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# Canadians market health care to Americans

TORONTO — Attention Americans: Cheap, government-subsidized health care for sale. High-quality surgery at low cost. Why pay more in Toledo than you can get it for less in Toronto?

Toronto Hospital, the largest acute-care facility in Canada, and the Hospital for Sick Children, one of the best pediatric centers in the country, will begin marketing their services south of the border in the next few months.

Dozens of other institutions may follow. The plan's proponents say it

will bring badly needed millions into hospitals chronically short of funds. Others feel it will mean poorer service for Canadians in favor of rich Americans. "I would not accept in this hospital a system that was going to disadvantage a Canadian," said Dr. Alan Hudson, president of Toronto Hospital and leading proponent of the plan. "Our first and foremost commitment is to Canadian patients,"

echoed Michael Strofolino, executive vice president of the Hospital for Sick Children.

The Ontario government, for the moment, seems to be sitting on the fence, though Health Minister Ruth Grier says she does not support aggressive marketing of services outside the province.

Nonetheless, the province has looked at the issue. A government study shows Ontario hospitals could make more than \$80 million U.S. and create 645 jobs by serving Americans.

Hudson's explanation of the plan is simple. All Ontario hospitals have ex-

cess capacity, beds closed due to funding cutbacks. By bringing in patients and money from outside, hospitals will be able to open more beds, hire back staff and, as a result, shorten waiting lists for Canadians.

Up for sale will be such high-tech services as bone marrow transplants at \$80,000 each, brain tumor surgery, head and neck surgery and complicated cataract surgery.

"If I do a brain tumor here, the fee for the service is about 1,200 dollars Canadian, that's less than \$1,000 U.S.," said Hudson, a neurosurgeon. "Now you phone a

surgeon in New York City and ask him what he's charging. A lot of them are charging \$3,000 to \$6,000. And that's just the doctor-not-the-hospital."

The Canadian hospitals won't be hiring individual patients, but will attempt to sell services to the insurance companies, preferred provider organizations and health maintenance organizations. A light last year against higher doc-

# Ozone layer plummeting to record low

WASHINGTON — The ozone layer that protects the Earth from ultraviolet radiation has dropped to record low levels globally, with the biggest decline over areas that include North America, Europe and parts of Asia.

The finding strengthens the concern about the effects of manmade chemicals on the natural ozone layer, researchers said, although they also said the dip in the concentration may be related to a 1991 volcanic eruption.

J.F. Gleason, a scientist at the Goddard Space Flight Center in Maryland, said that measurements last December and January by a NASA satellite showed that the ozone layer surrounding the Earth was thinner than in any previous measurements. The Nimbus 7 satellite has been taking measurements since 1979.

"During December 1992 and January 1993, global ozone was at the lowest level ever recorded," Gleason said Thursday at a news conference. "We had never (before) seen global ozone under 280 Dobson units (a measure of ozone)."

Readings taken as recently as Sunday, he said, show that ozone in the upper atmosphere is still depleted.

"The global ozone levels are still way below normal and they have not recovered," said Gleason. Readings in the northern hemisphere, he said, were still 10 to 20 percent below normal.

Ozone is a molecule of three atoms of oxygen. It forms a layer in the upper atmosphere that blocks much of the ultraviolet radiation streaming from the sun. Ultraviolet rays from the sun are powerful enough to cause possible genetic damage and to kill some forms of plant life. The radiation also causes sunburn and is thought to be one of the major causes of skin cancer.

Manmade chemicals — principally chlorofluorocarbons used in some spray cans; as refrigerants and in some industrial processes — are thought to destroy molecules of ozone by chemically stripping away oxygen atoms.

A concern about the effect of chlorofluorocarbons led to an international agreement called the Montreal Protocol, that called for eventually halting manufacture of these chemicals.

Richard Stolarski, a scientist at Goddard, said the new low ozone level "reinforces the wisdom" of limiting chlorofluorocarbon production and shows that "the concern expressed in the Montreal Protocol was very well placed."

The scientists said that the recent ozone readings were so low that there was concern that there could be a flaw in the total

# Suspects held without bond

## Pair admits to killing in court affidavit, faces possible death sentence

TWIN FALLS — Two men charged in the fatal stabbing of a Twin Falls man were ordered held in jail without bond Thursday.

Leo D. Jasper, 20, is charged with first-degree murder. Danny T. Egelston, 23, is charged with aiding and abetting the Tuesday night murder of Thomas M. Pont, 42.

Pont, who bled to death after being stabbed five times, suffered from epilepsy and had a history of mental problems and brushes with the law.

Jasper and Egelston admitted to police their part in the killing, according to an affidavit filed in court by detective K.C. Dudley of the Twin Falls Police Department.

According to the affidavit: "Egelston admitted that he was present at the time Jasper stabbed ... Pont and that he felt Jasper was attempting to rob Pont. Jasper admitted that he stabbed ... Pont and that he had intended to rob Pont."

The suspects, both of Twin Falls, were in court Thursday and listened quietly as 5th District Magistrate Melvin C. Edwards read their legal rights and told them the possible sentence if they are convicted.

"The maximum penalty," Edwards said, "is death."

Under Idaho law, a killing committed during a robbery is first-degree murder. The sentence for aiding and abetting a murder is the same as if the person had committed the act himself, Twin Falls County Prosecutor G. Richard Bevan said.

A preliminary hearing date had not been set Thursday. If a magistrate judge decides after that hearing that the state has enough evidence to proceed, the men will enter pleas in District Court.

The public defender's office was appointed to represent both men. Deputy Public Defender Elizabeth Burr-Jones asked that Egelston be released on his own recognizance and that bond for Jasper be set no higher than \$10,000.

Investigator's statements in the court file do not contain enough evidence to hold either man without bond, Burr-Jones argued.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor G. Richard Bevan pointed out that the knife police believe was used in the killing was found in the motel room where the two men were staying Tuesday night.

A city police officer found Pont's bloodied body slumped against a white

# Records show murder victim had history of emotional problems

TWIN FALLS — Although Thomas Pont's neighbors describe him as a quiet, likable man, his mother says his emotional problems sometimes got him into trouble.

Pont, 42, was found stabbed to death near a Main Avenue restaurant Tuesday night. Two men have been arrested and charged with killing Pont during a robbery attempt.

"I don't think he instigated this fight that got him killed," said his mother, Ruth Allen of Twin Falls.

Allen said her son was a big, strong man — 6 feet 2 inches tall and 220 pounds, according to court records.

The third of six children, he always had trouble getting along with people, Allen said.

In September, Allen had to call the police to take her son away from her home. He was too much for her to handle, Allen said.

Court records show Pont was arrested and charged with disturbing the peace after he threatened to smash his mother's glass door with a piece of firewood.

Pont was violent, and police took him to the hospital emergency room. Doctors there recommended he be taken to Canyon View Hospital, but he was denied admission, a police officer said in a written statement.

The officer contacted an official with the Department of Health and Welfare's Bureau of Mental Health, who said she was familiar with Pont.

But nobody from the agency ever showed up at the hospital, so Pont was

# Reno: Let Waco investigation guide reaction in future

WASHINGTON — Attorney General Janet Reno said Thursday she hopes an investigation of the Waco standoff that ended with the deaths of dozens of religious cult members will help in dealing with future incidents.

"I think we're going to see something like this recur in the future," Reno told a Senate Appropriations subcommittee.

"We're going to try to consult with the best experts ... on what could have been done," Reno said, adding that she will be seeking "an improved, non-lethal means of ending something like this."

an investigation that is to cover the entire Branch Davidian cult situation. It is to cover the deadly Feb. 28 assault on the compound by the Treasury's Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms as it tried to serve an arrest warrant on cult leader David Koresh and a search warrant for illegal weapons as well as the conduct of the 51-day standoff that followed and Monday's fiery end as the cult's compound went up in flames.

In response to questions from panel members, Reno said she was told the cult "could have held out indefinitely," that it had food "for as long as a year" and access to water.

Questioned by Sen. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark., about the daily cost of the standoff to the government, Reno said she did not have an accurate figure at hand but said "it was expensive."

She did not say whether the cost had any impact on her Saturday evening approval of an FBI plan to poke holes in the compound and inject liquid tear gas inside.

Just hours after the FBI started implementing that plan Monday, the compound was engulfed in fire that the FBI said

was set by cult members. As of Wednesday, 40 bodies had been spotted in the rubble of the compound that burned to the ground within an hour.

Three of the people apparently had been shot, but it was not clear whether they were victims of suicide, homicide, or bullets that exploded in the estimated 1,200-degree heat of the inferno.

Panel chairman Sen. Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C., indicated he thought 51 days was long enough for law enforcement officials to wait to arrest people who killed four ATF agents in the Feb. 28 shootout.

"Fifty-one days was a gracious plenty," Hollings said.

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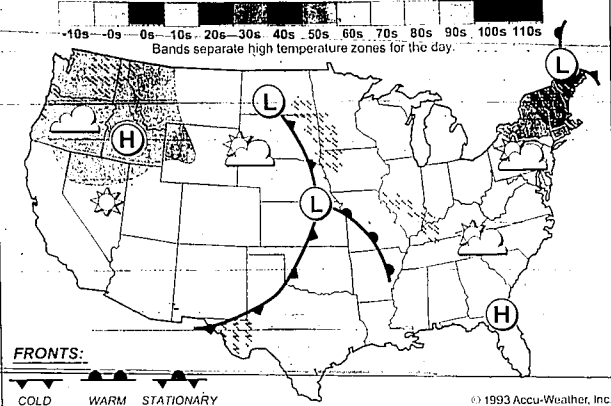

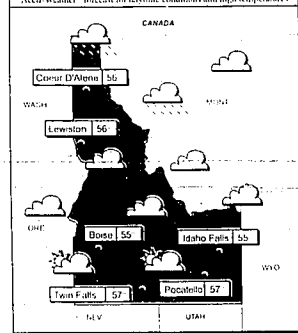

## Weather summary

The clouds and scattered showers continued to move in and out of the state Thursday afternoon. While some spots were still dry and mostly sunny, satellite photos showed more clouds lined up offshore that will keep on tracking onshore and inland for the next few days. This means most of the state will get wet at times. Rainfall amounts were less than a tenth of an inch in most areas. Lewiston, however, was the exception, and got .14-inch between sunrise and 4 p.m.  
 By 3 p.m. MDT, the maximum temperatures were from the upper 40s to 50s and a few low 60s. Many of those highs occurred in the morning.  
 The mercury cooled down during the showery periods. The warm spot was Mountain Home with 63 degrees. Boise reached 61. Pocatello and Hatley had 57. Twin Falls had 56. Coeur d'Alene, Lowell and Burley were in the mid-50s, and Spencer, Challis and Salmon were in the upper 40s.  
 Grangeville was the coolest, with 44 degrees at 2 p.m. Lake Havasu City and Coolidge, Ariz., logged in the hottest temperatures in the nation with 102 degrees Thursday. Pellston, Mich., was the coolest at 20.

## Rain, snow cover Northeast; record cold in South

Rain and snow covered much of the Northeast on Thursday. Fair skies and winds associated with a high pressure system brought record cold to the Southeast.  
 Skies were partly sunny east of the Rockies but were overcast in the West, with widely scattered showers in Washington and Oregon.  
 Rain was scattered across New Jersey, Pennsylvania, while snow fell in parts of New York state and Pennsylvania. Widely scattered rain showers tinged along the Middle Atlantic Coast.  
 Up to four inches of snow fell at Phillipsburg, Pa., and more than seven inches blanketed Binghamton, N.Y. Syracuse, N.Y., had received 4.6 inches by midday.

Gale warnings were issued for the coasts of Massachusetts and Rhode Island.  
 Rain for the six hours ending 1 p.m. MDT included more than half an inch at Watertown, Albany, Massena and Syracuse, all in New York state.  
 A high pressure system dropped temperatures across the Southeast, with readings generally below 50 degrees from the southern Plains to the southern Atlantic Coast.  
 Fifteen cities reported record low temperatures for the date, including Birmingham, Ala., and Paducah, Ky., where the mercury dipped to 31 degrees. The morning low of 45 degrees at Lake Charles, La., was the coldest reading of record so far in the season.  
 The low temperature for the Lower 48 early Thursday was 20 degrees at Pellston, Mich.

# White House strives to regain momentum with Legislature

WASHINGTON — The White House still reeling from its jobs bill defeat, searched Thursday for initiatives on which to score a clear-cut victory before getting enmeshed in other looming disputes over campaign finance reform and national health insurance.  
 One candidate: Clinton's proposal to restructure the college loan program to allow students to pay off their loans through national service.  
 Clinton announced that he'd send the measure a key campaign promise to Congress next week. While not without controversy, the program at least is relatively straightforward and holds out the possibility of attracting bipartisan support.  
 Meanwhile, the administration worked without much optimism — with Democratic leaders on ways to salvage parts of Clinton's deci-

malated jobs-stimulus package.  
 "There are a number of options," White House communications director George Stephanopoulos said.  
 "The president wants to move forward on summer jobs, he wants to move forward on investments in highways and mass transit, and he wants to move forward on immunization and all the other important initiatives contained in his package."  
 Other White House aides said that a supplemental appropriations bill might be introduced in the House next week that would include spending for these jettisoned programs.  
 The mood at the White House was clearly dark a day after Clinton was handed his first major legislative defeat as Democratic leaders failed for the fourth time in a month to break a Republican filibuster on Clinton's \$16.3 billion jobs-stimulus package. The White House and the Democratic leadership then abandoned the

proposal and approved instead a \$4 billion program to provide jobless benefits for unemployed workers who have exhausted their benefits — the only part of the package that wasn't resisted by the GOP.  
 Other parts of Clinton's overall economic plan also appeared to be unravelling.  
 White House officials reluctantly signaled they might have to reconsider a part of the package — an investment tax credit — which is opposed by Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and other key Democrats.  
 "We're looking at it right now," White House press secretary Dee Dee Myers said. "I'm not ruling it in, I'm not ruling it out."  
 Later, Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen was asked by reporters if the administration were considering withdrawal of the proposal. "No, we're not," he said.

 "There are things we do very well in this country. One of them is health. Our administrative costs are so much better than in the United States that we are much more competitive."  
 "Americans with litigious inclinations might want to think twice, however. Million-dollar malpractice suits are unheard-of in Canada. The Supreme Court has set a limit on general damages at \$225,000 U.S., and punitive damage awards are capped.  
 "Bringing suits in U.S. courts for malpractice in Canada is costly, but not impossible.  
 "They (the hospitals) may be opening themselves up to extrajudicial lawsuits," said Richard Shekter, a health law specialist with the Fogler, Rubinoff law firm.

Treating Americans is nothing new. "We have a U.S. patient at the moment," said Strofollino of the children's hospital. "A lot are here on physicians' referral because of our expertise."  
 The same is true for Toronto Hospital, whose reputation is equal to that of the best American institutions.  
 Both hospitals are talking about small numbers for 18-24 months, then a review. If it's a success, they will expand the program.  
 With 44,000 in-patients a year, adding fewer than 100 is a drop in the bucket to Toronto Hospital.  
 "We wouldn't get into it if we didn't think it had a future," said Strofollino. "This is a world-class system and this is a world-class hospital."

Police checked the home of Egelston's common-law wife Wednesday morning, and someone there sent them to Honker's Place motel.  
 At Honker's, they spoke with Egelston's wife, Lexi Madsen, and several other people who were in the room.  
 Those people said Egelston came to the room the night before, out of breath. Dudley's statement says Egelston was followed by Jasper, who washed blood out of his pants in the sink, then threw a knife into the sink to soak, the affidavit says.  
 Madsen told *The Times-News* Wednesday that Jasper and Egelston had been drinking earlier Tuesday evening.  
 Police issued a search warrant to retrieve the knife and a blood-stained coat from the motel room, Dudley said.  
 Both men were arrested elsewhere without incident later Wednesday.  
 Madsen told police at the motel that Egelston had beaten her when he returned. According to a police report, she had ordered pizza, but a fight began when Egelston returned to find only two pieces remaining.  
 Egelston hit Madsen in the face and choked her, she told police. No charges have been filed in connection with those allegations.

## Museum dedicated Thursday with pledges of 'never again'

WASHINGTON (AP) — A half century and a world away from the gas chambers of Auschwitz, Majdanek and Chelmo, a new Holocaust museum was dedicated Thursday to teach future generations the lessons of what one survivor called "the black hole in time, the black hole in history."

Before 7,000 people, many of them survivors of the concentration camps erected by Nazi Germany in World War II with a mission to exterminate the Jews, came a repeated admonition: Never again.

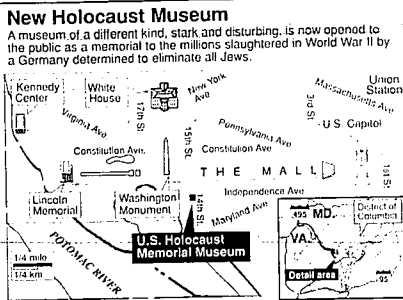
From Elie Wiesel, who won a Nobel Prize for his efforts to keep the Holocaust memory alive, came this recollection:

"In Poland, SS officers used Jewish infants for target practice. The only emotion they ever showed was anger when they missed," he said. "In Kiev, an SS officer beheaded two Jewish children in front of her mother, who in her anguish, in prey of some mystical madness, held them close to her bosom and began to dance."

"In Romania, the Iron Guard hanged Jews on meat hooks and displayed them in butcher shops, with signs, 'Kosher Meat.'"

Through starvation, execution, and overwork, Hitler's henchmen executed 6 million Jews, two third of the pre-war population of Europe, in their drive for a "Final Solution."

In his dedication address, President Clinton said the museum binds "one of the darkest lessons in history to the



hopeful soul of America."

At the end of his speech, Wiesel turned to Clinton.

"Mr. President, I cannot not tell you something," he said.

"I have been in the former Yugoslavia last fall. I cannot sleep since (because of) what I have seen... We must stop the bloodshed in that country. People fight each other and children die. Why?"

"Something, anything, must be done."

The president, who is considering using military force in the former Yugoslavia, said "ethnic cleansing" in Bosnia is "but the most brutal and blatant" example of evil in the world today. The museum reminds the world "again and again how fragile are the safeguards of civilization," he said.

Throughout the ceremony, held on a rainy, windy day on a plaza flanking the museum, the derisive chants of demonstrators, who spread the falsehood that the Holocaust was a hoax, could be heard by the crowd.

As if in answer, Clinton said, "Look at the liars and the propagandists among us, the skinheads and the Liberty Lobby here at home, the Afrikaners Resistance Movement in South Africa, the radical party of Serbia, the Russian Black Shirts."

## GOP triumph: A bitter political lesson for Clinton

WASHINGTON — Moments after a humiliating legislative defeat, President Clinton summed up the lesson of Day 92 of his administration: "I must say there's a lot I have to learn about this town."

His offhand remark came in a speech delivered in the shadow of the Capitol, where, remarkably, the president elected on a promise to jumpstart the economy failed for a fourth time Wednesday to get a modest jobs bill through Congress.

A year from now, even months from now, the defeat may be lost under a stack of Clinton successes. Still, the loss was significant because of how it came about and because the subject was the economy — the one issue on which the Clinton White House thought it would meet little resistance on Capitol Hill.

Instead, the administration had to abandon its package Wednesday after attempts at compromise failed because of Republican solidarity, winning passage only of \$4 billion in emergency unemployment benefits — less than one-fourth of Clinton's original package.

The defeat came after several White House strategy missteps. First it failed to win advance Republican Senate support, then mistakenly believed political pressure on a handful of GOP moderates would melt their resolve.

In the end, it appeared to strengthen it.

In between, Clinton lost control of the debate, letting Republicans make the argument the package was

political pork and dangerous deficit spending, not "the plan to jumpstart our economy" that won Clinton so many campaign points.

If Clinton doesn't repeat his mistakes, "then we'll forget about this one," said American University political science professor James Thurber. "In the wide sweep of things, I think the history of this year will show that he won far more than he lost."

Perhaps, but there are signs of more trouble for Clinton on the horizon.

Republicans, particularly in the Senate, have been energized by blocking Clinton and taking the first steps to repair the GOP's tattered image by uniting around shared economic themes.

"President Clinton's economic plan has done more to concentrate people on the differences between Republicans and Democrats than anything I could ever do," said Republican National Committee chairman Haley Barbour. "It has galvanized and energized our party."

And, in a troubling sign for the White House, critics of Clinton's larger economic plan are lining up to take on Clinton again, sensing vulnerability.

There are powerful Democrats as well as Republicans in this group: some think Clinton's plan doesn't go far enough in cutting the deficit; some dislike the president's tax proposals; others want to advance pet priorities of their own.

## Waco cult only one of hundreds

Experts: Tragedy is a warning of more bloodshed to come

BARRINGTON, Ill. (AP) — Cynthia Kissler thumbs through a worn yellow binder fat with printouts of names; religious sects predicting the end of the world; self-improvement groups heavy on pink psychology.

"Somewhere in here," says the thin, intense Kissler, "is another Waco waiting to happen. What happened with the Branch Davidians is continuation of what we know is going on out there."

Kissler runs the Cult Awareness Network, a clearinghouse and information central about cult activities, from a cluttered suburban Chicago office.

She and other cult watchers see the tragedy in Waco, Texas, as more of a pointed warning than simply an isolated event that got out of hand. They say this week's deaths and the 1979 massacre in Jonestown, Guyana, reflect a vast problem simmering below the threshold of public awareness.

"The big explosions like Jonestown or Waco are more exception than the rule. The real concerns about destructive cults are the psychological and emotional wreckage they create," says Craig Branch of the Watchmen Fellowship, a ministry that tracks suspected cults from its base in Birmingham, Ala.

No one knows how many destructive cults and sects exist in the United States, Kissler's binder holds 1,500 names gleaned from newspaper clippings, court documents and thousands of calls to the network's hotline.

Some of the groups have legitimate purposes, Kissler says. But her group's efforts show that most, despite wildly diverse beliefs, share stunningly similar patterns of mind control, group domination, exploitation and physical and mental abuse.

Cults in the United States rarely receive official scrutiny; they are commonly written off as callalhs for society's outliers, those not smart or stable enough to know their own minds.

But those familiar with cults say almost everyone is susceptible to their lure at some time in their lives.

## Whistleblower awarded \$11.45 million

WASHINGTON (AP) — A General Electric whistleblower who sued his company for overcharging the United States for aircraft parts for Israel will get \$11.45 million through a settlement with the U.S. government announced Thursday.

