Transient chases chill; hundreds left homeless

ALTADENA, Calif. — A homeless man named Andres Huang woke up cold and shivering in a sagebrush-covered campground just up the mountain from Altadena.

So he kindled a fire. Scaring winds turned his small campfire into a raging blaze that burned 5,500 acres, incinerated 115 homes and left hundreds in the same predicament as himself — homeless.

"He was cold and confused," said Sheriff's Department spokesman Sgt. Noel Lanier. "It just got away from him and he began running down the hills." Authorities know only this about him: A Chinese immigrant, Huang speaks no English. He is 35 years old. Before he came to this country two months ago, he had lived somewhere in South America.

Like Mrs. O'Leary's cow, Huang's relationship to this fire is destined for infamy in Altadena. And for those whose

homes were erased from the landscape, the slow process of starting over began Thursday.

Whipped by the fierce winds, the fire raced through Eaton Canyon in this community in the foothills of the San Gabriel Mountains, 15 miles northeast of Los Angeles. The fire early Wednesday was one of 13 blazes that destroyed nearly 600 homes and burned 113,000 acres from Ventura County, north of Los Angeles, to the U.S.-Mexico border.

From Eaton Canyon, the fire spread into the exclusive gated community Kinneola Canyon Estates and sent 26-year-old Jim Bonaccorso scrambling down another hillside. "I woke up and heard explosions," Bonaccorso recalled Thursday, standing in the smoking embers of the home he shared with his parents. "I thought it was power transformers bursting."

What he heard were the exploding gas tanks of his neighbors' cars. The back of

Sea winds help crews fight California fires

LAGUNA BEACH, Calif. — Cool sea breezes helped firefighters gain ground Thursday against a Southern California firestorm that destroyed nearly 600 homes and burned 116,000 acres.

Stubborn strips of flames persisted as some residents returned home to find their dreams gone up in smoke.

A procession of fire refusers walked through the smoke along a coastal highway into Laguna Beach, the posh coastal resort in Orange County half-gutted by a wall of flame that destroyed more than 300 homes.

Authorities blocked the Pacific Coast Highway, allowing residents to return only on foot or bicycle. Hundreds of people abandoned their cars to make the trip.

President Clinton declared disasters in five counties and federal agencies organized help for 25,000 displaced. Gov. Pete Wilson offered a \$50,000 reward for arrests of arsonists, and police patrolled neighborhoods to prevent looting.

Cool sea breezes signaled an end to the hot, dry Santa Ana condition that on Wednesday fanned 13 blazes into firestorms from Ventura County, north of Los Angeles, to the U.S.-Mexico border. The National Weather Service warned the

gusty winds that blow through Southern California every fall from the deserts east of Los Angeles could return Saturday.

By Thursday, firefighters had contained more than half the arson-caused 10,000-acre fire in Laguna Beach, 40 miles southeast of Los Angeles.

Arson also was suspected in a 33,111-acre fire in Ventura County that destroyed 19 structures, including a million-dollar home in the Lake Sherwood area that burned in a fire-up late Thursday.

A growing army of firefighters seized the chance to steadily encircle the fires. Some of the fires raged out of control; others were partially contained.

Deputy replaces Forest Service chief

WASHINGTON — Forest Service Chief Dale Robertson, a holdover from the Reagan administration often at odds with environmentalists, was ousted Thursday and replaced by one of his deputies.

Robertson, 53, had been under intense criticism since 1991 when a federal judge declared illegal the agency's plans to allow logging of ancient forests in the Pacific Northwest and halted most of the harvests to protect the northern spotted owl.

Named chief in 1987, Robertson's job had been rumored to be in jeopardy since President Clinton was elected on a platform that emphasized environmental protection.

David Unger, 61, a veteran of the Forest Service and Soil Conservation Service, will become the acting chief overseeing the 191 million acres of national forests on Nov. 1. Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy said.

In a statement issued by the USDA, Espy described Unger as a conservationist with extensive experience in endangered fisheries habitat.

Espy did not specify why Robertson was being replaced. But Assistant Agriculture Secretary Jim Lyons told a congressional panel in August that Clinton had inherited a terribly mismanaged national forest system, damaged by years of excessive logging under Presidents Reagan and Bush.

"We realize now we were cutting timber faster than we could sustain," Lyons said.

Unger said in the USDA statement Thursday that he believes his background, especially in the area of natural resources,

Jury finds Hamilton guilty of embezzlement, forgery

HAILEY — Janet Hamilton was found guilty Thursday of embezzling nearly \$250,000 from Tom Hormel, formerly of Hormel Meats.

After deliberating more than nine hours, the jury, which heard the seven-day, 5th District Court trial, found Hamilton guilty of one count of embezzlement and one count of forgery.

The embezzlement charge stemmed from her purchase of lots in Bellevue's Silver-

wood Subdivision for an amount in excess of \$250,000.

The jury found her guilty on a felony forgery count, charging that Hamilton signed Hormel's signature on a \$72,000 check without his knowledge.

But the panel found Hamilton innocent of five additional charges that she wrongfully took more than \$325,000 of Hormel's money to pay personal credit card debts, buy automobiles, pay her mortgage, remodel her condo and help with her daughter's education.

Blaine County Prosecuting Attorney

Fritz Haemmerle said he was pleased about the outcome.

He said he focused his case primarily on the forgery and embezzlement counts in which the jury found Hamilton guilty.

"The other counts are so complicated that the complexity is almost enough to raise a reasonable doubt," he said.

Hamilton's attorney, Jim Harris, was unavailable for comment.

Haemmerle said he did not see any "irreparable" issues in the trial, saying that the whole trial was "a clean."

Babbitt to Mike

WASHINGTON — Angered by a persistent Senate filibuster, Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt announced he would revert to his plan to impose a \$4.28 grazing fee over five years without Congress' blessing.

Three House bills, including one from Democrats including Montana Sen. Max Baucus have voted with a coalition of Republicans to block a \$3.45 grazing fee compromise from full consideration.

Without the Senate vote, Babbitt will impose his reforms through an administrative procedure that does not require Capitol Hill input. The secretary set his new regulations in motion Thursday night after continued resistance from the filibustering senators.

Although the House overwhelmingly approved the deal, Senate opponents of the compromise complain that a vote would codify rangeland reforms that have never been considered in congressional hearings.

Bautus said he would support some changes in grazing policy, including a higher fee and measures to protect against damage when livestock are allowed to chew up dense patches of native grasses or trampled sensitive habitats in steeps, washes.

"Everyone involved in this issue wants reform," he said. "The \$3.45 fee makes sense."

But the House-Senate conference by Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., includes provisions for federal ownership of improvements ranchers make on federal land as well as for a reserved federal water right on Bureau of Land Management property.

"The Reid compromise provisions ... go

Pot found on 5 students at Sawtooth

TWIN FALLS — While the rest of the school was honoring "Red Ribbon Week," five young boys at Sawtooth Elementary School were caught Thursday in possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia.

Det. Sgt. Bill Hanchey said some teachers at Sawtooth heard Thursday that two boys had some drugs on them and contacted him.

He said he went to the school and talked to the two boys and found out that three more boys were involved. All the boys were ages 11 or 12.

The boys weren't arrested, but the detective said he confiscated the marijuana and paraphernalia that the boys had at school and at home. Hanchey wouldn't say how much pot was confiscated but said his investigation will continue today.

This is the first incident of drugs at Sawtooth, he said. But he added that drug use among elementary school students in Twin Falls isn't unique.

Sawtooth Principal Randy Rutledge couldn't be reached for comment.

This week, Sawtooth and other local schools are celebrating "Red Ribbon Week," in which students and teachers wear red ribbons to show their support of a drug-free environment.

Hanchey is a "resource officer" who works out of the Twin Falls High School. While his job was about to be eliminated in September when Twin Falls residents voted against a levy increase for the school district, some local parents have donated money to cover some of his expenses and he's remained in the schools dealing with the students.

He also had a previous civil case dealing strictly with contractual issues stemming from her employment by Hormel, but that case is under appeal.

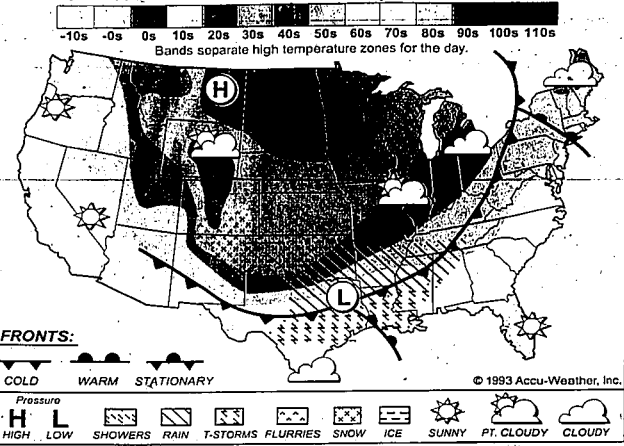
The court has ordered a pre-sentencing investigation, which could take six weeks. Hamilton is free on an existing \$10,000 bond until her sentencing hearing.

This is the third embezzlement case in the past 1 1/2 years in which the defendant has been found guilty, Haemmerle said.

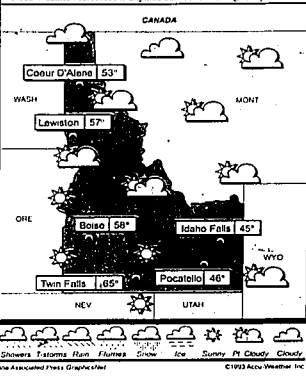

Packwood probe may move into criminal wrongdoing, panel says

...WASHINGTON — The Senate Ethics Committee said Thursday that its investigation of sexual harassment charges against Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., has taken a new turn into possible criminal wrongdoing.
That turn of events is the subject of the current dispute between the committee and Packwood over the release of his office diaries, said Sen. Richard Bryan, D-Nev., chairman of the committee.
Though the Ethics Committee normally operates in near-total secrecy, Bryan Thursday issued a sharply worded, five-page statement on the dispute with Packwood that reflected the anguish of the senators over the investigation of one of their own, and over the invasion of privacy issues involved in the subpoena of his diaries.
Bryan said the diaries, thousands

of pages of notes dictated on a daily basis by the senator since 1969, were transcribed by his secretary and maintained in his office. "They are not strictly personal, handwritten diaries," Bryan said. "Sen. Packwood told the committee that he was considering using the diaries to write a book."
Bryan also said the committee had agreed that Packwood could mask any portions of the diaries he wanted were strictly personal, and that those portions would be reviewed by a neutral hearing examiner.
Packwood initially agreed to that procedure but reneged last week when a committee lawyer going through the diaries with Packwood's attorney came across material in an unmasked portion that appeared to be incriminating, Bryan said.
He said that at that point Packwood's lawyer refused to copy the material for the committee, and the dispute continued until the subpoena

was issued Oct. 20.
"Packwood took the Senate floor Thursday to apologize, for what he conceded was his own inaccurate portrayal of the committee lawyer's actions," he said, and he denied the allegations had looked at masked portions of the diary. He also clarified an earlier statement that his diaries contained comments about the personal relationship of a senator and that of a high-level Democratic Congressman, saying the senator referred to is no longer a member.
The Senate is scheduled to take up the question of whether to ask a federal court to enforce the subpoena on Monday. Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., was critical Thursday of Bryan's statement, saying it appeared to prejudice the case against Packwood.
Packwood was accused of sexual harassment by more than two dozen women, including many former staff assistants, after the narrowly won reelection last November.

his own house was on fire, and Bonaccorso, struggling to get to sleep, realized his driveway was a wall of flame.
"I ran through my neighbor's property and fell down the hillside," he said. "My whole backside is bruised."
The Bonaccorso faced the task of calling his parents in Mexico, where they had gone to celebrate his father's retirement, and telling them that the house his father had built 18 years ago with his own hands was gone, along with virtually everything in it.
Gerry and Sal Bonaccorso came home to find their Jaguar reduced to

junk in the driveway, alongside the smoking hulk of their son's truck.
The ash-laden neighborhood smoldered in a random pattern caused by fickle winds—that consumed one house in fire, only to leave the rest intact. The fire department had already affixed red and white tags to the mailboxes of burned homes reading "condemned."
In the ash-filled early morning light, Mrs. Bonaccorso had so far found only two items in the rubble of her home—a crucifix and a statue of the Virgin Mary.
"Is that interesting?" she said softly.
"We're happy for one thing," she said, tears welling in her eyes as she

wrapped her son in her arms. "My baby here. Everything can be repaired, right? Everything except this. That's what's most important."
Meanwhile, Andres Huang was scheduled to be arraigned Friday on felony charges of recklessly starting a fire in an area where fires are banned.
Minor injuries sustained when he tumbled down the foothills landed him in the jail ward of County-USC Medical Center, where he was being held in lieu of \$7,500 bail.
No visitors were allowed. Through an interpreter, Sgt. Lanier said, he told arson detectives "that he started a fire and it became uncontrollable."

way beyond preventing abuse," Baucus said.
Thursday afternoon's attempt to break the filibuster fell six votes short of the 60 necessary to end debate and vote on the \$14 billion Interior spending package, which includes the Reid deal as well as all 1994 money for all national parks, forests and other federal lands. In the meantime, both the House and Senate approved a stop-gap measure to keep these operations from shutting down until Nov. 10.
Baucus invited several Western Democrats in the filibuster, including Sen. Ben Nighthorse Campbell of Colorado, as well as Sens. Byron Dorgan and Kent Conrad, who represent North Dakota.
Majority Republican Sen. Conrad Burns took to the floor to decry the

Reid deal as "the tip of the iceberg." Republicans have used the debate to incite regional grassroots opposition to much of Babbitt's proposed agenda to clean up over-developed public lands in the West as well as to protect native plants and wildlife.
"This is Bruce-Babbitt's war on the West," said Idaho Republican Sen. Larry Craig. "I'm not willing to let Western communities be bulldozed."
Idaho's other Republican, Sen. Dirk Kempthorne, joked that it might not be too bad to cut off the federal money for a period of time. "This idea that because of the efforts of the Senate that we may shut down Bryce Babbitt's office for a few days pales in comparison to the fact that if his new laws go into effect, it will shut down ranches forever."

And Baucus himself admitted the debate has complicated his chances for educating those communities about the need for a more efficient Endangered Species Act.
Even Baucus' highest ranking Republican counterpart on the Environment Committee, Rhode Island Sen. John Chafee, voted with the Democrats.
"They've got to win this one," explained Rep. George Miller, who chairs the House Natural Resources Committee. Miller has aggressively held firm in backing the Reid deal and repeatedly pointed to the majority in both chambers who support the compromise if the Senate would put it to a straight vote.
"This is about people who have political power disproportionate to their numbers," Miller said. "These are hangovers from a bygone era."

will "help lead the agency in a new direction."
Tom Amontec, a spokesman for Espy, acknowledged the decision to replace Robertson was not limited to "there are a lot of controversies at the Forest Service—allegations of undocumented aliens, the air tankers, timber theft. They are serious problems that need to be addressed," he said.
Robertson cannot be fired because of civil service protection, but can

be reassigned. He will become a special assistant to Deputy Agriculture Secretary Richard Rominger, Espy said. Associate Chief George Leonard also will leave his position effective Nov. 1 to assist Lyons, assistant secretary for natural resources and the environment.
Unger currently is associate deputy chief for the national forest system. Before joining the Forest Service in 1987, he served five years as associate chief of the Soil Conservation Service.
Neither environmentalists nor timber

industry leaders said they were happy with the temporary move on Thursday.
"Unger is a nice guy, but he is a long-term career person in the agency that helped oversee the most destructive era in national forest history," said Brock Evans, vice president of the National Audubon Society.
"It sends the wrong signal for anyone hoping for meaningful reform. I think it is only temporary, but temporary could be a very long time," he said.

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Clintons seek health plan help

BALTIMORE (AP) — Doubts will give way to support once Americans learn what's in his revamped health-system overhaul, President Clinton suggested Thursday as he set out with first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton to sell the plan.

"It begins with you knowing about it. Please help us," the president told a crowded auditorium audience at Johns Hopkins University. Medical students in white coats lined up along the sides.

Mrs. Clinton — the president's principal health-care adviser — conceded that the legislation faces a difficult journey in Congress. "This debate will be a vigorous one. There's a lot at stake," she said.

"We want people to become informed in order to rebut the kinds of attacks, the misinformation, the advertising campaigns that will be stirred up in the next months," Mrs. Clinton said.

Public opinion polls have shown that support for the plan has dropped off since Clinton presented a broad outline in a nationally televised speech five weeks ago.

On Capitol Hill Thursday, some lawmakers complained about the plan's potential costs as well as the idea of creating new entitlements that would be tough to hold in check.

"It is not possible to cut back on entitlements," said Sen. John Chafee, R-R.I. "Anyone who says, 'We'll see how it works and cut back if necessary' is living in a never-never land."

Another senator, Democrat Daniel P. Moynihan of New York, said as many as 100 million Americans would be forced to pay higher premiums if the plan is approved.

Health Secretary Donna Shalala,

testifying before Moynihan's Finance Committee, did not dispute Moynihan's estimate. But she added, "The president's plan does provide a peace of mind that no actuary can price."

Clinton was on a two-day trip to Baltimore, New York and Boston to promote both health system overhaul and his endangered free trade agreement with Mexico and Canada.

At Johns Hopkins, he also made a plug for re-emphasizing physical education in high schools.

The battle in Congress over the much-longer actual legislation will extend through most of next year. The measure would restructure the health system and guarantee universal medical coverage to all Americans by 1998.

