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Yeltsin on top in power fight

MOSCOW — Russian President Boris N. Yeltsin continued to aim for a head-on confrontation with the nation's legislature Thursday night amid signs that he may survive an impeachment vote set for today.

His chief antagonist, Parliament Speaker Ruslan Khasbulatov, told reporters Thursday he no longer favored removing Yeltsin from office.

"I don't think that among all possible measures we should immediately talk about the most extreme one," he said.

In an apparent effort to boost pressure on wavering deputies, Yeltsin later restated his intention to ignore any impeachment vote — which, he warned, would "plunge the people into the pit of confrontation."

Yeltsin charged that the parliament was seeking to stifle reform by pushing him out of office and avoiding a vote on the future shape of Russia's constitution.

"The intention is to do it ... behind the backs of the citizens of Russia, behind the backs of the voters," Yeltsin said in a televised address. "All this is accompanied by

a fanning of hysteria, with screams about coups and conspiracies. Though, I think, the phrase 'being caught red-handed' is quite appropriate here."

The president's advisers and other observers took Khasbulatov's apparent retreat as a sign that conservatives in the 1,033-member Congress of People's Deputies lacked the two-thirds majority needed to remove Yeltsin.

By their own tallies Wednesday and Thursday, conservatives could count on only about 600 of the 689 votes needed to remove the president.

Yeltsin's aides, however, cautioned that Khasbulatov and his conservative colleagues would try any number of other tricks to whittle away at the president's powers or to drive him out of office.

Some delegates spoke of amending the constitution, which the Congress of People's Deputies can do freely with a two-thirds vote, to permit impeachment of the president by a simple majority vote.

Khasbulatov himself raised the possibility that parliament might try to abolish Yeltsin's job.

Yeltsin's vice premier, Sergei Shakhrai, theorized that Congress might try to vote Yeltsin's entire government out of office if it could not remove the president himself.

The crisis boiled over last Saturday when Yeltsin, his patience with parliament at an end, made a televised address proclaiming emergency powers and calling for an April 25 referendum on whether the president or Parliament holds executive authority.

All sides in the dispute expressed fears Thursday that a head-on collision between president and Parliament could lead to civil war.

Russian Orthodox Patriarch Alexii went on television Thursday to express his concern. "I appeal to all of you with a heartfelt call to do everything not to plunge the country into chaos, disarray and civil war," he said.

Khasbulatov spoke to a national television audience, charging Yeltsin had run roughshod over the constitution in order to win a paralyzing power struggle.

Man faces hearing today in 1986 rape

SHOSHONE — A man described by a prosecutor as a "serial rapist" will face a court hearing today as his lawyer argues that it's too late to prosecute him in the brutal 1986 highway rape of a 62-year-old Richfield motorist.

Robert Andrew Amerson, 26, has been repeatedly arrested and released since 1990, thwarting prosecution in the Lincoln County rape by escaping from law officers and by taking advantage of legal technicalities.

Twin Falls attorney Harry DeHaan said Thursday he can prove that charges against Amerson, his client, should be dropped.

DeHaan will try to do just that at 9 a.m. today in 5th District Court in Shoshone. He will argue that the statute of limitations — a time limit — has run out in the case.

DeHaan said Amerson has told him he did not commit the crime. DeHaan also said he has evidence to dispute all the state's evidence against Amerson.

Amerson is being held in the Mini-Cassia Criminal Justice Center in Rupert in lieu of \$400,000 bail, charged with rape, robbery and two counts of sexual entry with a foreign object.

Amerson was first charged in the rape in May 1990 after a Boise crime expert computerized fingerprints found on the rape victim's car with Amerson's, then-Lincoln County Prosecutor Lavon Loynd said.

The arrest warrant said the woman was followed by a man driving a sports car as she drove westbound from Richfield to Shoshone on Highway 26 during the early morning hours of Dec. 18, 1986.

The man swerved in front of the woman and stopped, blocking both lanes of traffic. The warrant said,

He approached the woman's car on foot and signaled for her to open her window. When she complied, he forced the window wider, opened the woman's car door, raped her and sexually assaulted her with a flashlight, according to the arrest warrant.

Current Lincoln County Prosecutor Jennifer Brown filed the latest charges — the same as have been filed three previous times — against Amerson on Feb. 23.

Brown said the five-year statute of limitations has not expired in the case because Amerson was living outside of Idaho for much of the time.

She said Magistrate Judge R. Barry Wood found at Amerson's March 11 preliminary hearing that the time limit had not expired.

DeHaan expects that finding to be reversed. "The evidence will say he was in the state of Idaho accessible to arrest during virtually all of the statute of limitations," DeHaan said.

If he is right, and Wood dismisses the case, it will be only the latest of several setbacks for law officers and prosecutors.

Clinton plan rolls ahead

WASHINGTON — Acting in record time, a divided Senate approved an outline of President Clinton's plan to spark the economy and trim the budget-deficit Thursday.

Democrats marched in near lockstep behind their new president. "Finally we've done something to break the gridlock and to bring the deficit down and to create new jobs through investment," Clinton exulted during a congratulatory telephone call afterward to top Senate Democrats.

"It's a remarkable achievement," Democrats eager to use their political momentum then launched the Senate into debate on the more controversial piece of Clinton's package: a \$16.3 billion measure aimed at creating jobs for teens and other out-of-work Americans.

Almost immediately, lawmakers voted by voice to forbid any of its money from going to produce fish at-lakes, whitewater canoeing facilities, and several other politically sensitive projects the administration had initially sought.

But work on the jobs bill then slowed to a crawl after its sponsor, Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., used his procedural prowess to all but guarantee amendments offered by opponents would be defeated.

Byrd's move angered Republicans and conservative Democrats, who were eager to trim or delay the measure's spending.

Prescription drug coverage in health plan

WASHINGTON — The Clinton administration plans to include coverage for prescription drugs in the basic health insurance plan being designed for the 37 million uninsured Americans, a costly benefit the White House also intends to give to all Medicare recipients, sources said Thursday.

"The only thing they haven't figured out is how to pay for it," said one source briefed by White House health planners.

Many private insurance plans now do not cover prescription drugs. But that may

quickly change because the government's core benefits package is likely to set a basic, national standard against which all other insurance plans would be measured.

The decision on drug coverage is apparently one of the first of hundreds to be made by the administration as officials winnow a huge array of options down to the concrete elements of the president's landmark health care package.

With President Clinton having pledged to unveil his plan by early May, the long-lingering and option-culling phase is now winding down and the process of resolving

specifically what will be covered, who will be covered first, and how it will be paid for is now under way.

The decision on drug coverage has been watched with particular interest because drug costs are a significant, unreimbursed expense for many people.

One immediate beneficiary of widespread coverage for prescription drugs will be the nation's elderly, the heaviest consumers of medications; another will be pharmaceutical companies, repeatedly criticized by the Clinton administration for allegedly making excessive profits.

Single bombing suspect still loose

NEW YORK — Four of the five men arrested in the World Trade Center bombing proclaimed their innocence Thursday, and, a month after the blast, federal investigators believe there may be only one suspect still loose.

"The circle is now very narrow," Jim Esposito, head of the FBI's New Jersey office, said after the fifth suspect was arrested early Thursday.

Authorities also disclosed that an explosive timing device like those in other terrorist bombings was recovered at the New Jersey home of suspect Nidal Ayyad, a chemical engineer who investigators believe has bomb-making know-how.

But at his court appearance, Ayyad insisted: "I am not guilty. I swear by all I hold dear — the Koran, my wife, child and mother — I had nothing to do with this."

The bombing a month ago Friday killed six, injured more than 1,000 and forced evacuation of the world's second-tallest

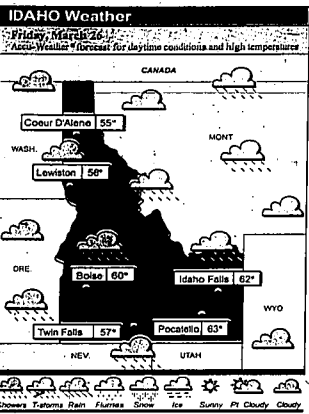
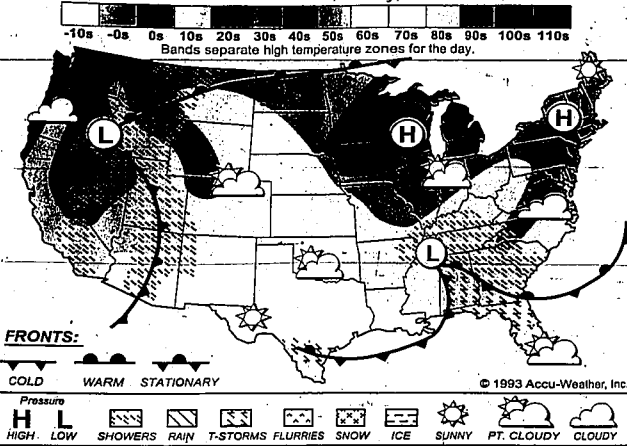

Heavy thunderstorms rumble across Gulf Coast region

Powerful thunderstorms pounded the Gulf Coast region Thursday.

Rain also drenched much of the West, the Appalachians and Massachusetts.

The thunderstorms produced golf ball-size hail across southern portions of Louisiana and Mississippi and in eastern Texas, where it damaged roofs and broke car windshields in Tenaha. No injuries were reported.

In Louisiana, the storm system spun off an apparent tornado north of Covington and hailstorms in Acadia, Allen and St. Helena parishes. Four mobile homes, a barn and a house in St. Tammany Parish sustained the worst damage but there were no reports of injuries.

In the West, heavy rain in the mountains above Santa Barbara, Calif., prompted the National Weather Service to

issue an urban and small stream flood advisory for Santa Barbara and Ventura counties through today.

A strong low pressure system was expected to move into California today, bringing heavy snow across higher elevations of California and Nevada.

A winter storm warning was in effect for today for the mountains of Southern California above elevations of 5000 feet, where up to a foot of snow was forecast.

Rainfall amounts were expected to reach up to 3 inches near the mountains before the storm heads to Arizona on Friday afternoon.

Rain also fell Thursday across much of Nevada, Utah, Illinois, Kentucky, Tennessee and the eastern sections of Massachusetts.

Heavier rainfall amounts for the six-hour period ending at 11 a.m. MST included .80 inch at Santa Barbara, Calif.

'Fanatic' dashes into cult's compound

WACO, Texas — Risking possible gunfire from either federal agents or Branch Davidians, a man described as a "religious fanatic" sprinted past a small army of heavily armed officers and into the cult's armed compound, the FBI said Thursday.

Louis Anthony Alaniz, 24, of Houston, stunned federal agents and cult members alike when he was spotted dashing across the yard of

the 77-acre compound early Wednesday evening, FBI Agent Bob Ricks said at a news conference.

Ricks declined to explain how Alaniz managed to elude numerous checkpoints, tanks, impersonal carriers and 400 federal officers surrounding the compound, which he said all under orders to watch for people trying to sneak in or out of the place.

"I'm not going to tell you the route," he said. "Obviously, it's much easier to control people coming out of the compound than per-

haps someone who is zealously trying to get inside."

Alaniz arrived at the compound; unscathed, knocked on the front door and was let inside by cult members, who have been under siege since U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agents tried to serve arrest and search warrants for weapons violations on Feb. 28.

Ricks said Thursday that when Alaniz knocked on the door, the cult's "initial reaction was that it was an FBI undercover agent."

In late May 1990, Amerson went free when Wood ruled that Loyd failed to prove that Amerson was out of the state long enough to extend the statute of limitations, which on rape cases at that time was three years.

Loyd failed to prove that Amerson served 10 months in the Montana State Penitentiary in 1989 for attempting to rape a motel clerk. Wood ruled. In that case, the woman testified that Amerson was "violent, cruel and threatened to kill her."

Two weeks later, Loyd refuted the woman's testimony.

On June 13, 1990, Butte County Chief Deputy Sheriff Cary VanEtten testified to Amerson's stepfather's farm to arrest him and found Amerson on a tractor, VanEtten said in a telephone interview Thursday.

He had Amerson drive the tractor to the farm so that the tractor would not block the road, and when they arrived at the farmhouse Amerson ran inside, VanEtten said.

VanEtten's stepfather then told Amerson that Amerson was in the bathroom. While VanEtten waited at the door, Amerson climbed out the back window and escaped, VanEtten said.

In retrospect, VanEtten said he

should have arrested Amerson first and then worried about getting the tractor off the road.

Lincoln County authorities lost track of Amerson until late 1991, when Sheriff Charles Cain arrested him on a charge of battery on a peace officer, Brown said.

Loyd convened a grand jury against Amerson on two counts of rape and one count of robbery in Brown's case. An indictment was returned on Jan. 23, 1992, Brown said.

The Idaho Legislature lengthened the statute of limitation on rape to five years as of July 1, 1992.

The indictment was returned to Idaho on July 29.

But on Dec. 18, Michael Kane, an Idaho deputy attorney general who had taken over the case at Loyd's request, had the grand jury indictment dismissed.

At the grand jury, Loyd had once again not addressed the case's statute of limitations problem, Brown said.

Kane then attempted to prosecute Amerson moving to Idaho in June 1990. Amerson, court documents show, DeHaan moved to dismiss that case on Jan. 11, 1993. This time he argued that Amerson had not been given a preliminary hearing within

two weeks after he returned to Idaho on July 29, as law requires, according to court records.

Amerson also had no chance for a trial within six months of returning to Idaho, violating Idaho's speedy trial law, according to records of DeHaan's arguments.

Fifth District Judge Daniel Mechl dismissed the case on Feb. 11. Brown then filed new charges.

DeHaan said Thursday he ran a write-in campaign against Loyd, the lone candidate on the prosecutor's ticket last fall, partly because she believed Amerson's case had been mishandled.

"We can't give (Amerson) to be a serial rapist," she said. Support for Brown from the rape victim helped her win the race, she said.

Loyd could not be reached by telephone Thursday.

DeHaan said the prosecution against Amerson has become too political.

"If it were not because of that situation there would have been a resolution of this case," he said.

DeHaan said that Montana, Alaska, Oregon, Hawaii, California and Utah are ready to testify that Amerson lived outside of Idaho while the statute of limitations was running, VanEtten said.

buildings.

Authorities say the motive remains unclear, though all five men arrested were born in the Middle East and at least four of them are believed to have links to a radical Muslim cleric who advocates the overthrow of Egypt's secular government.

The arrest Thursday of Bilal Alkaisy, 27, a Jordanian native living in Brooklyn, leaves only one known suspect still at large, said two federal investigators who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Alkaisy surrendered for questioning Wednesday night. He appeared in court Thursday afternoon and entered no plea to charges of aiding and abetting the bombing. He was ordered held for a bail hearing Tuesday.

An FBI complaint linked Alkaisy to Ayyad, and said a search at Ayyad's Maplewood, N.J., home turned up a time-delay firing device for explosives, "consistent with timing mechanisms used in other terrorist bombings."

But James Fox, head of the FBI's New York office, said there was no indication the bombing was the start of a terrorist campaign.

Court papers said Alkaisy also had an American Express card listing Ayyad's address, and that Alkaisy lived in the area of a Jersey City, N.J., shed used to hold bomb ingredients.

Alkaisy shared a Jersey City apartment with suspect Mohammed Salameh shortly before the blast,

said an investigator who spoke on condition of anonymity. Salameh allegedly rented the van used to carry the bomb into a parking garage beneath the trade center.

The investigator said Alkaisy, who worked as a salesman for an import company, also shared bank accounts with both Salameh and Ayyad, who are of Palestinian descent.

It wasn't clear if Alkaisy had ties to Sheik Omar Abdel-Rahman, the radical cleric first linked to other suspects in the bombing. Abdel-Rahman, suspected of fostering terrorism in his native Egypt, is fighting deportation from the United States.

Hours before Alkaisy's arrest, another suspect, Mahmud Abolhima, was flown in from Egypt. He fled the United States within days of Salameh's arrest, the investigator said. Authorities allege that he organized the bombing.

Abolhima's brother, Mohammed, said he had alerted the FBI to Mahmud's whereabouts.

"Why not?" Mohammed Abolhima asked while standing outside the courtroom where his brother pleaded innocent. "I do not hide it. He did not have any relationship with these people."

Abolhima, Salameh and Ayyad, like Alkaisy, are charged with aiding and abetting the bombing. All were ordered held without bail.

The other suspect, Ibrahim El-Ghobry, 42, an Egyptian living in Brooklyn, pleaded innocent to obstruction of justice and other charges. He allegedly scuffled with agents who searched his apartment as part of the bombing investigation.

Poetic license requires permit in Bay Area

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Poetic license is a double entendre in the coffeehouses of San Francisco, where permits are required for poetry readings in the city that sustained a generation of Beat poets.

Readings were halted at the Blue Monkey Cafe for two months after owner Theresa Strang was told by the city she needed a \$638 entertainment permit.

"Can you imagine Ginsberg and Kerouac getting ready to do a reading and saying, 'Wait a minute, do we have 630 bucks?'" asked poet Mel Thompson.

"A city of poets coming down on poetry, that's ridiculous," added poet Neelke Cherkovski.

Upholding the renegade tradition that inspired Lawrence Ferlinghetti to risk jail to publish Allen Ginsberg's "Howl," the city's new poets view the permit requirement as a free speech issue.

"What that really does is censor noncommercial art," Thompson said. He is lobbying city supervisors, and petitions seeking to change the rule are being circulated. Supervisor Angela Alioto is considering ways to amend the ordinance to exclude poetry readings.

"A lot of poets very specifically came to the city because of the long tradition of poetry and the accessibility to poets of cheap rents, to coffeehouses where they can live out the legend they have in Europe, of the

writer in Paris on the Left Bank," Cherkovski said. Cherkovski traces the city's bohemian tradition to the days of Mark Twain, Bret Harte and Jack London. But he credits the revival of the oral tradition to Beat poets of the 1950s, including Jack Kerouac, Ginsberg and Ferlinghetti.

"We're the minstrels of today, that's what we are. We spill all our guts out there, when there's a war, we talk about our girlfriends that left us, our friends that died," said Comichia, a poet from Peru living in San Francisco.

"I feel like poets and poetesses are the voice of the people speaking out, and it should be encouraged."

Readings have continued uninterrupted at cafes from North Beach to the Haight despite the action against the Blue Monkey. But poets and cafe owners alike fear the permit requirement could quash the tradition.

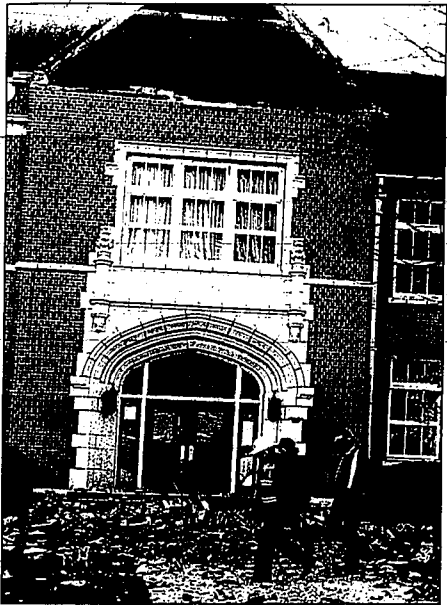
Police don't intend to start crashing readings, but Sgt. Steve Tacchini said cafe owners would be notified of the decades-old law as he becomes aware of violations.

Oregon temblor damages Capitol

WOODBURN, Ore. (AP) — A strong earthquake rumbled through the Northwest early Thursday, cracking the Capitol rotunda, collapsing walls at a high school and theater and jolting people awake.

"It rolled my wife right out of the water bed," said David Ross Jordan of Dallas, west of Salem.

Only minor injuries were reported. The 45-second temblor began at 5:34 a.m., and was centered near Woodburn, 30 miles south of Portland.

It was felt as far away as Seattle, 145 miles north of Portland, and Roseburg, 165 miles to the south. Estimates of its magnitude ranged from 5.3 to 5.7 on the Richter scale.

"It just kept rumbly and rumbly," said Jose Alberto Nunez of Mollalla, a town of 3,800 about two miles from the epicenter.

In Salem, about 15 miles south of the epicenter, the Capitol rotunda was seriously damaged and part of the building was closed.

House Speaker Larry Campbell said it appeared the rotunda was shifted by the earthquake, and engineers were considering removing the gold-plated pioneer man on top of the Capitol.

Two walls at Mollalla's high school partially collapsed, and bricks and a chimney fell from the 68-year-old building. Public schools are closed across the state this week for spring break.

After the quake struck, Philip Fontaine ran into his front yard carrying his son.

"The children were all screaming."

Everything was just shaking and not stopping. All I knew was I had to get my children out of my house," he said.

In Newberg, northwest of Woodburn, part of the roof and a wall collapsed at a theater.

Oregon Highway 18 was closed at Dayton, just west of Newberg, after a bridge over the Yamhill River shifted off its support and dropped about 8 inches.

People showed up at hospitals and clinics throughout the area complaining of injuries from falling objects or cuts from broken glass.

No damage was reported in the Portland area, but the quake knocked books off shelves and left pictures askew on walls and set off alarms.

The National Earthquake Center in Golden, Colo., recorded the quake's magnitude at 5.3. But the University of Washington's seismology laboratory measured it at 5.7.

Aftershocks were occurring every few minutes, but most were small, said Chris Jonientz-Trisler, a seismologist for the Federal Emergency Management Agency in Seattle.

The quake ruptured an unnamed fault that runs east to west and is located near the foothills of the Cascade Range about six or seven miles south of Mollalla, said Craig Weaver, a seismologist at the U.S. Geological Survey in Seattle.

It was a "thrust" earthquake, meaning that land on one side of the fault moved upward relative to land on the other side of the fault, he said.

Ex-regulator tried to spare Neil Bush from blushing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former bank regulator L. William Seidman says he timed the filing of a lawsuit to minimize embarrassment to George Bush's son, Neil, and later communicated with Barbara Bush about her son's predicament.

Seidman, former chairman of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., also details in his forthcoming memoirs what he characterizes as an attempt by a top Bush administration official to influence regulators' handling of the case.

Under Seidman, the FDIC filed a civil suit against Neil Bush and other directors of the Denver-based Silverado Banking, Savings and Loan Association for \$200 million.

After that, Seidman said Charles Bartlett, a friend and newsletter publisher, wrote him a note saying Barbara Bush was angry because the FDIC announced its suit on Oct. 1, 1990. That was the same day that the Treasury Department's Office of Thrift Supervision announced a hearing on related administrative charges against Neil Bush.

"Charley's note indicated that Barbara Bush had been informed that we had plotted the case against Neil in such a way as to bring him maximum embarrassment," Seidman wrote in the memoirs, to be published this spring.

In fact, just the opposite was true, he said. Even though he had reused himself from the Neil Bush case, Seidman said he decided to time the filing of the suit so that it and the thrift office hearing "could be seen as part of the same activities, rather than a separate proceeding."

Seidman said he believed the FDIC was obliged to sue Neil Bush but that he had Bartlett write a note to Barbara Bush saying, "Please believe that Seidman has the deepest compassion for Neil, and for the anguish that his problems are causing his parents."

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Maryland copes with outdated state motto

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (AP) — A panel of lawmakers has decided it's time to heed complaints that the motto on Maryland's state seal is sexist.

But instead of changing the words, the House Ways and Means Committee simply translated them differently.

Until Wednesday, the Italian words on the state seal, "Fati maschii parole," meant "manly deeds, womanly words."

On the theory that words mean whatever you say, the committee of 19 men and 9 women decreed that henceforth the phrase means: "strong deeds, gentle words."

The measure needs the approval of the full House, the Senate and Gov. William Donald Schaefer to become official.

The new translation would flunk a language test if it were up to Amy Colley, Romance language and literature editor for the Modern Language Association in New York. The phrase, which dates back 300 years to the settlement of colonial Maryland, is "very gender specific," she said.

However, the diplomatic Francesco Legaluppi, Italian consul in Baltimore, said the new translation is defensible.

FBI director remains confident Clinton will keep him on job

WASHINGTON (AP) — FBI Director William Sessions said Thursday he is "very optimistic" that President Clinton will allow him to stay on the job, despite accusations of ethical lapses and news reports that the White House wants him out.

"I don't accept those reports at all," Sessions told reporters after a House Judiciary panel hearing on the FBI's activities of the past year and plans for the future.

The Justice Department's Office of Professional Responsibility ac-

White House and administration sources have said it is only a matter of time

before Sessions is asked to leave. The OPR findings and turmoil at the FBI over the accusations has made it impossible for him to lead the bureau, some critics have said.

But others administration officials, including Clinton himself, insist a decision has not been made.

Sessions, who is half way through his 10-year term, said, "I'm very optimistic."

"I believe ... that the president of the United States is very, very certain to see that I did nothing unethical or improper," he said.

