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# County may miss landfill deadline

TWIN FALLS — A Washington company has submitted the apparent low bid — \$2.9 million — to build the county's new landfill. But much to the county commissioners' dismay, work on the project might not start until next March — well past an October federal deadline to close old landfills. Commissioners Marvin Hempleman and

Jim Fraley said Thursday that a meeting last week with an adviser to Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, left little hope that the senator would work to speed the transfer of federal acreage needed for the landfill site. Instead, an aide to Craig urged the commissioners to continue with an environmental impact statement to transfer 1,000 acres on Hub Butte from Bureau of Land Management control to the county. Doing this means the county probably

would not get control of the land until next spring. Last week's meeting showed an apparent change in Craig's thinking from January when the senator said he would try to speed the land transfer, Hempleman and Fraley said Thursday. "What we were led to believe is not what's happening," said a disappointed Hempleman. "We did what was suggested." After a January meeting, the commis-

sioners were confident Idaho's senior senator would try to speed transfer of the landfill site from BLM to county control. This could be done by tacking the land transfer onto a bill going through Congress. The commissioners pinned most of their hopes to meet the October deadline on this solution. But at the January meeting Craig also had urged the commissioners to go through **Please see LANDFILL/A2**

# Clinton approves plan allowing gays in military but calls for 'refinements'

WASHINGTON — President Clinton has accepted the broad outlines of a proposal by Defense Secretary Les Aspin that would allow homosexuals to serve in the military so long as they do not reveal their sexual orientation, but has asked for further "refinements," senior officials said Thursday. The officials said Clinton is especially concerned about the practical implications of the proposal and has raised a number of specific questions, such as the circumstances under which service members

would be investigated for homosexual conduct. Aspin delivered a final draft of his proposal Thursday night incorporating the refinements, but it was not clear whether the changes met the president's concerns. Continued confusion over the shape of the final policy was reflected in comments by White House officials, who first told reporters Thursday that Clinton would announce the plan Friday, then cautioned hours later an announcement was unlikely.

The intensive, 11th-hour negotiations reflected the agonizing nature of a debate that has mobilized the gay community and stirred intense opposition from the military leadership. In their search for an acceptable middle ground, senior officials from the White House, Pentagon and Justice Department have spent much of the past few weeks wrestling with seemingly trivial language changes that nonetheless carry great symbolic and legal weight. Senior Justice Department officials, including Attorney General Janet Reno and Solicitor General Drew S. Days, have ex-

# Mighty river overwhelms flood controls

VICKSBURG, Miss. — The stretch of Mississippi River with the worst flood damage has fewer federal flood controls than any other part. Few experts, however, believe the addition of more concrete, steel and dirt could have halted 1993's rising waters. "The Upper Mississippi is an uncontrolled system. It has so few reservoirs, it doesn't control anything," said Fred Bailey, director of engineering for the Mississippi

River Commission. "The problem is just too much water." Only 15 percent of the 164,000 square miles of Mississippi drainage north of St. Louis is controlled by dams, compared to 73 percent of the area along the Missouri River. Of the 250 flood control reservoirs in the entire Mississippi system, 11 are located in the flooded section. The rain, of course, was the problem. Al-

though much of the spring downpour fell in vast undammed tracts and could not be contained, the real culprit was the volume dumped by stalled weather systems. With the ground already saturated by spring rain, June was the wettest month in the region since record-keeping began. Midway, July is just as soggy. "I doubt any human being can comprehend the forces that can be generated by that water," said Jim Tuttle, chief of water control for the commission and considered

# Arrests foil plot to bomb black church

LOS ANGELES — A white supremacist plot to start a race war by bombing a black church, spraying its members with machine-gun fire and killing Rodney King and other well-known blacks was smashed Thursday with the arrests of eight people, authorities said Thursday. A federal and local task force made the arrests in four Southern California counties and seized a large arsenal of guns and pipe bombs, Nazi paraphernalia and pictures of Adolf Hitler. One of the eight was arrested as he was preparing a letter bomb to be sent to a rabbi, authorities said. Other potential targets mentioned by members of the Fourth Reich Skin

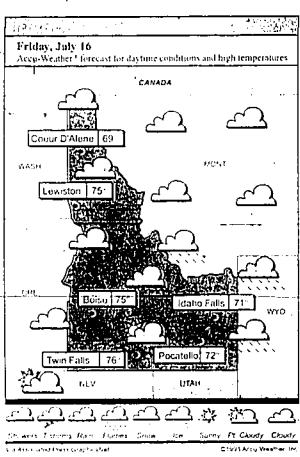
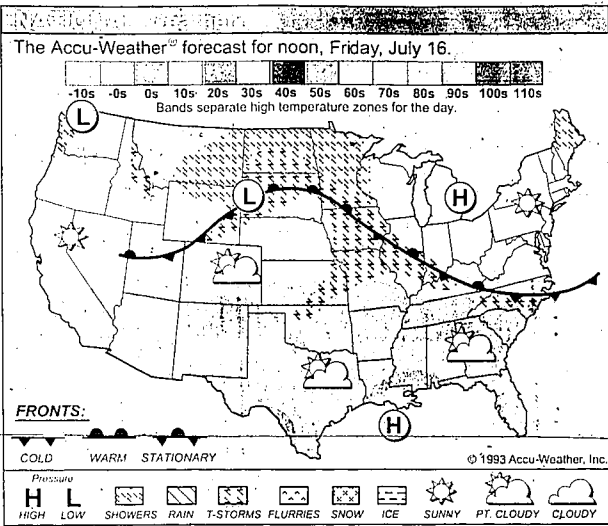
Heads were leaders of both the NAACP and the Urban League; Nation of Islam Minister Louis Farrakhan; the Rev. Al Sharpton, a New York activist; Danny Bakewell of the Brotherhood Crusade in Los Angeles; and rap music stars. FBI agent Charlie Parsons told a news conference the plotters wanted to "help start a race war. That was their motivation." "We prevented despicable and violent acts from occurring," he said. The arrests resulted from a 1½-year investigation in which agents infiltrated white supremacist groups, including the Florida-based Church of the Creator and the White Aryan Resistance. An undercover agent was able to persuade the white supremacists to

let him store the weapons, ski masks and other items for safekeeping, Parsons said. Of the eight arrested, only one — Christopher David Fisher, 20, of Long Beach — was charged specifically with conspiring to attack and destroy the First African Methodist Episcopal Church, a major religious hub for blacks in Los Angeles. Fisher was identified as the leader of the Fourth Reich Skin Heads, whose members included at least 18 minors, authorities said. Five other adults were charged with weapons offenses: Jeremy Rineman, 22, and Jill Scarborough, 22, both of Orange County; Josh Lee, 23, of Costa Mesa; and Chris Nadal, 35, and Doris Nadal, 42, of Los Angeles.

**Hot-weather plagues East-Coast, Alaskans**

Hot weather kept Easterners sweating Thursday and created potentially dangerous fire conditions in South Carolina. Rain fell on much of the Midwest and parts of the South.

The high in New York City's Central Park was 90, the ninth consecutive day of a 90-degree or higher reading. The record is 12 straight days, set in August and September of 1953.

It was almost as hot 89 in Umiat, Alaska, which was undergoing a heat wave of its own. Thursday's high and Wednesday's reading of 92 were records for the interior Alaskan city. Other records Thursday included 84 in Northway, Alaska, and 89 at Eielson Air Force Base, Alaska.

Hot weather also persisted over the Carolinas, with the National Weather Service issuing heat advisories for portions of both states. A fire danger alert was issued for

**Weather summary**

Summer weather continues to elude Idaho.

A series of weak Pacific weather disturbances circulating inland from the Southwest kept scattered broken clouds moving in and out of the Gem State Thursday.

There were showers early in the afternoon in the north central mountains and into the upper Panhandle. Isolated thundershowers were also picked up by radar in some of the more remote mountain areas near the Idaho and Montana border.

Otherwise, it was mostly sunny across the south, and partly sunny in the north. Except for mountain showers, it appeared little rainfall occurred during the afternoon.

Temperatures were still running much below the seasonal normals, more springlike than summer, in the 60s and 70s statewide. The warmest reading in the state Thursday was 84 at Hagerman. Stanley reported the coldest at 33.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 110 at Laughlin, Nev., and Lake Havasu City, Ariz. Truckee, Calif., reported the lowest at 25 degrees.

Rain continued to fall on parts of the flood-choked Midwest, and was scattered over much of the South.

Showers and thundershowers stretched across the northern Plains and the upper Mississippi Valley and from southwest Kansas to the Oklahoma and Texas panhandles.

Showers and thundershowers also hit Missouri, southern New Mexico, the northern Rockies, the Tennessee Valley, parts of the lower Ohio Valley and the Appalachians, and the Gulf Coast states from Florida to Texas.

In the Pacific Northwest, rain fell on western Washington.

Heavier rainfall during the six hours ending at noon MDT included 1.32 inches at Nashville, Tenn., and 1.14 at Knoxville, Tenn.

Temperatures around the nation at 1 p.m. MDT ranged from 56 degrees at Mullan, Idaho, and Pullman, Wash., to 101 degrees at Gila Bend, Ariz.

# Financial questions lead Senate to postpone hearings for Elders

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate committee postponed confirmation hearings for President Clinton's choice for surgeon general on Thursday as the White House announced a review of her presence on the Arkansas payroll while drawing a \$550-a-day federal consulting fee.

Under pressure from Republicans, the panel agreed to a one-week delay in the confirmation hearing for Dr. Joycelyn Elders, according to aides to Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., the committee chairman.

The committee had planned to hold the hearing today on the nomination of Elders, the 59-year-old head of the Arkansas state health agency.

The attacks drew a sharp response from Arkansas Democratic Sen. David Pryor, who said Elders' critics were resorting to "innuendo" and "attempts at character assassination." DHS secretary Donna Shalala also renewed her support.

Elders had previously drawn strong criticism from conservatives for her support of abortion rights and sex education. The questions of dual government jobs — one in

Arkansas, the other in Washington — provided her critics with fresh ammunition.

Sen. Dan Nickles, R-Okla., noted that Arkansas Gov. Jim Guy Tucker had expressed unhappiness over the nominee's double paycheck, even though Elders said she was taking vacation time to work in Washington. Nickles' Senate schedule would determine whether any state law was being broken.

At the White House, spokeswoman Dee Myers told reporters that officials are looking into the question of Elders' dual compensation as well as reports that her husband didn't pay Social Security taxes on a nurse for his 97-year-old mother.

Asked whether the disclosures could derail the nomination, Ms. Myers said: "I don't know. I think we need to have a little more information on it, exactly what the circumstances were. I know it's something that the counsel's office is working on."

Sen. Nancy Kassebaum, senior Republican on the committee scheduled to hold the confirmation hearing, requested delays, as did Nickles.

Shalala said she wasn't overly concerned. "So far the opposition hasn't been very strong," she said in an interview.

"If having a strong voice excludes you from holding high public office, we're in for some wispy-washy political leaders," the secretary said.

Federal officials said Elders was being paid as a consultant to Shalala, and described the arrangement as common for officials awaiting confirmation.

State officials said there apparently was no prohibition to her working from this second job as long as she was doing it on her vacation time.

But Tucker said Wednesday through a spokesman that he was unaware of the double salary and didn't approve of it.

pressed concern that the Aspin proposal may be difficult to defend in court, according to sources familiar with the views. The policy, dubbed "don't ask, don't tell," would end intrusive investigations into sexual orientation but still would prohibit public or private disclosures of sexual status.

Gay rights activists continued to hold out hope Thursday that Clinton would overrule Aspin, but acknowledged they faced an uphill battle.

On Wednesday, Aspin delivered to Clinton what officials called a "first draft" of the policy and spent nearly two hours with him discussing possible improvements.

"The president did not ask for any fundamental change in the Aspin reports; we are talking about refinements and implications, more in the way of elaborations," said one official.

A second official said that "all the

to be the river's top expert. "It overwhelmed everything."

The federal government has spent billions of dollars over 65 years to build dams, levees, dikes, retaining walls and locks aimed at taming a river basin that drains 35 states and covers 1.25 million square miles — 41 percent of the entire continental United States.

The projects allowed cities to grow and farms to prosper, guaranteed reliable transportation by barge and promoted recreation.

But environmentalists argue that it's folly to try to hem in such a huge river system, especially when projects encourage people to move into seemingly flood-proof areas that prove to be hazardous zones when the river runs wild.

"We've put the river in a straitjacket," said Brent Bluewelder of Friends of the Earth. "That turns moderate floods into big ones and big ones into colossal ones. It's flood damage enhancement. It's making it worse."

Rather than more levees and dams, Blackwelder suggests better flood plain management. Otherwise, he said, "We're going to have worse disasters in the future."

Others attribute this year's disaster in part to the loss of vast wetlands that in past centuries acted as natural sponges to absorb some of the fury of floodwaters.

"Sadly, the states that are having the worst flooding have lost the most wetlands," said Brent Hulse, executive director of Sierra Club's Midwest representative.

The senator plans a July 29 hearing on his proposal to give counties an extra year to close old landfills with a possible six months more beyond that. A BLM representative would attend the hearing to talk about the land transfer, Fawcett said Thursday.

"I feel like we're going forward with our commitment to help Twin Falls on this landfill question," he said.

Unfit now, the Legislature has allowed only a handful of resort towns such as Ketchum to institute their own taxes.

Meanwhile, Vining said Trans IV will "not extend services at this point" if the city decides not to fund his project.

He said he has also applied to other cities and counties that will be affected by the federal grant, but as Thursday he had received no response.

## UFO studies, stories converge this weekend in Seattle area

Did you know:  
 • Tens of thousands of Americans have been abducted by UFOs?  
 • The U.S. government has captured UFOs and is testing them in Nevada?  
 • Extraterrestrials have mutilated up to 20,000 cattle?  
 • Physical features on Mars were made by intelligent life?  
 • NASA's space-shuttle crew has videotaped alien spacecraft?  
 • Sound far-fetched? Even flaky? Theories on all these subjects will be discussed this weekend in Bellevue, Wash., at a national research conference on unidentified flying objects.

"She didn't have any knowledge about UFOs. But she couldn't sleep at night, she and another woman just wanted to get to the bottom of this," Carpenter said.  
 Carpenter separately hypnotized both Ambrose and her friend and said their accounts of the abduction included 43 identical details, including the shape of the room in the spacecraft (round), the color of light inside (rosy) and the features of the alien beings (pegs-shaped heads with dark, slanting eyes).  
 Ambrose, who also will speak at this weekend's conference, now says she remembers those details but no longer sees them as significant.  
 "I rarely think back on the physical experience. To me that's the least important part of it," she said.  
 What's important, she said, is the continuing, mind-to-mind communi-

cation she has with the beings she encountered.  
 "It's telepathic, and I don't even know how to explain it," Ambrose said. She believes the visitors leave a spiritual, almost biblical message; that a time is coming when people will have to choose between unity and separation, between peace and conflict.  
 Ambrose, who is writing a book on her experience, realizes many people react to UFO stories with suspicion or fear, skepticism or downright disbelief.  
 "These are the reactions of a negative people," she said. "I would like to take some part in changing the perception of people on this planet."  
 The Saturday-Sunday conference at the Bellevue Hyatt Regency is sponsored by the Missouri-based Triad Research Conference Foundation.

It's a gathering not just of believers, but — organizers insist — of professionals, scholars and scientists.  
 "We know there are screwballs out there, people who claim all sorts of crazy things," said John Carpenter, a hypnotherapist from Springfield, Mo. "But these are quality speakers with good research, not anything built on speculation."

Carpenter will discuss his studies of more than 80 people who, under hypnosis, have recalled details of their abduction by alien beings. He believes many people they have had such an experience and don't realize it.  
 Among his clients was Skye Ambrose, a St. Louis-area massage therapist who initially knew only that she and her friend saw a bright light while driving along a Colorado highway and later couldn't account for a two-hour period of time.

## Alaska crash kills 4 boys, bus driver

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Four boys in a pickup truck and a tour bus driver were killed in a fiery head-on crash south of Denali National Park.

The tourists on the bus escaped without serious injury.  
 Alaska state troopers said the bus operated by Alaska Sightseeing Cruise West was southbound with 15 people on board when it collided with a northbound pickup truck Wednesday in a no-passing zone on the Parks Highway.

The truck came to rest under the bus and set it on fire, leaving the bus a charred skeleton. Passers-by tried in vain to put out the fire and rescue the bus driver, Michael Rogers, 29.  
 "He kept saying, 'Help me!' I was standing out there watching, but there was nothing we could do," one of the passers-by, Army Sgt. David Lancaster, told the Anchorage Daily News.

He said he and a friend tried to pull Rogers out, undoing his seat belt. But Rogers' foot was jammed in and he was stuck.

"All the way home I've been thinking about that driver," Lancaster said.

John Kreilcamp, the tour bus sales director in Anchorage, said the 40-foot coach was on a return trip to Anchorage when it crashed. Kreilcamp said Rogers knew so much, coworkers called him "The Anchorage Encyclopedia."

## Top medical officer in Arizona resigns

PHOENIX (AP) — Arizona's chief epidemiologist has resigned after only four months on the job and barely one month into one of the largest medical investigations in the state's history.

The resignation of Dr. George Gellert won't harm a federal-state investigation into the hantavirus illness that has killed as many as two dozen people in the Four Corners region, according to Greg Jacquin, associate director of the state Department of Health Services.  
 Gellert resigned at the end of June but will remain on the state payroll until July 30 to finish several projects, Jacquin said Tuesday.

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

**Heavy rains threaten some areas; cleanup continues in others**

Drenching thunderstorms bore down on St. Louis Thursday, increasing fears that the Mississippi and Missouri rivers, engorged for more than a month, would converge 20 miles upstream of where they normally do.

Only a levee kept the steadily rising waterways apart, and a narrowing peninsula of land from being inundated.

President Clinton, who has stopped in flood-stricken Iowa twice in two weeks, will tour the St. Louis area Sunday, the White House announced. The Mississippi reached a record height of 43.3 feet at St. Louis on Thursday and is expected to crest there Monday at more than 45 feet over flood stage.

Upriver, water percolated up through the ground in East Carroll, Ill., buckling streets and bursting water mains, as the powerful Mississippi forced the water table above street level and muscled through levees. Mayor Herb Simmons said 12 families in the town of 600 were evacuated.

In other parts of the Midwest, people put their backs into early cleanup efforts even as they cast wary eyes toward the skies.

Des Moines, Iowa, officials delayed by another day their projected date for about 250,000 people will get back running water, knocked out early Sunday when flood waters spilled into the Des Moines Water Works.

