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# State works to expand waste storage at INEL

**TWIN FALLS**— Even as state leaders are cheering a federal court order against nuclear waste shipments to Idaho, a state agency is proposing permits for increased handling and storage of that waste.

The Division of Environmental Quality has proposed issuing a permit to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to increase the capacity of a waste storage facility.

In addition, Twin Falls podiatrist Dr. Peter Rickards has appealed another state permit allowing expansion of a facility that handles spent reactor fuel.

The U.S. government wants to increase spent fuel shipments, but Gov. Cecil Andrus and other officials have said they oppose INEL becoming the nation's radioactive waste dump.

that details spent fuel storage problems in one aging storage building at INEL. Those problems could result in an accidental nuclear reaction or other radioactive releases, Rickards said.

The proposed change in spent fuel storage racks would increase the capacity of the facility, which "cannot accommodate ... fuel receipts expected in the next several years," said a DEQ news release.

Andrus could not be reached for comment Friday.

The Navy has said it expects spent fuel shipment to increase over the next 10 years.

But those shipments were suspended by a federal court injunction earlier this week.

A federal judge Monday ruled that the Energy Department must halt all shipments of nuclear waste bound for storage at the INEL until an environmental review of site

# U.S. will detain cleric

**WASHINGTON**— The Justice Department has decided to take into custody the radical Islamic cleric whose followers have been charged in a terrorist conspiracy and the World Trade Center bombing, federal law enforcement sources said Thursday night.

The sources said the department has decided to take the action by revoking the immigration parole status of Sheik Omar Abdel-Rahman.

The sheik wasn't being charged in the alleged bombing and assassination conspiracy that was broken up a week ago.

Abdel-Rahman

Abdel-Rahman, 55, was ordered deported in March for gaining admission to the United States on false pretenses. Although he is appealing the order, Immigration and Naturalization Service officials have said the sheik could be detained at any time for posing a threat to society.

CBS News and ABC News first reported the Justice Department decision.

In Jersey City, N.J., a building superintendent refused to let reporters inside the five-story apartment building where Abdel-Rahman lives, and it wasn't known if he was there.

Meanwhile, a prosecutor said that the plotters arrested a week ago had considered planting a bomb on the George Washington Bridge.

The bridge linking Upper Manhattan with Fort Lee, N.J., was discussed as a possible target of the terrorist plot during a meeting between two suspects and a confidential informant, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Robert Khuzami.

Portions of the secretly taped conversation were disclosed Thursday at a court hearing in Manhattan federal court for defendant Mohammed Saleh.

# Drivers get bucks for buckling up

**TWIN FALLS**— Ten unsuspecting motorists were stopped by a police officer Thursday afternoon and given \$10 just for wearing their seat belts.

The \$10 was part of the "Buckle Up for Safety and Bucks" campaign aimed at increasing awareness of safety belts.

"What a deal!" said Mary DeTienne of Twin Falls after being told she was the first person to receive a check and a "buckle up" T-shirt at the corner of Main Avenue and Third Street South.

DeTienne said she was in an accident last year, but was saved from serious injury by her safety belt. She added that she wants to provide a good example to her children by wearing the belt.

—Gabriel Gardner was pulled over while

driving a borrowed car. Her own set of wheels was in the repair shop as a result of a recent accident, Gardner said it was the second accident she has been involved in that could have injured her had she not worn her safety belt.

This is the third year of the safety campaign, which was started by Dr. Spencer Williams of Twin Falls. Williams and his assistants, along with a city police officer, target five major holiday periods each year to give out the checks and T-shirts.

They pick a street corner and randomly stop drivers who are wearing seat belts.

It took only a few minutes to find 10 buckled-up drivers, an indication of the impact local seat belt campaigns have had in recent years.

According to the Department of Transportation, only about 28 percent of Twin

Falls drivers wore their seat belts until 1990, when local police and other safety-belt supporters began pushing the issue.

Since then, Twin Falls became the first city in the state to reach 70 percent seat belt use. That prompted a visit from Gov. Cecil Andrus in July. Andrus presented the city with an award from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and a City Challenge Award for sustaining that high level of seat belt use.

Under an Idaho law enacted in 1986, drivers stopped for speeding or some other offense can be given an additional \$5 citation for not wearing their seat belts.

One of Thursday's winners, Debbie Brown of Twin Falls, said obeying the law isn't the main reason she wears her seat belt.

"It could save my life someday," she said.

# Loggers, ecologists assail Clinton plan

**WASHINGTON**— President Clinton unveiled a \$1.2 billion plan Thursday to limit logging in the Pacific Northwest that he vowed would "break the logjam" over timber harvests.

Instead, he unleashed a torrent of angry recriminations from both environmentalists and logging interests throughout Washington, Oregon and California.

"The debate over protecting the ancient habitat of the spotted owl has been 'a drama that has paralyzed the Pacific Northwest for too long," Clinton said Thursday. "The main virtue of our plan, besides being fair and balanced, is that we attempt to answer the

questions and let people get on with their lives."

Clinton said Thursday his initiative would cap timber-harvest for the next decade but provide an extensive jobs program to retrain more than 16,000 displaced loggers and put another 15,000 to work.

"It is clear that the Pacific Northwest requires both a healthy economy and a healthy environment, and that one cannot exist without the other," he said.

Development of the plan has provided the first major test of President Clinton's skill in reconciling his commitment to expanding American jobs with his vow to protect the environment. While

# Island celebrates independence

**LONG ISLAND**, Maine— Independence Day arrived three days early on this Casco Bay island, where residents who had complained about taxation without adequate representation severed 200-year-old ties to the city of Portland.

The new Town of Long Island celebrated its independence and the prospects of lower taxes, with screaming jets from the National Guard, an old-fashioned cookout and plenty of back-slapping.

"This is the Boston Tea Party all over again," said Cmdr. Jim O'Keefe, the Navy's chief recruiting officer for New England, who was cheered as he addressed a crowd outside the newly named Town Hall.

A rebellion in this fishing community of 165 year-round residents was driven by taxes that doubled, tripled, even quadrupled after a property revaluation by the city of Portland.

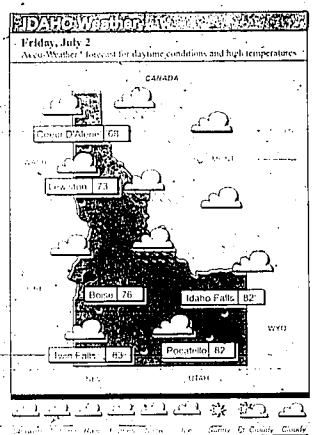
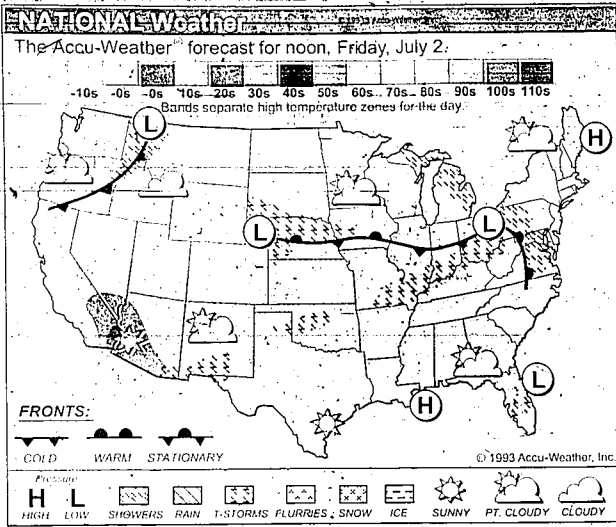
Islanders, who voted by 340-1 in November to secede, feared that higher taxes would change their lifestyle.

### Thunderstorms, tornadoes range from Plains to East Coast

A tornado destroyed a home in Indiana on Thursday as thunderstorms were scattered from the Plains to the East Coast.

Tornado watches were posted for parts of Indiana, Kentucky and Ohio, and a severe thunderstorm watch was posted for parts of Florida, the National Weather Service said.

At midday, showers and thunderstorms were scattered over the Plains, the upper Mississippi Valley, the Ohio Valley and the middle and southern Atlantic Coast.

Thunderstorms dropped more than 2 inches of rain on the Big Bend region of Texas early in the morning.

Strong to severe thunderstorms developed across parts of the lower Ohio Valley during the afternoon.

# Law office gunfire kills 8, wounds 6

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A gunman opened fire in a law firm on the 34th floor of a high-rise in the financial district Thursday, fatally shooting eight people before killing himself, authorities said.

At least six were wounded.

The gunman apparently shot himself to death as police searched the building closed in, said police spokesman Dave Ambrose.

Police continued combing the halls and offices of the 48-story glass tower for a possible second gunman after a 911 call reporting a hostage on the 32nd floor.

Seven people were found dead inside the building, including the gunman, San Francisco Mayor Frank Jordan said at a news conference. Two others died at San Francisco General Hospital.

The gunman took his own life in a stairwell between the 33rd and 34th floors, Jordan said.

"At this point, we think the individual we have known someone, I think he was going after someone on the 34th floor at the Pettit & Martin law firm," Jordan said.

Jordan said authorities didn't have a motive yet but believed the shooting spree was "prearranged."

### Weaver jury breaks record

BOISE (AP) — Jurors started early and worked fast on their verdict on the 14th day of deliberations in the murder-conspiracy trial of white separatist Randy Weaver and Kevin Harris, but they again adjourned Thursday evening without a verdict.

After yet another 10-hour day, the eight women and four men have put 120 hours of jury time in Boise's federal building.

"I expected them out today. I'll expect them out tomorrow. I'll expect them out every day," defense attorney Gerry Spence said. "But we'll just have to wait."

The longest deliberations in Idaho prior to Thursday had been 13 days in a 1976 civil case involving an airplane crash.

Weaver, 35, and Harris, 25, are charged with the first-degree murder of Deputy U.S. Marshal William Deagan during an Aug. 21 shootout at Weaver's northern Idaho cabin.

Highlights of President Clinton's Northwest forest protection plan:

- Allows for logging of about 12 billion board feet of timber over 10 years, or about 1.2 billion annually on the federal lands in the region that produced more than 4 billion a year during the 1980s.
- Establishes protective reserves for the threatened northern spotted owl in roadways that permit limited logging of dead and dying trees and thinning of some live trees, but only where that poses no threat to the bird.
- Sets up special management areas where experimental-harvesting techniques would be used.

the plan demanded compromise from both environmentalists and the powerful timber industry, most analysts agreed that loggers, who will lose 6,000 jobs beyond the thousands already lost, suffered what one labor representative called "the fuzziest end of the lollipop."

But in a move that has appeared briefly to the feuding interests, Clinton signed a separate bill that would block the export of raw logs harvested from U.S. federal lands.

In Washington state alone, with the largest share of the region's public-lands timber harvest, some 6,000 jobs depend on the portion of the milling and wood products industry that would be lost if such logs were shipped abroad, as most were before 1990.

In Congress, disgruntled lawmakers signaled they might fight Clinton's plan with legislation that would both raise limits on tree-cutting and thwart future environmental lawsuits by exempting the harvests

from existing laws. Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., said the plan "looks like an economic development plan for lawyers."

And an American Forest and Paper Association vice president Mark Rey, calling the plan "one of the most litigation-prone exercises that I have ever encountered," vowed to sue on at least 10 separate counts to block the plan from taking effect.

"As an industry, we were trying to work with the administration and sue for peace," Rey said "but it is unfortunate, now we're just going to have to sue."

The administration said it would submit a detailed version of its plan to the U.S. District Judge William Dwyer of Seattle, who had given the Forest Service until July 16 to complete a draft environmental impact statement. Dwyer, concluding that the government had been overharvesting the trees on public lands illegally, issued a ban on the sale of such timber in March 1991. He ordered the ban to remain in effect un-

operations is completed.

The Navy said in a Thursday news release it is discussing whether to appeal the decision with the U.S. Department of Justice.

The court's ruling will have "significant impact" on the operation of the Navy's nuclear-powered fleet and the shipyards that support those ships.

Since 1957 the Navy has sent all spent fuel from its reactors to INEL for processing and storage.

Until April 1992, the department reprocessed the spent fuel to recover valuable enriched uranium. It now is stored indefinitely in water-filled basins at INEL.

Adm. Bruce DeMars, head of the Navy's Nuclear Propulsion Program, said he was surprised by the ruling, considering the Navy's success in "meeting our responsibilities

in matters of protecting the environment and the public."

The Navy, however, has steadfastly refused to inform the state or local communities when the radioactive shipments pass through.

But the court ruling will hold up delivery of old ships and retiring of ships heading back to sea.

"This is a most serious matter," he said. About 50 submarines and surface ships are scheduled to have their reactor fuel removed, pending decommissioning, during the next two to four years.

The Navy also has scheduled "critical refuelings" to get submarines back to sea. DeMars said the fleet refuelings will mean job losses at the Navy facility at INEL as well as at shipyards around the country, he said. And the disruption would last long after the injunction is lifted, well into the next century, DeMars said.

But the Navy is working closely with the Energy Department to fully include the Naval Reactor Facility operations into the court-ordered environmental impact statement, he said.

The statement will include alternatives to shipping spent fuel to INEL, he said.

Meanwhile the Navy has stopped work on a \$40 million facility upgrade at INEL.

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# Clinton accepts base closing panel's report

WASHINGTON (AP)— President Clinton, pitching a political hot potato to Congress, has accepted a commission's plan to close or scale back dozens of military bases, aides said Thursday.

Separately, the Pentagon announced shutdowns or reductions at 92 U.S. installations overseas.

Clinton is scheduled to announce the decision on the domestic bases today, when he also will outline plans to create jobs for communities hard hit by the closings, said the

aides, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The panel's report recommends closing 129 bases and realigning 16. Among the major facilities targeted for closure are the giant Charleston, S.C., naval shipyard and the Mare Island naval shipyard in Vallejo, Calif.

Congress, under a law designed to prevent wheeling and dealing by members in behalf of local bases, has the power to reject the plan in its entirety, but it cannot amend it. Cling-

ton's options were similarly limited.

Members of Congress "will be permitted to vent their frustration, some will pound their chest in outrage, but I'm 100 percent convinced that when the leaves fall off the trees in the fall, that Congress will overwhelmingly accept this package," commission chairman James Courter said Thursday.

He had this advice for Clinton: "I had this advice for Clinton that the president get it off his desk very quickly, because if it languishes there, he will be subjecting himself to the same unpleasant pressure that the commission felt." Clinton was doing just that, having decided to accept the list even before it officially arrived at the White House from the commission, the aides said.

The commission only deals with domestic base closings. In a separate announcement, Secretary of Defense Les Aspin said the 92 overseas closings involve 13 major installations, including Ft. Belvoir Air Base in Germany. The total number of U.S. military sites overseas has been reduced by about 50 percent since 1990.

The Pentagon said the overseas closings are guided by Clinton's decision to reduce U.S. forces in Europe to 100,000 by September 1996 rather than the 150,000 planned under the Bush administration.

The closings and realignments are part of the U.S. effort to reap a

"peace dividend" after the end of the Cold War. Closing domestic bases would be costly at first, but would save about \$2.3 billion a year after 2000, the commission says.

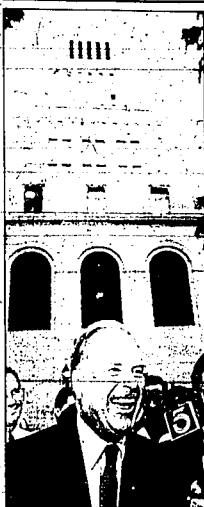
The transition could throw thousands of Americans out of work, rattling U.S. communities from coast to coast and force defense-based industries to find civilian uses for their technology.