"I know that the bureau will continue to function and function well, and that this director can and has led it and will continue to do so."

Sessions noted the breakthroughs in the World Trade Center bombing and what he said was the FBI's calm handling of the standoff with a religious cult in Waco, Texas.

Clinton on Tuesday denied reports that he had decided to replace Sessions. "I've not had a decision about that. I have — I have asked

Janet Reno to look at it ... and I am going to wait for her judgment on it."

The same day, Ms. Reno rejected news reports that Sessions' successor had already been chosen, saying, "I haven't chosen him and the president hasn't chosen him and I don't know who else would choose him."

Sessions said he will be exonerated and retained as FBI director because "it is important that the bureau not in any way be politicized."

"There should not ever be a cabal

within the bureau that disagrees ... with the director's decisions that should be allowed ... (to) have an overthrow of the regime," he said.

Asked for evidence of a cabal, Sessions said he knew only what he read or heard in media reports.

At the same time, Sessions said he found it "impossible to believe" that his top-level managers "are either disloyal to this director or who believe that the bureau would be better off with the director not here."

Secretary proposes sanctions

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and its Asian allies may move to impose stiff sanctions on North Korea to pressure it to abide by the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, Secretary of State Warren M. Christopher said Thursday.

The punitive measures would include denying the already isolated, Stalinist government oil, gas, other raw materials, and even food, Christopher told a House appropriations subcommittee.

North Korea announced March 12 it was withdrawing from the treaty, which it signed in 1985. Earlier this year it barred international inspectors from visiting two sites, raising concerns it was hiding a nuclear weapons program.

Christopher said experts told him sanctions can be effective with North Korea. "There seems to be a number of ways in which pressure can be put on them," Christopher said. "Perhaps we won't have to get to that point because they'll realize earlier on that they made a mistake in withdrawing from this convention."

Under pressure from the West to open suspected nuclear weapons development sites for in-

spection, North Korea accused inspectors of joining the United States in "anti-North Korean maneuvers."

Christopher said the U.N. Security Council would take up the issue at the end of the month or in early April.

House lifts abortion counseling restrictions

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House voted Thursday to permanently do away with government restrictions on abortion counseling after defeating an attempt to require parental notification for minors seeking abortions at federally funded clinics.

The House passed and sent to the Senate, 273-149, a bill that authorizes spending for family planning clinics and writes into federal law President Clinton's lifting of the Bush administration's ban on abortion counseling.

Known as the "gag rule," supporters of Clinton's action wanted to lock it into law to reverse 12 years of Republican, anti-abortion policies.

Right before the House's final vote, the chamber rejected, 243-179, a Republican-led effort to prohibit clinics that receive federal money from performing abortions on minors unless a parent is notified 48 hours in advance.

Anti-abortion lawmakers maintained that young girls need permission for all sorts of things, such as getting an aspirin from the school nurse.

"Here we have an invasive procedure on a minor, and you want to say no notification," said Rep. Thomas Billey, R-Va., who offered the amendment. "It doesn't seem to make sense."

But advocates of abortion rights resisted, arguing that only low-income teen-agers who had to go to subsidized clinics would be subject to the notification requirement.

Even some Democrats who support parental notification, such as Rep. J. Roy Rowland of Georgia, opposed Billey's change because their

states already had such laws.

Busy signal at Social Security costing government millions

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government is ringing up an \$11.5 million telephone bill by putting callers to its nationwide toll-free Social Security hot line on hold, investigators say.

But a local Social Security office may not even go through. The General Accounting Office says fewer than half of all such calls are answered.

Congressional Democrats say the Social Security Administration's troubles answering the phone are just one of the consequences of massive cutbacks in the agency's staff under Presidents Reagan and Bush.

Applicants for disability benefits are now waiting three months instead of two for a decision on their claims, said a report by the Democratic staff of the House Ways and Means Committee.

Advocates say some Americans suffer economic hardship, ill-health, or die waiting for their case to be decided.

Ways and Means subcommittee on Social Security, said at a hearing Thursday.

At the end of 1992, more than 725,000 disability claims were waiting to be processed.

Social Security's work force was trimmed from 80,000 to 63,000 between 1984 and 1990. The agency also sought to economize by disconnecting local phone lines and installing a toll-free, nationwide hot line on Oct. 1, 1989.

But complaints about busy signals and inaccurate information on the toll-free line prompted Congress to direct the agency to restore public telephone access to its 1,300 local offices a year later.

"SSA responded by relisting local office telephone numbers in local directories but did not reinstall the incoming telephone lines that would have enabled the public to reach these offices readily," the Ways and Means report said.

As a consequence, the GAO said, 55.7 percent of calls to local Social Security offices do not go through.

And an internal audit by Social Security found that putting callers to the number on hold cost the government \$11.5 million in telephone time charges in 1991 — or 30 percent of the agency's total 800-number costs.

A caller to the hot line on Wednesday night was told to wait six minutes.

Nevertheless, Louis D. Enoff, acting Social Security commissioner, told the subcommittee that he believes the public "has more convenient and far better access to SSA than at any time in the past."

SSA spokesman Phil Gambino said the toll-free line handles more than 1 million calls a week. He said the agency also has reconnected some additional phone lines at local offices, although not all those disconnected in the 1980s.

Survey: Day-care workers make less

WASHINGTON (AP) — Many workers in day-care centers are earning less now than four years ago, according to a survey of nearly 200 centers in five cities.

Sen. Christopher J. Dodd, D-Conn., said the "near-poverty" wages shortchange both the workers and the children themselves.

Researchers said Thursday that entry-level, day-care employees, the fastest-growing segment of the child-care work-force, were making \$5.08 an hour last year, compared with \$5.16 an hour in 1988.

The highest-paid teachers earned \$8.85 an hour last year, 66 cents more than they earned in 1988, said the study by the Child Care Employee Project, a private, non-profit research organization based in Oakland, Calif.

Ex-conviicts contribute to spread of TB

ATLANTA — More than 200,000 people released from prisons and drug-treatment centers may spread tuberculosis every year if these institutions don't test and treat everyone who enters their doors, health officials say.

The federal report comes two weeks after prison health workers told the government they can't afford to test everybody.

An estimated 10 million Americans are infected with tuberculosis, and about 20,000 active cases are diagnosed annually. The incidence in prisons is at least three times that of the general population. It also is high at drug-treatment centers because drug users and carriers of the AIDS virus are most at risk.

Every year, 540,000 inmates are released and 645,000 people finish treatment at drug clinics. About 240,000 of them have latent TB infection and spread the germ, the CDC said.

Postage stamp pays tribute to Kelly

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — A postage stamp honoring the late Grace Kelly was issued jointly by the United States and Monaco.

The stamp unveiled Wednesday is nearly identical for the two countries. The U.S. stamp pays homage to "Grace Kelly" and the Monaco stamp commemorates "Princess Grace." And the face values are different.

The American-born actress married Prince Rainier of Monaco, a tiny European country. She died in 1982 in a car accident.

The stamp was unveiled by the U.S. Postal Service and the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

The actress won an Academy Award for playing the embittered wife of an alcoholic entertainer, portrayed by Bing Crosby, in the 1954 movie "The Country Girl."

FCC asked to restrict TV mayhem

WASHINGTON (AP) — Contending TV violence contributes to anti-social behavior, a private, non-profit group petitioned the Federal Communications Commission Thursday to restrict murder and mayhem on television.

The effort was immediately criticized by longtime children's television advocate Peggy Charren as an attempt to use censorship instead of education to solve problems.

But it comes on the heels of a Times Mirror survey showing the public more concerned than ever about the amount of violence in television entertainment and its effect on society.

The petition from the Foundation to Improve Television asks the FCC to revoke the license or authority to program from cable companies or broadcasters who habitually show "an excessive amount of dramatized violence" between 6 a.m. and 10 p.m.

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Struggle angers, confuses Russians

RYAZAN, Russia (AP) — Far from the Kremlin, power struggle Russians are confused and angry at President Boris Yeltsin's failure to end the country's political crisis and improve their hard lives.

But they are even angrier with lawmakers in the Congress of People's Deputies who are trying to remove Yeltsin.

"We must support the president. But we have to chase the lawmakers away now or they'll stay for life," said Alexander Frolov, a bricklayer.

Yeltsin has retained significant public support. But the deepening poverty that has resulted from his reforms has disillusioned many, and the promise of democracy is little consolation.

"Yeltsin was a leader. He had a chance. But he didn't do anything for me," said Frolov's co-worker, Vasily Persov. "We have been betrayed. Prices are going up, up, up."

"You go to the market one day, and the next day you're left sucking your thumb."

Ryazan, a 12th century Russian city about 130 miles south of Moscow, is lined with Soviet-era buildings and sagging wooden houses built before the revolution.

Life for Ryazan's 470,000 residents has become more difficult since Yeltsin freed prices in the first big step of his economic reform program in January 1991.

The bricklayers said they earned 10,000 rubles a month, or \$15, below the average wage of \$19. Lidia Kolpakova, a city maintenance worker, said she earned \$12 a month.

At Detsky Mir, or Children's World store, a baby carriage costs \$13, and a warm blanket \$5.

At the grocery store, there is plenty of food and lines are short. The

reason: Many people cannot afford the prices. Two pounds of sausage cost \$1.39, and two pounds of butter \$1.60.

"The president has got to bring the prices down," Kolpakova said as she sawed treetsops on a street not far from where she lived.

supposed to live. It is very, very hard.

The state and city are so broke that train service to Moscow has been cut. Many people now stand during the four-hour trip.

The roads are full of holes, and there is no money to clear away the snow that melts into mud.

Most people interviewed said Russia needed a strong president and that Yeltsin was the right man for the job.

And most said they would go the polls if Yeltsin proceeds with plans to hold a national vote of confidence in his government on April 25. "We have got to have a president, one guy who knows what's going on and runs things. There should be one boss in the country," said Yevgenia Platono, another maintenance worker.

Others were fed up. "We are so poor and so tired, how should we know who's going to run the country?" said 70-year-old Zinaida Ivanova, as she swept the steps of Ryazan's red-brick Kremlin walls.

"People are apathetic. We have lived hard lives," she said as she rested a moment and leaned on her homemade broom.

"Things weren't right in the past, but we believed they would get better. Now we don't believe anymore."

Lena Maschenko, a hearty "babushka," or grandmother, who had been visiting her relatives in Ryazan, said she would do everything she could to support the president.

"Yeltsin is squeezing those deputies and he's right," she said. "We've got to get rid of them. Of course, I'll vote for Yeltsin. I'll get my daughter and my grandchild and we'll make a committee to help our president."

"I want a better life for my children."

Serbs keep pushing as talks continue

SUBOTICA, Yugoslavia (AP) — As U.N. officials focus on Bosnian peace talks and help for besieged Muslim enclaves, Bosnian Serbs are using the distractions to complete ethnic cleansing campaigns elsewhere.

In the northeastern town of Bijeljina, the last remaining Muslims are being systematically driven from their homes to make room for Serb settlers.

"They told us they were in a hurry to make Bijeljina ethnically pure," said Razija Avdic, one of 140 Muslim refugees now stranded in the northern Yugoslav city of Subotica.

"We were given a choice: Leave now peacefully, or by force later on."

Bijeljina was home to 28,000 Muslims, about 70 percent of the population, before Serb paramilitary troops attacked last April and took control after a bloody three-day battle.

It was one of the first battles of the Bosnian war and just days before the siege of Sarajevo began on April 6. Since then, Serbs have seized more than 70 percent of the republic.

As in other parts of Bosnia, Serb fighters in Bijeljina have used varying degrees of terror to force Muslims out. Now there are only about 5,000 left and, with pressure mounting for a peace settlement, Serbs are stepping up their campaign.

"Widespread intimidation and low-level terror techniques are being used against the Muslims," said William Tall, the United Nations' chief monitor for the region.

The refugees in Subotica said they were frequently harassed and threatened. Ten days ago, Serbs blew up six mosques, including a

430-year-old structure. Not a trace of them remains, and trees have been planted on the graded sites.

The Serb mayor expressed regret and blamed the destruction of the mosques on unidentified outsiders. But local Muslims got the message, and there was a wave of departures.

Tougher tactics are being used against holdouts. "Uniformed men came and stole our corn, the tractor and other farm equipment and finally demanded we surrender our house," said Pasa Mulahasanovic, whose husband, Avdo, owned a small farm on the outskirts of the town.

"As we were leaving, they were already moving in," she said.

Muslims were forbidden at gunpoint to sell any of their belongings, and a neighbor was found dead one morning in a ditch, his throat slit, Mulahasanovic said.

The Bosnian Serb army began sending draft notices to Muslim men of military age, forcing them to leave or be sent to fight other Muslims. Hand grenades were lobbed into gardens in the middle of the night, terrifying the occupants of houses that Serbs wanted vacated.

In February, Serb authorities in Bijeljina started registering Muslims intending to leave and organized buses to take them to Subotica, on the Yugoslav-Hungarian border.

Many crossed into Hungary and went on to western Europe. But Hungary recently began blocking their entry, citing the refusal of other Western countries to accept more refugees.

Hungary also says it does not want to assist the Bosnian Serb campaign by accepting loads of Muslims.

Bosnian signature leaves Serbs as only holdouts

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Bosnian President Alija Izetbegovic signed a plan Thursday designed to halt ethnic war in the war-ravaged country, marking a major breakthrough in peace talks and leaving Serbs as the only holdouts.

A U.N. announcement said Izetbegovic signed a proposed map dividing Bosnia into 10 semi-autonomous provinces and also approved a separate agreement on interim governing arrangements. Bosnian Croat leader Mate Boban previously approved of the peace plan, but on Thursday signed a revised map. It was not immediately known how the map was changed.

Fred Eckhardt, spokesman for international mediators, said the Bosnian Serb leader Radovan Karadzic "reserved his position."

No other information was available.

The meeting by the three sides was under way — the first joint session involving all three leaders since the troubled peace talks moved from Geneva to New York earlier this year.

The plan calls for Bosnia to be divided into semi-autonomous regions, based largely along ethnic lines. Although the former Yugoslav republic would remain a single state, the central government's powers would be limited.

MOSCOW — Ruslan Khasbulatov has become the second-most powerful man in Russia even though he is loathed by many of his colleagues and supported by only 12 percent of the nation's voters.

According to many of his comrades and to Western diplomats who watch him perform as speaker of Russia's parliament, the faint praise is richly deserved.

They call the 50-year-old speaker a power-hungry opportunist and an egotistical bully, a man who changed his ideological shirt from communism to democracy — and now, perhaps, back again — in order to seize power.

Even the speaker's critics, however, say he is a hard worker, splendid at bridging and exploiting divisions within Russia's Communist-era parliament.

Most spectacularly, he has united his colleagues on the one question on which most can agree: President Boris N. Yeltsin's reformist government must go.

The break with Khasbulatov has been bitter medicine for Yeltsin. In 1990, Yeltsin promoted the obscure but gifted professor of economics to be his second in command, working as deputy chairman of the parliament. While Yeltsin busied himself fighting Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev and the Communist Party, Khasbulatov stood at his shoulder running the parliament's day-to-day affairs.

After the end of the August 1991 coup brought Yeltsin to real power, however, Khasbulatov drifted from the reformers' camp.

The Russian president plainly was annoyed. He accused Khasbulatov of blocking economic reforms for the sake of "sick ambitions."

Khasbulatov recently complained that he has been treated unfairly in

both Russian and Western news reports. He was and remains "in favor of radical reforms in our society," he said, and fights Yeltsin only for the sake of freedom. "The gist of the conflict lies in ... the almost dictatorial powers in government management," he said.

Leaders of the reborn Communist Party are among Khasbulatov's most ardent backers. And more than a few Russian analysts worry that if Khasbulatov gains additional power, he will poison relations with the West.

Back when he was one of Yeltsin's closest allies, Khasbulatov played an instrumental role in disassembling the Soviet Union. But this month, he solemnly announced that the whole affair had been engineered by Washington.

Presidents Ronald Reagan and George Bush, he said, had "promised a lot to Gorbachev and (former Soviet Foreign Minister Edward A.) Shevardnadze, first for ruining Comcon (the Communist bloc's economic group) and the Warsaw Pact and then for ruining the Soviet Union. But Congress did not allocate a single cent for that. Why should American workers pay for our mistakes?"

A group of prominent scholars and journalists publicly blasted that comment as a transparent bid to win "support of the Communist-cum-chauvinist reactionaries." Following Khasbulatov's lead, the Independent Citizens Initiative said, would "isolate Russia from the entire civilized world."

In fact, few in Moscow believe that Khasbulatov can supplant Yeltsin as Russia's president.

Though Khasbulatov has helped fan Russian nationalism, he is not Russian. He is from the Caucasian Mountain region, and by ethnic background he is a Chechen. As the speaker's detractors are prone to note, the last leader that Russia had from the Caucasus was Josef Stalin.

Yeltsin's backers blame much of the rush toward impeachment on Khasbulatov's personal ambition.

"It seems that Khasbulatov is in such a psychological state that he is incapable of any compromise," Gleb Yakunin, a pro-Yeltsin delegate to Russia's Supreme Soviet, said Wednesday.

Soon after, an anti-Yeltsin delegate also lambasted the speaker.

"He is constantly maneuvering, changing his stand," said Ilya

Konstantinov of the Russian Unity faction. "He remains chairman, even though he is not popular with the deputies, because he takes advantage of the contradictions between various political forces."

Khasbulatov maintains that he began fighting his former friend reluctantly, out of concern for suffering that Yeltsin's economic "shock therapy" has inflicting on millions of Russians.

More recently, he has portrayed himself as a stalwart defender of Russia's Brezhnev-era constitution against the onslaught of a dictatorial Yeltsin.

The phrase "defending the constitution" is heard almost as frequently now among legislators as the phrase "building socialism" used to be. And for some of the same reasons: power and privilege.

Khasbulatov controls the parliament's financial and material resources, said anti-Khasbulatov reformer Oleg Rumyantsev. "His personal insidiousness allows him, by using the stick-and-carrot policy, to manipulate the deputy corps (parliament members)."

Then too, there is the force of Khasbulatov's personality. In a realm of gray-suited party men — 80 percent of the lawmakers in the Congress of People's Deputies are ex-Communists — he is a verbal tiger.

When Russian Central Bank Chairman Georgy Maryukhin balked at the parliament's inflationary demands that he hand out trillions of freshly printed rubles, Khasbulatov growled, "It's time to tie him in a sack and throw him in the water."

Togo leader attacked

LOME, Togo (AP) — Gunmen stormed the military compound housing President Gnassingbe Eyadema on Thursday, then fled under fire from government troops. Eyadema was reported safe, but his military aide was killed.

A government communique said the attackers came "from abroad," and that it immediately sealed its border with Ghana as part of an investigation.

How our 'wish list' fared in 1993 Legislature: Lousy

Talk about disappointment. Back in January, when Idaho lawmakers were making sure they had plenty of clean socks for their annual trip to Boise, we published a "wish list" of suggestions.

The 1993 session is petering out now. So we've pulled out that list to see how we did. Let's just say our lawmakers didn't strain any muscles responding to our suggestions.

Here's a scorecard:

Performance audits - One of our few successes. In January we called this item "the most useful idea on the legislative agenda." After three years of shoving, Rep. Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley, finally succeeded in pushing this sensible idea past the reluctant Democrats.

The state will have a mechanism for checking how efficiently state agencies do their jobs - and how carefully they spend our money.

Tax reform - A big priority for lots of Idahoans. We suggested in January that the Legislature lighten property taxes modestly by shifting the load to a broadened sales tax. But the Legislature, not threatened by an initiative this year, stuffed the issue behind the sofa cushions. But take heart, taxpayers: An interim study commission will talk about property tax reform.

Sex offenders - We suggested changing the law that says a rape defendant can only be convicted if the victim physically resisted. This change would make "date rape" prosecutions easier. But the idea never moved beyond idle talk.

We also backed a proposal for giving sex offenders treatment in prison - in hopes that judges would choose imprisonment over probation. Instead, the Legislature chose a "get-tough" program of mandating

minimum sentences and requiring parolees to register with local authorities.

So we'll spend more money on locking up perverts and keeping track of them after they're free. But we won't lift a finger to try to smooth out the kinks in their skulls. Swell.

Medicaid - Another high-profile, high-priority issue that was stuffed behind the sofa cushions. But guess what? Another study commission.

County reorganization - We suggested giving individual counties an option to reorganize, with fewer electors and more professional managers. We keep suggesting this, and usually nobody listens.

So this year we declare a moral victory because there's going to be a (ta-da!) study commission.

Property seizure - The law that lets drug agents seize property from suspects creates a dangerous incentive to abuse civil liberties. But who cares about the rights of drug suspects? No, action.

Education spending - We proposed a "moderate" increase, and that's pretty much what happened. Education may end up doing a little better than expected, and that's good. Of course, liberals will regard the end result as stingy; conservatives will regard it as spendthrift. That's politics.

Term limits - At the state level, this is an idiotic idea. Voter anger at the U.S. Congress is being misdirected at state government. We'll keep begging people to wise up and leave well enough alone, but the idiocy seems unstoppable.

All in all, a dismal record. We went two for eight. Worse, if you count the detailed items in each category.

Did the Legislature go astray, or did we just have dumb ideas? You decide.

'Truth' law should survive

A year ago, the Legislature passed a "Truth in Taxation" law requiring taxing districts to provide notice of proposed tax increases. The law is generally credited with raising the visibility of proposed changes, much to the delight of local school boards and other local taxing authorities, who had been used to a more secretive process.

Not surprisingly, they fought this session to scale back the notice requirements, claiming the notices were too costly and weren't accurately based on real tax numbers.

Wisely, the Legislature held up these

changes in late-session action.

In our view, the Truth in Taxation law may need some refining to allow lower-cost notices, but it doesn't need wholesale abandonment. The basic concept is a good one, even if it doesn't include publication in the state's newspapers.

Two local legislators, Rep. Celia Gould, R-Buhl, and Rep. Jim Kempton, R-Altus, worked hard to find ways to make such publication less costly while retaining the law's intent.

We encourage them to continue their efforts in the future.

In several cases, these merchants didn't just send me to another source, they got on the phone and helped locate the items for me. I extend my personal thanks to each of you.

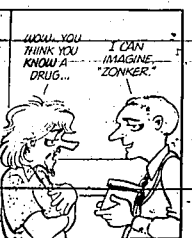
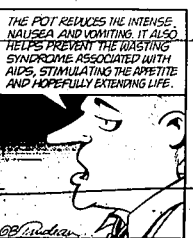
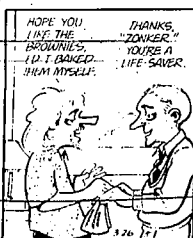
While our search for props was going on, other segments of the production crew were also hard at work building stage sets, arranging for costumes, etc. Our producer, Fred Scheibe, has done an

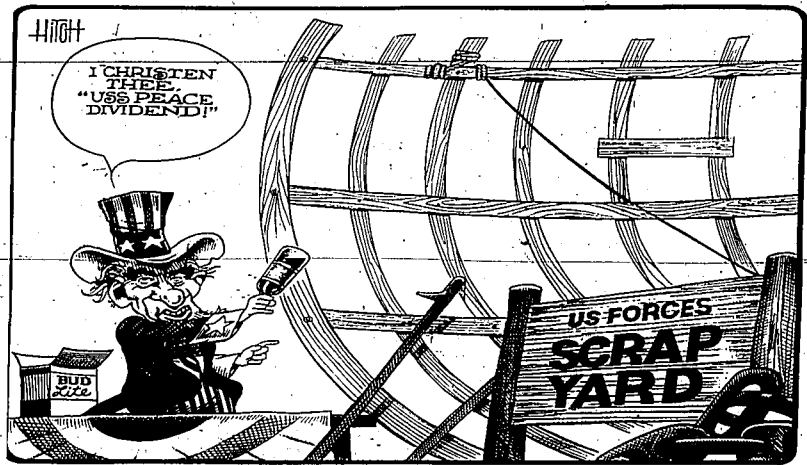

law in his book "Order and Law": "The ideal behind my intuitive picture of how judges should decide is the liberal ideal of the rule of law, which holds that men of intelligence and reasonable good will can come to a fair measure of agreement about what the law is, and that our liberty is most secure when in the end it is to the rule of law that government power is responsible."

Despite conservative efforts to return the Court to its roots, that is not the direction the Court has been going in the last 30 years. The liberal wing, led recently by William Brennan and Harry Blackmun, has focused not on interpreting the Constitution but on "equality of outcome." Fried writes, "For the rule of law opposes every attempt to define justice in terms of end results; how the world must end up looking, how people must be, and how they must stand in relation to one another."

The battle between those who believe the "original intent" of the Founders is primary and those who hold the modernist view that the law is just one more ideological battleground, the spoils of which go to the victor in the last presidential election, ensures that respect for law will continue to decline.

