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# GOP senators feel cowed by Babbitt grazing plan

WASHINGTON — The debate over rangeland reforms reached near hysteria in the Senate Thursday as Western senators staged an attack on Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt's plan to change rules for livestock grazing on public land.

A Senate vote Thursday night failed to halt a filibuster by opponents of grazing fee increases. The 53-41 vote fell short of the 60 votes required to terminate the stalling tactic.

Babbitt has endorsed a doubling of the fee ranchers pay to let their cattle and sheep eat forage on federal rangeland.

But what has really riled mostly Republican senators are his plans about wider federal ownership of water rights and rangeland developments. Babbitt wants shorter leases and restrictions on subleasing to ensure ranchers "live lighter on the land."

Senate defenders of livestock owners de-

clared an outright legislative war on the reformers — threatening relentless resistance, filibusters, and even attacks on other projects that grazing reformers want for their own districts.

"We're not going to let this die," said Utah Republican Orrin Hatch, who appeared at a news conference along with Idaho's two Republican senators.

"We all know the story of how the West was won," said Sen. Dirk Kempthorne, R-Idaho. "If this is enacted, you can write the sequel of how the West was lost."

Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., has often forged compromises between environmen-

talists and the resource-extraction industries, such as mining, timber and ranching. This time, he described his deal to lower Babbitt's fee hike but keep his management reforms as one that opens a new era in the region's relationship to the landscape.

"There is a new West," Reid said on the Senate floor. "It is coming on us and we should accept that." Reid referred to new residents from urban centers and a new economic recognition of recreation dollars that require pristine vistas.

The reform opponents decried the Reid deal as one that clinches reforms without hearings on the specific proposals. Although Babbitt himself staged general hearings on grazing last spring and summer, the scoping talks on his new administrative proposal has just gotten started.

Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, said that new hearings would allow the federal govern-

# El Nino puzzles scientists

MIAMI — The current El-Nino weather pattern — blamed for disastrous Midwest flooding and hurricanes in the Pacific — has become the longest on record and may be strengthening.

And that could upset the world's weather for another year, scientists said.

El Nino, which starts with a temperature increase in the western Pacific, normally occurs twice a decade and lasts 12 to 18 months. University of Miami oceanographer Donald Hansen said Thursday.

The current El Nino began in early 1991 and was forecast to end in July 1992. But it's now almost 3 years old — and Pacific waters are heating up again.

"It's unlike anything we've seen among the El Ninos," Hansen said. "Maybe it's not just an El Nino, but is really signaling that two or three years ago we had a relatively persistent change in the climate."

Scientists caution that data on El Nino is limited. The phenomenon has been studied scientifically only since World War II, although meteorologists examining historical records have traced it back a century.

The current El Nino is by far the longest on record, said Gerald Bell, a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration meteorologist with the Climate Analysis Center in Washington.

"Pacific temperatures are already above normal and they are increasing again," Bell said. "That's why we're putting out the flags now."

Normal water temperatures near the international date line are 83 degrees. But in the last month, NOAA figures show an increase from 85 degrees to 86 degrees, a sign El Nino is not only continuing, but strengthening.

El Nino could still fizzle, Henry Diaz, a NOAA forecaster in Boulder, Colo., said current long-range forecasts predict a return to a normal winter climate. But those forecasting models erred in predicting El Nino would end in 1992, he cautioned.

"No one is sure just what the world is experiencing," Diaz said.

El Nino — Spanish for the Christ child, and so named because it often appears in South America around Christmas — begins with a warming of western Pacific waters believed to be part of a normal global climate cycle.

# Diet drug mixture produces dramatic weight loss

MILWAUKEE — An experimental combination of two widely used diet drugs produced dramatic weight loss and reduced high blood pressure, sugar and cholesterol to normal.

"This is comparable or superior to any medical treatment of obesity," said the study's author, Dr. Richard L. Atkinson of the Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Hampton, Va.

Atkinson and his colleagues gave the two

drugs to 506 women and 57 men, most of whom have been followed for at least six months, and some for more than a year.

The subjects also were encouraged to exercise, counseled about changes in their eating behavior and were limited to 1,200 calories per day. Most adults eat at least 3,000 more calories daily than that.

After three months, the patients had lost an average of 22 pounds. That climbed to 29 pounds at six months and 37 pounds after nine months, Atkinson reported Wednesday at the annual meeting of the

North American Association for the Study of Obesity.

Blood pressure in 49 subjects with high blood pressure dropped to normal. Twenty-four patients with high cholesterol saw those levels fall to normal, Atkinson said. And blood sugar — an indication of diabetes — also dropped to normal.

"That's dramatic stuff," he said.

The combination of the prescription drugs — fenfluramine and phentermine — was superior to either drug alone, he said. "We're fixing high blood pressure, high

sugar and high fats by treating the underlying disease — obesity," Atkinson said.

"It looks to be very effective," said Dr. David York of Louisiana State University. Questions remain about whether the drugs will continue to work over the longer term, and whether they will have any side effects if given for years, York said.

The drugs appear to be safe in the short term when taken individually or together, Atkinson said. But he, too, said longer studies are needed because patients may have to take them for a lifetime.

# Senate rejects another deployment limit

WASHINGTON — President Clinton won a hard-fought victory Thursday as the Senate rejected curbs on his right as commander in chief to send troops to Haiti.

Instead, senators endorsed a non-binding compromise their leaders made with the White House.

Both Democrats and Republicans, exasperated with the administration's foreign policymaking in Somalia, Haiti and Bosnia, have pushed for sharp restrictions on presidential authority during the past two weeks.

But on the Senate, by an 81-19 vote, turned aside an amendment by Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., to deny funds for any military operation in Haiti unless Clinton had Congress' approval in advance.

The vote came after Helms renewed his scathing attack on deposed Haitian President Jean-Bertrand Aristide, branding him a "demonstrable killer." Only Republicans, including Senate Minority Leader

Bob Dole, R-Kan., supported the measure.

The Senate then voted, 98-2, for a watered-down measure that says Clinton should seek approval from lawmakers before committing troops to Haiti but is not required to do so.

Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., who has vigorously opposed Clinton's policy in Somalia, and Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., a longtime opponent of military operations, cast the dissenting votes.

The White House, Republican leader Dole and other senators worked out the compromise during "three days of negotiations as Clinton fought off the challenge to his foreign policy and war-making authority.

Dole argued that it was imperative that Congress speak before the fact on Haiti — "before the body bags are counted before ... we have the bad news about the tragic loss of one American life in Haiti."

The amendments were part of a \$239 billion defense spending bill for the fiscal year that began Oct. 1.

# Higher fee on international travelers concerns senators

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Clinton administration was told by senators of both parties Thursday that its plan to raise fees on international travelers is costing support for the North American Free Trade Agreement.

"You've got a non-starter" in the proposal to charge arriving plane and train passengers an extra \$2.50, Sen. Slade Gorton, R-Wash., told Mickey Kantor, President Clinton's trade ambassador. "You are in the process of losing supporters without converting any opponents."

Gorton supports NAFTA.



Democratic Sen. Richard Bryan of Nevada, who has not announced his position on the agreement, said he finds the transportation increase troubling because of his state's dependence on tourism.

The administration originally recommended doubling the \$5-per-trip customs fee to replace an estimated \$500 million a year that would be lost when the trade agreement eliminates U.S. tariffs on most Mexican

products.

Kantor told the Senate Commerce Committee the increase has been reduced and that the administration now favors some spending reductions to help make up the difference.

"That's the best option we have been able to come up with," Kantor said, noting that half the extra \$2.50 per trip would come from foreigners. He repeated "the administration's willingness to look at any options lawmakers offer."

Meanwhile, Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun, D-Ill., said after meeting with Clinton on Thursday that she sup-

ports the agreement. Before, she had been leaning toward it. She told reporters at the White House she was persuaded by arguments that there would be solid job retraining programs for any workers who lose their jobs as a result of the pact, although she added, "I don't believe there will be a great number of losers."

The transportation fee already is under attack from two dozen House Republicans, whose support is essential to congressional acceptance of the trade agreement.

The agreement, known as NAFTA, would gradually eliminate

most tariffs and other barriers to free movement of goods and services between the United States, Mexico and Canada. It would create the world's biggest and richest trade zone.

The pact is opposed by most U.S. labor unions and by perhaps most congressional Democrats on grounds it would give U.S. companies new incentives to move jobs to Mexico in search of low wages. The administration disagrees, saying it would create jobs by opening the Mexican market to more U.S. goods.

The agreement has never been

considered to be in trouble in the Senate. Nevertheless, two Republican supporters lectured Kantor that he and Clinton are not doing enough to ensure its success.

Sen. Larry Pressler, R-S.D., a NAFTA supporter, suggested Clinton has been less than rock-solid in pushing the agreement. "I have a feeling the president is trying to walk through this dance without holding the girl very close," he said.

Pressler said Clinton should be holding town meetings with union members to explain that the agreement would create jobs.

# Clinton returns attention to health care battle, blasts critics

WASHINGTON (AP) — Struggling to regain momentum on health care after weeks of criticism and foreign-policy distraction, President Clinton defended his plan Thursday and won cheers for promising a 75-cent cigarette tax increase.

Clinton rebutted Democratic and Republican critics and cast his health-care plan as not only socially responsible but also "hard-headed economics."

"There are times when doing the right thing morally and ethically is also good business," he told business leaders. "We can make money by making our workers more secure and whole."

Clinton unveiled his health-care plan in a nationally televised address to Congress on Sept. 22. But a month later, he has yet to send a bill to Capitol Hill containing the details. Public opinion surveys show support for the plan has slipped.

In the latest political sting, a bipartisan group of senators — led by John Breaux, D-La., and Dave Durenberger, R-Minn. — introduced a "managed competition" plan Thursday they portrayed as a mainstream alternative to Clinton's plan. The bipartisan group did not include Clinton's requirement that employers provide health insurance for all workers or as much regulation.

A day earlier, the National Association of Manufacturers — a business group Clinton had hoped to enlist, criticized the president's plan as too ambitious and said it should

be reduced.

The White House released a letter from N.A.M. President Jerry Jasnowski on Thursday that apologized for the negative comments without taking them back. "Your health-care proposal has far more positive elements than problems," Jasnowski added.

Clinton wants to guarantee health coverage to all Americans by the end of 1997. He would require employers to pay at least 80 percent of their workers' average health insurance expenses, with employees paying the rest. Small businesses and low-wage workers would get subsidies to help pay their share.

Clinton's speech to Business for Social Responsibility, a group that promotes responsible business practices, answered his critics point by point and rejected their alternatives one by one.

The president denied his plan would create a cumbersome bureaucracy of regional health alliances and push the nation too quickly toward guaranteed health coverage for all Americans.

"When you hear all this stuff that these alliances are big bureaucratic nightmares and government creations, that's not true," he insisted.

# Smokes, drinks, drugs kill 500,000 a year

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cigarettes, alcohol and drugs are killing more than 500,000 Americans a year and spawning a host of social maladies from street crime to homelessness to gang violence, according to a major new study.

Unless Americans stop abusing these substances, efforts to hold down spiraling health costs are doomed to failure, the study's sponsors warned on Thursday.

Three dozen major organizations representing the nation's doctors, lawyers, employers and educators responded with a call to make substance abuse prevention and treatment a top national priority.

The study sponsored by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and conducted by researchers at

health care costs, overwhelming the education, criminal justice and social systems of this nation and contributing to an unprecedented wave of violence and homelessness," said Joseph A. Califano Jr., the president of Columbia University's Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse.

Dr. Steven A. Schroeder, president of the Johnson Foundation, noted that half the men arrested for homicide and violent assaults test positive for drugs.

"Without an all-out attack on substance abuse and addiction, reforms designed to provide health care for all Americans at a reasonable cost are doomed to failure," said Califano, the former Carter administration health secretary and longtime crusader against smoking.

Candidates target Christian right

WASHINGTON (AP) — You won't find Pat Robertson's name on a 1993 ballot.

But Robertson and his Christian conservative political movement are targets in two high-profile election contests next month.

In Virginia, one could easily get the impression that religious broadcaster Robertson is running for governor. Democratic Mary Sue Terry is aggressively trying to put Republican nominee George Allen as an ally of the so-called religious right and features a big photograph of Robertson in a campaign ad.

Allen's running mate, Mike Farris, acknowledges his ties to the religious right.

In California, opponents of a statewide "school choice" referendum are casting the voucher proposal as an attempt by religious zealots to use public money in Christian schools.

These races have become not only test cases of the Christian right's power at the ballot box but also of the effectiveness of using the movement's support for a candidate or issue as a campaign attack weapon.

Robertson's Christian Coalition, the most aggressive political organization in the Christian right, has denounced Terry's strategy and predicted it will backfire.

"George Wallace ran against blacks, Mary Sue Terry and Don Beyer are running against Christians," said Ralph Reed, Robertson's top political lieutenant.

Earlier this year, Democratic candidates for Los Angeles mayor and Arkansas lieutenant governor tried to paint their GOP opponents as puppets of the Christian right. In both cases, the Republicans won.

"If Democrats would do their homework, they would find out it is not working, and it has not worked," said Christian Coalition spokesman Mike Russell.

Allen labels the Terry effort "more distortion" of his record and views, and his relaxed campaign style has helped him ward off major damage from the attacks so far.

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conservatives on Election Day and say the attacks have only motivated their constituency.

But while the Allen-Terry race is close, even ardent supporters of the California initiative say it is likely to lose.

Most blame the \$10 million budget of voucher opponents, primarily teacher unions. While there have been no advertising efforts directly critical of the Christian right for supporting the initiative, that connection has been raised in many public forums on the subject.

"Below the radar level, it has been wild, vicious and mean," said the Rev. Lou Sheldon of the California-based Traditional Values Coalition, a conservative Christian organization supporting the voucher proposal.

The Christian right's effort there included \$250,000 in Christian Coalition radio ads, and the initiative is regularly promoted on syndicated Christian radio programs. Rejection of the proposition would be a high-profile defeat for the Christian right.

"If we don't do it this time, we'll roll up our sleeves and do it again in a couple or few more years," Sheldon said. "We're going to be at this for a long time."

Daughter testifies parents were abusive

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. (AP) — An 11-year-old girl suing to stay with the couple who raised her testified Thursday her biological father frequently hit her during court-ordered visits.

"They said that if I didn't call them Mom and Dad they would hit or slap me," Jenny Yang said.

The girl is trying to slow her biological parents are unfit and that she should be allowed to remain with her custodial parents, who have raised her since she was 4 months old.

In a visit ordered by a judge after the biological parents sued for her return, Yang said her father once "slapped me from the living room to the kitchen," because she said she hated the visits.

"He said I had to shut up or he'd throw me down the dark basement," she said.

During testimony Wednesday, witnesses said Jenny's brother, Jeff Hong, had been kept in a dark closet when he was a toddler and, more recently, chained in their basement for days as punishment.

Jenny sued in April in a case that mirrors other recent custody battles waged by children.

In the case of Gregory K., a Florida appeals court upheld the 13-year-old's "divorce" from his parents, but overturned a lower court's ruling that gave him the right to see his own half brother.

And 14-year-old Kimberly Mays won her fight to end her biological parents' visitation rights.

In Jenny's case, a gas company serviceman testified Wednesday that he found Jeff, then 11, chained by the ankle to a beam in the basement last year, given only a mattress and blanket.

The boy's father, Long Han Hong, testified Monday he chained Jeff in the basement for two or three days to punish him for misbehaving.

Police Officer Thomas Doyle said Hong told him the boy was being punished for sneaking out at night and for shoplifting. The case was referred to Child Protective Services but never prosecuted.

An acquaintance testified that she once saw the boy, then a toddler, run screaming from a janitor's closet in the hall of Hong's apartment building.

"Long said something like, 'The child was naughty,'" Susan Do said. Hong and his wife, Pham Hue Ong, are in a tug-of-war with Mike Wong-Yang and Janet Frieu.

Hong and Ong conceded they signed over legal custody to the newborn girl to Yang and Trieu in 1982, but say they thought they could get her back. Both couples were then recent immigrants from Vietnam.

Joseph Smigiel Jr., the attorney who drew up the custody agreement, testified both couples came to him with the intention of making the custody arrangement permanent. He said a Vietnamese translator was present because both couples spoke little English.

Term limits return to ballots in 3 Eastern states

Term limits, the favorite among last year's array of referendums, are back on this election ticket on ballots in Maine, upstate New York and in New York City, where court challenges forced an eleven-month campaign.

This latest surge of throw-the-bums-out sentiment is also before New York City's voters as a proposed constitutional amendment to permit recall of all-elected officials, be they mayor, state legislators, governor or members of Congress.

Paradoxically, the recall measure was inspired by anger over the \$2.8 billion in tax increases pushed through by Gov. Jim Florio in 1990. Yet the first-term Democrat is now favored to win for re-election Nov. 2.

Last year, 14 states limited Congressional terms, 12 put curbs on state lawmakers and many limited the tenure of executive officers, from governor on down.

Maine's measure would limit state lawmakers and four executive posts; a measure in Monroe County, N.Y., is for county officers; New York City's addresses the offices of mayor and the City Council.

"It's going to revolutionize city government" and bring in "new people with new ideas," said Ronald Lauder, heir to the Estee Lauder cosmetics fortune, who is backing the New Yorkers for Term Limits Inc. in New York City.

That measure would limit elected city officials, including the mayor and City Council members, to two four-year terms.

Opponents protest term limits are unnecessary to kick out bad politicians, and that a revolving door is no way to run a democracy.

Maine's Secretary of State G. William Diamond argued that his state's proposed term limits would produce novice lawmakers easily swayed by lobbyists and bureaucrats.

Term limits, Diamond said, are "a cynical and superficial response to the many serious problems confronting state government."

The Maine ballot measure, sponsored largely by Republican philanthropist Elizabeth B. Noyce, seeks to limit state legislators to four consecutive two-year terms. The attorney general, secretary of state and state treasurer would be limited to four two-year terms, while the state auditor would be limited to two four-year terms. Those positions are all elected by the Legislature.

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Ohio, Michigan grocery chains sell flu shots

CINCINNATI (AP) — In a new twist on one-stop shopping, two grocery chains are selling flu shots.

"It's been wild," Pat Nowak, director of public relations for SeaWay Food Town Inc. of Toledo, said Wednesday.

"We thought if we got 50 a day we would be ecstatic. We're averaging 338 a day."

It's also been educational. "People don't like to get their flu shots in the meat department," Ms. Nowak said.

In the program that began Sept. 13, SeaWay charges \$8 a shot, alternating three days a week among its 45 supermarkets in northwestern Ohio and southeastern Michigan and its 20 discount drug stores.

