Anti-gay measure 'fatally flawed'

BOISE — Attorney General Larry EchoHawk said Thursday that the anti-gay rights initiative proposed by the Idaho Citizens Alliance is "fatally flawed" and would not survive a court challenge.

The initiative, which seeks to keep homosexuals from being protected by civil-rights laws, violates several provisions of the U.S. and Idaho constitutions, including the equal-protection, free-speech and due-process clauses, EchoHawk said in a scathing legal review.

"This initiative is not merely an innocu-

ous effort to ensure homosexuals do not receive special status," EchoHawk wrote. "Rather, it targets a class of citizens for denial of basic constitutional rights... govern-

ment-condoned discrimination, denial of equal protection of the law and foreclosure of access to the democratic process."

State law requires EchoHawk's office to review proposed initiatives and suggest changes. However, the ICA doesn't have to accept any of EchoHawk's suggestions.

Opponents of the ICA initiative exulted over EchoHawk's condemnation of it.

"For the ICA to go forward now would be a waste of money," said Jack van Valkenburgh, executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union of Idaho.

"If they cared about Idaho at all, they'd drop this foul initiative," van Valkenburgh said. "But I don't believe they will, because

they're more interested in gathering names and addresses and building a national power base.

ICA Chairman Kelly Walton of Heyburn rejected EchoHawk's analysis as biased from the outset and pledged that his group would press ahead to get the initiative on the November 1994 ballot.

"I find it incredible that so many tax dollars have been spent on this lengthy 18-page review, not to objectively deal with each issue, but to promote political correctness," Walton said.

Attorneys will analyze EchoHawk's report to see if any changes need to be made. "But I don't believe they will, because

House approves Clinton budget

WASHINGTON — The House moved to close the book on Reaganomics Thursday by embracing President Clinton's recipe of new spending to create jobs, plus long-term budget cuts and tax increases to whittle the deficit.

On a virtual party-line 243-183 vote, the Democratic-dominated chamber approved a deficit-reduction blueprint that would trim budget shortfalls by \$310 billion over the next five years. Only 11 Democrats strayed and opposed the president, while no Republicans supported his plan.

The savings — to be enacted in future bills — to be enacted in future bills. About half would come from spending cuts on defense and benefit programs such as Medicare. The rest would arise from tax increases, mainly on the rich and corporations. It resembled a plan the Senate was also debating.

"The one thing we need to do tonight is to say the Congress of the United States stands behind this young man," said Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo. "We want to give him a chance. We want our people to succeed. We want a new day for this country."

With a near party-line 240-185 test vote of approval, the House then moved toward passage of a companion bill pumping \$16.3 billion in new spending into communi-

ty development grants, small business loans and other job-creating projects. The administration says the measure would create 219,000 jobs this year and more later.

In the Senate, where debate will spill into next week, party discipline also held. Democrats defeated 53-46, a GOP effort to strip Clinton's proposed energy tax from the plan.

With an 80-vote numerical advantage in their pockets, Democratic leaders had predicted that in a long day of debate, they would overwhelm Republicans and approve the two Clinton economic recovery measures.

True to their word, party leaders showed they could hold their rank-and-file together. About half of the House also had predicted that in a long day of debate, they would overwhelm Republicans and approve the two Clinton economic recovery measures.

Lawmakers then turned aside, 409-20, a second Republican plan that would have eliminated \$682 billion in red ink by combining spending cuts with Clinton's tax increases on the rich.

Also rejected was a package by the liberal Black Congressional Caucus adding defense cuts and tax increases to Clinton's plan and using the extra money to finance social programs. The defeat was by a 335-87 margin.

Bentsen wants increase in U.S. debt limit soon

WASHINGTON — Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen said Thursday the government risks bounced checks unless Congress raises the national debt limit before taking a spring vacation.

"Our best estimate is that the Treasury will run out of cash and room under the current ... limit on April 7 as Social Security recipients and others attempt to cash their checks," Bentsen said in a letter to congressional leaders.

The current limit is \$4.145 trillion. Bentsen asked that it be increased to \$4.37 trillion through Sept. 30.

Through Wednesday, the debt — the accumulation of all the government's deficits and surpluses since

the founding of the Republic — stood at \$4,124 trillion. That's just \$21 billion short of the current ceiling set on Nov. 5, 1990.

Congress plans to begin its February session on March 5, but Bentsen asked for the increase in the debt ceiling in eight days — by March 26 — to "avoid unnecessary uncertainty in financial markets and dislocations in the Treasury's usual pattern of auction announcements."

March 26 marks the announcement of the regular auction of 52-week Treasury bills, which would settle on April 8.

"Of course a more significant delay could risk default on the government's securities, with its adverse consequences on the financial markets, the federal deficit, and the U.S. economy," Bentsen said.

Gay ban hearings start in late March

WASHINGTON — Senate hearings on President Clinton's controversial plan to end the ban on gays in the military will begin during the week of March 29, Armed Services Committee Chairman Sam Nunn, D-Ga., announced Thursday.

Nunn, who supports the existing policy and was

instrumental in Clinton's January postponement of a proposed executive order lifting the ban, reiterated his views Thursday while promising "fair, thorough and objective" hearings over four months.

Nunn said initial hearings will examine the ban's historical background. Testimony also will be heard from officials of foreign countries that permit gays to serve in the military.

Birthday heart attack an unwelcome present

ANAHEIM, Calif. — Doctors have uncovered what must be one of nature's crueler ironies: People are especially likely to suffer heart attacks on their birthdays.

A study released Thursday shows that people — especially men — are about 20 percent more likely to suffer a heart attack on their birthday than on other days of the same week.

Just what folks should do about this is not clear, though. Certainly birthdays cannot be avoided, as much as people might like to. But overindulgence can be, and researchers suspect that might be the real culprit.

Looking at when heart attacks occur is a hot subject of research. Experts hope their work will help reveal the forces that trigger these attacks, so they can find new ways to stop them.

Alzheimer's drug receives nod

A Food and Drug Administration advisory board unanimously recommended marketing approval Thursday for tacrine, the first drug approved for Alzheimer's disease, which affects as many as 4 million Americans.

Approval of the drug requires action by the FDA itself, but the agency normally follows the recommendations of its advisory panels.

The drug may be available to patients

within a couple of weeks, and certainly within two or three months, said officials of the FDA and Warner-Lambert Co., which manufactures tacrine.

Although previous trials of the drug had proved inconclusive and the board had twice turned down marketing requests, new data indicated that the drug can partially reverse the loss of mental function associated with the disease.

The panel noted that the drug does not work for everyone who takes it and that it has the potential to cause severe side effects.

treated over a five-year period at 90 New Jersey hospitals. He presented his data at a meeting of the American College of Cardiology.

The pattern was significantly different for men and women, Wilson said. Men's heart attack rates were 21 percent higher on their birthdays, but women's were only 9 percent higher.

"Emotional stress and overindulgence, such as drinking and smoking, might explain the birthday risk," he said.

The study of what touches off heart attacks is one of the newest in cardiology. It began with the discovery by Dr. James Muller in 1985 that people face their highest risk of heart attack during the first hour or two of the morning.

"There is a lot of interesting information coming out on emotional stress. A birthday is a big event," said a physician at Deaconess Hospital in Boston.

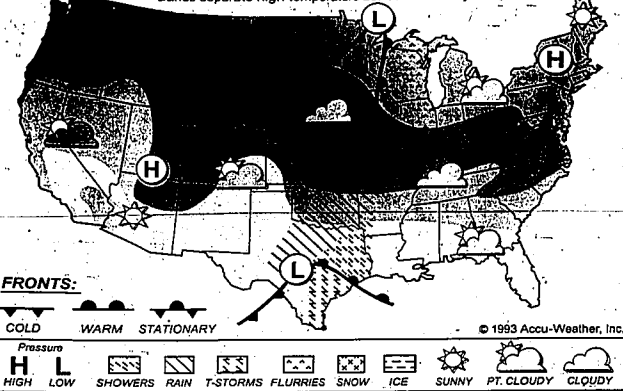

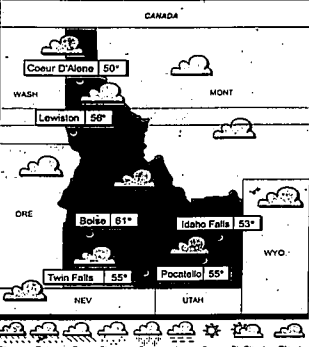

Weather summary

A flood warning remained in effect late Thursday for the Weiser River near Weiser, the Malheur River near Vale, Ore., and the Bruneau River near Hot Springs. Those streams were running high in the wake of steady rains and melting snow from milder temperatures. The rain tapered down to a few showers around Malad City and Twin Falls Thursday afternoon. However, snowmelt remained a factor in the flood potential for some rivers in southwest Idaho and southeast Oregon. Rainfall around the state was heaviest across the southern counties. Among the reports were Caldwell .35 inch, Challis .04, Fairfield .27, Gooding .45, Lowell .30, Malad .01, Malis .12, Moscow .06, Mullan .04, Rexburg .02 and Stanley a trace. Elsewhere around the state, Hailey and Salmon had scattered clouds, while the rest of the state was mostly cloudy and a little breezy. Spring arrives with the vernal equinox at 5:41 a.m. MST on Saturday. The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 63 degrees at Hagerman. Porthill reported the coldest at 21 degrees. Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 89 degrees at Thermal, Calif. The lowest was 22 degrees below zero at Waterson, N.Y.

Freezing rain coats southern Plains; showers widespread

Rain showers were scattered over eastern Florida, along the western slopes of the northern Rockies and western Oregon into northwest California. Wintry temperatures were expected to reach South Carolina by early Friday. Frost warnings were posted across the state. Temperatures were unseasonably cool Wednesday night and Thursday morning from the Mississippi Valley across the northern half of the Atlantic coast. Low temperature records for the date include 8 degrees below zero in Rochester, Minn., breaking the 1941 record of 4 below; and 12 degrees below zero in Marquette, Mich., breaking the 1967 record of 7 below. Temperatures around the lower 48 states at 1 p.m. MST ranged from 9 degrees above zero at Massena, N.Y., to 84 degrees at Thermal, Calif.

Americans return to Kismayu

KISMAYU, Somalia (AP) — A battalion of American troops returned to this violent city Thursday in an attempt to end feuding between factions of rival warlords that derailed national peace talks. The 500 U.S. Army troops — members of a quick reaction force — arrived in this dusty port little more than two weeks after they had ended over a year of peacekeeping operations on March 5 to an 800-man Belgian force. The Americans, accompanied by 13 helicopters, were ordered back after fighters of Mohamed Said Hirsi, known as Gen. Morgan, drove supporters of Col. Omar Jess, an Aidi ally, out of the town. The clash prompted Mohamed Farah Aidid, one of Somalia's chief warlords, and a supporter of Jess, to pull out of peace talks in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. Aidid refused to return

until the situation in Kismayu was "reversed." In Addis Ababa, meanwhile, delegates for a quorum and held informal talks instead. No substantive progress was reported. Kismayu was quiet Thursday, as a team of investigators — including the U.S. military's top legal adviser — searched for weapons hidden in Nairobi, Kenya — began trying to sort out the dispute. "It's very complex because it involves clans and sub-clans, years of hatred," said Brig. Gen. Greg Lile, who is in charge of the American troops in Kismayu. Representatives of 14 Somali clans planned to fly to Kismayu on Friday for their own probe in hopes of restoring the peace talks. The United States had more than 1,000 troops here until the handover

to Belgian forces. About 150 American soldiers remained to guard aid agencies. Activity at the airfield, where rows of coats covered by mosquito nets fill the former waiting room and hangar, picked up steadily as U.S. troops returned with their supplies in overland convoys and by C-130 transport planes. The troops were based on weapons, bandits, roadblocks and "technicals" — vehicles mounted with weapons — in Kismayu and will intercede to halt unrest. U.S. Army Capt. Wesley Bickford said at least 10 people were killed but elders of Jess' clan said more than 100 died. They also alleged that Morgan's men have been taking people from their homes at night and executing them. Lile said 51 people sought treatment for gunshot wounds.

Judge calls sheik danger to U.S.

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — A radical Muslim cleric who preached at a mosque where two World Trade Center bombing suspects worshipped is a threat to U.S. security and has thousands of terrorist followers in Egypt, a judge reportedly said in a deportation ruling. In the sealed order, U.S. Immigration Judge Daniel Meisner said Sheikh Omar Abdel-Rahman's followers in Egypt were involved in the 1981 assassination of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and other "spectacular terrorist activities." The Star-Ledger of Newark obtained the ruling, which was dated Thursday, and published excerpts Thursday. Abdel-Rahman, 54, said in TV appearances Thursday that he doesn't know the two men charged in the

Feb. 26 trade center bombing, and he denied that he has any backing from the sheik, who lives in Jersey City, N.J., is the spiritual leader of a radical Muslim movement in Egypt that wants to install an Islamic government. He has denounced the bombing; his followers say he is the victim of an anti-Muslim hysteria. Abdel-Rahman has preached at El Salam mosque in Jersey City, N.J. Mohammed Salameh and Nidal Ayyad, both indicted Wednesday in the bombing, often prayed there. "I don't know any one of them," Abdel-Rahman, speaking in Los Angeles, told CNN. "Maybe they pray in mosques where I pray."

Abdel-Rahman also said he didn't know Ibrahim Elgabrowny or El-Sayid Nosair. Elgabrowny is in jail on an obstruction of justice charge in connection with a police raid on his Brooklyn brown apartment; a federal judge refused to set bail for him Thursday. Nosair was acquitted of the 1990 murder of extremist Rabbi Meir Kahane, but remains jailed on related weapons charges. Nosair also prayed at the mosque. According to The Star-Ledger, the judge's order said the sheik's Egyptian followers have been involved in Sadat assassination, the 1990 killing of a high-ranking Egyptian Parliament member and five companions, and attacks on tourists and on the Egyptian Coptic community. "The applicant has a few thousand followers who have been responsible for conducting spectacular terrorist activities" in Egypt, the judge said. "There are reasonable grounds for deeming the applicant to be a danger to the security of the United States."

Continued from A1 he said. But Walton rejected the attorney general's finding that the measure is unconstitutional several times. "Is it unconstitutional to say that homosexuality is an unhealthy lifestyle when epidemiology supports the assertion?" he asked. "Is it unconstitutional...to protect our children from the disastrous effects of choosing this behavior? I think not." A key provision of the initiative would bar state-and-local governments from enacting laws or adopting rules that give civil-rights protections to gays and lesbians. However, EchoHawk said that would make the state an ally in discrimination against homosexuals. The ICA says its initiative is intended to ensure that homosexuals are not given "special rights" under civil-rights laws. But, EchoHawk said, "Current Idaho law does not confer any special status on minorities." He said the measure would also deny gays and lesbians the ability to ask government to address their problems, a right guaranteed by the First Amendment and the Idaho Constitution.

Incredible shrinking tax base

Tobacco revenues crumble as more Americans quit smoking

It seems to make perfect sense — if cigarettes rob Americans of their health, why not tax them more to help pay for health insurance? One answer: Because revenues from tobacco taxes are crumbling like the ash on a cheap cigar, along with the percentage of Americans who smoke.

They're butting out for health reasons or because tax increases make it too expensive. Either way, the public treasury is taking a hit.

A 30-state survey by Associated Press bureaus found 20 states reporting tobacco product tax revenues in decline and 11 others that were in

decline until they raised their excise tax.

The same goes for federal tobacco revenues, which fell until the excise tax went up from 16 cents to 20 cents a pack in 1991. This year it went up to 24 cents.

While tobacco taxes yield lots of ready money at first, they're unlikely to provide long-term funding for something huge and growing like universal health care.

Call it The Incredible Shrinking Tax Base. In 1965, the year after the first U.S. surgeon general's report linked smoking to cancer, 42.4 percent of Americans over 18 smoked. By 1990 that figure had dropped to 25.3

percent. Accordingly, government treasuries have eased their dependence on tobacco.

Among the states, tobacco taxes peaked in 1968 in providing 5.2 percent of state revenues. That share has fallen to 1.9 percent. Smokers' current \$5.8 billion contribution to the federal pot is 0.4 percent of all revenues, a mere puff compared to the 1.39 percent in 1968.

This pattern of sliding revenues has two chief causes, economists say.

Tobacco taxes don't grow with the economy, necessitating regular hikes. And when tobacco taxes get high enough, some smokers quit and would-be smokers don't start. Another effect can be bootlegging and black markets.

