School aid package becomes law

BOISE — Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus vented his frustration with the 1993 Legislature Thursday, refusing to sign what he called a woefully inadequate public school aid package and vetoing 12 other bills.

At a time when parents are becoming increasingly vocal and involved and business is calling for a better effort, the Legislature has demonstrated that it will lead Idaho down the path of stagnation and decline," Andrus declared in a statement.

It was the third time since he returned to the governor's office in 1987 that Andrus

has let a public school aid plan take effect without his signature.

And the dozen vetoes on Thursday brought to 15 the bills Andrus has rejected from a session he maintained justified lawmakers meeting only every other year. The last time there were more vetoes was in 1983 when Democrat John Evans rejected 23 bills.

But there was nothing unexpected in the actions Andrus took before leaving for President Clinton's Forest Conference in Portland today.

He had lambasted the Republican legislative majority for its state school aid package but acknowledged repeatedly that a veto would not loosen the GOP grip on the state's purse strings.

Legislation requiring state agencies to assess the financial impact of regulations on private property and then compensate the owners for any losses had been rejected the last two years and was vetoed again. Opponents warned it could completely undermine the government's regulatory efforts.

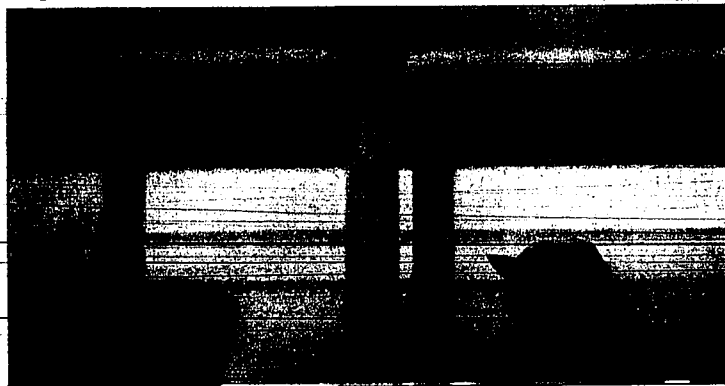
The governor made a clear statement that state assumption of indigent health care bills from the counties was doomed since his plan to provide subsidized care to the medically needy went unfunded.

And his legislative allies indicated the veto stamp would also fall on restrictions on the use of the State Insurance Fund to finance new buildings, revisions complicating the budget limitation law, more lucrative compensation for damage done by wildlife and an earlier filing deadline for independent political candidates.

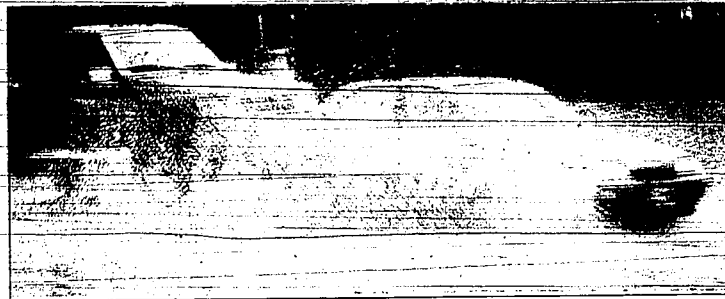
But the governor's dissatisfaction over the Republican financial commitment to

Clinton faces big test in Portland

WASHINGTON — As Bill Clinton steps up to his first test as a champion of the environment today, he is not unlike Richard Nixon arriving in Beijing in 1972.

Because of Nixon's long history as an anti-Communist and his devout support among Republican conservatives, he was free to take a step that no Democrat dared risk — moving to normalize relations with China.

Similarly Clinton, because of the massive support he has garnered over the years from environmentalists, may have some political wiggle room in negotiating a solution to the long-running feud over the ancient forests of the Pacific Northwest.

But while environmentalists, who still perceive the president as one of their own, are willing to give him some latitude, many are more than a little nervous about the potential outcome. Chief among their concerns is that Clinton will bend to economic pressures — as he has on several occasions already in their view — and adopt what the environmental community sees as a short-term expedient in the forest dispute.

"We are worried," confessed Steve Meyer, a lobbyist for Trout Unlimited, "because Clinton is so heavily focused on jobs."

The test was set to begin in earnest Friday morning when the president, along with Vice President Al Gore, was sched-

uled to meet with the warring factions in the long-running conflict of the Pacific Northwest, which may be as much cultural as it is economic.

On one side are the region's logging and timber interests, whose livelihood and way of life rest on their ability to harvest the miles and miles of dense woods. On the other are environmentalists, bent on preserving the ancient foliage and such creatures as the spotted owl that inhabit them.

And there is ample evidence that in seeking a solution, the president may use the latitude his pro-environment reputation has bought him.

Already, Clinton has made some decisions that have dismayed his environmental supporters — decisions that would have

Millions gain break in cable TV rates

WASHINGTON — Millions of Americans will pay 10 to 15 percent less for "basic" cable TV under a law adopted Thursday by regulators reasserting their authority over an industry criticized for skyrocketing prices.

The Federal Communications Commission voted 3-0 to cut cable rates 10 percent from their Sept. 30, 1992, level and erase any increases operators imposed since then.

The rollback will apply to 57 million viewers who subscribe to more than 11,000 cable systems licensed by communities.

But spokesmen for cable companies in

Twin Falls, Burley and Ketchum will effect the FCC decision might have on Magic Valley cable rates.

In Twin Falls, King Videocable's handful of subscribers to basic cable began being paying nearly \$3 less March 1, but they also lost six channels. Other viewers began paying \$1.30 more a month to receive the same number of channels.

TCI Cablevision, serving the Rupert-Burley area, restructured its charges March 29.

Local authorities must apply the FCC guidelines for basic service — local broadcast signals plus any public-access cable

channels.

The FCC's rate formula also applies to so-called expanded basic service. The FCC will take complaints from consumers that they are paying unreasonable charges for that service, which typically includes superstations and satellite-delivered channels such as ESPN and CNN, E-Span and the Discovery Channel.

Premium channels like Home Box Office or pay-per-view services are not covered.

Subscribers are not likely to see any reductions for six months, FCC officials said. Cable operators are free to cut unreasonable high rates now to avoid paying re-

Filibuster looms on stimulus plan

WASHINGTON — All 43 Senate Republicans Thursday threatened to block President Clinton's \$16.3 billion economic stimulus package unless he reduces it to their satisfaction.

Without the support of at least some Republicans, Democrats, who are also threatened with defections within their ranks, cannot must the 60 votes necessary to end any GOP filibuster and force a vote.

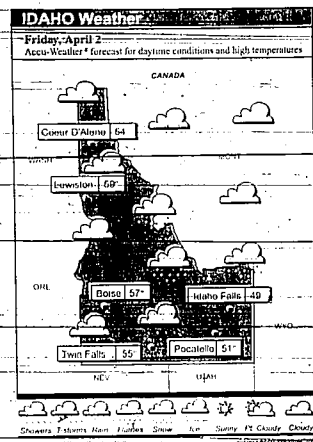
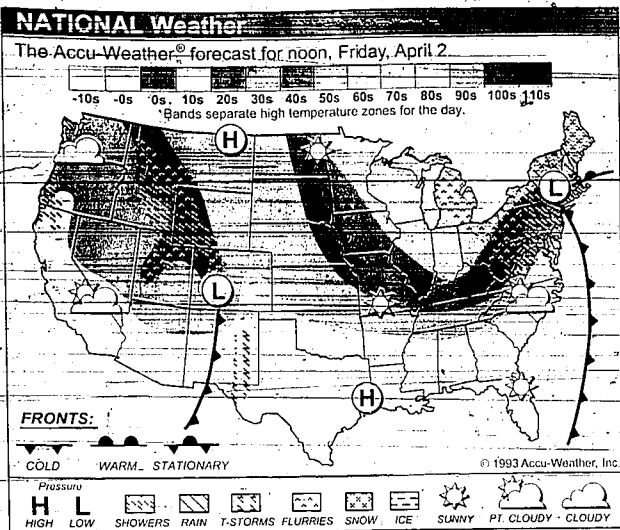
Unless a compromise is reached today, the debate could extend into Congress' Easter recess, which is to begin Saturday, and seriously delay completion of action on the president's economic plan.

"Up to this point, the president assumed he could do anything he wanted to do without working with Republicans on substantive matters," said Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas. "There will have to be dramatic changes if this bill is to be passed."

The stimulus package, a jobs and investment plan that would add to this year's deficit, was offered by Clinton separately from the budget as an insurance policy against a relapse in the economic recovery.

Congress completed work Thursday on the five-year budget blueprint that would implement Clinton's long-term economic plans and cut the deficit by \$496 billion.

Weather summary

A Pacific cold front swept across the northwest states into the intermountain region Thursday, bringing rain to Idaho.

The National Weather Service says an unstable airmass pushed in with that cold front and helped trigger a few thunderstorms in Twin Falls and Burley.

Rainfall amounts in the Magic Valley were generally around a quarter to half an inch. Lighter amounts fell in central and northern sections of the state while the eastern part was dry.

Daytime highs around the state were in the 40s to 50s with a few readings in the low 60s.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 66 degrees at Payette and Salmon. Stanley reported the coldest at 29 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 89 degrees at Lake Havasu City, Ariz. The lowest was 12 degrees at West Yellowstone, Mont., and Caribou, Maine.

From Iowa to New York, rain-swollen rivers in flood

Thunderstorms pounded the Northeast on Thursday, with rain and melting snow combining to flood rivers and streams, Iowa had severe flooding.

Snow extended over parts of New England, Michigan, Illinois and the central Mississippi Valley. A winter storm watch was posted for Friday across northern Maine.

In Iowa, streets were closed and homes were flooded as rivers rose, with record levels predicted along the Cedar and Iowa rivers. In New Hartford, residents used canoes to move down a main street after heavy rain sent Beaver Creek out of its banks. Some highways were closed.

Flooding also was reported in New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

In Unadilla, N.Y., 10 of 75 cows stranded in a flooded field died when they were swept away by water that overflowed from the Susquehanna River. In Clyde, N.Y., about 30 miles east of Rochester, the fire department evacuated residents of homes near the Erie Canal by boat when roads flooded.

In Michigan, freezing rain and high wind knocked down power lines in the Lower Peninsula, cutting electricity to more than 49,000 customers and closing schools.

At 11 a.m. MST, rain and thunderstorms were scattered from the Midwest to Michigan, across Indiana, Kentucky and western Tennessee, and in the Northwest and northern Rockies. Thunderstorms extended from the central Atlantic Coast to Florida.

Snowfall during the 6 hours ending at 11 a.m. MST included 4 inches at Portland, Maine, as well as 1 inch at Flint and Saginaw in Michigan and at Plattsburg, N.Y.

Temperatures around the nation at 1 p.m. MST ranged from 27 degrees at Worthington and Duluth, Minn., to 85 in Miami, McAllen, Texas and Blythe, Calif.

The low temperature for the lower 48 states was 4 degrees above zero at Grand Village in Yellowstone National Park, Wyo.

President plugs Russia aid plan

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (AP) — In an impassioned plea for spending scarce tax dollars on Russian aid, President Clinton said Thursday that America should help "not out of charity" but as a crucial investment for peace and prosperity.

"The danger is clear if Russia's reforms turn sour, if it reverts to authoritarianism or disintegrates into chaos," Clinton said, two days before a summit with beleaguered Russian President Boris Yeltsin in Vancouver, British Columbia.

The world cannot afford to see Russia turn into a much larger version of chaotic Yugoslavia "armed with a vast arsenal of nuclear weapons," Clinton said.

"He made his case in a speech before a convention of the American Society of Newspaper Editors, meeting at the U.S. Naval Academy."

It was his most detailed discussion of the political and economic crisis in Russia since he took office. Clinton offered an unqualified endorsement of Yeltsin as the leader of reforms.

"The success of Russia's renewal must be a first-order concern to our country," he said.

Yeltsin, who narrowly overcame an impeachment attempt, is looking to the West for money and technical assistance to ease Russian misery resulting in part from belt-tightening economic reforms.

The Russian leader also hopes Clinton can boost his prestige before an April 25 referendum on who has ultimate authority: Yeltsin or the Communist-era Congress.

Before his speech, Clinton had lunch with 4,000 midshipmen at the Naval Academy and told them that the more the United States backs democracy in Russia, "the less likely you will have to be sent in harm's way."

From Annapolis, Clinton went to Andrews Air Force Base and boarded Air Force One to fly to Portland, Ore.

There, before the weekend summit with Yeltsin, he and Vice President Al Gore will hold a conference on the bitter dispute between loggers and environmentalists over the future of old-growth forests in the Pacific Northwest.

brought scorn on other presidents, George Bush for one, who lacked Clinton's pro-environment record.

Without warning, the new administration moved to disband the White House Council on Environmental Quality, a Clinton legacy and protective at times, and during the Reagan administration it was largely ignored. But through good times and bad, it faithfully oversaw the National Environmental Policy Act, which requires government organizations to prepare highly detailed environmental impact statements showing the consequences of actions they contemplate.

Confronted with its first tough decision in enforcement of the Endangered Species Act, the administration extended protection to the California gnatcatcher, a tiny songbird inhabiting some of the state's most valuable real estate — but with conditions. Developers will be able to build on their property immediately if they participate in a state program to create a coastal scrub preserve as gnatcatcher habitat.

Before its first month was out, the administration was suggesting that the time has come for a review of the 35-year-old Delaney clause in the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic

Act. The law, recently upheld by the courts, bans any level of cancer-causing pesticides from processed foods.

Under pressure from Western Democrats in the Senate, the White House earlier this week agreed to drop from its budget plan proposals for increased grazing fees and new royalties on hard rock minerals mined from public lands as well as a phase-out of money losing timber sales from national forests.

Still, the honeymoon lingers on for Clinton. And Clinton's proposed energy tax is viewed by many as the touchstone of new environmental policy.

education seemed paramount. Andrus had proposed a 10.5 percent increase in aid to \$549 million in his tax enhanced budget. But after days of fighting, the Legislature agreed on just \$528 million, less than officials estimated was needed to maintain the educational system at current levels.

"This budget will certainly increase class size, ignore improvement cut our already meager effort at reform and raise property taxes in many districts," Andrus said. "Until the Legislature softens its knee-jerk resistance to change, Idaho's school children will be the losers."

Lawmakers paved the way for

their scaled-down support effort by voting to repeal the requirement that every school district have a program for gifted and talented students by next fall. Officials estimated meeting that mandate would cost millions of dollars, and the governor signed the repeal legislation on Thursday.

In vetoing the \$3.2 million in state cash to cover indigent medical bills that counties will now be responsible for, Andrus said the state will not assume those expenses until the Legislature makes good on its part of the two-year-old deal to finance the medically needy program that extends subsidized health care to poor children.

The \$3.2 million earmarked for state payment of those catastrophic medical bills will be deposited in the budget reserve account under legislation still awaiting the governor's signature.

The change in the election law's filing deadline for independent candidates was prompted, at least in part, by GOP frustration with Panhandle tax activist Ron Rankin and the independent campaigns he has generated that have just thrown elections to Democratic candidates.