The Kroger Co., the nation's largest grocery chain, started offering A-beijing flu shots last week. It also charges \$8 a shot and plans to offer vaccinations in 50 Cincinnati area stores, four stores a day, through Nov. 5.

Registered nurses administer the shot.

"Reaction has been very positive, from our stores and from our customers," said Reuben Shaffer, manager of communications for Kroger's stores in Cincinnati and Dayton.

Woman accused of using credit cards of Amtrak crash victims

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A thief swiped credit cards and traveler's checks belonging to victims of Amtrak's worst crash, then went on a \$2,100 shopping spree, police said.

"It's amazing that somebody would be so bold as to try something like this," said Sgt. Steve Caraway, a police spokesman in the suburb of Kenner.

Dawn R. Taylor, 31, whose husband works for Amtrak, was charged with forgery and unauthorized credit card use

after her arrest Tuesday.

A Visa, a MasterCard and traveler's checks were taken from an Amtrak office at Union Passenger Terminal in New Orleans. Authorities do not believe Taylor's husband was involved.

S&L nominee broke rules

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton's nominee to head the Resolution Trust Corp. tried to help a friend purchase a Florida building from the savings and loan cleanup agency, despite rules prohibiting such assistance, a letter shows.

Stanley Tate got involved in the matter in late 1991 and early 1992 while he was chairman of an RTC regional advisory board in Florida and was subject to ethics rules barring assistance to friends in agency matters.

In a Feb. 10, 1993, letter, Tate revealed he had been trying to help James O'Rourke purchase a building in Perrine, Fla., from the agency after she said her husband submitted an offer well below the property's appraised value.

Mrs. O'Rourke ran a Miami-area automobile tire business with her husband, and Tate knew her from his service on a local hospital board, according to the husband.

## Good schools need good parents

Most private schools don't have ivy. They can't afford it. Most don't offer small classes, beloved schoolmasters, Latin, lacrosse or an old school.

On average, private schools spend less money than public schools, and turn out better students. How do they do it?

The cheaper part is easy to explain: lower pay for teachers (and everyone else); fewer non-teachers on the payroll; no special education, bilingual education or other costly extras. Ollen, larger classes, bare-bones facilities.

The better issue is trickier. Part of the answer is that the private schools start with better students. Private school students are somewhat more likely to have middle-class, educated, English-speaking parents. (In California, they are not more likely to be white, according to Policy Analysis for California Education.)

While some students are sent to private school to shape up or catch up, most private schools don't have to cope with students with serious learning or behavior problems. Private schools set up specifically for such students aren't cheap.

Still, the Catholic schools appear to be much more effective than public schools in teaching students from poor, poorly educated families, including minority students.

Some argue that parental support explains all of this. By definition, private-school parents value education, or they wouldn't be paying for it. Low-income parents who sacrifice to scrape up parochial school tuition send a clear message to their children: School is important.

Good parents, good kids, good schools. There is a connection. But it also seems to me that low-cost private schools turn their poverty into a virtue. They can't afford to do too much, so they concentrate on doing what's most important.

While public schools spend money and class time trying to teach adolescent skills, drug, alcohol, sex and AIDS behavior modification, "bachelor living, bicycle safety, self-esteem and multicultural appreciation," private-schools focus on the easy stuff, like teaching algebra.

Forced by mandates or lured by special-needs funding, the public schools create new programs for students with different languages, problems, interests, attention spans and (assumed) aptitudes.

Catholic school students take more college-prep classes than public students of similar so-

cioeconomic status; they are much less likely to be placed on a general or vocational track.

In addition, the low-cost schools can't afford to change the curriculum every time a new fad hits education.

Backed by parents, private teachers have authority to control the classroom; students aren't allowed to disrupt others' education. In schools where orderly behavior is the norm, most students conform. Where anything goes, everything does.

Public schools are supposed to educate all kids, including the children of apathetic, overwhelmed, seriously messed up or missing parents. They can't count on that 100 percent parental commitment to education, or on a parent community that agrees on the school's goals and rules.

It's a much harder job than teaching kids whose parents have picked the school and paid for the school.

Unfortunately, public schools' money advantage doesn't buy focus, order, community or parents.

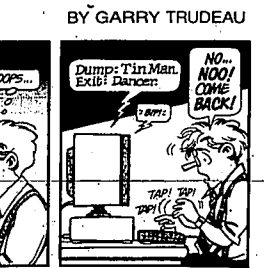
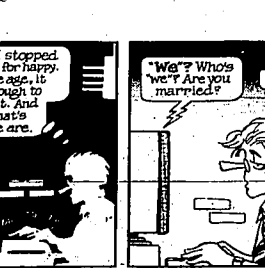
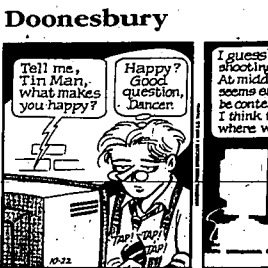

# Opinions vary about whether justice was served in Denny decisions

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Most of all, there was a sense of relief a day after the Regional Denny riot beating verdicts, even while opinions varied widely about whether justice was served.

"People down here are in a good mood," said South Central Los Angeles businessman Vergees Hudleston. "Some people were really scared if there was a guilty verdict there would be another riot because these young people, they don't mind dying."

"I'd say 90 percent of the callers are pleased with the verdicts. They say we beat them at their own game," said Carl Nelson, news director at KJLH, a black-oriented radio station. "They look at it as a slam-dunk, a home run."

"Most people here just wanted a fair trial. I saw a black or white thing... As far as African-Americans are concerned, it's over."

Shoppers and storekeepers at the Crenshaw Baldwin Hills Plaza, in an area where rioting was intense, said

they were thankful that the trial's ordeal was behind them.

"I'm really glad it's all over," said Marko Parfoly, manager of a shoe store. "People are tired. They are ready to move on."

But the outrage of some hadn't faded. One woman suggested the verdicts may embolden street thugs.

"I don't feel justice was done," said Crenshaw District resident Ann Melton. "I feel now, somewhere along the line, it's going to happen again."

"A lot of blacks feel they really have the upper hand, in regards to police and other races."

College student Shena Verrett agreed.

"Two wrongs don't make up for a right," she said. The jury passed down the wrong verdicts, I saw (Williams) face just as sure as I see mine. He did it. "I don't think they should give them an easy sentence just to keep people happy."

On Wednesday, a multiracial jury

acquitted Damian Williams, 20, of the most serious charge — attempted murder — in the Denny assault, the televised beating that came to symbolize the riots that began April 29, 1992.

Denny was beaten just hours after four white policemen were acquitted of nearly all criminal charges in the March 3, 1991, beating of black motorist Rodney King.

Rather than life in prison, Williams faces up to eight years in prison for felony mayhem, hitting Denny in the head with a brick. Four other convictions, all for misdemeanor assault, carry six-month terms.

Denny himself urged leniency for Williams, saying on NBC's "Today" show, "I would just recommend a very strong probation, one which Damian Williams would have to check in and totally be accountable."

Co-defendant Henry Watson, 29, was convicted of misdemeanor assault, for placing his foot on Denny's neck. Because he already spent 17 months in

jail, he was released and returned home.

On Thursday, the homes of both Williams and Watson, which were surrounded by television news crews and reporters a day earlier, looked like any other residence in a quiet, working-class neighborhood.

The trial's outcome was still the buzz of the airwaves, however.

"B.H. Handel, a lawyer who's the morning KFI radio talk show host, was blunt in his assessment of the jury system. "We have a jury system in which

they beat someone unmercifully after he was down and a jury says that's not excessive force. ... In South Central, a man throws a brick at pointblank range and that's not assault with a deadly weapon? Jurors are imbeciles," Handel said.

## Foley: Anti-gay rules for Congress would be obtrusive, hard to enforce

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rules barring lawmakers from refusing to hire gay people would interfere with their special need to employ whomever they want and probably could not be enforced, House Speaker Thomas Foley said Thursday.

Foley, D-Wash., made the remarks after criticizing three House members from Oklahoma who told a newspaper that they would not hire openly gay people for their staffs.

"I don't agree with that and I regret it," Foley told reporters. "But I don't know exactly how one, under the present circumstances or anything I can imagine, can require members to take particular individuals off their staff that they do not wish to hire."

With his remarks, Foley tipped into an area that has become increasingly sensitive for Congress and its leaders — the fact that legislators have exempted themselves from many laws, including those that prohibit discrimination.

Their justification, which Foley reiterated Thursday, has been that mem-

bers of Congress, by the nature of their jobs, need freedom in hiring that would be intolerable elsewhere. For example, liberal Democrats should not be forced to hire conservative Republicans.

"Once you try to parse out whether an individual is a person that is appropriate for a member to hire, I don't know how you can set up standards other than serving at the pleasure of the member," Foley said.

Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., one of Congress' two acknowledged homosexuals, said in an interview that he agreed a rule forbidding such discriminatory hiring would be hard to enforce. But he said he still favored a rule giving lawmakers freedom to hire or reject people based on political ideology but forbidding them from discriminating because of sexual orientation,

race, religion, sex or other such attributes.

Gregory King of the Human Rights Campaign Fund, which lobbies in Washington for homosexuals, said, "If a member of Congress stated he wouldn't hire a black person or a Jew in his office, there would be proceedings under way today to censure them."

Foley compared the leeway lawmakers need in hiring to that required when presidents and corporate executives employ top, confidential advisers.

"It happens in every line of work that people who have special confidential relationships with business executives, with university or academic leaders, with political leaders, are people that they have to have a right to choose," he said.

Later in the day, Foley issued a statement reemphasizing his opposition to employment discrimination. He also restated his support for an effort led by Reps. Dick Sweig, D-N.H., and Christopher Shays, R-Conn., to apply civil rights, worker safety and other laws to Congress.

## College may abolish flag as symbol

ST. GEORGE, Utah (AP) — The Confederate flag and Rodney Rebel have been symbols of Dixie College as long as anyone on campus can recall, but an abolition movement is underway.

The college's Student Executive Council voted this summer to abolish the flag, which they say is a racist symbol and throwback to the days of slavery.

A campus pipe bombing Oct. 2 — believed to be racially motivated — has prompted a council of Dixie College administrators to consider banning the Stars and Bars early next month.

Meanwhile, school mascot Rodney Rebel has stopped waving the flag at football games.

Brigham Young, an early Mormon Church president who led Mormon pio-

neers to the Salt Lake Valley in 1847, sent settlers to southern Utah in the 1850s to found the Cotton Mission. Those pioneers thought of themselves as settlers of Utah's Dixie.

The tradition spawned the college name and its symbols.

But students say the symbols are not worth keeping if they offend people or mar the college's image and academic mission.

Student Body President Victor Iverson said most students support the change.

"Some are kind of sad to see it go, but they understand that we don't want to turn people off when they see it on a campus visit," he said.

Some alumni are more reluctant to

abandon tradition.

Alumni Association president Scott Lovell said an overwhelming majority of the association's board favor keeping the flag.

"Personally I am in favor of keeping the flag," he said. "It doesn't denote anything negative in Dixie. It's part of Rodney, a fun-loving character."

Dixie College President Robert Hudleston, a newcomer to the area, said it will be up to college leaders, residents and the Board of Trustees to decide the fate of the symbol.

Earlier this month, a black student's room was damaged by a pipe-bomb explosion. Some black students also have reported receiving racist notes and phone calls.

## Foodmaker settles with child's parents

SEATTLE (AP) — Thirty-five lawsuits stemming from the bacterial outbreak at Jack in the Box restaurants are pending against the company, a spokeswoman for the parent company said Thursday.

The settlement in one case was announced Wednesday. The parents of a 2-year-old girl who died from a strain of bacterium linked to Jack in the Box hamburgers reached a settlement with the restaurant chain's parent company, the family's lawyer said.

Terms of the settlement were not disclosed, but Seattle attorney

Thomas P. Graham III described it as "substantial."

Foodmaker spokeswoman Shere Zizzi on Thursday confirmed the settlement was reached and that its terms were confidential. She said settlements had been reached on about 16 cases. No terms of the settlements are being released.

Two-year-old Celina Shribbs of Mountlake Terrace was one of three Washington state children to die last winter in an outbreak of E. coli O157:H7, a bacterium found in undercooked meat. Roughly 500 others in Washington fell ill.

The outbreak was traced to contaminated and undercooked hamburgers served by Jack in the Box restaurants.

Celina, the daughter of Keith and Shandra Shribbs, died Jan. 28.

Neither she nor her parents had eaten at a Jack in the Box, and health officials were never able to determine from whom she got the infection.

But sophisticated genetic testing at the national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta showed that Celina's strain of E. coli matched the pattern of toxins found in the contaminated Jack in the Box meat, Graham said.

## Spokane rejects development

SPOKANE (AP) — The city's Plan Commission has recommended against plans for a supermarket and retail shops that would require demolishing 37 homes in the East Central neighborhood.

The panel on Wednesday voted 8-1 against the proposal by Tidyman's Warehouse Foods for a development covering 103,000 square feet. Tidyman's said it also was considering apartments at the site, which is occupied mostly by low-cost homes that would be razed.

Developers secured the property mostly through cash options to home owners. Tidyman's attorneys also sought changes to the city zoning code and the neighborhood's land-use plan. The proposal was debated for months.

"I am basically troubled by the notion that someone can seize a large tract of land and create a neighborhood crisis," said Plan Commission member Jim Bamberger.

He said the project conflicts with a citywide policy of locating large retail centers at the intersections of major arterials rather than side streets.

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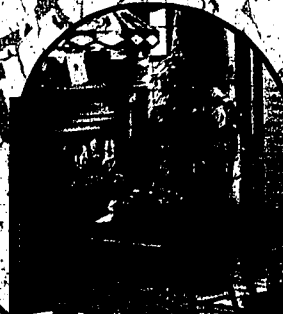
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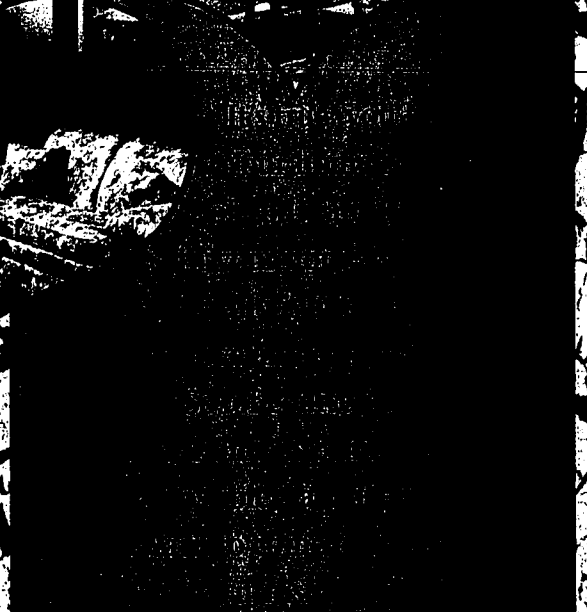

## Hearing set in Elmore murder case

**MOUNTAIN HOME** - Four Mountain Home residents face a Nov. 2 preliminary hearing in the death of an 84-year-old woman whom investigators say was murdered.

The hearing date was set Thursday during an afternoon court appearance, said a spokeswoman in the Elmore County prosecuting attorney's office.

Each of the four, the spokeswoman said. The four were arraigned Wednesday morning on charges ranging from first-degree murder and conspiracy to commit first-degree murder to forgery.

The charges came in the death of Velma M. Hartley, whom police say was smothered as she slept the night of Sept. 23. Police allege that Hartley's daughter and granddaughter were in on the murder. Muriel K. Banes, 41, Hartley's daughter, has been charged with aiding and abetting first-degree murder, conspiracy

to commit first-degree murder, and forgery.

Banes' boyfriend, David O. Nelson, 45, faces charges of first-degree murder and conspiracy to commit first-degree murder.

Kimberly Bennett, 19, Banes' daughter and Hartley's granddaughter, faces charges of conspiracy to commit first-degree murder and passing forged checks.

Bennett's boyfriend, William C. Schuller II, 20, faces a charge of conspiracy to commit first-degree murder.

Two fishermen found Hartley's body on Oct. 9 approximately 27 miles east of Mountain Home and 10 miles north of Glenns Ferry. She was dressed only in a nightgown.

A court complaint alleges that Banes paid Nelson \$500 to smother Hartley and that Bennett and Schuller were in on the conspiracy.

The complaint also alleges that after Hartley died, Banes forged two checks for a total of \$400 and that Bennett passed the checks.

### Deputies seek suspect in January stabbing

**TWIN FALLS** - Sheriff's investigators are looking for a man in connection with a stabbing last January.

Juan Carlos Fuentes, 20, is wanted in the stabbing of Bernardo Brazil at a home on Camarillo Street on Jan. 21. He faces two counts of aggravated battery.

Fuentes had fled the Twin Falls area but Twin Falls County sheriff's Sgt. Bob Gauthier said Thursday he believes Fuentes is back in the area.

Fuentes is 5-foot-5, 150 pounds with black hair and brown eyes, Gauthier said. He has tattoos of a rose, dragon and cross on his left arm and tattoos of a dragon and cross on his right arm. Anyone with information can call Gauthier at 236-4108.

Another man involved in the fight, Adan Tito Cantu, pleaded guilty last week to misdemeanor battery and was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail. Cantu allegedly hit two people with an iron meat hook in the melee.

### News photographer's trial scheduled for Jan. 31

**JEROME** - A Jan. 31 trial has been set for a Times-News photographer charged with obstructing and delaying law officers at the scene of a fatal car collision.

Mike Salsbury was arrested by a Jerome County sheriff's deputy at a Sept. 28 collision on Interstate 84 at the Jerome exit 168.

Salsbury's attorney, Monte B. Carlson of Twin Falls, confirmed Thursday that the trial date had been set.

### Bullets struck truck during Quincy Street shooting

**TWIN FALLS** - Bullets apparently hit more than a house in Monday night's drive-by shooting on Quincy Street.

A resident of the street has reported to police that she found a slug in the hood of her truck that was parked on the street.

Linda Baker, 158 Quincy, reported hearing gunshots around 10 p.m. Monday night. That's the same time that someone shot at a house at 309 Quincy.

Wednesday, Baker found a 9-mm bullet in the hood of her truck, according to a Twin Falls police report. Investigators found a 9-mm bullet in the kitchen wall of the house at 309 Quincy following the shooting Monday night.

Witnesses to the shooting reported hearing shots in several locations on Quincy Street. Police Lt. Jim Kistler said the shooter probably hit the wrong house.

The house next door - 319 Quincy - was targeted in a shooting in late September. Four days later a double-wide trailer home in the Skyline Trailer Park was shot at.