Clinton has already announced plans to triple defense conversion spending in the U.S. to \$5.2 billion by 1997, with about \$20 billion

spent on the effort in the next five years. The program is aimed at easing the economic and political fallout from base closings.

And the process is far from over. Courter said the 1995 reauthorization will have an even more difficult assignment than this one, because as the easy choices are gone and more bases still will have to be closed.

After Clinton sends the list to Congress, lawmakers have 45 working days to kill the plan. With the pressure on to cut spending, it isn't likely to do so.

## LA mayor requests healing

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Richard Riordan, the Republican-millionaire voters turned to for leadership amid recession, budget slashing and ethnic tension, was inaugurated Thursday as the city's first new mayor in 20 years.

"My fellow Angelenos, the time has come for all of you to take part in the healing of our great city," Riordan said after taking the oath of office before a crowd of officials and supporters on the City Hall lawn.

Riordan pledged an administration that will seek to unify the city's diverse 3.5 million residents, make its streets safer and be friendly to business.

"I will work closely with President Clinton, Gov. (Pete) Wilson and the City Council to turn our city around. But in the end it will be you that will turn L.A. around," he said.

With the Rodney King beating, the 1992 riots and its frayed ethnic relations all in recent memory, Riordan said the city was under a spotlight.

"The nation looks to us today," he said. "This is a challenge, an opportunity, to show that all of us, of every race, gender and religion, can strive together to make a better Los Angeles."

Riordan, elected on the strength of his appeal to white voters, reached out to other groups that opposed him in the election or simply didn't vote.

He also mentioned the homeless, people with AIDS and teachers as being important to him.

"I will be a mayor for the whole city," said Riordan, 63, a lawyer, venture capitalist and philanthropist whose fortune is estimated at \$100 million.

Riordan succeeds Tom Bradley, the city's first black mayor, who did not seek re-election.

## Lawmakers tout TV violence blackout bit

WASHINGTON (AP)— Parental advisories on violent TV programs won't do much good if parents aren't home to change the channels, lawmakers said Thursday.

They want a blocking device in each TV set.

But network executives, who a day earlier announced they'd warn parents and TV publications in advance of potentially disturbing programs, said Congress shouldn't insist on that technology yet.

The public should first be given the chance to determine whether the advisories will suffice, the executives told a hearing of the House Energy and Commerce telecommunications subcommittee.

The proposed "V-block" is nonetheless an idea gaining popularity among congressmen who think the advisories are a weak solution to a big problem.

It would enable viewers to stop any show electronically coded as violent from appearing on the TV screen, through a fairly simple home programming system.

All new TVs already are equipped with the technology because it is included on the computer chip that must be inserted to decode captioning

for the hearing impaired.

To activate it for violence, however, the networks would have to electronically code their shows.

The executives from ABC, CBS, NBC, Fox and the motion picture industry all planned the plan.

"We are concerned about being crowded by additional government control," said Thomas Murphy, chairman of Capitol Cities-ABC Inc.

There is bad violence and good violence, said Warren Littlefield, NBC president of entertainment.

Bad violence is gratuitous or glamorized, he said, adding "We will eliminate it from our airwaves." In shows with good violence, "we take on socially relevant issues, like incest, date rape, the dangers of amoral cult leaders," he said.

Littlefield said parents should make individual judgments about these shows, as noted in the voluntary warnings coming this fall. "Due to some violent content, parental discretion advised."

A "V" block would be a blanket shut-off of many shows that carry socially important messages simply because they contain some violence, the executives said.

## 6 suspects held in gang rape, slaying of teen-agers

HOUSTON (AP) — Jennifer Ertman and Elizabeth Pena were trying to take a shortcut home on a summer night after an evening of fun at a friend's pool.

When the girls crossed paths with a group of catcalling drunken young men, they kept silent and walked on. By the time they may have realized the group was involved in a gang initiation, there was no escape.

The two were gang-raped and strangled, authorities said.

"They walked right by these guys, they were in arm's reach," Police Lt. John Silva said. "They just wanted to get out of there as fast as they could."

According to preliminary investigation, Miss Pena, 16, and her 14-year-old friend were pulled into the woods where they were slain on the night of June 24.

Within 24 hours, six teen-age suspects, including one 14-year-old classified as a juvenile, were arrested and charged with capital murder.

Held without bond are Peter Anthony Cantu, 18, considered by police as the ringleader; Derrick Sean O'Brien, 18; Brian Perez, 17; Neal Omar Gilbarret, 17, and Jose Ernesto Medeljin, 18. The 14-year-old is also being held.

Police said the youths were members of a fledgling gang calling itself Black N White. They were drinking, celebrating the initiation of two new members, authorities said.

They bragged about the slayings in jail, according to authorities. When they showed up in court Wednesday, their jail jumpsuits were scribbled with derogatory comments in red marker.

## What's left of jobs bill goes to president

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vacation-bound lawmakers began moving the shrunken remnants of President Clinton's jobs bill through Congress Thursday, 10 weeks after Senate Republicans killed what once was one of his chief economic priorities.

The House approved the measure by a mostly party-line 280-138 vote as lawmakers rushed through a final day in the Capitol before their 11-day July Fourth break. Senate passage was likely later in the day.

The legislation was considered a day before the government was due to release June unemployment figures.

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# World Yeltsin: Clinton OKs ban

MOSCOW (AP) — Boris Yeltsin, the long-day head and President Clinton agreed to push for a global ban on nuclear warheads tests and de-activated Russia would not be the first to renounce another atomic weapon.

The agreement came a day after Yeltsin's long-term plan to resume testing nuclear warheads. The reliability and safety of warheads, Clinton said he would announce his decision in a few days.

Both Russia and the United States have been observing "their own moratoriums on tests since last year. France, Britain and China, the other nuclear powers also have halted tests.

"Our goal is to bring the moratorium on nuclear tests to a new level, which would include not only nuclear tests, but also nuclear warheads," the Russian president was quoted as saying by the Interfax news agency.

Russia's seven-month moratorium formally expired Thursday as did a U.S. moratorium. Moscow declared its ban after the United States and other major nuclear powers acted, although the formal moratorium agreement had expired.

"What's very important now is not to begin a new moratorium, but to keep this one so that no single nuclear state will start testing," Yeltsin told reporters. "Then we will see whether anybody else starts testing."

Clinton said his government would approve an extension of Moscow's test ban Friday.

He and the question of an international ban then would be raised when the leaders of the Group of Seven industrial nations meet next week in Tokyo.

Clinton's decision was first telephoned to President Clinton, Yeltsin said at an impromptu airport news conference, Interfax reported.

There was no immediate comment from the White House.

The Soviet Union had long pushed for a global test ban, but U.S. and Soviet leaders never succeeded in reaching such an agreement.

Former Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev announced a unilateral moratorium on testing in October 1991.

**Serbs, Croats join to apply more pressure**

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Bosnian Serbs and Croats started demanding hefty tolls from U.N. relief convoys and pounded Muslim facilities Thursday, causing mounting confusion as the former Yugoslavia's pressure for a settlement on their terms.

The demands that U.N. trucks feeding much of the Muslim population pay for use of roads running through Croat and Serb territory were made separately, but U.N. officials said they clearly were issued after mutual consultations.

Serbs-Croat battlefield cooperation also grew Thursday. U.N. officials described instances of troops from both groups riding in the same vehicles as they moved toward government-held towns and villages in central Bosnia.

Serb tanks also appeared to be moving unimpeded through Bosnian-Croat territory, again toward positions held by government troops.

The road toll demands appeared intended to further complicate the United Nations' role in Bosnia and to pressure the beleaguered Bosnian government to accept the Serb-Croat plan, which it has steadfastly rejected.

**Judge in India puts hold on 'killer buses'**

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — A judge has taken action to tame a fleet of buses blamed for terrifying motorists and killing 58 people in the capital.

The magistrate on the New Delhi High Court ordered the city's 3,000 Red Line buses on Wednesday to install equipment that would limit the maximum speed to 25 mph, reduce their pollution and force drivers to wear uniforms.

A lawyer petitioned the court after the buses were involved in hundreds of accidents in the last seven months.

The bus service was introduced in December to ease congestion in this city of 9 million people.

# Refugees try to evade clampdown

BONN (Germany AP) — Drawing the currents of the Oder River and taking to foot scores of refugees sought to evade a new clampdown on asylum-seekers Thursday but were captured at the border and sent back.

The law that took effect Thursday reverses an open-door asylum policy written into the constitution 43 years ago in atonement for the Nazis' persecution of foreigners. Refugees caught trying to cross into Germany by land are immediately turned back.

Those who arrive by air have 19 days to prove they are fleeing conditions run by dictators or at war. Until then, they are kept in special airport holding cells.

The liberal asylum policy was scrapped in part because of concerns that an influx of newcomers were draining social welfare coffers and touching off neo-Nazi violence against foreigners.

But anti-foreigner attacks have increased since parliament approved the measure in May, including an arson blaze that killed five Turks.

# French-Russian crew blasts off

MOSCOW (AP) — A Russian-French crew blasted off Thursday from the former Soviet cosmodrome in Kazakhstan on a 21-day mission, the first of four space flights scheduled between the countries.

The launch at 6:33 p.m. (9:33 a.m. MDT) went smoothly as the Soyuz TM-17 capsule made its way to the Mir space station, which is orbiting about 200 miles above the Earth.

On board were Russian commander Vasily Tsibilyev, engineer Aleksander

Serebriov and French researcher Jean-Pierre Haignere.

The cosmonauts will carry out a new series of tests called "Altair" before Haignere returns July 22 with the Mir's current crew, Gennady Manakov and Alexander Poleshchuk, who have been in orbit for about 250 months. The liftoff from the Baikonur cosmodrome was the latest in Russia's effort to fund its struggling space program with joint space missions and commercial satellite launches.

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The space shuttle Endeavour flies past emergency vehicles en route to a successful landing Thursday at Kennedy Space Center in Florida. The shuttle landed two days late because of inclement weather.

# As Endeavour finally returns, NASA looks ahead at Hubble

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA completed one spacewalking shuttle mission Thursday and rehearsed for another one that also will help prepare for the crucial Hubble Space Telescope repairs.

The next mission is to begin in two weeks. Endeavour and its six astronauts returned home two days late with a science satellite they snared in orbit and some tips for the Hubble repair crew. A record five and possibly seven spacewalks are planned during the December link-up with Hubble. Endeavour's next flight.

During the past three weeks, the four astronauts who will attempt to install corrective lenses, a new camera, solar panels and gyroscopes have been training underwater with a Hubble mock-up at NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala.

Endeavour's latest mission ended with a morning touchdown at Kennedy Space Center. Shuttle director Brewster Shaw said Endeavour looked to be in good shape after its 4.1 million-mile journey.

The 19-day flight lasted two days longer than intended because bad weather scuttled Tuesday and

Wednesday's landing attempts. It was only the second time in 12 years of shuttle flights that landings had to be delayed two days because of bad weather.

Once home, Endeavour skipper Ronald Grabe exchanged greetings with the astronaut in charge of the next mission.

Astronaut Frank Culbertson Jr. and his crew were inside Discovery for a launch-pad countdown test, just four miles from the runway.

"If we'd known you were over there we would have done a fly-by of the pad," Grabe told Culbertson before getting off Endeavour.

Discovery's satellite-delivery mission is scheduled to begin July 17. NASA set the launch date Thursday.

The main objective of Endeavour's mission — retrieving the European Space Agency's 45-ton reusable satellite called Eureka — was accomplished June 24.

The satellite and its load of science samples, monitors and telescope had been in orbit for nearly a year.

Endeavour's two spacewalkers spent much of their nearly six-hour outing on June 25 forcing Eureka's two loose antennas shut. The unexpected work reduced the amount of

time scheduled for testing Hubble repair methods.

During the six-hour spacewalk planned for Discovery's flight, two astronauts will test actual Hubble repair tools. It's an opportunity to "perhaps identify some possible stumbling blocks," said astronaut James Newman, who will perform the spacewalk.

"That's an important concept test before you go fly for a mission like that," Newman said.

# Missouri enacts health law

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP) — Gov. Mel Carnahan signed health-care legislation Thursday that he said could serve as a national model. It drew praise from first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton.

Carnahan cautioned that the new law is only a first step, providing improved primary care for some 600,000 Missourians, mostly children and pregnant women.

Mrs. Clinton, leading a federal task force on health care reform, made a brief television appearance from Washington to endorse the measure. She said it will fit into a "broad national framework" the federal government will provide on health care, but that states would have a major role in tailoring the federal program to their needs.

The new law is to be financed by raising Missouri's cigarette tax 4 cents per pack, to a total of 17 cents, and imposing the state's first tax on smokeless tobacco, at a rate of 10 percent. The law's estimated cost is \$23.4 million in the budget year beginning July 1.

A key feature is known as collaborative practice, in which advanced practice nurses will work independently in locations where a physician isn't available on a daily basis. The nurses will work with regular oversight by physicians.

Carnahan said that will expand health care in rural and inner-city areas where there are shortages of physicians. The law also creates a fund for pay incentives to get physicians to practice in under-served areas.

Carnahan said another important section deals with providing health care to children at school. School officials will be able to contract with Medicaid to provide school nursing services.

# Thalidomide slows AIDS in early tests

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thalidomide, a morning sickness pill that created an international nightmare by birth defecting infants in 1950s, shows promise in laboratory test tubes and in early clinical trials of slowing down the AIDS virus.

Researchers reported Thursday in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences that thalidomide retards proliferation of the AIDS virus by reducing the production of an immune system protein that usually nurtures the virus.

Gita Kaplan, a Rockefeller University immunologist, said that in laboratory tests against the AIDS virus, thalidomide inhibits the production of a protein called tumor necrosis factor-alpha, or TNF-alpha. She said TNF has been found in earlier studies to assist in the replication of the human immunodeficiency virus, or HIV, that causes AIDS.

"TNF-alpha is known to be probably the most important physiological activator of HIV," Kaplan said in an interview. "There is evidence that if you can inhibit TNF, then you can inhibit HIV."

Dr. Anthony S. Fauci, director of the National Institutes of Health's National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, said that there is a "real scientific basis for studying thalidomide or other drugs that block the production of TNF, but that there are uncertainties about the ultimate effect of such therapy on AIDS patients."

"At least in a preliminary trial the indication is that it is certainly worth pursuing with more people in a larger trial," said Fauci.

"Whether or not it will turn out to have any long-term effect on HIV individuals, we don't know."

Thalidomide exposed to HIV-infected cells in the laboratory was shown to slow the reproduction of the virus, said Kaplan. In another study, the drug was tested against HIV-infected blood from 17 AIDS patients.

In all cases, she said, thalidomide slowed or halted the reproduction in test tubes of the HIV virus.

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# Seattle man aces GED test

SEATTLE — Chris Kenan plays guitar in a rock band, flips hamburgers at The Keg restaurant and is a regular kind of guy.

He also was the only person in the United States to get a perfect score on the 1992 General Educational Development exam. More than 9 million people took the high-school-equivalency test last year.

Kenan answered the 286 questions correctly and wrote an essay about his love for jazz.

The perfect score earned him a plaque from the American Council

on Education and praise from state officials.

"It was nothing," said Kenan, dressed in shorts, casual shirt and black Doc Martens for the award ceremony Wednesday. "I did it on a lark."

A perfect score is a rarity, said Pat Green of the state Board for Community and Technical Colleges.

