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# Bosnia' decision splits Washington

WASHINGTON — Inexperienced in foreign affairs and facing what could be a no-win decision, President Clinton is being tugged in opposite directions as he weighs bombing strikes and the lifting of an international arms embargo on Bosnia. He's hardly the only one who's torn. Congress is divided between fears of a new Vietnam quagmire and the horror of

"ethnic cleansing" of Bosnian Muslims by Serbs. Pentagon leaders are split over whether air strikes will stop the Serbs' aggression or simply inflame them. And, allies are reluctant to take tougher steps, fearing a widening of the war and a backlash against British, French and other forces taking part in U.N. relief operations.

"Everybody agrees that there is no clear, good course of action," White House press secretary Dee Dee Myers said Thursday. "There are costs and risks with every decision." However, she said, "The one thing that's clear is the president firmly believes we must take more action to stop ethnic cleansing (the systematic elimination of Bosnian Muslims and Croats) and to stop Serbian aggression in Bosnia." The decision rests with Clinton, who is far more comfortable grappling with prob-

lems at home than with crises overseas. "The only thing the president has ruled out is ground forces at this time," White House communications director George Stephanopoulos said.

Clinton met for two hours Thursday with the Pentagon's Joint Chiefs of Staff, Defense Secretary Les Aspin and Secretary of State Warren Christopher. Powell said later it was "a full discussion of a wide range of

# Spending freedom

## States like federal money but want power to spend it as they choose

WASHINGTON — Money alone won't buy happiness for the nation's governors. Sure, they'd like to see more federal spending on education, health, transportation, housing and other programs. But according to an Associated Press survey of governors, what they covet even more is the freedom to spend federal dollars however they choose.

"Rarely does money come from Washington with no strings attached; even though the states are in the best position to determine how best to implement programs that benefit their own residents," said Illinois Gov. Jim Edgar, a Republican. "They've got a sympathetic ear over at the White House, where a former governor now resides."

President Clinton already has told the Department of Health and Human Services to give states more flexibility in administering Medicaid, the health care program for the poor. Oregon has been given a waiver that will allow it to treat more people, but reduce the number of covered treatments. And Vermont has administration permission to cut benefits for people who don't find jobs or accept public service work after 2 1/2 years in the Aid to Families with Dependent Children welfare program, a plan awaiting final approval by the state legislature.

The costs of AFDC, like Medicaid, is shared by the states and federal government, so any revisions must be approved by the federal government.

The AP survey of dozens of governors found that many would like to see that freedom extended beyond health and welfare programs. It's an attitude that crosses party lines.

Said Vermont Gov. Howard Dean, a Democrat: "I would tell them to keep their money and just give us our flexibility, particularly in the areas of education, health care and housing." Needs, too, vary from state to state. "What might work in California or New York may not work in Wisconsin or Ohio," said Wisconsin Gov. Tommy G. Thompson, a Republican. "Therefore, flexibility is a necessity."

That's a particular worry for governors looking ahead to Clinton's health care reform package: But a bipartisan group that met with the president Wednesday said he assured them that states would have lots of running room implementing the plan.

In the survey, Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus said the Reagan and Bush administrations required the states to spend money for specific programs in the areas of education, highways, the environment, and welfare, among others.

"What's the biggest thing the Clinton administration can do for us?" asked Andrus. Please see MONEY/A2

# Shoshone students air grievances

The walk-out ended about 15 minutes after it started.

SHOSHONE — The principal of the junior-senior high school acknowledged Thursday that she has made a point of allowing excrement to lie on a boys' restroom floor and has required students to sit in closet-sized punishment booths for up to six hours.

Principal Sue Ringquist's admission came after about 20 students walked out of the school between classes at 9:15 a.m. Thursday. They later issued a list of complaints, including an objection to the punishment booths.

"I went out and told them they needed to come back to class, or I would suspend them and call their parents to come and get them," Ringquist said Thursday afternoon.

About five minutes after Ringquist spoke with the students, student body President Jeremy Higley and four other students went to the principal's office and handed her a list of complaints:

- The students said the wooden detention booths are excessive punishment.
- Students asked for School Board

# House passes weak Demo line-item veto measure

WASHINGTON — The House gave President Clinton a largely symbolic victory on his 100th day in office Thursday, voting to strengthen his hand slightly in the fight against pork-barrel spending projects.

The measure, approved 258-157, was an echo of last year's presidential campaign, when voters demanded that something be done about sky-high budget deficits and expensive projects lawmakers win for their home districts.

"We have a perception problem we have to deal with," said Rep. Vic Fazio, D-Calif., referring to public distaste for pork-barrel spending. "And what better way to deal with it than incrementally, truly in a conservative way, allowing an experiment ... to restore public confidence in an institution they believe is out of control."

The Democratic bill would force Congress to vote on presidential requests to kill, or rescind, already enacted spending

items. Such requests would survive only if approved by majorities in both chambers. The new requirement would last for only two years.

The president currently can propose such rescissions, but they don't take effect unless lawmakers approve them within 45 days. Usually, they die because they are ignored.

Democrats ended up voting for the bill by a 174-70 margin, while Republicans were split: 84 voted "yes" and 86 voted "no." The chamber's lone independent, Rep. Bernard Sanders of Vermont, also voted "no."

For their part, Republicans mocked the measure as a sham that would do little more than fool the public into believing something had been accomplished.

The measure now moves to the Senate. Its prospects there are unsure because of opposition by Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., and the uncertain position of Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine.

# Workers, backers remember Chavez

DELANO, Calif. — As thousands of farm workers and their supporters gathered Thursday in this sunbaked town to celebrate the life of Cesar Chavez, Donna Huerta and other leaders of the United Farm Workers union wanted to convey this message:

"La lucha," the struggle, will continue. Chavez and his union experienced their greatest triumphs here and reminders of those times were never far from view Thursday.

The three-mile funeral procession began in the city park where Chavez, with help from then-Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, ended his first public hunger strike in 1968. Mass was said under a tent at Forty Acres, the complex where in 1970 the fledgling UFW union signed its first contracts with grape growers of the Central Valley.

# Waco inferno toll exceeds 70

WACO, Texas — Investigators ended their search for bodies in the charred Branch Davidian compound Thursday after finding more than 70.

That would be least a dozen fewer people than cult leader David Koresh had claimed were with him.

There was no immediate word of whether Koresh's body was among those found.

In all, 32 of the victims were found in a fortified first-floor room. In Washington, a spokesman for the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms said agency Director Stephen E. Higgins may step down after the Clinton administration completes its review of the agency's ill-fated raid on the compound.

## Weather summary

In the Magic Valley, a few light showers developed around midday and again in early evening but precipitation reports were only traces or at most a few hundredths of an inch.

Winds were generally light but at times became brisk. Afternoon temperatures were in the 40s and 50s. The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 69 degrees at Emmett. Malad reported the coldest at 29 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 103 degrees at Blythe, Calif. Pinedale, Wyo., reported the lowest temperature at 18 degrees.

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## Thunderstorms bring tornadoes, flooding to Oklahoma

Rain fell on much of the south-central portion of the nation Thursday.

Meanwhile, a thunderstorm system caused extensive flooding in central Oklahoma.

A late dusting of snow was scattered over northeast Minnesota but had turned to rain by afternoon.

Flooding was reported in Oklahoma at Bristow, Dewey and Dewar. In Stillwater, 110 people were evacuated overnight as rising water threatened their homes.

No damage or injuries were reported and many were allowed to return Thursday, although Stillwater's schools were closed due to street flooding.

Stillwater police said more than 7 inches of rain had fallen since Wednesday morning. The rain was the result of a strong thunderstorm system that also spawned several tornadoes.

At midday, rain showers and thundershowers extended from New Mexico through Texas into the lower Mississippi Valley. Rain fell on the eastern end of the Upper Great Lakes and the western half of the Lower Ohio Valley.

More than an inch of rain fell in Houston, Texas, in the six hours ending at noon MDT.

Flooding continued around the shore of Lake Champlain in Vermont and New York, though the water level at Rouses Point, N.Y., fell.

Temperatures around the nation at 1 p.m. MDT ranged from 34 degrees at Duluth, Minn., to 102 degrees at Palm Springs, Calif.

A record low for the date was set in Wilmington, N.C., which cooled to 30 degrees, eclipsing a record of 31 set in 1922.

... military options as well as consideration of the current diplomatic situation. We haven't ruled anything off the table" other than the use of ground forces.

Christopher said the resumption of international peace talks on Bosnia will not affect Clinton's plans for tougher action against the Serbs.

"It does not change our plans at all," Christopher said. "The president's decision-making process is on track, it will go forward as it was intended to go forward... What we need from the Serbs, both the Bosnian Serbs and the Serbs in Serbia, is deeds, not words."

On Saturday, Clinton will confer with all his foreign policy and national security advisers in what may be the final decision-making meeting.

Whatever he decides will be unpopular with some.

"Five-hundred-and-thirty-five members of Congress have almost 535 different ideas of what should be done because it is that frustrating and that complex," Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., said.

Former Defense Secretary Dick Cheney, appearing on NBC's "Today" show, said, "Lifting the arms embargo, I would support. I think that makes sense. Selective air strikes — I haven't heard yet a good rationale for how that's going to work, I think it'll be far tougher to take out those artillery sites than

... determined in Washington," he said.

Some states are coping by shuffling budget funds from one program to another.

"We have had to cut other programs to maintain the state share of Medicaid spending," said Montana Gov. Marc Racicot, a Republican.

In Georgia, Gov. Zell Miller said taxes had to be raised for the first time in decades because in just one year — fiscal 1991 — the state share of Medicaid spending jumped by more than one-fourth.

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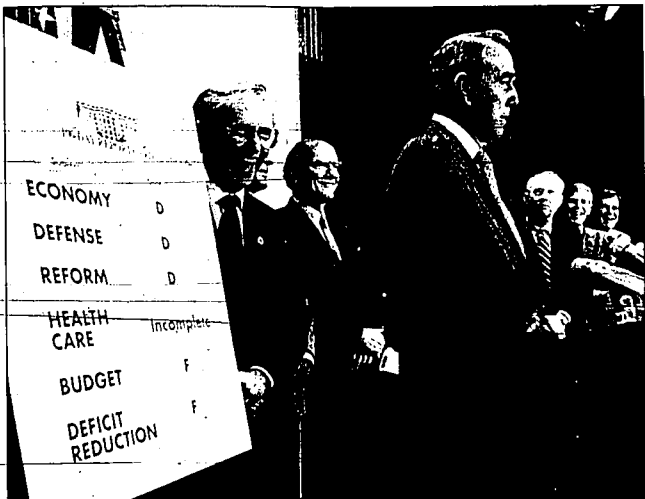

## For all the 100-day ratings, the score at day 200 will tell more

### Analysis

WASHINGTON — President Clinton hit the 100-day mark Thursday with mixed reviews but a common theme: uncertainty.

A better benchmark comes in another hundred days, when the fate of Clinton's ambitious agenda will be much clearer.

In a way, to borrow a baseball metaphor, a president's first 100 days can be like spring training: full of excitement, rookie mistakes, experiments — and scores that don't necessarily tell you much about the long season to come.

Not that they don't tell you anything.

"I learned that things are not going to change quite as fast as I wanted them to," Clinton said Thursday. "But this country has some serious problems and we're going to have to get everybody serious about dealing with the problems."

Much of that dealing will come in the next 100 days, a period full of dilemmas, decisions and deadlines for Clinton.

At home, the president is putting the finishing touches on a dramatic health care reform package and his national service program, with campaign finance, welfare and education reform initiatives to follow. And, come July, Clinton faces his deadline for a plan allowing homosexuals to serve openly in the military.

All this while Congress turns Clinton's economic blueprint into an economic program, a process that will test his resolve and political skills against the myriad interest groups and lawmakers out to make changes, large and small.

"That's a real action period," says White House communications director George Stephanopoulos. "You can't really judge until that is done."

Or, as Senate Republican leader Bob Dole puts it, "We start shooting real bullets now."

Meanwhile, there are worries in Washington, shared by the public at large, that Clinton is trying to do too much, too soon.

"It's important for the administration to get back its focus on the economy and health care," said Democratic pollster Celinda Lake.

Those issues no doubt will be the major focus of a White House that says it learned a lesson watching Senate Republicans kill Clinton's jobs bill.

In the next hundred days, he will spend more time courting Republicans and, more importantly in the White House's view, more time trying to rally public support for his cornerstone initiatives.

Focusing Clinton hardly has the luxury of focusing solely on the domestic front.

He must deliver on promises to take tougher steps against Serbian aggressors in the former Yugoslavia and to offer Russia an additional \$1.8 billion aid package. On neither issue is there consensus in Congress or public opinion.

For a president, having to do too much at once is a fact of life, said Republican Sen. Richard Lugar of Indiana. "He has to be both the president of the United States and the president of the free world."

At the 100-day mark, Lugar is a minority among Republicans: He

credits Clinton with a "very vigorous 100 days" and believes even better days lie ahead.

"I would think in the second hundred days that the president will move much more in the direction of building bipartisan coalitions," Lugar said. "And if he does, he is going to have a great deal of success."

Democratic Sen. John Breaux of Louisiana said he already sees evidence of that on health care, "the next big issue."

Some aides want Clinton to hold off on health care until after the economic plan is adopted, but the president is committed to unveiling his plan next month.

Pollster Lake said it would be "political suicide" for Clinton to wait, but that the White House better do a better sales job than it did with the jobs bill.

"It can't be a debate about taxes. It has to be a debate about security and reform," she said. Health care, she said, "gives Clinton an enormous opportunity to define this presidency."

Even most Republicans agree it has been hard to define Clinton's presidency during the first 100 days, what House Minority Whip Newt Gingrich called "the shakedown period."

Clinton enters the next phase with many in Congress eager to test him, and a public growing increasingly impatient for proof its demands for change will be met.

"They voted for effective government," said Republican pollster Ed Gees.

"You can run a campaign on rhetoric and promises but you can't run the White House, you can't run the government, unless you have results."

## National service plan includes college tuition

WASHINGTON (AP) — Students who perform community service could work off \$13,000 in college tuition, get a modest stipend and qualify for health care and day care benefits under President Clinton's national service program.

According to a White House outline of the program obtained by The Associated Press, the plan to be unveiled today also includes a more controversial component — to make higher education affordable: a \$25 billion federal government takeover of the college loan program.

### Retired general fears gays' military effect

WASHINGTON (AP) — Allowing homosexuals to serve in the military would make America's armed services "second-rate," a retired Army lieutenant general told Congress.

But under questioning from members of the Senate Armed Services Committee, C.A.H. Waller acknowledged that homosexuals who have kept their orientation secret have served admirably. Waller, deputy commander of U.S. forces in the Persian Gulf War, expressed opposition to the "openly avowed homosexuals" who want to "foist their lifestyle upon soldiers, sailors, airmen and marines."

## By mistake, IRS sends woman \$91,952; she does the right thing

SEATTLE — Most people are happy to receive tax-refund checks from the Internal Revenue Service, but the one Heather Mull of Seattle got made her more nervous than pleased.

Mull, 24, didn't think she deserved any tax refund, so she was particularly puzzled by the government check that showed up in her mailbox this month — for \$91,952.95.

"It was unnerving," said Mull, an employee of King County Medical Blue Shield. "My imagination just ran on about what could happen to me" when Uncle Sam detected the error, she said.

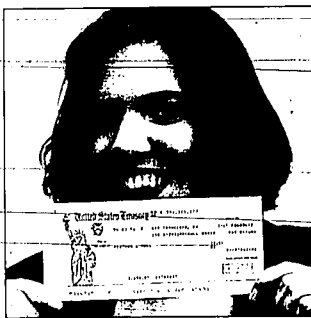
Mull said a notice that she'd be receiving the payment came on April 1, tempting her to wonder if it might be someone's idea of an April Fool's prank. But sure enough, the check came a few days later.

Her attorney, Bob Kane, said the refund stemmed from a credit of about \$1,200 Mull was to receive on her 1991 taxes after recently sending in missing forms for that tax year. But somehow the amount of the credit grew by some \$90,000 — plus interest.

On Wednesday, Kane informed the IRS of the error, and his client later returned it to the government agency.

Keeping money that belongs to the government — even if it is sent in error — can result in having to pay it back plus 7 percent interest, said Kane, a former Justice Department lawyer who has represented the IRS in court.

Mull said she never seriously considered keeping the loot. "Of course, that kind of thing would cross a person's mind in the abstract sense, but it's not the right thing to do and I would not have felt good about it ... The truth of the

matter is the money never belonged to me."

