# Barge hit bridge, caused train crash, officials say

SARALAND, Ala. — Officials concluded Thursday that a barge, being pushed by a towboat lost in fog on an Alabama bayou, smashed into a railroad trestle and knocked concrete out of an abutment minutes before the Amtrak Sunset Limited roared across and plunged off, killing 44 people.

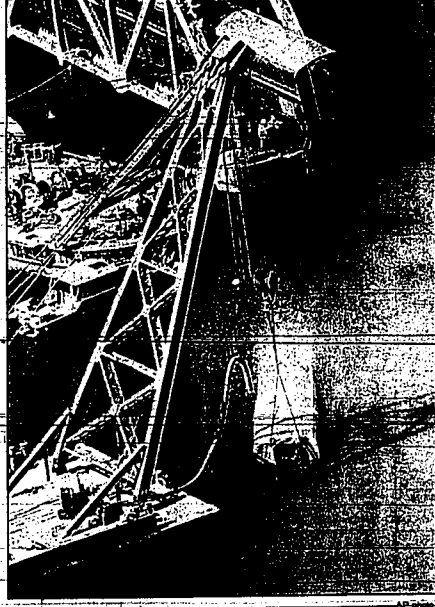

The barge, being pushed by the towboat Wednesday through a pre-dawn fog, had cracked into the trestle abutment, officials said. "The barge did hit the bridge," declared U.S. Transportation Secretary Federico Pena. The FBI said criminal charges against the towboat operator are "a possibility" — but a prosecutor said it was too early to decide.

As rescuers resumed their search Thursday for more victims, they found the body of a boy, who appeared to be about 3 years old floating in the bayou. Authorities are offered differing casualty figures. But they agreed on a death toll of at least 44 and said three people were missing and presumed dead. "It was Amtrak's worst train wreck. The final toll could exceed the cumulative total of 48 people killed Please see TRAINA/2

# Health campaign in high gear

TAMPA, Fla. — President Clinton, in response to a question on financing the health-care proposal, asserted Thursday night that overhaul efforts could become "a tide that one can turn back." Moving quickly to keep public attention on the plan he unveiled the night before, Clinton fielded questions on a forum broadcast by ABC and hosted by Ted Koppel. Clinton said he saw wide bipartisan support for what he was trying to accomplish and predicted that passage of the legislation would pass Congress by the middle of next year. "The public feeling for this will sweep across America without regard to party,

to region or to age. The American people will see this as a decent, humane thing that we have waited too long to do," he said. "It will then be a tide that no one can turn back." The breadth of the questions immediately showed the complexity of the debate. In the first half-hour of the program alone, Clinton was asked how his plan would affect therapy for a young boy disabled after a near-drowning, how much mental health coverage it would provide, how it would treat Alzheimer's disease and what protections it would offer AIDS victims without health insurance. Clinton, sitting on a stool alongside Koppel in the Tampa Performing Arts Center, took questions from those in the audience and from panelists assembled by the network in Chicago, Los Angeles and Boston. In response to a question on financing the plan, Clinton said new taxes on cigarettes, "a little under a dollar" a pack and a proposed small tax on large companies that select their own health insurance purchasing arrangements should suffice. He said no broad-based tax was necessary. "I don't think we should raise a big general tax on people to pay for the uninsured when most people are paying too much for their insurance already," Clinton said. When one man in the audience questioned the wisdom of a higher tax on tobacco, Clinton said smoking was always detrimental to health while drinking alcohol was only harmful in excess.

# U.S. will halt output of nuclear arms fuel

WASHINGTON — The White House has prepared a proposal aimed at stopping the production of nuclear weapons fuel, a move that if successful could hamper the ambitions of potential nuclear powers. The proposal, contained in a four-page draft circulated among government agencies and sent to U.S. embassies, is part of a new U.S. policy to stem the spread of missiles and nuclear, chemical and biological weapons. President Clinton will probably announce the broad outlines of the policy on Monday in a speech at the United Nations, an aide said Thursday. The policy is similar to that of the Bush administration in several respects including support for existing controls, the spread of nuclear technology. But it differs in one respect — seeking to curb proliferation of nuclear weapons by tackling the supply of the fissionable material that fuels them. The proposal calls for the United States to start negotiating an international agreement prohibiting "the production of highly enriched uranium or the separation of plutonium for nuclear explosive purposes," according to the draft. A copy was obtained by The Associated Press. It also promises to discourage the production of fissionable material for civilian use in countries that pose a high risk of proliferation — such as India, Pakistan and North Korea. Under the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, countries not considered official nuclear weapons powers are restricted from producing weapons-grade fuel. The administration's proposed treaty would apply to all countries. But critics note that it would not stop nuclear nations from producing nuclear material for civilian reactors — fuel that can be diverted for the production of weapons. The United States stopped producing plutonium in 1988. But the other four declared nuclear powers — Russia, France, China and Britain — all process spent fuel to produce plutonium for civilian purposes.

# Bomb-range funds stuck in Congress

TWIN FALLS — Congress Thursday delayed an Air Force request for \$6.7 million for a proposed state-owned range in south-western Owyhee County.

The Air Force has requested the money so the Idaho Air National Guard could buy private lands that would be part of the controversial bombing range proposed by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

The money was not in President Clinton's budget, but was included by Idaho lawmakers in a military authorization bill. The Senate committee that oversees military construction money, however, voiced uncertainty about need for the range and has asked for written clarification from Secretary of Defense Les Aspin on the department's position.

A report Thursday from the Senate Military Construction Appropriations Committee states, "the committee directs that none of the funds provided for training range expansion or land acquisition be obligated until the secretary of defense has provided the committee certification in writing that the project is required for training and readiness."

But that means the Defense Department would have to reverse its position, outlined in a May Government Accounting Office report. The GAO is the investigative arm of Congress.

In a statement included in that report, the department said the existing Saylor Creek Bombing Range and nearby existing ranges would accommodate the "composite wing" stationed at the Mountain Home Air Force Base.

Andrus has offered state land as a training range for the wing. The range would attract to the Air Force. But the proposal would include more than 6,000 acres of non-private lands.

Air Force officials have said the range is needed for efficient training, but acknowledge that the wing — composed of fighters, bombers and support aircraft — can accomplish its training without the state's proposed range.

The Air Force also has said that it would not recommend closing the Mountain Home base even if it doesn't get the range.

Andrus and Mountain Home businessmen say the range is needed to keep the Air Force in Idaho. A state-owned range would not necessarily require congressional review, as would a range on more than 5,000 acres of federal public land.

"The U.S. Air Force and Governor Andrus have attempted to usurp congressional oversight by ignoring the Eagle Act requirements for approval of the Idaho Bombing Range," said Grace Bukowski, military project coordinator for Citizens Alert of Nevada, a military watchdog group. "Their heydays are now over," she said.

# Dissident cheers Yeltsin from afar

TWIN FALLS — The outlook isn't bright for Russia's transformation into a capitalist democracy, says one of the early leaders of that nation's pro-democracy movement.

"Instead, said Alexander Fedorovskii, the current battle between Russian President Boris Yeltsin and the anti-reform Congress of People's Deputies may lead to a military dictatorship or even civil war.

Yeltsin may lose his presidency, and all his reforms, if he does not undertake extreme measures against the parliament," said Park neighborhood of Twin Falls for less than a month.

During the Gorbachev and Glasnost period of the late 1980s, Fedorovskii and his wife, Olga, were prominent leaders of Moscow's pro-democracy movement. Back then, they said, people eagerly worked to dismantle the Communist Party's monopoly on power and create a Western-style democracy. The movement was a wildcat in August 1991, when popular resistance helped end the at-

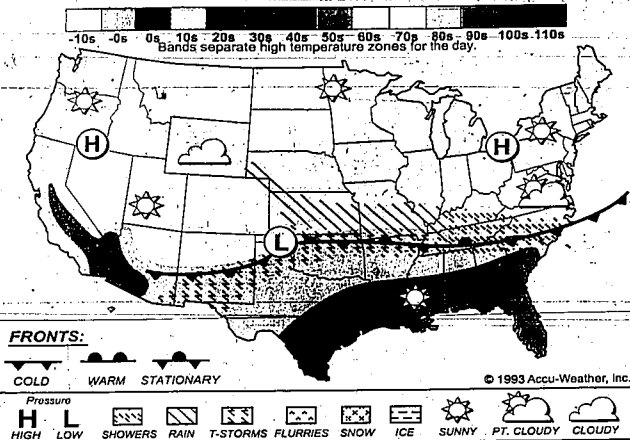

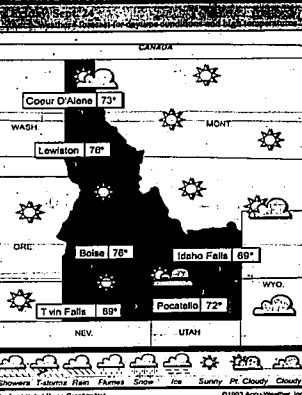

## Torrential rains bring flash flooding to Missouri, Illinois

Torrential rain deluged eastern Missouri and southern Illinois on Thursday, while sunny skies prevailed over western part of the nation.

Showers and thunderstorms around the St. Louis area in east-central Missouri associated with a cold front slowly crossing the central United States produced nearly 3 inches of rain between late Wednesday night and Thursday afternoon.

Trailer parks were flooded and a highway was submerged under 4 feet of water, adding more misery in a state already battered by summer flooding. A suburban St. Louis woman drowned, and another woman was killed when her house was swept away.

Heavy rain left many roads flooded in Washington and Saint Francis counties. Basement flooding was reported near creeks in Genieve County, and water was reported flowing through levee breaks in Perry County.

Showers and thunderstorms also produced nearly 2 inches of rain at Columbia, Mo.; about 1.5 inches at Paducah, Ky.; and 1.25 inches at Louisville, Ky., and Warrensburg, Mo.

Showers and thunderstorms extended from southeastern Kansas and eastern Oklahoma to Tennessee, Kentucky and southern Indiana on Thursday afternoon, with strong thunderstorms in northern Arkansas and western Tennessee.

Elsewhere, a few showers and thunderstorms fell in south-central Texas and extreme southern Florida. Light rain and drizzle prevailed from Ohio to northern New England.

Skies were sunny across most of the nation west of the Great Plains and over the Dakotas and the upper Mississippi Valley. Skies were partly sunny from eastern Texas to the south Atlantic Coast.

In the Pacific Northwest, morning lows of 34 degrees at Olympia, Wash., and 38 at Astoria, Ore., equalled records for the date.

# Train disaster site usually calm fishing haven near waterway

SARALAND, Ala. (AP) — Bayou Canol, home to alligators, catfish and white egrets, is usually a calm backwater just off a river that bustles with tugboats and barges.

"We used to fish in there all the time," said Terry Watson, 33, a lifelong resident of nearby Whistler. "We used to fish right where that train went into the water."

The calm was shattered early Wednesday when a barge struck the railroad bridge moments before an Amtrak passenger train plunged into the dark bayou waters.

Big cranes were maneuvered into position on Thursday to lift the wrecked cars and engines out of the water, 17 to 25 feet deep. Divers said one coach was impaled upon a concrete pile. They said bodies in coach chairs, and floating.

One of the divers, Mark Lampton of Orange Grove, Miss., said the swampy terrain is full of alligators and snakes but they apparently were scared away by the noise of rescue craft.

The rail bridge was just 7 feet above the bayou, which runs to the north of the main Mobile River channel about 10 miles from Mobile itself. "None of the city, a major industrial area gradually gives way to the serenity of a remote swamp."

Barges carrying coal, wood chips and ore ply the Mobile River waters at all hours en route to Birmingham, Demopolis and other points north.

But they don't go into the bayou, known locally as a great fishing hole for catfish, crappie, redfish and flounder. No roads serve the area. Long-necked white egrets stalk the banks looking for prey, and alligators cruise the water.

In 1992, about 20 million tons of cargo was shipped along the river, according to the Army Corps of Engineers. Warrior & Gulf Navigation Co., owner of the barge and tugboat involved in the accident, operates 24 towboats and 300 cargo barges on the river.

Alabama State Docks Harbormaster David Carey said barge and tugboat accidents happen occasionally along the river, adding: "I wouldn't classify them as common. For that amount of tonnage, I would say it's uncommon."

Investigators believe fog was a major factor in the barge accident. Watson said he's been on many a fishing trip in thick fog.

"I've been in there when you can't see the man sitting in front of you," he said.

Watson and Carey agreed the normal practice for a towboat operator in fog is to stop until it clears, although radar can help boats negotiate the river's twists and turns.

"They usually drop anchor when it's real foggy and wait until they can see again," Watson said.

In all crashes in Amtrak history. Seven victims remained hospitalized, five in guarded condition. Most of the dead were found in train cars, but rescuers said the three still missing were believed to be crew members in the cab of the lead locomotive.

Rescuers maneuvered barge cranes into place to stabilize the cars in the bayou before divers crawled inside. They lifted a coach out of the water and placed it on a barge. Lifting the lead locomotive could take days. Its nose, which carried a data recorder, was buried in 25 feet of water and 15 feet of silt.

The wreck was being investigated by the FBI, the National Transportation Safety Board, the Coast Guard and the police department in Mobile, 10 miles south of the accident scene.

Investigators described what happened this way:

The Mobile River flows south past Mobile's towboat operator Andrew Stabler, who has been licensed for one year, was pushing six barges — each 193 feet long and 35 feet wide, lashed two astide and loaded with coal, coke and wood chips — north up the river. He turned slightly left to go around 12 Mile Island, a heart-shaped spit of land north of the city.

Once he passed the island, instead of returning to his northward course, which would have taken him under 14 Mile Bridge, he continued left in the fog and unwittingly veered into Bayou Canol. At 3:06 a.m., he called the Coast Guard by radio telephone from his vessel, the M/V Maxville, to say that he was lost.

"Mayday! Mayday!" Stabler says, which routinely records such calls: "I've lost my tow," he says, referring to one of the barges he was pushing. "There's too much fog. I don't know my exact location. It's just around 12 Mile Island, around the cut."

The Coast Guard asks whether he needs assistance.

"Negative," Stabler replies. "I don't know what happened. I just saw the heel of the barge disappear."

Perkins of the Coast Guard said Thursday in an interview: "That's when we think he hit the bridge."

The tape shows that Stabler thought he was under 14 Mile Bridge, two miles farther north on the Mobile River — when in fact he was over the railroad trestle over Bayou Canol.

"We're just under 14 Mile Bridge," Stabler says. He pauses, then adds: "I don't have time to talk. I'll get back."

He pauses again. "It's real bad here. There's a train just ran off the track."

Another pause.

"There's a train in the water. There's a lot of people in the water. There's a fire. We need help. Get out here!"

The entire dialogue takes 12 minutes, including the calls — indicating that Stabler's call for help came at 3:18 a.m.

Amtrak officials said Thursday that the Sunset Limited had crashed shortly after 3 a.m., indicating that the train crew could have had little warning even if Stabler had been aware that he hit the trestle.

"There were only a few moments," Perkins said, "from the time he struck it and the time the train went in the water."

## Cuban MiG pilot

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Cuban MiG-21 military jet landed Thursday afternoon at the U.S. military base in Guantanamo, Cuba, and the pilot asked for political asylum, U.S. officials said.

The jet apparently was in the air with a number of other Cuban planes and "piced off and headed to Guantanamo," said a Pentagon official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The plane landed at 2:35 p.m. — hours after an older MiG-21 flown to Florida last week by another defector was returned to Cuba.

tempted coup against Gorbachev by hard-line Communists.

But since the collapse of the Soviet empire in late 1991, the power struggle between Yeltsin and the communist-dominated congress has left many people disenchanted with democracy, which they feel has led to with corruption and national weakness.

"I don't want to risk their lives anymore, because they feel betrayed," Fedorovskii said. "They associate Mr. Yeltsin with the whole process of corruption and poverty, even though he's in no way responsible for that."

"People don't believe in anything anymore," Olga Fedorovskii, 34, added.

The widespread indifference to Yeltsin's decree Tuesday dissolving the congress, and its retaliatory order to reinstate Yeltsin as president, was brought home to the Fedorovskii when they phoned some friends in Moscow earlier this week.

"They said, 'Don't worry, nothing is happening, everybody is working,'" Alexander Fedorovskii said.

The best chance to avert disaster, he said, may be for Yeltsin to use force to oust the old parliament and hold elections for a new one, which most observers assume would be more supportive of Yeltsin's freer-market reforms.

"I don't want to be a cynic, but small blood now may prevent seas of blood (later), that Russia is so used to," he said.

"I'm a university professor, helped found the Moscow Popular Front in 1988 and reported on the old Soviet parliament for the front's newspaper. He and Olga were active in many anti-government causes, including advocating freedom for the Baltic states of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania.

"Olga Fedorovskii left Russia in April 1991 with the couple's two daughters, after an escalating series of threats on their lives. Alexander left in August, a week before the attempted coup.

The family spent two years in Germany waiting for permission to immigrate to the United States. They arrived in Twin Falls three weeks ago.

## Quake rattles Malad

No injuries or damage were reported.

# Senator's budget ax aimed at Martians

WASHINGTON — With his phrase "SET TO KILL," Nevada Sen. Richard Bryan attacked Martians on the Senate floor this week.

Well, at least verbally. The Democrat sponsored an amendment to kill a \$12.3 million program that uses a radio astronomy telescope to search for alien life forms.

"As of today, millions have been spent and we have yet to bag a single little green fellow," Bryan told colleagues Wednesday morning. "Not a single Martian has said 'Take me to your leader,' and not a single flying saucer has applied for FAA approval."

The 77-23 Senate vote showed overwhelming support to end the High Resolution Microwave Survey program, however the House must still approve the measure.

The program is sponsored by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, with taxpayers footing the bill.

This is the second time that the Nevada senator has tried to boldly go where no one has gone before. Bryan also killed the program last year in the Senate.

But critics charge that NASA revived the program by changing it from the Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence to today's label, A "horrendous case of bureaucratic arrogance," Bryan called it.

The program's manager, Gary

Coulter, said the name was changed when the program was shifted to another department. He said that was done by an order of Congress, "not as a thinly veiled method of obfuscation."