The Minnesota Revenue Department offered this equation: For every 10 percent increase in the price of cigarettes, sales fall 4.5 percent.

The tax on smokers is "a mechanism to limit consumption," Mark Muchow, chief tax analyst for the West Virginia Division of Tax and Revenue. "Every time the cigarette tax is increased, a few more people say, 'It's time to quit.'"

Cigarettes cost, on average, \$1.90 a pack, including the 24 cent federal tax and state taxes that range from Virginia's 2.5 cents to Massachusetts' 51 cents.

"It's a lot easier to add a few cents to the cigarette tax to close the bud-

get gap, than to raise the sales tax," said Doug Ollingbrough, a researcher at the Council of State Governments in Lexington, Ky.

New York is fairly typical. Revenues on tobacco products slid from \$606 million in fiscal 1991, to \$596 million in fiscal 1992. This year they're projected at \$557 million.

Or take California, which pumped up its cigarette tax from 10 cents a pack to 35 cents in 1989. That only briefly stopped the natural slide in revenues. Cigarette excise taxes jumped from \$560 million in fiscal 1989 to \$787 million in fiscal 1990, but started to fall again the next year.

Yet this steady, if diminishing cash flow, remains attractive to lawmakers, and even presidents.

President Clinton said he may propose higher taxes on tobacco products to help pay for his national health insurance plan. Like other advocates of this idea, he suggested it's only fair smokers should pay more.

His wife and architect of health care reform proposals, Hillary Rodham Clinton, reiterated this in a recent AP interview.

The Clintons weren't the first to latch on to this idea.

Former President Jimmy Carter has endorsed a \$2 federal excise tax on cigarettes sought by the American Cancer Society, American Medical Association and the American Heart Association.

Preaching hinders new talks, authorities say

WACO, Texas (AP) — Cult leader David Koresh is again talking to law officers trying to end a 19-day standoff but is evasive and may be willing to let many of his followers die, the FBI said Thursday.

The apocalyptic preacher took little part in negotiations for several days, apparently because of wounds he said he suffered in a Feb. 28 gunfight in which four federal agents and at least three cult members were killed.

His re-entry into the discussions Wednesday eroded progress made earlier in the week, which had included a face-to-face meeting between cult members and law officers, FBI agent Bob Ricks said.

"We're very concerned that part of Koresh's grand scheme is he would like to see a large number of his people die, which would be justification for his pronouncements of the fulfillment of the scriptures," he added.

Koresh has said 104 people, including 17 children, are holed-up with him in the cult's fortified com-

Allen claims experts clear him of abuse

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — Woody Allen said Thursday a team of child sexual abuse experts cleared him of Mia Farrow's allegation that he molested their adopted 7-year-old daughter.

Allen, 57, was accused of molesting the child, Dylan, in August at the Bridgewater home of Farrow, Allen's companion and favorite leading lady for 12 years before a bitter split last summer.

As part of a state police investigation of the allegations, Dr. John Leventhal, a pediatrician and director of the Yale-New Haven child sex abuse clinic, had been meeting with Allen, Farrow and Dylan since Thanksgiving.

Allen and Farrow were briefed for 24 hours by Leventhal and two clinical social workers trained to detect child sexual abuse. Allen then proclaimed to a small array of reporters and photographers that he had been cleared.

He said the report found that "I never ever used my daughter, that no sexual abuse took place."

Allen said he intended to seek custody of Dylan and his other children immediately. "I believe this will turn everything around," he said.

Farrow wouldn't comment on the report, except to say, "I'll always stand by my children."

Her attorney, Eleanor Ailer, said Farrow felt the expert's findings were "incomplete and inaccurate."

Ailer said the hospital team had declined to meet with people who could have given critical testimony in the case, such as some of the older children in the family.

Negotiators heartened by new talks on NAFTA

WASHINGTON (AP) — Negotiators from the United States, Canada and Mexico expressed satisfaction Thursday with their opening round of talks aimed at drafting side agreements to go along with a continent-wide free-trade pact.

However, they said that no substantive decisions had been made during what they described as two days of exploratory talks covering the range of issues to be dealt with.

And officials indicated that disagreements did exist, even over such a basic question as how many side agreements would be negotiated.

The discussions Wednesday and Thursday involved Rufus Yerxa,

representing the Clinton administration, and John Weekes, heading up the Canadian team, and Herminio Blanco, the head of the Mexican delegation.

The Bush administration completed negotiations last August with Mexico and Canada over a 2,000-page document known as the North American Free Trade Agreement. It would create the world's largest free trade zone by removing tariffs and other barriers to trade among the three nations over the next 15 years.

However, President Clinton said during the campaign that he would not sign the document until side letters had been negotiated providing extra protections for worker rights, the environment and sudden increases of imports.

While the Mexicans and Canadians are willing to discuss side deals on worker rights and the environment, Weekes, Canada's negotiator, told reporters that both countries questioned the need for a side agreement dealing with import surges.

"We are talking about side deals in the area of the environment and labor. That is where we are putting our emphasis," Weekes said.

Probers urge halt to C-17 production

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon should suspend production of the new C-17 military cargo plane until problems with the aircraft can be resolved, Congressional investigators said Thursday.

"Step back and take a hard look at this before you make additional commitments," said Louis Rodrigues, a national security official with the General Accounting Office.

A House Government Operations subcommittee wrapped up two days of hearings on the McDonnell Douglas-built C-17 aircraft, which has been plagued by \$1.5 billion in cost overruns and wings that failed stress tests.

The panel invited company chairman John McDonnell to testify, but he failed to show, Chairman John Conyers, D-Mich., threatened subpoenas to compel McDonnell, Douglas and Defense Department officials to appear.

Military defends policy on war trophies

WASHINGTON — The military defended its tough policies on war trophies Thursday, saying Desert Storm troops caught trying to smuggle back weapons and other illegal items were adequately warned and fairly treated by the military justice system.

Hundreds of Persian Gulf veterans have faced disciplinary action for returning home with Iraqi Army AK-47s, pistols and hand grenades. Punishments ranged from reprimands to 33 months in prison.

In the Army, 36 have been court-martialed, six charged in U.S. district court, 73 subjected to nonjudicial punishment and 41 separated from service.

Col. Richard H. Black, chief of the Criminal Law Division of the Army Judge Advocate General, told a House Armed Services subcommittee that his office had reviewed more than 200 cases arising from war trophy violations.

He added that "we found no evidence that higher ranking soldiers were accorded more favorable treatment because of their seniority."

GAO backs funds request for S&Ls

WASHINGTON — Congress must provide more money for the savings and loan cleanup or risk depositor runs, the head of the General Accounting Office warned Thursday.

"We don't want to have a situation like we did in Rhode Island," said Charles A. Bowsher, comptroller general of the GAO, Congress' auditing agency.

"In this day and age you can have electronic runs on banks that are very swift," Bowsher told the House Banking subcommittee on financial institutions. "Unless there's confidence there, you can have severe problems."

Bosnia official warns of spreading war

WASHINGTON — Bosnia's vice president said Thursday the chance of breaking a warring Balkan war are fading rapidly.

"Time is not on our side, every minute the situation is growing worse," said Zlatko Lagumdžija, referring to shelling and air raids on Bosnia this week by Serb fighters.

Renewed war could come to Croatia, and the bloodshed and "ethnic cleansing" could spread to Kosovo, a predominantly Albanian enclave of Serbia, within three weeks after Serb-led forces gain their objectives in Bosnia, he said at a news conference.

Lagumdžija hinted that his government would continue to oppose the peace plan under negotiation at U.N. headquarters without precise and public enforcement provisions guaranteed by the United States.

Man pleads innocent in doctor's death

PENSACOLA, Fla. — A public defender entered a plea of innocent Thursday for the man accused of murdering an abortion doctor, while abortion rights supporters picketed outside the courthouse and opponents returned to the doctor's clinic.

Circuit Judge Kenneth Williams appointed Chief Assistant Public Defender Earl D. Loveless to represent Michael F. Griffin, 31, a Pensacola chemical plant worker. That appointment is temporary until another judge can hold a hearing on whether Griffin should be granted his request to defend himself, using a Bible as a law book.

Across town, about a dozen anti-abortion demonstrators protested today for the first time since the shooting outside the Pensacola Women's Medical Services clinic that killed Dr. David Gunn last week.

One protest leader, John Burt, said nothing justifies what was done to Gunn, "but nevertheless with no doctor no babies die."

Study links fruits, health of women

SANTA FE, N.M. — Women who eat plenty of fruits and vegetables cut their stroke risk by 54 percent, and men with vitamin-rich diets are 30 percent less likely to die of heart disease, researchers said Thursday.

The studies are the latest in a growing body of statistical evidence that has shown the benefits of the so-called antioxidant vitamins: vitamin C, vitamin E and beta-carotene, a relative of vitamin A.

The statistical evidence is now strong enough to begin costlier experiments in which men and women are given vitamin supplements in an attempt to reduce their heart disease and stroke risks, researchers said at the American Heart Association's annual epidemiology meeting.

Perot serves Clinton mixed bag in promo

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ross Perot had a dash of criticism and a dose of praise for President Clinton Thursday.

He complained that the administration had left many details of its economic program to a Congress controlled by special interests.

Perot praised Clinton's commitment to government ethics and health care reforms, even as he voiced skepticism that Clinton will be able to squeeze savings out of the health care system and at the same time provide coverage to all Americans.

His criticisms were that Clinton's plan would increase the country's

debt in the short-term — Perot said the national debt would still grow by \$1 trillion in Clinton's term — and that the president had yet to provide many details of his deficit-reduction plans.

The 1992 independent presidential candidate drew laughter from a National Press Club audience when he suggested Clinton's program was so lacking in vital details it was like

"taking an F-16 at night, with no instrument panel and flying supersonic through the mountains, in the fog."

Perot also was critical of the road and bridge building projects including in Clinton's economic stimulus program, saying they would add to the government's debt while creating "one-time, taxpayer-financed bubble jobs."

Yet he echoed Clinton's argument for child education, immunization and other new spending in the package. Perot said as Washington cuts unnecessary spending it also needed to "spend trillions more to get out country back on the track where

it used to be for our children."

Perot also used his Press Club speech to promote the electronic town hall meeting he is airing

Sunday night on NBC, casting it as a vehicle for ordinary Americans "to reassert their role as owners of our country." Perot also said he was publishing a new book in April, "Not for Sale at Any Price," discussing his proposals for government reform.

The book, he reminded his audience, will be for sale at a price. Most of Perot's speech covered familiar ground, criticizing deficit spending, the influence of lobbyists in Washington and the need for dramatic campaign finance reforms.

EPA: Radon poses threat in schools

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 70,000 classrooms in the United States and nearly one of five schools has unacceptably high levels of radioactive radon gas, the Environmental Protection Agency said Thursday.

The EPA said more than 10,000 classrooms have radon levels more than double the EPA standard.

Rep. Henry A. Waxman, D-Calif., chairman of the House Commerce Committee's panel on health and the environment, said in some areas, "it may be more dangerous to attend school than it would be to work in a nuclear power plant."

But Waxman also said that because of the nature of radon gas, "parents and teachers should not panic." "Radon causes lung cancer only after years of exposure," Waxman said, adding that there is no evidence children are suffering immediate, acute illnesses because of radon exposure at school.

He introduced legislation to require all schools to test for radon levels and to disclose any danger to parents and teachers.

"It is expensive, and cost-effective to identify and mitigate radon hazards," Waxman said.

That could be done by venting the gas that collects below the foundation slab to the outside air at an estimated cost of as little as \$10,000 per school.

Radon is a colorless, odorless, radioactive gas generated by decaying uranium in the soil. The EPA said it is the second leading cause of lung cancer in the United States, and is responsible for 7,000 to 30,000 cancer deaths a year.

It is relatively harmless when it seeps out of the soil into the outdoor atmosphere. But it can build up to dangerous levels in schools, homes and other buildings.

South Korean leaders seek to ease rising nuclear tensions

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korean leaders tried to assure their people Thursday there was no danger of a nuclear war as South Korea's nuclear program could lead to war.

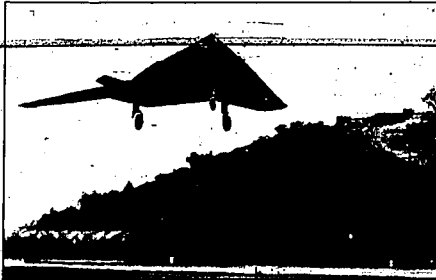
The North blamed rising tensions on the divided peninsula on U.S.-South Korean war games that ended on Thursday.

Tensions began growing last week, when the North made a surprise announcement that it is quitting the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, thus releasing it from the obligation to allow international inspections of its nuclear sites.

A South-Korean newspaper reported Thursday that Seoul would be willing to discontinue the maneuvers if the North would rejoin the treaty, but the South's foreign minister said he knew nothing about this.

The withdrawal reinforced suspicions that the hard-line Communist North is developing nuclear weapons, despite its denials.

South Korea, the United States and other Western nations denounced the decision. The International Atomic Energy Agency opened a special meeting in

Vienna, Austria, on Thursday to discuss ways of persuading North Korea to reconsider.

"The name of the game in North Korea has to be nuclear transparency, and that means continuing inspections," said David

Kyd, a spokesman for the U.N. agency.

"We hope that North Korea will recognize that has to be the case. Anything other than that is going to isolate them even more and create very serious fears in that part of the

world," he said. If North Korea continues to refuse nuclear inspections, possible actions were outlined by the U.N. Security Council.

North Korea maintains its nuclear program is peaceful and says two sites the agency has demanded to inspect are military installations it is not obligated to open to outsiders.

For its part, South Korea has said it is free of nuclear weapons, but the North maintains that U.S. troops stationed there keep nuclear arms in the country.

North Korea has declared a "semi-war" footing to protect the U.S.-South Korean war games, which it maintains could suddenly turn into a real invasion.

Prime Minister Hwang In-sung

said during a Cabinet meeting Thursday that the real threat came from the North's withdrawal from the nuclear non-proliferation treaty.

Rumors about an imminent war led some South Koreans to stock up on basic necessities, news reports said. But most South Koreans, used to living with tensions on the peninsula, remained calm.

The North invited South Korea in 1950. The fighting ended in 1953, but no treaty was signed and the countries technically remain at war.

The South's defense minister, Kwon Young-bae, told the Cabinet there had been no sign of extraordinary movements by North Korea's military, except for its high-alert footing.

The North urged South Koreans to

press for the withdrawal of all U.S. troops and nuclear weapons from their nation, saying that if U.S. "adventures" led to nuclear war the Korean peninsula would be the first place devastated.

The North's official Korean Central News Agency, monitored in Tokyo, said the "dark clouds of another war" loomed because of U.S. efforts to pressure North Korea into agreeing to abide by the nuclear treaty.

Foreign Minister Han Sung-joo said U.S. troops participating in the joint U.S.-South Korean war games would not extend their stay because of the nuclear dispute. The troops' prompt departure after the exercises is seen as an effort to defuse the tensions.

Indian police arrest pair in Calcutta bombings

CALCUTTA, India (AP) — As the death toll from a huge explosion in Calcutta rose to 86 on Thursday, police in Bombay arrested two men in bombings in that city.

Bombay Police Chief A.S. Samra said the two arrested men had links to the Persian Gulf, but did not elaborate. Police said the two drove bomb-laden vehicles to their targets.

Thirteen bombs planted in cars, motor scooters and briefcases exploded across Bombay on March 12, killing 317 people. Police believe terrorists planned the attacks but have not determined their identities or motive.

Investigators have found no link between the bombings in Bombay and Wednesday's explosion in Calcutta. Internal Security

Minister Rajesh Pilot told Parliament in New Delhi.

Federal investigators were trying to see if the Calcutta blast was caused by a bomb or by stored explosives that accidentally blew up.

"If it was a bomb, it must have been a big one, but we have reasons to believe that it was a big stockpile of explosives that got ignited somehow," said a senior federal investigator.

"We are coming to the conclusion that the place was a sort of a bomb-making factory," said the investigator, who spoke only on condition of anonymity.

At least 24 people died Thursday from injuries suffered in the Calcutta explosion, raising the death total to 86, Press Trust of India said.

Lawmakers turn back Polish reform

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Parliament rejected a privatization plan Thursday, dealing the old coalition government its worst defeat and leaving Poland without a framework for the mass privatization of large state enterprises.

