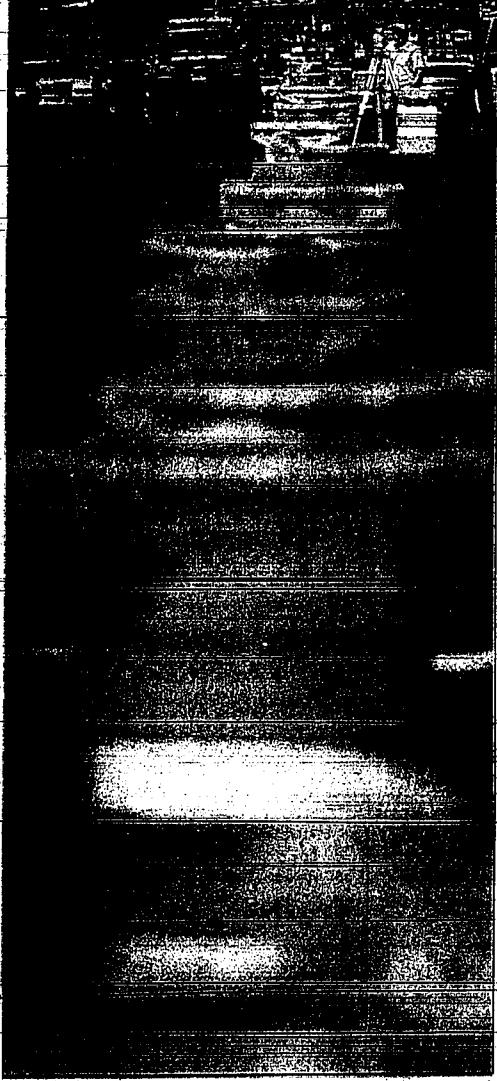

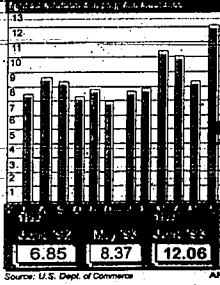

Trade deficit surges; Fed props dollar

WASHINGTON — The U.S. merchandise trade deficit soared 44 percent in June to the highest level in five years, the government said Thursday.
That prompted a massive effort by the Federal Reserve to prop up the value of the dollar.
The startling trade report, far worse than economists had predicted, sent the value of the U.S. dollar tumbling toward a new post-World War II low against the Japanese yen. To halt the fall, the Federal Reserve intervened in foreign exchange markets by purchasing huge quantities of dollars.
"It was heavy and direct intervention and it came in waves," said economist David Jones of Aubrey G. Lanston & Co. "That means they mean business."
Americans bought more clothing, televisions and computers from abroad in June, widening the deficit to \$12.1 billion, the largest gap since February 1988, the Commerce Department said.
The deterioration was produced by a 3.3 percent drop in exports to \$37.6 billion and a 5.1 percent jump in imports to a record \$49.7 billion.
At the same time, American businesses seeking to improve their efficiency in a soft U.S. economy are buying foreign computers and communications equipment. And U.S. consumers haven't lost their appetite for imports, particularly Japanese cars and electronics.
Commerce Secretary Ronald H. Brown said the report "underscores the need to pursue export opportunities aggressively."
"The message is clear. U.S. exports are doing poorly, to a significant extent because of stagnation and recession in Europe and a slowdown in economic activity in Japan," said economist Allen Sinai of Economic Advisers Inc. "This big deterioration is a sign of a weak economy losing momentum as we move into the third quarter."
He said the June trade number would make the economy's performance look even weaker in the second quarter than the lackluster 1.6 percent annual growth rate estimated earlier by the Commerce Department.
During the 1990-91 recession, trade was one of the few bright spots in U.S. economy, with the deficit falling.
Economists said U.S. exports are suffering, primarily because the severe downturn in Western Europe's economy has depressed demand for U.S. goods.

'Glitch' boosts county tax hike over 5% mark

TWIN FALLS — The county government's share of the property tax levy will rise more than 5 percent the coming year, officials said Thursday.
The proposed rate increase will add still more to taxes that were already expected to rise with increasing property values.
Commissioners Norma Blass and Jim Fraley and Clerk Bob Fort did not say Thursday how much the tax rate will increase. They expected to announce the tentative budget figures this morning.
Fort and Blass said Wednesday that they had hoped to keep the tax levy increase to 5 percent. But after working over the budget figures Wednesday night, Fort found a "glitch" in the estimates, and realized the county's share of the levy would increase more than 5 percent, he said Thursday.
If the levy increase exceeds 5 percent, the commissioners must hold a public hearing to comply with the state's Truth in Taxation Law. They plan a public hearing on the budget for Sept. 7.
Commission Chairman Jim Fraley said Thursday that had the levy increase been held to 5 percent, he might have suggested increasing it beyond that to give county employees raises.

Budget adoption set this morning

The Twin Falls County Commission will adopt the tentative budget for the 1993-94 fiscal year at a meeting this morning at 10 a.m., according to a news release from the commissioners.
County elected officials who wish to speak with the commissioners about the budget are welcome to do so at 9 a.m., the release stated.
Both meetings will take place in the commission chambers on the fourth floor of the County Courthouse, 425 Shoshone Street North.

Stanley puts anti-sockeye fish fry on weekend menu

STANLEY — A group of area businesses will fry up some ceremonial sockeye salmon Saturday to protest the notion that the fish's Idaho relative is an endangered species.
The Saturday feed will feature sockeye flown in from Alaska, not the local endangered variety.
The Sawtooth Valley Boosters claim that the sockeye listed as endangered is not native fish — no different in fact from the hundreds of pounds of sockeye that will be cooked up Saturday, said George McKovitch. "Only we're going to eat them," he said.
The National Marine Fisheries Service listed the Idaho sockeye as endangered in December 1991 under the Endangered Species Act. Chinook were listed as threatened in May 1992.
The listings have resulted in restrictions on activities thought to affect the fish in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area, which includes the Stanley area.
Some Stanley tourist-based businesses have complained that the restrictions have driven visitors away. And McKovitch claims the listing is unfounded.
Today's Idaho sockeye are the result of

transplanted fish from Canada, he said.
"We're not against sockeye," McKovitch said. "They're gone; let's get on with life."
But the fisheries service may be reluctant to remove the sockeye from the list because that would mean the service would get less money from the Bonneville Power Administration to study the species, McKovitch said.
The BPA sells electricity from the eight federal dams on the lower Snake and Columbia rivers, which most experts agree are the principal cause of the demise of the salmon.
Despite McKovitch's claims, the fisheries service considers the Redfish Lake sockeye an "evolutionarily significant unit." That means the fish is genetically distinguishable from kokanee salmon and other sockeye runs, said Mike Bancroft, an attorney who represents the service on endangered species issues.
"Redfish Lake has never been stocked with sockeye," he said. The fish in the lake are the remnants of the native fish.
Sunbeam Dam was built in 1913 on the main Salmon River about 20 miles downstream from the mouth of Redfish Lake Creek. Fish ladders at the dam were ineffective, according to some early records.

Clinton starts drive for trade pact

WASHINGTON — President Clinton launched an intense campaign Thursday to overcome Democratic opposition to the trade agreement with Mexico and Canada, naming Chicago attorney William M. Daley as head of a task force to build "a strong and unified front."
Mindful of opposition from organized labor and Democratic leaders of the House, Daley said his task was "quite a challenge" but he predicted Clinton would prevail.
Daley, the 44-year-old brother of Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley and son of the late legendary Mayor Richard J. Daley, is known as a shrewd negotiator with close ties to labor unions that oppose the agreement.
Clinton said "it will be difficult for us to prevail" if both House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., and Democratic Whip David Bonior of Michigan stick by their opposition to the pact.

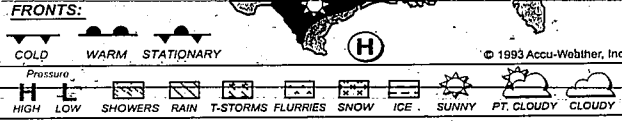
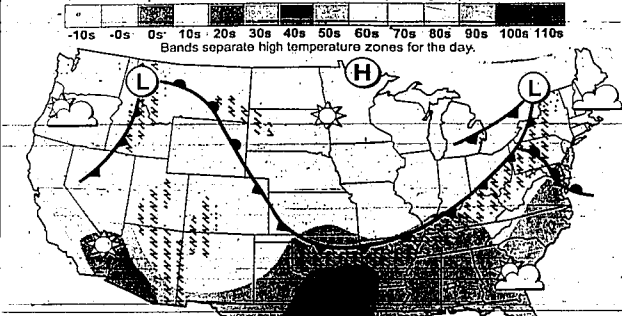

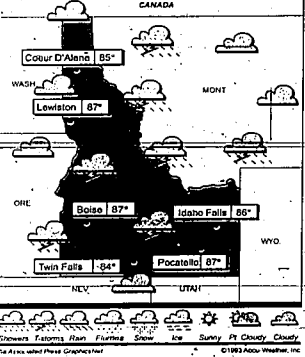

South swelters; heavy rains bring more floods to Iowa

Heavy rain caused flooding in Iowa as showers and thunderstorms drenched much of the nation Thursday. Temperatures soared in the South. Flood warnings were posted for the upper Iowa River in northeast Iowa, and will continue through Saturday.

Highway 66 was flooded near Lucas, and only one lane of Highway 34, also near Lucas, was open to traffic. But highway warnings began to recede later Thursday when blue skies appeared.

Threats of heavy rain prompted flash flood watches Thursday afternoon and evening for central and northern New Mexico, central Illinois, and south-central Oregon, including the southern Cascade and Siskiyou mountains.

On Thursday afternoon, rain showers and thunderstorms extended over the southern Atlantic coastal states, the eastern Gulf of Mexico states, the western part of the upper Great Lakes, the eastern part of the upper Mississippi Val-

ley, western Kansas, southeast Colorado, northeast New Mexico, the Great Basin, southwest Oregon and northwest California.

Heat advisories were posted Thursday afternoon for the southern half of Missouri, the midlands and eastern South Carolina, northern Texas, most of Arkansas and northern and central Mississippi.

Tallahassee, Fla., warmed to 101 degrees and set a high temperature record for the date, breaking the 1972 mark of 99 degrees. The city has reached 100 degrees or higher on six days and has broken a high temperature record for that date twice this summer.

Austin, Texas, tied records for consecutive days without rain and for 100-degree or hotter days, and forecasters said the odds for breaking the two records were nearly 100 percent.

The nation's temperatures at 1 p.m. MDT ranged from 57 degrees at Arcata, Calif., to 105 at Gila Bend, Ariz.

sockeye upstream of the dam and in Redfish Lake in the 1920s and 1930s. The dam was partially removed in 1934 to re-establish the sockeye run.

Enough salmon and steelhead got over the Sunbeam Dam to sustain the species, said Dexter Pitman, salmon and steelhead program manager for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

Fish-and-game records show that millions of kokanee and sockeye were restocked in the upper Salmon River - but none in Redfish Lake.

Sockeye from Babine Lake on the Skeena River in British Columbia were transplanted in the 1980s to Stanley and Alturas lakes, but no adults ever returned from their ocean migration, said Tom Rogers, supervisor of Fish and Game's salmon and steelhead hatcheries.

The Canadian fish were brought in to help the Idaho sockeye runs, already in trouble in the early 1980s, and to see "if it would work," Rogers said.

Apparently they weren't tough enough.

But arguing about whether the sockeye are native or not does nothing to help recover the fish, Pitman said. It is more important to focus on the major problem affecting the sockeye - and other salmon - and that is the hydroelectric system on the lower river, he said.

McKevich agreed that fish habitat around Stanley is not the problem. He too thinks the solution is to alter the dams on the lower river. The attention to habitat is only a way for the downstream power interest to divert attention from the real problem.

Meanwhile the sockeye listing has delayed the stocking of cutthroat trout in the area lakes and streams. And that has affected the tourist business, hotel owner Tim McGowan said.

Fishing is one of the things tourists like to do when they come to Stanley, he said.

But the sockeye is only part of the reason for the delayed trout stocking, Pitman said. The coldest July on record also meant that many streams flowed too much and were too cold for the stocked trout to survive, he said.

And rainbow trout can "potentially" eat young chinook salmon - as well as compete with them for food, Pitman said.

McGowan admits that the cool weather has affected the tourist business. But most reservations are made in January, and the weather doesn't deter dedicated fishermen, he said.

People are coming, and people are fishing despite the weather, but many are leaving because the fishing is too dismal, he said.

In a separate report Thursday, the Labor Department said first-time claims for unemployment benefits slipped by 6,000 last week to 325,000, the lowest level since mid-February.

U.S. hurls double punch at Iraqis

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. Air Force warplanes threw a one-two punch at an Iraqi surface-to-air missile battery Thursday.

They struck first with two fighters and, an hour later, with a pair of ground-attack planes, U.S. officials said.

It was a more aggressive U.S. action than usual against Iraq's defiant air defenders.

Kathleen deLaski, spokeswoman for the Pentagon, said Iraq provoked the strikes by firing two missiles at a pair of U.S. planes near the city of Mosul. The planes were patrolling a U.N.-imposed "no fly zone" over northern Iraq.

She said the Iraqi SA-3 anti-aircraft missiles did not hit the U.S. planes.

U.S. and allied planes have bombed Iraqi air defense installations numerous times since the end of the Gulf War, but Thursday's Iraqi provocation was "the most serious," Ms. deLaski said.

The spokeswoman said U.S. officials viewed it as an isolated incident, although the State Department described it as occurring "against the city of Mosul, in provocations" such as attacks on predominantly Shiite southern marshlands.

A report from the state-run Iraqi news agency, monitored in Nicaragua, said Iraqi anti-aircraft guns opened fire after the bombing and later prevented the U.S. planes from attacking another defense battery. It did not say Iraq fired missiles at the planes.

The Iraqi news report said a

soldier and a civilian were wounded in the attack.

In a letter to U.N. Secretary General Boutros Boutros-Ghali, Iraq Foreign Minister Mohammed Saoud al-Salhaf accused the United States of "practicing a policy of injustice and aggression against Iraq and the Iraqi people."

Ms. deLaski said the episode began when a U.S. Air Force F-4G "Wild Weasel" electronic warfare plane working with an Air Force F-16C spotted the launch of two Iraqi surface-to-air missiles at an air defense site near Mosul at 11:23 p.m. MDT Wednesday.

The F-16C dropped a cluster bomb on the site. About eight minutes later another F-16C and F-4G flew over the site, and the F-16C dropped a cluster bomb.

At that point two E-155 "Strike Eagle" ground-attack jets were called into the area and between 12:15 a.m. and 12:30 a.m. MDT they launched four laser-guided bombs at the target. The Pentagon said it could not immediately determine whether the F-15Es, which are based at Incirlik, Turkey, were launched specifically to strike the air defense site or whether they already were flying for other reasons.

Ms. deLaski said no further action against Iraqi forces was planned because the air defense site "has been effectively neutralized."

Asked why the two F-15E strike planes were called in after the F-16Cs had already bombed the site, the spokeswoman said, "The feeling was there was still a threat." She declined to elaborate.

The commissioners say they budgeted \$500,000 from the reserve fund to help soften the tax levy increase last year.

Study: Valdez repair fund spends little on recovery

WASHINGTON (AP) — The trust fund set up to repair Alaska's coastline after the Exxon-Valdez oil spill has spent the lion's share of its money so far on administrative costs, legal and travel expenses, and reimbursement of the government and Exxon Corp., an Associated Press review has found.

The \$202 million disbursed, only \$45-million has gone to new environmental restoration projects, according to a review of documents from the federal-state trustee council that manages the fund.

The AP review of documents from the trustee committee shows that about \$1 of every \$3 spent went to administration. Overall \$760,000 was allocated for travel expenses associated with the cleanup project.

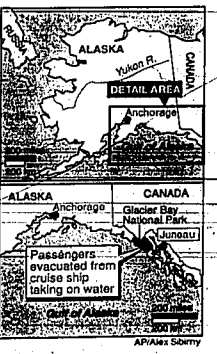

WASHINGTON (AP) — A 300-year drought drove people out of northern cities in Mesopotamia, the "cradle of civilization" — in what is now Iraq and Syria, and may have led to the downfall 4,000 years ago of the first great empire in history, researchers say.

There was an excellent climate, said Weiss, with wet winters, dry summers and a long growing season. "It was the grain belt," he said. "These are people who cultivated wheat and barley. They had donkeys and probably horses. This is during the early bronze age."

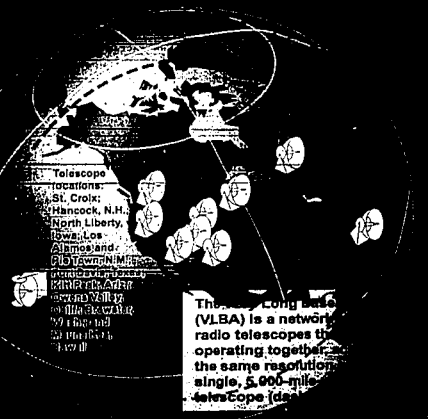

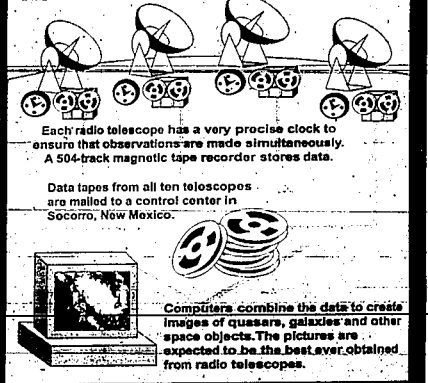
Telescope may help unravel astronomical mysteries

Planet-sized telescope

Radio telescopes use dish antennas to collect radio waves much as optical telescopes use mirrors to collect light waves. Since radio waves are much longer in wavelength than visible light, radio telescopes must be much bigger to achieve useful resolution.



How VLBA works



ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — The world's biggest astronomical instrument, a 5,000-mile-wide radio telescope, is being dedicated today.

Scientists hope it will unravel mysteries from the edge of the universe to the Earth's surface.

