Campaign ploy cancels city's credit

TWIN FALLS — The city has canceled 15 employee credit cards because the card numbers became public knowledge during the just-completed City Council campaign.

New cards should arrive sometime next week, Finance Director Gary Evans said Thursday.

The city discovered that people outside City Hall had access to a list of city credit card numbers when candidate Chris Talkington announced he

had those numbers on a live television show six days before Tuesday's election.

"That was the *what* we knew that the list existed — when he waved it on TV," Evans said.

"Somebody obtained the list improperly," he said.

City Manager Tom Courtney said that the Twin Falls branch of First Security Bank of Idaho is investigating the matter internally.

But Bryan Hayhurst, a vice president with First Security, would not comment Thursday.

Talkington refused to say how he obtained the list. He provided a copy of the list to *The Times-News* on Oct. 27; the day he displayed the list before TV cameras.

He defeated two-term Councilman Jim Vickers Tuesday.

Talkington said he brought up the credit card issue because he thinks no city employees need charge accounts.

"I cannot see the validity in having credit cards in the first place," he said.

Councilman-elect Lance Clow, an independent financial planner and

former banker, said Thursday he looked into the matter after Talkington broached the issue and determined that the city manages its credit system soundly.

"The written policy I saw has more controls than any I have seen on any corporate cards by private industries in the 20 years that I have been associated with banking and credit cards," Clow said.

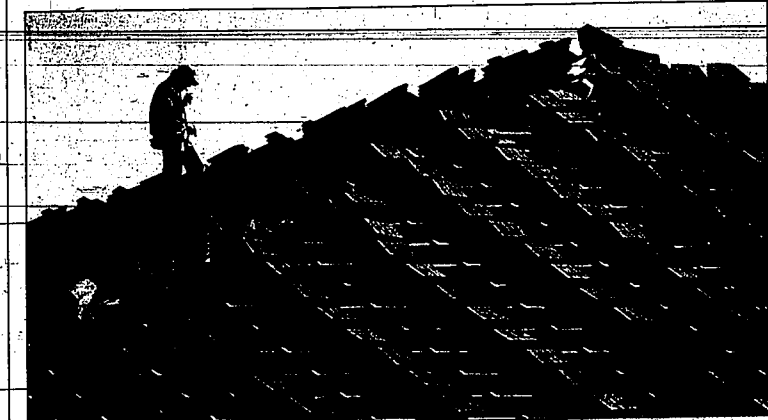
To obtain a list of numbers, someone likely contacted the bank and applied falsely that he or she had the au-

White House changes figures again on who pays more for health care

WASHINGTON — A week after enraging critics by saying 40 percent of insured Americans would pay more under the president's health plan, the White House said Thursday the real number is only 30 percent.

White House budget director Leon Panetta, dispatched to Congress to deliver the revised roster numbers, said the 40 percent figure only took into account what people would pay in insurance premiums.

The 30 percent number includes out-of-pocket costs such as co-payments and deductibles, that may decrease for many Americans under President Clinton's plan.

"If we fail to pass this plan, 100 percent of Americans will pay higher premiums, because that's where our health costs are going," Panetta said.

It was more damage control for the White House after critics seized on the 40

percent figure in testimony last week by Health Secretary Donna Shalala.

"There was confusion that was unfortunate," said White House spokeswoman Maria Romash.

"We wanted to be able to provide the American people with as accurate an analysis as we could. To just talk about premium costs is to miss half the picture," she said.

For instance, there are some people enjoying policies with high deductibles, such as a \$3,000, who might pay the full amount of the visit's cost, every time they see the doctor, Romash said. Their premiums might be higher under Clinton's plan, but their co-payments for each doctor visit likely would be much lower, she said.

Meanwhile, Laura D'Andrea Tyson, the chair of president's Council of Economic Advisors, told a House Ways and Means subcommittee, that the plan's big subsidies for early retirees ages 55 to 64 "may encourage an additional 350,000 to 600,000

people to decide on early retirement."

It was unclear just how much good the White House would reap from recalculating the numbers.

Senate Finance Chairman Danforth Moynihan, D-N.Y., suggested Clinton still has a political problem trying to convince millions they need to pay more.

Republicans were skeptical of the new numbers.

"I don't think anybody really knows," Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., said through a spokesman. "Everyone in the administration seems to have a different figure. Without being critical, it's all the more reason to go slow, ask all the right questions, get the facts straight and get it right."

"It's hard to believe any of their numbers," added House Minority Whip Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., through an aide. He complained that the White House task force hadn't released any internal documents.

Vices can bring on bad moods

WASHINGTON — Feel depressed? Lonely? Restless? Bored? Upset? You're not alone.

Almost 40 million American adults frequently fall into such negative moods, government health researchers reported Thursday.

Those susceptible to four moods were more likely to be smokers, and the moodiest men also tended to be heavy drinkers, according to Charlotte A. Schoenborn and John Horn of the National Center for Health Statistics.

These findings suggest emotional well-being may play a role in vigorous smoking and heavy drinking, their study said.

Some 43,782 adults were asked in a 1991 health survey if they had felt such negative moods in the previous two weeks.

Depression was more common among women (11 percent) than men (7 percent). Men were more restless (11 percent) than women (10 percent). Eleven percent of women and nine percent of men felt bored.

About six percent of women and three percent of men often felt lonely. Almost five percent of women and three percent of men said they often got upset.

Malibu residents return to ashes

MALIBU, Calif. — Alice Kavalagian cried as she trudged through the ashes of her home. "This is it," she said, pointing to the clothes she was wearing. "I don't even have a sweater."

Malibu was among thousands of residents chased from this celebrity enclave by an arson wildfire that roared out of the Santa Monica Mountains on Tuesday and burned 350 structures, most of them houses. One person was killed.

Some returned Thursday to see whether their houses were still standing. Others waited at roadblocks put up to allow firefighters to continue battling stubborn hot spots.

By Thursday, firefighters had contained 70 percent of the 18,500-acre wildfire, one in a series of blazes that have destroyed 1,150 homes; blackened 200,000 acres and injured nearly 200 people in Southern California since Oct. 26. Several were blamed on arson.

The Malibu fire claimed actor Sean Penn's \$4 million Spanish-style mansion

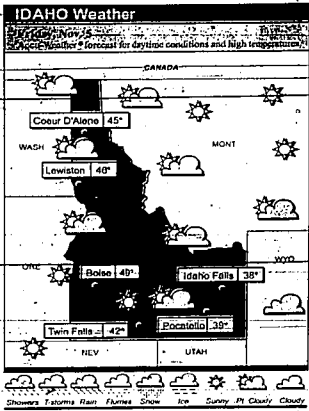
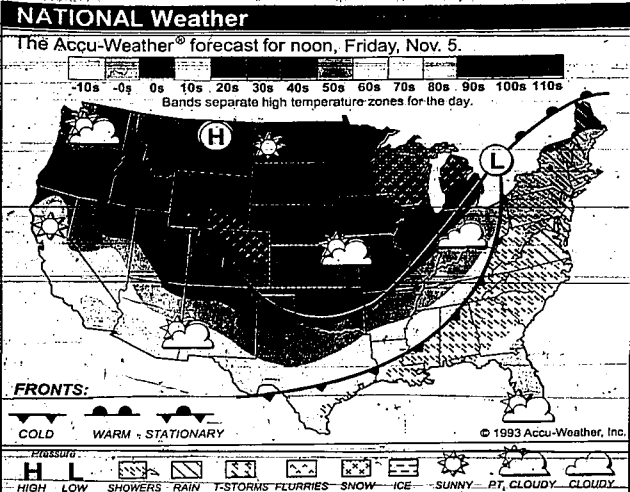
Traffic surrounded officer Gary Sidell as Malibu residents return home along the Pacific Coast Highway Thursday.

along with Ali MacGraw's home, with its panoramic view of the Pacific Ocean.

"I'm grateful to be alive. I'm grateful to my friends who helped save my animals. And I'm grateful to all the firefighters for their extraordinary efforts in saving so many people's lives," the star of the 1970 hit movie "Love Story" said in a statement released through her publicist.

Snowstorm swirls from Rockies toward Great Lakes

A winter-like storm stretched from the northern Rockies across the northern Plains on Thursday, lashing the region with heavy snow and strong wind.

The storm had dumped up to 10 inches of snow on the northern Big Horn Mountains of Wyoming by early afternoon.

Elsewhere, 4 inches of snow fell at Grand Forks, N.D., and at Thief River Falls and Bemidji in Minnesota. Walker, Minn., got six inches of snow.

A winter storm warning was posted through Friday for upper-Michigan, with warnings for gale-force winds Friday night over much of the Great Lakes.

Elko County - Today mostly sunny. Highs in the lower 50s to lower 60s. Tonight fair. Lows mid-teens to upper 20s. Saturday mostly sunny except becoming partly cloudy in the afternoon north. Highs in the 50s to lower 60s.

Weather summary

A cold air mass continued to move into the Gem State from the north Thursday as a high pressure system directed the flow from off the west coast.

This system kept temperatures cool as the cold air flows in from Canada. An associated stationary front along the Idaho-Montana border associated much of the cloud cover across the entire state.

A few light showers were reported in northern Idaho and some snow flurries fell in Stanley and at McCall during the afternoon. At 3 p.m., temperatures around the state ranged mostly from the upper 30s to the lower 50s.

Winds around the state generally were light to moderate for most of the afternoon. At 3 p.m., Twin Falls reported the highest winds of 23 mph.

The highest temperature in the state Thursday was 55 degrees at Caldwell and Parma. Fairfield and Idaho City reported the lowest at 18. Elsewhere in the nation, the highest temperature was 90 degrees at McAllen, Texas. Pinedale, Wyo., reported the lowest at 11, degrees.

Advisories were posted for blowing and drifting snow Thursday over central and northern Minnesota.

Winds gusted to 52 mph Thursday morning at Rapid City, S.D., and wind advisories were posted into the night for South Dakota and Iowa.

Rain fell across southern Minnesota, Wisconsin, upper Michigan, the southern Appalachians, the Tennessee Valley, northern Florida, Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi.

A flood advisory was posted for Kauai, Hawaii, where heavy rains forced the temporary closing of the Hanalei Bridge.

Temperatures around the nation at 1 p.m. MST ranged from 19 degrees at Cut Bank, Mont., to 85 degrees at Hattingen, Texas.

Senate ratifies crime bill deal

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted 94 to 4 late Thursday to pump \$222 billion into the fight against violent crime, approving a bipartisan amendment to put 100,000 new police officers on the streets and build prisons nationwide.

The bargain-between key Senate Republicans and Democrats was struck shortly after the House Judiciary Committee sent the Brady gun control measure to the full House on a vote of 23-12.

The amendment, crafted by Senate Appropriations Chairman Robert Byrd, D-W. Va., to the Senate Crime bill, uses an innovative financing mechanism to finance the crime-fighting programs it envisions.

and tariffs between the United States, Canada and Mexico over a 15 year period. The treaty is designed to create a North American trading block.

Craig and Sen. John Breaux, D-La., have been working recently with U.S. Trade Representative Mickey Kantor on NAFTA's side agreement on sugar.

Idaho is the nation's second largest producer of sugar beets, which are converted to sweetener and have an annual value to the state of \$175 million, Kemphorne said.

The agreement apparently will keep Mexico from flooding the United States with sugar, thus protecting Idaho's fourth-largest cash crop," Kemphorne said in a prepared statement.

Now with the Craig-Breaux compromise in place, the Idaho Farm Bureau will go for supporting NAFTA to campaigning for the treaty. Farm Bureau President Tom Geary of Burley said economic studies indicate NAFTA would help Idaho farmers and consumers.

NAFTA originally would have allowed for Mexico to export freely into the United States after the sixth year of the treaty.

Among those advising Craig recently in Twin Falls are commodities broker Alex Sinclair, a NAFTA supporter.

But many celebrity homes, including the 100 mansions in the exclusive Malibu Colony, were spared.

Two hundred houses were initially reported destroyed in the blaze. That number rose Thursday to 350 structures, most of them houses, as firefighters continued a street-by-street search of areas whose flames had been doused.

"A lot of times when the fire is going on, it's hard to tell whether one or two homes were destroyed," said Los Angeles County Fire Inspector Angelo Montoya.

"As the flames burned through you can take the addresses and count the number of homes. Not until that happened do you know the number of homes. And they're still at it," he said.

With cool sea breezes mixing with wind gusts in the hills, crews and firefighting aircraft focused Thursday on the hot spots around Fernwood in Topanga Canyon.

Forecasters weren't expecting a return of the hot, dry Santa Ana winds from the deserts northeast of Los Angeles that fanned the worst of the fires.

The blaze claimed its first fatality Wednesday night.

British movie director Duncan Gibbins, 41, died of burns suffered when he tried to rescue a Bluepoint Siamese he had taken to a liting to a

burned friend, Ron Mass, 40, remained in critical condition.

The on-survived and was brought by sheriff's deputies to a Los Angeles County animal center in Agoura Hills on Wednesday. It was badly singed with burned paws and ears.

Some \$255,000 in reward money was posted for information leading to the capture and conviction of the Malibu arsonist, with the latest \$5,000 pledged by the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. Other money was offered previously by Gov. Pete Wilson, the city of Los Angeles, insurance companies, an entertainment executive and others.

Authorities searched for clues but ruled out involvement of two men seen in a pickup near the fire's point of origin. The men had apparently spotted the fire and unsuccessfully tried to put it out, said Deputy Sheriff Ron Abbott.

In Riverside County, firefighters Thursday contained a nearly 9,000-acre brush fire that destroyed or damaged 11 homes, a county fire dispatcher said. The fire was caused Tuesday by a downed power line.

Mike Pierson, 33, returned to his wood-sided house to find it intact. His relief, however, was subdued.

"My cousin's home is gone, my best friend's home is gone. Every person I grew up with, their home is gone," Pierson said.

thority to obtain that information, or that any employee furnished the list, he said.

But Courtney and Evans contended that the city played no part in the information leak.

"The city's credit system is 'extremely secure,'" Courtney said.

Evans said "the leak was not within the city." If someone gained access through the city, he said, "they would have had to have been in our vaults ... or have been in our accounts payable."

Wayne Rickards, the director of consumer compliance with the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, said the Federal Right to Privacy Act prevents agencies "from just wandering through your records."

"In California, there is a very strict privacy law that protects customers," he said.

But he is unsure what sections of Idaho law prevent bank employees from disclosing city credit records to private individuals, he said.

Still, such disclosure certainly is improper, he said.

The 15 cards are issued in the

names of city department heads, Evans said. "Thirteen of them have been kept at all times at the vault in the city."

Those with city cards in their names included: Courtney, Evans, Police Chief Paul DuFré, Fire Chief Phil Chud, Personnel Director Susan Harris, Street Superintendent Bob Hildreth, Sanitation Inspector Sherry Jeff, Water Superintendent Joe Kogus, Airport Manager Ron Madison, Community Development Director LaMar Olson, Public Works Supervisor Robert Van Ostrom, City Engineer Gary Young and computer specialist Mick Turner.

Employees use the cards when they leave town on business, he said. The costs are estimated beforehand, and each employee must hand in the receipts when returning the card, he said.

The monthly credit statement provides the city with third-party verification, he said.

"There's less risk involved with a credit card," he said. "If you lose

cash, you lose cash."

The city did not care that the cards' existence and account balances were made public, he said.

"But we are concerned about the numbers," he said. "We didn't want them misused."

With a credit card number and a phone, a person could buy anything from clothing to airplane tickets and charge it to a city account.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor G. Richards said the city law does not specifically make it a crime to have someone else's credit card number.

Correction

Clinton reassures Dems on NAFTA, rebuts Perot

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — President Clinton told fellow Democrats Thursday not to be spooked into voting against free trade with Mexico by this week's Republican election victories. He also traded barbs with Ross Perot, who called the trade pact "stupid."

Intensifying his uphill struggle for votes, Clinton dismissed arguments from the Texas businessman — and some Democratic and labor leaders — that a trade agreement with Mexico would cost many American jobs.

"That one fellow talks about the giant sucking sound," Clinton said, referring to Perot's charges that American plants would rush to Mexico because of cheaper labor and less stringent environmental rules.

"I know a little about this; I was the governor of a state that lost plants to Mexico," Clinton said. "I used to stand at plants on the last day they were open and shake hands

with people when they walked off the job for the last time. I want you to understand this very clearly from somebody who's lived through this: This agreement will make that less likely, not more likely," Clinton said.

While Clinton traveled to Kentucky to campaign for the North American Free Trade Agreement, Perot pushed for its defeat on Capitol Hill.

Perot praised opponents for their political courage — although most analysts believe it may well be more of a risk to support the pact. Perot said the agreement is "dead on arrival" among ordinary citizens.

"If this is such a good deal, why doesn't everybody get excited about it?" he demanded. He called it "another stupid trade agreement rammed through by special interests."

Clinton flew to Kentucky to appear at a Lexington plant that makes computer equipment that is subject to a 20 percent tariff in

Mexico. The trade agreement would eliminate the tariff.

With the House set to vote Nov. 17, the White House acknowledged it still lacks enough support but said things were picking up as a result of new deals with Mexico to protect politically sensitive American industries.

NAFTA supporters estimated that an agreement with Mexico on sugar would bring Clinton 10 to 12 votes.

On the other side of the battle, Rep. Terry Everett, R-Ala., said there are 53 solid Republican votes against NAFTA in the House. Appearing at a news conference with Perot, Everett and other NAFTA opponents said there are 213 House members against the agreement — just five short of the number needed to kill it.

Some analysts believe the Republican sweep in Tuesday's elections in New York, New Jersey and Virginia will make fence-sitting Democrats even more nervous about casting their votes, such as for the trade agreement.

