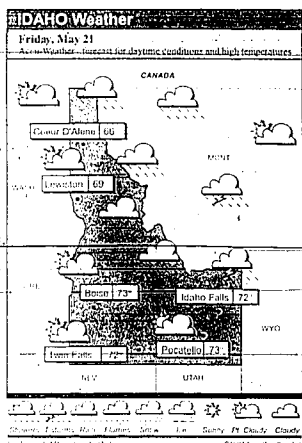
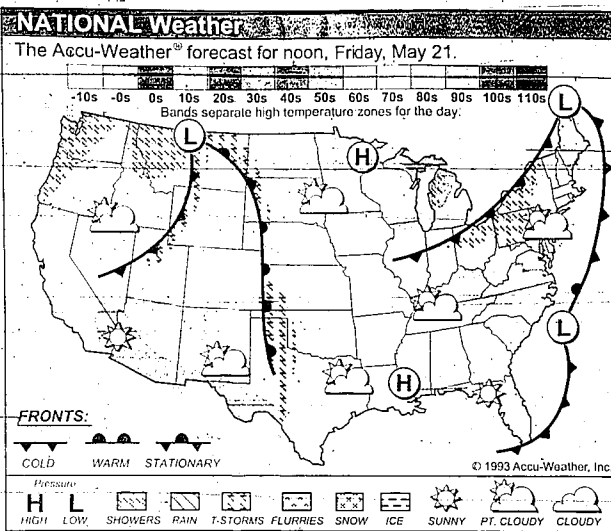

Weather summary

Showers and thunderstorms spread into western and central Idaho early Thursday, then took a north and eastward path up into the Idaho panhandle and across the border into Montana later in the morning and afternoon.

For the most part, thunderstorms that did occur were brief and produced only light rainfall. The exception was Mallon, where just over 20" rain was reported. Challs reported 25 inch, the most at any reporting station.

By mid-afternoon, radar still showed widespread showers along the Idaho-Montana border. Elsewhere, there was some clearing with the showers ending or most of the state except for a few new showers in and around Pocatello.

Cooler air spread inland with the precipitation Thursday. However, temperatures did rise into the 70s-80s in partly sunny areas, from the mid-60s to low-70s in cloudier spots.

Skies cleared over the Magic Valley by late morning and winds shifted to the west but died down by evening.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 90 degrees at Hagerman. Yellow Pine reported the coldest at 30 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 105 degrees at Coalinga, Ariz. Bywater, N.D., and Custer, S.D., reported the low at temperature at 27 degrees.

Unseasonable chill grips nation's midsection

The nation's midsection endured an unseasonal chill Thursday, with the temperature almost reaching the freezing point in Nebraska's capital.

The band of cold air stretched from the Ohio Valley region to the northern Plains.

Rainstorms and thunderstorms were scattered over the northern Rockies, while rain showers spread over the southern Plains; the Tennessee and Ohio valleys into the northern Atlantic coastal states.

In northwest New Mexico, the Animas River was close to flood levels and was expected to rise through the weekend because of melting snow in Colorado.

Gov. Roy Romer visited potential flood sites in southern Colorado and said authorities will "try to prevent a flood before it happens."

In Alaska, the villages of Atkasook and Eniokwuk were flooded because of ice jams on the Yukon River. No injuries were reported.

In Lincoln, the temperature dipped to 33 degrees, breaking a record of 35 degrees for the day set in 1931. And Youngstown, Ohio, tied its record low of 34 degrees set in 1956.

Court indicts Venezuelan leader

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP)—The Supreme Court on Thursday authorized an embezzlement trial against President Carlos Andres Perez, who promised to abide by the law and predicted his name would be cleared.

It is now up to the 49-member Senate, which is controlled by the opposition, to decide whether to order a trial. The Senate scheduled a meeting for 10 a.m. Friday.

Throughout the country, where political and social unrest helped to fuel two coup attempts last year, people prepared for upheaval. But Caracas remained mostly calm.

The unpopular president is the first democratically elected Venezuelan leader to face charges while in office.

In an emotional speech televised Thursday evening, Perez again declared his innocence. He pledged to step aside, as required by the constitution, if a trial is ordered as expected.

A darkness fell, National Guard troops fired tear gas to disperse an unruly crowd of about 1,000 outside the National Congress Building. The

mob was made up mainly of students and young workers shouting anti-Perez slogans.

Police moved in after the crowd tried to break through a barrier. Two minor injuries were reported.

Allegations of corruption have dogged Perez during both of his 5-year terms, but he finished out his first without charges. On Thursday, on a 9-6 vote, the court accused the president of misusing \$17.2 million in government funds. He denies wrongdoing, saying the money was used to protect Venezuela's security.

He is alleged to have used it instead for a lavish inauguration party and the like.

Minutes before the decision was handed down, the entire Cabinet resigned, pressuring the ruling against the 70-year-old president.

Information Minister Angel Zambrano said the 17 ministers quit "to

pave the way for the new administration to take over."

If the Senate endorses a trial, the president would be automatically suspended for its duration. Perez's term expires Feb. 2.

He faces a prison term of six months to three years if convicted. Perez, his voice breaking twice, told the 20 million Venezuelans he expected the trial to be ordered. He said he would hand over power to Congress President Octavio Lepage and stand trial to clear his name.

"I will immediately proceed to hand over the post to the Congress president so that the Congress can appoint an interim president as soon as possible while the judicial proceedings clear the president," he said.

He appeared to have a tear in his eye at the end of the speech. As he spoke, fireworks exploded across the capital.

Perez predicted a short trial and a return to power. The president, whose popularity has dropped to single digits in recent polls, was characterized by the allegations as a conspiracy against him.

No warming hints

WASHINGTON (AP)—Growth rings from a 3,613-year-old South American tree show no evidence that the climate is being warmed due to human activity, scientists say.

Two researchers report that annual rings in an alerce tree, the second longest-lived tree species known, show that the climate near the west coast of South America has warmed and cooled many times over thousands of years, but that there has been no increase in temperatures during the industrial age.

Their report was to appear today in the journal Science.

The researchers said their study does not contradict studies that have suggest warming trends in parts of the northern hemisphere. But the results did indicate that any so-called global warming isn't really global — at least not yet.

seem fair," wrote Bond, the ranking Republican on a Senate subcommittee that oversees the White House's budget.

"I must say I am concerned about a developing pattern of experienced public servants being fired to make room for young political appointees," Bond said.

For the second straight day, questions about the firings dominated the White House news briefing. In a 16-month period examined by auditors, the travel office handled \$10 million to \$11 million from news organizations in payment for White House airline charters to accompany the

president.

"The office was not being run in a professional manner and the money was not being handled in a professional manner," Stephanopoulos said.

While acknowledging the complaints from Thomas, Stephanopoulos said the producer "is not looking for any business with the White House. He will not bid on the (charter) business."

Thomas, in addition to his Hollywood interests, is owner of a charter company that leased planes from time to time during the Clinton campaign. He was at the White House, in the back of the press briefing

room, when the firings were announced on Wednesday. "He's here all the time," Stephanopoulos said.

The former director of press advance for the Bush administration, John Herrick, rebutted charges that the travel office did not seek competitive bids.

"The travel office attempted as much as they could to offer the business to any company that was willing to do it," Herrick said in an interview. "I know they talked to several different airlines and charter companies routinely to see where they stood and what their interest level was in doing it."

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Clinton eases registration by signing 'motor voter' bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton signed into law Thursday a landmark measure requiring states to ease voting registration, ending a hard-fought battle by Democrats and advocates for young, disabled and minority Americans.

The so-called "motor voter" law requires states to allow registration by mail, as well as when citizens apply for or renew a driver's license, visit, welfare and other government agencies or stop by a military recruiting office.

"Voting is an empty promise unless people vote," Clinton said at the White House signing ceremony. "Now, there is no longer the excuse of the difficulty of registration."

Whether the new law will result in increased voter turnout, however, is the subject of dispute. Clinton said it would. "Motor voter works at registering voters, and people who register vote." But states with similar laws generally have experienced higher turnout in the first election after enactment, but no long-term climb.

And critics have argued some provisions invite fraud, particularly one that prohibits purging a name from voting rolls solely because the individual has not voted for an extended time.

Roughly 65 percent of eligible Americans are registered to vote. Supporters of the new law predict that number will top 90 percent within a few years because of easier registration.

"Democracy only works when we remove the obstacles to taking part," said Vice President Al Gore.

Young people are likely to benefit most from the new rules, and on hand for the signing were representatives of MTV and Rock the Vote, an organization that lobbied 18- to 24-year-olds to register for the 1992 election and supported the legislation.

Advocates for the disabled predicted 17 million adult Americans with disabilities who are not currently on voting rolls because of inaccessible registration offices will register as well, either by mail or by signing up at government agencies where they receive services.

And NAACP leaders praised the signing as an extension of the civil rights movement's victory in ensuring blacks the right to vote. President Lyndon Johnson's remarks at the signing of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 were played at the start of the ceremony.

"The whole civil rights community, Mr. President, celebrates this day," said Benjamin Chavis, the NAACP executive director. "Of all the government rights afforded to the American people, and particularly those rights secured by the blood, sweat and tears of African-Americans, hardly any is more precious than the right to vote."

Also attending the South Lawn ceremony were members of Congress instrumental in passing the law, including some of the Senate Republicans who voted to break a GOP filibuster.

That breakthrough came after supporters agreed to end language creating penalties if government workers coerce people to register with a particular political party. Because Democrats hold an edge at the state and local government level, some Republicans had suggested government appointees at welfare and other agencies might coerce recipients to register as Democrats.

More troublesome to Republicans, however, many who support the "motor voter" concept, is a provision that prohibits states from purging individuals from voting rolls just because they do not cast ballots.

"That opens it up to fraud," Ohio Republican Chairman Robert Bennett said in a recent interview.

Many states now purge names from an individual's list on a four- or five-year period, a practice designed to deter fraud by removing individuals who have moved or died.

Under the new law, names could be purged only at an individual's request, by proof of death, because of criminal conviction or mental incapacity, or if the voter moves to a new jurisdiction.

Feds seek more on Iraqi death plot

WASHINGTON (AP) — FBI and Secret Service investigators are certain Iraq sent agents to assassinate President Bush in Kuwait, but the White House is pressing for firmer evidence, two administration officials said Thursday.

The administration has said it would respond against Iraq if it finds the allegations to be true. But the White House and some State Department officials have been urging caution, said one of the sources.

Both spoke only on condition of anonymity.

White House spokesman George Stephanopoulos would say little on the subject besides, "We have no final conclusions from the investigation at all." He said he did not know how long it would take for a report to be concluded and sent to President Clinton.

The FBI and Secret Service agencies began their investigation in Kuwait 16 days ago and have since interviewed the 11 Iraqi suspects jailed since their April 13 arrest, the officials said. Most of the team returned to Washington recently, said a third official.

Based on their interviews, on Kuwait-supplied information, and on the types of explosives found in the suspects' possession, the team is now certain that Iraq's Ministry of Intelligence sent agents to kill Bush when he visited Kuwait April 14-16, the two officials said.

Skepticism within the administration has stemmed from several factors:

U.S. officials were disturbed that Kuwait did not tell them it had arrested the 11 Iraqis and five other suspects until either late in the Bush visit or afterward.

Although it appeared Kuwait held off because it didn't want to risk a cancellation of the visit — which was a salute to Bush's leadership in reversing Iraq's invasion of Kuwait — U.S. officials were still concerned the Kuwaitis might have been hiding information.

The State Department also re-

ported that the suspects appeared to have been tortured in captivity, causing some doubts about the veracity of the confessions they gave the Kuwaitis, said the officials.

The Iraqis originally tried to pass themselves off as smugglers, but quickly broke down under Kuwaiti questioning, said one of the officials.

Kuwaiti authorities announced from the start that they would not extradite the suspects to the United States — the United States hasn't requested it — and would put them on trial.

The trial is set for June 5, and the Iraqis, as well as one of the five other non-Iraqis arrested in the alleged plot, could face death sentences if convicted.

Some of the suspects didn't seem to know who the target of the planned attacks was — although one told authorities that it was Bush, the officials said.

One of the investigators' main tasks was to find out whether Bush was in fact the target, or whether the suspects meant to set off bombs around Kuwait City to disrupt the visit.

The investigators quickly concluded that Iraq was behind the mission, based largely on the fact that the explosives in a car bomb rigged to explode near a building Bush was to visit were of the type used by Iraq in past terrorist acts.

Having interviewed the suspects over the past two weeks, the team also was convinced that their target was Bush, said one official.

The interviews have borne out everything that Kuwait claimed about the suspects and their intentions — especially that one of the suspects planned to strap explosives around his body and blow himself up next to Bush, in case the car bomb failed to hit its mark, he said.

Search remains wide for new justice

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton has cast "a wide net" for a new Supreme Court justice, and aides said Thursday an informal end-of-May timetable for a nomination may slip to June.

Clinton does not yet have a short list of candidates and the long list changes almost daily, White House advisers said. Still prominent on the long list are several female and minority judges.

"Without setting a firm deadline, the White House had hoped to select a nominee by the end of May. That would leave enough time for an FBI investigation and confirmation hearings before the August recess of Congress.

"He's hoping to get it done in 10 days, but don't hold your breath," said one White House official. "We're dealing with a guy who's intimately involved in this process and who takes his time making decisions — especially important ones."

Justice Byron White has announced that he will retire at the end of the court's term, usually late June or July.

The process has been slowed because Clinton has been personally

involved in winning names. "He's casting a wide net, and has sent us back for more names more than once," said another Clinton aide. The aides, both involved in the Supreme Court selection process, spoke on condition of anonymity.

Among those being considered are federal district Judge Jose A. Cabranes of New Haven, Conn., Stephen Breyer of the United States Court of Appeals in Boston and Jon O. Newman of the appeals court in Manhattan.

The president has recently asked for information on state judges, including Justice Shirley S. Abrahamson of the Wisconsin Supreme Court and Justice Christine Durham of the Utah Supreme Court.

An old Clinton friend, Richard S. Arnold of Little Rock, Ark., has likely dropped from consideration because he has belonged to the Country Club of Little Rock, which enrolled its first black in December.

Another falling star may be federal Judge Amalya L. Kearse of the federal appeals court in Manhattan. Aides said her name does not come up as much in conversations with Clinton, but they don't know why.

The candidacies of Kearse and Abrahamson are helped because they have Republican guardian angels on the Senate Judiciary Committee. Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, is pushing for Abrahamson and Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., has supported Kearse.

Abrahamson and Durham are among the first women judges on top state courts. They have interpreted their state constitutions to expand the protection of individual rights beyond the minimum requirements set by the U.S. Constitution.

Breyer, 54, has taught anti-trust and administrative law and economic regulations at Harvard. He is considered a moderate. The fact that he worked for the Senate Judiciary

Committee in the late 1970s couldn't hurt his chances.

Breyer and Newman are moderates appointed by President Carter. They are known for finding consensus among their fellow judges, a trait Clinton wants in his first choice for the Supreme Court.

Cabranes-52, is another moderate who has disagreed with trial lawyers on legal reform. That could hurt, because Clinton received strong support from trial lawyers. He reportedly was considered by President Bush for the Supreme Court.

His selection would meet Clinton's desire to bring diversity to the court. Cabranes did not speak English when he arrived in the South Bronx from Puerto Rico at age 6.

California high court upholds surrogate pacts

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A woman who bore a child for a childless couple has no parental rights to the baby, the state's highest court ruled Thursday in upholding surrogate-motherhood contracts.

Lawyers in the case said it was the first ruling by any state supreme court to uphold such contracts. The New Jersey Supreme Court declared surrogate contracts invalid in the so-called Baby M case.

In its ruling, the California Supreme Court said surrogate contracts — in which a woman agrees to bear a child for a few — are enforceable and do not violate public policy.

A lawyer for the surrogate mother in the case said he would appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Although most surrogate mothers are poor, "there has been no proof that surrogate contracts exploit poor women to any greater degree than economic necessity in general exploits them by inducing them to accept lower-paid or otherwise undesirable employment," said the

opinion by Justice Edward Panelli. "The woman in this case was implanted with the couple's already fertilized egg."

