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Clinton wins in deficit cut fight

WASHINGTON — Democrats pushed a massive deficit-reduction tax increase through the House Thursday night, handing President Clinton a narrow victory in the most critical test of his fledgling administration.

The 219-213 vote, with all Republicans in opposition, sent the bill to a difficult fight in the Senate.

No Republican voted for the bill, which was supported by 218 Democrats and the chamber's lone independent. Thirty-eight Democrats joined 175 Republicans in voting no. The only absent member was Rep.

Paul Henry, R-Mich., who is ill; controversy, swiftly hailed his triumph. He said the House had voted "no to gridlock, no to the status quo and no to the special interests who worked so very hard to frighten Americans" about his economic program.

"Tomorrow, we go on to the Senate and we go on to the country," he added.

The vote climaxed a day of debate in the House and a final flurry of phone calls from Clinton and Vice President Al Gore to winning Democrats.

House Speaker Thomas Foley delivered a final plea for Democrats to embrace the

president's economic plan, saying the vote was no less momentous than the decision to go to war in the Persian Gulf. "This is the time to justify your election," he declared.

A cheer erupted from the Democratic side of the chamber as the scorecard showed the 218 votes needed for passage. Republicans cheered as well; as if to reaffirm their solid opposition to Clinton's tax hikes.

The bill, a combination of tax increases and spending restraints, is part of a plan to reduce the deficit by about \$500 billion over the next five years. The tax increases would exempt most low-income people, cost middle-income families up to about

\$400 a year and fall heavily on the well-to-do. It also includes an energy tax that the White House said may be subject to a "contingency" in the Senate.

Rep. Charles Wilson, D-Texas, was among Democrats opposing the bill, saying "It was just too tough on energy states... I just couldn't vote 'aye' just on a promise that they might change it in the Senate."

Press Secretary Dee Dee Myers said several lawmakers who voted against the bill would have voted for it if their support had been needed. "There were enough people who would have supported it in the package down," she said.

The bill's fate in the Senate is uncertain.

Pair of wrecks slow traffic on Interstate 84 near Jerome

JEROME — Two automobile accidents near Jerome slowed traffic on Interstate 84 for more than three hours Thursday morning.

A drowsy Wyoming National Guardsman caused the first accident at 9:06 a.m. two miles east of the western Jerome exit, the Idaho State Police reported.

The second accident happened about half an hour later when a driver slowed down as he approached the first wreck.

Dan Hart, 22, of Ivanston, Wyo.

was westbound in a National Guard truck when he apparently got sleepy, and the truck drifted off the road, hitting the guard rail, the ISP dispatcher said.

Hart was treated at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center and released.

His two passengers, Phillip Streeter, 20, and Duane Streeter, 33, also of Wyoming, were taken to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center in Twin Falls. Phillip Streeter was reported in fair condition Thursday evening, and Duane Streeter was in guarded condition, according to a nursing supervisor.

As police were clearing that accident

from the roadway, 34-year-old Humberto Tellez of Heyburn approached the scene. When he slowed down, April Paquette, 20, of Rivendale, Utah, hit Tellez from behind, pushing his car into a field, the dispatcher said.

Paquette was then rear-ended by Jason Gray, 19, of Huntington, Ore. He was not injured but received a citation for following too close. Paquette was cited for inattentive driving, the dispatcher said.

Alicia Tellez, 32, was riding in the first car. She was taken to St. Benedict's Family Medical Center in Jerome and treated for minor injuries.

New flu strain means bad year

ATLANTA — Bad news about the coming flu season.

Doctors expect the harsh Beijing flu to hit the United States, and a new variant of that bug means most people won't have any natural immunity against it.

"Even though you were exposed to similar strains in the past, you might not be so able to defend yourself against this new one," Dr. Lone Simonsen of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said.

"It's very important to get the vaccine next fall."

The CDC reported Thursday that the newest bug emerged late in the 1992-93 flu season, killing the elderly and infecting people into May.

Officials brace for big gnat attack

TWIN FALLS — Swarms of blood-sucking buffalo gnats will return to infest the Magic Valley this summer.

This year will be the first time in 17 years that irrigation canals won't be chemically treated against black flies — also known as buffalo gnats.

The insecticide used to control the nasty little gnats no longer works, because the insects have developed an immunity to it, said Bob Stoltz, extension entomology specialist.

"Most people have forgotten what this can be like," said Sen. Laird Nob. He recalled driving back to Twin Falls from the South Hills one and encountering a swarm of

flies that was "like a canyon of those things going up the river."

Twin Falls County Commissioner Jim Fraley said that when he would cut hay in Murtaugh years ago, he sometimes had to wear a net over his face to work. Swarms of the gnats can make outdoor activity nearly impossible, he said.

Despite the flagging effectiveness of the pesticide, the flies did not cause any problems last year, Nob said. Maybe there won't be a problem this year either, he said.

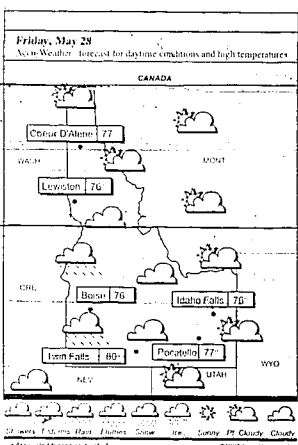
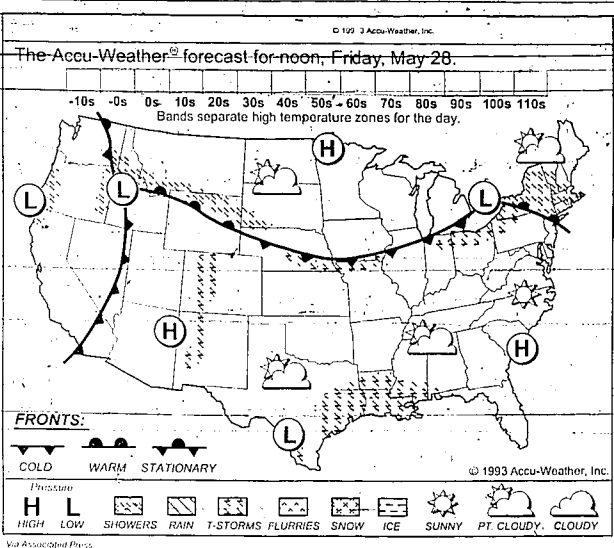
But if the population explodes, officials need to be ready to deal with the little pests.

Storms pummel North Dakota while Michigan shivers

Thunderstorms ripped through parts of North Dakota early Thursday and the temperature in Michigan dropped below freezing.

An overnight storm west of Bismarck, N.D., brought winds of 50 mph and heavy hail. Winds overturned two semi-trailers along the interstate, slightly injuring three people, authorities said.

A second storm near Lidgerwood, N.D., 55 miles southwest of Fargo, hammered the town with 60 mph winds, hail and heavy rain. Falling branches and uprooted trees knocked out power for about two hours.

Drizzle continued in parts of the state through daylight hours.

Jury told FBI faked pictures

BOISE (AP) — Jurors learned Thursday that the FBI staged photographs from the scene of last summer's deadly shootout at white separatist Randy Weaver's remote northern Idaho cabin.

FBI Special Agents Greg Rampton and Larry Wages testified in Weaver's murder-conspiracy trial that investigators did not tell defense attorneys that evidence from the area where Deputy U.S. Marshal William Degam was killed was taken away, then returned and photographed.

Rampton did not disclose that the photographs were staged even when he testified earlier this month.

"You knew before the trial that the pictures I had were reconstructed with FBI cross-examination the other day, isn't that true?" Weaver's attorney, Gerry Spence, asked Rampton during cross-examination Thursday.

"You never asked me about that, and I tried to stick with the questions you asked," Rampton replied.

U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge later agreed to admit the photos as defense exhibits after an extended shouting match between Spence and Assistant U.S. Attorney Ronald Howen.

"Even though you're angry right now and real upset, by 8 o'clock tomorrow morning you'll be here with cool heads," Lodge said.

Information kept from the defense became a major issue in the case on Tuesday when Howen admitted while jurors were outside the courtroom that the photos were fabricated. On Wednesday, Howen admitted learning eight weeks ago that the photos were staged.

Wages told jurors on Thursday — the trial's 28th day — that he told Howen about the photos in early April, a week before the trial began.

Weaver, 45, and Kevin Harris, 25, are charged with killing Degam during the Aug. 21 gunfight near Weaver's Ruby Ridge cabin. Marshals were trying to find a way to arrest Weaver on a 1991 fugitive warrant when the shooting started.

Weaver's 14-year-old son Samuel was killed in the initial exchange that started an 11-day siege. Weaver's wife Vicki, 42, was killed by a federal sniper the next day. No one is charged in either of their deaths.

Defense attorneys have argued throughout the six-week trial that the government concocted the case against Weaver and Harris to cover up a botched operation that left three people dead.

After Thursday's heated argument between Howen and Spence, Lodge ordered both sides to show up 30 minutes earlier each morning to agree on evidence to be submitted that day. He said debates over evidence were wasting time.

The judge said he had guaranteed jurors the trial would be over by mid-June and he was determined to stick to that deadline.

"I'm not opposed to going to night court if necessary," Lodge said.

He also disqualified a prosecution witness after Harris' attorney, David Nevin, argued that the testimony about previous behavior by Harris would be "nothing more than throwing mud on him and making him look bad in front of the jury."

Indoor life may be health hazard

WASHINGTON (AP) — If you suffer from indoor allergies, here are a few household hints:

Put up the walls-to-wall carpeting, wash bedclothes weekly in hot water and cover your mattress and pillows in plastic.

These tips were included in a 308-page report, released Thursday, that examined the magnitude of allergies and disease caused by indoor sources of allergens.

Americans spend 93 percent of their lives indoors, where exposure to dust mites, fungi, pet dander and cockroach feces may cause allergies, according to the study conducted by the Institute of Medicine, a non-profit health policy organization.

"Allergies play a key role in triggering some cases of asthma, and treatment for asthma-related illnesses costs more than \$6 billion a year," said Roy Patterson, a professor at Northwestern University's Medical School and chairman of the committee.

One in five Americans will experience allergies at some time during their lives, according to the report.

A significant number of those illnesses will be triggered by exposure to biological or chemical substances found indoors.

Although most cases will be mild or moderate, some people die from allergic diseases.

Oman of the Sawtooth National Forest to discuss the potential problem.

Without an effective control program the black fly population could explode this summer. The buffalo gnats — so called because of its resemblance to buffalo — are about one-fifth the size of a common house fly.

The gnats particularly bother livestock and make it impossible to raise them on salt licks, which raises sheep in the South Hills where the flies like to migrate after they hatch.

They attack the sheep's ears and drive them to distraction. In trying to avoid the irritation, the sheep try to get their heads under each other. They will around and won't eat or drink, Noh said.

At night the flies disappear, and then the sheep eat. But in the dark they get lost.

The gnats also bother cattle and horses, often turning their ears into a bloody mess. And they are suspected of carrying a viral livestock infection.

"The flies generally don't bite people. But they swarm around and get into eyes, nose, mouths and ears.

Like mosquitoes, the gnats need animal blood to complete their reproductive cycle. They lay their eggs on weeds in moving water. The larvae attach to pondweed along the edges of the stream and feed on microscopic organic matter carried by the water, Stoltz said.

The first batch already has hatched from local irrigation canals; another batch is expected to hatch in about a week, Noh said.

For years wool growers and other livestock owners have paid for a treatment program using the insecticide methoxychlor applied in the upper end of the Twin Falls canal system, where most of the flies seem to occur.

Clinton denies he's starstruck

President comments on Hollywood friends during talks with visitors

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton on Thursday bemoaned all the attention being paid to his precocious haircut and Hollywood friendships, telling 200 visitors at a White House town meeting that such things "don't amount to a hill of beans."

Clinton asserted that, overall, his administration was "doing pretty well, but I think we've done a lousy job of being able to cut through the fog that always surrounds this town and communicate that."

In a lively two-hour exchange with out-of-towners televised live on CBS, Clinton fielded a mix of questions that ranged from foreign policy to what he thinks about when he wakes up in the morning.

Clinton sought to put his Rose Garden guests at ease by joking about all the publicity over his pricey haircut in Los Angeles last week.

"I'm glad nobody found out about the manicure," the president said.

But he also was clearly sensitive that recent focus on his haircut, his ties to Hollywood producer Harry Thomason and the diamonds in the White House travel office had distracted attention from his economic plan and other major initiatives.

"You have to bend over backwards not to do things that you'd never even give a second thought to if you were a private citizen or a governor or a senator," Clinton told his guests. "Because they're going to be taken and blown all out of proportion and your whole image is going to be garbled by it."

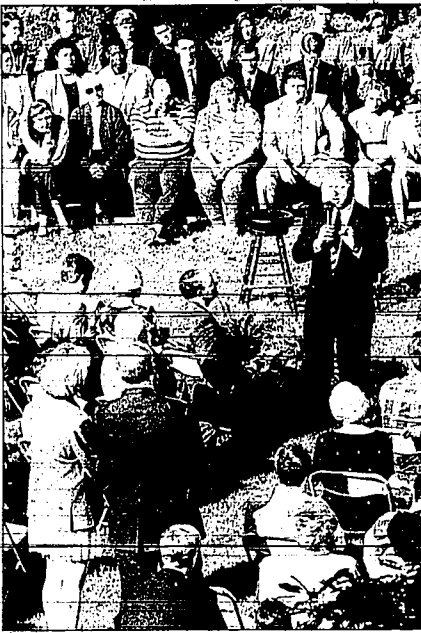
Calling the flap over his haircut "a boner" and "a mess up," Clinton said: "You just have to laugh it off and go on."

At another point, Clinton was asked whether he was "infatuated" with Hollywood and said "It's another thing where a little thing becomes big because it makes a good story. It doesn't amount to a hill of beans."

Clinton himself then asked if the administration had "gone Hollywood."

"The answer to that is no, heck no, never no. Never. Never."

Throwing back a bit of the criticism he's taken from the press, Clinton joked about some

microphone glitches during the town meeting, telling host Harry Smith, "If you were a politician and all these mikes went out, they'd say, 'Are you a failed network, are you a failed newscaster.'"

Clinton's first question from the audience went right to the heart of questions about the success of his administration.

Milwaukee lab technician Thomas

Haines told Clinton that his major initiatives on the economy and health care "look like they're going to be destined to be locked up in gridlock."

"I wouldn't be too discouraged," Clinton replied.

He said the current congressional battle over his budget bill was the "toughest thing" he'd face and that he expected "a much more open process" on health care.

Clinton said he expected better relations with Republicans in the future.

"I hate all this," he said. "I mean, I didn't run for president to get up and fight with the Republicans every day. It doesn't help America and I don't want to do it."

In matter-of-fact form, Clinton slipped in a major foreign policy announcement when a California woman asked his position on trade with China.

The president said he would extend favorable trade status to China for another year, to support its modernization efforts. At the same time, he insisted that the United States won't "turn our back" on human rights abuses there.

Clinton also said he's close to a compromise on gays in the military that could allow homosexuals to serve so long as they remain silent about their sexual orientation while on duty.

Offered fresh insights on his approach to health-care reform, saying he'd rather take the time to phase in a broad reform package "worth having" than quickly give people more limited protection "that's not worth a nickel."

Defended his shakeup of the White House travel office despite "glitches" in the way it was handled. He said it "wasn't an act of cynicism" to bring in a distant cousin to oversee the office.

The most offbeat question came from Janis Wagoner, an artist from Troy, Mich., who asked, "Mr. President, when you wake up in the morning, before you get out of bed, do you lie there and think what sort of little thing is going to happen today?"

"Some days I do," Clinton confessed.

He added, "Actually, when I get up in the morning, I say a little prayer that I won't make any stupid little mistakes and that I'll do right by 'America today.'"

The president got a backhanded vote of confidence from one man who said he'd come to the White House a little concerned about the president's performance.

"You've given me a lot more confidence," he said. "Thank you."

Study: Many hate crimes done just for the thrill

BOSTON (AP) — The incident was all too familiar. A black man walking home was assaulted by a group of whites.

"How do you like this, nigger?" the victim, 27-year-old Darryl James, recounted following Monday's attack in Boston's Charlestown section. "Don't come around here anymore."

Such examples of urban hate have many causes: growing tensions between racial and ethnic groups, increasing violence in society.

But two Northeastern University researchers say most offenders are young people not yet lost to hatred. Mostly, they commit their crimes for the thrill of it.

"What we are dealing with are kids who say, 'For fun, we're going to get someone who is different,'" said Jack McDevitt, associate director of the school's Center for Applied Social Research.

Simply dumping them in prison is not going to teach them that what they're doing is wrong.

McDevitt and Jack Levin, a sociologist and author of several books on prejudice, studied 169

cases filed with the Boston Police Community Disorder Unit during the past two years.

McDevitt, a criminologist, also has reviewed data from 11 other cities for the FBI. His conclusion: In many cases the victims of so-called hate crimes are interchangeable.

"It doesn't matter to a lot of these kids who their victim is," he said. "They are looking for someone different to attack."

The researchers classified nearly 60 percent of the cases as "thrill hate crimes" involving two or more attackers, usually teenagers. The researchers classified most remaining cases "reactive hate crimes," where someone considered an outsider is attacked for venturing into another group's area.

A third classification, "mission hate crimes," is committed by dedicated ideologues like neo-Nazis. McDevitt said those crimes were rare.

Interviews with the thrill crime offenders revealed that when the original target — a black or Asian — wasn't available, the group would seek out someone else, often homosexuals.

Air Force allocates heavy bombers to reserve units

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force announced dozens of changes in the makeup of war-fighting units at bases around the country Thursday, including the first shift of B-1B and B-52 heavy bombers to reserve units.

The changes, it said, are a result of base closings and realignments already under way as well as those expected to be approved by Congress and President Clinton this summer. Some of the changes are due to budget cuts, it said.

The Air Force announced last year that some bombers would be shifted to the reserves as part of an overall reduction and reorganization of the service. Until today the Air Force had not said exactly where the bombers would go.

