Anti-gay initiative aims at 'homosexual agenda'

BOISE — Backers of Measure 9, last year's failed anti-gay rights initiative in Oregon, unveiled an Idaho version on the Statehouse steps Thursday, setting off what is sure to be a contentious 20-month campaign for and against the proposal.

The initiative, which seeks to bar state and local government from extending civil rights protection to gays and lesbians, was filed with the secretary of state's office by the Idaho Citizens Alliance, a offshoot of the Oregon Citizens Alliance that sponsored Measure 9.

OCA founder and chairman Lon Mabon and ICA Chairman Kelly Walton of Heyburn, a former vice-chairman of the Oregon organization, said they have budgeted \$300,000 to place the initiative on Idaho's 1994 ballot and get it passed.

"Idahoans, this is your opportunity to join in the wave of the future as the conservative majority in this wonderful nation begins to take back America for traditional values," Mabon said.

He introduced Walton as "a man with whom I have had the privilege to work with in this effort to preserve our heritage."

Walton said the initiative is intended to prevent homosexuals from gaining what he and Mabon called "special rights" or "minority status" under Idaho's human-rights laws.

It would, among other things, forbid any state or local law or regulation making homosexuality "the legal or social equivalent of race, color, religion, gender, age, national origin, marriage, or family," and ban hiring quotas or affirmative action programs targeted at gays and lesbians.

"We feel a man sleeping with a man or a woman sleeping with a woman does not warrant minority status," Walton said, adding that gaining minority status is just one item in "the homosexual agenda."

The initiative would also:

- Prohibit public schools from teaching or counseling students that homosexuality is a healthy, acceptable lifestyle.
- Bar agencies of state and local governments from spending any public money to "sanction or express approval of homosexuality."
- Require public libraries to limit access to "adult materials which address homosexuality" to adults.

Brian Bergquist, chairman of Idahoans for Human Dignity, denied that gays are seeking affirmative action or quota programs.

FBI nabs bombing suspect

NEW YORK — A man described as a follower of a radical Muslim cleric was arrested Thursday in last week's World Trade Center bombing. He was taken into custody when he coolly tried a third time to reclaim a rental deposit on the van determined to have housed the bomb.

Other suspects were being sought in what prosecutor Gilmore Chaires called "the single most destructive act of terrorism ever committed on American soil." The motive remained unclear.

"This investigation clearly is not finished, but a large first step has been taken," James Fox, FBI chief in New York, said at a news briefing Thursday night.

Mohammed A. Salameh, 25, was charged with aiding and abetting the bombing and a fire that followed, and with transportation of explosives across state lines. The Jersey City, N.J., resident was ordered held without bail and faces life in prison if convicted. A hearing was set for March 18.

The arrest was a sudden, major break in the most notorious U.S. bombing in years. Just a day earlier, the FBI had said it could take months to crack the case.

The van Salameh rented was the one that carried the bomb, FBI Agent Thomas G. Donlon said in an affidavit filed with the court. Charred fragments of the Ford Econoline E-350 van — including an axle with a traceable identification number — were recovered at the blast site.

The affidavit also said a search of a Jersey City apartment with a bomb-sniffing dog turned up bomb-making equipment including wiring and manuals on circuitry and electromagnetic devices. On the rental agreement Salameh had given the identification number for that apartment; it wasn't immediately clear whether he lived there.

Salameh, in federal court in New York City on Thursday night, appeared relaxed as an interpreter read the charges to him in Arabic. "Why?" he asked his attorney repeatedly. The court-appointed defense lawyer, Robert Precht, asked unsuccessfully that bail be set at \$5 million.

Papers that the suspect presented the rental agency several days ago were covered with nitrites, a government source, speaking on condition of anonymity, told The Associated Press. Nitrites are found in some explosives; traces of nitrites were found at the blast site.

The arrest came after an army of investigators spent the past week combing through piles of rubble at the blast site, fielding thousands of phone calls and pursuing scores of leads. Detectives systematically checked garbage payment slips and viewed videotapes of entering vehicles.

The suspect had rented the van from a Ryder truck agent in Jersey City on Feb. 23 and returned less than two hours after the explosion Friday afternoon to say it had been stolen from him in Jersey City, said Paul Masciella, a car dealer who shares space with the Ryder agent.

The man wanted his \$400 cash deposit back but was told he would need a police report of the theft, Masciella said. He said the suspect returned Monday without the police report and again was turned away.

On Thursday morning, the man called the Ryder office — and spoke with an FBI agent posing as a Ryder official, said Patrick Galasso, the truck rental agent.

"He didn't have a clue as to what was going on," Galasso said. "He thought he was talking to a Ryder rep."

Koresh has captive congregation

WACO, Texas — David Koresh, the "Doomsday prophet besieged on a Texas hilltop, has found a new, captive congregation to preach to: FBI agents.

Koresh is reading long chapters from the Book of Revelation over the telephone to a Wesley flock of women who must hang on his every word. For obvious reasons.

Both sides are discussing the Bible. Koresh because he wants to, the FBI because they have to. At least five and possibly up to 18 people were shot to death on this Sunday.

"There are long discussions regarding religion. There are long readings of the Scriptures," FBI spokesman Jeffrey Jamar said.

Three teams of negotiators were dealing with Koresh, and telephone contact lasts about 18 hours daily, Jamar said. Koresh promised to surrender Tuesday, once a 58-minute sermon on the meaning of the Seven Seals of the Apocalypse was transmitted over the Christian Broadcasting Network. Afterward he reneged, saying that God "told him to wait."

Koresh says he is awaiting further instructions from God.

In the back of many minds here is the fact that Koresh, who has proclaimed himself a latter-day Jesus Christ, is 32 years old. Christ died, aged 33, on Good Friday.

Today is Friday. Though FBI and Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agents say they are prepared to wait as long as it takes to assure that Koresh and his followers surrender peacefully, there is the fear, spoken aloud, that the whole thing may end even more horribly than it began Sunday morning, when four ATF agents and an estimated 14 cult members shot each other to death during a botched raid on Koresh's stronghold.

Thursday afternoon, washed by brilliant sunshine and cold breezes, the headquarters of the Branch-Davidian sect, which Koresh heads, glittered from afar, atop "Mount Carmel," tiny and white.

One nameless corpse clutched an assault rifle. Please see SIEGE/A2

President signs jobless benefits extension measure

WASHINGTON — President Clinton signed a \$5.7-billion emergency jobless benefits bill Thursday that was rushed through Congress to avoid a cutoff of assistance.

The measure also imposes a pay freeze on Congress.

The House voted 247-156 to approve the scraps of the bill relating to extended unemployment benefits. A separate 403-0 vote adopted the Senate-added language on the pay freeze.

The House had passed the measure on Wednesday. Idaho's congressmen, Republican Mike Crapo and Democrat Larry LaRocco, voted for the pay freeze but split on the jobless benefits extension. LaRocco voted for it, Crapo against.

"With this bill becoming law, 1.5 million unemployed Americans who need help making the rent and buying groceries and paying for school clothes will receive it," Clinton said as he signed into law the first piece of his economic revival plan.

"In the end, what we have to do is extend jobs and not unemployment," Clinton said. "That is our next great test."

The measure extends through Oct. 2 a program that gives jobless Americans up to another six months of assistance once

they've exhausted their standard 26 weeks of benefits.

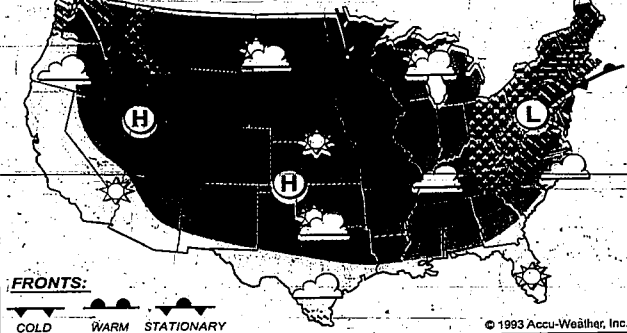
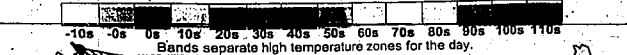
Without the extension, the program would have expired at midnight Saturday. The pay freeze will keep lawmakers' salaries at \$133,600 a year. The provision was overwhelmingly endorsed by both chambers so lawmakers can "show that they're going first" on a sacrifice, said House Speaker Dan Rostenkowski.

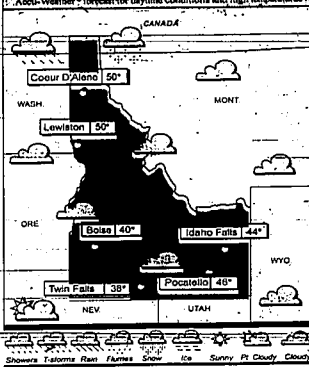

Weather summary

Rain for the north while the Boise Valley warms up. The frontal system that moved into Idaho Thursday morning brought rain and snow to the north while fog and smoke persisted beneath inversions over much of the south.

Some mixing of the air mass over the southwest gave the Boise area a break from freezing temperatures and some of the fog and smoke problems of late. Wind gusts to 30 mph were reported at Lewiston during the afternoon.

Another surge of moisture Thursday night was expected to bring snow to the north central mountains with rain elsewhere in the north. The south remains dry but with persistent fog in many areas.

Skies over the Magic Valley were partly cloudy above the fog and haze. Temperatures moderated into the 30s and 40s. Winds remained light.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 54 degrees at Riggin. Stanley, Soda Springs, Bear Lake and Spencer reported the coldest at 4 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 86 degrees at Thermal, Calif. The lowest was 22 degrees below zero at Pinal, Ariz.

Rain, snow, wind batter East; new storm soaks Northwest

An intense low pressure system spread heavy rain and high winds across parts of the East on Thursday, causing extensive lowland flooding and threatening heavy snow from Ohio into New England.

Another storm soaked the Northwest.

A cold front stretching across the Pacific Northwest produced snow and freezing rain across parts of Oregon and Washington.

Overnight lows below zero were confined to northeastern Utah, western Wyoming, Colorado's Gunnison Valley and northwest Platteau, and northern Maine.

A large area of rain blanketed the middle Atlantic Coast states during the afternoon with a mixture of rain and sleet moving into parts of the northern Atlantic states, the National Weather Service said. Rain and snow fell over parts of the Ohio Valley.

Heavy rain was reported over sections of Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia.

Minor flooding from up to 2 inches of rain closed roads and schools across West Virginia and 67 mph wind tore roofs from Preston County homes and businesses.

Ice and up to 6 inches of snow caused traffic problems at higher elevations of West Virginia, the weather service said. About 4,000 Monongahela Power Co. customers were without electrical service Thursday in the northern part of the state, said spokesman Russ Lorince.

Between 2 and 3 inches of rain fell overnight over much of Virginia with 3 to 4 inches over the west-central part of the state. Dozens of secondary roads were closed throughout the state.

High wind along the Virginia coast almost tore an empty 1,000-foot tanker from its moorings on the Elizabeth River, but the Coast Guard said tugs secured it in time.

Wind blew at more than 60 mph through the Chesapeake region, ripping roofs from buildings and downing trees and power lines, and up to six inches of snow fell on parts of western Maryland. Utilities reported 75,000 people were without power in Maryland during the afternoon.

Along the coast, the storm's high wind combined with higher-than-normal tide to produce high surf and beach erosion from Virginia north to New York's Long Island.

Heavy rain and flooding also were reported over parts of the lower Ohio Valley.

was seen Wednesday from a helicopter in a ravine about 350 yards from the compound and was removed by police in two Bradley armored personnel carriers at 12:20 p.m. Thursday. The body, presumably that of a cult member, was taken to Fort Worth for an autopsy.

A local television station glimpsed two cult members dragging a heavy burden outside the compound at 4 p.m. Thursday and loading it on a pickup truck. It was impossible to determine what they were dragging.

Another child was released from the compound Thursday morning. On Wednesday, a box of 12 German Shepherd puppies was sent out. A total of 20 children have been set free from the compound since the siege began Sunday, but an estimated 47 men, 43 women and 19 children remain inside with Koresh.

Former cult members find it disturbing that Koresh is releasing none of his own children, whom he began openly following the example of the biblical King Solomon, on a harem of wives who abandoned their husbands at Koresh's command.

Marc Breault, a former follower of Koresh, told the Waco Tribune-Herald that the winning out of the children, between those sired by Koresh and those who were not, could be a grim omen.

"By releasing these children, I believe he's saying that the children are not worth sacrificing. Only the righteous ones are worth sacrificing," Breault said. "The adults are worth sacrificing because they've been converted. By sacrificing I mean becoming martyrs."

The self-styled second Messiah and his followers have been beleaguered in their compound for five days.

What benefits bill provides

The provisions of the unemployment benefits bill sent to President Clinton on Thursday:

- Costs about \$5.7 billion.
- Extends the program previously set to expire at midnight Saturday, through Oct. 2.
- Permits unemployed workers who have exhausted their standard 26 weeks of benefits to be eligible for additional benefits.

The jobless could get 20 or 26 additional weeks, depending on the unemployment level in their state.

Under current unemployment levels only the states of Alaska, California, Oregon, Rhode Island, Washington and West Virginia, as well as Puerto Rico, have jobless rates high enough to qualify for the additional 26 weeks. The rest of the states would qualify for 20 additional weeks.

not plan to increase their payrolls this year.

Both chambers, the jobless complained that the Republican extension was a \$5.7 billion run-up in the deficit and Congress need to start taking a pay-as-you-go approach.

The pay freeze is in line with Clinton's call for a one-year freeze in the cost-of-living increases for federal workers. Under the bill, Congress won't get its scheduled 2.1 percent cost-of-living increase to \$136,405 at the start of next year.

The House vote was unanimous on the pay freeze, except three lawmakers abstained, including Rep. John Boehner, R-Ohio, who argued that it is unconstitutional for Congress to change its pay scale before facing re-election. He was joined by Rep. Neal Smith, D-Iowa, and Craig Washington, D-Texas.

grants.

"To be honest, the only person I've heard talking about a 'homosexual agenda' is Kelly Walton," he said. "I've never heard of it until he came to the state."

Referring to a sign carried by an ICA member that read "Equal rights not special rights," Bergquist said, "We agree with that 100 percent."

But the rights that he and lesbians seek, he said, include the right not to be fired from a job or evicted from one's apartment for being homosexual.

About 100 protesters — many wearing black armbands carrying signs and wearing buttons with slogans like "I'm straight but not narrow," stood behind Walton and Mabon as they talked with reporters.

They remained silent as their two antagonists spoke, but broke into several choruses of "This Land is Your Land" after Walton and Mabon left to file the initiative.

One of the singers, state Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey, called the initiative "the beginning of a hate campaign that we don't need."

The problems in this state are so enormous — funding our schools, environmental problems, keeping nuclear waste out of — that we ought to be pulling together, not splitting apart into little groups," said Peavey, who is considering running for governor next year.

Peavey compared the ICA initiative to Oregon's Measure 9, saying "the language is cleared up somewhat, but the campaign is going to be double ugly."

Attorney General Larry Echohawk's office now has 10 business days to review the proposed initiative and suggest changes. The ICA, though, can accept or reject any of those amendments.

"After the initiative is put into final form, Echohawk's office will give it an official short title and description, and the secretary of state will place it on a petition form. The ICA then will have until the end of the 1994 balloting to gather 32,061 registered voters.

