WASHINGTON — Starting Monday, NATO warplanes will be scouring the skies over Bosnia, ready to challenge and destroy Serbian aircraft that violate a U.N.-imposed flight ban designed to protect the area's Muslim population.

In Brussels Thursday, the United States and its NATO allies agreed to back up their five-month old "no-fly" zone over the former Yugoslav republic with force after easing French concerns about coordinating the mission with the United Nations.

Joining the initial NATO contingent of 56 warplanes will be 24 U.S. fighters; 12

Air Force F-15s based at Aviano, Italy, and 12 Navy F-18s from the carrier USS Theodore Roosevelt in the Adriatic Sea.

Pentagon officials believe there is little chance that the decision to keep Serbian airplanes grounded — or shoot them down in the event they try to fly over Bosnia — will involve American bloodshed.

"We're more worried about our SERBS than those Serbs," a U.S. Navy pilot said privately Thursday, referring to the dreaded Selected Early Retirement Boards that force military people out of the service before they want to leave.

The military is confident it can thwart any ground-launched attack against its planes. One Navy official suggested night

takeoffs and landings from the Roosevelt will be just as hazardous as any threat posed by the Serbs.

NATO command planes will direct allied fighters toward any aircraft that enters Bosnia airspace. Violators will be warned repeatedly to leave the area before any shots are fired, in hopes of avoiding clashes that could imperil U.N. peacekeeping forces on the ground inside Bosnia, Pentagon officials said.

Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., has expressed concern that enforcing the no-fly zone could endanger those 7,500 allied troops.

"What happens when our humanitarian forces are attacked — how are we going to defend them?" the chairman of the Senate

Armed Services Committee has asked. "Are we ready to send in ground forces?"

Although President Clinton has said he has no plans to send ground forces into Bosnia, some military officers are leery. "If something bad happens, all bets are off," one Army officer said grimly. "I'm keeping my fingers crossed."

But military leaders acknowledge that enforcing a no-fly zone over the Balkan peninsula will do little to halt the fighting. "It's rather insignificant," Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said last week of the potential impact. "What it does, however, is reinforce the fact that when the U.N. passes such a resolution, it must be obeyed."

Walton changes petition

Opposition to anti-gay rights initiative forms

BOISE — The Idaho Citizens Alliance re-submitted its anti-gay rights initiative to the Secretary of State's office on Thursday, revising the original proposal in response to criticism by the attorney general's office.

"There are some points with the AG review that we have picked up on that do appear to be valid, and we feel we have addressed those points," alliance leader Kelly Walton said.

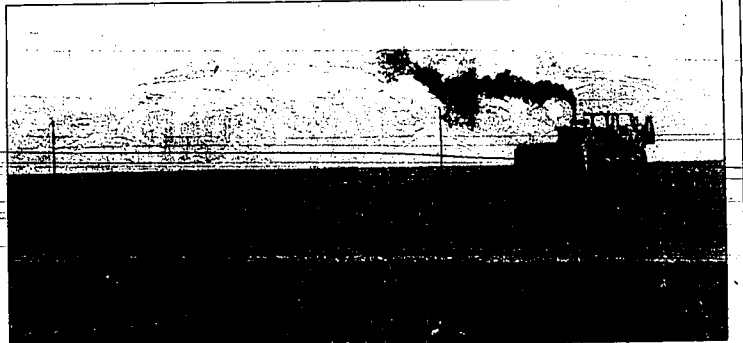
The modified initiative came just before the deadline for refining calls to battle what leader Jill Kuratits called "bigotry, pure and simple."

In the 15 days since Attorney General Larry Ichofflavik advised the alliance that the original proposition would not withstand a constitutional challenge, the title "Idaho Civil Rights Act" has been stripped from the document, and eight sections have been condensed to six. "Through me as prudent as one defeated in Oregon last fall, the proposal is purportedly intended to prohibit designation of homosexuals as a minority needing protection from discrimination — what proponents call 'special rights'."

Walton said that by "special rights," he means such things as hiring quotas or affirmative action.

State asks court to define 'thorough'

The state of Idaho has asked the Idaho Supreme Court to clarify its recent decision reopening a lawsuit against the state by dozens of school districts, including seven in the Magic Valley.

The March 18 decision allowed the districts to pursue their claim that the state doesn't give them enough money to provide a "thorough" education, as required by the state Constitution.

Deputy Attorney General David High, chief of civil litigation in the attorney general's office, said the state would ask the Court to clarify the term "thorough."

The petition for rehearing was filed Thursday. In its opinion, the Court said it had ex-

amined the state Department of Education's rules and regulations for public schools and found that "the requirements for school facilities, instructional programs and textbooks, and transportation systems as contained in those regulations presently in effect, are consistent with our view of thoroughness."

Forty-eight districts have sued the state to try to force it to pump more money into the state's school system. Seven Magic Valley districts currently are part of the lawsuit: Blaine, Minidoka, Jerome, Valley, Hagenman, District and Richfield.

The Twin Falls and Buhl districts originally were plaintiffs as well, but they have said they want to drop out.

High said the state will ask the court to be more specific about how much weight it intends to give the state regulations. Some

of them are requirements and others merely suggestions or recommendations.

"We're interested in getting clarification of the opinion to make the district court process work better," he said. "We'll suggest refinements or changes to the court's definition of thoroughness."

Merlyn Clark, the attorney representing one group of school districts in the suit, said those questions should be decided in 3rd District Judge Gerald Schroeder's courtroom, where the lawsuit returns following the Supreme Court decision.

However, it will be up to the Court whether to grant a rehearing, and whether to hear from the school districts before it decides.

On Wednesday, state school superintendents met to discuss the case. Please see LAWSUIT/A2

Wealthy bear brunt of Clinton budget

WASHINGTON — The Clinton budget has a dash of sweet — and some sourness as well — for groups across the spectrum of America, ranging from westerners and students to veterans and construction workers.

Almost everyone would pay new taxes, but the burden is heaviest on the affluent. Children do better than the elderly under the Clinton scheme, and scientists would fare better than doctors.

The broadest tax increase, and the only one that directly affects the vast middle class, is the administration's proposed tax on the heat content of various fuels. It's expected to take a \$17 monthly bite from families with annual incomes of \$40,000.

The administration's biggest argument about the proposed fiscal 1994 budget is that it is fair.

"It asks every American to contribute to our economic future: senior citizen, federal workers, doctors, hospital, farmers, the wealthy, everyone," said budget director Leon Panetta.

The balance could change in future months and years as the administration makes decisions on health-care reform, agriculture subsidies and weapons systems. These decisions will affect senior citizens, doctors, farmers and defense workers.

The proposal on the table, considered reasonably equitable by most analysts, nevertheless signals some early winners and losers.

More than half the new taxes would be paid by those with annual incomes above \$200,000. At various points above \$140,000, people would be hit with a 5-

percentage point hike in their income-tax rate, a 10 percent surtax and higher Medicare taxes. Many would also lose breaks on business-related meals, entertainment and club dues.

Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen sought Thursday to minimize the impact of the energy tax on taxpayers.

"If they refinanced their home mortgage, they would have saved several times that every month," he said, referring to the low general interest rates that have set off a wave of refinancing.

On the spending side, the Clinton plan tilts toward low-income children with more dollars for Head Start, immunizations, nutrition programs and federal efforts to remove lead-based paint from schools.

Low-income families would benefit as well from increases in the earned income tax credit, migrant health services and a program that helps people pay fuel bills.

Veterans would see an extra \$1 billion poured into their health-care system. Another \$1 billion would be spent on women's health research and services for AIDS victims.

But older people with moderate incomes — \$25,000 and up — could be stung.

"We are concerned about the cumulative impact" of the energy tax, an increase in Medicare premiums and new taxes on Social Security benefits, said Marty Gorry, chief lobbyist for the American Association of Retired Persons. "Whether they come out winners or losers remains an open question depending on what happens with the health-care package."

Mental illness afflicts most zoo animals

LONDON — A hulking gorilla, a psychotic baboon, a self-mutilating bear. Not the sorts of furry creatures people hope to see at the zoo.

Yet according to a survey conducted by Britain's Born Free Foundation, mental illness is rampant among zoo animals.

The foundation, a charity that monitors animals in captivity, did not calculate the numbers of animals affected compared with the total number of animals monitored, which concerns skeptics.

But in a telephone interview, the researchers said their examples represent a global problem.

"The most important thing was the same species displayed the same abnormal behavior in zoos worldwide," said William Travers, the director of the study.

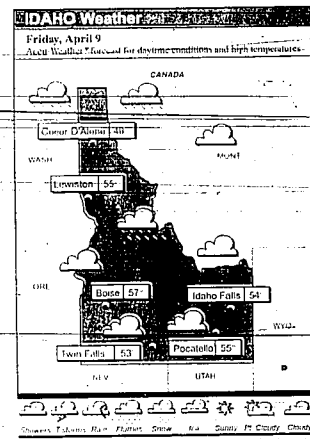
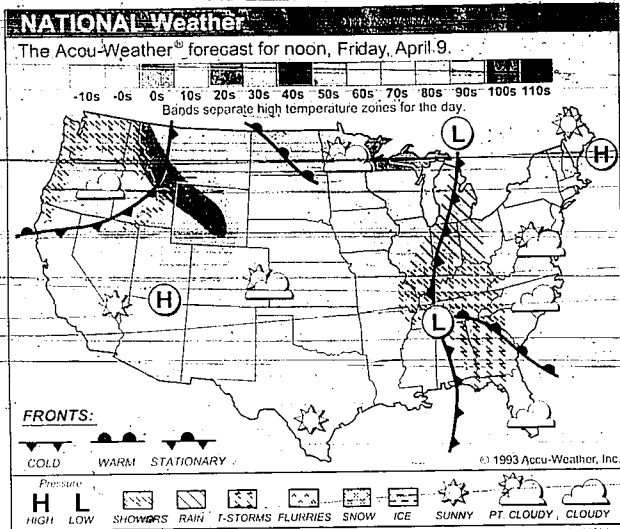
"Our evidence confirms that deprived of their natural environment, social structures and outlets for many of the skills for which they have naturally evolved, animals exhibit abnormal behavior."

Most experts agree that caged animals pick up peculiar habits, but not all consider this behavior a sign of insanity.

The border between sanity and mental illness is fuzzy among humans, and even blurrier among non-humans. Scientists do not know how or even if animals think. If they do, what's normal?

"If you can define a behavior as not productive or damaging to the animal, like, please see ANIMALS/A2

Flood warnings posted across lower Mississippi Valley

Heavy rain continued to fall Thursday in the lower Mississippi Valley, prompting flood warnings in several states. A flash flood watch was posted for the afternoon over south-central and southeast Louisiana, where up to 4 inches of rain had fallen since Wednesday.

Thunderstorms were expected to add another 4 inches of rain in the region in the afternoon and evening.

The National Weather Service posted flood warnings Thursday for rivers in Iowa, Arkansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Connecticut, New York, North Carolina, Georgia, South Carolina, Florida and Texas.

Flooding has been a problem during the past few weeks.

because of melting snow and ice jams followed by locally heavy rain.

The early afternoon rain extended over the Mississippi Valley, much of the Upper Great Lakes, northwest Texas and the Pacific Northwest. Rain and thunderstorms were reported over the lower Mississippi Valley, and sputter fell in northern Minnesota.

FBI hangs up on Koresh, dimming hopes for ending standoff

WACO, Texas (AP) — FBI negotiators hung up on the leader of a heavily armed cult when he began rambling about religious doctrine, dimming hopes of ending a 40-day standoff, the government said Thursday.

Talks with cult leader David Koresh resumed late Wednesday for the first time in six days, but FBI special agent Bob Ricks said the negotiators hung up after Koresh talked nonsensically about the Bible's Book of Revelation.

The Branch Davidian cult is observing Passover, celebrating the Jews' Exodus from slavery in ancient Egypt.

Russian crews try to halt spread of contamination

MOSCOW (AP) — Hundreds of disaster workers cleared snow and built dams in the Siberian wilderness Thursday in an effort to clean up the radiation from Russia's worst nuclear accident since Chernobyl.

Commonwealth Television showed heavy damage at the nuclear weapons complex in the underground tank containing a poisonous mix of liquid nuclear waste exploded and burned on Tuesday.

The roof and several walls of the complex's plutonium processing facility were destroyed in the blast, which spewed a radioactive cloud into the atmosphere.

The Russian Air Defense Command said the wind was blowing the radioactive cloud northeast from Tomsk-7 at a height of 1.2 miles and a speed of 22 mph, according to the television. There were conflicting reports about the extent of the contamination and the cloud.

A shift supervisor at the Tomsk-7 plutonium processing plant, meanwhile, blamed the accident on poor work discipline, a report said.

Although no evacuations were ordered and officials said the contaminated areas were unpopulated, the Russian government called it the worst nuclear accident since the April 1986 explosion and fire at the Chernobyl atomic power plant in Ukraine.

That accident rated a 7 on the International Atomic Energy Association's seven-point scale, while the Tomsk-7 accident rated a 3.

At the complex, workers in masks measured radiation in the area, while more than 500 firefighters and civil defense troops cleared away contaminated snow and dirt. They also built dams to prevent melting snow from spreading the contamination.

A military Mi-8 helicopter flew over the largely uninhabited area of dense forest, taking measurements as part of a continuous radiation monitoring program.

Vladimir Alexandrov, a shift supervisor at the Tomsk-7 plutonium processing plant, told the ITAR-Tass news agency that one of the main reasons for the accident was poor work discipline.

He said nuclear industry workers take little responsibility for their actions because the pay is low and the government pays little attention to poor conditions in the workplace.

Tornado hits small fishing town, 3 die

GRAND ISLE, La. (AP) — A tornado smashed through this island fishing village Thursday, collapsing a school filled with children and killing at least three people, the Coast Guard reported.

One of the dead was a high school senior who was the school's prom queen; the others were construction workers caught behind the two-story school, school officials said. At least 20 people were injured, authorities said.

"I just looked out my window and saw the wind and then there were trees flying by," said Pat Bellanger, the mayor's secretary. "While I was watching, the school just collapsed and parts of it started blowing all over the place. I could see bricks, two-by-fours, glass flying all over."

The school has 315 students enrolled from kindergarten to 12th grade. The tornado hit minutes before the end of a school bus tour that had been dismissed for Easter holidays.

The twister also ripped apart some military barracks that had been converted to teacher housing and flipped about 20 trailers, injuring several people.

...ative action programs for homosexuals.

"They have the same protections as the rest of us under the Constitution," he said. "But they do not deserve special minority protection based on behavior."

It also includes a new section that specifically denies legal recognition of same-sex marriages.

At a meeting near the close of the 1993 legislative session, High Attorney General Larry Echolfaw and Chief Deputy Attorney General Jack McMahon told legislative leaders that the Court's definition of "thoroughness" excludes vocational education, teacher salaries and most all extracurricular activities.

...mental illness, and you don't know why they are doing it."

"No doubt you see it in captive animals and occasionally in horses in fields where they have restricted territory," he said. "But it may be a way of alleviating stress and making them feel better."

Between 1990 and 1992, researchers from the Born Free Foundation visited 100 zoos in the Europe and the United States and recorded animal behavior on video.

The long list of allegedly disturbed animals includes a bulimic gorilla in Barcelona, bulimic chimps in the Sacramento Zoo, a bear in Rome that pulls its hair out, tongue-twirling giraffes in Japan and a baboon in Cyprus that cannot stop doing back flips. Travers considers the baboon psychotic.

The investigators tallied traits supposedly suggestive of mental illness, but did not calculate the percentage of animals afflicted. But some investigators question the validity of the conclusions because they are not based on a scientific analysis.

"Despite this, Travers insists the situation is rampant."

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Economy continues slow climb up

WASHINGTON (AP) — Prices paid to farmers, factories and other producers jumped a worrisome 0.4 percent in March, driven up by a blip in gasoline and fuel oil prices, the government said Thursday.

Economists warned that the best news on inflation is over.

Other reports, public and private, show the economy continuing to grow — but slowly. Many major retailers said sales in March were down from a year ago. New claims for unemployment benefits dropped in early April, but less than expected.

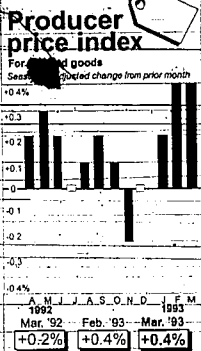
A row of businesses said they plan the biggest increase in new equipment and buildings in four years.

Much of the March increase in the Labor Department's Producer Price Index was attributed to special factors, including energy costs and a pre-Easter rise in egg prices.

That left the increase in so-called core prices — prices excluding the volatile food and energy sectors — at only 0.1 percent in March.

"The (inflation) market reaction was very happy because core inflation was up only one tenth, but I'm less than happy because I do eat and I do drive a car and heat my home," said economist Paul W. Boltz of T. Rowe Price and Associates, a mutual fund company in Baltimore.

Analysts said inflation wasn't in



any danger of roaring out of control, nevertheless they said the economy probably has strengthened enough to rule out impossible risks in inflation.

Producer prices also had risen 0.4 percent in February following a 0.2 percent increase in January.

Taken together, the first three

months of the year represent an annual inflation rate of 3.9 percent, the worst rate in any quarter since the final three months of 1990 and more than double the 1.6 percent rise for all of last year.

Boltz said he expects producer price inflation of about 2 percent for all of this year and consumer price inflation of about 3.4 percent up from 2.9 percent in 1992.

"Inflation is not dead. It's not zero. It's a solid 3 percent and looks to be going up. At 3 percent inflation, prices double every 24 years," he said. "The message here is that the best news on inflation is behind us, but the deterioration will be very gradual."

The Labor Department is scheduled to report Friday on consumer prices in March.

In other reports Thursday:

- Unsettled weather and shoppers' uncertainty about taxes and the economy continued to pummel retail sales in March. Many storeowners reported business was down from year-earlier levels, or, like industry leader Wal-Mart Stores Inc., posted meager advances.
- American businesses told the Commerce Department they plan to increase investment in new buildings and equipment by 6.6 percent, to \$882 billion, this year.
- New claims for unemployment

insurance dropped by 9,000 to 369,000 during the week, ended April 3, the Labor Department said. However, the drop was only half what economists expected and followed a 11,000 increase the week before.

At the White House, spokesman George Stephanopoulos said the health care bill would be passed by the end of the week.

Each six weeks of the need for President Clinton's \$16.3 billion economic stimulus package, now bottled up in the Senate.

"We believe we need a package to create jobs now," Stephanopoulos said. "We're still not doing enough to create jobs in this economy."