—Air Force officials said they could not estimate how many B-1Bs and B-52s would be put in the reserves. They said there are 95 B-1Bs and about 134 B-52s in service now.

from Dobbins Air Reserve Base to Robins Air Force Base and convert to B-1B bombers. The Air Force said it has not decided exactly how many bombers would be put in the 11th or precisely when the change would be made.

The entire fleet of B-1B bombers — the most advanced heavy bomber now operating in the Air Force — has always been exclusively part of the active-duty Air Force.

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Survey shows puzzling nature of AIDS virus

WASHINGTON (AP) — Scientists may know more about HIV than about any other virus in history, but not enough.

To many researchers, it is just becoming clear how insidious the virus that causes AIDS really is.

Science, the journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, surveyed top AIDS researchers around the world and found that more than a decade of work by the best in the business, HIV remains a puzzle with no quick solution.

"Despite the high-powered arsenal of contemporary biology, there is nothing on the horizon remotely resembling a cure for AIDS," the journal reports in the issue published today. "Nor is there anything like a workable vaccine."

Researchers have made remarkable progress. Since 1983, scientists have identified the human immunodeficiency virus and learned that it targets human white blood cells, CD4 helper T-lymphocytes, essential to the immune system.

It is known that the CD4 cells decline as the AIDS infection takes hold. Scientists have identified the proteins of the virus and what jobs they perform inside human cells during the life cycle of the AIDS virus.

And some drugs with limited value have been developed. But there remain more questions

than answers, the survey showed. "This disease has been trying to tell us for a long time that it's complex," said Anthony Fauci, head of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, the lead agency in the U.S. government's war on AIDS.

Science got responses from 74 researchers, including Fauci, Jonas Salk, who developed a polio vaccine, and the co-discoverers of HIV, Robert Gallo of the National Institutes of Health, and Luc Montagnier of the Pasteur Institute.

The researchers said these are the main questions that need to be answered to cure AIDS:

1. What causes the collapse of the immune system in AIDS patients?

"This question was cited as far and away the most important," reports Jon Cohen of Science magazine.

It's still unclear exactly how the AIDS virus kills CD4 helper T-lymphocytes. Some believe the HIV kills the cells directly. Other experts say the virus may use indirect means, even perhaps by tricking the CD4 cells into committing suicide, a process called apoptosis.

2. How can HIV replication be controlled?

To control a virus, it must be kept from reproducing. Right now, the only licensed HIV drugs, including AZT, ddI and ddC, all attack one phase of the virus life cycle. And the virus seems to be able to change so

these drugs become less effective. Researchers say a weak point in the life cycle of HIV must be found.

3. What part of the immune system needs to be boosted to vaccinate against HIV?

Since HIV attacks the immune system, it is not clear how the body can be coaxed into protecting itself in the way polio vaccines train the body to defend itself against polio virus. Vaccines tested so far seem to boost only one part of the immune system and protection seems to wane quickly.

4. Can combination therapy overcome drug resistance?

Researchers believe it very important to find a combination of drugs that kills the virus before it can change and become resistant.

5. What are the best targets in the viral life cycle for therapy?

This, again, relates to finding a weak spot in the HIV cycle that can be attacked by drugs.

6. Will immunotherapies like vaccines work?

Many researchers believe AIDS

will never be "cured." People infected will always have the virus in their bodies. The quest is for a therapy that keeps the virus quiet and under control as long as possible. One approach is to find vaccines that permanently suppress the virus.

7. Can drugs target HIV in the lymph nodes?

Studies show that HIV hides and reproduces in the lymph nodes and researchers believe it can be controlled only by drugs that work in those glands.

8. How is HIV transmitted sexually, maternally and intravenously?

Though the ways the infection is spread are known, the precise mechanism, on a molecular level, is still unclear.

9. Can the immune system be reconstituted after infection?

This question deals with how the body's defenses can be restored once HIV infection and viral population is reduced. There is some concern that even if HIV is controlled, the body may never be able to recover.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States suspended most aid to Guatemala Thursday in response to the assumption of dictatorial powers by President Jorge Serrano.

State Department spokesman Richard Boucher said the suspension involved all cash transfers to the Guatemalan government and military education and training programs. Police training was suspended as well.

Employers would bear biggest burden in health care plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton will try to make all employees from the biggest corporations to the smallest sandwich shop, carry most of the load of paying for guaranteed health care for all Americans.

The centerpiece of his reform package will be a mandate on employers to provide insurance for all workers, either through a new, Social Security-like payroll levy or a requirement that they buy all their workers health policies.

Clinton and his team are still wrestling with the final details of the plan, which officials have said privately could raise overall health costs by at least \$40 billion, and possibly twice as much.

The president said Thursday that he prefers phasing in a broad package of benefits rather than giving people something overnight that's not worth a nickel.

The White House, already facing a hard sell with Congress on tax hikes to reduce the annual budget deficit, is trying to minimize the need for new taxes in health reform.

A payroll levy aside, the administration is pondering other sources of money for the plan it is expected to submit to Congress next month.

New taxes on tobacco seem a certainty.

now spend subsidizing charity care for the uninsured.

Other possibilities include taxing a portion of employee health benefits that exceed the comprehensive package guaranteed all Americans and a windfall profits tax on hospitals and other providers.

The rationale for the last is that the providers will be collecting more fees from newly insured patients and saving both money and time in a streamlined system.

Earlier suggestions for a value added tax, or national sales tax, and taxes on health insurance premiums have been discarded, according to officials.

Health economist Marilyn Moon of the Urban Institute says just doubling the cigarette tax to 48 cents from 24 cents would generate \$1 billion to \$5 billion a year. Some lawmakers and health groups are pushing for a \$1- or \$2-a-pack tax.

But "the main funding mechanism" for health reform will be the employer mandate, gradually phased in, said a senior official who asked not to be identified.

Clinton must decide whether to make employers pay a premium as a fixed percentage of payroll or bear the costs of buying an actual policy for each worker.

White House officials have suggested a wage-based premium could be in the 7 to 8 percent range, comparable to what businesses now pay for Social Security and Medicare. The actual amount would vary from state to state.

In addition, workers might have to contribute 2 to 3 percent of their wages. They would also be responsible for copayments and deductibles.

These premiums, funneled directly to local insurance-purchasing cooperatives, would replace the premiums that most businesses and workers already pay.

Clinton said Thursday that any new payroll premium "would not be a tax over and above what people are paying now."

A wage-based premium would be easier for small businesses to swallow. Instead of trying to buy a \$5,000 family policy for a \$15,000-a-year worker, an owner might pay just 8 percent of \$15,000, or \$1,200, for the same coverage.

And even that payroll levy would be phased in, starting at perhaps 3 percent in 1996 and moving up 1 percentage point a year, the senior official said.

But businesses with well-paid workers could wind up paying more for health care.

"If you're a law firm and the average salary is \$60,000, you will be

well aware that you're subsidizing other people's workers as well as your own," said Moon.

Clinton advisers say that if they select the alternative of requiring each company to buy a policy for each worker, they would have to build in large subsidies for firms with low-wage workers.

In any event, health reform will be "a zero sum game," said Robert D. Reischauer, the director of the Congressional Budget Office, with insurance costs falling for companies with older, sicker work forces and rising for those with healthier, younger workers.

Clinton plans to require insurers to switch to community-wide rating and bar them from denying coverage to sick people or charging them more.

Health reform could be a boon for automakers and steel companies saddled with health costs running as high as 20 percent of payroll.

But the Clinton administration won't let corporate America pocket all the savings, at least not immediately.

Just as the coverage mandate will be phased in on companies that now offer no insurance, firms paying above average amounts for health insurance will be allowed to scale back their contributions only gradually, the senior official said.

Whatever the costs of the Clinton health plan, the president must "never

let people forget the cost of doing nothing," argues Sen. Jay Rockefeller, D-W.Va.

Health costs are rising \$80 billion to \$100 billion a year, and a family of four now spending \$4,000 for health

insurance will face a bill of \$14,000 in the year 2000 if costs stay on their current trajectory, said Rockefeller.

If that happens, "the cost and damage to people's lives is incalculable."

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Candidate Clinton promised no tax boost

WASHINGTON (AP) — Candidate Bill Clinton said he could provide health insurance for everybody and curtail medical costs without raising taxes.

"He's discovered he can't."

"Believe it or not, we can do it for less than we're spending if we have the courage to reform the system," the candidate said in Los Angeles last September.

Clinton still aims for big savings over the long haul by changing the way Americans buy health insurance and medical care.

But White House officials now acknowledge that reform will impose tens of billions of dollars in new costs on the private sector, individuals and the government.

Then-President Bush accused Clinton last year of trying to push the country toward "socialized medicine."

Bush, who favored malpractice and insurance re-

formed and vouchers for the poor, charged that if Clinton won, "within a year the government will run health care in this country and our health care system will combine the efficiency of the House post office with the compassion of the KGB."

Clinton countered that Bush had

presided "over the biggest explosion in health care costs in history" and had done nothing to stop it.

Clinton, during the primaries, initially backed the "play or pay" approach to force companies to insure workers or pay a new, unspecified payroll tax.

But after capturing the nomination, he became a convert to the idea of managed competition, coupled with a cap on health spending set by a national health board.

"This is a private system. It is not play or pay. It does not require new taxes. It will preserve what is best about the present health care system," Clinton said last Sept. 24 at the New Jersey headquarters of Merck & Co., the pharmaceutical giant.

The heart of managed competition is the creation of big, new insurance purchasing pools with the clout to demand lower prices and better care from doctors and hospitals.

If you ever get an opportunity to fight with someone over prayer at graduation, please respectfully decline. It just ain't that big a deal.

The two-policies toward Bosnia were exposed in a graphic way the other day when Peter Tarnoff, the No. 3 man in the State Department, discussed the true policy at a luncheon with a group of reporters on condition that he not be identified. The New York Times later identified him.

Tarnoff described a far more limited American role in the world than in the Cold War years. He said that while Ameri-

ca had paid only lip service to the notion of collective security during the Cold War, the new administration truly believes in it.

The new approach is "not different by accident, it's different by design," Tarnoff said.

The White House pretended to be shocked. His remarks were disputed by White House spokeswoman Dee Dee Myers, who insisted Tarnoff did not speak for the administration.

Take that with a grain of salt. The White House is trying to perpetuate the fiction that there is no change in policy, while in fact there is a dramatic change.

Tarnoff was trying to tell the truth about

what is going on. He talked about the real policy. Myers was playing politics.

It's easy enough to see the transparent falsity of the White House denials. The facts speak for themselves.

The White House itself insisted Clinton wanted air strikes and the arming of the Bosnian Muslims. The Europeans didn't. Whose policy was adopted? The Europeans. Case closed.

Clinton foreign policy radically different from Cold War era

President Clinton has initiated one of the most fundamental changes in American foreign policy in 45 years, but doesn't want to admit it.

Clinton wants you to think he's tough in the clutches like Ronald Reagan in Grenada, or George Bush in Iraq or maybe Richard Nixon in the 1971 Christmas bombing of North Vietnam. He's not.

Clinton is initiating a post-Cold War policy built on the principle of sharing international responsibility with America's principal industrial-world allies.

The time-honored Cold War American role of world policeman is out. International cooperation — even if results are sloppy — is in.

The premise that America has all the answers is out. The idea that America's allies can take the lead is in.

Clinton is looking for consensus with allies, even if he has to buy some ideas he doesn't like.

This is new. It is not like any other presidential policy since 1945. It is meant to face the fact the Cold War is over and the United States doesn't have to do all the things it believed it has had to do since the end of World War II.

In fact, it is about time the international community shared the burdens of playing world cop.

U.N. says town is unsuitable

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — The designated "safe area" for Bosnian Muslims in Srebrenica is so lacking in shelter and sanitation it wouldn't qualify as a refugee camp elsewhere in the world, a U.N. official said Thursday.

"The problem with Srebrenica is not that it's a refugee camp, as others in the rest of the world are," John McMillan of the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees told reporters. "There's no adequate shelter, there's no food, water, sanitation."

Tens of thousands of people, mostly refugees who fled fighting elsewhere in eastern Bosnia, are in Srebrenica, which is surrounded by Serb forces.

Cdr. Barry Brewer, spokesman for U.N. peacekeepers in Sarajevo, said there was a danger of epidemics in the area, about 45 miles northeast of the capital.

The United Nations declared Srebrenica a safe area last month to prevent it falling completely to the Serbs, who control about 70 percent of Bosnian territory.

Under a new U.S.-European peace initiative soon to be considered by the U.N. Security Council, Srebrenica would be one of six expanded safe areas guarded by U.N. peacekeeping troops.

For now, it remains a shell-battered skeleton of a town lacking drinking water, shelter and basic sanitation.

Brewer said Thursday that battles were reported on the front line northeast and southeast of the town.

He said Serbs south of Srebrenica would not let U.N. officials work on a water plant supplying the town. Low pressure meant people had to wait two to three hours for water, he added.

Conditions also are grim in at least two other proposed safe areas in eastern Bosnia — the mountain enclave of Zepa and the town of Gorazde. Conditions are better in the other three intended safety zones — Sarajevo and Tuzla in central Bosnia, and Bihac in the northwest.

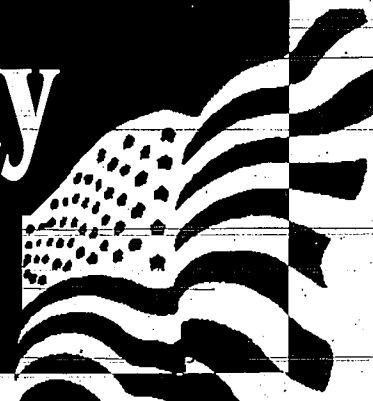
Srebrenica has come to symbolize the plight of Muslim refugees in Bosnia's 13-month-old war.

Last month, after a prolonged Serb artillery bombardment, Muslim-led military leaders agreed to a cease-fire that amounted to the town's surrender.

Bosnia's Muslim-led government has flatly rejected the idea of safe areas contained in the latest peace initiative, proposed by the United States, Russia, Spain, France and Britain.

Blast near Italian museum kills 6

FLORENCE, Italy (AP) — A car bomb meant to spread terror in an already tense nation exploded near one of the world's great museums Thursday.

The blast killed six people and heavily damaged the Uffizi Gallery and some of its masterpieces.

At least 26 people were injured, four of them seriously. The bomb — Italy's second in two weeks — went off just after 1 a.m. in front of an archaic building that abuts the west wing of the Uffizi. The blast blew legs and a hand off statues and flying shards of glass from shattered gallery windows tore into on-lookers.

Six buildings, including the archives, were gutted by the explosion, which carved a crater, 10 feet wide and more than 6 feet deep in the street and alarmed thousands of tourists and others taking late strolls on a warm night.

Police had no leads, but were exploring a possible connection with a May 14 bombing in Rome that they've tied to the Mafia.

A terror attack at the center of one of Italy's main tourist attractions could harm what was seen as a promising tourist season. The law dollar and the Persian Gulf War have kept visitors away for several years.

"We are leaving tomorrow, but if we were staying, this would make a big difference," said Kevin Stevens,

a tourist from Atlanta. "At least we got to see the Uffizi."

Tension has mounted in Italy over the past 15 months because of a series of scandals that have implicated hundreds of the political and business elite. Over the past year, Mafia bombings killed the country's top two investigators, and counterblows by the state resulted in the arrest of the mob's top two reputed bosses.

Glass from dozens of shattered Uffizi windows littered the courtyard between the two main wings of the U-shaped museum.

"Tomorrow?" asked a wistful foreign tourist pressing against the steel barricades that cut in half Piazza Signoria, the square that has been Florence's heart since the 13th century.

"Months, months," a security guard told the young woman as the two congregated in their only common language, pidgin English.

Uffizi director Anna Maria Tofani said Italy's most famous museum would be closed "certainly for months" and that millions of dollars in damage had been caused.

Florence's art superintendent, Antonio Paolucci, said 20 paintings and a few sculptures were damaged.

Britain's Major fires Cabinet member

LONDON — Seeking to boost his government's fading fortunes, Prime Minister John Major dumped embattled treasury chief Norman Lamont Thursday in a Cabinet shake-up.

Major named Home Secretary Kenneth Clarke, a combative politician, as Chancellor of the Exchequer in place of Lamont, who has been under fire for Britain's 2½-year recession and dogged by questions about his personal life.

The prime minister also made three other changes in his 22-member Cabinet, including bringing in one new member, right-winger John Redwood, as Welsh Secretary.

Major's 10 Downing St. office said the moves were "intended to refresh the government."

Poland debates government policies

WARSAW — Poland's Parliament debated a no-confidence motion against Prime Minister Hanna Suchocka's year-old government Thursday after the Solidarity movement declared that post-Communist reforms have hurt too many people.

The vote, scheduled for today, is being brought by the same people who put Ms. Suchocka in power. No clear alternative to her government has emerged.

The coalition government, with only about 185 votes in the 460-member Sejm, cannot survive unless some deputies break ranks with the opposition. The opposition must muster at least 231 votes for the no-confidence vote to pass and tallies, Thursday put the vote very close.

Solidarity has threatened a nationwide general strike if the no-confidence motion fails.

Germans struggle with economy

BONN, Germany (AP) — Chancellor Helmut Kohl's government said Thursday that Germany is in its worst economic crisis since World War II, and revealed plans to slash spending on everything from social benefits to shipyard subsidies.

Germany is struggling to pull itself out of an economic pit caused by a persistent recession and heavy borrowing to pay for unification.

Newspapers had reported Germany was so strapped for money that Kohl planned to slash spending next year.

A speech by Finance Minister Theo Waigel in the Bundestag, the lower house of Parliament, confirmed those reports.

"At the moment we are experiencing the worst economic crisis since the founding of the Federal Republic of Germany," Waigel said. The country was formed in 1949, from the rubble of Nazi Germany.

The government, Waigel announced, has decided to clamp a moratorium on new federal spending in 1994.

If it can get the opposition Social Democrats to go along, Waigel said the government also wants to slash 20 billion marks, or about \$12 billion, from next year's budget.

No federal programs would escape the government's cost-cutting hatchet.

"That goes also for areas which have been considered taboo," said Waigel, including social benefits, salaries for government workers, tax writeoffs, and subsidies for coal, shipbuilding and farming.

Waigel said even the government's move to Berlin may have to be delayed. The *Bild* newspaper said the move will have to wait until the next century.

