Demos advance plan to cut deficit

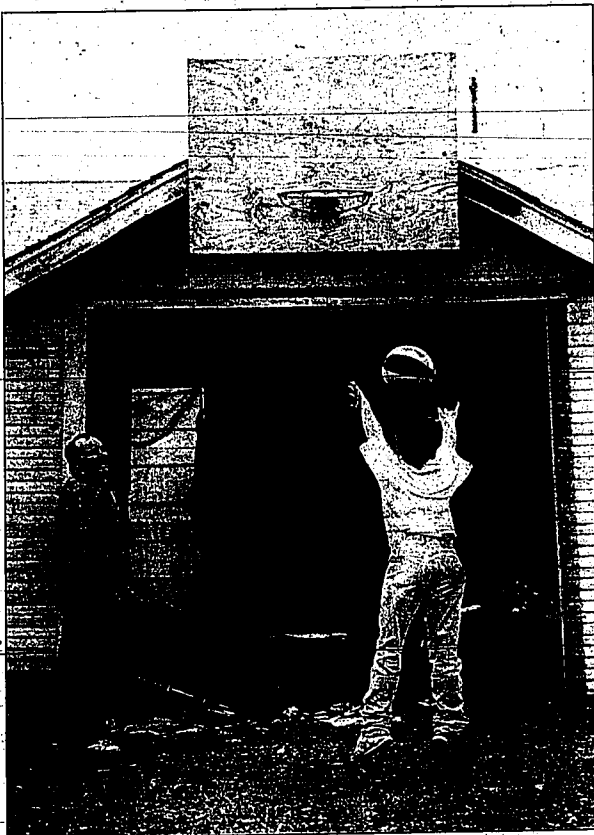
WASHINGTON — United Democrats whipped the outlines of a \$502 billion budget-cutting plan through a Senate committee Thursday night. But they quarreled among themselves over whether to trim President Clinton's \$16 billion spending plan for jobs. After systematically rejecting 29 Republican amendments, the Senate Budget Committee approved a deficit-reduction blueprint that added about \$60 billion in spending cuts and tax increases to the pack-

age Clinton unveiled last month. But the backbone was still that of the president's plan: taxes on the rich and on energy, defense cuts and extra money for education and public works projects. The final vote was along party lines: 12 Democrats for the plan and 9 Republicans against. Republicans tried to eliminate tax increases, to scale back the new spending Clinton proposed and to hold the defense reduction to the \$60 billion Clinton pledged during his campaign, rather than the \$127 billion, five-year cut Democrats agreed on.

On every attempt, the Republicans failed. "It sounds like you think we have just walked out of Independence Hall and invented government," said Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C. "But we've got a big problem" — the deficit. The Senate panel's debate came a day after the House Budget Committee approved the outlines of a similar \$510 billion deficit-reduction measure. The full House and Senate plan to debate the two measures next week, as majority Democrats press to enact Clinton's economic proposals. Both measures would compress budget

deficits projected at or beyond \$300 billion for the rest of the century to \$254 billion next year and around \$200 billion by 1998. To find savings, both committees chose to imperil parts of Clinton's plans to spend \$144 billion on community development. The Senate would postpone spending one-fifth of the new money until after 1998. The House measure would clamp a tight cap on future spending, and let lawmakers decide later whether to cut existing programs or the extra money Clinton wants.

Jury considers size of culvert

TWIN FALLS — A piece of pipe 10 feet in diameter leans against the courtroom wall where a jury is deliberating the fates of the Salmon River Canal Co., two highway districts and dozens of people. The jury has listened to eight weeks of testimony and nearly two days of closing arguments in the \$2.4 million lawsuit over Salmon Falls Creek's 1984 flood. The pipe bears silent testimony to the size of the flood and was introduced as evidence in the case by two highway districts that owned Balanced Rock Crossing. The crossing was the central point of arguments Thursday as four sets of lawyers pitched their cases for the last time to the jury. Fifth District Judge J. William Hart turned the lawsuit over to the jury shortly before noon. Salmon Falls Reservoir filled for the first time in 1984. People who owned irrigation pumps

houses and businesses downstream of the dam pleaded with Salmon River Canal Co. to release small amounts of water early to prevent floods. But Salmon River Canal Co. directors said they planned to fill their reservoir within 5 feet of its top before spilling. When it neared the top, warm weather and a heavy rain predicted snowmelt brought much larger spills than the company expected. The pipe, which nearly touches the ceiling of the courtroom, apparently wasn't large enough to handle the flow. The culvert could handle large amounts of water, according to the district's calculations, if the water backed up behind the earthen fill and created more pressure on the water flowing through the pipe. In 1984, the districts hurriedly dug a notch in the crossing with heavy equipment to let the water pass as Salmon River Canal Co. spilled its water. The water reached the notch, tore out the

Tomorrow's retirement not an attractive deal

WASHINGTON — Unlike their grandparents, who are collecting more in Social Security retirement benefits than they paid in taxes, many of today's workers won't get their money's worth when they retire, Congress was told Thursday. Social Security was a good deal for almost anyone who is retired today; it is not going to be a particularly good deal for many people who retire in the future, said John B. Shoven, professor of economics and director of the Center for Economic Policy Research at Stanford University. He and other experts told the Senate Finance Committee last week that, within a decade, average workers could begin to see the value of

their Social Security retirement benefits slip below what they and their employers contributed in taxes. Bruce D. Schobel, corporate vice president and actuary for New York Life Insurance Co., said the system is getting "very close to the critical level." Support for Social Security could wane if workers, knowing that they won't get back 100 percent of what they and their employer paid in, believe they can do better by investing that money on their own, the witnesses said. But the experts also testified that the program's value should not be measured solely on the basis of the dollar value of benefits a retiree can collect. Social Security also protects

Cult leader agrees to release of 3 men, but hopes for progress fade

WACO, Texas — Doomsday cult leader David Koresh agreed Thursday to let three men leave his armed compound, the FBI said, but they still hadn't left by late in the 12th day of the sect's standoff with federal agents. Also Thursday, a 12-year-old girl who lived with the cult for four years said that while there, she was taught to put a gun in her mouth and instructed how to commit suicide by taking cyanide. The siege of the Branch Davidians' rural compound near Waco began Feb. 28 when an attempted raid by federal agents turned into gun battles. Four federal agents and at least two cult members died. Two women and 21 children were allowed to leave last week. The last was a young girl last Friday. Ninety adults and 17 children are still believed to be inside the compound. FBI spokesman Dick Swensen called Koresh's promise to release three men — made in a phone call early in the day — a positive signal in negotiations to end the stalemate. But by early evening, the three had not left, authorities said.

Swensen cautioned, "Until they come out, we won't be comfortable that they are coming out." More than a week ago, Koresh reneged on a promise to surrender the entire cult once a radio station played a lengthy statement of his on the air. Koresh, an apocalyptic preacher who has called himself Jesus Christ, has said earlier that he was injured in the gun battle. Americans forget healthy living

WASHINGTON — Americans are fatter, do less strenuous exercise, and sleep less soundly, are more stressed and sleep less than they did in the 1980s, according to a broad-based annual survey released Thursday. "When it comes to voluntary health habits, the nation is at best holding the line, and at worst slipping from gains made in the early- to mid-1980s," said a statement from Baxter International, a major international supplier of health products that financed the survey, which covered 1992. Based on the latest results, said Humphrey Taylor, president of Louis Harris and Associates, which has been conducting the survey each year for a decade, it is quite possible "that the healthy-lifestyle movement of the past two decades was in fact just a passing fad," like "the hula hoop and cabbage-patch dolls." The most encouraging signs, Taylor told a press conference here, were an "enormous increase in seat-belt use" from 19 percent in 1985 to 70 percent in 1992, and in smoke-detector use, from 67 percent to 90 percent. The proportion of non-smokers and non-drinkers also rose. "You can't make it to the Olympic games and win a gold medal (if you are) 50 lbs. overweight," said a fit-looking Olympic track champion Florence Griffith Joyner, on hand to promote healthy lifestyles.

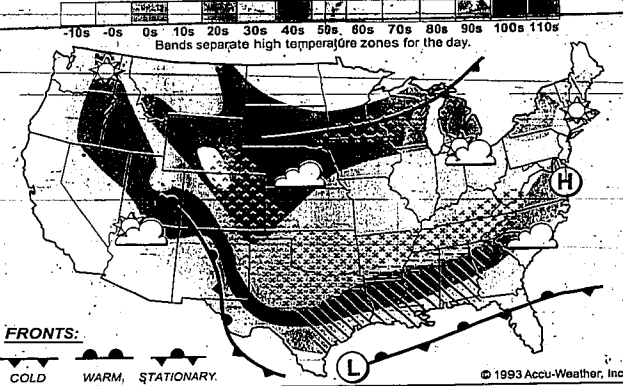

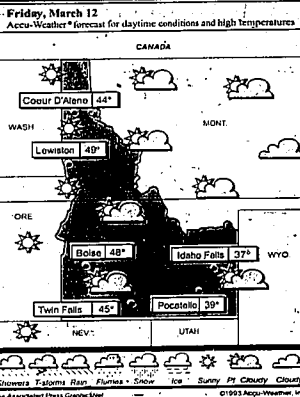

crossing, swept away four sets of irrigation pumps and inundated houses on its way to the Snake River.

The districts did everything they could, argued Twin Falls attorney Robert Alexander, who represented the Twin Falls Highway District.

"The main, simple fact is that for the entire history of the crossing, it had been twice more than big enough to handle the flows in Salmon Falls Creek," Alexander said.

Replied Salmon River Canal Co. attorney David Lombardi: "That's a big caveat. They brought it in the courtroom so you could see it. It looks big enough to me. But that's why I'm not an engineer."

The case wasn't big enough to pass floods that could be expected once every 50 years, Lombardi said, and 1984's flood was even bigger.

"This is the second jury to deliberate the lawsuit. In 1989, jurors in another trial pinned 40 percent of the blame on Salmon River Canal Co., 40 percent on the highway districts and 20 percent on the downstream landowners.

The Idaho Supreme Court overturned that verdict, saying 5th District Judge George Granata incorrectly ruled that Salmon River should have operated its dam to provide flood control for downstream landowners.

In another court ruled, the company should operate its dam in a reasonable manner.

Roadblocks assailed

Bomb probe tracking transfer of huge sums

NEW YORK (AP) — Investigators are tracking what could be tens of millions of dollars sent to two suspects in the World Trade Center bombing to pay for the attack and other terrorist activities, a federal law enforcement official said Thursday.

The money was transferred from Europe to a New Jersey bank account held jointly by the two suspects, and officials were combing records of that account. The official wouldn't say which country the money was sent from.

The official also wouldn't say exactly how much money was involved, but said the FBI suspects "there were probably several deposits of under \$10,000 into the account. Deposits of less than \$10,000 would avoid federal reporting requirements."

"We speculate that the money was used for the bombing, possible escape, safe houses and other terrorist activities," the official said.

The bank account was held by Mohammed Saleh, 25, an alleged member from Jordan who was arrested March 4 in Jersey City, N.J., where he was living; and Nidal A. Ayyad, 25, a Palestinian-American chemical engineer arrested Wednesday at his home in Maplewood, N.J.

Both are charged with aiding in the Feb. 26 bombing that killed at least five people, injured more than 1,000 and shut the world's second tallest buildings until at least the end of March.

In other developments:

The father of the latest suspect said his son lacks any motivation to become a terrorist again after his arrest, where he emigrated from Kuwait to study.

Investigators continued searching the blast rubble with body-sniffing dogs for a worker missing since the attack. Crews at the 110-story twin towers started an expected two-week job scrubbing soot from the complex.

workers and their dependents against disability and death, and keeps 13 million Americans out of poverty, noted Robert M. Ball, commissioner of Social Security between 1962 and 1973.

"How do you put a figure on the protection that Social Security gives young people against the cost to them of parents who live much longer than average, are sicker than average, have saved little or... in the absence of Social Security, would need to move in with their sons and daughters," he said. "These unmeasurables are of great importance."

A recently published analysis by Scheibel and Robert J. Myers, chief actuary for the Social Security Administration until 1970, found that the vast majority of workers who retired in the past received, or are now receiving, benefits of far greater value than they had paid.

The analysis said that the average earner who retired in 1960 recover his Social Security taxes after just 10 months of benefits. The average earner retiring last year would reach the recovery point after 68 months — starting with benefits now averaging about \$650 monthly — while the payback period for workers retiring in the year 2027 is projected at 103 months.

And the situation could worsen, the authors said, especially if tax rates rise to a level needed to support the program over the long run.

"Many workers who retire in the future will not get their money's worth when the combined employer-employee taxes are considered," they wrote. "They would be expected to pay eventually for a program that is financed almost entirely by these payroll taxes."

The experts said the trend is the result of demographics — an aging population that is living longer coupled with slow economic growth.

Laurence J. Kotlikoff, professor of economics at Boston-University, also warned that the Baby Boom generation, and those that follow, will all pay much more in Social Security taxes over their lifetimes than they will get back in benefits. Moreover, the deal for each successive generation is worse.

The loss to the typical baby boomer ranges from one to two years of labor earnings, he said. For children just being born, the projected loss ranges from two to three years of labor earnings.

Other cult members, led by disgraced preacher Steve Schneider, said they were talking to more negotiators. Schneider said he was "asked if he believed Koresh was mortally wounded, Swensen said, "Frankly, no." He said Schneider can be heard over the phone consulting with Koresh.

Meanwhile, Kirk Jewell of Niles, Mich., appearing on the "Donahue" television show, described how she was trained to commit suicide while she lived at the compound.

The girl said she fears Koresh's followers will kill them all, and she urged federal authorities to break the standoff by invading the compound.

"Better a few people die than all of them," she said.

The girl was removed from the compound last year after a court granted her father custody. Her mother, Sherri Jewell, is believed to still be there.

In other developments Thursday:

U.S. District Judge Walter Smith Jr. rejected a request to grant Koresh access to a lawyer while the negotiations proceed. Lawyer Kirk Jewell made the request for Koresh's mother, Bonnie Haldeeman.

The judge also ordered the government's response to the request sealed, even to Lyons.

Mrs. Haldeeman and a lawyer tried to enter the restricted area around the 77-acre compound Thursday afternoon but were denied access. She told reporters she loved her son and wanted to help.

"Agent Dan Conroy of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms said an arrest warrant had been issued for cult member Paul Fatta," 35, charging him with conspiracy to manufacture and possess unregistered machine guns. Fatta, whose whereabouts were unknown, was at an Austin gun show on the day of the shootout.

Tension surrounds abortion clinics day after deadly gunshots

Seven waves of anxiety spread among abortion-rights advocates Thursday, a day after the shooting death of a doctor outside his clinic. What before had been a threat for the first time was reality.

One of their longtime foes crossed the line from passionate protest to fatal violence.

"I would guess that everyone who provides abortions is on notice today," said Patty Potts, executive director at Planned Parenthood in Kansas City, Mo.

"It is the ultimate horror... You can't predict who is going to do a crazy act like this and therefore you really have to be on guard."

Such tension is not new to Bruce, whose clinic was fire-bombed in December 1989. The staff had already learned to be vigilant, she said. "(But) beginning today, we will have an armed guard."

Many — if not most — abortion clinic staffers around the country have faced intimidation. Some have been blockaded by protesters, the targets of taunts and verbal threats. Others have confronted activists chained to chairs, hate mail or the foul-smelling fumes of butyric acid, a chemical sometimes sprayed at their doors.

