# Navy must make its case for nuclear shipments

WASHINGTON — The Navy will have to explain to a Senate committee why it should be allowed to resume shipping nuclear waste to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Late Thursday evening, the Senate Armed Services Committee stripped language from a military authorization bill exempting the Navy waste shipments from federal environmental requirements.

U.S. Sen. Dirk Kempthorne, who sits on the committee, led the fight in the panel to

remove the exemption language, which the Navy had quietly attached to the bill.

Kempthorne called the hour-long debate in the closed committee room "one of the liveliest, most spirited debates I've ever encountered in the Armed Services Committee."

Highly radioactive spent nuclear fuel from Navy reactors has been shipped to and stored at the INEL since 1957. Some of those shipments pass through Glenns Ferry, Gooding and Shoshone on their way to the federal site near Arco.

But on June 28, federal Judge Harold Ryan barred further shipments to the INEL

until the Navy completes an environmental impact statement on nuclear waste management operations there.

The Navy had sought the congressional exemption to get around Ryan's order.

Instead, Kempthorne said, Navy officials will have to tell senators in a public hearing why the waste shipments should resume. That hearing probably will be held in about a week, the senator said.

"The process is absolutely backward," he said. "We need to hear from the Navy what the problem is before we consider a solution, and we need to determine what impact

## Panel pares tax increase

WASHINGTON — Negotiators agreed Thursday to raise taxes on fewer Social Security recipients than proposed by President Clinton and back-dated a major tax boost on upper-income Americans to March 1.

Senior tax writers in Congress also bumped from the deficit-reduction bill a Senate-passed plan to increase capital-gains taxes on those with incomes over \$250,000. And they voted to remove the present \$135,000 annual limit on the amount of wages subject to the Medicare tax.

The action still left negotiators far apart on some major matters, chiefly how much to raise the gasoline tax, how strictly to restrain the growth of Medicare, and how much new spending should be allowed for economic incentives and social programs.

"On revenues, we are about halfway there," Rep. Dan Ros-

## Idahoans' income rises with strong economy

BOISE — Total personal income in Idaho jumped by 7.2 percent this winter over the winter of 1992, underscoring the strength of a state economy that generated 2.2 percent more tax revenue than analysts expected.

The federal Bureau of Economic Analysis reported Thursday that only two other states — North Dakota and Nebraska — recorded greater percentage gains during the January-March quarter when compared to the year-earlier period.

The state has consistently been among the national leaders in income and job growth since 1990.

The bureau said payroll improvements in Idaho were above average in construction, services and in private service-type industries including wholesale and retail trade, the finance-insurance-real estate and transportation-public utilities groups.

Idaho's growth, which Andrus administration analysts had predicted in their latest economic forecast, nearly matched the 7.3 percent increase the state experienced in

personal income from the first quarter of 1991 to the first quarter of 1992.

It was well above the nationwide increase of 4.6 percent in personal income and the regional increase of 5.9 percent.

"Business conditions remained relatively strong in Idaho during this year's first quarter," economists for West One Bancorp said, despite "a weather-induced decline in retail sales combined with weakening farm prices."

The income expansion was reflected by the report earlier in the week that personal state income tax receipts were up more than 12 percent from July through June with the bulk of that increase coming during this past winter and spring.

Administration economists projected growth during the spring quarter to slip fractionally to 7.1 percent before picking up during the final six months of the year and exceeding 8 percent this fall to average 7.8 percent for the year.

Personal income increases in the border states ranged from 4.3 percent in Wyoming to 6.2 percent in Washington.

# Ruined home goods bury Midwest landfills

So much is wet, so much is stained, so much reeks of river bottom and sewage that Midwestern dumps are filling up with the ruined remains of flood victims' lives.

So much must be thrown away, that garbage trucks are gridlocked.

In Des Moines, Iowa, trucks are backed up in lines even though dumping hours have been extended and the landfill is open Sundays for the first time. The \$20 per ton fee for disposal has been waived through the end of the month.

It's kind of like the funeral after the flood. People are burying their lives," said Gail Andersen of the Des Moines Metropolitan Solid Waste Agency, which handles trash for 17 communities in Polk County.

"We waived the fee because people need help right now. The last thing people who've lost everything need is to pay to have their possessions buried in the ground," she said.

Like an aftershock after an earthquake, a second flood wave is hitting long-suffering residents along the swollen Mississippi and its tributaries.

It's a wave of debris — sodden carpets, rugs, clothing, sofas, chairs, mattresses, wallboard, TVs, refrigerators, ovens and whatever else the rolling rivers destroyed. Millions of sandbags must also be disposed of.

To make matters worse, much of the junk is water-logged and bulky, which means it fills up dumps faster than planned.

"It's going to cause a loss of useful life at these landfills. It's going to be a nightmare for quite some time," said Francis Hallada, senior environmental engineer for the Iowa Department of Natural Resources.

"It's unlikely any of that can be recycled," he said.

In Des Moines, the volume of trash going to the landfill is triple what it was two weeks ago. The amount has gone from from 180 vehicles and 434 tons of refuse on July 3 to 304 vehicles and 1,384 tons on July 17.

In Missouri, the first estimates show 300,000 tons of residential waste will be generated.

## HIV inmate says he was beaten in jail

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls jail inmate infected with the AIDS virus says he was beaten in his cell Tuesday and now has been placed in solitary confinement.

City police are investigating the beating of Timothy Heck, 33, who is in jail facing two felony charges of sexually abusing a child.

Heck was arrested Monday night outside the Depot Grill restaurant and charged with reckless driving, petty theft and obstructing a police officer.

When police confirmed there was a 1-year-old felony warrant out for Heck's arrest, he was taken into custody and booked into the Twin Falls County jail.

The next day he was taken to Burley to be arraigned on charges that he sexually molested two boys, ages 14 and 13, more than a year ago.

The trip to Burley was necessary because all the Twin Falls judges were out of town for the annual judicial conference.

When he returned from Burley, Heck said he was entering his cell next to a cell-block lounge when someone threw a blanket over his head, and several men began pummeling him with their fists.

Heck said he saw four men in the area before the blanket was thrown over his head. Sgt. Jim Munn of the Twin Falls Police Department said he believes three men were involved in the attack.

He did not identify the suspects, and said no arrests had been made late

## Gem 'election fatigue' ends with new law

TWIN FALLS — Only 3,844 voters bothered to cast ballots in Tuesday's juvenile jail bond election, fewer than attended the grand opening of the new Costco Wholesale store the same day.

People may have been more interested in getting a good deal on crescent rolls than deciding whether to borrow \$800,000 for the proposed juvenile jail.

Or they may simply have been "electioned out."

In the past two months or so, Twin Falls voters have been asked to elect school trustees (May 18), borrow \$4 million for a new landfill (June 9), approve an \$840,000 supplemental school levy (June 22), and OK the jail bonds.

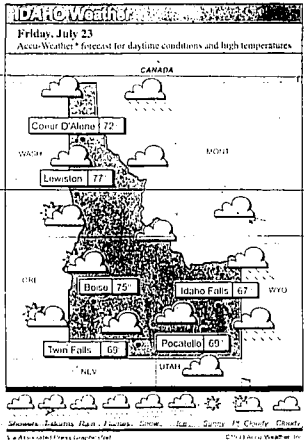
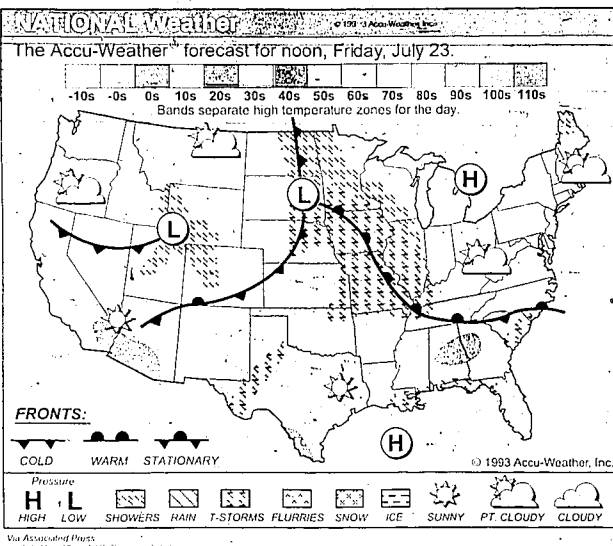
In addition, Camas County voters went to the polls on June 18 to approve a school bond issue and supplemental levy, and Murtaugh School District voters on July 13 turned out a plan to build a new high school, middle-school building.

In Idaho, just about any day can be Election Day. That may be creating "election fatigue" among local voters who are repeatedly being asked to approve bond issues or special levies for dozens of separate taxing districts.

"We've had the school bonds, the landfill, the juvenile detention center — we've just been bonded to death," said Twin Falls

## Rain soaks Midwest again; South continues to swelter

Rain fell in parts of the Midwest Tuesday, swelling floodwaters in the nation's already-sudden midsection. Heat and humidity prevailed in the South.  
In northeast Montana, all rural roads as well as parts of Highway 2 were closed by flooding near Poplar and Wolf Point.  
Meanwhile, the Mississippi River was near crest Thursday morning at Cape Girardeau, Mo. Levels were falling on the river's upper half, and Wabasha, Minn., was slightly below flood stage.  
On Thursday afternoon, rainshowers and thundershowers extended from Florida across the upper Texas Gulf Coast as well as in the southern Appalachians.  
Showers and thundershowers also fell in South Carolina and northern Georgia, across New England into northeast New York state and the western part of the lower Ohio Valley; the upper half of the Mississippi Valley; eastern parts of the Dakotas; the northern Rockies; and the Oregon coast.  
Heat and humidity remained a problem and advisories were posted in parts of the Carolinas as well as across Mississippi and much of Arkansas. A heat alert was posted through Friday for Alabama, except the coastal areas.  
Atlanta reached 101 degrees and broke its high temperature record for the date of 100 set in 1952. Montgomery, Ala., heated up to 109 degrees, tying its record for the date, set in 1978.  
For the first time in a week, the low temperature records for the date were broken or tied, the National Weather Service said.  
Temperatures around the nation at 1 p.m. MDT ranged from 51 degrees at both Jackson, Wyo., and Yellowstone National Park, Wyo., to 100 at Anderson, S.C., Atlanta and Montgomery, Ala.

## Weather summary

The National Weather Service reports a band of moisture that spread across the Gem State from the west brought mostly light rain to most areas by Thursday afternoon.  
With the rain temperatures remained well below normal. No significant winds were reported.  
Mid-afternoon readings were generally in the 60s and 70s although a few cooler readings were reported.  
The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 77 degrees at Hagerman. Stanley reported the coldest at 33. Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 108 at Lake Havasu City, Ariz. Truckee, Calif., reported the lowest at 32.

this court order will have on the Navy and on national security.  
Gen. Cecil Andrus, who first drew attention to the Navy's attempt to get an exemption on Tuesday, repeatedly has stated that the Navy cannot prove that halting the shipments will endanger national security.  
Andrus has attacked the Navy's exemption play in vitriolic terms, calling it a "sleazy attempt" to circumvent Ryan's order and "childish and petulant."  
He enlisted Kemphorne in the fight to strip the exemption language out of the military authorization bill on Wednesday.  
Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary will also be invited to testify at the hearing. Kemphorne said. He urged all sides to try to work out a compromise, not confrontation. "This is a time for negotiation, not conflation."

negotiators at an open meeting of their conference. "But there is not much progress on the spending side."  
Later, Rostenkowski told reporters that many House members he had talked to were reluctant to support the proposed gasoline tax because its impact would be focused on large, rural states and only certain industries.  
"That will be tough to sell," he said.  
Hargainers are working on a bill, the heart of Clinton's economic program, designed to reduce the budget deficit by \$500 billion over the next five years. Half the saving would come from tax increases - mostly on the well-to-do - and the remainder from spending cuts and restraints.  
Clinton kept the pressure on Congress to pass the deficit-reduction package.  
The lawmakers agreed to try to limit the Medicare restraints - the biggest spending hangup - to halfway between the \$58 billion front-five-year reduction voted by the Senate and the \$50 billion in the House bill.  
All the decisions are subject to reconsideration until the negotiators reach final agreement on the entire bill. Congressional leaders are hoping negotiators can finish the bill by July 29, allowing final action in the House and Senate before a recess to begin Aug. 6.

Thursday afternoon.  
Aside from a couple of ribs that may be cracked, Heck reported no severe injuries. His face still bears many of the bruises and marks caused by the beating. Mann said, acting on advice from the county's legal counsel, the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Department declined to allow The Times-News to photograph Heck Thursday.  
Chief Deputy Ed Gudgeff said Heck was being held in an isolation unit for his own protection Thursday.  
Heck said he believes he was "set up" and Tuesday's attack is an extension of the discrimination he faced while in jail two years ago.  
Ironically, Heck said he is in jail on fabricated charges that stem from a dispute with the two boys involved. He is being held in lieu of \$50,000 bond on two level charging. A preliminary hearing is set for August 3.  
"One of the boys" named in the complaint against Heck said in a telephone interview Thursday he will ask that the charges be dropped when Twin Falls County Prosecutor G. Richard Bevan returns next week.  
The boy, now 15, said the alleged incident involving his friend did not occur. He would not say whether or not the incident in which he is named actually happened.  
The other boy could not be reached for comment Thursday.  
In felony cases, the decision to pursue the charges or drop them lies with the prosecutor.

Heck has a long criminal record and was most recently in jail two years ago, charged with felony assault. That charge was reduced to a misdemeanor when Heck agreed to plead guilty.  
When in jail at that time, Heck said he was routinely discriminated against by jail staff because a blood test revealed he carried HIV, the virus that causes AIDS.  
He wrote a letter to 5th District Judge Daniel Hurlbut that is included in his court file. In the letter, Heck complains of cold food, bags of garbage left for days in his cell, not being allowed to shower for 12 days, and being denied a change in bedding for more than two weeks.  
"In the letter," Heck acknowledged he had open sores at the time. HIV-positive inmates are only isolated from the general jail population if they have open sores or wounds that might result in the virus being transmitted to other inmates, Gudgeff said.  
Former Sheriff Jim Mann, who was in office during Heck's last jail stay, denied Heck's claim that he was kept in a cell with a large sign proclaiming "AIDS" over the door.  
Tuesday's attack "feels like a setup" connected to the earlier discrimination, Heck said. Although he does not know if he has "full-blown" AIDS, Heck said his health has been deteriorating in recent months. He was diagnosed with AIDS-Related Complex more than a year ago.  
"Sgt. Mann at the Police Department said he had no evidence linking the attack to Heck's illness."  
He was charged in March 1992

County Commissioner Jim Freley. "I think that played a big part in it (the defeat of the juvenile bill proposal)."  
The summer voting season may not be over: On July 29, school boards in Twin Falls and Kimberly will decide whether to hold levy elections.  
A state law that goes into effect next year is aimed at reducing the confusion caused by frequent elections, each with its own polling hours and eligibility rules for voting.  
Starting Jan. 1, elections will be held on only four days a year: the first Tuesday in February, the fourth Tuesday in May (which is already Primary Day), the first Tuesday in August, and the Tuesday following the first Monday in November (the day now set aside for general elections).  
In addition, the law sets uniform rules for registering to vote and declaring candidacy, uniform polling hours (8 a.m. to 8 p.m.) for

all elections, and requires districts to use the same polling places "whenever practicable."  
The main sponsor of the "election consolidation" law, Rep. Pam Ahrens, said it's intended to make local government more accountable to voters and, just as important, encourage people to vote in local elections.  
"There's so much confusion," said Ahrens, R-Boise. "People don't know what the election's being held, where to vote, what time the polls open. It's hard enough to generate interest in the general and primary elections."  
Only 15 percent of registered voters in Twin Falls County, or 4,677, voted in the June 9 land-fill bond election. In the Twin Falls School District levy election, 2,037 people voted. And the 3,841 voters in Tuesday's fall-bond election represent just 13 percent of the county's registered voters.