If law is not immutable, at least in the critical areas involving life, freedom of religion and human relationships, then it breeds contempt. It sends a message that says I do not have to take law seriously or

show it much respect, because what I want to do may be allowed if I can just get my candidate into the White House.

"Originalism" provides a standard, a safe harbor for law and for those who live under it, not above it, because, in Fried's words, it infers "general principles from specific constitutional provisions and then (applies) those principles to new cases."

President Clinton's view of law is quite different. It begins not with the Constitution but with a political agenda and then attempts to rewrite the Constitution to fit it.

With Justice White's departure, the Supreme Court will edge ever closer to what Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes envisioned in "The Common Law." To Holmes, the law ought to be based on experience. "Truth is the majority vote of that nation that can lick all others," he said. In a 1926 letter to John C.H. Wu, Holmes wrote, "So when it comes to the development of a (ital) corpus juris (initial) the ultimate question is what do the dominant forces of the community want and do they want it hard enough to disregard whatever inhibitions must stand in the way."

This is the philosophy of a materialistic society that sees itself as autonomous and whose sole objective is self-gratification. It is the philosophy that was recently abandoned in Russia and it is one that Justice White rejected. But America is now embracing it with increased fervor, oblivious of where it has led other nations and where it will ultimately lead us: to decline and destruction. Expect President Clinton to nominate someone who will help speed the process along.

U.S. flexes muscle at Kismayu

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) — A U.S. Marine amphibious assault force steamed for the southern port of Kismayu Thursday in a show of force aimed at keeping rival warlords out of the contested city.

Although Kismayu has been quiet for several days, Marine Col. Fred C. Peck said rival warlords were accusing opponents of moving forces into position in an attempt to take the city.

Forces led by Mohamed Said Hirsi, who calls himself Gen. Morgan, drove a militia led by Col. Omar Jess out of Kismayu on March 17, killing at least 10 people and wounding about 50 in a day-long battle.

Gen. Mohamed Farrah Aidid, one of Somalia's principal warlords and an ally of Jess, accused the allied coalition of abetting Morgan's takeover and temporarily walked out of a peace conference in Ethiopia.

Peck said about 1,300 Marines would go ashore in Kismayu on Friday and move west of the city toward the area where Morgan's forces are deployed. At the same time, several hundred Belgian paratroopers already in Kismayu would move north toward Jess' encampment.

A company of about 200 soldiers from the U.S. 10th Mountain Division will also head in the direction of Jess' camp, moving southwest out of Merca, a small port south of Mogadishu.

The four-ship U.S. flotilla is led by the USS Wasp.

Western forces dropped 200,000 leaflets on and around Kismayu on Wednesday warning anyone observed carrying weapons within or en route to Kismayu will be considered a threat.

Deployment of the Marine assault force comes less than a week after the coalition withdrew a 500-member American army rapid reaction force from Kismayu. It had been sent to help the Belgians quell fighting between the Morgan and Jess militias.

Defense chief wants Canada leadership slot

TORONTO (AP) — Defense Minister Kim Campbell, already leading in nationwide opinion polls, joined the race Thursday to replace Brian Mulroney as prime minister and leader of the Progressive Conservative Party.

The expected announcement by Ms. Campbell, a 46-year-old lawyer from Vancouver, British Columbia, cemented her position as the front-runner among five announced candidates.

The winner of the Conservative leadership race automatically will become prime minister until the next federal election, which must be held by late November.

Mulroney announced last month he would step down as prime minister and party chief as soon as a new leader could be selected. A leadership convention is scheduled for June.

In a speech to a gathering of supporters and media in Vancouver, Ms. Campbell cited the economy as a top priority.

"I guess what it boils down to is I would like to change the way people think about politics in this country by changing the way we do politics in this country," she said.

Ms. Campbell formerly was junior minister for Indian affairs and justice minister.

The other announced candidates are Environment Minister Jean Charest and three Tory Members of Parliament — Patrick Boyer, Garth Turner and James Edwards. Ms. Campbell already led her toughest potential opposition to back away from the race — Trade Minister Michael Wilson, External Affairs Minister Barbara McDougall and Communications Minister Perrin Beatty.

Spankings aren't torture, court rules

STRASBOURG, France (AP) — Spankings in British boarding schools may sting the seat and the soul, but it's not torture, a court ruled Thursday.

In a 5-4 ruling, the European Court of Human Rights rejected a claim by a mother who said the 1985 spanking of her son, then 7, was "degrading or inhuman treatment" banned under the European Human Rights Convention.

Thursday's ruling lets the practice continue in private schools.

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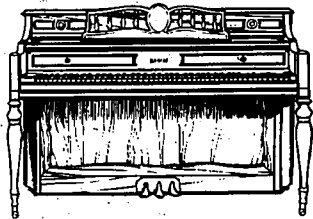
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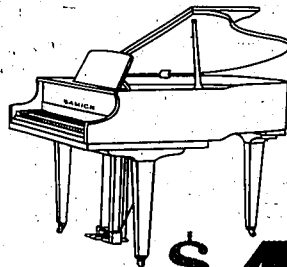

Treasurer takes aim at lobbyists

Edwards says bills she authored were unfairly killed

TWIN FALLS - State Treasurer Lydin Justice Edwards plans to shoot back at a few Boise lobbyists who earlier this month helped shoot down bills she wrote.

"I am declaring war on lobbyists - not all of them, just some of them," she told the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club Thursday. "We are seeing a little bit of aggression and just a little bit of arrogance."

Edwards, a Republican, said she plans to file a written complaint against two lobbyists who she said misrepresented facts before legislative committees. She said she isn't sure what form the complaint will take, but probably will send it to legislative leaders and to either the attorney general or the secretary of state.

The complaints stem from the death of two bills she wrote.

Idaho Farm Bureau Federation, the lobbying arm of Farm Bureau, objected to part of a bill that would change the way the Idaho Fish and Game collects hunting permit fees.

Currently, the money is sent in with each application and then refunded if the applicant doesn't win the lottery for a specific hunt. Edwards proposed a \$5 non-refundable fee. The bill would have eliminated \$250,000 of paperwork, but Fish and Game would have collected less money.

"So a lobbyist from the Farm Bureau decided they didn't like it," Edwards said, "because this particular lobbying group has not liked Fish and Game."

Farm Bureau predicted Fish and Game would have to raise other fees to make up the difference.

Royola Jacobson of the Farm Bureau said in a telephone interview the organization was simply trying to find a way to refund fees to unsuccessful applicants. The Farm Bureau supported the bill after it was amended to address its concerns.

"When we read them and reviewed them, heck, we really supported the bill," Jacobson said. "We felt kind of bad that the bill got defeated."

In another bill, Edwards proposed requiring businesses owing at least \$50,000 in tax during any collection period to make the payment with an electronic transfer between banks. The proposal would get the money into the state's

Twin Falls High will gradually be brought up to code

TWIN FALLS - Construction on Twin Falls High School science classrooms and a new gymnasium may begin within a week following the city's approval of building permits Thursday, schools Superintendent Terrell Donicht said.

The permits had been delayed about one month as Twin Falls city government and the Twin Falls School District haggled over how the 40-year-old school could be brought up to current fire safety standards.

Donicht said the city agreed to allow the school district to

gradually improve fire safety over a number of years, but the district was not required to immediately provide a timetable for all the fire code work.

The school district will cut 17 new outside doors in the high school building's walls in 1993 to increase the number of fire exits, Donicht said. The much more costly process of piping in a fire-snuffing sprinkler system will be put off a few years, Donicht said.

Thursday's permits will allow remodeling of science classrooms and construction of 600 square feet of class space, as well as construction of a gymnasium.

Funds for the work will come from a \$9.9 million bond

issue passed by voters in May of last year. Money for the fire work is coming from other sources.

The district sent a building contract to Bateman-Hall Construction Co. for the work, Donicht said. The company's \$1.8 million bid was higher than the \$1.5 million bid abandoned earlier by the Scott Hedrick Construction Co. of Boise.

The construction will not be complete before fall classes begin, Donicht said.

Scott Hedrick Construction Co.'s \$886,000 remodeling and construction project at Robert Stuart Junior High also received a building permit Thursday, Donicht said.

Chivalric attempt to raise cigarette tax goes awry

BOISE - The Idaho Statehouse is no Camelot, and Rep. Jim Stoicheff doesn't look much like a medieval knight.

But that didn't stop the Clatsop Point Democrat from enlisting Sir Gawain Thursday in his unsuccessful attempt to raise the state cigarette tax by 2 cents a pack.

The bill would have raised \$1.7 million, which was to be used to

extend Medicaid coverage to about 4,000 "medically needy" children.

Stoicheff, a retired schoolteacher who holds a master's degree in literature, used the story of Sir Gawain and the Green Knight to try to convince the House Revenue and Taxation

Committee to live up to its part of a deal struck last year between the Legislature and Gov. Cecil Andrus.

For the last few years, lawmakers and Andrus have funded over the medically needy program and its relationship to the Catastrophic Health Care Fund, a program run by the counties.

The "cat" fund, as it is known, pays medical bills, exceeding \$10,000 for indigent people. Until last year, it was funded entirely from local property tax revenues,

and the Legislature wanted the state to take it over. However, Andrus refused unless the medically needy program was funded at the same time.

Last year, a compromise was reached under which the state began putting money into the cat fund and the medically needy program was enacted to go into effect this October. The undersanding was that the Legislature would fund it this year.

However, legislative budget writers decided not to fund the medically needy program, in an attempt to squeeze as much money as possible for public schools out of the rest of the state budget. The cigarette tax increase was intended to raise enough money to allow the program to begin on schedule.

That's where Sir Gawain came in.

In the medieval tale, the Green Knight challenged Sir Gawain to

Washington apple grower purchases Galena Lodge

KETCHUM - Galena Lodge, a cross-country ski area on the Sawtooth National Recreation Area north of Ketchum, is being sold to a Washington apple orchardist.

Closed and up for sale since late last summer, the lodge is being purchased by apple grower Richard Krantz of Yakima, Wash., a winter sports enthusiast who designs and builds power tillers for cross-country trail grooming snowcats.

"I've admired Galena Lodge for several years and have thought it would be great to own and operate it," said Krantz, who plans to run the lodge with his wife and daughters. A July 1 closing date has been set on his agreement to purchase the resort.

Operated under a special use permit from the Forest Service, Galena Lodge has been turning to cross-country skiers for nearly 20 years. Its current owner, Steve Haims, closed the lodge last summer after a half-dozen

drought-afflicted winter seasons, citing an inability to make the business profitable.

Closure of the lodge and potential loss of groomed Nordic trails this winter motivated a successful community fund drive that created the North Valley Trail System, operated by the Blaine County Recreation District.

In advance of taking over Galena Lodge, Krantz has requested authorization from the SNRA to groom the 30-kilometer Boulder Mountain Trail between Galena and North Fork, as well as the 15-kilometer Prairie Creek Trail System, which were part of the North Valley Trail System this winter.

The SNRA is seeking public comment on Krantz's proposal to take on grooming responsibilities and sell season passes for the trails through the Recreation District. If approved, the trails will be added to the Galena Lodge trails special use permit.

Transient could face 10-year term for slaying

SHOSHONE - Lincoln County Prosecutor Jennifer Brown said she will recommend seven to 10 years in prison for a man who pushed a California drifter off a freight train to his death last May.

Brown said Melvin Atkinson, 38, pleaded guilty to a voluntary manslaughter in the death of 35-year-old Samuel Wayne Thurmond, whose body was found along the tracks about 10 miles west of Kimama.

Fifth District Judge Phillip Becker ordered a presentence investigation and had not yet scheduled a sentencing date Thursday. Atkinson has been serving a two-to-five-year prison term since last fall on a related Power County conviction.

Atkinson, whose last known address

was Phoenix, originally was charged with first-degree murder for Thurmond's May 22 slaying. But Brown said the case was difficult to prosecute since Atkinson and the witnesses involved were transients.

The prosecution's key witness was Heinz Eppelmann, a Las Vegas construction worker who testified last June that he joined Thurmond, Atkinson and two other men he knew only as Pops and Tennessee on a westbound Union Pacific train in Ogden, Utah.

Shortly after the train left Pocatello, Eppelmann testified, Atkinson asked if he had ever killed anyone, then pushed Tennessee out of the train car, probably somewhere in Power County.

Tennessee survived, but authorities said Thurmond - drunk on beer and sleeping - was killed when Atkinson

pushed him from the train.

Jerome School District attempts to refine sex ed curriculum

JEROME — The Jerome School District is conducting a survey to determine what type of sex education program the school should include.

Some parents have complained so far, though, that the survey is vague and confusing.

A curriculum review committee has been

working on the issue since October, said school Administrator Lavar Butters.

A philosophy statement prepared by the committee states the curriculum should include:

- Strong parental involvement that would promote the sharing of family values and promote communication.
- The message that abstinence prior to monogamous marriage is the healthiest choice.

Class materials that stress a healthy self-image and affirm the students' abilities to make good choices.

The survey asks high and middle school students, teachers, parents and community members to respond to 19 statements ranging from whether the primary responsibility for sex education lies within the home, church or other places.

The survey stresses that the school can

only complement-values that are imparted at home.

Some parents have complained, though, that the survey is misleading.

"You can't really understand what is being asked," said Ann Egbert.

Board Chairman Nancy Churchman said that the survey was written so they should include their comments and notate questions they couldn't understand.

"The School Board will have the final say

in what curriculum is used, but we are using the survey to find out what people want," she said.

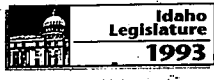

Andrus next to see audit bill

BOISE (AP) — Years of senate debate with little fanfare as compromise legislation authorizing efficiency evaluations of state agencies won unanimous approval from the state Senate.

The House passed a bill, was forwarded to Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday just a week after his veto of the Republican alternative was sustained.

"It's a good compromise," GOP Senate floor spokesman Pro Tem Jerry Twigg of Blackfoot said. Although disagreement over the technical aspects of the bill had stalled its passage in the past, Twigg said the



public "really didn't care how we come to performance audits. They just wanted us to do it."

The bill reorganizes legislative support services and replaces the legislative auditor, whose job is being taken over by the elected state auditor, with a management systems analyst who will develop performance audit plans and then have the actual auditing conducted

by independent contractors.

Andrus and Republican leaders have agreed on the need for performance audits, which both agree could save tax money.

But legislative leaders wanted the work done by legislative staff, while Andrus wanted the evaluations conducted by independent auditors.

The GOP maintained their proposal was less expensive, but Andrus countered his was the only one the public would accept because the audit findings would be signed by someone other than a state employee.

Gunman opens fire; 7 hurt in Washington

BUCKLEY, Wash. (AP) — At least seven people were shot and wounded when a gunman opened fire Thursday along a highway near this rural Pierce County town, a sheriff's spokesman said.

Three of those injured were hospitalized in critical condition, hospital spokesmen said.

Authorities shot and wounded the 30-year-old gunman and arrested him about a half hour after the shootings began, Pierce County sheriff's spokesman Curt Benson said. He identified the man as Ricky Thorp of Bonney Lake.

"We have an individual shot almost point-blank in the head with a .22-rifle. That's pretty tough," Benson said of one victim.

The shootings occurred along a three-mile stretch of the Buckley-Summer Highway, Benson said. Buckley is about 33 miles south of Seattle.

As the gunman walked along the road, he shot at motorists and people who came out of their houses to see what was happening, Benson said.

"Our people don't indiscriminately shoot at anybody," Benson said. "The man was armed with a .22-

caliber Ruger rifle with a scope. The weapon had a banana clip containing at least 25 rounds, he said.

Benson said police received the initial call at about 6:05 p.m. MST that someone was shooting at passing cars.

Four minutes later, Thorp's mother called to say it was her son doing the shooting, the spokesman said.

A man identified as Glenn Anderson of Tacoma was reported in critical condition with a head wound at Harborview Medical Center in Seattle. A second, critically injured man, Michael Stott, 38, of Buckley, was transferred to Harborview from Good Samaritan Hospital in Puyallup, near Buckley. Stott also was hit in the head.

A third victim was in critical condition at Good Samaritan with three gunshot wounds. A fourth victim was in stable condition with a thigh wound. Good Samaritan nursing supervisor Sally Erickson said.

Three other victims were taken to Community Memorial Hospital in Enumclaw, near Buckley. KIRO Radio reported, their conditions were not immediately known.

coffers earlier and allow the treasury's office to start earning interest sooner.

Idaho Retailers' Association President Tim Brennan opposed the bill, Edwards said. He also "used faulty information," she said.

Brennan said in a telephone interview he wasn't "strongly opposed" to the bill, but offered committee members some information on how many retailers would be affected.

"Our people don't have a strong opposition," Brennan said. "It isn't that big of a deal for you and us."

Filing a written complaint about a lobbyist's testimony as Edwards

wants to do is unusual," Brennan said.

"Never heard of it," he said. "I've been here 35 years and I've never heard of it."

A provision in Idaho's law regulating paid lobbyists prohibits them from "knowingly" deceiving or attempting to deceive a legislator about facts pertaining to legislation. Violation of the provision is a misdemeanor.

A Kiwanis member voiced support for Edwards' complaints.

"I agree with you that whatever is going on in the Farm Bureau has got to be stopped," said retired banker David Mead.

an unusual contest, Gawain could take his best shot at the Green Knight's neck with a sword, if the Green Knight could do the same to Gawain in a year and a day.

That, Stoicheff told committee members, is pretty much the situation with the medically needy program. Andrus has promised to veto this year's \$3.25 million appropriation for the cut fund if the Legislature fails to fund the medically needy program as promised.

Andrus repeated that promise later Thursday morning after the tax-payers' office told Stoicheff's bill on a voice vote.

"No medically needy, no catastrophic," he declared. "We made a deal with the Legislature, and when I make an agreement I keep my word. If you kill one, I'll kill the other."

If Andrus vetoes the cat fund money, the state, the counties and medical providers likely will end up in court, Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said.

Hempleman, who sits on the board that administers the cat fund,

said that under the 1992 compromise, counties are no longer responsible for anything more than the first \$10,000 in catastrophic health-care costs.

Neither Andrus nor the Legislature should expect counties to pick up the tab for the cut fund, again, he said. "It's their baby, unless we go to court and get an adverse ruling."

Arizona RVers find out about Idaho

BURLEY - There may be more RV traffic through the Mini-Cassia area this summer than usual, thanks, in part, to two local couples.

Bill and Dorothy Schafer of Burley and Ron and Arvela Klebe of Rupert spent 10 days at an Quartzsite, Ariz., sport and RV show last month, promoting Idaho tourism as part of a Region IV Travel Committee program.

The results of the stay were great, Bill Schafer said.

"There is a growing interest in Idaho," said Schafer, who is also executive director of the Mini-Cassia Chamber of Commerce. "We'll be welcoming more RVers in the area this summer."

Quartzsite, which Schafer describes as a type of crossroads between Phoenix and some California destinations, balloons from a population of a few hundred during the summer to a half million during the winter, as retirees flock to the area.

The Bureau of Land Management allows the RVers to park on the desert land, charging them a fee of \$3 per day. Most are retirees from colder climates who have sold their

homes and travel around the country.

BLM count during the Schafer's and Klebe's stay showed 272,000 recreational vehicles parked within a 20-mile radius of Quartzsite.

"You have to see it to believe it," Schafer said.

During the peak season, the area boasts numerous rock and RV shows and flea markets.

The Schafer's and Klebe's volunteered their time for the Region IV Travel Committee.

While promoting Idaho as a whole, they also specialized in

giving information about the Magic Valley, distributing thousands of maps and brochures.

"We talk about south central Idaho in particular because that's what we are promoting," Schafer said.

The Travel Committee's program is the sole focus on RV travel in the state tourism budget.

It was Klebe's fourth visit to Quartzsite, while Schafer has now made the trip to distribute materials twice.

"We had two pallets of Idaho material, Oregon Trail material, Idaho maps and travel guides sent down by freight, and the Klebes hauled a bunch of local Mini-Cassia and South Central Idaho material," Schafer explained. "We gave it all away except one case of Idaho road maps."

Idaho might be ideally suited for RVers because the majority of them prefer rural places and traveling on secondary roads.

The Oregon's trail 150th birthday has been the topic of many RV and travel guides, and Schafer said the RVers he talked to seemed interested in visiting some of the key areas of the trail.

"They are curious about the state because they haven't been here," Schafer explained.

Mayors to sign fair housing proclamation

BURLEY - Mayors and representatives of Mini-Cassia communities will unite this morning to show their support of fair housing laws.

Denise Wright of the Mini-Cassia Association of Realtors said the proclamation to be signed at 8 a.m. at the Heyburn City office is in commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the passage of what is commonly known as the federal Fair Housing Law.

Several mayors of the Mini-Cassia area are expected to be at the signing.

The proclamation, declaring April "Fair Housing Month" will ask for commitment by residents to give fair housing opportunities to all and to "wholeheartedly recognize these rights throughout the year."

The law guarantees that housing should be made available to all citizens without regard to race, color, religion, sex, family status, handicapping conditions or national origin.

"At least she does not believe there are housing problems involving discrimination in the Mini-Cassia area."

"At least we haven't had any complaints filed," she said.

Complaints have been registered in target cities, including Pocatello and Idaho Falls, she said.

National origin is the No. 1 reason people discriminate others who are trying to obtain housing, Wright said.

A Realtor faces harsh penalties if found guilty of discrimination, including the revocation of his professional license and a fine of \$10,000 for each occurrence.

Early retirement, child abuse among concerns of Minidoka County School Board officials

RUPERT - Kathleen Hanson, who has served as assistant principal at Big Valley Elementary, was appointed as principal at a Minidoka County School Board meeting.

The School Board disagreed over a planned child abuse policy and held off adopting it until several points are clarified.

Board member Bill Hepworth said he was concerned with the ease in which someone could report a suspected incident that could lead to "loose" allegations against parents.

Hepworth worried that instructors who have had no experience with child abuse would too easily make frivolous claims against a parent. He said he preferred that abuse cases be reported only after they were witnessed by at least two people.

Superintendent Michael Bishop and Trustee Steve Holland disagreed, saying all incidents should be reported.

The board decided it was necessary to discuss with law enforcement and human services the procedure needed to remove a child from school district property.

The board also discussed and adopted an early retirement incentive program.

The program would be offered to employees who have been employed by the school district for 10 years or more full time, who have or will be 55 by Aug. 15 of the school year during which they are making their application and are in good standing in their position.

The district would save funds eventually by replacing early retirees with lower-paid people.

Judge: Ketchum didn't follow rules with annexation

KETCHUM - Ketchum has been defeated in its initial attempt to annex Weyakin subdivision, but its tug of war with the city of Sun Valley is not over.

Fifth District Judge Phillip A. Becker ruled Wednesday Ketchum did not follow proper procedure when it annexed Weyakin, and that two ordinances it passed to achieve that end are null and void.

Meanwhile, Ketchum has asked for a temporary restraining order to block the city of Sun Valley's annexation of that property. The city is asking the judge to find Ketchum in contempt for continuing with its annexation while under a restraining order.

Becker has not made a decision on how to proceed in either matter.

In the process of annexing several parcels south of Ketchum March 3, changes were made to the proposed zoning of the Reinheimer Ranch land above the 25 percent slope and to the Union Pacific Right-of-Way land.

Weyakin attorneys Gary Slette and Evan Robertson argued at that meeting that the zoning changes were substantial and material and required the council to republish the proposed ordinance and take further public comment on the proposed zoning.

The council felt that the changes didn't warrant the additional 15-day public notice and comment period and passed the ordinance, prompting Slette and Robertson to seek a temporary restraining order.

In his ruling, Becker said material changes had been made.

"To change zoning classifications without notice and hearing is a taking equally as intrusive as enacting a zoning ordinance without notice and hearing," wrote Becker.

The contempt action filed by Slette and Robertson stems from Ketchum's decision to pass new annexation ordinances the Monday before the hearing on the temporary restraining order and publish those ordinances the morning of the hearing, March 17.

Ketchum claimed that an amendment to the restraining order March 8 freed them to complete new annexation, which they accomplished by annexing Weyakin in an ordinance separate from the other parcels and annexing all parcels unzoned.

Schools 2000 returns to bargaining table, but maybe not for long

BOISE - House and Senate negotiators will try again today to come up with a compromise aid bill for public schools, after the House rejected a Senate plan that gave the schools a total of \$562.1 million in state funds.

That was \$5 million more than the House had agreed on earlier this week. The extra money came from the state's budget reserve account, or "rainy day fund."

The Joint Finance Appropriations Committee, which includes senators and representatives of both political parties, will meet this morning to discuss alternatives to the failed aid bill.

The gifted-and-talented program and the Schools 2000 reform effort could be traded away.

House Speaker Mike Simpson and JFAC co-chair Sen. Atwell Parry, among others, suggested Thursday that one way to get more money into the classrooms is to take funds away from those two programs.

