U.S. to airdrop relief aid to Bosnia

WASHINGTON — President Clinton ordered the Pentagon to mount an airdrop of relief supplies into war-torn Bosnia on Thursday.
He said it would serve important "humanitarian purposes" but acknowledging it would fall short of alleviating the region's misery.
Officials said the flights would begin soon — possibly as early as Sunday — using U.S. cargo planes based in Germany. They will be flying at night — at some

10,000 feet to lessen any risk of anti-aircraft fire.
"The war that has raged in Bosnia-Herzegovina over the past year has taken a staggering toll: Thousands have been killed or imprisoned; thousands more are at risk due to hunger and exposure, and over two million people have been forced from their homes," Clinton said in a statement issued at the White House.
He said that regular overland deliveries

"are the best means to ensure that the long-term needs of the Bosnian population are met," but he maintained the airdrops will provide an important supplement.
The president said the need for food and medicine was greatest in Eastern Bosnia and that the airdrops would be made "with-out regard to ethnic or religious affiliation."
"These airdrops are being carried out primarily for humanitarian purposes, not combat aircraft will be used in this operation," Clinton said, indicating no fighter escorts would accompany the unarmed transport aircraft.

Clinton's statement made no mention of any other countries joining in the mission, which he said would be coordinated with existing United Nations relief efforts.
But he said later in answer to a question, "We've had several volunteers." He did not elaborate.
Asked why the mission was worth undertaking, he said that in addition to the humanitarian aspect, "We think if we do it we will be able to create a somewhat better climate for negotiations" in the former Yugoslavias.

Panel finds money to save aquifer study, preserve settlement of lawsuit

BOISE — The Legislature's budget committee on Thursday rescinded a study of the Snake River Plain Aquifer, and in the process likely preserved a deal to settle a lawsuit concerning the aquifer and two Magic Valley canals.
Funding for the proposed groundwater surface water study of the aquifer was approved by the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee, along with money for the Snake River Basin. A adjudication of the Snake River Basin, a blueprint for the Idaho Department of Water Resources and the Idaho Department of Commerce.
The aquifer study, which was prompted by a lawsuit against the state by the Twin Falls and North Side canal companies, will be funded by taking \$187,000 out of an obsolete water conservation fund within the Department of Lands.
The study stems from the canal companies' lawsuit last summer against the Water Resources Department, in which they charged that new groundwater developments in the Upper Snake River Basin were threatening riparian and wildlife habitat.

Idaho Legislature 1993
Under an out-of-court settlement reached last month, the Water Resources Department imposed a five-year moratorium on new groundwater permits while the interrelationship between ground and surface water is studied.
The settlement was contingent upon the Legislature funding part of the study, which is projected to take three years. The canal companies have said they will go back to court if the study isn't funded.
"In a year, when budget writers are struggling to stay within Gov. Cecil Andrus's \$1.08 billion revenue projection, it helped that the study will be funded without general tax increases."
Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome, proposed taking \$187,000 from the Resource Conservation and Development Account, a dedicated fund administered by the Department of Lands. Soil Conservation Commission that account, whose main purpose is to

lend money to private entities for sprinkler systems, riparian improvement and other water-conservation projects, gets money from the state's share of federal inheritance taxes. Usually it contains about \$250,000, but right now it has more than \$1.3 million.
"We've used it a couple of times to bail us out of situations where we just couldn't find General Fund money but needed an appropriate funding source," said Jeff Youz, an analyst with the Legislature Budget Office.
Bell justified taking the money from the conservation account by noting that \$16,000 from a Twin Falls man's estate recently was deposited into it.
"He's probably resting easy knowing that that money is being put to good use," she said.
Bell's motion trimmed the original \$322,000 request for the study to \$287,000 by eliminating a planned look at the effects of conservation on the aquifer. The committee approved it unanimously.
Besides the \$187,000 approved Thursday, the canal companies have agreed to put up \$25,000 and the federal Bureau of Reclamation will kick in an additional \$25,000.

April meet offers help for Yeltsin

WASHINGTON — President Clinton's decision to put a U.S.-Russian summit on a fast track reflects an assessment that Boris Yeltsin urgently needs help to fight anti-Western anger among his political foes.
Clinton had originally planned to meet with the Russian president later this year, devoting his first months in office to his campaign pledge of healing the economy. But with interest in the Russian president's increasingly grim reports from Moscow and intelligence assessments that Yeltsin was in danger of losing significant power to conservative rivals, Clinton's foreign policy aides urged him not to delay.
The April 4 date was chosen, said several officials, to provide Yeltsin with some crucial support one week before a scheduled Russian referendum on who should have more power — Yeltsin or his parliament.
Regardless of whether a meeting with Clinton could affect the outcome of Yeltsin's struggle with his legislature, "no one wanted to be blamed for Yeltsin losing the fight because we didn't help," said one official who spoke only on condition of anonymity.
In the five weeks before the summit, the big question is what Clinton can bring to the table that will provide Yeltsin with a significant boost — short of the billions of dollars Russia would like but Clinton can't afford to give.
"There are 301 small ways to show we care about Yeltsin and his uphill battle to convert Russia from a communist to a market economy and from an authoritarian to a democratic society," said Ilya Prizel, director of Russian studies at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies. These range from "providing aspirin for bare Russian medicine cabinets to building housing for Russian troops stranded in other former Soviet republics, experts say.
Whatever Clinton brings, these experts say, he must keep in mind that plans to help Russia should be formulated in close consultation with the Russians.
U.S. officials say Russian diplomats have been privately urging the new administration to tone down what many Russians regard as the arrogant "big brother" style of the Bush administration.
"What we're hearing from the Russians is a constant drumbeat that says 'this is a demonstrative to our people that this is a partnership with the United States, that there is genuine consultation,'" said one official who asked not to be further identified.

Shooting stuns close-knit Laotian community

TWIN FALLS, Idaho — Bounthong Kinnavongsa and his family say they are shocked and saddened by the shooting of a Laotian family officer Monday night.
Kinnavongsa was killed by return fire from Officer Ron Farnsworth, who was hit in the leg by one round from Kinnavongsa's AK-47 assault rifle.
The gun fight ended Kinnavongsa's search for the good life in the Magic Valley after fleeing his war-ravaged homeland 13 years ago.
"They are just shocked. They don't have any idea why this happened," said Khan-

many Rathamone, a Laotian interpreter who has spent many hours with Kinnavongsa's family since the shooting.
Kinnavongsa and his wife, Leng, were hosts at a family dinner party at their house Monday evening, Rathamone said.
"He was a happy camper all the way through," said Thongpan Thepovongsa, who was at Kinnavongsa's home that night. Everyone listened to music, laughed and joked with one another. When the party

broke up, Kinnavongsa's sister took his 3-year-old daughter, Shida, home with her for a couple of hours, Rathamone said.
Shortly after 9 p.m., Kinnavongsa told his wife, Leng, that he was going to pick up Shida just a few blocks away.
According to the family, he never got there.
Kinnavongsa's sister lives on Adams Street. Just before 9:30 p.m., Farnsworth and another officer heard what sounded like gunshots in the area.
Farnsworth spotted Kinnavongsa's pickup coming out of the alley between Adams and Jefferson streets, according to police.
The patrolman followed Kinnavongsa down Shoup Street and to the end of Osceola Street North. When Kinnavongsa began to turn around, Farnsworth turned on

his overhead lights to begin a traffic stop.
What followed was a brief and intense gun battle that sent Farnsworth to the hospital and left Kinnavongsa dead in the front seat of his pickup next to his empty assault rifle.
The close-knit Twin Falls-area Laotian community of 200-250 people reacted to the incident with horror, said Pauline Day, director of the CSI Refugee Center.
"No one seems to have any answers, and that bothers everyone," Day said.
"His wife didn't even know he had the gun (with him)," Rathamone said.
He had the gun for several years, and a friend said he occasionally hunted deer with it, Rathamone said.

From Rockies to Appalachians, snow blankets the land

Snow was scattered from the Rockies to the Appalachians on Thursday, with a threat of heavy snow in the Ohio Valley, while rain and thunderstorms spread over parts of the South.

At midday, snow was falling in the Rockies, the middle Missouri Valley, the middle Mississippi Valley, much of the lower Ohio Valley, the Tennessee Valley, and the central and southern Appalachians.

The storm had already dropped up to 12 inches of snow around Kansas City, Mo.; 11 inches at Columbia, Mo.; 8 to 12 inches in southern Illinois; and 9 in West Virginia.

Hundreds of schools were closed or dismissed early in parts of Kansas, Missouri, Tennessee, North Carolina, West Virginia, Ohio, Kentucky, Georgia and South Carolina.

The Missouri Legislature adjourned early during the morning so lawmakers could get home, and many businesses closed in Kansas City, Kan. Ten-foot drifts blanketed the East Coast.

The Central Kansas Railway, which operates 125 miles of line between Scott City and Great Bend.

Heavy snow and winter storm warnings were posted Thursday for parts of Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia, extreme southwestern Virginia and South Carolina.

Rain and occasional thunderstorms extended over eastern Texas, the lower Mississippi Valley and central Gulf of Mexico coast.

Locally heavy rain caused street flooding in and around Lake Charles, La., the weather service said.

Heavier rainfall during the six hours up to 11 a.m. MST included 1.50 inches at San Antonio, Texas; 1.38 at Houston and .98 at Shawport, La.

Heavier snowfall during the same period included 8 inches at Harrison, Ark.; 5 inches at Evansville, Ind.; and Kansas City, Mo.; and 3 inches at Paducah, Ky., St. Louis, Mo., and Topeka, Kan.

Record lows were scattered from the Northwest to the East Coast.

In 1980 to escape the fighting that has plagued the small Southeast Asian nation of Laos since it gained independence from the French in 1949.

The Kinnavongs family lived near Luang Prabang, a city of about 45,000 located some 200 miles north of the capital city of Vientiane. Kinnavong was the eldest of three children. He was always quiet - smiling and happy" as a child, said Thep-pong, who knew Kinnavongs as a boy.

Kinnavongs's parents, four sisters and his brother were among the 80 percent of Laos' people who worked hard in the fields to grow enough to live comfortably - the equivalent of a lower middle-class family, Thep-pong said.

As fighting between the Commu-

nist Pathet Lao troops and American-backed anti-Communist forces increased, the Kinnavongs family was driven from their home and split up.

The Pathet Lao took power in 1975. Thep-pong made his way to the United States in 1978 and was soon joined by one of Kinnavongs's sisters.

"He was always quiet - smiling and happy" as a child, said Thep-pong, who knew Kinnavongs as a boy.

"We have suffered a lot from the war, but we don't blame other people," Thep-pong said. "This is not the cause of what happened."

Kinnavongs began working at Swensen's Magic Market more than eight years ago. He fathered a child, Ashley Ann Brown, in 1987.

Court records show the state ordered him to pay child support -

\$125 per month - to Ashley's mother, Tina Brown of Twin Falls. That amount included \$160 per month last September.

He married Leng Thannao in 1988 and the couple had their only child two years later.

Kinnavongs's father has been dead for many years, but his mother still lives in Filer. She often stayed with Kinnavongs, Rathamone said. "He was a good father and he often cared for his mother," Rathamone said.

When she learned of her son's death, Khanny Kinnavongs was shocked and very sad, he said. "She cried and cried," he said. "Everybody is trying to be a good neighbor" and support the family Kinnavongs left behind, Thep-pong said. "We are trying to do the best we can."

The aquaculture and hydropower industries have been approached about contributing the remaining \$50,000, Bell said.

Money for the adjudication - a massive lawsuit intended to sort out every water right held on the Snake River basin - comes from filing fees paid by people claiming to hold water rights. The fees go into a special fund rather than the state's General Account, which has don't currently standing a \$1.08 billion ceiling.

The budget committee approved \$3.3 million for the adjudication, which is being overseen by 5th Dis-

trict Judge Daniel Hurlbut of Twin Falls.

JFAC cut all proposals for capital expenditures out of the department's budget request, as well as \$150,000 it had requested to begin administering water-rights decrees under the adjudication. The money under the water rights is from the General Account, which the panel is squeezing as much as possible.

Overall, JFAC set the Water Resources Department budget at \$3,312,800, \$651,200 less than Andrus had proposed and a \$552,200 cut from its current appropriation.

A senior Pentagon official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the supply-drop was designed to be "of short duration." But bad weather or problems with accuracy of the drops could add to the time, he said.

The aircraft used would be slow-flying C-130 "Hercules" transports. To protect the pilots, the planes are supposed to fly at high altitudes - such as 10,000 feet - to avoid the possibility of anti-aircraft fire from forces on the ground.

However, the higher the flights occur, the less accurate the drops are.

The flights are supposed to direct supplies to the varied ethnic groups - Muslims, Croats and Serbs - in order to counter any charges of favoritism.

