everything in my lives."

The highlight of the day is waiting for U.N. peacekeepers to drive by and toss out goodies. As Burdush spoke, an Egyptian fuel tanker passed by, and its soldiers threw a few packs of bread and jam to the children.

Since the siege of Sarajevo began last April, 1,237 children have died, and another 12,305 have been wounded, 2,189 seriously, according to Arif Smajkic, director of the government's health research unit.

"Thousands have been evacuated since the fighting began. For those remaining, life is precarious. Often, it is also boring."

"They are the greatest victims of this war," said Erna Ribar, the UNICEF spokeswoman in Sarajevo. For 10 months, they have had no school. Their life has not been disciplined, and they've had to fight for their survival.

UNICEF and the local Red Cross estimate there are between 62,000-68,000 children up to 14 or 15 years old in the city. The Department of Education figures it has about 80,000 children of school age — 7 to 19.

Some are on the streets, some are confined to dark, cold apartments by parents afraid of the indiscriminate mortar shelling and sniper fire. All

are being scarred daily, if nothing else by psychological terror.

"I don't think the children are on a critical (health) level. They are pale and thin, but they are playing actively," said Dr. Risto Terzihau of the World Health Organization. "It's impossible to say what kind of psychological trauma they have, but I'm sure they have it."

Burdush is a refugee from Hrid, a hilltop suburb northwest of Sarajevo who claims to be 15 but looks no more than 13. The rivalry with the "Centrals" began, the children say, because the kids at the Central Hotel have water, electricity and a cleaner place to live.

"Their gang leader, Burdush, he's a gypsy. He's a drug addict," said 16-year-old Munezica, a "Central." "I am the strongest and that's why I am the leader of the Europees," said

Burdush, sitting atop a garbage can 250 yards away, past the children's no man's-land and the "front-line" of trash dumpsters.

On the other side of town, Ania Mehanovic, a freshly scrubbed 7-year-old with porcelain skin, big brown eyes and delicate hands, shivered in a small, unheated room with seven other children, waiting for her teacher.

The people in her neighborhood of sprawling middle-class high-rises have sought to organize classes for their children. But the cold, lack of electricity, and school supplies, shelling and fear have confounded their efforts.

"Amir's teacher hasn't shown up for days. Her students trek in daily and patiently wait at least an hour."

"I'm afraid when they shoot," said Ania, who walks alone from her home across the street. "But it's boring for me at home, so I go out."

"I have nobody to play with, and here I can learn to write," said Sinisa Isic, a freckled redhead with a broad smile, said as he took out an old notebook and started practicing his alphabet.

Some ad-hoc neighborhood schools hold classes in basements or apartments.

The Education Department says it plans to introduce an 18-week shortened course for all ages that can be taught at a neighborhood level.

Avdo Jabucar, deputy education minister, acknowledges the odds are against him.

"Most of the schools are shelled and destroyed or full of refugees, and we also have to take care about safety," Jabucar said.

Azra Catovic, 13, brought her reluctant neighbor, 6-year-old Ajna Avdispahic, to the class and hung around for the company. She has no school classes for her age group.

"My mother's a dentist and on duty most of the time. My father's at the front," said Azra. "I would like very much to go to school because I'm alone in the apartment and bored."

OPEC ends overproduction

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — OPEC is pursuing a goal that has eluded the cartel — often before: keeping production under control to give prices a boost.

"It's the same story over and over," said Peter Bogin, associate director for oil markets at Cambridge Energy Research Associates in Paris.

In November, OPEC set a production ceiling of 24.6 million barrels a day. But in the months since, cartel members have been pumping about 23 million barrels a day.

Preparing for Saturday's OPEC meeting in Vienna, cartel president Alio Paris says he has drummed up

support among the nations for a supply cut of at least a million barrels a day.

Saudi Arabia, the organization's most powerful member, initiated the push late last month for a million-barrel-a-day cut, which helped boost prices a dollar or two a barrel. Prices, though, are still running more than \$3 a barrel under the OPEC target of \$21 a 42-gallon barrel.

The average price of a cartel barrel was \$17.65 a barrel last week, up about \$1.30 a barrel since late January. Lighter crudes generally run a dollar or two a barrel higher.



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Retaliation may sour ties, Foley says

TOKYO (AP) — U.S. House Speaker Thomas Foley warned Thursday that threats of trade retaliation by either side could sour relations between the new U.S. administration and Japan.

Foley, visiting Japan on a week-long trip as head of an eight-member congressional delegation, told reporters the two allies and trade partners are too dependent on each other to take "negative trade actions."

"There's no doubt that the trade gap has become very large," said Foley, D-Wash. "But we need cooperation and a positive direction

rather than threats of retaliation." Japan has been under heavy pressure from the United States and other major trading partners to reduce its trade surplus, which surged to a record \$107.1 billion last year, including \$43.7 billion with the United States. Economists predict that the trade imbalance will grow further this

year as Japanese imports shrink due to a recession.

Japan's relations with President Clinton got off to a rough start, with U.S. lawmakers filing tough trade bills and Japan warning of retaliation. But Japanese automakers were relieved Tuesday when U.S. automakers dropped their threat to file antidumping measures against foreign carmakers.

Foreign Minister Michio Watanabe left earlier Thursday for Washington, where he was expected to try to dissuade U.S. officials from taking tough measures on trade.

Suspect in CIA shootings disappears

QUETTA, Pakistan (AP) — A 28-year-old Pakistani wanted by the United States quietly slipped back into the country, then disappeared just before he was accused of murdering two CIA employees and Frank Langling, 28, both CIA in Virginia, relatives said Thursday.

The Pakistani government promised to track down the suspect, Mir Aimal Kadir, and extradite him to the United States for

trial. But family members and friends insisted he was innocent. Kadir was charged Tuesday with capital murder in the Jan. 25 deaths of Lansing H. Bennett, 66, and Frank Langling, 28, both CIA in Virginia, relatives said Thursday. Two other agency employees and a third man were shot dead when a gunman shot into cars waiting at a street light to turn into the agency's headquarters.

Iran stronger, president says

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Tehran's renewed revolutionary fervor was affirmed by the people on Thursday when hundreds of thousands packed Freedom Square on the 14th anniversary of the Islamic Revolution.

High inflation, unemployment and tense relations with neighbors and trade partners beset the country, devastated by the 1980-88 war with Iraq.

But President Hashemi Rafsanjani told the crowd that revolutionary Iran had emerged all the stronger for its staunch independence.

Stones' free spirit flies high with solo album

"Sorry I'm late. I just got into the house, and I'm a bit wet," Mick Jagger says over the phone a few days ago, still out of breath from some unexplained exertion in the West Indies.

Pressed for details, he replies with a giggle between bites of tea-time cake. "No, I'm not gonna tell you what I've been doing or where I am, because it's gonna be warmer than where you are and you're gonna be jealous."

Although he'll be 50 on July 26, Jagger's jet-set image remains intact. Meanwhile, his musical reputation has taken a beating.

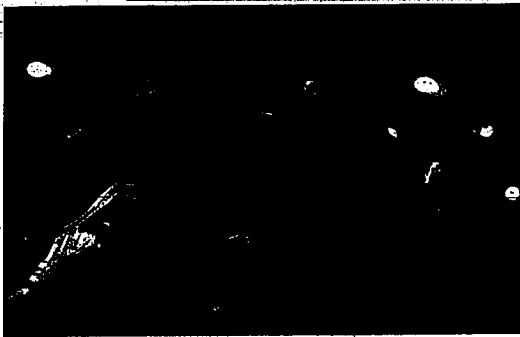
While his performances with the Rolling Stones have been professional and sometimes inspired in recent years, his solo records have been abysmal.

But this week, Atlantic Records will release Jagger's third solo disc, "Wandering Spirit," and - surprise - it's the best album made by any member of the Stones, individually or collectively, since "Tattoo You" in 1981.

"I hope it sounds like that - I want him to have a good record," says Jagger's songwriting collaborator in the Stones, Keith Richards. "Maybe it's more like the record he should've made the first time around."

Richards is a good deal more conciliatory toward Jagger these days than he was in the mid-'80s. When Jagger released his first solo album, "She's the Boss," in 1985, Richards steamed. Then Jagger refused to tour behind the Stones' "Dirty Work" album, instead releasing the solo "Primitive Cool" in 1987, and hitting the road with a

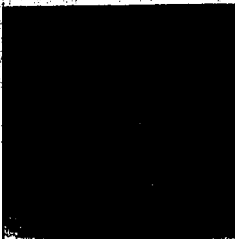

'Limelitters' bring Jackpot song, satire

JACKPOT-News — The Limelitters will appear Tuesday through Feb. 25 in the Gala Showroom at Cactus Pates.

Combining classic songs with humor and contemporary satire, the folk group performs for all ages. Along with a string of best-selling albums, the Limelitters made its mark in the music world with timeless hits, including "Baby, the Rain Must Fall" and "Dollar Down."

It all began in 1959: Between takes of a horror movie, actor/musician Alex Hassilev performed solo in Cosmo Alley, a Los Angeles coffee house. One night, he asked Glen Yarbrough, with whom he had worked before, to come out of the audience and sing some impromptu duets. Yarbrough stayed on. Then one night, The Kingston Trio's "Lemon Tree" was dropped by Cosmo Alley and heard Hassilev and Yarbrough and asked if they would cut a demo with him.