Claes E. Walsh, represented by the Taxpayers Against Fraud, initially

sued GE in 1990 under the False Claims Act that enables whistleblowers to share in recoveries from companies that defraud the government.

The federal government joined in the litigation in 1991, and last year, it entered an agreement with GE requiring the company to pay \$59.5 million.

In addition to that amount, U.S. District Judge Carl Rubin in Cincinnati also imposed a \$9.5 million fine.

Last December, the judge ordered that Walsh should get some \$13.4 million of the total.

## Disability trust fund going broke

WASHINGTON (AP) — The economic downturn helped push the government's disability trust fund to the edge of bankruptcy and it now has only enough money to pay benefits until 1995, Congress was told Thursday.

But Congress is expected to act soon to avert disaster by setting a greater portion of the Social Security payroll tax into the disability trust fund, keeping it solvent until 2020.

The General Accounting Office's June 1, Ross told the House Ways and Means subcommittee on Social Security that the growing number of Americans on the disability rolls has drained the insurance trust funds.

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**Audit shows C-17 bailout payments**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The McDonnell Douglas Corp. and the Air Force "deliberately misled" defense auditors on the company's financial status and the nature of payments made to develop the C-17 cargo plane, the Pentagon's audit chief said Thursday.

John F. McDonnell, chairman and chief executive officer of McDonnell Douglas, denied his company conspired with Air Force officials to obtain "bailout" payments.

He said McDonnell Douglas is now strong enough financially to fulfill all of the terms of its C-17 production contract, emerging with an aircraft that meets government requirements.

"McDonnell Douglas is financially able to absorb all losses and has taken not a penny that it was not owed," McDonnell said. "From a financial point of view we are able to see this program to completion."

But many members of the House Government Operations Committee said they remained skeptical and are suspicious that taxpayers' money has been abused.

The C-17 program has been plagued with \$1.5 billion in cost overruns and wings that failed stress tests.

In an investigative hearing, William H. Reed, director of the Defense Contract Agency, said that throughout 1990 and 1991 his agency found McDonnell Douglas, the nation's largest defense contractor, "in an unfavorable financial condition which might adversely affect its ability to perform under government contracts."

Reed said he learned that there had been private discussions between Air Force civilian officials and the company about McDonnell Douglas's financial squeeze.

He said that at the time, McDonnell Douglas's financial position was being portrayed by company and government officials "in the most favorable light."

"Was your agency deliberately misled?" Reed was asked.

"I believe we were deliberately misled," he replied.

Elaborating, Reed added: "Did someone lie to us directly? No."

**Hope, despair greet Earth Day celebration**

Earth Day was celebrated around the world on Thursday, but not everyone was optimistic about the planet's future.

India's environmental minister said that despite the endorsement of an environmental agenda by world leaders in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, last year, the emission of gases that contribute to global warming continues to rise.

"Emissions are going up while the availability of funds to the developing countries are going down," Kamal Nath said in New Delhi, the United News of India reported.

In Washington, researchers released a report that shows the protective ozone layer dropped to record-low concentrations last year, with the biggest decline seen over areas that include North America, Europe and parts of Asia.

J. E. Gleason, a scientist at the Goddard Space Flight Center in Maryland, said measurements last

December and January by a NASA satellite showed that the ozone layer surrounding the Earth was thinner than in any previous measurements.

Richard Stolarski, another scientist at Goddard, said ultraviolet radiation not filtered out by the ozone layer "is energetic enough to break the bonds of DNA," a measure of the potential for causing genetic change.

In many international cities, celebrations of Earth Day were nowhere to be seen or weren't going to be held until the weekend.

Still, the creation of Earth Day has, watched his cause grow considerably from a small environmental fringe movement.

In Pullman, Wash., members of the Washington State University zoology club celebrated by buying 2 acres in a South American rain forest for \$18.80.

In Missoula, Mont., a group opposed to nuclear weapons testing planned to read accounts of 950 nuclear explosions.

**Police start to piece together Ohio prison puzzle; 2 bodies found**

LUCASVILLE, Ohio (AP) — Investigators found the bodies of two more inmates Thursday as they began to piece together what happened in a ransacked cellblock held for 11 days by rebellious maximum security prisoners.

Fifty miles away in Columbus, lawmakers ordered investigations into the siege that left nine inmates and one guard dead.

Inmates at the Southern Ohio Correctional Facility gave up Wednesday during a seven-hour, televised broadcast that they said was the condition for their surrender. Five guards held hostage since April 11 were released as the last of the prisoners were taken to an adjacent cellblock.

The guards were in stable condition Thursday at the Southern Ohio Medical Center in Portsmouth, Ohio. Hospital did not disclose what they were suffering from.

Two guards had been released earlier in the siege.

Authorities and inmates agreed to 20 other terms, including a review of living and working conditions at the prison.

Corrections spokesman Mike Lee said all inmates were accounted for. He didn't know what caused the deaths of the two found Thursday.

The two bodies were discovered after investigators began to sift through debris in the evacuated cellblock, said prison spokeswoman Sharon Konegay.

Col. Thomas Rice, superintendent of the State Highway Patrol, said there was "quite a bit of damage" in the cellblock.

"Mattresses and doors, anything you can imagine that would be in a penal institution, are all over the place," he said. Authorities had to "cut a path" to the place where the inmate's body was found Thursday.

A military explosives team searched the cellblock for booby traps and explosives.

Ms. Konegay also said there were fewer inmates in the cellblock during the standoff than officials thought. Earlier, prison officials said 450 inmates were inside. On Thursday, Ms. Konegay said revised figures showed that 409 inmates were involved, including the two found dead Thursday.

She said 129 of the rebellious inmates were transferred Thursday to the Mansfield Correctional Institution, about 140 miles northeast of Lucasville, to relieve overcrowding. Eight of 10 Ohio National Guard companies at the prison were

ordered to leave Thursday. The remaining 185 soldiers were to leave Friday, said Gen. James A. Hughes, the lock-force commander. During the siege, 800 soldiers were assigned at the prison.

In Columbus, House Speaker Vern Riffe, in whose district the prison is located, canceled the afternoon House session in deference to the families of the victims. "We are all sorry and grieved," he told a hushed House.

Riffe said the Correctional Institution Inspection Committee had been asked to investigate the standoff. The state patrol was conducting a separate criminal investigation as was the Scioto County prosecutor's office.

Gov. George Voinovich created a committee to determine what should be done to improve the system.

Outside the prison, guard James A. Demons, who was released last week, said he was forced to wear Muslim garb when inmates let him go after a live TV broadcast.

In the broadcast, Demons said he had "adjusted to the nation of Islam." "I am not a Muslim," he said Thursday. "If I pacified them and made them happy, it would be safer for everyone."

**NIH terminates grant to explore genetic link to criminal behavior**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Institutes of Health on Thursday terminated a \$78,000 grant to the University of Maryland for a conference examining whether there is a genetic link to criminal behavior.

"We as scientists and physicians believe it was an inappropriately conceived, dangerously inflammatory conference in the way it was promoted," said Dr. Bernadine Healy, the NIH director. "It would have been socially irresponsible for it to go forward."

Funds for the conference had been suspended since July 1992 because of NIH concerns about the way it was being promoted. Black leaders and others feared the conference would lead to assertions that blacks are inferior to whites.

**FCC bans cellular phone scanners**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Radio scanners that can pick up cellular phone conversations will be illegal to manufacture or import starting next week, the Federal Communications Commission ruled Thursday.

The scanners must be incapable of tuning into the band of radio waves used by cellular phones.

The new rule stems from the Telephone Disclosure and Dispute Resolution Act passed last year by Congress.

Complaints have grown over the years with which people using an ordinary scanner receiver can eavesdrop on cellular phone conversations.

The rules also prohibit frequencies that could change cellular frequencies into frequencies that could legally be picked up by a scanner.

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## Bill denies China trade status

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic congressional leaders introduced legislation Thursday that would end normal trade relations with China unless it makes major reforms in human rights, weapons dealing and trade practices.

"It is not our intent to isolate China," said Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell of Maine at a news conference. He said the bill was crafted in hopes that China will indeed change, and continue to be accorded most-favored-nation trading status by the United States.

Rep. Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., a longtime critic of the Chinese regime, announced introduction of the bill in the House. Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., and Assistant Majority Leader David Bonior, D-Mich., were among the co-sponsors.

The bill is similar to a measure that passed both houses with large majorities in the past, only to be vetoed by the Republican president.

President Clinton vowed in his campaign to put pressure on China, but his administration has not announced a decision on extending its most-favored-nation (MFN) status, which runs out in July. The MFN designation, entailing the lowest possible duties on goods, is granted all equal trading partners.

The bill would require the president to state that certain conditions have been met before such an extension.

The legislation is intended primarily as leverage for Clinton in dealing with China, Mitchell said, adding "We hope the bill won't be necessary."

House Foreign Affairs Chairman Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., has said he prefers diplomatic pressure to trade sanctions. Hamilton had supported such legislation during President Bush's term, but said Congress and the president can now work together to pressure China without putting conditions on MFN.

But Pelosi, at a joint news conference with Mitchell, said "Three years of unconditional MFN have not led to any substantial improvement in the human rights, trade and nuclear-proliferation practice of the Chinese government."

The U.S. trade deficit with China grew by 43 percent last year, from \$12.7 billion in 1991 to \$18.3 billion. Ms. Pelosi said this year's deficit could be as high as \$26 billion.

## Public's initial encounter with health care reform likely to be 'piece of mind' issues

WASHINGTON — For most Americans, the first tangible encounter with health care reform is likely to be a law that guarantees them continued insurance coverage regardless of their medical condition and prohibits insurers from raising premiums after they undergo expensive treatments, informed sources said Thursday.

Intended to address the concerns of the vast majority of Americans, who already have medical insurance, such "peace of mind" issues have always ranked high on the Clinton administration's list of health care reform goals.

And first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton has repeatedly made public statements to that effect since her Jan. 25 appointment as head of the White House Task Force on National Health Care Reform.

But until now, the administration has not expressed its intention to seek enactment of such insurance

reform "market reforms" as a first step in its overall agenda.

As President Clinton and the first lady continue to whittle down the array of options being presented to them by administration health policy analysts, the latest White House thinking is that insurance market reforms should be implemented as soon as possible — even as most Americans are being organized into large insurance purchasing alliances, sources said.

The formation of regional purchasing cooperatives is likely to take several years, sources said.

The theory behind the creation of such consumer alliances — known as managed competition — is that the cooperatives would shop among providers networks for an assortment of insurance plans that offer high quality at low prices.

Sources said Thursday that the administration's reform agenda also will require insurers to set premiums by using the average cost of covering an entire community, as proposed

to the current practice of setting rates based on the experiences of small, individual purchasing groups whose costs can rise sharply as the result of even one costly illness incurred by a group member.

Together, the reforms would quickly drive some small insurers from the market — thus making it easier to form health-orienting purchasing alliances, according to health policy analysts.

"They (administration officials) want to have open enrollment — no restrictions. That means guaranteed access and complete portability from one job to another," said one health policy analyst familiar with White House thinking.

Senior task force members, including Ira C. Magaziner, the group's day-to-day manager, have begun briefing members of Congress and various interest groups on the general outlines of the reform agenda. The president is expected to unveil his proposals before the end of May, possibly in a speech to a joint session of Congress.

## Columbia countdown plods along on course

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA sailed through its second countdown for space shuttle Columbia on Thursday, and the launch team appeared delighted to be back in action so soon after the last liftoff.

If Columbia departs on a science mission Saturday as scheduled, it would tie NASA's 16-day record for the shortest interval between shuttle launches, set in January 1986. Discovery left April 8 on an atmospheric research mission and returned last Saturday.

It also would be the shortest gap between a landing and launch — seven days — in 32 years of U.S. human space flight.

"This is what the team likes to do and it's what they do best," said shuttle test director Al Sofge. "The team is not the least bit hurried. The team is very relaxed, very comfortable, looking forward to the launch."

Forecasters gave 100 percent odds of good weather for Saturday's 8:52 a.m. MDT send-off.

NASA's first attempt to send

Columbia on the German Spacelab mission ended with an engine shutdown three seconds before liftoff on March 22.

The mission originally was supposed to be in 1988, but was put on hold along with all other shuttle flights after Challenger exploded shortly after liftoff on Jan. 28, 1986.

During the nine-day mission, seven astronauts will conduct medical tests and exercise experiments in involving baby fish, tadpoles, plants, melted glass and metals.

## Ex-House post office clerk gets 3 months

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former clerk at the House Post Office was sentenced Thursday to three months in a halfway house after pleading guilty to enticement and conspiracy charges.

U.S. District Judge Norma Holloway Johnson also ordered Wendell Magruder, 34, to spend two years on probation upon his release and to repay the almost \$14,000 in took from his stamp drawer at the House facility.

Magruder was indicted nearly a year ago on charges of conspiracy to distribute cocaine, enticement and concealing evidence from federal investigators.

### Ranchers can't keep public out of land management

Local ranchers may have good reasons to want to be rid of a controversial forest ranger, but complaining to a U.S. senator was the wrong approach.

A politically brokered, back-channel solution is the traditional way to solve such problems. But it's not how things should be done in the '90s and beyond.

As district ranger for the Sawtooth National Forest's Twin Falls District, Don Oman oversees a lot of grazing land. He is a dedicated and principled man, but he apparently has never learned to get along with the ranchers he works with.

Three years ago, the rancorous dispute spilled onto the pages of People magazine and the New York Times. Now it's back in the news.

In a recent letter to U.S. Sen. Larry Craig, Oakley rancher Don Pickett complained that Oman had allowed two outsiders — a vocal critic of public lands grazing and a Times-News reporter — to attend meetings between ranchers and Forest Service officials.

Pickett saw the intrusion as renewed proof of Oman's hostility to ranchers. He asked Craig to have Oman transferred or short of that to "bring this tyrant against grazing on public lands under control."

resource administered by someone you believe is out to get you. You'd lose a lot of sleep.

In this instance, though, Pickett was clearly wrong. Those meetings feature important discussion of how the public's land will be managed for the coming year. The public ought to be able to watch.

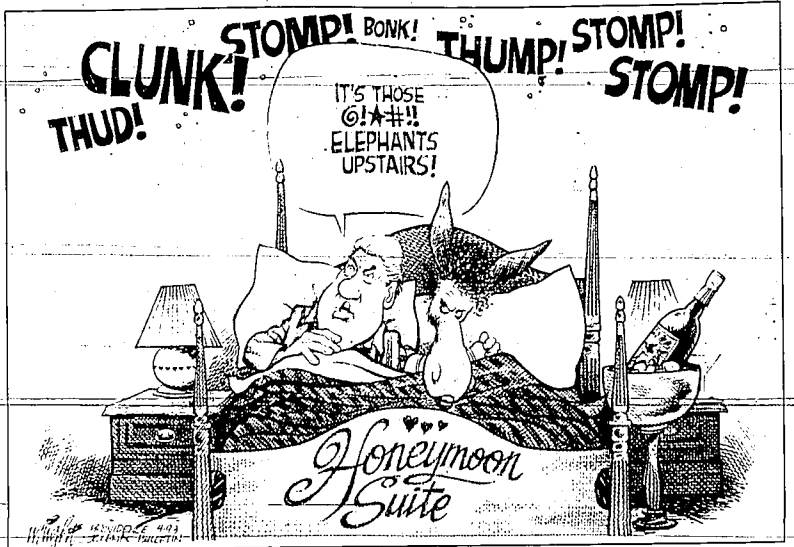
Pickett also made a mistake in writing to Craig. The letter, once it was made public, made the ranchers look as though they had something to hide in those meetings.

Nowadays, recreationists and conservationists are increasingly pushing their own agendas for use of public rangeland. Although ranchers have an important financial stake in the grazing leases that their families may have held for decades, they will have to accept public involvement in how the range is managed.

But Pickett was probably right on one point: The time probably has come for Oman to move on.

Oman won a significant victory by surviving the ranchers' ire as long as he has. Maybe he should let the fight end while he's ahead on points.

Meanwhile, everyone involved should try to cool off a little. The personal enmity between ranchers and Oman has too often eclipsed the main issue: management of the public land. To argue over who should be admitted to a meeting is to miss that point entirely.

### Who'll solve deficit?

Every married woman and child owes more than \$16,000 toward the national debt. This means a family of four owes more than \$64,000. ### Shame on dog dumpers

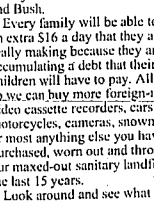
To the person or persons that dumped three dogs (two shepherd-type dogs and a small white dog) on Pole Line Road near Rock Creek:

# Gay rights opponents make their presence felt

Clinton won't march, but he's in touch with gay concerns

WASHINGTON — When supporters of gay and lesbian rights march through the capital by the hundreds of thousands Sunday, President Clinton will be far away. First in Jamestown, Va., for a Senate retreat, then in Boston to address newspaper publishers. Clinton has denied having "snubbed the gay community." But if some gay rights activists grumble that the president is "swinging them out of a growing caution to an embarking their issues, others are patient in their expectation of help from a president whose job will already have imperiled him politically.

Surveying the record, The Nation magazine this week said Clinton is running "the first pro-gay White House" despite distressing backsliding.

(WASHINGTON AP) Some preach fire and brimstone from the pulpit or distribute lurid videotapes of homosexuals parading in San Francisco. Others simply call their members of Congress to oppose lifting the military's ban on gays.

The opponents of expanded gay rights, from televangelists to ordinary citizens, won't be out in force this weekend during a major gay rights march in the nation's capital.

But their vocal arguments that giving homosexuals expanded rights will weaken America's military and corrupt the nation's children already resonate from the television airwaves to the top levels of government.

"Homosexuals are seeking governmental approval of their unnatural or immoral lifestyle," said Robert Dugan, Washington director of the National Association of Evangelicals, which represents 50,000 churches.

"It's a behavioral question, not a discrimination or civil rights question. It seems to me that homosexuals should not have special governmental acknowledgement of their lifestyle any more than child molesters or adulterers should."

Organizers predict as many as one million gay rights activists will march in Washington on Sunday in support of expanded civil rights legislation to protect gays and on an end to the military's ban on homosexuals.

Groups opposing the gay rights agenda range from veterans' organizations opposed to lifting the military ban to religious evangelists, anti-abortion groups, mainstream religious organizations and grassroots coalitions.

Their methods vary. Some prefer stinging rhetorical attacks like the

one launched by television commentator and GOP presidential candidate Pat Buchanan at last summer's Republican National Convention.

When President Clinton announced in January he was ordering an end to ban on gays in the military, religious broadcaster Pat Robertson urged members of his "700 Club" show to call Congress.

"When lawlessness is abroad in this land, the same thing will happen here that happened in Nazi Germany," Robertson said. "Many of those people involved in Adolf Hitler were Satanists, many of them were homosexuals — the two seem to go together."

A favorite anti-gay showpiece is "The Gay Agenda," a video showing transvestites and half-naked homosexual men gyrating at the annual San Francisco gay rights parade. Ho-

mosexual advocates say the tape is propaganda that depicts only a flamboyant minority within the gay community. Other opponents have gone the route of letter-writing, urging city councils to retain anti-sodomy ordinances or, as was the case last year, bumping anti-gay rights referendums before voters.

Will Perkins, who helped lead a successful effort to pass a law in Colorado forbidding civil rights protection on the basis of sexual orientation, focused on specific, least contentious allies rather than religious issues. "Most people don't equate practicing homosexuality with being black or Hispanic," said Perkins, a car dealer and chairman of Colorado for Family Values. "It does not meet any of the criteria that have been established to protect a class of people under the Civil Rights Act."

## Jury convicts Alabama governor on ethics charges; fight promised

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — The ouster of Republican Gov. Guy Hunt on a felony ethics conviction Thursday thrust Democratic Lt. Gov. Jim Eason into the governor's office even as Hunt promised a legal battle to regain it.

"We will be fighting to clear this and clear my name," Hunt, a Primitive Baptist preacher, said outside the courtroom. "This is not my battle now. It's the state of Alabama's battle."

The jury convicted Hunt of looting \$200,000 from his tax-exempt 1987 inaugural fund, a verdict that by law removes him from office in his second term as Alabama's first GOP governor this century.

Hunt, appearing stunned but dry-eyed, moved through the courtroom hugging weeping supporters after the verdict was announced on the ninth day of the trial.

Circuit Judge Randall Thomas called the 59-year-old Hunt to stand

before him in the courtroom as he set a May 7 date for sentencing.

The maximum penalty is 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Hunt's chief defense attorney, George Beck, said no appeal would be filed before the May 7 proceeding.

Hunt would be restored to office if the verdict is overturned on appeal by January 1995, the scheduled end of his term.

"Whether the governor violated the law to such an extent that he deserves the penitentiary, it's up to the judge," said Attorney General Jimmy Evans, the chief prosecutor. "Is the defendant remorseful or is the defendant arrogant?"

Hunt's conviction automatically eli-

minated the 43-year-old Folsom to the governor's office that his father, the late Gov. James E. "Big Jim" Folsom, held for two terms in the 1940s and 1950s.

On leaving the courtroom after becoming Alabama's first governor ousted for conviction of a felony, Hunt said he would go to the Governor's Mansion to pray with family and friends.

Later Thursday, he greeted his Cabinet members with handshakes and hugs on the mansion porch, summing them for a final meeting.

Folsom and Hunt also met at the mansion for about 20 minutes to discuss the need for an orderly transition," said Hunt spokesman Terry Abbott. "This has never happened before in Alabama. We're charting new territory."

Hunt, a farmer from Cullman County in northern Alabama, is the eighth governor in the United States this century to be indicted while in office.

## Regs place 900 numbers in jeopardy

WASHINGTON (AP) — The once flourishing world of 900 number telephone calls is in danger because of over-regulation by the federal government, industry executives told the Federal Trade Commission Thursday.

"Take for example the warning on the government wants in every TV commercial for a 900 number service," said one executive.

"It absorbs nine seconds, or almost one third of a 30-second ad, said Francis Moneym of the American Association of Advertising Agencies.

## Navy nominee faces Tailhook fallout

WASHINGTON — Texas lawyer John Dalton, nominated Wednesday to be secretary of the Navy, will face an immediate challenge in dealing with a long-awaited report on the Tailhook sexual abuse scandal.

The report, which is expected to be released today, reportedly will recommend disciplinary action against 140 officers for various acts of lewd and drunken misconduct at the 1991 convention of naval aviators at the Las Vegas Hilton.

Dalton, 51, will play a key role in any disciplinary action. According to Navy sources, Dalton is on a fast-track for Senate confirmation so he can take office quickly.