Water won't flow from taps until Monday because 20 million gallons must first fill the maze of pipes, and

Sewage and other contaminants in floodwaters were blamed for bacterial infections that sickened four people in the Iowa City area, doctors there said. Though tetanus shots are being administered in many flood areas, Charles Driscoll, head of family practice at University Hospitals, said these infections weren't tetanus.

The floods have been blamed for at least 25 deaths and at least \$5 billion in damage in eight states. More than 16,000 square miles of farmland have been flooded, about 1,600 homes have been damaged, and more than 150 levees have burst. Clinton has declared 228 counties, including all 99 in Iowa, federal disaster areas, and proposed at least

\$2.5 billion in federal aid.

Even though no significant amounts of rain fell Thursday in central Iowa and the Raccoon River was receding quickly, West Des Moines Fire Chief Randy Bracken recommended that 3,500 people evacuated Saturday stay away from their homes.

"The weather service is not giving me much hope," Bracken said. Forecasters said strong thunderstorms would strike over the weekend.

The National Weather Service issued a flash flood watch for the St. Louis area as strong thunderstorms gathered and produced some drenching downpours. As much as 2 inches of rain was expected in some areas.

The Mississippi River surpassed the 1973 record height of 43.23 feet at St. Louis on Thursday morning and kept rising, with an expected crest of 45.5 feet on Monday, though a floodwall was expected to avert damage to downtown St. Louis.

The Missouri River, which reached a record level Thursday at Jefferson City, Mo., and is 18 miles before they meet north of St. Louis, was expected to crest at the rivers' confluence Friday. That left the peninsula between the rivers, including West Alton, Mo., in a squeeze.

About 7,000 people have been evacuated from the area, and two more minor levees broke there Thursday. But officials' big worry was the main levee along the Missouri River, Mississippi River back-

waters have swept nearly 2 miles inland and are lapping at the back of the levee.

"If it breaks, all that water from the Missouri is going to start pouring into St. Charles County," said Marty Lampert of the county emergency command post, who estimated several hundred people are still living in the evacuation zone.

"It would be a major concern," he said, although he added, "I don't want to scare anybody" because the levee appeared to be holding.

In other places, cleanup was under way. The job was immense in Ames, Iowa, where water 14 feet deep had filled the Iowa State University basketball arena Friday. The water has been pumped out, but a thick layer of black silt covered the floor.

Under the rules the FTC is finalizing, advertising for 900 services would have to carry specific consumer information.

The FCC has had rules governing pay-per-call numbers for some time. The new regulations replace all others. They enforce the FCC section of the Telephone Disclosure and Dispute Resolution Act passed by Congress last October.

In its new rules, the FCC also ordered that:

- No refund other than 900 can be used if the call fits the pay-per-call category.
- Phone companies and 900 number services be allowed to block customer access to them if customers refuse to pay legitimate pay-per-call charges.
- Phone companies provide toll-free pay-per-call information lines.
- Customers be sent pay-per-call disclosure statements annually.
- Phone companies obtain proper charitable organizations using a 900 number as tax exempt.
- Customers who want 900 numbers blocked from existing lines must inform the phone company 60 days after the rules are published in the Federal Register.
- Anyone getting a new phone number has 60 days from the time their phone service starts to ask for the lockout.
- Much of the new law falls under jurisdiction of the Federal Trade Commission which has until July 20

to announce its final rules about what consumers must be told by sellers who use 900 numbers.

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**FCC to phone companies: Block 900 service**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumers who don't want calls made from their telephones to 900 numbers must be given a block on their lines by the phone company, the Federal Communications Commission ruled Thursday.

Furthermore, the phone company must list the charges for pay-per-call services separately on customer bills, and can't disconnect phone service to customers who refuse to pay for them.

The 900 numbers are used to sell everything from sports scores to Santa chats to sex talk. Some charitable organizations also use them as a quick way to gather donations.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic negotiators began work Thursday on a compromise version of President Clinton's deficit-reduction plan, agreeing the outcome will determine whether their party can govern the nation.

"This is our best chance to regain control of our economic future," Rep. Martin O. Sabo, D-Minn., said in opening the conference. "By succeeding, we will be able to tell the American people that, 'Yes, your government works.'"

"Let's put this bill on the president's desk and get this country on the road to creating jobs," pleaded House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo.

Republicans watched from the sidelines because they oppose the bill's tax increases, which would fall mainly on the well-to-do.

"I can't conceive that the American people want us to pass something that will ... do nothing to encourage prosperity," said Sen. Pete Domenici of New Mexico, senior Republican on the Senate Budget Committee.

His House counterpart, Rep. John Kasich, R-Ohio, was more blunt. "Now it's their legislation," he said of Democrats, who control the House, Senate and White House. "When they pass this piece of legislation and it wrecks the economy, they're the ones who are going to have to take responsibility."

Fifty-three senators and 157 representatives were named to the conference committee that is charged with writing a compromise between the bills passed by the House and Sen-

ate. But most of the work will be done by the 14 senior Democratic tax-writers in Congress: seven each from the House Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Finance Committee.

Their biggest task may well be negotiating an acceptable energy tax one somewhere between the House tax on utilities and fuel, which would produce \$72 billion over five years, and the Senate plan that would only raise taxes on gasoline and diesel fuel by 4.3 cents a gallon and bring in about \$22 billion.

Either the House or Senate bill would, assuming action is completed on spending bills later this year, reduce the federal budget deficit by \$500 billion over the next five years. Roughly half the reduction would come from tax increases; about \$100 billion would be saved by restricting the growth of Medicare, Medicaid and other mandatory spending programs; the remainder would result from limited discretionary spending and reducing interest costs. The cuts in discretionary spending are to be spelled out in later bills.

By most counts, the two bills are virtually identical on 85 percent to 90 percent of the issues. But the importance of the remaining 10 percent to 15 percent is evident: The House bill passed by only a six-vote margin and the Senate had to call in Vice President Al Gore to break a 49-49 tie.

Knowing they have no Republican support, negotiators can ill-afford to do anything to offend any Democrat. Among the obvious problems:

• Several House Democrats, claiming they number 80 or so, want to delete any energy tax — the only provision that would affect the big middle class. Republicans like to recall that Clinton campaigned to cut taxes on middle-income families.

• House liberals, pressed by the 40-member Congress and Black Caucus, criticized the Senate bill for doing too little for low-income working families and to create jobs in inner cities.

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# Researchers find genetic link in homosexuals

WASHINGTON (AP) — Researchers have identified a gene pattern linked to male homosexuality, adding powerful new evidence to the scientific theory that the tendency to be gay can be inherited.

The finding does not prove homosexuality in males is genetically compelled, but it does show that the sexual orientation is powerfully influenced by inherited genes, said Dean Hamer, principal author of the study appearing Friday in the journal Science. "This is the strongest evidence to date that there is an important genetic component to sexual orientation," Hamer said in an interview.

Evidence of a gay gene was found by studying the X chromosome in 40 pairs of homosexual brothers. Thirty-three pairs of brothers shared the same pattern variation in the tip of one arm of the chromosome, a region that may have 100 or more individual genes.

Hamer said his lab at the National Cancer Institute is now trying to identify the specific gene shared by the gay brothers. A similar study searching for a genetic basis for homosexuality in females is now underway, he said.

The study is at least the fourth in recent years to identify possible biological explanations for sexual

orientation and strengthens the argument by many in the gay community that homosexuality is not a matter of choice, but of biological destiny.

Members of the gay community said the new study could help to change the perception of homosexuality.

"It may help people look at this as a genetic issue, that it is natural and it involves no sort of choice at all," said George Neighbors Jr. of the Federation of Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays in Washington. "If you believe in God or nature, that's what homosexuality develops from."

But he said the finding could also pose a threat to homosexuals. Neighbors said some gays fear that if a biological basis for homosexuality is found, there may be some people who view it as an opportunity to medically change the sexual orientation.

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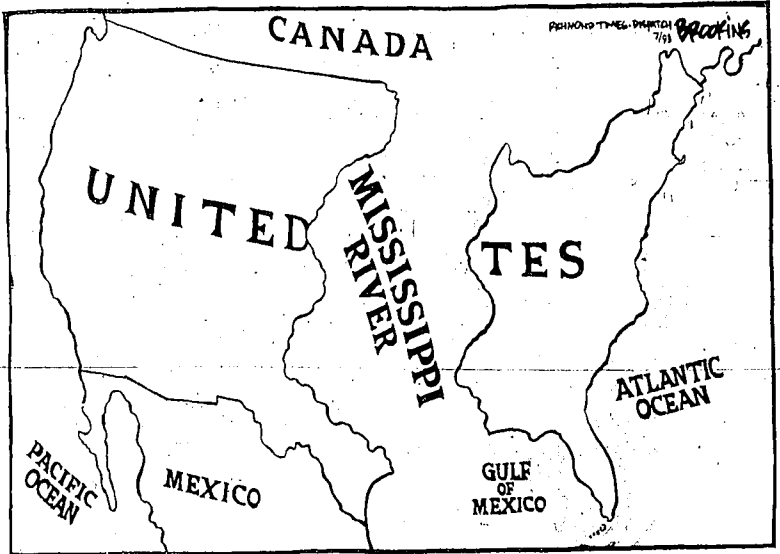

### Employee-shared health premiums make sense

Even if the city of Twin Falls can afford to pay 100 percent of its employees' health insurance costs, it probably shouldn't.

This week the City Council was asked to go back to its old practice of paying 100 percent of health premiums, including coverage for employees' families. Since 1991, the city has paid only a portion of the employees' premiums, with no family coverage.

Employees suggested that, since premiums rose only 15 percent this year, instead of the expected 20 percent, the city should seize that windfall as an opportunity to restore fully paid coverage.

We're not so sure.

Certainly, coverage for families is important, and the city should try to provide it. Police Cpl. Mike Hottman was right when he told the council: "Insurance is more than a cost benefit. It's a peace-of-mind benefit."

Anyone with a family knows the truth of that statement. Employees are unlikely to be at their best if they must live in fear that a sick spouse or

child could break them.

But the other half of the proposal premiums paid entirely by the city is less persuasive.

Lots of private companies and public agencies have benefited from asking employees to share health premium costs. That's because group insurance premiums are based partly on each group's history. If city employees file lots of claims, premiums are likely to rise.

Giving employees a stake in keeping costs down provides an incentive to avoid unnecessary medical costs. It may even create an indirect incentive to stay healthy.

With rocketing health costs creating a nationwide crisis, those are important goals.

So the best option may be the compromise offered by Councilman Jim Viekers: Reinstating coverage for employees' families, but ask employees to make a "co-payment" for part of the premium.

That idea could benefit not only taxpayers, but city employees too.

### 12 beds might be better option

In March of this year, the Twin Falls County commissioners started plans for construction of a youth detention center. The county had received a \$750,000 grant from the state of Idaho on Oct. 15, 1990, and decided they would need another \$650,000 from the taxpayers for construction of an 18-bed facility that would cost a total of \$1,400,000.

The plan was that the building would serve the five counties of Blaine, Camas, Coaling, Jerome and Twin Falls. The state Department of Health and Welfare had recommended only a 14-bed facility for eight counties, which included Lincoln, Cassia and Minidoka, with a total population of 140,000. Now with only five counties involved, the total population is reduced to \$96,400. If Twin Falls builds an 18-bed facility, it will have the highest bed capacity per capita of any detention center in the state.

By comparison: Pocatello has built a 12-bed facility serving 139,000 population in seven counties. Idaho Falls will have access to a 12-bed facility serving six counties with a population of 124,000. Why then are we

being asked to build an 18-bed facility? The important point being that administrative and regulatory costs increase dramatically for every six additional beds.

In addition, we find that the dollar amount has been increased by \$150,000. We were originally informed that the amount of the bond election would be \$650,000. Now you will find that the amount you will be voting on is \$800,000.

You might be surprised to learn that the county plans on contracting with Health and Welfare to operate the facility for an additional \$880,000 per year. That's an operating cost of \$49,000 per bed per year!

Pocatello will contract out its 12-bed facility to a private contractor for \$450,000 per year, which is \$175,000 less than the Department of Health and Welfare wanted.

At a time when the expenditure of our tax dollars is so critical, why shouldn't we agree with the citizens committee appointed by the county that recommends a 12-bed facility located on property the county already owns on a one-half-acre vacant lot next to the courthouse and county jail and save Twin Falls County taxpayers more than \$500,000.

## 'Just say no' to latest of Clinton's nominees

Isn't it hypocritical for liberals who opposed the nomination of C. Everett Koop for Surgeon General 12 years ago to blast conservatives who oppose the nomination of Jocelyn Elders to the same post now?

When Koop was nominated, his critics said little about his medical skills, which were considerable after a 40-year record of exemplary practice. Rather they opposed him for his views and required him to take a kind of "disloyalty oath," vowing that he would not impose his views if liberals were to acquiesce to his confirmation.

It was clear then that liberals in and out of government did not want Koop to use the office to promote practices with which they disagreed. Because they could not fault him on medicine, they tried "horking" him before Robert Dork had been "horked."

Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., said, "Dr. Koop frightens me ... he's dogmatically denounced those who disagree with him, and his intemperate views make me wonder about his and the Administration's judgment." Waxman also heaped out an all-purpose condemnation, saying Koop was "a man of tremendous intolerance."

When Dr. Elders says that pro-lifers need to get over their "love affair with the fetus," that seems to be a dogmatic denunciation of those who disagree with her about the nature and value of the unborn.

But there is more to Dr. Elders than her views. As director of Arkansas' State Department of Health since 1987, she has a record. The Senate and the public have a right and an obligation to judge her based on her performance, since she will be bringing her worldview to the office of Surgeon General should she be confirmed.

Reducing the number of teen-agers who become pregnant is a high priority for Dr. Elders. Yet, under her "leadership," Arkansas went from having the fourth highest teen birthrate in the country to the second highest, according to the publication "Vital Statistics of the United States."

That teen pregnancy rate, despite Dr. Elders' goal, reached a 10-year high.

Under her "leadership," the incidence of sexually transmitted diseases rose dramatically. Between 1989 and 1992, there was a 130 percent increase in syphilis cases.

among Arkansas teen-agers and a 150 percent jump in teens afflicted with HIV.

Her prescription then, as now, was based on a near-absolute faith in condoms, which she would make available to every public school student who wants them. She said on CNBC television that she would provide the long-term contraceptive Norplant to drug-addicted prostitutes "so they could still use sex if they must to buy their drugs."

Her defenders say she would not give a kindergarten student the same type of sex education she would advocate for a student in high school. Maybe not, but the information would be based on the same flawed philosophy that ultimately leads to the free condoms, abortion advice and other views about sex that conflict with the values and beliefs of many, if not most, parents.

Bill Jones, past president of the Arkansas medical society, told *The Washington Post*, "She is a rabble-rouser ... she polarizes people pretty quickly." Apparently it is all right to polarize people if a liberal is doing the polarizing, but not if someone of Dr. Koop's background does it.

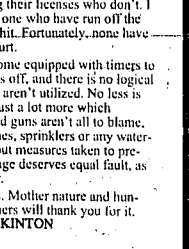
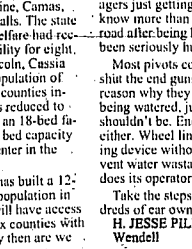
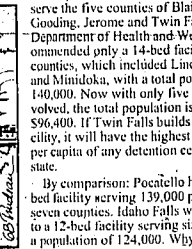
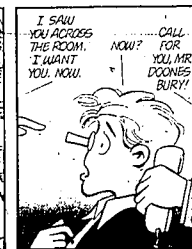

# Fuel delivery brings some relief to Bosnian capital

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Serbs eased a two-week fuel blockade of Sarajevo on Thursday, allowing the crippled hospital and bakery to resume operations.

But U.N. officials said life remained a living hell for many.

A day after a visit by the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees, Bosnian Serbs allowed 75 tons of diesel fuel stuck at the airport for two weeks to be brought into the capital.

The first stops were the city bakery, a main water-pumping station and the hospital, which desperately needed the fuel to generate electricity. Doctors had performed operations only by natural light.

The bakery resumed operation within two hours of the delivery after a 15-day shutdown, the longest in its 40-year history. At no point during the 16-month siege had it closed for more than a week, even after it was badly damaged by shelling in February.

"I'm happy now that we can provide at least a small amount of bread," said baker Enver Kazacic, grinning as warm loaves tumbled off a conveyor belt.

The bakery received 10 tons of diesel, normally enough for four days. But Kazacic said the bakery would make only about 55,000 loaves a day instead of 100,000 to stretch out production.

Restoration of natural gas service, cut off by Serb forces last month, also

was considered a major breakthrough in easing the city's deepening utility crisis. It will allow residents to cook normally for the first time in weeks.

But most areas remained without running water and electricity.

"Life remains a daily torture," said U.N. relief spokesman Peter Kessler, referring to the daily struggle to lug home water for basic needs. "People are living through hell."

Running water was restored Wednesday in some western neighborhoods, home to about 20 percent of the city's 380,000 residents. But restoration of electricity and more water hinges on delicate talks between the Muslim-led government and Bosnian Serb leaders.

Kessler said refugees in one former hotel were so desperate for cooking fuel that they tore molding off walls.

The city has been under siege for more than a year since rebel Serbs throughout Bosnia took up arms against Muslims and Croats who voted to secede from Serb-dominated Yugoslavia. More than 138,000 people have been reported dead or missing.

In southwestern Bosnia, Bosnian Croat fighters and Muslim-led government troops fought for control of the city of Mostar.

Croatian radio said government forces were shelling southern suburbs. Bosnian radio said Croat forces, backed by regular Croatian army troops, had launched a heavy infantry

attack on the southern front.

Mostar has been placed off-limits to U.N. personnel by Croat militia leaders, and Kessler said no food aid had reached the predominantly Muslim eastern side of the divided city for a month. He said the 30,000 residents there had only two communal water taps, both exposed to sniper fire.

In a ham-radio broadcast monitored in Sarajevo, the leader of Mostar's Muslims, Smajl Klarić, said Wednesday that 10,000 people had been detained by Croat militiamen at a helicopter factory. He also said women were being raped.

Vesvo Vegar, spokesman for Croat forces, said that only 3,000 people had been detained, and that they were men with Bosnian army documents. "Not a single case of rape was noticed here," he said.

In neighboring Croatia, where a fitful cease-fire has mostly held for 18 months, new Serb-Croat clashes erupted, apparently provoked by Croatian plans to reopen a bridge that Croats recaptured from Serbs in a January offensive. The Maslenica bridge links central Croatia and most of its Adriatic Sea coast.