Prime Minister Hanna Suchocka exchanged a shocked look with her Cabinet members when parliament rejected the measure 203-181 with nine deputies abstaining. Defections and absences by about 25 coalition deputies sunk the measure.

"This is a serious sign that there is a possibility of turning back from the path of reform," the prime minister told reporters.

The vote highlighted the weakness of Suchocka's seven-party coalition. The 9-month-old government does not have a majority in the 460-member parliament, or Sejm, and relies on support from independent deputies and the Solidarity union.

The defeat could call into question the future of the government itself. The pro-reform Liberals demanded an emergency meeting of coalition members to decide whether their shaky partnership should continue.

Cabinet director Jan Maria Rokita said the government could still try to get parliament to pass a revised bill.

Russia, Georgia anger grows

MOSCOW (AP) — Georgian troops attacked Russian facilities to try to draw Moscow into the war between Georgian forces and separatists in the republic, the Russian Defense Ministry said Thursday.

The ministry statement heightened tensions between Russia and Georgia over Abkhazia, a Black Sea coastal region whose Muslim minority has been battling for greater autonomy from Georgia since last summer.

The Defense Ministry said five civilians were killed and eight wounded in an attack Wednesday on a Russian military health center in the Abkhazian capital of Sukhumi, and another on a military laboratory in nearby Eshera.

"If illegal actions against Russian facilities continue, Russian troops will resolutely take all necessary steps including use of force to stop any provocations," the Defense Ministry said in a statement carried by the ITAR-Tass news agency.

GOP tax plan makes precious little sense

Tax policy in this country is commonly an instrument of political policy. We manipulate taxes to encourage home ownership, to discourage cigarette smoking, to ease life for farmers, and for a whole host of other goals.

But try to explain the social goals behind a policy that taxes the services of watch repairmen, barbers and diet workshops — but doesn't tax the services provided by lawyers.

Are we supposed to think that the Republican legislators who back this plan disapprove of haircuts, watch repair and diets? Or that they regard legal services as a more socially productive way to spend money?

Do they want us all to be unemphatic and fat — but with our legal affairs in order?

But the truth probably is worse. The truth probably is that the Republicans cobbled their plan together and released it this week, just so they could say the governor wasn't the only guy with a plan.

Taxing services is basically a good idea. All sales taxes tax consumption rather than production, and broadening the economic base on which sales taxes are collected is an excellent way to increase revenue.

But a service tax needs to be fair. Where's the fairness in taxing the sweat of tradesmen while exempting

professionals? And here's a brain teaser: If Farmer Jones has a good year and buys a new tractor, it's exempt from sales tax under the production exemption. But if he has a bad year and has the old tractor fixed, the GOP plan would tax the transaction.

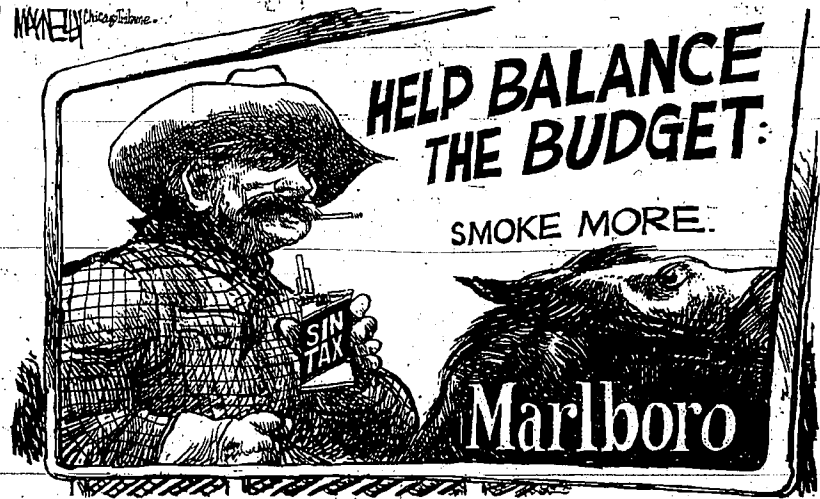
Why? The contradictions in the Republicans' service tax are just the beginning of what's wrong with their plan.

In the name of property tax relief, the Republicans propose to raise personal income taxes; this on top of an increase proposed by President Clinton.

Taken together, those two increases would mean top-bracket taxpayers would go from paying about 39 percent of their income in state and federal incomes taxes to paying more than 45 percent. Ouch.

We'll say it again: If Idaho lawmakers need extra money, the place to look is a broader-based sales tax. Raising income taxes is the wrong approach.

Forgive our skepticism, but the Republicans' 11th-hour proposal looks less like a tax plan than a political shield. It's supposed to deflect accusations that they ignored property-tax relief throughout the session. It probably won't work.

F&G editorial misses the mark

Your March 5 editorial deploring HB 199, which adds a Fish and Game Commissioner, completely misses the mark. You imply an agenda from local farmers and ranchers to further bash the Fish and Game Department and a dissatisfaction with Commissioner Norm Guth, who lives in Salmon.

Wrong on both counts! You also criticize a population imbalance from sparsely populated Custer and Lemhi counties.

Let's start by making it clear that Fish and Game commissioners are not selected to represent population — legislators are. Do you want most of the commissioners living in Boise?

The commissioners are the eyes and ears for a resource area so they can make intelligent decisions as they give guid-

ance to the professionals in the Fish and Game Department.

How can we use another set of eyes and ears? There are currently seven Fish and Game regions with a headquarters in each one, including one in Idaho Falls and one in Salmon. They are there because department personnel are needed to manage the resource there and not because of a people head count. Commissioner Guth lives in Salmon but covers both regions. He is the only commissioner with two regions. The Magic Valley commissioner was added recently and was supported by myself and other eastern Idaho legislators for the very same reason.

Mr. Guth is doing a fine job. I have heard no complaints except that his area is too big. It is 250 miles across and is the largest, geographically, in the state,

with about one-third of the state's hunting units and a corresponding amount of big game.

This is not an "us against them" issue. People are highly mobile. Magic Valley folks come to eastern Idaho to hunt and fish. Do they want good policy for hunting and fishing when they go there? A new commissioner would balance out and cover a huge, mostly uncovered area to set good policy for a good statewide Fish and Game management policy.

The move is not designed to hinder but to enhance; not to give anyone more clout but to fill a void.

Limit dogs to solve problems

This is an open letter to Rupert City Mayor W.F. Whitton and the city council members: I read the notice from the Rupert City Council which encourages citizens' participation to create a better community that was printed March 12 in the South Idaho Press. I have two solutions to solve dogs' problems.

• Irresponsible dog owners who dump unwanted dogs on streets and at farmers' houses and Myrtle Kelley's place (Rupert zoo lady) should be punished by fines of \$500.

In this way, the dog dumpers think twice before dumping dogs and there might be fewer dogs to pick up on streets and less payment to the Burley Animal Shelter and fewer chances for Myrtle to take in more dogs. Let's discipline the root cause of the problems.

• The practical way to enforce the barking noise ordinance is to limit to a maximum of two dogs per residential lot. I learned the city of Paul has this ordinance.

In November 1991, Myrtle pleaded innocent to 40 dogs barking. The violation of a noise ordinance (703) and requested a trial with full juries. The case was dropped dead without our testimony to show how noisy her dogs were at all hours in the magistrate court.

In Feb. 1993, Rupert City officials settled with Myrtle, allowing 10 dogs to be reduced through attrition to five dogs, besides eight other animals.

Five dogs cannot be quiet. Ten dogs drive us

crazy. Myrtle will continue to violate the noise ordinance every day, which affects a minimum 100 neighboring homes. And Rupert city has failed to enforce the ordinance.

Why waste the effort to pass the noise ordinance? What's the good in an ordinance without enforcement?

I shall fax and report this neglected enforcement to the Idaho State Bar Association in Boise and to Gov. Andrus on May 3. I request city officials to abate this situation by that deadline. My two suggestions are workable to solve the problems.

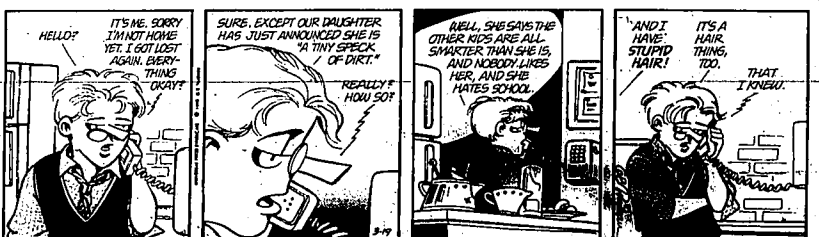

Boise businessman tests waters for try at governor's seat

BOISE (AP) — Larry Eastland, a Boise businessman and former state Republican Party finance director, introduced his "support committee" for the 1994 governor's race with a call for more efficient government.

The former Marine officer decorated Vietnam War veteran and aide to the late U.S. Sen. Len Jordan in the 1960s, called at a news conference Thursday for reining in government and turning to the private sector for solutions.

"We must get control of a tighter, better government," Eastland said. "There's only one way to do that, and that's to go department by department, agency by agency and begin to define the objectives, put in a total quality management system."

The Ada County native and

president of a Boise surgical products company said he supports privatizing or eliminating some state services and promoting competition and choice as the basis of public school reform.

Eastland's two-page list of supporters includes former Idaho attorney general Jim Jones, four state senators, eight state representatives and a number of local and regional GOP officials, including Republican National Committeewoman Cindy Moyle of Burley and Sheila Olsen, the widow of former state party Chairman Dennis Olsen of Idaho Falls.

Eastland, who plans a formal announcement in September, joins state Republican Party Chairman Phil Batt in making the initial step toward running for governor. Boise

businessman Chuck Winder also is a declared candidate, and several others are considering the race.

Batt said last week in releasing a three-page list of supporters exploring his candidacy — including every statewide elected Republican, two former governors, former Sen. James McClure and dozens of state legislators — that he was entering the race early in part to head off Eastland's candidacy.

On Thursday, Eastland welcomed the challenge. "Phil Batt is a friend of mine. I consider that he'd be a very good governor for the state of Idaho... I think it's going to be a good race. I'm delighted that Phil is in this race. I think that gives voters a good choice. I think it will make us both better candidates."

Eastland promised to provide a new generation of leadership, but he walked on several controversial issues Thursday.

On the proposed Idaho Citizens Alliance initiative to "prohibit homosexuals from being granted special rights through minority status," he said he would support special rights for any group, homosexuals or any others. "This initiative to me is not inflammatory. I wish it weren't there. I wish it weren't going to be on the ballot. I think we have the laws in place to handle it. But I don't think that this is an issue that's just going to go away... My opinion of it is that it will get on the ballot, my opinion of it is that it will pass."

As for how he will vote, Eastland said, "We'll see whether it gets on the

ballot or not first."

On the bill vetoed by Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus in 1990 that would have created the nation's most restrictive anti-abortion law, he said he also would have vetoed it, but for a different reason.

"With proper leadership from the governor we could have had that on the ballot where it belonged. I believe this issue is so personal and so divisive that only by putting it on referendum on the ballot are we going to resolve what the policy of the state of Idaho ought to be on that question."

"I'm pro-life, period. But that's just me," he said. "I think the majority of people have the right to make the decision on public policy in the state of Idaho."

On the prospect of another One-Percent Initiative on the 1994 ballot, he refused to say whether he would endorse the property tax limitation measure, a version of which was voters last November.

"One Percent's not the question. The question is the rising value of property and the inflation of property that causes people to have to pay more in property taxes for the same amount of property with no improvements," Eastland said. "I'm going to come out with some very specific kinds of things to help bring the tax structure back into something reasonable on behalf of property owners."

He said specifics of his plan would come later.

Avalanche closes Highway 21; crews plow paths for vehicles

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Highway 21 is expected to be closed until next Wednesday by an avalanche which came down early Thursday.

Scott Gurnsey, district maintenance engineer for the Idaho Transportation Department, said several avalanches occurred during the morning due to heavy overnight rain and warmer temperatures.

"The highway will have to be closed until temperatures drop and conditions improve," he said.

Two vehicles were stranded between the slide areas and transportation crews worked Thursday to clear a path for them.

There were no injuries and no vehicle damage.

Crews said hazardous conditions will keep the road closed between Grandjean Junction and Banner Creek Summit until temperatures drop, snow stabilizes and the highway can be cleared.

Ethanol industry drops try to restore tax break

BOISE (AP) — The ethanol industry has folded its campaign to restore a state fuel tax break for the alcohol-gasoline mixture in the face of unwavering opposition from Gov. Cecil Andrus.

At the request of Northwest Ethanol Fuel Association spokesman Mark Dunn, the Senate Transportation Committee on Thursday killed the House-passed bill that would have dropped the fuel tax on gasoline from 21 cents to 18 cents a gallon.

Although Dunn had told the committee earlier in the week that he hoped to work out a compromise acceptable to the Democratic chief executive, Andrus made it clear on Wednesday that no compromise was possible.

Pursuing the bill now, Dunn said, "would be an effort in futility. It's obvious this bill is not going to become law," leaving Idaho the only state in the region without a financial incentive for gasoline.

State slaps Panhandle care facility with ban on clients

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The state has banned Sandpoint's only residential care center from accepting clients until the facility proves it can better evaluate their medical condition.

State inspectors in January found nine elderly residents of the Oddfellows Plaza in need of more care than the facility is licensed to give, Jean Schoonover, chief of the state's Bureau of Facilities Standards, said Wednesday. "They were nursing home-level. They needed attention," Schoonover said. "They had been retained there and they should have been transferred out."

Don McMinimy, chairman of the Oddfellows Plaza board of directors,

said his board is concerned with the state's charges and was sending a letter including plans to remedy the situation. "I feel we'll get this squared away," McMinimy said. "It's just a matter of complying and we're practically there now."

Residential care is for people who need assistance with their daily lives but do not require around-the-clock care. A registered nurse is required to visit residents of a care center once a month to evaluate their conditions. Other than that, the centers are staffed by nurses' aides.

Schoonover said inspectors visited Oddfellows, which is licensed for 60 beds, after receiving several complaints about care.

Zion park dam fails, vehicles hit

CEDAR CITY, Utah (AP) — Zion National Park officials Thursday blamed the collapse of a small earthen dam up a narrow drainage for a wall of water that washed across Interstate 15 Wednesday night.

Park spokesman Denny Davies said the 30-foot impoundment on the Middle Fork of Taylor Creek, caused three years ago by an earth slide, gave way under pressure of heavy rain and runoff.

"It was inspected a week ago," Davies said. "But we found it had failed in the night. It looks like it just liquefied with all the rain and runoff and saturated soil."

It sent a wall of water, estimated at between 8 and 10 feet high, crashing down a narrow wash near the Kolob section of the park just south of Cedar City. Water and mud nearly two feet deep splashed across the freeway some three miles west of the embankment about 9:30 p.m., slamming into several vehicles and causing four minor injuries.

Earlier Wednesday, an Iowa trucker escaped injury when a snowslide pushed his 18-wheeler off U.S. 189 in Provo Canyon in northern Utah.

With water levels at between 500 and 600 percent of normal, saturated soil was wreaking havoc along parts of the Zion's trail and road system, Davies said.

Taylor Creek flood washed out a popular back-country trail in the park. He said officials have also closed the road leading to the Fingers of the Kolob overlook because of slumping.

"It's dropped nearly two feet in some places," he said.

Numerous cabins atop the Kolob Plateau were buried under more than 10 feet of snow. All that was visible of the Lava Point Ranger Station was its chimney, Davies said — and that was broken.

Davies said back country hiking has been restricted in the park, where flash floods in narrow canyons can be deadly. The Zion Narrows along the Virgin River is closed until further notice, he said.

The highway patrol said drivers of three vehicles lost control when mud washed over the highway.

2 North Idaho basketballers held in thefts

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Two North Idaho College basketball players, including standout Spelling Davis, have been arrested for allegedly stealing eight videocassette recorders from the Coeur d'Alene school.

Rene Rosa, 23, remained in the Kootenai County Jail in lieu of \$2,000 bail Thursday on charges of grand theft and burglary. Davis, 19, also was jailed in lieu of \$1,000 bail on a charge of grand theft by possession of stolen property.

An arrest warrant also was issued for a third North Idaho College student, according to court documents.

Davis, a freshman forward, confessed to one of the thefts, according to a police report.

Rosa, also a freshman, was a reserve guard who quit the team at midseason and then returned briefly. He quit the team again later in the season.