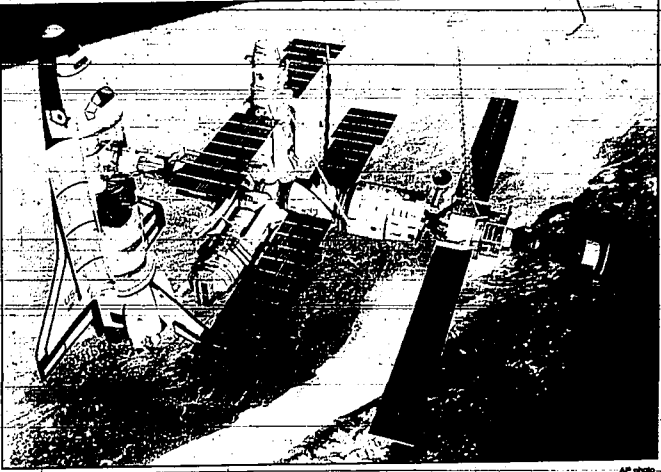
"That's ludicrous, that's just a Washington story," Clinton said. "That's ridiculous."

However, the fears were real enough that the White House sent Clinton's own pollster, Stanley Greenberg, to Capitol Hill to reassure Democrats that they won't be ousted by voters for supporting the trade agreement.

Clinton said he was proud of the showing of New York Mayor David Dinkins and New Jersey Gov. Jim Florio even though they lost narrowly to Republican challengers.

"They came back from the dead. Everybody wrote them off," Clinton said. "But that, NAFTA wasn't an issue in any of those races."

He said the best course for lawmakers "is doing the right thing for America."

U.S. plans 10 shuttle trips to Russian space station

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States plans to send 10 shuttle flights to the Russian space station Mir as the two countries work jointly to build an international space station.

An expanded agreement between the two nations was released Thursday by the Clinton administration.

"This plan describes a new relationship between the U.S. and Russian space agencies which will advance their national space programs and benefit their respective national aerospace industries," the document said.

It was signed Nov. 1 by Daniel Goldin, administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space

Administration, and Yuri N. Koptev, general director of the Russian Space Agency.

The plan expands on an agreement to fly a cosmonaut on a shuttle mission next January and to launch a U.S. astronaut to the Mir in 1995 and bring back the station's crew aboard a shuttle three months later.

Goldin went to Capitol Hill on Thursday to explain the plan to Congress, which must approve any such radical change in American space activities. No financing was agreed upon beyond the \$400 million the U.S. already has committed to buying hardware and services from the Russians.

The joint activities will go far beyond anything done previously by

the two countries. The shuttle will carry new solar arrays to replace the existing ones on Mir. Russia will add two laboratory modules outfitted with U.S. and Russian hardware to the Mir.

In the second phase, planned for 1997, U.S. and Russian hardware will be put into space "to create a totally new, advanced orbital research facility," capable of being serviced by visiting space crews.

"This facility... will form the core around which the international space station will be constructed," the plan said.

Assembly flights to complete the space station will come in a third phase, from January 1998 through October 2001.

More Hispanics going to college despite funding difficulties

WASHINGTON (AP) — Like many Hispanic students, Magda Alarcon had to drop out of college when her money ran out.

But at 28, she is back in school, one of a steadily growing number of Hispanics in U.S. colleges and universities.

Hispanic enrollment in higher education grew 84 percent in the past decade, from 472,000 in 1980 to 867,000 in 1991.

But it's still the lowest among all minority groups, the American Council on Education said in a report being released Friday.

From 1990, 26 percent of Hispanics 25 and older had attended college, and 6 percent had received degrees, according to the report based on statistics from the Census Bureau, the Education Department and other agencies. Among non-Hispanic minorities, 47 percent had some college education and 14 percent graduated.

Now, Alarcon is looking toward a spring 1994 graduation with a degree toward a doctorate.

The fact that it will take Alarcon so long to get her degree is not that unusual.

"Historically Hispanic students have not had the kind of opportunities that more traditional college students have had in terms of their pre-college preparation," said Diana Natalicio, president of the University of Texas-El Paso. The report found that in 1991, Hispanics, at 51 percent, had the lowest level of high school completion among all races and ethnic groups.

Christopher: Russian stance no threat

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Warren Christopher told Congress on Thursday that Russia's new military doctrine posed no nuclear threat to the United States or to its neighbors.

But Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., was not convinced. He said the new doctrine displayed "much more assertiveness" toward other former Soviet republics.

"It seems to me to be a bad day," Lugar told Christopher, who was testifying to the Senate Foreign

Relations Committee.

The doctrine allows the use of nuclear weapons outside Russia's borders and abandons an old pledge not to use nuclear weapons first.

"What we're seeing here is Russian military doctrine trying to catch up with the new reality in Russia," Christopher said. "This is a new development, a new doctrine, and obviously I'm prepared only to give you a very preliminary assessment of it."

He went on to assure the commit-

tee the Russian government in diplomatic exchanges had confirmed military operations outside Russia "must conform with all international norms" and respect other countries' sovereignty.

"Nothing that we have seen in this new doctrine... as I say, we're just beginning to study it — contradicts that crucial principle," Christopher said.

"I do not read into it the apprehension that you do," Christopher told Lugar.

GOP raps House crime package

WASHINGTON — The House overwhelmingly approved a package of Democrat-sponsored anti-crime bills Wednesday.

That action came amid complaints that the package included certain tough-on-crime measures, notably expansion of the death penalty, mandatory minimum sentences and prison-construction funds.

A high-profile \$4.6 billion package is a provision authorizing \$3.4 billion in grants to help cities bolster police patrols by hiring 50,000 police officers over the next six years.

Because the measure does not specify how the grants to cities would be financed, however, Republicans characterized it as "an empty promise" and "a major disservice" to the public.

But Democrats said the legislation represented a down payment on President Clinton's plan to put 100,000 additional police officers on the street, pointing out that the

administration hopes to finance the crime package through a year-end round of spending cuts.

The package considered by the House on Wednesday contained five separate crime bills. Four were approved by more than the two-thirds margin required under fast-track rules. The fifth measure, which would have provided alternative punishments for youthful offenders, was approved by a simple majority but approved by more than two-thirds because it failed to get the necessary two-thirds vote.

The fifth bill would have funded state and local experiments with measures like "boot camps" and weekend incarceration for convicted gang members. But opponents portrayed it as too soft-hearted in an era of gang violence.

Among the bills approved were one to authorize federal grants for drug prevention and education programs for potential gang members and two others to provide drug-abuse treatment for federal and state prisoners.

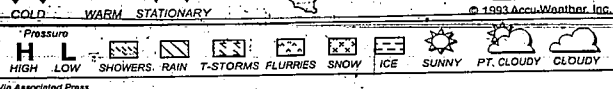
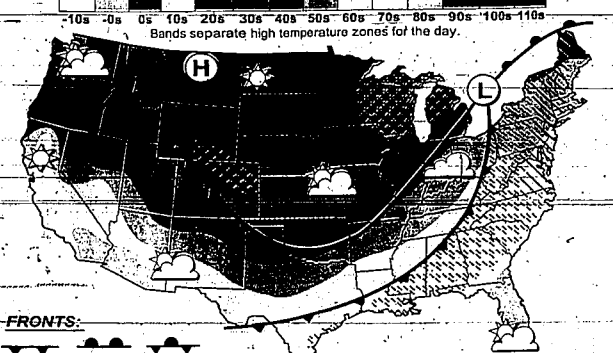

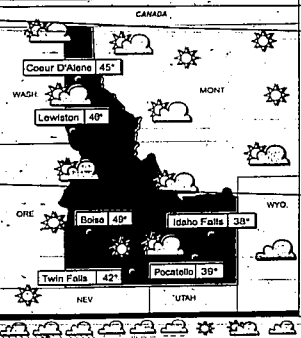

with people when they walked off the job for the last time."

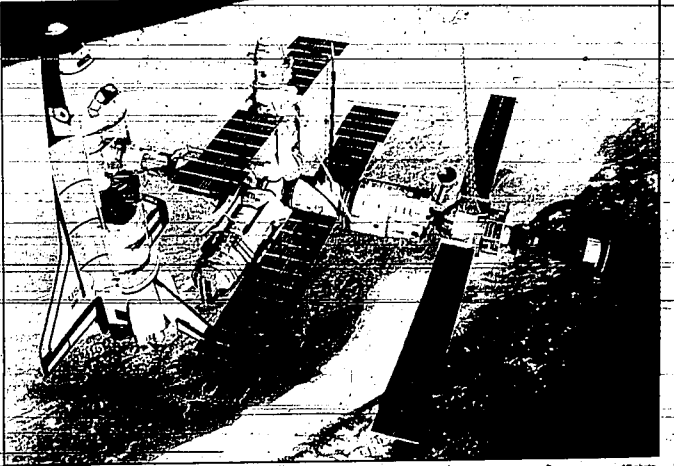

But Democrats said the legislation represented a down payment on President Clinton's plan to put 100,000 additional police officers on the street, pointing out that the

administration hopes to finance the crime package through a year-end round of spending cuts.

The package considered by the House on Wednesday contained five separate crime bills. Four were approved by more than two-thirds margin, required under fast-track rules. The fifth measure, which would have provided alternative punishments for youthful offenders, was approved by a simple majority but went down to defeat because it failed to get the necessary two-thirds vote.

The fifth bill would have funded state and local experiments with measures like "boot camps" and weekend incarceration for convicted gang members. But opponents noted it was too soft-hearted in an era of gang violence.

Among the bills approved were one to authorize federal grants for drug prevention and education programs for potential gang members and two others to provide drug-abuse treatment for federal and state prisoners.

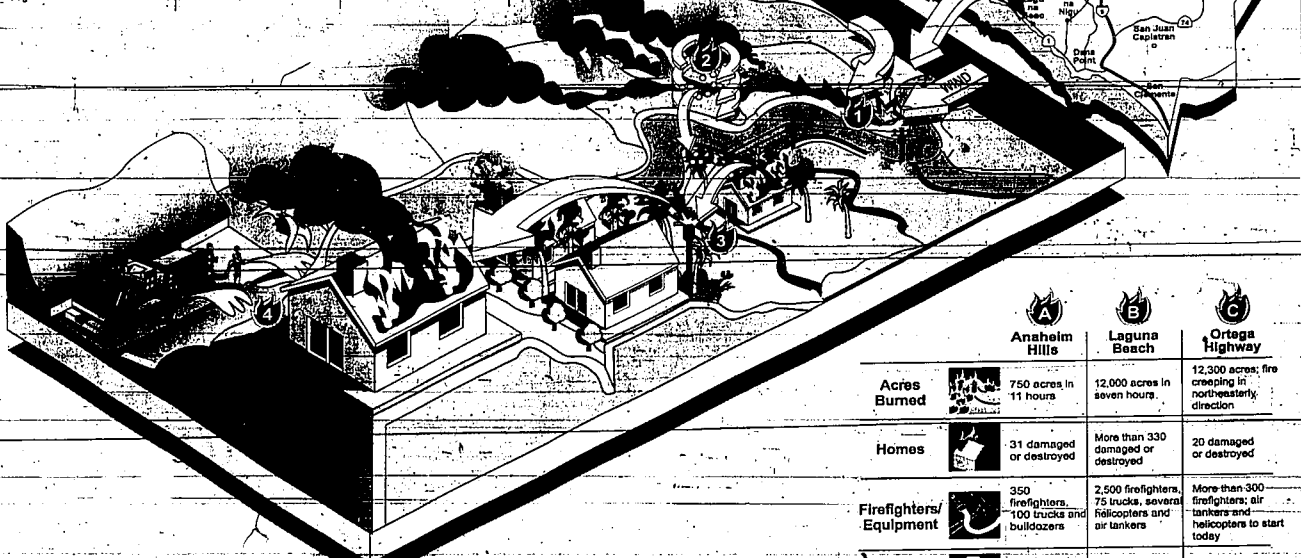
HOW THE FLAMES SPREAD

A combination of Santa Ana winds, flying embers and shake roofs helped a runaway blaze to sweep across more than 12,000 acres of Laguna Beach wilderness and destroy more than 330 homes.

Recipe for Destruction in Laguna Beach

The destructive ingredients: hot temperatures, low humidity, Santa Ana winds and high-density older housing.

- 1** Driven by Santa Ana winds, a fire reported at 11:30 a.m. Wednesday quickly churned into a blaze racing through Laguna Coast Wilderness Park. Fed by meadows of new vegetation, flames roach 50 to 100 feet in the air and ground temperature is estimated to be 2,000 degrees.
- 2** Wind and heat intensify create a cyclone effect that scatters embers in all directions. Wind gusts up to 80 m.p.h. which can carry embers up to a mile away, help start spot fires on shake roofs and treetops in surrounding areas.
- 3** Treetop fires cause nearby power line transformers to explode, sending fire in all directions. Homes built with wood siding and shake roofs and crowded into small lots with little space between individual structures are particularly susceptible to spreading flames.
- 4** Efforts to contain fire are thwarted by avoidance traffic, winding and narrow roads, and poor visibility from smoke. At times, water pressure is so low firefighters are helpless.

Firefighters finally win battle in war against wildfires

MALIBU, Calif. — All night long the flames had roared seaward down the canyons of Malibu, licking the coastal ridgelines in a steady march toward the dense, blufftop neighborhoods of Pacific Palisades.

Carbon, Las Flores, Big Rock and Tuna canyons — one by one they were transformed into superheated swirls of orange cinders.

Finally, just before dawn Wednesday, Topanga Canyon Boulevard remained the only major barrier between the firestorm and the city's western fringes of Los Angeles. If the Malibu Feed Bin fell, so too might the palatial Getty Museum and the home-studded hills around it.

It was at Topanga Canyon Boulevard and Pacific Coast Highway that hundreds of fire crews from up and down the state drew a line in the sand. With skill, bravery and a blessed shift of the wind, they managed to thwart the fire's steady spread toward Los Angeles, at least for most of the day Wednesday.

"This was the big time," proclaimed Battalion Chief Ralph Mailloux of Gardena shortly after 6 a.m. "If we'd lost here, it would have been like standing over."

The line was held for nearly 10 hours, but a shift in winds caused it to be breached many miles up the canyon, again raising a threat to dense hillside neighborhoods on the western edge of Los Angeles.

The pitched battle by the ocean was one of the most dramatic moments in a night of feverish efforts to slow an inferno that was controlled more by the terrain and shifting winds as by the thousands of firefighters along its flanks.

Tuesday night and Wednesday morning, fire crews worked to save most homes and businesses along Pacific Coast Highway and Topanga Canyon Boulevard. They threw everything they had at the firestorm.

They stationed engines along miles of roadway. They doused the brush and trees with water and fire-retardant foam. They set backfires. And when the flames finally drew close to their lines, they fought them with everything from hand-held hoses to helicopters.

At 1 a.m. Wednesday, many of the troops were already at their posts.

A quarter mile above Topanga Canyon Boulevard, the crew of Engine 63 from the Kern County Fire Department sat on a boulder eating tepid In-N-Out burgers and barbecued potato chips delivered by county workers. Their assignment was to protect the sleek-Pizzaro Design Center on Pacific Coast Highway, as well as the ridge across the roadway. Just downhill was a funky commercial strip of fish restaurants, an old motel and market that ran to the crucial intersection.

The Baker'sfield team had hooked up their hoses to a hydrant outside the design center and looked over the building for possible problems: When the time came, they knew exactly what they were going to do. They would drench the glass and stucco building, string their hoses across the highway and spray 1,200

gallons a minute on the opposite hill to keep the fire from rushing down the ridge onto the structures lining Pacific Coast Highway.

They waited patiently, hauling out their folding lawn chairs and catching naps after their fire engine. They were already weary from hosting naps oceanfront houses in the Big Rock area earlier in the night — a drill repeated time and again by hundreds of fire crews for miles along Pacific Coast Highway.

Hours passed. For a time it even appeared as if the blaze might be halted at Tuna Canyon with a combination of backfires and dying winds. "I want to use up my water," lamented firefighter Tammy Lindley.

Shortly afterward, she got her wish. About 3 a.m., the winds moved seaward, growing stronger. Flames danced atop nearby crevasses. Below, strike teams composed of five engines each stood sentinel on Pacific Coast Highway, each assigned to an individual structure. A San Gabriel Valley crew doused the Topanga Beach Cantina. An Orange County team took care of the Topanga Ranch Motel and Market. And so on.

On the hillsides, dry chaparral crackled as it was swallowed by bright orange flames. Tornado-like funnels of cinders spun skyward. The fire was shaped by the wind, hugging the ground or leaping 100 feet into the air as the air currents changed.

By 4 a.m., the flame front stretched a half mile across the canyon above the road. As he doused the roof of a house, firefighter Bobby Mundz groused that his residents had done little brush clearance, making his job far more difficult.

"Look at that — it's a Roman Candle waiting to happen," said Mundz, pointing to a palm tree with a thick row of dead fronds.

A few minutes later, Los Angeles County firefighters crawled up the sides of the steep slope, using road

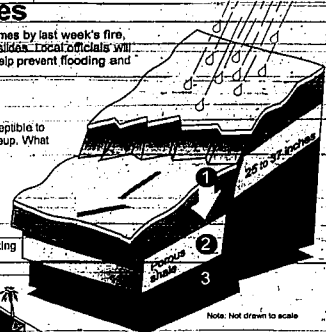
When the Rain Comes

Laguna Beach's hillsides, stripped of foliage and homes by last week's fire, could become mudslides in the form of mudslides. Local officials will decide whether to reseed the denuded hillsides to help prevent flooding and mudslides as the rainy season approaches.