From there, the newly formed trio took its act to the Limelite Club in Aspen, Colo. After just two months, the group's members labeled themselves after the club and moved to San Francisco. Their show was an instant success and by the end of the first week, the Limelitters had received offers from four major recording companies. One smash engagement led to another, and soon the Limelitters were one of the hottest folk acts in the country.

Just when success had been realized, the group's members decided to part ways. During the

1970s, the Limelitters worked together periodically in a series of reunion-tours. The 1980s ushered in a new chapter for the group. Hassilev and Gottlieb joined forces with tenor Rick Dougherty and instrumentalist John David and once again the Limelitters were on the road to musical success.

Hassilev, a Paris native and actor, was educated at Harvard and the University of Chicago. The group's baritone and song producer, Hassilev is also a master on the guitar-and-banjo. Gottlieb is the humorous spokesman of the Limelitters. While Gottlieb's cracking jokes during the show, the audience could hardly guess this comic has earned a Ph.D. in musicology.

With 25 years of experience, Dougherty's high, soaring tenor energizes the group's sound. Among his credits, Dougherty has directed and appeared with various companies in California's Bay area. David's instrumental work is highlighted by his ability to bridge the gap between folk and contemporary styles. Crooner donates \$50,000 to arts school in Harlem

NEW YORK — Singer Michael Bolton, whose remakes of classic rhythm and blues standards have earned him triple platinum sales, gave \$50,000 to the Harlem School of the Arts Monday, saying that he wanted to give something back to the black community from whose culture he has drawn his singing style, material and commercial success.

"This is just one of the appropriate ways that I can think of to show the obvious and tremendous contribution that African-Americans have made to our culture and my career," said the lean, blond singer, addressing an afternoon gathering of students, teachers, elected officials and the news media at the school.

Citing early influence from recording artists such as Ray Charles and Stevie Wonder, Bolton said that he wanted his \$25,000 donation,

which was matched by \$25,000 from his record company, Columbia Records, to set an example to others in the recording industry to support cast-starved arts organizations.

Darryl Durham, executive and artistic director of the 29-year-old private institution, said that Bolton's gift would be used to finance student scholarships, financial aid and performance opportunities that have been reduced in recent years as the school faced a decline in donations from both public and private sources. It currently operates on \$1.6 million each year.

Even when he's away, he's everywhere

Like wagering, hookers and blimps, Garth Brooks was everywhere during Super Bowl Week in Los Angeles.

He started off Monday by winning an American Music Award as favorite male country artist. In his acceptance speech, Brooks expressed hope that his fans wouldn't forget him during his eight-month layoff. You have to wonder what he's taking a break from shaving, perhaps?

The next day, he and his band played an impromptu show under the name Yukon Jack in a small New Mexico club. On Thursday, Garth performed his new single, "Learning To Live Again," on "The Tonight Show." Friday, he played two sell-out concerts at the 18,000-seat Forum, and on Saturday, it was a nationally televised concert at the NFL Experience theme park. On Super Sunday, of course, Brooks sang the national anthem in front of an estimated worldwide audience of one billion.

Still to come are his two sold-out shows at the Houston Astro-dome on Feb. 21 and 22, Jerez, Mexico, "I hope you don't forget him during this extended layoff." To his credit, Brooks' Forum concerts raised nearly a million dollars to build a youth center in South Central Los Angeles, but considering his schedule during the publicized layoff, I wonder what his rumored "retirement" would've meant: a six-month tour of Eastern Europe?

Brooks' heightened profile could be in response to his being knocked out of the top spot on the country albums chart by Billy Ray Cyrus' "Some Gave All." Even though the Cyrus smash LP has been out 36 weeks — twice as long as "The Chase" — it has more legs on the charts, which must hurt the competitive Brooks.

The success does seem to finally

have made it through Billy Ray's thick neck and on to his head. When he accepted the American Music Award for best new artist, BRC took a shot at Travis Tritt, who had questioned Cyrus' brand of country burlesque months earlier. "This is for all the self-proclaimed critics who didn't like Acly Breaty Heart," he said, waving the trophy over his head.

"Here's a quarter, call someone who cares."

After making his unkind (though, in retrospect, dead-on) remarks in June radio interview, Tritt was taken back with all the controversy — and made something of an apology by sending Cyrus a potted plant.

Heal the hurt: Give foster kids knowledge they've been loved

DEAR ABBY: We have a foster child in our home, age 7, whom we plan to adopt. Until his mother put him up for adoption at age 5, his life was at the mercy of adults who were usually drunk. Physical and emotional abuse were all he knew.

He has been able to forgive his mother and her friends for hurting him, and his father for "never, ever even once seeing me to know what I look like." However, expressing normal emotions is not part of him yet. He has learned to laugh this year. He screams, screeches and has tantrums, but he cannot cry.

On Jan. 4, he received a Christmas gift from his mother. She delivered it to Children's Services on time, but because they were slow in forwarding it to us, we did not receive it until after New Year's. He opened the box, dug out the stuffed toy and tossed it aside. Then he opened the card, which his mother had printed clearly so he could read it.

With his usual false bravado, he said, "There was something about how we actually worked together because we didn't have these torturous, dramatic interpersonal relationships off screen. So the most intimate relationship we had was each other on screen. And I think that shows."

(At that point, he slowed down and seemed unable to continue. His posture softened, his voice almost faded, and a tear trickled down his cheek.)

He continued, "slowly and haltingly, 'You will always be with me in my heart. I love you, Mom.' He just stood there, holding the card. I asked him if he was sad because he didn't like the present that brought him back to reality. He came over to me, crawled up on my lap and began to sob. He never, ever thought his mom wanted him, or even missed him—'even a teensy.' We rocked, and I prayed, and he cried for nearly an hour.

He named his joy and asked if he could take it everywhere—even to church. He wouldn't let me use a pin to tack the card up on his bulletin board because that would put a hole in it. Abby, I am sharing this with you as a plea to every parent, mother or father, who has given up a child:

"Mom and Dad, please try to get past your own grief, guilt and pain and try to give your child one more gift — the gift that may well be the key to his or her ability to be healed and restored."

"These children must know that they were loved, and therefore are now lovable."

"Please give them a tangible keepsake; it doesn't have to be fancy or grammatically correct if it's in writing. But do tell them that they were loved. The healing that this can bring is beyond measure."

Foster takes strong approach to romantic drama set in South

NEW YORK — Think of Jodie Foster, and words like "smart," "confident" and "strong" come to mind.

Now the two-time Oscar-winning actress is trying for a new adjective: romantic.

In the new film "Somersby," Foster is teamed with Richard Gere, who knows a few things about love stories, having starred in such films as "An Officer and a Gentleman" and "Pretty Woman."

"Somersby" is an American version of the 16th century French tale that was the basis for "The Return of Martin Guerre," the 1982 French film starring Gerard Depardieu.

But the pairing of Gere and Foster in this grand romance about secret identities was a choice that elicited mixed reactions, says director Jon Amiel.

"Everybody said, 'Ohhhhhh. Please love story!' Jodie Foster? Hummmmm. Really, interesting," he says. "You could tell people's doubts and anxieties were considerable, precisely because it was an unknown quantity."

"She's not the obvious romantic choice for a coupling that one would go after. But the movie has a life that was beyond just the beauty of two people together. Our fear was

if we went just with that beautiful coupling, the subtext would suffer."

Gere, also executive producer of the film, was not the least bit anxious about the casting of his leading star.

"Well, it's different," he says of her new role, matter-of-factly. The 30-year-old Foster, who began her show-business career at age 3, looks professional and self-possessed in her interview.

"What's nice" about the film, she says, "is that it's not one of these costume dramas with people looking

at each other across the landscapes. This is deeper than just a romantic love story. It tests the love. It gives it a stake. There is this life-and-death issue about love which I think feels matter."

But what about the sexual chemistry? Just because you are a great actor does not mean you are going to make the screen sizzle. And not so great ones can make audiences swoon.

"I never really thought about it, thank God, or I guess I would have been nervous," she says.

"There was something about how we actually worked together because we didn't have these torturous, dramatic interpersonal relationships off screen. So the most intimate relationship we had was each other on screen. And I think that shows."

Foster is nonchalant about the romantic nature of her role, as is Gere, a young woman who has grown during her years alone and now finds a deeper love with this man who enters her much-changed life.

"I've done (romances) before," she says. However, she acknowledges that her recent roles in films such as "The Accused," "The Silence of the Lambs" and "Little Man Tate," which she also directed, shows her strong and resilient.

"But there's no reason why you can't play a romantic lead and still be strong at the same time. I don't know who made that rule."

Enigmatic actor fends off attempts to peel away the outer sheen

NEW YORK — In a perfect world, 30 minutes alone with Richard Gere should be the kind of scintillating interlude that can make celebrity journalism such a rewarding experience.

In the real world, it's like surviving a rough flight, rife with turbulence and treacherous air pockets. Just when it seems the wheels are never coming down, you're back on the ground and it never looked so good. Fasten your seat belts. It's going to be a bumpy read.

An hour after a scheduled interview, a reporter and photographer are ushered into a hotel room to meet Gere. At 33, the star of "Looking for Mr. Goodbar," "American Gigolo," "An Officer and a Gentleman," and 1990's biggest hit, "Pretty Woman," looks a decade younger.

Gere does not get up from the couch but extends his hand and flashes a bright smile. "Hi, I'm Richard," he says, all movie star subtle, boots, jeans and blazer.

Things look promising. But right after the opening question, a softball about his new movie, "Sommersby," the temperature dips precipitously and the first clouds appear.