Walton said 800 people have already volunteered to circulate the petitions, and expressed confidence that the measure would gain a spot on the 1994 ballot.

But he said he won't file petitions until the July 1994 deadline in order to collect as many signatures as possible. The ICA's goal, he said, is 100,000 signatures.

Actress Hepburn enters hospital

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Hospitalized Katharine Hepburn was admitted Thursday for exhaustion, a family member said.

The 85-year-old actress will spend a few days in Hartford Hospital, said Edwynth Grant, Hepburn's publicist.

Hepburn arrived about 5 p.m. by car and was admitted to a private room, said hospital spokesman James Battaglia. He said she will undergo some tests.

Diana visits lepers

KATMANDU, Nepal (AP) — Princess Diana toured a leprosy hospital Thursday, sitting on patients' beds and holding their hands.

The British princess, who is on her first trip abroad since separating from her husband Prince Charles in December, spent an hour visiting patients in the Anandah Leprosy Hospital on the southern edge of Katmandu Valley.

Diana is a patron of Leprosy Mission International, London-based city agency that runs the 110-bed Anandah hospital.

Hospitals should offer AIDS testing

WASHINGTON — Hospitals with sizeable AIDS caseloads should offer voluntary HIV testing to every patient they admit or treat in emergency rooms, the government recommended Thursday.

Under new guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, voluntary testing for the deadly virus would be routine in about 600 hospitals — 11 percent — primarily in urban areas hit hardest by the epidemic.

The test results would be kept confidential and people could not be denied care because they refused to take the test.

Meanwhile, the Department of Health and Human Services announced the availability of a toll-free hotline for doctors and other health care professionals to call with questions about treating patients with HIV infection or AIDS.

The number — 1-800-933-3413 — is staffed from 10:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. EST, Monday through Friday, by a physician, a pharmacist or nurse practitioner at San Francisco General Hospital.

Congress may ease taxes on domestics

WASHINGTON — Congress is preparing to ease the Social Security tax burden on households that employ domestics. But major relief for families with the "Zoe Baird problem" is unlikely because it could jeopardize retirement and medical benefits for workers.

Baird is the corporate lawyer whose nomination to be attorney general was withdrawn after disclosures that she had failed to pay Social Security taxes for her maid and chauffeur, who were illegal aliens. The Internal Revenue Service told Congress on Thursday that Baird was one among millions who have flouted this law.

A family now must pay Social Security and Medicare taxes on a domestic's wages every three months once those wages exceed \$50 a quarter — a figure unchanged since 1950. There is strong support in Congress for raising the minimum covered wage to \$300 a year and allowing employers to pay once a year with their own annual income tax return.

Photographers: Copyright law unfair

WASHINGTON — U.S. copyright law is unfair to photographers, who lack the time and resources to register the copyrights of thousands of pictures they may take in a year, a panel of professional photographers told Congress on Thursday.

A photographer can produce more copyrightable work in one day than most authors produce in their life. Richard Weisgrau, executive director of the American Association of Media Photographers, told a House subcommittee. "In 1981, I created 300,000 images, of which more than 35,000 were published. ... How could I register them?"

Even doing "bulk registrations" of copyrights — that is, submitting a videotape of hundreds of pictures as one registration — does not solve the problem, he said.

Weisgrau voiced strong support for a bill that would eliminate the requirement to register copyrights in order to be able to sue for damages and attorney's fees if a copyright is infringed.

White supremacist enters hospital

JACKSON, Miss. — A self-proclaimed white supremacist who is awaiting a third trial in the 1963 slaying of civil rights activist Medgar Evers is hospitalized for an undisclosed ailment.

Bryan Lee Beckwith, 72, was taken to the Veterans Administration Medical Center on Wednesday, hospital associate director Dick Baltz confirmed.

"He came in for treatment. We are really still determining his condition," Baltz said. He wouldn't discuss the nature of Beckwith's illness, citing patient privacy rules.

Capital Hill smoking could be banned

WASHINGTON — Three congressmen launched an effort Thursday to ban smoking on Capitol Hill, saying at least 76 colleagues support them.

"It's time to put an end to the image of smoke-filled rooms once and for all," Rep. Dick Durbin, D-Ill., told a news conference.

Durbin, who was behind the ban on smoking aboard airlines, said he polled the 435-member House and received 109 responses, including 76 in favor of an all-out ban.

He said 28 favored smoking only in designated areas, while five lawmakers wrote in other responses.

Study: Immune cells kill colon cancer

WASHINGTON — Human immune cells linked with special antibodies have turned into biological smart bombs that target and kill colon cancer cells, according to researchers who tested the technique in mice.

Dr. Hiroshi Takahashi of Massachusetts General Hospital Cancer Center in Charlestown, Mass., said Thursday that although the method has been tested only in mice, it could develop into a powerful new therapy for human cancers.

A report on the study was to be published Friday in the journal Science.

Takahashi said the technique uses powerful killer cells that are present in the human immune system.

The cells, called lymphokine-activated killer cells, or LAK, have been shown to be extremely toxic to colon cancer tumors in test tube experiments. In clinical trials with patients, however, Takahashi said the LAK cells mount only a weak attack on the cancer.

Campaigns cost candidates \$678 million

WASHINGTON — House and Senate candidates spent a record \$678 million on their 1992 election campaigns, 52 percent more than they spent for 1990 elections, the Federal Election Commission said Thursday.

That means candidates spent nearly \$6.49 for each of the 104.5 million votes cast in November.

The agency attributed the jump to an unusually high number of retiring House members, redistricting, two high profile and expensive Senate races in California and special Senate elections in Pennsylvania and North Dakota.

One hundred eight representatives and 13 senators left the 102nd Congress, either by choice or after defeats in primaries or the general election.

The previous spending record was recorded in 1988, when candidates spent a total of \$459 million. The FEC said 1,792 people ran for congressional seats in that year, 1,164 fewer than in the 2,956 who ran last year.

From Jan. 1, 1991, to Dec. 31, 1992, Senate and House campaign committees raised \$659 million, 40 percent more than they raised by the 1990 elections, the FEC said. Last year's candidates reported \$60 million in year-end cash balances.

White House spurns AMA

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House spurned a bid Thursday by the powerful American Medical Association for a seat at its health care planning deliberations.

The doctors signaled a willingness to entertain changes, but not strict controls on what they charge.

"We know that the status quo must go," AMA Executive Director James S. Todd said in letters to the White House and leaders of Congress.

The 290,000-member organization has helped to block national health insurance since the Truman administration. But Todd wrote Ira Magaziner, the White House adviser who oversees hundreds of experts working on health care, "Bring us into the process, and we can help make it work."

The appeal fell on deaf ears. White House Press Secretary Dee Dee Myers said neither the AMA nor any other interest groups will be allowed to join Clinton's health work groups. "It would be a conflict of interest," she said.

But she said the administration was "encouraged by their willingness to look seriously at some of the president's proposals."

George Stephanopoulos, the White House communications director, said there already are doctors in the working groups in an individual capacity, and Clinton officials have met several times with AMA leaders, including a private session with Magaziner last week.

Hillary Rodham Clinton, who chairs the task force, said Wednesday it will "take a lot of public support to bear back the powerful lobbies and special interests that are already lining up to defeat any plan we develop."

Todd, in a telephone interview from AMA headquarters in Chicago, responded to Thursday's rebuff from the White House. "We hope that it's not a totally closed operation."

This is not an effort to go in and scuttle the activity. It's trying to make it more effective and more likely to be acceptable to the American people," he said.

In his letter, Todd expressed the AMA's willingness to accept shared "sacrifice" and negotiate health care spending goals.

But "strict global budgets and price controls are unwise and unworkable," he said. "We strongly support fair managed competition rather than government-imposed price controls."

He voiced support for community-wide insurance ratings which are designed to lower premiums, a federally set minimum benefits package and a mandate on employers to provide insurance, all likely to be part of Clinton's plan.

Clinton favors controlling costs and covering everyone through what Myers called "managed competition and a global budget."

Managed competition means steering people into big groups that would encourage doctors and hospitals to band together to compete for their business.

Train offers commuter service across flooded Arizona river

TAGNA, Ariz. (AP) — It's a strange sight in the Arizona desert: more than 70 bleary-eyed commuters waiting near cattle pens for the 7:42 across the Gila River.

Unlike other commuter train stops, no briefcases, pinstriped suits or Wall Street Journals are visible. And the ride is free.

The Southern Pacific Transportation Co. is running Arizona's only rail commuter service — a six-mile, 18-minute emergency shuttle across the flood-swollen river. No bridges are open to road traffic along a 90-mile stretch of the river from Gila Bend to the Colorado River near Yuma.

Short of a 120-mile, 2½-hour drive or hitching a plane or helicopter ride, the train is the only way to get from Interstate 8 south of the river to the north side, and the flood-isolated community of Roll in the Mohawk Valley.

If there were no commuter service, "I'd have to draw unemployment," tractor driver Stanley "Buck" Clayton said Thursday.

"I've been here 22 years. I've seen some wet river, but I've never seen anything like this."

He lives near Wellton but works north of the Gila. The flooding has inundated about 18,000 acres of farmland and up to 50 homes. It's expected to last at least a month longer.

Forget about stations. This train runs from a spur line at the McElhenny feedlot near Tagna to a siding near Roll.

The flood has cut some 80 dirt-causeway crossings of the normally dry Gila and has closed all nine bridges to normal traffic.

When it became clear the rail bridge would withstand the flood, the Southern Pacific, normally a freight line, assembled a short train with two boxcars for support

and two cars for passengers. The train was set up in cooperation with the Wellton-Mohawk Irrigation and Drainage District, which encompasses farms along 50 miles of the Gila.

Passengers are mostly dike-building crews for the district, but the train also is open to National Guard troops and other emergency workers, said David Wickersham, a district engineer for the railroad.

"It wasn't really our intent to make a daily service for farmers, but they show up and you can't say no," Wickersham said, adding that some evacuees also have used the train.

Wickersham said the railroad was trying to arrange to transport students from Roll to Antelope Union High School in Wellton.

"We're real happy to be able to do it," he said. "We felt it was good for our interest to do this."

Pizza, briefings mark siege of sect

WACO, Texas (AP) — Like a medieval army laying siege to a castle, authorities are settling in for a long haul outside the Branch Davidians compound.

But instead of catapults and battering rams, the weapons of this siege are decidedly modern, including portable toilets, pizza and twice-a-day news briefings.

"Things have settled into a routine," said Jeff Jamar, the FBI official heading operations around the sect's heavily fortified compound near Waco.

That routine includes 12-hour shifts of agents surrounding the cluster of tan buildings huddled on a rise of Texas prairie. Wellington sect members have been holed up since a deadly shootout with federal agents.

While duty near the compound is dangerous — four agents were killed and 16 wounded Sunday — it's not without amenities. Pickups bearing

containers of steaming pizzas drive into the security area surrounding the Mount Carmel compound several times a day.

"It's getting so regular it's like we should be punching time clocks," said one agent as he returned to his hotel after spending the day in the field. He declined to identify himself.

Little happened to change the routine Thursday, the fifth day of the standoff between federal authorities and the more than 100 followers of David Koresh, the 33-year-old sect leader who claims to be Jesus.

Speaking at a news conference, Jamar said Koresh had released two boys, aged 11 and 12, in the last 24 hours. That makes a total of 20 children and two elderly women released from the compound since Sunday.

Jamar said the body of an unidentified man was recovered Thursday in a wooded area 300 yards from the compound. He had a pistol in his hand and

died of gunshot wounds. At least two more of Koresh's followers were killed Sunday; there have been reports that from seven to 10 others died in the shootout.

Intelligence surveillance indicates the sect members have returned to their regular routine, with the estimated 47 women handling housekeeping and child care while the remaining men do construction work. The compound is believed to be well-stocked with food and water.

Koresh had promised to bring out his followers after a 58-minute recorded statement was broadcast by radio stations Tuesday. He later reneged on his pledge, telling negotiators he was waiting for further instructions from God.

Since then, federal authorities have dug in for a long siege. While negotiators talk with Koresh on the phone, armed personnel carriers prow the compound's perimeter.

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Agencies suggest drivers pay by mile

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Drivers would pay for each mile they travel under a plan proposed by California transit agencies to help pay the costs of federal regulations and increased demand.

A report by the California Transit Association recommends a fee of one-fifth of a cent per mile, or about \$24 a year for a modest driver, 12,000 miles annually.

The money would be used to reimburse transit agencies that are facing a projected \$4.1 billion deficit by the year 2000, the report said.

The fee would be enforced by checking mileage when cars are in for their mandatory spring checks every two years, the report said.

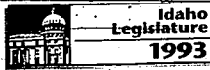

Hopes to build education slush fund evaporate

BOISE (AP) — The bubble burst Thursday on the Republican campaign to hold the line on non-education spending so more general tax revenue can be pumped into state aid for schools.



After snatching other budgets to build up a \$2.85 billion slush fund for school aid, budget writers were warned by a legislative analyst that their projected spending target for welfare programs did not include \$3.1 million to accommodate increased demand for Aid to Families With Dependent Children.

Although only an estimate of the anticipated rise in the program's caseload, similar estimates have been extremely accurate in the past. And since those eligible are entitled to the benefits, the state has no choice but to pay them.

An analyst said the multimillion-dollar obligation was dropped from

budget writers' blueprint to keep spending within the \$1.08 billion in anticipated tax receipts because it simply didn't fit.

Covering that increase will more than wipe out the slush fund and leave Republicans with an overall budget plan that would not require any increased taxes, as Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus has proposed. But it also will include as much as \$27 million less in state education support than Andrus recommended.

That problem came on the heels of the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee's setting the budget for legislative operations \$561,000 above its target, with the additional money to be diverted from education support.

But GOP leaders quickly promised to push legislation that would cut at least \$400,000 from a perpetual legislative appropriation to reflect the fact that the size of the Legislature was cut by 21 members last year. And budget writers continued chipping away at other non-education budgets to create as much breathing room as possible for public schools and colleges.

They voted along party lines to shave nearly \$600,000 from the budget for the new women's prison in Boscawen, delaying the opening of that facility from mid-October as Andrus proposed to December.

But those savings were eroded by spending on other Corrections Department facilities and programs that exceeded the targets by more than \$300,000. That included approval for the hiring of seven new parole officers and additional parole commission hearings as the state tries to

cope with prison crowding.

But even at that, Sen. Mark Rieks, R-Rexburg, said, "there's no question that this is a tight budget. We're trying to hold things down."

In Veterans Services, budget writers followed the governor's recommendation for staffing the new Veterans Home in Lewiston, trimming the agency's request by about \$20,000. Unless the agency can scrounge up the extra money from another source, the opening of the facility will be pushed back from January to April 1994.

Senate GOP reverses self, backs pension plan

BOISE (AP) — Senate Republicans reversed themselves Thursday and endorsed a House-passed state employee salary package that includes a disputed plan to improve pensions for state and local government workers.

The plan, which includes a 2-percent pay raise for state workers, won unanimous approval from the Senate Commerce and Human Resources Committee within two hours of the closed-door caucus that resulted in the about-face.

Senate President-Pro Tem Jerry Twigg, who was among those changing his mind to support the package, speculated that the plan would win final legislative approval in the Senate with more than 20 votes.

Just two days earlier, GOP Caucus Chairman

David Kerrick said the package was doomed because an overwhelming number of Republican senators were concerned about its financial impact on local governments.