March's producer price increase was driven by a 1.3 percent jump in energy prices, up from a 1.2 percent gain in February. Gasoline prices rose 2 percent, heating oil, 8.5 percent, and natural gas, 1.5 percent. Egg prices jumped 12.6 percent and fish prices, 11.3 percent, the first since last June. However, fruit prices fell 0.1 percent and vegetable prices declined 0.5 percent.

The price of snapbeans shot up 101.7 percent, but radishes were down 50 percent; squash, 46.6 percent; cucumbers, 41.3 percent, and strawberries, 21.2 percent.

Over-the-counter drugs fell 1.4 percent. However, new car prices rose 0.4 percent, as did tobacco.

Parasite sends Milwaukee clamoring for bottled water

MILWAUKEE (AP) — People picked stores clean of bottled water, schools covered drinking fountains and restaurants boiled large pots of water for washing food Thursday after thousands got sick, possibly from municipal water.

Health officials said a parasite could be to blame for the fluke illness.

Mayor John O. Norquist recommended that residents of the Milwaukee area buy drinking water until the source of the problem is determined. Some 800,000 people depend on the water system, which is drawn from Lake Michigan.

Many decided to buy bottled water and stores around the city had run out Thursday.

Roosevelt Harris, carrying four boxes of spring water, talked as the he had struck gold.

"I don't want to get sick. I'll buy it if it costs a dollar a gallon," said Harris, 74, one of the first customers through the door when the "downtown" Woolworth's opened.

Hospitals and businesses received large orders for bottled water and water coolers, and spring-water bottlers struggled to keep up.

"We're working frantically to get enough empty bottles and add shifts to meet demand," said Todd Peterson, president of Chippewa Springs Ltd.

"Some of our suppliers were ringing even before the start of business."

Scientists discover bubble boy gene
 BOSTON — Genetic material from a boy who died after spending his entire life in a protective bubble has helped scientists find the gene that caused his rare disease, which robs the body of all defenses.

Researchers estimate that this gene accounts for about half of all cases of severe combined immunodeficiency disease, or SCID, which occurs in about one in every 100,000 births.

The latest work reveals the cause of X-linked SCID — a defect in the Interleukin-2 receptor. Interleukin-2 is a hormone that serves as an important regulator of disease-fighting blood cells. Cells that respond to the hormone take it in through a spot called the interleukin-2 receptor.

In X-linked SCID, this receptor is constructed wrong. The receptor is actually assembled from proteins made by three different genes, and the scientists found that an error in one of these genes caused the problem.

2 charged with killing German tourist
 MIAMI — Two men were charged Thursday with killing a German tourist who was robbed, beaten and run over after she got lost in a blighted neighborhood while driving a rental car away from the airport.

The slaying prompted Germany and Britain to issue travel advisories. Seven foreign tourists, including three Germans, have been killed in Florida this tourist season.

Anthony Williams, 18, and Leroy Rogers, 23, already in custody on unrelated robbery charges, were charged with first-degree murder and strong-arm robbery in Friday's killing, Lt. John Brooks said.

Both men have prior criminal records, police said. Williams was on probation for armed robbery.

FDA toughens contraceptive label rules
 WASHINGTON — The Food and Drug Administration imposed tough labeling rules on contraceptive manufacturers Thursday, forcing them to spell out a product's inability to prevent sexually transmitted diseases.

The FDA strengthened its regulations as part of a campaign to educate the public, because, it said, high-risk sexual behavior is still prevalent, particularly among adolescents and young adults.

One in four Americans gets a sexually transmitted disease at some time in their life; there are 12 million new cases a year, according to one recent study. In all, some 36 million Americans are estimated to have diseases spread through sexual contact.

Besides AIDS, those diseases include chlamydia, genital herpes, genital warts, gonorrhea, hepatitis B and syphilis.

Third of U.S. families without insurance
 WASHINGTON — Nearly half the nation's families include a member who won't have any health insurance this year or will spend 10 percent of his income on direct medical costs, a health-care advocacy group said Thursday.

A study by Families USA found that more than 75 million people — almost a third of all Americans — either don't have health insurance or are enrolled in plans where they end up paying 10 percent of their income on medical expenses.

These out-of-pocket expenses do not include money paid for health insurance premiums or federal and state taxes that are collected to finance such public programs as Medicare, the report said.

AIDS pushes accidents for top position on list of premature deaths

ATLANTA (AP) — Accidents are still the top cause of premature death among Americans, but violence and AIDS are catching up fast, federal health officials reported Thursday.

In 1991, unintentional injuries robbed Americans of 2.1 million years of potential life before age 65, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said. Automobile wrecks accounted for 1.3 million of those years.

Cancer, claiming 1.9 million potential years, was the No. 2 cause of premature death. But violence and the AIDS virus grew fastest on the annual list, the CDC said.

Homicide claimed 906,944 years and suicide 674,583 years, according to provisional data for 1991. The nearly 1.6 million years lost to intentional violence was up 4.7 percent from 1990, the CDC said.

"We don't really know what is the one factor that's causing violence to go up," said Dr. Alex Crosby of the CDC's new Center for Injury Control. "Substance abuse, access to guns, poverty, unemployment — all play different roles in different communities."

AIDS stole 776,240 years from its victims in 1991, up 17.6 percent from the 660,261 years lost in 1990.

"People who were getting AIDS when they were 20 are dying now in their 30s," said CDC epidemiologist Nana Lopez. "And it's an epidemic that's growing."

The CDC uses the years-of-potential-life scale to gauge health crises among younger Americans. Age 65 is used as a benchmark even though most Americans live to be older than that.

The CDC's report comes just

days after the World Health Organization noted that injury, rather than illness, is the main cause of death among young people in industrialized countries. And health officials meeting in Washington Wednesday declared violence — both intentional and accidental — a public health epidemic that kills 3.5 million people worldwide annually.

The CDC, already alarmed at those statistics, last year created a new center to address violence and accidents. The Center for Injury Control recently funded programs in Raleigh and Durham, N.C., Houston and New York City's borough of Brooklyn to see if peer counseling, conflict resolution training and other steps can lower violence among young people. It also funds accident programs, including seat-belt use.

Thursday's report said heart disease and birth defects also were leading causes of premature death in 1991, totaling almost 2 million years, about the same as 1990.

But years lost to premature births continued their steady decline, from 442,664 in 1990 to 438,600 in 1991, the CDC said. The agency credited the use of synthetic to increase lung development and help forestall respiratory distress syndrome, the top killer of premature babies.

CDC compiled the list by sampling death certificates nationwide; exact numbers of deaths from each cause aren't yet available.

First lady's dad a gruff, loving father

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Hugh Rodham, who died at age 82, was remembered as a gruff but loving and proud father of first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton and two other children.

The retired Chicago-area businessman died Wednesday night at St. Vincent Infirmary Medical Center, where Mrs. Clinton had spent 16 days at his bedside after he suffered a stroke on March 19.

The Clintons flew to Little Rock on Thursday to make funeral arrangements.

Mrs. Clinton had returned to Washington on Sunday after her vigil caused her to miss several meetings of her health care task force.

"The Rodham family wishes to extend its heartfelt appreciation to the many prayers offered, the many expressions of concern in Arkansas and throughout the world," a White House spokeswoman Dee Dee Myers said.

Mrs. Clinton, 45, was the eldest of three children of Rodham and his wife, Dorothy.

Rodham owned a small textile business in Chicago, making draperies for hotels and other clients. He retired in 1970, and he and his wife moved to Little Rock in 1987 to be close to their daughter and her family.

In a profile of his daughter, The Washington Post said that when she would bring home lots of A's on report cards, the family joke was that he would grunt, "You must go to a pretty easy school."

The Rodhams were active in their church and Republican poli-

tics. Their daughter took up more liberal politics after going away to school at Wellesley College in Massachusetts.

Rodham was born in Scranton, Pa., the son of an immigrant from Northumberland, Lin and Co. Rodham also worked at the lace company during the Depression after earning a degree in physical education from Pennsylvania State University, which he attended on a football scholarship.

Pioneer musician Anderson dies at 96

PORTLAND (AP) — Marian Anderson, the brilliant contralto whose 1939 concert at the Lincoln Memorial was a singular moment in civil rights history, died Thursday. She was 96.

Miss Anderson died in the home of her nephew, James DePreist, the Oregon-Swampy's music director. She suffered a stroke last month.



Her artistry and quiet elegance endured despite the obstacles of racial prejudice. Through her tenacity and talent, she helped dispel the myth that blacks could not excel in opera and classical music.

"She was grateful that she was able to make a difference, but her goal in life was really to make music, and when that opportunity was denied, there was the outrage of a nation, rather than her outrage," DePreist said today.

"She was not bitter about it and never exploited it."

Miss Anderson was the first black artist to entertain at the White House and the first black to sing a major role with the Metropolitan Opera in New York.

Opera singer Roberta Peters, who also was in the Met cast that day, recalled today that "when we took bows, we were all applauding her, for those who were on stage." She called Miss Anderson a "modest, lovely, charming, religious, very, very, dear, special person."

The haunting perfection of Miss Anderson's voice was heard in concert halls around the world, her rich and soaring tones cradling spirituals and Schubert lieder, Verdi and Handel, the "Marseillaise" and "America."

"Yours is a voice such as one hears once in a hundred years," the conductor Arturo Toscanini once told her. "You are the greatest singer alive."

The Lincoln Memorial concert epitomized her long struggle against racial discrimination. It came about when the Daughters of the American Revolution refused to rent her Constitution Hall in Washington for a concert.

Although the DAR claimed the date was already taken, Eleanor Roosevelt thought Anderson was a

victim of discrimination and resigned from the group. The first lady arranged for Miss Anderson to sing at the Lincoln Memorial on Easter Sunday. The event attracted 75,000 people, the largest public tribute since Charles Lindbergh returned from France a decade before.

Her program included "America," the aria "O mio Fernando," Schubert's "Ave Maria" and the spirituals "Gospel Train," "Trampin'" and "My Soul Is Anchored in the Lord."

She told the racially mixed audience: "I am so overwhelmed, I just can't talk. I can't tell you what you have done for me today. I thank you from the bottom of my heart, again and again."

Miss Anderson later said: "If you've ever been tremendously excited about something or frightened — have you ever heard your heart beat heavily enough so that you almost lose your breath, so that you can't hear much else that's in your ears? Well, this was the sort of thing that happened for me at the Lincoln Memorial."

As her career wound down, she regretted all doors had not been open during her prime.

"If I only could give what I had to offer them. But they wouldn't accept it, or me," she said. "Other Negroes will have the career I dreamed of."

Her own career began early. Born Feb. 17, 1897, in Philadelphia, she began singing at age 3 and joined her church's junior choir by age 6. Two years later, she earned her first money as a singer — 50 cents.

fore-returning home she performed across Europe and for the kings of Sweden and Denmark.

For 30 years, she could be heard from Rome to Berlin from Stockholm to Salzburg. She recorded many of the works from her recital programs.

Her voice stretched more than two octaves. Her favorite music included Schubert, Handel and Mendelssohn. Christmas carols, spirituals and old American songs. She sang more than 200 songs in nine languages.

But always, her career was marked by her struggle against discrimination — her singing opened door after door — to hotels, restaurants, concert halls.

As a youngster, she was refused admittance to a Philadelphia school of music because she was black. Later in Atlantic City, she was given the keys to a city but was not allowed to stay in a hotel there.

She rarely spoke about prejudice but in a 1960 interview she said: "Sometimes it's like a hair across your cheek. You can't see it. You can't find it with your fingers but you keep brushing at it because the feel of it is irritating."

King announces 30th anniversary march

WASHINGTON (AP) — Calling for a renewed commitment to end the "violence of racism and poverty," Coretta Scott King and fellow civil rights leaders announced plans Thursday for a 30th anniversary March on Washington.

Mrs. King said "hundreds of thousands" are expected at the Washington Monument on Aug. 28. The

twentieth anniversary of the 1963 march drew 300,000.

"The critical issues that faced us in 1963 are unfortunately still with us today," said Mrs. King, the widow of Martin Luther King Jr. "We cannot give up, or give out, if we are to fulfill Dr. King's dream, and our dream, of a better America," she said.



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President makes 'get-acquainted' visit to Pentagon

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton, whose relations with the military got off to a rocky start, paid a get-acquainted visit to the Pentagon Thursday.

While there, he suggested he would like to see more cuts deeper than those in his new budget.

Clinton, who made the visit on the same day he sent Congress a fiscal 1994 budget that makes sharp cuts in defense spending, said he realized that his cuts were causing some uneasiness among Defense Department workers.

"There's a lot of uncertainty out there as you all know," Clinton said at a picture-taking session as he met with the military's top enlisted men and women.

He had breakfast with the joint chiefs of staff, met with top enlisted men and women, and worked a crowd of Pentagon employees at the entrance to the building.

It was his first visit to the Pentagon as president.

White House spokesman George

Stephanopoulos said that during the two-hour visit Clinton was briefed on a variety of issues, ranging from the airlift of supplies in Bosnia to the post-Cold War draw-down of troops in Europe and other matters.

Air Force Chief of Staff Merrill A. Meeker showed Clinton a film showing a new method of dropping food supplies in Bosnia so that no one on the ground is injured.

Under the new system, boxes of ready-made meals disintegrate in the air as soon as they are released, allowing the light, individually packaged, freeze-dried meals to float to the ground, the spokesman said.

During a meeting with the top enlisted personnel in each of the four services, Clinton heard some complaints that many members of the military were uncertain of their futures because of all the changes taking place.

"I've got to get this budget off my mind. I think that the numbers will be clear and certain for five years and I would like to see them modified any over the next few years, based at least on what I see now," he said.

The Marine Corps commander, Gen. Carl Mundy Jr., said the meeting between Clinton and the Joint Chiefs of Staff lasted more than two hours.

"It was a great meeting," Mundy said.

The four star general said there was a lot to talk about.

Clinton, whose own lack of military service during the Vietnam War became a campaign issue and who irritated critics of the military with his move to lift the ban on military gays, said he was pleased with his visit.

"We talked about a dozen different issues," he told reporters.

And what did he learn? "A lot," the commander-in-chief said.

Panel on lifting ban on gays in military considers rules, regulations

WASHINGTON — Greater privacy in latrines and showers, mandatory sensitivity training and prohibitions on public kissing and hugging by same-sex military personnel are among the options being considered by a Pentagon panel studying ways to lift the ban on homosexuals in uniform, Pentagon officials said Wednesday.

Discussions by the panel of senior uniformed representatives from each military service are still in their early stages, and no decisions have been reached on how to implement President Clinton's plan to lift the ban, the officials said.

Nevertheless, the nature of the discussions demonstrates how entrenched the Pentagon has become in the practical, nuts-and-bolts implications of the president's plan. The panel, which includes a full-time support staff of several dozen, is charged with making a recommendation to Defense Secretary Les Aspin, who then must submit a report to Clinton by July 15.

"There are a lot of questions," said a Pentagon official with knowledge of the internal discussions. "Like what if someone comes in and says, 'My roommate has just announced he's gay, can I have another room?'"

"One (school of thought) says it should be handled like someone who complains about a black roommate. ... Another says he should be accommodated." Under existing regulations, race is not considered a valid ground for requesting a change in quarters.

Clinton said last month that he would be willing to consider keeping homosexuals out of some duty assignments, prompting an outcry among gay-rights advocates who accused him of betraying his campaign promise to end discrimination against homosexuals. The White House subsequently backed away from the statement, and the Pentagon official said Wednesday the segregation option is "not under consideration" at any level. "There are two groups of people who dislike it. ... the gay-rights people and the military," the official said.

Gay-rights groups object because they say service personnel should be judged according only to their conduct, not sexual orientation. The military objects to the idea because "they don't want people to avoid combat by saying, 'Hey, I'm gay,'" the official said.

Nevertheless, the official made clear that homosexuals in uniform could still be subject to a double standard, at least in some areas, although he emphasized that the panelists have not reached any consensus. Among their first tasks, he said, is educating themselves on rules that now govern conduct of heterosexual couples in the military with the aim of deciding whether the same rules should apply to homosexuals.

One of the most ticklish questions concerns such behavior as "kissing" and hugging, whether on an officer's club dance floor or during an "open house" when military personnel entertain guests from off base.

"What are the rules about display of sexual affection between unmarried people?" the Pentagon official said. "Can you have different rules

for homosexuals?" These are the kinds of very specific questions under consideration.

Military fraternization rules prohibit contacts of sexual liaisons between officers and enlisted personnel and among those in the same chain of command. Beyond that, however, personal relationships among military personnel are governed by rules little different than in other workplace settings.

"If I were to see two male officers dancing together, it would be difficult for me to accept that," an Army captain said Wednesday.

Gay-rights advocates have little patience for such arguments. "Whatever is appropriate for heterosexuals should be appropriate for lesbians and gays," said Gregory J. King, a spokesman for the Human Rights Campaign Fund. "That's fundamentally where we come down."

The Pentagon official said previous considerations would play a pivotal role in the panel's deliberations, including the question of bathroom facilities. Many military personnel, citing the cramped quarters and lack of privacy common to military life, have said they would object to sharing bathrooms with homosexuals.

"Where there are places showers and latrines are not private, should we have some (that are) private?" the official asked.

He acknowledged that providing private bathroom stalls may not be feasible in most field conditions, but suggested that the experience of women in uniform may hold important lessons for the panel.

"In the field, I'm told, men and women stop worrying about it," he said. "To what degree do men and women living out in the field adopt a different standard of behavior?"

One of the officials on the panel is whether to recommend implementation of sensitivity training along the lines of programs that have long been conducted on race relations and, more recently, sexual harassment.

"Do you teach people to tolerate gays the way you teach them to tolerate blacks, or do you do a more general thing where you say private behavior is none of the military's business?" the official asked. "You've got to decide what kind of education you're doing."

The panel is headed by Air Force Lt. Gen. Robert Alexander, the Pentagon's acting chief of personnel, and includes a senior, one-star officer from each service. The panel held its first meeting earlier this week, and its members expect to work virtually full-time on the implementation plan until it is finished.

Police put out piggy banks to raise money

COLFAX, Calif. (AP) — The latest police weapon against a shrinking budget?

Piggy banks.

The piggy banks seem to have become the unofficial mascot of the Colfax police as the six-member department struggles to make do with their \$300,000 budget amid a rising population and diminishing revenues.

Officers have put a dozen pink plastic piggy banks in stores in this village 50 miles northeast of Sacramento.

On sale are T-shirts with the words "Colfax Police" and a picture of a pig's head. A fund-raiser and drawing drew 200 people to a pizza parlor Monday. And a car wash is planned.

The first goal is paying off a 1990 patrol car, recently purchased for \$2,700. The police association also wants more training and equipment.

"Instead of complaining about our problems, we as an association decided to get out and do something about it," Officer Reed Dahlberg said.

