Rental lack squeezes homeless

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls' taut rental housing market is fast turning into a crisis for the city's growing number of homeless families.

"We've had seven families this winter who've lost their homes to fire," said Ruth Young, office manager for the South Chapter of the American Red Cross. "As far as I know, none of them have found housing yet, and one family is still living in a motel."

"It used to be that when the holidays rolled around, the homeless disappeared," said Cyd Dillon, Multico county specialist for the South Central Community Action Agency. "Not this year."

Stephen Feldman, a Twin Falls property manager and real-estate agent, estimates that the agency rate for rental housing in Twin Falls is between 1% and 2 percent. "For people trying to find a house to rent, it's almost impossible," Feldman said. "The upshot is that people who are evicted or who lose their housing for other reasons are on the street."

"There's one guy who has to keep going back and forth between here and (the Helping Hand Mission) in Burley because he's applied for IHA housing and he's waiting to get in," said Jim Biers, social services director for the Twin Falls Salvation Army.

Dillon said her agency was helping 360 homeless individuals of families months before the holidays. Across town, the Salvation Army helped 24 people in December — six single men and seven families.

907 homeless individuals were reported in the Magic Valley from January through September. Although single men make up the largest group, a growing number are families, Biers said.

"We're getting some newcomers, people who've given up on wherever they were living and just got in their cars and left," Biers said. "But we're also seeing too many people who've lost their jobs and been evicted."

"What concerns me is the number of first-time people we're losing."

According to the Idaho Housing Agency.

Bush sees suffering, lauds American troops

MOGADISHU, Somalia — President Bush, wending his way among Somalis too weak to move and children about to die, said Thursday it was "just too emotional" to witness the suffering of this ravaged African country.

The president, in a New Year's Eve visit to the east African nation, praised the 18,000 American troops deployed throughout Somalia, saying they were performing their task of alleviating its misery in a "brave" way.

Bush was given a graphic display of the dangers of their mission when rival clans shelled each other with mortars in the western suburbs of Mogadishu Thursday night.

Flashes from the shelling lit up the sky as Bush spent the night on a U.S. Navy ship offshore. Col. Fred Peck, the Marines' spokesman, said the battle, apparently over an ammo cache, was the first firefight but it "is definitely the largest" since U.S. forces arrived Dec. 9 to aid relief operations.

Peck said he was unaware of any changes in Bush's plans to return to shore today for further inspections of efforts to save the starving.

Soon after arriving from Washington, via Saudi Arabia, Bush was taken to a private hospital, school and food center about 18 miles outside Mogadishu.

The clatter of his helicopter was almost drowned out by the chant of children and their parents shouting repeatedly, "Welcome Mr. Bush. Welcome Mr. Bush."

A group of children dressed in colorful rags handed him a purple bougainvillea branch, and he was then fed through a maze of plastic sheets covered with plastic sheets and tattered cloth to the hospital's school.

Bush entered a school, made of corrugated tin, to be greeted by dozens of children sitting quietly on the sand floor. Outside a sign read "We need peace and education." Another sign said, "We Somalis never forget George Bush."

There were no desks or chairs, only several tattered school books.

"I thought I had the most respect for the before-how-and now it's even greater," Bush said of the U.S. troops. "It's the best of America."

Security for Bush's 44-hour visit was a daunting operation. Marines seized weapons caches, took over one building from which snipers could target the former U.S. embassy and packed its 55-acre compound with machine gun pits.

Arms treaty signing switches to Moscow

ABOARD U.S.S. TRIPOLI — President Bush and Russian President Boris Yeltsin will hold their arms reduction summit in Moscow this weekend instead of the Black Sea resort of Sochi.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said Yeltsin called Bush and asked that the location be changed because of bad weather in Sochi.

Fitzwater said there would be no changes in the summit schedule outside of minor changes owing to the longer flight time from Somalia, where Bush is visiting American troops, to Moscow.

Yeltsin and Bush are to meet for two days over the weekend to sign a historic nuclear arms control agreement.

Fitzwater had no details on the weather in Sochi, but the Russian news agency Tass reported from Moscow that the nearby Georgian region of Abkhazia was experiencing its biggest snowfall since 1949. It said heavy snow has been falling for three days.

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Somali clans exchange fire in Mogadishu

MOGADISHU, Somalia — Clan fighters allied with Mogadishu's two main warring factions traded mortar fire Thursday in the western suburbs, lighting up the New Year's Eve sky.

None of the multinational peace-

keeping force was believed involved in the fighting, which broke out about two hours after sundown.

Maj. Ken Roberts, a U.S. military spokesman in Mogadishu, said in an interview with CNN that the fighting occurred five to six miles from U.S. positions and involved 30 caliber

machine guns, small mortars, light artillery and small arms. He said the fighting was between "warring factions."

Flashes from mortar explosions and occasional streaks of tracer fire could be seen by reporters near the port and airport, where the U.S. troops of Operation Restore Hope are based.

In trendspeak, they're "crystal-balling it."

"Of course, the prognosticators don't know what will happen in 1993. Oh, they know that there will be a new administration. That's a gimme."

But they don't know the really juicy stuff, like whether interest rates will go up or down. Or whether Dink and Charles will reconcile. Or whether the new "Star Trek" spinoff will go where no series has gone before.

They do have some good hunches about baby boomers all grown up, about baby boomers leaving the nest (finally), about bell bottoms (Yes, bell bottoms. More on that later).

A lot of what they foresee is bound up in what many Americans feel — optimism, a sense of new beginnings at hand.

Some predictions for 1993

Every year fortunes are made and bets laid on predictions that may or may not come true. It's always a gamble.

But here Edward Cornish, president of the World Future Society, offers a few of his best guesses for 1993.

HEALTH: Fetal brain tissue transplants will be more widely used in treating Parkinson's Disease. Advances expected in genetic treatment for alcoholism, mental illness and other maladies.

SOCIETY: There will be no letup in violence in American cities. People will want to bulletproof their automobiles

and homes. Flak jackets may be worn increasingly in high-crime areas.

WORK: The home-based option will gain in popularity as a result of improved telecommunications and the strains of traffic, crime and child care.

LEISURE: Electronic entertainment will be bigger — and more time-consuming — than ever. The number of games and specialized TV programs will surge with plenty to suit every taste.

FOOD: The line between food and medicine will continue to blur. People will insist more on ingredients that are healthful as well as tasty. Iron-free products will be the rage, owing to new links between iron and heart attacks.

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No, you've not heard the last of Family Values. They're just being reshaped, the traditional nuclear mold altered to fit the shortage of time and cash. Policy-makers predict 1993 will find help on the way.

"I think we're going to see a good deal of attention paid to child issues and children's problems," said Nicholas Zill, executive director of Child Trends, a nonprofit research organization.

Much of the push-will likely come from Hillary Clinton. First Lady, First Spouse, First Mate, we've yet to find out. Long a children's rights advocate, she'll no doubt play a key role in the new administration.

As well a lot of women. A year ago, '90-one was talking about Susan Faludi's "Backlash" and the state of feminism in the '90s. Well, it looks like the Year of the Woman has extended to '93, with a new crop of female law-makers and executive appointees.

Along with the focus on children, a whole host of social issues will take center stage. Activists like Ralph Nader, executive

Fresh snow storm shapes up across West

Another snowdrift took shape in the West Thursday, already buried under one of the worst storms in years.

Arctic air marched eastward from the Plains, bringing frigid temperatures and snow squalls to the Great Lakes.

Morning fog hung over much of the East Coast again, while skies were generally clear in the Southwest and southern Florida.

The low pressure system responsible for this week's heavy snowfall in the Northwest promised more of the same today. Winter storm warnings were in effect today for mountain regions of Oregon; Northern California and Nevada.

Arctic air in the Plains moved southeast, ending a spell of mild, moist weather in the middle Mississippi Valley and Great Lakes.

A winter storm watch was issued for tonight and Friday for parts of Michigan as the extremely cold air crosses the upper Lakes.

A cold front stretching from New York to Louisiana was expected to drive temperatures down from New England to the Gulf Coast, bringing heavy rain in spots and snow and ice in northern New York and New England.

Work with Clinton, judges told

WASHINGTON (AP) — Judges must work with the incoming Clinton administration and the new Congress to improve the federal court system, Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist said in a year-end report Thursday.

"The central challenge is to blend ... sometimes conflicting perspectives into a responsible policy that will best serve the national interest," Rehnquist said.

Rehnquist, the nation's highest-ranking federal judge, reaffirmed "the judicial branch's commitment to work closely with the other two branches of government in dealing with challenges facing the judiciary."

Cuban pilot may face hijack charges

MIAMI (AP) — A Cuban pilot who flew his commercial airliner to freedom recounted Thursday how he secretly gathered up relatives and friends, loaded air cargo and talked his way to the United States.

But 47-year-old Carlos Cancio Porcel still has a problem — U.S. officials are considering filing hijacking charges.

Cancio said that even if he goes to

prison in the United States, the flight would be worth it because his wife, children and other relatives were among the 48 defectors on the plane.

"I know that my family is all right is enough — the family is ahead of everything," the red-eyed, exhausted pilot told reporters.

The Cuban American National Foundation has hired a lawyer to represent Cancio and any others who

might face charges, said the group's chairman, Jorge Mas Canosa. Mas said he left confident after talking to State Department officials. "I think nothing is going to happen," the State Department said it has never assured anyone charges won't be filed.

Cancio, a pilot since 1965, said he first began thinking about defecting about a year ago.

"It's not at all unusual for someone to get a tip about a vacancy that hasn't been advertised, show up and already have five or six people ahead of them," he said.

"There's not much out there, and what's available is often not in a part of town people want to live," Feldman said. "I tell people that if it's completely acceptable to grab it because you're not going to get a second choice."

Feldman said people considering a move to Twin Falls often call him months in advance, looking for housing, but he can't offer much encouragement, unless they are in the market to buy a home.

"One advantage of this market is that it's forcing some people without a lot of money to do what they should do," he said. "And that's buy a home. There is a lot of financing available to people who don't have a lot of money. Some people are surprised how cheaply they can get into a house."

But Biers says that often isn't an option.

"I deal with people every day who have a job, a business, heat and rent," he said. "And a lot more are one paycheck away from the street."

Bush visits refugees at camp in Somalia

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) — But other than a few banners and Home to about 4,000 people, the Lafoole refugee camp visited by President Bush Thursday looks like just another rundown patch of misery.

Twig hovels are home to bedridden families. The hospital building is a battered concrete block. Children in rags wander barefoot.

"It's a name says it all, Lafoole, the Plunge of Bones."

But despite the name, Lafoole is an example of the fruits of Somalia's and relief agencies' efforts to relieve the suffering that has wracked the country.

Just two doctors and six nurses care for the 40 or so patients in the hospital and scores of out-patients living in nearby hovels. Dr. Hawa Abdou, one of the physicians, said his people were dying daily from starvation only a few months ago. That has dropped to one or two a week.

The mood at Lafoole also is improving. Dr. Hawa said the arrival of foreign troops gave new hope to refugees that the warfare would soon end.

Powell: 1 command needed during crises

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff believes the military services should operate under a single command when dealing with regional crises, according to Pentagon sources.

The sources said Wednesday that Gen. Colin Powell is recommending that such forces be consolidated under the U.S. Atlantic Command in Norfolk, Va. — and not necessarily be commanded by a Navy admiral, as is the case now.