With the election of President Clinton, anti-abortion activists are without a friend in the White House for the first time in a decade. Some abortion providers fear the movement could be intensifying in response.

"I'm starting to think that there may be some backlash in terms of extremists taking matters into their own hands," said Lisa, who has declined to use her last name since a chemical attack was made last fall against the clinic she runs in Grand Rapids, Mich.

The National Abortion Federation, which represents 200 clinics, estimates the reported incidence of harassment more than doubled in 1991-92. At scattered rallies and news conferences Thursday, activists appealed for a swift, strong response to the trend.

No evidence of conspiracy in clinic shooting, police say

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) — Investigators found no evidence Thursday of a conspiracy in the shooting death of a doctor outside his abortion clinic.

The anti-abortion demonstrator who reportedly confessed was ordered held without bond.

Michael Frederick Griffin, once described by his wife as suffering "great fits of violence," was ordered held without bond. A day earlier, he shot Dr. David Gunn, calmly surrendered and confessed, authorities said.

"At this time we have no evidence to indicate a conspiracy exists," police Sgt. Jerry Potts said. "The case is not closed, but I can't say we anticipate additional arrests."

Griffin, 31, was charged with murder. He is accused of firing three shots at Gunn from a .38-caliber revolver at point-blank range.

Gunn, 47, was getting out of his car at the back door of the Pensacola Women's Medical Services as anti-abortion demonstrators picketed the clinic.

Via a television hookup between the jail and the Escambia County Courthouse, Griffin asked Judge William J. Green for a blanket and a Bible for his cell.

Griffin also asked to represent himself, but the judge didn't rule on that request.

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Davidians have few supporters, but government has many critics

WACO, Texas (AP) — It isn't easy to find people who support the Branch Davidians, the apocalyptic cult holed up in a virtual fortress east of here.

But it's becoming easier by the day to find people who are critical of the government for its actions.

The criticism, much of it from the far right and from civil libertarians, has gone beyond early charges that the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms botched its raid on the sect's compound.

An increasing number of people are questioning whether the raid was necessary at all.

Talk radio shows and computer bulletin boards have been flooded with calls and messages from critics of the military-style operation against the Branch Davidians. Members of the Libertarian Party held an anti-government protest in Waco. And some conservative Republicans have begun to speak out against the raid.

"Let's set aside the thorny theological issue of whether David Koresh is Jesus Christ," conservative newspaper columnist Joseph Sobran wrote earlier this week. "A more serious problem is that the federal government thinks it's God."

The criticism springs from several sources.

Some of the critics say the Branch

Davidians are being persecuted for their religious beliefs, which are said to include the claim by Koresh, the sect's leader, that he is Jesus.

Others say the government is overreacting to violations of firearms laws; still others oppose those laws altogether.

"Freedom of religion is for all believers," Gary Johnson, spokesman for the Libertarian Party of Texas, said last weekend. "A cult, whatever that is, is no exception. And the right to bear arms is not for hunting or for shooting burglars or rapists. It is the last resort for resisting tyranny."

That last argument is what has fired the rage of many gun owners. Richard Gardiner, legislative counsel for the National Rifle Association, said the organization has been swamped with calls from members angered by the siege.

"There is the concern that these people were being picked on, and that violations of the gun control act may have been fabricated," Gardiner said in a telephone interview from Washington.

"Now, I don't know if that's the case, but that's the concern that's been raised by our members."

One problem with either criticism or support for the government is that the reasons for the raid remain largely secret. The original search and arrest warrants remain sealed, and the ATF won't say exactly what it was looking for, or what information it has.

The agency has insisted that it has a legal right to keep the warrants sealed until they have been executed. But some people have begun to question that.

"I think the public has a right to know," said Joe Cook, northern regional director for the Texas chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union. "If there ever was a reason for it to be sealed, I think that time is long past."

One irony is that much of the criticism comes from people who usually support law enforcement. David Rueker, a spokesman for the Associated Conservatives of Texas, a group of conservative Republicans, criticized the need for "a military strike force being used against innocent men, women and children."

"I'll guarantee you," Rueker said, "the FBI has never had a stronger supporter than me in the past. But I've been sickened by what I've seen down there."

Pentagon: Soldiers can talk about gas

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon said Wednesday that American soldiers used as human guinea pigs in World War II chemical weapons tests can now talk about their experiences, ending decades of secrecy.

The Pentagon is lifting a prohibition against military personnel involved in the tests disclosing what happened, Lt. Gen. Robert M. Alexander, a deputy assistant secretary of defense, told a House subcommittee.

Alexander said also that the Pentagon immediately will begin declassifying information on the locations, dates and individuals exposed to chemical weapons.



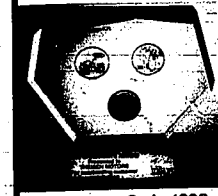

Clinton promises help for areas hit by closures

BALTIMORE (AP) — Looking to wean the nation off Cold War military budgets, President Clinton on Thursday promised help to people and places hurt by deep Pentagon cuts and a new round of base closings.

He also pledged to spend billions of dollars to promote civilian uses of military technology.

"The world's finest makers of swords can and will be the world's finest makers of plowshares," the president told enthusiastic workers at a Westinghouse Electronic Corp. plant, one day before the scheduled announcement of a new round of base closings.

Clinton plans to ease the pain of military cuts with a five-year "defense conversion" budget of \$19.6 billion, a fraction of the \$112 billion he plans to slash from the Pentagon budget during the same period.

Republicans said the conversion program won't provide enough help to victims of Pentagon cuts.

"I think it is a political effort to try to cover and make excuses for the incredible slashing that they're doing in this Pentagon, because they don't have the guts to cut anywhere else," said Rep. John Kasich, rank-

ing Republican on the House Budget Committee.

"I don't pretend that this will be easy, and all of it will take some time," Clinton said. "But the choice we face is between bold action to build a stronger and safer and smarter America or continuing to cut defense with one that is too localized and too limited."

Clinton's first-year budget contains little new money, and most of the programs announced Thursday have been on his agenda since the presidential campaign. But the Westinghouse plant — with its electric cars and high-tech civilian radar system — was a fitting backdrop for unveiling his repackaged defense conversion program.

Nearly 4,500 plant employees have been laid off since 1991, but company officials said hundreds of jobs were saved when the firm began using its technology to create products for civilian and military uses.

Clinton wants to use federal money to help more defense-oriented companies develop similar "dual-use" technology programs.

Wowed by the high-tech projects

on display at the plant, Clinton stared at the inside of an electric van. "I love it," he said.

A twin-engine surveillance plane shown to Clinton was used by the FBI for two days this week to monitor the site of the cult standoff in Waco, Texas, company officials said.

The first money for Clinton's package comes from a \$1.4 billion appropriation approved by the Congress last year but not spent by the Bush administration. Reiterating a promise he made last month, Clinton said he will take another \$300 million from other federal programs to make \$1.7 billion available for defense conversion in the fiscal year that ends Sept. 30.

Of the money to be spent this year, \$845 million will go to "dual use" programs; \$637 million will help workers, military personnel and communities hurt by defense cuts, and \$185 million will be spent on new technology.

In the next five years, Clinton hopes to spend \$5.2 billion on displaced workers and military personnel; \$4.7 billion on dual-use programs; and \$9.6 billion on new technology.

Space station redesign starts for NASA

WASHINGTON (AP) — Under orders from President Clinton, NASA has begun redesigning the proposed space station with a goal of scaling it back dramatically in size, cost, working lifetime and capabilities.

"He wants the current space station redesigned as part of a program that is more efficient and effective and capable of producing greater returns on our investment," NASA administrator Daniel Goldin told NASA center directors in a memorandum.

In the broad outlines from Goldin, many of the previous design goals would change.

The station would not necessarily be permanently manned by astronauts — simply visited periodically — and its lifetime would be 10-15 years, instead of the previously planned 30. The number of shuttle launches required to build the station in orbit would be cut back from the current 17 and so would the number of space walks needed for assembly.

Galileo antenna stuck

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Engineers made the Galileo spacecraft spin faster, but the maneuver failed to open its main antenna, a problem that will hamper the ship's \$1.4 billion mission to Jupiter.

NASA gave up any real hope of fixing the problem in January after thumping the stuck antenna dish 13,320 times with motors that were designed to open the device. Engineers had said there was almost no chance the jammed antenna would

U.S. infant mortality rate drops

ATLANTA — The U.S. infant mortality rate dropped to a record low, but black babies died at more than twice the rate of whites and the gap is growing, federal health officials reported Thursday.

For every 1,000 births in 1990, 9.2 babies died before age 1, down from 9.8 in 1989; the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said. It credited most of the drop to a new way of treating the underdeveloped lungs that kill thousands of premature and underweight babies.

In Idaho, the death rate was 8.7 per every 1,000 births.

"That kind of technology is exciting and, yes, it saves lives," said Rae Grad, executive director of the National Commission to Prevent Infant Mortality. "But wouldn't it be better to give mothers better prenatal care so their babies are born with big lungs instead of tiny lungs?"

The rate in 1990, the most recent year for which data are available, propelled the United States up two notches — to 20th place — in UNICEF's ranking of infant mortality in 23 developed countries. Japan has the world's best rate, 5 per 1,000; the United States ranked below Italy and ahead of Greece.

From 1980 to 1989, the U.S. infant mortality rate dropped about 3 percent annually. But the 1990 rate dropped 6 percent, primarily because the new lung treatment eliminated almost one-fourth of infant deaths from respiratory distress syndrome.

Premature and underweight babies — those born weighing less than 5 1/2 pounds — often have lungs that aren't completely developed. Doctors once just gave them oxygen.

Now, they manufacture a chemical, often missing from the lining of the babies' lungs, allowing them to breathe, said Dr. Marian MacDorman of the CDC.

Despite this technology, 38,351 babies died in 1990, down from 39,655 in 1989. The District of Columbia had by far the deadliest rate, 20.7, followed by Georgia with 12.4 and Mississippi with 12.1. Vermont had the lowest rate, 5.4.

The mortality rate for black infants was 18, compared with 7.6 for whites, and the disparity is growing, the CDC said.

The risk of dying was 2.3 times greater for black infants than whites in 1989, but had crept up to 2.4 times by 1990.

The rate of black infant deaths decreased 3 percent between 1989 and 1990, while the rate for whites decreased 6 percent.

Low birthweight was the leading killer of black babies, while birth defects claimed more white babies.

Socio-economic factors probably are to blame for the high death rate among blacks, MacDorman said. Nearly three times as many black as white infants were born to families living below the poverty line in 1990, and more black women are likely to be uninsured, she said.

"That means they don't have access to technology like the synthetic lung chemical, Grad said.

Senate confirms Reno to Justice

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate unanimously confirmed Janet Reno Thursday as the nation's first female attorney general.

That completed the Clinton Cabinet and bringing fresh leadership to a Justice Department still led by a Bush holdover.

Applause broke out in the normally decorous Senate chamber when the 98-0 vote was announced, making Reno the government's top law enforcement officer.

A host of problems, ranging from a terrorist bombing in New York to questions about the FBI director in her own department, await the 54-year-old South Florida prosecutor. She is expected to be sworn in next week.

"President Clinton should be commended for taking yet another step in opening new op-



portunities for women and minorities," Sen. Howard M. "Bud" Shuster, D-Ohio, said in the brief discussion that preceded the vote.

Reno's cakewalk through the constitutional advice-and-consent process closed the book a Clinton Cabinet-selection process that got under way not long after his election last November.

Clinton's difficulties filling the job of attorney general — the failed nomination of Zoe Baird and the withdrawal of federal judge Kimba Wood from consideration — have delayed any major policy reviews at the Justice Department.

House votes 356-58 to ban HIV-infected immigrants

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House overwhelmingly expressed support Thursday for banning immigrants infected with the AIDS virus, and the White House said it might have to accept Congress' intent despite President Clinton's opposition to the ban.

The House vote was 356-58.

"The president has to work with Congress. He can't act unilaterally on issues like this," White House spokeswoman Dee Dee Myers said today, anticipating Clinton's second defeat on the issue.

"Clinton's desire not to outlaw infected immigrants would add to an

already overwhelmed and overburdened health care system," said Rep. Thomas Bliley, R-Va.

In a preliminary vote, the House approved, 283-131, a bill authorizing spending for the National Institutes of Health.

"To hold up funding for the National Institutes of Health when it contains much-needed funding for breast and ovarian cancer and osteoporosis and other research is a serious, serious thing," Myers said.

"We'll have to wait and see how the bill ultimately comes to him, but I think Congress' intent on this becoming clear," Myers said.

UNLV officials, who have taken heat for forcing the resignation of former coach Jerry Turkkanian last year, were quick to deny the accusations. "I find it unimaginable that any instructor would let anyone pressure them into giving a grade," UNLV president Robert Maxson said Thursday.

David Chambers, a former NCAA executive and now UNLV compliance officer, said his office had informed NCAA headquarters that the university had checked

completed his course work. She said the pressure came at a time her husband was recovering from a heart attack, and that one call was made to

her at the hospital where he was being treated. "We have looked into it and are satisfied that the grade is proper, and he is eligible to compete," Chambers said. Rider is the nation's second-leading scorer at 29.2 points per game, and is expected to be a top pick in June's NBA draft. Bertolino is passing grade in the three-unit English class last fall put Rider over the 24-unit annual minimum needed to become eligible for the 1992-93 school year.

"We had some pretty good performances," said Buhl

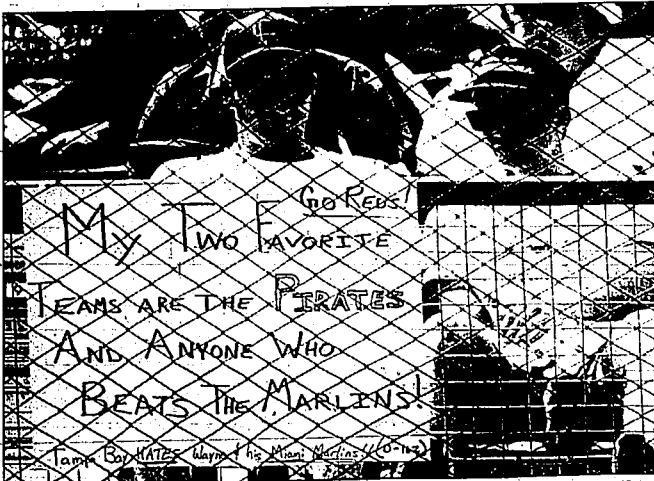
Coach Pat Milligan. "Ron Hunsaker came from behind and both 103-pounders, one a freshman, won. And two of the guys who lost were right in there to the end."

U of I may not play football with Big Sky

MOSCOW — The University of Idaho said Thursday it may not play football in the Big Sky Conference beginning in 1994 because of a conference decision to cut football scholarships over the next four years.

University President Elisabeth Zinser has appointed a committee to study the school's options and issue a report by June 1, the school said.

The panel is to consider options including:

- Remaining in the eight-member Big Sky Conference and complying with new scholarship rules.

- Remaining in the conference for all sports except football, which the school would play as an independent beginning with the 1994 season.

- Staying in the conference but playing football in another conference beginning in 1994.

The committee will include representatives from UI's faculty, administration, athletic department and athletic boosters.