According to court documents, Rosa admitted taking a VCR from the library area. He told authorities he and another student took the VCR, which he kept in his dormitory room for some time, because they needed money.

Both Davis and Rosa are attending the junior college on basketball scholarships.

"It's very disheartening and very disappointing," North Idaho basketball coach Rolly Williams said of the arrests. He spoke by telephone from Hutchinson, Kan., where he was inducted into the National Junior College Athletic Association Basketball Hall of Fame on Monday.

On Wednesday, college President Bob Bennett said if the athletes are found guilty they face expulsion under the school's disciplinary code, "which doesn't tolerate theft."

Firm won't appeal

LEWISTON (AP) — Potlatch Corp. will not appeal the \$86,500 in fines levied against it by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

The area resulted from federal safety rule violations that resulted in the near-fatal electrocution of an electrician last October.

Potlatch company officials met in Boise with the OSHA area director.

ICL unveils wilderness plan

Marief Hemingway, others propose 6.5 million protected acres

TWIN FALLS - Just 90 miles north of Twin Falls lies the largest unroaded area in the country, outside of Alaska.

Wild lands are part of what makes Idaho unique and attractive, Ketchum resident Marief Hemingway said Thursday as the Idaho Conservation League unveiled wilderness proposal.

"From Idaho's existing 9.3 million roadless acres, we propose 6.5 million acres of scenic back country be designated as wilderness," Tom Pomeroy, president of the ICL board of directors, said.

The proposal includes 130,000 acres in the Smoky Mountains, 182,000 acres in the Pioneers, more than half a million acres in the Boulder-White Cloud mountains and 26,000 acres on Cache Peak south of Burley.

The proposal diverges from past ICL proposals on two significant points.

It adopts a policy of "no net loss of jobs" and no loss of county tax income as a result of any wilderness designation.

And it advocates no further road construction in any existing roadless area, which would all but eliminate most large-scale logging.

But less than one-fourth of the roadless areas are "suitable" for timber harvest according to Forest Service figures.

Increased timber production from private lands, better management of roaded areas and reduced raw log exports could make up the timber supply lost to any wilderness designation, ICL leaders said.

The policy of "no net job loss" means more than tourism jobs to replace lost logging jobs. It means jobs in forest rehabilitation to improve forest productivity, fish and wildlife habitat and damaged watersheds.

The proposal suggests tax incentives to attract small businesses, high technology industries and small manufacturing to rural communities.

It also suggests retraining, scholarships and other help for small communities that want to diversify. And it supports higher federal payments to counties in lieu of taxes.

"Tourism may be the fastest growing and the third largest segment of Idaho's economy, but it alone is not the state's economic salvation, ICL says.

The proposal suggests that more diverse rural economies include timber harvest, grazing and mining. But the long-term economic stability depends on a healthy environment.

"You can't continue to rape the land and expect it to come back," Hemingway said.

Riggins and McCall are examples of timber-dependent communities that have diversified to include tourism, hunting, fishing, skiing, boating, real estate and other business development, in addition to logging.

Critics accuse wilderness advocates of wanting to lock up roadless areas for an elite few.

But advocates say wilderness is a lot more than just a place to go backpacking or a way to protect scenery or to create outdoor zoos.

Wilderness areas protect wildlife habitat, biological diversity and ecological integrity. They offer places for "unretired" life—from industrialized human activity, off-limits to human exploitation, wilderness advocates say.

"We're not the enemy," ICL member Julie Caldwell said.

The ICL proposal is the Idaho portion of a larger, regional Northern Rockies Ecosystem Protection Plan, a multi-state effort by a coalition of conservation groups.

By protecting entire ecosystems the plan protects a number of endangered and threatened wildlife, such as the woodland caribou, grizzly bear, gray wolf and westslope cutthroat trout.

The ICL, however, accepts that not all areas need the restrictions of wilderness to protect wildlife. In areas adjacent to wilderness, selective logging, recreation, hunting and fishing could occur so long as they don't harm vulnerable species.

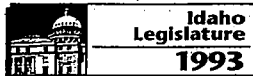
The group wants to submit its proposal to Idaho's congressional delegation for consideration and debate. It is hopeful that the Clinton administration will present a favorable climate to such proposals.

Vote shelve proposal for CSI library

BOISE - The College of Southern Idaho will have to wait another year to build its long-delayed new library and adult learning center.

On voice vote Thursday morning, the House Revenue and Taxation Committee drove the final nail into Gov. Cecil Andrus' ambitious tax-restructuring package, killing a bill that would have required quarterly estimated payments of state income taxes.



The vote simultaneously ensured that there would be no money for new state building projects this year, including the CSI library center.

The bill would have applied to individuals who now make quarterly payments of their federal income taxes. Corporations already must pay their state taxes on a quarterly basis.

Andrus had estimated that extending the requirement to individuals would have raised \$50 million in one-time money. As part of his package, the governor had proposed to put \$35.5 million of that money into the Permanent Building Fund, which pays for state construction projects like the CSI library center.

The remaining \$14.5 million would have gone into the state's "rainy day fund."

The \$5.25 million library center was one of 14 projects Andrus had recommended funding in fiscal 1994, which starts July 1.

But Rep. Celina Gould, R-Buhl, was one of several committee members who argued against the quarterly payments bill. She argued that, because the House-Senate budget committee would have to go back and specifically appropriate any money that was raised, it amounted to something of a blank check.

Audit issue compromise seems near

BOISE - The three-year battle between Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus and the Republican-led Legislature over performance audits may be close to a resolution.

After the House, on a 50-19 party-line vote, voted Thursday morning to override Andrus' veto of Rep. Bruce Newcomb's performance-audit bill, a special leadership committee introduced a compromise measure that gives Andrus much of what he wants.

The House Ways and Means Committee sent the bill directly to the floor, where it may be voted on as early as today.

It effectively splits the difference between Newcomb's and Andrus' plans. Newcomb's original bill would have created a legislative analyst's office to evaluate how well state agencies are doing their jobs. But Andrus wanted all such evaluations done by private companies.

The compromise creates a permanent legislative analyst's office to do preliminary performance evaluations and plan detailed audits, but also requires that those detailed audits be contracted out.

Newcomb's original bill allowed, but did not require, performance audits by outside contractors. Andrus cited that provision in his veto message, saying that "the change of one word in this bill could have ensured my signature."

Andrus also vetoed Newcomb's first performance-audit bill in 1991. Last year, Newcomb's second attempt died on a tie vote in a Senate committee.

Newcomb, R-Burley, said Thursday he would accept the compromise in order to get a performance-audit law on the books this year, although he insisted that outside audits will be more expensive and less reliable than in-house ones.

Backers say performance audits, also known as performance evaluations, are a key way to make sure state government gets as much value as possible out of taxpayer dollars.

Although the House, as expected, voted to override Andrus' veto Thursday morning, the Senate declined to even consider the matter.

"There'd be no point," said Senate Majority Leader Joyce McRoberts, R-Twin Falls.

Republicans hold more than a two-thirds majority in the House, but are one vote short of two-thirds in the Senate. A two-thirds vote is needed to override a gubernatorial veto, and Andrus has the backing of all 12 Senate Democrats.

Bruins fill regional debate teams heading to state championships

TWIN FALLS - A high school athlete might psych out his opponents by dunking a basketball during warm-up.

A comparable spectacle in high school debate is the Twin Falls High School debate team unloading crates containing the 20,000 pages of documents they use to overwhelm their opponents' arguments.

The documents were more than show for Twin Falls, though.

The students know more about worldwide pollution, this year's debate topic, than all but scientists and professors, debate coach Roy Nicholson said.

The team amassed a record stash of trophies for the school this year, winning something at each of the 13 meets the debate team attended.

Saturday, five of six Region III debate pairs that qualified to go to the state championship were from Twin Falls, the most Nicholson has ever seen qualify from any high school in Idaho, he said.

The team begins two days of state competitions at Borah High School in Boise today.

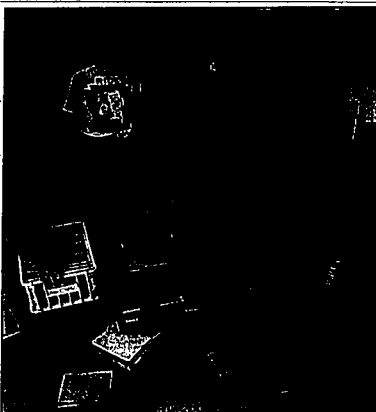
This year, students had to prepare arguments supporting or opposing the statement: "The United States government should reduce worldwide pollution through its trade and/or aid policies."

Team members started accumulating information about pollution soon after state competitions ended last year. All 10 students involved in the state championship attended summer-college debate camps from Vermont to California to learn from the country's elite debate professors and to make thousands of copies of the statement. The students also called universities across the country to collect information supporting their arguments.

Part of the team's success this year resulted from teamwork, Nicholson said. More than in years past, team members shared information with each other.

Tali Braga, who along with Jeremy Kassis form the team's best pair, said debate students learn valuable skills such as public speaking, doing research and working together.

"What many people don't understand about debate is how

competitive and fun it is, the students said Thursday. Mike Cooper, another top debater paired with team captain Mark McAllister, said he gave up playing football so he could devote more time to debate.

"There's just as much of a rush in this as there is in football," Cooper said. But, "there's more of a future in debate."

Readers like Saturdays at the library

TWIN FALLS — Extending the Saturday hours of the Twin Falls Public Library was the "hands-down" choice in a recent survey, said library Director Arlan Call.

The library now opens from noon to 5 p.m. on Saturdays. But residents who answered the survey in late January and early February wanted the library to open at 10 a.m., close at 6 p.m., an increase of three hours, Call said.

Opening on Sunday from noon to 5 p.m. was the second choice and extending Monday's hours until 9 p.m. ranked third, he said.

Adding an extra hour each day was the least popular choice.

Of 337 responses to the survey, 230, or 73 percent, said that the library's current hours are not adequate. That's something Call wants to increase to 34 positions.

"We intend to try to expand the hours to be incorporated into our budget request to the city," he said.

The city provides about 90 percent of the library's budget and funded the facility with more than \$483,000 this fiscal year, Call said. Donations, grants and book fines bring in the rest of the money.

The cost of extending library hours would depend on whether professional librarians or others

were employed for the extra time, he said.

Besides increasing the hours, the library also needs to increase its staff, according to Call. Based on national standards, the library could increase its staff by as much as 3 1/2 positions.

The library averaged 146 positions in 1992, but the national average for a library in a town the size of Twin Falls is 18, Call said. While the staff won't increase to 18 any time soon, that would be a target number.

And if the library's Saturday hours are extended, for a total of 57 hours a week, Call wants the library eventually to open for 60 hours a week, he said.

Industry donates 16 truckloads of spuds to needy

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho potato industry has donated 16 truckloads of potatoes — about 657,000 pounds — to the state's community food banks and soup kitchens.

Fresh, dehydrated and frozen

potatoes will be distributed to local food banks by Boise-based Idaho Foodbank Warehouse, the Idaho Potato Commission announced Wednesday.

But since not enough freezer

space is available for the frozen potato products donated, about 436,000 pounds will be donated to Second Harvest in Chicago for national distribution to community food banks.

Computer glitch garbles Bellevue story

BELLEVUE — A news story in Monday's edition concerning the upcoming Bellevue city election contained some errors.

A computer malfunction led to a mix-up in information from two candidates. The following is a corrected version of candidate Michael Hofferber's statements, as well as those from Wayne Douhal.

Before moving to Bellevue, Hofferber served on the Ketchum Rural Volunteer Fire Department.

As a free-lance journalist for *The Times-News* and other publications, Hofferber has spent more than 7,000 hours covering public meetings.

"Bellevue is the best place in the valley to live," said Hofferber. "It is here that the real Idaho small town still exists."

Hofferber said he wishes to help preserve the

quality of the community.

"I've adopted it as my home, and I want to be involved," he said.

Hofferber's goals include maintaining and upgrading the city library, volunteer fire department and city parks.

Douhal, 48, served as Bellevue's mayor for three years prior to the election of Dennis Wright.

"He served on the Planning and Zoning Commission for eight years as a volunteer for the Bellevue Volunteer Fire Department."

Douhal, a mechanic, has lived in Bellevue for 20 years with his wife and their children.

"I'm not a politician, but I do believe in the city," Douhal said.

He said he wants to keep spending within bounds and the city running efficiently.

"I'd be a better council member than mayor because I say what is on my mind," he said. "I'm not a politician's person."

Various groups in Blaine County ponder low-income health care

HAILEY — Low-income residents in Blaine County may one day be able to obtain affordable health care services.

A group of medical and social providers — including persons from about 20 organizations such as social service agencies, the local hospital and schools — are looking into funding sources for a clinic.

Patients would be charged a small fee for services, although no one would be turned away because of inability to pay.

The Interagency Resource Group said that an increased demand for medical care by people who cannot afford to pay has strained member health insurance, and created a crisis that "little would help alleviate."

The group initiated the idea after the Wood River Medical Center commissioned a study on indigency care by Patterson Associates, a Sun Valley consulting group.

The study completed in December indicated that 2,155 residents or 15.9 percent of Blaine County's population does not qualify for Medicare, Medicaid or private health insurance. More than half are children under 18.

The study proposes a model clinic which would provide care to persons who have no health insurance and

who live at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines.

A committee made up of members of the Interagency Resource Group is currently discussing the results of the study, determining community and physician interest and looking for funding.

Patterson Associates have recommended a combination of state, local, hospital, private, and national foundation funds to support the program.

According to the study, local physicians would participate on a voluntary basis in the clinic or in their own offices.

An advisory board of 12-13 community members would develop the program and make policy decisions. Eventually the clinic would hire a director.

According to Rodman and others, transient resort workers, low income parents with sick children and elderly people with chronic illnesses are typical of the people seeking help in hospital emergency rooms and public agencies.

"They can't afford care so they wait until it gets so bad it becomes an emergency," Rodman said.

"We lose about \$64,000 annually because people cannot pay their bills," said Connie Perry, associate administrator for Support Services at the medical center.

Perry says that the center accepts

patients regardless of their ability to pay.

"If we could take some of those dollars and put them into a clinic, it would reduce the bad debt, the amount of free service our doctors give, and fewer people would be using the emergency room which is incredibly expensive," Perry said.

Supreme Court revives part of school fund suit

— In a 4-1 ruling Thursday, the Idaho Supreme Court revived part of a lawsuit over funding for the state's public schools.

The Supreme Court upheld parts of a decision by 4th District Judge Gerald Schroeder dismissing a lawsuit filed by school districts and parents. But it ordered further proceedings on whether the school funding system provides enough money for a "thorough" state educational system.

The decision was written by Justice Stephen Bistline and based mainly on the high court's ruling in a 1975 lawsuit on much the same grounds. But the court held that the earlier ruling did not decide the thoroughness question, and ordered further hearings.

Bistline was joined by Chief Justice Charles McDevitt and justices Byron Johnson and Linda Coppel Trout.

Former Chief Justice Robert Bakes, who has retired from the court, helped decide the case and dissented from the "thorough" portion of the ruling.

Bakes said the 1975 decision mentioned "thorough" several times in holding that the state was meeting its constitutional requirement to provide a system of "basic, thorough and uniform" education.

Jerry Evans, state superintendent of public instruction, said he had a mixed reaction. But he was happy that schools will have a chance to make their case in court on whether state school funding is adequate.

"I'm not the only one who's got something in my district that's a current need," Gould said. "But there's no guarantee in this bill that CSI would get that money. You can bet that as soon as we passed this there'd be 70 people in this House who'd have their own plans for the money."

CSI Executive Vice President Mike Glenn said he was "disappointed" by the vote, but realized that it involved issues other than the library itself.

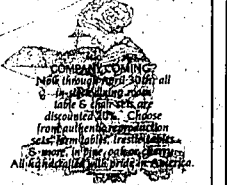
"The Legislature has always done as much for the college as it possibly could," Glenn said. "The bill was on the issue, and I'd still like to think it will be an issue for next year."

However, Glenn said the vote won't detail the planning process for the library, for which the 1992 Legislature earmarked \$300,000 last year. Architects will review the first detailed interior and exterior plans for the building with college administrators and staff next

Thursday, he said.

Across the rounds, the Senate approved a bill appropriating \$8.9 million in state aid to CSI and North Idaho College in Coeur d'Alene. The two community colleges will split the money evenly.

"That bill now goes to the House for action."

Bey of bills includes raise for district judges

BOISE - A three-bill package that raises state judges' pay and puts an additional district judge in Twin Falls sailed through the state Senate Thursday.