Andrus said he vetoed the bill because he saw no need to squelch independent candidacies before the selections of the major parties are known. But legislative Democrats stated bluntly that the bill was intended to resolve the GOP problem with Rankin and Republicans did not deny it.

The bill's sponsor, Rep. Mark Stubbs, R-Twin Falls, accused Andrus of vetoing the bill for political reasons.

"Independent candidates have been spoilers in elections for both Republicans and Democrats, but most recently the impact has been against Republicans up north," Stubbs said. "It's fine with me, because down here independents spoil Democrats."

Defense abruptly rests case

Lawyers wanted to 'surprise' prosecutor; King trial could end next week

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Defense attorneys in the Rodney King beating trial stunned a federal court Thursday by abruptly resting their case, a move one lawyer said was designed to unnerve prosecutors.

Attorney Harland Braun, who had told Assistant U.S. Attorney Steven Clymer he had 10 witnesses waiting to testify but then called none, said outside court: "I just wanted to keep Clymer up till 3 in the morning ... they can't deal with surprise."

Braun and attorney Paul De Pasquale, who represents former police officer Timothy Wind, halted the defense by resting without calling any further witnesses Thursday morning.

The attorney for Officer Laurence Powell rested late Wednesday, canceling his client's expected testimony.

The lawyers deplored they stopped their case because several witnesses had backfired on them, most notably a highway patrolwoman who went on the stand as she recalled the brutality of King's beating.

King acknowledged his client, Theodore Briseno, disagreed with Koon's handling of King's arrest and testified so at the state trial, which ended in acquittal on most charges. That verdict set off three days of deadly rioting.

Braun said Briseno joined forces with his co-defendants in the federal trial to deprive the government of a split defense.

"We got together and we decided less is better," Braun said.

Only one of the four white policemen on trial, the sergeant who commanded the March 3, 1991, videotaped beating of the black motorist, took the stand in the federal trial. Other defendants said Sgt. Stacey Koon adequately defended them.

"Stacey Koon speaks for everyone who's willing to accept responsibility for their actions," said Braun. "We salute Stacey Koon."

Braun expected the case to go to the jury by Wednesday.

Clymer said he was unprepared to call rebuttal witnesses immediately because of the premature defense conclusion. He moved to play for jurors a two-hour segment of Briseno's videotaped testimony at the officers' state trial. The defense objected and the judge did not immediately rule.

U.S. District Judge John G. Davies also took under-consideration motions by the four defendants to be immediately acquitted. Their lawyers said the government didn't prove its case.

Powell, Wind and Briseno are charged with willfully violating King's civil rights by using unreasonable force. Koon is accused of failing to stop an unreasonable beating. If convicted, the officers could face 10 years in prison and fines of \$250,000.

DePasquale called only one witness for Wind on Wednesday, a passenger in King's car the night of the beating. Bryant Allen retracted his previous statements that King's behavior frightened him. The only thing he was scared of, he said, was the police.

Powell: 4,000 troops to remain in Somalia

WASHINGTON (AP) — Army Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said Thursday some 4,000 U.S. troops will remain in Somalia through next year in support of the humanitarian relief operation.

Civil war has contributed to widespread famine in Somalia, and military officials and aid workers have expressed fear that serious malnutrition will return unless a solution can be found to Somalia's rival clans.

Testifying before the Senate Armed Services Committee, Powell said U.S. troops number about 10,000 and he expects the force to total about 4,000 during the summer. The U.S. contingent has ranged as high as 20,000 since then-President Bush began dispatching troops Dec. 9.

Supplementing the support force will be an off-shore, rapid-deployment unit of 1,000 troops.

"We'll probably have something like 4,000 there for this year and also next year's support operation," Powell said.

Powell and Defense Secretary Les

Aspin answered the panel's questions on a wide range of issues, including next year's military budget and homosexuals in the military.

Aspin assured the committee that he will work in tandem with the military, including the joint chiefs, on finding a way to implement President Clinton's plan to end the ban of homosexuals.

Powell took exception with reports that the military is trying to undermine Clinton's efforts, saying there has been "a lot of stupid commentary about the chiefs being insubordinate."

The general said "We have heard the president clearly" and will work with Aspin and his staff on the issue.

Aspin has described his \$263.4 billion budget for fiscal 1994, beginning Oct. 1, as a "breathing water" blueprint that puts off major cuts in weapon systems pending an overall review.

Both Aspin and Powell agreed that one of the first cuts will likely come from the military's plan to build four tactical aircraft at a cost of about \$350 billion over several years.

Slain abortion doctor's son calls for stop to 'terrorist acts'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The son of a doctor killed outside an abortion clinic urged Congress on Thursday to stop "terrorist acts" and intimidation by anti-abortion groups.

"My father was murdered because no one took the appropriate measures beforehand," declared David Gunn Jr. He said his father had been stalked and harassed at restaurants long before the shooting in Florida last month.

But anti-abortion activists, testify-

ing at the same House Judiciary subcommittee, urged lawmakers not to step on their First Amendment rights.

The panel has already passed a bill prohibiting people from blocking abortion clinics. It is now studying whether to expand the legislation to protect women and doctors from harassment away from clinics — a step the Clinton administration favors.

The legislation "strikes at the

heart of what it means to live in political freedom — the right to dissent, vigorously ... without fear of oppressive, crushing retaliation from the government," said Randall Terry, founder of Operation Rescue.

Terry said his group was non-violent and that abortion rights supporters had tried to tar all the opponents as fanatics. He said his group's purpose was to stop doctors from performing abortions and to "expose them, humiliate them

and disgrace them."

Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., the bill's sponsor, wanted to know what the difference was between exposing doctors and threatening them.

There's a Grand Canyon of difference," Terry said.

Doctors remove bullet from Lee's body

WILMINGTON, N.C. (AP) — A bullet was removed Thursday from the body of actor Brandon Lee, who died after a movie-set accident with a prop gun that was supposed to fire blanks, police said.

A .44-caliber bullet was removed during an autopsy, Capt. L.P. Thomas said.

He declined further comment pending release of the autopsy report. A brief police statement did not say if the bullet was fired by the prop gun.

Lee, the 28-year-old son of the late martial arts star Bruce Lee, died Wednesday about 12 hours after being wounded on the set of an action-adventure movie that has been plagued by mishaps.

A projectile that was apparently fired from a prop gun entered Lee's abdomen and lodged against his spine, Dr. Warren W. McMurry said Wednesday after operating on Lee.

He did not remove the object during surgery.

The actor was starring in "The Crow," a movie based on an adult comic book of the same name. He was playing a rock star who is murdered by a gang, then comes back to life with supernatural powers to avenge his death.

Executive Producer Bob Rosen said Lee was standing about 20 feet from the gun when it was fired. When a blank is fired, a piece of soft-wadding normally comes out of the gun. Instead, some other kind of projectile came out.

"I've never heard of anything like this before. I don't know how it got in there," Rosen said.

The shooting is being treated as accidental, but police will examine film shot during the scene and interview witnesses, Chief Robert Waldman said. He would not release the shooter's name.

Lee told NBC-TV recently that he understood the risk of injury.

"I'm a professional. The stuntmen are professionals. Within the boundaries of that, there are accidents," he said.

Bruce Lee died in 1973 at age 32 of brain edema, or swelling, but a coroner's description of "death by misadventure" fed rumors of drugs.

Federal government spends \$4,599 on each American

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government spent \$4,599 for every American last year, \$317 more than the year before, the Census Bureau said Thursday.

Nearly 12 cents out of every federal dollar was spent in California. Altogether, federal spending in the states totaled \$1.2 trillion during the government's 1992 fiscal year, which ended last Sept. 30. That's a nearly 9 percent more than the year before.

More than half that money went directly to individuals as retirement, disability, Social Security or other benefits.

Idaho received \$4,721,000 during that fiscal year. That amounted to \$4,424.68 for every person in the state.

The Census Bureau tally excluded some spending, such as interest on the federal debt, international payments, and foreign aid and spending by the CIA and other intelligence agencies.

Out of each dollar spent by the government, about 17 cents went to buy

White House won't back off energy tax, Bentsen tells leaders

WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen told business leaders Thursday the Clinton administration won't budge on its proposed energy tax, but he listened with interest to their plea for more investment incentives.

Top officials of the National Association of Manufacturers, in an hour-long private meeting with Bentsen and senior deputies, complained that the proposed tax on energy ranging from gasoline to coal to electricity would amount to a tax on production.

"It would put U.S. manufacturers at a disadvantage with their overseas competitors and hurt the administration's effort to create jobs," they said.

Stanley C. Gault, chief executive of Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. of Akron, Ohio, said the tax would add \$1 to \$1.50 to the cost of making tires in the United States, hampering his company's efforts to compete against Michelin of France and Pirelli of Italy.

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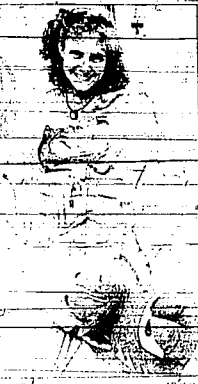

Woman recuperates from attack

TWIN FALLS (AP) — Sandra Rossi, a woman who was hospitalized with a crocodile-shaped slip,

It's part of the 27-year-old adventure's prescription to ward off the blues: wear a crocodile-shaped slip.

"I can't afford to be depressed," she said.

Rossi, a resident of Pocatillo, is recovering from a crocodile attack.

Her misadventure happened in Tipton, where she was a tutor for a daughter of zoologists (Lense and John Hart), who are identifying plant and animal life there. For 20 years, the Harts have lived in a local retreat, never bothered by crocodiles.

But one evening, Rossi went to Tipton in the afternoon with zoologist Ken Cochrane and two Hart children. Afterward, with everyone else drying off on a hot, Rossi went back in the water to change her hair. "And I got clamped," she said.

The crocodile had latched onto Rossi's arm.

Cochrane tried punching the crocodile on the snout, expecting the "claw" to loosen its grip. It didn't. He pulled Rossi out of the water. The crocodile pulled her down and rolled her under water.

He wrestled the reptile. It bit him twice.

After 10 minutes, the crocodile finally lifted Rossi and shook her and her forehead pulled loose from the animal's bite. Bits of bone, muscle, and her hand, dangled from Rossi's elbow.

The damaged limb was amputated and after 10 days in a hospital, Rossi flew home.

Rossi, who is right-handed, keeps up her spirits joking and talking about her mishap, including the day she satisfied a need for revenge.

Before leaving Africa, she and Cochrane visited a crocodile.

"We bought crocodiles," Rossi said. "Like an arm's worth."

Prices, ads stall smoking decline

ATLANTA (AP) — Just one year after smoking reached a record low, Americans stopped kicking the habit and more blacks and women started smoking, federal health officials reported Thursday.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention blamed discount cigarettes and \$3.9 billion in tobacco advertising for the reversal, and called for cigarette tax increases.

"We need to look at bold steps because we're not making the progress we need to make," said Dr. Michael Eriksen, director of the CDC's Office of Smoking and Health.

The figure for 1991, the latest for which statistics are available, mark the end of 25 years of steady decreases in smoking. And they mean the United States won't meet a national health objective: only 15 percent of Americans smoking by the year 2000.

Also taken as an off-year 2000 pace, Eriksen said, "At the current rate, we'll only reach 19 percent."

Discount cigarettes, which can cost as much as \$1 less per pack

than national brands, and promotions such as free samples and \$5-off coupons for cautious make smoking more affordable, Eriksen said.

"That is contributing to people continuing to smoke who in the past otherwise would have quit," he said.

The CDC found that 25.7 percent of Americans — 46.3 million people smoked in 1991. In 1990, 25.5 percent smoked, the lowest level since the CDC began counting in 1955.

Because the difference between the two years is less than half a percentage point, the CDC said the nation's smoking habits leveled off in 1991.

But more blacks — 29.2 percent versus 26.2 percent in 1990 — and more women — 23.5 percent versus 22.8 percent — smoked in 1991, it said.

The CDC couldn't explain the increase among women except to point to advertising targeting women's fears of weight gain if they stop smoking.

"This is particularly disturbing be-

cause more women today die of lung cancer than die of breast cancer and lung cancer is totally preventable," Eriksen said.

The CDC said the increase among blacks could be related to the 1990 failed attempt to market a cigarette geared toward blacks. A national outcry by black organizations that condemned the Uptown cigarette campaign was credited with helping the level of smoking among blacks drop to 26.2 percent that year.

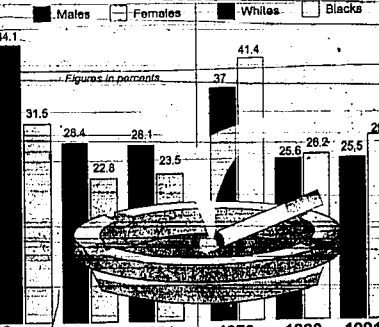
The following year, some blacks who tried to quit during the Uptown uproar may have begun smoking again, Eriksen said. The CDC is pursuing a separate study to confirm the effects of the Uptown campaign.

The CDC also found that smoking was most prevalent among people 25-44, Indians and Eskimos, those who live below the poverty line and people with less than a high school education.

The CDC based the figures on an annual national survey of about 43,000 people.

Vaccination plan draws cheers, warnings

WASHINGTON (AP) — Children's advocates applauded a \$1.1 billion Clinton administration plan proposed Thursday to provide shots for all children at government expense.

Displeased drug companies said they might spend less to find new life-saving vaccines.

In a message to Congress, President Clinton said his legislative proposal will spare children "the deadly onslaught of infectious diseases" and tear down "the financial barriers

to immunization."

His health secretary, Donna E. Shalala, flanked by prominent Democratic lawmakers and the head of the Children's Defense Fund, said immunization was "the right thing to do and the smart thing to do."

"Children are America's greatest resource, and protecting them should be viewed as a basic function of government, on par with protecting our water, our air and our food," said Shalala.

The vaccines would be free at

public clinics and private physicians' offices. Clinton said private physicians could charge for giving the shots unless the fee would prevent vaccination of someone unable to pay.

Children's Defense Fund President Marian Wright Edelman said the bill would mean "hard-pressed American families will no longer have to confront impossible choices between immunizing their children and buying groceries, heat or other necessities."

Clinton calls press fair, blasts rumor-mongering

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (AP) — President Clinton told newspaper editors today that he thinks news coverage of his presidency has been "remarkably fair and thorough."

But he lambasted recent stories about his administration's relationship with the military, calling one "an abject lie."

"I don't think we ought to be out here rumor mongering myself," Clinton told the American Society of Newspaper Editors, meeting in Annapolis, Md. "I think it does very little to support the public interest."

The president singled out one off-the-record story in which a member of his staff allegedly told a lieutenant general she didn't speak to the military.

"Those kind of stories, they're all just made up out of whole cloth. And people who run them based on gossip or people who talk about

them from podiums ought to be ashamed of themselves without knowing they're true," Clinton said.

The Washington Post on Thursday quoted Army Lt. Gen. Barry R. McCaffrey as saying the incident happened to him. Efforts to reach him for comment were not immediately successful.

Clinton said it is hard for a modern president to keep the public in the dark on big issues because, he contended, the news media are always looking for new angles.