Serbs shelled the Croatian city of Karlovac, 40 miles southwest of Zagreb, on Wednesday and Thursday for the first time in months, U.N. officials said.

Four people were killed and 27 wounded west of Glina, another tense Croatian town south of Zagreb.

### Legislators urge Castro to resign

CARACAS, Venezuela — About 200 legislators from Latin America and Spain urged Cuban President Fidel Castro to resign, saying the Communist leader should end his rule with a "gesture of true courage and generosity."

The appeal was published Thursday in the Caracas newspaper El Universal as Castro attended the opening of the Ibero-American summit in Brazil. The two-day meeting will gather leaders from Spain, Portugal and the former colonies.

The letter to Castro listed the names of 194 legislators from El Salvador, Panama, Puerto Rico, Spain and Venezuela. Also listed were officers of the Venezuela-based Cuban-American National Foundation.

### U.N. to hold firm on monitoring in Iraq

BAGHDAD, Iraq — A U.N. envoy sent to defuse a standoff with Baghdad will stand firm on the monitoring of Iraq's weapons program, a spokesman said Thursday.

Soon after he arrived in Baghdad, envoy Rolf Ekens met with Foreign Minister Mohammed Saeed al-Sahaf in a final attempt to prevent military action against Iraq.

The United Nations and Baghdad have been clashing for weeks over Iraq's refusal to permit the installation of surveillance cameras at two missile-testing sites. The West has threatened military strikes if Iraq does not back down.

### Health organization targets leprosy

GENEVA — The World Health Organization on Thursday announced a drive to eliminate the age-old scourge of leprosy by the end of the century.

Dr. Shaik K. Noorden, chief of WHO's leprosy unit, told a meeting of affected countries and groups working to eradicate the disease that a multi-drug treatment could eliminate the disease within six years.

WHO projects it would cost \$420 million over six years to reach its goal of less than one case per 10,000 people, he said. The money would be used to buy anti-leprosy drugs, train health workers and organize a worldwide campaign.

### Ambassador freezes during climb

BOLZANO, Italy — Japan's ambassador to Austria and his Italian guide froze to death while climbing in the snowy Dolomite mountains, a rescue official said Thursday.

Ambassador Ryoji Onodera, 57, and his guide, Fritz Kurt, 33, set out Wednesday morning to climb the 12,800-foot high Ortles peak in northern Italy. Searchers tracked the climbers to a crevasse Thursday about 2,600 feet below the peak.

## U.S. delegation to press MIA information

HANOI, Vietnam (AP) — With improved economic ties at stake, the highest level U.S. delegation to visit Hanoi since the Vietnam War arrived Thursday to assess official cooperation in the search for missing U.S. servicemen.

Winston Lord, assistant secretary of state for East Asian and Pacific affairs, brought a 22-member delegation to Hanoi for three days of talks with Vietnamese leaders on the issue of 2,253 Americans still officially listed as missing from the war.

"We're here on a very serious mission, and that's about all I can say right now," Lord told reporters. President Clinton announced the trip July 2, the same day he made public his decision to unblock International Monetary Fund loans to Vietnam. The United States had ve-

toed such loans as part of an economic embargo it has maintained against Vietnam since the Communist north took over the south in 1975.

But Clinton said any improvement in U.S.-Vietnamese relations was contingent on progress of the missing servicemen issue, and that sending such a high-level delegation conveyed "a clear message" of American concern.

The delegation included co-leaders Hershel Gober, deputy secretary of veterans affairs, and Air Force Lt. Gen. Michael Ryan, assistant to the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, as well as senior officials of four private veterans organizations.

"This is the highest-level delegation, with the most wide-ranging composition, from the U.S. ... ever

visiting Vietnam," said Ho The Lan, an official spokesman for the Vietnamese government.

Clinton must decide by Sept. 14 whether to renew the embargo against Vietnam for another year. This week's visit is widely seen as crucial to that decision.

Vietnam's deputy foreign min-

ister, Le Mai, who greeted the delegates, told reporters that he hoped their visit would serve to "push ahead" a resolution of the MIA issue and improve relations between the United States and Vietnam.

"I think the important thing is that one should work together in a very cooperative spirit," Mai said.

### Attack halts relief planes in Angola

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — Relief flights to starving civilians trapped behind battle lines in Angola resumed Thursday, but were quickly suspended after a U.N. plane was damaged by automatic rifle fire.

The plane, operated by the U.N.-sponsored World Food Program, was hit as it tried to land in M'Banza

Kongo, a city held by UNITA rebels 185 miles north of Luanda, the capital.

Mercedes Sayagues, a World Food Program spokeswoman in Luanda, said in a telephone interview that flights to three other towns landed without incident. They delivered 45 tons of beans, corn and vegetable oil.

### Yeltsin orders military alert

MOSCOW (AP) — President Boris Yeltsin told the Defense Ministry on Thursday to get ready to beef up Russian forces in Tajikistan after a deadly attack on a border post by Islamic guerrillas.

The legislature later unanimously approved a package of agreements with Tajikistan's pro-Communist government permitting Russia to use armed force against Islamic militants in that former Soviet republic.

Civil war broke out last year in Tajikistan after pro-Communists ousted an alliance of democrats and Muslim fundamentalists. Tens of thousands of Tajik fighters fled to Afghanistan, where they launch periodic cross-border attacks. The conflict has killed an estimated 20,000 people and displaced about 600,000.

Russia and other former Soviet republics have sent troops to guard the border in hopes of averting an influx of arms, drugs and Islamic fundamentalism.

### Russian lawmakers boost lowest wages

MOSCOW (AP) — Parliament has voted to almost double the minimum monthly wage and pension to help workers whose buying power has been eaten away by high inflation.

Russian News media said Thursday the new minimum wage, effective Aug. 1, would be 7,740 rubles, or about \$7.55 at current exchange rates. The minimum pension will be 14,620 rubles (\$14.26).

The chairman of parliament's committee on social policy, Mikhail Zakharov, said the current minimum wage — 4,275 rubles (\$4.17) — was barely a third of what is considered a poverty-level income.

# Japan earthquake death toll reaches 126

OKUSHIRI, Japan (AP) — With the last fires finally out Thursday, workers dug through tons of dirt for a hotel believed to contain more than 30 people — victims of an earthquake whose force brought down landslides and raised crashing seas.

At least 126 bodies had been recovered and 85 people were still missing from Monday's quake; Japan's deadliest in decades.

People crowded ferry boats that resumed service to the hard-hit island of Okushiri to search for relatives or mourn the dead. Community centers and school gymnasiums were filled with homeless people sleeping on mats on the floors. Their few extra clothes hung on hangers along the wall.

Afterwards, meanwhile, continued to rock northern Japan.

The initial tremor, estimated at 7.8 on the Richter scale, touched off giant waves, fires and landslides. Police said 151 people were injured and about 1,000 people left homeless.

Rescuers delivered food and water to remote areas of Okushiri, a small island in the Sea of Japan where more than 400 people died. Some of the people whose homes were destroyed left on ferry boats that began servicing Okushiri again to move in with friends or relatives elsewhere in Japan.

"I've had enough," a grandmother said as she boarded the ferry.

Workers dug toward Okushiri's Yoyoso Hotel, which was covered

by a landslide touched off by the quake. The bodies of about three dozen people, many of them elderly tourists, were believed to be inside in the hotel.

Tons of earth buried the two-story building, and work proceeded slowly. More landslides were feared after a heavy rainstorm Wednesday night.

Meteorologists said the tidal waves, which caused damage as far away as South Korea and Far Eastern Russia, surged at speeds of 300 mph and towered as high as 36 feet. Many victims had no time to reach higher ground before the waves struck, just minutes after the quake.

Many of the 80 homes in Inabo, a fishing village, were washed away. Midori Mizuno, 53, said she ran for the hills as the waves arrived.

"The third wave caught me," she said Thursday, surveying what was left of her house. "But it threw me up onto high ground."

Misae Ikeda, a 38-year-old housewife, said she was swept away in her car, but managed to climb out a window. Frogmen dived to vehicles at the bottom of the harbor, but found few bodies.

In the village of Aonae, swept first by waves and then by fire, 37 caskets lined the Buddhist temple under a hanging scroll of the goddess of mercy. The chief priest chanted sutras for the dead as incense filled the air.

"We don't have enough room to put all the bodies," said priest Takazu Tetsutaka.

## Arms, hate papers seized

BONN, Germany (AP) — Investigators confiscated hate literature and a weapons arsenal Thursday in coordinated nationwide raids against an outlawed neo-Nazi gang and other right-wing radicals.

No arrests were immediately made, but charges were expected against 75 people following this latest blow against the radical right, which has been attacking foreigners and smashing Germany's image for nearly three years.

Seventeen people, most of them foreigners, died in extreme-right violence last year. The bloodshed has intensified this year, with the May 29 firebombing in Solingen that killed five Turks and daily attacks that have followed.

day, undercover and uniformed police struck at suspected members of the outlawed German Alternative in Berlin and other cities across Germany.

Air guns, starter pistols, baseball bats, clubs and illegal pamphlets were found in 67 apartments, said Norbert Weise, the Koblenz prosecutor who coordinated the raids.

Weise said 75 people would be charged with violating the ban on German Alternative, one of three neo-Nazi groups outlawed by the federal government last year.

Members of the three organizations have continued to meet and distribute propaganda slandering Jews and foreigners and calling for a Fourth Reich on the order of Hitler's Third Reich.

## Envoy calls for unity in peacekeeping

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) — A U.N. special envoy appealed Thursday for unity among the peacekeeping coalition facing with the controversial task of running down a renegade Somali clan.

"There were bound to be some growing pains. I regret ... there have been differences in approach," said U.N. envoy Jonathan Howe, who seeks to ease disputes over the hard-line tactics against warlord Mohamed Farrah Aidid.

In the most public rift, U.N. officials requested the removal of an Italian general for not following orders.

France, however, spoke out in support of continuing U.N. military efforts.

Playing to international criticism of the U.N. offensive, hundreds of Somalis took to the streets to protest bombardments of strongholds used by clansmen who have been blamed for attacks on U.N. forces.

At a well-orchestrated demon-

stration, 2,000 people waved placards printed with drawings of helicopter gunships above an English-language message: "Is this humanitarian aid? Help, yes; War, no."

U.N. officials reported more sniper and grenade attacks on U.N. outposts, but said no soldiers were injured.

Howe praised the work of the peacekeeping force and aid operations and defended the military campaign in southern Mogadishu against gunmen loyal to Aidid, who opposes the U.N. presence.

The United Nations wants to negotiate with responsible leaders, not "criminals and terrorists" allied to Aidid, said Howe, a retired U.S. admiral who is special representative of U.N. Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali.

Earlier Thursday, Howe denied charges that hawkish American advisers and officers were dominating the coalition's planning, which has used U.S. air power and ground troops for devastating attacks on Aidid compounds.

## Ecosystem protection measure hits Congress

TWIN FALLS - Forces outside Idaho may yet decide the fate of federal roadless lands within the state.

A bi-partisan group of four congressional representatives has introduced the five-state Northern Rockies Ecosystem Protection Act, which would designate more than 8 million acres of wilderness in Idaho.

The Idaho Conservation League supports the ecosystem approach to wilderness designation and supports the Idaho portion of the act, Director Glenn Stewart said. Only the details remain to be worked out, he said.

The statewide group's own wilderness proposal would include 6.5 million acres of federal lands in the state.

The Northern Rockies bill's introduction by Democrats from New York and California, and Republicans from New York and South Carolina, reinforces the idea that

"these are national lands," not just Idaho lands, Stewart said.

That idea apparently continues to escape the notice of the Idaho delegation, he said.

Members of the delegation have insisted in the past on an "Idaho solution" to the wilderness issue in Idaho.

The proposal was written by conservationists and wilderness advocates in the Northern Rockies region. And more than 400 groups and businesses support the proposal, including the Idaho Sportsmen's Coalition and the Idaho Environmental Council, said a news release from the Alliance for the Wild Rockies based Missoula.

It is the first time an ecosystem approach has been applied to public lands legislation, the alliance said.

Meanwhile Idaho interests and politicians continue to negotiate a wilderness proposal.

Idaho Democrat Rep. Larry LaRocca has proposed a bill that would designate about 1.5 million as wilderness in

the 1st Congressional District.

The conservation league has proposed a bill that would designate about 6.5 million acres.

Forest Service plans recommend wilderness designation for 1.3 million acres of national forest land within the state of Idaho.

About 9 million acres of federal lands within Idaho remain roadless and potentially eligible for wilderness designation.

But the issue is not numbers of acres but the areas that would be protected, wilderness advocates say.

The Northern Rockies bill would establish more than 16 million acres of wilderness and wildlife corridors in Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Oregon and Washington. But more important, supporters say, is that it protects entire ecosystems.

"The federal government holds these lands in trust for

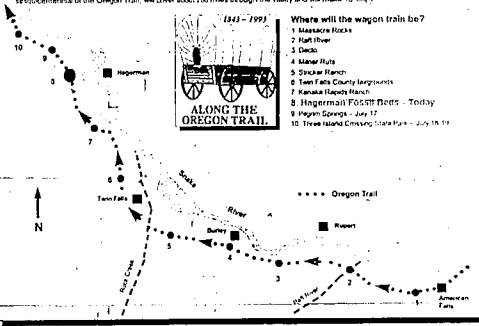

## Judge warns jailers to obey his orders

TWIN FALLS - A magistrate judge issued a stern warning Thursday to jailers who last week disobeyed his order by failing to take an inmate to a doctor's appointment.

Twin Falls County jail inmate Frank Kitchen, serving six months for drunken driving, was scheduled to see his eye doctor July 6, and 5th District Magistrate Melvin C. Edwards had signed an order that he be taken to the appointment and returned.

He didn't make it because jailers thought the appointment had been cancelled. So Kitchen's attorney, deputy Public Defender Patrick McMillen, asked Edwards to find the jailers and their boss, Twin Falls County Sheriff Wayne Touseley, in contempt of court.

"The bottom line is the buck stops with that man right there," Edwards said, pointing to Touseley as he scolded the jailers. "And he's not even a player in this action."

Touseley's duties include jail operations, but he was not directly involved in the decision not to transport Kitchen.

The issue was not about whether Kitchen's appointment had been cancelled, it was about following a judge's order, Edwards said.

"It is difficult for me to think you just simply disregarded a court order because you didn't care or you didn't think you needed to do it," Edwards said to the jail employees who testified.

He stopped short of finding anyone in contempt of court, but said he won't be so kind in the future. "Come back to me again like this ... and I'm not going to stop where I'm stopping," Edwards warned.

## Task force reviews aftermath of Amanda

TWIN FALLS - The violent death of 2-year-old Amanda Hostetter 18 months ago continued to cast ripples through Twin Falls Thursday as people close to the tragedy were interviewed by the Governor's Task Force on Children at Risk.

The task force wants to know whether changes suggested for the Department of

Health and Welfare in the wake of Amanda's death have been implemented, and whether the general child protection system has improved as a result, said Marcell Nelson, program specialist with the department's Family and Community Services Division.

Amanda died Jan. 20, 1992, from internal bleeding caused by a blow to the abdomen. Health and Welfare workers had seen Amanda several times prior to her

death, but never removed her from the home.

A jury cleared her mother's boyfriend of murder charges. Amanda's mother, Jodie Hostetter, pleaded guilty to one felony child abuse count for keeping a dirty house and allowing Amanda to be placed in a dangerous situation.

The task force's visit to Twin Falls was

IDAHO FALLS — A national oversight board has urged officials of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to exit hot tape and move quicker to fix problems at a nuclear fuel storage building.

Energy finally would address problems officials have known about for 20 years.

INEL officials told the Defense Nuclear Facilities Safety Board there's no immediate safety risk, and plans are in the works to remedy problems at the building.

Two reports last month questioned the safety of the "603" building erected 42 years ago to store spent nuclear fuels in three pools and a dry storage area.

An internal Westinghouse Idaho Nuclear Co. report said safety problems were aggravated by two decades

of inaction, as officials made plans to solve the problems but never carried them out. Energy Department and WINCO officials discounted or ignored the safety problems for economic reasons, the report said.

The WINCO report, which the state obtained through the environmental group Snake River Alliance, followed another report questioning whether the building could withstand an earthquake. Taken together, the reports prompted the state INEL Oversight Program to call for the building's immediate shutdown.

Steve Halupa, vice president and manager for WIN-

CO, said the building is safe. Spent fuel is to start moving out of the building by October, and safety upgrades are planned.

"The 603 Building is being operated safely," Halupa said. "As far as we know there are no show-stoppers out there that would say this is an inadequate facility. There's nothing that would require our immediate removal from the facility."

Halupa said the only earthquake concerns deal with some roof trusses and the building's crane system, not its storage pools.

## Rains hurt N. Idaho tourism

POST FALLS (AP) — Shivering in soggy sneakers under an umbrella, Dan Grimmer stopped to ponder a sign advertising ice cream.

"This really isn't what I came here for," the Thousand Oaks, Calif., resident said Wednesday in Court d'Alene as rain and temperatures in the mid-50s threw cold water on his summer vacation plans.

Just two weeks into the summer tourist season, some merchants here say their business is down significantly because of unseasonable rain and cooler temperatures.

"Our tourist travelers are checking out," said Bob Templin, owner of Templin's Resort and Conference Center.

At Sandpoint, Lake Pend Oreille Cruises canceled a regularly scheduled trip for lack of interest. The only people wanting to board the 149-passenger boat Wednesday

were from Seattle, where rain generally is not considered an inconvenience.

"The tourists are here, because we see the out-of-state license plates," said cruise ship owner Sandi Archer. "But they're not getting down to City Beach, where we are."

Instead of flocking to northern Idaho's beaches, tourists are seeking activities where they can stay warm and dry.

## Protests continue against timber sales

DIXIE (AP) — Environmental activists continued their protests against logging an area of the Nez Perce National Forest Thursday.

U.S. Forest Service officials said two activists were buried to their waists in the middle of a logging road, another was chained to a Forest Service truck and two more were on a tripod over the road.

Service law enforcement officers and Idaho State Police were dispatched. Some activists were arrested, a Forest Service spokeswoman said.

The area was closed to the public in mid-June after road-building equipment was vandalized. Earth First!, an environmental organization, contends it was closed to keep the logging from public scrutiny.

Activists contend at stake is the largest roadless area in the lower 48 states, which extends from the Goshute Wild Wilderness Area to the Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness Area.