They were among dozens of bills considered by the state and Senate Thursday, as both chambers worked to clear a backlog of pending legislation.

One of the three judge bills would place an extra district judge in Twin Falls to take the place of Judge Daniel Hurlbut, who is now working full-time on the Snake River Basin Adjudication of water rights.

That position would be filled this July.

The extra-judge bill passed 33-0, as did a bill raising court fees to pay for the raises and the new judges. Only the measure raising judges' pay by 6 percent generated any Senate opposition.

Among those voting against it was Sen. John Penney, D-Carey, who argued that it wasn't fair for judges to get a substantial pay raise in a year when other state employees will receive little.

"If we're truly in a financial emergency, everyone ought to share the sacrifice," Penney said.

However, Senate President Pro Tem Jerry Twigg, R-Blackfoot, pointed out that judges have not received a salary increase since 1991 and don't plan to ask for another one next year.

All three bills already have passed the House, and now go to Gov. Cecil Andrus for his approval.

In other legislative action Thursday:

The Senate approved, 20-15, a bill requiring state agencies to evaluate whether proposed regulations and actions are so burdensome that they constitute "takings" of private property.

Opponents of the bill, which already has passed the House, argued that it would effectively stymie state regulation, especially in the areas of

public health and safety and environmental protection. Gov. Andrus has vetoed similar bills the past two years, and may expect him to veto this one too.

The House passed two bills originally sponsored by Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo. One would make it a misdemeanor for minors to inhale paint fumes, gasoline fumes, or other volatile substances in order to become intoxicated; the other would make it a misdemeanor to carry concealed firearms on school grounds.

Both bills passed on 67-0 votes. They have already passed the Senate and now go to Andrus for his signature.

Also headed to Andrus' desk is a bill making police officers and firefighters hired after July 1 eligible for disability retirement benefits from their first day on the job.

The measure, which the House approved unanimously, was inspired by the case of Idaho State Police Cpl. Steve Hobbs, Deer, who was shot by a motorist and left for dead two years ago. Although Hobbs was shot while on duty and is severely disabled, he could not collect disability retirement because he had only been with the ISP 5 1/2 years instead of the required 10.

The bill passed Thursday won't help Hobbs, but Rep. John Alexander, D-Pocatello, hinted during debate that legislation to do that may be introduced next year.

The House passed, 54-16, a bill intended to help the Twin Falls Reformed Church get a variance from a city requirement that it hook up to the city water line.

The measure, which now goes to the Senate, allows the state fire marshal to grant variances based on financial hardship. The church says it would be prohibitively expensive to connect to the nearest water line, which is nearly a mile away.

Utah residents don waders but not for fishing

OGDEN, Utah (AP) - Residents of the farming community of Elwood in Box Elder County say flooding is so bad they have begun wearing hip waders to carry their children to school buses.

A week's worth of rain has caused sporadic flooding from Salt Lake County north, but the biggest problem is in Elwood, just south of Tremonton.

"You have to wear hip waders out here to get anywhere," said resident John Kilburn. "I could take a boat with an outboard motor on it and run around right now."

Kilburn said at least five homes along one road in Elwood have been flooded since Tuesday afternoon and nobody except neighbors has come along to help. "My garage is a mess. It's wasted," he said. "We're just sitting here wet, real wet."

Kilburn said he called state emergency services, Box Elder County emergency services and Elwood City, but nobody has responded. The county sheriff's department said it has received no reports of flooding.

Readers like Saturdays at the library

TWIN FALLS — Extending the Saturday hours of the Twin Falls Public Library was the "hands-down" choice in a recent survey, said library Director Arlan Call.

The library now opens from noon to 5 p.m. on Saturdays. But residents who answered the survey in late January and early February wanted the library to open at 10 a.m. and close at 6 p.m., an increase of three hours, Call said.

Opening on Sunday from noon to 5 p.m. was the second choice and extending Monday's hours until 9 p.m. ranked third, he said.

Adding an extra hour each day was the least popular choice.

Of 337 responses to the survey, 230, or 73 percent, said that the library's current hours are not adequate. That's something Call wants to work on.

"We intend to try to expand the hours. It will be incorporated into our budget request to the city," he said.

The city provides about 90 percent of the library's budget and funded the facility with more than \$483,000 this fiscal year, Call said. Donations, grants and book fines bring in the rest of the money.

The cost of extending library hours would depend on whether professional librarians or others

were employed for the extra time, he said.

Besides increasing the hours, the library also needs to increase its staff, according to Call. Based on national standards, the library could increase its staff by as much as 3/4 positions, he said.

The library averaged 146 positions in 1992, but the national average for a library in a town the size of Twin Falls is 18, Call said. While the staff won't increase to 18 any time soon, that would be a target number.

And if the library's Saturday hours are extended, for a total of 57 hours a week, Call wants the library eventually to open for 60 hours a week, he said.

Computer glitch garbles Bellevue story

Douthitt, a mechanic, has lived in Bellevue for 20 years with his wife and their children.

"I'm not a politician, but I do believe in the city," Douthitt said.

He said he wants to keep spending within bounds and the city running efficiently.

"I'd be a better council member than may be because I say what is on my mind," he said. "I'm not a politician's person."

Various groups in Blaine County ponder low-income health care

HAILEY — Low-income residents in Blaine County may one day be able to obtain affordable health care services.

A group of medical and social professionals, including persons from about 20 organizations such as social service agencies, the local hospital and schools — are looking into funding sources for a clinic.

Patients would be charged a small fee for services, although no one would be turned away because of inability to pay.

The Intergency Resource Group said that an increased demand for medical care by people who cannot afford to pay has strained member agencies' budgets and created a crisis that a clinic would help alleviate.

The group initiated the idea after the Wood River Medical Center commissioned a study on indigency care by Partners Associates, a Sun Valley consulting group.

The study completed in December indicated that 2,155 residents or 15.9 percent of Blaine County's population does not qualify for Medicaid, the state's public health insurance. More than half are children under 18.

The study proposes a model clinic which would provide care to persons who have no health insurance and

who live at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines.

A committee made up of members of the Intergency Resource Group is currently discussing the results of the study, determining community and physician interest and looking for funding.

Partners Associates have recommended a combination of state, local, hospital, private, and national foundation funds to support the program.

According to the study, local physicians would participate on a voluntary basis in the clinic or in their own offices.

An advisory board of 12-13 community members would develop the program and make policy decisions. Eventually the clinic would hire a director.

According to Rodman and others, transient resort workers, low income parents with sick children and elderly people with chronic illnesses are typical of the people seeking help in hospital emergency rooms and public agencies.

"They can't afford care so they wait until it gets so bad it becomes an emergency," Rodman said.

"We lose about \$50,000 annually because people cannot pay their bills," said Connie Perry, associate administrator for Support Services at the medical center.

Perry says that the center accepts

patients regardless of their ability to pay.

"If we could take some of those dollars and put them into a clinic, it would reduce the bad debt, the amount of free service our doctors give, and fewer people would be using the emergency room which is incredibly expensive," Perry said.

Supreme Court revives part of school fund suit

BOISE (AP) — In a 4-1 ruling Thursday, the Idaho Supreme Court revived part of a lawsuit over funding for the state's public schools.

The Supreme Court upheld parts of a decision by 4th District Judge Gerald Schroeder dismissing a lawsuit filed by school districts and parents. But it ordered further proceedings on whether the school funding system provides enough money for a "thorough" state education system.

The decision was written by Justice Stephen Bistline and based mainly on the high court's ruling in a 1975 lawsuit on much the same grounds. But the court held that the earlier ruling did not decide the thoroughness question, and ordered further hearings.

Bistline was joined by Chief Justice Charles McDevitt and Justices Byron Johnson and Linda Coppe Trout.

Former Chief Justice Robert Bakes, who had retired from the court, helped decide the case and dissented from the "thorough" portion of the ruling.

Bakes said the 1975 decision mentioned "thorough" several times in holding that the state was meeting its constitutional requirement to provide a system of "basic, thorough and uniform" education.

Jerry Evans, state superintendent of public instruction, said he had a mixed reaction. But he was happy that schools will have a chance to make their case in court on whether state school funding is adequate.

"I'm not the only one who's got something in my district that's a current need," Gould said. "But there's no guarantee in this bill that CSI would get that money. You can bet that as soon as we passed this, there'd be 70 people in this House who'd have their own plans for the money."

CSI Executive Vice President Mike Glenn said he was "disappointed" by the vote, but realized that it involved issues other than the library itself.

"The Legislature has always done as much for the college as it can," he said. "The library was not the issue, and I'd still like to think it will be an issue for next year."

However, Glenn said the vote won't derail the planning process for the library, for which the 1992 Legislature earmarked \$300,000 last year. Architects will review the first detailed interior and exterior plans for the building with college administrators and staff next

Thursday, he said.

Across the rotunda, the Senate approved a bill appropriating \$8.9 million in state aid to CSI and North Idaho College in Coeur d'Alene. The two community colleges will split the money evenly.

That bill now goes to the House for action.

Minidoka schools discuss ways to make up snowtime

RUPERT — Minidoka County school officials recently chucked at a School Board meeting.

The board had received a letter signed by numerous East Minico Junior High School students, pleading that school days not be added onto the calendar because of "lost" snow days. The students pledged to work hard throughout the year.

Well the students needn't have worried. Although the district's schools were shut down eight days because of impassable roads, the district met the minimum state requirement for holding classes.

But, even so, schools within the district were asked to make up the days, according to Superintendent Mike Bishop. "We have a

philosophy that we have set up a curriculum or course of studies that each child should have," Bishop said. When eight days are missed, "it is pretty hard to get it done."

District schools came up with some pretty creative plans — without extending the calendar. Some have cut five or 15 minutes off lunch; others have cut the time allowed for students to pass from one class to the next.

Bishop said it would have sent the wrong message to "back off" and say the eight days that were missed were unimportant to a child's education.

Bishop added he was also glad for spring break this week.

Several county roads are covered with water, perhaps making it difficult for buses to navigate the roads.

"It would have been a mess," he said.

Bevy of bills includes raise for district judges

BOISE — A three-bill package that raises state judges' pay and puts an additional district judge in Twin Falls sailed through the state Senate Thursday.

They were among dozens of bills considered by the Senate Thursday, as both chambers worked to clear a backlog of pending legislation.

One of the three judge bills would place an extra district judge in Twin Falls to take the place of Judge Daniel Hurlbut, who is now working full-time on the Snake River Basin Adjudication of water rights.

That position would be filled this July.

The extra judge bill passed 33-0, as did a bill raising court fees to pay for the raises and the new judges. Only the measure raising judges' pay by 6 percent generated any Senate opposition.

Among those voting against it was Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey, who argued that it wasn't fair for judges to get a substantial pay raise in a year when other state employees will receive little.

"If we're truly in a financial emergency, everyone ought to share the sacrifice," Peavey said.

However, Senate President Pro Tem Jerry Twigg, R-Blackfoot, pointed out that judges have not received a salary increase since 1991 and don't plan to ask for another one next year.

All three bills already have passed the House, and now go to Gov. Cecil Andrus for his approval.

In other legislative action Thursday:

The Senate approved, 20-15, a bill requiring state agencies to evaluate whether proposed regulations and actions are so burdensome that they constitute "takings" of private property.

Opponents of the bill, which already has passed the House, argued that it would effectively stymie state regulation, especially in the areas of

public health and safety and environmental protection. Gov. Andrus has vetoed similar bills the past two years, and many expect him to veto this one too.

The House passed two bills originally sponsored by Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo. One would make it a misdemeanor for minors to inhale paint fumes, gasoline fumes, or other volatile substances in order to become intoxicated; the other would make it a misdemeanor to carry concealed firearms on school grounds.

Both bills passed on 67-0 votes. They have already passed the Senate and now go to Andrus for his signature.

Also headed to Andrus' desk is a bill making police officers and firefighters hired after July 1 eligible for disability retirement benefits from their first day on the job.

The measure, which the House approved unanimously, was inspired by the case of Idaho State Police Cpl. Steve Hobbs, Declo, who was shot by a motorist and left for dead two years ago. Although Hobbs was shot while on duty and is severely disabled, he could not collect disability retirement because he had only been with the ISP 5 1/2 years instead of the required 10.

The bill passed Thursday not to help Hobbs, but Rep. John Alexander, D-Pocatello, hinted during debate that legislation to do that may be introduced next year.

The House passed, 54-16, a bill intended to help the Twin Falls Reformed Church get a variance from a city requirement that it hook up to the city water line.

The measure, which now goes to the Senate, allows the state fire marshal to grant variances based on financial hardship. The church says it would be prohibitively expensive to connect to the nearest water line, which is nearly a mile away.

Kilburn said at least five homes along one road in Elwood have been flooded since Tuesday afternoon and nobody except neighbors has come along to help. "My garage is a mess. It's waist-deep in it. We're just sitting here wet, real wet."

Kilburn said he called state emergency services, Box Elder County emergency services and Elwood City, but nobody responded. The county sheriff's department said it has received no reports of flooding.

The sale at the Strip resort is expected to run 45 to 60 days. Light fixtures, carpeting — and everything in between — is up for sale.

Some people waited as long as two hours to get into the Dunes, which was closed Jan. 25 following its purchase by Mirage Resorts Inc.

Henry Ortega and Harry Kahala arrived at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday, only to make it to the entrance gate two hours later. There they learned only 50 people were being admitted at a time. "I'm just buying those two plants. I thought the prices would be more economical," Ortega said. "Everybody's really here to get a bargain. It all depends on what you're looking for, but I've heard the majority of people complaining."

Richard Lenz, owner of Huntridge Performing Arts Theatricals Inc., said the sale reminded him of the Landmark Hotel's liquidation sale, where he purchased lighting equipment from the showroom. "Everything's overpriced," he said.

Despite his disappointment, the native Las Vegas said he was glad he came to the old Strip resort, which opened in 1955.

"This hotel has a lot of history. I worked here about 15 years ago as a stagehand. It's kind of like coming to a funeral," Lenz said.

However, not everyone was displeased. Jane Kennedy, one of the first to arrive, thought the items she purchased for her custom-built home were definitely worth the two-hour wait.

"These deals are great. I love it. I bought a lot of stuff at Landmark when they closed and I found some great deals there too," Ms. Kennedy said.

Las Vegas restricts sports books

LAS VEGAS (AP) — The Las Vegas City Council has approved a regulation that would prevent sports books from operating in neighborhood bars and lounges.

The state Gaming Control Board previously voiced its opposition to such operations, saying the idea of books in neighborhood bars could spread statewide if the idea takes hold in Las Vegas.

The city council approved a

measure Wednesday that closed a loophole in the city's gaming regulations that allowed seven licenses to apply for a sports book license.

The revised law bans most sports betting outside of major hotels and casinos. It is retroactive to July, a move designed to scuttle the seven pending license applications.

An attorney representing the Becker Gaming Group suggested the

retroactive provision may be illegal.

Becker had sought a sports book license for Charlie's Lakeside Bar and Grill in The Lakes subdivision of Las Vegas.

Attorney Mark Lerner hinted the Becker group may challenge the city in court.

City attorney Brad Jerbic told the council several weeks ago he was confident the revised regulations would survive any legal challenge.

4 charged with grave robberies

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Four persons have been indicted in connection with the theft of prehistoric remains of American Indian children from two burial sites in Utah, federal prosecutors said Thursday.

A federal grand jury late Wednesday indicted a Vernal couple on charges they dug up the partially mummified remains of a Fremont Indian baby, still strapped to a cradle board and wrapped in a hide blanket.

A second indictment names a Santa Fe, N.M., college student in the theft and transportation of a skull of an ancient Indian baby from a cave in a southern Utah wilderness study area. The college's outdoor recreation director is charged with helping the student take the skull to Santa Fe.

U.S. Attorney David Jordan said the College of Santa Fe has agreed to pay a \$5,000 civil fine for the actions of its student and recreation director.

The indictments were announced at a news conference attended by Wil Numkena, executive director of the state's Division of Indian Affairs, who said burial sites are sacred to American Indians.

The four who were indicted are not accused of selling or trying to sell the Indian remains, Jordan said.

—Jordan said the remains would be reinterred when the case is completed, and it will be up to American Indians to decide where and how.

Archaeologists estimate the Fremont child was less than a year old when buried 1,250 years ago near Red Fleet Reservoir in eastern Utah's Uintah County. It was dug up June 6, 1992, the indictment alleges.