The Clintons will make more joint appearances for the plan, said White House spokeswoman Dee Myers. The president will focus on "the bottom line" while Mrs. Clinton will speak "more personally," Myers said.

U.S. measles cases hit record low total

WASHINGTON (AP) — Three years ago, during one of America's most severe measles epidemics, an army of medical workers attacked the disease with a massive inoculation campaign. On Thursday, the government declared victory.

"We have seen measles virtually disappear in the United States in 1992," Dr. William L. Atkinson of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said at a news conference.

Through the first six months of the year, there have been only 175 reported measles cases, and he predicted that by the end of October the total would reach only about 260.

"This would be the lowest total of measles ever reported in the United States since reporting began," he said. "I think we can confidently say ever in the history of the United States for all practical purposes."

That contrasts with a time in 1989 to 1991, he said, when there were tens of thousands of measles cases, 132 deaths and 11,000 hospitalized with complications of the disease.

The 175 cases reported for the first half of 1993 represents a 99-percent decrease from the nearly 14,000 cases reported for the first six months of 1990, during the peak of the epidemic.

Atkinson said that the major measles outbreak prompted federal, state and local health officials to mount a major campaign against the childhood disease.

"State and local health departments took on Herculean efforts to increase vaccination levels in children," he said. Vaccination rates

among two-year-olds increased from 65 percent reported in 1985, to about 82 percent in 1991, the latest year statistics are available. The results have been predictable, said Atkinson.

"When vaccination levels go up, diseases tend to disappear," he said.

During the 1989-91 outbreak, there were pockets of infection throughout many of the nation's biggest cities and most of the victims were young, preschool children, said Atkinson.

Now that picture has totally changed. "We are no longer seeing those giant outbreaks in large cities," he said. "The largest outbreaks have all been in school kids and the biggest we've seen is only about 40 cases."

Since vaccinations for measles, mumps and rubella are generally given together, Atkinson said there has been a corresponding decrease in those other childhood diseases as well.

Mumps is near a record low rate of incidence in the nation, he said.

Despite the success of the campaign against measles, however, about 20 percent of pre-schoolers still have not been inoculated against the disease, so a potential for a resurgence remains, Atkinson said.

For other childhood vaccinations, the picture is worse. "Our best estimates for 1991 indicates that levels for four doses of diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis (whooping cough) are probably no better than 45 percent, and levels for three doses of oral polio vaccine are probably no better than 55 percent," said Atkinson.

New definition brings AIDS total to 339,250

ATLANTA (AP) — An expanded definition of AIDS added 48,915 Americans this year to the count of diagnosed cases kept by the government.

The CDC had predicted 90,000 to 100,000 new AIDS diagnoses this year because of the new definition, which added three diseases and the severe disappearance of disease-fighting blood cells to the list of symptoms used to determine when people with HIV progress to full-blown AIDS.

With three months of the year left, the prediction seems on target, Ward said. Three new indicator diseases — recurrent pneumonia, pulmonary tuberculosis and advanced cervical cancer — accounted for 4,739 of the new definition cases.

The new diagnoses didn't change the underlying trends of the epidemic. AIDS still is increasing most rapidly among women, minorities, intravenous drug users and people who have unprotected, heterosexual contact.

Since the epidemic began in 1981, 339,250 Americans have been diagnosed with AIDS and 204,390 have died, the CDC said.

The broader definition went into effect in January and "helps portray the problem more accurately," said Dr. John Ward, chief of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's AIDS surveillance.

From January to September, the CDC added 85,526 to its count of AIDS patients, a 141 percent increase over new diagnoses in the same period last year, the agency said in a report released Thursday.

More than half of this year's new patients were diagnosed under the new definition of AIDS, which recognizes people who may have been ill for years.

But the jump doesn't mean AIDS is mushrooming. The CDC thinks the disease is increasing at 3 percent to 5 percent a year, a rate of growth that has been steady since 1990.

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Justice charged with illegally getting drugs

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — A state supreme court justice who accused two colleagues of illegal conduct was charged Thursday with using court employees to obtain prescription tranquilizers for his own use.

Justice Rolf Larsen was charged with one count of criminal conspiracy and 27 counts of fraudulently obtaining a controlled substance. Each count carries a maximum penalty of three years in prison and a \$10,000 fine upon conviction.

Larsen has been asked to voluntarily appear for arraignment Monday, said State Attorney General Eric Preate Jr.

He will continue to sit on the court. Any possible judicial disciplinary actions would have to be taken by two panels appointed by the state Supreme Court and the governor's office.

Admiral lashes out at Tailhook censure

WASHINGTON — A rear admiral censured for failing to prevent the debauchery and sexual abuse at the 1991 Tailhook convention has attacked Navy Secretary John Dalton for a punishment "unprecedented since Pearl Harbor."

"Two wars, years at sea, absolute loyalty and dedication to my Navy and my country and you are punishing me as if I were guilty of misconduct. I am not. I spoke the truth," Rear Adm. Riley Mixson wrote in a rebuttal to Dalton dated Oct. 18.

Mixson, the assistant chief of naval operations for air warfare, asked Dalton to reduce the punishment to a non-punitive administrative action although the censure cannot be appealed.

Unsafe reactors likely to remain open

WASHINGTON — Russian and Eastern European officials are determined to keep their unsafe nuclear reactors operating, although the risk of an accident is 10 times greater than in the United States, U.S. officials reported Thursday.

"The Russians clearly are not going to close the reactors until they have some (energy) alternatives," Ivan Selin, chairman of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, told a House Energy subcommittee.

The NRC chairman as well as senior Clinton administration officials said that the Russian and Eastern European reactors clearly are unsafe and far below U.S. standards.

Grant program comes under fire

WASHINGTON — A \$6 billion-a-year grant program for students past high school is run on "an honor system" wide open to fraud and provides no way to measure what taxpayers get for their money, administration officials said Thursday.

"Success in this program is whether we successfully give the students the money — not whether they graduate from a college or proprietary school," David Longenecker, assistant secretary for post-secondary education, told the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations.

"This program operates essentially on an honor system," said the department's inspector general, James B. Thomas Jr.

Senate approves unemployment money

WASHINGTON — The Senate approved extra unemployment benefits Thursday for 1 million Americans who have been jobless for half a year, but it was unclear how soon Congress would ship it to President Clinton.

After three days of debate, senators approved the \$1.1 billion measure 76-20. The bill would allow up to 13 weeks of extra benefits for people who have used up the standard 26 weeks of coverage.

But Senate passage left the bill's immediate future cloudy. Senators added two amendments to the measure that were not in the version approved by the House on Oct. 15.

Shuttle astronaut bungees in space

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Columbia astronaut David Wolf was thrilled about making his last bungee drop in space Thursday — until he was reminded about the bungees that await him on Earth.

"It's a little bit sad," Wolf joked before performing the medical experiment in the shuttle laboratory. "I just heard that this is going to be our last opportunity to drop."

"Negative, Dave. You have a whole-week of baseline data collection" after the flight ends Monday, said ground controller Laurence Young.

"Oh, thank God!" Wolf said sarcastically, emphasizing each word. Ground controllers roared with laughter.

3-year-old's hanging spurs demand for reform

CHICAGO (AP) — The tragedy of 3-year-old Joseph Wallace began before he was born.

It ended April 19 with his hanging, allegedly at the hands of his mentally ill mother.

Six months later, a task force looking into how the juvenile justice system failed Joseph said similar tragedies are possible.

"It would be comfortable to believe the facts in this case are so exceptional that such cases are not likely to happen again," the task force said in a report to Cook County's chief circuit judge. "That hope is unfounded."

The report, released Wednesday, recommends a complete overhaul of a system that allowed four judges to remove Joseph from foster care and

return him each time to his mother, who was charged with murder.

The three-layoff task force largely exonerated the judges who handled Joseph's case at various times, but had harsh words for the county public guardian's office, which was supposed to protect Joseph's interests.

"All told, the public guardian's office was Joseph's last clear chance, and its neglect went far beyond the public apology offered by its chief," the report said.

The report said attorneys on both sides routinely agreed to consent orders that gave judges almost no information and little choice but to return Joseph to his mother.

The chief judge, Harry Comerford, said he will reassign 10 probation offi-

cers to serve as investigators for judges hearing abuse and neglect cases.

Problems in Illinois' Department of Children and Family Services aren't unique.

The American Civil Liberties Union, as it did in Illinois, has child welfare agencies in Connecticut, Washington, D.C., Wisconsin, New Mexico, Missouri and other places, alleging they are mistreating children in their care.

The task force report alternates between legal jargon and chilling biographical details on the life of 28-

year-old Amanda Wallace, the suicidal woman who gave birth to Joseph on July 29, 1989, while she was a resident of a mental health center.

She had been institutionalized repeatedly since childhood.

At age 2, she set her mother's Chicago apartment on fire; a brother died of smoke inhalation. In 1974, the state removed her from her mother's custody because of physical abuse. "She had reportedly been locked in a closet for three days, beaten with a hammer, tied to a chair and sexually abused by her mother's paramour," the task force wrote.

'Richest girl in the world,' heiress Doris Duke, dies

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Doris Duke, the tobacco heiress whose father's fortune made her the richest girl in the world and propelled her into an international circle of celebrities, died Thursday. She was 80.

Miss Duke, whose family gave Duke University its name, died at her Beverly Hills home, one of five she owned around the country, said Howard J. Rubenstein, a family spokesman. She lived mainly in New Jersey.

The cause of death was not disclosed.

Her wealth was estimated this year at \$750 million, 110th on Forbes magazine's list of the nation's richest.

Though Miss Duke shunned the media and struggled to protect her privacy, her life was fodder for the gossip columns from the day in 1925 when her father died and left her most of his \$300-million estate.

Six decades later, the media attention continued. In 1988, she posted \$5 million bail for her friend Imelda Marcos, wife of the late Ferdinand Marcos. Mrs. Marcos was acquitted of federal charges she helped her husband loot the Philippine treasury when he was president.

A week after posting the bail, Miss Duke adopted a 35-year-old former belly dancer and Hare Krishna devotee, Charlene Gail "Chandi" Heffner. Miss Duke was 75 at the time and had no children.

By February 1991, Ms. Heffner was

persona non grata on Duke property and Miss Duke was quoted as saying the adoption was "the greatest mistake I ever made in my life." Stephanie Mansfield wrote in her 1992 Duke biography entitled "The Richest Girl in the World."

Miss Duke was 12 when her father died in 1925 and left the bulk of his \$300 million estate to his only child. Most of the Duke millions came from the American Tobacco Co., the Duke Power Co., and real estate investments. Two years after her father's death, the young Miss Duke sued her mother, Nanaline, and other executors of her father's will over ownership of the various Duke residences, which the trustees were preparing to sell.

In 1927, the courts agreed Miss Duke was sole owner of the New York and Newport, R.I., mansions, with Nanaline Duke retaining the right to live in both. Miss Duke also acquired sole ownership of Duke Farms, the estate in Hillsborough, N.J., where she grew up.

Both of Miss Duke's marriages ended in divorce. In 1935, she married James H.R. Cromwell; her second husband was international playboy and polo player Porfirio Rubirosa.

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Students promote random acts of kindness

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP) — "Random acts of senseless kindness" are breaking out all over since a college professor turned frustration into a class assignment.

Chuck Wall, human relations instructor at Bakersfield College, was listening to television when the phrase "another random act of senseless violence" got stuck in his mind like a bad melody.

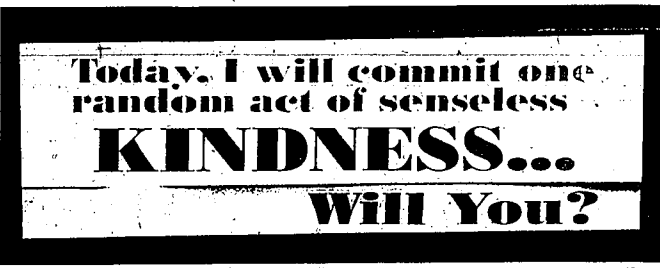
Inspiration struck. The result was an essay assignment and a bumper sticker: "Today, I will commit one random act of senseless KINDNESS... Will you?"

Hundreds of people in Bakersfield have bought stickers that his students sell for \$1. A bank and a union paid to have them printed. Proceeds go to the Braille Center of Kern County.

Wall asked his students to do something out of the ordinary to help someone who wasn't expecting it, then write about it.

Shane Gautreaux, 20, bought 30 blankets at the Salvation Army and brought them to homeless people who gather under a bridge.

"After people hear that, they think, 'God, that didn't take a lot of time, it didn't take a lot of money,



Hundreds of people in Bakersfield, Calif., have bought this bumper sticker. And if more people did something like that, just think what a nicer place the world would be," Gautreaux said.

Jessica Fredericksen, 41, pulled out of a parking space she had just pulled into, waving to a motorist who appeared frantically late for an appointment. Then, Fredericksen parked in the only other available space about a half-mile away.

Todd Madison, 19, encountered a homeless father and son at a convenience store and bought them the sodas and chips they wanted.

A law enforcement association plans to put the stickers on all 113 Kern County sheriff's patrol cars. The "senseless kindness" idea has been broadcast from pulpits, school district offices and professional associations in Bakersfield, a city of

about 200,000 people about 100 miles north of Los Angeles.

Wall isn't the first to promote the idea of random kindness. Ann Herbert of Marin County north of San Francisco got credit for that in a book called "Random Acts of Kindness," published by Conari Press last year. "I had no idea it would erupt like this," Wall said.

O'Connor asks court to decide on gay ban

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Supreme Court justice Thursday asked the full court to decide whether to temporarily lift a court order that bans discrimination against gays in the military.

Justice Sandra Day O'Connor referred the emergency request by the Clinton administration to the other justices, said court spokeswoman Toni House.

An individual justice has the authority to grant an emergency order, but it is not uncommon for the full court. Emergency requests filed at the Supreme Court typically are acted on within a few days or weeks. The Pentagon wants the high

court to temporarily limit a lower court's ban on discrimination against gays in the military so that it affects only the sailor who filed the lawsuit.

The government contends U.S. District Judge Terry Hatter Jr. of Los Angeles lacked the authority to issue a nationwide ban.

Hatter's Sept. 20 order will keep the government from implementing President Clinton's new policy, which states that recruits will not be asked their sexual orientation but that openly declared homosexuals will not be allowed to serve, the government said.

Hatter earlier ruled that the Pentagon's longtime ban on gays in the military was unconstitutional.

Chinese satellite plunges through atmosphere

WASHINGTON (AP) — An out-of-control Chinese satellite made a fiery plunge through the atmosphere Thursday, splashing down in the Pacific Ocean 1,000 miles west of

Peru, the U.S. Space Command said. The satellite apparently skipped like a stone on a lake when it hit the atmosphere and landed 1,000 miles south of the predicted impact point.

Commander undergoes cancer surgery

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gen. Joseph Hoar, the four-star Marine general who was considered a top candidate to replace Gen. Colin Powell as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, had surgery last week for prostate cancer and is expected to make a full recovery, military officials said Thursday.

Hoar is the commander-in-chief of the Central Command, and is responsible for U.S. military forces in the geographic area from the Indian Ocean and Africa to the Middle East.

The 58-year-old general's surgery was Oct. 20 at the National Naval Medical Center in Bethesda, Md., said one senior military source, who

spoke on condition of anonymity.

He returned to MacDill Air Force Base near Tampa, Fla., on Tuesday and is expected to return to work some time next week, the source said.

"He's still convalescing, but all reports so far are good, very positive," the military source said.

A second military source said tests showed the cancer had not spread.

Lt. Cmdr. Kenneth Satterfield, a spokesman for the naval hospital, confirmed that Hoar was a patient and had been admitted "for a procedure," but Satterfield refused to state explicitly what it was.

Hoar was one of President Clinton's top candidates to replace Powell, who retired Sept. 30 as the nation's top military officer. Instead, Clinton chose Gen. John Shalikashvili, the commander of U.S. forces in Europe, to succeed Powell.

Hoar, who has served more than 35 years with the Marines, is considered a "true warrior" who earned a Bronze Star Medal with a 'V' for valor.

New Apple chairman tussles with town over mansion

WOODSIDE, Calif. (AP) — New Apple Computer chairman A.C. "Mike" Markkula wants his house to be as majestic as its surroundings. Trouble is, redwood trees are pretty majestic.

Markkula's plan to build an 18,000-square-foot house on a 50-acre site he owns. He told the Woodside planning commission Oct. 14 that a smaller house would be dwarfed by the redwoods, which are among the world's largest trees and can grow

up to 120 feet tall.

"He may want a big house for whatever reason he says, but redwood trees by nature dwarf things — that's one of their beauties," said Planning Commissioner Helen McCloskey.

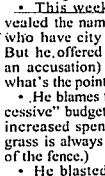
For that reason, we are breaking with our past habit of not making endorsements in city races. Here are our recommendations to Twin Falls voters:

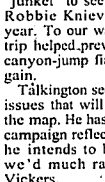
with honor and competence. He listens to constituents and is in touch with the concerns of citizens. His position as a small-business owner brings an important perspective to the council.

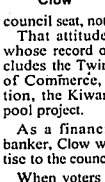

McClusky, by a nose

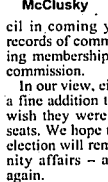

Among the five council candidates, McClusky has taken the lead in addressing growth-related issues. He is challenging traditional thinking on growth, offering ideas such as a development fee.

