Idaho relaxes rules for banking water

BOISE — State water officials Thursday made it a little easier for the federal government to rent its own water.

The Idaho Water Resources Board ruled that water districts can lift some restrictions on how water stored in federal reservoirs can be used under state law.

Endangered salmon have focused attention on just who owns the water in federal reservoirs on the Snake River.

"We have to move water in July and August," John Keys, the Bureau of Reclamation's Pacific Northwestern regional director, told the board.

The bureau wants to move more than 200,000 acre feet of water from the Upper Snake River, including 20,000 acre feet from Lake Walcott, downstream to help "flush" endangered salmon to the ocean.

The bureau has asked three southern Idaho water districts to waive any fees or condition on water released to help flush endangered salmon out to sea. It also asked that reservoir refilling priority conditions be waived.

The National Marine Fisheries Service's ruling that continued operation of federal dams on the lower Snake and Columbia rivers will not unduly harm endangered salmon was contingent on a minimum flow through the system.

In order to meet that minimum flow, the bureau needs 220,000 acre-feet of water from the Upper Snake River system.

But it isn't looking to buy any water. It plans to use stored water not already allocated for other purposes and water normally used to generate power at bureau dams.

Keys said. And it is trying to get unallocated storage space back into federal ownership, he said.

"We don't think the bureau has any water in those reservoirs," Department of Water Resource Director Keith Higginson said. The water in the federal reservoirs on the Snake River belongs to the state of Idaho, he said.

Former Lincoln County teacher faces sex charge

SHOSHONE — A 65-year-old substitute teacher and husband of a popular local baby sitter was charged Thursday with sexually molesting a 6-year-old girl.

Glenn O. Tremayne returned to jail after he decided not to ask that his \$50,000 bond be reduced.

The Shoshone police chief had testified he could not guarantee Tremayne's safety if he was allowed to go home.

A retired schoolteacher of 35 years, Tremayne told 5th

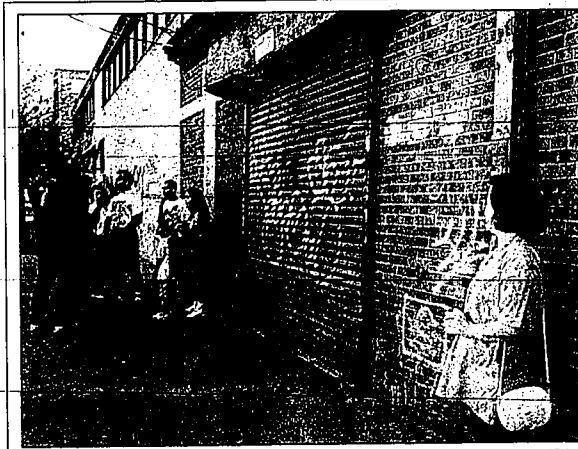
District Magistrate R. Barry Wood that he last worked in May as a substitute teacher.

The formerly taught school full time in Richfield, Lincoln County Prosecutor Jennifer Brown said.

Tremayne was arrested at his home on East D Street Wednesday night after Wood issued a search warrant based on testimony heard that afternoon.

A preliminary hearing is scheduled for July 7-8 on felony charges of lewd conduct with a child and injury to a child.

Brown said the lewd conduct charge carries a maximum sentence of 15 years. Please see MOLEST/A2

Arrests smash terror bomb ring

NEW YORK — Eight Muslim fundamentalists were arrested Thursday, five while stirring an explosive "witches' brew" for plotting a day of bombings of the United Nations, a federal building and the Holland and Lincoln tunnels, the FBI said.

The planned terror spree was conceived about 2 1/2 months after the Feb. 26 World Trade Center bombing, and two of the eight suspects told an informant they helped in a test blast for that attack, a federal complaint alleged.

The group also targeted a U.S. senator and outspoken Jewish New York state lawmaker for assassination, the FBI said. Agents wouldn't confirm a

legged ringleader Siddig Ibrahim Siddig Ali reportedly told an informant. "Law enforcement's answer is: No, you cannot," U.S. Attorney Mary Jo White told reporters.

The attack on the twin towers killed

six, injured more than 1,000 and shook the national psyche, six Muslim fundamentalists are now in custody.

The suspects in the new plot — five of them Sudanese nationals with permanent U.S. resident status, the others' backgrounds unclear — also discussed bombing unspecified "other military and governmental targets," the complaint said.

The motive wasn't known. A federal judge ordered all eight held without bail.

Also Thursday, authorities searched the Jersey City, N.J., apartment of radical Muslim cleric Sheikh Omar Abdel-Rahman, the spiritual mentor of several of the Trade Center sus-

Triple drowning stuns Colorado town

STERLING, Colo. — "Grandpa, I can't get him!" 11-year-old Jeanan Guerra screamed.

She was a good swimmer, but she underestimated the strength of her panicked 3-year-old cousin as he clung to her for dear life in a lake.

Bill Albrandt followed Jeanan into the water and both youngsters grabbed hold of him.

Suddenly, the struggling stopped. All three slid silently into North Sterling Reservoir as two relatives who couldn't swim watched.

"I just can't talk about it any more," Darlene Albrandt, who watched her husband and grandchildren drown Tuesday, told reporters from her front steps.

"I can't talk to you now, I just can't," Bill Albrandt, 56, was a retired welder who loved to fish. He and his wife decided to take the youngsters and Albrandt's mother, Rachel Cullip, out on their 17-foot boat to a cove in the northwest part of the 3,000-acre reservoir. They packed a picnic lunch. At lunchtime, it grew hot and the life jackets came off.

Jeanan and her cousin Michael Chavez began "horsing around" on the stern and Michael fell out of the boat, Mrs. Albrandt said.

Mrs. Albrandt tried to maneuver the boat close enough to toss a flotation device, but

she was too late. She and Cullip managed to pull Michael from the water about 45 minutes later, but couldn't save him.

Mrs. Albrandt flagged down other boaters, who went for help.

Later Tuesday, Albrandt's body was pulled from the 12-foot-deep reservoir. Divers continued searching for Jeanan's body Thursday.

Nineteen miles from the reservoir in Sterling, a community of 10,000 near the Nebraska border, Wednesday was the start of "Hay Days," the small agricultural city's celebration of summer.

But the picnics and the farm machinery exhibits were subdued as residents talked of the search for Jeanan's body and the triple drowning.

Acquaintances of the family spoke with admiration of Albrandt's devotion to his grandchildren.

"He loved those kids," said Bill Williams, a real estate agent and friend. "He was a welder, and a good one, but he had problems with his lungs several years ago and had to retire. It seems like those kids were with him all the time."

The area has had other jolts recently. Late last week, a 10-year-old Sterling boy struck his head in the city's indoor pool, lost consciousness and sank to the bottom. Lifeguards brought him out of the water and resuscitated him.

In March, two students at a nearby high school were killed in a traffic accident.

House kills supercollider

WASHINGTON — House members eager to prove their resolve to end the deficit voted Thursday to kill the \$10 billion superconducting super collider by an even wider margin than they did last year.

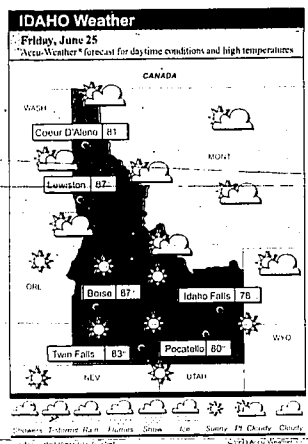
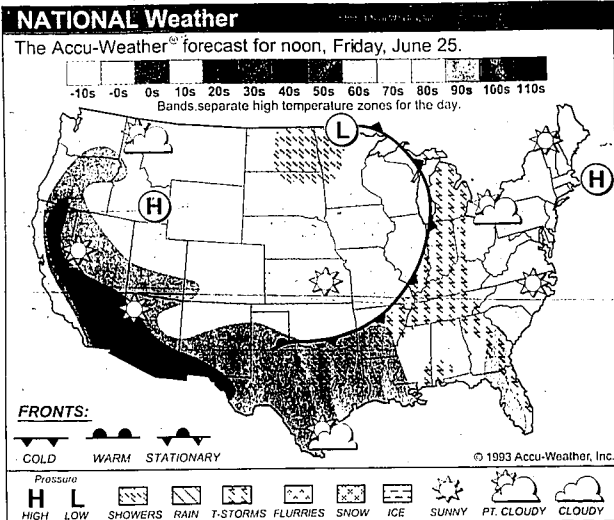
But the 280-150 vote to end the project, branded by House opponents as a "boondoggle," "his turkey" and "Jurassic park," does not necessarily mean it will die.

The Senate last year voted to resuscitate the giant atom-smasher after the House voted 232-181 to close it. A House-Senate conference committee dominated by collider advocates proposed \$517 million and that was ultimately enacted. However, proponents were less optimistic that a similar rescue would ensue this year.

"Maybe the Senate will save it and we can save it in conference," President Clinton said after the vote.

Opponents hammered away at cost overruns and delays in the project, the failure of foreign governments to join in the project and the need for frugality amid budget deficits.

Summer weather is here at last. It took a few extra days but skies over Idaho were clearing, temperatures rising and winds diminishing Thursday as high pressure built over the Gem State. By today, summer conditions should be in place across the entire state. Gusty winds continued in the north and southeast but were expected to taper off Thursday night. Temperatures, while warmer, were still below normal on Thursday afternoon. Middle-range readings were mostly in the 60s and 70s. A few light showers fell in northern Idaho with Moscow reporting .04 inch and Mullan .01. The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 79 degrees at Lewiston and Hagerman. Ketchum and Stanley reported the coldest at 26 degrees. Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 113 degrees at Coalinga, Calif.; Craig, Colo., reported the lowest temperature at 25 degrees.

Thunderstorms lash wide area; mercury at low marks

Thunderstorms moved eastward, and by Thursday afternoon rain showers and thunderstorms extended over the southern Atlantic Coast states, the Tennessee Valley, the Gulf of Mexico states, the lower Missouri Valley, the Mississippi Valley, the upper Great Lakes, and the lower Ohio valley. Morning temperatures were lower than normal for late June over a large part of the nation. Low temperature records for the date were broken or tied from North Carolina to Washington state. Base panel overrules Air Force

WASHINGTON (AP) — Overriding the Pentagon, the base closing commission voted Thursday to give New Jersey's McGuire Air Force Base a major new role in restructuring U.S. air power. It called for closing bases in New York and Michigan but saving hurricane-battered Homestead Air Force Base in Florida. The panel recommended shutting down two air bases — Plattsburgh in New York and K.I. Sawyer in Michigan — and taking operations away from others. The Pentagon had recommended closing McGuire as an active-duty base and turning it into a reserve facility. In another decision going against the Pentagon, the panel voted to save Homestead, which was devastated by Hurricane Andrew.

The list of changes compiled by the commission in meetings through Sunday will go to the White House. The President Clinton will have until July 15 to accept or reject the list. If he turns it down, the panel has an additional month to change the list and submit it to Clinton a final time. If the president accepts a list, he sends it to Congress, where lawmakers have 45 working days to vote it up or down with no changes permitted. Thursday's decisions came after wide-ranging debate on where best to place the nation's bombers, air transport planes and refueling tankers at a time the size of the military is being reduced in line with the end of the Cold War and breakup of the Soviet Union. As one part of a new Air Force strategy, the Pentagon has decided to create "air mobility" bases that would combine airlift and refueling plans. The Pentagon had sought to make Plattsburgh Air Force Base the mobility base for the East Coast, but the panel decided that McGuire in New

Jersey had a better location near supporting units. On Thursday, the commission also decided: To save 3,400 jobs at the Lettner Army Depot in Pennsylvania and to reduce employment by more than 1,900 at Tooele Army Depot in Utah. New missile repair maintenance work will be brought in to Lettner. To realign Griffiss Air Force Base in New York, transferring out B-52 bombers and KC-135 tankers. A contractor would maintain minimum operation of the airfield, and other functions will be transferred to the Air National Guard at the base. To convert March Air Force Base in California to an Air Force Reserve facility. To keep open Grand Forks Air Force Base in North Dakota and Fairchild Air Force Base in Washington state.

Continued from A1 state law for certain specific uses. The state Legislature, last year, granted the bureau permission to use some of that water for salmon "flush" for three years. The bureau also plans to make the arrangement permanent through the appropriate state water-rights application to allow it to use the water outside the state of Idaho. So long as moving the water doesn't adversely affect other water users, John Rosholt could see no objections to the bureau's requests, he said. Rosholt is the attorney for the Twin Falls and North Side canal companies. But not all of the eastern Idaho water district has been asked, he said. Water District 1 includes eastern Idaho water users upstream from Milner Dam. Water districts on the Boise and Payette rivers, however, objected to the bureau's requests. The water the bureau plans to run down the river will come at a time

when the river normally is at its lowest and could ease water quality problems, provide some recreation and generate a little power along the way, Keys said. "We will run all of it through the turbines," he said. That would include Idaho Power Co.'s hydroelectric facilities. But with irrigation water already flowing in the river, the bureau could only move 1,500 to 2,000 cubic feet per second more water down the river without flooding areas near Burley, Keys said.

night was not answered. "Brown said an investigation" is continuing, and Health and Welfare officials have interviewed other girls. More interviews are scheduled, she added. Continued from A1 duct charge was filed and Tremayne arrested as soon as possible partly because his wife, Irma, baby-sits children in the couple's home. "I have a really hard time leaving someone like that out on the street," Brown said. The mother of the 6-year-old girl named in the complaint said the two were watching a television movie Tuesday night that dealt with child sexual abuse. During the program, the girl told her mother "That's what he did to me," Brown said. The criminal complaint alleges Tremayne "French kissed" the girl, tied her to a bed, fondled her genitals and watched her go to the bathroom.

Tremayne watching the children alone while his wife was away. Tremayne did not enter a plea to either charge Thursday. That will come if his case is sent to District Court after the preliminary hearing. The second charge alleges Tremayne threw a 5-year-old girl across a room in January, leaving red marks on her arm. Mail bomb injures Yale scientist, may be linked to California blast

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — A mail bomb severely wounded a Yale University computer scientist Thursday, and the FBI was investigating a possible link to other explosions, including one that injured a California professor this week.

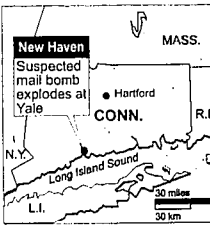
David Gelernter, 38, was opening his mail in his office at 6:15 a.m. MDT when the explosion occurred, said John Sennett, an FBI spokesman. Later, after the bombing was reported on radio, someone called in a threat to the medical center where Gelernter's brother, a Yale geneticist, works.

The bombing occurred two days after a geneticist at the University of California-San Francisco, Dr. Charles Epstein, lost several fingers when a mailed package bomb exploded at his home.

The FBI was looking for possible connections between the two cases and other recent bombings, "both solved and unsolved," Sennett said. In San Francisco, FBI spokesman Rick Smith said the two blasts may be related to about a dozen explosions dating back to 1978 and dubbed the "Unabomb" case.

The previous bombings, which killed one person and injured 21, also had academics and people who work in high-technology fields among the victims, The New York Times reported Thursday.

The FBI said authorities had to presume that David Gelernter was an intended target, although no motive

was clear why he would be singled out.

"We're looking closely for any kind of motive, including those that are terrorist in nature," Sennett said.

Gelernter, an associate professor and director of undergraduate studies in computer science, is an outspoken conservative, said a colleague, Professor Vladimir Rokhlin. Dr. Joel Gelernter, a Yale psychiatrist whose field of specialty is genetics, works at the Veterans Affairs Medical Center in neighboring West Haven. He is investigating whether there is a genetic component to alcoholism.

After the bombing, someone called the medical center switchboard and warned: "You are next," said Louise FitzSimons, a Yale spokeswoman. Federal agents checked Joel Gelernter's mail, but

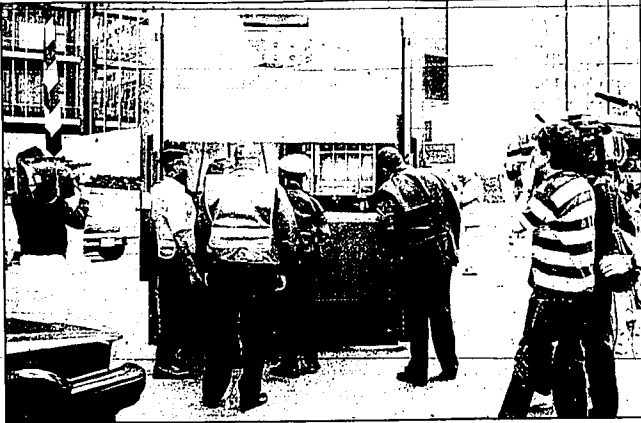
the hospital wasn't evacuated. Authorities said they did not immediately know the type of parcel or explosive that was used in the mail bomb.

The blast caused David Gelernter severe wounds to the abdomen, chest, face and hands. His condition was upgraded from critical-to-serious Thursday afternoon, said Cynthia Atwood, a university spokeswoman.

Gelernter ran a block from his fifth-floor office to the university health clinic to get treatment, leaving a trail of blood, authorities said.

This week's other victim, Epstein, 59, was listed in fair condition at Marin General Hospital. The head of the medical genetics division at UC-San Francisco lost several fingers on his right hand and suffered burns, cuts and other injuries to the chest, abdomen and face when he opened a package bomb in his kitchen in Tiburon, north of San Francisco.

The FBI said it was investigating because his research was funded by the National Institutes of Health.

'We are incredibly vulnerable': Terrorist operations land in U.S.

NEW YORK (AP) — "We can get you anytime." That chilling boast, allegedly made by a man accused of plotting to bomb the United Nations, two tunnels under the Hudson River and other targets, is also a fair assessment of the terrorist threat to the United States after the World Trade Center bombing.

"The Trade Center broke a taboo — a self-imposed constraint against terrorism in the U.S. — that no longer applies," Brian Jenkins, a terrorism consultant, said Thursday.

"We are incredibly vulnerable," added Bruce Hoffman, a Rand Corp. analyst. "Almost anyone with the motivation can cobble together enough to paralyze an entire city."

Though it indicated that the World Trade Center attack was no isolated event, the arrest Thursday of Siddiq Ibrahim Siddiq Ali and seven others for allegedly conspiring to bomb targets in New York this summer was reassuring to investigators in two respects.

First, the alleged conspirators were caught by a seemingly model investigation, which employed an inside informer and the bugging of a safe-house that the FBI called a "bomb factory."

"The FBI was complacent about domestic terrorism until the Trade Center," said Robert Kupperman of the Center for Strategic and International Studies. "Since then, it's gotten very busy."

Second, the alleged conspirators appeared to come from the New York City area, as did those charged in the Trade Center blast, and there have been no allegations of similar plots in other parts of the country.

Also, so far, the United States hasn't been victimized by two types of terrorist teams that have struck elsewhere — "sleeper cells" that don't advertise their religion or politics, and "transient units" that enter the country, strike quickly and flee.

For all its enemies around the world, the United States has been relatively free of terrorism. Until this year, no deaths had been caused by terrorism on U.S. soil since 1985, and no large-scale attacks since a 1975 bombing at LaGuardia Airport in New York that killed 11. Moreover, U.S. authorities have foiled several assassinations of foreign dissidents.