But despite intense lobbying against the retirement improvement by some local officials, the caucus reversed itself after meeting with state pension system director Alan Winkle behind closed doors at midday Thursday.

The decision renewed optimism that the session can wind up in less than 22 weeks. Lawmakers had been advised the rejection of the package could add a week or more to the session. The pay raise, which applies only to state workers and public school teachers, will cost about \$18.4 million in general tax receipts and

another \$4 million to \$5 million in federal and other funds.

The pension improvement, the second part of a four-phase program, would cost the state about \$1.6 million in general tax revenues for its own workers and another \$3 million for school teachers.

But it also affects employees of local governments that have voluntarily chosen to become part of the system. Opponents say the cost to property taxpayers would total \$120 million over a decade once all four phases are in place. But retirement system officials put that cost at around \$80 million, and they contend that natural growth in local revenues will run 60 percent to 70 percent more than that.

Bill seeks larger fine for not wearing seat belt

BOISE (AP) — Idahoans would get hit with a larger fine for driving without a seat-belt under a bill being considered by the state Legislature.

The measure would increase the fine from \$5 to \$33.50. It also would shut loopholes allowing some children to legally ride in cars without being in car seats.

Supporters argue the bill, in the House Transportation Committee, will save lives. "The importance of seat-belts can't be understated," said Idaho State Police Col. Ron Moore, whose agency backs the legislation sponsored by the Idaho State Police Troopers Association.

But not everyone thinks it's a great idea. A Boise man said he believes higher fines won't make non-wearers buckle up.

"I don't think the fine makes that much difference because they think they can get away with it," said Don Wilson, 53, an ardent belt wearer.

Advocates for the new law contend it will work because it not only increases fines, but also allows po-

lice to stop drivers who aren't wearing a seat-belt.

Currently, Idaho law allows an officer to fine a person for not wearing a seat-belt only if the driver has been stopped for some other violation.

For children, the new law would require all passengers younger than four or weighing less than 40 pounds to be in car seats, even if they aren't the driver's children. The current law only applies to the driver's children.

Also, the new law closes a loophole allowing drivers to get out of being cited for not having a child in a car seat if they take the seat to court.

There's certainly room for improvement in the state's buckle-up rate.

Among six Northwest states, Idaho ranks above only Utah in seat-belt usage with 53 percent to 50 percent, Washington — which is attempting to pass a primary law this year — is highest at 73 percent, while Oregon, which already has a primary law in effect, is at 72 percent. Idaho's goal is to have 70 percent usage, Col. Moore said.

Official: Commission needed major changes

BOISE (AP) — Betty Richardson said on Thursday that the Idaho Industrial Commission needed some major changes when she was appointed two years ago.

"I needed a kick in the pants, quite frankly," Richardson told the House Revenue and Taxation Committee.

She told committee members, considering a tax increase to generate more operating revenue for the agency, that she and newly appointed Commissioner Jim Kemps are pursuing the changes aggressively.

There are only two people now serving on the three-member commission that supervises workmen's compensation and rehabilitation cases. Paul Larson resigned recently and his replacement, State Sen. Herb Carlson, R-Engle, won't join the panel until after the legislative session.

Revenue and Taxation is working on legislation that would boost the number of members to five. The workmen's compensation insurance, Industrial Commission Director Gary Stivers said it would boost the tax

from 2 percent to 3 percent, although an insurance industry lobbyist contended it actually would go from 3.7 percent to 4.7 percent.

Phil Barber, an insurance company lobbyist, said the premium tax increase, which would generate \$2.2 million per year, could make it difficult to compete in the Idaho market.

Committee members wanted to know what the public would get for the extra money.

Stivers presented a report showing

the agency has been spending more than it has been receiving in recent years, wiping out a reserve fund that was \$3.8 million in 1990.

Without new revenue, he said the Industrial Commission will be \$443,000 in the red in the budget year starting July 1.

Increasing the premium tax by 0.5 percent will keep the agency from running a deficit until 1996, Stivers said, and an increase of 0.75 percent will provide a solid funding base until 2000.

BLM sponsors mustang adoption April 30, May 1

IDAHO FALLS — About 50 head of mustangs will be offered to the public for adoption on April 30 and May 1.

The wild horses are 5 years old or less and come in a full range of colors. Adoption cost is \$125 per horse. After one year, people who adopted the mustangs may apply for title. Once titles are granted, they can take possession of the horses.

"The horses have to be treated humanely and cannot be used for a commercial purpose," said Tommy Gooch, district range specialist for the Bureau of Land Management in Idaho Falls.

available at any BLM office. Gooch said. To file an application, send it to the BLM District Office, 940 Lincoln Road, Idaho Falls, 83401.

Gooch said those who apply first will get first choice. "We'll just hold the applications here until they show up at the adoption," he said. "People also can submit an application at the adoption."

The mustangs will be adopted from the fairgrounds in Idaho Falls. For more information, call the BLM office at 542-7503 or 831-8201.

No advance payment is necessary, Gooch said. "The money only changes hands when they get a horse," he said.

Probe focuses on Medicaid referrals

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare is investigating how Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center refers Medicaid patients to at-home after-care providers.

Health and Welfare has received at least one complaint that the Idaho Falls hospital has been referring patients to its own provider, Home Health Services, spokesman Ann Kirkwood said.

"We've had concerns phoned in to us," she said Thursday. Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center does not handle many Medicaid referrals, so the investigation clinched further comment.

Hospital spokesman Frank McGovern said he was unaware of the probe. "We have not been informed of anything," he said.

Home health agencies such as Home Health Services provide treatment by licensed medical professionals, including physical therapists or registered nurses, to people who have been discharged from a hospital but need some help with their recovery.

Although doctors prescribe the treatment, hospitals usually have staff to help patients arrange the services. Medicaid regulations do not forbid a hospital from providing home health services or mentioning its own agencies as long as patients make the selection on their own, Kirkwood said.

"The hospital can't step on that freedom of choice," she said.

Teacher faces felony charges

PRESTON (AP) — A former Preston school teacher facing felony charges of lewd contact and sexual abuse of a child will be bound over to district court for arraignment, a judge has ruled.

Steven M. Kissinger, 38, of Idaho Falls, appeared before Franklin County Magistrate Court Judge Lowell D. Cassiday Wednesday for preliminary hearing on three counts each of lewd contact and

sexual abuse of a minor under 16. He is to appear before 6th District Court Judge Wallace M. Trautman in late April for arraignment, said Franklin County Prosecuting Attorney Jay McKenzie.

Kissinger is charged with crimes involving a female minor who Kissinger was a teacher at Jefferson Middle School in Preston. The crimes allegedly occurred in March and April 1991.

Potlatch Corp. Western Wood official resigns

LEWISTON (AP) — Marlin Clausner Jr., Potlatch Corp.'s vice president of the Western Wood Products Division since 1988, has resigned.

Clausner, who is based at Lewiston, told his supervisors in San Francisco late last week he would be leaving. Potlatch spokesman Michael Sullivan said Wednesday.

"It's a shock to everyone and the company, from the top down," Sullivan said.

Clausner was in San Francisco Wednesday meeting with his supervisors to help determine the company's next step.

Clausner, 51, is looking at a change and different alternatives for his future and has no intention of discussing his reasons for leaving at this time, Sullivan said.

"He is certainly not leaving under any cloud at all," he said.

Hagerman limits softball tournament teams

HAGERMAN — There will be more softball tournaments in Hagerman this summer, but there will be fewer teams to disrupt the town.

The City Council this week approved use of the city park for six three-day weekends for softball tournaments this summer. Last year, there were four.

Complaints from local residents, city officials asked tournament organizers Dave Smider and Mike Miller to limit the number of teams at each event to 24.

"In the past, there's been too many teams invited, and the town's been totally flooded with softball players," Councilman Lyle Cornelison said.

"Two years ago, they had 42 teams at one tournament," he said. "They had to divert Wendell to play. That's ridiculous."

Last year, local residents complained about, excessive noise all night, property trespassing on their private property and other problems from the huge influx of people.

Twin Falls residents probe, peer at, pick over city's comprehensive plans

TWIN FALLS — A trail from Rock Creek Canyon to the Snake River. A system of bicycle trails throughout the city.

Affordable housing spread throughout the community. A new name for South Park. A special zoning district for the College of Southern Idaho.

Alternative routes to using Blue Lakes Boulevard North.

More than a year's work on the city comprehensive plan and master street plan went on display Thursday at an open house at CSI. The object was to acquaint city residents with the draft plans and to find out how they feel about the proposals.

The open house attracted a steady crowd throughout the afternoon and evening. Many people answered a questionnaire regarding their choice of ways to alleviate traffic on Blue Lakes.

Bryan Roberts of Twin Falls suggested a solution: build another bridge across the Snake River Canyon to route traffic directly under U.S. Highway 93 to Jackpot.

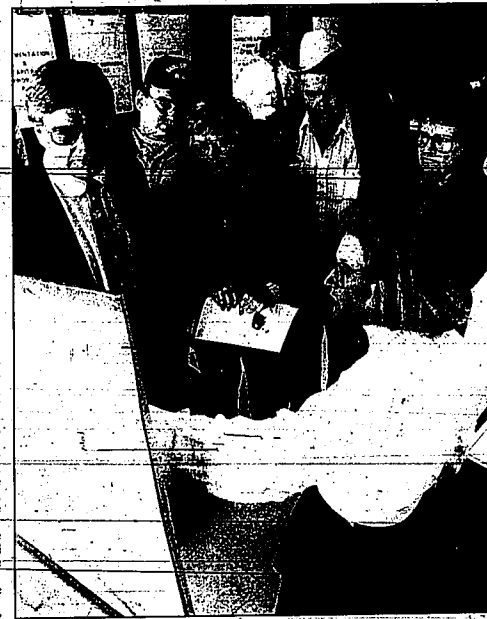
"The problem is right here," he said, pointing on a map to the Perrine Bridge. "When the bridge coming to Twin Falls tunnels off the bridge to Blue Lakes, he said. Building another bridge across the canyon, possibly at Grandview Drive, would relieve the traffic strain on the Perrine and Blue Lakes, Roberts said."

With the President Clinton's promise to rebuild the infrastructure, now would be a good time to propose the bridge, he said.

Other residents' concerns were a little more immediate. Fillmore Street resident Robyn Liney used the occasion to gather signatures for a petition to keep Fillmore from being widened and "extended." Extending the street to Pole Line Road is being considered, along with extending Locust Street, but the city has not decided yet what to do.

Argyros Jr. arrested for pretending to be officer

HAILEY — The son of former Seattle Mariners owner George Argyros pleaded innocent Thursday to a felony charge of impersonating a police officer.

George Argyros Jr., 28, of Newport Beach, Calif., was arrested Wednesday night after a motorist told police a man carrying a badge forced him to stop on U.S. Highway 75 between Ketchum and Hailey, Blaine County deputy prosecutor Doug Nelson said.

After spending the night in jail, Argyros posted \$1,000 bond and was released, Nelson said. A preliminary hearing will be set within three weeks.

Argyros also was cited for reckless driving.

Lee Fieguth of Ketchum told investigators he was using the passing lane to go around a truck when another vehicle moved up behind him with horn blaring and headlights flashing, Nelson said.

The other vehicle pulled alongside, into the opposing traffic lane, and the driver flashed a badge, according to Fieguth. Once the two were past the truck, the other vehicle pulled in front of Fieguth and forced him to stop, Nelson said.

The driver then came back to Fieguth and showed his badge again, threatening to arrest him, Nelson said. Argyros was arrested after police checked the license plate number on the vehicle.

Argyros owns a badge because he is a consultant for a sheriff's department in California, Nelson said. His father lives in Sun Valley.

The felony charge carries a minimum two-year sentence, but Nelson said he probably will reduce the charge to unlawful detention, a misdemeanor.

Anti-gay initiative's impact could be felt far, wide

BOISE — At first glance, the differences between last year's Measure 9 in Oregon and the initiative filed Thursday by the Idaho Citizens Alliance are striking.

Absent are the references linking homosexuality with pedophilia, sadism and masochism. Missing is the directive to schools and public agencies to officially discourage homosexuality and give no aid to those who have a sexual identity that is "abnormal, wrong, unnatural, and perverse."

Analysis

However, backers and opponents of the ICA's initiative agree that the basic intent is the same as that of Measure 9: to prevent gays and lesbians from gaining status as protected minorities under the civil rights laws.

Just what that means, though, is strongly debated.

ICA members like Leslie Hofstetter of Jerome say it means forestalling any attempt to establish hiring quotas or affirmative action programs for homosexuals. Opponents, like University of Idaho law professor Liz Brandt, say it would open the door to legal discrimination against gays in areas like housing and employment.

For Hofstetter, a 30-year-old mother of four, the issue comes down to protecting her children.

"I'm exercising my equal rights to oppose a political agenda that I don't agree with," said Hofstetter, who with her husband Donald are Jerome County coordinators for the ICA.

"What they (homosexuals) do in their bedrooms is their business," she said.

What the Idaho Civil Rights Act says

The text of the proposed Idaho Civil Rights Act:

Be enacted by the people of the state of Idaho

Prohibits extension of legal minority status based on homosexual behavior. No agency, department or political subdivision of the state of Idaho shall enact or adopt any law, statute, ordinance, regulation, resolution, rule, order, agreement or policy which has the purpose or effect of establishing homosexuality as the legal or social equivalent of race, color, religion, gender, age, national origin, marriage or family or that otherwise extends minority status, affirmative action, quotas, special class status or any other categorical provision or similar concept which includes or is based on homosexuality.

Prohibits the sanctioning of homosexual behavior by public educational institutions. Public educational institutions shall not counsel, advise, instruct or teach students, employees or children that homosexuality is a healthy or acceptable lifestyle, and shall not sanction or express approval of homosexuality. This section shall not prohibit government from providing positive guidance to persons experiencing difficulty with sexual identity.

Prohibits government entities of the state of Idaho from using public funds to sanction homosexual behavior. Government agencies, departments and political subdivisions of the state of Idaho shall not expend any public funds to sanction or express approval of homosexuality.

This section shall not encourage, advise, instruct or teach any employee or citizen that homosexuality is a healthy or acceptable lifestyle; and shall not in any way sanction or express approval of homosexuality.

This section shall not prohibit government from providing positive guidance toward persons experiencing difficulty with sexual identity.

Services and protections shall be equal for all citizens. (The previous sections) shall not be construed to deny any citizen, based on per-

ceived or actual private sexual practices, any governmental services, licenses or approvals otherwise due or available.

Library standards. (The previous sections) shall not be construed to prohibit public libraries from providing adult materials which address homosexuality, provided access to such materials is strictly limited to adults.

All civil and constitutional rights protected. (The previous sections) shall not nullify or be construed to nullify any existing civil rights protections based on race, color, religion, gender, age, national origin, marriage or family, or that otherwise diminish the holding, enjoyment or exercise of any rights guaranteed to citizens by the Constitution or the laws of Idaho or the Constitution of the United States of America.

Adoption of provisions on employment decisions. (The previous sections) shall not be construed to forbid the adoption of the provisions prohibiting employment decisions based on factors not directly related to employment. If such a provision is adopted, it is the intent of the people that private sexual behavior, or rumor, perception, or knowledge of a person's private sexual behavior, are factors not directly related to employment. If such a provision is adopted, it is the intent of the people that personal expressions, conversation or any other form of expression concerning private sexual behavior shall also be considered factors not directly related to employment, unless such actions disrupt the workplace.