"No one is going to be pleased with our proposals," Waigel said.

Later Thursday the Bundestag adopted a separate economic package — called the "Solidarity Pact" — that will impose a 7.5 percent income tax surcharge in 1995 to help defray the cost of unification.

Forest Service closes part of Redfish to help salmon

STANLEY - The Forest Service has closed a portion of the shore of Redfish Lake to protect gravel salmon spawning beds.

About 1,800 feet of shoreline between the public boat ramp and the Sockeyes Campground on the east side of the lake will remain closed year-round.

Because of boats and foot traffic on the shoreline are breaking down banks and the material is silting up the gravel shoals used by salmon for spawning.

Sockeye salmon have been declared an endangered species. Idaho Department of Fish and Game plans to release 10 pair of captive breeding sockeye and fry and fingerlings in 1994 into the lake.

After spawning and rearing habitat areas have been identified in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area and will be protected as well.

Judge rejects suit over false drug charge

TWIN FALLS - A judge has thrown out a Twin Falls woman's \$1 million lawsuit stemming from a mistaken drug indictment.

Although Carmela Ann Miller's name appeared in December 1991 on a felony drug indictment and a criminal-arrest warrant intended for Carmen Elaine Miller, she is not entitled to damages from the city, county or state, 5th District Magistrate R. Barry Wood ruled.

An all-day sweep of dozens of drug

trafficking suspects failed to net either woman, and Carmela Miller's name was published in the next morning's Times-News as one of several people indicted, but not arrested.

Outraged, Carmela Miller and her husband, Twin Falls police detective Tim Miller, went to the Magic Valley Drug Task Force office to rectify the error.

Not only was Carmela Miller's name and date of birth on the arrest warrant, a copy of her driver's license photo also was included, Drug agents acknowledged that she was not the person they were looking

for, but they refused to publish a retraction in The Times-News.

Meanwhile, Carmen Elaine Miller - who has the same date of birth as Carmela Miller - turned herself in to police after reading the newspaper story.

She later pleaded guilty to one count of delivering cocaine and was given a suspended 1 1/2 year prison sentence and two years probation.

Information about the "wrong" Miller apparently got into the file when officer Joanne Loveland ran a driver's check on Carmen Elaine Miller but provided the

Idaho Bureau of Narcotics with Carmela Ann Miller's photograph and driver's license information.

Carmela Miller filed a tort claim against the city and county of Twin Falls and the Idaho Bureau of Narcotics, which had primary responsibility for the Carmen Miller case.

When that claim went unanswered, Miller sued, claiming her reputation was damaged by the publication of her name after a negligent investigation.

Eastland stumps for support

TWIN FALLS - The Republican gubernatorial primary is a year away, but that didn't faze Boise businessman Larry Eastland Thursday as he stumped the Magic Valley for support in his bid for governor.

Eastland, a longtime GOP activist who most recently led Idaho's term-limits campaign, says he wants to lead "a new generation of Republicans" into state government.

"This is really a changing of the guard," the 50-year-old candidate said.

Two decisions by two prominent Democrats have fueled politicians' eagerness to start Campaign '94 earlier than usual. Gov. Cecil Andrus has opted not seek a fifth term, and Attorney General Larry Ichofflew, by most accounts the strongest potential Democratic nominee, announced in February he would not run for governor.

Eastland, former state GOP Chairman Phil Batt, and Boise developer Chuck Winder already have begun running for the Republican nomination. House Speaker Mike Simpson of Blackfoot has named a campaign treasurer and is expected to announce officially this summer.

Other Republicans rumored to be looking at a gubernatorial run include insurance executive Gerald Tyler and Port of Lewiston manager Ron McMurtry.

Three veteran legislators are expected to contend for the Democratic nomination: Sen. John Peewey of Carey, former Sen. Mike Burkett of Boise, and former Sen. Ron Beilspacher of Grangeville.

Tax activist and 1 Percent Initiative promoter Ron Rankin of Coeur d'Alene has said he may run as an independent.

In an interview with The Times-News Thursday, Eastland said he and Batt have been lining up support for months, and broadly hinted at Simpson and others that the starting gate may have closed.

"He who hesitates is lost this time around," he said. "Whoever waits is not going to have a chance to run from."

Eastland's supporters include Rep. Mark Stubbs of Twin Falls; former Attorney General Jim Jones, a Jerome native; former Twin Falls County Councilman Dave Munoz of Buhl; and longtime Republican worker Orrie Sinclair of Twin Falls.

Eastland said his campaign will emphasize new ideas for making government more efficient and responsive to people. For example, he said he would require state agencies to compete with private companies for state business.

He also would freeze state hiring, which he claimed would save \$40 million, and use the money to buy computers and other, high-tech equipment for schools. He endorsed the concept of outcome-based education, and said schools should be given incentives to meet or exceed state academic standards.

Eastland said he opposes so-called "special rights" for homosexuals but does not favor the anti-gay rights initiative being sponsored by the Idaho Citizens Alliance.

"What this campaign is going to do is inflame a community that has learned to be tolerant, if not accepting, of different lifestyles," he said.

BOISE - Motorists in Idaho will spend less money for gasoline on Memorial Day weekend than a year ago, but more than the week prior, the American Automobile Association of Idaho says.

While pump prices in Idaho and across the nation are at their highest level this year, they have actually been very moderate for the past several months. AAA Idaho spokesman Dave Carlson said. Prices took a seasonal dip early in the year and are starting to rise as summer approaches.

Based on a survey of 87 Idaho gas outlets, the average price for a gallon of self-serve unleaded gas was \$1.16 on Tuesday. That is up 3.6 cents since Easter, but 4 cents less than a year ago.

Twin Falls seeks changes in E911 system

TWIN FALLS - The City Council is just about ready to commit \$225,000 for dispatching services in a regional enhanced 911 phone system.

But before council members sign off, they want the E911 board of directors to promise two things:

System dispatchers will be at least as qualified as the ones now working at the Twin Falls Police Department.

A note in the four-county joint powers agreement demanding that the dispatch center be located north of the Snake River will be taken out.

But the city might get only one of its wishes, Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman, chairman of the E911 board of directors, said Thursday afternoon.

Minimum qualifications for dispatchers will be drafted, Hempleman said.

But striking the requirement for the dispatch center's location might not be possible yet, he said.

A commissioner each from Gooding, Jerome and Lincoln County serve on the regional board and the majority probably won't agree to allowing the dispatch south of the Snake River just yet, Hempleman said.

"They don't object to doing it a little later, but not right now," he said.

"Twin Falls City had drafted a letter of commitment to the regional board, but at a special council meeting Thursday afternoon, Councilwoman Pam Dowd said she wanted an agreement on dispatcher qualifications.

Dowd said that of the city's current eight dispatchers, all are certified by the

Peace Officers Standards and Training academy and that seven of the eight dispatchers are certified at the highest level. The eighth dispatcher is one level below, Dowd said.

"I would hate to see Twin Falls take a backward step. I want a written guarantee of a minimum level of work," Dowd said.

Councilman Jim Vickers said he wanted the provision prohibiting a dispatch center outside of Jerome County or Wendell taken out of the joint powers agreement.

Conditions change and over the course of many years, prohibiting a dispatch center south of the river might cause problems, he said.

"Who knows what the needs of southern Idaho are going to be in 50 years?" he said. "We'd be remiss if we didn't try to..."

Air Force: General's transfer isn't punishment

TWIN FALLS - Mountain Home Wing Commander Gen. William Hinton is being groomed for a promotion, not castigated for being outspoken, an Air Force spokesman said Thursday.

Suggestions that Hinton is being transferred because of any disagreement with Defense Department statements about

a proposed bombing range in Owyhee County are "absolutely false," said Col. Mike Gallagher, public affairs director of the Air Combat Command at Langley Air Force Base in Virginia.

Hinton is being transferred to serve as a special assistant to Gen. John M. Loh, commander of the Air Combat Command. He will serve with Loh a few months, before attending a six-week general's school, Gallagher said.

That is a common practice in the Air Force, he said. After completing the school, Hinton will be assigned to a yet-to-be announced position.

Hinton last week said publicly that a General Accounting Office report inaccurately represented a Department of Defense response that questioned the need for the state's proposed range. The statement was not from "senior officer level" at the Pentagon and does not reflect

the position of the Defense Department or the Air Force, Hinton said.

The Defense Department did not agree.

Two Pentagon spokesmen said the statement in the GAO report was written by the department and represents the department's position. "The responses that appeared at the back of the GAO report expresses the Department of Defense position," said Jim Turner, a department spokesman in the Pentagon.

Citizens volunteer to fight neighborhood crime

SPOKANE (AP) — For years, high crime rates have earned the West Central neighborhood the nickname Felony Flats.

But the low- and moderate-income neighborhood was galvanized when two neighborhood girls were abducted in 1991, turning its anger into action by starting its own crime-fighting effort.

When told the city had no money for more police officers, residents opened a police substation in a building donated by a neighborhood businessman. They volunteered time to staff it and trained themselves to defuse disputes before they escalate into conflicts requiring police intervention.

A year after the COPS West substation opened, residents say they're winning the fight for their neighborhood and boosting their collective self-image.

They're also drawing attention from a statewide law enforcement group that's launched a program to promote community-oriented policing across Washington.

"It will take some time to change the attitude that this is Felony Flats," said Patti Kelly-Boese, who lives across the street from the substation and opens her home to troubled teenagers needing temporary shelter. "But now we've had a reclaiming of the neighborhood. People are fixing up their homes, and they're proud."

Earlier this century, the West Central area was one of the city's prominent neighborhoods.

The reputation withered as homes aged and were turned into rentals. The area drew residents who didn't stay in one place long and allowed conditions to deteriorate, said Tim Conley, the Spokane Police Department's community resources officer for the neighborhood.

The neighborhood experienced

increases in all types of crime — domestic violence, burglaries, drugs, assaults — culminating in the abductions of 11-year-old Nikki Wood and 12-year-old Rebecca West in October 1991. Wood's body was later found north of the city. West is still missing.

The tragedy drew neighbors together in collective anger as never before, said Cheryl Steele, president of the COPS West substation. Activists sent out 4,200 surveys to

West Central households and found that about half had been victimized by crime in the neighborhood, Steele said.

"What we found is that most people here are good people living in fear and isolation," Steele said.

When they came to the city council with a proposal, they didn't come in hand.

"They thought we were going to ask for money," Steele said.

Instead, they told councilors they

had found a vacant building that could be used as a police substation. A business owner who donated the former flower shop leases it to the city for \$1 a year.

Metropolitan Mortgage and Securities Co. Inc. furnished building materials and completed design work for remodeling, while the local Building Trades Council recruited members to provide labor.

Fund raising and work by neighborhood volunteers led to the

substation's opening in May 1992. The only public utility spent for the substation covered paperwork costs, Conley said.

Organizers gathered information on other community-policing efforts but largely tailored their own program, Steele said.

Their intention wasn't to create the impression of a massive police presence, Steele said. Instead, it was to convince residents they could solve their own problems rather than looking only for police help.

"We decided we would put a substation in our neighborhood that wouldn't chase people off," she said.

More than 160 volunteers staff the substation seven days a week, 10 hours a day. Members sign up for shifts weeks ahead of time.

Before they can sit behind the substation's desk and work the phones, staff members take a 20-hour training program from police officers who volunteer their time.

At the station, volunteers take reports on everything from front-yard arguments to missing pets to crime tips. The intent is to prevent problems from escalating into crime, Steele said. Residents still rely on police help when it's warranted, and guard against headless meddling in their neighbors' private affairs.

Conley and other police officers regularly stop at the substation to fill out crime reports and check with volunteers on potential problems.

When a pizza delivery worker was shot and killed two blocks from the substation last August, volunteers received 18 tips from residents. The information led police to arrest four suspects within two days.

The substation also collected information that led to the return of 10 stolen bicycles, Conley said.

With police resources limited, the volunteers are vital, he said.

"They know who the bad guys are and they know when they're out there," he said. "If we don't work with them, we're going to miss that information. The police department can't be an army of occupation."

The substation has also grown into a community gathering place. A network of social service organizations offers classes at the station on topics including anger management and money management, and the neighborhood Boy Scout troop has found a new meeting place. Many residents stop by the station just to make small talk with volunteers.

The area's success isn't going unnoticed. Several Spokane neighborhoods are interested in setting up similar substations.

Meanwhile, the Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs is promoting community-oriented policing as an alternative to more traditional strategies such as hiring more officers, increasing criminal penalties and putting new laws on the books.

Programs in Spokane and elsewhere in the state have shown that effective crime-fighting programs don't have to be expensive, said Mukiteo Police Chief Jon Walters, who serves as chairman of WASPCA's community-policing committee.

With that in mind, the law enforcement association last year helped create the Washington State Institute for Community-Oriented Policing, a program to promote new crime-fighting strategies statewide and exchange information on what techniques are most successful.

The institute is a joint project of the association, the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission, the University of Washington and Lincoln State University.

Businesses oppose Sho-Ban tax proposal

FORT HALL (AP) — Shoshone-Bannock officials appear determined to impose an 18-cent-a-pack tax on cigarettes sold at tribal stores.

But business representatives testifying Wednesday at tribal Tax Commission hearings warned that imposing the tax Jan. 1 would hurt business on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation.

"If you need to raise revenue, there's a better way to do it," said Mike Stammer, manager of the Bannock Peak Truck Stop at Arbon, west of Pocatello.

The Shoshone-Bannock operate three outlets — two stores at Fort Hall and another at Arbon — where cigarettes are sold at discount prices. The cigarettes are cheaper, in part, because the state does not charge its

own 18-cent-a-pack cigarette tax, or its 5 percent sales tax.

But tribal Tax Commission Chairman Claudio Broncho said the state is to blame.

Legislators have considered removing the tax exemptions on reservation cigarette sales to non-Indians. In 1989, the issue reached the House floor, where lawmakers soundly defeated a bill to repeal the exemption.

This year, a bill surfaced that would have restricted tax-exempt sales to tribal members. It didn't get far, but Broncho believes the exemption eventually will be lifted and the tribe should impose its own tax first.

But the proposed plan extends beyond the tribal stores to private

businesses operating on the reservation, including the Pocatello airport. In a policy center to trigger a confrontation with the state, the tribe plans to impose its own tax even though those businesses already pay state taxes.

Broncho says that's only fair since the state and counties draw taxes from the reservation and still expect Fort Hall authorities to provide services.

"We are trying to self-govern and taxation is one of the ways we're trying to go in this direction," he said. "Everything that a county has, we have too."

He declined to estimate how much revenue would be generated by the tax, which must be approved by the Fort Hall Business Council, the

Bureau of Indian Affairs and Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt.

Fort Hall Business Council member Marvin Osborne agreed with business operators that increasing the price of cigarettes would remove an incentive for shopping at tribal stores.

"We would really be diminishing our base of business," Osborne said, and Stammer likened the proposal to "cutting your arm off to save your finger."

He said a 5-percent across-the-board sales tax would be more fair than targeting cigarette sales and would raise more money for tribal services.

Lee Kniffin, who owns the Smoke Signal south of Blackfoot, argued that imposing a tribal tax would impede Fort Hall's economic development.

"My main concern is keeping these businesses open," he said. "We just have to be careful how we do it. Every move has to be thought out and thought out thoroughly."

Willy Dixey, who is running for the Fort Hall Business Council in Friday's election, questioned taxing local small businesses to make a point with the state.

"I could see taxing those people if the state wasn't taking its share," Dixey said. "It's just like a shark eating a small fish."

New school would be near land owned by employees

BRIGHAM CITY, Utah (AP) — The Box Elder school board has decided to build a \$3 million school despite some residents' concerns that a district teacher and principal own property near the site.

The plans have some residents questioning whether the school board has acted improperly by voting in a few minutes before Wednesday night's vote to disclose that Box Elder High School Principal Jay Stuart and teacher Steven Leggett own land near the site.

Land records show Stuart owns 11 acres directly across from where the district will build a school to replace Lincoln Elementary. Leggett and his family own 40 acres nearby.

School Board President Shirleen Peck told a standing-room-only crowd it did not matter that longtime employees have property near the new site.

The district purchased its land in July 1962 with the intent to build a new school as the northwest side expanded.

The plans went no further for

three decades, until this spring, when the board's proposed issuing a \$28.5-million bond, \$3 million of which would be earmarked for building a new Lincoln Elementary on the vacant property.

Some residents near the school, built in 1912, are worried that moving Lincoln to another site will lower property values and decay the neighborhood.

But others say the new site, which has nearly seven acres rather than three at the old site, would offer more room for classrooms and a playground.

Stuart, who has worked for the district for more than 25 years, said he did nothing to prompt consideration of the site near his land. "It's ludicrous to think I've got a conflict of interest. I don't make decisions for the district. If I was a school board member, or a district superintendent, that would be different. But I'm just an ordinary citizen," Stuart said.

"I'd probably sell it if I could make any money off it, but I doubt that's the case," the principal said.

Convicted murderer sentenced to death

BOISE (AP) — A migrant worker was sentenced to death on Thursday for the first-degree murder of a Fruitland convenience store clerk.

Aurelio Moya Barajas, 33, was automatically sentenced by 3rd District Judge Gerald Weston to another 15 to 30 years in prison for the June 1992 robbery of the Perk and Pack store where clerk Sherril Jean McDonald, 48, died after her throat had been slashed.

Barajas, a Mexican national whose last known address was Fresno,

Calif., became the 23rd convicted murderer on Idaho's Death Row. His conviction and sentence will be automatically reviewed by the state Supreme Court, but his trial attorneys want to be replaced because neither has any experience with death penalty cases.

Idaho has not executed anyone since 1957, but defense and prosecuting attorneys believe numerous appellate decisions on existing death penalty cases had created the prospect for an execution

within as little as a year. Barajas was convicted last Feb. 4 by a jury of nine women and three men, to a great extent on the basis of genetic testimony. He was arrested the day after the slaying.

An expert testified during the four-day trial that blood on the knife found in Barajas' car matched McDonald's, based on DNA testing. McDonald had been working with flour while preparing some food at the store, and police found flour on some of the money in Barajas' car.