There will be a leaflet drop in advance, the official added. The leaflets will be in Serbo-Croatian, using the Latin alphabet for the Croats and the Cyrillic alphabet for the Serbs.

"We want people to know why and when we're coming," he said.

"A second defense official, briefing reporters on condition of anonymity, said such supply missions would include about three-to-five aircraft.

Each plane will carry about sixteen 2,000-pound bundles composed of medical supplies and food staples such as flour, cooking oil, coffee beans, rice and some pre-cooked meals he termed "Meals Ready To Eat."

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Pentagon void of Demo leaders

WASHINGTON (AP) — At the Justice Department, Stuart M. Gerson is the acting attorney general, acting associate attorney general and an assistant attorney general.

He is also a Republican, held over from the Bush administration.

The Democratic leadership void is almost as great at the Defense Department, where the bureaucracy was home alone when Defense Secretary Les Aspin fell ill last Sunday. Aspin is President Clinton's only confirmed appointee at the Pentagon.

The Justice and Defense departments are two of the federal government's biggest and most complex agencies. Yet for a combination of reasons they are operating during the hectic early weeks of President Clinton's term with almost no high-level nominees officially in place to press the president's agenda.

The White House says it's been slow at filling top jobs because FBI background checks have been slow, and because the president and his aides had focused mainly on constructing the economic program Clinton announced last week.

"I think that the pace is picking up and that it just takes a while to go through this process," White House press secretary Dee Dee Myers said Thursday. "I think that we'll get people in place at the Defense Department and other agencies soon."

These are not quiet times at the Pentagon. U.S. troops face fighting in Somalia, Clinton is planning military air drops of food to war-torn Bosnia, U.S. planes are still monitoring the skies over Iraq, the services face a new round of budget cuts, and a major fight looms over openly allowing homosexuals in the military.

Aspin's aides said he remained

conscious during his four-day stay in the hospital, where he was treated for a heart ailment, so his duties were not transferred to anyone else. If a hand-off of authority had been necessary, there was no deputy defense secretary officially in place to assume Aspin's duties.

Not only was there no deputy defense chief, there was nobody in any position higher than James R. Locker III, who is No. 9 in the line of succession. Locker's title is assistant defense secretary for special operations and low-intensity conflict. He, too, is a holdover from the Bush regime.

Aspin left the hospital on Thursday and is expected to make a full recovery.

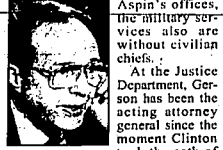
William Perry, Clinton's nominee for deputy defense secretary, said at his confirmation hearing Thursday that he couldn't predict when other top spots would be filled.

"It's slower than I would like," Perry told the Senate Armed Services Committee.

The committee did not immediately vote on Perry, and it was not able to send the nomination to the full Senate because the FBI report on Perry had not been received.

"Members share my frustration that we don't yet have it," said Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the committee. Nunn said having Perry "on board will lessen the strain" on Aspin.

Besides the void in leadership in



Aspin's offices, the military services also are without civilian chiefs.

At the Justice Department, Gerson has been the acting attorney general since the moment Clinton took the oath of office more than one month ago. He had been assistant attorney general for the civil division during the Bush years.

Gerson says there is no confusion about who is in charge.

"The folks have hardly fallen off the vehicle," he said in a recent interview. "As long as I'm here ... as acting attorney general, I'm going to act."

Janet Reno, Clinton's nominee for attorney general, met with Senate Judiciary Committee attorneys on Wednesday but no date for her confirmation hearing has been announced. The committee has yet to receive the FBI report on her.

In the interim, the department has carried on with much of its normal business — investigations, prosecutions and settlements — but some major decisions are being put off, most notably whether FBI Director William Sessions will be allowed to remain in his post amid allegations of ethics lapses.

The most senior Clinton people at Justice are Webster Hubbell, a former law partner of Hillary Rodham Clinton who is in a senior position that does not require Senate confirmation, and Michael Cardozo, who is working without pay as a special attorney helping with the transition, staffing and other matters.

Kemp handed out \$94,000 in bonuses

WASHINGTON — Housing Secretary Jack Kemp gave \$94,000 in bonuses to 70 political appointees in his department shortly before he left office, documents show.

The documents, obtained by The Associated Press, also show that Kemp proposed bonuses of \$298,000 for 51 senior career employees. Those monies have not been paid, pending reviews by the Office of Personnel Management.

President Clinton ordered an investigation of federal bonuses after revelations that five Cabinet secretaries, including Kemp, awarded money to political appointees and senior career officials in the waning days of the Bush administration.

The documents, obtained under the Freedom of Information Act, show \$94,251 was given, in amounts averaging \$1,300 each, to 70 appointees in the Department of Housing and Urban Development in November and December.

In a statement, Kemp defended the bonuses as "part of the routine civil service annual performance review process that had been carried out through my entire tenure at HUD."

Border action doesn't curb drug flow

WASHINGTON — Drug interdiction measures on the U.S. border, while forcing traffickers to seek out other smuggling channels, have not seriously stemmed the flow of cocaine and other drugs into America, a top congressional investigator said Thursday.

But other officials told a Senate Appropriations subcommittee that the enforcement campaign has been effective, especially in cutting down smuggling via aircraft.

The panel is reviewing the Bush administration's policy of putting about 70 percent of anti-drug money into law enforcement, against 30 percent for treatment and education. President Clinton has yet to specify a drug policy, but has signaled he intends a more balanced spending formula within an overall anti-drug budget of about \$12 billion.

GOP reps enjoy high-priced retreat

WASHINGTON — House Republicans piled onto a special train Thursday, destined for a retreat along with dozens of special-interest lobbyists who paid at least \$6,000 apiece to pick up the tab for the three-day affair.

On the agenda for the event at Princeton, N.J., was a round of dinner receptions and work sessions on issues Congress must confront this year, from health care to taxes to foreign policy.

For the lawmakers, the entire trip — room, meals and transportation — is free, the costs paid by those who seek to influence Congress on behalf of corporate America.

For the lobbyists, who represent interests from the Baby Bells to RJR Nabisco, there's the opportunity for private conversations with lawmakers — the kind that are hard to arrange in Washington's frenzied atmosphere.

Clinton considers raising tobacco tax

WASHINGTON — President Clinton suggested Thursday he may propose higher taxes on tobacco and other products that pose a health risk to help pay for his national health insurance plan.

"You do have to find some way to recover some revenues" to extend health insurance to the 37 million Americans who don't have it, he said.

White House officials said Hillary Rodham Clinton's task force on health-care reform also is considering — although without much enthusiasm — a proposal to tax workers' health benefits as income.

Clinton indicated his administration would look beyond the tax increases proposed for his economic program to finance his health-insurance program.

Borrowed satellite helps weathermen

WASHINGTON — American weathermen can breathe easier now. A borrowed satellite is in place to provide uninterrupted observations of Earth in case an overdue weather eye fails and leaves the United States without coverage.

European satellite, Meteosat-3, was put in service at a new duty station over the Pacific coast of South America Wednesday as a backup to the GOES-7 satellite which orbits 22,300 miles high over the United States.

The United States normally operates two weather satellites in geostationary orbit, one each over the West and East coasts. But GOES-6 failed in 1989, leaving the U.S. vulnerable should the remaining satellite break down.

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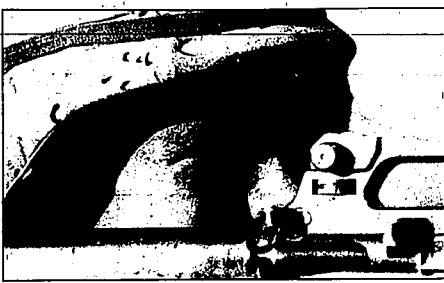

U.S. Marines, soldiers blast away at snipers

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) — U.S. Marines and Nigerian soldiers pounded at snipers with machine guns and grenades for five hours Thursday, shutting down relief activity in this devastated city with the heaviest shooting in weeks.

On Somali streets killed and three U.S. Marines and two Nigerian soldiers were wounded in the firefight in an area rocked by anti-foreigner rioting Wednesday that left at least five Somalis dead.

Sniper fire hit the hotel where most foreign journalists stay. U.N. headquarters three blocks from the battle and a relief agency a half-mile away also reportedly came under fire. Most of the shooting came from the Nigerians, who fired without restraint at any niche they believed might harbor a sniper.

In the southern port of Kismayu, about 2,300 U.S. and Belgian troops combed the city for weapons and rounded up fighters loyal to warlord Mohamed Said Hirs, known as Gen. Morgan. He faces a midnight Thursday deadline to move his forces north of Kismayu or face Western attack.

At least 600 sullen fighters in dusty civilian clothes surrendered in Kismayu. They gave up 43 rifles and machine guns.

Relief workers in Mogadishu stayed in their compounds and aid deliveries were at a standstill for a second consecutive day. The chief U.N. spokesman in New York, Joe Sills, said there were no immediate plans to pull out U.N. workers.

The U.S.-led coalition came to restore order and ensure food gets to starving Somalis. But violence in Somalia this week has increased friction between rival factions and raised questions about the ability of foreign troops to maintain order in a nation loaded with weapons but without government.

That could complicate the planned transition to a U.N. command, in which most of the 17,000 remaining American servicemen and women would go home.

The air in central Mogadishu smelled of gunpowder, and smoke drifted along streets near a major traffic circle where Thursday's gun-battle started.

Beijing flu likely candidate for next flu season

ATLANTA (AP) — The harsh Beijing flu is rearing its head at the end of the flu season, meaning it's probably the strain that will dominate next winter.

"In nursing homes particularly, physicians need to be careful because ... this Type A flu hits the elderly very hard," Dr. Ali Khan of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said Thursday.

Although flu season generally winds down by mid-February, the bug's worst strain — Beijing flu, clinically known as Type A-H3N2 — began increasing last month, the CDC said.

Most flu cases this winter were the milder Type B, or Panama, flu, which affects mostly schoolchildren and young adults. From Sept. 27 through Jan. 16, Type A flu made up only 2 percent of flu cases, the CDC said.

But from Jan. 17 through Feb. 13, Type A flu made up 14 percent of cases, the CDC reported.

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More than 400 Marines searched for weapons in houses in the district after the battle, but apparently found little. Traffic returned to the streets after the shooting stopped.

Marine Col. Fred Peck, the U.S. military spokesman, said the firefight appeared to have started as a battle between rival Somali groups. He said Nigerian soldiers guarding the area became involved and Marines rushed to help.

The shooting began at the traffic circle and spread along a main road to the hotel housing most foreign journalists. Almost two dozen Nigerian soldiers guarding the hotel directed a heavy fire against suspected snipers.

One Marine attributed 90 percent of the gunfire during the battle to Nigerian troops. A Nigerian officer said his men wanted to drive out the snipers.

Journalists saw one dead Somali who was shot in the traffic circle. Three Marines suffered minor gunshot wounds, while two Nigerians also were hit by bullets, military officials said.

During rioting Wednesday, protesters threw rocks at the hotel and threatened to attack it as part of protests against foreign troops and other foreigners in Somalia.

The rioting began after Mohamed Farrah Aidid claimed the U.S.-led coalition allowed Morgan's men to attack supporters of an Aidid ally in Kismayu. About two dozen people are believed to have died in the fighting Monday in Kismayu, about 300 miles south of Mogadishu.

The fighting disrupted a plan for 1,000 American soldiers to leave Kismayu this week, leaving 700 Belgian soldiers in the port. U.S. officials said 600 more U.S. soldiers had been sent to Kismayu to help search for gunmen.

U.S. officials said the Morgan fighters who surrendered Thursday would be taken to a site about 150 miles to the northwest, where Morgan had been ordered to move his troops before the deadline.

It was not clear what happened to the rest of the estimated 150 Morgan fighters who attacked Kismayu on Monday.

Morgan is the son-in-law of ousted dictator Mohammed Siad Barre, and many Somalis believe he is trying to regain control of the country for Siad Barre. U.S. officials, however, say Morgan knows he can never gain widespread support and wants only to grab some territory in the south.

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CDC scolds states for easy tobacco sales

ATLANTA (AP) — Federal health officials, discouraged by how easily teen-agers bought cigarettes during two studies, scolded states Thursday for failing to strictly enforce bans on tobacco sales to minors.

The government will withhold federal health funds from states that don't improve, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention warned. "What we want to do is make tobacco be treated the same as alcohol," said Michael Eriksen, director of the CDC's office on smoking and health. "A 12- or 14-year-old can't go into a convenience store and buy a six-pack. The same should take place for tobacco."

The CDC said almost two-thirds of teen-agers who tried to buy tobacco during a state study in Texas were allowed to, and almost half succeeded in a study in Missouri.

They are among the 47 states that ban tobacco sales to anyone under 18.

Up to 4 men suspected of robbery in Buhl

BUHL - Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies were searching Thursday night for up to four armed men suspected of robbing a Buhl-area dairy.