The instrument, stretching from the Virgin Islands to Hawaii, actually is a series of 10 computer-steered antennas, each 240 tons, 82 feet wide and nearly 100 feet tall when pointed straight up.

"It's a very versatile instrument designed primarily for astronomy," said Joan Wrobel, a National Radio Astronomy Observatory staff astronomer.

The Very Long Baseline Array radio telescope also can be used for precise measurements of the movement of Earth's crust to help study earthquakes. And it can be used for accurate measurements of variations of the Earth's rotation to improve time keeping, navigation and spacecraft tracking.

It can record high-resolution images of celestial bodies emitting electromagnetic radiation in wavelengths ranging from about 1 meter, to 7 millimeters, billions of light-years away. A light-year is the distance light travels in one year — about 5.9 trillion miles.

The far-flung objects can be powerful sources of energy beaming from the center of galaxies and quasars.

Construction of the VLBA began in 1985 and has cost \$160 million. The dishes are at St. Croix, Virgin Islands; Hancock, N.H.; North Liberty, Iowa; Los Alamos and Pie Town, N.M.; Fort Davis, Texas; Kitt Peak, Ariz.; Owens Valley, Calif.; Brewster, Wash.; and atop Maun Kea, Hawaii.

The antennas are pointed at an object by computers via land lines from the observatory on the campus of New Mexico Tech in Socorro, about 80 miles south of Albuquerque.

The first two dishes first produced a correlated signal in March 1989. All 10 dishes went on line in May.

With all 10 operating, the VLBA has up to 1,000 times more resolution than any other radio telescope, including the 19-mile-wide Very Large Array, whose 27 dishes sit 50 miles west of Socorro on the Plains of San Agustin.

Analogy: the human eye can see a car wheel a mile away; the VLA can read the writing on a dime a mile away; the VLBA can read a newspaper in Los Angeles from Washington, D.C.

The 10 VLBA sites gather and record signals from space. Tapes are mailed to Socorro — to keep costs down — and these computers produce images the eye would see if it could see radio wavelengths.

The VLBA has "the ability to make movies of objects that are extremely far away, like quasar cores. Something at the edge of the observable universe," said Craig Walker, Wrobel's husband and an astronomer at the observatory.

Other telescopes can take only snapshots of large distant objects, he said in a telephone interview.

"With the VLBA, we can see things on the order of a light-year in size at the edge of the universe. Things of that size can change in time scales of months and years, which is a reasonable time to do a study," he said.

The VLBA also can be used, in conjunction with optical telescopes, to directly measure the direct distance

of objects — one of the most difficult and important aspects of astronomy, he said.

Many images from the VLBA will be from objects believed to be at the edge of the universe — as far back in time as can be seen.

Because light takes a long time to travel from its source to Earth, light traveling 10 billion years shows conditions of 10 billion years ago. And that would be close to the beginning of the universe, thought to be some 12 billion to 15 billion years ago.

The VLBA already has detected something rarely seen in a distant object.

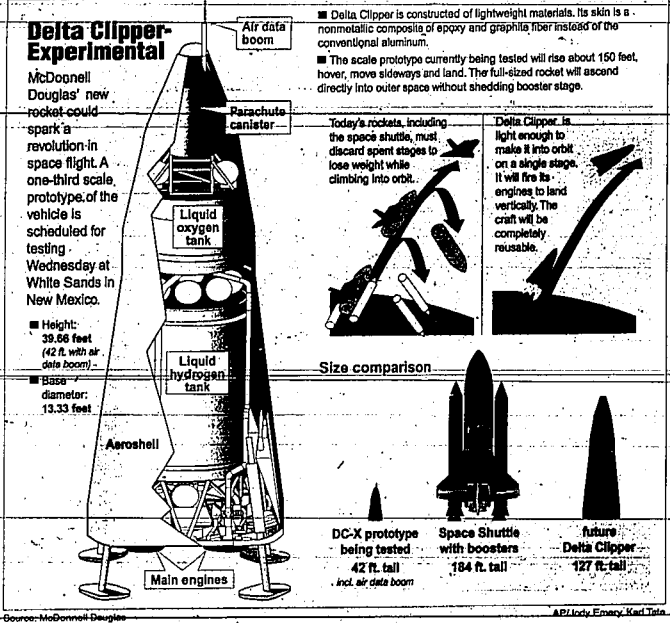
Wrobel, using four VLBA antennas and a VLA antenna in Connecticut

1991, detected a galaxy 300 million light years from Earth spewing out a bizarre, warped, jet of fast-moving radio-emitting particles from the galaxy core. The jet bends through nearly 90 degrees.

"VLBA images like this help astronomers understand jets, active galactic nuclei and the black holes they may harbor," she said.

Miller Goss, VLBA director of operations, said the VLBA has been used to make hundreds of observations, even though it is only being used part time while technicians debug the device.

He said he hopes it will be up to full-time use next year — 24 hours a day, taking only Christmas and New Year's Day off.



Rocket backers seek cheaper alternative

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N.M. (AP) — An experimental, one-piece rocket made a short maiden flight, then settled back onto a landing pad — the first time a rocket ever landed upright on Earth.

The Delta Clipper-Experimental rocket, 150 feet up on Wednesday, flew about 350 feet to one side, then touched down nose up, on its landing pad.

Space shuttles land horizontally, like airplanes, and other rockets have splashed down in water.

The 42-foot-tall, bullet-shaped DC-X is a one-third scale prototype of McDonnell Douglas' proposed Delta Clipper. The rocket would be light enough to reach orbit and return without using expensive lower stages or boosters that fall away after launch and are not retrievable.

McDonnell Douglas estimates launching a full-size Delta Clipper would cost \$10 million per flight.

NASA estimates each space shuttle flight costs \$409 million, based on eight flights per year. The Delta Clipper wouldn't be able to carry as heavy a payload, but backers hope its simplicity will make it more reliable and economical than current launch vehicles.

Smoking causes deadly leukemia

ATLANTA (AP) — Smokers have a 50 percent greater risk of contracting a deadly form of adult leukemia, according to government research that identifies the strongest link yet between cigarettes and leukemia.

Tobacco smoke causes 22 percent of all cases of myeloid leukemia, making it the leading known cause of the disease, the study by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention scientists found.

"A lot of people are worried about exposure to radiation and electromagnetic fields, which are linked to leukemia," the scientist, Dr. Michael Siegel, said Thursday. "But it's clear that smoking is much more deadly."

"It's yet another cancer-related to a known carcinogen, which is tobacco smoke," said Dr. Clark Heath of the American Cancer Society.

Leukemia is a cancer of the blood cells. The cancer society expects 26,700 new cases in American adults this year. About 12,000 of those will be myeloid leukemia, which is often fatal. Doctors don't know everything that causes myeloid leukemia, although the chemical benzene, radiation and certain viruses are known to cause some cases.

Also, his analysis of 15 smoking-and-cancer studies found that smoking caused more of that cancer than did all other known risks combined.

"Because myeloid leukemia is so often fatal, if we could eliminate smoking, we could eliminate 20 percent of adult leukemia deaths," he said.

There is biological evidence to back up his findings: Tobacco smoke contains high levels of cancer-causing, radioactive and radioactive polonium, all of which are carcinogens.

Smokers have high levels of radioactive lead in their bones, which is where the blood cells that leukemia attacks are produced.

Smoking suppresses the immune system, preventing it from fighting cancer cells.

Senator spits seed winning 32 feet

OWATONNA, Minn. (AP) — Sen. Paul Wellstone has a new title: watermelon seed-spitting champion of the Steere County Free Fair.

The Minnesota Democrat won the contest Wednesday, launching the seed into a flight of 32 feet, 2 inches. He easily outdistanced six other contestants.

Asked how he accomplished the feat, Wellstone said he "got very serious about it," turned his back on the other contestants in order to concentrate, took several steps back from the firing line, then dashed to the line as he let the seed fly, giving it extra momentum.

He said he has no plans to use his talent in Washington.

Coaches say maturity will make Nussmeier even better player

University of Idaho quarterback-Doug Nussmeier starts the 1993 Big Sky Conference football season as the most talked about player in the league.

The 6-foot-4, 210-pound senior from Lake Oswego, Ore., beat out two-time first team All-Big Sky Conference quarterback Jamie Martin of Weber State for the all-league's spot last year. Nussmeier also was voted the Big Sky's Most Valuable Offensive Player.

He has ranked in the top five in the country, in total offense in each of the last two seasons. If he continues his pace, he will end his career as the all-time leader in NCAA I-AA passing efficiency.

And there is reason to believe Nussmeier could be better this season.

"He's more relaxed. He's really grown up and matured," said Idaho offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach Scott Linehan, a former Vandal standout at quarterback. "He doesn't let a mistake haunt him for the whole game. He would be so hard on himself. He doesn't worry about making mistakes. He just goes out and makes the plays."

Nussmeier's job could be a little tougher this season because the Vandals return only 10 starters, the fewest in the Big Sky.

"He's had a lot of help the last couple years," Linehan said. "Now Doug's looking over his shoulder, and he's not seeing those guys any more. Now he has to look in the mirror and say, 'I'm the guy.'"

The key players in giving Nussmeier protection are senior center Matt Groshong (6-2, 270) and four-year starter Jody Schung (6-4, 265) at weakside tackle. Linehan tabs Groshong as one of the league's best and calls him the strongest of the Vandals.

Junior Jay Lukes (6-4, 271) can play either guard position.

The other spots on the line are open for competition. Among the players battling for field time are Steven Zerk (6-5, 290) and Richard Zerk (6-6, 285), both freshmen transfers from Santa Clara.

Paul Burke received an another year of eligibility from the NCAA and returns at tight end.

The Vandals are cautious about their wide receivers.

"This is the first year I can remember when we didn't have an established receiver coming back," Linehan said.

Senior Alan Allen caught only 14 passes last season for Idaho, but averaged 20 yards per reception after missing the first three games of the campaign.

Sophomore Dwight McKinnis should be the other wideout.

"Dwight is an exciting player," Linehan said. "He doesn't always go to the right place. He's real young. He makes young mistakes."

Junior college transfer D'mitri Baptist and redshirt freshman Kimiko Bandy are the leading candidates at the inside slot receiver position.

Braising Sheridan May (6-1, 210) and quicker Lavoni Kidd (5-7, 170) give Idaho variety with its single running back offense.

"Sheridan is one of those guys we feel we can give the ball to 30 times a game and he'll stay out there the whole game," Linehan said.

"Lavoni is hard to see. He gives us a change on offense."

Senior kicker Mike Hollis needs more consistency to keep the Idaho staff happy. The punting chores will go to sophomore Erich

Unusual system gives Pate tourney lead

CASTLE ROCK, Colo. — Steve Pate put on the kind of late burst possible only under the peculiar scoring system in use this week and took the first-round lead Thursday in The International tournament.

"It's a little misleading," Pate said of a late rush that moved him to the top of the leaderboard over a five-hole stretch. "It's not as dramatic as it looks."

It served the purpose, however. Beginning on the 13th hole at the Castle Pines Golf Club, Pate went birdie-putt-birdie-putt-birdie-putt.

That took him from 3 points to a leading 14 under the modified Stableford scoring system under which a player receives 5 points for an eagle, 2 for birdie, zero for par, minus-1 for bogey and minus-3 for double bogey and higher.

"It is a system that has worked well for Pate in the past. He is a two-time runner in this event and the leading point scorer in tournament history."

"This course and Torrey Pines (in La Jolla, Calif., where he has won twice), I always seem to get a good result on those two courses no matter how I'm playing," Pate said.

He could offer no realistic explanation for his mastery of this Rocky Mountain layout.

"Maybe the high altitude kills my brain cells and I can't get in my own way," Pate deadpanned.

Pate, who had a medal score of 66, held a 1-point lead over Mark O'Meara and defending champion Brad Faxon, who took different erratic routes in scoring 13 points.

Faxon had to rally from a first-hole double bogey and O'Meara holed out three times from off greens.

John Adams, who has yet to win in a 16-season PGA Tour career, and rookie Skip Kendall were next with 12 points, followed at 11 by Greg Norman, the playoff loser in the PGA Championship last weekend, and Jeffy Phil Mickelson.

Pate had been in a deep slump since the Harbourtown tournament the week following the Masters.

"Just then, I should have stayed home," he said. "I'm still played awful."

But it all came together in the late burst that took him from 10 points behind to one in front. It began with a 20-footer on the 13th. On the 15th, he rolled in a putt from more than twice that distance, then hit a 7-iron to 3 feet for birdie on the 20th yard, par-3 16th.

At the mile-high altitude, Pate needed only a 5-iron second shot from 198 yards on the par-5 17th. He put it 10 feet from the flag and made the putt for the 5 points that put him in front.

O'Meara and Faxon both indicated their strong-play was at least partially caused by having the pressure of attempting to make the Ryder Cup team behind them. Both failed to make the 1993 team but were finalists after the PGA. O'Meara finished 13th on the points list from which 10 men were chosen. Faxon finished 20th but had a chance until the qualifying period closed last week.

"Frankly, it's a relief to get the Ryder Cup over with," Faxon said. "I'd been thinking about it all year long."

O'Meara said it had been in his thoughts, too.

"The last two months have been a struggle," he said. "My physiology maybe has adjusted. Mentally, I was a little better. I wasn't confident. I wasn't thinking positively."

There was a marked improvement in this round, however.

"I hit more good shots than I have in a long time. I had a little more confidence," he said. "He also got some breaks." "It was definitely my day." O'Meara said after a medal score of 66. Included was a 45-foot sand shot for a birdie, a 40-foot chip-in for birdie, and a 12-foot chip-in for par.

"That doesn't happen once in six months," O'Meara said.

Faxon, on the other hand, got away to a start that may be unmatched as the worst in the history of this tournament.

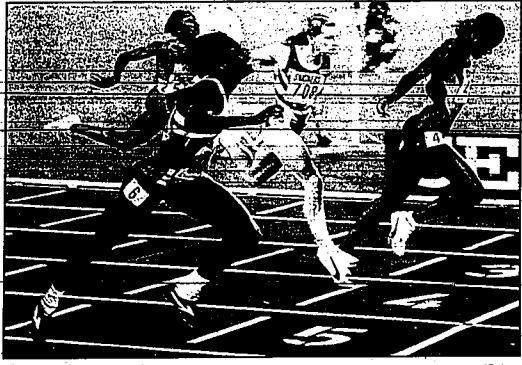

Gunnell, 27, of Britain, shattered the record by a remarkable two-tenths of a second with a time of 52.74 seconds at the World Championships Thursday night, edging Sandra Farmer-Patrik, who also went under the previous mark at 52.79.

Ottey, 33, of Jamaica, the winner of eight individual bronze medals and two silvers in Olympic or World Championship competition since 1980, including a devastating second-place finish to Gail Devers in the 100 Monday night, outran Gwen Torrence in winning the 200 in 21.98.

The sizzling victories by Gunnell and Ottey overshadowed Sergei Bubka's fourth straight world pole vault title and near-miss at a world record, Kevin Young's second straight world title in the men's 400-meter hurdles and Dan O'Brien's struggle to lead the decathlon.

"It was a dream come true," Gunnell said after her record of 52.94 set by Marina Stepanova of Russia in 1986 and becoming the first British woman to break a world record in six years.

"I knew the race would be fast. I just wanted to win. The world record came as a bonus. To come out and run that fast is wonderful."

At first, Gunnell was uncertain she had won after dueling brilliantly with the pacesetter Farmer-Patrik. Then she saw the scoreboard at Gottlieb-Daheim Stadium and jumped.

"At the start of the race I was having a hard time trying to concentrate," said Gunnell, who also was concerned about a cold that had forced her to take penicillin the past two days. "The crowd was so overwhelming, I couldn't be sure that I was the one who had won in the end."

Bowe, Holyfield set heavyweight championship rematch

NEW YORK — Friendship only goes so far, it appears, about the opening bell to a boxing match for Evander Holyfield, but I can't let him whup me," world heavyweight champion Riddick Bowe said. "I'm not going to let him beat me just because he's my friend."

On Thursday, Bowe's promoter, Rocky Newman, and Holyfield's promoter, Dan Duva, formally announced their heavyweight championship rematch on Nov. 6 at Caesars Palace in Las Vegas.

Bowe won the undisputed title from Holyfield last Nov. 13 with a 12-round decision, but it was later stripped of the WBC. Bowe still holds the IBF and WBA versions.

"I'm just thankful for the chance to fight

for the heavyweight title again," said Holyfield, at 30 four years older than Bowe.

The announcement was held at a well-known Harlem soul-food restaurant called Sylvia, and both fighters were mobbed by on-lookers as they arrived in their limousines.

Holyfield will be paid about \$10 million with Bowe expected to get just slightly more. The fight will be televised by TVKO on pay-per-view.

"We could have made fights that were easier and worth more money," Newman said. "We felt from the very beginning this would be the toughest fight we could possibly make, and because it's Evander Holyfield, he also commands more money."

The 10th round of their first meeting is considered by many boxing experts to be among the best the sport has ever offered.

Bowe dominated the early part of the round, Holyfield came storming back in the middle minute, and the two boxers traded one-to-one in the final minute.

"In the first fight, I was very careless," Holyfield said. "I started to run into a lot of shots. He's a bigger man than I am, and yet he threw more punches in the fight than I did. I think that shows you that I was trying to hit a home run while he was fighting."

"This time, I will have to do what I have to do to win, and that means I can't go toe-to-toe with him. I will box him," Holyfield said.

Bowe said he "was confused and discombobulated" Holyfield in the first fight, "and you ain't seen nothing yet. This is going to be hell for Evander Holyfield. This is Round 13. He used to have something I wanted. Now I've got it and he ain't gonna get it back."

Bowe said he weighs about 265 now but will come into the fight at around 230-235.

"I know I'm a little bigger, but I know what I've got to do," Bowe said. "You know what Evander once told me. He said he could hit me with his eyes closed. You know what I'm going to do? I'm going to close his eyes for him and let him try."

Bowe has a professional record of 34-0 with 29 knockouts. He has defended the title twice, knocking out Michael Dokes in the first round last Feb. 6 and dispatching Jesse Ferguson in the second round last May 22.