They say building 145 miles of logging roads and taking 81 million board-feet of timber will ruin a valuable corridor for bear, owl, salmon, wolves and other plants and animals.

## Pig owners unhappy with county ruling

SPOKANE, WASH. (AP) — When the county ruled this little piggy can't stay home, the owners of a Vietnamese potbellied pig named Betsy cried big bad wolf.

Harvey and Edith Sramek said they will fight the recent Spokane County ruling that their 70-pound and finker should be classified as a farm animal, rather than a household pet. The county's zoning code forbids

keeping livestock in residential areas.

Despite their compact size, potbellied pigs are not known by any different scientific name than their larger counterparts, concluded Allan del-aubenfels, zoning enforcement officer. Also, uncastrated males and females with young could be dangerous, he said in a June 29 letter to the Srameks.

"I really think my findings are ludicrous, based on what they used to justify them," Harvey Sramek said.

The Srameks have until Aug. 8 to get rid of Betsy, or appeal the ruling. After that, the matter will be referred to the county prosecutor.

Veterinarian Gordon Jewett disputed the letter's assertion that the small pigs are dangerous.

Broadie has sold hundreds of carriages all over the United States and Canada.

"I cover a lot of area. I was even dealing with the Koreans," he said. "I deal with commercial people, he said. "The carriages are used pri-

marily to transport people around cities to historical places and individuals for private use."

Broadie says he has also sold carriages to famous people such as Hollywood star Kirstie Alley and affluent people such as doctors and lawyers.

Broadie smiled wryly when asked if he makes money.

"I make enough to get by and get down the road and back," he said.

Broadie promotes his wagons only by word-of-mouth. So far, he has received two orders for wagons while on the Oregon Trail.

"The wagons basically start at \$5,000 and then everything you add costs more," he said.

All wagons are made of red oak, carriages are painted to specifications, and sleighs are built to specifications, Broadie said.

"I wanted to travel," said Broadie. "I've put over 100,000 miles on my pickup in a year and a half."

The driver of the truck, Richard Ball of Paul, told officials he opened the hood and the flames shot out, according to Rupert Fire Chief Thayne Taylor.

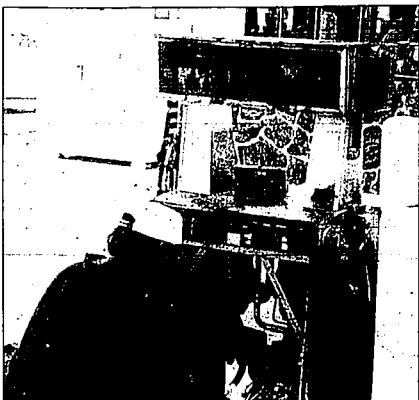
Ball ran inside the gas station to get a fire extinguisher, but when he returned the truck was engulfed in flames.

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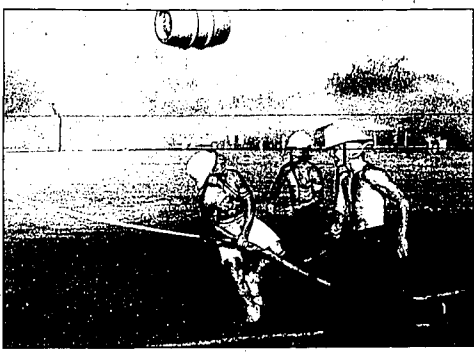

**Cassia school scores pleasing**

BURLEY - Cassia County School District officials are pleased with students' showing on standardized tests this year.

Curriculum Director Jerry Doggett told board members during their Monday meeting that he saw signs of improvement.

"The Iowa Test of Basic Skills are taken by sixth- and eighth-graders, while the Test of Academic Proficiency is taken by 11th-graders.

The averages in the district were near the 50th percentile, Doggett said, meaning that the students' scores were midway between the averages within the state.

Anywhere from the 65th percentile to the 35th percentile is considered in the "average" range, he said.

"Interpreting the meaning of the test scores can be difficult, Doggett acknowledged.

The tests show how well they've done but not why," he said.

In addition, he said some students don't take the tests seriously. Because the students' scores on the standardized tests aren't counted in grading, some students fill in the answers randomly.

Board Chairman Kent Fletcher said he likes to compare test scores to those of the past to see how the students have progressed as they traveled from the sixth to the 11th grades.

It can be tricky because the student population is changing, Doggett said one class had 10 new students, each of whom scored below other students in the class.

He said the curriculum can be modified if the tests point to a deficiency in a particular subject. For instance, math classes were recently altered for 11th graders.

**Child safety awareness event planned**

But the city of Rupert is fighting back. The city is conducting a child safety awareness seminar July 28, according to Sherri Miles, of the Public Works Office, who along with Police Detective Terry Quinn helped organize the event.

"We've never had any problems here in the past, but you never know when something like that might happen," she said.

Miles said she hopes the program will become a yearly event and "not just when it's fresh on everyone's minds."

She said several years ago a child fingerprinting program was instituted but support waned.

Pocatello's proximity to Rupert has convinced many parents to abandon their attitude of "it's not going to happen to my kids and it's not going to happen in Rupert," Miles said.

The seminar, which will be geared for parents and grandparents, will be held in the Civic Gym from 7:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. It will include films and information that parents need to know about keeping their children safe.

"It has little things that they can do to ensure their child's safety when they are out and about and mom and dad's not with them," Miles said.

Local police officers will talk about what parents need to do if their child turns up missing. A packet containing a checklist will be handed out.

Parents need to be able to provide police with information such as the child's clothing and any scars or marks they might have. A recent photo is helpful.

Also, the Rupert Police Reserves are planning a child fingerprinting session.

Miles said the event would probably be held on a Saturday at the Rupert gazebo. There will be no charge.

Along with the seminar, a poster contest will be held for the children. The theme of the contest is safety and will have three age divisions, including ages 6 to 8, 9 to 11 and 12 to 15.

She said the Minidoka County Banker's Association donated three \$25 savings bonds as prizes, and Rupert Mayor Bill Whitton donated three large pizzas. A local roller rink is offering free skating passes to children who enter.

On Thursday, Miles and Quinn were handing out their announcing the seminar.

She said the response from the community was very positive, and all the businesses were very receptive.

"We feel this is a real important program because kids are important," Miles said.

While Rupert may be a small community, it's heated near a busy interstate which puts it at risk.

"We all feel so safe and secure in our little world, and it's not so safe and secure," she said.

**Hospital land still hasn't been awarded**

## Rush to radio judgment

Limbaugh's popularity fuels resurgence in Magic Valley talk radio

JEROME -- Can we talk?

Let your Walkman we can.

Fact is, whether you live in Jerome and hate the North American Free Trade Agreement, or in Rupert and are steamed about hospital consolidation, or in Burley and carry a chip on your shoulder about landfill fees, talk radio is pretty hard to avoid.

"Talk really changed AM radio," said Kent Lee, station manager of Jerome's KART-AM and KFMA-FM. "Talk and Rush Limbaugh."

Limbaugh is on the box just now, skewering Bill Clinton as usual. Karla Cunha, who hosts KART's three-hour show, listens and chuckles.

"I get calls about guests we've had on the show and issues we've talked about," she said. "And then I get calls about Rush."

But when Limbaugh was still wearing polyester leisure suits and ranting and raving on sundowner stations in the Milo Belt, Cunha was learning talk radio at the side of another master.

His name was L. James Koutnik, and he could send the Magic Valley's blood pressure into triple digits faster than tax hike on Christmas Eve.

Koutnik was a Twin Falls real estate man with a low threshold for outrage: For 19 years he presided over "Party Line" on Twin Falls' KLIX-AM, and for part of that time Cunha was his engineer and on-air "sidekick."

"I learned a lot about radio and a lot about people," she said. "And I learned when to go to a commercial." After Koutnik's death in 1988, Cunha became one of a series of hosts of "Party Line," but the show was canceled last year. Her 9:06 a.m.-to-10:06 a.m. show went on the air on KART in May.

"We're probably averaging two or three calls a day from listeners," Lee said. "The format works pretty well for us because we are able to get newsmakers, generate some interest from sponsors and listeners, and it's a good lead-in to Rush Limbaugh."

"It's an interview show," Cunha said. "If we have time for calls, that's great, but after questions and answers and commercials, there's not always time for that."

"Time is always a big constraint with a live talk show," said Cliff Barborika, who hosts a show on Rupert's KBBK-AM. "If you have a guest, a caller or two can use up 30 minutes."

The newsmaker talk format that KART, KBBK and Burley's KBAR-AM use is dependable, but not always an accurate gauge of listener interest.

"I think that's the reason we wouldn't consider expanding our show, although we have gone longer in the past," said Mark Maier, news director of KBAR and part-time host of a 30-minute, three-day-a-week talk show. "You just don't know whether you'll get the callers."

And that's why KEZJ, the largest station in the Twin Falls market, hasn't installed its own-ahed talk show or replaced "Party Line" since it bought KLIX last fall.

"You'd have to have the right person to do it," said Terry Tarjo, general manager of both stations. "The problem with local talk shows is that they tend to be rather dull."

"It's great to interview the chairman of the local Red Cross, and what he has to say is of great interest to the

## Limbaugh, other conservative commentators twist dial to right

Day 146 of "The Raw Deal" dawned with Rush Limbaugh stating the obvious about his hit half-hour of liberal-bashing: "You're watching one of the hottest shows in America," he said, referring to "Rush Limbaugh: The Television Show."

Limbaugh, whose "Raw Deal" reference is to the Clinton administration, is proving himself right in more than ways than one: His colorful conservatism, proclaimed daily on television and his No. 1-rated radio show, has helped trigger boom times for commentators taking cues from President Clinton's perceived misuses.

The "Right on" vermaculosity of anti-establishment '60s has given way to the profit-making right-wing talkers of the '90s.

Some say the rise in conservative commentary is reverberating throughout Washington, changing the mood — and sometimes the minds — of the president and Congress.

Limbaugh alone is a powerful force.

According to the latest Arbitron ratings, his radio show has 4.6 million listeners per quarter-hour, up 78 percent from a year ago. And his half-hour television program is one of the few new hits in syndication.

"Rush is a gold mine," says L. Brent Bozell III, chairman of the conservative Media Research Center. "In every town in America, there's a Rush Limbaugh now."

Just since Bill Clinton's election:

• A consortium of conservatives announced plans to launch a television network in December. Sample programs include "Science in America," a weekly investigation of "government policies based on the bad science that is propagated by the establishment media."

• Former Watergate conspirator G. Gordon Liddy, who has a popular midday radio show in Washington, D.C., is going national with his views.

• Veteran conservative Pat Buchanan, who returned to CNN's "Crossfire" after his 1992 presidential bid, also is

starting a coast-to-coast radio show.

• Mary Matalin, former deputy campaign manager for President Bush, co-hosts the new "Equal Time" call-in program on CNBC cable.

• Add holdover conservatives John McLaughlin, William F. Buckley Jr., George Will, Rowland Evans and Robert Novak, all of whom have national electronic forums for their views.

Bozell says it's about time, but "fearfully enough,

"From the standpoint of commentators, there are many more conservatives than liberals," he says. "And that's because liberal commentators call themselves reporters and anchors."

Even Limbaugh's impact "pales next to what the other side has — morning news shows, evening newscasts and objective reporters promoting an agenda," Bozell says.

Fox News president Van Gordon Sauter, a self-pro-

## Non-alcoholic brew not everyone's cup of suds

TWIN FALLS — Crave a cold beer? Consider reaching for a non-alcoholic one.

A non-alcoholic beer? Isn't that a contradiction in terms?

Actually, non-alcoholic beer contains the same ingredients as regular beer... The only difference is that after the hops and barley have been brewed and fermented, the alcohol is chemically removed, leaving behind a brew for people who like the taste of beer but don't want the alcohol.

And that's not its only attraction: It's also lower in calories.

But that's not what explains the current rise in its popularity. Non-alcoholic beer sales, which account for 1.2 percent of the market, have tripled since 1990. "As with so many other trends, big business controls consumers' taste, and it's the fact that major brewers such as Coors, Miller and Anheuser-

Busch, have started offering non-alcoholic beer that is the ultimate cause of its growing popularity.

Luckily, brewers claim that its recent success is also a result of its improved flavor.

Dick Burwell, president of Magic Valley Distributing, said that the non-alcoholic beverage tastes similar to the real stuff.

"It can have a more hoppy taste, but you know you're drinking beer."

Some people in the Magic Valley disagree.

"It's just awful compared to a real beer," commented Jim Jones, owner of Dunken's Draught House.

Jones used to have it on draft, but his volume wasn't high enough to keep it fresh. Now he only sells non-alcoholic beer by the bottle.

Joe Knight, bar manager of Rock Creek Restaurant, agreed. Neither O'Douls nor Cutter, his two non-alcoholic offerings, are big sellers.

At every bar in the Magic Valley, however, beer drinkers and bartenders say something different about non-alcoholic suds. Debbie Harmon, who tends bar at Honker's Place, said her establishments sell a lot of the non-alcoholic stuff. And Irene Lees of Neo's Lounge in Eden observed, "In the winter time, people drink more non-alcoholic beer."

He wasn't sure why.

"Even if people can't agree about whether non-alcoholic beer tastes as good as its cousin, drinking it does offer one obvious advantage: Non-alcoholic beer drinkers don't run the risk of getting drunk. Especially since the crackdown on DUIs, people have become more conscious and cautious about drinking too much before they drive."

As Tony Watkins of Southern Idaho Distributing Co. explained, non-alcoholic beer is "great for the community and great for our image. It gives people an option not to drink but still to be socialable."

Non-alcoholic beer is also an integral part of the designated driver program. Hurvell said. It allows designated drivers to drink a beer without compromising the safety of others.

Still, it's important to remember that even non-alcoholic beer does contain .5 percent alcohol. And according to Simone Azure, director of substance abuse at the Canyon View Hospital, it shouldn't be used as substitute by people trying to quit drinking.

"My opinion is that for people (with substance abuse problems) who start drinking it, it's a short progression to drinking the real stuff."

Although non-alcoholic beer may appear to be a contradiction in terms to many people, perhaps someday consumers will consider it as they do sugar-free pop, low-fat ice cream or decaffeinated coffee — as just another product that allows them to indulge our vices without feeling too guilty.

# Lawyer-bashing hits primetime

The scene is a dusty road. As the crowd cheers, the chute opens, and out pops an attorney in suit and tie, clutching his briefcase and running for his life.

"There's Billy Bugh, going after that divorce lawyer that took away his boss' heart!" the roles announcer belts, as a cowboy on horseback whips his lasso in the air and gives chase.

"Yee haw!" erupts from the bleachers.

"Get him!" This particular lawyer wound up roped and hog-tied — in a beer commercial. And Miller Brewing Co. knows exactly what it's doing. In just about 30 seconds of air time, they're selling beer by acting out the sweetest revenge fantasies of millions of level-headed American citizens.

After decades of lawyer jokes and lawyer cartoons, lawyer-inspired song lyrics, T-shirts and "Saturday Night Live" skits, assaults on attorneys have reached a new intensity. The humor has developed a darker, sharper edge. At best, it depicts members of the bar as cheating, conniving slayers; at worst, as far less than human. A cartoon titled "Early Man Mourns the Passing of the First Lawyer," in a new book of cartoons by the syndicated cartoonist Wiley titled "Dead Lawyers and Other Pleasant Thoughts," shows two cavemen inspecting a body left after two hairy creatures' sneak away. "Oh, thank goodness," one caveman says to the other. "For a moment I thought it was human."

In "Henry VI," William Shakespeare was among the first to take note: "The first thing we do, let's kill all the lawyers."

Today, as the animosity and resentment that masquerade as humor intensify, several factors appear to be at play. When lawyers were allowed to advertise, the business of law became even more lucrative during the 1980s; and many attorneys blame distasteful ads for the slide in their image. As attorneys assumed a higher public profile, even becoming the subject of a prime-time soap opera, they also became the focus of increasingly critical media attention. And the consumer

movement that had already made enormous strides reforming the used-car and funeral businesses began to cast a skeptical eye on legal providers.

And, during the Bush-Quayle years the White House itself became the nation's chief lawyer-basher. Former Vice President Dan Quayle — a lawyer, himself — charged that lawsuits were costing the nation hundreds of billions of dollars and causing the nation to lose its competitive edge. Critics say his "evidence" was sketchy. Nevertheless, lawyer-bashing gained new legitimacy.

"Bush and Quayle really fired it up and provided the ammunition," said Terry Carter, a national columnist who tracks the image of lawyers in the media for California Lawyer and two other legal magazines. "It was sort of like the planets all lining up. ... Everything was coming together. Then they threw it up in the air, and it became part of the zeitgeist."

Officials of the American Bar Association agree. Quayle's attack was a wake-up call to the profession, said Mike Scanlon, the ABA's new director of communications.

Now, just a few months after Quayle has left the Washington spotlight, comes the latest lawyer-basher: the Tyrannosaurus rex in "Jurassic Park." There's never any question that the lawyer — with less than sparkling personality and even worse professional ethics — will be the first victim.

Carter, the columnist, compares the growing sentiment to a pendulum's swing. "There's a pendulum at work here," he said, "and we're really far out in that pendulum swing right now."

# War over used CD sales turns up in intensity

It was one of the strongest selling points when the major labels were trying to launch compact discs in the early '80s: CDs were semidurable and would sound as good on the 1,000th play as on the first.

It's true. And it means a cruel economic irony for the industry in the '90s: The sound of 1975's "Achtung Baby" CD will be just as crisp coming out of the bin for \$7.99 as the new bin for \$15.99.

That has thrown record executives into an uproar after the 315-store, California-based Warehouse record chain decided to start making those used CDs available in many of its stores. Other major chains — such as Massachusetts-based Strawberies and Texas-based Hush — also are selling used discs.

The war of words escalated to an explosion last

month. Three major distributors — Sony, CEMA (Capitol/EMI-America) and WEA (Warner/Elektra/Atlantic) — fought back, cutting off advertising dollars to any store that stocks used CDs. Caught in the fray are the small independent stores that have sold used discs without problems for years.

In response, some retailers have banded to form their own advocacy group, the Independent Music Retailers' Association.

"It just smells of greed and small minds," said Mike Lefebvre, owner of PepperFand, a Beatles-specialty CD/record store in Orange, Calif., that has sold used discs for the better part of a decade.

"It's not like a car that eventually wears out. This thing never wears out," he said.

Even some chains aren't eager to get into the used-disc business.

"We don't sell used products," said Stan Goman,

record-division head for California-based Tower Records.