Gere announces that he isn't fond of interviews and only does them for movies. He cares about, such as "Sommersby," a romantic drama in which the co-stars with Jodie Foster.

But any visions of Gere relaxing and letting loose with a stream of family anecdotes are short-lived. He waits for each new question with a mixture of scorn and denial.

When it is suggested he's a bit defensive, he smiles. "How much can you expect to learn about me?" he says. "You just walked in the door. All I know is you're someone who writes about celebrities. What do you want to know?"

Well, you asked. How about those recurring rumors that you and Cindy Crawford are gay? Crawford has addressed the rumors in recent interviews, saying she and Gere are "secure" in their sexuality and denying that either are homosexual.

Gere was also the subject of a particularly vicious rumor a few days ago, one that was resurrected in a cartoon in the February issue of Spy magazine.

Gere smiles at the question and then adopts a blank expression. "I don't know anything about any of that," he says flatly. "Then he amends the statement: 'It's kid stuff. Kids in a schoolyard.'"

Oddly enough, the gay rumor question seems to put him in a good mood. He talks some more about Crawford. He's proud of her booming model-MTV reporter-exercise video queen career. "She's forging her own way," he says, adding that she's very bright, having studied chemical engineering in college.

An hour was promised for the interview but 30 minutes seems just long enough. There's just one last thing. The photographer, having waited 90 minutes, has set up an elaborate array of strobes, umbrellas and lights in the adjoining room so he can take Gere's picture.

Gere strides in the other room, followed by a nervous publicist. He looks around. There will be no picture, he announces. He wants a still from the movie used instead so people will see the film.

He flashes the smile again and walks out the door. And the universe goes on anyway.

'Sommersby' travels a heartfelt journey

The soldier who comes home from war a changed man is a familiar figure in fiction. But what about someone who behaves entirely differently and still claims to be the man who left?

The possibilities and ambiguities posed by this intriguing question were explored a decade ago by Gerard Depardieu and Nathalie Baye in the masterful French production "The Return of Martin Guerre." Given Hollywood's sorry record for recycling — and usually ruining — foreign-film material, the pessimists among us were dreading the return of Richard Gere in "Sommersby."

What we have instead is a rich and moving version of a tale that returns Gere to a professional level he has not enjoyed since "Days of Heaven" and "Bloodbrothers." And that level is still several notches below — the astonishing — and boundlessly subtle performance fashioned by Jodie Foster. It is a flawless reading of effortless virtuosity from an actress who already has two Academy Awards, and an effort that marks the start of next year's Oscar race before this year's have even been handed out.

The translation of the story from 16th century France to our Civil War turns out to be an inspired stroke. Director John Amiel, best known here for the acclaimed miniseries "The Singing Detective," compresses a nation's tragedy into a telling detail after another.

The opening of the film is a dirge of woe and loss that has overwhelmed — and sometimes broken, scraggly families in rural Tennessee. As their lives come home after six years of war and imprisonment in a Union army jail. A central achievement of the beautifully written screenplay by Nicholas Meyer and Sarah Kernochan is the way it sustains the question of identity at the heart of the plot as it probes the ironies raised by Jack's return.

His neighbors have no reason to doubt him and — for very different reasons — neither does his wife, Laurel (Foster), at least not in public. The expression on Laurel's face as Jack strides up the path to her house — a precarious balance of yearning, doubt and ambivalence — is a mere prelude to Foster's intricate and complex portrait of a torn woman.

The Sommersbys who left to fight for the Confederacy was a boorish lout. He is a man so transformed that he may not, indeed, be the same person. He is the soul of kindness, an attentive lover, and, soon, the adored and adoring father of a young son. After years of abandonment and loneliness, Laurel quickly melts. The only complication in her new found happiness is the seething jealousy of Orin (Bill Pullman), a family friend who has been her patient suitor.

Inevitably, it is Orin — who is spurned by Laurel because her duty and allegiance (not to mention her passion) lie with her husband — who finds a way to call Sommersby's claims into court and confront him with an inarguable truth about identity and responsibility. It would be unfair to the elegant evolution and crushing inevitability of the script and Amiel's scrupulous and imaginative depiction to say any more.

"Sommersby" is undoubtedly destined for box-office success, and it is rare for Hollywood to give us a film whose commercial appeal is more than matched by its high artistic quality. In "The Return of Martin Guerre," the theme of a woman forced to fend for herself and make some very tough decisions echoed across the centuries. In "Sommersby," a story that has been re-imagined more than remade, it does so again with renewed and heartbreaking conviction.

Snow levels not good in Snake River Basin

TWIN FALLS — It may be wet, but it ain't snowing hard enough where it counts. Despite gray skies over the Magic Valley, not much snow has fallen in the mountains in the past three weeks, reports the Soil Conservation Service's Snow Survey. Snow levels in upper Snake River Basin have slipped to about 76 percent of average.

Those levels were at 87 percent on Feb. 1. It's not that the snow has disappeared, but the accumulation is averaged over the winter. The amount of snow that represents the average gets a little bigger every day. So every day it doesn't snow, the already below average snowpack gets a little further behind the average.

Based on snowpack, the survey predicts spring runoff for the Snake River to be about 82 percent of average. It predicts the stream flow into Magic Reservoir from the Wood River at 85 percent.

The one bright spot is Salmon Falls Creek. It is expected to yield 112 percent of average stream flow this spring.

The meager snowpack may mean tight irrigation water supplies this summer. Yet its too soon to give up hope. The snow accumulation season lasts into April. That's plenty of time for a couple of big snow storms.

ISP nabs 10 motorists in railroad crossing sting

TWIN FALLS — Idaho State Police officers were riding the rails Thursday morning to catch motorists who failed to stop at rural railroad crossings.

The officers had no trouble finding violators. They cited 10 people and issued a couple of warnings on two passes between Twin Falls and Hansen and one trip to Curry, Sgt. Steve Jones said.

The "Trooper on the Train" program is part of Union Pacific's Operation Lifesaver campaign. An officer rides the train and videotapes cars at upcoming crossings. When the officer violates the radios to a patrol officer in a car who stops the motorists and issues a \$43 citation.

The object is to reduce the number of people injured or killed in car-train accidents, Jones said.

From 1989-91, there were 44-45 such accidents each year in the Magic Valley. Last year that number decreased to 35. Three Magic Valley people died in railroad crossing accidents in the Magic Valley, he said.

Jerome city accountant will serve time for DUI charge

JEROME — The Jerome city accountant will be sentenced on a charge of drunken driving next month.

According to court records, John H. Yon, 35, was arrested Jan. 9 after failing four field tests and breath tests, registering blood alcohol levels of .19 and .20 percent. In Idaho, it is illegal to drive with a blood alcohol level of .10 or more. His pretrial conference was Thursday. According to court documents, Yon indicated he may plead guilty. He will be sentenced March 9 when he will enter his plea.

No rezone needed at Hub Butte

P&Z Commission says site qualifies for heavy industrial use

TWIN FALLS — The county does not need to get Hub Butte rezoned for a landfill site, according to the Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission and the county attorney.

Following Prosecuting Attorney G. Richard Bevan's recommendation, the commission voted 8-0 Thursday night that building a landfill on the butte would be a continuation of the county's current landfill and

therefore does not require a rezoning. Hub Butte lies two miles south of the county's current landfill. County ordinances allow the new landfill on Hub Butte to be considered a continuation of the current landfill's heavy industrial use, Bevan said.

He cited an exception in the county's zoning law that states: "Nothing in this ordinance shall be interpreted to prohibit or restrict the continuance or expansion of the industrial use on any heavy industrial site as provided in State Code..." This land does not even need to be rezoned," he told the commission.

Zoning administrator Lee Taylor agreed, and so did all of the commissioners. Several commissioners said they preferred not to rezone the area.

"I don't want to rezone it if we can get out of this," Commissioner Jim Lanting said.

The Twin Falls County Commission voted last summer that landfills belong in the industrial zone.

Hub Butte lies in the agricultural zone and the county had asked for

303 acres of a 3,100-acre parcel on the butte to be rezoned to industrial.

One county resident, Shirley Nelson, urged the county Thursday night to look elsewhere for a site, saying that she did not want industrial uses spreading into that part of the county.

"We don't need heavy industrial (use) in that area," Nelson said. She suggested looking west of Highway 93.

Geologist Jim Stevens said one possible site was found at Mud Lake, west of the highway. But that site would be more expensive to operate.

Another area resident, Harold Jones, said he did not want the landfill farther south than 2800 North. Otherwise, he did not object to the project, Jones said.

The landfill will last the county at least 50 years, engineer Steve Freiburger told the commission.

In voting that the Hub Butte site was an extension of the current landfill's industrial use, the Planning and Zoning Commission also recommended that the application for a rezone be denied.

Morris Air will ground Twin Falls flights April 4

TWIN FALLS — Morris Air Service, which brought cheaper flights in and out of Twin Falls, will end its daily flights to Salt Lake City on April 4.

Morris Air scheduled the flights primarily for skiers in the California cities it serves, Chief Executive June M. Morris said Thursday. The flights started in December with rates as low as \$79 round trip.

The airline hasn't decided whether it will fly between Salt Lake City and Twin Falls next winter, Morris said.

"It's certainly something we're going to look at again," she said.

The first Morris Air winter in Twin Falls brought increased competition and cheaper flights to Twin Falls.

SkyWest dropped its prices and most restrictions on its tickets out of Twin Falls, partly to compete with Morris Air. SkyWest didn't say how long the program would last. It called the strategy experimental.

Delta Air Lines also dropped its ticket prices on routes that competed with Morris.