But the conditions believed to have led at least to the World Trade Center attack exist elsewhere in the nation, in Muslim enclaves where extremist

fractions hate the United States as a patron of Israel and a font of godless materialism.

The Detroit suburb of Dearborn, for example, has a large Lebanese Shiite community. Sheik Omar Abdel-Rahman, whose vituperative sermons in Jersey City, N.J., may have inspired the Trade Center bombers, received an enthusiastic greeting at a mosque there shortly after the bombing.

Like the Trade Center bombing, the plot exposed Thursday was disturbing in its amateurish audacity. "You'd think the Trade Center arrests would have sapped their ardor, made them shy," said Hoffman.

Investigators say the Trade Center defendants mailed a letter warning of additional attacks unless the United States ended relations with Israel and stopped interfering in the internal affairs of Middle Eastern countries.

If the Trade Center bombing suggested a motive for terrorism, it didn't settle its ultimate authorship. In one view, most mischief can be traced to Iran, which reportedly sent \$100,000 to the bombers; in another, much of the new terrorism is local, almost spontaneous.

Court ousts judge over antics, sentences

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Judge Gary Graham once ordered a speeding boater who killed a manatee to spend 32 hours by a river, yelling to boaters to slow down.

Another time, he told a snake collector to kill his collection after a woman was bitten.

His courtroom antics got him his own local-access cable television show.

Thursday, he got the boot from the state Supreme Court.

He was ordered removed from the Citrus County bench by justices who cited rudeness, abuses of power in imposing sentences and improper criticism of public officials.

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Gay group: Ban compromise no good

WASHINGTON (AP) — A gay rights group wrote President Clinton Thursday that if he accepts a compromise on ending the ban on homosexuals serving in the military "we will fight back."

The organization, Access Now for Gay and Lesbian Equality, was one of the first to endorse candidate Clinton, raised millions of dollars for his campaign and includes a friend of the president, David Mixner, among its members.

An adviser during the campaign, Mixner has been critical of Clinton since January and the controversy over the gay ban.

In a two-page letter to the president, the group said that if Clinton backs a compromise that would require gay servicemembers to conceal their sexual orientation, they would counter his action.

"Should you choose to join the ranks of those who are among our oppressors, please know that we will fight back with every tool at our disposal, that this community will not go away, that you cannot casually put this issue behind you," it said.

White House officials indicated Thursday that Clinton, bowing to pressure from Congress and the military, will be forced to retreat from his promise to lift the ban completely.

U.S. infantry unit to travel to Macedonia

WASHINGTON (AP) — A reinforced infantry company of the U.S. Army's Berlin Brigade in Germany will arrive in Macedonia in early July as part of a multinational peace-keeping effort to contain the Bosnia war, the Pentagon said Thursday.

About 300 U.S. soldiers will go.

The unit chosen for the Macedonia assignment is Company C of the 6th battalion of the 502nd Infantry Regiment of the Berlin Brigade. The company includes about 150 combat soldiers; they will be augmented by roughly an equal number of support troops, such as medics and logistics specialists from other units in Europe.

The Berlin Brigade preceded the American section of the once-divided city throughout the Cold War. In recent years it has trained for a wide variety of special deployments. In 1991 it participated in Provide Comfort, the U.N. effort to protect Iraqi Kurds from retribution by Iraqi government forces after the Gulf War.

FBI director discusses future with Attorney General Reno

WASHINGTON (AP) — FBI Director William Sessions met Thursday with Attorney General Janet Reno to discuss for a second time whether he can keep his job.

Although Reno has said that deciding Sessions' fate was a top priority, the latest meeting did not resolve the matter, said Justice Department spokesman Carl Stern.

White House Press Secretary Dee Dee Myers said President Clinton "continues to wait for a report from the attorney general on the status of Judge Sessions."

However, Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez, D-Texas, reportedly said that he was told a decision had already been made and that Sessions will be asked to resign. Sessions has completed 5 1/2 years of his 10-year term.

A colleague on the House subcommittee that oversees FBI operations told him only the timing of Sessions' exit is at issue, Gonzalez told the San Antonio Express-News, the paper reported Thursday.

That squares with a recent statement by an administration official familiar with discussions concerning Sessions who said senior Justice Department officials had concluded he should be replaced and were searching for a graceful way to ease him out.

The department is seeking a way to

get Sessions to resign "for the good of the service" and to avoid further controversy over an internal report that harshly criticized him for ethical lapses, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Rep. Don Edwards, D-Calif., who heads the House Judiciary subcommittee on civil and constitutional rights, which oversees the FBI, declined to discuss Sessions today.

The FBI and Sessions' two attorneys did not immediately return calls seeking comment.

Stern said he did not know who initiated Thursday's meeting, who else attended or what exactly was said.

Shortly after it ended, Sessions flew to San Francisco to speak before the Commonwealth Club.

Gonzalez told the San Antonio Express-News that he and Edwards had discussed having the House investigate FBI operations because of the treatment of Sessions, who was chief

judge of the U.S. District Court in San Antonio before becoming FBI director on Nov. 2, 1987.

The Texas congressman said he believed Sessions was the victim of a "harsh and unfair smear" stemming from a handful of veteran agents loyal to the spirit of the late FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover.

Sessions' wife, Alice, said much the same this week as she charged that high-ranking FBI officials were trying to destroy her husband's career.

The internal report accused Sessions, among other things, of using government planes and cars for personal travel, using a sham to avoid paying taxes on his escorted travel to and from work, building a taxpayer-financed fence at his home that did not meet FBI security guidelines and receiving a "sweetheart deal" on his home mortgage.

Prosecutors not immune from suits, court rules

WASHINGTON (AP) — Prosecutors may be forced to pay monetary damages for what they do while investigating a crime and what they tell news reporters while announcing indictments, the Supreme Court ruled Thursday.

The court, by a 5-4 vote, said prosecutors do not enjoy absolute immunity against being sued for supervising or participating in police investigations.

And the justices voted unanimously in ruling that prosecutors also may be sued for their out-of-court statements, such as those at news conferences, about grand jury indictments.

The decision revived a civil rights lawsuit by an Illinois man jailed for three years until prosecutors dropped the charges against him in a kidnapping.

In that case, the court acknowledged that local, state and federal prosecutors cannot be sued for what they do in their roles as courtroom advocates for the government.

But Justice John Paul Stevens, writing for the court, said that immunity is lost when a prosecutor helps in a police investigation.

"When the functions of prosecutors and detectives are the same, the immunity that protects them is also the same," Stevens said.

Police officers are entitled to qualified legal immunity and are shielded from being sued only if they acted "in good faith."

Joining Stevens were Justices Harry A. Blackmun, Sandra Day O'Connor, Antonin Scalia and Clarence Thomas.

Justices rule in Nevada case

Nearing the end of its 1992-93 term, expected to conclude next week, the court also:

- Ruled in a Kentucky case that states may make it easier to commit mentally retarded people to state facilities against their will than to commit the mentally ill.

- Reinstated a Nevada man's murder convictions and death sentence, ruling that criminal defendants must be allowed to plead guilty or waive their right to a lawyer as long as they are mentally competent to stand trial.

Moderates frustrated by Clinton

Republicans feel left out of tax bill process

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican moderates who reject a GOP no-new-taxes doctrine say they were ripe for the plucking on the Democrats' tax bill — if President Clinton had moved a bit in their direction early on.

"It's awfully hard to be bipartisan when you're excluded from the launching," says Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore.

Lacking what they considered sufficient movement by Clinton, the GOP moderates quickly stood up against his deficit-reduction package of tax increases and spending cuts.

And even if he wins this time, they say he could face more problems in the future. Many of these moderates are the same Republicans who are angling to be helpful on Clinton's upcoming health care package.

"I just hope this isn't a forecast of what's going to happen on health care," said Sen. John Chafee, R-R.I. "If Clinton comes forward and says, 'I've been to the top of Mount Sinai and I've got the tablets and there can be no change,' then we're in trouble."

On the tax bill, Sen. Bob Packwood of Oregon, ranking Republican on the Senate Finance Committee, said, "I don't know of one Republican who feels badly about voting on this turkey."

But these senators, unlike their GOP colleagues to the right, were willing to back higher taxes for the sake of deficit reduction and have done it in the past. They weren't comfortable with the GOP alternative that included no tax increases.

"No taxes and no spending — that's not the answer either," said Sen. Dave Durenberger, R-Minn. "That's not what I got elected to do. That doesn't represent progress; that doesn't represent change."

They say they couldn't get behind Clinton because his plan didn't really tackle the deficit or take on expensive entitlement programs.

If Clinton had signaled a willingness to go for more compromise, such as \$2 in spending cuts for each \$1 in tax hikes, they could have been on board, they said.

"Both the polar opposites have oversimplified the solution, and the president isn't giving you a third course," Durenberger complained.

There is more than a little annoyance at the president who promised to reach out to the opposition during his campaign.

"Some marvelous opportunities have been lost here," said Chafee. "This requires both parties to do the heavy-lifting-together. We were ready."

The White House is skeptical about that, though holding out hope it can work with what it calls "pro-change, thoughtful Republicans" on health care reform and other issues in the future.

"Oh, they're marching in partisan lock step, but it's not partisan!" said Paul Begala, a Clinton political adviser. "I'm interested in mending fences with these people, but I also have some obligation to the truth."

Republicans complain that Clinton, after campaigning as a centrist, has reverted to a "big-government zeal," as Packwood put it.

"They said they saw it in the State of the Union address, and then in the fine print of his budget: Small business gets hit hard; there's no guarantee about deficit reduction."

Packwood said Clinton could have put together a package of uniform belt-tightening with government-wide freezes, mixed in with some tax increases. Even Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, the presidential chief critic, said over the weekend he could back some tax increases.

Clinton would have had to be willing to jettison his left wing," Packwood said. "But he would have gotten all the middle-of-the-road Democrats, and a lot of Republicans would have bought on."

Instead, the White House pursued a majority strategy, and only went after Democratic votes, Packwood said.

"They seemed to think their president was elected with a 63 percent mandate, not a 43 percent mandate," Packwood said.

Packwood rebuffed Senate Finance Chairman Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., when asked if he wanted to be in on revising the tax package passed by the House. Packwood's theory, according to an aide, was "why sit around and watch Democrats raise a lot of taxes."

Jerome officials keep lid on recruiting errors

Jerome has much to be proud of in its successful recruitment of the LeSueur Cheese Co.

The new cheese plant provides jobs, pays taxes and purchases dairies' milk.

But everything did not go perfectly as the town and county brought the company to town.

Last week, Idaho Commerce Department Director Jim Hawkins held a closed-door meeting in Jerome to assess the recruitment of LeSueur Cheese Co.

Unfortunately, the public and the news media were kept out.

People would have learned a great deal about the difficulties of economic development, and public officials could have been held accountable by the people who pay their salaries.

The Times-News has reported on many of the recruiting issues as they occurred:

- In October, the City Council admitted that it was scrambling to find \$500,000 to upgrade the Jerome sewer before the cheese plant opened, even though voters earlier had passed a sewer bond issue. An engineer said his original sewage plant estimates were so far off the mark because he was allowed only three hours to work on the numbers. He waited 60 days.

- Throughout construction of the cheese plant, city and county officials wrestled for control of the plant site, alternately attempting to

enforce two different zoning codes on LeSueur. That often left Jerome Cheese Co. bewildered and stymied.

- There are too few milk cows to keep all the Magic Valley's new cheese plants busy at full capacity. State, local and business leaders are scrambling to bring new dairies and more cows to the valley. The question of whether this is a good idea should have been discussed long ago.

- Now, Jerome has an odor problem. The cheese plant is producing too much sewage for the town's sewage plant, and the excess is fermenting in a large tank as neighbors complain.

We fear the door was shut at last week's trouble-shooting meeting because state and local officials wanted to hide their mistakes from the public.

Fortunately, LeSueur Cheese Co. appears to be a conscientious company. We believe company officials will help local officials iron out the various problems that have arisen.

- But if residents are to be assured that some future business won't take advantage of local officials' mistakes, they must know how the officials plan to avoid the mistakes.

- Jerome officials deserve the credit for pushing their town and county's economies forward.

- But a candid assessment of the process would benefit voters, taxpayers and the Jerome business community.



It's almost tea time again in Washington

At his news conference June 17, President Clinton took credit for the recent positive economic indicators where none was due.

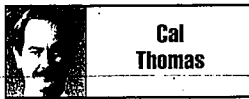
The president said if his plan passes, "you will see a continuation of what's happened already in the last five months: low interest rates, increased housing starts, more jobs coming into the economy."

The first question that should have been asked of the president is a two-part: "Mr. President, you said just nine months ago that this was the worst economy in 50 years. Have you single-handedly turned it around, if so, which of your economic proposals -- none of which has passed Congress -- caused the virtual overnight improvement?"

The economy continues to show enormous strength because of the momentum left over from the Reagan and, to a lesser extent, the Bush years. The president suggests that just the idea of his budget proposals (which have already been altered and are likely to be changed some more) has improved the economy, though he said his now dead economic "stimulus" package was essential to that objective.

Those with short memories should revisit the 1990 budget deal between President Bush and the Democrat-controlled Congress led by the same gang bringing us the current "deficit reduction" through "spending cuts" and "tax fairness."

Before considering the 1990 budget deal,



let's look again at the '80s, that "horrible" decade of greed and consumption in which only the rich supposedly benefited.

In fact, the gross national product rose 32 percent during the decade and median family income hit record levels. Adjusted for inflation, median household income for black families increased 16.5 percent between 1982 and 1989.

As incomes rose, so did government tax revenue, but that wasn't enough for the free-spending Congress. In 1990, tax revenues were projected to increase by \$397.8 billion by 1995, an average of \$80 billion in new money each year. This was due to the reduction in tax rates in the Reagan years.

The 1990 budget deal -- in which President Bush broke his "no new taxes" pledge and scaled his political fate -- produced a gas tax increase of 13 cents per gallon, to raise more than \$50 billion over five years.

That agreement was about "fairness," too. It was called the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act. President Clinton's budget proposal, as passed by the Senate, would place an additional 4.3 cents-per-gallon tax on

gasoline, diesel fuel and most other fuels.

In 1990, congressional leaders congratulated themselves for "political courage," promising the agreement would eliminate the deficit in five years by raising more than \$140 billion in new taxes while providing "deep cuts" in federal spending. As everyone knows, the taxes were assessed, but Congress refused to live up to its part of the deal and cut spending.

It is now 1993. Another president and the same congressional leadership that promised us the elimination of the deficit if we agreed to new taxes in 1990 are trying to stick it to us again.

"We'll keep playing this shell game as long as we are suckers enough to fall for it. But when we finally wake up and realize we have been duped and that the professional tax-and-spenders have tricked us again, the only way we will be able to fix things is by reforming Congress.

We should begin that task by throwing out every member who votes for any new taxes. Term limits would also help government to live within our means as career politicians are forced to find real jobs.

If they can't make do on what they're getting now, maybe it's time for another party in Boston.

According to the June "Progressive Dairymen" magazine, there are 492 dairies in the Magic Valley generating \$14.97 million per month (\$500,000 per day) into

the economy. The dairymen and women work very hard 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to produce a clean and healthy product. We all work within our communities and help our neighbors whenever and wherever we can.

I would be the last person to tell anyone that I am perfect, but I would like to believe that if I were accused of anything, I would at least have the chance to prove my innocence before some people in the community started screaming "guilty" and throwing stones.

To you, it may be nothing. To everyone

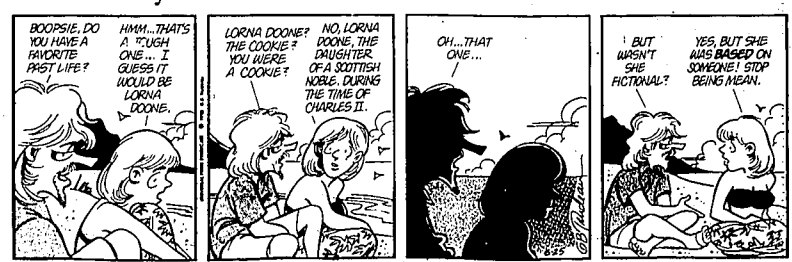

Kurds hit Turkish sites around Europe; 1 dies in Swiss shooting

Kurdish separatists, demanding an end to military campaigns against their people, attacked Turkish targets across Europe on Thursday in a series of coordinated strikes.

One militant died in an ambulance in Switzerland and more than 30 people were taken hostage in France and Germany.

The militants hit Turkish diplomatic missions and businesses in Germany, France, Switzerland, Sweden and Denmark. There was fear more attacks could come.

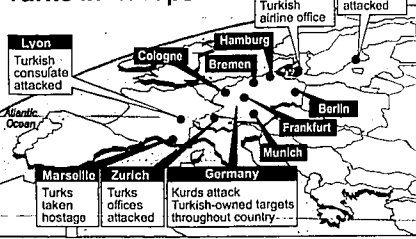
Abdullah Ocalan, the leader of the separatist Kurdistan Workers' Party, or PKK, had recently vowed to make the summer "the bloodiest ever for Turkey."

For nine years, Kurdish rebels have fought the Turkish government for an independent state in southeastern Turkey, home to about half of the country's 12 million Kurds. But today's attacks represented the largest single campaign of Kurdish violence in Europe.

The attacks included:

- A shootout at the Turkish Embassy in Bern, Switzerland, that left one Kurd dead and seven people wounded. Police said Turkish officials fired at Kurds marching on the

embassy, and armed Kurds fired back. Militants also tried to storm consulates in Zurich and Geneva.

- In Munich, Germany, an estimated 21 people were taken hostage at the Turkish consulate. By evening, the militants had freed all 10 women and a man who apparently suffered a heart attack. Eighty Kurds who tried to enter the Turkish consulate in Bonn were held back at the gates.
- In Marseille, France, four Kurds claiming to have bombs surrendered

after holding 10 people hostage for about three hours in the Turkish consulate. Separatists failed to enter a consulate in Lyon.

- Turkish-owned banks and travel offices were hit in at least 13 cities, including Berlin, Stockholm, Sweden, and Copenhagen, Denmark. The militants smashed windows, broke furniture and dashed away.

- In Athens, Greece, PKK representative Hasan Dag said the group would wage "total revolutionary

war" and hit Turkey's lucrative tourist industry as well as "every kind of economic source and security elements of the Turkish state."

He accused Turkey of attacking Kurds even though the PKK offered a unilateral cease-fire in March in an attempt to open autonomy talks. Turkey did not respond to the offer and the outlawed PKK resumed attacks that provoked military reprisals.

More than 6,000 civilians, soldiers and rebels have died in the nine-year-old guerrilla war.

In Munich, the assailants demanded that Chancellor Helmut Kohl deliver by Saturday morning a televised speech appealing to Turkey to stop its campaign against the Kurds.

Heavily armed police surrounded the consulate in Munich's upper-class Nymphenburg neighborhood and began negotiating with the hostage-takers.

One of the attackers warned police against storming the building.

"We have taken every measure, have spread gasoline and placed bombs," he said in a telephone interview with The Associated Press bureau in Ankara, Turkey. "We want the massacre of Kurdish people to end."