A 16-year-old boy sleeping in the trailer home had been living at 319 Quincy the night of the driver-by shooting.

## Former state representative wants Otter's job

**TWIN FALLS** - In the world of politics, campaigning for lieutenant governor may seem a lot like taking your sister to the prom - better than nothing, but not by much.

Lieutenant governor is a part-time job (only three months out of the year), it doesn't pay that much (\$20,000 a year), and the only real duties, aside from waiting for the governor to die or quit, are to preside over the state Senate and break the occasional tie vote.

Nonetheless, three Republicans - including C.L. "Butch" Otter, who's held the post for the last eight years - are pursuing the state's No. 2 job. One of them,

traveling around the state, said he's "quite encouraged" by the response he's received so far.

"I'm not well-known (in southern Idaho), and I would have a big job ahead of me to achieve the level of recognition necessary," he said. "But there does seem to be some level of dissatisfaction with the incumbent, and people seem to think that, with my legislative and business background, I'm well-qualified."

Former state Rep. Dean Sorenson of Boise, husband of current state Sen. Sheila Sorenson, is also pursuing the lieutenant governor's spot. No Democrats have yet expressed interest in the position.

Haugenson said he would decide whether to run or not by next month. But he already has ideas about what he'd like

to do with the office if a Republican wins the governor's chair.

He would, if asked, help the governor put together the first GOP administration since 1970, and would propose forming a "productivity council" to review state regulations with an eye to repealing those that were overly burdensome on business, especially natural-resources industries.

Haugenson also faulted Otter, who is serving his second term under Democrat Cecil Andrus, for being too close to the governor and missing the opportunity to promote Republican policies.

"If the governor's from the opposite party, it seems to me that one of the things a lieutenant governor can do is be a spokesman for his party - when he thinks

**HAGERMAN** - A public dinner on at 7 p.m. Saturday at the American Legion Hall in Hagerman will benefit Harland and Linda Wilson, who lost most of their personal possessions in a house explosion Oct. 9.

The funds also will help Steve Crandall and his son, Steve Crandall, who were in the house at the time working on a gas furnace.

Bill Wilson, brother of Harland Wilson, said Thursday that the house on Bruneau Street, owned by Bill and Joy Snapp, was completely destroyed by the blast.

Linda Wilson and the two Crandalls were in the house at the time of the explosion, he said, and all three suffered burns and hearing damage. Linda Wilson was trapped in fallen ceiling plaster and was rescued by firemen.

Harland had just stepped outside and was hit in the neck by a piece of flying glass but is all right, Bill Wilson said.

He said the blast was felt throughout the city up to three miles away.

"We thought it was a sonic boom," Wilson said. "I'm surprised they can still hear at all."

Everything breakable inside the house was destroyed, he said, and even unbreakable things like the bed and some clothing were ripped by flying glass.

The west side of the foundation was blown apart, the roof lifted and dropped back into place.

The south wall was blown out, and the roof above it collapsed. A carport roof fell onto an automobile, and other walls were pushed outward. No damage-cost estimates were available.

Fire chief Rolly Zollinger said it was miraculous that the three people in the house were not killed.

## Twin Falls, Lincoln sheriffs still want attorneys

**TWIN FALLS** - The Twin Falls County and Lincoln County sheriffs plan to press on in trying to hire private attorneys in battles with their boards of county commissioners.

"The cause we have is just. It's important. It's a constitutional issue," Lincoln County Sheriff Steve Southwick said Thursday.

Twin Falls County Sheriff Wayne Touseley said he still needs legal advice and will try to get it. "I'm not going to let it die. I still have some legal answers I need out there," Touseley said.

However, Wood also outlined three options for the sheriffs:

- Appeal in court the commissioners' decisions to deny the sheriffs' requests.
- Argue in court that the Idaho Constitution allows them to hire private attorneys.
- Ask their county prosecuting attorneys to appoint special prosecutors to look into their concerns.

Southwick wants to challenge the Lincoln County Commission's decision to move the sheriff's dispatch from Shoshone to Jerome County. He says the decision to relocate the dispatch takes away his ability to run the sheriff's office and perform the duties of sheriff.

"That's a constitutional issue that affects officeholders statewide, Southwick said.

"Where are they (commissioners) going to stop?" he asked. Saying that the Lincoln County prosecutor would have a conflict of interest in representing him and the commissioners, he asked the commissioners to allocate money for a private at-

torney to represent him in his court challenge. The commissioners denied his request.

Touseley wants to hire a lawyer to sort out concerns about the sheriff's budget passed by the Twin Falls County Commission in September.

He contends the budget does not provide enough money to adequately run the sheriff's office. He also questions whether the budget process was properly followed.

Touseley and his lawyer, Laird Stone, will weigh which course to follow in his case. So far, he has paid Stone's bill himself.

"We haven't made up our mind. We're not sure which is the best way to proceed at this time," Touseley said.

Before Southwick proceeds he'll have to find someone to pay his attorney, Robert C. Huntley Jr. of Boise. Huntley has worked for free so far, Southwick said. Southwick said he might have to borrow the money or seek donations to pay Huntley.

### FCC: Cable TV rates decreased in 1993

**WASHINGTON** — Cable TV rates went down this year for most subscribers, according to a preliminary report released today by the Federal Communications Commission. Still, 31 percent of cable subscribers in the nationwide sampling saw their rates go up between April and September, when new rate regulations went into effect. The report's findings are preliminary because they deal only with 14 of the 25 companies surveyed. The FCC declined to give any information about their findings on the other companies. Among the 68 percent of customers who saw lower bills, the average decrease was about 8 percent with subscribers getting an average 6 percent more channels. Stated differently, the average bill for basic cable service declined about \$2, with customers getting two more channels than they had before.

### King Videocable, which serves much of the Magic Valley, reduced its price for basic cable service but also reduced the number of basic channels offered.

## Amtrak cuts Idaho rail route

**WASHINGTON** — To save \$10 million a year, Amtrak will reduce service on three passenger train routes, including its southern Idaho route, and shut 15 ticket offices Nov. 4.

"The rail line is forced to cut service because it is not getting a requested increase in federal subsidies this year to offset declining ticket sales, spokesman Howard Robertson said Thursday.

The Pioneer, which has operated daily between Chicago and Seattle through Denver and Portland, will have only three runs a week west of Denver — departing Denver and Seattle on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday.

The Pioneer, which stops in Shoshone and runs through other Magic Valley towns, provides the only passenger train service in southern Idaho. Amtrak also cut the Texas Eagle, between Chicago and San Antonio-Houston, and the River Cities between Kansas City and New Orleans.

The rail line also delayed a decision on eliminating three commuter trains on its Harrisburg to Philadelphia route. Amtrak is seeking funding from Pennsylvania and said an announcement is expected soon.

Ticket offices will be closing in: Delray Beach, Fla.; Pocatello, Idaho; Centralia, Ill.; Chillicothe, Ill.; Mattoon, Ill.; Fort Wayne, Ind.; Hattiesburg, Miss.; McComb, Miss.; Malta, Mont.; Southern Pines, N.C.; Devils Lake, N.D.; Amsterdam, N.Y.; Youngstown, Ohio; Temple, Texas; and Cheyenne, Wyo.

Those closings combined with a staff reduction at ticket offices in Johnson City, N.Y., and Lehigh, Pa., will eliminate the positions of 33 ticket agents, Robertson said. "We will try where possible to put those people elsewhere," he said.

Amtrak wants to eliminate 149 other positions by the end of the year, but has not identified where those cuts would be imposed. "It's a long-term goal for fiscal year 1994," Robertson said.

Trains will continue to stop at stations where ticket offices are being closed. Passengers with reservations can buy their tickets from the conductors on the trains for which they have reserved seats, but passengers without reservations will have to get their tickets in advance from a travel agent or at an Amtrak ticket office elsewhere.

Amtrak, with 25,000 employees nationwide, will get \$351 million from the federal government this fiscal year, the same as it receives last year but less than the \$381 million it requested. Amtrak revenues for the 1991-92 fiscal year were \$1.3 billion, down from \$1.4 billion the previous year. Figures for last fiscal year, which ended Sept. 30, have not been compiled.

## Kimberly cuts \$300,000 off proposed water project

**KIMBERLY** — A proposed city water project — the fate of which will be decided next month — has been scaled down, a local engineer told residents Wednesday evening.

The project will now cost \$1.5 million, down from the \$1.8 million figure originally released, according to Scott Bybee of J-U-B Engineers.

The city will ask residents to approve a \$250,000 water bond issue to complete the project during the regular municipal election Nov. 2.

If the bond issue passes, residents will see a \$5 average increase on their water bills each month, city clerk Edythe Adams reported. The bond would be repaid over 20 years, Bybee said.

In addition to the bond, \$500,000 could come from the Idaho Community Development Block Grant Program, which is administered by the Idaho Department of Commerce. The city will contribute \$50,000 to the project.

The city does not qualify for one other grant, according to grant writer Jerry Miller, assistant planner for the Region IV Development Association Inc. Had the city qualified, it could have received up to \$500,000 from the Rural Development Administration — Farmers Home Administration Community Development Program.

Installation of water meters, a requirement of the FmHA grant and included in the original budget at a cost of nearly \$300,000, has now been cut from the project, Miller said.

Bybee told residents Wednesday that much of Kimberly's water system is 40 years old or older, and to completely upgrade the entire system could cost up to \$5 million.

The proposed project, Bybee said, would meet the most urgent needs of the greatest number of people. Benefits of the project would include better overall water pressure, better fire protection, increased water storage, and better water quality, he said.

The project would include a new well on the north side of town, a new water storage tank, well head protection, and fire hydrant and water line upgrades.

All the present city water wells are on the south side of town, Bybee said. A new well located on the north side of town would benefit the entire town, but the north side typically has the lowest water pressure.

Miller explained that increasing water pressure could lower costs of fire insurance for the entire community. Low water pressure in the north end increases water rates in other areas, he said, as rates in small towns are determined, in part, by the condition of the entire water system.

Department of Commerce grant eligibility is determined by several factors, Miller said. "But there are more applications than there is money," he said. The grant is not guaranteed.

If the bond issue is passed and the \$500,000 grant funded, construction would start in the fall of 1994, and the project would be completed in the spring of 1995, Bybee said. Monthly city fees would increase by about \$5, to about \$34.50 — which includes water, sewer, and garbage pickup. This figure includes a \$2 increase to cover higher county landfill fees.

## Castleford mulls school bond issue election

**CASTLEFORD** — The School Board wants to know if there is enough community support to justify holding a bond issue election next spring to replace the gym floor and remodel the locker room.

Crumbling walls, creaked pipes, inadequate space and cracked and broken boards in the gym floor are just some of the problems facing the district.

Last year, broken pipes in the walls cost the school district \$1,000 in repairs, and corroded water lines provide a weight room for only three showders at a time in the building.

A draft copy of the survey form was presented to members of the board at its meeting on Tuesday.

The survey will be hand delivered to community residents, sometime next spring, and "we'll abide by whatever the community wants," says Superintendent Kelly Murphy.

The questionnaire will ask whether the community will support a levy for the entire amount, half the amount, not for the amount, but to wait until the fall of 1994.

Replacing the gym floor, installing side baskets and expanding the north side of the building out 20 feet to enlarge the locker rooms and put in a weight room will cost as much as \$215,000 to \$230,000.

A two-year levy would require a tax increase of about \$60 per year on a \$50,000 house with a home owners' exemption and an increase of about \$170 per year on a \$100,000 farm with a \$40,000 home.

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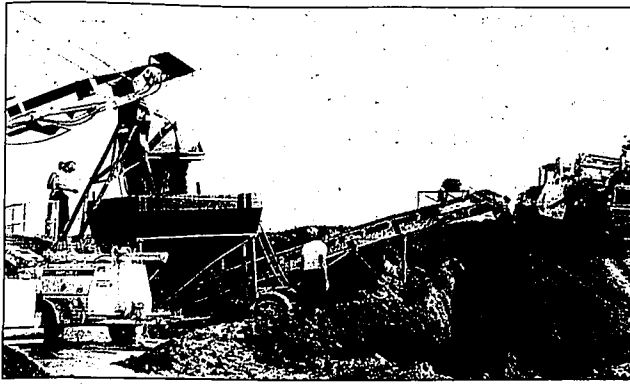

## Boiler breakdown chills children at Pershing Elementary School

RUPERT — Going to school at times has been a chilling experience for kindergartners and first graders at Pershing Elementary School in Rupert.

The building where about 120 students normally attend class is without heat because of a boiler breakdown. To alleviate the chill, students have been moved to vacant classrooms until a new boiler is installed.

The school consists of three separate buildings. "It's been very difficult to move out of the regular classrooms," Pershing Principal Goldie McClure said.

McClure, who was transferred from Acquia Elementary to Pershing this year, said she didn't know that the boiler needed repair or replacement until the recent cold weather struck.

Assistant Superintendent Dr. Richard Goodworth, who recently started working for the Minidoka

County School District, said he didn't know if the boiler had been malfunctioning in the past.

Jerry Frost of the district's maintenance department wasn't available for comment.

A new boiler is being installed in the building, and if everything goes as planned, work will be complete on Monday, Goodworth said.

McClure said some classrooms in the building where the young students meet are warmer than others.

Students have been moving into other classrooms "off and on for the last two weeks," McClure said. "We are trying to be patient and do the best we can."

She said teachers often feel colder than students because the students are active.

Space has been found to meet when temperatures in the regular classrooms are too cold. Temporary classrooms have included the lunchroom, she said.

But some activities have had to take

place in the regular classrooms, and teachers and students have gone into the cold rooms, McClure said.

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## Rupert officials approve mobile home subdivision

RUPERT — The city Planning and Zoning Committee Thursday evening approved a subdivision of 58 pre-fabricated homes in the southeast corner of Rupert.

Nicholls said that unlike other subdivisions, a committee of residents would enforce everything from yard

upkeep, the number of pets allowed, to where antennas and satellite dishes can be placed.

"People take pride in them, hopefully that's why they move in," Nicholls said.

If the city council approves the final

blueprints, a few homes could go up for sale this year, Nicholls said.

The hearing was to approve the requirements for the subdivision; the city council probably will review the final blueprint at the next city council meeting Nov. 2.

## Andrus accepts off-site WIPP nuclear waste testing

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus Thursday accused unnamed New Mexico state officials of trying to undermine efforts to open the nation's permanent dump for low-level, long-lived nuclear waste in that state.

And because of that internal opposition, Andrus grudgingly accepted the federal government's decision to abandon underground, on-site testing of the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant near Carlsbad for cheap off-site testing at still-undecided federal laboratories.

"Because of the resistance to opening WIPP by key people inside New Mexico state government, the rocks have been placed in the road,"

the governor said. "It is apparent that the position of New Mexico Governor Bruce King, the New Mexico Legislature and the people of Carlsbad continues to be ignored by certain bureaucrats." The Energy Department announced its decision on testing Wednesday but did not notify Andrus until Thursday.

Andrus has been campaigning for more than five years to force the government to begin removing the

millions of cubic feet of radioactive waste now temporarily stored at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

And he had previously said that he had been assured by top department officials that testing for the \$1.4 billion facility would involve waste now stored at INEL.

But in the notification letter from Assistant Energy Secretary Thomas Grumbly, that assurance was in effect withdrawn.

Grumbly said no decisions had been made on where test waste would come from or where the testing would be conducted, and "our consideration includes the waste stored at the Idaho National

Engineering Laboratory and INEL facilities as well as other alternatives."

In addition to the INEL, the department said potential test sites included the Los Alamos National Laboratory in New Mexico, Brookhaven National Laboratory on Long Island, N.Y., and Pacific Northwest Laboratory in Richland, Wash.

While Andrus still believes testing in the 19 bins and one cove of the salt caverns 2,150 feet underground was the best and safest method, he said he would back laboratory testing since that appears the only way to keep the drive alive toward finally opening the dump.

"Bureaucratic inertia has delayed licensing of WIPP so I have concluded that the surest way to move the test phase forward is to accept the Energy Department decision to study the storage in its laboratories," the governor said.

He urged Grumbly to include INEL scientists in that testing because of their expertise in nuclear science.

Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary, in announcing the testing decision, said the Clinton administration was attempting to give full consideration to the concerns of the scientific community and others who have raised questions about on-site testing.

Grumbly said above-ground lab

testing would provide accurate information more quickly and at lower cost — \$20 million to \$30 million. Underground tests were expected to cost 10 times that much.

And Wendell Weart, manager of the dump's technology department at Sandia National Laboratories, said using laboratories already working with radioactive material would eliminate likely additional delays in trying to get waste to the dump in southeastern New Mexico.

While that may not reinforce public confidence in the facility, he said that confidence should build later, because there will be a smaller-scale start-up once the dump opens that should show people WIPP is safe.

#### Former Kamiah clerk claims sex bias

KAMIAH — Former Kamiah City Clerk Tracye Santo has filed a complaint with the Idaho Human Rights Commission alleging gender discrimination and harassment against the Kamiah City Council.

Santo issued a statement about her allegations Wednesday, but declined to give specific details, saying she expects to follow with court action in the matter.

Santo was suspended with pay Sept. 23 from the Kamiah clerk's position she had held since early 1992. After a closed meeting with the city council Oct. 13, Santo resigned, saying the terms the city had offered would have prevented her from doing her job.

On advice of the city attorney, Kamiah Mayor Westley Pratt and other officials have declined to comment. Earlier Pratt said the clerk had been suspended because of unspecified irregularities in her job, including hiding several taped recordings of Kamiah City Council meetings.

#### Florida firm docked for bogus boat deal

BOISE — People who received notice in the mail they'd won a sport fishing boat and outboard motor had a few surprises coming.

At the bottom of the promotion from Ewing Fairchild International, Inc., a Florida marketing company, the lucky "winners" were notified they had to pay a \$99.50 shipping, handling and promotional fee.

What they got if they sent money was a small rubber dinghy. The "outboard motor" was a small, battery-powered motor — and they didn't even get a battery.

For victims of the scam, Attorney General Larry EchoHawk had good news Thursday. His Consumer Protection Unit has obtained a judgment against Ewing Fairchild in which the company is ordered to make full restitution, stop its illegal marketing practices and pay \$17,500 in civil penalties and fees.

Dom, 54, a Boise investment consultant, on Thursday launched his bid for the Republican nomination for governor in next May's primary.

#### Rash of suicides alarms, baffles experts

IDAHO FALLS — A rash of suicides in eastern Idaho has mental health experts alarmed and baffled.

Five people took their lives in five days this week, and there have been about a dozen suicides in the last two months. No one knows why.