Soil Composition

Laguna Beach's coastal hillsides are typically susceptible to mudslides because of their porous geological makeup. What happens to each layer when saturated:

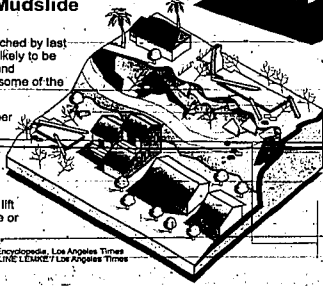
- 1) **Topsoil:** Sticky, claylike. Slides down, taking trees, fences, homes and pools with it
- 2) **Porous shale:** Fine-grained clay that can hold large quantities of water. Breaks apart and slips
- 3) **Bedrock:** Solid rock. Also can break, destabilizing shale layer.



Areas With Mudslide Potential

Hillsides homes untouched by last week's fire are most likely to be affected by flooding and mudslides. Here are some of the reasons why:

- **Gravity:** The steeper the slope, the more susceptible it is to sliding.
- **Excess weight:** Water-saturated soil becomes heavy, can lift and become unstable or slide away.



Denuded hillsides: Without trees and shrubs to absorb rain, water saturates hillside and weakens bedrock.

Development: Mudslides can occur where roads have been carved into hillsides, altering the natural slope.

Californians swim, skate, hike, bike back to their burned homes

MALIBU, Calif. — With roads closed to all but emergency vehicles, ingenious Southern Californians found ways to skate, hike, bike and boat around the city. They risked their lives. They risked arrest and, in one case, risked hypothermia to get home because not knowing where to go. "I was surprised to get around town," said Jim Bettelman, one of the few Malibu residents able to assess his property Wednesday. "I had to. They wouldn't let me in any other way, so I had to go here."

Jason Baldwin, 30, tried pedaling south on the highway on his 21-speed mountain bike to his sister's home on the edge of Malibu and Pacific Palisades. Falling ash and rain turned rain by smoke made his athletic attempt Wednesday morning impossible after 10 miles. "My parents just went through this in Laguna Beach last week," he said. "I'd ridden to get to my sister's house to see if there's anything I can do."

Two men even tried getting in on in-line skates, their shoes tied together and draped around their necks. In one case debris made roller transportation impossible. Most, like Pepperdine University roommates Amy Snow and Tanya Looper, abandoned their cars behind police lines and hiked home through still-smoldering, denuded canyons colored charcoal. "It really is, like, every house," said Snow, 20. "It's really awful. But I was trying to wonder what had happened."

Then I swam to shore from about 100 yards out," he said, dressed only in the running shorts he had escaped in. "I needed to see what was going on."

Braving the frigid Pacific, he said, was a small sacrifice to learn that his oceanfront home was spared — even as fire roared from the Santa Monica Mountains to the highway's edge. Bettelman's neighbor wasn't as lucky; a shower of embers ignited the shake-shingle roof of his wooden house. It burned for an hour, leaving an ocean view on a built-up stretch of highway from which the Pacific is normally invisible.

Nearly 100 firefighters fought the blaze about four hours before bringing it under control. Later Thursday, many of the college's 2,011 students gathered for a chapel service where they prayed, sang, cried and hugged. Officials said the displaced students would be housed temporarily in a hotel in Cleveland; about 25 miles northeast of Chattanooga. College vice president David Tilley said it was a blessing no one was killed. Officials believe the fire started in a first-floor prayer room of the Church of God-affiliated school. The 52-year-old building had no sprinklers. But because of its age, it was exempt from a 1978 law requiring sprinklers in buildings taller than one story because.

flares to set back firefighters. The procedure is used to clear a path of vegetation, thereby eliminating an important source of fuel for the main fire. But it is also extremely risky, dependent on the good will of the winds. A shift in the winds could instantly envelop a firefighter in flames. "The wind suddenly" one yelled to another as he tossed a flare up the canyon. In this case, the backfires worked as intended, pushing the fire up the hill and away from a hair salon, a bait shop and the Something's Fishy sushi parlor. Attention then shifted to the feed store, where flames were moving perilously close to some 100 barrels of wet hay, three barrels of kerosene and 50 cords of wood out back. South Bay firefighters showered water. Another backfire was lit, again successfully. With the approach of dawn, there were two possible scenarios. If strong easterly winds whipped through the canyons, as had been expected, the flames could have easily jumped past the waiting armada of firefighters. At the same time, dawn would also bring water-bearing helicopters over the smoke scene. It was a race against time and fate. In this instance, the firefighters won. As winds blew from the west rather than toward it, two water choppers made four direct hits. They flew so low over the flaming brush that at times they disappeared in the billows beyond the feed store. "Those guys have more guts than I can believe," said Laguna Beach Fire Capt. Tom King.

CLEVELAND, Tenn. (AP) — The smoke was so thick when fire alarms woke Mike Monahan that another student had to guide him out of the building. "Only then did the Lec College freshman realize his dorm was engulfed in flames. "Someone woke me up and said, 'This is for real! Get up!'" said Monahan, one of more than 70 students who lived in the mostly wooden dormitory that caught fire early Thursday. Seventeen students were injured, most from smoke inhalation, said Joe Wilson, public information officer for the Bradley County-Cleveland Emergency Management Agency. Three were in serious condition after being airlifted to Chattanooga for treatment of burns; five others were hospitalized in stable condition, suffering smoke inhalation, cuts and broken bones caused by leaps from Ellis Hall's second-story windows.

'Experts' search for theme to Tuesday's election results

WASHINGTON — Christie Todd Whitman's shock-of-shocks victory in New Jersey and the success of Republicans all over the damed place this week means that: A—Jim Florio should not have raised taxes. B—Bill Clinton should not have resigned now. C—Bill Clinton might as well resign now. D, All incumbents should resign now. E—Political consultants who say all this stuff should resign now. Ever wary to bring global meaning out of parochial events, the political analysts, pundits and party leaders were out in force Wednesday doing what they do best: spinning. They can win an election or lose an election, they can predict an election outcome or miss by a mile, they might have absolutely NOTHING to do with an election — no matter — these folks who make their living off of other people's victories and defeats will always have something to say about it the next day. And so it went this week. When New Jersey Gov. James J. Florio, who just spent months ago

Meaning, shmeaning, Democrats harumphed... Isolated incidents... We're still redecorating the White House... Lots of time... "Enjoy it while it lasts," Paul Begala, a consultant to Clinton and Florio, admonished the Republican Party. Comes now the measured response from Norman Ornstein of the American Enterprise Institute: "Ignore all that." "The reality," Ornstein said, "is this had almost nothing to do with the White House or Bill Clinton — as these elections never do." That didn't stop everyone from party chairmen to morning talk-show hosts to, well, newspaper reporters, from trying to discern any granule of meaning from a silo of statistics. The most obvious comparison was between Clinton and Florio, two Democrats who raised taxes shortly after moving into their new executive offices. It was an analogy that even the White House was eager to make when it looked as if Florio would overcome his vilification and win re-election. "The Clinton administration wanted Jim Florio to be the poster boy for their campaign for higher taxes, but the people of New Jersey realized that Florio's record tax increase hurt the economy of their state," said Republican National Committee Chairman Haley Barbour. Wednesday, Democrats were hard-pressed to endorse the Florio-Clinton comparison. Florio raised taxes suddenly without building consensus, without explaining why, Democrats said. Clinton did nothing like that, they insisted. "Bill Clinton," said Democratic consultant Ann Lewis, "is a much more incremental and inclusive politician." And — negative ratings aside — let's not forget that, unlike Florio, people actually like Clinton, added

Democratic strategist Mark Mellman. Bill Clinton has never been as unpopular as Jim Florio, has never had to climb as far out as Jim Florio," he said. "I think that one can easily make too much out of this tax issue," concluded Democratic National Committee Chairman David Wilhelms. Besides, he said, these were local races. That assertion had Barbour crowing: "Well, if all politics is local, locally, Bill Clinton's very unpopular, whatever the locale." It was Begala, though, who tried to shake off the entire tax issue. The New Jersey election was not about Florio's unpopular \$2.8 billion tax hike, he said. It was about George Bush. "Jim Florio is the last victim of the Bush Clinton deal," Begala declared in an interview by car phone from the New Jersey Turnpike. While they didn't pin it on Bush, some Republicans did concede the still-flagging economy hurt Florio's case. Likewise, they said, it could take down Clinton in 1996. "If the economy's stagnant, he loses. If it's growing, he's fine," Republican pollster Glen Bolger said. Several strategists said losses by Florio and New York Mayor David N. Dinkins represented an extension of the "throw-the-bums-out" attitude that has emerged — albeit periodically — in recent years. "This is the most difficult climate I've ever seen for incumbents. There is a level of voter rage or impatience higher than I've ever seen," said Lewis, the Democratic consultant. "We should call it the 'No-Heffergate' — their motto is, 'Just do it.'" Voters don't care what politicians say anymore, Lewis said, just what they do. And if the electorate doesn't approve, forget about it. Democrats, not surprisingly, argued that Clinton is, indeed, "just doing it" — with health care, student loans, deficit reduction — and will win re-election as a result.

Don't undercut crucial alternative high schools

The politicized ruckus over alternative high schools seems unbearably complex and arcane. Full of arguments about "funding units" and "full-time equivalents." It's the kind of duel that could only take place between two groups of educational bureaucrats - jargon at 40 paces.

Yet the key point is simple. Alternative high schools provide an irreplaceable safety net for kids who are in danger of spending their lives uneducated and dependent. Weakening that net, as state officials propose, would be a mistake.

The importance of alternative schools is easy to underestimate. Statewide, they serve only 1 percent of the total.

But their impact is large because of who those 2,700 kids are. All have had difficulty (of some sort) in traditional schools. Many are pregnant girls or underage mothers.

Karen Fraley, who launched the alternative school in Twin Falls and now heads a night-school version in Jerome, made a cost-benefit analysis a few years ago. At the time, she figured that if one teen-age mother could be rescued from a lifetime of public dependency, taxpayers would save enough money to bankroll the Twin Falls program for five years.

Clearly, alternative schools are an excellent investment.

Since 1989, the state has recognized that alternative schools are "a different animal" with special needs, and it therefore allows them special flexibility in collecting state money.

But now state education officials contend that some alternative schools

— primarily the one in Twin Falls — are taking advantage of that flexibility. So they want to tighten the rules. For example, they object to "double dipping" — the practice of letting a youngster take day classes in one program and night classes in another, with the state paying for both.

Perhaps this practice is an abuse, from a purely fiscal standpoint. But Fraley says it's a useful option for, say, a 19-year-old mother who wants her diploma ASAP.

Another example: The state wants to tighten reimbursement for alternative schools for the time students spend in work-study programs, or in study halls, or working as office aides, or taking their turn at the school day-care center.

Superintendent Terrell Donich of Twin Falls counters that regular high schools have students in all those programs except day care. No similar economy measures are being proposed for those schools, he notes.

The bottom line, to us, is that the states' proposal would take money away from crisis programs that can ill afford to lose it.

In Twin Falls, some students will lose their access to child care and pay for private day care — or drop out of school.

In Jerome, Fraley fears that the rule changes could kill her program outright.

That mustn't happen. Alternative schools, serving two generations of children at the same time, are too valuable to be weakened by legalistic penny pinching. Local officials are right to be fighting for them.

NAFTA erodes sovereignty

The North American Free Trade Agreement is not essentially a trade agreement, much less a "free" trade agreement; nor is NAFTA about free trade vs. protectionism. NAFTA is primarily a political union which would severely erode U.S. sovereignty. This is, of course, exactly what the NAFTA architects had in mind. David Rockefeller, founder of the Trilateral Commission and former chairman of the Council on Foreign Relations, wrote in the Wall Street Journal about NAFTA: "Everything is in place... after 500 years to build a true 'new world' in the Western Hemisphere."

Agency lacks common sense

that appeared when it was published in the Outdoor section Thursday. Our apologies to the writer.

According to Larry Hovey's article in the Times-News on Oct. 21, I'd say that the deer hunters with controlled deer hunt permits are the ones who took the beating in Region 4.

In 1990, biologists knew 18 months ago that the drought and winter kill had cut into the deer herds, as they claim, then the 564 question is, "Why put out all those deer permits in Region 4 hunt units, and worse yet, include all those antlerless permits and kill-off permits?" These are questions that should be answered by the biologists.

That is not good sound management under any circumstances. However, it's been already noted by many hunters that the Idaho Department of Fish and Game is expert at making excuses, which in this case, is blame the drought — and, of course, the biggest excuse is always winter kill.

So, it comes down to this: If the winter kill was what it claims, then what's the excuse that they didn't winter feed? It shouldn't be lack of funds, for according to the permits issued just on controlled hunts alone for the deer and antelope, the dedicated fund fee of \$1.50 for each tag of these three animals mounted to \$21,480 just from Region 4, and that doesn't count the open hunt fees for that region.

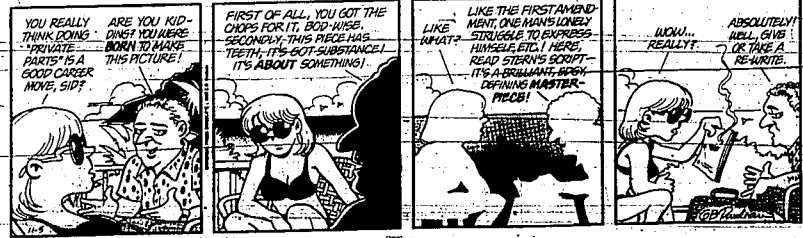
Could it be that the Fish and Game is only in the business of selling tags? Or maybe my friend was right when he said that the way the Fish and Game issues tags in Region 4 is by how many parking spaces is in the hunt unit — not the amount of big game.

The fact remains that there are just too many permits being issued for the amount of game there is in the units. Years ago and not too many years at that, there was only 1,000 permits in Unit 154. That went to 1,200; in 1990, 2,000; and then the unit was divided into two hunt units. Now Fish and Game issues 2,280 permits and has four units. In Unit 145 in 1990, there were 500 deer permits. This year (1993), it has sold 3,000 permits, including a muzzelender hunt. Why is the Fish and Game issuing tags in Region 4 by how many parking spaces is in the hunt unit — not the amount of big game?

Moreover, hunters are beginning to wonder how efficient our Department of Fish and Game is — or is this putting out permits just a money-making scheme? Sure seems so, or perhaps it just may have miscounted the parking spaces in the South Hills and the other hunt units in Region 4.

Marine departure sign of Somali calm

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) — About 3,600 American sailors and Marines sailed away Thursday in a sign of confidence that security is improving for U.N. peacekeeping troops in Somalia's bloodied capital.

Somali clan leaders and U.N. officials, meanwhile, met to discuss ways to improve security and keep tensions down in the city. The turnout was better than a meeting a week earlier and included representatives of Mogadishu's two main factions.

The departing Marines never came ashore after arriving in support following an Oct. 3 battle in which 18 U.S. soldiers died fighting supporters of Mohamed Farrah Aidid. The bloodshed led Washington to rein in military operations and step up efforts for a political solution to Somalia's clan conflict.

The arrival of U.S. Army soldiers, Abrams tanks and Bradley armored vehicles over the last two weeks permitted the deployment of the Marines elsewhere, a U.S. military spokesman, Col. Steve Rausch, said.

There are now 7,500 U.S. troops in Mogadishu, bolstered by 30 M1-A1 tanks and 42 Bradley Fighting Vehicles, the Pentagon said.

An additional 8,650 sailors and Marines remain offshore on a fourship amphibious landing force and an aircraft carrier.

Queried about reports U.S. forces had adopted a change in strategy and will establish a high-profile presence in Mogadishu's streets, Pentagon spokesman Capt. Michael Doubleday said the forces were simply conducting missions President Clinton

German to head European army

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — A German general takes command today of the "Eurocorps," a 25,000-member force of French, German and Belgian troops that may form the nucleus of a European army.

The United States once viewed the Eurocorps with suspicion, for fear it would weaken the NATO alliance.

Princess denies eating disorder, breakdown

LONDON (AP) — Princess Diana, in a rare public rebuke to Britain's royal-bugby news media, dismissed suggestions Thursday that she is suffering from an eating disorder and is on the verge of a nervous breakdown.

The princess, obviously fed up with speculation about her mental and physical health, chose a charity event to confront the press.

At a London fit and well, the 32-year-old estranged wife of Prince Charles told about 400 people they were lucky she was there because according to media reports she had "posed to have my head down the loo (toilet) for much of the day."

Newspapers had said Diana suffered another bout of the eating disorder bulimia, in which the sufferer binges on food and then takes laxatives or vomits.

Diana was photographed leaving another London charity event on Monday with tears in her eyes.

Buckingham Palace said she had a respiratory attack, and the tabloids responded with even more speculation about stress and Diana's health.

"I am supposed to be dragged off the minute I leave her by men in white coats," the princess then mockingly told the audience.

OTTAWA (AP) — Jean Chretien, whose Liberal Party was swept to power by voters unhappy with the Canadian economy, took over as prime minister Thursday and was expected to move quickly to start creating jobs.

After nine years in opposition, the left-of-center Liberals are anxious to get off to a fast start. Chretien was expected to announce a meeting with provincial premiers to begin implementing his \$4.5 billion public works program, providing 120,000 jobs.

Kim Campbell, who became Canada's first woman prime minister after the resignation of Brian Mulroney only to be pulverized at the polls four months later, offered her government's resignation to the governor-general at 10 a.m. An hour and a half later, Chretien and his Cabinet were sworn in.

The Liberals won by a landslide in last week's general election, taking 277 of the 295 seats in the House of Commons. Ms. Campbell's Progressive Conservatives, battered by a long recession and widespread unpopularity of Mulroney, fell from 133 seats to 100.

Lucien Bouchard's separatist Bloc Quebecois became the official opposition with 54 seats, followed by the western-based Reform Party, a conservative movement led by Preston

Manning, with 52 seats. The socialist New Democrats fell from 43 seats in the old House to nine, and there was one independent.