About \$200 was taken from a dairy two miles east and three miles south of Buhl by a man carrying a shotgun.

Area law enforcement agencies were told to watch for a car carrying four men with a handgun and four shotguns inside.

The robbery suspect was estimated to be 18-20 years old, 5-feet, 6-inches tall and weighing about 140 pounds, wearing a camouflage jacket.

The suspect had not been found late Thursday evening, but a Twin Falls County Sheriff's dispatcher said she could not release information about the incident.

Man who allegedly scuffed with Gold won't stand trial

RUPERT - Charges have been dropped against a Burley man who allegedly fought with former Jerome County sheriff Larry Gold and cut him with a pair of scissors last spring.

Minidoka County special prosecutor Rick Bollor said the Gold family requested the case against Oliver Vieira be dropped.

Bollor said the Golds asked not to proceed with charges because the former sheriff had received so much media attention during the last year.

Previously, former Minidoka County prosecuting attorney David Haley had decided to pursue a charge of battery against Vieira.

The case against Vieira was delayed after Gold complained of having temporary memory loss after the June 1 incident.

Gold said he stopped Vieira's car on Interstate 84 just east of the Jerome County line after a chase, and the Burley man cut the sheriff on the hand and hit him on the head.

Jerome residents reminded of tax reduction program

JEROME - Relatively few Jerome County taxpayers are taking advantage of the circuit-breaker program that reduces property taxes.

Last year 460 property owners received tax reductions of up to \$800 for each taxable piece of property as a result of the circuit-breaker. This year only 100 people have applied for the tax reduction.

"We don't know why so few have applied this year," Bonnie Tolman, senior chief deputy assessor, said.

"The problem is if they don't sign up for the circuit-breaker program, and are declared a hardship case, the county ends up paying," Tolman said.

The circuit-breaker is designed primarily for senior citizens who own and live in their homes and earn less than \$16,510, but a number of other people qualify under the law.

Applications for the circuit-breaker program must be received in the county assessor's office by April 15. Assistance and further information is available by calling the assessor's office at 324-7507.

All recipients of circuit-breaker property tax reduction automatically receive the homeowner's exemption which reduces the taxable value of a home by 50 percent or \$50,000 whichever is less.

Auditorium picture brightens

School Board instructs architects to design 1,500-seat facility

TWIN FALLS - Construction bids were so low on the first two of four new school building projects that a new 1,500-seat auditorium is assured, Superintendent Terrell Donichit said Thursday.

"We consider ourselves pretty fortunate that they came in under budget," Donichit said.

The School Board on Thursday accepted a bid of \$2.46 million from Scott Hedrick Construction of Boise to build a classroom addition to Robert Stuart Junior High

School and classrooms and a working gym at Twin Falls High School.

"The district had projected that the two projects would cost \$3 million, Donichit said.

Scott Hedrick beat out six other construction companies' bids in the two projects. The Boise firm bid \$875,000 for the Stuart addition and \$1.5 million for the new high school building.

The district originally planned a 1,000-seat auditorium, but community members organized a fund-raising project and have raised \$410,000 in pledges and cash, which is about \$90,000 short of what the district

estimated it would take to build a 1,500-seat facility.

As a result of the low bids, the School Board gave final instructions to Design West Architects to design a 1,500-seat auditorium and to design the South Park elementary school as originally planned.

"We were a little bit worried about the elementary school," Donichit said. School officials were unsure whether there would be enough money to build the school as planned, he said.

The board also voted to pay for three alternate features, including giving Scott Hedrick a \$21,000 incentive to the build-

ings completed by Aug. 15; adding 288 lockers to the practice gym for \$12,000, and paying an additional \$10,100 to replace the existing doorway at Stuart with a new doorway.

The extra \$535,000 the district has because of the low bid will also ensure that the district can adequately furnish the buildings it is building.

The auditorium and the elementary school will be bid out this spring and construction will begin in July for both projects. The auditorium is scheduled for completion by March 1994 and elementary school will be finished in August 1994.

Andrus finds support for plan to cut state health care costs

TWIN FALLS - Gov. Cecil Andrus suggested a "managed-care" approach to holding down medical costs Thursday and he found a supporter in Twin Falls physician Dr. Mary Groda-Lewis.

Speaking at a Twin Falls Kiwanis Club luncheon, Andrus warned of the high costs of medical care on already-stretched state budgets. The numbers show costs will go higher still.

State and federal Medicaid costs in Idaho are projected to reach \$288 million this fiscal year and \$383 million, the following year, Andrus said.

"We have to determine some place where we are going to contain this," he said.

Medicaid patients - those who do not have private insurance and cannot afford to pay their own medical bills - have increased 67 percent in Idaho the past five years. In the same period, payments to doctors and hospitals increased 470 percent, he said.

One way to contain these costs might be for the state to hire physicians, such as Groda-Lewis, to handle Medicaid patients, Andrus suggested. These physicians would oversee Medicaid patients to determine the extent of and type of medical care they receive.

Groda-Lewis, who already sees a large number of low-income and Medicaid patients, agreed this might help contain costs and said after the meeting that she might favor the governor's plan.

"We've got to do something about the costs, but we can't lose the quality of the care," she said.

Patients must be educated to the need of preventive care, Groda-Lewis said.

Western growth outpaces rest of U.S.

BOISE - Economic growth doesn't necessarily pay for itself, according to a report to be issued soon by a Western-issues think tank.

Population in nine Western states - excluding Idaho - grew faster than the national average, but personal income, family income and state tax revenues rose less in the West than in other regions and in the nation as a whole.

As a result, state governments are facing greater strains on their budgets with fewer resources, according to the report "The West Comes of Age: Hard Times, Hard Choices."

The report was prepared by Westrends, a project of the Western Office of the Council of State Governments. Westrends President Andrew P. Gross presented highlights of the report, which will be published in April, to lawmakers Thursday.

"Based on the 1980s, it seems the more the state grows, the more it loses," Gross said.

Group takes action following damage to campers



Some Blaine County residents have asked an attorney to find out who is responsible for the collapse of the Bellevue RV and Boat Storage facility after it collapsed on Jan. 22, flattening up to \$3 million in vehicles.

HAILEY - Debra Hall can't afford to replace the \$15,000 camper she lost when heavy snows caused a Bellevue storage facility to collapse last month.

"It was a '73 Carriage camper in mint condition," said Hall. "I got it from my grandparents who took care of it like a baby." But since the Jan. 22 incident, when 14 inches of snow fell in Blaine County, Hall and a group of 20 other residents who had their cars, boats, or recreational vehicles crushed in the mishap have decided to take action.

At a meeting at the Blaine County courthouse Wednesday, the group voted to hire Ketchum attorney Ed Lawson to start a preliminary investigation to determine who should be

responsible for the damages. The owners of the Bellevue RV and Boat Storage facility have said they are not responsible for the destruction of the vehicles.

"The total value of the 96 units has been estimated at anywhere from \$1 million to \$3 million.

Lawson added he was optimistic that the storage facility owners had enough assets to cover the cost of claims should a suit be filed.

But the owners have argued they aren't at fault because the people renting their units signed waivers of liability.

"A primary consideration is that virtually all of the persons who rented space signed an expressed-waiver of liability and agreed to provide their own insurance," said Cal Neill, one of the building's owners, in a recent letter.

The letter was sent to Dick

and Ginger Purdy, who lost a travel trailer and a '67 El Camino when the structure collapsed.

The couple organized the meeting to band together with other victims and explore further action.

"I tried to get a list of the other renters," said Burkett whose '82 motor home was flattened. (The owners) said to come back tomorrow, then they wouldn't give it to me. I'm concerned there might be people in Palm Springs or somewhere that don't even know about this yet."

In response to several questions concerning the validity of the waiver in the case of negligence, Lawson said the facts weren't clear.

"Even if you checked the box saying if you read the fine print

Weak public TV signal to be fixed

BURLEY — Faulty equipment, cold weather and snow has kept the public broadcasting station Channel 10 looking weak in the Mini-Cassia area for the past several months, officials say.

KISU station employees say, however, that the trouble will be rectified as soon as the weather allows.

"We'll get to it as soon as possible," said Pocatello TV station manager Bill Campbell.

Two translators that amplify the signal — one on the Albion Ridge and the other closer to Declo — are only about a year old, but technical difficulties have hurt reception. Problems have been occurring for

several months, Campbell said.

"We've had more trouble with them than we should," field engineer Larry Babb said.

Cold weather, including lots of snow, has hampered repairs. Snow near Albion is as deep as anywhere in the state. Pomerette Ski Area reported 199 inches of snow — more than 16 feet — on top of Mount Harrison Thursday.

When the weather is bad, traveling to the translators can be treacherous, Campbell said.

Campbell said he's been regularly reminded of the problem.

"We've been getting a lot of phone calls and letters," Campbell said. "We're the only public television station in the area," he said.

Commissioners consider ban of smoking

RUPERT — The Minidoka County Commission might adopt a policy banning smoking within the county's three buildings.

Commission Chairman Norm Seibold wants to prohibit smoking in the courthouse, the law enforcement building and the judicial building. All three buildings are located on one city block in

Rupert.

"There's been some complaints about it in some of the offices," Seibold told the county's department heads Monday during the commission's bimonthly meeting. "And I've had two or three complaints about it."

County buildings and grounds Supervisor Paul

Aston told the commission that he has examined Idaho Code concerning the imposition of "no smoking" regulations.

Nowhere in the code does the state say a smoking area must be set aside for county employees in buildings where no smoking is allowed, Aston said.

Seibold said that if county employees must smoke, they will have to do it outside, if commissioners make the buildings smoke-free. They may then return as soon as their next meeting on

March 8.

Seibold asked Sheriff Paul Fries if such a rule would create problems within his department. Fries replied that smoking is already prohibited in most of the law enforcement building, except for men's and women's back bathrooms.

Fries said smoking used to be permitted in another room inside the building, but smoke ruined a filter on an alcohol measuring device stored there.

When Seibold asked Fries if he approved of the idea, Fries said he did.

"I think it's the coming thing in the future," Commissioner John Rensberg said. "A few years ago, I would have said smokers have some rights."

None of the commissioners smoke.

The commissioners instructed Minidoka County Prosecutor Gara Newman to draw up a "no smoking" resolution or ordinance, whichever is appropriate — to be considered at the next meeting.

Assessor explains appraisal practice

BURLEY — Assessors are obligated to reassess a portion of homes every year, but aren't allowed to break the law in order to do it, according to the Cassia County assessor.

Martell Holland explained his policies to commissioners Monday during their bimonthly meeting in response to a man who recently complained that he found a deputy assessor inside his house without his permission.

Holland declined to specify ex-

actly what happened in the incident. Assessors don't have special privileges in determining what value a property should be appraised at, Holland said.

"We have to abide by the law. Our job is to go out and physically appraise property — whether it be a mobile home, residence, or what-

ever," Holland told commissioners. He said he has instructed workers in the assessor's office to quickly leave if the owner objects to having the person on his property.

The assessor is then to do his best at appraising the property

from the street, that is considered public domain.

Assessors sometimes like to look inside a house, as part of the reassessment process, but cannot enter without permission, Holland said.

If no one is home when the assessor arrives at the house, the assessor will leave a card on the door asking for the resident to call the assessor's office.

Holland said it is the homeowner's right to refuse to allow an assessor or deputy assessor upon property or inside a house. In that case, however, if a homeowner is

later found to be "hiding" home improvements, the individual can be assessed at twice the assessment value of the home, Holland said.

The homeowner also loses his right to appeal an assessment if he doesn't let an assessor into his house.

Holland said deputy assessors are told to use reasonable judgment.

"I ask the guys to be courteous," he said.

Assessors and deputy assessors carry identification with them as well as drive a Cassia County vehicle, Holland said.

County legislative issue waits till next year

BOISE — The question of how, and whether, counties should be able to change the way they govern themselves will wait until next year's legislative session, despite a flurry of proposals this year and keen interest in some counties, including Twin Falls County.

Instead, says Rep. Pam Ahrens, R-Boise, an interim legislative committee to study the whole question of local government reform will be proposed.

The committee would look at a lot more than simply optional

forms of county government. Ahrens said, including combining some city and county services, merging cities and counties into metropolitan governments, and consolidating some of the state's numerous local taxing districts, including school districts.

"You could take the money that pays for 13 superintendents and use it to pay chemistry teachers or math teachers," said Ahrens, a longtime proponent of rationalizing government who sponsored last year's election-consolidation bill.

Plans for the interim committee are still tentative, but Ahrens said it probably will include members of

the House and Senate committees dealing with taxation, local government, education and state affairs, as well as representatives of counties, cities and other taxing districts.

Numerous bills and proposed constitutional amendments have been introduced this session to give counties more flexibility in how they structure their governments.