"When we're seeing the numbers we're seeing, it's a red flag," said Benton Granville, assistant administrator at the Eastern Idaho Regional Behavioral Health Center in Idaho Falls. "The community needs to be aware of it."

#### EPA attorney says feds botched cleanup

COEUR D'ALENE — An attorney for the Environmental Protection Agency says the federal government should have moved much sooner against Gulf USA Corp. so it could have stopped the depletion of \$160 million in assets needed to cover pension obligations and clean up the Bunker Hill complex.

But, Ted Yakulic said, "there's really no point in armchair quarterbacking." Idaho Gov. ## AFL-CIO boss defends EchoHawk support

LEWISTON (AP) — The president of the Idaho AFL-CIO is deflecting criticism of organized labor's impending endorsement of Attorney General Larry EchoHawk in the 1994 three-way primary for the Democratic nomination for governor.

Randy Ambuehl contends the decision merely reflects labor's strong support for the attorney general's decision to abandon plans to seek a second term in favor of a bid for the state's top elected office.

Ambuehl has said most on the AFL-CIO's executive board are worried about Republicans controlling both the Legislature and the governorship in 1995 and believe EchoHawk has the best chance to keep the office in Democratic hands on the retirement of Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"I think that Larry is the person that the majority of our member-

ship feels comfortable with," he said. He pointed out that both Beitelspacher and Peavey voted to repeal Idaho's prevailing wage law for publicly-financed projects in 1985 while EchoHawk opposed repeal.

"Except for that one vote," Beitelspacher contended, "my labor voting record in 13 years has always been 100 percent with the working people, and all of my life I have been one of those working people."

He said he saw no purpose in

1985 to oppose the bill because of the overwhelming support from other lawmakers that guaranteed its enactment.

The prevailing wage law generally assured workers higher wages on public works projects in Idaho. And Beitelspacher insisted organized labor's endorsement of EchoHawk is not a setback.

"I have people in labor who are helping me and they are calling me," he said. "They are more irritated about it than influenced by it."

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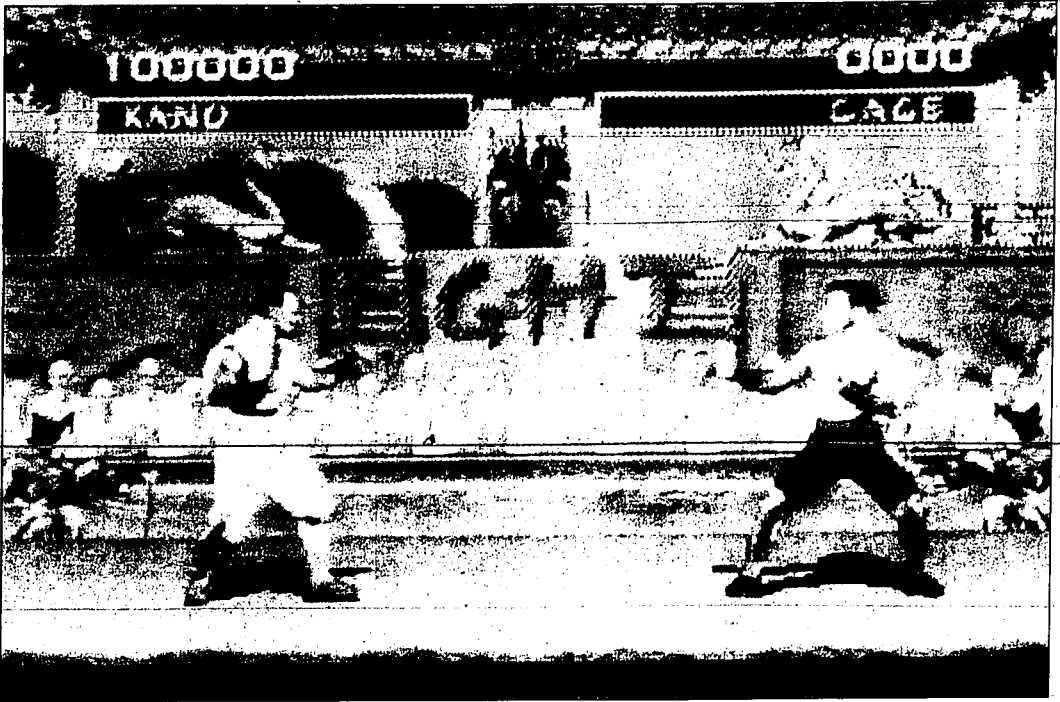

#### Former Kamiah clerk claims sex bias

KAMIAH — Former Kamiah City Clerk Tracey Santo has filed a complaint with the Idaho Human Rights Commission alleging gender discrimination and harassment against the Kamiah City Council.

Santo issued a statement about her allegations Wednesday, but declined to give specific details, saying she expects to follow with court action in the matter.

Santo was suspended with pay Sept. 23 from the Kamiah clerk's position. She had held the position since 1992. After a closed meeting with the city council Oct. 13, Santo resigned, saying the terms the city had offered would have prevented her from doing her job.

On advice of the city attorney, Kamiah Mayor Westley Pratt and other officials have declined to comment. Earlier Pratt said the clerk had been suspended because of unspecified irregularities in her job, including hiding several taped recordings of Kamiah City Council meetings.

#### Florida firm docked for bogus boat deal

BOISE — People who received notice in the mail they'd won a sport fishing boat and outboard motor had a few surprises coming.

At the bottom of the promotion from Ewing Fairchild International, Inc., a Florida marketing company, the lucky "winners" were notified they had to pay a \$99.50 shipping, handling and promotional fee.

What they got if they sent money was a small rubber dinghy. The "outboard motor" was a small, battery-powered motor — and they didn't even get a battery.

For victims of the scam, Attorney General Larry EchoHawk had good news Thursday. His Consumer Protection Unit has obtained a judgment against Ewing Fairchild in which the company is ordered to make full restitution, stop its illegal marketing practices and pay \$17,500 in civil penalties and fees.

#### Boise man joins GOP race for governor

BOISE — Doug Dom says people want a nontraditional candidate for governor next year. He says he's the man.

Dom, 54, a Boise investment consultant, on Thursday launched his bid for the Republican nomination for governor in next May's primary.

He's a political unknown in a race that already includes three other Republicans, but said the fact he has no political ties will be an asset. Former state chairman Phil Batt of Wilder and Boise candidates Chuck Wilder and Larry Eastland already are in the race to succeed Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus, but Dom used his announcement speech to attack a Democratic frontrunner, Attorney General Larry EchoHawk, rather than his GOP opponents.

#### Woman must wait for ruling in fire suit

BOISE — A 4th District Court judge says it will be at least a week before she decides if Jeanne Howard should be dropped as a defendant in a million-dollar lawsuit filed by the state.

Judge Deborah Bail will decide if Howard had the legal duty to notice the car her husband, Frederick, was towing behind their motor home was sending out sparks along Idaho 55 on July 17, 1992.

The state filed the lawsuit to recoup the costs of fighting a 6,000-acre fire that it claims the Lake Ariel, Pa., couple started. The couple's attorney, James Lynch of Boise, filed a defense motion to have Jeanne Howard, 70, dropped as a defendant.

#### Rash of suicides alarms, baffles experts

IDAHO FALLS — A rash of suicides in eastern Idaho has mental health experts alarmed and baffled.

Five people took their lives in five days this week, and there have been about a dozen suicides in the last two months. No one knows why.

"When we're seeing the numbers we're seeing, it's a red flag," said Benion Granville, assistant administrator at the Eastern Idaho Regional Behavioral Health Center in Idaho Falls. "The community needs to be aware of it."

#### EPA attorney says feds botched cleanup

COEUR D'ALENE — An attorney for the Environmental Protection Agency says the federal government should have moved much sooner against Gulf USA Corp. so it could have stopped the depletion of \$160 million in assets needed to cover pension obligations and clean up the Bunker Hill complex.

But, Ted Yakulic said, "there's really no point in armchair quarterbacking." Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus, however, has not been as kind since the Department of Justice earlier this week finally asked a federal judge to force Gulf USA into involuntary bankruptcy in a bid to salvage at least some cash for environmental cleanup and payments to thousands of Bunker Hill retirees.

## AFL-CIO boss defends EchoHawk support

LEWISTON (AP) — The president of the Idaho AFL-CIO is deflecting criticism of organized labor's impending endorsement of Attorney General Larry EchoHawk in the 1994 three-way primary for the Democratic nomination for governor.

Randy Ambuehl contends the decision merely reflects labor's strong support for the attorney general's decision to abandon plans to seek a second term in favor of a bid for the state's top elected office.

With only a two-thirds majority required, the AFL-CIO's political education committee has already voted 18-1 to support EchoHawk. Only one vote has not been mailed in, Ambuehl said.

But former state Sen. Ron Beitelbacher of Grangeville, who along with state Sen. John Peavey of Carey is challenging EchoHawk in next May's primary, called labor's endorsement misguided.

Perennial candidate David Shepherd of Lewiston is also running.

As a lineman for Washington Water Power Co. and a "fella that has paid union dues for more than 20 years, I think it is frankly a mistake," Beitelbacher said on Tuesday.

"I think organized labor is best served when it waits out the primary and lets the candidates build organizations — then measure who did the best job."

Ambuehl has said most on the AFL-CIO's executive board are worried about Republicans controlling both the Legislature and the governorship in 1994 and believe EchoHawk has the best chance to keep the office in Democratic hands on the retirement of Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"I think that Larry is the person that the majority of our member-

ship feels comfortable with," he said. He pointed out that both Beitelbacher and Peavey voted to repeal Idaho's prevailing wage law for publicly-financed projects in 1985 while EchoHawk opposed repeal.

"Except for that one vote," Beitelbacher countered, "my labor voting record in 13 years has always been 100 percent with the working people, and all of my life I have been one of those working people."

He said he saw no purpose in

1985 to oppose the bill because of the overwhelming support from other lawmakers that guaranteed its enactment.

The prevailing wage law generally assured workers higher wages on public works projects in Idaho.

And Beitelbacher insisted organized labor's endorsement of EchoHawk is not a setback.

"I have people in labor who are helping me, and they are calling me," he said. "They are more irritated about it than influenced by it."

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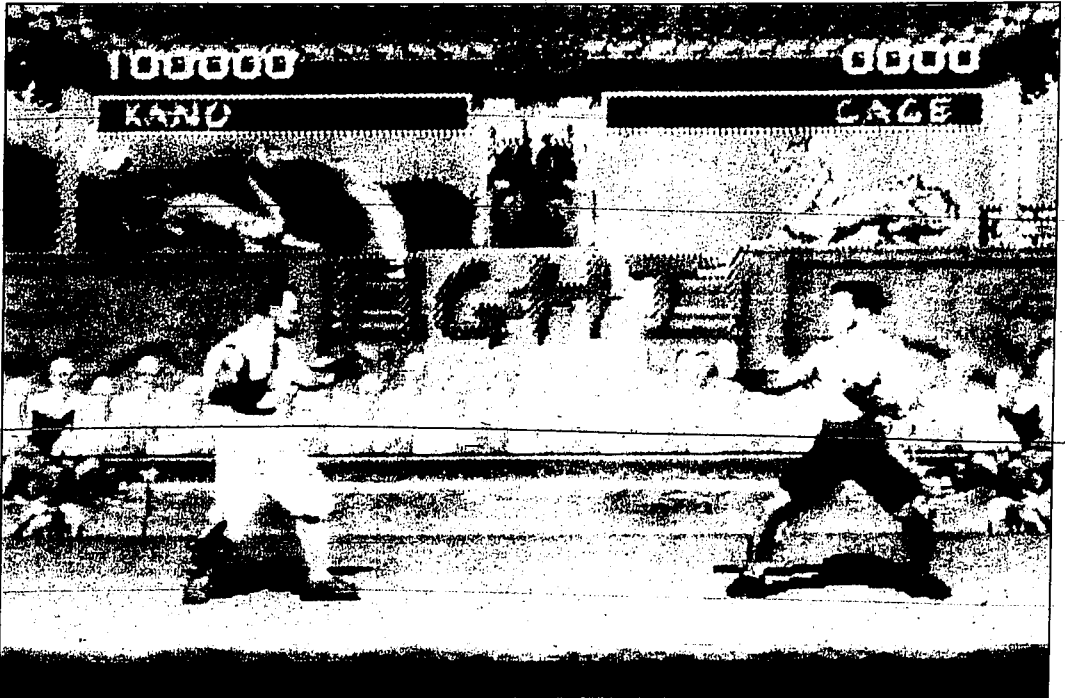

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# Garth Inc.: When you say Brooks, you've said country

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — It's hard to say when he blossomed from a mere country music success story into a cultural touchstone, one of those celebrities whose last name is superfluous.

Garth. In the John Singleton movie "Poetic Justice," the subject of country music comes up between two urban men. The name with which they associate it is Garth Brooks.

On MTV's "The Real World," aspiring country singer Jon Brannon phones home and is cut off by his father with the explanation, "Garth is singing the national anthem (on television)."

When Eddie Murphy needed a country-music representative for his attempt at a "We Are the World"-type song — he called Garth.

He'll likely be the only country singer on the upcoming Kiss tribute album. (Brooks calls his lead vocal on "Hard Luck Woman" his "tribute to Peter Criss.")

Brooks' power is reflected in big and small ways.

One kind of singer would dare alienate consumers with an outspoken stance against used CDs? Why would anyone who wants airplay on always-conservative country radio stations release "We Shall Be Free," with its line advocating that people "love anyone they choose"? The song was No. 7, instead of Brooks' customary No. 1 on the Billboard country singles chart.

Not that Brooks believes he's doing such controversy.

"It doesn't bother me," he said during an interview at his record company's office.

Dressed in one of his trademark plaid shirts and black cowboy hats, Brooks was soft-spoken and intense.

"My job is to be the most honest Garth Brooks I can be, and I say these things because I believe them," said Brooks, 31.

"I don't think we can be free until everyone can love who they choose, and something has got to

be done about used CDs.

"I've got more money than I'll ever be able to use, but people who are like brothers and sisters (songwriters) to me are getting ripped off. Two things can happen with used CDs — either find a way to pay the people who create them or they must be wiped out."

It is hard to overestimate Brooks' popularity. He is the best-selling recording artist so far in the 1990s, with total sales hovering around 30 million.

"The Chase," Brooks' last album, contained "We Shall Be Free" and sold about 5 million copies, about half of what he's become accustomed to.

"I thought I was finished," Brooks said, completely serious. At the time, Brooks spoke publicly of retiring and devoting himself to being a father.

Instead, wife Smokey and baby-girl Taylor Mayne Pearl (named after James Taylor and Minnie Pearl) are joining him on the road as he promotes his new record, "In Pieces."

"In Pieces," immaculately pro-

duced by Allen Reynolds, is a nice helping of the now-familiar Brooks style. That means intensely sung slices of life balanced with rollicking odes to the regular guy, and one or two stylistic twists.

"The Night I Called the Old Man Out" is a good example as to what keeps Brooks solidly country, despite showmanship inspired by 1970s arena rock. In rock "n' roll, the story would end with youth coming out on top. In Brooks' hands, the story ends with the rebel being taught a lesson.

"The most telling point to me is the tear in the old man's eye — that he doesn't get any pleasure from the situation," Brooks said.

Brooks reunited one of his favorite bands, New Grass Revival, to play on his version of the "Callin' Baton Rouge." To do so, he had to fly in banjo player Bela Fleck from a tour with his Flecknotes. Besides that, he sticks with the same revolving group of songwriters and players that has been on every Brooks album since "Garth Brooks" in 1989.

anything from postures to angry words."

"Mortal Kombat" may be the most notorious game to ever come off the drawing board, but it is neither the most violent nor the most realistic game available to children in the arcades. The consensus is that "Night Trap" (a stalker game that features zombies driving bolts through the necks of scantily-clad girls) and "Time Killers" (dismemberment by chain saw) are more violent. And the most realistic, graphically advanced game in the arcades today isn't a combat game at all — it's NBA Jams Basketball.

Why are 70 percent to 80 percent of all video games combat-oriented? Szabo and others in the industry say it's the young-boys' market that demands it.

"I don't like the direction of the games, but the audience dictates where the trend goes," says Bob Szabo, owner of a video arcade in Mountain View, Calif. "I got a call from a parent asking me why don't we have more non-fighting games for little kids. I told her, 'If you see one I'll buy it.' I'll go down to L.A. to the video industry show for three days and not see one reasonably successful kiddie game."

Kinder, who wrote the book "Playing With Power in Movies, Television and Video," says it's a mistake to single out violent games as a problem in a culture where violence is so pervasive. "You can't blame the violence of the culture on video games such as 'Mortal Kombat.' But what is tremendously disturbing is here you have a new medium that has enormous cognitive value, and you see it immediately being used to transmit and reinforce violence."

Ferrell, who edits PlayRight, a video advisory letter for parents in addition to GamePro, says he believes video games are a small part of the media violence menu that kids ingest.

"You have rock videos, movies, television all around. Seeing (Los Angeles riot victim Reginald) Denry was one of the most horrible things I've ever seen in my life, and kids saw that repeatedly. The video game industry doesn't have anything to match that in terms of real horror."

"Up to this point the images haven't been like film or video — they've been animation," Ferrer continues. "The only difference between (games) and watching Brutus beat the living hell out of Popeye is that you may be doing some of the punching."

Kinder believes participating in violent games — as opposed to just watching violent acts — will have a different effect on children. But the evidence is not here yet.

"Clearly children are being positioned to get pleasure by inflicting violence. They're identifying with the ones who are inflicting violence. And they're learning that acting out violence is empowering. The notion that combat is fun is a very disturbing one."

# 'Mortal Kombat': Playing in arena of death

Formats: Sega Genesis, Game Gear, Super Nintendo, Game Boy.

Price, manufacturer: \$29 to \$69, Acclaim.

Recommended ages: 13 and up.

How the game works: "Mortal Kombat" debuted in four versions of the original martial arts arcade game. You play as one of seven digitized players — Kano, Johnny Cage, Sonya, Liu Kang, Sub-Zero, Scorpion and Rayden. In the three-match free-for-all, you fight each of the six fighters, then against yourself in a mirror match, then three endurance matches. If you live, you then fight Master Shang Tsung. All matches are to the death.

Good points, bad points: The graphics in the SNES are better defined over the Genesis version,

plus the sound duplicates every bone-crushing blow, just like in the arcade. Genesis wins the speed factor by a hair; just choose the Bruce Lee clone of Liu Kang (my favorite). Genesis and SNES fighters are at least 65 percent bigger than in other games. Sega's version is rated MA-13 for graphic violence and with "Mortal Kode" (Mode A), you'll get the original bloody arcade finishing moves by hitting buttons, A, B, A, C, A, B and B. Play on Game Gear is a true winner over Game Boy. Try Acclaim's Dual Turbo wireless remote controllers for easy use and less eye strain (you can sit about 15 to 20 feet away from your TV). Tip: These versions have some new moves and surprises, so stay sharp.