Boise company elbows its way into valley

One company is fixing a bad name to the idea of private-sector involvement in Magic Valley landfills. That's too bad, because we see ample opportunity for private companies to help pay for cleaning the new landfills that will serve the area's counties.

New federal rules will require communities nationwide to have better, more environment-friendly landfills by this October. Magic Valley counties are scrambling to find sites and begin construction, and they surely will want to look at some of the many private companies that offer landfill management services.

They will, that is, if they aren't thoroughly disenchanted by their experience with Dispose-All Inc.

The Boise company is doing its damndest to elbow its way into the valley. It seems determined to build its own landfill, with or without the blessings of local authorities and neighboring property owners. And it has made clear its intent to import garbage from wherever it must to make its venture profitable.

The company's latest affront is to brazenly announce plans to begin building a landfill within two weeks. This, despite not having applied for a permit — a process that would take a month or more.

The applicant site is at Cassia County's Burley Butte. Local officials already had considered and rejected that spot as a site for a publicly

owned, regional landfill because of neighboring property owners' objections.

Now those neighbors may have a second fight on their hands. That fight may start immediately. Unexplained excavation-taking place on Burley Butte this week may be grounds for county officials to seek legal restraint against unauthorized construction.

Dispose-All seems to be employing a two-pronged strategy to win a piece of the valley's landfill business. First, it grabs any available site to bury the trash it hopes will someday come its way. Second, it looks for ways to torpedo the regional district's own plans.

Local officials eventually may benefit from involving private companies in running the new landfills. But Dispose-All's take-no-prisoners tactics, its interest in importing garbage, its disregard for community sentiment and its questionable performance in locales where it already does business make an undesirable candidate.

(We also question the motivations of landowners who are willing to trade their neighbors' quality of life for a check from an out-of-town trash hauler.)

As far as we can see, Dispose-All's corporate presence in the Magic Valley is an outcome to be avoided. State and local authorities, as well as concerned citizens, should use every lawful means to oppose it.



We all lose when we degrade women

Don't read on if you are gender squeamish.

There is a pattern to recent events in the news involving young women that is disturbing. It's an uncomfortable subject, but that should not keep concerned people of both sexes from examining an alarming trend.

Consider these events:

- In Fort Worth, Texas, a 13-year-old girl was held down by six boys ages 12 through 14 while another boy sexually assaulted her on a crowded school bus. It was reported that other students on the bus laughed as the girl struggled during the assault.
- In Los Angeles, eight high school students in a middle-class suburb were accused of raping and molesting girls in a gang competition to accumulate "points" for sexual conquests. One of the victims was 10 years old at the time of the incident, the others 13, 15 and 16. The gang members received the points whether the girls consented or were forced.
- In Glen Ridge, N.J., a dozen teen-age boys gathered in a basement room to watch sexual acts were performed on a 17-year-old mentally retarded girl from their neighborhood, including violating the girl with a baseball bat, a stick and a broom.
- In Dallas, school officials acknowledged that one of the causes of violent "rumble" between African-American and Hispanic boys was the lewd treatment of girls in public, including coarse remarks and forced fondling in hallways.
- In a national study of 100 schools last week, girls aged 9 to 19 reported that they had been subjected to pinching, grabbing, obscene remarks and even rape by male classmates. A ninth-grader at Woodrow-Wilson High School in Dallas said boys constantly demand that girls perform oral sex. One 12-year-old middle-school student said the daily harassment

made the girls feel "like a prostitute."

You don't have to be a prudish Aunt Tilly to worry that something dangerous is happening if the young women of our country are being degraded as sexual objects and victims at increasingly young ages.

One counselor who works with high school girls through Girls Inc. confirmed recently that many of them have problems — with self-esteem because they are pressured to have sex and treated in a derogatory way. They are both taunted as "bitches" and courted as "babes," the counselor observed.

She said many of the girls do give up and become promiscuous in hopes of becoming popular or at least accepted. Then they are derided and feel devalued. "It's an ongoing battle," she said, "to teach them that they must have respect for themselves and demand respect from others."

In recent years, society has been shocked by statistics showing young people — as many as two-thirds of those in high school having sex at an increasingly younger age and with multiple partners. Appropriately, concern has increased about teen-age pregnancy and the spread of AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases.

There certainly also should be concern about the growing numbers of violent acts against young women, during the school day, on school buses, by students who know them and witnessed by others.

So certain forms of the usual cynicism — the depiction of women as sex objects in everything from soap operas to beer truck posters to Sports Illustrated, the demise of the family, the increase in violence overall, a decline in morality and spirituality. Some will no doubt place much of the responsibility on young girls who show poor judgment.

One Texas mother this month expressed a

mixture of shocked amazement and concern about the accepted behavior of her daughter and her friends, who had just returned from a spring break week of unchaperoned partying at South Padre Island. She remarked it apparently was commonplace for young women who were members of a sorority that used to be known for its pedigreed status to compete in wet T-shirt contests while guys leered and jeered about their breasts.

She remarked that one of the current trends was for young women to be held by their legs over a keg to see how much they could chug while upside down. "It all seems cheap to me," she said, "and these are the NICED girls."

No doubt mothers expressed similar concerns about propriety back in the 1920s when their daughters bobbed their hair, wore short "lapper" skirts and drank bootleg liquor. The difference today is that we have girls being raped publicly on school buses and violated with brooms. No human being, male or female, should be subjected to such degrading treatment.

I hesitate to bring this up because it is an uncomfortable subject and there are no easy solutions to offer. But it is perplexing. Why is it that women have made progress in being respected for their intellectual abilities in many fields, and yet seem to be losing ground when it comes to being treated as a disposable sexual object?

Surely we are all the losers when our young men do not know how to treat young women with respect, as valued partners on earth and in life. If sex to young people is not only increasingly impersonal, but dehumanizing, then we are not just talking about youthful indiscretions, but a pattern that does not augur well for men or women.

Citizens group uses U.S. survey to press for medical reform

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Citizens Network is using a new national survey to reinforce demands that the state immediately begin moving toward health care reform that will provide affordable health care for hundreds of thousands of Idahoans it now says are without it.

"We're not content with waiting," network director Roger Sherman said Thursday against the backdrop of new figures showing nearly twice the number of Idahoans as previously thought are without medical insurance.

The Clinton administration may be searching for a national solution, Sherman said, "But we're here in Idaho. We're asking state officials to come with Idaho solutions."

Although there was much talk about the health care problem during this winter's legislative session, the only significant legislative approval was changes in the way insurance companies must deal with small employers, making group health insurance more accessible and affordable to them.

Lawmakers did authorize continuation of the task force that came up with that proposal last year, but many policy makers acknowledge that the cost makes it impossible for the state to seriously consider extending coverage to all the uninsured.

The study, conducted by the Washington-based Joint U.S. Foundation, showed that 300,000 Idaho residents were uninsured this year, nearly 29 percent of the total population. It also found that a third or more of them will incur medical bills in excess of 10 percent of their pre-tax income.

Up until the study, the health care debate in Idaho had been focusing on a survey by the state Hospital Association that found 160,000 Idahoans were without health insurance.

The difference, Sherman said, was probably due to the fact that the Idaho Hospital Association survey was based on a snapshot of the state at a specific point while the new survey would only count states with larger percentages of their populations without health insurance. They were Nevada, Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas, New Mexico, Mississippi, Oklahoma and California.

Sherman blamed Idaho's high ranking on the state's large number of seasonal, low-paying jobs that generally carry no benefits and a state Medicaid program that provides subsidized health care for barely a third of the people who qualify as poor under federal guidelines.

While he conceded the cost of a major change in the state's health care delivery system, Sherman said officials should immediately consider cost containment proposals that would include a crackdown on overbilling by health care providers in the state's biggest cities and alternatives to high cost long term institutional care.

"We can't just peek around with the system," he said. "We have to take a comprehensive approach."

Opinion on split board expected by next week

BOISE (AP) — The attorney general's office expects to have a new legislative agenda ready by next week on whether the Idaho Board of Education can follow a new law requiring separate councils for higher education and public schools.

That was decreed in a law approved by the Legislature in the final days of its 1993 session. But top state legal officials say it might be unconstitutional.

State schools chief Jerry Evanson Thursday asked for a formal opinion. Deputy Attorney General Steven Tobiason said it will be ready before the board meets next Thursday and Friday in Idaho Falls.

But Tobiason said the opinion likely will be based on previous research, and that indicates the bill is unconstitutional. Tobiason said unless the separate councils are advisory only, with decisions ratified by the full Board of Education, the measure probably would not meet constitutional requirements.

"That was the conclusion reached by a previous informal advisory," Gov. Cecil Andrus signed the measure into law and Press Secretary Scott Peyton said the governor had no specific comment whether it was constitutional.

"He believes it's workable, a recognition we need to start to give public education and higher education the attention we need," Peyton said.

Idaho's Board of Education has eight members, including Evanson, who covers all education matters, including a public school agenda presented by Evanson.

Rep. Doug Ahrens, R-Boise, and Rep. Cecil Andrus, R-Edger, contended the board gives scant attention to public school matters and essentially serves as a rubber stamp to recommendations from Evanson.

"The new law sets up separate four-member councils on public schools and higher education. Evans serves on both, giving each five voting members. A late amendment allows the councils to sit as a joint Board of Education on some matters."

Evanson said he wanted a full-scale attorney general's opinion before the education board starts using the process. Without legal guidance, there could be a court challenge later over anything the board does, he said.

Keiser accepts president's position at Missouri school

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (AP) — John Keiser, a candidate for mayor of Boise and former president of Boise State University, was named president of Southwest Missouri State University on Wednesday.

Southwest Missouri State, which has an enrollment of about 20,000 students, had been without a permanent president since Marshall Gordon was fired in February 1992 in a dispute over cost overruns on construction projects.

Keiser, who has been teaching history at Boise State since being fired as president by the Idaho State Board of Education in September 1991, was given a three-year contract at \$114,000 annually, and will begin the job July 1.

"The man is so outstanding and has such great abilities and such integrity and is committed to all the things that are right and good about a university," said Jim Ferguson, president of the Board of Regents. "We would be foolish not to bring the man here."

Keiser was attending a funeral and was not present at a news conference announcing his selection as Southwest Missouri State's eighth president.

He announced in December that he wanted to be Boise's next mayor. Keiser withdrew his nomination from Southwest Missouri State, but reconsidered after he was approached by the university's presidential search committee.

"I'm obviously not running for mayor now," Keiser said Wednesday. "I've always wanted to do a lot of things, but I can only do one thing at a time."

Keiser, 57, was president of Boise State from 1978 until being fired for failing to keep the Board of Education informed about major decisions at the school. Boise State has about 15,000 students.



Ferguson suggested that Keiser's firing was politically motivated by a board jealous of his accomplishments. He called it a blessing for Southwest Missouri State.

"I personally believe in one sense it's really fortunate they fired him at Boise State University because I don't believe he'd be available today," he said.

Nothing he also was replacing a president who was fired, Keiser said he will need to make a good impression quickly in Springfield.

"Any new president has got to prove himself," he said. "Over time, I'm confident I will get the same kind of support that I've gotten from the faculty and students here."

Among the Board of Education's complaints was that Keiser did not advise members in advance of Boise State's abortive attempt to dispart of the Big West Conference to join the Big West, plus a push to create a new institute support for academic programs and buildings.

That money was for a vocational-technical college, the \$10 million Canyon Technology Center and a class room center in nearby Canyon County which Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus subsequently vetoed.

Keiser has said he was fired because he aggressively sought to promote Boise State over Idaho's other state colleges. In his tenure, Boise State's endowment increased from \$250,000 to \$18 million and more than \$60 million was contributed by private sources for new buildings and renovations.

U of I seeks opinion on residency law
MOSCOW — The student president at the University of Idaho is asking for an attorney general's opinion whether the state's new educational residency law is constitutional.

The new law, approved in the 1992 session, makes it tougher for students to qualify for lower resident fees in the higher educational system. It states that a student must have established a legitimate domicile in Idaho "for purposes other than educational" to qualify as a resident student.

The student also must live in the state for a year before classes begin and receive less than 50 percent of support from parents who are not Idaho residents.

Student President Richard Rock has had student attorney general Thane Twigg looking at the law. "It may be that the law is unduly restrictive and may not give nonresident students the opportunity to prove residency after being labeled a nonresident," Twigg said.

About 30 percent of the more than 9,000 students at the University of Idaho are from out of state.

Blue Cross network plan irks retailers
COEUR D'ALENE — The amount Blue Cross of Idaho will pay pharmacists to fill prescriptions under its new network system has drawn the ire of many retailers.

Effective May 1, all 250,000 Blue Cross subscribers — one-fourth of Idaho's population — must have prescriptions filled at a network member pharmacy.

To join the network, retail pharmacists must sign a contract agreeing to the Blue Cross payment rate.

"What they basically do is say, 'This is what we're going to do — you can take it or leave it,'" Brian Jorgensen, owner of Coeur d'Alene's Medicine Man Pharmacy, said Wednesday.

Julie Taylor, director of public and governmental affairs for Blue Cross of Idaho, agreed pharmacists will get less. How much less will Taylor said the Blue Cross network and resulting reduced reimbursement rates are aimed at controlling escalating prescription drug costs.

Zinser speaks on deaf student revolt
MOSCOW — Elisabeth Zinser spent only five days as president of Gallaudet University before a student revolt forced her to resign in favor of a deaf president.

She says she doesn't feel she was victimized and is glad she was part of what proved to be a historical moment in the deaf cause.

Zinser has been president of the University of Idaho for four years. Idaho's Women's Center extended Women's History Month a week into April Wednesday and asked Zinser to tell what happened on the Washington, D.C., campus when students protested the choice of a president who could hear.

Student protesters closed the campus after Zinser was selected March 6, 1988. She said she knew students wanted a deaf president, but one student she met during interviews told her she would have student support if a qualified deaf president could be found.

"I realized there was a real issue out there but I didn't know it would turn into a real revolution," she said.

Lankford case pries tag nears \$215,000
GRANGEVILLE — The cost to Idaho County taxpayers of prosecuting and defending brothers Mark and Bryan Lankford for killing a Marine Corps officer and his wife is nearing a quarter-million dollars.

According to the Idaho County auditor's office, the Lankfords' cases have cost the county \$210,422.94 so far. And the total continues to climb.

Mark and Bryan Lankford were convicted of first-degree murder for the June 1983 slayings of Capt. Robert Bravence and his wife, Cheryl.

Idaho County Commission Chairman George Enneking said this week he would not be surprised if Bryan Lankford's resentencing hearing costs the county an additional \$50,000 to \$70,000. The hearing is expected to last two weeks, and Bryan Lankford's attorney, Joan Fisher of Genesee, is being assisted by death penalty specialist Timothy Ford of Seattle.

Feds sought to lure Weaver into capture
BOISE — The government's plan to arrest Randy Weaver included a deputy marshal buying land next to Weaver's property, befriending Weaver and luring him to a place where he could be captured, according to a federal memorandum filed in the case against Weaver and Kevin Harris.

The scheme called for Deputy Marshal Mark Jurgensen to pose as a white supremacist to get close to Weaver. Jurgensen would cut down a tree near Weaver's property line in attempt to gain his confidence, the memo says.

The trial for Weaver, 45, and Harris, 25, is scheduled to begin Tuesday in U.S. District Court in Boise.

Police arrest escapee 20 years later
LEWISTON — A man who escaped from a hospital for the criminally insane almost 20 years ago and was recaptured last month will not yet be returned to Oregon to face sexual assault charges.

A Nez Perce County magistrate rejected a request on Wednesday to return Harry Anthony Hanman to Benton County, Ore., where he is wanted under the name Thomas Andrew Dorium on charges of kidnapping, rape and sodomy.

Withdrawal jumbles mayoral race

BOISE (AP) — Former Boise State University President John Keiser's departure for a university presidency in Missouri throws an already-confusing Boise mayor's race into further turmoil.

Keiser was the only announced candidate. His withdrawal leaves two prospective candidates for the November election, Mayor Brent Coles and businesswoman Tracy Andrus.

"But some observers say new challengers may surface."

"It may open the door to another candidate," Jim Weatherly, director of Boise State's public affairs program, said Wednesday. "I can't name anybody, but the positions Dr. Keiser articulated — the quality of life theme — might be picked up by another candidate."

Potential candidates who thought "there were three strong candidates, and there wasn't any way to develop a separate base" will reassess, Councilman Mike Wetherell said.

Meanwhile, Coles and Andrus stand to pick up heavy-hitting Keiser supporters like philanthropist Velma Morrison and businessman Jim Nelson.

Keiser said after praising Coles for doing a good job, "I had agreed to support Brent Coles if I didn't get in the race myself."

Coles, the former councilman who replaced Dick Kempthorne in January after Kempthorne won a U.S. Senate seat, has not stepped in for Keiser's backers.

"He and I agreed on many issues in planning for the future," Coles said Wednesday.

Andrus said Keiser's move to Southwest Missouri State University won't change her view of the race. She said she has always cared on the issues facing Boise rather than her potential opponents.

The mayor's race is nominally non-partisan. But William Campbell, the former state Republican chair, says he may join Coles' campaign, said the fact that Coles is a Republican and Andrus is the daughter of Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus will affect the race.

"At this stage of the game, it looks like (partisan) politics are going to play an important role," Campbell said.

Keiser announced his campaign in December. Andrus followed a month later with formation of a high-powered exploratory committee.

Coles said he hasn't devised campaign plans and is focusing on the mayor's job.

Kootenai sheriff wants dispatch chief gone

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Sheriff Pierce Clegg said he supports a consolidated 911 emergency system in Kootenai County, but he wants the person in charge of the dispatch network replaced.

As dispatchers from the city of Coeur d'Alene and Sheriff's department prepare to move into the new 911 center, officials are scrambling to organize a properly planned transition, Clegg said Wednesday.

8 Indian execs to stand trial for gas leak

BHOPAL, India — A court ruled Thursday that eight Indian executives should be tried for manslaughter in the 1984 Bhopal gas leak, which killed more than 4,000 people in the world's worst industrial disaster.

The officials are accused with responsibility for the leak at a pesticide plant run by the Indian subsidiary of Union Carbide Corp. of Danbury, Conn. The charge carries a maximum penalty of life in prison.

Vijay Gupta, a lawyer representing the company, said the executives would appeal to a higher court seeking to overturn the order for a trial. It took India eight years to file charges because the government first negotiated an out-of-court settlement with Union Carbide, but the Supreme Court then threw out a provision barring criminal charges.

Record unemployment plagues Iraq

AMMAN, Jordan — Iraq's labor minister said Thursday that U.N. trade sanctions and the effects of the Persian Gulf War have closed most factories in Iraq and caused record unemployment.

Omed Medhat Mubarak said tens of thousands of factories have shut down since the war because of a shortage of raw materials and spare parts.