# AIDS cases increase by 3.5%; heterosexual transmission up

ATLANTA (AP) — The biggest jump in new AIDS cases in the United States last year was among women who — for the first time in the epidemic — were infected more through sex than drug use.

New AIDS cases climbed by 3.5 percent last year, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported Thursday.

And while the vast majority of patients still are men, the fatal disease is increasing almost four times as fast among women.

"It's a continuing evolution of the epidemic," said Dr. John Ward, the CDC's chief of AIDS surveillance.

"They need to know their sex partners, and they need to know the drug and sex practices of that partner so they can ... make a more informed decision about whether to have sex with that person."

About 47,095 new AIDS cases were diagnosed in the United States last year, up from the 45,499 cases reported in 1991.

New cases among females 6,642 — increased 9.8 percent, compared with a 2.5 percent rise among males, who accounted for 40,453 cases.

Until now, tainted drug needles have caused most female AIDS cases. Last year marked the first time that sex surpassed drugs: 50 percent of the new female AIDS cases were due to heterosexual contact, compared with 44 percent from intravenous drug abuse, Ward said.

Still, about 57 percent of the women infected heterosexually reported having had sex with a drug user, making drugs an indirect threat, the CDC said.

It was just a matter of time before sex became women's biggest AIDS risk, said David Kirby of the American Foundation for AIDS Research.

"Not only do they have sex with IV drug users, but with bisexual men," he said, adding that bisexuality is more prevalent in the United States than is commonly thought.

"This underscores the tremendous need for highly specific education aimed at sexually active women," Kirby said. "We have to help them empower themselves so they're able to negotiate having safer sex with their partners."

A big consequence of the increase among women is the spread of the HIV virus to their babies, who come

down with full-fledged AIDS much sooner than adults. The CDC recorded 624 new AIDS cases among infants and toddlers last year, a 16.6 percent increase.

The CDC expects the trends to continue because all AIDS cases from heterosexual contact increased 17.1 percent last year, while those due to tainted needles increased only 1 percent.

More than half of 1992's new female AIDS patients lived in 10 metropolitan areas, with most

concentrated in New York City.

Homosexual and bisexual men, the first group hit by HIV a decade ago, still account for most new diagnoses.

But new cases in that group decreased 1.1 percent last year, the CDC said. "The slowing trend in this population reflects the prevention efforts in these communities," Ward said. "It shows that, yes, you can have prevention programs that teach of urge or motivate people to change their behavior and reduce their risk."

## 'Tragedy of errors' allows cleric to obtain at least 3 visas from U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A "tragedy of errors" allowed Sheikh Omar Abdel-Rahman, the Muslim cleric suspected of ties with terrorists, to receive at least three visas in the 1986-1990 period, the State Department said Thursday.

State Department Inspector General Sherman Funk said in a preliminary testimony that his review of the Egyptian sheik's case was "deeply troubling" and "what is even more troubling is that the same errors can happen again in the case of visa applicants whose interests may be inimical to the United States."

Abdel-Rahman's followers include suspects in the World Trade Center bombing and alleged plots to launch terrorist attacks on New York landmarks and tunnels.

An immigration judge in March ordered him deported and on July 2 he was taken into custody. He is now being held at a federal prison hospital in Otisville, N.Y.

Funk chronicled what he called a "tragedy of errors" including events in 1991 when the Immigration and Naturalization Service office in New Jersey was seeking information to deport the sheik at nearly the same time the INS office in New Jersey was granting him permanent residence status.

## School package unveiled by GOP

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republicans proposed their own school improvement package Thursday, focusing on school choice.

They denounced President Clinton's plan as the product of the teachers unions. Rep. Dick Armey, R-Texas, said the plan he and four other GOP lawmakers proposed would emphasize the use of tax-funded vouchers that parents could use to pay for private schools.

"Every person that I've talked to that's not a teacher and not in administration think it's a great idea," said Rep. Cass Ballenger, R-N.C., who joined Armey and Reps. Pete Hoekstra of Michigan, John Boehner of Ohio and Newt Gingrich of Georgia at a news conference to announce the plan.

Mike Cohen, an assistant to Education Secretary Dick Riley, said the proposal represented "the same gridlock we've had for 12 years."

Armey's plan would provide federal matching grants for local schools to spend on choice programs, decentralizing management and similar programs. A quarter of the funds would be set aside for choice programs.

## Errors, breakdowns in system

Among the State Department's findings:

- Abdel-Rahman's name was not added to the State Department's lookout system until nearly seven years after it should have been done. During this period he was issued at least two visas.
- After his name was added, the system was not checked as required when he applied for and was issued another visa.
- Even after the State Department realized its error, it failed to

notify the INS for some six months, during which time the sheik made several trips into and out of the United States.

• The INS, after being notified the visa had been issued in error, continued to miss him in his departure from and entry into the United States.

• The INS issued him a "green card" for permanent residence while the INS lookout system contained information prohibiting that.

Funk, in a classified report issued to House members earlier, stated that a CIA officer serving at the U.S. Embassy in Sudan unwittingly approved Abdel-Rahman's request to enter the United States in 1990, three years after his name was added — and then belatedly — to a list of foreigners ineligible to enter the United States.

Rep. Tom Lantos, D-Calif., the chairman of the House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on international security, international organizations and human rights accepted that account, rejecting speculation aired in the Arab world that the CIA rewarded the sheik get a visa because he helped the agency recruit Afghan rebels to fight Soviet forces in Afghanistan in the 1980s.

"It is my judgment that there was no CIA complicity in a deliberate manner in getting the sheik into this country," Lantos said, attributing the action to "an erroneous judgment of the individual involved and not through a matter of CIA policy."

"Our system for keeping terrorists and others who would do us harm at home has more holes in it than the levees of the Mississippi River," he commented. Rep. Ben Gilman, R-N.Y., ranking minority member of the subcommittee. "It is a hopeless mess that needs a thorough housecleaning."

"It clearly is a dysfunctional system in the very dangerous world in which we live," added Rep. Olympia Snowe, R-Maine.

Mary A. Ryan, assistant secretary of State for consular affairs, said that "we fully understand that the system leaves room for improvement," but "with approximately 7 million applications filed annually at over 200 overseas locations, it is a monumental task."

Abdel-Rahman, who is blind, was tried and acquitted in connection with the 1981 assassination of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, and was charged with inciting a 1989 riot in Egypt.

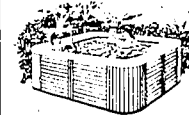

**Investigators search for clues to suicide**

WASHINGTON — Investigators talked to colleagues of deceased deputy White House counsel Vincent Foster Jr. on Thursday and searched his office as they tried to confirm a preliminary conclusion that he committed suicide.

The U.S. Park Police inquiry is not addressing the larger unanswered question of what might have motivated President Clinton's longtime friend to take his life Tuesday night.

"I don't think there is anything more to know," Clinton said. "His family, his friends, his coworkers, we've been up real late two nights in a row now, remembering, crying, laughing, talking about him. I don't think there is anything else."

Foster's body discovered in a suburban Virginia park. He had been shot once in the head with an antique revolver that was still in his hand.

**Panel seeks aid from Packwood accusers**

WASHINGTON — The Senate Ethics Committee is sending letters to all the women who worked for Sen. Bob Packwood, the Oregon Republican accused of sexual misconduct, seeking "any information you may have" to support or refute the charges against him.

Packwood's accusers said they were encouraged by the panel's step. One, Julie Williamson, 53, said from Portland that "To me, I think it is a sign that they are really making an effort to have what I would call an investigation."

Ethics Committee Chairman Richard Bryan, D-Nev., and Vice Chairman Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., said in the letter the panel is "interested in any information that you may have regarding Sen. Packwood's conduct, whether that information tends to substantiate allegations of sexual harassment or misconduct, or to refute them."

**Tax payments create \$11.1 billion surplus**

WASHINGTON — Quarterly tax payments by corporations and self-employed people gave the government a rare budget surplus of \$11.1 billion in June, the Treasury Department said Thursday.

That reduced the cumulative budget deficit for the first nine months of fiscal year 1993, which began Oct. 1, to \$200.6 billion, down from \$19.9 billion from the same period a year earlier. A year ago, the June surplus was \$3.8 billion.

The Office of Management and Budget now expects the year's deficit to total around \$285 billion, down from a record \$290.1 billion in 1992.

**Ex-judge sentenced to 8 years in prison**

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — A former circuit judge was sentenced Thursday to eight years in federal prison for his part in a Miami courtroom extortion scandal.

David Goodhart, 63, was the only one of four defendants in the Dade County case who was not a sitting judge at the time of the 1991 indictments in Operation Court Boom.

The judges were charged with accepting bribes from several lawyers. A raid of the judges' homes in 1991 resulted in authorities finding walls of \$100 bills including money handed out as part of sting operations that led to the arrests.

**'Lost' lottery ticket yields \$10,000**

WINCHENDON, Mass. — "Finders, keepers" is the motto at the home of Rice and Linda Ruschioni, who collected a \$10,000 jackpot after their 8-year-old daughter spotted an unscheduled lottery ticket in a parking lot.

"I ate whatever you want to call it," the father said Thursday, explaining the family's decision to keep the prize money. "Somebody else was going to walk down and find the same ticket."

Mrs. Ruschioni thought the ticket might be a winner, so she took it to a liquor store and confirmed the lucky news. The next morning, the Ruschionis collected their winnings at the Massachusetts Lottery office in Worcester.

**NASA shoots for Saturday launch**

CASPER, Wyo. — NASA said Thursday it was ready to try again Saturday morning to launch the space shuttle Discovery on a three-day flight.

A launch attempt last Saturday was stopped with less than an hour to go because of a faulty electronic switch in a system that frees the bolted-down spacecraft from the launch pad. NASA has replaced the switch.

**Tap water, floods flow in Iowa**

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — As more of it fell from the sky, water flowed through faucets in Iowa's flood-weary capital on Thursday for the first time in 12 days.

But too much water remained a problem for many in the Midwest.

In Illinois, the Mississippi River swept over an island that it created in a flood more than a century ago. After a levee blew out on the 15,000-acre Kaskaskia Island, someone rang the town's 252-year-old "Liberty Bell of the West" to warn anyone who hadn't already fled.

Heavy rains also caused flooding in parts of Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri and North Dakota on Thursday, and the forecast called for more thunderstorms, some of them strong. Flooding rains first started in the Midwest more than a month and a half ago.

Strong thunderstorms dumped up to 5 inches of rain on southeastern Nebraska, pushing the Big Nemaha River from 12 feet to 25 feet overnight at Falls City, population 4,800. Flood stage is 20 feet, but no new evacuations were reported.

An estimated 3 inches of rain in five hours caused widespread flooding of streets and basements in Council Bluffs, Iowa. In Kansas, flooding closed U.S. 77, a major north-south route 60 miles west of Topeka. In central North Dakota, 4 1/2 inches of rain in Glen Ullin caused basements to cave in.

And no relief came from the Mississippi River, which held in a "flat, broad crest" for more than 200 miles from Grallon, Ill., to Cape Girardeau, Mo., said Tom Dietrich, a National Weather Service hydrologist in Kansas City.

"We really are at crest and we are next to be hanging up there the next three, four, five days," Dietrich said.

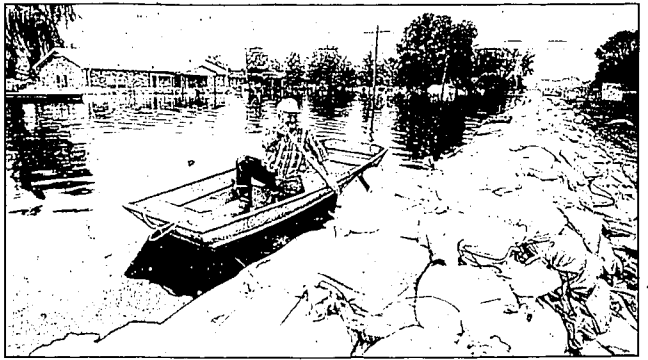
River engineers are worried that hundreds of miles of saturated levees could crumble as the high water persists.

The river was at 46.9 feet Thursday at St. Louis, down slightly from the record 47.05 feet Tuesday night, Dietrich said. He said the level will continue to fluctuate because of factors including upstream rain, levee breaks and levee repairs. Flood stage is 30 feet.

Downtown St. Louis is protected by a 52-foot-high floodwall, but a neighborhood at the city's southern tip has been badly flooded as sandbagged levees were swept away.

One of the worst levee breaks along the Mississippi was one at West Quincy, Mo., last Friday that closed the last open bridge over the river for a 200-mile stretch. Dan Campbell, sheriff of Marion County, Mo., said Thursday he will investigate whether someone deliberately broke that levee. He said water district officials were suspicious because the levee seemed to be in good condition just before the break.

In rainy Des Moines, traffic returned to highways and downtown businesses reopened for the first time since the Raccoon River swamped the city's water plant July 11, knocking out service to 250,000 people. After they refilled the city's 810

By early afternoon, water service was back to half the city, with the other half expected to get it back by the weekend. Until then, downtown workers were asked to choose between water for air conditioning or water for toilets.

The water won't be safe to drink for at least three weeks.

In Illinois, Kaskaskia Island — created when the Mississippi changed course in an 1887 flood — was being overrun by the river after a section of levee failed.

Most of the 125 residents who remained in recent days fled during the night. Workers trying to plug the levee were taken from the island by boat.

Another levee broke Thursday on the Missouri River, this one protecting farmland in Saline County, Mo.

Flooding since the start of June has caused \$10 billion in damage and left 16,000 square miles of farmland under water. More than 32,000 homes have been damaged, the American Red Cross estimated Thursday.

**House delays vote on \$3 billion in flood aid**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A \$3 billion emergency aid package for Midwestern flood victims was delayed Thursday in the House because of disputes over how to pay for the assistance.

It was not clear when a vote would be held on the aid package, which the administration had urged Congress to pass as quickly as possible. A staff member of the House Appropriations committee said it could be a day or two before the measure comes to a vote.

The delay touched off angry outbursts.

the floor and lauded the courage and the heroism of their constituents in this flood and then stood up and stuck a knife in their backs when it comes to emergency aid," said Rep. Richard J. Durbin, D-Ill., chairman of the Appropriations subcommittee on agriculture.

### Public comment hearings set for INEL cleanup proposal

**TWIN FALLS** - Federal and state officials have set hearings and a public comment period on proposed cleanup of buried radioactive waste at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The 30-day public comment period begins Wednesday, July 28, and ends Aug. 26. An informal open house to explain the plan and take public comment will be from noon to 7 p.m. at the INEL Outreach office in Twin Falls.

The government is considering what to do with "Bad A" - plywood boxes and steel drums with hazardous chemicals contaminated with radioactive waste stacked on an asphalt pad and covered with three feet of dirt.

The steel barrels have a life expectancy of about 20 years.

The department's preferred alternative is to maintain and monitor the existing dirt cover.

## Mom was right: Man involved in fatal June crash wasn't drunk

**TWIN FALLS** - A blood test shows that a Filer man involved in a fatal accident last month had not been drinking before the crash.

A state police officer investigating the crash told reporters at the scene that he smelled alcohol on the breath of Jeffrey Knight, 18, immediately after the wreck.