"Because of CNN and others who now give virtually continuous direct access to the facts of what is going on to wide numbers of people, there is even more pressure than there used to be on everybody in the media to find an angle to the story, a unique angle, an insight, a twist," the president said.

He said he saw a survey recently

in which two-thirds of those asked said he was spending enough time on health care, while only half said he was spending enough time on what he says is his major focus — the economy.

Wells wants execution to proceed

BOISE — Condemned killer Keith Eugene Wells has asked that his execution be allowed to proceed.

Wells, 30, of Boise, made the request in petitions filed with 4th District Judge Gerald Schroeder and the Idaho Supreme Court, Boise attorney John Adams said Wednesday.

He was sentenced to death for killing John Huston, 33, and Ronald Rains, 20, both of Boise, at Boise's Rose Pub on Dec. 20, 1990. Wells, who was on parole from prison, robbed the bar of \$150 and beat both victims to death.

Besides wanting his execution to proceed, Adams and Wells asked the Idaho Supreme Court to rule against him on his attempted appeal and Schroeder to allow him to withdraw his post conviction petition.

Charge dropped against club owner

MOSCOW — A grand theft charge against Xenon nightclub owner Barry Eli Tassler has been dismissed because a material witness refuses to testify.

Quentell Hicks, who is charged with the theft of several items allegedly found at the Xenon club, said he would exercise his right against self-incrimination and refused to testify at Tassler's preliminary hearing. The hearing had been set for Wednesday afternoon.

Moscow attorney Robert Tumich — who represents Hicks — wrote in a letter to the court his client plans to seek suppression of statements he made to police after being arrested in December.

A charge of robbery is still pending against Tassler. He allegedly used force to take a camera belonging to Mark Plampan at Xenon. Police said found the alleged stolen property at Xenon when investigating the camera incident.

Center should cure Kootenai needs

BONNERS FERRY — Intimidating paperwork and a 725 mile drive have for years stymied health care for the Kootenai Tribe of Bonners Ferry.

A new medical center being built on the tribe's 12.5 acre property should cure that problem. Tribal leaders hope the center will restore health among members and help the 145 member branch rebuild its ranks.

"People are excited," said Velma Bahe, tribal vice chairman and community health representative.

"We have a lot of elders and families that refuse care now. They're distrustful. It will be nice when they can come here and get the services they need."

Work on the 6,000-square-foot center began five years ago when the tribe hired Tim Hunt as its executive director.

Shively pleads guilty to sexual assault

MOSCOW — Carl Shively, 23, pleaded guilty to felony counts of battery and sodomy in connection with the reported sexual assault of a University of Idaho female student.

Second District Judge John Bengtson tentatively accepted Shively's pleas resulting from a plea agreement.

The judge set sentencing for May 17 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Under the plea agreement, Bengtson could refuse to accept the deal after reviewing the pre-sentence investigation report. The agreement calls for Bengtson to have a number of sentencing options, all of which include prison time for Shively.

In the meantime, there are reports that a plea agreement may be worked out for Shively's wife, Charise Shively.

She pleaded innocent Monday to aiding and abetting her husband in the alleged sexual assault of the UI student.

Lawsuit challenges land-use plans

SALMON (AP) — Coeur d'Alene lawyer Scott Reed is challenging increasingly popular local land-use plans, patterned on a New Mexico county ordinance that bases public land use on maximizing private gain.

A land-use ordinance adopted by Catron County, N.M., has been the model for similar ordinances in several western states. At least six counties in Idaho, including Boundary, Lemhi and Custer, have adopted the Catron ordinance in the interim while working out their own land-use plans.

Another half dozen or more are considering the Catron model.

"In my view, they have been deceived by the promises of the Federal Lands (Bureau), a coalition advocating multiple use of public lands," Reed said.

The Catron ordinance maintains that the use of public lands and natural resources should be determined by private interests seeking to maximize private gain. Proponents of the ordinance, such as the Wise Use movement, see federal land management as a threat to private property rights.

Reed's opponents, 17 plaintiffs challenging the land-use plan in Boundary County, The U.S. Conservation League is among the plaintiffs.

Central to plans based on Catron County's are local definitions of custom, culture and economic stability. Federal law requires agencies to consider local custom and culture in deciding how to manage public lands.

Supported by working committees expert in such areas as grazing, logging, water and wildlife, county officials hope to be better able to assess impacts on private interests from public land policies, then respond accordingly.

Ruth Kanter, executive director of the National Lands Conference in Bountiful, Utah, calls the Boundary County suit "trifling."

Yeltsin's decrees due review

MOSCOW (AP) — Opening a new round in Russia's power struggle, lawmakers asked the Constitutional Court on Thursday to review presidential decrees that escalated the country's political crisis.

The Supreme Soviet standing legislature seeks to nullify Boris Yeltsin's March 20 decree ordering a referendum on who should wield supreme power: president or parliament.

The Supreme Soviet's parent body, the Communist-dominated Congress of People's Deputies, already vetoed the decree and the court previously ruled 9-3 that it was partially unconstitutional.

But the 247-member Supreme Soviet sought additional rulings that could provide legal ground for blocking Yeltsin from calling a plebiscite on April 25 to compete with one ordered by the Congress. Yeltsin's aides, however, have said the president was no longer leaning toward holding a rival plebiscite.

The Supreme Soviet also asked the court to overturn earlier Yeltsin decrees granting autonomy to Cossacks in southern Russia and creating influential presidential "representatives" in the regions.

The 1,033-member Congress endorsed Yeltsin's proposal for a referendum Monday. But it loaded the ballot with a question about Russia's painful economic reforms that could embarrass Yeltsin.

The Congress also said the four referendum questions must be approved by 50 percent of Russia's 105 million eligible voters, rather than just a majority of those who cast ballots. That could make approval of any question difficult — if not impossible.

Yeltsin has criticized the requirements as illegal and aides said the president would challenge them in the Constitutional Court.

The president remains popular in Russia, but his reforms are widely criticized for causing a sharp drop in living standards.

Sub collision near-disaster, Russian says

MOSCOW (AP) — A U.S. attack submarine that banged into a Russian missile sub last month nearly hit the Russian boat's nuclear reactors, which could have spewed radioactivity into the sea, a Russian naval officer said.

However, a British military analyst said Thursday it was unlikely the reactors would have exploded or split open if the compartment had been rent open and flooded in the March 20 collision in the Barents Sea off Russia's northern coast.

Pentagon spokesmen said U.S. military leaders had no comment.

Both countries reported minor damage to the submarines after the accident.

Rear Admiral Alexey Ovcharenko, who investigated the incident, said the nuclear-powered USS Grayling struck the hull of the Russian submarine about 65 feet from the reactor compartment.

In an interview published Thursday by the newspaper Rossiiskaya Gazeta, he said that flooding in the compartment would have prevented the crew from shutting down its two nuclear reactors. The reactors would then overheat and eventually explode, releasing radiation into the ocean, he said.

"The calculation of the routes, speed and masses of the two vessels show that mere luck saved the subs from destruction," he said. "Equally disastrous would have been a hit at the area housing our submarine's ballistic missile launchers."

The Russian submarine, identified only as a Delta III class vessel, was carrying 16 multiple warhead nuclear missiles, Ovcharenko said.

Father of Spanish king dies at age 79

PAMPLONA, Spain (AP) — Juan de Borbon, father of King Juan Carlos and pretender to the Spanish throne during the Franco regime, died Thursday, national radio said. He was 79.

Don Juan, as he was known in Spain, had battled throat cancer for five years and had been hospitalized in the University of Navarra Clinic in this northern Spanish city since Sept. 16.

Juan de Borbon set aside his aspirations to the Spanish throne in 1978 and acknowledged his son, Juan Carlos, as king.

The 17-year-old driver of a 1975 Pontiac Grand Prix failed to notice a curve on Golf Course Road one mile west of U.S. Highway 93, and the car turned over, Jerome County Sheriff's deputy John Gibbs said.

Gibbs said the man sustained shoulder injuries and was taken to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

The deputy added that he could not release the name of the driver or of the passenger, a 17-year-old Kimberly boy who was not seriously hurt.

Rep. Crapo brings wilderness forum to Twin Falls today

TWIN FALLS - Rep. Mike Crapo, R-Idaho, will sponsor a meeting at 7 p.m. today in the Community Room of KMTV on Blue Lakes Boulevard North to gather local public opinion on wilderness designations for the remaining 9.3 million acres of roadless national forest lands within Idaho.

Jeffrey Thomas, 21, was set to stand trial Tuesday on a charge of first-degree murder in the killing of 46-year-old Sacramento Aguilar.

Rather than face a possible death sentence if convicted, Thomas has agreed to plead guilty to second-degree murder on Tuesday, Gooding County Prosecutor Phil Brown said.

Thomas' attorney, Jeff Stoker, of Twin Falls, confirmed that his client plans to plead guilty to the lesser charge.

"That's the pending arrangement," Stoker said. "I don't foresee anything changing."

But Thomas could change his mind before Tuesday and stick with his original plea of innocent, Stoker said.

If a guilty plea is accepted by the judge, a presentence investigation into Thomas' background will be ordered. When it is completed, he will be sentenced.

Brown said he will recommend that Thomas be given the maximum sentence of life in prison. Stoker declined to comment on his own sentencing recommendation.

Aguilar's body was found Aug. 31 in a car beside the road in southeastern Gooding County. He had been shot several times with a .38-caliber semi-automatic handgun, Brown said.

The murder weapon has not been found, Brown said.

Thomas lives near where Aguilar's body was found. He was arrested in Twin Falls Sept. 26 and has been held the Gooding County Jail without bond since then.

An eye on greener pastures

Wet winter bodes well for South Hills grazing; fire damage healing rapidly

TWIN FALLS - Rain drummed an encouraging tattoo on the hillsides as ranchers gathered with Forest Service officials Thursday to discuss grazing on the Sawtooth National Forest this summer.

"I think it's going to be a lot better up there for cattle this year," rancher Bill Williams said.

With lots of snow and rain, the hills will produce more and better quality grass and will leave more water in the livestock ponds, he said.

Williams is part of the Western Stockgrowers Association, a group of ranchers who run their livestock on the Twin Falls Ranger District of the Sawtooth forest. The group met Thursday to discuss last year's grazing operations and plans for the Rock Creek Cattle and Horse Allotment.

Williams said he remembers only one year as dry as last year, when even some of the best water holes dried up. 1977 was dry, but most springs field out.

It was a tough year, Forest Service range conservationist Ralph Jenkins agreed. Drought and cold weather meant poor forage and little water for his stock, sending cattle home early, he said.

This year the 65,000-acre Rock Creek Allotment, the northwest portion of the 320,000-acre ranger district in the South Hills, also will get back the 6,000 to 7,000 acres that burned in the Indian Spring wildfire during summer of 1991.

Temporary fences around the burned area will be taken down, and the materials used to build new fences where needed, District Ranger Don Oman said.

Bushes and grasses are coming back well in the burned area, which will be reopened to grazing this summer, he said.

Jenkins praised general maintenance of fences and stock water systems.

But some areas in the allotment still don't meet guidelines for grazing lands in the forest's 1987 Land and Resource Management Plan, "forest plan" for short.

A long-standing problem area is the scenic corridor along the Oakley-Rogerson Road. Forest officials have long recognized that cattle grazing along Shoshone Creek

has been excessive.

The area looked good on July 3 last year, but by August it was looking "pretty tough," Jenkins said.

"I'm not sure we can manage livestock and meet standards and grades," he said.

Officials hope to resolve the issue in a new Allotment Management Plan for the entire allotment.

Jenkins pointed out that forest regulations require salt blocks for cattle be set out at least 100 feet from roads.

But some of the roads are "salting" roads, tracks from pickups setting out salt, Williams replied. He suggested mapping the roads that ranchers must keep salt away from.

Oman asked if about 150 cattle could be let into a fenced riparian pasture along the South Fork of Shoshone Creek early in the season to demonstrate that areas can be grazed and still show an improvement.

"I don't think that would be hard to do," rancher Dave Crockett said.

Walton predicts ongoing 'civil war'

JEROME - The chairman of the Idaho Citizens Alliance says his sights are set higher than the current anti-gay rights initiative his group is pushing.

"This is just the first of many issues," Kelly Walton said during a presentation in Jerome Wednesday night.

Walton and the ICA have begun a drive to put their "Idaho Civil Rights Act" on the 1994 ballot. If 32,061 registered voters sign the petition, and the measure is approved in the general election, it will prevent gays from achieving "minority status," Walton says.

The measure would forbid state or local laws making homosexuality "the legal or social equivalent of race, color, religion, gender, age, national origin, marriage or family."

It would also limit what school counselors and teachers could say to students about homosexuality and bar governments from

spending tax dollars to "sanction or express approval of homosexuality."

But the gay rights issue "is a small part of a nationwide cultural civil war," Walton said.

Williams may not run again

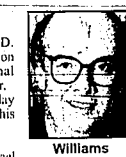

TWIN FALLS - State Auditor J.D. Williams, after a losing, bruising election battle for Idaho's 2nd Congressional seat, may bow out of politics altogether.

Williams, a Democrat, said Thursday that he may not run next year when his seat comes up for re-election.

"It's about 50-50 now," he said. Former Idaho Senate Pro Tem Michael Crapo, soundly defeated Williams in a heated election battle that included an investigation into the use of money in Williams' state office.

"I'm tired," Williams said. "I'm really tired."



Williams was appointed auditor in 1989. Before, he was Franklin County prosecutor from 1975 to 1981 and mayor of Preston from 1984 to 1986. He also lost an election to Jim Williams for attorney general in 1992.

Williams has also said he isn't interested in running for governor, a seat that is opening up because of Gov. Cecil Andrus' decision not to run for re-election.

Development Director Lamar Orton said. The city has already negotiated to take

over a grazing lease on land above Blue Lakes Spring, which will secure the city's water source.

The city has agreed with the federal Environmental Protection Agency to stop using Alphas Spring.

The spring was determined to be vulnerable to pollution because its water comes from Blue Lakes.

The state, meanwhile, will write a management plan for the land that probably would include commercial development, such as shopping centers and hotels. The plan will take about a year to develop, Williams said, if the city doesn't buy the parcel.

"I think it's important that there not be the impression that we're trying to stop development on the north side of the bridge," Orton said.

"Our concern is the kind of development that may have an impact on our water."

Day care hit with charges

TWIN FALLS - The owner of the Children's Village day care center was charged Thursday with counts of operating a day care without a fire inspection certificate and 34 counts of not having the required state license.

Carl M. Puffali, 33, was ordered to appear in Magistrate Court April 9 to answer the misdemeanor charges. She could not be reached for comment Thursday.

According to the complaint against Puffali, she has been operating the day care since January, even though her state license was revoked more than a year ago.

After receiving a complaint from the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare last month, Twin Falls police detective K.C. Dudley, charged Puffali's home at 369 E. 1st St. on Tuesday.

On March 9, eight children were dropped off between 6:45 a.m. and 8:15 a.m.; seven children were left at the house the next morning, Dudley said in a statement included in Puffali's court file.

Armed with that information, Dudley obtained a search warrant the next day. Inside the Puffali home, detectives found records that showed the day care had been operating at least since January, Dudley's affidavit said.