It was unclear whether the ruling also would apply to another type of surrogacy, in which the surrogate mother's own egg is impregnated through artificial insemination.

NASA asked to tone down station plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — A powerful space advocate in Congress urged NASA on Thursday to put aside its drawing board and stick with the space station design that has cost the nation more than \$8 billion already.

"We are recommending that NASA proceed with a scaled-down version of the Space Station Freedom," said Rep. George H. Brown, D-Calif., chairman of the House Science, Space and Technology Committee. The Freedom-derived station is the only design I intend to support.

Letter author from President Clinton, NASA set three teams of engineers to work in February on a 90-day crash project to design stations costing \$5 billion, \$7 billion and \$9 billion.

Move to oust Packwood on harassment allegations fails

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Rules Committee threw out a complaint seeking the ouster of Sen. Bob Packwood on sex harassment allegations Thursday, arguing members had no authority to unseat him. Packwood praised his colleagues' decision, but a lawyer for the group that brought the complaint said it showed the Senate was "out of touch with the American people."

The panel voted 16-0 to reject a petition contending Packwood lied to voters about the allegations during last year's campaign and therefore was guilty of election fraud and should be ousted.

The separate Ethics Committee still is investigating accusations that Packwood made unwanted sexual advances toward more than 20 women who worked for him or with him during his 24-year Senate career and tried to silence some by threatening to expose de-

tails of their personal lives.

That panel has authority to recommend punishment, including expulsion, if it finds a senator violated Senate rules or standards. Packwood said he was pleased with Thursday's vote "both for myself and for the Senate."

"The last thing the Senate wants to do is get into the practice of conducting autopsies on 32 elections every two years if the loser claims the winner told a lie," the Oregon Republican said in an interview with The Associated Press.

But Katherine A. Meyer, a lawyer for the Oregon voters who sought to unseat Packwood, said of the ruling, "It says the Senate is really out of touch with the American people."

"The Senate does not think there is anything wrong with lying and cheating and

stealing your way into this exclusive club, and I think the American people are tired of that attitude," she said. She said that the Rules Committee had denied the petitioners a fair hearing, refusing to thoroughly investigate the claims, and that she feared the Ethics Committee would do the same. Sen. Wendell Ford, D-Ky., chairman of the Rules Committee, said he agreed with colleagues who worried that setting a precedent of reviewing campaign conduct and comments "would open Pandora's box."

"I think it was a very clear consensus that it is very difficult to read the minds of voters

after the fact — what would happen, what

if," Ford said. He said the Republican Party has launched a similar effort to unseat Sen. Don Riegle, D-Mich., "just for publicity purposes" based on allegations he lied during his 1988 campaign.

More than 200 Oregon petitioners had asked the Rules Committee to nullify Packwood's re-election. They alleged that an effort to silence some of the female accusers prior to his victory in November was electoral fraud akin to stuffing ballot boxes.

But several members of the committee said during a hearing last week they did not believe they had the authority to unseat a colleague even if convinced that he or she had lied to voters.

"They said that campaign statements did not constitute the kind of electoral fraud

covered by Senate rules.

The petition argued that Oregon voters would have chosen a Democratic challenger, former Rep. Les AuCoin, if they had known about the allegations that Packwood forced himself on female employees.

Three weeks after the election, The Washington Post published several of the women's contentions about uninvited sexual advances.

The Post, which had been pursuing the story for months, also said Packwood had provided the newspaper with derogatory information intended to challenge the woman's credibility in the days leading up to the election.

The committee's action Thursday took only five minutes. It voted without debate on a motion by Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, to dismiss the challenge.

Perspiration won't be enough to save 'Inspiration Oak'

MAGNOLIA SPRINGS, Ala. (AP) — "Inspiration Oak," a 500-year-old live oak tree attacked by a vandal with a chain saw, apparently won't survive despite a lengthy effort to save it.

"Even if part of the tree were to survive, there is almost no living wood left," said forester Stan Reavis of Pensacola, Fla. "It could fool us and live, but my gut feeling is that it will be completely dead in the next month or two."

The tree was attacked with a chain saw on Oct. 12, 1990, during a dispute over ownership of the property, which was taken under a court order by the county for a public park.

No charges were filed. A 4-inch-wide gash was cut through the bark all the way around the tree's 29-foot-circumference

base. New tissue was grafted on to bridge the gap so sap could flow.

By 1992, volunteers formed a foundation to raise money to save the tree, 65 feet tall with limbs spreading 150 feet across.

Elaine Gill, a worker at Inspiration Oak Park, said visitors had come from 67 countries and from all over the United States. She estimated 100,000 visitors have passed through the park to see the tree since it was attacked.

"We go through one of our guest books in about 2½ months," Ms. Gill said.

The Baldwin County Commission voted Thursday to have the county's Parks and Land Management Committee study proposals to preserve the tree after it dies.

U.S. drug labels assailed in 3rd World

WASHINGTON (AP) — The products of American-owned drug makers can be perilous in the Third World because of labels that lack critical warnings or make claims that would be prohibited in this country, congressional investigators said Thursday.

"Nothing could be more reprehensible than the exploitation of men, women and children in developing countries with misleading and deceptive medical claims," Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., said.

Waxman and Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., had long sought the study by the congressional Office of Technology Assessment, which randomly sampled 241 drugs made by foreign subsidiaries of companies based in the United States.

The seven-year study of drugs sold in Brazil, Kenya, Panama and Thai-

land, found that two-thirds of them made unsubstantiated claims of health benefits or failed to include information that prescribing doctors should know, the OTA said.

Among the missing information: proper dosage, ingredients, side effects, and warnings about medical conditions that the drugs could worsen.

The drug industry was quick to denounce the report, issuing a statement even before it was publicly released. The Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association said the study was unfair because it failed to recognize differing laws in different countries and that labels are constantly being rewritten as new information becomes available.

The manufacturers also criticized the Office of Technology Assessment for being slow.

"It is unfortunate that the OTA took seven years to complete the study that Congress requested to be completed in two years," association President Gerald J. Mosinghoff said.

"Given the amount of additional time taken, it is all the more unfortunate that the study does not provide an accurate picture of what the actual situation is in developing countries regarding pharmaceutical labeling," he said.

The drug makers said they were being held unfairly to standards that did not apply in the countries where their products were being sold.

But the Office of Technology Assessment, the scientific arm of Congress, said its results were based on the determination of what physicians would need to know to prescribe the drugs safely.

Only 1 nuclear sub shipyard may survive end of Cold War

WASHINGTON (AP) — Only one of the nation's two shipyards that build nuclear submarines is likely to remain open in a post-Cold War era of declining budgets, the Defense Department's No. 2 official said Thursday.

Deputy Defense Secretary William Perry's testimony marked the first time a Clinton administration official has advocated a move toward one shipyard, and his comments were sure to cause consternation in Connecticut, Rhode Island and Virginia.

"We haven't quite completed the plan yet," Perry told the Senate Appropriations defense subcommittee, "but as I see it ... (we should be) keeping one not two (shipyards) and keeping it at a very low production rate."

General Dynamics' Electric Boat Division in Groton, Conn., and Newport News Shipbuilding of Newport News, Va., have been competing for defense business sharply reduced by the collapse of the Soviet Union.

Newport News is the largest private employer in Virginia. Electric

Boat is the second largest private employer in Connecticut and the largest in Rhode Island.

Perry described the prospects for the shipyards as the Pentagon wrestles with the problem of maintaining the defense industrial base in a time of shrinking military budgets.

Subcommittee chairman Daniel Inouye, D-Hawaii, noted that defense budgets have declined 40 percent since 1985.

Perry said the Pentagon has two options: Shut down some facilities, such as the shipyards, and then restart them at the turn of the century or keep a low production rate going until the next generation submarine. Perry said the first option is a "perfectly viable alternative," but not the preferred solution because of the potential loss of skilled workers.

By maintaining low production at a facility, the industry can "keep a cadre of people and if there is a dramatic change in the world situation and you need to reconstitute forces, you can do it much more effectively."

Electric Boat currently is working on the Seawolf, the nuclear attack submarine designed to counter the former Soviet fleet. Congress has appropriated funds for two of the boats, estimated at around \$2 billion each. President Clinton's fiscal 1994 budget includes no money for a third submarine.

Newport News and Electric Boat are fighting for the contract to build a new attack submarine, the reduced-cost Centurion.

The hearing also considered the size of future military forces and bases, and Perry said the United States plans to "hold the line" on 30,000 American troops in South Korea and 40,000 in Japan.

Perry said he does not expect the threat from North Korea to dissipate in the near future.

He also said the United States is taking steps to keep North Korea from reprocessing a batch of plutonium into nuclear weapons material, but did not say what those steps were.

Auditors say cleanup plan was a waste

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Energy Department spent \$45 million for a contractor to map out a cleanup plan for contaminated land at its Oak Ridge weapons laboratory, but department auditors say it got little for the money, including advice that actually could hamper cleanup.

A report by the Energy Department's inspector general's office blamed inadequate management controls by the civilian prime contractor, the subcontractor and the department's own Oak Ridge field office for the poor results.

"DOE has received little value for the \$45 million expended," concluded the IG report, which urged that some of the money be returned and that tighter controls be placed on remaining work that is to be done under the contract.

Bechtel National Inc., the subcontractor assigned to do the work, called the IG report misleading and full of "numerous factual inaccuracies and technical misunderstandings."

Insurance program chief quits

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — The chief of Empire Blue Cross and Blue Shield, the nation's largest nonprofit health insurer, resigned Thursday after months of battling critics over his management and the company's financial problems.

Albert Cardone, who earned \$600,000 a year as chairman and chief executive officer, was replaced by two executives. The company op-

erates only in New York State, insuring more than 8 million people.

Financial reserves had dwindled during the last two years, and the Legislature approved a \$100 million bailout to soften the impact of rate increases on about 350,000 customers.

Cardone's resignation came a month after a state audit criticized Empire for slow response to changes in the health insurance market.

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EPA expands toxic dumping disclosures

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Clinton administration is moving to increase public disclosure of toxic chemicals, expanding the reporting requirements for substances that industry puts into the air, water and soil.

The Environmental Protection Agency plans to add at least 200 chemicals to the list of 300 polluting substances that industrial plants must track and publicly disclose, according to an agency official who spoke on condition of anonymity. Under 1986 legislation, 23,000 industrial manufacturers must disclose their emissions of 300 chemicals, some linked to cancer or other serious diseases. The additional chemicals are among more than 600 that lawmakers had tried unsuccessfully to include on the list.

EPA Administrator Carol Browner plans to announce the expansion Tuesday. The agency is expected to release, then a report on 1991 emissions, the latest available, showing a downward trend but an upturn in discharges into water.

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Mother, son leave \$37 million for Nature Conservancy efforts

CLEVELAND (AP) — A wealthy widow and her son — a philosopher-night watchman — didn't often talk about the environment, and some associates say they seemed more interested in art and academics than conservation.

But Mildred and Peter A. Putnam left \$37 million to the Nature Conservancy, which buys and protects land that harbors endangered plants and animals.

Before Mrs. Putnam died in 1984 at age 93, she made a pact with her son to leave most of the family fortune to the nonprofit conservancy.

Peter Putnam made good on that promise before he died six years ago at age 62.

But details of the bequest were not widely known until the conservancy, based in Arlington, Va., said in the May-June edition of its magazine that the bequest had inspired a \$300 million fund-raising drive.

It's the largest single gift the conservancy has received. But its biggest contributor was 3M heiress Katharine Ordway, who gave gifts totaling more than \$53 million during her lifetime.

James P. Conway, a longtime friend of Mrs. Putnam's and a Case Western Reserve University fund-raiser, said she rarely mentioned the environment, even though much of her money came from investments in natural resources.

"Usually when someone makes that kind of money, they are not conservationists," Conway said.

But Barbara Lipscomb of Shaker Heights, a conservancy board member credited with securing the be-

quest, said both Putnams cared about the environment.

Friends said Mrs. Putnam managed the family fortune of real estate, lumber and ore holdings after her husband died in 1951. She became a generous patron of the Cleveland Museum of Art, donating 14 pieces of art.

Peter Putnam devoted his time to academic pursuits — for a while.

He received a doctorate from Princeton in 1960 and taught at the University of Massachusetts and Union Theological Seminary, in

New York. But he quit academics in 1974 because the seminary, realizing his family was wealthy, pressed for a gift, according to a profile in the Princeton alumni magazine in 1991.

Putnam became a volunteer for the government program VISTA in Houma, La., where he eventually settled and became a state highway department night watchman.

He spent little money on himself, but continued to manage the family money after his mother died. He spent his spare time writing about physics, philosophy, psychology, history and economics. He died after he was struck by a car while riding his bicycle to work. He had no heirs.

"He was a brilliant, brilliant mathematician. He had an extraordinarily interesting mind," said Adele Silver, whose late husband, Rabbi Daniel Silver, grew up with Peter Putnam in the upscale suburb of Bratenahl.

The conservancy owns 1,300 nature preserves covering 6.4 million acres in 50 states. It raised \$146.4 million in 1991, making it the nation's most successful fund-raiser among — nonprofit — environmental groups.

The Putnam bequest has been used to preserve Little Pecan Island near Lewisville — the Morgan-Sawamp near Ashitabala, Ohio, land used by migratory waterfowl along the Platte River in Nebraska and the 500, square-mile Gray Ranch in New Mexico, which is home to about 1,000 plant and animal species, many of them rare or endangered.

Woman regrets taping incident

ANCHORAGE (AP) — A woman who videotaped police as they fatally shot a man threatening to kill his little brother says she regrets recording the scene.

Terrance Cloyd, 20, killed his brother and 8-year-old sister Tuesday, then walked outside holding his 10-year-old brother hostage at gunpoint, police said.

Kelli Kallio, 20, a nursing student who sold the tape to local TV stations and newspaper, was among neighbors who watched the early morning standoff with police.

"Something inside me just said 'Tape it,'" she said. "However, she added: 'If I had it to do over, I might not give the video to anybody.'" She said she would de-

cline an offer for the tape from "A Current Affair," the syndicated program that buys home videotapes to dramatize news events.

Kallio's tape includes her hushed commentary as police snipers prepared to act after negotiations failed to get Cloyd to surrender.

"They're going to shoot him. Ready, aim. They're going to fire. They're raising their guns ... oh my God! They just blew his head off ..."

KTUU-TV in Anchorage said Kallio offered the tape within an hour of the shooting and it paid \$50. The Anchorage Daily News said it bought the tape for \$100.

"She called us and asked to be paid," said KTUU reporter Julie Hlasquet. "There was no arm twist-

ing. She was actually quite excited about it."

But afterward, Kallio said, it was "tasteless" to broadcast sections of the tape showing "Cloyd being shot in the head."

"It was a tough call," said KTUU news director John Tracy. "Only by seeing the video can you understand why the police did what they did."

The Anchorage Daily News ran a photo made from Kallio's tape. It showed police hurrying the 10-year-old away after Cloyd was shot. A color photo shot by a staff photographer showed blood running from the gunman's body.

10 months later, after leaving cruise ship, retiree still missing

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — A retiree who was beginning to have memory problems told his wife he was going for a stroll and would meet her on the deck of the cruise ship that brought them to this scenic port.

That was the last Jean Shaw saw of her husband, Walter. Ten months later, police and private detectives are no closer to finding him.

"All the leads we have are like smoke: They're there and then they're not," said police Lt. Ron Forman.

"To not have an answer or know what happened, it's unbelievably difficult," Mrs. Shaw said. "It's a living nightmare, and it goes on every day."

Theories abound. Maybe he fell or was pushed overboard. Maybe he left the ship and wandered into the nearby forest, got lost or killed by a

bear. The 72-year-old retiree from Florida may even have forgotten who or where he was.

"Any scenario you want to build is possible," said Juneau police Capt. Mel Personett. "We don't have anything to eliminate any of those possibilities."

There is no evidence Shaw took a ferry or plane out of Juneau under his own name, Personett said. None of his credit cards or checks have been used since the day he disappeared. And police say there is nothing to indicate suicide or murder.

Shaw was chairman of one of the nation's largest construction companies, The Turner Corp., based in New York.