But the state crime laboratory tested Knight's blood for alcohol and found none, the same officer said Thursday.

"He must have gotten some spilled on him" during the crash, ISP Cpl. Jay Jensen said. There was alcohol in Knight's pickup at the time of the accident, he said.

Jensen reported that Knight failed to stop at the intersection of Idaho Highway 75 and 2500 East Road on June 17.

His pickup collided with a car being driven by Hazel Wilder of Twin Falls. Wilder's passenger, 73-year-old Dixie Newby of Twin Falls, was killed.

"Several law enforcement officers at the scene said they believed Knight had been drinking, Jensen said. But Knight's mother denied those reports the next day.

"She was right."

"It was a hasty decision," Kathie Knight said. "We knew it was wrong."

She said her son probably would not want to talk about the accident, and he did not return a reporter's phone call Thursday.

"It has been very difficult for him," she said.

The negative blood test results mean Knight will not face felony vehicular manslaughter charges. Any decision on misdemeanor counts stemming from the accident are up to the Twin Falls County prosecutor's office, Jensen said.

### Wood River Valley Sail Plane Regatta won't be an eye sore, director vows

One of the gliders expected at the regatta has an 85-foot wingspan, she said.

"We don't want more because there is too much air traffic at Friedman," said Conner.

The best time for spectators to watch the regatta is during takeoffs from noon to 3 p.m. daily through Aug. 8.

The public is welcome to come to the airstrip, talk with the pilots and look over their planes.

"All those guys love to talk about their gliders," Conner said.

## Air Force range study due out in September

**TWIN FALLS** - The Air Force said Thursday it plans to release an environmental review of a proposed state-owned training range in September.

The draft environmental impact statement on the controversial range - proposed by Gov. Cecil Andrus to make Idaho more attractive to the Air Force - was due out in June.

The range proposed for southwestern Owyhee County would accommodate a "composite wing," made up of jet fighters and support aircraft, stationed at Mountain Home.

The Air Force expects to release the draft impact statement on Sept. 3. A public comment period would begin Sept. 10 and continue until Dec. 10.

The Thursday announcement grew out of a meeting between the Air Force, the state of Idaho and the Bureau of Land Management's Idaho office.

The Air Force flew officials from Idaho to Langley Air Force Base in Virginia in an KC-135 air-tanker to discuss the lagging schedule for the impact statement.

## BLM director plans careful look at Andrus' land swap proposal.

Bureau of Land Management Director Jim Baca, in a letter to a national wildlife group, pledged to scrutinize Idaho's proposal to swap state land with his agency to create an Air Force training range.

"I am looking closely at (Gov. Cecil Andrus') proposal to exchange lands between Idaho and the BLM, versus the standard process of requesting a withdrawal of lands for military purposes by an act of Congress," Baca wrote in a letter to the foundation for North American Wild Sheep.

The correspondence, written in May and recently obtained by the Idaho Statesman, was in response to a letter the foundation sent to Baca criticizing the proposed range. The group charged that the range could lead to the loss of more than half of the bighorn sheep population in the area.

Andrus has been working for years to create a state-owned training range he said is needed to help ensure the continuing viability of Mountain Home Air Force Base.

That jump start in learning made grade school a breeze for Hal Jardine, who has won a National Merit Scholarship. Cindy Jardine said.

But more recently, high school has been more of a challenge because Hal's teachers had him do special projects and given him tough assignments that prepared him well for college, Cindy Jardine said.

For example, he had to read four books last summer just to prepare for Advanced Placement English, she said.

"He's had some excellent, excellent teachers," Cindy Jardine said.

Hal laughed when Willamette University, the Salem, Ore. school he will attend this fall, sent him assignments to do during the summer, she said.

It was just like preparing for one of Missy Lu Barry's English classes, Cindy Jardine said.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation announced on Monday that Jardine is a member of the National Honor Society, will receive a merit scholarship. Previously, 5,300 merit scholars received awards.

Hal, who will take general liberal arts courses at Willamette, will receive \$9,100 a year in Willamette scholarships, much of it donated by alumni.

Willamette is a private, residential university of 1,700 students.

He also will receive \$2,500 a year from Piney-Bowes, the company his father, Dick Jardine, works for, Cindy Jardine said.

That's nice, because tuition, room and board, traveling and supplies will cost \$19,400 a year at Willamette, she said.

About 115 private and 85 public colleges and universities in 42 states and the District of Columbia offered merit scholarships this year.

Students from more than 19,000 high schools entered the 1993 National Merit Scholarship program by taking a test in 1991 that served as an initial screen of 1.1 million students.

In the fall of 1992, about 15,000 top scorers were designated semifinalists and had to meet high academic standards, be endorsed and recommended by their principal, take a second test and provide information about their activities, interests and goals.

The scholarships total \$25 million. They are paid mostly by 600 companies and colleges from across the country.

# Faced with deficit, Jerome seeks ways to stay in black

**JEROME** City department heads asked for more money than the budget can afford, and their requests sent City Council members searching for ways to reduce a possible deficit.

One city employee suggested raising water rates, but officials made no decision on the proposed increase.

In a recent budget meeting, City Administrator Larry Paine said the requests pointed up a deficit of more than \$300,000—that figure could be as high as \$470,533 if all priority requests from city departments were granted.

"The bad news is that doesn't include a pay raise for any of our employees," Paine said.

At a meeting with the employees Paine said he showed them the budget without a salary increase; "and the whole room was dead silent."

The proposed revenue totals \$3,367,819, with expenditures projected at \$3,575,338 leaving a shortfall of \$207,519. Additional requirements, prioritized by city departments, would cost almost \$500,000, he said.

To fund the costs of running the city, Paine suggested water rates could be raised up to 50 percent. Residential sewer fees would not be increased this year, Paine said.

The assessed property valuation in the

city has increased from \$85 million in 1992 to an estimated \$92 million this year, said John Yon, city accountant, said. By retaining the current tax levy rate, Yon said the increase in property value could generate an additional \$73,000.

Councilman Dennis Moore said he preferred the levy rate be kept the same as last year.

"It's fair to the taxpayer, and we're not hiding anything," he said.

"And it's an election year," Paine added.

New housing and commercial businesses in town would bring in more tax money, but would also increase service requirements, Yon said.

Mayor Gerald Ostler said he also expected the city to annex property adjacent to the city limits.

"The council plans to conduct several more workshops before making a final decision on a pay raise for employees and budget cuts."

## Faculty fears Zinser's cuts will cripple teaching

**MOSCOW (AP)** — University of Idaho President Elisabeth Zinser says she is willing to cut programs and professors to reduce administrative costs.

But some faculty members fear Zinser's efforts to trim the scope of top officers will harm teaching, which is what the reductions are meant to help.

"Sometimes a consolidation of a department could improve" teaching, Zinser said. "The outcome, bottom line, is to improve instructional services for students. That's what we're going to do."

"Most of the things we are looking at will not involve cuts at the core of the instruction,"

Provost Thomas Bell has been meeting privately with each dean to discuss reductions in their colleges.

In June, the state Board of Education told the four university presidents to devise plans to reduce administrative costs.

Although the presidents were given flexibility in making the cuts, the board, and Gov. Cecil Andrus, have complained mostly of six-figure salaries for top administrators. Their reasoning was to devote more money to teaching.

But by whittling down lower-level administrators, some faculty members say, the UI would target areas the board wanted touched least. And

they fear that will ultimately weaken academics.

The deans must give the provost their reports by next week. The presidents are slated to present their plans to the board Aug. 25.

Some UI colleges are focusing on associate dean positions and above, but others are looking deeper.

The UI College of Education has considered consolidating at least one department to eliminate a director position, while the College of Range, Wildlife and Forestry has looked at merging the duties of a couple of positions and replacing staff members with part-time graduate students.

## Weaver: My wife never wanted to trade her kids' lives to battle feds

**BOISE (AP)** — While separatist Randy Weaver said Thursday federal agents were "crazy when they confronted her children solely to confront a federal government both he and she distrusted."

Weaver, 45, was highly emotional in a 2-hour interview with Boise television station KTVB-TV in his first comments since the Aug. 21 shooting and subsequent siege that claimed the life of a federal marshal, Weaver's wife, Vicki, and their son, Samuel, outside his isolated northern Idaho cabin.

Weaver and Kevin Harris, 25, were both acquitted of murder and conspiracy in the death of Deputy U.S. Marshal William Degan. No one was ever charged in the deaths of Mrs. Weaver or her teen-aged son.

"It would be easier for her to talk

about it," Weaver said of his wife. "She could talk a lot better than I can. It was such a tough thing for her when Sam was killed and in a way, it's a blessing for her to be gone because she loved her kids so much."

"And instead then trying to say she would have killed her own children. They're crazy. They're really crazy. They're crazy."

Weaver's three daughters survived the 11-day siege and are living with relatives in Iowa. The jury did convict Weaver of failure to appear for a 1991 trial on a federal weapons charge. His absence resulted in the federal agents taking out the cabin in their attempt to arrest him.

Weaver, in a jailhouse interview at which his attorneys were present, said both he and Harris believed that they would be acquitted if the truth emerged in the courtroom.

"We all agreed that was exactly what we were going to do. We all agreed that if the truth came out, we were going to get out of this just right. And that's exactly what happened."

"I want to thank the jury for taking the time. I have to admit I'm very amazed that the facts came out the way they did, that they got the facts, that they allowed the facts out in what I mean," he said.

The critical issue in the eight-week trial and nearly three weeks of deliberations was who fired the first shot in last summer's confrontation on Ruby Ridge.

The defense maintained that federal agents intent on repaying Weaver for his refusal to inform on other white separatists in northern Idaho fired the bullets that killed Samuel Weaver's dog, to trigger the exchange that left both the boy and Degan dead.

Baca, who refused comment on his letter Wednesday, also wrote that the BLM has "concerns about this proposal and its potential impact on bighorn sheep and ... other significant resource values."

He directed the BLM's Idaho director, Delmar Vail, to prepare an

"options paper" for Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt. Vail said he learned of the request on Monday and was not sure yet what was expected of him.

Baca also wrote in the May letter that he planned to ask the Department of Defense "to re-certify its national need for this training facility." BLM officials said they were not sure what the director meant by that.

Andrus sent a letter to Baca on July 8. In it he criticized the sheep foundation's letter to the BLM di-

rector, contending that it contained erroneous information, including that the range would kill bighorn sheep.

The governor assured Baca that all was well with his training range proposal.

"I value the resources of this state and ... have designed a plan that will protect the area and provide the needed training for the Air Force and Idaho National Guard," Andrus wrote.

The Idaho Alliance is a non-profit group formed to provide information about the Mountain Home Air Force Base, the Saylor Creek Bombing Range and proposed new state ranges that "we need to preserve the base as vital to our economy and our nation's defense needs," according to a letter signed by Grant L. Petersen Sr., a Mountain Home car dealer.

The Air Force expects to issue a final impact statement in February 1994 and to make a final decision on

the proposed state range by March.

As of June, the Air Force has spent nearly \$4.5 million on environmental documents and related studies in its attempt to expand its training facilities in Idaho, according to figures from the Army Corps of Engineers.

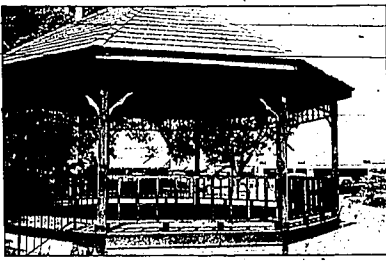

### Partial solution may be only detention option

If we can't solve Twin Falls County's whole juvenile-detention crisis, maybe we can chip away at a corner of it.

That may be the only alternative left, after voters on Tuesday rejected an 18-bed juvenile jail on Wright Avenue in Twin Falls.

Although a majority of voters said yes to an \$800,000 bond issue, the county fell short of the two-thirds vote it needed.

What now? We agree with Lauren May-Jones, the woman who runs the county's makeshift detention center in Filer. She recommends building a much smaller lockup - only eight beds. A detention cottage.

The county probably could swing something like that, using only the federal grant money already in hand - if the neighboring counties that share the grant will accept a half-measure.

The building should be designed for expansion. After a few years of watching the cottage fill to overflowing, voters might consent to pay for an additional wing.

In the near term, unfortunately, this kind of half-measure wouldn't really solve the county's problems. With a shortage of juvenile detention space, sheriff's deputies would still be required to ferry overflow juveniles up to 398 miles one way to other detention centers - making those deputies unavailable to protect life and property in Twin Falls County.

But at least the county could shut down its temporary juvenile quarters inside the Flowers and Produce Building at the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds. That facility - whose doors legally must be left unlocked - is an embarrassment that can't continue much longer.

Whatever the county builds, it should stick with its Wright Avenue site. A downtown alternative - doggedly and illogically promoted by the citizens committee that campaigned against Tuesday's proposal - is patently unsuitable.

But county commissioners should take one clue from Tuesday's defeat. Many voters appeared to be turned against the county's proposal by the center's projected operating expenses: \$800,000 per year. We hope the commissioners find a way to reduce that amount.

Voters sent a message Tuesday, though its substance is unclear. Either they don't want a detention center, or they want a smaller one, or they want one that's cheaper to run, or they just didn't feel like parting with any tax money that day.

Whatever the message was, federal and state laws demand that the county commissioners press on toward some kind of action.

They should do what they can, even if it provides less than a satisfactory solution.

### Triple-dipping may be possible at ice cream shops, but not in school district

Recently, the override levy request of Twin Falls School District 411 was turned down by the voters. It is alleged by your paper (editorial of June 24) that the reason "probably was the so-called 'triple dip'."

Although it may now be too late to make a difference for the coming school year, we wish to set the record straight on "triple dips" and teachers' salaries in District 411.

A "triple dip" was portrayed as being able to take advantage of movement within the salary schedule, a 3 percent cost-of-living increase and a retirement benefit - all in one year. That is simply not possible. A practicing teacher cannot be on the district's salary schedule and receiving Idaho teacher retirement benefits at the same time.

In fact, a practicing teacher will contribute an additional 1 percent of salary to help fund the next phase of the retirement system improvement.

Next is the issue of District 411 teacher salaries. It must first be understood that some of the figures published were inaccurate. The beginning salary of a first-year teacher in District 411 is actually \$16,700. When the salary is combined with a district contribution to the fringe benefit pool, it is \$17,480.

When we compare our beginning salary with similar school districts using the actual base salary of \$16,700, Twin Falls teachers rank 109th of the 113 districts in the state. Comparing districts within just

To believe state Rep. Ron Bluk's triple-dipping assertion is to believe that teachers in Twin Falls are doing well financially. This is not the case.

The Magic Valley area, Twin Falls teachers rank 20th of the 21 districts.

For comparison, a beginning teacher in Cassia County earned \$19,276 while a similar teacher in Twin Falls earned just \$16,700. Next year, based on a 3 percent cost-of-living increase and movement on the salary schedule for one year of experience, that Twin Falls teacher could possibly earn \$17,694 - still far below a beginning teacher in Cassia County.

It should be noted that no teacher receives an "automatic" pay raise on the salary schedule. For a teacher to advance, he or she must have proven his/her ability in the classroom. Movement on the salary schedule must be earned either through an acceptable level of service or approved

continuing education.

Teachers pay the cost to continue their education. With college credit costs about \$100 per credit, a teacher spends approximately \$1,500 to gain an \$800 raise. In other words, a teacher must work two years after earning their 15 hours of credits in order to break even.

The final part of the "triple dip" was alleged to be the proposed 3 percent salary increase included in the override. Yes, Twin Falls teachers supported this increase because teachers' salaries in Twin Falls have not kept up with inflation and rising medical costs. Every teacher with a spouse or family who depends upon the district's health-care insurance is bringing home less money in real dollars than they were two years ago.