Holyfield is 29-1 with 22 knockouts, his only loss to Bowe. He fought only once since losing the title, winning a lackluster decision over Alex Stewart in June.

Title in jeopardy for O'Brien

Germany's Meier only 4 points behind leader

STUTTGART, Germany (AP) — Before the decathlon, Dan O'Brien said he felt both breaking the 9,000-point barrier and earning the title as "the world's greatest athlete" was possible.

O'Brien, a former University of Idaho athlete, can forget about the world record at these World Championships. And the title could be in jeopardy, too.

Germany's Paul Meier, backed by a home crowd of some 52,000 at Gorb-Dauner Stadium, is only four points behind going into the last five events Friday in the grueling two-day competition.

O'Brien, the defending champion and world-record holder at 8,891 points, won the 400 meters Thursday night to lead Meier 4,598 to 4,594 points.

O'Brien got off to a strong start, sharing the best time in the 100-meter (10:57 seconds) and winning the long jump (26 feet, 2 1/2 inches; on his first attempt).

"I was most pleased with my long jump today," he said. "It was good to get out of the competition and save my strength."

But he couldn't keep it up in the next event, the shot put. He finished fifth, 50-6 1/2, his worst performance in 2 1/2 years.

"The shot put was the biggest disappointment today," O'Brien said. "I didn't lose a lot of points there, but it hurt my ego. I should have been second, maybe first, in that competition."

Meier then cleared 7-0 1/2 in the high jump to pull ahead of O'Brien by nine points. O'Brien, bothered by a strained groin, cleared just 6-8.

In the 400 meters, O'Brien finished in 47.48 seconds, with Meier second in 47.53.

O'Brien, who failed to qualify for the Olympics last year after missing his opening height at the U.S. trials, knows Meier is close. But he isn't worried.

"I know that I have a much better discus and a much better pole vault," he said. "I just need to concentrate on my strengths and just get focused for the things I need to do tomorrow."

"If I win I will be very pleased. If I don't, then just competing here is a great thrill for me."

Said Mike Keller, O'Brien's coach: "Based on the conditioning that O'Brien is in, based on his groin injury and the meet itself, I'm happy. Especially with the 400. We told him

not to come home with a 49."

Keller is confident O'Brien will have a strong final day.

"We're in good shape," he said. "We've got a lot of points tomorrow. We've better have some points, too. We're ready to score in the 8,700 points."

Two top cogitators, Michael Smith of Canada and Olympic champion Robert Zmelik of the Czech Republic, dropped out.

Smith fouled on all three of his long jump attempts; Zmelik reinjured his right ankle.

Christian Schenk of Germany is third with 4,425 points and Christian Pliazat of France is fourth with 4,398. Steve Fritz and Rob Muzzio, the two other Americans, are sixth and 11th.

Bonds strikes back at Bucs

Giant slams 2 homers, 4 RBIs in 9-6 victory

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Call them a couple of blasts from the past.

So far this season, the Pittsburgh Pirates had mostly escaped the bashing of Barry Bonds, you know, those wicked 400-foot ropes and scintillating line drives that are Barry Bonds' calling card in most National League cities.

Maybe it was a show of sympathy for the team whose uniform he wore for seven years, but until Wednesday night Bonds had exercised the Pirates from his hit list. Then he sent them a couple of long-distance reminders of what they're missing.

Bonds was batting just .138 against his old team — almost sounds like his NL playoff stats, right? — until he went 4-for-5 with two long home runs and four RBIs in a 9-6 Giants' victory. He appeared to do as much damage to the Pirates' psyche as he did to their pitchers' earned run averages.

"Did he do some damage to us? I'd say so," Pirates manager Jim Leyland said. "I'd say that's accurate, that is the best player in baseball we're talking about."

As winning pitcher Trevor Wilson said, it wasn't just an MVP-caliber night, it was a potential Hall of Fame's night.

"To me, 90 percent of this team and what it's done this year are because of him," Wilson said.

And what he's done for the Giants, for their confidence, for their state of mind, for their statistics, is perhaps even as enormous as his \$43.75 million contract. A year ago, they were 57-63 after 120 games; now they're 80-40. By contrast, the 1992 Pirates with Bonds were 69-52 after 121 games; now they're 57-64.

"You watch him play and you wonder how he can make the game so easy," teammate Mark Carreon said.

Don't think the Pirates miss Bonds?

Consider this: He has as many homers in just his five two-homer games as the Pirates' team home-run leaders, Carlos Garcia and Al Martin, who have 10 apiece.

"What's funny is that Bonds has taken most of the season to feel at home again in his old home ballpark. Until Wednesday, he had gone hitless in his last 12 at-bats in Three Rivers. He was 0-for-3 Thursday, but the Giants still won 6-3 to lead two of three in the series. Bonds finished 6-for-24 (.250) in his old ballpark for the season.

"I had to stop being so calm, so mellow, so neutral here," he said. "Usually, I had to stay calm because I'm too fired up. That was my biggest problem. I had to get back to the way I normally play the game. You want to be able to stop and say hello to the Pirates, but I'm with the other side now. I'm a Giant now."

Bonds said he still thinks often of Pittsburgh, the city he called home for seven years, and Leyland, his only manager in the majors until he signed with the Giants. Maybe he thought about them too much.

Bubka becomes 1st athlete to earn 4 track titles, misses world record

STUTTGART, Germany (AP) — Sergei Bubka made track and field history on Thursday, then blasted referees for ruining his attempt at a world record.



Sergei Bubka of the Ukraine won the pole vault gold medal Thursday in Stuttgart, Germany, with a vault of six meters.

Bubka cleared 19 feet, 8 1/2 inches to win the pole vault and become the first athlete to win four titles in the world track and field championships. He first won in 1983 at age 19. He has now won the pole vault in all four editions of the championships.

The Ukrainian star failed in three attempts to raise his world record of 20-1 1/4 by 1/4 of an inch and blamed referees for ruining his attempt at a world record.

"It's a big scandal, they killed my motivation," Bubka fumed after receiving his gold medal. "I have to teach them the rules at World Championships? This is crazy."

The basis of Bubka's argument was that the judges only gave him two minutes to prepare for the record attempt. Since he was the only vaulter left in the competition, Bubka should have been given six minutes for each attempt.

"I was ready for the world record. I wanted to set the world record. It was my biggest dream to set a world record and win a big title, because I've never set a world record at the Olympic Games," Bubka said. "I was close to this dream but they killed my motivation."

Bubka has set 16 outdoor and 18

indoor world records.

Grigory Yegorov of Kazakhstan took the silver at 19-4 1/4, his personal best, but failed to become the third man in history to clear 6 meters, or 19-8 1/4. Apart from Bubka, only Rodion Gataulin had cleared 6 meters, but he

failed to make the Russian team.

Maksim Tarasov of Russia and teammate Igor Taranenko shared the bronze at 19-0 1/2. Tarasov, the Olympic champion, said it was a very strong competition, and jokingly called it the "Soviet championship."

All four medalists came from former Soviet republics.

Bubka cleared his opening height of 18-8 1/4 in his first attempt, and then cleared 19-1/2 on the first try.

When he cleared 6 meters on his first try, the world record certainly seemed within his grasp.

But then came the argument with the referees.

"First they were not ready with the bar for a long time, then they gave me only two minutes," Bubka said.

Bubka argued for several minutes, waving his arms indignantly. The referee told Bubka he had stepped over his time limit and had only two minutes left. Bubka called for the technical delegate, Artur Takac, who told the judges that Bubka was right.

He got his six minutes in the end but in the first two attempts wasn't close. On the third, he went over the bar, only to bring it down with his chest.

"I was ready for the world record. Anyone who knows something about pole vaulting must have seen it from when I jumped 6 meters," he said. "It was a big mistake on their part and it was very difficult to continue jumping after that."

Former Phillies player ready to return to the majors; believes he has a chance

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — Baseball people refer to a brief trip to the major leagues as a cup-of-coffee. Glenn Wilson's most recent call-up amounted to a sip — and it left a bad taste in his mouth.

"Being called up and getting sent back after only 14 at-bats, that didn't sit well," Wilson said. "When you get released like I got released, I don't care who it is, you're going to be bitter if you're not the guy they want."

Wilson wasn't the guy the Pittsburgh Pirates wanted, at least not this season. He was the guy they wanted in 1988, when they traded Darnell Coles to the Seattle Mariners to get him.

But that was five seasons ago, when Wilson was coming off four solid seasons with the Philadelphia Phillies, including a 102-RBI, All-Star campaign in 1986.

Now, Wilson is playing with the Class AAA Buffalo Bisons, trying for one final fling in the major leagues after a nearly two-year retirement.

He has the endorsement of his manager, former Cleveland Indians skipper Doc Edwards, who thinks Wilson has shown this season that he can still play.

"He's hit around 300 all year. He's got 12 home runs and a lot of key hits," Edwards said. "Obviously, I think a lot of him because about three weeks ago I made him the team captain."

Most important to Wilson, he has passed his own test.

"I'm big-time encouraged," he said. "That's the thing that drives me. I feel in my mind I can compete with anybody in this room. If I didn't feel that way, I'd just right out of here."

It's taken a good year in Buffalo to erase the memory of his retirement in 1991 after signing as a free agent with the Atlanta Braves. The Braves made

Wilson last spring training cut, then offered him a job with their top farm team, the Richmond Braves.

"After nine straight seasons in the majors, I wasn't mentally prepared to go to Class AAA baseball," he said. "It was like a shock to your system."

Wilson said he was so miserable after six weeks with Richmond that he called them up and said, "That's it, I'm out of here, and I'm going home."

"I didn't even bother to look for a job the next spring," he said. "I figured if I couldn't get a job now, what would change events to where I could get a job. I just figured my career was over at 31."

Baseball had made Wilson enough money to buy three gas stations near his residence in Conroe, Texas, and he settled into his post-athletic life — sort of.

"I realized what it's like being on the outside," he said. "I think what you miss most of all is the pride factor of people saying, 'There goes Glenn Wilson, a guy who played for nine years and did this and did that.' You don't hear those things when you pump gas every day."

Chet Montgomery, Pittsburgh's director of minor league operations,

called Wilson last September and offered him a chance to come to camp with the Pirates. "I didn't miss the game, but I didn't even hesitate to say I do want to play," he said.

Wilson said he got to camp in the best shape of his career but, still, he was assigned to Buffalo.

He realizes he's not in the Pirates' plans, but feels his hitting — he's batting .285 with 12 homers in 47 at-bats in 56 games — should earn him a shot somewhere else in the majors next year.

"I think somebody will give me a shot," he said. "They'll have to look at my numbers."

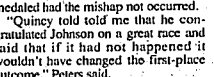
"If I was getting to be 37, I'd say, 'No way. Right now, there's a little window there. But if it ends at the end of the year, it ends.'"

A lesser incentive to return to the majors was provided when Milwaukee broke into his home earlier this summer and stole all the memories Wilson had of his career, including balloons, milestone hits, his 100th outfield assist and his only grand slam homer.

"I need two home runs for 100 for my career up there. That would be a nice ball," he said. "I need two hits for 1,100 hits. That would be a nice ball."

Watts slips to 4th when he loses Nike sole

STUTTGART, Germany (AP) — Olympic champion Quincy Watts lost a possible medal when he lost the sole of his shoe during the men's 400-meter final in the world track and field championships. Nike may have lost, too.

Will Nike, which sponsors Watts and is a world-wide market leader, lose money and prestige because of the mishap? Will Nike's competitors take advantage of the bad publicity?

"I guess the way I'd like to look at it is that some people like to laugh at others' misfortunes and others don't," Nike's Tom Harte said Thursday. "I don't know. I don't want to speculate about what they (the competition) might do."

Harte, Nike's marketing manager for running, will bring back the shoe to the firm's Beaverton, Ore., headquarters after the World Championships end Sunday.

Tom Smith, Watts' coach, said, "Since it happened, Quincy hasn't said a bad thing even though he's disappointed as anybody."

Watts' shoe came apart at the 200-meter mark of the one-lap race, relegating him to fourth in Tuesday night's final.

Michael Johnson won the final in 43.65 seconds, the fastest time in the year and third-fastest in history, leading the United States to a 1-2 finish.

Watts, 23, of Calabasas, Calif., finished in 45.05 behind Kenya's Samson Kitur, missing the bronze medal by 49 seconds.

Keith Peters, a Nike spokesman, said Watts told him that he could have

Criteria for national parks a gem for protecting U.S. assets

Oops. We think we might have caught someone in the Clinton administration doing something right.

George Frampton - widely perceived as an environmental extremist who has infiltrated the highest levels of the Interior Department - suggested recently that Congress be given a rubric on how to designate new national parks.

The idea might bring an answer to the question we've often asked over the years: Do the lava wastelands at Craters of the Moon National Monument really qualify as a potential national park?

Frampton, former president of The Wilderness Society, is the new assistant secretary in charge of the National Park Service and the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Too often, Frampton notes, lawmakers have persuaded their colleagues in Congress to give the folks at home a national park - not because some natural or historic gem is in danger of being lost, but because a lawmaker wants to have a place for pretty photo opportunities before news cameras in his home district.

"It is a totally ad hoc, arbitrary, political process. ... We don't have a set of criteria. There is no standard. There is no benchmark," Frampton says.

The result is that special interest groups and members of Congress scramble for preferential treatment of their pet projects, sometimes with little regard for the sites' true historical, cul-

tural or natural value.

(In Idaho, business boosters in Minidoka and Cassia counties have long lobbied for making Craters a national park. Skeptics have suggested that what they really want is a highway across the desert, with an exit ramp at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. Such a highway might result if Craters becomes a national park, and it might let the Magic Valley tap into the flow of federal money to the eastern Idaho nuclear site.)

Pet projects aside, there's another problem with how parks are designated: Lawmakers are unwilling to vote for new taxes to pay for the new parks. Thus, money is taken from the upkeep of older parks to pay for the new ones.

The proposed criteria for new parks could be established in the same way a special commission has worked to set standards for the protection of Civil War battlefields, Frampton has said.

The criteria would presumably downplay such peripheral issues as how much money local developers might make off a new park and would instead focus on the historic and natural value of the proposed park's assets. The criteria could also help determine whether a national park would offer those assets the best possible protection.

Frampton's idea is drawing support on Capitol Hill.

We hope Idaho's lawmakers are listening.

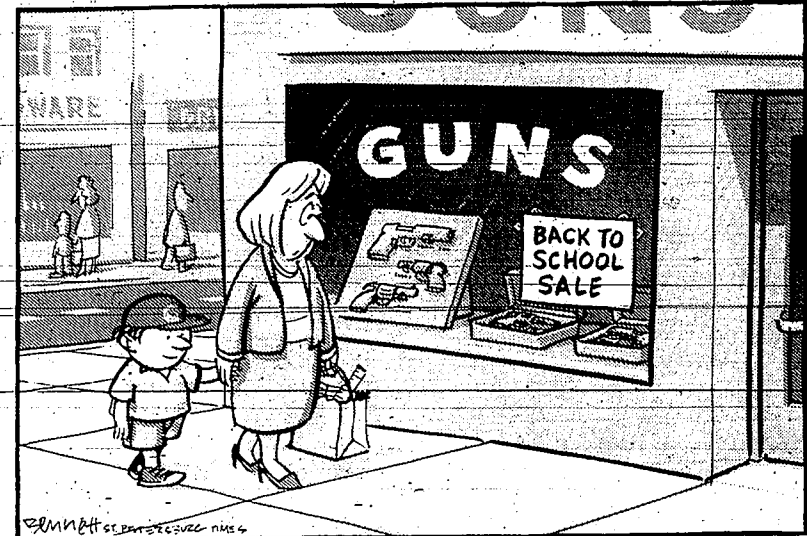

Media close eyes to pope's diagnosis of American ills

For more than three decades, the press and entertainment media have served as a type of priesthood for the cult of youth. From Woodstock to the Pepsi generation, everything young has been promoted as preferable to anything middle aged or old.

The young were interviewed, analyzed and elevated in the public mind, while those of more mature years were told to step aside in favor of the views and values of people who had not yet found a cure for acne, much less the world's problems.

So when more than 170,000 young people came from 70 nations to Denver to meet and listen to Pope John Paul II, what did the media do?

Did they report stories on the new counter-culture - that is, young people searching for the eternal values so many of their parents' generation abandoned in droves? No, the media focused on "controversy and conflict" within the Catholic Church over abortion, homosexuality and the ordination of women priests. It was the latest in a lengthening list of examples of how journalists close their eyes to anything not of this world.

Once, some of this could have been ascribed to ignorance. Now it must be identified for what it is: prejudice. The final frontier of bigotry is directed against people who believe in and order their lives according to God's Word and His will. After more than two decades of religious and political activism in which Christians have been prominent, the press has no excuse for ignoring, stereo-

typing and mislabeling believers as "the flock" and "pilgrims."

The pope's messages ought to have prompted debate about the meaning of life and America's spiritual atrophy, but the press seems ill-equipped to cover such important topics. Reporters and editors prefer the comfort of controversy and opinion polls. Thus saith CNN - Gallup - USA. Today has far more resonance for most journalists than "thus saith the Lord."

The pope correctly diagnosed America's problem after the victory over Soviet communism. It is moral exhaustion and an inability to distinguish right from wrong. "All the great causes that are yours today will have meaning only to the extent that you guarantee the right to life and protect the human person," said the pope in a now-veiled reference to America's 30 million abortions in the past 20 years.

Paraphrasing the Old Testament prophet Isaiah, the pope said, "Let us pause and reason together," adding, "To educate without a value system based on truth is to abandon young people to moral confusion, personal insecurity and easy manipulation. No country, not even the most powerful, can endure if it de-

prives its own children of this essential good."

Now there was a statement worthy of discussion and comment - but the press mostly ignored it.

So much of the press seems to think that the Church is, or ought to be, a democracy. That attitude recalls a line from pastor Charles Stanley of First Baptist Church in Atlanta: "We have moved from a period in which little Samuel said, 'Speak, Lord, for thy servant heareth,' to one in which we now say, 'Listen, Lord, for thy servant speak.'"