"The search for intelligent life in the universe is too important to abandon," Coulter said.

"We have found that the theme of E.T. — searching for life — is a compelling magnet for school children," he said. "Coulter was referring to the 1980s hit movie about an alien child left on earth, trying to call home."

Former Las Vegas journalist George Knapp, who reported the story of a scientist who claimed to work for the government on alien space crafts at the Nevada Test Site, said, "This is about the fourth year in a row that he's made a big stink about this program — all for purely political reasons."

"For less than the cost of a single attack helicopter, you can try to answer some fundamental questions," added Knapp, the Altamira Communications Group vice president.

Despite the criticism, Bryan is hoping the Senate-House conference committee will kill the funding for good.

"The Great Martian. Chase may finally come to an end," Bryan said. "It may be funny to some, except the punch line includes a \$12.3 million price tag to the taxpayer."

# Administration eases child porn definition

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Clinton administration has changed its definition of hard-core child pornography in a Supreme Court case involving videos of young girls who wore "scantily wearing" white-wearing clothes.

In a written brief filed this week, Justice Department lawyers urged the setting aside of a ruling that had upheld a Pennsylvania man's conviction in a five-year sentence.

He had been prosecuted under a federal law banning "exhibition" of a child's "genitals or pubic area." A federal appeals court upheld Stephen A. Knox's conviction and sentence for possessing certain videos, ruling that the law applies "even when these areas are covered by an article of clothing."

Justice Department lawyers last March had urged the high court to reject Knox's appeal, arguing that the appeals court "correctly found that including scantily clothed displays of the genitals within the meaning of the hard-core child pornography."

The brief had been filed before Solicitor General Drew Days took over as the administration's chief advocate before the Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court granted Knox's appeal in June, and will hear arguments in the case this winter.

The brief filed this week by Days

and other administration lawyers said the appeals court "utilized an impermissibly broad standard" for determining what is child pornography.

"While the court of appeals was correct in holding that complete nudity is not absolutely required ... the court erred in holding that simply focusing on the misdirection of a clothed body may constitute an 'exhibition' of the unrepined body parts beneath the garments," the government lawyers said.

The law, they said, "requires at least that the body parts themselves be discernible either through or beneath the clothing." They urged the justices to send Knox's case back to the Philadelphia-based 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for further study.

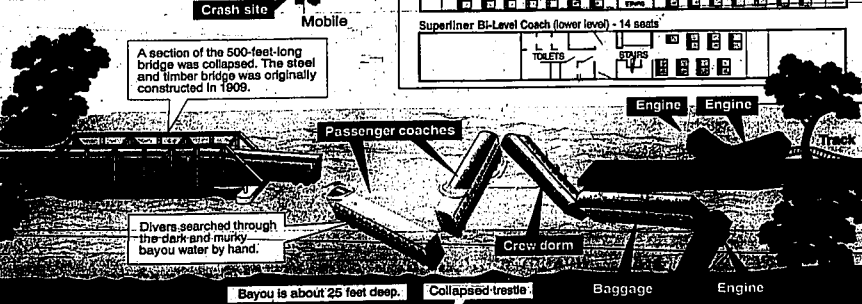

# Travelers' adventures end in murky bayou

Shirley Anderson didn't like being cooped up in a car, and lying flat her ears, so she took the new coast-to-coast train from Los Angeles to Miami.

Awfuling her at journey's end were her two beloved grandchildren. The tug of family and the prospect of a scenic rail trip also drew Jim and Janice McNab into celebrating their retirements with a Florida vacation. The highlight would be seeing their daughter, Heather, play in a college volleyball game in Gainesville.

Their separate adventures ended together in a horrifying plunge into an Alabama bayou in the middle of night.

Mrs. Anderson, 55, of Portland, Ore., and the McNabs, of Long Beach, Calif., were among more 40 people killed in the crash of Amtrak's Sunset Limited train early Wednesday.

"I'm on the verge of losing it," John Anderson, who learned about the wreck when he arrived at work Wednesday, said before his wife's death was confirmed. A co-worker was "just kidding me about it because he knew my wife was making that kind of trip," he said.

It was his wife's second train trip to Florida to see their daughter and

two grandsons in Gulf Breeze.

"She enjoys that kind of travel," Anderson had said. "She watches the scenery from her car seat; she can do what she wants to, she can move around. ... She wanted to visit her daughter and her grandkids and kick back and relax."

Anderson said he didn't make the monthlong trip with her because he didn't have enough vacation time from his printworker's job at the Oregonian newspaper.

His daughter, Terri, was waiting at the station in Pensacola, Fla., for about the derailment. She drove 50 miles to Mobile and was waiting at a hotel where survivors were being sent.

Mrs. McNab, 55, had left her job as an elementary school principal in June, following her 57-year-old husband into retirement.

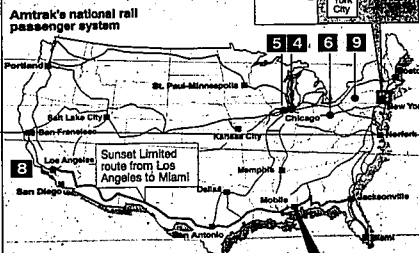
He quit his job as an administrative analyst for the Port of Long Beach in 1991, and was active in his union for 20 years.

"They were on a vacation-retirement trip," said son-in-law Jim Shaw.

The couple planned a three-week trip, stopping off to watch one of their three daughters play an important college volleyball game, said Marilyn Smith, Mrs. McNab's sister.

# Passengers recount terror of train wreck

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) — In the deepest hour of the dreary night, 5-year-old Carol Ann Newton slept protected in her grandfather's arms.

Dennis Stevens and his mother, returning from an Arizona vacation, dozed in their reclined seats. Australian Bob Bell peered out at the blackness of the Alabama bayou.

Then screeching wheels, mangled metal and desperate cries for help punctured the serenity aboard the Sunset Limited, an Amtrak train that became a death trap on its coast-to-coast run.

"There was a horrible noise and things started flying through the car. All the luggage was on the floor," said Dirk Capel, 60, a Dutch tourist making the trip from Los Angeles to Miami.

"I looked out the window and all I could see was water. I thought we were sinking. People were screaming, 'Oh, my God! Help us! Help us!'" Capel said hours after he was rescued from a passenger car stranded on a bridge to nowhere.

Capel, who had slipped off his shoes to get comfortable for the overnight leg, lost his luggage, money, passport and tickets in the wreckage. By day's end, he was wearing Red Cross-donated sneakers.

The nightmarish wreck occurred about 3 a.m. Wednesday, just minutes after the train's three diesel engines and eight cars had groaned out of the Mobile station.

About 10 miles north of Mobile, at a desolate stretch of backwater named Bayou Canot that is home to water moccasins and alligators, the train started across a 500-foot-long bridge built in 1909 of steel and timbers. Just an hour earlier, a 132-car CSX freight train with three locomotives

had negotiated the span without incident.

"But the passenger train's locomotives plunged off the bridge and exploded, sending flaming diesel fuel across the already horrific scene. Half the bridge was gone, and 16 feet of murky water had quickly swallowed a baggage car, a crew dormitory car and a passenger coach. A second passenger car also tumbled in and was half-submerged, its back end high in the air.

A third coach teetered on the ragged edge of the collapsed bridge but held. Behind it were a lounge car, a dining car and, at the end and still on land, a sleeper.

When the search was suspended because of darkness Wednesday night, 41 bodies had been pulled from the water. The search for the missing and for crew members presumed dead in the wreckage resumed Thursday. At midday, Amtrak and federal agencies were still giving varying estimates on the number of missing.

Dennis Stevens, 33, and his mother, Elvi, 69, were flipped from their seats and her leg was broken when their coach landed on its nose in the water. They had expected to be home in Orange City, Fla., by evening.

"We were asleep, and the next thing I knew we were in the water. It sounded like a big blast," Stevens said. "I pushed out a window and got out. Fuel was burning on top of the water. Smoke was everywhere. Then a tugboat came and threw some ropes to fish us out. You could hear screams."

In the same car were young Carol Ann Newton of Osyka, Miss., and her grandfather, James Augustus Jones. He smashed a window and

pushed the top to safety. Freeing others from the wreckage, Jones, 39, injured his neck and was hospitalized.

At the University of South Alabama Hospital in Mobile, nurses gave the child a Little Mermaid dress, pink slippers and a baby doll.

"Her first train trip and her last train trip," said her mother, Heather Newton. "No more trips away from Momma."

Bell, the 52-year-old Australian, chose Amtrak to see the "United States for the first time." He boarded in Los Angeles on Sunday night for the 3,000-mile, eight-state trip.

Late Wednesday, the exhausted Bell could barely react to a reporter's questions. "There was just lots of noise — banging, crashing," he said. Simon Grant of Reading, England, was also touring the United States, with a small group of countrymen. He had just nodded off to sleep.

"I heard this tremendous screech," Grant said. "The train stopped like a car hitting a brick wall. There was a lot of screaming and panic."

In the sleeping car at the rear of the train, Mary O'Donovan of Pensacola, Fla., was too far from the wreckage to realize at first what had happened.

"I thought we had hit another train. There was all this crunching, crunching, crunching noise," said Mrs. O'Donovan, whose knee was bruised when the wreck tossed her out of her berth.

When his seat lurched, Richard McClain, 65, of Carbondale, Ill., was snug asleep under his sweatshirt. He hasn't flown in airplanes for 12 years and thoroughly enjoys the rolling tracks. "It's the most relaxing thing I do," he said.

### Chicken protein may ease arthritis

WASHINGTON — A protein from chicken bones stopped the pain and swelling of rheumatoid arthritis for patients in a clinical experiment, and experts say the novel treatment holds promise for control of the crippling disease.

Dr. David Trentham, of Beth Israel Hospital and Harvard Medical School in Boston, said that a collagen solution made from chicken cartilage and swirled into patients' morning orange juice appeared to arrest the progress of rheumatoid arthritis in a small group that was studied. Trentham said that swallowing protein that is similar to the membrane of the joints "re instructs the body to cease the attack on the body's own joints."

### Senators denounce FBI for 1950s probe

WASHINGTON — Several members of the Senate denounced the FBI on Thursday after learning that it secretly collected information in the 1950s to paint then-Rep. Quentin Burdick as a Communist sympathizer. Senators also assailed Roll Call, a Capitol Hill newspaper, for publishing a story based on information obtained under the Freedom of Information Act about the FBI's activities concerning Burdick. Burdick died last year after serving 32 years in the Senate. "I would have thought that McCarthyism was dead," said Sen. Hank Brown, R-Colo. "This kind of activity is deplorable."

### Fixed-rate mortgages decline again

WASHINGTON — Interest rates on 30-year, fixed-rate mortgages fell slightly this week, remaining below 7 percent for the fifth consecutive week, the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp. said Thursday. This week's average was 6.95 percent, down from 6.96 percent the previous week but above the 28-year low of 6.82 percent two weeks ago. The rate started 1993 at 8.07 percent and declined for most of the year, except briefly during the spring when investors became temporarily nervous about inflation.

On one-year adjustable rate mortgages, lenders were asking an average initial rate of 4.34 percent, down from 4.36 percent last week.

### Iacocca attacks Perot's NAFTA stance

WASHINGTON — Retired Chrysler Chairman Lee Iacocca took on Ross Perot Thursday, saying the Texas billionaire has his facts wrong in his campaign against a free trade treaty with Mexico and Canada. "He's a good fellow, he's worth a couple billion dollars. I like him. But he's on the wrong side of the angels here," Iacocca told reporters after meeting with President Clinton.

The administration hopes that high-profile appearances by Iacocca can help counter Perot's campaign against the North American Free Trade Agreement. Iacocca said he has accepted Clinton's invitation to help the administration.

### Unemployment claims continue to rise

WASHINGTON — The number of newly laid-off workers filing claims for jobless benefits rose to a seven-week high last week, but analysts said the recent trend still suggests continued employment growth.

"The numbers are still running at a level consistent with more comfortable employment gains than we were getting previously," maintained Robert G. Dederick, an economist at the Northern Trust Co. in Chicago.

"The jobless claims data continue to point to a firming labor market," agreed economist Bruce Steinberg of Merrill Lynch & Co. in New York.

"Kids are taught that they're just animals and they're going to have sex — just use a condom," Allen said. "I'm willing to stand by God."

The campaign began in April as part of a Southern Baptist Convention sex education program. Youths were asked to enter into a pact with God before their parents, then in a more public setting at church "to be sexually pure until the day I enter a covenant marriage relationship."

## Pilot survives 9-day struggle in Alaska

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — It had become a weekly ritual. On his days off, Mike Legler climbed aboard his floatplane and took to the skies. As usual, he didn't tell anyone where he was going.

After a couple of hours traversing Kenai Peninsula and Prince William Sound the morning of Sept. 13, Legler said, he came in for a landing at a lake, within walking distance of Puget Bay. The plane's nose was pointed too far down.

"The next thing I knew, I was in the water and bleeding," Legler was unable to grab his emergency locating beacon before the gray and maroon Twin Otter plane sank, and he had to swim about a quarter of a mile to shore through nearly frozen water.

He crept ashore in remote surroundings — "that's kind of the end of the Earth out there." He had no survival gear or food. And his ordeal wasn't about to end any time soon.

Legler, 46, a Vietnam veteran and a mechanic for Alaska Airlines, was wearing a float vest over street clothes, with a flare gun, knife and matches tucked inside. A 45-degree wind was blowing hard in his face. "I was shaking so hard I could hardly stand up," he said.

He said he managed to build a fire by igniting the cellophane wrapper on a package of cigars. He burned some dry grass and then some wood. He dried his clothes and spent the night curled around the fire.

The next day, a walk west in

the direction of civilization along the beach ended at sheer cliffs. To the north was the Sargent Icefield.

Legler said he turned back and found a plywood cabin. An old carpet became his sleeping bag. Mussels and kelp from the beach provided his main diet, supplemented by some berries and roots from nearby forest.

"I would just dig up the roots and if they were too bitter to swallow, I would spit them out. Otherwise I ate them," he said.

Legler thought he could reach a nearby bay often used by hunters, but in the ensuing days found each path he tried was too steep or treacherous. "Every day I'd give up hope, and a couple of hours later I'd get some more hope."

Constantly, he heard the drone of rescue airplanes that did not exist.

Late Wednesday, nine days after Legler left his home in Eagle River just north of Anchorage, the sound was real. A Scenic Air Charters plane was coming in over Puget Bay to drop off two hunters.

"I just dropped everything and ran to the beach and shot off the flare gun," Legler said in a phone interview from the charter company's office in Moose Pass, 50 miles southwest of Anchorage. "I just thought: God, that's come along or I'd a been dead."

Legler said he is healthy and not in need of any medical attention. He said a forehead wound he suffered in the crash had healed.

## Aspin wants GOP amendment rejected

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Les Aspin asserted Thursday that House approval of a Republican-sponsored amendment on homosexuals in the military would undermine President Clinton's policy.

In a letter to House Armed Services Committee Chairman Ron Dellums, D-Calif., Aspin urged rejection of the measure that would reinstate questioning of recruits and service members about their sexual orientation.

The amendment, sponsored by Rep. Duncan Hunter, R-Calif., also would allow the military to ask whether an individual engages in, or intends to engage in, homosexual acts.

In January, Clinton directed the military to stop questioning recruits about their sexual preference, a decision backed by both the House and Senate. The directive is the centerpiece of the president's compromise policy, announced July 19.

Clinton's policy says homosexual orientation is not a bar to service, but homosexual conduct



Aspin said that for the troops in the field, the contentious issue has been resolved with senior commanders saying the uniformed men and women are comfortable with the new policy.

"The Hunter amendment would reopen this debate and would undermine the leadership of our senior military commanders on this important issue," Aspin said.

The secretary also argued that the president's policy has the full support of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and that the Justice Department believes the new policy can be more easily defended in the courts than the old policy of an outright ban.

The House planned to debate the issue late Thursday as it continues work on next year's

defense budget.

In addition to the Hunter amendment, whose outcome was considered to be close, the House was to consider a measure that would leave a final decision on the issue to the president and another that would reaffirm the Armed Services Committee's policy.

That plan, adopted by the Senate last week, toughens Clinton's policy, branding homosexuality an "unacceptable risk" to military morale and stating that a future defense secretary could reinstate the questioning about sexual orientation.

The House had scheduled votes on the three measures so the committee's policy would be voted on last, with a procedural rule that the last measure adopted would prevail.

## FEC tells Robertson to pay up

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Election Commission ordered religious broadcaster Pat Robertson on Thursday to pay back almost \$400,000 in disputed expenses from his failed 1988 presidential campaign.

The FEC voted 5-1 to order Americans for Robertson Inc. to repay \$290,794 to the U.S. Treasury and to refund \$105,635 to news organizations.

The commission found that

Robertson's campaign used public funds to defray nonqualified campaign expenses and exceeded spending limits in Iowa and New Hampshire. It also concluded that Robertson's campaign overstated news media for air travel.

Robertson — who would be personally liable if his campaign can't make the payments — has 30 days to decide whether to appeal Thursday's decision to the U.S. Court of Appeals.

### Idaho politicians run for cover on NAFTA

It's become pretty much the price of admission to Idaho politics these days to nod your head gravely and allow as how that danged North American Free Trade Agreement could wreck the state's sugar industry.

And why not? Sugar is a \$176 million crop in Idaho, and sugar-growers tend to be influential citizens in some of the counties that the next candidate for state or federal office is going to need to carry.

Moreover, sugar-processing workers in Idaho are organized, politically active and fighting mad — and firmly in the NAFTA will-send-my-job-to-Mexico camp.

U.S. Sens. Larry Craig and Dirk Kempthorne and Congressman Mike Crapo are feeling the heat. They now say they won't support the treaty without a side deal to protect Idaho sugar.

They want guarantees that if the Mexican soft-drink industry shifts from importing sugar to exporting high-fructose corn syrup, the extra sugar won't land on the U.S. market. In short, they're saying free the market, but protect us from its downside.

That's not economics; it's mythology. Idaho's billion-dollar agriculture economy depends, more than any-

thing else, on markets, and NAFTA would create the world's largest market, particularly for foodstuffs such as meat and potatoes, which Idaho produces in abundance.