The report, ordered by Congress, also envisions the usage of unified command in the Persian Gulf and other areas of the world.

Secretary Dick Cheney and commanders around the world for their comments. It is to be written every three years to provide an updated review of the roles and missions of the armed services.

However, Powell's latest version lacks the sweeping revisions endorsed by President-elect Clinton and key Democrats in Congress, sources said.

It contains recommendations on the redistribution of certain types of military assets "but no major realignment of the military branches," said one source.

Cheney has told reporters he might let his successor in the new administration deal with the issue, but he will send it to Congress.

President-elect Clinton's nominee for defense secretary, House Armed Services Committee Chairman Les Aspin, D-Wis., has called for far more cuts in defense spending than Cheney and Powell want, including reducing the size of the Army from 12 to nine divisions.

Sami Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, has recommended consolidating the air units of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps under the Air Force.

The draft report turns that and several similar suggestions aside, said one source. Powell has defended the current air defense structure, saying each service's air component served the nation well in the Desert Storm war with Iraq.

Instead, the source said, the draft holds to Powell's long-stated view that duplications should be eliminated in such areas as basic flight training and support functions.

Patch tests for drugs

One of the nation's largest independent drug-testing labs is awaiting federal approval for a "drug detection patch" that would reveal whether a person is using cocaine by collecting sweat from the skin.

Pharmchem Laboratories of Menlo Park, Calif., said Wednesday the developer of the technique submitted the patch to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for permission to begin selling the patch. Under an agreement signed earlier this year, Pharmchem would act as the medical device company's sole distributor.

So far, the request is limited to cocaine testing. But Pharmchem said it also plans to ask the FDA to approve patch-based tests for other drugs, including marijuana, methamphetamine, PCP, opiates and alcohol. The company said it expects the FDA to act on its application sometime in 1993.

Worn on the upper arm, the Band-Aid style patch works by absorbing perspiration, which is later analyzed for traces of the substances, themselves or the metabolic chemicals they produce.

9 hurt in derailment

STEVENSVILLE, Mich. (AP) — An Amtrak train with more than 200 people aboard jumped the tracks Wednesday night not far from where vandals left debris on the track two days before, authorities said.

Nine people were slightly injured. The Pere Marquette was about 60 miles east-northeast of Chicago on its route to Grand Rapids when it derailed. All four passenger cars and the engine went off the track and landed-tipped-at an angle.

The cause of the accident was under investigation. CSX Transportation, which owns the track, reported that the train appeared to have struck something, but it wasn't clear what, Amtrak spokesman Clifford Black said. He testified the number on board at 217, but Pat Kelly, another spokeswoman, said there were 240 people on the train.

Pete Simclair, Van Buren County deputy coordinator of emergency management, said someone left debris Monday on the same track 20 miles east of the accident site in an apparent attempt to derail trains.

After more than an hour of waiting in a drizzle near the crash site, passengers were taken by buses to a school where they were fed until other buses were rounded up to take them to Grand Rapids.

Couple accused of leaving kids alone released on bond

CHICAGO (AP) — A couple who left their two young children home alone while they vacationed in Mexico were released from jail Thursday after posting bond.

David and Sharon Schoo walked quickly out of the Kane County Corrections Center into an awaiting station wagon. Neither responded as a swarm of reporters shouted questions at them.

The couple was arrested Tuesday at O'Hare International Airport as they returned from a nine-day vacation to Acapulco. Each posted \$5,000 Thursday on a \$50,000 bond.

Their lawyer, Gerard Kepple, said the Schoos would not return to their home but would be taken elsewhere to shield them from the extensive media coverage that the case has drawn.

Bosnians harass U.N. chief

(SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina) — U.N. Secretary-General Boutros-Boutros-Ghali was jeered and spat at on the streets of this besieged city Thursday when he appealed to Bosnians to give peace talks more time to work.



Many residents are enraged by Boutros-Ghali's opposition to Western moves toward military intervention in Bosnia. On Wednesday, he sent a letter to the U.N. Security Council expressing his "grave concern over the growing momentum for military action in the area."

Western nations on the council, led by the United States, are pushing toward using warplanes to make sure Serbs honor a U.N. resolution barring them from military flights over Bosnia.

Boutros-Ghali said his one-day visit was to show solidarity with Sarajevo's people who have been surrounded by rebel Serbs for nine months. Wearing a blue peace-keeper's helmet, he emerged from a Russian-built Antonov plane that landed despite freezing fog at Sarajevo's U.N.-controlled airport Thursday. The airport, often caught in cross-fire between Bosnian government forces and Serb besiegers, was calm.

Boutros-Ghali was taken downtown for talks with Bosnian leaders and a tour of the devastated city.

As reporters looked on, the deputy president of Bosnia's Muslim-led government, Ejup Ganic, told Boutros-Ghali that U.N. help had come "much too late."

"We share your frustration. We share the horror that has happened to our country," Boutros-Ghali responded.

But he insisted to negotiate, he said. "Only through negotiations will we be able to find a solution."

Outside, about 50 protestors chanted: "Boutros, out! Boutros out! Ghali, fascist! Ghali Hitler!" The group jeered and spat at Boutros-Ghali's white U.N. car as it sped away on a tour, passing Sarajevo's once-prized national library and stopping at a badly damaged hospital.

Czechoslovakia ceases to exist

BRATISLAVA, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Czechs and Slovaks spent a final, nostalgic day Thursday in a common state that anchored Central Europe from Germany to Ukraine but began fraying soon after the end of communist rule.

The division of Czechoslovakia into the independent Czech Republic and Slovakia at midnight came with a complete absence of the violence that plagued the country's 74-year existence in one of the most troubled neighborhoods.

As a peaceful reassertion of national identities in the post-Communist world, the split offered an alternative to the bitter, howling feuds of other newly formed nations, the former Soviet Union and Yugoslavia.

Polish miners near solution to protest

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The government signed an agreement Thursday with representatives of more than 300,000 striking coal miners that raised hopes of ending the 18-day protest.

The agreement, reached after 16 hours of negotiations, still has to be approved by the strike committee in Silesia. Leaders indicated the action could be called off by Monday.

The agreement calls for a quick bailout of indebted mines, additional state subsidies and a commitment to seek credits for restructuring.

3 die in suicide pact

TOKYO (AP) — Five teen-age girls leaped from the top floor of an eight-story apartment building Thursday in a suicide pact, and three died, police said.

One of the survivors, who were hospitalized in a serious condition, told police that the girls jumped after talking paint thinner. "She gave no reason but said, 'We thought we wouldn't be afraid of dying if we were high,'" said Osamu Nemoto, a duty officer at the state police headquarters in Mito, 60 miles east of Tokyo.

1992 wasn't exactly a banner year — for anything

1992 is over, and not a moment too soon. Such a year it was — an exciting, exhilarating, exhausting, confusing, through-politics-and-human-perversity. If it had lasted another month, we couldn't have stood the strain.

This was the year when America embraced family values — and elected Bill Clinton.

This was the year when America demanded change in its federal government — and then re-elected a herd of incumbent congressmen to shake things up.

This year voters drove a president from office because he couldn't end a recession — and then learned from economists that the recession had ended in 1991.

This year Idahoans turned thumbs down to casino gambling — but nearly 80,000 of us gambled our votes on a Texas billionaire who wanted to be president without going into politics.

For the Magic Valley, it was a year when people who normally wouldn't think much about landfills thought about them — at one point, Twin Falls County commissioners could have fattened their budget by taxing the sale of tar-and-feathers.

Around the world, it was a year of needless tragedy and heartache. The "New World Order" that seemed so glorious in 1991's Desert Storm was powerless to halt "ethnic cleansing" in a hell-hole called Serbia.

Closer to home, police in Los Angeles were equally powerless to stop a different kind of ethnic cleansing. Rioters — enraged because white policemen had been acquitted of beating a black motorist, expressed their political disenchantment by destroying Korean-owned businesses.


Another criminal case — the Amanda Hestler murder — focused the Magic Valley's attention on child abuse. That case's unsatisfactory conclusion left many local folk unhappy with our legal systems, but we refrained from looting anything.

In 1992, both the U.S. Air Force and motorcycle stuntman Robbie Knievel encountered resistance to their plans to bore holes in southern Idaho's skies. In both cases, significant numbers of local residents recognized the need to guard local interests from those who would exploit our hospitality.

Such a year. Dan Quayle was the cultural elite. TV cameras greeted Navy Seals on the beach in Somalia. Anybody here from out of town? A hurricane in Florida. A jailbreak in Jerome. Yet another neo-Nazi kook in north Idaho.

It was a year when we in the news business never ran short of raw material. And neither did Jay Leno.

And now it's over. We can't tell whether the world is a better place or a worse place than a year ago. It's certainly an older place, and God willing a wiser one.



While Clinton brings in lobbyists, party will reign in its righteousness

The embryonic Clinton administration is already illustrating a paradox. Some of its early responsibility is a reputation for giving it responsibility. Thus the 1992 election may do for Democrats what the 1952 election did for Republicans — force them to temper their righteousness.

In 1952, Republicans, losers of five consecutive presidential elections, were, with Joe McCarthy and others in Congress, demonstrating that prolonged absence from executive power tends to corrupt a party. The Eisenhower presidency soon made congressional Republicans more circumspect.

Soon now Democratic responsibility for the executive branch may make congressional Democrats less judgmental and accusatory.

Many of the people whom candidate Clinton exoriated as "influence peddlers" — Washington lawyer-lobbyists — are being hired by president-elect Clinton. A Clinton aide is referring to them sardoniously as "implementers." Clinton, the candidate of "change," has changed the nomenclature.

We are now told that these "implementers" are crucial to Clinton's promise to break governmental "gridlock." They know how to get things done around here.

A lawyer-lobbyist (Vernon Jordan) is running the transition; another (Ron Brown) will be Commerce secretary; a third (Mickey Kantor) will be trade representative. And these three are just the best-known of the many of their breed now burrowing into the administration. But worry not.

A Washington Post news story reports that this is not merely acceptable, it is desirable.

This page-one headline — "Scorned During Campaign, Lobbyists Now Seen Essential" — is followed by this headline over the inside "jump" portion of the story: "Lobbyists Bring Expertise to President's Team." Again, imagine similar Post headlines describing similar uses of "influence peddlers" — sorry, "implementers" — by a Republican transition, a transition that was, say, using someone who lobbies for airlines and local transit authorities to organize the Transportation Department as Clinton's transition is starting.

The Post's story focuses on "superlobbyist" Howard Paster, who before joining Clinton's transition (and presumably joining Clinton's administration, as liaison with Congress)

George F. Will was manager of the Washington office of what the Post calls the "public relations and lobbying giant Hill and Knowlton, whose clients span most of corporate America." The Post sardoniously reports: "No administration can get

interventionist government. Intervention in economic and social relations does not merely propitiate interest groups, it creates them. Some of them organize to defend benefits sometimes bestowed without having been requested. This is a selfish government, whereby government supplies a program, thereby increasing the supply of groups making demands.

Interest groups drawn to Washington like iron filings to a magnet, resist revitalizing federalism by devolving responsibilities to states. Such devolution would inconvenience interest groups. They prefer "one-stop shopping" (the phrase is from Michael Horowitz of the Manhattan Institute) in Washington to shopping in 50 capitals.