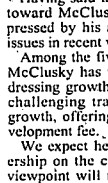
We expect he'll offer similar leadership on the council. Although his viewpoint will not always prevail in council decisions, his voice will be valuable as the council grapples with community change.

Vickers has not been a flashy member of the council, but he has served

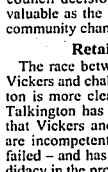

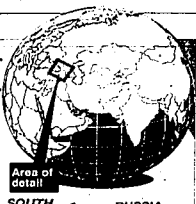

Judge hits FBI with \$1,920 fine

BOISE (AP) — A federal judge has ordered the Federal Bureau of Investigation to pay a \$1,920 fine for its delays in producing reports and evidence in the Randy Weaver-Kevin Harris trial.

U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge said in an order filed Tuesday that the FBI repeatedly failed to heed orders to produce material on a timely basis, delaying a criminal trial that took eight weeks.

Weaver, 45, and Harris, 26, white separatists, were charged with murder, conspiracy and other counts after a shootout and 11-day standoff in northern Idaho left three people dead, including a federal marshal, Weaver's wife and son.

The jury acquitted Harris on all charges and convicted Weaver only of failure to appear on a previous weapons charge. Weaver was sentenced to 18 months in jail last week. Prison officials say he could be released by Christmas because of time already served.

The court's order in the Weaver case is being studied at the highest levels of the FBI, which will take whatever appropriate action is necessary," the FBI said from its national press office in Washington. "Issues raised by the order are among those covered in an on-going internal investigation that began over six weeks ago."

Lodge said he fined the FBI the equivalent of one day's pay for four defense lawyers at \$60 per hour. During the trial, Lodge said he was fining the government \$3,240 for failure to produce documents for the defense on a timely basis.

U.S. Attorney Betty Richardson said the Justice Department asked for clarification. Lodge's new order means the lower fine will be levied against the FBI instead of federal prosecutors.

"The FBI was a principal participant in the Weaver/Harris criminal proceeding," the judge said. "Its behavior served to obstruct the administration of justice in that proceeding. Its behavior brought about delays and countless arguments outside the presence of the jury. These delays and arguments, which obstructed the progress of the trial, would not have been necessary had the FBI acted as it said."

The judge said it was clear that federal prosecutors Ron Howen and Kim Lindquist "were receiving less than full cooperation from the FBI" during the trial. "It later became clear that a pattern of delay and lack of cooperation was manifesting itself despite the efforts of the local assistant U.S. attorneys," the judge said.

Lodge said the FBI delays in producing material reached a climax mid-trial when the agency delayed reports about an FBI sniper until after the man testified.

FBI Agent Lon Horuchi testified that he fatally shot Vicki Weaver, Randy Weaver's wife, in the Weaver cabin a day after the standoff started. He testified June 8 and immediately left town.

Defense attorneys complained to Lodge that they didn't receive material on Horuchi until the next day, because the FBI mailed it fourth class from Virginia.

Boise mayor's race getting down and dirty

BOISE (AP) — The mayoral race in Idaho's largest city is getting down and dirty as Tuesday's election nears.

Challenger Tracy Andrus accused Mayor Brent Coles on Wednesday of stooping to gutter politics by spreading false rumors that she was 13 months behind in the rent for her apparel shop.

And in what many believe is a tight race that has seen a record \$220,000 spent, Andrus fired a salvo of her own that \$5,848 of Coles' wages were garnished in 1989 for failure to pay a debt.

Coles said the business rumors were generated by others and were not publicized by his campaign.

And he said he paid the debt — rent for his wife's dance studio — as soon as he learned a court judgment was entered against him.

Andrus made the charges at a press conference before supporters, including her father, Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"Mr. Coles and his campaign obviously don't think they can win on the issues," she said. "So they have taken the classic low road to partisanship and unfortunately, the low road to sleaze."

She said her shop, Andrus-Shane, was not behind in rent. She supplied a letter from landlord Arthur Oppenheimer, a supporter, verifying she has never been in default.

Coles said later, "It's my understanding we were following up from reports... We have not used that in any part of the campaign."

But both KIVI-TV and The Idaho Statesman said Coles' campaign staff had tipped them off about it.

Lawmakers reconsider rebuilding state hospital

BOISE (AP) — Even though the contractors are being lined up, some legislators still want to kill construction of a new state hospital in Orofino in favor of community-based treatment for the mentally health.

But Gov. Cecil Andrus is committed to seeing State Hospital North rebuilt, a spokesman says.

"The project's been authorized by the Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council and the Legislature," Andrus spokesman Scott Peyron said Wednesday. "It has been designed and it will be built. To do any-

thing else would affect the state's relationship with its creditors and be a terrible waste of money," he said.

The first attempt to find a contractor for the project earlier this year failed to attract any bids that met and were below the money the state has set aside for the building.

Another round of bids are being submitted through Dec. 22.

The project, which has already been approved by lawmakers, is being financed by bonds.

Police catch man before he stabs self

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Following a freeway chase and a scuffle, police nabbed a Coeur d'Alene man they say threatened to kill himself with a knife.

Cactus Petes moves closer to going public

TWIN FALLS — Neilson & Co. cleared another hurdle in its quest to become a "public" company Thursday evening when the Nevada Gaming Commission gave unanimous approval for the company to issue public stock.

Officials with Neilson & Co., which owns the Cactus Petes and Horseshoe casinos in Jackpot, couldn't be reached for comment.

The federal Securities and Exchange Commission must still give final approval for an initial public stock offering. The company will issue stock under the name of its new

holding company — Ameristar Casinos Inc. — according to Neilson & Co.'s applications to the gaming commission and the SEC.

Applications to the SEC indicate the stock will be issued on the National Association of Securities Dealers Automated Quotations system.

Meanwhile, opposition has surfaced to the company's plans to develop a floating casino in Indiana.

The Evansville Courier reported this week that a political action committee has formed in Warrick County, Ind., to block the planned "The Ameristar" gambling boat on the Ohio River near Evansville. Ameristar has teamed up with a group of Indiana investors, called River Estates Inc., announcing plans to develop a hotel, night club and restaurants on the shore near the floating casino.

Warrick County voters will decide on Tuesday if they will allow Ameristar to develop the floating casino. In neighboring Vanderburgh County, six gambling companies are vying for voter approval to put a casino riverboat in that county.

The new Indiana Gaming Board will decide next spring what five casino riverboats are allowed on the Ohio River. And other gambling companies are trying to develop riverboats upriver in such places as Cincinnati and Louisville.

Neilson & Co. is also developing a riverboat on the Mississippi River near Vicksburg, Miss., that is scheduled to open New Year's Eve.

City Council races heat up

Former Mayor Talkington, incumbent Vickers battle for seat No. 6

TWIN FALLS — Until a week ago, City Council candidate Chris Talkington worked full-time at a Sun Valley resort, more than 80 miles from Twin Falls.

"He worked here for about a year, mostly in the accounting department," said Jim Haupt, hotel manager at the Radisson Elkhorn Resort. Talkington was "night auditor," Haupt said. He sometimes worked at the front desk, too.

But Talkington said Thursday that he worked there "strictly on a contract basis" as part of his consulting business. He said he ended a six-month contract with the resort a week earlier to campaign.

He said he lived in the Wood River Valley, but commuted home to Twin Falls on his days off.

"My primary residence is in Twin Falls," he said.

Talkington said he would not rule out returning to work at the Elkhorn after the campaign.

Talkington formerly managed the local King Videocable service and later owned a 7-Eleven franchise. He started his business consulting enterprise after the parent company shut down his store in 1991.

A former mayor, Talkington is running an aggressive campaign to regain city government. In an earlier interview, he said communication between the

TWIN FALLS — Councilman Jim Vickers thinks he may know why he is the only incumbent running for City Council Nov. 2.

Vickers, 50, said in an interview Tuesday that changes in the election format have reduced the number of candidates for City Council. Candidates all ran against each other for seats before 1989; each must run for a specific seat now.

"I suppose I'm the guy who created this monster by going to the seat system," he said.

If re-elected, Vickers said this would be his "third and final" four-year term on the council. He is being challenged by former Mayor Chris Talkington.

"The big difference between his experience and mine is that mine is current experience," Vickers said. "Chris has been in active the last 10 to 12 years."

"We're not getting urban sprawl," he said. "We've had a lot of property sitting dormant over the last 25 years." Developments on dormant properties inside the city limits are subject to city control, he said.

TWIN FALLS — As a builder and as chairman of the city planning and zoning commission, City Council candidate Jeff Gooding says he "has been on both sides of the counter."

As a councilman, he would improve the dialogue between the council and the planning commission, he said in an interview last week.

He said he is running because the council "needs new blood."

"I am tired of hearing people complaining about the problem but not wanting to be part of the solution," he said.

Gooding said that while the city can manage growth, he is unsure if the city can dictate how fast it grows.

"Who are we to say who can come in? I think in a lot of areas we can't develop because of costs," he said.

The city can control development best through the use of special-use permits and planned-unit developments, he said.

Now that development has moved toward the Snake River Canyon, the city no longer can take that area for granted, he said.

"We have a better chance of protecting it with (commercial) planned-unit developments than with backyards," he said.

He opposes impact fee legislation that would require developers to finance improvements in city services, though he thinks such legislation will pass eventually.

Bill won't end Gem wilderness debate, analyst says

TWIN FALLS — Even if Idaho's congressional delegation agrees on a wilderness bill and gets it through Congress, the debate over wilderness will never be finally resolved, said Jay O'Loughlin, director of the University of Idaho's Forest, Wildlife and Range Policy Analysis Group.

"As long as roadless areas exist on federal lands, there's always the possibility they could be added to the wilderness system," O'Loughlin said Thursday. "We're not going to run out of roadless land in my lifetime, or yours."

Idaho's two senators and two representatives have been working with Gov. Cecil Andrus for the past 10 months to develop a unified proposal for designating some of Idaho's 9.3 million acres of roadless land as wilderness.

It's encouraging, O'Loughlin said, that the five men — some of whom have disagreed sharply about wilderness in the past — are still talking to each other and apparently see in basic agreement on several contentious issues, such as release language, water rights and preserving timber jobs.

But even if a single bill emerges from their discussions and becomes law, he said, future generations of Idahoans probably will be debating wilderness questions.

He noted that the wilderness debate has reignited in Colorado, 13 years after Congress passed a statewide wilderness bill.

"Even if all roadless lands eventually are either protected as wilderness or opened to commercial exploitation, O'Loughlin said, previously cut lands can be reclaimed."

In east Texas, he said, there are 35,000 acres of "wilderness" that several decades ago were mostly tree stumps. But after having had time to regenerate, "you'd have a hard time finding a stumper there."

Although 1st District Rep. Larry LaRocco has shelved his partial wilderness bill, the multi-state "Northern Rockies Ecosystem Protection Act" still is pending in Congress. But O'Loughlin said that bill, backed mainly by congressmen from east of the 100th meridian, has little chance of becoming law.

Historically, he said, Congress has left it up to each state's delegation to develop wilderness bills for those states. The Northern Rockies bill, by contrast, "is untried and unproven,"

and we believe the state delegations would have enough say in the matter to block it."

The Policy Analysis Group was set up by the Idaho Legislature in 1989 to provide policy makers with objective analyses of natural-resource issues. It is up for reauthorization next year.

Besides wilderness, the group has looked at riparian policy on Bureau of Land Management lands, the use of state endowment lands, the feasibility of putting a pulp and paper mill on the former Bunker Hill smelter site in north Idaho, and different methods of determining minimum instream flows for recreation purposes.

The group's February 1991 report on wolf recovery plans in central Idaho formed the basis for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's draft environmental impact statement on wolf recovery.

Researchers currently are studying issues as varied as forest health, grizzly bear recovery and how the Endangered Species Act has affected and might affect Idaho.

Once the group finishes its current menu of issues, O'Loughlin said, efforts to develop a pollution-control plan for the middle Snake River could be a study topic.

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Andrus, other governors want Clinton to name salmon recovery czar

BOISE (AP)— Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus and governors of three other Western states want President Clinton to appoint a federal "salmon czar" to help expedite recovery efforts for the region's declining fish runs.

Andrus, Oregon's Barbara Roberts, Washington's Mike Lowry and California's Pete Wilson wrote the White House recently urging the president to name a single person to report directly to him on the issue.

In the letter dated Sept. 30 but released Thursday they said appointing a salmon czar would help "ensure that federal agencies pursue coordinated and focused policies in working with state and tribal governments to achieve coastal restoration of Pacific salmon."

The governors said the Endangered Species Act's "final-hour, species-by-species approach threatens to overwhelm state; tribal and federal natural resource agencies," and that conflicts over salmon management are costing millions of dollars.

"We need an anticipatory approach to recovery Pacific salmon and to support salmon-related employment, communities, cultures and ecosystems," the governors wrote.

"We need to take dollars now spent in sustaining conflict and invest them in sustaining salmon and jobs."

Andrus spokesman Scott Peyron said representatives of all four governors were meeting in Portland, Ore., on Thursday to begin putting together a working group to develop agreement on a region-wide approach to protecting and enhancing salmon habitats.

The city has \$1.3 million in surplus funds — more than enough money to purchase another police car and hire new officers, he said in a televised candidate forum Wednesday night.

Though Vickers has said publicly that Fillmore Street cannot become a boulevard, Talkington said he does not believe the council when it says that Fillmore Street will not be extended to Pole Line Road.

"I would ask why we have Fillmore in the comprehensive plan," he said.

The city already has a "de facto" belt road, he said. The council needs to focus more on bike paths and sidewalks than on alternate routes to Blue Lakes Boulevard North, he said.

Strip developments do not ad-

Falls, he said. A 1-cent hike in the state sales tax — with revenues returned to the governing bodies where the sales occur — could bring almost \$1.2 million to the city's budget, he said.

But support for increased tax revenues does not equal support for bigger government, he said.

"Every employee you hire is a million-dollar investment," he said.

The city would need to raise property taxes 1.5 percent for every two officers added to the city's police force, he said. And more officers may not be the answer to increased crime, he said.

"Our number of uniformed officers, per capita, is in line with the rest of the state," he said. "You can't

hire enough officers to make every-one safe."

The city should strengthen its Neighborhood Watch program instead, he said.

As a member of the four-county "enhanced" 911 board for the past year, Vickers acknowledged that progress has been slow on the facility.

When completed, the system is expected to allow quicker and more efficient dispatching of emergency services to Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Twin Falls counties.

But the delays in E911's setup are no fault of the city's representatives, he said.

"If this had been a Twin Falls system, we could have had it up and running two years ago," he said.

He dismissed any accusations that the city has been mismanaged.

"We're running a very lean ship," he said. "There's a budget, and you have got to work within that darned thing."

Mini-Cassia candidates gear up for elections

With the election only a few days away, candidates all across the Mini-Cassia area are lined up for Tuesday's contests.

Burley
Mayor Frank Bauman is the sole contender for his own seat, but six candidates are vying for three positions on the Burley City Council.

Curtis Mendenthal, 47, lost a bid for City Council two years ago, but the longtime businessman, who owns Burley Dental Laboratory, said he wants to give it another shot.

Mendenthal wants the council to consider replacing the mayor and city clerk with a city manager and limiting council members to two consecutive terms, he said.

"My experience in politics is nothing," he said. "As far as my business background, I have a lot of experience and I like to get things done."

Lois Cowell, 33, a part-time high school substitute teacher and coach, said the city needs to avoid putting a price tag on housing development and burdening developers with unnecessary regulatory burdens.

Cowell said she favors hiring a city administrator who would recommend solutions for long-term growth and restructuring.

"I don't know all the answers, but I'm a real hard worker and I've gone to a lot of council meetings," Cowell said.

Wendell McMurray, 75, who has served two terms as a city councilman, said the city doesn't need to undergo major changes to do what it needs to do.

"I think we run a pretty good business," McMurray said. "I don't see the need for any radical changes such as in city government. We've got several projects instigated that I want to see continued."

McMurray helped plan for the new

City Hall, improvements to the sewage system and the golf course, and the merger of the Cassia County Sheriff's Department.

LaVern Jackson, 53, a two-term city councilman, said he would bring experience and know-how to the City Council for a third term.

"You have to be on a few years to know what to do, just as with the past experience I've had here and in business in town," Jackson said. "Just working together, that's what it takes."

Jackson co-owns Jackson Plumbing and Heating with his brother, Gladys Esquivel, 55, a social worker, said she wants low-income housing to be made more available.

As executive director of the now-defunct Office of Economic Opportunity, she supervised the first housing development built by Burley citizens.

She wants to enhance Mini-Cassia economic development and add more public recreation to give troubled youth a positive self-image, she said.

"I think social issues have a tendency to spill over into other issues," Esquivel said.

Kenneth E. Frank, 53, was Burley mayor for four years until 1990. He said his rapport with city employees and his desire to get the city more involved in state issues will work in Burley's favor.

"I will bring a spirit of cooperation," Frank said. "We need to work together to the advantage of the city."

Frank served on the City Council for two years and on the planning and zoning commission for 10 years. He is a Farm Bureau insurance agent.

Rupert mayoral race
Three people have filed for the position of Rupert mayor, five people have filed for two Rupert city council seats.

Incumbent W.F. "Bill" Whitton is seeking a fifth four-year term. Whitton said his political connections and "open-door" policy to anyone

with concerns about the city are beneficial to running city government and saving Rupert funds.

He would like to continue to see the city progress with street improvements and wants to encourage tourism.

"If it ain't broke, don't fix it," Whitton said.