"Tailhook is definitely something I'm going to have to deal with, and it is a challenge. I will face early on," Dalton told The Associated Press.

He said President Clinton told him he wanted as secretary "someone who understands the Navy, had a Navy background, someone who knew the culture of the Navy and could make sure that the entire Navy did not have an adverse reaction" to how report is handled.

An earlier report by the Pentagon inspector general severely criticized top Navy officials for mishandling

their investigation of the scandal. The final report, dubbed "Tailhook II," is expected to provide an embarrassing portrait of hard-drinking carrier pilots posing themselves and engaging in other public misconduct.

Disciplinary cases will be referred to either Vice Admiral J. Paul Ryan, commander of the Atlantic Fleet

surface forces, or Marine Lt. Gen. Charles Krulak, who heads the Combat Development Command at Quantico, Va., depending upon the branch of service of the officer involved.

Reason and Krulak, neither of them aviators, will determine whether individual cases should be resolved by court-martial or by lesser disciplinary procedures.

## CDC claims too many doctors utilize C-sections

ATLANTA (AP) — Increasingly, women who had babies delivered by Caesarean section are giving birth vaginally in later pregnancies, but American doctors still perform the operation too often, federal health officials said Thursday.

Physicians in this country in 1991 performed 349,000 unnecessary Caesareans at a cost of more than \$1 billion, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said.

"The number of mothers who delivered vaginally after a previous Caesarean is rising, however, to 108,000 in 1991 — up from 20.4 in 1990, according to the latest CDC figures."

"That's the good news," said Dr. Sidney Wolfe of the consumer group Public Citizen in Washington, D.C. "Women need to know that the fact that they had a C-section once ... does not mean they have to have C-sections from then on."

Among the 966,000 Caesarean deliveries in 1991, about 35 percent were repeats. The overall Caesarean

rate was 23.5 per 100 births, unchanged from 1990. Only Brazil and Puerto Rico reported higher rates.

The national goal of lowering the rate to 15 Caesareans per 100 births — the rate the CDC deems medically appropriate — by the turn of the century, probably won't be met, said CDC statistician Selma Taffel.

"It's going to be extremely difficult," Ms. Taffel said. "We would have to have a rather large reduction in the primary Caesarean rate, and the primary rate has not changed substantially since 1986."

Bare at one time, C-sections, the common term for the surgery in which an obstetrician cuts open the uterus to deliver the baby, can cause infection and longer hospital stays. But the rate soared, from 10.4 births per 100 in 1975 to 24.7 births for every 100 in 1988.

Health care activists protested that many were unnecessary, accusing doctors of choosing the costly procedure to make money and schedule deliveries for their own convenience.

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## West Earthquake rattles town in Alaska

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) — A moderate earthquake was felt in Kodiak Thursday morning, the Alaska Tsunami Warning Center said.

The quake measured 5.1 on the Richter scale and struck at 4:46 a.m. about 85 miles southwest of Kodiak Island in the Pacific Ocean, center spokesman Alex Medders said.

He said the Kodiak Coast Guard station received reports of the quake being felt on the island, but had no reports of damage or injuries. No tsunami, or huge, destructive wave, was generated by the quake, he said.

The Richter scale is a measure of ground motion, as recorded on seismographs. Every increase of one number means a tenfold increase in magnitude. Thus a reading of 7.5 reflects an earthquake 10 times stronger than one of 6.5.

An earthquake of 3.5 on the Richter scale can cause slight damage in a local area, 4 can cause moderate damage, 5 considerable damage, and 6 can be severe. A 7 reading is a "major" quake, capable of widespread heavy damage.

## Defense opens trial in death of police officer

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Negligent homicide and leaving the scene charges should never have been lodged against the driver responsible in the death of a highway patrol trooper, the defense attorney said as trial began for Alberto Bueno.

Bueno, 27, a native of Casas Grandes, Mexico, faces four misdemeanor charges in the Dec. 11, 1992, death of Trooper Joseph S. Brunett, 24.

Brunett was trying to stop southbound traffic on Interstate 15 when he was hit by the truck driven by Bueno.

Defense attorney Solomon Chacon said Bueno admits driving without insurance and driving on a suspended license, but is innocent of negligent homicide and leaving the scene of an injury accident. "This was a most unfortunate accident. It was not negligent homicide," Chacon told the 3rd Circuit Court jury Wednesday.

He said witnesses would testify Brunett endangered himself in the way he was stopping traffic.

He said Bueno left the scene on foot to seek help and an interpreter.

## Utah auto insurance bill remains alive

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The sponsor of a vetted uninsured-motorist bill believes he has addressed the governor's concerns.

Gov. Mike Leach, a former insurance executive, had said he was concerned two many innocent drivers would be charged under the proposal to identify uninsured motorists and fine them \$600.

The sponsor, Rep. Kelly Atkinson, D-West Valley, said Wednesday he has addressed the problems that rankled the governor by only flagging drivers whose names turn up uninsured three months in a row.

Supporters of the legislation estimate Utah's insured drivers now pay an estimated \$30 million in premiums each year for uninsured motorists.

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## Docs press for tougher DUI law

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Utah's drunken-driving laws, one of the toughest in the nation, should be made tougher still, according to the Utah Medical Association.

"The UMA and other proponents of the stiffer law say drivers begin to be impaired at 0.04 percent blood-alcohol level — half of the current legal limit."

Looking to tougher laws next year, their motto is "Zero-four in '94."

Prosecutors and police say the light drinker who tests from 0.04 to 0.08 percent is not the problem — it's the heavy drinker with a 0.30 to 0.40 percent blood-alcohol level who does the damage. Dropping the limit will

not change that driver's habits. Utah already has some of the toughest DUI laws in the nation. Only five states have a .08 percent law, and few have an administrative revocation statute as strong as Utah's.

On Wednesday, the Citizens Council on Alcoholic Beverage Control heard pro and con views.

Chairman Al Cooper said factions behind the reduction are targeting the 1994 Legislature. The Utah Alcohol Policy Coalition has endorsed 0.04 percent and the citizens council is deciding its own stance, he said. The Utah Medical Association, which represents 85 percent of Utah's doctors, is backing the reduction.

State Public Safety Commissioner Douglas Hoddero said only five states have legal limits as low as Utah's. "Other states envy us," he said.

"We can arrest at 0.04 percent right now, or 0.02 percent," he said. "But below 0.08 percent, the burden of proof shifts from the defendant to the state."

At lesser levels of blood alcohol, a driver will not show as many signs of impairment. The police officer will have a tougher time explaining the reason for the stop, Hoddero said.

Boddero said the average blood-alcohol test in Utah now registers 0.16 percent. These are problem drinkers, not social drinkers, he said.

## Nevada cabbies may urge fares not to smoke

LAS VEGAS (AP) — The Nevada Taxicab Authority has given cab drivers permission to post signs in their cabs encouraging fares not to smoke.

The signs — reading "Thank You for Not Smoking" — were approved on a six-month trial basis.

After — that, — authority investigators, cab companies and drivers will report back to determine public reaction to the plan.

Under the plan approved Wednesday, drivers cannot refuse to accept fares who smoke.

Authority member Richard Devaux voted against the proposal, saying he preferred an outright smoking ban in cabs. New York City, Washington, D.C. and other major cities currently have such laws.

"I think we are not doing something that is common in this industry," Devaux told the board.

### Day care owner pleads innocent to charges

Gail M. Pufahl, 43, has entered innocent pleas in Magistrate Court to 32 counts of operating a day care without a fire inspection certificate and 11 counts of not having a state license.

Police watched Pufahl's home at 369 Polk St. for two days in March after receiving a complaint from the Department of Health and Welfare.

Pufahl says several children were dropped off at the home and records seized show Pufahl was operating a day-care-even though her state license has been revoked.

### Lincoln County man critical after being electrocuted

**KIMAMA** - A 35-year-old Lincoln County man was critically injured Thursday afternoon when he was electrocuted at his home, state police said.

Electricity to Russell-Orlman's home near the Lincoln-Minidoka county line had been shut off and he was trying to turn it back on using a metal pipe, Idaho State Police dispatcher Dee Silver said.

The pipe touched a high-voltage line at about 12:30 p.m., sending about 20,000 volts of electricity through Orlman's body, Silver said.

He suffered serious burns and was in critical condition when a helicopter took him to the Intermountain Burn Center in Salt Lake City, Silver said.

### Kimberly seed fire damages haystack, storage shed

**KIMBERLY** - A weed fire that got out of control east of Kimberly Wednesday caused about \$12,000 damage to a haystack and a storage shed, the Kimberly Fire Chief said.

The fire at the Norma Aslett residence one quarter mile east of Red Cap Corner on Idaho Highway 50 took about two hours to control, Fire Chief Rob Vawser said.

**BURLEY** - The Boise-based company digging a private landfill on Burley Butte farmland is seeking volunteers to serve on a citizens' advisory committee.

Dispose-All Inc. is asking volunteers to write to a Boise address, according to an advertisement printed Wednesday in the Mini-Cassia Review, an advertising circular.

Dispose-All is building a landfill eight miles west of Burley although it doesn't have all the permits needed to open a landfill.

The advertisement also unveiled the company's public-relations theme for its new landfill: "Harmony ... Balancing Community Need, Agriculture and the Environment."

Cassia County commissioners decided this week that no existing law can stop the construction, but they are sched-

uled to talk with company officials at 3 p.m. Monday in the courthouse in order to get more information about the project.

According to the advertisement: "The volunteer committee would act as a forum where Dispose-All and citizens can 'come together, learn and exchange ideas.'"

"The volunteers would advise Dispose-All of specific community concerns and offer suggestions for resolutions."

"The committee would tell the public of 'operational activities and environmental and regulatory compliance.'"

The ad says Dispose-All is committed to conserving Idaho's "precious resources" and "her great quality of life."

It further says Dispose-All Magic Valley is proposing to build a "state-of-the-art integrated waste management facility west of Burley."

Dispose-All President Doug Lomow did not return a re-

porter's telephone call Thursday. Dispose-All's actions have caused some controversy. A Southern Idaho Solid Waste District landfill is planned to be built on nearby Milner Butte, and county officials say they have no intention of using the Dispose-All facility if it is built.

Officials say they have also had difficulty in getting information about Dispose-All plans. And an Oklahoma City landfill run by Dispose-All has received poor reviews from Oklahoma regulators.

In another ad, Dispose-All advertises for a part-time community relations information position.

The person Dispose-All wants for the position would need to have lived in the Mini-Cassia area for 20 number of years and have been heavily involved in the commu-

# ICA petitions may be in circulation by May 10

**BOISE** - The Idaho Citizens Alliance hopes to launch its petition drive for an anti-gay rights initiative by May 10, Chairman Kelly Walton said Thursday.

The ICA moved one step closer to that goal Thursday, after Deputy Attorney General Frank Walker gave the measure official short and long titles.

The measure's short title is "An act establishing state policies regarding homosexuality." The long title summarizes what the initiative would do.

The titles, along with the initiative's text, will appear on petition forms and - if the measure gets signatures from 32,061 registered voters - on the 1994 ballot.

Walton, a Burley contractor, said about 1,200 people have volunteered to gather signatures for the ICA initiative.

The petition drive could be delayed if someone challenges the official titles. But Walton said he won't challenge them, although he called them "mediocre."

"It's not a Liegeit, but it'll fly," he said. "The attorney general didn't go out of his way to do me any favors, but it's not something I'm going to jump up and down and shout about."

Some had speculated that Attorney General Larry Echols might de-

cide that the measure had been changed so much from its original form that it was in fact a new initiative and required a new legal review. That would have delayed signature-gathering.

Also Thursday, Ada County Commissioner Gary Glenn

said public response has been overwhelmingly in favor of his coming out in support of the ICA initiative.

On Wednesday, Glenn became the state's first elected official to openly support the measure, saying he would sign petitions to put it on the ballot and encourage others to do the same.

"By drawing first fire, I hope to encourage other elected officials to do likewise," Glenn said.

"Idaho should protect the traditional legal institution of marriage, and our public schools and other agencies should not use public funds to promote or endorse homosexual behavior."

However, he did not commit to actively campaign for the initiative should it win a ballot position.

On Thursday, Glenn said 49 people called the commis-

## TJ window businesses lose money

**BOISE** - TJ International's window businesses lost money in the first quarter, after a strong showing last year.

The quarter, however, is traditionally the weakest of the year for the building-materials industry.

TJ International's subsidiary Norco Windows expects to maintain its current level of 100 employees through the year, officials say.

Norco has a factory in Twin Falls. The weak window business and higher lumber prices kept TJ International out of the black lumber prices the first quarter. The company's first-quarter sales jumped 51 percent, from \$75.6 million last year to \$114.1 million this year.

But it lost \$573,000, or 12 cents per share, com-

pared with \$806,000, or 16 cents per share last year.

The company also was hurt last quarter by its practice of allowing dealers to buy at whatever price happened, even if TJ International's costs had risen.

"This happened continuously throughout the first quarter," Chief Executive Officer Walt Minnick said.

Still, the company's should benefit in the long run from lumber increases.

"Because we use wood more efficiently, we directly benefit when the prices for commodity lumber - our chief competition - rise," Minnick said.

In addition to its windows, the company builds beams and other building products out of strips of more-common and cheaper lumber.

## Fate of Buhl Middle School undecided

**BUHL** - The Buhl School Board accepted the resignation of high school Principal Dennis Osman. Osman has accepted the position of high school principal in Gooding next year.

Buhl School Board members didn't reach any conclusions on whether to build a new middle school, but several cost estimates were tossed around at a recent meeting.

The new school could run at least \$5 million, and that doesn't include other costly improvements in the district.

A district facilities committee formed last fall to study the building needs of the school district made a report earlier this week, in which three of the 46 members recommended a new school be built. Members looked at overworking and the aging condition of the buildings.

The final recommendations included a list of priorities.

At the top of the list was a new \$4 million middle school, which would include grades five through eight, and a joint-use facility building.

The joint facility building would have a gym for practice, and another separate room that would be used for drama, art, music and also a lunchroom. The new building would be located west of the high school.

The committee felt the next logical step is to consult an architect and develop more detailed plans. No decision on the matter was made by the board.

Other improvements on the list include:

- An addition to the high school and elementary school.
- Modernization of the heating and cooling system at the elementary.

## Child molester will serve 10 years to life

**TWIN FALLS** - A Kimberly man was sentenced to life in prison Thursday for sexually molesting a 10-year-old girl.

Douglas Roberts, 57, will be eligible for parole in the year 2003. He had requested a probation after a jury convicted him in February of lewd conduct with a minor and sexual abuse of a child.

"It does not take a trained psychologist to realize the immense harm done to the victim," 5th District Judge Daniel Mechl said in a written decision.

"It took a lot of courage for the victim and her mother to stick to their story... A sentence of probation in this case would be an insult to that courage," Mechl wrote.

Roberts was on parole for the 1984 shooting death of his common-law wife in Jackpot, Nev.

He was the Elko County highway foreman when he shot Ranae Luddy, 38, in the chest with a .38-caliber handgun.

The two had been living to-

gether for seven years, but they were separated when Roberts shot her after finding her sleeping with another man.

Until his child molesting conviction, Roberts had lived with his current wife on her family's ranch south of Kimberly.

He is from a tightly knit family, Mechl wrote, and "is in the best of health, a responsible citizen; however, he loses control of himself in the heat of passion."

During the trial, Roberts' family testified that the girl who accused him of improper touching on at least two occasions during the early summer of 1992 had often lied and had wanted to get even with him after an argument.

But three other girls testified that they too had been molested by Roberts. One girl even broke into hives as she told her story.

Defense attorney Tom Kershaw said Roberts was prepared for the sentence and the family had not decided whether or not to appeal.

Roberts has until June 3 to appeal his conviction.

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## GOP financier resigns, joins campaign

State Republican Finance Chairman Roy Eignen announced Thursday that he will resign his post to become the finance chairman in the bid for governor of former GOP Lt. Gov. Phil Batt.

"While I know and greatly respect all of the candidates who are seeking the GOP nomination, over the last two years, Phil has proven his ability to tirelessly direct, organize people and raise funds — all of which are essential to a successful gubernatorial campaign," Eignen said.

Batt, a former legislator who lost a narrow race for governor in 1982, has been the state party chairman since early 1991 following a Republican rout at the polls.

In that time, the party raised a record \$12 million for the last campaign as Batt forged a coalition of the party's moderate and conservative wings to record a major electoral victory last November. He announced

early this year he would likely be a candidate to succeed Governor Cecil Andrus, who is retiring at the end of his unprecedented fourth term.

Batt, who immediately became the front runner not only for the nomination but to win the election, has said he would make a formal announcement of his candidacy this fall.

Meanwhile, Boise businessman Larry Eastland was pressing his bid for the GOP nomination in eastern Idaho, emphasizing education as his first priority.

"We need to focus inside the classroom and provide resources to make our children want to learn and get excited about school," Eastland told supporters at Blackfoot.

He said creating jobs, reinventing government to better serve Idahoans and taking a balanced approach to environmental and economic issues will also be key proponents of his campaign.

Boise developer Chuck Winder is the only formally announced candidate on the Republican side.

## State Bar president, Democratic chairman balk at Craig's plan

**LEWISTON (AP)** — The president of the Idaho State Bar and the chairman of the Idaho Democratic Party have declined Republican Sen. Larry Craig's invitation to serve on a committee to review Democratic Congressman Larry LaRocco's federal judge and prosecutor recommendations.

Craig announced formation of the committee earlier this month after LaRocco, as the only Democratic member of Idaho's congressional delegation, recommended that President Clinton nominate Lewiston lawyer John Tait as a federal judge and Boise lawyer Betty Richardson as U.S. attorney for Idaho.

But Craig's chief of staff, Greg Casey, said the decision had nothing to do with Tait or Richardson. He said

the state's senior senator would have formed a review committee even if a Republican was in the White House.

John Hohnhorst of Twin Falls, State Bar president, said he declined to serve on the committee because bar rules prohibit it. But Hohnhorst said the State Bar intends to provide Craig's office with a list of its members in order to mail questionnaires to them about LaRocco's recommendations.

Boise lawyer Bill Mauk, state Democratic Party chairman, said he declined to serve on the panel because he fears the public will see its formation as a negative comment on LaRocco's recommendations to President Clinton.

## 86-year-old man dies in fire; 62-year-old son OK

**MOSCOW (AP)** — An elderly Moscow man was killed when his house burned down, but his 62-year-old son escaped from the fire.

W. Lloyd Randle, 86, died Thursday of injuries suffered in the blaze. Officials at Grifman Medical Center

did not know the exact cause of death.

Randle's son, Charles T. Randle, was in the basement of the house when the fire broke out and escaped unharmed. Moscow Fire Marshal Don Strong said.

"It's just a tragedy something like this happened," said Bob Williams of Moscow, a family friend.

Crews from the Moscow Fire Department responded to the fire at 12:17 p.m. Thursday, and the unconscious Randle was removed from the burning house about 30 minutes later.

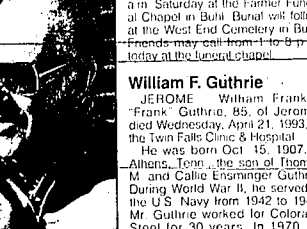
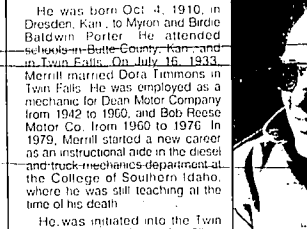

Thursday afternoon, the Sun Valley City Council listened to Fisher's presentation and invited him to come back when Mayor Rnh Lieder could be present to hear the plan. Sun Valley City Attorney Bruce Cullum said the council will discuss the Ketchum City Council presentation. Fisher said Ketchum and the Wood River Valley can expect continued growth, continued demand for services and housing, a need for secure year-round jobs and less state funding.

What Ketchum can do, said Fisher, is take "the seasonality out of the town," reduce its dependency on one industry, reduce its dependency on Sun Valley Co. and initiate a middle class.

In other business Wednesday the Ketchum council took public comment on the proposed zoning of land

previously annexed into the city in an effort to comply with requirements set by Fifth District Judge Phillip Becker.

Becker ruled March 24 that Ketchum did not follow proper procedure when it annexed Weyyakin and that two ordinances it passed to achieve that end are null and void.

- Expanding the elementary library.
- Demolition of the old portion of the middle school, but saving the gym and one wing that would remain.
- Installation of a parking lot on the old middle school site.

Terry Huddleston told board members the improvements could reach about \$5.2 million.

The figure does not include architect and engineering fees, bonding fees, site development, or any equipment.

Huddleston said these additional fees could increase the price by as much as 20 percent.

"Keep in mind these figures are estimates at best, and nothing more than that," he said.

Although the plan for a new middle school calls for a joint facility with an auditorium, and several said they would prefer one. Others were also concerned about the school being large enough to handle future

growth.

Resident Don Campbell said he felt the district should consider an auditorium at the middle school.

Pete Anderson, an architect the committee consulted, said a small auditorium that would seat 600 people would add at least \$1 million to the price tag. He said saving the old auditorium would cost as much as building a new one.

Kyle Wood, the drama instructor, said Coleur d'Alene has a joint use facility with an auditorium, and said the district needs to plan 30-40 years ahead.

"If we have rooms where kids can bounce basketballs, I hope the kids on stage get the same opportunity," said Candy Atkins, band instructor.

Board member Dan Nofziger said the school probably won't be large enough in 15 years if the Twin Falls area grows as projected.

An anonymous donor has provided concrete, which can be used to help make a dog kennel. Pauli hopes experienced concrete workers will show up to help pour a slab.

On Sunday, plans will be arranged for the removal of Kelly's property, and he is looking for anyone with a green thumb to help. "Pauli said.

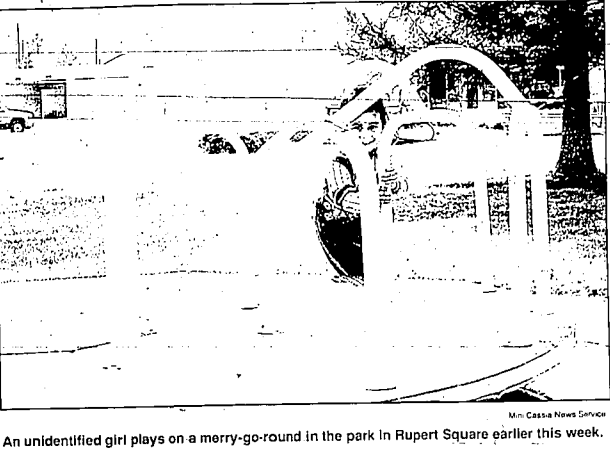
Anyone wanting further information on the cleanup may call the city public works department at 436-4900 or come to the Kelly property at 423 South "C" Street.