The pope's message was for American youth to consider the moral mess of the world and then reconsider the principles of Scripture, the life of Christ and the teachings of the Church that they might not walk down the same alley and be morally mugged.

But this profound message did not impress the majority when you consider that the Christ of whom the pope spoke changed the world by starting with only 12.

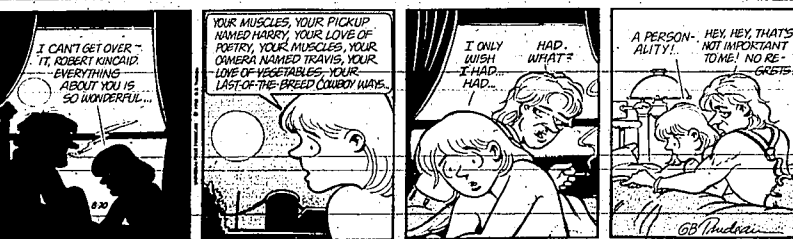

Captain of Soviet sub recounts 1961 tragedy

MURMANSK, Russia (AP) — When the reactor of a Soviet nuclear submarine suddenly went haywire in 1961, Capt. Nikolai Zateyev sent 22 volunteers to their deaths in a heroic struggle to save the ship.

They saved their sub, and the reactor did not explode. But the radiation made its nightmare voyage with men dying in agony and begging their shipmates to kill them.

For years Russians knew the story of Zateyev's submarine only through underground songs. Now he is 67, retired, and ready at last to talk about those sad, romantic verses.

Zateyev's ship was the first Soviet atomic submarine armed with nuclear warheads. She was named the K-19 but among sailors became known as "Hiroshima."

Before the breakup of the Soviet Union, the K-19's fate was a closely-guarded secret. Western specialists heard rumors but no details until 1991, when Pravda finally confirmed that radiation had killed many of the sub's crew.

Ordinary Russians still know little about the tragedy, Zateyev said Thursday, as a TV documentary was filmed two years ago, but officials deemed it "too upsetting" to be shown.

The stocky, dignified captain and other survivors recounted their story to The Associated Press in interviews this month in Moscow and the northern port of Murmansk.

The K-19 was a major technological advance for the Soviets, and engineers were so eager to launch the sub that they installed no back-up cooling system.

During the ship's construction, a welder allowed solder to drip onto a pipe carrying coolant to the reactor. The pipe cracked microscopically, like a hot glass dropped into cold water.

On June 4, 1961, the K-19 was heading in the North Atlantic from Soviet diesel subs during a training exercise. The cracked pipe burst.

Water poured from the reactor room, seared to at least 140 degrees. The gauge went no higher. Radiation also was rising, but the crew could only

guess how much. The reactor had to be cooled. "It would have been Chernobyl. Only 30 years earlier," said crew member Alexander Fateyev, now 56, an official with the Russian Ministry of Energy and himself a retired captain. He said the ship was carrying three nuclear warheads and would have poisoned the sea with radiation if the reactor had burst. "Zateyev organized three-man brigades of volunteers to work five to 10 minutes each. Protected only by raincoats and gas masks, they were

ordered to weld a new cooling system. Among the first volunteers was Lt. Boris Korchilov, 20, a blue-eyed ladies' man. "I accompanied him to the reactor room door — to his death," Zateyev recalled. "And I said: 'Well, Boris, do you know where you're going?' "And he said: 'I know, Comrade Captain.' " "Well, go with God," I said." Five minutes later, Korchilov stumbled out of the reactor room, tore off his gas mask and vomited. "That was the first time I felt: 'Yes, this is radi-

ation,'" Zateyev said. Of the 139-man crew, 22 died of radiation poisoning — eight within a matter of days, the rest within two years.

"Right on the spot their appearances began changing. Skin not protected by their clothes began to redden, face and hands began to swell. Dots of blood began to appear on their foreheads, under their hair. Within two hours we couldn't recognize them," Zateyev said.

"People died fully conscious, in terrible pain. They couldn't speak, but they could whisper. They begged us to kill them."

But the work brigades succeeded, and the reactor did not explode. A Soviet diesel sub answered Zateyev's SOS.

The K-19 was towed to Russia's northern Kola Peninsula. Korchilov and five other sailors were rushed to Moscow. Seven days later, Korchilov was the first of them to die; within 10 days, all six were dead. Doctors told Zateyev they had received three times the lethal dose of radiation.

Others survived grueling hospital treatments. Zateyev lay in bed for 18 months; doctors replaced both his bone marrow and blood.

Because the corpses were radioactive, the six were buried secretly in a Moscow cemetery. The location of the fraternal grave was unknown to families and friends until a K-19 crew member came across it at his brother-in-law's funeral.

A government commission declared Zateyev a hero and decorated his crew. But they have received no financial support, only "valuable gifts," Zateyev said, adding with irony: "You know, watches."

They were ordered not to discuss what had happened, and their medical histories were falsified. Doctors wrote that they had "damage to the peripheral nervous system."

"Only a year or so ago did our doctors give us papers saying we suffered from radiation exposure," Zateyev said. "That was the system: hide everything. People suffered, died, and there was no reaction."

Russia sells final state-owned properties

MOSCOW (AP) — The last of 73,000 state properties being sold as part of a plan to shift Russia to a free-market economy should be in private hands by the end of 1994, a government official said Thursday.

About 350 billion rubles, the equivalent of \$355 million, has changed hands and 150 billion shares of stock have been distributed so far, said Fikryat Tabayev, chairman of the Russian Federal Property Fund, a privatization agency.

Most Russians have been investing with special vouchers issued to every citizen.

The vouchers, which have a face value of 10,000 rubles, or about \$10, are used at auctions to buy shares in former state companies.

But there are only 50 million vouchers left — not enough to purchase all the shares now available. And the government has not come with a good system for handling cash sales, Tabayev said.

Russian vice president won't quit

MOSCOW (AP) — Russia's attorney general Thursday denied allegations that he plotted the murder of a corruption investigator and said he would not resign.

In a nationally televised news conference Wednesday, a commission investigating high-level corruption leveled the allegations against Prosecutor General Valentin Stepankov and said he should step down.

It said it has a recording of Stepankov planning the murder of a commission member who was too "curious" about Vice President Alexander Rutskoi's activities.

The commission also accused Rutskoi of having a suspicious Swiss bank account padded with "large sums of state money from certain companies" in Russia.

Rutskoi denied the accusation on Thursday and said he would go to court to defend his "honor and dignity." Under Russian law, he could be impeached if the 13-member Constitutional Court finds he has broken the law and the Congress of People's Deputies then votes to remove him from office.

Both Rutskoi and Stepankov have aligned themselves with hard-line opponents of President Boris Yeltsin. The commission insists its investigation was not politically motivated.

The panel said it has a recording of Stepankov talking on the telephone with a Russian businessman in Canada about getting rid of Andrei Makarov, a prominent defense attorney.

The businessman, Dmitry Yakubovsky, told a news conference in Toronto Wednesday that Stepankov asked him to arrange Makarov's assassination. He said he refused and warned Makarov.

Makarov said Yakubovsky taped the conversation, then turned over the tape. The ITAR-Tass news agency published a transcript Thursday from a copy of the tape provided by Makarov.

At one point, Yakubovsky suggests, referring to Makarov: "Maybe it is necessary, so to say, to remove this irritant?" Yakubovsky later adds that the plump attorney "is a very sick and weak person."

Stepankov: "Well, maybe he should get treated."

Yakubovsky: "Well, maybe, it is necessary to help this person get treatment?"

Stepankov: "Well, I don't know... if you believe so and you have opportunities there, well, you think it over."

Russian newspapers have reported that Yakubovsky, a lawyer who once worked with Stepankov in the Moscow city prosecutor's office, has been involved in secret business deals, possibly including arms sales.

According to Yakubovsky, Stepankov wanted Makarov killed because the lawyer had found documents in Zurich suggesting the vice president was involved in corruption.

Stepankov said the conversation was a recording. Several newspapers on Thursday accused the panel of playing politics.

Prime minister, president split over providing asylum for sheik

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Sheik Omar Abdel-Rahman is talking about heading his hit-cell-in-upstate New York for asylum in Afghanistan. The only trouble is Afghanistan isn't sure it wants the radical Muslim cleric.

The country's fundamentalist prime minister, Gulbuddin Hekmatyar, called Abdel-Rahman a "leader of the Islamic nation" and said he was welcome in Afghanistan.

But Hekmatyar's arch-rival, President Burhanuddin Rabbani,

opposes asylum for the sheik. An offer of asylum could doom the nation's attempts to get desperately needed money from countries menaced by the sheik or other Muslim fundamentalists.

American lawyers for Abdel-Rahman said Wednesday they were discussing his possible deportation to Afghanistan with federal authorities, who have held the sheik in Otisville, N.Y., since last month.

On Thursday, Abdul Jabbar Naeemi,

political consul officer at the Afghan Embassy in Islamabad, told The Associated Press that "the president and foreign minister have already rejected the idea of his coming to Afghanistan."

Letting the sheik into Afghanistan would not be in the country's interests, he said, but refused to elaborate.

"Afghanistan's bankrupt government needs huge infusions of cash from other countries. For the past year, Afghan leaders have been going to Muslim and Western capitals trying to drum up donations."

"The West has been close-fisted with aid because of the factional fighting that has killed more than 10,000 people.

But Egypt, Algeria, Tunisia and other Arab countries cite security concerns for their reluctance to give money to Afghanistan. Thousands of Arabs have returned to their home nations from the Afghan front and joined militant Islamic groups.

If the sheik is deported from the United States to Afghanistan, his presence there is unlikely to loosen those purse strings.

Abdel-Rahman is considered an undesirable in the United States and several Arab countries for his advocacy of the violent overthrow of secular governments in the cause of Islam.

Several of his followers have been implicated in the World Trade Center bombing in New York and a plot to

bomb other New York buildings. Some had fought in Afghanistan.

In his native Egypt, his followers in the outlawed Islamic Group are believed to be behind numerous deadly attacks on security forces, Coptic Christians and Western tourists. Egypt accused them Wednesday of laying the bomb that wounded Interior Minister Hassan el-Ali, who has vowed an all-out attack on militants seeking to install an Iranian-style Islamic theocracy.

The Islamic Group claims Afghan war veterans as members, and many group members say they received their training in explosives and small-arms fire from the Afghans.

According to several Afghan sources, most of the estimated 10,000

Arabs who joined the war against the Communists belonged to either Hekmatyar's Hezb-e-Islami group or the fundamentalist Ittihad-Islami.

Pakistan, which shares a border with Afghanistan and supported the rebel war against communism, also is concerned about the sheik's presence in the region, said a foreign ministry official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

In March, Pakistan launched a crackdown on Arabs living illegally in the country; many of them veterans of the Afghan war. Hundreds of people were detained in the sweep, and about 60 people were deported. Thousands more reportedly fled the country, many to Afghanistan.

Americans survive Somali mine blast

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) — Somali guerrillas ambushed a U.S. military truck Thursday, but four American soldiers inside survived a remote-controlled mine blast and fought off a gun attack.

U.N. military spokesman Maj. David Stockwell said the soldiers received minor cuts from flying glass when their truck was lifted into the air by the mine explosion, but were able to return fire and drive their vehicle to safety. The Americans were not identified.

He said there were no Somali casualties.

The soldiers were approaching a logistics base in southern Mogadishu in a light truck when the explosion occurred, Stockwell said. "We're not sure what kind of device it was," Stockwell said. "We believe it was command detonated."

The explosion broke a six-day

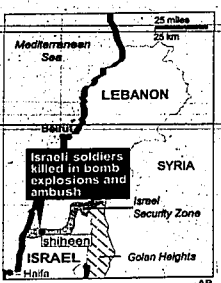
lull in which there had been few significant attacks on U.N. forces in southern Mogadishu. The previous week had seen almost daily mortar, U.N. posts, although no casualties were reported.

It also was the second time in two weeks that a U.S. army vehicle was hit by a remotely detonated mine. Four American soldiers died on Aug. 8 when their Humvee all-purpose vehicle was torn apart by a bigger explosion.

"We hold the Aidiid faction responsible for the Aug. 8 explosion and for today's," Stockwell said, referring to renegade warlord Gen. Mohamed Farah Aidiid. Aidiid also is held responsible by the United Nations for the June 5 grenade and small arms attacks on U.N. posts. He has ordered his arrest and put a \$25,000 reward on his head.

Muslim guerrillas kill 8 Israelis in attack

SHIHEEN, Lebanon (AP) — In a replay of the events touching off last month's Lebanon bloodshed, Muslim guerrillas killed at least eight Israeli soldiers Thursday in their deadliest strikes in five years and Israel retaliated with air raids. Seven soldiers were killed and two wounded in an ambush shortly after dawn in Israel's self-declared "security zone" in southern Lebanon. Another Israeli soldier was killed and one was wounded in the second bombing after sundown, security sources said.



A similar scenario in late July escalated into Israel's biggest offensive in Lebanon since its 1982 invasion. The weeklong air and artillery attack averaged the slaying of seven soldiers, claimed 147 lives in Lebanon and destroyed hundreds of homes.

The latest violence also raised tensions less than two weeks before month's peace talks are to resume in Washington on Aug. 31. Thursday's attacks were claimed by Hezbollah, or Party of God, a fundamentalist Shiite group backed by Iran that has sought to sabotage the U.S.-sponsored peace talks.

Hezbollah said in a statement in Beirut that two of its guerrillas were killed. The security sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, had no immediate word on casualties or damage from the air raids.

Flames and black smoke rose from targets, including Hezbollah's al-Fajr radio station, the security sources said.

The Israeli planes also hit two Hezbollah strongholds near Baalbek's Sheik Abdullah army barracks and another in Taibeh, five miles southwest of Baalbek.

The Israeli military said the warplanes hit "terrorist targets of the Hezbollah organization in southern Lebanon." Hezbollah said two of its guerrillas were killed in the raids.

Islamic Resistance, the military wing of Hezbollah, said in a statement in Beirut that the soldiers were attacked to mark the 24th anniversary of an arson attack on Jerusalem's al-Aqsa Mosque, Islam's third-holiest shrine.

The assaults matched the worst death toll for Israeli soldiers since Israel carved out its occupied zone in southern Lebanon in 1985 to protect Israel's northern settlements

from guerrilla infiltrations. A 1988 suicide-car-bombing killed eight Israeli soldiers.

The attack began with three bomb explosions that hit a 15-member Israeli army foot patrol in the western sector of the security zone, security sources said.

Israelis who survived the bombings were then raked by machine-gun fire and rocket-propelled grenades in an ambush near the village of Shiheen, 2 1/2 miles north of the Israeli border, the sources said.

After sunset, two roadside bombs were detonated by remote-control near an Israeli patrol at a ravine about 800 yards from the scene of the earlier explosion. One soldier was killed, sources said.

In Oslo, Norway, Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres said, "It is a big tragedy. We have done our best to calm the situation in South Lebanon and this news is most alarming."

If Hezbollah launches rockets into northern Israel, as it did last month, Israel could respond with air and ground forces, an Israeli official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Muslims set conditions for peace agreement

GENEVA (AP) — Bosnia's Muslim President Alija Izetbegovic set conditions Thursday, including an immediate end to the Serb siege of Sarajevo, for any peace agreement with the Serbs.

The demands appeared to be an attempt by the Muslims to salvage whatever they can before a peace settlement that is certain to be at their expense. The Muslims control 10 percent of Bosnia, while the Serbs have 70 percent.

International mediators were trying to break a deadlock on how to divide Bosnia between the three warring factions — the last major stumbling block to an accord. They said they hoped to reach an accord in the next few days.

The presidents of Serbia and Croatia, the main powerbrokers in Bosnia, arrived Thursday to help the

mediators bring about an agreement.

But Izetbegovic said he did not think an accord could be reached quickly and set several conditions for Muslim approval.

He demanded that Croats lift the siege of the southern city of Mostar, that Serbs and Croats give up their claims on the regions where Muslims were a majority before the war, that Serb forces withdraw completely from Mount Igman and Bjelasnica outside Sarajevo; and the United Nations secure safe passage for humanitarian convoys throughout Bosnia.

Izetbegovic boycotted the talks for two weeks because Bosnian Serbs had taken the two strategic mountains overlooking Sarajevo. He rejoined after most Serbs left, but complains that more than 100 Serbs are still on Mount Igman.

Kimberly limits kindergarteners

KIMBERLY — Rapid enrollment growth means several kindergarteners who live outside Kimberly School District boundaries won't learn their ABCs here, a school official says.

Faced with growth generated by a local housing boom, the School Board voted in the spring to restrict kindergarten enrollment. Principal Wes Remaley said.

Their decision said only

kindergarteners living within the district can enroll once the school's four kindergarten classes reach student-teacher ratios of 17-to-1, he said.

As of Thursday, 81 local kindergarten students had registered, surpassing the board-established limit, Remaley said.

Kimberly School District Superintendent John Garner said parents of 10 children who live outside Kimberly had asked to enroll their children in Kimberly this fall.

Remaley sent letters to several parents Thursday telling

them that they cannot enroll their children in Kimberly, which reopens class next Thursday, Remaley said.

In some cases, however, the district may try to accommodate families of kindergarteners whose siblings are already attending Kimberly schools, Garner said.

"We try not to break up families," he said.

The district is also reducing the number of out-of-district students at transitional years, by not permitting some of them to advance to Kimberly Middle

School or to Kimberly High School, Garner said.

Those students with poor attendance or bad behavior living outside district boundaries will not remain in the district, he said. This fall only a few students are affected, he said.

Last school year, 85 students, or 7 percent of the district's 1,160 students, did not live within district boundaries, Garner said.

Most of the out-of-district students come from Hansen, he said.

They attend in Kimberly for

various reasons: Some say Kimberly schools offer a broader range of classes, others seek convenience because kids go to babysitters before or after school in Kimberly, Garner said.

Population growth has fueled the need for the new restrictions, he said.

The Kimberly City Council has issued more than 50 building permits for new homes this year, he said.

Another subdivision near Dierkes Lake could bring another 50 new homes within district boundaries.

Lightning strike at Billy's Hole starts fire

TWIN FALLS — Lightning has sparked a fire in Billy's Hole in the South Hills, the U.S. Forest Service reports.