"They are anxious to move ahead quickly on the infrastructure program because it's visible and they want to be seen delivering on one of their campaign promises," said Lawrence LeDuc, a political scientist at the University of Toronto.

"The bigger things that affect the economy more generally they obviously can't do a whole lot about," said LeDuc, noting that Canada's 11.2 percent unemployment was not likely to go down significantly anytime soon.

Rightist-led strike paralyzes Haitian capital

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — Pro-military rightists demonstrated their clout Thursday on the eve of a meeting aimed at solving the political standoff, calling a strike that brought the capital to a near standstill.

Most businesses were closed and traffic was reduced to a trickle.

Traffic had been light anyway because a worsening gasoline shortage caused by a U.N. oil and arms embargo imposed Oct. 19 to pressure the military to allow the return of exiled President Jean-Bertrand Aristide.

U.N. and Haitian officials said they will meet Friday, with or without the military, to search for a solution to the country's political standoff.

The two-day strike was called by the pro-military Front for the Advancement and Progress of Haiti, or FRAPH, to protest the government's refusal to order that gasoline stored on the island be released for distribution.

A Haitian civil court was to have ruled Thursday on a lawsuit by gasoline dealers against Shell, Texaco and Esso. Haiti's three gasoline distributors, to free the supplies. But the court, at other public buildings, was closed by the strike.

"It is a crying shame that we have to go along with a strike called by such a group as the FRAPH but they are the only ones protesting the U.N. gasoline embargo," said Jean-Claude Roy, a conservative businessman and political commentator.

A similar strike was called last week by FRAPH and an independent drivers' union. In the past, the organization has used intimidation to force businesses to comply with strikes, so most stores and offices do not even try to open.

No violent incidents were reported Thursday.

The army has not said whether it

will take part in Friday's talks. U.N. special envoy Dante Caputo said Aristide and the president of Haiti's Senate had agreed to participate.

On Thursday, the head of the Chamber of Deputies, Antoine Joseph, said he would attend the talks, but only if all other parties, including the military, did so.

At issue is whether Aristide, toppled in a September 1991 coup, can return to Haiti and resume office.

Lawmakers with close military ties say it is unlikely the army will attend the proposed meetings because Aristide has called for the immediate resignation of the high command.

The presence of Aristide representative Michael Barnes, a former U.S. congressman, at the negotiating table was another sticking point, Joseph said.

"Why does Aristide need a foreigner to represent him when he has a

handpicked prime minister?" he said.

Prime Minister Robert Malval was installed at the end of August but has been unable to make his authority felt among government bureaucrats installed by past military-backed regimes.

Under the U.N.-sponsored agreement signed by army chief Lt. Gen. Rouff Cedras and Aristide in July, Cedras was to step down after Haiti's parliament passed laws separating the army and police and granted general amnesty for crimes committed during the coup. Aristide was to return Oct. 30.

But with many pro-Aristide lawmakers hiding in fear for their safety, the parliament could not reach a quorum and the laws were not passed.

The United Nations proposed renewed talks last Saturday, saying they would focus on ways to carry out the agreement, not to renegotiate it.

Kurdish attacks kill 1 in Europe

BONN, Germany (AP) — Kurdish militants smashed and burned Turkish consulates as a business day across Europe on Thursday in a coordinated violent protest against Turkey's treatment of its Kurdish minority.

"At least one person was killed and 16 were injured in the more than 60 attacks that left smoldering shops and offices and shattered glass in the streets of urban centers in Germany, Switzerland, Austria, Britain, France and Denmark.

More than 40 Kurds were arrested. The attacks hit Turkish consulates, travel bureaus, airlines, banks, a newspaper office in Frankfurt and a cable television station in Berlin.

The action seemed better coordinated and more violent than a previous day of violent Kurdish protest in Germany and other European nations on June 24.

One Kurd was killed in those attacks, in Switzerland.

Wildfire consumes homes

WEST RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — John Stredwick kendra his 12-year-old daughter Hughra as she cried amid the rubble of their river-side home.

A few hours earlier, the family was awakened by the sound of burning fireballs slamming into the \$300,000 residence.

It was the biggest single loss during a wildfire that also consumed two mobile homes and damaged a fourth house, officials said. The fire, pushed by 50 mph winds, tore through 2,000 acres of grass and shrub lands early Wednesday.

Near Chelan in north-central Washington, fierce windswept down from Canada early Wednesday were blamed for a fire that destroyed two mobile homes. The winds knocked a tree into a power line, starting that fire.

Fred and Irene Kumbel escaped their burning trailer with the help of neighbor John Khntz. Next door, Mike and Betty Kuntz escaped their

burning home after being awakened by their 15-year-old son, Mike Jr. The Stredwick family also fled their home, saving little more than the clothes on their backs.

"The fireballs hitting the house sounded like hailstones," said Stredwick, 44, an employee at the Hanford nuclear reservation.

All that remained was a blackened stone fireplace, twisted bits of iron and ashes. Stredwick said the house was insured and he planned to rebuild on the scenic spot along the Yakima River.

There were no reports of serious injuries from the fire, and no houses had been found, said Gary Pira, a spokesman for the Benton County Emergency Management Agency.

Ron Anderson, chief of Franklin County Fire District No. 3, said the swirling winds pushed flames across roads and other barriers, and carried burning embers more than 100 yards in places. That led to a haphazard trail of destruction in the rural area.

About 200 firefighters from the area, and from nearby Yakima, Grant and Walla Walla counties were busy through the night plowing fire lines and erecting temporary fences to keep horses and other livestock in their fields, Anderson said.

Fire investigators were concentrating on an area near Red Mountain Road outside of town as the fire's likely starting place.

About 200 people were evacuated during the fire and 18 families sought shelter at a Red Cross center — a West-Richland church overnight. They were gone by Wednesday morning.

Two smaller fires near Canyon Lakes Golf course at Kennewick and in Finley were brought under control and did little damage, Pira said.

Meanwhile, the King Bee Fire continued burning Thursday on about 120 acres inside a 600-acre perimeter in the Wenatchee National Forest, about eight miles southwest of Wenatchee.

Wyoming man receives heart of slain teen

DENVER (AP) — The heart of a teen-ager who was fatally shot while trick-or-treating was transplanted into a 53-year-old man.

Carl Banks Jr., 18, died Sunday night. On Monday, his heart was transplanted into Baron Swapp, a ranch caretaker from Fort Laramie, Wyo.

Swapp had a heart attack in December 1990 and his condition had deteriorated with coronary artery disease.

Swapp's wife, Sharon, would like to meet Banks' mother, Martha.

"They've given me my husband back," she said. "There's no words to express it."

Banks' liver and kidneys also were used for transplants.

9 E. coli victims ate at Taco Time; officials find no link

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — All nine people sickened last month by the E. coli bacteria here and in the Lewiston, Idaho, area recently ate at Taco Time restaurants, but the source of the contamination remains unknown, health officials said.

Inspections before and after the illnesses were reported showed both restaurants in the cities were following proper food-handling procedures.

The Pullman franchise "is the best in the county when it comes to cleanliness and educating employees," John Skyles, Whitman County public health director, said Wednesday.

All five people who were infected in Whitman County ate different items at the Taco Time in Pullman, said Tim Moody, the county's health officer. One food handler reported being ill with diarrhea during the time when some, but not all, victims ate there.

Moody said officials have found no relationship between the illnesses of

those who ate at the Pullman franchise and those who ate at the Lewiston restaurant.

The Lewiston-based North Central District Health Department said in a statement Wednesday that it believes there was no connection between the cases in Lewiston and Whitman County.

Three of the Pullman-area victims were hospitalized, but none of the Lewiston-area victims were. All those who became ill, including a Lewiston-area 3-year-old, have been recovering and no new cases have been reported in the areas since Oct. 25.

All nine cases involved the O157:H7 strain of E. coli, which was blamed for the infections of hundreds of Northwest residents and the deaths of three Western Washington children in January.

The outbreak was linked to contaminated and undercooked hamburgers at Jack in the Box restaurants.

Board members tour proposed bomb range

BOISE — Some members of the Idaho Land Board, a panel which holds a key to a proposed Air Force training range in southwestern Idaho, toured the area by helicopter Thursday.

"Not much out there," said state schools superintendent Jerry Evans, after arriving back in Boise after a 24-hour tour of the range.

"It looks like there's an opportunity to increase revenue from the state lands in the area," Evans said.

The Idaho Air Guard and Air Force set up a tour of the proposed Idaho-Training Range for members of the Land Board. But Auditor J.D. Williams and Attorney General Larry Echo Hawk couldn't make it, and Secretary of State Pete Cernuszka fell ill Wednesday and sent his chief deputy.

Gov. Cecil Andrus called it a "look-see" for Land Board members and the staff of the state Land Department and an update on boundary changes since the first proposal. But it turned out to be over the area several times before.

Meanwhile, the Air Force announced that a draft environmental impact statement on the training range will be filed with the Environmental Protection Agency on Friday.

The public comment period opens next week and continues until Feb. 9. The Air Force said it, the Bureau of Land Management and the state will conduct "full-and-open hearings" Jan. 11-15 in Grand View, Boise, Twin Falls and Mountain Home.

Copies of the report and associated technical studies will be available at libraries and other public locations in Idaho, northern Nevada and eastern Oregon.

The state wants to create a new training range in southwest Oregon, Owyhee County, mainly to benefit the Mountain Home Air Force Base.

The proposal also would include more than 30 sites to locate radar emitters for an electronic combat range that would cover

much of southern Owyhee County to the Twin Falls County line. To create the range, the state would trade land with the Bureau of Land Management to acquire a block of nearly 26,000 acres. BLM would acquire state land elsewhere.

Evans said he isn't ready to give blanket approval to the exchange until he sees specifics. "I want to look at the details of any proposal first," he said.

Opposition to the training range is coming from hunters, recreationist, environmentalists and the Duck Valley Indian Reservation, which is just a few miles away.

Thursday's tour was designed to show how revised plans meet those concerns, particularly about the wildlife in the Owyhee River Canyon.

An early proposal for one large training range running up to the edge of the canyon was changed to two separate sections, one north of the canyon and one south of it. Air Force officials said there would be little flight activity over the canyon.

"The flight paths out there won't be anywhere near those canyons," Andrus said.

A preliminary, unreleased environmental document, however, shows target areas less than one mile from the canyon. State Fish and Game officials' level because of their support on three-mile buffers between the canyon and the range's target areas.

Hulley attorney R. Keith Roark has filed a motion asking that Becker be disqualified. Roark is helping to defend Robert Johnson, 24; Johnson and his cousin, Tommy Peterson, 24, are charged with the mid-July killing of Connie Marie Allen, 31, and Ricky Lee Mangum, 33.

The couple were murdered in their home northwest of Gooding in the early morning hours of Sept. 14, Gooding County authorities say.

Roark could not be reached for comment this week. Becker said he knew of Roark's motion before it was filed, and that there was no problem between the two of them.

If Becker is disqualified, another district judge must be assigned to the case.

Johnson and Peterson are scheduled to be arraigned in district court this morning.

Farm product quality lab at CSI opens doors to public

TWIN FALLS — More than 30 Idaho farmers, educators and agriculture officials toured the new Quality Assurance Laboratory Thursday.

Said Debastani, chief chemist for the lab, and his staff demonstrated how they're testing local potatoes for pesticide residue.

The lab opened in October on the College of Southern Idaho campus. Its purpose is to provide scientific analysis of what's inside Idaho's farm products.

The lab's first contract is with the Idaho Potato Commission, which has selected the lab to sample from 60 different farms, processing factories and shipping sites in the state.

Those samples are checked at the lab

for pesticide residue in the potatoes.

Under that contract, the lab tests eight samples and runs those samples through 60 tests, which takes three days, Debastani said.

The lab is now testing potato samples that came from a Twin Falls farm, he said.

The contract with the potato commission is for \$200,000 and the lab costs about \$300,000 a year to run, said Rod Awe, director of agriculture technology for the state Department of Agriculture, which oversees the Twin Falls lab.

Debastani said he's negotiating with other state commodities commissions and agricultural groups to test other foods grown in Idaho. Those negotiations could lead to further contracts that could help the nonprofit lab become self-sustaining within five years, he said.

He said a growing trend in agricultural research is to have public laboratories that charge a fee, as opposed to public labs that charge little or no money for research. The agriculture industry in Idaho must now have its products analyzed by labs at the University of Idaho in Moscow or by private labs in Washington, Oregon and California, he said.

Since 1990, the state has spent \$1.5 million from the general fund to create the lab and another \$700,000 to equip it with new technology from around the world. For example, the lab's computer equipment is so sensitive that it can detect chemical residues down to the part-per-billion level.

The lab could also analyze such farm products as wheat, onions, apples, beans, barley, sugar beets, alfalfa and other commodities, Debastani said.

Crane caught, questioned on missing girl

State agents check Jerome fugitive's alibis

TWIN FALLS — The FBI in Colorado has captured the Jerome fugitive who was wanted for questioning in the disappearance of 9-year-old Stephanie Crane of Challis.

Robert Crane, 43, was caught Thursday, said Les Stimpson, an Idaho Falls-based investigator with the Idaho Bureau of Investigation. Crane was arrested on a probation violation charge in connection with his flight in 1989 from Jerome County authorities. Stimpson said.

He has not been charged in Stephanie's disappearance, Stimpson said.

Crane has provided investigators with alibis for the time period when Stephanie disappeared, and Idaho authorities are checking out Crane's statements, Stimpson said.

Stimpson said he did not know where in Colorado Crane was captured.

Crane is the great-uncle of Stephanie, who disappeared about 6 p.m. Oct. 11, apparently while walking home from a Challis bowling alley.

Despite a nationwide manhunt for Crane, Stimpson declined to call Crane a "prime suspect" in the case.

"We just needed to get him cleared and hadn't been able to find him," Stimpson said.

In a five-month period in 1985, Crane was arrested in Jerome County on charges of driving without privileges, disorderly conduct and charge in connection with a probation violation of Sheriff George Silver III has said.

Crane was sentenced to five years in prison in January 1988 on drunken-driving and driving-without-insurance charges, according to court documents. He was released on probation in August, 1988.

Chevron trucks can roll again, city says

TWIN FALLS — The city planning and zoning commission gave Chevron Pipe Line Co. the go-ahead Thursday to resume trucking at its last terminal west of the city.

The terminal, more than 20 years old, is located on the western border of the city's Area of Impact, just south of the railroad tracks on 2700 East.

But the city's 1993 comprehensive plan has zoned that land for rural residential uses.

City code allows for nonconforming uses of city land provided that those uses are not abandoned for more than one year.

"It has been three years since trucks have carried fuel out of there," Community Development Director LaMar Olson said. "The main question is: Has it been discontinued?"

Gerald A. McKee, product systems leader with Chevron in Salt Lake City, wrote his Nov. 2 letter to Olson that Chevron had no intention of abandoning the facility.

Chevron "maintained all utility connections," continued to actively maintain the pipeline takeoff facility, and "maintained-all structures and security fencing in good working order," McKee wrote.

Relative inactivity at the terminal was caused by delays in transferring operations from Chevron U.S.A. to Chevron Pipe Line, McKee said.

The commission agreed that Chevron had not discontinued use of the facility.

There is no place in the city where the facility could relocate because the pipeline does not pass through any vacant industrial zones, Olson said.

The commission member Ken Stutzman, asked if the roads could handle truck traffic.

Alternative high school would lose \$51,000 under proposed cutbacks

BOISE — Proposed funding restrictions for alternative school programs could cost the Magic Valley Alternative High School as much as \$51,000, according to Gus Hein, deputy superintendent of public instruction.

That's roughly how much less the school would have received from the state this year if the proposal had been in effect, Hein said.

Six other programs around the state would have lost a total of \$46,000, Hein said Wednesday during a special legislative hearing on the proposed rules. The money would have been redirected to 15 other alternative high school programs around the state.

The new rules are necessary to keep some alternative programs from receiving more than their fair share of state aid, he said.

But administrators and students at MVAHS and the Jerome school district's evening alternative program said the changes would cripple their ability to keep "at-risk" students involved in school.

"It would destroy our school at night," said Karen Fraley, administrator of the Jerome program. "We couldn't operate without using some of the options we're using."

An issue were three proposed changes to the state Department of Education's rules governing alternative high schools:

- Students who are enrolled in more than

one alternative program, or an alternative program and a regular high school, could only be counted once for funding purposes. (State aid is based partly on student attendance.)

- Some nonacademic programs, such as study hall, office aide work and child-care classes, would no longer qualify for state dollars. Only one hour a day of on-the-job training would be eligible for funding.

Although no limits would be placed on classroom size, state aid would cover only the first 18 students — a provision intended to encourage small classes.

The changes already have been adopted on a temporary basis and made retroactive to Sept. 1. The State Board of Education will decide whether to make them permanent at its Nov. 19 meeting in Pocatello.

Hein said the changes are needed to keep some districts from turning their alternative programs into cash cows.

"You could have Sonny Joins going to high school from 8 to 3 every day, and counting toward that school's daily attendance, and for the math class he's flunking and count toward that school's hourly attendance," Hein said. "The department regards that as double-dipping."

But Fraley said the new rules would discourage students who are thinking about dropping out from using alternative programs.

"I don't feel we're double-dipping," she said. "What we're doing is picking up kids who've fallen through the cracks. It takes some kind of flexibility to make that work."

Twin Falls Superintendent Terrell Donicht blasted the rules as "arbitrary, capricious and discriminatory," and said their real purpose was "financial not educational."

Hein and members of the administrators' committee that reviewed the rules conceded as much.

Hein noted that alternative high schools received \$6.7 million in state aid during the 1992-93 fiscal year, compared with \$2.5 million four years previously.