The mission of so many of these suddenly (since Nov. 3) "influence peddlers" (now "implementers") in the new administration merely reflects this fact: The Democratic Party is devoted to implementing the agenda of interest groups. And the mission may have the agreeable effect of dampening Democratic sanctimony — about "greed" (as in the decade of), "corporate America" (the gasping nature of), "condemners of interest" (a.k.a. "slackers").

And that may be just part of power's chastening effects on Democrats. In 1993 the mere existence of a Democratic administration may give Congress second thoughts about reviving the expired independent counsel law.

Does Clinton really want to live by Lawrence Walsh's standard that "withholding information from Congress is tantamount to lying? Does a Democratic Congress want to feel obligated to scrutinize all statements made by fellow Democrats in the executive branch in order to enforce such a standard?

Clinton's embrace of "implementers" (Jordan, Brown, Paster, et al) who represent what Clinton unit recently called "entrenched power and money" in Washington may not be pretty. But it may presage an abatement of his party's unattractive righteousness which recently has become inversely proportioned to its executive responsibility.

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
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

Shoshone youth parlays electronics interest into radio jock job

GOODING — Most kids his age listen to the radio, but Cody Tews sits on the other side of the controls.

A discjockey at age 14, Cody earned his FCC license last April and signed on with radio station TNT-1480 AM Dynamite Country in Gooding.

Headphones in place, Cody sits in the control room amid the strains of "The Streets of Bakerfield." He leaned to record music early on and he punches in a recorded announcement when he is too busy to take the microphone live.

"We used to have to introduce every song," Cody said, "but now everything's automated."

"Cody slips in a tape selected from a stack labeled 'Current #1.' Another group of songs labeled gold (as in solid) is filed nearby. The Deejay must type the commercials into a computer.

At the top of the hour, Cody connects with his audience.

"You are listening to 1480 TNT country," he says. "We will get right back to your favorite music after this."

Cody works summers at the station and is on call during the school year. His on air handle is "Captain Cody." It fits, according to the station's owner.

Weldon "knows of any other Deejay this young anywhere around," said Arlis Trammer, who co-owns TNT with his wife, Mo.

"Cody's so good at this that we can leave

him with the station and know it's in good hands."

Of course, even those who are most successful have their frantic moments.

"I've forgotten to flip the switch and the music I was meaning to play never made it on the air," he said. "I've played the wrong commercials, too." It's part of learning the trade.

Cody's an electronics enthusiast who has always been interested in radio. At home, he has a shop filled with electronic equipment and manuals. Someday, he wants to be an electrical engineer.

No one in Cody's family shares his fervent interest in electronics.

Sometimes we have to call people and say, 'Could you come over because Cody asked a question we can't answer,'" laughed Diana Tews, Cody's mother.

At Shoshone High School, where Cody is a freshman, the young teen's interests are more diversified. He's in Natural Helpers and FFA, and he is president of his class.

He also serves as chairperson of the Wood River Youth Board, all while maintaining As and Bs in his studies.

"The kids at school don't treat him like a celebrity," Cody explained, and he doesn't receive any fan mail. "But people do stop me and ask, 'Cody, is that really you on the radio?'" he said.

TNT's main audience is in the Wendell-Gooding area. Some listeners live in Hagerman, Bliss, Fairfield and Jerome.

Cody, himself, commutes to the station from his family's farm 11 miles north of Shoshone. When he gets his driver's license, it will be a lot easier," said his mom/chauffeur.

Meanwhile, Cody continues to spin those country tunes. His personal favorite is the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band's "Fanning the Drum." But Cody himself seldom fishes in the dark.

"I know I have a young voice right now for a Deejay," he said, "but if you want something, you have to go for it."

Critic's top 10 films of '92 — and then some

From the sublime to the unwatchable: 1992 was a year like many movie years, full of unforeseen comebacks, marginal work from once-reliable filmmakers, formulaic junk, terrific pictures from unexpected sources and other surprises.

Among the most intriguing movies such as Robert Redford's meditative family drama, "A River Runs Through It," and Spike Lee's revelatory biography, "Malcolm X," shared shopping-mall marquee with sloppily sequels like "Pleasantville" and bottom-of-the-barrel drab like "Kuffs."

But few years are remembered for such in-one-month-and-out-the-next fodder. In-the-long-run, it's enough that 1992 gave us such movies for the ages as "Unforgiven" — Clint Eastwood's tragic

Western about a man who struggles to escape his violent nature, and "The Best Intentions," Billie August and Ingmar Bergman's Swedish masterpiece about an uneasy marital truce between an

exceptionally strong-willed couple (the maddeningly beautiful, in my opinion).

More than ever, it was difficult for American movies without stars, \$40 million budgets or studio backing to find an audience.

At year's end, the widely praised "Gas Food Lodging" had grossed just over \$900,000 at the domestic box office, while such already-forgotten marginal stuff as "Consenting Adults" and "Captain Ron" topped \$20 million.

Video and cable will, of course, help connect these movies with those who

might have appreciated them in theaters. But it's difficult to imagine that anything as gripping and provocative as "One False Move" can have the same impact on a 2 1/2-inch screen.

Controversy, little substance mark rock music scene

Sister Who? This was Bill Clinton, future president of the United States, speaking at a sensitive and high-profile meeting of Jesse Jackson's Rainbow Coalition, ripping rapper Sister Souljah. She was the forceful speaker who had earlier suggested — to make up for centuries of racism — a week to kill white people.

Clinton's response to Souljah's remarks developed into a brilliant political strategy.

He managed to reassure Americans that he stood against racism — of all types — and assert himself over the power-broking Jackson without losing his coalition of African-American voters.

Sister Souljah — whose 1992 debut album, "360 Degrees of Power," was a seemingly endless and decidedly un-funny sermon about race relations — earned a front-page picture in the New York Times and a cover story in Newsweek.

For this, she serves as a perfect symbol of the Year in Rock, 1992: Much Ado About Nothing.

It was a year the musicians stood up to make forceful statements that won them huge headlines and national attention beyond the usual rock 'n' roll publicity. It was a year the highest-profile performers decided to back their strong sound bites with weak and uneven works of art. Remember?

MADONNA'S "SEX": Dirty pictures for \$49.95 and the book's cover fall off for no extra charge. An annoying new album called "Erotica."

Yet she dominated headlines, sparked bookstore rushes and ignited public-library controversies all over the world.

"ICE-T'S 'COP KILLER': A powerful song about police brutality misinterpreted by pundits who demanded it be removed from the rapper's first-ever speed-metal album, "Body Count."

"Anyone who ever listened to Randy Newman believes Ice-T's defense that the song's 'cop killer' is a narrator, not the rapper himself."

SINEAD O'CONNOR: Irony of the year: At the Bob Dylan Tribute Concert, fans booed her off the stage because she had earlier ripped up the Pope's picture

on national television. But O'Connor never followed up her strong — and not as ridiculous as critics made out — political statements with strong music.

Her Dylanfest song was dimmy and her album of lounge tunes, "All I Not You Girl," flimsier.

'Hoffa' portrays title character as a man of single dimension

HOLLYWOOD — Jimmy Hoffa never drove a truck for a living but turned the Teamsters into the largest and strongest union of its day. He trafficked with thugs but used a sophisticated grasp of the intricacies of trucking industry economics to consolidate his gains.

Movie review

A devoted family man who never developed champagne tastes, he disappeared on July 30, 1975, probably a victim of organized crime. He was a complex, contradictory personality whose life might have made an exceptional movie. It hasn't quite.

"Hoffa" (rated R for violence and strong language) is a very impressive piece of work in a number of ways. Dark, sinister and brooding, it uses Jack Nicholson's convincing acting, Stephen H. Burum's panoramic cinematography and Danny DeVito's polished, energetic direction to create a stark, brassy epic of union history. But that is only half the story.

For "Hoffa" turns out to be as misdirected as it is passionate, as one-note-dramatically as it is potent. Chiefly, it is a take-it-or-leave-it biography that distills all the conventions of the form. It ends up outsmarting itself, an attempt at myth-making that succeeds only in leveling the object of its affections.

David Mamet wrote the "Hoffa" script, and it is a classic, elegant piece of work, displaying the grace with spoken language that marked "Glengarry Glen Ross" but troublesome in terms of structure and character development. With a score by the conventional signposts of biography, "Hoffa" offers us a single date for any of its actions, and except for the briefest glimpse of the Detroit News, not a single city is named as a location.

The same kind of contempt for the standard issue is displayed in the development of Hoffa's character, that in a word, doesn't.

Aside from the fact that this simplistic portrayal does a disservice to the real man (who, though you wouldn't know it, could outfigure any CPA), its lack of dramatic arc makes the film increasingly tedious to watch. All the audience is left with are snapshots of repetitive tough-guy behavior, a scenario that is too limited to hold anyone's interest for a 2-hour-and-20-minute length. During "Hoffa's" first hour, however, these problems are not very visible or very troublesome. Though the film opens in the 1970s with the union leader and close (albeit fictional) associate Bobby Claro (DeVito) waiting for a meeting in a restaurant parking lot, the story soon shifts into flashback and shows us

Hoffa's start as a firebrand organizer of fearful truckers. America's turbulent, violent labor history has been rarely touched by film (John Sayles' 1987 "Menace" was an excellent exception), and DeVito takes full advantage of that setting.

Always a director with a feeling for the dark side, he and cinematographer Burum create a vivid, compelling portrait of large-scale class warfare, from angry confrontations in rainstorms to apocalyptic pitched battles with management goons.

Though he has a weakness for showier shots than he really needs, DeVito emerges here as a director of impressive visual scope and flair. Helping him quite a bit is Nicholson's strong performance, flat Midwestern accent and all, as the choleric union leader.

Ex-hairdresser becomes big-time director

LOS ANGELES (AP) — He first worked as a hairdresser in a New Jersey beauty parlor. Ten years ago he was accepted as a director on a TV sitcom. Today Danny DeVito is the director and co-star of a \$50 million movie.

All this from a bald, five-footer who seems to lack the likely power person in the film business. But after directing only three movies, DeVito can call his shots at any studio, as director as well as actor.

How did it happen? It helps that he has appeared in a number of successful, fortune hunter in "Romancing the Stone"; as Arnold Schwarzenegger's twin brother in "Twins"; as the insidious Penguin in "Batman Returns."

As director, his movies have included the twisted comedy melodramas "Twist Momma From the Train" and "The War of the Roses." His latest is "Hoffa," a big-budget biography filled with strong drama and vast crowd scenes.

"My main man Dan" is what Jack Nicholson, who stars in "Hoffa," calls DeVito. Their friendship goes back to 1975 and "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest." They also appeared together in "Going South," which Nicholson directed, and "Terms of Endearment."


The public's image of DeVito, 48, was established during his five-year run as Louis DePalma, the blustery, malevolent dispatcher in the comedy series "Taxi."

A different view of DeVito himself is offered by Joe Roth, who hired him for "Hoffa" while heading 20th Century Fox production (Roth has since moved to Disney).

"He's a very warm, dedicated guy, able to go through every emotion to get the job done. He's completely loyal and dedicated. Yes, he can explode on occasion, but only when someone on the picture has fouled up badly. It's only about trying to make a better film."