Karen Porter, owner of 4 Ways Travel Service of Twin Falls, wondered if Morris Air's departure will reduce competitive pricing.

"It'll be interesting to see if things go back to the way they were," she said.

Man calling for client lists isn't affiliated with T-N

TWIN FALLS — A man who called a Twin Falls weight-loss business Wednesday falsely claimed to be working with *The Times-News* and asked for the names of the business' clients.

A man who identified himself as David Matlock called Pam Boldt, manager of The Diet Center, Wednesday morning. Boldt said the man said he wanted to use some of her clients as advertising models.

The man said he works for Gem State Advertising in Boise and was working with *The Times-News* on an advertising project, Boldt said.

When Boldt asked for references or a telephone number, the man said he would send her some information and hung up.

Neither the Boise telephone book nor directory assistance has listing for Gem State Advertising, and the Better Business Bureau's Boise office said they

had no information on a firm with that name.

There are two David-Matlocks in the Boise telephone directory, and both said Thursday they knew nothing of the calls to The Diet Center.

Another Diet Center employee received a similar call Tuesday evening, Boldt said. Other weight loss businesses in town said Wednesday that they had not received similar calls.

Times-News Sales Manager Janet Goffin advised people not to give information over the telephone to people they are not familiar with, any *Times-News* advertising salesperson will provide a return telephone number, a business card or other verification, Goffin said.

The newspaper does not contact businesses and ask for models to appear in advertising, she said. Usually it is the business that contacts its advertising representative to request photographs for advertisements.

Bill would allow districts to elect commissioners

BOISE — County commissioners could be elected from individual districts under a bill approved Thursday by the Idaho House.

Currently, commissioners are nominated to represent one of three zones in a county but are elected by the voters of the entire county.

But HB9, sponsored by House Minority Leader Jim Stoicheff, would allow counties to adopt a system of district-only elections. It would also allow people to adopt district-only elections by initiative or referendum.

Stoicheff argued that now, a commissioner actually represents one zone but who nominally represents one zone can usually lose that zone in the election but win anyway by getting enough votes from the other zones.

The Sandpoint Democrat sponsored a similar bill last year that would have required district-only elections. That measure died in a House committee.

In contrast, he said, "There's nothing mandatory about this. If the folks aren't



interested in doing it, fine, they don't have to."

Rep. Mark Stubbs, R-Twin Falls, said during floor debate that district-only elections should be mandatory, because they make it more likely that far-flung areas of large counties like Twin Falls and Blaine will be represented by commissioners of their own choosing.

But, Stubbs said, he would vote for H.9 because it's better than nothing.

Rep. Judi Danielson, R-Council, was the only person to speak against the bill. She said budget decisions affecting the entire county should be made by commissioners elected by the entire county.

"Danielson and seven other lawmakers voted against the bill, which now goes to the Senate for consideration."

Lawmakers put governor's tax plan under microscope

BOISE — Lawmakers took their first detailed look at Gov. Cecil Andrus' plan to restructure Idaho's tax system Thursday. They weren't too impressed.

However, they seemed willing to at least consider two of the key components of Andrus' package: repealing some sales tax exemptions and extending the tax to some services.

Dozens of high-powered lobbyists representing some of the state's most powerful corporations and associations were on hand to give their particular spins

on the plan to a subcommittee of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee.

Gerald D. Van Buren, Idaho Power's manager for corporate taxes, argued that the package, by putting greater emphasis on sales and income taxes, would tie the state's tax system more tightly to business cycles, and thus make tax revenues more volatile.

Van Buren also said a provision extending the 5 percent sales tax to electricity would effectively tax it three times. Idaho Power already pays a tax on kilowatt-hours generated, as well as sales tax on its generating equipment.

Tests turn up iodine near INEL

TWIN FALLS — Sophisticated tests have turned up traces of radioactive iodine in the Snake River Plain Aquifer up to eight miles south of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Despite the minute amounts — 1 million times less than federal drinking water standards — the discovery underscores the need for cleanup of buried waste at the eastern Idaho site, Gov. Cecil Andrus' aide Scott Peyron said Thursday.

Waste water containing trace amounts of iodine and other radioactive materials was dumped

likely have been present in the aquifer for several years, but in such minute quantities that the chemical has been undetectable with standard methods, according to a federal Energy Department statement. The U.S. Geological Survey used a more sensitive analytical method to find the iodine.

Iodine-129 is a byproduct of a nuclear chain reaction, but it also is produced by volcanic activity. The iodine in the aquifer may be the result of past INEL waste disposal, the department said.

Several radioactive and chemical contaminants have been identified in the aquifer below the INEL. But the first time any were found off the site was in 1990 when the USGS located a plume of radioactive chlorine, using the same method that found the iodine. The chlorine also was detected at 1 million times below federal drinking water standards.

Fort Hall to begin using foot patrols

FORT HALL — Police will begin foot patrols around housing projects on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation this spring in the wake of the death of an Indian boy who was beaten and left to freeze.

"It will be called the Fort Hall Housing Police," Fort Hall Police Chief Don Davis said Thursday.

Davis said foot patrols have proven effective in fighting inner-city crime, but Fort Hall's will be the first program of its kind on an Indian reservation. He said four officers will be walking patrols by April 1.

Fort Hall Business Council members approved the foot patrols last week after Bear's mother and stepfather and others called for a massive overhaul of tribal government.

Ex-prostitute goes to jail for 2 days

COEUR d'ALENE — A former Fort Falls woman arrested for prostitution during a police raid on Stateline last summer has been sentenced to two days in jail.

Elena Ramirez, 32, who now lives near Dallas, flew to Coeur d'Alene for her sentencing on the misdemeanor charge Monday.

Kootenai County Magistrate Bob Burton sentenced Ramirez to 30 days in jail, but suspended 28 days. Burton also ordered her to pay a \$300 fine and serve one year of probation.

Adene's was one of three massage parlors targeted during the police raid. Eight women were charged with prostitution and all three businesses have since been closed.

Tech school to help migrant workers

IDAHO FALLS — Eastern Idaho Technical College has opened a program to help Idaho Falls-area migrant farm workers earn their high school equivalency diplomas.

The Idaho Falls college became the fourth off-campus site to offer the federal program, which is run by Boise State University. There is no charge and school supplies and tests all are provided.

Rosa Quilantan, former director of migrant education for the Idaho Falls School District, now works for Boise State and recruits students for the program. She said it helps about 200 people get their diplomas each year.

Loggers seek apology from NBC

COEUR d'ALENE — Northern Idaho's logging industry is threatening legal action unless it gets a prime-time apology from NBC for a report linking dead fish to logging on the Clearwater National Forest.

The Jan. 5 report on the "NBC Nightly News" also included film footage of wildfire-devastated Olympic Peninsula forests portrayed as clearcuts on the north-central Idaho forest.

"Clearly, we think they were way out of bounds here," Ken Kohli, spokesman for the Coeur d'Alene-based Intermountain Forest Industry Association, said Wednesday.

Kohli said the association has hired the Washington, D.C., law firm of Crowell & Moring to explore possible court action against NBC.

The NBC report on the Clearwater showed what appeared to be dead fish floating belly up.

Police nab suspect in attack on family

NAMPA — A man broke into a Nampa home, ordered a mother and her five children into a garage at knifepoint and attacked two of the children before fleeing, police said.

Authorities later arrested James Cagle, 21 of Nampa and charged him with three counts of aggravated battery and one count of burglary.

The man broke into the residence of Jeannette Wickersham, 38, early Wednesday and took the woman and children into the garage, where he demanded rope to tie them up.

Obscure federal law raises opportunities

BOISE (AP) — Multiple-use advocates see an obscure federal-law enacted in 1866 as a way to help them gain access to more of the West's backcountry, including millions of acres of roadless land in Idaho.

And at a public hearing Wednesday, Secretary of State Pete Conarrusa told the Legislature's House and Senate Transportation committees that the law could open many old roads and rights of way to public access.

In many cases, private landowners have closed old public roads passing through their property to federal lands, effectively locking out the public and even the state Department of Lands, Conarrusa said.

"We have so many parcels of lands in Idaho that are landlocked, and as a result, they have no value," he said. "We can't get the highest and best use of them."

The federal law allows citizens to file an "assertion" with a county government to preserve the public's right to use a road that had been reserved as a private right of way any time between 1866 and 1976.

Rights of way granted during that time are referred to by the federal government as "RS 2477" roads. But the exact definition of a right of way is very broad under the old law, and the process of determining what roads were reserved may prove difficult.

Wednesday's hearing was called after lawmakers learned the federal Bureau of Land Management was planning to file a report that Idaho

had no concerns about RS 2477 roads. House Transportation Chairman JoAn Wood, R-Rigby, scolded the BLM for not publicizing December meetings on the issue.

"They didn't even notify the governor or the state Land Board," she said.

But after the hearing, BLM realty specialist Bill Weigand said the new testimony will be incorporated into a March 1 draft report on RS 2477 roads for Congress. A final report will be submitted in May.

A search by the BLM indicates that about 2,300 miles of RS 2477 roads have been recorded on Idaho public land records, more than twice as many as any other state. No assertions had been filed with county gov-

ernments at the beginning of the BLM's status review. But as of Wednesday, more than 50 had been filed, officials said.

Phil Nisbet of Grassroots for Multiple Use in Salmon said there will be hundreds more filed by group members in Idaho counties. More than 300 are in the works in Lemhi County alone, he said, and more than 1,000 assertions have been filed in Utah and Alaska.