Serviceability and effectiveness. It shall be considered that it is the intent of the people in enacting (the previous sections) that no part thereof is held unconstitutional. The remaining parts shall be held in full force and effect. These sections shall be in full and complete effect upon approval and shall preempt any conflicting charter, ordinance, rule or policy adopted or attempted by county, city, municipal corporation or other public body in this state.

"The Hofstetters moved to Jerome from Burns, Ore., last June," Leslie Hofstetter said they weren't members of the Oregon Citizens Alliance, the group that backed Measure 9.

"They had about the same initiative in Oregon, but we didn't get involved with that because we assumed it was going to pass," she said.

Hofstetter said she supports the ICA initiative because it would ban quotas for gays and lesbians and prevent schools from teaching that homosexuality is an acceptable lifestyle.

But Brandt, a family law professor who also is president of the Idaho chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union, said the initiative would do a lot more than that.

Depending on how courts interpret the proposed law, Brandt said, "it's potentially incredibly broad."

For example, she said, a provision bar-

ring state and local governments from spending any public money to "sanction or express approval of homosexuality" might prevent governments from hiring people they knew to be gay, since that could be construed as sanctioning or approving homosexuality.

That would be the case despite another section that seems to permit policies that protect gays from employment discrimination. Brandt said the two provisions con-

Boise firm wants out of school bid

TWIN FALLS — A week after the Twin Falls School Board accepted the bid of a Boise contractor, that was \$500,000 lower than projected, the company wants out because of a \$163,000 gap.

"We have a mess," Superintendent Terrell Donicht said.

The board accepted a \$24.6 million bid from Scott Hedrick Construction to build a classroom addition to Robert Stuart Junior High School and classrooms and a working gym at Twin Falls High School.

The district had projected that the buildings would cost \$3 million.

Hedrick informed the board this week that a mistake was made in the electrical subcontractor's estimate for this high school and asked to be released from its bid.

Hedrick could not be reached for comment Thursday.

At a special meeting Thursday, board members decided to sign the contract with Hedrick.

"A bid is a bid," Donicht said. If Hedrick does not sign the contract, the board will decide whether to rebid the projects, accept the next lowest bid, or attempt to re-award Hedrick his bid in court, he said.

But when the district contacted Ormond Builders Inc. of Idaho Falls, the next-lowest bidder, the company found a \$62,000 error in its bid, Donicht said.

The next lowest bid would be about \$250,000 more than Hedrick's bid, he said.

If the district does rebid the two projects, Hedrick will not be allowed to bid, Donicht said.

He said he is unsure how the bids will affect the district's other expansion projects: a new elementary school in South Park and an auditorium at Twin Falls High.

Ketchum annexes land south of town

KETCHUM — The City Council annexed five parcels of land south of town Wednesday night, much to the dismay of Weyyakin Homeowners Association attorneys who fought to the bitter end for exclusion from the action.

Attorneys Gary Slette and Evan Robertson argued that recent changes in the proposed zoning of two parcels owned by the Idaho Foundation for Parks and Lands were substantial and require the council, according to Idaho law, to reauthorize and take public comment.

"We are hopeful the city will follow the guidelines... and reauthorize the proposed changes," said Slette.

Had the annexation been successful, the next opportunity for public comment and the next chance to vote on an annexation would have been March 24.

By that time, Weyyakin would be a part of the city of Sun Valley. Early in the annexation process, Weyyakin residents indicated through a poll that they preferred annexation with Sun Valley.

Weyyakin requested annexation into the city of Sun Valley on Feb. 6.

The zoning changes in question grew out of efforts by Ketchum and the foundation to strike an annexation agreement. The land and the zoning changes include:

- Reinheimer Ranch, originally proposed as a combination of Agricultural Forest Use and Open Space, was changed to Agricultural Forest.
- Union Pacific Railroad Right-of-Way, originally scheduled for a Recreational Use designation, was changed to Limited Residential-One Acre.

The zoning changes were requested by the foundation to protect the value of the property for fund-raising purposes, according to City Attorney Ed Lawson.

The Reinheimer Ranch parcel has been key to Ketchum's annexation push from the world go.

The ranch property separates Ketchum on its southern border from all other parcels annexed Wednesday. One of the requirements for annexation is that land be contiguous to the annexing city.

Without Reinheimer property annexed, the package falls apart. March 10 is the sign and publish the ordinance, making it law.

"We are trying to work with the foundation to reach this agreement," said Ketchum city administrator Jim Jaquet. "We are willing to give them time to review it and get back to us."

If the annexation agreement isn't finalized by March 10, the city hopes to finalize it March 17.

"Our main concern is the 24th," said Jaquet, referring to the date Sun Valley city could finalize its annexation of Weyyakin.

The council rejected Slette and Robertson's arguments of "significant change" because the zoning changes were required by the owner of the annexed land.

The properties annexed are Reinheimer Ranch, Weyyakin subdivision, Mortgage Row, Kendall Property, Sun Valley Camping Resort, Gas Co. Property, Union Pacific Railroad Right-of-Way, Peshier subdivision and South Baldy Estates.

Robertson was also concerned by a "nuisance waiver" included in the proposed annexation agreement that he called inappropriate and a possible threat to Weyyakin property values.

The annexation agreement would require the city to have property owners near Reinheimer waive any right to object to "activities conducted on the ranch" which may be considered a nuisance or otherwise annoying, noxious or obnoxious.

The Last Will and Testament of Eleanor Reinheimer specifies that the ranch will remain a working ranch, which includes the raising, feeding and confining of livestock and the raising and cultivating crops.

Rock Creek neighborhood.

"With the new school and park it will strengthen people's desire to live in the area," said J.U.-B planner John Bertram.

Planners suggested putting a small commercial center — approximately 1 p.m. on the corner of Orchard Drive and Blue Lakes Boulevard South. With a grocery store, possibly, and other retail businesses, such a development could keep a lot of traffic off Blue Lakes, said J.U.-B planner Nancy Taylor.

A similar commercial-retail center at Grandview Drive and Falls Avenue would serve the same purpose, Taylor said.

Taylor fielded questions at a land-use map.

She got few questions about the south part of town, but several residents asked about the Pole Line Road and Washington Street area. Planners suggest a mixed use of commercial and residential north of Pole Line and east of Washington.

But homeowners near there worry that the area will become too commercial.

CSI would make a nice place to encourage high-tech companies, Taylor said, and the draft plan suggests giving the college its own zone. The college currently is zoned residential.

Thursday, residents near CSI en-

couraged Taylor to scale the proposed CSI zone back from Pole Line.

A loud debate about a proposed low- to moderate-income, eight-plex development on Locust Street partly spurred the city to update the comprehensive plan in October 1991.

The update encourages multi-family housing throughout the community as long as it conforms with existing densities. But City Councilman Jim Vickers wondered Thursday what the city can do to encourage lower- to moderate-income housing in Twin Falls.

"The city's limited in what it can do," Vickers said.

Ernie Price, a Twin Falls resident who served on a committee that helped shape the draft plan, shared this view.

"Implementation is the tough part. You've got to wait for the developers to come along," he said.

The Comprehensive plan suggests building a system of bicycle trails throughout the community, revitalizing the old beer warehouse district, sets out goals for schools and addresses economic development and growth.

Bertram said the community should pay special attention to recreational opportunities and parks. "Not many communities have a Rock Creek or Snake River Canyon," he said.

While the plan sets a path toward the future, it does not lose sight of the past and present, Taylor said.

"One of the most important things was to protect the quality of life," she said.

The Planning and Zoning Commission and City Council will hold public hearings before adopting final plans.

dict, and courts would have to interpret them in light of the initiative's overall intent.

The initiative probably also would drive gay and lesbian student groups off the campuses of state universities; force public libraries to keep books that mention homosexuality off-limits to minors; limit what school counselors could tell students who were troubled about being gay; and prevent groups that supported gay rights from holding meetings or events in public facilities.

However, it's unclear whether the ICA initiative would prevent the Legislature from adding gaps to the state's human-rights law.

Measure 9, which sought to amend the Oregon Constitution, clearly applied to all parts of state and local governments. The ICA initiative's first section, intended to exclude homosexuals from civil rights laws, applies to any "agency, department or political subdivision of the state of Idaho."

But because the Idaho Constitution does not allow constitutional amendments by initiative, the ICA measure is structured as an addition to state law. It's a well-accepted principle that no law can keep the Legislature from amending or repealing it or any other section of law.

Burley establishes grievance procedure

BURLEY — The city of Burley has adopted a formal grievance procedure for disabled people with complaints about access to events held in city-owned facilities.

The action was required to "close out" a community development block grant that the city received from its senior citizens' building, known as the Golden Heritage Senior Center, Mayor Clark Bauman said this week.

Whenever local governments receive state or federal grants, there are measures the city must take in order to become eligible for the money.

The city was required to designate an employee in this case City Clerk Bud Bringer, to receive complaints from the disabled about access to city-sponsored events.

Access by the disabled to its facilities isn't a new issue for the city of Burley. One of the reasons the city built a new City Hall was because the old facility was not accessible by the disabled.

In other business this week, council members decided to settle a dispute with a Minidoka man over land rental at the Burley Municipal Airport.

Warren Heins owns a hangar at the airport. When he bought the hangar he thought he didn't need to pay rent on the land on which the hangar sits.

The individual who owned the hangar previously wasn't required to pay rent, and Heins thought that provision transferred over to him when he bought the hangar.

The city recently discovered Heins wasn't paying rent, and after an attempt at negotiation failed, asked him to pay \$1,000 back rent or he would not be allowed to stay on the airport.

City Attorney Bill Parsons said an agreement has now been reached under which Heins will pay \$600 rent through this year and will pay rent each year after.

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Indiana family to share \$60 million Powerball jackpot

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — A Jay County family that pools its money to play the lottery claimed a share of the largest Powerball jackpot ever Thursday.

Wendell and Betty Addington and their four children said they will split the \$30 million jackpot, half of the grand prize from Wednesday night's drawing.

Addington and his family rode in limousines to Hoosier Lottery headquarters in Indianapolis to claim their prize.

"We have been playing the lottery since it began in 1989. One in a while we thought about stopping the family pool, but one of our would-be members was out of it," Addington said.

The 64-year-old hog and grain farmer from rural Dunkirk said he doesn't plan to retire or change his lifestyle. "I'll just live a good life, pay some bills and have a little relaxation."

His wife and two grown sons and daughters appeared surprised at the extent of their new fortune, and most indicated they hadn't determined what they would do with the money.

However, Nancy Fulkerson, a daughter who works in Fort Wayne, said she would return to school and resume an education that was interrupted a few years ago because of a financial pinch.

The Addingtons bought the ticket at Ludwigs grocery store in Dunkirk, 100 miles northeast of Indianapolis.

As was its weekly practice, family members pooled their cash and bought five Powerball tickets. Addington said he noticed Thursday morning that one of his tickets matched all the numbers.

"I checked the numbers on paper. I then got on the phone and called my two sons, Brian and Randy," he said. "I was in shock."

The store owners will receive \$200,000 commission for selling the winning ticket.

The ticket and the one sold in Missouri matched all five numbers and the Powerball. The Multi-State Lottery Association has identified the winner from Missouri.

The winning numbers were five, nine, 15, 16, 26, and Powerball 44.

Buhl couple win 3rd place, \$5,000

BOISE (AP) — Nobody from the Magic Valley won the \$60 million Powerball jackpot, but it wasn't a total bust for south-central Idaho.

Don and Priscilla Walker of Buhl were among six Idaho players to win a third-place ticket prize of \$5,000.

Idaho Lottery Commission spokeswoman Stephanie Hawkins said Thursday that sales in Idaho the four days before Wednesday's drawing totaled \$1.26 million.

The Walkers, who bought their ticket at United Oil in Twin Falls, were among them. They said they generally play Powerball once a week, but the record jackpot prompted them to "buy a few extra tickets this time."

Schell received minor injuries in the crash, but deputies said he wasn't transported to a hospital.

"Some rearranging will need to occur before the move is complete," secretary Kathi Davies said.

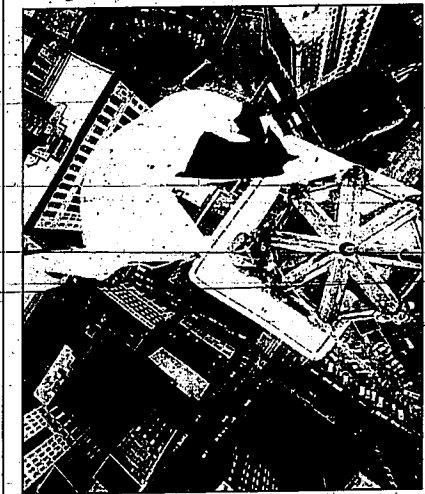

Seattle man stands trial for wife's poisoning

SEATTLE (AP) — Joseph Meling told police three days after his wife collapsed in a coma that he leveled himself to be arrested for her poisoning, a drug tampering trial.

At the time, authorities were not sure what had caused Jennifer Meling's crush A. A. Tamwater police officer at the time, said the wife was sent to Capital Medical Center in Olympia after Meling called dispatchers on Feb. 5, 1991.

Burnett, now a Snohomish County sheriff's officer, testified in the third day of Meling's U.S. District Court trial on drug-tampering charges in the near-fatal poisoning of his wife and the deaths of two other people. Meling is charged with six counts of product tampering, two of perjury and three of insurance fraud.

Jurors in the U.S. District Court trial also were told that items taken by FBI agents in searches of Meling's home and office included two apparent suicide notes, numerous razor-sharp blades that could have been used to slip open "blister packs" of capsules and a magazine containing an article on a previous drug-tampering case.

Burnett said he and Meling talked in Jennifer Meling's hospital room, with Meling's mother and his wife's parents nearby.

Meling told Burnett he had learned the hospital received an anonymous call — later determined to have come from his wife's aunt — fingering him as the perpetrator and claiming his

wife remained in great danger.

Meling wanted to know why police had not arrested him, Burnett testified. Burnett said he told Meling he had no knowledge of what was happening.

Previous testimony showed it was that same day that laboratory tests showed Jennifer Meling had received a potentially lethal dose of cyanide three days earlier, on Feb. 2.

She filed for divorce after her recovery but subsequently reconciled with Meling and is expected to testify in the trial.

Meling, 31, a Tamwater insurance agent, is accused of poisoning his wife to collect \$700,000 in benefits from recently purchased life insurance and of tampering with at least five other Sudafoed packages to divert attention from himself.

Two people died after taking tampered capsules from packages of Sudafoed 12-hour decongestant. Tainted capsules also were found in two packages recovered from homes and one from a store in the ensuing nationwide recall.

Burnett said Meling told him at the hospital there had been no recent changes in the couple's insurance.

Later investigation revealed that scarcely a week and a half earlier, Meling had obtained an accidental-death-and-disability rider that doubled benefits from his wife's life insurance policy, under circumstances that included product tampering.

Defense attorney Curtis R. Vance Jr. suggested Thursday that Meling might

have omitted mentioning the rider because he had not received confirmation of the change.

Meling also denied the couple had experienced marital difficulties. Burnett testified. Previous testimony showed the Melings had had a fight so bad in December 1990 that Mrs. Meling had called 911, and that Meling had told numerous acquaintances they were having serious problems.