Kenan, 32, was bored when he dropped out of high school in Phoenix 15 years ago. Before taking the 7½-hour exam at Seattle Central Community College, he purchased a book to brush up on math, his weakness.

**Illness hospitalized 2 almost a year ago**

ATLANTA — The mysterious virus suspected of causing 21 deaths in the Southwest hospitalized two people almost a year ago, government doctors said Thursday.

In further development, Georgia began tracking down owners of pet prairie dogs who have those rodents tested for the hantavirus.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention announced that it's not likely the pet poses a threat. The agency suspects deer-mice spread a new strain of hantavirus, which has caused severe respiratory illness in New Mexico, Arizona, Utah and Colorado.

Mid Georgia officials said they wanted to be sure, so they've banned the sale of prairie dogs and are testing as many as possible.

The CDC is investigating 38 possible hantavirus cases. By Thursday, the agency had found proof of hantavirus in 15 people infected during the outbreak, first begun in May, Eleven died. Ten were from New Mexico, four from Arizona and one from Colorado.

Also, the CDC found proof of hantavirus in two other people who were hospitalized with respiratory illness as early as 10 months ago.

**Specialists call for new vaccine agency**

WASHINGTON — A new government agency could focus American efforts on developing a vaccine to protect the world's children from ordinary diseases that claim 2 million lives a year, experts reported Thursday.

In a report issued by the National Academy of Sciences, a committee of specialists called for the formation of a National Vaccine Authority that would team with private drug companies to develop vaccines that could be used worldwide.

We could put the strengths of both the private and public sector to work," said Jay P. Sanford, committee chairman and former dean at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences.

The study said a federal vaccine authority could overcome the legal, technical and economic problems that now keep many drug companies from manufacturing new and cheaper vaccines against such common childhood diseases as mumps, measles, whooping cough, diphtheria, tuberculosis and polio.

**NIH will bring back ethics regulations**

WASHINGTON — The National Institutes of Health is resurrecting ethics rules, slapped down three years ago by the Bush administration, that would limit financial ties between private companies and government-funded scientists.

The biotechnology industry, which fought the rules when they came up the first time, says they could be disastrous if fledgling companies, short on cash, can't lure scientific talent with stock instead of money.

**Mob informant dies in his sleep**

LOS ANGELES — Aladegna "Jimmy the Weasel" Fratianno, the former mob boss who turned government witness, has died, a government official said Thursday. He was 79.

Fratianno, one-time acting boss of the Los Angeles crime syndicate, died in his sleep earlier this week. Phoenix FBI spokesman Jack Callahan said in a telephone interview.

**Carrier quits over magazine covers**

MOVILLE, Iowa — A mail carrier quit after refusing to deliver issues of Time and Newsweek, saying the covers would have tempted the 301 people on his route to sin.

George Yoerger, a substitute carrier, left behind the magazines when he left to deliver the mail June 15 in this northwest Iowa town. The Newsweek cover showed two women hugging under the headline: "Lesbians Coming Out Strong: What Are the Limits of Tolerance?"

**Bungee death caused by long cord**

ARVADA, Colo. — A man who was killed during a bungee jump was attached to a cord that was 70 feet too long, an investigator said.

The company that built the jump, Bungee America, ignored safety standards that would have prevented William Brotherton's death Sunday when he leaped from a tethered hot-air balloon over a field, said the report by Carl Finocchiaro, safety committee chairman of the North American Bungee Association.

**Texas murderer executed by injection**

HUNTSVILLE, Texas — A man convicted of killing a "Good Samaritan" motorist was put to death by injection Thursday after almost 15 years and seven reviews by appeals courts.

Curtis Paul Harris, 31, was convicted of using a tire jack to fatally club Timothy Merka, 27, of Mumford, a motorist who had stopped to help him and his brother with their disabled car.

Harris' brother, Danny, 32, is scheduled to die July 30. The two brothers visited for about an hour Wednesday.

Appeals in the case had included three pleas to the U.S. Supreme Court.

**Economy slips back into recession**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. manufacturing economy slipped back into recessionary territory in June, a key barometer suggested Thursday in the second report in two days on troubles besetting the nation's factories.

Further illustrating the mixed condition of the overall economy, the government also reported some improvement in the labor-market last week, and a slight increase in construction spending in May.

But an index based on a survey of purchasers of raw materials used by the nation's factories dropped sharply in June to 48.3 percent, from 51.3 percent a month earlier. A reading below 50 percent indicates a shrinking manufacturing economy.

The National Association of Purchasing Management report Thursday came a day after the Commerce Department said orders to American factories had fallen 1.4 percent in May, the third straight monthly decline.

"It is pretty clear that the manufacturing sector is just not participating in this expansion," said economist David Wyss of DRI-McGraw-Hill, a Lexington, Mass., economist forecasting firm.

"It seems to be softening in the second quarter and I find that worrisome," he added. "If we don't have manufacturing jobs, it is awfully hard to get the rest of the economy moving."

The Labor Department, meanwhile, reported that 340,000 newly

344,750 during the period ended June 26.

The report does not conflict with the purchasing management survey, contended Sung Won Sohn, an economist with the Norwest Corp. in Minneapolis.

"We are seeing manufacturing jobs declining while service jobs are rising," he said. "I think the initial claims are really reflecting, not the manufacturing side, but the service side."

Factories shed 39,000 jobs in May on top of a 65,000 loss a month earlier, leaving manufacturing employment at the lowest level in 28 years.

Because of generally weak economic reports during the last two weeks, Sung said he has revised his projection for overall job growth in June to 80,000, from 120,000 earlier. The Labor Department reported more than 200,000 jobs were created in both April and May.

Sohn also predicted the unemployment rate would return to 7 percent

in Friday's Labor Department report, from 6.9 percent in May. The May reading was the first below 7 percent since December 1991.

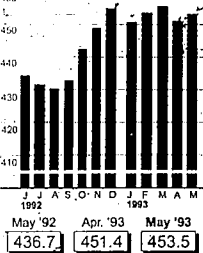
Slightly better news, the Commerce Department said Thursday that construction spending had risen 0.5 percent in May, boosted in part by the highest level of commercial building in 19 months.

Residential, commercial and government outlays totaled \$453.5 billion at a seasonally adjusted annual rate, up from \$451.4 billion in April, the report said. April's 0.7 percent decline became the first since last August after the department revised March's originally estimated 0.1 percent drop to a 0.2 percent advance.

But while residential spending inched up 0.1 percent to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$200.8 billion, in April, outlays for single-family homes dropped 0.2 percent. It was the third straight drop including 1.8 percent in April and 1.6 percent in March.

**Top Marine: Gays won't help military**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Most people underestimate the possible harm from homosexuals serving openly in the military, the Marine Corps' top officer said Thursday.

He and other military leaders remain opposed, he said.

Gen. Carl Mundy, commandant of the Marine Corps, said he thinks a compromise will be worked out that will be acceptable to the service chiefs, but he indicated the debate is continuing at the Pentagon.

As for himself, he said, "It's better just to have a clear-cut policy that says, 'This is the way it is... if you must talk about your homosexuality, then you probably are better served in another profession than the military.'"

He told defense reporters there is wide agreement among military leaders.

All of us, more or less, in whatever words we frame it, believe that there is a danger to fracturing cohesion that is not understood by a lot of people," he said.

Still, the four-star general denied suggestions that the service chiefs were backing President Clinton, who has said the military should not discriminate against homosexuals. Clinton has asked Defense Secretary Les Aspin to propose a new policy to replace the ban on homosexuals by July 15.

"My position from the outset has been steady as she goes; whatever we are told to do, we will do it, the Marine Corps will execute it," Mundy said. He added, "My own personal views are just about as I've expressed them."

Mundy indicated the Pentagon has not yet worked out details of a new policy, which is expected to follow a formulation popularly called "don't ask, don't tell" — meaning the military would end its practice of asking recruits if they are homosexual, and gays would be required to keep their status private.

## Stock market declines in response to negative economic news

**NEW YORK** — The stock market finished mostly lower Thursday with the Dow Jones industrial average and several other indicators down in response to disappointing economic news.

A fixation on the economy prevailed as investors sifted through negative numbers on the manufacturing sector and awaited June's employment situation report scheduled for release this morning.

The Dow ended at 3,510.54, off 5.54, after weaving at moderately lower levels during most of the session.

A number of broader market indicators also declined. The New York Stock Exchange composite index sagged 0.46 to 2,454.64. Advancing Big Board issues managed to maintain a lead over declining ones at 7 to 5.

Volume on the floor of the NYSE climbed to 281.24 million shares as of 2 p.m. MDI, up slightly from 280.88 million on Wednesday. The Nasdaq composite index slipped 0.36 to 703.59. The American Stock Exchange

market value index gained 1.63 to 438.87.

Shares surrendered some momentum after the National Association of Purchasing Management issued its assessment of the manufacturing sector.

The group's index of business activity sank to 48.3 percent last month from 51.1 percent in May.

It was its lowest reading since December 1991 and its second month below 50 percent this year. A reading under 50 percent generally indicates the manufacturing sector is contracting.

The news from the purchasing managers' club the anxiety created by poor reports earlier this week on home sales, consumer confidence and the index of leading indicators.

Anticipation of the Labor Department's employment report for June tended to keep stocks steady within a narrow trading range, analysts said.

The preoccupation with the domestic economy overshadowed upbeat news from abroad that temporarily buoyed the market in early action. Germany cut key lending

### Clinton seeks middle ground on owl debate

The timber industry hates President Clinton's plan for Pacific Northwest forest. So do environmentalists. Not surprisingly, there are practical reasons. Both sides are obliged to grapple with the plan's true measure is not the howling it produces, but the results.

On that score, it shows some promise.

Long-term economic salvation for Pacific Northwest lumbering towns does not rest on cutting more old-growth forests, for those are a limited commodity. Rather, it lies in winning every possible dollar out of every tree cut.

Steps in that direction are the strong points of Clinton's plan.

Example: The president said he will push to end federal tax subsidies for exporting logs. He'll also sign a bill to ban exports of raw logs from public lands.

These steps were long overdue.

Sending logs to Japan and other nations provides jobs for people who cut, haul and load the logs. But sending finished lumber and manufactured wooden products would also provide jobs for sawmill workers, factory hands, artisans, anyone whose labor can add value to a piece of wood.

In a related step, Clinton proposed more than \$1 billion in economic aid to the region. If the money can be

channeled to truly useful programs, never a certainty when Uncle Sam is involved, it has the potential to stimulate some of those value-added jobs.

Such jobs will be badly needed, because many traditional forest-products jobs will dry up. Clinton's proposal to cut 1.2 billion board feet of timber a year (down from 4 billion a year in the roaring '80s) will idle thousands of timber workers.

But those lost jobs are not Clinton's fault. Nor are they the spotted owl's.

Though the owl's threatened extinction led to the current court-ordered logging moratorium, an eventual crisis was inevitable. Owl or no owl, the ancient trees that have been the industry's staple for so long cannot last much longer.

The choice for timber companies and their employees is, "Adapt or die." No politician can protect them for long.

Meanwhile, environmentalists who had hoped for a more restrictive plan must accept political and economic realities. Families need groceries, and a regional economy cannot transform overnight.

Clinton's plan seeks a middle ground, and properly so. His announcement will not end the debate, but it appears to be an honest attempt at a balanced approach.

### Tobacco industry's claim against EPA is ludicrous

America's worst drug pushers are getting desperate. They're suing the Environmental Protection Agency.

Philip Morris, L.S.A., R.J. Reynolds, Tobacco and other cigarette makers are trying to discredit an EPA report that links passive smoking to lung and heart cancer. The industry argued that the EPA study has accelerated the nationwide campaign to ban smoking in places open to the public.

Cigarette peddlers claim the EPA's conclusions about passive smoke are based on faulty science. Considering the source, the criticism is laughable. Getting a medical lecture from the tobacco industry is like getting tax advice from Willie Nelson.

It's been 29 years since the Surgeon General determined that cigarettes cause cancer, but the tobacco pushers still refuse to admit the connection. What every major health organization accepts as irrefutable medical fact, the cigarette makers absurdly dismiss as coincidence.

But they haven't banded together and sued the U.S. government, until now. Fear has set in because new no-smoking laws are being enacted across the country. Many cities have banned smoking in city buildings. Other ordinances have even farther.

Last week Los Angeles outlawed smoking in all restaurants except bars, nightclubs and outdoor cafes. The controversial move faces a legislative challenge, but the vote still is a shock down the spine of the tobacco lobby.

True, the industry isn't exactly wheezing, financially. While smoking is declining overall in the United States, cigarette makers are successfully luring new addicts, particularly young women. Meanwhile, exports of tobacco products are booming, as Uncle Sam promotes home-grown toxins abroad.

But the issue of passive smoke is a threat to the cigarette industry. It's easy to defend the right of a consumer who willfully chooses to poison himself. It's not so easy to defend the poisoning of those around him, including children.

The agency concluded that secondhand smoke is a carcinogen, like asbestos. That's right. Tobacco's legal counterattack. What's not only are our farmers subsidized for growing a lethal crop, they can sue the very government that's subsidizing them!

Tobacco companies face a hard task, trying to convince a court that secondhand smoke is harmless. The wisp of the end of a lit Camel is the same noxious gas that eventually kills the smoker. (Lest passive smoke isn't quite as deadly, having been once-filtered through somebody else's lung tissue.)

EPA chief Carol Browner says the agency stands firmly behind its medical findings and will fight the tobacco lawsuit. In the meantime, other cities might follow Los Angeles' example by proposing tougher laws to rid the air of passive smoke.

If it comes down to a battle between good health and big money, bet on the big money. Cigarette makers have millions to spread around, and politicians aren't the only ones who take it. Every newspaper and magazine I've ever worked for has published cigarette advertising and gladly cashed the checks.

Cigarettes kill many times more people than cocaine and heroin combined, but that's OK because the stuff is legal. If Pablo Escobar had been born here instead of Colombia, he wouldn't be a fugitive today. He'd be on the board of R.J. Reynolds.

Just in the United States, money doesn't just talk. It coughs.

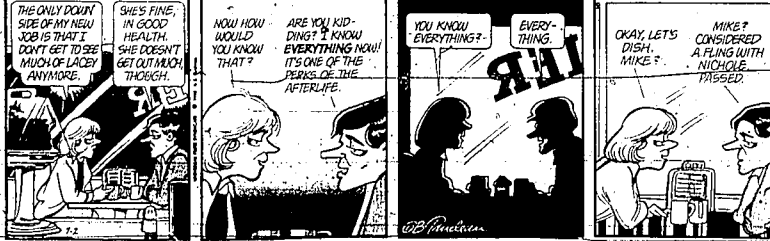

# State Fish and Game system called a success — but is it legal?

BOISE (AP) — The Fish and Game Department is pronouncing its new system of allowing hunters to apply for controlled permits by telephone and credit card a big success — even though it may not be legal.

The new program closed Wednesday night after accepting 8,881 telephone calls from hunters using a credit card to apply for deer, antelope or bear tags. That means about 10 percent of the hunters who usually apply for the permits used the new system, despite the fact it had little advance notice before it started June 7.

The only problem is that the new system is illegal, according to a legal advisory from the attorney general's office.

State Treasurer Lydia Justice Edwards asked the attorney general's

office to look into Fish and Game's contract with a Rexburg company to take the phone calls, charge credit cards and issue credit card refunds to hunters who don't draw a permit.

Ken Norrie, deputy attorney general, said the new system was a big success.