In a later interview, a militant was

asked if hostages would be killed if demands were rejected. "Absolutely," he said. "We will die, too."

But he said the hostage-takers, who were armed with sub-machine guns and handguns, were ready to compromise if officials promise to

meet demands "in the near future." In a statement, Interior Minister Rudolf Seiters rejected the pressure and said the government "will not permit conflicts from the native countries to be carried out here in Germany."

Norway whale meat a good draw

OSLO, Norway — Whale meat from Norway's first commercial hunt in six years drew good prices at an auction Thursday.

The hunt for 160 minke whales, which began June 8, defies a global ban imposed by the International Whaling Commission in 1986 and has provoked international protests, boycotts and sanction threats.

The whaling ship Raine Cato was the first of the hunt's 28 boats to return with its catch, said Harald Dahl of the local fisheries association. The ship sold 8,800 pounds of meat from two minke whales at an auction in the arctic port of Svalbard for \$2.50 a pound — 58 cents a pound more than expected, Dahl said.

Norway says the 87,000 minke whales off its coast can sustain a hunt and whaling is essential to some coastal villages.

Japan's ruling party faces defeat

TOKYO — The Liberal Democratic Party's 38-year hold on power is being threatened by the party rebellion that has forced early parliamentary elections, opinion polls suggested Thursday.

The bad news for Prime Minister Kiichi Miyazawa's party came a day after 44 lawmakers defected to launch a new conservative party, the New Life Party.

Politicians and analysts are debating whether a loss by the Liberal Democrats would produce a dramatic restructuring of the corrupt Japanese political system or leave politics as usual. The lawmakers who bolted the party have reputed ties to leaders tainted by scandals.

Vote asks U.N. to lift arms embargo

VIENNA, Austria — An international human rights conference demanded Thursday the United Nations lift its arms embargo on Bosnian Muslims to allow them to defend against "naked Serbian aggression" and extremist Croats.

The vote — which was largely symbolic — does not have any binding effect on U.N. decision-making on former Yugoslavia. But it reflected frustration at U.N. Security Council inaction at halting Serb aggression in Bosnia.

The World Conference on Human Rights approved by a 88-1 vote a resolution put forward by Islamic countries "deploring the failure of the United Nations to stop the war in Bosnia-Herzegovina, where more than 138,000 people have been killed or are missing."

Canada prepares for 1st woman leader

TORONTO (AP) — Kim Campbell, who will be sworn in today as Canada's first woman prime minister, is faced with winning an election this fall or becoming a mere historical footnote.

Ms. Campbell, 46, a former defense minister and justice minister, won the leadership of her Progressive Conservative Party at its convention in Ottawa two weeks ago. She replaces Brian Mulroney, who is stepping down after nine years in power.

Winning the leadership of the party that has a majority in the House of Commons automatically makes her prime minister. But the mandate of that majority ends in November, giving her little time.

Ms. Campbell has kept out of public view since her convention victory, working hard behind the scenes to put together her new Cabinet and prepare for a short burst of power before leading the party into a national election, probably in early autumn.

Her first task will be to make people forget Mulroney, whose economic policies drove his popularity as long as 12 percent over the past three years. On the other hand, she can't disavow those policies, which she supported as a member of the Cabinet.

"She has to distance herself from

the previous government, but not in a way that offends people who made up the previous government," said William Christian, a professor of political science and the University of Guelph.

"On the other hand, it is clear from a general public point of view she has to show she is an alternative."

A Gallup poll published Thursday shows Jean Chrétien's opposition Liberal Party as the current preference of 41 percent of voters surveyed. The Conservatives received 36 percent and Audrey McLaughlin's New Democratic Party 10 percent.

The poll of 1,014 Canadians, conducted by telephone June 16-21, has a margin of error of plus or minus 3.1 percentage points.

"I don't get the impression the voters are very excited about Jean Chrétien and Audrey McLaughlin," said Christian. "I think voters will be prepared to give Campbell a look."

The obvious difficulties she faces are the budget deficit and a stubborn unemployment rate of 11.4 percent — the same problems that helped sink Mulroney — while maintaining the social safety net of health care and welfare so important to Canadians.

Her main opportunity for foreign

exposure will be the Tokyo summit of industrial powers next month. Unlike Americans, however, Canadians historically haven't paid much attention to foreign policy in deciding how to vote.

Ms. Campbell campaigned for the

leadership on a platform of change and a new "politics of inclusion." Change has been made easier by the announcement by virtually all the influential figures in the Mulroney Cabinet that they will not seek reelection.

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Russian calls off trip in dispute

MOSCOW (AP) — Prime Minister Viktor Chernomyrdin canceled a trip to Washington on Thursday after U.S. officials stepped up pressure on Russia to stop selling missile technology to Third World countries.

The unusual cancellation cast light on one of the most serious disputes between Moscow and Washington since the end of the Cold War and showed the difficult choices facing a cash-starved Russia.

The United States — upset by Russian sales of high-tech weaponry to India, China and Iran — threatened Tuesday to impose economic penalties on Russian companies that sell missile technology to Third World clients.

Russia has been trying to hang on to a share of the international arms market while it makes the transition to a market economy. The defense industry is a major component of its economy.

President Clinton will meet in Tokyo on July 7-9 with leaders of Japan, Germany, Britain, France, Canada and Italy on ways to assist President Boris Yeltsin and his economic reform program.

Chernomyrdin's trip — the first high-level Russian visit to the United States since Clinton took office in January — was to have begun Saturday and was to have included talks with Vice President Al Gore.

The cancellation was the first open rift between Moscow and Washington since Russia in May exercised a rare veto at the U.N. Security Council in a dispute over funding for United Nations peacekeeping forces.

Yeltsin has made close ties to the United States a pillar of his foreign policy, despite opposition from hardliners who accuse him of taking orders from Washington.

Prenatal test may offer safer alternative

LONDON (AP) — A new prenatal test that examines fetal cells surrounding the amniotic sac offers a safer alternative to the two current means of testing, according to a British study of 100 women.

The new technique — called centocentesis — requires further testing before doctors can recommend it as a substitute for other tests: amniocentesis and chorionic villus sampling.

Investigators performing a centocentesis inserted a needle between the placenta and the amniotic sac to retrieve cells. They then analyzed chromosomes from those cells.

"I'm quite optimistic but I wouldn't recommend people to get overly excited until we have done another 100 ongoing pregnancies," said Dr. Eric Jauniaux, one of the investigators and an obstetrician at Kings College Hospital in London.

The findings, published in the June 26 issue of *The Lancet*, a medical journal, showed that researchers were able to successfully retrieve cells from 96 percent of the 67 women who were between six and 10 weeks pregnant.

The success rate dropped to 42 percent at 11 weeks of gestation and 10 percent at 12 weeks because the celom shrinks.

Ed Board votes on cutting costs

TWIN FALLS — The presidents of the three state-supported universities and Lewis-Clark State College will be allowed to come up with plans to trim administrative expense, the state Board of Education decided Thursday.

Opening a two-day meeting in Twin Falls, the board voted to allow the Presidents' Council, made up of the presidents of the four schools, to present plans in August on administrative cuts.

"Our question is not should we cut administrative costs but how we're going to do it," said board President Keith Hinckley of Blackfoot.

Board members discussed a flat cut in administrative expense or using a ratio of each school's budget but decided to let each school prepare a cutback plan.

Gov. Cecil Andrus urged the board early this year to look at ways to eliminate overhead.

University of Idaho President Elisabeth Zinser said it would have little overall impact on administrative expense if she cut her \$125,000 salary.

Zinser acknowledged that as president she must take the lead in such cuts but

said reducing her salary by anything less than \$25,000 would make little difference to the public.

Part of her salary includes a retirement plan. Zinser donates about \$5,000 each year to school development and donated \$22,000 this year to the library, she said.

If the board approves her cost-cutting plans at the August meeting, some positions will be cut and services reduced, she said.

The public's perception of bloated is a myth, Zinser said, although one that must

Suit charges unrestrained water use

HAGERMAN — A local water user has sued the state over diminishing flows from the Snake River Plain Aquifer.

Howard "Butch" Morris and two out-of-state land owners accuse the Idaho Department of Water Resources of not adequately controlling groundwater use on the plain above the Curran Spring that forms the headwaters of Billingsley Creek.

In 1972, the spring gushed forth 72 cubic feet per second of crystal-clear water.

This year it is down to about 10 cfs. One cubic foot per second equals 449 gallons per minute.

The suit filed in Snake River Basin Adjudication Court in Twin Falls blames unrestrained groundwater development for the decline.

The U.S. Geological Survey and other water experts say the decline is caused by changes in irrigation and improvements in water management that has reduced the amount of excess water seeping into the ground above the Snake River Canyon, as well as groundwater development.

The state, however, distributes water

according to the established priority — that is the oldest water rights get their water first. Younger water rights get what's left.

But wells on the plain above the Hagerman Valley are not part of a water district and therefore, the department has little control over how much water is pumped.

The suit asks the department to manage those water rights on the plain in conjunction with older rights in the canyon below. Morris could not be reached for comment Thursday afternoon.

The department would not comment on the case as it still is pending, spokesman Dick Larsen said.

EPA may loosen landfill deadlines

Local officials unsure how extending closure dates would affect area counties

TWIN FALLS — The Environmental Protection Agency proposed a six-month extension to close smaller landfills on Thursday. But it's questionable how much the extension, proposed from Oct. 9 to April 9, 1994, will help Magic Valley counties.

The proposed extension would apply only to landfills that take in less than 100 tons of trash a day.

Twin Falls County's main landfill takes in approximately 135 tons a day, Commissioner Jim Fraley said. A second landfill near Buhl takes about 50 tons of trash a day.

"I don't think it would help us," he said. However, Fraley had not seen the EPA proposal and said he would have to read it to know for sure how it affects Twin Falls County.

While the extension would apply to every landfill in the six-county Southern Idaho Regional Solid Waste District, the district director doubted how much it would help the counties.

"In cold-weather states, six months is not worth it. That gives you two months in real construction time," director Terry Schultz said.

A couple of landfills in the district are full and must be closed regardless of the extension, he said. The waste district board of directors will continue with its own timetable regardless of the extension, Schultz said.

The EPA must publish the proposed rule change in the Federal Register and allow a comment period. Schultz wondered Thursday if national environmental groups, such as the Sierra Club, would challenge the extension.

The Sierra Club and other organizations sued the EPA two years ago and forced the agency to issue the long-promised landfill rule in October 1991.

"There's always a little bit of iffyness with that," Schultz said.

Old, environmentally unsafe landfills are supposed to be closed by Oct. 9, according to new federal rules called Subtitle D. But

Kiser's driving privileges also were suspended for the six months following his release, and he was ordered to pay \$47,500 in court costs.

McKay spent several weeks at a rehabilitation hospital in Boise, but has returned to her parents' home in Jerome.

School districts decide what to do with extra funds

TWIN FALLS — Satellite-television programs, computer hardware and textbooks are among the items local school districts will buy with their portions of \$5 million in extra state money next month, district officials say.

The school districts will get the money — appropriated in the event the state has a budget surplus — in mid July, according to State Auditor J. D. Williams.

State officials say that a surge in tax receipts almost guarantees the extra money will be available. "We appreciate anything we get," Jerome School Board Chairwoman Nancy Churchman said. "We could use a lot more. Every district could."

Cassia County School District is a good example. The district will receive \$117,000 state money if the money is distributed, according to a state report, Superintendent Leonard Hurst said.

But the district's list of needs includes asphalt parking lots at district schools, re-roofing district buildings, hiring for 5½ teaching positions, remodeling several ar-

cas to convert vocational and storage rooms into classrooms, and paying for textbooks that have increased in price by 52 percent to \$38 in five years, Hurst said.

Twin Falls has a similar dilemma. The district is expected to receive almost \$150,000.

But School Board members have already said that \$380,000 worth of supplies, programs and staff positions are on the chopping block, including workbooks for elementary students and the district's school crossing guard program.

Board member David Sass said the board will restore budget items on a priority basis.

Churchman said the Jerome School District will not use the money to pay for salaries and benefits because they are ongoing expenses. "We may not get that money again," she said.

She said the district is not ready to hold supplemental levies to raise the funds the next year, because once districts get started with levy elections they can't stop.

PUC considers more calling areas

BOISE — The Public Utilities Commission is getting dozens of requests for changes in "local calling areas," or regions where telephone users can call other nearby areas without paying long-distance charges.

Rather than deal with them piecemeal, the agency said Thursday it plans a year-long study of calling areas on a statewide basis.

However, a proposed single calling area for the Magic Valley has not yet been put on the list of those to be studied.

New property tax effort needs work, state advises sponsors

BOISE (AP) — A new initiative to limit property taxes needs clarification and could have a "serious constitutional problem," the attorney general's office advised sponsors Thursday.

Rep. Ken Robison, D-Boise, and former Democratic lawmaker John Gamm of Boise introduced the initiative June 10. It's sponsored by the Citizens Property Tax Committee.

It restores a controversial 5 percent limit on the annual growth of local government property tax-financed budgets.

It also enacts versions of the residential property tax relief proposal Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus made two years ago. That includes a \$10,000 boost in a residential property tax exemption now limited to \$50,000.

Opponents argued it was more of a tax shift than true property tax relief, and a new study from the state

Kimberly Hansen, Murtaugh, Hazelton, Eldon, Jerome, Wendell, Gowen, Shoshone, Dietrich, Richfield and Carey.

"As the speed and quality of telecommunications technology has increased, so too has the customer's dependence upon voice and data communications," the PUC said.

"This dependence in turn has stimulated customers' desire for expanded toll-free telephone access to the people, businesses, service and agencies essential to them."

The staff will prepare a report on calling areas, the need for changes and financial and competitive aspects.

Most Idaho telephone users can call other customers within their local exchange without tolls. Many also have an arrangement known as Extended Area Service, which allows them to call other exchanges without long-distance charges.

The PUC said in the last three years, 20 new Extended Area Service routes were approved and four petitions, covering nine areas, were rejected.

Eight customer groups have petitions on file for extended service. Those that have been the subject of public hearings will continue. Action on those which have not been subject to hearings will be deferred until the investigation is complete.

Besides all the EAS activity in the last few years, the commission also said a task force on telecommunications urged a statewide study of calling areas.

"Local calling areas should include the largest appropriate community of interest that is economically feasible," the task force said.

The commission should "review existing local calling areas to determine the largest economically feasible extended area service local calling areas and to develop policies that will achieve that expansion," it said.

Babbitt talks tough on Northwest logging Simplot son dies in Boise after illness

WASHINGTON (AP) — Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt told Northwest Democrats Thursday they must face up to some tough decisions about dramatic logging cutbacks in the region after a decade of over-harvesting, a congressman said.

Assistant Agriculture Secretary Jim Lyons also said that complying with environmental laws protecting wildlife makes it "difficult to sustain a level of harvest on the west side (of Oregon and Washington) that is anywhere near what we had in the last decade."

Babbitt refused to comment after the private meeting with Lyons, scientists and at least 10 Congress members from Oregon, Washington and California, except to say that he felt they were continuing to make progress in search of a compromise.

Rep. Mike Kopecki, D-Ore., said Babbitt was there primarily to listen, but at the close of the 90-minute session the secretary made "a very strong statement for us to resolve this issue."

"He said there has been 10 or 12 years of error and neglect on our national forests, and that now we have to face up to it and make some real, difficult decisions — real tough decisions that hit right at the heart of some of our communities in an issue that has just polarized our region so terribly," Kopecki told reporters.

Babbitt's pep talk comes as House Speaker Tom Foley, D-Wash., and other Northwest lawmakers voice opposition to logging reductions of the magnitude reportedly being considered by the Clinton administration.

BOISE (AP) — Richard R. Simplot, eldest son of Idaho industrialist J.R. Simplot, died at a local hospital Thursday of complications resulting from a recent illness, the company said.

Some of the presidents presented data that showed their administrative costs were below national averages.

Idaho spends 25.34 percent of its budget on administrative costs. At other Western universities, the average was about 30 percent.

"I'd say the public perception is we have too many highly paid bu-

recreants running around campus," board member M. Karl Sturhoff of Boise said. People "don't want student services cut — they don't want as many \$100,000 people."

At \$17.8 million, Idaho has the highest dollar amount of administrative cost with Boise State second at \$16.3 million. On a percentage basis, Idaho spends 17.9 percent on administration to 27.4 percent for Boise State.

August reports from the presi-

dents will focus on significant reductions in cost, justification of ongoing expenses, reallocation of the money saved and ways to address the public's perception of bloated.

Idaho has joined four other institutions in the Western Interstate Commission of Higher Education that are asking its universities to streamline administration. Schools in Arizona, Wyoming, Montana and California all have administrative expense by 10 percent.

landfill operators throughout the county, including many cities and counties, are having a tough time meeting the deadline.

The National Association of Counties has lobbied the EPA and Congress to extend the deadline. Sen. Dick Kamephoros, R-Idaho, plans a July 29 hearing on a bill to extend the deadline two years.

Following the EPA's announcement Thursday, Twin Falls County probably must pin its hopes on Congress to help meet the Oct. 9 deadline.

The county has picked a landfill site on BLM land at Hub Butte south of Twin Falls. On June 8, voters passed a \$4 million bond issue to build the landfill.

All the county needs now is control of the land to start building. If the county gets control of the land by the end of July, engineers say the county might be able to open a new landfill and close the old one by Oct. 9.

"We're playing a waiting game and hoping the pieces will fall into place," Fraley said.

The county is preparing an environmental impact study on the Hub Butte project to show the state's congressional delegation. If the plan passes muster, county officials say the delegation will try to speed the transfer of land through Congress, possibly by tacking it onto a bill.

But if this doesn't work, the county must conduct a full environmental impact statement, which probably would take until next February. In this case, the county might have to keep its main landfill open until then, Fraley said.

If this happens, the county probably would have to monitor groundwater at the old landfill for 30 years. This could cost as much as \$2.5 million, according to engineers' estimates.

Senators use state funds for politics

State Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, and Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, this week used state funds to endorse unpledged Republican candidate Phil Batt for governor.

A press release, typed on state Senate letterhead and mailed to the media using state funds, quoted Darrington saying Batt is "the most qualified candidate to be Idaho's next governor from either party."

"After visiting with Phil Batt about many issues that face Idaho, such as health care, agriculture, small business and the economy, I am proud to throw my support behind Phil," Cameron said in the release.

At least three other Republicans - Boise consultant Larry Eastland, House Speaker Mike Simpson of Blackfoot, and Boise developer Chuck Winder - are eyeing next year's gubernatorial race.

Among Democrats, state Sen. John Peavey of Carey, former state Sen. Ron Beitel of Grangeville, and Boise attorney and

former state Sen. Mike Burkett also are organizing support.

The letter was mailed using postage meter number 6784139. That number is assigned to the state of Idaho mailroom, said Sandy Head of the regional U.S. Postal Office in Spokane.

"That's not ethical," Darrington said Thursday. "We normally don't do that."

Darrington said he gave a draft of the press release to David Scott, a state employee who works for the State Republican caucus. Scott rewrote the release and sent it out.

"It probably wasn't appropriate," Scott said, adding that he did what he was asked to do.