Craig Gehlke, regional director of The Wilderness Society, said he fears that pro-development and off-road-vehicle groups might file assertions into wilderness study areas to preclude their suitability for wilderness, a move that Nisbet said his group will consider.

Idaho needs primary care in rural areas

MOSCOW (AP) — If Idaho is to fill the growing shortage of doctors in rural areas, the state may have to produce its own home-grown variety of health workers.

So says Michael Laskowski, director of the WAMI Regional Medical Program at the University of Idaho and Washington State University.

"Primary care is really what Idaho needs," Laskowski said. He said about 48 percent of Idaho lacks the necessary health care typically provided by family doctors, nurse practitioners and physician assistants.

Laskowski said research also shows most young doctors who return to Idaho settle in or near their home town.

For that reason, he said, WAMI (Washington-Alaska-Montana-Idaho) wants to launch a program to identify potential doctors in small towns at the grade-school age, then help usher them through medical school.

Currently, WAMI is aiming at Idaho communities, Laskowski told those attending a noon meeting Wednesday of the League of Women Voters at the UI.

"The reason I've focused on Native Americans is because there is federal grant money available," Laskowski said. "Then we would use it (the program) as a model" to expand the effort statewide.

WAMI is a cooperative medical school program developed more than

20 years ago between the four states. WAMI has produced 169 practicing doctors from within Idaho and about 25 percent of those have remained in the state.

While that percentage may seem low, he said other WAMI students from the other three states have also set up practices in Idaho, boosting the "real return rate" to about 70 percent. It costs about \$37,500 a year to put one student through the WAMI program.

Laskowski said WAMI hopes to eventually go to grade schools throughout the state and locate youngsters with the "enthusiasm" to become health workers. Already WAMI selects some 24 high school students for a summertime, week-long "immersion in medicine" program aimed at encouraging youngsters toward medical school.

mal. The spring is tapped high on the source, but the muddy water was running down through cracks in the rock above the city's tap.

Martin said the problem was not serious, but it was noticeable and needed to be stopped. Officials from the state Division of Environmental Quality tested the water Thursday but were unavailable for comment.

To solve the problem, Martin said, the valve from Potter Spring to the city was shut off. The Hagerman water system is now drawing only from its second source, Big Spring. Martin said water from Potter Spring is not really needed until summer irrigation begins.

"We'll make sure it's completely

clean and tested before we put it back in the system," he said.

Meanwhile, local residents should let their cold water run until it is clear again, Martin said.

The city has applied for several federal grants to build a new water system that would include a well and a water tank. Next month, Martin and other Hagerman representatives will plead their case before a DEQ panel.

Local residents passed a bond issue in October that would provide matching funds if grants are awarded.

The new system could cost up to \$2 million with Hagerman's share as much as \$500,000. Martin said Hagerman's chances look good because of the bond and because the

amount of public comment.

"We have a list of names of people who say an improved water system will increase their business," Martin said. "But we can't put any new business in water, a new water system."

With a well, the city will be able to pump water if the spring supplies become muddy again, Martin said. "If the city wins grants and the water system is built, Hagerman could have a water system second to none, Martin predicted.

"Our water system now is so old and so obsolete that, if we don't get it done, it's going to be a mess," he said. "With the old pipes and water, we're waiting for water, it's a mess."

If electricity is included in the sales tax, he said, Idaho Power's 237,837 residential customers would pay an average annual tax of \$33. Small commercial customers would pay \$123 annually; irrigation customers would pay \$283 and large industrial customers would pay \$35,262.

Idaho Power itself would save about \$1 million annually, he said.

Steve Ahrens, president of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry, said the package would tilt the tax burden toward businesses and away from individuals.

He particularly argued against Andrus' proposal to treat the production exemption for tools, equipment and machinery — even if, as suggested by Rep. Mark Stubbs, the tax on personal property were repealed too.

"The production exemption is such an integral and important part of the Idaho economy that I don't know how

you could repeal it without creating chaos," Ahrens told Stubbs, R-Twin Falls.

The state may eventually need to tax services, he said, but this year the legislature would concentrate on stretching the budget as far as it can go.

Tim Brennan, chief lobbyist for the Idaho Retailers Association, suggested that lawmakers look at taxing professional services, such as those provided by attorneys, accountants and architects — rather than the delivery, installation and repair services Andrus proposes to tax.

Failing that, Brennan said, the Legislature could hike the sales tax by half a percentage point, raising \$92 million, or simply increase projected revenue growth to 7 percent or so from the current 6.2 percent. That would give lawmakers an additional

million dollars or so to play around with.

Michael Ferguson, Andrus' chief economist, defended the plan against legislators who have called for a tax increase in the guise of property tax relief.

The package would raise \$126 million in new revenue and give about \$100 million in the form of tax relief. Most of the rest would go to public schools and higher education.

"I think the package is getting a bad rap — that it's one dollar of tax relief for two dollars of tax hike," Ferguson said. "It's not."

The package isn't just meant to provide property tax relief, he said, but to pay for critical needs that the current tax system doesn't raise enough money to meet.

The subcommittee will continue its examination of the governor's tax package Monday at a hearing scheduled for 3:30 p.m.

The council also voted to allow persons living outside of the city limits to participate in the city's fire department. McClure is not yet ready to schedule training sessions, he said.

Dietrich's council meetings will begin at 7 p.m., instead of 8 p.m., until further notice.

Hailey hydrants cause dispute deluge

HAILEY — A dispute between Hailey city officials and a rural property owners' association over fire hydrants may end up in court.

At Monday night's Hailey City Council meeting, members of the Indian Creek Ranch Homeowners' Association supported off with council members and Hailey Mayor R. Keith Roark over whether the city has lived up to its end of a 10-year-old agreement.

The city gets a substantial amount of its water supply from sources in the Indian Creek Canyon. At dispute is the 1983 agreement between the city and the association regarding placement of a storage tank and water line in the canyon; which is located in unincorporated Blaine County to the northeast of Hailey.

At Monday's meeting, Nick Latham, who was president of the homeowners' group in 1983, said the city agreed to install six fire hydrants along the Indian Creek Ranch subdivision at six along the water delivery system.

But the written pact entered into by the association and the city at that time does not specifically say that the city would install that number of hydrants on the line.

Hailey City Administrator Daryle James, who was the city's water and sewer superintendent a decade ago, said Monday that at the two parties agreed verbally at the time that the city would install "up to six hydrants."

James said that when the time came to place hydrants on the line, only two suitable locations were found. According to James and current Water and Sewer Department Superintendent Stephen Tozier, one of those hydrants has since become inoperable because drought conditions have reduced water pressure.

When Latham and other

This prompted Roark to respond that the city had performed according to the written agreement signed at the time.

He said that given the drought's effects on flows at Indian Creek, fire protection in the city may be jeopardized, and it would be irresponsible for him and the council to bow to the wishes of the homeowners.

Roark told the homeowners he felt it irresponsible of city officials to sign such the first agreement.

"Having the hydrants outside of the city, where our people don't regularly patrol, was a bad idea."

Fort Hall to begin using foot patrols

FORT HALL — Police will begin foot patrols around housing projects on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation this spring in the wake of the death of an Indian boy who was beaten and left to freeze. "It will be called the Fort Hall Housing Police," Fort Hall Police Chief Don Davis said Thursday. Davis said foot patrols have proven effective in fighting inner-city crime, but Fort Hall's will be the first program of its kind on an Indian reservation. He said four officers will be walking patrols by April 1. Fort Hall Business Council members approved the foot patrols last week after Bear's mother and stepfather and others called for a massive overhaul of tribal government.

Ex-prostitute goes to jail for 2 days

COEUR D'ALENE — A former Post Falls woman arrested for prostitution during a police raid on Stateline last summer has been sentenced to two days in jail.

Eloise Ramirez, 32, who now lives near Dallas, flew to Coeur d'Alene for her sentencing on the misdemeanor charge Monday. Kootenai County Magistrate Bob Burton sentenced Ramirez to 30 days in jail, but suspended 28 days. Burton also ordered her to pay a \$300 fine and serve one year of probation. Adene's was one of three massage parlors targeted during the police raid. Eight women were charged with prostitution and all three businesses have since been closed.

Tech schools to help migrant workers

IDAHO FALLS — Eastern Idaho Technical College has opened a program to help Idaho Falls-area migrant farm workers earn their high school equivalency diplomas. The Idaho Falls college became the fourth off-campus site to offer the federal program, which is run by Boise State University. There is no charge and school supplies and tests all are provided. Ross Quilantan, former director of migrant education for the Idaho Falls School District, now works for Boise State and recruits students for the program. She said it helps about 200 people get their diplomas each year.

Loggers seek apology from NBC

COEUR D'ALENE — Northern Idaho's logging industry is threatening legal action unless it gets a prime-time apology from NBC for a report linking dead fish to logging on the Clearwater-National-Forest. The Jan. 5 report on the "NBC Nightly News" also included film footage of wildfire-devastated Olympic Peninsula forests portrayed as clearcuts on the north-central Idaho forest. "Clearly, we think they were way out of bounds here," Ken Kohli, spokesman for the Coeur d'Alene-based Intermountain Forest Industry Association, said Wednesday. Kohli said the association has hired the Washington, D.C., law firm of Crowell & Moring to explore possible court action against NBC. The NBC report on the Clearwater showed what appeared to be dead fish floating belly up.

