Baghdad makes some concessions

Baghdad promised Thursday to abide by two U.N. demands that prompted U.S.-led air strikes on southern Iraq, but the key issue of Iraq's "no-fly" zones remained unsettled. Pentagon officials said only one of the four targeted anti-missile batteries was knocked out in Wednesday's short, intense raids. They said the other three were disassembled and temporarily unusable. But U.S. officials said the mission was successful because a threat to allied planes enforcing the no-fly zones was curbed and

by anti-aircraft forces. There was no elaboration and the planes were not identified. A senior Pentagon official said there was no evidence of such an incident. He said there had been no radar illuminations, no missiles fired and no Iraqi aircraft in the no-fly zones. Baghdad quickly backed down Thursday on two issues: Deputy Premier Tariq Aziz said Iraq had eroded a ban on U.N. flights that prevented weapons inspectors from dismantling Iraq's weapons of mass destruction. Baghdad also promised to stop the raids into Kuwait to remove Iraqi material left

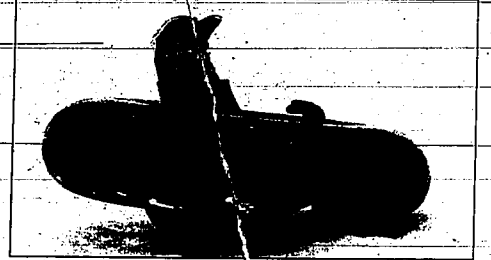
there after Iraqi forces were routed in the 1991 Persian Gulf War. U.N. diplomats said Iraq sent two letters to the Security Council expressing willingness to comply with the U.N. resolutions and asking permission to retrieve equipment from the border area with Kuwait. The United States and its allies cited Iraq's border incursions among the reasons for Wednesday's air strike in southern Iraq. The Pentagon said allied warplanes damaged the four Iraqi air defense sites they targeted and destroyed one mobile missile battery. The three other missile batteries were dismantled by the Iraqis.

Sexual harassment claim costs city \$76,000

TWIN FALLS — Settling a sexual harassment claim by four Twin Falls police-department dispatchers has cost the city more than \$76,000.

But more important than the money, the women say, is a change in city policy regarding harassment claims and an educational program to make sure other employees don't have to go through what they did.

"The city has agreed to provide effective, ongoing training for supervisors and other employees, including officers," the dis-

patchers' attorney, Mark Stubbs, said. "Everybody probably needs to be more aware of these issues," City Attorney Fritz Winderlich said.

Dispatchers Loretta Mullins, Gerlyn Soliz, Tami Louisa and Lori Holbert filed a claim against the city in October 1991. "If they go ahead with the policies and procedures and educate people, I think that will take care of the problem," Soliz said.

The city has contacted two people about conducting training seminars, Winderlich said.

The dispatchers say their working conditions have improved in recent months.

"It was a very confusing time," Soliz said. "But I think it was a lesson well learned."

Of patrolmen have really come around," Helber added.

Ernesto Larios, before filing the claim, the dispatchers say they were harassed by one of their supervisors at the time, Sgt. Ed DeVall.

DeVall denied the dispatchers' claims, which included touching, kissing, lewd and suggestive jokes and other behavior the women said was offensive.

When they complained to a superior officer, they were told to handle it themselves. Please see HARASS/A2

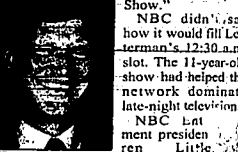
Letterman's coin flip sends lists, pet tricks to CBS

NEW YORK — David Letterman killed the suspense Thursday. He gleefully announced he's got a better gig, winking to his NBC "Late Night" audience that it came down to the flip of a coin. "Hens CBS... tails CBS."

The irascible talk-show host, whose "Stupid Pet Tricks" and Top 10 Lists are a staple of the wee hours, said his last NBC show would be June 25. He said he expected his first CBS show would air in August.

CBS announced later that it had signed him for an 11:30 p.m. EST talk show, smack against his old friend Jay Leno and



Letterman renouncing to report on Santa Monica, Calif., said only that the hour following "Tonight" would be a comedy show pro-

duced by Lorne Michaels, the "Saturday Night" producer. Littlefield said negotiations with Letterman came down to the wire, precluding NBC from making final plans to replace him.

Letterman's decision to leave NBC was fueled by public dissatisfaction with his boss, who had passed him over as successor to Johnny Carson, and a fervent belief by CBS.

Letterman is believed to have offered him \$16 million annually at NBC. He will be on \$16 million annually at CBS.

Letterman's conference with his new boss sidestepped questions about printing slyly and saying only: "I got enough for gum."

During the afternoon taping of his show Thursday, Letterman tipped his hand by starting with a joke about how he would be visiting outgoing President Bush to pick up any extra movie boxes. He then referred to lines in the NBC building lobby for "Late Night" ticketholders and said there would be an additional line "if you would like to host the show."

Then he announced his last show on NBC would be in June, and the audience groaned. "Do you really mean that, ladies and gentlemen?" he replied. "Well, what are you prepared to do to back it up?"

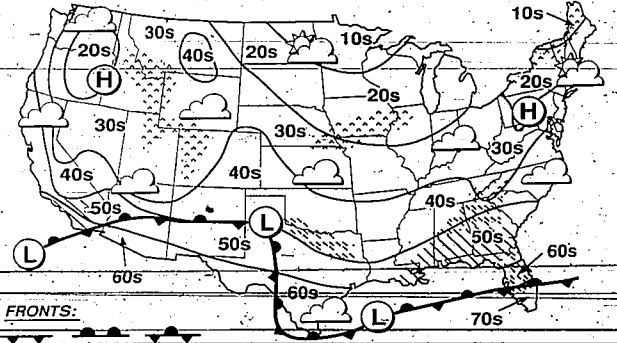

Lines separate high temperature zones for the day.



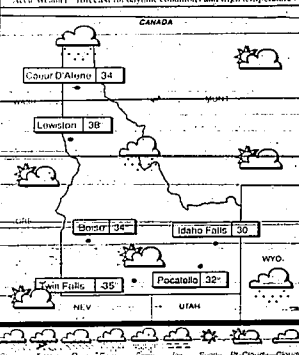

Rain, snow, even a tornado persist across West

A tornado touched down in Southern California on Thursday as rain and snow persisted across much of the West. Wintry conditions lingered in the Midwest and East.

A tornado touched down during the early morning hours in Buena Park, about 20 miles southeast of downtown Los Angeles. The twister downed trees, power lines and fences and blew out windows out of an automobile dealership.

A strong low pressure system off the Oregon coast continues to bring more rain and snow to the region. Eighteen inches of snow blanketed southern Mono County in California, causing several road closures.

Key roads caused hundreds of accidents in several states, including a 52-vehicle pileup in Utah. Utah police reported only two minor injuries.

Snow fell Thursday afternoon across parts of the northern and central Plateau and central and southern Rockies.

Heavy snow fell across parts of the northern Atlantic Coast states and New England, with up to 16 inches in New Hampshire and Maine. Snowfall totals across eastern New York state included 14 inches at Warrensburg.

School was canceled at Boston and many of its suburbs as well as areas of neighboring New Hampshire.

Light snow extended across the lower Great Lakes and Ohio Valley, and scattered areas of snow prevailed across parts of Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, Indiana and Ohio.

At least 13 school districts remained closed Thursday in Michigan, one day after freezing rain and snow forced hundreds of school systems to shut their doors.

Maxwell sale brings \$775,000

LONDON (AP) — Buyers paid nearly \$775,000 Thursday for furniture and other personal possessions of late media magnate Robert Maxwell, the auctioneer's Sotheby's reported.

Sotheby's had originally estimated the sale would raise only about \$459,000.

The auction was ordered by Buchler-Phillips and Co., the accounting firm appointed receiver to Maxwell's private estate following his death in 1991 and the subsequent collapse of his business empire under huge debts and fraud.

His business empire included the Daily Mirror in London and New York's Daily News.

Heart patient off ventilator

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — A woman who became the nation's first artificial heart recipient in nearly two years was taken off a respirator Thursday and was in critical but stable condition, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Sharon Loughran was awake but weak and was awaiting a human heart at the University of Arizona Medical Center, said hospital spokesman George Humphrey.

Mrs. Loughran, 46, of Scottsdale,

received the CardioWest air-driven heart Monday when her diseased heart failed.

The plastic-and-metal device, the size of two fists, is intended to keep Mrs. Loughran alive until a human donor organ can be found.

In 1985, Mrs. Loughran's surgeon, Dr. J. G. Cooper, performed the first successful operation using a Jarvik-7 heart as a bridge to a human heart transplant.

Schoenover said.

Nursing home workers did not try to resolve an incident in which two residents slapped and pushed each other, she said.

"When you have a resident slapping and pushing, the other residents are intimidated and live in fear," Schoenover said.

A few incontinent residents who were restrained were not taken to the bathroom often enough and they soiled their clothing.

"Other patients had pressure sores resulting from inadequate care, she said.

Bureau inspectors in October found several residents who didn't get needed help eating and lost weight as a result. Five residents who didn't receive adequate care for their elders and 11 nurse's aides had been working less than four months and were not receiving training.

Marcotte has said those deficiencies have all been addressed.

Schoenover said each violation alone may not warrant action, but that all of them together add up to a big problem.

er, the women were told the situation would be taken care of, the claim says.

"I believe the department acted very expeditiously in handling that," DeVall said. "I think that was very concerning with a lack of sensitivity shown."

But the harassment continued. In fact, conditions worsened for the dispatchers when other officers began to make unpleasant remarks and spread rumors, the claim says.

"They appeared to have been told that the dispatchers were making claims against officers other than Sgt. DeVall. Many of the officers acted angry and resentful," the claim says.

Even though DeVall resigned in September 1991, citing the harassment allegations and other personal reasons, the lawsuit writing environment continued, Stubbs said.

As an example, Stubbs said a sign posted in a stall inside the women's restroom that said "Women, stand up for your rights" was not removed until several months after the tort claim was filed.

The dispatchers only filed a formal claim when it became their only option, Stubbs said.

The conflict could have been avoided if the city had taken care of the problem quickly, without letting resentment build up, Helbert said.

Police Chief Paul Du Fresno said his department tried to protect the identity of the people involved during an internal investigation, and that "allowed people to make some assumptions that were incorrect."

"We learned a lot from it," Du Fresno said. "I think there will be some residue for a long, long time."

A complaint was filed with the Idaho Human Rights Commission, which ruled last summer that the dispatchers had a valid complaint.

The two sides signed an agreement nearly a month ago.

"When asked about a \$76,452 city check made out on Dec. 15 for 'legal services - settlement agreement,'" City Manager Tom Courtney said the settlement agreement with the Human Rights Commission concludes me from saying anything about that.

"Money for legal settlements comes from the city's liability insurance fund, which holds about \$70 million," he said.

In addition to the improved personnel policy and the promise of further education, the dispatchers also have been assured they will not be fired in retaliation for the claim.

His first guests Thursday were movie critics Roger Ebert and Gene Siskel, who asked if the show would stay in New York.

At CBS, Letterman will enter gabshow gridlock, competing against Leno, the syndicated "Arsenio Hall Show" and a new Fox show with comedian Chevy Chase, among others.

His departure had been in the cards, some say, as early as 1988, after Leno was named "permanent guest host" to fill the gaps of Carson's jaid-back "Tonight" taping schedule.

Though he may never have expressly indicated his interest in the "Tonight" show, his feelings were hurt when NBC picked Leno for the job in June 1991 and allowed Letterman to learn about it from the media.

Health, ag secretaries enjoy smooth confirmation sailing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Health Secretary-designate Donna Shalala pledged Thursday to move quickly on welfare reform, trying to quell senators' concerns that President-elect Clinton might backpedal on his campaign promise to overhaul the system.

At a confirmation hearing where she was greeted warmly, Shalala also pledged to stress women's health issues and push for more research on breast, ovarian and cervical cancer.

"She reiterated Clinton's support for fetal tissue research and his plans to lift the 'gag rule' on abortion counseling at federal clinics.

Shalala said she didn't know Clinton's timetable for offering a health care package but said aides were busy reviewing options. "I believe that the president-elect has said to us he wants it yesterday," she said.

Also appearing Thursday at confirmation hearings were Secretary of State-designate Warren Christopher and Agriculture Secretary-designate Mike Espy.

Espy, a Mississippi congressman, told the Senate Agriculture Committee he wanted to modernize the agency and streamline it.

Shalala would "send the wrong message" to start closing them without first consolidating the departmental bureaucracy in Washington.

At the Senate Foreign Relations hearing for Christopher, Republicans dropped plans to question him about any knowledge of Army spying on civilians in the 1960s, virtually assuring his clear path for nomination.

In his second day of testimony, Christopher disputed the characterization by a New York Times interview with Clinton indicating the president-elect was offering an olive branch to Saddam.

Shalala, appearing before the Senate Finance Committee, got a friendly reception but was questioned repeatedly about Clinton's welfare plans.

"I'm picking up rumors... that for strategic and political reasons, welfare reform will be put on the back burner," said Sen. Jay Rockefeller, D-W.Va.

Shalala said the rumors were true and she would have a task force working on welfare reform from her first day on the job.

Senate Finance Chairman Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., noted that Clinton, during his campaign, promised to end welfare. "As we know it," instead, Clinton promised to replace it with a system giving welfare recipients job training and education, but make them get a job after two years.

"This is what went on paid advertising in close states, in the closing weeks of the campaign," Moynihan said. "It came as a surprise that it was one sentence in your opening statement."

Moynihan noted that Clinton's aides have indicated in recent days they may be unable to fulfill his campaign promise of cutting the deficit in half over the next four years.

Voters give Clinton high approval rating

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bill Clinton's popularity has surged since he took office, and his approval rating for him will soar unless he shows progress on the economy, the deficit and health costs, Republican and Democratic pollsters said Thursday.

As the same time, their joint survey showed 58 percent of registered voters believe Clinton already has backed off numerous campaign pledges.

The poll, conducted jointly by Republican pollster Ed Geocos and Democratic pollster Celinda Lake, found that 71 percent of the respondents had a favorable opinion of Clinton and 84 percent thought he had done a good job as president-elect.

The pair surveyed more than 1,000 registered voters Jan. 4-5. The margin of potential sampling error was 3.1 percent.

Both pollsters told a news conference that Clinton's approval rating, which climbed from about 50 percent on election day, could fall as fast as it rose.

"I think what's here — if we're honest — is opportunity, not results," said Lake, who is in partnership with Stan Greenberg, pollster for Clinton's campaign.

The joint poll showed that 62 percent of voters think Clinton is "a different brand of Democrat" and 70 percent think the party is changing under his direction.

Lake said those numbers "signal the collapse" of the Reagan-Bush Republican coalition, although "we still have to solidify that."

Geocos said Republicans should be concerned about the "changing attitude toward Democrats, but

he believes the Democratic Party will not allow Clinton to live up to his rhetoric. "Congress will kill the image of the Party again," he said.

The pollsters said a huge majority of voters will settle at first for simply a new face in Washington.

"They want to see someone in touch, someone getting things going," Lake said. "I don't think you have to finish in 100 days, but you have to get started."

Geocos said the "perception of progress" is more important than keeping any promises in the first 100 days of Clinton's administration.

But he said the fact that most voters don't believe Clinton will keep his promises, coupled with election day polls that found a high number of voters don't trust Clinton, "is a real trouble for the president-elect."

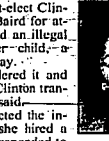
"What we are seeing are the seeds of a negative cloud falling over Bill Clinton's head," Geocos said.

Both pollsters said the honeymoon will end if Clinton does not eventually address voters' main concerns: the economy, the deficit and health care costs.

Lake said health care "is the one issue that could kill the Clinton administration because it is so hard to do what voters expect."

Attorney general-designate hides nothing

WASHINGTON (AP) — President-elect Clinton knew when he nominated Zoe Baird for attorney general that she had employed an illegal alien couple to take care of her child, a spokeswoman for Clinton said Thursday.

"It was fully disclosed. He considered it and did not think that it was a problem," Clinton transition press secretary Dee Dee Myers said.

Baird told FBI agents who conducted the investigation of her background that she hired a South American couple after no one responded to want ads she had placed for a baby sitter, the officials said Wednesday night.

The officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, confirmed reports in local editions of The New York Times, which reported that the man, a Peruvian, served as a part-time driver for Baird.