"Used-record stores have been around, college campuses and hip areas of cities for years. I just can't see selling used stuff in a mall. It just junks up a store."

But the Warehouse, which touched off the powder keg, isn't backing down. "I started with the customers. The customers clearly like the idea," said Bruce Jesse, the Warehouse's vice president of marketing communications. "They like the idea of being able to trade in for cash or credit. They like the idea of being able to buy a CD for about half the price of new."

"Lastly, it's kind of fun, it's kind of an adventure," Jesse said. "You never know for sure what you're going to find. The mix of things in there, the titles in the used CD section, change all the time. Everyone likes the needle-in-a-haystack sort of thing."

## Lower prices mean consumers lower standards

Sacrifice quality for a cheaper price?

The public will do it every time, argues Jerry Pettus Jr., president of Charlotte, N.C.-based United American Video, a leading national supplier of videos priced under \$10.

UAV's videos — consisting of vintage movies, old TV shows and cartoons — are duplicated in the EP, or extended play, mode. Compared to the norm, SP, or standard play, EP tapes offer lower audio/visual quality. But EP videos require less tape to make, so they can be marketed much cheaper. SP tapes generally are priced in the \$14-\$20 range.

"The consumer doesn't mind the slight degradation in quality to get better price," Pettus said. "They get a tape that's very watchable. It's worth it to them to pay \$6 to \$10 for it."

Pettus argues that many consumers can't tell the difference between EP and SP tapes anyway — especially on older, smaller, inexpensive TV sets, where the audiovisual fuzz seems natural. "Whatever problems you find on EP tapes are much more apparent and magnified on big, fancy TV screens with high resolution," Pettus said.

In addition, there is an expectation of lower quality anyway with many of UAV's titles, which include obscure John Wayne Westerns such as "Blue Steel," "Randy Rides Alone" and "The Star Buckler," episodes from the "Underdog" TV series and such cliffhanger serials as "The Original Buck Rogers," "The Original Flash Gordon" and "The Original Rocketman: Commander Cody."

claimed conservative Republican who ran the CBS News division in the 1980s, says there is "gulf-level liberal orientation within the networks." It's one of the reasons there's an increasing estrangement between consumers and news organizations.

Sauter would not discuss whether his conservatism affected news coverage at CBS during his tenure. "CBS anchor Dan Rather, a frequent target of the Media Research Center's 'Notable Quotables' newsletter, virtually made Bozell's case during a recent closed-circuit interview with Clinton at a meeting of CBS affiliate stations.

As if we could be so hundredth as great as you and Hillary Rodham Clinton have been in the White House, we'd take it right now and walk away winners," he told the president of his anchor-pairing with Connie Chung. "Thank you very much, and tell Mrs. Clinton we respect her and we're pulling for her."

The quote was headlined "Dan Rather's Burning Love for the Clintons" in the June 7 issue of "Notable Quotables." Rather declined to comment.

During an earlier interview in Dallas, he said he was "dedicated to pulling no punches and playing no favorites."

"In the very first week of the Clinton administration, our CBS phones were ringing off the hook with people who said, 'Well, I knew all along that the people at CBS News were Reagan Republicans.' I sort of smile and shrug my shoulders. The more things change, the more they stay the same."

The onrush of conservative talk programs is anything but the same old story.

"During the Reagan-Bush era, you didn't see large numbers of people from the left side of the Democratic Party being given their own talk shows to aggressively debate the Republican agenda," says Jim Nareckas, editor of the Fairness & Accuracy in Reporting organization's biweekly magazine "Extra!" "But that's certainly what you're getting now."

Matalin says the broadcast and cable industries are only grudgingly airing conservative views.

"There is a huge audience for this," she says. "So even though they're philosophical quasi-socialists — well, that's going too far — they act like capitalists and they respond to market demand."

Andy Friendly, the CNBC executive who hired Matalin, says call-in TV and radio programs provide outlets for "fed-up and frustrated" audiences.

"We have a quote 'liberal' Democratic administration that is stumbling all over itself and not showing the promise or results that had been hoped for," he says. "And when that happens, Americans feel they want to hear and talk to people who share their frustration."

Former Carter administration spokesman Holding Carter, a political consultant and part-time commentator, calls Limbaugh "the sumo wrestler of the talk show trade. A sumo wrestler with fairly fast feet."

"It's not that the left-of-center people aren't good theater," he says. "It's just that they're not perceived as having the same market appeal right now."

"During the Bush administration, everything was mashed potatoes," Bozell says. "And now, like a laser beam, Clinton is defining the ideol-

gies again. In that sense, he's the best thing going for the conservative movement."

Meanwhile, liberal commentators and talk show hosts are barely seen or heard these days. Jesse Jackson's half-hour "Both Sides," which airs Saturday nights on CNN, is the only national public affairs talk program hosted by an acknowledged liberal. Former Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower's twice-a-day two-minute commentaries are heard on 46 radio stations, compared to Limbaugh's three-hour show on 600 stations.

Hightower, who calls himself a "progressive populist," claims to represent "all the underdogs of America who fight against the forces of ignorance and arrogance."

Ron Reagan, a former TV talk show host who now is a correspondent for the Fox News magazine program "Front Page," says the popularity of conservative commentators reflects "how far the political center has drifted toward the right."

"Rush Limbaugh can get away with all sorts of things," says Reagan's youngest son. "Everyone chuckles and says Rush will be Rush and he's just this jolly fat boy. I think it's about time that somebody stepped up to the plate and told the Rush Limbaughs of the world where to get off."

Limbaugh, who was unavailable for an interview, has said his show is "not about what America thinks. It's about what I think."

"I don't think I would have the success I have today being a liberal for the simple reason that liberals don't laugh about things," he adds. "I have a sense of humor. This is a fun show. I'm here to attract an audience, not to change the way America thinks."

people who are involved with that," Tario said. "It doesn't mean much to most listeners."

Tario, who runs about 13 hours of syndicated talk each day, says the key to a local show's success is finding a local host willing to be unpopular or outrageous — somebody like Koutnik or Limbaugh.

"Not many people are willing to challenge people," he said. "And that's what you need: somebody who will jolt people."

But he adds that there's no doubt Limbaugh, Larry King and their many competitors have set the stage for success local talk radio shows.

"People who listen to radio now are a lot more involved, and much more willing to challenge what they hear, than they used to be," he said.

For the moment, stations that carry Limbaugh — KART and KBBK in the Magic Valley — are drawing listeners simply by virtue of his presence in their lineups.

"We don't carry his show, but our morning DJ listens to him on the way to work from Oakley," Maier said. "He picks him up at 3:30 in the morning from some station in California."

That kind of listener loyalty is fine with Cunha. She figures it can't help but build an audience for shows such as hers.

"People who listen to Rush Limbaugh, I think, tend to be involved, and that extends to local issues."

Limbaugh's audience crosses demographic and age groups, and Tario is convinced that's the key to the success of local talk radio as well.

"When L. James was doing his show, he was getting some real strong (ratings) numbers," he said. "You would think the people listening to him would be over 35 or 40, but he was getting kids too."

Successful talk radio aims at the people who control the dial, he said, and that can extend from the car to

the home to the workplace.

"You find radios everywhere," he said. "If you go into a business and the owner or manager controls the dial, the customers and the other employees just have to deal with it."

Around here, they deal with Rushtalk.

"I listen to him," Barborka said, "because when I get out in the community I know people are going to say, 'Did you hear what Rush Limbaugh said today?'"



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# Virtual reality: The ultimate video game

So here you are, standing on a platform in outer space. You just arrived and, from the looks of things, there is nothing around for miles. Suddenly, a maniacal laugh echoes in your head and an ominous voice issues a warning: "Prepare to die."

A foreboding feeding washes over you.

You walk down a set of steps onto another platform. You turn your head to the right and the left. Then you notice a man watching you. He's hiding behind a column — and aiming a gun at you.

You extend your arm to shoot at him. You watch as your cartoon arm reels off a couple of shots and his cartoon figure dodges behind a column.

Then, out of nowhere, a protodactyl swoops down and snatches you up. The giant bird soars into space, as you helplessly dangle from the bird's jaws. Then he drops you.

You seem to be having an out-of-body experience. You watch as your body hits the ground, and yet you feel nothing. Your arms and legs fly off like matchsticks.

And then the game begins again. Welcome to another dimension in space and time.

This, friends, is virtual reality. It has been called a chance to immerse yourself in a computer storyland. Strap on a pair of goggles and you, too, can be a knight in shining armor or a Lilliputian walking in the land of 6-foot humans.

Once fodder for science fiction, virtual reality has long been a secret handshake shared only by the nation's top computer scientists.

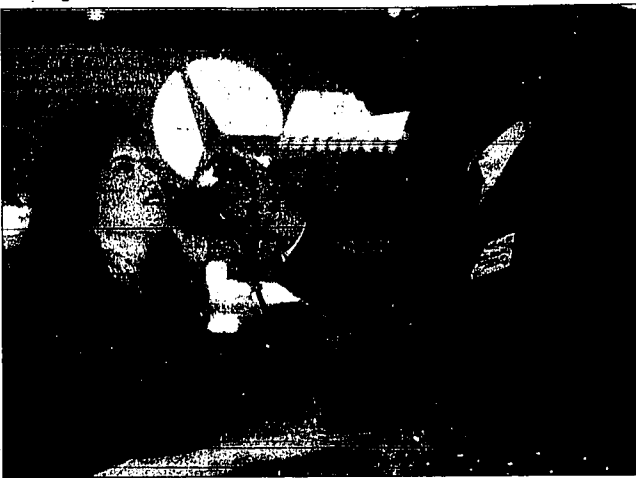
Pioneered by American researchers, virtual reality developed out of three decades of work, creating simulated training programs for the Air Force and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Today virtual reality is seeping into the American mainstream through our craving for video games. And that's none too soon for many Americans, who are eager to don a virtual-reality headset and try it themselves.

There's only one hitch: Virtual-reality game machines remain rare.

Some cities (Chicago, for one) boast of amusement arcades built entirely around virtual-reality machines, and some gigantic sports bars (Dave and Buster's in Atlanta, for instance) house virtual-reality games. But it's still hard for most people to even find a machine — let alone play it.

People occasionally stumble upon a virtual-reality machine on tour. At Daytona Beach, Fla., during spring break, college students stopped sunbathing and funning to pay \$5 for the

chance to strap on goggles and go virtual — even if it was only for 3/4 minutes.

The reason for the scarcity of the machines isn't hard to figure. Virtuality, the only virtual reality game machine currently on the market, sells for \$55,000 each. So neighborhood arcades aren't exactly lining up to buy them.

There are only 90 Virtuality machines in the country; most are in permanent locations, at sports bars or Virtuality amusement centers, said Bill Freund of Horizon Entertainment, a St. Louis-based company that holds the U.S. rights to Virtuality, a British invention.

A number are being sent around the country on tours, from college campuses to conventions.

But what's the fuss about? Some say it's the chance to play the ultimate video game. With virtual reality, players get the chance to go inside the world of the video game.

Hard to imagine? Maybe. But it's easy to enter this imaginary world. Just strap on a helmet — which can weigh from 2 to 6 pounds — and you find yourself looking at a computer-generated world on the miniature TV screens inside your helmet.

Using a joystick control, you walk. The quadraphonic stereo system in your headset echoes with footsteps. As you move along, a simulated heartbeat insistently drums in your ears — the heartbeats are faster than normal. Your adrenaline begins pumping.

Turn around and you can see the action behind you. If you squat, your character on screen squats. Duck and your character ducks.

Extend your arm and shoot. The bullets are toward the target as if you're lobbing rocks at your opponent. In the make-believe world of virtual reality, this game has been programmed so the pull of gravity is twice as strong as that which we experience on Earth, so the bullets don't follow a straight trajectory.

Although this is the stuff of a high-tech dream, the graphics remain fairly primitive. Even Army and Air Force simulators operate on a fairly basic level.

For people expecting to see themselves in a virtual-reality version of Panavision, however, this isn't it.

"When people do this try it on, they find out how lousy it is compared to all the hype," said Michael Moshell,

director of the visual-systems lab at the University of Central Florida, where researchers are working on virtual-reality training programs for the military.

The problem, Moshell said, is that the animated graphics are choppy and still look like something straight from a basic computer game. It may be an animated world, but the effect is more like an early Nintendo game than Walt Disney.

"It will be a few years before we get to television quality," Moshell said. "And it will probably be seven or eight years before we get the quality of a 70mm movie."

Already the rush to capitalize on virtual reality is bringing with it a crush of new products that, in reality, aren't virtual reality.

"It's a new industry. Jargon is bound to be confused," said Tom Byron, spokesman for Spectrum Holobyte, a California computer software company that was one of the first players in the virtual-reality gold rush. "When people talk about virtual reality, they tend to forget the word immersion. It's not a true virtual-reality experience unless you're immersed in the experience."

# After decades of jokes, Manilow ready for respect

Singer wants some recognition for 20 years as performer

LOS ANGELES — Thursday was Barry Manilow's birthday.

He's 47. Same age Ozzy Osbourne will be this year, but that's pretty much where the similarities end.

And while over the years he's always taken ribbing about his image with a good sense of humor, he's had just about enough. One-shot wonders such as Wilson Phillips get written up as the Next Big Thing while Manilow has been writing, arranging, performing and topping the charts for more than two decades.

It's time for respect. It's time for the jokes to end. It's time to own up; it's time for Manilow lovers to come out of the closet, as Bob Dylan, Arsenio Hall and Axl Rose have.

After all, someone bought those 50 million records, CDs, cassettes; and yes, eight-tracks.

Ross admitted he's a big "Mandy" fan. Dylan stopped Manilow at a party in 1988, hugged him and said, "Don't stop what you're doing, man. We're all inspired by you." Hall cites him as a favorite guest and admonishes his audience to give him respect for his work.

"They're brave for admitting it. I've gotten a bum rap," Manilow said in a telephone interview from his Bel-Air home. "It kind of capsulized this entire experience I've gone through for 20 years — people putting down what it is I do. When they finally investigate it, they change their minds."

And as for the people and the critics who hold up his work as... well, everything that made the '70s bad?

"The little wessels that take potshots at all of us? They're just little wessels. They get their jollies at the expense of others. I just don't take them seriously," Manilow said.

"Nobody was more surprised than me to find out I was a hip," Manilow said. "I believed in what I did so much, I couldn't believe there were people who couldn't hear it."

These days after style changes, an album of show tunes and a critically hailed journey into jazz with "2 a.m. Paradise Cafe" in 1984, Manilow himself is unsure of his image.

"I don't know what the public's perception is of me. I'm hoping there's a majority of them who know I am sincere in what I'm doing," he continued.

He's wary even about innocuous questions such as what he wears on stage. It's a caution stance that's become second nature after years of being set up and knocked down. Or as Rolling Stone put it, "When your name is a punch line, you live in hell. Barry Manilow lives in hell."

"I do press (interviews) when I feel it's necessary. Sometimes I'm lucky; I get an interviewer who's intelligent, who knows what I've done," Manilow said. "Sometimes I get very young people who ask me the same stupid questions about Bette Midler and the McDonald's commercials and how I wrote 'Mandy,' which of course I didn't write."

While acquiring a reputation as a master showman in his exuberant concerts, Manilow gives hints of a much more private person who has had his fill of the spotlight.

"If I could, I would never leave this studio," Manilow said of his home recording base. "Touring always gets in the way. I love being creative. The part that is the job to me is going out on stage and putting on makeup and looking cute and being in good voice. A lot of entertainers live for the mo-

ment the spotlight hits them. I do enjoy it, but what I really enjoy is not shaving and writing music."

His lack of enthusiasm for the stage partly stems from having had it all. And having lost it once. In the early '80s, he found himself broke.

"They start to hand you checks in the millions of dollars. If you're not on top of that, you begin to lose it. I hear these stories all the time," Manilow said. "I had \$11,000 after selling 50 million records. I mean, I lost it all."

And though he has since gotten back on his financial feet, to a degree the bankruptcy didn't matter much. Seriously.

"Although I felt pretty stupid for allowing it to happen, it didn't stop me from being OK. I learned that money wasn't the real reason I got in this business."

That's come around full circle, with Manilow now embracing his past after retracing it all to put together last year's four-CD box set. In the past 15 years Manilow hasn't done a

traditional concert — playing full-length versions of his biggest and best-known songs the way other artists do. Instead, he's done medleys, he's done show tunes, he's done jazz tunes.

This time it's all-the-way-through versions of all the big songs, just like on the records. And respect or no, he keeps a sense of humor about it.

Manilow laughed and said, "Far those guys who got dragged there by their wives and girlfriends, these hours are going to be agony."

It's hard to separate Man(illo)w from myths

He tries to lead a normal life. He doesn't want to hurt anybody. So why are they saying all these awful things about Barry Manilow?

He lives a secret life that even he doesn't know about. Sure, there are the big misperceptions that come to his attention, much of it surrounding the songs he writes.

But then there are the rumors, the myths, the underground rumblings that have lives of their own and never reach his ears.

To set the record straight on both:

• He doesn't write the songs: Not all of them, anyway. Beach Boy Bruce Johnston wrote "I Write the Songs." Other Manilow classics also were composed by other people, including the songs most associated with him: "Mandy," "Trying to Get the Feeling," "Weekend in New England," "Ready to Take the Chance Again," "Somewhere in the Night," "Looks Like We Made It" and "Can't Smile Without You." He did change the arrangements on many to fit his style. "I was able to take these songs... and make them into something that sounded as if I created them. That's why the public believed I wrote those songs, even though I didn't."

• No, "Mandy" isn't actor Mandy Patinkin: Since Manilow didn't write

it, could hardly be about him. Anyway, the rumor that they were high school classmates isn't true. "I don't know him at all."

• The "no-touch" clause in his performing contract: While not on the scale of a Howard Hughes, the rumor says, Manilow reportedly doesn't want to catch colds that would mess up a concert tour, so he keeps people at a distance. "That's nonsense. I've never even heard about that; that's really wild. I've heard a lot of them, but that's brand new on me." For the record, he shakes any hand and autographs any paper that his way.

• Women throwing cash at security guards, trying to get on stage: In Manilow's set, he chooses a woman from the audience to duet on "Can't Smile Without You." In some cities, savvy fans have bribed security guards with wads of cash, trying to get in prime position to get picked. "Wow, I hope they're not losing too much money," Manilow said.

• Calling Elton: Through the years he's been on stage in cashed velvet, bell-bottoms and that Copacabana outfit. Those days are long gone. "I don't do costumes. It's just clothes that I buy at the store," Manilow said. "Elton, Rod, all of us in the '70s were costumed up in rhinestones. It's an old image."