"If someone had given a thought to it, it probably wouldn't have been

sent out," he added.

The office is set up to assist legislative leaders, Scott said, and does not have any letterhead or funds to mail partisan political releases.

"I've never done anything like that before," he said.

"It's an inappropriate use of the state's franking privileges," Peavey said. "Such abuse of privilege jeopardizes our ability to communicate legitimately with our constituents."

Peavey said that while unethical, the state Senate does not have rules or guidelines banning the use of state funds for political uses.

Cameron, at a family reunion in Stanley, could not be reached for comment.

Officials have trouble confirming identity of body found 2 years ago

RUPERT - Minidoka County law enforcement officers think they know the identity of a badly decomposed body found in the desert two years ago. But of late, they have run into a lot of dead ends in confirming their suspicions.

Officers have checked dental records, medical records and performed DNA tests, but the body of the possible murder victim still remains unknown.

"I don't know how else to identify this guy," Capt. Randall White of the Minidoka County Sheriff's Department said.

"The body that was found so de-

composed only bones remained was found in the German Lake area near Minidoka in 1991. A pathology lab determined that the man probably died of a blow to the head.

Recently, an attempt to match DNA of the body with that of the father of a man who was reported missing in the area failed because not enough DNA could be found in the body.

White believes there is a good possibility that the body is that of Jorge Rodriguez, who was 23 at the time he was reported missing in 1988.

"But there's no way to prove it," White said.

Dental records of Rodriguez no longer exist, Medical records also

have been checked without success.

A facial reconstruction of the man's skull, performed by a Wyoming crime lab, matches that of Rodriguez.

"The woman at the crime lab said this is one of the closest matches she's seen," White said.

He said further attempts are being made to help identify the body. Law officers are talking to people who were acquainted with Rodriguez to see if the clothes found on the body might have been his. He added, though, that the clothing, which has been lying in the desert for years, isn't in good shape.

White said hair analysis could be done on the hair found on the body if a known sample of Rodriguez's hair exists, but so far none has been found.

Herman store purchases does not include Burley

DENVER (AP) - In a move to extend its reach regionally, Gart Bros. Sporting Goods Co. has agreed to buy 10 Idaho and Utah stores from bankrupt Herman's World of Sporting Goods.

Gart did not purchase the Burley store and several others in Idaho.

A spokesman from Herman's Sporting Goods headquarters in New Jersey said he was unsure why Gart Bros. selected the stores it did.

Turner said the Burley store is now closed, as well as the eight other stores in Idaho which weren't purchased by Gart Brothers.

There were six employees working at the Burley Herman's at the time it closed, Turner said.

He said Herman's was renting the building, located off Overland Avenue.

The acquisition price wasn't reported, but Gart said it expected to have all of the stores reopened under new banners, by late September.

It could add more than 400 new jobs to the payroll in Idaho and Utah, but the company plans to offer a number of jobs to former Herman's employees.

One-time alternate juror: 'He's paid the price'

BOISE (AP) — A one-time alternate juror in the murder-conspiracy trial of white separatist Randy Weaver said Thursday she would have acquitted Weaver of all charges.

As the jury adjourned its eighth day of deliberations without a verdict, Gina Hagerman said at times she did not believe the testimony of key prosecution witnesses, Deputy U.S. Marshals Arthur Roderick and Larry Cooper. They were with Deputy Marshal William Degan when he was killed in last August's shootout at Weaver's isolated northern Idaho cabin.

Hagerman, 34, a single working mother, said the deaths of Weaver's son and wife in that gunfight and the subsequent siege were punishment

enough for what-ever he might have done.

"He's paid the price," she said. "He's lived through hell for 10 months."

Weaver, 45, is charged with aiding Kevin Harris, 25, in Degan's murder. Both also face other conspiracy and firearms counts. Harris is charged with firing the shots that killed Degan, and Hagerman said she felt Harris was guilty of nothing more than manslaughter because the marshals fired first and then overreacted.

A central issue in the trial was who

shot first in the Aug. 21 fire fight on Ruby Ridge. A jury when Deputy Marshal Frank Norris testified that the first shot he heard that day came from the guns carried by marshals, Hagerman said that "really stood out in my mind."

Her comments were the first assessment of the highly publicized trial by an impartial observer other than presiding U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge, who at one point said 75 percent of the government's witnesses had benefited the defense.

Hagerman, along with three other alternates, sat through the entire eight weeks of government testimony from 36 witnesses and presentation of hundreds of pieces of evidence, but she was dismissed by Lodge during the June 15 closing argu-

ments because of illness.

The seven women and five men on the jury have spent more than 60 hours behind the closed doors of the jury room so far. The other three alternates, two men and a woman, have also been sequestered but are not participating in the deliberations.

Charles Peterson, a member of the defense team, said he expected the jury's marathon, now among the longest deliberations in any criminal trial in state history.

"There's a lot of evidence there, and it takes a lot of time to go through that stuff if you're going to be conscientious," Peterson said.

Hagerman said she began the trial in mid-April without any preconceived notions about Weaver and Harris or sympathy for them, but "as

I heard the evidence things changed more so in their favor. I felt there might have been some injustice done in the way the government overreacted. They had executed a little more force than I thought they should."

She said she was especially distressed when she heard testimony about how the marshals shouted things at the Weaver cabin like, "We had pancakes for breakfast, what did you have?" after Vicki Weaver had been killed by a federal sniper on Aug. 22.

"Marshals acknowledged using that tactic in hopes that they could get Weaver out of the cabin, but they testified that they were unaware at the time that Mrs. Weaver was dead. Hagerman said the courtroom facts seemed to fit the defense presentation of events last August — that the marshals shot first, killing Samuel Weaver's dog, and that Harris fired back in defense of the 14-year-old boy, killing Degan.

The testimony of Cooper and Roderick contradicting that theory, Hagerman said, just did not ring true. "They were kind of cold," she said. "They weren't letting us know some of the facts we needed. They got very defensive and didn't cooperate. At times I felt they were not telling the truth."

CALDWELL — On Thursday mornings, the time when Canyon County magistrate courts hear family disputes, tighter security will be in place.

County officials say hearings involving divorce, child custody and support and domestic violence often trigger strong emotions and disturbances.

A metal detector will be used on all people entering the area and a deputy will be posted in each courtroom, officials said.

Runoff stresses Bingham County dikes

BLACKFOOT — Bingham County officials say they will have to repair several dikes damaged by heavy spring runoff.

Because of a heavy runoff, Palisades Reservoir released water which stressed area dikes, officials said. County Commission Chairman Dale Arave said a dike at Wadsworth Island is causing the most concern.

"Most of the damage occurred there and it's the most critical," he said. "The Wadsworth Island dike along U.S. Highway 39 southwest of Blackfoot was built 14 years ago to prevent flooding.

Arave said it "won't be possible to make a close examination of the dikes until water drops further."

Official: Loss of sales will cost money

COEUR D'ALENE — A forestry industry spokesman says President Clinton's plan to eliminate timber sales that lose money will cost taxpayers more in the first year than it will save in four.

James S. Riley, executive vice president of the Intermountain Forest Industry Association, Coeur d'Alene, testified in Washington, D.C., before a Senate subcommittee. He said eliminating those timber sales would cost 23,000 jobs, \$850 million in wages and \$119 million in federal tax revenue.

The cutback promises a four-year savings of \$72 million, he said.

He argued the plan is a ploy by environmental groups who want to stop timber harvesting on national forests.

Proposed turbines spark arguments

RATHDRUM — Proponents of Washington Water Power's proposed natural gas-powered generation turbines say they will help prevent electrical brownouts in the Rathdrum area.

But critics at a Wednesday public hearing on the project contend the utility has not fully evaluated the possible health risk in Rathdrum. The state Division of Environmental Quality is considering permitting the WWP project.

Those applauding the project were Rathdrum City Councilman Jack Hanusson and state Rep. Hilde Kellogg, R-Post Falls. They touted it as clean power available when the utility needs it.

But David Hunt, representing the Citizens Network for Responsible Growth, warned the plant could operate 180 days before the first emissions check.

Among other pollutants, the plant would emit carbon monoxide and nitrogen oxides, as well as three carcinogens.

Tribe stops spearfishing a day early

LEWISTON — The Nez Perce Tribe will stop spearfishing for spring chinook salmon early this year.

The closure on the Rapid River near Riggin at midnight Saturday trims a day from the tribal season for spring chinook. The tribal executive committee approved the move to protect wild summer chinook salmon returning to the stream to spawn.

Wild chinook are designated as threatened on the Endangered Species List.

Mountain Home commander steps down

BOISE (AP) — Command of Mountain Home Air Force Base's 366th Wing has changed hands.

After a two-year tour as the wing's commander, Brig. Gen. William Hinton Jr. turned over control of the five-squadron, 65-aircraft intervention force to Col. David McCloud Wednesday.

McCloud also was promoted to the rank of brigadier general. He was

commander of the 1st Fighter Wing at Langley Air Force Base in Virginia. Hinton will take a senior-staff post at Langley's Air Combat Command headquarters.

Report: INEL ignored safety problems

BOISE (AP) — A just-completed investigation into the safety of radioactive waste storage concluded management at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory either discounted reports of safety problems or ignored them for economic reasons.

Supervisors of the operation that centers on a high-level storage facility "knew of the problems and would like to have fixed them, but it was a continual battle with management over resources," the report found.

"The reason given by supervisors was lack of time, people and money. ... No actions were ever taken until there was a major problem."

The 19-page investigative report, signed by S.P. Gearhardt of Westinghouse Idaho Nuclear Co. Inc., was prompted by the discovery in February that five storage canisters containing radioactive material had corroded to the point that they were no longer reliable.

It documented a 25-year history of questionable decisions on waste

storage activities that created the serious corrosion problems currently existing at the storage site. But it also emphasized that no one government contractor was solely responsible, and none of the problems were created intentionally.

But the document appeared to reinforce the state's claim that all shipments of nuclear material to INEL should be halted until a full-scale environmental assessment is conducted.

Although the report found concern over safety has heightened since Gov. Cecil Andrus began campaigning against further waste storage in 1988, it cited a longstanding conflict for managers between accommodating business concerns and addressing safety risks.

Cash and manpower for the storage operation were severely limited over the years, it said, and even when contractors obtained money it was diverted to other utilities.

Gearhardt said that while the storage facilities at INEL were intended to only temporarily hold radioactive

material until it could be reprocessed, there was a substantial amount of waste brought to the site that managers knew from the outset could not be reprocessed.

And his investigation found that proposals dating back a decade and more to either remove that material from storage or at least put it into containers that would not fail were never carried out.

Reprocessing of spent Navy reactor fuel was the primary mission and everything else took a back seat, the report said.

"When plans to can or remove the fuel were proposed, they were canceled or modified many times because management did not want to expend the manpower and money," the report said.

And, it said, management believed that "keeping the Navy happy was their most important mission. The Navy was the main source of operating money, and they could always pull the funding ... if management did not continue to accept and process Navy fuel."

Tribe expands center to serve more patients

PLUMMER (AP) — The Coeur d'Alene Indian Tribe has started a \$1 million expansion of a health center here that serves Indians and non-Indians from as far away as Spokane and Troy, Mont.

The Benewah Medical Center has won awards in its three years of operation.

"This may be the beginning of some promises made many years ago — that we would have doctors and hospitals," said tribal elder Larry Aripa in a prayer starting Wednesday's groundbreaking. "Now some of those promises are coming through."

The center opened three years ago. Tribal Council Chairman Ernest Stenger said it exceeded all expectations. The 6,750-square foot building opened with 12 employees and 850 patients. Now it has 44 employees and 4,000 patients.

"I'm really proud of the job we've done here," he said. "I'm proud of

the employment it's created, of the lives it's touching."

Center director Gary Leva said the patient load has grown by 50 to 100 patients per month since it opened.

The tribe owns the clinic and operates it with money from Indian Health Service and fees. Because the bulk of the funding comes from Indian Health Service, it can't turn away Indians.

Leva said the patient load grew so much the center's board had to decide whether to limit services to non-Indians or expand.

The 12,000-square foot expansion will include space for a five-chair dental clinic and programs in substance abuse, mental health, community health outreach and quality assurance.

The expansion, expected to be done by February, will double space for the pharmacy. A nurse-practitioner will join the staff of two doctors and one dentist next month.

Lawmaker hopes to help doctor under investigation by board

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Wally Wright, D-Bayview, was rebuffed in his effort to testify on behalf of a northern Idaho doctor accused of prescribing too many painkilling drugs, but says he might introduce legislation to protect doctors such as Dr. De Lamar Gibbons.

The Idaho Board of Medicine held a three-day hearing that ended Wednesday. It could result in the doctor losing his license to prescribe medicine. A ruling is expected later in the year after both sides file written arguments.

Gibbons works at Kellogg. Wright flew to Boise from his Coeur d'Alene area home to testify for the

doctor, but was told only people directly involved in the case could testify.

The board contends that Gibbons is turning some of his patients into drug addicts. Gibbons, who represented himself at the hearing, said he is the only doctor who will treat victims of chronic pain in the Silver Valley, instead of leaving them to shorten and suffering lives.

Wright was critical of the process and said he is making Gibbons' case a crusade, because the state ignores all but terminally ill patients. "This is a witch hunt by bureaucrats who want to justify their positions," Gibbons said.

Monster madness

Beater-bashers thunder into fairgrounds Saturday to give locals thrills, chills

FILER — If you own a rusting muscle car that leaks oil like Oklahoma and shows up in the background of your wedding photo, you might not want to park it too close to Twin Falls County Fairgrounds area.

A whole bunch of vintage Chevys, Fords, Cadillacs and Buicks is going to get crunched Saturday night.

"We go through a lot of them," said Stanley Torgerson, president of International Promotions, the Gilbert, Ariz.-based company that's sponsoring the monster truck show at the fairgrounds. "We contract with salvage yards and junk dealers for them. We look for old cars that are complete, but you know those are pretty hard to find these days. We try to avoid foreign cars and smaller cars; too much plastic and aluminum."

How, after all, could you expect a Civic or a Nova to stand up to the likes of Grave Digger, Taurus, Road Kill, Carolina Crusher. No Problem, High Voltage and Thunder Beast?

"These are pretty powerful machines,"

The monster truckfest, "Mavericks and Monsters Motorsports Thrill Show," is scheduled for 8 p.m. Saturday at the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds. Torgerson says. "Indeed, if you're not familiar with the arcane world of monster-truck racing, it involves driving a 12,000-pound, 11-foot high pickup mounted on 66-inch tires right over the pride of Detroit, sitting all in a row."

First one to the other side wins. If you tip-over, you lose, and it will probably cost you \$15,000 to get your truck fixed. "It's becoming a pretty refined sport," Torgerson said. "You have people who own the trucks who are spending

\$65,000 for a 16-valve engine. It's a big investment."

Local fans of monster-truck racing and the last two shows at the fairgrounds drew near-capacity crowds — will see a little better of class of Chrysler-crunchers than usual for an area of this size.

"The trucks are coming from Spokane and headed for another show, so it works out for them to come to Twin Falls," Torgerson said. "Normally, for a crowd of that size and a \$10,000 purse, it wouldn't be worthwhile for them."

"Because of the size of the investment and the cost to keep them operating, the owners of these trucks get sponsors, including some toy companies that make toy models of these trucks," Torgerson said.

Typical is Grave Digger, owned by Dennis and Julie Anderson of Kill Devil Hill, N.C. A 1950 Chevy panel wagon with a fiberglass body and an alcohol-burning 540-cubic inch engine, Grave Digger.

Pioneering folk group tumbles along

TWIN FALLS — Saturday afternoon westerns at the old hometown theater ... bad guys in black hats ... campfires in the prairie ... Sound like a blurred image from the distant past? Not necessarily.

The Sons of the Pioneers are still going strong — and still evoking those cowboy scenes from yesteryear. The group will celebrate 60 years in the musical saddle in 1994.

In preparation for the diamond jubilee, Sons of the Pioneers will record an album package of 60 songs, one for each year on the dusty road. During those years, the faces have changed, but the Old West mood has remained the same.

"Of our present members," Dale Warren has been with the group the longest," said Pioneer Luther Nallie, who made camp in Twin Falls for a few hours between shows at Cactus Pete's, Warren, 68, (also known as trail boss), has been on

board for 40 years. Nallie is close behind, with 27 years under his own brass buckle.

Other group members are David Bradley, a world-class yodeler; Sunny Spencer and his son-in-law Gary

LeMaster and Nallie's son, John.

"We 'howdyed' and brought him and Dale (Evans) on stage to sing with us," Nallie said.

Taking advantage of staying power, the Sons of the Pioneers have tallied up more than 1,500 commercial recordings, including mega-hits like "Cool Water" and "Tumbling Tumbleweeds." The group has also appeared in 98 movies, with stars such as John Wayne, Gene Autry and Bing Crosby.

The Sons of the Pioneers became the vocal group of the year at the Academy of Country Music in 1970, and the singers

Smile when you say that, stranger

TWIN FALLS — Stop me if you've heard this.

There's this stand-up comic from L.A. in this bar in Rock Springs; Wyo., see, and it's Tuesday night and there's about 10 feet of snow on the ground outside and he thinks he's fallen off the edge of the earth.

There's nobody in the room except these three cowboys, just sittin' there taking pulls on Budweiser longnecks, and not one of 'em has cracked a smile yet.

Finally, in desperation, this poor comic bellows, "Fellas, I'm dyin' up here."

One cowboy puts his feet up on the table, pulls his hat down over his brow, folds his hands in his lap and says, "Then sit it over with so we can go home and watch Seinfeld."

Ta-boom.

Welcome to the frontier circuit, where comedy isn't always pretty.

"L.A. audiences don't talk back," said Dan Coffman, whose Pocatello-based Back Stage Comedy network books most acts in this area. "Ours do."

But if they're tough rooms out here in the boonies, they're filling up fast.

Cactus Pete's Horseshoe Hall & Casino in Jackpot and the Elkhorn Radisson Resort in Sun Valley feature weekend comedy acts; Boyd's Underground Lounge in Burley books them monthly.

"Our crowds haven't been big, but I think interest is growing," said Brent Boyd, owner of the Burley club. "We're planning to bring them back every week in the fall."

"We've only been at this a month, but so far the response has been good," said Connie Wilson, assistant to the president at Cactus Pete's. "We're getting more people into the room all the time."

"We're booking acts into every kind of room you could imagine in this area," Coffman said. "Some hotels don't want comics who use off-color material or swear; other rooms want comics who use adult material. The market is there."

A typical week might take a comedian who's never been east of Barstow to Green River, Wyo., on a Tuesday; Ogden, Utah, on a Wednesday; Burley on a Thursday; Sun Valley on a Friday and Boise for the weekend.

"Everybody wants to be a stand-up comic, but not everybody wants to do the things you have to do to be successful," Coffman said. "And that means you have to learn how to handle money, handle audiences and work in places like Green River."

"It's a business in which you have to pay your dues," L.A.-born comedian Danny Marona said. "I've been at it 33 years, and it's gotten a lot tougher since I got into the business."

Marona, who splits time between his Snake River Canyon rim residence west of Twin Falls and his Northern California home when he's not on the road, is glad he's not starting out today like the young comics riding the frontier circuit.