The man, whose identity was not disclosed, worked for Baird until last spring but his wife, also not identified, continued taking care of Baird's 3-year-old son until shortly after last

full's election, one official said.

The disclosure was potentially embarrassing for Baird, who would oversee the Immigration and Naturalization Service if confirmed as attorney general.

The INS is responsible for enforcing the 1986 Immigration Reform and Control Act, which carries civil penalties

for businesses and people who knowingly hire illegal aliens.

In the early 1980s, one of President Reagan's nominees to head INS quickly withdrew from consideration after the Senate Judiciary Committee staff discovered he had employed an illegal

alien as a servant, according to a senior Justice Department official who spoke about the episode at the time.

But a committee source said the current Judiciary Committee chairman, Sen. Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del., was "very favorably impressed" by Baird's account of the episode, particularly because she volunteered the information.

Biden, however, was withholding judgment on the matter until the committee received the FBI's report, the source said.

Baird reported that she thought she was complying with the law because she had consulted a Connecticut lawyer before hiring the couple, the committee source said.

The lawyer advised Baird and her husband, Yale law professor Paul Gewirtz, to file labor certification papers with INS and the Labor Department. The lawyer also told Baird and her husband that it was not necessary to pay Social Security withholding tax because of the couple's illegal status, the source said.

Baird and her husband, however, recently paid back taxes on the advice of a Washington immigration lawyer, the committee source said.

U.S. cuts troop level in Panama

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States will reduce its military force in Panama to 6,000 men and women by 1993 and remove them all by 1999, the Pentagon announced Thursday.

At present, there are some 10,000 members of the Army, Air Force, Navy and Marine Corps stationed there, said Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams.

The reductions are part of process of turning the Panama Canal over to the Republic of Panama on Dec. 31, 1999.

The 1977 Panama Canal treaty set that date for the troop withdrawal and for the transfer of all U.S. military facilities to Panama.

There were 22,750 U.S. troops sent to Panama for Operation Just Cause, which lasted from Dec. 20, 1989, to Jan. 31, 1990.

President Bush ordered the troops in to topple and seize Panamanian strongman, Gen. Manuel Noriega.

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CDC: AIDS cases in rise

ATLANTA (AP) — At least 330,000 Americans will have died from AIDS by 1995, but the epidemic's spread will slow a little, according to projections federal health officials released Thursday.

"The AIDS epidemic hasn't plateaued, but it will not grow as fast as in its earlier years," said Dr. John Ward, chief of AIDS surveillance for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"Why? A slowdown in new infections is a possibility, and another is that people with HIV are getting treatment that slows the progression to AIDS."

Still, the CDC said that by 1995 more than half a million Americans will have been infected with AIDS since the start of the epidemic in 1981.

Auditorium committee begins final fund push

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls High School Auditorium Expansion Committee is counting on big small pledges in the next few weeks to help it reach its \$500,000 goal.

Ruling stalls hatchery plans

TWIN FALLS — A state-appointed hearing officer has upheld the denial of a permit for a Snake River trout hatchery that would have been the world's largest.

The hearing officer, appointed by the Idaho Health and Welfare Board, ruled this week that construction and operation of the proposed hatchery north of Buhl would violate water quality standards and contribute to existing problems in the river.

Boise developer Earl Hardy has proposed

diverting a portion of Box Canyon Creek to the hatchery at the mouth of neighboring Blind Canyon.

The state Division of Environmental Quality denied Hardy's application for a discharge permit — required to operate the facility. It was the first time the agency has turned down a discharge permit.

Hardy challenged the decision.

The hearing officer's decision is the key to protecting Box Canyon, north of Buhl, and to ongoing efforts to clean up polluted water in the Middle Snake River, environmentalists and state officials say.

"It's critical to what's going on in the Middle Snake," DEQ director Joe Nagel said.

DEQ is leading a cooperative effort in the Magic Valley by agriculture, dairy and aquaculture industries, municipalities and others to reduce the amount of nutrients and sediments discharged to the river.

The accumulation of pollutants in the river has resulted in water that violates state water quality standards.

The denial of the Box Canyon permit doesn't mean DEQ will not approve other future discharge permits, said Tim Litke, the

agency's regional director.

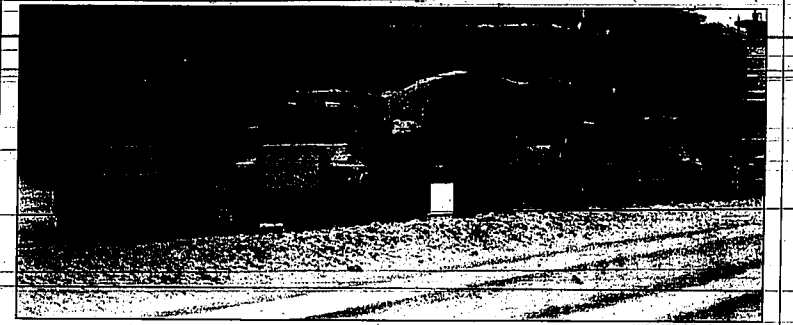
What it does mean, he said, is that because of the polluted condition of the river, more and better information is needed to determine whether a proposed facility would affect the river. Without such information DEQ cannot approve a permit, Litke said.

Box Canyon is the 11th-largest spring ecosystem in the nation and one of the last remaining free-flowing springs along the Snake River.

The hearing officer's report says that

Magic Valley starts digging out from worst blizzard since '84

Snowdrifts up to 12 feet tall continued to bedevil road crews and travelers in Jerome, Gooding and Lincoln counties Thursday, but the rest of the Magic Valley began to dig out the day after the worst blizzard since 1984.

"We haven't gotten mail for two days and we haven't gotten our paper since before that," said Manning Paterson, chairman of the Gooding Highway District, who lives southeast of Gooding.

"The roads are in bad shape, and we've got four trucks and a grader out."

"It's almost a losing battle," Jerome Highway District Supervisor LeRoy Lewis said.

Arlyn Bodily, superintendent of Jerome County's Valley School District, despaired of getting school buses down dozens of snowbound country lanes.

"I've lived in Idaho a long time, and I've never seen anything like this," he said.

Bodily's schools are closed for the fifth straight day today. The Jerome School District didn't plan to hold classes either, and neither did Buhl, Gooding, Wendell, Filer, Castleford, Dietrich or Shoshone.

Twin Falls public and parochial

schools will be back in session, though, along with schools in Cassia County, Minidoka County, Kimberly, Glenns Ferry, Bliss, Camas County, Hansen and Hagerman. Richfield had decided as of press time.

After 3 to 5 inches of snow accompanied by winds of up to 40 mph stopped the Magic Valley in its tracks Wednesday, Idaho Transportation Department crews didn't get U.S. Highway 92 between Shoshone and Interstate 84 reopened until 10 p.m. Thursday.

"The north-south roads are still blocked," Jerome County Sheriff George Silver said. "We do have a 4-wheel drive unit on alert, and all of our search-and-rescue people are on stand-by for people who are snowed in and can't get out."

Many of those people live along or near a nine-mile stretch of Highway 25 east of Jerome that remained blocked Thursday night. Idaho Highway 50 between Eden and 184 was closed, and farther west, U.S. Highway 20 between Fairfield and Mountain Home was still impassable.

Elsewhere, calm winds made improbable mid-January rain eased conditions during the day.

In Twin Falls, early morning

commuters were greeted by the sight of 3-foot piles of snow down the middle of the city's downtown thoroughfares, left there by snowplows. Most of the snow was carried away by trucks by midday.

In Twin Falls County, highway district foreman Clyde Burney expected most roads to be opened to at least one lane by Thursday night. The county sent seven graders and four trucks with plows out Thursday.

"It's been real good today," Burney said. "The wind lightened up."

Burney had worried that winds in the Hollister area would prevent crews from clearing the roads. But the winds tapered off in the afternoon and roads were cleared to at least one lane by evening, he said.

Today, the highway district workers will widen traffic lanes and start clearing the Rock Creek Canyon Road, Burney said.

At the Magic Valley Mall, some of the 29,000 students in south-central Idaho who got a unexpected winter vacation Thursday were making the most of the opportunity.

"It's pretty cool that we're getting a lot of snow," O'Leary Junior High School ninth-grader Erin Thompson said. "We haven't had it for a long time."

Anti-tax activist seeks governor's seat, fires shots at Democrats, Republicans

BOISE — Undeterred by voter rejection of the 1 Percent Initiative last year, anti-tax activist Ron Rankin announced Thursday that he will run for governor in 1994 as an independent.

Rankin, who lives south of Coeur d'Alene, blasted both major parties in his announcement — Republicans for what he called "a callous disregard for and disenfranchisement of conservative Republicans" and Democrats for "promising all sorts of pie-in-the-sky property tax relief, knowing they cannot perform."

Although he compared Democratic tax-relief packages, such as the one proposed by Gov. Cecil Andrus Wednesday, to "putting a gelding in a stud farm," Rankin reserved most of his criticism for the Republican leaders of the state Legislature.

He accused lawmakers of deliberately stalling property tax relief, in the hope that Rankin and the Idaho Property Owners Association would launch another tax-limitation initiative like the 1 Percent and indirectly benefit them in the 1994 state elections.

"Some analysts say that one reason the Democratic Party suffered such large losses in last year's legislative elections was that groups which traditionally support

Democrats, such as the Idaho Education Association, spent much of their energy and money campaigning against the 1 Percent Initiative.

Rankin also accused Senate Republicans of "purging" two of their number, Stan Hawkins of Ucon and Rex Furness of Rigby, and "shunning" and "dishonouring" three others who received campaign help from the pair.

But Sen. Grant Ipsen of Boise, one of the three senators Rankin says are being shunned, denies that is so.

"He's looking at it completely different from the way I do," said Ipsen.

Shoshone officials ask courts to slow down trains

SHOSHONE — The Shoshone city attorney will file an injunction against the Union Pacific Railroad to put an end to higher train speeds through town.

At a recent meeting, officials instructed Lyle Loynd to proceed with the court work to hopefully slow down trains that come in town say pose a danger.

Mayor Tim Ridinger reported last month that he gave Union Pacific one month to speed up trains through town. Ridinger said the trial would allow the town to react to the higher speed of 60 mph.

Residents had previously complained at the railroad's plans to go faster, saying the speed was a hazard especially since school buses and emergency vehicles frequently crossed the tracks.

Union Pacific asked to travel through Shoshone faster because the railroad was losing money at the 30 mph specified in a city ordinance.

But city officials say now that the month is over, trains haven't slowed down.

Police Chief Charles Cox stated that he has clocked trains at 68 mph.

Our department is split by the tracks, making it necessary to maintain two

departments, and our ambulance is on the south side of tracks, making it impossible to reach the sick or injured should there be a derailment," Cox said at the City Council meeting. "And there is also a school on each side."

Meanwhile, resident Billie Williams reported talking to Sen. John Peavy, D-Carey, and gaining his pledge to help put an end to faster trains. Some residents also are preparing a petition to protest increased speeds.

Williams said the danger was worse because several railroad signals had malfunctioned at the two crossings in the city.

Military bristles at disclosure

BOISE — Officials of the Naval Nuclear Propulsion Program said Thursday that the Navy may leave the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory if it is forced to prepare an environmental impact statement on its activities at INEL.

But Carl Schmitt, deputy director of the program, added that moving the Extended Core Facility from INEL would be an expensive, and not very likely, proposition.

"We are not going to pick up our marbles and go home lightly," Schmitt said. "There's far too much at stake."

Schmitt and Rick Guida, environmental specialist for the nuclear navy program, spoke at a meeting of U.S. Sen. Larry Craig's INEL Citizen Advisory Committee.

The program, a joint effort between the Navy and the U.S. Department of Energy, disassembles and inspects spent fuel cores from nuclear-powered submarines at the ECF.

The spent fuel is then stored in pools of water at the Idaho Chemical Processing Plant, another INEL site.

The nuclear industry is suing the Energy Department to force it to prepare an environmental impact statement for its activities involving the handling of spent reactor fuel at the INEL. That suit is in the pre-trial discovery stage in federal district court.

Schmitt and Guida declined to comment on why the Energy Department didn't want to prepare an EIS, citing the pending suit.

However, they insisted that the transport of spent fuel to and inspection at the ECF had a long record of safety.

Since spent Navy fuel shipments to the INEL began in 1957, Guida said, there has never been an accidental release of radioactivity. The solid metallic fuel is nonflammable, non-explosive and non-toxic.

Designated to withstand shocks of more than 50 Gs, or 50 times the force of gravity.

Jonathan Carter, Gov. Cecil Andrus' chief legal assistant, didn't buy those arguments.

"If it's as safe as they claim it is, they shouldn't have anything to hide," Carter said.

"All the information we have is essentially based on what they've told us. That's why we want a full-blown environmental impact statement on their operations."

Schmitt and Guida said the waste storage aspect of the Navy's INEL activities would be included in an EIS being prepared on the overall waste storage issue.

But Carter said that EIS would not include information about transportation, shipment, inspection and other activities at the ECF.

"Should the state win its lawsuit, Schmitt said, the Navy and DOE would consider moving the ECF elsewhere. That would jeopardize the jobs of the 400 workers at the facility.

Even though leaving the INEL likely would involve building a new facility, at a cost of billions of dollars, he said, "if you give us no options, I suppose we'll have no choice but to spend a lot of money."

Schmitt and Guida refused to say what percentage of the spent fuel comes from more than a visual inspection at the ECF, saying that was classified information.

However, they rejected suggestions by some INEL critics that most of the inspections were cursory, and meant only to justify the fuel at the INEL indefinitely.

Roger Paulson, a local 21-year railroad employee, said after the meeting that the most serious dangers involved increasing speed of trains, signal malfunctions and frequent hazardous material cargo.

He said that the railroad handbook says that a signal malfunction must be reported to the train dispatch office.

 evidence presented in the lengthy hearing — which lasted about nine months — showed the facility would violate Idaho water quality standards.
 Discharge from the proposed hatchery would have contributed to the pollution problems in the already overloaded Snake River, the report said.
 "This is a very significant

conservation victory for Box Canyon and the Middle Snake River," said Trish Klair, water quality director for the Idaho Conservation League.
 "Perhaps the greatest significance of this case," she continued, "is to enforce the state's ability to say 'No' to more pollution in the Snake River and have it stick."
 Had the state lost, it might have become impossible to sign the Middle Snake River cleanup treaty and

The league and the Hagerman Valley Citizens Alert supported DEQ in opposing the permit because of the threat to Box Canyon and because of the additional pollution that would have added to the river, Klair said.
 The report must be approved by the Health and Welfare Board. If the board accepts the hearing officer's ruling, Hardy may apply for an exception. Hardy could not be reached for comment.

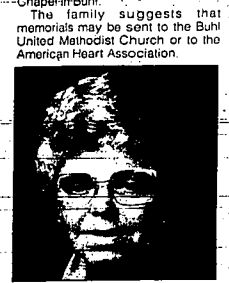

Craig questions snail protection

 TWIN FALLS — U.S. Sen. Larry Craig has criticized the proposed listing of the Bruneau Hot Spring snail under the Endangered Species Act, which is expected today.
 The snails may not meet the criteria for listing, the Idaho Republican said Thursday. Biological and hydrological studies on the snail and its habitat, he says, have been ignored in the "rush" to list the snail.
 The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service first proposed listing the snail in 1983, but "proposals were held up" until a decision in Washington, D.C.
 Then in November, in response to a lawsuit by environmentalists, a federal judge gave the service until today to make a decision on the snail.
 The snail is found in hot springs along the Bruneau River in Owyhee County.
 But the springs are threatened by a long-term decline in the groundwater, that feeds those springs, officials say.
 Craig said he fears potential "dire consequences" for hundreds of ranching and farming families' from "massive" cutbacks in water use, constituting a federal "picking off" of snails of any plant to stabilize the small population if it is listed.
 As state are 265 water rights in northeastern Owyhee County, said Idaho Department of Water Resources spokesman Dick Larsen.
 But apparently nobody has the

authority to shut-down fifty wells to save the snails.
 The Fish and Wildlife Service can't shut down any wells, Boise Field Supervisor Chuck Lobell said. "I don't have that authority," he said.
 "What the federal agency can do is to work with other federal agencies to make sure nothing they do would affect the snail."
 That might make it difficult for a farmer or rancher to get a federal loan to stop an irrigation well, but it would not stop him from pumping.
 Only the Water Resources Department has the authority to administer state-water rights, Lobell said.
 The agency, which says the Fish and Wildlife Service doesn't have enough evidence to list the snail, has no authority to turn off any pumps to save an endangered species, Larsen said.
 The director does have the authority to stop groundwater pumping if withdrawal exceeds the average annual aquifer recharge. But the director also has the authority to let such pumping continue if it is in the public interest or if a plan to restore the aquifer exists or is in the works.
 The agency in 1982 established a "groundwater management area"

south of Bruneau, including the aquifer that feeds the snail's hot springs, effectively halting any new groundwater development.
 Since then, pumping has declined, but still the groundwater level appears to be dropping.
 "We don't know that there's conclusive proof that it's being overdrawn," Larsen said.
 Whether or not the aquifer is being overdrawn, Craig said he fears that a suit would be brought to force the Water Resources Department to shut off wells to preserve the aquifer level.
 The snail's critical habitat is the hot-spring-pool fed by the aquifer and if that aquifer is affected by groundwater pumping, then Craig said he can't imagine a recovery plan that wouldn't include a reduction in groundwater pumping.
 The Water Resources Department, however, has proposed getting an alternative water supply, transplanting the snails or reducing groundwater withdrawals.
 Reducing the groundwater withdrawals may include repairing or abandoning leaky wells, buying water-rights and shutting-off late-priority water rights.
 Leaky wells lose an estimated 1,000 acre-feet of water annually, Larsen said.