One day after the hospital visit, Jennifer Meling was released and left her husband to move in with her parents in Battle Ground.

Tamwater police handled the investigation until early in March 1991, when the case was determined to be product tampering and the FBI took over the case.

William A. Tobin, an FBI metals expert from Washington, testified that tiny slits found in five of the tampered Sudafoed packages could have been made by "precision blades," surgically cutting blades found in Meling's apartment. The part of the sixth package from which the tainted capsule apparently was taken never has been found.

Two hand-printed suicide notes were found in envelopes addressed to relatives and friends, FBI agent Roger

Call testified. They were not shown to the jury but were made available to reporters after court was adjourned.

No evidence has been introduced about any actual suicide attempt by Meling.

Defense attorney Carol Koller said both were written about March 5, when Jennifer Meling filed for divorce, and were found by the FBI on March 12.

One, addressed "To whom it may concern," began:

"There is no way for me to prove that I didn't try to kill my wife or anybody else. The life insurance and the current state of the relationship with my wife puts me in a very vulnerable position. But I didn't do it."

The other, addressed to his family and friends, said in part:

"I pray that God forgives me — I know that he's the only one who should take a life. I've prayed and received no peace. I've tried and made no progress. I've loved and not been loved in return. I feel so empty. I see no future. I've tried to accept my circumstances as God's will in my life — knowing that all things work for God for those that love God. But again I get no peace."

Don't pack state boards to scratch parochial itch

Don't like the way you're being treated by an agency of state government? No problem.

Just contact your legislator and get him to write a bill adding someone from your neighborhood to the commission that controls the offending department.

Sound far-fetched? Stay tuned. If the state Senate follows the lead of the House, there will soon be a state Fish and Game commissioner who represents 1 percent of Idahoans.

It's a proposal by Rep. Golden Linford, a Roxburg Republican who chairs the House Resource and Conservation Committee. Linford's constituency - dry farmers and irrigators from the Snake River Plain - doesn't much like the idea of somebody who lives 160 miles away, Salmon outfitter Norm Guth, representing them on the Fish and Game Commission. They want their own commissioner.

The new commissioner would be the seventh member of the Commission, representing Bonneville, Madison, Fremont, Jefferson, Clark, Butte and Teton counties. Guth would then represent only Lemhi and Custer counties, which would be just fine with the 11,000 people who live there.

But let's put that into context. If you took all those people to Boise for the weekend, they would only half fill Bronco Stadium.

In a state that depends on geo-

graphical balance to function, commission-packing is a perilous idea. If the Fish and Game Commission can be balkanized, then why not the state Board of Education, the Health and Welfare Board or the Transportation Board?

Or perhaps Idahoans could even succeed where Franklin Roosevelt failed, and pack the Supreme Court.

The notion of geographical representation can be tricky. We long have argued that some arms of government - such as the Education Board and the Supreme Court - should maintain a rough geographical balance.

But Idaho is heading for trouble if it starts adding regional seats to state boards and commissions simply because some people don't like whoever is representing them now.

Under the state Constitution, Idahoans already have advocates who can intercede on their behalf with state government. They're called legislators, and they represent everybody equally.

But if Linford's bill is approved, the 136,000 residents of the Magic Valley will have the same voice on the Fish and Game Commission as the 11,000 citizens of Lemhi and Custer counties.

That's more than unfair. In a government like Idaho's that depends upon an unwritten social contract of regional equity, it's an invitation to chaos.

The Idaho Water Alliance appreciates media attention on the condition of the Snake Plain Aquifer. Water, both surface and groundwater, is the lifeblood of the Magic Valley. However, wells are going dry in flooding and Jerome counties.

The Bible as a whole presents both the love and holiness of God. To be honest, we have to take both into account in relation to homosexuality or any other immoral and deviate behavior.

Yet, the Idaho Department of Water Resources maintains that there will be no adverse economic impacts to the Magic Valley due to additional groundwater development. The IWA believes there are already significant economic impacts and these will get worse. Sen. Laird Noh has said, "No state has ever acted fast enough to protect groundwater."

Some suggest that the drought is the problem - this is not true. Although the drought has exacerbated the problem, the aquifer is being overused by approximately 400,000 acres feet per year. This overappropriation threatens all present water rights holders in the Magic Valley. These people who have invested in our economy need to be protected.

The membership of the Idaho Water Alliance is indicative of the level of concern. The members are the Northside Canal Co., Nature Conservancy, Idaho Aquaculture Association, Twin Falls Canal Co., Hagerman, Jerome, Bliss, Hagerman Water Rights Owners, A&B Irrigation District, Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, Billingsley Creek Ranch, Spring Acres, Idaho Rivers Union, Lower Snake River Aquifer Recharge District, Hagerman Valley Citizens Alert and the Idaho Wildlife Federation.

The Department of Water Resources should not allow continued mining of the aquifer - it is the basis for our way of life.

When religious freedom, public welfare clash, tragedy can result

Once in a bloody while, Americans' religious tolerance leads to predictable tragedy when things go too far for the public good. Such is the case this week with the cult in the Texas compound of the Branch Davidians.

There is and should be a deep reluctance for the agents of the state to interfere in religious doings. It is a tenet of our national faith that one person's haecus-focuss is another's free exercise of religion and none of the government's business. The Constitution's First Amendment guarantees it: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."

As a general rule, the nobody-else's-business legal test is sound. It usually works out in case after case, all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court. However, sometimes things defy orderly adjudication. Exceptions include the direction of some gun with a hot-line to heaven, like the man called David Koresh of the Branch Davidians.

Firstpower and faith mix into a poison, whether at the hands of kings or kooks. History shows that. Yet we want not to intrude when religion is an evaluation of "brude when religions in solons an evaluation of undue threat. Our reverence for the Constitution's important and defining principles of democracy makes it constructively difficult to prey upon a minority. But that same reverence makes it easier for a minority within a minority to prey on us all, as cults ultimately do.

There is always a delicate balance between the rights of a messiah in his own kingdom and the laws of the larger land against machine guns. It doesn't take a roomful of constitutional lawyers to figure out the way to Sunday. That unforgotten way: a federal agent being blown away makes the case.

What we saw makes the personal mental distress go up: "Well, the Davidson thing is in Texas, after all. That's a place where you can drive all morning Sunday and not be able to get anything on the radio but fired-up preachers or the Dallas Cowboys pre-game shows."

Texas has a governor who will wear blue jeans for a New York magazine cover portrait. Texas is surreal, the kind of place a cult can go unnoticed in the exaggerations that compose ordinary life.

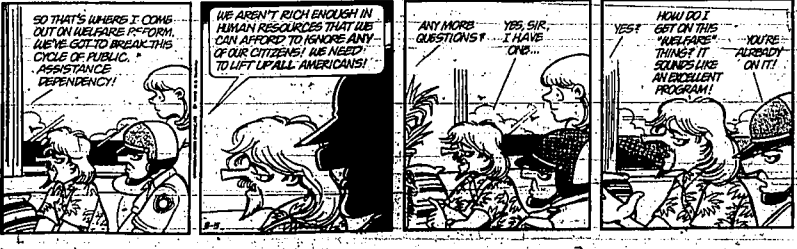
Sorry, Don't delude yourself. It's not that easy. Texas hasn't cornered the religion-around-the-bend market. We have seen the likes of this week's videotapes from Texas before in carnage-flopped denouncements by cults.

The week has brought expert after expert to television screens and newspaper stories to explain how something as crazy as appearing as cult life can draw in normal people. We have heard time and again how isolation and fixation operate to inculcate mindless loyalty.

But what of the normal people outside the compound? How soon can the legal system respond to the warning signs? How soon do average folks worry about dangerous behavior like gun-worship and child abuse allegations? Sometimes not soon enough. Sometimes the cost of protecting a central value of American life, like religious liberty, is terribly high. Ask the survivors of those who fell as human sacrifice at Branch Davidians' hell on earth this week.

Serb 'cleansing' campaign rolls on

TUZLA, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — U.N. and Bosnian officials accused Serbs Thursday of stepping up their "ethnic cleansing" campaign in eastern Bosnia, as new allegations surfaced of Serbs slaughtering and raping Muslim refugees.

Serb commanders, who have devastated Muslim enclaves in a four-day offensive near U.S. air-drop sites, called the charges of atrocities "wrong and malicious" and reportedly promised their foes safe passage out of the embattled region.

But it was apparently a one-way offer. The Bosnian Serb army command in Zvornik, according to a statement reported by the Yugoslav news agency Tanjug, vowed Muslims and Serbs "will not live together ever again."

U.S. military planes have dropped humanitarian aid over the region for four consecutive days. But ham radio reports suggested bundles fell near Serb positions, hindering retrieval by refugees.

In the capital Sarajevo, a sniper targeting an aid convoy near the airport killed a French woman from the Equilibre relief organization and injured two Polish aid workers, said U.N. peacekeepers' spokesman Barry Freewey.

There were continued reports of Serb atrocities in the war-torn region around Cerka and Konjevic Polje, but they were sketchy and impossible to confirm. Serbs have barred access to the region after routing thousands of Muslims from their homes this week and burning their villages.

The Security Council on Wednesday night demanded a halt to the tank-led offensive and urged U.N. forces to be sent to the region to protect civilians.

About 10,000 Muslim refugees were crowded cold and hungry on the ruins in the ruins of Konjevic Polje, U.N. officials said.

About 500 refugees from Cerka reached nearby Muslim-held Srebrenica, and some accused advancing Serb troops of slaughter and rape.

"There is little doubt that Serb forces, by their current offensive, are intensifying ethnic cleansing," U.N. human rights envoy Tadeusz Mazowiecki said in a letter to the U.N. Human Rights Commission.

"There are accounts of massacres of civilians, burning of homes and attacks on refugees trying to flee the area," the former Polish premier said.

U.S. condemns Serb leader for implied terrorism threat

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department condemned a Serbian leader as "irresponsible and disgraceful" Thursday for his warning that U.S. relief deliveries to Bosnia-Herzegovina could expose the American people and all mankind to Armageddon.

"Anytime anyone raises the specter of international terrorism we are all concerned," spokesman Richard A. Boucher said in response to the assertion by Radovan Karadzic, the Bosnian Serb leader, in "an open letter to Americans."

Boucher said Karadzic "is supposed to be here negotiating for peace" in talks at the United Nations in New York.

"Assailed also by U.N. officials, Karadzic subsequently reiterated the statement. He told reporters "it missed the point" after he had met with U.N. Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali and the two international mediators on the Yugoslav conflict, former Secretary of State Cyrus R. Cyrus Vance and Lord Owen, a former British foreign secretary.

The officials "protested very strongly" to Karadzic in the meeting at a U.N. headquarters — U.N. spokesman Joe Sills said.

Karadzic is in New York on a limited travel visa. In December, then-Secretary of State Lawrence S. Eagleburger said Karadzic, President Slobodan Milosevic and Ratko Mladic, the Bosnian Serb military commander, had "political and command responsibility" for atrocities in the Balkans and should be tried for crimes against humanity.

"Karadzic's 'open letter to Americans' urged President Clinton to stop overland relief shipments to Bosnia. Otherwise, he said, Clinton would be 'twisting the best of intentions' of the American people and mankind to the hell of Armageddon."

The letter was dated Saturday and distributed Tuesday to reporters covering the U.N. negotiations on Bosnia.

Hearing in shooting case opens

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) — The first court martial hearing of Operation Restore Hope began Thursday in a dusty, flyblown room where Gunner Sgt. Harry Conde faced charges for shooting a 17-year-old Somali who snatched his sunglasses.

Conde, 33, a radar technician based in Twentynine Palms, Calif., could be charged with the military equivalent of an aggravated assault for wounding the teen-ager as well as a bystander hit by buckshot from Conde's gun.

A 13-year veteran born and raised in San Juan, Puerto Rico, Conde could face up to 10 years in prison if the court martial proceeds.

A power generator provided a droning background to the testimony from nervous Marines in the room at Mogadishu's airport. Their words frequently were blotted out by the roar of planes taking off and landing.

Capt. Chris Wesely, the investigating officer, sat behind a battered table. Only a few folding metal chairs were available, so some spectators sat on wooden drawers turned on their sides. Sheets of bare plywood served as a partition.

No one disputes that on Feb. 2, Conde shot a youth, identified only as Omar, who grabbed the soldier's prescription sunglasses through the window of a moving Humvee military vehicle that was returning to the airport.

Conde, 33, a radar technician based in Twentynine Palms, Calif., shot the boy while riding in a convoy in central Mogadishu on Feb. 2.

At issue is whether Conde fired on the spur of the moment, fearing for his safety, or if the shot came as Omar was fleeing and was fired in revenge.

Omar, hit in the abdomen by several pellets, was treated at a Swedish field hospital but later vanished. No one is even sure he's still alive.

The weapon, an M-79 grenade launcher loaded with a .30mm buckshot shell, had been confiscated by the Marines during a raid of Somali arsenals the month before.

China warns against linking trade, rights

BEIJING (AP) — The United States should not put conditions on trade privileges for Beijing, China said Friday, responding to indications the Clinton administration will link human rights to most-favored nation status.

Secretary of State Warren Christopher said Sunday the Clinton administration expects China to improve its human rights record if the United States is to renew its favorable trade conditions for Beijing.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Li Jianying said, "To attach any conditions to the MFN status will damage the normal economic and trade relations between China and the U.S. and also the entire bilateral relationship."

"Therefore, it is unwise and unacceptable to the Chinese side," he said at a weekly briefing.

"Trade status which must be renewed annually, grants Chinese goods the lowest possible tariffs. The United States grants the status to most of its trade partners."

Congressional critics of China have tried for the past two years to attach human rights conditions to its renewal but were overruled by former President Bush.

Christopher said Clinton, who criticized Bush's China policy during the campaign, favors conflictual renewal.

He said the United States considers China's human rights record poor, its treatment of Tibet improper and some of its trade policies abusive.

Li accused the United States of trying to interfere in China's internal affairs and said Christopher made "irresponsible comments" that violated the norms governing international relations.

British marine dies

OSLO, Norway (AP) — A British marine was killed Thursday when a military vehicle plunged into an icy river during NATO exercises in northern Norway.

The marine, whose name was not released, was assigned to the Royal Marines Commando Logistics Regiment in Plymouth, England.

The accident occurred about five miles from Sorpeisa in northern Troms county.

"To me," he said, "music is carefree. It's not a matter of life and death if you play a wrong note."

At a recent rehearsal with the Magic Valley Symphony, Rosenberg directed with a spirited energy and the music was clean and light.

"That's beautiful," he told the musicians, "but I want you to hear each other a little bit better."

Rosenberg said the members of the Magic Valley Symphony are excellent musicians.

"I love them," he said. "They do an extremely enthusiastic job."

Through the years, the public has come to know that the season's four concerts offer a good variety of world-class classical music performances, said Beverly Nelson, speaking for the Magic Valley Community Concert Association.

"The people want to go to good concerts," she said, "and they know these will be good."

An earlier line-up performers-like violinist Scott Yoo, who, at age 18, has won international acclaim, Nelson explained, that season tickets have to be sold in advance. Tickets for individual concerts are not available.

"We have to know ahead of time what money we're working with when we book these people," she said. "We sign hold agreements, then sell passes."