The fire was spotted Thursday afternoon, but may have been a holdover from the night before, Sawtooth National Forest spokesman Ed Waldapfel said.

The one-acre fire is burning in aspen and dead standing and fallen trees about 10 miles west of Oakley and six miles north of Bostetter campground.

About 27 people were battling the fire, including the Sawtooth Hotshots, a helicopter crew and a two-person fire engine crew.

Twin Falls County to pay 4.48% interest on landfill bond

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls County will pay about 4.48 percent interest to borrow \$4 million to build a landfill.

The county commissioners opened bids on the bonds Thursday morning and awarded the bond sale to Seattle North-West Securities of Portland, Ore. The firm's bid came in at 4.479 percent.

Seven institutions offered bids on the bonds and the county's financial adviser, Jim Wrigley of First Security Bank in Boise, said the number of bidders reflects well of the county's financial rating.

The county has an "A" rating, which Wrigley called excellent. Only Boise, with a "AA" rating ranks higher in Idaho, but Twin Falls probably will attain that rating soon, Wrigley said.

Wrigley said the bonds probably will sell within days. Anyone who wants to buy some of the bonds should contact their stock broker soon, he said. Those who buy the bonds will not pay state or federal taxes on their earnings.

The county will use the \$4 million to build a landfill on Hub Butte south of Twin Falls.

Police investigate report of teen molesting 7-year-old girl

TWIN FALLS — City police are investigating a Twin Falls woman's report that her 7-year-old daughter was sexually molested by a 13-year-old boy.

The woman called police Wednesday night and said the incident occurred Monday, according to police records. Detective Chuck Dudley said Thursday he would not comment on the case until his investigation is complete.

Woman injured in June 7 accident remains in coma

TWIN FALLS — A young Twin Falls woman critically wounded in a June 7 accident remains in "a very deep coma" at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, her mother said Thursday.

Amy J. Stukenholtz, 22, was injured when her car struck a pickup one mile south of the intersection of U.S. Highways 93 and 30.

"She's not doing well," Joyce Stukenholtz said. "It's hard on the family to wait and see what's going to happen."

Stukenholtz' two children, ages 1 and 2½, are living with her parents.

The meeting starts at 4:30 in the upstairs conference room in City Hall, 321 2nd Ave. East. The meeting is open to the public.

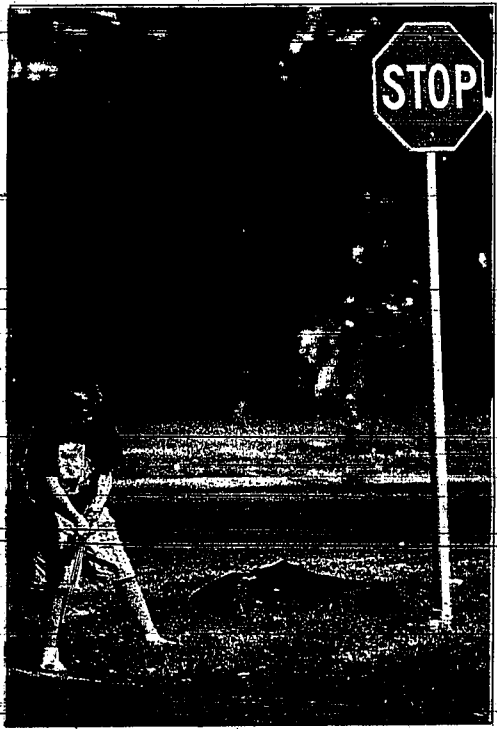

Twin Falls schools seek \$400,000 Sept. 8

TWIN FALLS — The School Board voted Thursday night to hold a \$400,000 levy election that would restore to the 1993-1994 budget an array of programs, textbooks and supplies that have been cut.

The election will be held from noon until 8 p.m. on Sept. 8 — the day after school begins — at each of the district's six elementary schools.

The levy, which needs a simple majority to pass, does not include the 3 percent salary increases or the three new teaching positions that were part of a failed June 22 levy.

The latest levy would cost Twin Falls residents \$47 in taxes a year for every \$100,000 of property.

Overall, however, the same person with \$100,000 in property would pay \$17 less in taxes supporting the school district than they paid last year if the levy passes. If the levy fails, their taxes linked to schools will decrease \$64 a year.

The levy would return to the budget such programs as school-crossing guards — \$16,000 and school nursing for \$22,000.

It includes \$15,000 more for supplies and textbooks than was earlier thought necessary because dozens of kids have recently moved into newly completed housing and apartment projects in town this summer, Superintendent Terrell Donich said.

He said if the levy passes, the board would not likely need to pass an emergency levy as allowed when districts experience growth in enrollment, unless enrollment jumps by 200 or 300 students.

If the levy fails, multiple factors would be weighed in deciding whether the board passes an emergency levy, including how many new students enroll in the district, Board Chairman Steve Truman said.

Boards can pass emergency levies on their own without an election.

Other items included in the levy are: \$26,000 for teacher's aides; \$18,000 for extra curricular salaries; \$20,850 for a junior high in-school suspension program; \$27,500 for a librarian; \$20,000 for a counseling service for teachers; \$21,000 for a resource officer; \$17,000 for a custodian; \$5,000 for a drug-prevention program; \$60,290 for supplies and materials; and \$60,000 for textbooks.

Local school districts bail out of funding suit

TWIN FALLS — Several Magic Valley school districts are having second thoughts about participating in the funding lawsuit against the state.

Only four districts — Jerome, Blaine County, Minidoka County and Richfield — are still fully involved in the suit.

Nine area districts have, at one time or another, been parties in the suit, which is aimed at forcing the Legislature to spend more money on public schools.

The status of one district, Valley, is unclear, Valley Superintendent Arlyn

Bodily says the district is still officially a party to the suit but isn't actively participating in it.

But according to a list provided by Robert Huntley, the Boise attorney representing a group of smaller districts, Valley no longer is involved in the suit.

Since an Idaho Supreme Court decision in March, the focus of the lawsuit has changed. Equity — the way the state divides money between large and small districts — is no longer an issue. Thoroughness, or whether the state spends enough money to guarantee students a constitutionally mandated "thorough" education, is.

Work stall forces Jerome to seek extra class space

JEROME — Sixth-grade students will be attending classes not in a school but in a church this year — at a cost to the district of \$600 per month.

The Central Elementary students were left without classrooms when construction of the district's new Horizon Elementary School couldn't be completed in time for fall classes.

"It looks like we'll be able to open the new school after the Christmas break," Superintendent Jim Cobble said.

The church is "in close proximity to the school library, lunch room and other school activities, so it was the best choice," Cobble said.

Students will be assigned to the classes at the church to be taught by Jean Kriwix and Connie Klans at the time they register.

Registration will be held at Central Elementary Wednesday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Classes start Thursday.

Kindergarten and Jerome Early Education Program classes will be held at the National Guard Armory until Horizon School opens, Cobble said.

Spud harvest works around landslide

BLISS — Unfortunately for potato farmer Dick Elliott, not all roads lead to his farm on the south side of the Snake River.

When a July 24 landslide wiped out a portion of old U.S. 30, severing the main artery between Bliss and the Bliss Bridge across the Snake River, Elliott was one of several farmers faced with finding alternate ways to deliver crops to market.

Elliott began digging his crop of early potatoes Tuesday.

Elliott, who contracts with Ore-Ida to deliver his potatoes to its processing plant in Butley, said he expects to incur higher costs as truck drivers are forced to travel greater distances.

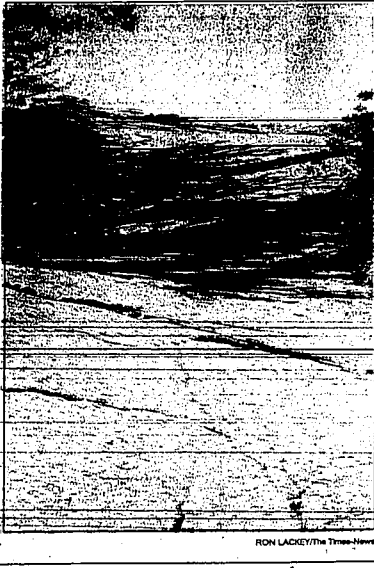
And drivers are more likely to get lost as they drive a maze of desert roads to his farm, Elliott said.

"They have to go through Hagerman, to get down here and up across Bell Road, there are 15 different roads they can take and only one of them leads to here," Elliott said.

Elliott is not the only farmer adversely affected by the landslide. As many as two dozen growers may have suffered some sort of inconvenience at the hands of Mother Nature.

LaVerne Schroeder, who lives near Bliss but farms on the south side of the river, said the missing road has caused more than a few headaches.

"One of the big concerns is that it adds about a third to our costs doing what

Spence declares Weaver was no danger to society until cornered

White separatist Randy Weaver was "your typical little guy" who was never dangerous until he was forced into a corner at his Hartsdale cabin, defense attorney Jerry Spence says. Spence appeared Wednesday night on NBC's new television show "Now," with Tom Brokaw. "As long as he's free to have his views, we're free to have our views," the Hartsdale attorney said. "When he loses his rights, we've lost ours." Following a lengthy federal murder

trial in Boise and record-breaking jury deliberations, Weaver in July was found innocent of everything except for failure to show up in court on weapons charges. His friend, Kevin Harris was acquitted on all counts. That failure to appear launched the standoff and violent finale nearly one

year ago. Killed on Aug. 21 was Deputy U.S. Marshal William Degam and Weaver's 14-year-old son, Sam. The following day, Weaver's wife, Vicki, died from a federal sniper's bullet, while Weaver and Harris were wounded. Spence conceded Weaver was a white separatist, not supremacist. "He read the Bible, asked questions, wanted to kind of segregate himself from the rest of the world he saw as wrong, evil, full of dope-bad things." "See that hole right there," Spence

pointed them at anyone. "They always came out with their weapons, so the rules of engagement were really a death warrant," he said. "Well they didn't tell us the rules. They just started shooting." Harris said, Weaver added he did not surrender immediately after the death of his wife because of the belief snipers would kill him, too. "Do you want to give your federal agents the leeway that when they kill citizens, that things just went wrong?" Spence asked. "We have a mother dead and a little

boy dead and things just went wrong?" Spence did not comment whether Weaver would retaliate in court over the deaths of his family. He did speculate the federal government was looking at its own botched operations. "They're investigating why the FBI didn't get a conviction. They're investigating why the FBI muffed it. They're investigating why the United States attorneys didn't do their jobs as they should do their jobs. What they're not investigating is the murders of innocent people," he said.

Nampa can't charge students for classes
NAMPBA — Enabling students to explore and stretch their potential is key to middle level education in Nampa. But the two Nampa junior-high schools can't charge students fees for participating. Principals at South and West junior high learned last week they could not charge fees for "exploratory classes" — classes aimed at reinforcing basics through hands-on experiences. West Interim Principal Bob Gearheart said the schools can't charge the fees because Idaho law prohibits fees for classes that are not optional.

Gynecologist appeals license revocation
REXBURG — A former Rexburg gynecologist is appealing a state Board of Medicine decision to revoke his medical license over allegations including a complaint that he drugged and sexually abused a patient. A complaint filed with the Board of Medicine last November alleged Brent Woodfield, 46, mistreated 12 patients between December 1991 and June 1992. In one instance, the complaint states Woodfield "improperly provided medications to the patient and engaged in sexual conduct." The board decided on July 16 to revoke Woodfield's license after a hearing in June. Woodfield practiced in Rexburg from October 1991 until leaving the area sometime in 1992. He previously practiced in Oregon for at least two years beginning in 1986, according to the Oregon Board of Medical Examiners.

Canyon County sheriff's deputies resign
CALDWELL — Three Canyon County sheriff's deputies have resigned, claiming they were harassed after a hearing officer ruled they were not fairly considered for promotion. Canyon County Sheriff George Nourse said in a brief statement issued Thursday that he could not comment because of county personnel rules. But Nourse took a shot at Nampa attorney and former Canyon County Prosecutor Richard Harris, who is representing the deputies. "I would think that with Mr. Harris' familiarity with the county rules that he would know better than to release information concerning personnel matters," the sheriff said. Detectives Russell Terrell, 45, and Bill Volker, 41, resigned Aug. 15. Dennis Black, 38, who was transferred to patrol after working as a detective, resigned Aug. 1.

BSU requests \$2.9 million to hire faculty
BOISE — Boise State University wants \$2.9 million more from the state next year to hire faculty, add classes and start two graduate programs. The additional teachers and classes form the core of its spending proposal for the 1994-95 school year. The blueprint is aimed at meeting the demands of growth, rather than expanding programs and degrees. "It does not reflect our entire needs, certainly. Resizing the fiscal condition of the state, we have tried to focus on the most critical needs," BSU Vice President Daryl Jones said Wednesday. "We wish to respond to the demand for new programs, but we're going to have to be extremely selective." BSU will take the request to the state Board of Education on Aug. 26. The \$62.5 million budget is a 12.7 percent increase over current funding.

Parents join others who have lost kids
TROY — Ed and Robyn Giovannetti of Troy have joined a club of sons with the parents of local teen-agers who have died in a string of traffic accidents. Preston Parks Giovannetti, 16, died July 17 of injuries after he was thrown from a car in which he was riding with four other friends. An emergency medical technician, Ed now wrestles with the bitter irony of being the one who found Preston at the accident scene and tried in vain to save him. Misdemeanor charges against John Victor Lewis, 21, of Troy were filed Wednesday for allegedly purchasing beer for the boys hours before the accident. Lewis was arraigned before Magistrate William C. Hamlett on five misdemeanor counts and released after posting a \$500 bond. Bryan Eberhardt, 21, was arrested late Wednesday night and charged with procuring beer for minors, Latah County Sheriff Joseph Overstreet confirmed.

Consultant sues agency for hazing
COEUR D'ALENE — A former consultant with the Idaho Industrial Commission — Sandpoint office — is suing the agency, saying he was subjected to illegal-type hazing and other mistreatment by fellow employees. Jeffrey Broney's allegations are similar to those contained in a class-action lawsuit filed by Sandpoint attorney Joseph Jarzabek last year. That suit was dismissed. Industrial Commission Chairman Gerald Geddes in May 1992 ordered a stop to "rookie shows," during which some of the alleged hazing took place. Broney, who now works at the Coeur d'Alene Convalescent Center, alleges employees treated him to carry out various "humiliating" acts as an initiation into the commission. He began working in the Sandpoint office Aug. 14, 1991.

700 apply for 300 positions at company
POST FALLS — A California furniture manufacturer opening a factory in Post Falls next summer received nearly 700 applications on the first day they were accepted for 300 production jobs. Harpers Inc. and state officials had braced for thousands of job seekers on Wednesday. "Harpers advertised for people to start work in a month. I think you'd see 10 times the applications," said Michael Bruch, placement supervisor for the Idaho Department of Employment in Coeur d'Alene. Harpers plans to hire up to 500 people by the time the plant relocates in July 1994 from Torrance, Calif., Idaho human resources manager Tim Moman said.

Group says landfill violates federal laws
COEUR D'ALENE — A watchdog group contends Kootenai County's newest landfill violates federal pollution laws, and it wants the Environmental Protection Agency to investigate. But the county's solid waste director said the request is misguided. The Coeur d'Alene Lake Environmental Awareness Network, in a letter Wednesday to the EPA's regional office in Seattle, accused county officials of breaking federal law by failing to obtain a certain permit for the Fighting Creek landfill.

Plaintiffs: Abortion funding shows bias

BOISE (AP) — The issue of whether the state should fund abortions for poor women who have nonfatal health problems is before a Boise judge. A class action suit filed last week in 4th District Court claims the state Department of Health and Welfare has a "discriminatory funding scheme" for Medicaid-financed abortions. The plaintiffs include Planned Parenthood Association of Idaho, two Boise abortion providers and two Idaho women. Health and Welfare only pays for abortions in cases where continuing a pregnancy would endanger the life of the mother. "We don't contend that the Idaho Constitution requires the state to fund abortions for poor women," said Ned Squires, an attorney for the plaintiffs. "By having chosen to fund pregnancy-related and other medically necessary health care, the state cannot constitutionally exclude abortions from the services provided." But Health and Welfare officials argue state and federal laws limit how Medicaid money can be spent on abortions.

"This lawsuit is trying to make the quantum leap that this is a fundamental right that requires the state to pay for it also," said Deputy Attorney General Mike DeAngelo. "The issue is really one of policy that the taxpayers of the state of Idaho have entrusted in their elected legislators who enacted the statute and appropriated the money for the department to use for the specific purposes they have authorized." The state's Medicaid budget is already strapped, DeAngelo added. Abortion foes say the plaintiffs are attempting only to "murder more children." "This is just another ploy on the part of abortionists to increase their profits. The discrimination does not take place in the funding of abortions," said Pat Benson, president of Right-to-Life of Idaho. "The discrimination takes place against the unborn, who have no voice very often." But Mary Kelley McColl, executive director of Planned Parenthood Association of Idaho, said the suit has nothing to do with those who perform abortions. The goal of the suit is to help women who cannot afford to end their pregnancy.