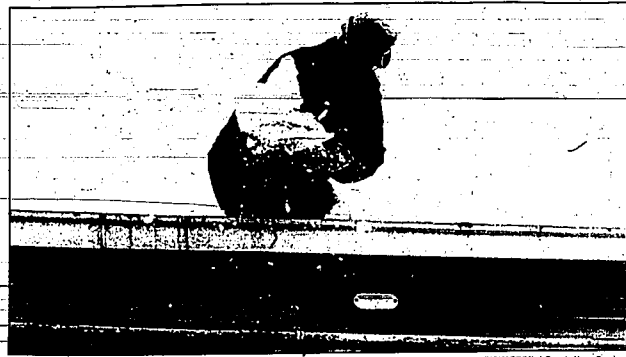

Human rights group seeks formation in Mini-Cassia

BURLEY—The founding board of a human relations organization is hoping to form a Magic Valley offshoot of the group that promotes treating all people equally. Members of the organization recently voted to file for non-profit corporation status with the secretary of state under the name Earth Tribe Inc., according to Steve Thompson, the group's founder. The group's former name, Common Ground Alliance, sounds too similar to the Idaho Citizens' Alliance, a newly formed organization seeking to prevent homosexuals from gaining civil rights, Thompson said.

He added there are about 25 members of Earth Tribe, and many more are interested in what the group is doing, even though they haven't yet joined. "Interest in the committee has arisen from Albion to Buhl and is growing; however, a couple of positions and some alternate positions are still needed to be filled," Thompson said. Thompson said he was working to organize a folk festival this year which would likely occur in Albion, he said.

"Every ethnic and cultural group is invited to participate with foods, arts, crafts, music and dance and so on," Thompson said. The group's Burley headquarters is located in an office at the Bargain Center building at 1214 E. Main St. According to Thompson, Earth Tribe was founded upon the principles of dignity and worth of all human beings. "We are all roots of the same human tree and the pursuit of the ideals of justice and equality for all people is a noble cause," Thompson said. Heyburn names superintendent, approves building restrictions

HEYBURN—Roger Denker, formerly this city's No. 2 administrator, has been appointed to succeed Al Hodge as city superintendent. The City Council appointed Denker during its Wednesday meeting, according to Mayor Glen Loveland. Under the ordinance, such homes must be new and previously unoccupied, be built on a permanent foundation, be double-wide and have at least 800 square feet of living area. They also must feature regular home siding and roofing, be built to federal and state housing standards and be energy efficient. Those planning to put a premanufactured home in Heyburn must also obtain a special use permit from the city, Loveland said. On a case-by-case basis, the city will prevent the homes from being installed in upscale areas, he added.

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Prosecutors gear up for Walker trial

RUPT—Officials from the state attorney general's office are preparing for the Randy Walker murder trial set to begin Feb. 1. Tom Watkins, of the criminal investigations division of the Attorney General's Office, will be prosecuting the case. Officials say they expect the trial of 48-year-old Jerry Fino, who faces charges for killing Walker at his Rupert pawnshop, to last four weeks. Watkins said he hasn't prosecuted a murder case before, but has assisted in several cases. "It's been a learning experience,"

Watkins said in an interview last month. Meanwhile, Rupert Police Department Detective Perry Quinn said he was impressed with Watkins' investigative work. The attorney general's office was called upon to prosecute the murder case when former county prosecutor Dale Haley lost his bid for re-election to Gara Newman, the county public defender, in November's general election. Because Newman had conferred with Fino, it was decided that it would pose a conflict of interest if she represented the state in the trial. The county has agreed to pay lodging and other expenses of members of the attorney general's office.

Blaine trustees applaud principal, deny drill team travel to Seattle

HAILEY—The first Blaine County School Board meeting of the New Year began Tuesday with a round of applause for Chuck Turner, principal of the Wood River Middle School. Turner is one of four finalists nominated to receive the state of Idaho Outstanding Secondary School Principal award. The next step in the selection is the interview. Superintendent Phil Homer praised the fine work Turner has done in his transition to a junior high school principal to the middle school. Jaymie Stimac, Wood River High School drill team adviser, was not applauding the board's decision to turn down her request for approval for her drill team to travel to a competition in Seattle. Stimac explained that the two annual in-state competitions do not allow drill teams with flags to compete. According to Stimac, the competition in Seattle is sponsored by the Northwest Pageantry Association, an organization that allows flags in the drill. Stimac also said the high school drill team has been preparing for the competition as well as raising money to pay for the trip since early in the school year. Liability concerns kept Homer from recommending approval for the trip. Homer said that the School Board had to work within the parameters of the Idaho High School Activities Association guidelines. The board also found the request for three school days' travel excessive. Board member J.B. Miller expressed concern over the hazardous driving conditions and the distance required to make the trip before the board denied approval. In other business, the board discussed the possible acquisition of land adjoining the southwest corner of the Carey School parking lot. The parcel is currently owned by the county and in the past was the location of a storage shed housing

five gallon drums of herbicide. The city has since cleaned up the site, and, according to Trustee Robb Peck from Carey, soil samples were taken to test for possible soil contamination. Homer requested the board's permission to move ahead on acquisition of the parcel from the county. Homer anticipated donation of the parcel from the county. The school district would cover the legal fees incurred in the transfer of ownership. The board gave approval to move ahead with the acquisition pending an investigation of the clean up results. Plans for the property include parking lot expansion. Ruthann Saphier sought the board's approval for a nationally acclaimed video-based parenting class called Active Parenting. Saphier represented the Wood River Network for Youth and the Wood River Women's Resource Center. The classes are effective and affordable, according to Saphier, and Network for Youth and the Women's Resource Center plan to offer the classes to parents of incoming kindergarten students in September of 1993.

Saphier quoted a study showing that self-destructive behaviors such as school failures, drop-outs, delinquency, teen pregnancy, suicide and drug use have been on the rise since 1963. She urged the School Board to support and encourage both parents and teachers to attend the six week program. Saphier said the active support of the school system in conjunction with the community would make the program a success. It will be provided free of charge to classroom teachers and a small fee to cover the cost of materials would be required of the parents. Scholarships would also be made available. The board reacted enthusiastically and asked that they be allowed to review the classroom materials. In executive session, the board agreed to expel a student. Board members declined to divulge the student's name, whose privacy is protected under Idaho law. The board directed the School District attorney to pursue negotiations to acquire the Northridge property in Hailey, the proposed site for the new Blaine County Middle School.

Before raising taxes, look at efficiency, cost control

Gov. Cecil Andrus' one-column-A, one-column-B state budget is long on imagination and short on common sense.

But it demonstrates why Andrus is Idaho's consummate politician.

The governor handed the Legislature two budget proposals Wednesday, one that would spend \$1.126 billion - \$110 million more than last year - and the second that would scrape by on \$1.078 billion.

The governor knows the first one, with its proposals for repealing the production exemption to the sales tax and extending the sales tax to services, is dead on arrival in the Republican-controlled Legislature. But it allows him to play wish-list politics at the lawmakers' expense.

If only the Legislature had listened, he will be able to say we could have provided \$51.9 million more for education.

constituents about the need to defeat the 1-Percent Initiative, and issuing dark warnings about other tax increases if the measure passed.

Now that the voters have obliged, legislators are not about to go back and tell them a tax increase is needed anyway.

There are some elements of Andrus' budget - reducing school levies, property tax relief and state assistance in helping counties reduce their medically indigent funds - that make sense.

But for any of that to happen, other areas of state spending are going to have to be reduced. Neither the Legislature nor Idaho voters are eager to expand state government with an infusion of money.

In the past few weeks Andrus himself has signaled his own belief that the state budget contains a certain percentage of cellulose.

If only the Legislature had listened, we could have given the teachers a bigger raise.

If only the Legislature had listened, we could have spent \$3.5 million on public school reform.

The legislators know better. They would need an exceptionally good reason to scrap the production exemption or extend the sales tax, and that reason is nowhere to be found in the governor's pending blueprint.

The state will be lucky, very lucky - to balance the books on a \$1.078 billion budget. But that's not the biggest reason the lawmakers are in no mood to commit money Idaho doesn't have.

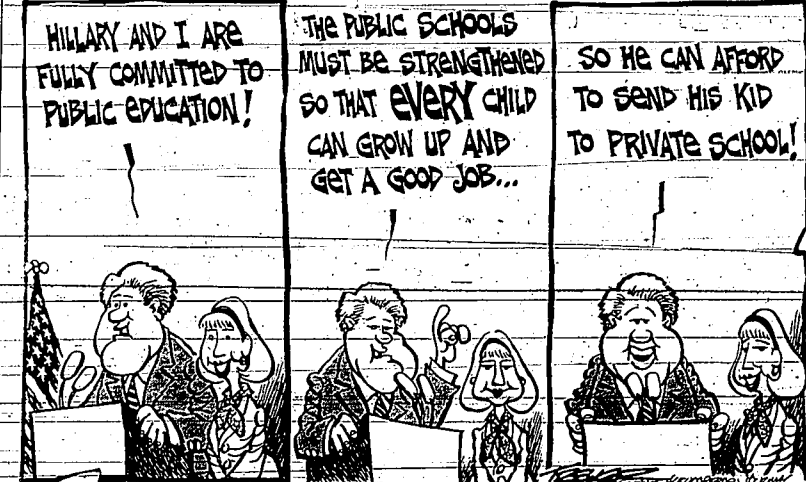

I have referred several patients to Dr. Mary, who has accepted patients no one else wanted and given them very personal, caring attention. She works inhuman hours.

I have been with Dr. Mary in the emergency exam room with a distraught patient; I have seen her tears of joy at delivering a baby; I have known her to give away services and help her patients out of pocket.

The amount her practice gets from Medicare goes to many expenses of running the practice. If she gets anything from that, it is only a small fraction. The truth is, she practices at a great sacrifice. She is a saint, the epitome of a selfless community doctor who does her work out of love.

I have been the pastor of many doctors. I have found them all to study hard, work incredibly long hours and to agonize over patients as people. They earn their pay.

Certainly there is a great need for health-care reform, but the forces that drive health-care costs are far more complex than doctors getting rich. Legal costs, insurance, government paperwork, precautions against being sued, costs of attention, equipment, unpaid bills or files for which Medicare and Medicaid reimburse only fractions have grown exponentially. Doctor bashing is no solution.

In Dr. Mary's office, there is a hallway papered with pictures of her patients - pictures that are there because she loves them like her own children. Anyone who doubts her motivation should go see that hallway and see her smile as she tells about these human beings who are so special to her.

Clearing up TMJ facts

Recently, The Times-News published an article about temporomandibular joint disorder or TMJ. There are a few things that I would like to mention. Because of the variety of symptoms, TMJ is often called "the great imposter." The average person sees several specialists before being correctly diagnosed and is often labeled a hypochondriac. A few of the most common symptoms are:

- Head pain or headache - forehead, temples, migraine type, sinus type; shooting pain in the back of the head, hair or scalp painful to touch.
- Eyes - pain behind the eyes, bloodshot eyes, sensitive to light.
- Teeth - Clenching/grinding, looseness or soreness of back teeth.
- Mouth - Discomfort, limited opening of the mouth, inability to open smoothly, jaw deviates to one side when opening, locks shut or open.
- Ear problems - hissing, buzzing or ringing, decreased hearing, earache but no infection, itchy ears, vertigo or dizziness.
- Jaw problems - clicking, popping, joints, grating sounds, pain in cheek muscles.
- Throat - swallowing difficulties, laryngitis, sore throat with no infection, voice irregularities, frequent coughing or throat clearing.
- Neck problems - Stiffness, neck pain, shoulder and back aches, numbness and/or pain in fingers or arms.

Also, most insurance companies specifically do not cover TMJ. And the costs can be very expensive even without surgery. The plastic splint is usually more than \$1,000. Often therapy, either physical or bio-feedback or both, is necessary - not to mention the expense of medications. But the relief that they bring can mean the difference between living and existing.

After reading an article on Burt Reynolds suffering from weight loss, chronic headaches, nausea and fatigue - many of the symptoms I was suffering - I learned I also have TMJ. After a couple of months of anti-inflammatory and muscle relaxants, I now have a plastic splint I wear in my mouth. I'll wear it for four to six months, 24 hours a day (this includes meals) to move the jaw. Then I will probably have to have braces to move my teeth and, hopefully, I won't have to have surgery. But I feel a better already.

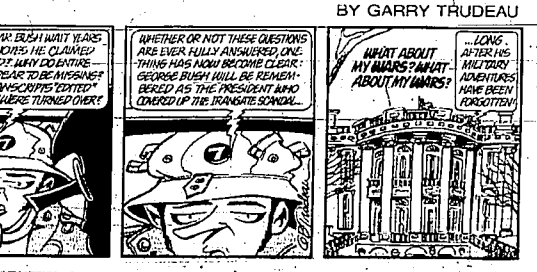

Polish ferry capsizes, killing at least 39

STRALSUND, Germany (AP) — A Polish ferry capsized in the Baltic Sea Thursday at the height of a storm that whipped up 33-foot-high waves and 90 mph winds.

The death toll was feared to be upwards of 50.

Nine survivors were rescued and 32 bodies were recovered, said Helmut Meier, spokesman of the German Fleet Command in Gluecksburg.

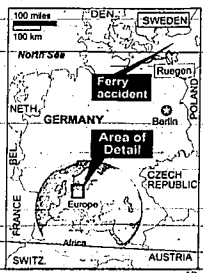
He said about 15 others were missing, probably still in the overturned vessel where raging waters prevented rescuers from reaching them.

The stricken vessel was upside down in waters estimated at 60 feet deep, possibly on a sandbar.

Waves washed across its red bottom as an overturned lifeboat bobbed nearby.

German police in Stralsund said the 412-foot vessel, the Jan Heweliusz, overturned between Poland and Sweden about 20 miles east of the German island of Rugen.

The ferry capsized before dawn as the storm, packing near hurricane-force winds, raged across the Baltic, apparently causing its cargo of heavy trucks and rail-freight cars to shift. Many passengers jumped into the



icy waters but survival time in such water is only a matter of minutes, officials said.

He said divers would probably be unable to enter the ferry until Friday because of the stormy conditions.

Some survivors were in critical condition from exposure to water temperatures of 36 degrees, according to German rescue workers in Stralsund, a coastal town near the Polish border.

Haitian refugees say they'll continue to flee

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — Just off the plane from Cuba after his failed attempt to escape, Haiti, Jean-Claude Bayaud said neither fear nor President-elect Clinton could stop him from trying again.

"We're not going to be discouraged," said the unemployed 30-year-old mason from Petit Gouvè, one of about 1,200 being sent back home on U.N. flights from Cuba this week. "God isn't discouraging us. We will always try to go again, for a better life."

U.S. policymakers and south Floridians had worried that up to 100,000 Haitians would set sail for Miami after next Wednesday's inauguration. Clinton had encouraged Haitians by attacking Bush's practice of quickly sending back boat people. But on Thursday, the president-elect said he would continue the Bush policy, at least for now. His radio message on the Voice of America boomed out over the sizzling airport tarmac as scores of people were being repatriated.

One refugee official said the message, following Clinton's earlier promises, should teach this nation a bitter lesson.