Richard E. Russell, 59, owns the Blue Room Tavern in Rupert, where he put up a sign last year that read, "No Special Service for Gays," as a protest against the Pro-Gay March on Washington. The sign drew national media attention.

Russell said his business success for the past 30 years should show voters that he knows how to balance a checkbook.

"I think I can relate to people better than the present mayor can," Russell said. "You don't need a white shirt and a black tie to come talk to me."

Joel Rogers was city councilman from 1986 to 1991 and manages the radiology department at Minidoka Memorial Hospital. He wants a five-year plan developed by department heads to deal with growth, but he is lukewarm on the idea of consolidating county and city police forces. He said he would restore integrity to city government as mayor.

"It's time for a change," he said.

Rupert City Council
Five people have filed for two Rupert City Council seats.

Incumbent Dorelle Allred is seeking a sixth four-year term. Allred, 56, is vice-president and manager of First Security Bank in Rupert. He said he would like to help continue the city's progress, such as improving the city's water.

"I think it's important to have the type of climate that creates growth," Allred said. "The energy of a vibrant Chamber of Commerce and service clubs can be the catalyst."

Cliff Barborka, 43, said he owes much to Rupert, which has given him

a new life and a pleasant switch from the hectic pace of Salt Lake city, where he was vice-president of an advertising company.

Barborka is radio announcer and public relations director for Minidoka Memorial Hospital.

"I believe that Rupert has a message," he said. "I believe that with dedication you can make anything happen. Promotion will in fact bring people to this area."

June Dombbeck, Rupert's first and only city councilwoman, said the city needs a recycling program and a comprehensive 10-year plan to improve streets and housing.

"I'd like to see some planning, and for the council to be really serious about it. I want them to start in some new direction," Dombbeck said. "We know that the status quo isn't forever."

Steve Barrus, manages Redder's Showcase, Inc. television and appliance store. Barrus said he has gained budget experience as a Chamber of Commerce board member.

He wants to improve the downtown business district while being cautious about how the city spends money, he said.

"It's not our money. It's the taxpayers and we have to spend it that way," Barrus said.

George McDonald, a retired broadcast sports director and West Minico Junior High special education teacher, served as city councilman for four terms from 1961 to 1977. As councilman he would actively seek out industries to relocate to Rupert.

"You've got to be able to ferret out what your community needs," McDonald said. "You need to sell your community, otherwise there will be no jobs and no growth."

Heyburn City Council
Four people have filed for two City Council seats.

Incumbent Flossie Kay, 67, a retired Heyburn postmaster, was

appointed city councilwoman last year.

She is concerned about zoning issues and traffic control. She would like to amend the state's Open Meetings Law, which prevents council members and citizens from voicing concerns unless formally scheduled on the council agenda.

"The citizens can't speak up unless they've called ahead. It's doing away with free speech," Kay said.

George Froom, 68, a former Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers Union representative, said his experience as a negotiator will help at the city level.

"I think the council has done well over the past years," Froom said. "Our situation basically demands more money. I'd do my best to find grants and other projects."

Les Stuebe, 39, former Heyburn police officer and foreman of a concrete construction and excavation company said he's fed up with the slow progress of improvements to streets and other projects.

"A one-man show can't do it all by himself, but I can sure light a fire under the council to get something done," Stuebe said.

Mike Bohon, 40, served as a Heyburn city councilman from 1986 to 1992 and works at Amalgamated Sugar Co. in Paul. He has served as a state delegate for the Association of Idaho Cities, chairman of Streets and Recreation Committee and as a board member

of Bonneville Power Administration.

Bohon said his grandparents homesteaded in the Heyburn area in the early 1900s. "I still raise horses on a small ranch in the area," he said.

Paul City Council
Three people have filed for two City Council seats.

Randy Jones, 44, is the assistant manager at Magic Valley Tire Inc. and a 20-year volunteer firefighter. He said he will bring new ideas on how to reduce the costs of government, such as starting a compost program to reduce the bulk of garbage going to the new regional landfill.

"I'm lucky to be alive so I need to do something with my life," said Runyon, who is a salesman for Anderson Lumber Co.

Students not the only drinkers in Moscow

MOSCOW (AP) — Alcohol abuse at the University of Idaho has made headlines this fall, but community leaders admit the town of Moscow itself has a drinking problem.

Representatives from the university, city, school district, police department, Chamber of Commerce and Gritman Medical Center met Wednesday to discuss how reforms under way at Idaho might be extended to the entire community.

Lou Miller, director of the emergency department at Gritman, said underage drinking seems to be treated as a rite of passage, with "a level of encouragement or tacit approval."

Miller said about half of the young people treated for injuries at the emergency room were hurt in alcohol-related incidents. The other half are sports injuries.

He added other drugs do not seem to be a major problem.

"Focusing on alcohol is probably going to get us pretty close to the center point," Miller said.

Cameron Lewis, Lakeside

Foundation administrator, paraphrased the attitude of some young people: "Grandpa did. My dad did it. My big brother did it. I'm going to do it."

Lakeside operates substance abuse programs.

Alcohol abuse has grabbed plenty of attention since an intoxicated pledge fell from the third-floor fire escape at her sorority-house Aug. 19. The 18-year-old Spokane woman suffered injuries that left her paralyzed from the waist down.

The tragedy brought scrutiny from

Gov. Cecil Andrus and the state Board of Education. A Greek forum on alcohol abuse at Idaho attracted national fraternity and sorority leaders.

Both the university and its Greek system responded to the accident by initiating a series of reform measures.

One of the recurring themes at the Greek forum was acknowledgment many freshmen arrive on campus with histories of alcohol abuse and expectations they've arrived at "party central."

"What kids tell me is a lot of the drinking begins in fifth or sixth grade,"

Moscow School Superintendent John Masonhill said Wednesday. Word got around, he said, about where underage drinkers can buy alcohol in town without being carded.

Some of the suggestions from the Wednesday meeting included having Idaho students visit the public schools as role models for younger kids.

The community also needs to give its young alternatives to drinking parties by sponsoring alcohol-free social events such as street dances and summer leagues.

Man claims killing accidental

MOSCOW (AP) — A rural Moscow man insists he accidentally killed the woman he was living with, but Latah County authorities are calling it murder.

William Gale Hagedorn, 31, appeared in court Wednesday afternoon on a charge of first-degree murder in the death of JoAnn Grace Romero, 31. The incident allegedly happened at their trailer west of Moscow.

Medical Center, after undergoing surgery for a wound to the right side caused by a .38-caliber bullet, according to records.

The Tuesday night shooting came amid an apparent argument between Hagedorn and Romero, and alcohol may have been involved, according to court records.

Hagedorn initially told authorities Romero shot herself, but later admitted pulling the trigger, police say.

City officials on hot seat for remarks

KAMIAH (AP) — A contrite Kamiah City Council has apologized for comments about minorities during a recent meeting, stressing they were not intended to be racist.

But across town Wednesday night, citizens gathered to express their outrage and recruit write-in candidates for Tuesday's election.

The Nez Perce Tribal Executive Committee last week accused council members of making racist remarks on a tape recording of the Sept. 15 meeting. It was discussing Kamiah's minorities in regards to a grant for a new water system.

The council members Wednesday admitted many of their remarks were uncalled for, but said they are not prejudiced against Indians and others.

"It was never intended to be a racist thing," Mayor Westley Pratt said. "We've had a good relationship (with the tribe) prior to this. We plan to open up the lines of communication."

They continued to insist, however, former city clerk Tracey Santo is responsible for the tape being released to tribal members.

Santo resigned Oct. 13. She has filed a claim of gender discrimination and harassment with the Idaho Human Rights Commission and said she plans to follow with a lawsuit.

But the tape has galvanized some Kamiah residents into finding last-minute write-in candidates to challenge Pratt and others.

About 100 people gathered to hear Terry Jackson, a write-in candidate for mayor, and a spokesman for Barrett Moffett, a write-in for the council. Moffett is a Nez Perce committee member.

Joe Vickroy sought support for his council race to correct an arrogant attitude he sees on the board.

"They know better and we don't know anything. That's no way to run this," Vickroy said.

Builder drops apartment plan

POST FALLS (AP) — A developer has dropped plans for a 486-unit apartment complex following a reversal of a zoning change.

Dennis Swartout, a Spokane, Wash. developer, withdrew a request this week for a rezoning of the 28-acre site. He said he will revamp his plans for the property and consult neighbors to reach a mutually agreeable proposal.

"We're going back to the drawing boards," Swartout said Tuesday.

The city council last fall voted to approve a rezoning and crews had begun clearing the land earlier this year.

But neighbors organized against the project, objected that the proposal hadn't been properly posted and demanded that the city council revoke the zoning change. The council complied last month, forcing the developer to go through the same public hearing process.

Two weeks ago, the city's planning and zoning commission dropped its support of the proposal.

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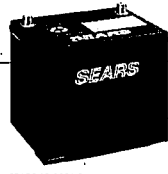

Beavis and Butt-head catch costume industry by surprise

Costume companies were ready for Bill and Hillary. They knew the Coneheads were hot. Barney was on their list early.

But those rude TV teen-agers, Beavis and Butt-head, caught the costume industry by surprise. "Sometimes, we find out about trends at the very last minute," said Patricia Coppock, president of the National Costumers Association. "I did not hear about Beavis and Butt-head ... until about early September. People started to jump on the bandwagon."

Beavis and Butt-head, in case you haven't heard of them, are the animated teen-agers who torment adults and trash videos on MTV. "What's hot now? Beavis and Butt-head," said Phil Morrison, president of Morris Costume Co., a Charlotte, N.C. costume retailer and manufacturer, which holds a license for masks of the pair. "With Beavis and Butt-head, it's selling to a younger group — anti-establishment."

Costume manufacturers and retailers alike said that pop culture strongly influences which costumes are in the Halloween mix. "There are a few processes we go through. We see what's strong in the toy business. Sometimes, we look at party goods, and what's selling in paper — Barney, Batman," said Richard Tinari, president of Tinari Costume Co., a costume manufacturer in the United States with annual sales of more than \$50 million.

Rubie's, which is privately held, makes the most of the Halloween costumes. The New York City-based company recently opened a costume manufacturing

plant in Greer, S.C.

"Major motion pictures also help to sell costumes," Tinari said, citing Batman as an example. He said Batman costume sales have been influenced by both recent Batman movies and the 1966 television show, which occasionally appears in reruns.

"And Superman, now that he's back on TV. Ever since he was killed (in the comic book), he's even become more popular."

Tinari adds that the industry is also influenced by the success of "Batman Returns," Robin, Superman and Spiderman — are still hot," said Jeff Peters, co-owner of Party City in Pineville, Party City, which also carries party supplies, is a Rubie's dealer.

Customers say timing is key. "The secret is knowing what is going to sell in advance," he said,

"I think it should be completely off the air," Burk said Thursday. "And I'm going to do everything I can to get it off there."

"I think the fire was an unbelievable, terrible tragedy," said MTV spokeswoman Carole Robinson. "But we do not feel the program is responsible."

But Burk questioned why the cable music channel would make the changes if the show was blameless. "I think it had a lot to do with it," she said. "If they don't think they're guilty, then why did they change it?"

Burk said she tried to keep Austin from watching the show, which features a pair of underachieving teenagers who are prone to vandalism and acts of violence.

"It's kind of hard to keep him from the TV when you're chasing a 2-year-old," she said.

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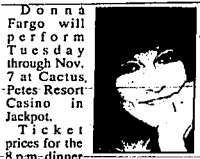

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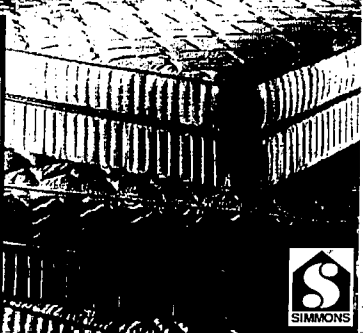


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Sister needs word from wise

"Tim Burton's The Nightmare Before Christmas" (PG). Part avant-garde art film, part amusingly morbid fairy tale, this delightful and ghoulish holiday musical about a plot to bring people behind Halloween to wake up for Christmas displays more inventiveness in its brief 75 minutes than some studios can manage in an entire year. The film Burton ("Beetlejuice," "Edward Scissorhands") was born to make. (Twin Cinema)

"The Age of Innocence" (PG). The fashionable world of 1870s New York City as depicted in Edith Wharton's Pulitzer Prize-winning novel and seen by director Martin Scorsese, starring Michelle Pfeiffer, Daniel Day-Lewis and Winona Ryder. Scorsese's adaptation (co-written with Jay Cocks) is beautifully done, polished, elegant and completely cinematic. It is also a bit distant a film that doesn't wear its feelings on its sleeve, but given the effects it's after, that would be counterproductive. (Twin Cinema)

"The Beverly Hillbillies" (PG). Not as awful as you might imagine. Jim Varney heads a cast that also includes Lily Tomlin and Cloris Leachman in this occasionally hilarious, clunky, dumb movie-ization of the beloved inane TV series. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

"Cool Runnings" (PG). Blithe, infectious comedy with serious underpinnings about a Jamaican bobsled team competing in the Olympics and coached by John Candy. A beautifully crafted film for all ages. With Leon, Doug E. Young, Ronnie D. Lewis and Malik Yoba. (Twin Cinema)

"Demolition Man" (R). Wesley Snipes and Sylvester Stallone battle it out in a future that is clearly not big enough for both of them. Unable to decide about whether to be a loud movie or a dopey movie, director Marco Brambilla and a trio of screenwriters have ended up with a loud movie and a dopey movie, not the best of compromises. (Jerome Cinema, Ace Theatre)

"Dennis the Menace" (PG). Walter Matthau, Mason Gamble, Christopher Lloyd, Joan Plowright, Lea Thompson. Director John Hughes fits his "Home Alone" imprimatur on Hank Ketchum's cartoon-strip creation — the irrepressible towhead and bane of grumpy old Mr. Wilson's life. Recycling one of his pet plot devices, writer-producer Hughes introduces a new character: a creepy vagrant played by Lloyd in the title role. Gamble manages to be inextinguishably mischievous and genuinely likable. The other modest pleasure of this by-the-numbers kiddie comedy is Matthau, playing the eternally cranky, set-upon Mr. Wilson and getting to showing off his considerable talent for physical comedy. "Fatal Instinct" (PG-13). Carl Reiner's sendup of the suspense genre stars Armand Assante with Kate Nelligan, Sean Young and Sherilyn Fenn. (Twin Cinema)

A bump in the night movie where all the bumps are visible a mile ahead. (Motor-Vu Drive-In)

"Hocus Pocus" (PG) Who are these broads-on-brooms...the witches of Westwood? Although they look like hell — and raise it — they'll put a spell on you. This silly but irresistible film stars Bette Midler, Sarah Jessica Parker and Kathy Najimy as 17th-century sorceresses whose spirits are conjured in present-day Salem on Halloween night. They think they've died and gone to the devil's playground. (Jerome Cinema)

"Jason Goes to Hell: The Final Friday" (R) Yes, 13 years after he started his killing spree, Jason Voorhees' never-ending story offers a little humor. Unfortunately, first-time director Adam Marcus and writers Dean Lorey and Jay Huguley have a story to tell as well. And it's a confusing mess. (Motor-Vu Drive-In)

"The Joy Luck Club" (R). No matter how many hankies you bring to this emotional version of Amy Tan's best-selling novel, it won't be enough. Deeply felt and straight from the heart, it artfully intermixes the stories of four Chinese mothers and the conflicts they have with their American-born daughters and makes powerful points about the drama behind the fabled golden door of immigrant dreams. Finely directed by Wayne Wang and starring a nonpareil collection of Asian and Asian-American actresses. (Mall Cinema)

"Judgment Night" (R). Four guys in an RV take the wrong off-ramp and descend into a drug lord's danger zone. Well directed by Stephen Hopkins but essentially a no-brainer. (Jerome Cinema)

"Malice" (R). Alec Baldwin, Bill Pullman and Nicole Kidman star in this so-so thriller that seems mostly rehashed from earlier thrillers. It's fairly compelling in places, but if you haven't seen it, you've still seen it.

"Mr. Nanny" (PG). Hulk Hogan plays nanny to kids who try to get attention from their workaholic dad. Also starring Sherman Hemsley, Austin Pendleton and David Johansen. Directed by Michael Gottlieb. (Ace Theatre)

Halloween videos

When the witching hour grows near this Halloween, you can't get up with "The Incredibly Strange Creatures Who Stopped Living and Became Mixed-Up Zombies" (then renamed the shorter but no sweeter "Creeping Psycho Meets Bloody Mary").

You can also choose "Bloodsucking Pharaohs in Pittsburgh," "Chopper Chicks in Zombietown," "Shriek of the Mutilated," "Hollywood Meatcleaver Massacre," "Rabid Grannies" or, my favorite, "Slugs: The Movie."

The reason, of course, is that all of those are now available on home video. Not surprisingly, all of them are cases where the titles are better — far better — than the flicks.

But wait, there's more: "Three on a Meathook," "Chopping Mall," "Frankenhooker," "Slithis" and "The Rats are Coming! The Werewolves Are Here!" (Yes, really, it's British, so what do you expect?). There, I've gotten that out of my system; browsing the video shelves at Halloween can be a real giggle.

But you're not looking for a treat rather than a trick, there are lots of things that go 'bump' in the video. Here are my picks in three age categories:

Suitable for kids

The best all-around Halloween video, bar none, is Disney's "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow," a classic short animation about Washington Irving's New York of the 18th century when superstitious schoolmaster Ichabod Crane tries to woo the beautiful burgher's daughter and runs into the prankish Headless Horseman with a grinning jack-o'-lantern under his arm.