The failed school bill directed that \$1.66 billion be spent on school reform and \$300,000 to help local school districts establish gifted and talented programs, as required by state law. Those moneys would be spent separately and not flow out to local districts through the funding formula.

Several lawmakers have criticized the reform program this session, saying it wasn't fair to spend \$1.66 billion on a handful of districts when the overall

education budget wasn't enough to maintain current operations.

Washington Elementary School in Jerome is one of six schools that is receiving special reform grants as part of the program.

At one point in the budget-setting process, JFAC cut out funding for school reform entirely, although intensive lobbying by House and Senate leadership got it restored.

Other possibilities include splitting the difference between the House and Senate budgets and taking the money from the rainy day fund, perhaps with specific language that it could not be spent for teacher salaries or other ongoing costs.

That was the main concern cited by House Republicans who debated against the Senate's budget.

"If it said in here that this money would go only for books or supplies, or other non-ongoing programs, I suppose I could go for this," said Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, who chairs the House Education Committee.

But Rep. Ken Robison, D-Boise, argued that adding \$5 million was an improvement, albeit a small one, on an inadequate public-school budget.

"Is it more important to leave \$5 million in the reserve fund, or is it more important to meet the needs of our schools?" Robison asked.

The House turned down the Senate measure on a voice vote, meaning individual lawmakers' vote weren't recorded. The vote appeared close to ob-

servers, and some Democrats suggested that Republicans didn't want a roll-call vote or a division (in which members vote by standing up) because they didn't have the votes to kill the bill.

But Republicans replied that the Democrats neglected to ask for a roll-call or a division until it was too late.

The dispute over the school budget is reminiscent of a similar House-Senate squabble last year. In that fight, the Senate also wanted to spend \$5 million,

more on schools than the House, although it ended up settling for \$100,000 more.

This year's fight threatens to extend the legislative session into next week, although some lawmakers were still optimistic that they would go home today or Saturday.

"I'm hoping we'll be here in June, so they can sing 'Happy Birthday' to me on the floor," said Parry, who will turn 68 on June 14.

Boundaries drive rift between feds, locals

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Some eastern Idaho county officials contend enforcing wilderness boundaries is a waste of money, and that federal officers have threatened violators.

But one area sheriff said the county officials' motives may be personal.

Congressman Michael Crapo, R-Idaho, asked Targhee National Forest officials last week to respond to the allegations from Teton, Fremont and Madison county commissioners and prosecutors, and the Teton and Fremont county sheriffs.

In a Feb. 9 letter to Idaho's congressional delegation, they criticized the federal agencies for enforcement efforts against snowmobilers in the Jeddediah Smith Wilderness Area on the Targhee in Wyoming.

Madison County Sheriff Greg Moffat also criticized the enforcement in a March 3 letter. But Moffat said he did not want to sign with the other officials, "because some of the signers have in fact violated the law

as it pertains to the wilderness area. I believe some of their concerns may be due to personal motives," Moffat wrote. "I will not condone what they have done in the past, however, I would like to go on record as one who believes that the wilderness law needs to be looked at since the use of snow machines in this area is not detrimental to the area in any way."

Federal officers had cited Teton County Prosecutor Roy Moulton of Driggs and Teton County Commissioner Brent Robson of Teton for driving snowmobiles into the wilderness area, Forest Service officials said.

"We have difficulty finding the resources to enforce crimes that leave victims, and it is distressing to see the Forest Service and the Park Service wasting the money and manpower on such a petty issue," officials of the three counties wrote in the letter.

They said a Forest Service official threatened to shoot snowmobilers

who would not stop when ordered, and another officer tried to ram a fleeing snowmobiler. Last year, they said, officers tried to run a group down with a helicopter.

In a letter sent to Crapo on Wednesday, Targhee Supervisor Jim Caswell said he did not believe the allegations about his officers.

"It is not our policy to use force, including high speed pursuit, to apprehend violators," Caswell wrote.

Since 1990, the Forest Service and National Park Service have issued more than 25 citations for illegal snowmobiling in the wilderness, but only a fraction of the violators have been cited, Caswell said it has become a game for local snowmobilers to test into the wilderness and evade citation.

"It is disturbing that elected officials, law enforcement officials, and prosecuting attorneys would support the violation of the law and selective law enforcement," Caswell said. "In my opinion, the attitude expressed by the commissioners contributes to

the violations and directly impacts the expenditures of funds for enforcement purposes," the county officials wrote.

Several attempts to reach Teton County commissioners and Moulton for comment were unsuccessful.

"A lot of this controversy is generated because of the failure of the Forest Service to adequately locate and post boundaries," the county officials wrote. "They will spend thousands of dollars on enforcement efforts and not 50 cents for a sign."

But Caswell said one of the Teton County commissioners had assisted the Forest Service in posting the wilderness boundary. Targhee spokesman Dee Sessions said it was part of a court-ordered restitution for Robson after a citation.

"We believe that we cannot turn our heads and ignore the breaking of federal law no matter how petty someone might think it is," Caswell said. "I do not believe that it is what Congress expects, or that it's what the general public wants."

Blackfoot thespians learn from fire

BLACKFOOT — Members of the Blackfoot Community Players were meeting at the historic Nuart Theater when they heard that fire had destroyed the Chief Theater in Pocatello last Saturday.

They immediately decided on changes to protect the Nuart, in the heart of Blackfoot's downtown business district.

"The news made us sick. It's the kind of sick feeling you get when you hear someone has died," said Talma Ward, who operates a beauty salon in a corner of the Nuart. "We decided that day to review our fire insurance policy."

But Ward said there are no immediate plans to install an automatic sprinkler system that officials say might have saved the 55-year-old Chief.

Moscow nightclub could lose permit

MOSCOW — Xenon, a downtown Moscow nightclub, faces the loss of its state permit to "serve beer and wine over allegations" that scantily clad male and female dancers performed indecent acts.

Lyle Bolon, a special agent for Alcohol Beverage Control Division of the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, informed Xenon manager Barry Tassier on Wednesday that the agency may revoke the club's alcohol license.

The administrative violation notice alleges that exotic male and female dancers violated an Idaho law prohibiting sexual activity or nudity in a business licensed to sell alcohol, Bolon said Thursday.

Two separate allegations refer to shows held at Xenon on Jan. 31 and Feb. 25. Bolon said the Jan. 31 show featured male dancers and the Feb. 25 show featured female dancers, including to state and Moscow Police investigators.

Bonneville residents may sue county

BONE — A group of rural Bonneville County residents say they are tired of being snowed in all winter, and will sue the county if it fails to keep the Bone Road open.

"As a result of Bonneville County's failure to maintain the Bone Road, those residents needing access to and from their homes have been forced to endure the intolerable," Idaho Falls attorney Brad Wright, who is representing the residents, wrote to county commissioners.

County crews this week began opening the road, which has been blocked for months by heavy snow. The road normally is plowed to within almost two miles of the Bone Store, about 20 miles southeast of Idaho Falls.

Wright said the half-dozen families he represents have told him to file a lawsuit immediately if the county does not agree to keep the road passable year-round.

State OKs preferred landfill site

IDAHO FALLS — The state Division of Environmental Quality has approved the preferred site for Bonneville County's new \$2.5 million landfill on 320 acres of farm land east of Idaho Falls.

The action is the last major hurdle the site needed to overcome. However, the county must still receive state approval for the landfill's design, and the District 7 Health Department must approve an operating plan.

Under federal Environmental Protection Agency rules, the county must have a landfill meeting stringent new requirements operating by Oct. 2.

The county also is building a \$2 million waste transfer station in Idaho Falls. Garbage initially will be taken there and compacted. Large semi-tractor trucks then will haul the trash to the new landfill in the foothills about 12 miles east of the city.

UP lays off 19 workers in Pocatello

POCATELLO — Union Pacific is furloughing 19 car department workers. It will be the railroad's first Pocatello layoffs in several years.

Thirteen carmen, one car foreman, two machinists, one electrician and a laborer will be furloughed April 1, Ed Trandahl, a Union Pacific spokesman in Omaha, Neb., said Thursday.

"It's some belt tightening," Trandahl said. "The company looked at options and determined there was not a need at this time for the boxcars."

Layoff notices were posted Wednesday and Thursday in the Pocatello yards.

Special Olympics threat hurts program

BOISE — The theft of more than \$28,000 from the Idaho Special Olympics coffers may restrict the organization's summer programs.

Tricia Jean Stein — a Special Olympics volunteer for seven years — was arrested by Boise City Police last month on charges of grand theft after the organization's auditors discovered conflicting bank statements, Stein, 30, will be arraigned Wednesday in Ada County District Court.

Special Olympics volunteers hope to put the incident behind them and to raise enough money to finance summer programs.

Repairs finished on state Capitol

BOISE — The outside repairs on the state Capitol after the 1992 New Year's Day fire are finished, and the scaffolding that has become a fixture on the back side of the building will start coming down.

Total cost for the stone work by Estel Sommer Masonry of Idaho Falls is about \$300,000, much lower than the \$450,000 originally estimated.

"The masonry contractor on this job, from our standpoint, has done an excellent job," said Jan Frew, architect for the Idaho Department of Public Works.

House approves compromise bingo bill

BOISE (AP) — A compromise bingo bill drew a tepid response from a leadership committee Thursday, but gained strong House approval and was sent on to the Senate.

"It's not the best in the world," Rep. Alan Lance told members of the Ways and Means Committee as the bill that would regulate charitable bingo and raffle games was introduced.

"It's better than the Senate came out with but it isn't as good as the House bill," Lance said before the House passed the measure 57-13.

The compromise, meshing parts of competing bills introduced in the House and Senate, was designed to end a session-long stalemate that threatens to halt all charitable fundraising games by July.

Indeed, that is what one witness said Sen. Mark Ricks, R-Rexburg, wants to do.

The bill would mandate a combination of county and state registration, licensing and regulation of bingo games.

Hal Franck, representing veterans' organizations, argued against letting the state Lottery Commission supervise bingo games, as the Senate version would have. The House has tried to set up regulation at the county level.

"You ought to be talking to Senator Ricks (chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee) about local control," Lance told Franck.

Franck said, "He (Ricks) has told me he would just as soon see charitable bingo and raffles sunset (die) on June 30," Franck said.

Legislators have been advised that if they don't adopt new rules, it will be illegal to hold bingo or raffles as fund-raising events after that date. Committee members didn't like

parts of the plan, but Lance said the new law is designed to expire in July of 1994.

"We're going to have to revisit all of this," he said.

Lance said the bill exempts from licensing small bingo games or raffles with prizes under \$1,000. If the total value of prizes or raffles is over \$1,000, the organization would have to buy a \$100 license.

Earlier, House State Affairs Chairman Pam Ahrens, R-Boise, told members the compromise appeared to be the only way to get a bingo bill through the Senate.

"We've tried to address as many potential problems as possible," she said.

Highlights:

- Charitable organizations will pay a \$100 annual licensing fee. Counties will get \$75 of the fee and will do preliminary processing. Lottery Commission approved at the county level will be sent to the Lottery Commission, which also will

have to approve. The state gets \$25 of the license fee.

- The legislation limits bingo games to three per week, eight hours per session and a top prize of \$1,200 per game. The payout for one session is limited to \$5,000. The cash limit for a raffle is \$1,000 but there's no limit on the value of non-cash prizes.
- No more than 65 percent of the gross revenue can be paid out in prizes, at least 18 percent of the gross must be donated to the sponsoring charitable organization and not more than 17 percent of income can go for expenses or administrative overhead.
- Each sponsoring organization must make annual financial reports to the counties and state. Small games, offering prizes under \$100 for a game or \$500 for a session, don't need a license. Lotteries, raffles or other games covering more than one county will have to apply for a special state license for \$200.

Symposium focuses on recreation, preservation

BOISE (AP) — A symposium on management of central Idaho's Frank Church River of No Return Wilderness began Thursday amid doubts it would settle issues of the area.

But Gov. Cecil Andrus, in an address opening the three-day conference, said the legacy of the 2.4 million-acre wilderness — the largest in the lower 48 states — is too important to give up trying.

Senators don't like Clinton plan

Idaho Sens. Larry Craig and Dirk Kempthorne were part of a united front of Republicans that failed to stop Senate approval of the outline of President Clinton's plan to spark the economy and trim the budget deficit.

"The skids were greased," Craig said after the 54-45 vote Thursday. "Idahoans are about to be socked with the biggest tax increase in history."

"People would understand it better if the deficit was being reduced. But this plan doesn't do that. Spending will go up, not down."

Kempthorne, who sponsored an amendment aimed at cutting the budget for Congress by 25 percent, said the Clinton plan "will be devastating to the American economy and many people in Idaho."

"While its sweep covers an area greater than Rhode Island" and Delaware combined, we should remember that the Frank is a work in progress," Andrus said in prepared remarks. "Protection will not be complete until the salmon — the mighty fighter of Northwest waters — is re-established. Those of us who value the River of No Return owe it to our children to join the fight to save this symbol of our heritage."

John Hendee, dean of the College of Forestry at the University of Idaho and a conference organizer, said one of the biggest management problems is public demand. So many people want to float the Main and Middle forks of the Salmon River that the Forest Service must strike a balance between outfitters and private rafters.

The Forest Service currently allocates half its permits to commercial outfitters. The rest are put in a lottery for private rafters.

Many private rafters think it's unfair for outfitters to get guaranteed

river access and want all the permits to be put in a lottery," said Rutgers University professor and state district ranger responsible for rafting on the Main Salmon.

The wilderness, created by a bill signed into law by President Carter on July 23, 1980, is managed by four national forests: the Challis, Payette, Salmon and Nez-Perce.

Some interest groups say dividing wilderness management fragments efforts and dilutes funding. So the Forest Service is considering turning the Church into the nation's first "all wilderness" national forest to consolidate resources.

Environmental groups also charge the Forest Service focuses excessively on recreational use and not enough on scientific research and protection of the ecosystem. They are calling for more money to be used in those areas.

The conference was aimed at providing a forum for people to discuss these and other conflicts and problems in the wilderness and devise ways to solve them.

"The symposium is extremely significant," Hendee said.

But not everyone is convinced the symposium will lead to solutions.

"We could accomplish a great deal, or it could be just another meeting," said John Freeman, a political science professor and natural resource expert at Boise State University.

For the symposium to be successful, he said, it needs to build momentum for change that will continue after the meeting ends.

Andrus, in recounting efforts that led to the wilderness area's designation 13 years ago, urged a return to what the late Sen. Frank Church and others had in mind.

"Wilderness doesn't need management as much as it needs protection. If you protect it, Mother Nature will manage it," the governor said. "Once this realization hits home, as Frank Church demonstrated, safeguarding what is rare and wild becomes a personal matter."

Officially 'endangered' gnatcatcher becomes experiment target

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Clinton administration declared the California gnatcatcher a threatened bird Thursday and launched what environmentalists and local government officials in Southern California called an "unprecedented experiment" in dealing with endangered species.

The tiny bird with the kittenlike voice is at the crux of a struggle among developers, environmentalists and local government officials. In Southern California, where its coastal sage scrub habitat covers thousands of acres of land considered prime for housing construction.

But those competing interests also have been working with the state in a novel effort to agree on saving some habitat and allowing economic development of other parts.

Babbitt, in adding the bird to the list of threatened species said he was invoking a never-before-used rule to take note of that state effort and allow the state to develop a gnatcatcher protection plan.

The Fish and Wildlife Service, which normally has that responsibility for endangered and threatened species, will have the authority to approve or reject what California develops under its Natural Community Conservation Planning Act.

California's program, still in the planning stages, would allow developers to destroy some of the coastal sage scrub while preserving other parts for the gnatcatcher and fellow species that otherwise would also be likely candidates for extinction.

This "ecosystem" approach, Babbitt said, "accommodates both the needs of the Endangered Species Act and the imperative of development in that corridor from Los Angeles to San Diego."

"It is a test of whether or not we can find balance, whether we can

accommodate growth and protection of an important part of that ecosystem, in effect of whether we can in Southern California live lightly on the land."

Developers, environmentalists and local government representatives j lauded the decision.

If the program works, it will be "a model that can be used on a national level," said Joel Reynolds of the Natural Resources Defense Council, which sued the state of California to protect the bird and petitioned the federal government to put it on the endangered species list.

The idea behind Babbitt's plan is to avoid eventual litigation over land use that typically comes when developers clash with the government and environmentalists over saving species from extinction. The clashes lead to "train wrecks" such as the current quagmire over

the northern spotted owl in the Pacific Northwest. Monica Florion, senior vice president for the Irvine Co., said her industry sees the approach as economic good sense. She said it is worth it to give up some land to avoid future lengthy delays.

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Colorado city will join study of Amtrak run

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — The Colorado Springs City Council has agreed to contribute \$5,000 to a feasibility study which could result in an Amtrak route with a stop here.

The \$100,000 study will review the possibility of a 1,000-mile Amtrak route from Denver to El Paso, Texas. The line would include the cities of Albuquerque and Las Cruces, N.M., and might be served by Amtrak trains known as the Zephyr, the Southwest Chief or the Pioneer.

The study, required by the U.S. Department of Transportation, is mostly funded by cities and states on the route.

Colorado Springs' contribution buys a seat on a steering committee, which will hire a consulting firm and makes decisions later on schedules should the route become a reality, according to city transportation director Dave Zelenok.

The Amtrak route would use existing rail lines and equipment, but ultimately may run trains which can travel at speeds up to 100 miles per hour, Zelenok said.

Only seven of Amtrak's 42 rail lines make money now, according to the agency's budget information, and losses on the proposed route are likely.

Amtrak has been subsidized with more than \$16 billion in federal money since 1970. The rail carrier offers to cover up to 30 percent of the Denver-El Paso route's losses, but won't pay more than \$1 million a year.

Trinity atomic blast site will be open to public

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE (AP) — The site of the world's first atomic bomb explosion will be open to the public April 3.

Trinity Site, on this restricted military range, is open twice a year — on the first Saturday in April and the first Saturday in October.

The site is located on the northern end of the 3,200-square-mile missile range, between Carrizozo and Socorro.

Trinity Site encompasses ground zero, where the atomic bomb was placed on a 100-foot steel tower and exploded on July 16, 1945, and the McDonald ranch house where the plutonium core for the bomb was assembled.

The missile range displays historical photographs and a bomb casing at ground zero, but there are no ceremonies or speakers for the tour.

Visitors for the April 3 tour may enter the range through the Stallion Range Center five miles south of U.S. 380, east of San Antonio. Visitors also may travel with an escorted caravan leaving the Otter County Fairgrounds in Alamogordo at 8 a.m.

Cameras are allowed at the site, but pictures may not be taken elsewhere on the range.



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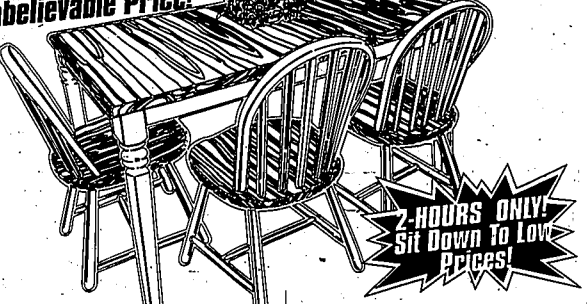
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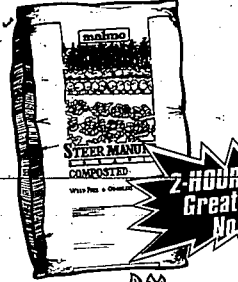


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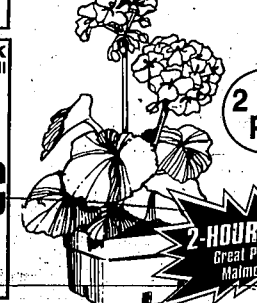

2 low-budget films challenge 3 big-buck movies for top honors

LOS ANGELES — Independent producers challenge studio power at the 65th annual Academy Awards ceremonies Monday night, with the low-budget "Howards End" and "The Crying Game" pitted against three major, big-buck movies.

The two British-made movies have attracted the most talk, but there were predictions that the 4,639 Academy voters might consider the homemade product more worthy for best picture. If so, the Oscar could be bestowed on Warner Bros. "Unforgiven," Columbia's "A Few Good Men" or Universal's "Scent of a Woman." Billy Crystal will be repeating his role as emcee of the telecast, which has been titled "Oscar Celebrates Women and the Movies." Starting time: 7 p.m. MST, on channels 6 and 35 in the Twin Falls area.

No show-in nominees appeared among the performers. Clint Eastwood appeared the sentimental favorite, his steel-hard gunslinger in "Unforgiven" marking the peak of an enduring career. Eastwood won the Directors Guild of America award on March 6 for his direction of "Unforgiven."

Al Pacino, winner of the Golden Globe as best dramatic actor in "Scent of a Woman," got strong support. So did newcomer Stephen Rea, the anguished IRA member in "The Crying Game."

Two actors playing real-life people also figured in the race: Robert Downey Jr. for "Chaplin" and Denzel Washington for "Malcolm X."

Emma Thompson, Anthony Hopkins' second wife in "Howards End," has won most of the critics' awards and appears the favorite for best actress. But the competition was strong from Catherine Deneuve in "Indochine"; Mary McDonnell, "Passion Fish"; Michelle Pfeiffer, "Love Field," and Susan Sarandon, "Lorenzo's Oil."

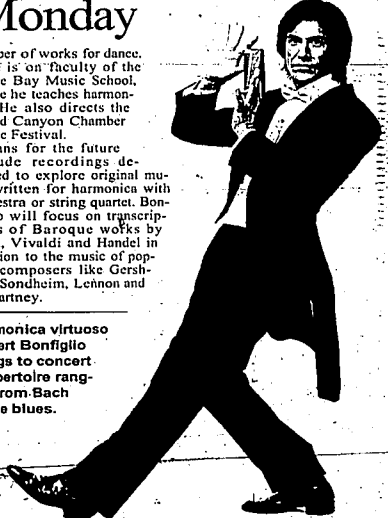

Back from hiatus, Bon Jovi revitalizes its future with songs marking the past

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Jon Bon Jovi stood backstage, his million-watt smile toned down to about a thousand. He's cropped his streaked-blond "mud hair" to a collar-grazing length, an apparent nod to turning 30. And he and his wife, Dorothea Hurley, are expecting their first child in May.

Bon Jovi's back, and so is his eponymous band. The group's new album, "Keep the Faith," displays the members' maturity — and rejuvenated attitude — about their careers.

The group scored big-time with the 13-million-plus-selling 1986 album "Slippery When Wet" and its 9-million-selling 1988 follow-up, "New Jersey." But after a grueling, eight-year-pace of making albums and touring (the last tour in 1988-89 spanned 16 months and 237 dates), the New Jersey band members took time off and went their separate ways.

"I had the opportunity not to consider that (previous success) at all," Bon Jovi said backstage at the Spectrum before a concert. "I had nothing to prove. All I had to do was make a record that I felt had something to say in order for me to want to release it," he said. "A guy told me here that this is the 11th time I've played here (the Spectrum). How many times do you have to play the Spectrum before you're fulfilled? How many more No. 1 anything's do you have to have before you're fulfilled?"

"You have to be successful, but you have to be successful for yourself. You don't have to be successful on someone else's terms."

During the band's hiatus, the singer (real name: John Bongiovi) put out a solo project, the soundtrack to the film "Young Guns II" — the No. 1 single "Blaze of Glory" from that album earned him a Golden Globe award in 1991 and a Grammy nomination.

Guitarist Richie Sambora also threw his trademark broad-brimmed black hat into the solo arena with his album, "Stranger in This Town." Keyboardist David Bryan scored the film "Netherworld." Bassist Alec John Such and drummer Tico Torres basically just said, "I'm done."

"Keep the Faith," the band's fifth album, is full of the most soul-searching music Bon Jovi has done, from the optimistic title track that describes, as Bon Jovi said, a man asking forgiveness for his mistakes, to "Dry County," based on a cross-country motorcycle trip Bon Jovi took during the band's time off.

"The most agonizing song on 'Keep the Faith' is the ballad, 'Bed of Roses,' which describes the challenge of creativity, how difficult it can be for a songwriter to get the words out. It, too, begs forgiveness, this time for needing to perform at the cost of being away from loved ones."

"The hell that creativity sometimes brings you, 99 out of a hundred times, you close the notebook and just walk away from it," he said.

"That time, I decided to write down, 'I'm having a hard time getting it out.' ... I was in the midst of a hell of a hangover at a rather gray period in my life, trying to say something that you're not always at ease saying."

"But some tracks, such as 'I'll Sleep When I'm Dead' and 'Blame It on the Love of Rock 'n' Roll,' echo less weighty, old material, such as 'Bad Medicine' from 'New Jersey' or 'Social Disease' from 'Slippery When Wet.'"