Besides, she said, she supports President Clinton and wants to see him succeed. "We have this big problem with the deficit and we can't afford to give money to people who don't have it coming."

## Ruling frees move to more local channels

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cable television operators lost a bid Thursday to delay enforcement of a federal law that requires them to devote about one-third of their channels to local broadcast stations.

Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist rejected an emergency request by cable operators and programmers who sought to postpone the law's effect until the full Supreme Court acts on a formal appeal.

"It simply is not indisputably clear that (the cable operators and programmers) have a First Amendment right to be free from government regulation," Rehnquist wrote.

The cable operators and programmers say the 1992 Cable Television Consumer Protection and Competition Act violates their free speech rights.

The law requires cable operators to set aside part of their system's channel capacity for commercial and public broadcast TV stations.

That results in "directly controlling the content of cable operators' speech while simultaneously elevating the speech of broadcasters over ... the speech of cable programmers who must compete for the remaining spots on a cable system," cable industry lawyers told Rehnquist.

Lawyers representing the Federal Communications Commission argued against delaying the law's effect.

"The must-carry provisions are designed to regulate an economic market in serious dysfunction, and thereby to protect the First Amendment interests of viewers to receive a diversity of programming and information," government lawyers said.

## New Hampshire House defeats King holiday

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — Legislators on Thursday rejected a holiday honoring the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., leaving New Hampshire the only state without one.

The House defeated the bill 199-

Gov. Steve Merrill had said he would sign executive orders each year adding King's name to the state's Civil Rights Day.

Some opponents felt King was inappropriate during the Vietnam War and a womanizer.

# TV movie a story of faith, actress says

## Jillian to speak at Albertson College

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Actress Ann Jillian had given up hope of having a child of her own when she read about a woman who became pregnant with her own grandchildren.

"I thought it was the most remarkable thing," the actress said, sitting in her living room near a playpen full of toys. "It's a story of faith of what the human spirit can do."

A few months later, Jillian — resigned to childlessness after 15 years of marriage — unexpectedly became pregnant.

Now the delighted mother of a 16-month-old son, she is portraying that grandmother in "Labor of Love: The Arlette Schweitzer Story," a CBS movie being shown Sunday for Mother's Day.

The movie costars Tracey Gold as the daughter born without a uterus, and also features Bill Smitrovich, Elizabeth Perkins, Diana Scarwid and Frances Sternhagen.

Arlette Schweitzer herself makes an early cameo appearance, as a coworker of the movie's star.

"All the daughter ever wanted was to be a mom," Jillian said. "She planned it from the time she was little, and when the time came, it was a disaster — but she didn't have a place in her body to hold a baby."

Schweitzer risked her health to be-

come impregnated with two eggs from her daughter — fertilized in vitro by her son-in-law's sperm — and gave birth to twins.

"This particular role has parallels for me," said Jillian. "Both of us were 42 when we gave birth, both of us Roman Catholic, both C-sections, both the same kind of outlook (on life). It gave me a chill when I read the script. ... It was so ironic that it would come to me."

Also, she said: "There was pain involved for both."

She cited concerns about medical complications and of stirring painful memories for Schweitzer, who years earlier had lost a son to Sudden Infant Death Syndrome.

There was another irony in the casting. In 1987, Jillian played herself in the op-rated TV movie "The Ann Jillian Story," about her personal experi-

ence undergoing a double mastectomy and surviving breast cancer.

Initially, she had intended to give the leading role to another actress, and the person she had in mind was Scarwid.

When Jillian arrived on location in North Carolina to film "Labor of Love" and scanned the cast list, there was Scarwid portraying her sister.

"There was such a strong empathy there between the two of us," she said. "I'm happy to say that she's a new friend."

The actress noted that she supports Schweitzer's actions, although some viewers may question the choice of becoming a surrogate mother even for love.

"We're both Roman Catholics, so we had questions of faith, and I'm happy to say the church did support her," Jillian said. "As far as I can see,

every child comes from God. It's a miracle. For us, with our finite minds, to question such a miraculous result is not something I'm going to tackle. ...

"These wonderful new treatments and these wonderful technologies, God would not have put that into someone's brain to do if it could not be used for good. I suppose anything in life could be twisted to be used for bad, but it seems clear to me that every baby is a gift from God."

Jillian said she spends most of her time now with her son, Andrew Joseph Murcia, but continues to raise funds for The American Cancer Society, the Children's Center of Antelope Valley, St. Jude's Childrens Hospital and other causes.

She also is maintaining her career as a singer; she'll perform May 14-16 at the Claridge Hotel and Casino in Atlantic City.

"She'll also be featured in a comedy special, 'Bob Hope: The First 90 Years,' May 14 on NBC.

Becoming a parent, Jillian said, has made her sensitive to the exploitive nature of movies and television.

"Now, being a mother, I see so much more clearly," she said. "I say, 'There are limits.' Good taste and your own self-decency will provide the limits. If we dig down inside ourselves, we know what's going too far."

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# Writers review arts commission grant awards applications this weekend

Every other year, the Arts Commission awards \$5,000 Fellowships for excellence in writing, up to \$5,000 for Worksite (special pro-

ject applications) and \$10,000 for a Writer-in-Residence who will provide readings throughout the state and promote literature for the two years of his or her term.

This year, the panelists will be reviewing 55 Fellowship, three Worksite and 25 Writer-in-Residence applications. They will recommend up to six Fellowship and Worksite applicants and a Writer-in-Residence for consideration by the Idaho Arts Commission at its June meeting in Boise.

Panelists reviewing the manuscript submissions are Molly Gloss, fiction writer and Pen/Faulkner Award finalist for her book "The Jump-Off Creek" published by Houghton Mifflin; Tom Spanbauer, fiction writer and Pulitzer Prize nominee for his book, "The Man Who Fell in Love with the Moon," published by Atlantic Monthly Press; Primus St. John, a poet, professor at Portland State University and author of "Dreamer" published by Carnegie Mellon

University Press; and Diana Kappel-Smith, non-fiction writer whose most recent book is "Desert Time" published by Little, Brown and Co.

These panelists will be reviewing blind copies of the manuscripts, based on the criteria for each category. The process will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday with a discussion of the Fellowship submissions. Idaho's current Writer-in-Residence, poet Daryl Jones, will be joining the panelists to review the Writer-in-Residence ap-

plicants Sunday morning. Panel meetings are open to public observation, but the public will not be allowed to participate or influence in any way the panel deliberations.

The Idaho Commission on the Arts is a state agency dedicated to making the arts available to all Idaho people. It is governed by 13 citizens from throughout the state who are appointed by the governor. The commission prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, gender, disability or age.

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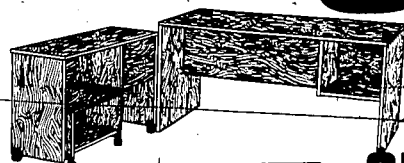
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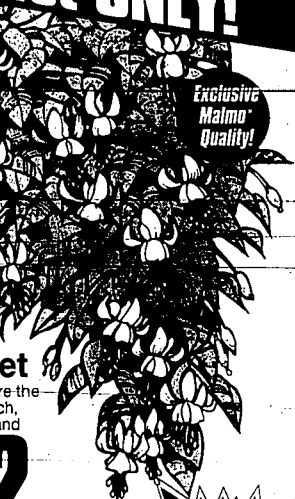

### Political huddle gives hope for wilderness bill

It's far too early to celebrate, but the news from Washington is encouraging. Idaho may be on its way toward a wilderness bill at last.

The prospect is all tantalizing and hard to accept. We've had our hopes up before, and we've been disappointed. But this time may be different.

This time, the working group is not only bipartisan but broad. Gov. Cecil Andrus and all four members of the Idaho congressional delegation have been meeting this week, and all five appear committed to pursuing a compromise.

That promise gives the attempt a better chance than the failed attempt by Andrus and former Sen. James McClure to resolve the issue in the late 1980s. Though the Andrus-McClure proposal was bipartisan, it represented only two of the key players.

A wilderness bill is important to Idaho for a variety of reasons. The most obvious is to protect sensitive wild lands from development.

Equally important is that settling the wilderness question will let industry know which areas will be available for development and the

accompanying job creation.

The most pressing reason, however, is political: If Idaho leaders keep failing to agree, powerful out-of-state interests could step in. That scenario would risk a wilderness bill that doesn't reflect Idaho's priorities.

Even as Idaho's five top political leaders were huddled in Washington, a newly released poll said a majority of Idahoans favor giving equal weight to protecting the wilderness and saving timber jobs. (We should note that the poll was paid for by organized labor.)

Our elected leaders may not be able to give precisely "equal" weight to those two values. But the general message still makes sense: the bill ultimately will have to balance economics and environmentalism.

One of the keys to that balance is Sen. Larry Craig's insistence on specific "release language" that would free non-wilderness acres for development.

To be sure, much remains to be worked out on Idaho wilderness. But the five men who met in Washington this week are pursuing the best opportunity Idaho has seen so far. We urge them to keep at it.

### Beware of all research

In 1948 and 1953, a two-part publication of sociologist Dr. Alfred Kinsey's works on male and female sexuality quickly became national bestsellers. This document has been instrumental in revolutionizing our society's sexual behavior, sex education, politics, law and even religion to a certain extent.

Kinsey's reports claim to represent "common behavior" in the United States.

It is critical that we are informed citizens who think critically and independently. Within these Kinsey reports (when carefully studied) lies numerous error, distortions and biases. ### Change lifestyle, lose weight

I would like to make some suggestions and offer some encouragement to anyone trying to lose weight, based on my own experience and material I have read.

Since February, 1992, I have lost approximately 45 pounds. I felt OK at that time but feel much better now. I no longer have shortage of breath, and my legs no longer ache when I walk.

Quoting Roma Kabatznick, psychological consultant to Weight Watchers International, "Create realistic goals rather than making big dramatic changes: It's more important that your diet and exercise plan fit into your lifestyle than your lifestyle fit into your diet and exercise plan." I am not promoting the above mentioned (Weight Watchers). This isn't necessary. I give the above quote because, for most people, the statement is correct.

Losing one pound per week is the best way to keep it off. This would be a 500 calorie reduction daily. This can be done by engaging in a little more physical activity - such as parking three or four blocks away from the bank, post office, courthouse, etc., and walking to whichever business you are planning to do business with. It is the normal thing to look for the parking space nearest the business you are going to patronize.

It can also be done by cutting down on certain foods or seasonings. Go ahead and put dressing on your salad, but cut down on the amount of dressing.

Do you eat the whole bag of potato chips? Try lite popcorn. Replace ice cream with low-fat yogurt.

If you normally eat a bedtime snack or eat snack food while watching television, cut down on the amount - especially before bedtime.

Swim, walk, ride your bike. Do something to increase your metabolism. It is easy to say, "I need to quit snacking." But if you write it down, you are more likely to do it. Be sure to write down where, when and how you plan to reach your goal.

If you slip and eat too much, don't get mad at yourself and give up. Remember, it took time to gain the extra weight, and it takes time to lose it.

Many people talk about losing weight. Be one who does it. If you think you feel fine now, think of how you will feel in a few months.

Enjoy springtime and summer with a simple change in lifestyle.

## More weapons in Balkans won't wipe clean history

WARSAW, Poland - Faithfully evoking the terror of wartime Europe, recordings of howling World War II sirens and the rattle of machine-gun fire pierced the frigid night air of Warsaw recently.

Thousands of people stood in silent tribute to those 500 or so Jewish warriors who 50 years ago staged the Warsaw ghetto uprising. In that Hitlerian spring of 1943, the so-called ZOB fighters who roamed streets like Nalewki and Zamenhofa knew they ultimately would perish at the hands of Nazi occupiers, all but a handful did.

In the context of the genocide then being carried out at death camps such as Auschwitz and Treblinka, the Jewish ghetto guerrillas surpassed mere physical courage to author - against all odds - a unique statement about human dignity.

former will begin using armed force in the former Yugoslavia, with the United States in the lead.

But in the face of no definable aim, armed intervention - even if restricted to air power - easily could turn out to be a mere statement of moral outrage, a humanitarian ticket to be punched, an appeasement of this or that constituency. As experts at an Aspen Institute seminar recently pointed out, time and again, outside attempts to "settle" longstanding dilemmas of ethnicity and nationhood often have succeeded only in seeding future conflicts - Iraq and the Kurds, for example.

Europe had never seen anything like Hitlerian genocide before World War II, and Serbian brutality to the contrary notwithstanding, it has not, in fact, seen it since. Neither are Bosnian Muslims today Europe's Jews of 50 years ago.

The Jews had no history of aggression against other peoples, only after wartime persecution did they establish their nation state, and also unlike infant Bosnia, the Jewish state quickly mastered the political and military dimensions of self-defense, as any nation worthy of the name must.

This is not to blame the victim; it is to blame human rights violators of every stripe and to acknowledge the tragic dynamism of history itself.

The world must continue to monitor and condemn human rights violations by all sides in the Bosnian conflict, including those by civilians.

Mediating efforts - no matter how scintillatingly futile - should continue around the clock. Conflictive zones must be showered with leaflets outlining the Geneva Convention, both as a means of trying to influence their behavior, and as a means of rebutting the "ignorance" excuse when the war crimes tribunals convene. Weapons must continue to be strictly embargoed.

Finally, the United Nations, European states, the United States and non-governmental organizations must find ways of expanding refuge and other forms of assistance - the region's "leitmotiv" at the moment.

But the idea that introducing interventionist firepower and lifting arms embargoes somehow will reduce human suffering in the former Yugoslavia should provoke two basic questions that have not yet been asked: "How?" and "For how long?"

Until the answers are forthcoming, intervention in Bosnia must be seen as the well-meaning but futile goal of overwrought onlookers.

## Bosnian Serb response prompts another try at peace negotiations

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — International peace talks on Bosnia will reconvene this weekend in Greece in response to the Bosnian Serbs' pledge to reconsider the U.N. peace plan, U.N. officials announced Thursday.

Fred Eckhardt, spokesman for international mediators, said that all three parties — Muslims, Croats and Serbs — had accepted the offer to meet in Athens Saturday and Sunday.

"The meeting on the weekend will give all parties a chance to discuss how the plan meets the various security concerns of all parties, especially the Bosnian Serbs," Eckhardt told reporters.

Bosnian Serbs announced Thursday that their self-proclaimed assembly would reconvene May 5 to reexamine the plan that they had rejected on Monday. The Croats and Muslims, the other warring parties in the yearlong conflict, have signed the plan.

The assembly's decision came after Bosnian-Serb leaders met in

Belgrade with Serbian President Slobodan Milosevic, the Bosnian Serbs' main backer.

The U.N. announcement, on behalf of mediators Cyrus Vance and Lord David Owen, said the decision to reopen the talks had been influenced by the apparent Bosnian Serb concession.

Diplomats also said the reconvening of the talks and Serb reconsideration appeared to be prompted by intensified discussion of possible U.S. air strikes against Bosnian Serb artillery positions and possibly supply lines.

In other developments, the General Assembly on Thursday expelled Serb-dominated Yugoslavia from the premier U.N. economic and social forum, further deepening its diplomatic isolation for backing the Bosnian Serbs.

U.S. Ambassador Madeleine K. Albright told the 181-nation assembly that until Bosnian Serbs sign the peace plan, they and their Yugoslav sponsors will remain "international pariahs."

"It appears Serbs are making a special effort to show their contempt for this institution," she said.

The assembly voted 107-0, with 11 abstentions, to drop the Belgrade government — made up of Serbia and tiny Montenegro — from the Economic and Social Council.

The assembly approves membership in the 34-nation economic panel, which has an important voice in setting the United Nation's economic policies, although it only has the power to make recommendations.

Yugoslavia remains a U.N. member and its flag still flies outside U.N. headquarters but its participation in key U.N. bodies, such as the economic council and the General Assembly, has been suspended since the war.

A Security Council delegation that visited Bosnia on Wednesday recommended the creation and enforcement of safe havens in the Muslim enclaves of Sarajevo and in eastern Bosnia.

## S. African sides show compromise

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — President F.W. de Klerk and ANC leader Nelson Mandela said Thursday they were ready to share power despite their differences, but de Klerk said the ANC was unfit to run the country alone.

In interviews with Cable News Network, the leaders were unusually conciliatory toward each other following two weeks of bitter accusations following the assassination of black leader Chris Hani.

"The atmosphere is again improving," de Klerk said. "Obviously we went through a very bad patch ... but things are calming down again."

Despite repeated questioning, neither man would say who should be South Africa's next president. But Mandela said the African National Congress was willing to accept anyone chosen democratically — even a white.