Speaking with reporters at a week-long conference of the Arab Labor Organization that began Monday, Mubarak said "the highest rate of unemployment in Iraq's history was registered this year."

He refused to disclose exact jobless figures or the total work force in Iraq, which has the second-largest known oil reserves in the world.

Russians free U.S. reporter after 2 days

MOSCOW — The successor to the KGB released an American reporter Thursday after questioning him for two days about a story he wrote on the Kremlin's chemical weapons program.

Will Englund of The (Baltimore) Sun said he was freed from Lefortovo Prison after his interpreter agreed to sign a statement that he understood his rights and responsibilities under the Russian criminal code. Englund said he refused to sign the statement.

Englund, who has been based in Moscow since June 1991, was summoned last week by the Russian Security Ministry to discuss the Sept. 16 story. The article was based partly on information from a Russian scientist, Vil Mirzayayov, who has been charged with disclosing state secrets.

Mirzayayov and another author said in an article in the Moscow News last fall that Russia had tested powerful chemical weapons in apparent violation of a previous agreement to destroy such arms.

Reports: Iran, N. Korea talking missiles

WASHINGTON — An Iranian military delegation is in North Korea to complete the purchase of 150 missiles capable of reaching Israel with conventional and chemical warheads, an Iranian opposition official said Thursday.

Asked about the reported deal, Secretary of State Warren Christopher said: "We would view that with considerable concern."

Mohammed Mohadessin, foreign affairs director of the National Council of Resistance of Iran, an opposition coalition, said sources in Iran reported that the 21-man Iranian delegation is headed by Brig. Gen. Hossein Manteqi, head of Iran's Defense Industry Organization.

He said in an interview the Iranians are pressing the Koreans for delivery of the missiles this year, perhaps as early as July or August.

The two sides are still haggling over terms, he said.

Court orders Yugoslavia to halt genocide

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) — The U.N.'s embattled Muslim government won a moral victory Thursday when the World Court ordered Yugoslavia to stop acts of genocide.

But the 14 judges did not deal with Bosnia's request for an exemption from the U.N. weapons embargo against the former Yugoslav states.

While the emergency measures can sway world opinion, the court has no enforcement powers. Its rulings can be enforced by the U.N. Security Council, although none ever have.

Bosnia's chief counsel, Francis Boyle, said the Muslim-led government would use the ruling to exert pressure on the Security Council to tighten sanctions against Serbia. The court may issue further rulings in the case.

The Bosnian government accuses the Serbs of "ethnic cleansing" pushing out Muslims so Bosnian land

can become part of a Greater Serbia. Serbia denies responsibility for the Bosnian Serb rebels and their tactic of clearing other ethnic groups from captured territory. Serbia's lawyer last week accused Bosnia of missing the court to circumvent the weapons embargo.

It was the first accusation of genocide to come before the U.N. court since it was founded in 1946.

"The Federal Republic (of Yugoslavia) should immediately ... take all measures within its power to prevent the commission of the crime of genocide," said the court.

The court, the U.N.'s principal judicial arm, also ordered the remnant of Yugoslavia — Serbia and Montenegro — to "ensure that military, paramilitary or irregular armed units" under its control cease any genocidal acts.

Even though the court's vaguely worded ruling used the term "genocide," the judges carefully stressed it was not a determination on whether

genocide is being committed in the Bosnian war or who may be committing atrocities.

But the unusual haste of the decision — six days — and its language indicated concern Serb troops might be committing genocidal acts.

"The crime of genocide shocks the conscience of mankind," the ruling said.

"They were pretty clear about apportioning blame to Serbia," said Utrecht University international law professor Terry Gill, an authority on the court.

The judges were unanimous on the ruling, except for a dissent by Russian Judge Nikolai Tarasov on the part regarding control of paramilitary groups.

Russia, a traditional Serbian ally and permanent Security Council member with veto power, appears to be delaying efforts to tighten sanctions against Serbia.

The court noted it was dealing only with the genocide complaint,

and did not address itself to Bosnia's request that it be entitled to outside military help to defend itself.

In response to the ruling, the Serbian chief counsel Shabtai Rosenne said: "This is absolutely not a defeat."

He noted that the court "is not accusing anyone of anything. We will do our utmost to comply."

"We are only asking for the right to protect ourselves, to defend ourselves from genocide," said Boyle, Bosnia's lead attorney. "It's exactly as if the Jews were asking for the right to defend themselves from the Nazis."

The Bosnian government claims 134,000 people have been killed or are missing in the civil war. Some reports place the figure as high as 200,000.

The war broke out when Bosnian Muslims and Croats declared independence from Yugoslavia in April 1992.

U.N. evacuates 2,100 Muslims from besieged Srebrenica

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — More than 2,000 Muslims squeezed onto 10 trucks and headed to safety from besieged Srebrenica on Thursday.

Bosnian Serbs blocked the U.N. commander and a peacekeeping team from the town, however.

Twelve trucks delivered food to Srebrenica then carried away nearly 2,100 people, said Lyndall Sachs, a U.N. spokesman in Belgrade, capital of Serb-dominated Yugoslavia. The convoy headed for Tuzla.

Officials in Srebrenica had blocked another evacuation attempt this week, saying they feared the operation could weaken the town's defense.

At least nine people died last week in a mad scramble to flee the town on U.N. vehicles. There were no reports of casualties in the latest evacuation.

Elsewhere on Thursday:

U.N. officials were embarrassed when Serbs found 48 boxes of

munition under flour in an aid convoy headed for a Muslim suburb of Sarajevo. Spokesman John McMillan said an investigation was under way.

Two Nigerian soldiers were reported killed in Croatia, just north of the Bosnian border, bringing to 31 the number of peacekeepers killed since U.N. troops arrived in Croatia about a year ago.

A U.N. spokesman said the two men were killed on duty early Wednesday, but gave no more details.

Serbs forced the U.N. peacekeeping commander, Gen. Philippe Morillon, to give up plans to enter and protect Srebrenica with 150 Canadian soldiers. U.N. officials said.

Morillon planned to return to his headquarters in Sarajevo on Friday, he said.

Serb leaders have been demanding the evacuation of 18,000 Serbs from Muslim-controlled Tuzla in exchange for cooperation over Srebrenica.

Rabin wants 2 areas sealed indefinitely

JERUSALEM (AP) — Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin said Thursday he would ask his Cabinet to keep the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip sealed indefinitely to defuse Arab-Israeli tensions.

The plan, which is expected to be approved, was announced in a raucous parliament session the same day troops killed a 13-year-old schoolgirl in the Abu Sabheita refugee camp in the Gaza Strip.

Kaedi Omar al-Qura was shot in the back of the head when soldiers fired at schoolchildren stoning them, Arab reports said.

Official: Is bulldozer digging landfill?

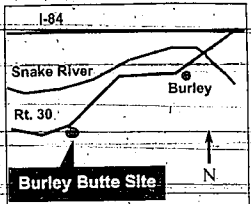

BURLEY - Somebody's moving dirt and building fences on Burley-Butte, but the Cassia County prosecuting attorney was not able to confirm Thursday whether the project is a landfill.

"It does look like something's going on. ... But I haven't been able to confirm it," Prosecutor Steven Bywater said.

Bywater received a call from a butte-area resident early Thursday who was concerned about work on the butte. Bywater drove to the site and found aerial-survey markers and a bulldozer moving dirt.

But the bulldozer operator told him he did not know the nature of the project nor whom he was working for, Bywater said.



A Boise company, Dispose-All Inc., has told the Idaho Division of Environmental Quality that it wants the agency to certify a landfill site on Burley Butte, an agency

official said this week. DEQ officials had not received the application as of Wednesday, but they had scheduled a site tour of the butte for next Tuesday.

Dispose-All President Doug Lumow told the Twin Falls County Commission this week that he planned to start work on a landfill within two weeks. But he did not reveal the site.

Lumow did not return a phone call Thursday.

Workers from a Filer company were building a fence at the butte on Thursday.

A man answering the phone at Bill's Fencing said company crews were at Burley Butte building a fence for a man named "Doug."

The man who answered the phone declined to give his name.

If work has started on a landfill on Burley Butte, it's being done illegally, Bywater said. Work cannot start until the county issues a permit, he said.

The county will not issue a permit until the DEQ has certified the site and until after a public hearing. Bywater said. County residents must be given 14 days notice.

DEQ officials say they cannot certify a site until after a 28-day public comment period. That comment period starts when the agency receives the application.

If work has begun on a landfill, the county will take legal action, possibly seek an injunction, to stop work until a permit is issued, Bywater said. The Cassia County commission will determine what course to take.

- The Circuit Breaker program for widows or widowers who meet certain income restrictions. Alan Darnfest of the Idaho State Tax Commission said that only 1,334 Idaho residents of the 3,100 who qualified in 1990 applied for the program.
- Call local county assessor's offices or the State Tax Commission at 334-7733.
- The 50-50 homeowners exemption that allows a homeowner to deduct 50 percent of the market value of his or her primary residence from property tax valuation.
- Homeowners must apply for the exemption at their county assessors' offices.

State explains new testing method

TWIN FALLS - A student taking a traditional multiple choice test might use a pencil to indicate the correct way to fold a parachute.

But in a performance-based "assessment" a student could be asked to pack his own parachute and jump out of a plane.

Although extreme, that illustration is what a performance-based educational system is all about, said Sally Tiet,

coordinator of guidance, assessment and evaluation for the State Department of Education.

Tiet and a few other members of the department's Goals and Testing Commission, including Twin Falls School District Superintendent Terrell Donich, gave one of six state-wide public hearings on performance-based education.

The commission was established in 1991 to prod Idaho's school districts into moving towards performance-based educational systems.

Twin Falls is one of the first districts in

Idaho to turn to a performance-based educational philosophy. In Twin Falls, it is called Outcomes Driven Development Model.

Performance-based education is a method to gauge whether students are prepared to enter a work force where new jobs are being created all the time, she said.

In performance-based education students must demonstrate certain skills - encompassing language arts, math, science

Gooding man withdraws murder plea

GOODING - A Gooding County man charged in the Aug. 31 murder of a farm worker, decided Thursday to withdraw a guilty plea to second-degree murder and stand trial for first-degree murder.

Jeffrey Thomas, 21, appeared before 5th District Judge Daniel Mechl to change his plea. Thomas is charged in the shooting death of Sacramento Aguilar, 46, in

southeastern Gooding County.

Thomas' attorney, Jeff Stoker, said Thomas' motivation to plead guilty to the lesser charge was "to be sure he wouldn't face the worst scenario."

Stoker said Thomas wanted to give his version of the event to a jury and apologized to the court for the plea of guilty to second-degree murder.

Mechl on Tuesday rejected Thomas' first attempt to plead guilty after Thomas said the shooting was unintentional and in self-defense.

Aguilar, a native of Guanajuato, Mexico, had been employed in Jerome and Gooding counties as a farm worker for 22 years.

"He's known for being in the area longer than any other Mexican," said Debbie Lagunas, a friend.

Aguilar was driving to his son's home when the shooting occurred, according to Roberto Aguilar, 26, a son of the victim.

Mechl said the trial could possibly be held in late May.

Counter gang problem before it starts, officer says

TWIN FALLS - You can't always judge a gang member by the clothes he wears.

In fact, separating gang-related activity from juvenile crime in general is difficult, Twin Falls police officer Kevin Davis told a crowd of about 130 people Thursday night.

Rather than focusing on the clothes children are wearing, Davis urged parents to provide a strong religious and moral base for their children to keep them out of trouble.

Youth crime often stems from dysfunctional families and a generation of youngsters that believe they evolved rather than being created by God, Davis said.

"I don't like the term 'gangs,'" Davis said. "A lot of teen-agers emulate the gang styles they see on television and in the movies, but that doesn't mean they are criminals, he said."

"It's in the music. They like the movies, they like the fashion," he said.

But that attention to clothes and other material things that display rebellion and anti-social attitudes reveals the mindset of

Police first noticed the presence of organized gangs in Twin Falls about two years ago, when they were given pictures of some youngsters who had come from California and committed some crimes in the area.

About a year ago, police aggressively pursued the youth gangs that were cropping up.

One particular group, again from California, began recruiting young members and started a campaign of intimidation against other local youngsters.

Local kids began organizing themselves out of protection and need down the California-based group, which disbanded, Davis said.

There still are so-called "gangs" in the area, but most are formed merely for protection from others or to provide a social structure that many kids cannot find elsewhere, he said.

Organized gangs coming into the area for brief crime forays are more of a threat, police have evidence that

Democratic Party seeks new leader

TWIN FALLS - Twin Falls County Democrats will be looking for a new leader soon.

County Chairman Ken Pedersen, who led the local party through a disappointing election campaign last year, announced earlier this week that he plans to leave his position.

In a letter to area Democrats dated April 5, the Twin Falls

attorney cited "personal and business reasons" for his decision.

Pedersen, 45, told *The Times-News* Thursday that he hasn't been able to devote as much time as has been needed to building county

Democrats' strength, and that someone else should get the chance.

"Somebody needs to stimulate the interest of more free-thinking people," he said. "I'm not sure I was the one to do that."

The next chairman also will have to do a better job of finding Democrats to run for local offices, he said, and break the perception of the party as largely irrelevant in county politics.

"We need candidates that can overcome the hold that Republicans have on this county at the legislative level," Pedersen said. "There are people out there who want to help, but there's this self-perpetuating myth that becomes reality that we have no power. That's the dilemma we're in."

County Democrats will meet April 21 at 7 p.m. at the Royal Lounge, 677 Filer Ave., to select a search committee to look for a new chairman. That process may take awhile, Pedersen said.

"It may take several months to decide what we're going to do," he said.

Pedersen, a partner in the firm of Webb, Pedersen and Webb, became county Democratic chairman in June 1991. He had previously served as chairman for about two years, until May 1990.

Last year, local Democrats were optimistically talking about a revival of their party's fortunes, fueled by Bill Clinton's presidential campaign and Richard Stallings' race to succeed then-Sen. Steve Symms.

But Clinton barely edged out independent candidate Ross Perot for second place in Twin Falls County, and Stallings narrowly lost the county to GOP candidate Dirk Kempthorne. The only Twin Falls Democrat to seek a legislative seat, former state Rep. Gary Robbins, took just 36 percent of the vote against GOP opponent Ron Black.

Activists question INEL budget

TWIN FALLS The Clinton administration's proposed budget could cut more than 800 jobs at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

But the site is not going to be the next Cold War reactor research facility people had hoped it would be, said Kerry Cooke, head of the Snake River Alliance, a statewide citizen activist group.

With two reactor research projects essentially gone from the federal Energy Department's 1993 budget, INEL would be left with a growing role as a waste facility, she said.

"There doesn't seem to be any

other infancy," she said.

The Clinton administration's proposed budget for the federal Energy Department would cut INEL's 1993 budget to \$850.3 million, down by \$6.4 million from 1992.

The proposed budget includes no money for a proposed New Production Reactor. And that's not news to the alliance, which advocates nuclear disarmament. The New Production Reactor would have produced tritium, a radioactive form of hydrogen used in nuclear bombs.

INEL was competing as the Energy Department's Savannah River Site at South Carolina for the proposed project.

The INEL budget doesn't include

the Naval Reactors Facility at the Argonne National Laboratory West, both are installations at INEL.

But the administration has proposed cutting the budget for the Argonne facility at INEL to \$77.3 million, this year's budget is about \$125 million.

The cut could result in the loss of 500 to 900 jobs in Idaho and Argonne's Clinton facility. But most of those jobs are at INEL, spokesman Brad Bugger said.

Advanced reactor research on the Integral Fast Reactor, or IFR, is the main program at Argonne. People at the facility either work on the reactor itself or in support facilities. If the IFR shuts down, Argonne would shut down, Bugger said.

Argonne employs 832 people at INEL.

But it wouldn't happen overnight. It would take years and lots of money to dismantle and decommission the facility.

The new administration is determined to halt advanced reactor research, Bugger said. It wants to shift away from nuclear power to a reliance on conservation and renewable energy sources.

The 1993 budget includes \$21.9 million to continue nuclear fuel cycle research at ANL-W, and another \$55.4 million to shut down three reactors at the facility.

The IFR has been touted by some as the answer to "safe" nuclear power in the future. But others have expressed concerns about the liquid metal used as a coolant in the reactor, Bugger said.

The coolant, liquid sodium, is used to transfer heat to water, which turns to steam and turns a generating turbine. But the hot sodium reacts violently when it comes in contact with the water.

Argonne scientists are confident they can control it, Bugger said.

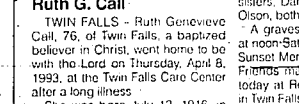

Jerome installs new water meters

JEROME Residents may be paying higher water and sewer bills with the installation of new meters in town.

The new meters are being installed at all residences and businesses in town, a project scheduled to be completed in July.

Bob Turner, water department supervisor, told the council at its meeting Tuesday.

About 2,600 meters, costing \$279,000, are being installed by city crews.

Residents may end up paying higher bills, since many of the old meters did not correctly record the amount of water used.

City property owners will pay about \$150,000 additional in water bills this year when the new meters are installed, officials estimated.

Bill Taylor, supervisor of the Waste Water Treatment plant,

reported the bio-tower at the plant has been completed.

The expansion of the plant should be finished by May, he said. Plant improvements were required to handle additional waste generated by businesses in the Industrial Park.

The aerial fire truck, to be purchased from the Twin Falls Fire Department, should be delivered to Jerome by the end of this week, Jim Auldred, fire chief, said.

The truck will improve the Jerome fire rating and will result in some insurance companies reducing insurance costs.

Council members also dispatched the following business:

- Took under advisement a request from Councilman Rocky Jackson that \$33,000 was needed to replace the water pipeline at Lincoln and Main streets.
- Approved a liquor catering permit to Nicholas J. Trappert to cater a dance at the fairgrounds. The council also approved a liquor

catering permit for Nick Henderson to cater an Optimist Club function at the fairgrounds on April 16.

Heard a report from Police Chief James Dahl that the city clean up project was going well.

Property owners were being notified by the police department if trash needed to be cleaned from areas throughout the city, he said.

Cooperation is not obtained, a citation will be issued, he said. The city had received 10 or 15 requests from residents for use of city trucks to haul rubbish to the landfill, he said.