This year, the season's theme is "Hear It, See It, Feel It." For the first concert on October 21, the board of directors have selected Yoo. He is the winner of the 1989 Young Concert Artists International

Auditions, and he also took first prize in 1988 at the prestigious Josef Gingold International Violin Competition in Brazil.

For the second concert on November 17, pianist John Bayless will perform his own compositions based on combinations of popular and classical music. Nelson said Bayless has performed at Carnegie Hall in New York and is brilliant at improvisation. She said he has a dynamic personality and can play any number of guest, such as "Moon River," in the style of Mozart.

The third concert of the new season, set for January, 1994, will be by the Dallas Brass, a group featuring brass instruments, drums, keyboards and xylophones. The six musicians perform together and

as soloists, adding informative narration, creative lighting design and tightly-knit choreography.

In March, 1994, the final concert will be performed by Helicon, a trio playing a variety of traditional instruments from around the world. Taking their name from Mount Helicon in Greek mythology, the men play music from a variety of countries on wooden flutes, penny whistles, hammer dulcimer, fiddle, guitar and cittern.

"The important thing," Nelson noted, "is the fact that you have to buy your membership now."

The concert association is encouraging the public to get their memberships early by offering last year's prices until May 1. Also, as an "early bird special," new members will be allowed to attend the final concert of the 1992-93 season, featuring classical harmonica player Robert Bonfiglio performing with an ensemble of flute, violin/viola and cello.

As an added value, the Magic Valley memberships are honored at the community concerts in Burley, Boise, Pocatello and Idaho Falls. Most of the performers at those concerts are different than the ones who will be in Twin Falls, Nelson said.

Admittance to Community Concerts is by season membership only. The cost until May 1 is \$25 for adults, \$12.50 for students and \$60 for families. New members who join now will be allowed to attend a bonus concert on March 29.

Others' confidence gave Simon courage to write opera

By now, surely most listeners would agree that Carly Simon is both a superb pop singer and a first-rate songwriter. Her original works, such as "You're So Vain" and "Anticipation," endure as pop standards. Her salsón-song albums, "Torch" and "My Romance," musically surpass similar efforts by Linda Ronstadt and Rickie Lee Jones. And her soundtracks for films such as "Heartburn" and "Working Girl" have won critical acclaim.

So why would Simon want to write an opera?

"Because I got an offer... and because everyone made me feel that I really could do it," says Simon, whose "Romulus Hunt" began previews Monday at the John Jay Theater in New York, followed by an April 7 through 11 run at the Kennedy Center in Washington.

"I received a letter a couple of years ago asking me to write an opera for the Metropolitan Opera Guild and the Kennedy Center, and I kept looking at it and thinking about whether or not this was something that I could do."

The letter asked Simon to compose an opera for the Metropolitan Opera Guild and the Kennedy Center hopes audiences. The idea is to lure otherwise way listeners to the opera with the tantalizing prospect of hearing music by an established pop artist.

Although Simon says she was a bit hesitant at first, eventually the producers persuaded her that "I didn't have to necessarily be a student of opera to write one. I didn't have to go back and listen to everything that Verdi and Puccini and everybody else had written, but that I could do it in my own way."

Not that creating an entirely new song structure was easy. Once Simon and collaborator Jacob Brackman had penned a story line—about a 12-year-old coming to terms with his parents' divorce—"it was time to face the music."

Actually, it was easy enough to write the songs—or arias," says Simon, "though I didn't stick to the usual form of the pop song."

"But I didn't have as easy a time with the recitatives," adds Simon, referring to the elusive musical passage that precedes and follows an aria. Traditionally, these sections fall somewhere between song and speech, with the characters singing phrases that carry no discernible melody or song form.

"So I made a kind of clumsy attempt at the recitatives at first, and then Jeff Halpern, the musical director and conductor of the show, basically taught me an awful lot about how to do it."

Surely, many listeners wonder whether "Romulus Hunt," written for five singers and nine instrumentalists, sounds like Simon.

"Harmonically, I think the opera is quite similar to my songs," she says. "And yet, because this music is being sung by operatic voices, it probably will sound rather different. In fact, I've

found that sometimes it's hard to get the way I want them to; and that has been the most difficult aspect of this experience."

Still, if "Romulus," a one-act opera, has half the melodic inspiration of Simon's best work, it should make an impression on listeners. Dramatically, too, it seems aimed not so much at children but at those attuned to a child's world:

"It's true that the protagonist is a kid, but there are lots of adult problems covered," Simon says.

And though Simon acknowledges that she's a little wary of launching her first opera in New York, she's counting on understanding audiences:

"I just hope people understand that this is a work in progress," Simon says.

musicians love to play it.

(The story) is about a soldier who goes AWOL," he explained. "A gypsy lures him away and then, at the moment she sees the young man in order, she forgets the poor sergeant. It's a down-to-earth story."

Strauss is wonderful, he said, because the "Strauss Dynasty" brought about a revolution without a shot being fired. "They made dancing go public; they traded their knickerbockers in for stocks and started dancing."

For his solo performance, Rosenberg has chosen Beethoven's "Piano Concerto No. 3"—for its moods and lyrics.

"I like the contrasts of the first movement," he said, "the poetry of the second movement and the impassive humor of the last."

I've decided all movies are rated PG. That's because given the level of most movies, parents need to dispense some guidance. But first, we have to know what we're in for. The movie industry's rating system is close to worthless; general more toward maximum profits than suitability. The rationale is that the industry that makes movies can make more money if they throw in something rough. That's show business.

But, there's hope. There's a new newsletter and phone line for parents who want to know what's potentially objectionable in movies rated PG-13, PG and yes — even G.

Before you assume that only someone suffering from terminal prudishness could be put off by a G-rated Disney film, let me share. In "The Great Mouse Detective," there is a gratuitous and tacky scene from a rodent strip show.

Yep, a Disney strip joint. I'll bet Uncle Walt is spinning in his angel Mouseketeer cars. In this G-rated movie, the stripper sings her furry little heart out as she bumps and grinds: "Drink your beer. Get cozy. Your baby's here. You won't

be misunderstood. Let me be good to you. Hey, fella, I'll take off all my clothes. Hey, fella, there's nothing I won't do just for you. Your baby's gonna come through. Let me be good to you."

movies are. She counts the number of curses uttered, describes the violence and sexual content. And she notes whether the plot is entertaining and offers what ages she thinks the story would entertain. Best of all, she leaves what children should see up to parents.

She calls her business Family Enrichment Services. Her monthly newsletter costs \$19 a year. That's cheaper than the system my husband and I use of renting videos just for us — or going to shows alone — before we subject our children to them. You can get a sample newsletter for \$2. Besides tipping you off about movies you may want to skip, she offers story previews so you can help children follow movie plots and she suggests movie classics suitable for families.

She makes note of the role models characters provide, and whether children might be upset by something such as an animal being hurt — which goes unnoticed by most movie critics who gear reviews for adult audiences. While ratings offer little guidance; in general, a PG means there is no naked sex but some sexual content, some bad language, and there's something that is scary, but less gory than those with stricter ratings.



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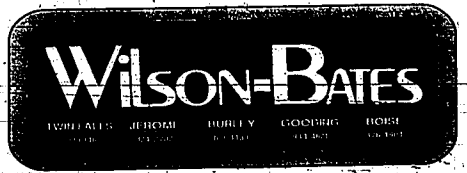
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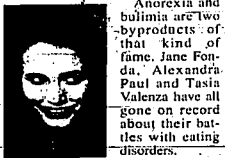
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MacDowell decries ideal body image

Acting and modeling may seem like a glamorous way to pay the phone bill and stock up on the latest Calvin Klein. But they have their dark side, too.



Anorexia and bulimia are two by-products of that kind of fame. Jane Fonda, Alexandra Paul and Tasia Valenza have all gone on record about their battles with eating disorders.

MacDowell, who started as a model before she became an actress, the ideal that is depicted in both movies and modeling is damaging to women. "In real frustrated," says the 30-year-old actress, "I see the ideal and 'Groundhog Day.'"

"I know where I live I can separate myself and live a normal life. I eat very healthy and don't have neurotic problems. I don't work out two hours a day and just eat vegetables. Let's put it that way. But when I come into the business there are people who are setting up this kind of body for women. I think it's extremely frustrating."

Producers have often told her to lose weight, says the one-time international mannequin. "They want me to look like a girl, and I'm a woman. It's very hard for women nowadays. I think it's hideous. I don't read articles about men working out three hours a day and eating just vegetables."

The only director who hasn't urged her to lose weight, she says, was Australian Peter Weir, who directed her in "Green Card." "I weighed 138 pounds. I'm 5 foot 8. So by the charts I'm in there. But by the way we're supposed to work, I'm maybe five pounds over. But he's the only director who said, 'Please, don't lose weight. I couldn't believe it. It's the first time that anybody has ever said that to me. Oh, God, what a relief!'"

Weir, who was not a show-biz insider, confided to MacDowell that he was concerned about the way females were viewed in Hollywood.

"His perspective is completely different. He told me that when he was in Hollywood he hated the conversations they'd have about women."

"Oh, isn't she hot? Isn't she a fox? She's hot stuff." And he was completely disturbed about the way women were spoken of.

MacDowell doesn't denounce nude scenes in films. But she does object to the way they are done. "Most of the time the scenes that I see and the scenes that are written are demeaning to women. And we have a double standard here, that nobody's really ready to fit or to deal with. And that's what's find disturbing. It's not that I find the human body vulgar. It's how it's done that disturbs me."

MacDowell lives in Montana with her husband, who builds houses, and they have two children, a son, 6, and a daughter, 3.

"I've don't have a kind of situation where people are saying to my son, 'Your mom's a movie star.' We have a real home and people know who I am and whenever it's brought up, he gets kind of weirded out a little bit."

MacDowell's husband built the home they live in and they also own a ranch. The couple hopes to go into partnership building and selling homes, she says.

Baird notches his niche in politically correct times

ADOLPHUS, Ky. — In these politically correct times, here's the story of a politically incorrect man, former Georgia Satellites leader Dan Baird.

He doesn't vote. He makes fun of pasta. He jokes about teen-age pregnancy. He tells stories about wet T-shirt contests. He calls his debut solo album "Love Songs for the Hearing Impaired," and aspires to sound like a cross between Carl Jung and Jethro from "The Beverly Hillsbillies."

And somehow, amidst a Billboard singles chart full of mellow R&B ballads, Baird has notched a genuine, rock 'n' roll hit single — "I Love-You-Period," the tale of a student who gets his love note to a teacher back graded for punctuation.

"I call it key rock," Baird said in an interview at his large cabin in rural Kentucky, complete with cement rehearsal room where he can play without bothering his girlfriend.

Baird, a youthful-looking 39 with shoulder-length hair and a gap-toothed smile like David Letterman's, says the songs on "Love Songs for the Hearing Impaired" chronicle the lives of the politically apathetic masses who "watch network TV and like it." The album is loud and good-natured, the kind of record that could have three-chord bar bands altering their repertoires.

The direction of his solo effort was dictated by Rick Rubin, owner of Def American Records and producer of everyone from L.L. Cool J to Mick Jagger. Rubin, who made his name in rap and metal music, contacted Baird a few years ago, when the fading Satellites were recording music for a never-completed film project starring John "Full House" Simms.

Baird was one of the few people in the music business unaware of the producer's stature. "So we (Rubin and Baird) go out to dinner and he brings his own pasta for them to cook," Baird said. "It's like wheatless pasta, or something ridiculous."

"I look at him and go, 'What are ya doing?' You're bringing in your own pasta — what a moron!"

May be butt of jokes, but video gets used

It's the hippest hip workout around. Jay Leno makes jokes about it in his monologue. It's been mentioned in "Cathy," comic strips. Undoubtedly, it has become a part of pop culture. It's "Buns of Steel."

But what is "Buns of Steel"? "Buns" is a nine-tape exercise video series from the Maier Group of New York and it not only has become a phenomenon, it has created a new fitness superstar in the form of instructor Tania Webb.

Webb, 32, is a 5-foot-3-inch bundle of energy and muscle who seems to indeed have buns of steel (and legs, arms and especially a stomach of steel). "People are starting to recognize me more and more when I go out," says Webb, speaking via telephone from the Webb International offices in San Diego. "They say 'Aren't you that 'Buns of Steel' girl?'" she says, laughing.

And exercise mavens who were originally laughing at the title aren't laughing anymore. The \$14.95 "Buns" videos were all over Billboard's chart of top-selling health and fitness videos for 1992. The original "Buns of Steel" was the fifth best-selling exercise video of the year, and Webb's videos, "Buns 3," and "Buns 1 & 2" were all on the list as well. "Buns" started as a one-shot exercise video from the Maier Group, a

company that also markets exercise videos such as "Dieting Omities." The company hired athlete and health-club owner Greg Smithy (a Chuck Norris look-alike) to make the first "Buns of Steel" video in 1987. Thanks to an enticing photo of Webb's very muscular backside on the box, the video became a hit.

So there was a sequel. And then a threequel, in which Webb finally had the chance to show the rest of herself. Webb, who has a master's degree in exercise science, was a well-known fitness instructor in the San Diego area when she was asked to model for "Buns of Steel."

"I was teaching at the famous Golden Door health spa where I trained Christie Brinkley, John Denver and other celebrities who come to the Golden Door," she recalls.

The response to Webb's grueling squat-and-lunge workout was so good (but she was asked to do more videos: "Abs of Steel" (1 and 2) and "Buns of Steel 4 (Advanced)") and "Buns of Steel Beginners."

The videos do work, Webb says. "People buy them as a joke because of the name and then they discover it's a great workout."

Consistency is the key to exercise, Webb says, and she shows no signs of stopping. Within a few weeks, her new videos — a revised "Buns 2000," a step exercise video "Buns 2000" and "Thighs of Steel" — will be on the market.

'Star Wars' makes leap from top movie to video game well

Recommended ages: 8 and up. How the game works: Based on the hit 1977 movie, this game gives you a choice of three roles — Luke Skywalker, Han Solo or Chewbacca. The goal is to make it through 14 levels, from ripping through the Tatooine desert in Luke's land-speeder to clashing with aliens in the Mos Eisley Cantina, blasting imperial storm troopers or battling the fighters in the trenches of the Death Star. Along the way, you'll pick up all kinds of weapons. (Luke's light-saber is both

the most fun and the most effective). Good points, bad points: "Super Star Wars" pushes the limits with high-speed flying and fighting, accurate scaling and 360-degree rotation. This game uses three depths of field — near, mid-range and far — to create the feeling of a three-dimensional universe, a feature previously found only on expensive CD-ROM game systems. Excellent imitation includes sound effects from the movie and digitized speech. Bad points: There is no "save-game" password (every time you load the game you must start over, which can be frustrating if you have advanced to higher levels), and only one can play at a time.

The bottom line: A major step above the eight-bit "Star Wars" Nintendo game, and the best movie transfer to a video game in a long time.

New 'Amos' will bust your guts along with stereotypes

WASHINGTON — Lots of us are guilty of making sweeping judgments about people based solely on the color God gifted wrapped them in. So it's good news when a movie this sensibly — and humorously — with the fact.

Even if that film's star almost passed on it because of its title. "I read the name 'Amos & Andrew' and said, 'I don't think so,'" says actor Samuel L. Jackson of the social comedy. Currently, he can be seen in the hit satire, "National Lampoon's Loaded Weapon 1."