Those are just a few of the persuasive points made this week by Twin Falls commodities analyst Alex Sinclair, who spoke in support of NAFTA to the Twin Falls Rotary Club.

The Idaho sugar industry, he pointed out, has nothing to fear from a Mexican sugar industry that can't meet its own domestic needs.

Nonetheless, Sinclair said, the Idaho sugar beet people have succeeded in scaring the bejesus out of Craig, Kempthorne and Crapo, who ought to know better.

The fact is that American companies will export billions of dollars more in good and services into Mexico if NAFTA is ratified. Idaho will be a player in that new market.

Unfortunately, protectionism is a venerable and cherished American tradition not because it's good policy, but because it's good politics. The NAFTA debate in Idaho, so far, is about politics.

We'd like to see the congressional delegation slow down on this one, re-assess its opposition to NAFTA and listen to responsible voices like Sinclair's.

## Don't hold your breath, Bill

Maybe there was this same electricity on the cold January day in 1935 when Franklin Roosevelt launched his plan for Social Security. But I doubt it.

Maybe there was the same excitement in 1965 when Lyndon Johnson, riding on sympathy for a slain John F. Kennedy, proposed Medicare and Medicaid.

I doubt that, too. Neither Roosevelt nor Johnson could tap the clout of color TV sets blazing coast-to-coast the glomour of a president's speech before a packed Congress.

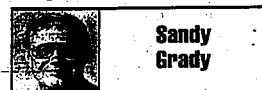
Now a young, inexperienced president, only middling in popularity, was daring to cap the New Deal with universal health care. Roosevelt wouldn't even try for it.

But none of this forewarns, not even the majestic FDR, could have used the electronic bully pulpit with more passion than Bill Clinton. Sure, we've snickered at Clinton's long-winded speaking style. "Do not operate heavy machinery while listening to a Clinton speech," was a standard joke. But somehow his 52-minute pitch for health-care reform seemed almost brief. Clinton was on fire. He did everything that grab congressfolk by the lapels and shout, "Damn it, you gotta pass this!"

And the same honorables who had bad-mouthed and baited him for eight months were on their feet clapping when Clinton said, "The health care system is badly broken, and we've got to fix it."

Even Republicans were dazzled by Clinton's powerhouse health-care sermon. "Best speech of his life," said Rep. Jim Leach, R-Iowa. "Persuasive, coherent."

There was a whiff of duplicity in Clinton's pitch. Like a salesman peddling a new car, he

Amazingly, the honorables even gave two standing ovations to Hillary Rodham Clinton, who bounced up smiling modestly in her blue jacket. Hard to remember that during the '92 campaign she was as popular as Lady Macbeth. Hillary, as health-care's co-author, drew more engulfing, sweet applause from Congress in one hour than controversial Eleanor Roosevelt did in a lifetime.

Ah, but this rollicking good will for the Clintons was the easy part. After all, what senator or congressman, especially with voters eyeballing him on the tube, wants to be against health-care reform?

So sure, the House chamber hasn't heard such cheering for a president since George Bush's Persian Gulf War conquest. Even the most misanthropic cynic couldn't sneer at Clinton's health-care crew — "security, simplicity, savings, choice, quality and responsibility."

Sure, sounds splendid. But Clinton was drawing us a dream palace that Congress' cheapjack carpenters may turn into a shack.

"He's over-selling." But Clinton knows Congress is going to write the health bill. He's going to be a cheerleader who keeps a fire-undoing these guys and gals," said Joseph Califano, ex-adviser for Johnson and Jimmy Carter.

There was a whiff of duplicity in Clinton's pitch. Like a salesman peddling a new car, he

glossed over the sticker price. Not until the last eight minutes did Clinton grapple hurriedly with the bottom-line riddle: Who pays?

He brushed over his idea of financing health reform with "savings" — not mentioning the \$340 billion he hopes to chip from Medicaid and Medicare. He casually noted "new taxes on tobacco," avoiding levies on blue-collar beer or yuppie wine. The numbers don't make sense: Clinton promised a Mercedes on a Yugo budget.

This pie-in-the-sky airiness leaves Clinton vulnerable. When Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., called Clinton's numbers "fantasy," Republicans joined the howling chorus.

"I heard a gold-plated salesman face 32 million uninsured people that will bankrupt the government," said Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas.

"It's the biggest marketing operation since New Coca-Cola," said Rep. Dick Armey, R-Texas. "But Americans aren't going to like the taste. More billions for bigger bureaucracy."

Sure, Clinton vowed to inundate applause a health plan by 1994. But politics will be intense as big plan grids through the Hill's sausage machine. Fred Wertheimer, of Common Cause, sighs, "It will be the big lobbying effort of a lifetime."

But one thought: It was enough that Bill Clinton ignited more electricity than Roosevelt or Johnson, that he dared go where Truman and Nixon failed, that he lit a blowtorch pakson.

But none of them had Hillary Clinton's velvet hand on the whip.

## Handcuffs set woman with hidden past free

Two stray bits of wisdom came to mind last week as Katherine Ann Power turned herself in.

One is a line from a folk song: "The only way out is through." The other is printed on a police mug: "No matter where you go, there you are."

Power is living both lines after 23 years of trying to be someone else. She faces her past not as a hero. Bravado died with Walter Schroeder, the policeman killed in the bank robbery she helped carry out with friends. She drove a car while the others entered the bank and fired the guns, but she is still responsible in the eyes of the law, in the eyes of the Schroeder family and in the eyes of perhaps the most unrelenting judge of all, her conscience.

The depression got so bad for the woman, who called herself Alice Louise Metzinger that she had to become Katherine Ann Power again. She had to tell her husband, her son and her friends in Oregon. She had to tell her parents, whom she had not seen since 1970. Then she had to tell Boston and the world.

The telling does not mean she is asking the Schroeders or us to forgive her. She is asking that we hear her. She is saying, "This is who I am and this is what I did." We can make whatever conclusions or condemnations we choose. That was her point in coming back — to take the punishment. Taking it is better than listening to "the still small voice," which can roar in

the eardrums, preventing sleep, peace and life if it is ignored.

We make our own hells on earth, and sometimes the most unlikely people are disintegrating inside. Alice Louise Metzinger, chef and restaurateur, cooking teacher who liked to make simple peasant dishes, hit bottom. There was no way out but through.

"This is not a glamorous tale, no matter what Hollywood wishes to make of it. This is a tale of human misery as old as the planet. One person does harm to another and the pain never ends. Not for the victims and not for a person on the run. The prisons of the mind are much darker than any jail."

"The truth shall set you free," says the Bible, and perhaps that is why Power smiled as she entered Suffolk Superior Court. She found her freedom in handcuffs.

No one is suggesting that she can erase the empty years for a policeman's wife and his nine children. But she can answer for them. She can hear the rage as we hear her confession. As she faces her past, people around the country face theirs, reflecting on the time of protest that

went much deeper than love beads and long hair.

It was often a terrifying time when young people bravely made decisions that took them down irrevocable paths — to a Canada; jail, the underground, war. Those decisions are still being second-guessed in many quarters and are the stuff of nightmares.

Former movement leader Jerry Rubin and Tom Hayden glibly dismiss the violence of those days by saying Power was not "in the movement." But she was, and she was not alone in taking her politics to criminal extremes.

The country was polarized, and demands were constantly being made to prove that one was a "loyal American" or "dedicated to the cause." Quiet voices were few, and people got lost.

Last week one person found her way back. She returns to the system she once wanted to destroy. Her lawyer in Boston participated in the peace movement. The circle closes.

As we witness the cathartic journey, we feel anger, sadness, sympathy, all of the above, or more. The best we can do is be honest about those feelings and try to seek the truth in her story and our own.

# Israeli parliament approves agreement with PLO

**JERUSALEM (AP)** — Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, defeating opposition calls for early elections, declared that he won "freedom of action" to pursue Middle East peace after parliament ratified the historic Israel-PLO accord on Thursday.

Rabin said the 61-50 vote allowed the government to implement the agreement on Palestinian self-rule in the occupied lands and continue attempts to reach peace with Israel's Arab neighbors.

"Now we shall build a new Middle East," Foreign Minister Shimon Peres said after the vote.

The margin was less substantial than Rabin had hoped for, but it put a convincing end to calls for early elections or a national referendum that would have slowed down the peace movement.

It also diminished fears that Israel would be torn by violence and political anarchy after recognizing the PLO, its bitter enemy.

U.N. spokesman Yasser Abed-Rabb praised the move as "a historic step" and said support for the treaty was larger in the street than in parliament.

Rabin staked the credibility of the peace initiative as well as the future of his government on winning the vote, saying it would constitute a formal vote of confidence.

Eight legislators, including three from the hard-line Likud bloc, abstained from the vote, and one was absent in the 120-seat Knesset, or parliament. The result clearly embarrassed Likud, which failed to enforce party discipline on the vote.

"There is no need for new elections. The parliament very clearly approved the agreement. The margin is very clear," Rabin's spokesman Oded Ben-Ami told The Associated Press.

Rabin said he will now focus on the painstaking task of establishing Palestinian autonomy in the occupied Gaza Strip and the West Bank town of Jericho, and on pursuing peace negotiations with Jordan, Lebanon and Syria.

"This gives the government freedom of action to implement the agreement with the Knesset," he said on Israel radio.

Ben-Ami voiced hope for the resumption of Middle East peace talks in Washington next month and

for detailed negotiations on what promised to be "a long and bumpy road."

Peres, speaking later on Israel television, said Israel and the PLO hoped to formalize their current unofficial contacts within two to three weeks, with the PLO naming several delegates for face-to-face talks.

Palestinian leader Hanan Ashrawi said one of the immediate issues would be the fate of about 13,000 Palestinian detainees held by Israel. Mrs. Ashrawi also said Jan. 1 "could be a target date" for PLO chief Yasser Arafat's arrival in the areas of future autonomy.

Rabin's opponents, who say the agreement would eventually lead to a Palestinian state and end Israel's existence, also prepared for battle.

Gonen Segev of the right-wing Tsomet Party said the hard-liners will now start "an information campaign" to force changes in the agreement.

"Our aim now is to guarantee no Palestinian state and guarantee that the settlements in Judea and Samaria will not be removed," Segev said.

using the Biblical names for the West Bank.

The right-wingers also charged that the backing of only 61 of 120 legislators showed the government had no mandate from the people.

Segev said Rabin's majority was "miserable" because it relied on five Arab legislators who "define themselves as Palestinians."

The prime minister had hoped to avoid relying on the pro-PLO Arab lawmakers, and there had been reports that he would call new elections or form a new coalition if he got a narrow victory.

But influential members of his Labor Party described the 11-vote margin as a victory.

The government was not required by law to get parliament approval for the accord signed Sept. 13 in Washington, but it is customary and considered necessary for the legislature to give a nod of approval on issues of historic consequence.

Rabin got a large margin of approval after five members of the ultra-religious Shas Party decided to abstain. The group's sixth member was overseas.

One of the three Likud members who abstained, Meir Shitreet, said the opposition party was making a mistake by opposing a peace deal backed by the majority of Israelis.

He said a total of seven Likud members backed the agreement privately.

## Croat village faces ethnic purge; government pressures U.N.

**ZAGREB, Croatia (AP)** — Croats clinging to their last village in Serb-controlled land are in danger of being driven out or killed in retaliation for a brutal Croat attack, a U.N. official said Thursday.

U.N. civil affairs chief Cedric Thornberry made the report as tensions rose once more between Croats and Serbs — enemies in a 1991 war that left Croatia independent from former Yugoslavia, but a third of its territory in Serb hands.

The Croatian government demanded that 14,000 U.N. peacekeepers, whose mandate expires Oct. 30, pack up and leave in two months if they cannot guarantee Serb-held land will be returned.

U.N. officials say new Serb-Croat fighting could break out if the U.N. buffer is removed, and the Croatian demand appeared to pressure tactics to wring out concessions.

Fighting between Serbs and Croats largely ended in January 1992, and ethnic conflict moved to neighboring Bosnia last year. But

warfare periodically erupts, and Thornberry said 117 ethnic Croats remaining in the village of Podlapanac were in danger of retaliation for a Croatian attack on nearby villages on Sept. 9.

"As we speak, Podlapanac is in danger of being ethnically cleansed. Thornberry, civilian chief of the U.N. peacekeeping force in former Yugoslavia, told a news conference.

Officials of the self-proclaimed Serbian Krajina Republic told the villagers of Podlapanac they were no longer safe, he said.

Croatian forces withdrew from the region under international pressure, and U.N. peacekeepers moved in. They found the villages of Dvovselo, Citluk and Početilo wrecked and torched.

The return of Serb corpses, many mutilated beyond recognition, was sending tensions spiraling, Thornberry said.

Thornberry visited Podlapanac, 24 miles northeast of Medak, on

Wednesday and said he found "panic has set in."

"They told me very clearly, 'We must go, it's the only thing that will give us peace of mind,'" he said. Most other Croats left the region during the war, leaving Podlapanac as the last sizeable Croat settlement.

The U.N. military commander, French Gen. Jean Cot, said 14 more badly burned bodies had been found around Medak this week; bringing the U.N.-counted death toll to 49. Serbs say at least 65 people were killed.

A beefed-up unit of Czech U.N. peacekeepers was patrolling Podlapanac around the clock, Thornberry said, but added that peacekeepers were faced with a dilemma that has become all too familiar.

"If you fail to support ethnic cleansing, you may sponsor murder and mayhem, you may cause the destruction you are actually trying to avoid," he said.

The marathon debate, which began Tuesday and lasted for 32½ hours, was punctuated by screaming and angry walkouts by opponents and supporters of the plan.

In Jerusalem, thousands of Israelis protested against the accord and hundreds of police were deployed around the Knesset to keep order.

## U.S. Coast Guard returns 297 refugees to Haiti

**PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP)** — The U.S. Coast Guard said Thursday it intercepted 297 Haitian refugees off Haiti's coast and returned them to their country, which has been hit this month by army-sponsored killings.

A 65-foot, "grossly overloaded," freighter was intercepted Tuesday 18 miles north of Cap du Mole in northwest Haiti, a Coast Guard statement said. The refugees were

turned over Wednesday to the Haitian chapter of the International Red Cross in Port-au-Prince.

Since a 1991 military coup that overthrew Haiti's first freely elected government, the Coast Guard has intercepted more than 40,000 Haitians trying to reach the United States. Refugees say they are fleeing army terror. Washington claims they are economic migrants and has shipped most of them back.

Human rights advocate Jean-Claude Bajeux said Haitians are becoming increasingly discouraged as they wait for the arrival of nearly 13,000 U.N. troops and the resignation of the city's repressive police chief.

Those measures, along with the Oct. 30 return of exiled President Jean-Bertrand Aristide, are part of a U.N.-brokered plan for the restoration of democracy.

Two aircraft strafed and bombed starving refugees lining up for rice Thursday at a food distribution center deep in the jungle, a U.N. official said.

Five people were confirmed killed and 48 wounded.

The wounded were to be evacuated by a U.N. plane, said Augustine Mahiga, chief of the U.N. High Commissioner-for-Refugees mission in Monrovia.

He said it was unclear whose aircraft bombed the crowd of people near a rice distribution center in Vahou, a rain forest village in northwestern Liberia's upper Lofa County.

"The attack was the most serious violation of a July 25 peace accord aimed at ending a nearly 4-year civil war that has killed more than 150,000 people."

The Lofa County region was once controlled by forces loyal to rebel leader Charles Taylor. They were pushed out four months ago by another rebel faction loosely allied with the government's army.

## 5 die in new Liberian fighting

**MONROVIA, Liberia (AP)** — There have been reports of skirmishes between the two sides, but neither side is known to have aircraft capable of bombing. The only known combat aircraft in the region belong to a West African coalition army sent into Liberia in 1990 to put down Taylor's rebellion.

The West African army, though accused in the past of firing on and even bombing relief convoys it claimed were aiding the rebels, would seem to have little reason to bomb a refugee camp during a fragile phase in the peace process.

The coalition, dominated by Nigeria, is anxious for the peace accord to succeed so it can pull out its forces.

The isolated jungle region is home to an estimated 100,000 refugees threatened with malnutrition and disease.

Hundreds of children are reportedly dying weekly.

The starving are among an estimated 250,000 people throughout Liberia threatened with death by malnutrition or related diseases.

The July 25 agreement was signed

by Taylor's rebels, the government army and the rebel group opposed to Taylor.

The plan called for formation of a transitional government, the disarmament of the rebel factions and democratic elections by next year.

The transitional government has been formed but has refused to take power until the armies are disarmed.

The West African coalition army is supposed to be expanded and carry out the disarmament under U.N. supervision.

The plan finally got a boost in New York on Wednesday when the U.N. Security Council formed a 440-person military observer mission to monitor the peace accord. It did not say when the mission would be deployed.

The war broke out on Christmas Eve 1989, when Taylor led an invasion aimed at toppling the dictator regime of then-President Samuel Doe.

Doe was killed by a rebel splinter group and the war degenerated into brutal factional feuding.

## Insecurity reaches Japan's auto workers

**SAYAMA, Japan (AP)** — One need look no further than the parking lots to see company loyalty runs high at the sprawling Honda Motor Co. Sayama plant.

Rebels, Accords, Civics — most shiny new — and many probably made right here — fill row after gravel row.

But ask the workers in this 6,400-employee bastion of blue-collar jobs how they feel about their jobs these days and they are likely to echo their American counterparts.

"Fuan," they may say. Insecure.

As Honda, like Japan's once invincible auto industry in general, struggles to survive recession and plunging profits, many of its employees feel they are being undercut. And they see some of the threat coming from American workers.

While U.S. auto workers fret over the possibility of losing work to cheaper foreign labor because of the North American Free Trade Agreement, similar concerns are beginning to be felt in Japan because of the surging value of the yen.

Already in the process of eliminating 3,000 of its 43,000 workers in Japan, Honda this week confirmed plans by March 1996 to produce all of its popular Accord and Civic models sold in North America at its factories in North America.

"To be honest, it's a blow to the pride," says Sayama plant worker Tadao Sanada, 48.