Minor quake rattles remote southwestern Utah

KANAB, Utah (AP) — A minor earthquake shook a remote area along the Utah-Arizona border near Kanab Thursday morning, but there were no reports of damage or injury.

The University of Utah

Seismograph Stations reported the tremor, registering magnitude 3.5 on the Richter scale, occurred at 12:21 a.m. MDT. The epicenter of the quake was 23 miles east of Kanab, beneath Buckskin Mountain.

The Kane County Sheriff's Department said it had no reports of the quake being felt by area residents. The border region has sustained damaging quakes in the upper 5 magnitude range in 1857 and 1959.

Elko airport closed while investigate suspicious pipe

ELKO, Nev. (AP) — About 30 people were evacuated from the Elko airport after a Sky West employee found what appeared to be a pipe bomb in the luggage inspection area.

The building was evacuated and fire crews stood by Wednesday afternoon as emergency service personnel went into action. They quickly discovered that the

device was a test unit that had been placed on the scanning table by a Sky West worker for the purpose of testing other employees.

Elko police said the person who conducted the test apparently failed to tell her relief, causing the confusion. "Sky West is based in St. George, Utah, and provides service to the Magic Valley and Sun Valley areas."

Robert Wade McQueen was pronounced dead at the scene after his compact car collided with a pickup truck about 5:30 p.m. Wednesday.

The truck's driver, John Allan Han, was taken to West Valley Medical Center in Caldwell, where he was in stable condition Thursday.

According to a Canyon County Sheriff's Office report, McQueen was northbound when he failed to stop at a stop sign at the intersection and collided with the eastbound Han.

Agencies work to reduce road dust

POCATELLO — City and county road officials are working with the Idaho Division of Environmental Quality to figure out how best to reduce road dust in the Pocatello valley.

Marilee Hill, a program development specialist working on the state's plan, met Monday with Pocatello Mayor Peter Angstadt and street Department Supervisor Curt Neville.

A study released last year by an Environmental Protection Agency contractor said that on certain winter days, road dust contributes to more than half of downtown Pocatello's small particle air pollution.

Residents want feedlot shut down

IDAHO FALLS — A group of rural Bonneville County residents has once again called for the shutdown of the Keith Skar Feedlot.

The group filed a motion for a permanent injunction against the cattle feeding operation on Tuesday, contending there has been no relief from the sour smells that they say make living in the area intolerable.

Last year the group took Skar to court and won. After a 12-day trial last October, 7th District Judge Ted Wood said the dust and smell from the feedlot constituted a nuisance for its neighbors.

Challis ambulance service may end

CHALLIS — The four remaining emergency medical technicians in Challis say ambulance service may end June 15 unless more volunteers join their ranks.

"I work two jobs, and I pick around a radio the rest of the time," Cynthia Edwards said this week. "It's just not feasible for us to cover 24 hours a day, seven days a week and still earn a living."

All four Challis paramedics have full time jobs.

Court denies requests from suspect

BLACKFOOT — A judge has denied Norm Jere Alford's requests to suppress evidence and to move his August trial for allegedly killing his brother and wounding his wife away from Blackfoot.

Seventh District Judge James Herndon said there was no evidence that pre-trial publicity would prejudice the case against Alford, 44, who is charged with first-degree murder, assault with intent to commit murder and two counts of using a firearm in a felony.

Schools may reap million-dollar windfall

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's economy displayed boom-like strength in April, generating so much new tax revenue that Andrus administration budget officials now believe public schools could receive a multimillion-dollar windfall this summer.

The administration's monthly update of tax receipts, released on Thursday, showed total collections through 10 months of the budget year running \$17.7 million ahead of projections.

Receipts of just over \$880 million were more than 10 percent ahead of the year-earlier total. The strength was in the corporate and individual income taxes, key indicators of the state's underlying economic strength, and while economists expect the size of the cash surplus to shrink slightly because of refunds claims, they were optimistic it would still be substantial.

Budget Director Charles Moss was confident

receipts would total the \$28.4 million over \$1 billion needed to pay the state's bills through June without making a previously anticipated \$11.6 million withdrawal from the dwindling Budget Reserve Account.

And he said there should be another several million — if not the entire \$5 million — that lawmakers promised more than a year ago would go to public schools from any cash left over after the books for the existing budget year are closed out on June 30.

When that commitment was made by Republican lawmakers in March 1992, most believed it was an empty promise made for its political value in the annual battle over state aid to education with Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus. The difference between the support Andrus wanted and the amount lawmakers approved for the current

school year was \$5 million.

In his own quarterly economic assessment released at the same time, U.S. Bancorp Senior Vice President John Mitchell called Idaho "a remarkable portrait of growth."

"The state led the nation in 1992 in percentage growth of nonfarm employment that was widespread, and the growth was continuing this year."

"Employment continued to grow in Twin Falls, Pocatello, Nampa-Caldwell, Coeur d'Alene, Lewiston and Idaho Falls," Mitchell said. "Another good year would seem to be in the cards for the state."

The cash surplus at the end of April was five times larger than it was at the end of March because of dramatic surges in income tax collections.

Couple fights big bill from last July's fire

BOISE (AP) — Frederick and Jeanne Howard are coming back on to Idaho in their 31-foot Bounder motor home — but not for vacation.

The State Department of Lands is suing the retired Lake Ariel, Pa., couple for \$1.3 million. The department says that figure was the cost of fighting a 6,258-acre fire along the Payette River the Howards are accused of negligently causing last July.

The Howards have driven the motor home back to Boise for testing as part of their legal defense.

At stake for Idaho taxpayers is at least part of the difference between the \$1.3 million and the approximately \$300,000 the couple's insurance company has offered, said Department of Lands Assistant Director Winston Wiggins.

The couple has refused to divulge to the state their assets.

Officials look for arson suspect

BOISE (AP) — Arson investigators began tracking down a possible suspect Thursday in the early morning arson fire at an abortion clinic.

"We did get some information from a witness that we are looking into, and we might have a suspect out of that information," Boise Fire Marshal Steve Mims said.

"It was incendiary. From what we can determine right now there was a flammable liquid accelerated used," Mims said. "It was thrown on the front porch. The fire itself may have broken the glass of the front entryway."

The fire broke out about 3 a.m. at the Women's Health Care Clinic, which has been a target of anti-abortion protests in the

past. The building was unoccupied at the time. There was no evidence that the arsonist entered the building, Mims said.

Flame damage was limited to the entrance, but Mims said the rest of the building sustained heavy smoke and heat damage. An estimate of the financial loss was not immediately available.

Office manager Marsha Bittiker said the fire would not stop clinic operations.

"The clinic is open for business" although it has temporarily relocated, Bittiker said. The clinic sees an average of 20 to 25 patients a day for all procedures, she said, but she did not have any specific information on the number of abortions performed.

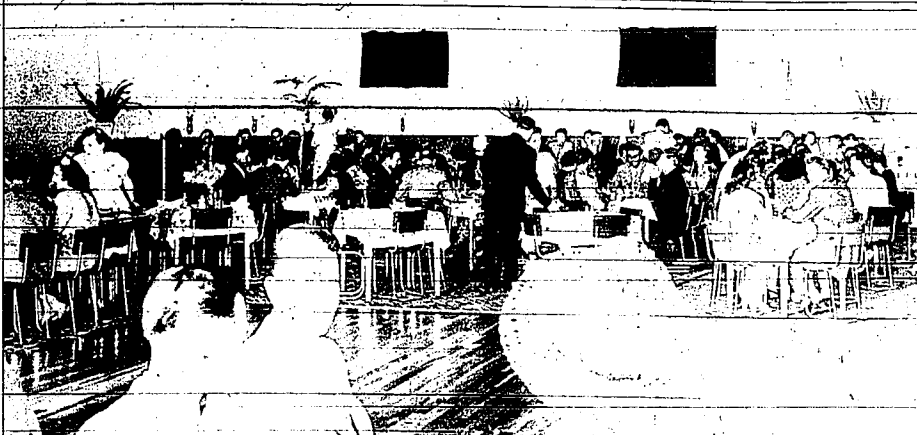
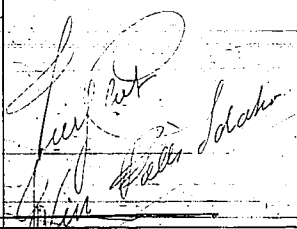

A tall handsome blonde in a dress that looked like seawater lifted over with good taste came out of the ladies' room, touching up her lips and turned toward the arch, humming.

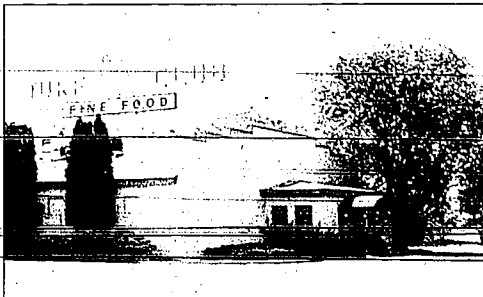
The sound of rumble music came through the archway and she nodded her gold head in time to it, smiling. A short fat man with a red face and glittering eyes waited for her with a white wrap over his arm. He dug his thick fingers into her bare arm and leered up at her.

It was July, the war had been over for 11 months, and the world was in the mood to party.

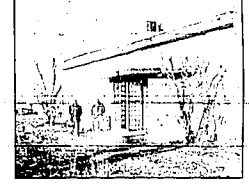
We had won the peace, the Depression was just a bad memory and everybody was sick — sick to death of war, beer, rationed gas, rationed food and your Aunt Bernie's kitchen-table backchat. What we needed was something to go, someplace classy, someplace fun, someplace like the Turf Club.

"A cigarette girl came down the gangway. She wore an egret plume in her hair, enough clothes to hide behind a toothpick, one of her long beautiful naked legs was silver, and one was gold. She had the utterly disdainful expression of a dame who makes her dates by long distance. I went into the bar and sank into a leather baret packed with down. Glass-

es tinkled gently, lights glowed softly there were quiet voices whispering of love, or 10 percent, or whatever they whisper about in a place like that. The barman moved one lip slowly over the other and made small tight circles on the bar with his cloth. "Your name?" "Marlowe." "Marlowe, drink while waiting?" "A dry martini will do." "A martini. Dry. Veddly, veddly dry." "OK." "Will you eat it with a spoon or a knife and a fork?" "Cut it in strips, I said. I'll just nibble it."



Nearly 50 years later, a trip to the Turf Club is an unofficial rite of citizenship in Twin Falls. If you didn't go there to celebrate your cousin's wedding, you certainly made it for your tenth high school reunion. Or your Rotary Club meet there. Or your office Christmas party.

While it's a place of eminent respectability, to open its double oak doors is to sniff the ghostly traces of \$5 Havana cigars as the dying notes of "Lagerlaine" or "Paper Doll" waft from the rafters where they used to store the slot machines.

Can the Brady Bunch sing? 'The Best of' album tells all

Time to shoot a few holes through this fuzzy veneer of warm feelings about "The Brady Bunch."

OK, boomers, watch the terms if they help take your minds off of the pressing problems of '90s adulthood.

Give a good "golly gee whizz" when you hear about the stage play.

Who needs Des McAnuff anyway? But when it comes to music — hey, the Brady Bunch stinks.

This much is proven by "It's a Sunshine Day: The Best of the Brady Bunch" (MCA). It's a terrific conversational piece — and it's become the hottest trade item between MCA employees and their counterparts at other record companies. But it's best seen and not heard; in reverse Motown vernacular, it'll give

you clouds on a sunshine day.

Lisa Sutton, the album's compiler, seems well aware of its musical shortcomings. Her liner notes amount to several hundred-word apology for the poor performances of the 18 songs. She even notes that Tim O'Brien, who recorded "Merry Christmas from the Brady Bunch," complained about "being saddled with 'six little kids who could not sing.'"

That phrase was echoed by seemingly every producer who touched the actors in subsequent years.

What makes this stuff so bad? Off-key vocals. Ensemble arrangements that are shouted, not sung. And truly wretched

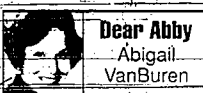

Jagger biography hits market amid a flurry of publicity

NEW YORK (AP)—If a new book is to be believed, Mick Jagger's list of sexual conquests reads like a who's who of popular music, with Rudolf Nureyev, Princess Margaret and Andy Warhol thrown in for good measure.

Eric Clapton, David Bowie, Madonna and Carly Simon are among the stars who had flings with the lead singer of the Rolling Stones, Christopher Anderson says in "Jagger UnAUTHORIZED," released earlier this week.

Jagger would have no comment, said Fran Curtis, a spokeswoman for the singer who had earlier said there would be a statement. "Since he hasn't seen the book, it doesn't make any sense," she said today. "You know, the publisher wouldn't give us a book."

The 49-year-old rocker has spent the last 10 years with model Jerry Hall, the mother of three of his children. "I haven't seen the book, it doesn't make any sense," she said today. "You know, the publisher wouldn't give us a book."

In one of the book's more sensational tidbits, Anderson claims Jagger and Clapton were "reportedly" discovered in bed together in the late 1960s.

Buckingham Palace said: "We don't comment on this great raft of books involving the royal family. A lot of them are sensational."

Andersen is the author of 14 books, including the best seller "Madonna Unauthorized" and biographies of Katharine Hepburn and Jane Fonda.

Time was, you see, that to stroll into the Turf Club was to walk on the wild side.

"The original clientele came over from Frontier Field, where they used to run horses," said Steve Soran, who runs family bar, the Turf Club, on a quiet corner. "On opening night, they were big. The Ink Spots, who were very hot then. Paid 'em \$3,000 for one night. The only reason they made money was because the Ink Spots dropped \$2,500 in the slot machines."

"I carried the drink over to a small table against the wall and sat down there and lit a cigarette. Five minutes went by. The music that was coming through the fet had changed in tempo without my noticing it. My girl was singing. She had a rich deep down-around-the-ankles contralto that has pleasant to listen to. She was singing 'Dark Eyes,' and the hand behind her seemed to be falling asleep."

"There was a heavy round of applause and some whistling when she ended."

"A man at the next table said to his girl, 'They got Linda Quonquest back with the band. I heard she got married to some rich guy in Pasadena, but it didn't take.'"

"The girl said, 'Nice voice. If you like female crooners.'"

"I started to get up, but a shadow fell across my table..."

The night the Ink Spots lost all their money was just about the only night the Turf Club made money in the early days, Soran said, and the club changed hands in 1949.

Hugh Fairbank bought the place and ran it for the next 14 years, as a supper club and a nightclub. But it was always an uncertain proposition, dependent on a clientele not content to eat fried chicken on a table at the Hotel Rogerson and subject to the moral sensibilities of a rock-ribbed town in a buttaned-up era.

"It was an idea, I think, that was a little ahead of its time," Soran said.

Idaho outlawed slot machines, and after Twin Falls banned liquor by the glass, Soran had no real option but to run the Turf Club as a fish out of water. Not even a valiant effort at

amexiation by still-wet Kimberly or Hansen via an "aerial easement" could save the situation, Soran said.

Turf Club waiters made good money — 45 cents an hour plus tips in the old days — and not enough people were willing to pay five bucks for steak dinner and a cup of coffee. The place closed in 1963.

But the Manhattan-with-a-cherry sign on the roof and its 1,000 directed light bulbs floated above the glowing neighborhood around the College of Southern Idaho campus, and in 1968, Soran's dad, Leo, and another Bob, decided there might be some life left in the dogwater after all. So they bought the place, gave her a facelift and a third lease on life.

"The (red velvet) wallpaper was my idea," Leo Soran said. "We had an Austrian who was working in Salt Lake City come up and put it in."

"It was a first-class operation," Steve Soran said. "I was just out of high school, the maitre d', and one of my jobs was to drive to the airport every day and pick up fresh seafood. We had a lobster tank in the place, even a salad bar — one of the first, maybe the first, in this area. It didn't go over too well."

"Fine dining in itself still didn't pay the rent and the likes of the Coasters, the Diamonds and Gary Lewis and the Playboys didn't draw enough people to make up the difference, so nearly 20 years ago the Sorans turned the Turf Club into what it is today — a place for parties, banquets and memories, catered by the Sorans and their Depot Grill."

"There are people who had their wedding receptions there who come back for their 25th anniversaries," Steve Soran said. "I think the majority of our business comes from the people who've known the Turf Club for one time."

"It has," he said, "an image."

Thus the faded queen of Falls Avenue has kept her reputation without sacrificing her mystery.

"I had a Conquest come in through the open door and stood looking at me with a sad light in her eyes. She looked like her photo and not like it. She had the wide cold mouth, the short nose, the wide cold eyes, the dark hair parted in the mid-

dle and the broad white line between the parting. She was wearing a white coat over her dress, with the collar turned up. She had her hands in the pockets of the coat and a cigarette in her mouth."

"You're a man named Marlowe," she asked, looking at me. She put her hips against the end of the desk and crossed her ankles.

"I said I was a man named Marlowe."

"By and large," she said. "I am quite sure I am not going to like you one damned little bit. So speak your piece and drift away."

"What I like about this place is everything runs so true to type," I said. "The cop on the gate, the shine on the door, the cigarette and check girls, the silent guy with the gun, the nightclub owner with the soft gray hair and the B-picture mannerism, and now you — the tall dark tender with the negligent sweater, the husky voice, the hard-boiled vocabulary."

"She said, 'Is that so?' and fitted her cigarette between her lips and drew slowly on it. And what about the wise-cracking snapper with the last year's grays and the come-hither smile?"

Much of the time these days, the Turf Club sits locked and silent, but maybe not for much longer.

The Sorans, who had rented the place for years, recently bought it back and are making plans to turn it into — you guessed it — a supper club.

"What I have in mind is a casual kind of place where people come to relax, enjoy themselves and have a good meal," Steve Soran said. "We certainly wouldn't forget the groups that use it now, but the idea is to design the place where both groups and individual customers can go."

"The lime-green paint on the outside, the steel partitions, the Sorans' beloved red velvet wallpaper will go. But not the hi-ball glass on the roof half full of sparkling neon and not the ghosts of the hat-check girls, the bow-tied barmen, the saloon singers, the high-rollers, the big-tippers and the Ink Spots."

"Your son's" he recognized the place," Steve Soran said. "But you'll still know it's the Turf Club."

"Music is it," he said. "It's my hobby, my business and my life."