"We've made it clear we're concerned with ideas, not color," he said in the third such back-to-back interview with foreign media since the April 10 killing of Hani, the Communist Party chief and a top ANC official.

The murder raised fears of a violent uprising by Hani's mainly young, militant supporters, and the interviews indicated de Klerk and Mandela were trying to reassure potential foreign investors whose money is badly needed to revive the economy.

In his interview, de Klerk rejected the ANC's demand that he announce a date for the country's first multiracial vote, but said he expected the election to be held by late this year or early 1994.

The ANC, the country's most popular black group, is expected to win the most votes.

## Queen plans open house to help with repair costs

LONDON (AP) — Facing repair bills and few donations from her subjects, Queen Elizabeth II is opening Buckingham Palace to all comers — to help pay for the restoration of her favorite weekend home.

The announcement Thursday signaled another concession to changing times by the monarch. Earlier she agreed to pay taxes following a public uproar over government plans to top the repairs for fire-damaged Windsor Castle.

"Although Windsor Castle doesn't belong to her personally and is the government's rather than her majesty's financial responsibility, she is naturally keen to avoid additional demands upon the public purse," Lord Airline, head of the royal household, told reporters.

The Nov. 20 fire at the castle, 20 miles west of London, was only one of the disasters in what the queen has called her "annus horribilis."

Princess Diana protested.

The government estimates castle repairs will take five years and cost \$16 million to \$62 million. The public has donated only about \$39,000 to a trust fund the queen set up for contributions.

Airline said Buckingham Palace, the queen's London residence, will open its state rooms and picture gallery for eight weeks annually in August and September. Treasures on view will include a raft of Old Master paintings, the world's finest collection of Sevres porcelain and antique French furniture, some from Versailles.

Admission will cost \$12.50 for adults, and the palace expects up to 400,000 tourists a year.

The government said the tours of Buckingham Palace plus new charges for visiting Windsor Castle are expected to meet 70 percent of the repair bill.

## Tables turned: Captured, captor meet again

BANJA LUKA, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Milorad Pajcin never thought he would sit in a prison cell for months in Croat-run camps.

Let alone get a chance to gain revenge against a man he says was one of his most brutal torturers.

But the turbulent winds of Bosnia's war brought them face to face again, this time with the tables turned.

Pajcin is a potential witness in Davor Glasnovic's pending war crimes trial, and his testimony could determine whether Glasnovic is convicted and sentenced to death.

"I was not quite sure what I would have done to him if we were alone," Pajcin said after confronting

Glasnovic in Banja Luka prison, where Serb guards kept them six feet apart.

"I would not torture him," Pajcin said after a pause. "Just one bullet."

The 33-year-old Serb fighter said he often prayed for such a bullet during four months in Croat-run prison camps.

Glasnovic could be sentenced to death by firing squad if convicted.

Serbs have been blamed for most atrocities in Bosnia's war, but Western monitors say some Croats and Muslims are also guilty.

The accused torturer himself became a victim. Serbs cut off one of Glasnovic's ears after capturing him. Pajcin clenched his fists while

describing to an Associated Press reporter his first meeting with Glasnovic as when Pajcin was a prisoner in Rama, central Bosnia.

"I saw a tall man with longish hair who darkened the doorway," Pajcin said. "Later I heard his name, which I'll never forget — Davor Glasnovic."

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## Norway charges pair with ship sabotage

OSLO, Norway (AP) — Two activists from a U.S.-based environmental group have been charged in the attempted sinking of a Norwegian whaling ship in December.

Canadian Paul Watson and American Dwight Worker of the Sea Shepherd group were charged with gross destruction of property, which carries a maximum sentence of four years in prison, spokeswoman Elisabeth Kaas of the Lofoten and Vesteralen police said Thursday. Watson, the leader of the Los Angeles-based group, has repeatedly claimed he sabotaged the 72-foot whaling ship Nybrøen. It was discovered about to sink at its wharf in the arctic Lofoten Islands.

**Yeltsin pitches French-style constitution**

MOSCOW (AP) — Boris Yeltsin made a pitch for a new French-style constitution and aides hinted at a Cabinet shakeup Thursday as the president raced to capitalize on his referendum victory.

"Everybody must understand that the president, the Cabinet and the policy of reform now enjoy the protection of the people," Yeltsin told officials from Russia's 89 regions at the Kremlin.

Yeltsin is trying to advance his reforms and eliminate opponents with political momentum gained from Sunday's non-binding referendum, in which 58 percent of voters expressed support for him and 53 percent backed his policies.

But the president needs to act before his opposition of nationalists, pro-Communists and entrenched industrialists can regroup.

His public support also could fade in the worsening economy. Officials said Thursday that real income was down 19 percent in the year's first quarter from the same

period last year, the ITAR-Tass news agency said.

"We must move fast, otherwise the credit of confidence is going to disappear again," his legal adviser, Deputy Prime Minister Sergei Shakhrai, told reporters. "The referendum deprived the parliament of legitimacy, leaving the president the only legitimate structure."

In two days, Yeltsin has reinvigorated his Western-oriented foreign policy, promised wider privatization and called for a new constitution that would eliminate the Soviet-era Congress of People's Deputies parliament.

Yeltsin told the Cabinet on Thursday "all opponents of reform should leave the government because we don't have time to recalcu-

late them," said Cabinet adviser Sergei Vasilyev.

The president didn't single anybody out. But his comment could presage a shakeup in agencies such as the Central Bank, whose Soviet-era chief Viktor Gerashchenko has been accused of stifling reforms with loose credit.

In one change, Shakhrai announced Thursday he would replace Yuri Yarov as the official in charge of relations with regional governments. The position is crucial to soothing the independence fervor that many officials fear could tear apart Russia, as it did the Soviet Union.

Yeltsin presented the regional chiefs with a draft constitution Thursday that embodies a "fundamentally new regional strategy," he said, according to ITAR-Tass.

The draft says the president is Russia's "supreme authority" with power to pick ministers and dissolve parliament. The Congress would be replaced by a bicameral

legislature with control over the budget.

Russian officials have likened the document to France's 1958 constitution, which gave broad power to former President Charles de Gaulle and reduced the role of the parliament to prevent government instability and paralysis.

Among other things, the Russian draft guarantees citizens the right to own, buy and sell land. The issue is among the most economically important and politically sensitive for Russia, which still restricts land ownership.

Yeltsin gave the officials until May 20 to suggest changes. Shakhrai said the document should be approved by a "constitutional assembly" rather than the Congress.

The parliament's standing legislature, the Supreme Soviet, approved the deadline Thursday but said that lawmakers must approve the constitution drafted by Yeltsin and regional leaders, the Interfax news agency said.

**'General' convicted of fraud**

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — A cross-dressing woman who took a bride and received loans from neighbors by masquerading as a highly decorated general was convicted of fraud Thursday sentenced to three years in prison.

Teresinha Gomes, known since 1975 as the stately but cash-strapped war veteran Gen. Tito Anibal de Paixao Gomes, also was ordered to repay the money she borrowed.

Gomes, dressed in a conservative

tie and a double-breasted pinstriped suit, had one comment for a crowd gathered at the courtroom door: "Clothes don't make the man."

She then strode from the courthouse to the accompaniment of a John Philip Sousa march blaring from a music store across the street.

Gomes, 52, said during her trial that she left home on the Portuguese island of Madeira in 1974 and resurfaced a year later in Lisbon dressed as an army captain.

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**Taiwan, China make progress on closer ties**

SINGAPORE (AP) — Taking a small step toward reconciliation, delegates from China and Taiwan signed four agreements Thursday and drank a champagne toast to closer ties.

The once-bitter rivals ended their first formal meeting in 44 years by agreeing to regular talks to resolve economic and other differences and ultimately establish direct trade ties.

China's chief delegate for the three days of quasi-official negotiations hailed the meeting's "great historical significance" and called it a big step forward in relations between the two sides, which favor reunification.

"Both came out winners," said Wang, head of Beijing's Association of Relations Across the Taiwan Straits.

Taiwan's head representative also was upbeat, shaking hands with Wang and smiling over the champagne.

Koo Chen-fu, chairman of Taiwan's Straits Exchange Foundation, said the meeting marked "the opening of a new chapter of exchanges between people on both sides of the Taiwan Straits."

The nationalist followers of the late Chiang Kai-shek took refuge on Taiwan in 1949 after being defeated by Communists in a civil war. Both nations consider their governments the legitimate representatives of China.

Still to be overcome, however, are strong disagreements over Taiwanese investments in China that pushed this week's largely symbolic meeting into an unscheduled Thursday session.

Taiwan has invested at least \$9 billion in Chinese factories since private contacts were first allowed in 1987, directing funds through Hong Kong because of its ban on direct investment.

**More victims of gas explosion located**

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) — Searchers found the charred bodies of a 10-year-old girl and her 5-year-old brother Thursday as they resumed the grim task of looking for victims of a methane gas explosion at a city dump.

The explosion Wednesday triggered an avalanche of garbage that buried squatter huts.

The death toll has reached 27, and 12 were reported missing, said Nurdan Istanbuluoglu, a relief official at the scene. He said 15 children were among the victims, and another 20 bodies were likely buried under the garbage.

Istanbul Governor Havri Kozakcioglu said in a statement that searchers expected to find about 10 bodies in one of the 11 huts dug out.

## Dispose-All targets landfill plan

**TWIN FALLS** — In an apparent attempt to thwart potential competition, Dispose-All Inc. has asked a prominent Magic Valley landowner to help fight a multicounty plan to build a public landfill. Peabo rancher Katie Breckenridge said Thursday that a woman identifying herself as Judy Peavey had asked her to challenge in court the Southern Idaho Regional Solid Waste District's plan. Peavey, a former Ada County Commissioner, works for Dispose-All and has waged a public-relations campaign to win support for the Boise-based company's plan to build a landfill. Breckenridge declined Peavey's request, saying she was not familiar enough with the issue to challenge the district in court.

### Boise firm seeks help from rancher to fight multicounty landfill proposal

Peavey refused to talk about the matter Thursday. "We're not making comments to The Times-News," she said. Without Breckenridge, 10 residents from five Magic Valley counties are expected to file a challenge today in 5th District Court. They reportedly want to prevent the waste district from borrowing landfill construction funds without holding bond-issue elections. Regional waste district Director Terry Schultz said Thursday that he suspects Dispose-All may be trying get business for its landfill by working behind the scene to

upend the region's plan in court. "I don't think it's appropriate to operate under the disguise of a citizens committee to try to invalidate our project," Schultz said. "This goes beyond citizen concern about government expenditures." Dispose-All's try to "torpedo" the waste district's plan does not jibe with claims of harmony and wishes to be a good neighbor that company President Doug Lonow made only a week ago before the Cassia County Commission, Schultz said. Lonow has prophesied for months that the Southern Idaho Regional Solid Waste District would not open a landfill in time to

meet new federal rules for burying trash. And he has boasted that his private landfill on Burley Butte, which he began digging without state certification, will open in time to receive garbage. The six-county waste district has asked a 5th District Court judge to validate its plan to borrow money without holding bond-issue elections in each county. If the judge rules the region must hold bond-issue elections, the district would have difficulty meeting an Oct. 9 federal deadline. Gooding attorney Lynn Nelson said Wednesday he will file a challenge on behalf of 10 residents in Gooding, Blaine, Lincoln, Jerome and Minidoka counties. The residents want bond-issue elections on the regional district's plan, Nelson said. When asked Thursday if Dispose-All was involved, Nelson said only "they are aware of what we're doing."

## Fair game is fair game

New bingo law likely won't affect charitable games; county fair booth another matter

**TWIN FALLS** — Bingo at the Moose Hall is safe, but bingo at the fair may be nixed. A state bingo law that kicks in Saturday probably won't affect games conducted regularly by the Moose and a handful of other Magic Valley charitable groups.

But it will limit how often fairgoers can play for blankets, toys and other prizes at the Twin Falls County Fair's bingo booth. The booth, operated in alternate years by the Twin Falls Future Farmers of America and the Pomona Grange, has been part of the fair since the 1940s, said Corrie Lanting of Twin Falls. Lanting will manage the fair booth for the Grange this year. Traditionally, he said, the booth offers bingo games 12 hours a day every day of the fair. But under the bingo law passed by the Legislature earlier this year, bingo operators can only run three sessions a week, and each session can last only eight hours at most. The law — was aimed at — large commercial bingo operations, such as Boise's controversial Riverbend Bingo, but it still allows most churches, fraternal lodges and other nonprofit organizations to raise money through bingo games. The law requires all operators who offer top prizes of \$100 or more in cash or \$1,000 or more in other merchandise to be licensed, at a \$100 fee. Lanting said the fair booth raises "several thousand dollars" every other year for Grange charities, so the license fee won't be a big deal. But he's not sure how the law will affect the booth's hours of operation.

"We'll abide by the law, whatever it is, as soon as somebody interprets it for us," he said. But according to state Lottery Director Wally Hedrick — who, along with county commissioners, is charged with enforcing the law — the Grange will catch a break this year because of the fair's scheduling. The fair will run Sept. 1-6, from Wednesday of one week to Monday of the next. That means the Grange will be able to run games three days out of the first week and Sunday and Monday of the next — or five of the six fair days, Hedrick said. Grangers must abide by the eight-hour daily limit and the caps on prizes. The top prize can be no more than \$1,200, and the payout per session can't top \$5,000.

The lodge, as well as anyone else in the area who operates charitable bingo games, will have to have a license as of July 1. Hedrick said the Lottery Commission is working with the Idaho Association of Counties on application forms. The forms should be available from county clerks by late May, he said. Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said two or three people already have asked about applying for bingo licenses, and he expects more to do so in the coming weeks. "There are quite a few bingo things going on off and on, so I'm sure we'll have some traffic," Hempleman said. "But it won't be like the liquor licenses."

## Jerome girl beats the odds, survives deadly disease, but problems remain

**JEROME** — A seriously ill Jerome girl has passed one milestone in her battle against a deadly disease. Jennifer Baird has outlived the odds, after doctors told her a year ago she would die from severe aplastic anemia if she didn't obtain a bone marrow transplant. The disease of young adults is caused by deficient red blood-cell production in the bone marrow. Some studies have shown that eight out of 10 patients with the disease die during the first year, according to Baird. "I think I'm better," Baird said. "We don't know why, but I haven't had to have a transfusion since January. I was getting transfusions three times a week." Baird, who is still waiting for a donor for

the operation, celebrated her 19th birthday on Sunday. "Her only hope for survival is a bone-marrow transplant," said her mother, Colleen Baird. She was diagnosed with the life-threatening disease last March, after becoming ill in December. Baird said doctors at first believed she suffered from leukemia.

An international search has been conducted since her diagnosis. Several potential donors were found, but none were an exact match, and doctors decided not to chance a partial match. Five potential donors from the United States are being tested for compatibility, Baird said. Another two from foreign countries are also waiting to be tested. "The chances of getting a donor is not great — only one in 20,000 people will match," Baird said. Jennifer was hospitalized recently at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center with two blood clots in her brain, but has recovered from that complication. "You never know how you're going to react when something like this happens," Baird said. "Some people brood about it; I chose not to."

## Court can't take water, lawyer says

**TWIN FALLS** — Nobody's going to come and take anybody's water rights away to save endangered salmon, an Idaho water lawyer said Thursday. No court has ever taken away a water right in any cases involving the Endangered Species Act, said Roger Ling, attorney for Water District 1, which encompasses southern Idaho east of Milner Dam. Ling addressed southern Idaho water users at a Thursday information meeting on the endangered salmon issue and the Bureau of Reclamation's request for water from the Upper Snake River Basin to help flush young salmon to the ocean. Snake River sockeye were declared endangered in 1991, and three runs of Snake River chinook were declared threatened in early 1992. Courts can stop anyone from doing anything that results in the death of individuals of an endangered species or destruction of its habitat — known as "taking," Ling said. A court cannot prove that allowing no water past Milner Dam acknowledged in the state's water plan — would constitute a taking, he said. And Congress can't reallocate state water rights without just compensation. So water users in southern Idaho shouldn't feel pressured to give up part of their water just to be good sports, Ling said. People are wrong if they think giving up some water now means they will never be asked again. "That's not how the game is played," he said. But that doesn't mean those who want to shouldn't cooperate with the Bureau of Reclamation's request for 427,000-acre feet of water from southern Idaho — 337,000 of it from the Upper Snake River Basin.