The committee voted 3-2 to oppose the rules, but the action was unofficial because the panel's two senators, Roger Madsen of Boise and John Hansen of Idaho Falls, split on the question.

However, Hansen and Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, said afterward that if the State Board adopts the rules permanently, they will ensure that they are reviewed, thoroughly during the 1994 Legislature. Hansen and Black chair the House and Senate education committees, respectively.

Black added that he has asked the Legislature's staff to research whether the Education Department followed proper procedure in adopting the temporary rules, and will request a formal opinion from the attorney general's office.

Whittom's gap down to 4 votes in Rupert mayor's race

RUPERT — Defeated mayoral candidate Joel Rogers is calling for a recount of the votes after Mayor W.P. "Bill" Whittom's victory proved to be narrower than originally thought.

Whittom squeaked past his prime opponent by a mere four votes, after the vote total was added up a second time.

Rogers originally thought he had lost by 10 votes.

Rogers said he had been mulling over the idea of a recount since Tuesday night's unofficial total showed he had lost 569 to 579.

Thursday afternoon when he learned the actual count was 570 to 574, he decided use leftover campaign donations to pay for the recount, which will cost \$100.

"Personally I would have accepted the outcome, but I had a lot of phone calls from people saying we should have a recount just to be sure," Rogers said. "I'm convinced it's the fair thing to do, especially for the

people that supported me."

Whittom won a fifth term in the elections Tuesday night, hours after news media had carried his admission that he had exaggerated the circulation figures for his monthly paper, the Fair Times.

Television station KMVT in Twin Falls delivered a stinging blow to Whittom two hours after the last vote

was cast by announcing it would no longer air Whittom's farm news segment.

The state attorney general's office has said it is still investigating Whittom not only for misleading advertisers, but also for alleged dishonest billing.

The attorney general's office will pore over all 1,166 ballots cast in the mayor's race to make sure they were read and tallied correctly.

Still, Rogers assumes the vote is correct, even though it is a close call. "I guess I can go down in history

as the first person to lose by only four votes," Rogers said. "That doesn't sound very exciting."

Council members "expressed" the vote, as required by law after election judges hadn't counted the votes correctly.

The canvass showed the judges had miscounted a tally of five votes, which were meant for Rogers instead of Whittom, and one of two dozen ballots rejected as indecipherable showed a vote for Rogers.

Utah police run out of time, leads in youth-gang slaying

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Police say they're running out of time — and into dead ends — in their investigation of the shooting death of a witness to a youth-gang slaying.

"We're starting to get worried," Murray police Lt. Pete Fondaco said Thursday. "If we don't get a break soon, I'm thinking we may not get it at all."

More than a dozen investigators from several police agencies were poring over clues in the slaying of 17-year-old Monica Vigil, who was shot to death in her bedroom early Tuesday by an assailant who apparently struck — a handgun through an open window and opened fire.

While details of the autopsy are being withheld, Fondaco said the girl was struck "multiple times in the body" and apparently was in an upright position when the first bullet struck her.

"She was not shot in her sleep," he said.

Investigators have speculated that she may have been smoking, since they found an ashtray on the windowsill. Fondaco said friends have told police that it was not unusual for them to talk to the girl through the window at odd hours.

"Some people believe there may have been a conversation that preceded the shooting, but we don't have any real information on that," he said.

Police sources have said the shooting occurred at close enough range to leave burned gunpowder residue on her body. Most of the shell casings from the weapon were found inside the room, although one was found on the ground outside.

Fondaco would not say how many rounds were fired, nor would he confirm or deny information from other sources that the weapon was a 9mm.

Spokane wants city barbecue shut down

SPOKANE (AP) — The city is trying to have an after-hours barbecue, notorious as a magnet for drug dealers and gang members, closed as a drug nuisance under state law and closed for a year.

The Superior Court hearing on the future of Sam's Barbecue Pit enters its third day today.

A lawyer for owner Cassk Thomas contends his client is powerless to prevent the drug activity.

Lawyer Pat Stitley said Thomas had tried to cooperate with authorities, trimming bushes, installing lights and posting no-littering signs to try to discourage unsavory activity.

Sam's Pit typically was open from midnight until dawn. Police raided Sam's on Oct. 8, arresting eight people for investigation of drug activity. Thomas voluntarily closed the barbecue.

When police learned he planned to reopen, they obtained a temporary court order to keep the place closed on Oct. 21.

Clarifying language may clear hurdles of rangeland reform

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Clinton administration Thursday addressed a major concern of Western politicians over reforming federal rangeland policy, prompting Colorado Gov. Roy Romer to drop his opposition to the plan.

Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt issued clarifying language, saying that legislation on federal rangelands is "pursuant to state law" on water rights.

Several senators and other critics, including Romer, had expressed concern that the federal government could usurp state water authority if the package became law.

"I am satisfied that this ambiguity can be corrected" by the language Babbitt issued, Romer said in a letter to Babbitt.

"I think it is in the best interests of all parties to get beyond the current deadlock," Romer wrote. "I support these changes, urge that they be adopted together with the bill currently before the U.S. Senate."

However, Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., immediately branded Babbitt's move "a smokescreen and not a big deal." He said through his spokesman Ari Fleischer that the fact that they're willing to wheel and deal on water underscores our point that no one knows the implications of a lot of these changes that are proposed in the reform package.

Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., who has been aligned with Domenici on the issue, said through a spokesman that he had not seen Babbitt's new language but would be very interested in reviewing it.

U.S. Rep. David Skaggs, D-Colo.,

had proposed removing a sentence from the bill that made U.S. water rights paramount on public lands. Babbitt's clarification wouldn't be in the bill, but would be part of the legislative record on the measure.

"With the water issues settled, we should now be able to move forward with long-overdue reforms in federal grazing policies," Skaggs said in a statement.

The bill states that the federal government will be entitled to all rangelands, reversing the situation in what it was before former Interior Secretary James Watt changed it to allow ranchers to obtain the water rights.

States generally govern their own water rights and the federal government must apply for water rights like anyone else.

Babbitt is hopeful that the change will change the minds of some senators using a filibuster to block Senate passage of the compromise bill, said Babbitt spokesman Kevin Sweeney. Several had raised concerns about the water rights provision. The bill also would increase

grazing fees charged on government-owned rangeland and require stricter environmental standards.

Babbitt also said that he intends to expand the public hearing process to allow Congress to hold hearings on issuing environmental standards for privately owned range. The pending bill requires the interior secretary to set those standards through a rulemaking procedure which would involve a public comment period.

Senate and House hearings thus would become part of the public hearing process, said Interior spokeswoman Stephanie Hannah. Several Senate opponents have said they would allow the grazing fee increase to go ahead but were opposed to the accompanying package of range reforms because Congress had never held hearings on their contents.

The reforms, most of them initially proposed by Babbitt as administrative steps he intended to take on his own authority, were written into a compromise by House and Senate negotiators who worked on the interior spending bill.

Court rejects ISU teacher's appeal

BOISE — A nonreteneed faculty member at Idaho State University has no constitutionally protected right to continued employment, the Idaho Court of Appeals says.

The court on Thursday rejected an appeal from Donald O. Olson, who filed a lawsuit after he was terminated by the school. The court concluded that until a faculty member gets tenure, there is no obligation for the school to rehire each year.

Olson, an electronics instructor, was employed under five year-to-year contracts. In 1990, he applied for tenure, which provides job security for university faculty members.

Hospital stops using waste incinerator

BOISE — St. Luke's Regional Medical Center in Boise has stopped using a medical waste incinerator after reaching an agreement with the state Division of Environmental Quality.

The agency fined St. Luke's \$5,000, in part for failing to test smoke coming out of the stack, as required by its operating permit, said Tim Trumbull with the division.

St. Luke's was required to test smokestack emissions to make sure no hazardous materials were being released.

The hospital also was found to have violated state regulations by failing to obtain a permit before constructing two natural gas-fired boilers for heating Trumbull said.

Boy, 12, dies after accidental shooting

BOISE — A 12-year-old Boise boy has died after he was shot with a pistol he and his brother found in a canal near their home, police said.

Police Detective Lance Anderson said the death Wednesday night will be ruled accidental. The victim and his 15-year-old brother were handling the 9mm handgun in their home when it fired, striking him in the chest.

"They were playing with the handgun and it accidentally discharged," Anderson said.

Bankruptcy case headed to high court

PONDERAY — Only three months after becoming a landmark case in the region's appeals court, the Bonner Mall bankruptcy dispute may be settled by the U.S. Supreme Court.

Attorneys for U.S. Bancorp Mortgage Company Wednesday filed a petition that put the case in line with thousands of other candidates, hoping for a decision out of the high court.

"Obviously, the bank is most anxious to overturn the decision of the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals," said Ford Ebsaesser, counsel for the Bonner Mall Partnership.

At issue is a legal principle known as the "new value exception." Under that, debtors can shore up a floundering business and maintain control through reorganization.

Computer glitch cuts 800 numbers

SEATTLE — GTE phone customers in five Western states were unable to place calls to 800 numbers for about an hour Thursday because of a software and equipment problem, a GTE spokesman said.

The outage affected an estimated 5 million GTE customers in Washington, Oregon, Montana, Idaho and California.

GTE spokesman Kevin Lavery said there was no indication the wildfires in Southern California were responsible. Lavery said the problem began about 10:30 a.m. MST. Service was restored shortly after 11:30 a.m.

Lack of support may kill state water program

BOISE (AP) — The state program responsible for keeping tap water clean could shut down this month, but some cities are reluctant to keep it alive.

There is a 50-50 chance it will go under, costing 28 people their jobs, said John Ledger of the state Division of Environmental Quality, which oversees the program. A decision could be made within a week.

The program depends on fees from city-operated water systems for much of its budget and many of the communities have not paid up. Plus, the state is not sure those that have paid will continue to do so.

Its demise could pose a health threat because small drinking water systems will not have state experts around to help with bacterial outbreaks, Ledger said.

"They'll pick up their phone to get help and nobody will be there," he said, although, if Environmental Quality ends its program, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is required by law to pick up the ball.

Yet EPA officials said they would only have enough money to run a barebones operation, which would mean a much lower response time.

The Legislature ordered the state

Department of Health and Welfare, which runs Environmental Quality, to find the money somewhere else.

The agency adopted regulations that require water systems to pay \$1 million of the program's \$1.6-million budget, with the rest from federal government.

City water systems have resisted paying.

They question the legality of assessing local fees for a state operation and they feel state tax dollars should pay for a program that benefits all Idahoans.

The attorney general's office said this month the local fees are legal.

But cities still feel state tax dollars should be used, said Scott McDonald, executive director of the Association of Idaho Cities.

His office has urged cities to pay the money "under protest."

About two-thirds of all water systems in Idaho have come up with money so far, state officials said.

McCall voters reject local-option tax proposal

MCCALL (AP) — McCall voters overwhelmingly rejected a proposed 1-percent local-option sales tax to help finance construction of a road connecting the resort community's east and west sides.

The Valley County Commission has pledged \$1 million to the Deinhard-Boydston Connector project.

But the resort city tax to provide additional funding needed support from 60 percent of local voters.

It wound up losing by more than 2-to-1. The final vote was 242 for and 535 against the measure.

City officials estimated the tax would have generated about \$300,000 a year during its seven-year life. The local tax would have been on top of the existing 5-percent

state sales tax. The same goods and services exempt from the state sales tax also would have been exempt from the local-option levy.

EchoHawk's opponents cry foul over ads

BOISE (AP) — Some of Larry EchoHawk's fellow candidates for governor say the attorney general is getting free publicity from an advertising campaign warning Idahoans about telemarketing and mail scams.

The 30-second radio-and television public service announcements are sponsored by the Idaho State Broadcasters Association.

They began running last month and will be repeated between now and January.

More often, it's none for the road

New sobriety transforms the way Magic Valley kicks back

BURLEY — It's Friday night at Boyd's Underground Lounge, and the usual crowd has filtered in.

The two guys at the bar are tossing back light beer, the designated driver at the corner table is nursing a "7Up" with a popcorn chaser, and the crowd around the pool table has just ordered up a second round of Diet Cokes.

...But make no mistake, Boyd's is no form bar. It's the kind of place where people come to drink and to keep company with others who do. It's just that drinking ain't what it used to be.

"Social drinking or social use of drugs has been part of human history since the beginning, in every culture and in every society," said Paul Ives, a Twin Falls psychologist who counsels alcoholics. "It still is, but attitudes toward alcohol have changed. Twenty years ago drinks were funny. They're not funny anymore."

Tougher DUI laws and the growing social stigma about public drunkenness haven't exactly ruined happy hour, but they've sure knocked the empties out from under the three-martini lunch.

"My customers come in earlier, drink less and go home earlier than the people who patronized the bars where I first worked," said Tim Jones, who owns Dunken's Draught House in downtown Twin Falls. "We close at 9 for a reason."
"I've been in this business for 10 years, and I really think social awareness has changed it," said Joe Knight, who manages the bar at the Rock Creek Restaurant. "It's a lot easier to get people to take a taxi. And when people drink, they drink in moderation."

The new sobriety, for lack of a better term, dates from the early 1980s when Mothers Against Drunk Driving, a national group made up of relatives of victims of drunk drivers, began a high-profile campaign to tighten DUI laws.

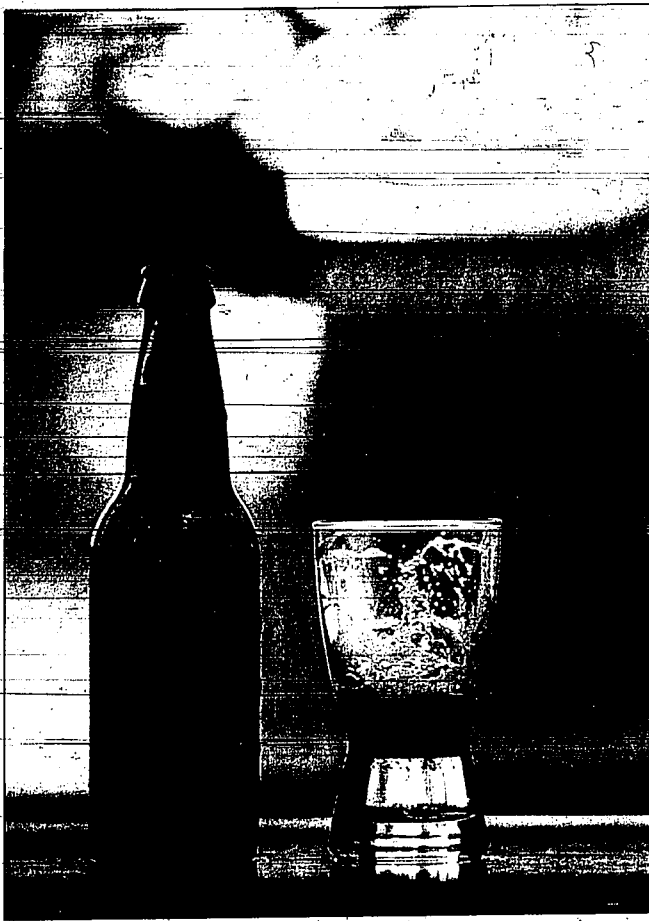
They succeeded in spades. Between 1982 and 1992, 43 states tightened sanctions on drunk drivers. Perhaps more significantly, so did insurance companies. A DUI nowadays is tantamount to either a canceled policy or a four-figure premium.

At the same time, drug awareness education spawned alcohol awareness education, companies began adopting zero-tolerance policies toward alcohol in the workplace, and the nodding acceptance of public drinking began to disappear.

"I grew up on the south side of the tracks where I was used to seeing drunks who were obviously drunks," said Simone Azure, an addictions counselor at Canyon View Hospital and Counseling Center in Twin Falls. "It never occurred to me that the people I see in business suits were sometimes drunks too, but I think more people are understanding that all the time."

For whatever the reason, all this teetotaling has hit the bar business like a tequila hangover, closing corner taverns by the thousands and causing the live music business the way of Bobby Sherman and the Strawberry Alarm Clock.

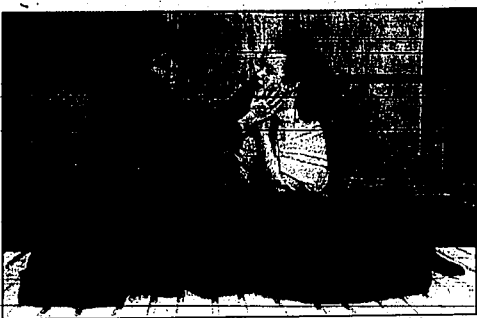

New technology takes hiss out of recordings for clean CD sound

The music industry, like most things in life, is ruled by a simple truth: A recording format is only the best until something better comes along.

Until now, many people would have defined the best as compact discs. But now something better has come along — an improvement in the way CDs are recorded, thanks to a refined mastering technology that improves the sound.

The technology is called 20-bit mastering, and it works like this: Bits are to CDs what grooves are to vinyl records. The more bits the better. Until now the industry standard has been to master — that is, to place the music on the CD — at a rate of 16 bits of information. The additional four bits increase the range of the signal so the music sounds clearer and has less hiss.

These CDs, in stores now, are fully compatible with existing CD players. This must be a first — no more than 12-bit CDs. An exception is Sony's special Gold-Plated Mastersound line, which has re-released classic albums by the likes of Bob Dylan, Billy Joel and Anita Baker. About 100 such Mastersound CDs stand out, they're packaged in distinctive white plastic longboxes.

Sony introduced one of the most ambitious 20-bit remastering projects when it reissued all 12 of its Aerosmith albums, the bulk of the band's catalog from 1973-82. The discs arrived in stores in September.

The good news aside, don't buy a 20-bit recording expecting an epiphany of sound. What you'll get is a cleaned-up CD — a good remastering job that may reveal a wider range of high and low notes.