For thrills and chills for beginners, there are the sturdy old Vincent Price creepsters: "The Raven" and "House of Usher" (the 1960 version, not the 1988), both based on the writings of Edgar Allan Poe. And "House of Wax" with Price as a deranged artist who turns murder victims into wax-coated statues is a guarantee of great nightmares.

For giggles, there are "Love at First Bite" with George Hamilton as campy Dracula and "Little Shop of Horrors" (either the 1986 musical spoof or the 1960 low-budget original) with a nerd bewitching a man-eating flower.

If those are gone, check out the original versions of "Invasion of the Body Snatchers" (1956) and "The Blob" (1958) about outer-space aliens trying to take over Earth in sticky and icky form. Both are low-budget but much more creepy fun than the 1978 and 1988 overblown remakes.

As a final resort, you ya gonna call? "Ghostbusters" for sure, with Joe Dante's scary-funny "Gremlins" ready to eat their way into your heart — literally.

Great for dates

Scary movies are perfect to inspire hand-holding, and there are few scarier than John Carpenter's original "Halloween," which gave us a seemingly unstoppable small-town psycho (plus teen scream queen Jamie Lee Curtis) and Wes Craven's original "A Nightmare on Elm Street," which gave us the razor-fingered Freddy Krueger. Don't bother with the countless and exploitative sequels.

To add some chuckles to the shudders, consider Dee Wallace Stone as an investigative reporter who turns into a werewolf on camera in "The Howling" and David Naughton as the hilariously hysterical character in "An American Werewolf in London." The person-to-wolf transformations in both early 1980s films are still impressively grisly — and sexy.

For the esthetic, there's Roman Polanski's "The Fearless Vampire Killers Or Pardon Me You've Got Your Teeth in My Neck," an outrageous, breezy, sexy but still scary spoof of the Dracula legend (trivia fans: it's the murdered Sharon Tate's last performance).

If those best bets are gone, look for John Sayles' surprisingly effective

The anthology "Creepshow" with "Cheers" Ted Danson (among others) is a trio of garish and nasty treats with a simplified comic book flavor, while "Poltergeist" with "Coach's" Craig T. Nelson is a convincing house-built-over-a-graveyard ghost story.

Creepy classics

Here are some ideas for the dis-

criminating person seeking the definitive chill rather than the cheap jump-and-scream shenanigans of all those countless slasher flicks.

For starters, consider any of the 1930s and '40s originals that set the Hollywood pace: "Frankenstein" and "The Mummy" with Boris Karloff, "Dracula" with Bela Lugosi and "The Wolf Man" with Lon Chaney Jr. Most remakes (not to mention the

countless sequels) can't come close to the serious scares they produced.

From the distant past are the supremely creepy and stylish German silent films "Nosferatu" (1919) about a rat-fanged vampire and "The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari" (1922) about magic, madness and murder.

Probably easier to find is Alfred Hitchcock's "Psycho," whose

bloody shower scene with Janet Leigh is arguably one of the most famous in Hollywood history.

But there are also Gregory Peck and Lee Remick coping with a devil child in "The Omen," while Mia Farrow, tending her own son of Satan in "Rosemary's Baby." And poor Linda Blair is a real head-turner as a demon-possessed child in "The Exorcist." All are classy grabbers.

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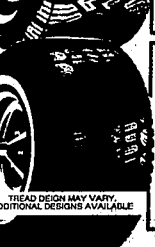

Dismissal request by grad players denied

LOGAN, Utah — A judge has rejected a motion to dismiss misdemeanor charges against two Utah State University football players allegedly involved in the April beating of a Riverton woman.

Logan Municipal Judge Cheryl Russell-Hackelman also refused to suppress evidence against cornerback Efrim Haymore, 22, and Wendell Shaun Johnson, a 23-year-old receiver.

Defense attorneys Barbara Lichner and Shannon Demler argued Wednesday that police did not have probable cause to arrest the men, who are facing assault and resisting arrest charges.

Logan Police Officer Russ Roper testified that when he stopped Haymore and Johnson about 1:30 a.m. April 26, they were walking down a street swinging a lead pipe.

Roper said he did a radio-check on Johnson's driver's license and learned he was a suspect in a beating that taken place less than an hour before. Haymore refused to give identification.

Prudhomme, from Granada Hills, Calif., will end his 29-year career in the NHRA Winston Drag Racing Series after the 1994 Winston Finals at Pomona, Calif.

"I gave it a lot of thought, and it's a decision my family and I thought would be best," the 52-year-old Prudhomme said. "I am thankful for the racing memories throughout the years, although I'm really looking forward to 1994 to give my competition one final strike before I leave."

Salmon earns AL rookie nod

ANAHEIM, Calif. — All outfielder Tim Salmon wanted this season was to establish himself as a major leaguer.

He did a bit better. He became the fourth American League ever unanimously voted Rookie of the Year.

Salmon, a third-round selection by the California Angels in the 1989 amateur draft who lived up to expectations, hit .283 with 95 RBIs and 31 homers, tied for ninth in the AL.

Salmon's victory Thursday completed a sweep by the Los Angeles-area teams. A day earlier, it was announced that Dodgers catcher Mike Piazza was

unanimously voted NL Rookie of the Year. The only other time both awards were won unanimously was in 1987, by Oakland's Mark McGwire and San Diego's Benito Santiago.

Salmon, 25, joined McGwire, Carlton Fisk (1972) and Sandy Alomar Jr. (1990) as the only AL rookies to win unanimously and become the first Angel ever to win the award.

"Going into spring training, I wasn't trying to reach any marks," Salmon said by telephone from Hawaii, where he's vacationing. "I wanted to get my feet wet, get a rhythm going, get myself comfortable in the box every day. To have the kind of year I had, you can't even describe it. I did not expect that. This is something you dream about achieving, maybe after four or five years in the game, but not in my rookie year."

Chicago White Sox pitcher Jason Bere got 18 second-place votes and was runner-up with 59 points, well ahead of Boston pitcher Aaron Sele, who had 19 points and finished third.

Atlanta Games officials expect no athlete delays

NEW YORK — The chief organizer of the Atlanta Olympics said Thursday he expects athletes from all nations to be allowed into the United States for the Games in 1996, despite possible State Department reservations on some.

Billy Payne, president of the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games, said visa restrictions that barred athletes from last summer's World University Games and other events should not be applied when the Olympics are concerned.

The State Department banned Libyan teams from the University Games in Buffalo, N.Y., and talked about withholding visas for members of the Iraqi soccer team at next year's World Cup in the United States despite a pledge by then-President Reagan in 1988 that all teams would be welcomed.

The potential trouble spot in soccer evaporated when Iraq was knocked out of regional cup qualifying Thursday.

Payne, however, said other international sports tournaments did not have the cloud of the Olympics and that different rules had to be applied.

"I don't think it's appropriate that we panic about what happens at a World University Games or a World Cup. They're not an Olympic Games," he said.

USOC's Schiller fills out commissioner field

NEW YORK — Harvey Schiller, executive director of the U.S. Olympic Committee, is one of the final candidates in the search for a new baseball commissioner.

Schiller, 54, joins Lynn Martin, a Labor Secretary during the Bush Administration. Although owners have attempted to conduct the search in secrecy, New York Yankees owner George Steinbrenner confirmed Thursday that Schiller remained under consideration.

"Harvey is one that is under consideration," said Steinbrenner, a USOC vice president. "Harvey Schiller is a tremendously capable guy in any position he's ever been in. He's a doer. He's a get-things-done guy. Harvey has tremendous abilities, as he's demonstrated here. He has been a tremendous executive director. It certainly would be a loss if he left the Olympic committee."

Schiller refused to comment on whether he is a candidate or say if he had been interviewed. Two other sources, speaking on the condition they not be identified, confirmed that he was interviewed for the job and said they were under the impression the list had

been pared to three candidates.

"There are a lot of fine people who have applied for the job and been interviewed," Steinbrenner said at a meeting of the USOC Congress. "I don't want to get into names, but a lot of fine people are involved. I'd say it was a short to medium-short list. I don't know the exact number."

According to baseball officials, prominent figures have said they aren't interested in the job, primarily because of the manner in which owners treated Bowie Kuhn, Peter Ueberroth and Fay Vincent. The office has been vacant since Vincent resigned under pressure on Sept. 7, 1992.

Milwaukee Brewers owner Bud Selig is the No. 1 choice of search Atlanta Braves chairman Bill Bartolomeo, the search committee head, but says he will not accept the job. Some owners prefer NBC Sports president Dick Ebersol, who is thought not to be interested. Other names mentioned recently include former Democratic National Committee chairman Paul Kirk.

Schiller has been the USOC's executive director since 1990. He was also executive director during part of 1987 and early 1988 before leaving to become commissioner of the Southeastern Conference.

The Scarlet Knights, who had a turnover in their last four games, got the ball inside the Pitt 30 on its next four possessions but failed to come up with points. Two possessions ended when Lucas fumbled, another was stopped on downs and the fourth when John Benestad missed a 29-yard field goal.

Benestad, who also missed a 31-yarder in the second quarter, hit from 42 yards on the opening series. A fumble on the ensuing kickoff gave Rutgers the ball at the Pitt 14, but Scarlet Knights coach Dave Clawson went for a first down on a fourth-and-3 at 7 and came up empty.

West put Pitt ahead with 2:22 left in the quarter with a 5-yard run. A fumble by Fortay on a sack set up Ryan's TD pass to Green midway through the second quarter. West capped a 78-yard drive with a 22-yard pass at the start of the second half with a 2-yard run.

Ironically, both of Pitt's victories have come on Thursday night on the road against heavily favored opponents. The other was a season-opening 14-10 surprise over Southern Mississippi.

Orsulak, Davis sign pacts; 39 other baseball players opt for free agency

NEW YORK (AP) — On the first of baseball's offseason deadline days, teams decided Thursday afternoon offering salary arbitration to 39 players and chose to allow them to file for free agency.

Two players in this group agreed to new contracts. Outfielder Joe Orsulak and the New York Mets settled on a \$1.7 million, two-year deal and pitcher Mark Davis and San Diego agreed on a one-year contract for \$400,000 guaranteed, \$12.6 million less than the four-year deal he got when he left the Padres to sign with Kansas City after the 1989 season.

Only one new player was offered arbitration: San Francisco catcher Jeff Reed. Earlier in the week, the Los Angeles Dodgers made the arbitration offer to pitcher Kevin Gross.

If the players don't agree to new deals by Jan. 18, they will exchange figures with their clubs along with the rest of the younger players in salary arbitration, those with 3-6 years of major league service.

In addition to Gross and Reed, 39 others were covered by the repeater rights restriction, which gives clubs the right to block players from becoming free agents twice in a five-

year span. If clubs don't make arbitration offers during the five days following the World Series, players then become eligible to file for free agency.

Only one player filed Thursday, Detroit-Tigers left-hander David Wells. He increased the total to 37.

In addition, the Seattle Mariners said they wouldn't exercise their \$3.25 million option on pitcher Tim Lincecum.

Among the players not offered arbitration were Boston catcher Tony Pena, California outfielder Chili Davis, Detroit outfielders Eric Davis and Kirk Gibson, Tigers infielder Alan Trammell, Milwaukee outfielder Robin Yount, New York Yankees pitchers Steve Furr and Frank Tanana, Toronto outfielder Richie Henderson, Blue Jays pitcher Mark Buehrler, Atlanta pitchers Steve Bedrosian and Jay Howell, New York Mets baseman Eddie Murray, Philadelphia pitcher Larry Andersen and Phillies outfielder Jim Eisenreich.

Some, like Murray and Eric Davis, had clauses in their contracts that prevented teams from making arbitration offers and losing their right to free agency. Clubs still have

to decide whether to exercise options on Davis, Trammel and Yount.

Orsulak, 31, hit .285 with 27 homers and 100 RBIs, leading the team in both averages and RBIs. He made \$700,000 this season. The new deal gives him a \$100,000 signing bonus and salaries of \$800,000 per season. He also has the chance to earn an additional \$200,000 each year in performance bonuses.

Davis, won won 1989 NL Cy Young Award with the Padres after saving a league-high 44 games, drops from a \$3.25 million salary this season. The 33-year-old left-hander was with three teams in 1993. He was traded from Atlanta to Philadelphia on April 13, released on July 2, and signed by the Padres on July 10.

He appeared in 35 games for San Diego, going 0-3 with four saves and a 3.52 ERA. The four saves were the most since he had six with Kansas City in 1990.

Davis' contract includes \$175,000 in possible performance bonuses; \$25,000 if he was traded from Atlanta to Philadelphia on April 13, released on July 2, and signed by the Padres on July 10.

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NBC may drop NFL

CHICAGO — NBC Sports President Dick Ebersol, testifying Thursday in federal court, said the odds are 50-50 that the network will quit telecasting pro football games next year because of heavy financial losses.

Ebersol, discussing the stiffening competition in TV sports programming, predicted cable will take over coverage of the NFL's American Football Conference if NBC drops out.

Noting that the NFL's own estimates put NBC's loss at \$88 million this year, the final year of their contract, Ebersol said, "There's no way I can justify that."

He called the NFL's revenue demands "almost unheard of" and said that unless the league drops its demands, NBC will "be out of football next year."

Ebersol's comments came at a trial over the NBA's proposed restrictions on how many Bulls games WGN can carry.

Ebersol warned that professional basketball is "in the same kind of peril" as Major League Baseball. Its TV ratings have plummeted because too many games have been televised.

"The public was absolutely saturated," Ebersol said.

While the number of NBA games on network TV has gone down since the late 1980s, coverage by cable stations and superstations has soared, Ebersol said.

In an attempt to change that, NBC's \$10 million, five-year contract with the NBA limits the games carried nationally on cable TV as well as on NBC.

In their lawsuit against the NBA, the Bulls and WGN contend that the NBA is trying to force WGN to cut back or eliminate its Bulls broadcast by restricting cable stations a fee of more than \$25,000 to carry each game. The Bulls, seeking to televise as many as 41 regular-season games on WGN, say the restrictions are a restraint of trade.

Ebersol said "the fragility" of negotiating large TV sports deals has led to "a series of cancellations" of balling with the retirement of Magic Johnson, Larry Bird and Michael Jordan in successive years.

NBC's efforts to sell advertising for this season's NBA telecasts have "been impaired," Ebersol said, by Jordan's retirement.

"We lost the biggest star the league had," he said.

Forgotten Cowboys remembered

IRVING, Texas (AP) — There's a bounce in his step and a smile on his face as linebacker Godfrey Myles walks through the Dallas Cowboys dressing room at Valley Ranch. The Super-Bowl's forgotten man is back.

"For the first time since he suffered an injury while celebrating a touchdown in the Super Bowl in January, Myles is ready to play in a football game."

"I'm ready to hit something, hit anybody," Myles said. "It's been a long, long time. It's been frustrating."

Coach Jimmy Johnson on Thursday activated Myles for Sunday's game at Philadelphia. Myles is ready for some action to help forget his freak injury in the Super Bowl.

A moment of joy came in recognizing pain when he ripped his anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee.

Jimmie Jones had just scored a touchdown after Charles Haley blindsided Buffalo quarterback Jim Kelly and the ball popped free. As the Cowboys celebrated the go-ahead score, Myles himself was blindsided.

"I got shoved and I tried to brace myself, but the grass was in my way and I fell on my face the night before," Myles said.

"I'm ready to hit something, hit anybody. It's been a long, long time. It's been frustrating."

"You would think something like that would happen in a violent collision on the field."

Myles is well enough now to play outside linebacker and help the special teams. He practiced in pads for the first time on Oct. 14.

Trying to rehabilitate his knee has been a long, hard battle. But rehab is nothing new. The 1991 third-round pick out of Florida missed almost all of the 1991 season because of shoulder surgery.

His potential has been untapped although he was a mainstay on the special teams last year.

"We're eager to get Godfrey back for '93," Johnson said. "He started for us in the Super Bowl at outside

linebacker and had some tough luck. We want to get him going again."

Myles, 25, has been working hard the last two weeks to get into shape.

Judge dismisses Campanelli lawsuit

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Lou Campanelli, abruptly fired last season as California's basketball coach, had his lawsuit dismissed Thursday by a federal judge.

U.S. District Judge Fern Smith said Campanelli's claim that the firing damaged his reputation and his job prospects, failed to allege that University of California officials publicly disclosed the grounds for his dismissal or said anything to disparage him.

Smith said the suit could be reinstated if Campanelli provided allegations within 20 days that school officials made public statements about his firing that contained serious personal accusations, such as immorality or dishonesty.

A claim that he was accused only of incompetence or failing to get along with co-workers would not show violations of constitutional rights needed for a federal suit, Judge said.

Campanelli's lawyer, Joseph Aloiato, said he would be able to show damaging public statements by UC Berkeley athletic director Bob Bockhart and vice chancellor Daniel Boggan.

"Bockhart was popping off" the (Campanelli) couldn't handle the kids. That's the worst thing you can say about a coach," Aloiato said. "Also, you fire somebody in the middle of a successful season. That carries the assumption that you're being fired for reason other than success as a coach."

even more impressive if he hadn't missed the final 2 1/2 weeks of the season. But an injury after hitting a grand slam in the Angels' 15-1 rout of Seattle on Sept. 15, Salmon broke his left ring finger while fielding a line drive.