An acre foot is the amount of water needed to cover one acre with one foot of water. But it's true that any water left in the reservoir system, which holds more than 4 million acre feet, helps to fill the system the next year, Ling said. Carryover benefits all the users of a particular reservoir because it will take that much less water to fill it. Carryover forms a significant part of most irrigators' water rights. Selling carryover water will make reservoirs that much larger to fill the following year and thus hurts everybody's water right, he said. The bureau wants 427,000 acre feet of water from the Upper Snake River system this year, said John Keys, the bureau's Pacific Northwest regional director in Boise. The water would be used at various times to help salmon move up and down the river, he said. The bureau is looking only for willing sellers, he said. "We have every intention of working within the state's water rights laws," he said. "If we don't come up with a solution ourselves, the courts or Congress will do it for us," he warned. Idaho Department of Water Resources Director Keith Higginson, however, said he would not approve any release of water out of Idaho for "fish flush" without some reassurance that it would be used to benefit the troubled fish and not just to help the Bonneville Power Administration generate more electricity at the dams many believe are the cause of the salmon's plight. The 1992 state Legislature authorized the out-of-state transfer of water for fish flush for a three-year trial period. The law, however, doesn't make a determination that the transfer is in the public good or that it will be a beneficial use outside the state. The legislature also said the transfer would be allowed only if it was part of a coordinated effort that includes contributions from other interests as well.

# Suspects mum on giving names

BURLEY - Sometimes police arrest someone only to find the person refuses to give a name.

The problem wastes time and logs down the court system, but law enforcement officials say criminals eventually won't get away with their aliases.

The situation recently arose in Burley when Edwin Alejandro Mazaregos gave police numerous names before he eventually was charged with assault.

Mazaregos is being held in the Mini-Cassia Criminal Justice Center

in Burley after he was arrested Sunday night. According to a Cassia County Sheriff's Department deputy report, Mazaregos tried to stab security guards at the Las Palmas Bar in Burley, then threw rocks at them.

No one was seriously hurt in the incident.

Mazaregos, who was found hiding in some brush, first gave law officers six different names, a deputy's report said. He also gave different addresses, saying he lived in Kimberly, Burley and Minidoka.

"It is unknown who this person is or any other information about him," the deputy wrote in his police report.

Sheriff Billy Crystal and extra effort will be made to confirm Mazaregos' identity.

The man's fingerprints will be processed by a nation-wide data base of fingerprints. If he has been fingerprinted elsewhere, the man's identity will be confirmed.

The data bank virtually covers anyone who has ever committed a crime or has been fingerprinted for various reasons," Crystal said.

Crystal added, though, he suspects that some have gone through the criminal justice system in the United States without using their real name.

"Career criminals" have a number of different aliases that are used at

various times, he said.

If a person, for instance, was arrested in Montana, he could use an alias. After serving jail time there, the person could use a different name if arrested in Idaho.

Magistrate Nathan Heeger said, so far, no one has refused to give his name during a court hearing while he was on the bench.

If a person didn't give his name, a judge could hold the person in jail until he cooperated, Heeger added.

Defective Dave, Dave said, someone gives a false name and is later found out, law officers can press charges of obstructing a police officer.

## Oakley might receive help for water upgrade

The legislation is patterned after the revolving loan funds set up for wastewater treatment projects under the Clean Water Act.

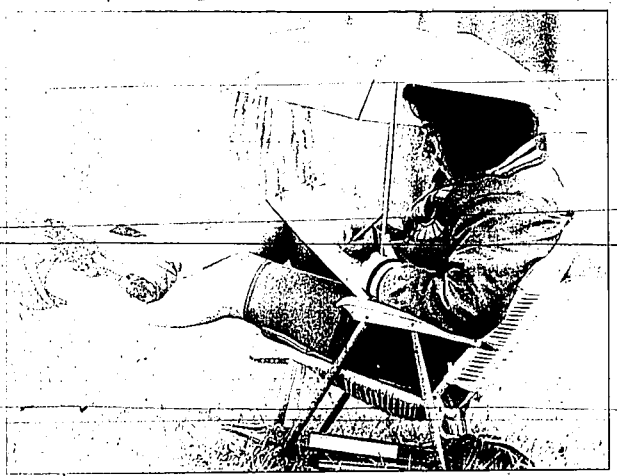
"Through it, the federal government provides 'seed' money for states to grant loans to communities that need to upgrade their drinking water

## Quake rumbles through Arizona, jolting scientists, scaring tourists

Arizona's largest earthquake since 1959 rattled a wide area around the Grand Canyon early Thursday, unsettling thousands of tourists and surprising scientists who hadn't expected a second sizeable quake within five days.

No injuries or serious damage was reported from the quake, which measured 5.5 on the Richter scale and was felt in southern Utah.

A quake that size can cause considerable damage in a populated area, but the region of northern Arizona affected is for the most part sparsely settled.

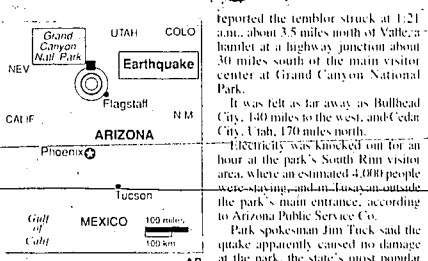
Kane County sheriff's dispatcher Debbie Whitaker in Kanab, Utah, said the quake made a "clicking noise" rather than a rumble.

"When I got on the telephone hot line, I got a funny feeling," Whitaker said. "The quaker lasted about 30 seconds. I'm not sure if it was an earthquake, but it was a good one."

Whitaker said she received about 15 calls within minutes of the quake.

"Most people said what they felt here was comparable to what they felt during the quake in Springdale," she said.

The Springdale quake, on Sept. 2



measured 5.8 on the Richter scale, caused rock slides in the Zion National Park area and destroyed two homes in Springdale.

Scientists said they couldn't rule out the possibility of another moderate quake in the region but said the possibility of a damaging one appeared remote. To keep closer track, the U.S. Geological Survey is sending sophisticated measuring devices to the region.

## Education leader calls for school conference

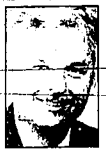

The top education official of the Idaho Board of Education called Thursday for an education summit of state leaders to discuss a lawsuit to problems with the state's funding formula.

Carl Shurtliff, in a speech at Idaho State University, urged state leaders to work out solutions to school funding without going through a long and costly court battle.

The Idaho Supreme Court last month ordered a 3-year court hearing on a lawsuit filed by 17 school districts to determine the amount of state support for public schools. Some state leaders predict it could result in a court order for \$250 million extra for public schools.

Shurtliff's remarks, prepared for the 151 Associated Students leadership banquet Thursday night at Pullman, said state leaders should work out the problem. He suggested a conference presided over by Robert



Nowcomb

Bakes, who retired earlier this year as chief justice of the Supreme Court.

Shurtliff recommended, including legislative leaders, and one of them said it sounded like a good idea.

"It would be an interesting forum," said Rep. Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley, majority floor leader. "There are no guarantees that we would get anything solved, but it would get the issues out for discussion."

Legislative leaders have vowed to fight the lawsuit all the way, but Shurtliff said negotiation would be better.

"Reason to litigation of these kinds of issues is a capitulation to the fact that we cannot control the events that overtake us, but that rather, we let the

events control us," Shurtliff said.

"That is failure at the ultimate, and it is also the ultimate copout."

He said every participant in the conference should be ready to discuss his or her view of the problem, possible ways to resolve it and how to achieve results without a long court battle.

Shurtliff said the "education summit" will achieve little if everybody is "prepared to fingerprint, find scapegoats, or look for political advantage."

Shurtliff suggested the summit include Gov. Cecil Andrus and other state officials, top legislators, attorneys for the school districts involved in the lawsuit and executives of the Idaho Education

Association, Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry and Idaho Schools Boards Association.

Newcomb said it should be a quadrum for everyone to understand the problems facing the Legislature. "It also might help discuss the dilemma, education versus taxes - to see if there isn't some way to maneuver here that would be acceptable," he said.

In order to solve this, it is going to take some unique, imaginative ideas. I don't think the people are going to stand for a \$250 million tax increase," he said.

Shurtliff, a Boise lawyer, said it's important to avoid the prospect of spending up to millions of dollars in legal fees on the lawsuit.

**Couple's slayings brings life terms**

**BOISE** — Convicted killer Bryan Lankford has been sentenced to two consecutive life prison terms for the 1983 slayings of a Texas couple along the Clearwater River in northern Idaho.

Second District Judge Ronald Schilling on Thursday resented Lankford after the U.S. Supreme Court overturned his death sentence because the defendant and his attorney, Juan Fisher of Genesee, were not properly advised the prosecution would seek the death penalty.

Lankford, 32, laughed when Schilling announced the second life term would follow the first, with no chance of parole.

"I love you in spite of your evilness," Lankford told the judge.

Lankford and his brother, Mark, both from Conroe, Texas, were convicted of the June 1983 slayings of Marine Capt. Robert Bravence, 27, and his wife, Cheryl, 25, of El Paso. The couple was camped along the Clearwater and died from blows to the head.

**Mullen area loses UP rail service**

**MULLAN** — Union Pacific Railroad's Sterling Poldella leaned out of the locomotive's window, thrust his arm skyward and bellowed "Goodbye."

In the short run, the loss of rail service will inconvenience only a handful of shippers. But the abandonment of the 71.5-mile Wallace branch line may be an economic miracle or a railroad company with a gambler's spirit, the lost train rumbled through the Silver Valley on Wednesday. It also built another major obstacle to commercial development in Idaho's most depressed county.

Two engines and a caboose rolled out of Kellogg in the morning and ambled to the end of the line in Mullan.

**Business urges school suit resolution**

**LEWISTON** — Idaho's largest business lobby and school boards organization are the latest groups to call on the Legislature to settle a suit challenging the adequacy of the state's public school support.

State Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans said the positions of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry and the Idaho School Boards Association reflect the growing pressure on legislative leaders to reach an out-of-court settlement with dozens of school districts suing the state. "I will still hope," Evans said Wednesday, "I don't know it is going to come to pass."

Steve Abrams, president of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry, said the business lobby supports Attorney General Larry EchoHawk's desire to resolve the case. EchoHawk has said he prefers a negotiated compromise to litigation.

**Growth threatens lakes, study warns**

**COEUR D'ALENE** — Explosive growth in northern Idaho is taking a toll on lakes, and rigid management plans are needed to protect water quality, according to a two-year study.

"As more and more people move up into this area, lakes are being impacted, no question," aquatic ecologist Jere Mossier, who prepared the report for the state Division of Environmental Quality, said Wednesday. The \$200,000 Idaho Lake Water Quality Assessment Report, funded jointly by the Federal Environmental Protection Agency and the Division of Environmental Quality, examines 17 northern Idaho lakes, including 12 in Kootenai and Blaine counties.

Mossier said lakes where more growth has occurred are particularly vulnerable to degradation.

**Convicted killer can't visit grave sites**

**BOISE** — Judge Alan Schwartzman refused on Thursday to order authorities to take Robin Roy to the grave site of her two children she was convicted of murdering when she set their duplex afire nearly 15 months ago.

"The ironies of such a request are somewhat mind-boggling, and I don't want to get into it," Schwartzman said as he denied the motion "unequivocally."

The 4th District judge said Sheriff Vaughn Killeen could have deputies take Roy to the cemetery if he had a humanitarian desire to do so, but he would not set a precedent by ordering the sheriff to do it.

The sentencing hearing for Roy, 35, is set for Aug. 30, Deputy Ada County Prosecutor Roger Bourne has already advised the court he will seek the death penalty.

**Andrus optimistic about wilderness**

Gov. Cecil Andrus emerged from a breakfast meeting with Idaho's congressional delegation on Thursday more encouraged than ever that the state may be nearing the end of its wilderness debate.

"It's the first time that all four members of the congressional delegation, and there have been changes too, but it's the first time all four have said they want this resolved," Andrus said. "That's never happened before."

The Democratic chief executive, who failed in his attempt with former Republican Sen. James McClure to resolve the issue in the late 1980s, said he, Democratic Congressman Larry LaRocco and Republican Sens. Dirk Kempthorne and Larry Craig and GOP Congressman Michael

Crapo got the message during meetings with congressional leaders on Wednesday that they all have to back an acceptable compromise before Congress will even consider it.

Andrus said both House Interior Chairman George Miller and Public Lands Subcommittee Chairman Bruce Vento were adamant that "if we weren't united, 'Don't bother us, don't ask Congress to referee.'"

Members of the delegation were equally optimistic about the newfound unity on the issue.

Craig compared the progress as being in third inning of a baseball game, but Crapo said it was important to focus on the fact that the delegation and Andrus "are all working together to try to solve this issue."

Aides to the four delegation

members will begin finalizing provisions of the package for managing areas not designated as wilderness but still worthy of some special attention and protecting Idaho water rights and employment.

Kempthorne called all three top priorities with him.

Every one of the five was resolving that the decision on the future of 9 million acres of backcountry now under wilderness review will be made by Idahoans and not government bureaucrats or politicians from other states.

"We have stood together, looked our arms with the whole Idaho delegation and the governor," he announced that Idaho leaders want a bill, LaRocco said. "We're going to fight for a bill that's right for Idaho."

LaRocco expects hearings late this summer or fall on his proposal for

1.25 million acres of new wilderness in northern and western Idaho and another 558,000 acres as special management areas.

The remaining 2.5 million acres of roadless area would be released to traditional Forest Service management.

Crapo, who represents the other half of the state, held town meetings on wilderness earlier this year but has no timetable for drafting a bill.

Andrus also said it was critical for the delegation to back adequate financing for the Forest Service where officials are contemplating major job cuts.

While the wilderness debate poses a threat to the timber industry in the long-term, the inability of the Forest Service to meet its current timber sale quotas because of a budget squeeze is an immediate threat.

**Andrus urges Congress to help with INEL**

Gov. Cecil Andrus asked a congressional committee on Thursday to fully finance the Integral Fast Reactor, selling the technology as the best way to handle tons of nuclear waste building up in storage facilities at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory and elsewhere.

Andrus was joined in Washington, D.C., by Republican Congressman Michael Crapo and GOP Sens. Larry Craig and Dirk Kempthorne in testifying before the Energy Subcommittee of the House Science, Space and Technology Committee. Their testimony came in response to the Clinton

administration's recommendation to dismantle the project at the loss of 800 jobs in eastern Idaho.

"This shift away from nuclear research is a very serious mistake for our national energy policy," Crapo said. "It is not a question of reducing the federal deficit through cuts in the Department of Energy budget. The question is where the priorities within this budget will be placed."

The breeder reactor technology is designed to recycle its own fuel

and to shut itself down automatically in an accident. It would convert uranium, plutonium and other transuranic elements left behind by the fission process into metal ingots used to make new reactor fuel, dramatically reducing radioactive waste.

A National Academy of Sciences panel says the project is valuable to the nation's ability to produce

electricity in the future and the Senate Budget Committee approved the full budget a week before the administration called for cancelling it.

"Clearly, a different approach is called for, one that rids the world of the waste materials that remain radioactive for long time periods and one that will pay its own way," Andrus said.

**Court rules for businessman**

**BOISE (AP)** — The state Supreme Court has reinstated the claim of a Boise businessman and his partner that they were misled into buying land that could not be legally used for the anti-storage unit they wanted to build.

In its unanimous decision on Thursday, the high court held that the real estate agents could not hide behind a law that suggests they had no duty to tell Patrick Large and Evelyn Ruth that restrictive covenants on the property precluded its commercial use because those covenants were officially recorded with the deed.


And Justice Byron Johnson said there were too many issues of fact in dispute between Large and the real estate agents for a district judge to preclude letting the dispute go to trial. The court returned the case to 4th District Judge Robert Rowett for trial.

Large and Ruth were dealing with Century Realty and Diversified Properties Inc. but property owned by Charles and Barbara

Claude that the realtors said could be rezoned for commercial use. But the recorded covenants precluded commercial use of the land even if it was rezoned.

The real estate agents claimed that because Large could have found out about the covenants just as easily as they did — by looking the property up in the recorder's office — they had no obligation to go out of their way to inform him that he really could not use the property for the purpose he had told them — the anti-storage unit.

## Better-funded neighbors eclipse Idaho's fledgling movie business

KETCHUM — Your odds of rubbing shoulders with a movie star are infinitely better here than in Beverly Hills.

But the irony of the Wood River Valley's growing reputation as Hollywood-in-the-High Country can be heard on Peg Crist's answering machine.

"We don't have any current commitments for projects this summer, but if we don't already have your resume..."

Crist runs the Idaho Department of Commerce's one-woman film office, and business isn't brisk these days.