# Mini-Cassia Goodworth flees 'stress' of Bonneville

**IDMHO FALLS (AP)** — The new Minidoka County School administrator says he's tired of being the "point man" in Idaho Falls, but some say he was unimpressive for 10 years.

The Bonneville superintendent for 10 years will leave the district June 30 to begin his new job as assistant superintendent of Minidoka County Schools.

Richard Goodworth, 55, and he considered taking a less stressful assistant's job for several years but made his final decision Tuesday.

"It is time for a change. I need that change, and the district is at a time when it can benefit also," Goodworth said in a press release.

During his tenure, Goodworth oversaw the building of five new schools, including Hillsdale High School, which is completing its first year. He also took over the district's policy and procedure manuals and accounting procedures.

But Goodworth also has drawn fire from a number of teachers and patrons who alleged he was unresponsive and gruff. Some patrons were angered by the district's decision to build Idaho Falls High School instead of adding on to Bonneville High School.

"After 22 years of being the point man I was ready to move on," Goodworth said. "There are always some critics. Any superintendent has to make hard decisions, and that's not the way to win friends."

A 26-year veteran of education, Goodworth took his first superintendent job in San Miguel, Colo. He later was superintendent at Park City, Utah, for eight years before coming to Idaho Falls in 1983.

He said he hopes forward to specializing in financial matters and secondary education in the Minidoka County School District.

# Getaway car stalls; police nab youths

Heyburn Police Officer Earl Andrew spotted the car near the junction and had pulled it over when it sped away eastward on Interstate 84.

Andrew followed at speeds exceeding 100 mph before his car overtook and he had to give up, Minidoka County Sheriff Paul Fries said.

Eventually, sheriff's deputies from Minidoka, Cassia and Power counties, city officers from Rupert, Heyburn and American Falls, and Idaho State Police officers from two districts became involved in the chase.

The car, with its engine seaming, finally was pulled over near milepost 45 on Interstate 86, 55 miles from where the chase started, Fries said.

## Briefly

### Babysitter/boyfriend convicted in death

**SPOKANE** — An Idaho man accused of killing his girlfriend's 21-month-old son while babysitting has been convicted of second-degree murder.

The Spokane County Superior Court jury deliberated for two hours Wednesday before returning the guilty verdict against Mark E. Burch, 29, of Lewiston.

Sentencing was set for May 10. Burch faces 10 to 15 years in prison, deputy prosecutor Dawn Cortez said.

Burch was accused of beating John Bilby into unconsciousness on May 6, 1992, to stop him from crying. When the child's mother, Veronica Bilby, returned home from work, she was unable to wake the youngster.

The child died two days later. Medical evidence presented at the trial indicated the boy's brain injury and internal bleeding were caused by an attack with a blunt object. Burch contends the child's injuries were accidental — a fall down some steps and banging his head while playing.

### Injured pilot recovers from surgery

**SPOKANE** — A crop duster whose plane collided with a Navy jet on a training flight was in critical condition Thursday after undergoing reconstructive surgery.

Keith Graham of Homedale had extensive surgery on his face Wednesday at Deaconess Medical Center, family attorney Fred Pflanz said. Graham remained in critical condition this morning, a nursing supervisor said.

Graham was injured when his small plane collided with a Navy A-6E Intruder near Steptoe Butte, northwest of Coeur d'Alene, on April 14. The jet, based at Whidbey Island Naval Air Station, was on a low-altitude training mission.

Dozens of individuals and companies have contributed more than \$6,700 to a fund to help cover Graham's medical expenses, his wife, Danita Graham, said at a news conference.

### Panhandle mayor recalls Holocaust

Coeur d'Alene Mayor Ray Stone helped liberate the Nazi death camps in World War II and says the new Holocaust museum will go a long way in helping people remember what mankind is capable of doing.

Stone attended dedication ceremonies for the new museum this week in Washington, D.C. He said he is appalled by a recent survey which indicates a significant portion of American adults doubt 6 million Jews were killed by the Nazis.

"When the survivors and liberators are long gone, this will still be here as proof that the Holocaust did happen," he said.

### Ex-Marine receives heroism award

**MOSCOW** — A Vietnam combat veteran who pulled a downed buddy to safety while bullets danced around his feet will finally be recognized for his valor.

Paul Uphregrave of Moscow, a Marine squad leader in 1965, was slated to receive the Bronze Star on Thursday from the Navy ROTC unit at the University of Idaho. "It's sort of like putting 'Paid in Full' on some things," said Uphregrave, 50.

The almost three decades between the heroism and the honor, said Uphregrave, is the product of a "clerical mistake" that took 20 years to unravel.

### Man shot while hunting wild turkeys

**LEWISTON** — Wild turkey hunting is relatively new to Idaho, and a shooting near Lapwai is the state's first involving the sport, Idaho Fish and Game officials say.

Wednesday's accident occurred near Lapwai. Nez Perce County Sheriff Ron Koepfer said rescue workers found Greg Reed, 28, of Lewiston, with face and neck injuries caused by a gunshot wound.

He was listed in fair condition Wednesday evening at a Lewiston hospital. "It's still under investigation and we're taking statements, but from all indications it was strictly a hunting accident," Koepfer said.

Preliminary reports indicated the accident occurred as Reed and his hunting partner, James Holcomb, 42, of Lewiston were hunting together.

Holcomb apparently shot at a turkey that had crossed between the two, Koepfer said.

Fish and Game sponsored turkey-hunting clinics in hopes of avoiding a shooting accident this spring.

# Idahoans may vote on prison help

**BOISE (AP)** — The state Board of Correction is considering a direct appeal to voters next year for a source of tax revenue dedicated to building and operating new prisons.

"I'm not totally convinced that people in this state aren't willing to spend a little more to make sure people are confined," Idaho Department of Corrections director Richard Vernon said at Thursday's board meeting.

Gov. Cecil Andrus said later that he would support an attempt to put the issue on the 1994 ballot, but that he would not back requests for millions of dollars from existing taxes to expand Idaho's crowded prison system.

"We cannot and I will not continue

to take existing revenue sources that are needed for education and the other crying needs in our society and dump them into more concrete and steel to lock up people in our penitentiary system," Andrus said.

However, "I would support any type of an activity where you would be able to judge the citizens' willingness to pay for this," he said. "The board is attempting to come to grips with the problem, and their efforts have to be applauded."

Board members talked to Deputy Attorney General Terry Anderson about the legalities of asking voters, through a November 1994 ballot measure, to approve a funding source for prison construction and operation. Board Chairman Nick Miller of

Boise said the type of tax hike Corrections may ask next year's Legislature to put on the ballot will be discussed in the coming months. Also to be decided is whether bonds or some other financing method would be used if voters approve the revenue source.

Miller said prison officials may have no choice but to seek public support for their needs if lawmakers, and Andrus continue to oppose building more inmate bed space while other state funding needs are going unmet.

"This might be more palatable to the Legislature because they don't have to raise taxes — they let the voters do it," he said. Idaho's inmate population,

currently about 2,500, is increasing by about 200 a year. And even with a 128-bed women's prison in Pocatello and a 190-bed addition to the main penitentiary south of Boise scheduled to open late this year, Corrections may ask lawmakers for about \$6 million in new construction and planning money next January.

The board on Thursday discussed asking the 1994 Legislature for about \$500,000 for a 100-bed work camp to be built at a national forest site yet to be identified, about \$800,000 for a community work center, probably in Post Falls; and about \$4 million to build a 192-bed "special needs facility" and related infrastructure at the main prison complex south of Boise.

## Clerk gave Weaver wrong court date

**BOISE (AP)** — A deputy court clerk testified on Wednesday that he advised U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan that white separatist Randy Weaver had been given the wrong court date before Ryan issued a warrant for Weaver's failure to appear on the 1991 weapons charge.

But under further questioning by Assistant U.S. Attorney Ronald Howen, Ronald Haberman backed away from that statement.

"I'm saying I communicated that to judge Ryan," Haberman told Howen. "But I'm not sure when or how." But Ryan, in the presence of Howen and Weaver's former defense attorney, still signed the warrant that set in motion the events leading up to the violent confrontation last summer that left a federal marshal and Weaver's wife

and teen-age son dead on Ruby Ridge in northern Idaho. Federal probation officer Karl Richins admitted to jurors earlier in the day that while court officials advised him that Weaver should appear for trial on Feb. 20, 1991, he mistakenly told Weaver the date was March 20, 1991. Then-U.S. Magistrate Stephen Ayers testified earlier he had originally set the trial for Feb. 19.

The testimony in the second week of the murder-conspiracy trial for Weaver, 45, and Kevin Harris, 25, appeared to bolster the defense contention that the government was

completely off base when it obtained the Feb. 20, 1991, fugitive warrant for Weaver.

The federal indictment against Weaver on the fugitive charge, which superseded Ryan's warrant, was issued on March 14, 1991, — some six days before Richins had told Weaver he was to show up.

It was Weaver's failure to appear that prompted federal marshals to put his mountaintop cabin under surveillance for 18 months until an unexpected exchange of gunfire last Aug. 21 triggered the deadly 11-day standoff.

Weaver and Harris are accused of murdering Deputy Marshal William Degan in the initial shootout. Fourteen-year-old Samuel Weaver also died in that firefight, and Vicki Weaver, 42, was killed by a sniper's bullet the next day.

Richins said he was made aware of his mistake after the actual court date had passed. And defense attorneys introduced as evidence a Feb. 26, 1991, memo in which Richins' supervisor said a newspaper reporter had contacted the office asking about the mistake and was told that office was not aware of it at that time. The memo said the mistake was discovered after that telephone call prompted an inquiry of the court.

## Crnkovich sues for costs

**WALLACE (AP)** — After emerging unscathed from two trials on corruption charges, former Shoshone County Sheriff Frank Crnkovich is demanding the county pay the costs.

In an April 14 letter to the county commissioners, Crnkovich's attorney, Sam Eismann, threatened to sue if the county does not respond to the \$104,000 claim within 10 days.

Prosecutor Dan McGee on Wednesday said it was passed on to the county's liability insurance carrier, the Idaho Counties Reciprocal Management Program in Boise. But he does not expect the

program to cover the claim.

The same group refused to pay a similar claim filed by former sheriff's deputy John Maucoletel in 1991 because it did not fit the criteria of being an error or omission by the county. The commissioners then had to open the budget to meet Maucoletel's demand for \$8,000.

"There's a very slim chance it would be covered," McGee said. "I would anticipate that Crnkovich would have to sue the county."

Eismann said a year ago he believes Crnkovich has the same right as Maucoletel to demand reimbursement.

## Eliminate exemption, group says

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** — The president of the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho has endorsed eliminating sales tax exemptions while lowering the 5 percent tax rate as the most politically palatable way of raising more cash for state operations.

"Expand the base at the same time you are trying to bring the rate down — I think that is the ideal kind of system," Randy Nelson told eastern Idaho business leaders.

Nelson said income tax rates are already higher than in many other states and there is at least a public perception that property tax is already excessive.

That leaves the sales tax as the only other place the state can generate substantial new revenue to underwrite education, prison, health care and other programs.

**Italian premier announces resignation**

ROME — Premier Giuliano Amato announced his resignation Thursday, bringing an end to postwar Italy's 51st government four days after Italians overwhelmingly voted for political reform.

Amato's decision, which was widely expected, came after a day of debate in the Chamber of Deputies on how to respond to the radical change demanded by voters. "I am going now to put my resignation in the hands of the head of state," Amato told a half-empty chamber.

President Oscar Luigi Scalfaro was to name the next premier, who will be tasked with carrying out electoral reform and rescuing Italy's battered economy.

**German bank tries to boost economy**

BERLIN — Germany's central bank lowered interest rates Thursday in the latest attempt to boost the nation's economy and ease currency turmoil in the European Community.

The Bundesbank's policy-making Central Council announced after its weekly meeting in Frankfurt that the discount rate was lowered to 7.25 percent from 7.5 percent. The Lombard rate was cut to 8.5 percent from 9 percent.

The discount rate is the Bundesbank's cheapest rate for loans to commercial banks. The Lombard rate is the rate at which banks can borrow emergency funds from the central bank.

The Bundesbank has been under heavy pressure for more than a year to ease its monetary policy and help encourage domestic and global economic growth.

**Cease-fires crumble again in Bosnia**

TUZLA, Bosnia-Herzegovina — One truce was ignored and another jeopardized Thursday as Muslims and Croats battled for a seventh day and Serbs accused Muslims of withholding weapons from U.N. peacekeepers.

U.N. officials said Muslims and Croats, one-time allies against Serbs in the yearlong war over Bosnia's secession from Yugoslavia, fought again over Vitez, southeast of Sarajevo. But the combat was slightly less intense.

Yugoslavia's Tanjug news agency, citing Sarajevo radio, said Croat artillery shelled Muslim troops around Kiseljak northwest of the Bosnian capital. The most intense fighting was around Jahnina, 25 miles west of Sarajevo, the report said. It was not clear who attacked whom in the latest round of violence. But several times in the past, it has been the Croats who have attacked Muslims to win territory as a peace deal looked imminent or international pressure increased on the Serbs.

**World travel expected to double soon**

PARIS — The number of international tourists is expected to double to 935 million annually during the next two decades, a travel group said Thursday.

The World Tourism Organization said factors behind the projected increase include earlier retirements in many countries, easing of visa restrictions and the increased earning power of women.

The organization said 456 million people traveled abroad in 1990, compared with about 25 million in 1950. The top five tourist destinations in 1992, attracting 40 percent of foreign travelers, were: France, the United States, Spain, Italy and Hungary, the organization said.

**Korean Buddhists demand equality**

SEOUL, South Korea — About 3,000 Buddhist monks and parishioners demonstrated peacefully Thursday to demand that President Kim Young-sam ensure religious equality.

Protesters carrying yellow, red and blue banners marched from a rally at a temple in central Seoul, led by gray-robed monks beating ceremonial gongs and drums. "As head of state, President Kim must stop favoring Christians," read one banner. Kim, a Presbyterian who is South Korea's first civilian president in three decades, has introduced broad reforms since taking office in February. But Buddhists contend he is lukewarm in addressing religious discrimination.

**Germans charged with WWII killings**

KOBLENZ, Germany — Prosecutors charged two former German soldiers with murder Thursday in the revenge killing of 15 Italian women and children during World War II.

The case had been thwarted for decades because a U.S. military officer gave investigators a wrong name for one of the suspects.

The two men, identified as Wolfgang Lebnigk-Emden, 70, and Kurt Schuster, 78, are accused of attacking a farmhouse full of civilians with hand grenades, guns and knives.

**Mourners pay homage to Turkish leader**

ISTANBUL, Turkey — Hundreds of thousands of mourners, some weeping and tossing red carnations, thronged the burial procession of President Turgut Ozal on Thursday.

Ozal died in Ankara, the capital, of heart failure Saturday. His body lay in state in Ankara before being flown to Istanbul, where he wanted to be buried. Ozal, who became president in 1989, helped guide Turkey's economic recovery and made it a regional military power while maintaining its strong ties with the West.

**Egyptian court rules death for extremists**

HAEKSTAP, Egypt — An Egyptian military court convicted a group of Muslim extremists of attacking foreign tourists and trying to overthrow the government Thursday, and sentenced seven of them to hang. Another 25 were sentenced to prison terms of up to 25 years.

The defendants, mostly bearded and all wearing flowing white galabiyas and carrying copies of the Koran, chanted anti-government slogans after Maj. Gen. Mohammed Wagdy al-Laitiy, the chief judge, read the sentences.

**Factions decimate Cambodian resources**

SIEM-REAP, Cambodia — War costs big money. Politics, too. To finance both, the four factions trying to wrest control of Cambodia — whether through the ballot box or barrel of a gun — are stripping the hard-luck nation of its cultural treasures and natural resources.

"Should the dream of peace ever come, the Cambodian people will awaken to a new nightmare of a nation picked clean of its cultural heritage, like a skeleton by crows," said Pich Keo, director of Cambodia's National Museum in Phnom Penh.

The pillage ranges from the theft of priceless artifacts from ancient temples to the clear-cutting of vast stands of tropical hardwoods.

Art treasures and timber alike are for the most part smuggled into Thailand, then surreptitiously auctioned off to the highest bidder, be it a European art collector or mammoth Japanese construction firm,

**China wary of country's strife**

BEIJING (AP) — A Foreign Ministry spokesman said Thursday that China will not support any of the four Cambodian factions if civil war breaks out, but declined to say if it would use its influence with the Khmer Rouge to prevent fighting.

The Chinese-backed Khmer Rouge and three other factions signed the Paris peace agreement

in 1991 to end 13 years of war and approve U.N.-sanctioned elections.

But the Khmer Rouge has since said it will never accept the results of the elections, and won't rule out violence to disrupt the polling, scheduled for late May.

The Khmer Rouge recently moved its headquarters out of Phnom Penh, sparking fears it was preparing for open warfare.

according to officials of the United Nations Transitional Authority in Cambodia, or UNTAC.

"When it comes to illegal timber exports, the Khmer Rouge are certainly not the only violators and may not even be the worst," said a Phnom Penh-based U.N. economist. "All four factions have intensive logging operations in the areas under their control.

"The fact is, some of the heaviest fighting we've seen in recent months has been for control of timber rights, not for 'national liberation' or any of the other justifications these parties have used for savaging the nation they claim to be trying to save," said the economist, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The rape of the forests has been going on for years. But the ancient

Hindu temples and Buddhist monuments, including the famed Angkor Wat complex, have only recently come under large-scale assault by an thieves after surviving the Khmer Rouge horror and two decades of civil war fairly unscathed.

"The opening of the country with the arrival of UNTAC brought the existence of these treasures into the light of world attention after years of darkness in Cambodia," said James Jelen, deputy provincial director for UNTAC.

Poorly paid government soldiers together with deserters from various guerrilla groups have organized into gangs to loot the temples, which are often poorly guarded. "An illiterate guard, who perhaps hasn't been paid in months because the government is in such disarray, can be bribed to turn his head for a couple of dollars and perhaps a bottle of Chivas Regal for his officer," said Im Sotha, who supervises workers restoring sections of the Angkor Wat complex damaged by years of neglect.

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



## Opposition steps up campaign against Yeltsin

**IZHEVSK, Russia (AP)** — Boris Yeltsin flew to the most military-dependent region of Russia on Thursday to pitch for support in the referendum on his leadership. Opponents stayed home and accused the president of plotting a coup.

The mud slinging was heavy going into the final days of the campaign for Sunday's vote.

Yeltsin's one-time ally and now rival, Vice President Alexander Rutskoy, demanded air time on Russian television to report "corruption in top echelons of state power," the IFA-Rass news agency said.

He rejected a chance to debate others on a Friday program and accused Russian television of bias for Yeltsin, the agency said.

And the Supreme Soviet legislature, locked in a power struggle with Yeltsin for months, issued a statement charging the president was engineering extensive election fraud and planning to impose one-man rule on election night.

Yeltsin's aides denied the allegations, contained in a Supreme Soviet statement quoting unidentified sources in the Security Ministry.

But during a whirlwind trip to the headquarters of defense plants, Yeltsin promised "a series of decisive, harsh measures." He refused to elaborate.

The coup plot charges came a day after the Constitutional Court handed Yeltsin a victory, saying he needs only a majority of votes cast to win the ballot on confidence in his

leadership. The Communist-dominated parliament had set a requirement for a majority of eligible voters, which would have made it nearly impossible for Yeltsin to win.

Hard-line opponents of Yeltsin's free-market economic reforms have

frequently accused him of plotting to seize absolute power.

In a pitch for votes at a collective farm in the village of Yakshur, Yeltsin appealed: "Do not turn away from your president." Several people shouted back: "We are with you. We

support you." Later, he told managers at the Izmay factory — which makes cars, Kalashnikov rifles and appliances — Yeltsin promised the region would receive \$250 million of the aid President Clinton earmarked for Russia.

## Russians worry over Yeltsin aid backlash

**MOSCOW (AP)** — While Western countries have earmarked billions of dollars in new aid to help Boris Yeltsin in his battle with reform opponents, some Russians are worrying it will backfire.

Some also complain the assistance is not coming quickly enough and is not in the right areas.

A week after the Group of Seven industrialized countries approved \$28.4 billion for Russia and a day after the International Monetary Fund announced a \$6 billion aid package, Russian and foreign analysts are pleased that the West has adopted a more realistic approach. The West is easing up on its demands that reforms in Russia take place before aid is delivered.

But economist Oleg Bogomolov put it in an interview with The Associated Press: "It's not a sign of great generosity."

Since the aid was intended largely to bolster Yeltsin, before Sunday's referendum on his presidency and economic policy, some experts see it as counterproductive.

"This connection with domestic disputes probably encouraged the right-wing of our political spectrum, the nationalist opposition, and promotes a further split in our society," said Bogomolov, director of the Institute of the International Economy and Political Research.

Some of Yeltsin's hard-line opponents accuse him of relying too

much on aid from the West, calling it humiliating for Russia to seek foreign help.

Many Russians also complain they have seen little of the aid promised earlier and are skeptical the West will keep its new promises.

Alexei Pushkov, deputy editor-in-chief of the weekly Moscow News, wrote that only \$1 billion of the \$28 billion promised last year has been made available.

"The extreme opposition has gained a solid argument to back its claims that the West cannot be a steadfast partner of Russia," Pushkov wrote.

Much of the aid was held up because Yeltsin's government failed to meet conditions such as curbing inflation, eliminating the budget deficit, converting defense industries and privatizing the economy. Yeltsin has been unable to move quickly in these areas because of legislative opposition and concern that massive unemployment and social unrest would result.

Yeltsin himself appears to be so worried about Russian reaction to the new pledges of aid that he has not tried to take credit for them in his pre-referendum campaign appearances. Instead, he has sounded defensive.

"Russia has never rejected a helping hand," Yeltsin told a hostile audience of state factory directors and business leaders last week.

## Russia fires archive chief over POW documents

**MOSCOW (AP)** — The head of a Russian depository of top-secret documents has been fired because of the leak of a disputed report on the fate of U.S. prisoners of war in Vietnam, a state archive spokeswoman said.

The spokeswoman also said the document was believed authentic, but refused to speculate about the reliability of its contents.