Right now, the Idaho Constitution prescribes the same structure for all of the state's 44 counties: a three-person board of county commissioners and an elected sheriff, clerk, assessor, coroner and treasurer.

Council hears 1st reading of proposed zoning change

HEYBURN — The City Council has heard the first of three scheduled readings of a proposed change to the city's C-1 commercial zoning ordinance.

Under the proposed ordinance, new restrictions would be placed on C-1 zoning prohibiting the construction of retail and other heavily commercial businesses on such property, according to City Clerk Ruth Davis.

Only office buildings and other light commercial activi-

ties would be permitted on land zoned C-1, she said.

The proposed change would allow a Heyburn church to sell its building and land.

The church is now zoned residential and is seeking commercial zoning.

Local residents said that for such a zoning change to be allowed, the ordinance should be rewritten to prohibit some businesses from going on the property.

The ordinance will be read during the next two meetings before the council votes on it, Davis said.

and trophies provided through the national organization and its many corporate sponsors.

Diversity and partisanship pollute selection process

Diversity is the current pet concept among liberals, and Gov. Cecil Andrus paid homage to it Wednesday. In making his second female appointment to the five-member Idaho Supreme Court, Andrus remarked, "We're not at 50 percent, but we're getting closer."

In that statement, Andrus joins the "bean counters" — as President Clinton recently derided the interest groups that criticized his Cabinet's insufficient diversity.

Diversity preaches that the only way to ensure sensitivity to all viewpoints is to recruit from a prescribed collection of demographic groups. To properly serve all citizens, an organization's personnel list must "look like America."

But the goals of diversity are limited to the agenda of the left. On Wednesday, Andrus rejected the notion that Supreme Court nominations should reflect the political, economic and religious heterogeneity of the state's various regions.

He sees no cause for concern in a state Supreme Court whose membership comprises three lawyers who practiced in Boise, one who practiced

in north Idaho and an ex-Lewiston judge.

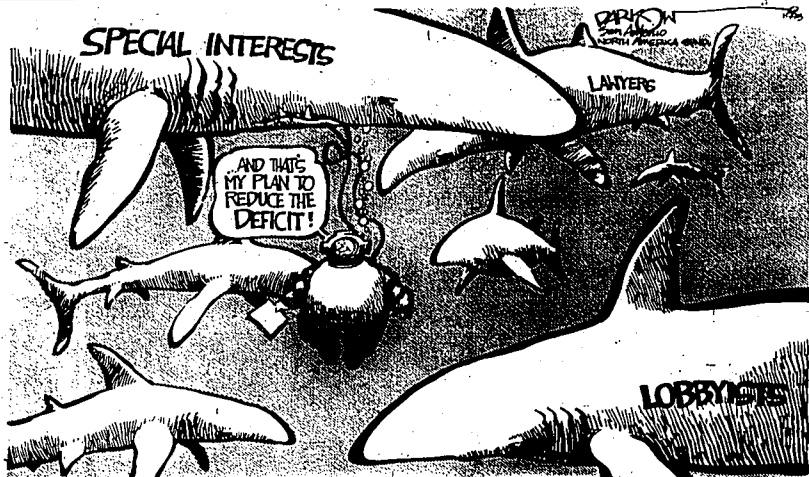
Southern and eastern Idaho don't need a voice on the court, he implied. "The laws of Idaho pertain to Bonners Ferry as they do to Idaho Falls or Montpelier," he said. "We don't have different laws by geographical designation."

Certainly not. Nor do we have different laws by gender. Or by race. But then, why do we pursue diversity?

In many cases, we suspect, diversity is merely a code word for political payback. A bean here, a bean there.

The problem with diversity is obvious. Selecting people for reasons other than merit (in *Silak's* case, to give the court gender-balance and to reward past political support) can mean bypassing more-meritorious candidates. Perhaps worse, the mere perception that merit was not the deciding factor can undercut public confidence in an appointee.

In rejecting geographic quotas, Andrus seems to argue for a purely merit-based selection process. We might find that argument persuasive if he had not already polluted the process with diversity and partisanship.



Don't blame Bush, Reagan for everything

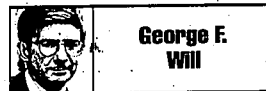
At Hyde Park, where he placed a single red rose on FDR's grave, President Clinton lamented that for 12 years Republican presidents tried "to cramp the role of government." His implication was that now government will be unleashed. Well.

His displeasure should have been directed also at the Founders, who designed the system of separation of powers — of checks and balances, of limited and enumerated powers — designed, in part, to cramp government's role.

And during the 12 "cramping" Republican years, virtually no government programs were terminated, most grew, federal civilian employment rose (even during the darkest years of the Reagan Terror — 1981-1989 — it rose 216,000), and federal outlays rose from \$591 billion to \$1.5 trillion. The grandiosity of Clinton's plans for government growth can be gauged by the fact that he considers this a record of a "cramped" role for government. And remember, government's growth and cost are vastly understated by mere budget totals.

There are also all the compliance costs of such measures as to take just three from the Bush era) the amendments to the Clean Air Act, the Americans with Disabilities Act and the 1991 Civil Rights Act. The Clinton administration already has contributed additional compliance costs to the burden of doing business: The Family and Medical Leave Act.

A recent study by the Joint Economic Committee of Congress concluded that just since 1988, new regulations, including a 27 percent increase in the minimum wage since 1990 (with



another increase planned), raised per-worker costs for small businesses at least 33 percent.

And then there are the costs of the purely perniciious "diversity" regulations, as enforced by a government unfortunately not noticeably cramped during the 12 Republican years. In a stunning article in the Feb. 15 issue of *Forbes* magazine, Peter Brimelow and Leslie Spencer report on the sacrifice of merit hiring to quotas, and other consequences of this country's exquisitely misnamed "equal employment laws."

The cost of all this — a huge hidden tax — may already have depressed the gross domestic product by four percentage points — approximately what we spend on the entire public school system. All American employers with more than 15 employees come under the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission's Uniform Guidelines on Employee Selection Procedures and can be sued if their work force "balance" strikes someone as "wrong." Brimelow and Spencer report this hair-curling testimony from Thomas Maggiori, a Phoenix restaurateur:

"In 1987 EEOC's local field office wrote me a letter saying they had reason to believe I didn't have enough women food servers and busers." No woman had complained against

me. So the EEOC advertised in the local paper to tell women whose job applications we had rejected — or even women who had just thought of applying — that they could be entitled to damages. Twenty-seven women became plaintiffs in a lawsuit against me.

"The EEOC interviewed me for hours to find out what kind of person I was. I supplied them with hundreds of pounds of paper. I had to hire someone full time for a year just to respond to EEOC demands.

"Six months ago I finally settled. I agreed to pay \$150,000 in damages, and as jobs open up, to hire the women on the EEOC's list. ... I have to advertise twice a year even if I have no openings, just to add possible female employees to my files. I also had to hire an EEOC-approved person to teach my staff how not to discriminate.

"I employ 12 food servers in these two restaurants. Gross sales, around \$2 million. How much did it all cost me? Cash outlay, about \$400,000."

Maggiori's ordeal is but one of many comparable outrages that occurred during the 12 years when Republicans had government on what Clinton considers too short a leash. Imagine, if you can, how much more omnipresent, officious, intrusive, bullying and expensive government will be now that it is staffed and directed by people who, like the president, think government's role has been too "cramped."

Serb chiefs order units to hold fire

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Bosnian Serb leaders ordered their troops Thursday not to shoot at U.S. planes parachuting aid to eastern Bosnia, but warned that the planned airdrop could worsen the war or impede peace talks.

In Washington, President Clinton formally announced that the U.S. military will drop food for the hungry in besieged eastern towns. The timing of the airdrops will be determined by the Defense Department and the United Nations, he said.

Bosnia's Muslim president, Alija Izetbegovic, left Thursday for a meeting in Washington with Clinton before a new round of peace talks at U.N. headquarters in New York.

Sarajevo was relatively quiet for a fourth day, but Serbs and Muslims reportedly duelled with artillery in the Bihac region in the northwest. Battles also were reported in a coastal area of neighboring Croatia, where fighting resumed last month after a year-long truce between Croats and Serbs.

The food-drop operation will be the deepest American involvement yet in the war over Bosnia's secession from Serb-dominated Yugoslavia.

A statement from the Bosnian Serb military told troops not to fire at American transport planes "or to by any means jeopardize" the airdrops, the Yugoslav news agency Tanjug said.

The statement warned that the airdrop could escalate the conflict if U.S. planes were shot down and American forces retaliated, Tanjug said.

A Serb official, Aleksa Buha, charged that Muslims were planning to fire at American planes and blame the Serbs to provoke U.S. military intervention.

Indian police battle Hindus to block rally

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Riot police fired tear gas and chased protesters from dawn to dusk Thursday to stop tens of thousands of Hindu militants from massing for a rally to demand the government's ouster.

At least 88 people were injured and more than 2,800 people were arrested, city police chief Mukund Bahari Kaushal told reporters at his makeshift headquarters behind barricades on the Parliament grounds.

The government's success in preventing the rally was a boost for Prime Minister P.V. Narasimha Rao, who was accused of insouciance in dealing with religious riots that engulfed India after Hindus tore down a Muslim mosque in December in the town of Ayodhya.

The incident sparked Hindu-Muslim riots in December and January that killed 1,940 people.

The Bharatiya Janata Party, the right-wing group that called the rally, has been gaining strength ever since, and India's multi-ethnic, multireligious democracy is in danger.

Bharatiya Janata likely will claim credit for keeping the demonstrations less violent than expected. The only serious injury reported was a teen-age boy hit in the face at close range by a tear gas canister.

"In a sense it was a draw," said Aahis Nandy, a political analyst at the Center for the Study of Developing Societies. "Everybody listens and reacts to what the BJP does or says."

Police said 35,000 to 40,000 people clashed with officers. Bharatiya Janata claimed more than 100,000 people took part.

U.S. picks up 146 people seeking entry

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) — U.S. authorities intercepted 146 boat people Thursday trying to reach American shores through Puerto Rico, currently the most popular Caribbean point of entry into the United States.

Nearly all were Dominicans, who have been heading by sea to the United States in much greater numbers this month than Cubans or Haitians.

So far this month, 520 boat people have been intercepted sailing to Puerto Rico, and the Dominican Republic's civil defense chief said that in the last week alone, 500 more were picked up before they managed to leave Dominican shores.

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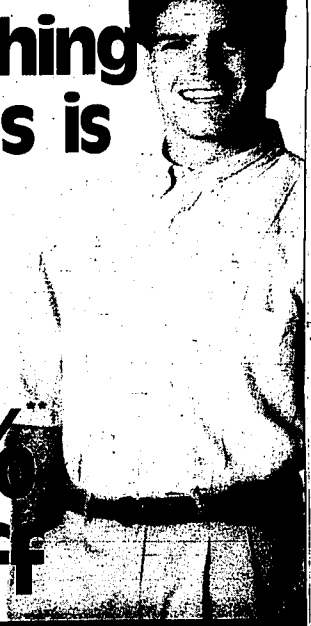

A 4-cent per gallon subsidy that expired last year and Gov. Cecil Andrus vetoed legislation that would have created a new subsidy.

The House Revenue and Taxation Committee approved the legislation Thursday.

It should come up for a final vote in the House next week.

Transportation is critical to this state. Here in Idaho we need all the dollars we can get for the highways," said Steve Thomas, Boise lawyer representing the Idaho Highway Users Conference.

He said the subsidy would cost the state \$3 million in fuel tax revenue. The money is used to match federal funds, up to an 8-to-1 ratio, he said.

That means diverting \$3 million from the highway fund could cost the state \$15 million to \$25 million, Thomas said. He reminded lawmakers that a recent study showed \$7 billion is needed to repair and improve state roads and bridges.

"Integrity of Idaho highways is essential," Thomas said. "If you want to subsidize ethanol, do it

other than from the highway fund."

Rep. Steve Andrus, R-Rupert, sponsor of the bill and committee chairman, suggested increasing the state fuel tax by 1 cent per gallon to offset revenue lost because of the ethanol subsidy.

"I think people would pay it to get ethanol back into the state," Andrus said.

Mark Dunn, lobbyist for the Northwest Ethanol Fuel Association, said if Idaho offers a subsidy to ethanol products as surrounding states do, the state would be in a position to land new ethanol plants.

Without specifics, he mentioned Lewiston and the Magic Valley, areas several members of the committee represent.

A letter from Ron McMurray, manager of the Port of Lewiston, said a new ethanol subsidy would "rekindle discussions with potential investors."

However, in his veto message last year, Andrus said in the 11 years the subsidy was in place, no new ethanol plants were erected in the state and more than half of the subsidy was going to out-of-state producers.

Dunn said ethanol was used in 17 percent of the fuel sold in Idaho before Andrus vetoed last year's bill; now it's less than 1 percent. "Thousands of motorists complained when it was not available," he said.