"We're proud to be associated with the Big Sky Conference and at this point anticipate continuing our membership," Vandal athletic director Pete Liske said. "However, it's only prudent that the University of Idaho leave its options open during this period of careful review."

The move follows Monday's vote by the conference's Council of Presidents to cut each school's allotment of football scholarships to 45 by the 1996-97 school year.

The cuts will be made gradually, with six football scholarships phased out at each school per year beginning in fall 1994.

NCAA regulations currently allow Division I-AA schools to offer 65 scholarships. The NCAA is cutting the allowance to 63 in 1994.

Rodman skipped practice Wednesday without notifying coach Ron Rothstein. The team suspended Rodman for Thursday's game against Denver in Auburn Hills. Team spokesman Matt Dobek said Rodman missed practice because he was tired.

The suspension, which will cost Rodman about \$26,000 of his \$2.3 million annual contract, is the latest in a series of problems for him.

Rodman began having troubles as far back as last summer, when he threatened to retire. He said he

wasn't motivated to play and was upset that coach Chuck Daly had quit. Daly now coaches New Jersey.

He missed training camp and the first week of the season, citing depression over his divorce in California and his anger at Daly's departure. Rodman was suspended for three games in November after refusing to join the Pistons on a four-game road trip. He grabbed 20 or more rebounds in his first seven games after that suspension ended, and the Pistons decided against collecting \$78,000 in fines.

Police briefly hunted for Rodman Feb. 11 after a friend reported he'd left home in the predawn hours and a gun was missing. The friend said Rodman was distraught.

One of Otter's few tasks is staying out of trouble

We've long believed that C.L. "Butch" Otter was an excellent lieutenant governor, and that perhaps he would make a decent governor someday.

He's friendly, he speaks well, and he makes a good impression with Idaho's international trading partners.

But his recent shenanigans raise questions about his judgment.

For example: On the witness stand this week during his trial for driving under the influence of alcohol, he said it's OK to drink and drive - it's just not OK to drive drunk.

Another example: How did his blood-alcohol level come to be elevated? He told the jury he stuffed whiskey-laced tobacco into his mouth, then spit the tobacco out again, all while an Ada County sheriff deputy was waiting to give him a breath test to find out whether he had been driving drunk.

Yet another example: Otter is the 50-year-old son-in-law of Idaho's most powerful business family, but he spends his nights drinking, carousing at amateur fights and winning tight-jeans

contests at bars. Then, he drives himself home.

To be sure, testimony this week revealed Otter was just barely guilty of driving under the influence of alcohol.

The jury that convicted him Wednesday did so on the power of a blood-alcohol level that was almost within the legal limit - so close that a less-prominent citizen might have been able to plea bargain the drunken-driving charge.

But elected officials cannot rely on that kind of rationalization when they get caught. They must be prepared to meet the toughest standards of behavior rather than the loosest ones.

And they should not rely on bizarre tales of chewing whiskey-laced tobacco while awaiting an alcohol breath test.

If the chewing-tobacco story is true, Otter wasn't very smart. If it's false, he lied.

The lieutenant governor position has few real responsibilities. Aside from breaking an occasional tie vote in the Legislature, Otter's sole task is to stay out of trouble.

From now on, we hope he'll work a little harder at it.

Social Security benefits are not welfare

If you've been in Tanzania or Tibet for the past month, you may not have noticed that we medias have moved gender-bashing right up to the top of our hidden agenda.

It's not surprising that the media blitz being waged in support of Washington's latest attempt to loot Social Security. Trendy types very much want to renege on the system's contract with workers jaded back in 1935. So media progressives are shelling grayheads around the clock to sell out the objective - your mind.

Interestingly, this hollowing from the left builds despite the fact that Social Security is the one liberal program that has actually worked. Furthermore, it has solid political support across the voter spectrum. Even the majority of young adults back the system, including those who are sure it'll be gone when they get old.

HOWEVER - and it is a large however - the vocal minority who are all for breaking the Social Security promise made to today's retirees seems to be concentrated in the media and in other high-visibility areas. Americans of all ages would do well to keep reminding themselves: We medias ain't the world. What often looks like a coast-to-coast lynch mob, chasing Social Security pensioners is actually a relatively small but noisy group with loud bullhorns.

To be sure, there are changes that are going to have to be made in the system in the next century. But the distortions, bias and downright lies in much of the stuff being dumped on Social Security now are helping to resolve the real problems about as much as federal welfare programs have helped inner-city family life.

For example, nearly all the media prep-fire gives the impression - using prefabricated

phrases like "entitlements such as Social Security - that reduce Social Security benefits are responsible for the federal budget deficit. This isn't just false, it is an anti-truth."

Social Security is the only big federal program that doesn't run a deficit - it takes in about \$50 billion a year more in taxes than it pays in benefits. The accounting was once kept separate by law, but today our politicians kept Social Security (with its big yearly surplus) right in with the ocean of red ink from all the operating budget programs. The scam makes the huge budget deficit LOOK SMALLER than it is. Add a plus five to a minus 20, you make it look as though you're only 15 in the red.

New Deal designers of Social Security, no doubt foreseeing future pols' wish to cook the books, set up the program so that its funds are kept separate from the budget. By their law, the Clinton administration succeeded in pushing up the tax on Social Security pensions, the extra money asked off would have to go right back into the trust fund. If it froze coast-of-living adjustments (or just machine-gunned pensioners in the streets) any reduction thereby in what Social Security pays out would simply revert to the trust fund.

The Clinton-targeted "affluent" retirees - the 25-thousandaires, you know - already are being taxed on 50 percent of their benefits. But the extra \$6 billion a year or so thus taken from them is not being spent directly on needed items like homes or new sunnys for congressmen; by law it is supposed to go back in the SS cookie jar. The jar is supposed to be filling up for next century, when Baby Boomers retire.

Unfortunately, as many Boomers have been most upset to discover, those crutty pols have figured out a way to get into the jar. In the last Congress, Sen. Pat Moynihan presented a bill, devised by the great Social Security guru Robert Myers, to stop this sly trick. It would cut the Social Security tax and

put the system back on a pay-as-you-go basis. The lower SS tax would bring in only about what's required to pay benefits. Though initially skeptical, I've come around to agreeing with Myers, who knows more about the system than the rest of us put together, that lowering Social Security tax to the pay-as-you-go level makes sense. If the Boomers want to set up a different contract for their own future, so be it.

Where the Boomers go wrong, I think, is that they fail to see that Social Security benefits for the present recipients are not welfare. The benefits to today's retirees are OWED MONEY, payment for services already rendered.

Today's Boomers may choose to rewrite their own deal, take lower SS tax rates now in exchange for turning their own future SS program into a poverty-only plan. But that's not the contract America made with those it forced into the program in the '30s and '40s. In historical fact, those then-young people were assured with much heart-crossing by every official from FDR down that this was a straight quid-pro-quo, no hole, no welfare: "You pay in for support of these 1940s old folks, and when you are old folks in the '90s, you get the going rate then from their grandchildren." That, not you-get-it-if-you-need-it, was the deal today's retired were compelled to accept.

Let us say you have promised a guy \$20 for mowing your yard. After he's done what you asked, inform the swabby fellow that the sawbuck he comes to collect is charity. Then tell him he gets it only if he proves he is deserving of your gift and will use it for what you consider proper purposes. In the resulting furor, he may - probably should - break your face in several places.

That's about how today's retirees react when they hear us medias huffing about selfish "millionaires" taking Social Security when they "don't really need it." This old taxpayer sees their point: It doesn't matter, kids, whether they need it or not, give it to United Way or buy for every striver in East Dallas. It's THEIR money, you see.

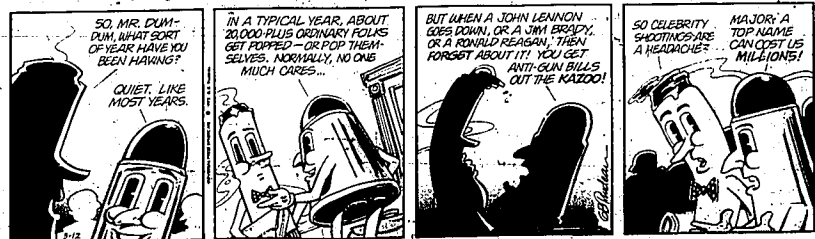

Campaign aims to restrict civil rights of others

As I'm sure everyone is aware, the Idaho Citizens Alliance is ready to go ahead with its petition drive to get an anti-gay rights initiative on the 1994 ballot. Conservatives love this thing and will doubtless line up in droves to sign the ICA petition. However, perhaps a little empathy and a lot of thought are in order before they join a campaign bent on restricting the civil rights of others.

However, this evidence is by no means conclusive, and the link between genes and homosexuality is still debatable. The point is, no one who wishes to maintain his or her credibility on this issue would, at this point, categorically state that this relationship does or doesn't exist; we just don't know for sure.

On the other hand, this concept of special rights for homosexuals cooked up by the ICA and its compatriots across the country is a cut-and-dried issue. "Special rights" is a misnomer. While it is true that homosexual groups have a political agenda, I don't see where that agenda calls for rights the rest of us don't have. High-priority issues on the homosexual political agenda include such things as equal housing opportunity, personal safety and the right to privacy. What Mr. Walton is so special about things like that? Everyone else is guaranteed those rights; for what reasons are homosexuals supposedly excluded from them?

California quitters aren't finding the promised land

No economic story has been more overplayed in the 1990s than the supposed mass migration of people and businesses from California to other states. Many of these states - Washington, Oregon, Colorado, Arizona and Utah - have been hyped as new economic Valhallas, offering a superior quality of life and expanding opportunities. Yet, recent events in Seattle, the ultimate in destinations for the "crowd," indicate trouble is brewing in the Valhallas.

Even so, the extent of both the state's business relocations and net outward migration has been vastly overstated. Relocations are reliably estimated to account for no more than 5 percent of all job losses during the past few years. Similarly, the exodus of some 100,000 more people than arrived from other states hardly qualifies as a hemorrhage in a state with a growing population now exceeding 30 million.

More troubling, perhaps, are the essentially escapist attitudes bound up in the Valhalla syndrome. Rather than signaling the emergence of new economic power centers, outboard California migration seems more driven by middle-class families, especially white, fleeing the stresses of urban life for calmer, more culturally homogeneous environments. Fear may also be a motivation - fear of a multiracial society in which Latinos, African-Americans and Asians are key players in politics and business.

California quitters who share those attitudes are not the sort of people likely to bring economic dynamism to neighboring states. The problem is that too many people are coming to retire, says Thomas Seal, president of Alpnex, a Utah-based software company. "If you want people

to work 40 hours, it's great. But you don't have people who work 70-80 hours like you have in Silicon Valley."

What the Valhalla seekers do stimulate are real-estate prices and jobless statistics. Media reports from cities as diverse as Reno, Nev., Albuquerque, N.M., and Portland, Ore., indicate that many transplanted Californians are either unemployed or underemployed.

In the Reno area, they are widely credited with doubling the ranks of the unemployed between 1991 and 1992. California's neighbors are also discovering that some migrants bring with them extremist attitudes - from Christian rightists to ultraenvironmentalists - that add an element of instability to the political and economic landscape.

Those resentments may be expected to grow as many California migrants find that the Oriz-and-Harriet era has faded in even the supposedly pristine Western communities. A Phoenix, Ariz., utility executive recently described Southern California as "the cesspool of the West" whose population was "voting with their feet" and relocating to "oases" like Phoenix.

Phoenix, it should be noted, along with Seattle and Albuquerque, has higher per capita crime rates than Los Angeles. Even Salt Lake City, the last refuge of "Leave It to Beaver" patriots, has seen its incidence of serious crime double since 1980, according to 1990 FBI statistics.

Whatever their putative appeal, none of the Valhallas are even remotely capable of replacing California as a source of economic diversity, innovation and business dynamism. Historically, most

Western states tend to be heavily dependent on one or two industries.

Overreliance on energy and minerals wrecked - the economies of Utah, Montana, Wyoming and Colorado throughout the '80s. Today, the most glaring example of a basically one-economy state may be Washington, where Seattle-based Boeing just announced plans to lay off 27,000 aerospace workers. The Seattle area, which is three times as reliant on the aerospace industry for employment as Southern California, will be most keenly affected.

But the greatest danger in the California exodus mythology lies in the misguided confidence that California's neighboring states can prosper without California. Virtually every major study shows that the economic vitality of most Western states largely depends on the capital, markets and technical creativity of California. With California industries too crippled to relocate or expand elsewhere, neighboring states such as Arizona and Nevada suffered net losses of industrial jobs during the past two years.

Ambitious Valhalla-mongers may find California-bashing cathartic, but it makes little sense as an economic strategy. Begging California, in the media or in the marketplace, is ultimately an exercise that benefits no one and leaves the West weaker as it seeks its place in the emerging global economy.

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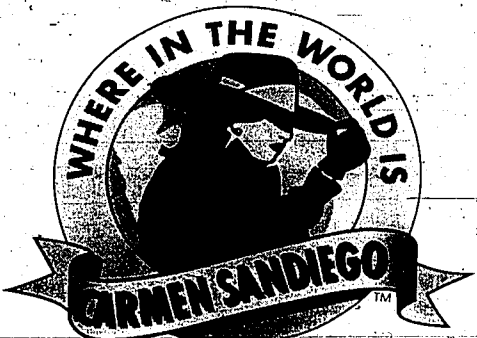

Yeltsin loses more powers

MOSCOW (AP) — The Communist-dominated Congress whittled away more of President Boris Yeltsin's powers Thursday and canceled a national referendum he had sought to cement his authority.

The criticism was so biting that Yeltsin walked out of the Grand Kremlin Palace before the Congress of People's Deputies adjourned its second day of an emergency session.

The votes cutting his power were preliminary but potentially damaging to Yeltsin, who has haggled for months with Parliament Speaker Rustan Khasbulatov over who should wield supreme power: the president or parliament.

Without his present power to issue decrees, Yeltsin loses the ability to implement market reforms over the heads of obstinate officials and pro-Communist lawmakers. And without the threat of the proposed April 11 referendum, lawmakers may be emboldened to attack Yeltsin further.

Yeltsin's supporters in the 1,033-member Congress claimed the restrictions, if given final approval, could make Yeltsin a lame-duck president. The resolution was sent to an editing committee, which includes Yeltsin and Khasbulatov.

and could be presented for a final vote Friday.

"After this Congress, the reforms could be finished," said Leonid Gurevich, a pro-Yeltsin lawmaker.

In Washington, Secretary of State Warren Christopher expressed confidence that Yeltsin could still emerge from the power struggle in a stronger position. "It's a very dynamic situation," Christopher said. "The end of the story has not been written."

Yeltsin took the podium in Congress on Thursday morning to plead for his powers, arguing the country needed strong leadership.

"I favor strong presidential power in Russia, not because I am the president, but because I am convinced that without it, Russia shall not survive and rise again," Yeltsin said.

Lawmakers gave Yeltsin only a smattering of applause, then Khasbulatov shot back minutes later in an emotional speech that called Yeltsin's ideas "petty." He said the only document the Congress would recognize was the Communist-era constitution.

Despite the blow in the Congress, Foreign Minister Andrei Kozyrev asserted Yeltsin retained strong popular support. "Please be sure that there is a reliable partner, a reliable government, a reliable president with a popular mandate," he said afterwards.

Marines attempt to bridge gap in cultures, win help of Somalis

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) — They call him the king of crowd control.