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

Dalton's road to stardom wound through '60s California, BYU

TWIN FALLS — Here's the inside story: the "J" in Lacy J. Dalton stands for Jill.

The country music singer was actually born Jill Lynne Byrem, but her first record producer told her she needed a new name. She compromised, and kept the J.

Dalton has always lived life mostly by her way.

In Twin Falls, between shows at Cactus Pete's Resort Casino, she talked about her initial launch into the music business.

"I was 19 or 20, working at a country fair in Pennsylvania selling jewelry for Big Joe Ryan," said Dalton.

There was a hooch selling rooster to roll psychedelic posters across from me, and I fell in love with the guy in the booth and ran off with him to California to record music."

Before that, Dalton was raised in a family of country music lovers in Bloomsburg, Pa. Her father played stringed instruments, sang and wrote songs. Her mother played guitar and sang harmony. Her sister wrote songs and played the piano and guitar.

When Dalton left home to go to college, it was to Brigham Young University.

"I went there because the tuition was so low for non-Mormons and because it has a great theater department," said Dalton, who landed a night job-cleaning restrooms in the

BYU theater building. She stayed a year.

"While I was there, I started drinking coffee to stay awake so I could go to work at 4 a.m.," she said.

It wasn't long before Dalton developed the habit of turning out hit records. Her songs, which combine rhythm 'n blues, rock and country, include a string of chart-toppers. One hit collection contains "Sixteenth Avenue," "Hard Times," "Hillbilly Girl With the Blues" and "Dream Baby."

These days, Dalton travels with her husband, Aaron Anderson, who is her tour manager, sound engineer, accountant, business manager and "T-shirt guy." Her 22-year-old son is in college studying to be a physicist.

"I don't understand it," Dalton said. "I can't even balance a checkbook."

But Dalton's son also inherited some of his mother's musical talent. He helped her write a song entitled "Little Boy Blue," which she performs in her shows.

Off the road, Dalton retreats to her 15-acre ranch near Nashville, Tenn. Neighbors include Charlie Daniels and Reba McEntire.

"Reba and I talk about all the problems we have trying to do our hair," Dalton said. "I'm awful at hair."

Dalton's good at mapping out an exercise schedule, though. She stays in shape by running in place one hour a day while doing her vocal exercises. She also likes to hike the back country and ride horses.

Dalton's new album, "Chains in the Wind," is available at her shows.

When she leaves Jackpot, she will head for Elko and Reno for concerts. She will spend July and August performing at the Ozark Mountain Theater in Branson, Mo.

Whimsical guide takes mystery out of programming your VCR

It's become axiomatic that VCRs are beyond the comprehension of the everyday user. We don't know what all the buttons do, we don't know how to connect the thing to our TV set and we don't know how to record a show.

But if all that were so, I doubt that 80 percent of homes would have a VCR, with more being sold all the time. Last year, in fact, was the best sales year ever for VCRs.

Still, it's true that VCR installation and operation can induce high anxiety. Recognizing that one anti-

date to anxiety is laughter, there's now a whimsical VCR guide that seeks to demystify these gadgets with lighthearted instruction. It's called "House-Training Your VCR"

(Grapevine Publications, \$9.95), by Dave Murray.

Murray is a humor writer who also happens to be a veteran VCR salesman. That's a strange combination, but in this context, it works. Through his dealings with customers, he has worked out some effective analogies to explain the more arcane truths about VCRs. I like his observation that a VCR is fundamentally a combination of three other appliances: a tape recorder, a TV set and an alarm clock.

Unlike most VCR manuals, "House-Training" dares to use plain English and pokes gentle fun at the

formality of manuals in general. Murray takes notice of the routine safety warnings such as "Do not pour liquids directly into your VCR" and adds his own prescription: "But if you sort of trip it at all, that might be all right."

Heavily illustrated with cartoons, the short paperback book (113 pages, plus index) at first glance gives the impression of being more a joke book than useful guide. Yet as Murray puts it, beneath its "flip, obnoxious exterior" there is quite a bit that's essential to understanding your VCR.

Other topics include how to set up a timed recording, how to edit tapes when copying from one VCR to another, and what features to look for in a new machine, organized according to practicality.

Most of the information in "House-Training" can in fact be found by the diligent reader within the pages of the manufacturer's VCR instruction manual. The trick is to locate it and then interpret it. Murray has done the work already, and with his refreshing attitude he has turned a reading chore into a pleasure.

Benny and Jon (PG). A movie about how magical we all are once we get past our neurotic armor. Aggressively fantastical and milled with the mindset of films like "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" that proclaimed insanity as the sane response to an insane world. Aidan Quinn and Mary Stuart Masterson star as brother and sister Johnny Depp is the mystery man who rescues Masterson from an insane asylum and Quinn from his role as her sole protector. (Motor-Vu Drive-In)

Cliffhanger (R). Sylvester Stallone is an expert mountaineer who puts his skills to the test when an airplane crashes in the Rockies. Complicating the rescue is a criminal gang led by John Lithgow that has taken the survivors hostage. Renny Harlin directs. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

Dave (PG-13). Filled with amusing situations and clever lines, this bemused look at what happens when a regular guy has to step into the Oval Office and run the country successfully because of the delicately pitched comic performances of its cast. Kevin Kline, almost unequaled as a farce actor, stars in an Ivan Reitman-directed, Gary Ross-written film that is not only comically wise but also can't be given away. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

Dragon: The Bruce Lee Story (PG-13). This biopic of Bruce Lee is notable for introducing in the title role the magnetic new actor Jason Scott Lee (no relation) to a large audience. 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Chinese, New Zealand films share top honors at Cannes

CANNES, France (AP) — In a rare tie for best film, "Farewell to My Concubine" by Chinese director Chen Kaige and "The Piano" by New Zealand's Jane Campion shared the Golden Palm award this week at the Cannes Film Festival.

Both films received standing ovations at their premieres here last week and have been highly praised by critics and the public. Britain's David Thewlis won the best actor award for his portrayal of Johnny in Mike Leigh's film "Naked," and American Holly Hunter was named best actress for her role as the mute Scotswoman Ada in "The Piano."

Leigh, the director of 1991's highly acclaimed comedy "Life Is Sweet," won the director's award for "Naked," a disturbing film about Johnny, an anti-hero of the '90s who storms out of a friend's apartment and has a series of encounters as he wanders the seedy side of London.

The 10-member jury awarded its Grand Prix to Wim Wenders' "Far Away, So Close," a dream-like film about angels and fallen angels in the newly reunited city of Berlin.

Wenders, whose "Paris, Texas" won the Golden Palm in 1984, made "Far Away" as a sequel to his 1987 "Wings of Desire," about an angel who becomes a human every 2 hours, 45 minutes, and walked out of its screenings.

The panel, headed by French director Louis Malle, awarded two Jury Prizes to "The Puppet Master" by Taiwanese director Hou Hsiao-hsien and "Raining Stones" by British director Ken Loach.

The Golden Camera award for best first film went to Tran Anh Hung of Vietnam for "Odor of Green Papaya," and special technical prize to "Mazeppa" by French director Barabas.

"My Concubine" is a love triangle with a difference. A female impersonator in a Chinese opera troop Cheng Dieyi (Leslie Cheung), a homosexual, is in love with his leading man Duan Xinhou (Zhang Fengyi), who in turn is in love with courtesan Juxian (Gong Li).

The story spans 50 years in the lives of the two actors, and the tragedy of China's Cultural Revolution and their relationship with Juxian.

"The Piano" recounts the sojourn of a mute Scotswoman (Hunter) who sails to New Zealand's Maori country in the last century along with her 9-year-old daughter — and her beloved piano — for an arranged marriage to Stewart (Sam Neill).

The marriage is loveless, but a mystic tattooed hermit (Harvey Keitel) who is fascinated by her and the piano tugs at her heart.

Campion, who is nearly eight months pregnant, was not able to accept her award in person. Neill accepted the award.

French actress Isabelle Adjani presented the Golden Palm. Her latest film, "Toussaint Louverture," was to premiere officially after the awards ceremony. It was hoisted and whistled at a press screening Sunday night.

The crowd of mostly journalists booed the comedy directed by French-woman Philippe Esposito.

Many said afterward that it simply was not funny when it intended to be, and that Adjani, who plays a neurotic, hypochondriac woman dumped by her lover, was uninspiring.

"I made a film I love," Esposito said at a news conference Monday — which, in an unusual move, Adjani did not attend. "People have the right to like it or not."

More than 500 films were shown at the 46th festival, which lasted 12 days.

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'Cliffhanger' takes overkill overboard

"We like extremes," remarks one of the minor characters in "Cliffhanger," a poorly SoCal teenager who likes parachuting off the peaks of rocky mountains.

So, too, does Renny Harlin, the Finnish-born action filmmaker who has now graduated from "Die Hard 2: Die Harder" to the even more extravagant, even more hysterical "Cliffhanger," which stars Sylvester Stallone as a rock-climbing rescue worker caught up in a mad chase across a mountain range.

One doesn't look to Harlin for subtle nuances of feeling. The new film is one maniacally executed, almost unbroken series of high-risk situations, most involving dizzying heights, automatic weapons and gunning, sadistic villains.

Much of it is effective, but much of it is just too much — too relentless, too overpowering and too means-spirited to be the kind of rousing adventure it means to be.

Harlin's most effectively staged sequence is his opener, in which Stallone, as the angelically named Gabriel Walker, comes to the rescue of his wounded partner, Hal Tucker (Michael Rooker), and Hal's uneasy girlfriend, Sarah (Michelle Joyner), who have gotten themselves stranded atop an immense, needle-like promontory called "The Tower." (Though the film is set in the Colorado Rockies, most of it was filmed in the Italian Alps, near Cortina.)

Unfolding some spectacular aerial photography of the region under the opening credits, Harlin deftly sets his astounding outdoor stage, using a combination of matte shots (in which actors are superimposed onto artificial backgrounds) and swooning camera movements to establish a breathtakingly effective sense of height.

As Gabe climbs up the spire, a bright red helicopter flies into view, containing Gabe's partner and companion, Jessie Deighan (Janine Turner), and Frank (Ralph Waite), the helicopter's crinkly-eyed, avuncular pilot.

Landing on a roomier nearby peak, Jessie and Frank throw a cable across to Gabe; harnessed to it, Hal and Sarah will be able to slide to safety. Hal makes it, but then Sarah's belt breaks. Gabe scrambles out to save her, but as he struggles to hold on to her, her hand slips from her glove. She falls to her death.

Harlin smoothly modulates the sequence from humor to panic to tragic impact. Though there are some shaky matches in light quality between the location long shots and the studio close-ups (a problem throughout the film), this is filmmaking of a very high order, depending for its impact on a Hitchcockian calibration of framing and cutting. The audience is gripped by pure form.

Hitchcockian, too, is the reference the sequence makes to the opening of "Vertigo," most specifically in the way the scene fades to black before Gabe has climbed down, leaving him metaphorically suspended over a void for the balance of the film.

Flash-forward one year, where Gabe, his nerve nightly shaken, has returned to the mountains from a long hiatus; he wants to reclaim Jessie and take her back to the city.

This, of course, is not to be.

A radio call comes in to the rescue station, asking for help for a band of amateur climbers about to be stranded in a major storm. The viewer knows, as the characters do not, that these climbers are in fact a band of ruthless super-criminals who, after a not entirely smooth attempt to hijack a U.S. Treasury plane loaded with \$100 million in fresh bank notes,

them to help locate the three cases that fell from the plane, each containing one third of the loot.

The script, by Michael France, with a rewrite by Stallone, provides Gabe with a distracting later number of personal issues to resolve where one would have been more than enough — he needs to renew his romance with Jessie, heal his

broken friendship with Hal, and regain the self-respect that went down with the unlucky Sarah.

Harlin commits a similar, and more literal, kind of overkill by needlessly piling up scenes, entirely too many of them belonging to sympathetic characters. If he needs to demonstrate just how ruthless Qualan and his band can be, a single

gratuitous killing would have more impact than the headlining half-dozen Harlin offers here. Harlin committed a similar misstep in "Die Hard 2" by crashing an entire jumbo jet full of innocent people. It's hard to regard any movie as an innocent

regard after that Mass murder, does cast a nasty pall.

"Cliffhanger" could have used a little more of the humor that enlivens such moments as Gabe and Jessie warming their hands over a bonfire of \$1,000 bills. Says Gabe, gesturing at

the cave they're sitting in, "It costs a fortune to heat this place."

But as extreme as the extremes have been, Harlin is still able to pull off a madcap finale that involves a mountaintop, a helicopter and a chain ladder. Satisfyingly echoing the opening scene, Harlin's climax demonstrates the importance of keeping something in reserve. Like the roller-coaster ride "Cliffhanger" clearly wants to be, the film sends you out pleasantly rattled and wobbly of gait. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

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
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
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

Ex-Vandal hoop coach defends team's grades

MOSCOW — Former Idaho men's basketball coach Tim Floyd is upset that Vandal athletic director Pete Liske said Floyd's players were academically deficient.

"I'm a little chafed," Floyd, now head coach at the University of New Orleans, said of comments from Liske published last week.

Liske said the University of Idaho's recruiting philosophy has changed since Floyd and his successor, Kermit Davis, were at the Moscow school. He said there is more emphasis on academics now.

"We stayed on a par with the national (graduation) average and at the same time put a winning team on the floor," Floyd said Wednesday by telephone from Louisiana. "I don't appreciate Mr. Liske making a knock at (me) to make himself look better."

The latest NCAA report on graduation rates at Idaho shows 43 percent of the male athletes who were freshmen in 1986-87 — Floyd's first year as head coach — have graduated.

All the white basketball players who began as freshmen at Idaho in 1986-87 have graduated, the report showed. No black freshmen players entered school in 1986-87; all Floyd's black players who came that year were transfers. Only 25 percent of them have graduated.

3 additional Filipino Little League teams disqualified

MANILA, Philippines — A team from the same city which won the Little League World Series last year and then was stripped of the title was among three squads disqualified from trying to represent the Philippines this year for again falsifying age records.

One of the teams was from the southern Philippine city of Zamboanga, the city whose team was stripped of last year's Little League World Series title after officials discovered some of the players were over the age limit of 12.

The nationally circulated newspapers Malaya and Manila Standard quoted the chief of the local Little League organization, Dominador Navarrete, as saying the Zamboanga team tampered with birth records of seven of its nine players.

The exposure of the deceit last year was a national embarrassment for the Philippines, prompting local Little League officials to resign.

CSI meets Triton Saturday

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo. — The last time College of Southern Idaho played Triton College of River Grove, Ill., Kirby Puckett helped the suburban Chicago school defeat the Golden Eagles.

That was 1983, the season before CSI won the National Junior College Athletic Association baseball title.

Puckett has been kept busy the last few years with the Minnesota Twins, but CSI and Triton are back at the JC nationals, facing off in the event's second game at noon Saturday. The 36th annual tournament will be played at 16,000-seat Sam Houston Field, which should be packed for the contests.

"This town, for a week, is the baseball town of the world," said CSI Coach Jim Walker.

After outbitting the nation's top hitting team, Trinidad State College, in a three-game playoff, the Eagles have drawn rave reviews in Grand Junction.



But Walker expects opposing pitching to improve several notches this week.

"Can our swings withstand a guy throwing 85-plus (mph)?" Walker said. "I want to see if we can do it. But we've made the adjustments. The consistency has been great."

In the Northwest District playoff, CSI raised its batting average from .373 to .381.

At the same time, the Eagles' pitching suffered a bit, with only Mark Knip and Ted Soto having solid performances.

"In part, it was the best hitting team we played," Walker said. "They made us pay for a fastball up. They hit a lot of mistakes."

The coach expects to see less power and more speed from Triton. At No. 11, Triton is the only NJCAA-ranked team to survive the playoffs to the 10-team tournament.

"I think their defense will be good, and they will run," he said.

Because of Triton's speed, Walker may use Craig Sande as catcher because he has a stronger throwing arm than Mike Zandi.

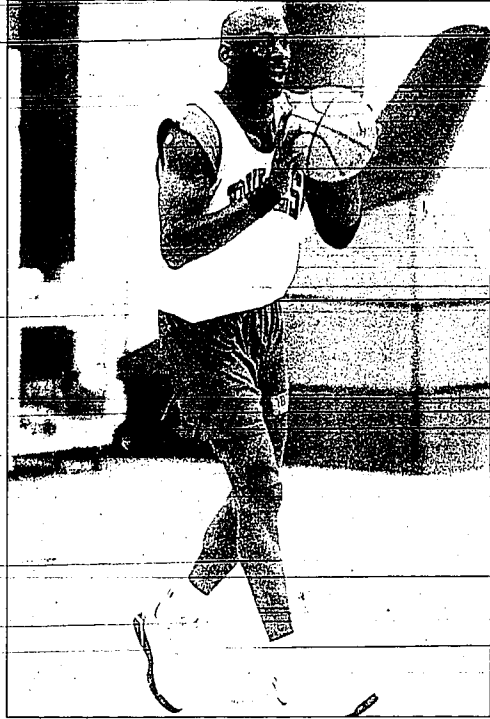
NY on Jordan: So what?

Jordan, Barkley head All-NBA team

NEW YORK — The greatness of Phoenix forward Charles Barkley and Chicago guard Michael Jordan was re-emphasized Thursday when they were unanimously selected to the 1993 All-NBA team.

Barkley, the league's most valuable player, and Jordan, winner of the league scoring title for a seventh straight time, were the only players named on all 98 first-team ballots by a nationwide panel of NBA writers and sports broadcasters — three from each league city and 17 representing the national media. Each received the maximum 490 points, with points awarded on a 5-3-1 basis for first-, second- or third-team nominations.

Joining Barkley and Jordan on the first team were forward Karl Malone of the Utah Jazz, center Hakeem Olajuwon of the Houston Rockets and guard Mark

Price of the Cleveland Cavaliers.

Barkley, acquired from the Philadelphia 76ers during an offseason trade, did exactly what the Suns wanted him to — lead them to the Pacific Division title and the NBA's best record (62-20). He topped Phoenix in scoring with 27.6 average, in rebounding with a 12.2 average and in total assists with 385, a 5.2 average. This was the fifth time he was chosen to the All-NBA team.