To believe state Rep. Ron Bluk's triple-dipping assertion is to believe that teachers in Twin Falls are doing well financially. This is not the case.

When compared with our own take-home pay two years ago, teachers in Twin Falls who have spouses or families bring home less in real dollars. If this trend continues, the probability of keeping or hiring good teachers in Twin Falls diminishes as teachers look elsewhere for communities where they can support their families.

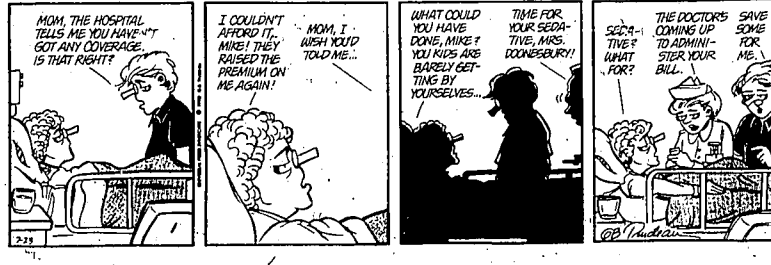
that broke up the cruise on Addison and all the trouble (I know, it was my son that was shot).

**Critics call INEL draft plan inadequate**

**BLACKFOOT** — People interested in letting the public influence federal studies on radiation and chemical exposure at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory say a draft plan is inadequate. They voiced their criticisms Monday during a Blackfoot work session on establishing a community forum on Blackfoot activities at the INEL. It was conducted by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry. The U.S. centers are doing a "dose reconstruction" study to estimate the exposure people working or living near the federal installation may have suffered over its 40-plus years of operation. The toxic substances agency is reviewing the health records of INEL employees and eastern Idaho residents for any correlations between the job's activities and any diseases or deaths.

**Officials antsy at Clearwater delay**

**OROFINO** — U.S. Forest Service officials, conservationists and timber industry representatives are getting anxious about the continuing delays in naming a new supervisor for the Clearwater National Forest.

Officials in the Forest Service's Northern Region headquarters in Missoula, Mont., say filling the Clearwater job is their top priority. Timber and environmental groups also say they want the job filled quickly.

Without quick action, they warn, the simmering controversy over the Clearwater's timber sale program is likely to boil over again.

Regional Forester David Jolly said in May that he had made his recommendation for the Clearwater post to top agency officials and requested an exemption from the hiring freeze.

**Reward offered for information on rape**

**LEWISTON** — A \$5,000 reward is being offered for the arrest and conviction of the man who raped a Bureau of Land Management employee July 6 on the Salmon River south of Lewiston.

The rape occurred at knife point near the Clinton Creek campground below Eagle Creek. The victim had become separated from her BLM work crew when she was accosted by a man riding a red and white four-wheeler.

The man was described as white, 25 to 30 years old, 5-foot-9 inches to 6-foot tall, with light brown hair and medium build. He was wearing blue jeans, a white T-shirt, brown hiking boots and a leather aviator-style cap covering his ears.

**Trial date set for reservation traffic case**

**BLACKFOOT** — A September jury trial has been scheduled for a Fort Hall woman arrested at a traffic stop who contends the Idaho State Police have no authority on reservation land.

Rozina George was stopped Feb. 15 on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation for failure to heed a stop sign and failure to show proof of insurance. Both are traffic infractions.

She then was cited April 11 by State Police Officer Shawn Kitch for speeding and failure to show proof of insurance. George also received misdemeanor charges of obstructing an officer and resisting arrest.

**League favors stricter water standards**

**POCATELLO (AP)** — Idaho is looking at changing its water laws and environmentalists want it to follow the lead of other western states in erecting stricter standards for industrial discharges of cancer-causing chemicals.

At meetings in six cities this week, Idaho Division of Environmental Quality officials accepted public comments on the state's water laws. Most proposed changes concern federal requirements that the states develop water quality standards for toxic substances.

One key change — permissible under the acceptable standards for health risk by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency — would allow Idaho industries to dump 10 times higher concentrations of carcinogens into lakes and streams.

Idaho industries are now limited to releasing the chemicals in concentrations that pose a risk of one hypothetical person in 1 million contracting cancer, said Mark Shumar, water quality standards coordinator.

Of 10 states in the region, only Nevada has adopted the EPA's less strict option — a risk equal to one in 100,000.

"The question we're asking the public is, which standard do they prefer?" Shumar said. "One helps out industry, but exposes the public to greater risk."

"The Idaho Conservation League's position is that (the more restrictive standard) is the only one that should be considered and we're dismayed that the state even proposes a standard that was suggested by industry," said Mark Solomon, Latah County commissioner and chairman of the league's water quality committee.

The league contends there are a number of factors involved which could make the less stringent requirement more hazardous to the public.

It said the EPA does not take into account that a person's combined exposure to two or more chemicals in the environment often amplifies the effects of cancer-causing agents.

The methods, Solomon said, do not consider children are more vulnerable to carcinogens than adults. Also not mentioned are high fish diets or how much workplace exposure to chemicals can contribute to doses.

If the state loosens the standard, Solomon argued, many of the 60 or so industries which now have discharge permits based on the stricter federal guideline would likely appeal to the state to have their requirements relaxed.

The state also proposes to measure only dissolved metals in water and not total suspended metals, because "if" the dissolved metals that are harmful to aquatic life and based on that premise, we think meaning the total is overly protective," Shumar said.

But Solomon argued measuring only dissolved metals would not protect waters such as mining-polluted Lake Coeur d'Alene, which is in danger of having heavy metals pushed into suspension as nutrients from sewage and agriculture cause the water to turn over as it loses oxygen.

The Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry has asked for an extension until Aug. 31 to comment whether the proposals are based on sound science.

Common mining pollutants cyanide, arsenic, selenium and mercury would still be measured as total suspended particles, Shumar added, because they tend to accumulate in animal tissue and so need more restriction.

**Police impound vehicles, order people out of 'Tent City'**

**BOISE (AP)** — Boise police have ousted at least 18 homeless people living in vehicles outside the Boise Rescue Mission, cracking down on what they called a "tent city" of cars.

More than 15 people living in cars along Front Street left under police orders within the past week. Three more cars were impounded on Wednesday.

"We allowed them to stay as long as we could, but we got so many complaints, we had to do something about it," Boise Police Lt. Jim Spears said. "Police said they started enforcing city ordinances against vehicle abandonment for more

than 48 hours or living in vehicles on public property after receiving complaints about the condition of the parking lot.

Officers began patrolling the area during the past month and distributed information about the city ordinances as well as a fact sheet on local homeless resources.

An employee who answered the telephone at the Boise Rescue Mission on Wednesday refused to comment on the police action. Executive Director John Drzewiecki was out of town and could not be reached.

Spears said complaints about the conditions

outside the mission ranged from littering to human excrement.

"The stench is incredible," he said.

At the nearby Basque Center, Gina Gamboa said broken bottles and the smell of urine make walking in the area offensive.

"As an individual who goes down there all the time, it does get kind of awful," Gamboa said. "Over the past year or two, the problem has become more severe. But I don't think asking people to live in their cars is the answer. If the mission is their home, then they're going to hang out nearby."

## Idaho GOP head: Anti-gay measure not needed

BOISE (AP) — The chairman of the Republican National Committee said Idaho's proposed anti-gay initiative is unnecessary, but the leader of the group sponsoring the ballot measure said Haley Barbour was misinformed.

"If there are not special preferences, I don't know why you would try to rule out special preferences," Barbour said Wednesday at the end of a short fund-raising trip to Boise.

He acknowledged being only "vaguely familiar" with the Idaho Citizens Alliance initiative proposed for Idaho's 1994 general election ballot, but said Republicans oppose discrimination of any kind.

"The first thing the Republican Party believes in is individual freedom and tolerance," Barbour said. "People ought to be able to lead their personal lives any way they want to as long as they're not hurting other people."

"Beyond that, though, one of the things we don't like are special preferences," he said during the taping of KTVB-TV's "Viewpoint" program.

Idaho Citizens Alliance Chairman Kelly Walton acknowledged there are no Idaho laws granting homosexuals special preferences. But he said homosexuals will seek such privileges and the initiative would head off such a move.

"Prevention always takes less effort than waiting until there's a full-scale war," said Walton, a Burley contractor.

He cited a ban on discrimination against homosexuals by the University of Idaho Faculty Council as evidence, and predicted that local measures will follow.

"Then they'll say, 'Why not pass it statewide?'" Walton said. "If Mr. Barbour fails to see the pattern, he's just misinformed."

The initiative would prohibit homosexuals from being granted "minority status" in such areas as housing and employment and would limit discussion of homosexuality in public schools. It also would outlaw same-sex marriages and limit access to library materials addressing homosexuality to adults.

The Idaho Citizens Alliance must gather 32,061 signatures of registered voters by July 1994 to qualify the initiative for the November 1994 ballot.

Barbour joins other top Republicans in expressing skepticism about the initiative. State GOP Chairman Randy Smith, former chairman Phil Batt, Idaho House Speaker Michael Simpson and Congressman Michael Crapo all have said it is unnecessary. Leading Democrats, including Gov. Cecil Andrus and Congressman Larry LaRocco, were among the first to oppose the initiative. The Idaho Democratic Party also has formally denounced it.

## 2 environmental activists arrested

DIXIE (AP) — U.S. Forest Service officers have arrested two more environmental activists for obstructing road-building operations in a timber sale area on the Nez Perce National Forest.

Forest Service spokeswoman Elaine Murphy said the man and woman were arrested Wednesday after burying themselves among logs and branches in a road under construction for the Noble Creek timber sale.

Highland Enterprises, the Grangeville company building the road, had scheduled the log pile for removal with heavy equipment.

"They were easily could have been killed," Murphy said. "They weren't real obvious."

She said the activists — who would not identify themselves — would appear before a federal magistrate today in Boise, probably on charges of entering a closed area. The Forest Service closed the Noble Creek area to the public after road-building equipment was vandalized June 22.

## Man charged in shooting of official's daughter

BOISE (AP) — Jolannie L. Darby — still recovering from an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head — has been charged with first-degree murder for the July 3 slaying of his wife.

Darby, 39, is accused of shooting Vikki Lynn Darby, 26, at his Garden City mobile home. Police said Darby turned the gun on himself after killing his wife, who was the daughter of Ada County Commissioner Vern Bisterfeldt.

A warrant for Darby's arrest was issued Wednesday morning.

## A dance tune-up

Professionals help younger students hone their skills

TWIN FALLS - Liza Doolittle insisted she "could have danced all night." But the 120 kids currently attending Summer Dance Workshop are toned up enough to actually accomplish it.

"Stretch," the instructor's voice rose above the lilting music. "Some of us are just lying on the bar."

The advanced ballet students stretched farther, making it look almost easy - in spite of the fact that their bodies were resting flat against their outstretched legs.

The students are not novices, even though they range in age from 10 to barely 18.

"A ratio of one male for every 10 females is about average," Killilea said. "They (the males) come in for the street dance, but they find they also need some jazz and ballet to dance really well."

Killilea characterized this year's students as "very good."

Jessica Nichol, 15, made the trip from Boise to attend dance camp at CSI. Like most of the other out-of-towners, she's staying in a campus dorm.

Jessica's a serious dance student, and she welcomes the sweat and sore muscles of dance camp.

"It's a lot of work, very intense," she said, "but they teach you a lot."

JACKPOT - George Trullinger IS Buddy Holly, but not really.

This is not reincarnation. It's pure show biz.

"Sometimes impersonators walk around trying to be the people they impersonate; but, for the most part, this is just acting," said Trullinger, who's played Holly for 10 years with Legends in Concert.

Trullinger's an original cast member in the show built around impressions of famous entertainers - everyone from John Wayne to Michael Jackson to Patsy Cline. Currently on-stage at Cactus Petes, in addition to Trullinger, are Hank Williams, Jr., Wayne Newton and Madonna look-alikes.

Kim Goltry, also known as Madonna, has been playing the controversial blonde bombshell for almost three years now. Her act is just that - an act. "I'm not even a Madonna fan," she said, "I'm using her talent to create a more likable and classier version of her."

But those who prefer a steamy Madonna won't be disappointed. Goltry's renditions of "Vogue" and "Dancing Queen" are, by her own admission, "hot and sexy." And her backup dancers wear outfits "that would be illegal in Boise."

Goltry's been performing professionally since she was 6. She's 25 now. These days, she tours part time with Legends and spends the rest of the time at home in Las Vegas working on her own music.

Trullinger, 33, grew up with music, too. His father taught him to play guitar, and he joined his first band when he was 12. He was born the year after Buddy Holly died. "But I watched the 'Buddy Holly Story' and I grew up on rock and roll."

Note: based in Las Vegas, Trullinger tours 35 weeks a year, belting out "That'll Be the Day" and "Peggy Sue," all along the way.

Legends in Concert is the brainchild of it's producer-director John Stewart, who got his inspiration from a mural on Hollywood Boulevard.

The mural depicted deceased superstars who left their marks on the entertainment industry. Stewart decided to combine those stars of yesterday with the technology of today.

"I started a massive search for people who could sing, sound, feel, smell like these real people," he said. "After a year of plowing through 'a ton of Elvis Presleys' and dozens of mediocre Marilyn Manros, Stewart finally devised his all-star cast. He has since added in contemporary personalities.

# Cable continues strong showing in Emmy nominations

CBS' "Northern Exposure" was the top vote-getter in the 1992-93 Emmy Award nominations announced Thursday, but the real message was the increasingly wobbly status of network TV as cable, led by HBO, made a potent showing.

HBO, propelled by such TV movies as "Citizen Cohn," "Stalin" and "Barbarians at the Gate" and the comedy series "The Larry Sanders Show," totaled 55 nominations — equaling the number of the ABC network.

Combined with entries from its other channels, cable earned 76 nominations overall, nearly 20 percent of the 367 announced by the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences.

Figuring in 38 nominations for PBS, 16 for syndicated shows and 10 for the new-era Fox Broadcasting Co., the total rises to 141 for shows not broadcast on the traditional Big Three networks — ABC, CBS and NBC — or nearly 40 percent of the total.

"The Larry Sanders Show," starring Garry Shandling in a tough backstage spoof of late-night talk programs, became the first cable entry to be nominated for either best comedy or drama series, according to John Leverone, awards director of the television academy. It picked up seven other nominations, including acting nods for Shandling and supporting players Rip Torn and Jeffrey Tambor.

The cable show will square off for best comedy series against "Cheers," "Home Improvement," "Seinfeld" and "Murphy Brown" when the 45th annual Prime-Time Emmy Awards ceremony is broadcast on ABC Sept. 19 at the Pasadena Civic Auditorium.

Moving yet again as a contender for best comedy series was "Roseanne," which has yet to earn an Emmy nomination for the show, itself, in its five seasons on ABC. In a Hollywood trade paper ad this week, the Carsey-Werner company, which produces "Roseanne," listed some of the notable honors that have been heaped on the series, including the prestigious Peabody Award. But academy voters remain

inexplicably cool to the show, although they gave it five nominations — citing stars Roseanne Arnold and John Goodman and supporting actresses Laurie Metcalf and Sara Gilbert (the latter was fighting direction).

The producers of "Roseanne," including Roseanne and Tom Arnold, issued a restrained comment, saying: "We're happy with the nominations. But we're also very disappointed that the show is not nominated."

Another big loser in the comedy series nominations was Fox's "The Simpsons," which finally got an opportunity to enter the category this year after the academy changed past rules that had barred animated shows from competing with the live programs. But like "Roseanne," "The Simpsons" was ignored for

best comedy series and, since it chose this arena in which to compete, was not permitted to be entered in the animation category, Leverone said.