DeVito's achievements in the movie business certainly could not have been predicted during his growing years in the summer resort of Asbury Park (N.J.). After graduating from Catholic high school, he went to work in his sister's beauty parlor.

He admits to harboring secret desires to be an actor early on. "I'm a big movie fan. Sometimes I'd go two-three times a week. I used to think, 'I can do that.' I didn't admit it because

Weather, New Year's festivities don't mix

TWIN FALLS — Mother Nature chose the most treacherous driving night of the year to make travel nearly impossible in parts of the Magic Valley Thursday.

As if the annual deluge of drunken drivers wasn't enough for police to handle, winds blew snow across roads, reducing visibility and adding to the already icy conditions, especially south and east of Twin Falls.

Even police cruisers were having trouble staying on U.S. Highway 93 between Twin Falls and Jackpot. The Idaho State Police was discouraging travel in that direction.

Twin Falls County sheriff's dispatcher Paula Gietzen said officials in Jackpot warned against traveling there "unless you've got chains and a lot of time."

Many east-west secondary roads in southern Twin Falls County were drifting with snow. Chains were recommended for anyone trying to reach the Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport.

Conditions weren't much better to the east, the ISP reported. Interstate 84 from the Henry's Fork area to its junction with Interstate 86 was littered with cars and trucks that had slid off the road or rolled over, a dispatcher said.

There had been no serious injuries reported by early Thursday afternoon, but officials were bracing for the worst as New Year's Eve traffic began to pick up.

"I want everybody to stay home tonight," Gietzen said.

Environmentalists will have work cut out for them in '93

LEWISTON — Some environmentalists fear the Idaho Legislature's 1993 session will pass measures to weaken federal and state environmental controls.

"I think we're going to be playing a lot of defensive battles in protecting the environment," said Mike Matheson, Ketchum public lands director for the Idaho Conservation League.

"It's hard to predict what kind of crazy ideas might come out of this Legislature," he said. "I hope reason will prevail, but I have no great expectations."

Finance reports for state campaigns show Idaho's four largest timber industry contributors spent more than \$91,000 on Republicans, who won big majorities in the Idaho House and Senate.

Only \$15,500 went to Democrats, and much of that was spent in Democratic primaries pitting pro-industry candidates against others more environmentally oriented.

Campaign financial forms completed through the Dec. 2 reporting deadline show Timber PAC, Polatch Corp., Boise Cascade Corp. and Plum Creek Timber Co. collectively spent \$121,498 on Idaho campaigns. That includes \$7,400 to Idahoans Against 1 Percent, \$7,000 to the Idaho Business PAC, \$91,398 to Republicans, including \$34,425 to state and local GOP organizations, and \$15,500 to Democrats, including \$1,200 to party organizations.



A year of epic events

Water, drought, death not divine news, but it tops our '92 list

TWIN FALLS — 1992 was a year christened in blood, baptized in fire and embroiled in controversy over water.

The year began with the death of 2-year-old Amanda Hostetler in Twin Falls, a death that stunned a community and raised questions about how well our children are protected.

Unfortunately, hers was not the only death to appear in the headlines. Magic Valley law enforcement investigated seven illegal killings in 1992.

Fire brought national attention to the Wood River Valley when lightning fires took not only a sixth consecutive drought year to blacken thousands of acres and scorch several homes.

While the lack of water dominated the news, battles over what to do with what little remains also raged.

Private citizens, utilities, environmental groups and government agencies continue to squabble over how best to protect endangered salmon runs, clean up the Snake River and provide for future energy needs while protecting existing water rights.

Voters made news in 1992 as well, turning out in record numbers to elect a new senator and show their support for

decided legislative push. Local elections changed the face of law enforcement in many counties for years to come, as four new sheriffs were elected along with a handful of new county commissioners.

In state issues that will have local impact, Gov. Cecil Andrus appeared to win a few rounds in his ongoing battle with the federal Department of Energy over storage of nuclear waste at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The governor also grabbed local headlines in April when he offered his proposal for a new Air

Festival of Trees falls 10% short of '91 fund-raising mark

TWIN FALLS — Festival of Trees, the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center Foundation's major annual fund-raising event, took in about 10 percent less than last year, Director Larry Baxter said Thursday.

The festival, which sells donated, decorated Christmas trees to benefit the Southern Idaho Regional Cancer Center, earned about \$65,000 during the

Dec. 3-6 event. Baxter estimated that was 80 to 85 percent of the final figure, since some support comes from foundation grants, which have not been counted yet.

Last year the event raised \$80,000, and after the bills were paid, earned about \$55,000 for the foundation's programs.

"We'll have enough money to pay the bills and to support the QRUs and the center center," Baxter said. Attendance at the festival, which was held in the old Mode building in the Blue-Lakes Shopping Center, was down from about 13,000 last year to 11,000 this year.

"We didn't do as well as last year, but I'm very confident, very happy about this year's event," Baxter said.

Baxter said cold weather was probably the biggest reason for the drop in attendance.

"We sold everything, and the festival was a success, so I'm happy," said Donna Wuthrich, co-chairwoman of this year's festival. "United Way of Magic Valley also fell short of its goal, raising about one-third less than it did last year, but Wuthrich said she didn't know if there was a

connection.

"I don't like to compare," she said. "I'm satisfied if we had items left over I'd feel differently, but we didn't."

The festival had about 40 trees donated this year, about one-third fewer than in 1991, but Wuthrich said that wasn't as significant a factor as it seems. "We had a lot of decorated items donated that we sold, including a playhouse," she said. "To me the quality of the trees is more important than the quantity, and we had some very nice trees this year."

Tax reductions available to hundreds

JEROME — Property tax reductions are available to hundreds of Jerome County residents who in the past have failed to take advantage of the tax break.

About 460 property owners received tax reductions last year under the Circuit Breaker program. Deputy County Assessor Bonnie Tolman said.

"But there are many, many

more who are eligible but just don't come in and apply for the program," Tolman said.

The state pays the county the amount of the tax reduction allotted to eligible taxpayers.

Property owners who may qualify for tax reductions must meet the following requirements:

- Owned and resided in Jerome County home through 1992.
- Household income was \$16,510 or less in 1992 after deducting non-reimbursed

medical expenses.

The property owner also must qualify under one or more of the following categories as of Jan. 1, 1993:

- Age 65 or older.
- A widow or widower.
- A veteran with at least 10 percent service-connected disability.
- A person receiving a VA pension for a non-service-connected disability.
- Disabled as recognized by Social Security Administration.
- Blind.

An orphan under age 18.

Former prisoner of war or hostage.

Applicants can apply for the program between Jan. 1 and April 15 at the Jerome County Assessor's office in the courthouse. Information can be obtained by calling 324-7507.

Those eligible for the Circuit Breaker Program can also receive a 50 percent reduction in the landfill fee included on tax bills.

Force training range in Owyhee County. The battle over how much air space the Air Force needs and how much it will get over the pristine and biologically sensitive Owyhee Desert promises to be one of 1993's big stories.

The year's final week brought the Magic Valley's biggest snowstorm in years — a hopeful sign that 1992 may someday be known as the last year of the drought.

Here is a look back at the stories and issues that shaped 1992:

Murder

Descriptions of a 2-year-old child's bruised body lying dead in a hospital emergency room inflamed the community, which demanded answers to who had done it and how it happened.

Nearly a year has gone by since Amanda Hostetter's death, and the answers to those questions still remain unclear.

A jury found her mother, the boyfriend, "Budd" Stradley, innocent of murder in the case on Dec. 10. Amanda's mother, Jodie Hostetter, denies claims by many that she abused her child. She faces

three to nine years in prison for a felony child abuse count, but remains free while she appeals that sentence.

Rupert pawnbroker Randy Walker died on the sidewalk in front of his pawnshop April 13 after being stabbed several times. Jerry Fino, 18, awaits a February murder trial.

On May 22, a 33-year-old California driver died after being thrown from a freight train near Kinama in southeastern Lincoln County.

Another homicide, Kevin Atkinson, 38, of Pocatello, has been charged with killing Samuel W. Thurmond and is set to stand trial March 22.

On June 8, Juan Ramos, a 21-year-old Mini-Cassia farmworker, was shot and killed outside a bar in Burley.

A 17-year-old illegal immigrant, Abel Larios, pleaded guilty to voluntary manslaughter and was sentenced to eight to 16 years in prison.

On June 22, the dismembered body of 61-year-old Benito Ruiz-Carabeo of Burley was found stuffed into garbage bags and dumped in rural Lincoln County.

Cassia County authorities believe two brothers who lived with Carabeo

may have killed him. The suspects are missing and are believed to have fled to Mexico.

On Aug. 31, the body of Sacramento Aquilar, 46, was found beside a road in eastern Gooding County. Jeffrey Thomas, 21, of Gooding County is charged with murder, but denies shooting Aquilar. A trial is set for April 6.

Drought

The Magic Valley endured its sixth straight year of below-normal water levels.

The irrigation canals that supply water to farmers and ranchers were shut off earlier than usual, and ditch riders released water on a rotating basis.

In spite of that, Idaho farmers produced the state's second-largest potato crop ever.

The end-of-1992 brought hope with the Magic Valley's biggest snowstorm in years. More than six inches of the white stuff blanketed the central valley on Dec. 29.

More importantly, total snowpack in the South Hills is at 143 percent of normal and snow levels in the critical upper Snake River drainages are near-normal.

Thus, 1992 ended much the way it began — for farmers who hope their prayers will be answered in the form of more moisture in 1993.

Fire

On Aug. 6, the hills around Hatley and Bellevue exploded in flame as lightning touched off fires in the boggy grass and timber.

The R-6 Fire and its brethren scorched 20,000-plus acres and destroyed several homes and buildings before being brought under control.

As soon as the ground had cooled, public lands officials began efforts to seed the barren hillsides.

Water

There were plenty of major water issues — in addition to the lack of it — to choose from in 1992. The plight of the Snake River was one of the most vivid.

On June 26, when the Andrus took a boat ride near Thousand Springs to get a first-hand look.

But his tour was cut short when a pipe bursting on the riverbank pumped into the river by agriculture and other users, clogged the intakes on the Governor's boat.

A year-long study of the Snake River between Milner Dam and King Hill was released in March by the University of Idaho's research and extension center.

The report, which described the poor health of the Magic Valley's "working river," sparked discussions among citizens, business government and environmental groups about how to clean up the Snake.

The study confirmed that agriculture is the biggest contributor of nutrients and sediment to the river.

In May, the Idaho Department of Water Resources announced a moratorium on most new water-use permits in southern Idaho.

The move was spurred by the drought and pressure by water users who say development of surface and groundwater is affecting existing uses.

The new businesses cropping up like mushrooms on Blue Lakes Boulevard North were the most obvious sign of that economic growth. Two new hotels, a discount store, car dealerships moving from downtown and the promise of more development further transformed the REXBURG commercial corridor.

The arrival of Wal-Mart and a new Kmart store in Burley signaled the beginning of a discount store war there.

Drugs

The drug war's big guns seemed somewhat muffled after suffering a major defeat early in the year.

Charges against 28 of 39 Twin Falls County residents indicted by a grand jury in 1992 were dropped by District Judge Daniel Hurlbut in May.

Hurlbut ruled that deputy prosecutor Frank Nichols "misused the grand jury process." Two more indictments were later dismissed.