It was involved in construction of the John F. Kennedy Library in Boston, IBM headquarters in New

York, and the Mosconi Center in San Francisco.

He and his wife arrived at Alaska's capital on July 20, 1992, on a cruise aboard the 620-foot Safeguard.

Mrs. Shaw, in a recent telephone interview from her home in Indian River Shores, Fla., said that before her afternoon nap that day, her husband went to mail some post cards and returned to their cabin.

"He said, 'I'm going out on deck and I'll be wandering,' and, 'I'll see you later,'" she recalled.

Mrs. Shaw awoke shortly before the ship departed for Ketchikan at 4 p.m., and found no sign of her husband. The crew paged Shaw and searched the ship. Police searched downtown.

Later, two women told police they had talked with a man who matched his description.

Taunts lead to complaint of harassment

ST. CLOUD, Minn. (AP) — A 10-year-old boy claimed that a dozen classmates were taunting him daily, and had taken to calling him sexually explicit names.

His complaints went unanswered. So Jonathan Harms took a tape recorder to school. His recording of the jeers has become the basis for a sexual-harassment complaint.

The teasing by about 12 boys happened in the lunch line, the bathroom, the classroom, on the bus and the playground, according to the complaint filed with the state Department of Human Rights.

The central Minnesota school district of Sauk Rapids-Rice, which was notified of the complaint Tuesday, is accused of failing to protect the third-grader.

"He was never harmed," said the boy's father, Sam Harms. "He would report and tell and never be believed."

Jonathan either hid the recorder in the pocket of his baggy pants or taped it to his calf.

Five boys were suspended after transcripts of the recordings were given to school officials, Superintendent Jerry Hartley said. He said he believes the district responded appropriately.

Jonathan said his classmates had teased him since first grade, but beginning last fall, the taunts turned sexual. He said he thinks the taunts were intended "just to make me mad."

The boy said he would tell them to shut up or hit back. Sometimes, he was wrongly disciplined when he was acting in self-defense, his father said.

Harms says his son developed an eye tic and an involuntary grunt, his performance in school dropped considerably and he came home crying from school. Jonathan transferred to another school in March.

Financial straits leave School Board little choice

Twin Falls School Board members took a weighty step this week in asking voters for \$840,000 in additional property taxes.

In recent years, unlike many districts, Twin Falls has managed to get by on the regular revenue it receives from state and local sources. Board members have resisted becoming dependent on yearly infusions of supplemental cash.

That habit has had both good and bad points. The board's frugality is commendable. But an argument could be made that, if the board had given voters the chance to be generous, local kids might have gained some additional education opportunities.

This year, though, the board has little choice. Rising costs and declining revenue have left the board unable to fund the quality of education the community expects.

And so, on June 22, the board will ask voters to join it in crossing a momentous threshold.

The \$840,000 will let the district give its employees a decent raise and pay for a variety of items it otherwise could not afford. But it also will create an instant addition: Having

once depended on a voter-approved funding boost, the board will have to come back every year for another dose.

In the words of Superintendent Terrell Donich, this year's levy request is "the first of forever."

This is especially true because the board chose to designate the money for pay raises. Once granted, those raises can't be rescinded easily if voters say "no" to some future levy.

But addition is not necessarily a bad thing. Depending on annual voter approval for a significant chunk of its budget could make the district more accountable to taxpayers.

Tying the special levy to salaries also makes the voters indirect participants in union salary negotiations. In effect, the teachers union becomes accountable to taxpayers, too.

Philosophical issues aside, the inescapable fact is that the district needs a little extra money this year. Like it or not, the board had to ask.

We're confident that Twin Falls voters, who have supported their local schools ungrudgingly in the past, will respond the same way this time.



Political correctness squashes dissent

Anyone who doubts that radicals are conducting a politically correct witch hunt at our universities should ask Judith Kleinfield. She can tell you. Because even though they threw her in the fire, she refused to burn.

Kleinfield possesses a doctoral degree from Harvard and has been a professor at the University of Alaska at Fairbanks for more than 20 years. There she has specialized in the education of Alaska Native students. In the early 1970s, Kleinfield's research was instrumental in establishing high schools in native villages so students would not have to leave home to get a basic education.

Like many educators working with minority groups, Kleinfield knows that some well-intentioned efforts to help minority students have only hurt them. Despite expensive special programs in "multicultural" education, the proportion of native teachers in Alaska has not been increasing.

At the same time, students who don't belong to minority groups targeted for such "help" tend to grow resentful over what they perceive as a double standard. By refusing to re-examine such situations, educators have aggravated racial tensions without truly benefiting the minority group.

The urgent need at present is for courageous educators to speak truthfully about this situation. In September 1991, following a talk she gave on teacher education before a committee of the Fairbanks Chamber of Commerce, Kleinfield spoke up.

"Equity pressures," she stated, had induced certain professors to graduate some native students who had not yet mastered the required skills. The university's failure to give some students a quality education was in part responsible, she believed, for their later difficulties in securing teaching positions.

One would think Kleinfield's years of work on behalf of native students would have made it possible to express such an opinion without serious repercussions.

Imagine her astonishment when "news" of her remarks sparked widespread protests at the University of Alaska. At three separate rallies, she was publicly denounced as a racist. Posters distorting her position went

up all over campus and threats were made against her life.

The university launched a formal investigation of charges that Kleinfield had made discriminatory remarks against native students. The investigating committee compared the grades of native and non-native students and concluded that Kleinfield's "allegations" were false.

University officials denounced her on television and refused to allow her to teach classes in the education department. An attempt was even made to cancel publication of her most recent research, even though it was unrelated to the controversy.

Of course, since she had only expressed an opinion, the university was unable to find a basis for disciplining Kleinfield. The charges were dropped. But the story doesn't end there.

An anonymous complainant brought the

episode to the attention of the federal Office for Civil Rights. Even though the OCR has the prerogative to dismiss meritless cases, to its enduring shame it chose to conduct a four-month federal investigation of Kleinfield under Title VI of the 1964 civil rights law.

But what most merits attention is that, to the discomfort of her critics, Kleinfield refused to bend beneath this public assault. She secured affidavits showing certain faculty had indeed been pressured to pass native students and some had lost their positions when they resisted this unethical coercion. The Center for Individual Rights in Washington provided Kleinfield with legal defense, as it has for many other targets of the radical left.

In the end, the OCR found that Kleinfield had made no discriminatory remarks and closed the case.

The incident is unusual, not only for Kleinfield's courage but for the legal defense she was able to summon to her support. She is a tenured full professor well-known in her state for her education column in Alaskan newspapers. But most targets of leftist persecution are not so lucky. Their careers usually can be derailed by the bureaucratic warfare that is unleashed against them. They keep their opinions to themselves because they are afraid.

In recent years, many of our universities have become bastions of political bigotry disguised as "tolerance" and "diversity." As the record of persecution accumulates, Judith Kleinfield's case provides hope that such battles can be won.

Thai fire suspect in custody

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Police announced Thursday they have arrested a man suspected of accidentally starting a factory fire that killed at least 180 people last week.

Two executives of Kader Industrial (Thailand) Co. Ltd., the company that owns the doll factory, also turned themselves in for arrest on negligence charges. Police had issued warrants Wednesday for them and two other company executives.

Witroj Yoosak, 33, who worked in the warehouse section of the factory in a Bangkok suburb, was accused of discarding a surreptitiously smoked cigarette among flammable fabric in a storeroom.

Police said more than a dozen witnesses reported Witroj had been smoking in the no-smoking area shortly before the fire May 10.

Witroj, who was arrested Wednesday night at his home in the central Thai province of Angthong, denied the charge.

The blaze was the worst factory fire on record, with the death toll exceeding the 146 killed in a blaze at the Triangle Shirtwaist Co. factory in New York City in 1911.

Hundreds of workers were injured in the Kader factory fire. Most of the victims were women, who make up the majority of Thailand's low-wage factory work force.

The two company executives who turned themselves in today were Chulin Unhaphoom, a Chinese-American, and Pichet Laokasem, a Thai national.

The executives are charged with negligence and making illegal modifications to the factory's buildings. Negligence charges carry a penalty of up to 10 years in prison.

Retired CBS newsmen dies

ROME (AP) — Winston Burdett, whose career as a journalist for CBS spanned four decades, has died at his home. He was 79.

Burdett died Wednesday in Rome, where he lived for many years, said his son, Richard.

Burdett, who retired from CBS in 1978, had suffered from a long illness, but the cause of death was not immediately known.

Born in Buffalo, N.Y., Burdett began his career in the 1930s as a film and theater critic for the Brooklyn Eagle. During World War II, he was a stringer for CBS radio and made his first broadcast from Stockholm in 1939.

While in Europe, Burdett was chosen by Edward R. Murrow to help cover the war for CBS. He broadcast from the Balkans, North Africa and Italy.

He returned to Italy in 1948 to cover the country's first postwar elections. In 1956, he took up residence in Rome as the chief European correspondent for CBS. During the next 22 years, he reported on four papal elections, dozens of governments and Red Brigade terrorist attacks.

Burdett is survived by his wife Georgina and two children, Richard and Christina. Funeral services are to be in Rome Saturday.

Big champagne maker cuts staff

REIMS, France (AP) — Groupe Moët et Chandon, the largest maker of champagne, said Thursday it will lay off nearly 15 percent of its workers due to falling sales.

President Yves Bernard said the company's first layoffs in 50 years were forced by a 20 percent drop in sales from 1989 to 1992, from 32 million bottles to 26 million.

He said 230 employees, from cellar workers to headquarters staff, would lose their jobs during the next 18 months to reduce the company's work force to about 1,400.

The fall in sales also has sent prices plummeting. Champagne that sold for \$28 a bottle two years ago can now often be picked up for under \$18.

Bernard blamed the slump on "the morose international economy, anti-alcohol campaigns and the cost of the product."

Dead fish cover river

VIENNE, France (AP) — Nearly 10 tons of fish went belly up in the Loire River, apparently victims of pollution.

Crews finished removing the fish Thursday along a 12-mile stretch of the river south of Vienne in central France.

Authorities opened an investigation to determine the source of the pollution, which mostly affected fish living along the river bottom.

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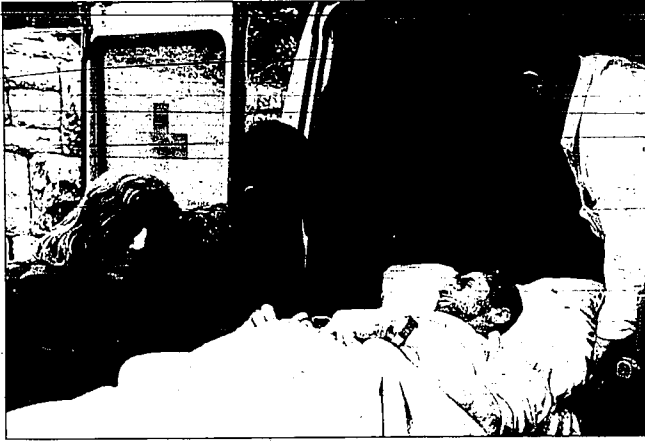

With or without recognition, Serb state functions

PALE, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Despite a total lack of international acceptance, a Serb mini-state with its own government structures, money and border procedures has taken hold in much of Bosnia.

Bosnian Serb leaders firmly declare their right to decide their fate for themselves, but are vague about the future status of that self-proclaimed republic.

Formation of a Greater Serbia, encompassing all Serb territories in the former Yugoslav federation, has been one of the driving forces of almost two years of warfare in Croatia and Bosnia-Herzegovina. But the Bosnian Serbs say they also want to retain some separate identity.

They already have established many of the trappings of a separate state — officially the "Republika Srpska," or Serb Republic. This mountain town is the capital of the republic. Senior officials maintain offices in the Pandrama Hotel, the town's biggest.

The trappings include an army built from the Yugoslav People's Army, a separate currency, a national assembly, government departments, state-run radio, a television network — even its own postal service.

Bosnian Serbs control 70 percent of Bosnia-Herzegovina's territory. At a Serb checkpoint about 10 miles northwest of Sarajevo, customs guards wearing blue uniforms and red-velvet-and-blue shoulder patches with the words Serb Republic demand that travelers show passports and ask "Do you have anything to declare?" — at any international frontier.

Travelers report similar checks along the border with Yugoslavia to the east.

Bosnian Serb leader Radovan Karadzic and others say they are entitled to their own state, even if they are holding off on declaring outright independence.

"Serbs have the same right of self-determination as other peoples," Slavisa Raskovic, a Karadzic aide, said in an interview. "We have the right to establish our own state just like anyone else."

Karadzic said Bosnian Serbs have everything they need for an independent state.

"We have our own republic," he said. "It functions. We have territory, we have boundaries, we have authorities, we have people. These criteria are a fair measure to recognize any state."

More than a million Bosnian Serbs voted overwhelmingly for an independent Serb state in a referendum last weekend. It was criticized not only by the world community but also by Serbia, the larger of the two remaining Yugoslav republics and the Bosnian Serbs' chief supporter.

Yugoslavia has been hit hard by economic sanctions, forcing its most powerful leader, Serbian president Slobodan Milosevic, to pressure Bosnian Serbs into accepting an international peace plan that denies them their own borders.

The wars in Bosnia and Croatia broke out after the two republics seceded from Yugoslavia. Ethnic Serbs in both states opposed secession.

Bosnia-Herzegovina has a seat in the United Nations occupied by an envoy from the Muslim-led government, the Bosnian Serbs' foe. That government is broadly recognized in the international community. No one recognizes the state the Bosnian Serbs have carved out of Bosnia-Herzegovina.

But that hasn't stopped them. Although the Bosnian Serb parliament decided Wednesday to withhold a formal declaration of independence, delegates discussed implementing draft laws dealing with health care, education and other issues.

Croats release 1,000 Muslims; central Bosnia remains quiet

MOSTAR, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Tensions in this battle-ravaged town eased Thursday with the release of 1,000 Muslims by Bosnian Croats and a lull in hostilities between the one-time allies.

Despite the calm, Croat and Muslim fighters did not give up their battle positions around central Bosnia.

But Bosnian Croat troops abided by one provision of a cease-fire pact signed Tuesday with the release of

1,000 of the 1,800 Muslims rounded up last week in Mostar.

Gen. Sefer Halilovic, the commander of Bosnia's Muslim-led government troops, toured the region with Gen. Milevoj Petkovic, his Bosnian Croat counterpart, in a U.N. convoy.

The two sought compliance with the agreement, which calls for a cease-fire and gradual implementation of an international peace plan agreed to by Muslims and Croats but rejected by Bosnia's Serbs.

Halilovic also tried to get his troops to pull back from the village of Vite and allow 300 trapped Croat civilians and soldiers to leave. But snipers continued to target civilians in Mostar, and smoke from sporadic mortar explosions rose from Muslim quarters in the southern city.

A Muslim woman was killed by Croatian snipers. Mostar Muslims

said they were not responding in hopes a cease-fire could be established.

Muslims and Croats formerly fought together against Bosnian Serbs, who now control 70 percent of the republic's territory after 13 months of war has left 138,000 people dead or missing.

But frequent and growing Muslim-Croat battles have increasingly made the war a three-way conflict.

U.N. officials have accused Croats of repeated incidents of "ethnic cleansing" over the last few weeks as they try to push Muslims out of

territories they would control under the peace plan.

Bosnia's Serbs have consistently rejected the plan because it doesn't meet their territorial ambitions.

An overwhelming majority of Bosnian Serb voters voted against it in a referendum last weekend, preferring to keep territory acquired in the war and keep from their own state within the republic.

The Bosnian Serb assembly declared an end to Serb military operations on Wednesday. But U.N. officials reported continued fighting in eastern Bosnia, with Serbs and Mus-

lim-led government forces exchanging artillery fire in the region between Breko and Tuzla.

In Rome, Western countries made progress Thursday toward tightening the sanctions against Yugoslavia, gaining the commitment of Hungary, Bulgaria and Romania to choke off the Danube River route to Serbia. The pact came at a meeting of the Western European Union.

The U.N. sanctions have been the West's major diplomatic weapon in pressuring Serbia into stopping its support for Bosnian Serbs fighting Muslims in Bosnia-Herzegovina.

How will China slow runaway inflation?