"In Idaho, there are some obstacles to getting more films made," she said. "And the biggest is probably that we're behind all of our neighbors."

Even as Utah and Colorado grow into hotbeds of the burgeoning independent film industry and neighboring British Columbia attracts dozens of American movies every year because of the low cost of production, no feature film has been shot in Idaho since actor-director David Hemmings wrapped up "Dark Horse" in Blaine County in the summer of 1991.

"Dark Horse" went almost straight to the videocassette market, and the two other feature films shot in Idaho in the '90s, "A Talent for the Game" and "Midnight Fear," quickly followed suit.

"We haven't had a lot of exposure lately," said Crist, a former photographer from Southern California who opened Idaho's film office six years ago. "Many of the films shot here have gone to video without going to theaters."

"Hollywood's a small town," Crist said. "Things get done by word of mouth. We're just hoping the word about Idaho gets to the person who's going to do the next 'Dances with Wolves.'"

"What we need," says Tom Trusky, a Boise State University English professor and the reigning expert on Idaho film history, "is for Bruce Willis to tell some of his Hollywood pals about Idaho. That's how it will get done."

Willis, who owns a home near Hailey,

is one of a handful of sometime Blaine County residents with the clout to get a movie made in Idaho. Clint Eastwood is another, he's already shot two films here: "Bronco Billy" in Boise in 1979 and "Pale Rider" in the Sawtooth National Forest north of here in 1984.

But for "The Unforgotten," the movie that finally won Eastwood an Oscar, he went to Alberta, where production costs are lower.

"Film industry people who live in the Wood River Valley tend to go there for pleasure, not for business, and we respect their privacy," Crist said. "We're reluctant to approach them unless it's through a third party."

It was not ever thus. When Sun Valley opened for business in 1937, Hollywood arrived by the train car full primed for lights, camera and action.

"From about 1940 through the end of the war, there were seven or eight feature films shot in Idaho, mostly around Sun Valley," Trusky said. "It was the glamorous place to be, I'm sure with the help of some very shrewd promotion by Mr. Harriman."

Actually, Averell Harriman, the major heir to the Union Pacific Railroad, was tending to his long, distinguished diplomatic career by the time the cameras started to roll for "Sun Valley Serenade" in 1940. But by that time, Madison Avenue had already put Sun Valley on the map in gilt-embossed letters.

Ernest Hemingway came to call, and soon after, his pal Gary Cooper. By the outbreak of World War II, everyone who was anyone in the entertainment industry had vacationed in Sun Valley, and a substantial number came back to make movies.

"It was easier in some ways to make films in those days in places like Idaho because there wasn't as much location shooting," said Peter Haggart, director of the School of Communications at the University of Idaho. "You could go someplace and shoot some exteriors and then go back to a sound stage in Hollywood and shoot the rest of the film."

But about the time Technicolor dawned across movie screens, television began to offer serious competition to the movies. Making pictures became more expensive, cost overruns became more dangerous and filmmakers began to retreat to the valleys and hills around Los Angeles to shoot their scenery.

After Ketchum doubled for a small town in Arizona in "Bus Stop," Marilyn Monroe's memorable sojourn in the Gem State in 1956, Hollywood, with rare exceptions, forgot about Idaho.

But by the mid-1960s, urban sprawl had gobbled up the best movie locations in Southern California, and Hollywood rediscovered its wanderlust.

"There were other areas that had become established earlier with the film industry," Crist said. "John Ford shot 'Stagecoach' around Moab, Utah, and filmmakers have been going back there ever since."

That kind of tradition became the basis for strong efforts by some Western states to attract more moviemakers. Utah, for example, spends five and a half times what Idaho allocates to film promotion; and

## Linguists Klingon to most anything

They study long hours and pore over exotic and obscure markings just so that they can bark, growl and spit at each other during their infrequent meetings.

Lawrence Schoen, one of their high priests, says: "It's like any hobby. There is a certain appeal to being able to speak in the language of a race that never existed in a distant, imaginary galaxy sometime in the indefinite future."

"Hja, HJSAH, oih Klingon Hol."

Translation: "True. It's the Klingon language."

Schoen is an assistant professor at Chestnut Hill College in Philadelphia. He describes his field as psycho-linguistics, and he is the founder and president of the Klingon Language Institute. He also edits a scholarly journal called *HotQeD*, which means "linguistics in Klingon." (The word is a combination of "Hol," meaning language, and "QeD," meaning science.)

The institute has upward of 200 members. When they get together they say, "Ih-Klingon Hol Dajath?" ("Do you speak Klingon?")

"Some people are very, very serious about this," said Schoen, who says he is not a fluent Klingon speaker. He formed the institute mainly for fun and because he was curious.

The Klingons are a warrior race that people the "Star Trek" movies and television episodes, including "Star Trek: The Next Generation," a syndicated series. They behave in strength, honor and loud, vulgar-sounding speech. It is almost impossible to say anything substantial in Klingon without spitting on your listener.

The bible of the Klingon language is Marc Okrand's "Klingon Dictionary" (Pocket Books), which sells for \$10 in most bookstores. Besides the English translation of Klingon words, it contains grammatical information and a pronunciation guide. There is also an audio cassette "lesson" on the market, and the KLI offers a free, 11-lesson correspondence course to

## Twin Falls man blends art, business

TWIN FALLS — Whoever said it was enough to produce art for art's sake never met Wayne Bosh.

A trim, handsome man with equal parts charisma and business savvy, Bosh isn't out to become the next Picasso. Not that he would if he could.

"I'm a businessman," Bosh said candidly. "All I care about in the art is if it sells."

Bosh owns Mario Jason Originals, a 32-employee company in downtown Twin Falls that manufactures contemporary wall and accent art for sale in merchandising showrooms from Atlanta to New York to San Francisco. And though the company's products may be all color and texture and form, the hard work that goes into them is all Bosh.

"The way you would design something for yourself would be different than the way you would design it for the consumer. An artist who sells maybe 50 paintings at \$25,000 a piece has a more eclectic approach, and you're trying to take a mass-appeal approach. You can argue, well, who's the better artist?"

"If a guy designs a new razor and it sells 10 million pieces, is he really more of an artist than the guy who designs something that sells a thousand pieces? When you're designing for production, it's a very disciplined art. A lot of people can design things, but nobody wants to buy them. It has to be sellable. I look at this as a business."

Mario Jason Originals was founded in the early 1970s by California sculptor Mario Jason. When Jason decided to turn his attention to his \$35,000 original bronze sculptures ten years ago, Bosh, a former business broker, arranged the sale of the company to an old business partner. He bought the company himself in 1985.

"I really liked the company and I wanted to get into something different," Bosh said. A native Wendellite, he moved the company from its original site in Los Angeles to the old Woolverton building in Twin Falls in 1988.

"Most of my family was still living here, so it was a natural choice for me," Bosh said.

Mario Jason Originals has three basic

## The best, worst of Idaho movie history

BOISE — As Idaho's unofficial film historian, Boise State University English professor Tom Trusky has collected prints and done research on the 34-odd feature film produced in Idaho since "Cowpuncher" went before the cameras near Idaho Falls in 1915. Here some of the high points and low points of Idaho film history, according to Trusky.

Best movie: "Grub-stake," made by Canadian-born director Nell Shipman at her Lionheart Lodge Studios on Priest Lake in 1923. An old-fashioned morality tale with a woman as the main character, Shipman's story inspired a plea for more equitable treatment of Indians and equality for women.

Worst movie: Tie, "Heaven's Gate," "Idaho Transfer," "Northwest Passage" and "The Duchess of Idaho." "Heaven's Gate," Michael Cimino's 1979 \$40 million train-wreck of a movie shot in part near Wallace, is generally celebrated as the most colossal flop in American movie history. "Idaho Transfer," made by Peter Fonda from his own script and shot near Arco in 1973, is a piece of incomprehensible, post-"Easy Rider" gibberish about time travel and environmental destruction.

Colorado spends four times as much.

The results have been hugely profitable. Because a movie production company buys services and hires extras locally, a picture can pump between \$1 million and \$5 million into a local economy, Trusky said.

"So much of what drives a filmmaker's decision about where to shoot is access and support," Haggart said. "They can come in and hire a lot of people and know things will be taken care of. They go where they can get the best prices and they go where they can find the support services."

In Idaho, often those services are just too expensive — or just too far away.

"We had a production that was interested in coming in this summer and shooting on the Payette River and staying in Boise," Crist said. "Unfortunately the Payette River is an hour away from Boise, and they didn't want to travel that distance. So they're working in Oregon."

"We had another production recently that was interested in shooting at Craters of the Moon, but they needed 200 hotel rooms," she said. "You're not going to find 200 hotel rooms in Arco."

And according to Crist, Idaho

starts with some other disadvantages:

- Seventy percent of Idaho is federal land, and the prime film locations are administered by the Bureau of Land Management. It can take months to get a BLM permit, a delay that most filmmakers can't afford.

- Production companies like to shoot exteriors in July and August, when the weather is warm and the chance of rain is slimmest. That coincides with the crest of the tourist season in Idaho, and there are few hoteliers in the state willing to tie up a large bloc of rooms for a movie company.

- Most of Idaho's valleys are cultivated, and even areas that aren't are usually within line of sight of a telephone line or a highway. That limits the state's appeal for westerns.

- The emergence of Park City,

Utah, and Telluride, Colo., as marketplaces for independent films makes it difficult for Idaho to attract attention with the mavericks — filmmakers with little money to spend.

- With the exception of Walt Disney Productions, all of the major studios are now subsidiaries of large, cost-conscious corporations — some of them foreign-owned. The emphasis is now on the bottom line, and spending the money to shoot on location in a place like Idaho is a luxury.

And as in other areas, Idaho is hurt by its reputation as the most obscure Western state.

"A couple of years ago, they made a movie about Polly Bemis (a Chinese-American woman who escaped from a forced marriage to become a successful entrepreneur in northern Idaho in the last century)," Haggart said. "And although the building where she lived are still standing, they shot the movie in Montana."

"I was back in New York on a subliminal when 'My Own Private Idaho' (a movie by Portland, Ore., independent filmmaker Gus Van Sant about two homosexual street hustlers) was released," Trusky said. "Everyone asked me if I'd seen this movie about Idaho, so I went as soon as I could. 'I just sat there and laughed.'

he continued. "There, in the desert scene where these two guys are speeding along on their motorcycle, I expected to see Black Butte or the Arco buttes, and there instead is eastern Oregon."

"Then they get the airport where Idaho International Airlines offers direct service from Boise to Rome. It cracked me up."

"My Own Private Idaho" had nothing to do with Idaho," Crist said. "I think it's fair to say we weren't very happy with that film."

For Idaho to get back on the movie map, it will have to develop its own homegrown filmmakers, Crist says — perhaps somebody like David Lynch. In the past few months, she's been scouting locations for Lynch, who went from a Boise grade-school classroom to "Elephant Man," "Dune," "Blue Velvet" and eventually "Twin Peaks."

"He came back for the first time in 30 years just before Christmas," she said. "He hopes to be able to come back again, maybe with a project."

In the meantime, she works the phones with her contacts in L.A. "It's just a matter of time before the film industry discovers Idaho," she said. "We just have to wait our turn."

"Northwest Passage," a 1940 biopic about fur traders and intrepid Canadian explorers shot near McCall, trashes Indians as duplicitous savages. "The Duchess of Idaho" is Esther Williams in a Busby Berkeley-style confection about the life and loves of a swimmer, set 900 miles from the nearest ocean.

**Best performance by a rookie:** Frances Farmer, in her role in the first talkie filmed in Idaho: the 1935 Hollywood treatment of Edna Ferber's "Come and Get It." Directed by Howard Hawks and William Wellman, it co-starred Edward Arnold and Joel McCrea and was shot near the timber town of Headquarters, Farmer, a Seattle native, was a talented young actress who quickly ran afoul of Hollywood for her leftist politics. After she suffered a nervous breakdown in 1940, she was lobotomized without her consent.

**Worst performance by a veteran:** Dancer Cyd Charisse, who actually played a character named "Indian Girl" in the justly forgotten 1951 movie, "The Wild North," filmed in Sun Valley and along the Kootenai and Selway rivers.

**Favorite actor:** Cowboy star Jack Hoxie, who appeared in "Told in the Hills," a 1919 Hollywood Western shot near Lewiston. Hoxie, who grew up near Riggs in a family that neighbors didn't mess with, was wanted for the murder of his brother following an argument over an affair Jack was having with his brother's wife. The Idaho County sheriff, knowing the family's reputation, didn't press the matter. After a long silent film career, Hoxie retired to a ranch in Oklahoma, where he lived until the 1960s, urging young people to be good Christians.

**Best save by a Soviet film library:** Gosfilmotond, the Soviet national film archives, which found the only two surviving reels of "Told in the Hills" in its Moscow vaults four years ago. "Russia was kind of at the end of the distribution network," Trusky said. Gosfilmotond sent Trusky the surviving reels, which he premiered in Lewiston during the Idaho Centennial celebration in 1990.

**Best promotion:** A celebrated still photograph of Marilyn Monroe in a frock made from a potato sack, for "Bus Stop."

any terrans who ask for it.

Linguist Okrand created the Klingon language for the 1984 film "Star Trek III: The Search for Spock."

Schoen, 33, confesses to watching a lot of "Star Trek" while growing up, but says he is not a fanatic. He does not go to "Star Trek" conventions and he doesn't wear rubber-pointed ears like the Mr. Spock character.

He was teaching in a small college near Chicago about a year ago and learned that he would be a victim of a staff reduction there. He sent out resumes and began waiting for replies. While doing that, he decided to study Klingon to keep his mind off his mailbox.

"It was something to do while waiting for answers," he said.

He studies the language and puts out the quarterly journal because he enjoys it.

"It's a sort of intellectual game," he said.

But Klingon is hard to learn and hard to speak. With the same effort, he thinks Klingon students could probably learn Japanese. Still, he doesn't believe that those hobbyists are "maw" (crazy).

"There are people who can tell you how many pitches were thrown in the third inning of the fourth game of a World Series 10 years ago. They're not crazy. It's just something that interests them."

Using computer bulletin boards, he began searching for other Klingon speakers. He found so many that he formed KLI, a nonprofit organization based in Flourtown. It costs \$5 a year to join, or \$15 if you want to receive HoIQeD.

Okrand purposely made the language difficult. In English the usual word order is subject-verb-object. Klingon reverses that: "There is no distinction between adverbs and verbs. Accent marks adorn the language like confetti and upper-case letters are used to warn the speaker

that these letters are not pronounced as they are in English.

But, for the fan, that is no problem. Or, as we say in Klingon, "qoy he" (pronounced "kye he").

"It's challenging, mysterious and stimulating. It's a combination of let's pretend and an intellectual puzzle. You see, you can't go to a native Klingon and ask him questions. You have to figure everything out based on the dictionary, the cassette and listening to actors speak Klingon in the movies or on television.

"Unfortunately, the actors sometimes get wrong. There are some sounds they just can't manage. So you investigate and speculate. It's like an archaeologist trying to put together a picture of a vanished civilization from just scraps of evidence. We have no connected speech to refer to. Just bits and pieces."

Schoen says the language people use can have some effect on the way they think. That may explain why

the Klingon people are a hard, loud, uncompromising race of warlike creatures.

His journal contains mainly scholarly articles about the "proper" use of Klingon, but it also contains jokes, puns and wordplay.

"We don't want to get carried away with this business. It's supposed to be fun, something that can be put aside when it's time to do something in the real world."

People interested in joining KLI can write to HoIQeD at Box 634, Flourtown, Pa. 19031-0634. Schoen asks for a stamped self-addressed envelope. He doesn't want to be "Qut" (vulgar) but he doesn't have the "Huch" (money) to buy a lot of stamps.

"It's a shoestring operation," he said. "And I'm only doing it for fun."

There is no word in the Klingon dictionary for "fun."

product lines, which are also sold in C. Penney's and imported furniture stores all over the country, and are available locally at Natures Loft in Boise.

The first line is based on Jason's original, sea-inspired designs of the California ideal: sailboats, windswept landscapes and fluttering ocean birds. Those copyrighted designs were part of the purchase price for the company.

The second and third product lines are based primarily on Bosh's own designs, and reflect his ability to improve on a classic. Bosh said just 20 percent of his products now are from Jason's designs, the rest are from designs of his own.

"I've designed almost all the stuff here," Bosh said, gesturing toward the starkly beautiful metal trees and whimsically-painted tropical fish hanging on his display-room walls.

Bosh, though not classically trained as an artist, holds an Associate degree in art and a Masters in industrial art education.