He spoke as he and dozens of other workers, clad in their white cotton overalls, swamped up a day's work in a working-class suburb of Tokyo.

"It just doesn't feel right for work to be going over to the Americans," he said.

Honda spokesmen stress that, in keeping with the practice of local production, Honda's factories in Ohio and Canada produce most of the two models already. Of 393,477 Accords

and 219,228 compact Civics sold in the United States last year, only 60,000 Accords and 70,000 Civics were made in Japan.

But they admit the decision to shift more production to the United States reflects the climbing value of the yen against the dollar, which raises costs in Japan and makes American labor cheaper.

The yen has risen nearly one-fifth in value against the dollar so far this year. The dollar's rise has cut deeply into export earnings industry wide.

Honda, for example, last month reported a 62 percent plunge in first-quarter profits. Toyota Motor Corp., Japan's largest car maker, saw its profits fall 26 percent in the fiscal year ended June 30.

"With an exchange rate of 105 yen to the dollar, it makes no sense to make cars in Japan and send them to the United States," said Honda spokesman Yoichi Harada. "We've been reviewing how to make profits at that exchange rate and this is one of the ideas."

Harada said the shift will be gradual and the job reductions done through attrition and decreased hiring, not pink slips.

Labor union officials say they are concerned that moving too much production outside of Japan — other automakers are expected to follow Honda's example — could have a "hollowing" effect on Japan's industrial base, a favorite Japanese criticism of the U.S. economy.

But the union so far supports the current plan since there are no layoffs involved.

Even though the Sayama plant is not directly affected, "to some young assembly-line workers the reductions and shifts are just another sign that the famed lifetime employment system enjoyed by their fathers may become a thing of the past."

"I guess it can't really be helped in times like these, but I'm worried about my future," said 22-year-old Isamu Owada, who like many other young assembly-line workers showed up for work in jeans and a T-shirt, his uniform stuffed into a rucksack slung over his shoulder. "I don't think of this as a lifetime job anymore."

"It's not that the Americans are our enemies," said another 22-year-old assembly-line worker, who asked to remain anonymous. "But they are taking our work."

## Kasparov, Short tie in chess

**LONDON (AP)** — Garry Kasparov and challenger Nigel Short fought to an exciting draw Thursday in the eighth game of their breakaway world chess championship.

Kasparov leads 6-2 going into the ninth game of the Professional Chess Association match on Saturday.

Short, who has often been the aggressor though he has yet to win a game, was two rooks down at one stage after a series of sacrifices.

Analysts regarded Short as having the initiative after a strong 20th move, giving up a rook for a bishop.

But Kasparov, the highest-rated player in chess history, infiltrated his queen into Short's position to force a draw by perpetual check after 41 moves.

# Yeltsin calls for elections, grows impatient with foes

MOSCOW (AP) — President Boris Yeltsin called for early presidential elections next June as signs emerged Thursday of growing government impatience with hard-liners barricaded inside the parliament building.

Yeltsin ordered Interior Ministry police to "secure" public safety after accusing his political opponents of distributing dozens of automatic weapons to anti-Yeltsin demonstrators outside the Russian White House.

Late Thursday, unidentified gunmen tried to storm the Moscow headquarters of the commonwealth military command, killing one policeman and badly beating a second before being repulsed. A woman was killed by a stray bullet, Interfax news agency said.

Postfactum news agency said the gunmen were hard-line army officers who support Russia's parliament. It was the first violent clash since Yeltsin dissolved parliament on Tuesday.

Yeltsin's foes seemed increasingly desperate and isolated, denied support by the people, the military and the international community after his decree Tuesday dissolving parliament. Lawmakers ordered the president to "surrender to legitimate authorities or leave the country."

Deputies later convened parliament in defiance of Yeltsin and voted to confirm earlier decisions by the smaller standing legislature to impeach him and name Vice President Alexander Rutskoi acting president.

Yeltsin moved to seize sole con-

rol of the government after 18 months of struggle with lawmakers over how to reform the economy and over whether to rule Russia: the president or parliament.

The political stalemate has paralyzed the government and crippled the economy. Fueled by fears of turmoil, the Russian ruble plunged 18 percent Thursday to a record low, trading for 1,299 rubles to the U.S. dollar.

More than 1,000 anti-Yeltsin demonstrators remained camped outside the parliament headquarters, known as the White House, for a third day. Small bands formed "self-defense units" and about a dozen carried assault rifles.

Russian TV described the atmosphere outside the White House late Thursday as "explosive."

Yeltsin warned lawmakers and their supporters that he would punish those ignoring his orders and those possessing weapons without permits.

"Dangerous weapons are falling into the hands of extremists, thugs, the mentally ill, criminals and mafia gangs, who have been gathering around the White House with the aim of getting uncontrolled weapons," presidential spokesman Anatoly Kravkov said in a statement issued on Yeltsin's behalf.

"This poses a serious danger to

people's safety," he added. "The Interior Ministry has been given directions on the assumption of a need to secure the safety of citizens."

The Defense Ministry claimed the hard-liners were preparing to attack the ministry, but the improbable claim appeared to be a possible excuse to crack down on the anti-Yeltsin forces.

Yeltsin expressed hope Wednesday there would be no violence.

"We would not like and do not intend to use any force," he said. "We want everything to go peacefully, without blood."

But Thursday, Dmitry Ardamatsky, a member of Yeltsin's press service, said officials would not rule out the use of force to disarm Yeltsin's opponents.

"It is my firm aim of reassuring Russians that he is committed to democracy. Yeltsin on Thursday called for presidential elections June 12, two years ahead of schedule. On Tuesday, he set elections to a new parliament for December 11-12 and said only that presidential elections would follow later.

Some critics had pointed to the lack of a date for presidential elections as proof that Yeltsin planned to establish a dictatorship.

Yeltsin said the presidential election would have to be approved by the new parliament, to be called the Federal Assembly.

"It was unclear if Yeltsin would seek re-election, although it is widely believed he wants a second five-year term. Yeltsin had said in the

past he would not seek re-election, but aides said he may run again.

Yeltsin was elected in 1991 to a five-year term.

Hard-liners in parliament said Thursday they would order presidential elections within three months, asserting Yeltsin had no authority to order an election.

Lawmakers said parliamentary

elections could follow the election of a new president.

Rutskoi said Thursday for the first time that he would not run for president in future elections.

Parliament speaker Ruslan Khasbulatov told lawmakers that "Yeltsin has concentrated in his hands tyrannic power, which is even worse than a dictatorship."

"His failed adventurist policy has brought the country to the very edge of civil war."

Khasbulatov urged lawmakers to visit factories and military academies to rally support among workers and cadets.

Still, life appeared normal Thursday in Moscow and other major cities.

## Saudis won't cut crude oil production

GENEVA (AP) — Staking out its position in a key OPEC meeting, Saudi Arabia said Thursday it would not reduce its oil production in the coming months to help lift sagging prices.

Hisham Nazer, the kingdom's influential oil minister, made his remarks upon arrival in Geneva for Saturday's meeting of the 12-nation Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries.

The producers, under pressure to halt the slide in oil prices, will be plotting production strategies for the final three months of the year.

Crude prices have tumbled to their lowest level in three years — since shortly before Iraq invaded Kuwait, a crisis that briefly sent

prices above \$30 a 42-gallon barrel.

The average price of an OPEC marker — an indicator of crude oil price trends — stood at \$14.78 a barrel last week, well below the group's \$21 target.

The price plunge has been blamed partly on excess production by Iran, Kuwait and several other OPEC members.

Nazer, whose country supplies about a third of OPEC's oil, said Saudi Arabia would not cut output below its current level of 8 million barrels a day. Overall, the nations are supplying about a million barrels a day above their July-September ceiling of 23.6 million barrels a day.

## Parliament votes to end whites-only rule

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — Despite cries of "traitor" from right-wing whites, Parliament voted Thursday to give blacks a role in governing the country for the first time.

President F.W. de Klerk's National Party used its overwhelming majority in the dominant white chamber of Parliament to ratify the power-sharing agreement reached with the African National Congress and other groups at democracy talks.

The vote was 107 to 36.

Immediately after the vote, Conservative Party leader Ferdinand Hartzenberg stood up and said, "The government has finally put its foot on the neck of apartheid."

He then led the pro-apartheid party's 36 grim-faced members as they walked out of the chamber.

"It is the beginning of the final abdication by the government to the South African Communist Party and the ANC, and we are going to do our utmost to prevent that," Hartzenberg said.

Under the agreement, all the 26 black anti-apartheid groups that participated in the talks can appoint a representative to the Transitional Executive Council. But several parties, including the

Conservative Party and the black Inkatha Freedom Party, the ANC's rival, said they would boycott the new council. The panel, essentially a shadow government, could begin functioning as early as next month. Constitutional Development Minister Roelf Meyer said.

While it will not have absolute power, the panel will have veto power over some government decisions — most importantly those involving increased use of the security forces to quell political unrest in black townships. It also will help oversee foreign, economic and national security policy and the holding of the country's first multiracial election on April 27.

"The ANC is expected to win the election and create the first black-led government in South African history."

Meyer, who presented the legislation in Parliament earlier in the week, faced a torrent of insults from members of the Conservative Party, who also tried unsuccessfully to hamstring the proceedings.

The debate shaped up as a bitter battle among Afrikaner brethren, laden with implied threats of

secession and civil war, over the future of the country ruled throughout its history by its white minority.

But supporters said, the granting of power to the black majority was the only way to quell the violence and economic decline that has wracked the country and put the country desperately in need of foreign investment and loans.

ANC President Nelson Mandela was expected to call for the lifting of the remaining international sanctions Friday in New York following the bill's approval.

"It's not only light at the end of the tunnel. The whole tunnel has been lit now," said lawmaker Jannie Mornberg, an ANC member who sits as an independent in Parliament. "I can smell freedom in the air."

Scores of police surrounded the parliament building in case of disruptions by right-wing whites, but the vote passed peacefully. Those watching included a former ANC political prisoner, Moe Mahanaj, one of a group of non-lawmakers allowed to watch the debate to ensure no major changes were made to the bill.

## Inmates say they were at killing scene

Last spring, the two were charged in Blaine County on burglary and grand theft, said Blaine County Prosecutor Fritz Haemmerle. They were later released on bond.

### Andrus testifies against Hells Canyon park

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Gov. Cecil D. Andrus testified Thursday before a House subcommittee in opposition to national park status for Hells Canyon National Recreation Area.

Speaking before the House Natural Resources Subcommittee on National Parks, Forests and Public Lands, Andrus said that national recreation areas are underfunded.

He also cited the need for a comprehensive management approach by the U.S. Forest Service. "Without a system-wide planning approach, the resources of Hells Canyon will be in jeopardy," Andrus said. "He said that establishing Hells Canyon as a national park 'would attract much greater numbers of people to a fragile environment and would further jeopardize the resources that park proponents also want to protect.'"

Andrus quoted former U.S. Sen. Richard Neuberger of Oregon, who said of Hells Canyon in 1937: "Why not leave this bit of unknown scenic splendor for those willing to be inconvenienced to see it?"

"Who wants it cluttered up with professional tourists, tired business men, jangling politicians, knickknack peddlers, and glum girls and boys?" Neuberger asked. "Surely it merits a happier fate than that."

Andrus served as Interior Secretary from 1977 to 1981 in the Carter administration.

The race was organized to raise money for a local effort to fight the snail's listing as an endangered species.

## EchoHawk questions bombing range effects

TWIN FALLS - Attorney General Larry EchoHawk said Thursday that he has "grave concerns" about a proposed Air Force training range in Owyhee County.

EchoHawk, who announced his candidacy for governor two weeks ago, said he "was worried about the environmental effects of the range, as well as its effects on sacred lands of the Shoshone-Paiute Indians."

That puts EchoHawk in conflict with the man he hopes to succeed: Gov. Cecil Andrus, who has pushed the training range as a way to help ensure the survival of nearby Mountain Home Air Force Base.

But EchoHawk, like Andrus a Democrat, said he would not make up his mind about the range until the Air Force releases an environmental impact statement on the proposal. That statement, originally scheduled to be issued in June, now is expected to come out sometime this fall.

Andrus' proposal for a state-owned range includes two sites totalling about 25,000 acres where planes from Mountain Home and other bases would drop more than 24,000 dummy bombs every year.

It also would include an electronic com-

bat range over most of southern Owyhee County where planes would fly as low as 100 feet off the ground.

"I do have some grave concerns about how that training range might affect the delicate desert environment down there," EchoHawk said before a noontime speech to the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club.

Members of the Shoshone-Paiute tribes also fear that the range would disrupt their sacred rituals and perhaps lead to the discovery and destruction of their holy places.

The tribes' home is the Duck Valley Indian Reservation on the Nevada-Idaho border, only a few miles from the proposed range.

EchoHawk described how, on a recent visit to the area, he stood on a cliff overlooking one of the Indians' sacred sites as two supersonic jets streaked by, only a few feet over his head.

"I turned to the tribal leaders and said, 'How did you plan that?'" he said.

Because state land would be used to create the range, the proposal will need the approval of the Land Board, EchoHawk and Andrus both sit on that board, as do Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa, State Auditor J.D. Williams, and Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans.

EchoHawk said he's told the governor not to count on his vote for the range proposal, although he added that, if the Land Board voted today, it probably would approve the plan.

The board probably will take action within six months, he said.

On other issues, EchoHawk: "I said 'reform measures coupled with some additional appropriations' will be needed to resolve the school-funding lawsuit against the state."

But the sums cited by the four dozen school districts in the suit - as much as \$250 million a year in additional state aid, plus the \$700 million in needed construction and renovation identified by an independent commission - are "out of sight and unrealistic," he said.

Said he would build more prisons if needed to relieve overcrowding at the state's existing penal facilities.

Although EchoHawk, a former Bannock County prosecutor, said he would look carefully at alternatives to prison time, "it will not be at the expense of the safety of the people of Idaho."

"The violent offenders, the child molesters, the drug pushers - we'll find a place for them," he said. "If that means building more prison space, I will do it."

## Ketchum sidewalk decision put off

KETCHUM - Proposed sidewalk construction in Ketchum is on hold for about a month.

In response to a suit by local restaurant owner Mike Martin, the city council decided Wednesday evening to postpone sidewalk construction on sidewalks, curbs and gutters.

The council instead set another public hearing on the project at 6:30 p.m. on Oct. 20.

Martin had sued the city claiming his attorney Ned Williamson was cut off and not allowed to present adequate background during an earlier public hearing on the proposed construction.

Two plans are proposed for Leadville Ave. where Martin's restaurant, the Kneadery, is located.

Both proposals eliminate a curb cut and on-site parking in front of Martin's business and call for diagonal parking on one side of the street and parallel parking on the other.

"The only difference between the two plans is which side of the street gets the diagonal parking."

Neither Martin nor his attorney attended Wednesday's city council meeting, however.

"The purpose of these meetings is for people to respond and work on the design," Councilman Tapp Cullen said. "They are open to every businessman and we are just trying to fulfill the wishes of the business community."

The current sidewalk improvement project was initiated by the Ketchum business community last winter.

"I think the plans represent a poor planning effort on behalf of the city," Martin said Thursday. "Parking is an enormous problem in Ketchum. Their plan eliminates parking in favor of sidewalks and that is not right."

## Oregon forest supervisor agrees to revise recreation area plan

The supervisor of Oregon's Willowa-Whitman National Forest announced on Thursday that he would direct a comprehensive revision of the management plan for the Hells Canyon National Recreation Area.

Congressman Larry LaRocco, D-Idaho, applauded Robert Richmond's decision during a hearing of the House National Resources Subcommittee on National Parks, Forests and Public Lands.

"They've been trying to work with an old plan developed in the early '80s," LaRocco said. "There was widespread opinion that the plan needed to be revised."

Forest Service officials were reluctant to revise the Hells Canyon management plan earlier because they believed it also would require revising the entire Willowa-Whitman plan. But LaRocco said that was not the case, and with public confidence in management of Hells Canyon strained, "I think it's useful to start over."

He said public comments would be solicited early in 1994 and a new management plan could be ready within a year. However, Willowa-Whitman spokesman Bruce

Kaufman in Baker City, Ore., said the process could take about two years.

Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus also submitted testimony to the House panel on Thursday urging a higher priority for national recreation area management and criticizing the disjointed way Hells Canyon resources have been handled.

"I believe the Forest Service needs to take a management approach that looks at the resources in a more connected fashion rather than addressing issues separately," Andrus said. "Without a system-wide planning approach, the resources of Hells Canyon will be in jeopardy."

The Forest Service has issued a draft environmental impact statement on recreational uses along the Snake River corridor through Hells Canyon. But LaRocco and Andrus said wildlife, logging, forest health, grazing, road building, trails and cultural resources throughout the recreation area also should be considered.

Andrus particularly pushed for federal funding to study how grazing allotments may be affecting bighorn sheep populations through disease.

But the governor, who oversaw Park Service operations as Interior

secretary from 1977 to 1981, joined LaRocco in opposing proposals to make Hells Canyon a national park. The congressman, a member of the subcommittee chaired by Bruce Vento, D-Minn., said it would be a mistake to shift responsibility to the Park Service from the Forest Service, where managers finally are learning the unique needs of national recreation areas.

"We need some new thinking and creative thinking for the '90s," he said. "We have to stop just providing bricks and mortar. We have to provide a management scheme that really looks at the splendor of the canyon and that whole recreation area."

Andrus said making Hells Canyon a national park would "attract much greater numbers of people to a fragile environment and would further jeopardize the resources that park proponents also want to protect."

## Former UI president has cancer

MOSCOW (AP) — Former President of Idaho University Richard Gibb is taking the offensive after being diagnosed with liver cancer.

Gibb and his wife recently splurged on a car to tour New England as summer turned to fall. Now he is busy with chemotherapy and learning everything about the disease to counterattack it.

"I'm a realist, but I'm not about to give up," 64-year-old Gibb said Wednesday. "I can't see the Northeast another time."

The story began in December when Gibb went in for a checkup with some pain in his abdomen. The pain was from an appendectomy scar, but doctors discovered a cancerous tumor on Gibb's colon.