It's crucial, said Sambora, to keep that balance between experimenting with new ideas and keeping true to your signature sound.

"You can't, as an artist, ignore your past history. 'Cause it's a very important road that led you to get to this point," said the genial Sambora.

Stretched out on a backstage couch with his feet up, he's loose and easygoing, clad in a colorful shirt and jeans and his usual hat.

"You don't want to leave those people (older fans) in the dust. So you have to make a record that is new, yet has a lot of the same old characteristic in it so people are familiar with it — especially when we've just come back from a break," he said.

He called "Keep the Faith" optimistic.

"There's a lot of darkness that's happening in the world right now," he said, "so people got scared, and, I think, so did we. We wanted to go, 'Yes, we realize it is dark out there, but if you don't keep your chin up and keep the faith, you're not going to get through this point.'"

Sambora said the band didn't try to dispel the breakup rumor, which he says the British press started.

"Jon and I are like oil and water sometimes, but that's what makes our chemistry so exciting," he said.

"We're allowed to have disagreements, and I guess the British press must have gotten a hold of some disagreements. They did the classic 'Mick and Keith guitar play-off, lead singer (thing),' he said, with a mock Cockney twang.

"They could have come up with something a little more exciting, but we were so tired at the end of the ('New Jersey') tour and we figured it was free press; so we let it go."

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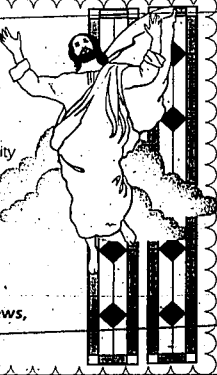

"Mr. Baseball." In this predictable, marginally entertaining, culture-clash comedy, Tom Selleck stars as an earnest, lazy American baseball player who's traded to an uptight Japanese team. Naturally, both the player and the team do some things wrong during the pennant race. Unless you're a Selleck fan, don't bother.

"Mediocrano." This Italian entry won't last year's foreign-language film Oscar, but does of movies were better than this pleasant, heart-warming little comedy about Italian soldiers stuck on a Greek island during World War II. Acting and script just passable.

"Candyman." An unusual horror film in two respects: The killer, a bloodthirsty demon (Tony Todd) who hacks up victims with a hook, is black and the setting is a Chicago ghetto. Otherwise, it's slow, fairly routine gorefest. The only plus is Virginia Madsen's campy performance as a blonde heroine.

"Solar Crisis." Charlton Heston and Jack Palance turn up in this unreleased 1989 science-fiction thriller. Tim Matheson plays Heston's grandson and Peter Boyle is the chief bad guy in this end-of-the-world thriller set in 2050. The movie appears to carry no director's credit.

"Nickie & Dime." PG-rated comedy starring C. Thomas Howell as a con artist whose small fortune is impounded.

'The Crying Game:' 1 movie in a million

THE CRYING GAME (R). The less said about the latest film from writer-director Neil Jordan the better; it is a sophisticated entertainment where the ground is constantly shifting under your feet and too much foreboding can be a dangerous thing. Set in Northern Ireland and starring Forest Whitaker, Miranda Richardson, Stephen Rea and newcomer Jaye Davidson, this romantic thriller is never predictable but always honest and thoroughly enjoyable. See it now or forever be sorry (Twin Cinema).

A FAR OFF PLACE (PG). A shimmeringly beautiful classic trek picture, set largely in the Kalahari desert; a sophisticated, intensely visual treatment of a traditional adventure tale. With Reese Witherspoon, Ethan Randall, Sarel Bok, Jack Thompson and Maximilian Schell (Twin Cinema).

A FEW GOOD MEN (R). A brisk and familiar courtroom drama of the old school, as enjoyable as it is predictable, and boasting a pair of pure star-power performances by Jack Nicholson and Tom Cruise. Centered around a murder trial inside a military courtroom, "Men" is essentially fun and simple, a commodity that has unaccountably become rarer. And nobody but nobody can raise their eyebrows quite like Jack (Twin Cinema).

FIRE IN THE SKY (PG-13). Based on the experience of Arizona logger Travis Walton, who claimed to be abducted by aliens, this plodding UFO thriller doesn't play up the thrill of the genre. It's doggedly serious about convincing us when it would have done better to just entertain us. (Twin Cinema).

GROUNDHOG DAY (PG). Though endearing is not an adjective often associated with the abrasive Bill Murray, it fits this gentle, small-scale romantic comedy about a cranky weatherman who is forced to relive the same Feb. 2, over and over again until he gets it right. Co-starring Andie MacDowell and directed by Harold Ramis, "Groundhog" is initially too heavy on Hollywood schtick, but once the obvious laughter is over, it may just make you smile (Twin Cinema).

UNFORGIVEN (R). Working at the top of his form as both an actor and a director, Clint Eastwood has turned out a Western for the ages. Simultaneously heroic and nihilistic, reeking of myth but modern as they come, it resonates with the spirit of films past while staking out a territory quite its own. In addition to Eastwood's work, it features splendid acting from Gene Hackman, Morgan Freeman and Richard Harris, as well as an exceptional television script from David Webb Peoples. Saddle up or get out of the way (Jerome Cinema).

Turtles 3-quel a real treat for youngsters

"They may not follow the 'Rocky' road (five movies) or go where 'Star Trek' has gone before (six movies), but the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles just joined 'The Godfather' in the land of three-quals. Now showing on screens everywhere is 'Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles III: The Turtles Are Back ... In Time.'

Cowabunga. Actually, nobody says "cowabunga" in "Turtles III." Furthermore, there's no Shredder, no Foot Clan and nobody delivering pizzas. This is pretty refreshing for a Ninja Turtles film. Are you sure we're in the right theater? Better call the roll. Michaelangelo? Here. Raphael? Yo, Donatello. I'm in. Leonardo? Yeah, April? Here. Master Splinter? Who can say which among us is truly present. ... Looks like we're in the right

place. And isn't that glib with the hockey stick Casey Jones (Elias Koteas) from the first Ninja Turtle movie? But who are all those dudes wearing costumes from Elizabethan England and 17th-Century Japan? Is this "Sir Walter-Raleigh Meets the Seven Samurai?" Well, sort of. In "Turtles III," our heroes are teleported to Japan in 1603, while a similar number of Japanese warriors are teleported to contemporary New York.

"Hey, dudes! Check it out; we're in 'Shogun,'" says one of the Turtles, in a line well above the heads of the movie's main audience, people whose ages are in the single digits.

The Turtles and April (Paige Turco) try to resolve matters between feudal warlord Norinaga (Sab Shimono) and Princess Miho's (Vivian Wu) rebels in the mountains. As used here, the term "resolve" means to hit, kick, chop and duel with swords. As in previ-

ous Ninja Turtle films, there is an abundance of acrobatic, carefully choreographed martial arts movement, but no blood or gore. The average hockey game is more violent. Speaking of hockey, those 17th-century Japanese warriors teleported to the Turtles' home beneath New York become big fans of hockey on TV. And the Brits in rutlies? They are low-life munitions dealers selling weapons to Lord Norinaga and willing to kill all the prisoners in his dungeon.

By shifting the action away from New York, director and screenwriter Stuart Gillard has added some much-needed outdoorsiness to the Turtles' canon. The costumes and sets appear to have been created with concern for authenticity and several characters have been given room to do more than grunt and grime.

Compared to real movies, "Turtles III" is no masterpiece. But unlike the awful "Turtles I" and slightly less awful "Turtles II," "Turtles III" is a rather diverting 90 minutes for young moviegoers.

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An Oscar would make his day

LAS VEGAS — Clint Eastwood's latest schedule breakdown occurs the moment he steps out of his limousine at the side entrance to Billy's Grand Hotel.

After having his afternoon plans thrown off by a luncheon that went on a hour longer than expected, the idea had been to find a quiet place to finish an interview before the start of the National Association of Theater Owners' annual awards dinner, at which he is being honored as director of the year for "Unforgiven."

But suddenly, he's being schmoozed by one of the hotel managers, then hustled off to a reception he knew nothing about.

Eastwood glances at his longtime publicist, Marco Barla, and at Joe Hyams, the Warner Bros. executive who looks after Eastwood's Malpaso Productions, and their eyes all seem to glint in midair. What reception? But there are no complaints as the slick-hot man in the white dinner jacket whisks Eastwood's entourage down a long hallway and into a room filled with Hollywood bigwigs and a few star-struck high rollers who are presumably guests of Billy's.

Before he can get a drink in his hand, the intricacies are drawn from their holsters and Eastwood is gunned down in a hail of flashing bulbs, before he can make his escape to a quiet corner of a restaurant.

"I hate to disappoint people," says Eastwood who is being honored for a movie in which he plays William Munny, out of Missouri, "a man of notoriously vicious and inopportune disposition." "But those flashes were making me blurry."

Other than the surprise photo op, this kitschy convention of theater operators is friendly business for Eastwood. He has attended many of them before, and was honored as the association's "Star of the Decade" almost 10 years before returning as its director of the year. At the Warner Bros. lunch earlier

in the day, Eastwood thanked the exhibitors for supporting him when few critics did, and their loud standing ovation suggested that they took both his thanks and his success personally.

It is a contagious feeling these days. Suddenly, everyone in a Clint Eastwood fan.

The rangy star seems to have arrived at a moment of high emotional drama rare even for Hollywood. Whether he wins any Academy Awards Monday night, he has already been to the mountain. After 30 years of box-office stardom, after 23 years of directing and producing, after three decades of being ignored or overlooked in America as a serious filmmaker, he has dazzled them all.

"Unforgiven," his revisionist Western about alcoholism, violence and the romantic Outlaw Myth, was a hit with critics, moviegoers and the film Establishment, three groups who often seem to have little in common. Eastwood and "Unforgiven" were named director and picture of the year by the Los Angeles Film Critics Association and the National Society of Film Critics, and before heading over to Las Vegas for the NATO award, he picked up the prestigious feature directing award from the Directors Guild of America.

The DGA award makes Eastwood the odds-on favorite to win the Oscar for best director as well, and he could take home second and third statuettes as producer and star of "Unforgiven." In a competition where strained analysis is the rule, the case for Eastwood makes itself.

A more enduring star than either Gary Cooper or John Wayne, he has never been nominated before, or even been given one of those dubious career achievement "thank you" plaques.

He is the last of the great Western heroes, and the only modern director to keep that most American of all movie genres alive. He is respected by the film Establishment for his budget restraint and business sense, and by other filmmakers for his independence.

Eastwood's only known enemy, in a business where enmity is a by-product of success, is Sondra Locke, the plaintiff in an angry palimony suit a few years back. And despite all those steely, tough-talking killing machines he has portrayed on screen, he has the reputation of being one of the industry's gentlest and most respected figures.

"Anybody who has ever worked with him knows he is a total professional and a decent man," says Robert Daly, chairman of Warner Bros. Pictures. "When you work with him, you walk away feeling good about it."

To all of these sentimental elements, add the fact that "Unforgiven" is a huge box-office hit and regarded by many as the finest classical Western to come along since perhaps John Ford's 1956 "The Searchers," and you have an irresistible opportunity to make up for past sins and celebrate a legend. Ask Eastwood how he feels about any of this, or how he likes his chances for the Oscars, and his eyes drift off to some other part of the restaurant. You get the sense he might have preferred a question about Sondra Locke, or his golf game.

"Just kind of surprised and pleased by the whole thing," he finally says. "You don't know how a movie's going to be accepted. This one seems to have taken on a life of its own."

Prod him a little. Remind him that only two Westerns — the 1932 "Cimarron" and Kevin Costner's 1990 "Dances With Wolves" — have won the Academy Award for best picture, and that only Costner, in what may be the most dumbfounding footnote in Oscar history, has won for directing a Western. Not Ford, Howard Hawks, John Sturges, Fred Zinnemann or George Stevens. How do you figure? "Americans are famous for overlooking their own art forms," says Eastwood. "The Western movie has had great moments of popularity in film history. It seemed that at one time it was so mainstream, people wouldn't take it seriously."

If you take movies seriously, you have to laugh at the Oscars

LOS ANGELES — The Oscar is only gold-plated.

And so are the Academy Awards. Like the statuette, the glittering annual ceremony coasts by on cheap sparkle and gilt. Underneath the veneer, it's made of baser stuff.

But that's why we watch it. Forget art. We tune in to see what ugly dress Kim Basinger is going to wear this year, and what Billy Crystal is going to say about it. We watch it to see what sad old star is going to stumble out for a nearly posthumous tribute. We sit at home, peering at those five little faces as the winner is announced, hoping to see something Hollywood rarely show us anymore — naked, ugly, unguarded emotion.

And like it or not most of us watch the Academy Awards some of them, at least — every year. The Oscars aren't as corrupt as they could be — although the academy, unlike most civilized societies, does give studio executives and publicity flacks the vote. Nor are they as unceremoniously silly as they might be, even if they have seen fit to honor Red Buttons and "You Light Up My Life."

But the Oscars are still, fundamentally, a joke. You can argue that Peter Finch really gave a better performance in 1976's "Network" than loser Robert De Niro gave in "Taxi Driver." Maybe you think 1982's "Gandhi" was a better-directed film than "E.T." — the Extra-terrestrial!

But do you think history has proven that "The Greatest Show on Earth" was the best film of 1952? (Well, perhaps. Until you consider that "Singing in the Rain" and "The Man in the White Suit" weren't even nominated.) And when was the last time you rented "The Great Ziegfeld" (best picture, 1936), "Oliver!" (best picture, 1968) or "Kramer vs. Kramer" (best picture, 1979)?

The Academy Awards aren't about talent. They're about money, with just enough intangibles (studio loyalty, likability, sympathy) thrown in to keep us watching. They honor stodgy documentaries few people have ever seen, ignore controversial

one everyone has talked about, give awards to three-hour epics no one can sit through and shun pictures critics and audiences have adored. They make about as much sense as Jack Palance.

But then, to understand the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences ("What art? What science?") one filmmaker sniped, you have to understand how it began.

It began as a sweetheart union for the studio bosses — which, in those late-'20s, pre-talkie days, meant the men who ran Warner Bros., Paramount and MGM. There was new talk of guilds and unions in Hollywood, and the men who ran that company town didn't like it. To head off the organizing, Louis B. Mayer of MGM promoted a motion-picture association that would arbitrate contract disputes and negotiate working conditions. It would be controlled, of course, by the people who knew the most about those issues — the studio heads. Almost as an af-

terthought, the new academy decided to give out annual awards.

And so the Oscars were born. Moguls awarded obedient employees and got free publicity. Winners were decided by a powerful few. Honors were shared equitably.

The Academy Awards continued in this cozy way for a while. But stars began to balk. When Betty Davis wasn't even nominated for a bravura performance in a film her studio didn't want her to do — 1934's "Of Human Bondage" — the discontent grew louder.

The academy gave the best actress Oscar to Davis the next year for another, lesser performance in the studio-sanctioned "Dangerous" — see what you get for being a good girl? — but the damage was done.

Labor troubles only added to the strife, and some performers boycotted the 1935 ceremonies.

Eventually the studios withdrew, reluctantly, from the union-organizing business and the Academy Awards took over the academy. And

as other studios came to power — Columbia, 20th Century Fox, the independent Selznick and Goldwyn and even the B-movie Universal and Republic — it became harder for just a handful of men to control. With the advent of TV broadcast in the '50s, the Academy Awards took on a life, and profit, of their own. They couldn't be rigged anymore.

At least, not as obviously.

But the Oscars follow their own logic.

To begin with, the academy's roughly 4,000 members don't reflect the people making and watching today's movies. Membership isn't automatic — you have to be nominated, and accepted — and many members

joined years ago, back when Julie Andrews had a career. Some haven't been on a film set in decades. A number don't vote. Others don't care. One film producer — a major player, who's packaged three of the industry's biggest hits and worked in Hollywood for more than 50 years — routinely gives his ballot to his wife. She has a lot of fun filling it out, she tells friends, and she knows she's not alone.

the game."

Not playing the game, in Hollywood, means making already insecure people even more insecure. The three cardinal sins: admitting publicly that you're talented, insulting "the industry" or living in New York. (Which is why Woody Allen's win as best director for 1977's "Annie Hall" was truly surprising.)

That exception noted, Hollywood hews to those unwritten rules as if they were inscribed on stone tablets above the Polo Lounge. John Cassavetes was too edgy and New York to ever win; Steven Spielberg is still too young and rich.

The commandments aren't clear. "Malcolm X" may be no worse or no better than "Gandhi," but Richard Attenborough works within the system. Spike Lee doesn't. Gandhi made Hollywood liberals comfortable. Malcolm X didn't. So "Gandhi" wins a slew of Oscars and Lee doesn't even get a directing nomination.

Lee's in good company. Stanley Kubrick never won an Oscar. Neither did Roman Polanski. Or Sam Peckinpah. Or Martin Scorsese. Or Alfred Hitchcock.

In the 1958 awards — a year that Hitchcock's work in "Vertigo" and "Wells" in "Touch of Evil" went unacknowledged — the best directing Oscar was given to Vincent Minnelli for "Gigi," a paean to Parisian jill-bait. The 1968 directing award went to Carol Reed for "Oliver!" Kubrick had to content himself with a nomination for "2001." Polanski's "Rosemary's Baby" didn't even get a nod.

My first thought was that Hendrix was one of the few rockers who might be in the same ballpark as Mozart, say. Certainly, she wouldn't say that Mozart was a guy thing, would she?

And supposing I, as a guy, had suggested that women couldn't appreciate Hendrix? Not that I would, of course. You would think that good music would be inherently good, the way that Plato, another guy, would have it. Even Joni Mitchell, a gal (if you will), has said, "A good piece of art should be androgynous."

Gender isn't superficial. The plumbing difference alone (forget about sexuality and culturally ordained roles) makes our physical experience of life fundamentally alien to the opposite sex. And physical experience conditions the mind to some extent.

Whether by nurture or nature, men and women seem to hear music — especially jazz and pop — differently. Critics tend to write off these differences, but marketers don't. Many of the performers most popular with women — from Michael Bolton to Billy Ray Cyrus — are the ones most maligned by critics. Many of those most popular with men — from The Who to Hendrix — are

those that critics hold up as visionary and wonderful.

Women determine pop stardom. Men determine which stars do significant work.

Guys can enjoy Hendrix all they want, and his records will sell well. However, if the mass of women enjoy Hendrix the way that men do, he would be as big as Elvis Presley by now.

Think about it. Presley, Frank Sinatra, The Beatles and Michael Jackson were "gal things" — pop stars who most guys had to be dragged to kicking and screaming. When guys admitted to their strengths, these pop stars became significant guy things.

When Bruce Springsteen, a prototypical guy thing, made himself into a gal thing on "Born in the U.S.A.," he suddenly quadrupled his sales. There's no denying that sex appeal is a big part of what sells male stars to women. Gender identification usually sells female stars to women and male stars to men.

However, it's the rare woman who exploits sex appeal and gets the ear of the critics.

With notable exceptions — such as Mitchell, k.d. lang and Bonnie Raitt — women performers today seem to have little choice but to exploit their sex appeal as much as or more than their musicianship.

When you see a Wilson Phillips video, why do they always hide plump Carmen Wilson? When you see a Madonna video, why does she hide nothing?

Bob Dylan once complained to Rolling Stone magazine about female performers' tendency to exploit sexiness. When asked if even someone like Mitchell did that, he said, "Well, no. But then, Joni Mitchell is almost like a man."

He laughed, and then added that he wasn't saying women shouldn't be performers. In fact, the question came up because he was talking about how much he disliked the sexually charged stage style of Mick Jagger.

Maybe the male dominance of music criticism and performance has kept women from the limelight. But does lack of opportunity alone explain the dearth of "significant" female composers?

Controversial culture critic Camille Paglia, a woman, has suggested that there are no women Mozarts because men and women differ in areas besides plumbing — such as aggression. "There is no female Mozart," she wrote, "because there is no female Jack the Ripper."

(Hendrix's guitar sounded like the ripper and felt like Mozart.) Even the notion of Mozart's of Hendrix's significance — in this case, a ranking of achievement — could be seen as a guy thing.

Isn't it just like keeping the "stats" in sports? Just some silly prattle that guys like to argue about at lunch?

In the movie "Diner," which is mostly about what guys argue about at lunch and what it means to them, one guy makes his prospective bride take a sports trivia test before he will

marry her. Another of the "Diner" guys complains that he can always tell when his wife has been listening to Michael Burns, because she always mistakes him. This happens no matter how often he explains his filing system. She doesn't understand why that's important.

Some time ago, after I wrote a story about a social issue, a woman wrote me to ask why I wasted my time with music when I was able to write about important things. (Maybe I should have answered, "It's a guy thing.")

When we do look back at women who deeply affected the course of a music, the primary list is from blues and jazz: Bessie Smith, Billie Holiday and Sarah Vaughan. Then a few from country, rock and pop, such as Maybelle Carter, Kitty Wells, Patsy Cline, Janis Joplin and Judy Garland.

When they go, Ella Fitzgerald, Aretha Franklin and Barbra Streisand probably will belong on that list, too.

All are known primarily as singers, although a few are known for their songwriting as well.

And there's the rub. Most male musical icons, like Hendrix, are known for creating rather than interpreting. That may be why Mitchell "is almost like a man." So are Laurie Anderson, Elizabeth Swaydos and Tracy Chapman.

Women musicians faced a lot of prejudice in the past, and most still do. Yet female musicians are making inroads all the time.

There are many jazz soloists making themselves heard, at the piano (fall voice, the second most likely instrument for women) and on horns and guitars.

More than likely, most of them don't think Hendrix was a guy thing at all.

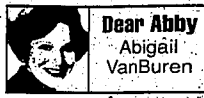

3-song set wasn't enough for Cream, bassist says

Trio blocks out time in summer for 'projects,' possible tour

You read it here first: Watch for a Cream reunion.

At the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame ceremony in January, Eric Clapton, Jack Bruce and Ginger Baker played together publicly for the first time in almost 25 years.

The three-song set "was not quite long enough for me," Bruce said. "I felt just the same except better in a way. I could actually hear what Eric was playing. In the old days they didn't have monitors and stuff."

Apparently the brief set wasn't enough for Clapton or Baker, either. Since then, they've been talking. Bruce, 49, is on a short solo tour supporting his new album, "Some-things." Baker is touring with his new group, Masters of Reality.

Clapton's been everywhere doing everything, including finishing his yearly stand at Royal Albert Hall.

But there's some time mysteriously blocked out on the calendar later in the summer for "projects," as Bruce put it.

"There is some talk about it, but it's not really something I can go into in any great detail," Bruce said. "But we are talking to each other, which is nice." In a word, he said, a Cream regrouping is "promising."

It's also a miracle that it's even possible, given the trio's well-documented abuses.

While most at the Hall of Fame ceremony laughed when Bruce said the best thing about Cream is they're all still alive, he was quite serious. "It's true. From the British bands that were successful in the '60s, I've been wracking my brain to think of a band where all the members are still with us," Bruce said. The Beatles, Stones, Who — all could never reunite. Not only have Cream members stayed alive, they've stayed working and vital.

"We all just started off to be musicians rather than pop stars or anything like that," Bruce said. "I've kept on working, and I'm still in love with the music."

And while he plays keyboards and even cello on his new, eclectic release, Bruce has never forsaken his

first love. "I've fooled around with guitars and so on, but I'm a bass player who can sing a bit," Bruce said. "The instrument you choose to play is very much part of you."

Schools take turns decorating area library

TWIN FALLS — First-grader Krista Gambrel can't wait for her kite and her paper jerepchaun to go on display at the Twin Falls Public Library next week.

"She thinks it is exciting that people who don't even know her will see her art," said Erin Becker, Krista's teacher at Immanuel Lutheran School. "The kids all seem to be really proud of what they've done."

During April, Immanuel students will display dry seed mosaics, woven paper creations, watercolors and Lenten silhouettes. It's their month at the library, and Immanuel is one of several Twin Falls schools participating in the new program sponsored by the Magic Valley Arts Council.

Each month, a different school — including public, private and home schools — takes a turn producing a children's art exhibit in the Kiva area on the lower level of the library.

Since it began in February, the exhibit has drawn a lot of interest, librarian Judy Davis said.

"The children love it," she said. "They love to bring their parents in, and grandma, so everyone can see what they've been doing in school."

So far, Davis said, exhibits from the St. Edward's Catholic School and Perrine Elementary School have included a mask with fish hooks in it, bridges made with loops of colored paper, picture collages made from magazine articles and Valentine cards.

"Each class has come up with different ideas that they've presented," she said. "Some of those were just wonderful."

The idea for this ongoing art display was a brainstorm, said Laurie Wagner, co-chairwoman of the Magic Valley Arts Council's Arts in Education Committee.

"We thought it would be great to let the children's art have more exposure so the public can enjoy and see how creative the kids are," she explained. "We decided the Kiva room would be the perfect place."