"There were many times that I'd go home at night, a couple months behind on the rent, and wonder why I was doing this," he said. "But then I'd think one more week, one more show ..."

With the Arts & Entertainment Network's "Evening at the Improv," HBO's "Comedy Special" and the cable Comedy Channel, comics are everywhere. Even the most visible and best-paid performer in network television — Jay Leno and David Letterman — are stand-up comedians.

"I think there's a certain level of appreciation by people because of all the exposure to comedy on television," Boyd said. "Before anybody sees a comedian in a club, they've seen a lot of comedians on TV."

"Comedy is something that draws people's attention," Wilson said. "When we started, I think we were looking at attracting younger people, but it's been a little surprising. We're getting older people too."

 "We're looking to attract tourists and people in the community who don't want to go into a bar and drink or listen to music," said Jim Haupt, assistant manager of Radisson Elkhorn, where the Showplace Saloon will begin weekly Friday night comedy acts tonight. "It's something families can do. We'll even let kids in."
 "It's a long way from backwoods Idaho to L.A.'s Comedy Store, but many of the comics Coffman books have played both.
 "There are a lot of comedians looking for work out there, so we can afford to be fairly selective," Coffman said. "Most of the people we book for this area are from the L.A. area or the Bay Area, so we can get comics who have had some exposure and experience."

Except for those rooms that don't want off-color humor, Coffman doesn't advise his clients to tailor their California material for Mountain West audiences.
 "It's up to each of them to decide what works and what doesn't," he said. "If audiences don't like your material, you'll hear about it."
 "We had one guy in here who was being heckled pretty good by a woman in the front row," Boyd said. "He said to her, 'When you sleep, do you dream of the movies? I think you must, because your forehead's big enough.'"
 "For a comedian, there's no place lonelier than a room half-filled with people and half-filled with silence — especially if you're a long way from home."

"What you have to understand is that most of these comedians have worked in comedy clubs," Marona said. "If you go to a comedy club, you go to laugh. If you go into a nightclub or casino, you're not going to laugh unless it's funny.
 "There's more noise, more distractions and most of the audience isn't paying attention to you," he said. "The trick is to talk to the three people who are paying attention to you, not to the 20 who aren't. If you do that, you'll lose the audience."
 Marona, who's played everywhere from New York City to small-town Nevada, said successful comics are students of people.
 "If you go into a club in Idaho with your L.A. material, there's no guarantee your audience is going to think it's funny," he said. "I went back to New York and

started telling my L.A. driver jokes," he said. "They died. Nobody laughed. I asked a friend of mine after the show why.
 "Marona," he said. "Everybody in New York is a bad driver. They don't see anything funny about that."
 Marona began his career as a musician. Comedy was a sideline.
 "Then my manager at the time gave me a very valuable piece of advice," he said. "She said there are a lot of people who sing better than you do. But not everybody can be funny. That's much harder."
 And no place, for a city boy, is harder than a room full of cowboys.
 "I'll tell you this," Coffman said. "For people who can handle it, this circuit is a great place to learn how to be funny."

 "I used to have a farm three miles long and three feet wide," he said. "I grew spaghetti on it."
 Speaking of Spencer, he started out wanting to be a classical clarinet soloist, but found he could make more money working with Al Hurt

and Pete Fountain in New Orleans. With the Sons, he plays seven different instruments on stage.
 "That's not all he's capable of playing, but it's all he can carry on a plane," Nallie said.
 The addition of instruments such as electronic keyboard, trumpets, trombones and saxophones has broadened the sound of the group in recent years. The current show blends modern country tunes with old-time favorites and a big band salute reminiscent of the Glenn Miller era.

Next year will undoubtedly bring more extras — as the Sons of the Pioneers climb back in the saddle to watch 60 more years tumble by.

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Boys learn wrong lesson when violence ignored

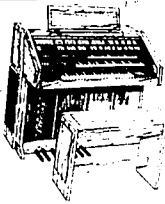

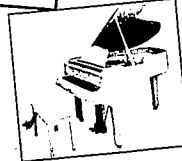
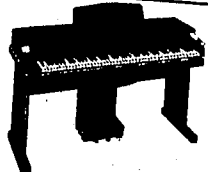

Jurassic Park (PG-13), The poor little rich kid of this summer's movies. Enormous amounts of money and attention have been expended on making the film's half-dozen dinosaur species awfully impressive (though much too intense for small children) but very little has been done to make any of the puny human beings equally involving. In fact, when the big guys leave the screen, you'll be tempted to leave with them. Another case of \$60 million worth of special effects chasing two cents worth of characterization and story. Last Action Hero (PG-13), A ponderous joyride more notable for how strenuously it has been promoted than for how much pleasure it delivers. Based on a slight idea about a boy who loves action films so much he finds himself right up there on the screen with his hero, this epic falls victim to all the excesses that too big a budget and too big a star (Arnold Schwarzenegger) inevitably guarantee. Made in America (PG-13), Sensational chemistry between Whoopi Goldberg and Ted Danson chooses this freewheeling romantic comedy about a single mother (Goldberg), an owner of a Berkeley bookstore devoted to African culture, whose daughter (Nia Long) discovers that her father, via a sperm bank donation, is none other than Danson, a flamboyant car dealer. Smart, sophisticated yet with wide appeal. (Twin Cinema, Ace Theatre)


Once Upon a Forest (G), Hanna-Barbera's first entry in the animated

feature market since the 1990 "Jetsons: The Movie" is never terrible; it just feels very by-the-numbers: Countless children's films and television programs have used similar coming-of-age themes in recent years. Parents can safely send small children to it, certain that the film contains no violence and offers an uplifting message. But adults and older children who accompany them won't be able to help wishing it was a bit more interesting. (Twin Cinema)

BSU thrower still competes

Twin Falls athlete will go to Scotland track meet

Even if he could make a living throwing the discus, Steven Muse would just as soon keep his job with Idaho Power.

He likes the stability it provides for him and his family.

But even as a hobby, track and field is proving beneficial to Muse.

The 27-year-old Boise State University graduate will join a national-team Sunday to compete in a U.S.-England dual meet in Edinburgh, Scotland, on July 2.

Muse finished fourth in the discus at the USA/Mobile Track and Field Championships in Eugene, Ore., making him an alternate for the national squad. One of the top three could not make the Scotland trip, opening up a place for Muse.

Edinburgh will be only the fifth meet this season for Muse. He has improved his throws from 176 feet to 183 to 187 to the 197-11 at Eugene. That's 11 inches shy of his personal record established while at BSU.

And he thinks he can fling the discus 10 feet farther.

"I think I can throw it quite a bit farther now, but I don't have as many meets," Muse said. "That really helps out, because you get a feel for your body."

"The more meets you have, it becomes automatic. It becomes automatic in practice, too, but there's a different kind of adrenaline in a meet."

At BSU, Muse was a four-time All-American and won seven Big Sky Conference championships in the shot and discus. He was also named National Strength and Conditioning Coaches All-American and All-Big Sky Academic.

Now he spends considerably less time working on his event, but still feels he can improve.

"I probably overtrained in college," Muse said. "When you get out of college, you have to accustomate what works."

A broken right wrist forced him to redshirt one season at Boise State. A broken left arm added to his frustration with the sport, leading Muse to drop out of competition for two years.

Returning to action in 1992, he entered three meets.

He does his weight training at The Club and Twin Falls Athletic Club. He practices throwing at Robert Stuart Junior High and the College of Southern Idaho, where he often has to search for well-thrown platters in an alfalfa field.

Out of necessity, he acts as his own coach, and he jokes about that role.

"You get a feeling," he said. "If the discus goes nowhere, you know you did something wrong. If it takes off, you better do this again."

This spring, Muse worked as a volunteer coach for the CSI track team and entered two meets the Golden Eagles attended that had open competition.

He schedules his two-hour workouts around the demands of his position as consumer education representative for Idaho Power and his family, wife Michelle

and their 4-month-old daughter, Monique. The couple expects their second child in six months.

In Scotland, Muse intends to be successful.

"I expect to win," he said.

Croat, Briton give Wimbledon crowd a thrill

WIMBLEDON, England — They call him "Never Borin" Goran, and "Ivan-ACE-ovic."

He calls himself "maybe a little crazy."

But call him what you will, nobody serves aces at Wimbledon like Goran Ivanisevic, and few have played two more dramatic matches than he did in losing in the final last year and winning in the second round Thursday.

After all the fuss this week over Andre Agassi's depilatory adventures, Steffi Graf's obsessed heckler and Pete Sampras' miraculously cured shoulder, Wimbledon witnessed simply superb tennis from Ivanisevic and a British wild card named Chris Bailey.

Ivanisevic saved himself with one gutsy ace on a second serve late in the fifth set, then he ended it with his 34th ace to crush the hopes of long-suffering British fans in the most riveting match at Wimbledon since last year's final.

Ivanisevic dropped that final to Agassi despite a record 37 aces. But in Thursday's drama on Centre Court he survived a match-point against him to beat the No. 263-ranked Bailey 5-7, 7-6 (7-3), 6-7 (7-3), 6-4, 9-7.

"I think this was the best five-set match I ever played," said the No. 5 Ivanisevic, who came within inches of losing on a second-serve let in the fifth set.

This magnificent duel in twilight ended a day that saw the departure of the oldest and youngest men's seeds — Ivan Lendl, 33, and Andrei Medvedev, 18 — in the tournament's first major upsets.

Lendl's annual, perhaps final, quest for a Wimbledon title wound up as always in defeat, 4-6, 7-5, 6-3, 6-4, against Armand Tomicic in the second round. Lendl left quickly and quietly, saying nothing about his loss or his questionable future in the game, and caught a plane home to Connecticut to be with his wife for the birth of their fourth child. Lendl lost in the first round of the two previous Grand Slam events this year.

Medvedev, seeded 10th at his first Wimbledon, was eliminated by Cedric Pioline 6-7 (9-7), 7-6 (8-6), 6-3, 6-4. The 18-year-old Ukrainian said afterward he was despondent over a personal matter and would have preferred not to play.

All the other big names won, including Stefan Edberg, Jim Courier and Martina Navratilova. But for sheer tension and quality of competition, nothing surpassed Ivanisevic-Bailey.

Bailey, playing way over his head in his finest performance, led 6-5 in the final with Ivanisevic serving. At deuce, Bailey drilled a backhand past Ivanisevic to move within a point of producing the biggest men's victory for Britain on Centre Court since Roger Taylor beat defending champion Rod Laver in 1970 in the round

Padres trade Gary Sheffield to home state

SAN DIEGO — Gary Sheffield, the 1992 NL batting champion, was traded to his home state Florida Marlins on Thursday, becoming the latest San Diego Padre to be shipped away because of an owner-mandated salary purge.

Padres general manager Randy Smith, on the job only two weeks, said the five-player deal was "a baseball trade." But Tony Gwynn, apparently the only untouchable player in the Padres' clubhouse, scoffed at that notion.

"No, I do not think it was a baseball deal. ... The decisions they make, I'm as perplexed as anyone," said Gwynn, who's watched an exodus of talented players during his 10-year career. "To see Sheffield go just crushes you. He's 24. He's everything you're looking for in a franchise player."

While happy to be going to the Marlins, Sheffield ripped the Padres' payroll pangs.

"To have to leave under these circumstances is tough," he said as he packed his belongings. "It's not for the fans or the city. I figure if you can't afford a team, you should let it and not use us as bait. Basically, that's what they're doing, and that's what I feel like, bait."

Money you shipped off because of how much the game has changed," said Sheffield, who is making \$3.11 million this year. He is eligible for free agency after the 1994 season.

U.S. officials lobby Congress to drop opposition to China

LAUSANNE, Switzerland — U.S. Olympic officials are trying to convince members of Congress to drop their resolution opposing Beijing's bid to stage the Games of the year 2000.

Dr. LeRoy Walker, president of the U.S. Olympic Committee, said he has spoken with sponsors of the House resolution and will meet in Washington later this month with other congressional leaders.

But in Washington today, Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J., restated his opposition to China as an Olympic site.

"I don't think it right to give the Games to a country that has in its prisons and tortures political dissidents," Bradley said in an interview on NBC-TV.

Asked about IOC's charge that he and others in Congress are politicizing the Games, Bradley said, "For one of the most political institutions in the world to charge politics is not surprising. That's politics ... saying that the Games should be free of politics is like saying air should be free of oxygen."

"The issue here is whether we want to condone the gross human rights violations that are taking place in China."

Bradley, who won an Olympic gold medal with the U.S. basketball team at Tokyo in 1964 before going on to a NBA career — has written to the IOC urging rejection of Beijing's bid on human rights grounds.

Bradley said, however, he was opposed to a U.S. boycott if China gets the Games, adding, "The objective here is to head off at the pass something that could really be an

embarrassment to the world and to the Olympic movement."

Walker said he hoped the resolution would be killed.

"I don't think it's in our favor for it to be debated. I think it's bad for it to come out of the Congress at all," he said.

The resolution, introduced in both the House and Senate, urges the IOC to reject Beijing's candidacy because of its human rights record. Chinese and IOC officials have reacted angrily to the U.S. initiative, describing it as political interference.

Walker said the USOC is concerned about the "tremendous implications" of Congress' intervention.

"We're not arguing the issue. We're bothered by the source of the resolutions and what it might do, how our athletes might be affected by it," he said Wednesday.

Defector makes point with pitches

MIAMI (AP) — Cuban defector Rene Arocha believes he's making a point with his pitching and politics.

When Arocha took the floor for the first time Wednesday night in his adopted hometown of Miami, he celebrated the victory and drove in two runs with his first big-league hit as the St. Louis Cardinals beat the Florida Marlins 4-3.

Playing only 200 miles from Havana, the rookie agitator showed what Cuba's best players could do in the majors — if only they were given the chance.

"The message I believe I'm sending to Castro is that the Cuban people in general are so oppressed," Arocha said through a translator. "And the players specifically don't get a chance to leave the country and perform the way I have."

Although Arocha couldn't be sure, he had a hunch that friends and family heard about his Miami debut in his hometown of Regla.

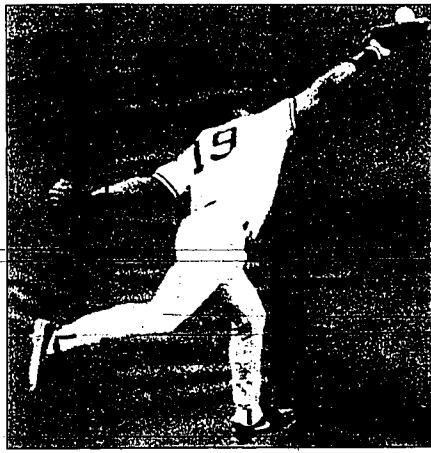
"I think everybody in Regla must feel very proud," he said.

Arocha (6-2) won despite his shortest stint as a starter, departing after 5 1/3 innings. His lead was protected by four relievers, including Lee Smith, who earned his major-league leading 25th save.

Arocha was satisfied with his pitching and estate about his hitting. He was 0 for 19 before hitting a single up the middle in the second inning against Ryan Bowen.

"When the inning ended, he stared at me all the way from the mound," Cardinals manager Joe Torre said. "I've been telling him the past month what a terrible hitter he was, and he told me he would show me. His stare bore a hole right through me. And the best thing about it was it was with the bases loaded."

Arocha is a hero among Cubans in Miami, where he defected from the powerful Cuban national team in 1991. A crowd of 37,936 at J.Pe. Robb Stadium cheered each time his name was announced, and when he left the game at the sixth inning, many gave him a standing ovation.

Catcher's job the most grueling, abusive task in world of baseball

CHICAGO — Met a fellow a few weeks ago, and he told me he had played sandlot baseball. That he had played sandlot baseball. No-hit catcher. This isn't unusual. Most catchers can't hit. It's a defensive position.

I asked if he blinked his eyes when the hitter swung the bat. He insisted he never blinked. Immediately, I knew he was a fraud.

All catchers blink, including Carlton Fisk who Tuesday night caught his 2,226th game, a major league record. Curious, I asked Fisk if, after 21 full seasons behind the plate, he is still blinking.

It is an instinctive reaction when the pitch is coming and the bat flashes in front of the catcher's eyes. The first lesson the schoolboy receiver learns is to forget the bat, that he must concentrate on the ball.

Fisk said he was blinking more than at any time in recent years. He said this was because he has been rusting on the bench, playing only once or twice a week. I told him that when he was at the height of his career he was blinking but didn't know it. A slow-motion film, I am certain, would reveal the fraction of a second when the catcher's eyes are closed.

This is mentioned now because many fans don't have a full appreciation of the catcher. The same goes for the players. Most players, at some time during their career, play every position. But squatting behind the plate with mask, chest protector and shinguards — the so-called tools of ignorance? No, thanks.

The general assumption is that catchers are big, dumb oafs is an old wives' tale. The opposite usually is true. Moe Berg, who spoke seven languages and caught for several clubs, including the White Sox, was a graduate of Princeton and the Sorbonne. Seven of the current big league managers were catchers. It would have been eight if Jeff Torborg hadn't been fired.

Catching is the most physically demanding position. The catcher must be both strong and courageous to withstand collisions at the plate. More than any other player, he is likely to fracture a finger or break a hand and prove to arthritis in the knees. Severe bruises in the arms, which are not protected, are

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explained. "About rundown plays, about the hitters, their strengths and weaknesses, and how you can lose 10 points on a Sunday afternoon in Texas. Here's a stat only catchers know: One year, when I was with the Rangers, the temperature was 105 degrees, or higher, 45 days in a row."

In part, this is what the Encyclopedia Britannica, in its entry on baseball, says about catchers: "The 'good hands' essential to every player are, especially important, for the catcher. Throughout the game he must catch the pitched balls not hit by the batter and sometimes pitches that strike the ground near the plate. Sometimes he must jump for a high one or a wide one. "If the batter has two strikes, the ability of the catcher to catch a tipped ball and hold it results in a strikeout, ending the batter's turn at bat with a putout; eluding the catcher's grasp it becomes a mere foul ball, granting the batter one more chance to hit safely."

"I loved it," said Joe Garagiola, a former somewhat anonymous catcher who later gained fame as a network broadcaster. "But I've never seen a catcher cheered for stopping a pitched ball."

There always seems to be a dearth of good catchers. Mom, when she agrees to allow sonny boy to play Little League, doesn't want him catching because of the increased possibility of injury.

What she doesn't realize is that a sure-handed catcher, who can throw has the best chance to make the climb to the big leagues.

Which brings us back to Carlton Fisk. Now that he has broken the record for most games caught, the "fingers" are — that after a respectful two- or three-week period, the White Sox will give him the pink slip. At the age of 45 he isn't the catcher he once was. He's been dropping pitches and doesn't have much steam on his thighs. . .

The magnificent old warhorse, like Samson, has been shorn of his home-run power, but he remains an unconquerable competitor. AND he's not .189 right. Tuesday night he ripped two line drives, both caught by deep center and right-center. If it's the end here he should be able to make another big-league connection. Good catchers, even average catchers, can help a club.

Former big-league player takes another shot at game

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — It's hot. Yet there's Leon Durham, wearing a black nylon sweatshirt and pitching batting practice to a bunch of guys who fell through the cracks of organized baseball's multimillion-dollar system.