The records show that six to 16 children were at the house on 44 different days over the past three months, Dudley said in the affidavit.

The records also show Puffali hired an assistant to work at the day care, Dudley's statement said.

A fire inspection certificate is required for any group day care facility. The family day care home, a group day care is any place caring for seven to 12 children. A family day care home takes care of six or fewer children.

The remaining 11 counts stem from a failure to obtain a state day care license, which is required by law by anyone caring for 15 or more children.

Puffali has no previous criminal record, according to the court file, but Thursday charges are not the first time Children's Village has drawn the eye of authorities.

The city fire certificate and state license were revoked in 1991 after Health and Welfare employees said Puffali violated her permits by allowing children to be kept in a basement that does not have proper fire exits.

An administrative hearing in February 1992 upheld that license suspension.

Other complaints against Children's Village included failure to display the permit in a prominent location.

Buy state land, protect water source, auditor says

TWIN FALLS - The city of Twin Falls could buy a large chunk of state land north of the Perrine Bridge to protect its water supply, state Auditor J.D. Williams said Thursday.

Williams, in town for an Idaho Land Board hearing, said the city could best gain control of the land by purchasing it.

"The smartest thing to do is buy that parcel from us," said Williams, a member of the land board.

The state owns 1,620 acres of land north of Perrine Bridge.

Because the board must manage the land to earn money for schools, the state can't leave it idle.

That would be the best course of action for Twin Falls City, which is trying to avoid building a \$20 million to \$30 million filtration system for its water supply.

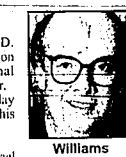
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Kimberly day care protests

KIMBERLY, A Kimberly businesswoman says she has purchased a \$50 permit from the city to allow her to operate a day care center in her home. She says she should have no problem with the city's permit law.

But city officials say Theresa Albright is in violation of local laws, and they have no plans to go out of their way to locate and make others pay the special use permit fee.

When Theresa Albright started the Alphabet Playhouse day care center in Kimberly two years ago, she decided not to pay the city's permit fee.

"I called the other day, after providers in town and mine, and she explained," he said. "I said, 'Well, this industry, they must not enforce this, so I never applied for one.'"

Now, the city says that Albright must apply for the \$50 permit, a demand that Albright says is unfair.

"All I want is equal justice," she said. "They need to make everybody comply with the same rules. If they have a problem because they're not making everybody do this, I never applied for one."

Mayor Jesse Posey said Albright's violation was brought to the city's attention when a contractor applied for a building

permit to do remodeling work at Albright's business.

"We had information that there was a day care center there," Posey said. "We followed up, and it was her address."

The city follows up on known violations of the special use permit ordinance, he said, but not on those who do not seek out violations.

Albright requires no day care licenses, Posey said, but no one would mind making sure every day care has complied.

"It's the same thing as running a stop sign," he said. "If you get caught, you're guilty. There may be six other people that run a stop sign, but they don't get caught."

Last week, city attorney William Hoffstedt sent Albright a letter stating that the city will get a court order forcing her to comply or close her business.

In residential zones, Hoffstedt said, a special-use permit is required for all home businesses. The attorney said he has written letters for zoning violations throughout the six or eight years he has served Kimberly.

"I wouldn't say it's a common letter," he said. "But I send out a letter whenever the city requests it, if there is or appears to be a violation."

Child's home, he said, reported, Hoffstedt said, the city does not know how many cottage industries are in town.

"The other known day care operators do have special-use permits," he said. "She (Albright) is not being singled out by the city."

Posey said Albright is making too much of the matter and is not being fair to the other day care operators who are in compliance with the law.

But Albright said it is the city's responsibility, not hers, to find out who is in violation.

"I thought that was their job as city officials because we pay their wages," she said.

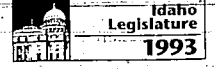
Albright added that finding businesses that are not in compliance is an easy enough task.

She said she called the Department of Health and Welfare, which monitors her with a list of 15 day care centers in Kimberly in residential zones. Only one has city permits, Albright said.

Meanwhile, Albright said she has gone ahead and applied for the permit. "If they're saying you have to have it, but they're not going to make everybody comply, then why should some person have to comply?" she asked.

New bingo laws, including \$100 license fee, go into effect May 1

BOISE (AP) — Charitable bingo games and fund-raising raffles will come under new state laws starting May 1.



Gov. Cecil Andrus asserted that Thursday, signing a bill approved by the 1993 Idaho Legislature on the final day of the session.

There was some question whether the new law would allow charitable bingo games used across the state to raise money for nonprofit purposes. A temporary law approved in a special legislative session last year was to expire June 30, and the Legislature was divided over whether to replace it.

Statewide May 1 organizations will have to pay a \$100 license fee and a three-cent county fee. Those approved by the state Lottery Commission.

Other provisions:

- Bingo games are limited to three per week, eight hours per session and a top prize of \$1,200 per game.
- The payout for one session of a game is \$1,000. The limit for a raffle is \$1,000. There is no limit on the value of uncash prizes.
- No more than 65 percent of gross revenue can go for prizes, at least 18 percent of the gross must go to the sponsoring charity or nonprofit organization and no more than 17 percent can go for operating expenses.
- Charities must submit annual financial reports both to counties and the Lottery Commission.
- Lotteries, commissions, lotteries, offices of other games covering more than one county must have a special state permit for \$200.
- Andrus also signed into law measures dealing with state negotiations with Indian tribes over regulation gaming, a bill changing the fourth in taxation law and a major change in the state Board of Education.

The Idaho Lottery director is designated as the person to monitor

reservation games. The state must get legislative approval of any compact authorizing reservation games not otherwise allowed by state law.

The Legislature spent a lot of time on the Truth in Taxation law, which requires tax agencies to advise taxpayers to increase spending of tax levies. The only change to survive allows small taxing districts to meet the advertising requirements by certified mail, if that's cheaper than newspaper ads.

Rep. Pam Ahrens, R-Boise, told legislators a bill changing the Board of Education was the 18th in passage in recent years.

This year's session passed 11 bills. It divides the board into two councils of four members each, one supervising higher education and one working on public school issues, with state Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans serving on both.

The measure will require the governor to appoint one new board member. The new law requires the board to meet jointly with the state and federal governments to discuss whether the new arrangement meets all requirements of the Idaho Constitution.

Andrus signs new child support law

BOISE (AP) — Starting July 1, parents delinquent in making child support payments could be in for a shock.

A new state law signed by Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday allows courts to deduct child support payments from a delinquent's federal income tax refund.

Current law allows payment deductions only if a parent is delinquent in making the payments.

That's one provision of a controversial law that the Legislature only reluctantly approved in the final day of the 1993 session, and only

with the stipulation that it expires in nine months.

Lawmakers found out in the last week of the session that if they didn't approve new child support guidelines to convert a federal mandate to Idaho, they'd have to raise \$8 million to \$8 million in federal funds.

"It's not the best bill in the world by a long shot, but the problems with this bill can be corrected in nine months from now," GOP Floor Leader Bruce Newcomb of Burli told House members.

Rep. Mike Smither, R-Twin Falls, prepared 10 pages of amendments to

the Senate-passed bill, which became part of the final law.

One of the most significant cut the \$1,000 penalty for violations down to \$300.

Lawmakers and Idaho's state tax for collecting child support payments was one of the best in the nation, and shouldn't be changed under threat from the federal government.

Advocacy organizations say the new law allows the Department of Health and Welfare to charge too much in fees and expenses for helping parents collect child support payments.

Crapo to Congress: Stop selling furniture

BOISE (AP) — When John Hoehne, Rep. Mike Crapo's chief of staff, moved into the 2nd District Congress suite in Boise, his new personal office had been stripped of everything but a phone and a chair.

"I just worked on the floor a few days," Hoehne said. Former Rep. Richard Stallings had exercised the right of a departing member of Congress to buy government furniture and equipment from one district office.

Stallings says he spent \$1,100 to buy a desk, two book cases, four file cabinets, an old computer and other items from his personal office at market value set by the General Services Administration.

Crapo, a Republican, is spending

\$7,500 in taxpayers' money for roughly similar furniture and more, including 14 chairs, to meet his needs.

"We will not accept business as usual and we will not accept the perk of selling off taxpayer-financed furniture at fire-sale prices," Crapo said on the House floor recently. He is cosponsoring a bill to end the practice.

Stallings, a Democrat who vacated his seat in a run for U.S. Senate, said such purchases are neither perks nor wasteful. He likened them to recycling.

"Anybody can go to garage sales and pick up similar-type merchandise," he said. "It's a waste for the government to replace

outdated merchandise," he said.

In contrast to other lawmakers who left little more than the rugs, Stallings left most of the furniture in his three room suite in the Borah post office, and Hoehne scrounged temporary replacements for the others.

location as required by law, and eating for more than 13 children allowed by the permit.

At a December 1992 City Council meeting, Tufahli blamed her problems on a personality conflict with a Health and Welfare supervisor.

A March 1992 *Times-News* investigation revealed numerous complaints to Health and Welfare about conditions at Children's Village.

In 1989, a 4-year-old, last received shots to the back of his throat and burns to his lips when he

drank standing water from a backed-up drinking fountain that contained a caustic substance, possibly drain cleaner.

In November 1991, a 2-year-old girl came home from Children's Village with an inch-long cut on her lower back.

A 2-year-old boy was taken from the center in unconsent in October 1990, and later died in Salt Lake City, of what doctors said was an illness similar to Sudden Infant Death Syndrome. Children's Village was not blamed for the death, but the center was unlicensed at the time.

When the current battle is over, the ICA will determine to wage that war on other fronts, he said.

Walton envisions a grassroots organization with a governing board made up of representatives from all 44 Idaho counties that will take up conservative causes.

"I want to turn Idaho into a bastion of conservative public policy," he said, adding that the group is well on its way to becoming a political force after just a few months of organizing.

"The ICA is going to be here for decades," he said.

Jerome County is far ahead of many others in rallying citizens to the ICA agenda, Walton told a group of 40 people, most of whom support the anti-gay rights initiative.

He credits Don and Leslie Holstetter, Jerome County's ICA coordinators, for the strong early support.

Fully mobilizing the statewide organization will take about 10 years, but the effort will be worth it, Walton said.

He pointed to the Oregon Citizens' Alliance, which failed in its attempt

to pass a similar anti-gay rights measure last year, as an example of what the ICA can become.

"We turned the OCA into a grassroots army of 8,000 trained volunteers," Walton said.

The guiding philosophy of the ICA is simple, Walton said.

"The ICA is in business to promote and defend the family - the traditional family unit."

Farm labor-housing will be asset to area, officials say

HEYBURN. — The 24-unit Migrant Council farm labor apartments will be an asset to the community and help cut down on the housing shortage in the Mini-Cassia area, officials say.

"This is an important event for the agricultural community," housing development officer Jerry Leggett said — at Thursday afternoon's groundbreaking ceremony.

The ceremony was moved indoors to the Heyburn Fire Station from the site of the project because of inclement weather.

The apartments, which will be a mixture of two-, three- and four-bedroom units, are expected to be completed in October, Leggett said. The project is financed through the Idaho Housing Administration.

At Aragon of the Burley Idaho Migrant Council said the apartments will help ease the housing crunch experienced by farm laborers the last few years, but more housing is still needed.

"Already we have people calling saying they've looked all over and can't find anywhere to live," he said.

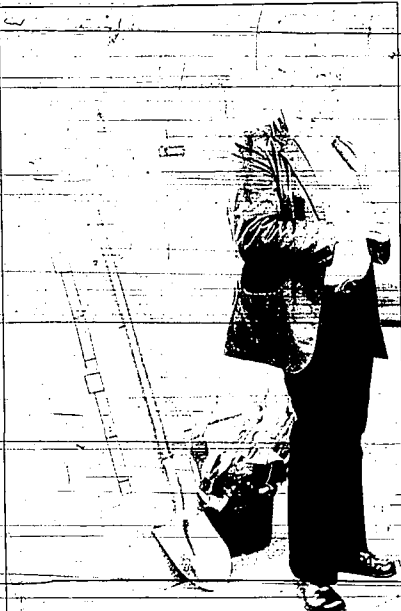
There might be future plans to add onto the apartments once they are built, Aragon said. Last year, he found farm workers living in garages and even under highway overpasses.

The plan to build the apartments came under fire about two years ago because residents feared the housing project would not be well-maintained. Lawsuits had been signed petitions against it.

Hector DeLeon, deputy director of the Migrant Council, said the apartments will be kept clean and sanitary.

"We've been working hard to provide safe, decent places to live," he said.

Heyburn Mayor Glen Lowland said he has talked to Migrant Council and other officials, and they have pledged that the units will be well-maintained.

Virginia Enriquez, manager of the Colonia de Colores, a Migrant Council project in Twin Falls, said her apartments are full and it's rare for a family move out.

"They are very comfortable there," she said.

Leggett said in order to qualify to live in the housing, a family must have made at least \$3,055 during

the previous 12 months in agricultural work.

Work at processing plants does not count, he said.

People who live at the housing will be mostly engaged in field work.

Leggett said the housing is not strictly for Hispanics, but for any farm laborers.

Declo man faces multiple drug charges

DECLO. A Declo man is facing five drug charges, including one that he sold methamphetamine within 1,000 feet of a high school, court records say.

Robert Mike Willard, 40, was arrested last month after a half year of tracking by federal Bureau of Narcotics agents, documents on file at the Cassia County Courthouse say.

He was charged with three counts of delivery of a controlled substance, one count of tax stamp

violation, and one enhancement charge for allegedly selling drugs near a school, records say.

Deputies say Willard sold 50 grams of methamphetamine to Bureau of Narcotics agent on Aug. 26 of last year within 1,000 feet of Declo High School.

Because the transaction reportedly took place near a school, Willard would face additional penalties if found guilty.

On July 7, Willard allegedly sold 6.9 grams of cocaine to a confidential informant at a Declo bar, records say.

On Oct. 19, 1992, Willard allegedly sold methamphetamine to a confidential informant, court records say.

Narcotics agents said the drug tax stamp he sold was the same as the one he sold to the agent on Aug. 26.

Willard was charged with the drug tax stamp violation, and one enhancement charge for allegedly selling drugs near a school, records say.

On July 7, Willard allegedly sold 6.9 grams of cocaine to a confidential informant at a Declo bar, records say.

Burley High seeks ways to boost school attendance

BURLEY. Go to school every day, collect \$25.

Instead of being suspended, clean up the hunking before or after classes.

Those are two of the creative approaches Burley High School is using to boost student attendance.

About four or five weeks ago, Burley High School officials started a weekly prize giveaway as part of the incentive-based Renaissance program.

A student's name is drawn and if the person hasn't been absent on time at any classes for the week, the person will be awarded the \$25 prize.

If the student had been absent or tardy, the \$25 is added the next week's drawing.

"I think the program is working well," Assistant Principal Steve Jensen said. "If it doesn't work, we're going to go back and try something else."

Jensen said he recently went into classrooms seeking input from

students on the attendance policy.

The suggestions were taken to principal parents and faculty and a plan was formulated.

Parents and school officials are getting away from suspending students who chronically skip school.