Jordan's first team selection was his seventh. He topped the league in scoring with a 32.6 average, joining Wilt Chamberlain as the only players to lead the NBA in scoring seven consecutive seasons, and was No. 1 in steals with a 2.83 average as the two-time defending NBC champions Bulls won the Central Division with a 57-25 record.

Olajuwon, third in the voting with 83 first-team votes and 455 points, was the

key to Houston winning the Midwest Division with a 55-25 record. This was the first appearance on the All-NBA team since 1989 for Olajuwon, the NBA's Defensive Player of the Year.

Malone earned his fifth straight appearance on the team with 45 first-team votes and 327 points. This is the first appearance on the first team for Price, who got 44 first-team votes and 344 points.

Named to the second team were forwards Dominique Wilkins of Atlanta and Larry Johnson of Charlotte, center Patrick Ewing of New York, and guards John Stockton of Utah and Joe Dumars of Detroit.

Chosen to the third team were forwards Scottie Pippen of Chicago and Derrick Coleman of New Jersey, center David Robinson of San Antonio, and guards Tim Hardaway of Golden State and Drazen Petrovic of New Jersey.

Dale Murphy retires from 'fantasy world'

HOUSTON — Just two homers shy of 400 and struggling at the end of a 17-year career, two-time National League MVP Dale Murphy retired Thursday.

Murphy, hitting .143 with no homers and seven RBIs as a backup for the expansion Colorado Rockies, made the announcement at a hastily arranged news conference before a game with the Houston Astros.

"I had a few tears this morning ... as I guess most guys do when they say goodbye to something that's close to them," Murphy said. "I'll miss the game of baseball."

The seven-time All-Star choked back tears while discussing the game he started playing when he was 8. He said there were "many reasons" for the decision, which he arrived at Thursday morning.

"He said it was time for him to 'become part of real life.'"

"Playing baseball is not real life, it's a fantasy world. To be able to go out there and play baseball, it's a dream come true," he said.

Murphy, 37, acknowledged his poor performance with the Rockies. He said club officials, needing to make a roster move, had hinted at his release.

"I have no problem with that, they have to do what they have to do," he said. "I haven't really been doing the job, which was fairly obvious."

Aside from not winning a World Series, Murphy said he regrets not hitting the 400-home plateau.

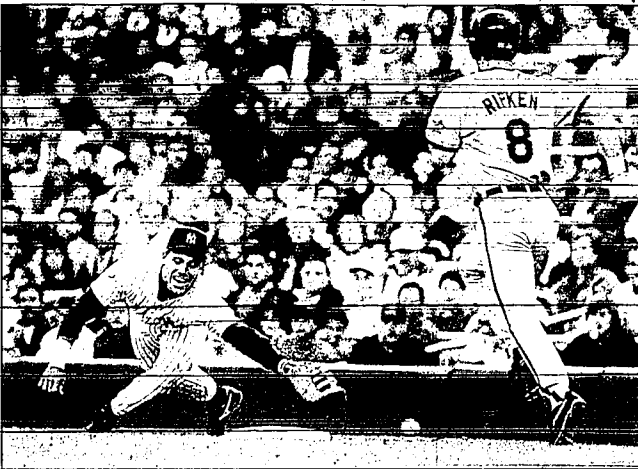

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Fernando Valenzuela did not join his former team on Thursday and took a verbal shot at the team that gave up on him two years ago.

Two months before that hasty audition with the Angels, Valenzuela had been unceremoniously released by the Dodgers. He had gone 141-116 with the Dodgers.

His revival began last summer with Jalisco in the Mexican League, where his record of 10-9 with a 3.86 ERA wasn't nearly as significant as the "F" ratings which tracked back the strength in his left shoulder.

Given an opportunity in spring training by the Orioles, managed by former Dodgers catcher Johnny Oates, Valenzuela enjoyed a nearly flawless camp to secure a starting job.

Luis Gonzalez hit a two-run homer off David Nied (3-7) and Jeff Bagwell extended his hitting streak to 14 games with a two-run

double and a single.

Pirates 13, Marlins 8

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Tom Prince hit Pittsburgh's second inside-the-park home run in as many days, and the Pirates scored six runs off three misplays by Florida right fielder Junger Felix.

Prince sliced a ball to right field in the second inning that skipped past Felix and rolled to the wall. He slid home ahead of the relay throw for a three-run homer. The 13 runs were the most ever scored against the Marlins. Bob Walk (6-3) was the winner and Ryan Bowen (3-5) took the loss.

Nelson glad to be coach of U.S. team

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Don Nelson, chosen to coach the U.S. team in next year's basketball world championships, could very well preside over a roster composed entirely of NBA players.

That would be fine with the coach of the Golden State Warriors, who was selected for the national post-Thursday.

"Again we're going to have our best assembled to represent the USA, and I think that will speak for itself," Nelson said. "Before, of course, it's always been collegians, and they have struggled, playing against the more mature players throughout the world."

Last year's NBA-dominated Dream Team, which overwhelmed its international opposition en route to an Olympic gold medal, had one collegian on the roster, Duke's Christian Laettner, now of the Minnesota Timberwolves.

But that may be the last concession to amateurism.

"Right now, we have not totally decided but there is a very good chance it may be all NBA players," said Tom Izzo, chairman of USA Basketball's Senior Men's National Team Committee, which also selected Nelson.

"Our commitment is to get the outstanding players. If it happens to be that all of them are not from the NBA, then so be it, but if it is, then I think that is the way we would be leaning."

The selection of Nelson, who has a 753-541 record as an NBA coach, "is just a reemphasis of our commitment... to excel in this competition," said Warren Brown, USA basketball's executive director.

Basketball's world governing body, FIBA, selected him in 1989 to open international competition to all players, regardless of amateur or professional standing. That paved the way for creation of the Dream Team, which included NBA superstars such as Michael Jordan, Patrick Ewing and Charles Barkley.

"There were some in the United States who felt maybe there was a little bit of overkill but if you look at how it played out around the world, I think the vast majority of writers and basketball federations thought it was the greatest thing that ever happened," Thom said.

Nelson, who has spent 31 years in the NBA as a player, coach and general manager, agreed that recruiting the best players from the professional ranks was the way to go rather than rely on collegians.

Phoenix journeys to Seattle for Game 3 of conference finals

SEATTLE (AP) — Charles Barkley, the newest MVP on the NBA block, wants to make sure you know he's right. The brightest of the Phoenix Suns knew the Seattle SuperSonics would be trouble in the Western Conference finals.

"Seattle has a good team," Barkley said. "If anybody thought we'd just walk over them, they're crazy. This is going to be a tough series all the way."

The Sonics managed to steal the Suns' home-court advantage Wednesday night with a 103-99 victory to even the best-of-7 series 1-1. It's on to Game 3 tonight, a move from the ultra-modern America West Arena to the aging Seattle Coliseum.

Phoenix had the best record in the league (62-20) and the Suns did bounce back in the opening round of the playoffs with three straight wins after losing the first two games at home to the Los Angeles Lakers.

"We know they've had success on the road all year," said Sam Perkins, Seattle's Game 2 hero.

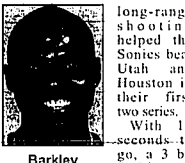
The Suns had the league's top road record at 27-14, but they didn't win in Seattle this season.

The Sonics won three of five in the regular season, including 122-113 and 95-94 victories in Seattle in January and February.

"We wanted to keep the homecourt advantage like we did with San Antonio," Phoenix's Dan Majerle said of the six-game semifinal which the Suns ended on the road. "We just didn't get it done."

Trailing 97-91 with 2:52 left Wednesday night, the Sonics outscored the Suns 12-2. Perkins scored 10 fourth-quarter points, including two 3-pointers in the run.

The Sonics traded for Perkins in February to give them some leadership and another low-post scorer. In the playoffs, he's been a leader and a 3-point terror. His

long-range shooting helped the Sonics beat Utah and Houston in their first two series.

With 10 seconds to go, a 3 by Perkins put Seattle ahead 101-99.

Talk about big shots. If the Sonics wind up winning the Phoenix series, Perkins' pointer might prove to be the biggest shot of the playoffs for Seattle, and it came from a player struggling with his shooting in the short series.

"He's our best 3-point shooter by far," teammate Ricky Pierce said.

Pierce wasn't bad himself, scoring 34 points in Game 2, hitting 13 of 20 from the field. He helped offset the big scoring nights of Majerle (29) and Barkley (24).

For the series, Pierce is averaging 20 points, Majerle 19 and Barkley 18.

Seattle beat Houston and Harlem Olajuwon in overtime in Game 7 of their conference semifinal series last Saturday afternoon in Seattle. The noise in the Seattle Coliseum was ear-shattering, and could be even worse for Game 3 against Phoenix.

Barkley doesn't intend to wear earplugs. "It should be fun," he said. "It's a rocking and rolling place. The crowd really gets into the game."

Even if the home team plays ugly.

"We're not a pretty team," Sonics coach George Karl allowed. "We're not going to be a pretty team. But we're a pretty good team."

Game 4 of the Seattle-Phoenix series will be played Sunday here with Game 5 in Phoenix on Tuesday night.

National League warns Reds' Schott after note-passing incident

CINCINNATI (AP) — The National League warned Cincinnati Reds owner Marge Schott about violating terms of her one-year suspension Thursday, a day after she sent a note into the dugout during a game.

The league office said in a statement that "Mrs. Schott was contacted regarding the terms of her suspension." It had no other comment.

Baseball sources speaking on condition of anonymity said NL president Bill White phoned Schott and warned her about contacting members of the team. The sources said there would be no further action against her.

Schott violated her suspension terms Wednesday night by tossing a note to manager Davey Johnson into the dugout during a 4-0 victory over the Atlanta Braves.

Her one-year suspension for using racial slurs forbids contact with anyone involved with major-league baseball, except in social circumstances. That precludes sending notes into the dugout.

Schott, who's allowed to sit in a box seat behind the Reds' dugout, stood up as the team came off the field following the top of the fourth inning Wednesday night and waved a piece of paper at a batboy, who was standing in the dugout.

She tossed the paper to the batboy, who caught it and took it to Johnson. The manager read it, folded it up and put it in his back pocket.

After the game, Schott declined to talk about the incident. Asked whether she'd passed a note into the dugout, she shook her head. Asked again, she said "No comment."

But Johnson confirmed he got a note from her asking the team to win. The manager said Thursday the episode was confusing.

"It was kind of weird," Johnson said. "The batboy started to give me the note. I said I wasn't taking any, and he said it was from Marge. I said I'd better take that one."

"At the same time he gave me the note, Reggie Sanders walked by with a grin on his face. I guess everyone knew what was going on but me. I read it and

it wasn't really from Marge, as far as I could tell," he said. "Good luck. We need a win." And it was signed by what looked like a dog's footprint.

That's how Schott signs things, as a reference to team mascot Schottzitz 02.

Schott's suspension agreement with baseball's executive council says she can't "associate or communicate

with anyone on her team.

Her appearance was her first in the stands at Riverfront Stadium since general manager Jim Bowden fired manager Tony Perez on Monday. She has distanced herself from Bowden's actions, saying she wasn't consulted, and she wasn't in her seat Tuesday for Johnson's debut.

The note-tossing incident was the second time she's skirted the terms of her suspension.

On opening day, Schott had a videotaped message played on the scoreboard, assuring fans she would be back in her front-row seat in a month. The suspension stipulated that she had to watch games from an executive booth for the first month of the season.

After it came to the notice of the executive council, the Reds assured there would be no more tapes from Schott on the scoreboard while she was suspended.

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Cosby plays key role in Ribbs' return to The Brickyard

INDIANAPOLIS — The way Willy T. Ribbs looks at it, sitting out a year worked wonders for Aric Luyendyk and Paul Tracy. They're on the front row for Sunday's Indianapolis 500.

"Ribbs will be back in the 40th row to start his second Indy 500, but the fact that he is even in the race is remarkable considering what he has gone through this month. As late as in April, before he qualified last weekend, his best speed was more than 5 mph less than what he needed.

"I couldn't get above 210.5 mph Friday, so the crew gambled on a major change in the chassis for Saturday, but the way things turned out I had no chance to test it," Ribbs said. "I felt I needed to have my head examined if I went out with an untried change as big as that one, but I went out anyway and it worked. It gave the car grip it had never had."

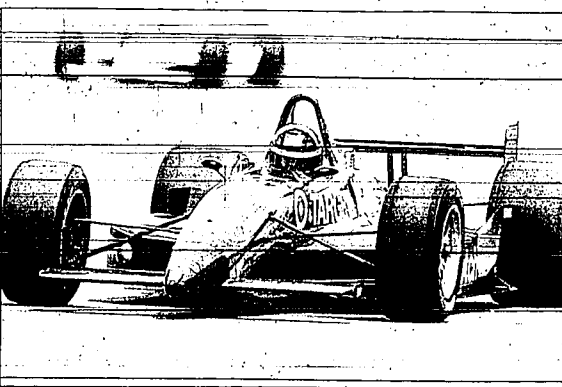
Ribbs, whose fastest lap all month had been 215.462, put together a remarkably consistent four laps at 217.711 to easily make the field. It was a shade faster than the 217.358 he ran to qualify in 1991.

"Coming in here is like going to war, on the front lines," he said. "You've got to be on the watch for booby traps, snipers, heavy artillery, everything that could harm you. You never know what's going to come your way."

One thing that has come Ribbs' way is a major sponsorship from Service Merchandise, a Nashville-based catalogue store retailer — courtesy of Bill Crosby and the William Morris Agency of Beverly Hills.

The deal is worth \$50 million over two years, with Service Merchandise holding a two-year option.

"We have represented Bill Cosby for 29 years, and when he came to us and said he wanted to do something for Willy T., we decided to market him like an entertainment product," said Richard Herbst, senior vice president for the agency. "It's a complete deal that calls for Cosby to do commercials for the sponsor, for William Morris to find additional sponsorship, for Walker Motorsports to provide first class equipment and for Willy T. to drive it."

Cosby, who is appearing in Las Vegas, Nev., will fly in Sunday for the race and return that evening.

Ribbs said, "Maybe Bill will join me."

The deal was put together so late that Ribbs is driving a year-old Lotus-Ford Cosworth that team owner Derrick Walker purchased from the Newman-Haas team. It was used as a backup car primarily by Mario Andretti last year, but it never ran at the Speedway until Ribbs drove it.

"We have a new Lola on order and expect it in time for the Detroit Grand Prix," Ribbs said. Raymond Zimmerman, president of Service Merchandise, has never been involved with racing before, which may account for his unusual comment: "I want Willy T. to go real slow, so everybody

can see the name on the car," he said, laughing.

Cosby, nonlaughing, retorted: "I want him to go as fast as he can."

Ribbs, after a checkered career that saw him drive Formula Fords, Formula Atlantics, Trans-Am sedans, Winston Cup stock cars and IMSA sports cars, finally made it to the Indy 500 in 1991 in a car sponsored by Cosby and McDonald's. He qualified 29th but, 45 minutes before the track closed, in the race, he lasted only five laps before the engine gave out.

"I have some good memories from 1991," he said. "I want to the rookie's meeting and heard all the veterans tell us how we'd feel like Hurricane Andrew hit us going into the first turn, that the turbulence would blow our minds."

Tracy misses warmup

The Unser crew had a slower time than Aric Luyendyk's in the semifinals, but Luyendyk's team was penalized three seconds because of an equipment violation.

"I get more nervous doing this championship than I do for the race," said Snyder, whose crew

Mast, 42, making his first start in this elite event since his rookie season of 1974, shot a 6-under-par 64 and led a group of three career non-winners at the top of the first-round leaderboard.

Hart Maggett and Durly Waldorf each had a 65. Like Mast, Maggett and Waldorf played at the front of the field and took advantage of softer, smoother greens and the more gentle breezes in their early morning starting times.

As the day wore on, the winds increased, the greens spiked up and the Texas temperatures — along with the scores — rose.

Baker-Finch, however, found some relief from the afternoon heat in his pant over the Colonial Country Club course.

The darkly tanned Australian, a former British Open champion, hit his tee shot into the edge of a pond that fronts the green on the par-3 13th.

CORNING, N.Y. (AP) — Heavy winds kept scores high in Thursday's opening round of the LPGA Corning Classic, with Cathy Johnston-Forties, Kalle Robbins and Allison Finney sharing the lead at 2-under-par 70.

It was the highest score to lead after one round in 14 years at the 72-hole, \$500,000 tournament.

Five players were at 71, and 10, including defending champion Colleen Walker, were at 72.

"The wind was consistently beating on you," said Walker, who was under midway through the front nine before bogeying Nos. 7, 9 and 10.

"You had to stay awake," Walker, the leader in all four rounds at last year's Classic, said the wind dried the greens at the Corning Country Club and made them especially fast.

"You had to be short of or at the side of the pin or you'd go over the green," she said. "Today was kind of a patient day."

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Canadiens weigh pluses, minuses of having week off during playoffs

MONTREAL (AP) — A week off in the playoffs can be a blessing. It can also be a curse.

It gives time for wounds to heal. It can also hurt timing, cohesion and momentum.

The Montreal Canadiens will soon find out — again.

"No doubt it helps, but on the other side, sitting for seven days is not good," Canadiens' center Kirk Muller said Thursday. "It helps the injured guys heal up but at the same time, you don't want to lose that timing you had as a team."

The Canadiens earned an eight-day break after eliminating the New York Islanders in the Stanley Cup semifinals last Monday. They begin the best-of-7 finals Tuesday.

Montreal also had an eight-day rest before playing the Islanders, following a four-game sweep of Buffalo in the Adams Division final.

Montreal got lucky that time. The Islanders won in overtime in Game 7 over Pittsburgh in the Patrick Division final and had only 38 hours rest before an afternoon game to open their series in Montreal. The Islanders showed up tired and lost Game 4-1.

"That first game was tough for us," Muller said. "We played well in the first period and then held on. But if you asked the guys, they didn't feel as good as they did in the fifth or sixth game of a series."

The Canadiens' layoff came



thanks to a record-tying 11-game playoff streak that began with a victory in Game 3 of the opening round against Quebec. It ended when they lost Game 4 of the semifinals on Long Island.