"I think it speaks for itself. It was highly effective, it was very popular with the hunters and it was efficient," he said. "We've had no negative feedback on it."

It's seen as a way to make it easier for hunters to apply for tags and get their money back if they don't get

one. State officials estimate it costs \$10 per warrant now for sending refunds out.

Fish and Game contracted with Stylart, a Rexburg company that has handled information requests. Using toll-free telephone lines, hunters called in requests for hunting permits and paid by credit card.

Stylart processed requests, charged hunters \$4 per application plus 3 percent of the tag fee. For a resident deer permit, the new process added \$4.51.

Deputy Attorney General Terry Anderson said in a legal directive that laws allow vendors to collect \$1 for licenses, tags and permits.

"However, there is no additional statutory authority which would allow them to charge the fee (\$4) being assessed for the service they are providing," she said.

The other arrangement that Stylart issue credit card refunds, also has no legal backing, she said. The state can't issue refunds to a third party, Stylart, for forwarding to individuals "without appropriate waivers from the individual hunters or specific statutory authority."

Fish and Game may seek to "fine tune" the laws to allow that, Norrie said. But that will be up to the Fish and Game Commission, which hasn't met on the subject yet.

"They have negotiated a contract that gives them authority that is not in the code," Edwards said Thursday. "It is blatantly illegal."

"We can't authorize an agency to collect \$4 when we are paying other vendors \$1," she said. The agency defends the process as a way of making

it easier for hunters to apply for permits, and cutting down on errors.

An agency official said in 1992, Fish and Game got 87,463 applications and rejected 4,439 because of obvious errors. Another 2,056 were kicked out by computers. More than 3,200 applications were voided because of wrong money amounts or they were too late.

Norrie said presumably the telephone-credit card system eliminated most of the mistakes.

"I accept the agency doesn't entirely accept Anderson's analysis, considering it's a 'service charge' and not a 'fee.'"

"We are not trying to get into a big battle over this, we are trying to provide a service to the public," Norrie said.

"That's viewing Stylart as a licensed vendor. This is not a licensing procedure. This is taking an application for the controlled hunt and the fees that accompany it," he said.

The state's 600 license vendors, who sell regular hunting and fishing licenses over the counter, don't take applications for controlled hunts. They go to Fish and Game headquarters in Boise, which holds a computerized drawing.

Based on \$4 per application, Stylart would have \$35,524 per call coming in, Edwards said she won't allow Fish and Game to pay that amount.

In any event, nobody's talking about invalidating the 8,881 hunting applications in the system. And Fish and Game wants to get the questions out of the way so it can use the system again.

State Auditor J.D. Williams says he's invited a critic of his office operations to come in for a personal briefing on reports on bonuses paid to state employees.

Boise lawyer CPA Ralph Gines on Thursday told a news conference Williams has been putting out inaccurate information about the bonuses paid state employees.

Gines said Williams reported that about 2,000 state employees were paid \$1.4 million in bonuses in fiscal year 1992, but the actual figure should have been 3,215 workers receiving \$1.65 million.

"One of the primary purposes of the auditor's office is to provide timely and accurate information to the public," Gines said. "The present attitude seems to be one of obscuring and withholding public information."

Williams said Gines had his facts mixed up. "There were two different bonus reports prepared for state legislators," he said, after Gines' news conference. "One covered all bonuses and the other covered just bonuses over \$500. That's why the figures are different."

Gines also said Williams told him it would cost \$300 to get a report on State bonuses for another year, but told a reporter for the Idaho Press-Tribune it would cost \$3,000.

Williams said preparing the report for the newspaper would require writing a special computer program to produce it, because a new information system doesn't go back that far, Gines asked only for a part-year report.

An attorney general's opinion on Monday backed up Williams and said if information is not already available, a person asking for information should bear the cost of compiling it.

**Eatery will help pay medical bills**

BOISE (AP) — A restaurant in Nampa linked to 180 reports of food poisoning will try to help victims pay their medical bills, the owners say.

"We are not cowards," said Jesus Malmuez, who helps his son-in-law, Roberto Lopez, run Mario's Hacienda restaurant.

"We will try to keep up and see what happens. If we go down at least we went down doing our best."

## Powerball jackpot hits record \$78 million

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Lottery officials are predicting soaring ticket sales but only a 50-50 chance that somebody — perhaps an Idahoan — will claim the record \$78 million Powerball jackpot this weekend.

"We're estimating there's a 51.1 percent chance for somebody to win," said Multi-State Lottery Association director Chuck Strutt.

Powerball is played in Delaware, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Oregon, Rhode Island, South

Dakota, West Virginia, Wisconsin and the District of Columbia.

Players have missed the big prize in 15 consecutive drawings since a \$36.8 million prize was claimed by a player in Missouri on May 8.

Should they miss again Saturday night, Strutt said the jackpot would rise sharply but not as fast as it would in the winter, when people have fewer diversions. He said the jackpot would be somewhere above \$90 million but below \$100 million.

BOISE (AP) — Ross Perot supporters have reserved the Boise State University Pavilion for a July 17 appearance, but the Texas billionaire's visit is not certain, a spokesman says.

"We're waiting for confirmation," said Platt Thompson, Idaho director for United We Stand America, Perot's Dallas-based grass-roots group.

After Perot's strong showing on Idaho's presidential ballot last November — 130,395 votes as an independent candidate — UWSA in Idaho expected him to visit this year.

The July edition of Spotlight, a BSU arts and entertainment calendar, lists "July 17 — Ross Perot, Pavilion."

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## Searchers seek missing Pocatello girl

POCATELLO (AP) — Pocatello police launched a foot-by-foot search of area highways and called in heat-sensing helicopters Thursday in an effort to find an 11-year-old newspaper carrier snatched off a city street two days earlier.

Police said they fielded hundreds of calls, including a police inquiry from Massachusetts, but had no leads into the fate of Jaralee Underwood.

She was collecting from Idaho State Journal customers when an eyewitness said she was forced into a car by a male. Officers said they were looking for a clean-shaven male in his 30s, 5-foot-7 and stocky build.

Local FBI field agents joined the case.

Police asked for volunteers to search area roads Thursday evening, and hovering helicopters with thermal detectors, capable of picking up unusual sources of heat, from the nearby Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

About 1,000 people gathered at a Mormon Church center Wednesday night in a prayer session for the girl's safe return. Leaders passed out

posters with the girl's picture and asked anyone traveling over the July 4 holiday to distribute them.

Jaralee's parents remain hopeful but realize that time is critical. "Whatever has happened, we know she is all right," Jeff Underwood said. "We just keep hoping for a lead."

Jaralee is one of the family's six children.

Police Lt. Kirk Nelson said no hard leads have developed.

On Wednesday evening, police set up roadblocks on major highways of this community of 46,000 asking motorists if they saw anything in the area of the abduction Tuesday night. Police Chief Jim Benham joined officers handing out the girl's picture.

# Idaho Lottery sales jump

BOISE (AP) Idaho Lottery sales continued rebounding from the second-year slump, rising nearly 11 percent over the past 12 months. And Lottery Director Wally Hedrick on Thursday predicted sales would eclipse the first-year record of \$66 million in two more years. "There is a saturation point," Hedrick conceded as the Lottery Commission turned over a \$14 million dividend to the state. "I don't think we've reached that yet." Sales during the last 12 months totaled \$57.2 million. That was up substantially from the \$51 million to \$52 million trough sales slipped into

the previous two years. "The success is a reflected of the people's confidence in the lottery," Hedrick said. "We have presented the kinds of games they wanted." When the Lottery was set up after being approved by voters in 1988, state officials had expected first year sales to total just \$25 million with the traditional second-year slump dropping them below that afterward. "The annual dividend from the program is split evenly between school districts and the state to finance building renovations or new construction." The first-year dividend totaled

\$17.2 million, and the Lottery maintained that amount in the second year despite the drastic decline in sales by substantially reducing operating expenses. But when a substantial sales recovery failed to occur two years ago, the dividend slipped to \$12 million. Hedrick said he expected to exceed the original \$17.2 million dividend in the 1994-1995 operating year. "Our future looks bright," he said, promising yet another round of new games, promotions and activities to keep public interest in the Lottery high.

## State gives \$112,000 to INEL traffic plan

BOISE (AP) The Idaho Transportation Department has agreed to contribute an extra \$112,000 to complete a traffic safety highway project at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. The \$1.08 million project is aimed at improving the safety of federal workers and others who travel a main highway through the federal nuclear research center on U.S. Highway 20.

The Department of Energy approved \$975,000 for the work. The Idaho Transportation Department contributed engineering and design work. Contractors' bids were higher than anticipated, so the Transportation Board voted on Tuesday to finance the remaining amount. John Combs, board chairman, said the project will substantially improve safety for motorists on

U.S. 20. "The board decided it was important to contribute the additional amounts to construct the project. This is a good example of two government agencies working together to solve a problem." When shift changes are made at INEL, a bigger stops motorists on U.S. 20 to allow employees to leave the facility, creating some delays. Officials said night shift changes can be hazardous.

## Bill holds nuclear sites liable for contaminating water supplies

The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory and other federal nuclear sites could be held accountable for contaminating water supplies under a bill introduced in the U.S. House.

Flanked by the Sierra Club and the Natural Resources Defense Council on Wednesday, Rep. Peter DeFazio, D-Ore., unveiled legislation to close a loophole exempting military and Department of Energy facilities from clean water mandates. "It's time to ask the federal government to play by the same rules as citizens and private industry," he said. "It's outrageous that over 20 million tons of hazardous and radioactive waste is dumped into the environment every year by federal agencies that are supposed to protect

the public good." The passage of the Federal Facilities Compliance Act last year requires federal installations to comply with environmental laws. But it did not encompass bodies of water, said Daryl Kimball of Physicians for Social Responsibility. For decades, federal facilities — particularly the DOE — have discarded radioactive waste into waterways.

food restaurant, she said. However, Nelson said in a telephone interview from Davidson's law office that she will pick the child up sometime today.

The visitation is part of a custody arrangement reluctantly signed by Kierstyn's father, Brian VanBuren, 21, of Twin Falls. VanBuren said he worries that he may never see his daughter again and is considering challenging the agreement.

## Summer brings fire hazards

TWIN FALLS — Summer is the season for forest and range fires, and the Bureau of Land Management is urging the public to take extra precautions during the Fourth of July weekend.

Grazing and other rangeland vegetation have dried and will burn readily, despite recent rains, said Andy Payne, fire management officer for the Shoshone BLM District.

"We have already had two human-caused fires this summer on the Shoshone District," Payne said. "Fire danger is presently rated as moderate, but a few days of hot, dry weather can drive the fire danger right back up again."

It is against the law for anyone to start fireworks or even have them in your possession while on lands managed by the Forest Service, BLM, National Park Service and the state.

"People violating this law are subject to a fine of \$500 and confiscation of all fireworks," said Randy Richter of the Sawtooth National Forest Fire Management Office. "In addition, a person responsible for starting a fire on public lands can also be held liable for the resulting costs of property damage and putting out the fire."

This may sound ominous, but Fredrick C. and Jeanne Howard of Lake Ariel, Pa., know the ramifications of starting a fire even if it's accidental.

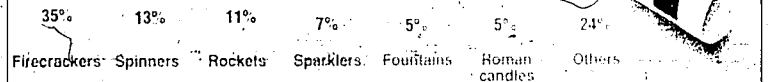
- Do not try to relight duds, douse them with water and throw them away

More than half the injuries from fireworks are burns. The hands, face and head are most vulnerable.

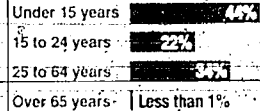
### Most injuries are from firecrackers

Percent of injuries caused by each type of fireworks



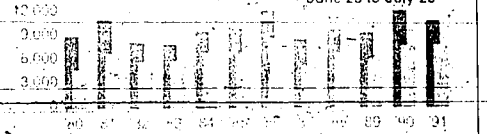
### Most victims are children

TWIN FALLS — Police departments are preparing for a rousing weekend as the Fourth of July spirit hits the valley and children crowd around the fireworks booths.

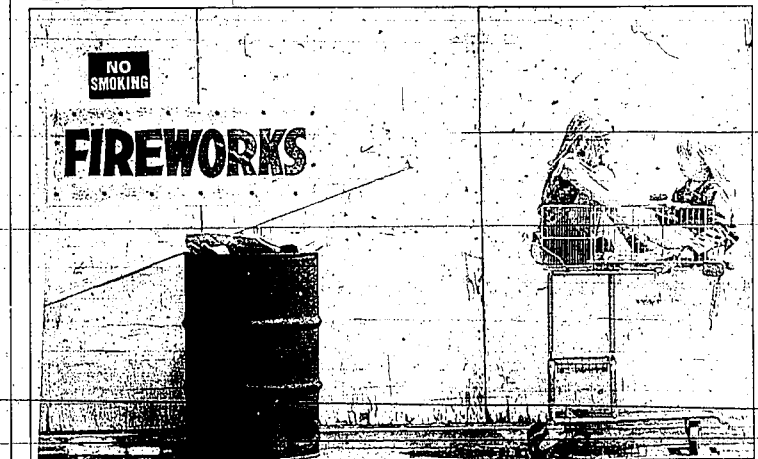
"We will be enforcing the law that it is illegal to explode firecrackers and bottle rockets," said Police Chief Tom Bennett of Burley.

## State discusses replenishing low aquifers

KIMBERLY — The state Legislature's committee on aquifer recharge met Thursday at the Kimberly Agricultural Research Center to hear from regional water experts about the possibilities of artificially replenishing Idaho's thirsty aquifers.

"The whole purpose of the meeting is to get comments from the citizens of Idaho as it pertains to aquifer recharge to see if there needs to be any legislative action which addresses the subject of aquifer recharge," said state Sen. Mark Ricks, R-Reburg.

There has been more rain this year than in past years, but "it takes more than one year to recharge the aquifer," Ricks said.

The lawmakers heard testimony from Virgil Temple, manager of the A&B Irrigation District in Rupert, which has suffered declining water levels in its wells.

Don Campbell spoke on behalf of the Idaho Aquaculture Association, whose members are largely dependent on steady spring flows from the aquifer to raise fish.

The committee's day-long session included an afternoon field trip to an operational aquifer-recharge system approximately 10 miles from Kimberly. Please see AQUIFERS/B2

# Buhl needs golf coach, music teacher

Buhl Board members heard two pleas from residents — one for a golf coach and another for more staff in the music department.

Matt Echeverria, a golf pro at the Clear Lakes Country Club in Buhl, said the district needs a coach as well as a more structured golf program. He volunteered his services to help the coaches set up practice drills, but he said he didn't have the time to spend two to three hours each evening with students, as a coach would.

Echeverria also suggested organizing a tournament to raise funds for the golf team. Money could be raised to purchase shirts, bags, or even help cover transportation costs.

Carol Kohnpelt, who has been an aide to the music teacher, Candy Atkins, told board members there is enough interest in music and choir to warrant a teacher and a half for the district.

Atkins has gone back to school to become a counselor, but has expressed interest in teaching part-time this year. The district is looking for a full-time teacher to replace Atkins.

Kohnpelt encouraged the board to keep Atkins on the payroll, as well as hire another full-time music teacher.

She also said (Atkins' music ability is outstanding, but she doesn't really know how to work with and teach kids).

The board agreed to consider both suggestions, but made no decisions Tuesday evening.

In other business:

A \$4.5 million budget was adopted by the School Board, up slightly from last year's \$4.2 million budget.

Superintendent Gene Pyles said revenue is up 5.7 percent, while expenditures are up only 4.5 percent. He said the difference was the result of spending about \$50,000 in reserve.