Realtors plan to paint senior citizens' homes

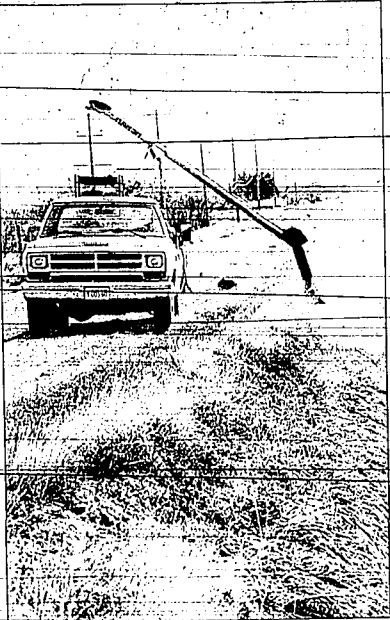

Rape trial scheduled early June

BURLEY — A June 7 jury trial has been set for a Washington man in connection with charges of kidnapping, robbing and raping a Declo woman in early February. Pipeliners left big dollars in area

BURLEY — Magic Valley motels have reported a 51 percent increase in business over last year, and at least one official attributes the economic surge to Northwest pipeline and construction workers in the area. In addition, Mini-Cassia businessmen say the hundreds of workers in the area that constructed a new natural gas pipeline gave the area economy a boost. Pipeline workers were in the area for two months, filling motels and eating establishments before finishing the Northwest Pipeline project that extended the expansion through the Magic Valley. The expansion increased the company's pipeline capacity by 433 cubic feet per day. It cost \$432 million for the project, which will help the growing natural gas needs in the Northwest, officials say. Bill Schaefer, executive director of the Mini-Cassia Chamber of Commerce, said the pipeline workers came at a time — during

winter — when many establishments are at a lull. He said many workers came into the chamber office to ask questions about the area and surrounding schools. "Many of them brought their families with them," Schaefer said. The Burley luncheon sack lunches for the workers who stayed there. "They would request them that evening and pick them up in the morning," front desk Manager Sheri Anderson said. Hog Heaven in Burley even named a hamburger after the pipeliners. "We were getting ready to put a burger on the menu," explained owner Sue McGinnis. She said it was decided to name the burger — containing a half-pound of meat with all the trimmings — in honor of the workers. Hence, the Pipeline Burger was born.

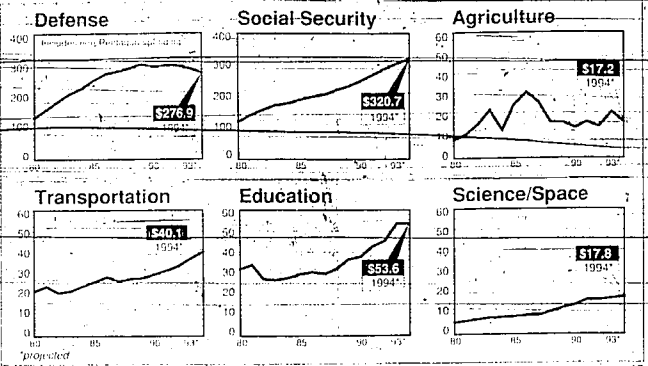

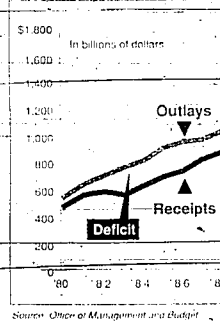

Some GOP lawmakers fear military cutbacks

Some Republican members of Congress say that if President Clinton's five-year defense budget becomes reality, the Navy could have only eight aircraft carriers by 1994 and the Army and Air Force could be almost half their size today.

Pianoman hits the road following new album

NEW YORK — Behind the glass window of the recording studio in downtown Glen Cove, it sounds like Sunday morning at the local Baptist church.

What the quartet here is singing, however, is the title track for Billy Joel's new album, "River of Dreams."

The record is expected by early summer, after which Joel will launch another world tour that once again, he warns, may be his last. "I know, I say that every time," he says. "But usually, I say it at the end of the tour, not the start. Someday I will stop touring. I don't enjoy spending that much time away from my wife and daughter."

In a way, that's what "River of Dreams" is about. In contrast to Joel's last album, "Storm Front," with the manic "We Didn't Start the Fire," this is more reflective. "I'm looking more inward," says Joel, adding with a laugh that he finally realized it's not abnormal for a man in his 40s to do that.

"When I came out the last tour, I was feeling depressed," he says. "The tour was successful, but I had a lot of unresolved questions about life."

Such a feeling, of course, can have a silver lining for writers, because there's a bottomless market for songs of sadness, witfulness and general melancholy.

But Joel hesitated. "I figured people would think, 'This guy's got a major recording career and he's married to Christie Brinkley and he has the blues.' Right? But then I thought, why not? I can have the blues, too."

The result is several songs that take him into different territory, including a bedtime song for his daughter, Alexis, called "Lullabye in G."

"She was asking me about what happens when you die," Joel muses. "That's a tough one. So I finally explained that when your body is gone, you can still be here in music you make. I will sing this song to her, and she'll sing it to her daughter someday, and that will be me, living in the song. She understood that."

This afternoon, however, he's putting the final touches on "River of Dreams." As the quartet behind the glass window goes to church with its rolling melody, Joel talks with producer Danny Keough about a sound he hears.

"I last night we did some duo-weep kind of harmonies with me on top," he says. "But I like the power of this

group. ... I'm wondering if there's a silver way we could blend those sounds together ..."

He nods his head to the beat of the track, which like the rest of this record, was first done last summer in the Shelter Island Sessions. When he finished, though, he thought they needed something else. So he brought in Kortchmar. They took on more of a rock-band sound and now they're almost ready to go out on their own.

Joel, meanwhile, still has a foot tangled in a long-running, multi-million-dollar lawsuit against a former manager he says emptied his bank account. He'd love to just pay people and leave it in their hands, but then, that's sort of what got him in trouble in the first place.

"I do think everyone who comes into the music business should be required to take an accounting course," he says, with a painful smile. "But I don't know. I've been very successful. Maybe in some larger picture losing money is a way things get evened up a little."

'Chessmaster.' Check this out

How the game works: If you have ever played chess on a board, you know the rules. Chess is a two-player game — player one is White, player two is Black — and your goal is to checkmate your opponent's King. "Chessmaster" is free. Beginners can learn from the "teach" and "hint" modes, then progress through 16 levels of play from newcomer to grand master. You can play against the computer or a human opponent.

Good points, bad points: Contains stunning perspectives and colorful fantasy sets. You can reticulate against 150,000 classic openings, a special "game room" displays a movie list captured pieces and a thinking window. And you can "turn" the board 90 degrees to view it from every angle.

dobra mandolin, percussion). Martin, the designated funk of the group, is its only unmarried member.

When asked if any of the musicians are related by blood, Lee Carroll (keyboard, piano) deadpans, "In Kentucky, you never know."

All of the Exile guys grew up in Kentucky, where the band was formed in 1963, with none of its current members. Originally known as The Exiles, the name is almost synonymous with Kentucky music tradition.

"I tried to get Exile for my high school prom and couldn't," said Mark Jones (guitar, vocals).

Added Carroll, "Fifty clubs in Kentucky claim to be the club where Exile got its start."

Exile, as it exists today, has roots in the late '70s. LeMaire and Steve

Goetzman (drums, percussion) joined up in 1977. By 1978, Exile recorded its 5 million-selling No. 1 hit "Kiss You All Over." Back then, the band toured with big name rock groups like Act of Violence.

Then, in the early '80s, group members decided to "return to Kentucky and make the move from pop to country." The result: a dozen No. 1 hits, including "I Could Get Used to You," "Crazy for Your Love," "Hang on to Your Heart," "Nobody's Talking," "The High Cost of Living," "Wake Up in Love" and "She's a Miracle."

The current group was intact by 1989 and was calling Nashville its home base.

"Actually, we mix country and rock, and we were doing that before it was fashionable," LeMaire said. Lounging around Twin Falls on

Wednesday, Exile looked more rock than country. Dressed in jeans and long hair, and high-impact energy. But Carroll wears a button photo of his 14-month-old baby on his jeans jacket. And two of the others offer to trade an autograph for a package of almond M&M's. These guys are not Mick Jagger.

Caught in the world of country music during a time of transit, Exile has found the industry to be bigger and more diverse than the old story goes.

Country music is big business, not a good-old-boy-in-town type of thing, according to LeMaire. Some country performers are difficult and troubled. Others, like mega-star Vince Gill, is true to the image he conveys and is well loved by everyone.

At Cactus Pete's, Exile will perform lots of its country hits, songs people will recognize from years spent flipping the radio dial. The group will also "sit down and have some fun with music from the past."

And Exile knows how to have fun. Just ask LeMaire, who has written the bulk of Exile's song catalog.

"Where do you get the ideas for your songs, Sonny?"

Muffled chuckles. "He steals them from us," Martin screams.

The chuckles erupt.

sashaying from the foxtrot to the quickstep to the tango to the waltz. Ballroom is back, you see, and you can't stop the music.

"Life goes on in cycles of 30 to 50 years, and it's about time for it to come back," Lamont Williamson, business manager for the dance studio that he and his wife, Pam, operate. "Rock is a fad. Disco is a fad. It's ballroom's time again."

In an era ruled by raw, ballroom is a mix of gentility. Fueled by a movie from Australia, "Basically Ballroom" — that both reveres and mocks ballroom's arcane conventions, the formalized, 10-step dance ritual has tapped a rich vein of nostalgia. Spreading out of a few centers of dance in the United States — Provo, Utah is one of them — it's found a new audience.

"Everywhere else but the United States, ballroom is very popular — and it has been for years," said Pam Williamson, who was born, grew-up and learned how to dance in Australia. "It's unbelievable."

Ballroom is currently the only system of the New Civility. Cotillions are big in some parts of the country, figure skating draws sometimes higher television ratings than baseball or basketball, and manners columns are flourishing in newspapers and on talk radio.

But dance is an art — and as such — has its own appeal. Pam Williamson says, "Most places in the world it's considered a sport," she says. "It requires work, conditioning, intelligence and stamina, and when it's done right, it's a thing of beauty."

But aesthetics aside, it's the popularity of ballroom's first cousin country-Western swing that's probably most responsible for ballroom's comeback.

"I get same requests for ballroom dancing classes, but I get a lot of requests for country swing," says Kim Nielsen, owner of Nielsen School of Dance in Twin Falls. "They're quite similar."

Table TV's The Nashville Network has put country swing and

square dancing in about 60 percent of the homes in America, pretty much around the clock.

"We have a lot of people in the 25-35 age group who like country music and want to learn how to dance," Pam Williamson says. "Sometimes it's a wife who'll bring her husband in, but a lot of times people come in by themselves."

The Williamsons began teaching dance in Burley a year ago; she had danced professionally for a decade and competing as a Brigham Young University student. In February they brought the BYU Ballroom Dance Center to Burley for an exhibition and in March their local team finished fourth in the U.S. Amateur Formation Championships in Provo.

Most of their students couldn't remember Lawrence Welk on a bet. "We basically took a bunch of kids within a few months they were good enough to place in a national competition," Lamont Williamson said. "With the right instruction, they can learn to do it very quickly."

Classical ballroom dancing is as formalized as figure skating. There

are relatively strict rules for dress and only certain kinds of music considered appropriate.

"To do it well, you need to do the things you would do to play any sport well," Pam Williamson said. "And that includes conditioning and a great deal of practice. But the dances themselves are not that hard to learn. Anyone who applies himself can do it within a few weeks."

Part of the reason ballroom has been in eclipse for so many years, the Williamsons believe, was the rise of the franchise dance studios in the 1950s — dance mills that promised too much and charged accordingly.

"Nobody can tell you they'll teach you to dance in so many lessons," Lamont Williamson said.

"What typically happened was that after you completed a few lessons as part of some kind of introductory offer, they'd charge you a lot more money to continue," Pam Williamson said. "We don't do that."

The Williamsons say their goal is to expand the popularity of ballroom, and to make it possible for Idahoans to compete statewide. "There's a whole generation waiting for this."

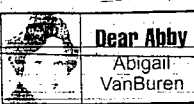

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Rediscovering the Old West



Country singer Michael Martin Murphy worries that Nashville record company executives are losing their interest in country music as they concentrate more on the drug and death images of popular music.

Michael Martin Murphy is immersed in outlaws and gunfighters these days. He's reading all he can get his hands on about the James Gang, Billy the Kid, the Youngers, Belle Starr and other colorful characters of the Old West.

It's not a new enterprise, Murphy has been interested in the West and all things Western most of his life. But he's working on a new double album for Warner Bros., titled "Rhymes of the Renegades," that will retell the stories of the bad guys of the late 19th century.

"I have this fantasy that I want to do," he said in a phone call from Nashville, Tenn. "It would take me to Tombstone and to Deadwood, S.D., and Dodge City and Abilene—all the places that I sing about that were important in the Old West."

It's important to Murphy to portray the Old West as realistically as possible. And he loves the more obscure stories about famous people.

"Few people know that Jesse James was concerned about black education,"

he said. "He rode up to a black college in 1879, or maybe it was 1878—with the proceeds from a recent bank robbery and put the money on the doorstep of the college. The president of the college was concerned about keeping his good image in the community, so he took the money and turned it in to the governor of Missouri."

Murphy said that story illustrates that though many of the legendary outlaws had fought on the Confederate side during the War Between the States, there were many subgroups within the cause of the South.

Glorifying gunslings is not the aim of the singer-historian. "I think it's important today, as we look at a society that has a lot of trouble passing laws against people who have Uzis on the street. The West wasn't really very wild. El Paso, during the height of what we call the Wild West era, recorded only five

shooting deaths in its biggest year."

At 38, the singer of the early-'70s hits "Wildfire" and "Carolina in the Pines" sees himself as part of a generation that remembers America's past while shaping its future.

He is grateful to have had a grandfather who witnessed trail drives in Texas, and he thrills at the thought that there are people still around who knew some of the colorful days of the West. He respects Western values such as honesty and trust and recalls that his grandfather never signed a contract but made many verbal ones.

"I think the most fun you can have is to be who you are at the time you were given," he said. "If you can read, there's no reason to be bored."

With his concerts and his annual WestFests—festivals that celebrate life in the last century with music, art,

mountain man encampments, Indian dancing and cowboy poetry-reading—Murphy has touched thousands, many of them new to things Western.

"Fifty to 70 percent of my audiences are under 25," he said, "and my concert-attrait kids that are even younger than teenage."

That's a hopeful sign to Murphy, who believes that young people are interested in history. "Don't you remember what it was like when you were a teen-ager?" he asked. "How you longed to break free?"

The West, represents freedom, and the cowboy represents individualism.

"Country music," he said, "is gathering new interest among young people because they are wearying of the drug and death images of popular music."

He fears that Nashville record company executives aren't seeing the distinction, as country music continues to adopt some rock sounds and concert overtones.

"Young people demand reality in their country music, said Murphy.

"You can't just be a Nashville singer with a cowboy hat."

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In the steps of Kerouac, Kesey: Students hit the road for credit

NEW YORK (AP) — Douglas Brinkley has this vision of the ultimate college course: 20 Harley-Davidson motorcycles throttling through the great American high in search of Truth, Freedom and Rock 'n' Roll.

That probably isn't what the trustees of Hofstra University had in mind when they hired Brinkley to teach American diplomatic history. But it's not far from what they got.

Brinkley, an associate professor at Hofstra, is the instructor, four-guide and spiritual leader of "An American Odyssey: Art and Culture Across America," a six-week course in history, literature and culture that rumbled out of New York last week on two custom-fitted buses and swept onto the road in a gust of hype and glory.

The destination: Alaska. The goal: Truth, Freedom and Rock 'n' Roll.

The group was scheduled to arrive in Utah April 5 to visit Salt Lake City and Zion National Park.

This is the second such trek for Brinkley, whose first bus class roamed the continental United States for six weeks last spring for a six-credit course that paid homage to Jack Kerouac, Ken Kesey, Tom Pully and other knights of the modern road.

The story of that journey is recounted in Brinkley's book, "The Major Basis: An American Odyssey," just published by Harcourt-Brace.

It is a romantic and phantasmic account by a young professor — in a movie, he'd be played by Michael J. Fox — who decided it was time to do something dramatic to light the fires of intellectual curiosity in a generation dulled by boredom and a secondary educational system.

Instead of sitting in a Long Island classroom reading about Abraham Lincoln's Illinois, Jimmy Carter's Georgia, Harry Truman's Missouri or Thomas Jefferson's Virginia, we would visit those states ourselves

on a historical exploration of America," Brinkley wrote.

"It would be a grueling, high-risk venture, but as Ken Kesey has written, 'It is better to fail with faith than to succeed with security.'"

And so they went. Brinkley and 17 students and a speed-rapping bus driver for a version of Kesey's adventures with the Merry Pranksters in the 1960s.

Along the way, they camped in national parks, gambled in Las Vegas, meditated at a Buddhist institute in Colorado, heard jazz in New Orleans and blues in Chicago, the Grateful Dead in San Francisco and Bob Dylan in Seattle, watched cattle roundups in Oregon and talked to William Burroughs at his home in Kansas.

"He just opened up all these doors," one of the students, Christine Morga, said of

Brinkley. She is among five students on the first trip who came back for the second.

Brinkley, 32, taught briefly at Princeton University and the U.S. Naval Academy, before landing the job at Hofstra, in Hempstead, N.Y. He has published two prominent cold warriors, Dean Acheson and James Forrestal. The Forrestal book, written with Townsend Hoopes, won this year's Theodore and Franklin D. Roosevelt Naval History Prize.

As he approached his 30th birthday, Brinkley said, he worried that he was being pigeonholed as a diplomatic historian, and wondered what he could do to make history and literature more relevant to students.

"Among other things, he had grown tired of asking students what books they read for pleasure and hearing the response: 'None.'

"That kind of hurts me," he said in an interview just before leaving New York last Friday. "There's so much great literature out there that they should be gobbling up, not because it's class assigned, but because it's fun."

One of his biggest thrills during the first trip, he said, was seeing a student who'd never read an unassigned book eagerly buying a copy of a Jack London novel at London's ranch in California.

"That really told me. 'Wow, if I made it through to him...'" The 6-foot-tall, now-and-then tells me what he's reading.

Brinkley's course has its critics among traditionalists, and he appears sensitive to the idea that his second trip — which coincides with a publicity tour for his book — may expose the students to more hype than history.

"I'm being harder on the students this year," he said. The class includes a lengthy reading list, tests and a mandatory journal.

'Margaret Mead of Hollywood' chronicles star-struck lives

NEW YORK — Literary lioness Jackie Collins is lying in the tall grass (read: antique divan) of her \$2,500-a-night hotel suite, leopard-print scarf swirling under her mane of black hair, moistening her gleaming violet-gloss lips as if savoring a delectable morsel. A bit of fresh impala, perhaps, in the claws of the queen of la-la land gossip beasts. Then she says, "Oh, yes, there's plenty of news in Hollywood."

"There's a major movie star, very happily married, who every time he goes out brings a girl back to a hotel with him," Jackie intones in her throaty-sexy way. (And yet there's an earthy, honest quality to her, too, that gives the hair-dryer-helmed Hollywood wisewoman the confidence to spill their milk.)