And you won't be taking home actual 20-bit CDs, either: your player

is capable only of playing 16-bit discs. But you still get the benefits. To make 20-bit recordings compatible with 16-bit CDs, Sony created a process called Super Bit Mapping.

Vic Anesini, 29, the mastering engineer on the Aerosmith project, explains: "The higher (the) number of bits, the better the dynamic. It also helps expand your dynamic range (the difference between the lowest and highest audible frequencies). There are numerous ways to accomplish that task, but sound is often compromised. Anesini said. Not so with Super Bit Mapping, which reshapes the additional four bits — which contain sounds at the very high and low levels of the range — and lays them back into the audio signal.

So, how do the remastered CDs sound? In the case of Aerosmith, mostly pretty good. Side-by-side comparisons between the original and the new 20-bit versions reveal a variety of new textures, textures that weren't heard and hiss. Of course, these CDs can't top the original recordings (except they don't have the pops and ticks inherent in vinyl).

While twisting the dial away from rap and heavy metal, you passed a garage and something called house that sounded just like disco. Then there were Guns N' Roses, Motley Crue, Poison and — guess what you couldn't escape — Def Leppard.

by George Strait. It was the summer of '89, and your dial has been on country radio stations ever since.

Now that you're "country to the core," it's time that you go into the highlights of country music past. The selections are in no particular order.

"Capitol Collector Series," Merle Haggard (Capitol) Next to Hank Williams, Merle Haggard is the most talented country artist ever, and this 21-track compilation contains one miraculous out after another.

(Highnote) An erratic artist, Stewart put it together on the only modern honky-tonk album that can stand up to the glories of Ernest Tubb and Floyd Tillman. This album is for two-steppers, not 12-stepers.

"Greatest Hits," This Florida wild hair like Lassic is the past, present and future of country music. He's probably the best artist going right now, and his early stuff was the highlight of the early '80s.

"The Best of George Jones," 1955-1967 (Rhino) His voice was a little hoarse in his classic period, but he was only for fans of "Possum," "Flat-top" and "Only Daddy That'll Walk the Line: The RCA Years," Wayne Jennings (RCA) The 40 cuts on this new, two-disc set define the word "essential."

Like Harris, he turned hundreds of thousands of people on to the glories of hard-core country.

"40 Greatest Hits," Hank Williams (Polygram) I've ruled against listing him as a classic because he's really not very good values, even though Hank's set was worth the money. This two-disc set, which came out in 1986, is the next best thing.

"My Tennessee Mountain Home," Dolly Parton (RCA) This concept album had a pretty simple concept — Mountain Girl gifts her "famous" but business-simple mountain life — but the delivery was exquisite.

Perkins' country transformation unfolded quickly. Shortly after she started line dancing, she tuned her car radio to WCFB-FM, a 1-year-old Orlando country station that targets the 20-something generation. She dipped into her paycheck and invested in some cowboy couture — her wardrobe now includes three pairs of boots, a cowboy hat and a Western outfit.

But the most astonishing part — how easily she made friends at Sullivan's.

"The people are so nice here. I used to go to rock clubs, and it wasn't like this. Here, if somebody can't get the hang of a dance, someone in the crowd will jump in and teach them how to do it."

Line dancing might have brought her into the country music fold, says Perkins, but it was the people who won her over.

"I used to sit over there," she says, pointing to the middle of the club, "and then I met a bunch of people who always sit over here. Now I come in and they're here, so I just sit here."

Country music listeners, she discovered, are just good folks. Not snobby, not inclined to put on airs. Her new band of friends — a group that includes college students, the

owner of a construction company and some good ole boys — are planning excursions to other country music clubs. And not surprisingly, her favorite country song is Garth Brooks' "Friends in Low Places."

Suddenly, country is everywhere. More ubiquitous than Beavis and Butt-head; or gardening-cooking-entertaining guru Martha Stewart; or Michael Richards, a.k.a. Kramer, from "Seinfeld."

Tokyo now has a 24-hour country music station: singer Sammy Kershaw has his own cologne, Starclone, and, from the boob tube to the silver screen, country singers are showing up all over.

Time was when the only country star who appeared in national ads was Loretta Lynn — in the kitchen hawkling Crisco. But Madison Avenue isn't one to miss a trend, either: Randy Travis is hawkling Coca-Cola, Barbara Mandrell is pushing No Nonsense pantyhose, and Willie Nelson has shown up in Oldemark ads.

Indeed, country has come a long way since 1943, when Tennessee's governor declared that the music was "disgracing the state." Fifty years later, it has become so big, so mainstream that in 1992, a country phenomenon Garth Brooks sold

more albums than U2, Guns 'n' Roses or Michael Jackson.

Just one question, kids: Why? Blame it on a generation in search of a simpler life. Or the recession. Or the void in mainstream rock 'n' roll. Or the aging baby boomers who grew up on Southern rock and its countrified cousins.

The center of country music has shifted to a younger person, says Richard Peterson, a sociology professor at Vanderbilt University who studies country music: And Peterson maintains that part of country's current popularity — a slide from the good-looking young singers coming out of Nashville and the brain drain that has sapped rock 'n' roll — lies in line dancing.

"Historically, in all forms of popular music, dance has been a harbinger of a new music," Peterson says. "The twist helped to launch rock 'n' roll. You get young people dancing, and you will convert them to the music."

Witness Perkins, who swears that she still listens to country music, even if line dancing faded away tomorrow.

Others, such as Charles Wolfe, a folklore professor at Middle Tennessee State University, think that many Americans, particularly those who live in big cities, are turning to

country music because it represents a simpler way of life.

Sick of the rat race, many are striking out, not for the country, but the most accessible substitute.

Or why not this theory? Peterson, the Vanderbilt professor, says slow economic times may have convinced many professionals that they're just average folks.

Scaling back those dreams is tough. No wonder they need a little down-home, feel-good, foot-stomping music.

"They may once have dreamed about making it to the top of the corporate ladder, but these days, in the midst of a tough recession, lots of people are beginning to see themselves not as corporate chieftains but as the common man. Or common woman."

"Clearly, country is now appealing to people who identify themselves as working stiffs," says Peterson. "They romanticize themselves as being workers as opposed to managers. They may be blue-collar workers, but a lot of them are white collar. They may be CPAs or middle managers, but they identify with the lions. Front their point of view, it's us against the system. So that when Hank Williams sings, 'A country boy can survive,' they say that's what I'm like."

Distilleries are still making money, but at a stiff price. According to Business Week magazine, the liquor companies are dropping or selling off low-priced brands, whose sales have gone in the well, in favor of premium brands.

"A lot of people have figured out that they're going to drink, it's cheaper to drink at home," Boyd said. "For the price of a couple of premium mixed drinks, you can almost buy a bottle."

"People are still coming into drink," Knight said. "But maybe now they're drinking red wine. And almost all of our customers have something to eat when they're here."

"Our house wine use is to be charitable," Knight said. "Now it's Chardonnay. And although Cors Light is our No. 1 seller, the next four or five top-sellers are beers from micro-breweries. My customers come in here to enjoy themselves. They don't come in to get drunk."

But Azure and Ives are quick to point out that the change may be more apparent that real. Alcoholism hasn't gone away: it's just gone in the closet.

"I still see people drinking from the same basic reason: low self-esteem," Azure said. "And they're still lying, manipulative and making excuses."

Alcoholics, she said, are still very good at masking their addiction.

"It's not at all unusual for an alcoholic to go to work with a 2-3 (blood alcohol level) and function perfectly normally," she said. "Look,

if you knock back beers until 3 in the morning, you're not going to be in when you get up at 7 and go to work."

Moreover, just because more Magic Valley residents are clean and sober these days doesn't mean that's the case everywhere, Azure says. Hamlet, "you'd find a lot of bars full of people getting drunk," he said.

"This area has grown a lot, and with the population, there's come changes of attitudes about alcohol," he said. "I grew up here, and it used to be a little like Prairie Town."

Ives thinks the rise of so-called 12-step programs and residential treatment centers that began 20 years had an impact.

So are drug education programs, he says, which "have made non-drinking socially acceptable for kids."

"If you're a kid today, you don't have to go to the kegger on Friday night to be popular," he said. "The option is to be sober, saying no, and not misdeeds doing that."

"There's just better awareness than there was 10 years ago," Boyd said. "More people are taking responsibility for themselves, their families and their lives."

"I just see this," Ives says, as he designed these days. "They've said, 'We're brightly lit, with lots of windows — not like the old places that were dark and where you could sneak away in the afternoon and get drunk.'"

"The No-Tell Bar isn't around anymore."

DEAR READERS: We've all experienced a moment in our lives that is literally unforgettable. If you were 4 years old or older, you will remember the one where you heard the numbing news that President Kennedy had been assassinated (I was in Tokyo, Japan, vacationing with my husband).

At age 48, T.G. Sheppard won't stand for idleness

TWIN FALLS — It's a good thing T.G. Sheppard uses initials. He probably would have time to spell out his name.

The popular country singer is a self-proclaimed workaholic, which might be one of the reasons he's managed to crank out 23 albums and 19 No. 1 songs (10 in a row) at the age of 48.

Movies make a convenient scapegoat. They're more exotic than television and more accessible than radio. The screen image, even in the tiniest crackerbox of a theater, is larger than life. And some say the impact of that image is greater than it should be.

"Look Who's Talking Now," if spoken with the proper inflection, could easily pass as a title for the next Stephen King novel — "Honey, Did I Just Hear the Garbage Compactor Say It Was HUNGRY?" Unfortunately, the movie is something far scarier — the third installment of the tired John Travolta-Kirstie Alley comedy saga whose main conceit, until now, was to have big-name stars crack voiceover jokes over shots of impossibly cut-gurgling toddlers.

In other words, it's Hollywood high concept at its worst.

As the latest sequel opens, Travolta and Alley's rug rats have

grown old enough to speak for themselves, so the filmmakers had to come up with something new to bestow the power of speech onto. Presumably after much brainstorming, they have settled on... dogs. Yes, it has come to this.

Danny DeVito and Diane Keaton (both collecting easy paychecks here) provide the voices for Rocks and Daphne, Rocks being a frisky, unmannered pooch little Mikey (David Gallagher) convinces his dad (Travolta) to bring home, and Daphne a snooty poodle James' new boss (Lysette Anthony) drops off for baby-sitting while she goes on an extended business trip.

This horrifies Mollie (Alley), who

was dead-set in the first place against having even one pooch in the house, but she puts up with the two pets for the sake of Mikey and James. Soon the dogs are tearing the house apart and arguing heatedly.

Eventually a plot kicks in about Mollie's suspicions toward James' close relationship with his boss, and it has all the sophistication of a "Love American Style" vignette.

The movie grows increasingly ludicrous, culminating in a climax in which Rocks must defend the family against a pack of ravenous wolves.

It also gets schmaltzy, capitalizing on its Christmas-time setting to evoke shameless cheap sentiment (at one point, "Silent Night" creeps onto the soundtrack). (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

Shatner discovers he's object of contempt

Poor William Shatner, aka Capt. James Tiberius Kirk of the Starship Enterprise. Nothing would have made him happier, the actor notes in the epilogue of "Star Trek: The Motion Picture," his autobiography co-authored by Chris Kreski, than to be able to end his reminiscences about the beloved TV series "with the simple phrase 'And the cast, crew and creatives of 'Star Trek' lived happily ever after.'"

But as Shatner discovered in catching up with his old colleagues, not only had some of them not lived happily ever after, but they also hadn't been terribly joyful while they were doing "the show" — thank "it" good measure to him.

Nichelle Nichols, who played crewmate Uhura, complained about Shatner's self-involvement and his disarming tendency to deem her character's lines of dialogue unnecessary. Walter Koenig (who played Ensign Chekov) voiced similar sentiments. Jimmy Doohan (Scotty) refused to meet with Shatner, claiming that he "won't want to hear the negatives."

Well, live and learn. At least now Shatner knows why some of his former estimates had been "rather cool" to him at "Star Trek" conventions. Of course, he never meant to hurt anyone, he writes now, seemingly chastened, though he admits he may have been "ignorant" of his fellow actors' need for screen time.

But the other actors will have to write their own books. These are Shatner's "Star Trek" memories, and fans of the series will find anecdotes here on a variety of Enterprise issues: Leonard Nimoy's Vulcan ears; the flap engendered by a proposed kiss (reportedly the small scratch's first interracial smooch) between Kirk and Uhura; and the challenge of coming up with special effects on the cheap, which involved scrounging through

TV studio trash bins in search of other props' cast-off props.

Despite the show's popularity today, the series got off to a shaky start. It was the brainchild of Los Angeles cop-turned-writer-producer Gene Roddenberry, who conceived the futuristic saga as set aboard a starship called the USS Yorktown, with a captain named Robert April and a red-dish, half-martin, fox-tailed crew member called Mr. Spock. The first "Star Trek" pilot show was deemed "too cerebral."

However, the network liked the second pilot better, and the show made its network debut in September 1966, to mediocre ratings and bad reviews, with Shatner singled out for his "wooden" acting. Saved from cancellation after both the first and second seasons by orchestrated write-in campaigns, the series made it through a third before getting the ax in 1969.

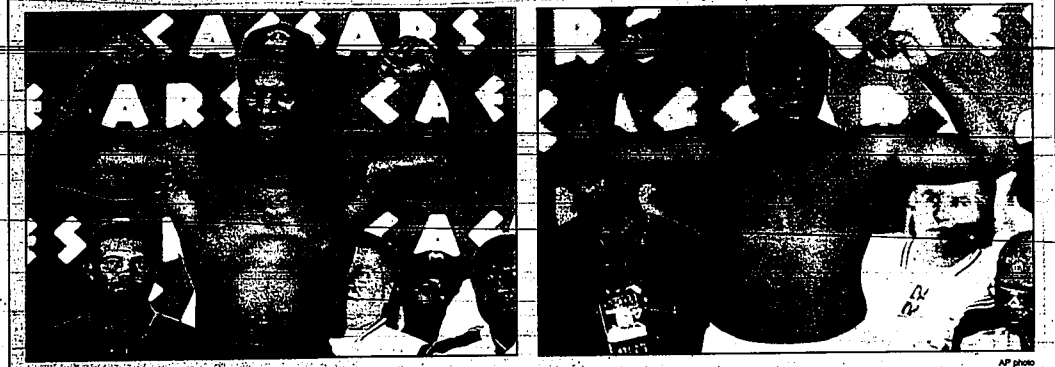

"While we're not going to be in the running for the team titles, still we have to remember we had only two boys and two girls on our teams at this time last year," Sievers said.

The Chicago Bulls — apparently on the way down — met the Charlotte Hornets — a team on the way up — in the most significant game among 13 NBA openers Friday night.

Even coach Phil Jackson calls the Bulls a longshot for their fourth consecutive league title following Michael Jordan's retirement, despite the return of most of the veterans, who Jordan called "my supporting cast."

"I miss him, but we have to deal with reality," said guard John Paxson, whose 3-pointer with 3.9 seconds left in Game 6 against Phoenix was the decisive shot in the NBA Finals. "We still have a core of guys who won three championships, and we've added Toni Kukoc, who's very talented offensively."

The Bulls' preparation has been slowed by All-Star Scottie Eppert's recovery from off-season wrist and ankle surgery. He only played in Chicago's final two exhibition games.

"We would have liked to start growing as a team from Day 1 after Michael left, but we haven't had Scottie, either, for most of the pre-season," Paxson said.

Along with veterans teams like New York and Cleveland, the young Bulls are ready to step in for the Bulls.

Third-year pro Larry Johnson, with a 12-year, \$84 million contract extension, is expected to become one of the elite players in the NBA, but he will get help from new acquisitions Moses Hawkins at guard and center Alenzo Mourning, a defensive stand-out who also averaged 20 points last season as a rookie.

"You don't want to count out those guys over there," Johnson said of the Bulls. "If somebody goes down or somebody retires like that, that usually picks up everybody else's game."

"Chicago is hearing all this ... Guys take that personally. They turn around and play just as hard. Mike was Mike and Mike was the man, but they have guys who can

Mourning made it sound basic. "I can stop them from scoring, you get the ball back," he said. "It's that simple."

Mourning spent part of the off-season at Georgetown working with fellow former Hoyas Patrick Ewing and Dikembe Mutombo.

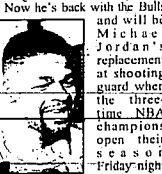
"I read where someone said, 'The harder you work, the luckier you get,'" Mourning said. "I want to be the luckiest person in basketball."

Myers steps into Michael Jordan's shoes

DEERFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Pete Myers has been waived five times, traded once and played in Europe since being drafted by the Chicago Bulls in 1986. Now he's back with the Bulls and will be Michael Jordan's replacement at shooting guard when the three-time NBA champion opens his season Friday night at Charlotte.

"It's been a long journey," the 30-year-old Myers said.

Myers is aware that no one can really replace Jordan, but he is thankful for the opportunity.

"I know I'm not Michael," he said. "I'm far away from being Michael ... A lot of players in the NBA are not even close to Michael's stats. So, I can live on it."

"Somebody had to replace Kareem [Abdul-Jabbar], somebody had to replace Will Chamberlain. Everybody is going to have a replacement. I'm going to need a replacement sooner or later. So, I don't even worry about that."

Myers never thought he would be in this situation six months ago.

"I'm sure the Bulls management wouldn't imagine anything like this, but I'm in this position and I hope I can perform to the potential that they expect of me," he said. "I'm confident. I believe in myself as a person, as a player. I'm just going to do the things I know I'm capable of doing."

Board approves Toronto franchise

NEW YORK (AP) — The NBA on Thursday welcomed Toronto as an expansion team for \$125 million, delayed a decision on awarding a franchise to Vancouver and voted to suspend for as many as two games players who repeatedly are called for flagrant fouls.