When Marine Sgt. Keith Credle shows up, the Somali kids start clapping and chanting "A-mer-can."

His song-and-dance act is part of Company C's effort to bridge the cultural gap and convince people to turn in weapons to the troops, instead of pelting them with rocks.

Judging by the reaction in Little Tokyo, one of Mogadishu's toughest neighborhoods, it's working.

"If you keep the people entertained, you don't need sticks," said Capt. Robert Abbott of Rockville, Md.

On Thursday, as a pair of Light Armored Infantry Vehicles rolled out of the soccer stadium where about 1,000 Marines are based, the Marines aboard locked their ammunition magazines into place. Each also grabbed a rock to keep within easy reach.

Flak jackets and helmets aside, stones are a regular hazard on the streets of Mogadishu, an American figure a little retaliation goes a long way toward deterrence.

LT Mike Zeffiff sports a Band-Aid that covers the six stitches on the bridge of his nose, broken by a baseball-sized rock last night. But he's willing to forgive and forget.

"Who are you going to get angry at?" he asked. "There were 10 kids there waving, and one of them threw a rock at the vehicle. You should have seen the look of shock on his face when it hit me."

A lot of the rock throwers wave and smile while they're doing it, suggesting to the Marines that it's part of a childish game.

"We laughed and laughed" when Zeffiff got hit, said Lance Cpl. James Lawrence of Deland, Fla. "That's what he gets for going slow and be-

ing a sitting target." Little Tokyo — the name apparently comes from the crowded feeling — is an intimidating maze of dirt paths walled by rusted corrugated steel and long-spined cactus that grows seven feet high. Smoke from cook fires wafts through the air. A male hauls water from one well, a camel from another.

Bandits, flushed out of other areas, sought refuge in Little Tokyo until recently, because only foot patrols could follow them.

At the request of local elders, the Marines bulldozed a road through the cactus. Tanks are flattening junked cars and dragging them from the clogged streets. Fledgling schools have been given chalkboards and building materials for desks and chairs. The local police station is getting a cleanup job.

The rocks the Marines keep at hand are a low-key defense mechanism, they say, intended to avoid having to resort to gunfire. Other patrols in the 14,000-strong U.S. force in Somalia carry baseball bats.

"It all depends on how units work with people," Lawrence said. "Some guys play it straight and get hit. We sit around and joke with the crowds. They gather around just to see what we're like."

When Credle, of Marion, N.C., arrived Thursday, more than 50 kids surrounded his vehicle, then started clapping rhythmically and chanting. Credle smiled and a gold tooth glinted in the midday sun as he started his street dance.

Seoul lifts ban on travel north

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korea's new government is lifting a ban on travel by businessmen to North Korea as part of its campaign to ease tensions with its communist rival, officials said Thursday.

In another gesture, the government said it will send home a North Korean who was captured in the 1950-53 Korean War and jailed as a spy. The man says he was a war correspondent.

President Kim Young-sam took office two weeks ago saying he wanted to get talks going again on resolving disputes between the Koreas, which have been divided into the Marxist north and pro-Western south since 1945.

The countries adopted a reconciliation accord a year ago, raising hopes they would begin dealing more warmly with each other and perhaps move toward reunification.

Iraqis rebuild plant in 2 months

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — In less than two months, the Iraqis have rebuilt the high-tech engineering plant that U.S. Navy cruise missiles demolished in January, a U.N. nuclear weapons inspector said Thursday.

Dimitri Pericicos of the International Atomic Energy Agency also said Iraq continues to withhold a list of foreign suppliers who helped develop a secret nuclear program, de-

priving inspectors of information necessary for long-term monitoring to prevent the program from being revived.

Pericicos, whose 23-member team returned to its regional headquarters in Bahrain on Thursday after eight days in Iraq, said the same problem applies to chemical, biological and ballistic missile programs.

He said if he got from the Iraqis on this trip was "promises, promises, promises."

Youth lockup ballot may come soon

TWIN FALLS — County voters may get a chance to vote on paying for a new juvenile jail by the end of April.

"We want to go to a bond as soon as possible," Twin Falls County Commissioner Norma Blass said. "Maybe within 45 days."

The county had hoped to avoid a costly and potentially unsuccessful bond election by getting a judge to declare the proposed juvenile lockup an "ordinary and necessary" expense.

But 5th District Judge Daniel Meehl sided Monday with a group of 14 county residents opposed to letting the county borrow the money without voter approval.

"In the wake of Meehl's decision, the

commissioners have been recruiting volunteers for a citizen committee to review the detention center plans.

Although speed is essential, Twin Falls County Prosecutor Richard Bevan said the committee must have time to build a foundation of community support for the project.

Four or five people already have asked to be on the panel, and the county may give them a crash course next week on the 2½-

year effort to build a detention center, Blass said.

Joe Conrad of Boise's Lombard-Conrad Architects will be on hand as will representatives from the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

Commissioners hope Health and Welfare won't pull a \$740,000 grant given to Magic Valley counties to build a regional detention center.

The area has been without a permanent place to hold young criminals since the privately owned Southern Idaho Youth Center closed in September 1990.

Jerome, Gooding, Camas and Blaine counties decided last year to turn their portions of the grant over to Twin Falls County, then rent space when they need it.

The grant has strings, however. The county must show that it is actively going

forward with the project, or the money could be taken back, Blass said.

"If that happens, county voters would be asked to pay for the entire \$1.5 million price of the detention center instead of roughly half that."

"I think they really want to work with us," Blass said of Health and Welfare. If the county can get the ball rolling quickly on a bond issue election, the grant should remain in place, she said.

If a bond-issue election fails to get the necessary two-thirds approval, the issue could return to the courts, Blass said.

A federal court could order the county to build the detention center, because the county is required by law to provide detention for juveniles apart from an adult

Farnsworth was hit once in the leg with a round from an AK-47 assault rifle after stopping Kinnavongsa's pickup on Ostander Street North.

The officer returned fire with his 9-mm Remington-Handgun hitting Kinnavongsa once in the chest, police say.

Twin Falls County Coroner Cal Edwards will preside over today's inquest, which is a proceeding similar to a court hearing in which a panel of six jurors decides who, if anyone, is to blame for the killing.

Police probe shooting in restaurant parking lot

TWIN FALLS — City police are investigating an apparent suicide attempt that happened in the parking lot of a Blue Lakes Boulevard restaurant Thursday afternoon.

A man was shot once in the neck with a 22-caliber rifle while inside a van parked behind the Pizza Hut restaurant, Lt. Jim Kistler of the Twin Falls police department said.

The man was in surgery at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center late Thursday. Police did not release his name Thursday night.

"We're checking all aspects, but right now (the wound) appears self-inflicted," Kistler said. "There is no indication of foul play."

A woman carrying a child ran into the restaurant around 3 p.m., screaming that her husband had shot himself, Pizza Hut employee Chad Wells said.

Wells called police from a telephone at

the rear of the restaurant. When he opened the back door, he saw the man covered with blood in the parking lot.

The man got back into the van, then came out again and staggered around the parking lot, moaning, Wells said.

Two other restaurant employees tried to help the man, finally laying him down on the pavement until an ambulance arrived, he said.

The man was still conscious when medical help arrived, Wells said.

Wells described the man as being in his late-20s to mid-30s, with a mustache. The couple was driving a van with Washington license plates.

The couple's child, who appeared to witnesses to be 3 or 4 years old, was taken into protective custody. The woman apparently was carrying the girl into the restaurant to get some food when the shot was fired, manager Monica Rankin said.

The couple may have been fighting before the incident, but Kistler said police have no further details about what triggered the shooting.

Finance committee vote hits Jerome elementary

JEROME — Washington Elementary School stands to lose \$130,000 for teacher training and computer equipment after Legislative budget writers axed funding for all school reform programs Thursday.

"It's just disappointing for us and our school," Principal Ann Reynolds said Thursday.

The Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee, in a move to ensure state taxes do not increase, voted not to fund \$2 million in public school reform programs known as Schools 2000.

Washington Elementary is one of six schools statewide selected to pilot programs intended to improve education.

The Legislature gave the Jerome School District \$210,000 this year to pay for its reform program, said Linda High, spokeswoman for the Idaho Department of Education. The state was scheduled to pay an additional \$130,000 next year, she said.

Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome, voted to

end funding of Schools 2000.

Bell said she didn't realize until after the JFAC vote that the Washington School project was for two years, and that \$700,000 of the proposed \$2 million appropriation was to finish projects around Idaho that already have been awarded grants.

Bell said if she'd known that, she would have made a motion to put the \$700,000 back into the budget. However, she conceded that even that probably couldn't have passed.

"There was a feeling among members of the committee that singling out six schools in the state was not fair," she said.

Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, one of the Senate's strongest supporters of school reform, said the JFAC vote would "set back school reform another 10 years" and called it "a great blow for the status quo."

Late Thursday, there was talk of JFAC revisiting the Schools 2000 budget today. But that would take a two-thirds vote of the

Murtaugh teacher hangs up her hugs, chalk after years of service

MURTAUGH — Nell Hulse says she misses her kids already.

But the Murtaugh Elementary School teacher says after 30 years of standing in front of a blackboard, it was time to give it all up.

"When one of my first students had a grandchild, I decided maybe it was time to quit," she said. "I had taught him, and then his son. I thought 'I don't need to wait for the third generation.'"

So Hulse decided to shelve her hugs, along with her chalk, and announce her retirement from the classroom earlier this year.

But few in Murtaugh have escaped her tutelage, or that of her late husband, Florin.

Together they chalked up some sixty

years of service to children in the community.

"I don't know of any teacher in the district who has a better following among the parents — who think she did a great job — than Nell," Superintendent Dr. Michael Chesley said. "She was a master teacher."

Nell, 62, learned her teaching skills 40 years ago at the now defunct Southern Idaho College of Education in Albion.

"It was the best teachers' college around for years since it was dedicated especially to teaching," Hulse said. "Albion was such a special place to be. Kids nowadays wouldn't think so. They need a bigger town, more things to do. But at that time it was really something."

Nell met and married Florin while at Albion. Within a few years they found themselves in Murtaugh, just a few

miles down the road from her hometown of Hansen.

While Florin taught school and coached, Nell took a few years off to start their family.

Florin Hulse eventually became school superintendent of Murtaugh schools, a position he held for 22 years. He died in 1984.

Nell started teaching first grade in 1941. She says kids themselves have changed over the years, but that they now "live in a whole different world."

"Schools must teach more and more to the younger kids now, so much more."

Nell added she always hoped to give the best to her students.

"I've always hoped that I was (a good teacher) — to see that students grow mentally and socially," she said.

Committee takes tough line on tax breaks, rejecting Blaine request

BOISE — The Idaho Legislature, and especially the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, has a long history of granting sales and property tax exemptions to pretty much anyone who asked for them.

So much so, in fact, that the sales tax law now contains 36 separate exemptions, and the property tax law has 29 sections devoted solely to exemptions.

With money tight and tax reform in the air, legislators from all over the political map are giving those tax breaks the hairy eyeball. With that in mind, Revenue and Taxation signaled, Thursday that the era of

generous tax treatment is over. The panel rejected all seven tax credit exemptions and other breaks on its agenda, including one requested by Rep. Clint Stennett and backed by the Blaine County school district. "Was this a bad day to bring in a bill?" asked Stennett, D-Ketchum, whose measure was last on the committee agenda.

It would have doubled the maximum individual income tax credit for charitable contributions to public and private school foundations, from \$50 to \$100, and limited the credit to cash gifts.

Blaine County Superintendent Phil Hammet said that under the existing tax credit, his district's foundation has helped fund everything from a boy's sports complex to a 70-foot model of

a whale. Doubling the credit, Hammet said, would help districts like his do even more and reduce their reliance on state aid and property taxes.

But Daniel John, tax policy chief for the State Tax Commission, said doubling the credit would cost the state \$750,000. That was all committee members needed to hear, and they killed the bill on a 7-10 vote.

Some of the other bills rejected Thursday would have allowed people to defer paying property taxes based on higher assessments until they sold or otherwise transferred their property; exempted senior citizens' groups from the sales tax; and created an income tax credit for contributions to the Idaho Special Olympics.

Hollister recall vote set end of month

HOLLISTER — A vote to recall Hollister city Councilman Robert Bennett will be held on March 30.

Hollister city Clerk Polly VanBlaricom confirmed Thursday that a second recall petition was filed with her on Jan. 26, and that the vote to recall will be held at the end of the month.

A previous attempt to recall Padgett was stalled earlier in January when Padgett accused petition author Cheryl David, a

former clerk for the small city of 144 people, of illegally obtaining signatures for the original recall petition.

David has denied those charges, but withdrew the original petition and circulated a new one in late January.

The new petition has 13 signatures, VanBlaricom said, three fewer than the original, but one more than is needed to hold an recall vote.

New arcade in mall must landscape to meet city codes

TWIN FALLS — The Blue Lakes Shopping Center does not meet city landscape requirements, but the Planning and Zoning Commission has a way to help fix that.

The commission Tuesday night gave the owners of a new arcade center in the mall a special-use permit, but said about 100 feet of Caswell Avenue must be landscaped.

The arcade, which features video games, miniature golf and batting cages, opened Feb. 13 and the owners are wondering how to pay for the landscaping.

Jeff Gooding, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission, said the arcade represents a new amenity to the city, but that the city will have to pay for the landscaping.

arcade at Tuesday night's meeting, he said. He likened the situation to that of School District 411 wanting to remodel and expand classrooms at the Twin Falls High School, but having to bring the whole facility up to fire code because of the project.

But Mahler and Huck said that when they went to the city with the plans for the arcade center, one of the city staff-mentioned landscaping. In fact, no one mentioned that they would need a special-use permit until Huck called a week before the arcade opened.

City Zoning Administrator LaMar Orton said the arcade's application fell through the cracks because the business was going into the mall, and the arcade owners were remodeling the space.

Internal remodeling permits now are specifically marked so that zoning officials know what the project is. Orton said.

Huck and Mahler say they have no control in this situation. The property belongs to the mall owners and landscaping the area will require digging up some mall employee parking, they say.

"We have no control over this. They're asking us to do something we can't do," Mahler said.

Deal guts veto on Fish and Game

BOISE — A clash over land purchases by the Fish and Game Commission appears to have ended in compromise.

The compromise, approved by the Senate Thursday, would require Fish and Game to hold public hearings on land purchases before county commissioners asked them to, and to draft management plans to address major public concerns.

Fish and Game has been sparring with agricultural interests and counties over its land purchase policies for several weeks. A bill passed by the House two weeks ago would have allowed county commissioners to veto Fish and Game land purchases.

That measure has been attacked by public hearing opponents as a thinly veiled attempt to hinder Fish and Game from acquiring any more land for wildlife habitat.

But sponsors, including Reps. Robbi King, R-Glenns Ferry, and Mark Stubbie, R-Twin Falls, say it was intended to make Fish and Game more responsive to farmers, ranchers and county officials concerned about its land management practices.

In public hearings earlier this week, some people complained that Fish and Game lands breed noxious weeds and predators, and some county officials said they worried about the economic impact of taking farm and ranch land out of production.

At the hearing, Sen. Stan Hawkins, R-Ucon, moved to send the bill to the full Senate but also to hold it for possible amendments.

He then met with proponents and opponents of the measure and explained that, while he thought some legitimate concerns had been raised about Fish and Game operations, the bill would not pass the Senate as written.