"Haitians should count on themselves first, and then see what other people can do," said Marinne Doufeuille, director of the private Permanent Refugee Service.

"Oh dear!" said Ivonne Villanueva, head of UNICIF in Haiti, when she heard the news. "People had expected a liberalization." She wasn't sure what had pressed

Haitians would do, with economic conditions as bad as they are.

"It's a choice between two bad options," she said. Like several others who stood in the processing line at the airport on Wednesday, Bayaud, a father of four, said hardship forced him to take a rickety boat to escape the hemisphere's poorest nation.

He expressed little hope U.S. pressure could restore Haiti's ousted president to power or change their lot.

Angola officials agree to talks

LUANDA, Angola (AP) — The government agreed Thursday to meet UNITA rebels for peace talks, but fighting raged uninterrupted throughout the Angolan provinces.

In the first hope for peace since fighting broke out in October, U.N. special representative Margaret Anstee said the government and UNITA agreed to send military officials to the Ethiopian capital of Addis Ababa to discuss a truce.

The Associated Press expected the talks will begin this weekend. No delegate list was drawn up.

The refusal of UNITA leader Jonas Savimbi to accept defeat in September elections shattered a May 1991 cease-fire that ended 16 years of civil war between UNITA rebels and the government in this former Portuguese colony.

Volcanic eruption kills 4 scientists

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — A volcano erupted in southern Colombia on Thursday, spewing forth a huge column of ash and killing at least four scientists taking gas samples on its side, according to the Colombian Red Cross.

Eight other scientists were injured and 10 were missing, the Red Cross said.

The scientists were in Colombia for an international conference when the 14,109-foot-high Galeras volcano exploded. Caracol radio said as many as 30 people may have been on the sides of the volcano when it erupted.

The Year of the Woman never made it to Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD — Irony is a quality not often seen in the movies, but it has assumed an all-farce-in-movieland, ready to crash this town's biggest celebration.

The theme of this spring's 65th Annual Academy Awards is "Women and the Movies" in a year when the lack of women in the movies has been the subject of widely publicized discussion.

Commentary

It may have been the "year of the woman" in politics but not in Hollywood.

Five good women to nominate as best actress have been hard to find in a year when the juiciest female roles called for sex kittens, psychos or both.

According to the early "buzz" — that's the Hollywood name for gossip — the frontrunners are Susan Sarandon for "Lorenzo's Oil" and Emma Thompson for "Howards End."

Shirley MacLaine, also mentioned for "Used People," and Geena Davis are two actresses who have publicly lamented the shortage of meaningful leading parts.

"It's no secret that it's harder and harder for women to find good roles in Hollywood," said Harriet Silverman, executive director of "Women in Film," an industry group.

"When you finally do get a woman to star in a film, she's either giving it or getting it" — "It," of course, is sex.

For best actor, though, the competition is fierce. Daking it out are Clint Eastwood in "Unforgiven," Denzel Washington in "Malcolm X," Jack Lemmon in "Glengarry Glen Ross," Al Pacino in "Scent of a Woman," Jack Nicholson in "Hoffa," Tim Robbins in "The Player" and Robert Downey Jr. in "Chaplin."

Among contenders for best picture, "Howards End," an adaptation of E.M. Forster's novel about a

Arkansans must stick together, Thomasons say

WASHINGTON — Harry Thomason likes to brag that the Arkansas town he comes from — Hampton — makes Bill Clinton's home town of Hope look like "a major metropolis."

His wife, Linda Bloodworth-Thomason, who grew up over the border in Poplar Bluff, Mo., says her own experience was shaped by tales of her outspoken Arkansas grandfather, who was shot to death by the Ku Klux Klan before she was born.

The immensely successful television duo say it's this shared Ozark heritage that cemented their decade-long friendship with Bill and Hillary Clinton.

Arkansans have to stick together, says Bloodworth-Thomason.

"We are all people from a poor rural state who are trying to do something at a national level," she said. "If you're from Arkansas, you do have to get up a little earlier and go to bed a little later and try to be a little smarter than everyone else."

The Thomasons — responsible for the hit TV shows "Designing Women," "Evening Shade," and "Hearts Afire" — have been highly visible since Clinton began running for president last year. Too much, they say.

"We feel we've been overpublicized and overcredited in the campaign," said Bloodworth-Thomason, who's worried about more publicity during Clinton's inaugural fest.

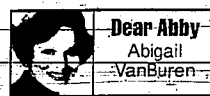

forward-thinking 19th Century woman, is the only film with a substantial cast of female characters.

Other nominees for best film include Eastwood's "Unforgiven," a western that ruminates on the emotional costs of killing; Rob Reiner's "A Few Good Men," a realistic courtroom drama; and Disney's "The Sandlot," the animated version of the Arabian folk tale.

Although awards for acting can make-and-break-careers, only the "best picture" prize is considered a bankable asset for studios.

The award can be worth up to \$50 million in extra ticket sales and home video rentals, according to David Davis, a motion picture analyst with Paul Kagan Associates, a media research firm.

Aside from politics, content, commercial success and critical acclaim all figure into the Academy Award nominations, though no one factor is considered a decisive indicator.

All these elements influenced the 5,000 academy members, who cast their nominations in branches for members of their own profession. The entire academy nominates the best pictures and votes for the final awards.

The nominations will be announced on Feb. 17. The awards ceremony will be telecast on March 29.

This year, both women and men in the industry are snickering privately over the choice of these "women and the movies."

Some wonder if the ceremonial razzmatazz will still involve the customary dancing girls.

With only one woman ever nominated for best director in the history of the Academy Awards, the big question is whether Penny Marshall and Barbra Streisand will be invited to participate in the onstage festivities.

The outcry has barely died down since both women were passed over for best director nominations in the last two years, though Streisand's "Princess of Tides" and Marshall's "Awakenings" were nominated for best picture.

"(The women and film theme) is the purest form of bull we see in a long time," said one high-ranking male studio executive. "Every time they find a hole in our lives they decide to honor it with a film fix."

Academy leaders say the theme was chosen to fit in with the so-called "year of the woman" in American politics and not as a commentary on women in the movies in 1992.

The award show is really to celebrate movies and to identify with a national theme that seems to have the public's interest," said Gil Cates, the presentation producer, who chose the theme.

Defending the academy, Cates argued that the narrow range of wom-

an movie roles in the 1990s is just a minor "jiggle on the graph" of film history, compared to contributions by movie greats like Katharine Hepburn.

But when asked how today's Hollywood positively reflects women in the movies, Cates said, "That's a tough question. I don't know."

The conventional wisdom in Hollywood attributes the increase in male-oriented films featuring screen violence and sex to the growing overseas market.

"Many women, though, point to a phenomenon closer to home - sexism."

The divergence between critical and Academy opinion could come into play in the best actress awards.

Critics' societies in New York, Los Angeles and Boston chose English actress Emma Thompson for her performance in "Howards End," from British production company, Merchant Ivory.

But some insiders believe industry sentiment may be behind Sarandon for portraying a determined mother of a sick child in "Lorenzo's Oil."

She lost for "Thelma and Louise" to Jodie Foster in "Silence of the Lambs" last year and failed to win a 1981 nomination for "Atlantic City."

"Susan Sarandon is like Glenn Close. She's been passed over so many times you don't know if the academy thinks they owe her anything," said Lindt Seger, a movie analyst and author of books about screenwriting.

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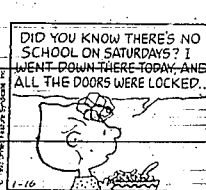

Powerful portrayal blends grace, fury

HOLLYWOOD—In the remarkable new film "Scent of a Woman," Al Pacino plays Frank Slade, a retired Army lieutenant colonel and war hero who spends his days in a dingy tract house on the New Hampshire property of his niece's family. Five years earlier, upset at being passed over for promotion after more than 20 years in the service, and recklessly showing off for some recruits, he juggled a few grenades. One of them went off, blinding him.

The film is essentially a tour de force for Pacino. He sustains us through the slow passages by working with a closed-in intensity that turns each scene into a kind of mini-movie.

When we first glimpse Frank in the near-darkness of his living room, he seems transfixed by his own rage; he's like a still-life marionet. But when he begins barking orders at Charlie Simms (Chris O'Donnell), the scholarship student from the posh, nearby prep school who has been hired to take care of him for the weekend, Frank is in his element. His furious, aggressive, cadenced delivery has a military snap to it, conversation with Frank becomes a form of combat.

What gives Pacino's performance such power is that he also shows us the self-loathing that steels Frank's speech. Frank is a bully but he's a desolate bully, he's a soldier who has become his own battleground. The drama in "Scent of a Woman"—directed by Martin Brest and scripted by Bo Goldman, and very loosely based on a 1974 Italian film starring Vittorio Gassman—is mostly in the language, in the way these two malcontents work off each other's emotions.

There isn't a whole lot of plot; Frank induces Charlie to accompany him on a "thanksgiving walk and bend" in New York City, with dire consequences the boy can't foresee. That's about it, but the film (rated R for language) is essentially a tour de force for Pacino. He sustains us through the slow passages by working with a closed-in intensity that turns each scene into a kind of mini-movie complete with its own ticking time bomb.

The movie is about how Frank and Charlie save each other's lives. Frank, on his bender, has the abandon of a man who is doing everything for the last time. He preens his misery. He also has a bitter man's

relish for other people's miseries; his radar picks up Charlie's troubles before the boy has volunteered a word. Charlie's troubles are far from minor. Along with another student, chunky, spoiled-rich George Willis (Philip S. Hoffman), he has recently witnessed the beginnings of a student prank that resulted in the public humiliation of the school's headmaster (James Rebhorn), who threatens to expel both boys if they don't reveal the perpetrators. The headmaster has also offered Charlie an added inducement: a guaranteed scholarship to Harvard. Charlie has a decision to make by the week's end: to snitch or not to snitch.

The close connection between the hierarchy of the military and the prep school is clearly defined. Both play off privilege. The exuberant elitism of Charlie's moneyed classmates is a kind of pagoda—We might be observing a campus of George Bushes-in-waiting. Their pranks and double-crosses carry the imprimatur of entitlement.

Frank, as evidenced by his own down-turned career, understands the hazards of crossing that entitlement. And so he spends most of the movie goading Charlie to snitch, as if the capitulation of this decent, earnest, middle-class kid would confirm his own worst cynicism about the way the world works. But Charlie isn't quite as blinkered as Frank assumes. As Chris O'Donnell plays him, and that's wonderfully, Charlie has the bluff and the guff in Frank's posturing. He also recognizes in Frank an innate courtliness, which is why Frank finally begins to trust him.

The film could be a bit more tough-minded; there are moments when Frank is too Chaplinesque (the theme music from Chaplin's "City Lights" with its Little Tramp and blind-flower seller, even works its way into the score). And the finale is cornball.

But at least its rising cornball, it's like watching the acting out of a dream revenge fantasy. Pacino works inside that dream with an amazing grace. He follows the logic of Frank's fury in "Scent of a Woman" as if it takes him to places he's never been before as an actor.

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Pacino raises artistic level, expectations for best actor

NEW YORK—Al Pacino rolled his eyes. "Who can play the role?" asked Martin Brest, director of "Scent of a Woman." "I obviously needed one of the great artists of our time." "Al."

"I'm glad you said artist," Pacino said, deeply, his eyes now dancing with mirth. "When Bo (Goldman) and I wrote it," Brest continued, "we took it as far as we could, and then thought about Al taking it to a whole other level."

Pacino indeed has taken his role of Lt. Colonel Frank Slade in "Scent of a Woman" to another level, with a performance that may finally bring an Oscar to the six-time Academy Award nominee.

"Scent of a Woman," in which Pacino plays an embittered blind Army career officer helibent on a New York City weekend fling, opened last month in major cities to qualify for the Academy Awards.

Pacino is considered a front-runner and possible winner of a best-actor Oscar. And the script for "Scent of a Woman," written by two-time Academy Award-winner Goldman, could be nominated for a best screenplay award.

How does Pacino react to the Oscar talk? "I don't think I've ever met any one who wasn't pleased with a nomination for an Oscar," he said during an interview at Fifth Avenue's posh St. Regis Hotel.

"You try to keep your expectations at a minimum because if you don't you open yourself to a kind of disappointment. But you can't help but feel that. It's in the air. You hear it," he said.

"Over the last decades I feel I'm

more privy to the feedback, so you naturally get stimulated. And it gets into your consciousness, so you naturally start to think about it. And I don't think I've answered the question yet, which is amazing—I'm good at that."

It might be said that 1992 was Al Pacino's year. In addition to "Scent of a Woman," Pacino starred in the big-screen adaptation of David Mamet's brutal drama, "Glengarry Glen Ross," which received critical raves. Pacino also could be nominated for an Oscar (most likely best supporting actor) for "Glengarry." If Pacino is nominated and wins for either film, it would cap one of the most impressive comebacks in motion picture history.

Said Pacino, who will be 53 April 25, "I think I've been really lucky this year (1992) to have, really, two scripts that you can say are literary and afford the actor this kind of an opportunity, which is akin to the stage. That's a rarity in movies."

Pacino said that portraying a sightless person provided intrinsic advantages.

"When you're given an obstacle if it's a physical thing or something that is abnormal to you, then you relish the opportunity to do it because anything that takes focus off yourself, makes it different, is like what they say is a handle for a character. Sometimes, you'll see actors, who like to play parts where they're deformed—or if they've got something that's a mask.

"I liked it when I did 'Dick Tracy,' for instance. I had the cover of the mask and the body. It makes you less self-conscious. It frees you up, actually. A thing like being blind becomes an obstacle that you can use. It puts you in a scene and makes you believe it even more."

A RIVER RUNS THROUGH IT (PG). Despite luminous cinematography and a career-making performance from Brad Pitt, Robert Redford's version of Norman Maclean's celebrated memoir about fly fishing and families suffers from an excess of idealized, worshipful attention. Though finely made and not without its moments of quiet satisfaction, the main emotion "River" arouses is a curiosity about what all the fuss was about in the first place.

THE BODYGUARD (R). Kevin Costner and Whitney Houston star in this muddled, often unintentionally titillating thriller about — you guessed it — a bodyguard and his pop star client. A lot of talent has gone into this jamboree but it

doesn't add up to much. Costner is turning into a stolid performer and Houston is impassive. So much for chemistry.

CHAPLIN (PG-13). An unfortunate melding of style and subject matter, too intent on turning the leading light of silent film comedy into an icon to be regarded with stately awe to do justice to the disturbing energy of the man's life. Still, Robert Downey Jr. gives a just-so performance in the title role, and the film's immaculate look and careful re-creation of bygone Hollywood are reassuringly diverting.

A FEW GOOD MEN (R). A brisk and familiar courtroom drama of the old school, as enjoyable as it is predictable, and accompanied by a pure star-power performance by Jack Nicholson and Tom Cruise. Centered around a murder trial inside a military courtroom, "Men" is entertainment pure and simple, a commodity that has unaccountably become rarer and rarer.

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Hall of Fame inducts 8

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame inducted eight more performers this week, and officials said 1993 would finally be the year they break ground on an \$85 million museum for them.

"We are finally going to have a groundbreaking... in Cleveland despite the certain skepticism of many people," the hall's foundation vice chairman, Jann Wenner of Rolling Stone magazine, told a news conference before Tuesday night's banquet honoring the inductees.

An eclectic group of performers, mirroring several rock music genres, were inducted at the eighth annual ceremony, held this year at the Century Plaza Hotel.

They included the groups Cream, Creedence Clearwater Revival, The Doors, Frankie Lymon & the Teenagers, and Sly & the Family Stone, and singers Janis Joplin, Little Jimmy and Van Morrison. Dinah Washington was honored for her early influence on rock music.

Record producer Milt Gabler and television producer and host Dick Clark were inducted as non-performing record industry professionals.

Nominees had to have released records in 1967 or earlier and were chosen for their contributions to or influence upon rock 'n' roll.

Sly and the Family Stone generated a funky, energetic sound characterized by "Dance to the Music," "Everyday People," and "Stand!," and "Hot Fun in the Summertime."

Morrison, who got his start in Ireland in the early 1960s, rose to fame with such works as "Astral Weeks" and "St. Dominic's Preview" and continues to perform today.

Brown, known as "Miss Rhythm," was a major R&B star in the 1950s. Her hits included "So Long" and "(Mama) He Treats Your Daughter Mean."