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# Historical society ready for open house

TWIN FALLS - Prescription for the summer blues: Jump in the car, head toward Curry Crossing, brake at the Twin Falls County Museum - and step inside yesterday.

That's an invitation from the members of the Twin Falls County Historical Society, who hope to generate increased interest in their museum at this month's open house.

"It's an opportunity to reach out to people," said society spokesperson Mable Lamb. "We're looking for new members and new input for the museum."

Here's the written equivalent of a guided tour:

Enter the double doors of the old Union School building, sold to Twin Falls County in 1969 for \$750. A volunteer from the historical society hands you a brochure. "You may close your eyes and hear the patter of little feet as they wore away the steps and trod the halls," it says.

Further inside, you groce through the old-time grocery and hardware store, and imagine your self at a turn-of-the-century tea party, admiring the delicate flower patterns on the Bavarian china and English earthenware. The napkins in the display case are hand embroidered. The fancy linens are made by "tatting," a craft that's almost extinct these days.

Next room: It's filled with vintage clothing, everything from knee-length swimwear to elegant hoop-skirted ball dresses. A mannequin is wearing a wedding gown first worn in 1904. A black velvet evening gown is displayed nearby.

So are the hats - lots of them - flowered, feathered and ribboned. "We could change the hat display every day and not run out soon," said Lamb.

The museum has plenty of artifacts, too. Petrified driftwood from the Bruneau desert is situated next to samples of molten lava. Against the wall is a section of the Amsterdam (near Hollister) Post Office and a switchboard from the old Perrine Hotel.

Adjoining room: You're about to view the cameras and equipment of C. E. Bisbee, the photographer who

captured the birth of Twin Falls on film. Next door to the Bisbee memorabilia is the "Stricker's House," circa 1900.

Move along, and you're in a one-room school, with its now faded textbooks, desks and student slates. A gramophone, player piano and early-day tractor stand ready to

provide the background music.

Downstairs: Historical society members are busily refurbishing the museum's lower floor. Much of it will house the collections of I. B. Perrine, "the father of the Magic Valley."

The world of the man who dreamed of building an empire in a desert is being recreated through the Perrine exhibit. So far, museum volunteers have collected two of Perrine's desks, an outfit worn by his wife and a photograph given to him by Thomas Edson one Christmas.

Outbuildings: A stroll on the museum lawn, lined with antique farm machinery, includes a stop at the blacksmith shop, the crafts corner, the big barn and pioneer house.

Pioneer house is the kind of home brimming with handmade quilts and sleepy-eyed bisque dolls. The children's room comes complete with a tiny china tea set and pint-sized cookstove.

The kitchen has a pantry stocked with ground coffee and crystal white soap. Mother is wearing her

apron and slicing away at the carrots and peppers.

The sitting room is furnished with a settee; endtable, clock and reading sewing machine.

And there could be more. Historical society members are now searching for people willing to contribute time or money to improve the museum. They're dreaming of a research and reading room which could be used by teachers, students and writers. They want to open the museum in the winter. But there's no money for heat. They're looking for someone willing to help restore old photographs and furnishings.

But they're looking on a shoestring.

Funding for the museum comes mostly from donations, along with \$4,800 figured into the county budget each year. Volunteers divide the money into slots for electricity, upkeep, office supplies and postage.

The volunteers work 600 to 800 hours a month.

It's a labor of love for yesterday.

# 'Hocus Pocus' is 'Bewitched' for '90s

It wasn't so very long ago — 10 years or less, I'd guess — that just about every movie to come out of Hollywood was about people with pimples.

## Movie review

Typically, these pictures would concern a teen-age (or preteen) boy who had just moved to a new neighborhood and was having trouble adjusting to life there. Often he'd have girl-troubles and bully troubles, and there would generally be some sort of sci-fi or supernatural twist to the story.

Although the heyday of the pimple-people picture is behind us, there are still throwbacks like "Hocus Pocus," which opens Friday. The new film tells the story of young Max Dennison, a California kid who has recently moved to Salem, Mass., and is — wouldn't you know it? — having trouble adjusting to life there.

Not only is Max beset by bullies, but he's also sweet on Allison, a beautiful girl at his new school who isn't particularly interested in him. That, until Max accidentally conjures up the spirits of a trio of 17th-century witches on Halloween night.

Talk about your icebreakers.

Max is portrayed by Omri Katz, the bland-but-not-annoying young actor who played the hero's buddy in "Matinee" — a pimple-people throwback that opened back in January. Vinessa Shaw has the thankless role of the lovely Allison, and Thora Birch ("Patriot Games") plays Max's plucky kid sister, Dani.

Eleven-year-old Thora is actually a good little actress — possibly the Jodie Foster of a new generation. But even so, "Hocus Pocus" would have been more enjoyable if it didn't so closely follow the synthetic conventions of the pimple-people picture.

Most of the movie's fun comes to us courtesy of the witches — amusingly malevolent spirits played by Bette Midler, Sarah Jessica Parker ("Honeymoon in Vegas") and Kathy Najimy (Sister Mary Patrick in "Sister Act").

Not even those marvelous "Jurassic Park" dinosaurs can do that. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema).

imperious house-haunter with buckteeth, beesting lipstick and two large crowns of hair resting on either side of her head. There's more than a whiff of the Marx Brothers' Margaret Dumont in Winifred's affected delivery, as when she summons her enchanted siblings. "SIS-TAHS!" she cries. "Gather 'round."

And gather they do — the daffy, crooked-mouthed Mary (Najimy), who has trouble keeping her tongue in her head, and Sarah (Parker), a spacy bimbo who has trouble keeping her hands off the guys. Rounding-out-the-cast-are Charles Rocket, facetiously funny as Max's and Dani's dad, and Stephanie Faracy ("The Great Outdoors"), who, as the kids' mom, gets a few laughs in a Halloween party scene in which she is dressed as Madonna and sounds like Madeline Kahn.

"Hocus Pocus" was directed by Kenny Ortega, who was a choreographer on "Dirty Dancing" and made his feature-film directorial debut with last year's "Newsies."

All things considered, "Hocus Pocus" is much more entertaining than a pimple-people picture has a right to be. In addition to the delightful witches and the delightful Thora Birch, the film's bag of tricks and treats also includes a cat that — thanks to the magic of computer graphics — really seems to talk.

Not even those marvelous "Jurassic Park" dinosaurs can do that. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema).

# 'Free Willy': Save-the-whales flick for kids

**"Free Willy" (PG).** A troubled young boy makes friends with an orca whale at a local aquatic park. When he learns of the whale's imminent removal, he decides to return him to the sea. Jason James Richter and Lori Petty star; Simon Wincer directs. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

**"Cliffhanger" (R).** Renney Harlin ("Die Hard 2") certainly knows how to direct action, but to appreciate the exciting stunts that Sylvester Stallone and company pull off you have to endure beatings sadistic enough to unnerve the old Marquis and the kind of story and dialogue that would look undernourished in a comic book. Very slick, but not even John Lithgow or "Northern Exposure's" Janice Turner can give it any dramatic lift. (Motor-Vu Drive-in).

**"Dennis the Menace" (PG).** Mason Gamble is Dennis in this adaptation of Hank Ketcham's comic strip, written and produced by John Hughes. With "Matinee" is the same Mr. Wilson; Christopher Lloyd, Joan Plowright and Lea Thompson also star for director Nick Castle. (Twin Cinema, Ace Theatre).

**"The Firm" (R).** As directed by veteran Sydney Pollack, the smoothly entertaining version of John Grisham's bestseller stars Tom Cruise and benefits from a script that has

taken the book apart and put it back together in notably better shape. The story of a lawyer whose perfect job turns into inescapable nightmare, "The Firm" benefits greatly from an eye-gone from Gene Hackman, Ed Harris and Wilford Brimley to Jeanne Tripplehorn and Holly Hunter giving on-target performances. (Twin Cinema)

**"In the Line of Fire" (R).** Clint Eastwood stars as the one Secret Service agent you don't want to mess with in this crisply entertaining thriller very professionally directed by "Das Boot's" Wolfgang Petersen. And Eastwood is matched glower for glower by John Malkovich as the president-laying assassin who doesn't plan to miss his target. If you like the sound of this, you won't be disappointed. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

**"Jurassic Park" (PG-13).** The poor little rich kid of this summer's movies: Enormous amounts of money and attention have been expended on making the film's half-dozen dinosaurs species awfully impressive (though much too intense for small children) but very little has been done to make any of the puny human beings equally involving. In fact, when the big guys leave the screen, you'd be tempted to leave with them. Another case of \$60 million worth of special effects chasing 2 cents worth of characterization and story. (Twin

Cinema, Jerome Cinema)  
**"Last Action Hero" (PG-13).** A ponderous joyride more notable for how strenuously it has been promoted than for how much pleasure it delivers. Based on a slight idea about a boy who lives action films so much he finds himself right up there on the screen with his hero, this epic falls victim to all the excesses that too big a budget and too big a star (Arnold Schwarzenegger) inevitably guarantee. And by parodying Arnold's already comic action persona, the filmmakers misjudged the appeal of their star. (Grand-Vu Drive-in)

**"Made in America" (PG-13).** Sensational chemistry between Whoopi Goldberg and Ted Danson charge this free-wheeling romantic comedy about a single mother (Goldberg), an owner of a Berkeley bookstore devoted to African culture, whose daughter (Tina Turner) discovers that her father, via a sperm bank donation, is none other than Danson, a flamboyant car dealer. Smart, sophisticated yet with wide appeal. (Grand-Vu Drive-in)

**"Rookie of the Year" (PG).** A children's baseball fantasy-comedy that probably only children will be able to wholeheartedly embrace. Which is more implausible: 12-year-old Thomas Ian Nicholas breaking his arm and magically turning into a 105 mph fastball phenom or the Chicago Cubs breaking into the World Series? "Rookie," directed by Daniel Stern — who also pops up as a demoted pitching coach and bean-ball victim — doesn't sell us on either, although fittingly for a movie about a late-in-

ning relief pitcher, it finishes strong. (Twin Cinema)  
**"Sleepless in Seattle" (PG).** This witty, warm, quip-happy one Nora Ephron romantic comedy offers teddy bear Tom Hanks and-live wire Meg Ryan — two players who click even when they share virtually no screen time — in an ultimate long-distance relationship: a Baltimore-Seattle bi-coastal dream romance triggered by a talk radio show, a kid cupid (Ross Malinger) and endless discussions of AFI to Remember." A real charm. (Mall Cinema)

**"Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" (1937).** This film has influenced virtually every American cartoon feature, from the Fleischer's "Gulliver's Travels" (1939) to the recent "Aladdin." Unlike the mumpkin era when they were recent features, "Snow White" touches genuine emotions, from the icy menace of the Queen to the warm merriment of the Dwarfs. Fifty-five years after its premiere, the jewel-like colors and crystalline clarity of the newly restored prints make it more apparent than ever.

**"Weekend at Bernie's 2" (PG).** He's back; but he's still dead. The sequel to the 1989 surprise summer hit picks up one day after the first one left off. Andrew McCarthy, Jonathan Silverman and Terry Kiser return for writer-director Robert Klane. (Twin Cinema)

### MSU to add women's golf, skiing to varsity program

BOZEMAN, Mont. — Women's skiing will join women's golf as new varsity sports at Montana State University, the college says.

MSU athletic director Doug Fullerton said Thursday the two sports are being added to meet NCAA Division I minimum participation requirements and to bring scholarships offered to female athletes at MSU more in line with the number offered by men's sports programs.

### Jewish leader blasts Schott portrayal in new biography

CINCINNATI — The book "Marge Schott: Unleashed" erases any doubt about sentiments held by the owner of the Cincinnati Reds, a Jewish community leader said Thursday.

"She's a bigot, she's a racist, she's articulated anti-black and anti-Semitic sentiments," said Michael Rapp, executive director of the Jewish Community Relations Council.

In February, baseball's executive council suspended Schott for a year and fined her \$25,000 for making slurs against blacks, Jews and Asians. Rich Levin, a spokesman for baseball's executive council, declined comment on the book Wednesday, saying he had not read the book and knew of no one in baseball who had.

## For 'the Shark,' it's smooth waters after choppy start at St. George's

SANDWICH, England — When might doing things backward be considered a way of getting ahead? Probably when Greg Norman plays golf as he did Thursday at Royal St. George's.

Norman's game has been stalled in traffic for so long, he surely cannot be blamed for posting that dramatic 4-under-par 66 to share the lead with Mark Calavecechia, Fuzzy Zoeller and Peter Senior after the first round of the 122nd British Open. Generally, whether the tournament is a major, minor or something in between, "the Shark" rides a late wave. His weekend charges are part of the sport's lore. Alas, so is his legacy of ifs, buts and maybes. A

number of events he almost has won in the home stretch were lost, in effect, upon take-off. The Shark doesn't choke so much as he bites off more than he can chew. Those early bogeys still count on the final scorecard.

Norman seemed to be embarking on another implausible mission Thursday. His first drive veered slightly right, but just far enough to find shelter in tall grass well-enclosed by overnight rain. Valor overcame Norman, who faltered away once with an 8-iron and twice with a sand wedge before reaching the green. That's three swings to cover no more than 140 yards. He took a double-bogey 6, at which point discretion

set in, and not a moment too soon.

"I thought I could get it out of that stuff with the 8-iron," Norman said. "I was completely wrong, and I guess I had to eat humble pie out there. But I told myself there are 71 holes to go, so be patient."

Easier attempted than accomplished. The weather for Norman's midmorning tee time was as good as it would get all day, an opportunity duly noted by Calavecechia and Senior, both working on their 66s within minutes of the Shark. Also, the back nine at Royal St. George's is palpably more difficult than the front. If Norman went out in par or worse — he rallied for 35, which is even — what grotesque number might he accumulate after the turn?

## Stand against China might hurt Utah, official claims

WASHINGTON — Lawmakers urged Congress on Thursday to formally oppose China's bid for the 2000 Olympics, but the head of the U.S. Olympic Committee warned their action could backfire and even hurt Salt Lake City's chances for the 2002 Winter Games.

"This notion of granting China, this despicable regime, the glory and the honor of holding the Olympics in the year 2000 is literally unthinkable," said Rep. Tom Lantos, D-Calif., in testimony before the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Aviation.

Lantos is a sponsor of a House resolution urging rejection of Beijing's candidacy for

the Summer Games because of the Chinese government's human rights record.

Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J., who last month introduced a similar resolution in the Senate, told the panel it was wrong to give China "a huge propaganda victory while it routinely tortures and imprisons political dissidents, severely restricts freedom of assembly and freedom of expression, brutally suppresses religious practices and oppresses the native population of Tibet."

But Leroy T. Walker, head of the USOC, warned that even a non-binding resolution "could easily trigger serious repercussions which would ultimately damage" the USOC and American athletes.

## Norman, 'in the zone,' rides birdie string to share of 4-way lead

SANDWICH, England — Greg Norman emerged from showers and mist and drizzle today in a tie for the hot sound lead in the British Open with a fellow Australian and a couple of his old-time tormentors.

Norman, who came back from a double bogey on the first hole with a late string of five consecutive birdies and a 31 on the back nine, shared the top spot with Mark Calavecechia, Fuzzy Zoeller and Peter Senior at 4-under-par 66.

"It's a matter of getting in the zone, getting the feel. Once you get the feel, you just go," Norman said of the birdie streak from the 13th through 17th holes at soggy-old Royal St. George's.

"I feel I'm back. I feel I'm ready to win another major," said Norman, the 1986 British Open winner who lost the title to Calavecechia in a playoff in 1988.

His closing burst seemed ample demonstration. It started with an 18-foot putt, was followed by a 45-foot chip-in and also included a 25-footer and a couple of mid-iron approaches that left him putts of less than 6 feet.

While Norman made the most spectacular move, it was only one of many on the course robbed of its natural defenses by rain that softened and eased his hard, fast fairways and greens.

The result was a complete change in the character of the course, exceptionally low scores and 11 men locked within a single stroke at the top of the standings.

The two men deemed most likely to succeed in the 122nd Open, Nick Faldo and Nick Price, were very much in the hunt.

Price, the PGA champion, was in a large group at 68 that also included three-time British Open winner Seve Ballesteros of Spain, Americans Scott Simpson, Corey Pavin, John Huston, Fred Couples and Duffy Waldorf, English amateur Iain Pym and Jesper Parnevik of Sweden, the upset winner of last week's Scottish Open.

Faldo, the defending champion and three-time winner of this title, was in a group another stroke back at 69, along with Paul Azinger, who double bogeyed No. 15, and Jack Nicklaus, winner of the Senior Open last week.

Unable to break par on the softened-up course were Payne Stewart, Tom Watson and John Daly, each of whom shot 71. Ian Woosnam and Tom Kite were at 72.

The course, winding through sandhills overlooking Pegwell Bay on England's east coast and generally considered the most difficult on the British Open rotation — only one of the 11 British Open winners on this links managed to break par for 72 holes — also was made more docile by the absence of the customary strong winds.

ROCKLIN, Calif. — The San Francisco 49ers made their peace Thursday with Steve Young, signing last year's MVP and leading passer to the richest contract in NFL history.

Just three months ago, in a bungling attempt to keep four-time Super Bowl winner Joe Montana, the 49ers said they would bench Young and play Montana. But the clumsy effort failed and Young was reinstated as the starter immediately after Montana's April trade to Kansas City.

Young's signing to a five-year contract worth \$26.75 million was an emphatic signal that the organization was now ready to cast his lot with Young.

"Steve has been a solid member of this team," said Carmen Policy, the team president. "He's always been there when we've needed him. Even if he didn't agree with what was happening on the field or off the field, he never turned his back on the organization. And I think it was time that the organization recognized that."

Young's annual compensation will aver-

age \$5.35 million, surpassing the \$4.8 million per year average for Denver's John Elway, according to Young's agent, Leigh Steinberg.

"Being the NFL's highest paid player is 'no big deal,'" said Young, who in 1984 signed a \$40 million contract with the Los Angeles Express of the now defunct U.S. Football League.

"That kind of thing comes and goes," he said. "I'm just going to play ball. We leave this negotiation ready to go to work."

Agreement was reached late Wednesday, after 9½ hours of negotiations between Steinberg and Policy.

Young missed the team's first training camp practice while waiting for the contract to be completed. After he signed it, he held a news conference and took the field for the afternoon practice.

He said his main satisfaction regarding the contract was that it validated his place with the 49ers and allowed him to get to camp on time.