"Once they understood what the realities were," Hawkins said, both sides were open to a middle path between giving county commissioners an absolute veto over Fish and Game land purchases and imposing no restrictions at all.

The compromise, which the Senate approved on a voice vote as an amendment to the original bill, requires Fish and Game to notify county commissioners of any land purchases greater than 15 acres. Commissioners then would have 10 days to ask Fish and Game to hold a public hearing on the intended purchase.

If Fish and Game decided, after the hearing, to go ahead with the purchase, it would have to develop a land management plan to address issues raised during the hearing, if commissioners so requested.

Hawkins called that a reasonable compromise, saying no one particularly liked it, but no one opposed it either.

However, King said Hawkins' amendment was an improvement over the bill's original provisions.

"This, to me, puts the heat back on Fish and Game," she said. "If they have 100 people come in and testify that the proposed purchase is going to be a problem for them, they'll take the heat if the purchase ultimately goes through."

The Senate probably will take up all that fits in the Republican leadership's target budget, but it would have provided less state aid per classroom than the schools are getting this year had the year-old \$2 million reform program been retained.

The decision to, in effect, repeal it means another \$172 will be added to the per-classroom state support, pushing it over \$33,000 during the next school year. Local property tax receipts are added to that.

Dispose-All pitches plan in Burley

BURLEY — An official with a private solid waste company has vowed he can provide the Mini-Cassia area with a landfill at a cost much lower than that available through the Southern Idaho Regional Solid Waste District.

"I'm staking the family business on it," Doug Lowmow, president of Dispose-All of Boise, said Thursday at the monthly meeting of the Mini-Cassia Chamber of Commerce.

He said Dispose-All's knowledge and efficiency will have the counties of Magic Valley scurrying to use its landfill instead of going with the district.

Lowmow criticized the regional landfill district, saying "it was unorganized and would cost taxpayers way too much money."

"I would suggest the (district) is a boondoggle," Lowmow said.

Several Magic Valley counties have banded together and fought the district to post costs for opening new landfills required by federal

regulations. That dupli that must meet stricter guidelines must be in operation by early October.

Twin Falls County commissioners recently voted a proposal by Dispose-All to handle the county's landfill needs.

"It's been apparent from the start that there is no shortage of options," district Director Terry Schultz said in an interview later on Thursday.

"Now the counties have to determine what option is best."

Dispose-All is scheduled to meet with the Solid Waste District Board on March 24. The district is now preparing to advertise for bids for construction of a 480-acre landfill on Milner Butte.

Lowmow would not reveal the site of his proposed landfill, saying that would be announced within a month.

The cost of Dispose-All's landfill will be approximately \$4.5 million including the purchase of the land, Lowmow said. The gate fee could be \$28,000, he said. Schultz said the regional district is anticipating a cost of \$24-\$25 a ton.

Lowmow, however, said his firm would not charge a gate fee. The user fee would be passed along to consumers by the trash hauler, he said.

Lowmow defended his company in the face of Minidoka County Commissioner Norm Seibold, who said Dispose-All's record is not good.

The commissioner said he talked to officials from Oklahoma and Ada County where Dispose-All also has operations.

Seibold said the officials said, "Once Twin Falls gets done with them they'll wish to hell they'd never heard of them," he said.

Seibold also questioned how the company could receive needed

permits and authorization to build a landfill in such a short time.

But Lowmow defended the company's record.

"I will put our record against any other landfill company," he said. He acknowledged there had been some management problems at the Oklahoma landfill site.

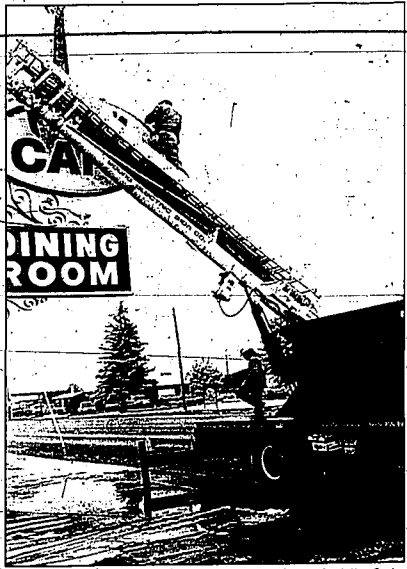
But up to that point, Lowmow said, his operations had a sterling record. Dispose-All took over the Oklahoma landfill in 1990 because the company operating it had several violations, Lowmow said.

Lowmow said his company, because it is privately owned, should be trusted more than the government in keeping landfill regulations. It is harder to get government officials to comply with regulations, he said.

"We will be run in total compliance to protect Magic Valley and Idaho's environment," he said.

He complained that had media coverage in the Twin Falls area has made his company look bad.

Facial reconstruction proves helpful in probe

RUPERT — The facial reconstruction received by the Minidoka County Sheriff's Department of a suspected murder victim has proven useful.

A Hispanic man's remains, thought to have been decomposing in the desert for approximately four years, were found in July 1991, in the German Lake area north of Rupert.

Just recently, a Wyoming crime lab returned a facial reconstruction

in the form of a drawing to help law enforcement authorities identify the body.

"We've got a couple of leads on it," Chief Deputy Bob Vasquez said.

He added he has interviewed one person who thought he might know the individual.

A copy of the reconstruction was sent to a Mexican family which had reported that a family member who was in the Mini-Cassia area is missing.

"Some members of the family said the face is similar, but they aren't certain."

"They say it might be him but it also might not be him," Vasquez said.

Dental records will probably provide one of the best clues to narrow down the identification, Vasquez said.

Once the man's identification is determined, Vasquez said law enforcement officers would trace his activities and associates to determine what could have led to the murder.

Forensics experts determined that the man, due to his skull being fractured, probably died of a blow to the head.

The victim is thought to be a slender male Hispanic in his mid-20s or 30s.

He was wearing blue jeans and a cotton shirt, along with a leather belt.

State fire marshal vows no variance for church

BOISE — The House Business Committee on Thursday approved a bill to give the Twin Falls Reformed Church a better chance of getting a variance from the city's fire code.

But state Fire Marshal Lee Bright said that even if the bill becomes law, he probably won't approve the church's variance.

The dispute between the church and the city stems from an addition the church is building at the corner of Pole Line Road and Grandview Drive North.

The water line nearest the site is almost a mile away at Pole Line and Washington Street North. When the church was built, the city fire code didn't require it to be connected to the water line, and it wasn't.

Since then, however, the code has been changed to require the church be hooked up to the water line. That, church members estimate, would cost them at least \$100,000, because the city has refused to extend the water line out to its property.

Although the church is located outside Twin Falls city limits, it is subject to the fire code because it is within the city's area of impact, a mile-wide ring around the city.

"The city turned down the church's request for a variance, and so did Bright when the church appealed to him.

That was brought church member and former county prosecutor Harry DeHaan before the Business Committee Thursday.

DeHaan testified in favor of a bill sponsored by Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, that would specifically allow the fire marshal to consider financial hardship when considering applications for variances.

"It also provides that neither the fire marshal nor the state would be liable if damage resulted from the variance."

"If the city wants us to live up to these codes, then they ought to live up to their half of it and give us a water main," DeHaan said. "They can't have it both ways."

Rep. Hilde Kellege, R-Post Falls, asked DeHaan, "Doesn't it concern you at all that you have 40 fire hydrants at the building?"

DeHaan responded that even if the church were hooked up to the water line, it would take several minutes for fire trucks to reach the church in the event of a fire.

But Bright said he had other reasons for denying the variance request, chief among them the possibility that a fire at the church could threaten a nearby mobile home park.

Although the panel sent the measure to the full House, Bright said he "has no intention" of granting the variance.

Jerome schools plan sex education survey

JEROME — The School Board agreed Monday to survey students, parents, teachers and residents to determine what type of sex education program should be offered.

"We need to do such a good job of nailing down public feelings so there is no room for controversy or criticism," Earl Jones, chairman of the sex education committee, said.

The board approved sending survey sheets to about 5,300 residents in one district. Some questions include:

"We believe the study of human sexuality should be taught within the context of family values."

"We believe the primary responsibility (for sex education) lies within the home."

"We believe the church and school can only complement and supplement those standards which are established in the family."

The survey further asks public response to whether the curriculum should include an explanation of reproduction, abstinence and safe sex.

School officials set March 26 to review the surveys. Residents with questions or comments can contact Jones at 324-1246 or 324-2444.

The board decided to meet with the architect and contractors responsible for construction of an

elementary school, a project that has been delayed by about three months because of bad weather. Board members agreed the Horizon Elementary School could not be completed by Aug. 1, he scheduled.

"Maybe they could finish one wing by Aug. 15, and we could begin occupancy," Trustee Eric Steigens said.

"We're confronted with a dilemma," Trustee Ben Neff, said in describing the need to put students in the new school, yet the inability of the contractor to comply with the contract completion date.

Craig Ainsworth, middle school principal, told the board and nearby audience, there was no room for two seventh-grade classes

next year. Carol Matthews, high school principal, said science classes had to double up on use of rooms.

A decision to expand high school class offerings was postponed for two weeks.

In other business, the board heard a report from Lavar Butters, interim school manager, that making up the 11 days of school missed due to snow conditions would be completed for most grades by March 29 when Spring break begins.

Approved use of Earth-Theme science and environmental conservation curriculum. Dick Jordan, science teacher, will begin teaching the curriculum at the alternative school this week.

Senate to decide education issue

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Senate will decide the fate of legislation dividing the state Board of Education into separate councils for public schools and the state's colleges and universities.

The House voted 47-23 for the plan Thursday. But minutes later, it rejected accompanying legislation to make the state's top public school official a nonvoting member of both panels.

Rep. Jim Hansen, D-Boise, sponsored that bill but won just 20 votes from the 70-member House.

Senators should be familiar with the plan to divide the Board of Education, its House sponsor, State Affairs Chairman Pan Ahrens, R-Boise, said there have been 17 proposals in the past decade to split the board or make other changes in the way education is governed.

The latest bill for four Board of Education members to serve on a council for public schools. Four others would be on the higher education board, and the state superintendent of public instruction, now Jerry Evans, would serve on both boards.

The measure says the separate

boards will work together on "general educational institutions and programs of common access to both higher education and public school systems."

Ahrens and others said the Board of Education gets bogged down in "micro-management" of universities with scant attention to the longer view.

"It would allow long-range planning and move away from crisis management into strategic planning," she said.

Rep. Dorothy Reynolds, R-Caldwell, said the new structure would lead to an expansion of the bureaucracy that supports education programs.

"Soon, we will have three staffs, one for each of the boards," she said.

House Minority Floor Leader Jim Stoicheff, D-Sandpoint, defended the current system.

"The state pokes its nose too much into local school districts now," said Stoicheff, who joined Rep. Francis Field, R-Grand View, in arguing that separate boards would cause more competition for education funding.

"If you think there is a tug of war now, just wait until you have two boards fighting over the pot," Field said. "It will be another layer of government to feed upon itself and become its own little empire."

"Judging from what I see in the media, the board has done a fairly good job of dividing themselves," said Rep. Charles Cuddy, D-Orfino.

And the bill's sponsor, Rep. Doug Jones, R-Twin Falls, said trim the staff of the office of the Board of Education, since it would have less responsibility.

Collision claims Middleton man

MIDDLETON (AP) — A Middleton man was killed when two pickup trucks collided head-on on U.S. Highway 30 near Mink Road in Canyon County.

Nick Charles Radney, 46, died at the scene of the accident about 3:20 p.m. Wednesday, an Idaho State Police dispatcher said.

Radney was a passenger in a pickup driven by Jerriann Dean, 37, also of Middleton.

Dean was flown by Life Flight helicopter to St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise, where she was listed in critical condition Thursday, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Jerome officials ponder move to save homeowners insurance

JEROME — Jerome homeowners could save a little on private fire insurance if the city makes a few purchases.

At a work session Wednesday, the City Council reviewed a potential 10 percent reduction for fire insurance offered by some, but not all, insurance companies.

The reduction would be available if the city beefs up its department and purchases a pumper and a ladder truck. By adding the two trucks, the city fire rating from the State Fire Bureau would be reduced from a 5 rating to a 4.

Most insurance companies give a discount for homeowners on a 4 rating. Bryan Craig of Prescott and Craig Insurance told council members.

About a \$10 savings per year would be realized by property owners, he said.

The Twin Falls fire department has offered a used ladder truck to the Jerome department for \$30,000.

"That's a buy of a lifetime because a new one would cost about \$350,000," Mayor Gerald Ostler said.

Buying the \$30,000 ladder truck and a pumper truck would cost the city about \$42,000 annually for five years, Ostler said.

Prosecutor pension bill awaits Andrus decision

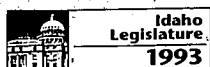
BOISE (AP) — Legislation giving county prosecutors and their deputies the same retirement benefits as police, firefighters and others in hazardous jobs is on its way to Gov. Cecil Andrus.

The House voted 40-28 for the proposal on Thursday. The Senate approved it earlier, 27-7.

Debate centered on whether prosecutors face the same job hazards as firefighters and police officers. About 150 prosecutors and deputy prosecutors would benefit if the measure becomes law.

Sponsors said prosecutors and their deputies are part of the law enforcement team and should be treated the same. Turnover among the officials is high, sponsors said, with 22 new prosecutors in Idaho's 44 counties sworn in to start terms last January.

If the measure becomes law, qualifying prosecutors could retire earlier and with a higher pension rate. But sponsors said it would cost taxpayers nothing because the lawyers will contribute more.

In committee testimony, backers of the proposal said Idaho never had a full county prosecutor retire from office. But sponsors said everyone will benefit if there are incentives for prosecutors and their deputies to stay.

"There will be some tangible rewards to prosecutors who decided to devote their careers," said the bill's sponsor, Rep. Bill Deal, R-Nampa.

"Ultimately, the public will be better off with experienced prosecutors," said Rep. Ron Crane, R-Nampa.

But House Democratic Floor Leader Jim Stoicheff, D-Sandwich, disputed claims that being a prosecutor is hazardous. And he blasted the existing law that he said grants unwarranted hazardous-duty benefits to workers besides police and firefighters.

"Rather than adding to the list, we should be taking people off except the guys who lay their lives on the line or risk injury," he said.

But Rep. Mark Stubbs, R-Twin Falls, said there is a lot of stress on prosecutors.

"It's a job that takes a heavy toll on the people we ask to serve there," he said. "We should give them some incentive to stay in that job."

Idaho Travel Council voices opposition to anti-gay initiative

ALTA, Wyo. (AP) — Fearing a tourism boycott, the Idaho Travel Council has joined a growing list of state leaders and groups opposed to an anti-gay initiative.

The council on Wednesday condemned a ballot measure proposed last week by the conservative Idaho Citizens Alliance. The council was meeting at Grand Targhee Ski Resort.

"Idaho should not be used as a battleground for outside interests wishing to pursue issues of intolerance and hate," Council Chairman Susie Barnett-Bushong said in a prepared statement.

"We strongly object to this effort and any effort that discriminates against any individual on the basis of race, creed, age, physical disability, gender or sexual orientation."

"Bushong, who works for Grand Targhee, urged officials in the tourism and recreation industry to defeat the initiative, which needs about 32,000 signatures.

to get on the November 1994 ballot, is designed to limit state government's sanctioning of homosexuality and the extension of minority status to homosexuals, Citizens Alliance organizer Kelly Walton of Burley, submitted the measure to the secretary of state for review a week ago.