Gibb had part of his colon removed. His surgeon said the cancerous type of tumor was slow growing. Gibb was told to check back in six months.

The professor of educational administration at Idaho went ahead with plans to take unpaid leave during the 1993-94 school year. Gibb went back to his doctor Aug. 27, and a CAT scan showed the worst: The cancer had spread unexpectedly to Gibb's liver. A biopsy later confirmed it.

But doctors have not pronounced a death sentence, Gibb said, nor have they rushed him into treatment.

He has taken an aggressive stand against the disease.

## Transportation board OKs \$106 million

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Transportation Board has approved \$106 million in road and bridge projects for next year, and a single project will take more than one-third of the money.

By far the largest project will be improvement of a busy, south-southeast Boise intersection, created by Interstate 84. It's scheduled to cost \$36.8 million.

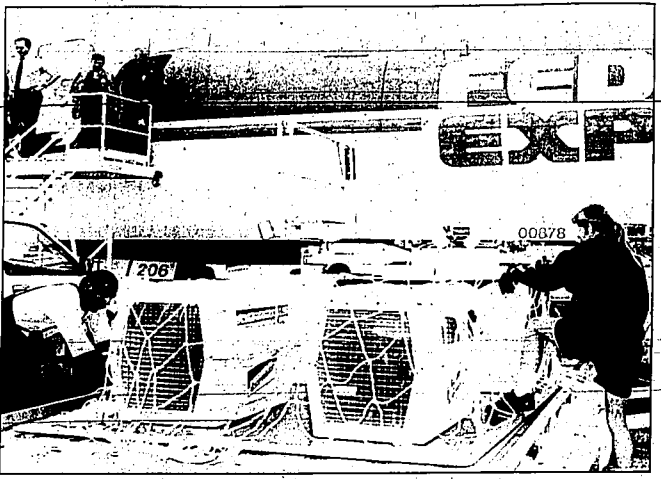
The Cole-Overland Interchange originally was planned later, but the Transportation Board elevated it in priority because of a huge increase in traffic volume in fast-growing southwestern Ada County.

The interchange will be realigned and reconstructed to improve safety.

A two-lane road west of Idaho Falls in Bonville County will be widened to four lanes in a \$4.3 million project. Four miles of U.S. 20 will be widened from New Sweden Road to Old Butte Road. A turning lane will be added.

Highway officials say the current two-lane highway connects many subdivisions to Idaho Falls. It's also a major route for travelers heading west from Idaho Falls to Arco and the central part of the state.

Transportation Board Chairman John Combs said the board does the best it can to weigh state highways needs, local priorities and economic impacts.

## California condors come to Idaho

BOISE (AP) — Twelve California condors hitched rides Thursday with the Air Force and Federal Express for new homes at an Idaho breeding site.

The birds were flown by a donated Federal Express charter from Los Angeles International Airport and seven birds were flown by an Air Force C-141 from Miramar Naval Air Station in San Diego.

"It's a pretty exciting day for us. These animals were on the brink of extinction," said Lora-LaMarca, a spokeswoman for the Zoo.

The planes touched down at Boise's Gowen Field shortly after 1 p.m. and were taken to the World Center for Birds of Prey south of the city.

"They arrived safely and were unharmed and were put into a room while they get accustomed to their surroundings," said LaMarca.

The six pairs from the Los Angeles Zoo and the San Diego Wild Animal Park were selected to represent all the critical breeding lines left in the condor's dwindling gene pool.

In prehistoric times, the range of the California condor extended through most of North America.

But there were only 27 California

condors left in the world when the last of the birds was taken into protective custody in 1987 for the captive breeding program. The world population is now 76.

"They've outgrown it here, so we had to send some to Idaho," LaMarca said.

Next year, scientists hope to open a fourth breeding colony in the Sutton Avian Research Center in Bartlesville, Okla.

There are still 33 California condors at the Los Angeles Zoo, 26 at the San Diego Wild Animal Park and five in the wild. "They are all doing fine," LaMarca said.

## For cost of moving, Idaho Falls man gets free house

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The sign in front of the small white house on an Idaho Falls residential street said, "Move it and it's yours."

Rusty Gerdes took the bait. Thursday, he started moving his new house seven blocks to where his old one sits.

Dozens of people called Landmark Distributing's office after Dave Bailey Sr. put up the sign two weeks ago.

Gerdes got the house because he was the only one who could move it quickly. The house had to be gone Thursday to make way for a new

warehouse and street expansion.

"We've been checking on houses for years, looking for one that's the right price, the right space, but nothing came together," Gerdes said. "This couldn't have worked out any better. Everything fell into place."

### New Fort Hall police chief takes over

FORT HALL — Fort Hall has a new police chief and a new policy toward citing non-Indian speeders on the reservation into tribal courts.

Vernon Alvarez, a 40-year veteran of the department, was named chief earlier this month. He replaces former chief Donald Davis, who has been reassigned as a captain.

"In looking at the situation and getting the appointment, I basically told the council that until state attorneys and tribal attorneys come to some kind of agreement, we won't cite non-members into tribal court," Alvarez said.

Tribal officers will patrol the Interstate. When a non-tribal driver is speeding on Highway 91, Indian officers will call the Idaho State Police or the appropriate county sheriff's office.

### Man claims drug charge is land grab

MOSCOW — A Riggin man charged with delivery of marijuana is defending himself in court and contends the state is trying to steal his Salmon River property from him.

"Before I'm finished, I believe you will know what really happened," Robert Nuckols told a jury in opening remarks at his felony trial Wednesday.

He is representing himself before 2nd District Judge John Bengtson. Deputy Attorney General Kevin Cassidy painted a different picture of Nuckols.

"The facts will show that the defendant was offered an opportunity to sell (drug) and he accepted the opportunity," Cassidy said. He said Nuckols, on Nov. 19, 1991, sold a pound of marijuana to an undercover informant.

The real issue, Nuckols said, is whether he was entrapped by drug agents.

### Boise Jews object to restaurant sign

BOISE — Some Boise residents and members of Idaho's oldest Jewish synagogue contend a nearby Subway restaurant sign is "insensitive."

That may be the case, city planners say. But the sign at the new Subway Sandwiches and Salads shop, next store to the Congregation Ahavath-Beth Israel, is perfectly legal.

"It's inappropriate outside a place of worship," said Boisean Burrey Wells about the 3-foot by 8-foot sign which sits three feet from the synagogue's property. "What's next? Are we going to have golden arches outside the Capitol building?"

Restaurant owner Bruce Belcher said he could have put in a much larger sign on a pole as high as the synagogue roof, but he chose the "monument" sign on the ground.

### LCSC students object to job cut

LEWISTON — The state Board of Education is pushing for cuts in administrative costs at the state universities, but Lewis-Clark State College students dislike one such decision on their campus.

In a Wednesday meeting with LCSC President Lee Wickerts, they bashed eliminating the student life director, William Bachman II. They suggested cutting the assistant to the president and the director of the arts and history center.

Presidential assistant Therese Hightower raises money for the foundation and arts center chief Leslie Esselburn organizes the Artists Series.

Bachman was cut as a part of the state board's push to channel \$91,346 from administration into instruction and direct services for students. His duties will be reassigned to others in student development.

### Port manager won't run for governor

LEWISTON — Port of Lewiston manager Ron McMurray has ruled out running for governor next year, but is leaving the door open to challenging incumbent Democratic Congressman Larry LaRocco.

Republican McMurray, 53, said he donated \$50 to LaRocco's campaign only two years ago.

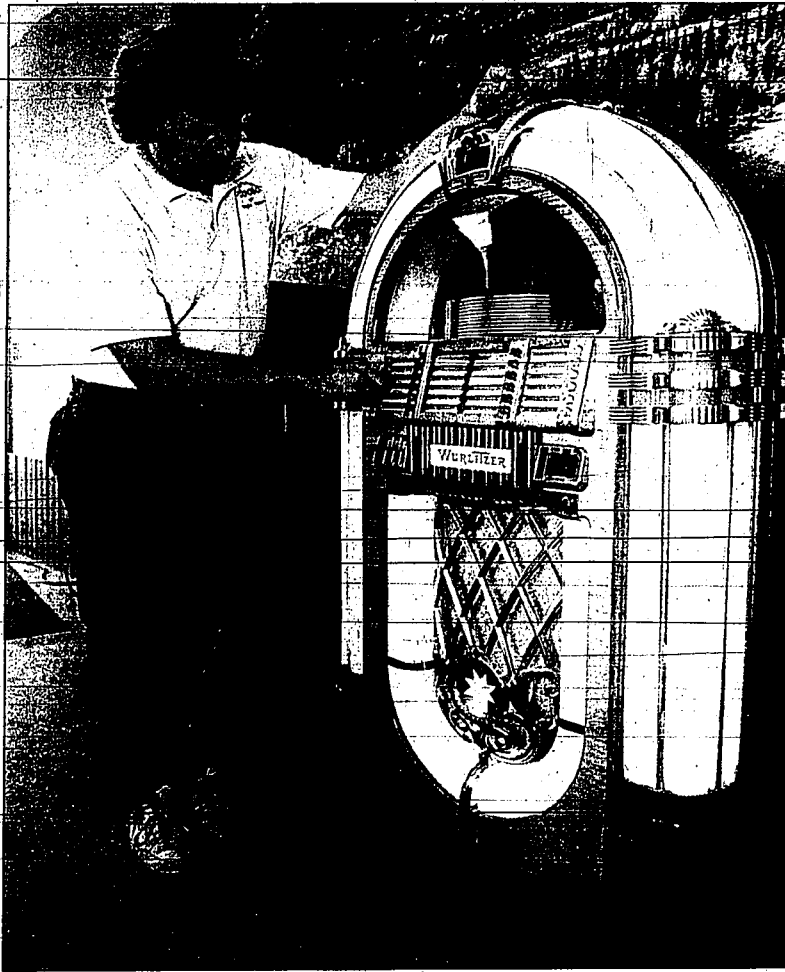

### Jukeboxes, those icons of American music, play on

TWIN FALLS — It's a slate-gray Wednesday midnight, about halfway between heartbreak and hangover, when the cowboy slides off his bar stool and into a booth nearby.

There's only a few people left in the place: three young women, shift workers from a food-processing plant, nursing Marlboros and killing longnecks; the bartender, a man, with a longhorn mustache and scowl to match; and the cowboy, who gives his name only as Bill.

One of the women turns in her vinyl-covered chair, smiles and nods, and Bill nods back.

"We're going to the Depot for ham and eggs," she says. "You wanna come along?" Bill shakes his head. He has a date with an angel.

At the end of the booth sits a jukebox.

Kevin Mahler bustles past stacks of 45s and boxes of software, like a man stuck between yesterday and tomorrow.

Mahler's Western Music Co. sells and leases video games and pinball machines, but the heart and soul of the business sits silently in the lobby.

It's a Wurlitzer 1015, and it was the Cadillac of jukeboxes back when Cadillacs had fins and you could play a record at 78 revolutions and a couple of pennies per minute.

"You find a machine like that in mint condition, it's probably worth \$15,000," Mahler says. "It's a collector's item. Even if you find one that's beat-up, it's probably worth \$3,000."

The six dozen jukeboxes that Mahler rents and services in Magic Valley bars and restaurants are really just variations on that Wurlitzer, even the non-nonsense machines that eat dollar bills and play CDs, yielding neither change nor remorse.

"I haven't worked (Idaho senators Dirk Kempthorne or Larry Craig into my act yet," Russell said in a phone interview earlier this month. "But that Dirk Kempthorne has a great name."

The Twin Falls appearance is part of a 40-city tour. Between gigs, Russell writes his material — on the road.

# Steely Dan on the road again after 19-year hiatus

When MCA Records recently released a CD version of the Steely Dan compilation album "Gold," one of the extra tracks was a live version of the song "Boschitzava."

This perked the ears of more than a few folks, because, as longtime Dan devotee Dick Johnson, 51, of Bloomfield Hills, Mich., notes, "The terms Steely Dan' and live' are oxymoronic."

That is so. Tired of one-nighters, of opening for heavy metal bands and playing in Honolulu one day and Miami the next, Steely Dan called it quits on the concert circuit after a July 4, 1974, gig in Santa Monica, Calif.

After that, group leaders Donald Fagen and Walter Becker retired to the studio, where for the next seven years they put together such durable hits as "Reelin in the Years," "Do It Again" and "Peg."

From that point on, Dan was never really a band with a set lineup. Fagen and Becker used a slew of hired guns as they concentrated on making a sophisticated blend of pop, blues and jazz that would make them one of rock's most highly regarded and top-selling bands.

Now the Dan is back — despite Fagen's 1991 claim that, "in my mind Steely Dan was really a part of the '70s, and I'd just as soon let it lie there."

Following on the heels of last summer's New York Rock 'n' Soul Revue, which reunited Fagen and Becker on-stage and caused audiences to demand Steely Dan songs, the two are touring again as Steely Dan, opening their first tour in 19 years Friday night at in Auburn Hills, Mich.

Becker also produced Fagen's new album, "Karmakrillard." And after a Becker album is released next year — with Fagen contributing and, perhaps, producing — there will be the first album as Steely Dan since 1981's "Gauch'o."

"It's Walter and myself," says Fagen, 45. "We're doing this as a team. We're just trying to be honest about it as to the various names that we call these things. For us, not that much time has elapsed. Steely Dan time is a whole different kind of time. It doesn't really exist."

So to us, there was no break. It's all on a continuing basis. Despite sporadic musical projects, however, the duo spent much of the '80s battling personal demons. Becker moved to Hawaii and kicked

a debilitating drug habit. Fagen, meanwhile, suffered a post-Dan depression that drove him into therapy. The result, he says, was a "personal metamorphosis. ... I'm just more comfortable with myself. I know I would be more fun and would help me a lot if Walter was there, too."

Fagen's "Karmakrillard" was the impetus for the Steely Dan reunion. "Just before I went in," the singer and keyboardist says, "I realized it would be more fun and would help me a lot if Walter was there, too. Becker wound up playing guitar and bass, finally taking credit as producer of the album."

But Fagen cautions that despite the collaboration, "Karmakrillard" should not be viewed as the new Steely Dan album.

material together, wrote songs together and collaborated on the entire project," he says. "On this one, all the songs were done by the time Walter became involved."

It was the New York Rock 'n' Soul Revue tour that reminded the pair just how well the Steely Dan songs have worn over the years. my life," says columnist Bob Meyer in the Chicago Tribune. "Although I have never considered it until right now, I suppose it has been a source of comfort to me no matter what else changes."

With calloused fingers, Bill sifts through the play list, slowly turning the metal selector taps as you might the pages of your grandmother's Bible, like a sinner in Isiah.

"We have a huge stock of 45s, and some of our clients have very specific play lists they want," he said. "We can still get most records, but it's a challenge, sometimes, when you get a record you need by someone and you wonder, 'whatever happened to this guy?'"

tenth as large as it was at its peak in 1950 — is the only remaining major user of 45s, and the day may come when record companies decide it's just too expensive to press them, Mahler said.

"The number of CD jukeboxes is growing all the time, and you can get sound quality on CD machines that you could never hope to get from a conventional jukebox," Mahler said. "But to a lot of people, it's just not the same."

Bill pushes his hat back on his head with a thumb and forefinger, and his shoulders slouch visibly. He douses his cigarette in two fingers of Coors, and he hangs his head and cries.

Mahler recently installed jukebox systems in the Burger Kings in Twin Falls and Burley, and he's hopeful that the multi-shop market of a generation ago isn't lost forever.

"I think there's a place for jukeboxes in the kind of restaurant where people go and sit and talk," he says. "That's kind of the trend in the restaurant business, to place like coffee houses."

Much of the appeal of jukeboxes, he concedes, is the lure of things retro, of an era when it took a Ruben Goldberg-like apparatus to play you

two and a half minutes of the Platens.

"I think there's a real fascination with the music," Mahler says. "There were some great songs, and people who'd go into a place just to hear them."

## Michelle Shocked: Intense, passionate, deadly serious

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Draped in a pink feather boa with a feathery, glittering top hat, Michelle Shocked prances playfully around the stage to an old disco standard.

Then she lets the audience in on "The Secret to Having a Good Time."

"It is, she says, "learning not to take yourself so seriously."

But don't be fooled. Offstage, the singer-songwriter is intense, passionate and deadly serious.

For those who don't yet know her,

Shocked, 31, is a two-time Grammy-nominated artist whose acoustic guitar and folksy sound has earned her a reputation as one of a new breed of folk artists. Not one to be pigeon-holed, however, Shocked has changed genres like most people change clothes.

As of late, she is the purveyor of a brand of music she's dubbed "funk" — a folk-funk crossbreed that gets audiences grinding and shaking. During a three-month test run of clubs with her band, the Casualties

of Wah, the new sound reportedly has met with enthusiastic response.

Onstage Shocked is radiant. She grins and grooves her way through a performance full of funked-up folk and blues-rock tunes. She plays guitar and mandolin. She jumps up and down. She tells stories.

In private, however, talking between bites of dinner, it's obvious she has more on her mind than having a good time. She's got a purpose.

Russell and his wife, who keeps books for her husband, have raised three children in Washington. They now have two grandchildren. ("All civilians, except for a 4-year-old grandson who shows some promise in stand-up comedy.")

"We live right in the city of D.C. If you listen close, you can hear the sirens. No, I shouldn't say that. That just reinforces the stereotypes — and we want to be a state just like every one else."

Russell recently returned to the lower 48 after a stint on location in Alaska, filming an upcoming PBS show set to air in February.

"They lowered a piano from a helicopter on top of a glacier, and I played it there," Russell said.

The next segment of the "Mark Russell Comedy Special" will be shown on PBS Nov. 17.

After that, he'll continue with political funny business as usual.

At 61, Russell has no plans to retire.

"A comedian can keep on going until it just gets pathetic," he said.

# Negotiating, navigating with Clint Garth Brooks rules country, pop charts

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Oh, the woes of a mainstream, nice-guy, country music superstar.

Your tours are sponsored by a beer company, so you do "Don't Drink & Drive" commercials for balance.

You grew up on James Taylor and Jimmy Buffett, and fantasize of making a blues album blowing the harmonica, but your career depends on staying "decidedly country."