# Controversy mars swimming events

**BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)** — Sam Jefferson of the United States won a silver medal in the men's 100-meter freestyle in the track competition at the World University Games, then questioned whether the race was drug free.

Ron Karnough of the United States finished sixth in the 200-meter individual medley, then questioned the conduct of one of his U.S. swimming teammates.

Jefferson, of the University of Houston, was beaten by Nigeria's Daniel Effiong, who attends Central Arizona, Canada's Glenroy Gilbert was third.

Afterward, Jefferson was not specific when he said, "Unfortunately, our swim is not drug free and I'm not even sure if the race was drug free."

Effiong, who has a personal best of 9.9 seconds, was clocked in 10:07, tying the WEG record. Jefferson ran his top time, 10:13, and Gilbert matched his best at 10:14, all run into a 2.6 mph headwind.

"Number one, if you look at the rest of the track, and field, in our sport this has not been a clean race," Jefferson said, "I'm a class A U.S. sprinter and I feel I can run just as fast on drugs."

"Where it takes a legitimate 10.2 runner maybe takes three years to get to a 9.9, it can take a few months to get there on drugs. Each athlete has his own opinion. There's a natural progression to get to this level."

"I won't accuse anyone. No one has been caught, tested positive. Effiong and Gilbert did not support Jefferson's opinion."

"I'm not about to point a finger at anyone," Gilbert said. "I have no suspicions. Everyone is clean until they fail a test."

"I'm a Canadian sprinter and I know all about that," he said, referring to the national disgrace of Ben Johnston's 1988 Olympic disqualification for using steroids. "You don't

know what's going on until there is a positive test."

Effiong made the semifinals in the 1991 world championships and has raced tougher competition than what he faced Thursday.

"I feel it was a free race," he said. "The times were 10:07, 10:13 ... in those kinds of conditions, with the headwind, 10:07 is great. I feel it is right to be tested at every competition."

The medalists and one athlete se-

lected at random are tested at the WEG.

Karnough's charges against his roommate for coming back to the athletes village after he had been drinking and waking him at 3 a.m., and a disqualification against the women's 800 freestyle relay cited a good U.S. swimming performance on a sour note.

Selected as the athlete to light the torch at opening ceremonies last week, Karnough, a 1989 graduate of California, was expected to take the gold in the event for which he has the second-fastest time ever by an American. Instead, he led for three legs, then was passed by five swimmers in the final strokes.

"He didn't want to make excuses for his performance but then talked at length about the early morning incident with his roommate. He said he alerted the coaches to it but they didn't take action."

"It's unfortunate that Ron would say that. His accusations are unfounded," said a men's coach Eddie Sims of Southern Methodist. "There was a confrontation between two of the athletes but we investigated and we found everything was OK. I feel sorry for Ron, that he didn't swim well but I think that's Ron's fault and he should take responsibility for his effort."

Senior Walker of Britain won the 200 IM with Jonathan Jennings of Texas third.

**BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)** — John McIntyre started at guard for Missouri when the Tigers were No. 1 a few years ago.

He's now attending graduate school and that makes him eligible for the World University Games.

"I was playing for a second-division club in Israel and they moved up to the first division and then there was a problem with my contract and it's now in arbitration," McIntyre, from Detroit, said. McIntyre is one of a number of familiar names on the various rosters in the men's basketball competition at the World University Games.

There are two groups — those like McIntyre who were born and

raised in the United States but decided to play in these games under another flag, and foreigners like Jiri Zidek of the Czech Republic who plays for UCLA, Pekka Markkanen of Finland who played for Kansas and Dino Maricic of Croatia who played for Southern Utah State.

The star finalists are Friday night and the unbeaten United States plays China in one game while Canada, the winner of the other pool, meets Italy.

Canada and Ireland, the team that came closest to the United States, losing 93-64, have the most U.S. collegians on their rosters.

Canada's players who fit in these categories are all natives who attend school in the United States. Rowan Barrett of St. John's has been its leading scorer while point guard Steve Nash of Santa Clara, who engineered the NCAA first-round upset of Arizona, and Brendan Graves of California have pepped up the world basketball competition.

# Lunn takes bite out of Big Apple

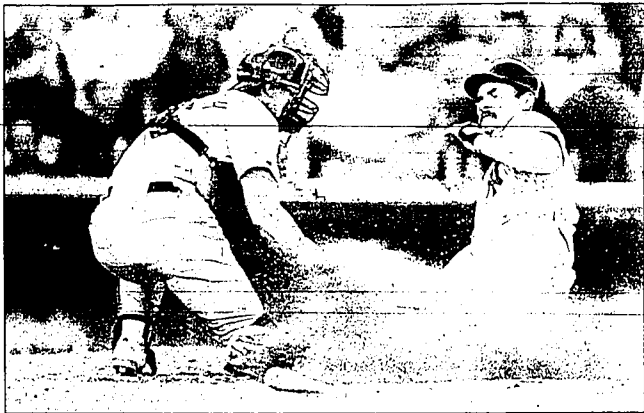

Nancy White, Lori Garbarz, Tammi Green, Vicki Ferguson and Hiromi Kobayashi of Japan are at 69, Trish Johnson of Wales and Mary Beth Zimmerman are at 70 while Betsy King, who captured the classic in 1990 and 1991, is in a four-way tie at 71. Defending champion Juli Inkster was 3-over.

Lunn had four birdies, with her lone bogey coming on the par-5, 430-yard 15th hole, where she missed a 5-foot putt.

She competed on the European Tour before playing in the LPGA qualifying tournament last year, where she tied for 19th place — non-exempt status. On the European Tour, she captured six titles and her sister, Mardi, captured the Ladies European Open last week. "I keep reminding myself that I'm only a rookie," said Lunn, who is coming off a seventh-place tie in last week's Youngstown Warren Classic. "However I am getting more comfortable. Mardi is two years younger than me and we are very close. I talk to her every day on the phone and we discuss our games."

Miller, who has eight victories since turning pro in 1978, had an inconsistent round. "I didn't play very well on the front nine," she said. "Fortunately, I turned things around."

BOSTON (AP) — Dave Fleming and three relievers combined on a six-hitter as Seattle won its sixth straight, handing Boston only its fifth loss in 20 games.

Fleming (5-1) allowed five hits in seven innings. The left-hander, who started the season on the disabled list, has won five straight decisions and a career-high 11th homer.

Mike Hampton, 20, the youngest player in the majors, got his first career save by relieving Scott Cooper for the final out.

## Blue Jays 7, Royals 2

TORONTO (AP) — John Olerud had a home homer in the seventh inning and a decisive bases-loaded walk in the eighth as Toronto ended a five-game slide.

# Boddicker decides he'll retire

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Brewers pitcher Mike Boddicker, who helped the Baltimore Orioles win the 1983 World Series, said Thursday he is retiring from baseball.

Boddicker, 35, had returned to his Cleveland Park Kan. home over the All-Star break to be with his ailing mother. He phoned the Brewers on Thursday with his decision.

Boddicker was acquired from the Kansas City Royals on April 26 and compiled a 3-5 record with a 5.67 ERA in 10 starts for the Brewers. He started well as the fifth starter, mixing breaking pitches and an occasional fastball, and went 3-1 with a 2.55 ERA in his first four starts.

But his effectiveness quickly diminished. In his final six starts, he was 0-4 with an 8.28 ERA. And in 54 total innings, he gave up 77 hits.

Boddicker was placed on the disabled list June 14 with a sprained left knee, the same knee that had required arthroscopic surgery March 3 to repair torn cartilage. He was dropped from the rotation and never pitched again.

Boddicker said last week he didn't expect to be with the Brewers much longer and that if he didn't retire, the club would probably release him.

He was not available for comment Thursday and had not yet returned to Milwaukee to clean out his locker.

"From Mike's standpoint, he wanted to help our club in every way he could," Brewers manager Phil Garner said. "He said he had nothing personal to gain, he was just concentrating toward help us win. Our standing (last place) might have had an effect. We also had hopes to him about looking at our jobs, too. All those entered into his decision."

In 342 career appearances, Boddicker had a 134-116 record with a 3.89 ERA. He started 309 games, pitched 63 complete games and 16 shutouts in 14 major league seasons with Baltimore, Boston, Kansas City and Milwaukee.

He broke into the majors with the Orioles in 1980 and was the first pitcher to be named the MVP in the league championship series. He went 1-0 and had a five-hit, 14-strikeout shutout against the Chicago White Sox in the 1983 ALCS. He also pitched a three-hitter to win a World Series game against the Phillies.

Boddicker finished the All-Star team in 1984 and finished with a 20-14 record and league leading 2.79 ERA. He also pitched in the league playoffs with Boston in 1988 and 1990 against Oakland, losing a game each season.

Boddicker was slowed by injuries last season with the Royals when he appeared in only 29 games, making eight starts. He had a 4.4 record.

Boddicker pitched a pair of one-hitters while with the Orioles, against Toronto in 1984 and against Kansas City in 1987.

# Racing fans, friends, family lay Allison to rest

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Hundreds of North Carolina auto racing fans attended a memorial service Thursday for driver Davey Allison at the small church he attended with the late Alan Kulwicki.

Driver Morgan Shepherd was among the few members of NASCAR's racing community attending the mass at St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic Church, just a few miles from Charlotte Motor Speedway.

Most were in Hueytown, Ala., for Allison's funeral. Allison, 32, died Tuesday after his helicopter crashed the day before at Talladega Super-Speedway.

In his eulogy, the Rev. Richard Contiliano recalled that a similar service was held in the church just four months ago for 1992 Winston Cup champion Alan Kulwicki, who died in a plane crash near Bristol, Tenn.

"Alan's passing touched so many lives, as does the passing of Davey," he said, as many of the people wiped tears from their eyes.

## 'We've lost another friend.'

"We've lost another friend," Shepherd said. "I was a lot closer to Davey than I was to Alan, who was something of a loner."

Shepherd was relieved to hear that Robert Yates Racing, which owns Allison's race car, decided not to enter this Sunday's race at Pocono, Pa.

"Since they were fifth in points and I'm fourth, we would have been next to each other in the garage," he said. "I think they made the right decision. It will give everyone a chance to get their heads together."

Shepherd said all of NASCAR is reaching out to the Allison family. "Everybody has to go some time but this really hurts all of us," he said.

Most of those gathered for the service in Charlotte were Allison's fans. In front of the altar was a poster showing Allison and his famous No. 28 Ford Thunderbird.

The priest described Davey Allison as a good family man with deep religious convictions. He suggested so many people came to the service because they were touched by the Alabama driver.

"I've followed the Allison family, starting with Bobby and Donnie, through their careers," said Daniel Huggins, 34, of Charlotte. "Then along came Davey. I can remember telling my younger brother that he was the next rising star. I really hate to see this happen."

"It was so full of energy," Curtis said before entering the church. "It's so sad that someone so full of life could be taken away."

# Racer's death hangs over weekend's Pocono running

LONG POND, Pa. (AP) — NASCAR's return to Pocono International Raceway this week normally would focus on stopping Dale Earnhardt's championship bid or hearing Ken Schrader's track qualifying record.

"There would be talk about Davey Allison's car-wheeling crash at Pocono a year ago, but they would chuckle and shake their heads about the guy who ran onto the track in front of Kyle Petty and Allison last month."

Allison's fatal helicopter crash this week changed all that.

"There will still be racing, and plenty of racing talk. All of it will be tinged by the death of one of the most popular drivers on the circuit, the second time it has happened to the sport in less than four months, the second to his family in 11 months."

Allison's car will be absent from the Miller Genuine Draft 500, but

not his name and number, which will appear on competitors' cars. Some will hear details that say "In Memory of Davey Allison 28."

Mark Martin's Ford will be one of them.

"It's just hard to believe," Martin said Tuesday after getting word of Allison's death, which followed the airplane death of NASCAR champion Alan Kulwicki in April and the death of Allison's brother, Clifford, last August in racing practice.

Martin thought back to just two days before, when he finished second and Allison third behind Rusty Wallace in the inaugural Winston Cup race at Loudon, N.H.

"Sunday night we both flew on helicopters to the airport, I was sitting on my airplane steps and he came running over toward me and waved me out of the way so he could run up in my airplane and look at it," said Martin, who had bought his plane in the off-season.

"He came in and we talked about the race."

"I can't imagine what that family's been through. There's nothing we can say or anything we can do. It's a big loss to all of us."

Davey Allison liked going to Pocono, even with some bad memories for him and his family.

The driving career of his father Bobby, a former NASCAR champion and a three-time winner at Pocono, ended in a bad wreck in the second turn of the three-corner track in June 1988. Allison's own frightening crash last July came in the short straightaway out of that turn.

Before his return to Pocono in June, Allison recalled telling a friend, "You know, I really think we're going to go to Pocono and win this week."

"I usually don't make a lot of statements like that. But I just have a good feeling going back to Pocono," Allison said in an interview.

He disagreed that it was a tough place for his family "because I've had several good runs there. Dad won." And he liked the people.

"Everybody at the speedway has always been real friendly to us. From the personal touch side of it, it's always fun to go up there. It's a relaxing area," he said, especially for his wife, Liz, and children Krista, 3, and Robbie, almost 2.

Allison finished sixth in his final Pocono race as Petty led 148 of the 200 laps for a 4.9-second victory over Schrader, who had set a track record of 162.816 mph in qualifying.

Pocono that weekend honored the Allison family with the Bill France Award of Excellence for contributions to the sport. Track officials this week were consulting the family on how to memorialize Davey Allison.

"It's like a blanket over this whole office," said Pocono chairman Dr. Joseph Mattioli.

"I'm positive there's going to be

different things happen at every race this season" that remind people of both Allison and Kulwicki, Mattioli said.

"It's going to be a pall," he said. "But time goes on."

**Dallas Cowboys**

Commissioner Paul Tagliabue assured the Cowboys they will not be shifted from their division when the NFL realigns. "We wouldn't want to destroy what works," he said. "The Cowboys in the NFC East works."

**Miami Dolphins**

Keith Byars, who played seven seasons with Philadelphia, signed a two-year contract with the Dolphins and joined his former Eagles teammate and friend, Keith Jackson.

"I made the right decision," Byars said. "I've got an opportunity to play for a legendary coach like Don Shula."

## 'Johnny Bago' dishes up fun

You could do a lot worse than hanging out with "Johnny Bago" this summer.

This lively, oddball action-comedy — from blockbuster movie specialists Robert Zemeckis and Frank Marshall ("Back to the Future," "Who Framed Roger Rabbit") — has been exiled to the time slot, purgatory of 9 p.m. MDT Fridays on CBS.

When it debuted, poor "Johnny" was thoroughly obliterated by ABC's "20/20" and a crummy Patrick Duffy movie repeat, "Murder C.O.D.," on NBC. It deserves better.

Bubbling with an engagingly low-down appreciation for American trash culture, "Johnny Bago" is a loopy and affectionate send-up of action shows. It also aims some carefully stung barbs at gangster movies, TV cops, RV enthusiasts and assorted other pop culture targets.

Johnny Tenui (Peter Dinklage) is a two-bit New York street hustler who goes on the lam after being framed for the murder of a tattooed boss. He winds up fleeing from cops and mobsters in a hand-me-down Winnebago. Therefore, Johnny's sudden nod to fugitive, Johnny Bago.

Bopping cross-country, stopping in trailer parks and dodging from one backwater burg to

another, Johnny meets all sorts of interesting eccentrics, wacko cops, fabulous babes and emotionally dysfunctional hitmen.

It's sort of a National Lampoon version of "The Fugitive Meets Route 66."

Dobson, who has appeared in such films as "Last Exit to Brooklyn" and "Where the Day Takes You," sports a nifty comic personality as lameable Jake Johnny. He's a cool jerk.

And Rose Abdou, who attended Michigan State University before paying her comedy dues with four years at Second City in Chicago, makes an impressive, funny TV debut as Johnny's brassy ex-wife, Beverly Flood. Beverly also happens to be Johnny's crunky, hard-charging parole officer.

Besides being saddled with a rotten time slot, "Johnny Bago" has stirred up a bit of misbegotten controversy.

The Italian American Foundation, a watchdog group on guard for ethnic defamation, has pressured CBS to dump the show because of alleged Italian stereotypes. The group says that "Bago" of the title is too close to the ethnic slur "bago."

Oh, brother. Lighten up, folks. "Johnny Bago" isn't an ethnic slur. It's a colorful, summertime comic book, a make-believe source of hand-loose escapism. And it is blessed with an above-average supply of wit and goofy imagination.

The result is an unusual movie about acceptance, tolerance, support, sex and fun among a group of long-time female friends who meet for three weekends within a year. Women viewers are not likely to be surprised by their conversation; men may be.

"Chantilly Lace" was shot during six days at Robert Redford's Sundance Institute in Utah, generating 28 hours of film that was edited down to the two that run Sunday night on the pay-cable service.

"Men say they feel like they've been let in a secret world," said Yellen. "Men said they were jealous that they (the women) had this closeness and bonding that they didn't have."

The experimental film was so successful that in September, again at Sundance, Yellen will pair the same seven actresses, playing different characters, with seven actors in "Parallel Lives."

"It's the idea that we all live many different lives — we live one way at home, one way at work," she said.

Yellen appears to be homing in on a film genre one might call collabo-

native improvisation.

"In material that I've created before, I've always used improvisation to set the character, to understand the character," she said. "I see doing a lot more of that. It gives the actors enormous freedoms. It really means letting the actors be collaborative. It's nice to do something this cutting-edge."

In the film, JoBeth Williams plays Natalie, a television film critic whose ex-husband has married Hannah (Helen Slater). Lindsay Crouse is Rheza, who anger flares during the weekend. Jill Eikenberry plays Val, who tells her friends that the love in her marriage has died. Ally Sheedy is Val's sister Elizabeth, who arrives with her friend Anne (Martha Plimpton). And Talia Shire plays Maggie, a nun who may be losing her faith.

During the story, the group meets three times — the first occasion, a reunion at Val's house that celebrates Natalie's 40th birthday; the second, Rheza's impending marriage; and the third time seeing a farewell video from one of their men.

Yellen said she did not assign the roles fully ahead. "We sort of cocreated the roles together," she said. "I had to be the conduit to connect all the pieces. I was the only one who knew what was going on with the other characters, so I had to share that with the actresses and work on the parts. We talked a lot about what was important, significant, what aspects of themselves that they

would like to stretch as actresses.

"I knew that there'd be seven characters — six friends and one outsider — and I knew that the age span covered at least a 10-year difference, that there had to be sisters to connect the generations. All this happened way before we went to shoot."