Response has been terrific, Wagner said, adding, "We've had great feedback."

Schools sign up in advance and, so far, the schedule is filled at least for the next six months. Morningside Elementary School will have the display in May, with Sawtooth in June, Twin Falls Christian Academy in July, Kids Art in the Park in August, Ageless Christian School in October and Acorn Learning Center in February 1994.

Wagner said she hopes the program will continue for years to come.

The best part of this art exhibit, she said, is that it gives children — especially those who do not excel in academics — a chance to feel pride and self-esteem.

"When they see their things on the wall," Davis said, "they think, 'Hey, I might be pretty good at this,' and it's possible they may see they can go on and do other things."

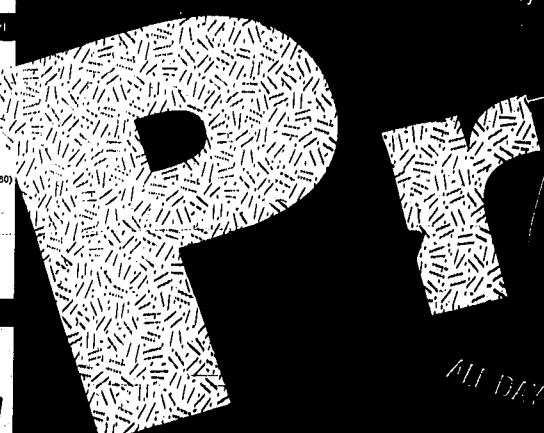

"We got some big plays at the end, so give our squad credit for a team victory."

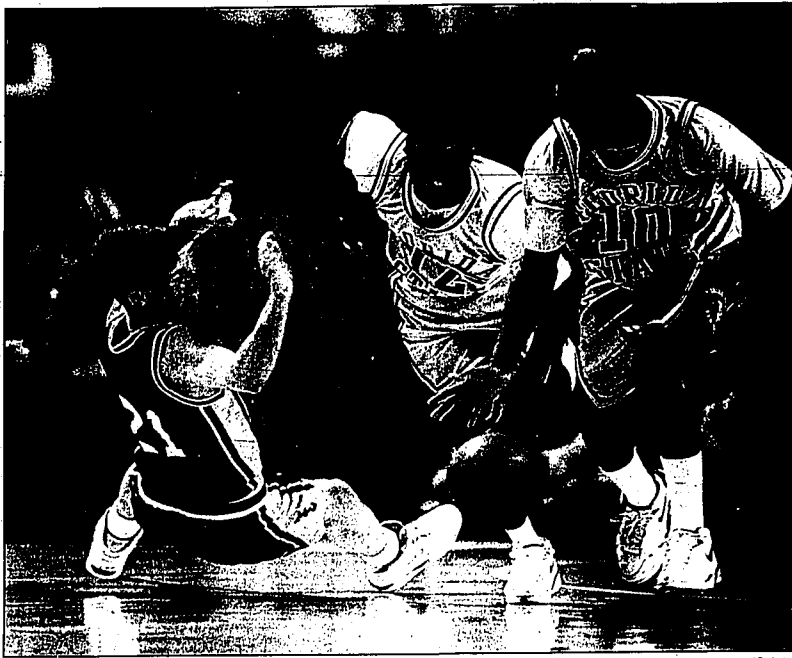
Trailing for most of the second half, the Seminoles took the lead, 68-67, with 2:18 left when Sam Cassell managed to make one of two free throws.

The Hoosiers made 28 of 45 shots from the field, most on layups as the screens and short passes of the motion offense befuddled Louisville.

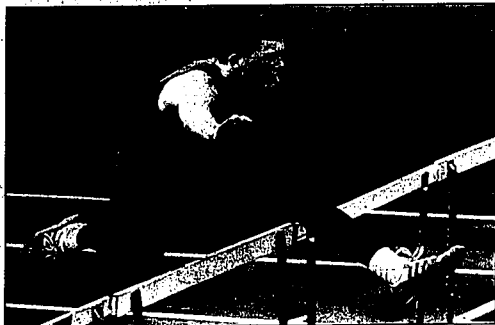

He's currently trying to discover that with a stay in the family cabin on Big Wood River that includes some early-morning steelhead fishing below Stanley.

But it isn't hard to say what Trenkle doesn't like.

Before leaving on that trip, the man who may or may not be back at the CSI helm next year, said "I don't want to see a war (of letters) in the newspaper."

Despite all the hubbub that boils around the article that was published in North Idaho, Trenkle says fans must understand that the current situation was going to happen with or without a national championship, with or without controversy.

"I only wanted to coach a whole year without controversy and then make a

decision (that would be) best for me and my family."

He noted that without the intrusion by the North Idaho article in the late season, he would have had that. He currently would be fishing and deciding on what he wanted to do next year. And no one would know a darned thing about it except CSI President Jerry Meyerhoefer.

"Trenkle's options are simple: leave the

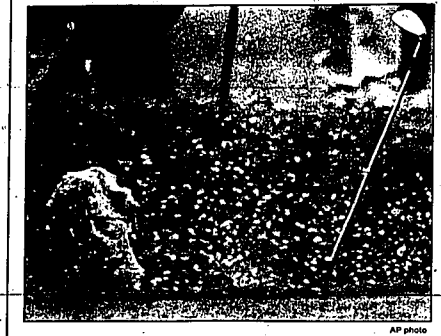

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Hot-shooting Rex Walters outplayed freshman sensation Jason Kidd and helped Kansas end California's golden trip through the NCAA tournament. Walters scored 24 points and was 4 for 5 from 3-point range as second-seeded Kansas beat the sixth-seeded Bears 93-76 in the NCAA Midwest Regional semifinals Thursday night. Kansas hit 8 of 11 3-pointers overall. The Jayhawks (28-6) will play top-seeded Indiana (31-3) in the regional final Saturday night in Indianapolis. Louisville 82-69 in Thursday's earlier semifinal. Kansas defeated Indiana 74-69 Dec. 5 in Indianapolis.

Walters, who made 8 of 9 shots overall, has saved his best for the tournament. He's averaged 14.2 points, but he had 23 points in the first round against Ball State, then 28 against Brigham Young. In the three games he's combined 24 for 33 from the field, including 12 of 17 from 3-point range. Adonis Jordan added 15 points. Steve Woodberry had 13 — all in the second half — for Kansas. That was enough to stop California (21-9), which had been 11-1 since 29-year-old Todd Bozeman was named coach on Feb. 8, including victories over LSU and twice defending NCAA champion Duke in the tournament. Kidd did his best to put California into high gear with his uptempo play. Despite frequent double-teaming, he finished with 13 points, 11 assists and four turnovers before fouling out with 1:21 to play. That effort came close to his first

Veteran Wolverines instill taste for title in younger teammates

SEATTLE, Ariz. (AP) — Look, there's the locker room, where we stayed in. This is the hallway we walked down. This is where it all happened, the court, the arena, the roar of the crowd. Feel it, want it, take it. Michigan's seniors are taking their younger teammates on a tour of the huge Kingdom, where four years ago the Wolverines shocked Seton Hall and the nation to win the NBA championship. "It's important for us to drop little bread crumbs and say things like they can get excited," senior Rob Pelinka says as the Wolverines prepare to play Friday against George Washington. He is sitting beside sophomore Chris Webber, who was in high school in 1989 but came so close to knowing that feeling a year ago at the Final Four. "I think when we talk about it, they do pay attention," Pelinka says. "It's something they all want. There was joy and ecstasy and jubilation,

everyone smiling and hugging each other. When you get that feeling in your heart, it starts to pound a little faster. It's exciting to try to relate that feeling to the other guys on the team who haven't had the chance to win the championship like I have and Eric Riley has and like James (Voshell) has." Steve Fisher also pauses at that locker room door, memories flooding back. He was the skinny, ruddy-checked interim coach that year, taking over the team just before the tournament when Bill Frieder was fired. Hardly anyone knew Fisher — until his team won six in a row to take the championship. "I didn't have my pass (for the Kingdom) and they had to get verification to get me onto the floor," Fisher recalls. "So things change in a hurry." Fisher didn't need his naming for practice and won't need it this weekend. And, no one will be wondering

what these guys are and how they got this far. Michigan may be ranked No. 3, but no college in the country has better-known players than the team with the "Fab Five." This time their opponent in the West regional semifinals, George Washington, is the relative unknown — though not to Michigan. The Wolverines watched George Washington win twice in Tucson last week, and saw the power of 7-foot-1 freshman center Yinka Dare from Nigeria. "He poses numerous threats — shot-blocking, rebounding, inside scoring," says Webber, who will share with Juwan Howard and Eric Riley the duty of guarding Dare. "He's a great physical specimen. He has a body a lot of athletes just dream about. "I don't look at this as Yinka against Chris. I look at it as Michigan and George Washington. I have to worry about him and he has to worry about me."

Semifinal promises classic matchup

SEATTLE (AP) — The matchup seems a classic battle of strengths. Vanderbilt's superior shooters vs. Temple's intense zone defenders. When Vanderbilt (28-5) plays the Owls (19-12) Friday night in the semifinals of the NCAA West Regional, something has to give. Vanderbilt's superior shooting bolstered by a 50 percent shooting mark over the season, feel they can successfully attack the matchup zone that Temple coach John Chaney employs virtually all the time. "They're very athletic," Vanderbilt forward Bruce Elder said. "Their perimeter people are big and quick. They present a lot of problems for any offense out there. When a team plays as much zone as they do, they're going to force you to shoot from the outside. Fortunately, we feel like we're a pretty good shooting team." That's an understatement. The Commodores' motion offense has perplexed opponents and produced

open shots all-year long, leading to the kind of success few envisioned before the season began. Vanderbilt shoots 41 percent from 3-point range. The Commodores' floor leader and leading outside threat, Billy McCaffrey, is shooting 56 percent overall and has made 52 percent of his 3-pointers. "He gets off a shot faster than any guard I've seen in the country," Chaney said. Chaney, who has the Owls in the NCAA tournament for the ninth time in his 11 years at the Philadelphia school, said he's uncomfortably familiar with motion offenses like the one Vanderbilt uses so effectively. "We've seen it quite a lot," he said. "We've had a lot of problems with it. There's no question about it." McCaffrey, who transferred from Duke after the Blue Devils' 1991 national championship season because he wanted more playing

time and a bigger role, isn't the only scorer for the Commodores. Vanderbilt plays nine players and all five starters average in double figures. "They have a lot of guys who can shoot out at the perimeter," Temple's Aaron McKie said. "If we're not alert, they can hurt us early and easy." Although Chaney insists his team can't win on defense alone, that's definitely the Owls' strength. They've held teams to just under 41 percent shooting from the field and have 88 more steals than their opponents. "Not many teams play 40 minutes of defense in the East," Vanderbilt coach Eddie Fogler said. "It's much more aggressive than most zones you see, particularly in the East." "Some coaches say you run a man-to-man offense against it. I don't know if I agree with that, but I know you can't stand still." But, he said, "it's beatable. You can get good shots, you just have to be patient."

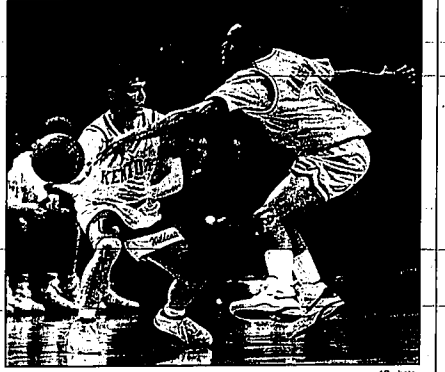

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Jamal Mashburn ended the showdown with Rodney Rogers barely after it started Thursday night, and Kentucky rode another wave of 3-point shooting to a 103-69 victory over Wake Forest in the NCAA Southeast Regional. Kentucky hit 16 3-pointers, the best performance in the NCAA tournament thus far. Duke hit 14 3-pointers in its first-round game against Southern Illinois. The Wildcats (29-3) beat an Atlantic Coast Conference school to reach Saturday's regional championship game. Just like last year, they'll have to beat an ACC member to reach the Final Four. Florida State took an 81-78 overtime victory over Western Kentucky in the other semifinal. Rogers and Mashburn hardly saw each other in the early stages: Wake Forest's premier player was guarded by Jared Prickett, a 6-foot-9 freshman, while Mashburn went head-to-head with Trellonice Owens. Rogers eventually had to sit down with three fouls, and suffer on the bench as the Demon Deacons faded from the NCAA tournament picture. Travis Ford hit 10 of 11 field goals in his five 3-pointers, for 26 points. Mashburn scored all of his 23 in the first half, hitting all five 3-pointers he tried. Dale

The Hoyas (19-12), shooting a season-best 62 percent, got 15 points from Robert Churchwell and advanced to the semifinals at New York's Madison Square Garden. The victory was Georgetown's second home triumph of the week; this one came at the Patriot Center, normally home to George Mason University. Georgetown blew the game open midway through the second half. With the Hoyas holding a 36-29 lead, freshman center Othella Harrington

fiercely rejected a 12-foot jumper by the Redskins' Scott Belyea. John Jacques came down with the 30-foot carom near midcourt and went all the way to the hoop where a charging call negated a layup. No matter how the play seemed to wake up the Hoyas, who put the game away by going on a 12-1 surge over the next seven minutes. The spurt, which featured a dunk by Harrington and three baskets by Churchwell, gave Georgetown a 48-30 lead with 5:20 remaining. In the meantime, a tough, pressure defense forced the Redskins, who shot 45 percent in the first half, to miss nine consecutive shots. They finished the game shooting 39 percent. The Hoyas also got 12 points from Harrington. Landon Hacklin had 14 points to pace the Redskins. The Hoyas, who sold out their tiny home gymnasium Tuesday in a victory over Texas-El Paso, moved Thursday's contest to the suburban Virginia campus to accommodate student ticket demands. On both occasions, the Capital Center, home to the Hoyas since the 1981-82 season, was being used for other events. Georgetown plays Alabama-Birmingham on Monday night in the quarterfinals. The NIT championship will be decided Wednesday night.

Razorbacks focus on Phelps' head

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — As the Carolina Tar Heels well paint a bull's eye on point guard Derrick Phelps for Friday night's NCAA tournament's East semifinal. That's because he'll be the target of Arkansas' pressure defense. "That's what the Razorbacks will focus on," Razorbacks coach Nolan Richardson said Thursday. "Cut off the head and the body will not survive. Phelps is the head for them, the one we've got to shut down. He's quick, slick and slushing." Phelps is also a little banged-up after bruising his back in the ACC tournament and then spraining it in practice on Monday. Phelps missed a couple of days of practice but worked out and seemed all right on Thursday. The Razorbacks will throw their press at the Tar Heels, employing the

defense they call "Forty Minutes of Hell." It helped Arkansas force 50 turnovers in the first two tournament games and 99 in its last four games. Arkansas led the SEC in steals with 346 and had 27 in the first two tournament games. Richardson's team plays a basketball version of survival of the fittest. "We have four guards who can handle the ball," guard Robert Shepherd said. "I Carolina wants to run, the Razorbacks will run. If the Tar Heels turn physical, Arkansas can deal with that, too." Richardson knows Carolina will have answers for the buzzsaw defense, especially with its size which starts with 7-foot, Eric Montross anchored under the basket. "They can throw the ball over our press," Richardson said. "The best

way to attack the press is to throw over it. Montross is about 8 feet tall. They're one of the biggest teams I've seen at the college level. They've got three 7-footers and one in a suit. That means he'll be there next year. I've never seen anything like that before. We'll try to bite them on the knee." Tar Heel senior George Lynch, no shrimp himself at 6-8, thought Richardson's anti-press strategy made a lot of sense for North Carolina. "Eric's a big target," Lynch said. "He's 7-foot tall and when he extends his arms, he's an easy target. And he does a great job seeing the court and seeing other teammates when he's double and triple-teamed." Tough presses are no big deal for the Tar Heels. They've seen them from Maryland, Florida State and Houston among others.

Cincinnati defense plans clampdown

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Cincinnati's trapping pressure defense has bolstered some of the best point guards in college basketball. It harassed Allan Houston of Tennessee and Anfernee Hardaway of Memphis State earlier this year, and last week it humbled top playmaker Sam Crawford of New Mexico State. And if you like to Cincinnati point guard Nick Van Exel, the defense is going to have Cory Alexander and Virginia (21-9) for dinner Friday night in the East Regional semifinals at the Meadowlands Arena. "We're going to eat him up just like we did Sam last weekend," Van Exel said after Thursday's practice.

Van Exel wasn't trying to be disrespectful to Alexander, but he said the Cavaliers of the ACC are not going to beat the Bearcats (26-4) of the Great Midwest Conference with one ballhandler against their tenacious traps. New Mexico State tried that in the second round of the NCAA tournament last weekend and got blasted 92-55 in a game that was all but over after eight minutes. The Bearcats built leads of 27-4 and 41-9. "If they only have one person who can handle the ball, they are not going to beat us," Van Exel said. "That's what they have, only one person who can handle the ball, New Mexico State had only one person.

Same with Memphis State. No one is going to beat us with one person. We just try to key down on that one person and make everybody else beat us." Besides Alexander, Virginia's other guard is Cornell Parker, a 6-foot-7 junior not known for his ballhandling. The Cavaliers might use backup guard Doug Smith to help handle the trapping press, but coach Jeff Jones likes to have Parker in the lineup. "I don't think this is an individual thing," Alexander said. "It's how we as a team do against the press. I can do a lot against the initial pressure but everyone is going to have to contribute."

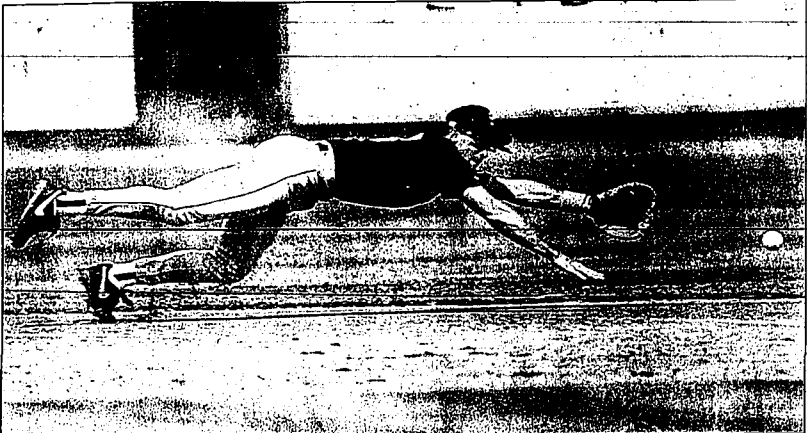

Spring training notes

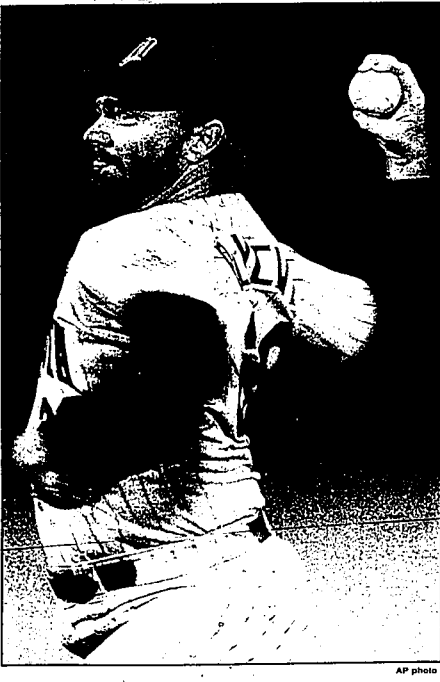

Francisco Cabrera suggests that no one enjoys baseball, even the rigors of spring training, more than he does. "I love baseball," says Atlanta's hero of last year's National League playoffs. "I enjoy everything about baseball." He even enjoys the autographing sessions before and after workouts and games. "I love communicating with the fans. I love to sign autographs," Cabrera said Thursday. "They come to see us play, pay a lot of money to see us put on a show. They deserve to be made happy if they want autographs." "I come from a poor family," added the 26-year-old native of the Dominican Republic. "We always learn to try to help other people." Now that he's assured of a job in the big leagues, Baltimore's Arthur Rhodes looks at baseball with a new perspective. "It's more fun now. I know that even if I have a bad game, I'll still be here," he said Thursday. "It sure makes it easier." Rhodes hasn't had too many bad outings since the Orioles recalled him from Triple-A Rochester on July 8. In 15 games he had a 7-5 record and a 3.63 ERA, and despite his late start, his 77 strikeouts ranked third among American League rookies. That earned him a permanent job as the fourth starter in the rotation. So instead of working to land a job, Rhodes is spending this spring working on such mundane things as fine-tuning his mechanics. "I came into spring training throwing the ball real good, so I just told myself to go out there and stay healthy," he said. Because he was a No. 1 draft pick, Greg Gohr knows he has to try harder. Much is expected of him by the Detroit Tigers. Yet sometimes he catches himself trying too hard. The man Gohr is trying to impress is Sparky Anderson. The Tigers' manager is a tough sell. Especially where hotshot rookies are concerned. For example, first baseman Rico Brogna, the No. 1 pick in the 1988 draft, was one of the first players Anderson cut this spring. Brogna now is likely to spend a long time at Toledo. "I don't want to be here," Gohr said. "I don't want to be here." Gohr, the top pick in 1989, doesn't want that to happen to him. And it probably won't. He appears to have earned a spot on the Tigers' 25-man roster. But not as a starter. The manager says Gohr will start out in the bullpen, seeking duty perhaps as a fifth starter. "It's hard not to have Toledo on your mind," Gohr said Thursday, after the Tigers were defeated 5-4 in 11 innings by the Kansas City Royals. The loss extended Detroit's winless streak to 16 games, including 15 defeats. The Tigers are 3-17-1 for the spring.

A Cleveland business executive said Thursday that he will lead an effort to build a memorial near the future Indians ballpark to honor two players who died Monday in a boating accident. He is suggesting that the memorial be built on a walkway between the baseball stadium and the basketball arena being built at the Gateway project site downtown. Alan Bedol, who along with his twin brother, Marshall Bedol, founded Marshall Industries and Almar Industries, said he believes private funds could be raised for a small park in the heart of the complex. The park would include a grassy area with trees, shrubs and benches. He suggested that the park be named after David Jacobs, who died last year. Jacobs and his brother, Richard Jacobs, purchased the Indians in 1986. Bedol said some sort of monument or plaques for Steve Olin and Tim Crews and possibly other athletes who died during their playing careers could be included. Olin and Crews, both pitchers, were killed in the boating accident.

Blyleven hopes to charm Twins 3rd time

FORT MYERS, Fla. (AP) — The arm whips, the wrist snaps, the baseball sails plateward. The batter, momentarily frozen, finally swings helplessly as the ball drops out of sight. "Strike three! Another K for Bert Blyleven. Reggie Jackson in 1973? Wade Boggs in 1983? No, this victim was George Bell in the spring of 1993, one of Blyleven's six strike-outs Wednesday. Decades come and go, but Blyleven, yet Bly-ven, two weeks before his 42nd birthday, still seems to be a big-time curvball to the plate. But will baseball's No. 3 all-time strike-out artist make it to his 24th big-league season? "I don't know," he said. "All I can do is throw strikes, fool a few hitters and keep the ball in the park. And hope I'm pitching well enough to convince them to take me north. I don't know if I am."

Each time Blyleven has pitched, Trombly has followed him on the mound and wowed the Twins. Allowing only one run all spring, Trombly has a 0.55 ERA. Mets ink pact with pitcher

ST. LUCIE, Fla. (AP) — Bret Saberhagen, a two-time Cy Young Award winner coming off a season of injury, Thursday night signed a three-year contract extension with the New York Mets that guarantees him \$15.38 million. He has an option for a fourth year for at least \$5 million.

"I'm thrilled to have been able to finalize Bret's contract before the start of the season," Mets general manager Al Hamzain said.

The Mets gave him a \$2.5 million signing bonus—\$3.05 million for 1994, \$4.05 million for 1995 and \$4.3 million for 1996. In addition, the Mets will give him \$479,656.65 for each of those three years in deferred payments.

Contract incentives based on innings pitched before 1997 could push the final-year figure to as much as \$5.5 million.

Saberhagen, plagued by an inflamed finger last year, was 3-5 for New York with a 3.05 ERA in 17 games. He came to the Mets before last season from Kansas City for infielders Keith Miller, Gregg Jefferies and outfielder Tim Lincecum. "I was disappointed when I was traded by Kansas City," he said. "But when I got to New York, I really liked it."

Saberhagen, who won the Cy Young in 1985 and 1989, was 110-72 with a 3.21 in eight seasons with the Royals.

Bucs rest easy with Bob Walk

BRADENTON, Fla. (AP) — The baseball season's only 10 days away, so everything's back to normal in the orderly world of Bob Walk — at least as ordinary as life gets for a player nicknamed Whirlybird.