"The sweatshirt tries to hide the truth. But it can't."

"Need to lose some weight," said the renegade Northern League's marquee player.

"Bull!" Durham is sweltering. Sweat beads up on his scalp, which is cropped as closely as a scalp can be without being completely shaved. Drops of perspiration dangle off the bottom of his gonche. The man wants a baseball future and he's using sweat equity as down payment.

Durham's left arm comes forward. The ball heads to the plate. The batter swings. And then the process is repeated. Over and over again. Once one of baseball's most feared left-handed hitters, Durham is lobbing easy pitches to guys who probably never will see the inside of a major-league clubhouse.

And he's smiling as he does it. "It's good to be back in baseball," he said.

Baseball hasn't always been kind to Durham. In 1982, he was a National League All-Star, a 20-homer, 20-steal player, a 300 hitter. He batted .277 and hit 147 homers during his 10-year career, mostly with the Chicago Cubs.

But injuries and insecurities hurt his career. And after flunking drug tests in 1988 and 1989, baseball had little use for him.

— "I had people I could be talked to — a wife, a brother, great teammates — but I never opened up. I don't know how to handle stress. So I'd turn to chemicals for a boost," said Durham, whose chemicals of choice were cocaine and booze.

Finally, Durham made a change for the better. He got sober.

"After staying clean for two years while running the family's printing business, he decided to give baseball another try this spring."

He went to minor-league camp with the Chicago White Sox, was released and wound up in the Northern League — a first-year, six-team circuit that isn't affiliated with the majors.

"It's fun," said Durham, whose grand slam won the season opener.

But in the fun atmosphere of St. Paul Municipal Stadium, 22 players are trying to start the impossible climb from the lowest rung on baseball's ladder.

Some have been in big-league camps but were caught in minor-league games. Some were completely overlooked. Some are young enough to be Durham's sons; he will be 36 next month and is the league's oldest player.

"Guys here are tremendous competitors. Bull fit right in," said Saints manager Tim Blackwell, a former Cubs teammate of Durham. Plus, he's not afraid to take on responsibility. He's grabbed some of the young guys and taken them under his wing. If they're not going to listen to a guy who has played 10 years in the big leagues, who are they going to listen to?

Slow-footed Mariner makes history with cycle

SEATTLE (AP) — It took 17 seasons and 2,607 games for a Seattle Mariners' player to hit for the cycle.

When it finally happened with a triple in the 14th inning in the Kingdome Wednesday night, history-making Jay Buhner was surprised.

"It's ironic, isn't it?" Buhner said, grimacing. "Mr. Fleet on his feet. For me to get a triple is probably the hardest thing to do. So it was the farthest thing on my mind."

Ken Griffey Jr., the Mariners' three-time All-Star and one of the American League's premier center fielders, was considered the top threat to hit a home run, triple, double and single in the same game for Seattle because of his speed.

Although he lacks Griffey's speed, Buhner is having another outstanding defensive year in right field. He has one of the strongest arms in baseball.

After going 4-for-7 that included his fourth career grand slam in the 14-inning game against Oakland, Buhner had a .306 batting average, 15 home runs and a team-leading 49 RBIs.

Buhner has single-season bests of 27 home runs and 79 RBIs.

With his fifth home-run in four games and a 2-for-5 game, Griffey was hitting .321 with 18 home runs and 47 RBIs.

Buhner and Griffey are good friends. On the field, they cheer for each other. They also try to outdo each other.

It can only make you better when you're competing with such an outstanding talent as Griffey, last year's MVP of the All-Star game, Buhner said.

Albus, Charles atop field

DEARBORN, Mich. (AP) — Jim Albus and Bob Charles each shot 6-under-par 66s to share the first-round lead in the Senior Players Championship at the sun-drenched TPC of Michigan on Thursday.

They were one stroke ahead of Jack Nicklaus, who designed the 18-hole golf course in the shadow of the Ford Motor Co. world headquarters, and Jim Colbert. Ford is sponsor of the event, considered one of the Senior majors.

Two strokes back at 68 were defending champion Dave Stockton, Raymond Floyd, senior rookie Bob Murphy and Rocky Thompson, seeking his first victory since 1991.

There were other familiar names within striking distance of the leaders. Tom Weiskopf and Don January were at 70 and Arnold Palmer, Chi Chi Rodriguez and Dave Hill were at even-par 72. But Lee Trevino struggled to a 74, as did J.C. Snead, Billy Casper and Tom Wargo.

The top of the leader board was a familiar spot for Albus, who stunned the golf world by winning this tournament in 1991 while still working as a club pro at Piping Rock Club on Long Island. It was only the sixth start on the Senior tour for Albus, who now plays the circuit full time.

"I have nothing but good thoughts here," Albus said. "A lot of club pros can play. They just always haven't had the chance to show it."

Albus, who won the GTE Suncoast Classic in February, was humming along at 6-under after a two-putt birdie from 50 feet at the 13th. But he failed to hole a 3-footer to save par on the next hole. It was his only bogey of the round.

Albus birdied the 15th from 20 feet, then parred in for 68. "I think it was the good conditions that led to all the good scores," Albus said.

Keepers go 1st in NHL draft

QUEBEC (AP) — Vezina Trophy-winning goaltender John Vanbiesbroeck and New York Islanders playoff star Glenn Healy were among those picked Thursday as the Florida Panthers and Anaheim Mighty Ducks stocked their rosters at the NHL expansion draft.

The NHL's newest teams each selected 24 players as they prepared for the 1993-94 season.

As expected, the teams fared well in the goaltending category, picking three each from a good selection supplied by the other 24 NHL teams that were allowed to protect only one veteran.

Vanbiesbroeck—the former New York Rangers star goaltender who won the Vezina as the NHL's best goalie in 1985-86, was made the No. 1 selection by the Panthers from the roster of the Vancouver Canucks. The Canucks had acquired Vanbiesbroeck in a trade last Sunday.

Guy Hebert of the St. Louis

Blues was the Ducks' No. 1 pick as goaltenders went first in the draft. The Ducks followed that selection by picking up Healy, whose often spectacular goaltending in the postseason keyed the Islanders' strong-playoff run.

The Ducks also picked up Ron Tugnutt from the Edmonton Oilers as their third goaltender. The Panthers selected Mark Fitzpatrick from Quebec and Toronto's Daren Puppa.

Alexei Kasatonov of the New Jersey Devils was the No. 1 defenseman picked by the Ducks. And Steven King of the Rangers was the No. 1 forward chosen, also by the Ducks after they won a coin toss to start the final round.

After picking Kasatonov, one of the key players on the Russian national team for many years, the Ducks went for younger players for the most part among the defenses.

They included Montreal's Sean

Hill, Buffalo's Bill Wulfer, Detroit's Bobby Dollas, Hartford's Randy Ladouceur, San Jose's David Williams, Tampa Bay's Dennis Vial and Ottawa's Mark Ferrer.

The Panthers, meanwhile, made Chicago's Milan Tichy their No. 1 defensive pick. They followed Tichy's selection with Pittsburgh's Paul Laus, Joe Cirella of the Rangers, Calgary's Alexander Godynyuk, Dallas' Gord Murphy,

Winnipeg's Steve Baneroff, Boston's Stefane Richer and Philadelphia's Gord Hynes.

After King, the Ducks picked Boston's Tim Sweeney, Pittsburgh's Troy Loney, Chicago's Stu Grimson, Hartford's Terry Yake, New Jersey's Jarrod Skalde, Buffalo's Bob Corkum, Vancouver's Anatoli Semenov, Toronto's Joe Sacco, Los Angeles' Lonnie Loch and Jim Thomson, Washington's Trevor Halverson and San Jose's Robin Bawa.

Maltbie, Stadler share early Hartford lead

CROMWELL, Conn. (AP) — Craig Stadler and Roger Maltbie, casting aside concerns about their struggling games, shot 5-under-par 65s Thursday to share the first-round lead in the Canon Greater Hartford Open.

The carefree attitudes — something Stadler readily admits he's not known for — led them to within a shot of the course record.

John Huston, Keith Clearwater and Dan Forsman are a shot back and nine players, including Nick Price and Corey Pavin, were at 3-under. A day after only six players broke par on the course during a celebrity program because of wind gusting to 25 mph, 21 golfers broke par in ideal conditions.

Not all benefited from the improved conditions, however. Defending champion Lanny Wadkins shot 74 and two-time Hartford champion Paul Azinger had a 75.

Though Stadler and Maltbie took similar approaches, it was for different reasons. Stadler had been striking the ball well, but hasn't been making putts.

"I've been scared to make putts. Not for any particular reason, just because I don't have any confidence," Stadler said. "When you get over a 6-footer and you can't decide whether you want to miss it left or right, it's pretty tough to make them."

Stadler, who has used five putters in his last two tournaments, said his putting began coming around on Tuesday when he sank a 5-footer he thought he would miss.

An even-par 70 during Wednesday's pro-am bolstered his confidence, and Stadler decided to play Thursday-as-if-it-were-a-practice-round.

"I just told myself to have a good time. If it goes in, fine; if not, I was



at least making a decent stroke at it," he said.

When he made par after two bad shots on the 341-yard, par-4 second hole, he knew the attitude adjustment was working.

"That was the key to the putting for the day, saying that," said Stadler, still using the putter he pulled out for the final day of the U.S. Open.

Stadler also made short putts on the third, seventh and 15th holes for birdies, and birdie putts of 12 feet on the 13th and 20 feet on the 14th, something he hasn't done a lot of this year.

"I have putted so miserable for six months this year. Today was much improved. I don't feel like I made a bad stroke out there," Stadler said.

While Stadler's confidence began returning earlier in the week, Maltbie had no idea he was on the verge of a good round. He had played poorly since lying for eighth in the Northern Telecom Open in January and was coming off an 80 in Wednesday's pro-am.

"I just decided I wasn't going to be too critical of myself," said Maltbie, who helped redesign the course three years ago.

Maltbie said he didn't even play that well, although he could have been alone in the lead had he not missed a 3-foot birdie putt on the final hole. He had several good saves and made just one bogey.

His best shot was a birdie from 50 feet from a bunker on the 171-yard, par-3 16th, the same hole on which he had a hole-in-one on in the opening round last year.

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Holyfield back in boxing after losing title

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — It was not what Evander Holyfield's 65-year-old mother Annie wanted to hear.

"She had a sick look on her face," the former heavyweight champion said of his mother's reaction when he told her he would fight again.

Then, she said, "If that makes you happy, I support you."

Saturday night, the 30-year-old Holyfield will fight for the first time since losing the undisputed championship on points to Riddick Bowe Nov. 13.

His opponent at the Convention Center will be Alex Stewart. He stopped Stewart on a cut in the

eighth round of a tough fight Nov. 4, 1989. Two fights later, on Oct. 25, 1990, Holyfield became undisputed champion by knocking out James "Buster" Douglas in the third round.

The loss to Bowe came in his fourth title defense and was the first

of his 29-bout career.

"After the fight, I was bitter," Holyfield said Thursday. "I was not so bitter that I lost, but I was bitter about the way the judges scored the fight. The way they scored it, it seemed I wasn't even there."

Two judges favored Bowe by seven points each. The third favored Bowe by three points.

Holyfield, whose purses have totaled more than \$80 million, said to let the defeat that he would not fight again.

"I retired because I was under a lot of pressure and I wanted out," he said.

Holyfield returns without trainers

George Benton and Lou Duva; who were in his corner since he turned pro in 1984.

Duva, who advised Holyfield to quit fighting, and Benton took over the training of unbeaten contender Michael Moorer after Holyfield said he was retiring.

So Holyfield asked Emanuel Steward to train him. Steward once trained Moorer and long guided the career of Thomas Hearns.

He also took on his adviser Hammer, the rapper who is a friend, and who is serving as co-promoter for Saturday's fight. Holyfield remains tied managerially to Shelly Finkel and promotionally to Dan Duva.

Cable TV not drawing sports away, study reports

WASHINGTON (AP) — Contrary to what some viewers think, sports programming is not moving away from free broadcasts to cable TV, according to a preliminary report released Thursday by the Federal Communications Commission.

The NFL and college basketball haven't migrated to cable at all, and are in little danger of doing so, said the report, which will be sent to Congress.

While some NBA, major league baseball and NHL games have moved onto cable channels at the local level, overall the movement has been slight, the report said.

As for college football, contracts

between college football conferences and ABC, ESPN and regional cable networks are blocking broadcasters from new access, the FCC reported.

The Pacific 10, for example, has a deal with Prime Ticket Sports, a regional cable channel that prevents any broadcaster from carrying any Pac-10 football game at the same time as the one being shown on Prime Ticket.

Since most college games are played on Saturday afternoons, the only way local broadcasters can show conference games is to get the school to switch to morning or evening game times.

James Hedlund of the Association

of Independent Television Stations contends there is a worrisome situation developing.

"We're hoping there is enough pressure that the Congress will enact something that will do away with exclusive time windows," he said. "Hopefully, the FCC will continue to focus on it so these sports can't in the dark of night slip over to cable."

The new cable TV law requires the FCC to monitor local, regional and national sports programming to make sure the 40 percent of Americans who don't subscribe to cable TV can still watch sports.

The study will continue for another year, concluding with second report

to Congress and a recommendation as to whether a law is needed to protect free access to important sporting events.

"I've been personally quite concerned," said FCC chairman James Quello.

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Argentine star says he won't play soccer

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Diego Maradona returned to Argentina Thursday and said he would not play soccer again.

Maradona, who returned from Spain following the expiration of his one-season contract with Sevilla in the Spanish first division, said that "after the match with Burgos, I realized it was the end for me."

During the June 13 match, Maradona was substituted for by coach and longtime mentor Carlos Bilardo, whom he insulted while talking to TV interviewers. The striker threw his captain's armband on the ground, stormed off the field and said he would deal with Bilardo "like a man — if he is a man."

"Either Carlos was wrong or I was wrong that time," he was reported to say Thursday. "We talked afterwards and straightened everything out."

Maradona said he would decide his future after a few days' rest with his family.

The war that America forgot

Miscalculation turns 'quick, easy' Korean campaign into 3-year slugfest

Forty-three years ago today, a war began that profoundly changed America, then was relegated to little-read history books.

Though few other Americans recall it now, the men who fought the Korean War are proud to think that it was the beginning of the end for communism.

"We call it the war America forgot to remember," Win K. Scott, 63, of Waynesville, N.C., said just before joining a group of fellow veterans who are returning to the battlefields of their youth to mark the anniversary as guests of the Republic of Korea.

In 1950, Scott was a 20-year-old Marine serving with the U.S. occupation forces in Japan. Five years

earlier, when World War II ended, Soviet troops accepted the Japanese surrender in the northern half of the Korean peninsula while U.S. forces did the same in the southern half. The division of Korea, intended to be temporary, had hardened into an Iron Curtain of the Far East, separating a communist regime in the North from one sponsored by the United States in the South.

On June 25, 1950, the North Korean army poured across the boundary, intending to reunify the country by force of arms and under the communist flag.

The communists might have achieved that objective, for the out-

gunned South Koreans were overwhelmed and soon in disorderly retreat. But four days after the attack, President Harry S. Truman announced that U.S. troops, Scott and his Marine-Corps buddies among them, would go to the defense of South Korea.

"We've got to stop the sons-of-bitches no matter what," Truman said, explaining his decision with customary bluntness to Secretary of State Dean Acheson.

The first Americans sent to Korea, high on memories of their regiments' World War II victories, predicted a quick and easy campaign. Frank Torries, then a young Marine fresh out of Spanish Harlem, heard a reporter from The New York Times asking the disembarking GIs if any were from New York.

"I am," Torries told the reporter. "The Marines have landed. We're going to kick ass and be out of here in three weeks."

In fact, the three weeks stretched into three years, during which 54,246 Americans died, almost as many as were killed in the 10 years of the Vietnam War.

The overall toll was far greater: 1.3 million South Koreans, many of them civilians; a million Chinese; 500,000 North Koreans.

It was a war both sides grossly miscalculated. The communists, having won control of China the previous year, assumed that the United States wouldn't fight again in Asia so soon after World War II.

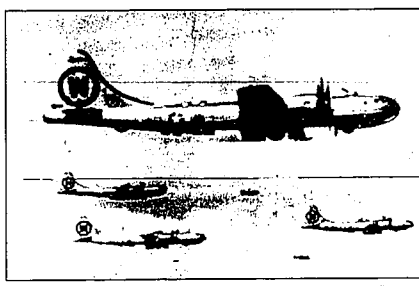
Based upon recent U.S. foreign policy, that wasn't a bad bet. Though an ally of the United States, South Korea had been denied adequate weapons, even though the Chinese communists obviously were angling North Korea.

In 1950, the United States was still trying to figure out its new role as the world's policeman. A generation earlier, America had retreated into its traditional isolationism after its victories in World War I.

Immediately after World War II, the United States was of two minds: It declared that in Europe it would not permit any advance by the Soviet Union beyond its Eastern European satellite states. But there was such a commitment in Asia.

When Truman acted, a lot of Americans had to adjust their personal lives as well as their political assumptions.

Fritz Heistermann of Whittier, Calif., had enlisted in the Marines at the age of 16 and served in World War II at the battles of Guam and two Jims.

Like thousands of ex-GIs, Heistermann was recalled to service when the Korean War broke out.

By Christmas 1950 he and other Americans had advanced to the Chosin Reservoir in far northern Korea. China, which had entered the war a month earlier, suddenly

poured in wave after wave of soldiers.

"Chosin was much worse than two Jims, because of the bitter weather and being outnumbered," said Heistermann.

Frustrated by the Chinese move, Gen. Douglas MacArthur, the U.S.

commander, wanted to drop atomic bombs on their bases and supply lines. But Truman rejected that idea just as forcefully as he had decided not to abandon South Korea.

His decision was momentous for the world: Never after that did any of the superpowers use their atomic arsenals. But it also meant the Korean conflict stalemated into a war of attrition.

Four decades later, Korea remains divided. But Torries, now 63 and living in Santa Ana, Calif., believes this was the war in which America drew the line against further communist advances.

When communist regimes in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union started falling in 1989, Torries and his fellow Korean War vets were pleased to think that the process had begun with those bloody battles of 1950, where so many of their own buddies had fallen.

Yet that is a history lesson their fellow Americans have refused to learn, Heistermann said.

"When I came home from World War II, there were bands playing at the dock," he said. "When I came home from Korea, your family welcomed you, and that was it. I never talked about that war. People weren't interested and wouldn't know where it was even if you told them."

Tribal leaders question re-enactment of Custer's Last Stand

POPULAR, Mont. — George Armstrong Custer may be dead and buried — but every year he is re-enacted in a re-enactment of his Last Stand.

Some ancestors of the original tribes that participated in the Battle of the Little Bighorn are protesting on grounds the re-enactment exploits the battle by chasing the tourist dollar.

Other ancestors of those who fought in the famous battle say today will be a holiday to commemorate the great warriors of the Sioux and to celebrate with victory dances and feasts because the 7th Cavalry under Custer's command was defeated that day.

Lt. Col. George Armstrong Custer, the West Pointer who survived the Civil War, died June 25, 1876, with about 225 men of the 7th Cavalry.