BEIJING (AP) — At the Four Star Gold Store on trendy Xidan Avenue, shoppers crowd around the counters to inspect glittering 24-karat chains, rings and pendants. They're not just oohing and aahing. They're buying.

"The price of gold will go up," explained Wang Hong, 20, as she helps a friend adjust a newly bought \$150 necklace with a heart-shaped charm.

Chinese these days can't get enough gold, the international hedge against inflation. A recent industry survey reported that China surpassed the United States last year to become the world's largest buyer of gold.

The gold rush is a sign of the economic times in China. An avalanche of statistics indicates inflation is getting out of hand, triggered by an investment binge after senior leader Deng Xiaoping called last year for bolder moves to create free markets. In April, the cost of living registered the sharpest increase in five years, up 17 percent from a year earlier in 35 major cities. Prices for fuel, construction materials and industrial raw materials rose more, signaling that Chinese consumers will face even higher inflation later this year.

"I think it's getting extremely se-

rious," said Ian Perkin, chief economist for the Hong Kong General Chamber of Commerce.

Inflation has bedeviled modern China's history. It helped topple the Nationalist government and bring the Communists to power in the 1940s, and it fueled the public dissatisfaction that fostered the 1989 pro-democracy movement.

Sustained high inflation could derail Deng's plans to make state enterprises economically self-sufficient and do away with the last remaining state price subsidies. It also could hurt exports, discourage foreign investment and stir public discontent — the worst fear of China's authoritarian leaders.

"I think the whole message of Deng Xiaoping's speech of growing faster at almost any cost is a very misguided one," said Diane Yowell, director of research for HongKong and Shanghai Bank's China Services.

While acknowledging positive economic achievements in the past year, she believes "it's time for some caution to be taken."

So far, there have been no reports of bank runs or panic buying, largely because higher household incomes and better supplies of consumer goods have been part of China's phenomenal economic growth.

Sick woman seeks OK for suicide

TORONTO (AP) — A woman suffering from Lou Gehrig's disease made a final plea for the right to die with dignity, asking the Supreme Court on Thursday to allow her a doctor-assisted suicide.

"This case is not about euthanasia, which is illegal," attorney Christopher Cosindine told the nine justices of Canada's highest court. "It is about a terminally ill patient who is physically incapable of committing suicide without the aid of a physician."

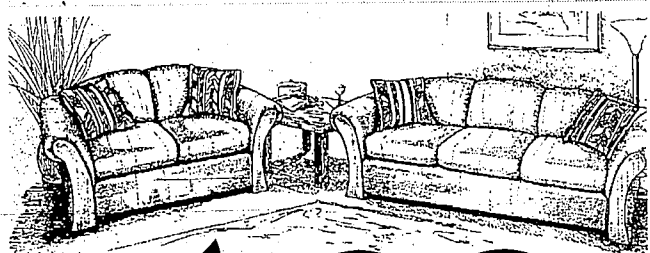
Cosindine argued the case of Sue Rodriguez before a national television audience as part of an experiment to allow cameras in the Supreme Court's Ottawa courtroom.

Mrs. Rodriguez, 42, is a married woman from Victoria, British Columbia, who has an 8-year-old son. The former administrative assistant was diagnosed in August 1991 with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, also known as Lou Gehrig's disease.

The malady leads to degeneration and eventual death of the cells of the spinal cord and brain stem that control the muscles. It eventually shuts down body functions, usually causing death from suffocation or choking.

Mrs. Rodriguez, who lost her British Columbia, wants to be able to end her own life when suffering becomes too great.

Prime minister of Ukraine steps down

KIEV, Ukraine (AP) — Prime Minister Leonid Kuchma resigned Thursday after Ukraine's president asked lawmakers for near complete control of the government.

Parliament members were expected to vote later on President Leonid Kravchuk's request to be "sole head of government and have powers to reform the economy by executive fiat."

Kuchma told a session of parliament that only one person can run the country at a time.

"All executive power should be concentrated in the hands of one person," he said, according to the Interfax news agency.

In an address to lawmakers, Kravchuk said the president should have "direct leadership of the Cabinet."

Like other former Soviet republics, Ukraine has been struggling to create a free market economy.

Kravchuk said he wanted the authority to issue decrees on economic issues. As prime minister, Kuchma has had the decree-making powers that Kravchuk now wants. With those powers due to expire today, Kuchma asked parliament for an extension, saying he would resign if they refused.

Mayor, council members, clerk blast other council members in resignation letter

HOLLISTER — A raucous town meeting Wednesday night resulted in the resignations of the mayor, the city clerk and two City Council members Thursday afternoon.

"We feel we can no longer be part of and will not be part of a city council that pits neighbor against neighbor and breeds hate and discontent," said a joint resignation letter signed by Mayor Steve Taylor, Councilman Jim Fleenor, Councilwoman June Dobbs, and City Clerk Holly Van Blaricom.

Residents of Hollister had collected 20

signatures on a petition to recall Mayor Steve Taylor. But all four office-holders said in interviews Thursday they had decided to resign three weeks ago.

The resignations came four months after a recall petition against Councilman Edwin Padgett was filed with the city.

Padgett remains on the council, a position he won in a tie-breaking coin toss in November 1991.

"Ed Padgett and (Councilman) Larry Bingham, you may have won the battle for now, but you cannot stop progress. Truth and honesty shall win out," the letter said.

Padgett did not return a telephone call from *The Times-News* by early Thursday evening.

City Clerk Van Blaricom said she began receiving verbal insults from telephone callers after she processed the recall petition against Padgett.

"I resigned because of the intimidation from the harassing phone calls," said Van Blaricom.

At Wednesday night's meeting, residents voiced several complaints against the mayor.

They said the mayor had inconsistently enforced an ordinance mandating the minimum amount of property on which a septic system could be installed.

Residents Debra Taylor said Mayor Taylor told her that her trailer had to sit on at least one acre to receive a required septic tank permit.

A letter from the South Central Health District Department to City Council says the one-acre minimum is a health department rule for land platted since

State backs Little Wood River watermaster in dispute

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Department of Water Resources this week "set aside" a petition for Watermaster Lee Peterson's removal.

A small group of water users in two Little Wood River districts had submitted a petition to remove Peterson as watermaster.

A watermaster is selected and paid by water users but functions as agent of the state and must be appointed by Water Resources. The watermaster distributes water in order of legal priority to water users.

"There appears to be a small group of water users who seek removal of the watermaster. Their concerns appear to be related to matters other than the ability of their watermaster to fairly and properly distribute water," department Director Keith Higginson said in his May 18 order clearing Peterson.

Elderly woman recovers from broken neck in Boise hospital

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CSI study debunks Mayan theory

Herrett researchers find tools could have cut ancient construction times significantly

TWIN FALLS — Stone axes, flint-knapped by Herrett Museum workers, are chipping away at a long-held belief that some Mayan temples took several lifetimes to build.

"We were amazed how efficient the tools are," said Jim Woods, director of the College of Southern Idaho's Herrett Museum.

It actually took them less than one lifetime, or about 30 years, to build many of the enormous limestone structures, Woods said.

Woods, his wife Cyndie Woods, and Research Associate Eugene Titmus spent most of March at the ancient Mayan city of Nakbe in northern Guatemala doing research with replicas of Mayan stone tools.

CSI is charged with overseeing the analysis of some 60,000 stone tools discovered at the site.

But the best way to understand the purpose of the tools they find is to make replicas of them and test theories about their use, Woods said.

The work by Titmus and the Woodses led to the discovery about temple construction time lines, Woods said. It supports the long-disputed construction dates that epigraphers, who decipher Mayan glyphs, have been finding at ruins, he said.

Before their trip, Woods and Titmus — recognized as one of the world's experts in flint-knapping, the art of making stone tools — made dozens of stone tools that were the same size and weight as those found at Nakbe.

In Guatemala, they fashioned handles out of Sapodilla wood, an extremely hard tropical wood, that were almost identical replicas of a rare wood axe handle discovered in a Belize swamp, Titmus said.

The trio watched stone workers at the Mayan ruins of Tikal using metal pick axes to carve limestone blocks to replace those fallen from Tikal temples. They asked a forman to use one of their stone axes.

When the forman finished chopping large chips from a limestone block, he told Woods that the stone axe was equal to his metal pick axes.

The CSI researchers then used their tools to carve a 500-pound block from an ancient quarry near Nakbe. Many gouge marks in the limestone were straight, unlike the curved marks their axes made.

But Woods and Titmus took thinner flint blades, which were identical to some spear-like blades found at Nakbe, and attached them to six-foot-long poles.

Their new tools made similar marks to those found in the ancient quarry.

At first, the CSI researchers swung the flint axes delicately — afraid that they would crack or chip apart. But the axes held up well — even after hundreds of blows — and before long they swung with all their might, Woods said. "The work went remarkably fast," he said.

Woods calculated that eight people

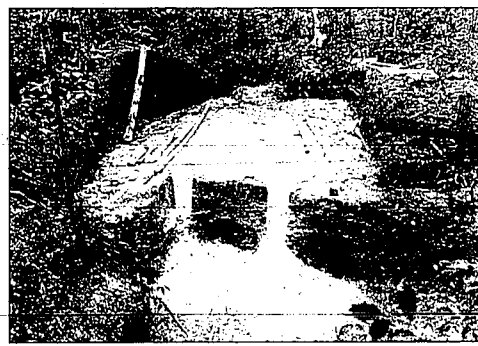

working six hours a day could carve out 50 quarter-ton blocks in a month. A large Mayan temple could therefore be built within 30 years.

"In all the decades of research no one has ever tried to make a replica of Mayan tools," Woods said.

His findings make it more understandable how the Mayans were able to level tops of mountains and fill in swamps to build large cities and extensive highways without steel tools.

Bonds will refinance hospital debt

TWIN FALLS — County commissioners have approved the sale of \$33.4 million in bonds to refinance old debt at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

Commissioners Jim Fraley and Marvin Hempleman passed a resolution Thursday afternoon authorizing the sale of bonds. Commissioner Norma Bliss was absent.

Because of lower interest rates, the refinancing will save the hospital \$265,000 a year and permit the hospital to build a \$1.5 million transitional nursing unit, hospital attorney Keith Taylor said.

The county-owned hospital was remodelled extensively in 1981. The money was raised through sale of county bonds, which the hospital was to repay at 13.5 percent interest. They were refinanced in 1985 at 9.5 percent.

The bonds for the latest refinancing were sold at 8.85 percent on Tuesday, pending the commissioners' action Thursday.

The highly rated Idaho bonds will be paid off over a 20-year period, Taylor said.

The nursing unit will include 17 semi-private and three private rooms. It will also have a living room, a dining room, an activities room and a foyer.

The rooms will be mostly for elderly hospital patients who have partially recovered but aren't ready to go home or to a nursing home, Administrator John Bingham said.

Once such a patient no longer needs hospital care, and his Medicare payments for a given illness are exhausted, the hospital will be able to move the patient into the "transitional" beds and collect Medicare there.

GOP freshmen solicit Perot's help

WASHINGTON - Feeling pushed to the margins by a Democratic majority, GOP freshman reformers are turning to America's most successful political outsider.

Idaho Republican Rep. Michael Crapo and his Republican freshman colleagues Wednesday recruited Texas billionaire H. Ross Perot in their crusade to loosen the Democrats' clench on Congress.

As Crapo and 47 other House Republican freshmen bent Perot's ear about their fledgling reform proposals, President Clinton corralled House Democrats in a closed-door session on the chamber's House floor.

In Capitol hallway, Perot used the spotlight to chastise Clinton for understating tax increases in his economic plan.

"Don't they understand we can see through all this?" Perot said.

convoluted language.

The Republicans' enlistment of Perot comes as many GOP freshmen have grumbled that Democratic newcomers have largely rebuffed the more radical proposals.

"It's been our feeling that the effort to keep the reform agenda alive has been lagging a little bit," Crapo noted. But at the same time, Crapo must use his exclusive access to the Republican leadership to make sure the 19-point freshman agenda won't undermine their own party's strength.

"The message to GOP leaders is we're not trying to do anything that detracts from the Republican party by meeting with Mr. Perot," said Crapo.

And the Texas billionaire's trading of President Clinton's fiscal policy had clear benefits for the GOP.

Perot said he came away from the 90-minute meeting with a new sense of that frustration. "I didn't

understand that freshmen have no voice," he said, adding that most have to wait two or three terms before they can safely take glibly.

"They're basically told to go stand in a corner."

In dishing out unsolicited advice to Clinton, Perot implored the president to "get organized."

He criticized Clinton for floating "trial balloons" that allegedly test public reaction to various tax proposals.

"Just give it to us straight," Perot said. "That's the way you keep the credibility with the American people."

In his travels for a vaguely defined grassroots campaign, Perot said many citizens have expressed misgivings about mixed signals they interpret from the White House, Perot said.

"The American people are holding their nose and walking away," he said.

Blaine alternative school walk-a-thon set Saturday

The Blaine County Alternative School Coordinating Committee is organizing a walk-a-thon Saturday afternoon through the "Alternative Oregon Trail" to help raise the remaining \$40,000 needed to open the school's doors to as many as 20 students this fall.

With an \$80,000 commitment from the Blaine County School Board under its belt, the committee is turning to the community, asking them to participate in a walk-a-thon by soliciting donations and pledges for miles walked. The funds raised will be needed to help meet the anticipated \$79,000 annual budget.

At 9:30 a.m. Saturday, walkers will start at the Hailey City Park to a starting point in Oakley Canyon.

The five-mile walk will end in Hailey City Park with a celebration of food and music, sponsored by KECH Radio and Atkinson's Markets.

The projected annual costs break down in this way: \$66,000 (including benefits) for school staff, \$10,000 for utilities and lease, and \$3,000 for start-up materials.

The committee is also contacting local civic and business groups, private donors, and

foundations, education-related grant foundations and concerned citizens.

The Alternative School has been in the works for months, since a diverse group of concerned teachers and professionals began researching a way to help "at-risk" students and drop-outs achieve academic success and personal well-being, according to their brochure.

"The committee is made up of representatives from parent groups, Job Service, the local CSI branch, law enforcement, Health and Welfare, Juvenile Services, high school staff and administration, the school district office and local philanthropists."

The scheduled pilot program would include three daily classes, as well as sessions in self-esteem building, career exploration and job placement, and substance abuse awareness and intervention.

A counselor would be available to help these students through the problems that left them unable to succeed in the public school system.

The committee recommends that tax deductible contributions be made to the Blaine County Education Foundation, specifying that the money be earmarked for the Alternative School.

Contractors question new Jerome codes

JEROME - City Council adopted energy-saving building regulations Wednesday night that contractors said could make home improvements too expensive for low-income families.

The put the Northwest Energy Code into force on a 3-1 vote. Voting in favor were Janet Burdick, Eric Bross and Rocky Jackson. Elza Hall voted "no."

Increased costs to comply with the ordinance would make it impossible for the elderly on fixed incomes or low income families to make home improvements, several contractors attending the council meeting said.

"Are we going to price lower-income people clear out of improvements?" Weldon Weigle, Jerome businessman, asked.

Jerome contractors "will be priced out of town if we don't adopt the same ordinance," Jim Benson, contractor, said.

The Northwest Energy Code will

hold down the cost of electricity and will be good for the economy and environment, the council noted.

The building code prescribes energy-efficient building standards for new single and multifamily buildings that use electricity for heating.

Each violation of the ordinance is a misdemeanor and may be punished by a fine of not more than \$300 or imprisonment of not more than six months or both.

The council also decided to raise fees charged Jerome residents who allow their dogs to run at large.

For the first violation of letting a dog run loose, a penalty of \$25 will

be charged. The second violation occurring within 12 months will cost the dog owner \$50 and the third violation is \$100.

A complaint or notice of violation can be signed by an animal control officer, police officer or citizen who has witnessed the violation.

Impound fees will be raised from \$5 to \$25, plus \$3 per day for confinement of a dog.

Proof of rabies vaccination must be provided when applying for a dog license. Dog licenses will be valid for two years.

The council heard the first of three readings of the new ordinance and will vote on it after the third reading.