The document, a report to the Communist Party Politburo in North Vietnam, says 624 American aviators were prisoners in September 1972, more than listed in American or Vietnamese records. It was discovered in the Contemporary Documentation Center in Moscow, containing material from the archives of the Soviet Communist Party.

Stephen J. Morris, a fellow at

Harvard University's Russian Research Center, obtained a copy several months ago, said archive spokeswoman Natalya Krivova.

The joint U.S.-Russian commission on American POWs got a copy only recently, Col. Anatoly Volkov, a commission spokesman, said Thursday. The commission, which searches for information on missing American servicemen, is co-chaired by Gen. Dmitry Volkogonov, a Russian military historian, and Malcolm Toon, former U.S. ambassador to Moscow.

On Monday, the board of the State Archives Service dismissed Ren Usikov as director of the documentation center for "violating regulations on access to confidential material," said Krivova.

## Pro-apartheid party leader dies at 72

**CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP)** — Andreus Treurnicht, the leader of the pro-apartheid Conservative Party, died Thursday, a party spokesman said. He was 72.

The party's chief whip, Frank le Roux, said Treurnicht died in a Cape Town hospital several days after undergoing heart bypass surgery. He gave no details.

Treurnicht's death came at a difficult time for the party, which has opposed President F.W. de Klerk's reforms to dismantle apartheid and had one of its most prominent leaders implicated in the slaying of ANC activist Chris Hani.

## Traveling the Oregon Trail

3 million expected to visit sites during sesquicentennial summer

**TWIN FALLS** — In the spring of 1843, a thousand people gathered in Independence, Missouri, ready for the adventure of their lives.

Before the Great Migration closed about 25 years later, more than 300,000 Americans had used Oregon Trail and its cutoffs to seek new homes in the lush valleys of Oregon and the gold fields of California.

A century and a half later, interest in the Oregon Trail is at an all-time high. Tourism officials along the 2,000-mile route expect as many as 3 million people — 10 times the number who made the original trek — will travel all or part of the trail during the trail's sesquicentennial summer.

Many visitors will see ruts etched so deep in hillsides and sandstone that, 150 years later,

they'll swear the wagons just rolled by. Others will climb grand geological landmarks like Wyoming's Independence Rock to look for emigrant signatures etched long ago.

And everyone who travels the trail will wonder: What ever possessed the pioneers to make this trip? Why would anyone leave the safety of the United States to endure six months of choking dust, searing heat and rain-swollen river crossings along a trail lined with grave sites and discarded possessions?

The emigrants had their reasons. Many were fed up with poor Eastern soil, which was overpriced, overcrowded and worn thin through excessive cultivation. Land in Oregon, by contrast, was plentiful and cheap.

Other pioneers were motivated by patriotism and the notion of "manifest destiny." In the early 19th century, the Northwest was shared with the British. Many emigrants felt sure that if enough Americans settled in Oregon, the United States could lay a legitimate sole claim to the area.

Still others simply had the urge to push seaward as their ancestors had done for generations. ... from Europe to the New World, from Plymouth Rock to Philadelphia, from Pennsylvania across the Alleghenies to Ohio and Kentucky and Missouri and on across the plains.

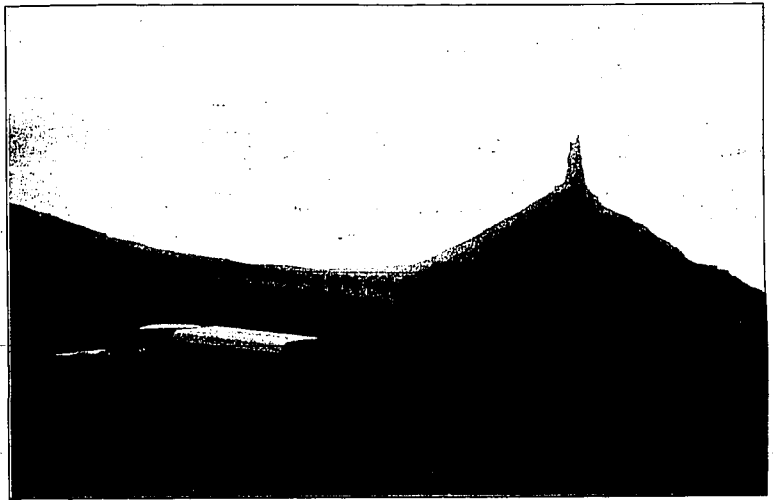
"The Oregon Trail pioneers were the entrepreneurs of the 1840s," says John Meek, an Oregon state legislator who spent the summer of 1992 retracing the emigrant trail in reverse. "They operated, solely on a vision of the future."

Meek is the descendant of Joe Meek, a well-known frontiersman who helped establish Oregon's provisional government in 1843. The modern-day Meek and his 17-year-old daughter, Shaena, spent 100 days on the trail last summer, riding horseback by day and camping out each night as they crossed Oregon, Idaho, Wyoming, Nebraska and Kansas before reaching the original start in Missouri. "We had an experience which, at least in our lifetimes, was second to none," he says.

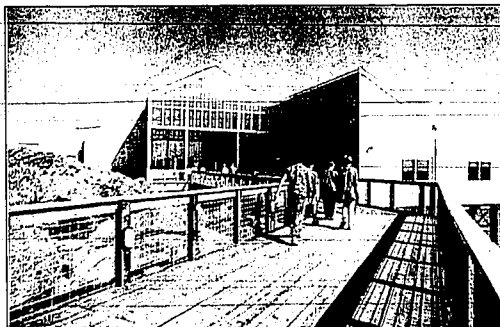
Indeed, the Oregon Trail has a lot to recommend it as a family vacation. A trail trip is interesting, educational and informal. Much of the route runs parallel to interstate highways, although it's easy enough to find back roads to explore. Best of all, an Oregon Trail trip is blessedly easy on the pocketbook, since most historic sites are free or cheap, and since most of the trail winds far from expensive cities and theme parks.

It's possible to drive the trail in less than a week, but anyone who can spare a few extra days will find the trip far more rewarding. For best results, set aside nine days out of a two-week vacation.

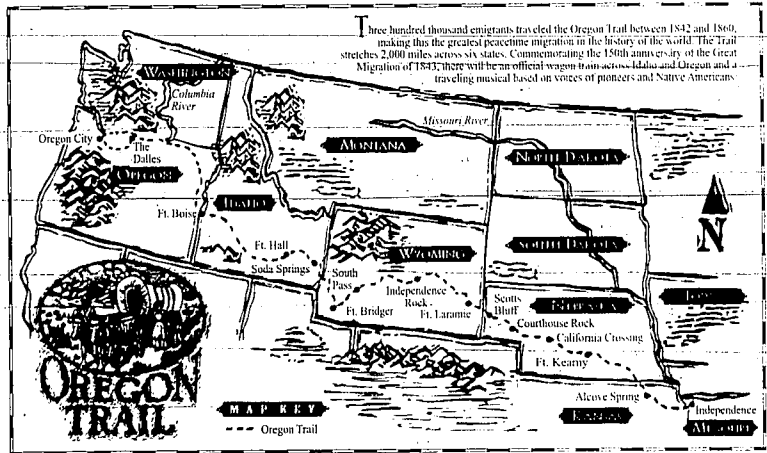

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## 'Indecent Proposal' leaves couples questioning

**LOS ANGELES** — "Indecent Proposal" is well on its way to becoming a blockbuster, even though critics have denounced it as an inept, anti-feminist send-up. The movie, which stars Demi Moore as a married woman who for \$1 million sleeps with a billionaire portrayed by Robert Redford, "Indecent Proposal" earned \$18.4 million the first weekend it was released and \$24.5 million in its first 10 days.

"This is an opening you'd find more in line with male action movies," said Barry London, marketing chief for Paramount Pictures, which released the movie. "The film obviously has become a salient, ethical issue."

Industry analysts say most of the customers so far have been women, although as the movie's reputation spreads more couples are showing up. Many are asking each other, "Would you?"

The movie relates the trauma that results when an aging, dashing billionaire (Robert Redford) offers a debt-ridden couple (Moore and Woody Harrelson) a million dollars if the wife will spend the night with him.

The woman who wrote the screenplay, Amy Holden Jones, said the money is irrelevant. "I don't believe the woman actually sold herself for a million dollars; I think she wants to sleep with Robert Redford." Jones' movie is a metaphor for marital betrayal and infidelity. What few people notice — it's barely mentioned — is that once they've made love, nobody particularly cares about what they do with the

"I am interested in sexuality, and people always fly into a rage about sex," director Adrian Lyne said. "It's bizarre but very interesting. I wonder what the reaction would be if the story dealt with being paid \$1 million to blow someone away."

It's the second time in five years that Lyne has gotten America's undivided attention with a sex drama. He also directed "Fatal Attraction," the 1988 movie starring Michael Douglas, Glenn Close and Anne Archer about a scorned woman who turns homicidal after a weekend fling with a married man and is killed by his faithful wife.

In "Indecent Proposal," Moore plays, if not exactly a stay-at-home type like Archer, a woman who has subordinated her career to her husband. But when she sacrifices her monogamy for his financial good, she isn't punished but rewarded, when her husband and her lover feverishly compete for her favors. —Both movies, in other words, can be seen as female fantasies, contemplating the loosening of the bonds of matrimony from a wife's perspective. In one, a husband's infidelity summons pain, in the other a woman's brings pleasure. And in both cases, it's the wife's prerogative to put things back together.

But most critics of "Indecent Proposal" — and there have

been many so far inside and outside the film industry — see the movie as another woman-as-clay story, much to Jones' annoyance.

"The critical reaction doesn't jibe (with) the reaction of the audience that I like to reach, which is the women in the country, who don't usually have pictures geared towards them at all," she said. "And I'm finding the response from women to be wildly popular."

"That's more important to me. A critical success, whether it's a box office failure is far more painful than a critical failure which is a box office success."

When it comes to sexual roles, turnabout doesn't always make for fair play, Jones said.

"The story couldn't sustain a gender switch, she says. "People have said to me, 'Could you reverse this to two women and a man?' And the answer is no, because women would not get so hysterical about it. Men are emotional about sex, women are practical. That is a lot of what's behind 'Indecent Proposal.' The woman can do it and say, 'Hey, no problem.' The man can't get it out of his mind, because his entire macho identity is tied up in it — and a woman's is not. "It's dead-on the truth, let me tell you," Jones said. "Men will do anything they can to deny it. But a man in that situation would be boiling and worrying about it forever. "He's better than me?" is what he's thinking. And no matter what she answers, she can't win. If she says no, he doesn't believe her. If she says yes, he hates her for it."

"He says he wants the truth, but in reality he doesn't; once he hears the truth he can't take it."





# Music Fest aims to introduce kids to joy of music

TWIN FALLS — Jill Crandall and Joe Kaufman signed up for summer school — sort of.

Jill and Joe are enrolled in the College of Southern Idaho Music Fest. Now celebrating its 10th year, the event features music classes taught by experienced instructors, some who teach at college level. Last year, more than 100 junior high and high school kids signed up.

Joe, 16 and a junior at Twin Falls High School, has attended Music Fest for four years in a row. His specialty is the acoustic bass, which he plays in the Magic Valley Symphony. He developed an interest in music at school.

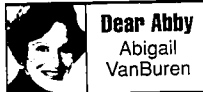

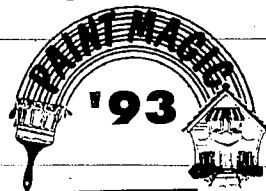
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# Aerosmith. If still Stones clones, at least they're rich

**LOS ANGELES** — Rolling Stones clones. Junkies. Filthy rich. There's always so much to chat about with Aerosmith — whatever the decade. Though the Boston-based hard-rock band came up with such rock standards as "Walk This Way" and "Dream On" in the mid-'70s, the group was invariably dismissed at the time as a junior-grade Rolling Stones. Exhibits A and B: pouty-lipped lead singer Steven Tyler's onstage prancing and mannerisms reminiscent of Mick Jagger and guitarist Joe Perry's Keith Richards-inspired gangster cool.

Essentially, however, the main talk about Aerosmith shifted from music to drugs, as tales of the band's excesses grew. Tyler once said that he was so far out of it that he hopped up in a lavish Boston hotel suite for days before realizing his mansion was just around the corner.

By the '80s, the personal problems had taken their toll and Aerosmith virtually disintegrated. Perry and guitarist Brad Whitford left the band and the future didn't look bright for Tyler. But the original Aerosmith re-formed in 1987 and rebounded dramatically in 1988.

That year's "Permanent Vacation" album and 1989's "Pump" not only re-established the commercial power of the

band (which also includes Tom Hamilton on bass and Joey Kramer on drums), but also led to a favorable critical reevaluation of the quintet.

And Aerosmith got the last laugh, of sorts, in 1991 when Sony Music — the Stones' former U.S. label — signed the record group to a \$30 million-plus contract. It was one of the most lucrative ever in the rock business and the even more impressive because the band still owed two albums to its current label, Geffen Records.

On the eve of the release of the group's new "Get a Grip," the first of those two Geffen albums, the flamboyant Tyler, 45, spoke about Aerosmith, the Rolling Stones, drugs and being filthy rich.

**Q: What effect did the new Sony contract have on you? Did it put more pressure on you to live up to all the expectations?**

**A:** No, not at all. I think I was floored when we first signed the contract, the fact that anybody would dump that amount of money on the band. It made you feel good that someone wanted you that bad. It was like someone saying: "We love the band, and we think you're still on an upward curve."

But that was the only time I sat around and thought about us being legends or big stars or anything. After that moment, I just hung in. I wanted to start rocking again. I wanted to write the

new album and get out and play it. The songs are, in effect, our marching orders. They have a lot more to do with what we'll be doing for the next year and a half than the contract.

**Q: Were you worried at all when you got the contract that it would make you less hungry? In baseball, for instance, it's rare that a free agent lives up to expectations after signing a big contract.**

**A:** Yeah, but I don't think that's going to happen to us, because we've been millionaires before and we lost it, so we know the pitfalls.

**Q: Did you ever dream during the down days in the early '80s that you'd be back on top?**

**A:** Sure, I never gave up. I thought that we did it once and we can do it again.

**Q: When you look back, do you think you were just kidding yourself?**

**A:** No. I didn't know we'd come back with such a vengeance, but I thought we'd have another shot once I could see things clearly again. On the other hand, I was scared to death to get sober because I thought I would lose my artistic spirit and all the rest of it. But we've found out that you have more to draw upon when you're sober.

**Q: What about your own influences? People always talk about the Stones. Was it a Stones record that first made you want to be in a band?**

**A:** No, the record that got me off the most was the Who's "Can't Explain." I was also a Beatles fan big time, especially after "Taxman."

**Q: So, was it doubly frustrating to you when everyone started comparing Aerosmith to the Stones?**

**A:** Deep down, it was a huge Stones fan. But I was afraid to admit it for years because I thought once I did everyone would just go, "See, he is just trying to mimic Jagger." I hated that they kept saying the Jagger-esque Tyler and they were using that as a crutch and they were looking at Aerosmith without looking at our own music.

I was also uncomfortable with all the comparisons of Joe Perry and Keith Richards for the same reason. So, I used to always steer reporters' questions away from the Stones. But now I can talk about how much I loved the Stones, not just "Satisfaction," but "Between the Buttons," all that stuff... on into the '70s and today, I like Jagger's new album, along with new bands like the Stone Temple Pilgrims.

**Q: What about Jagger? You're one of rock's colorful figures. Is that your natural personality or did you see the flamboyance in him and think that's simply the way to be a successful rock star?**

**A:** Looking back, I'm not sure Jagger was that colorful. He was certainly mysterious. What attracted me to him was that he was the baddest boy on the block and not only in terms of persona. He delivered. He could sing his ass off, and I was this skinny guy with long hair, and I said, "You know what? I can do that too."

**Q: What's it like for bands today to talk about you the same way you talk about the Stones?**

**A:** It's a great compliment. I love it when groups like R.E.M. do an Aerosmith song. It's a thrill — and it's happening a lot. They never did in the past. I used to think maybe you had to wait until you were dead and then they cover your tunes.

**Q: How did you feel when Aerosmith went down in flames the first time? Did you think people would forget about the band and forever think of it as a Rolling Stones clone?**

As I do remember being laid up on my back in a hospital, but for a minute because I took my left heel off in a motorcycle accident — and suddenly seeing this new band, Van Halen, shoot up out of nowhere. I thought, "Jesus, we step out of the spotlight for two minutes and someone else has to come in there."

That's not to take anything away from Van Halen. They are a great band in their own right. But at the time, I did worry that we were going to lose our place if I don't get my crap together.

**Q: Are all those classic Steven Tyler stories true — about being wasted in a hotel around the corner from your house?**

**A:** Oh yeah, sure. I would rent a limousine and go and party with some people and three days later, the guy would still be sitting out front in the car. Or how about getting on a plane to go to L.A. and getting off in Tampa?

There were times when I'd be so far out of it, I'd wake up at home in the morning, grab the phone and try to punch the numbers for room service. Since, all that stuff's true. People often ask, "How do you come up with some of the crazy things in the songs," and I just tell them I did those crazy things.

**Q: Is it too dramatic to say there was a moment when the drug addiction got so bad that you literally had to choose between life and death?**

**A:** The truth is, I wasn't conscious enough during those years to think I was in danger. Even when the rug was pulled out from underneath, I still didn't notice it was gone until some key people in my life said, "Look at you, your whole career has gone to hell." That's how drugs are. You don't see it. I just thank God for those people. With their help, I did see what was happening and I changed.

**Q: How do you deal with the issue of being a role model? Do you want to caution young people against the excesses in the "sex, drugs and rock 'n' roll" lifestyle?**

**A:** I'm not sure what you can say. People have to go through it themselves. In fact, when they hear you (preach against it), it's a turmoil. That's what happened to me. I remember thinking, "Here I am, I thought that for years, so I really can't say anything except I've got a great story."

You can read in all the press about what it used to be like and what it's like now. I mean, I thought for years I was going to lose it all and that's not what happened. Conversely, all the girls I was given by my higher power or whoever, the forces... it was stilled by all that stuff.

**Q: But you did seem to be preaching against something in "Janie Got a Gun" (on the "Pump" album) — child abuse. Your idea of rock 'n' roll had always been escapism and fun, so did you**

## Aerosmith discography

**The Baltimore Sun**

Over the last two decades, Aerosmith has pumped out an enormous amount of music — 11 studio albums, five live albums, two greatest-hits collections and a boxed set. Here's how they stack up.

**"Aerosmith" (Columbia, 1973).** Sure the writing is unpolished and derivative, with the slow-building "Dream On" as the album's only standout song. But the playing is gutsy and spirited, taking the Rolling Stones' approach to blues rock one step closer to hard rock. (1½ stars)

**"Get Your Wings" (Columbia, 1974).** Better underscore and a surer sense of groove underscore how much the band had grown since its debut. Highlights include "Same Old Song and Dance" and a swaggering, boogie-fied "Janie Got a Gun." (Two stars)

**"Toys in the Attic" (Columbia, 1975).** Here's where the band truly hits its stride. Not only is the playing tighter and funkier than ever, but the song list includes some of the band's best-known classics, including "Walk This Way" (later remade by Run-DMC) and "Sweet Emotion." (3½ stars)

**"Rocks" (Columbia, 1976).** Like "Toys in the Attic," only harder. Between the brute force of "Rats in the Cellar" and the stone knuck of "Last Child," it seems as if Aerosmith could do no wrong. (Three stars)

**"Draw the Line" (Columbia, 1977).** Oops. This is where the strain of too much touring and too many drugs becomes obvious. A couple of memorable rockers, including the title tune, but a major disappointment after "Rocks." (Two stars)

**"Live! Bootleg" (Columbia, 1978).** A stop-gap release designed to shore up fan loyalty, this collection of vintage concert recordings is worth hearing if only for the band's take on James Brown's "Mother Popcorn." (Two stars)

**"Night in the Ruts" (Columbia, 1979).** With Joe Perry gone, the band's groove quotient drops noticeably, but tracks like "Bone to Bone" keep this from being a total waste of time. (1½ stars)

**"Greatest Hits" (Columbia, 1980).** For a band that never considered itself

a singles act, these guys sure had their share of hits. All essential songs, from "Dream On" to their cover of "Come Together." (3½ stars)

**"Rock in a Hard Place" (Columbia, 1982).** Rock bottom would be more like it. Aerosmith in name only. (1½ stars)

**"Done With Mirrors" (Geffen, 1985).** Not quite a return to form, but a credible comeback nonetheless. All-around. (1½ stars)

**"Aerosmith Classics Live" (Columbia, 1986).** Hoping to cash in on the Aerosmith revival, Columbia rummages through the vaults to find unreleased live material. Listenable, but inessential. (Two stars)

**"Aerosmith Classics Live II" (Columbia, 1987).** Gosh, there's a lot of stuff in that vault. (1½ stars)

**"Permanent Vacation" (Geffen, 1987).** This is where Aerosmith went from comeback to domination. Whether it's a matter of pop-savvy singles like "Dude Looks Like a Lady" and "Angel" or rhythmically tight and "Singing Rockers" like "Rag Doll" and "Hang on in There," Aerosmith proves it still set on all fronts. (Three stars)

**"Gems" (Columbia, 1988).** Not the greatest hits, just an inebriated simulation. (Two stars)

**"Pump" (Geffen, 1989).** Just as solid as "Permanent Vacation," but with better hooks, thanks to "Love in the Electric Blue" and the semi-innocent "Janie Got a Gun." Proof that a band's second wind really can be stronger than its first. (3½ stars)

**"Pandora's Box" (Columbia, 1991).** As big-time superstars, it makes sense that Aerosmith would get the full boxed-set treatment. But with so many live medleys, it's worth wondering whether this collection really counts as a complement. Great for fanatics, but average fans should stick with "Greatest Hits." (2½ stars)

**"Get a Grip" (Geffen, 1993).** With deeper grooves than any album since "Toys in the Attic," the best songs here show off the band's rhythmic strengths without compromising its pop appeal. As a result, the best songs — "Livin' on the Edge," "Eat the Rich," "Gotta Love It" and "Cryin'" — are as vigorous as they are infectious. Absolute perfection. (Four stars)

resist recording that song? Did you worry that it would be seen as preaching — and be a turnoff to your fans?

**A:** The main thing you worry about is just coming up with songs at all. I don't sit down and write stuff like certain writers do. They think about what they are going to write first and then they write it. I'm a musician and I can keep my mitt on. I can catch the balls that come at me.