Pyles told board members "it's a very tight budget," adding, "it's only an estimate of what you're going to get, based on average daily attendance."

Salaries and benefits make up more than 70 percent of the budget. Health insurance has increased 20 percent, and teacher salaries will go up 2 percent.

The remaining 28 percent of the budget goes toward purchasing services and supplies, computer, other insurance coverage and a contingency reserve.

The board adopted a tobacco free policy for the school district. Tobacco use will not be allowed in any of the district buildings or on the school grounds during regular business hours. This is the same policy Twin Falls and Filer school districts recently adopted.

Idaho Country Club, formerly Falstaff Dairy, was awarded the milk bid for the 1993-94 school year. They were the lowest bid submitted at \$5,040.

# Unfinished school has Jerome district looking for extra class space

JEROME — Jerome officials are grappling with where to teach some students after learning Wednesday a new school won't open after all.

Two middle school classes and three classrooms for kindergarten and Jerome early education children are without a place to meet.

Board members also agreed to file a lawsuit against the state for the delay in the new school.

Batemian recently told school officials it would not be able to finish classrooms in the new Horizon Elementary School for a fall opening.

Jerome School District principals, new Superintendent Jim Cobble and board Chairman Nancy Churchman will continue discussions of where to find the extra space.

The School Board met Wednesday to discuss what went wrong after Bateman Hall warned the district last week it couldn't keep to an earlier agreed-upon schedule.

Batemian President Kim Hall said a severe winter hind up progress on the nearly \$4 million building. Hall had originally signed a contract saying the 18 classroom school would be ready for students by mid-August. In March, however, Bateman said his firm would only be able to finish the south wing.

But on Wednesday, one subcontractor told the board that allowing children to attend classes in the south wing this fall would present a safety hazard.

Building officials said the south wing can't be built until the west wing is finished since all the mechanical controls for the water system, fire sprinklers, air conditioning and heat are to be located in there.

"The State Fire Marshal wouldn't allow it," said Gerald Strebel, a fire inspector representing Firetro of Salt Lake City. "Even if the state fire marshal OK'd it, we're going to take responsibility for the rest of the building if it catches on fire while the kids are in there because my company isn't going to."

"Completing the south wing will impact the entire building. We're trying to build a quality building that will have at least a 50-year life," Hall said.

To further complicate the problem, a change order to the contract required electrical and data transmission lines in five classrooms and printers in each classroom that would cost an additional \$40,000 and take 15 additional days to install. The funds are available from a \$100,000 contingency fund in the contract, according to district Business Manager Mike Gibson.

The requirement for the computer hook-ups came after the contract was signed after the district received a \$340,000 federal grant, Gibson said.

Board members agreed to a Dec. 1 deadline for completion of the building.

If that date is not met, the contractor is required to pay a \$1,000 per day penalty, Gibson said.

# Bellevue park poses problem

BELLEVUE — The injury of an 8-year-old child in City Park last month has drawn attention to the state of its disrepair, although city officials aren't sure how to maintain equipment and stop vandalism.

Brandi McManis was swinging with her sister in the park when the bolt on the swing came out, according to 4-year Dennis Wright.

Brandi complained of aches and pains later that day. Her mother, Cheri McManis, contacted Wright who told her to take the child to the doctor and send the bolt to the city.

The bolt came to \$261 for the emergency room and \$96 for the doctor, according to Wright.

"This was not the first time" a child was hurt on park equipment, according to Wright. Four or five years ago a child was climbing on the basketball fence when it fell over on him, he said.

The entire basketball had to be removed and was not replaced, Wright said.

A Risk Management Team from the city's insurance company has given the city a list of items to improve safety, such as providing more and under the swings, according to Butch Hickman, city maintenance supervisor.

But the swings are new and almost indestructible, Hickman said.

"I don't know how the thing came apart," he said. The swing has since been repaired. As for the items on the list Hickman says he will attend to them "when I get the time."

The park's basketball and tennis courts are also falling apart, according to resident Andrew Harding.

The basketball backboards have been the prime target of local vandals, Wright said. People drive their pickups onto the courts and have ripped away at the backboards. The city finally took the backboards down, he said.

But removing all of the equipment is not the answer, Harding said. He said he received estimates of \$16,000 three years ago to extend the basketball court and do an overall renovation.

But Wright doesn't want the city to spend that kind of money on the park.

"I couldn't get excited about pouring thousands of dollars into a park project that is going to be destroyed by vandals which we can't control," Wright said.

The Marshall's department responds to one or two complaints per month of problems in the park, according to Marshall Dean Biggs. In addition to destruction of the courts, graffiti is a big problem requiring the city to repaint the buildings several times each year, he said.

The solution for Bellevue may lie in combining the tennis and basketball courts in one fenced area and soliciting support from the city's youth to maintain them.

Backboards and hoops could be placed on half of the tennis court, which is already fenced in, according to Wright. The courts could be locked up at night if needed, he said.

But what is really needed is to get the kids behind us on this, according to Councilman Richard Kimball.

If the teen-agers of Bellevue would get together and be willing to help get the park back in shape, they will have an investment in it that they are willing to protect rather than destroy, he said.

# Judge agrees to hear consultant's lawsuit against the state

BOISE (AP) — A Boise judge has decided against entirely dismissing a civil lawsuit against the state by its former AIDS education consultant.

Fourth District Judge Deborah Ball on Wednesday said firing Joy Hummer, in large part because of a letter she wrote in an AIDS court case, may have violated her right to protection by the court.

Hummer, who coordinated the state Department of Education's AIDS program, filed suit last fall. She said Jerry Evans, state schools superintendent, fired her in April 1992 because she was controversial, not because she did her job poorly.

"This case is really about ... the sensitivity of the (AIDS) question in this community, regardless of the delicacy with which it is handled," her attorney, Craig James, told 4th District Judge Deborah Ball.

After an hour-long hearing on the department's motion to dismiss the suit, Ball dropped the state Board of Education and Jerry Evans as defendants. That left the Idaho Department of Education as the sole defendant.

Ball also rejected the lawsuit's allegations the department broke an implied contract when it fired her.

Hummer was not present during the hearing and could not be reached for comment.

Attorneys for the Education Department said the suit should be dismissed because Hummer served "at the pleasure" of Evans, who decided he no longer was pleased.

"He was offended by the conduct of the employee," said attorney Howard Humphrey. "As I understand it, she showed herself to be a person of poor judgment."

She left her daughter in bushes in 28 degree weather, she said when her daughter is old enough she will tell her about it.

"I would tell her I would for I would what I did and why I did what I did to her," she said. "That is between me and her."

Since abandoning her daughter, Nelson has taken a battery of parenting classes and received extensive counseling, Davidson said. She now has role models and a supporting network, Davidson said.

Nelson said she should judge her based on the way she lives her life now. She said she is devoted to her new 5-month-old daughter, her husband and Kierstin.

"I put my kids before me," she said. "I'm there for them when they need me. I'm a full-time mom."

Said Davidson, "It seems to me that right-thinking people should rejoice that this person has reformed her life. It would be an evil thing with a capital E, to bring up the past."

After all the public scorn, it would have been easy for her to give up attempts to gain custody of her child, he said.

# Schools warned of bomb attacks

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — University officials throughout the West are being told to watch their mail for suspicious packages in the wake of recent bombings. If they find one, lawmen are asked to dial FBI-BOMB.

FBI Special Agent Ron Vandenberg of the bureau's Salt Lake office said a warning has gone out to college and university professors in Utah, Idaho and Montana to keep an eye out for any suspicious mail since a pair of bombings last week were linked to a serial bomber who has struck 14 times since 1978.

"Similar admonitions have been issued at universities throughout the country," said FBI spokesman Les Davis in Washington, D.C.

One person has been killed and 23 injured in the so-called UNABOM — or "University Bomber" — incidents. Last week, devices severely injured a University of California-San Francisco professor and a computer scientist at Yale. They were the first attacks in six years.

Several of the devices have ties to Utah, and that has campus law enforcement officials worried. The University of Utah, where a bomb was found in 1981, has issued a written warning for personnel to scrutinize packages in soft mailing envelopes, cardboard boxes and mailing boxes or boxes that appear to contain books.

"We want people to be extra cautious," said campus police Chief Wayne Shepherd. "If they've got a question, we'd rather they call us."

So far, police have opened three packages for nervous professors, Shepherd said.

The kids are caught," Romero said. "Most of our problems stem from the bottle rockets and the firecrackers."

At one stand in Twin Falls, lucrative sales from fireworks stand attest to the public's fascination with pyrotechnics.

"I get a lot of kids during the day and they spend anywhere from a dollar to \$20. Later in the afternoon, more adults come and they'll spend anywhere from \$20 upward," said employee Jara Leach. "Adults buy family packs and a variety of cones and fountains. Family packs are the most popular."

Leach said gleeful kids are satisfied with smaller fireworks.

"The kids buy Jumping Jacks costing 25 cents and come 12 in a pack, Baby Magic Blooms selling for 25 cents and that stay on the ground and shoot colored sparks, and Whipper Snappers that come 50 to a box and cost 30 cents. The kids throw them and they pop," she said.

Most fireworks cost from 10 cents to \$5, and the larger fountains and family packs cost from \$10 to \$50, Leach said.

Clearing leaves, brush and dry grass within 30 feet of the houses and other structures, removing all trees within 10 feet of the house, cleaning the roof and rain gutters, regularly storing firewood and other combustible materials at least 30 feet away from the house, and applying a fire retardant solution to wood shingle-shake roofs are some suggestions to homeowners to prevent their homes catching fire.

The BLM has a brochure for people who intend to set off fireworks legally on private land.

"Make sure you are in an open area and that there are no flammable materials around. Have about 100 feet clearance," said Mark Wiseman, fire control officer for the Burley BLM.

**Cultural arts center plans go forward**

BURLEY — A group dedicated to providing the Mini-Cassia area with a cultural arts center is also considering raising funds to construct a large pavilion.

Leon Hale, president of the Mt. Harrison Heritage Foundation, said there would be many uses for such a pavilion.

"We could use it for trade shows, or bring seats in and hold a rodeo or to host basketball games," he said.

The Mt. Harrison Heritage Foundation has been studying the feasibility of a 1500-seat theater to help reduce the strain on present facilities and provide a home for many cultural arts groups in the area.

Already, auditoriums at Burley and Mini-Cassia high schools are stretched to the limit, Hale said. An exact cost for the multi-million dollar facility hasn't been determined yet, Hale said, since those involved haven't decided on how large and extensive a facility is needed.

Support for such a center is high, Hale said, adding very few have said they're opposed to the idea.

"Everybody is saying, 'yes,'" he said.

Hale said another feasibility study will be conducted soon that will provide more information on whether the funds could be raised and how much support there is for the center's construction. Whether the facility would receive regular use would also be studied, Hale said.

A grant is being sought to finance the study, according to Hale, who added several fund-raising events have already been held.

Hale recently received \$500 donated by members of the cast of the Burley High School drama production "Boy Meets Girl." The proceeds of one night's performance were donated to the Heritage Foundation.

The most promising location for the center, Hale said, appears to be a piece of land owned by the state Transportation Department, located north of Burley near Connor's Cafe.

The site includes a pond, which would beautify the area, as well as provide a water source in case of fire, he said.

Eleven acres of land are contained on the site, which might be "barely enough" land for a facility, Hale said.

He said negotiations are taking place for the site.

**Regatta officials pleased, but plan some changes**

BURLEY — Officials say the Fifth Annual Idaho Regatta was a success, although the chairman of the event said he was disappointed with delays in the boat racing action.

"It went real well, but there's a few things we will have to change," Terry Tringham said.

The crowd was also well behaved, while the newly implemented family section seating worked out well, said Bingham.

The down-trend side of the boat ramp was designated family seating, and coolers were not allowed in the area.

"That meant those watching the action could do so, while persons wishing to bring in coolers and do more conversing with friends sat on the upstream side," Bingham said.

In addition, admission prices were increased to \$10.50 on Sunday in part to discourage people coming into the marina with the sole intent of causing trouble, Bingham said.

Security personnel, mostly off-duty sheriff's department deputies, did a good job in stopping any incidents that came up, he said.

Crowd numbers increased during Saturday from last year, while Sunday numbers declined.

On Saturday, 2,070 people paid admission, compared to 1,198 last year. On Sunday, 1,425 people paid (compared to last year's 2,082). It was the first year admission was charged on Friday, and 427 people paid that day.

Bingham said the numbers provided enough income to pay the bills. The Regatta Committee is happy if it can carry over 5 percent of its funds, "and it looks like we will be able to do that," Bingham said.

Some delays at the event were caused mostly with the addition of drag racing.

A "photo-cell sensor switch" which gave the elapsed time and miles per hour of the boats kept moving out of position due to water that eroded the base of the photo stand, Bingham said.

There were several other things which slowed the program down, Bingham said he thought the crowd was disappointed during the slow times, but promised that the proper revisions will be made for next year.

Because of the excitement the drag boats created, Bingham said he's looking for more of the top boats.

The Cuckoo's Nest, driven by Tom Wright of Hermiston, Ore., thrilled the crowd, doing the final quarter mile in 5.14 second, reaching 194 mph.

Bingham didn't expect speeds to reach that high because of Burley's high elevation.

**Dutch oven contest reveals few secrets of gourmet cooking**

RUPERT — What's the secret to Dutch oven cooking?

Maybe there isn't one, according to several contestants of the Dutch oven cook-off Thursday afternoon held at the Rupert Square.

"It's so easy it's hard to make mistakes," said Dave Wilson of Rupert. He's been cooking with Dutch ovens for five or six years and has entered several contests.

"You just have to sit back and if it gets too well done you'll know not to cook it as much the next time. But you'll eat it anyway," he said.

His meal, fit for any pioneer, consisted of buffalo roast (complete with potatoes and carrots), journey cake and choke-cherry cake. He purchased the buffalo at Fort Hall for \$6 a pound.

"They guaranteed me it was the real thing," he said.

Journey cake, a kind of corn-bread, was made by pioneers partly because it was good hot or cold.

Wilson said.

He gave a few out-lookers tips of cooking, such as not using too many red-hot charcoal briquets under the ovens. To do so could mean some burnt food, he said.

Down a ways from Wilson were youngsters Preston Smith and Kyle Tarbet of Rupert, hard at work with their Mexican lasagne. The boys first got started with Dutch oven cooking about a year ago in 4-H.

"It was a little hard when we started," Tarbet said.

Tarbet has won awards in the beginner division, winning first place last year and fourth place in an Oakley competition with a pineapple upside-down cake.

Now, Tarbet said, he and Smith enjoy cooking with the Dutch oven.

"We cook at each other's houses," Smith said.

Dutch ovens are very versatile, Wilson said. Anything that can be cooked with an oven or stove can be cooked with Dutch ovens.

"All you have to do is find a way to do it," he said.

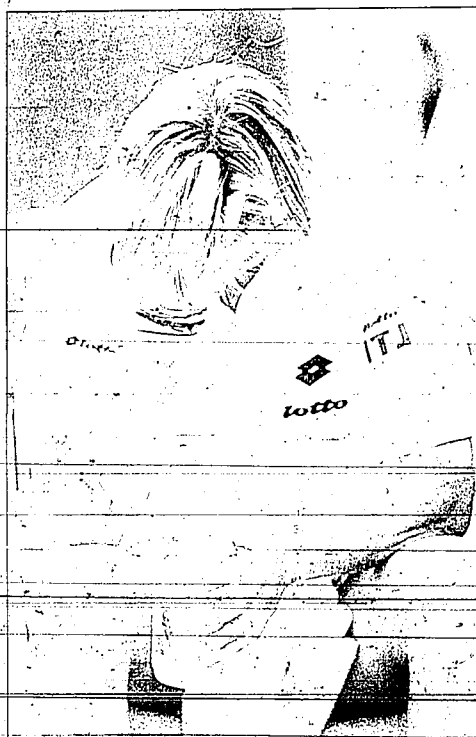
"Those guys capitalized," said Slotten of Grand Junction. "They made us pay for all three walks and added four runs after the error."