"There has been a build-up to this point, so it hasn't been a total shock," Salmon said. "But to hear Jack (Lund) is the secretary of the Baseball Writers Association of America) say 'unanimous,' that did surprise me."

"That means everybody who saw me play thought I was above and beyond all the rest of the rookies, and that means a lot to me. It's been a tremendous season for me. I've really enjoyed it, and this is just the icing on the cake."

Salmon said the biggest things to him in terms of accomplishments were his 95 RBIs and the 93 runs he scored.

Salmon came up to the Angels after hitting .347 in 1992 at Edmond, leading the Pacific Coast

League in homers with 29 and RBIs with 105. He was voted the PCL's most valuable player and first baseman in 1992. The year by several baseball publications.

He hit just .177 in 23 games with California in late 1992, but was assured a starting spot in their outfield for 1993.

"Salmon is the story of the year. Ang manager Buck Rodgers said at the end of the season. "He had twice the home run and RBI production we expected."

Arizona-UCLA matchup may be early peek at Rose Bowl

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — There's a big game in the Pac-10 Saturday and Sunday, if it doesn't involve Washington or Southern Cal.

It'll be No. 7 Arizona vs. No. 15 UCLA at the Rose Bowl, and the winner may be back at Pasadena against the Big Ten champion on New Year's Day.

"It seems like it's too early for this game to be the Pac-10 game of the year to me," UCLA coach Terry Donahue said. "I'm not looking down the road. We've got a real match on our hands."

Donahue better not look too far ahead as the undefeated Wildcats (7-0 overall, 4-0 in the Pac-10) are first, with the Bruins (5-2, 3-1), Southern Cal and Washington tied for

second, Washington, on probation and ineligible for postseason play, and Southern Cal have combined to play in the past six Rose Bowls.

"I'm not sure how big a showdown this is," Arizona coach Dick Tomey said. "It's tough every week."

It's been tough on the Wildcats the past two weeks, when they escaped with victories over Stanford (27-24) and Washington State (9-6) on late field goals by Steve McLaughlin.

"We aren't a special team," Tomey said. "We don't have any illusions of grandeur." UCLA already has beaten Southern Cal and doesn't play Washington. So a victory over UCLA would put the Wildcats in great

shape in the Rose Bowl race and all but eliminate the Bruins from contention.

In discussing that circumstance, Donahue said with a smile, "We'd better not let them win."

Donahue emphasized that a win by his team would not guarantee anything.

"I think if we win the game, the conference race starts over again," he said. "We have three weeks to go (after the Arizona game), and we control our destiny."

After Arizona, the Bruins have road games against Washington State and Southern Cal sandwiched around a home game against Arizona State. After UCLA, the Wildcats have a home game against Oregon followed by road games against California

and Arizona State.

Should Arizona beat UCLA, the worst case scenario for the Wildcats would be that they would need two wins in their final three games to clinch the Pac-10's Rose Bowl bid.

Arizona, which beat UCLA 23-3 at Tucson last year, leads the nation in rushing defense (15.1 yards per game) and total defense (208.1 yards per game).

Arizona's seven opponents have scored a total of only 70 points.

"Right now, Arizona's got the best defense in the history of the NCAA against the rush," Donahue said. "That's a shocking statistic. Arizona is a great defensive team."

"They take away the run, they force you to throw and they sack you. And the biggest

thing to me, when they sack you, they turn the ball over in their offense or their score."

The Wildcats have 36 sacks, 12 by Teddy Bruschi and seven by Rob Waldrop.

Yards lost via sacks are counted as negative rushing yards, a big reason that Arizona has allowed only 15.1 yards rushing per game.

UCLA has won five straight games — its longest winning streak since 1985 — since losing to California and No. 6 Nebraska in its first two games this season.

"I don't think we've played anybody with the balance they have," Tomey said. "I think they have done a marvelous job of getting their season turned around."

Backs against the wall

Vandals must win Saturday to keep playoff hopes alive

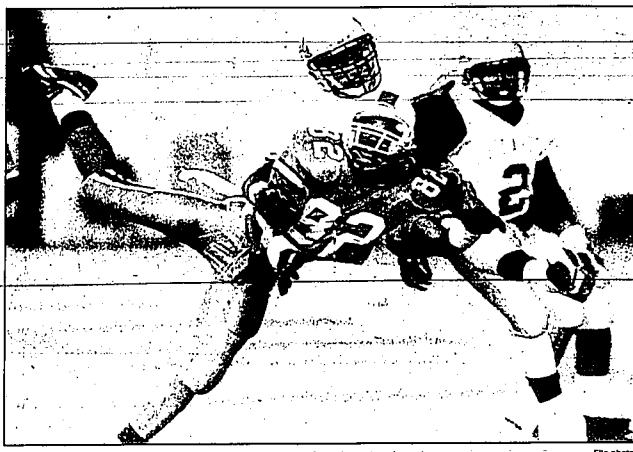

"We have a point to prove," Idaho senior wide receiver Allen said. "We can either go up or go down, but everybody's looking forward. Like coach said, this is part of the game."

Saturday's other games involving Big Sky teams include newly 24th-ranked Montana State (6-2, 3-1) at Boise State (3-5, 1-1) on television live on the Prime Sports Northwest cable system, Idaho State (2-6, 0-5) at Eastern Washington (4-3, 2-2), and Weber State (4-4, 1-4) hosting downstate opponent Southern Utah of the American West Conference.

building on the momentum from three straight victories, including last week over Idaho, in its last regular-season road game of the year. Boise State will try to remain untraced after its first Big Sky victory of the season over Idaho State.

The game pits former Montana high school opponents from the 1950s and University of Utah teammates — and roommates — in the 1960s now coaching against each other.

Boise State's first-year head coach, Pokey Allen was a quarterback and Montana State's second-

year head coach Cliff Hysell was a lineman for the Utes. Now Allen says he sees a lot of Hysell in the Bobcats.

"They're not the most talented team in the league, but they play hard every play," Allen said. "When you play hard every play, good things happen. I really like the way his team plays."

Allen's Broncos had no such consistency as they struggled to four straight losses before beating Idaho State. But Montana State has never beaten Boise State in Boise, and Hysell said Saturday's game has more to do with the

Bobcats overcoming such psychological hurdles.

"We need to get this program to the point where we can win indoors, on artificial turf in Boise, on grass in Missoula, in Three Forks if that's where they tell us to play," he said.

Montana State already is assured of its first winning season since 1984, when the Bobcats won the I-AA national championship. And with Brock Spencer, a junior transfer from Brigham Young, now starting at quarterback, Hysell's team is beginning to crank up its passing game.

Dan Marino absence boosts Chiefs chances

What a switch from last year: Ohio State fans embrace Cooper

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — After Ohio State lost its first two Big Ten games last season, many fans wanted the school to fire John Cooper. Now Cooper is a leading contender for coach of the year.

No wonder.

The third-ranked Buckeyes (7-0) are off to their best start since 1979, have their highest ranking since 1986, and hold the outright lead in the Big Ten for the first time in seven years.

Instead of calling radio shows to criticize Cooper, fans are now talking about Ohio State's chances of winning its first national championship in a quarter century.

"Sure we think about it," Cooper said. "We set our goals high at Ohio State."

The Buckeyes are even wearing the same style jerseys as Woody Hayes' 1968 title team, with black stripes and numbers on the sleeves. But the comparison won't be taken seriously unless Ohio State wins its last four games, beginning with Saturday's showdown against No. 12 Penn State. The rest of the Buckeyes' schedule also is demanding, with games against No. 21 Wisconsin, No. 23 Indiana and No. 24 Michigan.

"This is the time of year when the pretenders fade and the contenders step up," safety Chico Nelson said. "We think we're contenders, and we're ready to prove it."

Although Cooper has won 66 percent of his games in six seasons at Ohio State, many Buckeye rooters still think he has a lot to prove. They point out that he is 0-4-1 against arch-rival Michigan, 0-4 in bowl games and 5-13-2 vs. ranked teams since coming to Columbus.

"They're right," said Cooper, who previously coached Tulsa and Arizona State. "We haven't beaten Michigan and we haven't won a bowl game. And I'm as disappointed by that as anyone."

Expectations are always high at Ohio State, where Hayes won 13 Big Ten titles and two AP national championships during his 28-year reign from 1951-1978. Just ask Earle Bruce, who was fired in 1987 after compiling an impressive 81-26-1 record with the Buckeyes.

"The only thing that satisfies Columbus is an undefeated season and the Rose Bowl championship," said Bruce, now a sports talk show host on a local radio station. "It's always been that way. If you don't win all the time, they're going to hit you in the head with a shovel."

Ohio State gets so much attention because there's no competition from pro sports. Although Columbus is the largest city in Ohio, it doesn't have an NFL, NBA, NHL or major league baseball team.

"We're the only game in town," said quarterback Bobby Hoying, grandson of former Cincinnati Reds slugger Wally Post. "People here live for Ohio State football."

So far this season, life has been good for Buckeye fans. Their team has won its first seven games by an average of 22 points, although the losses include blowouts over patsies Rice, Pittsburgh, Northwestern and Purdue.

Led by a talented trio of tailbacks, a veteran offensive line and big-play receiver Joey Galloway, Ohio State is leading the Big Ten in scoring with a 37.4 average.

The Buckeyes also have a stingy defense that features strong, speedy linebackers and 6-foot-5, 300-pound tackle Dan "Big Daddy" Wilkinson.

Wilkinson, a sophomore from Dayton, has a 30-inch vertical jump and can bench press 475 pounds.

"He's a man among boys," Cooper said. "The good Lord doesn't create us all equal, and he's a good example."

Sports publicist Steve Snapp, who's been at Ohio State since 1969, said this is the Buckeyes' best defense since the 1973 unit that included Randy Gradishar, Rick Middleton, Tim Fox and Neal Colzie.

"This is a big-time defense," Snapp said. "They're fast, physical and deep."

The defense can score, too. Last week against Purdue, cornerback Marlon Kerner returned an interception 100 yards and noseguard Matt Finken recovered a Boilermaker fumble in the end zone.

"We like to be aggressive and go after the ball," Wilkinson said.

Nelson said the team developed its unity and winning attitude over the summer, when almost all the Buckeyes stayed in Columbus and worked out together.

"That really brought us closer," he said. "We're doing things together more than we used to. It's like your teammates are your brothers, and you don't want to let your brother down."

Not to mention the 94,000 people expected to pack the horseshoe-shaped Ohio Stadium for the Buckeyes' first game against Penn State since the 1986 Fiesta Bowl.

More and more cities willing to pay high price of playing

NEW YORK (AP) — In 1959 Houston oilman Bud Adams wanted to buy an NFL franchise. When the league didn't act fast enough, he and a friend formed the AFL.

Now, in the most fertile period of professional sports expansion since the 1970s, the competition for teams now is among cities playing a game of can-you-top-this.

Taxpayers shell out hundreds of millions of dollars for new stadiums. Leagues charge skyrocketing entry fees.

Lost in the rush is a sticky question: Do cities benefit economically from the teams they want so badly?

Many economists say no.

"Sports as a development tool just does not induce the kind of economic growth that spending that money on other things does," said Robert Baade, an economist at Lake Forest College in Lake Forest, Ill.

The question is part of a broader debate over whether cities and states should give financial inducements to attract companies, such as Alabama's recent package of up to \$300 million to land a Mercedes-Benz plant.

This week, the NFL awarded a franchise to Charlotte, N.C., and on Nov. 30 plans to announce a second new team for 1995. Major League Baseball added two teams this year. The NBA has increased by four teams since 1988, with a fifth to start play in 1995. Five teams have joined the NHL since 1991, including two this season.

Why the growth spurt? Baseball and football have faced antitrust lawsuits and political pressure from municipalities and Congress to expand, even though team owners would rather limit the supply to inflate the value of existing franchises.

Basketball has been capitalizing on the popularity of stars like Michael Jordan, Larry Bird and

Don Shula's mark is his stability

MIAMI (AP) — Perhaps Don Shula's most remarkable ability is his stability.

In a profession notorious for turnover, Shula holds onto the ball. He's midway through his 24th season with the Miami Dolphins and on the verge of tying George Halas' NFL record for victories.

"There have been some down times, some times we lost a few games in a row," the 63-year-old Shula said Thursday. "I've been an optimist and had the courage of my convictions that things would get better, along with a belief in myself and my ability to coach."

"And I've always enjoyed the game. I've never thought about giving up or getting out of it."

As a reward for his persistence and longevity, Shula can tie Halas' mark of 324 victories Sunday against Kansas City.

"It's something I can't spend any time on," Shula said of the achievement. "All of my concentration and focus has to be on the team and the opportunity we have to stay on top in the AFC East."

"You really can't think selfishly about individual records; I wouldn't want my ballplayers thinking about individual records."

Shula's current contract runs through 1994, and his retirement could be years from now. Some peers — including Kansas City coach Mary Schottenheimer — predict Shula's final victory total will never be matched, partly because no one will coach long enough to win that many games.

"It's unique that Don has continued to have the energy and enthusiasm for his task, when it was only a few years ago people were saying the league had passed him by," Schottenheimer said. "That wasn't very accurate."

Shula became an NFL head coach in 1963 at Baltimore. No other coach from the '60s is still at it. In his time with the Dolphins, the other NFL teams have had a total of 187 head coaches. The Colts — the team Shula left for Miami in 1970 — have had 12 coaches since. The Patriots have had 11; Houston and New Orleans 10 apiece.

Shula offers several reasons for his staying power. "I'm in good health and I haven't missed many days of work," he said. "Both the Colts and Dolphins have let me do whatever I felt was necessary to put the product on the field. I've had complete control wherever I've been, and that's helped. Winning early in your career also helps."

Ironically, in this season of Shula's record achievement, son David has an 0-7 mark in his second season as coach of the Cincinnati Bengals. David's difficulties underscore how tough the job can be.

"I just encourage him every week to hang in there and work hard," Shula said. "There's so much media pressure now and so much fan pressure, but you can't jump around. You have to have a plan and the courage of your convictions and hopefully be given the time to stick by them until you're successful."

Packers' Bennett returns to practice

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — Green Bay Packers linebacker Tony Bennett returned to practice Thursday, saying he did what he thought was best during his 102-day holdout.

"We were hoping for a trade at one point but it didn't work," said Bennett, who signed a one-year contract Wednesday worth a reported \$550,000. "The best thing for Tony Bennett was to get in and play. Negotiations are a tough thing. You feel you're worth this and the organization says you're worth this. ... You don't really know your worth until you get into the free agency market and shop for yourself."

Bennett said the fans "definitely supported" him during the negotiations. When asked whether he's excited to be back, he said: "No comment on that. I'm here to get the job done."

Bennett, who had 26½ sacks the previous two years, said he is under contract for the rest of this season.

He said it was unlikely he would negotiate an extension while the Packers are still playing because the recent negotiations were so difficult.

"I'm not really concentrating on the future right now," he said. "It's more, or less, each week and each game. I've got to concentrate on getting the job done. I've got to concentrate on these next 10 weeks and then see what happens."

This Sunday the Packers are home against Chicago. "I feel I can play," Bennett said. "I can't really say. I don't know how the coaches feel about me coming in and playing. I feel if I had to play, I could."

"I can't make up for lost time. It's a hard shot for me right now; Each game, each week, total concentration; trying to get the job done."

Bennett said he has no hard feelings toward the Packers.

Even with near mistake, Gallagher leads

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Jim Gallagher stared at his card in astonishment, inspecting it ever so closely, and discovered a mistake after shooting an Olympic Club record 63 Thursday in the first round of the Tour Championship.

In this richest of tournaments, a \$3-million gathering of the PGA Tour's top 30 money winners for a \$540,000 first prize, Gallagher shot an 8-under-par round for a five-stroke lead.

In the scorer's tent, he turned to playing partner Gil Morgan to point out the error. Morgan had given Gallagher a birdie-4 on the 17th, where Gallagher had actually made par.

"Hell, I made everything else," Gallagher said as he corrected the card.

The way Gallagher played — an eagle to start, seven birdies and just one bogey tucked in the middle — Morgan's mistake was understandable.

Gallagher took five minutes to go over his card, make sure it was absolutely correct before he signed his name and consigned it to history at this most beautiful of old, forested courses.

"It's only the first day, but I'm off to an awful dang good start," said Gallagher of Greenwood, Miss.

Gallagher, still pumped from his Ryder Cup victory over Seve Ballesteros last month, jumped ahead of Scott Simpson, Corey Pavin and David Frost at 68. Six other players were tied at 69.

The three players in the race for the major seasonal honors — Greg Norman, Nick Price and Paul Azinger — were nine shots off the pace at 72.

In gorgeous, blue-sky weather, shadows slanting across the fairways

20-foot putt from the fringe on which, he said, "the hole just got in the way."

It was that kind of enchanted round, a mere 23 putts, beginning with a 15-footer for an eagle on No. 1.

"I started it with a bang and ended with a bang," Gallagher said. "I putted so good. You can ask Dr. Gil. He gave me a birdie on 17 because he just assumed I would make it from 12 feet."

Gallagher's lead is hardly safe. But along with his Ryder Cup success, this 63 was affirmation that, at age 31, Gallagher is up there with the best players even if he's just No. 21 on the money list.

It was also a long way from his first experience at the Olympic Club, where the previous record of 64 was shared by Rives McBee in the 1966 U.S. Open and Keith Clearwater in the 1966 Open — both times when the course was a par 70.

Gallagher's round also tied the Tour Championship's best opening round ever.