County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter re-filed most of the dismissed cases, and many of the defendants pleaded guilty. Some of those cases are still pending, Baxter said.

Nichols, on special assignment to the Magic Valley Drug Task Force, left after turning for his position run out in August.

Although Cisneros was captured in 11 months later, troubles for Gold continued to mount, and he lost to independent Police Chief George Silver in the November election.

In Twin Falls County, the sheriff's race was more amiable — at least on the surface — but hotly contested. Four men vied to replace Sheriff Jim Munn, who is retiring after 13 years in office.

Courthouse security chief Wayne Toutsley, an independent, edged Republican Cal Edwards by just 398 votes.

Rupert police chief Paul Eries opened an investigation into the Jan. 10 shooting of Sheriff Judge County's Robert Aja.

In Hagerman, Mayor Jim Martin survived a recall attempt, but three city council members in Ketchum were not so fortunate.

Spurred by the firing of popular police chief Cal Nevada, voters ousted Pam Ritzen, Ed Simon and Larry Young by narrow margins.

Sports

The biggest sports news of the year was old but as the College of Southern Idaho men's basketball team brought home a third trophy from the national tournament. The Golden Eagles ended 1992 with a 15-0 record and a number two national ranking.

Odds and ends

A bull moose wandered into Twin Falls on Sept. 17 and led Idaho Department of Fish and Game officers on a merry chase. Efforts to down the moose with tranquilizers failed, and he killed a couple of days later when hit by a car.

December saw two plane crashes in less than a week: On Dec. 11 a Ketchum pilot returning in his steamer from Miami, Fla., went down in heavy fog just east of the Twin Falls airport. He walked away with minor injuries.

Six days later, a Navy "Top Gun" pilot from San Diego died when his F-16 fighter jet crashed into the desert seven miles southwest of the airport during a routine training mission.

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Idaho Traffic deaths decline

BOISE (AP) — Idaho could enjoy a 9 percent drop in traffic fatalities from 1991 to 1992, but that trend may end if the state's population explodes without a subsequent increase in highway patrolmen, state officials say.

Idaho's fatalities for the year stood at 240 on Thursday morning, down about 9 percent from 263 in 1991, said Marie Bishop, highway safety manager for the Idaho Department of Transportation.

That also was lower than the 244 deaths in 1990, but an increase from 238 the year before. The highest numbers in recent history were 331 in 1980 and 293 in 1981. Transportation will continue to study the aspects of each death and publish its findings later in 1993, she said.

"We're encouraged by the reduced fatalities," said Col. Ron Moore, deputy director of the Department of Law Enforcement. "People aren't drinking and driving quite as much and the overall seat belt is up," he said. "There seems to be a little societal change."

The Idaho State Police visited 26,000 school children from kindergarten to six-grade in 1992, teaching them to encourage their parents to drive safely.

Moore said there still are plenty of people drinking and driving in Idaho. To combat intoxicated drivers on New Year's Eve, every available trooper would be on the highways.

Although the icy roads may reduce the number of fatalities because many collisions are at slow speeds, Moore said statistics have shown half or more of all the deaths occurred in vehicles traveling under 35 mph.

Three of the six deaths over the Christmas weekend involved icy roads.

Women typically play lottery

MOSCOW (AP) — The typical Idaho lottery player is a woman between the ages of 25 and 44, with a middle income range who has not graduated from college, a University of Idaho economist says.

She may also spend time at home watching game shows and soap operas, often visits the grocery store and buys a \$1 lottery ticket on impulse.

Whether those impulsive players tend to be impulsive shoppers is the topic of a study by UI economics associate professor Linda Morris. Although her findings could have huge implications for marketing the lottery in this state, the Idaho Lottery Commission is not footing the bill.

The National Science Foundation is funding the project. Risk-taking behavior is an area the foundation is interested in.

In the early stages of the project, Morris received a \$17,000 foundation-planning grant in August, 1991. She will write an in-depth proposal for a larger, two-year grant in the months ahead. That study could begin in September.

Based on data from the Lottery Commission, the profile of Idaho players parallels those found in other states with one exception: more women play the Idaho lottery than men.

According to national statistics, more men play. And they tend to choose games with big stakes, like the multimillion-dollar Powerball. Women tend to stick to the lower-stakes games like the instant scratch-off games.

Manager of state office suspended

ST. MARIES (AP) — The manager of the state Department of Employment office in St. Maries has been suspended for 30 days pending a personnel investigation. Department spokeswoman confirmed on Wednesday that Morris Bentley, manager of the four-person office since June 1985, was suspended Dec. 22. He has worked for the department since 1978.

Because it was a personnel issue, no further information can be released, Employment. Department spokeswoman Eileen Cavanaugh Bruce said. She said the suspension was not a disciplinary action, but she would not elaborate.

Bentley could not be reached for comment Wednesday.

Andrus, Babbitt to meet

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus said he expects to meet next week with Bruce Babbitt, President-elect Clinton's choice for Interior secretary.

The governor also said Wednesday that he has been in touch with the office of Commerce Secretary-designate Ron Brown to discuss who will head the National Marine Fisheries Service in the Clinton administration.

Andrus, Interior secretary under President Jimmy Carter, said he plans to have a wide-ranging discussion with Babbitt, the former Democratic governor of Arizona who ran unsuccessfully for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1988.

"Bruce and I have known each other a long time," Andrus said. "He called me and said he'd like to visit with me."

Although Andrus said the meeting would take place next week, one of his aides said it might be in mid-January because of previous commitments.

Among the issues Andrus said he would discuss with Babbitt is the U.S. Fish-and-Wildlife Service, which is largely responsible for implementing the Endangered Species Act.

Bonner burned All-Pac 10 cornerback Keshion Johnson on both of his scoring plays. A beaten Johnson fell down





Texas A&M could be first 13-0 team without title

DALLAS (AP) — Imagine going 13-0, beating Notre Dame in the Cotton Bowl and not winning a national championship. Impossible?

Not if you're from Texas A&M.

The fourth-ranked Aggies, 6-point underdogs despite their record, can become the first team to go 13-0 and not win the national championship.

The only team to win 13 games in a season were Nebraska in 1971 and Brigham Young in 1984, and they were both national champions.

They were the Sugar Bowl showdown between unbeaten No. 1 Miami and No. 2 Alabama will likely produce the national champion.

The Aggies would have to leapfrog Florida State if the third-ranked Seminoles

Cotton Bowl

defeat Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

A&M coach R.C. Slocum said the Aggies deserve national title consideration if they defeat the Fighting Irish, but he cautions it won't happen unless there's a million-to-one miracle.

"Notre Dame is a good enough challenge for us, and if we beat them and go 13-0, then we'll let the chips fall where they may," Slocum said. "I'm not going to lobby for it. I would just hope the voters would look at the job we've done."

Both Slocum and Notre Dame coach Lou Holtz have called for a game playoff to be played after the bowl.

If A&M wins the Cotton Bowl and goes

13-0 and doesn't win the national title, then they have every right in the world to complain," Holtz said. "There should be a championship game after the bowls."

Notre Dame linebacker Demetrius Dubose said: "If A&M beats us, they should be the national champions no matter what happens in the Sugar Bowl because of the tough schedule we've played. Of course, we plan on keeping that from happening."

The fifth-ranked Irish (9-1-1) came into their sixth Cotton Bowl under something of a cloud when Florida State was passed over by the selection committee.

The Cotton Bowl was criticized for not going along with the spirit of the new bowl coalition and matching the third-ranked team versus the fourth-ranked team.

"I understand we were not wanted here by

a lot of people, but we will play well and you can mark it down," Holtz said.

In last year's Sugar Bowl, there were complaints and jokes that the Fighting Irish didn't belong.

The running joke was: What's the difference between Cheerios and Notre Dame? Answer: Cheerios belong in a bowl.

Using the perceived slight as a motivator, Holtz and the Irish defeated Florida 39-28.

Holtz also has other motivators he can use to spoil A&M's bid for a perfect season.

A&M freshman quarterback Corey Pugh broke an oral commitment to attend Notre Dame, making Holtz furious.

"I'm going to win against the Fighting Irish on Jan. 1 and rammed," I'm sure coach

Holtz will have the defense coming after me. But it's not going to distract me from doing my job."

A&M and Notre Dame only had one common opponent, Bill Walsh's Stanford Cardinal.

The Aggies edged Stanford 10-7 in the Disneyland Classic to start the college football season with Jeff Granger at quarterback. Notre Dame lost to Stanford 33-16 in the fifth game of the season at South Bend.

The Irish rallied from that loss with six consecutive victories.

Rose Bowl: Huskies look for redemption

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Beaten by Washington State and Arizona in two of their final three regular-season games and hounded by off-field problems that mar their Rose Bowl preparations, the Washington Huskies will try to make it up to themselves on Friday.

The Huskies think they owe it to themselves to beat Michigan in the Rose Bowl in order to regain some of their lost respect.

"We need to win this game to show people that we can still win," outside linebacker Jaime Fields said. "It's a chance for us to show people we can still be a good team, especially with all this adversity."

After going 12-0 and winning the

USA Today-CNN coaches' national championship last season, the Huskies were jolted back to reality after a 22-game winning streak broke 16-3 at Arizona on Nov. 7. On Nov. 21, they were embarrassed by Washington State 42-23 in a snowstorm at Pullman, Wash., in their regular season finale.

The Huskies then were forced to go on the firing line to defend themselves as allegations surfaced that the Washington football program was out of control.

Washington's problems began with the Billy Joe Herbert loan case. Last season's Rose Bowl co-MVP quarterback was ruled ineligible for

obtaining \$50,000 in loans in violation of NCAA rules.

The Huskies' troubles snowballed. Former offensive linemen Dan Danieks and Danieks Smith was arrested on a charge of selling cocaine on the Washington campus.

In a blockbuster revelation, former Washington players, including one-time tailback Steve Weathersby, said they received thousands of dollars in cash and other benefits, including summer jobs requiring little or no work, from Huskies boosters Herb Mead and Jim Kenyon.

Dr. William Gerberding, Washington's president, ordered the hiring of the in-house, high-powered

investigative team of Mike Glazier and Rick Evrard to look into the Huskies' football program. Glazier and Evrard are former NCAA investigators.

"With that troubled background, coach Don James and his assistants have tried to prepare the Huskies for a New Year's Day game. It hasn't been easy, Fields admits.

"It was kind of hard because everything was coming down," Fields said. "But we did it. We hung together as a team and got ready to play Michigan."

"One of our senior starters for the No. 9 Huskies, Fields is one of the reasons why the Huskies (9-2) are favored by 2 points.

Colorado again faces rocket named Ismail

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — Kicking to the Rocket almost cost Colorado its national championship two years ago. Do the Buffaloes dare kick to the Rocket's little brother?

That Fiesta Bowl strategy likely will be determined by the condition of the turf at Sun Devil Stadium on New Year's Day — or by the whim of coach Bill McCartney.

Quincy Ismail, Syracuse's mercurial wide receiver and kick returner, poses coverage problems for any opponent. So did his brother, former Notre Dame standout Rughub "Rocket" Ismail.

When McCartney played Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl two years ago, the Buffs' kicking philosophy was "don't kick to the Rocket." But leading 10-9 with less than a minute remaining and facing a fourth down near midfield, Colorado punted to Ismail.