## Graf beats Martinez to reach final round

WIMBLEDON, England — It was a case of mystic grass, an enchanted Centre Court bedeviling an old mistress who once held it under her charm.

No matter which side of the net Martina Navratilova played on, the grass betrayed her and favored Jana Novotna.

Of so it seemed to Navratilova, denied a chance for a 10th Wimbledon title by a 6-1, 6-4 loss Thursday in the semifinals.

"The court was really slow on her ball," she said in puzzlement, "and it was really fast on mine."

Novotna will need all the magic she can muster in the final Saturday to beat Steffi Graf, who has kept Centre Court under her spell through four Wimbledon championships in the last five years.

Graf wondered whether she, too, might be tricked by the grass in her semifinal match when she fell behind 1-4, 0-30 against Conchita Martinez. Then, abracadabra, everything turned Graf's way: 11 straight points, a tiebreaker shutout and a second-set romp for a 7-6, 6-3 pass to her sixth Wimbledon final.

"If you see Martina having a tough match and you are down, you say, 'Come on, get yourself together,'" said Graf, who was not all that surprised by Novotna's victory.

"She's got the talent, she's got the guts, and we had a lot of close, close matches last year. I never could figure out why she was unable to get beyond that (one previous Grand Slam final). But I guess she has figured it out now."

In tennis and in business, Novotna has created her own good fortune with an attacking style and brilliant execution that spun Navratilova dizzy.

As early as the third game of the opening set with Navratilova serving, Novotna pushed her to 15-40 with a backhand shot that Navratilova chased down and barely sent back — only to have Novotna smash it with an overhead.

Navratilova saved one break-point but lost the next when she lunged and slipped away Novotna's strategy of pushing her toward the line.

"That set the tone for the rest of the match, Novotna always missing the net like her former Czech compatriot, always getting there a bit quicker and hitting a bit harder from all over the court. Novotna raced to a 5-1 lead before Navratilova had a chance to break a sweat."

"It's not that hard started that slow," Navratilova said. "I never got going. She just made the play every shot. I was digging the whole time."

"I never had a chance to get my own. I didn't lose the match because of nerves. I was busy on the practice court. I didn't feel good, but I thought it would come around. I didn't play well, obviously, but I don't know how much she had to do. I would say the majority of it was me, but she played really, really well. That was the best she ever played. If she plays like that, she can definitely win the final."

# Mystery surrounds Bradley's landing in Philly

## Did Sixers really want the tall, lean center?

PHILADELPHIA — The intrigue surrounding the Philadelphia 76ers and 7-foot-6 Shawn Bradley made for good mystery.

Several hours before Wednesday night's draft a rumor reached 76ers owner Harold Katz and general manager Jimmy Lynam. The word was the Orlando Magic and Golden State Warriors were going to make a deal that would send Bradley to Golden State.

The report indicated Orlando, with the No. 1 pick, would take Bradley and trade him to the Warriors for Antwanne Hardaway, whom Golden State would draft with the third pick.

The 76ers sat in between, holding the No. 2 pick. They wanted Bradley and had made no secret of it. Katz and Lynam see him as the keystone in rebuilding a team that has missed the playoffs the last two seasons and finished 1993 with the third worst record in team history.

Orlando eventually selected Michigan's Chris Webber and Golden State took Hardaway. The Magic dealt Webber to the Warriors for Hardaway and three first-round picks.

The 76ers didn't sit back when they heard the rumor. It appears they got word to Orlando and Golden State that if the deal went through, Philadelphia would sabotage it by taking Hardaway. Then Orlando would have to deal with Philadelphia to get Hardaway, and there was no way they'd get three first-round draft picks.

Maybe it was a bluff. Maybe it wasn't. Katz was asked about it Thursday at a news conference to introduce Bradley. The 76ers owner said whether that was why the rumored deal didn't go through "doesn't really matter. Shawn is here. We wanted

But this marvelous 6-foot-7 guard from Memphis State may be as close as the league gets to rekindling Magic.

# Canseco's career could be over

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Jose Canseco said Thursday that an elbow ligament tear will end his season and the Texas Rangers outfielder said it may possibly end his baseball career.

Canseco said an examination by orthopedist James Andrews confirmed he had a tear in his right elbow, likely related to a brief pitching appearance in May. But Canseco said he wanted to "weigh the pros and cons" a day or two before deciding whether to have surgery.

"I figured, being very positive, maybe it was a strained ligament and it would heal without surgery," Canseco said at a news conference. "But it's a torn ligament."

Canseco, who is making \$4.1 million this year, said the minimum recovery time for such an injury is six months to a year. He is guaranteed \$4.4 million for 1994 and \$5.1 million for 1995.

He said there was no guarantee the injury could be fixed even if he

decided to have the surgery. Asked whether his career may be over, the former Oakland Athletics star said, "Anything can happen."

The Rangers planned to release a statement later in the day.

Canseco pitched an inning on May 29 at Boston in a 15-1 Texas loss. The right fielder, who once pitched an inning in Class AAA ball, said he felt a sharp pain in his elbow on his second pitch but stayed in and threw 31 more pitches.

"I didn't really realize the severity of it at the time," he said. He allowed two hits and three runs, all earned, while walking three.

Since then, Canseco said, the elbow has been hurting.

"It was depressing for the point

where it was getting extremely bad," he said. Barring was difficult, he said, but throwing was even worse.

Canseco said precautions were taken before Texas manager Kevin Kennedy decided to let him pitch, but he also said his arm might have been hurt before he entered the game. He said he wouldn't pitch again.

The injury was another disappointment in a rough year for Canseco, best known this season for letting a fly ball bounce off his head for a home run. He is hitting .255 with 10 homers, 46 RBIs and 62 strikeouts.

"It was a disappointing season for me personally because I didn't have the numbers I wanted," he said.

Canseco said he didn't know whether Andrews or another doctor would perform any operation. Andrews treated Chicago White Sox star Bo Jackson for a hip injury.

# Cleveland keeps logo; reaction mixed

CLEVELAND (AP) — The reaction was mixed Thursday over the Cleveland Indians' decision to keep their grinning "Chief Wahoo" logo when the team moves to the new Gateway Stadium in 1994.

"We are very happy, very excited about this," said Sarah Norman of the Save Our Chief group, which collected 10,000 signatures asking the Indians to keep the logo.

On the other hand, American Indian groups who have lobbied for years to drop the bearded, wide-eyed logo, say it is a racially insensitive caricature.

Clark Hosick, of Alaska's Tlingit tribe, said the American Indian community will continue to protest use of the logo.

"The logo is still insulting," said Hosick, executive director of the North American Indian Cultural Center, a non-profit social service organization in Akron.

Hosick said the Indians' name and logo encouraged stereotypical comments, like "the Indians scalped" or other team.

"By doing away with the logo, hopefully some of this would disappear," Hosick said.

The Rev. Jesse Jackson, in a statement released by his Rainbow Coalition, called the decision to keep the logo unfortunate.

"If the team was called the Cleveland Negroes and African Americans, voiced their outrage, the name would be changed," he said. "But since the Native American Indians population in Cleveland is small, the management didn't feel compelled to change the status quo."

The 1990 census reported that about 20,000 American Indians lived in Ohio, more than half of them in northeast Ohio cities, including Cleveland, Akron, Lorain and Youngstown, Hosick said.

Club owner Richard Jacobs announced Wednesday that the team would keep the name Indians and the logo. He cited historic reasons, including the use of versions of the

"Chief Wahoo" logo since 1915 and the current one since 1952.

Sports columnist Bill Livingston wrote in The Plain Dealer on Thursday that the team's decision meant "the American Indian equivalent of Little League Sambo lives on," but he said the logo may not be racist, "but he is the next worst thing — a symbol of thoughtlessness and condescension."

Jim Ingraham of The News-Herald of Willoughby said the decision prompted the idea that "Wahoo" now has more security than third-year manager Mike Hargrove. The Indians are in sixth place in the American League East.

While the logo remains, Jacobs said a huge "Chief Wahoo" sign on Cleveland Stadium won't move to the new stadium.

The sign, erected in 1962, is too old to move, Jacobs said.

The Save Our Chief group is looking for a museum or other suitable location for the sign, Norman said. The team hasn't sanctioned the search and hasn't said what will become of the sign.

# Women face dilemma over sex appeal

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Women's sports is in a quandary.

To attract the much-needed male fans, organizations such as the LPGA regularly include biographical information in their programs and guides that are not included in men's sports.

By leading through the LPGA media guide, for example, you will find that Deborah McLaughlin is "6'0, blond hair, gaudy brown eyes," and enjoys a totally vegetarian diet, music, yoga, boogie boarding and watching sunsets at the beach. There also is a beautiful picture, done by a modeling agency.

Her galleries are loaded with testosterone. She earned \$35,335 in 1992, but at least doubted that via posters, endorsements and appearances.

"Would a poster of Freddie Couples in a Speedo sell?" she asked at the

McDonald's Classic in Wilmington, Del. recently. "Probably not."

"But I don't wear anything I feel uncomfortable in. It may be different than normal golfwear, but it's not sexually provocative attire. I just do it to have fun, to show my personality, that's it. The line says there, I don't go out thinking, 'Oh, I hope I have a bunch of men in my gallery.' That's ridiculous."

Women's track, too, has become an underwear show, evidenced by track star Jackie Joyner-Kersey's provocative wear. It sells the athlete. It sells the sport. Question is: Does it also sell sex?

"With the men, they can market just the girl," said McLaughlin, a former four-grade teacher. "We have the ability to also market personality looks. We have that extra for advertising, if you want to."

Not coincidentally, perhaps, harassment at programs has been a significant problem, Dickerson said, although less so in recent years. Not coincidentally, perhaps, the LPGA also is a magnet for less-than-balanced male fans.

They write, they call. They hound. Sometimes, they even get close enough to touch. That's what really scares women athletes about men who stalk. They get close enough to touch.

When Monica Seles was stabbed while seated on a tennis court in Gery, many last month, it haunted more than a few women athletes. Last year, a man was spotted entering an LPGA tournament with a gun in his front seat.

A California man was banned from tournaments last year after he followed golfer Nancy Lopez to several sites.

# NAACP, Charlotte NFL group ink pact

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — The group trying to win an NFL franchise for Charlotte signed an agreement Thursday with the NAACP that will allow minorities to participate in the operation of the club.

Principals for both sides met at the Greater Charlotte Chamber of Commerce offices, and in summit-like surroundings signed a "Fair Share" agreement. It will commit the bidding group, Richardson Sports, to achieving levels of representation for blacks and other minorities in the proposed franchise.

The signing followed a similar ceremony in Baltimore, where the NAACP reached an agreement with Flagstar Corp., owned by Spartanburg, S.C., businessman Jerry Richardson. The \$1.01 billion deal covers seven years and is to provide an avenue for minorities to own and operate restaurants in the corporation.

"I hope this agreement today will serve as a model for all of professional sports," said Benjamin Chavis, executive director of the NAACP. "I hope that the agreement we signed earlier today in Baltimore will serve as a model for all of corporate America."

Under the agreement, Richardson Sports and the Carolina Stadium Corp. will emphasize opportunities to minorities in management, advertising, marketing, concessions, purchasing and stadium construction.

The goal is 15 to 25 percent minority representation in management and 20 percent in non-management jobs.

The groups will review their progress periodically with the NAACP.

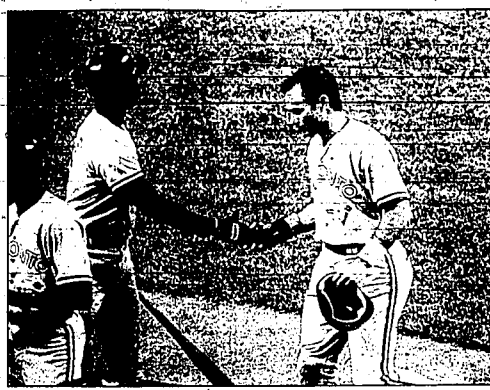
Among other goals in the agreement:

- Promote African-American and other minority suppliers.
- Try to do business with African-American and other minority vendors in areas such as security, floral services, groundskeeping and placement services.

Provide a headline for companies trying to do business with the team.

Chavis also committed the NAACP to helping Charlotte secure the franchise. The NFL's expansion committee is expected to decide in late October, picking two cities from among five candidates.

Jacksonville, Fla., Memphis, Tenn., Baltimore and St. Louis are also bidding for a team.

BALTIMORE — With half the season still to play, it's already clear that Toronto, baseball's world champion, once again is the class of the American League.

For the information of the Baltimore Orioles and anyone else planning to overtake the Blue Jays, things could get even worse before they get better.

That's the feeling of the Red Sox's Sam Mele, who scouted the entire Oriole homestead that ended Wednesday night.

"The Blue Jays will pick up another starting pitcher for the rest of the season," said Mele. "I'm sure of it. They've done it in the past."

Toronto added David Cone last year. The year before that it was Tom Candiotti.

"You've got to hand it to Toronto's general manager, Pat Gillick. He's lost a lot of talent after they won the World Series but he's filled the holes and already his club is back in first place."

"Toronto doesn't make many mistakes. They have talent. They score a lot of runs. They switch hit. The Orioles need pitcher Mike Mussina had if they're going to contend. (Mark) McLemore is amazing for a guy who just switched to the outfield. He throws to the right base. He hits the cutoff man."

"I think the kid (Jeffrey Hammonds) is going to be a helluva ballplayer. He's going to make contact. I saw the Yankees' Bob Wickman get him out the other night." The next time up, Hammonds hit the same pitch for a base hit.

Sam Mele has seen it all in baseball.

He played 10 years in the American League, one of those with the Orioles in 1954, Baltimore's first year back in the majors. That club went 54-100, finished seventh and drew 1,060,910 — less than a third what the Orioles will draw this year.

## Mighty Mississippi swamps the Midwest Deluge of rain causes millions of dollars in damage

Pete Peterson doesn't need shoes at work these days.

He does need a canoe. And it's park-out back.

Larry Kapinus would like to work in his fields. But the corn is knee-high — and the water is chest-high.

Along the upper Mississippi, there's water, water, everywhere it shouldn't be — from basements to baseball diamonds, factory floors to farm fields. Crops are destroyed, businesses closed, barge traffic stopped and the worst flooding since 1965 promises to leave a painful legacy: hundreds of millions of dollars in losses.

"It's shut down a very large portion of the transportation system of

the country," said a frustrated Buddy Compton, chairman of the River Invention Action Committee, a St. Louis-based barge operator's group. "We have to sit until the water comes down, but it keeps raining."

"The people in the city don't realize it's going to cost them," said Kapinus, a farmer near waterlogged Prairie du Chien, Wis. "Pretty soon it'll have to be passed on. There's a lot of pain out there."

The unusual summer flood has halted commercial traffic on a 400-mile stretch of river from southern Minnesota to St. Louis — the main Midwest route for hundreds of thousands of tons of grain, petroleum products, coal and other cargo each week.