In other business, the council:

- Took under advisement a request from Lon McDonald and Bob Richards for financial assistance in hiring a facilitator to handle economic development.
- Approved \$100 per year would be required for the next three years. McDonald said they were asking the City and county to each pay 25 percent of the cost. Jerome businesses would pay the other 50 percent, or there could be some funds from state and federal taxes, he said. Mayor Gerald Oster said the request would be taken up at the June 7 budget work session.
- Hired Susan Weinmeister as a Trans IV bus driver at \$5 per hour.
- Hired Dayle Dawson and Joe Martinez to water trees at \$5 per hour.
- Hired contractors and letters commending employees from the city street department for special services given.
- Took no action on a request from Dale Wheeler who asked for a variance in putting in curbs and gutters on his property at Cleveland and East O Streets.

"There are no other curbs and gutters on those streets and my neighbors will be mad if I put some in," he said.

- Appointed Larry Paine, city administrator, as the city representative for compliance with the Rehabilitation Act.

Such evidence could discount previously held theories that the Mayans had huge stone-cutters or artists' guilds in which people spent lifetimes working on temples, Woods said. Instead, the stone cutters could have been farmers called to work on temples when needed.

The CSI researchers have been invited to present their findings in Guatemala this summer at the Palenque Round Table, an annual conference of Mayanists, he said.

The National Geographic Society has helped fund the archeological

dig and may feature findings from the dig in a magazine article or a television program, Woods said.

Woods said the college is working on an agreement with the Guatemalan government to build traveling exhibits with replicas of artifacts uncovered at Nakbe. The exhibits would be in English and Spanish so they could be used in Guatemala as well as the United States.

The CSI workers have only begun their study of the Mayan culture. One mystery is why the Mayans built Nakbe, located in an area without valuable natural resources, Woods said.

Lawmakers, Andrus, state officials agree to set up working group

BOISE (AP) — In hopes of heading off a courtroom confrontation, Gov. Cecil Andrus, legislative leaders and other state officials have generally agreed to set up a working group to assess Idaho's overall education system.

Andrus House Speaker Michael Simpson and state Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans all emerged from Thursday's hour-long closed-door session feeling that the working group — if made a top priority — could help avert a judicial settlement in the school districts' lawsuit challenging the adequacy of Idaho's financial commitment to education.

Andrus acknowledged that the state Attorney General Larry Echols will continue preparing to defend the state in court.

"We want to solve it another way," Evans said, describing the chance of an out-of-court resolution as "reasonably good."

But Republican legislative leaders disagreed with Andrus and others that some action must be taken in the next year. And the governor acknowledged that the state Attorney General Larry Echols will continue preparing to defend the state in court.

The meeting came as 4th District Judge Gerald Schroeder was taking the case back after the state Supreme Court in March directed him to determine whether the more than \$800 million the state is currently spending on public schools is enough to assure the thorough education guaranteed by the state constitution.

The Democratic governor and the Republican House speaker who wants to run for governor next year agreed that the working group should look beyond the question of money to all the facets of the educational system and whether it is doing the job people want.

But they parted company over whether some concrete proposal can be put before the full Legislature next winter.

Andrus and Evans said holding off court intervention depends on quick action.

"There's an expectation that we try to get it done for the court to see what we're doing and the Legislature consider it next session," Evans said. "That may be too ambitious. But to say it's going to take two or three years is not going to be satisfactory."

Simpson, however, said issues like delivery of education in general, competition for schools, the number of school districts and how each spends its money are too complex

to be dealt with by the next legislative session.

"I don't think we can allow the lawsuit to drive us and rush us into something that's a mistake," Simpson said. "But I don't think any district judge in this state wants to take on the issue of funding public schools, and if we demonstrate that we're looking at that entire issue, the judge will probably allow us the opportunity to develop the educational future of Idaho as the Legislature should."

House Democratic Leader Jim Stoichoff of Sandpoint was the lone objector in the meeting, holding out for the state to defend itself as vigorously as possible.

Bob Nierenhausen, director of professional services at the Silver Valley hospital, has pulled laboratory equipment out of storage.

"We had to start from scratch, but we're open for business now," Nierenhausen said. "Anything I can't do, I put on a courier service to Spokane."

Reopening the laboratory is the first in a series of changes scheduled at the small facility this summer. Nierenhausen was opening the X-ray department Thursday and hoped to have outpatient services ready in about three months.

Youth may have stolen in order to sell

POST FALLS — A 15-year-old boy has been accused of stealing several pairs of expensive athletic shoes from a Post Falls shop, allegedly to sell to other youths.

"The suspect was basically filling orders," Police Sgt. Pete Marion said Wednesday.

The teen-ager, whose name was not disclosed, and a 16-year-old boy were arrested last Saturday after a resident told police he saw them carrying shoe boxes down an alley, Marion said.

The boy allegedly threw a rock through the store's front window and took several pairs of shoes from the Nike Air series, including a box or two of Air Jordans that sell for about \$140 a pair. Some Nike socks were also taken.

Woman killed after holding mom at bay

HAUSER — A Hauser woman who held taken her mother hostage was fatally shot by deputies after pointing a handgun at them, the Kootenai County sheriff's office said Thursday.

The 51-year-old woman and her mother were not identified pending notification of relatives.

Deputies answered a domestic dispute call involving the mother and daughter late Wednesday on Hauser Lake Road, Lt. Ben Wolfinger said in a news release.

The woman, who was armed, apparently was refusing to let her mother leave the house. After a period of time, the mother did get out and was escorted to safety. The news release said, it was not immediately known how long the mother was kept in the house.

Simpson tabs CPA as treasurer for race

BOISE — House Speaker Michael Simpson announced Thursday that he has designated a treasurer for a possible 1994 governor's campaign.

The Blackfoot Republican, in Boise for a meeting with legislative leaders, Gov. Cecil Andrus and other state officials on the legal challenge to state aid for public schools, said he would probably make an official announcement of his candidacy this summer.

In a certificate filed with the Secretary of State late Wednesday, Simpson designated Blackfoot certified public accountant T. Layne Vanorden as his campaign treasurer. It clears the way for Simpson to begin the key campaign activity of raising money.

Simpson is the fourth Republican to set up a campaign financing structure for the office that Andrus is retiring from at the end of an unprecedented fourth term.

UI nude dance remains controversial

MOSCOW — It's been four months since Nick Cave danced nude at a University of Idaho student workshop, but the performance remains an issue on the Moscow campus.

State Board of Education member Roy Mosman, a Moscow attorney, chastised university administrators in a letter earlier this month for allowing the performance and defending it on the basis of freedom of expression.

Cave performed at the University of Idaho on Jan. 19 in conjunction with several days of workshops for fashion-merchandising students. His performance included a dance — during part of which he was nude — as well as a slide show with pictures of people having sexual intercourse and oral sex.

Weaver turns away from surveillance clip

BOISE (AP) — A federal marshal testified Thursday that while separatist Randy Weaver, his friend Kevin Harris and even Weaver's teen-age son were carrying guns the vast majority of the time they appeared on three weeks of surveillance video at Weaver's mountain-top Panhandle cabin.

Inspector Arthur Roderick of the U.S. Marshals Service said the information was used in planning reconnaissance that led to an Aug. 21 shootout that left 14-year-old Samuel Weaver and Deputy U.S. Marshal William Degan dead.

Weaver, 45, and Harris, 25, are charged with murdering Degan.

The shootings triggered an 11-day siege and ended 18 months of federal surveillance at the cabin where Weaver holed up after failing to appear for a February 1991 trial on a weapons charge.

"Marshals had been trying to find a way to restrict him, convinced a direct approach would be met with gunfire."

"From our observations they were armed most of the time, so we had to take that into consideration when making our plan," Roderick testified during the 23rd day of the murder-conspiracy trial.

He said Weaver was armed 72 percent of the time he appeared on

the surveillance video, which recorded 160 hours of the comings and goings outside Weaver's cabin during three weeks in late April and early May last year.

Harris was armed 66 percent of the time and Samuel 84 percent, Roderick said.

Even Vicki Weaver, 42, who was killed by a federal sniper the day after the initial firefight, was carrying a gun 52 percent of the time she appeared on the tapes, he said.

But Harris' attorney, David Nevin, discounted those percentages, arguing that they may have been based on a small total number of appearances. Prosecutors acknowledged that only 20 hours of video included activity.

"Those numbers don't really tell us much about what percentage of time those people were really armed, do they?" Nevin asked Roderick during cross-examination.

But Roderick said the percentages were meaningful because the Weavers and Harris each appeared scores of times.

Earlier Thursday, Weaver refused to watch much of the three hours of edited surveillance video jurors were shown. Only toward the end did he begin watching at all, and even then he turned away each time his son or wife appeared on the

screen.

But the video, admitted into evidence after almost two weeks of arguing among the attorneys, had no visible effect on the jury.

The tapes were intended to show jurors the Weavers' daily routine at the Ruby Ridge cabin and how they reacted to outsiders.

Prosecutors originally wanted to show two hours of video the government edited down from the entire three-week period taped. But defense attorney Gerry Spence claimed compacting all the provocative action of a three-week period into two hours was not representative of the period marshals observed.

A compromise was finally struck late Wednesday under which jurors

where to see all the activity of six days — three selected by prosecutors and three by the defense. Since one of the days picked by both was the same, only five days of action was shown Thursday.

Instead of just showing all the times members of the Weaver family were handling guns as Spence claimed the government original wanted, jurors saw the Weavers not only running across their property with guns and wearing sidearms but also playing with their dogs and riding bikes.

Twice, the Weavers were shown running out of the Ruby Ridge cabin with guns at the approach of visitors, but each time they disarmed after apparently determining the visitors posed no threat.

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District mulls legal action

NAMPA (AP) — The Nampa School District may ask a Canyon County judge to declare an emergency that would force taxpayers to finance repairs at three elementary schools that administrators say could be condemned.

"We very well may try that," Superintendent Steve Schmitz said at a news conference on the district's options following Tuesday's failure of a \$30.7 million bond issue.

But as about 50 West Junior High School students walked out of class Thursday morning to protest the financing plan's defeat, Schmitz said discussions on alternatives were only preliminary.

Nampa School Board Chairman Mike Rasmussen said trustees had not discussed legal action to pay for repairs at Lakeview, Roosevelt and Eastside elementary schools.

"We would hate to hear Dr. Schmitz's rationale and what he thinks we would gain from that," Rasmussen said.

City building and fire officials identified "disturbing" problems at the three elementary schools and Nampa's Central School during a January inspection. The violations included unsafe exits, fire hazards and settling walls.

"There are concerns that would lead us to condemnation," city building inspector Dennis Davis said.

TRINIDAD, Colo. — Worries for Trinidad State College coming into a three-game district playoff with College of Southern Idaho are fading a long layoff and a lack of information about Golden Eagle hitters.

"Hitting is probably our best attribute," Giarratano said. "If we're going to be able to hit a little bit."

On the mound, Trinidad will match Ryan Mueller, 11-2, 3.17 ERA, against CSF's 10-1 Cody Winget in Monday's 1 p.m. seven-inning opener. The second game Monday and if necessary Tuesday cannot will be nine innings each.

"One pitching and defense are going to have to be exceptional if we're going to win," Giarratano said. "It's

difficult not knowing how to pitch the hitters. It's hard for both teams. Hopefully, we'll be able to throw strikes and get ahead of the hitters."

The Trojans won their regional tournament (the region has only three baseball teams) May 10 and haven't played since.

"Just practicing and scrimmaging, that's a big concern," Giarratano said. "Especially after playing a 60-game season, you lay off two weeks, you never know how you'll come back."

Trinidad has won its last four regional tournaments, advancing to the national finals the last two times and going 1-4 in those two visits to Grand Junction, Colo.

Suns set on San Antonio

Barkley's last-second shot sinks 'the Admiral,' Spurs

SAN ANTONIO — Charles Barkley needs no one to interpret the laws of basketball stardom.

"If you want to be great, you have to be willing to take the big shot — anywhere and anytime," he said. "I always expect to hit the big shot."

Barkley was willing, all right, and he hit the winning shot — a top-of-the-key jumper over the outstretched arm of David Robinson with 1.8 seconds left.

The result was a 102-100 victory for Phoenix on Thursday night that eliminated the San Antonio Spurs in six games and sent the Suns into the Western Conference finals.

"I got the shot I wanted," said Barkley, who finished with 28 points and 21 rebounds. "Basically, it was a free throw."

Barkley, who dominated Game 5 Tuesday night with 36 points, said he learned all about taking clutch shots from Andrew Toney when he played for the Philadelphia 76ers.

"It felt good the second it left my hand," he said. "I knew it was in."

Phoenix, having survived another hard series, now faces the winner of the Seattle-Houston semifinal.

The Spurs tied the score 100-100 with 11 seconds to play on two free throws by Robinson, who had been 4 of 5 at the line until then in the fourth quarter. But Barkley, isolated in a 1-on-1 confrontation between two of basketball's best players, clearly hit the winner.

"I thought he was going to drive by me, and then he just took the shot," said Robinson, replaying the moment over and over again after the game. "I just wanted to make him take a tough shot. And he hit it."

Phoenix was not home free, yet. With 1.8 seconds left, the Spurs rebounded and got the ball to Robinson on the right side, but Oliver Miller blocked his shot and time ran out.

"We wanted this victory," Miller said. "We kept our heads up, stayed aggressive on defense and we finished them off at the end."

For the Spurs, it's the end of a roller-coaster season that saw the firing of coach Jerry Tarkanian, the hiring of John Lucas and San Antonio reaching the semifinals for the first time since Robinson's rookie season.

"It was a tough way to lose, especially at home," said Robinson, who had 22 points and 14 rebounds. "I feel like I hit a real right now because I want to keep playing. But physically my body needs a rest."

Lucas said the game boiled down to free throws and, of course, Barkley.

"They did a good job," Lucas said. "If we had to do it again we'd let Charles take that 23-footer again."

Suns coach Paul Westphal said the winning shot went exactly as planned, except Barkley shot too soon.

"We didn't want to leave any time on the clock," Westphal said. "We wanted to make it or miss it at the buzzer so they wouldn't have a chance to make it scary."

The Spurs' J.R. Reid (14 points) said his team had its chances.

"I'm sorry someone had to lose the game," he said. "But you can't ask David Robinson for any better defense."

San Antonio took an 86-76 lead to start the fourth quarter on Sean Elliott's 3-pointer. But Phoenix immediately rallied with 12 straight points to take an 88-86 lead.

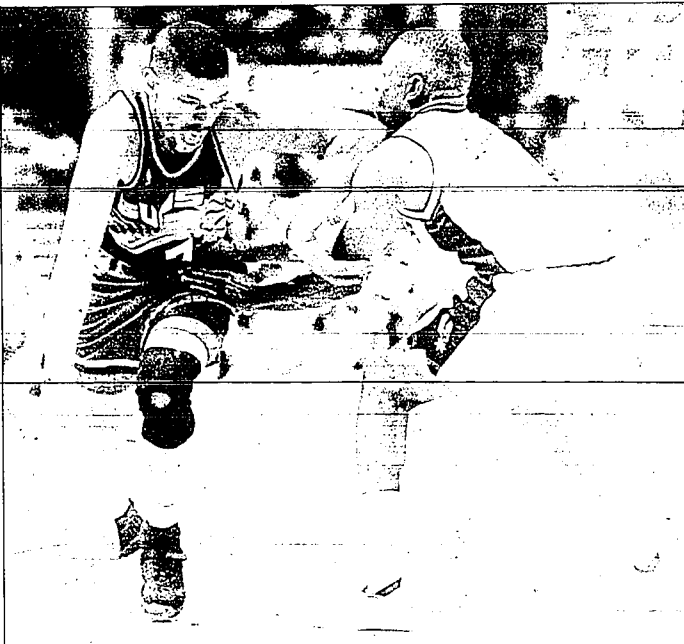
The fourth-quarter battle was on. The teams swapped leads four times before Phoenix finally went ahead 96-94 on two free throws by Johnson with 3:18 remaining.

"I thought we had the game under control," said Elliott, who added 19 points for the Spurs. "Every team makes runs at you. They did. I thought we would have ours."

Barkley was backed by Kevin Johnson and Dan Majerle with 18 each and Miller with 12.