Healthy margin sends pay plan to Senate

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Legislature cleared a key hurdle Thursday when House Democrats joined divided Republicans to pass a resolution granting state employees 2 percent raises.

The vote was 44-24, with the GOP splitting 24-24. But all 20 House Democrats approved the measure and it was sent to the Senate.

The resolution is a key part in the GOP majority's plan to keep the next state budget at \$1.08 billion. That's the amount expected to be generated

by the current state tax structure. Rep. Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise, Appropriations Committee chairman, acknowledged that 2 percent wasn't much, but it was all the state can afford if it is to stay within the budget target.

"This is something we as a state can afford for our employees," she said. Opponents argued against a part of the resolution that would provide for the second step in a planned four-year improvement of Public Employees

Retirement System pensions. The first step was approved last year, and supporters argued the Legislature has an obligation to keep going. But Rep. Dan Hawley, R-Boise, called it foolish luxury.

"We're providing future retirees with a Rolls Royce retirement. We've already given them a Cadillac," he said. "This benefits retirees. We need to spend more money like this on higher salaries for teachers," said Rep. Bill Sali, R-Meridian.

Hawley and others argued that granting state employees pension improvements also would impact school districts, cities, counties and other units of government because all are in the same retirement system. Gurnsey said the pension improvement will cost about \$3 million from the general fund for state workers. People in the Public Employees Retirement System will pay about 0.5 percent more of their share of the pension improvement.

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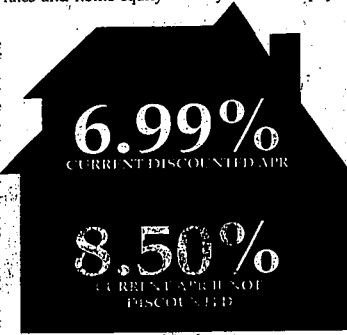

Jailhouse lawyer faces abuse charges

PORTLAND — Dean Schwartzmiller, the former Idaho inmate and renowned jailhouse lawyer who won release from prison for himself and others, has been arrested on felony sexual abuse charges.

He was being held in Portland Thursday in lieu of \$1.4 million bond on 61 charges, including felony counts of first- and third-degree sodomy.

Schwartzmiller, 51, was arrested Feb. 13 after two teen-age boys said they had been molested, photographed in different sexual positions or raped.

Multnomah County Sheriff's Deputy Mike Reese described Schwartzmiller as a "serial pedophile" who got close to teen-age boys by giving them high-paying jobs in his plastering business.

Plan could boost forest camping fees

BOISE — It soon may cost more to camp in parts of the Boise National Forest.

Forest officials plan to let private companies run campgrounds at Warm Lake, Cascade Reservoir and Sage Hen Reservoir this summer. The Idaho Conservation League said the action could increase fees to the point that some people wouldn't be able to afford public campgrounds.

The concessionaires will be allowed to set fees high enough to make a profit and pay 2 percent of their gross revenues to the Forest Service, officials said. Fees now range from \$3 to \$7.

Ex-BIA official will run bingo hall

WORLEY — Former Bureau of Indian Affairs Director David J. Matheson will run the Coeur d'Alene tribe's new \$2.7 million bingo hall, scheduled to open in March.

Matheson, 41, said nearly all of the 90 jobs the 1,200-seat hall creates will be filled by tribal members. The hall is expected to generate \$1 million a year in profits for the tribe, which has a 50 percent unemployment rate.

Matheson, who was appointed to the BIA position in 1990, was the tribe's chairman from 1981-1985.

Judge orders trial in assault case

CALDWELL — A Nampa man accused of terrorizing a mother and her children has been ordered to stand trial on four felony charges.

Canyon County Magistrate William Dillon found probable cause Wednesday to bind over James P. Cagle, 21, for trial on three counts of felony aggravated assault and one count of felony burglary.

Cagle remained in the Canyon County Jail on Thursday in lieu of \$200,000 bond pending a March 5 appearance before 3rd District Judge Wayne Fuller.

Cagle is accused of breaking into an east Nampa home on Feb. 10 and assaulting a woman and two of her five children with a knife and mallet.

Open-pit mine accident kills worker

AFTON, Wyo. — One worker was killed by another escaped serious injury when an earthen wall at the J.R. Simplot Co.'s Smoky Canyon mine gave way, trapping the workers inside a mine vehicle.

The open-pit phosphate mine is just east of the Idaho-Wyoming line.

William "Billy" Smith, 54, of Auburn, Wyo., died at the scene Wednesday night. Elwood Davis, 57, was treated and released from the Star Valley Hospital in Afton.

Mine and emergency workers from Caribou County in Idaho and Lincoln County in Wyoming worked more than two hours to uncover the vehicle.

Simplot's Smoky Canyon mine, which employs 126 workers, is the company's main source of phosphate ore.

Ruling backs clients over law firm

BOISE — The Idaho Supreme Court has unanimously affirmed the decision of the State Bar's Board of Commissioners that clients of an eastern Idaho law firm were cheated out of hundreds of dollars.

In the decision issued on Thursday, Chief Justice Charles McDevitt said a review of the record compiled against Joseph Williams of Shelley supported the board's findings.

Williams' firm called "The Law Offices" was found to have kept \$165 from one client while never doing any work on her bankruptcy case and of taking over \$400 from another for a divorce proceeding that was ultimately dismissed for inactivity.

The board ordered the clients reimbursed from the state's Client Security Fund.

On a canvas of cement, Pocatello artist carves a new face for political satire

TWIN FALLS - An exhibition of recent works by Pocatello artist Raymond Obermayr is set to open Tuesday and continue through April 8 at the Herrett Museum Art Gallery of the College of Southern Idaho campus. The exhibition is titled "Ray O. The Art of Raymond Obermayr."

A reception for the artist is planned for 7 to 9 p.m. Tuesday at the museum. Obermayr, who is also a poet, will read from his poetry at 8 p.m.

Obermayr was on the art faculty at Idaho State University, and he also taught at the University of Nevada in Las Vegas and worked as a studio artist in Oregon and California before returning to teaching at Shelby State Community College in Memphis, Tenn. He later retired from teaching and returned to Pocatello to work.

During the '50s, Obermayr was known for his large semi-abstract landscapes that stressed color and light. The works were rooted in nature, gestalt psychology and the color theories of Joseph Albers.

In the '60s, Obermayr was greatly affected by the civil rights and anti-war movements. Searching for a medium to replace oil paint that was faster and more direct, he settled on photo-transfer collages. The photo-transfer process was not only fast but also allowed him to deal with controversial issues and public figures. Images could be retrieved instantly from newspapers and magazines.

Obermayr now combines his "concrete art" with photo-transfers and found objects. His work is often satirical and attacks contemporary public figures. In addition to his "concrete art" and photo-transfer collages, Obermayr still has the desire to return to his colorful semi-abstract landscapes that allow him to deal with formal issues of beauty and aesthetics.

Regular museum hours are from 9:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday, 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Wednesday through Friday and 1 to 4:30 p.m. Saturday. The museum is closed Sunday and Monday and observes college holidays.

Twin Falls artist embraces belief that art teaches as well as beautifies

TWIN FALLS - Local artist JoAnn Thorne doesn't live by the old adage of creating art for art's sake.

Thorne wants to learn from her art, and now she's helping other people see their lives more clearly through brush strokes, line drawings and every color in the rainbow.

Thorne recently began a monthly art discussion in conjunction with The Center for Artistic and Metaphysical Study in Twin Falls. Her gentle speaking voice and flowing garments belie a strong message: Art can teach as well as beautify.

A medium of message

"Knowledge is everything, and wisdom is simply the responsible application of what we know," Thorne said, sitting in her spacious home where her paintings and those of her friends adorn the white walls. "I think sometimes it's difficult for artists to not fall into an artistic temperament and to allow for someone else to understand our work better than we do."

She added, "But how can I treasure an aspect of my work, or

change an aspect, if I'm not aware of it? That's what I call creative analysis."

Thorne said she believes an artist who is vulnerable enough to put a part of him or herself on a piece of paper or canvas and show it to the world is sending out a message.

"You can either learn from that message or not," she said.

Thorne, who works in varied mediums, has been creating since she was a child.

"I've always been interested in art, but this is the first time in my life I've been able to live with my paintings," she said. "Most of the time I sold them. I needed the money. People would come along

ISU hides exhibit following complaints

POCATELLO - A new art exhibit at Idaho State University is hidden behind blocked-out windows, while a man checks the visitors' age.

The exhibit, in the Pond Student Union Building's Transitions Gallery, is called "Diives and Devils," and presents the work of two Idaho artists, Hans Haney and Jose de Pesce.

ISU Program Board and administration officials decided the art — oil and watercolor studies of semi-nude women and airbrushed scenes — was too adult in theme to be directly visible to passers-by.

So the gallery windows were covered with brown paper and will remain so for the two-week exhibit.

"Some concerns had been raised" by people who saw the works before the opening, said Darcy Detienne, Program Board staff director.

Jan Anderson, ISU dean of students, said she requested the window coverings after receiving several complaints. She said she is trying to protect those who do not want to be involuntarily exposed to the works and the art are very near the games area of the SUB, where younger children are found.

Dory Grace, gallery curator, thinks the protective measures are "silly and more than a little irritating."

"The vast majority of these images is not more than you'd see on MTV ... Let's be real here ... I feel my job is to bring in shows appropriate for college students ... to challenge them and to help them expand their exposure to the arts."

"That means not sticking to things like majestic, snow-covered sheep."

A gallery employee manned a small table just inside the gallery. Only those 17 years or older were allowed to view the art.

Tension propels, gives life to all great poems, BSU professor says

BOISE - A good poem has tension to give it energy, said Idaho's official poet.

"That's really what gives a poem its depth," Daryl Jones said, explaining why certain poems appeal to him.

"It's a tension between opposite feelings, words, convictions or ideas," he said. "They're not one-sided sentimental poems that one would find in a greeting card verse."

Jones, in a recent phone interview, said he likes poetry that explores both sides of an emotion to find a gray area between the black and white. That gray area, according to Jones, is where the depth exists.

"I like to compare it to the way our vision works," he said. "Each of our eyes sees an object from just a slightly different perspective, but that slightly different perspective seen at the same time is what creates that third dimension of depth."

A good example, Jones explained, is in the poem, "Stopping By The Woods On A Snowy Evening" by Robert Frost. One line says, "The woods are lovely, dark and deep," suggesting tranquility and freedom from responsibility. Jones said the woods are symbolic of death.

Then, Frost wrote, "But I have promises to keep and miles to go before I sleep," suggesting that there are responsibilities and business in life that must be attended to, Jones explained.

Writer-in-residence offers poetry reading

The reading is open to the public free of charge.

"There's an energy, or tension, between the desire for tranquility and the desire to be fully engaged in life," he said.

In his own poetry, Jones draws inspiration from everyday experiences, memories and reading.

One poem he will read at the Twin Falls Library March 6 is based on the experiences of people Jones has met. "Why The Fire Lookout Fears and Loves Lightning" explores the emotions that keep those solitary people in their towers all summer long.

In another poem, "Foreshadowning," Jones takes a retrospective look at youth, its carelessness and heedlessness, and how that impacts relationships between people.

Jones, 46, is an English professor who teaches creative writing at Boise State University. A native of Maryland, he has lived in Idaho since 1986.

Last year, Gov. Cecil Andrus appointed Jones to be Idaho's writer-in-residence. During his two-year term, Jones is receiving a \$10,000 stipend to give readings and workshops in communities around the state. Jones said his goal is to share writing by Idahoans with other Idahoans.

While the best writing can speak to all people everywhere, he said, "the writing by people in Idaho seems to share a certain perspective. That perspective, Jones noted, includes a sense of vast space, influences of the environment and the pioneer spirit that built communities of the West."

In Twin Falls, in addition to some of his latest work, Jones plans to read a few poems from his book, "Someone Going Home Late." He said this book is a collection of original poetry about random occurrences that affect or alter the course of people's lives, sometimes in a positive way and sometimes not.

"The book," he explained, "moves toward developing a kind of faith or trust in the ultimate randomness of life, and then perhaps shows there is a kind of positive order to it."

KSKI joins Colorado radio network, lays off some local staff

HAILEY - The Wood River Valley's original radio station will soon broadcast from Vail, Colo.

KSKI-FM, headquartered north of Hailey with broadcast facilities on Bald Mountain, will join a network of seven other ski resort stations located in Colorado in mid-March, Charles Bernstein, KSKI's general manager said.

"We're going to be an affiliate of what's known as The Mountain," Bernstein said Monday.

Silver Creek Communications, an Idaho company principally owned by John McCaw, will continue to operate the station, and the station will be the first non-owned affiliate of The Mountain, according to Bernstein.