Compton has estimated the industry

is losing \$1 million a day. The Army Corps of Engineers says it could be two more weeks before the water recedes to levels where all locks on the Mississippi can be reopened.

The flood has forced evacuations, sidelined cruise boats and pushed some July Fourth riverfront activities in St. Louis to higher ground.

In Davenport, Iowa, the river's expected to crest Saturday at 22.3 feet, more than 7 feet above flood level but short of a record. The post office has relocated, the minor league baseball team has moved out of town and businesses — some located on River Drive — are trying to stay afloat in waist-high water.

"We'll stay open as long as we can get trucks in and out," said Peterson, who owns a paper company. He has a canoe to ferry workers and materials and has gone barefoot because the water is above his boots.

"I had a tetanus shot a couple of weeks ago," he jokes, "so I'm safe."

More wet weather soaked parts of the Midwest on Wednesday night. Quincy, Ill., was drenched with 6.06 inches of rain, and the Army Corps reported Thursday that Keokuk, Ill., and Burlington, Iowa, had record river levels.

But there was relief, too. In Prairie du Chien, the river dropped 6 inches Wednesday night. And locks in Minnesota have opened as the river has crested and water has receded.

President Clinton said Thursday he will ask Congress for money to assist flooded farmers, a day after Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy toured four soaked states.

"It's a very, very serious thing for the farmers," Clinton said. "It is the most rain they've had in over a hundred years."

Wisconsin Gov. Tommy G. Thompson has estimated flood damage in 30 counties at \$175 million, including \$124 million to farm fields and crops. And in Iowa, soybean losses are estimated at \$750 million and the corn acreage is expected to be lower than it has been since the drought of 1988.

Fields of dreams have turned into ponds of despair: sickly, yellow stunted crops instead of rich green, waist-high cornstalks, the landscape marred by liquid potholes.

"It's heart-breaking," Russell Newhall, a farmer near Dumont, Iowa, said surveying a pile of 50-pound of soybean seeds he had hoped to plant. "We've been waiting since the middle of April. We said we needed two good weeks to get into the fields. It just never came."

Calls to one rural Iowa hot line have been at levels approaching the death of the farm crisis. One county sealer said she heard of a farmer who called Thursday and was contemplating suicide because of a tough year.

"No, all problems are on land. Neil Diehl, chairman of Ingram

Barge Co. in Nashville, Tenn., has nearly 300 barges trapped along the river.

"Once you've lost the day of movement, then you simply have lost the opportunity to gain any revenue," he said. "It's gone. I don't

care how fast you try to move. You cannot make it up."

"It's a mess," agreed Compton, the barge group chairman. "We're all struggling together. It's going to be a long time before we recover from this one."

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## THE ACES ON BRIDGE

BOBBY WOLFF

*"Virtue is bold, and goodness never fearful."*  
— Shakespeare.

When a declarer thinks he has you trapped; it's time to think of bold measures. Put yourself in today's West chair and see if you can escape South's trap.

You win your club king, while noting East's try, so you switch to the diamond king. Dummy wins, trumps are drawn and South stuffs you on play with a diamond. What do you lead after you cash your last diamond?

It's dangerous to try to exit safely via a high club. East's jump to four clubs and his play of the try at TRICK "one" virtually "promised" that East had seven clubs. Therefore, the sluff and ruff would be a losing play. So the only remaining option is to lead a heart. But which heart should you choose?

A low heart will blow the game. South will allow this to ride to his A-3, and the jack will force his ace. Next, he will finesse against your heart queen and he will have no heart loser.

The winning exit is a bold heart queen. Regardless of where South wins this trick, he cannot play the hearts himself without a loser.

Note that the bold play of the heart queen gives away nothing, but doesn't hold the jack or ace, there is no escape, and if he does, the heart queen is the best play.

## Vintage car enthusiasts take show on the road

Summer's the time for hot nights and cool cars, which gave Stacy Knutson an idea. Why not, the 21-year-old Filer High School graduate wondered, as she watched the Blue Lakes Boulevard North cruise filter past one Friday night, turn a rite of summer into a car show?

The result is tonight's unofficial classic cruise, a collection of 20 to 30 restored vintage cars that will prowled the Ernest-Frosty Mug leg of Blue Lakes singly and severally from 8 p.m. to midnight.

"I drive a '64 Mercury, and whenever I take it out on Blue Lakes on a Friday or Saturday night, the kids all crowd around and want to know all about it," Knutson said. "So I figured, why not pick a summer night and show 'em all off?"

There will be mint-bright Model-

A's and '57 Chevys, and probably a cross-section of every other classic automobile that Magic Valley car-lovers like to restore, Knutson guesses.

"It's kind of snowballed," she said. "I call people to ask if they want to show their cars and they say they've already heard about it."

Knutson said she cleared the event with several North Blue property owners and the Twin Falls police, who warned her that they'd ticket even classic cars whose drivers didn't have valid licenses.

"They told us to mind our P's and Q's," she said.

Tom Parker, traffic safety officer for the Twin Falls police department, said he hadn't talked with Knutson about her plans, but said he knew of no city ordinance that cruisers would violate unless they attempted to drive as a parade.

"The city doesn't have an ordinance against cruising, and un-

less they obstruct traffic or trespass on private property, there's nothing we can do about it," he said.

On a typical summertime Friday night, North Blue is chock-a-block with more recent vintage Datsuns, Toyotas and Fords full of cruising teenagers.

"We're not out there to cause any more problems," Knutson said. "It's just a good place to show our cars."

And there are plenty of old cars to show. The Twin Falls area has several car-restorers' clubs.

One of them, the Magic Valley Early Iron, sponsored a show last spring that drew more than 150 entries, including, for the first time, three of Stacy's father's cars.

That's where Stacy caught the old-car bug. Gerald, Stacy's father, has been restoring Eisenhower-era iron for two decades.

"It's just a hobby that kind of kept going," said Gerald, who

owns Knutson Knutson's home in Filer. "My wife has several restored cars, but not from straight parts. Stacy was really the only one who got into it."

"My sisters think cars are for boys," she said. "I got interested when I was about a freshman in high school because I wanted a car."

Now Stacy, who works in a Twin Falls photo lab, helps on her dad's various restoration projects and scrounges warehouses and a junkyard that her uncle owns in northern Idaho for parts.

"My dad's problem is that once he finishes an old car he can't make himself sell it," she said. "That's my problem too."

At the moment, she's looking for a 1955, 1956 or 1957 Ford Thunderbird to restore. Pricetag once it's finished: \$50,000.

"Any of those models," she said. "I'm not fussy."

# 9 area schools, arts groups share \$26,933 in grants

**BOISE** — The Idaho Commission on the Arts has awarded grants totaling \$26,933 to nine Magic Valley Wood River valley school districts and arts groups for the 1994 fiscal year.

The commission made its annual allocations announcement Thursday at a series of news conferences around the state, including one at the Twin Falls Public Library.

The \$40,347 earmarked at the commission's meeting June 24-27 comes

most from the state, supplemented by money from the National Endowment for the Arts and various private-sector donations.

The largest single south-central Idaho recipient was the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities, which got \$10,000 for general operating support. The center is a non-profit organization, supported largely by grants from the Ingot Trust and the Sun Valley Co., that sponsors a wide range of performing and visual arts in the Wood River Valley.

The Twin Falls-based Magic Valley Arts Council, another non-profit arts support group, received two grants totaling \$4,940. A grant for \$3,940 will go for general operating support and \$1,000 was earmarked for the Hispanic Heritage Fiesta.

Other Magic Valley recipients included:

- College of Southern Idaho, \$3,375, for its Arts on Tour season.
- Buhl's Popplewell Elementary School, \$1,858, for a residency in mixed media.

Owin Falls School District, \$1,980, for a residency in the visual arts.

Minidoka County School District, \$1,563, for performances by Idaho Theater for Youth at the district's Pershing, Memorial and Acequia elementary schools and at Rupert's St. Nicholas Catholic School.

Jerome School District, \$992, for a residency in African history and dance at Central Elementary School.

Valley School District, \$875, for the Edna-Hazelton Elementary School for a residency in visual arts.

In addition, CSI received a Western States Arts Federation grant for \$1,350 for a performance by Faustwerk Mask Theater. WESTAF, composed of arts-support organizations in the 12 Western states, makes grants to schools and other recipients in those states.

Statewide, 130 groups, individuals and schools in 43 communities received grants from the arts council, a 13-member state board appointed by the governor charged with making the arts available to all citizens of Idaho.

age, color, religion, gender or appearance should report the offending company to the EEOC (Equal Employment Opportunity Commission) for discriminatory hiring practices. **DEAR ABBY:** I know that lots of cat lovers read your column, but I must disclose this current information: The Washington Department of Wildlife has published the following facts in its newsletter for Spring 1993: • A four-year study done in Wisconsin estimated that the number of songbirds killed by domestic cats (in that state alone) was 19 million, and the number of game birds killed by domestic cats was approximately 140,000. • Much cat-hunting is not witnessed because cats hunt at night - usually in a neighbor's back yard.

• Collar bells on cats won't work because birds and other wildlife don't associate the ringing with being stalked or attacked. • Declawing a cat does not provide safety either. The feline merely bats down its prey. • Confining the cat works best in deterring it from destroying wildlife. An outdoor cat lives an average of three to five years - whereas confined cats can reach 17 years or longer. • Neutering and spaying help cut down the cat population. Ordinances should be developed requiring spaying and neutering, as well as confinement, because some cat owners are not convinced of the great amount of damage their pet is causing. **GENE DIERING, ANACORTES, WASH.**

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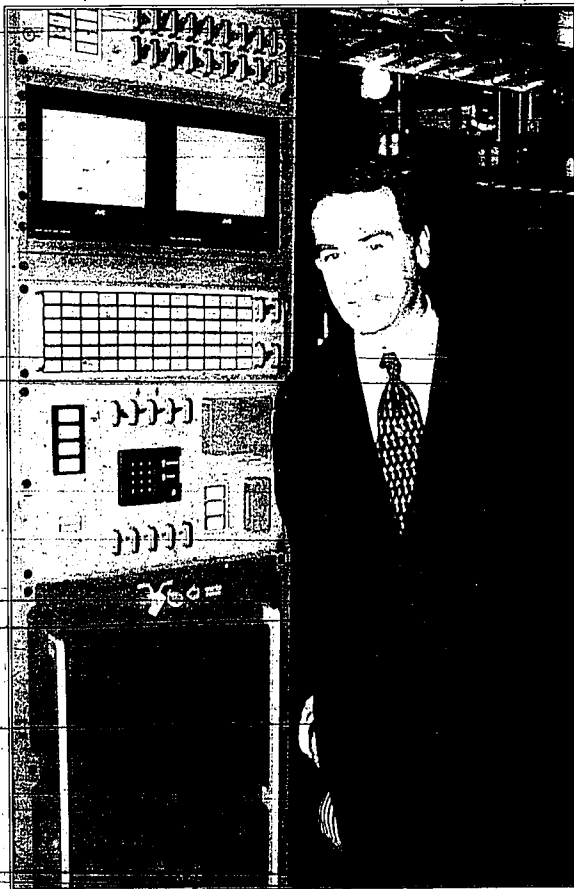

NEW YORK — Dean Stockwell hosts an intriguing look at the inner workings of the world of video surveillance and how it helps expose crime on "Caught-In-The-Act," a one-hour special from dick Clark productions, inc., in association with Garrison Broadcasting at 8 p.m. MDT Wednesday on NBC (KUTV, K38AS and KIFI).

## FOX's '12:01' parallels 'Groundhog Day' plot

Bill Murray could make a gimmick like the one that propels "12:01" work. Murray's charmed comedic flare did make it work in "Groundhog Day."

Jonathan Silverman, the star of "12:01," is no Bill Murray. That is the insurmountable shortcoming in this week's Monday Fox movie.

The hook of "12:01" and "Groundhog Day" is identical. A mysterious glitch leads to the same day being repeated over and over and over and over and over again. The execution of this premise in "12:01" is as tedious as the construction of the preceding sentence.

Silverman plays Barry Fierman, a low level employee at a high-tech company. His sloppy work habits and all-around clumsiness has him on the cusp of being an ex-employee.

Barry is painfully aware that he desperately needs to get a life. He's such a nerd he doesn't know where to look for it.

He compensates by fantasizing from afar about one of the company's stars, a scientist named Lisa-Fredericks. Two problems: Lisa, played by Helen Slater, has no idea even if he did, her nickname is "The Ice Princess."

In any case, Barry is hesitant to approach her, lest he "ruin their relationship."

On the momentous day, Barry writes a letter about a girl killed for no apparent reason as she leaves work. Heartbroken, he cancels his other plans and retreats to his home,

where his klutziness pays off. Trying to repair a broken lamp, he all but electrocutes himself at one minute past midnight.

That is when a shocking turn of events that he is not cognizant of a bizarre circumstance occurring simultaneously: The clock has rewound a full 24 hours. He doesn't begin to become aware of this until the morning when he awakens to the same TV show as the day before and finds what he considers to be yesterday's newspaper at his doorstep.

The sensible thing to do in this situation would be to face to the track, after a stop to buy Yonko tickets.

Barry, however, still doesn't comprehend what is happening, so he goes to work. It's only when every incident from the preceding day replays itself that he starts to suspect he has traveled backward in time.

The clincher comes when he notices Lisa, alive and unfringed, across the room.

What a way to break the ice. "Hi, you don't know me but I saw you being shot to death yesterday, which is really today, so don't go out the back door at the end of work, be careful and everything will be fine. By the way, my name is Barry."

To her credit, Lisa doesn't have him clapped immediately into a strait jacket. She just gives him a forceful broom.

From there it becomes a day-by-day process of wearing down Lisa's reluctance to believe his story, which he does by presenting "minireviews" before they happen.

Alas, viewers are likely to be worn down, too, in seeing the same scenes play out again and again.

## Producer: Bold new detective series will not be toned down

LOS ANGELES (AP) — There is general agreement that Steven Bochco's new series "NYPD Blue" is very good drama. There is less accord on whether it is good for television.

The series, part of ABC's fall lineup, has generated murmurs from admiring but uneasy network affiliates who have viewed it, and yowls of protest from a conservative watchdog group that hasn't.

Racy dialogue and nudity have raised cautionary flags in the advertising community as well.

Bochco said he may make minor changes in the show before it airs, but there will be no fundamental ones. "What do you think of that?" he said in a light yet challenging tone.

There is no reason to strip "NYPD Blue" of every trace of sex and profanity, the creator of such TV hits as "Hill Street Blues" and "L.A. Law" insisted.

"The vast, vast majority of Americans are more than content to make up their own minds about what they see as well as the dangers of real life under cover work during a sting operation and a raid on illegal gun runners. It is not once compelling, repellent and touching — Bochco and crew at their best. Flawed good guys skitter across moral boundaries, trying hard to keep their footing and their souls intact.

"NYPD Blue" includes flashes of nudity and violence and a dollop or two of gutter talk.

In one scene, Franz's character angrily confronts a female prosecutor, then grabs his crotch and shows a few crudities. In another, he's shown in a steazy clutch with a prostitute.

Caruso's character and a female officer flash their biceps in another bedroom scene — all meshing with Bochco's own prediction that he would produce TV's first R-rated series.

These scenes are a fractional part of the hourlong drama. But even a few bold strokes on a network TV series can take on a surprising power.

"But my personal opinion is its got elements that are not going to sit well in Wichita," he said in a telephone interview.