A lawsuit with your former manager probably will be resolved in front of the world, courtesy of cable's Court TV.

You marry a beautiful TV star — Will you adore female fans understanding?

Even in a quick phone call before a recent Los Angeles benefit performance, Black, 31, seems unshaken, accommodating.

"I'm a very compartmentalizing person," Black said. "I can say, 'This is the way it is and I can live with it.'"

Black puts his new album, "No Time To Kill," in one of the good compartments. His goal for it is modest, yet demanding on him.

"I want to be on country radio," Black said. "I see a lot of people benefiting from the new audience that country music has, and I'm really fighting the urge to exercise some of the freedom we have now."

He decided when I made "Killin' Time" (his first album) that I was a country artist. I have everything Steely Dan ever made, Stevie Ray Vaughan, Merle Haggard, George Strait. I really run the gamut musically, but I want to be decidedly country.

"I'm not trying to walk a line. I think there's a place for everything out there. I feel like I'm now in my place."

Black wrote one song, "Happiness Alone," on the new album with his hero, Jimmy Buffett.

A Buffett recording of a Mac McAnally song called "It's My Job" buoyed Black through eight years as a struggling club artist in Houston.

"It used to really bring tears to my eyes when I was trying to make it," Black says, "and I used to ask myself, 'Why do I have to want this?' So his music has really meant a lot to me over the years."

Black says he has tried to incorporate some of Buffett's approach to songwriting into his own work.

"He has a way of taking a serious subject and

making his point, but at the same time you can't help but smile a little. It's gravity with mercy.

"I wish more people would enjoy his music. It's the same with James Taylor. His last three albums are his best. Great stuff, and so many people are missing out is the way I look at it."

Black's fans don't seem to be missing him, having handed him three platinum albums and pushed "No Time to Kill" into the Top 20 on the Billboard album chart.

But there's still the task of protecting his wholesome, amiable image.

His summer tour is sponsored by a beer company, which Black says helps keep ticket prices down. But he also took an opportunity to do a public service announcement. "We reminded people to not only think when you drink, but to take a designated driver," he says.

More of a problem was Black's decision last year to leave Bill Hamm, the manager that guided him from a club act to the top of the charts.

"I'll probably be on Court TV — they've already called," Black said. "But I'm happy about it."

"It's like somebody's running your company and you're not happy with them — you have the right to fire them. And it's not a pretty thing, but it's so usual. I would really like for everyone who wants to know to be able to understand why I did what I did."

# PayCheck's taken the hard road to redemption

TWIN FALLS — Twenty years ago, country singer Johnny PayCheck recorded a hit song titled "I'm the Only Hell My Momma Ever Raised." For a while, he really was.

Born Donald Eugene Lytle in 1938 in Greenfield, Ohio, the aspiring entertainer was playing guitar at the age of 6 and working clubs at 15. He borrowed his name from a favorite heavyweight fighter.

Soon, PayCheck was recording hits like "Don't Take Her, She's All I've Got," "Slide Off Your Sash Sheets" and "Take This Job and Show It." He racked up six gold albums, a Grammy nomination and 33 hits in a row.

He was also drinking heavily and using drugs.

When a bar fight led to a much-publicized aggravated assault conviction, PayCheck received a 7-to-9½-year sentence, which he began serving in 1989.

He was released in two years for

being a model prisoner.

While in prison, PayCheck kicked alcohol, cocaine and nicotine. He also obtained his GED. (He had dropped out of school in seventh grade.)

"I stepped back and looked at myself," said PayCheck, who stopped by Twin Falls on Wednesday between shows at Cactus Petes. "I've been clean for five years now."

Not only that, PayCheck is encouraging others to do the same.

He helped organize the Johnny PayCheck National Drug and Alcohol Crisis Hotline, and he spends a sizable chunk of his time visiting adult learning centers, talking to students about the importance of education.

On the road 10 or 15 days a month, PayCheck spends the rest of his time at his hilltop home in

# 'The Good Son': Mac the knife

"The Good Son" was the subject of what is known in show business as a forced booking. Muscular Culklin's father reportedly refused to allow his \$8 million son to appear in "Home Alone 2: Lost in New York" unless young Mac was hired to play a homicidist boy in "The Good Son." Of course, 20th Century Fox acquiesced.

Perhaps papa Kit Culklin wanted to wear his boy away from type-casting and demonstrate his versatility. Well, it sometimes works for an adult star to slip into villainy (Gregory Peck, "The Boys From Brazil"), Michael Douglas in "Wall Street"). But a child actor? Pretty perilous.

This variation on "The Bad Seed" then begins with the death of Mark Evans (Elijah Wood) mother in the Southwest. His father (David Mark Evans) must leave for a business deal in Japan, and he drives to his brother's house in Maine, where Mark will live until the father's return.

It seems like a normal family, although the mother (Wendy Crewson) still grieves for a young son who drowned mysteriously in a bathtub. Mark soon discovers that his cousin, Henry (Macaulay), is

weird. He dangles Mark from a treehouse, shoots a dog with a homemade missile launcher and causes a multicar pileup on the expressway.

Now Henry casts his eye on his bothersome younger sister (Quinn Culklin). Mark sees the danger, but he can't convince the adults; they believe he is deranged by his mother's death. After the girl is nearly killed while ice skating, her mother's suspicions are raised. The climax comes with a cliffhanger — literally. (This is not revealing any secret; the ending is telegraphed throughout the film.)

Can moviegoers accept the "Home Alone" kid as killer Henry? The preview audience in Westwood tittered at his most menacing moments. To give him credit, Macaulay qualifies as an accomplished actor, no matter his age. But it may be impossible to accept the image created in two blockbuster movies.

Elijah ("The Adventures of Huck Finn") fares much better in the sympathetic role of Mark. His knowing, adult-size eyes convey all the boy's incredulity, terror and frustration that his warnings are not

heeded. Wendy Crewson adds much-needed compassion to the mother who slowly realizes her son's nature.

Jan McEwen's script is straightforward, with no attempt to psychoanalyze how Henry got that way. The direction by Joseph Ruben ("Sleeping With the Enemy") seems fitful and hurried. A Hitchcock touch would be needed to pull off "The Good Son." (Twin Cinema)

"Cliffhanger" (R) Renny Harlin (Die Hard 2) certainly knows how to direct action, but to appreciate the exciting stunts that Sylvester Stallone and company pull off you have to endure heinies audistie enough to unverte the old Marquis and the kind of story and dialogue that would look undernourished in a comic book. Very slickly done but never John Litgow or "Northern Exposure's" Janine Turner can give it any dramatic heft. (Grand-Vu Cinema)

"The City" (PG-13) Dr. Richard Kimble (Harrison Ford) never stops to catch his breath, and neither would you if fearsome U.S. Marshall Sam Gerard (Tommy Lee Jones) was on your trail. A crisp and jolting melodrama that screws the tension pitilessly tight, director Andrew Davis' superadrenalized version of the old TV show about the innocent man simultaneously fleeing the law and trying to find his wife's murderer is one movie more that delivers on its expectations. And watch out for one hell of a train wreck. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

"Hard Target" (R) The long-awaited English-language debut of Hong Kong action master John Woo stars kick-happy Jean-Claude Van Damme as a loner who faces off against Lance Henriksen, a droopie who organizes hunts where men with more money than sense stalk and kill the human animal. The result is very much of a mixed bag, a serviceable introduction to Woo's dazzling way with even John Woo, but not up to the standards of his best work. (Jerome Cinema)

"Heart and Soul" (PG-13) A Big Time Cinema movie from the "City of Angels" team (director Ron Underwood, co-writers S.S. Wilson and Brent Maddock) about ectoplasmic chums, fact and finding the soul — or souls — within you, with Robert

Downey Jr. shining in the "All of Me" five-four role of a callous yuppie, surrounded by four spirits seeking last-minute redemption. The rest of the cast — Alfie Woodward, Charles Grodin, Tom Sizemore, Kyle Sedgwick and specially David Paymer — are ace too ... though the movie's jokes aren't especially vital, its romance dubious, its heart is in its "Where are you want in its pocket" (Motor-Vu Drive-In)

"Jurassic Park" (PG-13) The poor little rich kid of this summer's movies. Enormous amounts of money and attention have been expended on making the film's half-dozen dinosaur species awfully impressive (though much too intense for small children) but very little has been done to make any of the puny human beings equally involving. In fact, when the big guys leave the screen, you'll be tempt-

ed to leave with them. Another case of \$60 million worth of special-effects churning two cents worth of characterization and story. (Twin Cinema)

"The Man Without a Face" (PG-13) Mel Gibson makes an impressive directorial debut with this sensitive and subtle story about a friendship that develops between a fatherless 12-year-old (Nick Stahl, a wonderful actor) and a disfigured recluse (Gibson). Minor reservations aside, it's a solid, thoughtful accomplishment. (Twin Cinema)

"The Real McCoy" (PG-13) The hero here is a recently paroled burglar who gets forced into doing one last elaborate heist with under duress — which, coincidentally, is also just the condition under which Kim Basinger appears to be enacting her part. Her performance continues to be a lost art, and this Russell Mulcahy-directed one is miscast, mechanical and, despite occasional attempts at broad humor, joyless. (Motor-Vu Drive-In)

# 'Much Ado' gives Shakespeare his due

Filmed versions of plays by William Shakespeare, if faithfully performed, have always been deemed inaccessible by mainstream movie audiences, which is why the most successful versions of "Romeo and Juliet," "The Taming of the Shrew" and "The Tempest" were titled "West Side Story," "Kiss Me Kate" and "Forbidden Planet."

As a Hollywood story reader might put it: "The guy has a good feel for plot and character, but you can't understand a thing anybody says."

Kenneth Branagh seems determined to change Shakespeare's popular appeal by making his plays look, feel and sound as if they were written for the modern screen, while keeping their period settings and dialogue intact. The British actor-director began by turning "Henry V" into a vividly moving costume action drama and continues, brilliantly, with the airy romantic comedy "Much Ado About Nothing."

For those who are only willing to give Shakespeare one chance as a screenwriter, this is the chance to take. There is music, high and low comedy, treachery, deception, whimsy, tragedy and not one but two love stories, engineered in both cases by the charming matchmaker Don Pedro (Denzel Washington).

One romance stars Branagh and his wife, Emma Thompson, (the Oscar-winning best actress from "Howards End") as Benedick and Beatrice, a couple smothering their romantic feelings for each other behind a barbed verbal rivalry. Their words may cut each other to the quick, but their hearts are not

Only when Don Pedro devises a scheme to make Benedick and Beatrice think each is in love with the other do they declare themselves.

The other romance, which controls the flow of the story, is between the young count Claudio (Robert Sean Leonard) and Beatrice's cousin Hero (Kate Backinsale), whose courtship, begun again by Don Pedro, is nearly undone by slander.

On the eve of their wedding, Don Pedro's evil half-brother Don John (a dazed Keanu Reeves) stages a liaison to convince Claudio that Hero is a wanton woman and prompts him to denounce her at the altar. (You have never seen a wedding fall apart like this one.)

However, all's well that ends well, as someone once said, and though "Much Ado" flirts with tragedy, it never strays far from romance and farce.

# 'Striking Distance' runs down 'The Fugitive'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The new Bruce Willis movie "Striking Distance" took in \$2.7 million in its debut weekend to knock "The Fugitive" out of the No. 1 box office spot for the first time in seven weeks.

"The Fugitive," which grossed \$7.1 million during the weekend, has taken in \$154 million since its August release.

While the two action-packed movies had audiences gripping armrests, crowds also packed theaters showing Martin Scorsese's elegant treatment of the Edith Wharton love

story "The Age of Innocence." Showing at only 83 locations nationwide, "The Age of Innocence" placed sixth in the box office derby with \$2.3 million in receipts, or \$27,919 per location. "Striking Distance" had a \$4,609 per-location average.

Also doing well in limited release was another literary adaptation, Disney's "The Joy Luck Club," based on Amy Tan's novel of four Chinese families. In its second weekend at seven locations, it earned \$38,093 per location.

In third place was the Kathleen

Turner-Dennis Quaid film "Undercover Blues" with \$2.9 million, followed by "True Romance" with \$2.6 million and Mel Gibson's "The Man Without a Face" with \$2.5 million. "Jurassic Park" was seventh with \$2.1 million, raising its 15-week total to more than \$322 million.

"Sleepless in Seattle" was eighth with \$1.42 million. "Into the West" opened with \$1.1 million for ninth and "The Real McCoy" took in \$1.38 million to round out the top 10.

Sydney hosted the world amateur boxing championships in 1991 and was main center for 1993 World Youth Soccer Championships. It annually hosts international tennis, rugby and cricket events.

### IOC bypasses China for safe, serene Sydney

**MONTE CARLO, Monaco** — Stability prevailed over political risk Thursday when Sydney edged Beijing for the right to hold the 2000 Summer Olympics.

In selecting Australia's picturesque harbor city, the International Olympic Committee returned the world's biggest sports spectacle Down Under for the first time since the 1956 Melbourne Games.

"I believe it was a sporting choice, not a political choice," said Primo Nebiolo, an IOC member from Italy and head of track and field's world governing body. "In the end, the members preferred Sydney because it was a candidate which presented no problems and created no criticism."

Beijing, considered the slight favorite, led in three of the four rounds of secret balloting by the 89 IOC voters. But the competing cities of Istanbul, Turkey; Berlin; and Manchester, England, were eliminated, votes swung to Sydney and enabled it to defeat Beijing 45-43 on the final ballot. One voter did not cast a ballot in the last two rounds.

The decision was announced live to a worldwide television audience by IOC president Juan Antonio Samaranch.

Moments later, fireworks exploded over Sydney Harbor, and an estimated 100,000 people who gathered on the waterfront greeted the dawn with champagne and blaring horns.

"I've got sore smile muscles," said Australian heptathlete Jayne Flemming, one of the thousands who stayed up all-night in hopes of a Sydney victory.

In choosing Sydney over Beijing, the IOC went for the safer candidate, a glamorous, cosmopolitan city with superior sports facilities and technology.

"We know this is the perfect decision," said IOC director general Franco Carrard. "The Olympic movement is in good hands."

Beijing had offered the powerful symbolic impact of holding the Games of the

## IOC gives collective sigh of relief after bid battles end

From cheers by the Opera House in Sydney to tears near the Great Wall in China, Thursday's selection of Sydney as host of the 2000 Olympics brought amusement, befuddlement and some anti-American feelings from the competing cities.

"I've got sore smile muscles," Jayne Flemming, an Australian heptathlete, said as she celebrated with 100,000 others in Sydney after the IOC decision was announced in Monaco.

When giant television screens showed IOC president Juan Antonio Samaranch proclaiming Sydney the winner, 900 pounds of fireworks filled the Australian sky. It was 4:30 a.m., and it was time to party.

The Sydney Morning Herald rushed out a special edition with the headline: "It's Ours!" Boasted the rival Daily Telegraph-Mirror: "We've Won!"

In Beijing, the mood was somber. Expected to win despite questions about human rights and the city's infrastructure, the Chinese capital was caught off-guard by the rejection. A few, who thought they heard Beijing announced as the winner, broke down in tears when the result was relayed.

"I couldn't believe it. I just couldn't," said He Jin, among 800 people at a Beijing party. "They should have given China this opportunity. It seems they are prejudiced against China."

Some in the crowd blamed Beijing's de-

feat on U.S. congressional efforts to sway the IOC on the human rights issue.

"The United States definitely has responsibility," said a 35-year-old man identified only as Yang, who was among those at Tiananmen Square, site of a deadly anti-democracy crackdown four years ago. "The United States has so much influence, I don't believe they don't have influence at the IOC."

The official line was more forgiving.

"We don't blame god or man, or give

## 4 Ketchum athletes will test strength, iron will at Ironman

**KETCHUM** — Four Ketchum athletes have qualified to compete in the Ironman Triathlon on the Kona Coast of Hawaii on Oct. 30.

The annual event, which features 1,400 of the world's best athletes, requires 2.4 miles of swimming, 112 miles of bicycling, and a 26.2-mile run consecutively. Winners reach the finish line in less than nine hours.

Dr. Greg Taylor, 39, will be competing on the Kona Coast for the fourth time, hoping to improve on the strong finish he made last year. His times and placing in three previous runs have improved significantly, from 9:58 and 83rd place in 1990 to 9:10 and 41st place in 1992.

This year his goal is to make the top 25 out of 1,400 and to get his finish time down to 8:50. A radiologist at the Wood River Medical Center in Sun Valley, Taylor started competing in triathlons in 1989 after moving to Ketchum. He placed 10th in "The World's Toughest Triathlon" in Lake Tahoe, Calif., that year, which qualified him for the

Hawaiian Ironman after competitors with higher placings passed on the event.

This year Taylor qualified at the Lanzerote Ironman in the Canary Islands at the end of May.

The Hawaiian Ironman is the most prestigious and exciting of all the world's triathlon events, attracting up to 10,000 spectators and worldwide media coverage.

"If you take all the excitement and hoopla of 10 top races and rolled them into one, that might be what it's like," Taylor explained.

## Ballesteros, Azinger share mutual distrust

**SUTTON COLDFIELD**, England — They are the souls of their 12-man Ryder Cup teams, Seve Ballesteros of Europe and Paul Azinger of the United States. They embody competitive grit. They extend their arms tentatively. And it just happens they have a history of mutual distrust and distrust.

If there are Ryder Cup rivals, they are prototypes. If the luck of the draw has any sense of humor, they will be paired against each other early and often in the set of five matches in the 30th Ryder Cup on Friday through Sunday at The Belfry.

They passed an olive branch during an air-clearing conversation late 1991, when Ballesteros said, "This is like old toilet water. Let's flush it." They both now say publicly that there are no problems, that they respect each other. But they will not be confused as close friends or, as Azinger says, dinner mates. Especially at a Ryder Cup. Too much rubble remains.

They have clashed in each of the last two Ryder Cups, in 1989 at The Belfry and in 1991 at Kinwah Island, S.C. In the 14-14 tie in '89, when Europe retained the Cup, Azinger beat Ballesteros in a tense final-day singles match, 1-up, after which Ballesteros complained that

Azinger got an unfair, favorable drop from a hazard on the 18th hole.