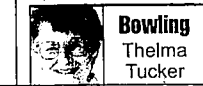

Waite, 28, spent the last two years playing golf in Australia, Asia and Canada, getting his game and mind in shape for a return to the tour.

"Two years down there helped me develop my game," he said. "I'm in a better position to play now, and my performance is showing that."

Simpson finished No. 8 on the money list in 1990, but his career began to deteriorate in the summer of 1991 after he was bitten by a tick and subsequently contracted Lyme disease. He finished No. 85 in 1991 and tumbled to 144 last year, making the cut in just 11 of 24 tournaments.

When the disease was at its worst, Simpson couldn't even hit a toothbrush. But a strong dose of antibiotics helped control the disease, and now he is beginning to show his old consistency.

"I seemed to have turned the corner. I'm just thankful to be finally showing signs of coming back," he said. "It has been a rough two years for me."

He had an additional stroke of bad luck last month, when he fell backward six feet into a sandtrap and injured his back.

But Goodyear qualified on the inside of the second row, at 222.344 mph, for the Indianapolis 500 on May 30, and his confidence in himself and the Walker Motorsports team remains intact and strong.

"I have complete confidence in

my team," Goodyear said Thursday as his crew worked on his Ford Cosworth-powered Lola in the garage area at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway before he went out and ran a practice lap at 225.378, his fastest of the month.

"I don't worry about whether the car is safe, or about fatigue. You have to have a clear mind when you're sitting in a race car."

"Last year, as the year went on, that was starting to increase," Goodyear said. "It can be great and you can run strong all day, or it can be off and you can hope that you don't go backwards and get lapped before you get the car right and be able to go racing."

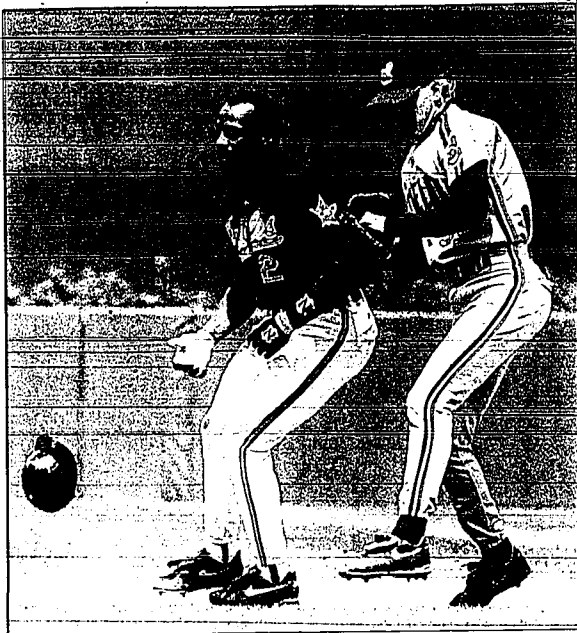

Cummings' curve has historical break

CHICAGO — It was a 1,000-to-1 shot, but romanticist that I am, it occurred to me that perhaps John Cummings, a rookie pitcher with the Seattle Mariners, is a great-or-great-grandson of William Arthur Cummings, better known as Candy Cummings, the inventor of the curveball.

Candy Cummings was born in 1848 in Ware, Mass. John Cummings arrived 121 years later, in 1969, at the other end of the country, in Torrance, Calif. Nonetheless, there appears to be a relationship.

"My dad is looking it up. He's checking the family tree," John Cummings said Wednesday in a telephone interview from Arlington, Texas. His father's family is from Massachusetts, about 30 miles from Ware.

Has he ever heard of Candy Cummings? "I didn't know until this spring. One of the reporters told me about him."

And, of course, I asked if, like the legendary Candy, a Hall of Famer, John threw the curveball.

"I just learned to throw it last year," John said. "Paul Lindblad, my coach in A-ball, taught it to me."

Sammy Ellis, the Seattle pitching coach, was consulted. John Cummings, a right-hander with three years of professional experience, is having his first taste of life in the big leagues. He is in the Mariners' rotation but is struggling: 0-6, eight starts with a 5.27 earned-run average.

"He's got a nice curveball," Ellis said, "and uses it a lot, but the fastball is his first pitch."

I asked Ellis if he shared my belief that the curveball is becoming extinct.

"No doubt about it," Ellis said. "The reason is that it's hard to get a called strike. The curveball, when it's a perfect pitch, comes in knee-high. But, by the time it hits the catcher's mitt, it's below the knees and the umpires won't call that pitch."

"Consequently, the only way the pitcher can get a strike is to elevate the pitch. And, for the hitter, that's a hanging curveball."

Many of today's pitchers prefer the slider, which has a short, downward bite, or the split-fingered fastball introduced by Bruce Sutter when he was with the Cubs in the late '70s.

The split-finger is a sister to the outlawed spibal. Probably more than any other pitch, it upsets the hitter's timing because it doesn't drop until the last second, when the batter is in full swing.

Candy Cummings, who had a 21-22 record in a two-year big-league career, is the undisputed father of

the curveball. In the beginning, and for many years thereafter, some baseball people insisted it was merely an optical illusion.

Whatever, the following is a dramatic re-creation written in 1946 by Dan Daniel, a bona fide baseball historian:

"It was a pleasant June day in 1864, on the Capitoline grounds near the Fulton Ferry in Brooklyn. The great Atlantic was playing the local Stars."

"William Arthur Cummings was pitching for the Stars. The first Atlantic batter stepped to the plate and Cummings threw him a strange, fascinating pitch. The batter raised his eyes and said, 'I've got to stop guzzling that beer at the Dutchman's.'"

"Candy hauled off and hurled still another peculiar-looking ball. The batter stepped out of the box and said to the Stars' catcher, 'Do you see what I see, or can it be there is something wrong with my eyes?'"

"The catcher laughed. 'That, my boy, is a curve.'"

In those days the pitchers threw underhanded. It wasn't until after the turn of the century that the curve was the pitch the batters feared the most.

There have been scores of outstanding curveball pitchers. Johnny Morrison, who had a 10-year big-league career, mostly with Pittsburgh in the '20s, was among the early specialists; his nickname was "Jug Handle Johnny."

Dazzy Vance of the Brooklyn Dodgers, and later Tommy Bridges and Bob Feller, had dynamic curveballs. Feller, the Strikeout King of his time, had a 98 mph fastball, but it was his curve that sent the batters to the bench.

Sandy Koufax, like Feller a power-pitcher-with-an-overhand delivery, may have had the most unhittable curveball. It came in left-high and had an immense and swift downward break. Every time I saw Koufax throw his "bender," I was amazed when the batter made contact. A foul ball off a Koufax curve was an achievement.

Nolan Ryan, who has pitched seven no-hitters, breaking Koufax's record of four, also had a tremendous curve but lacked Koufax's control. Other outstanding curveballers were Camilo Pascual of the Washington Senators and Bert Blyleven.

Blyleven was a master. He had a good velocity on his fastball but probably got more strikeouts with his curve than anyone else: 3,701, third on the all-time list behind Ryan and Steve Carlton; the slider was Carlton's pitch.

He is recently retired. The Minnesota Twins cut him in spring training.

Giants continue winning ways, beat Cincinnati, 6-1



SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Even as the wins pile up, the San Francisco Giants are keeping a tight leash on their confidence.

After a 6-1 victory over the Cincinnati Reds on Thursday, there wasn't a hint of cockiness in the clubhouse, just the quiet assurance of a team playing well. And that's the way manager Dusty Baker likes it.

"I hope they've got more confidence, but the feeling is, 'Hey, man, we've got another game to play,'" said Baker, whose team has won six in a row and nine of its last 10. "This team is not a team to get cocky, because you know how quickly you can lose a lead."

The Giants know it well. In first place last season on June 1, they ended up fifth in the NL West, 26 games out of first. For now, though, the league's best-hitting team is winning with contributions from just about everyone.

"They've got nine starters going out there and playing hard; and that's why they're winning," Cincinnati's Kevin Mitchell said. "With the Giants, you get one guy out and now you've got to face another."

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Fred McGriff hit a two-run homer in the 11th inning after Colorado had gone ahead in the top of the inning.

Gary Sheffield ended the bottom of the 11th with a single off Darren Holmes (0-3) and

'Screamer' replaces 'nice guy' in New York

NEW YORK (AP) — Make no mistake: If Bobby Bonilla, Vince Coleman or anyone else on the New York Mets is playing poorly, Dallas Green will tell them.

To their face. Loudly. Which might be the reason the Mets hired him. They didn't win under nice guy Jeff Torborg, so now they get tough guy Green.

"I express my thoughts," Green has said. "I'm a screamer and a yeller. I never hold back."

And, it doesn't matter who he's talking to, or at.

In 1989, when he was managing the New York Yankees, he upset some players by publicly criticizing captain Don Mattingly. But Green also gained points by refusing to back down from George Steinbrenner's bluster.

There also was that shouting match in the clubhouse with young outfielder Stanley Jefferson, who was blaming others for his demotion to the minors.

"Look in the mirror, big boy!" Green belted.

With the Mets, a team full of high-priced stars with low production, Green might find plenty to holler about. Especially with the club stuck at 13-25, second-worst in the majors to the expansion Colorado Rockies,

and 14 games behind Philadelphia in the NL East.

"I haven't watched the Mets too often this season, a few times on TV," Green said recently. "But

from what I've seen, it's just a case of a lot of players not doing the job they are capable of doing. When that happens for most of the team, you're talking about a last-place club."

The 58-year-old Green was working as a Mets scout when general manager Al Harazin went to meet with him Tuesday in Philadelphia. Harazin said Green's wife, Sylvia, had just left on a month-long trip to Tibet. Green accepted the post that night, and Harazin announced, Torborg's firing Wednesday night after the Mets beat Pittsburgh 6-4 in 10 innings.

"I didn't have to sell Dallas on the job," Harazin said.

The Mets are off Thursday, Green begins the job Friday when Atlanta visits Shea Stadium on Friday night.

"Will Dallas be able to turn it around? I don't know. But it had

gotten to the point where I had to do something," Harazin said. "Managing is all about leadership, and Green is aggressive."

In other words: "He's not afraid to get in someone's face, anyone's face, whether you have a five-year deal or if you are making the minimum," said Larry Bowda, who heard several of Green's tirades in Philadelphia.

In fact, it was one of Green's loudest outbursts ever, as manager of the Phillies near the end of the 1980

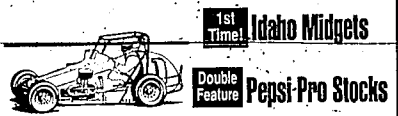
season, that was credited with spurting them toward their only World Series championship.

"I'm confident in my abilities, but I'm from the old school. I just didn't think I would get another chance given all the changes in baseball and the front offices," Green said.

Music of the megabytes

Tinkle those ivories; make your computer sing

TWIN FALLS — It may be the wedding of the century, as music and computers are joined together "til death do us part" or at least until a chip malfunctions.

Actually, music entered the computer age more than 10 years ago.

"Music technology is used for much of the music we listen to on movies and TV," said College of Southern Idaho music instructor Pete Crawford, who will teach a summer course on the subject. "Now, the price has come down enough so the average person can buy it."

Crawford will introduce his summer students to the history of electronic music. He will also talk about the "caring and feeding" of sequencers and about midi applications.

If this sounds like something plucked from a new language, it is.

Sequencers are electronic tape recorders. Midi (as in "a midi cable will fit into any electronic keyboard") is a word coined by computer manufacturers who set out to make sure every computer

can talk to every synthesizer.

But you don't need a doctorate in electrical engineering to make music on your computer, according to Crawford. In fact, you don't need to know a whole lot about music.

"We will tailor the class to fit people at all levels of expertise," Crawford said, "and you can get software to use with just about any computer, as long as a

certain amount of memory is available."

Here's a sample: Crawford plays a tune on his keyboard, and representations of the notes roll across the computer screen, as if they were etched onto a player-piano roll. The machine records what Crawford plays and sends it charging through stereo speakers.

Crawford adds another track and punches "play." The computer contines to talk to the keyboard.

"You can run this through a home stereo or even a set of \$5 headphones," Crawford explained.

Another program: Crawford plunks out a song on the keyboard, and the computer calculates the notes and flashes them onto the screen. In answer to a simple command, the computer prints out the sheet music.

This is called a notation program — a high-tech way to compose music.

"This sort of thing will not put musicians out of work, but will make it easier for them to write music," Crawford said. "In the past, I have felt like a sixteenth-century monk copying music onto sheets."

With a notation program, Beethoven could have multiplied his musical output several times over during his lifetime.

Crawford has an ear-training program, exercises for tuning and software designed for music education in the schools.

"A local dance teacher asked me if I had a tape of 'Mary Had a Little Lamb' without vocals, and I was able to produce one for her very quickly," Crawford said.

A quick cue zaps the end result onto the screen, complete with color-coded tracks and headings outlining the layout of the piece.

Crawford's software provides him access to a long list of musical instruments. He can grab notes and move them around on staves, too. Or he can highlight groups of notes to copy and paste, word processor style.

Sound idyllic? Not exactly. Electronic music also has its pecky side.

The computer announces everything you do wrong, and it's extremely accurate — within 1,000th of a second.

So here it is, a decade since "Jedi," and guess what?

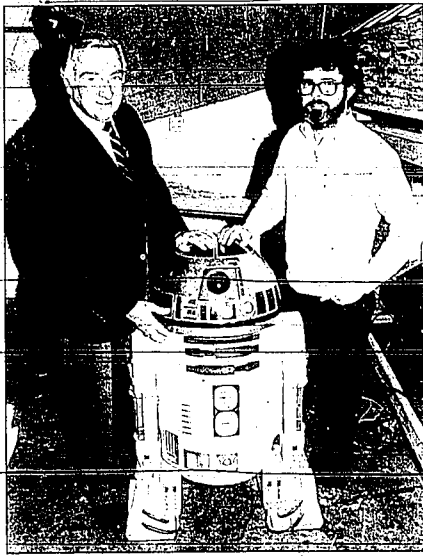
Those in the know are buzzing.

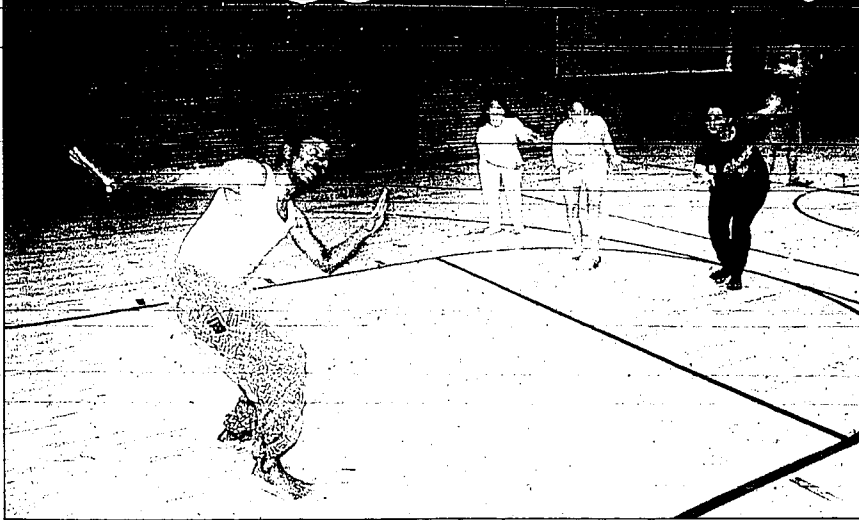

native village with a slide show and lecture. Next week, he will help them prepare an African dinner.

"He's great, and I'm really intrigued with the culture," said Christy Webb, a student at the school. "I want to go there (Nigeria)." Odoemene is a veteran globe-trotter. The National Geographic Society has funded his lectures for some time now. He has also danced with three traditional troupes and worked with Information Third World and with the Austrian and German ministries of education. In Europe, he taught drumming.

Odoemene's goal is to help end

cultural bigotry by encouraging young people to accept and interact with people of other cultures.

He's in the United States so his wife can obtain her master's degree in nursing. She received her bachelor of science degree this month. Odoemene did research for his doctorate in geology at Salzburg University in Austria before making the trek to Boise. None of this is without a purpose.