That means: a) His groin is hurting; b) Pittsburgh Pirates manager Jim Leyland doesn't know what his opening day status will be; and c) He's telling jokes, pulling clubhouse pranks and defying conventional wisdom.

With opening day so close, most teams would be worried about the status of their No. 2 or No. 3 starter. Not the Pirates. They realize this is Bob Walk, and when they really, really need him, he'll likely be right there.

Just look at his record. The last three years, he's been our horse down the stretch in August, September — and October," pitching coach Ray Miller said. "And that's not taking anything away from Doug Dnebek."

Drabek, Zane Smith, Randy Tomlin and Tim Wakefield all received more attention last season, yet Walk was 19-8 with a 3.38 ERA in 1991 and 1992 despite five stops on the disabled list. He had a six-game winning streak each season, was 5-0 with a 1.65 ERA last August and was 4-0 with a 2.45 ERA out of the bullpen in '92.

Still, he rarely received much credit for helping the Pirates to three straight division titles, at least in his Game 5 masterpiece against the Atlanta Braves in the National League playoffs last fall.

In a win-or-go-home game for the Pirates, Walk beat the Braves 7-1 on three hits, providing a huge psychological lift that never carried the Pirates to a memorable comeback — at least until Francisco Cabrera intervened.

After Game 5, Leyland was nearly in tears as he described what "one of the five favorite players I've ever managed" meant to the Pirates. Coincidentally, only 10 months before, former Pirates general manager Larry Doughty's decision to resign the right-hander as Walk over the objections of chief executive Douglas Danforth hastened Doughty's firing.

Danforth saw an off-injured pitcher in his mid-30s who made \$2 million but never produced at a huge number. Doughty saw a pitcher who never refused the ball even during the worst of weather on the worst of teams, a team leader who talks shop with young pitchers almost as much as Miller, a player who keeps the clubhouse loose and relaxed.

Indians find solace back on the field

Cleveland players get 'the kinks out' in 1st game since the death of teammates Olin, Crews

WINTER HAVEN, Fla. (AP) — There were funeral arrangements at the front gate, flowers in the clubhouse and tears just before the first pitch.

The Cleveland Indians played baseball again Thursday in surroundings that reminded them of pitchers Steve Olin and Tim Crews, killed in a boating accident three days ago. Their 2-1 tie with the Baltimore Orioles was a sometimes painful first step beyond the tragedy.

"It was difficult," first baseman Paul Sorrento said. "The intensity is not quite there yet. I think it was good for us to concentrate on something other than Steve and Tom. Baseball was a good escape for us."

The Indians got some encouraging news away from the field. Pitcher Bob Ojeda, who was injured in the accident, was released from a hospital Thursday. Ojeda, who had surgery for cuts to his head, is expected to recover fully. Ojeda left South Lake Memorial Hospital in a wheelchair, declining comment.

It was clear from the somber mood at Indians' spring training facility that they're still struggling to cope, too.

A dozen floral arrangements from the team's memorial service Wednesday night adorned a sign at the entrance to the parking lot. Flowers with balloons that said, "Thinking of You" were the only items in the players' former lockers.

There were condolence telegrams on the clubhouse bulletin board and a flag flying at half-staff beyond the outfield wall. Olin's wife, Patti, watched the first few innings from a seat behind home plate. "I don't know any other life than baseball," she said at a news conference a few minutes before the first pitch. "I can't give it up. I won't give it up."

Even the 4,402 fans were subdued. When the national anthem ended, there was only respectful applause — no cheers, no whoops.

Orioles manager Johnny Oates, who attended the memorial

Wednesday night, had hoped for a rainout. "The mood here is completely different than anywhere else," Oates said. "We were 100 miles away (when the pitchers died Monday), and we knew something happened. I came over last night and experienced it, and it's not a real good feeling. I wasn't looking forward to coming back over here today."

It was the Indians' first game since Sunday. "You could tell we're a little rusty at first," outfielder Albert Belle said. "After the first couple innings, we got the kinks out."

The crowd finally got into the game in the third inning, when Indians manager Mike Hargrove released some of his pent-up emotions by arguing a foul-ball call. Hargrove kicked dirt and carried on for more than a minute after third base umpire Durwood Merrill called Sandy Alomar's grounder foul.

The fans hooted as Hargrove grew more animated. Finally, it felt like baseball again.

"We've got a job to do. It's what we all love to do, what we all live to do," Hargrove said. "It's been a very welcome relief to be able to just get on the field and do things."

Both teams wasted scoring threats in the late innings, then agreed to call it after 11. The Indians went back to their clubhouse and started thinking about their former teammates. The Orioles were thinking about things much bigger than baseball as they boarded their bus.

"Once the game began, you forget all about it," Oates said. "Then around the ninth or 10th inning, it went through my mind as I was sitting there. I said, 'Wow, this game's going to end in a few minutes, and those families — the game's over so they don't have the game to keep their minds pacified now.'"

Vaughn hopes he's left bad side behind

FORT-MYERS, Fla. (AP) — The search by the Boston Red Sox for a power hitter may be over.

Boston, which did not have a player with more than 15 home runs last season, spent the winter signing free agent Andre Dawson and trading for Ivan Calderon to add more pop to its lineup.

But the power this spring is coming from first baseman Mo Vaughn, a homegrown product who finally seems to be living up to his minor-league reputation.

Vaughn hit a grand slam far over the right-field wall off Cardinals pitcher Joe Magrane in the first inning Thursday, starting the Red Sox to a 6-5 win. He later singled and scored.

The left-handed-hitting Vaughn, who batted just .234 with 13 homers in 13 games for the Red Sox last season, is hitting .443 this spring and has 14 RBIs in his last six games. His slugging percentage is .730, and he is among the league leaders in nearly every hitting category.

It's a pleasant change for Vaughn, who mediocre hitting was compounded by sometimes-awful fielding in 1992. He had 15 errors last year, including seven missed throws.

"I've been on the bad side a lot in this game, especially in the major leagues," he said. "I want to stay as far away from that side as possible. I've just got to be consistent, and I mean it."

Vaughn has been fielding well in spring training, even on a much-criticized field that has led to 24 errors by Red Sox infielders in 22 games. And he has been hitting well against lefties, including three straight two-run doubles last weekend and the grand slam against Magrane.

"That will help bolster his chances

of becoming an everyday player, rather than platooning at first base with righty Carlos Quintana — who started in right field Thursday for the first time this spring."

Manager Butch Hobson said he's not ready to decide if Vaughn will be a regular first baseman or alternate with Quintana.

"Mo's hitting the ball very, very well. He's hitting lefties well, too," Hobson said. "But I can't justify putting Carlos Quintana on the bench."

Vaughn has tried to avoid discussions about a platoon, though he is more than happy to talk about his success this spring against lefties. His key concern is not getting carried away with his recent success.

"Don't get me wrong, I'm glad to see hard work pays off. I've worked my butt off to be productive," he said. "But if you don't go about your routine every day, you'll be back to where you came from."

Vaughn, who hit 57 homers and hit .417 during three years at Seton Hall, once finished his reputation as a power hitter with some massive blasts in the minors — including a broken-bat homer in 1991 on which he was left holding the bat handle as the ball cleared the right-field fence.

He has become a better hitter by going more to left field and not trying to pull every pitch, a method stressed by new hitting coach Mike Eisler.

Even though none of his spring-training success will count when the season begins, Vaughn said he's not frustrated about wasting his hits.

"I've got 10 more days to make corrections and get even better," he said. "That's why I'm not fearful that it's something that's just happening in spring training, because the work is there and it's going to pay off."

Combs battles for last spot in Phillies' lineup

CLEARWATER, Fla. (AP) — Pat Combs never really knew adversity as he climbed the baseball ladder from sandlots through high school, college, the minor leagues and the majors.

When it came he wasn't prepared to deal with it.

Now, as he competes for the final spot on the Philadelphia Phillies' pitching staff, he's ready to deliver the promise of his first-round draft pick in June 1988.

It is too late for the 26-year-old left-hander.

Phillies manager Jim Fregosi will choose from among Combs, Kyle Abbott and Bob Ayrault for the final spot in the bullpen. It's a dilemma, because Combs hasn't been effective. Abbott is nursing an injury and Ayrault has lost velocity off his fastball.

Combs' problems started last spring training. He came back after major elbow surgery. Fregosi decided the pitcher's arm wasn't strong enough and sent him to the team's Class AAA farm at Scranton-Wilkes Barre.

Combs wasn't happy about the decision and made his feelings known. Only recently did he admit

Fregosi was right. Fregosi said, "He didn't think that last spring."

"Last year, I was upset with the way they handled things," Combs said. "Maybe it wasn't the best way. I'd never been through that before and I didn't know how to handle it. So I've put it all behind me and I've come in this year with a new attitude. ... I know if I'm healthy I can do it."

Fregosi wasn't the only one displeased with the way Combs reacted. Some teammates thought Combs' pain threshold was low.

"That's easy for them to say until you're there," Combs said, disgust etched on his face.

"Unfortunately some guys don't appreciate ... being healthy, and sometimes having been healthy ... maybe they forget what it's been like. It's a very frustrating experience. I think we're up in those positions to make us appreciate what we've got a little more. And make some of those guys need to look at that."

Combs, who in six innings this spring hasn't been sparkling, insists he has good velocity and good movement on his pitches. "The ball is taking off like a rocket," he said. "I resemble my old self. It was just a matter of getting through the little pain I had."

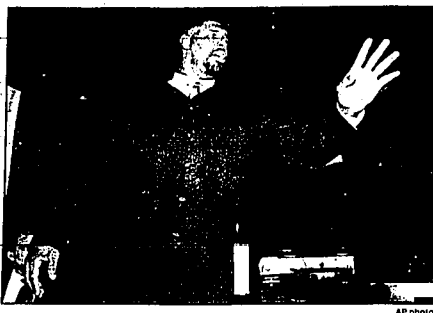

White blasts Eagles, says he prefers 49ers

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Reggie White knows where he would play. It was up to him. It's not.

"If I had to pick a team on my own, I would choose San Francisco," he said. "But it's not up to me. I've got to go where God wants me to go."

The All-Pro defensive end, who is also a Baptist minister, was in town Wednesday to accept the 1992 John Wanamaker Athletic Award. He also used the opportunity to lash out at the Philadelphia Eagles in their own backyard for not trying harder to keep him.

"I didn't give up on the Eagles. It seems as if the Eagles just gave up on me," he said.

"That bothers me more than anything."

Owen Norman Braman has said he would not match the best offer to White, although the team has named him their franchise player. The Eagles have offered a qualifying contract that would pay \$2.5 million to \$3 million per year.

The future of the 31-year-old White has dominated the NFL's annual meetings at Palm Desert, Calif., with Washington, the New York Jets, Green Bay and Cleveland making serious bids. Wednesday, San Francisco jumped into the race.

San Francisco looks very attractive," White said. "I want to find a team that's going to the Super Bowl immediately." He also wants to find a city where he could serve as a role model for inner-city youth.

White's agent, Jimmy Sexton, began discussions Wednesday with 49ers owner Edward DeBartolo Jr. and president Carmen Policy after the 49ers declined to match Atlanta's offer for Pierce Holt.

Under an NFL rule that limits the amount of money the final four

teams can offer, the 49ers would only be able to offer White about \$14.6 million over four years, about \$3.4 million less than what others are offering.

In eight years with the Eagles, White became the NFL career leader in sacks and the only player in NFL history to have more sacks (124) than games played (121).

"This is a hard time for me. It's said," White said. "No matter what anyone thinks, Philadelphia has become a very, very important part of my life."

White said he considered not attending Thursday's ceremony at a Wanamaker's department store for fear of public reaction. However, about 150 fans followed White through the store's hosiery and greeting card sections, and tried to get autographs.

A panel of 30 judges representing media, corporations and athletics chose White for the Wanamaker award, which is presented annually to the "talented, team or organization which has done the most to reflect credit upon Philadelphia and to the team or sport in which they excel."

Last year's winner was Charles Barkley, who was traded by the Philadelphia 76ers to the Phoenix Suns.

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Tom Gorman of the United States and Neale Fraser of Australia are under severe pressure to keep their jobs despite being two of the most successful Davis Cup captains.

Gorman has guided the United States to Davis Cup titles in two of the last three years, while Fraser has helped Australia win four times in 23 years. Their first round match begins Friday in Kooyong.

Fraser, a former Wimbledon and U.S. Open champion, only held on to his job last year on the casting vote of Tennis Australia president Geoff Pollard.

Delegates voted 5-5 in a ballot between Fraser and challenger John Alexander after an acrimonious campaign.

John McEnroe has made it publicly known that he would like the job Gorman has held for eight years. A United States loss in the first round would strengthen McEnroe's case.

"Whatever decision is ultimately made about the captaincy, it will be someone else making it," Gorman said Thursday.

"We are all out there doing our job, and I cannot argue about it," Gorman told the United States to victory in 1990 and 1992 and to a runner-up finish in 1991. "I'm proud of my years as captain," he said. "It's a privilege to represent my country — a tremendous honor."

The defending champion could have hoped for an easier opening round than Australia on grass at historic Kooyong.

Particularly since Australian left-hander Mark Woodforde is riding the hottest streak of his career and is ranked 21 in the world, an all-time high. Woodforde beat No. 1-ranked Jim Courier last week in the Lipton Championships.

David Wheaton and Brad Gilbert will play singles for the United States because Courier, Pete Sampras, Andre Agassi and Michael Chang all are unavailable.

"I don't think they are doing the Cup justice, that the country justice or their supporters justice," Fraser said.

Nonetheless, their absence makes life easier for the Aussie captain, who knows a first-round loss will increase the calls for him to be replaced.

Russian turmoil pares down boxing program

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Political turmoil has meant hard times for nearly everyone in the old Soviet Union. Russian athletes are no exception.

"Our boxing program is at a standstill," said Nicolai Khrenov, the Russian national coach. "We have no money. We're looking for sponsors."

But Khrenov does not long for a return to communism which spared no expense in making the Soviet Union the world's dominant sports power.

Khrenov and the Russian boxing team are in Birmingham to renew the longest-running dual meet in the sport. It dates to 1969 when the Americans and Soviets fought in Las Vegas.

Since then, the names have changed. The Soviet Union is no more.

The old Soviet republics have formed their own sports programs, so it's the Russians alone who will be fighting the Americans this year.

"For the Russian championships this year, we had about 160 boxers," Khrenov said. "For us, that's not many boxers. We used to have 300."

The fighters do not seem concerned with the political struggle.

Their focus is on the 1996 Olympics and possibly pro careers — unheard of under the old system. "I'm not interested in politics," said flyweight Vitaly Kargin, who lives in Angarsk, a small village

thousands of miles from the turmoil in Moscow. Kargin, 21, said the far-reaching changes in his homeland have not reached his hometown.

"The situation did not change too much in my family. Everything is all right," said Kargin, who is studying mechanics.

"My parents are working and making good wages. They can afford to buy groceries."

Kargin and his teammates fight the American team Friday night at the Birmingham-Jefferson Civic Center. The Russians then will travel to Bixby, Miss., to meet a different U.S. team on Monday before heading home.

The American boxers have not beaten the Russians in a head-to-

head dual since 1987 — a losing streak that has stretched to 10 meets. But now, they're meeting on somewhat equal terms.

Nine of the 12 boxers who competed in the 1992 Olympics for the Unified Team — Russia and most of the former Soviet republics — have turned pro. The Russian team sent to Birmingham includes five teen-agers and no one over the age of 23.

The American team is trying to rebuild after a disappointing Olympic effort — only one gold and three medals total, its worst showing since 1956.

But the Unified team far exceeded worse at Barcelona, winning no medals. It was a bitter blow for a

country that had won at least one boxing gold in every Olympics since 1956, excluding the boycotted 1984 Games.

"In Barcelona, there was no coordination between the republics," Khrenov said. "Every republic was training for themselves. It was very bad for the sport and the Russian team."

Now the Russians are on their own. And like nearly every other institution, the boxing program is getting a harsh lesson in capitalism.

"Before, the government gave us everything," Khrenov said. "It's different for us now. We're looking for private sponsors, but that's not easy. It's a new thing for us."

Ore-Ida CEO to resign after less than a year

BOISE — Robert White, who has been president and chief executive officer of Ore-Ida Foods Inc. for just nine months, has announced he will resign in April to pursue another career.

Although he has no immediate plans, White, 46, said his departure on April 29 has no connection with the turmoil that has dogged the company for the past year.

"It's true we went through some downsizing a year ago, but if you look at it in a broad context, Ore-Ida will be a very successful company," White said. "It really had no bearing on my decision."

The company laid off 140 salaried employees nationwide 14 months ago and reorganized another 130. It lost the successful Weight Watchers product line the year before when management was transferred to a newly formed company in Pittsburgh.

Richard Wamhoff, 47, who has been president and chief operating officer of Star-Kist-Seafood Co. in California since last July, will replace White. Both Ore-Ida and Star-Kist are units of the H.J. Heinz Co.

Greenspan tells lawmakers credit crunch may be easing

WASHINGTON — Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan told Congress Thursday he saw some glimmers of hope that the severe credit crunch that has plagued American businesses is finally beginning to ease.

He said there was a slight pickup in business loans this winter and he hoped that an improving economy would lead to even more sizable increases in bank lending this spring. "As I review the current banking situation, I find reasons for optimism, but not complacency," Greenspan said in testimony before the House Small Business Committee.

"Our surveys and other information indicate that banks' attitudes toward loans and risk-taking are improving," he said.

Suddenly, it's chic to be from, in Arkansas

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Most days, Lucille Robinson dons a white apron to flip burgers at her town. Nowadays, though, look for her all gussied up in satin and velvet in a tandler setting — the pages of Vanity Fair.

Call it her 15 minutes of fame, her chance to strut her stuff on the national stage. It's happening more often to folks here who say that local boy Bill Clinton is president, Arkansas is finally shedding its reputation as Dogpatch of the Delta.

"There's a whole different image of Arkansas now," crows Ms. Robinson, who runs the kitchen at Doe's Eat Place. "We're not barefoot and pregnant all the time, running in the woods. We have some intelligent people here just like everywhere else."

"Arkansas has been put down for years," she added. "But we ARE coming back now."

Yes, indeed, Arkansas is seizing the day — and the dollar — now that Mr. Clinton has moved to Washington.

Tourism is up. Business, too. Doe's, a favorite haunt for journalists and pols where Clinton chomped down greasy cheeseburgers, boasts a 30 percent increase in sales.

"We got a million dollars worth of coverage during the campaign, the election and inaugural. It was like a giant advertising campaign — free," boasted George Eldridge, one of Doe's owners, who posed with Ms. Robinson in the chic inaugural

Winter weather dampens February housing market

The Associated Press

WASHINGTON — Winter weather nipped more housing activity in February, a trade group's figures showed Thursday, and there were signs elsewhere the employment to climate remains tepid.

The National Association of Realtors said sales of previously-owned, single-family homes dropped 6.1 percent to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 3.55 million, down from 3.78 million in January and 4.04 million in December. The decline was spread across all regions.

"The fundamentals suggest the decline has to be weather-related, plus the fact that sales really soared at end of 1992 at a rate clearly not sustainable," said Robert G. Dederick of the Northern Trust Co. in Chicago. "People bought a lot of the homes in the fourth quarter that might have been sold later."

The Realtors' survey came on the heels of a Commerce Department report last week showing that housing starts slowed to a 2.5 percent gain in February after soaring 8.4 percent a month earlier.

Analysts attributed the slower pace to adverse weather in February and predicted first-time applications for unemployment insurance fell by 2,000 last week to 349,000.

It was the third weekly decline in a row and pushed jobless claims to the lowest level since 349,000 were filed during the week ended Feb. 15.

The four-week moving average of new claims totaled 359,250 during the period ended March 22, down from 350,750 a week earlier and the lowest since 353,250 were filed during the period ended March 5.

Many analysts consider the four-week average a more reliable measure of employment trends because it smooths out the volatility of the weekly numbers.

"The job market still isn't improving at more than a fairly tepid rate," Dederick said. The report is "consistent with some employment gains, but not rapid gains."

The Clinton administration has complained that while the economy is improving, it is a jobless recovery with much smaller employment gains than during the aftermath of most previous recoveries.

Officials cite the "jobs gridlock" as reason for passage of President Clinton's \$16 billion economic stimulus package now being debated in Congress.

state tourism will grow 10 percent this year as a \$300 million increase in travel spending over 1992.

"Arkansas is in," confided Skip Rutherford, a longtime Clinton friend. "People are pulling out their Arkansas roots, their Arkansas connections. Someone wrote a letter looking for a job saying, 'My grandmother had a friend from Arkansas. Does that help?'"

Already, Arkansas has been rewarded for being an FOB — Friend of Bill.

Clinton's December economic summit here pumped about \$2 million into the economy, said Barry Travis, director of Little Rock's Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Travis said the money is secondary to the positive publicity generated for a city still trying to distance itself from a symbol of shame — the 1957 crisis in which then-Gov. Orval Faubus ordered the National Guard to prevent blacks from integrating Central High School. Faubus' interference prompted the nation's first use of federal troops for school desegregation.

Clinton isn't the first native to make it big.

Some of America's richest and famous are from Arkansas: Dan Sells Yalton, the unassuming drug store owner who created Wal-Mart, poultry king Don Tyson, former Sen. J. William Fulbright and the late Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

'Unforgiven' favored to win Best Picture Oscar

By now, Oscar-watchers know that the Academy Awards do not really celebrate the films. Instead, the ceremony has come to resemble an outrageously expensive high-school prom. Politics and popularity take center stage as Hollywood royalty promenade in the best and worst garb that nouveau money can buy, paying tribute to the fact that American films are king of the marketplace.

Still, "The 65th Annual Academy Awards Presentation" (airing Monday on ABC) promises to be full of surprises, making it as difficult as ever to pick the winners. If box-office receipts and Academy success, Rob Reiner's courtroom drama, "A Few Good Men," would be the hands-down winner for Best Picture, though it is hardly the favorite among seasoned Oscar insiders. The con-

stant, instead, seems to favor a film in a genre that is archetypically American but traditionally overlooked by the Academy: the Western. But then, few Westerns have come along with the moral weight or visual magnitude of Clint Eastwood's "Unforgiven," nominated for nine awards, including Best Picture, Screenplay, Actor and Director.

A British dark horse in the Best Picture running, Neil Jordan's "The Crying Game," seems to have sustained its popularity largely through a cryptic advertising campaign, a tribute to the role clever promotion and gimmicks can play in a film's success. Stars Stephen Rea and Jaye Davidson are nominees in the Best Actor and Supporting Actor categories, respectively, and Jordan is up for Best Director and Best Screenplay.

Another import that appeals to the Academy's thirst for spectacular costumes and European pretense is Merchant/Ivory's adapta-

tion of "Howard's End," also up for Best Picture.

The final Best Picture nominee, Martin Best's "Scent of a Woman," joins the ranks of previous Oscar nominees in which a character's human spirit prevails over physical adversity, such as "My Left Foot," "Rain Man" and "Children of a Lesser God."

The Best Director nominees generally mirror the Best Pictures, and such was the case this year — with one exception. Instead of Rob Reiner, the voters chose Robert Altman, whose superficial indictment of Hollywood superficiality, "The Player," pales in comparison to his previous films.

This year, the Academy is celebrating women in cinema, but writers have noted that in spite of commemoration, few films truly showcased female talent. Of the five Best Actress nominees — Mary McDonnell ("Passion Fish"), Susan Sarandon ("Loren-

zo's Oil"), Michelle Pfeiffer ("Love Field"), Catherine Deneuve ("Indochine") and Emma Thompson ("Howard's End") — Thompson's understated performance appears to be the favorite.

The outlook in the Best Actor category is more difficult to predict. Neither Al Pacino ("Scent of a Woman") nor Eastwood have earned Best Actor Oscars in the past, and it looks as though they may be denied once again this year. Denzel Washington's performance in "Malcolm X" has the range and emotional depth the Academy usually rewards. However, Pacino may well walk away with the Best Supporting Actor Oscar (for "Glengarry Glen Ross") and Eastwood with Best Director.

The 65th annual Academy Awards show airs Monday at 7 p.m. MST on ABC (KPTV, KVVJ.)

This year's Academy Awards ceremony marks 40 years of televised Oscars

It all began with a scene from "Wings," the first movie to win the Academy Award for best picture, and the shot of buzzing biplanes gave way to a soaring modern jet.

Then Ronald Reagan, who would break a few more promises before he was done, stood before the TV camera in an unseemable California downpour and trotted out one of the biggest whoppers in Oscar history.

"Like this jet plane," pledged Reagan on that wet spring night outside Hollywood's RKO Fountains Theater in 1953, "the awards themselves have been streamlined."