"Suspended students isn't a good alternative because students are kept out of class where they belong," Jensen said. Instead, they are given the alternative of attending a four-hour Saturday school or doing janitorial work before or after school, formally called "School Saturdays."

If the student refuses to do either, the student will be suspended, but not out of class where they belong," Jensen said.

No students have been suspended during the two week period the new plan has been implemented, Jensen said.

Through the Renaissance program, businesses donate money or items to reward students who show good behavior. The \$25 prize is part of that program.

"It doesn't come from taxpayer money," Jensen explained.

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Reports indicates slower revival

Recovery loses its 'sizzle' but should continue steady, analysts say

WASHINGTON — A trio of reports Thursday on jobs, building and manufacturing gave fresh evidence the economy has slowed from its rapid yearend acceleration.

The government said jobless claims unexpectedly jumped a week ago and that construction spending remained anemic in February. A business survey suggested that industrial activity slowed last month.

Samuel D. Kahan, an economist with Fidelity Securities in Chicago, portrayed the future economic expansion as a "steak without any sizzle." But he also said there was no danger of its ending soon. "The economy has turned the corner and has become self-feeding," Kahan said. He estimated it would continue to grow at between a 2 percent and 2.5 percent rate until midyear and then increase to about 3 percent.

The Labor report showed that 380,000 newly laid-off workers filed applications for unemployment insurance during the week ended Nov. 7, the most since 382,000 during the week ended Nov. 7.

Analysts said the size of the increase was probably due in part to the mid-March blizzard. The storm closed many unemployment offices, forcing many applicants postpone their claims, and caused parts shortages, triggering some plant closings.

Still, most said the recent trend in claims portends just modest job creation and predicted a sharp uptick in the payroll growth that had totaled 365,000 in February.

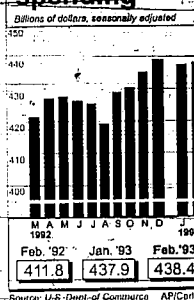
The National Association of Purchasing Managers said a survey of its members found that manufacturing economy continued to grow in March, but at a slower pace than in January and February.

But the survey component measuring employment dropped slightly in March, which analysts said reinforced the weak job growth picture. The Commerce Department, meanwhile, reported that construction spending inched up just 0.1 percent in February after falling 0.5 percent a month earlier.

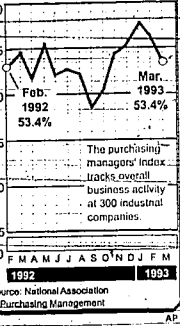
Outlays on residential, non-residential and government projects totaled \$438.4 billion at a seasonally adjusted annual rate, compared with \$437.9 billion in January. The report revised January's decline to just 0.5 percent from the 1.3 percent drop initially estimated last month.

Residential construction was up 0.2 percent in February after rising 1.4 percent in January. Construction of single-family homes fell 0.4 percent, the first drop since last June. But spending in the often-overbuilt apartment sector, which had declined for five straight months, rose 3.1 percent in February.

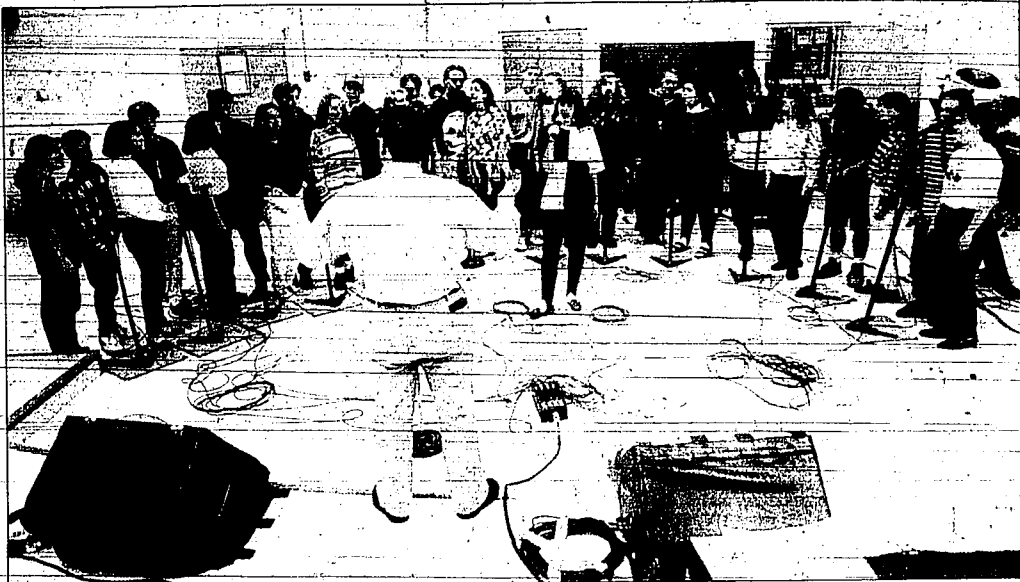

Madrigal director Smack in middle of tradition

TWIN FALLS. The Madrigals are in the spotlight, but Richard Smack is the one who put them there.

It all began in the late '60s, when an energetic Brigham Young University graduate took a job teaching music in the Twin Falls School District. At the end of his first school year, Richard Smack was frustrated.

"I wasn't producing what I felt I needed to produce," Smack said, "and I began to realize I couldn't do the job I wanted to do in the time I had."

Next came the soul-searching. "I thought about this a lot and made a very difficult decision," Smack said. "I knew what I wanted to do at school would take time away from my family."

As it turned out, Smack's wife, Rita, became his most enthusiastic cheerleader. That's how Smack found the freedom to explore his musical boundaries.

That's how the Madrigals came to be.

This year, when 33 kids hit the stage on Madrigal Nights, they will be carrying on a

Indiana farm girl moves from Motown to hoedown

TWIN FALLS. "Don't Worry 'Bout Me Baby," coaxed Janie Frickie — all the way to the top of the country music charts. The tune could be her theme song.

Frickie is a Country Music Association Vocalist of the Year twice over. She's a regular on TNN's "Starline Brothers Show." And she was recently inducted into the Walkway of Stars at the Country Music Hall of Fame.

Her performances this week in Jackpot are among more than 150 shows planned for 1993. Next month, she will appear with Dolly Parton, Billy Ray Cyrus and Clint Black at a benefit for Dollywood. In August, she will share the stage with George Jones in Branson, Mo.

Frickie set out on the rocky path to stardom in a roundabout way. On Wednesday, she told her story in Twin Falls. Late in the day, having clocked in hours of interviews, she was still gracious — and still smiling.

"I was raised on a farm in Indiana," said Frickie, dressed in "to-kill-for" black flacks, multicolored jacket, purple turtleneck, red cowboy hat and gold shoes. "I went to college on a work-study program because my parents couldn't afford college."

In fact, Frickie dropped out of college twice, to pursue a career in music. But, each time, she returned. "My mother never thought I'd finish," she said. "It's a wonder I did."

Education degree in hand, Frickie remained determined to sing. After a couple of "scrump and save years" in California, she nabbed a contract with a jingle company and hit the airwaves with songs for 7-Up, Coca-Cola, United Airlines and Red Lobster. She also sang backup.

"I funk-free sang backup for most of the acts in the business," she said.

Behind the scenes, country music singers are generally "down home nice people," Frickie reported. "They generally get along."

But Frickie, though raised in the country, wasn't raised on country.

"I was raised on Motown and Top 40, and I sang folk music in college," she said. She also sang gospel in church.

"I love gospel music," said Frickie, who released a collection of gospel favorites entitled "Crossroads" in 1992. The album was both cathartic and inspirational.

"I was going through a divorce," said Frickie, who has no children. "I had been married for 10 years."

Frickie bounced back in a way that suited her by concentrating on her music. She has written only one song: "Goodbye Broken Heart," which she has not recorded. But she's recorded lots of hits written for her.

"He's a Heptache," "Let's Stop Talking About It," "You Don't Know Love" and "Your Heart's Not in It" all hit the charts.

running, Frickie's new album, which she produced, is a collection of greatest hits with "a few surprises." Entitled "Now and Then," it's due in stores April 15, a release date Frickie finds amusing.

The album is being released in an era when country music has gone big time. Frickie's Jackpot show will feature several of her country hits in addition to a variety of show tunes.

Frickie takes her show on the road in a tour bus, with her five Grand Band. She has a home in Nashville, Tenn., which she leases out, and a ranch near Dallas, which she visits between engagements.

"I get restless if I'm home too long," she said. "I've weeks and I'm ready to go."

Frickie's hobbies are mobile. Currently, she's handpainted clothes.

"I have piles of pants and patterns in my room in Jackpot," she said. "Right now, I'm decorating black (Levi's) jackets for my band with Southwest fabric and glue paint."

Her fashions are sold in consignment shops in Texas.

Until now, Frickie's fashion tastes on stage have been flavored with the Southwest — plenty of cactus and boots. But the singer is ready for a change.

"I wanted to try something different," she said. "So I put in the most to get some long beaded jewelry."

Frickie likes her new "elegant look," she said, 30 minutes into yet another interview. She was still smiling.

25-year-old tradition. It's a tradition of excellence.

"Mr. Smack is a perfectionist, and I really appreciate that," Madrigal Trey Remole said. "He likes the music to be perfect."

It's always been like that.

"As a child, I would stand in front of the radio with a stick in my hand and direct the music," Smack, now 53, said.

By 1968, the kid with the dream was all grown up, but the dream was stronger than ever. That year, Smack's Madrigals became an extracurricular group at Twin Falls High School.

"Even in the beginning, we would have 100 kids in a little room with everyone clamoring to get into his classes," said principal Carl Snow, who refers to Smack as "one of the most caring and dynamic teachers I've ever worked with."

The first few years, the Madrigals performed in the school music room. But the group soon outgrew the facility.

Smack began to open doors, and people would stand outside on the school lawn. In 1985, he packed up the kids and took them to the College of Southern Idaho.

"My heart was pounding when we decided to try to fill that CSI auditorium," Smack said. "I just didn't know how we could do it."

Often, they still turn people away.

These days, the group performs at schools and club meetings. Through the years, the kids have toured in Toronto, Seattle and San Francisco. They are often asked to sign autographs. It's time stuff for small-town America.

And yet, Smack, himself, is low key — and hesitant to talk about his achievements.

Sitting in his school office, lined with framed photographs of past Madrigals, Smack prefers to talk about his students. It soon becomes obvious there is more going on here than celebrity glitz.

"Even though the music is so important, the other things the kids are learning are even more important," he said, "like learning to commit to being at a rehearsal at 7 p.m. — or finding a little niche where a kid can feel like he belongs."

The hardest part of Smack's job is saying no to a teen-ager. But at least 100 students try out for 10 or 15 Madrigal openings each year.

"I dislike turning a kid down so much," said Smack. "It feels terrible."

What does Smack look for in a Madrigal? Musical ability, certainly. But he's also searching for a more elusive quality.

"I want someone who will take initiative and will care about the group," he said. "I want someone who gets along with others and has personality."

The students choreograph the Madrigal numbers, mostly current or oldie pop tunes ("Careless Whisper," "I Remember You," "Johnny B. Goode"). Some of the kids write accompaniment for the band.

Mr. Smack lets us plan a lot of the program," Madrigal Crystal Carlson said. "He's very easy to work with."

Added Madrigal Juli Anne Patterson, "He loves to make jokes so much that we sometimes wonder if he's at home and thinks them up."

A large number of former Madrigals keep in touch with Smack. Dennis Boritz, now a music teacher at Twin Falls High School, is one of them.

"I chose to pursue a career in music largely due to Mr. Smack's influence," Boritz said. "His enthusiasm... has nurtured — an outstanding — choir program."

Smack, himself, can feel the electricity in the air when the Madrigals are "on." Goosebump time.

"It still happens to me after all these years," he said.

Smack is well aware that this kind of career fulfillment would never have been possible without love and support at home.

The youngest of his six children left for college last year. All are musical.

All were Madrigals.

When asked whether he was ever accused of playing favorites, he shrugged off the idea.

"Somebody is always going to say your play favorites no matter what you do," he said.

Off duty, Smack likes to play golf and spend time with his wife, an office manager at First Security Insurance.

The two go out to dinner and a movie. In the summer, they hike the South Hills.

But, first comes Madrigal Nights.

Then the seniors will move on.

"I guess when I finish teaching, I want to be thought of as someone who did the best he could do," Smack said, "and I want the kids to feel they got their money's worth — or education's — worth from me."

Madrigal Ryan Deibert put it this way: "Madrigals is almost like a family, and Mr. Smack is the father."

Smack said he is proud of the Madrigals, especially when he sees them move out on their own. Some pursue careers in music. Many do not.

"That doesn't matter," Smack said. "You reward them by being successful in whatever fields they choose."

Like any good parent.

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Album 'The Wheel' marks next step in Cash's new life

NEW YORK — Resuming Cash's personal history, "The Wheel" takes the listener back to the early days of his career, and then the very things that have followed.

When Cash recorded the autobiographical "Interiors," his narrative to one-time collaborator and producer Billy Crowell was a shock. "The emotional turmoil she was experiencing went into songs she produced herself, and made for their detailed, narrative, road trip album."

"Interiors" was a meditative masterpiece, a song cycle that examined the wounds of love, but also showed equal time to explore the creative potential. For Cash, who had been living in a state of constant change, "Interiors" was a time to look at his life as an artist, she says.

happy. The new project is his that "Interiors" was not — more rocking, more assertive, lighter. And while it still finds Cash profoundly affected by strong relationships and missed connections between people, it captures her, for the first time, cautiously hopeful.

"It was important to do 'Interiors' all on my own. I can see that now," explains the 37-year-old singer. "I think I needed to really get inside and control things and discover that I could make sense of what I was feeling. It helped me to let go. (With 'The Wheel') I

was able to write with people again. I didn't have to be in total control."

Cash wrote "The Wheel," title track short after finishing "Interiors" and still marvels at his own faith. "I wasn't feeling the way I feel now. I wasn't optimistic. I didn't have anything to indicate a positive change, and yet it was there in the song. It must have been some subconscious level at work, because I'm now starting to feel connected to that emotion. The song was a diary, they might say, but the things I was going through, but not in linear fashion."

"The Wheel," she says, was the song that put her through an extended post-"Interiors" writer's block. "I remember there were a lot of times when I felt like I wasn't writing anything. If I was discouraged, I'd go back to that song, and know that I could still write."

Not surprisingly, Cash believes that her musical development since the result of changes in the rest of her life. After making the split with Crowell final, she and two of her three daughters, 11-year-old Chelsea and

14-year-old, Caine moved to New York. (Caine, 13, elected to stay in Nashville with Crowell.) Cash transferred her record-company business from Columbia Records' Nashville office to its headquarters in New York.

It was more than a symbolic move. For the first three albums of her career, Cash was an artist who had to make a living as a writer. She wrote songs for other artists, and then she wrote songs for herself. "I was a writer, and then I was a singer," she says.

"Nashville is very specific," she says. "You have to want to fit yourself into that one hole. If you want to develop in your own or your own process, you're out of luck. It was a mutually frustrating situation that was bound to get worse, and I've got to admit I felt a sense of liberation making this record."