"By a week before shooting was to take place, each actress really knew the characters inside out. You could ask them about the characters when they were 3 or 5 years old or at their sweet-16 party or when they graduated from high school or whenever."

Yellen, her cast and crew lived in the same houses at Sundance that are used as the sets in the film. They spent the entire six days together, developing the story as they went along.

After four days and nights of intense work together, Yellen said, "We knew there was going to be someone (who would die). I said, 'Is there any consensus?' We did everything in a democratic way. Finally we had them draw straws. As in real life, there was a certain random as-

pect. The holder of the short straw got 15 minutes to think out her remarks and deliver her farewell scene at a nearby set.

Yellen named her film not for the song but for the face itself. "Chantilly" face is very strong and very fragile. She has willpower and an intricate pattern, and in its intricate pattern it derives its strength. And as it ages, it gets stronger."

## Disney airs new version of 'Heidi'

The Disney Channel offers a winning adaptation of the Johanna Spyri children's standard "Heidi," airing in two parts Sunday and Monday.

The timeless tale of parting and redemption has been the subject of more than a half-dozen film treatments, with the 1937 Shirley Temple picture largely regarded as the one to beat.

Just as the '37 adaptation served as a placebo for Depression-era blues, the Disney version speaks

poignantly to the feelings of abandonment and alienation prevalent in today's society. Involving despite its length, it packs more convincing intensity than either the book or any of the earlier movie versions. A thorough script, a breathtaking Salzburg, Austria, shooting location and fine performances by screen veterans Jason Robards (Heidi's grandfather), Patricia Neal (Peter's grandmother) and Jane Seymour (Heidi's mother) flesh out the character, personality and interpersonal conflicts.

The real gem of the movie is 10-year-old Noley Thornton, who

brings grace and conviction to the title role. Instead of following the template model of being a charming miniature "adult" schooled in the amusement of elders, Thornton's Heidi is subtly believable as a simple, good-natured girl.

"Disney's 'Heidi' is an easy film for the whole family to watch. It will hold the attention of children by wrapping a solid story in pleasurable images: beautiful scenery, elaborate costumes and plenty of cuddly baby animals." Adults will appreciate the film's pacing, complexities and especially the positive messages for youngsters.

## Report lauds importance of public TV, calls for user fees

NEW YORK — A think-tank report on the future of public television says the non-commercial network will be more important than ever in the coming 500-channel universe and calls for increased funding from the federal government and other sources.

Noting the continued fragmentation and commercialization of television, the report said, "The broad national values, the linkages among educational experiences, the in-depth coverage of public issues, and the common cultural experiences that the best of public television can offer seem of greater value than ever.... Without public television, there would be no alternative to programs driven fundamentally by the need to sell products."

The report from the non-partisan Twentieth Century Fund, to be released at a news conference in Washington Tuesday calls for Congress to impose fees on users

of the public airwaves to help pay for non-commercial programming. It also recommends that all federal funds for public television — \$253 million this year — be spent on programming, rather than continuing the present system of giving two-thirds of it to stations to use as they see fit.

The report was undertaken by Twentieth Century Fund in honor of the 25th anniversary of the creation of the present public-TV system. A 21-member task force included Vartan Gregorian, president of Brown University (who served as chairman), former PBS President Lawrence K. Grossman, journalist Lesley Stahl, former Sen. Timothy Wirth, D-Colo., and financier Henry R. Kravis. Its executive director was Chloe W. Aaron, a former PBS programming chief and station manager.

The report recommends that public television executives be mixed — welcoming the call for greater funding but skeptical of the proposal to earmark all federal money for programming.

## CBS pushing Letterman show — hard

NEW YORK — With millions riding on the outcome, CBS Tuesday launched the heaviest promotional blitz-in-network-entertainment history for its new star, David Letterman, who premieres Aug. 30 in a switch-over from NBC.

For eight weeks, starting with Tuesday's All-Star game, CBS will pepper its schedule with 80 spots made by Letterman promoting the show.

Most of the spots show Letterman in the foreground, with black graphics — including the CBS "eye" logo

— on a stark, white background. He addresses the viewer: "Don't you think that CBS eye thing is kind of, ah, creepy?"

Most of the ads, written by Letterman's writers, reflect the comedian's sense. The ads in an informal, straight-one-liners or one-two wags — "Is your name Bob?" Letterman asks the viewer.

"Hi, Bob!"

A second set of spots is aimed at daytime's primarily female audience. The ads feature a casually dressed Letterman in an informal setting answering interview questions posed off-screen.

A third set of ads will tie into local

stations' news programs with the theme: "Nobody follows the news like David Letterman."

George Schweitzer, senior vice president of communications, said at a news conference that the new program, "Late Show with David Letterman," will have a 60 percent share of network affiliates. Thirty percent more have agreed to carry the show with a half-hour delay, which is all that CBS will allow.

With six weeks left before Letterman starts rehearsing the new CBS "evening" show, the affiliates have signed on for the battle that will pit Letterman head-to-head against Jay Leno of NBC's "Tonight" show.

# National debate on TV violence getting out of hand

No one wants to stand up in favor of TV violence, but the current debate over the issue is so ill-informed and misguided that it's tempting to do so. Instead, we'll try to apply some much-needed common sense to the question of what to do about violence on TV.

First, let's address a few misconceptions:

**1. TV IS MORE violent than ever.** This is clearly wrong, at least on the networks. Sitcoms are the most popular form of programming, and there are fewer action and crime shows on the air than ever before. Shows such as "The A-Team," "Starsky & Hutch" and "T.J. Hooker," which aired during the 1970s and 1980s, all boasted more gunplay and fistfights than almost anything on now. The '1960s were just as bad. Cable TV and independent stations have added to the violence quotient, but no one is required to subscribe to cable. And cable is violent mostly because it recycles Hollywood movies.

**2. ALL TV VIOLENCE is the same.**

## Commentary

Look behind the numbers, and you'll find that such shows as "I Dream of Jeannie" and "Laugh-In's 25th Anniversary" are labeled as violent. So are the Bugs Bunny and Roadrunner cartoons many of us watched as kids.

One study cited by the American Psychological Association and recycled uncritically by media outlets says the average child will witness 8,000 made-for-TV murders before finishing elementary school. That amounts to nearly three murders a day — possible, but unlikely, unless the average child is watching TV all afternoon and all night.

Even when we can agree on definitions, context matters. "Hill Street Blues" does not equal "The Hard II." PBS's "The Civil War" has a high body count, but it's not "Dirty Harry."

**3. TV VIOLENCE begets real-life violence.**

Hundreds of studies have been done, and much evidence suggests that what kids see on TV affects their behavior. Kids who watch lots of TV

were found in one oft-quoted study to act aggressively on the playground.

We agree that most kids watch far too much TV. (We limit ours to three minutes a day.) But if TV violence translated directly into social violence, crime rates would be about the same everywhere — because rural and suburban kids watch as much TV as city kids do.

The truth is that among the many causes of violence — drugs, poverty, the availability of guns, urban decay, the breakdown of the family and lack of respect for the law — TV violence surely ranks near the bottom.

But the problems of drugs, poverty and guns are enormously complex. That leads to the bizarre spectacle of congressional leaders, who can praise the Brady gun-control bill, railing against the "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles."

It also leads to our next misconception:

**4. WARNING LABELS will help.** This is unlikely, although they probably can't hurt. Under pressure from Congress, the networks have agreed to attach viewer advisories to a few shows. They'll warn: "Due to

some violent content, parental discretion advised."

One problem with that is that only ABC, CBS, NBC and Fox have agreed to the labels, and they will decide for themselves when to apply them. They've exempted kids' cartoons, and the truly violent shows on independent stations ("G.I. Joe," "X-Men," "The Untouchables") won't be affected.

Another problem is that most labels are superfluous. Not even the most naive viewer can't be surprised to find violence in such TV movies as "Murder in the Heartland" or theatricals such as "Lethal Weapon II."

But the biggest problem with the labels is that they can work only when concerned parents supervise their kids' television viewing. If that was the rule, and not the exception, there'd be less reason to worry about TV violence.

Unhappily, most parents don't do even to regulate their kids' viewing. Nielsen reports that nearly 50 percent of kids between 6 and 17 have their own TV sets. Others watch what they want, when they want.

This is the heart of the problem.

and the real reason why the so-called watchdog groups want Congress to intervene. In effect, they're begging the government to protect us from ourselves.

TV, after all, is a business, and one that peddles its wares to a mass audience. In an admittedly flawed and imperfect way, the networks try to give people what they want. There's no better measure of the tastes of the American public than the Top 10 list issued weekly by Nielsen.

If viewers want to watch nonviolent, thought-provoking programs, they'd watch more PBS, A&E, Discovery, Bravo, C-SPAN, CNN and the Learning Channel. "I'll Fly Away" and "Brooklyn Bridge" would be top-rated shows, instead of Nielsen casualties. If viewers opposed TV violence, Mr. T would never have become a folk hero.

That's the biggest misconception of all behind the debate over TV violence: that viewers are passive victims of Hollywood who want fewer car chases and more socially redeeming programs.

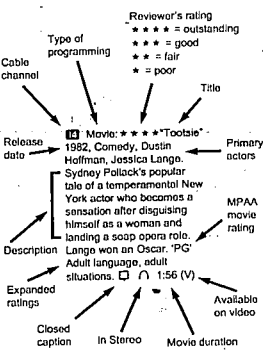

# Chase to plunge back into TV

LOS ANGELES — Chevy Chase knows there's no reinventing the talk-show wheel when it comes to late night.

"There isn't much you can do on these shows that hasn't been done," Chase said Monday morning, sparring amiably with TV critics during a press conference to promote his coming late-night talk show on Fox.

"I think these shows are host-driven. And it's, 'Do you want to see this guy do it?' So we're going to do the best we can in being original."

Debuting at 11 ET weeknights Sept. 7, "The Chevy Chase Show" is being billed as a "late-night, comedy-talk program."

Steve Binder, the show's producer, promises unpredictability. Chase jokingly guarantees "a lot of balloons."

No one, however, is promising instant success. Not in a jammed-up late-night universe that will also include Jay Leno, David Letterman and Arsenio Hall.

But Chase isn't interested in dissing the competition or adding to the media feeding frenzy over the late-night wars.

"I don't care about any of that crap," Chase said. "I like Jay. I love Dave, and I love to watch his show. And Arsenio was always very sweet to me when I was on his show."

"But I think we'll do less of an interview show than perhaps Jay or Arsenio."

In fact, the emphasis will definitely be on comedy and the irreverent sensibility that blasted Chase to fast fame on "Saturday Night Live" 18 years ago.

Like "SNL," each show will open with a comedy sketch before going to the opening credits and theme music.

There will also be a "Nightly News Update," a regular feature that echoes one of Chase's best-loved "Saturday Night Live" creations.

"The idea that it's turned into 'the next talk show' kind of parables me," Chase said. "To get back on television is just fun for me."

And no, Chase reassured one questioner, he hasn't mellowed. "If I'd mellowed, I wouldn't be doing this."

To join the late-night grind, Chase has put his film career at least temporarily on hold.

He kidded that Fox is paying him \$15 million a year to do the show. It's nowhere near that Lettermanesque stratosphere. "I'm not going to tell you what I make," Chase said. "That would be tasteless. And you know me."

# Cosby, Wussler form partnership to buy NBC

NBC doesn't seem to be for sale, but comedian Bill Cosby and TV executive Robert Wussler have a plan for what to do with it if it is.

Cosby, who became a megamillionaire from NBC's "The Cosby Show" and Wussler, a former CBS, Turner Broadcasting and Comsat executive, have formed Wussler Cosby Enterprises and could make a formal offer for the network this fall, according to this week's edition of Electronic Media, a trade paper.

The EM report says the partners, with the assistance of investment banker Goldman Sachs, intend to include NBC parent General Electric in the mix, with

a 10 percent to 15 percent stake of NBC.

It also says, costily and marginally profitable parts of the company, such as the news — and

sports — divisions, might be sold.

The reputed plan also calls for advertisers to be financially involved in production and for NBC affiliates to hold some equity stake in the new streamlined network. If GE were to sell NBC — which it has insisted in recent months it will not do — the price tag reportedly would be \$4 billion to \$5 billion.

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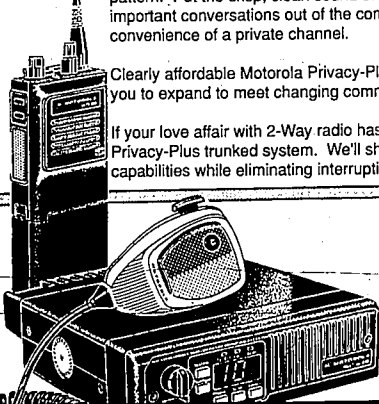

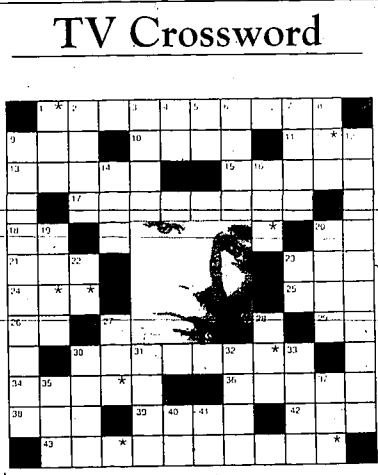

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# For diehard fan, horrid Mets are just grand

FIELD BOX 100, SHEA STADIUM — It was 99 degrees last Thursday, and the Los Angeles Dodgers were nailing the bases like in some old Goochy cartoon.

A jet blocked the sun, and all conversation in the stadium halted. The sold had no tea, no bubble.

Greg Mundy walked to center. Jimmy Fleming, the young Mets center fielder, tornately played the ball into the infield.

The first of two Met games. A two-night doubleheader at steamy Shea. Surely, nothing could be worse than this.

"The place that will off the wall, does it not?" Jack Waslin said aloud. But not.

Waslin was sitting in his box seat beyond third base, and it was not the cynical smirk of a New Yorker. He was happy, really happy.

This was Waslin's 999th consecutive game at Shea Stadium. He would reach 1100 in the nightcap. He had the tickets to prove it, from 1980. He would celebrate the moment by observing the Mets, experiencing the Mets, intaking the Mets.

Who watches the 1993 Mets? Waslin does. This might be some kind of record for maximum life. (XXX) eight days of getting stuck in traffic at the Queens Midtown Tunnel. But to Waslin, it is always 1980, and the Mets always leave a chance at finding the right detour.

"I grew up here," said Waslin, 33. "This is my fifth field. Shea is mine. It bothers me when I look at them talking about building another stadium."

"When I was a teen-ager in '78, I would ask a date here. If she went, she really wanted to go out with me. Nobody wanted to see that team. That's how I would see them out."

After all the sweating, Waslin is still spiky. That is no surprise: Waslin has built his life around the Mets schedule, home-and-away.

He has an understanding boss at a commercial refrigeration plant in Brooklyn. He has a supportive family. He has a new set of friends at the ballpark.

Here is Owen Grossblatt from Massachusetts, a guest last Thursday night in 1000. Grossblatt was patient when Waslin left his daughter's \$50,000 wedding in formal dress, right after the vows. There was a Mets game.

"Actually, after the cocktails," Grossblatt said, pausing in miskenntence for the plane overhead.

Even with these good people, it is not the same at Shea. Waslin admits that. The stands are empty. The fans are more negative.

Waslin blames this on success, and on the incessant second-guessing of talk radio.

"Eighty-four was my favorite season," he said. "It was so pure, exciting. Nobody knew about winning."

"When they won in 1986, it all changed. They won 100 games two years later, and it didn't satisfy anybody. It was the kinder syndrome. And on the radio, everybody was an expert about what was wrong."

In his years here, Waslin has caught eight foul balls. As he talked Thursday, Steve Coleman fouled the ball back, and Waslin muffled a tough play on another one.

"I give the balls to little kids now," he

said. "I love enough."

He has made friends on the field, too. Mostly the third basemen or shortstops. Howard Johnson gave him a warm-up session. Keith Miller, wherever he plays, leaves tickets for him.

Waslin has held up a banner or two in his day, for Holo or Buddy Humber. He had a comedy routine going with Frank Howard, when Howard was third-base coach.

"Give 'em the home-run sign," Waslin would yell.

Howard would take a big, imaginary swing. And smile.

There were times when Waslin admitted not to make games, when his car broke down and he had to abandon it in Brooklyn. Car services always rescued him.

When the dome on the Olympic Stadium collapsed a couple of years ago, the Expo-Mets game was moved from Mon-

real to Shea. Season tickets were not honored.

Waslin was in a panic.

He arrived at the box office early that morning. He was the first on line. The only one.

"Give me Box 1000," he said.

"But you can have any seat," the ticket seller said.

"It's my seat," Waslin said.

Now that he has reached the magic 1000 mark, Waslin is considering the un-

thinkable. He might miss a game, sooner than later.

He knows all the warning signs. He has stopped keeping score. He does not always force his friends to eat the lucky peanuts that would certainly change the fortune of Anthony Young.

"If I don't miss one fast, I'll probably have to go for 2000," Waslin said.

"I love this city. I love this team," he said. "I've a charmed life."

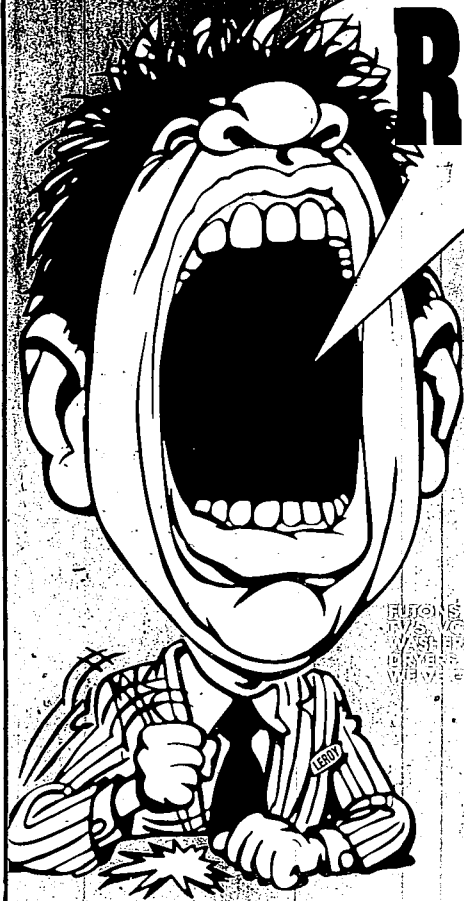