—Wilma Jeanne Brooks, 33, and Ricky Edward Brooks, 40, are charged with two counts of violating the federal Archaeological Resources Protection Act. Each count is punishable by a prison term of up to two years.

—Wilma Jeanne Brooks also goes by the name Jeanne Simper, Jordan said.

The second, unrelated indictment charges that a 24-year-old student from the College of Santa Fe in New Mexico dug up the skull of an Anasazi Indian child in a southern Utah cave while on a school field trip April 19, 1992.

No. 15 Santa Clara stuns No. 2 Arizona

SALT LAKE CITY — As Chris Mills goes, so go the Arizona Wildcats. And when Mills went to the bench with foul trouble against unheralded Santa Clara, the No. 5 Wildcats went right out of the NCAA tournament.
With Mills on the bench for four fouls, 15th-seeded Santa Clara overcame a 13-point second-half deficit Thursday night to shock the second-seeded Wildcats 64-61 in the NCAA West Regional.
It was the second straight first-round upset loss for Arizona (24-4), which was knocked out by 14th-seeded East Tennessee State last year.
"I don't feel jinxed," said Arizona coach Lute Olson, whose team shot a miserable 25 percent in the second half and 31 percent for the game. "At this point I'm just frustrated that we couldn't play more the way we're capable of playing."
Pete Eisenreich scored 19 points as the Broncos (19-11) became only the second 15th-seeded team to win a first-round game in NCAA

tournament history. Richmond beat second-seeded Syracuse 73-69 in 1991.
The win was even more improbable considering the Broncos, playing out of the little-noticed West Coast Conference, had lost earlier this year by 31 points to Stanford and 24 points to Minnesota.
"They didn't panic, but I did," Santa Clara coach Dick Davey said of his players.
Arizona struggled through most of the first half, but seemed to have the game in hand after wrapping a 25-0 run around halftime.
The Wildcats scored the last 14 points of the first half and first 11 points of the second half to take a 46-33 lead with 15:26 remaining.
But seconds later Mills, the team's leading scorer, picked up his fourth foul and could only watch helplessly from the bench as Santa Clara went on a streak of its own to get back in the game.

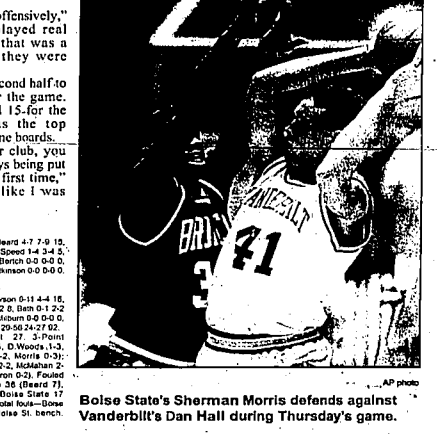
Strong 2nd half by Vanderbilt busts Broncos

'Tentative' beginning comes back to haunt BSU

SALT LAKE CITY — For the Boise State Broncos, a game against Vanduy wasn't very dandy.
A 57-point outburst by the Vanderbilt Commodores in the second half lifted the third-seeded team to a 92-72 victory over Boise State in the first round of the NCAA West Regional Thursday at the Huntsman Center.
The Broncos stayed close to the Commodores in the first half, trailing 35-27 at intermission.
Enter Vanderbilt star Bill McCaffrey.
The junior guard, who played for Duke's 1991 national championship team, popped in 10 buckets in the second half, four of them from beyond the 3-point line, and buried Boise State.
Leading by 10 points, Vanderbilt outscored Boise State 22-2 early in the second half to put the game away.
"In the second half, we played good defense, but also began to shoot the ball better and get better shots," said Vanderbilt Coach Eddie Fogler. "I

think our depth was a big factor here tonight, trying to rotate people to keep the heat up and the pressure on them as much as we could."
McCaffrey led all scorers with 26 points.
"I think that is a real fine basketball team we played. They're as good as we have played," said Boise State Coach Bobby Dye. "I'm trying to think back since I've been at Boise State and see if we have ever played a team that I thought was better than that group. Right off, I can't think of one."
The Broncos never led, but they did tie the Commodores 6-6 early in the contest.
Boise State was a little off target, going without a field goal for the first four minutes of the game.
Midway through the first half, Boise State had the ball, trailing by one, but couldn't convert. Vanderbilt, led by Bruce Elder, outscored the Broncos 10-2 pushing the advantage to nearly 10 points.
Boise's Tanoka Beard, the catalyst of the Boise squad was held to one field goal in the first half.
"We had a real difficult time

Rider defends academic effort, blasts UNLV

LAS VEGAS — Former UNLV basketball star J.R. Rider has denied that he received preferential academic treatment, accusing school officials of looking for a scapegoat when they suspended him from school.
"I've been hung out to dry publicly by a university administration that refuses to accept responsibility," Rider said in a statement read Thursday at a crowded news conference in an attorney's office.

"University administrators turned their backs on me to protect their own jobs."
Rider declined to identify the officials, as did attorney Steve Stein, who predicted the names would surface in the next few days.
According to reports published this past week, an instructor was pressured into giving Rider a grade so he could become eligible to play last fall. The Las Vegas Review-Journal also published copies of two compositions written for Rider in different handwriting, and three

papers on which his legal first name, Isaiyah, was spelled wrong.
University officials first discounted the matter, then suspended Rider on Tuesday, saying they had learned that a tutor had done the work for him.
Rider said Thursday he "verbalized" his thoughts to a tutor, who then wrote the paper for him.
Rider said the key question was not whether he produced the papers, but whether they came from his "thought process."
Rider also produced a stack of papers which he said he had written on his own for the summer school classes he needed to qualify for his final year at UNLV.
Rider was the nation's second-leading scorer, averaging 29.1 points per game. He was a second team All-American, and is expected to go high in the NBA draft in June.
The Rebels lost to USC 90-74 Wednesday night in the opening round of the National Invitation Tournament, with Rider sitting in the stands.
Stein said they were considering a lawsuit against the university.

Carolina (29-4) gave Dean Smith a record 30th NCAA tournament victory. George Lynch had 15 points and Brian Reese added 11 for the Tar Heels, who played the Pirates (13-17) for the first time in more than 40 years. Point guard Derrick Phelps, injured in the ACC semifinals, played 13 minutes.

1993 NCAA Seton Hall 81, Tennessee State 59

Big East champion Seton Hall (28-6), No. 2 seed, won its 12th straight overall and its fifth straight NCAA first-round game. Terry Dehere led the Pirates with 19 points. Arturas Karnishovas had 13 and Adrian Griffin a career-high 12. Tennessee State (19-10) made the tourney just one year after going

The fifth-seeded Redmen (19-10) used a 22-4 run in the second half to pull away. Twelfth-seeded Texas Tech (18-12), with no player taller than 6-foot-7, was outbounded 51-35.

Midwest Kansas 94, Ball State 72

Rex Walters made all six of his 3-point shots and scored 23 points and the second-seeded Jayhawks (26-6) shot 56.3 percent. Ball State (26-8) was seeking to match its tournament success of 1990 when it upset Oregon State and Louisville before a 2-point loss to eventual champion UNLV.

Arkansas 94, Holy Cross 64

The fourth-seeded Razorbacks (21-8) used runs of 11-0 and 10-0 in the game's first 12 1/2 minutes to lead 29-0. Holy Cross (23-7) cut the deficit to 10 early in the second half, but Arkansas then used a 15-2 burst to increase its lead to 22.

Duke 105, Southern Illinois 70

The two-time defending NCAA champions extended their run of first-round routs to six, setting a school record for most points in an NCAA game. The Blue Devils (24-7) hit 14 of 19 from 3-point range and shot 63.2 percent overall. The 14th-seeded Sillukis (23-10) were making their first NCAA appearance since 1977.

Just who is running Major League Baseball these days?

NEW YORK (AP) — In the balkanized world of major league baseball, the highest powers have the title of chairman, administrator and assistant to the chairman.

Their titles are unusual, and their jobs are undefined in an era of coalitions and committees. White Brewster, president Bud Selig is in charge from Milwaukee, the new director of Peter Widdington and Dick Wagner evolves in New York.

"I'm planning to be around two, three days a week," said Widdington, the Toronto Blue Jays chairman. "That doesn't mean days when I'm not here I'm not working on business related to the commissioner's office."

Widdington was given the title of administrator and the task of turning

the executive council's wishes into action by the commissioner's staff.

Wagner, the former general manager of the Cincinnati Reds and Houston Astros, is in charge of running the day to day operations.

Many in the commissioner's office expect him to be here for at least a year. There hasn't been much movement toward hiring a commissioner since Fay Vincent's forced resignation on Sept. 7, and many owners and officials think there won't be a new commissioner until after a new collective bargaining agreement is signed with the Major League Baseball Players Association.

"I'm not looking at it that way," Widdington said, although he acknowledges some owners don't want

to hire a commissioner until after the labor talks.

While Widdington is a snappy dresser and openly likable, Wagner is a quiet baseball man. He began his career in 1948 as general manager of Thomasville of the Georgia-Florida League and worked for the St. Louis Cardinals before taking charge of the Reds and Astros.

"I've seen baseball from every level," said Wagner, given the title of assistant to the chairman of the executive council.

For the last five years, he was a special assistant to American League president Bobby Brown and the commissioner.

He moved to Arizona this winter, planning to work from there. Those

plans changed last month when Selig asked him to come back to New York.

"The simple and fun thing would be to remain in Arizona," Wagner said. "I thought it was a compliment to be asked."

Owners have taken over authority for areas such as television negotiations and schedule-making. But Widdington foresees an end to the rule by committee.

Late-comer Cook milks Nestle for lead

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — John Cook, who hadn't planned to play this tournament, turned his late entry into a 69 and a share of the lead Thursday in the wind-blown first round of the \$1 million Nestle Invitational.

Cook was tied at 3-under-par with Mike Sorenson and Rick Bruns, the only others in the elite field able to slip through the teeth of the cold, blustery wind into the 60's on an Arnold Palmer's Bay Hill course.

Curtis Strange agreed, both about the wind direction and the difficulties

presented by the cold front that moved through this weather-battered state.

"It played about three or four shots harder than usual," Strange said after salvaging a 70 with a great save of par on the water-guarded 441-yard 18th.

It was that hole that Strange chose to illustrate how hard the 30 mph winds.

"I hit a real good drive and I had a 3-wood left and I've only got an area eight paces wide to get it between the bunker and the lake and I can't play the shot," Strange said. "In retrospect, the right shot would have been

to lay-up with a 2-iron."

Instead, he played the 3-wood to the left — far to the left, behind the grandstand, took a drop then pitched to tap-in distance for the par that kept him one shot behind the leaders.

Strange, on the comeback from a slump that has extended since his 1989 U.S. Open victory, was tied at 2-under with Dan Pohl, Jay Delsing, Brad Bryant, Vijay Singh of Fiji and Fulton Allem of South Africa.

The first hole, also 441 yards and also a par-4, was another that played dead into the wind. Cook hit a driver and a 1-iron into the front bunker; then got up and down for a par.

"Usually, it's a driver and a 6- or 7-iron," said Cook, who added this tournament to his schedule only after the flu forced him from the Los Angeles Open.

IAAF decides to challenge Reynolds' ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) — Track's international governing body, no longer content to merely ignore the decision, has challenged a U.S. court ruling that it owes runner Butch Reynolds \$27.3 million.

The International Amateur Athletic Federation filed a motion in U.S. District Court in Columbus, Ohio, late Wednesday, asserting the court did not have jurisdiction to hear the case.

The lucrative award came after two years of battling between Reynolds and the IAAF over Reynolds' positive drug test. Reynolds challenged the ban, saying his urine sample had been confused with another runner's.

Less than a week ago, Reynolds captured the gold medal at 400 meters at the World Indoor Track Championships in Toronto.

Reynolds' representatives believe the IAAF maneuver may have begun a process that will get the runner his money.

"We have invited them to participate in the legal proceedings since last fall," Brad Hunt, Reynolds' agent, said Thursday.

U.S. trade deficit widens

WASHINGTON — The U.S. merchandise trade deficit worsened in January, the government reported Thursday. Economists said the report reflected in part the flat economies of many of America's overseas trading partners.

Our trade deficit deteriorated in January because Europe and Japan are in the midst of a winter of severe economic discontent," said John M. Albertine, head of a Washington economic forecasting firm.

The deficit widened to \$7.30 billion as the year got under way, a 6 percent increase over the \$6.89 billion trade gap in December, the Commerce Department reported. The increase nearly wiped out a 1.5 percent improvement a month earlier.

Exports, which reached a record

\$39.67 billion in December, fell back 0.7 percent in January, to \$37.01 billion, with most of the level seen \$35.80 billion last August. Two-thirds of the decline was in aircraft and automobiles.

Imports also fell, due largely to a drop in U.S. purchases of foreign cars and other consumer items, and capital goods.

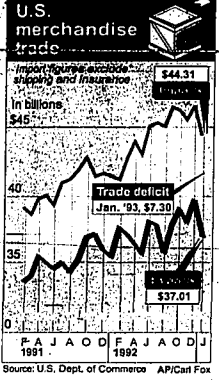
But the 4.8 percent decline, to \$44.31 billion, was overshadowed by the decrease in shipments of U.S. goods overseas: imports also had hit an all-time high in December, \$46.56 billion.

Analysts said the deficit, the difference between exports and imports, will worsen this year because the struggling economies in Japan and that of Europe are expected to remain weak, and thus curb purchases of U.S. goods.

Also, the slowly strengthening U.S. economy will provide Americans with more income to stimulate their demand for goods produced overseas, they said.

A report from the Mortgage Bankers Association Thursday suggested another source of growth in American purchasing power. It said mortgage refinancing activity reached a record level in the week ended March 12 as interest rates reached 20-year lows. "Last year, homeowners freed up about \$16-billion in lower-bid services due to refinances and adjustments made to their adjustable rate mortgages," said Warren Lasco, association executive vice president.

"We are projecting similar savings this year, and this increase in spending income should give a significant boost to our recovering economy," he added.



Dow up 38 on U.S. bond rally, German rate cut

NEW YORK — The Dow industrials rose 38 points to close at 3465, underpinned by a sharp advance in U.S. bonds, a long-awaited cut in Germany's discount rate and futures-related program buying.

The market opened to a favorable interest-rate environment — after the German Bundesbank cut its discount rate to 7.5 percent from 8.0 percent. Rate cuts followed in Switzerland, Austria, Belgium, the Netherlands and Denmark.

Although currency traders had fully discounted the move and the U.S. dollar actually fell against

the German mark Thursday, over the long run, the Bundesbank move is seen as bullish for both the dollar and U.S. bonds. Falling German rates lessen the attraction of mark-denominated fixed-income securities vis-à-vis U.S. bonds. The U.S. long-vad up 173/2 as stocks opened, and up 283/2 as they closed.

Bonds were further buoyed by a widening U.S. merchandise trade deficit for January, which rose to \$7.303 billion from a revised \$6.891 billion in December, and by a small 10,000 decline in initial state jobless claims combined with an increase in the four-week moving average of new claims.

Newest family nook offers high-tech toys for the young, vintage pinball for the young-at-heart

Ever since I was a young boy, I played the silver ball. ...

The song on the sound system is the same age as Doug Sugden, 25, pinball wizard.

From Soho down to Brighton, I must have played 'em all ...

"Oh, I still play vids, but pinball is really what I come to a place like this for," Sugden says, surveying the interior of Treasure Cove, Twin Falls' new family fun center. "Look at these machines: It used to be just a few bumpers and levers, but these things — they have everything."

Growups, a dozen of them, are clustered around a bank of pinball machines this rainy Sunday afternoon, oblivious to everything except digital readouts of scores that are mounting like the national debt on election eve.

"Our focus here is on families, not just on kids," says Shirley Huck, co-owner of the six-week-old, 22,000-square-foot facility in the Blue-Lakes Shopping Center. "That's the trend in this whole industry, to give families a place to go together. The kids play the coupon games or the video games and the adults play pinball."

In its first month, Treasure Cove did three times as much business as its owners had projected. It's expanded from eight employees to 18 and it's already on its second order of 2 million tickets.

Twelve-year-old Ken Harmon has 132 of them on his "VIP card," which the Treasure Cove gives out to players who want to save up for the good-stuff-like-the-mint-bright-

mountain bike and the Sega system in the glass case behind the counter.

"I come here quite a bit," Ken says, fingering another few dozen tickets that are about to go on his account. "Sometimes with my mom, sometimes with my brother. It's pretty cool."