"The Simpsons" earned just two nominations, for music composition and sound mixing — a startling brush-off for a series that, like "Roseanne," has earned great acclaim and helped carry the generally hide-bound industry into the new age of TV. "I guess they just didn't like it," said Al Jean, one of the executive producers of "The Simpsons" last season, adding that it was possible that academy voters don't regard the series the same as regular sitcoms, even though the producers do.

"We just thought our show and the way we produced it was more

akin to 'Cheers' or 'Roseanne' and that writing was more like those shows," Jean said. "Even though we were animated, we felt stylistically closer to the half-hour sitcoms. So I guess we can take pride — we were at least honored in being called a sitcom."

On the other hand, the nominations also showed that academy voters are all-too-aware of the ambitious efforts of the cable competition, especially its most successful pay outlet, HBO.

In another startling Emmy development, not a single one of the five nominated made-for-TV movies came from ABC, CBS or NBC, as HBO thumped them with four of the contenders and PBS had the fifth.

The nominees in this category included HBO's "Barbarians at the Gate," with James Garner in a tale of Wall Street's bidding war for R.J.R. Nabisco; "Stalin," with Robert Duvall, and "Citizen Cohn," with James Woods as the notorious late attorney Roy Cohn, a one-time aide to witch-hunting Sen. Joseph McCarthy.

Also nominated for best made-for-TV movie were PBS' "Tru," Robert Morse's one-man show about the late Truman Capote, and HBO's "The Positively True Adventures of the Alleged Texas Cheerleader-Murdering Mom," starring Holly Hunter in a send-up of a story of a mother ambitious for her cheerleading daughter — and the media madness that followed, including the battle for movie rights.

Whether by intention or coincidence, the selection of HBO films was an opportunity for the TV industry to put on its best face at a time when the networks are under fire for a season of sleazy shows with mind-boggling violence that has attracted attention from Congress and others. "Stalin," while dealing with a murderous man, was historical biography; "Texas Cheerleader" also took a different road.

For "Cheers," which picked up eight more nominations — bringing its total to 17, the most of any program in TV history — this will be the last chance to catch and pass the all-time Emmy Award winner.

## 'Jurassic Park' chews up box-office numbers

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Jurassic Park," which shot past "Batman" to become the sixth-biggest money-maker in movie history, also opened to record business in Japan, the United Kingdom, Mexico and other countries.

With domestic weekend ticket sales of \$10.9 million, "Jurassic Park" to date has grossed \$255.7 million. By week's end, it should pass "Law & The Return of the Jedi" as well.

The \$10.9 million figure was only good for third place on last weekend's box-office charts, however. "The Firm," starring Tom Cruise, was the No. 1 release for the third consecutive weekend, earning \$13.3 million. "In the Line of Fire," starring Clint Eastwood, was second with \$13.1 million.

Those figures only count the domestic box-office take, and not the record amounts of money "Jurassic Park" has begun taking in overseas.

In two days in Japan — with showings starting at 6:20 a.m. — Steven Spielberg's modern-day dinosaur story netted \$8.4 million. It brought in \$7.4 million in three days in the United Kingdom. Records were also set in Mexico, Taiwan and Korea, the film's international distributor said Monday.

In the United States, the new comedy "Hocus Pocus" was fourth at the box office with a take of \$8.1 million. In fifth was "Free Willy," a movie

about an aging killer whale who befriends a young boy. It had sales of \$7.9 million.

Sixth went to "Sleepless in Seattle" with \$7.4 million, while "Rookie of the Year" made \$6.6 million for seventh place. "Son-in-Law" collected \$3.7 million for eighth place and "Snow White" brought in \$3.5 million for ninth.

"Benny the Manucca" dropped a dangerous 49 percent from a week

ago, putting it in 10th place with \$2.8 million.

In limited release, "Much Ado About Nothing" and "Like Water for Chocolate" played very well.

speaking. No lip-synching or sound-tracking allowed.

# Musicians teach girls their prince will come

Disney's "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" has been in theaters — as it has been every few years since it was made in 1937 — just in time to mess up a new generation of little girls.

What could be so subversive in this charmingly rendered animated fable? It is the theme of rivalry between daughter and evil stepmother. Is it the anxiety over eating nonorganically grown apples?

No, it's that dam song, "Somebody My Prince Will Come," eminently hummable, ennobling the virtues of passivity and pre-determined happy endings. Snow White doesn't have to kiss a lot of lads before finding her prince (although she does kiss all seven dwarfs on their bald patas, heigh-ho). She has merely to wait prettily, because someday her prince will come, someday she'll find her love.

That song sets up little girls for a lifetime of feverish romantic expectations that don't easily mix with the jungle out there: that is the modern dating scene.

The romantic songs that women sing in movie musicals have always had a profound effect on their target audience — impressionable girls who learn to sigh with yearning before they are old enough to understand just what it is that awakes them somewhere over the rainbow.

Smart women, foolish love songs. Here are some of the ideas women harbor about romance, and here are

the memorable movie songs that gave them grist for the mill.

• **PASSIVE LOVE:** "Somebody My Prince Will Come," etc. Future romantic happiness is your bright light (are we not all princesses?) if you wait patiently for the right guy to awaken your senses with a kiss. While waiting, he there like a lump, nothing more is required of you until it's time to choose the bridesmaid's color scheme.

• **VIRTUOUS RESTRAINT:** When heartbreak gets you down, it is time to give your loins against men. Here's the advice from "Flower Drum Song" (1961), as if it foals anyone: "Love, look away, love, look away from me. Fly when you pass my door. Fly and get lost at sea!"

• **TRANSFORMATIONAL LOVE:** Ann-Margret in "Bye Bye Birdie" (1963), wearing capri pants and a midriff blouse as if expecting trouble, and hoping to ride off into on the back of an Elvis clone's motorcycle: "Drink champagne as though it were water ... daddy dear, you won't know your daughter! I've got a lotta livin' to do!"

Earlier in the movie, Ann-Margret's transformation has already begun: "How lovely to be a woman, the wait was well worthwhile, how lovely to put on makeup and smile a woman's smile."

• **LOVE HURTS:** To the hauntingly romantic tune of Cole Porter's "So In Love," Kathryn Grayson in "Kiss Me Kate" (1953) toasts her philandering ex-husband: "So taunt me, and hurt me, I deserve me, desert me, I'm yours, till I die! So in love with you am I!" Later, she whips up and sings "I Hate Men," whose risqué lyrics were sanitized for the movie version.

• **NOBLE SUFFERING:** Just as surely as fish gotta swim and birds gotta fly, "I'm gonna love one man till I die, can't help lovin' that man of mine," as per "Show Boat" (1951). Not only that, but "Ile can come home as late as can be, home without him ain't no home for me." This is the the-

ory of love as endurance test.

• **NARCISSISTIC LOVE:** "Flower Drum Song" teaches us to gaze adoringly in the mirror, all the while reassuring ourselves: "I'm strictly a FEMALE female, and my future I hope will be in the arms of a brave and free male who enjoys being a lovey with a GIRL LIKE ME!"

• **IMPOSSIBLE LOVE:** Anita wants her. "A boy like that, he's kind, your brudder!" But Maria's love for Tony goes beyond this little impediment to family harmony in "West Side Story" (1961). "I love him, I do," she tells. Her love for him goes even beyond the grave. "There's a place for us, somewhere a place for us ... she predicts tearfully over his dead body.

• **HYGIENIC LOVE:** Man trouble is nothing that a little styling moussé can't solve in "South Pacific" (1958). "I'm gonna wash that man right outa my hair" — repeat twice — "and send him on his way!" The trouble is that once you have found him, you never let him go.

# The prime of miss K.T. Oslin

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Her new album promises "Songs From an Aging Sex Bomb," but K.T. Oslin offers much more than that. She is the outrageous aunt, the helpless ex-lover who blurts out the truth because she's lived too long to fool with anything else.

So Oslin says aloud what other performers don't dare: Maybe there comes a time to say thanks, but no thanks, to the glamorous life. Like John Lennon in the 1970s, Oslin has decided she can go on just fine without a new record every year.

"In 51 years of this business, it's starting to look really silly to me," a cheerful Oslin said during an interview, dressed stylishly in a black pantsuit.

"As an adult, a lot of things start looking silly to you — a lot of things that were so important in your 20s and so important in your 30s, and relatively unimportant in your 40s. Then, all of a sudden in your 50s, you go, 'Please, that's just so silly.'"

K.T. Oslin became a surprise platinum seller in the 1980s with "80's Ladies." She was a veteran performer, in her 40s, when she brazenly beat the odds to hit it big.

In the time when Randy Travis was leading country radio back to traditional roots, Oslin moved from New York to Nashville and sold millions of her R&B-influenced material. Her secret was lyrics about loneliness, love and loss that rang true to country-music listeners.

But a lot has changed. It's been three years since Oslin's last album, "Love in a Small Town." Over the past year, she has done little performing.

RCA has released "Songs From an Aging Sex Bomb," a mix of greatest hits, a re-recording and four new songs that take aim at adult contemporary radio.

"It's 'Songs From an Aging Sex Bomb,' a summation of a new beginning," Oslin says. She saved her money, and there's only so much she's willing to do in the name of career anymore.

"The last four years have been really tough on me," Oslin said, noting she has been performing for 25 years, and only the last five in the "so-called star slot, whatever that is."

"That's a long time to be people

pleasing." Am I perky enough for you? Am I brown haired enough? Am I tall enough? Do I fit in the pants? Do I get the job? Smile, twinkle, twinkle.

"I think that more than anything kind of caught up with me. I was started to be a lot of little sad losses in my life — it started with finding out that my beloved dog was dying ... and I spent a year watching my poor dog die."

Just as she got over that, her mother died. "And all that stuff started to make me twinkle and shine very difficult," Oslin said.

Oslin likens herself to a dancing bear who decided to hibernate.

"I thought, 'OK, I don't want to dance for them for a while. I want

to go back to the woods and just sort of do what bears do. So I did."

"I was fortunate enough because of my success that I could afford to do that."

Despite the pressures, the four new "Songs From an Aging Sex Bomb" show Oslin in fine form. The new tracks (and a remake of "New Wave Home" from the "Love in a Small Town" album) were overseen by Los Angeles pop producer Glen Ballard.

"You Can't Do That" is a sly ode to cautious times, where the spontaneity of old doesn't cut it anymore.

Ballard's production takes Oslin further into R&B, topped with a pop music sheen. Musically, she could just as well be in Timbuktu as in Nashville.

"It was never traditional country," Oslin said. "No one was ever anyone doubting and surprised by my success in the country format than myself."

Now Wynonna Judd is having crossover success with a similar sound, and RCA thinks Oslin is a natural to follow suit.

"I think they're gonna see if we can get some adult contemporary play. You know, this stuff was not meant for country, it was not recorded for country," she said.

"I would be really dumbfounded if country played it because there was no attempt to make a country record."

Desire for success no longer rules here, so Oslin is relaxed about leaving behind country-radio-for-unknown territory, or waiting for the reviews of her performance in Peter Bogdanovich's upcoming film "A Thing Called Love."

Oslin plays a Nashville club owner who has a soft spot for songwriters. She'd like to do more acting, but Hollywood, like Nashville, is not rushing to find good roles for middle-aged women.

Loretta Lynn said something so profound: She said it's easier to get into this business than it is to get out of it. Oslin said, "Some people have a hard time giving up the applause and the attention. I wouldn't have a hard time with that at all."

"But the creative process I would have a hard time giving up."

If you want to get into the music biz these days, it turns out there's a ground floor available.

Children's music.

Sure, Raffi is everywhere. The Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles made records. Barney's first album is due next month — on his own Barney label, and the Barney label will be presenting the "Jurassic Park" soundtrack, thank you.

Peter, Paul and Mary recently cut their second children's album, "Peter, Paul and Mommy Too." Bobby Goldsboro cut a children's record. Waylon Jennings, of all people, just cut a children's record. Tom Paxton has cut a couple of them. A group called Riders in the Sky plays cowboy and Western songs in a style aimed at children, with adults encouraged to tag along.

The Pediatric AIDS Foundation last year issued a very successful fund-raising album with guest tracks by the likes of Bruce Springsteen ("Chicken Lips and Lizard Hips") and Bob Dylan ("This Old Man"). Springsteen used an out-take from that project, "Pony Boy," on his "Human Touch" album.

A whole stable of artists, unknown to most adults, work the children's market exclusively. Rhino Records started a children's division last year, called Kid Rhino. Sony and EMI are among the majors which have launched children's music projects.

But despite all this activity, the Recording Industry Association of

America says children's music still constitutes only a tiny fraction of the music market — and Howard Leib, a New York attorney who sold this year's New Music Seminar on a Kids Music Seminar, says part of the problem is that despite the number of children out there, the music biz hasn't begun to explore their potential as music consumers.

"There really is no children's music industry," says Leib. "Which is fine if you're content to sell your tapes out of the trunk of your car at birthday parties. ... But we could use it."

Leib took the plunge into children's music himself three or four years ago, and while trying to help build an industry out of many related but separate elements, he co-hosts a radio show, "Laughtrack Jr.," with

his 5-year-old daughter, Abigail, in New York.

The lack of a children's music industry — which does exist in other countries as nearby as Canada — has several implications, including a lack of promotion and a lack of places where parents (who, of course, buy most children's music) know they can find children's music.

"In most record stores, if they stock children's music at all, it's in a ghetto next to comedy," says Leib. "So a lot of parents who would love to buy something for the children besides Raffi or a Saturday morning cartoon product soundtrack don't know what's available."

This also ties into another problem: the lack of radio or TV stations which play children's music. Children, perhaps even more than any other consumers, want something they know, and they're unlikely to learn of the possibilities from top-40 radio or MTV.

Many children's artists, then, like artists in other specialty fields like Christian music, end up selling their own tapes at live shows or perhaps through direct marketing. But for an artist like Paxton, sales aren't the main point: "I enjoy children's music. It's a chance to do something different. The most fun for me is playing it live at concerts."

Paxton does add that he sees no reason children's music that goes beyond Raffi or Sesame Street can't become more popular, since most parents today grew up on rock 'n' roll, folk, R&B and other styles which can easily be adapted into music they would love for their kids to play.

"There's a growing range of kids' music available," says Leib. "There's pop, rock, folk, classical, even rap. There's a dearth of blues and jazz, but those tend to be more mature styles."

Children will listen to almost anything, he says. "We play maybe 150 CDs at our house and the kids will listen to all of them, including 'Guys and Dolls.' The hard part for most parents is getting kids away from the TV set long enough to listen to anything."

Leib does think a children's music industry will develop over the next decade, because there's a profit potential. His next concern, then, is the shape it will take. If the major labels get involved, he suggests, they may ignore unique artists in favor of "recordings" by Barney or other licensed characters, who are pre-published and thus largely pre-sold.

What happens on the ground floor today, then, may determine what goes into your child's tape player in the year 2000.

# Dennis the boring menace

Moviemakers give character little to do but the usual — make people mad

The idea of John Hughes adapting "Dennis the Menace" is essentially redundant.

What, after all, was "Home Alone" but a story about a mischievous, resourceful kid who annoys and charms grownups and thwarts bad guys? And how about "Curly Sue"?

The twist here is that Dennis is a mere 5 years old, played by 6-year-old newcomer Mason Gamble. Thus "Dennis" plays like a scaled-down version of a Hughes movie, with the violent slapstick slightly toned down and the sentimental goo still intact.