Blackfoot magistrate rules state police can't cite tribal members

BLACKFOOT (AP) — A Blackfoot magistrate has ruled that Idaho State Police cannot cite Shoshone-Bannock tribal members for traffic infractions on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation. Seventh District Magistrate Judge Charles Roos announced the decision Wednesday. Fort Hall Police Chief Don Davis said he was inevitable. "He ruled the only way he could because the federal law states that we have the authority," Davis said. Bingham County prosecutors said Thursday that they would appeal the ruling to 7th District Judge James Hemdon. "It's a significant issue and we need clarification as much as the tribal community needs clarification," State Police Col. Ronald Moore said. Portions of two interstate freeways and two U.S. highways pass through the Fort Hall reservation. The jurisdictional issue arose in February after tribal member Rosina George was cited by an Idaho State Police trooper on U.S. Highway 91, on the reservation in Bingham County, for failing to stop at a stop sign and failing to provide proof of insurance. George was stopped by again in April and cited for speeding, failing to show proof of insurance, obstructing an officer and resisting arrest. During a July court hearing before Roos, George's attorneys said traffic infractions were civil rather than criminal in nature and therefore not under state's jurisdiction. "They argued that state troopers could stop traffic offenders, but must call tribal officers to handle the

matter from there. State officers are allowed to cite for misdemeanor offenses, such as for drunken driving." In a written statement, Roos agreed that Idaho's traffic infraction laws are civil and regulatory in nature, not criminal. The judge based his decision on a precedent set by the U.S. Supreme Court in *Colville Indian Reservation* versus the state of Washington. The 1991 case also determined that traffic infractions were civil instead of criminal. All the charges against George were dismissed. "He couldn't go against the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruling," Davis said. Bingham County prosecutors unsuccessfully argued that the state assumed jurisdiction for patrolling the reservation 40 years ago and has been citing tribal members for traffic infractions ever since. Deputy Prosecutor Carter Mackley said prohibiting state police from stopping tribal members for minor traffic offenses limits officers' ability to enforce other laws on the reservation. He said while Wednesday's ruling applies only to Bingham County, the issue ultimately could determine jurisdictional policy covering all Indian reservations in the state. Mackley said state police officers will not try to cite tribal members for infractions until the issue is resolved. Moore said tribal members who provide proper identification will be released if stopped for traffic infractions such as speeding or running a stop sign.

Forest protesters appear in federal court

BOISE Idaho (AP) — Members of the environmental protest organization Earth First! identified themselves Thursday in an appearance before a federal judge in Boise on charges from an altercation earlier in the week with Forest Service and other federal officers. Seven women and 11 men were taken into custody near Dixie in

part of a protest that started in the summer of 1992 against logging a huge roadless area, Cove-Mallard. They face eight counts of entering the area after a judge ordered it closed, interfering with federal officers, intimidation and other charges. Most of them refused to identify themselves when arrested.

In Thursday's court appearance, "Jane Doe 1" told federal Magistrate Mikel Williams the women wanted to remain nameless as a gesture of their solidarity. But Williams advised them they couldn't be released from jail pending resolution of the charges unless they gave verifiable identities to assure they would return.

In a ritual performed in stores everywhere this time of year, Brian Gudelman, 20, strides from a dressing room to stand before his mother.

Stripes streak across his chest. Corduroy bags softly about his legs. Peggy Gudelman purses her lips, frowns, looks his hanging T-shirt and pants up and down.

"This is what you like?" she asks her younger son, Geoff, 17, watches. Parent vs. child. Child vs. parent. The wills are strong, the pocketbook mighty. At stake: One's reputation if the wrong school clothes are bought.

Brian nods amid the racks at the Nordstrom store. His mother shrugs in agreement, then explains her method.

"I've learned to stand back and follow them around," said Gudelman, 50, a teacher from Irvine, Calif. "But since I'm the person with the money, we decide if it's in reason."

This summer, as parents clothe their kids, back-to-school battles will fill store aisles. Each will use differing strategies in a war of the wills.

"The kids' strategy is how to manipulate more money out of mom and dad," said Linda Grossman, a Laguna Hills, Calif., clinical psychologist who counsels teen-agers.

"The parents' strategy," she said, "is (figuring out) how can they sit in the background, go along with the kids, but have some control" without being banned from the shopping trip.

This summer, U.S. kids will spend \$36 billion, much of which will be for back-to-school items, said James McNeal, a Texas A&M marketing professor who has studied the spending habits of children for 30 years.

In the past six years, McNeal has noticed a strong shift in spending power as parents hand over the decision-making to their children.

"Parents are providing kids with a lot more money as well as the opportunity to do the parents' spending. Much of this is done by parents who are very busy and don't like them to make their own decisions — as long as they're not too way out," said McNeal.

Who also wrote "Kids as Customers: A Handbook of Marketing to Children" (American Demographics Books).

Some parents loan their credit cards. Others give money for purchases here, purchases there. Still others, accompany their children

"I'll be spending more," said Emily, 16, who will be a junior at Glenns Ferry High School and who has yet to buy her winter wardrobe. "I'll spend around \$400."

Emily, who buys her all-own clothes with the money she earns, isn't alone. This week-end, next-price-tag turning is the favored leisure-time activity for the local 90210 set.

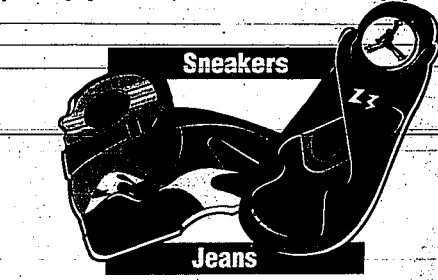

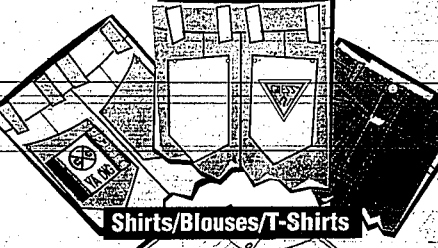

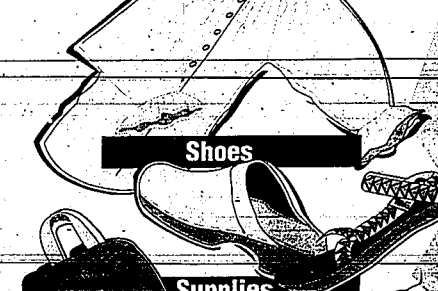

Forget The Cruise: Among valley teens, shopping is king

TWIN FALLS — Emily Warner of Glenns Ferry has been working hard at the drive-in all summer, and by the time she arrived at the Magic Valley Mall Thursday morning, she was ready for some power shopping.

B.U.M., Guess and Levi's, the gold, silver and bronze consolation prizes for going back to school, were already in her wardrobe, and she wasn't through yet.

"I'll be spending more," said Emily, 16, who will be a junior at Glenns Ferry High School and who has yet to buy her winter wardrobe. "I'll spend around \$400."

Emily, who buys her all-own clothes with the money she earns, isn't alone. This week-end, next-price-tag turning is the favored leisure-time activity for the local 90210 set.

"Back-to-school is very big for us," said Ron Lind, general manager of The Bon Marche. "It's not just the older kids until the last couple of weeks before they go back to school, but when they shop, they have money to spend."

What's the tab?

What you'll pay locally for brand-name young men's and women's clothes at department stores and specialty clothing stores (prices are averages compiled from an informal survey of stores, and don't include sale items):

- Shoes: With the exception of the fabric-topped Chuck Taylors, which sell for less than \$50, name-brand athletic shoes average \$70 or more; Doc Martins, about \$100.
- Jeans: Ranges from Levi's (about \$25) to Guess (\$70 or more).
- T-shirts: \$15 to \$25
- Flannel shirts: \$25 to \$55.

An informal survey of Twin Falls clothing stores this week showed that 5 and 30 percent of their retail sales come from back-to-school shopping, and business is good this summer.

"I think part of it is Costco (which opened

a store near the Magic Valley Mall in July)," Lind said. "It's taken us a step closer to being a regional trade center and it means that kids who used to spend their dollars in Boise are spending them here instead."

"They're buying denims and silks," said Michelle Brecht, manager of Vanity in the Magic Valley Mall. "And they're buying name-brands."

"Yeah, name-brands are big, this year and always," said Jonathan Miller, who works in the Ram Shop at Roper's in downtown Twin Falls. "That's what they come in looking for."

Thirteen-year-old Chadd Warner, who will be an eighth-grader at Buhl Middle School, was shopping for Nikes on Thursday, with financial reinforcements from his mother, Gayla.

But he expected to spend more than the \$50 she gave him for shoes.

"It's not hard at all to spend \$200 to \$250 on school wardrobe," Brecht said.

"Four hundred (dollars) wouldn't be unusual," said Cindy Requa, who manages Lerner Shops' outlet in the mall.

Cara Jensen, 16, who will be a junior at

Burley High School, expected to part with \$300 — just for starters.

"I'm spending more this year," she said. "My mom made a lot of my clothes last year."

Cara, who has two sisters, says her mother, Cindy, buys Cara's clothes — and that sometimes she pays her back.

She wears Wranglers and rides horses, and her tastes are eclectic.

"I get a mix of clothes" — whatever I feel like, — Cara said. "Whatever's on sale, that's quite the factor too."

"I see a lot of kids who are buying bits and pieces this year," Requa said. "We have quite a few lookers."

Grunge, the '60s-inspired, Seattle-grown look that is king of kids' fashion this fall, is selling well, but selectively, in Twin Falls this summer.

"This area tends to be a little more conservative in its tastes," Requa said.

"Grunge" favor T-shirts and shorts or jeans, accompanied by a pair of signature shoes — Doc Martins, for example. To that, they'll add a flannel shirt and a denim jacket.

Hispanic festival seeks to break down cultural walls

TWIN FALLS — Only 38 miles separate Twin Falls and Burley, but for Gloria Galan, the distance seemed farther.

Seven years ago, when she moved to Twin Falls, there were no dances, Spanish radio stations or television programs in her new home town. It was hard even to find the right ingredients for preparing Mexican food.

But instead of exchanging tamales for hot dogs, Galan organized a fiesta to celebrate the Hispanic culture. "I wanted to create a 'hey here' for us to be almost like home," she said.

Four years later, Galan's goal is not only to preserve Hispanics' sense of community in Twin Falls but to share the Hispanic cultural and artistic heritage with others.

Because of this, Un Dia en el Valle (A Day in the Valley) is a fiesta for everyone — not just Hispanics. It is sponsored by the Magic Valley Arts Council, the Hispanic Fiesta Committee and the Idaho Commission of the Arts.

"As time goes on we are being catered to, and it's nice," she said. "I feel we have a lot of things to offer, but we need to feel comfortable with each other and ultimately set aside their differences."

"It's one thing for kids to see something that's exciting, but to do something that makes them more accepting of each other," he said. "Everybody has a friend who's not of their culture... and that's who they often bring along (to the workshops)."

And dance workshops and performances do more than bring different people together, Sierra added. They

Sierra, who is on the board of directors at the Ballet Folklorico de Pocatello and leads many extracurricular dance workshops for kids, believes that dance makes people confront each other and ultimately set aside their differences.

"I'm trying to enhance and make more awareness of the multi-cultural aspect of our lives," he said. "Although Sierra grew up in Connecticut in a predominantly white neighborhood, he has been long committed to the crusade for tolerance."

"My roots go way back," he said. "In high school I was part of an exchange program between a middle-class anglo community in Connecticut with all-black middle-class community in Washington, D.C."

The program was a success until it was time for the black kids to move to Connecticut.

"When it reversed, people dropped out of the program. Reality struck. People thought, 'It was OK to have my kid live with a black family, but to have a black kid live with my family... My family alone had to take five kids,'" Sierra said.

The irony is that people share more than they are willing to admit, according to Sierra. To teach people to see similarities rather than differences, Sierra's group includes music

and all-black middle-class community in Washington, D.C. Sierra hopes to make people realize that the borders that separate nations and cultures are arbitrary and even temporary. By using a Spanish word like "patio" in his performance, he hopes that his audiences will consider the long-standing Hispanic influence upon North American culture.

"Patio is Spanish and we all know what it means," Sierra said. "How little we know of the words that we use."

That people don't pay attention to the nuances of language means that words are also potentially divisive, he added. Several years ago, for example, a Pocatello group wanted to hold a heritage frontier program. Its name, however, alienated Indians who don't consider themselves pioneers.

"Native Americans don't want to colonize pioneers and wagon trains coming across the frontier," Sierra explained.

Fortunately, a compromise was reached: "Frontier" was dropped from the name, making the program appealing to a wider range of people.

The challenge facing the Hispanic community in the United States is bridging the schism between "those who walked and those who flew," said Sierra. The first refers to Mexicans and the second to Central and South Americans.

"That's what I've been working on, getting them to work together," he said.

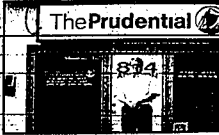

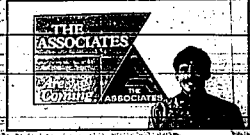

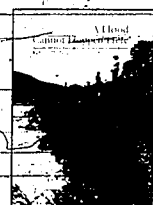

Burley author, historian details human drama of Oakley flood

BURLEY - Ten years ago next spring, the Magic Valley suffered a once-in-a-lifetime flood, the kind of natural disaster that lives in stories passed from the first generation to the second, only to dry up when newer calamities ensue.

There are really only two tangible monuments to the Great Flood. Year of 1984 - The first on the west end of the valley, is the bankruptcy of the Salmon River Canal Co., the result of a lawsuit that followed after the company spilled water down the channel of Salmon Falls Creek.

The other, on the east end, is a plaque in the Oakley City Park, mounted on a piece of local granite and already showing signs of weathering.

Kathleen Hedberg, a Burley freelance writer, didn't think that was enough.

So she wrote a book about it and published it herself.

"A Flood Cannot Happen Here" is culled from interviews with eleven Cassia County residents and outsiders who helped, in large ways and small, to keep the rising waters of Lower Goose Creek Reservoir out of the living rooms of Burley.

Hedberg, who holds a doctorate in history from Brigham Young University and has co-authored a high school world history textbook, started out to write down oral history, but it turned out to be something else.

"This book is different from the book I intended to write," she said. "I planned to write an adventure story, a true-life story of man against nature, an uncomplicated story about an event."

But the book is more than scrapbook history. It's also an engrossing account of small-town bickering, complacency and paralysis by analysis, and of how ordinary people do extraordinary things when the need arises.

Lower Goose Creek Reservoir - also known as Oakley Reservoir - was built in 1910 by a consortium headed by high-flying entrepreneurs William and James Kuhn, who had a big part in developing the western Magic Valley.

The Goose Creek drainage, was supposed to be a second Twin Falls Tract, but it never worked out that way. The four streams that flowed out of the mountains that ringed the valley were supposed to average 148,000 acre-feet a year; it turned out to be about half that.

The reservoir didn't fill, and the development project was a bust within years. Eventually, local farmers took it over from the investors, but the lesson was clear - Goose Creek was a high-desert valley.

There were wet winters and warm springs, to be sure, but Oakley worried about drought, not flood.

Gradually, the dry bed of Goose Creek below the dam was filled in and farmed, and in Burley, built over with houses, apartments, schools, cemetery and a shopping center, the reservoir's spillway, built for just such

a high-water contingency, was used just once.

So when the extraordinary winter of 1983-84 arrived, no one was willing to believe Oakley Reservoir would spill its banks, despite the warnings from the ranchers who lived in the high valleys and the hydrologists whose snowpack readings were increasingly alarming.

Not until mid-April did local officials grasp a disaster was imminent; happily, for those downstream, it arrived slowly. As the water crept toward the derelict spillway, Cassia County residents mounted a crash effort to build diversion canals to Murtaugh Lake and the Snake River that, just in time, saved millions of dollars in crops and many more times in property damage in Burley.

Hedberg describes an extraordinary effort that is a testament to both the sense of community in close-knit, heavily Mormon Cassia County and to the forbearance of their neighbors, including the Twin Falls Canal Co. that made construction of the diversion channel to Murtaugh Lake possible.

In most disasters, the biggest obstacle is the sense that it can't happen here. It did, and Hedberg had the wit and perseverance to make sure that no one in Cassia County will ever forget.

Capsule reviews

Capsule reviews of movies playing in the Twin Falls area. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and reviews are by the Los Angeles Times.

"Another Stakeout" (PG-13). Director John Badham and producer-writer Jim Kouf take another peek at crime, humor and buddyhood with the "Stakeout" team of Richard Dreyfuss and Emilio Estevez. Even with new snoop Rosie O'Donnell around, and a hilarious scene from surveillance target Dennis Farina, it suffers from the usual sequel blight. This mix of bang-bang and badinage isn't bad, but — with bullets flying and the comics sweating over their jokes — it sometimes suggests a super-powered night on the town where everyone is too psychoped up for Big Fun to really enjoy themselves. (Ace Theatre)

"The Firm" (R). As directed by veteran Sydney Pollack, the smoothly entertaining version of John Grisham's bestseller stars Tom Cruise and benefits from a script that has taken the book apart and put it back together in notably better shape. The story of a lawyer whose perfect job turns into inescapable nightmare. "The Firm" benefits greatly from an exceptional supporting cast, with everyone from Gene Hackman, Ed Harris and Wilford Brimley to Jeanne Tripplehorn and Holly Hunter giving on-target performances. (Twin Cinema)

"The Fugitive" (PG-13). Dr. Richard Kimble (Harrison Ford) never stops to catch his breath and neither would you if fearsome U.S. Marshall Sam Gerard (Tommy Lee Jones) was on your trail. A crisp and jolting melodrama that screws the tension pitilessly tight, director Andrew Davis' superadrenalized version of the old TV show about the innocent man simultaneously fleeing the law and trying to find his wife's murderer is one movie that more than delivers on expectations. And watch out for one hell of a train wreck. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

"Heart and Soul" (PG-13). A Big Time Cute movie from the "City Slickers" team (director Ron Underwood, co-writers — S.S. Wilson and Brent Maddock) about ecotoplastic chums, fate and finding the soul in or without you. With Robert Downey Jr. shining in the "All of Me" times-four role of a callous yuppie, surrounded by four spirits seeking the last-minute redemption. The rest of the cast — Alfre Woodard, Charles Grodin, Tom Sizemore, Kary Sedgwick and specially David Paymer — are ace too — though the movie's jokes aren't especially visual, its romance dubious, its heart is on its sleeve and its soul in its pocket. (Twin Cinema)

"Hot Shots! Part Deux" (PG-13). Charlie Sheen, Lloyd Bridges and Valeria Golino are back for more fun, generated by inspired director Jim Abrahams and his co-writer Pat Proft. This time they send up "Rambo" type movies, and as before, make us laugh as they skewer pompous machismo. With Richard Crenna, Brenda Bakke. (Grand-Vu Drive-in)

"In the Line of Fire" (R). Clint Eastwood stars as the one Secret Service agent you don't want to mess with in this crisply entertaining thriller very professionally directed by "Das