So Cash is now a single mother in New York, and as the promotional schedule heats up for "The Wheel," she's growing weary. She gets up early with the girls, makes the lunches, goes to work after school, and these days spends her afternoons and evenings doing interviews, radio appearances, performing and teaching the occasional songwriting workshop.

She's planning to tour — "with a drummer in the time" — but she says she prizes time with her daughters and time for reflection more than anything else.

"I've been thinking about how artists and musicians and songwriters have such higher percentages of stuff like alcoholism and suicide," says Cash, who builds time into her schedule for exercise, Jungian analysis and other therapies to ensure that the personal growth that started with "Interiors" continues.

"I go to some pretty deep places when I'm working," Cash explains, "and sometimes it frightens me — some of the things I'm discovering about myself are not exactly pretty. There are times when I need a lifeline."

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Murphy's career takes 'Boomerang' for worse

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Eddie Murphy's Hollywood picture "Money" — But these days he's sorting through a pile of problems, not riches. Murphy hawked his latest movie, "The Distinguished Gentleman," on the syndicated television show "Regis & Kathy Lee" — a publicity ploy to which he didn't have to resort in the '80s when he starred in such black-bustled as "Trading Places," "Beverly Hills Cop" and "Coming to America." To boot, his guest spot failed to help. When counting is complete, "The Distinguished Gentleman" probably will gross less than Murphy's 1989 carative and commercial washout "Harlem Nights."

And now the 31-year-old actor co-median finds his trademark vehicle on hold. In early January, Paramount Pictures suspended "Beverly Hills Cop III" on the eve of the sequel's filming, citing worries over a rushed schedule and huge budget.

Two of Murphy's three films before "The Distinguished Gentleman" — "Another 48 HRS." and "Harlem Nights" — delivered undiminished returns. "Boomerang" was a modest success.

Some suggest Murphy's descent hinges on his abandonment of sassy jokes and his popular, foul-mouthed rebel image.

"What he's doing in 'The Distinguished Gentleman' and 'Boomerang' is to try to set himself up as a romantic lead and matinee idol," said Peter Rainer, a film reviewer for the Los Angeles Times and chairman of the National Society of Film Critics. "He's sort of in a bind. Because what's best about him as a performer is his early funny stuff. He's trying to do it all, and it just gives a lie to everything."

Reginald Hudlin, who directed "Boomerang," said Murphy could "prove the naysayers wrong."

"Eddie is as funny as he ever was," Hudlin said. "He's a guy with an incredible amount of depth." And Hudlin, who pointed out that Murphy hasn't relied on his "Saturday Night Live" characters during his film career, "I look forward to a second decade of Eddie Murphy."

Certainly, Murphy's first decade was relentlessly fruitful. He established himself early, when at age 15 Murphy showcased Al Green impersonation at a talent night at the Roosevelt Youth Center in New York.

The Brooklyn native captured national attention in 1981 on NBC's "Saturday Night Live," making \$750,000 a week in first season.

He set himself apart with a broad range of comic characters, including uncouth politician Victor Jones, phleg-

head Mark Robinson, "Don't Come" (1981) and "The 48 HRS." (1982). His first feature film, 1982's "48 HRS.," costarring him with Holly Hunter, who helps capture a bank robber, and a musical, "Sweet Liberty," were on better display in 1983's "Trading Places," a sly black comedy. "Trading Places" was a hit, earning \$90.4 million at domestic theaters.

Quickly, Murphy surpassed Richard Pryor as both the country's top comic and an entertainer. He enjoyed enormous "crossover appeal," a Hollywood euphemism meaning his films attracted white patrons.

The first "Beverly Hills Cop" (1986) earned \$100 million. The 1987 sequel brought in \$118 million. In both films, Murphy starred as Axel Foley, a wisecracking, no-nonsense cop from Detroit.

His concept appears, featured in the 1985 movie "Eddie Murphy Raw," a raucous, vulgar, homophobic comedy, and a complete smash. The film grossed \$50.5 million after being made in only \$2.5 million.

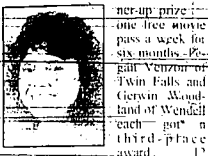
TWIN FALLS—Julie Atkins doubts she's been to more one movie in the past year. But she plans to go a little more often in '93.

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Disney puts new spin on Huck Finn's old story

The Adventures of Huck Finn (PG). This Disney family film, boy's adventure division, especially fortunate in its casting, with Elijah Wood as Huck and Courtney B. Vance as his friend Jim capturing the spirit of their roles. Though it bogs down in the middle and tends to be more preachy than necessary, writer-director Stephen Sommers' version of the Mark Twain novel is a notably lively and spirited yarn. (Twin Cinema)

Born Yesterday (PG). Though the part of a dizzy showgirl who entrances both her wealthy boyfriend (John Goodman) and an influential Washington journalist (Don Johnson) is perfect for Melanie Griffith, this remake of the 1950 film only serves to point out the one-note weaknesses that despite its revered status, hampered the original film as well. (Twin Cinema)

Cop and a Half (PG). A tough Tampa cop (Burt Reynolds). A cute kid who wants to be a tough cop (Norman Golden II). A vicious gangster who wants to be a doo-wop idol (Ray Sharkey). A lady Captain who wants to be a social worker (Holland Taylor). Playground bullies who want to be gangsters. Thugs who want to be straight men. Cops who want to be clowns. Put them all together, and the quintessential empty marketing hook script, and over-jolly direction by Henry Winkler—who may want

to be Ron Howard—and you haven't got even half a movie. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

The Crying Game (R). The less said about the latest film from writer-director Neil Jordan the better; it is a sophisticated entertainment where the ground is constantly shifting under your feet and too much foreknowledge can be a dangerous thing. Set in Northern Ireland and starring Forest Whitaker, Michael Richardson, Stephen Rea and newcomer Jaye Davidson, this romantic thriller is never predictable but always honest and thoroughly enjoyable. See it now or forever be sorry. (Twin Cinema)

Fire in the Sky (PG-13). Based on the experience of Arizona logger Travis Walton, who claimed to be abducted by aliens, this plodding UFO thriller doesn't play up the thrill of the genre. It's doggedly serious about convincing us when it would have done better to just entertain us. (Twin Cinema)

Groundhog Day (PG). Though clearing is not an adjective often associated with the abrasive Bill Murray, it fits this gentle, small-scale romantic comedy about a cranky weatherman who is forced to relive the same Feb. 2 over and over again until he gets it right. Co-starring Andie MacDowell and directed by Harold Ramis, "Groundhog" is initially too heavy on Hollywood schtick, but once the obvious laughter is over, it may just make you smile. (Motor-Vu Drive-in)

See No Evil (R). Here, of course, the imperiled heroine is deaf, the actress is Marlee Matlin, and the thrills involve killers, sadist cops and assorted ruffians all chasing after an Alexandrian coin none of whom Marlee can hear coming. Director Robert Greenwald, the cast and sound people take this snide, shock notion and pump some life into it. That's not enough, but it's something. (Twin Cinema)

Teen-age Mutant Ninja Turtles 3: The Turtles are Back in Time (PG)

Isn't this the kind of movie you've always dreamed of watching? A combination pirate picture and "Samurai time-travel epic" with four supersnacking turtles—the heroes? Fluke hits don't necessarily generate fluke sequel hits, and in this staggeringly expensive, obtuse and irrelevant (albeit great-looking parody), the magic of the four karate king, party-hearty reptiles congeals like stilted pizza, or mock turtle soup. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

Unforgiven (R). Working at the top of his form as both an actor and a director, Clint Eastwood has turned out a Western for the ages.

Coaching style often supplants substance

NEW ORLEANS — College coaches see the midseason firing of California's Lou Campanelli as a danger signal that their jobs are becoming less substance than style.

What once was strictly a win-and-loses business seems to have become more than that with an emphasis less on the end result than how it is accomplished.

Campanelli was dismissed in mid-season when athletic director Bob Bockrath overheard him in a dressing room diatribe aimed at his players. The firing came just two weeks after Cal beat UCLA and Campanelli was complimented by Bockrath and the canceller of the university.

The firing was publicly condemned by the National Association of Basketball Coaches. "Our reaction was caused not by the firing, but by the way it was done," NAAC president Johnny Orr of Iowa State said Thursday. "I still haven't found out what Lou said or did."

According to George Raveling of Southern Cal, the Campanelli affair caused a perception among coaches that their leadership styles could be defined by others.

"There are a variety of coaching styles that can produce positive results," Raveling said. "As a coach, you have to be concerned with attempts to surrender to others the decisions about how you will teach and lead. You need the ability to discipline and direct young persons to a higher level of achievement and success. You are often an extension of family."

Raveling recalled recruiting Mark Boyd of Stone Mountain, Ga. for USC. "The last thing his mother said to me was, 'I don't want my foolishness.' I knew what she meant. I was taking her son 3,000 miles across the country. She was saying, 'I expect you to deal with him as I would.'"

"You can't coach at all without the same. Some you have to love, put an arm around their shoulders. Some you have to kick in their rear ends."

Duke coach Mike Krzyzewski said, "This is not about Lou Campanelli. It's about setting one example and putting it in everybody. That would be a tragic mistake."

"The climate is to go overboard in setting an example. There is a public perception of how a person should coach all the time. That is a concern of the coaches."

"We are judged in so many ways — half-time leads, my record against Bobby Cremins, my record on Wednesdays, my record on Saturdays. My family doesn't put that many restraints on me."

Krzyzewski made the point that the curriculum of coaches is not the same as that of other faculty members on campus. "We are not teaching chemistry," he said. "We are not disseminating information. We are teaching values and habits."

Does that permit coaches to insult players, perhaps call them cowards?

"Maybe the kid is a coward," Krzyzewski said. "How do you attack a bad habit? You call attention to it. Sometimes you will do something to create emotion, create a conflict so that the team will come together as one."

Kansas' Williams, N. Carolina's Smith share a competitive relationship on court, friendly round of golf off court

NEW ORLEANS — No matter what Roy Williams does, his name will always be linked to Dean Smith.

This is Williams' fifth season as coach at Kansas and he's already assured of second place on the all-time list for victories by new coaches during that span. When the Jayhawks take the floor Saturday, it will be his second Final Four appearance.

Seems he should be able to shake the name of his former boss. Problem is, the team going against Kansas will be Smith's North Carolina Tar Heels. It was the same way two years ago when the former boss and his long-time assistant met in the semifinals in Indianapolis with the student prevailing 79-73.

You can't hear Williams' name without hearing Smith's. It's that way when one serves as an assistant to the other for 10 years and then has a program remarkably similar when he does go out on his own.

"Too much was made of all this in 1991," Smith said. "This game will be decided by our players and the Kansas players. Roy and I are always going to be friends, regardless of what happens. We've already got a golf date set for April. That's when we'll be competing against each other."

Saturday, though, it's basketball. North Carolina (32-4) against Kansas (29-6), followed by Kentucky (30-3) and Michigan (30-4). All but Kansas, the second seed in the Midwest, were top seeded in their region. The winners meet Monday night for the national championship.

Smith brought a North Carolina team to the 1982 Final Four in New Orleans and those Tar Heels left with the coach's only national title. This is Smith's ninth Final Four.

Williams had a good seat for that '82 game as Smith's assistant. He can quickly and in detail recall the timeout with 32 seconds left that led to Michael Jordan's game-winning shot 15 seconds later.

"That one timeout sticks out in my mind," Williams said.

Gravano, flanked by five federal bodyguards, appeared in a matty gray double-breasted suit as the leadoff witness in a Senate hearing on corruption in fighting.

Tyson takes Islam classes, but isn't ready to convert

INDIANAPOLIS — Former heavyweight champion Mike Tyson said he is not yet ready to convert to Islam.

Not yet, say associates of Mike Tyson. On Thursday they emphatically denied a newspaper report that Tyson is about to convert to Islam and change his name.

It was the latest in a series of hearings on boxing corruption to be held by the Senate permanent subcommittee on investigations.

Gravano, who admitted involvement in 19 killings, urged spectators with wary answers to questions. Asked if the govern-

ment could do anything to keep mobsters out of boxing, he answered: "Make the purses very small."

He was also asked what would happen if a fighter who tried to walk away from a deal with organized crime handlers. "Traditionally, we give them a hard time," he said. "We're not very fond of walking away."

But for all the spectacle of the hearing, Gravano confessed that he was not deeply involved in boxing in his mob days.

He did say that mobsters organized crime hits like the inter-Soviet boxing fights and making money by betting on the predicted outcome. He said a better way was to carve shares out of million-dollar purses.

Baseball clubs hold price increases to minimum, but \$90 pricetag per family still prohibitive

CHICAGO — Going to a baseball game will cost a family of four an average \$90.87 this season, up 4.8 percent from last season.

That is the average total for four game tickets, two beers, four hot dogs, four soft drinks, two souvenir baseball caps, two programs and parking, according to the Team Marketing Report, a sports-business newsletter.

The decrease was less than the 10.4 percent rise from 1991 to 1992, the newsletter said.

The average ticket price increased 1.7 percent this year, to \$9.57, from \$9.41 last year. A family of four, if paying only for tickets, would spend \$38.28.

This year's rise in ticket prices is paltry compared with last year, when the average was 7.7 percent more than the year before and with 1991, when it rose 9 percent.

"By minimizing price increases, baseball clubs are sending a message they're no longer taking fans for granted," said Alan Friedman, editor of the newsletter. "The attendance decreases experienced by many (18 of 26) clubs last year suggest that base-

They are the highest-paid of 42 American newcomers to Japanese baseball, which opens its season April 10.

Barfield batted .286 with 241 homers in 12 years in the majors, and was the American League home-run leader in 1986 with 40. Expectations are high for him here as the Giants try to improve on their second-place Central League finish in 1992.

Pitcher Hisashi Watanabe of the 1992 Japan Series champion Seibu Lions, who gave up the Yankees' first home run in the exhibition season, said, "He is quite different from other American players. He has good eyes."

Barfield is to receive \$1.3 million, and Moseby \$1.62 million.

Hall, with a .277 average and 134 homers in 12 years in the majors, has signed with the Pacific League's Chiba Lotte Marines for \$1.9 million.

The Central League Yokohama Bay Stars — formerly called the Whales — are reportedly paying \$1.5 million for the 30-year-old Braggs, a former Cincinnati Reds player.

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Marlins' scoreboard needs a nickname that will stick

MIAMI (AP) — Perhaps it will come to be known as the Aquamarine Monster. Or Deep Blue. Or maybe the Cobalt Curtain. That Deal, Sapphire Jewel, Florida Fence, Sea Wall or Wild Blue Yonder.

The Florida Marlins manually operated scoreboard needs a nickname.

"Somebody will come up with one that sticks," Marlins vice president Dean Jordan predicted.

The towering scoreboard, a throwback to an earlier era, helps make state-of-the-art Joe Robbie Stadium seem like a ballpark instead of a football stadium. The expansion Marlins will open their first season at JRS April 5 against the Los Angeles Dodgers.

"I think it's going to be a terrific baseball park," said Lou Astorino, chairman of the Pittsburgh architectural firm that renovated the stadium for baseball. "It's very intimate and relaxing, a good place to go and enjoy a game."