"I played the 1981 U.S. Amateur Open here," Gallagher recalled. "I beat it by 24 shots today. That's a lot of shots. This was the hardest golf course I'd ever played. And I went home and I quit playing for about six weeks. I even wanted to turn in my college scholarship."

Gallagher has won only two tournaments, the second this year in July, but he has been close to winning a half-dozen times. Some questioned Tom Watson's choice of Gallagher for the Ryder Cup team.

One golf publication claimed he had the least course on the American squad, saying he was somewhere between a lamb and a chopped liver.

Vegas makeover simply grand

Las Vegas, Nev. — With a succession of brilliant flashes and bone-jarring blasts, Las Vegas, citadel of decadence in desecration, took a new step Wednesday night toward transforming itself into a Disneyland with slot machines.

In a \$1.6 million display that combined state-of-the-art fireworks, 365 pounds of dynamic, 150 pounds of black powder and 550 gallons of aviation fuel, the aging Dunes Hotel was showered with fireballs, enveloped in flames and smashed into its own dust.

The implosion of the 23-story tower, witnessed by hundreds of thousands and filmed for a television movie to be shown in January, capped two days of spectacle surrounding the opening of nearby Treasure Island, a \$430 million pirate-themed "adventure resort."

Treasure Island is the second of three family-oriented casino resorts opening this fall on the glittering Las Vegas strip as Nevada attempts to counter increasing competition for America's gambling dollars from Indian casinos, state lotteries and casinos being planned or developed in cities such as Chicago and New Orleans.

Earlier this month, the pyramid-shaped, \$375 million Luxor hotel-casino resort debuted with high-tech theatrical attractions. In December, doors will open at the \$1 billion MGM Grand Hotel, Casino and Theme Park.

Mirage Resorts, owners of the Treasure Island, purchased the 1955-Vintage Dunes last year and timed its destruction to emphasize the contrast with the old-in-with-the-new Vegas theme. The Dunes property also will be used for an "entertainment-themed mega-resort" with details to be announced next year.

In Las Vegas tradition, anything judged worth doing is worth doing to excess, a principle followed closely by Steve Wynn, chairman of Mirage Resorts, Inc., parent company of Treasure Island.

The six-minute collection of aerial bursts preceding the Dunes demolition was billed as the largest fireworks display ever west of the Mississippi. It was followed by a complex detonation

sequence in which the building appeared to bend into itself and drop as if on an elevator.

Likewise, everything at Treasure Island is on a massive scale. Its Y-shaped tower holds 2,688 guest rooms, 212 suites, nine restaurants, two wedding chapels, a fully equipped spa and salon, meeting and banquet rooms — all atop a ground-floor casino with 2,200 slot machines and 85 gaming tables.

But its signature gimmick is out front, where a 90-foot pirate ship and a British frigate, manned by a combined 33 costumed stunt men, stage a fiery battle hourly through the evening in main-made Buccaneer Bay, which fronts on Las Vegas Boulevard.

Even before Tuesday's 10 p.m. opening, a crowd of thousands pressed 15 deep against the gates.

"We've been out here — freezing

for three hours," said Adele Winger, 67, a Las Vegas resident at the front of the pack. She was armed with quarters, ready to play in video-poker machines.

Treasure Island officials had been deliberately vague about the precise time it would open, hoping to avoid the dangerous running, mobbing horde that nearly overran security guards when its sister property, The Mirage, opened next door in 1989.

The official line was that Treasure Island would open sometime before dawn, but a local radio station incorrectly speculated the gates would part at 8 p.m.

Treasure Island hopes to attract all ages with its carnival arcade and video games, mammoth pool with 40-foot water slide (opening in the spring) and a \$20 million theater to house a new production by the Montreal-based Cirque du Soleil, a circus troupe.

Although "family-oriented" is the watchword for new Las Vegas attractions, there's still ample evidence of the city's older side.

World-be-gamblers gathering for the Treasure Island opening worked their way past vendors and news stands featuring publications such as "Nasty News" and "Adult Inquirer," advertising nude dancers who'll perform to customers' lusty roars. As one magazine executive delicately put it, dancing is not their specialty.

Nevada Gov. Bob Miller and former junk-bond king Michael Milken, a friend and financier of Wynn's, were among the invited guests who joined 400 journalists from around the world at the Treasure Island's opening ceremonies.

"It's a glorious thing to be a pirate king," the governor told Wynn, borrowing a line from the Pirates of Penzance.

Journalists were given a tour of the hotel's major features, including soft-sued suites in which television sets magically rise from cabinets at the foot of king-sized beds.

Noting that some "petite" suites start at \$100 a night, a hotel executive boasted that compared to similar rooms in other major cities, the suites should be considered "an excellent value."

One of the basic concepts of good declarer play is for you to lead a low card toward your honors, forcing a defender to play his card before you play yours. Although you cannot always tell which defender is the dangerous one, the bidding (or lack of it) will often provide a clue.

South took East's spade king and considered his options. He could see six top tricks, so he had to develop three more in the minor suits. If he led a club to dummy's king to lose to East's presumed ace, East would knock out South's spade queen and South would be in trouble. He could cash two top clubs, but where was a ninth trick to come from?

Seeing no future in that course, South led diamonds, conceding a trick to East. East punched out South's spade queen, and South was left with the same result. He could win only eight tricks before the defenders could manage five.

The plan to play clubs instead of diamonds was the right choice, but with one slight modification. The first club should be led from dummy, not from declarer's hand.

At trick two, South should lead a diamond to dummy's ace and a low club back. If East rises, South wins three clubs, two diamonds and four major-suit tricks. And if East ducks, South wins and switches to diamonds, ensuring the game when diamonds prove to be 3-2.

Poundstone promises something different in talk show

LOS ANGELES — Trust sardonic Paula Poundstone to take a mildly skewed approach to bringing up

babies. There's the 11-week-old foster boy she's caring for, who vies for attention during an interview with strategic wailing. And there's "The Paula Poundstone Show," her new ABC comedy-hour debuting Saturday.

When it comes to the hot's hair grooming, for instance, Poundstone lets one of her six cats do the honors with affectionate licks.

"Would you rather his hair look like my cat's fur or my hair?" she asks, rhetorically. You go with the baby book, she says, but you also go with what feels right.

Same with her new show. The comedian is fighting a series of minor skirmishes with the network to create a program that's a comfortable fit for her, if not cut from typical TV cloth.

"I suppose it's a cross between a variety show and a talk show, I guess. But I don't really have a good one-word description," Poundstone says. "I realize this has somewhat bothered people."

There are fresh cautionary tales of these sort folks who said they wanted to be different, but had a hard time describing exactly what that meant.

Remember "The Chevy Chase Show"? Talk show hosted by a tall guy, movie type, lasted shy of two months? Going in, Chase and Fox Broadcasting Co. said the show would be different. Uh huh.

Now, comes Poundstone, echoing those comments. Oh, she's not Chase. She's had years of comedy club seasoning; he had one year of "Saturday Night Live." She's shown herself to be adroit and loose in unscripted TV, most recently during the Emmy awards. Chase fell off a dizzying fact working without a net. And Poundstone, 33, seems to

take a more modest view of how much you can stretch the boundaries of television.

"I'm not reinventing the wheel here," she says. "I'm not saying, 'Oooh it's going to be the most different thing anybody's seen.'"

Modest, too, in other ways. Fox leased a Hollywood theater, performed an elaborate renovation, then grandly anointed it the Chevy Chase Theatre (the name was quickly exercised post-cancellation).

Poundstone is taping her show in a Los Angeles warehouse, which she has jokingly dubbed the Herb Ruckelhouse Theater. "It's just one of her musings," offers an ABC publicist.

Although the comedian would like the show to be broadcast live, for now the network is insisting on tape. Its first airing is 10 p.m. EDT; it settles into a 9 p.m. EST Saturday time slot Nov. 6 (after the time changes).

So what happens for an hour, and what's different?

First of all, Poundstone wants the opening titles to vary each week. A small point, she says, but symbolic of how hunched the high-stakes, big-money world of TV can be.

"It sounds so silly, and in the scope of the whole world it's a poetic topic, no matter how you look at it," she says.

"But even just that, just saying I want to do the opening different every week, I can't tell you how many hours of meetings I've sat in as a result of that idea."

Giuitarist Nils Lofgren is the music director and may perform, but there is no house band. Poundstone would like to see guest artists — scheduled to include Harry Belafonte and Cab Calloway — do her theme song.

"There will be some sketch stuff, but it's not the driving force of any given night," Poundstone continues. There will be some celebrities, but it's not celebrity-driven at all.

Expect conversation, but not always with a star. Poundstone is just

as eager to talk to the audience or one of the Regular People she plans to invite.

"I love Mary Tyler Moore and I'm really hoping I can get her to come on and do something on the show, but for me that bears the same weight as having the guy who fixes my jukebox."

Expect comedy bits such as one with economists — real economists (what people will do to get on TV) — shouting out their pet theories while spinning on an amusement park ride akin to Disneyland's Tea Cups.

"If people don't get a laugh, Poundstone figures, they might get education."

She is not necessarily convinced this is going to work, but figures the show has as good a shot — or better — than anything else she could try. And what the heck, Poundstone says.

"I'm at the point where you go, 'I want to do it the way I want to do it, or I don't want to do it all.'"

TV's good guys lighting up more

NEW YORK — On TV's "Evening Shade," coach Wood Newton contentedly smokes a cigar, and Aunt Freida Evans enjoys a cigarette.

Colombo solves murder after murder while chewing his stubby cigar, and "The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air" fantasizes about success and imagines himself smoking a pipe.

TV's good guys are smoking more than they have in decades, linking cigarettes to wealth, success and glamour while the nation at large is working hard to kick the habit, researchers report.

A recent analysis of 158 comedies and dramas showed that 24 percent of the programs contained at least one shot of smoking, tobacco-filled rooms, the study's authors said. "The people who are smoking are the high profile, successful role models," said Stanton A. Glantz of the University of California, San Francisco. "People who tend to be white men, successful, upper-middle-class people."

"Whereas the reality of smoking is it's declining in this country and becoming more concentrated in the lower classes and the unsuccessful," he said.

Glantz recorded one "tobacco event" in every 85 minutes of prime time dramas and comedies recorded last fall. From 1950-1963 the rate was one every 27 minutes, but it dropped to once every two hours in the late '70s. Now, Glantz said, it's coming back.

"If it's true, it's a shame, because it portrays smoking in the

wrong way on two counts," said Michael P. Eriksen, director of the American Lung Association's "Smoking and Health." "First is that smoking is going down in this country among adults, and secondly, to have the good guy being the smoker is opposite of what we see in society."

"The fact that smoking is good guys, but smokers want to quit smoking. They're very frustrated about not being able to stop, they're addicted, often disabled from their smoking."

"I'd like to see the smoker emphasize, or coughing or can't get up, and has a disdain for the habit," Eriksen said.

The research was to be presented Tuesday in San Francisco at the annual meeting of the American Public Health Association.

Glantz's colleague, Anna Hagan of the university's Institute for Health Policy Studies, said the concern is that the smoking by admired characters is sending the wrong message to impressionable youngsters.

"By and large, smoking is presented as positive and desirable behavior," Hagan said. "Deliverance ... may contribute to initiating smoking by presenting role models and deceptive associations that maintain the attitude that smoking is a socially desirable behavior."

Glantz and Hagan found that only 8 percent of the smoking events on prime-time television carried anti-smoking messages.

Among the anti-smoking messages were a "Cheers" episode parodying a character's efforts to quit smoking in the late '80s and

"Crossroads" in which a boy's cigarette was suspected of causing a fire.

Tyson becomes absorbed in role

Once, when Cicely Tyson was a little girl, she went to the movies and was so badly frightened that she had to sleep that night between her mother and father.

After that, she and her sister weren't allowed to go to the movies.

Keep that in mind when you watch NBC's scary "House of Secrets" (Monday night). It's probably not a movie that will scare your children to watch. If they do, they might become actors. Horrors.

The story is based on the fine 1955 French film "Diabolique," which has run several times during the pre-Halloween weeks on Bravo cable channel.

This time the story is set in New Orleans at a sanatorium owned by heiress Marion Ravenel (Melissa Gilbert). The sanatorium was established by her father in the family's ancestral mansion.

But Marion's abusive husband, Frank (Bruce Boxleitner), plans to sell the property to a developer who wants to turn it into a casino. And he will evict longtime family retainer Evangeline (Cicely Tyson), who reminds him that the Ravenels had promised she could live out her life there.

The story takes place in the sanatorium, in the nearby backyard, at the annu-

al Mardi Gras celebration and at one of New Orleans's famous above-ground cemeteries. Unaware that visitors are warned against walking in that burial place, Tyson decided during the making of the film to go there and seek out the tomb of Marie LeVeau, known as voodoo queen of New Orleans.

Tyson's interest in Marie LeVeau is understandable, given that her character practices a bit of voodoo in the film on behalf of the story's fragile heroine.

"I learned a lot about voodoo in the process of research when I did the film," said Tyson. "That's a fringe benefit of acting. I expand as a person in the process; and I always try to do that when I attack a role."

Tyson said she spoke by phone with two voodoo priestesses, but chose not to meet either of them "because I didn't want to be influenced" in her portrayal of Evangeline.

"I've used quite a bit of that after-prayers are finished (during a voodoo ceremony), the drums begin to beat to a kind of rhythm that's appropriate. I was quite taken with that, and I began to understand an African kinship, especially with Haitian voodooism. I know that in a particular ritual an animal has to be sacrificed, and that there's a candle and a bell, and that you have to quench the spirits' thirst, invite them into a place of beauty,

hence, the flowers (in the film scene) and to bring the spirit to a place it likes."

The movie also features Kate Vernon as the sanatorium's physical therapist and Frank Ravenel's mistress, and Michael Boatman as Sgt. Joe DuBois, who investigates some very strange events.

Tyson said during the movie's filming, she grew fond of Gilbert. "I like her very much," she said. Apparently someone else did as well: Gilbert and Weinstein are now planning to marry, according to an NBC publicist.

Tyson has appeared in more than 22 television productions, but she is perhaps "best remembered" for "The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pittman." In that 1974 movie Tyson played a 110-year-old woman whose life stretched from the Civil War and slavery to the beginning of the modern civil rights movement.

"It was one of those brilliant experiences," she said. "I don't know if I would have attempted something like that for today. I was so naive. I was paralyzed for days after I got the part. I suddenly realized the consequences of getting your desires. So I told myself, 'It's yours, and you'd better do something about it.'"

She did, and turned in an acting tour de force. The television movie won nine Emmys, two of them for Tyson.

Letterman agrees to pay \$125,000 in crash case

David Letterman isn't taking the blame, but the host of CBS's "Late Show With David Letterman" has agreed to pay \$125,000 to settle claims arising from a September 1991 car crash that injured an 8-year-old boy.

No one was ticketed in the collision between Letterman's car and a vehicle driven by the boy's father, Raymond Musser, after both men drove into a St.

Petersburg, Fla., intersection that had a broken traffic signal.

The reason, definitively shown neither David Letterman nor Raymond Musser was at fault in the accident, said Letterman spokesman Kenneth Lerer. "After learning of Justin's medical needs, Mr. Letterman contributed money to help meet some of those needs."

Justin Musser, now 10, suffered a broken jaw and was cut from his mouth by his car. The jaw healed, but

the scar may require plastic surgery.

After legal fees and medical bills, Justin will receive more than \$31,000. "I think this settlement is in the best interest of the child, given the difficult nature of liability here," the Musser's attorney, Barry S. Caskey, told Judge Robert Banno.

"Letterman was in Florida for his niece's baptism. He suffered minor injuries to his leg, but for me the difficult part was knocked unconscious and hit his head and back.

TV feature 'smartly' quiets loud commercials

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — Want to squelch that TV pitchman who's as loud as his sports coat, or muffle those monster trucks roaring across the screen?

The Federal Communications Commission says the simple question of what's too loud on television is hard to quantify, since "psychoacoustic reactions" of listeners vary. And it's harder still to control, the agency says.

But, Knoxville-based Philips Consumer Electronics Co. says it has found a way and has built it into its latest, larger-screen Magnavox televisions.

The company calls it Smart Sound. "We have developed a feature using artificial intelligence," said Ron Marsiglio, Philips' senior vice president and general manager for color TVs. "It lowers the level of the sound when it is real loud and it brings it up when it is real quiet. So you get a nice constant sound effect, no matter whether it is a blaring commercial or a quiet passage in a normal TV program," Marsiglio said.

Two years in the making, Smart

Sound's circuitry of amplifiers and volume levers is about as big as a deck of playing cards.

It's an active system, meaning that it will adjust itself to your preferred listening level and what pops up on volume levers is about as big as a deck of playing cards.

The feature will automatically lower the volume by 6-decibels if the sound exceeds your preferred listening

range or raise it by 3 decibels when the sound is too low.

The result: No more jarring jumps from "On Golden Pond" to fast-food ads; no more audio shock when channel-changing lands on professional wrestling.

And just in case you want the full spectrum, say from silence to shrieks in a Hitchcock movie, you can turn off Smart Sound with the press of a button on the remote control.

The Federal Communications Commission has been receiving consumer complaints about loud commercials for decades, and it has periodically studied the issue since 1962.

Ten-out-of-the-thousand-complaints the FCC averages in a month about radio and TV are exclusively about loud ads, said Edith Weiss, assistant chief of mass media enforcement and former head of complaints. But it could be more.

"Sometimes, people will write and complain about 10 things. We will generally put it under the category of what we can do something about. And loud commercials isn't one of those things," she said.