"We want to go back to Nigeria when my wife completes her master's degree," Odoemene explained. "That will give her the necessary requirements to manage the clinic we

will open in my village."

It will be a clinic, Odoemene said, to help pregnant women learn about hygiene and to help prevent AIDS. He talked of this dream with conviction. "New babies are dying in my village, he said.

Odoemene has been offered the chance to work in a Nigerian city, where there is electricity, water and telephone.

"I don't want to do that," he said, adding that he has, instead, accepted an agricultural position which will allow him to help improve the soil in the villages. "I was brought up in a remote village, that is what made my life, and that is what I love."

Odoemene and his wife are in the United States to gather the educational tools they need to help their people. They know that their three young children, accustomed to modern city life, may find the move to Nigeria difficult. "But we will manage," Odoemene said.

The Odoemenes said not earn good money when they return to Africa. Probably not even \$100 a month.

Odoemene doesn't need lots of money, he said. Or, rather, he needs something else more.

"When I dance, it brings back home, and I can feel it with me," he said. "I am happy about the day when we will go home."

Continued from C1 and the fact that TV viewership in the Twin Falls market drops by about two-thirds after 11 p.m.

Letterman's NBC show (which airs at 11:30 p.m. on Boise's KTVB-TV and its Twin Falls satellite station, K28AS) has very, very low numbers here," Wagner said. "We don't have a lot of shift workers in this market and you're not going to get the kind of audience you'd get for Letterman in a more urban market."

Tim Bever, general manager of Boise CBS affiliate KBCI, plans to air Letterman at 10:35 p.m., head-to-head with "The Tonight Show." But he says if he had "Cheers" in his stable, he might do the same thing as Wagner.

"Cheers" is very, very strong in this market," he said. "I wish I had it. But we're pretty confident about Letterman at 10:30. Our feeling is that Leno is on the downside; he's lost (Johnny) Carson's older audience. The demographics here are good for Letterman and we've got shift workers at places like Hewlett-Packard and Micron who are up that time of night and in the mood to watch TV."

Although KBCI is available on cable in the Twin Falls area, Letterman's new CBS show will only be seen on KMVT — at 11 p.m. because of Federal Communications Commission rules.

Ironically, the program now-in KBCI's 11:30 p.m. time slot — the syndicated "Rush Limbaugh" show — is beating the tar out of Letterman's NBC program, Bever said.

"In grad I don't have to choose between the two," he said. He said he may move Limbaugh back to midnight, or perhaps "upgrade" the conservative commentator by showing his program earlier in the day.

The third CBS affiliate available by cable in the Twin Falls market, Salt Lake City's KSL-TV, shows back-to-back re-runs of "M-A-S-H" at 10:40 and 11:10 p.m. Station Manager Bill Murdock could not be reached for comment this week on his station's plans for Letterman.

Syndicated programs like "Cheers" and "M-A-S-H" are profitable for stations because they are edited to allow plenty of time for local commercials and because they maintain a loyal viewership for years.

"Some of those overeggs have been running on the same stations since they went into syndication," Wagner said. "But you're talking about a show with 240 episodes available. You can watch for a long time before you see the same one twice."

Local stations have some latitude about scheduling network programming, but not unlimited freedom if they want to keep the money networks pay to affiliates for airing their shows, Bever said.

"What CBS pays us in program cost wouldn't run our newsworm for

long," he said. "It's an important revenue source, but networks are becoming more and more selective about what programs they pay copy for."

To sweeten the deal, CBS is giving affiliates three minutes of local commercial time in the first 30 minutes of Letterman, when viewership should be higher, and three minutes in the last 30 minutes.

"It used to be they'd give you local time in the last half of the program," he said.

Bever said he's optimistic about Letterman's prospects on CBS, but gunshy after the experience of the network's ill-fated Pat Sajak late-night show, which sank without a trace six years ago.

"I've still got a Pat Sajak coffee cup on my desk," he said. "It's the only quarter-million-dollar coffee cup in Idaho."

titled "Star Wars" — is, in reality, the fourth chapter in the saga.

In fact, as that movie begins, this designation appears on the screen: "EPISODE IV."

Lynne Hale — director of public relations for George Lucas' Lucasfilm Ltd. — says the most frequently asked "Star Wars"-sequel question is simply "When?"

If the fans have been buzzing more loudly than usual lately, that's partly because of what Lucas had to say about a sequel in a recent issue of The Lucasfilm Fan Club Magazine — all 40,000 copies of which, of course, instantly sold out. "It'll probably start writing it in the next couple of years," proclaimed Lucas (who declined to be interviewed for this article). "Somewhere between 1995 and the year 2000, there should be three more 'Star Wars' movies that will come out."

Many star warriors suspect that the first film in the new series will be released on the 20-year anniversary of the date — May 25, 1977 — that the first "Star Wars" movie premiered. (Only the second film of the trilogy did not open on a May 25; it opened on May 21, 1980 — close enough.)

"That's the word I've heard: May 25, 1997," notes Dan Madsen, president of the Lucasfilm Fan Club, publisher/editor of the magazine and the person who interviewed Lucas.

"The release of it will be in 1997," says David Prowse, the English actor who played Darth Vader — speaking by phone in a pleasant, British-accented voice from London. (James Earl Jones contributed

STAR WARS (1977)

In this first episode of the trilogy, our young hero, farm-boy Luke Skywalker (Mark Hamill), begins to discover his destiny by joining forces with Ben Obi-Wan Kenobi (Alec Guinness), a Jedi fighter figure.

Fighting alongside them in rebellion against the evil Empire are the spunky Princess Leia (Carrie Fisher), the roguish Han Solo (Harrison Ford), the shaggy Chewbacca (Peter Mayhew) and the droids, R2-D2 (Kenny Baker) and C-3PO (Anthony Daniels). Looming large among the bad guys is deadly Darth Vader (David Prowse, with the voice of James Earl Jones).

Watch for assorted alien toughs in the famous "cantina" sequence. George Lucas wrote and

directed this episode.

THE EMPIRE STRIKES BACK (1980)

In the wake of the destruction of the Death Star (the Empire's greatest weapon), the Emperor and Darth Vader strike back by launching an attack on the rebel forces on the ice planet Hoth.

This time around we meet Lando Calrissian (Billy Dee Williams), able administrator of Cloud City, where some of the rebels regroup. We also encounter the 900-year-old Yoda (operated by Frank Oz), the Muppet guru who painstakingly instructs Luke in the ways of the Force.

George Lucas masterminded the production and came up with the basic story. This episode — the darkest and perhaps best of the three — was directed by Irvin Kershner from a script by Leigh Brackett and Lawrence Kasdan.

RETURN OF THE JEDI (1983)

The climactic clash between the rebel forces and the evil Empire occurs in this final (so far, anyway) installment. To save the rebel alliance, Luke must confront Darth Vader, who claims to be his father.

New characters include a band of forest-dwelling teddy bears called Ewoks. There's also Jabba the Hutt, who seems to embody traits from several Lewis Carroll characters: the Cheshire Cat's smile, the Caterpillar's hookah, Tweedledee's (or Tweedledum's) physique, the Jabberwocky's disposition and the Mock Turtle's complexion.

Once again, mastermind George Lucas developed the story. He wrote the script with Lawrence Kasdan, and Richard Marquand directed.

In any case, Lucas' recent statement seems to have started the clock ticking on the next trilogy.

This anticipated "pre-quel" trilogy is expected to show Jedi-knight Obi-Wan Kenobi and the dark side's Darth Vader as young men. Luke Skywalker — hero of the original series — might briefly appear as a baby in the pre-quel, Time reported when "Jedi" opened.

In the recent fan-club interview, Lucas stated his intention to film the three pre-quel movies back-to-back-to-back. But on the subject of the third and final trilogy — which would chronicle events that take

place after the series we have all seen — he was vague: "Whether or not I would ever get around to the

third trilogy is speculation at this point. I'm not sure I'll live that long!"

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Country outlaw slows to gallop

Willie Nelson ponders past, future, new album, TV concerts

AUSTIN, Texas — Relaxing on his bus outside an Austin television studio, Willie Nelson sits at a small dining table, looking less like a legend and more like a man who just slipped into a truck stop to order the No. 3 special.

It is April 27. In two days Nelson turns the Big Six-O. He seems to be taking the event philosophically. So, as there lie after 60 for a long-haired, self-styled outlaw.

Nelson grins. "Well, I don't know. I never figured I'd get this far."

Not only has he gotten this far — he is still shooting down a career path as twisting and turning as the Rio Grande.

In the last two months, he has released his promising new album, "Across the Borderline," which includes celebrity duets with Bonnie Raitt and Bob Dylan. He has also completed his sixth Farm Aid benefit, hosted "Saturday Night Live," and taped two concerts for a CBS special tribute to his birthday, which airs from 7-9 p.m. Saturday (channels 11, 12 in the Magic Valley). In the works are another album and possibly a movie role.

All that, and a grueling 1993 concert schedule crowded with more than 200 dates, makes it easy

to overlook the fact that Willie will soon be eligible for senior citizen discounts.

"I never really thought that much about 60. But as you get closer to it, you start thinking more about it, especially since it's always been called 'The Big Six-O.' It's supposed to be some goal. I've been with it and the time you get there you're supposed to be... just about dead," he says with a soft chuckle.

"And it's real funny when you get there and you're not."

Nelson's "Two four buses," "Honeyisuckle Rose" and "It" have racked up more than one million million hits there, crisscrossing the country in the last 10 years. That's a lot of changing scenery. And a lot of time for Nelson to reflect on a four-decade career.

He is one of the most famous and prolific singer-songwriters in history.

Even if he had never recorded a single song in his life, he would have gone down in history as a legendary songwriter for penning classics such as Patsy Cline's "Crazy" and Ray Price's "Night Life" more than three decades ago.

Songs like "On the Road Again" and "Always on My Mind," are among the most enduring and recognizable in American contemporary music.

In the late 1970s and early 1980s, he the Lone Star of country music — a colossus straddling pop and country charts strumming his battered 30-year-old Martin classical with the hole worn in it. He led young rock 'n' roll fans out of the disco desert, and he was the spiritual leader of an old-guns' frat pack with pals Waylon Jennings and Kris Kristofferson, who made movies and mischief together.

His legendary carousing, bacchanalian Fourth of July picnics and sneakers-and-T-shirt lifestyle

fuelled the vicarious dreams of fans who ranged from rednecks, hippies and homemakers to urban cowboys and office workers.

Then he hit an ugly patch of road. In 1990, the Internal Revenue Service smacked him with a bill for \$16.7 million in back taxes, and he saw most of his property and possessions sold on the IRS auction block.

He lost his son, Billy, who committed suicide on Christmas Day 1991 at age 33. Martha, his first wife and Billy's mother, had died in 1989.

At one point, even the National Enquirer ran a cover story reporting that he was considering suicide.

Instead of being diminished by these personal tragedies and swings in fortune, Willie says he feels a sense of redemption for having survived them.

"Those are some of the worst things that can happen to you. And they've already happened to you."

"It's sort of like, what can you do to me now? And once you reach that point where it seems like you've been through the fires and you're still here, then that in itself is a miracle that you survived all these things. There's enough reason there for jubilation. I think, whether it's on your 20th birthday or your 60th, that you've made it that far."

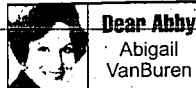
My problem is whether to tell Jim that I tricked him into marrying me. He is a very understanding man, and we have a fantastic marriage, but I don't know how he would react.

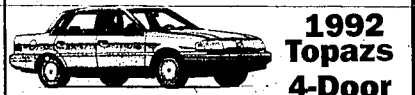

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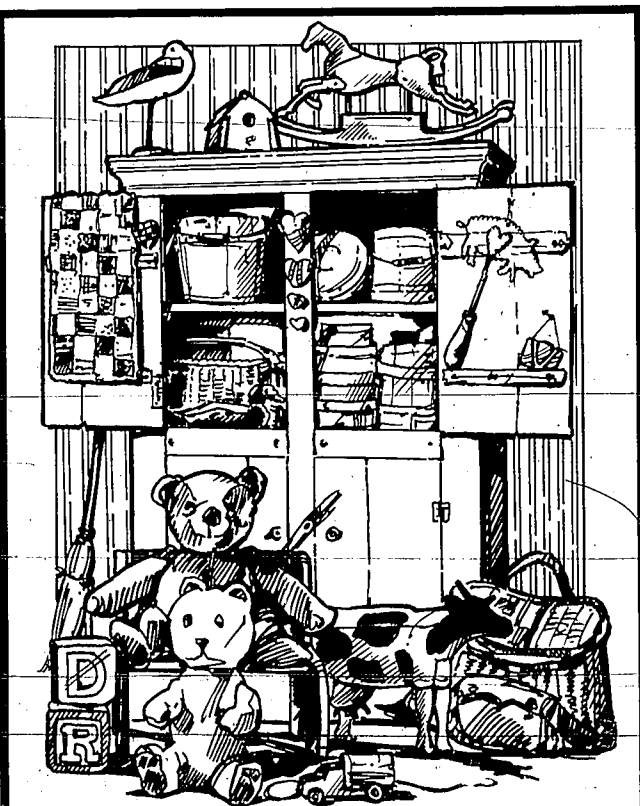
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'Sliver': Trouble on the set, trouble on the screen

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Paramount Pictures is betting "Sliver" is the next "Basic Instinct" — a steamy box-office hit.

—But those who have seen the sexual thriller say it's more like Madonna's "Body of Evidence" — lots of hype, little payoff.

Opening Friday in about 2,000 theaters, "Sliver" stars hotter-than-hot Sharon Stone, William Baldwin and Tom Berenger in a \$40 million tale of video voyeurism and murder — tonight inside Hawaii's Kilauea volcano — all for naught.

The sequence they were shooting, which showed Stone and Baldwin flying into a black abyss, was scrapped when test audiences were confused.

Production costs climbed well beyond the \$20 million originally approved by the studio.

The Motion Picture Association of America said the film's sex scenes and nudity mandated the adults-only NC-17 rating, and a few graphic scenes had to be trimmed for an R.

None of the above would have mattered if "Sliver" had tested well in early research screenings.

But it didn't.

The film's original conclusion saw Miss Stone's character of book editor Carle Norris end up with Baldwin's Zeke Hawkins. Hawkins, a wealthy apartment owner, is one of Norris' neighbors in his twin New York housing complex, popularly called "The Sliver." With an array of secret video cameras, Hawkins spies

on the apartment dwellers, including their sex lives.

Audiences detested the ending of the original script, written by "Basic Instinct" author Joe Eszterhas, so a new ending was shot — complete with a different murder.

Paramount didn't show the film to critics until Thursday night, meaning most newspapers and television stations wouldn't be able to review it until after it opens. But the studio has shunned the new "Sliver" version to a frustrated research audience — and several members were less than impressed.

"I think it has a good basic idea," said someone who attended the screening at Paramount's Studio Theater and asked not to be identified. "But the version I saw was not a good movie. It had a whole lot of holes — the plot was not consistent ... There were four of us who went together, and we were pretty much in agreement."

Said another audience member: "You could flip a coin to pick the killer. And that's what it looks like they did."

Further this year, "Body of Evidence" was heralded with the same sort of frenzy now accompanying "Sliver." The spin was that Madonna never had been racier. Instead, she drove most viewers to sleep, and the movie bombed.

Reaction to "Sliver" has been similar.

Natural gas grows as vehicle fuel, CEO says

SALT LAKE CITY — The Utah-southwestern Wyoming area is on the leading edge in the movement toward natural-gas-powered vehicles, said R.D. Cash, chairman, president and chief executive officer of Questar.

Questar subsidiary Mountain Fuel, a natural-gas utility, has a program to encourage use of natural gas for vehicle fuel in its marketing area of Utah and southwestern Wyoming.

"Natural gas is environmentally and economically superior to gasoline," significantly reducing carbon monoxide and other emissions, Cash told Questar's annual meeting this week.

He said a network of refueling stations is in place in Utah and southwestern Wyoming to support the area's 1,000-plus natural-gas vehicles.

Refueling stations are along Interstate 80 and Interstate 15.