The verdict: Even though Genesis gives you more graphic violence, the SNES version holds its own in the arena of death.

As for "Mortal Kombat," the tempo in a top box is starting to look more like a savvy marketing play — and less like a threat to the moral fiber of callow youth.

The game, which depicts spine-ripping, brain-blasting, heart-shredding and other sundry acts of mayhem in ultra-vivid, digitally modeled detail, had been a video arcade staple for more than a year before the home version was released. The arcade version — gorier than anything now available at home — garnered not a peep of protest.

That was before a \$10 million ad campaign for the home version, which included a television spot featuring hundreds of children running through the streets bellowing "Mortal Kombat!"

Within the industry, there's not a lot of question that campaign was the primary cause of the furore. Says Szabo: "They got exactly what they wanted for \$10 million — a little bit of controversy."

Also, "Mortal Kombat" had a built-in "secret" element: the fatal "finishing moves" that feature a level of gore previously available only in the arcades. The game's creators, Acclaim Entertainment, produced cartridges for the Nintendo and Sega game systems. The two Nintendo versions do not feature the controversial death sequences. The Sega Genesis version does — provided one knows the right code to access them.

Naturally, within days of the home release, the code was common knowledge on playgrounds across the country. Video magazines printed detailed charts and precise instructions for ripping hearts and popping brains. Thus, a hit was born.

A possible reason for the backlash

is that the game (along with the earlier "Night Trap") is the first to bring arcade-scale gore into the home, where it may be accessible to younger children on a continual basis.

For a parent who hasn't studied video games since the advent of Pac-Man, the level of realism brought home by the digitalization of real actors may be a shock. As vivid as it may be, "Mortal Kombat" is a technological half-step — weak tea compared with the CD-ROMs and virtual reality set-ups that are just entering the home market.

So what are parents to do when confronted by the possibility of guinea-fests on the family television? "Every time we ask the kids for input, they tell us they want the violence," says Ferrell. "I don't know what that says about our society. Certainly a parent wouldn't automatically say yes to everything a child wants. The parent has to play an interested, informed role. I had to make the Jurassic Park decision with my 5-year-old. And I decided not to let her experience that violence at that age."

Kinder, who is both inside the industry as a game evaluator and outside as an academic, has her doubts whether super-violent games are appropriate entertainment for any age: "Mortal Kombat" has been rated MA-13 (for mature audiences with parental discretion advised), but is it good for any age? I'm not sure. It's a difficult issue for me. A parent should actually look at it in the arcade and see what you're dealing with. Ask your child, 'Why do you think this is so much fun?'"

Kinder said her own young son has yet to get "Mortal Kombat" at home. "He asks every day. We're still negotiating the issue."

and saying "why did you rent this to my kid? no, that just hasn't happened."

Gardner says his business adheres to Sega's rating system; he won't rent "Mortal Kombat" to children who are obviously too young to handle very violent video games.

"I've had kids 7, 8 come in an ask for it," he said.

"Mortal Kombat" is a veteran of video arcades, including those in Twin Falls, and the target audience of 12 to 15-year-olds that is renting or buying it — \$59.95 for the Sega

version — has played it often before.

"A lot of kids play it very well," Gardner said. "Sega has a code to access the more violent version of that game, and it wasn't very long before they had it figured out."

The fact that all this seems to be escaping parents locally doesn't surprise Dr. Wayne Wright, a Twin Falls cardiologist who is president of the Idaho Family Forum.

"As a general rule, I don't think most parents know what their kids are watching," he said.

Dobbs says parents need to spend a half-hour watching "Beavis & Butt-head," the over-the-top MTV

cartoon saga of two maladjusted, fire-loving adolescents.

"I think they'd be surprised," he said.

After a poll of parents last year, Dobbs turned down a proposal to put video games in the O'Leary cafeteria.

"Kids have access to video games just about every place but school," he said. "Parents need to realize that, and they need to realize what their kids are being exposed to."

"It would be concerned about the extreme violence contributing to desensitizing of young minds," Wright said. "It seems to me this is being driven by the bottom line."

learned two or three dozen Hawaiian words.

Blossom Mathews (coordinator of Magic Valley SAFE Kids), who is from Hawaii, is helping the kids with the language and dances.

Five nights a week, the young people are rehearsing — gliding around an island drummer, begging their ruler to allow his daughter to marry.

The story goes like this: A Chinese man settled in Hawaii and married a princess there, despite an omen that the couple would have 13 daughters; none of whom would ever marry. But the seventh daughter finds a suitor. Unlucky, for her, since custom dictates that the oldest daughter must marry first.

From there, the story unfolds, and each thing dressed in hula skirts and Chinese robes.

Price Hamilton plays the father, Laurie Strand the mom and Vienna Bostock the seventh daughter.

"I'm in a wedding dress," said Vienna, a freshman at Buhl High School. "It's kind of scary since I'm only 15."

Actually though, Vienna said, she has enjoyed all of her experiences on the JUMP Co. set. And, with five years of dance and theater to her credit, she thinks the hula is a snap.

"It's a lot like ballet," she said.

Music and dance is a big part of "Thirteen Daughters." In fact, the original play contained 52 songs.

But, when the Twin Falls version

of the show opens, no one will need to bring along a sleeping bag. The kids will only be performing 10 songs — the best 10, they said.

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# Pearl Jam wary of superstardom

LOS ANGELES — It's not that Eddie Vedder is antisocial. That's not why he's driving his record company nuts by declining to talk in the press about Pearl Jam's new album, "Vs.," which just hit the stores.

Like his equally silent bandmates, Vedder is simply being careful now that Pearl Jam has become one of the rock machine's hottest commodities. He has to be, if only for his own sake. Suddenly everybody wants a piece of you; everybody wants to be your friend. Suddenly actresses want to date him. Vedder's not buying into it.

"I was listening to an old Who record yesterday while chopping some wood," Vedder said in a rare interview backstage at the MTV Video Awards last month. "Pete Townshend was definitely talking about some industry stuff. Pete tells the truth."

The song, "How Many Friends" from 1975's "The Who by Numbers," long has been a Vedder favorite.

"I remember relating to that song when I was 14, before all this," he said, gesturing to the MTV hula-hula all around him.

He shook his head and quoted a couple of lines from the song: "How many friends have I really got? He looked down and spread his fingers. "I can count them on one hand."

Finding those real friends becomes a chore. "You get related to an icon," he said.

Despite the 90-degree temperature, Vedder arrived at the MTV Video Awards rehearsals wrapped protectively in a bulky Army jacket, with a sarcastic "I (heart) grunge" T-shirt underneath. He wore a full-head rubber mask on his way in, thwarting the MTV cameras in their attempts to get a piece of him the same way he would blow him off MTV's Kurt Loder — live on the air — the next night.

Sure, some of it is plain attitude. But despite his energetic performances fronting Pearl Jam, Vedder is genuinely reserved.

If it's a game to some, it's more serious to the band. It's to the point where Vedder and the other members of Pearl Jam are doing no interviews for the album except for a piece for Spin magazine and one for Rolling Stone. Epic officials even confiscated tapes from radio reporters who interviewed Vedder.

But backstage at the MTV Awards rehearsals last month, before the media blackout, Vedder sat down for a chat about success and the upcoming album, at that time still untitled.

At times a one-word-answer kind of guy, Vedder this time relaxed and tried hard to express what was going on in his and the band's existence as they prepared to step again into the maelstrom of a new album, a tour, publicity, reviews, expectations.

Especially expectations. Little was expected of "Ten" when it was released in 1991. With sales of 5 million in the United States alone on its first album, things are quite a bit different this time out.

But the band is trying to keep things the same. "Luxury can make you lazy. We have the same work ethic as always. We try to keep it natural," Vedder said.

It's hard to stay natural when you're thrust in the most unnatural of situations. Last time even Pearl Jam got burned out on being Pearl Jam. Success can be trying even to those who enjoy its rewards. And you can get sick of any song, even your own, if you hear it too much.

"It's a shame to be overplayed," Vedder said. "The greatest song in the world can make you sick if you play it too many times."

The pressure of expectations is hard enough. Making it harder are the attacks Pearl Jam has withstood from its peers, fellow Seattle resident Kurt Cobain in particular. Nirvana's leader recently made peace with the band personally — the two will reportedly even play a benefit concert together. But in the past, Cobain has attacked Pearl Jam's music as the worst sort of sell-out, a classic example of everything wrong with rock music.

The band was formed in 1990 under the name Mookie Blaylock after the basketball player for the Atlanta Hawks.

Bassist Jeff Ament and guitarist Stone Gossard were part of the defunct Seattle band Green River and went on to form Mother Love Bone with singer Andrew Wood. He later died of a drug overdose, shattering the group.

Ament and Gossard hooked up with other local musicians in the one-shot "Temple of the Dog" album and decided to continue the collaboration with Vedder. Guitarist Mike McCready and drummer Dave Abbruzzese joined, and the band was set.

The band broke big and became the major attraction of the second Lollapalooza tour in 1992. That fame grew ever larger with an MTV Unplugged appearance and last summer's European tour with buddy Neil Young, peaking with a Young/Pearl Jam collaboration on MTV with "Rockin' in the Free World."

Despite the pressure, scrutiny and criticism, the actual recording of the album was easy, Vedder said. Like a tightrope walker, you just can't think about how high you are.

Vedder offered an earthier analogy: "If you want to break a beer bottle over your head, you don't think about it. If you think about it, you're not going to hit it hard enough and you're just going to hurt your head. If you don't think about it, you're going to obliterate it."

# Disney's 'A Far Off Place' reaches nearby video outlets

"A Far Off Place" is a children's safari into the soul of Africa, a broadening journey through a vanishing universe where elephants converse telepathically with Bushmen. A thematic cousin of "The Gods Must Be Crazy," this lovely, sometimes violent adventure also celebrates the spiritual link between the nomadic Bushmen and their fragile desert ecosystem. It teaches, without being overly obvious, values too dear to be lost along with these gentle, endangered people.

Based on two books by Laurens van der Post, this classic Disney film features Sarel Bok in the pivotal role of the compassionate Xhabbo, the Bushman who shepherds two white teen-agers across the dunes of southern Africa's Kalahari. During the 1,000-mile trek, he also takes them into a realm that can be reached only through dreams. Xhabbo (pronounced click-Habbo) doesn't practice standard issue abracadabra, but he does have keys to the magic kingdom.

It's thanks to Xhabbo's supernatural powers that the story's heroine — a boy in van der Post's originals — survives the massacre of her parents, anti-poaching activists. Nonnie (Reese Witherspoon) is a resourceful

14-year-old, hardly with an elephant gun and good with explosives. She escapes along with Harry (Ethan Randall), a bratty American kid whose father is also killed in the ivory poachers' assault. Xhabbo foresees the tragedy in a "napping," and persuaded the two teens to stay the night in his cave.

When she hears the gunfire, Nonnie runs back to the lodge, where she is spotted by one of the gang of Rambo-esque elephant killers. Her escape entails blowing up two trucks and the lodge, but she knows the villains will continue to pursue her. Back at the cave, she and Xhabbo decide that crossing the Kalahari is the only alternative. "If the wind can do it, we can do it," says the confident Xhabbo.

Harry, the Ugly American as adolescent, calls Xhabbo's beliefs nonsense. "That ... saved your life," snags Nonnie. Harry, who wants his MTV, has been a peeved puppy since the day he arrived in Africa. But he's due for his comeuppance from the sharp-tongued Nonnie and

his redemption from the gentle Xhabbo. The Bushman becomes like an older brother to Harry, teaching him not only to find water but to understand Nonnie. "Woman is like tree, judge not by the flowers, but the fruit," advises Xhabbo.

The Bushman, on the other hand, can't make sense of Harry's attempt to explain satellites, television and other modern magic. He can talk to elephants, trees, even sand dunes, but he can only giggle uncontrollably at the idea of putting stars in the sky or a man in a box. And when Xhabbo laughs, the stars seem to twinkle a little merrier. Yet nature is not always so kind, and the three, now dear companions, must overcome many hardships before their journey's over. 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# Sale gives touch of Third World to Idaho Valley happenings

**FILER** — In a church basement on a side street in Filer, you'll find Bangladesh.

Kenya, too, over there next to Mexico, just this side of Peru.

"It's exciting to see all these items, because you know that the people who made them now have a way to earn a living," says Lois Hooley.

Hooley helps run the Filer Mennonite Church's annual International Crafts Sale, made up entirely of crafts, art objects and toys made by artisans in the Third World.

"They're brought to the United States by Selfhelp Crafts U.S., a non-profit Pennsylvania-based marketing program that places them in craft fairs like this one."

"The difference between the jute plant-holder from India hanging over there on the wall and the one you'd buy in the mall is that the craftsman gets most of the money."

"Because most of the labor is made up of volunteers and we work with non-profit groups, our costs are lower," said Hooley. "There are no middle men."

"The artisan gets about half of whatever the item sells for, Hooley said. The Mennonites make nothing off the sale."

"Typically, Selfhelp works with co-operatives, groups of craftsmen and artisans who band together," she said.

"The standard of workmanship is very high. There's one cooperative in Latin America that makes alpaca sweaters, and if they're not right, they make the craftsmen take the yarn out and start all over."

"The items packed into the Mennonites' basement represent crafts from all over the world — baskets, brass, clothing, wall-hanging, toys, tablecloths, vases, bowls, bric-a-brac, greeting cards, Christmas decorations, chess sets. There's even a wooden parrot puzzle that's assembled vertically instead of horizontally."

"There are more 3,500 craftsmen

represented by Selfhelp," she said. "And the basement here is just packed."

"Many of items are made by artisans who can't make a living any other way, Hooley said."

"One woman in Bangladesh, for example, went to work for a craft co-op after her husband lost both arms in an accident. A small part of her pay was set aside for each item sold until that fund reached \$200; when she became independent of the co-op. By then she had her own marketable skill, and could support her family, Hooley said."

"Many of the crafts come from

refuge camps where people are sent temporarily and end up spending years or generations," she said. "They have nothing to do, no way to make a living — nothing but handouts. This gives them a chance to start again."

Selfhelp is one of several non-profit companies that market Third World crafts in the United States, Hooley said. Throughout the country, Mennonite churches cooperate both in marketing the products — there's even a thrift shop in Nampa.

"If we don't sell them here, you get a second chance to buy them there."

Hooley said more than 400 people had gone through the church basement as of Thursday afternoon. She expects more than 1,000 before the craft show closes Saturday night.

"It's a chance to do some Christmas shopping where your dollars really do some good," she said. "But it's also a chance to see some crafts that you're not going to see anywhere else around here."

"Since I've gotten the part I haven't watched the whole movie," said Sara Bruner, a Burley High School junior who plays Annette, the beauty shop assistant played by Darryl Hannah who goes from piety to profligacy to preg-

nancy. "I think being about the same age I can understand some of the things she's going through."

The story is set in a small town in Cajon country, in a beauty shop owned by a steel-willed woman named Truvy (Parton in the movie). The plot revolves around the upcoming wedding and subsequent married life Shelby (Roberts in the movie, Burley High junior Carrie Lyn Wahlquist in this production), the prettiest girl in town.

The beauty shop is the meeting place for the women of the community, a place where they gather to solve the problems of the day. The play travels with them as they suffer the hardships and relish the joys of life.

Shelby is the tragic lead character, but the movie's real heroine is M'Lynn, her mother (Field in the movie, Beckie Clark of Oakley in the play). It's M'Lynn's odyssey from Betty Crocker to Mother Courage that gives the play bite to go along with its poignancy.

"This play is different from most because you have six strong women characters," Stubbs said. "There's no

leading man. You have to have six strong actresses to handle the roles, and we've been fortunate to find them."

Karen Hatch of Burley plays the Olympia Dukakis role, that of Claire, the grand dame of Chiniquapin Parish. Kay Curtis of Burley tackles the Shirley MacLaine part, Ouiser, the cantankerous-but-loveable matron.

The movie took the Latcherie clan and their friends all over Louisiana, but the play is set entirely in Truvy's beauty shop.

"It's more of a challenge because you have to suggest other settings, through dialogue," Stubbs said. "You can't show them."

Stubbs, who graduated from Eastern Montana College and played three parts in last spring's OVAC production, "Guys and Dolls" and a role in last summer's melodrama, "A Golden Fleece," said members of the OVAC board approached him about directing "Steel Magnolias" after they heard he was interested.

"I was glad to get the chance," he said. "I think this a play people will remember."

# Master blaster: Godzilla lives

TOKYO — What's big, loud, vaguely reptilian and vents its spleen by pulverizing Japanese cities?

If you guessed Godzilla, Japan's favorite radiation-mutated building renovator, you're right.

Godzilla will be doing what he does best when "Godzilla vs. Mecha-Godzilla," No. 20 in the series, hits Japanese screens Dec. 11. (The date for U.S. release has not yet been announced.)

After 39 years, Godzilla has his job description down pat: Get across town to battle some other horrific mutant beast, and crush everything in your way.

Reckoning that the monster ain't broke, don't fix him, Godzilla's creators tend to stick to the same formula for every movie. Director Takao Okawana says about 90 percent of each film's material — the story, special effects, set designs — is carried over from previous films.

"We tried a slight alteration in Godzilla's voice in the last film but we got a lot of letters from angry Godzilla fans, so we changed it back," Okawana said, referring to "Godzilla vs. Mothra."

The incredible staying power of this simple formula has drawn nearly 80 million viewers to movie theaters and made the 330-foot fire-breathing behemoth of Japan's few world-famous cultural icons.

Longtime fans will be in for something completely new next year when TriStar Pictures releases the first made-in-U.S.A. version of Godzilla. Casting and other details are under wraps, but what-hung special effects are likely to replace the campy fake city models treasured by fans and ridiculed by the uncaptured.

Despite their continuity, the films have evolved somewhat since the original 1954 classic, "Godzilla."

The early films dwell heavily on Godzilla's mutation — because of a nuclear experiment gone awry — from a garden-variety dinosaur into a destructive terror. The idea induced special terror in Japan, the only nation to have experienced atomic attacks.

Later movies shifted from the anti-nuclear message to other themes, such as genetic engineering and threats to the environment.

These days, Godzilla directs his wrath at the moon, at starchy buildings that epitomize Japan's aesthetically numbing dash into industrial effluence.

Godzilla has laid waste many an eyesore in recent years: Tokyo's Gohamesque, \$1.5 billion city hall; Yokohama's space-aged waterfront; and Makuhari Mall, a sterile convention complex east of Tokyo.