As he did in the last break, coach Jacques Demers gave his players two days off. He had them back on the ice Thursday.

"We enjoyed the days off but now we can't wait to start the finals," said forward Gilbert Dumont. "We had eight days off before and we know how to get ready."

The Canadiens can't complain about fatigue. Demers gave them about 20 days off during the season, which would have been a radical concept under former coaches.

They've played only three games over the minimum during the first three rounds of playoffs, during which Demers has consistently used four lines and three defense pairs so no individual, with the possible exception of goaltender Patrick Roy, has been overworked.

"It's an advantage for players who are fast and for Patrick, who plays every game, 60 to 80 minutes, to regroup," Demers said.

He said forward Brian Bellows,

who has been playing with a cracked rib suffered in Game 6 of the opening round, has improved steadily because of the breaks.

"He'll be 100 percent better than he was last week," Demers said.

Center Stephan Lebeau remains the only question mark. He has been in and out of the lineup with a sprained ankle and didn't skate Thursday with the team.

The main problem for Demers is not knowing if the Canadiens will play Los Angeles or Toronto in the finals.

"I've got two teams in my head, two different approaches to the series," said Demers, who gave no indication of what personnel or line changes he would make to face either opponent.

Much has been made of some veteran players such as Muller, Bellows and Denis Savard getting a first chance to win a Stanley Cup, but the same can be said of Demers.

The closest he ever came to a Stanley Cup final was in 1986, when his St. Louis Blues were beaten in seven games of the semifinals by Calgary. His Detroit clubs reached the semifinals in 1987 and 1988 only to lose to Edmonton.

"It's a great honor to reach the finals," Demers said.

"What I like about winning the Prince of Wales Trophy was that it means I'll coach in the all-star game next year."

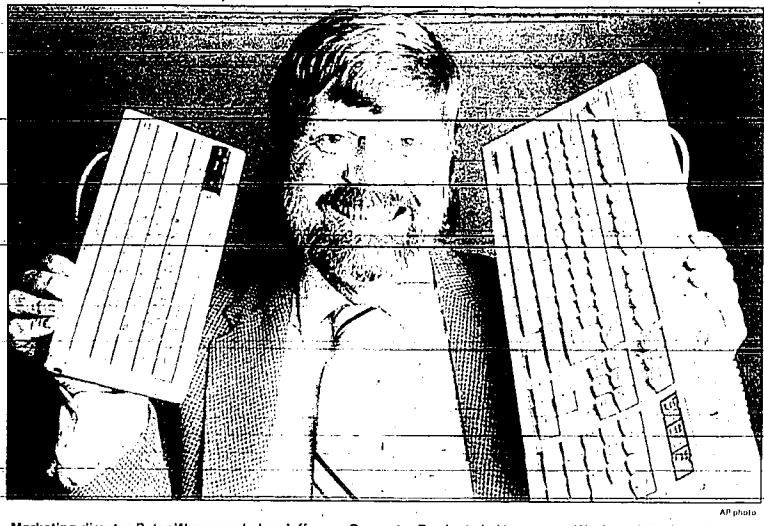
Here's how it works: Holding down the J key with your right index finger activates the cursor control and five function keys under your left hand. Holding down the F key with your left index finger activates the 10-key-pad number keys and seven function keys under your right hand. All controls are right under your hands at all times, including the mouse.

If you want to use the new Dvorak keyboard arrangement, you can do that too, by holding down the Enter key and typing the E key. Return to QWERTY by holding down the Enter key and the letter "Q."

Wezeman says tests under working conditions showed users of the system can increase productivity by 30 percent.

"It's very intuitive," he says. "It doesn't cause repetitive strain injuries, but it does correct reaching and awkward wrist and finger movements."

The keyboard changes are made possible by Jefferson Computer's patented KeyStar

"firmware," an algorithm program written on the keyboard microprocessor.

The Starpoint-101 keyboard, in appearance identical to the most popular keyboards, is ready for the market now.

Several products are still coming. Wezeman says. The Starpoint-60 keyboard, to be available in three months, eliminates keys duplicated by KeyStar technology, giving it a size attractive to notebook computer manufacturers.

By the end of the year, people will be available to connect a KeyStar Converter between their own keyboards and computers. And a Macintosh version for Apple's Macintosh computers will be available by January 1994.

KeyTronic, a Spokane-based world leader in keyboard manufacturing, has a non-exclusive license to KeyStar technology, but has not installed it in any of its keyboards. Other manufacturers are interested, Wezeman says.

Now the keyboards are available only under the name of Jefferson Computer Products. A separate company, Jefferson Dome, of Spokane, builds the keyboards.

Unit now, the company's employees, Wolf, Markowski and Ed Lindsay, an engineer in Yakima — have paid more in received time and money than they have received in compensation. But Wezeman says he is confident that will change.

Starpoint keyboards will sell to retail customers for \$179 through Jefferson Dome in Spokane and Wezeman in Vancouver.

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Students learn to give in Berkeley business course

The Associated Press BERKELEY, Calif. — Students at a University of California business class got an unusual lesson this semester. How to make a nonprofit.

Their assignment was to give away \$10,000 to charity. And it wasn't easy.

"One of the biggest things that we learned with the philanthropy project was how difficult it is to give away money," said Melissa Kelley, who took the course at UC-Berkeley's Haas School of Business.

"It seemed like everybody deserved this money."

The San Francisco Foundation donated the money to give students an inside look at the grant process, said its executive director, Robert M. Fisher.

The 28 students in the class, "Topics in the Management of Nonprofit Organizations," used a committee system to whittle down 40 applicants to three winners, said Kelley, who picked up her MBA on Monday.

All three focus on youth programs, which is where the class believed their money would have the biggest impact.

The Disabled Children's Computer Project received \$2,000, the West Berkeley Fund for Community Progress got \$5,000, and the

Suitcase Clinic, \$3,000.

All are San Francisco Bay organizations with volunteers, employees or directors who are UC-Berkeley students. The computer group provides technology information and consultation services, the fund supports education and health programs for young people and the clinic provides medical care to the homeless.

Professor M. Frances Van Loo said the practical philanthropy idea began with a guest lecture in her class in 1990 by a former official of the Peninsula Community Foundation, an agency south of San Francisco.

That class was given \$10,000 to distribute, although it came at the end of the semester instead of being a specific course. The foundation went on to fund similar programs at Stanford University.

This year, the San Francisco Foundation approached Van Loo about funding a Berkeley class. A second year has already been approved to teach a new batch of students about the pitfalls of philanthropy, Van Loo said.

"Most people think, 'Boy, what a neat deal to be able to give away money,' she said. "But I think to be fair to people, it's not easy to make those choices."

Arms makers take aim at civilian market

WASHINGTON (AP) — Faced with diminishing defense budgets, the Grumman Corp. of Hawthorne, N.J., is looking to diversify its military work by building special civilian units that would keep it afloat.

But Renato Caporali, the company's chairman, says the company couldn't find a market for that equipment.

"We once wanted a papaya for 21 days," Caporali told the Senate Appropriations defense subcommittee on Thursday.

Senior officers from three military contractors — Grumman, General Dynamics and GM Hughes — described the problems of converting parts of their companies to produce technology that, in some cases, no one wants.

The Senate panel is examining President Clinton's request of \$1.6 billion for defense conversion in next

Defense industry, finding some of its expertise isn't wanted, seeks government assistance

The military budget of \$263 billion will plan include money to train defense workers, assistance to communities and companies, and new programs for technology.

John Deutch, the undersecretary of technology for acquisition and technology, told the panel that the program must meet both defense and economic needs.

In some cases, Deutch said conversion may not be feasible. "There are some requirements, such as those for lighter aircraft and nuclear-powered submarines, that are unique to defense," he said. "The department must sustain the vitality of those portions of the industrial base that are truly defense-unique and essential for meeting future

security needs."

Deutch's comments come two weeks after Deputy Defense Secretary William Perry said some facilities, such as the shipyards building nuclear-powered submarines, could be kept open at a low-production rate.

The company officials described the problems associated with defense conversion in the 1970s.

"From watches and coffins, to subway cars and solar panels, companies got into businesses they knew nothing about — and to the best of my knowledge no one made a dime," Caporali said.

The officials said the Long Island company began its defense manufacturing Navy F-14 fighter jets

and the key is for the government to "create a market for products and the defense industry to find a way to do it."

Robert Dankanih, a senior vice president at Hughes who has directed many of the company's diversification programs, said the key to defense conversion is a healthy economy.

The officials also recommended a "flexible approach" in trade barriers and tax credits for industry.

Sen. Daniel Inouye, D-Hawaii, chairman of the Senate panel, expressed disbelief that none of the three witnesses had been contacted by the administration for their advice on defense conversion.

Inouye immediately asked the three witnesses to create a panel that would report back to the committee by July 1, on defense conversion. The three agreed to the senator's request.

Dow jumps, broad market slips

NEW YORK — The Dow industrials rose 14.67 points to end at another record-closing high of 3554.83 Thursday, boosted by strength in just a few of the blue chip components.

The old high scored on Wednesday was based in large part on a program buying and the direction of bond prices — two factors that had little influence on stocks Thursday.

The broad market, however, finished mostly lower, reflecting investor concerns about the weak performance of the dollar against the yen, another surge in gold prices and the current budget debate in Congress, analysts said.

Declining issues outnumbered advancing issues 980 to 902 and

volume on the Big Board was estimated at 290 million, compared with 274 million on Wednesday.

Dow components Chevron and Caterpillar posted strong gains, accounting for nearly all of the advance in the average, analysts said.

Chevron ended up 3% at \$88 1/2, and Caterpillar up 2 1/2% at \$72 1/2. Alcoa, General Electric ended up at \$73 1/2 and IBM up at \$53 1/2.

IBM rallied following its announcement that it plans to sell two refineries and take a \$550 million charge against its second-quarter earnings, analysts said. The restructuring, recommended by an internal study, will improve cash flow and return on capital employed, Chevron said.

Caterpillar climbed amid signs of improved demand for heavy

machinery, analysts said. "A sense is emerging that the industry has turned a corner on demand for heavy equipment," said Ed LaVarway, vice president of investment strategies at FNB Atlantic.

Yet much of the action and focus was in the broader market, which bucked under the stress of a falling dollar and rising gold prices, LaVarway said. The dollar hit an all-time low Thursday of 107.14 yen amid repeated Federal Reserve intervention. COMEX June gold futures ended \$6.10 higher at \$381.40 an ounce.

A weaker dollar, in the short run, can be inflationary, concerns about imported products become more expensive for U.S. consumers and exacerbates trade tensions between the United States and Japan.

Japan continues run as top creditor

TOKYO (AP) — Japan was the top creditor nation again last year, with the value of its overseas assets exceeding foreign liabilities by a record \$51.6 billion, the Finance Ministry said Tuesday.

The report is likely to bring even tougher calls from trading partners for stronger efforts to pare Japan's big trade surpluses.

By selling much more merchandise abroad than it buys, Japan has cash to spare for overseas loans and for direct investment in foreign factories and property.

Finance Ministry officials said the

34.1 percent growth in Japan's net foreign assets resulted mainly from a drop in foreign liabilities — the amount Japanese owe to foreigners.

The ministry did not provide figures for Japan's assets and liabilities in individual countries. It said total Japanese foreign assets rose 1.4 percent to \$2.04 trillion at the end of last year, from \$1.992 trillion in 1991.

Direct investment in stocks and purchases of foreign stocks and bonds rose slightly. Total liabilities fell 6.3 percent to \$1.52 trillion. Japan became the world's largest creditor nation for the first time in 1985 as the major industrial countries

coordinated their monetary policies to increase the yen's value against other currencies.

The move was part of efforts to decrease Japan's trade surplus by making Japanese goods more expensive abroad and foreign goods cheaper in Japan.

But that also made it easier for Japanese to buy foreign stocks and property. And so far, the strategy has done little to trim Japan's trade surplus, which surged to a record \$107.1 billion in 1992 as a recession stalled Japanese economic activity and depressed demand for imports.

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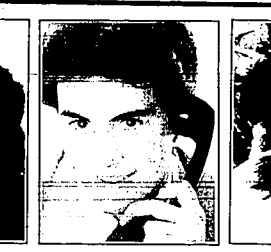

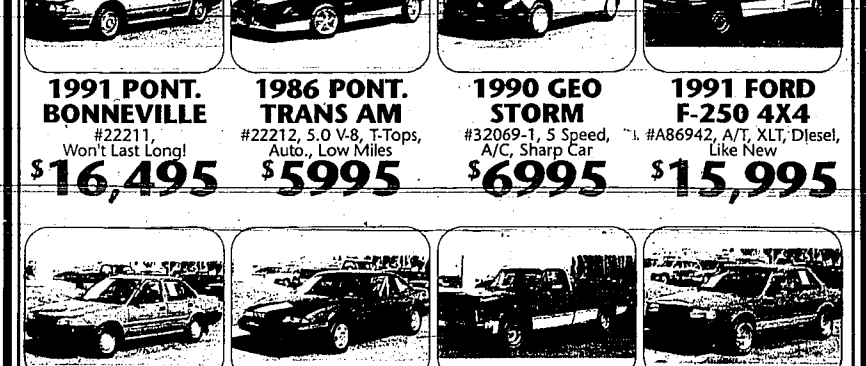



Bridge players can sometimes be gracious losers. It doesn't happen too often when they are on the short end of the score, but certainly does when they can manipulate the loss of a trick into the only play to score a slam. Mike Lawrence, a former ACE, treats the subject of loser-on-loser play in a new set of 15 pamphlets covering many phases of the game.

It's unusual to find such distributional duplication in the North-South hands after a takeout double of an opposing pre-emptive bid. Had either North or South held a third diamond instead of a third club, the slam would have been a slammer. As it was, South had to take advantage of a loser-on-loser play.

To make his slam, South should win his club ace and draw two rounds of trumps. The king and ace of hearts are cashed to finesse would be silly in view of West's preempt) and a small heart is ruffed. The king and ace of diamonds come next, and an dummy's heart jack. South discards a low club, allowing East to win. East must lead a red suit to offer a ruff and discard, and the loser-on-loser play lands the otherwise unmakeable slam.

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Passion, murder, jealousy: Surprise, this is a sitcom

LOS ANGELES — Start with a detective, add one dead body and a philanthropic husband and throw in a suspicious wife. What you have is *Went*. Yes, a situation comedy? Well, yes. Emmy-winning writer Jay Tarses has created a different sort of series, which he describes as "a romantic comedy mystery," adding, "I raise anyone missed the point." "It's tongue in cheek."

"Black Tie Affair," a *Went* series begins with two back-to-back episodes Saturday on NBC.

Just 12 days before its first showing, the program got a new name. The original title, "Smoldering Lust," was a bit less subtle.

Kate Capshaw, best known for the film "Indiana Jones and The Temple of Doom" and "Black Rain," makes her television series debut as the passionate wife of a sports-wear catalog mogul, played by Christopher Cody.

She lusts after detective Dave Brodsky, played by Bradley Whitford, whom she hires to do her work. Cody, her husband lusts after one of his catalog models, Alison Elliott, and schedules a tryst in a hotel room.

Enter one dead body — and one husband in big trouble.

"I'm proud of the work," said Tarses, who won an Emmy for his writing on "The Carol Burnett Show" and was nominated twice for his writing on "The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd," which he created.

"I think it's some of the best work I've ever done," he said.

Tarses wrote and directed some episodes of "Black Tie Affair," which he said evolved from a com-

edy about moneyed people to a mystery involving a wealthy San Francisco couple whose marriage is on the rocks.

He didn't think of Miss Capshaw for the lead, he said, because she's been associated with feature films, but her agent showed her a script and the actress liked it.

"I was talked, we had a wonderful meeting," Tarses said. "She's so cooperative, just the best, and she's funny and she's good-looking and she's a nice person."

"It makes the environment special when everyone's considerate of each other. And the chemistry between Kate and Bradley Whitford, who plays Brodsky, was terrific."

Tarses' other credits include creating and producing "The Tony Randall Show," "Buffalo Bill" and "We've Got Each Other," and writing and producing "The Bob Newhart Show." He's also known for strong women's roles such as Molly Dodd, played by Blair Brown.

"I don't know why people say I write good women. If they were men, I'd write the same way," Tarses said. "I've always felt that women and men are the same except for genitalia. I think they feel the same things. I just think you have to have logical dialogue."

Despite his reputation for high-quality writing, Tarses' shows haven't always done well in the ratings.

"My history in television has been mostly shows that are critically acclaimed and get cancelled very early," he said.

After delivering "Black Tie Affair" to NBC last October, Tarses waited for it to be placed on the schedule. And waited. And waited.

"They knew what it was going to be like. They saw dailies and they saw scripts," he said. "The word from there was that they liked it, so I guess the thing to do with something you like is to sit on it."

Meanwhile, he kept busy with a New York production of his play "Man in his Underwear," which he described as "a comedy with pain."

"I've tried to move on," he said. "All the other people involved with 'Affair' have moved on. But it might work and if it works, we have to get all these people back together again."

He's discouraged that the network has scheduled the show to premiere late Saturday on Memorial Day weekend, when the audience is likely to be small.

"I think we've got a good show here," he said. "I think they should get behind the show."

But he hasn't lost hope. "The history of television is just littered with shows that people discovered if the network stays with them," Tarses said, "shows that were supposed to die a long time ago — 'Cheers,' 'All in the Family,' ..."

"This could zoom through the roof and I could feel badly because I said all these things and they were smart to put it on at 10 o'clock on May 29."

As for the future, Tarses said, "I would like to write longform things. If I had something to say, I would write more plays, I would write more books, I would write more screenplays."

Despite his battles with ratings and scheduling, he has no regrets about the choices he's made.

"I wouldn't have done anything differently," he said.

After a moment's thought, he added, "I might not have bought Nehru suits."

Final 'Cheers' 20th most-watched show

NEW YORK — After 11 seasons and lots of hype, *Sam put it simply: "We're closed."*

But the subject wasn't as the nation's TV critics belted up to the bar to assess May 20's "Cheers" finale.

Reaction generally was upbeat for the episode, which included a return appearance by Sam's former girlfriend Diane and an after-hours bull session in which the Cheers gang discussed the meaning of life.