McCartney ordered the kick, reasoning that trying to angle a punt out of bounds might result in a short kick or a shank, giving the Irish good field position. Ismail sprinted 91 yards on the return for an apparent touchdown, but it was nullified by a clipping penalty, and

Orange Bowl: Cornhuskers scare no one

MIAMI (AP) — The Nebraska Cornhuskers are finding out how hard it can be to get respect when you've lost five consecutive bowl games.

"When you think of Nebraska, you think of Miami or Oklahoma or something like that," linebacker Travis Hill said. "We're not even given a chance to win."

The 11th-ranked Cornhuskers (9-2) have been facing an uphill battle as they prepare for their Orange Bowl meeting with No. 3 Florida State (10-1).

"We're supposed to lay down for them," Hill said. "Not even the press in Nebraska is giving us a chance to win."

The oddsmakers agree. They installed Florida State as a 10-plus-

point favorite after the bowl pairings were announced, and the line has fluctuated little as Friday night's game approaches.

Such is life for a team that's gone well within the Big Eight but has had off-the-field problems play for so long. Nebraska is making its 24th consecutive bowl appearance, but the Cornhuskers' last postseason victory was a 30-15 triumph over Louisiana State in the 1987 Sugar Bowl.

Nebraska has lost in its last three Orange Bowls, including a 22-0 shutout by Miami in the 1992 game.

That kind of track record has set the stage for some Florida State trash-talking aimed at the Cornhuskers.

Florida State linebacker Marvin

Jones went as far as likening himself to a shark and Nebraska's blood.

"They didn't even want to play us," Nebraska quarterback Tommie Frazier said. "They wanted to go to the Cotton Bowl and play Texas A&M. They're showing us they don't have any respect for us."

"At first, sure, we were disappointed not to get a shot at Texas A&M," Florida State fullback William Floyd said. "But we're over that and now we're excited and happy to be playing Nebraska."

Floyd suggested the Cornhuskers need to lighten up a little bit.

"I don't think they're loose enough to be around their opponent," he said.

Floyd said he and several teammates tried to get acquainted

with some of the Cornhuskers earlier this week. The Nebraska players they met seemed very uncomfortable and several wouldn't even look the Seminoles in the eyes during their visit, Floyd said.

"Football games is a football game, and a personal life is a personal life," he said. "You've got to know how to draw the line between them."

Nebraska linebacker Trev Alberts said the Cornhuskers' demeanor shouldn't be construed as meaning they're unfriendly.

Instead, Alberts said, it's their way of taking a serious attitude in their bid to break the postseason losing skid.

"We're here on business. We're not here to have fun," he said.

the relieved Buffs earned their first national championship.

Quincy Ismail, nicknamed "Missile," doesn't return punts, so that bit of history won't be repeated. But he is a dangerous kickoff returner, having logged five of the top 13 kickoff yardage games in SEC since history.

Citrus: 'Air Georgia' set to bomb Ohio St.

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — The tendency to concentrate on another star player may have hurt Georgia an advantage when the favored Bulldogs meet No. 15 Ohio State in the Florida Citrus Bowl on Friday.

Sophomore Eric Zeier has given the Bulldogs a dimension they didn't have for many of Vince Dooley's 25-year coaching career — a passing game.

Dooley's successor, Ray Goff, decided two years ago following a 4-7 season that the Bulldogs need to change their offense.

Zeier decided to be a part of the new "Air Georgia" when the coaching staff promised they would open up the offense.

As a freshman last season he passed for 1,984 yards and seven touchdowns after gaining the

starting berth halfway through the season.

"This season he passed for 2,248 yards and 12 scores, but was overshadowed by the Heisman Trophy bid of tailback Garrison Hearst.

Zeier ran for 1,547 yards and six touchdowns in a Southeastern Conference record with 21 touchdowns. He eventually finished third in the Heisman voting.

It's natural that the Buckeyes, a 4-point underdog, would have as their priority No. 1 trying to stop Zeier from Atlanta's Wayne McDuffie, a former assistant to Bobby Bowden at Florida State to run the new offense.

"His scheme appeared exciting to me," said Zeier, who had the advantage of going through spring practice with the Bulldogs before his first season.

Georgia still averages more yards on the ground than under 23 teams in the air (215), but the combination keeps defenses more honest than they were when Dooley's teams tried to run opponents into submission.

Zeier had only four passes intercepted as a freshman. He had 12 picked off this season.

He knows why.

"We're throwing the ball downfield a lot more," Zeier said. "You look at last year and you see lucky guys dropped balls for interceptions."

"This year we checked off a lot more," he said. "At the beginning of the season, three or four interceptions were the rest of it."

McDuffie is high on his young quarterback.

"The key to playing quarterback is simple," McDuffie said. "Throw to the open man. Eric does that. He just has such great vision."

Georgia (9-2) finished second in the SEC's Eastern Division. Ohio State (8-2-1) was the runner-up to Michigan in the Big Ten.

The 1 p.m. meeting Friday will be the first between the schools.

Ohio State has lost three bowls in a row since stopping Texas A&M 28-12 in the Cotton Bowl in 1987.

Like Georgia, the Buckeyes also have a history of living with the running game.

Robert Smith, slowed by a cracked rib and sprained left ankle during the season, averaged 5.8 yards per carry while leading the Buckeyes with 707 yards.

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — Concentration, focus, intensity. Those are the characteristics Tom Coughlin credits for his success and they're the elements the Boston College coach is stressing to his players as they prepare for Friday's Hall of Fame Bowl against Tennessee.

Coughlin said he talked to the team about the leading candidate to replace the fired Ray Handley as coach of the New York Giants, telling them to focus on the bowl game and to ignore everything else.

Suns have makings of champion team

PHOENIX (AP) — Charles Barkley has a new zest for the game. Kevin Johnson is healthy again and the Phoenix Suns are close to becoming the team Barkley envisioned when he was asked to trade to a contender.

"The biggest difference, I think, is that this team is a lot hungrier than any of the ones I was with in Philly," Barkley said after the Suns scored 78 second-half points Wednesday night in a 135-110 win over Houston.

"I got to the Sixers after they had done it all," Barkley added. "There just wasn't much else to accomplish. But this team hasn't won it and we want it real bad."

An NBA title is nearly the only honor which has eluded Barkley, a six-time All-Star and the top scorer for the Dream Team at the Barcelona Olympics.

After Phoenix acquired him, Barkley said he no longer cared about personal goals.

So far, however, he's ahead of his career averages at 25.9 points, 13.4 rebounds and 4.8 assists a game, and the Suns (21-4) have won 14 in a row.

The streak lasted all of December and tied Phoenix with the 1971 Los Angeles Lakers for the third-best monthly record ever. The Lakers were 14-0 in November 1991 and went 16-0 the next month.

Boston's 15-0 in December 1959 is the second-best record for a month.

The Suns hit season highs in points, steals (16) and assists (36) in Johnson's third game back from a groin pull and outperformed the taller Rockets 48-43.

Barkley, Johnson and Dan Majerle each scored 21 points. Barkley also had 17 rebounds and 10 assists, his 13th career triple-double and second this season.

Perhaps more to the point, the talent surrounding the best player in the league is so good that the Suns are generating more offense in less time, a sort of nuclear reaction in hoops.

Ex-Washington GM revitalizes Chargers

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Three years after taking over as general manager, Bobby Beathard has left his mark on the San Diego Chargers. Based on Beathard's past, that could mean a Super Bowl in San Diego's future.

First, though, Beathard has to get the "Smartest Man in the NFL" label that was stuck on him while he was GM at Washington and the Redskins were playing in three Super Bowls in the 1980s.

"It's pretty embarrassing," Beathard said as the Chargers prepare for their first playoff game in 10 seasons.

"To stick that label on anyone is not fair."

Beathard almost felt more comfortable when he was down at the other end of it. "Beathard said, referring to last year's 4-12 record, 'You hate to lose, but the only good thing is that it'll go away fast.'"

Headlines the man who hired Beathard struggle to find another description.

"How can I go against that?" owner Alex Spanos said. "My God, look at what he's done in three years. People will tell you that I'm impatient. I expected it in less than three years, but it's better now than later."

Of the 47 players on the active roster who will face the Kansas City Chiefs on Saturday, only 14 were here when Beathard took over on Jan. 3, 1990.

Beathard is the fourth Chargers GM since Spanos bought majority interest in the team in 1984. What Beathard inherited was a team in shreds. The Chargers had just completed their second straight 6-10 season and hadn't been to the playoffs since 1982.

Beathard said the team had to get rid of problem players, players who weren't committed to winning, and players who simply weren't good enough.

"It's not anything you can do overnight," he said. "We almost had to get worse before we got better."

They did, by going 6-10 yet again in 1990 and bottoming-out last season.

The holdover players are a fine bunch, including Pro Bowlers Leslie O'Neal, Gill Byrd and Anthony Miller.

But Beathard has scoured the NFL free agent ranks, picking up players like all-purpose back Ken Riggins, left tackle Harry Swane, punter John Kidd, kicker John Carney and safety Darren Carrington.

Beathard has also made some draft picks at Washington, he's kept a few here, taking linebacker Junior Seau in his first draft and adding free safety Stanley Richard in his second. With the sixth pick in 1990, he took quarterback John Friesz.

But two moves Beathard made this year helped and San Diego's decade of decline. On Jan. 2, he hired head coach Bobby Ross from Georgia Tech to replace the fired Dan Henning. On Aug. 13, he sent a third-round pick to Washington for Sean Humphries to replace Friesz, whose left knee was blown out in the exhibition opener.

After a 0-1 start while Humphries learned the system, the Chargers won 11 of 12 games to claim the AFC West championship.

Beathard likes to compare Ross' situation to that of Joe Gibbs, whom he hired at Washington as head coach in 1981.

Reds' Schott asks for time to respond

CINCINNATI (AP) — Cincinnati Reds owner Marge Schott has asked baseball to give her until Jan. 25 to respond to preliminary findings in the same investigation of alleged racial slurs, her lawyer said Thursday.

Robert Bennett said he received the report just before Christmas. He said it appeared to be a preliminary report that could be further modified.

He declined to discuss its contents.

"We've asked for until Jan. 25 to respond, which is an eminently reasonable request, given Christmas and the Reds are closed," Bennett said. "But I know they're anxious as we are to amicably resolve this thing."

Bennett would not comment on a possible settlement on predict when baseball would make an announcement on its findings.

"I can't be discussing in the press what my negotiations are or what I hope they will be," he said.

Baseball's ruling 14-member executive council is meeting in Cincinnati. The four-man committee appointed Dec. 1 to investigate Schott's alleged use of slurs.

Baseball's owners are to meet Jan. 11-13 in suburban Dallas.

Several civil rights leaders have demanded that she quit or be ousted from baseball for her alleged remarks.

The Rev. Jesse Jackson plans to meet with baseball's owners Jan. 12. Jackson spokesman Frank Watkins said, Jackson organized a protest Dec. 7 at baseball's winter meetings in Louisville, Ky. to accuse the game's owners of racism for not promoting many blacks into its executive ranks.

Jackson is threatening to organize pickets at selected ballparks for baseball's season opener in April unless he sees progress by then.