"There are two macho actors who are having a thing... There's one particularly well-known producer who dresses up in a blue-squined dress and throws oranges at the maid. I mean, who am I to judge him?"

... There's the major industry spring who...

It's just another early-spring afternoon in the St. Regis hotel, the beaux-arts palace frequented by Mary-Pickford and Douglas Fairbanks in the '20s, Marlene Dietrich in the '40s and Madonna in the '90s. No other palace will do for Jackie Collins when she leaves her habit and comes East, as she did recently to promote "American Star," her new book about lust, greed, betrayal and other staples of Hollywood life.

This afternoon in the anteroom of the Orient Suite, Collins is surrounded by glittering Asian "objets d'art," a black-gold marble fireplace, "an antique Chinese floor-size posters of Jackie Collins—white shimmer and woman more glamorous than the woman on the divan, stars from every walk, every color; 50 or more copies of "American Star" spill from antique tables, climb high-risers toward the ceiling. Reporters come and go like passenger pigeons, ushered and fro by a woman-servant who also attends the door, the supplicant photographers, the fresh tea. Jackie Collins has lounged all day like a caged cat, eating nothing, waiting for her one big meal, at nighttime.

"Oh, I remember the last time I stayed here and Lionel Richie stayed in the next room, and I slipped a note under his door. It was wonderful being next to you last night..."

More names, Jackie! Names! "Ah... no, she purses: I never reveal names. I don't want to do a Truman Capote. Then I'd never get invited back to the party."

More than 170 million people have read Jackie Collins' tell-all, reveal-no-names novels, which of course include "The noted" "Hollywood Wives," "Hollywood

Husbands," "Lady Boss," "The Bitch" and "The Stud." A Jackie Collins novel has been read by the equivalent of (A) More than half the population of North America, (B) more than a third of the population of Europe, or (C) approximately 3 percent of all the people on Earth. (This small quiz, like "American Star," is designed for pure pleasure: A, B, C are all true.)

Collins, 52, an untrained writer with an eighth-grade education, is one of the best-selling authors of our time.

She is unfazed by criticism that her books are commercial trash. Jackie Joyce may have created Leopold Bloom, an archetype for the modern age, in his novel "Ulysses," but in her novel, "The Stud," Jackie Collins created perhaps a more famous character: "Eunnie, the archetype for Alexis Carrington Colby, whom Jackie's sister, Joan Collins, brought to life on the TV series "Dynasty."

As you read this, a humongous press run of 775,000 copies of "American Star" is standing on bookstore shelves. "American Star" the NBC mini-series produced, directed and written by Jackie Collins, is in the works; The secret, of course, is simple: sex,

the '50s, another sister Jackie was kicked out of school at 15 for truancy, smoking and waving at the neighborhood flasher — and followed her sister to Hollywood.

There, Jackie watched her sister have affairs with stars such as Warren Beatty and got access to the world that would later become the stuff of novels.

In her early 20s, after her first husband died of a drug overdose, Collins married London nightclub owner Oscar Lerman. Lerman's contacts in Beverly Hills with Sidney Poitier and others gave his wife access to the gossip that inspired the 1984 best-seller, "Hollywood Wives."

Her eyes flickering with anger, Collins says she learned a hard lesson when "Hollywood Wives" was made into a TV movie — a movie that she hated. "I was supposed to be the 'creative consultant,'" she says. "But I was never consulted. It was painful to watch them take this best-selling book and do what they wanted with it."

In 1990, Collins agreed to turn her best sellers "Changes" and "Lucky" into a mini-series for NBC on one condition: that she would write the screenplay and executive produce as well. With that decision, she not only reinvested her career, she said, but was able to live out some of the fantasies of the larger-than-life woman who permeate her fiction.

Thus, in the 1992 mini-series, "Lady Boss" (based on the best-seller of the same name), Collins exulted in her favorite character, Hollywood mogul Lucky Santangelo. Born in "Changes," married three in "Lucky," — the Mafia daughter/Greek shipping heiress — buys a major motion-picture studio to make socially aware films. When Lucky takes over the studio, "You guys are out," they stare at her and mutter and say, "What are you talking about? We make all the money around here?" And Lucky replies, "You know something? I'm fed up with seeing women used and mutilated on screen. And I'm going to change things around here."

That is the kind of talk, cliched dialogue — in her books or on screen — that earns critical scorn, but Collins insists, "I give the message that women can do anything. My books are successful because I'm turning the double standard on its head — men can get away with anything, women aren't supposed to get away with anything."

Even her critics grudgingly credit her with being the "Margaret Mead of Hollywood" — capturing fading film idols getting face-lifts, Beverly Hills shopping sprees, and seedy Sunset Boulevard motel rooms.

Rock 'n' roll losing music industry pull

Rock 'n' roll may not be dead, but a consumer survey released Thursday shows it's losing ground to country, rap and soul.

The Recording Industry Association of America said rock 'n' roll accounted for one-third of all music bought in the United States last year, down from nearly half four years ago.

The burgeoning popularity of country music and urban contemporary, which combines rap and soul, boosted the industry to a record \$9 billion in sales during 1992, according to the annual consumer profile by the industry group.

Country music, led by Garth Brooks, accounted for 17 percent of music sales last year, the survey said. "You might say he's an industry by himself," said Jay Berman, the association's president.

Country music doubled its share of the market in two years, the association said. Rap and soul's growth wasn't quite as meteoric but also accounted for 17 percent of sales in 1992, up from 12 percent four years earlier.

Rap and soul had 15 percent growth over the previous year, the industry's healthiest one-year

improvement in more than a decade.

For that, music executives can thank stars like Whitney Houston, whose "Bodyguard" soundtrack was a sales sensation in the last few months of 1992, Berman said.

"It's no secret. You get a hit record and you sell a lot of it," said Bob Merlis, spokesman for Warner Bros. Records, which had big sellers with R.E.M. and Enya.

Profit margins were also boosted by the growing popularity of compact discs, which are more expensive than cassette and vinyl albums, which has virtually disappeared in consumer surveys. Introduced only a decade ago, compact discs made up 57 percent of all music bought last year.

Cassettes, which four years ago outstripped CDs and vinyl in sales, make up 40 percent of the market.

Although rock 'n' roll doesn't dominate the industry the way it once did, industry statistics show that it still makes roughly the same money. It accounted for about \$3 billion in business last year and \$3 billion in 1988.

'The Sandlot': No runs, no hits, no errors

"The Sandlot" is the perfect family movie because:

1. It's bright enough and funny enough that dutiful parents won't consider sitting through it a duty.
2. The setting is the '50s, which really was a simpler time for kids, and the film is thus able to take a refreshing break — for young and old alike — from '90s cynicism.
3. The sweet '50s nostalgia plays right into the memories of moms and dads (mostly dads in this case) and might seem exotic, or at least "not too intrusive," to their children.
4. The movie is basic, uncomplicated fun. Perfect for families if not quite so for film purists.

"The Sandlot's" mostly winning screenplay does suffer from a slight point-of-view problem. The movie is narrated, "The Wonder Years" style, by one boy, but, much of the time, he's just one of the gang. Sometimes it's hard to decide whether the more significant character is the one telling the story or the friend he worships. As flaws go, it's teeny.

For moral purists, it must be noted that "The Sandlot" has a bit of cussing — a half-dozen or so potential offenses — but nothing raunchy and, certainly, nothing that kids don't hear and say on a regular basis, whether then or now.

Anyway, don't let the baseball angle scare you away. "The Sandlot" is more about the goofiness, vulnerability and heroism of kidhood than the sport that, for many, is just a notch above golf in spectator appeal.

Our narrator, Scotty (Tom Guiry),

is the new kid in town — insecure because he's also still trying to get used to his new stepfather and has trouble making friends.

A self-described "egghead," he can't throw or catch, thinks Babe Ruth is a girl and has no idea why she's so famous and is generally terrified of being labeled a "goofy" by the neighborhood sandlot team.

The kid who comes to his rescue, Benjamin Franklin Rodriguez (Mike Vitar), is the leader, athletically gifted and kind enough to give a nerd a chance whilst his compatriots sneer.

The relationship between the two boys is a little reminiscent of the one between the big-brotherly River Phoenix and the needer Will Wheaton in "Stand By Me." But

Movie review

"The Sandlot" isn't nearly as dark or heavy as that film.

Mostly, it's about the bonding on the idyllic summer sandlot and the boys' efforts to retrieve a valuable Babe-signed ball from the clutches of a legendarily mean and homungous junkyard dog. Hitting one into the stands means losing the ball forever, because no one dries enter the lean-to of the monster, who makes Cuo seem like a Disney character.

The best thing about "The Sandlot" is its kids, a motley assortment of funny faces and idiosyncratic personalities — standard Hollywood stereotypes, but endearingly familiar enough to draw chuckles from all ages. The more adolescent humor ranges from slapstick (the hilarious attempts to retrieve the ball) and gross-out (punctuating on a carnival ride) to pubescent desperation (a fetching female lifeguard serves as the main object of desire).

The young actors do a fine ensemble job, while the only "names" in the picture are Karen Allen, who has little to do as Scott's always-well-mean, and James Earl Jones, as the reputed "meanest man in town" and owner of Hercules, the canine beast who mangles metal, crashes through walls and hoards every baseball batted his way.

Derivative, unapologetically sentimental and, at the end, shamelessly corny, "The Sandlot" isn't high art, but it is highly entertaining. To ask for more in these uninspired movie times would simply be greedy.

Cop and a Half (PG-13) A tough Taming cop (Burt Reynolds). A cutie kid who wants to be a tough cop (Norman Golden-H). A vicious gangster who wants to be a doo-wop idol (Ray Sharkey). A lady Captain who wants to be a social worker (Holland Taylor). Playground bullies

who want to be gangsters. Thugs who want to be straight men. Cops who want to be clowns. Put them all together, and the quintessential empty-marketing-look-script, and over-jolly direction by Henry Winkler and you haven't got even half a movie. (Twin Cinema)

The Crush (R). A cute journalist is besegged by the nymphomaniac, her demonic seduction includes attacks by striptease, wasps and merry-go-round. One more yuppie-in-peril shocker, and, despite its glossy style, just as slick and empty, calculated and crude, as most of the rest. Written and directed by Alan Shapiro, it teases up lewd fancies, then tries to wipe them clean with murderous rampages and by-the-numbers moralism. (Twin Cinema)

The Crying Game (R). The less said about the latest film from writer-director Neil Jordan the better. It is a sophisticated entertainment when the ground is constantly shifting under your feet and too much foreknowledge can be a dangerous thing. Set in Northern Ireland and starring Forest Whitaker, Miranda Richardson, Stephen Rea and newcomer Jive Davidson, this romantic thriller is never predictable but always honest and thoroughly enjoyable. See it now or forever be sorry. (Twin Cinema)

A Far Off Place (PG). A shimmeringly beautiful classic trek picture, set largely in the Kalahari desert: a sophisticated, intensely visual treatment of a traditional adventure tale. With Reese Witherspoon, Ethan Randall, Sarah Bak, Jack Thompson, and Maximilian Schell. (Jerome Cinema)

Indecent Proposal (R). Question: What would result if an idyllic but suddenly impoverished young couple (Demi Moore and Woody Harrelson) ran into a non-bashful billionaire (Robert Redford) who offered one million dollars for a very close encounter with the lady. Answer: one very silly movie. It may not be polite to laugh at other people's troubles, but this film leaves you little choice. (Mall Cinema)

Jack the Bear (PG-13). Marshall Herskovitz's directorial debut, based on Dan McCall's 1974 novel, has moments of sensitivity and all sorts of psychological insights. It's about a boy's coming-of-age story but it has a deep-toned lustre that lifts it out of its (conventional) class. As the boy's father, Danny DeVito is miscast and the film could be even shaggier and more adventurous but it's worth seeing. (Twin Cinema)

Sommersby (PG-13). Jodie Foster, who is a language with ease, is absolutely radiant in this post-Civil War retelling of "The Return of Martin Guerre," and it is

largely to her credit that the film's love scenes with Richard Gere work as well as they do. Unfortunately, this is a picture at war with itself, and an indifferent script and clichéd situations end up fighting that pleasant romantic combination to a standstill. (Motor-Vu Drive-in)

Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles 3: The Turtles are Back ... in Time (PG). Isn't this the kind of movie you've always dreamed of watching? A combination pirate booty and sanuarai time-travel epic, with four wisecracking turtles as the heroes? Fluke hits don't necessarily generate fluke sequel hits, and in this staggeringly expensive, obtuse and irrelevant (albeit great-looking parody), the magic of the four karate king, party-hearty reptiles congeals like stale pizza, or mock turtle soup. (Jerome Cinema)

Unforgiven (R). Working at the top of his form as both an actor and a director, Clint Eastwood has turned out a Western for the ages. Simultaneously heroic and nihilistic, reeking of myth-but-modern as they come, it resonates with the spirit of films quite its own. In addition to a splendid Morgan Freeman and Richard Harris, as well as an exceptional revisionist script from David Webb Peoples. Saddle up or get out of the way. (Jerome Cinema)

Chukars will put Southern Idaho's 23-7 mark to the test

TWIN FALLS — All is not perfect for the College of Southern Idaho baseball club as it plays through the middle part of its schedule, but it's sure not bad.

Whatever concerns Coach Jim Walker has at the moment are overshadowed by a 23-7 record and a .385 team batting average.

The Golden Eagles start their second league series at 6 p.m. today at Frontier Field with a one-inning game against Treasure Valley. The teams return at 1 p.m. Saturday for a doubleheader.

CSI brings a 3-0 league mark into the set. The Chukars had their first series with North Idaho rained out and have had less success than CSI at getting in games and workouts. Because of that, TVCC has struggled to a sub-.500 record and is

looking at an uphill battle to finish in the top two of the District 14 North side and make the playoffs.

"I know (TVCC Coach Rick Bauman) has been as frustrated as I am in battling the elements," Walker said. "We'd like to win all, and feel that two out of three would be the least that we would shoot for."

"Our goal is to try to win our side or at least get into the regional tournament." With 10 home runs and 43 runs batted in, first baseman Tom Walker has provided a big chunk of the power for CSI so far. His .449 batting average ranks third on the team behind Devin Chavez (.463) and Seth Garmann (.431).

On the pitching staff, Cody Winget, who will start today, and Kevin Shaler are 5-0. Shaler and Mark Kapp, 4-3 after the doubleheader, led behind him Wednesday, will start Saturday. Jed Soto, 3-0, two games, Jon Knudtz and Pat Flury, who is

throwing in the 90 mph range now, will lead the staff on the hill Saturday.

"I'm a little concerned about playing this good this early," Coach Walker said. "But maybe this team wants those standards."

Another small worry for Walker is that the honeymoon appears to be over among some team members.

"Some of them aren't happy with their roles. We're in that mid-season mid-pick a little bit," Walker said. "Living with people and being close with them so much, you're going to get on each other's nerves."

And a last concern of Walker's is that the team might start thinking its opponents will give up when they see CSI in the other dugout. It didn't happen at Snow, where the Badgers took a 5-0 lead before falling 10-8 and then run-rolled the Eagles.

"We still have a lot to prove," Walker said. "We can't rest on our laurels."

1st day features 'eerie' events

AUGUSTA, Ga. — There is something just a little bit eerie about Augusta National. — Lee Janzen, a fresh-faced youngster who was one of five golfers sharing the first-round lead at the Masters, spoke of it Thursday:

“There are ghosts out there,” he said. “They can be intimidating. And they're even more intimidating when they come out of the past and, for at least one brilliant spring day, assume major roles in golf's most treasured tournament.”

There was 53-year-old Jack Nicklaus, the greatest of them all, finding the spur he needed in a gentle jibe from a spectator, and going on to a 67 that tied for the first-round lead with Janzen, Larry Mize, Corey Pavin and Tom Lehman.

There was 50-year-old Ray Floyd, a former Masters winner and a runner-up last year, just one stroke back at 68.

There was 63-year-old Arnold Palmer, still called “The King” by his peers, running off an opening string of three consecutive birdies and renewing an old rivalry.

There was 43-year-old Tom Kite, the U.S. Open champion, who refused to yield to a painful back injury and managed a 73.

“If it went out, it went out,” he said, “but I wasn't going to back down.”

And there was Tom Watson, also 43, who took three straight consecutive penalties for an 8 on the 13th hole, then finished with five birdies to salvage a remarkable 71.

Some of the game's more curious stars were not so fortunate. Defending champion Fred Couples said he “got away with a bunch of bad shots” in a round of 72.

Saints GM: NFL takes '1-year' window' to extreme

NEW ORLEANS — Today's big spenders will have to pay some big bills next season when the NFL introduces a salary cap, according to New Orleans Saints general manager Jim Finks.

“I think there is a total over-reaction to this one-year window where there is no salary cap,” Finks said Thursday. “Some people have gone to extremes to sign players and it's going to catch up with them next year.”

Teams that feast on star players now may starve when the salary cap goes into effect next year, Finks said. “Next year, teams will have \$29 million to sign 53 players,” Finks said. “Some teams have committed two-thirds of that to sign 18 to 20 players. That means you are

going to have to spend one-third of the remaining money on two-thirds of the squad. You're going to sign 33 players with one-third of the money.”

Wayne Martin, one of the top defensive ends in the NFL, signed a four-year, \$10.1 million offer sheet with the Washington Redskins that would make him the second-highest paid defensive lineman in the NFL. The Saints have seven days to match the offer and retain Martin or get the Redskins' No. 1 draft pick for compensation.

Kicker Morten Andersen, fullback Craig Heyward and quarterback Bobby Hebert are among the players unhappy with New Orleans deals and shopping for better ones.

When the day of reckoning comes, Finks predicts the players will find free-agency has not benefited most of them.

“There's going to be a big-time gap between what some players are making,” Finks said. “Every time you see one of these big-time contracts signed, it's money out of another player's pocket.”

The \$17 million contract that Reggie White signed with the Green Bay Packers seemed great, but in reality, one of the other Green Bay players will underwrite it, Finks said.

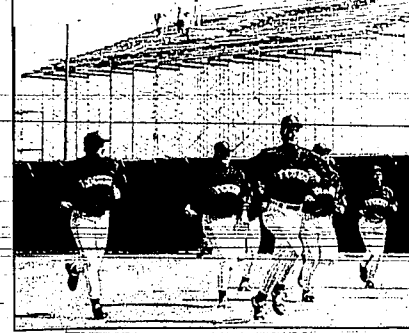
The Saints have been criticized by some of their players and many of their fans for refusing to shop for pricey free agents.

The Saints philosophy, Finks said, is to keep the draft the team they have and continue to build through that.