For baseball, the Marlins covered the outfield upper-deck seats with gray mesh and reduced the stadium's 73,000-seat football capacity to 43,909 for a cozy feeling. In the right-field stands, the Marlins erected a picnic area for groups of up to 500. They made the playing field asymmetrical to increase the number of triples.

"Our theme has been to help people have fun at the ballpark," Jordan said.

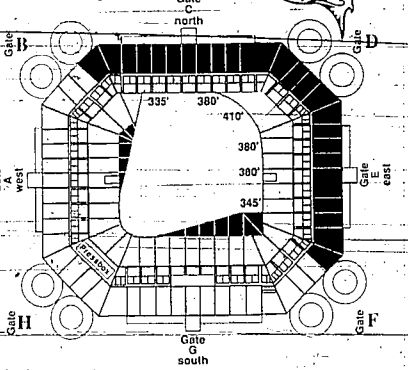
One thing the Marlins didn't change was the playing surface — natural grass. That delighted Astorino.

"Part of creating a feeling is smell, and you smell the grass," the architect said. "And when you look at it, it's not just one color, because of the way it's cut. All these things add up."

The scoreboard in left field is the centerpiece of redesigned JRS. As at Boston's Fenway Park and Chicago's Wrigley Field — both

built before 1915 — the board will indicate the pitchers and score by innings for each game in the major leagues. It also will give the lineups for both the visiting team and the Marlins.

Three operators will change numbers on the board by hand.

The height of the board is irregular, reaching a peak of 35 feet in left field, 45 to right, 380 to the power alleys, 410 to center and a hefty 440 to the spot in left-center where the scoreboard ends.

"It's a poke out there," Astorino said. "We're hoping to bring the triple back. Most ballparks are symmetrical, the only time you see a triple is when somebody misplays one."

The distances suggest JRS might be "pitcher's park" — especially when the Marlins are at bat.

"With the wall being so high in left field, and the distance to right and center, there are no cheap home runs, except for maybe down the left-field line," Jordan said.

Batters will find even the upper deck reachable in left, where Jordan estimates the distance at 420 feet from the foul pole to home plate. But he doubts anyone can hit a ball out of the stadium.

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Mile High is a hitter's park, but not a homer heaven

DENVER (AP) — If history holds, Mile High Stadium will yield significantly more doubles and triples than the average major league ballpark, but only slightly more home runs.

When the Colorado Rockies begin play at Mile High next month, teams will be well-advised to have a center fielder who can run, outfielders flanking him who can cover the gaps — and pitchers who pray a lot.

More runs will be produced than in most parks, and earned-run averages will balloon.

While it is undeniably a hitter's park, evidence shows that, contrary to popular belief, Mile High Stadium is not a homer haven. It is a hitter's park more for its spacious outfield in center and right field than for its thin air and short porch in left.

In the last 10 American Association seasons, Denver has led or tied for the league lead in homers six times — not the overwhelming advantage one might expect. Last season, Mile High ranked only fifth in homers among the eight league ballparks.

And when the Chicago White Sox and Houston Astros played two exhibition games here last April, not a single home run was hit in either game.

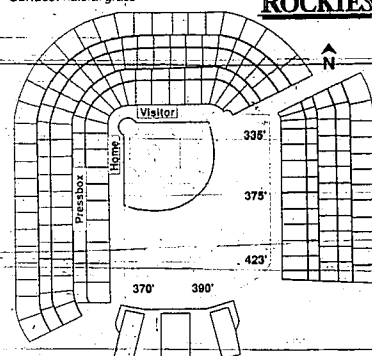
Mile High Stadium, originally built for baseball, has been expanded in stages to accommodate the Denver Broncos and now seats 76,000. The playing surface for baseball is basically a rectangle, with the left-field wall only 335 feet from home plate but right field 370 feet away and center field a distant 423 feet away.

To defend that expanse, a team needs speed in the outfield, a realizer of the Rockies addressed in the expansion draft.

Their priority in the draft was picking up a speedy center fielder who could run down deep drives and a defensive-minded right field-

er with an above-average arm. They got both in Alex Cole and Dante Bichette.

"We signed players for the ballpark," Rockies coach Amos Otis said. "We definitely got people who can play the outfield in Denver."

Pitchers who keep the ball down, particularly sinker-batters, also should thrive here. "You can't pitch high in Denver," Los Angeles Dodgers manager Tommy Lasorda said.

But the consensus is that home-run hitters will be in for a disappointment.

"Hitters are being misled tremendously if they think they'll go to Denver and pad their home-run stats," said Dodgers outfielder Eric Davis, who played for the Denver

Zephyrs. "Balls fly out of there pretty good, but not like some people will anticipate. It's no better than San Diego or Cincinnati."

San Francisco Giants third baseman Matt Williams believes the thin air and short left field wall will present a trap, much like Boston's Fenway Park.

"If guys go in there trying to hit home runs, they're going to be in trouble," he said. "You'll be lunging at everything."

Rockies manager Don Baylor has emphasized to his power hitters that they can't get caught up in the talk about how easy it will be to hit homers at Mile High.

"We've got to get them to avoid that temptation to try to pull everything," he said. "Their homers will come naturally."

Stewart posts early lead at Freeport

NFL coaches, directors toy with playoff concept

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Interest in a football playoff seems to be gathering strength, among coaches and athletic directors, groups which have always been opposed to the concept, NCAA executive director Dick Schultz said.

"Interestingly enough, the feedback we're getting is that the coaches would not favor a one-game playoff but would be in favor of a larger playoff, especially if the bowls could be incorporated," Schultz said Thursday. "They can see the potential of it, and many feel football needs a shot in the arm much like basketball has received from the Final Four."

Schultz sent a buzz through the NCAA convention in January when he urged in his annual state-of-the-association address that delegates consider a one-game playoff. Citing the need for money and the possible \$50-\$60 million game, the NCAA boss said schools should at least think about it.

"The first reaction was probably more negative than positive," he said Thursday. "But what has happened is exactly what I hoped would happen. What I wanted to do was stimulate their interest and get them thinking about it. And it has stimulated a lot of interest."

A playoff would have to be approved by majority vote of the Division I-A schools. Interest historically has been so low that it has never even come to a vote.

"I talked about a single game because I thought to mention more than that would really be more than people could handle," Schultz said. "But if it's only a single game, most of the coaches see themselves closed out of that game. If it were a large field, maybe four or eight schools, there seems to be a growing interest on the part of coaches."

Colts lose Brooks to free agency

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Wide receiver Billy Brooks became the first player the Indianapolis Colts lost to free agency when he agreed to a three-year contract with the Buffalo Bills.

Terms of the contract were not disclosed, but published reports in Buffalo said it was a three-year deal that would pay Brooks about \$3.5 million.

"It wasn't an easy decision," Brooks said after visiting the Colts' headquarters Thursday.

"The Colts gave me an opportunity to reach a dream by drafting me and allowing me to show what I can do. My wife and I have talked things over and we just feel this move is the best opportunity for us."

Brooks' signing with Buffa-

lo comes several days after the Colts signed Buffalo offensive tackle Will Wolford to a three-year contract worth at least \$7.65 million.

As one of Buffalo's "transition" players, the Bills can retain Wolford by matching the Colts offer.

But Buffalo has appealed the contract with the NFL Management Council, saying escalation clauses it contains would force the Bills to pay more for Wolford's services than the Colts would.

ARCADIA, Calif. (AP) — It's probably a good thing Eliza is a horse. If she could only hear the talk, she might not run in the Santa Anita Derby on Saturday.

Eliza, last year's juvenile filly champion, was one of seven 3-year-olds entered on Thursday for the 16-mile Santa Anita Derby, which has become one of the premier stepping-stones to the Kentucky Derby.

She will be the first filly in the race since 1988, when Winning Colts won by 7½ lengths en route to becoming the last filly to win the Kentucky Derby.

"We could have gone plus had we been more careful in hearts," observed West.

"I made the normal play," added East. "What else could I have done?"

West led fourth best, and East's king won the first trick as South dropped the eight. Sticking with convention, East returned the heart nine (top card left from an original holding of three cards), and South's jack was covered by the queen and ace. Dummy's heart seven became a second heart stopper for South and he cinched his nine winners by conceding a diamond and a club.

How should East know that he should depart from the habitual play at trick two? When South drops the heart eight, he is marked with the queen, the jack or the 10. If West had led Q-J-10, surely he would have led the queen. If South has the queen, East's return doesn't matter. If the jack or 10, East must return the five to keep from promoting dummy's seven.

After the heart five goes to the jack, queen and ace, South has no second heart stopper. When he knocks out one of West's minor-suit winners, West leads a heart to East's nine, and West cashes his heart-10 when he takes his other minor-suit winner.

Conventional play must take a back seat when the fall of the cards indicates a time for change.

Peter Rabbit hops into TV

The sure doesn't look it, but Peter Rabbit is 100 years old this year. Beatrix Potter's curious little bunny will be featured in a new series of specials, "The World of Peter Rabbit and Friends."

Potter created Peter and his siblings, Flopsy, Mopsy, and Cottontail as a letter to the 5-year-old daughter of a friend.

The series opener, "The Tale of Peter Rabbit and Benjamin Bunny," and subsequent tales are the first animated versions of the stories, because the company, holding the rights because that previous projects were not faithful enough to Potter's original

text and artwork.

Each episode opens with a live-action sequence set and filmed in Potter's home, Hill Top, in England's Lake District. Marmie Cusack plays the young Potter and introduces each story as she begins to draw a picture-letter.

Each episode is self-contained, but all are linked by a common setting and cast of characters. The series, which cost \$11 million, is reportedly the most expensive animation yet to come out of the United Kingdom.

Peter and his pals will be honored throughout the centennial with a variety of special books published by Warner (a division of Penguin Books), including "The Tale of Peter Rabbit Deluxe Edition." "The Tale

of Peter Rabbit: Limited Edition Good Set," which holds a copy of the first printing of the tale, and "So I Shall Tell You a Story" by Judy Taylor, a Potter life and works scholar.

A 15-month celebration of Peter's anniversary includes an exhibit of Potter's work at the Musée d'Orsay, Paris; the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston; a ballet at the Royal Opera House, London; and other events in London, Melbourne, Scotland and America.

The series opener airs Sunday at 4 p.m. MST on The Family Channel. It will be repeated Sunday, April 11, at 8 a.m. and 3 p.m. MST. Other episodes of the series will air throughout the year.

'Delta' back as brunette

She's back. She's brunette. She's got a brain.

Linda Bloodworth-Thomson — a few seasons ago, this parting was mutual and "never got ugly," she says. "He was extremely polite and respectful to me."

At the request of ABC, Burke's bleach-blond tresses returned to brunette. ("They said people were more comfortable with me, that way.") Several characters were added: Delta's mom (Elizabeth Wilson), an agent (Joe Udd) and a musician boyfriend (John Calvin).

Most important, the writing improved. "Delta" had gotten too silly," says Burke, 36. "I'm weird enough in real life, already. People think I'm a combination of 'Designing Women's' Suzanne Sugarbaker and the person they see on talk shows."

Delta Bishop "was too dumb, too naive about things. I need her to be older, more adult. I like her to be going through whatever I'm going through. I don't want everything to be so obvious; so staged. I want her to bring up little things without hitting people over the head."

For the five new episodes, Delta Bishop will give-up singing to concentrate on songwriting. Burke, who worked occasionally on the first 12 segments, says viewers are more interested in her character's "personal growth" than in her pines.

Debut set for 'Good Advice' starring Long, Williams

Movie explores impact of fetal protection policy

HOLLYWOOD — To what extremes would you go to keep your job?

ABC's Monday night movie, "For Their Own Good," chronicles the horrors a group of women endured to keep their jobs. Inspired by a real event from the '80s, the drama stars Elizabeth Perkins ("Big") as Sally Thompson, an abused wife and mother of a young boy, who is one of the few women working in a small-town factory where hazardous materials are used. The company refuses to spend the money to clean up the facility. So it initiates a "fetal protection" policy that prevents women of childbearing years to work with hazardous materials. If the women don't want to lose their jobs, they must be sterilized.

Sally and her female co-workers are trapped. The area is economically depressed, their co-workers don't care about their plight and the local lawyer tells them they can't

fight the company. So Sally goes to New York and obtains the services of a feisty American Civil Liberties Union attorney (Laura San Giacomo) to file a sex-discrimination case against the company.

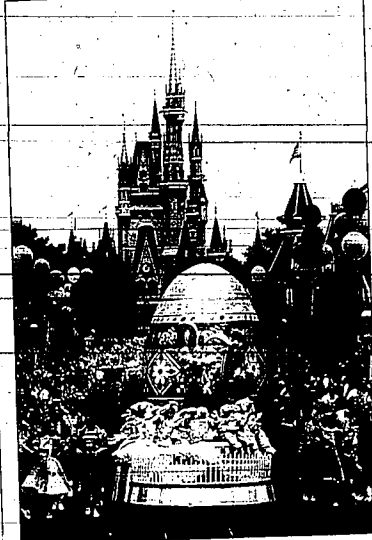
In 1990, the Supreme Court invalidated the fetal-protection policy and stated that American women needed protection from intrusive, discriminatory and unconstitutional job restrictions.

"For Their Own Good" is set in Texas and in New York City, but the old Los Angeles Herald Examiner building doubles for several locations. The presses have been transformed into a factory, and the newsroom subs for the ACLU office.

San Giacomo says, "In some of the research I did, I found some women were very compassionate to these women who had gone through this. Some women couldn't understand it."

Bernard plays woman trying to give baby better life in 'Miracle Child'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Crystal Bernard said all the networks send her movie scripts but "we vain actresses" want to do feature films with big directors.

She laughed that raucous roar so often featured by Helen Chappel, her character on NBC's "Wings." "Four years ago I would have given pedicures for a tiny part in any movie," she says.

Bernard stars in the NBC movie "Miracle Child" on Tuesday. It also features: Elvira, Leachman, Gracie Zabriskie, John Terry and Bernard Hughes. Michael Pressman directed and Gerald DiPego adapted the script from the novel by Patricia Pendergraft.

"Miracle Child" deserves recognition for the miracle it brings to television — it is that rare film not based on a true story. That's worth celebrating in an age when the networks' appetite for event films often means filming stories of questionable merit.

Bernard plays a young mother and nurse who hopes to give her baby a better life by leaving her with a doctor's small town. But instead of the doctor, played by Leachman, the baby ends up with the town spinster played by Zabriskie. The town's been down on its luck, but the baby seems to bring good luck and the town begins to thrive again.

"This movie doesn't have a riveting plot or a fatal disease," Bernard said. "It's a sweet movie, like a Hall-

mark Hall of Fame. Coming from a small town it was very understandable how this could have happened. I could understand how she could give this child away when her life was in shambles. "But she can't bear what she's done, and when she tries to turn to the town she ends up in an accident that puts her in the hospital for four weeks. What the movie is about is how this child changes the town for

the better."

Her character ends up staying in the town, working as a nurse for the doctor and finding love.

The movie was filmed on location in Gainesville, Fla., and Bernard had a blast. "I didn't have to get into makeup. I wore simple clothes. I got to fish."

Bernard grew up in and around Houston, where her father was a Baptist minister. She spent much of her childhood singing gospel music at youth rallies and church crusades around the country.