"Janie" was like that. It just came out, the line "Janie got a gun," and I filled in the spaces. I built the ladder, part by part, to go and speak, and when the song was finished I thought it was wonderful that I had written something that was maybe socially relevant. It was the press that made such a big deal out of it.

**Q: When fans come up to you now, do they ask you about drugs or about child abuse?**

**A:** No, it's more about the songs and rock 'n' roll and what it's like being a star.

**Q: And what is it like?**

**A:** It's great now. You just take all your addictions and put that energy into your songwriting. I used to collect drugs. Now, I collect money and cars.

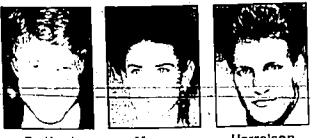

Tall tales from cruel little jokes grow, and the misogynistic notion behind that transaction — that every woman can be bought — has blossomed into a major moral dilemma in Adrian Lyne's artificial and non-didactic "Indecent Proposal." Lyne has used moral issues to needle some flesh before in such films as "48 Weeks" and "Fatal Attraction," but he's never taken his material quite this seriously.

"Indecent Proposal," which is unrelated to last year's almost identical plot of "Honeymoon in Vegas," stars Robert Redford as John Gage, a wealthy, unmarried billionaire who offers to pay \$1 million for one night with a married woman he spots stealing candy in a Las Vegas hotel.

In these recessionary times, there is no lagging over price. Diana Murphy (Demi Moore), a Las Vegas real estate broker, and her husband, David (Woody Harrison), a free-lance architect, have come to Las Vegas in a last-ditch effort to save off-bankruptcy, and having had

no luck at the tables, they accept Gage's first offer.  
"It's only my body, not my mind or my heart," says Diana, as she and David take themselves into a Faustian deal they think will shore up their otherwise deflatingly happy marriage. (Moviegoers who have observed Moore's cleavage expand conscientiously over the years may add that it's not exactly her body, either.)

Of course, it is much easier to keep the flesh and the spirit separate before one has been rented out, and Diana's one-night stand as a Forbes 500 hooker enters the bloodstream of her marriage like a fatal virus. The next afternoon, as David's guilt gives way to suspicion, jealousy and rage, is not what money can buy, but what it cannot buy back.

In a way, the movie suffers the same fate as the Murphy's marriage: It starts to fall apart the morning after Diana sleeps with John Gage. Almost nothing that happens from then on seems a logical extension of what happened before, least of all the erratic behavior of David and the impenetrable courtship of Diana by her leeches John.

The premise and set-up of the story is better suited to screwball comedy than romantic bathos, and that is how they were used in Andrew Bergman's bifurcated "Honeymoon in Vegas," which starred James Cagan as

a mobster who offers to square a young gambler's debt in exchange for some time with his fiancée. The moral question is in both movies — what does it take for her to do it? — but by casting Redford as the buyer, and then making him sensitive, polite and sincere in the extreme, "Indecent Exposure" undermines the dilemma.

Agreeing to sleep with Robert Redford for the money may be more moral than agreeing to sleep with, say, Howard Stern, but the idea creates an entirely different fantasy. And price structure!

This is a very pure performance by Redford, who seems content to model his expensive wardrobe while letting his killer-smile stand in for fabricated character. Like Cary Grant's angel sent to earth in "The Bishop's Wife" to test a troubled marriage and tempted to slick himself for a little earthly romance himself. In "Indecent Proposal," however, it is played as straight as a nervous breakdown.

There are some light moments in the early going, and a very funny performance by Oliver Platt as the Murphy's greedy lawyer ("Don't negotiate without me... I could have gotten you \$2 million"). But once the moral issues and the rivalry between David and the billionaire kick in, the movie catches up in an emotional whirlpool that takes it right down the drain.

"Indecent Proposal" will run through May 21 at the Mall Cinema.

TWIN FALLS — In a community where a gay character in a comic strip becomes an issue, a Twin Falls psychologist said he's not surprised the new sex-for-hire movie "Indecent Proposal" would create some ripples.  
"That's just the nature of the culture," said Morris Morgett, whose practice includes counseling couples. "I haven't kept track of how many letters to the editor you get about 'For Better or For Worse.' It was an emotional reaction."

The Times-News pulled five weeks of the comic strip starting in mid-March after its author, Lynn Johnston, began a story line about a teen-age character who reveals his homosexuality to his parents. The paper substituted strips, but when the strip in 1990 and made available copies of the new strip to anyone who wanted them.

Americans, Morgett said, are confused about sexuality, which leaves almost any sex-related issue, ranging from a Hollywood movie to sex education, open to controversy.  
"We don't talk about sexuality, so when something like this comes along that's entertaining, colorful, inflating, it attracts attention," he said.

"Indecent Proposal," a story about a billionaire who offers a young couple \$1 million to spend one night with the woman, opened at Twin Falls' Mall Cinema last weekend to "pretty good" reviews for this time of year, said Larry Rogar, manager of Interstate Amusements' theaters in Twin Falls and Jerome.

"It's turning into a women's picture," he said. "The reaction has been good. People I've talked to

who have seen the picture like it." Rogar said a few women have brought their husbands back to see the movie with them. He plans to keep the film running until May 21. Morgett hasn't seen it, but he expects "Indecent Proposal" to come up in counseling sessions with couples.

A lady captain who wants to be a social worker. (Holland Taylor). Playground bullies who want to be straight men. Cops who want to be clowns. Put them all together, add the quintessential empty marketing-hoop script, and over-judicious direction by Henry Winkler — who may want to be Ron Howard — and you haven't got even half a movie. **The Crush (R).** A cute journalist is besieged by the nymphomaniac; her demonic seduction includes attacks by striptease, wasps and merry-go-round. # Reba McEntire addresses through her work issues that matter to women

Reba McEntire looks at it this way: She's No. 2, so she tries harder. That's at least half true. After 20 albums, 12 years of touring and countless other projects, the woman known to her fans worldwide simply as Reba hasn't slowed down one bit.

"When people say, 'Why don't you slow down, why don't you quit?' I think, 'What for?' This is a great living. I love to do it."

On this morning, McEntire is speaking from her Nashville, Tenn., home, though she played Cedar Rapids, Iowa, the previous evening and has to leave for Green Bay, Wis., for a gig that night.

"We work between three and four days a week this time of year, and then in the summer, we'll work sometimes seven days a week. It's a great challenge."

Her next challenge will be to top the performance of her past two records, 1991's "For My Broken Heart" became her best seller, and "It's Your Call," out for only a few months, already is pushing up from the rear.

All of that makes her the No. 2 country-record seller behind Garth Brooks, which is where she derives the second part of her equation. Casting herself as No. 2 keeps the goal clearly ahead of her.

Make no mistake, though. Throughout a career that has seen Nashville pop out a favorite flavor every few months, McEntire has emerged as the undisputed first lady of country music.

That's partly evident through the industry's acknowledgment of McEntire with numerous awards. But the message is clear from the adoring fans who line up for her concerts and scarf up her records.

McEntire says she was surprised at the acceptance of "For My Broken Heart," essentially a tribute to the eight members of her band who died in a 1991 plane crash.

"When we recorded it, we had so many slow and sad songs on it. (Producer) Tony Brown said, 'Man, we've never done this before; we need some up-tempo songs.' And I said, 'Tony, I can't sing up-tempo. I just lost eight people that I worked with and loved.'"

"So I thought, well, this will just be a tribute album and we'll go on. For it to do so well told me that a lot of people needed this album because they were hurting, too."

And while McEntire counts "Rumor Has It" and "Reba" among her favorite albums, "For My Broken Heart" is "without a doubt, my favorite. It was a very heartfelt, strong, meaning album. It really pushes at your heart ... pulls it out, beats on it and while and sticks it back in." She laughs.

She can laugh a little easier as the tragedy fades and her star glows brighter by the day. The new album is decidedly more upbeat. But one aspect in the transition that hasn't changed is McEntire's ability to subtly, yet forcefully, speak through her music to the issues that matter to women: overcoming the fear of fully ex-

ploring one's capabilities and not playing second fiddle or fool to anyone.

The themes go back as far as her 1987 album, "The Last One to Know," and reaches to the new album, with "For Herself," a song she co-wrote. The hit "I'm There Life Out There" from "For My Broken Heart" documents a woman's exploration of the world outside the family circle.

McEntire, however, doesn't wear a women's-rights badge on her sleeve. The impression is that this is someone exploring her own limits, and finding out that, at least for her, there are few.

"I've had to work harder, all of us women have, and not just because we're girls," but because we're not through yet. I think males have dominated Nashville in the past," she said. "But that's fixin' to change."

"For me, I think it's based more on curiosity than anything." And what about McEntire? Doesn't she tire of the grind and realize she's made it several times over, that she can slow down now?

"Momma just tells me to slow down to watch my health. If I get tired, she'll see me on TV and call early the next morning and say, 'Reba, you look entirely too tired. You need to get you some rest.'"

But McEntire, 38, refuses to stop striving to reach that dream.

"Let me put it this way. When my daddy won the world (bull-riding) championship in 1957 — he'd won it three times — and I said, 'Daddy, when you won the world, was that the highest point?' and he said, 'No' and I said 'What is?' He said, 'Getting there.'"

"That's the way I am. The awards are super. But once you win, you instantly go to tomorrow, what comes next."

"I'm still selling tickets. I'm still selling albums. They still want me. When they don't want me, that's when I need to quit."

## Steelhead run might provide 1 more big weekend

ELLIS — Steelhead sport fishing remained hot over the weekend in the upper reaches of the Salmon River but all indications are the 1993 run is headed into the down slide.

An Idaho Fish and Game spokesman at the Region 6 office in Idaho Falls reported creel censusing over the weekend showed the run yielded one steelhead for 10 hours fish in that stretch of the main Salmon from the confluence with the Pahsimeroi to East Fork. The catch rate jumped slightly to 9 hours per catch from East Fork up to Redfish Lake Creek.

There could be another good weekend for area anglers, however, as the nighty take at the Sawtooth Hatchery wet was holding up fairly well into the week.

A spokesman said "We feel we are just about right in the middle (of the run) with over 700" currently in holding ponds. Unfortunately, the Sawtooth run continues its history of being predominantly male.

Meanwhile, things are petering out at the Pahsimeroi wet which now has taken 2,149 from its trap.

"It dropped off during the cold days but it has picked up some since," said a spokesman.

At the Pahsimeroi, the male to female

ratio has about evened out with 1,075 females and 1,051 males.

The releasing of the smolts grown from last year's harvest at the two facilities faces new problems this year as the federal government (National Marine Fishing Service) did not license any releases until well past the usual mid-March deadline.

The smolts from the Sawtooth and McCall hatcheries were released April 4 and 5. Approval to release the fish raised in the Pahsimeroi was not given until April 14.

And the major thrust of the upper Salmon River captive release program — the yield from the Niagara Hatchery — was held until this week. The first tanker truck from

Niagara didn't reach the Pahsimeroi until this past Monday.

It is believed that a very narrow "season" exists when smolting anadromous fish can absorb the impact of changing from fresh to salt water. Additionally, the Army Corps of Engineers again is persisting in its use of barging strollers down river although many fisheries agencies — the Idaho Department of Fish and Game particularly — believe barging "already has been proven a failed venture."

The return of steelhead adults to Idaho in two years could be deemed a point of major rebellion.

### Cansco found innocent of battery charge

CHICAGO — Texas Rangers slugger Jose Canseco was found innocent Thursday on a misdemeanor battery charge filed after he punched a man in a Chicago nightclub last December.

After a four-hour trial, Cook County Judge William O'Malley rejected claims by Steven Basso of Chicago that Canseco hit him without provocation.

"I don't know why people can't be left alone without being attacked by psychos," O'Malley said. "Mr. Basso testified himself that he should have left."

Canseco testified that Basso was acting irrational and screaming vulgarities at him and the woman Canseco was with. Canseco said he hit Basso, breaking his nose and knocking him unconscious, after Basso struck a male friend of Canseco's.

## Association could ban foreign exchange student athletes from varsity competition

BOISE, Idaho — Dan Ruescher could be one of the last foreign exchange students to compete on the varsity level in Idaho high school athletics.

The senior from Germany is Boise High School's top boys tennis player and a big contender to win a state championship.

The Idaho High School Activities Association will consider banning foreign exchange students from varsity competition at its June 7 meeting.

"It would appear we're going to adopt a ruling that would make foreign exchange students ineligible," said Bill Young, executive director of the IHSAA.

"What is happening is we're having an influx of foreign exchange students that are displacing Idaho athletes. We've had several letters from parents that feel it is not fair."

The proposal would allow foreign exchange students to participate in junior varsity programs. Any varsity bans would be lifted if the student spends more than a

year in Idaho. Most foreign exchange programs last one year.

"We would be treating all students the same whether they move from one school to another or one country to another without their parents," Young said.

In a straw vote last month, the Idaho Athletic Directors Association voted in favor of banning foreign students for several reasons.

"Number one, they are displacing local student-athletes off the team," said

## Wisconsin's medley team enters Penn Relays late, wins title

PHILADELPHIA — Wisconsin's women's distance medley relay team made one of the latest entries and quickest departures in the 99-year history of the Penn Relays. In between, the Badgers won their first relay title.

With Claire Eichner, the NCAA indoor mile and 3,000-meter champion overtaking Villanova's Cheri Goddard with just over 200 meters remaining and pulling away to a 20-meter margin down the stretch, Wisconsin won the distance medley relay Thursday.

The Badgers' time of 11 minutes, 7.72 seconds was far off the world record of 10:48.38 set by Villanova in 1988, but was considered respectable on a cold day with temperatures at 42 degrees and winds up to 15 mph.

Wisconsin did not decide to enter the Relays until April 12, five days after the deadline.

Villanova coach Magy Stern claimed meet director Tim Baker admitted the Badgers specifically to challenge the Wildcats. Baker said the meet had accepted late entries in the

past and he wanted to have the best competition possible.

The Badgers, who beat Villanova by nine seconds in the 3,200-meter relay at the NCAA indoor championships at Indianapolis in March, did not arrive in Philadelphia until noon MST Thursday. They did not reach Franklin Field until 2:30, less than an hour before the race.

But they were ready.

With Sarah Berk running the opening 1,200-meter leg in 3:27.7, Kim Sherman clocking 55.2 for 400 meters and Amy Wickus being timed in 2:05.5 for 800 meters, Wisconsin led all the way until Eichner got the baton.

But Goddard then swept past Eichner with about 600 meters left and held a slight lead for nearly a quarter-mile. However, Eichner had a big move left, which Goddard couldn't match, and the Wisconsin senior went on to an easy victory.

Shortly after winning, Wisconsin was gone. The four runners, plus coach Peter Tegen, headed to the airport to catch a 5:05 flight to Des Moines, Iowa, where they will compete in

the Drake Relays Friday and Saturday, mostly in individual events.

"We just wanted to compete," Eichner said. "We never had a chance to run at the Penn Relays."

Stern's Villanova teams won five consecutive distance medley relay titles beginning in 1987 before having the streak broken by Providence last year. He said he has learned something from the issue of Wisconsin's late entry.

"Now that I know the rules (can be bent), there is nothing wrong with trying to bring in the best competition," he said. "I'm not upset now. It's not that big a deal with an attraction like that."

Villanova was timed in 11:11.58, and was followed by Georgetown (11:15.13), Florida (11:30.73) and defending champion Providence (11:32.97).

In Thursday night's featured distance race, Bob Kennedy, the 1992 NCAA and national cross-country champion from Indiana, trounced a field that included three other Olympians in the men's Olympic Development 5,000 meters.

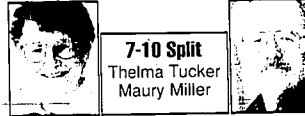

# Player may have gotten idea to build pipe bomb from movie

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — A Washington State football player may have gotten the idea to build a pipe bomb from watching a Steven Seagal movie, his father said Thursday.

Harvey "Buddy" Waldron, 22, of Bellevue, was killed when a homemade bomb accidentally exploded in the pickup truck he was driving in Pullman Monday. His teammate and passenger, Paul Saadla, lost his left hand.

An autopsy in Spokane on Thursday "did not reveal any surprises" and showed Waldron suffered major head trauma, Pullman Police Sgt. Chris Leat said. Waldron died Tuesday at Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane.

Temnant said investigators had no new leads as to a motive, but Waldron's father suggested his son may have gotten the idea to build a pipe bomb from watching the movie "Under Siege."

Harvey Waldron of Bellevue said his son had recently seen the movie starring Seagal, who plays a former Navy SEALs member and builds a pipe bomb. As a cook on a battleship, Seagal's character battles elite killer commandos out to hijack the vessel's nuclear arsenal.

Waldron said his son, who was a SEALs enthusiast, apparently was "sitting there one night" with Saadla when they decided to build a pipe bomb themselves.

Alcohol, tobacco and fireworks events and Pullman detectives may wait until Monday to interview Saadla about the incident, Temnant said. Saadla, who is being treated at Harborview Medical Center in Seattle, had been told Wednesday of Waldron's death and was understandably sad.

Doctors and family members asked that detectives wait until at least Monday before interviewing him, Temnant said.

The elder Waldron's account of the incident is similar to what Washington State football coach Mike Price said Saadla told him. Price said he spoke to Saadla, 20, of Santa Monica, Calif., at Harborview Medical Center in Seattle on Wednesday.

Price said the two built a pipe bomb "because they were curious, they wanted to know how and if they could." They planned to set it off in a field.

Another pipe bomb, materials and a bomb-making book called "The Poor Man's James Bond Book" were found at Saadla's home.

Waldron's funeral is scheduled for Sunday at 11 a.m. at the Pullman funeral home. A commemorative service is planned Monday.

# Purtzer, Sullivan share 1st-round lead in Greater Greensboro Open

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — Tom Purtzer, who skipped the last three PGA tournaments after being frustrated with his game, fought through cold and wind Thursday to grab a share of the first-round lead in the \$1.5 million Greater Greensboro Open.

Purtzer's 5-under-par 67 came during the morning at Forest Oaks Country Club, where temperatures were in the 40s with 20 mph winds.

Mike Sullivan, who has won twice on the tour in 17 seasons, was the only golfer able to match Purtzer's score in the afternoon. He sank a 15-foot birdie putt on his final hole to forge the tie.

"I think it was Sunday I'd be a lot more excited," he said. "At this point it's another nice birdie, but we're not in a very good position."

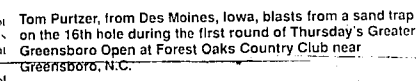
The weather at the third oldest tour stop was as much the story as the leaderboard.

The Angels, who moved ahead of the Texas Rangers to the top of the West by beating Cleveland on Wednesday night, have proven so far that they can be competitive despite having one of the youngest — and lowest paid — lineups in the majors.

Jim Abbott, acquired in the deal that sent the Yankees to the New York Yankees, is hitting .372, with four homers and 14 RBIs; Salmon is hitting .378 with three homers and nine RBIs; Curtis is batting .349, with six RBIs and 10 stats; Easley is batting .293 with two homers and six RBIs; and Disarcina is hitting .267, with one homer and four RBIs.

And those young players are real bargains, by major league pay standards. Snow is making \$110,000 this

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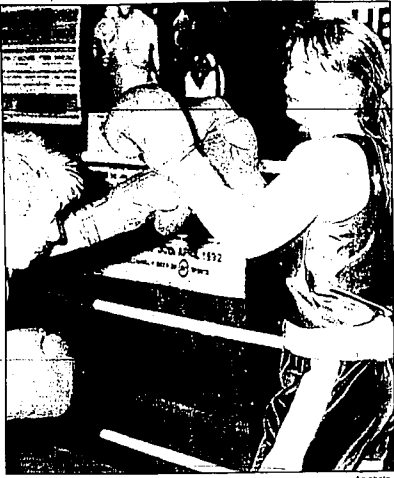

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# As NFL changes, so does its draft

PHILADELPHIA — It's all a matter of timing.

Six years ago, Clyde Simmons was a little-known defensive end out of Western Carolina. The Philadelphia Eagles picked him in the ninth round of the NFL draft and Simmons rewarded them by developing into an all-pro.

This year, in the new, slimmer eight-round draft, a player such as Simmons would not even be picked. It's all a matter of timing.

Last year, Steve Emtman, the giant defensive tackle from Washington, was the top pick of the draft. The Indianapolis Colts signed him, making him the top-paid defensive player in history before he ever played a down.

This year, under the league's new rookie-wage pool, a player such as Emtman would earn just a fraction of that salary.

The rules that made Simmons an eagle and Emtman a wealthy man have been scrapped.

The NFL is changing, with free agency and labor peace, and the draft is changing with it. When the 58th annual collegiate lottery begins at noon Sunday, fans will notice some differences:

- The draft will run eight rounds, rather than the customary 12. While that may sound trivial, consider that at least 100 players on NFL rosters last season were chosen in rounds nine through 12. Now, those players

must try to hook on with teams as free agents.

- A wage pool will limit the amount each club can pay for all of its rookies. The Eagles, for example, have about \$2.3 million to spread among eight picks; the bottom line is that rookies will fight each other for the same limited dollars, and none will strike rich.
- There will be a longer first round. To ease the pain of two free-agent defections, NFL owners agreed to create an extra spot at pick No. 13 for the Eagles (for losing Reggie White) and at No. 20 for the Cardinals (for losing Tim McDonald).
- Given the languorous pace of the process, the Eagles' first pick Sunday probably won't come before 2 p.m. Their regular first-round pick, No. 24, could come as late as 4 p.m. The NFL plans to draft four rounds on Sunday and another four starting at 10 a.m. Monday.
- The extra spots created for the Eagles and Cardinals have become a source of controversy around the NFL, which is trying hard to avoid controversy these days. Phoenix owner Bill Bidwell gladly accepted the "compensation" for losing McDonald, a Pro Bowl safety, to the San Francisco 49ers, but Eagles owner Norman Braman, who did little to try to re-sign White, has loudly complained that he's not getting enough for losing his top defensive player — even though the league awarded him "another" first-round pick in 1994. Braman even

tried to block the labor settlement in court.

Braman's griping has infuriated officials at other clubs. Publicly, they have been careful not to crab about being pushed back a spot or two in the first round. Privately, however, one NFC general manager said, "I don't see why we're rewarding a guy who didn't see the importance of keeping Reggie White. He gets a premium player (through a draft pick) and my club gets notched down. And he's moaning."

Regardless, the NFL's decision means there will be 29 picks in the first round, rather than the usual 28. (The New York Giants spent their first-round pick last spring by selecting quarterback Dave Brown in a supplemental draft.) So the champion Dallas Cowboys' first-round pick — No. 29 — will come where the second round used to be. Following everything so far?