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Bowl picks: No. 2 Alabama will fade before powerful Hurricanes

Alabama fans, take heart. Sure, Miami is No. 1, has a 29-game winning streak and is gunning for its second straight national championship, third in four years and fifth in the last decade.

But remember this: The last four times No. 1 has played No. 2 in a bowl game, No. 2 has won. And the trend started when No. 2 Alabama beat No. 1 Penn State 14-7 in the 1970 Sugar Bowl.

Yes, the same Sugar Bowl and same Superdome where No. 2 Alabama (12-0) will play No. 1 Miami (11-0) on New Year's night.

In 1979, Alabama needed an incredible game plan to get to the fourth quarter to beat Penn State. The Crimson Tide will need another tremendous defensive effort to defeat Miami, which is trying to become the first team with consecutive national championships since Alabama in 1957-59.

Both teams have great defenses, so should be a low-scoring game. Alabama led the nation in rushing and total defense, and was No. 2 in points allowed and pass defense. Miami was third in points allowed, fifth against the pass and eighth in rushing and total defense.

"Both defenses have great talent, but they use different systems," said Miami quarterback Gino Torretta, who is trying to become the first Heisman Trophy winner since Pittsburgh's Terry Bradshaw in 1973 to win the national championship.

"They do more guessing than we do." The guess here is that Miami will wear down Alabama, score three touchdowns and complete the greatest 10-year run in college football history.

The Hurricanes have a mediocre ground game, but average 310 yards through the air. And Torretta, who has 10 touchdowns and the power to lead pass rush of Alabama's All-American defensive ends, Eric Cur-

ry and John Copeland. Alabama's offensive strength is running the ball, but the Tide won't be able to do it consistently against Miami. That will force them to pass more than usual, playing into the hands of Miami's talented linemen and secondary.

After close calls against Arizona, Florida State and Penn State early in the season, the Hurricanes have found their stride. They've averaged 501 yards and 42 points in their last 10 games—all one victories, except for a 16-10 victory over sixth-ranked Syracuse.

In contrast, Alabama has struggled in two of its last three games, giving up a season-high 21 points to Mississippi State and Florida. The Gators had the Tide on the ropes in the Southeastern Conference championship game until Antonio Langham came to the rescue with a 27-yard interception return.

There will be no such miracle against the Hurricanes, who are 8-point favorites vs. Miami 21-10.

Seniors provide love to premature infants

A wince face scrunches in woe. Sobs start slowly, soft hiccupps of distress escalating into wails of despair.

Mothers worldwide recognize the signal to cuddle, to touch, to rock, to hold.

For fragile babies born prematurely or with serious medical problems, volunteers at Children's Hospital of Orange County, Calif., open their arms to provide these physical sensations of love when natural mothers aren't around.

"We're the extra arms for mother when mother can't be there," said Marilyn Williams, 65.

"So many of these mothers have to work, take care of other children or their husbands; they just can't be here all the time."

"We try to fill the gap," Williams settled into the upholstered blue rocking chair by an infant and took a turn settling Samuel Garrison, 6 days old, who relaxed the tiny fist scrunched toward his blue stocking cap.

In another nursery, Judy Young, 48, looked at a sleeping baby who had not left the hospital.

"Since premature babies are usually kept until around the time of their normal delivery, some of our babies can be here for quite awhile," said Catherine Keohane, social worker at the hospital. "This rocking and touching is an important human experience for them."

It's important for the "cuddlers," too. Most of them are the age of older women with grown children or grandchildren.

Williams, a retired teacher, mother of six and grandmother of 11, has been cuddling for two years.

Before attending to Samuel, she had rocked a little girl for almost two hours while the child slept peacefully. "She was cranky before I picked her up, then she fell asleep in my arms. I didn't want to move her,"

Williams said. "Besides, I was enjoying it."

More than 40 people have entered the Cuddler Program since the hospital began it two years ago. Requirements go beyond empty arms and an inborn parenting instinct, said Paula G. Smith, director of the hospital volunteer center.

Cuddlers also must be part of the hospital's volunteer program for at least six months.

They also must complete a four-to-five-hour orientation class designed to lay out ground rules and teach techniques such as how to pick up a baby from an incubator when the infant is attached to medical equipment.

"For Young, a hospital X-ray technician before she married and had her own family, cuddling the hospital infants is fulfilling a commitment made years ago.

"I always said when I had time to volunteer, I would come back to a children's hospital," she said. "The mood is always upbeat. Children are so wonderful."

Keohane selects infants for the Cuddler Program who need the comfort of extra human contact.

Holding, rocking, talking and singing to infants enables them to develop sensory skills of tracking voices, objects and faces, she said. Researchers say warmth and nurturing are critical to a child's development.

"Nurses just can't take the time to do this type of cuddling," Keohane said. "That's why these volunteers are so important."

More than 350 critically ill newborns are treated at the hospital each year.

Each baby has its own preferred "cuddle routine," Williams said. "Some want to be rocked, some patted. Sometimes we walk with the baby. Sometimes it's a combination of rocking, cooing and patting."

In one of her last television movies, she played a schoolteacher who persuaded several students to kill her husband in "Murder in New Hampshire: The Pamela Smart Story."

"In the Company of Darkness," Hunt's character obtains a job in a fast food place, working beside the suspect who immediately latches on to her. She learns that, like herself,

he comes from a dysfunctional family. Her mother was an alcoholic forcing her to become a surrogate mother.

"If he'd been simply the stereotypical evil person, she would have said, 'Oh, he's evil.' But he played it almost like a child who was wired wrong," Hunt said. "That allowed her to be off guard and be sucked in by him." Weber combed his hair for

ward to achieve an appearance like a demented elf.

"Sometimes, he'd run his hands through his hair and pull it back, and I'd say, 'Oh, you are a handsome guy,'" Hunt said. "I'd be there in my greasy braun hair and have a bra strap showing."

To take a break during the filming in Chicago, the two appeared together in something altogether different.

"Steven and I went one night to Second City," she said. "They put us on stage and we improvised. We went back many times after that. They were so incredibly generous in letting us work with them."

"It was a wonderful way for us to blow our minds at the end of the day, we could get rid of all that evil and darkness. In so many TV movies,

I'm in every scene. It's exhausting mentally. It was good to get back to improvising. I'd spent 10 years studying improvisation and had rarely had an opportunity to practice it."

Hunt literally grew up studying

acting and doing childhood roles. Her father is Gordon Hunt, an acting teacher and theatrical director. Her uncle, Peter Hunt, won a Tony for directing "1776" on Broadway and directed television productions. She appeared in four series as a child.

"I was never a big success as a child actor, so it wasn't that hard for me to make the transition to adult roles," she said in her dressing room trailer during a break from "Mad About You." "Sometimes, I didn't get a role because they thought I seemed too old. It actually got easier for me as I got older. And sometimes I'd take myself off the market and study."

Hunt said she had not been planning to do a series when she became involved in "Mad About You." She met Reiser because she had been sharing a home with Elizabeth Berkley ("Amadeus," NBC's "The Powers That Be"), who was a friend of Reiser's wife.

"Paul called me and said he had a script he'd like to send me," she said.

"I read it and met with him and said what I would want her to be in the show. Luckily, that's what Paul and producer Danny Jacobs wanted. I liked the idea that the humor would come from putting a magnifying glass on a marriage, and not because of a lot of wacky characters running around."

'Major Dad's' Archer shows women, Marines a successful combination

LOS ANGELES — Beverly Archer chose what some might call an unusual role model for an actress when it came to creating her character on CBS' "Major Dad."

"I took it from John Wayne," she says. "He's the only Marine I can remember."

"She's the best Marine on the base," Archer says of Gunnery Sgt. Bricker. "I think the dating line between her and the other guys is the best. But the personal stuff is fun to play. She has a wild sex life. But the crux is that she's incredibly efficient as administrative chief of the commanding general's office."

The idea of a tough, non-sensually assertive Marine who happens to be female came from Rick Hawkins, an executive producer of "Major Dad," Archer said.

"When Rick mentioned it to the Marines while training, the show

they fell on the floor laughing." "Both aspects of her character are very male."

The series stars Gerald McRaney in the title role as Maj. John D. McGillis, Shanna Reed as his wife, Polly, and Marisa Ryan, Nicole Dubuc and Chelsea Herford as Polly's three daughters.

The role as a gunnery sergeant is the first character with overt romantic involvement for Archer, who is noted for her prissy, schoolmarm-type roles in such recent TV shows as "Nurses" and "The Show." "We've Got Each Other," "Spencer" and "Mama's Family."

Archer says Gunn has a "macho-style feminine side." "She treats relationships the way a man would," she said. "It's solemn, ban, thank you ma'am. It's the stereotype of the Marine with a girl in every port, which is difficult to carry off in a sitcom. She had a 28-year-old boyfriend, but he mentioned the 'L' word as soon as he said he loved her, she could not deal with it."

Archer joined "Major Dad" in its second year.

"The role was handed to me, a platter by Rick Hawkins, she said. "He'd produced 'Mama's Family' during three of the four years I was in it."

"He had a very clear concept of Gunny. He sent me a two-page character analysis that had me on the floor. What interested me was that she was 180 degrees from both of 'Mama's Family.' Not to disparage people, but it was very perceptive of him to realize I could play a different character."

Archer knows her way around scripts. She wrote for such shows as "Mama's Family," "All in the Family," "Working Girl," and was story editor on the latter.

"I started writing because I figured out 'Mama's Family' I'd never work again," she said. "Which is, what, every actor thinks. I have a half-baked theory that every actor should try writing. Then maybe we'd all stop bitching, saying, 'My character would have been...'"

'Going to Extremes' producers buck the trends

LOS ANGELES — In television, where "go with the flow" is an industry axiom, producer-executives Josh Brand and John Falsey are swimming upstream. They've found a new spiky ground by ignoring, or at least subverting, what is known in networkpeak as the series "franchise."

"There are only a couple of franchises — cops, detectives, doctors, lawyers, and occasionally the family," Brand says.

"When we started 'Northern Exposure' we weren't really interested in doing a medical show.

"Our next show, 'Going to Extremes,' could as easily have been about Peace Corps workers, but making their medical students gave it an acceptable franchise."

"CBS' 'Northern Exposure,' which just won six Emmys, including best drama series, is a medical show in the way that 'Twin Peaks' was a cop show."

In addition, it's a comedy-massquerading as a drama because one-hour comedies simply aren't done on television.

"I think what's so wonderful about 'Northern Exposure' is that it is character-driven," Falsey says. "I think in the beginning 'CBS' was expecting more of a medical franchise.

They would have been happy if I had Fleischman jump into a helicopter to rescue a lumberjack who had fallen out of a tree. We got lucky because it aired in the summer and CBS wasn't paying that much attention."

ABC's "Going to Extremes" ostensibly is about students going to medical school on a Caribbean island. It's filmed in Jamaica, doing duty as the fictional island of Antigua. "Well, it's really about the clash between the First-World sensibilities of the students and the Third World culture of the islanders."

Brand and Falsey's third show, NBC's "Hill-Plains-Away," which appears to be a more conventional family show. Yet, it's set during the racial turmoil of the late 1950s and is told from the viewpoint of a black housekeeper working for a white family.

"When you present a drama series to a network they always want to know what's the franchise," Brand says. "What they mean by that is what is going to generate stories over four or five years? They understand if you say a medical school or a law school or a police station. For them stories aren't generated in character. They come from a profession."