Jackson won't be the only person turned off by the "Amos & Andrew" title — the name is too reminiscent of "Amos & Andy," the old radio and TV series infamous for stereotyping black characters.

But that's precisely the movie's point. When it comes to skin color or craziness, very little is ever quite what it seems.

Jackson, 44, plays brilliant, wealthy Super-brother Andrew Sterling in the film. A naughty mix of Spike Lee, Harvard scholar Henry Louis Gates Jr. and playwright August Wilson, Sterling describes himself as "a thorn in the side of white America."

This particular thorn moves into the wrong neighborhood — a spacious home on an exclusive New England resort island. On Sterling's first night in his new home, his unsuspecting white neighbors spy him fiddling with his CD player and "naturally" assume he's a burglar. Or as one neighbor puts it: When you see a black man in this neighborhood with an armful of stereo equipment, "you know damn good and well what

he's doing." After police are summoned, the neighbors' erroneous assumption takes on a life of its own, eventu-

doesn't bludgeon people." Jackson knows firsthand how assumptions can affect people's lives. The 6-3 stage actor's first important film role was that of a turn-of-the-century gang member in Milos Forman's lyrical "Ragtime."

That was just the beginning. He was an incept thief in "Goodfellas," a frenzied stickup man in "Coming to America," a parolee in "Ser of Love." On TV, he played a dozen no-goodniks, ending up in the gas chamber and the electric chair on separate series.

Somewhat, "I didn't look like a responsible adult," deadpans Jackson. "Must be something about a black man with hair on his face."

There are the Andrew Sterlings of the world, and the Amos Odells too — he's the white, small-time hood played by Jackson's co-star, Nicholas Cage, in the film.

And while "Amos & Andrew" is joyfully unsparring of the whites who instantly draw the wrong conclusions about the educated African American played by Jackson, it also skewers some black folk's assumption that their every misfortune is traceable to racism.

Enthusiastic test-audience reactions to "Amos" suggest to Jackson that, "People want a movie like this. ... We're trying to find answers to different social ills. ... After the film, people may be having coffee, and say, 'That was really funny when so-and-so said ...' and then realize they are guilty of saying some of those same things, of feeling them."

HOLLYWOOD — In Hollywood, movie deals involving millions of dollars are routinely made with a simple handshake. It's often the case that a film has been completed before the lawyers work out the details and the star signs a contract.

This may be common in industry circles. But will it make sense to a jury of Los Angeles County residents?

That's the question this week as actress Kim Basinger confronts charges that she backed out of a movie she allegedly had agreed to star in. Main Line Pictures Inc. contends that Basinger and International Creative Management breached a verbal contract for the actress to star in the film "Boxing Helena." The company's suit claims it lost nearly \$6.4 million because of the breach.

In court last week, the film's director, Jennifer Lynch, testified that Basinger backed out of the title role on the recommendation of her agent, Guy McElwaine of ICM.

But from the suit's outset, Basinger's attorney, Howard Weitzman, contended that the actress never made a final commitment to play the role. Weitzman said she turned it down because of her concerns with the character's personality and graphic sex scenes.

In the film, Helena is a woman who is rescued from a car accident by a doctor who then amputates her injured legs and then marries and keeps her as a hostage in a box, hoping she will fall in love with him. Screenplay writer who co-starred in the TV series "Twin Peaks," eventually took the Helena role.

As the trial opened last week, Basinger, accompanied by actor Alec Baldwin, sat through the proceedings in court. Photographers were barred from the courtroom and

and producer Sherry Lansing with a lawsuit for \$5 million for breach of contract when Harrelson jumped out of "Benny and Joon" and took a part in Basinger's "Indecent Proposal." In that case, Weitzman represented the studio's interest. The Harrelson case was settled out of court for less than \$500,000.

There are some agents who believe that if the jury rules against Basinger, it will be tougher for actors to walk away once they've made a verbal agreement. "It will make people think twice before they pull out of things ... who wants to go

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Urban fantasy reads more like 'Death Wish'

Capsule reviews

The following are capsule reviews of movies showing in the Magic Valley. Rating is by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times.

FALLING DOWN (R), A regrettable urban fantasy that details, in "Death Wish" fashion, what happens when a fed-up average Joe (Michael Douglas) turns into an armed and dangerous Miss Manners, ready to enforce civility at the point of a gun. Written by Ebbe Roe Smith and directed by Joel Schumacher, this is a film that uses bogus social consciousness as a blind for cashing in on society's miseries.

GROUNDHOG DAY (PG), Though endearing is not an adjective often associated with the abrasive Bill Murray, it is this time in a small-scale romantic comedy about a cranky weatherman who is forced to relive the same Feb. 2 over and over again until he gets it right. Co-starring Andie MacDowell and directed by Harold Ramis, "Groundhog" is really too heavy on Hollywood schtick, but once the obvious laughter is over, it may just make you smile.

ALADDIN (G), This musical successor to Disney's "Beauty and the Beast" does more than expand the visual boundaries of mainstream animation and its possibilities for extravagant humor. It offers Robin Williams, who brings his nimble wit and lightning fast comedy to the character of the Genie, in what may be the role of a lifetime. The late Howard Ashman contributes some brilliant lyrics, and the whole combination ends up appealing not only to the smallest child but to the biggest adult. Aren't we lucky to have it now?

ALIVE (R), A solid, straightforward recreation of a terrifying 1972 plane crash-and-is-unsettling, taboo-breaking aftermath. Alive's greatness lies in its ability to do except the one thing you really want with a saga like this, and that is transcend its material. Directed by Frank Marshall and starring Ethan Hawke and Vincent Spano, it is good at recreating physical detail but less adroit when it comes to conveying the experience's spiritual qualities.

ARMY OF DARKNESS (R), Sam Raimi's new pop schlock phantasmagoria is mostly a terrific piece of mindlessness about a 20th-Century hero-within-attitude (Bruce Campbell), thrown back into the 13th Century. Some of the special effects are captivating but they tend to overwhelm the knock-about humor.

A FEW GOOD MEN (R), A basic and familiar courtroom drama of the old school, as enjoyable as it is predictable, and boasting a pair of pure star-power performances by Jack Nicholson and Tom Cruise. Centered around a murder trial inside a military court room, "Men" is entertainment pure and simple, a commodity that has unaccountably become rarer and rarer. And nobody but nobody can raise their eyebrows quite like Jack.

NEW YORK (PG), If you don't remember the original high-grossing "Home Alone" don't worry: This zealous sequel is an attempt to do most exactly duplicate it. The result, unfortunately, plays like an overblatant parody of the first film, reminding us why we liked it without being able to duplicate its appeal. Tim Curry, however, is very funny in a bit of comedy.

HOMEWARD BOUND: THE INCREDIBLE JOURNEY (G), Highly appealing family film, far better developed than the 1963 original film. Three irresistible tales supplied by Don Ameche, Michael J. Fox and Sally Field, cross the High Sierras in search of their misters, three children living with their parents (Robert-Hays, Kim Greig), and a dog, in San Francisco, treat for all.

LORENZO'S OIL (PG-13), Though its plot of courageous parents trying to find a cure for an illness that is crippling their even more courageous son sounds like every Disease of the Month movie, "Lorenzo's Oil" is anything but average. Director George Miller believes this true-life adventure is every bit as exciting as any ambush and has ever walked into and has told it energetically and urgently without loading it down with sentiment. Almost as grueling to watch as it must have been to live through, and with a pair of fine performances from Nick Nolte (quite a likely accent) and Susan Sarandon.

SCENT OF A WOMAN (R), Al Pacino gives a tour de force performance as a blind, retired Army lieutenant colonel in this comedy. He is accompanied by Chris O'Donnell in fine as the scholar student from a nearby prep school who is hired to take care of Pacino for the Thanksgiving weekend and ends up accompanying him on a tour of Manhattan. Overlong and occasionally cornball, but full of affecting moments and wonderful acting.

SNIPER (R), A movie for people with time to waste: as compelling as a "Soldier" magazine cover. Tom Berenger, Billy Zane, the jungles of Panama and the rites of manhood as taught or experienced by CIA — and Army hunter/killers. Director Louis Lomax's movie is basically a late '60s-'70s brooding jungle lull, interrupted by sporadic gunplay, helicopters, lots of shots taken through scope sights and occasional camera tricks involving stop-motion bullet movement, but it isn't really smart, either.

GOMMERSBY (PG-13), Jodie Foster, who seems to improve with each picture, is absolutely radiant in this post-Civil War retelling of Max Remond's "Martin Guerre" and it is largely for her credit that the film's love scenes with Richard Gere work as well as they do. Unfortunately, this is a picture at war with itself, and an indifferent script and clichéd situations end up flattening that pleasant romantic combination to a standstill.

Baseball appears headed for facelift

PHOENIX — Baseball owners drew plans for changing the landscape of the sport Thursday, giving preliminary approval for expanded playoffs, interleague play and splitting each league into three divisions.

The moves could be in place by 1995. In a pair of straw votes that were overwhelming but not unanimous, the 28 teams approved doubling the playoffs from four teams to eight by adding an extra round, and splitting each league into two divisions of five teams and one division of four.

They also asked schedule-makers to include 10 to 20 interleague games per sport for each team, talking preliminary rivalries into account. The only interleague play this century has been in spring training, the All-Star game and the World Series.

"We're in a very competitive business with a lot of forms of entertainment," he said. "There's no industry that can afford to sit back."

The changes were sparked by a six-month examination of baseball's future following commissioner Fay Vincent's forced resignation last Sept. 7. Many owners are worried about finances, and see expanded playoffs as a way of adding revenue by creating more games for

television and pennant rates. "It will add attendance in September," said Peter Magowan, the new managing general partner of the San Francisco Giants.

Traditionalists have ridiculed the NFL, NBA and NHL for their extended playoffs, which, some say, lessen the significance of the regular season.

Baseball's most famous hip was put to an important test on the first day of the exhibition season. And Bo Jackson, who knows from this hip, does know how well he can run. "It's just the first game," he said Thursday. "I think you guys are expecting too much."

Jackson, playing for the first time with his artificial left hip, went 1 for 4 with an RBI single as the designated hitter for the Chicago White Sox. He left after five innings with a 11-10 loss to the Pittsburgh Pirates at Sarasota, Fla.

The 30-year-old slugger never needed to run all day. And that's just as well because he also is hobbled by a sore right hamstring. So he knows what any mortal would — he limped on the bases.

Jackson was not on the team's travel roster for Friday game's at Lakeland, Fla. He said he thought he'd be ready for Saturday's game against Texas.

"There's no need to play every day," he said. "I don't need to be the DH every day. I don't need to play first base every day."

Even so, he will need to do enough to convince the White Sox that his plastic-and-metal hip can stand the rigors of a full season.

The White Sox have until March 15 to either pick up his contract, which guarantees him \$910,000 and has another \$1.5 million in incentives, or pay \$150,000 to release him.

Jackson has not played in a major league game that counted since the final month of the 1991 season for the White Sox. However, the club has built a ticket campaign around his return. They just don't know, and neither does anyone else, whether he can make it back.

In other news, some Cincinnati Reds players aren't surprised general manager Jim Bowden said he would trade a star player eligible for free agency rather than lose him without compensation.

Pitcher Joe Rijo and Tim Lincecum, second baseman Bill Roberts and third baseman Chris Sabo are eligible to be free agents after this season unless the Reds sign them to long-term contracts.

Bowden said this week that he would trade one of the four by opening day if he cannot sign one to a long-term deal. The Reds' winter sign-off free-agent starter Greg Swindell to Houston has made Bowden wary.

The NFL's new system of free agency became a fact on Thursday when Gerald Perry and Don Maggs became the first two players to change teams, demonstrating that big a premium is being placed on left offensive tackles.

"Clearly this means Jeff will be seeking another team," said Marvin Demoff, Hostetler's agent. "We have some meetings scheduled. Others will be set up."

The signing of Perry, who the Rams thought they locked up, prompted the team to sign it would file a tampering charge with the Raiders contacted Perry prior to the March 1 start of the free agency period.

Perry will get \$3 million over three years, just under the figure for the league's top 10 offensive linemen. Maggs, meanwhile, moved from

Houston to Denver. The Broncos, ironically, had had a lingering gap at left tackle ever since they traded Perry to the Rams for Gaston Green, after Perry had a series of off-the-field problems. The problems continued in Los Angeles — he's now awaiting a hearing on charges of sexually assaulting a babysitter he had employed.

Those problems had less effect on the offers Perry received than the fact that he, like Maggs, plays left tackle.

That's usually the position on the quarterback's blind side and good left tackles are at a premium.

For example, when teams named their franchise players — those that can't move in this first year of free agency — three of the 10 were left tackles — Lomax Brown of Detroit, Jumbo Elliott of the Giants and Paul Gruber of Tampa Bay.

That means that five teams have moved to solidify that position in the first week of free agency.

Meanwhile, the team that seemed most aggressive in the early stages was Cleveland.

Defensive end Reggie White of the Philadelphia Eagles will visit Cleveland this weekend on a "recruiting visit." He will be joined by teammate Keith Byars and wide receiver Mark Ingram of the Giants.

White has said he wants to sign with a team that will make a commitment to winning and Browns' owner Art Modell wants to show him that he's trying to attract as many quality players as he can in an effort to win now.

Graf made starts only one teen-age upstart advanced to the quarterfinals, sweeping 15-year-old Iva Majoli of Croatia, 6-2, 6-2. Sanchez Vicario beat Patricia Hy 6-1, 7-5.

Jordan was expected to stay overnight at Northwestern Memorial Hospital, but was listed as probable for Chicago's game Friday night against the San Antonio Spurs, said Bulls spokeswoman Joyce Szymanski.

The infection between the fourth and fifth toes of Jordan's left foot developed from a corn.

Jordan's physician, Dr. John Hofferson, said Jordan told him the pain "got worse and worse, so that at the end of (Tuesday night's) game it was hurting him a great deal."

The doctor said Jordan even called him from the airplane on the way back to Chicago from New Jersey, where the Bulls defeated the Nets 87-80, and said the soreness was severe.

Manufacturers don't plan payroll increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — The restructuring of the factory work force that has cost millions of jobs is nearing an end, but manufacturers do not plan to increase their payrolls this year, according to a survey released Thursday.

Jerry Jasinski, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, said a survey of the group's board members found 90 percent do not intend to reduce their work force significantly this year.

The employment downsizing cycle for manufacturing as a whole appears to have stabilized, he told a news conference.

But Jasinski added that despite an anticipated 4.5 percent increase in industrial production, "manufacturers do not expect to increase overall employment this year."

The survey of 96 NAM board members suggested that manufacturers' payrolls will grow just 0.2 percent in 1993, even less than the 0.3 percent last year. The poll was taken just before President Clinton announced his economic stimulus program designed to create 500,000 jobs in the next two years.

Half (51 percent) of these manufacturers plan to increase employment, but 25 percent plan to increase their work forces by less than 2 percent, according to a summary of the

survey conducted by Peter D. Hart Research Associates Inc. "One in five board members anticipate no change and 29 percent plan to reduce their work force in 1993, including 11 percent who will cut work forces by 4 percent or more," the summary said.

The best news is the largest manufacturing employment gains in 1993 will be in jobs on the factory floor, while holding the line on management and administrative workers," Jasinski told the news conference.