“I think we have a good chance of doing that,” Finks said. “We have three transition players which we think we can keep and we have signed many of our players.”

Manager Don Baylor says it's time to perform.

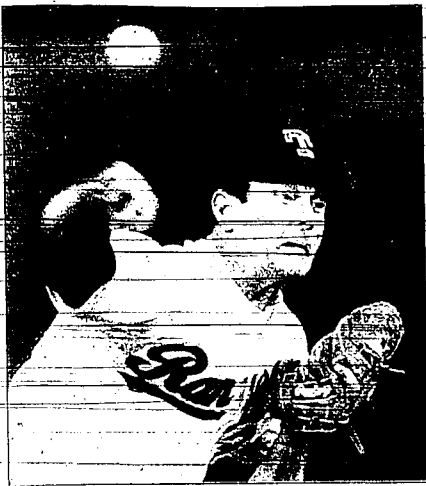
“It's somewhat hectic for players to come back with all the festivities that went on today,” he said. “You have a parade that was outstanding.”

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — As the nation relishes the promise of a new season and the novelty of baseball in Denver and Miami, the Texas Rangers harken to a bygone time as they open their final season at Arlington Stadium tonight.

Fittingly, Nolan Ryan will start for Texas against the Houston Astros, kicking off his own playoff.

Tom Vandergriff, the former major league player-critic-turned-informer Washington Senators from the nation's capital two decades ago, will throw out the first ball, as he did in the team's first game here in 1972.

Next year, the team moves into plush new digs, a \$168 million stadium under construction just up the road.

With his first pitch, Ryan will go where no man has gone before — a 27th major league season, a 33rd major league record.

And so begins the end of an era.

The 46-year-old right-hander said he doesn't want much fuss made over his last swing through American League ballpark. But Rangers pitching coach Claude Osteen wonders whether emotions can be so tempered.

"I doubt very seriously that there will be any pitchers come along that are going to retire in the manner that he is retiring," Osteen said.

"He's going to be leaving as a complete power pitcher."

"I've seen so many of them over the years. Robin Roberts, Tom Seaver, a whole bunch who more or less became old-speed pitchers in the last two or three years of their careers."

Nolan, with Ryan, who just this spring threw a seven-inning one-hitter.

Ryan is the last of a breed: the powerful pitcher who threw more fastballs than ticks, pitched every fourth day and was counted on for 300 innings a year.

When he walks off the mound for the last time, he'll take with him the epoch from which he came.

Even if another talent like Ryan comes along, these are the days of five-man rotations, more off-speed pitches and fewer innings as franchises spend multimillion-dollar investments with higher workloads.

"There will never be another one like him," Osteen said. "Most power pitchers make the transition and come down to earth to be a another pitcher like the rest, changing speeds and moving the ball around. Nolan changes speeds a lot, but he's still going out with complete power."

Still, the key to Ryan's performance is not the 95 mph heater, but the make-or-break curveball.

Cut it sharply, and Ryan's one, the chance of another special thing is at hand. I don't know if that's a long career, but I think what I want it to do, then, are fastballs, that much more effective."

When he's on that's total power. You know it from the very first pitch," Osteen said.

Ryan said he won't allow any lacwell hoopla to interfere with the team's drive or his determination to make up for a disappointing 1992, when he missed six starts due to injury and batted three or fewer times in the other times because of weather and physical problems.

Ryan, whose bullpen blew six leads, finished 5-9 last year, his fewest victories ever in a full season.

His starts (27), innings (157 1/3) and strikeouts (157) totals were the smallest in a full season since 1971.

Osteen said Ryan is starting the season healthy and won't have a set pitch count as in recent seasons.

"We'll certainly watch him closely," Osteen said. "But once he's in the flow, a lot of times he can be carrying a no-hitter or a one-hitter into the seventh or eighth, and you're not about to take him out."

Pena's ability has fans, coach wondering just how good he is

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Nobody's perfect, but Geromino Pena came close in the first two games of the season.

Pena, the St. Louis Cardinals' leadoff hitter, reached base in his first eight at-bats before finally lining out in the eighth inning of Wednesday's 6-2 victory over the San Francisco Giants. He was 5-for-6 with a three-run homer, four singles, three walks and three runs scored.

"It's going very good," said Pena, who speaks little English.

Cardinals manager Joe Torre had nothing but praise for the 26-year-old Pena.

"He has a lot of ability," Torre said. "I know the people in the stands, the scouts, that's the name they talk about. When you can get a second baseman who can do the things he can do, it's pretty attractive."

A few weeks ago, though, Torre thought it was getting ugly. So he benched Pena for three games.

Pena has been known to blow bubbles while fielding ground balls.

at second base and Torre thought he had gone too far in one particular game with his loose attitude and demeanor.

To help the message sink in, one of the games Pena spent on the bench was a road game. In spring training, teams rarely take regulars on the road, they don't intend using them.

"It was very important for him to understand I can accept a lot of things and I'm very patient in a lot of ways," Torre said. "I just thought he was a little casual that one game and he understood."

Not at first, Pena, from the Dominican Republic, was confused about his status before Torre brought in utility infielder Jose Quiendo to be his translator during a heart-to-heart talk.

"We had a cold war going on," Torre said.

Now, Pena is the hottest Cardinal. "I'm getting some base hits," he said. "I just luck, you know, I'm hitting the ball hard, that's it."

His three-run homer in the fourth off the Giants' Trevor Wilson broke

open Wednesday's game, giving the Cardinals a 6-0 lead.

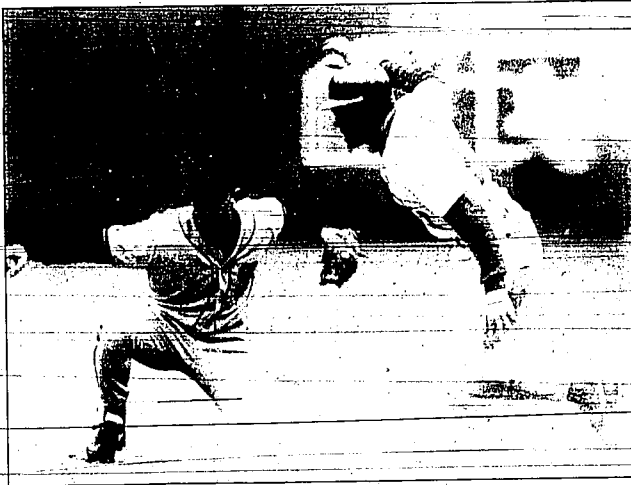
"I was feeling very good today," Pena said. "I would like to stay that way, all year."

Pena, one of four switch-hitters among the first five Cardinal hitters, batted .305 in 203 at-bats in an injury-plagued 1992 season. He missed the start of the season when he stepped on his glove while attempting to field a ball and broke his collarbone during spring training and he also missed almost two months with a nerve injury in his shoulder.

"The most important thing to me is I'm healthy," Pena said.

Defensively, Torre said Pena is not as good as Quiendo, but he thinks he can be with time. He's already got more power, with seven home runs and 37 RBIs last season, while Quiendo totaled three home runs in his last three full seasons.

"Pena has the ability to be a whole lot better and I think he will be," Torre said. "Right now, I'm committed to letting him go out there and play."

MIAMI — Florida Marlins' catcher Benito Santiago has mixed emotions about the opening series with San Diego, beginning today at Joe Robbie Stadium.

"He's looking forward to seeing old friends, but he isn't interested in all the questions about what drove him out of San Diego."

"The end there is in the past," Santiago said, "and I want it to stay there. They didn't sign me and that's it. I have a lot of good memories from that time, but the last month wasn't much fun."

"I'm having a great time with the Marlins. Everybody is behind the team. Playing the Padres will be a little strange, but the game is still baseball. It's still business."

Santiago is able to separate his friendships with the Padres from his relationship with the management.

He's looking forward to seeing Tony Gwynn, Andy Benes, Fred McGriff, Gary Sheffield and others. He's looking forward to showing those who let him leave the Padres that they made a mistake.

"I want to show them I can still play," Santiago said. "When they want me it was based on money, not ability."

Money wasn't an issue for the Marlins, who signed Santiago for \$5.2 million for two years. Santiago, 28, has become a leader on the Marlins. That was apparent when the team traveled with Atlanta in spring training after Mark Wohlers hit him in head. Second baseman Bret Barberie said the team was taking up for its leader.

"I was a leader over there, but there was always something else in the papers," Santiago said. "I was never given credit for being a leader."

Just as Santiago did in spring training on a couple of occasions, Marlins fans are waiting for him to pick off a baserunner from his knees.

In the opener, he had pitcher Charlie Hough moving out of the way of a throw to second base. In the second game, pitcher Jack Armstrong had to fall backward. Both barely avoided being hit. Santiago remembers hitting a pitcher, Mike Mills, in the minors.

"You have to keep your eyes on the ball, or you can get your head blown off," Santiago said. "There's no signal. You just have to watch. They'll get used to it."

Santiago senses the fans want him to throw somebody out, and he was upset Wednesday night when he clearly had Brett Butler nailed at second, but the pitcher's Barry Lick was called out later in the game. Butler stole successfully.

"I can't imagine what a runner goes through when he's sitting on second base and realizes he's just thrown out by a catcher from his knees," Santiago said, who has been gunning down runners in the major leagues since 1988.

Manager Rene Lachemann said there is much more to Santiago's game than his trademark throws.

"He has athletic skills that make him capable of doing things you wouldn't expect to teach other catchers," Lachemann said. "His hands, his ability to block and his ability to move are exceptional."

Santiago has been throwing off his knees since he was 17 or 18. It began as a joke.

"My brother told me to get my mitt," Santiago said. "He went down to second base, and I threw from my knees. It almost took his glove off."

"He can throw off his head if he wants," Lachemann said. "I just want the results."

Results are what Santiago, who has gone 266 straight games without a passed ball, believes the Padres could have gotten in San Diego if they had been willing to spend the money.

"We had Joe Carter, Roberto Alomar, Mike Pagliarulo and Jack Clark out there and finished second," he said.

Prep standout joins Chapel Hill champions

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Rasheed Wallace, one of the top high school basketball players in the country, said he's a "Tar Heel man" Thursday as he announced plans to attend North Carolina.

"I finally made my final choice. I chose North Carolina," the 6-foot-11 center from Sittoum Gratz High School said during a news conference.

He said he told Dean Smith, coach of the NCAA champion Tar Heels, "sometime last week that I liked the situation down there, like the way he coaches."

"As a coach and a person he (Smith) is the same — nice and calm. He's like a quote, unquote, a God down there," Wallace said.

Smith visited Wallace and his mother, Jackie, Wednesday night and accepted a verbal commitment from the player, who had Gratz as a commitment Thursday.

Wallace only made an oral commitment Thursday. The NCAA's signing period for basketball players begins next Wednesday.

Under Atlantic Coast Conference rules, North Carolina can't accept Wallace until he achieves a 700 SAT score. Wallace's score is 690, 10 points short of the minimum for freshman eligibility. Wallace took the test again March 27, but hasn't yet received the results.

Wallace said he wasn't concerned with being buried among the super talented players recruited by Smith.

- And a professor who is backing UNLV President Robert Maxson has been allowed to sit in on interviews with key witnesses in the probe.

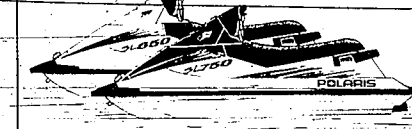
The Rider probe was initiated following reports that Ms. Bertolino was pressured into giving him a grade, which would be eligible for fall.

University officials first denied any problem with Rider, then admitted a tutor did some of his work for him.

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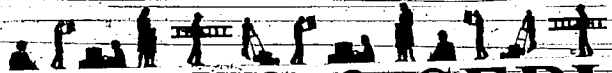



"If we go on explaining, we shall cease to understand one another." - Talleyrand.
Since you knew I had a diamond suit, my diamond deck should have been a clear signal for a shift," explained East.
"Way true," countered West.
"But how was I to know that it wasn't a suit-preference signal asking for a shift to the lower-ranking side-suit?"
West led the diamond jack, and when it was ducked ja dummy. East interpreted this play?
Unless dummy's holding makes it obvious that a diamond continuation is unthinkable (a void in dummy, for example), East's card signals attitude, not suit preference. In today's case, East's deuce requests a shift to another suit; it has nothing to do with suit preference.
At the table, West read it as a suit-preference signal and shifted to clubs. South won, drew trumps, eliminated clubs via a ruff and then put East on play with a diamond. East had no safe lead, and South lost only two diamonds and one heart.
A diamond continuation at trick two would have a similar result, but a shift to hearts would defeat the game. East wins the finesse, cashes his diamond ace and exits in clubs, waiting patiently for the setting trick in hearts.
Does West get all the blame for not finding the heart shift at trick two? Absolutely. If the setting tricks were to come from the club suit, East could easily have overtaken on the diamond jack to make the club play himself. When he allowed West to hold the trick, he was asking West to do something that East couldn't do for himself!

Hunter portrays mom accused of trying to kill daughter's rival

LOS ANGELES (AP) Holly Hunter went from playing a woman who can't talk in the movie "Piñero" to another who can't stop in HBO's "The Positively True Adventures of the Alleged Texas Cheerleader-Murdering Mom."

For "Piñero," she spent six months in New Zealand with Sam Neill and Harvey Keitel.

"I played a very reclusive, withdrawn-and-mystical-woman," she said. "I came back to Los Angeles and my agent gave me the HBO script—This was the antithesis of what I had steeped myself in for the last nine months, including all the training in music and sign language. "Now I play this glaring, unsubtle, outspoken, psychotic and slightly schizophrenic woman who talks non-stop. There's no dead air while this child's around—I thought the opposite were good."

In "The Positively True Adventures of the Alleged Texas Cheerleader-Murdering Mom," which debuts Saturday, Miss Hunter plays Wanda Holloway, accused of trying to hire a hit man to kill the mother of her daughter's cheerleading rival.

Mrs. Holloway was convicted two years ago in Channelview, Texas, on a charge of solicitation to capital murder, but a mistrial was declared because of a question about a juror's eligibility, and the state has appealed.

The movie is as much a happening as a movie. It has cheerleaders, family values, competition, small-town rivalry and American obsessions out of control. Miss Hunter talks to the camera, everybody bargains for deodand rights—and even the mak-

ing of the movie becomes a part of the story.

Feature film director Michael Ritchie directed, and playwright Jane Anderson wrote the script. It also stars Beau Bridges, Swoskie Kurtz and Matt Frewer.

"I studied some tapes of Wanda Holloway," Miss Hunter said. "It was astonishingly easy to play her. She was so unambiguously exposed. Her neuroses were not all covered up. She's a character in our movie who operates with very little shame."

"She's not a woman on the verge of a nervous breakdown. She's in control. She's an aggressive leader. I felt Wanda Holloway operated from the command post, and when she wasn't in the command post it irked her. I think she was afflicted with perpetual adolescence—in our movie anyway. I think that was her

most charming element."

Miss Hunter, born and raised in Georgia, still has an accent 18 years out of Smith College.

She talked about the movie while on a brief visit to Los Angeles from the Memphis location of the feature film "The Firm," based on the runaway best seller by John Grisham. In the movie, which will be released in July, Tom Cruise plays a young lawyer who learns the prestigious firm he has just joined harbors a terrible secret. Miss Hunter plays Tammy, a woman who helps Cruise collect evidence against the firm.

"Tammy's a woman driven to action by a tragedy in her life, which is the killing of her lover in front of her," she said. "She's a woman of enormous loyalty, very bright, and really quite easily trused by few people. There is hard to come by in her life."

After "The Firm," Miss Hunter will produce and star in the play "Lantana Frack," written by Beth Henley.

She's starred in such movies as "Raising Arizona," "Swing Shift," "Once Around" and "Miss Firecracker"—the latter based on another Beth Henley play—and was nominated for an Oscar as best actress for "Broadcast News" in 1987. She won an Emmy for "Roe vs. Wade."

Miss Hunter also is an avid scuba diver, who has dived in three places as off the coast of Greece, the Fiji Islands, New Zealand and Key West. Her greatest diving experience was off Washington's Puget Sound, she said, and the worst was the Aegean Sea.

"I'm going to the Cayman Islands for 'The Firm' and I'm taking all my diving gear," she said.

'Fly Away' may go to PBS

Although it's a long shot, NBC's struggling "I'll Fly Away" may wing its way to PBS next season, says John Falsey.

Falsey, co-producer with partner Joshua Brand, confirmed last month that PBS had contacted producer Lorimar about "confining" the actor-dancer-narrator Regis Tavares to a commercial network. "NBC doesn't renew it for the fall. 'Fly' ended its second season Feb. 5. NBC will announce its fall lineup in May."

"We're very flattered by PBS's interest," Falsey says of the possible deal, which would mark the first time PBS carried new episodes of a series from a commercial network. "It would be terrific to continue with the show. My only concern is money," NBC says Lorimar a licensing fee

of almost \$1 million per episode. Without heavy underwriting, PBS couldn't even approach that figure. Anything less "would compromise the integrity of the show," Falsey says, adding that it wouldn't be worth it to Lorimar to produce fewer than 13 episodes.

Falsey concedes that "Fly" is a long shot to make NBC's fall cut, too. "The network didn't help. The show, bumping around on the lineup like a pinball, it ranks 133rd among 127 shows, among NBC's lowest-ranking series."

From NBC's point of view, Falsey says, "they'd say, 'We want 38 episodes with you guys and the network just didn't improve.' Our answer is, 'You moved us all over the schedule. That aside, you should be able to find room in 21 hours of prime time for the finest drama on TV.'"

'Hee Haw' out of production

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — "Hee Haw," the cornball country humor show that showcased comfeds and an animated donkey, is going out of production after 25 years.

The 60-minute program — country America's answer to "Laugh In," ranks alongside some of TV's most venerable shows in longevity. "Hee Haw," currently seen in 140 markets, will remain in syndication with 600 shows in the vault to be rerun.

"I'm in mourning. I've lost an old friend," said George "Goobor" Lindsey, who was on the show 22 years.

Program officials said last week that initial production, which has been done for the past year, will be eliminated entirely.

The format of the show remained the same for a quarter century: fetching Southern belles in skimpy outfits doing brisk skirts, and country music by top stars like Loretta Lynn and host Roy Clark.

Many of the skits were in a combination of news and longevity.

Until 1992, a superimposed cartoon donkey was flashed across the screen as the show's unofficial symbol.

The network also confirmed that "Dudley" will replace "Major Dad" at 7:10 on Fridays starting April 16. The major has completed his season maras of April 9. "Dudley" stars Dudley Moore as a celebrated cabaret pianist.

'Roseanne' top-rated show among all households

ABC's "Roseanne" is the top-rated program among all households, but in black homes the top rated show is NBC's "The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air," according to a new study by BBDO, a major advertising agency.