As envisioned by Hughes and his stand-in director, Nick Castle ("Tap"), Dennis' neighborhood (actually the Chicago suburb of Evanston) is an idyllic place where adults sit on their front porches and watch over the swarms of kids playing hide-and-seek in the twilight. All is essentially benevolent, including Dennis and his friendly nemesis, Mr. Wilson (Walter Matthau).

Sure, Dennis may shoot aspirin into Mr. Wilson's mouth with a slingshot (one of Castle's sniffer camera angles) or ruin his false teeth, but he's essentially just a good, accident-prone kid. And Mr. Wilson, despite his protests, never actually seems to mind much; he's part of the neighborhood, and the only real threats come from outside.

The sweet-'n'-sour structure is basically the same as that of the "Home Alone" movies: The first part establishes how cute and cunning our fair-haired hero is; the latter scenes let him bash around a villainous punching bag before returning to the arms of his tearful mom (who, of course, was away from home).

In this case, there's virtually no other plot. Dennis bugs Mr. Wilson; Dennis plays with his friends; Dennis bugs Mr. Wilson. The episodic nature, typical for a comic strip, makes for a slow-going movie experience.

Part of the problem is that Dennis and his buddies, the beyond-her-years

Margaret (Amy Sakasitz) and pushover Joey (Kellen Hathaway), simply don't have much to do. They start decorating a tree house, but that subplot is abandoned like a pair of old sneakers.

Their scenes have the feel of kids playing house, as if Hughes figured that just aiming the camera at these li'l inepties would be enough. The youthful ineptitude being celebrated here is in short supply.

As for Gamble, he does just fine given a screenplay that calls for him to put an awful lot. He is relatively natural and bright in front of the camera and manages to keep up his endearing quotient while being a pest. You can't ask much more of a 6-year-old actor.

Mathau and Joan Plowright (Mrs. Wilson) provide a necessary counterbalance to the kids. Plowright is warm and steady (she's a Shakespearean actress, for God's sake), and Mathau, whose leather visage is a point of humor in itself, supplies double-takes and subtle expressions that provide the movie's wisest elements.

Switchblade Sam (Christopher Lloyd) is the equivalent of a "Home Alone" Wet Bandit, a dirty, rotten-toothed thief. Like a bulging pimple on a model's face, he must be eradicated, pronto, and who better to do the dirty work than the fresh-faced young Dennis.

Sam is far too realistic and unpleasant a character to be used solely for comedic purposes, and there's something essentially ugly in how Hughes, as is his wont, uses the cute child to give the bum the thrashing he deserves. Those later scenes seem like "Home Alone" outtakes, with such har-de-har highlights as the wooden plank on the head, a hot coal down the pants and a knife in the rear end.

This isn't the first time Hughes has targeted kids who like reruns, though he does seem to be working his way back age-wise. He's progressed from his original brat-pack teens to a pesky 10-year-old in "Home Alone" to the 5-year-old here. If his next movie is called "Sweet Pea," you've been warned.

## See 'Free Willy' — the kids will love it

**ANOTHER STAKEOUT (PG-13).** Richard Dreyfuss and Emilio Estevez return as the Seattle detectives who this time must pose as a "family," along with Rosie O'Donnell, to help locate a witness in a mob trial. Directed by John Badham.

**CONEHEDS (PG)** On their way to conquer Earth, Belkar and Prymat Conehead make their way to Paramus, N.J., to take up your normal everyday suburban life. Starring Dan Aykroyd, John Cusack, Laraine Newman, Michelle Burke, Michael McKean. Directed by Steve Barron.

**THE FIRM (R).** As directed by veteran Sydney Pollack, the smoothly entertaining version of John Grisham's bestseller stars Tom Cruise and a garage repair truck and racing the villains down to the ocean. Directed by director Simon Wincer. ("Lionsome Dove") and top technical crew, plus a fine whale (Keiko) and boy (newcomer Jason James Richter), this movie has a muscular savor, a power and sweep to its imagery and majestic ocean scenes that triumph over the strains and purple patches.

**HOCUS POCUS (PG).** Though it stars Bette Midler, Sarah Jessica Parker and Kathy Najima vamping it up as 17th century witches returning to haunt modern times, this is very much a PG Disney picture, with a heart and soul belonging to the world of well-scrubbed youth movies the studio used to specialize in. On this side even at 96 minutes, "Hocus" is more likely to satisfy kids than cast a lasting spell over adults.

**IN THE LINE OF FIRE (R).** Clint Eastwood stars as the one Secret Service agent you don't want to mess with in this crisply entertaining thriller very professionally directed by "Das Boot's" Wolfgang Petersen. And Eastwood is matched glow for glow by John Malkovich as the president-hating assassin who doesn't plan to miss his target. If you like the sound of this, you won't be disappointed.

**JURASSIC PARK (PG-13).** The poor little rich kid of this summer's movies. Enormous amounts of money and attention have been expended on making the film's half-dozen dinosaur species awfully impressive (though much too intense for small children) but very little has been done to make any of the puny human beings equally involving. In fact, when the big guys leave the screen, you'll be tempted to leave with them. Another case of \$60 million worth of special effects chasing two cents worth of characterization and story.

**LAST ACTION HERO (PG-13).** A ponderous joyride more notable for how strenuously it has been promoted than for how much pleasure it delivers. Based on a slight idea about a boy who loves action films so much he finds himself right up there on the screen with his hero, this epic falls victim to all the excesses that too big

a budget and too big a star (Arnold Schwarzenegger), inevitably guarantee. And by parodying Arnold's already comic action persona, the filmmakers misjudge the appeal of their star.

**POETIC JUSTICE (R).** Writer-director John Singleton has tried to do the right thing with this follow-up to his debut "Boyz n the Hood." He has stayed in South Central L.A., chosen a female protagonist and focused not on gangbangers but on hard-working neighborhood wage earners. Yet the Janet Jackson-starring result feels contrived and thrown together, something done without the intrinsic emotional connection he brought to that passionate first film.

**ROOKIE OF THE YEAR (PG).** A children's baseball fantasy-comedy that probably only children will be able to wholeheartedly embrace. Which is more implausible: 12-year-old Thomas Lun Tomkins breaking his arm and magically turning into a 105 mph fastball phenom or the Chicago Cubs breaking into the World Series? "Rookie," directed by Daniel Stern — who also pops up as an excellent pitching coach and bean-ball victim — doesn't set on either, although, fittingly for a movie about a late-blooming relief pitcher, it finishes strong.

**SLEEPLESS IN SEATTLE (PG).** This witty, warm, quip-happy new Nora Ephron romantic comedy offers teddy bear Tom Hanks and live wire Meg Ryan — two players who click even when they share virtually no screen time — in an ultimate long-distance relationship: a Baltimore-Seattle bi-coastal dream romance triggered by a talk radio show, a kid Cupid (Ross Malinger) and endless discussions of Leo McCarey's shipboard classic "An Affair to Remember." A real charmer, it tells us what we don't believe about romance any more and makes us like it.

## Pine tar: 10 years later

### Baseball remembers then and now the sticky situation

**NEW YORK** - The stuff is sticky. That's the main quality of pine tar. It is dark and sticky, a substance with extremely limited uses, and 10 years ago, an abundance of it on George Brett's bat mired baseball in a goney mess.

Now understand that before batting gloves and batting helmets, ever since the first pitch was thrown in anger, hitters have used pine tar to improve the grip on their bats. It is routine, like the pitcher using a resin bag.

The problem with Brett is that he battened his bat in the stuff, far up the handle and beyond the trademark, well past the 18 inches allowed in the rulebook. Nobody ever said anything about it, Brett being Brett. It was

one of those rules that baseball sort of winked at.

Then, on July 24, 1983 - a brilliant Sunday afternoon in Yankee Stadium - the wink became a blink and it was as if the pine tar had splattered all over the place.

Some weeks before, Yankee third baseman Graig Nettles had noticed Brett's bat and that nasty stain spread all over the barrel. "I knew there was a rule about too much tar on the bat because Thurman Munson once had a hit and an RBI taken away because of it," Nettles said.

He also knew baseball could occasionally get picky about bats because he was called out the year before when one of his broke and a supply of rubber balls came bouncing

So Nettles went to manager Billy Martin with the pine tar information. "He decided we wouldn't use it until Brett hurt us, until the right moment."

With the Yankees in Kansas City in early July, Brett came to the plate in a gosse-winging situation and Martin waved Gossage in and the Yankee bullpen. "I remember Nettles telling me, 'If he gets a hit, get the hit,'" Gossage said.

No problem. Brett's pine tar bat notwithstanding, Gossage's gas won the dramatic showdown. The Yankees went about their business, saying nothing.

Two weeks later, the Royals were in New York. Once again, as it frequently did before and after, the game came down to Brett vs. Please see BRETT/88

## Burkett, Giants shut down Phils

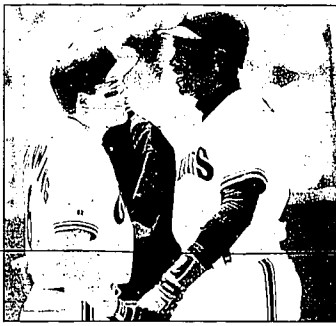
Rob Reed pitched the ninth for his 27th save in 29 opportunities.

On the mound, Gossage thought briefly about the pine tar. "In the back of my mind, I knew that if he got a hit, I had to get the bat," the reliever said. "I didn't want to test the rule, though."

At third base, Nettles admits he wasn't thinking about Brett's bat. "I had forgotten about it," he said.

In the Yankee dugout, Billy Martin had not forgotten.

Brett and Gossage had a history. In 1980, Brett had hit a three-run homer against Gossage in Yankee Stadium, clinching the playoffs and a ticket to the World Series for the Royals. Now they were at it again. "I didn't come in intending to throw it down the middle," Gossage said. "But a guy like me, I'm coming right after him."

Again, Brett caught one of Gossage's fast balls and sent it soaring toward the right field seats.

Home run.

Not so fast.

Brett was into his home run trot, still going around the bases, when Martin arrived at home plate, where rookie umpire Tim McClelland was about to find himself in one terrible mess. "Billy was on my shifty shoulder, yelling, 'You've got to call him out! There's too much pine tar!'"

Rule 11.0(c) says: "The bat handle, for not more than 18 inches from its end, may be covered or treated with any material or substance to improve the grip. Any such material or substance, which extends past the 18-inch limitation shall cause the bat to be re-

moved from the game."

Yankee catcher Rick Cerone had one end of Brett's bat and Martin had the other. Brett, meanwhile, was bitterly cursing the bases in triumph. "When I touched home plate, I didn't realize Billy Martin was already out there, arguing," Brett said.

McClelland looked at the bat. "For us," the umpire said, "the sightline is the trademark. It was way past. I told Billy, 'I'll handle it, relax.'"

The rookie umpire gathered the rest of the crew. Drew Coble, Nick Bremigan and crew chief Joe Brinkman. "I got the crew together for two things," he said. "First, am I interpreting the rule correctly, and do they see the same thing I do?"

Since umpires do not routinely carry tape measures, it was decided to use home plate to measure Brett's bat. "The plate is 17 inches across," McClelland said. "We measured it by that and the pine tar was at least 6 to 8 inches above that."

By then, Brett was aware that something was up. "I got back to the dugout and see the commotion and somebody said something about me corking my bat," he said. "I said I didn't do that, they're way off line. Then they checked for pine tar, and I said if they call me out for that, I'm going to run out there and kill every one of them."

Brinkman, as senior man on the crew, offered to make the call. McClelland declined, saying, "No, it's my call." With that, he pointed the bat at the dugout and signalled what effectively was the final out of the game.

"I didn't mean to make it dramatic," McClelland said. "The only thing

I'd do differently is call the manager out to explain the call."

Predictably, Brett went ballistic, racing out of the dugout in a straight line for McClelland. It took two umpires to hold him off.

"I reacted accordingly," he said. "You know, I lost it for 5 or 10 minutes. I was hyperventilating. I couldn't breathe when I got to the locker room."

For his part, McClelland said, he was not concerned for his own safety. "I'm 6-foot-6 and weigh 250 pounds," the ump said. "I'm wearing equipment and holding a bat."

While Brett was screaming, "You can't do that!" teammate Gaylord Perry, a more pragmatic sort, grabbed the bat and passed it to coach Rocky Colavito. "He raised it over his head," McClelland said. "I thought he was going to hit me."

The evidence made it down the dugout way but never got to the Royals clubhouse. Brinkman and McClelland recovered it and retreated to their dressing room with it. Knowing they were in a hornet's nest, the ump put the bat in a corner. "That thing's got to go down to the league offices tomorrow," Brinkman said.

Each of the umpires were headed elsewhere and suddenly all of them were looking at their clubhouse attendant, Steve Gregory. Brinkman said, "We can trust you, Steve."

That night, Gregory drove home with the wrapped hot bat. "My wife said me coming with it and said, 'Did anybody follow you?' The next morning, I took the subway downtown. Everybody was reading about the bat in the papers and there I was, standing there with it."

than to test the marketplace.

Among those no longer playing, the consensus winner is Yankee coach Mickey Mantle. The reasons should be obvious: He played before there were millions of cards in circulation, and before anybody thought to save grocery bags full of them for posterity, and before media coverage extended way beyond the white lines.

Mantle's 1952 Topps rookie card is to be auctioned off sometime during the weekend for an expected \$25,000. But even a rookie card from Bowman may bring in nearly \$3,000.

His talents — speed, strength and grace — were rooted in a particular time and place. And fairly or not, the values he came to symbolize — honesty, perseverance, coming through in the clutch — are timeless.

There are a dozen or so as gifted as Mantle playing at any time. But it's mostly those players who deliver the goods and the good feelings, like Minnesota's Kirby Buckett and Baltimore's Cal Ripken, that the market is betting on long term.

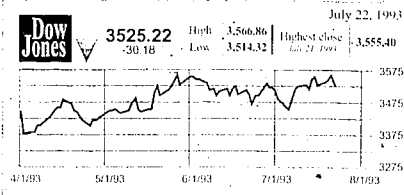
# Dow tumbles on Treasury bond slide

NEW YORK — The Dow industrials tumbled 30 points to close at 3,575.75 Thursday, succumbing to renewed fears of rising interest rates and profit taking amid the perception that stocks had reached the top of their intermediate-term trading range.

The Dow's drop came despite a continuing parade of generally respectable second-quarter company earnings reports.

The number of declining stocks on the New York Stock Exchange topped 1,000 for the sixth consecutive session. Traders said they could not remember the last time



market breadth turned from the generally positive pattern of recent

weeks to more negative pattern in so short a period of time.

"It may be no big deal, because there were still over 700 advancing issues on the NYSE," said technician Frank Grez at Shields & Co. "But it does suggest that the market is becoming more polarized than ever."

Indeed, lack of new leadership on the upside was one of the market's problems, traders attested. This was particularly true since the Dow's record closing high on Wednesday had not been contained by a single major stock in-

# TJ International enjoys improved 2nd-quarter earnings

HOUSTON — TJ International's second quarter earnings and sales have improved, despite a lull in the home market nationwide and disappointing results from its three main

divisions. The Boise-based specialty building products company on Thursday reported second-quarter net income of \$4.2 million, or 55 cents per fully diluted share. That is 29 percent better than 1992's second quarter net

income of \$3.3 million, or 43 cents per share. Second-quarter sales jumped 20 percent from \$111 million in 1992 to \$140 million.

First-half comparisons were stronger. The year-to-date net income hit \$3.6 million, or 45 cents per share. It was a 48 percent improvement over the \$2.49 million brought in the first half of last year, with its \$140 million per share. Second-quarter 1993 earnings were also offset by the company's first-quarter loss.