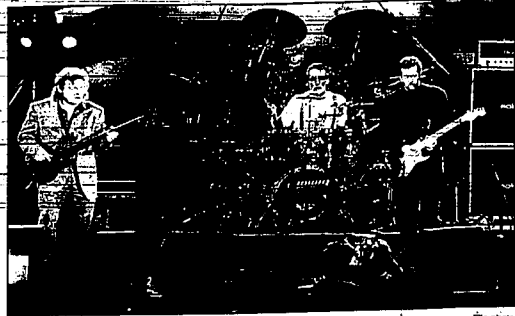

'The audience gives you everything,' Burns says

LAS VEGAS (AP) — George Burns turns 97 in a few days, so he's a year closer to his goal of playing the London Palladium on his 100th birthday.

The cigar-smoking, raspy-voiced comic is planning a three-night gig at Caesars Palace this weekend, including a birthday party with his celebrity friends Saturday night.

Burns signed a five-year contract with Caesars in 1990, saying at the time he turned down a 10-year deal because he was unsure the Strip resort would still be around.

Burns, whose birthday is Jan. 20, is still counting on playing London three years from now, but added a similar qualifier.

"I hope the Palladium is still there," Burns quipped in a telephone interview from his Beverly Hills, Calif., office, where he goes daily when he's not on the road.

He's down to about 20 or 30 performances a year, and Burns said it's audiences that keep him going.

"The love that comes over the footlights means everything to me," Burns said. "I couldn't make it without that. The audience gives you the vitality. They give you everything."

Burns continues to charm audiences with his wit, his recollections of four decades with his late soul mate, Gracie Allen, and his disdain for growing old.

"I blow a little smoke out onstage from behind the curtain, the audience rises, then when I walk out they say, 'Look at that, he can

stand up," Burns said, chuckling. Born Nathan Birnbaum in 1896, Burns quit school at age 7 and organized a group of child singers known as the Pee Wee Quartet, singing in saloons and on the Staten Island Ferry. A member of a poor family growing up on New York's Lower East Side, he had only to look to his 11 brothers and sisters to come up with his own ensemble.

He bounced around vaudeville as a trick roller skater and struggling comic, then hit his stride when he teamed with Gracie in 1923. The two became a fixture on radio in 1932, moving to television in 1950.

The move to television came about when longtime friend Jack Benny was asked to do a show but feared his services, and the hit series, "Burns and Allen" was born. The show ran until 1959, when Gracie retired. She died in 1964.

"You die and you cry, until you're finally able to stop crying," he said of her death. "I had a wonderful marriage. If it wasn't for Gracie, I wouldn't be where I am. Gracie made me what I am."

Burns visits her grave once a

month, talking to her about his latest gigs, Hollywood gossip and other things.

"Sometimes I even tell her a joke, but she doesn't laugh anymore," Burns said, pausing to allow the interviewer to ask why.

"She's heard all my jokes," he said. Ask him about his fondest memories, and the answers center on Gracie: "When Gracie said she'd marry me; when Gracie and I played the Palace; when we had our radio show for 19 years; when we had our TV show for 10 years."

After Gracie's death, Burns busied himself working clubs around the country and playing Las Vegas, where he helped start the careers of a teen-ager named Ann-Margret and the late Bobby Darin. He took over the late Benny's role in "The Sunshine Boys," and won an Academy Award for the 1975 comedy.

Has he ever lost confidence during his 90 years in show business? "Oh, no," he responded. "There were those times, but I didn't think I was bad, I just thought the audience was bad."

His greatest achievement? "The fact that I'm still around."

Blackwell chastises Madonna

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Madonna topped Mr. Blackwell's 33rd annual Worst Dressed list and received a scolding from the sharp-tongued critic for luring America's youth toward what he called a fashion trend of overexposure.

"What if your daughters and the youth of America were to clone Madonna?" Blackwell asked, standing before a photo of the singer-actress in a bare-bosomed gown.

Blackwell, whose real name is Richard Sylvan Selzer, said the latest edition of his list was the most difficult, declaring that the state of fashion had fallen to a new low.

"What looks terrible ... has become fashionable," he said. Following Madonna on the list were actresses Geena Davis, "Big Bird in heels," and Glenn Close, whom Blackwell described as "Draacula's Daughter."

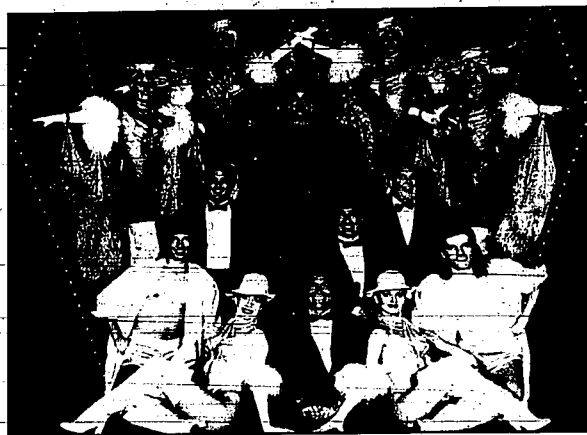

Twitty celebrates birthday with 9-under par 63

HONOLULU, Hawaii — Howard Twitty's birthday present to himself came a day early.

But it was a beauty; a gaudy, sparkling trophy that provided him with a 3-shot lead after the first round of the Hawaiian Open.

Twitty, about to turn 44 and now in his 19th year on the PGA Tour, produced a near-flawless effort over the Waialae Country Club course that nestles under the shoulder of Diamond Head.

On a course that has been toughened with the addition of mounds along most fairways and around the greens, with new bunkering and deeper, heavier rough, Twitty did not make a bogey or have a 5.

Twitty, whose last victory came in 1980, birdied the first hole of the day and his first of the season.

"Hey, that's a great way to start the year, a birdie on the first hole you play," he told his caddy.

"To go on, on a shoot 63, make no bogeys, that's just icing on the cake; a whole lot of icing on the birthday cake," he said after completing the round with an 18-foot birdie putt on the final hole.

Bill Glasson also played without a bogey and without a 5 and held second at 65 in the tournament that is being televised live in prime time to the mainland.

Glasson, who won the Kemper Open last year while playing on a special medical exemption, has a career-long history of back and knee problems. He attributed his improved play to improved health.

"My health is a lot better. I feel good enough to play."

Mark O'Meara, who had skipped this event for seven years, shot 66 and was tied with Ben Crenshaw and Tom Lehman.

Football revenue could save NCAA

DALLAS — Football, for years a target for reform, might be asked to assume college athletics by staging a national championship game.

"I think there's more sensitivity toward the idea of some type of football championship. But when you come in here supporting football and you continue to get knocked back, when everything has been reduced football, you start to wonder," said Chuck Neinas, executive director of the College Football Association.

"Now all of a sudden, it's, 'Let's have another football game and generate lots of revenue.' That doesn't sit well with people involved with football."

Football has always been college athletics' chief money maker, and a national playoff producing a \$50 million windfall might be the easiest way for schools to afford next year's expected sharp increase in financing of women's sports.

"We have gender equity coming in. Television revenues are going down," said NCAA executive director Dick Schultz, who brought up the playoff idea on the opening day of the NCAA convention. "They may not like it (the playoff) now but they need to think about it so if something comes up they're prepared to act."

It irks football people that the reform-minded Presidents Commission has reduced practice time. Yet a playoff producing a financial windfall — as well as a national champion — might serve to ease pressure on the sport.

"In some instances, it's been a kicking post; in some instances, it's being maybe tolerated," said former Oklahoma football star Prentice Gautt, associated commissioner of the Big Eight Conference. A playoff, he said, "maybe would get a lot of people on the bandwagon for football."

Schultz caught 2,000 convention delegates off guard when he suggested on Wednesday that they consider a major-college football playoff as a way of raising money. Many wondered whether he would have bothered raising the issue if he hadn't already become convinced that opposition to a playoff was eroding.

"Yes, I would," he said, and added that a day later he'd heard nothing to indicate much support.

"It's going to be awhile before we ever have one. If we ever have one," Schultz said Thursday as the convention got under way. "A lot of attitudes have to change. There just doesn't seem to be any interest at all."

ATLANTA (AP) — Dominique Wilkins scored 26 points and Atlanta took control with defense against Detroit, coming away with a 108-91 win.

The Hawks, extending their longest winning streak of the season to four games, broke a 55-65 tie with three steals and three baskets in a 62-second span in the final four minutes of the third quarter. The spurt came during a 20-4 run that created an 83-69 lead with 10:33 remaining.

Orlando Woodridge scored 23 points and Joe Dumars 18 for the Pistons, the first visitor to Atlanta in 18 games this season to fail to score 100 points.

The NBA's leading rebounder, Dennis Rodman, had 11 rebounds and six points before leaving with a strained right calf muscle. Mookie Blaylock scored 22 points for the Hawks, who have won two straight at home after losing seven consecutive times at the Omni.

Bird-less Celtics heat it up in NBA

BOSTON (AP) — You don't hear Larry Bird's name mentioned around the Boston Celtics much anymore, as in "How will they ever win without Larry Bird?" After a terrible start, the Celtics are the NBA's hottest team.

"Now when teams come at us, we're taking their best punch," says feisty forward Xavier McDaniel, "and throwing a few of our own."

Bury the obits for the legendary franchise that lost eight of its first 10 regular-season games after Bird's retirement last August.

The Celtics, shaking off their worst start in 14 years, are 7-0 in 1993 with a blend of improved shooting, timely defense, unexpectedly strong

rebounding and guidance from coach Chris Ford.

No. 4 Kansas 140 Oral Roberts 72

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — Reserve Patrick Rifeley scored 23 points as No. 4 Kansas snuffed Oral Roberts in a 140-72 Thursday night.

Kansas' highest-scoring game came in 1989, when it beat Oral Roberts 140-72 on Dec. 9, 1989. The Jayhawks were on pace for a blowout early against Oral Roberts, leading 48-9 and then 70-20 later in the game.

The victory was the 1,499th in the 95-year history of the Jayhawks, putting them one away from joining North Carolina and Kentucky as the only schools with 1,500. The trouncing of Oral Roberts accounted for their second biggest victory margin ever; the Jayhawks pulled down 115-45 on Jan. 3, 1989.

Greg Otenas had 21 points and Greg Gurley scored 16 for Kansas (13-1), while Oral Roberts (1-10) lost five in a row, and has dropped all nine road games this season.

No. 10 Oklahoma 102 Nebraska 89

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — Terry Evans scored 20 points and led big men in each half that carried No. 10 Oklahoma to a 102-89 victory over Nebraska in the Big Eight on Thursday night in Lincoln.

Oklahoma (12-3 overall, 1-1 Big Eight) overcame a 12-point first-half deficit to avoid losing its second straight home game to Nebraska (4-6, 0-2) as the 3-pointers hurt itself by committing 28 turnovers.

The Cornhuskers took a 39-27 lead before Oklahoma outscored them 21-4 in the final 6 1/2 minutes of the first half. Evans scored nine of the points and Nebraska held out by committing 28 turnovers.

It was the first Pacific 10 Conference victory of the season for the Sun Devils (7-3), who were 0-2 after a road trip.

Freshman Mark Hendrickson scored 17 of his 21 points in the second half of the season for the Sun Devils.

Washington State (10-1) also took the ball through teammate Fred Ferguson's hands with 1:54 left.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — New York Mets pitcher Dwight Gooden bruised his chest and foreleg in an automobile accident Thursday, was treated at a hospital and released.

Gooden's agent, Jim Neader, said the accident occurred at about 3 p.m. on U.S. 90 in St. Petersburg. Neader said Gooden was taken by ambulance to Bayfront Medical Center, where he was released at about 5 p.m.

San Antonio-Texas will join CFL

SAN ANTONIO — The Canadian Football League, expanding almost to the Mexican border with its new Texas team, will throw Thursday to unveil the name, colors and logo of the San Antonio Texans.

"It's a big day for all of South Texas," team owner Larry Benson said as his franchise was welcomed to town in the nearly complete Alamodome, where his team will play.

The CFL voted earlier this week to expand for the first time into the United States, awarding franchises to San Antonio and Sacramento, Calif.

"We wanted to go into cities that didn't have NFL franchises and that we felt wanted to get high-caliber professional football," CFL Commissioner Larry Smith said. "We're selling something that's unique, that's different."

"We're not coming down here to compete with the National Football League."

There are a few differences in rules between the leagues. For instance, CFL teams play on a longer and wider field, resulting in slightly quicker play. The CFL allows only three downs to move the ball 10 yards, compared with the NFL's four downs.

Montanan wins Sled Dog Marathon

DULUTH, Minn. — Defending champion Greg Swingley of Simons, Mont., won the John Beargrease Sled Dog Marathon just before 11 a.m. Thursday when he crossed the finish line with a team of eight dogs.

Race officials said Swingley finished the 475-mile race from Duluth to Grand Portage, and back in 21 hours, behind his record pace last year of 80 hours, 33 minutes.

Jamie Nelson of Togo, the 1988 winner, finished second, about eight hours behind Swingley.

Nelson moved into second after Robin Jacobson of Squaw Lake, the 1986 champion and last year's runner-up, scratched Wednesday.

Twelve of the 26 mushers had scratched from the race, and 12 teams were still on the course Thursday night. The race ends at 5 p.m. Friday. Swingley and his team were slowed by a storm that dumped about 8 inches of snow on the trail along Lake Superior's North Shore. The race began Sunday.

"I've never had such a slow trail since I've been here," Swingley said. "This is the fourth year (in Beargrease) and that was definitely the toughest trail."

AP tabs Seles top female athlete of '92

Monica Seles repeated herself in 1992, winning three of the four Grand Slam tournament titles and dominating women's tennis for the second straight year.

Thursday, she repeated as Associated Press Female Athlete of the Year. Seles, who won every Grand Slam tournament except Wimbledon last year and reached the final in 14 of 15 tournaments, is the first woman to win the award in consecutive years since another tennis star, Chris Evert, in 1974-75.

Seles said she was honored — and fortunate — to get the award.

"I think last year was pretty lucky," she said in Melbourne while preparing for the Australian Open.

She received 40 first-place votes and 296 points from a nationwide group of writers and broadcasters. Figure skater Kristi Yamaguchi finished second with 29 first-place votes and 257 points, while track and field star Jackie Joyner-Kersey was third with 23 and 210.

Speedskater Bonnie Blair was fourth, followed by sprinter Cait Devers, gymnast Shannon Miller, swimmer Summer Sanders, hockey goalie Manon Rheaume, race car driver Lyn St. James and skier Petra Kronberger.

It is rare for a non-Olympian to win the award in an Olympic year. It has happened only three previous times — Evert, in 1980; Mickey Wright in 1984; and Maureen Connolly in 1952.

Connolly is the only tennis player to win the award three consecutive years (1951-53). Four other tennis stars — Seles, Evert, Althea Gibson and Alice Marble — have won it twice in a row.

In 1992, Seles won the Australian, French and U.S. Opens for the second straight year, but her bid for a Grand Slam sweep was stopped by

Steffi Graf in the championship match at Wimbledon, the only Grand Slam title Seles has never won.

Although women's tennis is probably more competitive than ever, Seles is the undisputed queen. She won 70 of 75 matches last year, earned a record \$2.6 million on the tour, captured her third straight Virginia Slims Championship and retained the No. 1 ranking she has held since March 1991.

Most of her victims felt like Martina Navratilova did after losing to Seles 7-5, 6-3, 6-2 in the Slims final.

"In the last two sets I got run over by a Mack truck," Navratilova said. "It is amazing to me that she can hit the ball that hard that close to the line so consistently."

Bowe's trash turns into Lewis' treasure

LONDON (AP) — There wasn't a trash can in sight.

Lennox Lewis happily accepted Thursday what—Riddick Bowe tossed in the garbage — the World Boxing Council heavyweight championship belt.

Holding the green and gold belt aloft, Lewis announced he will make his first defense on April 24 in London — probably against Tony Tucker — as part of a four-fight, multimillion-dollar deal with HBO.

WBC president Jose Sulaiman flew in from Mexico to present Lewis with a new version of the belt, which Bowe merrily tossed in a trash can at a London hotel last month. Bowe, who dethroned Evander Holyfield on Nov. 13, relinquished the WBC version of the title but remains champion of the World Boxing Association and International Boxing Federation.

Lewis stopped Donovan "Razor" Ruddock in two rounds in London on Oct. 31 in what the WBC billed as a title elimination bout. The WBC stipulated that the winner of the Bowe-Holyfield fight must make a first defense against Lewis.