But the monster means well, says Toho publicist Masahiko Suzuki: "He's not cruel. He doesn't hurt people, just buildings. It's just like a kid at

the beach who builds sand castles and destroys them — just on a larger scale."

In his latest incarnation, to the political horror of many viewers, Godzilla stomps into the ancient city of Kyoto, a pure urban refuge of traditional charm. He grows at Kiyomizu-dera, one of Japan's most famous temples, but leaves it unscathed.

Audiences sigh with relief, then cheer with vicarious pleasure, as with one blazing breath Godzilla wipes out Kyoto Tower, a modernist mushroom-shaped blight on the city's skyline.

"His purpose is not random destruction," says special effects director Koichi Kawakita. "He seeks out places where man has remolded nature."

# 'Joy Luck Club': The picture tells a story

Every once in a while a movie comes along that is so stirring and so moving that it stays with you long after it's over. Like a wonderful memory, it washes over your psyche for days and bathes it in some indescribable richness.

The "Joy Luck Club" is just such a movie. And it's no surprise when you consider those who are responsible for it—Director Wayne Wang, known for "Chan Is Missing," "Dim Sum" and "Eat Drink Man and Wife" teamed up with writer Amy Tan to adapt her hugely popular novel of the same name that dominated best-seller lists in 1989.

Simply put, "The Joy Luck Club" tells the stories of four young Chinese-American women living in San Francisco and the hardships and tragedies their mothers endured before immigrating to the United States.

The tales are loosely knit around June's going-away party in which she is quietly inducted into her mother's mah-jongg circle. June's off to China to see the half-sisters her mother was forced to abandon as she fled the country. The mother, who recently died, never knew the fate-of-her-twin-girls-after-she-left them by the side of the road.

June (Ming-Na Wen) has lost her mother Suyuan (Kieu Chinh) without realizing the hope and love she had for her. Similarly, the other three women of the mah-jongg club all have some secret from their homeland that has taught them profoundly harsh lessons. And each mother, like all mothers, wants to spare her child the pain she has had to bear.

Lindo (Tsai Chin) is the most out-

spoken and strong-willed of the women and pits her daughter, Waverly (Tamyliq Tomita), against June.

An Mei (Lisa Lu) spent her childhood sticking up for her mother, who was horribly oppressed as a concubine, and becomes her daughter's advocate, too. Rose (Rosalind Wiseman) is caught in an unhappy marriage and is about to let her husband ruin her life.

Lena (Lauren Tom), the daughter of Ying Ying (France Nuyen), goes through life with a mother who has little emotional reserve left for her. And like the others, Lena is often unaware how desperately her mother wants her life to be better.

The bitterness these women endure might sound like a bleak backdrop. But it's just the opposite. Here's a film that enriches the soul with its enchanting beauty and lyrical tales. It's a haunting story about the redeeming power of hope.

But bringing a good supply of hankies just the same because "The Joy Luck Club" is a tear-jerker in the best sense of the word.

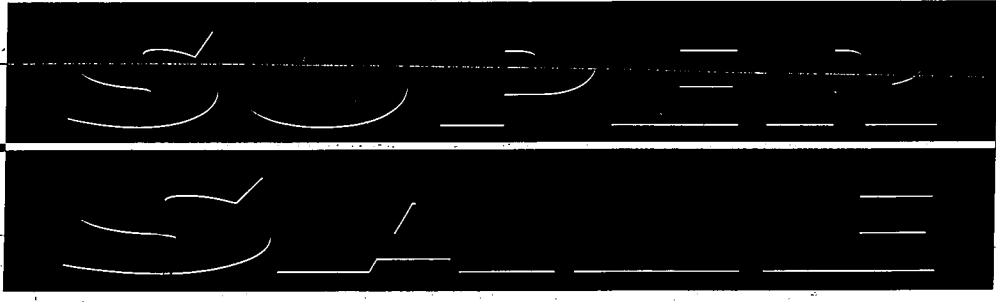

## Jury in antitrust suit recesses without verdict

**BOSTON** — The jury in former New England Patriots owner Billy Sullivan's antitrust suit against the NFL recessed Thursday after its third day of deliberations without a verdict. Sullivan has sued the league and 21 of its 28 teams for \$116 million, claiming they prevented him from selling stock in the defunct team. He contends he was forced to sell the Patriots to Victor Kiam for a price he considered low.

NFL ownership rules prohibit teams from being part of a larger corporation or selling stock. Sullivan's side said the NFL allowed those rules to be violated by other clubs.

The jury deliberated Thursday from 7:30 a.m. MDT until 2 p.m. with a break for lunch.

# Schilling shuts out Jays

## Series rests at 3-2 after Philadelphia's 2-0 win over Toronto

**PHILADELPHIA** — After a night of bedlam on the bases, the wildest thing about Game 5 of the World Series was that Curt Schilling shut out the Toronto Blue Jays.



Schilling slowed down Toronto's sprint to a second straight championship, pitching a five-hitter Thursday night that gave the Philadelphia Phillies a 2-0 victory and cut their deficit to 3-2.

A day after Toronto outlasted

Philadelphia 15-14 in the highest-scoring postseason game in history and the longest nine-inning night game ever, Schilling was in complete control.

Schilling, MVP of the NL playoffs despite a pair of no-decisions, rebounded nicely from his loss in Game 1 of the Series. He struck out six and walked three in handing the Blue Jays just their second shutout of the season.

Schilling shut down the middle of Toronto's lineup to finish it, setting off a wild roar from the 62,706 fans. They may have been even happier that Mitch Williams, the goat of Game 4, was standing in the bullpen with his jacket on when it ended.

The Phillies, playing 13 years

to the day that they beat Kansas City for their only championship, will try to tie the World Series on Saturday night in Toronto when Terry Mulholland pitches against Dave Stewart. They faced each other in Game 2, and Mulholland won.

As usual, Lenny Dykstra helped out the Phillies, drawing a leadoff walk from Juan Guzman in the first inning, stealing second and later scoring. An RBI double by Kevin Stocker in the second made it 2-0.

# Indians secure spot in A-4 playoffs

**HANSEN** — Eight of 45 volleyball teams representing Idaho's smallest high schools converge in Idaho Falls next week to contest the 1993 state Class A-4 championship, a get together that District 4 powerhouse Shoshone and Hagerman seldom miss.

As has become the norm, both will be on hand when the event opens a two-day run at Skyline High School Friday, Oct. 29.

The Indians, in Thursday's opener, were first to secure their invitation, measuring Hagerman — the only school of comparable size to defeat them this season — 15-11, 10-15, 16-14.

That nip and tuck victory, highlighted by state caliber play, produced Shoshone's ninth consecutive District 4 championship since joining the A-4 ranks in 1985.

Shoshone rolled up substantial early leads in all three games only to see Hagerman rally back into contention. Even third game deficits of 8-0 and 11-1 failed to hold up against the gritty Pirates.

"Did Hagerman play that well all season? Did they play that well in sub-district?" asked Shoshone's Larry Messick. "Any time a team digs its way out of an 11-1 hole it says something about their character."

The Pirates, though, failed to capitalize in all but game two, yielding the final six points after turning a 0-6 deficit into an 11-9 lead in the opener and allowing Ramie Maestas a go ahead ace before Lindsay Payne pounded home match point in the finale.

"When it was 11-1, in fact when it was 5-0, I told the girls the score was 0-0," Messick said. "But we started playing tentatively. Playing not to lose instead of playing to win."

"You've got to hand it to Hagerman," he continued. "I think that might be the best defensive team I've seen."

Sophomore hitter Niki Sologaga faced the Shoshone attack with 15 kills, three more than were credited to Hagerman's Diana Eichelberger in the match.

Despite slipping to 1-2 in its season series with their sole A-4 conqueror, the Pirates again proved too much for Magic Valley Conference foe Raft River which earlier ended Ketchum Community's season 15-10, 15-11 behind Holly Harper's hitting.

It appeared to be over early after the Pirates coasted to a 15-6 victory, then moved ahead 6-1 in game two. It was anything but easy as the Trojans, on the strength of seven straight winners from Stacie Jones, mounted an 8-6 advantage.

Raft River's lead crested at 14-8 on Denise Koyle's spike, but the Trojans missed on three potential game points and ties ensued at 14, 15

# Montana St. challenges No. 1 Idaho

Montana State will try to bring No. 1 Idaho down to earth — literally — when the Bobcats host the high-flying Vandals Saturday in Bozeman.



"Anyone you go anywhere in Montana it's going to be tough," Idaho coach John L. Smith said.

"They played us probably the toughest of anybody in the league last year."

It was Idaho, 28-7, in Moscow. Maybe Smith was thinking about Montana, Montana, in Missoula.

In Saturday's other Big Sky Conference games, Idaho State (2-5 overall, 0-4 Big Sky) visits Boise State (2-5, 0-3), No. 23 Northern Arizona (6-1, 3-1) travels to Eastern Washington (3-3, 1-2), No. 8 Montana (6-1, 5-0) hosts 1992 Division II champion Jacksonville State (3-4), and Weber State (3-4, 1-4) visits former Big Sky member Nevada (4-2), which now plays in the I-AA Big West Conference.

The game of the week is Idaho at Montana State, where coach Cliff Hysell's Bobcats host a Vandals team that has become Division I-AA's best while playing only two games at home.

"Idaho is scary," Hysell says.

But if any Big Sky team can make Idaho seem less scary, some of the numbers suggest it might be Montana State.

While Idaho (6-0, 3-0) is second in the league and seventh among all Division I-AA teams in passing offense, Montana State (5-2, 2-1) is the best in the conference against the pass. And while Montana State is third in the Big Sky in rushing offense, fans sided last in rushing defense — giving up more than 201 yards per game.

Alright, so Idaho has the Big Sky's top rushing offense and the Bobcats are next to last in rushing defense, giving up just 18 yards per game less than the Vandals.

And yes, Idaho's national-best 533 yards per game total offense is 211 yards more than Montana State's average, which ranks seventh in the eight-team league. And the Vandals' I-AA-best 49 points per game and 54 points per game are less than three Big Sky opponents — is almost 22 points per game better than the Bobcats.

# Huard to be starting QB despite sore ribs

SEATTLE (AP) — Sore ribs and all, Damon Huard will be Washington's starting quarterback when the No. 22 Huskies meet Oregon in their homecoming game Saturday at Husky Stadium.

Coach Jim Lambright made the announcement after Thursday afternoon's practice.

Huard, a sophomore, suffered separate cartilage in his right rib cage in a 39-25 defeat against UCLA last Saturday in the Rose Bowl.

"Damon had a real good week of practice," Lambright said. "It's a pain in the neck but he's tolerated the pain all week."

"It feels a lot better," Huard said.

The 6-foot-4, 220-pound Huard, in his first season as Washington's starter, is completing 62 percent of his passes (96 for 156) for 1,107 yards and nine touchdowns. He has been intercepted seven times.

Huard's backup is Eric Bjornson, who threw a touchdown pass but who also threw two interceptions after replacing the injured starter in the fourth quarter of the UCLA game.

"Damon has recovered adequately and he's not at risk," Lambright explained when asked about his decision to go with Huard. "We have a lot of confidence in Eric but Damon is a more experienced quarterback and we know Damon and his toughness this week."

The Huskies (4-2 overall and 2-1 in the Pac-10) begin the final five games of their Rose Bowl-less season Saturday at home, where they have had a school-record 16-game winning streak.

They're favored by 1 1/2 points to beat Oregon (4-2, 1-2) for the fifth consecutive game.

The Huskies have a new goal: A 9-2 record.

"These are very motivated young people who have had a lot of success in the last few years," Lambright said.

"You start off anticipating an 11-0 season, which two years ago was a reality. These players remember how it felt to achieve that."

Then when you lose your first game, you go to 10-1. Now, we go to 9-2."

The Ducks don't have a J.J. Stokes, UCLA's brilliant receiver who caught four touchdowns passes in the victory over Washington. But they have Danny O'Neill, a junior quarterback who has thrown for 1,873 yards and 14 touchdowns this season. O'Neill ranks fifth nationally in total offense with 305 yards per game.

With O'Neill leading the way, Oregon's offense is averaging 437.7 yards per game.

"Danny O'Neill is a great, great athlete with confidence now," Lambright said. "He's doing a great job leading and Oregon has an experienced offensive line with enough depth."

"Danny O'Neill's played very well," Oregon coach Rick Brooks said.

Washington's defense is hurting, too. The Huskies will be without their top pass rusher, linebacker Andy Mason, who suffered a knee injury in the UCLA game. Mason underwent arthroscopic surgery this week after a magnetic resonance imaging test showed he had cartilage damage in his right knee.

Mason, who leads the Huskies with five sacks this season, will be replaced in the starting lineup by junior Richie Chambers. Chambers will be making his first start.

Oregon beat Arizona State 45-36 last weekend but Brooks wasn't making any bold predictions about being able to do what UCLA did to Washington's defense.

"If I had J.J. Stokes, maybe I could exploit something in the secondary," Brooks said. "But I don't have J.J. Stokes. There aren't many around like him."

# Phils' pitching, defense sends Series to Toronto

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — It didn't come down to the bullpen. It didn't come down to Mitch Williams.

Starting pitching and defense got the Phillies on the Phillies on Thursday night, and now the World Series goes back to Toronto.

By scoring early and preventing the Blue Jays from mounting a threat, Philadelphia won 2-0 and pulled to 3-2 in the Series.

The best the Blue Jays could manage was a first-and-third situation in the eighth, created by Pat Borders' leadoff single and a soft hit by pinch-hitter Rob Butler. Cut Schilling, who threw 146 pitches, escaped that masterfully, and went on to a perfect ninth.

"I said, 'Let me know when he gets to 150 or 160,'" Phillies manager Jim Fregosi remembered telling pitching coach Johnny Podres in the seventh. "It was his game to win or lose."

Three Toronto threats were wiped out by downer plays. In the third, Blue Jays pitcher Juan Guzman bunted into a 3-6-4 double play. The Phillies turned another double play the next inning when Joe Carter struck out and Roberto Alomar was thrown out stealing. And in the sixth, Alomar hit into a

4-6-3 double play.

When they could have been down, the Phillies came out fighting.

"We're 10 games into a season we're not supposed to be in," Schilling explained. "There's no pressure."

A night after Williams blew a lead, Fregosi's panic, didn't go to Wild Thing again. Schilling didn't panic, either. With runners on first and third and no outs in the eighth, Rickey Henderson's bounce to the mound went into the pitcher's glove. Schilling threw home, and pinch-runner Willie Canse was tagged out in a rundown. Devon White struck out and Alomar grounded to second, ending the threat.

Toronto's comeback in the ninth, as Schilling completed the five-hitter, John Olerud popped out to second, Carter grounded to shortstop and Paul Molitor flew out to center.

Schilling hadn't been looking toward the bullpen, where Terry Mulholland warmed up in the eighth.

"The bullpen is not a concern when I pitch," Schilling said. "I always know what my staff didn't go in. I didn't do my job."

Schilling made it stand up with the help of three double plays. The only other pitcher to shut out Toronto this year was Baltimore's Fernando Valenzuela on June 30.

"We played a great solid defense in the field," Schilling said. "We made the plays we had to have."

The teams had combined for 65 runs, the most ever for the first four games of the Series, and had combined for 32 hits Wednesday night, tying another Series mark. Maybe the hitters were tired of swinging, maybe the runners are tired of scoring, whatever. Schilling and Guzman turned it from wild to mild.

Schilling's biggest jam came in the eighth when he gave up a pair of leadoff singles. But he grabbed Rickey Henderson's grounder and threw out a runner at the plate, then ended the inning by striking out Devon White and getting Roberto Alomar on a grounder.

The Phillies came to string of five straight losses at home in the World Series, a streak that started in 1983 against Baltimore. The Blue Jays had won seven straight road games in the postseason, beginning in Atlanta in the 1991 World Series.

Guzman also pitched well, allowing five hits in seven innings. Any other night, that might've won. Against Schilling, however, it didn't.

There had not been a single 1-2-3 first inning for either team in the Series so far, and that pattern continued. Alomar drew a two-out walk from Schilling, but was stranded.

Dykstra, as usual, got the Phillies going. He drew a leadoff walk and took off a few pitches later, stealing second and taking third when catcher Pat Borders rushed and threw the ball into center field for an error.

# Madrid to face Suns in tourney semifinals

MUNICH, Germany (AP) — Real Madrid, paced by Lithuanian center Arvidas Sabonis, beat Bayer Leverkusen and earned the right to face the Phoenix Suns in the semifinals of the McDonald's Open basketball tournament.

Sabonis led Madrid with 21 points, 15 rebounds, three steals and three blocked shots as the Spanish champions came back from a 45-42 deficit at halftime.

In the opening game of the tournament, Buckle Bologna of Italy crushed All-Star France at Brazil 129-88 and will play Limoges, the European champion from France, in Friday's semifinals.

Predrag Danilovic, a Serb forward drafted by the Golden State Warriors in 1992 after leaving Partizan Belgrade to the European club title, was the game's top scorer with 27 points for Bologna.

Bologna's 41-point margin was the largest in the six years of the McDonald's Open. The Denver Nuggets beat Barcelona by 34 points in 1989.

The six-team tournament is being played under a combination of NBA and international rules — a 24-second shot clock and quarter breaks taken

from the NBA, among other things.

The Phoenix Suns, the NBA representatives in the tournament, and Limoges have first-round byes and were idle on Thursday.

All five previous tournaments were won by NBA teams. This year's event features six teams for the first time.

Madrid pulled away for a 21-5 lead in the first quarter, but Leverkusen then scored 13 unanswered points to close within three, as Sabonis went to work with three fouls. With the 7-foot-center on the bench, Leverkusen held the edge in a tight game.

But when Sabonis returned in the third quarter, his big defense game carried Madrid. And when he hit a 3-pointer late in the quarter for a 63-60 lead, the Spanish helped Lithuania look back. Sabonis helped Lithuania win the bronze medal in the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, after starting for the former Soviet Union.

Center Antanas Martin had 20 points for Madrid, while two American guards led Leverkusen. Akeem Chalmers-Deen, a center who played college ball for Providence, had 19 points, and Tom Garver, a guard who played for the NBA Los Angeles Clippers, had 15.

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# Elkington downs Daly in Match Play

VIRGINIA WATER, England (AP) — Steve Elkington watched with interest as John Daly put his putter after missing a 5-foot putt on the first hole of the World Match Play Championship on Thursday.

And the Australian saw the long-driving former PGA champion launch a 5-iron approach shot over the green and out of bounds at the 12th hole. It was quiet an experience playing Daly, Elkington said, made all the more enjoyable when he beat the American 5 and 4.