T.J. Pruett, 15, and his friends, couldn't care less about tickets and trinkets. They're into serious video. "I like the new games, like Street-fighter II," he said. "I wish they had more of them."

"I think you're seeing the future of family entertainment," says Dean Newkirk, who manages 20,000-square-foot Po-Jo's on Boise's Fairview Avenue. "Businesses like ours and Treasure Cove aren't very common in this area, but it's growing. This is what kids want, and families want what they can do together."

Newkirk guesses that between 800 and 1,000 customers come through the door of his video emporium a busy Saturday, virtually all of them intent on spending money.

Beyond boundaries

Revolution that led Transylvanian to U.S.
leaves its mark upon her paintings

TWIN FALLS — You wouldn't know it from the quiet brick facade and the peaceful calico cat on the doorstep, but there is a revolution going on inside Kings-Lorincz's tidy home.

It's a revolution in color and form and subject, in acrylic and watercolor and charcoal pencil.

Lorincz is leading that revolution. Where it will eventually take her is anybody's guess.

A 15-year old Hungarian born and raised in the Romanian province of Transylvania, Lorincz is pushing the boundaries of her art.

The results are often shocking, and always interesting: A voluptuous female Apollo with strong slender arms, rendered in sharp black pencil strokes. A man with snake-like hands and feet clutching a bowl, the shadows of prison bars behind him. An abstract nude in a strange, surreal champagne glass. A horrific rendering of three

faces, misshapen in their terror and rage, just out of reach of a fish, dangling from a hook.

"This is hunger, definitely, and maybe overdoing something, gluttony, overeating," Lorincz said, explaining that her abstract painting means to her.

She pointed to a sphere next to the open mouth of one of the faces. "This is right by his mouth; This could be the earth that he's eating. He's eating up everything."

Lorincz has been painting for just six months, though she admits she's always loved to draw. But art supplies were nonexistent in Romania during the regime of communist dictator Nicolai Ceausescu and it wasn't until she and her mother, father and older sister emigrated to the U.S. three years ago that Lorincz could develop her own style.

Lorincz said she's inspired by the works of Salvador Dali, and this influence clearly shows in her work. Her paintings are abstract, yet simple in

Say goodbye to CD longbox

TO KILL, A BOX: Rarely has an idea made as little sense as the compact disc longbox.

Consider, next time you buy a compact disc and stub your fingers tearing at the multicolor cardstock packaging it came in, that the stuff generated 16,700 tons of trash last year. Then consider that such boxes have dominated record stores' racks, because retailers have harshly resisted any alternatives. New boxes have said, would involve expensive rack rebuilding.

But beginning April 1, when the Recording Industry Association of America's 1992 decision to retire the longbox takes effect, record stores will have to stop.

"It's then on to the jewel box — the plastic case that currently houses the disc itself — will be the container of choice. Some record stores, though, will wrap the jewel box in reusable plastic "keepers" that fit better in racks.

"It's going to be hard to see all these record album covers that have come out over the years," says Steve Sardoletto, store manager of Rocky Mountain Records and Tapes, a downtown Boulder, Colo., record store owned by the Mahlers' cousin, Wherehouse Entertainment. "But it's great, because we might be able to solve this with an environmentally-conscious solution."

Treasure Cove's average customer leaves about \$20 when he walks out the door. Julie Mahler, Huck's partner, estimated, and there can be up to 600 customers on a busy day.

"It would have been very hard for us to go out and build a building," Huck said. "As it was, it was very difficult to put together our loan application with the SBA."

Huck and the Mahlers decided early on that, unlike Po-Jo's, Treasure Cove wouldn't be primarily a

Despite her obvious penchant for color in the other areas of her life — her studio walls are bright pink, the living room in her house is lavender — she paints mostly in black and white: black backgrounds, stark white-and-black figures.

Her figures, too, are abstract. The female form Lorincz sees is exaggerated, sensual; arms interlocked so there is no separation, and legs end in points or spheres, rather than feet. The faces in her paintings are sometimes serene, sometimes twisted, with oversized mouths or hollow, black eyes.

"I like abstract, because realism can only be perceived one way," Lorincz said. "Everybody perceives it (abstract art) differently. They all have different experiences that tells them, different things."

"In science and mathematics, there is always an answer," she added, "and everybody can get that one answer and then there is nothing left. In art, you can always invent. If you look at a picture, you can always find something different."

CSI painting teacher Dan Looney, from whom Lorincz has taken painting classes for two semesters, said he thinks Lorincz's childhood in Romania also influences her frequently troubling work.

"I think she has been subconscious, affected by her upbringing in Romania," Looney said.

Lorincz agreed, admitting that both the oppressiveness of Ceausescu's Romania, and the revolution that overthrew him in 1989, influenced its influence much of her work.

So has the experience of coming to America, as evidenced by her painting titled "Breaking Out."

"My coming to America was so hard," Lorincz said in barely-concealed English. "I couldn't speak any English. It was like being reborn. I had to learn what people here have known all their lives."

Whatever the cause, Looney said

Oscar race indicates women haven't come a long way

LOS ANGELES (AP) — No joke. This year's theme for the Academy Awards is "Oscar Celebrates Women and the Movies."

Just don't bother opening the champagne. For every film like "Passion Fish" that gave the best roles to women, there seemed to be a lot more like the male-dominated "Glengarry Glen Ross" and "Unforgotten."

While acclaimed performances by Tom Cruise, Daniel-Day-Lewis and Jack Lemmon all crowded out of the best actor category, the Academy had to look hard to find five candidates for best actress.

The first one was easy: Emma Thompson, the odds-on favorite for her portrayal of the English woman torn by class conflict in "Howards End." Then, you have Susan Sarandon, a natural for her all-out performance as the mother of an ailing child in "Lorenzo's Oil," and Mary McDonnell as the paralyzed soap opera diva of "Passion Fish."

And then? There was talk of Michelle Pfeiffer for her role as Catwoman in "Batman" — Geena Davis, the tough-minded baseball catcher of "A League of Their Own" — or Alfre Woodard who co-starred in "Passion Fish" as Mary McDonnell's troubled but non-nonsense caretaker. Some even suggested Whoopi Goldberg, who had starred in the sleeper comedy hit "Sister Act."

Financially plagued Orion Pictures, sensing its opportunity, dusted off the long-delayed "Love Field," starring Pfeiffer as a Dallas housewife obsessed with President Kennedy. Their strategy paid off: Pfeiffer received a nomination.

Not to mention Catherine Deneuve, whose work includes

"The Last Metro" and "Repulsion," was cited for "Indochine." The film received mixed reviews, but Deneuve was in her element as a plantation owner in war-torn Indochina. Also, she had never been nominated before.

"It's still a man's world," declares Sarandon, and most film actresses would agree. There are many reasons offered for the male dominance of starrng roles.

Here is a rundown on the candidates for best actress of 1992. A winner will be announced at Oscar ceremonies on March 29.

CATHERINE DENEUVE has graced French films for more than 30 years and has been directed by Europe's most noted filmmakers, from Francois Truffaut to Luis Bunuel. "Indochine" brought her first Academy Award nomination.

In the \$20 million film, the most expensive in French history, the actress plays a plantation owner in French Indochina at the time of operations that led to the creation of Vietnam. She is the adoptive mother of a native girl who becomes a revolutionary.

"Indochine" was filmed largely in Vietnam, not the kind of location where you would expect to find the ethereally beautiful Deneuve. "It was very excited about going to Vietnam," she said. "I went there to work, which means I was able to go to the mountains and be with the people. I expect such a beautiful country."

MARY McDONNELL was nominated two years ago as supporting actress for her role as the white woman captured by Indians in "Dances With Wolves." In John Sayles' "Passion Fish" she portrays

a soap-opera star crippled by a street accident. She returns to her Louisiana roots and wallows in self pity until she meets a woman with a past, played by Alfre Woodard.

The actress gave ample credit for her nomination to Woodard and to writer-director Sayles — "I don't think there is any writer who hears as clearly the way human beings really are."

"It was like playing a good ball game," McDonnell said. "You knew whatever you threw she would catch it. She might do something unexpected, but you could deal with it."

MICHELLE PFEIFFER received her third Academy nomination for "Love Field." In 1988, she was chosen for support in "Dangerous Liaisons." The following year, she was nominated for lead actress in "The Fabulous Baker Boys."

"Love Field" barely made it to Oscar eligibility; it had been delayed for two years because of Orion's bankruptcy. Miss Pfeiffer plays a Texas woman so unstrung by President Kennedy's assassination she decides to drive to the Washington funeral. She has an interracial romance during her travels.

"I like the movie very much," the

actress said in a recent magazine interview. "I think that its message, if it has one, is one of hope and crossing boundaries — sex, of race, of class."

The film's problems began early. Denzel Washington considered "Love Field" but dropped out a week before production because he found the role too passive. Dennis Haysbert was cast. Filming was shortened because of Orion's growing troubles. A February 1992 release was postponed. Finally the film was released last year with hopes of an Academy nomination for Miss Pfeiffer.

SUSAN SARANDON is another three-time nominee, for "Atlantic City," "Helma and Louise" and now "Lorenzo's Oil." In the new movie, based on actual events, she and Nick Nolte are parents of a boy stricken by a mysterious ailment. They struggle against the medical establishment to get a medicine that saves the son from certain death.

Oddly, she played a role that was designed for Michelle Pfeiffer, who left the project to prove as Catwoman in "Batman Returns."

Miss Sarandon admitted she has had to struggle for roles, often be-

ing second choice: "Sometimes I get cast in things that they can't quite figure out who to get. The 'Bull Durham' people wouldn't read, wouldn't audition. Someone else was cast for 'White Palace.' When I got pregnant she switched to a part I was supposed to do, and I did that one. But I'm not going to look a gift horse in the mouth, that's for sure."

"It's taken a long time to get to roles that are really interesting. I spent a lot of my time being overlooked. I guess 'Bull Durham' was the turning point for me. I had to really grovel for that. I had to pay my trip to California; I had to audition all day long. I wasn't on anybody's list."

EMMA THOMPSON is a first-time nominee, chosen for her role as the free-thinking intellectual who

marries the wealthy Anthony Hopkins in "Howards End." The winner of a Golden Globe and most critics' awards, she appears the favorite for best actress.

A one-time comedy star on British television, Thompson became known to American audiences in a pair of films directed by her husband, Kenneth Branagh: "Henry VIII" and "Dead Again."

"After 'Howards End,' she appeared in another Branagh movie, 'Peter's Friends,' and in the spring will be seen again with her husband in an adaptation of Shakespeare's 'Much Ado About Nothing.'"

"It's such a shot in the arm," Thompson said of the nomination, "but I know, and Ken knows it comes so quickly. You're the flavor one minute, and you enjoy it, but it won't last."

Hollywood zooms in on Flintstones, Bedrock

HOLLYWOOD — Fred Flintstone's pal Barney Rubble is squatting on the ground trying to rub two sticks together when he suddenly looks around and puts the sticks down.

"It's finally happened. Betty," Barney laments. "I've become my father."

As Brian Levant recounts the line of dialogue, he lets out a laugh.

"Now, that's a different joke than a man just riding a dinosaur," he says.

Levant uses the joke to illustrate the levels of humor he will attempt to mine for children and adults when he directs "The Flintstones." The live-budget, live-action film from Steven Spielberg's Amblin Entertainment goes before the cameras in mid-May. Based on the Hanna-Barbera cartoon characters, the movie will star John Goodman as Fred, Betty Moran as Betty, and Dick Van Dyke as Barney. Dick Van Dyke also stars as Fred Flintstone's pal Barney Rubble.

For Levant, who last year directed the hit canine comedy "Beethoven" (worldwide grosses of \$142 million), it could be the best bet in making "The Flintstones" his finally best film children.

How else do you explain a 40-year-old who proudly displays a life-size collection of Flintstones memorabilia he has spent years assembling that includes a 1962 Fred Flintstone doll with green hair and a replica of Fred and Wilma's stone abode with a slab roof that when removed reveals the living quarters?

Holding up a stuffed toy Bronco, he remarks: "I found this in a junk store in Arizona."

How else do you explain a 40-year-old who gets excited merely recounting how a few weeks ago he jumped into the driver's seat of a "Flintstone Filver," a life-size vehicle with big rollers at both ends that will serve as Fred and Wilma's mode of transportation in the film?

"This was like the most fun you can have!"

So it doesn't turn on a dime. So you have to start it up with your feet.

"It's just wild!"

And that's just one of the crazy gadgets being created by the film's production wizards.

There is also the "LeSabretroo 5000" car (petrified wood chassis, stone fin, giant rubber band for an engine) and a host of animatronic creatures, including the Bronco, a saber-toothed tiger house-

cat, Dicktrud office equipment and, of course, Dino, who will tour "Dino's" in a return on all tours with leg extensions.

Levant said everything about "The Flintstones" will be big.

Even Fred's clothes.

"They're a little deeper because the garment is carved out of stone."

Even Fred.

"We want (Goodman) to be big and loud and gruff and wear his emotions on his outside. To me, you can't imitate Fred Flintstone. Then you're doing a sketch. We need to bring Fred Flintstone to life and feel the full range of emotions with him so at the end of the movie you haven't had a sneak — like a sketch on 'Saturday Night Live.' You've had a full meal."

Levant sounds like a child romping through a giant toy store, which he is. Growing up in the Chicago suburbs, Levant said he knew he wanted to write for television from the days he watched "The Dick Van Dyke Show."

"You watched people sitting around a room throwing darts and making jokes all day," he said. "I said, 'Now that's a way to make a living.'"

Levant is so immersed in the television culture of his youth that, like

many baby boomers, he instantly recalls the then songs to popular TV shows.

During an interview, for example, he proved he could hum the theme to "The Rifleman" and sang the lyrics to "Cheyenne."

For nearly two decades, Levant worked in the world of television, where small budgets and short film ing periods were the rule. He wrote or directed more than 400 episodes of various sitcoms. His credits include "Happy Days," "Mork & Mindy," "The Bad News Bears" and "The Nanny." Levant is to name a few.

Then came the chance to make "Problem Child 2," a movie that cost about \$12 million to \$13 million and went on to make \$33 million at the box office.

After that, Levant was hired by producer Ivan Reitman to direct "Beethoven," and the huge success of that film has propelled Levant firmly into the world of feature films. "The Flintstones" is the first in a four-picture deal recently signed with Universal. It is anticipated that the next film in the overall deal will be "Blowhard," a parody of the "Die Hard" movies, which Spielberg's Imagine Entertainment has expressed an interest in. He also hopes to do a Bugs Bunny movie at Warner Bros.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"To solve a problem it is necessary to think. It is necessary to think even to decide what facts to collect."
— Robert Maynard Hutchins.

Those who approach today's game in a routine way are destined to go down. To succeed, declarer must identify his main goal, which should not include the matter of overtricks.

West cashes his diamond king and switches to spades after East drops his diamond nine. Dummy's spade wins and declarer starts the trumps. How should he play the suit?

If he takes a finesse, he has his eyes on the trump suit instead of on the primary goal. West wins and leads a second spade, and the game can no longer be made. The trump ace is cashed and the clubs are started, but West ruffs the third club to lead a spade, down one on a heart that should have been made.

Since the primary goal is to win 10 tricks, South can afford to lose two trump tricks and a diamond. He cannot afford to lose a spade as well.

Instead of taking any trump finesse, South must win the first trump with his ace to start the clubs. West ruffs the third round to lead a second spade, but it doesn't work. Dummy wins. South discards his last spade on a high club, and the defenders are held to only three tricks.

Had East held a trump honor or had the trumps been 2-2, an over-trick would have been sacrificed. However, this is a small price to pay for the additional chances to score the vulnerable game.

ANSWER: Pass. Do not insist on hearts. North's bidding strongly suggests a four-card heart suit.



Garner plays business CEO in 'Barbarians at the Gate'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — James Garner says there are no heroes in the HBO movie "Barbarians at the Gate," a tragicomic retelling of the \$25 billion buyout of RJR Nabisco.

Garner plays Nabisco Chief Executive Officer F. Ross Johnson, who set off the financial hurricane of the nation's largest corporate takeover in the waning days of the Reagan administration in 1988. The takeover became a monumental symbol of the greed and fiscal misadventures that marked that period in American big business.

In the leveraged buyouts of the 1980s, the buyers of an organization borrowed heavily to complete deals. To repay the debt, they typically sold divisions of the companies and aggressively cut costs, eliminating jobs.