However, no deal could be worked

out between the Bowe and Lewis camps, and Bowe will fight Michael Dokes on Feb. 6 in Madison Square Garden. The WBC threatened to strip Bowe of the title, but he gave it up on his own by throwing the belt in the trash.

"We believe Lennox Lewis is the authentic champion of the world," Sulaiman said. "He didn't duck anybody, he was ducked."

Lewis is the first British heavyweight champion since Bob Fitzsimmons, who held the title from 1897

to 1899. He said he had mixed emotions about winning the title by default.

"In one sense, I feel that Riddick Bowe took away my glory from winning it in the ring," he said. "On the other hand, I won it."

Now, Lewis must decide on his next opponent.

WBC rules state that he should fight the No. 1 contender — in this case Tucker, whose only loss in 51 fights was to Mike Tyson in 1987.

But the Lewis camp has expressed interest in fighting someone else, possibly Alex Stewart.

Sulaiman said the WBC executive board would examine Lewis' request and announce its decision in the next 8-10 days.

Lennox Lewis will follow the rules of the WBC," said his manager, Frank Maloney. "If the vote is to fight Tucker, we will fight Tucker."

Lewis said it doesn't matter whom he fights.

"Whenever it is, he's going to get knocked out anyway," he said.

Maloney said the fight will be held in London, either at the Earls Court exhibition hall or at an outdoor soccer stadium.

NFL players form new union

NEW YORK (AP) — The NFL Players Association said Thursday it has begun the process of becoming a union again so its members, the players, can ratify the new labor agreement they reached with the league Jan. 6.

The association identified itself on Nov. 8, 1989 so it could legally file lawsuits against the NFL, challenging its rules against free agency.

After that, players won a suit filed in Minneapolis in the name of former New York Jets running back Freeman McNeil, forcing the league to come to a new labor contract with the NFLPA. The players had, been without a labor contract since the 1987 strike.

On Tuesday in Dallas, the NFLPA executive committee started the move toward recertification, which is considered a formality.

The executive committee unanimously adopted a resolution recom-

ending that the NFLPA bylaws be changed to classify the association "as a labor organization with collective bargaining as its objective."

It also recommended that the board of players directors "obtain union authorization cards from the players in the National Football League as soon as possible" so it can be recognized by owners as a legal labor union.

Bills' post-season performance has Dolphins on edge

MIAMI (AP) — After two straight Super Bowl losses, some people perceive the Buffalo Bills as losers. You count the Miami Dolphins among them.

If anything, the Dolphins are convinced the Bills are a team to emulate. With the way Buffalo has performed in this postseason, that's not a bad idea.

"I might hate them — I hate every opponent when we're playing them — but I respect them as a great team," Dolphins linebacker Bryan Cox said Thursday. "I think they respect us."

You have to look at what they've done. They went to two Super Bowls, which is a lot better than most teams do. They get all those injuries, but they still make that comeback and then they go into Pittsburgh ... We respect them as winners and they have to feel that



way about us because we both got here.

To Sunday's AFC championship game, that is. In 1990 and '91, the Bills were home for the final step to the Super Bowl and beat the Raiders, then the Broncos. The next step, winning the NFL title, has yet to be taken.

"Does that make us losers?" receiver James Lofton asked with a look of incredulity. "Losers are not teams with our record. Just because you don't win the Super Bowl doesn't mean you're a loser. You're the second-best team in the NFL and you're right up there."

All it means to me is that you retire that hunger to get back there and to win it.

Unfortunately, that has not been the way the public has responded. I think about Bud Grant's Minnesota Vikings, 0-4 in the Super Bowl. How are they remembered?

More recently, what about Denver, also 0-4 in the big game? The usual reaction to the possibility of the Broncos returning to the Super Bowl is: "Oh no, not them again."

It might not be accurate or fair. But it's there.

And it will be there for the Bills should they become the first team to lose three successive Super Bowls.

"We won the AFC title three of four years, and nobody can take that away," former Broncos coach Dan Reeves

said. "But some people only want to remember the big one. It hurts really bad to play the way we did and get beat as badly as we did. There's really no consolation in anything that anybody might say to you."

Bills coach Marv Levy has known the feeling the last two Januarys, he prepared for yet another super let-down?

"My thoughts never lean that way," he said. "The only way to achieve something in this game is to do so with a positive approach."

"Of course I don't see us as failures or anything of the such because of one game. You always strive for the chance to win. You always strive for the chance to play in that game. We happened to not win that one time, but that has nothing to do with what might happen the next time."

Cowboys-Niners matchup pits high-, low-profile coaches

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Few coaches are as different as Jimmy Johnson and George Seifert.

There's even a link between them that demonstrates how different low-profile Seifert vs. high-profile Johnson.

When Bill Walsh stepped down as the San Francisco 49ers' coach after his third Super Bowl in 1989, there were those in the team's front office who suggested a "name" coach might be a fitting successor rather than Seifert, who had diligently worked in Walsh's shadow as secondary coach and defensive coordinator.

The name that was most often heard was Jimmy Johnson, who wound up in Dallas. Now his Cowboys meet Seifert's 49ers on Sunday for the NFC



championship.

Walsh sent Seifert out to interview for a vacancy in Cleveland when the front office rejected Seifert made it as far as the airport in Dallas when he was called back to take the job in San Francisco.

But that's typical of George Seifert, probably the most anonymous successful coach in the NFL.

Despite a 57-13 record, a winning percentage of .814 and the only recent NFL championship in a dozen years, there's still the perception that Walsh coaches the 49ers.

"Do people call me coach Walsh?" he asked this week. "That and a lot of other things."

Nobody calls Jimmy Johnson anything else unless it's "Jerry." It's easy sometimes to forget whether it's Jerry Jones who's the owner and Jimmy Johnson the coach of the Dallas Cowboys; if it's the other way around, it's Jimmy Jones or Jerry Johnson or some other permutation involving the letters "JJ."

In fact, JJs have been all over Johnson's life — he was a high school classmate of the late Janis Joplin in Port Arthur, Texas and Jimmie Jones, who played for him at Miami, is now a defensive lineman for the Cowboys. But unlike George Seifert, people know Jimmy Johnson, who won a

national championship at Miami, then turned around the Cowboys after he and Jones (Jerry, not Jimmie) staged the coup that led to the overthrow of Tom Landry, the only coach America's Team had ever had.

Maybe it's the hair — the carefully

crafted "do" that never jiggles, never bounces.

Actually, it's been seen to move twice — once when Doug Flutie completed the "Hail Mary" pass that dented the Miami Hurricanes in 1983, the second time in New York last season, while he was berating an official from the sideline.

Seifert's trademark — no socks and tights. He's a hoater and fisherman, as much a product of San Francisco, where he grew up, as Johnson, is of his home state of Texas.

'Beautiful' sunshine helps root S.F. sod

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The sun finally shone on Candlestick Park Thursday, and the relief was evident on the faces of NFL officials.

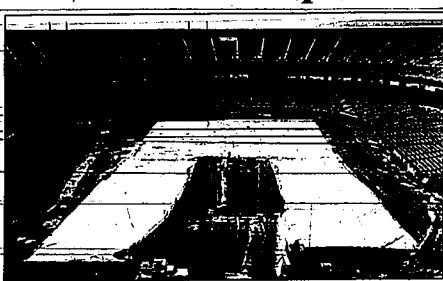
Less than 72 hours before kickoff of Sunday's NFC championship game, groundskeepers rushed to take advantage of a day of sunshine and dry weather and finished tamping 28,000 square feet of new sod on the mushy field. "It's beautiful," NFL grass guru George Toma said. "Right now, I'd say it's the best playing surface in the NFL."

After a day of steady rain Wednesday that all but halted the re-sodding project, the league's turf consultant was able to finish the job he was brought in from Kansas City to do.

"This is great, just great," said Bill Buckley, head groundskeeper at Candlestick. "This is what we needed. If we have a couple of days like

this, the field will dry pretty good."

About 50 workers began work at 7 a.m. to try to catch up on resodding the center portion of the field. The work had been started on Tuesday but was only a quarter of the way completed when drenching rains came on Wednesday.

Crews pumped about 5,000 gallons of the field that day, Buckley said.

"Groundskeepers hope for one more day without rain to allow the field to dry out, but more rain is forecast for late Friday and Saturday. The new turf will be covered with a tarp in case of more wet weather."

The area surrounding the field remains a quagmire, but clay pellets similar to cat litter will be spread around to soak up the excess moisture, Toma said.

The sticky 'stick became the principal sideshow in the circus leading up to the conference championship game. There was talk of bringing in helicopters to clear the field, and the 49ers win Sunday, a local radio station plans to auction off 49 square-foot sections of sod to benefit high school sports and an AIDS project.

"Let's just say we were concerned," NFL spokesman Reggie Roberts said.

NFL officials, clearly displeased with the attention the mire was attracting, spent the week stamping out rumors the game could be moved to another field in the area, such as Stanford Stadium.

Toma, who has solved numerous grass emergencies for the NFL, said he never panicked, even as crews worked round the clock to dry off the field.

"I knew we could do it, because we were under pressure, and everybody knew what had to be done," he said.

Odds makers tab Bills, Niners slight favorites

A decade or so ago, the people who wanted new blood in the Super Bowl would certainly have been rooting for the Bills and 49ers rather than the Cowboys and Dolphins.

This year, they'll be rooting for the "new, old blood" — Miami and Dallas, which spent plenty of time in the '70s playing games with Roman numerals after them.

But the guys who make the odds, like it the other way, assuming the public will go for familiar faces. The Dallas, which spent plenty of time in the '70s playing games with Roman numerals after them.

Payton, Noll, Walsh among Hall of Fame finalists

CANTON, Ohio (AP) — Walter Payton, the NFL's all-time rushing leader, along with coaches Chuck Noll and Bill Walsh, who won a total of seven Super Bowls, head the list of 15 finalists announced Thursday for induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Joining them are offensive linemen Bob Dick, running back Larry Little, Tom Mack, Dick Stanfel and Dwight Stephenson, quarterback Dan Fouts, cornerback Mel Renfro, defensive end Carl Eller, tight ends Jackie Smith and Kellen

Winslow and wide receivers Lynn Swann and Charlie Joiner.

Payton, Fouts, Noll, Stephenson and Winslow were all nominated in their first year of eligibility. The finalists were determined by the hall's 34-member board of selectors. It will meet again Jan. 30 to elect the 1993 induction class.

Payton rushed for more than 1,000 yards in 10 of his 13 seasons with the Chicago Bears. His 16,726 yards and 112 rushing touchdowns are both all-time NFL records. Twice the NFL

player of the year (1977, 1985), the Jackson State product topped 100 yards in rushing 77 times in his career.

Noll led the Pittsburgh Steelers to Super Bowl victories in 1975, 1976, 1979 and 1980 — more than any other NFL franchise. Over his 23-year coaching career, his teams were 209-156-1 including 16-8 in the postseason.

Walsh took over at San Francisco 49ers coach that was 14 the year before and won the Super Bowl in three years. Under Walsh, the 49ers won the Super Bowl in 1982, 1985 and 1989.

Currently the coach at Stanford, Walsh was 102-63-1 in 10 years with the 49ers.

Allies used high-tech weaponry

WASHINGTON — The U.S. and allied aircraft that swept through the skies of southern Iraq on Wednesday night rained laser-guided bombs and HARM anti-radar missiles in a half-hour strike against missile batteries, Pentagon officials said.

Iraq's only response appeared to be a swarm of anti-aircraft fire. My ally planes were reported to be in the four-hour attack, said Marine Gen. Joseph Hoar, the four-star general in charge of the mission.

"A senior Pentagon official said 112 aircraft took part in the raid. "Based on pilot reports, we believe it has been successful," said Hoar, who briefed reporters at Central Command headquarters in Tampa, Fla.

No military official, either at briefings or on background, would estimate the number of missiles or missile batteries destroyed by the strike.

Most said that it would take hours for camera footage of the strikes to reach military analysts and several days to assess the damage.

Jets attacked permanent anti-aircraft missile and radar sites at Tallil, Najaf, Samawah and Amarah in southern Iraq, as well as a number of mobile missile sites near Basra and Nasiriyah, Hoar said.

At the White House, presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the targets involved the surface-to-air missile batteries that had been used to threaten allied aircraft policing Iraq's southern no-fly zone, as well as the batteries "associated infrastructure" — the sites and radars used to control the weapons.

Hoar said he kept in touch with the U.S. commander on the ground, Air Force Maj. Gen. James Record, through an open telephone line throughout the four hours the aircraft were in the sky.

"We kept an open line so we could chat. It was very easy," Hoar said, appearing calm and confident just hours after the mission, which was not given a separate name.

The senior Pentagon official, who spoke on condition he not be identified, said the bulk of the 112 aircraft were U.S. Air Force jets launched from a base at Dhahran in Saudi Arabia, joined by several dozen jets launched from the aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk in the Persian Gulf.

The force included 38 attack aircraft such as F-117 Stealth bombers, F-16s, F-15Es, A-6 bombers, F-18s and British Tornados, the source said. They were accompanied by some 26 U.S. F-15Cs, F-14s, F-18s and French Mirages that served as air defenders and 16 Air Force and Navy jets that attacked Iraqi air defenses, the source added.

A group of 30 tankers, AWACS radar reconaissance aircraft and helicopters rounded out the force, the source said.

The aircraft dropped 2,000-pound smart bombs — the so-called "laser bombs" that produced dramatic direct hits shown on videotape during the Gulf War. In addition, HARM missiles, which flew into their radar site targets by following radar emissions, and free-falling gravity bombs were used in the strike, the source said.

"It was well crafted, a pin-point strike," the source said. "It was designed to send a crystal-clear message."

In comparison to the days and days of air strikes that hit Iraq at the beginning of the Persian Gulf War, the strike appeared limited in scope.

However, Hoar argued with that description, contending it was a complex mission involving more than 100 planes, and that more forces could be used, should Saddam continue his defiant behavior.

A second Pentagon official, also requesting anonymity, said military planners had selected a wide range of options for striking against the military forces of the Iraqi leader.

Tensions with Iraq mounted last week, when Saddam moved the mobile anti-aircraft missiles and the guidance radars into air battle, perhaps at avenge for the Dec. 27 downing of an Iraqi MiG that had entered the zone.

Although there were some 200 allied aircraft in the region, not all used, the official said. Some were kept in reserve in the event additional forces were needed later.

Assessing the mission

Damage includes 1 of 4 anti-aircraft sites; 1 unintended target

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon said Thursday one of the four anti-aircraft batteries attacked by allied warplanes was destroyed and the three others apparently escaped.

"It nonetheless characterized the mission as successful. "The Iraqi southern air defense network is now seriously degraded," said Pete Williams, the Defense Department spokesman. "In our view the operation was a success."

He described the bomb damage as "moderate" and disclosed for the first time that one bomb hit an unintended target. He had no details on the errant bomb.

"It's fair to say that not every single target was hit," Williams said. "But that was never our measure of success." He said the purpose was to "send a signal" to Saddam Hussein that the most able U.S. Security Council ceasefire resolutions.

In addition to the four missile batteries that were fired on, the allied planes targeted four air defense command centers that include radar and communications facilities, Williams said he could not accurately assess the damage to those four sites.

"Major parts of it were hit," he said. As a result, it was "seriously degraded." Williams said the Iraqis moved two of the four missile batteries away from the attack sites after the raid. He said he was not sure whether those two were damaged, but they cannot immediately be used because they are out of formation.

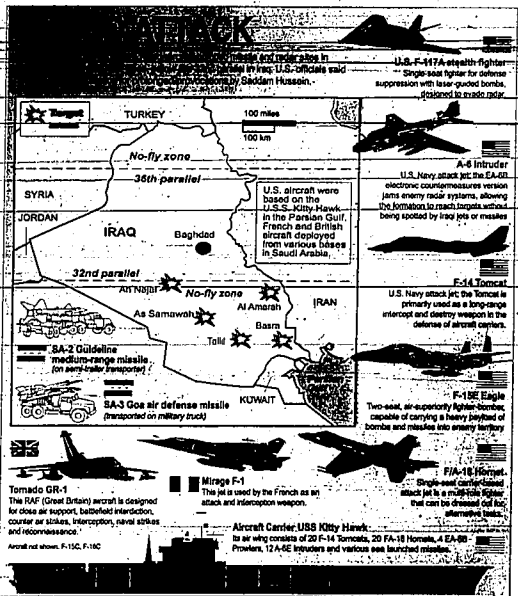
"They are not a threat to coalition aircraft," he said.