Police nab suspect in attack on family

NAMPA — A man broke into a Nampa home, ordered a mother and her five children into a garage at knifepoint and attacked two of the children before fleeing, police said. Authorities later arrested James Cagle, 21 of Nampa and charged him with three counts of aggravated battery and one count of burglary. The man broke into the residence of Jeannette Wickersham, 38, early Wednesday and took the woman and children into the garage, where he demanded rope to tie them up.

Obscure federal law raises opportunities

BOISE (AP) — Multiple-use advocates see an obscure federal-law enacted in 1866 as a way to help them gain access to more of the West's backcountry, including millions of acres of roadless land in Idaho. And at a public hearing Wednesday, Secretary of State Pete Cennarus told the Legislature's House and Senate Transportation committees that the law could open many old roads and rights of way to public access.

In many cases, private landowners have closed old public roads passing through their property to federal lands, effectively locking out the public and even the state Department of Lands, Cennarus said.

"We have so many parcels of lands in Idaho that are landlocked, and as a result, they have no value," he said. "We can't get the highest and best use of them."

The federal law allows citizens to file an "assertion" with a county government to preserve the public's right to use a road that had been reserved as a private right of way any time between 1866 and 1976.

Rights-of-way granted during that time are referred to by the federal government as "RS 2477" roads. But the exact definition of a right of way is very broad under the old law, and the process of determining what roads were reserved may prove difficult.

Wednesday's hearing was called after lawmakers learned the federal Bureau of Land Management was planning to file a report that Idaho

had no concerns about RS 2477 roads. House Transportation Chairman JoAn Wood, R-Rigby, scolded the BLM for not publicizing December meetings on the issue.

"They didn't even notify the governor or the state Land Board," she said.

But after the hearing, BLM realty specialist Bill Weigand said the new testimony will be incorporated into a March 1 draft report on RS 2477 roads-for-congress—a final report will be submitted in May.

A search by the BLM indicates that about 2,300 miles of RS 2477 roads have been recorded on Idaho public land records, more than twice as many as any other state. No assertions had been filed with county gov-

ernments at the beginning of the BLM's status review. But as of Wednesday, more than 50 had been filed, officials said.

Phil Nisbet of Grassroots for Multiple Use in Salmon said there will be hundreds more filed by group members in Idaho counties. More than 300 are in the works in Lemhi County alone, he said, and more than 1,000 assertions have been filed in Utah and Alaska.

Craig Gehrk, regional director of The Wilderness Society, said he fears that pro-development and off-road vehicle groups might file assertions into wilderness study areas to preclude their suitability for wilderness, a move that Nisbet said his group will consider.

Idaho needs primary care in rural areas

MOSCOW (AP) — If Idaho is to fill the growing shortage of doctors in rural areas, the state may have to produce its own home-grown variety of health workers.

So says Michael Laskowski, director of the WAMI Regional Medical Program at the University of Idaho and Washington State University.

"Primary care is really what Idaho needs," Laskowski said. He said about 48 percent of Idaho lacks the necessary health care typically provided by family doctors, nurse practitioners and physician assistants.

Laskowski said research also shows most young doctors who return to Idaho settle in or near their home town.

For that reason, he said, WAMI (Washington-Alaska-Montana-Idaho) wants to launch a program to identify potential doctors in small towns at the grade-school age, then help usher them through medical school.

Currently, WAMI is aiming at Indian communities, Laskowski told those attending a noon meeting Wednesday of the League of Women Voters at the UI.

"The reason I've focused on Native Americans is because there is federal grant money available," Laskowski said. "Then we would use it (the program) as a model" to expand the effort statewide.

WAMI is a cooperative medical school program developed more than

20 years ago between the four states. WAMI has produced 169 practicing doctors from within Idaho and about 25 percent of those have remained in the state.

While that percentage may seem low, he said other WAMI students from the other three states have also set up practices in Idaho, boosting the "real return rate" to about 70 percent. It costs about \$37,500 a year to put one student through the WAMI program.

Laskowski said WAMI hopes to eventually go to grade schools throughout the state and locate youngsters with the "enthusiasm" to become health workers. Already WAMI selects some 24 high school students for a summertime, week-long "immersion in medicine" program aimed at encouraging youngsters toward medical school.

Defense disputes fingerprint testimony

RUPERT — Defense attorneys for murder suspect Jerry Finn say fingerprints found at a pawnshop where the owner was killed may not be in blood and could have been left before the murder took place.

Court-appointed public defender Randy Stoker questioned latent fingerprint examiner Robert Kerchusky Thursday during the fourth day of testimony of the trial, in which Finn is charged with stabbing Randy Walker to death.

Kerchusky acknowledged there is no way of knowing when the fingerprints he found on a glass display case in the pawnshop were made.

He testified Wednesday that he found a palm print of Finn by dusting one section of glass from the display case. Two fingerprints were also found of Finn that appeared to be in blood, Kerchusky said.

The fingerprints were photographed, and swabbings were taken from areas of the fingerprints, Don Wyckoff of the Department of Investigation later testified that the swabbings

contained human blood. Stoker said even though the swabbings taken near the prints were in blood that didn't guarantee that the fingerprints themselves were made in blood. He referred to testimony made by Kerchusky that amino black, the substance used to enhance blood prints, reacts to other substances that contain protein, such as eggs and soy sauce. Stoker said it is possible that fingerprints on the counter could have later been covered with blood. That possibility was remote, said Kerchusky, who added it was more likely "the individual that the substance on his finger, then touched the glass."

Kerchusky also said that other prints what he thought was blood was found, including two of Walker's palm prints. Another palm print, found on the pawnshop door, however, hasn't been identified.

It does not belong to Walker or Finn or a customer, Robert Knutsen, or another suspect, Kerchusky said. He was initially questioned in connection with the killing, Kerchusky said.

In other testimony, witnesses said they saw a white man at the pawnshop, whom police have been unable to identify.

While Stoker tried to discredit Kerchusky's identification of Finn, the Boise Crime Lab, testified to the validity of processing of Finn's prints.

Fingerprint examiners always have another examiner validate their identifications, she said. In his testimony, Wyckoff said since he believed blood at the scene belonged to Walker, further categorization of the blood samples weren't done.

All the blood samples that he was able to identify were type "A" blood. By coincidence, however, Walker, Finn and Knutsen, who received cuts when attacked at the pawnshop, all have "A" blood. Because of that, Wyckoff said it's impossible to tell what person the blood came from.

Last fall, then prosecuting attorney Dave Haley received permission from Fifth District Judge George Griggan to have the blood fingerprints DNA tested, which would have determined whose blood it belonged to. However, a Reno, Nev., laboratory indicated there wasn't enough blood to do the DNA testing.

The trial will resume Tuesday.

OLYMPIA, WASH. (AP) — Chicken of the Sea tuna producers on Thursday voluntarily recalled all tuna in 14 ounce cans, sold in shrink-wrapped packs to Costco wholesale stores in nine western states because some cans were damaged.

Van Camp Seafood Co. Inc. recalled shrink-wrapped four-, six- and eight-ounce packs of tuna it supplied to Costco stores in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, California, Alaska, Montana, Nevada, Hawaii and Utah.

Shits or punctures in the cans could allow bacteria to grow, Washington state Health

Department spokesman Dean Owen said Thursday night.

Owen urged Washington consumers to immediately return Chicken of the Sea tuna purchased at any location because Costco supplies some tuna to other retailers.

Damaged cans have been found at Costco stores in Washington state and a retailer in Tumwater, Owen said.

Consumers who purchased the tuna before Feb. 12 should return the cans to Costco for a refund or replacement, Van Camp said.

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'Queen' speaks to another generation

HOLLYWOOD — Sixteen years ago, the late Alex Haley tapped into the American consciousness with his landmark ABC miniseries "Roots." More than 100 million people tuned into the 12-hour drama based on his Pulitzer Prize-winning 1976 best-seller, which chronicled Haley's maternal ancestor's origins from Africa and their passage from slavery to freedom in America.

Audiences will see a far different family story depicted in "Alex Haley's Queen," a lavish, six-hour miniseries. "Queen" explores the origins and life of Haley's paternal grandmother, who was born out of a love affair between a slave and a plantation owner before the Civil War. Throughout her life, Queen had to battle racism and poverty and ultimately, mental illness. Halle Berry plays Queen; Danny Glover, Ann-Margret, Jasmine Guy, Martin Sheen and Timothy Daly are among the featured stars.

"Roots" was important at that time because there had been no show that had been done to talk to the history of black America," said "Queen" producer Mark Wolper. "This show is interesting enough is coming out at a time where there are enormous racial problems between blacks and whites."

The "Queen" miniseries, Wolper said, "addresses a woman who is both black and white and her trying to discover who she is — whether she is black or whether she is white. Ultimately, she realizes it doesn't matter. What is im-

portant is "family and love and your relationship with the people around you. By accident, or by Alex Haley's intuition, this film is more appropriate for this time."

The producer, who worked closely with Haley in the months before his death, said Haley told him that black Americans today are more interested in "going beyond" the past and looking to the future and "finding their place now in this country." "Queen," he believes, speaks to those concerns.

It was Feb. 10, 1992, when Wolper and "Queen" director John Erman, who also directed "Roots" and the 1979 sequel, "Roots: The

Next Generations," had lunch with Haley at the Bel-Air Hotel in Los Angeles. The writer, 70, died later that day of cardiac arrest.

Haley had read and approved the completed screenplay and Erman and Wolper were deep into pre-production by that time.

"He said at the luncheon, 'This story has to be told now,'" Wolper recalled. "This was before the L.A. riots. Somehow, he sensed that things were tense."