"I had to play Johnson absolutely straight," Garner said. "I had to play him as if I believed he was absolutely right. But look at these leveraged buyouts — some companies go under. RJR Nabisco was fore the buyout, then it damn near went broke. These people have no conscience about taking companies and stripping them."

"Barbarians at the Gate," which premieres Saturday on HBO, also stars Jonathan Pryce, Peter Riegert, Joanna Cassidy, Jeffrey DeMunn,

Leilani Ferrer, Fred Dalton Thompson and Rita Wilson.

Larry Gelbart, best known for writing such comedies as "Tootsie" and "Oh God" for television, wrote the screenplay.

"The RJR board accepted a lesser bid than Johnson's because he hadn't included some people in the deal," Garner said. "They took it because they were mad at Johnson. ... He thought he was doing what was right for himself and the company. He said he was concerned about the effect on the employees."

"Johnson belonged to 51 golf clubs. Can you imagine the dues? The company paid for it. They had about 20 aircraft. They threw money around. Some of it was well-placed, so you can't knock it all. If it is interesting when I go back to New York for the premiere and see if any of these people show up."

Garner said he had met Johnson several years ago while playing in the Dinah Shore golf tournament.

"He's a nice guy, but there are no heroes in this film. I'll tell you that," he said. "I never gave much thought that it was playing his life. What I believe is a character, not a real person. I go by what's in the script."

Garner said his involvement began when he got a call from producer Ray Stark.

"I'd said no to a few other things he'd wanted me to do," Garner said. "It was always because of a conflict in my schedule. He said, 'This is one

you'll do.' He sent me the script, and Larry did a beautiful job. I called Ray the next day and accepted."

The filming of "Barbarians at the Gate" in Los Angeles was not without its own troubles. First, an earthquake on April 22, 1992, caused a delay. On April 29, the Los Angeles riots erupted, causing more delays.

Another recent Garner project is Paramount's "Fire in the Sky," released earlier this month. Garner plays an Arizona state police investigator who looks into a reported kidnapping by space aliens. The movie, based on a true story, also stars D.B. Sweeney, Robert Patrick, Craig Sheffer and Peter Berg.

Travis Walton "disappeared" on Nov. 5, 1975, while with a group of loggers on a mountain range in northeast Arizona. He didn't reappear until five days later, during which time his co-workers were suspected of murder.

"We don't say what happened, because we can't," Garner said. "One guy got separated from the others and got zapped. Everybody tells the same story, but my character doesn't believe a word of it. They passed the detector tests, but I want to nail them for murder. Then, when Walton shows up, he tells the same story as the others."

"I met Walton. He's a very intelligent man, but I didn't talk to him about it because I'm sure he's talked about it enough. In the movie, we don't say it's true, and we don't say it's not true."

Lifetime movie explores adoption scandal

Sex symbol image amazes Sarandon

HOLLYWOOD — To childless couples, Georgia Tann was a salvation. From 1924 to 1950, Tann headed the Tennessee Children's Home Society, a highly respected adoption agency. During those years, permanent homes were found for more than 5,000 babies. Jean Crawford, Mary Pickford and Dick Powell and June Allyson were just a few of the famous people who received their children from the home. But Tann guarded a deep, dark secret: a vast majority of these children were actually stolen from their natural parents.

"Lifetime's new movie, 'Stolen Babies,' dramatizes this shocking truth. Lea Thompson stars in the drama as a county welfare agent who works closely with the society, only to discover the illegality in adoption procedures; Mary Tyler Moore plays Tann.

Executive producer Kim Moses' interest in Tann was sparked when she read an article about her in a newspaper. But when she contacted the welfare department, the mayor's office and public relations office of Tennessee, everyone disavowed knowledge of Tann. "I felt that was curious, since it covered such a long period of time," Moses

says. "I think it is really a mirage on the state of Tennessee. It is something they are not happy about, so they really don't want to make it a part of that history."

So Moses and her partners, Ian Sander and J. Moses, began doing independent research. They found a social worker in Tennessee who had taken over the home after Tann died of cancer in 1950, and was responsible for writing the current laws to protect adopted children. "She was the first one to be suspicious of Georgia Tann because she was putting together statistics (on adoptions)," Moses says. "There was a high percentage of children in the adoption system from Tennessee from (a certain) county who had mental problems. There were repetitive adoptions. People would bring them back because of their behavior."

Though there also were a number of Tennessee families whose children, there were large numbers of out-of-state adoptions. In Tennessee, adoptions were free, but Tann was able to charge any amount for out-of-state adoptions.

"We would like they are adopting so many children from out of state when in Tennessee they were still waiting for children?" Sander says.

The stolen children came mainly from poor, uneducated families.

"Many of the homes they were adopted to were financially very well off," Moses says, "even though they were not from good backgrounds. There was this story where there was a little girl who was adopted out to a wealthy family, and she ate garbage because they didn't feed her. But then there were other children who did get to college."

Tann's rule endured, Sander says, "because of the Tennessee political machine. She worked with Judge Camille Kelly to 'legally' get the children away from their natural parents."

"When there was a judge who went up against them, he found himself absolutely exiled on the bench," Sander says. "There was a flu epidemic and 40 children died because (Tann) wouldn't give them penicillin because she thought it was too expensive. When a doctor tried to uncover that, he found himself out of a job."

No one was ever prosecuted for the illegal adoptions. "Tann destroyed many of the adoption records so they died before she was brought to trial," Kelly resigned her post.

Moore was drawn to the project because she felt that Tann was a fascinating character. "I wanted to play that character because I am sure she was a product of her time," says

Moore, who is almost unrecognizable as the maturely Tann. "If you have a choice between raising a child in a wealthy home with little love, or a poor home with a lot of love, there is no question the children would do better in the wealthy home. That was the conventional wisdom."

Thompson, who plays the idealistic social worker, says "Stolen Babies" is all about class. "It was really about the poor versus the rich," Thompson says. "There was a heavy class system in the South — the poor white trash and the rich people. I totally see both sides of the coin, because I have really rich friends and they can't have babies and when a woman wants a baby, man, it is like an intense physical desire."

"Stolen Babies," Moore says, is an important piece not just because it shows how Tann persuaded herself that she was in the right but because it reveals "how people can convince themselves that they are right in all areas of life, when they are really doing terrible things. I am almost saying, don't be so sure of yourself, no matter what you are doing. Look very, carefully at your motives and the outcome and be aware of other people's opinions before you take action."

"Stolen Babies" premieres Thursday at 7 p.m. MST on Lifetime.

The first two editions of "Day One" suggest that ABC can't see the Forrest for the sleaze. So far, it reminds me more of "Inside Edition" and "A Current Affair" than it does of the "60 Minutes" school of Journalism.

Sawyer's show opened this way: "Tonight, a Day One investigation ... women in the custody of the state ... at the mercy of those who held them ... it started with sex and may have ended with murder."

To begin with, ABC was skating

on thin ice in calling this "a Day One investigation," implying it was breaking the story. Instead, this appeared to be a repackaging of newspaper coverage of alleged sexual abuse by male staffers at a women's prison in Georgia.

No scoop, just poop. The segment was far too long and lingered unseemingly on the minutest aspects of the story. Correspondent Sheila MacVicar to a female inmate: "Why do you think they wanted to have sex with you?"

Sheila! Report immediately to Sex Ed 101!

Sawyer had a report on the dark side of Japanese corporate life — productive robots by day, drunken party animals by night — that lacked focus: I could never figure out what Elvis worship and plastic surgery to look American had to do with Japanese workers getting loaded.

And let's talk about the name, "Day One." All I can think of when I see it is Rose Petal in the campaign. "We'll be under the hood workin' on the engine from day one," etc.

Now here's the deal: I'll be surprised if "Day One" makes it past year one.

He also remarked about spoofs about his gentle manner. Most are good-natured, but then "there's some that are more whimsical than others."

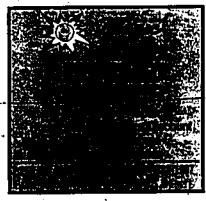

76ers show signs of recovery from listlessness, ineptitude

RICHFIELD, Ohio — Ron Anderson knows how it feels to be at the bottom of the Grand Canyon, looking up.

"A couple of weeks ago," the 76ers reserve forward said, "we might have laid down and died. We didn't lay down and die tonight. We got beat, but we didn't quit."

A couple of weeks ago — March 6, to be exact — the Sixers rolled over and expired peacefully in a 149-93 blowout at Seattle that brought the curtain down on the Doug Moe coaching experiment. It was their second 56-point loss of the season.

The potential for another such catastrophe certainly existed Tuesday night as the Cleveland Cavaliers went on a 27-1 run to seize a seemingly insurmountable 86-57 lead with 3 minutes and 54 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

"It was going that way," Fred Carter, who replaced Moe March 7, said when asked if the game had begun to resemble the 56-point shellacking the Sixers had suffered in Sacramento and Seattle. "And it

wasn't so much what Cleveland was doing. We were just inept at that point."

Inept, perhaps, but not resigned to their fate. The Sixers scored the last four points of the third quarter, the launching pad for a 27-5 run of their own that got them within 98-91, much to the consternation of the Cavaliers and 18,697 spectators in the Richfield Coliseum.

The Sixers made it a six-point game on a free throw by Armon Gilliam with 3:11 left before the shaken Cavaliers righted themselves and pulled away for a 110-98 victory.

"We missed three free throws during our run, too," Carter noted. "If we had made another couple of plays, we really could have put a scare into them."

The fight the resurgent Sixers gave Cleveland forward Gerald Wilkins was quite sufficient, thank you.

"We were on such a roll, I think some of the guys on the bench lost focus when they went into the game," Wilkins said. "Maybe they thought it was all over, that the Sixers were finished. But they didn't write they kept coming back, coming back."

Storm Tower likely to become horse to beat in Kentucky Derby

BALTIMORE — Jean Wilson is afraid to fly. But even fear can't keep her away from Gulfstream Park on Saturday.

Her husband, Rick, is 39, has ridden in more than 16,000 races, and his job, she says, has gotten to be old hat. But this weekend is different. The career of the veteran jockey could take on a new dimension. He will ride Storm Tower, an undefeated colt, in the Florida Derby. It is the first Grade I stakes of the season for 3-year-olds, and the horse — Wilson has been commuting to Florida from Laurel Race Course to ride him this winter — is the favorite.

A victory would mean that a Maryland-based jockey might be riding the horse to beat in six weeks in the Kentucky Derby.

"It's something we try not to talk about," Jean Wilson said. "We're afraid we'll jinx it."

Storm Tower trainer Ben Perkins Jr. said an ABC sportscaster, taping a pre-race interview for the Florida Derby, asked: "Why aren't you using a name rider — like (Chris) McCarron or (Eddie) Delhoussaye or (Kent) Desormeaux — on the horse?"

"I told him that it is no temptation at all," Perkins said. "We have as much confidence in Rick as anyone. The local guys don't get all the publicity as the big-name jockeys. But our feeling is that the choice of a rider is not a major, major decision anyway. The top jockeys are pretty interchangeable. And I guess you could say that about the trainers, too."

MIAMI — Hidden Trick has barely started down the road to the Kentucky Derby, yet he's already measured up to expectations.

That comes as no surprise to his trainer, Jacqueline Brittain. Two years ago before Hidden Trick made his body measurements were compared with computer models that predicted how he would turn out as a racehorse.

Hidden Trick scored well above average, and he proved that as winner of the Hutcheson Stakes early last month at Gulfstream Park. Now the Florida Derby on Saturday will show how he compares to other Kentucky Derby prospects who have beaten one another all winter.

The Florida Derby, at 1-1/8 miles, is the first major test of Kentucky Derby candidates — and the largest distance any of these 3-year-olds has raced. Brittain regrets missing the opportunity to race at a middle distance after the Hutcheson at seven furlongs. Hidden Trick lost training time after that race when he suffered a virus, and consequently missed a race.

This could put him at a disadvantage against more experienced colts such as Storm Tower and due d'Silgouff, winners of split divisions of the Fountain of Youth Stakes at 1-1/16 miles two weeks ago. Yet Brittain also realizes now is not the time for Kentucky Derby colts to peak.

"I'll be happy if he just gives a good account of himself," said the 39-year-old trainer. If Hidden Trick runs well on Saturday, he might be sent to Keeneland for the Blue Grass Stakes on April 10, where he would meet Copy, best of California horses after winning the San Felipe Stakes.

Hidden Trick, who is from the first crop of Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe winner Tremplino, is a small but muscular horse whose short stature might leave some wondering about his prowess.

His measurements taken as a yearling, however, indicate a versatile colt who will adapt to any distance. His powerful move from post-to-post in the Hutcheson bore

"Rick is a real professional. He's real solid. In addition to that, he is the first cbbice of Charlie Hesse," Perkins said. Hesse, a New Jersey race contractor, owns the horse in partnership with Anthony Tometta. Wilson came to Maryland to ride full time about two years ago.

Before that, he dominated the New York-Philadelphia Park circuit the way Edgard Prado or, before that, Desormeaux reigned in Maryland.

But he disliked riding at night at The Meadowlands and incurred a number of medical setbacks there — from a bleeding ulcer to a dislocated shoulder to a broken back.

"I had some kind of jinx with that place," Wilson said.

Wilson and his agent, Al Dellape, are choosy about whom they ride for in Maryland, and the results are a high winning percentage. Wilson also has had no serious injuries.

The same time Wilson moved here, so did the father-son team of Ben Perkins Jr. and Sr.

"When we first came, we had a rider named Chris De Carlo," the younger Perkins said. "But eventually we ended up with Rick. When we were in New Jersey, we never used just one jockey. We spread things out pretty good. Rick took the first call then for Dennis Heimer. But now we're real comfortable riding just Rick. He's an excellent rider of young horses, and that's mostly what we have."

Wilson, too, seems content with the arrangement. His goal is to win the Kentucky Derby or a Breeders' Cup race.

Trainer hopes Hidden Trick fulfills promise at Florida Derby

He looked like he wanted to race farther than the seven furlongs.

Hidden Trick was measured by a Lexington, Ky., company, Equix Biomechanics, which has been analyzing young horses for the last seven years. For \$500, the company takes 42 measurements including the length of the shoulder and the back, then produces a computer model to show how the horse will look at maturity.

The company also uses ultrasound to measure the young horse's heart and determine its capacity, which seems to relate to distance capability.

The computer creates a 16-dimension model that it compares with hundreds of other horse models. "We try to identify the horses that are made to run before they even put a saddle on them," said Suzanne Shull, equine analyst with Equix Biomechanics.

She remembers how Hidden Trick, measured at the Saratoga yearling sales, "came up well above average on his physical measurements and heart capacity."

Brittain, the trainer, can see firsthand how Hidden Trick is living up to expectations!

"It's exciting," said Brittain. "I never realized what it would be like," having a Kentucky Derby prospect. "I've had nice filles, but never a nice 3-year-old colt."

Brittain trains Hidden Trick for Keith and Elaine Wood of Boca Raton, Fla. Wood had owned a farm in Ocala, then sold the property and the horses because they were more trouble than enjoyment. Then he got back in the business and placed a few horses with Brittain.

Wood began raising horses again, yet he was not satisfied with the way his horse-breds were turning out.

Wood consulted a specialist in "tickler" patterns, which are patterns involving proven crosses of certain horse families used in breeding. Between the nicking and biomechanics recommendations, Wood bought two other yearlings in addition to Hidden Trick in 1991.

Now Hidden Trick has won four of eight lifetime starts and nearly \$100,000. For a minute, a former showhorse rider who became a racehorse trainer in 1978, this could be the start of something really big.

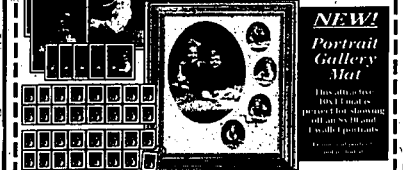

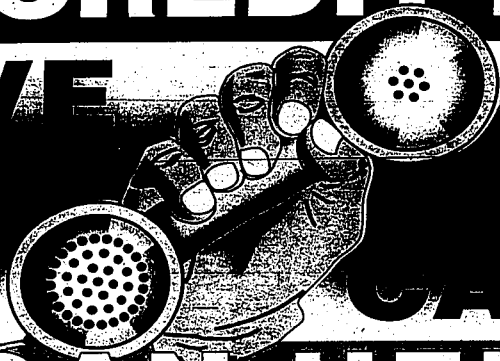