He said only one anti-aircraft missile site remained operational Thursday. That one is situated near Basra in extreme southern Iraq. Earlier Thursday, Brent Scowcroft, the national security adviser to President Bush, said "in the neighborhood of half" of the missile sites had been destroyed.

Williams, asked about Scowcroft's remarks, said he could not confirm his estimate. "I don't have a percentage for you," he said. "I don't have a box score for you today."

Williams also disclosed that of the allied bombs that missed their targets, one hit "some kind of structure" that was not supposed to have been bombed. He said he did not know what kind of structure it was or whether any civilians were in or near it.

The spokesman also said the government had no information on any Iraqi casualties.

AWACS spots plane during raid

MANAMA, Bahrain — A U.S. Air Force AWACS plane detected an aircraft bearing down on the 32nd parallel from the north as allied warplanes homed in on their targets in southern Iraq, the AWACS' senior controller said Thursday.

The unidentified interloper turned and fled Wednesday night before reaching the northern edge of a "no fly zone," the attack was mounted to enforce, said Capt. Charley Bouton of Springfield, Va. "We didn't consider it any threat whatsoever," the 32-year-old Gulf War veteran said.

Otherwise, Bouton said in a telephone interview, "We didn't see any aircraft south of the 32nd." That's the line of latitude designated off-limits to Iraqi aircraft by the Gulf War victors to protect Shiite Muslims from alleged persecution by Iraq.

Bouton was in charge of radar controllers in the unarmed Airborne Warning and Control System aircraft, a Boeing 747 converted into a flying radar platform that directed traffic and acted as watchdog for more than 110 U.S., British and French warplanes during the attack.

Experts say Saddam uses raid to his advantage

WASHINGTON — After a successful air raid on southern Iraq by American, British and French warplanes, the allies bragged again of bringing Saddam Hussein to his knees.

But in Baghdad, Saddam stood tall — exhorting his countrymen in a televised appeal to rally around him in "another holy war."

"For not the first time, Saddam bedeviled the West by turning what they hailed as a personal humiliation into a political triumph. "The allied attack may not have the intended effect," said Mary-Jane Deeb, an expert on Middle East affairs at American University. "Domestically, it could rally people around him, and it could strengthen him internally."

Analysis

Even though many Iraqis do not like Saddam or his police-state tactics, they share an ideological bond with him and admire his underdog ability to persevere.

"My guess is this just strengthens him politically... he will cleverly use this to shore up his regime," said Charles William Maynes, editor of the journal Foreign Policy.

"Although there is dislike for his brutal and brutish methods, he has the support still of high-ranking military officials and even middle-level military," said Thomas Ricks, a Middle East expert at Villanova University in Philadelphia. "They would see this (latest attack) as provocative and rally around him again."

Many foreign policy analysts believe that Saddam is crazy like a fox, provoking the

West as a way of shoring up his standing at home.

Deeb suggests that Saddam deliberately aggravated the latest confrontation to divert the attention of Iraqis from their daily struggles with high prices and scarce goods, the result of the continued U.N. economic sanctions against Iraq.

Another unintended effect of Wednesday's allied military action could be a backlash against the West in countries such as Saudi Arabia and Kuwait.

"Too much flexing of military power in the Gulf may, in fact, weaken and undermine the existing pro-Western regimes being challenged by groups such as Islamic fundamentalists," Deeb said. "Military action is often a safety valve for pent-up frustration with regimes like Saddam, but they have unanticipated political repercussions."

A Pentagon official speaking on condition of anonymity said the Air Force was preparing to send more aircraft to Saudi Arabia. It was not immediately known how many more would be sent, or from which bases. The Air Force planes that participated in Wednesday's raid flew from Saudi bases.

Still, officials in both the Bush and Clinton camps expressed cautious optimism that their latest attack on Iraq could erode Saddam's base of power.

The day of the allied raid on southern Iraq, acting Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger called Saddam's recent behavior "insane." And White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater called it "irrational."

A Clinton transition official dealing with national security said, "Frankly, we're hopeful. It would be good for the world, if by this action today, we bring him down by undermining his power base."

"But the allies' cannot ignore Saddam's resilience. After losing a war, portions of his country and much of his military hardware, as well as causing the deaths of thousands of his soldiers and civilians, the Iraqi dictator remains firmly in control."

Man's battle to die brings new, active life

LOS ANGELES — Gary Cole said his role in the CBS' "The Switch" — that of a man paralyzed from the neck down — was a lesson in concentration.

"Obviously, it wasn't something I was used to," said Cole. "I'm used to using my body and body language. This took another focus. But on the other hand it strips away some excess business you might have been into otherwise. It makes you focus totally on the role."

"The Switch" also stars Craig T. Nelson and Beverly D'Angelo. Cole stars as Larry McAfee, who led an active life until a motorcycle accident left him paralyzed and dependent on a ventilator to breathe. In this true story, he feels he has lost all reason to live and sees the state of Georgia to install a switch to cut off his life-support system.

"He was at the mercy of other people 24 hours a day," Cole said. "He can't just get up and leave. McAfee was initially, as are most people with such a severe injury, very angry. He had to depend completely on other people. He didn't feel the care was sufficient. He didn't feel the quality of his life was worth pursuing. He was bitter and angry. Then, he hid more of an acceptance of what had hap-

pened."

McAfee's case later led the Georgia Legislature to enact a program that emboldens paralyzed persons to lead a more active and independent life.

Nelson plays Russ Fine, a radio talk show personality, and Miss-D'Angelo is his wife. DeLoe helped McAfee in his fight for self-determination.

"I spoke on the phone to McAfee at his home in Augusta," Cole said. "But most of the contact I had with people similar to him with the same injury, was at the Veterans Hospital. I trained with Dr. Beaton. He put together the wheel chair like McAfee's, that's operated by 'sip and puff.' It responds to commands when you blow or suck on a tube.

"I spent about six weeks working with the

doctor. I had to simulate McAfee's speech patterns of talking while using the ventilator to breathe. I had a video tape of him talking. I wanted it to look the way it should before we started."

Cole, who starred as the late-night talk show host in the NBC series "Midnight Caller," has just completed a co-starring role with Clint Eastwood in the movie "In the Line of Fire."

Cole plays the head of the White House Secret Service detail in the thriller about a would-be assassin who stalks the President. It is due to be released this summer.

"John Malkovich stalks the president during his re-election campaign," Cole said. "Clint Eastwood is the veteran agent, and I'm the authority figure he has no time for. He was with President Kennedy when he was assassinated, and this is his first assignment on 'The White House' series then."

"Eastwood develops a kind of relationship over the phone with the stalker. He keeps dropping hints to Eastwood where he will be."

Cole studied acting at the Illinois State University, then moved to Chicago where he helped organize the Remains Theatre and became a member of the Steppenwolf Theatre. He said he tries to return at least once a year to do a play.

He played Gen. George A. Custer in the

miniseries "Son of the Morning Star." "That was my introduction to Westerns. I have a whole new admiration for the Western and those who do them. It's not as easy as it looks when you have large animals involved."

He also played Dr. Jeffrey MacDonald in the miniseries "Fatal Vision" and homicide investigator Jack Holtz in the miniseries "Echoes in the Darkness." "TV movies include 'The One Who Left Behind,' 'Vital Signs' and 'The Old Man and the Sea.'"

His next project is a miniseries for CBS called "Love Kills," which is based on a book by Ben Greene called "The Soldier of Fortune Murders."

"I play John Hearn, who placed an ad in Soldier of Fortune magazine saying he was available for high risk assignments," Cole said. "Apparently people had placed ads in the magazine for questionable activity. As a result of Hearn's ad he committed three murders."

Cole said he is not anxious to get back to the rigorous schedule of a series. "It's too soon after 'Midnight Caller,'" he said. "But it's an opportunity to have a nice business to work with the same people over a period of time. That's a nice situation."

"The Switch" will air Sunday at 8 p.m. MST on CBS.

Hip, young actors support LaBelle in 'Out All Night'

"Out All Night" is generally perceived as a sitcom vehicle for multi-award-winning song-stresser Patti LaBelle. But just as integral to the show's success is the cast of hip young actors who support her.

Foremost among them is Morris Chestnut, who plays Jeff Carswell, the business-minded apprentice to the club singer-turned-nightclub-owner Chelsea Eaige (LaBelle).

Chestnut often plays the straight man to some of the show's more unorthodox characters — including the smooth-talking hip-hop king Vidal Thomas (Duane Martin), Chelsea's daughter, Chanisse (Vivica A. Fox), and Jeff and Vidal's Bush neighbor, Angus (Simon O'Brien). But when the situation requires it, Chestnut displays a keen comedic sense, made more effective by its departure from his usual serious demeanor.

In fact, there is a great sense of camaraderie among the actors and crew. "Everyone has a good time," Chestnut says, "and the writers are pretty open with us. At the end of the day, we sit down with them and discuss the scripts and talk about problems or ideas we had, then they work with us to get it all straightened out. They really give us a lot of freedom, which is nice."

One of the things Chestnut most enjoys about being on "Out All Night" is working with LaBelle. "Patti is a beautiful person, a real down-to-earth person," he says. "She sets the tone for the whole show."

Chestnut also believes that "Out All Night" offers a positive image of contemporary African-Americans. "As you can see on our show, we have a lot of positive people — Vivica Fox's character, Duane-Martin's character. We all have college degrees." Patti's character owns the nightclub and even owns the apartment building where they live. It's a good show for young kids to watch.

Chestnut's commitments extended beyond his involvement with "Out All Night." He participated in the "Boyz n the Hood Increase

the Peace Tour," in which he and his co-stars from the hit-1992 film "Saved!—high schools—and talked one-on-one with the students about life experiences."

Critics singled Chestnut out for special praise in "Boyz n the Hood" for his portrayal of an inner-city teen struggling to escape the gang violence of South Central Los Angeles, trying to complete his education and hoping to raise a family.

Since Chestnut was born in the area where the film takes place, he feels a special bond to the local kids and thinks it is important to "let them know that they're just like us and I can do anything they want to." Even though the tour is over, Chestnut still likes to meet and encourage inner-city youths when he has the opportunity.

On Sunday, Jan. 17, Chestnut can also be seen in the starring role of a new movie for The Disney Channel, "The Ernest Green Story." He portrays the first black man to graduate from an integrated high school in Little Rock, Ark., in 1958.

Chestnut hopes to continue being a positive force by moving behind the camera as a producer. "There are a lot of topics I'd like to cover, a lot of issues I'd like to address through television or theatrical films," he says.

"Out All Night" airs Thursdays at 7 p.m. MST on NBC.

TV's inaugural events

You've opted not to stand with the crowd along Pennsylvania Avenue, and your invitations to the concerts and balls apparently were lost in the mail.

Well, watching on television is not quite the same as being there, but for millions, it will be the way they see President-elect Bill Clinton's inaugural festivities. The pre-inaugural gala, the ceremony itself and the parade will all be televised, along with visits to the inaugural balls.

The two-hour inaugural gala, "An American Reunion," on Tuesday night sets the tone for the festivities when Barbara Streisand heads up the cast of hundreds at the Capital Center (CBS). Gary Smith and Clinton pals Harry Thompson and Linda Bloodworth-Thomson are executive producers.

Two weeks before the gala, Smith's guest list also included Quincy Jones, Judy Collins, the Eagles, Fleetwood Mac, Chuck Berry, Rickie Lee Jones, Dennis Moore, Herbie Hancock, Chuck Berry, Lita Ford. There's also Elton John, Bill Cosby, James Earl Jones, Jack Lemmon, the Alvin Ailey Dancers, Wynton Marsalis and Aretha Franklin singing "A Whole New World" backed by the District of Columbia's Eastern High School Choir.

On Wednesday both "CBS This Morning" and NBC's "Today" will be on the air in the morning with inauguration ceremonies for three hours. CBS continues to cover the inaugural events, but on Tuesday morning, takes an hour break and comes back to cover the parade for

two hours. NBC plans continuous coverage during the day. That night NBC and CBS will air hour-long wrap-ups. NBC also plans a special Sunday night following the ceremonies from Arkansas to Washington.

ABC covers the inauguration for three hours, takes a break for "All My Children," then returns to parade coverage for two hours.

Spanish-language Univision covers the inaugural for two hours.

Jim Lehrer and Robert MacNeil will head PBS coverage for four hours. There are also related specials, including Hocking Carter's "Frontline" look at the Clinton transition and administration, Tuesday night, Paul Duke's "The Changing of the Guard" (Tuesday night), and John Chancellor's "The Presidency: The Light Side" (Wednesday night).

On cable, CNN begins continuous coverage Wednesday morning, staying on for the parade. Susan Rook hosts an hour special last night from one of several inaugural balls.

C-SPAN will carry the Clinton visit to Thomas Jefferson's Monticello Sunday, and the president-elect's inauguration at the Lincoln Memorial. A C-SPAN spokesperson said 14 cameras will follow Clinton around town Monday and Tuesday. Wednesday, C-SPAN covers the inauguration ceremony and the parade. They will follow coverage of inaugural balls also is covered.

MTV will cover its own rock-oriented ball Wednesday night at the D.C. Convention Center, live, for an hour and a half.

Disney Channel offers "The Presidential Inaugural Celebration for Children," with Markie Post, and another celebration for Youth, which starts at 5 p.m. Tuesday from the Kennedy Center, both free on cable.

Steinem makes TV movie about redemption

NEW YORK — 'Anybody knows that a made-for-TV movie should be about a scandal, Amy Fisher, a celebrity, Amy Fisher, a disease, Amy Fisher or ... Amy Fisher.

'Too often, these flicks are hardly about anything, except about two hours.'

In her first venture as an executive producer, Gloria Steinem has tried to break the pattern with "Better Off Dead," which premiered last week on the Lifetime cable network (subsequent broadcasts are scheduled for January 19, 23, 25 and 28).

Better being about two hours, "Better Off Dead" is about two very different women: a contemptuous cop-killer and the ambitious attorney who puts her on death row, then, years later, works to save her from the execution chamber.

The film displays impressive acting from Tyra Ferrell ("Boyz n the Hood") and especially from Marc Wonningshagen (of such worthy TV films as "Helen Keller: The Miracle Continues" and "Love is Never Silent"), whose radiant ordinariness gives an air of honesty to everything she does.

"Better Off Dead" was created through a new partnership between Rosilyn Heller, an independent producer, and her longtime friend Steinem, who presumably needs no introduction.

"It's the first of our films to get finished — amazing!" says a grateful Steinem at her Upper East Side apartment a couple of weeks ago.

Dressed casually in blouse and slacks, her hair pulled back in a ponytail, she looks less the film impresario than the writer and activist she's best known as. But this latest role she takes just as seriously.

"The general idea," she says, "is to put real life on television in a meaningful way."

"Better Off Dead" gets a good start on that by twisting the usual stereotypes: Here you find a black woman attorney, a white woman inmate.

Meanwhile, the film grapples with a range of social issues including racism, abortion rights and, most compellingly, the death-penalty debate.

The death penalty is a part of real life about which we have many illusions," Steinem says, "so we need to really look at it.

'What too few people understand is that capital punishment has no impact on cutting down crime, and that there's considerable evidence that it does the reverse: encourages crime.'

'Worse, it is administered in such a way that the system waits until the person is rehabilitated. Then the sentence is finally carried out.'

This is a central irony of Steinem's film. "It is largely about redemption," she says. "These two women redeem each other. But what that means to you and what it means to me depends on our particular lives, and it's not simple."

Indeed, it is seldom that a film comes along where, after its first few minutes, its audience can't guess where the story is headed and often beat the actors getting there. That is not the case in "Better Off Dead," which avoids the cookie-cutter approach of, say, a certain trio-of-films-about-TV-feminist cookie, Amy Fisher.

"Well, if you want to get something on television," says Steinem, summing up that phenomenon with a knowing laugh, "your chance is greatly increased by making the woman either bad or a victim."

Besides her film activity, Steinem continues as editorial consultant and writer for Ms magazine, which she co-founded. And she still reigns as a leader in the women's movement.

She finds no tension between activism and art. Both, she insists, are about truth-telling.

"Of course, there's a point at which, if you're an activist, you may feel pressures not to admit ambiguity even when it's there. But you have to resist those pressures, because, after all, not to admit the ambiguity makes you a bad activist as well as a bad artist — you're telling people that something is simpler than it really is."