"I was very moved," said Tom Shales of The Washington Post. "It ended on a note of hope. Considering that the characters were often described as losers," this was a very humane way to conclude things.

"We're left with the impression that the bar remains open and this oasis will go on, even if we viewers won't be there."

Billed by NBC for weeks as "the greatest night on television," the episode drew plenty of "Cheers" fans who wanted to "be a part of history."

The number of viewers who awoke Friday morning with a "Cheers" hangover totaled 93 million, according to Nielsen Media Research figures.

The rating for the 98-minute wrapup was 45.5, which computes to 42.4 million television households. The broadcast captured 64 percent of all households watching TV at that hour.

That ranks the finale 20th among the highest-rated broadcasts in history. Previously, the audience fell short of the top audience episode, the final "M-A-S-H" episode a decade ago seen by 121.6 million viewers.

Also scoring well was Thursday's "Tonight" live remote from Boston's Bull & Finch, the bar that inspired Cheers. It reached almost 15 million households for a 43 percent share of the audience — "Tonight" is

third-largest audience ever.

The big surprise was the absence of surprises. By the fade-out, bartender and reconfirmed bachelor Sam (Ted Danson) has faced the doubts in his life, then concluded "that he is a lucky man."

He was left alone with his one true love — Cheers," noted Ed Siegel, TV critic for The Boston Globe. "It was a moving way to pay tribute to the character that was the star of the show all along — the bar."

In his review, Dan J. O'Connor of The New York Times argued that during the final scene, "things didn't turn absolutely soapy," but nearby. "He called the finale 'an overly long and uncharacteristically labored episode.'"

John Carman of the San Francisco Chronicle, who liked the finale, found the encore performance of Shelley Long's Diane disappointing.

"Her cute pills must have passed their expiration date," he said.

Still, he said, "I was choked up at the end."

But the Houston Chronicle's Ann Hodges, while she also found the conclusion fitting, wasn't crying in her beer about the series' passing.

"I've admired their ability to keep 'Cheers' going as long as it has," she said. "But in the last year, they've slowed down. It was time for it to go."

For Hodges and other critics, the understated nature of the finale itself was nearly overwhelmed by the hoopla. Overkill came in many forms, including a barrage of hype, news tie-ins on local stations — and, finally, the nationwide "Tonight" show remote.

Shales called the "Tonight" hour "a debacle that besotted the memory of 'Cheers.'"

Similarly, wearing, Carman quoted Shakespeare:

"Silence," wrote the Bard, "is the perfectest herald of joy."

Chung to co-anchor 'CBS Evening News'

CBS finally will take dramatic action to stop the ratings erosion that for years has plagued "The CBS Evening News with Dan Rather," adding Connie Chung as co-anchor starting Tuesday.

The Rather-Chung team will be the first regular male-female anchor team on a network newscast since Barbara Walters and Harry Reasoner were on ABC from 1976-78. Although Asians and other minority women have anchored network newscasts, Chung becomes the first full-time minority female anchor of a nightly newscast, according to a CBS spokesman.

There has been a truly successful co-anchored network news show since NBC teamed Che Huntley and David Brinkley in the 1960s and they went on to create TV's dominant national newscast.

Though the Rather-Chung announcement by CBS News Presi-

dent Eric Ober on Monday was presented as "a clear and direct strategy" to give the evening newscast more flexibility, it shouldn't be fool-hardy. Ober has watched the ratings decline of Rather's solo newscast over the past several seasons.

ABC's "World News Tonight" with Peter Jennings has been the No. 1 evening newscast for the last few years with Rather's show a solid No. 2. But the "NBC Nightly News with Tom Brokaw" has gained ground on CBS and even has knocked Rather into third place a few times in the past year.

This obviously wasn't satisfactory to a network that has risen to No. 1 in prime-time, is No. 1 in daytime and next fall will make a determination to bid to become No. 1 in late night with the new David Letterman talk show.

Rather, in a prepared statement, praised Chung, adding that her co-anchor role "will help me spend the rest of my career at CBS News do-

ing more of what I like so much to do — report from the field."

Chung added, "We have known each other for more than 22 years and I couldn't be more excited about working with him in this new role."

The timing of the Rather-Chung announcement clearly was calculated to cheer network affiliates, who were about to convene for their annual convention in New York. Disappointing ratings growth for the network has been one of the few downers for CBS stations in recent years.

The CBS move makes good sense. Rather, 61, has not had the firm grip on the audience that his predecessor, Walter Cronkite, had 42 years ago (Rather became anchor and managing editor of "CBS Evening News" on March 9, 1981). Yet Rather remains a respected, hard-working asset to CBS News, particularly when anchoring from such news sites as Tiananmen Square in China, Afghanistan, Moscow and Waco, Texas.

Survey: Some viewers stay tuned

NEW YORK — You're watching TV and the show offends you. Do you sit there and take it or do you get up and go?

A survey released earlier this year on the public's attitudes toward television said 12 percent of the respondents do nothing, 43 percent change channels and 15 percent turn off their sets.

The National Association of Broadcasters and the Network Television Association, an alliance of the Big Three broadcast networks, co-sponsored the survey, which has been taken every two years since 1959.

The Roper Organization polled 4,000 adults nationwide in personal interviews between November and December last year. The results had a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 3 percentage points.

The study, "America's Watching," said that even in an age of channel "grazing" about two in three viewers regularly make a special effort to watch shows they particularly like.

And despite increasing cable alternatives, about three-quarters of the "appointed" viewers with cable said that ABC, CBS and NBC still offer most of their favorites.

Viewers find TV news highly credible, the survey also said.

PBS film 'Zoo' documents animal magnetism

At first, "Zoo" looks like it could be a sort of National Geographic Special: interesting, even beautiful, animals, most of them uncaged, stretching and yawning, growling and cawing, chattering and chirping.

Ah, but this is a Frederick Wiseman film. Like all his 25 documentaries, there is no narration. Wiseman, the producer, director and editor, simply allows photographer John Davey's camera to roll.

It's in the editing process that he uses his genius to create an impressionistic portrait. His camera seldom blinks, and sometimes — "Zoo" is no exception — it captures some very tough realities.

Wiseman said he likes to "place viewers in the middle of what is going on. They're given enough information so that they can think through their own reactions to what they are seeing or hearing. They are not spoon-fed or told what to think by an omniscient narrator. It's not for me to determine whether it succeeds or not."

The film is not entirely devoid of dialogue, however, nor with the zoo's visitors and staffers talking among themselves. (For foreign audiences, soundtracks of Wiseman films are subtitled.)

Not far into "Zoo" the viewer becomes aware that the humans wandering about the 290-acre Miami zoological park are at times funnier than the animals. Wiseman gets minks for restraint and finesse. He could have edited the documentary so that that point is made in spades but chose the subtle approach.

"There are something like 2,000 cuts in 'Zoo,'" Wiseman said, "and at least half the participants don't speak English. Unlike some of my other films, like 'Near Death' or 'Wellfare,' there's very little talk. But there's a lot of sound."

Behind Miami Metrozoo's animals is a staff of humans who care for them. Here is where Wiseman takes us beyond the pleasant facade that visitors enjoy. By the time it's over, the film has not only visited the animals, but also touched on issues of ethics, finances, technology, administration and research.

One of the more interesting staffers is chief veterinarian Christine Miller. In the film she cleans a gorilla's teeth, castrates a wolf, tends to some animals maulled by a wild dog, tries to save a stillborn rhinoceros, and when that effort is deemed a failure, cuts open the newborn for an autopsy.

"She is extremely competent," said Wiseman. "Her job is like practicing general medicine and surgery."

Wiseman said he chose to film at Miami

Metrozoo during the winter of 1991/92, when he was teaching at Florida International University. "A zoo had always been high on my list of possible subjects," he said. "I thought this was an excellent zoo. I then got in touch with the director of the zoo, and I was there for six weeks, in February and March."

Wiseman accumulated 80 hours of film and took a year to edit that down to the two hours that air Wednesday. Viewers should be forewarned that there is footage of a naked patient not recommended for the squeamish. But Wiseman did not consider shutting down the cameras or deleting material.

"One or two times — not in the 'Zoo' movie — I just decided not to shoot, and I always regretted it afterward: In 'Hospital' a man was brought in. He worked in a subway, and he'd been burned in some sort of explosion. And his family was all gathered around him.

"I never even asked to film. If there's the slightest objection, I don't. I don't feel I have any absolute right to film. Always, after it's shot, I ask them (the subjects) if they have any objection. If they do, I don't use it. It's extremely rare that anyone objects. I've never lost a sequence that I really wanted."

He rarely has regrets about what he's including in his documentaries, even though footage of naked patients at Bridgewater (Mass.) State Hospital for the Criminally Insane cost him big.

His "Tilcut Follies," made in 1966 when he was teaching at Boston University Law School, was shown at the New York Film Festival in 1967 and received good reviews in Life magazine and The New York Times.

But the reviewers were also critical of the state for the conditions at the hospital, and the governor asked his attorney general, Elliot I. Richardson, to obtain an injunction against the showing of the film. Richardson said the film violated the right of privacy of an inmate shown naked in his cell.

Wiseman countered that the state was trying to prevent the public from knowing about conditions at Bridgewater. He also said that in shooting the film, he was always accompanied by a prison guard, and that about 10,000 people (including high-school students) visited the hospital annually on tours and saw the same conditions shown in the film.

Calling the film "ghoulish," the trial judge agreed with the privacy argument and banned "Tilcut Follies," making it the only American film to be banned for reasons other than obscenity or national security. The state's highest court ruled it could be seen only by limited audiences of professionals.

Wiseman appealed the case to the U.S. Supreme Court on First Amendment issues but was turned down twice.

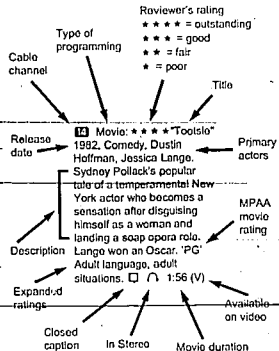

Soap operas move along at speedy clip

People love to say of soap operas that you can tune in to one after a year, or 10, and still know what's going on. The people who say this are people who have not watched a soap in a year, or 10.

To prepare for last Wednesday's "20th Annual Daytime Emmy Awards," I spent two days last week watching daytime drama. I stayed awake most of the time, I took copious notes, and I still don't have a clue. I haven't gotten slower, soaps have gotten faster.

A man gives a woman a kitten; a woman in pink pajamas is tied to the headboard of her bed; a man talks a woman down from the roof of a building in a rainstorm; somebody says, "I took the blame and the guilt that you felt and I threw it in your face!"

All this happened on CBS's "Guiding Light" last Tuesday—before the intro music. This was opera. Soaps have been MTV'd. Traditionally, only promos and margaritas ran their courses slowly. Today, everything does. In the new, super-competitive TV world, nobody has a minute to waste.

Other changes you might notice if you haven't watched daytime drama in a year, or 10:

1. The kitchen has practically disappeared. Granted, there's an occasional romantic-din-

ner-for-two in the living room, but you never see anybody cooking. And nobody stops by the Hughes' kitchen for coffee on "As the World Turns." Besides, there's nobody to fix it, because all the women are now running multinational corporations. Which brings us to

2. The office is the new center of action. As female soap stars have left home for the workplace, the workplace has developed an emotional life of its own. Take Cricket's warm, paneled law office on "The Young and the Restless"; it's 10 times homier than the sterile, tubular loft she shares with husband Danny.

3. The decanter has disappeared. Remember how every soap living room used to have a bar in the corner? Every time a character came home, he or she headed straight to the nearest cut-glass container of bourbon. No more. Today's soap people don't have drinks; they have drinking problems. "Another World's" big plot line this spring was Felicia's alcoholism.

Teetotaling is only the beginning. Daytime drama has discovered the "new pretty"; issues shows are all the rage. HIV, breast cancer, interracial marriage. In a surfer bar on CBS's "The Bold and the Beautiful," I heard this line: "Now what exactly worries you about hiring a mentally disabled worker?"

Admirable, but troubling. If soaps excise all the sins and shortcomings we struggle against (or dream of) in real life, what will be their use to us?

CBS '93 - It's not just Dave Fox aims at youths with 8 new fall shows

NEW YORK — Long before you get to David Letterman's new late-night show, CBS will roll out some of its other new stars with a prime-time fall lineup that features eight new shows and extra work for Connie Chung.

While the network focused on its new programming Thursday, some notable shows — including critical faves "Bob" and "Brooklyn Bridge," and the once-popular "Designing Women" and "Major Dad" — were off the schedule for 1993-94.

Questions also were raised about Ed Bradley's "Street Stories," which will run through the summer. ABC is chasing Bradley to jump networks. Whether he returns or not, the show will be revamped and put on the shelf until 1994, said Jeff Sagansky, president of CBS Entertainment. What's new? Try Oscar-winning actress Faye Dunaway starring opposite Robert Urich in the sitcom "It Had to Be You," your typical Boston socialite meets carpenter and falls in love story.

And ex-Eagles front man Glenn Frey, whose recording career has fallen off the charts, takes a crack at the Nielsen with "South of Sunset." Frey plays an L.A. private detective. No word on guest

shots for the similarly missing in action Joe Walsh.

There's a lot of familiar faces, too. Annie Potts of "Designing Women" will replace Susan Dey on a revamped "Love and War." Peter Scolaro of "Newhart" stars in the new "Family Album." Harry Anderson of "Night Court" turns up as columnist Dave Barry in "Dave's World."

As for newswoman Chung, the network is pitting its new co-anchor against NBC's increasingly popular woman "Seinfeld" with her own newsmagazine, "Eye to Eye with Connie Chung." The program will debut June 17 to give it a jump against the competition.

Sagansky was optimistic CBS could do well against Jerry, George and Kramer.

"I think Seinfeld is not going to do what 'Cheers' did," said Sagansky. "And as shown by 'Home Improvement,' it is takeable by a broad appeal program." "Bob," the first Bob Newhart flop after a pair of brilliant sitcoms starring the droll comic, could be considered as a mid-season replacement, said Sagansky. And warm up the fax machines, get out the earplugs — "Tom," starring Tom Arnold, is another replacement show.

Arnold is leaving ABC, where wife Rosanne is still employed, under less than happy circum-

stances.

"So far, our relations with him are fantastic," Sagansky said. "He's incredibly enthusiastic, and eager to go back to work."

LOS ANGELES — Fox Broadcasting Co.'s fall lineup jettisons a pack of youth-oriented programs as the network aims to broaden its audience with eight new shows, including a weekly news magazine.

But the popular "Beverly Hills, 90210" will be back with its cast fully intact, said Sandy Grushow, president of Fox Entertainment Group. "Melrose Place" also is returning. "Sinbad, Robert Townsend, Don Rickles, Richard Lewis and Queen Latifah are among those who will be featured in new fall programs unveiled Tuesday, including four comedies, two dramas and a variety show.

The 7-year-old network is expanding its late programming with the launch of "Fox Night at the Movies" on Mondays, beginning June 21.

"The Chevy Chase Show," Fox's entry in the late-night talk show derby, begins Sept. 7.

The 16 shows canceled by Fox include "Class of '96," "Key West" and "Flying Blind" — all aimed at the young audience that Fox sought in an effort to carve out a niche from the big three networks.

Grushow said Fox now is trying to gain more viewers in the upper end of the 18-49 demographics group.

Fox's new shows for the 1993-94 season are:

— "Buddy Blues," a comedy about two mismatched police officers (Giancarlo Esposito, Ron Eldard) in Bakersfield, Calif.

— "Daddy Dearest" stars Lewis and Rickles as father and son sharing a household and insults.

— "My Girls," a sitcom starring trap artist Queen Latifah as one of four upwardly mobile black women living in a New York brownstone.

"Sinbad" stars the comedian-actor as a successful video game designer whose bachelor life is turned upside down when he takes in two foster children.

"The Adventures of Brisco County Jr.," an hour-long Western that follows the exploits of an 1890s Harvard Law graduate (Bruce Campbell) who turns bounty hunter.

"The X-Files," a drama that pits two FBI agents on the case of unsolved crimes possibly linked to paranormal phenomena and the supernatural. Gillian Anderson and David Duchovny star.

"Townsend Television" brings the comedy-variety genre back with filmmaker Robert Townsend. Fox characterizes it as "The Ed Sullivan Show" for the '90s.

"Front Page" is a Saturday night newsmagazine, with Ron Reagan, son of the former president, as one of five correspondents. It will originate from Los Angeles with video essays and commentaries to go with stories.

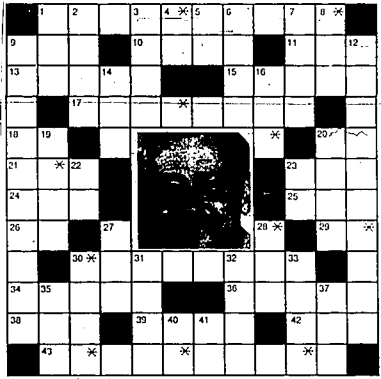

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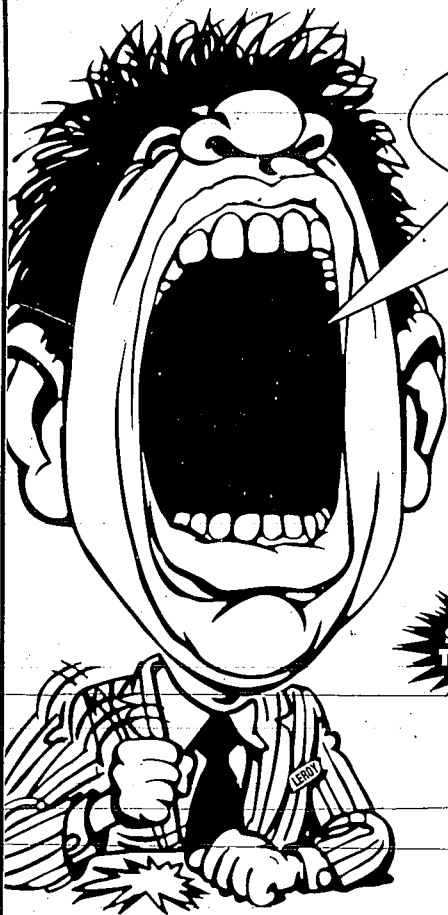
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