In fact, in black homes "Roseanne" is the 15th highest-rated program.

BBDO found that in the country's 10.2 million black households, just four of the top-20 programs in Nielsen's household rankings (based on the country's 93.1 million TV households in all) were among the top-rated shows with black viewers.

"Fresh Prince," "Roseanne," "Hangin' With Mr. Cooper"



(ABC) and "Monday Night Football" (ABC) are the only programs to make both lists. The reason for the difference in viewing patterns is simple: Not more than ever, black viewers can turn to programs that feature large black casts and deal with urban themes.

However, just the presence of a black cast member does not lead to higher ratings among black viewers, the survey found. Programs such as "Law & Order" and "Evening Shade," which have strong black actors in key roles, did not perform well in black households.

A&E investigates gambling

Who knows the truth about gambling? Organized crime may or may not have loosened its grip. Maybe God really is against it. And an obsessive-compulsive person, undoubtedly has a tougher row to hoe when a casino or gambling boat turns up in his back yard.

But anyone who believe's these are the other guy's problems hasn't heard "the experts' prediction: In 10 years, every U.S. state will have legislated some form of gambling.

This might be really scary stuff, or it may be salvation in an uncertain economy.

The answer depends on who you ask, and A&E's "Investigative Reports" series questions every side of the issue in "Gambling on the Future," Friday at 7 and 11 p.m. MST.

Bill Kurtis, who not only hosts the series but whose Chicago-based production company has made "Investigative Reports" one of the best reasons to punch up A&E on Friday nights, says he liked the project from the beginning. "It's the American dream. Can it be? Get rich quick?" he says.

"We can sit here and debate casinos, and only 30 miles away (in Juliet, Ill.) there are a riverboat, horse racing. The moral issue is negated. Legislators have negotiated it."

Kurtis and company might have stayed at home simply to illustrate the pervasiveness of a state lottery (Illinois is the biggest in the country) or the magnetism of riverboat gambling (The Empress River Casino sails sev-

eral times daily from nearby Joliet). Instead, the team spread out from Deadwood, S.D., to Ledyard, Conn., and back again to Las Vegas to discover if growth, jobs, tourism and big bucks in state fills truly compensate for the increase in crime, compulsive behavior and muddled morality that seem to come with the big game.

Bruce Oberlander is mayor of Deadwood, the first U.S. city, after Las Vegas and Atlantic City, to legalize gambling. He holds fast to his original course despite mixed reviews from residents and visitors alike.

"From the beginning it was a means to an end," Oberlander says. "We burned our bridges, and I wouldn't want to go back to the old days."

Halfway across the country, on the Mashantucket Pequot reservation near Ledyard, Conn., the living is easy and affluent, and the tribe has gambling revenue to thank for that good life. Their Foxwood Casino makes in \$2 million a day, and the tribal managers pump much of that into education, expansion and other improvements on and around the reservation.

But in nearby Hartford, Conn., Steve Wynn, CEO of Mirage Resorts Inc., tries to generate support for a complex to compete with the Mashantucks. And in Hartford, he's the one having a tough time of it. Many citizens, like the Rev. Daniel Pease Sr., are outraged.

"I felt like an extra in a 'Godfather' movie," Pease rails during a public meeting.

Kurtis, in his commentary, likens

gambling to "abortion with dice. Morally, there is no right answer," he says.

He observes, too, that many of gambling's attendant problems are simply signs of growth. "It can work if you plan for economic growth and the changes and problems that come with it," he says.

Perhaps there is nothing brand new here for those who have debated and continue to debate the relative merits of gambling. But there is perspective of a new and different sort, and there is the overriding promise upon which casinos are built: "Over the long term, the house always wins," Kurtis says. "No community wants its citizens to always be losers."

Leave it to Las Vegas to come up with a wrinkle that would seem to make winners even of those who lose at the slots and tables. The prize? Family entertainment.

Circus Circus, Excalibur, Luxor Hotel Casino, Caesar's Palace all have taken a page from the Disney handbook and begun to modify.

Luxor, for example, is constructing on four enclosed acres the Grand Canyon with log flume ride and roller coaster, "the biggest on the West Coast," says Bill Paulos, Luxor vice president.

And where there is a new wrinkle in gambling, there are critics. There with sights still set on Las Vegas while the if focus on family is preparing a new and younger generation of gamblers.

Answers to key questions about cable regulation

Answers to some key questions about Thursday's decision to force cable TV companies to keep rates in line.

Q. When will my bill be cut?

A: Subscribers are not likely to see any reductions for six months, FCC officials said. But cable operators are free to cut rates now to avoid paying refunds. Rates will be frozen for the next 120 days while the new rules are implemented. Within about two months the FCC is expected to issue specific guidelines that will determine what rates your company can charge.

Q. How do I know if the rules apply to my cable company?

A: The FCC will not regulate cable companies that have to compete for your business. Under the 1992 Cable Act "effective competition" is defined several ways. Among the conditions that qualify as competition are "that less than 30 percent of households subscribe to your cable company or if the franchise area is served by at least two unaffiliated distributors.

Q. How much will my rates fall?

A: All rates will be evaluated through a formula set by the government. If your rates are higher than the benchmark, the government will force your cable company to roll back its rates by as much as 10 percent below September 1992 levels and eliminate all increases imposed since that date. That could cut bills on

basic service by as much as 15 percent. Basic service typically includes major local broadcast stations and public-access channels.

Q. What if I get more than basic service? Will the rate I pay go up?

A: The new regulations also apply to so-called expanded service, which typically includes more than a dozen cable channels and superstations such as ESPN and WTBS, in addition to local broadcast channels. The same benchmark pricing structure will be used on second-tier services to prevent companies from creating "stripped down" basic service or from shifting costs between tiers. However, the FCC will not require companies to cut rates on expanded service automatically. It will only respond to complaints from a subscriber.

Q. What about charges for equipment and additional hookups?

A: The regulations require cable operators to justify the costs of charging subscribers for equipment such as remote controls, wiring and hookups.

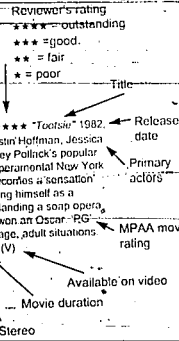
Q. Who will regulate my cable company?

A: The 1992 Cable Act requires local authorities to certify in writing that they have the resources to enforce FCC regulations and that they will use the same rules. The FCC and local authorities then will share jurisdiction over the regulation of basic service and equipment unless a franchising authority's certification is denied or revoked. In most cases the franchising authority is a city.

HOLLYWOOD — Barbara Feldon says that not a day goes by when somebody doesn't yell, "Hey, 99," out a cab window or smile and say hello to her on the street.

"I don't watch reruns," she says. "I haven't seen the show since 1970, so for 23 years it has been totally out of my life."

But the series has come back into her life thanks to cable's Nickelodeon, which began running the

Finny-winning comedy two years ago. "Ninety-Nine is not me," Feldon explains. "It's like I am getting the reflected pleasure she would be getting. I feel like an imposter in a way, but I just gobble it up."

On May 8, Feldon makes a rare TV appearance on the NBC comedy series "Mad About You" as the star of a famous '60s spy series. "It's sort of a parody," Feldon says. "I'm playing a woman who used to be on a series called 'Spy Girl.'"

Spy Girl enters the lives of publisher Jamie (Helen Hunt) and her filmmaker husband Paul (Paul Reiser) when she comes to New York to promote a book. "It turns out she is incredibly difficult and high-handed," Feldon says.

Though Feldon was trained as a dramatic actress, she gets the most satisfaction doing comedy. "I think you are either born with an ability to do comedy or not," Feldon explains.

Letterman move triggers vigorous booking war, field day for advertisers

NEW YORK — It's axiomatic that telling off the boss is one of life's most expensive luxuries, but if you're putting \$70 million a year in the boss' bank account, you can afford it.

That's why David Letterman, soon to depart NBC for CBS, continues, with impunity, to shove NBC and its owner, the powerful Time, with a torrent of japes and jibes. To add insult to injury, the "Late Night" lampooner now shamelessly plugs his new network from the peacock pulpit, which is much like an employee of PepsiCo telling everyone to drink Coca-Cola.

C.E. executives may grind their teeth and go home to kick the cat at night, but there is no room for corporate pride on the bottom line.

According to the trade magazine Broadcaster Advertiser Reports, Letterman raked in about \$70 million for NBC in 1991. His ratings since then have remained stable, at around 2.7, or 2.5 million households, which isn't bad for a night-owl show.

This means that from January, when CBS triumphantly announced that it was spiriting him away for \$14 million a year, and June 25, when he will depart, Letterman will have earned about \$35 million in ad revenue for NBC.

The "front" buying season in which advertisers get really serious about sponsoring programs in the television season to come, is three to six weeks away. But ad agencies report a flurry of activity as Letterman, on CBS, prepares to go head-

to-head with Jay Leno on NBC's "Tonight Show."

"If you're advertising a beer or a soft drink and you didn't have a position on CBS before, but you want one, I'm sure that you'd make sure your interest is registered," says Hetsy Frank, senior vice president for Saatchi & Saatchi.

"Advertisers never had an incumbent position on CBS because they never cared to reach people who watch action adventure movies ('Crime Time After Prime Time'). For obvious reasons, they now do want David Letterman."

Bill Croadale, of Los Angeles-based Western International Media, says that though CBS will not yet announce it, the network has signed up two major sponsors for Letterman's debut.

"My gut feeling is that they're probably Anheuser-Busch and Miller," Croadale says. "Beers have always been very strong in that late-night market because it's the ideal 21-34 demo (age group)."

Croadale says that in a "four-hour race" pitting Letterman, Leno, Arsenio Hall and Chevy Chase (Fox) against one another, advertisers will have a field day and the booking wars always vigorous, will become downright vicious.

"It should be a boon to advertisers because the more competition there is, the more clout we have in terms of negotiating the best prices," he says. "It will be interest-

ing to see how the respective hosts line up talent.

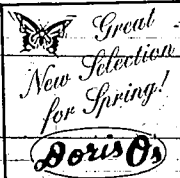
"That war has always been going on, with the talent coordinators scrambling to get the best people. It will intensify once all four of them are up because that's going to be the name of the game. The guy that gets the best is going to win both wars — not only the ratings war, but also in attracting the top names in advertising."

So NBC has a greater problem than Letterman's current irreverence for his soon-to-be-former masters. The network has to protect its "Tonight Show" franchise and, at the same time, fill the void Letterman will leave when he ceases to be a backup for "Tonight" and becomes its competitor.

Lorne Michaels, creator of "Saturday Night Live," has been given the crash program of coming up with a show to replace "Late Night." A source close to the Michaels camp says that even at full speed, he will not be able to roll it out before mid-August when Letterman is expected to make his CBS debut. From June 25 until then, NBC's 11:30 p.m. (CST) time slot will be in limbo.

Michaels is hobbled at the moment by lack of a host for the new showpiece. With Dana Carvey of "Saturday Night Live," making it clear that his interests lie elsewhere, Michaels has promised the network that he will come up with someone by mid-April.

"The new show will be less of a talk vehicle than a variety format—a source says. "It will be a cross between 'Saturday Night Live' and 'The Ed Sullivan Show,' where guests don't just sit on a couch and chat; they perform."

'Frontline' says 'The Trouble with Baseball' is TV money

An axiom of the TV age is that you know you're in trouble when you get to work on Monday morning and find Mike Wallace waiting for you.

Major League Baseball already is in trouble as it arrives for work today to open the 1993 season. Waiting to greet it is not "60 Minutes" but something even more ominous: "Frontline," the PBS documentary series that usually focuses on scourges such as racism, greed, corruption and petty tyrants.

Come to think of it, "Frontline" is the ideal program to explore the current state of baseball, to trace its spiraling, melancholy descent from national pastime to national embarrassment and to explore the sporting equivalent of the runaway federal deficit.

"The Trouble with Baseball" airs Tuesday on "Frontline" — ironically, opposite baseball on two cable networks: The Dodgers and Marlins on Sunshine, the White Sox and Twins on WGN-Chicago.

Therein lies the root of the "trouble" with baseball: television. Specifically, television revenue that has seduced owners and players and transformed baseball from a pastoral field of dreams into the greatest spectacle in greed.

If TV has ever offered a more lucid, succinct, ruefully damning description of the — one-great game, mania than "The Trouble with Baseball," I can't recall it.

The beauty of producer Michael Kirk's documentary is that it tells what is basically a ledger-sheet tale through the eyes of two baseball people whose careers have paralleled and mirrored the game's regrettable odyssey over the past 20 years.

The story of White Sox catcher Carlton "Pudge" Fisk and Sox owner Jerry Reinsdorf is a microcosm of baseball in the period when it declined toward its present gilded ignominy, summed up trenchantly for "Frontline" by writer Mark Hornung.

"I don't count, you don't count," he says. "The game is not played for us, it is played for television. The economic scale of baseball has taken away what was so profoundly human about it."

The beginning of the end for baseball as we knew it, says "Frontline," was 1975 when two events came together to produce baseball's "big bang":

Sixty million viewers saw Carlton Fisk win game 6 of the World Series with a home run, and major-league players won the right to sell their services to the highest bidder.

Fisk's instant celebrity convinced TV moguls that baseball

was ready for Prime Time, and what had been a stream of TV money to team owners became a tsunami as networks scrambled for rights to the new golden goose.

The players, newly released from the economic bondage of the reserve clause, were determined to get their fair share of the filthy lucre, pouring into the owners' pockets, and the money race was on.

In 1975 when Fisk (then with the Red Sox) hit his legendary home run, he was making \$80,000 a year and content. Today, as a White Sox, he is making \$650,000 — and bitter.

Fisk, paid \$1 million last year, was outraged when Reinsdorf offered a huge pay cut. Reinsdorf notes that Fisk, now 45, played in only 50 games last season.

With TV revenues now ebbing but payrolls still escalating immensely, owners like Reinsdorf are starting to play hardball with players like Fisk, whom he signed as a free agent in 1980.

Both sides seem to know that epidemic free agency, with players hopping from team to team, is bad for baseball. But players and owners seem locked in a co-dependent relationship of mutual greed.

Who's to blame: The Giants for offering Barry Bonds \$44 million for six years, or Barry Bonds for taking it?

Meanwhile, ticket prices continue to climb, altering the karma of the ballpark. Fans expect championship baseball for championship prices and can be testy when the millionaires on the field don't deliver. The player-fan relationship has been supplanted by something closer to seller-buyer.

Root, root, root for the home team, if they don't win it's breach of contract.

"Never once did I ever think I'd be playing elsewhere," Fisk says, thinking of his once-unthinkable move from Boston to Chicago. "The dream of most boys in New England was to play for the Red Sox or the Celtics. There were no other teams, no other dreams."

Today, there's always another root on the cable-dial. So root, root, root for the home team — if they're in another city, it's all the same.

Golfer Couples doesn't like to talk about divorce

ORLANDO, Fla. — A year ago, Fred Couples was front-page news as golf's No. 1 player. This year, he's just as likely to be seen on tabloid television.

The defending Masters champion's divorce proceedings with estranged wife Deborah in Palm Beach, Fla., have taken some of the spotlight away from his golf game.

After he won the Honda Classic in Fort Lauderdale, the Couples were the subject of a story on TV's "Hard Copy."

"I don't want to talk about 'Hard Copy' or anything like that because it doesn't have anything to do with golf," said the 33-year-old Couples in the locker room after the first round of the Bay Hill Invitational. "I will answer questions about golf."

A private person who has said he doesn't like answering the telephone because someone might be on the other end, Couples has endured the public scrutiny of the legal system.

"It's been like a death in the family," he said. "My emotions kind of go in and out like the tide. It's been difficult, and I think about it all the time on the golf course."

The Couples, who met as students at the University of Houston, have been married for 11 years. They have no children. Deborah, 34, had been a highly visible supporter of her husband in his first 12 years on the PGA Tour. He won nine tournaments, and invariably his wife was there on the 18th green in a brightly colored outfit ready to share the spotlight and the television cameras.

Deborah gave up a career as a tennis professional to support his efforts. They appeared to be a mismatched twosome, he being almost shy and she being very outgoing.

The scene after last year's Bay Hill Invitational underscores their differences. While Fred was almost apologetic for the gasp of his nine stroke victory, Deborah was complaining because tournament host Arnold Palmer hadn't flown her in from Palm Beach, where she was playing polo the day before.

Polo appears to be one of the major differences between the two. While Couples was earning between \$4.7 million and \$5.2 million last year from golf and endorsements, his wife was getting deeper into polo. Court records in Palm Beach County showed her polo expenses rose from less than \$10,000 in 1988 to almost \$300,000 in 1992. Couples' lawyers called polo an "obsession," and he has called it a "ripoff."

Celebrity divorcees are a Palm Beach specialty, and that hasn't

helped Couples keep the proceedings swift or simple. Deborah, who had said she was willing to reconcile, was awarded \$52,000 a month until the divorce is settled.

Her legal bills will be nearly \$750,000 when it is over. She not only seeks some of Couples' current sizeable assets, which include nearly \$1 million to play and endorse golf clubs and \$475,000 to endorse cars, but also his future earnings.

Couples, who doesn't want to reunite and has publicly acknowledged the now-serious relationship with another woman, is an admitted chess player who would rather stay home and watch ESPN than seek the limelight. But his place among golf's elite has forced him to be less private.

Last year was a career year for Couples. He not only won the Masters, his first major championship, but also was the leading money winner on the PGA Tour with \$1.3 million and was named the tour's player of the year.

He had always been considered one of the most gifted players in the world — and one of the least motivated. Couples disapproved that notion by finishing among the top 10 in 22 of his 34 worldwide events and winning \$2.2 million overall. He won three titles, the World Cup and the World Championship.

"Last year was a once-in-a-lifetime year," said Couples. "I may never play that well again, but I'm looking forward to trying."

The Honda Classic victory took Couples' mind off the courtroom — and perhaps off the severe migraine headaches he is again experiencing after suffering through them during parts of last season. He has assured his many friends and family members that he is coping with the divorce.

"People are pulling so hard for me to win," he said. "Many people are worried about me, and there's nothing to worry about."

Through it all, he is handling the attention of the press and public better. Last year, after winning the Masters and more than \$1 million before June, he admittedly had problems with his game.

"It kind of got out of hand," he said. "Everybody wanted everything."

Except for Bay Hill, where he missed the cut, he has played well this year. He has five top 10 finishes, highlighted by the Honda victory, a tie for second in the Los Angeles Open and a tie for sixth at Dorland.

Now he moves on to Augusta, Ga., to defend his Masters title. "I think I'm heading toward it," he said of the Masters. "Winning (the Honda Classic) was a big boost for me."