She came to Los Angeles at the age of 17 and was immediately discovered by Gary Marshall and cast in his movie "Young Doctors in Love." She played a roller-skating hooker.

Next, Marshall cast her as K.C. Cunningham in the final season of "Happy Days." "I was the little girl from Texas who had nothing but problems that Fonzie had to fix," she said.

She's still active in music: She and her writing partner have written pop music for Paula Abdul, Tracey Spencer, Steve Winwood, Tina Turner and others.

"I thought about doing an album but I think I'd lose some of the mystique you need with Helen Chappel's antics on 'Wings,'" she said.

Next, she'll appear with Sugar Ray Leonard in an exercise video.

The feeling that grows at you during "Diana: Her True Story" is that you're really watching "Diana: Her Story That Will Never Go Away."

Of course, it's a good story. It's as decent and compelling as any Danielle Steel epic, but real. Well, as real as someone's best guess, anyway. The British royal family is not about to sit for polygraph tests.

This miniseries is supposed to have particular credibility because it's based on journalist Andrew Morton's book of the same title. His sources are so good the producers have pointed out that the scene in which Prince Charles and Princess Diana agree to separate was filmed before the monarchy made the official announcement.

On the other hand, this is still about our interest in gossip that features either the bizarre or the satirical. It may be 1993, but here is a nation lurching back and forth between embarrassment and pride because its identity continues to be intertwined with an indulgent aristocratic tradition. This is mostly about spectacle and only secondarily about people.

Sure, it's supposed to be about Diana, a woman who hopes to live out a romantic fairy tale but instead becomes trapped in a loveless web of obligations and pressures. Castles

are only prisons; her children are regarded as the property of the state.

To care about Diana, dear, victimized Diana is to see the human I factor.

hidden behind all the pomp and pomposity. The Princess of Wales comes to be the clotheshorse child bride of her country's most regal husband. She becomes a deceived and ignored wife, struggling to mature as an individual and public symbol in the face of staggering family callousness.

But bloody hell; this story and all the offshoots are worth only so much videotape. TV already has given us "Fergie and Andrew: Behind 'The Palace Doors'" and "Charles and Diana: Unhappily Ever After" — not to mention enough tabloid and "legitimate" news coverage to supply an all-day Di channel.

No matter how sympathetic the portrait, some of us have had enough of this person.

Nobody in the cast of "Diana: Her True Story" will haul you over, either.

'Inside Edition,' 'Current Affair' go to the barricades

NEW YORK (AP) — Two tabloid TV shows — "A Current Affair" and "Inside Edition" — have taken up the fight in their long-standing ratings war.

On Thursday, "Current Affair" accused "Inside Edition" of swiping video footage "Affair" shot last year for a report on a suspected serial killer stalking outdoorsmen in Ohio.

"Inside Edition" denied it, and on Friday, WTOV-TV, the station that provided the footage, acknowledged it was responsible for the mixup.

"The video in question was a special map which was the property of 'A Current Affair,'" said the show's spokesman, Jeff Erdel. "It was marked to show the path of this serial killer, and it had a policeman's hand-pointing to various places on the map where the killer had struck."

When the footage appeared in an "Inside Edition" promotional spot Wednesday, "Current Affair"

warned stations that it told "Inside" to drop the video and "legal consequences are currently under review."

"That map has become 'Inside Edition's' map of shame," Steve Dunlevy, the senior correspondent-managing editor for "Affair," told Daily Variety.

Dunlevy and executive producer Ken Chandler didn't return calls from The Associated Press.

"Inside Edition" said its footage was shot and provided by WTOV, which serves the Wheeling, W.Va., and Steubenville, Ohio, market.

"A Current Affair" is attempting to set up a smoke screen to disguise the fact that the show's ratings are in a serious decline," said the "Inside Edition" executive producer, Bob Young, demanding an apology.

"Steve Dunlevy has once again added to his parade of pink elephants," Young said, referring to the Australian reputation for a world-class boogie-woogie and murder.

Erdel said "Current Affair" staffers electronically superimposed the two video sources and found them identical.

Clinton turns down invite from 'Cheers'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Everyone wanted to belly up to the bar for Wednesday's filming-of-the-final "Cheers" episode — even President Clinton.

But despite an invitation to join stars Ted Danson, Kirstie Alley and other cast members of the long-running NBC sitcom, White House officials said Clinton would be unable to fly in from Washington.

"We can't do it this week," said Dee Dee Myers, Clinton's press secretary. But she hinted that Clinton may someday be part of the show.

"I think there may be ways," said Ms. Myers. She didn't elaborate, and

"Cheers" representatives were unavailable Wednesday.

The 90-minute finale, which airs May 20, was scheduled to be shot Wednesday night at Paramount studios. Former cast member Shelley Long was to make a return visit.

A White House aide who spoke on condition of anonymity said Clinton would like to appear but the matter was complicated by his father-in-law's ill health and by his Saturday-Sunday summit meeting with Russian President Boris Yeltsin.

"Cheers" has attracted other politicians, former House Speaker Tip O'Neill and former Sen. Gary Hart have made appearances.

There is precedent if Clinton were to appear on a primetime entertainment

show. In 1968, President Nixon solemnly intoned "Soak it to me" on the variety series "Rowan & Martin's Laugh-In."

Clinton has his own Hollywood ties: He made use of talk shows and the expertise of TV producers and close friends Harry Thomson and Linda Bloodworth-Thomson during the 1992 campaign.

"Cheers," which has been on the air since September 1982, remains a top-rated show for third-place NBC and is the longest-running comedy currently on television.

Producers were working around Tip Long's duties on a new series, so the finale won't be in the last episode slot.

The final filming — for the next-to-last episode — is set for April 7.

Record-length Oscar show watched by 76 million

Monday's 65th annual Academy Awards telecast did not set a record for ratings but it did for length: 3 hours, 33 minutes.

Including 1974, when Nielsen started keeping records of such facts, no Oscar show has lasted longer. The two previous longest, in 1990 and 1992, tied at 3 hours, 24 minutes.

The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences estimated a world audience of 1 billion people for the Oscars live or on tape in 95 countries, five more than had ever shown the Oscars before. An estimated 76 million Americans watched an ABC

Q: I say that William Katt is the son of Barbara Hale and William Hopper (the original Paul Drake on "Perry Mason"). My mother says I'm wrong. Who's right?

A: Well, you are half right. Katt, the onetime star of "The Greatest American Hero" and the actor who played Paul Drake Jr. in several "Perry Mason" TV movies, is the son of Hale (Della Street on "Perry Mason") and the late actor Bill Williams ("The Adventures of Kit Carson"). Katt, a familiar face to TV viewers the past decade, was seen in the short-lived series "Top of the Hill" on CBS, "The Greatest American Hero" and in several TV movies and miniseries, including "The Daughters of Joshua Cabe," "Can Ellen Be Saved?" and "Swimsuit." Q: I've been watching "Knots Landing" since it began, but this season seems different. Are there new writers or is it just my imagination?

A: CBS' "Knots Landing" did change writers, but not this season. During the middle of last season the producers weren't satisfied with the direction the series was going, so they made some changes that included bringing back Anne Marcus, who had been with the series the first two seasons, as supervising producer in charge of scripts. The first thing she did was hire a new writing team.

Q: What happened to "House of Eliott" on the Arts and Entertainment channel? The story line improved a continuation. Then, all of a sudden, we have "Miss Manple" mysteries taking up the slot.

A: The latest repeat run of "House of Eliott" — a British-made series about how two sisters (played by Louise Lombard and Stella Gonet) cope with being left penniless and unprepared for life by the sudden death of their father, concluded in mid-December on A&E. The cable network, which has broadcast two seasons worth (24 episodes) of the series, is now negotiating with the BBC to reacquire the program's third season, now in production in England. Sources at A&E say repeating the first 24 episodes depends on the result of the negotiations.

Q: Tom Skerritt, the taciturn minister in "A River Runs Through It" — do I remember correctly that he started about 20 years ago in a TV series "It's a Man's World"? What else has he done?

A: Before his current foray into series TV, CBS' "Picket Fences," Skerritt was a regular on a 1983 bomb called "Ryan's Four" and

briefly on "Cheers" as bar owner Evan Drake. Skerritt made his feature debut in a low-budget 1962 movie "Two Hundred" with another newcomer, Robert Redford, who directed "River." Skerritt's done many features, including "M.A.S.H.," "Alien," "Top Gun," "The Turning Point" and a flock of TV movies. ("It's a Man's World" seen 1962-63, starred Glenn Corbett, Mike Burris, Ted Bessell and L-Randy Boone.)

Q: Is it true that child-star Macmillan Culkin is in trouble already in Hollywood?

A: Apparently Mac's pushy manager-dad Kit Culkin created quite a stir when he boasted producer Laurence Mark from his son's movie "The Good Son" last month. Mark had spent years developing the film. Not only that, Big Daddy insisted that one of his other six children have a role in the film. The tremendous resentment resulting from these and other actions caused one Hollywood insider to declare "the beginning of the end for (Macmillan) and his dad." The movie apparently is in limbo.

Q: Isn't Joan Rivers on the top world — finally — these days?

A: So she says. "My career is going great," declares Rivers. "My daughter (Melissa Rosenberg) is just fine and has had her career for a long time." Rivers (on MTV) picked up for 46 weeks, I love living in New York, I have stimulating friends, male companionship — and a dog that loves me. What more do I need? Rivers seems to have recovered from the suicide of her husband, Edgar Rosenberg, her firing by Fox (for being too close), and her slandering by NBC and Johnny Carson when she gave up her guest-host position on "The Tonight Show" to host her own late-night program. With a syndicated talk show, a new weekly USA cable gossip show, a jewelry line and a clothing line, Rivers says she's "more than OK" but I don't like to put a jinx on her. Surprisingly, the fantasies about becoming busier with other new ventures. Don't watch for her on the comedy circuit, though. She has given up stand-up.

Q: Is Harvey Keitel so desperate for work that he has to resort to those incredibly violent films he's done lately?

A: Keitel contends that the brutality in his recent movies, "Reservoir Dogs" and "Bad Lieutenant," is a challenge to the audience's own morality. Keitel says that viewers are forced to decide what they think. He adds that someday he intends to show some of the nightmarish scenes in "Bad Lieutenant" to his daughter, Stella, now 6. "We can't leave it to the government to educate our children," Keitel says. "If I don't confront my own fears, I'm just going to pass them on to my child." That's one view of art. And Keitel has had plenty of choices since his comeback in 1991 as gangster Mickey Cohen in "Bugsy."

Student misses Pacino's accolade because of essay

NEW YORK — Ileana Diaz wasn't watching the Academy Awards when Al Pacino mentioned the young woman from the South Bronx in his acceptance speech. The New York state university freshman was writing an essay.

"I was up late writing about how the innocence of children in the inner city is destroyed," said Diaz, whose family lived near Pacino's boyhood home in the South Bronx. "How can you consider them children?"

She choked up when she heard Pacino's remarks Tuesday. "I never thought he would remember me," Diaz said.

She said that I had encouraged her. Pacino said Monday night after being named best actor for

his performance in "Scout of a Woman." "That's not necessarily because of my work but by the fact that we come from the same place. I just can't forget that girl and I can't forget the kids out there who may be thinking... that if he can do it, I can do it. I want to thank the Academy for giving us a gift of encouragement."

The two crossed paths in November when the South Bronx Youth Economic Development Corp. honored Pacino. As a student at South Bronx High School, Diaz, 18, was involved in a school and business partnership and was selected to give Pacino the award.

"Some children I grew up with went after the life of drugs and the end product was death or jail," said Diaz, who wants to be a lawyer. "But there are other ways out of the South Bronx. Nothing is impossible."

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Latino players face special problems

FORT MYERS, Fla. — Just-ordering food was a chore.

There Pedro Munoz was, 16 years old, unable to speak English and beginning a new career in Bradenton, Fla. A foreign player in a foreign land. At an age when most American youths are living larger at McDonald's, Munoz couldn't even read a menu. With a little help from some friends, he soon learned the word "chequer" and "ordered" it again and again.

"When you go to eat and you don't know what to order, you learn the language quicker. You want to eat well," Munoz said. "You learn quickly when you really need it."

Now in Bradenton, Fla., Munoz couldn't speak a word of English when the Toronto Blue Jays signed him at age 16 and assigned him to a summer in Bradenton. He learned his English from teammates and off television.

What Munoz went through is just part of the challenge facing players from Latin America when they reach the United States to begin a career in baseball. In addition to competing with their American teammates for a job, they also must learn a new language, new customs and a new land.

"There's a lot more to judging a player from a foreign country," said Terry Ryan, Minnesota's vice-president for player personnel. "You have to keep in mind they might have trouble ordering food, translating the coaches' instructions and eating right."

"They get homesick. Everybody else gets homesick, too, but the difference is they may not be able to get ahead of their family on the phone."

Pitching prospect Richard Garces remembers the year the Minnesota Twins sent him to Kenosha, Wis., an area starkly different from his native Venezuela. Not only did he still have trouble with the language, he also had to deal with temperatures dramatically lower than he was used to at home.

"I used to cry every day," Garces said. "Every day I would cry and cry. When am I going to learn English?"

"It's tough," Munoz said. "We come here to a different country where everything is different. Everything here you can get in Puerto Rico,

but the weather is different, the language is different. You have to learn to communicate with people."

The Twins try to facilitate the transition with a few programs. Basic English lessons are taught several times a week in the minor league camp, with the emphasis on teaching the players enough to communicate on the field — they need to learn the English names for base balls, gloves and other pieces of equipment — and off. Assistant general manager Billy Smith, who teaches some of the classes, prepares their tax returns.

"We try to give them enough English to go into a restaurant and pay their bills and survive on a daily basis," Ryan said. "It's tough."

"The first thing we work on is food so they can eat properly," Smith said. "Then, last, to tell time so that when the manager tells them the bus is leaving at 9, they understand. We work on talking on the phone. Talking on the phone is one of the hardest things to do because you can't see the other person. You can't read their hand motions. You can't read the body language."

Cuban-born Tony Oliva, a spring training instructor, works in large part with Spanish-speaking players, and the Twins have hired Jose Matran, a Puerto Rican native, to manage their Class A team in Fort Myers. The Twins' defense manual is bilingual. The Twins also try to keep Latin players from rooming with each other at the Class A level as a way of forcing them to learn English more quickly.

Still, it's a battle. Garces actually learned to speak and read English quickly, but says he still cannot write in English. Hernandez, a native of the Dominican Republic, has played ball here since 1981 and still speaks "only" in "falling" English (Munoz served as his interpreter when Brito was called up last season). And Garces got himself in trouble with the club last spring ago when he ran up massive phone bills with daily calls to his wife and mother.

"It's tough for Latin guys to come here without being able to speak English, but you still have to try," Garces said. "It's really not that hard to learn. You just have to concentrate. Every day you have to learn something. You have to learn more and more and more."

Magic Johnson is coming to TV screens as the hero of a four-hour ABC miniseries.

A: No. Fair catches do not count as returns and do not count toward average yardage gained.

Q: How many grand slams has Nolan Ryan allowed in his career?