"I knew he was going to smash it at every hole," the 30-year-old Australian said. "I like watching it. I can't let it bother me. One good thing in match play is that I had every second shot into the green first, and that's usually how I won it. I hit some great irons this afternoon and put pressure on him and that was the key to my win."

In other first-round matches, woes continued for five-time champion Steve Baltouse, who lost 7 and 6 to David Frost. Corey Pavin gained some Ryder Cup revenge with a 4 and 3 win over Peter Baker, and Colin Montgomerie birdied the last two holes to beat Yoshihiro Mizumaki at the 37th.

Daly stayed close early against Elkington despite three straight bogeys to start the match. The American's rocky start on a chilly, windy day on the West Course at Wentworth was matched by his Australian opponent, who saved two holes by shooting to within one foot of the flag from bunkers at the fourth and sixth.

Down 2 after the morning session, it got worse for Daly in the afternoon when Elkington birdied four out of five holes from the 22nd. Daly didn't help by putting his second shot in the bunker at the 25th and missing from 5 feet at the 26th. The rest was just a formality.

"He beat me pretty bad this afternoon," said the 1991 PGA champion, making his first appearance at the event. "Holes I should've won I ended up tying or losing. I really thought I would do a little better than I did. I was kind of embarrassed, but not really, because Steve played so well this afternoon."

Elkington's victory put him into the quarterfinals against defending champion Nick Faldo, who had a first-round bye.

"That might be like falling off a cliff, playing the world No. 1 on his own course," Elkington said. "But I've seen bigger upsets than Steve Elkington beating Nick Faldo."

Pavin, who lost to Baker on the final hole at the Belfry last month, wadded out of the bunker at the fourth to within 4 feet for a birdie to tie the match, then took the lead for good with a 33-foot birdie putt at the fifth.

"It was a difficult day, very cold and the wind picked up," Pavin said on a day when the temperature reached a high of 50 degrees. "Peter was not on his best form today for sure and I played well. It makes up in some way for losing to him in the Ryder Cup."

Pavin, seeking to become the first American to win the tournament since Bill Rogers in 1979, plays Nick Price of Zimbabwe on Friday.

Mizumaki, ranked 160 places below Montgomerie, held his own in a see-saw battle, but the Scot birdied the 36th to tie the match and won it with a 25-foot birdie putt at the 37th. Montgomerie will play Masters champion Bernhard Langer on Friday.

# Techniques, attitude make Swann asset

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — Just over two years into his NFL career, Eric Swann has picked up the techniques — and the attitude — he missed by skipping college.

"It's all it took to shift talk from the 23-year-old lineman's potential to his performance.

"He's as good a defensive tackle as I've been around in 19 years," coach Joe Bugel said. "When you talk about good players, they're good against the pass and good against the run. He's as good as there is, because he can run. He's got a motor that never shuts off."

Such praise is a far cry from the problems Swann experienced two years ago, when he jumped from a semipro team to the Cardinals and ran into arthroscopic surgery, weight problems and misunderstandings with teammates who resented his youth and five-year, \$4 million contract.

Late in the 1991 season, the Cardinals realized nothing in Swann's background had prepared him for the NFL.

Team orthopedic physician Russel Chalk consulted with Swann and his new wife, Rosey. Swann listened dutifully, changed his diet and conditioning program, and got tough.

"I don't want to say that I got discouraged, but I got impatient with myself," Swann said. "I'm someone of an impatient person; I want to learn things quickly and get it done right. I wanted to come in and be a factor on my new team, but you have to wait these things out and be patient."

"It's a different game — faster and stronger as far as a lot of techniques. So once you have that down pat, you see progress."

Last year, his total of 70 tackles was fourth on the team. An 11-game starter, he also had two sacks,

knocked down six passes and forced a team-high four fumbles.

In six games this season, Swann has 41 tackles — on pace to become the first Cardinals lineman with 100-plus tackles since Bob Pollard in 1978.

Swann is the current NFC Defensive Player of the Week after a "2-tackle performance" against Washington which included two sacks, a safety, and a fumble caught and recovered.

Bugel talked to Redskins guard Mark Schlereth afterward.

"Mark Schlereth says very little, but when he tells you something, you ought to listen," Bugel said. "He says Swannie is the best he's played against, and he never quits, never stops hustling. That's the ultimate compliment coming from a player."

Swann had 13 tackles, 1½ sacks and a blocked field goal in a 26-20 loss to Detroit two weeks earlier, but he feels his performance against the Redskins was better. Until he makes the Pro Bowl, there's room for improvement, Swann said.

"I have a positive attitude, and I think all the hard work pays off. I just keep pushing, and sooner or later something's going to open up," he said.

At 6-foot-5 and 295 pounds, Swann is average for his position, but the Cardinals realized when they tested him after one season with the Bay State Titans of Lynn, Mass., that he had rare athletic ability.

He did a 29-inch vertical leap, and ran the 40-yard dash in 4.8 seconds.

General manager Larry Wilson, former draft director George Boone and Bugel gulped, then selected a player younger than many college sophomores the No. 6 choice overall.

# Governor tries new pitch to keep Yankees in Bronx

NEW YORK (AP) — Gov. Mario Cuomo delivered a new pitch Thursday to keep the New York Yankees in the Bronx: A \$150 million plan to make Yankee Stadium more appealing to the roving eye of owner George Steinbrenner.

Under the proposal, the 70-year-old ballpark and its surroundings would be upgraded while Steinbrenner would sign a 30-year lease extension to keep the Yankees in the Bronx through 2032.

"I think the one thing we have that they can't match in New Jersey is that we have New York," Cuomo said. "There's only one Yankee Stadium, there's only one Babe Ruth, there's only one Lou Gehrig and Joe DiMaggio and Mickey Mantle."

"And they're all New York."

It's the second Cuomo proposal in a month to keep the Yankees from moving across the Hudson to a stadium in New Jersey that is but a gleam in the eyes of its planners. In the last week of September, the governor unveiled plans for a \$550 million complex in Manhattan, a plan that annoyed officials in two boroughs.

Bronx officials were upset about possibly losing the team, while Manhattan officials wanted no part of a new stadium on the West Side. Cuomo said Thursday that proposal was more to show the Yankees that New York wanted the team to stay here.

Cuomo has said he was convinced that Steinbrenner wanted out of the

Bronx. The Yankees have a stadium lease that runs through 2002.

The latest proposal — it includes a 3,000-space parking garage, additional luxury boxes, a railroad station in the Bronx, and improved access to a new subway line.

Steinbrenner nearly signed six years ago.

It addresses most of the problems mentioned by Steinbrenner when talk of the Yankees moving to New Jersey heated up this summer. The 1987 deal fell apart in a dispute between Steinbrenner and the city over cable television revenue, which is not an issue now.

Funding for the \$150 million would come from the city, the state and the Yankees, Cuomo said.

Howard Rubenstein, a spokesman for Steinbrenner, said the Yankee owner expected to see the proposal before the end of next week. "He's read about it, he is awaiting it with great interest," said Rubenstein.

Steinbrenner complained that Yankee fans, crime and parking were keeping people away from Yankee Stadium, pointing to the huge crowds attracted to new ballparks in Baltimore and Toronto.

He picked a bad year to make his complaint though. The Yankees, who made a run at the American League East pennant, drew more than 2.4 million people this year — their best attendance since 1988.

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# Ukraine to keep power plant open, build new plants

KIEV, Ukraine (AP) — Squeezed by an energy shortage, Ukrainian lawmakers put aside worries about the safety of Chernobyl's nuclear reactors and voted Thursday to keep the power plant open.

They also voted to lift a moratorium on building new nuclear plants.

Environmentalists condemned the actions, saying the former Soviet republic failed to learn from its tragic nuclear past.

Chernobyl is the site of the world's worst nuclear accident, a reactor explosion and fire that spread radiation over a wide area in April 1986. The official death toll was 32, but scientists say hundreds may have died from exposure to radiation during the incident or during later cleanups.

Lawmakers voted in October 1991

— not long after Ukraine declared independence from the Soviet Union — to shut down Chernobyl by the end of this year. They cited the opinions of international experts who consider its RBMK-type reactors unsafe.

Parliament reversed that decision Thursday with a 221-38 vote.

"We were forced to pass such a resolution. We have no other option than to use atomic energy," said one lawmaker, Volodymyr Dantau.

Ukraine has been crippled by fuel shortages and general economic chaos since the breakup of the Soviet Union. It remains dependent on Russia for oil and natural gas, which were heavily subsidized in Soviet times. Russia has been raising fuel prices gradually, saying its own sputtering economy demands it.

Two of Chernobyl's four graphite reactors were restarted in 1992 because of the energy shortage. Officials say a third could be restarted eventually.

Reactor No. 4, which exploded in 1986, has been encased in steel and concrete. Reactor No. 2 has been off since a fire in 1991.

Germany's environment minister, Klaus Töpfer, who has long advocated the plant's closure, condemned Parliament's decision. "A political decision was reached here that disregards international safety concerns," said Töpfer, whose country has been a leading source of economic aid to Ukraine.

Viktor Kapusta, a plant spokesman, told The Associated Press that closing Chernobyl would have been costly. In addition to the loss of energy, he said electricity would have been needed from other sources just to maintain the idle reactors.

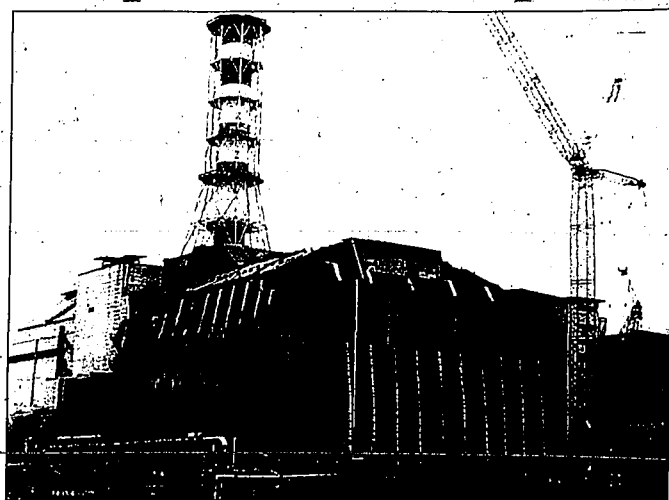
But Hanna Tsavitkova, spokeswoman in Kiev for the international environmentalist group Greenpeace, said building new reactors and operating the old ones will cost even more.

"Chernobyl is Ukraine's ecological tragedy," she said. "The 2 percent of nuclear energy that Chernobyl supplies to Ukraine's citizens will never justify Chernobyl's victims of the past, present and future."

Parliament also ordered that the Khamynsky, Rovno and Zaporozhye nuclear power plants get additional reactors into operation as soon as possible. All use VVER-1000 reactors, a different design than Chernobyl's.

The accident at Chernobyl, 80 miles north of Kiev, forced the evacuation and resettlement of more than 180,000 people from surrounding villages and cities.

It left Ukraine's 52 million people

## Germany won't give students 'Hitler' book

BONN, Germany (AP) — Germany has halted a plan to distribute a comic book called "Hitler" to high school pupils after a government agency decided the publication could be seen to glorify the Nazi era.

The 200-page comic book portrays Hitler's rise to power, the Nazis' cruel racial experiments, bloodied corpses of murdered Jews and German troops killing French civilians.

The book is part of a half-million mark (\$308,000) teachers' package that also contains posters and a computer game showing students how to resist a Hitler-style dictatorship.

The glossy paperback is sold for the equivalent of \$15 in German book stores. It's a commercial success, despite government reservations, with about 30,000 copies sold so far. A number of book reviewers have praised the concept.

The Federal Center for Political Education, a government agency that provides public school materials, at first supported the package and promised to distribute it to German public schools.

But the agency last week dropped its

endorsement, saying the comic book could make pupils identify more with Hitler than with his victims. The Israeli embassy and parliament President Rita Suessmuth had expressed reservations about the finished version.

Researchers are looking into whether the package can be redone, but it may be dropped.

In literature sent to schools by the foundation that created it, the book is called "Hitler — The Comic Book." It is being sold in German bookstores simply as "Hitler."

Of particular concern to the agency are collages showing Hitler in victorious poses, Wehrmacht tanks en route to conquests, and Nazi flags-flipping in the wind.

"It's the kind of thing that a fanatic might like to have in his living room," said Wolfgang Arnold, the center's deputy director.

Arnold argued that "Hitler — The Comic Book" treats the Nazi years too frivolously.

"Our history is extremely difficult. We have to treat it with great care," Arnold said.

## Briefly

### German bank lowers key interest rates

BONN, Germany — The German central bank lowered two key interest rates Thursday in a move that could help European nations combat sluggish economic growth.

In a step that surprised the financial markets, the Bundesbank reduced the discount rate, the cheapest rate for commercial loans, to 5.75 percent from 6.25 percent.

The central bank lowered the Lombard rate, the rate at which banks can borrow emergency funds from the central bank, to 6.75 percent from 7.25 percent.

The Swiss and Belgian national banks cut key interest rates after the announcement. European countries have to balance making cuts against the risk further rate reductions would erode confidence in their currencies.

It was the first rate cut since the Bundesbank's new president, Hans Tietmeyer, took office Oct. 1.

### Burundi president seized in army coup

NAIROBI, Kenya — The president of Burundi was seized Thursday in an army coup that halted the tiny Central African nation's transition to democracy and stirred fears of new ethnic bloodletting.

President Melchior Ndadayé, 40, and three Cabinet ministers were being held at a military base near the capital, Bujumbura, and a search reportedly was under way for other leading government figures.

The United States and other Western countries condemned the assault on Burundi's infant democracy and suspended millions of dollars in aid.

The Burundi embassy in Rwanda said the coup was masterminded by former President Jean Baptiste Bagaza and led by the army's chief of staff, Col. Jean Bikomagu. The coup leaders belong to the minority Tutsi tribe while Ndadayé belongs to the majority Hutus.

### Kasparov wins 4th straight title match

LONDON — Garry Kasparov, the world chess champion since 1985, clinched victory in his fourth straight title match Thursday by playing to a draw against his overmatched challenger, Nigel Short of Britain.

The draw gave Kasparov an insurmountable lead of 12½ to 7½ over Short in the match the men organized under the auspices of their newly founded Professional Chess Association after rebelling against the world chess federation.

Expert observers felt Short, playing white, had a slight edge throughout the game. But, just as in the match itself, there never appeared to be a possibility of Kasparov losing.

Kasparov, the highest-rated player ever, formally retained his title on Tuesday when he reached 12 points, since under match rules he would get to keep the title in the event of a 12-12 tie. But the 30-year-old needed a draw in Thursday's 20th game to give him the match victory with its prize of the equivalent of \$1.43 million.

### Kohl scolds countrymen's complacency

BONN, Germany — Chancellor Helmut Kohl scolded his countrymen Thursday for letting Germany fall behind the United States and Japan in ingenuity and economic drive.

Kohl's speech in the Bundestag, Parliament's lower house, contained the strongest words yet in a personal campaign to rouse Germans from what he sees as complacent and economically damaging habits.

"We need an enterprising spirit, vision and courage," Kohl said. The nationally televised session was called to examine what Germany can do to keep its economic standing as it wrestles with the costs of reunification, bureaucratic regulation and generous social benefits.

### Empress still unable to speak after fall

TOKYO — Empress Michiko remained unable to speak coherently a day after collapsing on her 59th birthday, but neurological tests showed no abnormalities, palace officials said Thursday night.

She was driven in a car to the palace hospital earlier Thursday, sitting up in the back seat with her head slightly bowed. She was admitted for a thorough examination.

Michiko collapsed Wednesday morning while chatting with her husband, Emperor Akihito, and daughter, Princess Sayako. She recovered consciousness several hours later and was able to walk, write and eat a light meal with her family, officials said.

## Actress learned medical techniques for movie role

LOS ANGELES — To play a pediatrician whose concentration on her patients threatens her marriage, Melanie Mayron had to learn some of the medical techniques — in a hurry.

She needed to show casual expertise with such procedures as taking blood and suturing wounds so that her handwork wouldn't be a distraction from the intensity of the role.

"The performance was a subtle emotional-ride," said Mayron, the star of "Other Women's Children," which debuts Sunday on the Lifetime cable channel.

"I was trying to concentrate on those fine nuances of character," she said. "Then, I would be learning these procedures right before we were going to shoot — how to suture and how to take blood — and I had to make it look like I'd been doing it for 20 years, as opposed to five minutes ago."

The movie, based on a novel by pediatrician Ferri Klass, costars Geraint Wyn Davies as Mayron's husband and Ja'net Du Bois as the grandmother of a boy with AIDS, played by Frederick Collins Jr.

Mayron, who won an Emmy for the series "thirtysomething," had very little time to prepare for the role.

Returning from a visit to her 92-year-old grandmother in Israel, she arrived at her West Hollywood home at midnight and found the script waiting.

There was a note from her agent saying the producers wanted to see her the next morning in Vancouver — a 1,200-mile flight to the north — since negotiations with another actress had fallen through at the last minute.

"I looked at the card and I was completely jetlagged from the

trip," Mayron said. "It was like, 'Tomorrow in Vancouver. TOMORROW IN VANCOUVER!' But I read the script and I hadn't had a part like this in a long time."

Sitting at the dining table in the airy bungalow she shares with three poodles, the actress explained that she's usually cast in offbeat character parts.

"This was like straight leading woman, a wife, a mother. That was a real good thing for me to have just in terms of, you like to keep doing things, surprising people," she said. "I don't have to be neurotic. I don't have to be quirky. It's just a real story."

Mayron got the appointment in Vancouver and got the part of Dr. Amelia Stewart, head of pediatrics at a major hospital. As she spends less and less time at home, her husband accuses her of putting him and their young son in second place to her career.

The movie was shot in the closed wing of a Vancouver hospital.

"A lot of the kids on the set that they got as extras in the hospital had cancer or leukemia and that was really, really hard," Mayron said. "I'd be talking with their moms. I'd be all choked up talking to one of them, hearing about her kid, and then they (the film crew) would go, 'Melanie, we're ready for you now.'"

"It would be like, 'Oh, God.' I don't know how some mothers do it, and I don't know how the doctors do it."

Although the movie touches on such topical issues as pediatric AIDS, it focuses on Amelia's struggle for balance in her life.

"I asked them what the point of the script was when they hired me," Mayron said. "Hlene Berg (one of the executive producers) said, 'We're trying to say, 'Yes, women can have it all, but not without a price.' I said, 'That sounds really good.'"