The shorter draft is easier to understand. NFL players had hoped to scrap the draft under the new settlement; owners wanted to keep it intact. The compromise was to cut from 12 rounds to eight this year and seven thereafter.

At first glance, the impact of four fewer rounds appears marginal. After all, most good NFL teams are built with early draft picks.

The Cowboys lined up for the Super Bowl with eight No. 1 picks among their 22 starters. Seven of their other starters were picked in rounds two through four.

On the other hand, the Cowboys had four starters taken after the eighth round, including cornerback Larry Brown, a 12th-round pick in 1991. The Buffalo Bills—Dallas Super Bowl opponents, had nine players on their roster drafted in rounds nine through 12, including Pro Bowl tackle Howard Ballard.

The Eagles had seven such players on their 1992 roster: Simmons, Mike Flores, Izell Jenkins, Mark McMillan, John Booty (originally drafted by the Jets), Mike Golic (drafted by the Oilers) and Vae Sikahema (drafted by the Cardinals).

Teams that have been able to find those hidden gems late in the draft tend to be the most successful," said San Diego Chargers coach Bobby Ross. "Now, we'll just have to pursue them as free agents."

Indeed, 112 players who would have been drafted last year must now find jobs on their own. The smart organizations that Ross refers to will move quickly after the draft to latch on to the sleepers, projects and small-college stars. Remember, Johnny Unitas was a ninth-round pick and Bart Starr was a 17th-round pick.

Late-round picks — and early-round picks — will find another big change this year: Money. Actually, make that the lack of money.

The labor settlement set a team-by-team wage cap for rookies, based on where a club picks and how many draft choices it has. Basically, the average club gets to spend about \$2 million.

### Jets fear using high pick on running back

HEMPSTEAD, N.Y. (AP) — Despite ligament damage in his left knee, Georgia running back Garrison Hearst is considered by some teams to be the best player in Sunday's NFL draft. And, yes, he probably will be available to the New York Jets, who own the third pick, and need a dynamic runner to live up to their muddy offense.

Sounds like a perfect fit, but don't bet on it happening.

Though Hearst rushed for 1,547 yards in 1992 and displayed amazing athletic ability in a recent workout for NFL scouts — all this with the "bad" knee — the Jets seem wary of investing such a high pick on him. They appear to be leaning toward Florida State linebacker Marvin Jones.

General Manager Dick Steinberg

didn't rule out the possibility of taking Hearst, calling him a "great, great talent," but he sounded concerned by the knee factor.

"The guys have played with a ligament injury for at least two years, and he's played well — but, obviously, there's a higher risk that he could injure the knee," Steinberg said Wednesday. "That doesn't mean he will. He may go a couple of days."

Hearst can't remember hurting his knee, but a torn anterior cruciate ligament was detected during medical exams at the scouting combine in February. The Georgia team orthopedist, William Mulhern, advised Hearst to leave the knee alone for now, but he predicted it probably would cause him trouble

later. If, and when, that happens, it would require reconstructive surgery, Mulhern said.

Red flags immediately went up around the NFL last week. At least a dozen teams have asked a host of questions with a dizzying workload in late February. In sub-freezing conditions on the Georgia campus, the 5-foot-9, 205-pound burner clocked under 4.4 seconds in the 40. It was a hundred by scouts as the best workout by a running back since Barry Sanders blew 'em away in 1989.

"Actions speak louder than the doctor's report," one AFC personnel director said of Hearst's showing. "He went from being a major concern to getting back into the top five."

Some teams apparently are convinced that Hearst is a solid

investment. The Phoenix Cardinals, picking one spot behind the Jets, are said to be high on him. The Los Angeles Rams, picking 10th, might be interested in fading up for him.

Hearst is a potential franchise back, having drawn comparisons to Emmitt Smith, Walter Payton and Thurman Thomas.

With breathtaking speed, he averaged 6.8 yards per carry and scored 19 TDs in '92 as a junior.

Oh, how tempting it must be for the Jets. They need that kind of runner. Their backfield needs an injection of vitamin B — breakaway speed. The Jets' backs carried the ball 385 times last season, but not one exceeded 32 yards.

And that was by Pat Chaffey, a backup fullback.

### Griffey likes line drives, but hits home runs

SEATTLE (AP) — Despite an early-season power barrage, Ken Griffey Jr. still doesn't consider himself a slugger.

At least not in a class with Juan Gonzalez, Cecil Fielder, Mark McGwire and Jose Canseco, all past home run champions.

"I don't think of myself as a home run hitter," the Seattle Mariners' All-Star center fielder said. "I like to hit line drives and keep the ball in play. I like to hit fairs."

On Wednesday night, Griffey put the ball out of play twice. He had his second two-homer game in three days as the Mariners beat Boston 5-0 behind Randy Johnson's four-hit.

That gave Griffey six homers in 14 games and a shot of an All-home run lead with Albert Belle of Cleveland and Dean Palmer of Texas.

Griffey, who homered twice Monday in Detroit, hit an opposite-field, two-run shot and then a solo homer to right off Danny Darwin.

Griffey's homers weren't Fielder or Canseco blazes. They were measured at 352 and 329 feet.

"I didn't think the second one was going to go out," he said following the seventh two-homer game of his career.

After a slow start in which he batted only .175, Griffey raised his average to .283 by going 8-for-13 with five homers and eight RBIs in four games.

Griffey insisted he's trying to hit singles and doubles.

Griffey said he doesn't think he's any stronger this season than last year, when he hit a career-high 27 homers. In fact, he said he's playing four pounds lighter than last season.

"And you know I don't go in the

weight room," he said. "I go into the weight room to play video games."

Mariners manager Lou Piniella likes the way Griffey hits line drives to all the fields. Piniella was a 291 career hitter.

"He's special swinging the bat," Piniella said. "He's got home-run

power to all fields. He doesn't have to go up there to jerk the ball."

In his fifth season with the Mariners, the three-time All-Star — last summer's All-Star MVP — has 93 homers in 592 games.

He's in the first year of a \$24 million contract that guarantees he will be in Seattle through 1996.

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# An ironic twist: Montana makes his first pass to an ex-49er

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Joe Montana drew back his right arm and threw his first pass as a Kansas City Chief — to an ex-49er.

Terence Flagler, a former San Francisco running back signed as a free agent, turned out to be Montana's first receiver as a Chief. "I had no idea who I threw to. Did not know," Montana said with a laugh. "Getting used to a different snap count, a different play calling, yeah, it felt different."

After 14 years and four Super Bowl victories with San Francisco and two weeks of hardball negotiations between the Chiefs and 49ers, Montana finally took the field Thursday.

"It really sank in," he said after his workout at Arrowhead Stadium. "It's final."

The biggest smile on the field belonged to Paul Hackett, the

Hackett's main job this spring is installing the split-back offense that former 49ers coach Bill Walsh designed for Montana.

Hackett didn't notice who Montana's first receiver was, but he cautiously picked out the first one.

"By my calculations, Joe has run that route 326 times," Hackett said. "I figured that would be a very safe pass to call at this time."

Hackett was the Chiefs' ace in the hole throughout their dealing with the 49ers, who made a last-ditch attempt to keep the future Hall of Famer by designating him, not Steve Young, as their starting quarterback.

"I'm looking forward to being a part of another great organization and continuing the success this organization has had in the past," Montana said. "My buddy Paul Hackett cornered me as soon as I got to the stadium today."

Hackett will shadow Montana throughout next week's minicamp. "What went through my mind when I finally saw him in our huddle

is that it's a great new beginning for him personally," Hackett said. "This has been a very difficult separation because of the 14 years."

Hackett and Montana both will be teaching Chiefs coaches and players the 49ers offense, which features new blocking schemes and pass routes.

"Joe's being here accelerates what we began two months ago," Hackett said. "Having him here to be part of that development process will put everyone in position to learn faster and more efficiently. It's one thing when you hear it from a coach. It's entirely different when you hear it from a player."

By using Montana as a teacher, the Chiefs will be taking one more lesson from Walsh.

"It's one of the great teaching tools Bill Walsh always used," Hackett said. "He gave tremendous

evidence to players of how to play. He's a player's learning from player. That's something I believe in."

"Joe will really speed that process up because he's been in this system so long."

Hackett admitted Montana's arrival had created "a little bit of a circus atmosphere."

"But that's just for one day," he said. "Everybody has a buzz about them, an excitement about them. This is a real happening. It is. But there's a lot of work to do. We've still got some questions."

One of the concerns is an offensive line which last year yielded 48 sacks.

"We've got an offensive line situation that we've got to resolve," Hackett said. "Football is not a one-man game, no matter how good you are."

## It's not an official statistic, but Eckersley blows 3rd save

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Nobody's going to rush out and change the rules on blown saves just for Dennis Eckersley's sake.

"It's just a statistic, something that's going to make me look bad," said Eckersley, who blew his third straight save opportunity in Oakland's 5-3 loss to the New York Yankees on Wednesday night.

Last year, Eckersley blew only three saves in 54 chances. Until Tuesday night, he had never blown two in a row. It's not even an official statistic, but it's still big news.

In all fairness, Eckersley would have needed to perform a miracle to break his streak Wednesday night. With Oakland leading 3-2 in the ninth, manager Tony La Russa called on Eckersley after Bobby Witt and Rick Honeycutt loaded the bases with none out.

"You try and avoid it; bases loaded and nobody out," said La Russa, who decided not to let Eckersley start the ninth because he had thrown "twenty-something pitches" in blowing Tuesday night's save.

"We were asking for a miracle," La Russa said. "He would have to pull a Houdini act to get out with no runs. We were hoping for only one."

Eckersley struck out pinch hitter Jim Leyritz. Bur pinch hitter Dion James connected on a 2-1 pitch for a two-run single. Later in the inning, Bernie Williams added an RBI single.

"He didn't throw me any breaking balls," James said, "but the situation, with the bases loaded, dictated that." "You can't go 3-1," Eckersley said. "It's time to throw a strike. Can't get cute. So you give him

something to hit. And he hit it. I'd rather come in with no one on base. With the bases loaded, you can't give up sleep."

"First-blown save should be credited to Honey (Honeycutt)," La Russa said. "That's where a blown save is not really a good stat."

Eckersley was credited with a scoreless inning of relief, lowering his ERA to 6.75. But he said he's not worried.

"It's game 12, and we've got a long way to go," Eckersley said. "I plan on saving a lot of games this year. Stuff turns around the other way just as fast."

He'll get all the help he needs from his manager. "If we have a one-run lead in the ninth for the next six months, we'll be all right," La Russa said. "He's still the best reliever in baseball."

## Staggs says he has documents in Houston probe of Jenkins

HOUSTON (AP) — Former Houston assistant coach Steve Staggs started creating turmoil in the Cougars' football program when he was hired by coach John Jenkins in 1990, current assistant Tony Fitzpatrick said.

Staggs says he's meeting with NCAA investigators to provide documentation for his allegations that Jenkins broke NCAA rules dating back to 1988 when the school was on probation for violations under former coach Bill Yeoman.

Fitzpatrick and offensive line coach Ronnie Vinkler worked

with Staggs as graduate assistants at Houston in 1987 and 1988. They noticed a change in Staggs in 1990.

"When I worked with him as a grad assistant, he was hardworking, intelligent and efficient," Vinkler said. "I thought his attitude changed ... for what reason I don't know."

Fitzpatrick said after he returned to Houston after one season as an assistant at Long Beach State, Staggs defected Jenkins.

"He had the whole coaching staff in an uproar," Fitzpatrick said. "There's a lot of people around here that told Jenkins not to hire the guy. If

anything, John's too nice."

Jenkins has issued several denials of all charges by Staggs.

Staggs charged Jenkins with making payments to help a prospective player attend summer school in 1988 so he could become eligible to play for the Cougars.

The athlete never enrolled at Houston.

Staggs says he can document illegal payments to four other players who were given financial assistance to help them become eligible to play for the Cougars.

## Author Tom Clancy hopes to buy Orioles

BALTIMORE (AP) — Author Tom Clancy has joined a local group attempting to buy the Baltimore Orioles from Eli Jacobs, who has filed for personal bankruptcy.

Clancy, author of several best-selling books including "The Hunt for Red October," also leads a group seeking to own an NFL team should Baltimore be awarded an expansion franchise.

Clancy said Wednesday he hasn't dropped his NFL bid, but it would be affected if his group obtains the Orioles.

"You can do one or the other," said Clancy, who lives in Calvert County. "You can't do both."

Baltimore investors led by lawyer Peter Angelos are competing with a group led by Cincinnati businessman William DeWitt Jr. to purchase the

Orioles. DeWitt's group has been negotiating for more than six months with Jacobs.

An announcement about the sale could come within the next two weeks, Robert Drann, a lawyer for Jacobs, said Tuesday.

Angelos said his group has had virtually no contact with Jacobs, despite several recent attempts to contact him.

## Jury doesn't buy Tose claims against casino

CAMDEN, N.J. (AP) — A jury Thursday rejected claims by former Philadelphia Eagles owner Leonard H. Tose that an Atlantic City casino plied him with drinks, causing him to lose \$1.2 million at the blackjack table.

The eight-member jury deliberated for eight hours over two days before reaching the verdict in the two-week civil case. The trial was the second stemming from a 1991 lawsuit Tose filed against the casino.

Tose sought to recoup the money he lost at the Sands Hotel Casino on three dates in August and September 1985. His lawsuit charged he was "visibly and obviously intoxicated" while gambling.

In a ruling stemming from the first trial in the case, U.S. District Judge Joseph E. Irenas ruled that casinos which allow patrons to gamble while obviously intoxicated are strictly liable for losses incurred.

Sands officials denied the allegations, although they admitted giving Tose the high-roller treatment. He had an extensive credit line and a private betting table where a security guard kept in on Tose's bets.

Tose, 78, of Villanova, Pa., lost \$14.6 million in Atlantic City casinos between 1981 and 1986, records show. Gambling debts forced Tose to sell the football franchise in 1985.

An admitted compulsive gambler and alcohol abuser, Tose gambled alone, usually playing seven hands simultaneously and wagering \$35,000 a game. He always had his favorite drink — Perrier and Scotch — served in a glass monogrammed with his initials.

In his lawsuit, Tose said casino officials ignored pleas from his friends to stop him from gambling tables when he became intoxicated. He claimed he was so drunk that he knocked over gambling chips and

needed help getting to the bathroom.

The legal dispute began when the Sands filed suit against Tose in January 1991 seeking to recover \$1.3 million in unpaid gambling debts. Tose filed a counterclaim a month later, alleging casino officials "intentionally and maliciously enticed" him to gamble.

In the first trial, the jury handed Tose a partial verdict last month, rejecting part of his claim that he was drunk on four occasions between June 1985 and March 1986. But the panel was split 3-1 in favor of Tose on whether he was visibly drunk when he sustained heavy losses on three other dates, prompting this new trial, where the casino also prevailed.

Both sides called additional eyewitnesses — former and current casino dealers, cocktail waitresses and gaming regulators — to testify at the second trial about Tose's appearance while he gambled.

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# Jobless claims signal slack employment

WASHINGTON — The number of newly laid-off workers filing claims for jobless benefits shot up by 26,000 last week, the government said Thursday in a report seen as the latest sign of slack job growth.

"Labor market conditions remain sluggish," said economist Bruce Steinberg of Merrill Lynch & Co. "Some increases had been expected after the holiday-induced drop of the previous week but the latest jump was more than expected."

New applications for unemployment insurance totaled 359,000 last week, up from a revised 333,000 during the week ended April 10, the Labor Department reported. The department originally estimated that April 10 claims totaled 335,000.

Economists Marilyn Schajda and Christine Schneider of Donaldson, Lufkin & Jenrette Securities Corp. agreed the figures "project a picture of a stagnant labor market."

But they attributed the increase in part to the return to a full workweek after a week that included the Good Friday holiday, when some state unemployment offices were closed.

Many analysts prefer to track a four-week moving average of claims because it smooths out the volatility of the weekly numbers.

But it also rose in the latest reporting period, to 361,000 from 358,000 a week earlier.

Steinberg said the recent trend in jobless claims suggested the creation of about 135,000 new jobs in April — less than half those produced in the months following previous recessions. The report came a day after the Republican defeat of most of President Clinton's \$16.3 billion jobs bill, which GOP senators contended was unnecessary.

However, the Senate did approve a non-controversial \$4 billion to pay for an extension of federal emergency unemployment benefits.

The report also said 26,021 applications were filed under the federal program during the week ended April 10, up from 23,498 during the previous week.

# Computer trading sends Dow dipping 15 points

NEW YORK — Stocks ended lower Thursday after swinging widely on computer-driven program trading.

The Dow fell 15 points at the opening after the Department of Labor said first-time claims for jobless benefits jumped by 26,000 for the week ended April 17. Analysts had expected a rise of 14,000, indicating that the economy may be weaker than they had thought.

Computer-driven buy programs sparked a quick recovery.

Buy programs at one point sent the Dow as high as 3470, or up 31 points on the day. Program traders then reversed themselves, and several waves of sell programs knocked it back down by mid-afternoon.

# The tale of baby Emily Remade 'Call of the Wild' airs

Fox Butterfield put it succinctly: The problem with NBC's "Born To Be Wild" is that the good guy — his baby daughter Emily — dies at the end. One wishes otherwise.

Emily Butterfield, who lived only 53 days, was the daughter of New York Times reporter Butterfield and his wife, Elizabeth Mehren, a reporter for the Los Angeles Times. Mehren was on a flight between Los Angeles and New York when her placenta ruptured, expelling prothrombin amniotic fluid. Emily was born a few hours later, at 25 weeks gestation, on March 26, 1988.

She was 1 pound, 12 ounces and 13 inches long. "Your nursing shows, your filaments, your veins are all that," said Mehren. "You're not more than that."

Some infants can survive at 25 weeks, most cannot, or survive with serious problems. Emily seemed to be doing well, but as it turned out, she too had a serious — ultimately fatal — problem.

"It's very painful to watch that movie," Mehren said. "When we walked out of that neonatal unit, part of my heart stayed there. I most often feel that I have a little angel on my shoulder. I did make a deathbed promise to this baby that the strength and dignity that she displayed would not be forgotten. She's not a movie of the week. There are enormous lessons for people."

Some lessons involve the medical personnel in the hospital's neonatal intensive-care unit. A NICU is "a planet we didn't even know existed," said Mehren. "It's a whole kind of parallel universe. There was no kind of handbook and protocol for this. Mehren developed fond feelings for the nurses, less so for the physicians.

"Inadvertently, I walked into this medical underground," she said, "and I have found myself very much talking out about it. In some ways, it keeps Emily alive. I talk about the lessons my daughter taught me, what I learned from this very small person, her birth, her life and her death. I learned a lot."

"One of the lessons is that if you have a question, you ask the experts: the nurses. Nurses take psychology; doctors take none, at least nothing on a humane level. All of her doctors were brilliant technicians and lacking

in social skills."

Emily Butterfield appeared to be doing well, passing the critical 27-day time period and gaining weight with the aid of a feeding tube. At two pounds, surgeons could operate and find out what was causing the pus that drained from a tube in her distended abdomen. When they did, they found that Emily was suffering massive necrosis of her intestines. She would not live.

Mehren, clinging to hope, had been keeping a detailed daily journal, planning to give it to Emily one day. "I had this extremely copious journal that was hard to read because it had these great teardrops on it," she said.

The journal became the source for her book, "Born Too Soon," published in 1991, condensed in *Readers Digest*, and the basis for this film starring Pamela Reed and Michael Moriarty.

"I simply felt that there was a story to be told," said Mehren. "What happened in that unit was magnified because the critical illness of a small child is an extreme case."

Mehren said she did not intend to be "a doctor-hasher. But I did feel that there were dynamics there that could have been improved. In the beginning, they saw us as an interesting addition (to the NICU), and then we became troublemakers. I asked too many questions and I was their 100 man. The neonatologist couldn't handle the fact that we were not in the winner's circle, that we were not going to be a success story."

"For Elizabeth, the nurses were the heroes," he said. "They were much more able to work with the parents. They were much more humane than the doctors, male or female. Once the operation was performed and it became clear that Emily had no intestine, the doctor washed his hands of us. That's pretty hard to forget. I think the movie downplays some of the antagonism."

Except for some minor changes, Mehren said, the movie is accurate. "It was my mortal fear that they were going to sanitize it. I think it would have been very easy to change the ending." Emily died May 17, 1988, and was buried near her paternal grandparents at the Butterfields' oceanside house, built in 1690. The house is now one in which Edgar Allen Poe lived.

Miller owns Animal Action, a firm that trains animals for movie and television work. His latest project, a remake of Jack London's "Call of the Wild," airs Sunday on CBS. Its "human stars" are Rick Schroder as young adventurer John Thornton and Gordon Tootoosis as Chitlat Charlie, an American Indian who befriends John during the Yukon-Gold Rush. But it also has another main character, Buck the sled dog, and that's where Miller comes in.

"Stop and think about the personal care you give your family, your wife and kids," Miller says of animal training. "You have to do the same with another family, an animal family. If you start your day at 7 a.m. and you get up at 6 a.m., ... well, now you gotta take care of the animals. And the same thing at night. So it turns into quite a long day."

NEW YORK (AP) — The man was asked to explain why he frequents a restaurant he didn't like. "I know the food will be bad," he replied — "but I know just HOW bad."

That kind of thinking helps account for the success of Miller-Boyettt Productions.

Perhaps the names don't ring a bell, but Thomas L. Miller and Robert L. Boyett should be recognized for what they are: packagers of TV's most reliable mystery meat. Grandly, blandly routine, their "Full House," "Family Matters," "Step by Step" and "Getting By" bring, no, not appellate appeal, but unexcelled comfort to television viewing.

Now in its sixth season, "Full House" anchors ABC's hit Tuesday night schedule at 7 p.m. MST.

The other three Miller-Boyettt sitcoms (including the new Cindy Williams showcase "Getting By" air Fridays starting at 7 p.m. MST all part of ABC's self-designated "T.G.I.F." lineup.

In this case, "T.G.I.F." must be shorthand for "thank goodness it's familiar." Perhaps as capably as anyone ever, Miller-Boyettt has capitalized on how with TV, familiarity breeds not contempt, but contentedness.

"I know what I like," viewers contentedly tell themselves as they tune in a Miller-Boyettt show, little suspecting that what they have concocted is quite the opposite: "I like what I know."