"Queen" is dedicated to Haley.

"Queen" airs Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday from 8 to 10 p.m. MST on CBS.

Will pen be mightier than ax for 'I'll Fly Away'?

Here's a question to ponder over the morning java: Is the pen mightier than the network ax?

Tonight, NBC's much-praised, letter-watched "I'll Fly Away" will air for the last time this season, and perhaps for the last time, period. But "Fly" has an advantage few other imperiled shows can boast: Hordes of viewers are peering NBC with pleas to renew the show next season.

It is obvious that the vast bulk of the American viewing public could care less whether this program about the civil rights era stays or goes; it remains a 9 p.m. 125-prime-time series and has achieved an average share of only 13 in its Friday night berth. But it is equally apparent that "I'll Fly Away" has a vocal, impassioned core of supporters. NBC and its producers, Joshua Brand and John Falvey, have received thousands of letters.

Just about any show on the brink of extinction has some supporters. The outcry over "I'll Fly Away," however, is believed to be unusual.

"We're hopeful that the show is not off the air for good, but there have been no promises made" by NBC, says Brand, who also co-created "Northern Exposure" and "Going to Extremes." "But the response on the part of the press and the general viewing public has been enormous."

The campaign to save "I'll Fly Away" is part spontaneous, part orchestrated. Viewers for Quality TV, an advocacy group based in Fairfax, Va., has targeted its nearly

3,000 members to write on behalf of the show; says Dorothy Swanson, the group's founder and president. She says that more members have written in support of this show than any other in the organization's nine-year history.

David Chase, a co-executive producer of "I'll Fly Away," says, "I've never seen this sort of mail before, and I was on 'Rockford Files' for years." The common theme of the letters, he says, is: "I don't know much about the broadcasting business, but all I can tell you is my family and I can't find anything else to watch... If you cancel ('Fly'), you people are forgetting about us entirely."

The push to save "Fly" — certainly encouraged by its producers put NBC in a difficult position. The battered network has a big image problem, and the loss of a critically acclaimed show only adds to its woes. (Executives could not be reached for comment.)

Though the show is, after all, a ratings flop, the power of the letter in the TV business is undiminished. In 1985, "Father Knows Best" was canceled by CBS after only one season. Letters poured in, NBC picked it up, and it lasted another eight seasons. In recent years, "Designing Women," and "Cagney & Lacey" were also helped, in part, by vocal viewers.

Tim Brooks, vice president of research for USA Network and a TV historian, says that such campaigns are a "hallowed tradition" in TV but that they "are generally not successful." The reason, he says, is "you learn in research that even if you get 20,000 letters, that does not reflect the general public at all."

NBC has said it will bring the show back at some point, but networks have made such promises before.

At the end of the day, there's a cynical part of me that says this might be a brush-off, but I'm also taking them at their word, and they've been good on their word up till now," says Brand. "But NBC has a lot of problems right now, and you can also look at us as one of their problems."

Playing lead in 'Queen' traumatic for Berry

Her first starring role was no royal picnic for Halle Berry.

During production of Alex Haley's saga of his paternal grandmother, born a slave, "there were many days when I had total breakdowns," Berry says. "I hyperventilated. I cried hysterically. When I knew a heavy scene was coming up I would try to talk myself out of going to work."

"For three months after filming, everybody in my life caught serious hell. I had a bad attitude. I was angry. I'd cry for no reason. I was very confused and insecure about who I was, who I was becoming and what my purpose in life was."

Berry, 24, best known for her roles in Eddie Murphy's "Boyz n the City" and CBS's "Miss Landry," never let her emotions cause her to knock working. "Queen's" three months on location outside of Charleston, S.C. (She was, however, laid up for 10 days after being thrown from a horse.)

When Berry returned home to Atlanta — where she lives with her new husband, Atlanta Braves slugger Dave Justice — sheounded her black friends to exercise the rights denied to their Civil War-era ancestors.

"I wanted to kill all my friends who don't vote," says the stunning Cleveland native. "I said, 'Our people died so we would have the right to vote. How can you not vote?' As blacks, we have to take advantage of all the opportunities we didn't have then."

Speaking of opportunities, Berry has herself "Queen" on tape for ages but she can't bring herself to watch it because of the fury it evokes. Instead, she's flying in her mother and mother-in-law from Cleveland and Cincinnati, respectively, to experience it with her and Justice when it airs.

"I don't know how I'm going to react," says Berry, an alum of Chicago's famed "Second City" comedy troupe. "I just want to be in a safe place with people who love me. We can go through it together. We can cry our tears together. We can laugh together."

Kids in the Hall find U.S. less tolerant than Canada

Canadian Scott Thompson, who calls himself network television's only openly gay actor, was expressing his comic confusion over why homosexuals are not allowed to serve in the American military.

"Don't they realize that by letting homosexuals serve in the Army they're more likely to get killed? That's the upside," says Thomas, one of five men in the Canadian comedy troupe the Kids in the Hall, which has a sketch comedy series airing late Friday nights on CBS.

"They can let them die in battle," Thompson explained. "They can send gay donations on suicide missions."

Given that sense of humor, shared by all five Kids in the Hall, many people were surprised last September when CBS began airing reruns of "The Kids in the Hall," a TV series that originated four years ago on the Canadian Broadcasting Corp. and was later picked up in even rarer form by Home Box Office.

The initial batch of shows turned out to be edited versions of the CBC broadcasts, so "the question of how much of the Kids' ribald, risqué humor would make it into the 22 original half-hour episodes that CBS ordered was put off — until this week. They will begin airing today. Troupe member Kevin McDonald said in a phone interview from Canada that the relationship with CBS is better than he expected, but — skirmishes have been broken out over some material.

"The things that we're losing are sort of heart-breaking," he said. "We think they're hilarious. We're sort of innocent morons. We can't see why anyone would disapprove of these things. The criticism always hits you

sideways. You never know what it's going to be. Sometimes it's a drug reference, sometimes it's words they're not happy with."

In many ways, the Kids' problems stem from a clash of culture. Johnson said that while most Americans believe that Canadian culture is their culture, in reality Canada is much more laid-back and tolerant. Standards are so loose at the Canadian Broadcasting Corp. that the Kids in the Hall members are now debating which one of them will be the first to try to use the "I word" in a CBC broadcast this year.

In contrast, the five Canadians — in their late 20s and early 30s — are finding the American network system a bit more frustrating. In one new sketch the group is now fighting with CBS executives for the right to air, Mark McKinley plays an over-the-top racist who gets his comeuppance in the end of the scene.

"To destroy him we have to portray him," McDonald said. "So there's a few racist words — understand why they object. But we're saying the words to destroy the kind of people who use them. Hence we think it's valid. They have their points, we have our points — may the best man win."

Thompson feels that CBS has the biggest problems with two issues: sexuality and religion. "I'm a little surprised at how secure the television is," Thompson said. "Just because the TV is square doesn't mean that what comes out of it has to be."

From CBS' point of view, there are no problems," said Rod Thorpe, chief of its night programming department. "We know going with the Kids that we would be pushed by our own sort of self-imposed constraints, and there were obviously going to be some contradictions at times."

Letterman picks Big Apple

NEW YORK — Reason, not to mention, good taste, has prevailed: David Letterman will stay in New York.

CBS, in a terse statement Tuesday, said that the talk show host has decided he wants to keep his show in New York — when he moves from NBC this summer.

But the network cautioned that a final decision on one of the great TV questions of the new year — should Letterman stay in the Big Apple or head to Timestown? — is still days away.

"If some facilities' concerns can be worked out, the show would like to remain in New York," said Ann Morfogen, CBS' vice president for media relations. "We are presently reviewing some studio space and logistical questions. We expect no definitive announcement for a few days."

Nevertheless, sources say that after much debate, travel between New York and Los Angeles and exhaustive audits of studio facilities in both cities, Letterman has decided to

stay put. Sources add that he will relocate the show to the CBS Broadcast Center on West 57th Street, and take up office space across the street at 555 W. 57th St.

While Letterman, his producers and CBS executives will late Tuesday afternoon to discuss the all-important "logistics" question of where the show should be taped, sources said it is widely believed that Letterman wants Studio 42 in the Broadcast Center, one of the center's largest studios and home of the CBS soap opera "As the World Turns."

"As the World Turns," which also has Studio 41, is expected to be moved to another stage in the center to accommodate the new tenant.

Studio 42's size is believed to be one of its key selling points. Sources say that Letterman wants to bring in at least 300 audience members for each day's taping; his NBC show in Studio 6A at 30 Rockefeller Center is taped before only about 100 audience members.

Parachutist falls to death while filming stunt

LONDON (AP) — A stuntman plunged to his death after his parachute failed to open while re-enacting a sky-diving accident.

Tim "Tip" Tipping, 34, was filming a sequence last Friday for a series that reconstructs real-life dramas when the accident happened, the British Broadcasting Corp. said.

Tipping, a former Royal Marine commando, had appeared in Indiana Jones and James Bond films and was the chairman of the Stuntmen's Guild.

He died trying to re-enact parachutist Terry Wakenshaw's accident — one that Wakenshaw had survived.

Wakenshaw had been dragged along the fuselage of a plane last September after his parachute got caught in its wheels, causing injuries to his head, chest and arm. Wakenshaw escaped by pulling an emergency cutaway handle, falling 500 feet and opening a reserve parachute.

When Tipping jumped from the plane in the re-enactment, none of the three parachutes he was carrying opened, according to the BBC, which filmed his fatal fall. The footage was not broadcast.