Tom Watson, the U.S. captain, knows the history. And he likens Azinger, the 1993 PGA champion, and Ballesteros, winner of the British Open three and Masters twice, to two magnets with the same polarity.

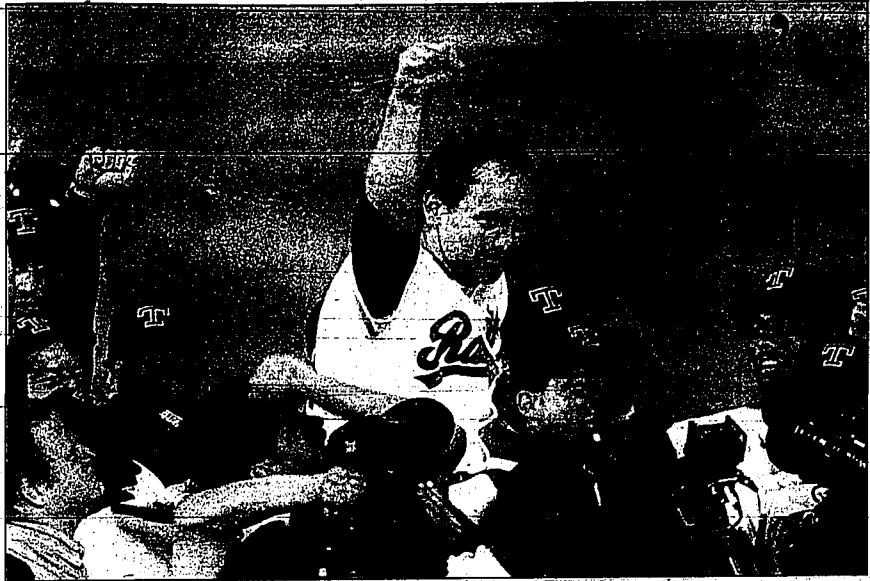

## From his small-town beginnings, Ryan blossomed into America's baseball star. He belongs to us all.

ARLINGTON, Texas — Baseball doesn't produce old-fashioned heroes like Nolan Ryan anymore.

This long, tall Texan is one of a kind, from his blinding fastball which produced seven no-hitters to his aw-shucks modesty.

He drove pickup trucks instead of sports cars, said "Yes Ma'am" and opened doors for ladies, wore cowboy boots instead of Nikes, and defended his honor code with his fists, like a wagon train boss.

He didn't stay out late at night unless he was at a baseball game, fiddle with drugs or alcohol, chase women or get paid for beer commercials.

He never failed to show for a game, question a manager's authority or give 100 percent effort.

He didn't throw firecrackers at fans, spray bleach on reporters or knock over a food table in a clubhouse rage. He never renegotiated a contract after he signed on the dotted line for what he thought was fair.

He stayed around after tough losses to take the heat and unselfishly gave his teammates credit when he won.

He sat patiently for hours in a hot sun signing hundreds of autographs during spring training.

look in his eyes when he took the mound was a puppy dog around his wife, Ruth, who stole his heart in Alvin High School.

An animal-loving Ryan probably would have been a veterinarian if scout Red Murff hadn't discovered him. Murff saw something beyond his wild pitches and lanky cowhand looks.

Ryan was a small town boy with a big league ambition. He never changed but baseball record books did.

Lynn Nolan Ryan, all 6-foot-2 and 150 pounds of him, was the boy you'd like to have your daughter meet or the man you'd want for a neighbor.

Ryan loved his kids and always felt guilty because he was on the road so often. He felt he had it easy just pitching baseballs.

"Ruth did a great job raising 'em," Ryan would say. "She's a great mom. She was the one who had the workload."

Ryan's baseball foundation was Ruth. She once said, "I knew I'd have to choose baseball or a divorce. I chose baseball."

Ryan, like most fathers, was always worried about how his profession might taken away from his relationship with his kids.

A Major's man and a fan favorite, Nolan Ryan is an old-fashioned American hero. Whether he's celebrating with teammates after his seventh no-hitter, above, or teaching Chicago White Sox's Robin Ventura a lesson after charging the mound, the Texas Rangers pitcher never let anyone down not even if he retires early from injuries sustained in Wednesday's game against the Seattle Mariners.

On road trips, he told fans to line up outside his hotel and he signed autographs. Nobody ever went away disappointed.

Ryan was from a small town in Texas, yet he was America's baseball star. Nolan belonged to us all. Everyone claimed him, from Maine to California.

He never let 'em down. He was our role model, whether he wanted to be or not. Nolan did.

For almost three decades, fathers took their sons to see him.

They knew their sons never would learn to throw a baseball like Ryan. They just hoped they would learn to act like him when they were grown.

Sometimes they would see him make baseball history, like his 5,000th strikeout or his seventh no-hitter.

Sometimes he would fall and not retire as a batter, like he did three times in his career. He handled success and misfortune with the same class.

He was a man's man and the fan's favorite.

He could be as tough as the cactus-dotted land he ranches in south Texas.

Young Robin Ventura of the Chicago White Sox tested the 46-year-old Ryan this summer by charging the mound. It was Ventura who pitched the no-hitter as Ryan clamped him in a headlock and delivered blow after blow in his leaguer's ear.

Dave Winfield had given Ryan's rough time once and Ryan vowed never to get the short end of a ruckus again.

Yet, the man with the gangster

In 1991, Ryan pitched in an exhibition game against son, Reid, then a freshman at the University of Texas. Later, Ryan admitted he wished he hadn't because he felt it put too much pressure on Reid.

"That was too much," he said.

Ryan decided in February this would be his last season. He wanted to do things with his family that he could never do before, like take his daughter, Wendy, to Six Flags Over Texas; or take the boys on a fishing trip to Montana.

Ryan talked about a perfect exit.

"I'd love to pitch in a World Series again," he said. "I pitched in one to start my career (with the New York Mets). It would be a great way to finish up."

History will record that Ryan didn't get everything. His arm of iron finally blew out on a West Coast trip in a game the Texas Rangers desperately needed to stay in a pennant race.

But let's remember what he said, back in February.

"It's been a good run and the no-hitters have been great, but I've paid the price by missing time with my family. It will be good to be able to take a summer vacation."

Ryan will get those summer vacations now and let him enjoy them in peace.

As Bob Hope said: "Thanks for the memories."

Anyone who ever saw Ryan pitch or give an autograph to a child would say he's earned his vacation.

## Blue Jays roll over Red Sox

TORONTO — Roberto Alomar drove in three runs with a homer and two-run triple and Dave Stewart allowed three hits over seven innings Thursday night as the Toronto Blue Jays inched closer to their third consecutive AL East title with a 5-1 victory over the Boston Red Sox.

The Blue Jays have won 10 of 11 and hold a 5½-game lead over the second-place New York Yankees and six games over the Baltimore Orioles, both of whom were idle. It also reduced the Blue Jays' magic number to clinch the division to five.

Stewart (11-8), who held the Red Sox hitless until Scott Cooper singled to lead off the fifth, allowed one run, struck out three and walked three for his third straight victory.

Nate Minchey (1-1) allowed five runs and five hits — three of them homers — over 6 1/3 innings in his third major league start. He struck out three and walked three.

## Angels take chance on injury-prone ace

**NEW YORK (AP) —** Joe Magrane, released by St. Louis last month, is guaranteed \$3.5 million under the two-year contract he agreed to Tuesday with California, and the deal could be worth \$13.4 million over four years if he's healthy.

Magrane, a left-hander who has pitched in just 33 big league games since 1990 and spent 399 days on the disabled list in six major league seasons, is guaranteed \$1.5 million in 1994, \$1.5 million in 1995 and a \$500,000 buyout in 1996, according to figures obtained Thursday by The Associated Press.

Lawyers for management and players and even agents were incredulous that the Angels would make such a large guarantee to a player with such an injury history, although the guarantee language does have some provisions that are health contingent. Magrane missed the 1991 season because of elbow surgery and spent 147 days on the disabled list last year because of elbow and shoulder problems. He was disabled for 19 days in 1987, 46 days in 1988 and 13 days in 1989.

Milwaukee Brewers president Bud Selig, chairman of the ruling executive council, said the signing didn't detract from his argument that baseball has financial problems.

"The fact that somebody signs a player to a contract doesn't obviate economic problems," Selig said. "No individual deal ever does that. You have to run your business as you see fit."

Magrane was released by St. Louis on Aug. 15 and signed with California five days later. He was making \$738,000 under the contract he agreed to with the Cardinals on Jan. 18 and was paid an additional \$310,000 in bonuses. Because he was released, California was able to sign him for just \$24,555, a prorated share of the \$109,000 minimum.

## Burkett leads SF in 7-0 rout

HOUSTON — John Burkett became San Francisco's first 20-game winner seven years and Barry Bonds had three doubles and two RBIs Thursday night to lead the Giants to a 7-0 victory over the Houston Astros.

The Giants, who have won six of seven, remained 2½ games behind first-place Atlanta in the NL West as the Braves reduced their magic number for clinching the division to eight with a 6-3 victory over Montreal.

Burkett (20-7) allowed three hits over eight innings in the Giants' second straight shutout of Houston. He allowed four baserunners, none past first, with two strikeouts and no walks. Kevin Rogers pitched a hitless ninth.

Burkett is the third pitcher in the major leagues to win 20 this season, joining Jack McDowell of the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta's Tom Glavine. The last San Francisco pitcher to win 20 games was Mike Krukow who was 20-9 in 1986.

## Galarraga homes in on NL batting honors

**DENVER (AP) —** With 10 days to go, it looks like Andres Galarraga is a lock to win his first National League batting title, and the first for a Venezuelan and a player on an expansion team.

After going 2-for-3 Wednesday night in Colorado's 11-4 victory over San Diego, Galarraga was hitting .383 and Tony Gwynn of the Padres was second at .358.

"I don't want to think about it yet," Galarraga said. "I don't want to put that kind of pressure on myself. I just want to go out there and get my hits."

Gwynn, a four-time batting champion (1984, 1987-89) and has been sidelined since arthroscopic surgery on his left knee on Sept. 12 and hopes to return this weekend. But he doesn't think he can catch up.

"The way Galarraga is going, it isn't going to matter anyway," Gwynn said. "I just want to play."

Galarraga, who has missed 41 games this season because of hamstring and knee injuries, needs 31 more plate appearances for the 502 required to qualify for the batting title. Still, even if he falls slightly short, he figures to win because the extra hitless plate appearances that would be added on wouldn't lower his average below Gwynn's.

"You have to wonder what this would mean to him — or to his country," Rockies manager Don Baylor said.

Galarraga, 32, was an All Star for Montreal in 1988 and made a comeback with the Rockies after four disappointing seasons. He has driven in a career-high 94 runs, tying the record for a player on a first-year expansion team set by Frank Thomas of the 1962 New York Mets.

Baylor says his major concern is with Gwynn, not with Galarraga.

"That other guy coming back, that's what worries me," Baylor said. "That other guy has four on his shelf somewhere."

**White Sox 7, Angels 1**

ANAHEIM, Calif. — Ron Karkovic homered, doubled and drove in four runs Thursday to help Jack McDowell snap a three-game losing streak and lift the Chicago White Sox over the California Angels 7-1.

The White Sox stretched their AL West lead to six games over the Texas Rangers, who were off, and reduced the magic number for their first division title since 1983 to five.

McDowell (22-10), who leads the major leagues in victories, pitched a four-hitter, struck out five and walked two in his 10th complete game this season. He allowed an RBI single in the second to J.T. Snow.

Chicago, with an AL-leading 46 road wins, went 7-3 on their road trip and

won 3 of 4 against the Angels. When they began the trip to Kansas City, Oakland and California, they led Texas by 3½ games.

The White Sox return home to play the Rangers in a three-game series beginning Friday, and can clinch the division title with a sweep.

Bobby Witt (13-16) outpitched Appier, allowing one run and five hits in eight-plus innings, striking out a season-high 11 and walking two. Dennis Eckersley pitched the ninth for his 34th win in 44 chances.

Appier (17-7) pitched five scoreless innings before an RBI single by Brent Gates in the sixth. Appier gave up two runs in seven innings, struck out five and walked four. The previous club record was a 31-inning streak by Bert Sabershen in 1989.

George Brett's 17th home run gave Kansas City the lead in the sixth, but Oakland tied the score in the bottom half after Jerry Browne's leadoff double, a ball left fielder Kevin McReynolds lost the lead run as he beaked toward the warning track.

Mike Aldrete walked one out later and, Gates singled.

**Braves 6, Expos 3**

MONTREAL — Greg Maddux bested Dennis Martinez, and the Atlanta Braves beat the pitcher they almost traded for last month, defeating the Montreal Expos 6-3 Thursday night.

Pugh (9-15), the top loser on the pitching staff, struck out five and allowed just one hit in his streak that was one shy of the major-league high this season.

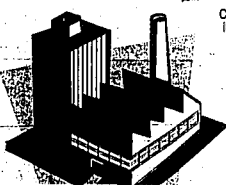

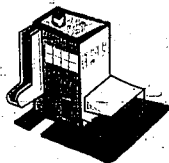

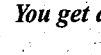
Health alliance

Most businesses and consumers will get their health coverage through new, not-for-profit state-run health alliances in each state. These will operate as giant insurance-purchasing pools. Consumers will be able to choose from a variety of health plans offered by insurers, doctors and hospitals. The alliance will use its clout to force these health plans to deliver quality care at the lowest possible price. To keep costs down, there would also be limits on how much the insurers could raise premiums each year.



#### LOW COST

Consumers would pay no deductibles; just \$10 to visit a doctor and nothing for a hospital stay or lab test. But if they chose to see a doctor not on the plan's approved list, 40 percent of the bill would come out of their pockets.



#### HIGH COST

The high-cost plan would make individuals pay the first \$200 of medical bills and families \$400, then 20 percent of all subsequent doctor, hospital or laboratory bills. They could choose any doctor without penalty.



#### COMBINATION

The combination-cost plan would feature low out-of-pocket costs if patients went to approved doctors, but stick patients with 20 percent of the bill for going "out of network." Costs and coverage would vary accordingly.

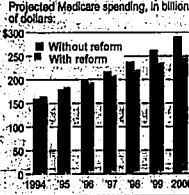

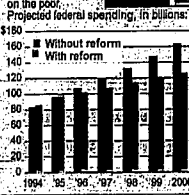

## Initial figures raise skepticism

President Clinton wants to provide medical coverage for everyone and have money left over. To some, that looks too good to be true.

"What Clinton has in mind doesn't strike me as being realistic on the financial side of it," said Dick Haeyen, former chief executive officer of Allstate Insurance Co. "The president's goal of reforming national health care is admirable and correct," said Haeyen, executive-in-residence at the Center for Health Economics at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. "But to say that we can do this and save money in the process is a little bit hard to swallow."

Haeyen is not alone in his skepticism over the White House's numbers. Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., called them a fantasy early this week. "They won't last," predicted the chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

The Clinton plan envisions, from 1994 to 2000, savings in Medicare, Medicaid and other federal programs totaling several hundred billion dollars. "It also assesses more payments for insurance premiums and new taxes on cigarettes and alcohol. Together, this is to produce not only health care reform, but also what Budget Director Leon Panetta called a "hook" for budget reduction" of \$91 billion. That is surplus money that would be applied to the federal deficit.

Some outside observers say such projections are built on fragile assumptions that medical costs can be strictly controlled. "If one is to assume the cost containment work, then maybe the (overall) numbers work," said Elaine Church, a health benefits an-

alyst with the Price Waterhouse accounting firm in Washington. "If one is to assume the cost containment numbers don't work so quickly, then the numbers fall apart."

The Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget, a nonpartisan group devoted to deficit reduction, sound-

ed a pessimistic note. "Without specific, implementable measures to reduce spending... it is highly unlikely that the anticipated savings will result," committee officers said in a

memo this week. "As a consequence of optimistic assumptions and the absence of any real budget enforcement, it is likely that both spending and deficits will exceed the amounts estimated."

Some of the administration's finer details concerning health care dollars are yet to come. "There may indeed be some adjustments that will have to be made as we again revisit these numbers," Panetta said this week.

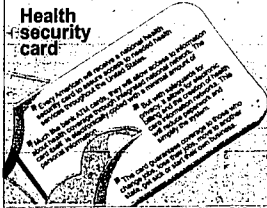
Also awaiting release are many specific proposals on savings from Medicare and Medicaid. They are expected to include increased co-payments, limits on hospital charges and a shifting of the poor to new health care alliances.

If the Clinton administration can rein in the growth of Medicare and Medicaid, it will have confounded history.

When Congress passed those programs in 1965, the estimated cost of health care for the poor and aged was less than \$7 billion a year.

In 1993 Medicare and Medicaid will cost the federal government \$226 billion. By 1998, with no reforms, that spending is projected to rise to \$406 billion, a 79 percent increase over five years.

The Clinton plan calls for containing increases to less than 5 percent per year. But from 1980 to 1990 Medicare costs averaged an annual rise of more than 12 percent.

# Crazy about Country

## Public goes hog wild over industry's permanent presence in prime time

This week, as one network executive joked, CBS stands for the Country Broadcasting System.

Five hours of country music programming will air on CBS, possibly an unprecedented dose of prime-time network country.

Such a rush of country on a broadcast network is a sign that the country has gone country more than country has gone mainstream. And there are reasons to believe that television helped make it so.

For three hours, Clint Black and Vince Gill host "The 27th Annual CMA Awards," the Country Music Association's answer to the Grammys. Friday night some 40 stars will be featured in the two-hour "A Day in the Life of Country Music."

The "CMA Awards" will dole out only 12 awards, with the three hours heavily loaded with performances. "Day in the Life" follows performers in 81 locations, all in the same 24-hour period.

"I remember back in the late '70s, early '80s, if any country artist was going to be on a TV show, everybody would get together and watch, because it was going to be such an unusual occurrence," said Ed Benson, executive director of the CMA, country's Nashville-based trade group. "Now you can hardly turn on any music show without country being there."

—Yes, Johnny Cash had a couple of variety shows and "Tex-Hon" an former, a more durable TV presence now. And it's not just the specials, Benson said. Country

music has made other inroads.