He said that programming for the company's seven Colorado stations, as well as KSKI, originates in Vail and is beamed via satellite to the various stations. With the use of digital technology, Bernstein said on-air staff in Vail will provide local news, weather, sports and ski reports for broadcast on KSKI, "which is something that's never been

able to happen before."

Five full- and four part-time employees of KSKI will be laid off, Bernstein said, adding "That's the unfortunate part of this."

Bernstein said the station's program director, dice jockeys, news director and one copywriter were given notice last week of the impending layoffs. He said the terminations differed from standard studio industry procedure in that nearly a month's notice was given and placement assistance and additional compensation were offered to those let go.

Among those remaining on KSKI's

local payroll will be advertising staff members and one person who will gather local news. For the broadcasters in Vail, Bernstein said.

Asked about cost savings expected to result from the change, Bernstein responded, "I wouldn't call it significant."

He said the main reason for the move was to take advantage of more extensive research into what listeners in ski resorts want in a musical format, which The Mountain provides. However, Bernstein predicted no radical departure from KSKI's current adult contemporary format.

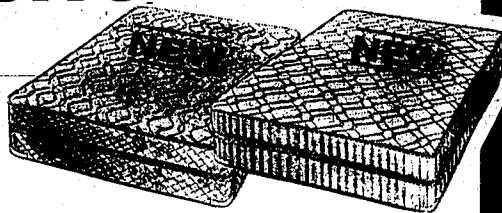

Hailey writer forges new frontier in cowboy poetry

He showcases the work of ordinary folks

Scott Preston wants to write a new story for the old west.

He describes his latest publication, *White Cloud Review* Number 5, "Old Stories for a New West," as "a collision of urban underground and rural performance poetry."

This means that the works of cowboy poets, railroad hands, and Simplot employees are featured right alongside city poets with college degrees.

"Good poetry," Preston said, "can be written by ordinary people in a language people can understand."

This collection of 25 western writers features cowboy poet Vess Quinan, folk singer Bruce "Utah" Phillips, Native American poet Gloria Dye, Vietnam veteran Rod McQuary and the editor of Dry Creek Press, John Dofflemeyer. A poem by cowboy poet Paul Zarzyski, "Elmencia Duende," has been inserted separately as a broadside. The work of Idaho artist David Boersig illustrates the issue.

"There aren't many publications that bring together the writers I'm bringing together," Preston said.

The 34-year-old Hailey writer and small press publisher says that universities and foundations limit the type of literature that gets published.

"Literature shouldn't be controlled by fashion, political correctness or art," he said. "The established traditions breed stagnation; they have their uses, but it's not where the most vital writing is going on."

An admirer of the cowboy poetry tradition, Preston has attended the annual Cowboy Poetry Gathering in Elko, Nev., for the past nine years.

"The stylistic and intellectual growth that cowboy poetry has made since the first gathering is incredible," he said. "I don't see any other area where this is happening outside academia, and it's producing some really good artists; folklorists can't keep up."

Preston claims that his *WRR* Number 2, "A Cowboy Poetics," represents the first time cowboy poetry was considered as small press literature. The collection included works by songwriter/performer Ian Tyson and well-known cowboy poets Baxter Black and Wallace McRae.

"I still sell several copies a year through the Western Folklife Center

said: "It was hit and miss printing. They just scrapped it together. I'd never been around a working guy doing a magazine."

Preston puts out his chapbooks "on the kitchen table using borrowed computers." He used to xerox them, but *WCR* number 5 is offset printed on 70 pound book stock.

Besides editing and publishing the *WCR*, Preston writes and performs his own poetry at festivals, coffee houses, and Rotary Club meetings. He often accompanies himself with a guitar or other instrument. He participated in the 1992 Cowboy Poetry Gathering as a "reciter" and workshop leader on small press publication.

Preston has lived in the Wood River Valley for 14 years and is a full time driver for Federal Express. He's six credits short of an A.A. degree. "I just can't motivate myself to take health (class)," he said.

Preston's goal is to produce 12 issues of the *WCR* and then quit.

"But who knows?" he said. Although the future isn't entirely clear, Preston is sure that *WCR* number 6 will feature the work of Inkom, Idaho, poet Bruce Embree. Embree works for the railroad and has one contribution, "Career Change," in the current issue. Preston solicits most work that appears in the *WCR* from writers and poets in the intermountain West. He accepts a small amount of unsolicited material.

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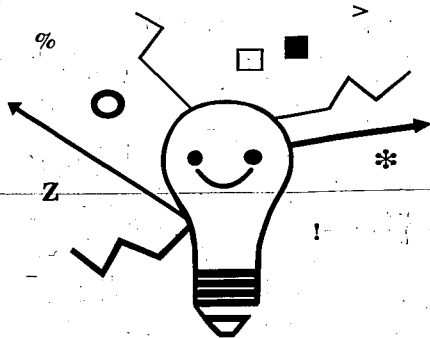
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Struggle for child remains a part of life

NEW YORK - When their son Lorenzo was 5, Augusto and Michaela Odone made a tape recording of his clear, little-boy voice as he sang a French tune with perfect aplomb and perfect pronunciation. That was a few months before the insidious disease lurking in his genes made its first move.

Recently, during a brief visit to New York, Michaela Odone happily listened to another kind of sound from Lorenzo — the only kind the 14-year-old is now able to make.

Calling home to Fairfax, Va., Michaela asked to hear his voice. "I was listening to his breathing," she recalled the next day, "and then he went, 'Ah-h-h-h,' a kind of high-pitched exhalation, reproduced by his mother with no trace of self-consciousness.

"He did it twice," she said, with evident satisfaction. "Two nice, big, fat ones."

What had brought the Odones to New York was a series of TV appearances and interviews marking the general release of "Lorenzo's Oil," the critically acclaimed movie that tells the harrowing story of the son's devastating illness and their impassioned search for a way to save his life.

A beguiling, precocious boy, Lorenzo was stricken at 5 with adrenoleukodystrophy, or ALD, a rare and savagely cruel genetic disease that strips the nerves of their protective sheath, called myelin. Without this insulation, the nerves cannot conduct impulses through the body, and functioning breaks down.

Lorenzo's prognosis was shattering: Doctors told the Odones that their adored only son would swiftly lose his ability to walk and talk, see and hear, swallow and eat; there would be a progressive loss of mental functions, followed by death within two years.

But the Odones refused to accept Lorenzo's fate.

Starring Nick Nolte as Augusto, an Italian-born World War II economist, and Susan Sarandon as the multilingual, Irish-American Michaela, "Lorenzo's Oil" follows the couple as they painfully educate themselves in the biochemical mysteries of ALD.

What Augusto Odone, now calls their "quantum leap": the intellectual jump from comprehending obscure medical data to intuiting a possible treatment, an oil to be ingested by their son — Lorenzo's Oil.

In the film, as it did in real life, the oil (a purified form of olive and rapeseed oils) seems to halt Lorenzo's physical deterioration. Though severely disabled, Lorenzo survives. And, as we see in a touching coda to the film, so do hundreds of other boys (ALD is passed from mother to son) around the world who are taking Lorenzo's Oil, despite ongoing doubts over its effectiveness within the medical community.

There is no doubt, meanwhile, about how the medical establishment (personified by Peter Ustinov as a physician who treats Lorenzo) is viewed in the film: ultra-conservative and patronizing. Nor is there any doubt about the film's message: Don't blindly accept the experts' opinion. Educate yourself. Take responsibility.

"One of the things that is good about the movie is that it helps redefine the relationship between doctors and laymen," said 59-year-old Augusto Odone.

'Lorenzo's Oil' deftly avoids pitfalls; reality keeps it true

George Miller, the greatly talented Australian director of such films as "Mad Max" and "The Road Warrior," hasn't made a movie in five years — not since his agonizing encounter with the Hollywood studio system when he came to America to make "The Witches of Eastwick."

"Lorenzo's Oil," Miller's finely crafted, highly moving new film, seems meant as a new beginning, grounded in an entirely different kind of material and told in an entirely different manner than anything Miller has attempted before.

Shot in the United States (largely on location in Pittsburgh), though with a largely Australian crew, "Lorenzo's Oil" is a based-on-a-true-story account of a remarkable couple, Italian economist Augusto Odone and his Irish-American wife, Michaela, who devoted their lives to discovering a cure for the rare disease Adrenoleukodystrophy (ALD), that had attacked their young son Lorenzo.

Despite their complete inexperience, and despite the discouragement of even active opposition of the medical establishment, they succeeded in discovering a compound, now known as "Lorenzo's Oil," that saved the life of their son.

As much as the story may have the elements of a TV movie — why is it that, the more authentic the real-life heroism, the more trite and synthetic its fictional adaptation seems? — Miller's film deftly avoids the pitfalls of the Disease of the Week genre.

Though Lorenzo played at various stages in his life by six different child actors, but principally by Zack O'Malley Greenburg, is a heart-rending figure as his disease progresses from speech impairment to total paralysis;

Miller doesn't exploit his condition for easy pathos.

Instead, his approach is a proactive one, focusing on the near-dormant energy brought to the problem by Lorenzo's parents, played by Nick Nolte (with an unfortunately distracting Italian accent) and Susan Sarandon, whose manic intensity has never been better used in a film.

Put off by the sympathetic but condescending professor (Peter Ustinov) who is the country's leading expert on ALD, the Odones dive into their own research project.

Tirelessly, they comb the medical journals and textbooks for references to the disease, and then research their research, working backward until they have effectively learned the basics of medical science. With their fundamental knowledge in place, they are ready to make advances, seeing connections with their fresh eyes that medical professionals may have missed.

The structure, as always in Miller's work, is linear, with a chase for knowledge replacing the literal pursuit of good guys and bad guys in Miller's action films.

Ustinov's character is allowed to acquire a surprising life of his own (Miller doesn't use him as the stock establishment villain); Kathleen Wilhoite is moving as Sarandon's younger sister, whose genes may also carry the disease;

and Margo Martindale makes the most of her brief appearances as another ALD mother. From a blue-collar background, far different from the privileged Odones.

Miller allows enough of a manic blur to remain around to Odones to take the edge off their saintly self-sacrifice — to suggest that their quest may have taken on a selfish, obsessive life of its own, above and beyond Lorenzo's plight.

There are moments in the film, among the movie's most haunting, in which the sight of the helpless, pain-racked child begs the ultimate, awful question: Would it not be more humane to let this life slip away, rather than prolong it in such agony?

Luckily, the salvation promised in the title, with its biblical overtones of anointment and communion, does exist, and the ultimate question need not be faced. But this is no blandly triumphalist film; there is a smack of pain and reality in it that keeps it true.

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Eastwood emerges as leader of Oscar pack despite Altman's hope

Robert Altman is not only a superb director, he's also a prophet — if not of doom, then at least of discouragement. Honored at last year's USA Film Festival, he was accompanied by actor Elliott Gould. When a fan told Gould that he should have received an Oscar nomination for playing a gangland underling in "Bugsy," Altman, standing nearby, shook his head. "Why would you want that to happen?" he said wearily. "Being nominated means you'll probably wind up being one of four losers."

This year, Altman has been nominated for best director — and he'll probably wind up being one of four losers.

His film, the witty and mercilessly observant "The Player," was inexplicably left off the best-picture list. No one has won an Oscar for best director without that film being among the best-picture finalists. Perhaps Altman is paying the price for being too observant about today's Hollywood.

Clint Eastwood, now in the elder-statesman period of his lengthy career, looks like the strongest contender for his meticulous direction of "Unforgiven." He is respected by virtually all the actors who have worked with him, and he brought new twists to the venerable genre of the Western.

But no one brings fresh twists to established genres like Neil Jordan, the director of the widely acclaimed "The Cryer Game." He did new spins on mother and son operas in "The Miracle," on gangster melodramas in "Mona Lisa" and even on the Little Red Riding Hood legend in "The Company of Wolves." With "The Cryer Game," he turns the action

genre inside out. The film, with its psychological mind games, is a great favorite of actors, who make up the largest branch of Academy voters.

"Scent of a Woman's" Martin Brest also is an actors' favorite. Who else can claim to have directed Al Pacino ("Scent"), Robert De Niro ("Midnight Run"), Eddie Murphy ("Beverly Hills Cop") and George Burns ("Going in Style")? But he did not receive a nomination from the Directors Guild, generally considered a forerunner of the Oscar race.

James Ivory of "Howards End" acclaim, was an expected nominee. If he emerges victorious, it will not be only for the majestic "Howards End" but also for a career of tasteful work.

Among the obvious omissions are Spike Lee, Robert Redford and Rob Reiner. Lee's massive undertaking in "Malcolm X" should have been acknowledged. But his relentless self-promotion and argumentative nature took its toll, although the academy sometimes admires such traits in others. Redford's tasteful, lean touch in "A River Runs Through It" may have carried too many echoes of his tasteful, lean touch in "Ordinary People" a dozen years ago. And Reiner's expert choreography of the courtroom scenes in "A Few Good Men" was offset by some prosaic shots of Washington monuments and too many close-ups of Tom Cruise.