Tipping plunged into a patch of woods near Altnwick, 300 miles north of London. The accident is under investigation.

Dahmer: No excuses for killings

NEW YORK (AP)—If he hadn't been caught, Jeffrey Dahmer would probably still be hunting down victims, the serial killer says.

"I wish I could say that it just left completely, but ... there are times when I still do have those old compulsions," Dahmer said in his first interview since he was convicted a year ago.

Police discovered severed heads, refrigerated skulls and preserved genitalia in Dahmer's apartment in Milwaukee on July 22, 1991. He

later confessed to killing and dismembering 17 young men and boys — one of them in Ohio.

Dahmer, 32, was interviewed Jan. 12 at Columbia Correctional Facility in Portage, Wis., where he's serving 15 consecutive life terms. Excerpts from the interview, scheduled to air last week on the syndicated television show "Inside Edition," were released to reporters Sunday.

Dahmer said he killed and ate parts of his victims' bodies "not because I hated them, but because I wanted to keep them with me."

He said he alone was to blame for the killings. "That's the only

person — not parents, not society, not pornography," he said.

His acts, he said, resulted from a compulsion "in which sexual fantasies of control and dominance mixed with excitement, fear and pleasure.

Nine years and a stint in the Army passed between Dahmer's first and second killings, but he said he experienced a surge of energy after the second one that made him feel he "was in complete control of the situation."

Dahmer pleaded guilty but insane at his trial and a jury found him to be sane. Wisconsin does not have the death penalty.

Jackson's contract questioned

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A judge said Monday he will review singer Michael Jackson's recording contract to decide whether the document considered one of the most closely guarded deals in show business can be used in a lawsuit.

Attorneys for Sony Music said they would give the inch-thick contract to Superior Court Judge David Yaffe, but pleaded that the lucrative covenant be kept secret. Sony believes the contract's

release would disclose trade secrets and throw the music business into chaos when other music stars renegotiate their deals, Sony attorney Wayne Smith said.

The pact may be crucial in a dispute between an inventor and the singer, his production company and record label, Hugo Zucarelli, the creator of a three-dimensional recording system called Holographics, says Jackson used the technology on singles from his 1987 album, "Bad," without paying a license fee and that he gave inaccurate credits.

Healey arrested in slashing

LOS ANGELES (AP)—James Healey, an actor who appeared on "Dynasty" and "Santa Barbara," was arrested Saturday after allegedly cutting the throat of his sister's estranged husband with a piece of glass, authorities said.

Healey, 42, of Santa Monica, was booked for investigation of attempted murder as long with his sister, Annetta

Virginia Rivera, 35, and a friend, Henri Marechal, 39. Mrs. Rivera and Marechal allegedly held the victim down while the actor cut his throat, said county sheriff's Deputy Ron Weber.

The victim, 42-year-old Jacob Benjamin Rivera of Rosemead, was listed in serious condition at San Gabriel Valley Medical Center, Weber said.

Rivera and a woman friend received several death threats Friday from his wife, Weber said, adding that the Riveras were divorcing.

Shortly after midnight last Friday, three people broke down Rivera's door and assaulted him, while the woman friend called authorities, Weber said.

Deputies arrived a short time later and found the victim bleeding profusely, cut with a piece of glass from a picture frame, Weber said.

Healey and the others were arrested there.

"The suspects had blood spattered all over them," Weber said.

Healey played Sean Rowan on "Dynasty" during the show's 1987-88 season. He also played Derek Griffin on "Santa Barbara."

The player everyone's buzzin' about

ORLANDO — The "Today" show has been calling, trying to schedule an appearance. So has "Entertainment Tonight." Orlando Magazine wanted him for a cover photo. The New York Times Magazine did a cover story, Sports Illustrated whipped together a photo layout. ESPN's "Sunday Night Conversations" chatted him up; Arsenal Hall bumped him up.

He has played to sellout crowds in every game so far, other than a Nov. 18 date in Philadelphia.

This is life with the Orlando Magic's Shaquille O'Neal, the boy who would be king, the 7-1, rookie center with the seven-year, \$40 million contract.

"He's the light at the end of the tunnel," Magic assistant coach Brian Hill said.

"Right now, though the expectation level of everyone outside our organization is too extreme, because everybody thinks he should be doing more right away, I think even our team expects that."

If nothing else, O'Neal — the No. 1 pick in last June's NBA draft — has changed the focus and intensity of virtually everyone directly involved with the Magic. Public relations director Alex Martins and his staff field roughly 40 messages a day for O'Neal. Martins walks O'Neal through a 30-minute media session before every game-day shootaround on the road and tells a lot of people no.

"When I was 20, I was a junior in college just going to class nothing like this," Magic point guard Scott Skiles said. "People follow him around all the time, just going crazy. The excitement of the way our season started has worn off, and now we're into playing game after game, so we don't get quite as much media attention. But if we were 14-4 (instead of 9-9), I'd bet that we'd have 100 reporters around every day."

O'Neal is clearly the magnet, despite his inability to convert free throws. To his credit, he has worked on that aspect of his game and the basics of a jump ball with shooting consultant Buzz Braman, who spent the last two seasons as the Sixers' full-time shooting instructor.

"I'll get better, because my mechanics will get better," O'Neal said. "When I miss (foul shots), I have no excuse. But people just know I'm missing now, they don't know I was 13-for-13 at the line in my last college game (at Louisiana State), they don't know I set a school record with a 20-for-21 game. I know what I'm shooting now, but I also know I'll get better."

His teammates know that, too. "It's up to us to help him, too," swingman Dennis Scott said. "He can't take us to the promised land overnight, but we can try and come close."

O'Neal says that he does not read articles written about him, that he was not bothered when NBA

legend Wilt Chamberlain recently suggested that comparisons between the two were unfair because Chamberlain had a more versatile offensive game, using a fallaway, banked jump shot to score many of his points rather than just dunking.

"That's fine," O'Neal said. "I'll have a jumper one day, too. I'm a young guy with a seven-year, \$40-million contract, so expectations are out of this world. Right now, I'm just trying to be realistic. When you play 82 games, you're going to have some nights when you dominate, some when you're so-so, some when you play like you don't deserve to be in the league."

In the meantime, he has done enough to be among the top 15 in the league in scoring, the top three in rebounding, the top five in blocks. He has accounted for 86 of the team's total 226 offensive rebounds and 69 of 106 blocks.

That all tells Magic general manager Pat Williams that all-of-the-offseason salary-cap adjusting was more than worth it. To clear space to sign O'Neal, the Magic dropped free agents Mark Acres and Otis Smith, then — in a frantic 15-day span — reworked the contracts of Skiles, Greg Kile, Jerry Reynolds, Terry Catledge and Lester Conner. "I don't think anything like this will come up again," Williams said. "It was all too bizarre."

Still, despite the megabucks wheeling and dealing involved, the Magic believe O'Neal will give the team back magnificently.

New basketball videos

Now that football and Super Bowl talk are on the wane, it's time to move on to hoops in a serious way. Two new videos supply all the juices needed for a total transition.

First there is "The Secret NBA," an entertaining visit into the emotions of the sport. More plainly, it's verbal warfare, which can be more easily identified as "trash talk."

This CBS/Fox video puts together interesting comments by players, coaches and even referees. Released just days earlier was CBS video "Shooting Stars of the NCAA," featuring highlights of nine college stars who excelled in the NCAA tournament.

Executive producer Jim Marchiony, a former Georgetown University sports publicist now with the NCAA, spliced in additional footage on a dozen other players who turned in peak performances in the post-season classic known as March Madness. This video is a rip-off for a series of NCAA "Shooting Stars" volumes.

In the NBA video, players seem to agree that everyone talks some trash. It's part of the game; playing a little cat and mouse with each other, getting the opponent to think

about something other than his game. Even cool, slick-topped coach Pat Riley (New York Knicks) admits that you have to "go off" sometimes, adding, "You have to show your players you care."

The nine players featured on "Shooting Stars of the NCAA" are Shaquille O'Neal, Kareem Abdul Jabbar (known then as Lew Alcindor), Patrick Ewing, James Worthy, Danny Manning, Larry Johnson, Magic Johnson, Larry Bird and Christian Laettner, who played in four Final Fours, scored more points and played in more tournaments than any other collegian.

Each featurette has, in addition to some joyous shooting and jamming action, some comments from coaches and players.

Others included are Elvin Hayes, David Robinson, Jack Givens, Grant Hill, Greg Kessler, Clyde Drexler, Ed Pinckney, Keith Smart, Dereck Whittenburg, John Morton, Kenny Anderson and Bobby Hurley.

Missing are a number of greats before Alcindor who it is hoped will be included in subsequent releases, even if the archives have only a little grainy black-and-white film left. That should not diminish their riches in tournament history.

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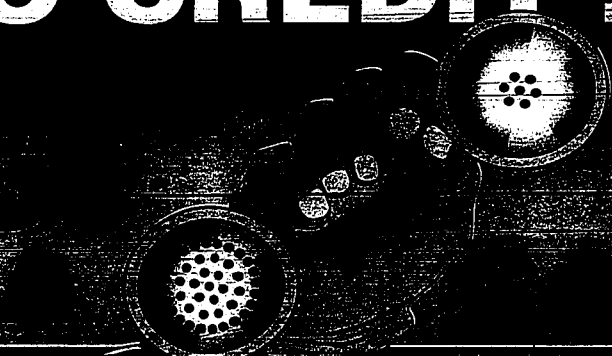


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