## 'Picket Fences' worth 2nd look

Rome, Wis., has become the must-visit destination in your TV travels this fall. Just last season in this busy town, a snake enthusiast conspired to kill her sister, the Chippewa Indians look over the courtdoors to protest a proposed golf course on their burial lands, and a schoolchild bid the town's dentist, who later acknowledged he was HIV-positive.

In the second-season opener of "Picket Fences," Mayor Bill Pugen (Michael Keenan) sends a carpenter to death. The town's new district attorney, John Lighton (Don Cheadle), can't believe that Sheriff Jimmy Brock (Tom Skerritt) wants the mayor prosecuted for murder. But Brock cannot see the shooting as self-defense — the carpenter had dropped his knife and surrendered — and that controversy spills the town.

What unfolds is the kind of stimulating case that once filled "L.A. Law's" docket. Defense attorney Douglas Wambaugh (Fyvush Finkel) argues that this is a nation of crime, that one of every four families will be victimized, that the mayor is "one of us." The prosecutor counters that the mayor took the law into his own hands.

As timely as a newscast and as provocative as the work of our best editorialists, "Picket Fences" is exceptional television.

At its premiere last fall, it seemed nothing more than a mainstream "Twin Peaks," a darker "Northern Exposure." In later episodes, the show found its own tone while muddling through with low ratings; it placed No. 78 out of 140 programs last season.

Then, last month, "Picket Fences" swept the Emmys, earning awards for best drama series, lead actor Skerritt and lead actress Kathy Baker, who plays Skerritt's wife, doctor Jill Brock. CBS mounted an impressive promotional campaign — not as good as the one for David Letterman, but close.

"Picket Fences" deserves another look. Or a first look, if you've missed it up to now.

"Whatever we win is primarily showcase for executive producer/creator David E. Kelley, the brilliant and offbeat writer who guided "L.A. Law" through its finest seasons. In one of the great ironies of the Emmys, Kelley was shut out of the writing nominations."

"Whatever we win is an extension of David Kelley," Skerritt said in a phone interview. "He has this view of us and an unbiased, objective view of our society. I've never seen represented on television."

In an episode next week, Kelley tells the story of a male teacher who says he was raped by a woman. When the teacher insists on a lawsuit, he suffers the humiliation of many female rape victims who sue. It's a David Kelley way of approaching the terrible situation of rape, but seeing it from a different point of view," Baker said. Kelley, a lawyer himself, gives viewers both sides of an issue, letting the audience decide, Baker said.

Skerritt's humor — well-known to "L.A. Law" fans — figures prominently in other episodes. Academy Award-

winner Marlee Matlin will appear as a modern-day Robin Hood who helps victims of this summer's floods. In another show, the town's leading businessman will push to hire a woman with big breasts to help sell milk products.

Kelley has created a marvelous group of characters to debate the issues. Jimmy and Jill Brock are more fallible and confused than most lead characters, and they often argue over the latest controversy or their three children's latest problems. Skerritt and Baker play these scenes with such naturalness that they could be your neighbors.

Surrounding them are character actors on par with the greats of vintage Hollywood movies. The crusty Ray Walston plays a judge with the wisdom of the greatest Supreme Court justices. Emmy nominee Finkel and Zeldi Rubinstein, as the sheriff's gossipy secretary, provide expert comic relief.

As the sheriff's attractive deputies, Lauren Holly and Costas Mandylor wrestle with the issues, too, as well as with some unusual sexual tensions. In another upcoming show, Holly's character presses charges against her therapist, who wants to date her.

CBS is giving viewers a top-notch series in an audience time period. "If we're on Friday nights, our attendance will be limited. That's a given," Skerritt says. "People have a habit of watching '20/20.' That's a conditioned response."

But Skerritt has found that fans appreciate a show that respects their intelligence and allows them to react. "Picket Fences" is the latest dramatic series that needs, and deserves, viewer support. It would be a real waste to miss the mind of David Kelley and the world of Rome.

## Revamped 'Bob' returns

The revamped Bob Newhart series, "Bob," returns — with numerous cast and storyline changes — to the CBS schedule Friday, at 8 p.m. MDT.

Newhart is being joined by new cast members Betty White, Jere Burns ("Dear John"), Eric Allan Kramer ("Down Home") and Megan Cavanagh ("A League of Their Own"). In addition, Carolee Watkins returns as Bob's wife, as well as Cynthia Stevenson as their daughter.

A year ago, the series storyline had Newhart playing a comic-book artist. This season, he returns as a freelance artist, his Mad Dog comic book (which he worked for last season) having gone out of business.

Needing work, Bob is convinced by the owner of the Schmidt-Green-

ing Card company, Sylvia Schmidt (White), to take over the (dysfunctional) family business.

"Bob" debuted last season to general reviews but finished the season at 71st position. Initially, CBS decided to put the series for its fall schedule, although it did order more episodes for a midseason return.

However, a spin-off was ordered earlier than expected when producer Linda Bloodworth-Thomson balked at the network's scheduling of her series "Hears Affire" on Fridays — a low-rated night. CBS decided to put that show into the midseason rotation and moved "Bob" into the fall starting lineup.



# MTV bumps show to later time

NEW YORK — "Beavis and Butt-head," the adonoid teen antiheros of MTV's cult-hit cartoon show, were bumped from their early prime-time slot to expand their later show to an hour, the network said Tuesday.

MTV said the move from shows at 7 p.m. and 10:30 p.m. EDT to the later, expanded show was just another change in an evolving "Beavis and Butt-head" franchise, not a try at taking the heat off the network's highest-rated — and most criticized — show.

"We have been reformulating the series over the last two or three months," said MTV spokeswoman Carole Robinson. MTV removed all of the show's references to fire earlier this month after an Ohio woman blamed the program for the death of her 2-year-old daughter.

Jessica Burk said Beavis and Butt-head inspired her 5-year-old son to set the fire that killed her daughter.

Before the change the duo liked to set things on fire and would declare, "Fire is cool!"

Beavis and Butt-head, who provide commentary on MTV videos, are also noted for bloody accidents with knives and chainsaws.

Previous changes in "Beavis and Butt-head" have included airing certain shows only in the later slot. MTV also airs a disclaimer before every show:

"Beavis and Butt-head are not role models." It reads. "They're not even human. They're cartoons. Some of the things they do would cause a real person to get hurt, expelled, arrested, possibly deported. To put it another way: Don't try this at home."

"Like the other changes in programming — Beavis and Butt-head," this does not represent us taking responsibility, for this incident in Ohio, but it is still the right thing for MTV to do," Robinson said.

MTV apparently began reformulating the show after its audience researchers noticed that "Beavis and Butt-head" was getting viewers of all ages, not just the 12- to 34-year-old bracket it originally expected.

Robinson said MTV is developing concepts for "a completely different format" for Beavis and Butt-head that would air at 7 p.m. "It will be suitable for the available audience," she said.

# Fox to replace Chase

A little tip: Don't bother sending in a resume unless you have the skills of a Johnny Carson; this Battered network's had enough humiliation for one season.

Fox told affiliates Monday that it will begin work immediately on a new late-night show to replace Chevy Chase, whose show was canceled Sunday after less than six weeks on the air. However, network executives said that there was no timetable for a new launch and that it was not even close to a decision on the selection of a new host. Among the names bandied about are Sinbad, Howie Mandel, Dennis Miller and, perhaps most intriguing of all, disc jockey/author Howard Stern.

Preston Padden, Fox's executive vice president, declined to comment on speculation that Stern is under consideration. Six

years ago, Stern produced five pilot shows for Fox; in those, Stern, sitting on a throne, interviewed a series of bewildered guests. One source who saw them said they would "make Chevy Chase look like Ernie Kovacs."

Nonetheless, Fox was said to be interested in the idea at the time. However, "there was a feeling he was a little too risky for us," and Rupert (Murdoch) was very sensitive to the overall perception of Stern," says a source close to Fox. "He was very controversial, which is a bad combination for someone who owns TV and newspapers."

Stern may have another big problem: He has trashed Fox mercilessly on his radio show for never airing the program.

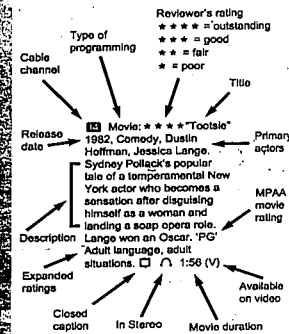

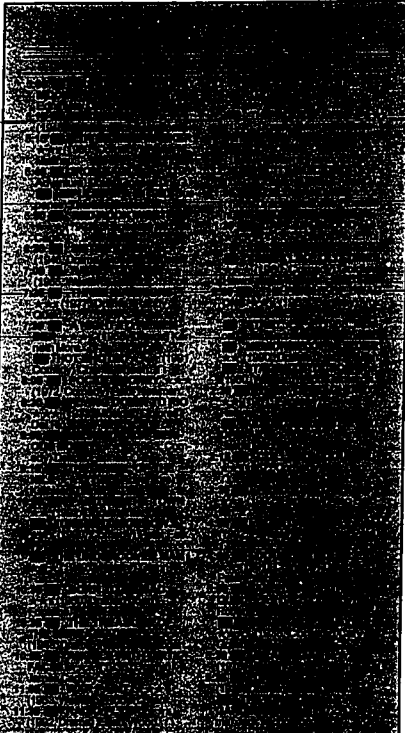

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# Scabs could replace bad hockey refs

There is no excuse for the lousy officiating the Detroit Red Wings and most other NHL teams have endured this season, but there are mitigating circumstances that Detroit's blue-collar sports fans might appreciate.

The NHL's striped shirts, among the lowest paid in sports despite having one of the toughest jobs, are trying to negotiate with team owners who say there's little money left after they spent so freely on players and coaches in recent years.

The officials extended their contract until Nov. 14 and vow to walk without substantial raises. The league, meantime, is staging tryouts for "scabs." The situation is tense, and the games seem to reflect it.

In the first two weeks of the season, the Wings have had some of the league's most experienced referees calling their games — Dan Koharski, Anty vanHellemond and Ron Hoggarth. All were accused of incompetence by the Wings: Koharski for inconsistency and calling too many penalties; vanHellemond for having a short fuse in a rare emotional outburst at captain Steve Yzerman; and Hoggarth for being blind, though it is generally agreed throughout the league that he has been incompetent for years.

But Koharski and vanHellemond are among the best, and both are ranking members of the union the

owners are threatening to break. Can you blame them for being a bit sensitive to catcalls? Wings coach Scotty Bowman can't; he has asked his players to go a bit easy on the officials and to consider their plight.

But agent Don Meahan, who is negotiating for the officials, believes the negotiations have had little effect on the men and their work.

"They've been consummate professionals," Meahan said. "There's almost a quiet resignation among these people that this is something they have to do. And I think the players have been very supportive of their position."

Negotiations are continuing, but Meahan said there is much work to do. "We're a long ways apart, but experience has told us you can't solve a lot of things at the 11th hour. We're looking for a degree of respect and not to be treated as second-class citizens. These people are the very best in the world, and they officiate the most difficult sports."

And they work for peanuts when their salaries are compared to counterparts in other sports. VanHellemond, the dean with 23 years' experience, is paid a base salary of \$90,000. If he works the Stanley Cup finals, he can make bonuses that increase his pay to \$125,000.

Linesmen begin with a base salary of \$75,000, referees \$50,000. The NHL has offered an across-the-board raise of 10 percent, Meahan said, but the officials

are seeking "substantially more than that ..."

Baseball umpires start at \$60,000 and top off at \$180,000. Basketball refs make \$57,000-175,000.

**IT'S LONG TIME:** It's time — go, it's long past time — to retire another number at Joe Louis Arena and to honor one of the great Wings of all time.

Sid Abel served the Wings as all-star player, captain and Stanley Cup champion from the 1930s through the 1950s — then as coach, general manager and broadcaster until the mid-1980s. No man has worn the winged wheel with greater love, respect and appreciation.

Abel is in poor health. But he's strong enough to stand at ice level and help his 103 No. 12 tie-die rollers next to three of teammates Gordie Howe, Ted Lindsay and Alex Delvecchio, where it belongs.

**WHERE'S THE FUN?** What has happened to the game presentation at Joe Louis Arena? Did former Wings executive vice president Jim Lites and marketing chief Jeff Cogan take all the fun to Dallas?

The rock 'n' roll music has been replaced by a sleepy organ during stoppages in play, making the frequent breaks for TV seem especially long and dull. And now instead of the funky "Wild Thing" song we once heard when Stan Probert dropped the gloves, we get Lawrence Welk-type rendition of the theme from "Rocky."

I would also lament the loss of the Spandex beauties who accompanied the Score-O competitors, but that wouldn't be politically correct.

**PICK SOUP:** Predictably, Los Angeles Kings star Wayne Gretzky is taking a lot more abuse in the absence of tough-guy defenseman Marty McSorley, traded to Pittsburgh.

After Gretzky was hammered by Edmonton's Dave Manson, coach Barry Melrose was asked what he was going to do about it. His response: "If I did what (L.A.) sports writers wanted me to do, I'd be dividing the Godfather right in two." Hartford Whalers winger Brian Propp was on the receiving end of more abuse from Chicago Blackhawks defenseman Chris Chelios in a recent game.

Seemingly without provocation, Chelios pummeled Propp and sucker-punched Hartford defenseman Adam Burt while Burt was fighting another player.

Propp was once knocked unconscious by an elbow from Chelios in the 1989 playoffs, when Chelios was with Montreal and Propp was with Philadelphia.

"He's just a lousy person," Propp said. "He never goes after any tough guys. He just goes after guys who don't fight, when nobody else (who will) is on the ice."

## Skater prepares for Winter Games

**MILWAUKEE** — Dan Jansen, a three-time Olympic speed skater and the world record holder for 300 meters, is preparing for another shot at gold as he competes for the 1994 Winter Games in Norway.

The countdown has started for the 28-year-old Jansen, who fell twice during the 1988 Calgary Games, then finished out of medal contention four years later in Albertville. He finished fourth in 1984 at Sarajevo.

"This is going to be his fourth Olympic year," he's not out here to win a medal, and to focus on the gold medal, without a doubt," U.S. speed skating coach Peter Mueller said.

During the 1992 Winter Games, Jansen placed a disappointing fourth in the 500 meters and 26th in the 1,000.

But it was the 1988 Games where Jansen's story became an international one.

Jansen's sister, Jane Beres, didn't finish her 1000 meters race, but she was in the 500-meter race. A favorite to win a medal, he slipped on the first turn and crashed to the ice. Four days later, after returning from his sister's funeral, he fell again in the 1,000.

## Wacky moments in sports with Albert

Sports laughs, bloopers and pranks have been a popular home-video item for years. More than 7 million such cassettes have been purchased. Now NBC's Mary Albert has packaged his selections of the all-time wild and wacky takes from the world of sports.

Released this week by CBS/FOX Video: "The Albert Achievement Awards" — 40 minutes of sports-bloopers tumbling off their pedestals for \$14.98.

Albert, a highly skilled play-by-play sportscaster, has been packaging television segments of athletes with their worst foul forward since 1980, when he worked for WNBC-TV in New York.

These highlights caught the eye of late-night talk-show host David Letterman and a regular guest on "Miscellaneous Mary" became a comic guest on the Letterman show — so long as he brought along a reel of sports funnies.

He did so more than 70 times. (He does a similar feature, "Spanning the World," on the "Today" show.)

This video skirts the top of those bloopers, some roasts and some that go back as far as 1980.

The most distinct feature of the video, setting it apart from many others, is Albert and his narration. It's crisp and adds to what is on the screen, and yet it never gets in the way.

As Albert dishes out "the (hardly) most prestigious awards in sports" he does give more than a glimmer of play-by-play man-in-the-business. The video begins with basketball, from the National Basketball Association to a women's game. It moves on to baseball, from the major leagues to the minors and colleges. The football section has college action, but NFL on-field action is lacking (that's NFL Films territory). There are items involving the pros at practice, cheerleaders, pre-game hoopla and ceremonial tattoos.

There are also curious episodes of sports, bizarre and embarrassing moments from horse racing, news conferences, the ice follies of hockey, Olympic low lights, golf, tennis, announcers' on-pitching, news that's not and the butchering of "The Star Spangled Banner."

## World Series announcer cries foul over charge of favoritism

Here's the pitch: CBS announcer Tim McCarver was "anti-Phillies" during the National League playoffs.

A swing and a miss, McCarver says. "This happens every year. It's ludicrous," says CBS's analyst for the Phillies-Blue Jays World Series. "It's an old, tired story."

Why would I be anti-Philadelphia? I live here. I played with the Phillies. It makes no sense. In Atlanta, they were saying I was pro-Philadelphia."

McCarver, 52, "helped" with two World Series with St. Louis and did ditches with the Phillies from 1970 to '72 and '73 through '79. He's been a broadcaster for 14 years — 10 of them with CBS. This is his fourth World Series for CBS, seventh overall. His play-by-play partner is Sean McDonough.

Seems every time McCarver broadcasts a playoff or series, he's accused of being unfair to somebody. Truth is, he's kind of tired of defending himself.

"I'm an experienced broadcaster. I know all the pitfalls," says McCarver, part of the Mets broadcast team during the regular season. "I broadcast based on my experience as a player and my experience as an announcer. I'm not paid to root one way or another."

"I call it as fair and across-the-board as I can. I stand by it ... If anybody has a problem with that, I really don't care. I don't matter to me."

After two games, McCarver says he hasn't seen

any surprises in the Series: "I expected a lot of runs to be scored. I expect a lot to be scored throughout the rest of the Series. The pitching on both sides is flexible, even though Toronto may be more susceptible to being outplayed."

And don't ask for predictions. (Darn.) "No tea leaves for me. It's nonsense. It's not my job."

The media overkill about the scrappy Phils' "Broad Street bellies" is part of the fun at Series time. "It's an old, tired story. I'm tired of hearing everything this time of year is overblown. There's nothing you can do. You're under a microscope."

McCarver refuses to compare this Phillies team to any from the past, but he does say that his enthusiasm "reminds you of when you played as a kid. You didn't worry about winning or losing. You played, you didn't work. There's a big distinction."

While enjoying a major-league high by broadcasting the Series — "if you can't get pumped for this, you're unreplaceable" — McCarver says he has no interest in pursuing a championship ring on the field as a manager.

"I played 21 years," he says. "I've already done that. The day I walked away from playing, I never looked back. I never missed it. The longer I stay in the booth, the easier it is to know my place is in the booth." McCarver says he turned down "mid overtures" from Montreal in '84 and Minnesota in '86.

Contract-wise, McCarver's four-year deal expires at the end of the year, the same as CBS's baseball package. Look for him on NBC and ABC, which will split major-league baseball beginning next season.