"Idaho already has enough of a black eye with the white supremacists in our neighborhood," said council member Lorraine Bowman of Sandpoint.

Idaho Department of Commerce spokeswoman Georgia Smith said the initiative could cost millions of dollars in tourism and product revenues and reinforce Idaho's image as a state that harbors intolerance. If the measure passes, boycotts on potatoes and tourism are possible, she said.

Medical expert says King's face shattered by batons

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Rodney King's swollen, battered face peered out in jurors' from blowup photos Thursday as a medical expert testified that King's facial bones were shattered by police batons, not by a fall to an asphalt road.

The pattern of injuries ... are consistent with a front-but blunt instrument, a baton or baton-like instrument," said Dr. Harry Lingdon Smith.

"Are Mr. King's injuries consistent with a fall to the ground?" Assistant U.S. Attorney Steven Clymer asked.

"No, they are not," Smith told the jury.

Smith isolated for the first time a



split second in the blurry opening portion of the famous beating videotape which he said shows Officer Laurence Powell beating a fallen King directly on the head and face.

"Although it is very blurry," said Smith, "it is to me apparent that as Mr. King is down Officer Powell sees the striking moves to the head and is then swinging multiple times. That gives multiple opportunities for Mr. King to be struck in the head and face."

"He said the first blow to King's head was clearly on the videotape, as King is standing, also was struck by Powell to

the head. Powell's lawyer has maintained that his client never struck King directly on the head — a move forbidden by police policy unless deadly force is required. A central defense is that King's cheekbone and eye socket were smashed when he fell to the ground while fighting officers.

No prosecution experts other than King's treating physicians testified at the officers' previous trial in state court.

Smith's statements supported testimony Tuesday by Dr. Charles Aronberg, chief of ophthalmology at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center, who said it was his opinion that King's injuries were caused by baton blows to the forehead and face. Aronberg said a fall to the pavement was out of the question.

Jury acquits Shoshone County sheriff

MOSCOW — A former sheriff accused of accepting payoffs to let gambling flourish in northern Idaho's Silver-Valley was acquitted of public corruption charges Thursday.

Former Shoshone County Sheriff Frank Crnkovich wept and hugged his wife, Julie, when the verdict was announced in U.S. District Court. He declined comment to reporters.

The jury deliberated for just over four hours before finding Crnkovich innocent of racketeering, obstructing justice and two counts of aiding and abetting illegal gambling. The trial lasted seven days.

It was the second trial for Crnkovich, who lost a bid for reelection in the fall. The first trial in November ended with a hung jury.

LEWISTON — President Clinton has proposed \$500 million for a Head Start summer program that is expected to pass Congress next month, said Sarah Greene, chief executive officer of the National Head Start Association at Alexandria, Va., said at Lewiston conference.

"That means all the individual community-based operations must be able by May 1 to say how they would use the money. Greene told a packer's round of educators attending the Lewis-Clark Early Childhood Program Region 10 training conference on Wednesday.

The conference continued through Thursday, with participants coming from Idaho, Washington, Oregon and Alaska.

To get a summer program in place that rapidly, Greene said flexibility will be needed in program guidelines, such as waiving the usual 20 percent local match.

The boy ticketed for carrying the knife also was given a citation for possession for cigarettes, the report said.

WIPP will run tests minus waste

The U.S. Department of Energy has told a scientific panel that it may not be necessary to bring radioactive waste from Idaho to New Mexico's Waste Isolation Pilot Plant during a planned five-year test phase.

Department officials, in a major shift on Wednesday, said tests with waste no longer are necessary for meeting Environmental Protection Agency long-term disposal standards at the underground nuclear waste dump.

But the officials, speaking to the National Academy of Sciences' panel on the proposed dump in Washington, D.C., maintained the tests would be helpful.

The academy panel had issued a report last year saying the planned tests had "no discernible scientific basis."

The facility in southeastern New Mexico is the designated underground repository for low-level but long-lasting waste from the nation's defense industry.

It has yet to open despite federal promises that waste from the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory would be moving to the dump as early as 1988.

The Energy Department has long maintained that a small quantity of radioactive waste must be stored to study the gases it generates.

The department has said that information would help the dump comply with the EPA's standards for protecting the environment for 10,000 years.

Energy Department officials said they have not abandoned the idea of bringing in waste for the tests. But spokesman Tracy Loughand said the department is preparing alternatives in case EPA officials reject proposed test plans.

Poet Allen Ginsberg, who helped chronicle a generation, hits the road

TWIN FALLS - He was your mother's worst nightmare. It was 1958, you were 16 and you might have held a bootleg copy of Allen Ginsberg's poems.

You might even have traded your corduroys for ragged jeans, your Keds for sandals and your assumptions for doubts, for Ginsberg, Jack Kerouac and others had turned Elvis' sneer into a snarl.

A generation and a half later, the poet laureate of the Beat Generation is still writing. At 65, he's unpredictable, he's contrary, and he's here.

"It's his first visit to Idaho," said Bill Studebaker, director of the College of Southern Idaho's Honors Program, which will host Ginsberg as part of its Snake River Symposium series today at 3 p.m.

"It's quite an honor that he chose Twin Falls, of all places." Twin Falls is precisely the kind of citadel of Main Street respectability that Ginsberg skewered in "The Howl," a blast of invective against the conventions of Eisenhower's America that echoed through a thousand smoky coffee houses



to the six-string laments of Pete Seeger. For a nation of Cleavers, it was shocking stuff - laced with social and political heresy, sex and drugs. Teenagers came to dread, above all else, being called "square." And they weren't so sure anymore that Father knew Best.

But times change. The volume of American public discourse is lower

nowadays, and Ginsberg wears a tie. He looks like a Distinguished Professor at Brooklyn College, and he is.

He's turned against drug use, and two years ago he even lectured at Virginia Military Institute. So perhaps it's not such a stretch that he's headed up the road to Hailey tonight to talk about poet Ezra Pound, and maybe read some of his poetry.

Pound was born in Hailey, but you won't find any official acknowledgement of that fact, much to the annoyance of some who admire his work.

Sometimes called the most influential and least-read poet in the English language in this century, Pound spent World War II making propaganda broadcasts for Benito Mussolini. After the war, he escaped a treason charge, and perhaps a death sentence, when he was judged mentally incompetent to stand trial.

He died in Italy in 1972, but he was dead to his hometown long before.

"Pound is really the reason Ginsberg is coming to Idaho," Studebaker said. "He was offered a chance to speak in Ketchum or Sun Valley, but he said no. He wanted to speak in Hailey."

Hailey's Liberty Theater is a sellout for tonight's 7 p.m. poetry reading, and on Saturday Ginsberg plans to visit the house where Pound was born.

Pound was an unreconstructed anti-semitic fascist; Ginsberg was born Jewish and his politics have always been left-of-center. But Ginsberg admired Pound still, to the point of visiting him in exile.

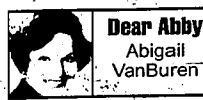

"His interest in Pound probably reflects his political sensibilities," Stuebaker said. "But Pound was an advocate of free verse, which had a powerful influence on Ginsberg and many other poets."

Ginsberg's own influence is significant, Stuebaker said, and will probably outlast his reputation as a cultural icon.

"His work is more accessible than Pound's because Ginsberg never forgot his audience," Stuebaker said. "It wasn't just for Bohemians."

But the poet notwithstanding, it's hard to forget the man who, along with Kerouac, Neal Cassady and William S. Burroughs, caused a generation to take its sensibilities seriously and its espresso neat.

"Ginsberg and the others inspired the beatniks who inspired the hippie movement," Stuebaker said. "He was just into oriental religions, macrobiotic diets and yoga before most people."

A year past 40, rocker Sting looks back, ahead

NEW YORK (AP) — Fans and critics may think of Sting as a pretty serious guy, but his new record really isn't that serious.

At least for Sting. "Take the album's title: 'Ten Summoner's Tales.'" It's "a mid-level joke" on the story, "Summoner's Tale" from Chaucer's "The Canterbury Tales" and also a reference to Sting's real name, Gordon Sumner.

If that's not exactly "National Lampoon's Loaded Weapon," it's still a change of pace for the self-proclaimed King of Pain, a man best known for tortured love songs ("Every Breath You Take") and social commentary ("Russians"), for reminding listeners, "There is a deeper world than this."

His latest album includes such songs as "Love Is Stronger Than Justice" (from Magnificient Seven), in which seven brothers compete for one bride, and "Seven Days," the story of a love-struck David and the Goliath who competes for his girl.

There are also more typical Sting compositions: the moody ballad "It's Probably Me" and "Shape of My Heart," with its line about "the sacred geometry of chance." He even takes on the media in "Epilogue (Nothing 'Bout Me)," chiding those who "check my records, check my facts, check if I paid my income tax."

Despite having just arrived from London, the bassist and former leader of the Police was in a friendly mood during a recent interview. His plane was several hours late, but the 41-year-old singer-songwriter showed few signs of being tired. Giving his usual thoughtful, articulate answers and responding openly to

questions both professional and personal.

Q. Do you think your reputation for seriousness is deserved?

A. I think it's a distortion. I think writers tend to focus on songs about issues because they're easier to write about. It's as if I suddenly discover a sense of humor.

Q. How do you write songs about issues?
A. I never write about an issue unless I find a metaphor to express it. I don't want to state the obvious. If I know where to look for metaphors, I'd be there digging. Somehow they come to you by a magical process, which I'm grateful for, sometimes, anxious about.

Q. You did say that your 1991 "The Soul Cages" contained "heavy imagery," didn't you?

A. That was very personal and confessional. As a piece of therapy it worked for me. I

didn't feel the need to repeat the exercise. I didn't want to dredge up an inner wound.

I wanted to get back to writing songs to amuse my band and family. I was always very happy during the period of making "Ten Summoner's Tales" and wanted the album to reflect that.

Q. Were you happy because you and (actress-film producer) Trudie Styler married during 1992?

A. Yes, I wrote the songs before I got married, but that was the mood. The songs are very much about being happy, being who you are.

Q. We got married Aug. 22 in a 900-year-old Saxon church in England. It was a fabulous day. It rained until we made our promises, then the sun came through the stained-glass window.

Q. The rumor is that the marriage was your children's idea.

A. That's true. I think children are very

conservative in their needs and desires. They were very militant about the wish that we should get married. We're from the generation that didn't want to get married. They said, "We'll feel better if you're married."

I wanted for a romantic moment and I proposed. The wedding was about six months later.

Q. How old are your children?

A. My wife and I have three, 2, 6 and 8. My first wife (actress Frances Tomelty) and I have two, 10 and 16. The 16-year-old is in a band and he's very serious about it. He won't let me listen to it. The hippest thing for him is to have me at arm's length. I appreciate that and understand.

Q. Have you given him any advice?

A. I will when I'm asked. The only advice so far is that schooling is important.

Q. What effect did turning 40 a year ago have on you?

A. It does tend to make you take stock of your life and ask yourself a lot of questions. We've moved to the countryside. I've never lived in the country before. I had this thought a couple of weeks ago that I could actually die, but rather comforting at the same time, to select a place you want to die.

Q. That was my main thought at 40, accepting mortality, accepting who you are, slowly coming around to the idea I actually like myself, which wasn't really apparent in my earlier years.

Q. Is there a key tale on "Ten Summoner's Tales"?

A. I think the album opens with kind of a

manifesto of faith, "If I Ever Lose My Faith in You." It's easy to define what you've lost faith in. In my case, it's the idea of technological progress, organized religion and politics. Despite all those things, I still have a great deal of hope and faith. I can't really define what I have faith in. In the song, I leave it open. It could be interpreted faith in romantic love, in God, in myself.

Q. How long will you tour?

A. I'm going to do a short tour — short for me. Three months in America, three months in Europe. I usually love touring. I have an alternative family on the road, the crew and the band. My family comes when school is out, when we're in one place for some time where it is nice to be.

Q. Is it so hard to write songs?

A. It's very difficult, very demanding — intellectually, spiritually, physically. I tend to walk around a lot and compose. The rhythm of walking will tend to inspire me.

Q. It's quick success, which the Police had, good or bad?

A. You have to accept that; if the initial attention you get is very positive and confirming, it is just as easy for that to turn into its opposite without logical reason. You can't be on top of the wheel forever. It does turn. You're performing a balancing act really, as a performer. The fun is that you do stay on by hook or by crook.

Success came to me fairly late. I was 25 by the time I got a recording contract. I'd had time to hold down a job, have a family, get an education. I wasn't exactly unformed, which I'm glad about.

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'Fire in the Sky' a human story

Tale of alien abduction rejects the glitz for personal drama

LOS ANGELES — In early November 1975, Tracy Torme was sitting in the library at Beverly Hills High School, listening to rock music on his headphones while pretending to read a book.

On the radio, the music was interrupted by a news story about a group of loggers from tiny Snowflake, Ariz., who claimed that one of their buddies had been abducted by aliens.

Torme remembers chucking at the absurdity of the newscast and wondering how dumb those loggers must be for coming up with a lame explanation for the disappearance of their friend.

The assumption that day was that the loggers had murdered their pal and conjured the alien story as a pathetic alibi. When the missing man, Travis Walton, showed up five days later with a horrific tale of abduction, Torme considered the possibility that the loggers had been telling the truth.

Eighteen years later, Walton and the loggers are sticking to their story and Torme has helped to bring it to the screen in "Fire in the Sky," which opens Friday.

"They were initially suspicious of me when I approached them about doing the movie, and I don't blame them," said Torme, who co-produced and wrote the screenplay. "But it really wasn't as tough as I thought it would be to convince them that I didn't want to exploit them."

"I see this more of a story of small-town America than I do an alien story."

In fact, Walton's experiences aboard the alien ship are only a part of the movie. Most of the film concerns itself with what happened to the other loggers during those five days Walton was missing. "They were ostracized by their friends" and became the subject of an intense investigation by authorities.

Even Walton was subjected to intense scrutiny after his return. Many people in Snowflake considered the incident an embarrassment and a blot on the town. Walton, 22 in 1975, remains in Snowflake and is married with four children.

"I've turned down many offers to do movies over the years, but Tracy convinced me because he

had a different approach to what happened," said Walton, a fireman in a local mill.

Torme said he would have done the movie regardless of whether he believed Walton's story because he thought there was an important story to be told about how people react in time of crisis. But he said it was easier to make the movie once he did believe Walton and his friends.

"I took these guys to the site and I interviewed them over and over again, and I am convinced they are telling the truth," he said.

D.B. Sweeney, who plays Walton in "Fire in the Sky," said it was important for him to believe the story to play the character, but he was fearful that his belief might be shattered if he met the real-life Walton.

"Everybody thought it would be easier if I believed it and so they wanted me to meet Travis, but I was reticent to meet him," the actor said. "I was afraid that if I met the actual guy and something about him raised some doubts, it would be hard to play the character convincingly."

Sweeney, who previously starred in "The Cutting Edge," "Memphis Belle" and "Eight Men Out," said he finally met Walton three weeks into the filming.

"He came to the set and I was real hesitant," he said. "I was already into my characterization and if he was very different from what we've seen in movies, I might be inclined to start trying to play him differently."

"So when he came by, we didn't talk much. Just some small talk. I sort of said, 'Hello, how you like your coffee?' and he said, 'I'm impressed with him.'"