Completing two days of meetings, the Board of Governors unanimously approved the NBA Expansion Committee's Sept. 30 recommendation that a Toronto group led by John Bitove Jr. be awarded a franchise for the league's 28th team in the 1995-96 season. The franchise fee of \$125 million is nearly four times the \$32.5 million it cost expansion teams in Miami, Orlando, Charlotte and Minnesota over a two-year period in the late 1980s.

The board postponed for up to two months a decision on whether to award a franchise to the Vancouver group led by Arthur Griffiths, but Expansion Committee chairman Jerry Colangelo termed the city's chance as excellent. Vancouver also would enter the NBA in 1997.

The NBA said the Toronto and Vancouver teams would get the sixth and seventh picks in the first round of the 1995 draft, and if Toronto comes in alone, it would get the sixth pick.

An expansion draft also will be held for the new teams, with each existing club losing one player after being allowed to protect eight players.

"We are as excited as we can get about bringing NBA basketball to Canada and Toronto," NBA commissioner David Stern said. "It's a spectacular day for our international expansion."

Stern defended the huge increase in the franchise fee, saying the league used a formula that determined that a team could be profitably operated after paying the \$125 million fee.

Stern added that the NBA's television revenues are in the area of a quarter of what they were when the last four franchises were awarded.

Vancouver, a latecomer to the league used a formula compared to the three separate bids that the NBA received from Toronto, saw its hopes increase to join the league with Toronto.

"We're happy with the one team we've chosen, but I got the feeling that having two teams would be an added plus," deputy commissioner Russ Granik said.

"There is a strong case for bringing in two Canadian franchises," Colangelo said.

Bitove, seeking to quiet doubts that pro basketball could be successful in a country where hockey is so popular, said market research indicated that five million people within

a two-hour drive of Toronto would consider attending at least one game and three million would consider attending two or more games.

Bitove said the name of the team, which will play in SkyDome in its first season and in a new 22,000-seat downtown arena after that, would be decided in a contest next year.

Under the new violence rule, a player will receive a point for a Flagrant 1 foul — defined as unnecessary contact by a player against an opponent — and two points for a Flagrant 2 foul — defined as unnecessary and excessive contact.

If a player with four points commits a Flagrant 2 foul, he will be suspended for a game. If a player with five or six points commits a Flagrant 1 foul, he will be suspended for a game, a player with five or six points whistled for a Flagrant 2 foul will be suspended for two games, and a player with seven or more points committing any Flagrant foul will receive a two-game suspension.

The board also voted to continue the fighting policy started before the 1993 playoffs.

Any player who throws a punch, regardless of whether it connects or not, will be ejected from the game, suspended for at least one additional game and fined. Teams will be fined an amount equal to the sum of their players' fines.

Any player leaving the bench after a fight will be fined \$2,500, and the player's team will be fined \$5,000 for each of its players who leave the bench area.

Additionally, any player in street clothes who leaves the bench area during a fight will be ejected and suspended for one game. Any player in street clothes who gets involved in an altercation will be ejected, fined at least \$10,000 and suspended for at least one game, and his team will be fined \$10,000.

In other business, the NBA announced that the Board of Governors will vote in the next few days on whether to further weight the NBA draft lottery in favor of the worst teams.

Under current lottery rules, the worst team had an 11 in 66 chance of winning the first pick and the best non-playoff team a 1 in 66 chance. After Orlando won the first pick for the second consecutive time this year, owners are considering changing the odds to 250 in 1,000 for the worst team and five in 1,000 for the best team.

For the first time, the NBA director of operations, said that veteran referee Darrell Garretson will relinquish his on-court duties after this season, his 27th as an official. Garretson, the league's chief referee for the past 12 years, will assume the new, full-time position of director of officiating.

Productivity, factory orders, jobless claims reflect stronger recovery

WASHINGTON — The U.S. economy unfurled more flags signaling a stronger recovery — sharply improved worker productivity in the third quarter, increased factory orders in September and fewer new claims for jobless benefits last week.

All the numbers are looking pretty good and moving in the right direction," said Sung Won Sohn, an economist with the Norwest Corp. in Minneapolis.

The Labor Department reported Thursday that productivity shot up at a 3.9 percent annual rate from July through September, rebounding from declines during the prior two quarters.

At the same time, the Commerce Department said factory orders increased 0.7 percent, to a seasonally adjusted \$255.2 billion, the third advance in four months.

And in a third report, the Labor Department said the number of new claims for unemployment insurance dropped by 10,000

last week, to 338,000, the lowest level in a month.

A bimonthly business confidence index released Thursday by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce appeared to support the view the economy had begun to pick up. It rose to 46 in October from 45.6 in August, although it still was well below the 62.4 reached in both December and February.

"The upturn is another sign that the recovery is picking up some steam after a particularly slow first half of the year," said

Chamber economist Robert Barr.

The news followed an October survey by the Federal Reserve, released Wednesday, that also found a moderately growing economy, paced by consumer spending, particularly for autos, and by residential construction.

Still, major retailers reported Thursday that consumers were spending cautiously in October, which historically has been a good barometer of Christmas sales activity.

Discount stores and a revitalized Sears,

Roebuck and Co. posted the strongest results. But some department stores and specialty apparel retailers reported poor sales, partly because warm weather curbed clothing.

The new data preceded the Labor Department's next employment report. Many analysts predicted the department would report Friday that 135,000 new jobs were created in October, although the unemployment rate was expected to remain at 6.7 percent for the third straight month.

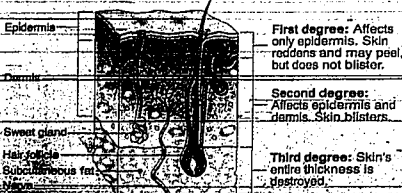
Fires threaten endangered birds

Healing Fire's Wounds

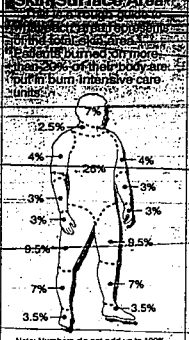
Speed is essential when treating fire victims at burn centers, such as the Sherman Oaks Hospital and Health Center. Victims are treated by a burn team composed of several doctors, a surgeon and, if there is smoke inhalation, a pulmonologist.

Degrees of Burns

First-, second- and third-degree burns are referred to by medical personnel as superficial partial thickness, partial thickness and full thickness burns. Partial and full thickness burn victims receive specialized care in a burn unit.

Treatment

- Patients with second- or third-degree burns undergo the following treatment: The recovery period varies with the severity of the injuries, but may take several months.
1. Burn team evaluates injuries. Vital signs taken.
 2. Burn is cleaned with soap and water. Gauze dressing with silver sulfadiazine, an antibiotic and pain reliever, is applied.
 3. Pain killers, such as morphine, are administered intravenously.
 4. Intravenous solution is administered to replace fluids lost through edema, when fluid flows from unburned parts of the body to burned areas.
 5. Once stabilized, patient is put in hyperbaric chamber, in which oxygen-rich atmosphere decreases swelling and hastens healing.

Smoke Inhalation

Smoke consists of oxides of nitrogen, sulphur and lead among other substances. When smoke is inhaled, carbon in the smoke attaches to the hemoglobin in the blood, preventing cells from absorbing oxygen. Hyperbaric oxygen treatment is used to displace the carbon from the hemoglobin.

WASHINGTON — The Southern California wildfires that have destroyed hundreds of homes and blackened tens of thousands of acres also may

have scorched a government effort to negotiate a compromise in one of the state's most nettlesome endangered-species controversies.

Seven months ago, Interior Secretary Bruce Bab-

bit joined with California officials, developers and environmentalists to announce a plan for saving both the threatened California gnatcatcher and the development prospects of some of the state's most

valuable coastal real estate south of Los Angeles. But the recent series of fires has destroyed thousands of acres of coastal sage scrub habitat favored by the songbird and several hundred pairs of the birds,

as well. As a result, plans for the pioneering habitat conservation plan in Orange, Riverside and San Diego counties may have to be significantly rewritten.

The plan is designed to permit the killing of some gnatcatchers through development of some of their habitat in return for the establishment of reserves elsewhere.

One of the areas considered most suitable for a reserve, the San Juan Hills area of Orange County, was particularly hard hit by the fires. Most of the area's coastal sage scrub habitat was destroyed, along with as many as 200 pairs of gnatcatchers, according to a preliminary estimate by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

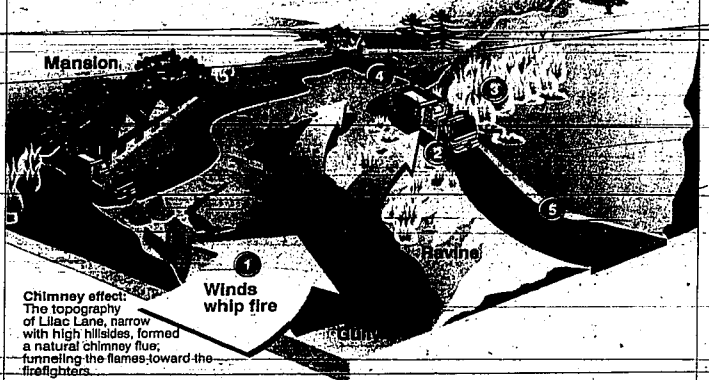
"I don't think it's doomed the process by any means," I said. Joel Reynolds, a lawyer with the Natural Resources Defense Council, "But it clearly requires a biological review of what kind of habitat loss is acceptable, if any."

The habitat conservation plan envisioned the loss of up to 5 percent of the roughly 2,500 pairs of gnatcatchers remaining in Southern California. But the recent fires may have killed 15 percent of nesting pairs, according to early estimates.

Scientists expect the sage scrub habitat to recover, but it will take from five to 10 years. Interior Department officials have been somewhat reluctant to discuss the effects of the fires on the fate of a tiny bird amid so much human suffering. "It's obviously going to have an impact on planning" for the conservation of the gnatcatcher, said Babbitt spokesman Kevin Sweeney, "but that is not the concern right now."

'It's Starting to Turn on Us'

A sudden shift of wind down a narrow canyon created a wall of flame that trapped four firefighters stalled on Lila Lane to protect a mansion and nearby houses. All four were injured — some critically, some seriously. The erratic fire began about 1 a.m. Wednesday near Santa Susana Pass Road and burned to the southwest into Ventura County and along Box Canyon Road.



Chimney effect: The topography of Lila Lane, narrow with high hillsides, formed a natural chimney flue, funneling the flames toward the firefighters.

1. At about 5 a.m., a radio call warns firefighters; burned and gusting winds have suddenly shifted direction.
2. Escape impossible: Four firefighters scramble into the cab. There is no time to don breathing masks.
3. Flames 40 to 50 feet high engulf the fire engine, breaking out the windows. The fire jumps the road, igniting the nearby hillsides.
4. A minute later, the firefighters, burned and suffering from smoke inhalation, walk to a nearby fire engine for help.
5. The firefighters are treated at the scene and rushed to area hospitals.

Man admits Noah's Ark hoax

HOLLYWOOD — The man who said he discovered the snow-covered, 4,000-year-old Noah's Ark high on Mount Ararat in Turkey, and who displayed what he claimed to be an ancient piece of wood from inside the ark as proof on a CBS special earlier this year, now says it was a hoax.

George Jannal, an out-of-work Israeli actor living in Long Beach, Calif., admitted in an interview this week that he made up the story to expose those who produce and broadcast what he considers to be poorly researched religious propaganda.

Presented with this information by the Los Angeles Times, CBS said Friday it had decided to scrap two projects that were in development with Sun International Pictures, the Salt Lake City-based production company that made "The Incredible Discovery of Noah's Ark," which CBS broadcast in February to an estimated 20 million Americans.

But "Mysteries of the Ancient World," another program from Sun examining such phenomena as the Sphinx, Nostrodamus, the Bermuda Triangle and the Shroud of Turin, has essentially been completed and will air on CBS. That program has been carefully reviewed for accuracy by the network's legal department and program practices department, Tick said.

"Incredible Discovery" came under strong criticism because its use for the existence of Noah's Ark, as described in the Bible, was based heavily on the views of creationists who oppose the scientific theory of evolution.

"We're a motion-picture producer, and we don't take a point of view," creationist "Newswatch" said Sun President Allan Pedersen.

Asked if Sun planned to revise its research techniques to prevent similar hoaxes, Pedersen said that such safety measures have always been in place.

"We certainly will be as conscientious as we can and scrutinize sources as closely as we can in the future," he said. "But frankly, we took the same due diligence before all this. My stance is that it's just about impossible to defend against that kind of well-planned and well-thought-out deception."

Cron, Jannal's perspective, the deception was painfully obvious. The "sacred wood" from the ark was actually from some railroad tracks in Long Beach, he said, and he has never set foot in Turkey.

"This is a scam that has been pulled on the American public; and it's gone too far," Jannal said from his home this week, holding the scrap of wood that he hardened by cooking it in an oven. Referring to Sun and CBS, he said: "They're foisting religious propaganda on Americans and making them believe it's true. So I honed the hoaxes."

CBS does not plan to run an on-air correction. "A, there's no format to do it, and B, it's just going to attract more attention to this," Tick said.

Sitcom characters enjoy friendship

Dave Thomas is proud of the "kind of novel" element that helps separate "Grace Under Fire" from the rest of the sitcom pack. Its two leading characters aren't sleeping together.

The Canadian-born actor, who plays general pharmacist Russell Norton on this season's breakout hit (nirving Wednesdays on ABC), says the funny and touch-relationship between Russell and Southern-bred divorcee Grace Kelly evolved very naturally out of his personal chemistry-writer-sues son Brett Butler.

"Originally, Russell was drafted to be a potential boyfriend for Grace," he recalls, "and the way the chemistry between Brett and me worked out, it seemed better if Russell became a friend. What I like about it now is it's a great heterosexual friendship with no sex. We are friends. We confer on personal matters and cry on each other's shoulders about being divorced singles — and then goes our separate ways when it comes to dating." He pauses, setting up his punchline: "And come back together (afterward) to commiserate."

This refreshing and unconventional (at least for network television) relationship has proven fertile ground for the comedy. Thomas adds happily, "On the show, we just finish shooting the two of us are on a double date together. Her date is the stingiest man in the world, and my date is a complete hypochondriac. And those two end up going home together, then we go home together — not for sex, I just give her a ride. It's really sweet and interesting. I think it's

the best part I could have hoped for."

His "Grace" success comes after a decade of relative quiet that was largely self-imposed after he became "spooked" by the through-the-roof success of Bob and Doug McKenzie, the dimwitted Canadian characters he and Rick Moranis created for "SCTV." The comedy series won Thomas an Emmy for writing. "I had a bewildered and shaken Thomas who decided to take a long sabbatical at his home in Toronto. 'Hid' would be more accurate," he recalls soberly. "I had a lot of money dumped in my lap real fast ... I really didn't know what to do. And the odd part of it was, it was for something that Rick and I created as a throwaway. The things we spent our time working on and crafting ... didn't get anywhere near the commercial acceptance that Bob and Doug did, and it made me feel like a fool — like my ability to communicate was not in my power but in fact was some Vegas wheel spinning in the background that stops at some place that I have no control over. And so I thought, 'I don't want to be a part of this.'"

"Today," he says, "he's quite content with his work on 'Grace.'" "Brett's carrying this show on her shoulders, and I'm not," he says, with audible glee. "So I get to be comic relief on and off the set. She's shared me with her ability to act and handle material, and it turns over very fast on this show. Brett has created a really unique character. I ran into someone last night who said, 'There's something wrong with her, nice, easy draw — then she'll sucker-punch you with four or five jolts.'"

Wayne's world: Actor appears in 3 TV series

LOS ANGELES — Wayne Knight, his pessimist's heart expanded, is fretting: Regular roles in three TV series this season may be overkill for viewers.

"You can only eat peanuts for so long and then you're tired and tired of peanuts," says the actor, squeezing in an interview between work on "The Second Half" and "Seinfeld." He's also appearing in "Against the Grain."

Knight offers evidence: an irate viewer he met during another run of professional luck, when he appeared in TV projects and the film "JFK" in rapid succession.

"This woman saw me in the grocery store and said, 'I saw you last night on this thing and I saw you in the other thing — and now you're in my store!'" Knight recounts in felleto.

Sheesh, some people. But don't let one sourpuss ruin it for the rest of us who know a fine character actor when they see him, and who can never see him too much.

On Tuesdays, Knight plays a gruff newspaper editor for "Second Half." Thursdays, you might catch him as the Annoying Newtman on "Seinfeld," the kind of man who believes Kramer (Michael Richards) can be one sharp guy.

Look for him Fridays on the critically acclaimed drama "Against the Grain" as friendly, football-obsessed Freddie Wilson. All three series are on NBC.

Knight's TV success follows his role as the greedy, junk-food-gobbling computer nerd who gets dinosaurs to run amok in "Jurassic Park."

Compare him to the memorable character actors who grab films

in the 1930s and '40s and Knight is pleased.

"That's what I want to be," he vows, sounding excited as he invokes names including Edward Arnold; the baritone-voiced figure of authority — or villainy — in such classics as "Meet John Doe."

"I'd like to be wearing tuxedos and saying, 'Now, you listen here,'" Knight says. "I'd love that. I'm sorry the studio's system's gone."

He has the same heft as Arnold, although he's peeled off 40 pounds since "Jurassic Park," and a broad smile that can be alternately warm, neurotic or menacing. It's all in a day's work for a supporting actor.

"Even if I get my face fixed and get a tummy tuck — which I won't — I still want to be a character actor, because I think they have the best job in the business," Knight says.

Series ponders higher law with fundamentalist Christian

Newly arrived on the "L.A. Law" set last August, Alexandra Powers mentioned to fellow cast members that she'd been married two days before. "How long did you live together?" actor Corbin Bernsen asked casually.