Boots" Wolfgang Petersen. And Eastwood is matched glower for glower by John Malkovich as the president-hating assassin who doesn't plan to miss his target. If you like the sound of this, you won't be disappointed. (Motor-Vu Drive-in)

"Jason Goes to Hell: The Final Friday" (R). The Friday-the-13th franchise, wearing thin after eight bloody rampages, tries to lease up our interest by touting this outing, produced by series originator Sean S. Cunningham and directed by Adam Marcus, as the last for your favorite hockey-masked maniac. — "Who cares if he or the series goes to Hell? There's a new vein here — the old "Who Goes There?" body-staining gimmick — but it would take massive transfusions to pump life back into this kill-a-ton. Only for incorrigibles. (Twin Cinema)

"Jurassic Park" (PG-13). The poor little rich kid of this summer's movies. Enormous amounts of money and attention have been expended on making the film's half-dozen dinosaur species awfully impressive (though much too intense for small children) but very little has been done to make any of the puffy human beings equally involving. In fact, when all the guys leave the screen, you'll be tempted to leave with them. Another case of \$60 million worth of special effects chasing two cents worth of characterization and story. (Twin Cinema)

"Rising Sun" (R). Director/co-screenwriter Philip Kaufman's puzzling version of Michael Crichton's controversial novel chronicling a confrontation to subvert the most precious of American institutions is mystifying when it should be clear and clear when it should be mystifying. Despite the presence of Sean Connery and Wesley Snipes, it's the markiest of thrillers, more dispiriting than involving. (Mall Cinema)

"Robin Hood: Men in Tights" (PG-13). Mel Brooks' foray into Sherwood Forest has some wildly funny stuff but a lot of scenery scaled down for the kiddie-TV generation. Cary Elwes makes for a dull, mugging Robin but the supporting cast, including Richard Lewis as King Richard, brings himself as a noble who dispenses bargain circumstances, is often funny. (Grand-Vu Drive-in)

"Rookie of the Year" (PG). A children's baseball fantasy-comedy that probably only children will be able to wholeheartedly embrace. Which is more implausible: 12-year-old Thomas Ian Nicholas breaking his arm and magically turning into a 105 mph fastball pitcher or the Chicago Cubs breaking "Hit the World Series?" "Rookie" directed by Daniel Stern — who also pops up as a demented pitching coach and bean-ball victim — doesn't sell us on either, although, fittingly for a movie about a late-inning relief pitcher, it finishes strongly. (Jerome Cinema)

"The Secret Garden" (G). Rare as it is to have an accomplished G-rated film made by a respected actor from a children's picture book, Agnieszka Holland's version of how a pair of misanthropic children are made whole by the wonders of the natural world is too calculatedly pleased with itself to truly soar. A lippit picture to take away from children to, but more dicey for unaccompanied adults. (Twin Cinema)

Remake of 'Hard Target' falls flat

"The Most Dangerous Game" chilled 1932 audiences with its tale of a wealthy madman who lures innocents to his island, then hunts them down like animals. Twice remade, the plot turns up again in "Hard Target," designed for the talents of Jean-Claude Van Damme.

Movie review

The stakes are high. For a cool half-million, hunting enthusiasts can stalk a homeless veteran through the slums and graveyards of New Orleans. No need to worry about the law. The game operates like a cat of the body. They also have the coroner's office fixed.

The insidious Emil Fouchon (Lance Henriksen) organizes the games with the aid of his leering, gun-crazy assistant (Arnold Vosloo) and a band of cutthroats. To make the chase more sporting, Fouchon selects victims from down-and-outers with special combat experience.

That's his first mistake.

One of those killed happens to be an ex-comrade of Chance Boudreaux (Van Damme), a rootless kick-boxer. He has also been hired by Natasha Binder (Yancy Butler) to find her missing father, another of Fouchon's quarry. The job is complicated because the New Orleans police are on strike, except for a lone detective (Carmine Mitchell).

"Hard-Target" marks the first American film of director John Woo, late of Hong Kong martial arts movies. His peculiar style employs deafening sound effects — Vosloo marks his entrance spotlighted with a clap of thunder.

He also employs more slow motion than has been seen since the Olympic diving finals.



The hunter becomes the hunted as Chance (Jean-Claude Van Damme) leads killers on a wild chase into his home terrain.

After nine starring films, Van Damme has not modified his acting technique, nor is his dialogue more intelligible (as in "Universal Soldier," his Flemish accent is explained by his Cajun background).

Miss Butler has little to do except act distraught. Henriksen and Vosloo hark back to silent-movie villains, lacking the ourled mustache.

In the unclimatic Van Damme, Miss Butler and his uncle (Wilford Brimley, with bow and arrow instead of oatmeal) are pursued by

helicopter, motorcycles and a pack of thrill-killers. Now the stakes are \$750,000 for the customers, who look like a bunch of redneck coon hunters.

When they bumble, Fouchon rights, "These guys are brain-dead." The same might be said of "Hard Target."

The Universal Pictures release was written by Chuck Pfister and lists no less than seven producer credits. The rating is R for endless killings, mutilations, beatings, explosions as well as language. (Twin Cinema)

13 years of gross-outs highlight Jason, 'Friday the 13th' series

The date was Friday, May 9, 1980, and a quiet little horror film called "Friday the 13th" opened to unexpectedly crowded movie houses.

Fast forward to Friday, Aug. 13, 1993, the opening of "Jason Goes to Hell: The Final Friday" (now playing at the I-win Cinema). This time, camp counselor killer Jason goes up against a world-famous hourly hunter of serial killers, Creighton Duke (Steven Williams), the one man with the know-how to destroy Jason for good!

For those who've lost track, here's a rundown on the entire "Friday the 13th" series (which is available on video):

"Friday the 13th"
1980, 1 hour, 33 minutes
Plot: Counselors at Camp Crystal Lake are gruesomely murdered by Mrs. Voorhees (Betty Palmer), the mother of Jason, a young boy who drowned 23 years earlier while two counselors were making out. Mrs. Voorhees is killed by Alice (Adrienne King), the surviving counselor.

Body count: 1
Best gross-out: Mrs. Voorhees' neck makes a fatal connection with a machete, and she loses her head over it.

Jason's demise: Drowning in a lake as a young boy.

Dumb dialogue: "Don't worry. There's probably some stupid explanation for all of this." — Boy to girl after discovering bloody ax.

Comments: Crude and rude, but easily the best of the bunch. This classic-by-comparison original had all the slasher movie clichés before they were clichés. Included are the title taken from the calendar, stalking camera, sole-surviving nice-gal heroine, sex equals death theme, extended killer/heroina chase sequence, dead killer jumping up for one last scare, the crazy oldtimer predicting doom, fake-out dream sequence, revenge plot and ominous background music.

The film includes victims Kevin Bacon and Bing Crosby's son Harry Crosby.

"Friday the 13th Part 2"
1981, 1 hour, 27 minutes
Plot: Alice is killed with an ice pick while recovering from the recent trauma of the Camp Crystal Lake bloodbath. Five years pass, and counselors-in-training at a nearby camp are kidnaped by a grown Jason, who wrenched his mother's decapitation at the hands of Alice.

Body count: 9
Best gross-out: Boy in wheelchair gets machete embedded into his face.
Jason's demise: Ginny (Amy Steel) stabs Jason in the neck with a fireplace poker.
Dumb dialogue: "I swear if you ever do this to me again I'm gonna kill you." — Girl to boy before she realizes she's 160 lbs.

Comments: A copycat sequel distinguished by Jason's first appearance as an adult.

"Friday the 13th, Part 3 in 3-D"
1982, 1 hour, 36 minutes
Plot: Chris (Dana Kimmell) and her friends vacation at Higgins Haven, her parents' mountain home near Crystal Lake. Chris is haunted by nightmares of Jason attacking her there two years ago. Jason returns to wreak havoc on Chris and her friends in typical bloody fashion.

Body count: 12
Best gross-out: Jason squeezes a boy's head until an eyeball pops out.
Jason's demise: Chris stabs Jason, clubs him with a log, clobbers him with a shovel, hangs him and hits him in the face with an ax.

Dumb dialogue: "Nothing's gonna happen here when we're all here together." — Girl to worried friend.
Comments: Jason's famous hockey mask, lifted off the face of a boy he'd just killed, makes its debut — the best reveal yet — was in 3-D, which was dropped for the video release.

"Friday the 13th: The Final Chapter"
1984, 1 hour, 32 minutes

Plot: A presumed dead Jason escapes from the morgue. It's business as usual, but at a new location — Crystal Point, where a group of teens have rented a summer home.

Body count: 13
Best gross-out: Jason takes a hacksaw to a morgue technician's neck, then jerks his head around 180 degrees.

Jason's demise: Tommy (Corey Feldman), the young boy who lives next door to the teens' summer home, hacks Jason to slivers with a machete.

Dumb dialogue: "Someone left the door open... what happens if a psycho walks in?" — Tommy's mother to Tommy.

Comments: Good entry, but using young Feldman in this manner is shameful. Crispin Glover co-stars.

"Friday the 13th, Part V: A New Beginning"
1985, 1 hour, 32 minutes

Plot: A disturbed Tommy (John Shepherd) is now an institutionalized teen after brutally murdering Jason. Killings take place at the institution, but this time Jason isn't guilty. A cracked paramedic uses Jason lore as a cover to commit his own murders.

Body count: 21
Best gross-out: A lighted flare is shoved down a boy's throat.

Jason's demise: None. Jason is only in dream sequences.

Dumb dialogue: "All right, bither you got the car started or you're a dead man." — One friend to another.

Comments: Way too many murders and extra characters, a confusing ending, poor portrayals of troubled youth and bargain-basement special effects make this one the pits.

"Friday the 13th, Part VI: Jason Lives"
1986, 1 hour, 27 minutes

Plot: Tommy (Thom Mathews) and a friend go to Jason's grave to destroy his remains. Lightning strikes Jason's open casket, bringing him back alive. He descends upon Forest Green, the renamed Crystal Lake, which just opened its new camping season.

Body count: 17
Best gross-out: Jason reaches into a man's chest and pulls his heart out.

Jason's demise: Jason is burned, hit in the skull with a rock, then anchored to the bottom of Crystal Lake.

Dumb dialogue: "We'd better turn around... I've seen enough horror movies to know any weirdo wearing a mask is never friendly." — Woman to man after spotting Jason blocking their path.

Comments: Some unexpected humor helps, though an Alice Cooper score that includes "He's Back (The Man Behind the Mask)" and Jason towering over a bunch of terrified young kids don't do it for victims Nor-Estlitz, Horshack from "Welcome Back, Kotter," and Tony Goldwyn.

"Friday the 13th, Part VII: The New Blood"
1988, 1 hour, 28 minutes

Plot: Telekinetic teen Tina (Lar Park Lincoln) uses her powers to send her abusive father to a watery grave at her Crystal Lake home. Years later she tries to use those powers to bring him back but instead revives Jason. His prey are the teens using the house next door to Betty. Dad is revived at the end, and he pulls Jason back into the lake with him.

Body count: 15
Best gross-out: Girl smuggling in sleeping bag is banged headfirst into tree.

Jason's demise: Tina electrocutes Jason, strangles him, incinerates him and literally brings down the house on top of him.

Dumb dialogue: "Oh, you big hunk-of-a-man. Come and get me." — Girl to Jason, thinking he's her boyfriend.

Comments: Jason meets the Carrie-like Tina in this supernatural turn. Look for Terry Kiser, the corpse in the "Weekend at Bernie's" films, as the doctor.

"Friday the 13th, Part VIII: Jason Takes Manhattan"
1989, 1 hour, 35 minutes

Plot: Seniors at Lakeview High at Crystal Lake take a cruise-to-New York City, unaware that Jason is a stowaway (awakened by a boat's anchor). The teens who make it to New York are stalked there, as well.

Body count: 17
Best gross-out: Jason punches a boxer's head clear off his shoulders.

Jason's demise: Jason disintegrates in a river of toxic waste.

Dumb dialogue: "Welcome to New York." Waitress to distressed teens after they tell her a maniac is trying to kill them.

Comments: The movie takes forever to get to New York, and once Jason and the teens arrive it's a letdown. But it is funny watching how unimpressed New York subway riders are at the appearance of Jason.

Final frontier for true Trekkies: Learning to converse in Klingon

RED LAKE FALLS, Minn. (AP) — A dozen or so fervent fans of "Star Trek" may truly have reached the final frontier of Trekkism: A two-week language camp devoted to the study of "Ilhingan," the Klingon language.

For Trekkies, little explanation is needed. Klingons are the warlike, alien adversaries of the crew of the starship Enterprise. Those in other orbits, however, might be tempted to ask how to say, in Klingon, "Get a life."

"That's not fair. We have a life," said camp organizer Glen Proschel. "These are people who are highly trained professionals and this is something they do as a hobby. I think it's a little bit more creative hobby than going bowling or going fishing for the weekend."

Lawrence Schoen, a linguistics professor at Chestnut Hill College in Philadelphia, played a Klingon ambassador on Monday's opening ceremonies.

Rich Yempell, a software engineer from Stoughton, Mass., beat his chest with his leather-gloved fist — the Klingon salute — as a gloomy Klingon battle song played. Acknowledged by his peers as the best non-native speaker of Klingon, Yempell goes by the Klingon name "HoD Quantor," or Capt. Krankor.

anthem as a young boy raised the black-alien flag.

In the imaginary universe of "Star Trek," Klingon is a planet whose inhabitants were always fighting with Capt. Kirk and the United Federation of Planets (the original TV series) until an uneasy alliance was formed (in the new movies).

In the original "Star Trek" series, Klingons spoke English, if grudgingly. English. But by the time the movie "Star Trek III" was being filmed in the mid-1980s, producers decided Klingons needed a language of their own.

The result was a working language with its own alphabet, syntax and sounds.

It also captures the essence of the cruel Klingon race. As the inventor of Klingon, Marc Okrand, put it on the audio cassette "Conversational Klingon," "Spitting is quite appropriate."

Donna Herberster, a research instrument maker for NASA, traveled from Cleveland for the seminar.

"My favorite Klingon phrase is 'J'ghibi,'" she said, dressed as a Klingon marine lieutenant. "It means, 'I don't understand.'"

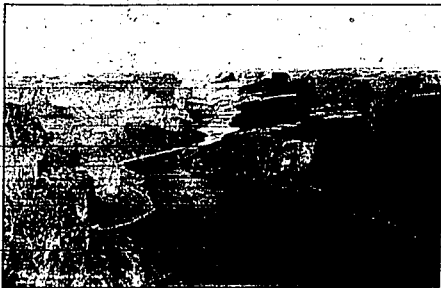

Photographs reveal life of photographer

TWIN FALLS — "The Footprints of Time," an exhibition of selected black and white photographs from the Clarence E. Bisbee collection, will begin Aug. 31 and continue through Sept. 30 at the Sunspot Gallery.

Clarence E. Bisbee arrived in the Magic Valley on Jan. 27, 1906, with the encouragement of Charles Diehl, founder of the Twin Falls News. He set up and worked out of a tent on Main Avenue South and built a studio at the corner of Second Street and Second Avenue West in 1914. Between 1906 and 1939, Bisbee made photographic portraits and completed a number of commercial assignments using an 8-by-10 view camera and a black and white glass plate negative process, making literally thousands of images. Many of the pictures were used by real estate developers, railroads and chambers of commerce to sell eastenders on

the idea of coming west to settle in the Magic Valley.

More than 2,000 of Bisbee's original glass plates are held in a collection of his work and form an invaluable historic document for the Magic Valley and the state of Idaho. From this body of work, curator Russ Hepworth selected a small group of specific images that reveal something of the nature of Bisbee himself, his methods for making photographs and his own times here in the Magic Valley captured and frozen on the silvered glass plates. The Bisbee collection is housed and maintained by the Twin Falls Public Library.

The Sunspot Gallery is located on the second floor of the Taylor Building on the campus of the College of Southern Idaho. Gallery hours are from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday. The gallery is closed on holidays. Parking and admission are free.

JACKPOT — Country music legend Ray Price has been dubbed the "direct link from the early days of country music to today's contemporary country."

But he's not thrilled about some of the sights he's witnessed along the way.

"For a long time, things were good. Hit songs like "For the Good Times," "Make the World Go Away," "Release Me," "Crazy Arms" and "Heartaches by the Number" earned Price shelves of gold records. He also raked up lots of honors, like Billboard's top male vocalist, a Grammy and entry into the Country Music Hall of Fame.

But the good times have a way of becoming memories.

Today, Price said in a phone interview this week, he has no new records in print because of country music's "age discrimination against us old timers."

Price is 67, and he doesn't expect the future to become any rosier.

"Not as long as big money from New York goes for the youth," he said.

Book superstores offer choice, but small sellers worry

CHICAGO — A paperback in one hand and a glass of iced latte in the other, playwright Rande Eckert feasts on the literature and ambiance at the Barnes & Noble superstore on Chicago's North Side.

The store's tufted green exterior, carpeted floors and beamed ceilings invite Eckert and other readers to lose themselves among 100,000 titles.

"I like the music. I love having bookstores where they have chairs, where they encourage you to sit down and read," Eckert said, sitting in the store's cafe. "It's a little bit of the sense of a library."

Vast "superstores" are opening in cities from New York to Los Angeles in what some are calling the "third store wars" of the 1990s. "The '90s are becoming probably the decade when the book business in America is going to explode more than any other in this century," said Steve Riggio, executive vice president of New York-based Barnes & Noble.

Some say the competition is healthy and will encourage more people to read. "We believe the more bookstores in America, the better off

America is going to be," Riggio said. "Others warn that the huge chains opening may wipe out the new bibliophiles

are bent on driving neighborhood bookstores out of business.

"They're not in bookselling be-

cause they love it. They're in it because it's good business," said Bill Kurland, owner of Shakespeare & Co.

"I'm not a restaurateur," owner Penny Davies complained. "I am a book seller. The chain's great. I have a 20-year-old Chicago-based chain announced it is closing 10 of its 19 stores and blamed the failures partly on the superstores.

"In addition to a huge selection, many of the superstores have music, and cafes. Some lure customers with author readings and signings. Most offer deep discounts — up to 40 percent on New York Times best sellers, for instance.