He made his last stand on a lonesome ridge overlooking the Little Bighorn River in Montana. Custer, who earned fame as an Indian fighter, had planned to strike fast and catch the enemy napping as he did in previous battles with Plains tribes.

But the Sioux, Cheyenne and Arapaho were not napping at the Little Bighorn. He ran into a massive encampment — a camp of some 10,000 people that stretched eight miles along the Little Bighorn River.

The great chiefs such as Crazy Horse and Sitting Bull had decided this would be a do or die stand. They did and Custer and his 7th Cavalry died.

The Executive Board of the Fort Peck Assiniboine and Sioux tribes in Poplar, Mont., voted unanimously to oppose the annual re-enactment that occurs every June at Hardin, located in south central Montana.

"Those were real men who fought and died at that battle. Instead of glorifying war and death every year, our goal should be to memorialize the men who fought there," said Caleb Shields, chairman of the Fort Peck Tribes.

"The battle re-enactment does not provide a message of hope for a better tomorrow for the

thousands of Indian and non-Indian children who visit the battlefield every year. What are we teaching our children?" he asked.

The re-enactment of Custer's Last Stand is sponsored by the Hardin Chamber of Commerce. Many Crow tribal members participate, playing the parts of leaders such as Sitting Bull and Crazy Horse who fought in the battle.

Last year Russell Means, co-founder of the American Indian Movement, asked members of the Crow Tribe to boycott the re-enactment. The boycott did not materialize. "It perpetuates all kinds of stereotypes," Means said.

"I find the re-enactment abhorrent. No respect is shown for our great Indian leaders and ancestors. I am disgusted with this group or any organization that will make a profit perpetuating war. I think it's time to grow up and stop playing cowboys and Indians."

Even though four out of five of the 1991 re-enactments were rained out, the weekend's events attracted more than 20,000 to Hardin and the Little Bighorn Battlefield. A Crow tribal official estimated that last year more than 80,000 people paid \$8 (for an adult ticket) to see the re-enactment.

"All that we are saying is it is time to stop reliving that battle and stop exploiting war for profit," Chairman Shields said.

"Our goal should be to memorialize the men who fought there." The chairman sent a letter to all the tribes in Montana, including the Crow Tribe, and Sioux tribes in both North and South Dakota asking for support in getting the re-enactment cancelled.

"There has always been negative criticism on that re-enactment but no one has spoken up on the issue.

"We felt an obligation as the only Sioux tribe in Montana. Since the battlefield is in our state, it is

our responsibility to take the lead in opposing it. "We feel that we won't be able to do anything this year except oppose it. But maybe next year we can get it cancelled."

John Steele, president of the Oglala Sioux Tribe, said he disapproves of the re-enactment, but as for June 25, "it is a holiday for us. A memorial day for the warriors that gave their lives in that battle and also a day of celebration.

"The college graduation is scheduled then and we have a pow wow and victory celebration for the battle victory."

June 25 was declared an official tribal holiday in 1970 by the Oglala Sioux Tribe. Hobart Keith, a former chief judge, had set all the prisoners in the jail free with a bean dinner to commemorate the holiday, Black Hawk attorney Mario Gonzalez said.

The day should be celebrated, he said, because it is noted as the only time the United States was defeated in battle.

Frank Means, Pine Ridge Village Councilman, said the "L" shaped ambush, one of the battle plans of the great warrior Crazy Horse, is still used today and he is admired by military strategists as one of the greatest warriors to ever live.

Hugh White Clay, public relations officer for the Crow Tribe, said, "We would like to have it some place else rather than where it is. I understand that some Sioux are going to come over to participate in it this year. They are glorifying Custer. A man who is dead and buried back east."

"To me the man Custer had one thing in mind, that was to come into our land and (commit) genocide on the Indian race under the guise of manifest destiny," White Clay said.

He believes the re-enactment is detrimental to race relations because it dwells on past relations.

"White people from back east go through with children who are 10, 11 and 12 years old. When they leave the only thing they take with them is not how the Sioux, Cheyenne Arapaho and Crow live today, but the man Custer is glorified."

"Five hundred years ago we were nations of people with religions, cultures and a social life that had sustained us for hundreds of years prior to that."

"This is what we want to convey to the rest of the world. Some of these other things are adverse. What is taking place is Indians have to come of age. Those things were done 116 years ago and Indian tribes cannot relive past glories."

'Data superhighway' years away, experts say

HEAVENLY HILLS, Calif. — The convergence of computers, consumer electronics, cable television and telephones is moving forward at a furious clip — yet it's still years away from creating the entertainment, social and business revolution its backers envision, participants in a giant high-tech mecca-Hollywood conference said.

And while cable television providers and telephone companies agreed over a "data superhighway" that could pave the road to billions in new business, public-interest activists criticized them for considering only the bottom line instead of the national good.

Politics, policy, money, entertainment, education and power — that's the allure of the data superhighway and the promise of interactive television, electronic shopping malls, "distance learning," electronic health care services and omnipresent two-way communications.

The need to create alliances is a key reason consumers shouldn't expect to see a full-blown system anytime soon.

"This is a very infrastructure-intensive industry — you have to build it before you ever start," said Roger McNamee, a Manly Park, Calif., venture capitalist. "As soon as you get into an alliance, the project moves along at the pace of the slowest member. And the slowest member is the guy with the money."

Bond rally, buy programs lift stock market nearly 24 points

NEW YORK — Waves of program buying by foreign stocks Thursday and reinforced a rally sparked by strength in the bond market.

Investors temporarily cast aside concerns about corporate balance sheets that had weighed down stocks over the past two sessions. The computer-guided, futures-related buying broke the monotony of a market that had drifted at moderately higher levels for most of the day.

The Dow Jones industrial average finished with a gain of 23.88 at 3,490.41, erasing much of Wednesday's nearly 31-point loss. Advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 7 to 5 on the New York Stock Exchange.

Income growth spurs savings rate

WASHINGTON — A healthy 0.6 percent increase in personal income allowed Americans to save more in May, the government said Thursday in a signal of modestly improving economic prospects.

The increase, to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$5.3 trillion, was the sixth consecutive gain in personal income and would have been even stronger if not for a second consecutive decline in federal farm subsidies, the Commerce Department said.

The report fit with analysts' belief that the economy is rebounding moderately, albeit unevenly, after growth as measured by the gross domestic product slumped to an anemic 0.7 percent annual rate in the first quarter.

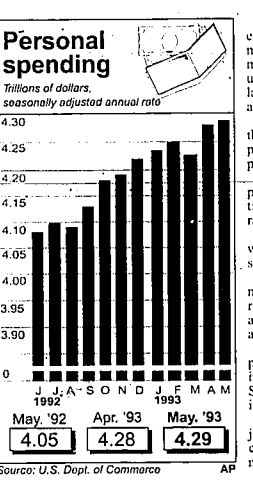
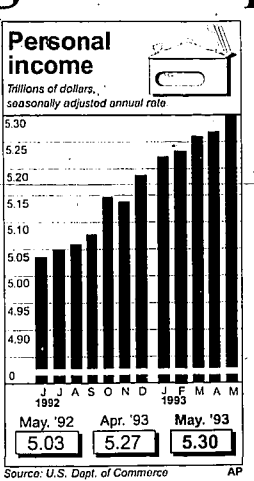
"This has been a half-speed recovery — however it is still an ongoing recovery and it's generating enough new jobs and income to keep consumer spending expanding," said economist Sandra Shaber of The Wall Group, a forecasting firm in Bala Cynwyd, Pa.

Personal consumption spending rose a slight 0.2 percent in May to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$4.29 trillion. But that followed a 1.2 percent surge in April.

In May, the combination of a healthy gain in income and a small rise in spending produced an increase in the savings rate — savings as a percentage of income — to 4.8 percent from 4.4 percent in April.

"Consumers are trying to break some bad habits. They didn't spend more than they took in and that's a pleasant change," said economist Bruce Steinberg of Merrill Lynch.

The May advance in incomes followed a paltry 0.1 percent increase in April.



1st class takes back seat as airline market shifts

Fliers seek economy, especially on domestic routes

NEW YORK — The comfy seats, champagne and napkin rings of first class are being reduced or eliminated by airlines that find today's cost-conscious business travelers are more apt to fly in the cheaper sections.

Particularly on foreign airlines, first-class seats are being removed to make room for more business-class and coach seats.

First class is still in vogue in some markets, but the yearning for basic air transportation has overcome the glamorous notion of the jet set on other routes.

Corporate travel budgets have been slashed and fewer executives are willing to book pricier first-class seats. And tourists sitting behind the first-class curtain are often redefining their fre-

quent flier perks or other promotions to get the more expensive seats.

"Most people in first class aren't paying for it," said Helene Becker, airline analyst at Shearson Lehman Brothers. "First class takes up too much space on a jet and offers too much pampering for many airlines to justify giving it away, she said."

Randy Petersen, editor of Inside Flyer, a magazine about frequent flier programs, plays down the notion cited by many in the industry that first class has become an expensive giveaway. By restricting the number of seats available to upgraded frequent fliers, airlines can control how many people are flying for free.

Excluding two special factors — farm subsidies and the reverberating effects of the mid-March storm on the East Coast — income would have been up 0.8 percent in May and 0.4 percent in April.

Despite the recent improvement in some economic numbers, progress in the job market remains slow. The Labor Department said Thursday new applications for unemployment insurance totaled 353,000 last week, the highest level in nine weeks and up 8,000 from the week before.

Employers generally have been cautious this year, preferring to work existing employees longer hours rather than add to payrolls.

The White House used the numbers to promote President Clinton's deficit-reduction plan, saying it would keep interest rates low and bolster the economy.

"The economy is not performing the way we would want it to," White House spokesman Dee Dee Myers said.

Nevertheless, the most-watched component of income — wages and salaries — rose a strong 1 percent in May to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$3.04 trillion after a 0.4 percent gain in April.

Farm income was down in May. Transfer payments, such as unemployment benefits, increased. Most of the gain came in Social Security checks. Non-farm business owners income rose.

Real disposable income — inflation-adjusted income after taxes — rose 0.4 percent in May after a 0.2 percent drop the month before.

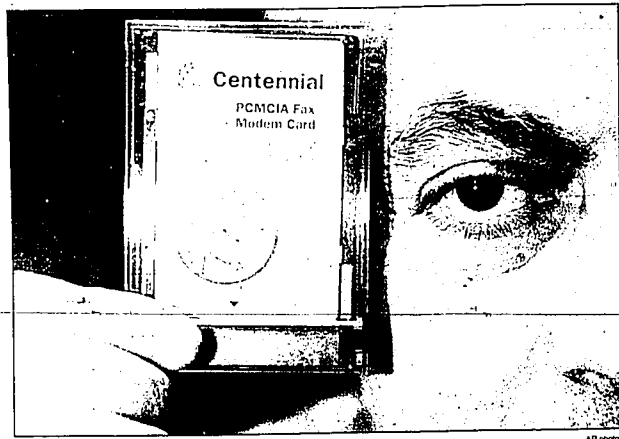

Alphabet soup of computer world has something new

NEW YORK (AP) — People Can't Manage Computer Industry Acronyms.

That's the best way to remember the latest mouthful — PCMCIA — from the folks who gave you DOS, ROM and CAD.

"It is the longest acronym I've ever seen, and it's very hard to say but we're going to have to get used to it because it's going to be big," said Roger Matus, a marketing chief at Digital Equipment Corp.

PCMCIA is an emerging technology for personal computers that lets a user add extra memory, a fax modem or other features without opening the machine.

Instead, the circuitry is embedded on a device about the size of a credit card, except a little thicker. The device fits a slot built into a computer and can be removed at the touch of a button, as with a floppy disk.

"It's much more appealing and it's much more cost effective to just be able to plug something in on the outside of the machine," said David Strom, a computer consultant in Port Washington, N.Y.

Most people "are just not used to getting to the inside of electronics products, and they're very afraid they're going to break something and they often do," said Paul Breedlove, director of technology at CompuAdd Computer Corp.

The technology was first used in laptops and palmtops, where space is a premium. But in the past month, Hewlett-Packard Co. and International Business Machines Corp. have introduced desktop PCs that take PCMCIA cards. And Digital started selling a device that gives existing PCs slots for two PCMCIA cards.

That means, for instance, a person can interchange programs be-

tween a laptop and desktop using a hard drive card that fits in a shirt pocket. "PCMCIA, we think, is fundamental to the industry," said James Turner, general manager of premium systems at IBM PC Co., which put room for four cards in its latest desktop, the PS-2-E.

Motorola Inc. last week announced it had even created a cellular phone modem on one of these cards. The company aims to sell it next year.

But the technology isn't perfect. The cards are more expensive than the circuit boards they replace, for instance. An adapter that lets a PC join a so-called "token ring" network sells in the \$400 range, but the PCMCIA card that does the same thing costs about \$600.

And, despite their billing as a standard that can work on any computer, most PCMCIA cards can't.

Chips good as gold to criminals

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — They are tiny, easily hidden and in demand on the black market.

Computer chips, the fingernail-size silicon wafers that run computers, are being targeted by brazen robbers seeking big bucks, authorities say.

"It's the dope of the '90s. Found for pound, it's more valuable than cocaine," Julius Finklestein, a deputy district attorney in the Santa Clara County's high-tech crimes unit, said Wednesday.

Thousands of dollars worth of chips can be tucked into a pocket. Hundreds of thousands of dollars worth can be carried away in a pickup truck or van.

The robbers have an incentive to steal because many of the chips are in short supply due to high demand, officials say.

The robbers' usual modus operandi is simple: large numbers of armed men invade a site, overwhelm and terrorize employees and disappear with the booty, which is sold for cash to middlemen. Smaller companies have sophisticated security.

So far, officials say, no one has died in any of the attacks, but they fear escalating violence.

One of the latest heists happened Tuesday night in San Jose.

Ten armed men invaded Bestronics, a circuit board assembly plant in San Jose. They used plastic handcuffs to tie up a dozen workers and made off with an undetermined number of computer memory chips.

One Bestronics employee was badly beaten. Others were pulled around by the hair while handcuffed, police said.

Because of production delays, computer microprocessors made by industry leader Intel Corp., based in Santa Clara, are in particularly great demand. The FBI and local police say when such shortages exist, middlemen put out "orders" to steal and organized criminal groups fill the orders.

In January, San Jose police stopped five cars carrying 13 suspects as they allegedly prepared to steal up to \$1 million worth of computer parts from Amdahl Corp. of Sunnyvale, Calif. Several suspects have pleaded guilty.

Two years ago, two small Austin, Texas, chip firms were hit by robbers looking for semiconductor. In one incident, seven masked gunmen broke into Magnum Assembly, pointed guns at 19 employees and forced them to lie on the floor while they sacked the building and made off with the chips.

The biggest known heist occurred in Silicon Valley in 1985. Larry E. Lowery was sentenced to six years in prison for stealing \$3.2 million in computer components from Monolithic Memories Inc.

In one of the most drastic moves recently, KLM Royal Dutch Airlines earlier this month announced it would take out the first class seats on its 747 jets and reduce the number of business class seats to enlarge the coach section.

Business class, which costs more than economy but less than first, typically uses narrower seats than first class and the meals and ser-

vices aren't as plush.

First class is still popular on some routes, particularly overnight flights to world business centers, and airlines are trying to woo travelers with a growing list of amenities. British Airways offers pajamas and a place to shower and freshen up once landing in the morning.

"On long haul 15-hour international flights there's certainly strong demand for first class. It's slightly

less in 1993, but I wouldn't predict what it will be in 1994," said Scott Mowrer, head of U.S. sales for Hong Kong-based Cathay Pacific Airways.

Cathay Pacific is rearranging the interiors of some of its jets to increase business class at the expense of first class. On other flights, the economy section is being expanded while business class seats are removed.

Delayed movie tells POW's tale

A powerful TV movie that's been on the shelf for more than two years finally gets to raise some pointed questions, as ABC belatedly premieres "The Last POW? The Bobby Garwood Story" Monday. Ralph Macchio stars as the former Marine private branded traitor in his 1979 court-martial.

In September 1965, 10 days before completing his tour of duty in Vietnam, Garwood was taken "prisoner." His captivity would last until March 1979—six years after all American prisoners of war had been returned. He was immediately court-martialed on charges of aiding the enemy and simple assault on a fellow prisoner. He was dishonorably discharged without back pay or benefits.

"The boy was guilty of nothing," says producer Ed Gold, who has been trying to get Garwood's story on TV since 1986. "He simply was in a bad place at a bad time."

During Garwood's imprisonment, fellow POW Capt. "Doc" Eisenbaum (Martin Sheen) urges his friend to survive at all costs and even teaches him Vietnamese to improve the odds. Eisenbaum gave him a double-edged sword," Gold says. "He gave him a way to survive and taught him to live off the land, and at the same time, he cursed him by teaching him the language."

The "curses" probably added years to both Garwood's life and his captivity. A natural linguist, in time the young prisoner mastered all 37 dialects of Vietnamese. Such sophisticated knowledge led the Vietnamese to their unmistakable conviction that Garwood was an upper-echelon intelligence agent.

Gold points out that, after years of little or no hope that he would return to America, Garwood became completely assimilated to the Vietnamese culture. "It got to a point where Bobby was dreaming in Vietnamese," he says. "He had no reason to speak English because he had no one to

speak to. When he was first flown back to Camp Lejeune, Bobby had a major problem working his way through to American ways. He was not familiar with knives and forks and spoons."

Gold has been fiercely interested in stories about Vietnam ever since he and "POW" director George Stanford Brown collaborated on the acclaimed HBO series "Vietnam War Stories." When the Garwood project first crossed his desk, however, he dismissed it with "Oh, that's that traitor kid." Then he started looking more closely.

"I realized that what had appeared to be a clear-cut case of collaboration was not that at all," he recalls. "It got clearer and clearer to me that this was a case of railroad. Bobby Garwood was branded a traitor before he even came home, and I thought, 'How could that be?'"

"If the American military truly had believed what Garwood was convicted of, they would have executed him. When he walked out of that courtroom branded a traitor, no one was going to ask for his side of things. It was set up so Bobby would just walk off to oblivion."

The drama, originally projected as a miniseries, ultimately was filmed over less than two months in 1990 in Florida, California and Thailand. ABC scheduled it for the 1991 February sweeps period, then pulled it (with Gold's agreement) when the Gulf War broke out. ABC blamed "litigation about some rights problems" for not rescheduling it before now.

Finally, "The Last POW?" will have a chance to raise its questions about the justice of Garwood's conviction, as well as another issue he and Gold are passionate about.

"Bobby's position is clear," the producer says. "There are still Americans in Vietnam. Forget what you think about me. That's not important. We have to get these guys out."

"The Last POW? The Bobby Garwood Story" airs at 8 p.m. MDT Monday on ABC (KPVI and KKVI).

Hitchcock thriller revisited on FOX

When a fusion reactor core begins to melt down aboard a space-liner in the year 2169, it's extremely bad news for the 2,000 or so passengers on their way back to Earth.

"Think about it. When a spaceship is disabled, it doesn't sink, cabins don't fill with water and sharks don't circle around. Either just sits there while everybody runs out of food, water and air—or it explodes."

We get a little bit of one and a lot of the other in "LifePod," the first big first-run attraction of the Fox network's new weekly "Fox Monday Night at the Movies" series.