Best director used to be the least exciting of the major Oscar races. After all, the director was merely the man (and very occasionally the woman) who made the film. But with such familiar names as Eastwood, Reiner, Redford, Costner, Beatty, Allen and Streisand now among them, the directing ranks sometimes are more star-studded than the acting categories.

Capital bumps Bruins early

Twin Falls blows 21-point lead in 1st half, heads to consolation round this afternoon

BOISE — The inability to finish — the character gap that has haunted virtually all Twin Falls athletic programs for years — struck again Thursday morning.

From a 21-point lead in the first 15 minutes and with 11 to spare with 6:39 left in the game, the Bruins collapsed and finally succumbed to a third-shot effort on Capital's final possession. And with that, Twin Falls' fell out of title contention in the Class A-1 state basketball tournament.

The Eagles, who had split with Twin Falls during the season and entered the game with a 12-11 record, got a putback by Richard Crane with a second left to give Capital its only lead — and a 53-51 victory.

The result sends Twin Falls, 17-9, into the consolation bracket against Madison of Rexburg in a loser-out game at 2 p.m. today at Boise State's Pavilion. Capital goes against top-ranked Lewiston at 7 p.m.

Not coincidentally, Twin Falls' last double-digit lead was there when senior point guard Eddie Trenkle fouled out with 6:39 to play. The Bruins were largely rudderless after that. "We're not the same team without him," said Coach Ben Allen.

NEW YORK (AP) — Steve Young, the NFL's MVP, officially was removed from the league's first ever unrestricted free agent pool on Thursday, along with dominant pass-rushers Neil Smith of Kansas City and Leslie O'Neal of San Diego.

But teams seeking instant help were left with a potpourri of pickings that includes Philadelphia's Reggie White, one of the NFL's top defensive linemen, and quarterbacks such as the inconsistent Vinny Testaverde of Tampa Bay, who was the top overall pick in the 1987 draft. Bobby Hebert of New Orleans, and Phil Simms and Jeff Hostetler, who each won Super Bowls for the New York Giants.

Thursday was the deadline for teams to declare players they would protect from raids by other teams.

A total of 66 players were protected of a possible 84, but 39 of those 66 were players whose contracts are up in future years. And only 11 of the 28 teams designated "franchise players," those who cannot be touched.

The list was indicative of the vagaries of pro football.

On the one hand, one-time top prospects such as Testaverde were left to sell their wares on the free agent market. On the other hand, players considered expendable under the now-defunct Plan B — Kansas City nose tackle Dan Saleaumua and San Diego running back Ronnie Harmon — to name two — were protected under a far less restricted system.

backs was reflected in the fact that only five were protected — White, Harmon, Barry Foster of Pittsburgh, Reggie Cobb of Tampa Bay and Harold Green of Cincinnati. By contrast, three of the 10 franchise players — Paul Gruber of the Bucs, Jumbo Elliott of the Giants and Lomas Brown of the Lions — are offensive tackles, a position at which careers are long.

There were two categories of players protected. One was franchise players like Young, the San Francisco quarterback, who must remain with the 49ers and be paid among the league's top-five quarterbacks — a minimum of \$3.28 million. They remain protected for the life of their contract and their team can't designate another franchise player during that time.

But 18 teams declined to place anyone in that category, at least for this year.

"That's a media term I've never used in my life. We don't take it seriously," said Jim Finks, the Saints' president and general manager, who protected three players, including Morten Andersen, perhaps the game's best placekicker.

Andersen and many others are "transition players," who must be paid among the top 10 at their positions. Their current teams have the right to match any offer made to them by other teams.

Many of those transition players included 1992 rookies whom teams want to protect even though their contracts aren't close to being up.

Bell remains ChiSox choice for DH over Bo

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — Even though Bo Jackson has recovered quickly from hip replacement surgery, Chicago White Sox manager Gene Lamont said Thursday he's not ready to name him designated hitter in place of 1992 home run leader George Bell.

"Bo's not a factor yet," Lamont said.

"But you have to see what happens when the games start. ... He's ready to start playing."

After two full-squad workouts, Lamont said he likes what he sees. "Everybody's enthusiastic," he said. "In a few days, everybody will want to start the games. Guys are in shape, but not in baseball shape."

The team has more than its share of injured and rehabbed players, with free agents Ellis Burks and Dave Stieb in addition to Jackson, Ozzie Guillen and Craig Grebeck. "Ozzie's looked fine, and Ellis looks outstanding," Lamont said. Still missing Thursday were Bell, catcher Carlton Fisk and non-

roster catcher Clemente Alvarez. Bell and Alvarez were due to arrive Friday while Fisk, who agreed to a 1993 contract after his most acrimonious negotiations yet time before, the mandatory reporting date of March 3.

"I don't know where he is," said Ron Schuler, White Sox senior vice president.

Fisk's wife, Linda, said Thursday that the future Hall of Famer was on his way to Sarasota.

Schuler also gave no reason for Bell's absence, but he denied a long-rumored trade that would send Bell and Alvarez to the Seattle Mariners for Randy Johnson.

Lamont said he hopes the team struggles less this year when Bell doesn't hit. Bell had 25 home runs last year.

"Right field will give us more power, and Steve Sax will give us some offense and make things happen on the bases," the manager said.

No surprise: Wildcats' star opts for NBA

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Jamal Mashburn, the key player in Kentucky's return to national prominence, is headed for the NBA after this season.

"It seems like I won't be coming back next year for the NBA," Mashburn said at a news conference Thursday with coach Rick Pitino at his side. "It seems like I'm ready."

Most players keep their college status in limbo until the end of the season before making the announcement to turn pro.

For example, Shaquille O'Neal waited until April 3 last year to announce his departure from Louisiana State for the NBA. O'Neal earlier had denied he would leave LSU before graduation.

But Pitino has said all season this would be Mashburn's final year in a Kentucky uniform. He said that was to keep fans from getting their hopes up and then leaving a "bad taste in their mouths."

"We've been very honest from Day 1," Pitino said. "We said if Jamal is one of the top picks, he's going pro. I think everybody has a good taste in

their mouth because they haven't been misled."

Mashburn, a 6-foot-8 junior forward, signed with Kentucky after the school was placed on probation by the NCAA and banned from Kentucky basketball. Mashburn said at a news conference Thursday with coach Rick Pitino at his side, adding that Mashburn could have found quicker fame at another elite program.

Mashburn averaged 12.9 points in helping the Wildcats to a 22-6 record as a freshman. Last season, he led the team to a 29-7 mark and the NCAA East Regional final, averaging 21.3 points.

This season, Mashburn is averaging 22.0 points and 8.5 rebounds for the second-ranked Wildcats (20-3). "He's been a security blanket," Pitino said of Mashburn's value to the program. "This is a proud moment for me, because he's going to the highest level."

Pitino, a former coach of the New York Knicks, said Mashburn was "mentally and physically ready to go pro."

Mashburn said his Kentucky teammates weren't surprised by his

decision. "They knew it was coming," he said. "They just wished me well."

Mashburn said he and Pitino had discussed the NBA all season, but only decided this week to make the final decision.

Pitino believes Mashburn will be among the top three selections in the draft.

Cincinnati oil executive leads charge for Orioles

BALTIMORE (AP) — Eli S. Jacobs has agreed to sell the Orioles baseball team for \$140 million to a group of investors led by a Cincinnati oil executive, according to a Baltimore newspaper.

The Sun, quoting unnamed sources close to the negotiations, reported in today's edition that the deal is being reviewed by Jacobs' creditors, who are pressing for repayment of millions of dollars in overdue loans.

Jacobs has relinquished control of the sale to his creditors and any deal is on hold while they consider it. The Sun said.

It was unclear whether the offer by investors led by William O. DeWitt

is for Jacobs' 87 percent share of the team or whether it included minority shares held by Orioles president Larry Lucchino and Maryland native R. Sargent Shriver. The Sun said.

DeWitt, a limited partner of the Texas Rangers' baseball team, met about two weeks ago with some of Jacobs' creditors in New York to discuss the offer, sources told the newspaper.

Jacobs, through a spokesman, declined any comment Wednesday. DeWitt, who has been negotiating with Jacobs for months, has said he would not comment until there was something to announce.

DeWitt's group of investors includes three Cincinnati businessmen with minority shares in the Texas Rangers: Robert Casselini, who owns a wholesale produce company; Dudley Taft, an executive with Taft Broadcasting Co.; and Mercer Reynolds, who is a partner with DeWitt in an investment company, The Sun reported.

Jacobs' creditors are expected to make a decision on the offer within six weeks, banking sources told The Sun.

The value of the team reached new highs last year when the Orioles moved into their new ballpark at Camden Yards.

Sell-offs became a nightly occurrence, and profits were estimated to be between \$15 million and \$22 million.

New owners will close Panhandle fabric plant

SANDPOINT — A British corporation has acquired Oberdorfer High-Tex Inc. and announced plans to shut down its multimillion-dollar industrial fabric plant near Sandpoint.

A prolonged downturn in the pulp and paper market forced Oberdorfer and sister company Weaving Industry Systems Inc. to sell out to overseas competitors, a spokeswoman said.

Scapa Group of Blackburn, England, intends to move Oberdorfer's operations and equipment to Shreveport, La. Scapa manufactures pulp and paper-making products at more than 50 plants worldwide. Its North American headquarters are in Raleigh, N.C.

About three dozen people will lose their jobs at Oberdorfer's Kootenai plant when it closes later this year, company treasurer Michele Holden said. Scapa has offered qualified workers the option of transferring to Shreveport.

"Quite a few are going to be doing that," she said. "But we have work to do here for several months."

Weaving Industry is being sold to an Austrian company, although the deal has not been struck yet.

Coeur d'Alene mine posts more losses, but less this time

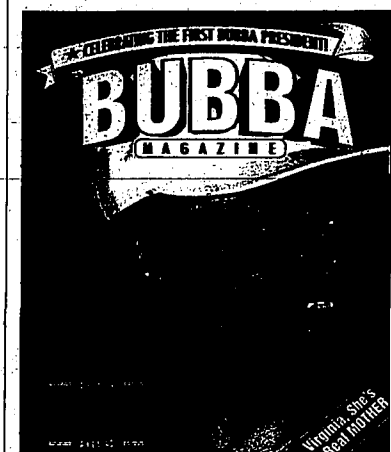
COEUR D'ALENE — Coeur d'Alene Mines Corp. reported a 1992 net loss of \$759,000 or 5 cents per share, a marked improvement from the previous year's loss of \$14.4 million or 94 cents per share.

The company posted net income of \$1.3 million during last year's fourth quarter, it reported this week, up from a net loss of \$3.4 million in the final three months of 1991.

"Coeur d'Alene Mines attributed the improvement in part to a 52-percent reduction in expenses. Much of that savings was the result of expenditures in 1991 related to acquisition of Callahan Mining Corp., the company said.

Coeur d'Alene Mines produced 56,338 ounces of gold in 1992, down from 60,771 ounces the previous year. Silver production last year was nearly 6.3 million ounces, down from more than 7.5 million ounces in 1991.

Dow shrugs off bond market plunge; analysts credit growing stock strength

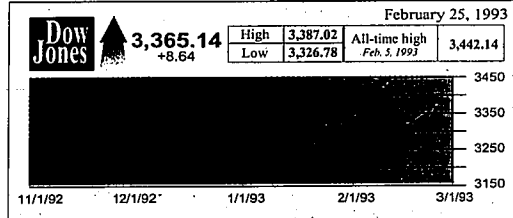

NEW YORK — The Dow industrials rose 8 points to close at 3365 in narrow trading Thursday, although the index posted a minor loss for most of the session. Broad indexes ended moderately higher.

Although the market refused to follow through a new report that quoted a 33-point advance, it nevertheless had enough self-confidence to shrug off a violent whipsaw in the U.S. Treasury bond market, traders said.

The long Treasury bond, up 3/32 as stocks opened, was up 21/32 by early afternoon on news that President Clinton had reiterated his commitment to reduce the federal budget deficit, stressing that the ensuing drop in long-term interest rates will aid the economic expansion.

But shortly after noon MST, bonds tumbled, rapidly erasing their gains following a new report that quoted a 33-point advance, it nevertheless had enough self-confidence to shrug off a violent whipsaw in the U.S. Treasury bond market, traders said.

Microsoft spokeswoman Anne Ruple said the company would fight the ruling by the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office in administrative appeal proceedings and, if necessary, in federal court.

"It is important. Windows is one of our most successful products," said Ruple, who predicted the company's legal fight to protect the name would take years.

Having advertised a six-card spade suit, South would surely be able to discard a club or two on dummy's hearts. So East made a great play — he led back the club queen at trick two.