"Almost all superstores keep long hours. Barnes & Noble, for example, is open seven days a week, 9 a.m. to 11 p.m.

Smaller stores are employing survival tactics. Playtous Book Shop in suburban Evanston extended its hours after a Barnes & Noble moved in nearby. But with just two full-time employees and two part-timers, there's no way to keep up, owner Margriet Schenkel said.

"Some say the deck is stacked against small stores. Indeed, the Federal Trade Commission in 1978 charged six major publishers with discriminating against independent bookstores by selling to big chains at lower prices."

Sales during the first four months of 1993 totaled \$2.84 billion, compared with \$2.7 billion year earlier, according to preliminary estimates from the Census Bureau.

Some bookshops contending with the superstores see being small as a virtue. "We've thought about the books for you. You don't have to look at every gardening book ever published," said Pat Peterson, co-owner of Barbara's Bookstore, a five-store Chicago chain.

Film examines troubling, growing handgun culture

On some of the meanest of New York City's mean streets, Forest Whitaker found the haunting images and chilling sounds that ring through his directorial debut, Home Box Office's "Strapped."

In the projects and on the playgrounds, he was confronted by the disturbing evidence of a handgun culture gone crazy.

"I did a lot of research," says Whitaker. "I went to all kinds of projects all over New York. During the daytime at one project, there was gunfire all day long."

"Kids were still playing in the playground, and they wouldn't even look up. Police officers would walk off in the other direction. I would leave there early in the night because I didn't want to be around when the gunfire was really supposed to begin."

"Strapped," which HBO will premiere Saturday, remains "very true to that environment," Whitaker told critics in Los Angeles. According to the National Center for Health Statistics, handgun homicides increased 43 percent from 1987 to 1991. Firearm homicide has become the leading cause of death for black males between the ages of 10 and 34.

"Most chilling of all, however, it is estimated that half of the illegal guns in New York City — from small Berettas to Uzi submachine guns — belong to children. These are the figures that made Whitaker want to direct "Strapped," the story of an inner-city youth lured into gun dealing.

"Although profoundly troubling, the conditions Whitaker found in New York did not shock him. He grew up in three Los Angeles neighborhoods with high crime rates: South-Central, Carson and Compton.

"I stayed there until I was about 17," he says, "then I went away to

college. The stuff that's in the film — the relationships, the problems and the pains and stuff — those are things that I've seen in my life. You know, I've seen a lot of those experiences happen.

"If you have any personal contact within that community, you're going to see and know people who are killed. I personally know people who have killed with weapons, people who have been shot — friends of mine.

"This is a story that is very pertinent and very true, and it's not going to go anywhere if we ignore it and don't speak about it. You keep pushing and pushing for social change, and change comes through awareness."

At a time when TV is being attacked for glorifying violence, Whitaker wants to use the medium to raise awareness of violence in our society.

Although this is his first time in the director's chair, Whitaker has worked with an impressive array of Hollywood heavyweights. His film credits include Clint Eastwood's "Birds" (as jazz legend Charlie Parker), Barry Levinson's "Good Morning, Vietnam," Oliver Stone's "Platoon," Martin Scorsese's "The Color of Money" and Alan Pakula's "Consealing Adults."

"I've been pretty fortunate," Whitaker says. "I've worked with some really good directors, and they've all been pretty cool and respectful. I got something from everybody I worked with. They all taught me something different."

And Whitaker hopes "Strapped" will teach viewers something about the dangers facing American children.

"We live in a society that is really screwed up in a lot of ways," he says. "We have people who are dying, being killed every day. You can look in the paper every day and see something about kids with guns — every single day."

Try, try again:

Networks debut 3 dozen new series

LOS-ANGELES — The fall television season is taking of the look of a very big shell game. Viewers, heads up.

ABC, CBS, NBC and Fox Broadcasting are introducing a hefty 36 new programs, the result of a high number of failures from the 1992-93 season.

Further complicating things, the compact September debut schedule is clearly a thing of the past,

with shows premiering over an extended period from August to October.

And, once again, many new series are popping up in special previews before settling into their regular time slots — so a show destined for a Thursday might sneak in first on a Monday.

The premise behind it is extremely logical, namely, if you can do something that sets you apart from the glut of shows, said Betsy Frank, senior vice president with Saatchi & Saatchi Ad-

vertising in New York.

"The problem, of course, is what do you give up? ... Some of the ... dare I use the word — excitement about the new fall season," said Ms. Frank, who analyzes network programming for the ad agency.

Excitement might be too strong a word for the new series awaiting viewers.

"I don't know that I've heard anyone jump for joy that it's the best schedule we've seen for

Zap! Roggin will change channels for you on special

LOS ANGELES (AP) — There's a respite for those weary fingers of yours on the remote control: You won't feel the need to flip through those channels for at least an hour while Fred Roggin does it for you.

The sportscaster and host of the syndicated series "Roggin's Heroes" has put together what may be the ultimate channel flipper.

It's a one-hour special called "Top Secret—Television," airing Sunday at 6 p.m. MDT on NBC (KUPV, K38AS and KIFI), in which Roggin will introduce short video clips from around the world.

"Conceptually, we will change the channel on the show," Roggin said. "We'll get bored with something and change it before you get a chance to change it."

"We're going to look at unusual, bizarre happenings from the world of television—things you don't get to see in this country," he said. "We click to a channel. It

could be Austrian television. Then, you may be on the BBC in London."

"Don't get excited, Masterpiece Theater buffs. We're not talking about watching Jeremy Irons in "Brideshead Revisited."

"A lot of foreign television is slight gags," Roggin said. "I think that our television is more sophisticated in this country and more conservative. If we've seen a guy get hit in the head with a watermelon, we've seen it a thousand times; but in other countries it plays big. Also, game shows are reckless in other countries. They ask people to do things we could never get away with."

There is, for example, a costumed Japanese man who sneaks up behind people and screams. That goes over like gangbusters in the land of the Rising Sun, along with a survival game whose climax is too scary to be shown on "Top Secret Television."

And, in case you wonder whether people in other nations act as stupid as some Americans,

there's evidence from home videos among the 100-plus film snippets.

"Who is this man, and why does he want to sub for your channel-changer?"

The video and film clip show has become something of a specialty for the 36-year-old Roggin, whose own production company put together "Top Secret Television."

It was his use of thumbnail bloopers, packaged as entries in a "Hall of Shame," that first made Roggin a standout sportscaster.

Then, one night, a bartender made a suggestion: "Hey! 'Hogan's Heroes!' 'Roggin's

Heroes!' Funny, huh?"

Roggin recalls his response as: "I'll never forget it home to put together a syndicated series."

"Roggin's Heroes," with theme music borrowed from its old television namesake, is a half-hour of comical peeks at the great and nowhere-near great.

"I learned that 'the package' was everything," Roggin said.

He entered sports broadcasting shortly after high school, where he had broken his nose twice while participating in sports.

"It looked like a casaba melon," Roggin said. "I loved sports and I loved to talk... so I decided to go into radio: I had a face for radio."

He became Uncle Fred at tiny KIKO Radio in Globe, Ariz., broadcasting from a trailer.

"You'd call up and request a song. I'd say, 'You know where the record store is? You'd better go out and buy it or we can't play it.'"

Over the next four years, Roggin got his nose fixed and began working in television in such cities as Yuma, Ariz., Austin, Texas, and his hometown of Phoenix. He landed in Los Angeles at the age of 23.

"When I started, from a confidence viewpoint, I've never believed I was the greatest on-air talent," Roggin said. But he has picked up nine regional Emmys as a sportscaster on KNBC-TV in Los Angeles.

"I've always believed the key is production. Try to produce well and you're creative, you can plug somebody into that. That's been my strength," he said.

"My acting talents were showcased on a made-for-television Perry Mason movie (NBC's The Case of the Tell-Tale Talk Show Host in May) and I think after witnessing it I'm surprised I even have a job," Roggin said.

"I think if I could play me, which is an adolescent goofy adult, I think I could do that," he said. "Of a drugged person. Anyone could work themselves up and start screaming."

On the bright side, there are fewer and fewer downright awful shows on the schedule," Ms. Franks said.

Some, however, consider that an indication of the networks' reluctance to take risks. The new series are comedy-heavy, with 21 sitcom debuts. There are 11 dramas, two variety shows, a news magazine and a mystery movie anthology.

"Phenom," a comedy starring Judith Light as the mother of a teenage tennis champ, premieres at 8:30 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 14. Steven Bochco's daring new police drama, "NYPD Blue," debuts at 10 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 21.

An overhauled Wednesday features four new series.
"Ther," starring comedian Thea Vidale as a widow with a young family, will bow with previews on Sept. 8, 10 and 15. Another Sept. 15 preview is "Moon Over Miami," a romantic comedy featuring mismatched private detectives, which airs at 9 p.m. Both settle into their regular time slots Wednesday, Sept. 22: "Ther" at 8 p.m. and "Moon" at 10 p.m.

Two other series premiering that night are "Joan's Life," starring Peter Onorati as a stay-at-home dad, at 8:30 p.m., and "Grace Under Fire," with comic Brett Butler as a divorced mom, at 9:30 p.m.

"Missing Persons" debuts as a two-hour "ABC Monday Night Movie" at 9 p.m. Aug. 30. The one-hour police drama with Daniel J. Travanti ("Hill Street Blues") moves to its regular 8 p.m. time slot Thursday, Sept. 23. "Boy Meets World," a comedy of adolescence comedy starring Ben Savage as the boy, debuts 8:30 p.m. Friday, Sept. 24.

Premiere dates for a pair of new Saturday shows have yet to be announced — "Against the Grain," a sitcom starring boxer George Forman as a family man, and "Paula Poundstone," a comedy-variety hour with the comedian.

CBS, the No. 1 ranked network last season, is wrapping its latest auction of eight new programs around baseball playoffs and the World Series.

"Dave's World," a sitcom starring Harry Anderson and based on humorist Dave Barry's work, debuts at 8:30 p.m. Monday, Sept. 20.

"The Trouble With Larry," a

comedy starring Bronson Pinchot as a missing man who returns to find his wife remarried, premieres at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 25.

The Wednesday lineup will be completed with two post-World Series debuts: "The Nanny," starring Franca Drescher as a street-smart nanny to a rich household, and "South of Sunset," a detective drama with former Eagles rocker Glenn Frey. Dates were unannounced.

"Angel Falls," a serial drama about a single mother returning to her childhood home, bows at 10 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 26.

"I Had to Be You," a romantic comedy starring Faye Dunaway and Robert Ulrich, will preview at 8 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 19, and then debut at 8 p.m. Friday, Sept. 24. Following it at 9 p.m. is "Family Album," a comedy about an extended family starting Peter Seolan.

"Harts of the West," with Beau Bridges and father Lloyd Bridges, debuts at 9 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 25. The drama, part of CBS' Western lineup, is about an uprooted family at a dude ranch.

ABC has a slate of 10 new programs for the 1993-94 season, and is emphasizing comedy in a bid to recapture its success of the late '80s.

"SeaQuest DSV," Steven Spielberg's futuristic, undersea adventure series, debuts with a special two-hour episode at 8 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 12, before settling into its regular 8-9 p.m. time slot the next week.

"The John Larroquette Show," featuring the former "Night Court" star as a hardluck bus depot manager, previews Thursday, Sept. 2, at 9:30 p.m., and premieres in its 9 p.m. Tuesday slot on Sept. 7.

Also premiering Sept. 7 is "The Second Half," a sitcom about a divorced sports writer played by comedian John Mendoza adjusting to single life. It follows "Larroquette" at 9:30 p.m.

"Saved by the Bell: The College Years," a sequel to the daytime show about three school buddies, premieres with a one-hour episode at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 14.

The newsmagazine "Now with Tom Brokaw & Katie Couric" debuts at 9 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 18.

"Frasier," with Kelsey Grammer reprising his "Cheers" role as Dr. Frasier Crane, premieres at 9:30 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 16.

"Against the Grain," a drama set in a small Texas town where high school football is king, has a 10 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 30, preview, followed by its 8 p.m. Friday, Oct. 1, premiere.

A "Mystery Movie" anthology debuts 9 p.m. Friday, Oct. 22.

Saturday, Sept. 25, brings the debut of two new sitcoms: "The Mommies," about the domestic adventures of two suburbanites, at 8 p.m., and "Café Americano," starring Valerie Bertinelli as an American expatriate in Paris, at 8:30 p.m. Both preview Saturday, Sept. 18.

Fox Broadcasting, offering seven new shows, is making a bid to expand its target 18-34 audience with slightly — that's slightly — older viewers.

Sunday's new lineup begins Aug. 22 with the debut of "Living Single," an 8:30 p.m. comedy starring rap singer Queen Latifah.

The Don Rickles-Richard Lewis sitcom "Daddy Dearest," about a man whose father suddenly becomes his new roommate, debuts Sunday, Sept. 5, at 9:30 p.m. Actor-filmmaker Robert Townsend's new variety show, "Townsend Television," premieres at 7 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 12.

"Bakersfield P.D.," a buddy sitcom about two police officers working in the central California town, debuts at 8:30 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 14.

Fox's revamped Thursday includes the 8:30 p.m. Sept. 16 debut of "The Sinbad Show," starring comedian Sinbad as a foster parent.

"The Adventures of Brisco County, Jr.," a tongue-in-cheek Western adventure, debuts with a two-hour episode at 8 p.m. Aug. 27.

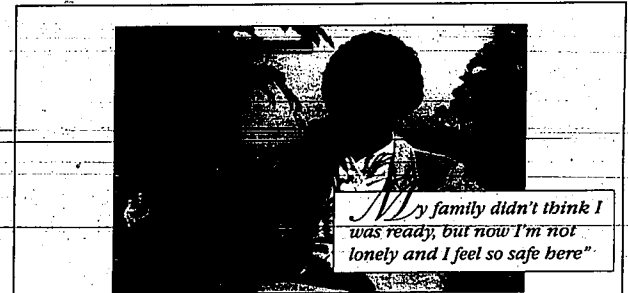

Economics play key role in decisions on sports logos

NEW YORK — In the early 1970s, when General Manager Bill Torrey first thought about uniforms for the expansion New York Islanders, the process was simple.

"The name, logo and colors were taken from the territory—Orange, blue and white were Nassau County's colors," Torrey said Tuesday. "The logo was a map of Long Island. Dionne Boe, the wife of owner Roy Boe, designed the striping. There was never any thought about a design that could be merchandised."

Today, more than 20 years later, Torrey is president of the Florida Panthers, another NHL expansion team, but the process is infinitely more complicated. "I hate to tell you how much time I put into that logo," Torrey said. "It was one of the most difficult things I had to get involved in, because it is so important."

After all, the '90s are an era when the marketing of the team logo can generate more money than most winning teams. In a time of widespread free agency, logo loyalties have supplanted fan loyalties.

Sales of licensed products for professional sports and major colleges topped \$9-billion last year. And sales of licensed NHL products are projected to reach \$800 million this year, up from \$600 million last year, said Alesia Klemm, senior correspondent at Team Licensing Business, a trade publication based in Scottsdale, Ariz.

"Teams design the logos and uniforms for consumer sales," Klemm said. "They want to make sure what they unveil to the marketplace is definitely going to sell, to fans as well as the fashion-conscious; because sports licensing has become such a fashion business. It's almost turning into what people want to wear every day."

So last April, after owner Wayne Huizenga and Torrey decided on the name Panthers, Torrey wanted a logo and color scheme that was distinct from NHL teams and the other South Florida teams: the aqua-blue team of the Dolphins, Marlins, Heat and the University of Miami Hurricanes.

Torrey took some rough sketches of panthers — Florida's state animal and an endangered species — that portrayed the presence he wanted the team to have ("presence, the smart, challenging, sleek") to NHL Enterprises, the league's marketing and merchandising arm, for guidance.

Fred Scalera, general manager for retailing and licensing, pointed the Panthers toward a little-known Manhattan company, Sean Michael Edwards Design Inc., which is becoming the leading design firm of the sports marketing industry. The small firm was started by Tom Duane and Ed O'Hara, who met at a computer convention. Their first sports job was designing a 100th anniversary patch for the St. Louis Cardinals.

The five-year-old company now has dozens of clients in all four major professional sports leagues; they

have redesigned uniforms and event and anniversary logos for the New York Mets, the Seattle Mariners, the California Angels, the Cincinnati Reds, the World Series, the Denver Nuggets, the Norfolk Tides, NFL Properties and the Philadelphia Eagles. The company, named after the partners' middle names, had an estimated \$2 million in sales last year.

"We knew they knew the climate

of pro sports and what deadlines meant; this had to be done in three weeks," Scalera said. "They know the need for multiple logos for multiple uses, not only for apparel, but what will work in different colors and black-and-white for print, broadcast, stationary, business cards."

After meeting with Panthers executives, Duane and O'Hara researched hundreds of images of big

cats in coffee-table and history books, and sketched slinking panthers, ones with ripping claws, snarling panthers and panthers with flames behind them to present them on storyboards to Panthers executives.

The result was a striking logo of a pouncing panther, claws extended, for the jersey; a secondary logo for the Panthers' shoulder patch (a

hockey stick crossed with a palm tree against a sunset) and an inaugural logo, dominated by the team name.

Another logo, of a growling panther snapping a hockey stick, is reminiscent of the San Jose Sharks. And why not? The Sharks led the NHL in the merchandise category last year, with an estimated \$125 million in sales.

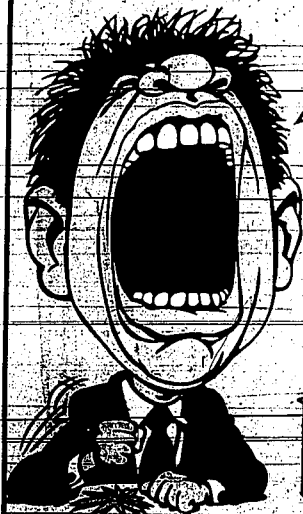

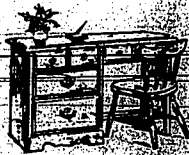

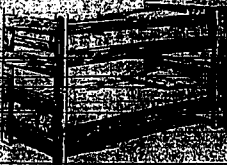