The survey found 47 percent of the manufacturers plan to increase production line workers, while 27 percent anticipate cuts in factory floor jobs.

Forty-one percent intend to bring on more people in sales and services, while 7 percent plan cutbacks in that area. Thirty percent plan to enlarge their research staffs, while 9 percent said they expect to expand.

Only 8 percent foresee any increase in their administrative staffs, while 47 percent expect top-level layoffs. An even smaller 3 percent intend to add to their management staff, while 41 percent expect declines in those jobs.

The NAM survey also found that "manufacturers are moderately optimistic about the economic outlook and their own company's profitability in 1993," Jasinski said.

Poor pace of auto sales shows economy still weak

DETROIT (AP) — The sales pace of domestically-built vehicles dropped sharply in late February, makers reported Wednesday, contributing to an emerging picture of renewed weakness in the national economy.

When calculated on a per-day basis, sales actually rose in the final three of last month vs. a year ago. But on a seasonally adjusted annual rate, which is considered more significant, sales fell.

"This is a tough market to make a buck," said Tom Webb, chief economist for the National Automobile Dealers Association. The auto sales figures are widely followed by economists as a barometer of consumer spending and manufacturing strength. The weakness compounded other evidence that the economic recovery of late last year has faltered.

Sales results released by automakers showed domestically built

cars sold at a projected annual rate of 5.4 million in the Feb. 21-28 period, which had only six selling days. Last year, when the period had eight selling days and one less Sunday because of leap year, cars sold at a projected annual rate of 6 million.

Light trucks, the strongest sellers in the industry, sold at a projected annual rate of 3.9 million in late February, up from 3.8 million in the same period last year.

For the entire month, domestic cars sold at a 6.1 million annual rate compared with a 6.2 million annual rate last February. Domestic light trucks for all of February sold at a projected annual rate of 4.6 million, compared with a 3.9 million rate last February.

For the month, including imports, sales rose 3.4 percent with most of the strength in light trucks such as minivans, sport utility vehicles and pickup trucks.

Idaho Power offers incentive for using energy-saving bulbs

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Power Co. wants its commercial customers to change their light bulbs. As encouragement, the utility is willing to pay \$200 for every kilowatt of electricity saved by using energy-saving light fixtures.

Idaho Power spokesman Jeff Beaman said the plan submitted to the state Public Utilities Commission for approval also would offer more specific incentives for customers who can make only small changes.

For example, the company will pay \$6 for each fluorescent lamp, and \$20 for each time clock installed to control lighting.

"By making better use of the electricity that's generated today, we delay the need to build new power plants which are, by nature, more costly than plants that already exist," Beaman said.

Idaho Power expects to pay about \$540,000 to save 6.6 million kilowatt-hours of electricity a year — enough to meet the average annual needs of approximately 475 residential customers.

Beaman said the long-term savings to the company could be enormous since a typical small power producer is for 12 years. Idaho Power would have to pay \$2.5 million to buy 6.6 million kilowatt-hours a year over the life of the contract.

Although lights account for less than 1 percent of a commercial customer's yearly business costs, Idaho Power said in a news release that "customers have indicated a willingness to use efficient lighting technologies provided they are supported with adequate information and funding."

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Maytag celebrates 100th anniversary

NEWTON, Iowa (AP) — Maytag Co. is searching for its oldest operating washing machine, wringer washer in a contest to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the company's founding.

Maytag made 12 million models of the wringer washers between 1919 and 1983 and says it receives hundreds of letters each year from owners who still use models made as long ago as the 1920s.

Cosby returns to NBC

We now know what the initials NBC stand for — Need Bill Cosby. The struggling Peacock Network made this very clear last week when it announced that the comedian, whose "Cosby" show helped pull NBC from No. 3 to No. 1 in the '80s, will return to the again-in-third network for the 1993-94 season.

"Cosby" will star in four-two-hour movies that will be spun off into a weekly hourlong series to premiere during the 1994-95 season. The concept agreed on by Cosby and NBC is a lighthearted mystery in the tradition of Angela Lansbury's "Murder, She Wrote" and Peter Falk's "Columbo."

The movie was announced by NBC's recently appointed West Coast president, Don Ohlmeyer, who quickly is fulfilling his promise

to aggressively pursue heavyweight talent. More than just the return of a beloved star, this deal is an obvious attempt to offset the second-guessing that followed the loss of late-night host David Letterman to CBS.

"Bill Cosby — is — a winner," Ohlmeyer said in the statement issued by NBC, "and as we set out to re-energize and re-invigorate NBC, it's only appropriate that the first step be with Bill Cosby. ... We are all tremendously excited to have Bill back at NBC, where he belongs, and we want everyone who comes to NBC to have the same winning attitude that Bill characterizes and articulates."

"Cosby's return follows the failure of his syndicated "You Bet Your Life," a one-year revival of Groucho Marx's classic game show. The secret word was disaster. It never caught on, earlier this year, the goose flew down to issue a cancellation notice.

Newsmagazines are TV of '90s

Sitcoms and dramas continue to bomb, but newsmagazines are clicking in the tick-tick-tick tradition of "60 Minutes."

They're making the "Vast Wasteland" of a hospitable place, for viewers and the networks. The Great-Newsmagazine Rush of 1993 is on. Before the year is out, Forrest Sawyer, Connie Chung and Faith Daniels will anchor new magazines, bringing the total to nine.

For once, the copycat mentality might actually benefit television. Finally, a break from laugh tracks and contrived situations.

The magazines offer the hope of ratings gold. The week before last, four shows were in the Top 25: "48 Hours," at No. 7, "20/20" at No. 9, "PrimeTime Live" at No. 17 and "Street Stories," at No. 24. "Dateline NBC" was pre-empted for a Maru Shiver special. But the news-magazine, which debuted last spring, has higher ratings than any of NBC's new fall series.

"60 Minutes," the granddaddy of the genre, fell No. 31 when it faced the Super Bowl. But the CBS program, now in its 24th year, remains the No. 1 show this season, has landed in the Top 10 each of the last 15 seasons and has earned CBS \$1 billion.

Programs are thus cheaper to produce than entertainment series —

compare about \$1 million per episode for an hourlong drama to roughly half that for a magazine. The networks own them, so no court-just hassles with studios. And unlike most entertainment shows, the magazines grow stronger with maturity.

For viewers weary of Hollywood shtick, the magazines mean fewer reruns and dependable storytelling. "Television is always criticized for being empty and a waste of time," said Victor-Neufeld, executive producer of "20/20." "The news-magazines, even on bad nights, offer stories that are informative and benefit the audience in many ways."

Sometimes, the newsmagazines miss, as "20/20" did by broadcasting an exorcism. Or they reveal a tabloidy side, as "Dateline" did by interviewing Amy Fisher.

But usually the stories are more satisfying, memorable or outrageous than anything Hollywood can conceive. "60 Minutes" told the story of school janitors who are better paid than teachers. "20/20" interviewed Gregory Kingsley, the Florida boy who "divorced" his parents. "48 Hours" looked at shrunkenyetics and "PrimeTime Live" investigated auto repair fraud.

The newsmagazine has become such a force that "60 Minutes" helped shape the presidential cam-

paign. After last year's Super Bowl, Bill Clinton discussed allegations of infidelity and may have saved his candidacy.

So potent a draw is the newsmagazine that it may be supplanting the drama. In the era of the remote control, a multistory magazine can hold viewers' attention much better than an hourlong plot. And viewers don't have to settle for average quality.

"Life is much tougher now, and people need more information and they know it," said Rick Kaplan, executive producer of "PrimeTime Live." "You don't get much more drama than what's occurring in real life."

The newsmagazines also give viewers a feeling of empowerment. "There's the sense that someone cares, that things are not entirely hopeless," said Andrew Hayward, the former executive producer of "48 Hours" who will supervise Chung's new show. "The news-magazines have tapped into clarity in an unclear world. They're satisfying a need for storytelling that more conventional forms are not meeting... It's not that people have an insatiable craving for more news programs."

Viewers do seem to have an insatiable craving for "60 Minutes" which all magazines have had to a degree. It has never sagged, thanks to consistently excellent stories and a company-of-top-notch correspondents.

And now for some primal screams about the primal-scene experience.

—Some malcontents in my office keep grumbling that "Northern Exposure" is in decline. They don't like the Bubble Man. They don't like the catapult episodes. They don't like Chris-in-the-morning's literary ruminations on the radio anymore.

Fish posh. "Northern Exposure" is still cooking with gas. The producers have pushed their little envelope this season, sending Maggie home to Detroit (with Fleischman in tow), bringing in the Bubble Man, introducing a politically incorrect feminist, and sending Marilyn on a weird outing to Seattle, among other twists.

The episode in which Maggie and Joel finally went for a roll in the hay (literally),

witily mocked the hype surrounding other famous consummations of recent TV history, notably "The Untouchables" and Cybill's "Shelter on 'Moonlighting'."

Best of all, the show is driving the right-wingers nuts (or, nuttier). TV, etc. is a newsletter put out by a conservative media-watch group headed up by L. Brent Bozell III, the guy who puts out an annual list of the 10 most liberal shows on TV.

The February issue includes scathing reviews of "Dinosaurs" (headlined "Prehistoric Propaganda") and "Northern Exposure," which it charges with "Chicken Little environmentalism."

Conservatives are so cute when they're mad — and out of power.

right now is its climactic flip side — the wondrously appreciated and underwatched "Key West."

This is a special series — stylish, funky, idiosyncratic, purveyor of its own peculiar vision. It's far superior to the more ballooned show it follows Tuesday nights on Fox. —The critics of '93's critics' during but greatly over-praised.

Despite scheduling problems, 'Homefront' not out of a home yet

Will "Homefront" find a home at ABC? Miami Kennedy is counting on it.

"Maybe I'm naive, but I'm eternally optimistic," says Kennedy, who plays rich, nasty Ruth Sloan on the acclaimed post-World War II drama. It returns to the lineup March 9. "The network are losing viewers to cable. They need mass-appeal shows like ours. ABC loves Homefront. They'd love to see it become a hit."

Really? After not running more than four episodes consecutively this season, ABC shelved the sophomore series in January; nine segments were clocked at 9 p.m. EST Thursdays; it returns in its original 9 p.m. MST Tuesday slot for

seven uninterrupted episodes. No word on the fate of the remaining two segments.

Having lived through a close call about "Homefront's" chances for a second season last fall, Kennedy and the cast experienced deja vu when ABC decided to put the series on hiatus. "I thought, 'This is the end. This is how they kill you,'" says Kennedy, 44. "I was sad and disappointed and frightened for my job, like anybody who feels they're going to be laid off. We thought that they thought they had a hit, despite ABC's love us. We had every indication the scheduling problems."

It may be more than scheduling. According to new ABC Entertainment chief Ted Harbert, reality newsmagazines, such as "PrimeTime Live" and "Street

Stories" are replacing hourlong entertainment shows as '90s network dramas. They come in smaller packages, and they're half as expensive to produce.

No argument there, Kennedy says. But what fiction gives you "is distance, it can heal you. Everyone can identify with certain characters. Newsmagazines often point out problems in society. They can scare you with their 'right here, right now' feeling. When you watch a newsmagazine, most of the time you're saying: 'That's not me, thank God. I'm not a murder victim, or I don't live next to a toxic-waste dump.'"

After seven bombs — anybody remember NBC's "Under One Roof" in '87 — "Homefront" is the eighth series for Kennedy. Playing realist Ruth Sloan "is an actress' dream. I'm acting, be-

coming someone else completely. It's the perfect revenge for an old hippie who has had to put up with those people-in-society for so long. I can show them for the vengeful, selfish people they really are."

In real life, Kennedy is married to actor-turned-high school English teacher Larry Dilig. (They met through a computer dating service in '74.) They have a son, Cisco, 10, and a daughter, Molly, 7. Kennedy's spreading the word about "Homefront's" return, and she has a few letters from 30 friends and relations, urging them to watch the show.

"I have to hit a Nielsen family somewhere," Kennedy says with a quick laugh.

"Homefront" airs from 9 to 10 p.m. MST on ABC.

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Vegas fights may become obsolete

In 1889 in Richburg, Miss. John L. Sullivan went 75 rounds with Jake Kilglin in boxing's last bare knuckles championship. Tex Rickard, a former Texas marshal who struck it rich on the Klondike, put Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney together in Soldier Field in Chicago in 1927, and four decades later, Muhammad Ali was traipsing from Louisville to Lewiston to central Africa.

In those years, big-prize fights didn't have to be in a casino in Las Vegas or Atlantic City.

Five years from now, or less, they might not have to be anymore, either.

Pay-per-view television will make it possible for promoters to, hold fights anywhere and make money. So, will they? That's another question entirely.

"It will have a definite impact on the sites because, as the pay-per-view universe increases, the opportu-

nity to make money will increase," Caesars World Sports president Rich Rose said. "Site fees will be less important in the mix."

And that comes from a casino man. The word of temperance comes from the pay-per-view industry. "I'm afraid it sounds better than it plays," said Seth Abraham, president of Time Warner Sports, whose pay-per-view subsidiary TVQ grossed more than \$40 million on Evander Holyfield-George Foreman and more than \$30 million on Holyfield-Riddick Bowe.

"Just because TV revenues go up doesn't mean promoters will want to see site fees go down. As long as you have casinos in Vegas and Atlantic City that are able to bid up prices, it'll be very, very difficult for other sites to get involved."

In the past 15 years, for example, Caesars Palace in Las Vegas has

been the site of more than 80 championship fights, Rose said. Occasionally, the casino stranglehold is broken, by a fight such as Bowe's defense Feb. 6 against Michael Dokes at Madison Square Garden.

Bowe-Dokes was televised by another Time Warner company, HBO. It's a special case, says Garden boxing spokesman Steve Griffith.

Bowe is from New York, and that emotional attachment was a big part of the reason why he fought here," Griffith said. "But in the future, we're certain Riddick wants to come back here, and it's logical that future fights will be on pay-per-view."

"As the universe increases, making revenue greater, the impact of that \$500,000 site fee we can't match diminishes," Griffith said. "In another couple of years, when there are 40 million homes instead of 20 million in the pay-per-view universe, promoters will start looking in our direction a little more."

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Company says Braves copied fan magazine

ATLANTA (AP) — The owners of a small company that published a magazine for the Atlanta Braves' Spanish-speaking fans claims the Braves liked the magazine so much they're trying to publish one of their own and cut the company out.

Bilingual Atlanta of suburban Marietta published a single issue of "Los Braves Internacionales" last October with articles written in Spanish about Hispanic members of the team and the playoffs.

Now, company owners said, the Braves are trying to publish a magazine of their own, ignoring copyright ownership and "good faith" agreements with Bilingual Atlanta.

"We're a small fish, and they're a big fish trying to eat us," said Andy Campbell, vice president of the company. His wife, Liza Campbell, is president.

Campbell said the Braves have arranged with Pacific Gateway, an Atlanta publishing company, to publish an identical magazine, even using the format and logo designed by Bilingual Atlanta.

"That's ours," Campbell said.

Braves officials said they are "not at liberty to discuss" the matter. Pacific Gateway officials could not be reached for comment.

Liza Campbell said the couple spent about \$25,000 putting out the first issue of the magazine, which carried free advertising for several large companies and was distributed free in the metro area. The Campbells say it is a long-term money-maker for their company, which also publishes a business newsletter in Spanish and runs bilingual marketing and telephone answering services.