# Recent profit can't erase Delta's fiscal year plunge

ATLANTA — Delta Air Lines has hopped aboard a trend of modest improvement in the airline industry, reporting Thursday a \$7.1 million net profit for the April-June period.

But the Atlanta-based airline still closed its fiscal year with the worst performance in company history — \$1 billion. The large loss was caused in part by a one-time charge of \$817.9 million, taken after taxes, to correct a change in accounting for retirement benefits.

The quarterly profit was the first for Delta since July-September 1991, when the carrier had net income of \$13 million.

Delta's quarterly earnings compared with a loss of \$180.2 million in the same period of 1992. After subtracting the dividends

paid to preferred stockholders, the carrier lost 41 cents per common share in the most recent quarter. A year ago, the company lost \$3.72 per share.

Analyst Samuel C. Buttick, who follows the airline industry for Kidder, Peabody & Co. in New York, said the focus should be on the improvement in the recent quarter. "The large full-year loss reflects not only previously reported losses but also a large one-time accounting charge that investors fully anticipated," Buttick said.

The analyst's trends are distinctly favorable. "The outlook, noting that fare prices are up, oil prices are down and a government panel studying how to revive the beleaguered airline business issued a preliminary report this week that suggested tax relief for the industry."

## Indian floods kill nearly 1,200

**BAHADURGARH, India** — For more than an hour, 7-year-old Seema battled to grab one of the food packets being distributed to flood victims on Thursday.

But every time, she got lost in the sea of hands outstretched to volunteers handing out fried bread and boiled potatoes in Bahadurgarh village in northern Punjab state.

The hungry girl was one of more than 4 million people left homeless by four weeks of monsoon floods and resulting landslides that have devastated areas in India, Bangladesh and Nepal. Nearly 1,200 people have died so far.

And churning rivers swollen by monsoon floods continued to wreak destruction in all three countries on Thursday.

Hardev Singh lost his two daughters and a daughter-in-law when gusting waters tore a path through his village of Daka in Punjab state.

"Who says God is great?" Singh asked in a choked voice.

"Not at all. How can millions of people have had luck all the time?"

By Thursday, the death toll in India had climbed to 590. In the impoverished Himalayan country of Nepal, where floods washed away thousands of homes, at least 296 people were killed in deluges and landslides.

Large parts of Bangladesh, into which many of India's rivers flow, were submerged. News reports

from the capital, Dhaka, said 50 people were killed on Wednesday, bringing the overall toll to 280.

In India, the northern states of Punjab and Haryana have been hardest hit. The states produce 80 percent of India's food grains, but now people line up at relief camps for their meals. Hospitals and nursing homes are packed with cholera patients.

In Punjab alone, more than 2 million people are living in makeshift camps in schools, government buildings or tents erected on high ground.

On Thursday, Seema was among hundreds of people in Bahadurgarh who swarmed around a relief vehicle crying "Give me, give me food."

In Daka, Gurdeep Kaur last saw her husband four days ago and didn't know whether he was still alive. "She hasn't touched food since."

The disaster has shattered the economy of Punjab, the richest Indian state, which is trying to overcome a decade-old Sikh separatist campaign that has left more than 25,000 people dead.

The monsoons, a season of heavy rains, arrive in India in late June. By July the rains spread to northern and eastern India, Nepal and Bangladesh and continue until mid-August.

In an average year more than 1,500 people die in floods and property worth \$300 million is lost.

## U.S. actions hint at long stay in Balkans

**SKOPJE, Macedonia** — The most telling evidence that the 309 U.S. border-monitoring troops who arrived here last week are prepared for a long stay can be found in the plumbing of the old Yugoslav army barracks that houses them.

The decrepit Turkish-style toilets — holes in the floor described as "kind of nasty" by one soldier — have been replaced by gleaming white American Standard commodes brought down on a cargo plane from Berlin.

The four-acre camp near the Skopje airport is bustling as soldiers and Macedonian workers renovate the barracks, which were badly damaged by the departing Yugoslav troops.

Most of the U.S. soldiers, a reinforced company from the Berlin Brigade, have been sleeping on cots in a maintenance bay as they begin their assignment to supplement a contingent of 700 U.N. troops from Scandinavia.

"We are combat soldiers and can adapt to anything," said Lt. Col. Walter Holton, commander of the first group to arrive. "But if you don't have to live on a cot in a shed, then we want to upgrade."

Retirees, coffee makers and other touches of home have popped up. Plans are afoot to build a small post exchange and to bring in transmitters allowing soldiers to receive Armed Forces Network radio and television.

All this is music to the ears of the Macedonian government, which requested the U.N. presence

out of fear that this former Yugoslav republic might be the target of aggression by neighboring Serbia as the bloody Balkan crisis continues to unfold.

Officials here see the addition of the Americans as a particularly blunt warning to Serbia, although there are concerns that the number of troops might be too small.

"We would like to see another zero added to the 300," said a government official.

If war breaks out, Undersecretary of Defense Todor Malezanski told Stars and Stripes newspaper, Macedonia could ask for 5,000 to 10,000 more American troops. The U.S. government has said the American troops will not be left undefended but has not made any public commitments on increasing the size of the force.

There is little doubt that the U.N. force would be quickly overwhelmed by an attack from Serbia and the Yugoslav army it controls, which Macedonian officials say has 60,000 troops and 200 tanks positioned just across the border.

The lightly armed U.N. troops are here to keep watch on Macedonia's potentially turbulent borders and not to defend them against attack.

"We really didn't design our task force based on what's on the other side," said Holton. His company is equipped with 50-caliber machine guns, M-16 rifles and a mortar battery. Additional firepower is provided by anti-aircraft missiles, which proved highly effective during the Persian Gulf War.

**TOKYO** — Angry junior lawmakers wrung further changes from Japan's scandal-ridden ruling party Thursday by refusing to let power brokers use their usual secret methods to choose their next leader.

The extraordinary victory in a party caucus vote shortly after Prime Minister Kiichi Miyazawa agreed to resign could give reformers a shot at winning the leadership since it now will be chosen by secret ballot instead of party elders.

The chances for the new Liberal Democratic Party leader to become prime minister were jolted later Thursday when a new party said it would

support an opposition candidate to become head of government.

That could give the opposition enough votes in parliament to end the Liberal Democrats' 38-year rule on power.

The newly elected parliament was expected to meet Aug. 2 to choose the new prime minister. The Liberal Democrats must decide on their new leader — and candidate for office until — before then. Miyazawa will stay in office until a successor is named.

In resigning, Miyazawa took responsibility for the Liberal Democrats' loss of their parliamentary majority in elections Sunday. He had to call the elections after losing a parliamentary vote of confidence for failure to enact measures to curb corruption.

His party remained by far the biggest in Parliament, winning 223 of the 511 seats in the more powerful lower house. It has sought to build its own coalition to keep power.

But Morihiro Hosokawa, leader of the Japan New Party, predicted a 70 percent chance for a non-LDP prime minister.

Appearing on a late-night television program, Hosokawa said he expected his party could come to an agreement on basic policies with a group of five opposition parties that are working toward a coalition. In any case, he said, his party intends to vote for the opposition coalition's candidate.

## Mubarak targets Muslim radicals

**CAIRO, Egypt** — President Hosni Mubarak pledged Thursday to make the defeat of Muslim extremists the first goal of his expected third term as Egypt's leader.

Speaking a day after his nomination to seek re-election, Mubarak

said he would work to help Egypt out of its economic morass and broaden democracy.

"But the correct starting point for all this lies in total confrontation with terrorism," he said in a speech to his National Democratic Party honoring Egypt's July 23, 1952, revolution.

WHEREAS, the existing system for custody and rehabilitation of juvenile offenders of the County is temporary and obsolete and the Board of Commissioners (the "Board") of the County has determined that the public health, safety, and welfare require the construction, maintenance, and operation of a new regional facility to replace the existing system; and  
WHEREAS, the County does not have sufficient funds available in its current year's budget nor from available State grant funds to finance the entire cost of a new facility and the Board has determined that it is necessary to finance a portion of the cost thereof from "future years"; and  
WHEREAS, the Board has determined that the portion of the cost to be financed from future years' revenues is an "ordinary and necessary expense" of the County within the meaning of Article 8, Section 3, Idaho Constitution, for which no approving vote of the electorate is required, and has further determined to submit such determination to the District Court of the Fifth Judicial District of the State of Idaho, in and for the County of Twin Falls, pursuant to the Judicial Confirmation Law, the same being Idaho Code Section 7-1301, et seq.  
NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF TWIN FALLS COUNTY, IDAHO, as follows:  
Section 1: The board hereby finds, determines and de-

Development and construction of an 18 bed regional juvenile detention center and associated improvements Southeast of Twin Falls, Idaho (more particularly described as follows: Twin Falls Valley Industrial Sub # 2, Lot 5), and completion of the present juvenile program for males and females.

F. The County does not have adequate funds available in its current budget nor from available State grant funds to pay all of the costs of providing the new facility. The County has determined to finance an amount not to exceed \$240,000 of the cost thereof from funds previously committed in the manner described in the Promissory Notes (the "Notes") which are annexed hereto as Exhibit "A".

G. The financing of a portion of such cost in the manner described would create an indebtedness and liability of the County exceeding the current year's revenues of the County. 2. The proposed expenditure is necessary to protect the health and safety of the inhabitants of the County in Idaho Code Section 16-1812A (1992).
- Standards for detention - The following shall be minimum standards for the care of children provided for in section 16-1812, Idaho Code:
  - (1) Juvenile detention facilities must be constructed and/or maintained so to keep children segregated from adult offenders of those laws of the Idaho Code under section 16-1806 or 16-1806A, Idaho Code; with there to be no contact as to sight or sound between the two (2) classes.
  - (2) Juvenile detention facilities must provide supervision and observation of juvenile detainees sufficient to protect the physical and mental health of detainees.
  - (3) Juveniles held in detention must be provided with at least three (3) adequate and nutritional meals per day.
  - (4) Juveniles held in detention must be provided access to reading materials on a regular and systematic basis. Detained juveniles may receive books, newspapers and periodicals from any source including the public library, detention facilities by family members, subject to the right of detention authorities to inspect and remove dangerous or harmful materials. Detention authorities may forbid the introduction into reading materials of obscene books or periodicals.
  - (5) A visiting program shall be established in juvenile detention facilities which will allow for family visits to each juvenile for at least two (2) hours each week.
  3. The proposed expenditures will allow utilization of grant monies; if not put to use, will not tax the region.
  4. The amount of the proposed indebtedness (approximately \$240,000) is not disproportionate to the total cost of the facility (estimated to be \$1,500,000) nor to the County's overall budget for the current fiscal year.
  5. The proposed improvements are authorized and set forth by the general laws of the Idaho Code Section 16-1812 Supp. 1992.
  6. The County has approved its present juvenile detention strategy for approximately three years and has determined that the improvements are indispensable to the efficient continued operation of a regional detention facility.
  7. As a regional detention center, the facility will contribute to the operation of the facility based upon each county's per diem occupancy of the facility, pursuant to the memorandum of understanding attached hereto as Exhibit "B".
  - H. The Board has been advised by counsel that an unresolved legal question exists as to the validity of the indebtedness and liability to be incurred. ## 'X-Men' sends message of equality

Sometime in the near future, environmental crises - ozone depletion, toxic pollutants and the like - will combine to cause random genetic alterations in some humans. Those born with individualized mutations (most granting superpowers) will be misunderstood and feared by normal humans, many of whom will want to see all mutants placed in concentration camps and ultimately eradicated.

"This is the world of Fox's 'X-Men' - a surprisingly thought-provoking entry in the vacuum realm of Saturday morning cartoons.

Younger viewers of this popular animated action series should know that the plight of these future mutants reflects those of other groups in history - the American Indians during the settling of America, for example - and that understanding beyond mere tolerance is required to prevent history from repeating itself.

Created by Marvel Comics' Stan Lee in 1963, the X-Men were a long time coming to television. "I've been trying to get 'X-Men' on TV for 15 years," says Margaret Loesch, president of Fox Children's Network. "First when I was at NBC back in the '70s, then when I was president of Marvel Productions. I just couldn't get any network interested in it. So when I came to Fox, after we got this operation up and running, I called Stan Lee and said, 'OK, let's do it.'"

"Looking back, this was the best time to do it. It was the right time with all the racial problems and intolerance that people seem to be having. There's a positive message with 'X-Men,' and we try to deal with it in every episode."

Led by the telepathic Professor Charles Xavier, the co-ed X-Men team strives to achieve a peaceful coexistence with humans, a task that involves the squelching of uprisings by evil or rebellious mutants. Despite their noble intentions, the X-Men are driven underground by a government-sponsored organization called the Mutant Registration Program designed to place all mutants in concentration camps. For the brooding

belligerent 'Wolverine, it's just another fight, while the intellectual Beast knows the larger battle is fought with 'eloquent' speech, even choosing not to escape from his jail cell so he can have his day in court.

Self-acceptance is another issue addressed. Power-absorbing, female mutant Rogue is tempted to submit to a process which reverses the mutation because of her simple desire to touch another person without hurting him.

Her fellow X-Men lead her to understand that it's OK to be a mutant.

fight for in their society — being accepted. I would like to see children when they look at it and see what all of us go through and that the X-Men always love each other, they realize they can always find a support group — their family, their friends, people who accept them for what they are."

Its thematic appeal aside, 'X-Men' also has the best look of Saturday-morning cartoons. "It is the single most difficult show to produce in animation on network television right now," says Loesch. "It's got what we call a lot of pencil mileage, which in animation just means it's very intricate drawing, a lot of shades, a very broad color palette."

Fox says the possibility of airing 'X-Men' as a special or a series of specials in prime time.

## Letterman takes it all in stride

LOS ANGELES — David Letterman doesn't appear to be burdened by the pressure of grandiose late-night talk show expectations.

"Maybe I'm just dumb," said Letterman, sly and ultra-slim as he bounced wisecracks off 100 or so TV critics Monday evening. "I don't find myself kind of in a cloud of anxiety about this. Of course, I'm full of gin."

Ta-da-boom. Yes, TV critics laughed generously as Letterman answered a few dozen questions about his move to CBS Aug. 30, when "Late Show with David Letterman" debuts.

Some particulars: Yep, the money is absurd. Letterman is making \$14 million a year from CBS. "I'm certainly not worth that kind...of...dough," he said. "There's no getting around it."

Despite public blustering by NBC that it owns the Rights to Stupid Pet Tricks and the Top Ten List, Letterman said he's still planning to use those surefire comedy segments on his new show. But "if that comes to trial, get a seat down front," he joked.

The Letterman theme song will also remain the same, but with a twist. "It's a slightly more rocking arrangement for the earlier time slot," said Paul Shaffer, Letterman's droll band leader and comic foil.

Alas, Larry "Bud" Melman isn't making the move to CBS. At least, the name stays with Letterman's old network. But Calvin DeForest, the nebbish performer who stylishly wore the Maimonides "Tonight Show Night," will indeed be part of the new Letterman show.

Yes, Letterman is a bit concerned that Jay Leno will have an initial edge in their head-to-head ratings competition because nearly all NBC affiliates carry "The Tonight Show" at 11:35 p.m., while numerous CBS affiliates are still planning to dial Letterman for at least a half hour while airing syndicated sitcoms.

Johnny Carson, a mentor and idol, is on Letterman's wish list for guests on his new show.

Though a deal has been revealed, Garry Shandling is a top choice to move into the slot following "Late Show with David Letterman." "I think he's one of a handful of guys — handful of men and women who always do great, quality work," Letterman said. Dave is a big fan of "The Larry Sanders Show," Shandling's dead-on talk show satire which Letterman said "reminded me of like any Tuesday of our life."