"I taught art for three years. I've had a lot of experience."

Mario Jason originals are made by hand in the cavernous workshop at the back of the Woolverted building. To produce the 2,000 to 4,000 pieces he sells every month, Bosh employs a score of artisans to cut each section of each complex design from sheets of stainless steel and brass.

The sheets are then spot-welded together and painted or lacquered according to Bosh's specifications. Some pieces are placed onto bases fashioned from imported Mexican onyx. Others are mounted onto canvas and placed in frames, still others are fitted with hooks for hanging directly over a painted wall.

This efficient set-up may not be the way Van Gogh would produce artwork, but Bosh said it works well for Mario Jason Originals. It also allows him to produce several hundred

editions of one piece one week and work on another design the next week.

Production flexibility helps with sales, as well. Not only is it cheaper to mass-produce — Bosh wholesales his artwork for as little as \$3 or as much as \$160 — it's also easier to meet the geographically-influenced taste of his far-flung customers.

Barns, birds and trout sculptures are popular in the Midwest and West, for example; dolphins and dancers are hot in the Sunshine State and brass lighthouses sell well in Maine and New York, where the real things still stand.

As with most gift, furniture and art-related businesses, Mario Jason Originals has taken its share of hits from the recession. Bosh said, and

the regional appeal of each piece has cut into the profit margin on some lines.

"Our business has been way off because of the economy. The economy nationally hurt us," Bosh said. "We sell a lot to California and Florida, and Florida was hurt because the snowbirds didn't come down."

Still, Bosh said the company is healthy, partly because of the involvement of his sister, his wife and his son, and partly because of employees who only seem like family.

"I have really good people here," Bosh said. "I'm lucky that I have people that I have people who have been with us so long and they never miss a day of work. If the people aren't there, you got nothing."

Bosh said he plans to expand his interests elsewhere over the next few years, but Mario Jason Originals will always hold his interest.

"I don't see myself outgrowing this company," he said. "It's interesting for me."

"For instance, this whole year is going to be spent developing new products," Bosh said. "Right now, we're considered sort of a contemporary product line, and we want to get into doing some country pieces."

"I think change is in the air, and with change, people want new products to go along with the feelings that they have," Bosh added.

"Luckily, we happen to be right in there. We try to keep people interested."

**Senate GOP helps with trade pact**

WASHINGTON — Senate Republicans told President Clinton on Thursday they want to help him pass a trade pact with Mexico and Canada, but warned him against seeking tough side agreements on environmental and wage standards.

Clinton is pushing for a North American Free Trade Agreement, but pledged during his campaign to address environmental and labor concerns in supplemental agreements.

"We hold open the hope that we can find some reasonable environmental protections and some reasonable labor protections that Republicans can support and we can get through the Congress," Myers said.

In a letter Thursday to the White House, 27 Republican senators pledged their help, saying the trade pact could ultimately boost economic growth in the United States and create jobs. Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole was among the authors.

**Jobs bill may receive death blow**

WASHINGTON — The tax portion of President Clinton's job-creation bill appears headed for the same fate as his emergency spending plan.

Democrats in the House Ways and Means Committee, which will begin work next week on the president's tax program, told Clinton on Thursday that his proposed investment tax credit is in deep trouble. The same message was spelled out at a hearing before the Senate Finance Committee.

"I think the president realizes there are many members who are concerned with the investment tax credit," Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, told reporters after the session at the White House.

"They don't see anything enthusiastically supporting it. No cheerleaders out there," Rostenkowski said.

Nevertheless, the White House said, Clinton is not giving up on the credit. "He would like to go forward on that," spokesman George Stephanopoulos said.

**Vitamin A may help restore hearing**

WASHINGTON — In research that raises hope for eventually curing leading forms of deafness, scientists have demonstrated that inner-ear cells critical to hearing can be restored in mammals using a chemical made from vitamin A.

The research was on inner-ear cells removed from three-day old rats, but Dr. Thomas R. Van De Water of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York said "we're very hopeful that what we saw in the rat tissue will transfer over to humans."

Other experts call the result a "very significant" advance in studies aimed at correcting human deafness caused by injury or age. Some predicted that the technique could be tried on humans with a decade. A report on the study was to be published Friday in the journal Science.

**FAA orders propeller inspections**

WASHINGTON — The Federal Aviation Administration Thursday ordered immediate inspections of the type of propellers suspected in last week's airplane crash that killed the governor of South Dakota.

The National Transportation Safety Board had been pressing for the inspections since last August, but the FAA refused to order them in March. The NTSB chairman warned that the propellers could fail and cause a "catastrophic accident."

The FAA's order applies to 116 aircraft like the state-owned plane that crashed April 19 in Iowa, killing Gov. George Mickelson and seven other people on board.

Similar propellers manufactured by Hartzell Propeller Inc. of Piquette, Ohio, are used in many commuter planes and corporate aircraft. More than 35,000 of the propellers are in service, according to the company.

**Nevada officials not happy about waste**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nevada officials Thursday accused the Energy Department of understating the risks of shipping thousands of tons of high-level nuclear waste across the country to a proposed Nevada storage site.

The cross-country transport of perhaps several thousand truck shipments of radioactive nuclear fuel a year would create health and safety risks to the public in dozens of states, said Robert Loux, executive director of the Nevada state office on nuclear waste issues.

Nuclear industry spokesmen accused the Nevada officials of "trying to alarm other states and communities" with false concerns about safety. They said nuclear fuel already is shipped regularly by highway in safety casks, with only a handful of accidents and no case of a radioactive release.

Energy Department officials could not be reached immediately for comment.

The Nevada delegation has been visiting major U.S. cities — including Omaha, Kansas City, St. Louis, Chicago and Cleveland — through which much of the nuclear wastes would travel either by truck or rail if the Nevada site is approved.

The effort, in part, is designed to garner support from other regions of the country for Nevada's effort to

block the storage site 100 miles northwest of Las Vegas, which the government would like to open by 2010. Nevada state officials for years have fought the proposed burial of the nation's most radioactive wastes in their state.

"The issue has been portrayed as Nevada against the rest of the country ... but there are high stakes for many, many states," said Sen. Richard Bryan, D-Nev., at a news conference.

The Nevada delegation argued that the state nuclear waste disposal program should be reviewed by outside experts, who also should examine DOE's plans for transporting the wastes to Nevada if Yucca Mountain is found to be suitable for storage.

"We want an independent review of the whole process," said Bryan.

Loux, who is executive director of Nevada's Nuclear Waste Project Office, an agency of the state government, said that preliminary Energy Department plans for transporting the wastes call for as many as 2,000 to 3,000 shipments a year — probably by truck — over major east-west interstate highways and through major cities.

The proposed Yucca Mountain facility would be designed to hold as much as 70,000 tons of high-level nuclear fuel.

**Gift may have saved children**

WACO, Texas (AP) — Ken Sonobe believes the bottle of cologne he gave David Koresh in January saved the lives of his two young granddaughters.

The girls were inside the Branch Davidian compound Feb. 28 when a deadly gun battle broke out between members of the religious cult and federal agents, starting a 51-day siege.

Within hours, Angelica Sonobe, 6, and her 3-year-old sister, Crystal, became the first of 21 children allowed to leave.

When the standoff came to a fiery end April 19, scores of cult members were killed, including the girls' parents and an estimated 17 young children.

The sisters appear to be adjusting well to their new life.

"We don't ask them too much," Sonobe said. "But somehow we mentioned going back to Texas and they said 'Don't send us back.'"

think what has happened is that they don't want to go back to the same life."

Sonobe, 69, and his wife, Molly, 60, watched television coverage of the raid from their home outside Honolulu about a month after they traveled to Waco for three days to meet their granddaughters for the first time.

Now, the girls' safety is foremost for them.

"When the shootout began, we said, 'Boy, what are they going to do with the children?'" Sonobe said in a telephone interview from home.

State child welfare authorities contacted the Sonobes soon after taking custody of the girls. Their father, Scott Sonobe, placed a note inside Angelica's coat pocket with the grandparents' names and phone number.

**Packwood case goes to Senate panel**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oregon voters trying to unseat Sen. Bob Packwood in connection with sexual-misconduct allegations will get their say before a Senate panel weighing the chamber's authority in such a case.

The Senate Rules Committee voted Thursday to allow Packwood's challengers and defenders to address the

panel on May 10 before it makes a ruling on whether the Senate has the authority to throw out his re-election.

Packwood has been accused by a group of Oregon voters of defrauding them. They contend he intimidated and threatened women who had made sexual-misconduct allegations against him.

**Robot arm, astronaut's back both fixed**

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Columbia's astronauts had to work out some kinks Thursday — in a robot arm and a crewmember's back.

The joints of the arm — about the length of a human's — repeatedly became stuck. The crewmen had to twist it back into the proper position. One of the two German physicists aboard the shuttle had his own problems.

"I feel better than I thought I would. The only thing that I had so far were minor back pains during the first two nights," astronaut Ulrich Walter told a German television station. "However, that has subsided and it was only during the night. I feel terrific."

**Warning issued for shark fishing**

MIAMI — The next shark you encounter may be able to eat you, but under new federal regulations, you may not be able to eat the shark.

After years of warnings from scientists and conservationists, the National Marine Fisheries Service has issued first-ever restrictions on fishing for 39 major shark species.

The agency published quotas Monday for commercial fishermen along the U.S. coastline from Maine to Texas and out to the 200-mile international limit, as well as bag limits for sports anglers, said Aaron King, a fisheries expert who helped draw up the plan.

"Most biologists would not argue that we run the risk of biological extinction," King said Thursday. "But if the problem doesn't already exist, it's going to exist soon."

**1st quarter: 35,000 new AIDS cases**

ATLANTA — The number of Americans with AIDS increased at a surprising rate during the first three months of the year, when more than 35,000 new cases were reported, federal health officials said Thursday.

Most of the new cases stemmed from a new definition of the deadly disease, but even cases not attributed to the broader definition increased by 21 percent, double the rate for the period last year.

"That is higher than we expected," said Dr. John Ward, chief of AIDS surveillance for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. "Some of that 21 percent is a sign that the AIDS epidemic is continuing to grow."

Between Jan. 1 and March 31, 35,779 new AIDS cases were diagnosed nationwide, a 204 percent increase from the 11,770 new cases during the same period in 1992 under the old definition, the CDC reported. Last year, under the narrower definition, cases increased about 10 percent every three months.

**Term of battered woman commuted**

BOSTON — A woman convicted of murdering an ex-boyfriend she said battered and harassed her won't have to complete her life sentence. A state panel commuted it.

The Governor's Council voted 6-3 on Wednesday to free Eugenia Moore, a 34-year-old mother of three, who began serving her sentence in February 1986. Moore's attorney said she could be out within two months after a parole board hearing.

Moore was convicted of second-degree murder in the 1985 stabbing death of Alfred Phillips, who she says abused her during their 20-month relationship and threatened her life after they broke up.

**Public wants health reform at low cost**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American public strongly favors changes in the country's health care system, but is unwilling to pay much more in taxes or insurance premiums to get the job done, surveys indicated Thursday.

The yet unfinished work of President Clinton's health reform task force drew a 70 percent approval rating in a survey by Democratic and Republican pollsters. Only 23 percent disapproved.

A separate insurance industry poll found voters support by wide margins many ideas Clinton is expected to propose, including a comprehensive benefits package for everyone, mandated employer coverage and a ban on insurers' rejecting people with medical problems.

Seventy-four percent approved of the government's creating regional alliances for individuals and businesses to buy insurance at competitive, large group rates.

But the support collapsed when the Health Insurance Association of America's poll-taker suggested

ed the government might force people to switch insurance plans or assign them to a health maintenance organization.

Both polls surveyed 1,000 adults and had margins of error of plus or minus 3 percentage points.

Clinton's plan, due in a month, is expected to push managed care plans like HMOs, but still afford people other choices including traditional fee-for-service medicine.

The bipartisan poll was conducted by Republican Ed Goes of the Tarrance Group and Democrat Celinda Lake of Mellman-Lazarus-Lake.

Lake said the public is "wildly supportive" of Clinton's drive for health reform, but voters are "cautious reformers."

Only 11 percent ranked health care as the country's No. 1 problem.

They strongly favor rigid government cost controls on the health industry and would "probably be satisfied with a much simpler system than the one they're about to hear about," Lake said.

The insurance industry survey by Voter-Consensus Research found voters willing by a 53-43 margin to have their taxes or insurance costs raised by up to \$250 a year to improve care for the poor.

Robert J. Blendon, a Harvard University School of Public Health expert on polling, said Americans are willing to endure "modest sacrifices" to help cover the 37 million uninsured, but not big ones.

They also have "a deep resentment and a sense that they have been taken to the cleaners" by the health care industry, Blendon said.

The Goes-Lake poll found Clinton has a 53-point credibility advantage over congressional Republicans on the health care issue.

Clinton was rated as better able to handle the problem by 72 percent, versus 19 percent who put their stock in the GOP.

"Even registered Republicans tend to consider Clinton better suited to improving health care," it said.

**Scientists say Saddam gassed his own people**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A human rights group contended on Thursday that it has scientific evidence that Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein used poison gas against his own people.

Physicians for Human Rights announced the results of laboratory tests by the British defense ministry's chemical labs in Porton Down, England, on soil taken from bomb craters in the Iraqi Kurdish village of Bijni. The results were released simultaneously by the British laboratory in England.

"This is the first time ever that scientists had been able to prove the use of chemical weapons, and especially a nerve gas, through the analysis of environmental residue taken years after such an attack occurred," said Eric Stover, executive director of the human rights organization. The physicians group gathered the soil samples and provided them to the laboratory.

Testimony from survivors who said many victims died writhing and coughing blood led to accusations that Iraq gassed its own citizens as part of a campaign against rebellious Kurds, which killed tens of thousands.

**The Adventures of Huck Finn (PG)** This Disney family film, boy's adventure division, is especially fortunate in its casting, with Elijah Wood as Huck and Courtney B. Vance as his friend Jim capturing the spirit of their roles. Though it bogs down in the middle and tends to be more preachy than necessary, writer-director Stephen Sommers' version of the Mark Twain novel is a notably lively and spirited yarn. (Twin Cinema)

**Aladdin (G)** This musical successor to Disney's "Beauty and the Beast" does more than expand the visual boundaries of mainstream animation and its possibilities for extravagant humor. It offers Robin Williams, who brings his nimble wit and lightning-fast comedy to the character of the Genie, in what may be a role of a lifetime. The late Howard Ashman contributes some brilliant lyrics, and the whole combination ends up appealing not only to the smallest child but the hippest adult. Aren't we lucky to have it now? (Jerome Cinema)

**Boiling Point (R)** Despite a misleading action-thriller title and campaign, this is a superior film noir, originally titled "Money Men," and directed stylishly by James B. Harris. Wesley Snipes stars as a Treasury agent in pursuit of an increasingly desperate ex-con, a funny-money specialist played beautifully by Dennis Hopper. The ensemble cast includes Lolita Davidovich, Viggo Petersen, Valerie Perrine and Jonathan Banks. (Twin Cinema)

**Born Yesterday (PG)** Though the part of a dizzy showgirl who enthralls both her wealthy boyfriend (John Goodman) and an influential Washington journalist (Don Johnson) is perfect for Melanie Griffith, this remake of the 1950 film only serves to point out the

one-note weaknesses that, despite its revered status, hampered the original film as well. (Jerome Cinema)

**Cop and a Half (PG)** A tough Tampa cop (Burt Reynolds). A cute kid who wants to be a tough cop (Norman Golden II). A vicious gangster who wants to be a doo-wop idol (Ray "Starkey"). A lady Captain who waxes as a social worker (Holland Taylor). Playground bullies who want to be gangsters. Thugs who want to be straight men. Cops who want to be clowns. **The Sandlot (PG)** Dinky-high-concept comedy about a bunch of sandlot pee-wee ballplayers. It's wholesome and rich in family-values, but is it any good? (Twin Cinema)

## 'Benny & Joon': There's a movie in there somewhere

### Movie review

Inside "Benny and Joon," a love story that celebrates dysfunction and the cute, though not necessarily in that order, there's a character drama whispering to be let out, but that's no help. Long before you get around to fixing this little movie, you'll hate it. And that's always a problem.

Benny, who is the only remotely "normal" character within miles of this story, isn't really part of the romance, the little notwithstanding. He's just the set-up guy, a Seattle auto mechanic who, we learn after a bit of the old expository waltz, has given up the pleasures of a man's early middle years to take care of his sister Joon, who is crazy. Of course she is: The crazy ones always spell their names oddly (Joon is short for Juniper; in this case, maybe it's the parents who should be taken out and whupped).