With Miller-Boyettt, they do know. Every week, even before the fade-in, they know just what they're gonna get. And how could it be otherwise? Like it or not, they've had the menu and the recipes memorized for years.

What are these series about? It's tempting to say "about 22 minutes." But a television critic, deprived of a rancorous Miller-Boyettt laughtrack, must skip the comic asides and confront his question head-on.

All four series are about a living, multi-burbling family. All four feature bright, smart-mouthed kids. All four center on the living room. All four have a fondness for off-the-rack, all-purpose-inducing finales. All four bear an anti-the-rack, all-purpose title (e'mon, what series COULDN'T be called "Step by Step," unless, it was maybe about ice hockey?).

Worst of all, with all four shows, an interchangeable, smiley-face theme song is tacked on. One champion-

For someone who loves animals as much as Miller does, it is terrific well-spent. "At first, I was just an animal-lover," and it started off as just a hobby," he recalls. "After a while, the hobby had to pay for itself. That's why it works for most of us in the industry."

Several dogs actually played Buck in the current "Call of the Wild," but the principal canine actor is a German shepherd named Velus. "I said Velus did 95 percent of the work, but we used photo doubles the way you would use a stunt double or body double for an actor," Miller says. "Because of the production schedule, you may have two units shooting at the same time to save time. So the other dogs might be 20 miles away, filming long shots."

Movie magic also enables a filmmaker to shoot a seemingly violent fight scene without ever hurting the animals. "These are simulated fights, but they have to look realistic," Miller says.

The process is simple: "We don't just introduce dogs, have 'em bump noses and teach 'em to hate each other," Miller explains. That would be cruel and dangerous. "But we will

take advantage of two dogs that may not like each other, may scarp and argue when they're in the kennel. We will keep them separated when they're in the kennel, of course."

"But once we've established that those two dogs may want to rumble with each other, we take them separately and condition them to wear string muzzles, made of a shoelace-type string. It's flat cotton, so it won't hurt them. If you're not closer than 25 feet, you may not even see it. They only wear them for minutes at a time."

Eventually, the dogs will be conditioned to get in each other's faces, so to speak, while on a leash — sort of opposite of training a dog NOT to fight. Later, they will be allowed to step the leash but are quickly separated. Gradually, the dogs become used to the process and expect to be pulled apart. As in pro wrestling, nobody gets hurt.

Dogs like acting? Even more than humans, Miller claims. "I like to say, 'We go to work. The dogs go to play.'"

"Call of the Wild" airs at 8 p.m. MST Sunday on CBS (KSL and KMVT.)

"You!"

Which Miller-Boyettt shows and characters are represented here?

"No matter. All you need to know is: Miller-Boyettt: Where the customary is always right.

To sum up, then, a Miller-Boyettt series is really about nothing at all. That is, nothing but itself.

# After 25 years, '60 Minutes' still strong

It has lasted longer than the combined network runs of "I Love Lucy," "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" and "The Cosby Show." Longer than "Hill Street Blues," "Cagney & Lacey" and "L.A. Law" put together.

Longer than both "M.A.S.H." and "Cheers," each of which logged an impressive 11 seasons.

"60 Minutes" will mark its 25th year by finishing No. 1 for the season ending Sunday. Although ratings won't be tabulated until next week, there's no way No. 2-rated "Roseanne" can catch the CBS newsmagazine. It will be the fourth time "60 Minutes" has come out on top.

The lessons of "60 Minutes," TV's most enduring success, should not be lost on network programmers struggling to hold on to audiences. Consider:

Since December 1975, the newsmagazine has been in the same time slot — 6 to 7 p.m. MST Sundays. Viewers never need worry that the show will be bounced around the schedule or go on hiatus. On average this season, 31.7 million viewers have tuned in each week.

The show wasn't a blockbuster in the beginning — it took 10 seasons to crack the Nielsen Top 10 for a year — yet CBS' patience has been rewarded over and over. The show earns roughly \$50 million a year and its segments are sold to about 35 nations. The program's \$1 billion earnings for CBS over its run make it the most lucrative program in network history.

"60 Minutes" never targets certain age groups, but instead welcomes all viewers. That's refreshing in an era when some networks, especially NBC, have played the age game — going after younger viewers and please advertisers. That "60 Minutes" actually skews to older viewers — 30 percent of the audience is women over 50 — has never hurt

CBS' bottom line or its ratings. It is the most democratic of TV shows.

The show is still overseen by Don Hewitt, its savvy creator and executive producer. He remembers the way television used to be and still can be in attracting a wide audience. He's the force responsible for the program's unparalleled consistency and vitality.

"The show has a very distinct vocabulary, a way of saying things, and every word comes out of Don Hewitt's mouth," says correspondent Steve Kroft. Because he remains involved in the editing process, Hewitt continues to put the "60 Minutes" polish on every story Kroft says.

Other newsmagazines put a star anchor like Diane Sawyer or Barbara Walters center screen; at "60 Minutes," the storytelling is the star. Hewitt has assembled a top-flight reporter company of broadcast journalists to collaborate with teams of producers. Newcomers Kroft and Lesley Stahl are just as important to the show's success as longtimers Mike Wallace, Morley Safer and Ed Bradley. Even when Sawyer and Dan Rather departed "60 Minutes," the show never faltered. The show's concept was strong enough to sustain it.

How long can the tick-tick-tick continue? Wallace turns 75 next month, and Hewitt is 70, but neither has plans to retire.

Other newsmagazines go in for what Hewitt brands "Kon and Barbie journalism": a male and female anchor bantering afterward about what a story meant. At the no-nonsense "60 Minutes," there's no need. "You've never seen Mike Wallace say one word to Morley Safer on the air," Hewitt says.

The CBS newsmagazine doesn't talk down to viewers, and it doesn't resort to gimmicks, hyperbole, huge graphics or melodramatic music to pump up reports. The clever on-air promos avoid sensationalism. "60 Minutes" always treats viewers like adults.

Despite the slew of newsmagazine competitors, no other show has come close to "60

Minutes" success. It has been a Top 10 hit for the last 16 consecutive seasons, no other newsmagazine has entered the Top 10 for even one season. ABC's "20/20," nearing its 15th anniversary, finished in the Top 25 for the first time last year.

Viewers who complain there's nothing good on network TV should not forget the old standby. Has any one program offered more fascinating hours of television? Can you get the dying brain surgeon who continued to operate? Or Wallace's confronting a priest about allegations of sexually molesting a woman? Or Stahl's donning a dark wig to report on the black market in Romanian babies? — The ultimate compliment to Hewitt: "Somebody says on Monday morning, 'Could you believe that guy on "60 Minutes"?"

The program presents three strong stories week after week. Memorable reports this season have focused on Ross Perot, the mistreatment of women in India, the filmmaking team of James Ivory and Ismail Merchant ("Howards End"), New York City school janitors who are better paid than teachers, totaled cars that are rebuilt and resold, the fight over gay studies for schoolchildren, the way foreigners enter this country, and Tampa's frustrations over failing to win a major league baseball team.

The subjects this Sunday include Asian gangs, Eton School in Great Britain and Sidney Rittenberg, an American imprisoned by the Chinese Communists for 16 years.

"We never think of this as a series," Hewitt says. "We think of it as a special every Sunday night. It's like little television specials stringing together with that spooky stopwatch."

In television, where everyone tries to analyze success, Hewitt refuses to do so.

"It's like a house of cards," he says of the show. "We don't know how we do it. We never sit around and talk about it. We just do it."

May they keep doing it 25 more years — at least.

## Disney, Nashville networks celebrate 10 years on cable

Who needs last names when you're among friends?

Billy Tammy, Hank and Garth will do just fine. So will Mickey, Donald, Alcega and Pluto.

That comfortable familiarity is a major element behind the success of both The Nashville Network, home to the country music firmament, and The Disney Channel, home to kids' favorite characters. Each of these cable channels is celebrating its 10th anniversary this spring, going strong and growing still in the volatile cable business.

TNN and Disney succeeded because they swam against the TV tide. While the rest of the industry was jumping through hoops seeking the latest, newest, trend, many viewers were feeling nostalgic — even rejected — by the medium's increasingly flashy, sophisticated and sexy-intensity. These folks preferred traditional, respectful forms of entertainment, programs that didn't change every week and didn't challenge them, but instead reinforced their own bedrock, heartland, family-values produced but "wholesome" shows their kids could watch and they themselves could view without feeling embarrassed or offended.

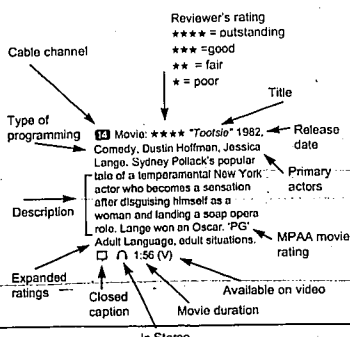

Q. Tell me where the term "soap opera" originated? I see nothing operative about these daytime follies nor are they the cleanest programs on the air. — B., Sherman Oaks, Calif.

A. The term goes back to the 1920s and the early days of radio, when most of the daytime serials were sponsored, and often produced, by soap manufacturers. Soap makers still are major sponsors of the serials. As for "opera," one definition says it's because they "showcased larger-than-life emotions and melodramatic plots."

Q. Has David Canary, who is Adam Chandler on "All My Children," ever appeared on "Bonanza"? — D., Scranton, Pa.

A. He did. In fact, he was on the show two different times. He played Candy, a wanderer who came to the Ponderosa, in 1967. Canary left in 1970 and returned in 1972 for the final season of the western. But Canary's been a soap opera stalwart, with roles in "The Doctors" and "Another World," before joining "AMC" in 1983.

# ABC chief says network, not Roseanne, will decide 'Jackie Thomas Show' fate

# Husband beats LaToya Jackson

Bob Iger to Roseanne Arnold: You don't scare me.

In his annual end-of-season media confab, ABC Network boss Iger said Tuesday that ABC — and "only ABC" — would decide the fate of Tom Arnold's "The Jackie Thomas Show," despite Mrs. Arnold's noises about taking "Roseanne" to another network if Tom's new sitcom is dumped. (Wake up and smell Tom's Nielsen, Rosie.)

"Roseanne has enjoyed speaking her piece in public for a long time, and I'm not in a position to influence that," Iger said at ABC's New York headquarters. "She is fully capable of conducting her business, but it is not my favorite technique to negotiate in public."

"Roseanne," owned by Carsey-Werner, finished No. 2 among 139 shows on Nielsen's hit parade, behind only CBS's "60 Minutes." "Jackie," which followed "Roseanne" at 8:30 p.m. MST Tuesdays before hitting the shelf last month, tied for 16th, losing almost a third of her audience, the Arnolds own it.

"Roseanne" is under contract to ABC for one more season. After that, Roseanne herself owes two years to Carsey-Werner. Any deci-

sions about "Roseanne's" future will be made by C-W, not its star, Iger said. He refused to confirm industry buzz that ABC has right of first refusal on the show.

"Jackie" is under "incredible scrutiny" because of its time slot as well as its stars, Iger said. Any post-"Roseanne" show "is held up to a high standard" because it has "not only a chance to garner large ratings but also a chance to make a lot of money."

ABC ignored Roseanne's "deadline" last week to "decide about 'Jackie.'" According to Iger, ABC has the legal option to wait until late next month, and Iger intends to do so. While refusing to label "Jackie Thomas" a failure, Iger said it wasn't a "rousing success," either. On a positive note (for the Arnolds), Iger said he was pleased that the prickly pair pitched changes in "Jackie" "that were consistent with ABC's thinking." Should it return — and smart money says it will — it won't necessarily get the same plum slot.

Either way, Iger knows he's in for some heat.

If "Jackie" is renewed, he will be accused of caving into star pressure. That pressure "has been used for years by very successful producers and actors who have done well and wanted more," Iger said.

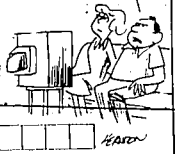

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# King of diamond history holds court

CHICAGO — He learned to read from the backs of baseball cards, and at the age of 10, discovered he had a photographic memory. So he began doing so-called parlor tricks. He could, for example, recite Ty Cobb's batting average, in chronological order, for all of Cobb's 24 major-league seasons.

"I look at things and they stick in my memory," said John Thorn. "It can be a both blessing and a curse." Then he quickly added: "Memorizing facts doesn't make you a historian. A photographic memory is not necessarily a mark of intelligence."

Perhaps not, but I am convinced that Thorn is the possessor of baseball's highest IQ. He has emerged as the reigning diamond historian and was at Comiskey Park on Monday night promoting his newest work, the third edition of "Total Baseball" (HarperCollins, \$35).

It runs 2,632 pages and, as advertised, is "The Ultimate Encyclopedia of Baseball." Thorn's co-author, Peter Palmer, did the stats, individual and team records, etc. Thorn had the press section, and has come up with some remarkable findings.

He reveals, without a shadow of lingering doubt, that it was Daniel Lucius Adams of Mount Vernon, N.H., who set the bases 90 feet apart, not Alexander Cartwright, as popularly believed. Adams also established nine men to a side, nine innings as the length of the game and successfully argued against allowing putouts on first-bounce catches.

Baseball was not invented by any one person, certainly not Abner Doubleday. The Doubleday Myth was destroyed more than 50 years ago. But before Thorn's research, Cartwright was regarded as the unquestioned "Father of Baseball."

"We want fairy godfathers," Thorn said. "People prefer legends to fact, and that's OK. There is probably no harm done by it. My only objection is that the truth is far more interesting. Baseball evolved by stumbling and inadvertence, not the spark of genius."

Thorn, 46, lives in Saugerties, N.Y., but is acquainted with the Midwest. He was an English major at Beloit College in Beloit, Wis. While working on his doctorate at Washington University in St. Louis, he was writing a dissertation on George Herbert, a 17th century English poet.

"That's when I realized Ray Herbert was more interesting than George," Thorn said, referring to a front-line pitcher, a one-time 20-game winner who pitched for five major-league clubs, including the White Sox. "I never finished the dissertation."

Thorn has immersed himself in baseball history ever since and is the author of 30 baseball books, among them the highly perceptive "Hidden Game of Baseball," which demonstrates that in Italy it was a defensive game, the highlights were fielding, throwing and baserunning.

The pitcher was not an adversary and instead laid the ball in, responding to the instructions of the batters, who advised where the ball should be thrown, similar to today's

batting practice procedure. The purpose of the game, Thorn explains, was to put the ball in play and create opportunities for the display of fine-fielding. Acrobatic defensive play, ball-like movement, was the primary attraction.

"Corruption was the great innovator," Thorn said. For example, Jim Creighton, who had a five-year career (1858-62) with the Brooklyn Excelsiors, was the first to violate the rule that the pitcher must deliver the ball with a stiff wrist.

To put spin on the ball, Creighton turned his wrist and was the first to throw a fastball in earnest. In doing so, he no longer was a friend to the hitters, but an opponent. He was also the first player to accept money for play.

Creighton is better remembered as the player who died while hitting a home run. In those days the batter got all of his power from the twisting motion of the torso. Creighton overextended himself on a swing, causing his bladder to rupture, and he collapsed and died at home plate.

Thorn's strength is that, as a revisionist historian, he is aware that baseball is part of our extended family. "We talk about Roger Clemens more than we talk about Aunt Minnie out in Montana," Thorn said. "Big-league ballplayers come into our home. They visit with us; we visit with them. Baseball has always offered an illusion of intimacy."

"It links the ages of man within each of us. I remember what it was like to be a boy every time I go to a ballgame, and that's a good feeling."

# Bob Knight helps Nick Nolte ready for coaching debut, role

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) — Bob Knight imparted a few gems of wisdom as Nick Nolte prepared for his coaching debut with a prep all-star squad dominated by Indiana University recruits.

Knight told Nolte not to do any coaching whatsoever.

"He told me to just sit and observe and take it all in," Nolte said. "He said I would know what to do when the camera's on."

"And he told me certainly don't throw a chair," the actor said, referring to a sideline stunt that haunts Knight to this day. "It was mainly a game for the recruits."

The advice didn't help. Nolte's squad lost 118-102 to another all-star team coached by William Friedkin, who will direct the movie "Blue Chips" starring Nolte as a college coach.

Nolte's South team led 53-41 at halftime as guard Steve Hair, an Indiana recruit from Terre Haute, scored 17 of his 27 points in the opening period.

The North outscored the South 18-7 in the first three minutes of the second half to take control.

Guard Ray Weathers, a Michigan State recruit, led the North with 28 points. Chianti Roberts of Oklahoma State added 19, and Illinois recruit Jerry Hester had 18, including eight during the early-second-half streak.

Indiana recruits Monte Maraccini and Robbie Eggers and Connecticut recruit Kirkland King added 14 points apiece.

"From the layman's point of view, I like them," Nolte said of the future Hoosiers. "They're good ball players. I think there's a lot of talent there. We'll see what coach Knight does with them."

Nolte spent time with Knight and the Hoosiers earlier this year to prepare for his film role.

The 6-foot-10 Eggers, from Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, didn't mind Nolte's lack of coaching experience.

"He was with us at the hotel and went around with us," Eggers said. "Just to sit around and talk and ask questions... He's a great guy. It was a big thrill for me, especially after seeing him in all those movies."

"Blue Chips" also will include college physics teacher Gilbert Cheney and Indiana's three other seniors from this past season. Indiana native Larry Bird will have a role playing himself, and some of the scenes will be shot in Bird's hometown of French Lick.

The Paramount movie is scheduled for release next year. Filming will begin May 10 in Los Angeles.

# Barry Bonds: A man on a mission

The image liners, even today, in Barry Bonds' mind. Actually, we all still see the same picture of Andy-Van-Slyke-sitting-by-himself in the outfield — 10 minutes without a muscle twitch — after the Pirates disappeared from the NLCS. Bonds had just made a near-miracle throw to the plate in the ninth inning, almost nailing Sid Bream in Game 7 against the Braves, almost saving the Bucs from a 3-2 loss. Almost. It still wounds Bonds to think about it.

"What can you do about it? I still try to forget about it? You can't turn the clock back," Bonds said Tuesday night. "You watch the highlights of the Blue Jays and Braves and... we gave 'em a fight, but we ended up with more bruises than they did you know? It doesn't mean we had anything to be ashamed of."

It was a couple of hours before the Giants began a three-game series with the Mets, and Bonds was wearing a new uniform, talking about his new friends — Will Clark, Matt Williams — and trying hard to escape the feeling you get when a piece of your past disappears forever.

Bonds has won two MVP awards in the last three years, and he is still not sniffing to go deep with every swing. But his Pirates are history: first Bobby Bonilla left, then John Smiley, then Doug Drabek and now Bonds, replaced by a new left fielder named Carlos Garcia whom Bonds says, "reminds me of myself when I was younger."

There was a part of Bonds that wanted to return to Pittsburgh as a free agent, knowing that Jimmy Leyton would be "a guy I'll always love." Bonds said — needed him back. But a man who says he learned about "the business side of baseball" as the son of a major lea-

guer knew there was more money with the Giants, a better universe waiting from the highest bidder.

Better to leave the 1991-93 Pirates alone in the mind. As Bonds said, "When it's over, it's over. I mean, I'm sure the Oakland A's had the same feeling, the old Yankee teams, even the Mets from 1986. I had great memories, a good time while it lasted, but you know, now there are younger players there."

He likes to call baseball a "classroom" and has taken his education to the NL West. Going into last night's game, Bonds was hitting 100, already having put together six multi-hit games, already being voted the National League's Player of the Week. But will that mean anything later in the summer? The Giants may or may not have a chance of surviving against the Braves. Actually they probably don't, although a lineup with Bonds, Clark and Williams will make the innings difficult for any pitching staff, even Atlanta's.

But even if the Giants do run out of octane somewhere in the middle of July, they'll still get a chance to see baseball's best player, up close, every day. We watch, we wonder: what is it that makes Bonds' swing so perfect? Why is it that every at-bat — even the

bad ones — seems so dangerous?

Part of Bonds' blessing is his bat speed, but he knows it's more than that. The reasons for Bonds' 333 RBI in the last three seasons start, mostly, in his own head. Depending on how you feel about Bonds, he is either confident or else terribly arrogant. It's independent or else, honest or rude. There is proof of the old axiom that hitting is mostly attitude. But whatever Bonds is, he is not afraid of being the best, or the richest, or the most outrageous.

It would be easy for Bonds to blend in with his \$43 million. Many players have done just that — take the money and vanish, or at least stop improving. But Bonds says, "I love the step improving. But Bonds says, 'I love the challenge.'" He means the business of attacking his own numbers. Bonds is already the first player in history to average 30 HRs, 100 RBI and 40 stolen bases in a three-year period, and now you ask him, seriously, how much better can a man hit a baseball?

Bonds likes to say, "The game is what drives me, the game itself." There is more to it, no matter how heatedly he denies it. There are no playoffs. Failure still live in Bonds' consciousness, and while he is quick to say, "You don't know a thing about my personal life," Bonds is also ready to confess, "You get those feelings, you're only human, that, I was there for 162 games, who I could not be there for seven?"

"I didn't blame myself (for the Pirates losses), but I did say that I (stunk). I took it right on the chin." A few minutes later, Bonds was talking about being "just a man trying to get by." And with that, he smiled. Bonds is hardy baseball's Everyman. In some ways, he is "It's Only Man" — with a single goal in 1993.

"Yeah, I want to get to the World Series," he said. "I'm tired of getting my butt kicked in the playoffs."

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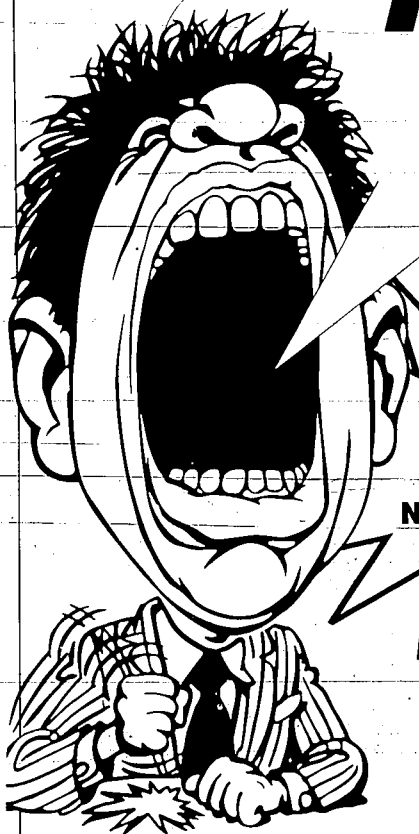
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