Asking no questions, South took dummy's king and led a trump. East went up with his ace to lead a low club, and West had a clear picture when he won his nine. Obviously East wanted a diamond ruff, and West was quick to oblige for one down.

What should South have done to counter East's imaginative defense? After winning dummy's club king, he should have cashed three rounds of hearts, discarding a club. And instead of down one, he would have scored an overtrick.

New ABC sitcom views life in Harlem

— There was an old lady who lived in Bed-Stuy.
She bumped in a wall because she was high.
She jumped out the window 'cause she thought she could fly.
I locked out my window,
I saw her go by.

That's an example of life in the drug-infested New York borough of Bedford-Stuyvesant, Brooklyn, as described in a collection of nursery rhymes written by Doug E. Doug.

Doug, 24, has made a habit of expressing his real-life experiences through different artistic forums. When he was in high school, Doug agreed to play Scrooge in a school production of "A Christmas Carol" at the request of his principal. Only Doug filtered Charles Dickens' classic tale through his own urban framework and transformed the 19th century classic into a 20th century "homeboy" tale.

Instead of saying "Bah, humbug," Doug's Scrooge would just say, "Ah, get the hell out of here."

Now, Doug's stark background has found its way into a network comedy series. In the new ABC sitcom "Wild 'N' Out," which loosely reflects his own life, Doug plays a Harlem-teen-ager who hangs with his friends on the stoop outside the apartment house where he lives with his middle-class family.

"I always wanted to be a comedic actor," says Doug, who took to the road as a stand-up comic at 17, performing an opening act for Miles Davis and Kool and the Gang.

"So when the show's producers approached me about creating a sitcom based on my family life, I was thrilled. I was a pretty crazy teenager. In high school I used to tell jokes to friends in the hallway like, 'My family was so poor, my family was so poor, my family was so poor they'd go to Kentucky Fried Chicken and lick other people's fingers.'"

Doug has performed at such New York City comedy hot spots as Sweetwaters, Uptown Comedy Club and the Comic Strip. He received his break from "Madoin X" director Spike Lee, who saw Doug's routine at the Apollo Theatre and gave him a bit part in his 1990 film "Mo' Better Blues."

Doug went on to earn a best-actor nomination from the Independent Spirit Awards for his role in "Hangin' With the Homeboys," and he starred in Kid 'N' Play's film "Class Act" last year.

Executive producer Michael Jacobs first caught Doug's stream-of-consciousness comedy when he was hosting a New Year's Eve special in 1991. "He struck me as quite original and different," recalled Jacobs, who created the ABC sitcom "Dinosaurs" for Walt Disney Television.

"I thought it would be very interesting if we did sort of a black 'Our Town.' Jacobs said.

Letterman will have theater of his own to play with

David Letterman on Broadway? You lose, L.A.
Dispelling buzz that NBC's most celebrated lame duck would take his business west when he joins CBS, the network announced Monday that it was buying the historic Ed Sullivan Theater to serve as Letterman's new base. Estimated price tag: \$4 million, or \$10 million less than Dave's salary.

Opened in 1927 as Hammerstein's Theater, the facility was dedicated to CBS's master showman in '67. The stone-faced Ed Sullivan held court there Sunday nights from 1948 to '71, spotlighting such talent as Elvis Presley and the Supremes and introducing U.S. audiences to the Beatles.

"If you're going to make the show a showcase, where better to put it than on Broadway?" CBS Broadcast Group boss Howard Stringer said.

Monday, "When that marquee lights up, it will be exciting and revitalizing. It says we're back in business."

New York sources say CBS will spend another \$4 million to renovate the theater, which was named a city landmark in 1985. It will accommodate an audience of about 400, more than double Let-

terman's NBC digs. In addition, CBS will buy the 12-story office building adjacent to the theater for production offices.

Letterman and his staff wanted to stay in New York, Stringer said. The question was "finding a facility that would give him the space to grow." Setting up at the CBS Broadcast Center would have meant sending "As the World Turns," a 20-year tenant, "out into the cold," Stringer said.

The Ed Sullivan Theater was a possibility "from the word 'go,'" according to Stringer. After an initial feeling that it needed too much work, CBS felt that "it was the next logical choice. To walk in there is to feel showmanship," said Stringer, no slouch himself in that department.

The theater, still in use as a TV-production facility, "has great equipment and state-of-the-art control rooms," Stringer said.

Q. Didn't Steven Seagal get his start in stardom when a talent scout spotted him slinging hash as a short-order cook in a Southern California greasy spoon?

A. Don't know where you got that information. The "Under Siege" star was one of Hollywood's hottest personal trainers, designing karate routines for fitness-minded showbiz folk. For seven years he was aikido instructor to CAA chief Michael Ovitz. One day the number one agent asked, "What are your dreams? What would you like to be most?" "A movie star," was the reply. "I'll work on it personally," said Ovitz, "and make you a star." And Ovitz is the man who could.

Q. Isn't it true that Jane Fonda is chafing at her marriage to TV magnate Ted Turner, and is aching to get back to acting in Hollywood?

A. As far as I can tell, Jane remains genuinely thrilled to be married to Turner. And besides, she'll be 54 years old by the end of the year, not exactly the best age for a leading Hollywood actress of Fonda's calibre. Still, Jane is even. Her interest in movies, video and TV is still there. While not planning a return to a starring role in a flick anytime soon, Jane is keeping busy. Latest word is that she's working on a TV series on Turner's TNT cable network about one of her favorite, politically correct causes — American Indians.

Q. I was saddened to read that Woody Allen's parents have been perplexed and somewhat disappointed ever since the story of his scandalous rift with Mia Farrow first broke. Are they back in his corner yet?

A. They never left it. Woody's elderly parents are gung-ho for him and his career and are proceeding as though nothing ever happened. His dad is still helping with the payroll for "Manhattan Murder Mystery," which Allen has been shooting in New York. And his mother is now answering his fan mail of some 50 letters a week, fulfilling photo requests, etc. and helping to keep the machinery in motion.

Q. Members of the press who are hounding screenings of "The Crying Game," that new thriller, were handed a sheet of paper after the showing asking them not to reveal the film's big surprise. Has such a veil of secrecy ever been imposed previously?

A. Although begging an audience not to reveal a major surprise as in "The Crying Game" is not

new to Hollywood, the weirdest example of celluloid secrecy was set by "Diabolique," a highly inventive shocker of several decades ago, starring Simone Signoret. For this film, audiences waiting on line in key cities where this now-classic movie was first shown were asked to sign "contracts" promising not to reveal the ending before they could be admitted to the theater, or even sold a ticket. No contract, no viewing.

Q. As longtime Abbott and Costello fans, we were fascinated to read that all 52 of their TV shows will have video distribution. Can you settle this question:

Which one of the pair was responsible for their ultimate breakup?

A. Lou Costello, the roly-poly funster of the team, wanted to split and try his hand solo as a dramatic actor away from his identity with longtime straightman, Bud Abbott. Ultimately, Costello made "The 30-Foot Bride of Candy Rock" without his former vaudeville and burlesque cohort, but the flick didn't make box-office history.

Q. Is it true that Faye Dunaway closely follows exotic dietary habits to maintain her svelte figure?

A. It's true that Faye, one of the best looking 50-year-olds I know,

follows curious eating habits. But, then again, many big Hollywood stars are renowned for their exotic vegetarian and macrobiotic eating habits. Dunaway follows a largely liquid diet. She takes the stuff with her on the road, as she did recently when she went to Israel to film her latest thriller, "Double Edge." She was especially concerned about eating in a foreign country, but finally relented to sampling local fruits and even fish.

Q. Isn't it obvious that Elizabeth Taylor's much-younger husband married her for her considerable fame and fortune?

A. Many of us feared the worst

when Taylor, 60, married construction worker Larry Fortensky, 40. He seems an odd choice — a formerly married, heavy-equipment operator from Southern California. They met at the Betty Ford clinic four years ago when both were rehabbing from bouts of alcohol abuse. But Taylor's close associates say they are genuinely in love. Both have a very clear sense of their own identities (he kept his job with a construction company), and each helps keep the other sober. One thing Fortensky dislikes: talk in his presence of Taylor's six, far more famous former husbands.

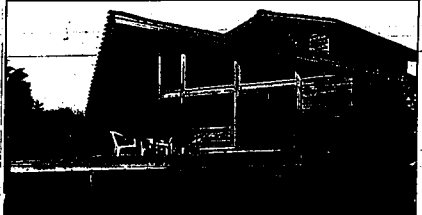

Baseball fans stuck between greedy owners, players

Baseball's theme song is lost in a time warp.

"Take Me Out To The Ballgame" evokes images of an innocent era, when buying "peanuts and Crackerjacks" did not involve serious financial consideration for the working-class fan. A recent survey published in Sport Magazine cites a 2,250 percent increase in the price of hot dogs at Yankee Stadium since 1952.

An overpaid hot dog might be easier to swallow if owners and players showed any respect for fans trapped in this greedy crossfire.

Baseball needs dramatic changes before these fools ruin a game cherished as our nation's pastime.

Salary caps, revenue sharing and a strong, independent commissioner are

among the most significant objectives for survival into the next century. Implementing those changes appears impossible, given the blind ambition that drives executives and players.

While owners continue to whine about exorbitant salary demands, they showed dismal fiscal responsibility by going on a four-day, \$250 million shopping spree for free agents during the winter meetings in Louisville, Ky.

The numbers are too numbing to comprehend. The game is filled with nobody's hitting .234 and making more than a \$1 million a year. Not to mention the somebodies who don't deserve their financial windfalls.

Wade Boggs hits a career-low .259 and signs a 3-year contract with the Yankees for \$11 million. Detroit signs

a used-up Kirk Gibson for a \$500,000 base salary, with a chance to make \$600,000 more in incentives. (He hasn't swung a bat since May, when Pittsburgh released him after hitting .096 in 16 games). Los Angeles gives Ramon Martinez a \$1.05 million raise after he finished 8-11 and missed the final six weeks of the 1992 season with injuries.

A look at this season's arbitration scorecard reveals that the average salary increase was 110 percent.

There is no pity here for owners, who constantly whine about financial ruin and the perils of small-market franchises, which do not have the financial leverage to compete with the larger markets.

Let's go back to the scoreboard, boys and girls. Minnesota and Cincinnati have won three World Series in a recent four-year span.

Now, how many have New York, Los Angeles and Chicago won recent-ly?

Sadly, the power struggle between players and owners may be played out mano-a-mano next spring, when a militant band of owners appears prepared to regain control by locking out players.

It shouldn't come to that. Don Fehr, the head of the players union, and Dick Ravitch, the point man for the owners (at an expense of \$750,000 a year), need to negotiate a new labor agreement before fan interest wanes to the point of no return.

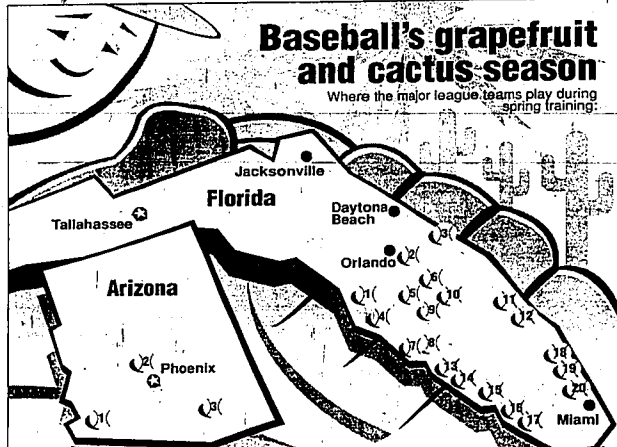
Baseball attendance dipped dramatically last season. Fewer fans watched on television. Baseball faces a sizable reduction — as much as 50 percent — in television revenue when the CBS/ESPN contracts expire at the end of the upcoming season.

Enough. Bring the fans back by showing your genuine concern for the game.

Look to the NBA as a prime example of common-sense. Implement revenue sharing in the form of a salary cap equal to 52 percent of the league revenues. Tie that agreement into sharing local television revenue so we don't have to hear those pathetic stories about the smaller markets struggling to survive.

Bring in a strong commissioner who won't be a lap dog to the owners. Poor leadership is at the crux of baseball's problems today. Fay Vincent tried using his clout during his brief reign, and the owners showed their appreciation by running him out of the game. Class act, these guys.

Do it now, before Pink Floyd's "Money" displaces the traditional seventh-inning anthem.

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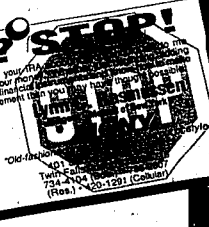

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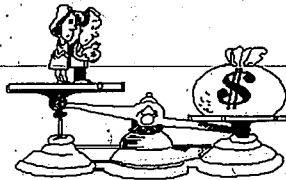
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