"CBS is kind of overlooked."

"Northern Exposure" that first summer," Falsey says. "The critics looked at it and said, 'Wait a minute. This is good.' By the time CBS ordered the next episode the following spring there was enough trust in us for them to say, 'I guess they know what they're doing.'"

In episodic television, writing is everything, unlike motion pictures where the director rules. The writer who can deliver a good script on time, week after week, and pull in an audience, is much sought-after. Among the most powerful people in television are the writer-producers, such as Steven Bochco, Linda Porter-Thompson, Diane English, Norman Lear, Barry Kemp, Matt Williams and others.

Brand and Falsey met when they were story editors on "The White Shadow." They then became partners when they created "St. Elsewhere." They also created "A Year in the Life."

Both "Northern Exposure" and "Hill-Plains-Away" have received the Peabody Award, but Brand and Falsey won their first writing Emmy this year for the pilot for "Hill-Plains-Away."

"We don't find the franchise limiting," Brand says. "I think we've figured out how to use a franchise but not really make the show about that. I do think it's limiting for what the public gets to see on television."

Networks have certain attitudes about what works and what doesn't work, and to a large extent it's dictated by those franchises.

"I think after so many years the carpet's gotten pretty worn. Those traditional doctor-lawyer-cop shows have gotten a little tired. Shows should be about people. If you can shatter the network franchise, it will liberate everyone."

Falsey says some television critics have compared "Going to Extremes" to "Northern Exposure" and in some cases found wanting. They both see it as much closer in concept to "St. Elsewhere."

"It's very funny, the characters are offbeat, you have a wealth of cultures, but it's not a medical franchise," Falsey says. "It's not as character-driven. It has a story line that goes all the way through."

Both writers say they don't want to repeat themselves. That's why they recently tried a half-hour comedy called "Rise and Shine."

And that's why they will write, direct and produce a commercial for Coca-Cola and why they are getting into feature motion picture production.

Women mark behind-the-scenes milestone in sports broadcasting

CHICAGO — December marked the fifth anniversary of a milestone in the women's movement. A very small and personal milestone, but a milestone nonetheless.

It was on Dec. 20, 1987, at the Pontiac Silverdome that CBS Sports' Cathy Barreto became the first female to direct a National Football League game at the network television level. And while Barreto wasn't directing an NFL contest on her anniversary date, she was involved with a network football telecast — CBS' coverage of the NCAA Division I-AA title game.

Barreto took time to see other women moving into the behind-the-scenes network roles.

"It speaks for itself, but when the woman doing live network sports television... After the initial step for womankind, you'd like to get some company out there. There are some local cable centers that have women directing (SportsChannel's Lisa Seltzer is one), but nothing on the national level."

Barreto — a four-time Emmy Award winner (two as a direc-

tor), started her career at CBS Sports in 1970 like most women at the time — as a secretary. But after moving from secretary to broadcast associate to associate director — and with encouragement from longtime golf producer Frank Chirkinian and former executive producer Ted Shaker — Barreto, 41, landed in the director's chair.

"I went with Frank on the golf tour as a production coordinator, getting into the nitty-gritty of how stuff gets on the air," she says. "I picked my interest. I wasn't sure I wanted to get into producing, so I became a production assistant."

After leaving the road — and finding out she didn't want to produce — Barreto worked on "The NFL Today" for 10 years. "This really got me going more toward directing," she says. "I was Shaker who put me back on the road after 10 years, and I've been doing it ever since. I'm sure my knees were shaking (at that game five years ago). Now I just get excited."

And it was that excitement that led Barreto into directing. "During the event," she says, "the director has the say that makes the shots that entertain the people at home. I like the

control) a director has during the event. It's spontaneous. I like the instant chaos that the director controls."

In addition to her primary college football assignments, Barreto has directed coverage of the last five U.S. Open late-night shows and the last two women's Final Four contests. All a far leap from the secretarial pool.

There were no women (on the production side) in the early '70s," Barreto says. "We were just secretaries. Then I got an opportunity because Frank saw the interest I had. When the guys came back with film from the CBS Golf Classic to edit, I'd be in there editing. I'd be making notes, asking questions. (Chirkinian) saw something then. After that, I became more than a secretary."

Barreto would like to see more women on the production side of sports telecasts, but "I don't know if the interest is there. It's harder now, because there are fewer jobs out there. There's a line waiting to get into television. It's so hard. I tell women to go to the local level and get that experience, because it's much harder to get into the network."

Q. Many of us who watch "All My Children" wonder what happened to Natalie and why she left the show. A lot of us have stopped watching since she was replaced.

A. Kate Collins, who played Natalie, quit or was fired, but some sources believe she has been put forward. Melody Anderson, who replaced Collins, was a regular on "St. Elsewhere" and "L.A. and the Fair-Play."

Q. Who plays Stan Carpenter in "One Life to Live"? This is the second part he has played. I think it's Dick Cavett but my husband says "Nah." Could it be one of the Smothers Brothers? My husband says "Nah" to that too.

A. It's Rex Thomas, a soap opera veteran. He was Bill Brewer in "General Hospital," 1963-66; Alvy Crown in "G.L.I.T.C." in 1985. But he may be best known for his prime-time series "The Invaders," 1967-68. His other prime-time series: "The Long Hot Summer," "The Psychiatrist," "From Here to Eternity" and "Eaton, Cook, Cavett, by the way, was org. O.L.N.L." last spring as a radio personality known as "The Loud Bull."

Q. The guy who plays Dylan Lewis on "Living the Life of Marty Saybrooke" is Robert Englund, who plays Freddie Krueger? They have the same last name.

A. No, his bill he does have famous relatives. Morgan-Englund is the son of actresses, Charles and writer/producer George Englund. He studied acting in college in Colorado and at New York's Circle

in the Square and did theater, before he landed on "Light" in 1989.

Q. What is the background of Michael Nader of the "ABC daytime series" "All My Children"?

A. The veteran performer, who got into acting while attending Santa Monica City College, began his career in a light way, appearing in several teen party movies in the 1960s and on the original "Gidget" TV series (ABC, 1965-66). After starting at New York's Actors Studio and the Herbert Berghof Studio, he began to emphasize stage work, something he still does when he has time. Nader's time has been limited by the fact he became a father; however, having become a familiar TV face in "As the World Turns" (as Kevin Thompson, from 1976 to '78), "Bare Essence" (1983), and especially in ABC's prime-time series "Dynasty" (as Farnsworth Dexter, from 1983 to 1989), he has become a household name. "The Great Escape" and "Lucky" in addition to his character of Dimitri, playboy and sometimes love interest of Susan Lucci, on "All My Children."



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Responsibilities amaze Gumbel

NEW YORK—Greg Gumbel not only can do the work of three announcers, he will.

CBS Sports announced that Gumbel will replace Dick Stockton as its No. 2 baseball play-by-play man next season, then take over for Tim McCarver and Paula Zahn as prime time host of the 1994 Winter Olympics at Lillehammer, Norway.

"I'm so amazed at the kinds of responsibilities I'm given—and that same thinking people would trust those things to me," Gumbel said.

Gumbel, 46, co-host of CBS Sports' "NFL Today" show with Terry Bradshaw, will work as analyst-Jim Kaat on baseball.

I lived five blocks away from Griffith Stadium, in Washington, D.C., when my dad was going to law school," Gumbel said. "That's where I saw my first baseball game."

"It's one of the more difficult sports to do because the national interest in the event is as much as it does in basketball and football, but it's my No. 1 favorite, simply because I don't think there's any better 1-on-1 competition in sports than a batter against a pitcher."

CBS Sports president Neal Pilson said Sean McDonough and McCarver would continue as the network's lead broadcast team. Gumbel has done play-by-play for both the New York Yankees and Seattle Mariners, and has broadcast the College World Series for CBS.

CBS Sports senior vice president Rick Gentile said the decision did not reflect any dissatisfaction with Stockton, who has been CBS' No. 2 baseball announcer the past three years. "Dick will continue to be with CBS Sports in several

capacities, including the NFL, NCAA basketball and the Olympics," Gentile said. "We're talking with Dick right now about those roles. This was an opportunity for us to take advantage of Greg's versatility."

Pilson said Stockton would not have any part in CBS' baseball coverage, "and that's about all I can tell you on that." Gumbel will work solo as prime time Olympic host. Pilson said, "Last February, in Albertville, McCarver and Zahn as prime time co-hosts, and their work was roundly praised by critics."

"We were very satisfied with the job they did and felt as the Games went on, they got better," said Mike Pearl, CBS coordinating producer for the Olympics. "The role they obviously were experiencing for the first time. We just felt that this time, given the type of programming we have and our expectations from Albertville, it was better to go with a single host concept."

Gumbel was a co-anchor of CBS' weekday morning broadcast "Front Street Live" and Pilson said it was that work and his job on "NFL Today" that earned him the solo anchor position at Lillehammer. CBS will televise about 120 hours from Lillehammer, more than 50 of them in prime time.

Gumbel joined CBS in 1988 after working for CBS Sports' "Cavaliers Network" and ESPN. He still does play-by-play for selected local telecasts of the Cleveland Cavaliers and is a co-host with John Madden of CBS' "SportsCenter" halftime and pregame shows.

"I feel that I've been very fortunate since I came to CBS with the kinds of assignments I've received," Gumbel said. "My goal over the years has been to improve as a broadcaster, and one of the ways you do that is to do different things."

PBA hopes it rolls strike with king-of-hill challenges

DETROIT—Bowling fans will get two tournaments in one starting with ABC's second telecast of the winter tour.

In response to ABC's request last year for a format change that might add excitement and increase player recognition, the Professional Bowlers Association is adopting a king-of-the-hill challenge, match that will follow the title match for each tournament on the 16-week schedule.

"The winner of the season-opening tournament, the Jan. 9 AC-Delco Open in Torrance, Calif., will advance to the televised finals of the second tournament, the Phoenix Open. The Phoenix winner will meet the AC-Delco winner in the

king-of-the-hill challenge. As long as the king keeps winning, he keeps coming back the next week."

To accommodate the challenge match, only the top four players, rather than the traditional five, will advance to the televised finals, which will then take three matches rather than four to produce a tournament winner.

The impetus for the format change started last season with 30 different bowlers, many of them first-timers, fumble the show, making it difficult for ABC to build player recognition.

"We think this format will help create the recognition, plus add the excitement we're looking for, particularly if someone gets a streak going," said PBA commissioner Mike Connor. "The challenge match will pay

\$5,000 to the winner, but the PBA is looking at a bonus plan, probably through insurance, for repeat winners.

"We'd like to offer something that will add to the incentive," Connor said. "We thought of doubling the prize each week. If someone repeated until we realized that if the same person did win every week, he'd be shooting for \$40 million the last week. But we will have something appropriate."

Should the previous week's king of the hill win the next tournament, the most recent previous winner will be standing by to accept the AC-Delco champion is one of the four Phoenix Open finalists; the backup king of the hill will be Dave Ferraro, 1992 PBA player of the year, or Marc McDowell, 1992 earnings leader.

When he rejoined "Today" in 1990, the producers hoped it would stop the show's skid after Jane Pauley left. He quit in February 1992, saying he was tired of commuting from his Phoenix home.

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