Tomorrow night's Academy Awards show will mark the 40th anniversary of the marriage of convenience between television and Oscar. Blear-eyed viewers might bear Reagan's characteristic first-night optimism in mind as the clock crawls past midnight and they haven't even gotten to the Thalberg award. They might also remember Johnny Carson's more honest assessment of Oscar's time-frame when he welcomed the audience to the 1978 broadcast, with the promise of "two hours of sparkles and entertainment spread out over a four-hour show."

The Academy Awards show should be the usual elephantine serving of glitz, glamour, thank-you speeches, the usual numbers and comedy — both intended and unintentional. In length, if in nothing else, it should make us all nostalgic for the first Oscarcast on March 19, 1953, which was a much humbler — and shorter — affair.

After Reagan, who had just released the utterly forgettable

"Hong Kong," finished the introduction, the evening's hosting chores were taken over by Bob Hope in Hollywood and Conrad Nagel at the NBC Century Theater on Columbus Circle in Manhattan. Oscar's small-screen bow was not so much the start of a beautiful friendship as the inception of an ungainly 40-year alliance.

Today, television is as much a Hollywood business as movies, but four decades ago the first broadcast amounted to sleeping with the enemy, and a lot of the reigning moguls were unhappy about it.

The premiere Oscarcast arrived at the worst of times for the movie industry. In 1948, a Supreme Court decision had forced the major studios to divest themselves of their lucrative theater chains. The continuing and shattering impact of that economic blow was compounded as television became a habit and cut deeper and deeper into the box-office revenues.

In 1953, things were so bad that the studios withdrew their funding for the Academy Awards show in a joint cost-cutting move in early March. RCA stepped in and offered \$100,000 to fund the show and pay for the rights to broadcast it over its network — NBC.

The initial broadcast also came at a time when many in Hollywood were under great pressure from the House Un-American Activities Committee. McCarthyism brought professional ruin to dis-

tinguished figures in the film industry and created a venomous and bitter atmosphere throughout Hollywood as a friend betrayed friend to stay off the blacklist.

It was a measure that would be felt, if not seen, when the statues were handed out, and lead to one of the most ridiculous injustices in Academy history — the awarding of the best picture to Cecil B. DeMille's overblown circus movie "The Greatest Show on Earth" instead of "High Noon" or "The Quiet Man."

The loudest applause of the evening greeted Gary Cooper's win as best actor for his isolated marshal in "High Noon." Cooper wasn't present, and John Wayne accepted for him without mentioning the savage politics surrounding the highly successful western.

"High Noon's" screenplay was written by Carl Foreman, who had been summoned to Washington the year before to testify before the Un-American Activities Committee. He took the fifth and his career took a nosedive. Powerful players in Hollywood, who had formed the Motion Picture Alliance for the Preservation of American Ideals, wanted Foreman blacklisted and fired from the film. They were led by Wayne and Hedda Hopper, the town's most influential and vicious gossip columnist.

Cooper, as stalwart and principled in person as he was in so many of his roles, stood behind

Foreman. The writer finished the script and added several scenes, notably those in which the craven townsfolk abandon the marshal to his fate, yet let "High Noon" become very clear political overtones. If the film plays today as a parable of its times, it's because, as Foreman later said, "I became the Cooper character."

Variety was not the industry sources that despise — or perhaps, "High Noon" would win easily for best picture. Nobody expected Foreman, whose screenplay was nominated and who was already in exile in England, to have a prayer. Cooper's marshal couldn't take the coward's way out, but the academy voters did. They dropped the hot potato that "High Noon" represented and didn't even pick "The Quiet Man," which started Wayne and ranks as John Ford's most enduring picture.

Instead, none other than Mary Pickford walked onto the stage and assuaged everyone in the audience by announcing, "The Greatest Show on Earth," which had been greeted with derision by the critics, but made a ton of money at the box office. The triumph of what was thought to be a losing no-hoper was such a surprise that the NBC cameraman couldn't find where DeMille was sitting in the audience. DeMille himself was flabbergasted but recovered in time to accept.

It was not the first time that commercial considerations and politics played a part in the Oscar balloting. But surely it was the shabbiest, and the largest audience ever drawn to a single television show up to that time was hand-to-hand with even if they didn't understand what lay behind the safe but daff choice of "The Greatest Show on Earth."

Short turns down NBC late-night slot offer

Comic-actor Martin Short says he was offered NBC's late-night slot but turned it down because "it's a tough act to follow, and being on every night of the week is too confining."

Instead, look for Short to do a weekly NBC comedy series on which he can be himself, play a wide variety of characters, and perform before a live audience. "I would hate in defining what it will be with the word 'variety,' because of negative connotations variety shows have today," he said.

"My show will be a way of redefining for the 1990s what variety once was. What I love about TV is its immediate, forgiving and spontaneous." Short's own show won't be on until some time after he leaves Broadway's "The Goodbye Girl," most likely this fall.

His NBC deal also calls for him to produce other programs in which he will not star. Additionally, he already is committed to several feature films — something that would never be able to do if he were on TV every night — starting in a movie each for Universal and Polygram, and directing three Universal features through Amblin Entertainment.

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Sheedy plays photojournalist in trouble after witnessing murder, taking picture

Arnold, ABC differ on fate of sitcom

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Franice may be the land of haute cuisine and haute couture, but to Ally Sheedy it is a land of haute linguistic confusion.

Miss Sheedy plays a photojournalist in the NBC mystery movie "Lethal Exposure," which airs Sunday. That film — and another that probably won't be shown in the United States — were filmed in France.

"They have such a different way of doing things there. They put actors together from many countries and shoot in English. It was craziness because most of them didn't speak English. Afterward, they dubbed in the French."

"The TV movie we shot in both French and English. We'd do a scene in English, then do it again in French," she said.

In the movie Miss Sheedy plays Chris Cassidy, a photojournalist who witnesses an airport killing and photographs it. The victim is a prisoner who is handcuffed to a French police officer, played by Francois Eric Gendron.

She flies to Paris to cover a trial and learns the same officer is involved in that case. She secretly follows him around and takes an apparently incriminating photo that puts her in the middle of the case.

The show also features Howard Hesseman as Cassidy's editor.

"Chris is very strident, loud and difficult to get along with," Miss Sheedy said. "She's a bulldozer."

She did not base her portrayal on a real photojournalist.

"I worked on a movie called 'Chantilly Lace' with an actress I liked, Martha Plimpton. This is going to sound strange. She based her character on a photojournalist she knew. I based my character on Martha's portrayal."

Still, she did get to know Plimpton's friend: She

"was on the set and I talked to her a lot because I was going to do 'Lethal Exposure' next. She was always dressed ready to go to work. She wore neutral colors to make her blend into the background. She dressed like a man."

Of late, Miss Sheedy has been busy. There was "Chantilly Lace," which was directed by Linda Yellen ("It's" about seven women who come to-

gether in the course of a year. We all wrote parts of it with Linda. We sort of wrote it as we went along"). She also stars with Danny Aiello in "The Pickle," an upcoming movie directed by Paul Mazursky.

"Basically I play a character who exists in Danny's imagination," she said. "He's a film director having a nervous breakdown. I'm a character from a film he made that he keeps running in his head."

Miss Sheedy, who wrote her first book when she was 12 and is the daughter of well-known literary agent Chafetz Sheedy, said she is working on a novel. She also writes poetry and newspaper and magazine articles.

"I've tried to write a screenplay, but it's a format that doesn't come easily to me," she said. "I've been working on the novel off and on for the past five years. I only have 50 pages. I like. I have hundreds of pages. I don't like. It's a story about a friendship between two girls. There are bits and pieces of me and other people, but the story isn't about me."

Miss Sheedy started dancing when she was six and performed with the American Ballet Theater for eight years. She did "tons of shows" in New York, went on to commercials, a small part in an "Afterschool Special," and then on to Los Angeles, television and a part in the movie "Bad Boys."

"The past few years I've been going through a hard transition. I'm 30. I go from playing ingenue roles to girls in their early 20s to girlfriends to playing women."

"People have you typecast in this industry. I did so much comedy, then I did a few serious roles. Now producers don't know if I can handle comedy."

Miss Sheedy said she would like to do a half-hour television comedy series.

'General Hospital' turns 30 Thursday

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Rockies may crumble, Gibraltar may tumble and prime-time television shows may have the longevity of a lightning bolt. But daytime TV? Now, there's staying power.

Fall in love with a typically short-lived television show and your heart is likely to be soon broken. But start dating a soap opera such as ABC's "General Hospital" and you could wallow joyfully in a 30-year affair.

The spooling rounds. The sexual escapades. The simmering rivalries. The illnesses. The angst. The great clothes. Is there more to life?

The venerable serial begins its fourth decade April 1 with the airing of the 7,676th episode. There's a discreet facelift as a birthday gift: new opening titles and updated theme music.

Clearly, a 30-year lifespan is astounding in a medium where having your series picked up for another 13 weeks can send spirits aloft and prompt giddy purchases in depressed Southern California real estate.

But such landmarks aren't rare in daytime TV, where even "General Hospital," doesn't have cabs on television.

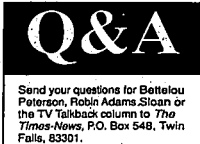

Q. Can you tell us something about the budding white actress who played actor Denzel Washington's 1940s-era lover in "Malcolm X"? Are she and Washington off-camera lovers as well? —A.R.

A. You're referring to Kate Vernon, a 31-year-old Toronto-bred actress best known for her role as Lorraine Prescott in TV's "Falcon Crest." She's definitely great-looking, single and not eager for a "serious" romance until she has one or two movies under her belt. She copied her big "Malcolm X" role after a steamy audition with Washington, who portrays the title role in the flick about the late black leader. The audition included a hot love scene that was the account of insiders, "pretty powerful." Whatever, Kate and Denzel, who is happily married, are said not to be an off-screen item.

Q. Is it true that Catherine Orenberg who played Princess Di on TV, once had an affair with Prince Charles? —W.P.

A. Orenberg, who just starred for the second time as Princess Diana in the recently aired TV movie, "Charles and Diana: Unhappily Ever After," met the then eligible bachelorette heir to the throne some years ago. Orenberg, the daughter of HRH Princess Elizabeth of Yugoslavia, who is Charles' second cousin, was seated next to Charles at a formal dinner. Instead of beginning a royal romance, the two engaged in a love fight. Oh, those fun-loving royals!

Q. We've heard about nude photos of supermodel Claudia Schiffer being up in a European scandal sheet. Why would she do this?

Schiffer certainly doesn't need the money. —J.C.

A. Claudia, who makes some \$6 million per year as the world's most expensive model, prides herself on her propriety. After all, at 22, she's still the proper German girl. That's why she was so upset when a European magazine titled R.O.M.E. ran unauthorized photos showing Claudia undressing backstage at a fashion show. One picture showed her bare chested. Schiffer sued for some \$30 million, and negatives of the offending picture were returned to her. A settlement is said to be in the works. Nudity, says Schiffer, is something she "would never do."

Q. What is this about Winona Ryder reuniting with her longtime boyfriend, Hollywood bad boy Johnny Depp? weren't they seriously on the outs? —J.P.

A. It's true that 21-year-old Winona, currently in Francis Coppola's bloody version of "Bram Stoker's Dracula," had been very close with Depp. The two costarred in such flicks as "Edward, Scissorhands." But something did go wrong. Perhaps she got fed up with his antics at Depp's tattoos. The rumor making the Hollywood circuit was that she was eager to see other men. Latest word is that she has reconciled with Depp. They appeared together not too long ago at the 1992 Montreal Film Festival. The relationship will no doubt take further twists and turns, so stay tuned.

Q. Why is the theme music for "The Arsenio Hall Show" credited to the host himself? He isn't known for his musical compositions. —L.J.

A. It seems Arsenio heard that Johnny Carson collected royalties over all those years for "The Tonight Show" theme composed by Elia Anka with assistance from Carson, and Hall was not going to miss the opportunity to do likewise. At least now there's some plausible explanation for the melody of the composition, considered one of the musical talents with which Hall surrounds himself on a daily basis.

Q. Didn't "Cheer" actress Kirstie Alley flail a week to work with her handsome husk of a husband, Parker Stevenson? Are they having marital difficulties? —H.J.

A. Don't jump to conclusions. It's true that Kirstie is quite explicit about not wanting to marry her husband. They costarred in the "North and South" miniseries, and it didn't work out well. Both were very critical — perhaps too critical — about each other's work. Some cynical Hollywood say the two performers in one family is at least one too many. But Alley and Stevenson remain blissfully wedded, with much to keep them busy — a 32-room house in California, vacation hideaways in Oregon and Maine, a menagerie of some 40-odd pets and, most of all, the couple's newly adopted baby boy, William True.

Q. With all the hoopla surrounding celebrities receiving stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame, I am curious where and by whom the actual stars are made? —V.P.

A. Terrazo artisan Bill Paternostro has been making the stars since the early '70s. The artist, who has made nearly 400 so far, takes about 2 1/2 days to complete each star. The letters and emblem are actually produced in a Los Angeles art-foundry but the rest is up to Paternostro. He has become something of a Hollywood Boulevard celebrity himself when he's at work on a star and is often photographed by tourists.

Q. What's this about Tom Cruise insisting on the use of voice-enhancing recording equipment during the filming of "A Few Good Men," his latest flick? Didn't his natural voice sound good enough? —J.C.

A. Cruise, 30, is sensitive about the sound of his voice. Some critics claim it is, too, thin and high-pitched. So Tom insisted that for portions of "A Few Good Men" a new sound recording system called Clearsound be employed. It was developed by a bunch of scientists, a self-help group popular among some Hollywood stars in-

cluding Cruise. Tom denies the rumors and claims his voice but concedes that it is better able to "capture" it. In any case, Cruise seems captured not only by Clearsound technology but Scientology itself.

Q. Demi Moore was reported to be reluctant to do a love scene in her new movie. Any reason? It seems so unlikely. —K.F.

A. Demi, who seems to have no problem letting it all hang out, did find it difficult to do the intimate love scenes in her upcoming film, "Indecent Proposal." Not that as a wife and mother she is uncomfortable doing cinema love scenes but rather her partner in this film was Woody Harrelson, who happens to be the husband Bruce Willis's best friend.

Q. Is there truth to the rumor Ed Asner will be taking time off from acting to return to school? —M.N.

A. True, Asner will be going back to school but this will not involve time off from acting. As his way of giving back, he will donate the time and talents to an Orange, Calif., college TV series created by two professors. Students will write, direct and act in the drama about life in a fictional university, for which they will receive college credits. Asner will play the school president. Filming begins this month.

Q. Explain if you can why for the first time in his latest movie Mel Gibson doesn't seem to show his fanny? —S.K.

A. Can it be that, just like the rest of us, time and gravity have taken their toll on the once Mel Gibson sex machine? Or a hunch, because the incredibly handsome actor bared his behind ever so briefly in his new film, "Forever Young" and even then it was seen in the darkness and shadows. When you contemplate this with the prolonged exposure his derriere received in 1986's "Lethal Weapon," we can only assume the years have not been kind to Mel's behind.

Q. Can you tell us something about, poorly stark down and give their attention to the grotesque. —S.K.

A. Yes, Kathy, who is 40 and has appeared in a number of supporting roles through the years, is just now coming into her own. Yes, she plays opposite De Niro in the upcoming "Mad Dog and Glory." And she costarred with Andy Garcia in the recent thriller "Jennifer's Body." Baker is married to her manager, Don, and has two young sons. She plays the mother and town doctor in "Picket Fences," a reality off-the-wall comedy series despite its title. In an upcoming film, "Baker" plays finds herself operating on an elephant. "Pretty weird stuff," laughs Baker.

Q. Do you think stunning Claudia Schiffer will soon be the wife of Prince Albert of Monaco?

A. This question has international social set wondering. Claudia is the German supermodel who makes a ton of money — an estimated \$6 million per year — who is most often compared to a young Brigitte Bardot. She's 22, and Prince Albert is 34. He is being pressured to get hitched to continue his royal family line in the tiny principality of Monaco. But Claudia says she's too young to get married, and has been dating others.

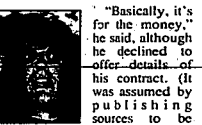
Stern to put some of his sleeze between covers

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NCAA money distribution system profits some schools

CHICAGO — Weep not for De Paul and Notre Dame because they failed to make the NCAA basketball tournament. If anything, both schools will be crying all the way to the bank.

Thanks to the 3-year-old NCAA revenue-distribution system, De Paul still figures to cash around \$500,000 without having to make a basket. Despite being out of the tournament for three straight years, Notre Dame's payday will exceed \$500,000 this season.

The payouts are near what conference schools from the Big 10 and Atlantic Coast Conference will be receiving. And, they've placed a combined 11 teams in this year's tournament, including four teams in the final 16.

"The new format has worked out better than I thought it would," De Paul Athletic Director Bill Bradshaw said.

Talk about being in the right place at the right time. If ever De Paul and Notre Dame could pick a time for their basketball programs to be down, this is it.

Under the old system, both Notre Dame and De Paul would have been out in the cold. It was a winner-take-all philosophy. In the tournament, De Paul's net worth around \$250,000 per step. A trip to the Final Four saw a school earn a cash windfall in excess of \$1 million.

However, the scenario also produced the "\$250,000 free throw." It saw athletes going to the line at the end of games with a substantial amount of a school's budget on the line.

"I remember in 1989, we had a one-point lead with six second left, and Terence Greene had a one-and-one," Bradshaw said. "Lesley Visser (of CBS) leaned over and said 'how much are these free throws worth?'"

I said, '\$247,464.' Those were big free throws."

The NCAA, though, wanted to get away from such scenarios when it signed its historic \$1 billion television deal with CBS. Starting in 1991, the association came up with a plan that emphasized "playing for the trophy," in the words of Executive Director Dick Schultz.

The plan has proved to be boon for De Paul and Notre Dame this year. The bulk of the new formula is based on a floating six-year average. Schools get credit for the number of tournament games they participated in during the previous six years, with these games aren't included until next year.

De Paul was in eight tournament games from 1987-1991 when it was an independent; its game last year goes into the Great Midwest's revenue-sharing plan. Notre Dame

played in seven tournament games during the six-year time period, including three in 1987.

Each game, or unit, is worth nearly \$43,000, meaning De Paul will reap \$241,927, while Notre Dame pulls in \$299,186 this year.

But the money train doesn't stop there. Schools also are rewarded for the number of scholarships they offer, and sports they sponsor.

Actually, both De Paul and Notre Dame are getting the best of both worlds. Back in 1987, both schools advanced to the Sweet 16, meaning they played three games, netting a payday of more than \$750,000. Not only did they get to all the money then, but they still are benefiting from those games.

"If it had been under the old formula, and we didn't make the tournament, we would take a financial hit," Bradshaw said. "Now we're not taking as bad a hit. We're not looking at receiving nothing. We're not looking at \$250,000 down the drain. It takes away some of the devastation."

That was one of the features of the plan. Big 10 Commissioner Jim Delany calls it "one of the most undervalued achievements in the NCAA."

"Sometimes having a lot of resources is just as bad as having none," Delany said. "It brings out the worst characteristics in people. But the committee did an excellent job to achieve the delicate balance between equality and equity."

Skill, not everyone embraces the plan. The majority of the NCAA's

smaller Division I schools aren't thrilled about having payouts weighed heavily to the size of their programs. That component was put in there to encourage broad-based participation. For instance, a school that gives out 100 scholarships gets \$13,000. But it jumps to \$143,000 for those over 200 grants.

Meanwhile, the mega conferences, like the Big East, aren't overjoyed by the depth of revenue sharing. One Big East official said the conference "isn't for socialism."

"And we're not the only capitalist around, either," the official said.

However, the Big East, along with the Big 10 and ACC, were willing to compromise. Schultz credits that move for making the formula work.

"They were willing to take less money for the good of basketball," Schultz said.

Delany estimates that while the television package increased 159 percent, the conference has seen its figures up less than 100 percent.

Big 10 schools will pull in around \$600,000-\$700,000 each, which would have been considerably more if the old formula had been in place.

But Delany's former job as commissioner of the Ohio Valley Conference helped him understand how the tournament isn't just for the big schools.

"It's a give and take," he said. "I'm a person looking for a better way to distribute money. I think this way is more consistent with the fundamental policies of the NCAA."

Schultz likes the plan because it goes beyond typical expenditures. It includes a \$30,000 payout to all schools to be used for academic enhancement programs. The tournament money also is used to fund a catastrophic insurance policy for athletes.

And, most importantly, in Schultz's eyes, the plan eliminated "the \$250,000 free throw."

"My concern was that if the dollars kept getting so big, you were looking at \$5 million for team going to the Final Four," Schultz said. "It's doing what I hoped it would do. It's taken the emphasis away from playing, for dollars."

However, teams still are rewarded for getting into the tournament and winning games. Over the next six years, both Notre Dame and De Paul will feel the effects for their current failures when there's nothing to be averaged in from the 1993 tournament and in Notre Dame's case, for 1991 and 1992 tournaments.

But it could have been much worse.

"The upside, might not be as great, but the downside is you don't jump off the ledge if you don't make the tournament," Bradshaw said.

At least not for financial reasons.

Female college sports teams begin to scrap gender-based names

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — When Becky Hopf arrived at the University of Alabama in 1987 as an assistant in the sports information department, she wondered why the women's basketball team was called the Lady Tide when the school's nickname is the Crimson Tide.

"As a woman, I think it's kind of insulting to call a team the Lady Tide," she says. "What you're saying is that team is not equal to the men."

So Hopf took a simple step: she started referring to the women's team in her press releases as the Crimson Tide, just like the men's squad.

In the years since, some schools have followed suit, most notably Vanderbilt.

The nation's top-ranked women's team dropped the "Lady" from its Commodores nickname prior to this season.

Other 10 schools in the Southeastern Conference still carry gender-based nicknames for their female teams. And as evidenced by those teams reaching the round of 16 in the NCAA tournament, it's a practice not uncommon across the nation.

Nine of those schools refer to their women by a different nickname than the men. Most teams simply place a gender-based term in front of the school's nickname, such as the Lady Tigers (Auburn) or Lady Volunteers (Tennessee), but others have more unique monikers, such as the Women of Troy (Southern California) and Lady Teachers (Oklahoma State Tech, where the male team is known as the Bulldogs).

David Housel, the longtime sports information director at Auburn, said Tuesday there is nothing wrong with the Lady Tigers nickname.

"I feel the same way about Lady Tigers as I do War Eagles (another school nickname) and just plain Tigers," he said. "Any way you say it, it's still Auburn."

But he said the female-based nicknames probably date back to the era when most female games were played just prior to the men's contest.

"We used to play a lot of double-headers. The sportswriters, broadcasters and even the fans needed a difference to tell the teams apart," he said. "Now it's uncommon to play doubleheaders because of the growth and popularity of women's

basketball."

Now some are calling for nicknames such as Lady Tigers to become a thing of the past, as well.

Ways Martin, who works with The Birmingham News and covered the SEC tournament earlier this month, returned home to write a column that carried the headline, "The game is no place for a lady."

"It's hard for me to think of Georgia point guard Kelly Robbins as a lady when she puts on a uniform and plays flat out for 40 minutes," Martin wrote. "Now don't get me wrong. Kelly

is an attractive young woman who I'll bet can be a lady with the best of them when that's what the occasion calls for.

"My point is that when the whistle blows and they throw the ball up, Kelly Robbins is a Bulldog — a tenacious, fighting, scrapping Bulldog. Not a Lady Bulldog."

Martin pushed for her campaign in Alabama to eliminate the Lady from the Tide and called on other schools to take note.

"Let's have ladies when the final horn sounds and one team must congratulate the other," he wrote. "But when the whistle blows and they toss the ball up, let's have Bulldogs and Tigers ... I think the ladies have earned it."

Michele Wilson, head of women's studies at Alabama-Birmingham, where the women's basketball team is the Lady Blazers, said research has shown that sex-based terms, such as usherette, leads people "to consider those positions less competent."

"I certainly think that's symbolic of the less esteem that we attribute to women than we do to men in general," she said.

"What if we were to differentiate teams or differentiate occupants of certain positions on the basis of a race modifier?"

There would be a very big outcry and justifiably so.

But Housel suggested the Lady Tigers nickname actually has aided the growth of women's basketball at Auburn by giving the team an identity of its own. And he noted that Tennessee has won three national titles in the past six years while Auburn has reached the Final Four three times since 1988.

"I think it's all in the perception," he said. "Lady Vols certainly hasn't been a hindrance to Tennessee's program, and Lady Tigers hasn't been a hindrance to ours, either."

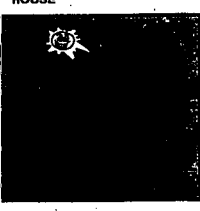

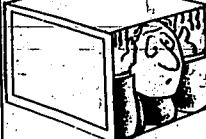