"Northern Exposure" is an example of a show that uses country music in its background music, as well as other types," Benson said. And there are regular appearances by country artists on talk shows. Disney and Tribune Entertainment have country shows about to debut or in the works. And can the next Garth Brooks show be more than a few weeks away? —What has made country music so mainstream as to become a fairly regular feature of prime time? Or, as Ken Krager, executive producer of "Day in the Life," would put it, what has prompted mainstream America to gravitate to country music?

### Youth factor

To start with, there's the youth factor.

"The last half-dozen years, there's been a shift in new artists, younger than the previous generation—of superstars," Benson said. "They relate to scores of young people all over America in a direct fashion. That's important. Growth is coming in all directions, but certainly younger fans are a big part of it. It's reflected in music sales, because they are active buyers, and active concert attendees."

"In addition, these young, attractive artists have not alienated any of the core audience.... You go to concerts and see

three generations at the shows."

Country radio remains a central vehicle to the popularity of country music, with 2,200 in-the-air, making country the largest radio format in the country, Benson said. "Country stations are Number One in 57 of the top 100 markets in the country," he said. "It's a powerful format delivering lots of listeners."

Krager gives a nod to country radio in "Day in the Life," letting several country-deejays carry the show's narrative.

### Video shortens road to success

The emergence of the music video has helped give television a role of its own in the country explosion.

"The impact of TV, especially music videos, has been an important part of the rapidity with which artists can establish themselves," Benson said. "That's been a big part of the last five years. Now you can quickly get a big new talent can break through."

Time was, a country artist might spend a long time on the road before gaining a large audience. Now there's instant exposure on The Nashville Network.

Country Music Television, a cable channel specializing in country-music videos, is in 20 million homes, Benson said. He said research indicates viewers spend more time watching CMT than



MTV and VH-1 in cable households that get all three music channels.

Exhibit A in the case for country-video impact is "Acly-Breaky Heart." That's the single best example of a video creating a tune and an identity for an artist. Billy Ray Cyrus' "Benson said. "His record hit the top-in-two weeks on the album chart. It broke Beatles and Paul McCartney debut records."

"The past two years, Benson noted, the CMA award show has eclipsed the Grammys in the TV ratings, and an appearance on the show is considered a major launching pad for a new artist or song. The show is performance-driven, with 22 full performances scheduled while 12 trophies are given out in three hours.

Friday's "Day in the Life" sent crews to 25 cities on the same day for glimpses of 40 artists: Travis-Tritt visits a Veterans Administration hospital; Emmylou Harris checks out a guitar factory; Lyle Lovett gets a haircut.

## 'Barney' prepares for new season on PBS

Back in mid-1992, a public outcry forced an embarrassed PBS to reverse its decision to

cancel the new "Barney & Friends" children's show. The network seraped up \$1.75 million to pay for production of 18 new episodes.

More than a year later — now that Barney the purple dinosaur is a national mega-sensation, and millions of kids have learned the original 30 "Barney & Friends" episodes by heart by watching reruns over and over — the 18 new episodes are ready for a Monday debut.

The long-awaited second season of the educational show, which is aimed at preschoolers, will incorporate a couple of new elements: a new dinosaur character, BJ, described as the "precozious but lov-

able older brother" of the existing character Baby Bop; and the availability of activity sheets that parents can get free from their local PBS stations to augment the lessons in each episode of "Barney & Friends."

The study-aid will be available after the debut.

The new "Barney & Friends" episodes will be shown nationwide on PBS stations. Connecticut Public Television co-produces the "Barney & Friends" show with the Lyons Group of Allen, Texas, the private company that created the character for a series of commercial home videos first released in 1988.

The year 1992 was "the year we launched Barney, and Barney launched us," CPTV executive vice president Larry Rifkin said Sept. 8 during the announcement of CPTV's 1993-94 programming lineup.

## New kids cable programs

If the new children's series on broadcast stations have already gotten you down, there is an alternative to turning off the tube:

"The Adventures of Pete and Paul" (Nickelodeon, starting in November), which began as a series of 60-second shorts, explores "suburban mythology" of childhood as seen through the eyes of two suburban humorists. The study-aid includes a mother who receives radio distress calls through a metal plate in her head. Guest stars will include Deborah Harry, Michael Stipe of R.E.M., Kate Pierson of the B-52s and former Baltimore Colt Art Donovan.

"Cappelli & Company" (Nickelodeon, weekdays) joined Nick Jr. in April. Hosted by Frank Cappelli, the show is taped with an audience of preschoolers who participate in song and dance numbers with positive messages.

"Itsy Bitsy Spiders" (USA Network, Fridays nights and Sundays mornings, beginning in November) follows the adventures of a four-eyed, six-legged spider as he evenges himself on a host of exterminator and the piano teacher.

"Legends of the Hidden Temple" (Nickelodeon, Sunday nights), a one-hour action-adventure game show hosted by Kirk Fogg and Kene, is a teaming of Muzak and Sesame Street. The show advances through a 13-room structure through skill, physical strength and

knowledge.

"Problem Child" (USA Network, beginning in November) is an animated series about 7-year-old Junior, who wreaks havoc at school and home.

"Rocko's Modern Life" (Nickelodeon, Sundays) is an animated series that takes the viewer on a weekly journey to O-Town, where life is a twisted caricature. The stars are a snailily and his dim-witted dog Spunky.

"Rupert Bear" (Family Channel, weekday mornings), the oldest children's comic character in England, finally invades the States — 73 years after he and his parents stole the hearts of London.

"Swat Kats: The Radical Squadron" (TBS, Sunday mornings) focuses on two ex-fighter pilots trying to capture the villains who plague Megakat City.

"2 Stupid Dogs" (TBS, Sunday mornings) features a cartoon animal. The block also has "Super Secret Secret Agent," an update of the 1960s series.

"Welnervelli" (Nickelodeon, Saturdays), an outrageous two-hour show that began this summer, uses puppetry, animation and interaction with the audience. Marc Weller, as host, will offer as host of the show, but assumes several half-man, half-puppet identities. The program also features "Big Mopos" and "Genial McElroy Being" and 1940s and '50s theatrical cartoons.

# More women shatter network's glass ceiling

**HOLLYWOOD** — It probably figured that Fox TV, weaned on breaking tradition since its birth in 1986, would be the first major broadcast network to hire a woman as its boss.

When Lucie Salhany, 46, was named chairwoman of Fox-TV in January, she became arguably the most powerful woman ever to hold an executive post at ABC, CBS, NBC and the fledgling network she now heads.

The power becomes more apparent because Fox is the pace-setting network that has forced the Big Three to follow its lead with reality programming and breakthroughs in attitude and concept with such hits as "The Simpsons," "Married... With Children," "In Living Color," "Cops" and "America's Most Wanted."

With its youth-oriented programs and small operating staff, Fox is generating profits at a time of economic distress for networks in general, and thus its every move is surveyed keenly by troubled competitors such as NBC for clues to survival.

What's more, on Jan. 19, only two

weeks after Salhany's appointment, Fox will expand to six nights of regular series programming when it launches the one-hour dramas "Class of '96" and "Key-We!" on Tuesdays, a long-planned move.

With periodic TV movies on the seventh night — Mondays — Fox, under Salhany, will approach parity with the Big Three even though it offers fewer hours of programming.

As head of Fox Broadcasting Co., Salhany now holds a position on the level of Big Three chiefs: Robert Iger of ABC, Robert Wright of NBC and Howard Stringer of CBS. Her boss is Fox Inc. chairman Rupert Murdoch.

In the cable arena, there are several women at or near the top rung of key channels, the best known being Kay Koplovitz, president and chief executive officer of the USA network.

While women increasingly have occupied important, middle-management jobs at the broadcast networks, it was only in the last 15 years that even a few approached the top.

## Analysis

It would be wrong to conclude that Salhany's appointment means that male-dominated TV has suddenly changed its ways. No such luck. But as the network leader in undermining tradition, Fox may well be opening a few more doors for other qualified women executives.

Salhany is an expert in syndication, a huge source of program income, and since 1991 ran Twentieth Television, which produces such series as "The Simpsons," "L.A. Law" and "In Living Color." Previously, at Paramount, she was instrumental in launching such series as "The Arsenio Hall Show" and "Star Trek: The Next Generation."

She is also clearly tough. One year ago, at Twentieth Television, she surprised many in the TV industry by agreeing with ABC to cut short one of her own studio's series for that network, "Anything but Love," because she did not believe that the comedy had enough rerun potential to pay off its costs.

"This is a straight business decision. I don't believe (the show) has a future in syndication," she said bluntly of the Jamie Lee Curtis-Richard Lewis series, which was admired by many.

As 1993 starts, the good news is that

1992's "Year of the Woman" shows signs of carrying over into TV's future.

There are no more powerful producers than Linda Bloodworth-Thomson ("Evening Shade," "Designing Women," "Hearts Afire"); Diane English ("Murphy Brown," "Love & War") and Rosalanne Arnold ("Roseanne," "The Jackie Thomas Show").

The bad news is that in many ways things are no different than in 1930s, when, as Edward Bliss Jr. recounts in his book "Now the News: The Story of Broadcast Journalism," a woman named Helen Sioussat succeeded Edward R. Murrow as in a CBS public-affairs position and Good-Housekeeping named her "Girl of the Month."

Sioussat and other women broadcast-ers of the time were real pioneers. More recently, women such as Marcy Carney — first as a significant ABC program executive and later as producer of "The Cosby Show" and "Roseanne" — helped break down sexist barriers. And the appointments of Pfeiffer and Corday were also important in raising public awareness of the issue.

It took a lot of people to open that door that Salhany walked through this week.

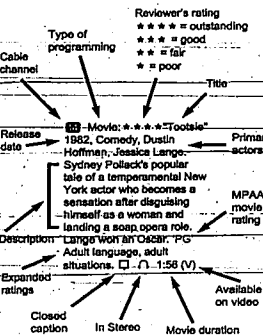

Carter intends to relax a bit with her family — the couple has a 5-year-old son and 2-year-old daughter — and then get back into show business.

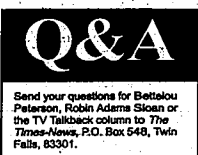
Q. What's this about Ivana's Trump turning into a Hollywood starlet? Isn't she a bit too old and sophisticated for all that?

A. Like many others, Bill believes that the Oscars run on much too long. He believes that the TV ceremonies could be tighter by dropping some of the lesser, non-acting awards. But it's a political quibble to determine which awards should go. Anyway, if Billy does emcee the Oscar telecast next March 21, it'll be his fifth go-around as host. Billy is noncommittal right now but smart Hollywood money is betting that he'll be back.

Q. Can you tell us something about Claudette Colbert, the Hollywood actress best known for sharing a bedroom with Clark Gable in the 1934 classic, "It Happened One Night"? Is she still alive?

A. Claudette is probably best known in recent years for her stage work on Broadway. Her roles, however interesting, have been infrequent. As a result, the always elegant Colbert has had a good time enjoying her home in Barboursville. The latest news is she's 90 however. Claudette, who turned 90

on Sept. 13, was felled by a stroke last April. The ever-ebullient Colbert is said to be recovering nicely, and was delighted to receive from friends a brand new electric wheelchair to tool around in.

Q. Has Janet Jackson's motion-picture debut in "Poetic Justice" made relations even more strained with already-strained sister LaToya?

A. As a matter of fact, to the contrary. Maybe Janet's acclaim as an actress has mellowed her a bit. Janet doesn't know her sibling, as others do, who say LaToya has no talent. Maybe singing's not for her, says Janet, but I think my sister would have been a great actress. No one's ever seen her do that — but I have."

Q. We hear the most dreadful thing about the marriage that Valerie Bertinelli is stuck in with some rock singer. What about it?

A. Valerie first met rocker Eddie Van Halen backstage at a concert in 1980. She was just 20 years old. The two fell for each other almost immediately. They've now been married for 12 years — a union of remarkable longevity by Hollywood standards. The marriage has been a year. Van Halen has battled a persistent alcohol problem that at one point landed him in the Betty Ford clinic. There are also long absences as he tours several months each year. But their marriage has survived, and produced a 2 1/2-year-old son named Wolfgang, for Van Halen's favorite composer, Mozart. They still live together in California's San Fernando Valley, and Valerie is back at work on TV as a divorcee working in a Parisian cafe in the new "Cafe American."

Q. What's become of Tina Louise, that beautiful bombshell who used to play that sexy actress on "Gilligan's Island"?

A. Ever since Tina made her big-time movie debut as a steamy slut in 1958's "God's Little Acre," she's been tabbed as the bimbo who somehow couldn't make it in Hollywood's major leagues. She was great as Ginger on "Gilligan's Island," but Tina's career has mostly revolved around TV and grade-B movie projects. Now 39, she still looks great. My Hollywood spits say she recently turned up in Timesdown to costar in a movie project titled "West From North Go South." Tina also is a pitchwoman for a beauty product in pill form designed to moisturize the skin.

# Will Elvis ever have Valentino's staying power?

**LONG MEMORIES:** Can you believe it, the obituary page of the Hollywood Reporter listed memorial services for Rudolph Valentino marking the 60th anniversary of his death. Will Elvis have such staying power in another 51 years?

**Q. Isn't it true that Carol Burnett has faced the sad but real fact that her TV career is over?**

**A. Let's put it this way:** Carol's TV career is in a long uncertain period, a plateau, if you will. Her last TV comedy pilot for CBS went nowhere. Carol, something of a perfectionist, wasn't pleased with the show. Burnett, now near 60, has decided to return to an early professional love, live theater. She's soon to star in a London stage version of the Stephen Sondheim review, "Putting It Together." Carol tells me she'll try to put her TV career together again next year in another series. To paraphrase Yogi Berra, her TV career ain't over till it's over.

**Q. I was fascinated to read that the plot of the hit movie "The Fugitive" in which Harrison Ford plays Dr. Richard Kimble, a Chicago surgeon wrongly accused of murdering his wife, was actually based on the case of a real-life Cleveland doctor named Sam Sheppard. Can you clue me in on the first case?**

**A. Dr. Sam Sheppard, a handsome ex-football star who was an osteopathic surgeon in an Ohio suburb, was accused of murdering his beautiful wife Marilyn in 1954. Though he denied committing the crime, claiming he spotted a "bushy-haired stranger" on the scene (Dr. Kimble claimed to see a mysterious "one-armed man" in his house in "The Fugitive"), Sheppard was convicted and jailed. About 10 years later, lawyer F. Lee Bailey won Sheppard's release in a landmark U.S. Supreme Court case. Sheppard died of liver failure in 1970 at age 46.**

**Q. Hasn't Marlon Brando's long-awaited autobiography project been scuttled since he's having trouble remembering what happened in his eventful Hollywood life?**

**A. No question that memory never has been a Brando strong suit. He is notorious for having difficulty managing his lines without the help of big cue cards. It comes as no surprise that Marlon is forgetful about details of his tempestuous life as one of Hollywood's renowned actors. My spies tell me he recently telephoned Ursula Andress, bluntly inquiring about their affair. Was it in the '60s, he asked. (She confirms the romance, but added that it was in the '50s.) In any case, the autobiography project is moving forward, bad memory and all. After all, Brando was paid a seven-figure advance, and is under pressure to deliver.**

**TALKING DOG:** It worked for Bruce Willis: so Hollywood figures, it will work for Eddie Murphy. Just as Willis provided the

voice for the baby in the "Look Who's Talking" films, Murphy is expected to do the voice of the dog in the film version of the novel "A Dog of Oxaca." In the film, the mixed-breed dog winds up in Hollywood where he becomes a film star. Maybe Murphy will finally have another hit.

**Q. A TV commentator, discussing the possible public backlash against Michael Jackson for his alleged sexual misdeeds, claimed that the careers of movie stars Fatty Arbuckle, Charlie Chaplin, Errol Flynn, Ingrid Bergman and Lana Turner all suffered after their headline-making romantic escapades. Is this true?**

**A. Not completely. A rule of thumb for Hollywood scandals is that the public is incensed only if the sensationalism revealed in the media is at odds with the personality's screen image. Thus, Arbuckle, Chaplin and Bergman all received the back-hand-of-public-outcry because they weren't the innocents or wholesome creatures they invariably portrayed. However, stars like Errol Flynn and Turner (whose images were sexually-charged-to-begin-with) found that their careers flourished after their exploits in private life became front-page news.**

**Q. I was under the impression Martin Scorsese and wife Barbara DeFina filed for divorce last year. How come the couple worked together on "The Age of Innocence"?**

**A. The pair has always had great respect for each other's work, despite their rocky relationship, and Martin's movies have family members. As a matter of fact, DeFina's dog, Zoe, has a part in "The Age of Innocence," costarring Michelle Pfeiffer and Daniel Day-Lewis. Scorsese directed and DeFina produced the film.**

**Q. As baseball fans we were delighted with the baseball movies that were released in recent times after a long dry spell. Don't tell us the game has worn out its welcome in Hollywood?**

**A. For years baseball movies were poison but you'll be glad to know in recent years, following the success of "The Natural," "Field of Dreams," "Bull Durham" and "A League of Their Own," Hollywood has taken another look at America's national pastime. Producers are now trying to interest Denzel Washington in "The Walls Come Tumbling Down," about a black baseball league in the 1930s.**

**Q. We understand that Shelley Long is a real bitch, hard to get along with on the set and off. What about it?**

royal family's been receiving this year, I was surprised to hear Prince Charles had hired some new public relations people. Does he really need them?

**A. You know the old saying, "keeping up with the Joneses"? Well, in this case, it's keeping up with his ex, the ever-popular Princess Di. Prince Charles knows he needed to fortify his falling image, damaged by scandal and out-of-sight with his estranged wife.**

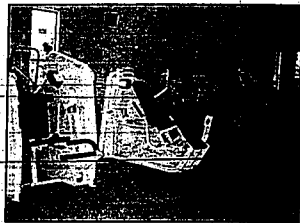
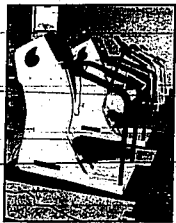
**Q. We've been reading that Liza**