It's flagrant oversimplifying, often at the expense of women, that inspires Steinem's efforts to bring true stories to the screen.

"If I watch the movie 'The Right Stuff' for instance, nowhere does it tell me what I already know, which is that there were 12 women astronauts in John Glenn's class. They were wiped out of both the film and the book."

"I would love to do a film about those women. I want to make visible what is invisible."

Source confirms move for Letterman to CBS

NEW YORK — David Letterman, aceable star of NBC's "Late Night With David Letterman," apparently will be moving to CBS with a salary of \$14-million-a-year, leaving rival Jay Leno secure as host of "The Tonight Show."

A source close to the networks' negotiations on Wednesday confirmed a Los Angeles Times story saying Letterman would move to CBS. NBC Entertainment President Warren Littlefield was expected to make the formal announcement, with Leno at his side, at a news conference Thursday in Los Angeles.

CBS officials would neither confirm nor deny the report, but the network was expected to schedule a news conference of its own Thursday.

CBS has been courting Letterman ever since NBC passed him over in favor of Leno as Johnny Carson's successor.

After fighting continually hard to hold him, had until today to match or top CBS's salary offer and give Letterman the 11:30 p.m. EST time slot, he had demanded and received from CBS. To note that demand,

NBC would have been forced to dump Leno.

It remains to be seen how many CBS affiliate stations would schedule a Letterman show at 11:30. Mick Shaubach, president of the CBS affiliate board, said that if the network offers at least 45 minutes of advertising time for local sale in the first half-hour of a new Letterman show, even affiliates now running lucrative syndicated fare in the time slot are likely to welcome him.

"I think stations will realize that Letterman is a winner in late night and will bring welcome demographics," Shaubach said. "He's going to be a very formidable force for late-night audiences against Leno, Arsenio (Hall) and 'Nightline.'"

Shaubach said that because of the months-long blitz of news coverage given to Letterman's possible defection, he should score higher ratings for CBS from the outset than he is pulling now for NBC and easily top those garnered by "Crime Time After Prime Time," a package of programs that CBS now offers at 11:30 p.m.

"Can you imagine what it would cost to generate this kind of publicity for David Letterman?" Shaubach said. "That's going to rub off on ratings."

ABC names new vice president

"World News Tonight's" executive producer helped guide it from third to first place in the network news ratings.

Friedman will report to news division president Roone Arledge.

The announcement Tuesday signaled the first step in a long-rumored restructuring of "ABC News," which is attempting to trim expenses and personnel in the face of recession-flattened revenues.

Other announcements concerning a reorganized management structure will follow soon, Arledge said in a prepared statement.

While reducing staff, ABC News is increasing its output. In March the division launches "Day One," its third prime-time magazine, with Forest Sawyer as host. A fourth magazine series is in development.

Network president unapologetic for reality TV trend

SANTA MONICA, Calif. — Networks will unabashedly offer reality-based TV as long as viewers show an appetite for dramatizations of such stories as the Amy Fisher saga, ABC's president said.

"What is happening in our world has become entertainment," Robert Iger told reporters earlier this week at a preview of the network's new programs.

He defended television's treatment of sensational crimes. All three networks recently broadcast movies about Fisher, the New York teen-ager who shot her alleged lover's wife.

ABC's "The Amy Fisher Story," which aired Jan. 3, was the highest rated of the three, with the audience estimated as 18.2 million homes—up from third for the week.

"I'm not embarrassed by ABC's involvement with Amy Fisher. I wasn't embarrassed by pursuing it. We pursued it on our watch," said Iger, who was ABC's programming chief until his Jan. 1 promotion.

He was asked if the network has a responsibility to offer loftier shows.

"It's really an interesting chicken and egg situation. Do we tell the viewer what they should watch, or do we give the viewer what

they want to watch? It's a little of both," he said.

Iger said he believed there would be a "saturation point" for reality-based TV, and said

ABC was trying to offer original TV movies as well as true-life dramas.

TV newsmagazines are another booming example of viewers' thirst for fact-based shows, he said. The network plans to enlarge the pack with a new entry, "Day One," scheduled to debut in March with host Forrest Sawyer.

The network already broadcasts "Prime-Time Live" and "20/20."

Shows take toll on drama

Dramas appear to be taking the heaviest hit as viewers switch to news programs, ABC executives said.

"It has been a bad year for the one-hour drama on ABC," Iger said.

Two critically acclaimed but low-rated series, "Homefront" and "Civil Wars," are on hiatus.

New programming head Ted Harber said he wants to give "Homefront" a second chance by airing remaining episodes in early spring.

The failure of "Civil Wars" to win a wider audience despite critical acclaim makes the news unlikelier.

Another series on hold, "The Young Indiana Jones Chronicles," will return in March,

as will "Life Goes On," he said. Chances for the latter's renewal are slim, Harber said.

TV is going to Extras, from the successful "Northern Exposure" team of Joshua Brand and John Falsely, will air through January. A decision on its future won't be made until spring, but the ratings have been disappointing, the executives said.

Three new sitcoms are waiting for air dates: "Home Free" with Matthew Perry and Diana Canova; "White Lie" starring Doug E. Doug and "Getting By" with Cindy Williams and Thelma Hopkins.

"Jack's Place," an hour-long series starring Hal Linden as a musician turned restaurateur, returns from hiatus setting in at 9 p.m. EST Thursdays.

Preceding it is the Andy Griffith series "Mudpie," snatched up by ABC after being canceled by NBC.

ABC also announced the "Billy Gray Cyrus Special—Dreams Come True," airing Feb. 17.

Oliver Stone is executive producer of "Wild Palms," a six-hour drama set in Los Angeles in the near future and described as a mind-bending mixture of horrifying drama, deep-end realism and hallucinatory soap opera.

It is planned for broadcast in the spring.

Is 'Law & Order' the best show in the universe? Maybe

NEW YORK — There is no finer series on television than "Law & Order."

If you are already a fan, feel free to skip the rest of this column and get about your business.

Others, however, are urged to press on and learn why the show, which airs Wednesdays at 9 p.m. MST on K3BAS and KIFI, deserves your attention.

As you may have noticed over the past 40-odd years, TV doesn't readily chart new territory. Nor do viewers eagerly embrace innovation. Both sides heed the sacred pact of television: Safety first.

But every so often, a program speaks to the audience in a new tongue and, no less remarkably, the audience comes out of its stupor and signs on (anybody remember "Hill Street Blues"?)

Another breakthrough series now in its third season, "Law & Order" has its own way of walking and talking, and it has carried a loyal following.

But you newcomers be advised: The show requires a little getting used to, especially for the chronic channel-zapper with an itchy trigger finger always flipping for the usual.

This isn't it.

You might figure that when you see a black screen slowly yielding the "Law & Order" logo as a voice notes that "in the criminal justice system, the people are represented by two separate and equally important groups — the police who investigate crime and the district attorneys who prosecute the offenders. These are their stories."

Then you hear: "BEE-bing!" Or is it "BAH-boong!" or maybe "BEEB-ong!"? Anyway, there's a

pungent little hiccupping sound, and the show is off and running.

With "Law & Order's" two-tiered format, the first half of each hour is spent looking for the bad guy, the second half hauling the accused into court. That's a lot to get done and the pacing is brisk, ever hell-for-leather, with a hand-held camera chasing the action strikingly filmed on location all over New York City.

The crimes seem inspired by the headlines of the New York Post at its most unsettling. There's a gang rape at a frat house. An arsonist kills dozens of revelers in a Harlem dance club. A black civil rights leader is gunned down after a rousing speech.

But any headline-like clarity is missing in how each case unfolds and is rapidly resolved. Itself, or sometimes doesn't, by the final fadeout.

Each story is complex, tripping out, step by somber step, with a seeming randomness more like real life than drama. There are precious few certainties here. It's not that kind of world, not that kind of city.

The writing is masterful. The dialogue, and there's lots of it, zings.

"Look, I can handle it," says Detective Mike Logan (Chris Noth), pressing his captain for news of when his temporary partner will be out of his hair. "I just wanna know for how long."

"I wanta know how long is my mother-in-law gonna live with us," Cagney (Dann Florek) fires back. "I don't know, but I'm learning to enjoy her pot roast."

—Of course, Logan's former-sidekick, Cerreta, will not be coming

back. Shot down in recent episode, he was last seen in a moving, farewell performance by Paul Sorvino, who is left in the series. Meanwhile, Jerry Orbach will stay on as Logan's weasly new partner, Lennie Briscoe. These changes make it a good time to catch up with "Law & Order" and meet this revamped cast, as well as any series ever boasted, also including Michael Montanary, Richard Brooks, Steven Hill and Carolyn McCormick.

Like the city and the legal system that are "Law & Order's" real

stars, the characters—these actors play are tough—and righteous, weary but full of stubborn hope.

"Law & Order" is disturbing but ultimately uplifting drama. And engrossing entertainment.

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'Deep Space Nine' goes big-budget on special effects

In "Star Trek: Deep Space Nine," the new spin-off of the spin-off of the Gene Roddenberry secular-humanist space opera, the United Federation of Planets is still earnestly at work trying to organize one big happy universe.

With Roddenberry creative heirs Rick Berman and Michael Piller in charge, there are also the usual small comfort elements that push Trekkers in Alpha state.

You have your gently bleeping electronics; silly crypto-pseudo-science ("another neutrino disruption"), beautiful alien bodies in tight flight suits ("those Bajorans are really stacked," my viewing-companion observed), and your mildly-pointy-headed-philosophical speculating ("Are we reduced to changing metaphors to solve this?").

What makes "DS9" a new wrinkle in the TV time/space continuum, even though it takes place in the very same galaxy as "Star Trek: The Next Generation" is that it will not be full of creatures so emotionally and spiritually evolved they can make you sick.

These neurotic life forms will suffer. They will do it, if the visu-

ally spectacular premiere is any guide, more noisily than they were used to when Roddenberry ran his quiet ship.

Don't call a big meal before you tune in. You'll need to be alert to keep this dense two-hour intro, to a whole new sector of night, especially since you'll be distracted by all the "Star Wars"-ish big-budget special effects.

The old Trek stories worked mostly on two levels: the philosophical and the gadget. As in how will all the futuristic hardware and mind-melding and so on at our command get us out of tonight's morality-based jam? In addition to the new sci-fi and techno lingo, "DS9" gives heavy psycho/conflict plot.

Essentially what we have here are a bunch of creatures stuck out on the frontier in "Deep Space Nine," a truck of junk space station parked hard-by-the-planet Bajor. DS9 was trashed by the bad guy Cardassians, who simp-minded Bajorans really and who?

The Cardassians have just given up their 60-year occupation of devastated Bajor (shades of Eastern Europe). The Federation has sent in Commander Benjamin

Sisko (Avery Brooks), the Shrike-spearman actor who played Paul Robeson on Broadway) to shore up the shaky Bajoran provisional government in hope of preventing civil war.

Sisko has a lot of baggage. He's a single parent still brooding about his wife, who was killed three years before in an attack on a Federation ship launched by Jean-Luc Picard, commander of "TNG's" Enterprise.

Though it was hardly Picard's fault, since he was surgically altered by hostile aliens at the time, Sisko still carries a grudge. He makes this clear in the opening scenes of "DS9," when Patrick Stewart, in a guest appearance as Picard, lays out his new mission.

Sisko, as Star Trek's first African-American No. 1, must cope with the series' first female Officer—hard—and wein-nosed Major Kira (Nina Gold), a former Bajoran freedom-fighter—resentful of Federation interference—with her plianter's affairs.

Not to mention Quark, the Ferengi overboss of the space station's gambling, booze and computerized brothel operations, whom Sisko is hoping to turn into a sort of Rotarian civic leader. Quark—as a delinquent nephew—

Nog, who will be a bad influence on Sisko's son, Jake.

Then there's the young medical officer who has the nose for the Spock equivalent. He doesn't yet know that the object of his affections is a 300-year-old blob of a girl who is merely hanging out in the body of a shapely 28-year-old female human.

Colm Meaney, the Irish actor who plays Miles O'Brien, is the only "TNG" cast member to get a permanent transfer to "DS9." In this one he's still the cheery, freckle-faced heir to Scotty—the

engineer, but he's been given a wife unhappy about having abandoned her career for his.

The physical adventure part has Sisko charging off in one of the station's three two-person runabouts to find the Bajorans' sacred temple before the Cardassians do.

In the process, he makes the presence of the tunnel that will propel the rest of the series. He gets lost in the first stiable worm hole ever found on "Star Trek." Which is to say "a tunnel in the fabric of space," that never collapses or anything like the ones found in previous shows, enabling all manner of space wildlife to travel to "DS9" and pose dilemmas.

The psycho part has Sisko trapped in the worm hole, explaining the meaning of human life to the shade of his dead wife and what baseball has to do with it, an apparition of his son.

You should watch 'I'll Fly Away' because it's terrific television

Only on prime-time broadcast network TV can a piece of work be considered a failure if no more than eight or 10 million households tune in.

But that's how the system works, and by traditional ratings standards, there's no question NBC's "I'll Fly Away" has failed. There are probably folks at NBC who think the network's old program test patterns during that time slot, on the theory that the number of people who fall asleep with the set turned to NBC would be about the same as the viewership of "I'll Fly Away."

This is the reason "I'll Fly Away" hovers on the brink of execution, and it's not an uncommon situation—dozens of times every year, TV shows die for lack of ratings, and two dozen actors and actresses are unemployed in a field where almost everyone is almost always unemployed. It doesn't cause a big ripple, except for those one or two shows every year that are actually pretty good and don't deserve to die.

"I'll Fly Away" is that kind of show. It's terrific. It's also in more trouble than the spotted owl. Owned by a rare act of TV corporate kindness has it lived to see the Clinton administration, and then just barely. The Feb. 5 show will be its last

of the season and maybe forever, unless its ratings make the biggest comeback since Buffalo over Houston.

Right now it's a long shot, for which NBC is taking some heat. But while NBC has made mistakes with the show, NBC also bought it in the first place. The problem now is that NBC is hurting so bad it can't afford to carry an "I'll Fly Away" when it once could do "S. Elshewer." These days NBC needs hits, not kind words from the quality-TV crowd.

The irony is that "I'll Fly Away" is a sort of PBS show, beautifully acted, subtly scripted and duller than Al Gore. It revolves around authentic people in a tough, edgy time and place—the Deep South of the late '50s—and it gives them no neat and easy escapes.

A year and a half ago, "I'll Fly Away" started with two intriguing and complex characters: Sam Waterston's Forrest Bedford, a Southern district attorney, and Regina Taylor's Lilly, whom he hires as housekeeper/cook/maid.

Forrest can stand up to klansmen. Lonesome can save an off-fair, refuse Lilly a small raise and alienate his teen-age son, Nathan.

Lilly's life plays out a little differently. It took her a full show to

register to vote, a striking reminder that not long ago this simple act required surpassing courage; she isn't just a symbol, she gets up and makes her way through every day. In a beautifully sub-parallel, she has the same star-crossed love life as Forrest.

Where the show sets itself apart, however, is the richness of even seemingly minor characters. Nathan's best pal, at first a redneck wannabe, becomes more complex when his girlfriend gets up pregnant; he backs out of marrying her and she charges him with rape. Lilly's father, at first a demanding nuisance, has become a checkmate for common sense.

While "I'll Fly Away" has incorporated violence, sex and a few soap-ish elements, no doubt with an eye on "marketability," it has done so with almost never a false step. In a medium where the surface laugh is trump, "I'll Fly Away" peels back ambivalence to find doubt, weighs what we want to do against what we should do, and shows us what happens after we choose.

It's splendid work, splendid television, and if it gets enough viewer votes from now through Feb. 5, it just might be back. Hold that thought.

"I'll Fly Away" airs at 9 p.m. MST on NBC.

CBS gives 'Brooklyn Bridge' another chance

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — The critically acclaimed but low-rated TV series "Brooklyn Bridge" will be given a second chance because of a grassroots campaign by viewers, CBS Entertainment President Jeff Sagansky said.

The series' based producer Gary David Goldberg's experiences growing up in a middle-class Jewish family in Brooklyn in the 1950s, has been off the schedule

since early November. Its seven remaining episodes will be rescheduled in a strong time slot this spring, Sagansky told reporters Monday. If it does well, he would consider scheduling the series in the fall.

"Absolutely," Sagansky said. "Personally, it would give me no greater satisfaction than to renew that show."

The network received 6,000 letters supporting the series.