Spokane downtown group tries new promotion approach

SPOKANE — The Downtown Spokane Association will break from the Spokane Area Chamber of Commerce and create organizations to make downtown improvements by letting merchants and property owners tax themselves.

Bill Burke, executive director of the Downtown Spokane Association, said Tuesday his organization will sever its management contract with the chamber in July. The association is a voluntary group with about 165 members.

The move will allow the association to create Business Improvement Areas and Local Improvement Districts that will form an overall management group for downtown, Burke said. The intent of the changes is "to steal from shopping centers what they do best," Burke said.

First Security expects merger with First National by 1994

ALBUQUERQUE — The merger of First National Bank of Albuquerque with Salt Lake City-based First Security Corp. is expected to be completed by early next year.

It will be the largest expansion purchase so far for the Utah holding company, said First Security chairman Spencer F. Eccles.

First Security will acquire First National Bank of Albuquerque in a stock deal worth an estimated \$200 million.

Entrepreneur puts flotsam to good use

CHINA BEND, Wash. — The debris on the Columbia River's banks near this northeastern Washington town contained the usual run of flotsam this year, according to Eric Weatherman of Columbia Navigation Inc.

There was a body, a bag full of hockey equipment, plenty of fishing tackle, and tons of logs that would play havoc with boaters and the Grand Coulee Dam's turbines if allowed to float downstream.

Canadian authorities claimed the body. Weatherman, under contract with the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, got the debris, and last month a subcontractor began sorting through the piles of wood to salvage the fiber for paper or incineration.

In the past, Weatherman said, the wood would have been pushed into piles 200 yards long and burned on the spot. Eagles and hawks that live along the river would swoop down and eat the mice fleeing from their hiding places, he said.

But the bureau, which manages Grand Coulee Dam and Lake Roosevelt, wanted to clean up the debris without creating a lot of smoke and ash, Weatherman said.

So this year the logs will be handled in one of two ways. Larger pieces will be processed into fuel for pulp at Ponderay Valley Fibre Inc. at U.S. Smaller wood may be chipped for burning at Washington Water Power Co.'s generator at Kettle Falls.

Past efforts to make use of the material have been frustrated by grit embedded in the fiber that haslessly duffed chippers and saws, he said.

Besides making use of what was once wasted, Weatherman said cleaning up debris also employs workers and machinery at a time of year when mud and snow keep them out of the woods.

Weatherman said his willingness to be flexible when responding to new government initiatives, and Columbia Navigation's history of reliability, brought recognition to the company in March by the U.S. Small Business Administration as the Northwest's Small Contractor of the Year.

Columbia Navigation does more than collect debris. For more than a decade, the company has operated a ferry that crosses Lake Roosevelt between Gifford and Inchelium.

Columbia Navigation's tugs and barges also set and repair all the booms on Lake Roosevelt.

Some of the anchors weigh five tons, but they are no match for the Columbia

Author: Wives should know about husbands' finances

BOCA RATON, Fla. — Discussing bank statements and investment strategies may not be the most romantic thing to do, but if you're married or about to get married, it may be a good idea.

Shelby White, author of "What Every Woman Should Know About Her Husband's Money," found herself a widow at the age of 30 with very little knowledge of her husband's financial details. After two years, she discovered that she could no longer afford to live in her home.

"I was very naive," said White, who signed copies of her book at Libertines Fine Books and Music in Boca Raton this week. "It wasn't that he kept information from

me; I just never asked."

She also conducted a seminar on money management for women, sponsored by Chase Manhattan Private Bank.

White said women who never ask about family finances could be setting themselves up for a financial disaster.

Statistics show why. White said only one third of recent first marriages last until death, and many women outlive their husbands by 15 years or more.

White said she knew of one woman whose husband named his new girlfriend as the beneficiary of his life insurance policy right before the couple got divorced. When he died a few years later, his girlfriend got the money and his ex-wife got nothing.

Another woman was left considerable money when her husband died but lost most of it on some bad advice from a relative.

Situations like these could be avoided if women make an effort to be involved in financial decisions and to educate themselves, White said.

Knowing how much your husband makes is only the tip of the iceberg, she said. You also need to know how much he owes, how much he spends and where his investments are. Keep track of documents you may need if the dies: his will, mortgage statements, deeds, insurance policies.

Read the tax returns, speak to your husband's accountant and never sign anything that you don't understand, she said.

"The thing I'm trying to do is teach women how to protect themselves," White said. "The more you know the better off you'll be."

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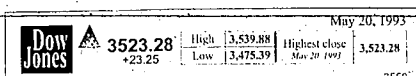

Dow rises to 2nd consecutive high

NEW YORK (AP) — Computer-directed buy programs propelled the Dow Jones industrials on Thursday to its second consecutive all-time high.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 23.25 points to 3,523.28. Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by about 13 to 9 on the New York Stock Exchange. Big Board volume totaled 279.55 million shares, down from 340.16 million on Wednesday.

Broad-market indexes were higher. On the American Stock Exchange, the market value index rose 2.37 to 432.29, posting its thirteenth all-time high for the year. The NYSE's composite index rose 1.55 to 248.41. The Nasdaq composite gained 6.99 to 697.42. Despite gains in all of the major



averages, the market continues to be caught in a tug-of-war between bullish and bearish influences. Program trading also added to volatility, battling the Dow Jones average up and down throughout the session.

The 30-year Treasury bond was down 63 cents per \$1,000 valuation and yielding 6.96%.

Stock traders said as long as the long bond stays below the psychologically important 7-percent level, stocks can avoid a big drop.

Scam jolts nation's ATM industry Slavage

HARTFORD, Conn. — A gang of high-tech thieves who hooked up a bogus automatic teller machine and hauled in a bundle sent the banking industry scrambling for ways to prevent illegal use of the nation's 83,000 ATMs.

Adding customer fingerprints, magnetic or hologram to ATM cards are being considered by the Electronic Funds Transfer

Association, which represents ATM companies, said Margaret Steeves of the Yankee 24 ATM network. The network has 3,700 ATMs across New England, New York and New Jersey.

Steeves said Thursday that customers should have no reason to distrust an ATM as long as it includes the logo of a legitimate bank and does not appear to be temporary.

That wasn't the case with a fake ATM hooked up by brazen thieves in a suburban Hartford mall in late

April. So far, losses total more than \$60,000.

The machine spit back each customer's card after recording the account numbers and security codes.

The gang has been traveling the East Coast using counterfeit cards encoded with the stolen information to make hundreds of illegal withdrawals at ATMs. They've struck in New York, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina and Virginia, authorities said.

Mortgage rates climb quarter-point

MIAMI — Mortgage interest rates charged by many lenders have jumped a quarter of a percentage point in the last four days, prompting suspicions that the mortgage market may have bottomed out. If that's the case, borrowers who have been waiting for the absolute lowest rates could push in to lock in mortgages at rates still below 8 percent — levels not seen in decades, "I think perhaps we have seen the bottom for this cycle," said Stan Strachan, editor and publisher of National Mortgage News in New York. "I don't think we're seeing the start of any substantial upturn in rates. But people are afraid of inflation."

As of Wednesday, rates charged by several major lenders had crept to 7.75 percent or 7.875 percent for a

30-year, fixed-rate loan. That's up from 7.5 percent or 7.625 percent last Thursday. Fifteen-year loans were running about 7.25 percent Wednesday, up from about 7 percent last week.

A quarter-point difference can add up to big savings. Comparing a \$100,000 loan at 7.5 percent vs. 7.75 percent, a customer will save \$206 a year and almost \$6,200 over 30 years with the lower rate.

"The market had been bouncing around, up an eighth of a point and down an eighth," said Susan Herman, president of The Mortgage Team in Miami. "But a quarter of a point is more significant."

Of the 20 lenders who do business with — including some of the nation's largest — virtually all had raised rates a quarter of a point since last Thursday.

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Will movie exploit or expound on Waco tragedy?

Fact-based TV movies, also known as docudramas, often are criticized for taking liberties with reality in the interest of fashioning a better drama.

Such criticism about blurring drama with reality is compounded by charges of exploitation when tragic news events are converted into TV movies as quickly as NBC is producing "In the Line of Duty: Ambush in Waco." It will be broadcast nationally Sunday — the final Sunday of the four-week national Nielsen ratings "sweeps."

The rush to make this movie is being criticized because it will use real names and locations, creating a representation of reality — even though investigators are still piecing together what happened at the compound (which burned to the ground April 19 in a fire that killed scores of occupants) and new facts and allegations keep emerging.

"I think docudramas, with very rare exceptions, do a disservice to reality — especially those that are done before the historical facts are confirmed and (before) the public no longer is concerned with the event as a matter of public policy," says Ben Bagdikian, author, social critic and former dean of the graduate school of journalism at the University of California,

Berkeley.

"They are done quickly, for purely money-making reasons," Bagdikian says, "and I think all the talk about drama and public education is marlarky."

Those involved in making the Waco movie, including actor Timothy Daly of NBC's "Who's the Boss" sitcom, who plays cult leader David Koresh, say they are avoiding sensationalism while telling an interesting story. Daly — who talked with reporters for several newspapers in an NBC-arranged conference call May 7 — says the drama (he does not like the term "docudrama") will give the public an emotional connection with the tragedy that it could not get from many weeks of dry news reports.

"The purpose of drama, of dramatizing anything, is to put it into a human emotional context so that people can feel something about it," Daly says. "We are bombarded with so much information, so quickly, about so many disasters around the world... that I think as a society we've become sort of inured to the real tragedy of what's going on, because there's so much tragedy, and it's reported in such a neutral way."

"And putting it into a dramatic format will hopefully let people identify with some of the characters and feel something about it," Daly says.

Bagdikian isn't buying it. "I don't think any member of the public who

has the slightest interest in the Waco incident has any doubt about the meaning for human beings and for the kind of problem that came out of this. All that a docudrama, done at this point, can do is to exploit it for narrow reasons.

"I also happen to think it's ironic that NBC is doing it. One reason that NBC News got in trouble with the consumer test that it faked in the GM (truck) case... is the mentality that goes along with a docudrama — (which) makes it perfectly all right to exaggerate and even falsify some of the reality so that it'll have a more spectacular impact."

It would be virtually impossible for NBC to argue that profit is not part of its motive (and it does not) — seeing how the Waco movie is to be completed in time for the important sweeps ratings period, which helps determine how much the networks and their affiliate stations will earn in advertising revenue.

What the movie's producers and Daly do say is that the press has exploited the fatal fire, as well as the preceding 51-day standoff outside Waco between federal law-enforcement authorities and Koresh's Branch Davidian religious cult.

"A lot of the criticism about movies like this seems to be coming from the press, and... I would say that the press was practically at the (original Feb. 28) raid at the Branch Davidian compound before the (Federal Bureau of Alco-

hol, Tobacco and Firearms) was, and they've been parked there ever since," Daly says. "I mean they have exploited the story more than a TV movie could exploit."

Daly said the exploitation question originally had concerned him.

"I had to be convinced (in March, before the fiery conclusion and while the standoff was in progress) to do this project, and when I spoke to (executive producer) Ken Kaufman and (director) Dick Lowery about it, they convinced me that they would do everything in their power to make this a responsible picture and not a piece of sensationalist fluff," Daly says. "Again, I would have to say that you have to look to the movie and not to the event (of the movie being made so soon afterward)."

The Waco movie will tell a parallel story of the federal agents and the cult during the period leading up to the initial raid, which resulted in the death of several federal agents and started the standoff. The movie was commissioned in March, while the standoff was still going on, and the plan all along was to have the script end with the raid. The fatal fire of April 19 did not alter that plan. Daly says the final tragedy will be handled in a postscript, perhaps with words superimposed on a final image.

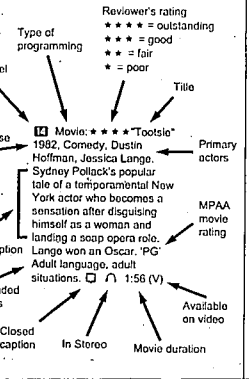

ABC deals with Arnolds

Last week, Roseanne and Tom Arnold unilaterally announced that their production company had signed a non-exclusive first-look agreement with ABC to develop new series and specials for the network.

Tom went out of his way to add that the deal "most importantly, frees me to star in a series on CBS next season and does not tie the 'Roseanne' series to ABC beyond next season."

Friday, ABC responded with a little message for Tom. In a statement the network said, "ABC is happy to confirm that we have an agreement with Tom and Roseanne Arnold's Wapello County Productions to develop new series and specials for the ABC Television Network. In order to avoid any further controversy, we will not release any details of the agreement at this time."

Translation: Carsey-Werner Productions owns "Roseanne" and it's Carsey-Werner, not Tom and Rosie, that will deal with ABC

when it's time to talk about renewing the series.

Meanwhile, ABC didn't renew Tom's "The Jackie Thomas Show" for next year, and CBS still hasn't said flat-out that it will take a new series from Linda Bloodworth-Thomason starring Tom, as he claims.

In this week's Time magazine Roseanne continued her assault against ABC's executives. "They are evil people," she says. "Their attitude was, 'We're going to teach this girl a lesson.' It was a male supremacist attitude."

Time says "she will honor her commitment to do 'Roseanne' for ABC one more season but vows to bar network executives from the set. 'They are not welcome,'" she told Time, adding that after that "the show will be offered to whoever has the money, except that it will go to ABC only if they change the top executives."

Time dismisses this kind of talk as "bluster" that ignores the Carsey-Werner factor and the Arnolds' inability to attract much audience interest outside her role in "Roseanne."

Disney: FBI informer

The delicious irony of the Unleash-Walt-as-FBI-informer story is that American history contains few figures more revolutionary and ultimately subversive than Walt Disney himself.

For those who tuned in late: "Walt Disney: Hollywood's Dark Prince," an unauthorized biography due out in July, says Disney reported to the FBI for 26 years on Hollywood actors, writers, et al., suspected of political (i.e. communist) subversion.

Granted, the thought of Walt Disney as a smith on the wrong side of the McCarthyism nightmare is distasteful. But commentators who fulminated ad nauseum on that point missed an opportunity to explore Disney's most disturbing legacy.

Any damage Disney may have done to Hollywood careers, and to the sanctity of civil liberties, through his spying is dwarfed by the seismic, lasting changes he helped bring to American life through his beloved public works, from TV and movies to theme parks.

In the innocent exercise of that genius, Disney put us on the road to

becoming what we are today, a society in which the prevailing values are not those of liberal or conservative, Christian or pagan, but of show business, of entertainment -- entertainment tonight, entertainment tomorrow, entertainment forever.

And it's sapping our spirit and sinew in a way that fellow-traveling Hollywood subversives never could have dreamed.

Increasingly we are a nation of cretulous, slack-jawed, attention-impaired, trash-culture addicts. It's come to this: Bill O'Reilly, smarmy host of "Inside Edition," is nearly a household word.

You say you want a revolution? America, once the world's leading industrial power, now settles for being the world's leading exporter of junk TV.

To be sure, Disney's influence is a study in unintended consequences -- he set out to entertain America, not undermine it -- but history is replete with such cases. Just ask presidents who appoint Supreme Court justices.

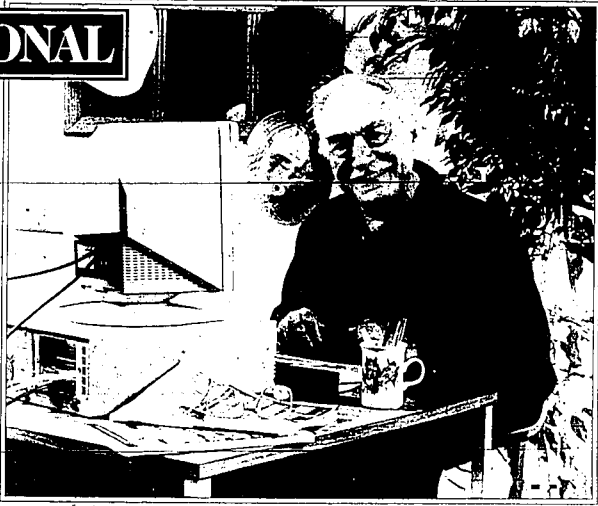
Along with a handful of other Hollywood giants, Disney set in motion forces that soon took on a life of their own.