Anyway, Benny is shown early on turning down a date request from an attractive and not bad-acting young woman whose car he has recently repaired at bargain rates. You can see the wheels turning when the woman asks Benny out, and then see the wheels grind to a halt. He almost says yes. Then he remembers Joon.

That's part of "Benny and Joon" and probably the most intelligent part at that: Benny (played by Aidan Quinn, who has never seemed so sympathetic or so interesting) is singing the old codependents' hymn. He needs Joon to need him.

write, but he does pretty fair impressions of Buster Keaton, Charlie Chaplin, Jacques Tati and even, in a crucial scene toward the end of the film, Harold Lloyd. Depp has the physical rhythms and shapes of these actors' routines done surprisingly well; he's a lot of fun to watch once you realize that he's crazier than a bedbug himself.

Still, you wonder in the early going and then in the middle of the film just where all this will lead. These characters are entirely too cute for their own good, and the treatment of Joon's mental illness is so smooth and so easy; until late in the story, when she loses control in a sadly predictable sequence, she appears not disturbed but merely eccentric. Joon and Sam, two happy, wacky kids: It's all too much.

Masterson and Depp do generate some sparks in the short time they have together, though the script doesn't give them that much — it's more concerned with Benny and how he finally tries to find a love of his own, with Ruthie (Julianne Moore), a movie-star-turned-fash-house-waitress. Sure, you say — a movie star who finally realizes her lifelong dream to become a waitress. What will they think of next? That's this movie's idea of a soulful gag. Cute. Very, very cute. (Twin Cinema)

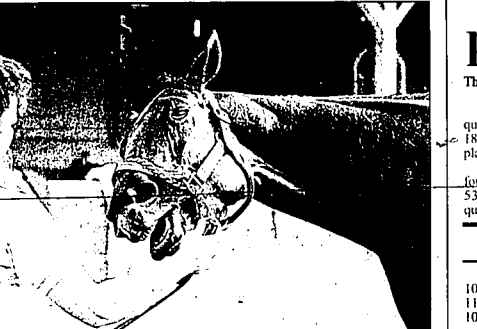

## Exemption law has some politicians crying foul

WASHINGTON — The chairman of the Senate subcommittee which writes antitrust laws said Thursday his colleagues have been balking at the idea of removing baseball's exemption. Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, an Ohio Democrat, said he hasn't scheduled a hearing on his proposed legislation because he doesn't have enough support to get the bill out of committee. "I like to win," he said. "A number of members of the Judiciary Committee are uncertain. As soon as I know we've got the votes, we're going to go."

Sens. Bob Graham, D-Fla., and Connie Mack, R-Fla., have gathered anti-exemption interest groups together to form a coalition, which met for the first time Thursday. "This is the most sustained, most vigorous and most likely to succeed effort that's come down the road," said Donald Fehr, head of the Major League Baseball Players Association. "This is a national movement, broadly based," Graham said. "That was not true a month ago."

Professional baseball is exempt from antitrust lawsuits under a 1922 Supreme Court decision that was affirmed in 1972. Any change is up to Congress. Major league baseball contends the exemption is good because it protects cities from bidding wars to move their franchises. Owners also say revoking the exemption would harm the minor leagues. The groups in the anti-exemption coalition say taxpayers and fans would be better off without it because the exemption gives owners the power to restrict expansion, veto moves by teams wishing to relocate and threaten cities unless they pay for new or improved stadiums. They groups also decry owners' ability to restrict where baseball games are broadcast. "Fans pay more to watch less," said Rep. Mike Synar, D-Okla. "Owners insure that the big league clubs don't enter each other's market and compete on price, number of games available or programming quality." The groups in the coalition are Consumer Federation of America, Capitol Baseball Inc., New Yorkers for Fair Capital, Tiger Stadium Fan Club, D.C. Area Baseball Fans, National Sports Fan Association, Sports Fans United, and the players' association.

McCallister, who attended the University of Houston and only recently moved to Florida, had six birdies on the back nine and no bog-

neys for the day. He was making his first PGA Tour appearance in a month after having his infected tonsils removed.

"After not playing in a month, I was a little nervous," McCallister said. "This was a good round for me. After being under the weather, I needed to get some confidence on there."

McCallister birdied the first hole and played par golf until a birdie at No. 8. He began his back-nine surge with a 15-foot birdie chip on the par-4 11th hole.

"It's a confidence builder for me, but we've still got three more rounds," he said.

His 64 tied the low opening-day score for the tournament set in 1978 by Gary Player.

## 6-under par 66 gives Albers early Sprint lead

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — LPGA veteran Kristi Albers had an eagle Thursday as part of a 6-under 66 and grabbed the opening-round lead in the richest tournament in women's golf.

Albers, who is looking for that elusive first victory after more than seven seasons on tour, held a two-shot lead over Page Dunlap in the \$1.2 million Sprint Classic.

"It's hard to stay patient, but I know I have to," Albers said. "I've seen a lot of players who came after me win, but I know I have to just let it happen."

Although most of the big names on the tour were in the field, the leader board was packed with non-winners. Only five of the top 15 had won a tournament.

Albers, who started on the back nine, catapulted into the lead when she eagled the 464-yard, par-5 fifth with a 30-foot chip. She birdied No. 7 to open a two-stroke advantage.

"I made a lot of good putts for pars," she said. "Albers, 29, has won \$23,000 this season in seven events and would love to celebrate her first career victory with this \$180,000 winner's purse in this 72-hole event."

"I had good experiences on this golf course," she said. "But I have so many holes to play it's really not a consideration."

Wakefield leads the majors in total pitches (657 in five starts), pitches per game (131.4) and walks.

# Low ends higher, erases 20-point loss tied to weak GIP

**NEW YORK** Stock prices ended higher on Thursday, after computer-driven buy programs erased a 20-point loss tied to a weak report on the nation's gross domestic product.

Advancing issues outnumbered declining ones by about 7 to 0 on the New York Stock Exchange. The NYSE's composite index rose 0.58 to 242.48. On the American Stock Exchange, the market value index rose 1.99 to 418.75.

The Commerce Department said the GDP grew at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1.8 percent in the first quarter. Analysts had expected growth of more than 2 percent.

The market largely ignored a Labor Department report that first-time unemployment claims dropped by 7,000 last week, a bit less than the 9,000 decline that was forecast.

General Motors said it will alter climbing Point on Wednesday.

The auto giant said its first-quarter net profit rose to 42 cents per share, up from a loss of 33.96 cents that was tied to charges for future retiree health benefits. Analysts had estimated net earnings at 34 cents.

Telefonos de Mexico led the most-actives on the NYSE and ended up 1/8 at 48, recovering from a drop of 21 to 45 1/2, after reporting a narrower-than-expected gain in earnings.

Oil stocks were mixed after sharp runups on Wednesday. Texaco declined 1/4 to 64 1/2, but Mobil rose 1/4 to 70 1/2.

## Economic growth slows down in early 1993

### Clinton aides say figures reflect need for jobs package

The Associated Press

WASHINGTON — Consumers turned cautious and military spending plummeted during the first three months of the year, dramatically slowing the economy's growth rate to only 1.8 percent, the government said Thursday.

President Clinton and top Cabinet officers immediately seized on the number in their fight to salvage parts of the \$16 billion jobs bill blocked by Senate Republicans last week.

The latest increase in the gross domestic product, the sum of all goods and services produced in the United States, was less than half the robust 4.7 percent annual rate of the fourth quarter, the Commerce Department said.

Clinton said the report "proves we were right" and supports "implementing the budget commitment that the Congress has made to reduce the

deficit and to increase targeted investments that will generate jobs."

His budget director, Leon Panetta, said, "Right now this is an anemic, no-jobs recovery. ... It should be obvious that the recovery needs a significant boost."

However, Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole of Kansas said the president's tax-and-spend policies depressed the economy by scaring business executives, consumers and investors. "The American people are grading the president with their pocketbooks," he said.

In another economic report, the Commerce Department said sales of new homes unexpectedly rose 4.8 percent to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 637,000 in March, despite the East Coast storm.

Declines in the Northeast and South were offset by increases in the Midwest and West. Also, the Labor Department said

first-time claims for jobless benefits dropped by 7,000 last week to 349,000. Analysts said the small drop suggested a stable labor market.

The first quarter marked the eighth in a row that the economy grew, following a three quarter recession in 1990-91. However, growth through the period has been only about half so strong as in previous expansions.

In the first quarter, consumer spending grew at a 1.2 percent rate after shooting up 5.1 percent in the fourth. Housing construction grew just 0.2 percent after jumping 25.1 percent.

Military spending dropped 25.5 percent, the biggest since the government began tracking the category in 1972. Excluding that, GDP advanced at a 3.5 percent annual rate. Defense spending, adjusted for inflation, now is the lowest since 1984.

Commercial construction fell 2.2 percent in the first quarter, the fourth

consecutive decline. However, businesses' investment in new equipment rose at a healthy 8.6 percent rate on top of a 14.5 percent gain in the fourth quarter.

Exports fell faster than imports, detracting from growth. The various changes added \$22.3 billion to the GDP, bringing it to a seasonally and inflation-adjusted annual rate of \$5.01 trillion.

Analysts were concerned because the growth was more than accounted for by a \$26 billion rise in inventories. With more goods on shelves and backlogs, factories will have less need to increase production or hire workers during the current quarter.

Economist Allen Sinai of the Boston Co. Economic Advisers Inc. said the constant wrangling in Washington, rather than the presence or absence of a small economic stimulus package, is the biggest factor making consumers nervous.

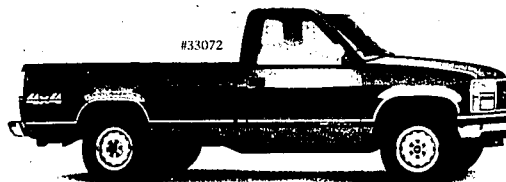

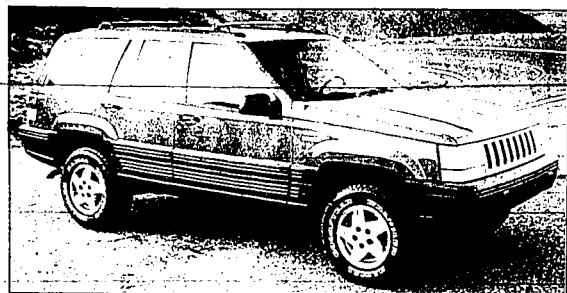

# Mini-series portrays Charlie Starkweather's killing spree

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Terence Malick made it into a movie. Bruce Springsteen made it into a song. And now the story of Nebraska's notorious mass killer, Charlie Starkweather, is going to be a television series.

"It's just a fascinating story," said Michael O'Hara, the screenwriter and co-executive producer of "Starkweather: Murder in the Heartland," a two-part ABC miniseries to air Monday and Tuesday.

"It's all about time and place for me," he said.

"The time was the winter of 1957-58. The place was Lincoln.

"Elvis was king. Eisenhower was president, and it was a seemingly idyllic period in human history," O'Hara said from his Pasadena, Calif., home.

But on Dec. 1, 1957, Charlie Starkweather, a 19-year-old teenager, killed gas station attendant Robert Colvert. Police had no suspects and the case was seemingly unsolvable.

Six weeks later, in a fit of anger, Starkweather killed his girlfriend's mother, stepfather and 2-year-old sister.

The parents had forced the girlfriend, Carl Ann Fugate, to break up with Starkweather.

"After he killed Robert Colvert, he knew he had the ability to kill people," O'Hara said.

Starkweather, along with the 14-year-old Carl Ann, headed west, killing seven more people, including a prominent Lincoln businessman and two high school sweethearts.

The string of murders terrified Lincoln and the rest of Nebraska. The *National Guard* was called in, schools were canceled and schoolchildren were escorted home.

"Hysteria started to reign. It was as if an atomic bomb had been dropped," said O'Hara, who also wrote "Switched at Birth," the highest-rated miniseries of the 1990-91 season.

The Starkweather saga attained legendary status long ago. It was retold by Malick in his 1973 movie "Badlands," with Sissy Spacek and Martin Sheen, and by Springsteen in title song of his 1982 album "Nebraska."

The miniseries opens the night Colvert is killed. The movie traces Starkweather's spree, including when he and Fugate are captured in Douglas, Wyo., as well as Starkweather's execution in Nebraska's electric chair on June 24, 1959.

Howas the last person to be ex-

ecuted in the state.

The movie, which is being filmed in northern Texas, stars Tim Roth as Starkweather, Brian Dennehy, Randy Quaid and Fairuza Balk also have roles.

"Starkweather was the godfather of all the kinds of madmen we see today," and perpetrator of one of the first killing sprees in modern American history, O'Hara said.

At 15, Fugate was convicted of second-degree murder in one of the slayings and became the youngest girl ever to be sentenced to life imprisonment. She was paroled in 1976 and moved to Michigan.

Confessions from Starkweather and Fugate's own testimonials create an ambiguous picture of her involvement in the killing, O'Hara said.

"My own personal feeling is that nobody knows, including her," he said.

During the murder of her family, O'Hara says, Starkweather placed Fugate at school, as she has maintained, O'Hara said, Fugate has said she was taken hostage and was spell-bound by Starkweather, who was "in his own strange way, very charismatic," O'Hara said.

O'Hara said he took pains to ensure that Starkweather was portrayed as a killer and not a hero.

"We went out of our way not to glamorize Starkweather in any way," he said. "In my view, the man had no redeeming social value. Basically, he was nuts."

"Murder in the Heartland" airs from 8 to 10 p.m. MST Monday and Tuesday nights on ABC (KPTV and KKKV).

# PBS series traces dance as art, religion, political weapon

"If you understand someone's dance, you immediately start learning about their culture and their values," says Ilforda Grauer, creator and executive producer of "Dancing," an eight-part series premiering Monday on PBS.

"Filmed in 18 countries on five continents, "Dancing" focuses on the roles, beliefs, messages and meanings that are formed when people dance. The series examines such topics as dance as an art form, a vehicle for worship, a political weapon—an instrument of self-expression and as a source of pleasure and entertainment. "Dancer: Round Trip to Los," a coffee-table companion volume, written by Gerald Jones, was published last year by Harry N. Abrams.

The premiere episode, "Out of the Mouths of Babes," features Jacques D'Amboise, former New York City Ballet star, who introduces the kids from his acclaimed National Dance Institute in New York to the pleasures of ensemble dancing.

Dance has given D'Amboise a center to his life. "I am 59 and I have been dancing since 7 years old, so that is over half a century," says D'Amboise. "I have been dancing in every field and on every level. Dancing opened up a whole world to me."

And gave him an education. Though he only completed one year of high school, D'Amboise has five honorary doctorates, "I am a visiting professor for 11 years at the University of Santa Barbara and a full professor at the State University of New York," he says. "Why?"

Became of dance opening such a world of education to me. I have danced in every country in the

world, so I have an international sense. All of it came through dance."

When Grauer began doing serious research on "Dancing" five years ago, she envisioned it as a multi-part series on dance in America. But the format quickly changed. "First, I had to define my subject," she says. "What was American? What was dance?" That really shattered all of my boundaries. So I started thinking about the various functions that dance serves in life."

"Tap dancing, Grauer points out, is uniquely American, but its roots can be traced back to Africa. "If you look at the Martha Graham technique, you eventually end up looking at some Asian forms because she is influenced by yoga," Grauer says. "American really meant the world. So what I tried to do was pick things that were really historical in their nature."

Parallels exist between the development of dance in Western Europe and development of dance in America, Grauer found. "The Ashanti court is still active," Grauer says. "In Ghana, the Ashanti are the predominant ethnic group. They have a king and a whole system of sub-chiefs. You didn't become a king of the Ashanti by birth, you were elected from a noble class. The Ashanti didn't have written language, so all of their histories were part of songs, chants and talking drums."

Grauer not only learned about dance while making the series, she also became aware of the effects of colonialism and cultural suppression. "One of the first things that people do is suspect the way other people use their bodies," she says.

# May sweeps will bid farewell to some beloved series

Rating periods are something to look forward to because there is always a lot going on, some of it pretty good. This year's May sweeps will be remembered for the extraordinary programs going off, some of them terrific.

Before the four-week period plays out May 26, America will say goodbye to "Cheers," TV's longest-running comedy, and "Knots Landing," the longest-running drama.