And, yes, the late-show host has

lost a lot of weight. Thirty pounds, to be exact.

Letterman professed little worry that NBC might sue over the rights to Stupid Pet Tricks and other "Late Night" fare.

"It's going to be the same show," he said. "These are the same producers, this is the same musical director... It would really surprise me if we didn't all (NBC, CBS and Letterman) find ourselves together on the high road."

Letterman said his old girlfriend and former "Late Night" writer Merrill Markoe created the Stupid Pet Tricks bit, and, "in the case of the Top Ten List, we stole that from USA Today."

He may be officially cool, according to Entertainment Weekly, but the tumultuous ups and downs of the past year have had an impact, Letterman said.

"I think the whole thing has gotten to be unbelievable, especially the year that ensued following NBC's selecting Jay Leno for 'The

Tonight Show,'" Letterman said. "And at that point, honest to God, I thought that I was just going to leave and wouldn't have a job. And I'm very, very lucky to be in this situation."

Because of his regard for Carson and "The Tonight Show," Letterman did have to work through some bruised feelings.

"Now... it seems things have worked out for the better. Through all of this, I've suffered no rancor. I've had a little remorse, certainly no acrimony."

Letterman also said the so-called late-night wars are a far bigger deal to the media than to him, and that he has no adversarial feelings toward folks like Jay Leno, Arsenio Hall and Chevy Chase, who begins a new talk show on Fox in September. "And that's comedy whippersnapper Conan O'Brien, who will take over the "Late Night" slot on NBC, Letterman said he'd be glad to be a guest on the show. And he likes Conan's chances.

## CBS says it won't sweat 'Evening News' ratings dip

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS, which teamed "Evening News" anchor Dan Rather with Connie Chung in June to

"redefine the role of the anchor," has seen its second-rated network slip into the cellar.

After six weeks with Rather and Chung together, the CBS newscast's ratings are down 2 percent from the

same period last year, while NBC's are up 1 percent and ABC is up 7 percent.

During the truncated holiday week, July 5-9, the CBS newscast finished last, marking only the third time since October that NBC climbed out of third place.

"That's the nature of the beast,"

said the CBS newscast's executive producer, Erik Sorenson, at a meeting Sunday of television writers and critics in Los Angeles.

"Every time there's been a change... it takes a while to iron out the kinks and that's what we're doing," he said. "And this helps to endure a long time to readjust and recalibrate."

# Big movie names flock to cable's small screen

LOS ANGELES — The subject was television, but you would have thought it was a movie stars' convention.

Tom Hanks, Jack Lemmon, Forest Whitaker, Kiefer Sutherland, Isabella Rossellini, director Sydney Pollack ("The Firm") and Timothy Dalton, 007 himself, were just some of the big-screen crowd to promote cable-TV last week before the nation's TV critics.

"The cable revolution... has blurred the lines between features and television," said John Lithgow, star of Showtime's "The Wrong Man." "It's certainly no stigma to do a cable film, and it's become a badge of honor to do something good on cable."

While the broadcast networks feare on true crime stories, like the Amy Fisher trilogy, and the movie studios just after the next "Jurassic Park," cable has become the source for literate, provocative or deeply personal fare.

Films like "Paris Trout," "Barbarians at the Gate" and "The Josephine Baker Story" have raised the cable movie's status. To continue to stand out in what could become a 500-channel universe, the cable networks are courting big-name film talent with showy roles or tempting offers to direct.

"We try to do films that are based on star power, stars that would not normally be associ-

ated with television," said Alan Sabinson, a TNT senior vice president.

TNT will present Lemmon and Matthew Broderick in David Mamet's "A Life in the Theatre." John Malkovich in Joseph Conrad's "Heart of Darkness" and a Zella Fitzgerald biography starring Neitzke Richardson and Jim Hutton.

"You can't separate film and TV any longer," Lemmon said. "You take a look at some of the people who are now doing films in cable; and forget it. They're starring in films as features, too."

The studios' dependence on a few big-budget movies forces actors to look elsewhere for roles, Lemmon said. "There are some very, very good properties that you'd be a damn fool to turn down just because it's going to be on television," he said.

Over at Showtime, Sutherland makes his directing debut with "Last Light," in which he plays a death-row inmate.

Speaking via satellite from England, where he's filming the big-screen "Three Musketeers," Sutherland explained why he chose to direct the story on cable rather than in the movies. He

didn't have to worry about money for an ad campaign or fret over the number of theaters where the film would play.

"Given the fact that it was my first film, I wanted people to see the film, and cable seemed like an obvious choice," he said. "Last Light" is his statement

against the "outdated" practice of capital punishment.

Whitaker, Sutherland's co-star in "Last Light," makes his directorial debut with HBO's "Stripped." The film looks at illegal gun trade in the inner city.

"I can see a lot of guys are getting opportunities directing on cable," Whitaker said. "They wouldn't get the chance in a feature."

Showtime and executive producer Pollack have rounded up Hanks, Tom Cruise and Steven Soderbergh ("sex, lies and videotape"), among others to direct "Fallen Angels," an anthology of six 30-minute film noir thrillers.

"It's very rare that somebody like me gets to actually be in charge and boss people around," Hanks said. He has directed a "Tales From the Crypt" episode on cable, and called directing "an ongoing educational process."

Rossellini, who stars in the Cruise episode; praised his directorial debut. "He had a very clear idea of the story," she said. "He's very communicative, so it was easy to follow his instructions."

Pollack endorsed cable as "an opportunity to do a much wider variety of material than you might have on film." He described each "Fallen Angels" episode as "a miniature movie."

"There is nothing miniature about HBO's" "And the Band Played On," the film version of Randy Shilts' best-seller about the early years of the AIDS crisis. The film stars Steve Martin, Lily Tomlin, Alan Alda, Richard Gere and Matthew Modine, among others. A generation ago, such a serious movie with a big-name cast would have been a natural for the movies. No more.

There are other signs of the blurring between cable and the movies: The four-hour "Gettysburg," starring Tom Berenger, Martin Sheen and Jeff Daniels, will premiere in movie theaters rather than on TNT, as originally announced. One critic wondered if Ted Turner had finally made his own "Gone With the Wind."

Dalton, who hopes to star in another James Bond movie next year, plays a brilliant villain in "Framed" on the Arts & Entertainment Network. He had the passion on a lot of movie scripts to work in television.

"How many good movies do we really get each year — compared to, say, 20 years ago?" he asked.

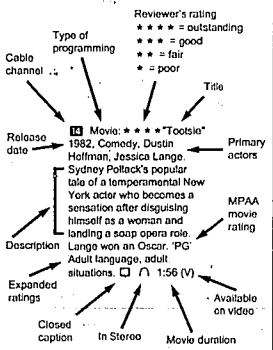

Of course, Chandler's diabolical moves might take several weeks or months to engineer, with many a seething outburst and agitated shake of his handsome silver head. Things do get a little hot in a soap.

But patience pays off for the viewer with a thing for hiss-feral bad guys. Adam Chandler, arch villain-industrialist of ABC's "All My Children" (seen weekdays at 11 a.m. EDT), is a businessman who gives everyone the business.

"That is, unless he happens to be laid up, as Chandler is these days, the victim of a car crash, legs paralyzed, future misdeeds doubtful. Go figure! The man who could have written "The Art of the Double Deal" is, for a change, downright sympathetic, even noble, in his suffering. Poor devil.

"It is a damn helpless!" roars Adam from his hospital bed, in a scene from a recent episode.

Rehearsal over, actor David Canary vaults from the bed and explains to a reporter how he's managed the latest about-face in Chandler's turbulent psyche.

"Another soap actor, told me years ago,

'Play gray — because if you commit yourself very strongly this week to something in your character, odds are the writers are going to make you continue to do it next week.' "I thought that was the worst piece of advice I'll ever heard," Canary laughs. "I'd rather Adam feel very strongly about this thing today, and if the writers take us another direction next week, I'll figure out a reason to go there then. I think that's a more interesting Adam. You can't control yourself next week!"

It's a lot more fun to play that way.

Fun to play, and fun to watch. Little wonder that Canary has picked up four Daytime Emmys, the most recent one this year, as he closes in on a decade on the 23-year-old soap.

And did we mention that Canary has a second role? In the sometimes raucously world of daytime drama, the real T-Adam, and now, much he seems to be like Stuart — friendly, gracious, but a little shy.

Then, in December 1983, Canary joined "All My Children."

Almost 10 years later, Canary still has a good time as the baddest man in town.

# Oprah films movie in 1 of toughest neighborhoods

CHICAGO — There are children at the Henry Horner Homes, lots of them. One afternoon this week, a gaggle of them shouted instructions to a film crew that had borrowed their neighborhood for a while.

"Turn it to the right; turn it to the right," Mario Williams, 11, yelled at the driver of a big black truck that plays a small role in the TV movie version of the national best-seller "There Are No Children Here" — the book — by Alex Kotlowitz — that is being filmed partly at the West Side public housing development.

The truck was seemingly wedged in the middle of Oakley Avenue, apparently in an attempt to complete a U-turn it should have made easily. Actually, the scene being shot for the movie, produced by and starring Oprah Winfrey, called for the truck to create a traffic jam. So the truck purposefully first inched forward, then back, over and over, while extras in cars leaned on their horns.

But Williams and the group of boys he stood with kept shouting at the driver to cut his wheels harder. "That man could've been turned that truck around," an exasperated Mario said to no one in particular.

Though not everything they saw made sense to the people of Horner, appearing on film for sure: A mega-star was in their neighborhood doing a movie about the lives of people like them and giving hundreds of them a chance to make some money as extras. For most, that was more than enough.

"Hell, I was out their 20 years ago looking for those same snakes," said Jerome

Parham, the youthful director of the local Boys and Girls Club who was once a resident. He alluded to the book's opening scene, in which the Horner children searched for garby snakes along nearby railroad tracks.

In 1991, readers nationwide were transfixed by the tale of the Rivers boys, Lafayette and Pharoah, and their family as they fought to survive drugs, gangs, guns and poverty in the decaying buildings they called home.

Winfrey was one such reader. She acquired the rights to turn the book into the movie now being filmed by a subsidiary of her Harpo Productions Inc. ABC is tentatively scheduled to air it during the 1993-94 season.

Besides being executive producer, Winfrey plays the mother's role, while child actor Norman Golden, 6, plays the father. Pharoah, the younger brother, Lafayette is played by Mark Lane, a 14-year-old who was selected during an open casting call that drew more than 1,000 hopeful young actors.

"I'm really excited that she's playing La-Joe," said Kotlowitz, a former newspaper reporter and several years at Horner researching his book. "It will bring the film that much more attention."

"I think the film will further what the book did, break down the walls of silence we've created around communities like this," Kotlowitz said. He hopes it provides more fortunate viewers "to recognize that

people who live in such communities are neighbors to us who don't live in the inner city" and that concerted efforts to change these neighborhoods will occur.

Says Evelyn Delph, a middle-aged woman who was raised in the Horner area: "Once people really see the movie and realize this was a true story, maybe something can be done. Because this is the reality right here."

On Wednesday afternoon, pride filled the air as area residents savored the relative peace all the cameras, white people and uniformed police working as security gave Horner's northwest corner, one of the toughest parts of a rough neighborhood. The luckier onlookers viewed the proceedings from plastic patio chairs. Others stood for hours, shifting their weight from foot to foot and obeying production assistants who occasionally asked them to move out of camera range.

"Black people don't usually get that much of a chance to see them make a film," said Curtis Rice, a teen-ager from a nearby

building. "But now they've got the chance, and they're coming with the utmost respect for the fact that this is a dangerous territory," said Debra DiMaio, a co-producer for the film. "But we're also buoyed by the fact that the spirit of the book and this movie will get made."

Winfrey was unavailable for a press interview, though she has been very accessible to the people of Horner. "She made us feel right at home," said Dalphine Allen, 31, a Horner resident, seemingly forgetting for a moment that it was Winfrey who was visiting, perhaps a credit to the superstar's people skills.

Allen is one of the 300 to 400 Horner residents employed as film extras. She and other extras were filmed in a card-playing scene with Winfrey. In fact, a resident at Winfrey's table taught Oprah how to play bid whist.

Allen recalls that during the filming of that scene, a filmmaker asked the Horner women where their purses were. "We don't carry purses in the hood," answered one extra, hinting that would make a woman a more appealing target.

Later, another crew member who was not present earlier asked about the lack of purses. "They don't carry purses in the hood," Winfrey said, as though she had known that all along, according to Allen. "We were laughing because it was funny."

## Forsythe of 'The Untouchables' most famous for feature films

A. Heckart, 74, has worked extensively on stage, screen and TV.

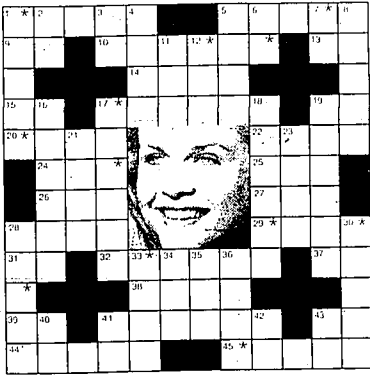

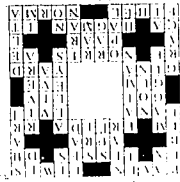

ORLANDO, Fla. — Here's a hint this NFL season will be wonderfully wacky, deliciously different: Fans at a training camp already are chanting "Super Bowl! Super Bowl!" — and they're Great Bay fans, not Dallas fans.

That kind of talk might wake up Vince Lombardi. Vince wouldn't recognize the league today, they hardly anybody without a program can. There was no free agency in the days of Lombardi, who was big on loyalty — even if it basically was unconstitutional.

But people are talking — no, yelling — that the Pack is back. Back to the Super Bowl. Sure, they're still a long shot during this so-called Dallas dynasty; but if — only through the NFL's new free-agent market — that Great Bay again has a pulse and street lights. So much for that theory the stars wouldn't flock to Smaller Market, USA. Spend \$30 million — \$17 million on a fellow named Reggie White — and you, too, can have the makings of a nice, little club.

The NFL is embarking on its most intriguing season ever — in its spite of itself. Let's face it: This is a season most owners never wanted to see unfold. These Scrooges were perfectly happy to count their millions and use the threat of drawn-out court battles to prevent players from imitating the NFL's free-agent market. These Scrooges were sick, sure, with all the Donald Trump-type money being thrown around. But now fans don't have to depend solely on the draft — or an injury to another team's QB — for his or her team to prosper.

Never in the modern history of the league — dating to, oh, Joe Namath's Super Bowl shocker that forced the NFL to absorb the AFL — has the NFL witnessed such incredible change. Owners historically have never been trade mongers, but linebacker Pat Swilling has gone from Saint to Lion and Boomer Easonon from Bengal to Jet.

The sidelines will have a different look, too. Gone are coaches Mike Ditka and Joe Gibbs, fire and ice. A season without Ditka! No more Tasmanian

Devil act. What a loss: Bill Parcells is back with nothing to lose in New England. Remember, Bill, you do have a best condition. At least he won't put us to sleep from the TV booth anymore.

Just think of all the possible Super Bowl pairings? Dallas vs. San Francisco vs. San Francisco vs. San Francisco vs. Miami. Dallas vs. Houston in the all-Texas steel-age match. Green Bay vs. Kansas City (a replay of Super Bowl I). The most deli-

cious matchup is, of course, Steve Young vs. Joe Montana, a k a San Francisco vs. Kansas City, for the rights to the World. And please, no Buffalo — no, no, no!