Walton said it was painful to watch the completed movie, which forced him to relive the experience. He will have to do it again when the film is shown in Snowflake's only movie theater.

"I was gut-wrenching to sit through that movie, and now I'm going to have to do it again. It's about a whole skeptical attitude again from people who don't want to believe the scientific documentation."

"Maybe the movie will open some minds that have been closed all these years."

Mixed bag vie for best actor

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Only one thing can be counted on in this year's competition for the Academy Award for best actor: The winner will make one of the year's best stories.

First, there are the long-neglected veterans: Al Pacino and Clint Eastwood. Pacino, one of the industry's most respected actors, has been nominated six times without a victory. Eastwood, whose long history of tight-lipped legends we have these days to a screen legend, never even received a nomination until he directed and starred in the acclaimed "Unforgiven."

Then, you have the upstarts: Robert Downey Jr. and Stephen Rea, both first-time nominees. Downey, 28, wasn't even born when Eastwood started making films. Rea, the star of the surprise hit "The Crying Game," is unknown to many American filmgoers.

Finally, there's Denzel Washington, who managed an Oscar nomination for "Malcolm X" despite the Academy's now traditional snubbing of writer-director Spike Lee.

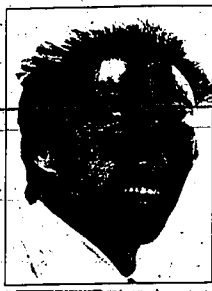
Washington, the only candidate to have won an award before, would become only the second African-American to receive the best-actor prize. (Sidney Poitier was the first when he won in 1964 for "Lilies of the Field.")

The race is considered wide open, partly because the roles are as diverse as the actors themselves: Charlie Chaplin (Downey), Malcolm X (Washington), a reluctant IRA member (Rea), a blind veteran (Pacino) and an aging outlaw (Eastwood).

Here is background on the nominees. A winner will be announced during Oscar ceremonies on March 29.



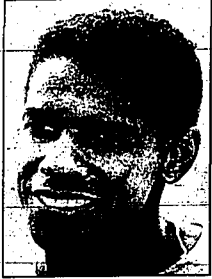

booze. What brought him out of it? "Time, mistakes, losing friends. Self-respect. Losing moments. Losing things. Turkey's on the table, and I'm under the table. No thanks."

CLINT EASTWOOD's role as William Munny in "Unforgiven" prompted reviews to compare it to John Wayne's Rooster Cogburn in "True Grit," which won Duke his only Oscar. Both played geriatric Western gunmen, showing their age but coming through when needed.

Eastwood guided the film as producer and director as well as star. Unlike his taciturn characters from "A Fistful of Dollars" to "High Plains Drifter," Munny is fallible. The only laughs result from his fumbling attempts to mount his horse and his failed target practice.

"(Munny) was definitely rusty," Eastwood said. "A lot of things in 'Unforgiven' have never happened

in Westerns in the past, at least the ones I was involved with."

Usually the protagonist always mounts the horse well, always shoots straight. Everything is taken care of.

Nobody ever plays it that you might be a little rusty after quite a few years. Weapons misfire, people aren't hit with every shot. Mistakes go on, which is very much like real life."

AL PACINO so far has proved "always a bridesmaid" with Oscar. He has been nominated twice as supporting actor ("The Godfather" and "Dick Tracy") and four times as leading actor ("Serpico," "The Godfather Part II," "Dog Day Afternoon," "... And Justice for All").

This year he has doubled his chances, nominated for lead actor in "Scen of a Woman" and supporting actor in "Glengarry Glen Ross."

As the blind, bitter-glass veteran,

Washington's role in "Malcolm X" came naturally. In 1981, he had portrayed the black leader in the New Federal Theater play, "When the Chickens Come Home to Roost." He had immersed himself in the Malcolm X legend, and he did the same for Spike Lee's film.

"It was a big, big job," Washington said. "But it was the easiest film I ever did. It was so fascinating that it went by quickly. It was the first film I'd done that I didn't want to end."

The actor talked to many people who had known Malcolm X, and he concluded:

"The question was, always, 'Which Malcolm are you talking about?' He made so many changes in his life, he was constantly in flux. The popular conception of the man is of this violent, angry man. Well, he wasn't violent at all."

Pacino won a Golden Globe in Jaquary for best dramatic actor. Customarily shy of the spotlight, he faced reporters afterward and combed his hair.

"This kind of character comes along rarely; it's rare when you get a chance to play that. A role like this affords you so much opportunity to have fun with it because that's the nature of the part."

STEPHEN REA found an ideal role as Fergus the IRA-volunteer in "The Crying Game."

The actor was born to a Protestant family in Belfast, Northern Ireland, so he has known the Irish turmoil since childhood. His wife, Dolours Price, is a former IRA member who served eight years in prison for her role in a 1973 car bombing.

In the film, Fergus is an unwilling participant in a kidnapping and later is pursued by his former co-conspirators. Rea admits his sympathy to the Republican cause but he added—in a magazine interview:

"I'm not an activist, and I don't believe in violence. What I bring is an understanding of how decent, ordinary people get involved and how that spiraled into something out of control. I've tried to express my experiences as an Irish person rather than just be an Irish vessel as an actor."

DENZEL WASHINGTON graduated from the TV series "St. Elsewhere" to become one of the screen's best young actors.

His role as a Civil War soldier in "Glory" brought him the Oscar for best supporting actor of 1989. He was also nominated in 1987 as supporting actor for his role as South African martyr Steve Biko in "Cry Freedom."

PRIVINE, Calif. — Even dismembered and strewn across the floor, they seem the incarnation of evil: ghoulish red eyes, daggerlike teeth, claws that could make short work of any animal they cared to challenge or eat.

But the technicians, artists and scientists scurrying among the fearsome body parts at Dinamation in Irvine don't seem to notice that they work in a scene from a Hieronymus Bosch painting. They're in the business of making dinosaurs, after all — more than 600 since the company's inception in 1982 — and adding verisimilitude to a 6-inch claw or razorlike incisor is all part of a day's work.

As the hellish scene in their construction shop attests, the people of Dinamation are very good at what they do.

"Right now, we have between 50 and 60 exhibits throughout the world," said Dinamation's founder and president, Chris Mays.

"Our customers include natural-history museums, aquariums and zoos. So our dinosaurs have to be accurate."

Dinamation has provided exhibits for the Museum of Natural History in Los Angeles, and the company's outdoor installation at the San Diego Wild Animal Park was a popular exhibit for the past two summers.

Accuracy and detail are points of pride with Mays. "We have three Ph.D.s on staff, and we try to

Utah find lends credence to Spielberg's monster

Some things you may not know about the beasts who once ruled the planet:

Food for thought: If you think present-day reptiles are dinosaurs' only living relatives, take a closer look at your meal next Thanksgiving. The skeletal structure of birds closely resembles that of a group of dinosaurs called ornithischians, and like many dinosaurs, birds lay eggs, travel together and often nest in groups.

Cool armor: The stegosaurus' distinctive back plates, once believed to be armor, were probably just big air conditioners. They contained blood vessels, which probably helped regulate the animal's body temperature.

Dinosaurs: Since some prehistoric plants were particularly

indigestible, many herbivorous dinosaurs swallowed rocks to help pulverize their fibrous diet.

Don't even think about transplants: Some of the largest dinosaurs, such as the 70-foot apatosaurus, may have had as many as eight hearts to pump blood along their long necks to their brains. Prehistory imitates art?

During the filming of "Jurassic Park," director Steven Spielberg decided to invoke artistic license in the portrayal of the vicious velociraptor, transforming the man-sized carnivore into a 20-foot terror. This was before a claw was unearthed in Utah last October that suggested that a member of the raptor family was — you guessed it — 20 feet in length.

"We're very aware of the fact that we're part science, part entertainment," he said.

Dinamation's exhibits feature dinosaurs moving in many fanciful if believable ways: carnivores gorge on fallen herbivores; a Tyrannosaurus rex turns its head and stares menacingly; a mother and her child protect a nest of eggs; baby-dinosaur cavort with one another.

In addition to its \$10 million-per-year dinosaur-construction business, Mays' company also is busy finding new dinosaurs, or bringing to life. Its Dinosaur Discovery Expeditions visit some of the continent's most productive fossil sites, providing amateur paleontologists with a dusty, exciting taste of the dinosaur-digging business.

The summer program, now in its fifth year, boasts some important contributions to the field, including the discovery of the world's largest and oldest-known apatosaurus, a 70-foot-long, 36-ton herbivore. International tours are being planned for the 1993 season. The highlights will be two six-day expeditions to Monterey, Mexico, next month — an area rich in dinosaur deposits, yet virtually unexplored by paleontologists.

A Dinamation installation can include as many as 20 animated prehistoric animals, varying in size from nesting 4-foot babies to 47-foot behemoths. The displays include dioramas, sound effects and various interactive elements; one device even allows people to control the creatures' movements. The price tag isn't small — some large installations can cost more than \$2 million.

Spectacular as Dinamation's exhibits are, they pale in comparison to Mays' ultimate dream: a huge, permanent facility, to open 6000. Company officials describe it as a combination museum and hands-on science education center.

Features bypass theaters, head direct to video

Charlton Heston, Jack Palance, Tim Roth, Genevieve Bujold, her son and Chuck Norris's son, Mike, all have movies that are bypassing theaters and heading for video this month.

Heston and Palance turn up in an unreleased 1989 science-fiction thriller, "Solar Crisis," due Wednesday. Tim Matheson plays Heston's grandson and Peter Boyle's chief bad guy in this end-of-the-world thriller set for 2050. The movie appears to carry no director's credit.

"In stores now is "Death Ring," an R-rated action film starring Mike Norris (son of Chuck), Don Swazey (brother of Patrick) and Chad McQueen (son of Steve).

In this rehash of Richard Connell's classic short story, "The Most Dangerous Game," Billy Drago plays a millionaire villain who kidnaps Norris and his wife (Isabel Glasser), and uses them as prey for a private

manhunt that's open only to the rich.

Bujold's son, Matt Almond, co-stars with her in "The Dance Goes On," written and directed by his father and her ex-husband, Paul Almond, a Canadian filmmaker who had a brief vogue in the late 1960s with "Isabelle" and "Act of the Heart," both of which starred his then-wife.

"In this 1991 film, Bujold and Matt Almond play bohemian mother and son, and James Keach is the boy's estranged father.

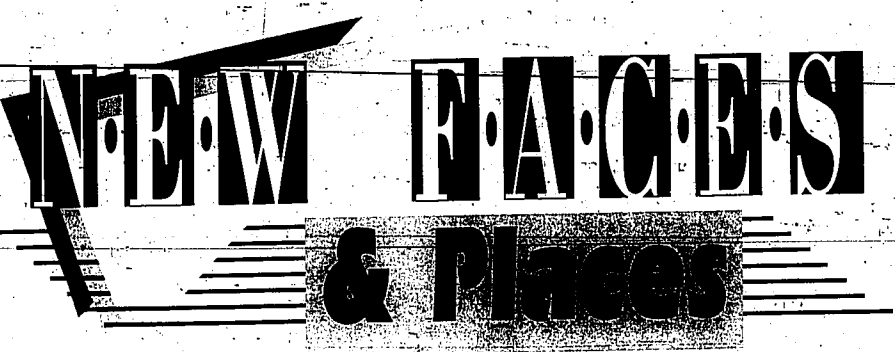

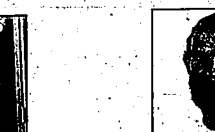

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Retail spending slows; jobless claims increase

WASHINGTON — The half-speed economic recovery is backtracking. Retail sales growth is fading after a strong holiday shopping season, and unemployment lines are stretching longer.

Sales rose only 0.3 percent in February, held in check by a drop in sales to dealers, the Commerce Department said Thursday. It revised away a previously reported increase for January, saying sales were unchanged during that month after advancing a strong 1.1 percent in December.

Meanwhile, the Labor Department said the number of Americans filing new claims for unemployment benefits unexpectedly shot up by 25,000 in the week ended Feb. 27. Claims totaled 382,000, the highest level in nearly four months.

The reports fit with other statistics showing the economy losing some steam this year.

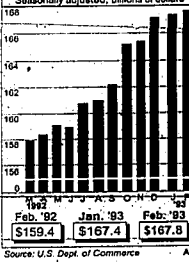
Economists, however, were far from alarmed. They said some retrenchment was inevitable after the final three months of 1992, when the economy sprang ahead at a 4.8 percent annual rate, the fastest in five years.

"We went way above trend in the last part of 1992 and now we're getting back to earth a bit," said economist Robert G. Dedrick of the Northern Trust Co. in Chicago.

Despite the fact that the unemployment rate in February fell to a 15-month low of 7 percent, other economic statistics have slipped early this year.

donia, Ariz., expect only a 2.9 percent rate of economic growth in the current quarter.

The slowdown in retail spending, which accounts for roughly one third of the overall gross domestic product, is a major reason cited for the muted forecast.

"We're not in a stronger recovery. This still is the kind of half-speed recovery we've been talking about for a long time. It really hasn't changed," said economist Sam Shaber of the WEA Group in Bala Cynwyd, Pa.

She said sustained improvement in the job market will be the key ingredient needed this year to keep retail sales rising.

In February, sales at building supply and hardware stores jumped 3.3 percent.

Dow Jones sinks 21 points; stock prices fall

NEW YORK — Stock prices fell sharply on Thursday after mixed economic data caused investors to question the staying power of the economic recovery.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 21.34 points to 4,547.00.

Big Board volume totaled 250.62 million shares as of 4 p.m., down from 255.19 million on Wednesday.

Advancers were narrowly squeaked by decliners on the New York Stock Exchange, with 949 issues up, 947 down, and 612 unchanged.

Broad market indexes were mixed. The NYSE's composite index fell 1.16 point to 250.20. But on the American Stock Exchange, the market index rose 0.43 point to 422.31.

Investors were also capitalizing on

three successive days of rises to record-breaking highs in the Dow Jones Industrial average.

The Commerce Department reported that retail sales rose a surprising 0.3 percent in February, boosted by strong sales at building supply and hardware stores, supermarkets and gasoline stations. Sales were expected to be unchanged from the previous month.

The sales figure suggested that the recovery is proceeding. However, the Labor Department reported that the number of Americans filing first-time claims for jobless benefits jumped by 25,000 in late February. Many analysts expected claims to drop by 6,000.

The department said some of the increase was due to the return to a normal work week after a week shortened by the President's Day holiday. Still, many stock analysts

have said the recovery will not take strong hold and push corporate earnings higher until the employment picture improves.

General Motors fell 1.14 to 38.7. Alcoa Aluminum declined 1.14 to 35, and Deere retreated 0.5 to 54.

Paper stocks, another cyclical sector, were also pushed sharply lower after Merrill Lynch lowered its intermediate-term rating on some of the stocks to "neutral" from "above average." Louisiana Pacific plunged 4 1/2 to 64, and Georgia Pacific slipped 3 1/2 to 44, and International Paper fell 1 1/2 to 64 1/2.

Glaxo Holdings led the most active issues on the NYSE and fell 1/4

to 19 after Ernest Mario resigned as chief executive and deputy chairman. There were rumors that Mario was forced out of negotiations with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. The FDA had accused the British drug maker of making false and misleading claims about its Zantac ulcer drug.