Also bidding adieu will be "The Wonder Years," an Emmy winner as best comedy; "Designing Women," an outstanding comedy Emmy nominee; "Quantum Leap," an outstanding drama Emmy nominee; "Life Goes On," a family drama that is the first prime-time series to have an actor with Down's syndrome as a star; and "A Different World."

Series disappear in May like

turkeys do in November, but it is unusual for so many shows to be afforded an opportunity to prepare farewell episodes.

Last call at "Cheers" after 12 seasons is scheduled for May 20. NBC is making a night of it. A 1½-hour retrospective, with Bob Costas as host, will precede the 90-minute finale, which includes the return of Shelley Long to her role as Diane Chambers. NBC is keeping the script under wraps, but there have been leaks that one story line will have Ted Danson's Sam Malone and Diane deciding whether to marry.

The nighttime will be a special "Tonight Show" from The Bull & Finch, the Boston bar that was the model for "Cheers," with many of the cast members in attendance.

CBS also is making a night of the "Knots Landing" finale on May 13. An hourlong "Block Party" will be presented before the two-hour conclusion, which will provide closure to story lines that

have been percolating for 14 seasons.

"A Different World," "The Wonder Years" and "Designing Women" all will expand to an hour for their farewell episodes.

On May 8, Dwayne Whitney and an unanticipated third party take off for "A Different World" in Paris.

On May 12, "The Wonder Years" concludes with a show in which it apparently will become clear that young lovers Kevin Arnold and Winnie Cooper will not grow old together.

"Designing Women" on May 24 will deal with an attempted hostile takeover of Sugarbaker's. Sam will take a "Quantum Leap" into himself next Wednesday.

On May 22, ABC will put "Life Goes On" to rest with a bedtime story of events past and future.

# NBC taps writer for 'Late Night' spot NBC sends message to advertisers

NEW YORK — Conan O'Brien, a little-known writer-comedian, was "anointed" heir to NBC's "Late Night" throne Monday in a ceremony telecast on the "Tonight" show.

"I'll be happy to see someone else's name in the paper for a change," cracked "Tonight" host Jay Leno, whose accession to the "Tonight" host's job is prompting "Late Night" host David Letterman's defection to CBS this summer.

O'Brien, 30, said he learned only earlier Monday that he'd succeed Letterman in the 12:30 a.m. EDT "Late Night" berth. How much earlier? "Eight hours ago. I was eating a sandwich," O'Brien said.

He is a 1985 graduate of Harvard University, where he was twice president of the Harvard Lampoon magazine, the nation's leading undergraduate comedy school. His graduate course was the San Francisco-based Groundlings comedy troupe, training in sketch comedy and improvisation.

O'Brien was a writer for HBO's "Not Necessarily the News" before his five-year stint at "Saturday Night Live," where he shared writing Emmy and occasionally appeared as a sketch player.

For the past two years, he has been a writer-producer at Fox's hit animated sitcom "The Simpsons."

O'Brien had had a run-through audition for the "Late Night" job on the set of "Tonight" in the Bur-

bank studios two weeks ago.

The announcement ended a week of speculation that longtime stand-up Gary Shandling, star of HBO's talk-show spoof "The Larry Sanders Show," would get the nod.

Sources close to the negotiations said Shandling turned down NBC's offer on Monday morning, triggering the O'Brien deal. Shandling reportedly got the offer two weeks ago.

According to one source, Shandling was the first approach for the job, but turned down a multi-year deal worth more than \$20 million because it required him to have his program ready for air by August.

He reportedly considered this too short a period to prepare, and gave NBC his decision Monday morning.

NBC's announcement ends conjecture about the network late-night scene that has brewed since Jan. 14, when Letterman announced his decision to take his show to CBS. It will begin on that network Aug. 23 at 11:30 p.m. EDT.

Moments after CBS announced Letterman's acceptance, NBC announced that "Saturday Night Live" creator Lorne Michaels had been assigned to develop a new late-night show.

Rumors on who the chosen star would be first settled on Denis Carvey and Dennis Miller. Then, a week ago, Shandling became the front-runner in the rumor mill.

When the new "Late Night" begins, presumably there will be two

such shows originating from Manhattan. CBS has bought the legendary Ed Sullivan Theater in midtown Manhattan, and is renovating it to house Letterman's show. Currently Letterman originates from NBC studios a few blocks away.

While no one outside his family and set of friends can say they know who Conan O'Brien is, NBC spoke volumes Monday by appointing him to replace David Letterman as host of "Late Night."

By selecting the 30-year old writer/comic, the network sent a signal to its advertisers, affiliates and viewers that its aims to keep the younger audience Letterman attracted.

Late late-night television, specifically the 12:30 a.m. EDT slot, has been a haven for the college and 20-something set. From the start of "Late Night with David Letterman" 11 years ago, the show has garnered an inordinate share of the 18-to-34-year-old audience that advertisers salivate over. O'Brien could do a lot to keep those viewers at NBC.

"They are trying to retain Letterman's younger skew," said Steve Auerbach, executive vice president of national electronic media at DeWitt Media, a New York advertising agency.

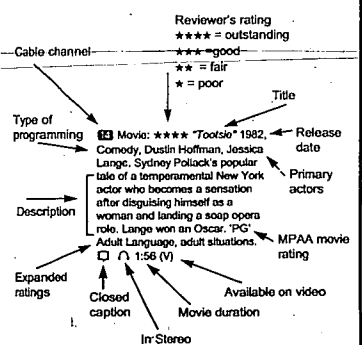

# Covering cult costs networks Carvey leaves 'SNL'

Covering the 51-day cult standoff in Waco, Tex., will end up costing the three networks and cable's CNN an estimated \$500,000 to \$900,000 each, say executives involved with coordinating the news coverage.

And those costs will continue to rise as the news organizations wind down their coverage by attempting to answer questions surrounding the demise of cult leader David Koresh. CNN had as many as 47 staffers

— reporters, producers and crew members — on site in Waco at the start of the siege, providing round-the-clock coverage. ABC kept two correspondents and crews on the scene at all times until last Friday, when it cut back to one. Following the fire, the network sent five correspondents back to Waco.

“Boy, — was it expensive, but you've got to do it,” said Ed Turner, executive vice president of newsgathering for CNN.

According to Turner, CNN shared some costs with local affiliates. CNN and Dallas station

WFAA-TV alternated staffing of cameras aimed at the compound.

David Verdi, executive news director at NBC News, said the network made a “major commitment” to the story from day one. That commitment included three cameras, three correspondents and several crews.

Networks can budget for covering such scheduled events as elections, but extended breaking-news coverage sends news expenses soaring. Coverage of Operation Desert Storm, for example, cost each network millions.

# Did ‘Jeopardy!’ help females? King signs 6-year deal with CNN

Producers of “Jeopardy!” — the highest-rated syndicated game show — have altered clues and categories to help female contestants, according to the publishers of a book due out next month.

“Inside ‘Jeopardy!’ What Really Goes On at TV’s Top Quiz Show,” by former show staffer Harry Eisenberg, alleges that categories were switched for certain female contestants to give them a better chance at winning. According to Jesse Riddle, an attorney

for Northwest Publishing, Eisenberg documents several incidents when producers took out categories on weapons and replaced them with more female-oriented categories, like fine china.

“They would change a ‘Final Jeopardy!’ category from sports to literature or art,” Riddle said. In the book, Eisenberg alleges that the changes were made on the day “Jeopardy!” was taped, despite the common practice of having the categories set well in advance.

Riddle said attorneys representing producer Merv Griffin and partner SONY Pictures met with the publisher’s representatives to show that the author’s allegations are not true, but that Eisenberg was able to cite 30 instances where categories were changed. A representative for SONY declined comment. Griffin’s spokesman Warren Cowan called Eisenberg a “disgruntled ex-employee.”

Riddle said that despite the threat of a lawsuit “we’re going to print the book.” However, Riddle also stressed that the book does not say producers broke federal laws prohibiting tampering with the outcome of such game shows.

NEW YORK (AP) — Larry King has signed a six-year contract with Cable News Network, extending his weekly night interview show through 1999 and guaranteeing him a sixth night of programming, CNN said Thursday.

“Interviewing newsmakers and taking calls from viewers live, around the world, is something I look forward to each night with CNN,” King said. “No other network can offer me that. This has

been a very successful association, and I am happy to see it continue.”

CNN said the sixth show, to be scheduled either Saturday or Sunday night, is not yet in development.

The 59-year-old King got his second Peabody Award for CNN’s “Larry King Live” election-year coverage in 1992. His show is seen in more than 200 countries worldwide on CNN International.

# Actor applies for concealed weapon

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Actor Edward James Olmos, known for his anti-gang movie “American Me” and his role as a detective on the old NBC series “Miami Vice,” requested a permit to carry a concealed firearm.

In his application, Olmos said he fears for his life after receiving threats against him and his family.

Such requests are rarely granted, and Police Commission Commanding Officer Richard Dameron wrote a letter to the board of police commissioners recommending that Olmos’ application be denied when the board votes Tuesday.

Olmos’ status is unavailable. In a comment, he said his spokesman Nick Athas. Athas said he was unaware of the gun permit application.

Dameron said Friday he didn’t know any details of the threats received by Olmos. He didn’t know

whether there was a connection to the murder last year of gang counselor Ana Lizaraga, who served as a technical adviser and had a small role in Olmos’ movie “American Me.”

Lizaraga was killed May 13 when she was ambushed in her driveway. An alleged gang member was charged with the murder.

Only one concealed weapons permit has been issued since 1974, to new police Chief Willie Williams who needed one because he had not yet passed the test required for law enforcement officers to carry guns in California.

# Real-life problem child? Ask Universal Pictures

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Is Michael Oliver a real-life problem child?

Universal Pictures thinks so. The entertainment giant is suing the 11-year-old “Problem Child” actor for \$150,000 in a contract dispute.

Such opening statements Wednesday, a Universal attorney said the red-haired moppet and his mother broke a promise to make “Problem Child 2” for \$80,000.

Attorney Shinaan Krakowsky said that just days before the film’s 1991 production, Michael’s mother demanded \$300,000 for her son — or the boy would walk.

only because without Michael repeating his role as the devil child Junior the entire movie would fold, costing Universal \$4 million, Krakowsky told the Superior Court jury.

Both “Problem Child” films focus on a small town couple, with John Ritter as the father, struggling to raise an adopted son prone to misfortunes.

The precocious actor, who was 9 at the time of the dispute, watched the trial’s start impassively. During recesses, he practiced karate kicks in the courtroom hallway, recounted recent video games and trampoline maneuvers or munched candy.

Robert DeMarzo, the lawyer for the boy and his mother, Diane Ponce, said in his opening statement that Universal still owes the young

actor \$350,000.

When Ponce renegotiated the contract, he said, she was following standard Hollywood practice because the first “Problem Child” was a \$51.7 million hit following its 1990 release.

Krakowsky derisively described Ponce as “a professional stage mother” and said her last-minute demands were “extortionist.”

“She used her son as a weapon by refusing to let him perform in ‘Problem Child 2’ unless Universal Pictures agreed to raise his compensation,” Krakowsky said.

She had signed an agreement with Universal for \$80,000, he said.

Ponce claims her son should have received the same pay as John Ritter — \$1 million.

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# From No. 1 to No. 192: Torretta masks sadness

MIAMI — He isn't No. 13 anymore, at least not in any way that matters, Monday. The NFL said Gino Torretta's new number is 192. It is a big, awful number. A number that looks especially ugly standing next to a Heisman Trophy.

"It's just another challenge," says Torretta, the quarterback with the scarlet number. "It's not the end of the world."

"It's not the start of a career that he had in mind either."

The University of Miami's Torretta entered pro football Monday, but it was backdoor, not red carpet. The Minnesota Vikings drafted him late in the seventh of eight rounds — the 192nd of 232 players.

This is a man, 22, who insisted again Monday: "I felt I was a first-round quarterback." Reality convinced him otherwise. He was warned it would be bad, but not this bad.

"Realistically I figured second to fourth round," he says.

Draftniks figured fourth to sixth. Nobody figured Torretta would escape by one round the ignominy of being the first draft-eligible Heisman winner to not be drafted.

He sat by the phone Sunday and again Monday with his mother and three brothers at home in Pinole, Calif. The party atmosphere faded by degrees.

By the end of the sixth round, with the still-arriving Heisman over there on the table staring at a phone that refused to ring, the small gathering had become a bunker against all the doubters.

"After the sixth round I'm thinking, 'Geez, there's only 50-some picks left,'" Torretta says.

Teams had expressed some interest to his agent, Leigh Steinberg. The Washington Redskins, the Los Angeles Raiders, and Jimmy Johnson's Dallas Cowboys, of course. But, no calls. Four QBs had been drafted when, finally, just before 10 a.m. on West — not long before nightmares of a tryout with the Miami Hotshots may have visited Torretta — the bell pealed. It was Vikings coach Dennis Green.

"Miami's never even spoken to me before the draft," Torretta would note.

"Coach Green said, 'We thought you'd already be gone by here. This quarterback wasn't a priority, but we can't pass you up.'"

Said Dolphins personnel man Tom Brantz: "I'm surprised he would drop to as late a round as he did. I liked him. More than that, he has as good an arm as anybody in this draft."

Yet it was the Dolphins, his hometown Dolphins, who passed on Gino right before the Vikings picked.

Competing to start in Minnesota will be returning part-time starter Sean Salisbury and recently acquired veteran Jim McMahon, and possibly incumbent Rich Gannon, although the Vikes say they don't expect him back. Torretta will compete for a roster spot with Brad Johnson, last year's ninth-round draftee out of Florida State.

This is the lot of a No. 192. Last year's 192 was a receiver from Houston, John Brown. Anonymous players get drafted 192nd, John Brown. Two years ago 192 was a guard from Florida A&M. The Heisman is supposed to live in penthouses, not on 192nd Street.

"I still have to be positive," Torretta says. "You always have to be confident in your abilities."

It hasn't been easy. First the mavericks said he won the Heisman, by default. Then the doubtful draftniks dismissed his potential, criticizing his lack of arm strength and mobility.

Torretta was hard at work Monday to keep the best face on this. He rationalized that, with free agency, there was not a dire need for rookie passers. He said what a "tremendous opportunity" Minnesota presents.

He says he is not insulted. I do not believe him. He says he has been handed a huge dose of extra incentives. This I believe.

"I have something to prove, now," he says. "I should have went higher. Right now, I think I'm more determined than ever."

Torretta is not the lowest-drafted Heisman winner. Just last year Brigham Young's Ty Detmer was a ninth-round pick of the Green Bay Packers. He languishes as third string. In 1985, little Doug Flutie lasted until the 11th round.

This does not diminish what Torretta accomplished as a Hurricane. Does not denigrate the Heisman. Rather, it SHOULD not. Of course, it will. In most minds, it rekindles all the doubts. It begs the question: If the Heisman thinks Torretta is the best player at college football and the NFL thinks he is the 192nd best, who's right?

None of this is fair to Torretta. It stifies a collegian and a college-career that deserve better. It is not fair; it just is. "How do I feel?" Gino Torretta was saying Monday. "I feel real good. Real good ..."

The first is "Shaq Attaq: In Your Face On and Off the Court, Shaquille O'Neal," and the other is "NBA Jam Session," which mixes spectacular on-court action with the hottest music of some of MCA's top recording artists.

The Shaq video (51/98, 55 mins., by Parade Video) shows and tells a lot about O'Neal, the NBA's hottest and newest tower of talent at 7 feet 11 and 303 pounds. It follows the kid who was born in Newark, N.J., through Cole High School in San Antonio and his astounding collegiate career at Louisiana State,

which led to his Shaqput as a pro.

Most of all, it shows Shaq's big-bucks smile, charismatic style and endearing quips as he dribbles through life and his many business ventures, including filming of his first Reebok commercial. cation and respect."

"NBA Jam Session" by CBS/105 and NBA Entertainment will be released Wednesday (40 mins., \$14.98) and highlights action footage by O'Neal, Charles Barkley, Dominique Wilkins, Dan Majumder, Larry Johnson, Dee Brown and Shawn Kemp.

Executive producer Don Sperling notes with pride his merging of two of the most dynamic forces in popular culture: artists and athletes. "We essentially composed and orchestrated visual accompaniments to the music," he said.

Featured is a new single by Bobby Brown/Pasce. "Drop It on the One." Also included are Bell Biv DeVoe's "Above the Rim," hits from Eric B & Rakim, Glenn Frey, Patti LaBelle, Steely Dan, Styx, and Wreckx-N-Effekt's "Rim Shaker," carved from their "Rump Shaker."

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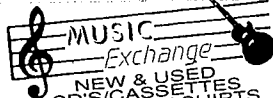