"They never had, she coolly replied. After all," she says, "if you're going to make a commitment like that, you might as well just get married."

Talk about life imitating art, Powers plays Jane Halliday, the newest associate at the fictional television law firm—a virgin and a fundamentalist Christian—while Bernsen plays the amoral lawyer Arnie Becker. Both hold forth each Thursday at 10 p.m. ET on NBC.

There is, in fact, a lot of Powers in Jane Halliday. "She doesn't share Halliday's strong Christian faith." But like the character, Powers is a smooth, sweet, soft-spoken professional trying to maintain traditional values in an anything-goes world.

"Friends say I'm old-fashioned on dating and manners, and how men and women speak to each other," says Powers by telephone from Los Angeles. "Everyone is so intent on being equal, and I agree with being able to go into any kind of work or

study. But as far as relations go, something has been lost.

"With the man I married, our first 14 dates were just coffee and a walk. To me, that's old-fashioned and sweet."

Those two words could also describe her character, who represents probably the most moderate, nuanced portrayal of a fundamentalist ever seen in a network series. The Halliday character was introduced on the show's season-opener on Oct. 7, when she was interviewed for a job with the law firm. Judging from that episode, her inclusion in the show clearly is meant to probe hypocrisy among liberals.

Hearing that Halliday is a graduate of Bob Jones University, the partners' eyebrows rise. "You might find us something of a godless bunch," one says. He is unimpressed when Jane says she is "pretty accepting of people."

Feminist lawyer Anne-Kelsey later derides Halliday as "a member of the religious right," with backward views on abortion, homosexuality and free speech—even though the interview has raised none of those topics. During the same episode, Kelsey hypocritically defends a woman claiming to be the victim of a sexist employer.

The deciding vote to accept Halliday into the law firm is cast by the womanizing Becker, who hits on her even before she is hired. He is floored when she politely informs him that she intends to remain a virgin until her wedding night. Of course, it remains to be seen whether the "L.A. Law" writers will let her.

Halliday shows a tougher side in the second episode, when she goes after the federal government for not helping a sick, Persian Gulf veteran. When he turns suicidal, she talks him off a ledge.

The character represents a sharp departure from the rigid, Southern, fanatical bigots that TV and movies usually present as fundamentalists. One of the few sympathetic portrayals was on the '80s series "St. Elsewhere," when a doctor had a conversion after a medical test showed he didn't have AIDS. However, even that character preached woodenly and constantly-touted a Bible.

Powers sympathizes, to an extent, with Christian complaints that the media stereotype and reject them. "A lot of people rant about the freedom to do or think as they please, but they don't give the same freedom to others. I think there is a fear of the conservative voice."

Powers has no problems with being typecast. She played a prostitute in the film "Rising Sun" and an accused murder-

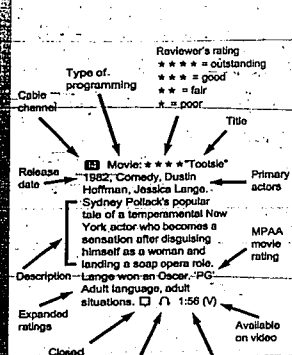

Host won't focus on exploitive issues

It didn't take much persuading to get Ricki Lake to host her own daytime talk show.

"I was always a talk-show junkie. My favorites were Oprah, Sally Jessy Raphael, Jerry Springer," said Lake, 25, a charmingly upbeat and down-to-earth performer.

"It's so gratifying. I get to think on my feet, I get to be spontaneous. And I've always been at the center of the camera."

Best known for her splashy movie debut as a dance-crazy '60s teenager in John Waters' cult favorite "Hairspray," Lake fashioned a very successful early career as a nightclub singer with a heart of gold, moving from "Hairspray" to TV movies and then a recurring role on the network's "Holly Hobbie."

Holly Peligrino Beach. But for the character of "Ricki Lake," she played a young adult and focusing on relationship issues. Lake took a break from her acting career.

The nationally syndicated show debuted in September, hoping to carve out a new niche in the crowded daytime chatterbox zoo. "Ricki Lake," featuring its own twentysomething host, is very intentionally targeted at a younger viewership.

"We're basically geared for an audience in their 20s and 30s," Lake said during a recent interview. "Shows about menopause or mid-life crises don't really appeal to me."

Instead, "Ricki Lake" opts for topics like "I Want to Confess the Person I Lost My Virginity to." Other shows have dealt with children who try to fix their single parents up with dates and women who are turned off by their boyfriends' sexual turn-ons.

A slightly different variation on the same old sleazy, tabloid talk show stuff?

Not at all, said Lake.

"We do not do exploitive issues. We don't put people on the stage to make fun of them. They're up there to tell their stories. We don't do freaks or transsexuals or transvestites just so we can laugh at them."

If Lake has a talk show idiosyncrasy, she has appeared on the Winfrey show in the past. And now, as the rookie host of her own show, Lake calls Oprah "the queen."

"She's incredibly empathetic and real. And she's such a generous woman."

Like Winfrey, Lake had to deal with her psycho-emotional baggage

about being overweight. Over the past 2 1/2 years, Lake has shed 115 pounds by banning fast food from her life (Get lost, Big Macs!) and undertaking a vigorous exercise program.

"My career was based on my physical attributes," Lake freely acknowledges. "I owe everything to being fat. You've got to have a gimmick. And I was the first fat leading lady."

First, because "Hairspray" came out in early 1988, six months before Roseanne Arnold's "Roseanne" first stormed the airwaves.

"My mother was always trying to get me to lose weight," recalls Lake, who grew up in suburban New York.

"I constantly took singing and dancing lessons as a child. I knew I wanted to be an actress. But my mother didn't encourage me because she didn't want me to be rejected."

"I wasn't the typical blond-blonded kid. And I was always five or 10 pounds heavier than everyone else."

Later on, when she was fat and successful after leaving college to make "Hairspray" at age 18, Lake said she was also quite content.

"When I was heavy, I always felt that I was very happy. But I just know that I'm 10 times happier now. I'm not thin. But I look fine."

She also sounds fine, a talk show host who seems genuinely interested in her guests. In those inevitably awkward talk show moments

when people are confessing past traumas and embarrassment—Lake can seem caring without ever going over the line into cloying. And she doesn't showboat like other talk show hosts, including, most notably, Geraldo Rivera.

"I'm just trying to be myself and not do anything offensive," Lake said. And, yes, she seems to have a natural on-camera flair for putting people at ease. "When I was growing up, I was always the one people ran to to tell their secrets."

Lake hasn't forsaken acting for the total talk show life.

Later this year, she'll be teamed with "Hairspray" director Waters again in "Serial Mom," an over-the-top comedy in which Lake portrays the daughter of a decidedly homicidal Kathleen Turner.

But right now, Lake is getting a real kick out of clucking with the talk show challenge. The joy is easy to explain. "It's having an opinion and being able to express it every day for an hour," Lake said.

Rivers picks up shopping show

NEW YORK (AP) — The syndicated "Joan Rivers Show" will end its five-year run on New Year's Eve, replaced Jan. 3 by "Can We Shop?," a daily, dirt-fishing, celebrity-filled, home-shopping hour starring you-know-who.

"We're going to see everything that I have always done. And we're also going to be selling, because that's what everybody's doing now," Rivers disclosed Friday on "CBS This Morning."

"Can We Shop?" will be a joint venture of Rivers, TruTV Entertainment Co., QVC Network and Regal Communi-

cations, a leading producer of infomercials.

Rivers and her partners originally intended to continue her Emmy Award-winning talk show, but she said they eventually realized that it was physically impossible to do the required number of shows-per-week along with all of my other commitments.

Rivers' syndicator, Tribune Entertainment, said the new show is scheduled to air in 24 of the top 30 U.S. markets and 11 of the top 12.

Those stations include the Tribune-owned stations in New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, Philadelphia and At-

lanta, the Paramount stations in Washington, Detroit, Houston and Dallas, as well as stations in San Francisco, Cleveland and Milwaukee.

Rivers, who joined QVC, a home-shopping network, in 1990, has sold \$60 million in jewelry and fashions, becoming—the company's—leading celebrity saleswoman.

"This is the future of shopping," said Tribune spokesman Bob Carr. "Viewer activity or a viewer call with an entertainment component—that's the new aspect of the show that no one else has. We think we've got a winner here."

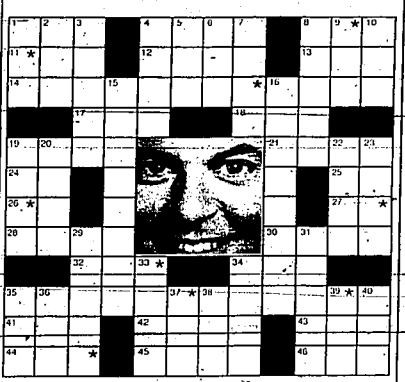

Animated 'Rock-a-doodle' airs Wednesday Public-service announcements help kids cope

BURBANK, Calif. — "Rock-a-Doodle," the animated film about a young boy whose vivid dream takes him on a colorful musical adventure premieres on The Disney Channel at 8 p.m. (Eastern/Pacific) Wednesday.

Edmond is a small boy — portrayed in live action — whose active imagination takes hold of a bedtime story about Chanticleer, a song-filled rooster who bellows out a tune like Elvis Presley. He and his farm animal friends believe it is his crow that makes the sun rise each morning. But when the Grand Duke of Owls sends and evil stranger to attack and distract him one morning at daybreak, Chanticleer forgets to crow and they discover the day can end without him. Feeling humiliated, Chanticleer leaves the farm for the big city. The wicked owl, who craves the darkness and will stop at nothing to prevent the rooster's return, has accomplished his evil mission.

As Edmond's mother reads him the story, a flood threatens his family's farm home. The boy remains convinced that only Chanticleer's crow can bring the sun back and keep the flood waters away. Edmond falls asleep and dreams that the evil Grand Duke of Owls turns into a fluffy white kitten to prevent him from seeking out Chanticleer. Undeterred, Edmond (now a kitten in a fantasy animated farm overtaken by flood waters) and his barnyard buddies — Patton, a trusty old farm dog; Peepers, a smart mouse; and Smokey, a wisecracking pig — leave the flooding farm and their helpless animal friends behind to find Chanticleer.

Control kids' TV time with blocking device

Ruth Tiggart worried that her children, Christian, 12, and Justina, 16, watched too much television.

So last spring the Torrance, Calif., single parent bought a remote control device, a device resembling a desktop calculator and costing about \$100, that limits TV time to nine hours a week for each child. Parents preset the machine, giving each child an access number and entering the number of hours of TV watching allowed. When time's up, the child's number—worn 4-turn on the set. The parent has an override code number.

"It works great," says Ruth Tiggart. "I think the biggest result is that they think about something they really want to watch. They don't just turn it on to have noise in the house."

"It's hard to watch a whole football game because it zaps out half your time," says Christian, a TV sports fanatic who will enter seventh grade this fall. "I've had to juggle with Sega games, sports programs and regular shows. But I managed after the first couple of weeks."

Justina, a high school junior, is less enthused.

"I don't really like it a whole lot," she says. "At a lot of times when I want to watch a certain show, I can't because I want to watch others. It's kind of good because I have time to do other things. I've been doing a lot more reading."

TV allowance is one version of the television blocking systems advocated in recent weeks by Rep. Edward J. Markey, D-Mass., chair-

man of the House Telecommunications subcommittee, which is holding hearings on television violence.

Markey proposes legislation — dubbed the V-Chip Bill — that would require networks and cable broadcasters to show a "V" on the screen before a violent program starts. All new televisions would be equipped with a computer chip that when activated would block out the show when the "V" was broadcast.

In Markey's bill, the television industry would establish criteria for rating TV violence. The chip costs less than \$1 a set, he says. All televisions are already equipped with similar technology since Congress required, effective in June, that sets contain a microprocessor to receive and display captioning for the deaf.

"It's unclear what would happen on screen when a program was blocked, a spokesperson for Markey says, but when a channel is blocked in other systems an on-screen message explains the situation."

Most existing technology can block only a whole channel, for example the PlayBox Channel.

With these systems, "basically you identify a channel or a number of channels, assign them some kind of code through the remote control, and instruct the TV not to display that channel," says Evon Beckford, head of the Consumers Union research group, which evaluated 1993

Like channel blockers, TV allowance has a limited function, setting only the number of hours a child watches, but not what is viewed. However, the future may hold more options for parents who want to control their televisions electronically.

Joseph N. Jackson, chairman of Protecon, a small Los Angeles company, testified before the House subcommittee about his TeleCommander, a device he plans to manufacture.

"We decided to broaden areas of management for a parent," says Protecon president Jim Brian. The TeleCommander will allow parents a number of choices in addition to limiting watching hours and blocking channels. With the free-standing device, which looks like a cable box, parents can block out specific time frames — for example home-work hours on school nights — and block specific programs.

In addition to its "negative" use, there's a positive function, Brian says. The family can sit down together and select favorites the children are allowed to watch and pro-

gram the TeleCommander to show only those programs.

The company plans to have a production model of the device in about six weeks and hopes to be ready to manufacture by December. The retail price will be in the \$79-\$89 range, Brian says.

He also points out that the circuitry devices, which the company hopes to license to television and VCR manufacturers and cable companies, only costs about \$10 — so installing it would not significantly increase the consumer prices of TVs or cable services.

In another system, TV Guide on Screen of Denver is test-marketing a satellite system based on Motion Picture Association of America ratings. The software produces a list of upcoming shows on the subscriber's TV screen, and the parent can use the remote control to zap those they don't want their kids to see. The system costs about \$1 a month, says company president Bruce Davis.

The technology gives rise to other issues. Carole Lieberman, an assistant clinical professor of psychiatry at the University of California, Los Angeles and chair of the National Coalition on Television Violence, says she has reservations about the "V" chip because lawmakers or special-interest groups might gain control of rating systems and attempt to censor ideas they didn't like.

She says ratings "need to be done with input from mental health professionals and people who have done research in violence in media. They should not be done by production companies making decisions by the seat of their pants, decisions designed to lose the fewest viewers."

Are you teaching your children to lie if you tell them to say, "My mommy — (or — daddy) can't come to the phone right now," when their parents aren't home?

No, points out one astute 7-year-old: "If they're not home, they can't come to the phone!"

How to deal with strangers on the phone is the topic of just one of 105 public-service announcements being made by Fox Children's Network to help youngsters cope with contemporary issues. The 30- and 60-second spots run between shows during weekdays as well as Saturday mornings.

"Raven" (Symone — "The Cosby Show") is among young actors participating in the announcements, many of which are done music-video style. Categories include messages of racial tolerance, individuality and self-esteem; motivational spots, which deal with a variety of emotional issues such as families, divorce, step-families and fatherhood; and safety spots by John Walsh, whose 12-year-old son Adam was abducted from a mall more than a decade ago and later found murdered.

Saturday marks the premiere of the Walsh safety spots, which open with a look at what Walsh terms "good luck" — a child's safety.

"Seventy percent of crimes against children are done by trusted authority figures," he says. "It could be a family friend, a Boy Scout leader, a minister. This is not 'How to Avoid Being a Victim of Sexual Abuse, Let someone right away and get some help. It's important that they know that they have the power to say, 'No.' It's a very important message in these tough times. This is not 'How to Avoid Being a Victim of Abuse.' Knowledge is power and is truly important."

Walsh will look at gun safety, tell kids to never answer the door unless it is an emergency and advise youngsters to call 911. He also looks at a parking lot alone. (It is believed that Walsh's young son was abducted when he became separated from his mother in a store and went to the parking lot to look for her.) Since that time in 1981, Walsh has worked for children's rights and founded the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children.

"In addition to child safety, we're going to expand into dealing with 'murder' and 'social values,'" says Fox programming vice president Karen Barnes. "We're going to continue to run all the PSAs we've done since the kids' network began in 1991. We just kept increasing the number, since we're tried to stay away from any issues that are anything but perennial."

The Fox Children's Network public-service announcements for youngsters air twice Monday through Friday and five times on Saturday. Fox's The John Walsh safety spot warning against pedophiles airs Saturday after "Tiny Toons." For ages 2 to 12.

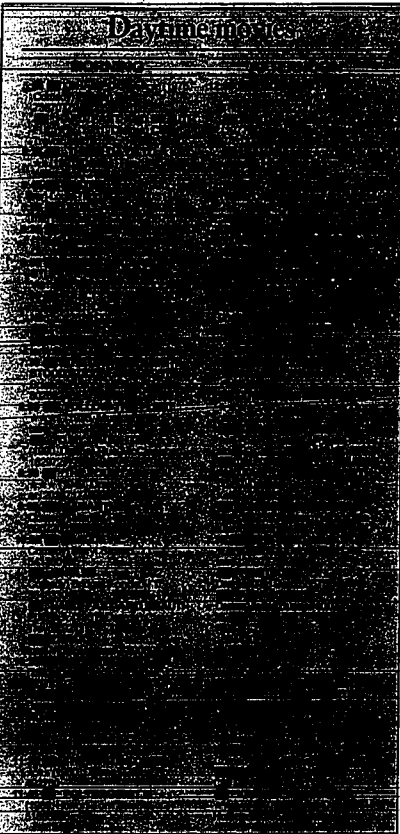

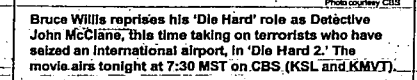

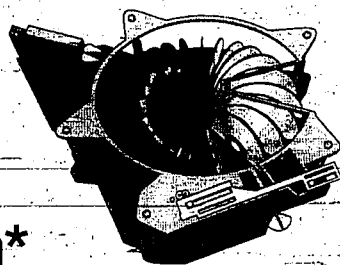