National Semiconductor rose 1/4 to 12 1/2.

The company said its third-quarter earnings rose to 19 cents per share from 11 cents a year ago.

Health-care stocks rose after a federal judge ruled on Wednesday that Hillary Clinton's health-care task force must meet in public when it is gathering information, although it may meet privately to discuss proposals.

Over-the-counter trading, US Healthcare rose 1/4 to 46 and Amgen advanced 3/4 to 34K.

Utah moves to close refinery; neighbors rejoice

WOODS CROSS, Utah — State regulators will revoke the permit of a Wood Cross oil recycling business and neighbors couldn't be happier.

The state also wants to deny K-West Recycling Corp. a permit to store used oil on its premises.

The company recycles as much as 10,000 gallons of used oil daily and has been pinpointed as a site of

leaking hazardous chemicals.

Residents blame the oil for headaches, rashes, nosebleeds, voice problems, allergies and funny-tasting water.

K-West owners say the residents are mistaken about the source of their problems and complaints. Besides, the company says, the oil refining business was there first.

State regulators don't know whether health problems around the six-acre site can be linked directly to K-West and prior compa-

nies that operated there, because the state has not tested the soil or groundwater.

But the regulators know enough that they want to stop used-oil refining and hazardous-waste storage at the site, which has been done periodically on the property since 1988.

Officials from two government divisions last week issued a notice of intent to deny a permit for the storage and an outright revocation of the permit to refine used oil. If

the notice and revocation hold through appeals, the site will be closed, both actions state.

Officials based their decisions on six years of regulation by the Division of Solid and Hazardous Waste, the Division of Oil, Gas and Mining and one Environmental Protection Agency inspection that have revealed numerous alleged violations.

The company has had three owners since 1988.

Bankers: Fewer Americans behind on loan payments

WASHINGTON — A rising economy and falling interest rates helped shrink the share of Americans who fell behind in their loan payments, a banking trade group said Wednesday.

A survey by the American Bankers Association found that, when seasonally adjusted, 2.43 percent of installment loans were at least 30 days overdue during the last three months of 1992.

This was down from 2.58 percent during the October-December period of 1991 and the third straight quarterly decline since the composite delinquency ratio reached 2.75 percent in the

quarter of last year.

It fell to 2.60 percent at the end of the second quarter and 2.46 percent at the end of the third. The composite ratio, based on eight types of closed-end loans at commercial banks, is seasonally adjusted.

The report also showed that delinquency rates for bank credit cards, which are not included in the composite ratio, decreased to a seasonally adjusted 2.93 percent, down from 3.14 percent in the third quarter and 3.29 percent at the end of 1991.

Home equity lines of credit, also excluded from the composite ratio, continued to post the lowest

delinquency rate, 0.85 percent. That was down from 0.88 percent in the final three months of 1991, but up from 0.75 percent the third quarter of 1992.

Consumer attempts to pay off their heavy debt burdens, rather than make new purchases, was one of the reasons for the sluggish escape from recession.

The Federal Reserve said consumer credit fell 0.3 percent during 1992, following a 1 percent decline a year earlier, the first since 1988.

But consumer spending, which represents about two-thirds of the nation's economic activity, was speeding up as 1992 ended.

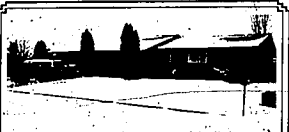

 Nine out of 10 players are no favorites to lose today's big-trump game. See if you can make the top 10 percent.
 In a typical game against average players, South will take the automatic club finesse at trick one. This loses to East's king, a club comes back to knock out the ace, and it's all downhill from there. Eventually South tries the diamond finesse, and the defenders win four clubs and a diamond for one down.
 In the club finesse at trick one, a mandatory ace! Not if South gives the matter more than a perfunctory thought. When West leads fourth best, it is unlikely that he has led from K-J-10-x-x. Had he held the ace, why would he have led the club? Since he didn't, East is likely to hold one of the three honors. If West has five clubs, the suit will block if dummy's ace goes up at trick one. (If West has one four, the game is safe.)
 In today's layout, dummy's club ace wins and the diamond-finesse loses. Now, whether East has K-x-J or 10-x, West cannot run his suit before South takes his nine winners.
 A word of caution. Most players who lead the jack instead of fourth best from a suit headed by the K-J-10. But not all. In general, unless West is a top player (some top players always lead fourth best), you can count on him leading the jack from that holding.

Filmmaker, 'Young Indiana' try to conquer TV — again

LOS ANGELES (AP) — George Lucas has shepherded Indiana Jones through Nazi cabals, murderous cults and killer special effects. Now the filmmaker is hoping his hero can survive television — the temple of doom for excellence.

Lucas' series, "The Young Indiana Jones Chronicles," returns to ABC with a two-hour episode Saturday from 7 to 9 p.m. MST, featuring an appearance by moviedom's Indy, Harrison Ford.

"I'm walking across the burial ground of great artistic adventures. It's worth-going and I'm enjoying doing it," Lucas said. "But the 'Brooklyn Bridges' and 'I'll Fly Away' — their bones are all around me."

"Each one of us tries to push (television) a little further, and gets a little more on the air," added Lucas.

"Young Indiana," which was pulled in October after struggling in a difficult Monday time slot, is now nestled in the newly discovered boom of family TV viewing, Saturday night. Future episodes will air 8 to 10 p.m. MST.

If CBS' predictable "Dr. Quinn, Medicine Woman," can make a Saturday splash, surely there is an audience for the rich tapestry woven by executive producer Lucas and a stellar team of film directors and writers.

Set in the early 1900s, the series details the globe-trotting childhood of the future archaeologist (and riskiest adventurer). The reminiscences of Indy at age 93 (actor George Hall) are cast featured.

Young Indy, played at age 10 by Corey Carrier and as a 93-year-old by Sean Patrick Flanery, brushes against history and historymakers including Sigmund Freud, Pablo Picasso and Mata Hari.

Unlike his hit trio of Indiana Jones films, Lu-

cas says, the series relies more on character and nuance than swashbuckling adventure.

"I'm able to deal with much more personal issues than in the movies," says Lucas, who also created the "Star Wars" film trilogy.

The two-hour episode, for instance, focuses its first half (before a murder plot intervenes) on jazz-struck Indy's attempt to crash the world and comedy of black musicians.

"It's an appreciative look at America's great musical art form, and a chance to view the unchecked racism of the early 20th century through Indiana's innocent eyes."

The series has the kind of detail and emotional texture that marked one of Lucas' earliest works, also a coming-of-age drama.

"I am basically doing a lot of little 'American Griffiths' right now," he said.

"Television provides a chance for me to express ideas and be creative in ways not possible when you have everything riding on one weekend," he added, "where a film is analyzed as much by stock analysts as by film critics."

The medium may be TV, but he insists what he's putting on each week is a full-fledged movie, backed by directorial talent such as Bill-Austin and Nicholas Roeg — and by computer magic.

"George Lucas: Heroes, Myths and Magic," the documentary airing tonight on PBS (check local listings), offers an intriguing peek at the pioneering use of technology that enhances "Young Indiana."

In one scene, for instance, a small band of marching troops is replicated to fill up the screen with soldiers. And a funeral procession, again enlarged by computer, paces down a street broadcasted at the filmmaker's whim.

Story of the West told in words, pictures of its people

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A new documentary series looks at the trailblazers, the settlers, the Indians, the soldiers, the cowboys, the gunfighters, the dreamers and all those others who contributed to both the myth and reality of the often-romanticized American West.

But "The Wild West" presents them in an extraordinarily personal way. The people who lived in the West in the 35 years following the Civil War tell their own stories, in their own, often moving, words.

The 10-hour syndicated series is narrated by Jack Lemmon and features the voices of Brian Keith, Barry Corbin, Graham Greene, Conchata Ferrell, James Coburn, Richard Crenna, George American Horse and many others.

It is being syndicated by the Prime Time Entertainment Network in two-hour segments over five consecutive nights beginning Monday, March 22.

"We wanted to tell about the West through the common elements of human experience, such as hopes, dreams, love, marriage, work and death," producer John Copeland said.

"At the end of the Civil War, it was estimated it would take 150 years to fill up the land west of the Mississippi. It took one generation — or about 35 years. We wanted to tell it in the words of the people, and we wanted it to be true to what happened. We didn't want the idealized West, the myth."

The subject is close to Copeland's heart. His great-grandfather, Elijah Simpson Hornaday, was a first sergeant in the 7th Caval-

ry with George Custer during the Battle of Little Big Horn, and won the Medal of Honor with the 6th Cavalry at Sappa Creek, Kan., in 1874.

Historian Robert Utley contributed to the segments on soldiers, Indians and gunfighters. His biography of Sitting Bull will be a May selection of the Book of the Month Club and the main selection of the History Book Club. He has worked at the Custer Battlefield National Monument in Montana and is a former National Park historian.

"I think one thing they've done in particular is to recognize that people are interested in people," Utley said. "They present broad themes of history in terms of individual human experiences that people can relate to. That's the best way to present history."

Copeland and executive producer Douglas Neate began putting the series together after the enormous success of the Ken Burns' Civil War series on PBS in 1990. They'd previously produced "Wild Times," "The Sacketts" and "Buffalo Soldiers," a pilot based on the black troopers of the 10th Cavalry.

"I think television has now recognized a market for this kind of history that did not exist before the Civil War series," Utley said. "It just all exploded in the last year or two. There are more in the works."

"I think the 1990s are going to be the years of the West, just as the 1950s of the Indians. 'Dances With Wolves' had a lot to do with arousing an interest in Indians that did not exist before."

I still have people come up to me and talk about it."

In addition to being known as Kay Chancellor Sterling, Jeanne Cooper is also called by her real name, Bernsen's real mother. She has worked with her handsome actor son in "L.A. Law," playing his mother (perfect type casting).

"In a way Corbin has created an indelible characterization [with his] lawyer Arnie Becker in 'L.A. Law' as I have with Kay in 'The Young and the Restless.' Corbin once asked me if he should be concerned about getting too identified with a role, and I told him that making an impression in a part as he has done means that audiences love and enjoy it. 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ABC hopes George Foreman will score a knockout with new sitcom pilot

With his victory over South African heavyweight Pierre Coetzee, 44-year-old George Foreman continues his reign as boxing's oldest active box-office attraction. But his run as a TV comedy star may be just beginning.

Right now, the former heavyweight champ is boxing's most reliable TV ratings star. Even against the giant tomato cans who've padded his record in recent years, his numbers are stratospheric. The reasons are obvious.

His knockout power is awesome — 66 knockouts in 71 ring victories — and viewers always anticipate immediate destruction. His longevity also is amazing: He won the title 20 years ago, lost it, took off for 10 years, then staged an unbelievable comeback in a series of TV bouts, culminating with a losing but still impressive 1990 title fight with then-champion Evander Holyfield.

Even more real reason: Foreman is so popular with TV fight fans he has his irresistible personality. By making fun of everything about himself — from his age and his weight to his insatiable appetite for junk food — Foreman has metamorphosed into a sort of ham-fisted Will Rogers of the boxing ring.

TV doesn't waste that kind of charisma very long. Since the late 1980s, Foreman has been all over the medium — in commercials, on talk shows, as a color commentator on

fight telecasts and as guest star on comedy shows such as HBO's "The Larry Sanders Show."

Now ABC has filmed a situation-comedy series pilot not just featuring Foreman, but starring him as pretty much himself, a jovial family man who just happens to be one of the world's top-ranked prizefighters.

ABC will be testing Foreman's comedy pilot and, by April or May, should know if the ex-champ is really on the way to being a TV star outside the boxing ring.

What are the odds of Foreman's making it as a TV performer? It's a tossup. Boxers have an outstanding record for getting into TV but a poor one for staying there. Their celebrity status as jocks gets the door open, at least for the ones with colorful personalities. But beating people up isn't much preparation for the finer points of acting.

Only a few championship-level boxers have sustained TV careers as performers. The all-time most successful: probably one-time middleweight champ Rocky Graziano, who was a regular in five weekly series in the late 1950s and early 1960s.

Rough and tough in the ring, Graziano was played by Paul Newman in the 1956 movie dramatizing his boxing career, "Somebody Up There Likes Me," while Graziano reinvented himself as a comedian and tried a new career in NBC's "The Martha Raye Show" (1954-'56), ABC's "The Henry and Rocky Show" (with Henny Youngman)

in 1955, CBS's "Pantomime Quiz" game show (1954-'56) and "Keefe Braselle's Variety Garden" (1963), and the syndicated "Miami Undercover" (1961).

Another ex-champ also followed the comedy path into TV, "Slapsie" Maxie Rosenbloom, who held the light-heavyweight title in the early 1930s. After a successful movie career, mainly playing punchy ex-fighters, Rosenbloom became a regular in a weekly TV series in 1954 — the syndicated "Joe Palooka Story" playing the make-believe champ's pal, Humphrey Pennyworth.

More recently, though, world-class prizefighters mostly have been one-shot actors or occasional bit players, such as boxing legend Sugar Ray Leonard.

The biggest boxing celebrity of the TV era — ex-heavyweight champ Muhammad Ali — was given a first-class showcase for his acting debut: the co-starring role with Kris Kristofferson in NBC's multimillion-dollar miniseries "Freedom Road" (1979). It only proved he wasn't really for prime time — that criticism abused, low-rated disaster.

Even then, he was Oliver compared to Mike Tyson, the last great box-office star among the heavyweight champs. Though Tyson was on TV all the time before being sent to prison for rape, he attracted few offers to become an actor. He fumbled out a few scripted lines in an episode of ABC's "Webster" once, but most of his TV "work" was doing "guest" shots as himself, especially

during his short-lived marriage to TV actress Robin Givens of ABC's "Head of the Class."

Max Baer, who held the heavyweight title in 1934-'35, fished out his long, successful career as a character actor with a run of comedy parts on television shows. He died in 1959, two years before his son, Max Jr., became a TV star as Jehro on CBS's long-running hit "The Beverly Hills Cop."

The senior Baer's brother, Buddy, who twice fought Joe Louis for the heavyweight crown, also became a successful actor. His unnamed fight with a bull in "Quo Vadis" (1951) was the film's action highlight. Buddy Baer finally landed a regular role in a TV series near the end of his career, playing a Norwegian in "The Vikings," a 1960 syndicated show.

No doubt the king of TV-actor ex-boxers today is Tony Danza, who starred in two of the most successful comedy series of the past 10 years: ABC's "Taxi" and "Who's the Boss?"

Danza was off to a reasonably good start as a pro fighter in the late 1970s when his natural flair for comedy made him a star in "Taxi." His pre-"Taxi" ring record, mostly as a 165-to-175-pounder, was 8-3. He actually fought twice more while starring in "Taxi," adding two more wins. Because he got out of the ring without much damage to his features, the handsome Danza became a favorite of female viewers and has played leading men in several TV movies.

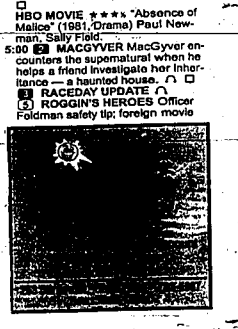

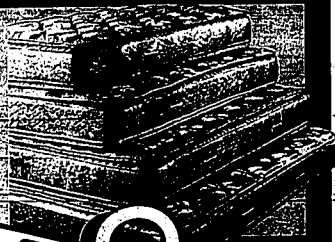