At 5:30 p.m. EDT, Letterman strode onto the stage to thunderous applause and said, "You're looking at a very excited man. For the very first time, NBC has named me employee of the month ... I guess what I'm really gonna miss is that vague, subtle tension between me and Garriek Uley."

"Oh, and of course there had to be one last (G) joke: 'If General Electric had a sense of humor, they'd send a guy in here right now to fire me.'"

But in the end, Letterman was gracious. At the conclusion of the show, which ran seven minutes longer than

## Final show's ratings double normal

Letterman's last "Late Night" averaged a 7.4 rating (percentage of the 47.2 million TV homes in the 29 surveyed markets) and a 27 share (percentage of the sets in use). That far surpasses the 3.6 rating and 18 share "Late Night" posted in the overnight survey the Friday before.

A comparison: following the May 20 "Cheers" farewell, "Late Night" earned similar numbers to those last Friday, garnering a 7.4/33.

"Hillary is one of those actresses who is there one hundred percent and she gives an enormous amount of balance to every scene we're in. She definitely is not one of

**STATS:** Born June 30, 1918, in Brooklyn, N.Y. "Edythe" Marjorie "Atteridge" high school in Brooklyn. Married twice; her first husband was actor Jess Barker; they had twin sons.

**IN EARLY YEARS:** Hayward was a hat model in New York when she was brought to Hollywood in 1932 to test for the role of Scarlett O'Hara in "Gone with the Wind." She made her movie debut in "Hollywood Hotel" in 1937. As a Paramount contract player, she did minor roles and worked up to starring roles, and, in 1947, the first of five Oscar nominations, for "Smash-Up: The Story of a Woman." The other nominations: "My Foolish Heart,"

1950, "With a Song in My Heart," 1952; "I'll Cry Tomorrow," 1956; and her winning role, "Wife to Live" in 1958.

**FAMOUS FOR:** Her red hair, husky voice, and specially role as the woman struggling back from adversity.

**IN RECENT YEARS:** After a series of poor movies — although 1967's "Valley of the Dolls" has since become a cult favorite — Hayward retired. She did one more feature, "The Revengers" in 1972 and several TV movies, also in the 1970s. Hayward died of a brain tumor in 1975.

# July Fourth concert a party on Capitol lawn — or at home

The concert at the Capitol is free, but the stars are big-time: an energetic Broadway star who's won all the entertainment industry's biggest awards; a hometown girl who made it big in the country-music industry; a piano virtuoso who cut 23 albums in eight years; and a black-led legend of country, Western and rock music.

Like all Fourth of July concerts in Washington, this one has a second act: Are the rousing Sousa marches, there are fireworks from the Washington Monument grounds.

This year's 1½-hour concert, the 13th Independence Day concert aired by station WETA for PBS stations, starts at 8 p.m. MDT Sunday on KPTV.

For Americans, the Fourth is one big party. For Jerry Colbert, who produces two live-and-televized concerts from the West Lawn of the U.S. Capitol each warm-weather season, "A Capitol Fourth" is the lighter one. The Memorial Day concert is always a bit tricky: It's a holiday honoring death and sacrifice in the name of the nation. Colbert's task is to blend dramatic readings with music, both serious and uplifting, and appropriate film footage for the PBS television audience.

In May he arranged for the super-size Super Bowl screen to hang suspended from a crane so the audience on the Capitol lawn

could see that footage too.

Colbert was pleased with this year's results, which honored veterans from the Civil War through both World Wars, Korea, Vietnam, the Persian Gulf and Somalia.

"I think it crystallized," he said. More than that, it turned out to be the highest-rated Memorial Day concert of them all, coming in fifth on PBS's all-time list of music-performance specials during a Sunday-evening timeslot that pitted it against CBS's venerable "60 Minutes."

Still, the threat of the inevitable glitch always hovers over live television. This time it was an electronic overload at the Capitol just before the finale that unexpectedly killed the klieg lights.

Many people sitting on the West Lawn thought the sudden darkness was simply a dramatic ending to the show. The stalwart National Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of guest conductor Erich Kunzel, played on by the small-lights of their music stands.

Presumably, the TV audience never knew, watching taped footage (which also showed on the large screen hanging behind the stage) until the show's end.

For this year's "A Capitol Fourth," performers are Rita Moreno, the only woman to have won the Tony, Emmy, Oscar, Grammy and Golden Globe awards; Mary-Chapin Carpenter, the Country Music Association's

Female Vocalist of the Year and holder of two Grammys; double Grammy-winning pianist Peter Nero; and singer/composers Johnny Cash and June Carter Cash, sing "Strike Up the Band" and "I'd Like to Be in America," from "West Side Story," the production that won her a best supporting actress Oscar for her role as Anita.

Alexandria, Va., resident Carpenter will sing her own "Down in Mary's Land." "I Am a Town," and her Grammy-winning "Down at the Twist and Shout," a tribute to a Bethesda, Md., lounge.

Carpenter began her singing career during an open-mike session at a D.C. nightclub in 1977. Her debut album was "Hometown Girl" in 1987. By 1990, she was the Academy of Country Music's Top New Female Vocalist, and in 1992 she was named Country Music Association's Female Vocalist of the Year.

Nero, whose "Rhapsody in Blue" will be leced with Gershwin variations, including excerpts from "An American in Paris," gives more than 100 recital and symphony concerts for the Philadelphia Pops, pop-music director/advisor for the Tulsa Philharmonic, and pop-music director for the Florida Philharmonic.

Johnny Cash, who holds seven Grammy Awards and has made 470 albums, is the only

member of both the Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame and the Country Music Hall of Fame. He's also in the Songwriters Hall of Fame and one of nine Grammy "Living Legends." June Carter Cash, his wife of 25 years, is a songwriter who has branched out to writing screenplays, short stories and a cookbook. The Cashes are scheduled to perform her composition, "Rings of Fire," he'll also sing, "Jackson." Also on the card are a *hoochie* featuring the five Fiddle Puppers dancers and a medley of songs from "Oklahoma!" by the National Symphony Orchestra and Sgt. Alvie Powell, soloist.

E.G. Marshall, who recently marked his 83rd birthday, returned to host, and Erich Kunzel, music director of the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra, conducts the NSO.

Military units will include a joint-services color guard, the Army's Old Guard Fifth & Drum Corps, the Army Herald Trumpets, the U.S. Army Chorus and the Air Force Singing Sergeants.

Col. John Burgouis will conduct the 75th member Marine Band, known as the "President's Own." Earlier in its history, the band was conducted by John Philip Sousa, whose marches traditionally end the program.

The program will be simulcast over National Public Radio and carried in more than 135 countries worldwide over the Armed Forces Radio and Television Network.

## PBS to debut outdoor series 'Make Your Own Adventure'

NEW-YORK (AP) — It's just before dawn. Crows, loud as small birds, have carried their raucous turf war into the trees above our unappreciated camper's serene, semidetached shelter in Queens. His eyes open slowly, unfocused.

This is no bucolic wonderland. But this is where this camper will watch "Trailside: Make Your Own Adventure," a new outdoor how-to series debuting in July on PBS (check local listings).

The program, says a release, will "show viewers how they can successfully experience the world of backpacking, camping, kayaking, cross-country skiing and other outdoor activities in all seasons, under a variety of conditions."

Episode 1: Mountain biking in Utah!  
Our camper gushes nervously and sighs the news release for mention of gin and cigarettes. No mention.

He brushes his teeth in a cool, refreshing stream-and-bathes-in-a-gonzo, cascading waterfall. Pick downpour. He clambers up a steep incline of videocassettes and crawls in his rough leathers to the couch and hits the remote.

"Trailside" opens with plugs aplenty: Chevy trucks ("It's possible to have fun outdoors and still leave Mother Nature with a smile on her face!"), L.L. Bean sporting goods and HI-Tec footwear.

"Trailside" host John Viehman, editor of Backpacker magazine and the most comfortable outdoors host since Marlin Perkins, stands on White Rim Trail near Moab, Utah, in spectacular Canyonlands National Park.

He and guest biker Lu Warner wear bike helmets and spectacular Lycra pants — what the outdoor catalogues call "climbing suits." Viehman's delivery is uninflected, and reaches his teaching points in a desperate, forced march. His attempts at spontaneity are so touchingly unfunny they're funny.

"Look at that!" he marvels flatly. "Those are some gnarly turns down there, Lu."

Descending rocky trail, it's time we "practice some of those downhill skills," Warner notes. Keep your weight back; your cranks horizontal and don't lock up the front brake. Later comes spike-tightening and tire repair.

"So far, the trail's been carried the show," Warner declares to the camera. "It's so frustrating, yet it's so fragile, isn't it?" says Viehman. Sure is, John.

One down on the flats and pedaling along, Viehman is perceptive: "Looks like we've got a hill ahead, Lu."

"Yeah, we do," Warner replies. "One of the most important things about mountain biking is to anticipate upcoming changes in terrain, and shift before it's too late." Gee, John, mountain biking is kind of like life, isn't it?

"They make camp at 'Site A.' In the distance are the small blue domes of other campers; bikers, hikers, skiers, and kayakers, tenting and sleeping systems."

Viehman scoops water the color of teal coffee from the Colorado River. He tells us it contains plenty of sediment and contaminants from agricultural runoff. Let it settle, use a good filter, and it's fine. Sure, John. You first.

Our boys and our gear. Sam Ballantyne, a petite character, meets with legs like coiled steel springs. She's pedaled in to coach Viehman in uphill technique and "attitude."

"Careful, John!" calls Lu. "She's a rad desert Bitch!"

Back in Queens, our camper hits the remote with a desperate stab and never learns those update techniques. He stares into the middle distance.

Outside, the crows are warring like rowtweilers. Our camper sighs contentedly.

Once again, smiling Mother Nature and the people who insist her are safely at bay, out there on the other side of the burglar bars.

## All new TV sets to have closed-caption capability

Starting this week, purchasers of new TV sets will have closed-captioning technology available. The technology is so simple that it can be as easy as a flip of the switch.

A federal law that takes effect Thursday requires television manufacturers to equip all new sets 13 inches or larger with built-in capability to display captions, or subtitles, if the viewer wants. For the last 13 years, viewers had to purchase a special decoding device that attached to the set to get access to the captions, which program producers had to have scrambled into the TV signal.

The technology originally was developed to enable the nation's 24 million deaf and hearing-impaired people to enjoy television by putting subtitles on the screen that they could read to know what the character, narrator, journalist or announcer was saying.

But the new law also has enormous potential benefits for many viewers whose hearing is fine. For some, it might be as simple as making it possible to watch television in a noisy setting such as a bar or an airport, or when someone else is sleeping in the same room. In the United Kingdom, the 27 million illiterate adults and the 12 million schoolchildren learning to read, captioning could turn TV into a free, 24-hour classroom.

"This is a major milestone in television," said Gerald Dominick, chairman of the captioning issues committee for

the Greater Los Angeles Association of the Deaf.

About 40 percent of all decoders sold in the last few years went to non-English speakers trying to learn the language, said Debra Davis Povar of the National Captioning Institute, which places captions in programs. Suddenly, the image of Daryl Hannah watching a mermaid movie "Splash" doesn't seem so strange.

Experiments in captioning started in the early 1970s, but it was not until 1980 that the National Captioning Institute brought the technology of "closed captioning," which adds the subtitles from anyone who didn't want to see them to the deaf and hearing-impaired on "The Wonderful World of Disney" and "Mastertape Theatre."

Today, nearly all of network and PBS prime-time shows have captions, as do more than 250 hours a week of cable programming and about 4,500 home videos.

With the implementation of the Television Decoder Circuitry Act, passed in 1990, viewers will no longer be required to purchase costly decoders (retailing \$130 to \$240) to watch captioned programs, nor will they be confined to their homes for captioned entertainment. Almost any new TV set purchased in the United States will have the decoding circuitry built in, with activation as simple as the push of a button.

"Television is a great communication tool," said Peter Povar. "Can you imagine if half the adult illiterate population could learn to read in the privacy of their own homes?"

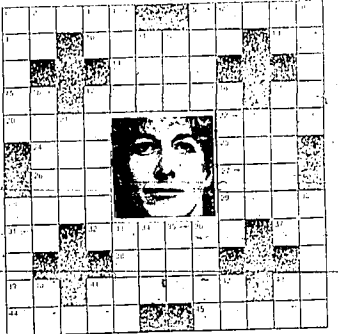

# Price's choice of clubs turns into saga 'All My Putters'

DALLAS — What's a putter worth? In Nick Price's case, a lot. Namely, controversy—principles, a Dallas link and victory.

The controversy—and principles involve a Ray Cook M1-X putter that, despite success, he ditched before the U.S. Open because upset about advertisements in the manufacturer ran. The local tie-in involves the Dallas Golf Co.-made Pyramid, a similar mallet-headed putter, that Price used in tying for 11th in the U.S. Open 10 days ago. And the victory involves another similar putter, borrowed from fellow pro Denis Watson, that Price stroked in winning the Greater Hartford Open on Sunday.

During his hot-streak covering victories in the PGA Championship last August and the Players Championship this March, Price used the Cook putter though he was not paid to do so. After the PGA and TPC victories, the Cook Co. ran ads that irritated Price because they indirectly slammed the Ram Golf Co., which buys Price to use its irons. Ads after the PGA were headlined, "The Zebra Lost Its Stripes," an allusive reference to Ram's mallet-headed Zebra putter, which Price is not paid to use.

The ads knocking Ram irritated Price—Price—their impact, he vowed to get rid of the Cook putter, no matter how successful he was with it. Price was genuinely bothered by the ordeal, calling it "the hardest thing I had to deal with in my life... I've lost a lot of sleep over this." The problem, he said, is that his pleas with the Cook Co. to cease the

negative ads went unheeded.

Some might say his principles possibly cost him an Open victory. He pitted well with Gaffner's Pyramid for much of the Open, but he struggled with it on the front nine Saturday and in the final round. He entered the last day in third place, four shots off the lead, but slipped to the tie for 11th after shooting a 73 that included six missed putts from three to eight feet.

Afterward, Price blamed himself, not the putter, for losing the Open "on the greens." He said he probably just needed more time with the new putter (Pyramid), especially before a major championship. And Cook putter, "at least I can sleep now."

Last week at Hartford, he used the putter borrowed from Watson instead of the Pyramid and was elated

with the results. For his part, Dallas Golf's Gaffner also expressed happiness, even though Price put away his blade after the Open. "I've been designing clubs for 12 years and it's my dream to get notoriety because someone like that uses your putter in the U.S. Open," Gaffner said. "This just proves that when one of the greatest players in the world puts with it, I can make 'em as good as anyone else."

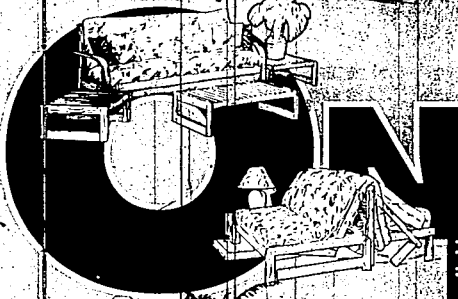
## Futon (Foo' Ton), n.

The name futon is Japanese and means nothing more than mattress. The futon began to sell in the-seventies promoting ecological and health related products.

The mattress itself was the primary product and was spread directly on the floor for sleeping, then rolled or folded for use as a sofa during the day.

At first, futon beds evolved with oriental design. Then frames were developed to convert the futon from a bed to a sofa. The frames are primarily sold for use in college'dorms, vacation homes, dens, and children's rooms - from a sleep over to a teen's primary bed.

The price of a complete futon sofa is about 50% that of a conventional sofa bed.