Based on "Alfred Hitchcock's 1944 thriller 'Lifeboat'—Hitch even gets a screen credit—"LifePod" neatly extrapolates the John Steinbeck story idea that Hitchcock fashioned into his castaway classic. By taking a similar situation into the 22nd century, "LifePod" manages to retain the claustrophobic atmosphere of the Hitchcock film while giving it a high-tech finish.

In the TV film, the fusion reactor accident occurs on Christmas Eve. As everyone scrambles for the nearest "LifePod," the outer space equivalent of a rubber raft, the giant spacecraft detonates, turning into a miniature sun against the dark backdrop of the galaxy.

Only one lifepod has safely escaped the explosion, housing nine survivors in an awkward-looking craft that "resembles three booster rockets strapped together. With no power to go anywhere on its own, it can only drift and wait for rescuers to spot the one lonely 'orbit marker' they have to signal their whereabouts."

As one pessimistic survivor remarks, "It's like sending out a message in a bottle, only here the ocean is 10 billion light years across."

In the Hitchcock film, the disaster is caused by a German torpedo and the unmistakable villain is a German, played by Walter Slezak, who's fished out of the sea with the other castaways. There's no war in "LifePod," but we soon learn the explosive act of a saboteur, perhaps a rebel from the planet Venus, where the powerful Earthcoops

runs a colony and is universally hated by the colonists. "LifePod" villain isn't so easy to spot, so we spend lots of time guessing who the saboteur might be.

Among the survivors are Lt. Janna Mayvenc (CCH Pounder), who's isolated from the others in the command quarters and can communicate with them only by electronic hookup; Daniel Banks (Robert Loggia), a member of the Earthcoops board who's returning from a fact-finding mission to Venus; Kane (Adam Storke), an escaped prisoner being returned to Earth; Clair (Jessica Teal), a journalist who's taping their ordeal with her mic; Miles Terman (Ron Silver), a former Earthcoops fraud investigator, embittered after being blinded in an accident; Parker (Stan Shaw), a ship-worker who suffers a severe leg injury in the explosion; Rena (Kelli Williams), a med-tech from the Venusian colony; and Q-Three (Ed Gale), a "little person" who has been "modified" with robotic components to work in "tight spaces on board spaceships."

In one of the film's most dramatic scenes, Rena has to amputate Parker's gangrenous leg with the help of Q-Three, who has a buzz-saw attachment for his bionic arm, but without any anesthesia. It's not only the film's most outrageous scene, but also its most important, because Clair's videotape of the

procedure later reveals the identity of the saboteur.

Hitchcock's film was one of those experiments in inventive-camera cinematography that enjoyed so much. His greatest challenge was finding ways to keep his camera busy on a single, confined set—a rubber raft in a studio water tank. The "LifePod" set isn't that small, so the close camera member really became a liability to keeping the action flowing.

Of course, Hitchcock also had another serious challenge: How to work in his usual cameo walk-on appearance without becoming a full-time cast member. He did it by posing for the "before" photo in a large redup aid advertisement in a newspaper one of the characters is reading.

The updated story-line makes good use of the imagination. In one scene, the pod drifts into a sunless orbit and the heavy air-conditioned atmosphere inside the main chamber starts to "snow" with tiny ice flakes that the moisture-craving survivors can gather out of the air and eat like snow cones.

To generate suspense, the new story-line not only keeps us guessing about whom the traitor might be, but also raises the possibility that whoever it is might be killing them off one by one to conserve oxygen and food supplies. It's up to you to make it look accidental.

"LifePod" isn't a big winner in the drama department—there are no standout performances from the ensemble cast—and the characters are pretty much one-dimensional. But it's really nothing more than an action picture with an exotic sci-fi background. On that level, it's entertaining enough.

What is impressive, though, is that Fox finally is serious about competing in the Monday night movie wars against NBC and ABC, clearly attempting to carve out its own territory with movies aimed at young, urban viewers. Since ABC and NBC never do sci-fi films, "LifePod" amounts to an auspicious start for Fox.

"LifePod" will air at 7 p.m. MDT Monday on FOX (KTRV).

Cosby won't air if he seeks to buy NBC

The story led NBC to reiterate GE Chairman Jack Welch's recent comments that the network "is not for sale."

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TBS airs 7 'Little House' stories

"Little House on the Prairie" was not a big favorite of the critics. Critical TV viewers thought it was cloying, hokey and sentimental. But "Little House," which was based on the classic Laura Ingalls Wilder books, struck a chord with viewers.

This week, TBS presents seven special two-hour episodes of "Little House."

One of the reasons "Little House on the Prairie," which aired from 1974 to '83 on NBC, became a hit can be traced to the charm and appeal of its star and executive producer, the late Michael Landon. "Little House" was Landon's first series after his 14-year stint as Little Joe Cartwright on "Bonanza."

Richard Bull played Neils Olsson, the owner of the general store, and Victor French was Mr. Edwards, a nearby farmer who, despite a gruff exterior, had a heart of gold.

The series went through numerous changes in 1977. Daughter Mary lost her eyesight and went to a school for the blind where she fell in love with her instructor Adam Kendall (Linwood Boomer).

Walnut Grove also went into an economic depression, forcing Charles to move his family to the budding frontier city of Winoka where they adopted a young orphan Albert (Matthew Labortaux). But city life didn't sit well with the family and they moved back to Walnut Grove, which had recovered from its depression. In the fall of 1980, Laura became a teacher and married Almanzo Wilder (Dean Butler).

When Landon decided to leave the series in 1982, the title was changed to

"Little House: A New Beginning." The series, though, couldn't survive without Landon.

Rather sore over Vietnam

NEW YORK — "There's a saying among the Indians," muses CBS anchor Dan Rather. "From time to time, you have to sit up on your horse and look back at the trails you've traveled."

Rather, just back with retired Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, from his first visit to Vietnam since 1974, looks back at some painful trails in "Schwarzkopf in Vietnam: A Soldier Returns," "Soldier," set for 9 p.m. MDT Wednesday, marks the return of the once-wanted documentary series "CBS Reports."

Both Schwarzkopf and Rather served tours of duty in Vietnam: Schwarzkopf as an adviser to the South Vietnamese army and as a U.S. battalion commander. Rather as a war correspondent from the battle zones.

Reflecting on the unpopular war, Rather's strongest emotion, he says, is outrage. Outrage at the hypocrisy of those government officials who made speeches sup-

porting the war but privately did not believe in the cause.

"My sense of outrage is much greater now than it was, because I now know things that neither I nor almost anybody else knew at the time," says the 61-year-old former Marine. "Some of those officials did not believe in the war; but they kept telling Americans they did."

"How dare they send young men and women there to die and have their legs blown off and be blinded. Four or five years after the war, in the late '70s, one very high leader called the war a 'dustbin' in my presence. It made me shudder at the time."

During the war, Rather, who served in the Korean War but didn't see combat, "bought the official U.S. line, red, white and blue. I didn't believe that officials were being hypocritical at the time, because perhaps I didn't want to believe it at the time."

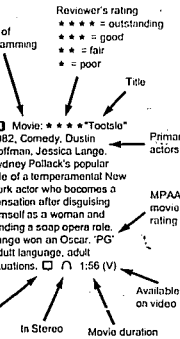
What haunts Rather to this day, he says, is that no American official "can answer the questions, 'Why?' 'To what end?'"

A. "Love of Life" ran on CBS, 1951-1980. Audrey Peters, who played the main character, Vanessa Dale, for 21 years, could be called the star, but like most soaps, there were many other major characters. Among the show's alumni who went on to greater fame is Christopher Reeve, better known as Superman.

Q. I'm at my wit's end. Please tell why the actress who played Blake on "The Guiding Light" has been replaced by the current Blake. One of my senior citizens friends told me the original Blake died. — M.V.W., Huntersville, N.C.

A. Your friend is wrong. There are two ex-Blakes out there. Elizabeth Dennehy, who was Blake 1988-89, left for the greener fields

of prime time; and Sherry Stringfield, Blake '89-'92, decided not to renew her contract. Elizabeth Keifer, veteran of "General Hospital" and "One Life to Live," took over.

Q. Is the actress who plays Stephanie Forrester on "The Bold and the Beautiful" the same actress who was Eve Howard on "The Young and the Restless"? My girlfriend doesn't agree with me that she is. — B.F.D., N.Y.

A. She isn't. Susan Flannery has played Stephanie on "B and B" since the soap started in 1987. Before that, 1966-75, she was Dr. Diana Horton on "Days of Our Lives." (She took the intervening years off.) Margaret Mason played Howard, 1980-84. By coincidence, she was on "DOOL" as Linda Anderson at the same time Flannery was on the show.

FOX airs newsmagazine

They all say they're going to be different, but like the makers of New Coke, newsmagazine producers often learn the hard way that, even if they are, different doesn't always work. So it is. The newsmagazines now all over the dial have mostly reverted to traditional formats.

Now, this Saturday comes the latest newsmagazine with a "different" promise. Fox's "Front Page" (8 p.m. MDT on KTRV). It's the first such effort from Fox, which hasn't been in the news game seriously until now. Promises aside, "Front Page" adopts something close to the traditional format, although it does have an MTV-like feel, doesn't rely on a sole anchor, and the story selection is somewhat irreverent. As executive producer David Corvo explained, the show's "altitude" is "distinctive."

Great. But how far will this difference take them?

"Different will last as long as it's better," Corvo said Tuesday. "It's got to be good. It's got to be appealing."

Said Van Gordon Sauter, president of Fox News: "The death

knell of the show would be reverting to the tone of the existing stories."

They, all on "Front Page" are reported by Andrea Hall, Tony Harris, Josh Mankiewicz, Vicki Liviak and former first son and ABC correspondent Ron Reagan. The first outing includes a look at teen-agers and plastic surgery, a segment on a crooked investment deal win ties to some of Hollywood's biggest names and a piece on one man's battle with an endangered snail. Each show will have three main stories, and several short essays from the likes of New York Daily News columnist Mike Lupine, San Francisco Examiner columnist Chris Matthews, syndicated columnist Joe Bob Briggs and Spy editor Lisa Birnbach.

Fox is spending about \$500,000 on each show, and has committed to produce 40 original episodes over the next year. Its budget is somewhere in the middle of the current crop of network newsmagazines.

Fox hopes that in addition to additional new-viewers (that is, children), "Front Page" will attract some of the "Beverly Hills, 90210" set as well.

But it's not all going to be fun and games.

Q. Jan's Raquel Welch dating a man of dubious reputation, who is much younger than she?—M.R.
A. Raquel has been married three times. When she was 28, and hitting her stride as a Hollywood sex symbol, she split from her first husband, James Welch, a high school sweetheart. Husband No. 2 was Patrick Curtis, a former press agent who became her manager. Her last husband was Andre Weinfeld, a French-born writer and producer who came to be known as that homey guy Raquel was hitched to. Now free and single at 52, Raquel is seeing a man she wouldn't discuss — a costume designer in Hollywood.

Q. With Ted Danson and Whoopi Goldberg's romance garnering all the headlines, I can't help but wonder how Mrs. Danson is getting along and what she's up to?—D.S.

A. Casey Coates Danson, who is now officially separated from the "Cheers" star after a 15-year

marriage, has in recent years occupied herself as an interior designer. She has, in fact, just completed a rather unique project, that of an environmentally designed home. It features a solar-heated pool and hot water system, solar-driven electrical system, fan-cooled bedrooms, earth-cooled wine cellar and drought-resistant garden. The 7800-square-foot, five-bedroom house just went on the market for \$4.5 million. Whether the home sells immediately or not, Casey should have no financial worries as Danson's salary was reported to have been \$450,000 per episode of "Cheers" in the last few years of the show's 11-year run.

Q. Most movies have a traditional "wrap party" to celebrate the finishing of filming. But it seems Steven Spielberg didn't throw one for "Jurassic Park." He reportedly did something different. Any idea what he did?—G.F.

A. Instead of the usual "wrap party," Spielberg donated \$25,000 to the Dinosaur Society, which named one of the oldest-known dinosaur species in his honor — using letters from the names of the cast. The result? Here goes Jurassicosaurus mudegonpeterkinum. However, I hear some of the cast members did not love the idea and would have rather had a party. Q. Do fans visit Marilyn Mon-

roe's grave site the way they've done for old-time star Rudolph Valentino?—S.B.

A. They sure do. On what would have been her 67th birthday, hundreds of fans from around the world visited the Westwood, Calif. Memorial Park burial vault of Marilyn Monroe, most of them bringing flowers. One collector of Monroe memorabilia came from Australia to commemorate the occasion.

THERE'S THE RUB: In the race to have "Last Action Hero" ready for its release date, editors and others worked around the clock. So intense was the post-production schedule, Columbia Pictures hired a massage for the overworked producers, editors and technicians.

Q. Were low ratings the reason for the "Knots Landing" cancellation?—K.F.

A: According to the show's producers, ratings were the least significant factor leading to the show's end. The high price of producing one-hour dramas actually caused the death knell after 14 seasons. At its peak, "Knots" was said to have cost about \$1.5 million per episode. Five cast members were each earning \$80,000 per show. It's unlikely we'll again see one-hour dramatic shows with large ensemble casts, given the now-limited opportunity for future syndication income.

'Exposure' on home video

That quirky, fish-out-of-water television show, "Northern Exposure," which has captured the hearts of viewers and critics as well as a mantle full of awards since its debut in 1990, will be available on home video this week.

Five episodes selected and recommended as favorites of critics/producers Joshua Brand and John Falsey are being released by MCA/Universal Home Video on Wednesday at \$14.95 each.

The show that didn't follow the usual glitzy, urban story line has garnered 19 Emmy nominations

and won six, including one for best drama series.

The more it strayed from television's beaten path, the more it was honored with trophies such as the Golden Globe Award and Electronic Media Critics Poll for best series, the Peabody Award, The Television Critics Association Award for program of the year, and, annually since its first season, a Viewers for Quality Television Award.

The warmth and humor of these characters thrown together in the fictional Alaskan town of Cicely grabbed viewers from the outset and never faded as the series became a centerpiece of CBS's Monday-night power package.

Buttafuoco to joke with Clay?

NEW YORK (AP)—It could be the politically incorrect lineup of all time: Andrew Dice Clay and, on the same stage, for one night only, Joey Buttafuoco. Clay says it's going to happen, but Buttafuoco's lawyer denies it. The bad boy of comedy said he will share the bill with Buttafuoco on July 10 on Clay's pay-per-view TV special, "Andrew Dice Clay: No Apologies!"

Buttafuoco, a fellow Long Islander, will tell a few jokes and then introduce the headliner on their home turf at the Westbury Music Fair, Clay said.

However, Buttafuoco's attorney, Marvin Komberg, said this morning that there was no contract and his client would not appear.

"They called and asked, but he never agreed, and he never signed an agreement," Komberg said. "It appears Andrew Dice Clay needs Joe more than Joe needs Andrew Dice Clay."

Buttafuoco, 37, is charged with statutory rape for allegedly having an affair with an underage Amy Fisher. Fisher, now 18, is serving a five-to-15-year prison sentence for shooting Buttafuoco's wife.

A publicist for the pay per view show insisted this morning that there was a signed deal. But she declined to give her name for the record.

On Tuesday, Clay had said: "It's for fun. It's not like I'm putting him on the witness stand. He's very psych'd for it."

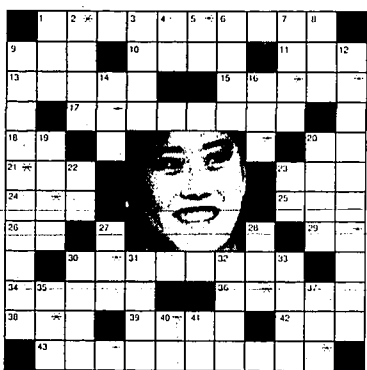

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Nicklaus makes strong broadcast showing at U.S. Open

Even before Lee Janzen made his Bobby Jones, Walter Hagen, Ben Hogan and Billy Stevenson in the stretch run of the U.S. Open yesterday, ABC had itself a tap-in birdie.

Oh, thank you, Jack Nicklaus, for being sufficiently down the scoring list after Round 3 Saturday that "you played early and could join the legion of voices on the telecast.

Usually, Nicklaus has a tendency to get caught up in technical jargon and comes across as a teaching pro giving a lesson. Almost as soon as he had cleaned up and climbed into his commentary chair this time, however, he was there with the goods on the Janzen-Payne Stewart showdown.

One by one he laid down the clichés being thrust his way by his fellow golf-playing analysts, of all people. It was late in the telecast and after Janzen had pushed his nose in front by the slimmest of margins, Jack offered, "I know how they both feel in this situation," before offering true insight into situation after situation.

Nicklaus, recall, besides winning more tournaments than any man save for Sam Snead, holds the all-time record for finishing second — something like five dozen times.

Of course, he and all his colleagues had lots to work with, considering the protagonists in this afternoon-long drama were matched against each other as the last two some in the tournaments and no other player ever got up to pose a serious threat.

When someone spoke of the pressure being applied to the 28-year-old victor Janzen by the veteran Stewart, a winner of the Open two years ago, Nicklaus answered, "I don't see that as being a problem for Lee."

He pointed out that the venerable Baltusrol layout was long and required a lot of patience to play successfully, "and that's the kind of course that Janzen will play well on."

It was pointed out that Janzen had fallen victim to the 36-hole cut in three previous Open appearances, "I don't pay any attention to that," Nicklaus said. "It has nothing to do with the way he's playing now."

In the player's case, that began when he showed up for his first practice round last Monday, coming off a third-place finish in the previous tour stop.

This second stop on the Grand Slam tour, if you think about it, actually glories in its failures as much as its successes.

For instance, until Janzen rapped in a 10-foot birdie putt on the home hole to tie Nicklaus' Open scoring record at 272, the 1993 tournament run the risk of being remembered as the one where defending champion Tom Kite and such notables as Greg Norman, Mark O'Meara, Bernhard Langer, Seve Ballesteros and a host of other name golfers

weren't even invited to play on the weekend.

And who will soon forget a man tied for the lead on opening day, Joey Sindelar, tacking a 79 onto his 66 and being required to clean out his locker? As Jim McKay always

says, it's the stuff these major championships are made of.

Sure, throughout the 24 hours of coverage provided by ESPN and ABC, perhaps McKay and essayist Jack Whitaker leaned a bit too heavily on history and tradition. By noon Saturday, you half-expected a twosome of Gene Sarazen and Ralph Guldahl to stride up to the first tee followed by Craig Wood and Ed Furgol.

But so what? Fully as much as baseball, golf is a game that is strongly enhanced, not to mention comfortable, leaning on its past.

It was shortly after Nicklaus had paid tribute to Janzen, saying, "It's nice to see a nice young man win," that Lee said his closing birdie to tie the record was a fluke. He admitted, "I couldn't have hit it there (on the green) if I tried to."

At the same time, Jack gave the

vanquished Stewart his due, remembering, "Payne has had a bitter pill to swallow two of the last three weeks and he's handling it well."

It was in Nicklaus' own Memorial Tournament three weeks ago when sure-winner Stewart, victory-less for two years now, was overtaken when Paul Azinger holed out from a sand trap on the last hole.