After years of inquiries and spot surveys, the FCC has failed to find ci-

ther evidence that television stations are turning up the volume of commercials or a way to regulate "perceived loudness."

Alon Salzman, vice president and audio visual manager at ad agency J. Walter Thompson in New York, said the "hot" mixing of sounds in a commercial might add to this perception, though the actual volume isn't significantly different from other programming.

The crunch of a potato chip is clear in a chip commercial, but might not be in reality, Salzman said. "Things are accentuated if that is a product that you are trying to sell," he said.

In 1984, in its most recent opinion on the topic, the FCC wrote that, "It seems unlikely that the more subjective factors, peculiar to each listener, can be controlled by machinery. Further, no standards yet exist that could permit a satisfactory regulatory approach."

But the agency did offer hope for TV owners of the future.

"Some newer television receivers are incorporating level control devices," the agency said. "Such devices will undoubtedly become more available and 'smarter' in the future."

2. Reva Shane and Anybody Named Luke on "Guiding Light," another CBS soap. Reva

went through the Lewises—dead H.B., son Josh and Billy—slowly, deliberately, and with great conviction. Josh was probably the love of her life, but then he was paralyzed in the accident, leaving her a widow.

3. Susan Lucci and Whoever Is In Her Shadow at the Moment on ABC's "All My Children." Lucci didn't get to be the most famous diva-in-a-time-by-losing-her-men she star by spotlight.

4. Cruz and Eden on NBC's now-defunct "Santa Barbara." As hot-blooded cop Cruz Castillo, A Alvarez took every Tom and Jerry stereotype to heart, handed him and made them work. Marcy Walker popped off the screen as blond heiress Eden Capwell. Did these folks anticipate a do-over?

5. Frisco and Felicia of "General Hospital." Talk about method acting: In real life, they had a baby.

sociate Professor of Communications at Eastern Michigan University. "But there is truth to the fact that television is a cultural democracy." In other words, the viewers vote.

In 1981, 30 million tuned in to Luke and Laura's long-awaited wedding. (Elizabeth Taylor was a guest). The wedding came on the heels of an unprecedented courtship; Luke and Laura didn't just date, they saved the world.

About this time, they were moving away from the traditional coffee-in-the-kitchen scenarios of the '50s and '60s. Luke and Laura moved them way out, with exotic locales and larger-than-life adventures. In one, the couple kept the planet from freezing.

"Well, you have to admit it was unique," said Marilyn Matelski, author of "The Soap Opera Evolution: America's Enduring Romance with Daytime Drama." "It hasn't been done since then. I guess that means they saved it."

After plots like that, marriage was an anticlimax. And Genie Francis, pleading exhaustion, wanted out of the show. So in January 1982, she walked off a pier into some fog.

Things got gloomier. New love interests for Luke, including Demi Moore ("Indecent Proposal") and Janine Turner ("Northern Exposure"), couldn't keep Geary with the show; he left in 1984; for a film career highlighted by "Centurion III." Francis worked on a failed NBC series, two other soaps and served time as Jessica Fletcher's niece on "Murder, She Wrote." Maybe she was true love, apart from the fact that she was certainly nothing compared to what they were together.

In 1990, "GH's" original producer Gloria Monty returned to the show, and Geary returned with her, but not as Luke. He was now Luke's cousin, the misbegotten Bill Eckert. Bill, currently an adulterous alcoholic who verbally abuses his children, is one of the most unsavory characters in daytime history. You don't love to hate him; you just hate him. Bill, Geary has said, "is much too existential for the soap medium."

After other soaps, Bill's going to get killed off soon by Luke appears with Laura and their 10-year-old son Lucky — in a diner in Canada. The family will make its way back

to fictional Port Charles by mid-November; the middle of sweeps. "GH" isn't releasing many details, but it's hard to imagine how an aging married parental unit — he's 46, she's 31 in real life — will inspire the rupture of the sexy adventures of the old days.

"I wouldn't be surprised if it doesn't play very well at all," said Matelski. "The people who were watching the show in their 20s are now in their 30s, and they're no longer watching soaps. They have jobs and families. And the 20-year-olds now — I might as well say Benjamin Franklin" as Luke and Laura.

In their first incarnation, Luke and Laura brought young male viewers into the soap world — a first. A recent survey found the No. 1 daytime viewing choice of men ages 18 to 25 are two soaps — "All My Children" and "One Life to Live" — that stress adventure. No. 2 cartoons.

Well, you pick your poison. Will the car-on-lovers love Luke and Laura? Jason Bondorf, editor of Soap Opera Digest: "Now it's back to reality, and marriage is always tricky. But this is significant, just like 'Return of the Jedi' was a significant chapter in the 'Star Wars' trilogy."

Significant, but not a sure thing. Returning soap stars have a checkered history. Michael Knight's Red/Ted return to "All My Children" was successful; viewers embraced him. But when the famous Diadre Hill returned to "Days of Our Lives" as Marlena, reviews were decidedly mixed: When last seen, she was having a baby in an island cabin: a sure sign of soap plot trouble.

"Her character was never revived with the same feeling," said

Matelski. "The old audience had dropped out and the new audience said, 'Marlena who?'"

Shaunda Brown, a 26-year-old office manager in Troy, Mich., remembers the Luke and Laura wedding well: "She'll see the big reunion now on the black-and-white office TV on Friday.

Carol Williams, professor of humanities at Roosevelt University: "I think what they're getting going for them now, two good actors. And Wendy Riche is a good producer. But if you had a gun to my head, I'd have to say I'm a little dubious about recapturing a spark when Tony Geary looks the way he looks these days. But I can tell by the cover of TV Guide that he went out and got a permanent-to-cover the receding hairline."

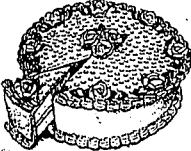
Hey, hairlines recede. Wrinkles increase. Time passes. Maybe a re-tooled, middle-aged Luke and Laura are just what we need in the nurturing '90s. Maybe we want a Luke and Laura free of passion and adventure, free of all that angst. Maybe we just want them back, period.

Marsden quoted Henry James: "Americans—want...tragedies—with happy endings." Luke and Laura as the new Tom and Alice Horton ("Days of Our Lives"): Now, there's a thought.

Sitting around their den, drinking coffee and waiting for their next drop by with new plot developments, discussing son Lucky's soccer practice and homework problems, occasionally exchanging comradely hugs.

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Maxine Elliot was considered a glamour girl

Q. I'm a lady of 85 whose middle name is Maxine. I was named for the actress Maxine Elliott (1871-1940), pseudonym of Jessie Demott. My mother admired her and said she had big brown eyes. Would your bio files have any interesting information? — Mrs. O.S. Anco, Iowa.

A. Current Biography gives Elliott's birthdate as Feb. 5, 1873. She was the daughter of a captain and was considered the "personification of a glamour girl before the term was

coined." She changed her name at 16 when she arrived in New York to study theater. She made her stage debut in 1890. Elliott's theater career made her the toast of the U.S. and Europe and a friend of royalty — theatrical and actual (England's Edward VII). Her last name was named after her. She retired in 1920, a wealthy woman, and spent most of her time at her villa in the south of France, where she died Nov. 19, 1940.

Q. What happened to Kenny Baker in "The Mikado" the only thing he ever did? — A.P. Asbury Park, N.J.

A. Baker probably was best known for four years (1935-39) with Jack Benny, when he set the pattern of the naive young singer on Benny's show. He actually did 14 movies, best known "The King and the Chorus Girl," "The Gwyneth Paltrow" and "The Harlowe Girl." His last was 1947's "Calendar Girl." He died in 1985. He was 73.

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Children experience Halloween traditions, in animated movie 'The Halloween Tree'

"Animation is one of the great art forms," believes acclaimed science-fiction author Ray Bradbury.

So it is that his 21-year-old book, "The Halloween Tree," will air in animated form Saturday on TBS and Sunday on some stations.

It is a spine-tingling tale of children who experience a time-traveling Halloween: a 4,000-year journey to Mexico on the Day of the Dead; to England on All Hallow's Eve; to the site of an Egyptian pyramid and to the Cathedral of Notre-Dame in Paris, all the while escorted by one mysterious Mr. Moundshroud.

"The idea to make an animated film of 'The Halloween Tree' was not a new one for Bradbury.

"No, it happened about 30 years ago," he said. "I was having lunch with (animator) Chuck Jones. We got on so well. The day after Halloween, we were talking about the fact that the kids who came to the door didn't know the meaning of it."

Jones, creator of Bugs Bunny, told how he had teased some of the children, at his doorstep. "When they said 'Trick or Treat,' Chuck said, 'Trick.' To these kids, and they were dumfounded," Bradbury said. "Trick" must be played if a "treat" is refused. "He asked them why they were treated that way, and they said they didn't know. So I said, 'Why didn't we do a history of Halloween?'"

Jones liked the idea, he said.

"I brought him a painting I had done in 1960

... of a Halloween tree," Bradbury said. The picture included historic references from around the world, some of which appear in the animated special.

"So MGM hired me to write a screenplay, but then the studios stopped doing animation," he said. "Over the years, little small studios optioned it for it, but nothing happened."

Three decades later, animation is back in vogue with the enormous success of feature films such as Disney's "Beauty and the Beast" and "Aladdin" and Fox's "The Simpsons." Said David Kirschner, chief of the massive Hanna-Barbera animation house, called Bradbury about his story. Kirschner also arranged for Turner Program Services to distribute the film in syndication.

"Finally here it is, almost 30 years later, and I'm very happy that I've waited as I've worked the last year with the Hanna-Barbera people," said Bradbury. He said he found great rapport with the staff, especially producer Mario Piluso.

In the animated film, four children begin their "round-the-world tour of the supernatural after their ringleader, Pip, leaves an ominous note tacked to his door explaining that he would be late to celebrate the spooky festivities.

Pip's note said something about appendicitis. Believing it all a joke, the kids tear for the hospitals and end up in traditional Halloween gear: a witch, mummy, wolf-like monster and skeleton, taking a nearly impenetrable short cut through the woods. While chasing the spirit of their illusive friend Pip, they stumble upon Moundshroud's creepy mansion and its enormous tree laden with jack-o-lantern souls.

Leonard Nimoy, who is associated with science fiction from playing Mr. Spock in "Star Trek," supplies the craggy voice of the sinister Moundshroud. Nimoy was recruited for the job by Kirschner, although Bradbury and Nimoy are long-time friends.

Bradbury offered a brief bit of shared history. "(Nimoy) told everyone that I was responsible for his becoming an actor," he said. "At a dinner once he told how he read my story 'The Foghorn' out loud and said, 'I've got to do more.'"

Bradbury said he'd like to do a new animation project every year. "It can be beautiful and it can be profitable," he insisted. He has always loved animation, he said, especially Disney's.

"I was a member of the Mickey Mouse Club when I was 10 years old," he said. "I always wanted to meet and work with Walt Disney. And I did ... but he never did anything (with Bradbury's stories)."

Disney died before "The Halloween Tree" could be produced.

Bradbury, who uses his tales without a computer. "A lot of the book people live by the computer," he lamented. But not Bradbury, who has the prolific publishing history to prove he does just fine on his trusty typewriter.

He has had published more than 500 short stories and written for radio, television (including both "Alfred Hitchcock" and "Rod Sterling's 'The Twilight Zone') and live theater. The more famous among his works include "The Martian Chronicles," "Fahrenheit 451," "The Illustrated Man," "Dandelion Wine," "The Pileass Man" and "Something Wicked This Way Comes."

'Nature's Nightmares' spooky truths

TV produces effective, gentler, more dramatic horror films

It was the 1940s, TV would be the ideal environment for theaters of horror movies, those traditional treats for Halloween moviegoers.

Back then, the best horror movies were made on a shoestring and, perhaps with the exception of Tod Browning's notorious "Freaky Friday," almost never strayed into forbidden territory...

Although television welcomes filmmakers who can work on a shoestring, the problem today is that viewers have been spoiled by effects-heavy, phantasmagoric horror shows like "Jurassic Park," "Bram Stoker's Dracula" and the two "Terminator" films.

"That's why even a well-crafted made-for-TV shocker, such as NBC's back-from-the-dead melodrama, "House of Secrets" (Monday night at 8 MST on NBC), may seem humdrum to desensitized younger viewers.

"House of Secrets" is TV's second remake of French director Henri-Georges Clouzot's 1955 masterpiece, "Diabolique," this time transported to colorful New Orleans, where wife Melissa Gilbert and mistress Kate Vernon conspire to murder sadistic Bruce Bonleiner, who can't seem to stay dead. (The first TV version, ABC's 1974 "Reflections of Murder," starred Tuesday Weld, Joan Hackert and Sam Waterston and was directed by John Badham.)

Though Clouzot's stunning compo-

in-the-bathub sequence is re-created effectively, "House of Secrets" takes the high road of suspense rather than outright horror. Done on a standard \$2 million to \$3 million budget, it seems more next to today's horror-movie blockbusters.

Television also isn't eager to compete with the low-budget "slasher" flicks made for theaters. This is a time when parents groups are raising a ruckus over routine violence on TV cop shows. It doesn't take much to figure out how they'd react if CBS or NBC started making stomach-churning horror films like "A Nightmare on Elm Street."

For that reason, a standard made-for-TV thriller like this week's USA cable network original "The Disappearance of Christina" isn't likely to wow horror-movie buffs either. In the movie, Christina (Claire Forster), the wife of businessman John Stamos, vanishes during a yacht cruise with her husband, his business partner (Robert Curran) and the partner's wife (Kim Delaney). Presumed dead, Christina keeps coming back to haunt Stamos.

If the same movie were being made for theaters, Christina would come back nude and dripping sea water, carrying a harpoon to impale Stamos with.

But no commercial network is going to make a film like that, not with advertisers growing more wary of organized protests and legislators in a crackdown mood.

Most of us naturally can see the most spectacularly gross theatrical

horror movies on television, either on our VCRs or on a premium network that shows them uncut. Commercial networks still prune such films of their most violent scenes, though independent commercial TV stations now routinely show them with minimal censorship.

The result of this confusing collision of standards has been the slow, steady development of a special made-for-TV genre that might be called "soft-core horror."

Soft-core horror has grown out of TV's eagerness to tap into the nation's booming appetite for scary stories without overly offending the great, bland core audience out there.

In may be a healthy trend, leading us back to films like those genuinely chilling, though bloodless, low-budget shockers that producer Val Lewent made for RKO in the 1940s ("The Cat People," "The Seventh Victim," "Isle of the Dead"), or those energetic, thinly disguised fairy tales, such as Universal's classic series about mummies, werewolves and invisible men.

When made-for-TV movies first appeared in the late 1960s, producers dealt with the medium's restrictions by rigging some old horror movie formulas that had pretty much fallen out of vogue because there were few thrills and fewer surprises left in them.

One was the "old dark house" movie, so named after Universal's 1932 "The Old Dark House," which found a young couple stranded by a storm at a foreboding spend the night with the likes of Boris Karloff and

Ernest Thesiger. Before "The Amityville Horror" became a 1979 box-office hit, TV already had added demons to the brew to refresh the tired old genre.

Among the best TV dark-house movies were CBS's "Something Evil" (1972), directed by Steven Spielberg a decade before he revived the genre on the big screen by producing "Poltergeist" (ABC). Don't be afraid of the Dark" (1973), from director John Newland; and ABC's "The House That Would Not Die" (1970) from director John Llewellyn Moxey.

Moxey also revisited almost all the classic horror films and did remakes. "Frankenstein" has been done at least half a dozen times, most elaborately in NBC's four-hour "Frankenstein: The True Story" (1973) and TNT cable's "Frankenstein" (1993), with Randy Quaid as the monster. "Dracula" has been remade equally often, most notably by CBS, with Dan Curran directing Jack Palance as the count, and by PBS with Louis Lujan as a romantic Dracula. "The Phantom of the Opera" has had two sumptuous TV remakes: CBS' 1983 version with Maximilian Schell as the phantom wooing Jane Seymour, and NBC's 1990 edition with Tony Richardson directing Charles Dancer as the phantom. CBS starred Michael Caine as grotesque "Jekyll & Hyde" (1990), and NBC updated "The Invisible Man" in 1975 with a script by Steven ("NYPD Blue") Bochco.

As usual, the networks put the emphasis on elaborate period costumes

and underscored the romantic elements, hoping to appeal to a general viewership.

When the networks purposely have courted horror movie fans, the results haven't been good. Weekly horror shows such as the syndicated "The Curse of Dracula," "Friday the 13th" and "Nightmare on Elm Street" series have seemed milquetoast versions of those movie standstills.

One of the most successful when striking out on its own to make effective thrillers that minimize the gore and maximize the suspense without trying to copy past movie successes: Steven Spielberg's 1971 "Duel," which had a driverless, demon-possessed truck terrorizing motorist Dennis Weaver, is widely recognized as a classic TV horror movie.

Over the years, TV has developed a small cadre of directors who have worked similar magic within the limits of soft-core horror, among them: Moxey ("A Taste of Evil," "The Night Stalker," "Through Naked Eyes"); Curtis Harrington ("How Awful About Allan," "The Cat Creature," "Dead Curtis" ("The Night Strangler," "Scream of the Wolf," "Curse of the Black Widow," "Dark Shadows").

Despite its limitations, TV's soft-core horror genre is starting to boom, thanks to the skills of such directors as Moxey, other than simply their trade mainly in television. Especially popular is the "woman menaced by psycho" thriller that has become a staple of broadcast and cable networks alike.
